






Mrs. Arthur H. Waite, Jr., Chairman of the Finance Committee, brought the recommendations from her Committee and moved that the suggested budget for 1964-1965 be adopted. Seconded by Mrs. R. Hugh Reid. Carried.

Mrs. Harold I. Tuthill, Chairman of the Resolutions Committee, presented the resolutions for recommendation to the State Conference. It was requested that letters be written to U. S. Senators Richard B. Russell and Herman E. Talmadge commending them on the principles in which they believe.

Mrs. Herman M. Richardson, First Vice Regent and Chairman of National Defense, gave a report on our immigration system and brought out the dangers facing the Walter-McCarren Act of 1952. She strongly urged the members to go out and vote on Election Day.

Mrs. R. RECOMMENDATIONS FROM THE FALL BOARD OF MANAGEMENT MEETING

WELFARE BY THE UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT

WHEREAS the marked increases in welfare programs and expansion of free governmental services have resulted in a notable weakening of and dependence on government by the citizens, even to the extent of demanding more and more from the government; and

WHEREAS there have been cases where these programs were sometimes poorly handled, and corruption and mis-management have been exposed; and

WHEREAS the churches in their communities have in years past directed the charity programs of our country, making charity voluntary, not compulsory by taxing heavily the citizens;

RESOLVED, That the members of the Georgia State Society of the NSDAR go on record as opposing expanded welfare programs by the United States Government, and that they recommend that charitable organizations be the center of offered charity and welfare.

AMERICAN HISTORY COURSES

WHEREAS more than fifty million young Americans are occupied with the business of their education, and at the present time we in the United States are spending nearly as much on education as the entire rest of the world combined; and

WHEREAS we should know what kind of education our young people are gaining; and as we are the sum of all our yesterdays, and only a knowledge of American History can bequeath the story of the beginning and development of our country; and

WHEREAS it is impossible for us to preserve what we have if we are ignorant of what we are preserving; and

WHEREAS at the present time many of our teacher's colleges do not require any course in American history to graduate, many

of our institutions of higher learning do not require students to study American history, and many colleges and universities do not require American history for admission; and

WHEREAS we are aware that there are inroads against loyalty to our nation, good citizenship, appreciation of our American heritages, and the great sacrifices it took to establish and preserve them;

RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, use its influence to have American history included as a required subject for graduation from high schools and colleges.

REAFFIRMATIONS

RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society reaffirm the following resolutions:

1. In favor of the Heritage of Prayer.
2. In favor of The Right to Possess Firearms.
3. In favor of Freedom of Expression.
4. In opposition to Total and Complete Disarmament.

MEMBERSHIP ROLL OF ANCESTORS

WHEREAS a ten year period has elapsed since the last membership Roll of Ancestors of Georgia members was published; and

WHEREAS it is the policy of the State Society to preserve these records in permanent form;

RESOLVED, That the State Registrar be instructed to compile such a record book during her term of office, and that the cost of the book be taken from the Lucy Cook Peel Fund.

PROJECTS

RESOLVED, That the use of the Special Projects Fund of \$700.00 be left to the discretion of the State Regent; and

WHEREAS the discipline in schools is reported to be inadequate, with antagonisms and disrespect toward those in authority being shown; and

WHEREAS the American way of life is having to be supervised daily by local and State police; and

WHEREAS the conduct of children is an outgrowth, usually, of the conditions of their home;

RESOLVED, That the members of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, deplore this condition, and call attention to the importance of discipline and training of the youth of America in their homes.

IMMIGRATION AND NATIONALITY LAWS

WHEREAS there are powerful forces in this nation pressing for the revising of our immigration and nationality laws; and

WHEREAS these bills would abolish the national origins quota system which assures continuity of pattern upon which our free institutions and society rests; more than triple immigration from 300,000 to an estimated 1,000,000 per year; weaken security screening provisions of the present laws against entry of Communist and other subversives; radically change the nature of overall immigration into the United States, i.e., immigrants from Asia and Africa;

RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, reaffirm its support of the now existing immigration and nationality laws.

TEXTBOOK SUBVERSION

WHEREAS a purpose of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution is to foster true patriotism and love of country; and

WHEREAS history should teach patriotism; and

WHEREAS many of our history textbooks today promote world government, downgrade patriotism and teach Socialism instead of Americanism;

RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, urge the State Department of Education to re-evaluate all "social studies" textbooks.

SUNDAY ELECTIONS

RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, go on record as opposing the holding of any election on Sunday.

STATE CONSULTING ORGANIZING SECRETARY

The Georgia Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution is proud to announce the organization of Fort Peachtree Chapter at Roswell with 25 members. The Organizational meeting was held on December 11, 1964, at the home of Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr. in Roswell. Mrs. Alvin Turley was Organizing Regent. The National Board meeting confirmed this chapter at their meeting on the same day. The State Consulting Organizing Secretary attended the meeting and welcomed them into our Georgia State Society.

STATE CONSULTING REGISTRAR

The names of every member in the State have been entered in the State Register under the name of the chapter. This does not mean we have all the information needed concerning the member but at least we have the names of members.

As a cross check, and to make information available when it is not known the name of a chapter to which a member belongs, a card index system is kept, the names of members being filed alphabetically. The card index is not a new project but well over 2,000 additions or changes have been made this year and the index is still incomplete; \$83.00 was contributed for the Registrar General Fund for microfilming and rebinding; 164 lineage papers of the Georgia Society have been copied for the Georgia Department of Archives and History and the Washington Memorial Library.

The contact with the chapters has been most pleasant and the response to the many requests gratifying.

STATE HISTORIAN

Mrs. James LeRoy Boyd

Georgia chapters contributed \$236.60 to the Cataloguing and Indexing of the Americana Collection in the Archives Room. Nine documents and items were given the Repository of Americana.

Two cemeteries were restored and markers placed. Graves of 25 members were marked, and others honored; the grave of one real Daughter was marked; two graves of soldiers' wives and one Daughter were marked; seven soldiers' graves were located; seven were marked. The marker of Revolutionary Governor and Mrs. Clark was restored at the Marietta National Cemetery. A monument was placed at the grave of Button Gwinnett, Signer of the Declaration of Independence, with much celebration and publicity. One historical marker was cleaned; one was relocated.

American History Month and historical anniversaries were observed and celebrated in various ways, including window displays, posters, broadcasts on radio and TV, programs, luncheons, teas. There were proclamations by the governor and many mayors proclaiming February as American History Month; 135 copies of the governor's proclamation were distributed to the Atlanta Public Schools; there was a statewide news dispatch from the Associated Press telling of it; awards of cash and medals were given for essays and excellence in History. Historical tours by adults and children were reported. School children were urged to attend the

unveiling of a memorial on a Court House lawn to fallen county soldiers.

An historical article, "George Galphin, King of Indian Traders," written by a Georgia Daughter was published in the January, 1965, issue of the DAR Magazine.

First place with award of \$5.00 goes to the Savannah Chapter; second award of \$3.00 to Whitehall Inn Chapter; and third award of \$2.00 to Baron DeKalb Chapter.

STATE LIBRARIAN

Library Expansion, the National Society project honoring the President General, has been a major project of the Georgia Society; \$2,837.00 was given through the chapters toward this program this year; \$86.60 was given to the State Library Fund; \$2,189.40 was reported for local library work. A total of \$5,113.00 invested in our libraries this year. A very good report.

In addition to the cash reported, a complete set of 13 volumes (with index) of Henning's Statutes of the State of Virginia was added to the Georgia Library, DAR, at a cost to the Georgia Society of \$100.00. These Statutes of Virginia carry colonial and revolutionary laws and are of great genealogical value. The purchase of this very rare find of Mrs. Mary Givens Bryan, Director of the Department of Archives and History, was recommended to the Georgia Society, DAR, before her demise and was subsequently purchased and placed in her memory. Other volumes have been given by individuals through their chapters and in some instances chapters have added to the total amount given.

Georgia has a spacious and beautiful new Archives building which will soon be dedicated to the historic and patriotic educational usage and preservation of records so much appreciated by all loyal Daughters of the American Revolution. Let us resolve to add to our collection in the research rooms of this wonderful building and thereby carry on the work so nobly begun and fostered by our predecessors and add to our Library as the years go by so that our successors will know that we have acknowledged and appreciated our noble heritage.

Awards of \$5.00 each were given by your Librarian for the best report submitted and judged by a committee on a per capita basis at the National, State, and local levels, respectively to: General Daniel Stewart, Honorable Mention to Abraham Baldwin, Elijah Clarke, in the same order; Abraham Baldwin, Honorable Mention to Commodore Richard Dale; Elijah Clarke, Honorable Mention to Mary Hammond Washington, Fielding Lewis, Baron DeKalb chapters.

Committee Reports

National Committees

AMERICAN HERITAGE COMMITTEE

American Heritage Chairman in Georgia cooperated with all other committees, working to promote our three-fold objectives, using as a means arts, crafts and our early music to tell our DAR Story. Forty-one programs were held in chapters, cooperating in 63 instances with other chairmen. It would be hard to evaluate which committee benefited most by their efforts, as the work showed wide interests. Much pioneer work was done supporting Museum Committee and Meadow Garden Chairman. Nine articles saved of Museum interest, one gift to Museum, \$173.00 sent by six chapters to Museum and Americana Room. Out of 20 chairmen appointed, 17 sent reports.

Many chapters showed interest in Indian culture. George Walton had program at Bradley Museum, site of the Yuchi tribe and presented articles to Museum. Hawthorne Trail displayed relics and gave a lecture on Indian crafts; Thomas Cobb's program showed Indian influence; Peter Early and Savannah chapters sent slides on Indian lore to National Program Committee.

American arts and crafts were sponsored by several chapters. John Benning and Stephen Heard had Heritage and Colonial Teas; Benjamin Hawkins monthly displays of antique articles; Baron DeKalb sponsored annual Antique Fair for seven days. American music featured six programs in chapters, George Walton stressing Folk Songs and Fort Frederica our heritage of music; Peter Early presented a special Musical Program. Three Regents of Savannah chapters formed a Music Committee for Georgia Day, the highlight creation of a Drum and Fife Corps by Savannah High Band. Other chapters sponsored music in public squares and Benjamin Hawkins featured music at all meetings.

Essay contests were sponsored in schools; General Daniel Stewart found interest aroused among students and parents. Baron DeKalb was responsible for having contest incorporated in curriculum of high school American History course. Chapters contributed to Americana Room and Museum, Altamaha, Benjamin Hawkins sent several articles to Museum. Hawkinsville presented lace baby cap worn by General David Blackshear to Museum. Savannah Chapter promoted five-day program arousing interest in preservation of Revolutionary Battle Site, main event being dinner attended by representatives of historic and patriotic societies, speaker was Count de la Villesbrunne, Consul of French Embassy, Savannah Chapter also initiated city-wide observance of Georgia Day.

An outstanding accomplishment was the forming of a large committee of working women by the Atlanta Chapter as an American Heritage Committee. Their support to American Heritage Chairman has been invaluable.

The following awards were presented: \$5.00 to Baron DeKalb for best overall report; \$2.00 to Benjamin Hawkins; second: \$3.00 to Savannah for best Community Project.

AMERICAN INDIANS

Mrs. Louis Joseph Bahin

Once again Georgia Daughters have accomplished most gratifying results in their work for the American Indians Committee. Reports were received from 77 of the 94 chapters; 75 have Chairmen and 52 had programs on American Indians. Savannah, Mary Hammond Washington and Etowah chapters sent 20 slides to be added to those sent to the National Program Committee last year by Xavier Chapter. Subjects were New Echota, John Ross and Chief Vann Houses, Tomochichi (his grave and his journeys to England), Etowah Mounds, and Ocmulgee Mounds. We need to cover more of our spots of interest in Georgia to complete this program.

Emphasis was placed on the State Project honoring the State Regent, Mrs. Benjamin Ivy Thornton—the renovation of a room in the DAR Section of the new dormitory at St. Mary's School for Indian Girls, Springfield, South Dakota. The \$1500.00 goal was reached, and in addition, cash donations amounted to St. Mary's \$450.50, St. Mary's Scholarship Fund \$55.00, Bacone College \$194.50, American Indians General Scholarship Fund \$78.00, and Le Sabre Indian School in Ashland, Montana \$8.00, totaling \$2,286.00. While boxes sent were slightly lower in face of the great increase of cash contributions, they were still creditable. Boxes sent to St. Mary's were valued at \$522.00, weighed 279 pounds and cost \$33.91 to send. To Bacone boxes were valued at \$408.50, weighed 186 pounds and cost \$23.14 to send. A box valued at \$20.00 was sent to a needy family on the Cherokee Reservation in North Carolina. Gold Bond Stamp Books went to St. Mary's, as did an American Flag with staff, and a parchment replica of the United States Constitution. The Flag and Constitution were also sent to Bacone. Twenty chapters visited Indian Restorations or Reservations; one chapter took its CAR Society to local restored mounds for a field trip of study, and had its program on American Indians presented by the Junior membership. Another chapter presented an elaborate exhibit of Indian Lore, with posters promoting the State Project of this committee—excerpts from the DAR Magazine article by Mrs. Harley Lee, National Chairman, and clippings from the St. Mary's School paper, "The Bugle"—at the annual work day held by the chapter for collecting clothing, etc. for their boxes.

This Chairman sent letters of instruction to all Chapter Regents, enclosing copies for the chapter chairmen, in September, and report blanks in January; attended two District meetings and the Fall Board of Management meeting, outlining the year's plans at each; sent out "booster" announcements promoting the State Project to all chapters; at State Conference had a display of crafts from St. Mary's School, realizing \$34.00 from the sale of these items for the school; and visited and spoke to five chapters on the work of DAR with American Indians.

Award to chapters reporting outstanding activity in all phases of our work as follows: Membership over 50—Baron DeKalb, \$5.00; Mary Hammond Washington, \$3.00; Honorable Mention—Savannah, John Benning and Fort Early. Membership under 50—Tallasse, \$3.00; Etowah, \$2.00; Honorable Mention—Colonel John McIntosh.

AMERICAN MUSIC

As State Chairman of American Music, I wish to thank all the

chapters who cooperated with the American Music Committee in providing excellent music programs of both American and foreign composers during the year, and in sending me their reports, programs, clippings and pictures showing their work. I am especially grateful for the sincere and active support and cooperation as revealed by their reports.

I want to thank the Augusta Chapter, our host chapter, for providing the beautiful special music for this Conference. I would like to give them honorable mention.

I have received so many fine reports that it has been difficult to select the winners of prizes and honorable mention. In fact, I am having to award two second prizes, and 11 honorable mentions.

The first prize of \$10.00 must be awarded to Baron DeKalb Chapter for the best music report considering both the excellent programs and the most attractive form of its report. The first second prize of \$5.00 goes to Toccoa Chapter, and the next second prize of \$5.00 goes to Joseph Habersham Chapter, as both of these chapters deserve special merit.

The following chapters are awarded honorable mention in the order named: Stephen Heard, Nathaniel Abney, Benjamin Hawkins, Hawthorne Trail, John Benning, Fort Frederica, George Walton, Captain Thomas Cobb, Etowah, Governor Treutlen, Elijah Clarke.

AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP COMMITTEE

Letters mailed to all chapters in August; 24 chapters reported chairmen; 31 chapters sent in reports; 20 chapters reported Americanism programs at meetings; four had Americanism programs for the public; 24 chapters repeated the American's Creed at all meetings; nine chapters had study groups or programs on the Immigration Act; six chapters sponsored essay or poster contests in the public schools; 29 awards given for essay or poster contests; value of awards \$63.00. Chapters had eight hours and 54 minutes radio time; two hours and two minutes television time; 2,0005 inches of publicity; 3,478 hours given by chapter members serving on boards or committees to reduce illiteracy, social problems of poverty, disease, at opportunity centers or other community service. One Americanism medal presented to an adult naturalized citizen; two members worked with classes in Americanization Schools with 16 hours given there; 242 books and magazines placed in libraries, schools, etc., to help reduce illiteracy and promote Americanism; \$111.83 spent on the Americanism program.

Twelve chapters worked with Naturalization Courts; two visited Naturalization and Americanism Schools; one prize awarded students there; one chapter took newly naturalized citizens to church; one to historic spots; one to recreational centers; three to chapter meetings; one to register; one to vote. Four chapters used the "Citizen—U.S.A." tape based on the DAR Manual for Citizenship; four chapters have scheduled its use in eight schools, four classrooms, and on two radio stations. Chapters distributed 357 Manuals to prospective citizens; 12 to libraries; seven to scouts; 96 to public schools; miscellaneous 17; 505 American flags given to new citizens; 318 Welcome Cards presented or mailed; 705 patriotic literature

presented; chapters gave 46 hours of service at Naturalization Courts; four hours 28½ minutes radio time to new citizens; 289 inches of publicity; 12 Manuals sold; amount of money spent on this program \$145.99. Eleven chapters contributed \$23.00 to the Occupational Therapy Fund; \$5.00 award to General Daniel Stewart Chapter for most outstanding work in Americanism with special emphasis on sales of DAR Manuals for Citizenship; \$5.00 to Stephen Heard Chapter for selecting the best qualified American citizen to receive the DAR Americanism medal.

My sincere appreciation to Mrs. Robert H. Perkins, Mrs. A. S. Varn, Jr., Mrs. Charles B. Evans, and Mrs. Aubrey Matthews who serve as Vice Chairmen of this Committee.

CONSERVATION

Mrs. Maurice A. Cameron

In September letters and questionnaires were mailed to all chapters. Our State Project is "Roadside Beautification," and it is with pleasure that I bring you the following report:

One chapter reported planting two miles of roadside with a variety of bulbs; one chapter reported planting two acres of roadside beautification in grass seed, redbuds, pine trees and dogwoods; one chapter planted 2,500 dogwoods, azaleas, crepemyrtles and 500 day lilies at the entrance of Little Ocmulgee State Park, the high schools, cemeteries, city parks and on all highways at city limits.

Forty-eight chapters reported having special programs with guest speakers, showing slides; 19 chapters wrote their Representatives and Senators concerning water pollution and soil erosion.

Twelve lakes and ponds were built. One nine-acre pond drained and restocked with 15,000 bream and 1,500 bass, furnished by Conservation Department, State of Georgia; 126,010 trees planted; 650,113 pine seedlings planted; 4,770 shrubs planted and 3,865 bulbs planted.

Fifty members of Baron DeKalb Chapter assisted the Garden Clubs of Decatur and DeKalb in planting 30,000 dogwood trees during "Make Georgia Beautiful Week"; 100 pecan trees planted and 4,000 cypress trees planted.

In DeKalb County each year 85 schools plant live Christmas trees. One small green house containing 137 plants was reported.

Four new sanctuaries reported; 106 bird feeders built; 404 members reported feeding birds, and 25 members fed other wildlife; bird house plans were given to 50 members.

Two hundred pamphlets on Conservation and litter-bags were distributed among members; 60,000 Conservation Newsletters sent out annually in the city and county by the Baron DeKalb Co-operative Extension Service; six chapters reported 19 speeches on Conservation over radio; \$237.50 for seven ads with the word "Conservation" used in them were sent to our DAR Magazine. One high school gave a \$5.00 prize to the youth planting the largest number of pines. State Chairman asked that the Conservation Pledge be used at all chapter meetings. State Chairman made four speeches at chapter meetings, one at the Ladies Activities of the Annual Convention, Georgia Association of Soil and Water Conservation District Supervisors: one at annual Short Course of Conservation, held at Abraham Baldwin Agricultural College in Tifton, Georgia, and one at a state meeting of the Soil Conservation Society of America, held in Tifton, Georgia.

I wish to thank my Vice Chairman, Mrs. J. Marvin Strickland,

for her interest in helping to promote Conservation throughout Georgia.

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

It is impossible to get an accurate report on the good work done by certain chapters whose reports I carefully compiled; 35 chapters replied to questionnaire sent by National and cards sent by Chairman.

Many responded to Constitution Week asking their mayors to issue proclamations and to display Flags. Others asked to have Flags displayed at all voting booths on voting occasions. Many television and radio programs were given with spot announcements on other important dates. Exhibits were placed in store windows, libraries and schools to illustrate our Flag. All chapters use Flags at their meetings, and give the Pledge of Allegiance. Most also sing the National Anthem.

A very special effort was made to make all Americans flag-conscious through press, TV and radio. At least 25 chapters reported the following: 1,500 Flag Codes given out; 1,150 Flags presented (many were large and on stands—to schools, Boy and Girl Scouts, DAR Schools and Key Clubs. Smaller Flags were given at Naturalization Courts and to other groups.)

The Press published accounts of Flag programs. (A number of pictures in many files); 200 Flag pins were sold for Helen Pouch Fund by one chapter; 35 talks or papers given on the Flag. Over 200 members display Flags at their homes on special holidays.

I urge each member of our Patriotic Organization to purchase a Flag for their own use. How can others believe we are concerned when we fail to show it?

Georgia has 11 active chapters which sponsor 1,354 clubs with 43,997 members of Junior American Citizens. Nine of these clubs are new; four chapters report chairmen.

It is hard to realize until you see it in action just what JAC is and the extent of its aims and accomplishments. Drama is made daily, as evidenced by one JAC Chairman who was invited to a Governor's Conference on troubled children, by the Divisional Director, only to find out that he was one of a number of hungry, poorly clad underprivileged boys who 20 years ago had been taught the fundamentals of honesty and citizenship by her in a JAC Club. She had lost touch with him, but he had never forgotten her and the JAC's. Though a college graduate from a well-known college, he is first to acknowledge he is a JAC Alumnus.

Baron DeKalb Chapter in Decatur would be the recipient of a Standard of Excellence Award, if one were offered. Their special project, Kittredge School's "Gold Rush" and the covered wagon entry in downtown Atlanta's parade is first place National winner. This chapter leads in number of clubs and members. They had entries in every category in the National contests, and will I am sure again win several awards.

Many of the chapters have given good Citizenship medals, Good Citizens awards, Citations and Thatcher pins, Flag Codes, and many thousands of membership pins and other club materials have been given to encourage interest in this most worthwhile effort of our National Society and Georgia is again fortunate in having two Nationals and two State and several cash awards brought to us through the Baron DeKalb Chapter.

Smaller chapters are to be commended for their interest and activities and many fine public programs and TV announcements. Button Gwinnett Chapter entered contest material in the Essay and Special Project categories from her two clubs and this Chairman feels encouraged at the promise of several new clubs next year.

Three cash awards were offered: \$5.00 to the first new club, goes to St. Andrews Parish in Darien; \$5.00 to the largest membership goes to Baron DeKalb; \$2.00 for the quality of program content to Atlanta.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP

Information blanks were sent to every Regent in the State or to the Chairman of Junior Membership. These asked for facts needed to make our Annual Report and of the 94 chapters thus contacted, only 60 chapters replied. These 60 chapters reported a Junior

membership of 312, of which 62 are new members. Three Junior members served as Chapter Regents, 10 as other chapter officers, and 35 as Chairmen of Chapter Committees. Forty-two subscribe to the DAR Magazine. All phases of the National Society's program are studied and participated in. Committee work by Juniors is as follows: three work on American Heritage Committee; 10 on American Indians; five with CAR groups; 10 on National Defense; seven on Transportation; nine on Good Citizens; 10 on DAR Schools; one on JAC Clubs; 15 on Public Relations; and 10 on other committees.

Only five chapters sent in application blanks in the Outstanding Junior Miss or Mrs. DAR Contest. Blanks or applications were sent from the National office and were to be used. Two personal letters were written, and of course, those applicants could not be considered. The three properly filled out and properly endorsed application blanks were judged by three non-DAR. They were a recent former Governor of Georgia, an educated citizen well versed in social, educational and civic affairs, and a prominent lawyer. The Georgia "Outstanding Junior DAR for 1965" is Mrs. Dauphin Vesro Childs, Jr. (Nina Durrett) of Gray, Georgia. She is a member of the Mary Hammond Washington Chapter, NSDAR.

The State Chairman's award of \$5.00 for the greatest increase in Junior membership goes to Fort Peachtree Chapter, reporting six new members during the past year. Her award of \$5.00 to the Junior Committee whose report showed the most outstanding work on the local level goes to the Baron DeKalb Chapter Junior Membership Committee of Decatur.

I regret that we did not have a full count of Junior members from all of the chapters in Georgia.

LINEAGE RESEARCH

Of the 94 chapters in the state, 21 appointed a Chairman for Lineage Research. However, in many of the chapters this work is done by the Regent or Registrar. Twelve new members reported as result of this committee. Many prospective members are being assisted. Four papers are in the hands of the National Lineage Research Committee.

Commodore Richard Dale reported having sent two old maps to National Lineage Research Committee—Dougherty and Lee counties.

MEMBERSHIP

Chapters reporting 87; membership gains 51 chapters; membership losses 35 chapters. No change in membership for eight chapters.

New members 255; reinstatements 34; transfers in 42; deaths 77; dropped 12; resigned 147; transfers out 22; net gain 73. Membership February 1, 1965, 6,281.

The State Chairman's awards were made as follows: Chapters with membership one to 50 showing the largest increase in membership, Whitehall Inn; chapter with membership 51 to 100, Brunswick Chapter; chapter with membership of 100 and over, Lyman Hall Chapter.

The State Conference award of the National Chairman of the Membership Committee was presented to the Whitehall Inn Chapter for the largest percentage increase in membership.

MOTION PICTURES

The chapter reports, though few, all show active interest in and use of the Motion Picture reviews and recommendations by Mrs. Maurice E. McLaughlin, Preview Editor, in our National DAR Magazine.

Three chapters reported use of Cultural and Educational Films from city libraries.

One chapter reported using a film for a chapter program.

All reporting chapters voiced disapproval of many current films as unfit for viewing by high school youth.

Several chapter chairmen reported conferences with their local theater managers, attempting to obtain a better class of pictures. In most instances this was not productive as many theaters receive film under a contractual agreement and there is little local control. Several chapters reported recommending the documentary films, "The Finest Hours" and "Four Days in November."

My Motion Picture Committee award of \$5.00 goes to the Benjamin Hawkins Chapter with the General Daniel Stewart Chapter as runner-up for best reports.

NATIONAL DEFENSE

Mrs. Herman M. Richardson

Of the 94 chapters, 89 had a Chairman. Of the 75 reporting, 71 full meetings were devoted to National Defense subjects by 57 chapters. The choice of subjects was both timely and significant. The United States Constitution, Our National Defense, and One Nation Under God were first among the many subjects studied.

Seventy-three chapters devoted at least five minutes to National Defense. No chapter eliminated the time allotted for this committee.

Forty-four of the reporting chapters discussed the 1964 Resolutions and 60 had National Defense material available at meetings; 28 chapters made National Defense material available to schools; 18 to libraries and 20 to individuals. The subject of the material distributed was extensive. The National Defender, DAR Magazine and the United States Constitution along with Flag Codes and the Bill of Rights were among many others distributed.

Three hundred and sixteen Good Citizenship medals were presented 32 chapters. Baron DeKalb Chapter presented 75 Joseph Habersham 50, Andrew Houser 22, Commodore Richard Dale 20, and Captain Thomas Cobb 18. Twenty-seven chapters presented the medals at school assemblies and 31 secured newspaper publicity. Four chapters presented the medals at chapter meetings.

Twenty-six chapters contributed \$254.71 to Dollars for Defense. Three chapters making large contributions are: Augusta Chapter \$50.00, Atlanta Chapter \$25.00, and Cherokee Chapter \$88.21, contributed directly to the National Society. Many of the smaller chapters made sacrificial contributions to this project.

Twenty-three chapters made increases in National Defense mailings. Three assisted high school debating teams by making the disarmament kit available to students.

The topics most interesting to the chapters' membership ran the gamut of the issues of the day. There was a particular interest in subversion through our history textbooks, disarmament, Communism, world government, the United States Supreme Court, and attacks on our Christian heritage, among many others.

The Stephen Heard Chapter reached 1,075 children in the

county's history classes with the tape, "Citizen—U.S.A." The playlet, "A More Perfect Union," which appeared in the September, 1964, issue of the DAR Magazine was rewritten for radio and produced by the Bob Jones University, Greenville, S. C. The play was aired locally by the University's radio station. Two tapes were gifts of the University to the State Society and to the Captain Thomas Cobb Chapter who was responsible for its production.

The State Chairman's award of \$5.00 to the chapter with membership under 50 is made to the Captain Thomas Cobb Chapter, with honorable mention to the Andrew Houser and Matthew Talbot chapters. The \$5.00 award to chapters with membership of 50 to 100 is made to Commodore Richard Dale Chapter, with honorable mention to the Stephen Heard Chapter. The \$5.00 award to chapters with membership of 100 and over is made to the Baron DeKalb Chapter, with honorable mention to the Joseph Habersham and Augusta chapters.

Recommendations which the chapter thought were pertinent were included in the report to the National Chairman.

The program committees have worked hard presenting programs to entertain, inform, and urge an increase in membership, using the President General's theme: "The People Who Know Their God Shall Stand Firm and Take Action."

This theme with suggested program outline was mailed early in May from National to each chapter and a copy was in the 1963-64 Proceedings.

Last September your State Chairman sent a letter to each chapter giving directions about filing reports, sending manuscripts and film to the National Filing Committee and a list of the awards to be offered.

Forty-nine Yearbooks have been received. Each showed much hard work and thought in its composition. Of the 94 chapters, 64 have reported. I wish we could have heard from all.

All reporting had used the three objectives of the Society: History, Education, and Patriotism. Most had stressed the President General's theme. Thirteen had had a program on the Diamond

Jubilee; others to have a program during the coming year. A big percentage stated their programs improved and attendance increased which was attributed to the interesting programs. National Defense was stressed; outstanding speakers were used. State officers or state chairmen had been speakers at 28 meetings. Eight chapters will have representatives at the program meeting in Washington during Continental Congress.

Thanks to each of you for your cooperation, understanding and efforts to make this a good year. Let us continue to be better informed.

It is with gratitude to the chapters for their splendid reports that the following awards are made:

PUBLIC RELATIONS

Reports were received from 62 of the 94 chapters. Among them was the Fort Peachtree Chapter, organized December 11, 1964, to whose members the State Chairman extends a warm and happy welcome and congratulations for the interesting clippings sent during its short lifetime of two months. There were 13,787 column inches of publicity excluding photographs of which there were 2,176 column inches, comprising 212 photographs. Radio stations gave 85 hours and 36 minutes; television three hours and 40 minutes. Fifty radio stations and eight television stations contributed this time. Augusta and Savannah chapters tied with the most television time, one hour each. Eleven new members were given complimentary subscriptions to the DAR Magazine; 18 to public libraries; five to church libraries; 29 to school libraries, one to doctors' offices, and two to hospitals. Giving space to the chapters for publicity of their activities were 86 newspapers. Five chapters submitted DAR feature stories. According to the rules of the National Society, only one is accepted—the selection to be made by the State Regent and State Chairman. Their selection was Abraham Baldwin Chapter, Mrs. Elizabeth W. Holderness, Public Relations Chairman. The story was entitled "Daughters of American Revolution Help Insure Defense of Country." Abraham Baldwin Chapter also had the most radio time, eight hours. Stephen Heard Chapter had the most publicity, with 1,179 column inches. Stephen Heard Chapter received the State Chairman's award of \$15.00, offered to the chapter telling the DAR Story by working for at least six National Committees, two in each category of the Society's objectives—Historical, Educational and Patriotic. Approximately \$16,000.00 of this money is invested in bonds because the colleges have had no call for loans. The U. S. Office of Education is lending students money at the low rate of 3 per cent with up to 11 years to repay, and the provisions for cancelling 50 per cent of the principal of the loan if a student teaches for five years in the elementary or secondary schools.

TRANSPORTATION

Chapters reported attendance at meetings have substantially increased with older and younger members benefitting by the Transportation service. Members of 29 chapters made Historic Pilgrimages to historic places—parks and schools. Those listed were Tamassee and Kate Duncan Smith Schools, Meadow Garden, Thornton House, Vann House, Etowah Mounds, Williamsburg, Valley Forge Freedom Foundation, Kolomoki Park the Indian Mounds, Jarrett Manor, Fort St. George, Indian Trails in Florida, Midway Church and Museum and Naval Base at Glynco; two members toured Europe and many historic places there; 15 chapters held Transportation and safety programs with guest speakers while many chapters cooperated with local police, sheriff, and highway patrol. One chapter attended opening of State Legislature, members appeared before public hearings on Automobile Safety Inspection Bill. Two chapters had radio programs. Many chapters reported safety driving classes held in high schools.

First place award of \$2.00 goes to Baron DeKalb Chapter, also an award of \$2.00 goes to Fort Peachtree Chapter, our newest chapter, for their wonderful report of four months.

Special National Committees

AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH

American History Month Committee letters were sent in August, 1964, to all Regents and to all American History Month chairmen who sent their names to the State Chairman. The letters outlined the plans of the National American History Month Chairman for the Essay Contest, High School Participation, Proclamations, National and State Legislation, Use of Posters and Stickers, Chapter Programs, publicity and suggestions for contestants.

Spot announcements were sent to all American History Month chairmen whose names were sent to the State Chairman.

Copies of Sample Proclamation were sent on request; 26 chapters sent in American History Month blanks.

The essay contest "Historic Trailways" was well received; 52 public schools and three private schools with 58 grades and 1,461 contestants participating; 21 chapters sent essays totaling 85; 21 assembly programs, six class discussions and one school paper article were reported. Publicity totaled 30 stories and editorials, 19 pictures with 455 inches; 437 spot announcements were used with seven on TV; 45 members spoke on the radio, with 437 minutes and three on TV with 43 minutes.

Twenty-two chapters observed American History Month with a chapter program. American History Month was proclaimed by Governor Carl Sanders and 21 mayors.

The American History Month Chairman is proud to report that 1,728 students participated in the essay contest "Historic Trailways." These students were from 55 schools and 58 grades.

Governor Sanders again issued a History Month proclamation as well as 21 mayors. There were 437 spot announcements during February, American History Month, on radio, and seven on TV.

CONSTITUTION WEEK

Constitution Week—September 17-23, 1964! Was your chapter one of the 37 in Georgia that let this important week slip by unnoticed? We agree that this week comes before many chapters start their full program of work—but let me urge you to use this week to begin your DAR year.

Each Regent was mailed a questionnaire, and suggestions to make Constitution Week a highlight. These letters were sent the last of July, and the envelopes stamped "Constitution Week Info" IMPORTANT, so that they would NOT be put aside; 55 chapters sent me reports, showing an effort to do the work outlined by National. I do thank all the chapters complying with my request to return reports to me by September 28.

To cover the report completely: Governor Sanders and 53 mayors issued proclamations; 90 articles and pictures were in newspapers; five chapters had interviews and five on spot announcements on TV; 29 had interviews and 44 spot announcements on radio; 38 window exhibits in business districts; 29 in libraries and 30 schools; one chapter had Tag Day; 40 had flags displayed all of Constitution Week and 19 on Constitution Day only; 43 chapters had special programs on the Constitution; 16 chapters had such programs in 85 other clubs; 27 chapters gave Constitution Week material to 104 other groups; 30 chapters had special programs at school assemblies; one chapter gave awards at school; and 29 chapters promoted special church services or church bulletin announcements.

Let me especially congratulate the Captain Thomas Cobb Chapter for winning the first award of \$5.00; the Oglethorpe, Button Gwinnett and George Walton chapters of Columbus (who worked together) the second award of \$3.00; and the Baron DeKalb Chapter the third award of \$2.00. I wish I could have given more awards, but next year make your chapter an award-winning chapter for Constitution Week. I am counting on you to put Georgia in the top ranks.

AMERICAN MERCHANT MARINE LIBRARY

At the 73rd Continental Congress National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, a resolution was passed, for an expanded Merchant Marine, U.S.A.

Copy of Act by U. S. Senate for an expanded Merchant Marine has been received from Georgia's Senator, Richard Russell.

It was the privilege of your State Chairman to attend NSDAR Congress and vote for the expansion.

Since AMMLA inception in 1921 more than 244,659 library units containing 13,844,942 books have been distributed by the eight ports representatives to the American Merchant Marine "Our Fourth Arm of Defense."

A library unit is comprised of 40 bound books, 26 are fiction and 14 non-fiction.

In addition to the bound books the standard library unit also contains 20 to 30 pocket books as well as 100 magazines.

Since there is no appropriation to purchase materials for units, the AMMLA is entirely dependent upon the generosity of friends and organizations, who donate to the nearest port office.

The goal of your State Chairman is to have every chapter in the State Society making a contribution in cash or material (books and magazines) to the AMMLA.

This year 28 chapters have made a contribution. Twenty chapters have given through the State Treasurer \$62.50; eight have sent materials.

The Baron DeKalb Chapter receives the Chairman's award of \$5.00 for a program, newspaper publicity and cash donations. Honorable mention goes to the Elijah Clarke Chapter for sending 190 pounds of books and magazines to port office, New Orleans.

MARKING REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIERS GRAVES

Baron DeKalb Chapter marked the grave of William Suttles at Utoy Cemetery, Atlanta, Georgia, August 19, 1964. William Suttles, born 1731, King George County, Virginia. Died January 23, 1839, DeKalb County, Georgia.

Whitehall Inn Chapter marked the grave of Captain William Isam Hendon, August 16, 1964, at Utoy Cemetery, Atlanta, Georgia. Captain William Isam Hendon was born in South Carolina. Died 1826. His wife, Sally Murry, was the first person buried in Utoy Cemetery, 1824. Captain Hendon is listed in Georgia Roster of Revolutionary Soldiers.

Whitehall Inn Chapter placed Historic marker at Providence Church, Cool Spring, RFD, Gainesville, Georgia; placed Historic marker at Utoy Primitive Baptist Church, Atlanta, Georgia; Government marker placed on grave of Colonel Hames Grant, Providence Cemetery, Cool Spring, RFD, Gainesville, Georgia.

Major General John Twiggs Chapter located grave of Arthur Fort near Bullard, Georgia. Historic marker that cost \$165.00 furnished by his descendants will be unveiled by Major General John Twiggs Chapter April 25, 1965.

MINUTES OF MEADOW GARDEN FALL BOARD MEETING

BYLAWS

BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I

NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II

OBJECTS

The objects of the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution shall be: to promote the aims set forth in the Bylaws of the National Society; to secure the benefits of cooperation of the Chapters in the State; the preservation of the memory of its Revolutionary patriots; the study of its history; the education of its youth in patriotic ideals and in the duties of citizenship.

Article III

MEMBERSHIP

All Chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, located within the State of Georgia shall be members of this organization.

Article IV

OFFICERS

The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Consulting Organizing Secretary, a State Consulting Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Curator. The State Regent shall appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as adviser in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure.

Article V

ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected at the annual State Conference biennially.

Section 2. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two years or until their successors are elected. Their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and of the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Section 3. No member shall be eligible to a State office until she has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years.

No member shall be eligible to the same State office for two successive terms. A member having served more than one-half term in the State office shall be deemed to have served a term.

Section 4. Nominations of candidates for office shall be from the floor. The election shall be held by ballot. A majority of the votes cast by members of the State Conference shall elect.

Section 5. Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become acting First Vice Regent, subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. A vacancy in any other State office between annual meetings shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. An election shall be held at the next State Conference to fill the unexpired term. Any State Officer, who is absent from the State for a continuous period of six months or longer automatically relinquishes her position as a State officer.

Section 6. No two State officers shall be members of the same Chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

Section 7. In recognition of valuable service to the organization, any State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Section 8. A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot. The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than fifteen months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

Section 9. On the election of State Regent, and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Recording Secretary General. The endorsement of a candidate for Vice President General shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary to the Recording Secretary General at least two weeks prior to Continental Congress.

Article VI

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, of the State Board of Management, and of the Executive Committee. She shall attend all regular meetings of the National Board of Management. She shall appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees.

Section 2. In the absence of the State Regent from any meeting of the State Conference, or of the State Board of Management, the State First Vice Regent, or in her absence, the State Second Vice Regent, shall perform the duties of the State Regent. The State First and Second Vice Regents may be assigned to direct committees and to perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent.

Section 3. The State Chaplain shall open all meetings of the State

Conference and of the State Board of Management with Scripture reading and prayer and shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require. She shall preside at the memorial service during State Conference and shall be responsible for the In Memoriam pages in the Proceedings.

Section 4. The State Recording Secretary shall record the proceedings of the State Conference and of meetings of the State Board of Management and of the Executive Committee. She shall compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and of the Proceedings Committee.

Section 5. The State Corresponding Secretary shall conduct correspondence and send notices in behalf of the State Conference, the State Regent, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as directed by them.

Section 6. The State Treasurer shall be the custodian of the funds of the State Society. She shall collect the State Conference dues and registration fees from the Chapters, and shall receive all sums contributed by the Chapters for State and National projects. All monies received by the State Treasurer shall be placed in a Bank which is a member of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. She shall disburse such sums only when authorized by the State Board of Management of the State Society. Incidental expenses shall be paid from the State Dues Fund when authorized by the State Regent in writing. The State Treasurer shall keep an account of all sums received or paid out and shall keep receipts for all payments. She shall prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference. Her books shall be audited annually by a Certified Public Accountant. She shall be ex-officio a member of the Credentials Committee.

Section 7. The State Consulting Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new Chapters.

Section 8. The State Consulting Registrar shall, when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, who live in towns and counties in which there are no Chapters, to prove eligibility, and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars in verifying lineage papers. She shall keep a correct list of all members in the State and shall make a report on membership to the State Conference.

Section 9. The State Historian shall be in charge of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General. She shall keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves in the State and shall prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General to Smithsonian Institution. She shall encourage the compilation and publication of County Histories and other unpublished records, especially those of the Revolutionary period.

Section 10. The State Librarian shall collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing duplicates, wherever possible, in the NSDAR Library and in the Georgia DAR Collections in the State Department of Archives at Rhodes Memorial Hall. She shall endeavor to obtain the books on the wanted list of the Librarian

General for the Georgia Section in the NSDAR Library and is authorized to solicit contributions from the Chapters for the purchase of the same. She shall serve as State Chairman of the DAR Genealogical and Historical Collections at the State Department of Archives.

Section 11. The State Curator shall receive and be responsible for all gifts of Revolutionary relics to the Museum of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution. She shall be the custodian of the conference properties and shall have them properly stored, insured and made ready for use of the State Conference.

Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. The Georgia State Society shall hold an annual State Conference between the first day of February and the time of the meeting of the Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week. The Executive Committee shall fix the time and place of meetings when not fixed by the Conference in session, or when for any reason it may be impracticable to meet at the time or place fixed by the Conference.

Section 2. The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credential blanks to the Chapters not less than sixty days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 3. The voting members of the State Conference shall be State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regent or alternate, and the delegates or their alternates from the Chapters of the State, that are entitled to representation at the Continental Congress. The number of representatives from each Chapter shall be determined by the rules for representation of Chapters in the Continental Congress as given in the National Bylaws.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a Chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the Chapter, except in the case of the Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. No member shall hold, at the same time, two offices carrying a vote at the annual State Conference.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any Chapter in the State of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference, by unanimous consent, the privileges of the floor may be accorded to the State Chairmen with the exception that they may not vote unless they are duly elected delegates from their respective chapters.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen days notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Twenty-five voting members, representing not less than ten Chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII

STATE DUES AND CONFERENCE FEES

Section 1. The annual dues of Chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be one dollar for each member of the Chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before February 1. Seventy cents of this amount shall be allocated to the general State Dues Fund and thirty cents shall be used to cover all State required per capita assessments. No Chapter shall be entitled to representation at the annual State Conference until the State dues are paid.

Section 2. The Finance Committee, appointed by the State Regent, shall be composed of seven members, to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two Honorary State Regents, one active Chapter Regent, and one active Chapter member. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund.

Section 3. Each Chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State dues, a Conference registration fee of \$2.00 for each voter to which the Chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Section 4. State Officers, Honorary State Regents, State Chairmen of Committees, and other members of the Georgia Society, Daughters of the American Revolution who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters, shall pay the \$1.00 Conference fee at the time of registration.

Article IX

EXPENSES

Section 1. Eight hundred dollars shall be taken each year from the State Dues Fund, to be used by the State Regent in defraying her necessary traveling expenses.

Section 2. Necessary expenses of the State Regent and other officers of the State Conference for stationery and postage shall be paid by the State Treasurer from the State Dues Fund, on the presentation of itemized statements approved in writing by the State Regent.

Article X

STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, the Honorary State Regents, the Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regents of the Chapters of the State, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the fall, following the regular meeting of the National Board. It shall meet also at the time of the State Conference and whenever called by the State Regent.

Section 3. Ten members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between

annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference.

Section 5. State Chairmen of National and State Standing Committees shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privileges of the floor, but may not vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article XI EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute an Executive Committee. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the Executive Committee, but may not vote. The State Board of Management may authorize this committee to perform such duties of the Board between its meeting, as may from time to time seem expedient. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three members of the Committee. It shall make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

Article XII CHAPTERS

Section 1. Chapter elections shall be held in April or May. The Chapter Regent shall report the names of the elected officers promptly, on triplicate blanks provided by the State Regent for this purpose, to the Organizing Secretary General, to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary.

Section 2. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent for use in compiling her report, not less than fifteen days before the opening of the annual State Conference. The official Chapter report, not to exceed five hundred words in length, for publication in the Proceedings shall be furnished the State Recording Secretary before the State Conference.

Article XIII AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent and to the Parliamentarian and the State Regent shall send a copy to each Chapter with her message carrying the call to the Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. Robert's Rules of Order (Revised) shall be the governing authority in parliamentary law for the State Conference in matters not covered by the Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24. Bylaws were adopted and State Officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21). No conference was held in 1911; the time of meeting having been changed from the fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910, to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912"; amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta, "that we have Conference in the spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, p. 21).

Awards

All chapters competing for awards must send reports to the respective chairmen by February 1, 1966.

All reports for awards are based on membership confirmed by the National Society as of February 1 of preceding year (1965).

Bylaws

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National and State Bylaws.

Change of Address

Notice of change of address of members shall be sent to the Organizing Secretary General, Treasurer General, and the State Registrar.

Change of Name

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to State Registrar and Treasurer General.

Chapter Elections

Chapter elections shall be held preferably in April or early May and names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, Administration Building, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D. C. 20006, to the State Regent, and to the State Recording Secretary. The full Christian name of chapter officers shall be given together with her husband's given name or initials, and address.

Dues

Pay to State Treasurer State Dues of \$1.00 per member preferably on or before January 1, not later than February 1. National Dues of \$3.00 per member sent to the Treasurer General, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D. C. 20006, before January 1, 1966.

Conference Registration Fee

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State dues (on or before January 1, not later than February 1), \$2.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Rules for representation of chapters at Continental Congress:

"Chapters having less than 50 paid members on February 1, are entitled to be represented by the Regent or in her absence the Vice Regent or alternate; chapters having 50 to 199 paid members on February 1, one delegate in addition to the Regent; chapters having 200 to 299 paid members on February 1, two delegates in addition to the Regent, and for each additional 100 paid members one additional delegate. (Article XIII, Section 3-C, National By-Laws)

Members of the Board and others who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay the \$1.00 fee at time of registration.

Contributions

All contributions by Chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

Deceased Members

Deaths shall be reported promptly to Treasurer General and State Chaplain. Complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and date of death shall be furnished State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for Conference Memorial Service and "In Memoriam" pages for State Proceedings.

Georgia Hospitality Fund

The following resolution which applies to the Georgia Hospitality Fund appears in the Proceedings for 1955:

"WHEREAS, The Georgia Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds an annual dinner in Washington each year during Continental Congress, which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society,

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Georgia Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$100.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes:

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this fund shall not be cumulative. Adopted."

Genealogical Records

To insure uniformity and convenience in filing, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, 8½ by 11 inches with one inch margins on left side and bottom, and one and one-half inches at top. One copy retained in Chapter Archives, and two copies shall be sent to the Chairman of Genealogical Records.

Information for Chapter Regents

1. All letters received by Chapter Regents relating to the work of the Society shall be distributed to the corresponding Chapter Chairman and brought to the attention of the members at a chapter meeting.

2. Please follow Resolutions No. 11, adopted at 61st Georgia Society State Conference, as follows: "Resolved, That a closing date of February 1 be established for all reports, and all reports be given from February 1 to February 1, regardless of a change of regime or Regent." All awards will be made on this date basis.

Information for State Officers and State Chairmen

State Officers and State Chairmen shall send to the State Regent and to the State Treasurer a copy of any instruction letter mailed to chapters.

Meadow Garden

The deed to Meadow Garden property from the National Society, DAR, is in the possession of the State Regent and is also recorded in the Richmond County Court House, Augusta, Georgia.

Nominations

The following resolution which applies to the announcement of

the candidacy for State Regent appears in the Proceedings of the Twentieth State Conference, 1918:

"Resolved, that it is the judgment of the Executive Board that announcements for State Regent should not be made . . . earlier than three months prior to the meeting of the Conference and they shall be furnished to the Press for publication."

Proceedings

Three copies of the Proceedings will be sent to each Chapter. One copy to be retained by Regent, one copy given to the Chapter Treasurer and one copy to the Chapter Chairman of Program. Additional copies, if available, may be secured from the State Recording Secretary at \$1.00 per copy, plus 25 cents for postage if to be mailed.

Reports

Chapter Regents' and State Chairmen's reports for Proceedings shall be as concise as possible—not to exceed 500 words—typewritten (double spaced) upon one side of 3-hole unruled notebook paper, 8 ½ by 11 inches, and shall be sent to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary on or before February 15, the original being sent to the Secretary for the Proceedings.

Resolutions

Resolutions to be considered by the Committee shall be typed and sent to the Chairman of the Resolutions Committee two weeks before the date of the State Conference.
