PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

WHEREAS the phrase "One Nation Under God" in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America is an expression of the belief which our forefathers felt in the establishment of this Republic, and which we, their descendants, still cherish; and

WHEREAS there are those who wish to delete any mention of God in anything pertaining to government in the United States, and to make the denial of God's existence a matter of public policy; therefore

RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society give support and approval to the efforts that are being made to prevent the deletion of the phrase "One Nation Under God" from the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America.

FOUR-YEAR TERMS

WHEREAS there is a proposed Constitutional Amendment to lengthen the term of members of the House of Representatives from two to four years; and

WHEREAS the present system of electing House members every two years serves as a useful national referendum on our policies; and

WHEREAS four years is too long a time for the people to wait to register their confidence, or lack of confidence, in national policies;

RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society urge its members to give most careful study and consideration to this proposed change from a plan established by the Founding Fathers.

PROMOTION OF RIFLE PRACTICE

WHEREAS the National Board for the Promotion of Rifle Practice which was organized under the Department of the Army by Act of Congress, is successfully fulfilling its assigned mission of training men of military age in the safe and efficient use of military-type rifles; and

WHEREAS the National Rifle Association of America is working in cooperation with said National Board for the Promotion of Rifle Practice by organizing adult and junior clubs, furnishing trained instructors, conducting marksmanship tournaments throughout the country; and

WHEREAS actual experience has proven that men with previous marksmanship training are more capable in combat, thus improving their chances for survival;

RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, endorse the marksmanship program of the:

1. National Board for the Promotion of Rifle Practice and
2. National Rifle Association of America in working together to promote more intelligent use of firearms and to train American youth and men of military age in order that they may better serve their country in combat.

The content of this proposed resolution has been personally verified by: Harlon B. Carter, President, National Rifle Association of America; Lieutenant General Julian C. Smith, USMC (Retired).

MASS DISOBEDIENCE

WHEREAS in all history there is no record of the survival of a disorderly society; and

WHEREAS in recent times there is a rapid spread of a planned course of lawlessness that threatens to destroy law and order; and

WHEREAS certain leaders are advocating obedience to "good laws" and violation of the "bad ones"; and

WHEREAS no man, or group of men, can be permitted in a government of laws, to take the law into his hands, for that course would lead to anarchy; and

WHEREAS there is no other way to peaceably and fairly decide issues than to seek redress from the courts; therefore

RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society affirm its belief that America needs a revival of respect for law and orderly processes, a revival of individual responsibility, and an insistence that laws be enforced, courts respected, and due processes followed.

GEORGIA DAY

WHEREAS the Georgia Assembly has given recognition to February 12 as Georgia Day, and

WHEREAS, State Senator Frank O. Downing is to be commended for his resolution which secured the recognition;

RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society request Senator Downing to introduce such legislation as would have February 12, Georgia Day, be made a legal holiday in the State of Georgia.

RED CHINA

WHEREAS the vote on the admission of Red China to the United Nations was a frightening 47 to 47 tie; and

WHEREAS the insistence of the 1965 administration was on a two-thirds vote for admission; and

WHEREAS a new approach must be made before the next vote which is less than a year away;

RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society express approval of a campaign to stress the legality of the veto power of any one

of the members of the Security Council Nations to prevent the admission of Red China. A veto by any member of the Security Council could block the impending disaster.

COMMUNISM

WHEREAS the greatness of a nation depends not only on its military strength and economic prosperity, but also upon the integrity of its individuals and the government which represents them;

RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society express its firm belief in the rightness of the commitments of our nation to use its strength in the prevention of the spread of Communism and the take over of defenseless nations against Communist aggressors.

TEXTBOOK STUDY

RESOLVED, That a committee to be known as the Textbook Study Committee be appointed to review the textbooks used in the Public Schools of the State of Georgia, and that a report of the same be made to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR.

Report of State Officers

STATE REGENT

It is with mixed emotions that I bring to you the account of my final year's work as your State Regent. The ties formed last year have grown stronger and your loyal support and cooperation have been a shining beacon to beckon me on when tired or discouraged. Until one has worn the State Regent's ribbon, it is hard to realize the enormous responsibilities and the consuming time of this office. It has been my desire to carry out the duties of this office and to further the objectives of our Society in a fair and impartial manner, and I hope my desire has been attained.

During the past months special emphasis has been placed on commemorating the 75th birthday of the National Society. Members have become acquainted with not only the early history of the National Society but with the 75 years of service DAR has given to historical, educational and patriotic endeavors. The Atlanta chapter, second oldest chapter, and Xavier Chapter are celebrating 75 years of DAR service. To begin on the next period of history, a new chapter, the John Franklin Wren Chapter, has been organized with a large percent of members in the Junior bracket. Membership, which is a major goal of this administration, shows an increase in spite of the extremely heavy loss by deaths. One-fourth of the members admitted this year are Juniors.

STATE CONSULTING ORGANIZING SECRETARY

The Georgia State Society of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution is proud to announce the organization of two chapters during the 75th Diamond Jubilee Anniversary, under this administration.

Fort Peachtree Chapter with 25 members was organized on December 11, 1964 with Mrs. Alvin Turley Organizing Regent.

The John Franklin Wren Chapter of Wrens was organized on November 27, 1965 with 30 members with Mrs. Henry Lively Organizing Regent at the home of Mrs. J. J. Pilcher in Wrens.

Georgia now has 95 chapters, the greatest number in its history.

STATE CONSULTING REGISTRAR

With the cheerful cooperation of the chapter regents and chapter registrars, the publication of the 1966 edition of the Membership Roll and Register of Ancestors has become a reality.

This book, dedicated to Mrs. Benjamin Ivy Thornton, State Regent, is a supplement to the 1946 and 1956 editions. Many names not included in the 1946 and 1956 editions have been included, as well as the names of members who have joined our Society since 1956. The 1966 edition has 161 pages, one-third more pages than the 1956 edition, contains 135 pages or approximately 5,400 names of members. There is an index of 27 pages showing approximately 2,714 ancestors. The price of the book is \$5.00 per copy, or \$5.25 if mailed.

The Lucy Cook Peel Fund has underwritten the cost of publication of the book. All money derived from the sale of books will be deposited in the Lucy Cook Peel Fund to be used toward covering the cost of future publications.

It has been a privilege to serve the Georgia State Society under the capable leadership of Mrs. Benjamin Ivy Thornton, State Regent.

STATE HISTORIAN

Mrs. James LeRoy Boyd

Of 77 chapters reporting, 57 chapters contributed \$210 to the Cataloguing and Indexing of the Americana Collection in the Archives Room.

One cemetery was restored and markers replaced; one chapter contributed money towards upkeep of an old cemetery. Graves of 42 members were marked; 2 graves of Daughters of Revolutionary soldiers were marked; 2 graves of ancestors of members were marked. Ten graves of Revolutionary soldiers were located, 3 were marked; 2 graves of wives of Revolutionary soldiers were located. Three historical markers were placed. Some of the chapters have worked hard towards getting historical markers, but not having been placed will have to be reported next year. Two historical restorations were begun, one completed.

Seventy-seven anniversaries for famous men, 24 for famous women, 116 for famous events were celebrated. 142 historical programs

by adults, 63 by school children were given. 600 historical broadcasts were made over radio, 12 over TV. 86 historical tours were made by adults, 66 by children. 72 chapters observed American History Month.

George Walton's letter and a letter to his granddaughter, Octavia Walton LeVert, were placed in Meadow Garden; a coverlet made in 1825 was given to Meadow Garden and placed in bedroom there. Nathaniel Macon Chapter brought pressure to bear on City Council causing repair work on Fort Hawkins to be completed.

Several chapters showed slides of the Americana Collection, and Diamond Jubilee celebrations were held throughout the state. Captain Thomas Cobb Chapter took picnic lunch to Etowah Mounds. John Benson Chapter cleaned and repaired a monument that marks the Cherokee Assembly Ground. Elijah Clarke Chapter presented to the University of Georgia an old copy of the "Jefferson Bible". General James Jackson, along with the Historical Society, placed an historical marker for the St. Augustine Road; a member of this chapter placed in a park a fountain to memorialize DAR members. Lachlan McIntosh Chapter placed an historical DAR marker at Lachlan McIntosh Boulevard, honoring Lachlan McIntosh. Major John Twiggs Chapter erected an historical roadside marker commemorating Lt. Arthur Fort. Tallassee Chapter has discovered some facts relating to a Trading Post; Fort Peachtree has ordered an historical marker commemorating Fort Peachtree built during the War of 1812. Savannah Chapter gave \$100 to the Revolutionary Park Site.

\$5.00 Lachlan McIntosh and \$5.00 Major General John Twiggs chapters tied for first place; \$3.00 Benjamin Hawkins and \$3.00 Savannah Chapters tied for second, and \$2.00 Baron DeKalb Chapter won third place.

STATE LIBRARIAN

Mrs. Wm. Lawton Brannen

Georgia Society DAR chapters have reported a total of \$3002.55 for Library work, as follows: National, \$384.60; State, \$382.15; Local, \$2265.80. Primary interest has been shown in improving local libraries. Memorials were given in local, state and national libraries.

At the March, 1965, State Conference in Augusta, and at the District meetings your librarian advanced the idea of giving memorials through our chapters to our State Library in the new Archives and Records building. Mrs. Herbert D. Forrest, Librarian General, requested memorials for the National Library. There was a good response. It is anticipated this method of procuring books much needed for genealogical research will find additional support and will be the avenue through which, along with the books being given honoring worthy living persons, greater libraries will be built.

On the occasion of the dedication of the new Georgia Department of Archives and Records building on October 11, 1965, which date co-incided with the seventy-fifth anniversary of our National Society, your Librarian presented books valued at \$75.00 in memory of Mrs. Mary Givens Bryan, who had so patiently advised and assisted the Georgia Society in the accumulation and preservation of its Library while she was serving as Director of the State Archives.

Miss Carroll Hart, Archivist, present Director, has been most cooperative with your Librarian in planning for Georgia Society to spearhead the movement to project the aim and thereby fulfill the

dream of the now deceased Mrs. Bryant, whereby Georgians will have the most complete Research Center south of Washington, D. C. Toward this ideal Georgia Society has contributed to Mrs. Bryan's memory the \$100.00 set of thirteen volumes, with index, of Henning's Statutes of the State of Virginia, which have been rebound at the additional cost of \$50.00.

We now have on hand in Georgia Archives Library account \$456.61, part of which is designated for the purchase of memorial books.

A Registry of Gifts, a bound volume, given by your Librarian honoring Miss Carroll Hart is being placed in the Archives.

Awards of \$5.00 each are being given by your Librarian for the best report on Library work, as follows: National, Savannah Chapter, Savannah; State, Metter Chapter, Metter; Local, Mary Hammond Washington Chapter, Macon.

STATE CURATOR

It has been found that Georgia is outstanding in its work for American Indians in this Division, and it is earnestly hoped that the work may continue to increase in scope.

Reports received from 68 of the chapters showed that 66 had American Indians chairmen and 50 had programs on the subject. To Bacone College we sent \$289.50 for scholarships, \$2.00 for furnishings, and 290 pounds of clothing for the thrift shop; \$46.67 was spent for freight for the boxes. To St. Mary's School for Indian Girls we sent \$115.00 in scholarships, \$317.75 for furnishings for the Helen Griffin Thornton Room in the new dormitory, and 376 pounds of clothing, with freight costs \$63.95. In addition 15 boxes of jewelry and beads were sent, and the State Budget allotted a per capita allowance of \$.03 to furnishings of the same dormitory room—\$180.00. The General Indian Scholarship Fund received \$41.50. The cash totals were Bacone \$291.50, St. Mary's \$612.75, and the General Fund \$41.50, making a grand total of \$945.75.

The display and sale of beadwork made by the girls at St. Mary's was held at State Conference and the proceeds sent to the school. This has proved an interest provoking undertaking of the State Chairman. One member writes to and sends gifts to individual girls at the school, and entertains at dinner the Headmaster and representatives of the school at Continental Congress. One chapter is sponsoring the making of 40 wigwams to be used on the tables at the annual Breakfast, and another is sponsoring the making of the 400 menu-programs to be used for the guests at the breakfast at Congress. This State Chairman is serving as general arrangements Chairman for the breakfast. The same chapter making the programs has sponsored the three-month study and week-long festival concerning the Cherokees in Georgia in the 7th grades of one of the largest schools of its county system. State Chairman's award of \$5.00 to chapter reporting most outstanding program of activity

goes to Baron DeKalb; \$5.00 for largest per capita donation to schools to John Houston Chapter.

AMERICAN MUSIC

On September 1, 1965, letters of instruction were mailed to all Chapter Regents and Music Chairmen. I wish to thank them for their excellent music reports. These show deep interest in fine music of American and foreign composers. Beautiful music adds much enjoyment and interest to the meetings. Please continue to have programs of music at your monthly meetings. You will be rewarded many-fold—not the least of which is an increase in attendance. In making the two cash awards offered, two things were considered: number of music programs presented, and the artistic manner in which they were reported. The first award of \$10.00 goes to Atlanta Chapter for 13 excellent programs of music very attractively reported. One of these was the magnificent Diamond Jubilee Concert, called "An Evening of Music," given on November 12, 1965, at the chapter house. Eleven outstanding artists appeared on the program. As last year, I am again forced to give two second prizes of \$5.00 each. The first second prize goes to Baron DeKalb Chapter for seven fine music programs most artistically reported. The other second prize goes to Fort Frederica Chapter for a splendid report on their Special Project—the choral presentation of Sidney Lanier's famous poem, "The Marshes of Glynn," set to music by Jay Welch. Honorable mention goes to the following chapters: Joseph Habersham, General James Jackson, Benjamin Hawkins, George Walton, Whitehall Inn and Captain Thomas Cobb. It has been a pleasure to serve as your State Chairman of American Music.

AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR

CITIZENSHIP COMMITTEE

Mrs. John H. Terry

Letters were mailed to all Chapter Regents and chairmen in October. Forty-two chapters reported chairmen, 52 chapters sent in reports. Thirty-six chapters reported Americanism programs at meetings; eight had Americanism programs for the public, two of which were on radio; 45 chapters repeated the American's Creed at all meetings; 15 chapters had study groups or programs on the Immigration Act. Chapters had 48 hours and 28 minutes radio time; two hours and 10 minutes TV time; 3,134 inches of publicity; 4,182 hours were given by chapter members serving on boards or committees to reduce illiteracy, social problems of poverty, disease, at opportunity centers or other community service. One member worked with classes in an Americanization School with 180 hours given there. Twenty-seven chapters reported placing 77 books, 218 magazines, and 45 subscriptions to the DAR Magazine in libraries, schools, etc., to help reduce illiteracy and promote Americanism, with the total spent on the Americanism program \$341.80.

Ten chapters worked with Naturalization Courts; two visited Naturalization and Americanism Schools; two chapters took newly naturalized citizens to church; two to historic spots; one to recreational centers; two to chapter meetings; three to vote; one had a tea for new citizens. Nine chapters used the "Citizen—U.S.A." tape based on the DAR Manual for Citizenship; five scheduled its use in seven schools and two on radio stations. Chapters distributed a total of 1,177 DAR Manuals; 1,075 to prospective citizens, 32

to libraries, 18 to scouts, and 52 to public schools; 544 American flags were given to New Citizens; 426 Welcome cards were presented; 764 pieces of patriotic literature were presented; chapters gave 77½ hours of service at Naturalization Courts; five hours and 50 minutes radio time to new citizens; 1,318 inches of publicity; 37 Manuals were sold; amount of money spent on this program \$79.70. Seven chapter contributed \$29.00 to the Occupational Therapy Fund.

Five dollar award to Baron DeKalb Chapter for most outstanding work in Americanism, and a second award to Stephen Heard Chapter for outstanding work; \$5.00 to Oglethorpe Chapter for the largest sale of DAR Manuals. My sincere appreciation to Mrs. R. H. Perkins, Mrs. A. S. Varn, Mrs. Charles B. Evans and Mrs. Frank B. McDonald, Jr., who serve as Vice Chairmen of this Committee.

CONSERVATION

Mrs. Maurice A. Cameron

Letters and questionnaires were mailed to all chapters; 52 chapters had Conservation programs, some using films and slides. Twelve chapters wrote their Congressmen and Senators in regard to the Redwood Forest, Control of Water and Air Pollution and Clean-up of our Roadsides by doing away with junk yards. One chapter reported planting 1,135 acres in pine seedlings, other chapters planted 53,870 pine seedlings, 3,582 trees, 525 Dogwoods, 500 Redbuds, 128 rose bushes and 936 Daylilies. Another chapter planted two miles of roadside beautification, Daylilies and roses were planted in Safety Zones on Highways, 250 Daylilies planted at gateway to highway entrance. One chapter planted a wild flower area and berried shrubs to attract birds; two chapters "Planted a Flag"; 113 acres of wildlife area planted, 368 members fed birds, 75 members fed other wildlife; 13 bird feeders, 22 feeding stations and 13 bird baths reported; 135 acres of Crimson Clover, 106 acres of woodland thinning, 200 acres of brush control, 14 acres of contour farming, 100 acres of cover crops, 275,000 feet of terraces, 1,421 acres of pasture and five acres of roadside erosion control; \$45.00 donated to Meadow Garden on landscaping project; 10 Conservation speeches over radio; 12 chapters distributed material on "Redwood Forest" and "Freeway through Forest." I have attended State Conference, Continental Congress, four District meetings, the Fall Board meeting. My award of \$5.00 for the most outstanding report on Conservation work, including Roadside Beautification goes to General James Jackson Chapter, and my award of \$5.00 for the best Conservation program goes to the Oconee Chapter. Honorable mention goes to Council of Safety and Governor Treutlen chapters.

DAR GOOD CITIZENS

DAR SCHOOLS

Every phase of work by Georgia chapters for our DAR Schools

has shown an increase this year over last year's work, and to compile such a fine report from Georgia has been a pleasure. Only four of Georgia's 94 chapters did not send in a report this year. Of those reporting, we had 70 chapter programs given on our DAR Schools, with special emphasis on Kate Duncan Smith DAR School in Alabama and Tamassee DAR School in South Carolina. Georgia located Berry School also received extra emphasis from the Georgia chapters. Using the guide of the Hightower Award requirements, chapters gave a total of \$10,912.00 to the DAR Schools, enough of this total going to Tamassee that Georgia can name a reception room in the new administration building at Tamassee the Helen Griffin Thornton Room, in honor of our State Regent; 251 boxes of clothing sent to the schools, totaling in weight 5,660 pounds, and valued at \$14,946.00. An all time high of 48 chapters met the requirements for Hightower Award this year.

Sixty-seven chapters reported their active participation in the work of this committee. Two reports were received too late to be included in the overall report. It is the belief of this Chairman that all 95 chapters began each meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America, thereby participating briefly in the work of this important committee; 134 large flags and 3,594 small flags were presented by 65 chapters to schools, colleges, churches, Naturalization Courts, various youth organizations, including the CAR and JAC Clubs, community centers and housing projects; 32 chapters studied the Flag Code or had a program presented on it; 1,375 Flag Code pamphlets distributed. Only 15 incorrect uses of the flag was noted and corrected by the chapters; 41 chapters presented an entire program on the flag; 29 flag talks given by chapters to other organizations; 49 newspapers gave a total of 309 inches in publicity with 15 pictures of flag exhibits. Outstanding were the editorials written on behalf of the correct respect for the flag. Increased interest was mani-

fested by individual chapter member in displaying her own flag on all patriotic days. Chapters participated in the selling of the jeweled lapel flag pins for the Helen Pouch Scholarship Fund.

The Chairman's award to chapter with membership under 50 is Captain Thomas Cobb; chapter with membership from 51 to 100 is Fort Frederica, and to the chapter with membership over 100 is Baron DeKalb.

Attention was called to Insignia "Do's and Dont's" and Insignia Leaflet enclosed in packet of instructions from National Headquarters. Members were also asked to refer to DAR Handbook for Insignia information. Several corrections were made in improper placement of DAR pins and bars. I feel there is a very definite need for the work of this committee in stressing the important place our Insignia holds in all DAR events and activities.

JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS

Mrs. Thomas S. Hopkins

There are 15 chapters in the state which sponsor 2,042 JAC Clubs with a membership of 67,766, an increase of 688 clubs and 23,559 members. It would seem proper to include in this year's

report the last year's national winner of awards as it was not recorded in last year's report. Baron DeKalb Chapter brought home the national prize for second place in Membership and received national recognition in Public Relations. They won six first prizes, three second, and three third and three Honorable Mention in the essay contests. The prize money amounted to \$37.00. With a membership this year of 58,070 members in 1,924 clubs they have again entered every category in the national contests, giving 73 Good Citizenship Awards, and their present project is on the American Indians. The National Vice Chairman of American Indians has asked the Kittredge School whose project this year is to make the place-mats for the American Indians Chairman's Breakfast at this 1966 Continental Congress. Truly this chapter is to be commended for the splendid job being done for JAC.

Atlanta Chapter ranks second in number of clubs with membership of 5,940 in 60 clubs. These clubs are situated in Boys' Clubs and Settlements. They have contributed more inches in press clippings with their monthly programs than any other chapter; \$25.00 has been given to purchase two large flags to be used in downtown parades. They have taken part in many community projects—studying government, visiting the State Capitol and 1,000 members planted pine seedlings. They had 2,100 spot announcements on all 18 television and radio stations. This Atlanta Chapter is most individual in that its Director, Miss Dorothy Waldman, has led JAC clubs for 25 consecutive years and I doubt that this can be equaled in any other chapter. She comes in personal contact with as many children as go to make up the entire population in many towns. For "man to man" teaching of citizenship, she is to be praised. Throneateska Chapter ranks third with 2,000 members. This wide-awake chapter has given flags to school rooms, and diligently extended teaching of citizenship.

Time will not permit any more individualism, though Button Gwinnett Chapter received a National second prize last year for their essay entry. Metter Chapter has an essay now at the National Chairman for judging. Each chapter sponsoring clubs has done many patriotic and worthwhile acts to assure the instruction of citizenry to our youth. Thatcher pins, cash awards, framed Flag Codes and other means of encouragement have been practiced by these 15 chapters.

Oconee Chapter gets the \$3.00 offered for "new clubs" and Atlanta earns the \$2.00 for the "best work most indicative of teaching good citizenship. The privilege to serve in this capacity is deeply appreciated, and getting my letters out early to each chapter, and getting supplies to the clubs has been most rewarding in these foregoing results.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP

Miss Annette Alexander

Information blanks were mailed to every Regent in the State or to the Chairman of Junior Membership. These asked for the facts needed to make the Annual Report. Of the 95 chapters contacted, 59 replied. These reported 352 Junior members, of which 65 are new members. Two Junior members served as Chapter Regents; 15 as other chapter officers; 28 as chairmen of chapter committees; 63 subscribe to the DAR Magazine. All phases of the National Society's program are studied and participated in. Juniors work on committees as follows: American Heritage, 7; American Indians, 9; CAR, 11; National Defense, 9; Transportation, 6; DAR Good

Citizens, 10; DAR Schools, 11; JAC Clubs, 4; Public Relations, 7; and others, 6. There were no entrants in the Junior Miss or Mrs. DAR Contest this year. The State Chairman's awards are made as follows: Chapter showing the greatest increase in Junior membership, Cherokee Chapter; chapter whose Junior Committee showed the most outstanding work on the local level, Baron DeKalb Chapter. I regret that all chapters did not report—it is impossible to have a complete picture of the work unless these reports are made.

LINEAGE RESEARCH

Report blanks were sent to all Chapter Regents. These asked for information needed to make my report, and of the 94 chapters only 46 chapters replied; 44 reported having Lineage Research Committee Chairman; 191 potential members assisted; 100 new members acquired through the efforts of the committee; six potential members papers sent to State Chairman, and are in the hands of the National Lineage Research Committee; 28 chapters qualified for National Honor Roll by checking Lineage Research on National Honor Roll Blank. I am sure chapters not reporting have been working on this Committee. Therefore, this report reflects the work of chapters I received reports from. I regret not having a complete report from all the chapters in Georgia.

MEMBERSHIP

Chapters reporting, 86; membership gains in 46 chapters; membership losses in 29 chapters; no change in membership of 19 chapters. Total membership February 1, 1966, 6,374. The State Chairman's award for the largest increase in membership was made as follows: \$5.00 to Fort Peachtree Chapter, membership under 50; \$5.00 to Commodore Richard Dale Chapter, membership 50 to 100; \$5.00 to Atlanta Chapter, membership over 100. The State Conference award of the National Chairman of the Membership Committee was presented to the Fort Peachtree Chapter for the largest percentage increase in membership.

MOTION PICTURE

All reporting chapters showed interest and activities in good films. Interests have been aroused in usage of films for chapter programs and in schools in teaching of History and social subjects. Films have been obtained from DAR program office and from Georgia Library Service. The State Chairman's award of \$5.00 goes for the second time to Benjamin Hawkins Chapter. This Chapter Chairman prepared folders to be placed at each meeting recommending best pictures.

NATIONAL DEFENSE

Mrs. Herman M. Richardson

The survey of the year's work shows a deep interest and great concern for our National Defense. Letters and cards were mailed to Chapter Regents in an effort to secure a National Defense Chairman in every chapter. Of the 95 chapters, 92 have a Chairman, with 66

chapters reporting; 48 chapters reported one entire meeting given to National Defense with topics: Viet Nam, Constitution, "What's Happening to the Spirit of America"; The Role of the FBI in Defending Our Freedom, National Defense, and A Republic Under God.

Sixty-seven chapters reported a minimum of five minutes given at each meeting on National Defense, 37 chapters gave more time; 52 chapters studied the 1965 Resolutions; 59 had National Defense material at meetings. National Defense material was made available at 24 schools, 22 libraries and to 32 individuals. Subjects of material distributed: National Defender, DAR Magazine, In Washington—The DAR Story, Flag Codes, Constitution and reprints from the DAR Magazine. Presented 292 Good Citizenship medals; 31 presented at school assemblies; 30 chapters secured newspaper publicity; 47 chapters contributed \$210.00 to Dollars for Defense, with Lyman Hall making the largest contribution of \$20.00; 28 chapters made increases in National Defense mailings; three chapters made the Labor-Management Kit available to high school debating teams.

Topics of great interest to chapters this year were: Viet Nam, Disarmament, Communism, Respect for Law and Order, Consular Treaty, Supreme Court Decisions, Immigration, Urban Renewal, Panama Canal Zone and Civil Disobedience; 29 members from 38 chapters wrote as individuals to members of Congress.

I am happy to report my awards for the best overall reports, with membership under 50, \$5.00 to Captain Thomas Cobb, with honorable mention to Major General John Twiggs and Hancock; membership 50 to 100, \$5.00 to Commodore Richard Dale, with honorable mention to Benjamin Hawkins and Brunswick chapters; membership 100 and over, \$5.00 to Baron DeKalb with honorable mention to Joseph Habersham Chapter.

An article "Soviet City Off U. S. Coast," that appeared in the Atlanta Journal and Constitution, September 5, 1965, was sent to the National Defense Chairman. This article was published in the National Defender, November 15, 1965. I brought back with me from Continental Congress many copies of the National Defender and distributed these to chapter members where I was guest speaker.

I want to impress upon each one of you to exercise your right to VOTE! Remember, "God grants liberty only to those who love it, and are always ready to guard and defend it." By voting and electing men of integrity this is one way we have of defending our liberty. God has blessed America and we pray that He always will, but remember, "Where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is Liberty."

PROGRAM

I am happy to report that chapters have had excellent programs this year. Of the 94 chapters in the State, 69 have reported, 47 have sent Yearbooks. Sixty-two have used the President General's theme; 63 had programs in connection with celebrating the Diamond Jubilee. Most feel that the suggested programs have been a great help; 12 will have representatives at the Program Committee meeting in Washington.

Due to the excellence of programs I am giving two first prizes. One of \$5.00 to the Atlanta Chapter for the consistent year-round excellence of their programs and another first of \$5.00 to the Augusta Chapter for their outstanding program celebrating the Diamond Jubilee. Baron DeKalb and Elijah Clarke chapters tied for honorable mention. Mary Hammond Washington Chapter first for most complete Yearbook, \$3.00 award; Augusta, second place; Elijah Clarke, Nathaniel Macon, William McIntosh and Fort Early all had excellent Yearbooks, therefore, I gave honorable mention to those chapters. A list of requirements was made and the books scored accordingly. Stephen Heard Chapter won the award of \$2.00 for most papers to National Filing Committee. Xavier Chapter receives honorable mention.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

NSDAR Diamond Jubilee Year was widely publicized in Georgia. Reports from 65 chapters showing 14,812 column inches in 32 daily and 97 weekly newspapers, 13 national magazines, 21 DAR publications, and six others. There were 308 photographs with total column inches of 4,378. Radio time given amounted to 42 hours and 27 minutes over 90 stations; TV time equaled two hours and 45 minutes over 10 stations. Chapter reporting most radio time was John Benning (six hours); second, Baron DeKalb (four hours). Three chapters tied for 30 minutes TV time, namely, Baron DeKalb, Captain Thomas Cobb and Mary Hammond Washington. Cherokee and Vidalia chapters tied for articles published in seven newspapers; General Daniel Stewart and Joseph Habersham chapters tied for second place with articles published in six newspapers.

Largest number of photographs was reported by Button Gwinnett Chapter with 28 photographs measuring 636 inches; second, Peter Early Chapter with 22—145'; third, Baron DeKalb Chapter with 12—154'; Lyan Hall Chapter with 19—80'. Matthew Talbot, General Daniel Stewart and Atlanta chapters reported 11 each; seven chapters reported publishing newsletters (Xavier sent copies of theirs); 48 chairmen subscribed to the DAR Magazine; others said

they read it; 10 chapters submitted entries for the two contests which will be judged later.

The State Chairman's award of \$15.00 offered to the chapter best telling the DAR Story in at least six national committees, two in each category of the Society's objectives, including photographs, is divided equally between Button Gwinnett Chapter who claimed 1,092 inches; Atlanta Chapter, 982; and Baron DeKalb Chapter, 949. Honorable mention to George Walton, Vidalia, Peter Early, Augusta, Stephen Heard, Council of Safety, Hawkinsville, Lyman Hall, Fort Frederica, Elijah Clarke, General Daniel Stewart, Sergeant Newton, Joseph Habersham and General James Jackson chapters. My thanks to the chapters participating in the work of this committee.

AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH

American History Month Committee letters were sent to all Chapter Regents in early September, 1965, which outlined the Essay Contest, High School participation, Proclamations, National and State Legislation, use of Posters and Stickers, Chapter Programs, Publicity and suggestions for contestants.

Reports showed many varied, interesting and informative programs presented and popularity of the activities showed a deeper understanding of our American Heritage in order to preserve our freedom. Activities included giving each school a poster suitable for framing, a flag and flag pole given to the city, a flag to a High School Athletic Association, a patriotic program at a 4-H Club meeting, showing films in school on American History and FFA. Gave a historical program; Governor Carl Sander's proclamation presented to a High School at morning exercises; chapter attended Naturalization Court—welcomed 27 new citizens with small flag and Flag Code; chapter program included History award winners, DAR Good Citizen winner and History teachers presented certificates and medals to winners on TV; school chapel program on American History Month given by students, contestants were carried on a tour of historical places with a briefing on the places; newspaper published winning essay, winning contestant read her essay on TV; award of \$5.00 presented to boy and girl making highest grade in American History; award of \$5.00 presented each winning contestant in 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th grades; a \$25.00 bond given to student making highest mark in American History.

Proclamations declaring February as American History Month were issued by the Governor and 39 mayors, participation in the Essay Contest, "George Washington's Advice," by 58 public schools; 70 grades and 1,142 contestants, three parochial schools, 10 grades and 247 contestants; school assemblies held in 60 schools with 92 class discussions and 19 school articles written. Publicity included 78 stories and editorials, 39 pictures and 963 inches of newspaper publicity. Spot announcements numbered 271 on radio, with 63 on TV and 21 DAR members appearing on radio with 1,240 minutes used and 38 DAR members appearing on TV with 122 minutes used. American History Month was placed in 113 locations in schools, libraries, banks, stores, filling stations, motels, Chamber of Commerce and post offices. There were 28 displays and 515 stickers used. Cash awards, History medals and certificates were presented essay winners and students making highest mark in American History.

Awards to chapters for best reports are: First place—\$5.00 to Savannah Chapter; second place—\$3.00 to Lachlan McIntosh Chapter; third place—\$2.00 to Stephen Heard Chapter; honorable mention—Baron DeKalb Chapter. MARKING HISTORIC SPOTS

After several months of research on finding the first burying ground four places that had merit were found but only one will be marked because of certain conditions. The site, number two, Percival Ward Holland Tything was the "old" burial ground for the Georgia Colony. On December 14, 1965, permission was granted the Georgia Historical Commission to install a marker February 12, 1966. Though the marker will be placed by the Georgia Historical Commission, the State Chairman's award of \$5.00 goes to Savannah Chapter for outstanding work in locating this historic spot and bringing it to the attention of the Georgia Historical Commission.

MARKING REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIERS GRAVES

Location of these graves reported November 12, 1965, by the Joseph Habersham Chapter were: Elizabeth Talley Farmer, daughter of Revolutionary soldier, Henry Talley, was born 1808 in York District, South Carolina, buried in the cemetery at Philadelphia Methodist Church on Hightower Trail, four miles from Conyers, Georgia. Eliza Louisa Talley, daughter of Revolutionary soldier, Henry Talley, is buried at Salem Baptist Church about 200 feet off the Highway near The Highway Trail, Rockdale County, Georgia.

By the Whitehall Inn Chapter, reported February 5, 1966. These graves of Mrs. Milton D. Davis' ancestors are located and marked:

Dr. William Gilbert, the first doctor in Fulton County, born in Chester District, North Carolina, died at age of 102 April, 1824. Buried at Utoy Primitive Baptist Cemetery, 1447 Casanova Drive, S.W., West End, Atlanta, Georgia, listed in Census of South Carolina, Chesterfield District.

Chaplain Humphrey Grant served as Commanding Officer at Fort Prince George under the Royal Governor, 1719-1776, buried in old family plot in Hall County, Georgia, listed in 1790 South Carolina Census. Colonel James Grant buried in Hall County, Georgia, Cool Spring, Georgia, Providence Cemetery; died 1823.

By the Major General John Twiggs Chapter: Historical roadside marker for Lieutenant Arthur Fort, Revolutionary ancestor of Mrs. Stewart Colley, Honorary State Regent, was unveiled on April 25, 1965, at Bullard, Georgia, Twiggs County, on U. S. No. 129-23, Georgia No. 87, one-half mile from the Fort Family Plot where he is buried. Arthur Fort was the author of the Bill to Create Twiggs County in 1809. Descendants from 10 States attended the Marker Service; nine of these descendants named Arthur Fort, perpetuated his name. Arthur Fort (the ninth) flew in from New York to unveil the marker.

MINUTES OF MEADOW GARDEN FALL BOARD MEETING

The Meadow Garden Board met October 26, at 10:00 p.m., at Holiday Inn of Callaway Gardens, Pine Mountain, Georgia, with Mrs. Benjamin I. Thornton, State Regent, presiding. Eight members were present. Mrs. William Lawton Brannen, State Chairman of

Patrons of Meadow Garden, and Miss Martha Cooper, State Treasurer, having been given special invitations to attend, were also present.

Mrs. Thornton announced there were no minutes of the August meeting.

Mrs. Welton, Meadow Garden Chariman, announced that the porch at Meadow Garden is in bad condition and greatly needs to be repaired. She said Mrs. Jack Ladson, Vidalia, Georgia, had purchased the old Craft Home in South Carolina, built circa 1780, and had offered some 15-inch boards from the old slave quarters for use in the restoration of Meadow Garden. Mrs. Welton said Mrs. Ladson had also proposed to give six or seven old boxwoods from this home for Meadow Garden, and that the cost of moving the plants from South Carolina and replanting them would be approximately \$50.00.

Mrs. Kendrick called the attention of the Board members to a Resolution, passed at the 1963-1964 State Conference, authorizing the transfer of \$2,000.00 from the Georgia State Society, DAR, savings account at the First National Bank, Atlanta, Georgia, to the Meadow Garden Restoration Fund to be administered by the Meadow Garden Board for the explicit purpose of restoration of Meadow Garden.

Mrs. Kendrick moved that the necessary amount of money be taken from the \$2,000.00 to pay for moving the lumber from South Carolina, and for restoring the porch with the lumber, which was given to Meadow Garden by Mrs. Ladson. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Humphrey and was carried.

Mrs. Welton then said she did not know how much lumber Mrs. Ladson had to give us.

Whereupon Mrs. Kendrick withdrew her motion that the necessary amount of money be taken from the \$2,000.00 for the moving of the lumber and the restoration work, and asked that Mrs. Welton first find out how much lumber Mrs. Ladson had to give to Meadow Garden before the Board definitely decides on the work.

Mrs. Humphrey moved that we proceed with the restoration of the porch floor after we ascertain the quantity of lumber to be given by Mrs. Ladson. It was seconded by Mrs. Kendrick. The motion was carried.

Miss Cooper, State Treasurer, reported the Meadow Garden Landscaping Fund balance is \$389.20.

Mrs. Humphrey moved that the money be taken from the Meadow Garden Landscaping Fund to pay for moving and replanting the boxwoods at Meadow Garden. It was seconded by Mrs. Chandler. The motion was carried.

Mrs. Wallace moved that we accept Mrs. Ladson's gift of the old lumber and boxwoods with thanks. It was seconded by Mrs. Humphrey. The motion was carried.

Mrs. Wallace said she had written Governor Sanders in regard to the State of Georgia helping with the restoration of Meadow Garden, and had asked him if State money to help with the restoration could not come out of his contingent fund. She said Governor Sanders replied that the money could not come out of his contingent fund, and referred her to Mr. Joe Cumming, who was not encouraging.

Mrs. Welton pointed out that the exterior of Meadow Garden needs painting and she estimated the cost would be about \$450.00.

Mrs. Kendrick asked that Mrs. Welton get bids for the cost of

painting Meadow Garden and send them to the State Regent and the Meadow Garden Board members for approval.

Mrs. Brannen, State Chairman of Patrons of Meadow Garden, asked for the cooperation of the Board members in getting Patrons for Meadow Garden.

The meeting adjourned at 10:40 p.m.

At each meeting we had the President General's Message, and five minutes devoted to National Defense. Chapter Constitution Week speaker was Dr. Eugene Huck, History Department, West Georgia College. Mrs. John Terry of Macon, Chairman of the Committee on Americanism and DAR Manual for Citizenship, spoke to our chapter at the October meeting. She brought us the highlights of Continental Congress. Programs included American History—joint meeting with Rome Chapter, SAR; American Music; report on 74th Continental Congress by Mrs. James LeRoy Boyd, State Historian; DAR Diamond Jubilee in September and this program repeated in October for the William Witcher Chapter, Cedartown; National Defense at which the theme "Where the Spirit of the Lord is, There is Liberty" presented by Mrs. Herman M. Richardson, First Vice Regent for Georgia NSDAR and Reverend Billy L. York; and American Heritage—an intra-chapter program in which members told of their heritage. The 1965-1966 Yearbook distributed at the first fall meeting. A Chapter Regent's bar purchased. A radio program by Mrs. Joseph N. BYLAWS

BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I

NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II

OBJECTS

The objects of the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution shall be: to promote the aims set forth in the Bylaws of the National Society; to secure the benefits of cooperation of the Chapters in the State; the preservation of the memory of its Revolutionary patriots; the study of its history; the education of its youth in patriotic ideals and in the duties of citizenship.

Article III

MEMBERSHIP

All Chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, located within the State of Georgia shall be members of this organization.

Article IV

OFFICERS

The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Curator. The State Regent shall appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as adviser in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure.

Article V

ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected at the annual State Conference biennially.

Section 2. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two years or until their successors are elected. Their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and of the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Section 3. No member shall be eligible to a State office until she has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years.

No member shall be eligible to the same State office for two successive terms. A member having served more than one-half term in the State office shall be deemed to have served a term.

Section 4. Nominations of candidates for office shall be from the floor. The election shall be held by ballot. A majority of the votes cast by the voting members of the State Conference shall elect.

Section 5. Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become acting First Vice Regent, subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. A vacancy in any other State office between annual meetings shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. An election shall be held at the next State Conference to fill the unexpired term. Any State Officer, who is absent from the State for a continuous period of six months or longer automatically relinquishes her position as a State officer.

Section 6. No two State officers shall be members of the same Chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

Section 7. In recognition of valuable service to the organization, any State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Section 8. A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot. The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than fifteen months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

Section 9. On the election of State Regent, and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Recording Secretary General. The endorsement of a candidate for Vice President General shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent to the Recording Secretary General at least two weeks prior to Continental Congress.

Article VI

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, of the State Board of Management, and of the Executive Committee. She shall attend all regular meetings of the National Board of Management. She shall appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees.

Section 2. In the absence of the State Regent from any meeting of the State Conference, or of the State Board of Management, the State First Vice Regent, or in her absence, the State Second Vice Regent, shall perform the duties of the State Regent. The State First and Second Vice Regents may be assigned to direct committees and to perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent.

Section 3. The State Chaplain shall open all meetings of the State

Conference and of the State Board of Management with Scripture reading and prayer and shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require. She shall preside at the memorial service during State Conference and shall be responsible for the In Memoriam pages in the Proceedings.

Section 4. The State Recording Secretary shall record the proceedings of the State Conference and of meetings of the State Board of Management and of the Executive Committee. She shall compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and of the Proceedings Committee.

Section 5. The State Corresponding Secretary shall conduct correspondence and send notices in behalf of the State Conference, the State Regent, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as directed by them.

Section 6. The State Treasurer shall be the custodian of the funds of the State Society. She shall collect the State Conference dues and registration fees from the Chapters, and shall receive all sums contributed by the Chapters for State and National projects. All monies received by the State Treasurer shall be placed in a Bank which is a member of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. She shall disburse such sums only when authorized by the State Board of Management of the State Society. Incidental expenses shall be paid from the State Dues Fund when authorized by the State Regent in writing. The State Treasurer shall keep an account of all sums received or paid out and shall keep receipts for all payments. She shall prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference. Her books shall be audited annually by a Certified Public Accountant. She shall be ex-officio a member of the Credentials Committee.

Section 7. The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new Chapters.

Section 8. The State Registrar shall, when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, who live in towns and counties in which there are no Chapters, to prove eligibility, and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars in verifying lineage papers. She shall keep a correct list of all members in the State and shall make a report on membership to the State Conference.

Section 9. The State Historian shall be in charge of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General. She shall keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves in the State and shall prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General to Smithsonian Institution. She shall encourage the compilation and publication of County Histories and other unpublished records, especially those of the Revolutionary period.

Section 10. The State Librarian shall collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing duplicates, wherever possible, in the NSDAR Library and in the Georgia DAR Collections in the State Department of Archives and History. She shall endeavor to obtain the books on the wanted list of the Librarian General for the Georgia Section in the NSDAR Library and is authorized to solicit contributions from the Chapters for the purchase of the same. She

shall have custody and supervision of the DAR Genealogical and Historical Collections at the State Department of Archives and History.

Section 11. The State Curator shall receive and be responsible for all gifts of Revolutionary relics to the Museum of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution. She shall be the custodian of the conference properties and shall have them properly stored, insured and made ready for use of the State Conference.

Article VII

MEETINGS

Section 1. The Georgia State Society shall hold an annual State Conference between the first day of February and the time of the meeting of the Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week. The Executive Committee shall fix the time and place of meetings when not fixed by the Conference in session, or when for any reason it may be impracticable to meet at the time or place fixed by the Conference.

Section 2. The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credential blanks to the Chapters not less than sixty days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 3. The voting members of the State Conference shall be State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regent or alternate, and the delegates or their alternates from the Chapters of the State, that are entitled to representation at the Continental Congress. The number of representatives from each Chapter shall be determined by the rules for representation of Chapters in the Continental Congress as given in the National Bylaws.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a Chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the Chapter, except in the case of the Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. No member shall hold, at the same time, two offices carrying a vote at the annual State Conference.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any Chapter in the State of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference, by unanimous consent, the privileges of the floor may be accorded to the State Chairmen with the exception that they may not vote unless they are duly elected delegates or their alternates from their respective chapters.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen days notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Twenty-five voting members, representing not less than ten Chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII

STATE DUES AND CONFERENCE FEES

Section 1. The annual dues of Chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be one dollar for each member of the Chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before February 1. Seventy cents of this amount shall be allocated to the general State Dues Fund and thirty cents shall be used to cover all State required per capita assessments. No Chapter shall be entitled to representation at the annual State Conference until the State dues are paid.

Section 2. The Finance Committee, appointed by the State Regent, shall be composed of seven members, to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two Honorary State Regents, one active Chapter Regent, and one active Chapter member. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund.

Section 3. Each Chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State dues, a Conference registration fee of \$2.00 for each voter to which the Chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Section 4. State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$2.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference fee at the time of registration.

Article IX

EXPENSES

Section 1. Eight hundred dollars shall be taken each year from the State Dues Fund, to be used by the State Regent in defraying her necessary traveling expenses.

Section 2. Necessary expenses of the State Regent and other officers of the State Conference for stationery and postage shall be paid by the State Treasurer from the State Dues Fund, on the presentation of itemized statements approved in writing by the State Regent.

Article X

STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, the Honorary State Regents, the Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regents of the Chapters of the State, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the fall, following the regular meeting of the National Board. It shall meet also at the time of the State Conference and whenever called by the State Regent.

Section 3. Ten members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between

annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference.

Section 5. State Chairmen of National and State Standing Committees shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privileges of the floor, but may not vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article XI

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute an Executive Committee. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the Executive Committee, but may not vote. The State Board of Management may authorize this committee to perform such duties of the Board between its meeting, as may from time to time seem expedient. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three members of the Committee. It shall make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

Article XII

CHAPTERS

Section 1. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April or May. The Chapter Regent shall report the names of the elected officers promptly, on triplicate blanks provided by the State Regent for this purpose, to the Organizing Secretary General, to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary.

Section 2. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent for use in compiling her report, not less than fifteen days before the opening of the annual State Conference. The official Chapter report, not to exceed five hundred words in length, for publication in the Proceedings shall be furnished the State Recording Secretary before the State Conference.

Article XIII

AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent and to the Parliamentarian. The State Regent shall send a copy to each Chapter and each voting member, at least sixty days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

Article XIV

RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. Robert's Rules of Order (Revised) shall be the governing authority in parliamentary law for the State Conference in matters not covered by the Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24. Bylaws were adopted and State Officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21). No conference was held in 1911; the time of meeting having been changed from the fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910, to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912"; amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta, "that we have Conference in the spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, p. 21).

Awards

All chapters competing for awards must send reports to the respective chairmen by February 1, 1967.

All reports for awards are based on membership confirmed by the National Society as of February 1 of preceding year (1966).

Bylaws

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National and State Bylaws.

Change of Address

Notice of change of address of members shall be sent to the Organizing Secretary General, Treasurer General, State Regent and State Registrar.

Change of Name

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to State Registrar, Treasurer General and State Regent.

Chapter Elections

Chapter elections shall be held preferably in April or early May and names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, Administration Building, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D. C. 20006, to the State Regent, and to the State Recording Secretary. The full Christian name of chapter officers shall be given together with her husband's given name or initials, address and zip code.

Dues

Pay to State Treasurer State Dues of \$1.00 per member preferably on or before January 1, not later than February 1. National Dues of \$3.00 per member sent to the Treasurer General, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D. C. 20006, before January 1, 1967.

Conference Registration Fee

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State dues (on or before January 1, not later than February 1), \$2.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Rules for representation of chapters at Continental Congress:

"Chapters having less than 50 paid members on February 1, are entitled to be represented by the Regent or in her absence the Vice Regent or alternate; chapters having 50 to 199 paid members on February 1, one delegate in addition to the Regent; chapters having 200 to 299 paid members on February 1, two delegates in addition to the Regent, and for each additional 100 paid members one additional delegate. (Article XIII, Section 3-C, National Bylaws)

Members of the Board and others who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay the \$1.00 fee at time of registration.

Contributions

All contributions by Chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

Deceased Members

Deaths shall be reported promptly to Treasurer General and State Chaplain. Complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and date of death shall be furnished State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for Conference Memorial Service and "In Memoriam" pages for State Proceedings.

Georgia Hospitality Fund

The following resolution which applies to the Georgia Hospitality Fund appears in the Proceedings for 1955:

"WHEREAS, The Georgia Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds an annual dinner in Washington each year during Continental Congress, which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society,

GENERAL NEW REGIME FUND BALANCE \$2,500.00

The following resolution which applies to the General New Regime Fund Balance of \$2,500.00 appears in the Proceedings for 1959-1960, page 41:

"RESOLVED, That at the end of each regime all money in the General Fund above \$2,500.00 be transferred to the Savings Account. When the Supplemental Audit Report is made as of June 1 every two years before the Auditors close out the books this transaction be handled in order to show in this Audit, thus making the General Fund show the same balance of \$2,500.00 at the beginning of each new regime. ADOPTED."

PROCEDURE BOOK OF INSTRUCTIONS FOR OFFICERS AND STATE CHAIRMEN

The following resolution which applies to a Procedure Book of Instruction for Officers and State Chairmen appears in the Proceedings for 1959-1960, page 41:

"RESOLVED, That all Officers and State Chairmen keep a Procedure Book of Instructions and helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new Officer and Chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities thus providing a continuing continuity of DAR work, ADOPTED."

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Georgia Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$100.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes:

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this fund shall not be cumulative. Adopted."

Genealogical Records

To insure uniformity and convenience in filing, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, 8½ by 11 inches with one inch margins on left side and bottom, and one and one-half inches

at top. One copy retained in Chapter Archives, and two copies shall be sent to the Chairman of Genealogical Records.

Information for Chapter Regents

1. All letters received by Chapter Regents relating to the work of the Society shall be distributed to the corresponding Chapter Chairman and brought to the attention of the members at a chapter meeting.

2. Please follow Resolutions No. 11, adopted at 61st Georgia Society State Conference, as follows: "Resolved, That a closing date of February 1 be established for all reports, and all reports be given from February 1 to February 1, regardless of a change of regime or Regent." All awards will be made on this date basis.

Information for State Officers and State Chairmen

State Officers and State Chairmen shall send to the State Regent and to the State Treasurer a copy of any instruction letter mailed to chapters.

Meadow Garden

The deed to Meadow Garden property from the National Society, DAR, is in the possession of the State Regent and is also recorded in the Richmond County Court House, Augusta, Georgia.

Nominations

The following resolution which applies to the announcement of the candidacy for State Regent appears in the Proceedings of the Twentieth State Conference, 1918:

"Resolved, that it is the judgment of the Executive Board that announcements for State Regent should not be made . . . earlier than three months prior to the meeting of the Conference and they shall be furnished to the Press for publication."

Proceedings

Three copies of the Proceedings will be sent to each Chapter. One copy to be retained by Regent, one copy given to the Chapter Treasurer and one copy to the Chapter Chairman of Program. Additional copies, if available, may be secured from the State Recording Secretary at \$1.00 per copy, plus 25 cents for postage if to be mailed.

Reports

Chapter Regents' and State Chairmen's reports for Proceedings shall be as concise as possible—not to exceed 500 words—typewritten (**double spaced**) upon one side of 3-hole unruled notebook paper, 8½ by 11 inches, and shall be sent to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary on or before February 15, the **original** being sent to the Secretary for the Proceedings.

Resolutions

Resolutions to be considered by the Committee shall be **typed** and sent to the Chairman of the Resolutions Committee **two weeks** before the date of the State Conference.

REPORT OF GEORGIA SOCIETY — 1965-1966

The Georgia Society, Children of the American Revolution, has 21 Societies, one Life National Promoter, 16 other National Promoters, and 21 State Promoters.

The Georgia Society ranked sixth in the nation in new members with 86, which brings our total to 427. Seven C.A.R. members were admitted to DAR.

Both Houses of the Georgia Legislature unanimously passed a resolution commending the work of the Georgia Society, C.A.R., and its State President and Senior State President. This is the first time that the Georgia Legislature has ever done this.

A new Society, Meadow Garden, was organized in Augusta. Another Society, Sandtown Trail, in Atlanta, has almost completed its organizing.

Two letters and a leaflet "How to Organize a C.A.R. Society" were mailed to every DAR Regent in the State. Many long distance telephone calls were made to further the work of the Georgia C.A.R.

Two issues of Georgia CARGoes, the Georgia C.A.R. newssheet were published. The State President and Senior State President had letters in each issue.

Immediately, after taking office, the State President published a Directory and mailed it to those who would need it. Later the State Yearbook was published.

An artistic, historic State C.A.R. Scrapbook was compiled.

Pictures of the State President and Senior State President appeared in the March issue of the National Magazine along with three articles written by the State President. One of these was to encourage Preservation of the American Butterfly, one of the State Projects of the Georgia C.A.R. this year.

Members of the Georgia Society, C.A.R., attended Affirmation: Vietnam, held in Atlanta Stadium, and the first public showing of the Magna Charter at the Atlanta Art Association.
