State Curator—Mrs. Yates W. Little, Conference Properties and DAR Museum, who announced that she had sent in two gifts to the Museum. She presented Mrs. Hugh Peterson, Adviser to the DAR Museum. Mrs. Peterson reported that the Museum is in need of silver and dishes for use at Functions.

The State Regent presented other National appointees: Mrs. Samuel M. Merritt, member of the Finance Committee and of the Resolutions Committee; Mrs. John F. Thigpen, DAR Speakers Staff.

**MARCH 20, 1969**

A meeting of the Executive Committee of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, was held in the Fenwick Room of the Augusta Town House at 9:00 a.m., Thursday, March 20, 1969, the State Regent, Mrs. R. Hugh Reid, presiding. Present were Miss Cooper, Mesdames Waite, Martin, Bahin, Henderson, Watson, Ward, Fox, Terry, Little and Tuthill.

Prayer was offered by the State Chaplain, Mrs. Martin. Minutes of the Fall meeting were read by the Secretary and approved. Mrs. Reid announced that the place of meeting of the State Board of Management had been changed to the French and Spanish Rooms. She also announced that the group picture for Proceedings would be made in the Boxwood Room at 5:30 p.m. Officers were asked to wear long dresses with gloves, but no corsages. She told of the fine work of the Membership Committee, and then spoke of the work of her own office. Of particular interest was news of changes in ordering History medals, the availability of a pattern for carving the insignia on gravestones and the filing system for gifts to the Americana Collection.

The State Regent presented Georgia's two Past National Officers, Mrs. T. Earle Stribling, Past Chaplain General, and Mrs. Leonard D. Wallace, Past Registrar General. Announcements necessary for

completing the day's agenda were made by Mrs. Reid. The morning meeting was recessed at 12:10 p.m.

#### SATURDAY MORNING, MARCH 22, 1969

The final session of the 71st State Conference was called to order by the State Regent, Mrs. R. Hugh Reid, at 9:00 a.m. Saturday, March 22, 1969. The State Chaplain read a portion of Scripture and led in prayer. The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America was led by Mrs. Matthew W. Kantala, the American's Creed by Mrs. W. E. Abernethy, the first stanza of the National Anthem by Mrs. Raiferd L. Drew, accompanied by Mrs. Irvin A. Brannen, Jr., and the Pledge to the Georgia Flag by Mrs. Kantala. The minutes of the Friday business session were read by the State Recording Secretary, Mrs. Louis Joseph Bahin, and approved. A motion to have the minutes of the Friday evening and Saturday morning sessions approved by the Proceedings Committee was passed.

Telegrams were read from Mrs. Clarence W. Kemper, Vice President General from Missouri, and from Mrs. Julius Y. Talmadge, Honorary President General, who sent greetings and a gift of \$25.00 for Meadow Garden. Other gifts for Meadow Garden at this time included \$10.00 from Mrs. William N. Gressette, \$10.00 from Mrs. J. Carter Goldsborough, \$10.00 from Mrs. James Andrew Williams, and \$100.00 from Mrs. Donald Spicer, Historian General, thus making her a Patron, and \$10.00 from Mrs. Henry Grady Jacobs. This last gift was presented for Mrs. Jacobs, who had left, by Mrs. Thomas Knox Kendrick. Mrs. Martin, State Chaplain, was excused to count the money collected from the money corsages for the National project.

Mrs. Reid presented for the last time the guests whose presence had added so greatly to the Conference, Mrs. Williams, State Regent of Arkansas and Mrs. Goldsborough, State Regent of North Carolina, and the Historian General, Mrs. Spicer, who expressed joy at having been present and announced that the subject for American History Month essays would be "A Signer of the Declaration of Independence—Why Chosen and What Happened to Him Later."

The State Regent called on Mrs. Tuthill, State Parliamentarian, for the rules concerning voting. Mrs. Reid then recognized the Chairman of the Resolutions Committee, Mrs. Benjamin Ivy Thornton, who read the ten resolutions for action, and the Courtesy Resolutions. (See list at end of Minutes). All were accepted without discussion except Resolution 8, to endorse House Bill #146, offered in the Georgia General Assembly by State Representative Janet Merritt proposing the restoration of the Flag of 1914 as Georgia's official flag. After discussion, and upon motion of Mrs. Charles F. Wysong, seconded by Mrs. Terrell Moore, the resolution was tabled. The vote to table was unanimous.

The State Regent recognized Mrs. Robert H. Humphrey, Chairman of the Finance Committee, who gave her report. Mrs. Martin announced that the sum realized for the Seimes Memorial from money corsages was \$330.00.

Mrs. Reid called for continuance of reports of State Chairmen as follows: American Merchant Marine Library, Mrs. J. L. R. Boyd; Collecting and Publishing Histories of Revolutionary Soldiers, Mrs. A. C. E. Shepherd; Conference Music, Mrs. Wallace S. Crouch, who presented her able assistant, Mrs. Irvin A. Brannen, Jr.; Conference Properties, Mrs. Yates W. Little; Cooperation of DAR with S.A.R. and S.R., Mrs. John C. Peteet; Lucy Cook Peel Memorial, Mrs. Claude E. Fitts; McCall Genealogical Fund, Mrs. J. C. Richardson; Medals and Prizes, Mrs. William S. Murphey; Parliamentarian, Mrs. Harold I. Tuthill and Assistant, Mrs. Young Harris Yarbrough; Processionals of State Conference, Mrs. F. L. Beasley and Mrs. Yates W. Little; Proceedings, Mrs. T. Earle Stribling; Scrapbook, Mrs. Henry Perkins; Tellers, Mrs. Leonard Wallace. In the absence of the Chairmen all other reports were filed.

The State Regent recognized Mrs. Hugh Faulk, who gave the report of the Committee on Time and Place as follows: District meetings, Southwest, in Cordele, Tuesday, June 17, 1969, with Fort Early Chapter, hostess; Northwest in Atlanta, Wednesday, June 18, 1969, Atlanta Chapter, hostess; Northeast in Toccoa, Thursday, June 19, 1969, Toccoa Chapter, hostess; Southeast in Statesboro, Friday, June 20, 1969, Archibald Bulloch Chapter, hostess. The Fall Board of Management meeting will be October 23, 1969, at the King and Prince Hotel on St. Simons Island. The 72nd State Conference will be held March 12, 13, 14, 1970, at the Sheraton-Biltmore Hotel, Atlanta, hostess chapters being Baron DeKalb, Fort Peachtree and Joseph Habersham. Upon motion of Mrs. Thornton, seconded by Miss Cooper, the report was accepted.

Telegrams were read by the State Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Sam J. Henderson, from Mrs. Ober D. Warthen, Honorary State

Regent, and from William DeCarr Sims, State President of the Georgia State Society, C.A.R.

Mrs. Reid called for the awards to be made by State Chairmen. (See list on pages 189-193).

The State Regent recognized Mrs. Leo L. Phillips, Jr., State Chairman of Junior Membership, who presented Mrs. John Landers, Chairman of the Doll Project of the Juniors. Mrs. Landers requested Mrs. Spicer to draw a name and Mrs. Thomas Knox Kendrick was asked to read the name of the winner of her namesake, "Miss Edna," a beautiful doll dressed by the Junior members of Georgia and named in honor of the Honorary State Regent. About \$240.00, realized from the sale will go to the Helen Pouch Scholarship Fund. Mrs. McCranie of the Colonel William Few Chapter was the winner.

Mrs. Reid expressed the appreciation of the Conference for the gracious hospitality extended by Mrs. Manon P. Phillips, Regent of the Augusta Chapter, and members of the chapter. Mrs. Phillips thanked her several chairmen.

Under unfinished business Mrs. Herman M. Richardson spoke of a room set aside for use of the State Society and the chapters at Rhodes Memorial Hall in Atlanta by Miss Carroll Hart, State Archivist. Up to 75 people can meet there, the door is to be left unlocked and no DAR books are to be removed from the State Archives Building to the room at Rhodes. The State Regent requested Mrs. Richardson to submit a written report of her findings for the State Regent's file, and also asked Mrs. Richardson to present to the Chairman of the Resolutions Committee recommendations to be considered at the Fall Board of Management meeting at St. Simons Island.

The State Regent presented Mrs. James J. Muldrow, National Chairman of Congress Seating, who had moved recently to Georgia and is now a member of Baron DeKalb Chapter.

Mrs. Reid called for new business. Mrs. J. Lamar Newbern, Regent of General James Jackson Chapter, spoke of the advisability of having proposed resolutions sent to the delegates for study before the Conference. A motion that copies of resolutions be given to voters at the time of their first reading to the Assembly was offered by Mrs. Robert W. Harrison, Jr., Earl of Camden Chapter, seconded by Mrs. O. Terrell Moore, Hancock Chapter, and carried.

There being no further business, the members of the Assembly joined hands and sang a stanza of "Blest Be the Tie That Binds," the colors were retired, the Benediction pronounced by the State Chaplain, and the State Regent declared the 71st State Conference of the Georgia State Society, National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution adjourned.

RESOLVED, That should the State Treasurer be incapacitated, the Chairman of the Finance Committee is authorized, with written approval of the State Regent, to serve as the Acting State Treasurer until such time as the State Treasurer is able to resume her duties or a new State Treasurer be elected.

**DISPOSAL OF OUT-DATED AND/OR UNUSABLE  
STATE PROPERTIES**

WHEREAS, Certain properties in the care of the State Curator become either out-dated or unusable as a result of wear; and,

WHEREAS, These properties become a burden to the Curator and an expense to the State Society for storage, transportation, or repair: Therefore be it

RESOLVED, That such properties may be either placed in an appropriate location where they will be appreciated, sold at a reasonable price to an interested purchaser, or disposed of in an appropriate manner. Be it further

RESOLVED, That the disposal of said properties must meet with the approval of the State Regent, the State Curator, and the State Parliamentarian, and that such disposition of said properties will be incorporated in the report of the State Curator to be recorded in the State Proceedings as a matter of record.

**MEMORIAL TO MR. ERWIN FREES SEIMES**

WHEREAS the President General had requested money corsages in lieu of orchids during her visits this spring to State Conferences, which the Georgia State Society made plans to do; and

WHEREAS the President General will not be able to attend Georgia's 71st State Conference due to the death of her husband on March 12th; and

WHEREAS a request from the Corresponding Secretary General indicated Mrs. Seimes' preferring that flowers for Mr. Seimes be omitted and memorial gifts be made to the fund for the renovation of Constitution Hall, which project we had designated to benefit from the money corsages; be it

**BUREAU OF CENSUS INVASION OF PRIVACY**

WHEREAS, The census of the United States every ten years from 1970 has been authorized by Congress to determine the number of members of the House of Representatives from each state, and to determine how many American citizens and aliens are residents of the United States, and

WHEREAS, In 1970 the Census Bureau is preparing to collect much extraneous data with some 120 personal questions such as, how are you fixed for plumbing, what door of your house do you usually enter, do you share your bath with anyone, how much do

you earn, what rent do you pay, etc.; which questions must be answered under penalty of a \$100.00 fine or 60 days in jail, and

WHEREAS, Legislation has been introduced in Congress which would limit mandatory questions to those necessary for our constitutional requirements for congressional districting, answers to all other questions to be voluntary;

RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution support an accurate simplified census in 1970 limiting the mandatory questions to cover only: Address, Names of all residents in household, Relationship to head of family, Sex, Date and Place of Birth, Race, Marital Status, and Visitors in home at time of census; placing all other questions on a voluntary basis, eliminating a penalty for failure to answer the voluntary questions, thus obtaining all essential information necessary for Federal, State and Local Governments, and at the same time protecting the right of individual privacy as guaranteed in the Constitution of the United States of America.

#### **ADMIRATION FOR ASTRONAUTS OF APOLLO 9**

WHEREAS the epic accomplishment of the Apollo 9 project is now history and

WHEREAS it proved without doubt what Americans working together towards a common goal can achieve and

WHEREAS the apt reading of verses from Genesis by the three Astronauts proved their loyalty to the country they serve, a nation under God

RESOLVED that the Georgia State Society Daughters of the American Revolution express their joyous pride and warm admiration for those courageous men—who looked upon God's creation—earth—"small and blue and beautiful in that eternal silence where it floats"—and they found it good.

#### **DISPLAY OF THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA**

WHEREAS a popular monthly magazine chose its February 1969 issue for an urgent plea for more universal display of the Flag of the United States of America and

WHEREAS the too frequent burning of the Flag of our country and the lack of respect shown has been shameful

RESOLVED that the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, warmly commend the Reader's Digest for its timely plea and with it affirm that "only as each one of us gives strength to America, can America give strength to us" and, be it further

RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be sent to the editors of the Reader's Digest.

#### **SENSITIVITY TRAINING AND SELF-CRITICISM**

WHEREAS Sensitivity training, incorporating Self-Criticism, is being promoted for use in many youth organizations and on a mandatory basis in certain public schools in various forms such as T-GROUPING, HUMAN RELATIONS WORKSHOPS, SELF-EVALUATION GROUPS, AUTO CRITICISM, OPERANT CONDITIONING, etc., and

WHEREAS these programs have been proven to cause distrust and the breakdown of communication between participants, and

WHEREAS many specialists in the field of psychiatry recognize SELF-CRITICISM to be an integral part of the brain washing technique used so destructively by the Chinese Communists on our military in Korea,

WHEREAS American psychiatrists and psychologists have been trained to make sick minds well and have earned public respect for their proper efforts in this field—while Communist Psychopoliticians have been trained to make well minds sick by misusing psychology to subvert respect for parental authority, loyalty to country, religious and moral convictions and the worth of the individual. Therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, go on record as being opposed to the Implementation of SENSITIVITY TRAINING PROGRAMS and similar programs in youth organizations, and public schools.

**GEORGIA DELEGATION MEETING  
SEVENTH-EIGHTH CONTINENTAL CONGRESS  
WASHINGTON — APRIL 14, 1969**

The meeting of the Georgia Daughters attending Continental Congress was held in the Assembly Room of the Administration Building at 2:30 p.m., Monday, April 14. At that time there will be a dinner to which all Georgia Daughters will be invited, along with guests, but the Board meeting will be open only to those eligible to attend.

Mrs. Reid announced that there were only six candidates for the office of Vice President General, the seventh vacancy to be filled next year, but that each candidate to be elected must receive a majority of the votes cast, so every voter must cast her ballot. She also announced those responsible for Georgia Box tickets for each session. She presented Mrs. James J. Muldrow, National Chairman of Seating for 78th Continental Congress, and explained the process of obtaining seats for guests for the first two nights of Congress.

The State Regent regretted to announce the loss by death of one of Georgia's Honorary State Regents and a Past Vice President General, Mrs. Thomas Coke Mell. Mrs. Mell died in Atlanta on March 25, 1969.

The State Regent made several announcements coming from the meeting of the National Board of Management: that the debt on Constitution Hall was down to \$54,000, but the interest is now 7 ½ %; that the bill to make February permanently American History Month is House Joint Resolution #481 (HJR 481); that the Schools Tour will leave Washington October 10, with details pertinent to the Georgia Society to be sent to chapters later; that the other organization required to make an annual report to the Smithsonian Institution is the American Historical Society; that application papers of prospective members needed for honor roll should be so marked; that a chapter wishing notice of verification of applications should enclose a stamped, addressed card with the name of the applicants; that there will be some changes in the honor roll requirements for 1970; that Georgia will receive several awards at Congress—namely two winners of American History Month essays, first place in Magazine advertising in 4,000-8,000 membership, Andrew Houser Chapter being third in the Society.

Mrs. Reid announced that Miss Cooper had Georgia Dinner tickets and that Banquet tickets could be obtained from her.

**MINUTES OF CALLED MEETING OF  
STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT  
WASHINGTON, D. C. — APRIL 16, 1969**

Mrs. R. Hugh Reid, State Regent, called a meeting of the members of the State Board of Management in attendance at the 78th Continental Congress. The meeting was called to order at 10:30 p.m. on April 16, 1969, in Mrs. Reid's room at the Mayflower Hotel, with 18 eligible members of the Board in attendance. Mrs. Leonard D. Wallace was asked to act as Parliamentarian for the meeting.

Mrs. Reid read Sections 2, 3 and 4 of Article X of the State Bylaws, which refer to the Board of Management, and she also read from the audit for the period ending May 31, 1968, which showed a balance in the General Fund Savings account of \$4,804.76.

The reason for the called meeting was stated by the State Regent. Mrs. Seimes, President General, had announced that a plaque would be placed in the lobby of Constitution Hall which would carry the names of individuals and groups which contributed during 1969 a total of \$1,000.00 or more to the fund for the renovation of Constitution Hall. Mrs. Reid pointed out that pledges were coming in rapidly, and to wait until the regular meeting of the State Board of Management in October would possibly make a gift from the Georgia State Society too late to prove helpful to the President General's efforts to reduce the debt. The State Regent reported that she had discussed with three Honorary State Regents of Georgia who had to leave Washington early the situation, and they had approved her suggestion.

Mrs. Reid asked for a motion that Georgia pledge \$1,000.00 to the fund for the renovation of Constitution Hall, taking the funds from the General Fund Savings Account, thus assuring the Georgia State Society's name a place on the plaque to be placed in the lobby of Constitution Hall. Miss Martha Cooper made the motion, seconded by Mrs. Carlyle Mumford Ward. The motion passed unanimously.

Mrs. Robert H. Humphrey moved that the necessary funds be taken from the state dues checking account and replaced with a like amount from the General Fund savings account after the latter drew interest in June. This motion was seconded by Mrs. G. Seals Aiken and passed without dissent.

Mrs. Reid announced that she would make the pledge for the Georgia State Society at the next pledging session of the 78th Continental Congress. There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

Georgia Daughters have indeed excelled in their efforts to carry out the objectives of the National Society, DAR, and this State Regent is proud to have been a part of these efforts. To have the privilege of wearing the ribbon of the State Regent of Georgia has been a most gratifying and challenging experience, one which will long be remembered with affection and gratitude. Sixty-six per cent of Georgia's 95 chapters met requirements for National Honor Roll recognition.

## **STATE REGISTRAR**

In September, letters of instruction were sent each Chapter Regent and Chapter Registrar. Over 3,000 index cards were printed and many distributed, with necessary information needed for the State Card Files.

Registrars, please send file cards when there is a new member, transfers in or out of Chapter, change of name, resignations, and deaths. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated.

The State Register of each Chapter's members has been indexed and many pages added to take care of the increase in chapters and members.

## **STATE HISTORIAN**

**Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox**

Twenty chapters contributed \$139.50 to the cataloguing and preservation of the Americana Collection. Governor Jared Irwin Chapter gave 2 books to the Repository of Americana and the Atlanta Chapter gave 3 books to the Archives. Oliver Morton Chapter has begun compiling a list of old cemeteries in Jones County and St. Andrews Parish Chapter is researching the origin of place names in McIntosh County. Nathaniel Macon Chapter had a 200 year old dress accepted by the museum.

Historical programs for, or by, adults were 102 and for, or by children were 30 with the anniversaries of 52 famous men, 7 famous women and 51 events celebrated. Proclamations for American History Month were signed by the Governor and many mayors. Publicity throughout the year was excellent with about 436 radio programs and announcements, 43 television programs and reams of newspaper editorials and articles. There were 45 historical tours made by groups of adults and 57 by school children. Peter Early Chapter was a leader in Early County in the celebration of the county's 150th anniversary.

Thirty-seven chapters celebrated American History Month. Essay contests were held, 19 chapters reported giving medals or prizes in American History and \$35 was contributed to the American History Scholarship. Five historical restorations have been begun. The graves

of 9 Revolutionary soldiers were located, 2 of these were marked, 1 was dedicated. One other grave of a Revolutionary soldier was marked; 1 ancestor of a member grave was marked and 35 deceased members of the DAR were memorialized by markers. Several chapters have plans to mark graves of Revolutionary soldiers already located.

### STATE LIBRARIAN

Of the 93 Georgia Chapters, 84 have Chapter Librarians, and 37 reported a total of \$1,130.90 spent on National, State, and Local Library work.

Edwards 1968, through Savannah Chapter; "Oxford Georgia Echoes" by Charles C. Jarrell 1967, from Sergeant Newton Chapter; "A Georgia Pioneer and Some of His Descendants—Young and Allied Families" by Emma K. Y. Hand 1953, from William Witcher Chapter; and pamphlet, "Ladies Volunteer Aid Association of Sandersville, Washington County, Georgia 1861-1862", by Kenneth Coleman 1968, from Governor Jared Irwin Chapter.

All books on the Librarian General's requested list were sent but one which was ordered but no longer available. Thirty-three chapters contributed \$107.50 to the National Library Microfilm Fund. The total spent on 5 of the books for the NSDAR Library was \$55.00.

Eleven books were added to our DAR Collection at the Georgia Department of Archives and History: "Proceedings of the Georgia State Society of the National Society DAR, 70th State Conference, 1967-68" and "The Cleveland Family" 3 volumes, from the State Society; "Coweta County Chronicles for One Hundred Years, with an account of the Indians from whom the land was acquired and some Historical Papers Relating to its Acquisition by Georgia, with Lineage Papers" by Mary G. Jones and Lilly Reynolds, 1928; "Land Office and Prerogative Court Records of Colonial Maryland" by Hartsook, and "Personal Names in Hennings Statutes at Large of Virginia and Shepherds Continuation" by Joseph J. Casey, from Atlanta Chapter; "The Mauney Brothers", given by Cherokee Chapter; "Funderburke History and Heritage" by Dr. Guy B. Funderburke, given in honor of Mrs. Ross Apperson through Colonel William Candler Chapter; "Marriages and Deaths, 1763-1820, Abstracted from Extant Georgia Newspapers" by Mary B. Warren, from Hawkinsville Chapter; and "Heidt and Allied Families" by Lawrence M. Edwards 1968, from Savannah Chapter. Cost of 7 of these books was \$117.50. The State Society spent \$60.00 on maintenance of the

DAR Collection at State Archives. Ten chapters contributed \$80.50 to the State Library Fund.

A total amount of \$710.90 was reported spent on local library work by 24 chapters. Fifty-four books and 5 pamphlets were placed in local and chapter libraries at a cost of \$523.90. Of these, 7 books and 5 pamphlets were placed for which no cost was reported, therefore, this figure is inaccurate. Chapters reported \$87.00 given for maintenance of and additions to local collections and for binding DAR Magazines for their local libraries.

Three chapters sent 209 books to the Tamassee Library, 2 chapters sent 261 books to the Kate Duncan Smith Library, and 1 chapter sent 160 books to the Fort Benning Library.

# Committee Reports

## National Committees

### AMERICAN HERITAGE

It has been a privilege and pleasure to serve as your State American Heritage Chairman. I wish to thank the chapters participating in this most important work.

Public interest in DAR aroused by American Heritage activities is most encouraging. Preservation of our noble heritage in the fields of art, crafts, drama, literature and music has been the means of presenting the aims of the National Society. As we have enthusiastically participated in heritage events whole communities have been inspired to a greater appreciation of our country's glorious past. Through enjoyable programs covered by some category of this committee, several chapters have reported an increase in membership. This is such a broad facet of our Society's work surely each chapter did some work in the field of American Heritage, although only 43 reports were received.

### AMERICAN INDIANS

Mrs. Arthur J. Waterman

The State Chairman would like to thank the Chapters for their help during the past year. We are fortunate to have a National Vice Chairman of American Indians, Mrs. Harold Brewer, in the Georgia State Society.

Sixty-one Chapters submitted reports, 24 Chapters reported Indian programs. About one-half of the chapters appointed Indian Chairmen. Chapter programs included our Indian Schools; contributions of the Indians; Indian culture; a speech by the Interior Designer who worked on the restoration of the Chief Vann House; and, a history teacher and authority on American Indians spoke to one of the chapters.

Oglethorpe Chapter, Columbus, presented two American Indian Programs. WRBL-TV Columbus, featured Indians 30 minutes per day for one week. American Indians were presented on the programs.

One chapter had a rummage sale with another chapter having a linen shower.

Seven hundred seven dollars and 65 cents was given to the American Indians by the Georgia State Society; \$413.15 was sent to Bacone—\$193.00 to the National Project; \$96.15 donations; \$14.00 for the Library; 263 pounds of clothing valued at \$634.50; and \$85.00 in linens.

St. Mary's received \$294.50—National Project \$165.00; Donations \$124.00; 258 pounds of clothing valued at \$615; \$75 jewelry.

Fifty-four dollars was sent to the General Scholarship Fund; \$110.00 was sent to Nursing Scholarships.

Other gifts to the American Indians included: a cash gift from a former Regent; shoes; and, a mattress and springs.

## **AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP**

Duplicate letters were mailed to all chapters in September with suggested ideas for their year's work on this committee.

In January 1969, all chapters received their questionnaire and 62 chapters reported, 44 had Americanism programs, 53 repeated the American's Creed at all meetings, 9 had study groups on Immigration Act, 14 had essays or posters, 7 presented 113 school awards, 12 reported 13 hours and 26 minutes of radio time, 4 reported 2 hours and 50 minutes of television time, 14 had 1,391 inches of news print, 2 had 337 inches of pictures, 5 served 453 hours on boards or committees to reduce illiteracy, 3 had 6 teaching in Americanism classes, 25 chapters gave 601 magazines and pamphlets to promote Americanism, 21 chapters had 95 daughters working on Americanism programs, 2 chapters entertained naturalized citizens, 19 chapters bought 210 DAR Manuals and placed them in schools, libraries, hospitals, doctor's offices and with scouts, 7 gave 1,258 manuals to Naturalization Courts, 2 chapters gave 8 DAR Magazines to libraries, 3 gave 144 flags to naturalized citizens, one chapter formed a resolution in protest concerning the recent rendition of our National Anthem and asked that we hereby protest any rendition other than that intended by the original musical score and patriotic lines.

My appreciation and gratitude goes to the four Vice Chairmen for their assistance in promoting this program.

## **CONSERVATION**

Letters and questionnaire sent to all chapters in August, 1968. Reports from 40 Chapters showed many varied, interesting and informative programs with speakers and slides presented and the activities showed a deeper understanding of our American Heritage and a greater interest in conserving our natural resources, in protecting wild life, in restoring historic spots and in beautifying the world about us. Members are serving in County and State work such as the Georgia State Pollution Commission, the County Beautification Commission, City Parks Commission and for the House Bill to preserve the Okefenokee Swamp and the Revolutionary Battle Park in Savannah. Plantings include thousands of pine trees, many dogwoods, various shrubs, bulbs, iris, roses, lilies, azaleas, camellias, boxwoods and many others. Special projects include plantings at hospitals, schools, fire stations, churches, city parks, colleges, civic centers, theatres, libraries, restoring and landscaping old city cemeteries, landscaping church grounds and Chapter houses, roadsides and camp sites. Youth work includes giving programs for Scout troops, Boy's Clubs, J.A.C.'s, C.A.R., 4-H Clubs, distributing literature at the meetings at schools and DAR meetings. Bird feeding stations, fountains and fish pools have been built. Members canned and froze fruits and vegetables. Money contributed to National Project was \$66.90 and to local projects \$407.00.

## **DAR GOOD CITIZENS**

In October a mailing was sent to all Chapter Regents and the four District Vice Chairmen with a letter of instruction for the selection of the Good Citizens, a sample questionnaire and a report blank.

It would be most gratifying to your State Chairman to identify each chapter and the amount of money sent to the National Chairman for DAR advertise-

ments but space does not permit the long list of chapters. Thank you for your every effort in making Georgia's report one to be remembered.

#### **DAR MUSEUM**

Fifty-nine chapters reported on their DAR Museum work for the year. Sixteen chapters have had programs on the Museum with ten of these showing slides. One hundred thirty-six dollars was contributed to the Air Conditioning Fund and \$75 to the regular work of the Museum. Two Chapters, Baron DeKalb and Elijah Clarke, made outstandingly interesting reports on their projects. Dr. Jessie Mize, through Elijah Clarke Chapter, presented to the Museum two gifts:

1. A hand woven badge commemorating one hundred years of the United States existence. The badge had been in the family of Miss Mary Creswell who for many years was Dean of the School of Home Economics at the University of Georgia.

2. A Rose Medallion footed fruit stand with pierced border. This was part of two china services purchased in 1902 or 1903 in Canton, China, by Dr. Charles Allen Mize who was then serving as Provincial Supervisor of the Island of Luzon, under Governor General Taft, later President Taft. These services have been in the Mize family ever since.

It has been a great pleasure for the Chairman to have served the Society on this committee.

#### **THE PROPOSED "GEORGIA ROOM" AT DAR MUSEUM**

The project of Georgia obtaining a "Room" at DAR Museum, has been presented by the State Chairman at every opportunity. Two District Meetings were attended and a report given, also information as to the progress being made. Letters were written and phone calls made to the members.

Programs on our DAR Schools were presented by 70 chapters: Tamassee 56, Kate Duncan Smith 58, Berry 27, Crossnore 22, Hillside 17, Hindman 14, Northland 13. A chartered bus trip to Kate Duncan Smith was sponsored by the Atlanta and Joseph Habersham chapters with the other chapters in the Metropolitan area invited. Forty-one Daughters enjoyed this tour. A bus load of clothing was carried and \$42.00 contributed to the school by the travelers.

Free freight was obtained from Georgia Highway Express in Valdosta and Vidalia; Overnight Transportation, Ft. Oglethorpe; and Baggett Transportation, Chattanooga, Tenn.

### DAR SERVICE FOR VETERAN-PATIENTS

**Mrs. John F. Thigpen**

Interesting reports were received from eleven chapters indicating much interest and activity in this new committee. There are many ways in which courtesies may be extended to these veteran-patients even when the chapter is far away from a hospital.

**Abraham Baldwin Chapter** sent cookies, fruit, cigarettes and magazines.

**Baron DeKalb Chapter** organized five committees of three to four persons each to rotate working each Monday, from eleven to one p.m., in the Day-Care Center at the VA Hospital on Clairmont Road in Decatur. These patients are not confined to the hospital and commute for treatment. Each committee donates, prepares and serves a

light lunch to about 18 people, which includes the patients and three ladies who work with the patients, all sitting family-style and visiting while they eat. Some of the patients find it difficult to adjust to civilian life and need to be with other people. Donations of 90 paperback books and \$15.00 in cash were also made and the Chairman attended services in memory of four Chaplains which were held at the hospital.

**Button Gwinnett, George Walton and Oglethorpe chapters** at Columbus appointed five members from each chapter to distribute 5,004 Christmas cards (cost wholesale \$65.97) to six wards at Martin Army Hospital, Fort Benning, to Vietnam veterans. Regent of Oglethorpe Chapter also took 162 historical and biographical paperback books to MAH for ward distribution. Total expenditure \$118.48.

**Capt. Thomas Cobb Chapter** reported sending 25 paperback books, classic and fiction.

**Cherokee Chapter** took magazines to patients in the wards at Fort McPherson.

**Council of Safety Chapter** sent a Christmas box weighing 36 lbs. and valued at \$65.00 to veteran-patients at the VA Center, Dublin. Contents were 48 wrapped packages containing tobacco, candy, cake, books, toiletries and socks; also \$3.00 in money with Christmas cards and \$10.00 to the Red Cross "Ditty Bag" project.

**Joseph Habersham Chapter** donated \$21.00 in cash to purchase coupon books for veteran-patients at the VA Hospital on Clairmont Road (P. O. Box 29457, Atlanta 30329) to be issued to meet emergency needs of the patients; also a new copy of THE ROBE and two dozen used copies of paperback books.

**Nathaniel Macon Chapter** sent to the VA Center at Dublin two large boxes of candy (\$20.00), 729 magazines, 50 paperback books and 20 copies of Reader's Digest.

**Roanoke Chapter** selected the VA Center at Dublin to express their appreciation to veteran-patients and were assigned to the Nursing Home Care Unit, composed of 56 men who had served in World Wars I and II. Merchants of Richland liberally donated a number of well-chosen gifts such as a zipper-lined weather jacket, pajamas, shirts, ties, socks, belts, books of stamps, cartons of cigarettes and shaving lotions, all gift-wrapped. Thirty-three coupon books of \$1.00 denomination were also purchased by the chapter from the Director of Voluntary Service for patients in need, each inscribed "Compliments of Roanoke Chapter DAR, Richland, Ga."

Your State Chairman regrets that no awards were offered by her for this year but there will be awards made at Continental Congress in April for the MOST OUTSTANDING STATE REPORT and the MOST OUTSTANDING CHAPTER REPORT. A breakfast for this Committee is scheduled for Tuesday, April 15, 1969 at the Army-Navy Club in Washington, D. C. Visitors are welcome.

Appreciation is expressed to Mrs. Hoyt P. Oliver, Vice Chairman for the Northwest District, for circularizing throughout her district the addresses of U.S. Military Hospitals in Georgia.

A short questionnaire was sent to the 94 chapters, and 36 reports were received. One chapter worked up a program on the insignia. Thirty-one purchased insignia pins (emblems): 33 bars, including regents, ancestral, state chairman and state officers bars; three 25-year pins and five 50-year pins.

**JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS**

**Mrs. P. I. Dixon**

Georgia has ten chapters which sponsored 1,944 clubs having a total of 61,246 members. This is an increase of 300 clubs and 9,420 members over last year. Several chapters organized for the first time and it is gratifying to report this increase. Throughout the State approximately 5,000 buttons, pins and citations have been presented. Two Thatcher Pins, 87 Good Citizenship Medals and several cash awards have been presented. Georgia contributed \$36.00 to the National J.A.C. Contest Prize money. Georgia received the following awards at the 1968 Continental Congress: First place for the greatest number of members; Second Place for the greatest number of Clubs and First Place for Outstanding J.A.C. work.

Baron DeKalb leads the State again this year in the number of

members with a total of 47,591, an increase of 2,877. This Chapter leads the State in the number of clubs sponsored with a total of 1,734. Their chairman contacted all school officials and gave help when requested. She personally presented the awards when asked. The Chapter won National First Prize for the most J.A.C. members, National First Prize for most new J.A.C. Clubs and the State award for the largest increase in J.A.C. Clubs. In the Contest awards Baron DeKalb won four First Place awards of \$5.00 each, two Second Place awards, four Third Place awards and two Special awards of \$5.00. J.A.C. work is organized throughout DeKalb County Schools.

The Atlanta Chapter does great work in Settlement Houses and Boys Clubs. Their Chairman does a remarkable work with underprivileged children, slum areas, low income and high crime rate sections. They were First in the State in new Clubs with a gain of 66. Their Chairman made 209 talks on the J.A.C. Program.

Thronateeska is Second in the State in new Clubs with 36.

### **JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP**

From February 1, 1968 to February, 1969, Georgia had a total of 110 new Junior Members. In response to a questionnaire, sixteen chapters reported 35 Juniors to be Chairmen of State and National Committees. Five Juniors are chapter officers, one Junior held two state chairmanships and one is a State officer. A total of \$522.40 was sent to the State Treasurer for the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund from the sale of Junior items, contributions from chapters and through the doll project. When profits from all items have been turned in for 1968-1969, the total will reach \$780.80. Kay Dyal Miller of Colonel William Few is Georgia's Outstanding Junior Member for 1968-69.

### **LINEAGE RESEARCH**

Letters of instruction and questionnaires were mailed to all chapters. The letter mailed early in October announced the Workshop held at the Washington Library in Macon on October 29, 1968. The meeting was well attended.

Sixty five chapters reported on the work that had been accomplished this year. They reported two hundred nineteen potential members have been assisted, one hundred twenty-five new members have been acquired through the efforts of the committees and ninety-eight new members had been accepted February 1, 1968. Also thirty-six workshops were held in the State.

Requests for assistance were received from seven chapters in the state and six chapters in other states.

Two requests for assistance were mailed to Lineage Research Committee, D. C. and one request for assistance was asked in another state.

Many of the chapters are doing excellent work. It is hoped that all chapters will have a Lineage Research Chairman next year.

## MEMBERSHIP

**Mrs. Carlyle M. Ward**

This report is compiled from information received from the office of the Treasurer General during the last year and in response to the questionnaire sent to each Chapter Regent, Registrar and Membership Chairman, when I had their addresses.

The Membership: February 1, 1969; in 95 Chapters—6,643. Members-at-large—69. We gained 322 new members, 110 of whom were Juniors; 66 reinstated; 44 transferred in. Total gain—432. Net gain—83.

Our losses: 164 deaths; 114 resignations; 17 dropped; 44 transferred out. Total loss 349.

Sixteen chapters kept the same number of members; 28 chapters had a loss; 51 chapters gained members.

Eighty chapters reporting; 11 C.A.R. reported transferred to DAR.

## MOTION PICTURE

One release was sent to the chapters giving information about the work for Motion Pictures. One questionnaire was sent. Of the 94 DAR Chapters, 27 answered about motion picture chairman; 15 of these have chairmen; 12 answering do not have chairmen. We hope more members will become interested in helping to improve motion pictures.

## NATIONAL DEFENSE

**Miss Martha A. Cooper**

The Georgia Daughters actively carried out the work of this committee as shown by the 89 reports which were filed; only 4 chapters failed to report National Defense work. The total report is one of the best, if not the best, for the Georgia State Society.

In carrying out the purpose of enlightening public opinion the chapters reported the following: 70 full National Defense programs with 10 hours 46 minutes devoted to the National Defense mailings; 57 chapters studied the 1968 Resolutions; 59 chapters distributed National Defense material, the distribution being 27 to schools, 18 to public libraries, and 32 to individuals; 116 communications to Congressmen on defense subjects were counted with others unreported.

To insure the future of our great country the chapters reported 6 bronze and 4 gold R.O.T.C. medals were presented. Four hundred thirty-eight boys and girls were recognized publicly for their honor, service, courage, leadership, and patriotism and were presented the Good Citizenship Medal.

A total of \$321.50 was contributed for Dollars for Defense to be used for the mailing of the National Defense material. The National Defender was distributed within 64 chapters. Probably the most outstanding work was that 59 paid subscriptions to members and gifts to non-members were reported. One of the gift subscriptions was to Miss Patricia Nixon at the White House.

Reports numbering 77 were received from 93 chapters of Georgia. One chapter, so requested of all 93, returned slip with notation—"No report." The courtesy of acknowledgement was appreciated. Tabulated—47 yearbooks mailed State Chairman, 13 outlines received, 6 inserts mailed, 3 supplements mailed.

The majority of the programs followed the excellent National Outline, and reflected the requirements for National Honor Roll to very good advantage. We can be very proud of our chapters for the high quality of work as shown in their programs and outlines.

Some chapters feel that they have within their membership members well qualified to adapt, develop the National Outline for their programs, and this chapter member participation as speakers creates a greater quickening and thought provoking interest to the members, and when possible, by open program meetings for the communities in which they live.

## **PUBLIC RELATIONS**

Throughout our history we have been blessed with leaders who had vision, fortitude and determination to develop and carry through new ideas and programs. This has been true of our DAR whose objectives are historic preservation, promotion of education and patriotic endeavor.

Our Chapters reporting have given us an excellent resumé of their work. We have approximately 20,000 inches of publicity in daily and weekly newspapers which gives us 18,500 inches of printed material with 1500 inches of photographs. For Radio and Television, we have 23 hours of radio time and 4 hours and 32 minutes of television time. From our Press Book Chairman, we have this report from the 41 Chapters reporting to her—4,419 inches of printed material with 1,392 inches of photographs. Our State Press Book will be sent to Washington for judging. Three Chapters will submit entries in the Feature Story Contest. They are as follows: Baron De-Kalb Chapter, Brier Creek Chapter, Fort Peachtree Chapter.

Your State Chairman wishes to thank all of the Chapters that sent reports and especially to thank our State Regent, for her help in planning Public Relations program for 95 DAR Chapters with over 6,700 members.

## **RADIO AND TELEVISION**

RADIO—27 hours, 15 minutes; TELEVISION—19 hours, 15 minutes. Many reports on Radio and TV did not include minutes, or station name, so could not use in this report.

It has been an interesting and informative year, in the presentation of our DAR programs, with the fine cooperation of so many local Radio and Television stations. My thanks to all the chapters for their devoted and active participation in all their efforts to acquaint the public with timely and patriotic programs.

## **STUDENT LOAN AND SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE**

Seven high school students made application for the National American History Scholarship. Joseph Stephen Bodenhamer, Albany, sponsored by the Thronateeska Chapter will represent Georgia.

Seventy-nine chapters contributed \$300.00 to the National American History Scholarship Fund.

The Georgia DAR has two Scholarship Funds at Berry Schools: The Janet S. Merritt Scholarship, \$7,728.96; The Edna D. Kendrick Scholarship, \$12,804.92. At the University of Georgia, the DAR Memorial Scholarship Fund totals \$18,382.59,—on loan, \$4,920.81. Also at the University of Georgia are the following additional funds administered by the University: Elijah Clarke Chapter, \$3,299.43,—on loan, \$1,111.82; Hawkinsville Chapter Lila Napier Jelks Fund, \$1,142.79,—on loan \$123.75; Richmond Walton McCurry DAR Fund, \$3,087.72; and the May Erwin Talmadge Fund, \$10,374.40,—on loan \$574.33. The following chapters have reported Scholarship

Funds: Abraham Baldwin at West Georgia College, 2 Scholarship Funds, \$200.00,—\$100.00 on loan; General James Jackson Chapter, A Memorial Gift of \$100.00 loaned on Scholarship; John Ball Chapter has established a Victor Davidson Memorial Scholarship at Mercer Law School; Peter Early Chapter, Scholarship Fund, \$11,491.89,—on loan, \$6,621; Savannah Chapter, Scholarship Fund, \$639.73 in Scholarship Fund,—\$800.00 on loan; Thronateeska, \$200.00 on loan to 2 students. Total Scholarship Funds reported this year: \$69,452.43. Total Loans to students, \$14,551.71.

### **THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA**

Of the 95 chapters in the State 82 sent in reports of their work. Thirty-five large flags were presented to Boy and Girl Scouts, Jaycees, J.A.C., schools, libraries, C.A.R., Woman's Nationalization Court Club, Y.W.C.A., to a city hall, Federal Nationalization Court, club house, 4-H club, health clinic, civic center, Boys' Club, Presbyterian Church, Court House Square, Tamassee and Kate Duncan Smith schools; 1890 small flags were presented and 68 Jeweled Flags were sold and given for gifts.

Twenty-nine chapters studied the flag code and 750 flag codes were distributed; 27 corrections of incorrect use of the flag were reported and 94 short talks on the flag were given; 41 chapters had entire programs on the flag; Newspaper items and pictures numbered 132; 16 television programs and 58 radio broadcasts. All chapters reporting gave the Pledge of Allegiance at the meetings, 55 sang the National Anthem and 16 chapters gave the Pledge to the Flag of Georgia; 62 chapters urged the use of the flag on national holidays, members of 43 chapters asked neighbors to buy and display flags; 37 chapters participated in community activities where the flag played an important part.

### **TRANSPORTATION**

Sixty chapters reported their work for this committee. Four hundred thirty members assisted in furnishing rides for members who would not otherwise have gone to the meetings. Sixty chapters reported cooperating with the hostesses and Program Committee. Thirty historical places were visited by chapters while others are planning visits later. Twenty-one chapters reported furnishing the Children of the American Revolution with rides for meetings, trips, etc. Thirty chapters had programs on traffic affecting children and adults. Ninety-six Daughters attended the Fall Board of Management meeting in Albany, Georgia. Thirty chapters said that they had obtained up to date material relating directly to traffic safety, and made use of it.

# Special National Committees

## AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH

Mrs. John Inman Bell, Jr.

Committee letters in reference to the activities for observing February as American History Month were sent to all chapters. Of the 57 chapters reporting, several included detailed information on their varied and interesting work. Newspaper articles were printed featuring: history relating to George Walton and his home at Meadow Garden; Early County's history with emphasis and picture of the court house with a wooden Confederate flag pole and the erection of historical markers; picture of State winner of 1968 American History Month Essay contest with summary of essay included; pictures of local winners of AHM Essay and article on local winner of history award for outstanding work in American History; and several articles with pictures of large celebration in commemoration of Georgia Day with members in colonial costume, laying wreaths on the tombs of Tomochichi and General Oglethorpe. This event was attended by Gov. Maddox, the mayor of Savannah, other official dignitaries, and the public. This chapter also presented an hour TV program with members in costume, narrating the slide scripts on "Georgia's Gems—Savannah's Squares." There were 130 newspaper articles and 21 pictures published with a total of 806 inches of American History Month publicity. Forty-nine sets of Spot Announcements were used on radio; 10 sets on TV. In behalf of this committee, 10 members appeared on radio with total radio time of 1,903 minutes; 18 members on TV with total TV time of 235 minutes; AHM colored slides were used on 13 occasions.

Fifty-five chapters had programs on American History, 2 scripts and 40 slides with narration were sent to the National Chairman; 23 chapters sponsored AHM displays at libraries, schools, and department stores; 124 AHM posters were displayed in banks, post offices and schools; and 297 AHM stickers were used; 92 medals, 2 Georgia Historical maps, 9 cash awards, 1 engraved desk set, 86 certificates, and 4 other awards not identified were awarded to students for excellence in American History.

Seventy-seven schools entered the Essay Contest, "Heroines of the American Revolution," with contestants numbering 1,401. Awards presented for the Essay Contest included 62 bronze and 18 sterling silver History medals, 99 Certificates of Award, 671 "Certificates of Appreciation", 7 books on American History, \$40.00 in cash prizes, 7 letters of appreciation to participating classes, and 1 letter of appreciation to school principal. All State Essay winners received a note of congratulation from the State Chairman.

Thirty-nine schools used the AHM Spot Announcements. Other school participation included 36 school assemblies, 10 school-paper articles, 85 class discussions, and Art History displays on some incident or personality of the American Revolutionary War period.

February, 1969, was proclaimed American History Month by Gov. Maddox and thirty letters were written to Congressmen in behalf of legislation permanently designating February as American History Month.

## CONSTITUTION WEEK

Constitution Week—September 17-23. Letters of instruction and questionnaires were sent to our State Regent, State Treasurer and to each of our 94 chapters. Many thanks to the 64 chapters who reported their outstanding work. The Governor of Georgia and 59 mayors proclaimed Constitution Week; 59 chapters urged the display of the Flag of the United States of America. Publicity—1948 inches of newsprint, 167 articles, 40 pictures; radio—1232 minutes, 962 spot announcements, 10 special programs; television—65 minutes, 132 spot announcements, 7 special programs. There was a total of 455 displays in public locations and 107 programs in chapters, schools, scouts and service clubs. The Georgia State report was sent to the National Vice Chairman NSDAR the first week in December.

# State Standing Committees

## AMERICAN MERCHANT MARINE LIBRARY

The American Merchant Marine Library Association not only provides every type of service rendered by land libraries, but is the only library that provides a sea-going library service exclusively to American flag ships. The Association maintains shore library facilities at its 8 U.S. port offices. At these locations not only are the standard books available, but AMMLA specializes in technical material used to assist those studying for license preparation and advancement in grades.

In the fall your chairman mailed duplicate letters to each Chapter Regent. She received only 20 reports; however, of these 20 she deeply appreciates those reporting although no work had been done by them this year. The following were reported sent to the A.M.M.L.A. at New Orleans: \$72.50 in cash through the State Treasurer; 192 Reader's Digest; 209 magazines; 610 paper backs; 141 hard backs; 1 "In Washington—the DAR Story".

Thank you for your work. This committee is most worthwhile and is appreciated very much by our seamen.

## COLLECTING AND PUBLISHING REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIERS' HISTORIES

## **MARKING AND RESTORING HISTORIC SITES**

Two chapters, Roanoke Chapter of Richland and Lachlan McIntosh of Savannah have elicited the aid of your chairman in trying to replace markers that have been destroyed through vandalism. Both are important markers. The number one marked in Georgia to General James Oglethorpe has been taken from the side of the City Hall in Savannah and the Fort Peachtree Chapter after awaiting for the completion of a highway to erect a marker have found the marker is lost.

The Highway Department has presented a plan for a road-side park to be located on the entrance to Savannah on the By-Pass known as I-95. This is the place of the marker to Sgt. William Jasper of Revolutionary fame at Jasper Springs.

Work is progressing on procuring the land where the Spring Hill redoubt is located on the Railroad Yard for the proposed Revolutionary Battle Park.

Correspondence has been received, contacts made in answering questions in line with our restorations. Your chairman continually attends meetings and supports other organizations engaged in this work. Chapters have reported markers already placed. More chairmen need to be appointed.

## **MARKING REVOLUTIONAL SOLDIERS' GRAVES**

The marking of the final resting place of our Revolutionary Soldiers is an important phase of our DAR work, and its continuation should be emphasized.

In addition there are a number of cases, the confirmation of which is not complete. They will be included later.

Chapter Chairmen have reported unique programs that resulted in additional funds toward our restoration goal. Chapters visited for the

## TEXT BOOK STUDY

Mrs. R. Graham Daniell, Jr.

Mrs. Robert G. Daniell, Jr. has spoken to several chapters of the DAR as well as civic clubs, church groups, etc. about the need for awareness of contents of all text books used in Georgia schools. She has continued to suggest the installation of shelves in school libraries promoting the theme: "AMERICANISM vs. COMMUNISM" of which installations have been made during the year.

Savannah Chapter member Mrs. Rosalind K. Frame has spoken repeatedly on the need for parents to take a more active interest in the contents of text books. She has shown films and spoken to church groups, civic clubs and the Georgia Basic Educators Council on this matter as a member of Savannah's Chatham County Board of Education. She has publicly questioned the text books and recommended a special committee for evaluating text books. For this she received an commendation from the Savannah Chapter DAR.

The overriding issue of great importance which we believe must concern this committee and each member of our Society in Georgia, is the newly developed program of teaching SEX EDUCATION in public schools. This is a national program under the direction of an organization known as Sex Information and Education Council of the United States (SIECUS). It is sponsored by the National Educational Association. This appalling program was designed to do more than to teach merely the biological facts of sex and reproduction. The materials were prepared by men who have written articles in lewd magazines that condone free love and encourage a new "SEXUALITY"—all without any teaching of morality or restraints. These men

are members of groups designed to push sex programs with the objective of breaking down the morals of our young people.

For 10 years in Sweden, this type program has been sponsored resulting in the skyrocketing of prostitution and illegitimate births and venereal disease and the sharp decline in the marriage rate. This has resulted in a nation of discontents without purpose or objective in life and with a total lack of moral and spiritual values. This Text Book Study Committee must consistently remind our educators that the purpose of education is the improvement of the individual. (May we urge members to read "Blackboard Power" by the distinguished educator Dr. Gordon V. Drake, also a booklet by him "Is the School House the Place to Teach Raw Sex?" Both can be purchased at Christian Crusade, P. O. Box 977, Tulsa, Oklahoma 73102.)

# BYLAWS

## BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

### Article I

#### NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

### Article II

#### OBJECTS

The objects of the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution shall be: to promote the aims set forth in the Bylaws of the National Society; to secure the benefits of cooperation of the Chapters in the State; the preservation of the memory of its Revolutionary patriots; the study of its history; the education of its youth in patriotic ideals and in the duties of citizenship.

### Article III

#### MEMBERSHIP

All Chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, located within the State of Georgia shall be members of this organization.

### Article IV

#### OFFICERS

The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Curator. The State Regent shall appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as adviser in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure.

### Article V

#### ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected at the annual State Conference biennially.

Section 2. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two years or until their successors are elected. Their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and of the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Section 3. No member shall be eligible to a State office until she has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years.

No member shall be eligible to the same State office for two successive terms. A member having served more than one-half term in the State office shall be deemed to have served a term.

Section 4. Nominations of candidates for office shall be from the floor. The election shall be held by ballot. A majority of the votes cast by the voting members of the State Conference shall elect.

Section 5. Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become acting First Vice Regent, subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. A vacancy in any other State office between annual meetings shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. An election shall be held at the next State Conference to fill the unexpired term. Any State Officer, who is absent from the State for a continuous period of six months or longer automatically relinquishes her position as a State officer.

Section 6. No two State officers shall be members of the same Chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

Section 7. In recognition of valuable service to the organization, any State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Section 8. A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot. The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than fifteen months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

Section 9. On the election of State Regent, and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Recording Secretary General. The endorsement of a candidate for Vice President General shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent to the Recording Secretary General at least two weeks prior to Continental Congress.

## Article VI

### DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, of the State Board of Management, and of the Executive Committee. She shall attend all regular meetings of the National Board of Management. She shall appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees.

Section 2. In the absence of the State Regent from any meeting of the State Conference, or of the State Board of Management, the State First Vice Regent, or in her absence, the State Second Vice Regent, shall perform the duties of the State Regent. The State First and Second Vice Regents may be assigned to direct committees and to perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent.

Section 3. The State Chaplain shall open all meetings of the State Conference and of the State Board of Management with Scripture reading and prayer and shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require. She shall preside at the memorial service during State Conference and shall be responsible for the In Memoriam pages in the Proceedings.

Section 4. The State Recording Secretary shall record the proceedings of the State Conference and of meetings of the State Board of Management and of the Executive Committee. She shall compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and of the Proceedings Committee.

Section 5. The State Corresponding Secretary shall conduct correspondence and send notices in behalf of the State Conference, the State Regent, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as directed by them.

Section 6. The State Treasurer shall be the custodian of the funds of the State Society. She shall collect the State Conference dues and registration fees from the Chapters, and shall receive all sums contributed by the Chapters for State and National projects. All monies received by the State Treasurer shall be placed in a Bank which is a member of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. She shall disburse such sums only when authorized by the State Board of Management of the State Society. Incidental expenses shall be paid from the State Dues Fund when authorized by the State Regent in writing. The State Treasurer shall keep an account of all sums received or paid out and shall keep receipts for all payments. She shall prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference. Her books shall be audited annually by a Certified Public Accountant. She shall be ex-officio a member of the Credentials Committee.

Section 7. The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new Chapters.

Section 8. The State Registrar shall, when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, who live in towns and counties in which there are no Chapters, to prove eligibility, and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars in verifying lineage papers. She shall keep a correct list of all members in the State and shall make a report on membership to the State Conference.

Section 9. The State Historian shall be in charge of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General. She shall keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves in the State and shall prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General to Smithsonian Institution. She shall encourage the compilation and publication of County Histories and other unpublished records, especially those of the Revolutionary period.

Section 10. The State Librarian shall collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing duplicates, wherever possible, in the NSDAR Library and in the Georgia DAR Collections in the State Department of Archives and History. She shall endeavor to obtain the books on the wanted list of the Librarian General for the Georgia Section in the NSDAR Library and is authorized to solicit contributions from the Chapters for the purchase of the same. She

shall have custody and supervision of the DAR Genealogical and Historical Collections at the State Department of Archives and History.

Section 11. The State Curator shall receive and be responsible for all gifts of Revolutionary relics to the Museum of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution. She shall be the custodian of the conference properties and shall have them properly stored, insured and made ready for use of the State Conference.

## **Article VII**

### **MEETINGS**

Section 1. The Georgia State Society shall hold an annual State Conference between the first day of February and the time of the meeting of the Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week. The Executive Committee shall fix the time and place of meetings when not fixed by the Conference in session, or when for any reason it may be impracticable to meet at the time or place fixed by the Conference.

Section 2. The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credential blanks to the Chapters not less than sixty days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 3. The voting members of the State Conference shall be State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regent or alternate, and the delegates or their alternates from the Chapters of the State, that are entitled to representation at the Continental Congress. The number of representatives from each Chapter shall be determined by the rules for representation of Chapters in the Continental Congress as given in the National Bylaws.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a Chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the Chapter, except in the case of the Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. No member shall hold, at the same time, two offices carrying a vote at the annual State Conference.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any Chapter in the State of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference, by unanimous consent, the privileges of the floor may be accorded to the State Chairmen with the exception that they may not vote unless they are duly elected delegates or their alternates from their respective chapters.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen days notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Twenty-five voting members, representing not less than ten Chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

## **Article VIII**

### **STATE DUES AND CONFERENCE FEES**

Section 1. The annual dues of Chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be one dollar for each member of the Chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before February 1. Seventy cents of this amount shall be allocated to the general State Dues Fund and thirty cents shall be used to cover all State required per capita assessments. No Chapter shall be entitled to representation at the annual State Conference until the State dues are paid.

Section 2. The Finance Committee, appointed by the State Regent, shall be composed of seven members, to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two Honorary State Regents, one active Chapter Regent, and one active Chapter member. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund.

Section 3. Each Chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State dues, a Conference registration fee of \$2.00 for each voter to which the Chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Section 4. State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$2.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference fee at the time of registration.

## **Article IX**

### **EXPENSES**

Section 1. Eight hundred dollars shall be taken each year from the State Dues Fund, to be used by the State Regent in defraying her necessary traveling expenses.

Section 2. Necessary expenses of the State Regent and other officers of the State Conference for stationery and postage shall be paid by the State Treasurer from the State Dues Fund, on the presentation of itemized statements approved in writing by the State Regent.

## **Article X**

### **STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT**

Section 1. The State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, the Honorary State Regents, the Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regents of the Chapters of the State, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the fall, following the regular meeting of the National Board. It shall meet also at the time of the State Conference and whenever called by the State Regent.

Section 3. Ten members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference.

Section 5. State Chairmen of National and State Standing Committees shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privileges of the floor, but may not vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

#### **Article XI**

##### **EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE**

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute an Executive Committee. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the Executive Committee, but may not vote. The State Board of Management may authorize this committee to perform such duties of the Board between its meeting, as may from time to time seem expedient. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three members of the Committee. It shall make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

#### **Article XII**

##### **CHAPTERS**

Section 1. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April or May. The Chapter Regent shall report the names of the elected officers promptly, on triplicate blanks provided by the State Regent for this purpose, to the Organizing Secretary General, to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary.

Section 2. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent for use in compiling her report, not less than fifteen days before the opening of the annual State Conference. The official Chapter report, not to exceed five hundred words in length, for publication in the Proceedings shall be furnished the State Recording Secretary before the State Conference.

#### **Article XIII**

##### **AMENDMENTS**

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent and to the Parliamentarian. The State Regent shall send a copy to each Chapter and each voting member, at least sixty days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

#### **Article XIV**

##### **RULES OF ORDER**

Section 1. Robert's Rules of Order (Revised) shall be the governing authority in parliamentary law for the State Conference in matters not covered by the Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

## State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24. Bylaws were adopted and State Officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21). No conference was held in 1911; the time of meeting having been changed from the fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910, to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912"; amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta, "that we have Conference in the spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, p. 21).

## ACT OF INCORPORATION

See page 178-182 in 1962-1963 State Proceedings for the Act of Incorporation Document of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR.

### Awards

All chapters competing for awards must send reports to the respective chairmen by February 1, 1970.

All reports for awards are based on membership confirmed by the National Society as of February 1 of preceding year (1969).

### Bylaws

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National and State Bylaws.

### Change of Address

Notice of change of address of members shall be sent to the Organizing Secretary General, Treasurer General, State Regent and State Registrar.

### Change of Name

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to State Registrar, Treasurer General and State Regent.

### Chapter Elections

Chapter elections shall be held preferably in April or early May and names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, Administration Building, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D. C. 20006, to the State Regent, and to the State Recording Secretary. The full Christian name of chapter officers shall be given together with her husband's given name or initials, address and zip code.

### Dues

Pay to State Treasurer State Dues of \$1.00 per member preferably on or before January 1, not later than February 1. National Dues of \$3.00 per member sent to the Treasurer General, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D. C. 20006, before January 1, 1970.

### Conference Registration Fee

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State dues (on or before January 1, not later than February 1), \$2.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Rules for representation of chapters at Continental Congress:

"Chapters having less than 50 paid members on February 1, are entitled to be represented by the Regent or in her absence the Vice Regent or alternate; chapters having 50 to 199 paid members on February 1, one delegate in addition to the Regent; chapters having 200 to 299 paid members on February 1, two delegates in addition to the Regent, and for each additional 100 paid members one additional delegate. (Article XIII, Section 3-C, National Bylaws)

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$2.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, who

are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. Article VIII, Section 4, of the State Bylaws.

#### **Contributions**

All contributions by Chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

#### **Deceased Members**

Deaths shall be reported promptly to Treasurer General and State Chaplain. Complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and date of death shall be furnished State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for Conference Memorial Service and "In Memoriam" pages for State Proceedings.

#### **Georgia Hospitality Fund**

The following resolution which applies to the Georgia Hospitality Fund appears in the Proceedings for 1955:

"WHEREAS, The Georgia Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds an annual dinner in Washington each year during Continental Congress, which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society,

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Georgia Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$100.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes:

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this fund shall not be cumulative. Adopted."

#### **GENERAL NEW REGIME FUND BALANCE \$2,500.00**

The following resolution which applies to the General New Regime Fund Balance of \$2,500.00 appears in the Proceedings for 1959-1960, page 41:

"RESOLVED, That at the end of each regime all money in the General Fund above \$2,500.00 be transferred to the Savings Account. When the Supplemental Audit Report is made as of June 1 every two years before the Auditors close out the books this transaction be handled in order to show in this Audit, thus making the General Fund show the same balance of \$2,500.00 at the beginning of each new regime. ADOPTED."

#### **PROCEDURE BOOK OF INSTRUCTIONS FOR OFFICERS AND STATE CHAIRMEN**

The following resolution which applies to a Procedure Book of Instruction for Officers and State Chairmen appears in the Proceedings for 1959-1960, page 41:

"RESOLVED, That all Officers and State Chairmen keep a Procedure Book of Instructions and helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new Officer and Chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities thus providing a continuing continuity of DAR work, ADOPTED."

### **Genealogical Records**

To insure uniformity and convenience in filing, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, 8½ by 11 inches with one inch margins on left side and bottom, and one and one-half inches at top. One copy retained in Chapter Archives, and two copies shall be sent to the Chairman of Genealogical Records.

### **Information for Chapter Regents**

1. All letters received by Chapter Regents relating to the work of the Society shall be distributed to the corresponding Chapter Chairman and brought to the attention of the members at a chapter meeting.

2. Please follow Resolutions No. 11, adopted at 61st Georgia Society State Conference, as follows: "Resolved, That a closing date of February 1 be established for all reports, and all reports be given from February 1 to February 1, regardless of a change of regime or Regent." All awards will be made on this date basis.

### **Information for State Officers and State Chairmen**

State Officers and State Chairmen shall send to the State Regent and to the State Treasurer a copy of any instruction letter mailed to chapters.

### **Meadow Garden**

The deed to Meadow Garden property from the National Society, DAR, is in the possession of the State Regent and is also recorded in the Richmond County Court House, Augusta, Georgia.

### **Nominations**

The following resolution which applies to the announcement of the candidacy for State Regent appears in the Proceedings of the Twentieth State Conference, 1918:

"Resolved, that it is the judgment of the Executive Board that announcements for State Regent should not be made . . . earlier than three months prior to the meeting of the Conference and they shall be furnished to the Press for publication."

### **Proceedings**

Three copies of the Proceedings will be sent to each Chapter. One copy to be retained by Regent, one copy given to the Chapter Treasurer and one copy to the Chapter Chairman of Program. Additional copies, if available, may be secured from the State Recording Secretary at \$1.00 per copy, plus 25 cents for postage if to be mailed.

### **Reports for Proceedings**

State Officers', State Chairmen's, and Chapter Regents' reports for Proceedings shall be as concise as possible—not to exceed 500 words—typewritten (double spaced) upon one side of 3-hole unruled notebook paper, 8½ by 11 inches, and shall be sent to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary on or before February 15, the original being sent to the Secretary for the Proceedings, Chapters Competing for Honor Roll by February 1.

## Resolutions

Resolutions to be considered by the Committee shall be typed, with a heading giving subject of the resolution, signed, and sent to the Chairman of the Resolutions Committee two weeks before the date of the State Conference.

### Minutes of the Annual Meeting, March 20, 1969

Mrs. Talbott B. Chandler presented the Honorary State Regents: Mrs. Henry Allan Ironside, Mrs. Young Harris Yarbrough, Mrs. Leonard D. Wallace, Mrs. T. Earle Stribling, Mrs. Robert H. Humphrey, Mrs. John F. Thigpen, Mrs. Harold I. Tuthill, Mrs. Thomas Knox Kendrick, and Mrs. Ben I. Thornton. Mrs. Manon P. Phillips, Regent Augusta Chapter and Mrs. Henry Perkins, Past Regent of the Augusta Chapter were introduced and thanked for their work in making the Conference a success.

A door prize, contributed by Mrs. T. Earle Stribling was won by Mrs. Henry Perkins.

Mrs. Emory P. Cary, Chaplain, conducted a Memorial Service for two members: Mrs. Charles C. Bush, and Mrs. J. Lawrence McCord.

Telephone calls, telegrams, and letters had been received from members who were unable to attend. The Corresponding Secretary

was instructed to send letters of regret to Mrs. Julius Y. Talmadge, Mrs. Max Land, Mrs. Ober D. Warthen, Mrs. Arthur Mallory, and Mrs. William C. Robinson. The Corresponding Secretary was also requested to send a telegram to Mrs. Erwin Frees Seimes, President General, expressing sympathy in the loss of her husband.

Resignation was reported of Mrs. Frank Campbell who now resides in Texas.

Four new members were introduced: Mrs. Louis Joseph Bahin, Mrs. Jonathan Fox, Mrs. Sam J. Henderson, and Mrs. John H. Terry. The reinstatement of Mrs. George W. Nelson was reported.

As Mrs. Herman M. Richardson, Honorary State Regent and candidate for the office of Vice President General had now joined the group, she was introduced by Mrs. Talbott Chandler.

For the record, Mrs. Thomas Knox Kendrick, Historian, read from the Proceedings of the Thirty-third State Conference, held in March 1931, the history of the organization of the Officers' Club as follows:

"On Tuesday, March 25, 1930, at Newnan, Georgia, there met for the luncheon hour at the hotel, Virginia House, a number of Officers, past and present, of the Georgia Daughters of the American Revolution, whose purpose was the organization of a State Officers' Club. The idea was originated and fostered by the State Regent, Mrs. Herbert Fay Gaffney.

"Mrs. Gaffney was elected temporary chairman, and Mrs. A. L. Wilkins served as secretary. An informal discussion was held as to the personnel, policies and dues of the proposed organization, and a personal expression from every member present was obtained, all being heartily in favor of the new organization.

"Mrs. Wilkins took the chair while Mrs. Gaffney, in a beautiful tribute nominated Mrs. Julius Talmadge, past Vice President General, and Hon. State Regent, for President. Mrs. Talmadge was unanimously elected the first President of the State Officers' Club . . . . .

"Upon motion by Mrs. Pope, telegrams were sent to Mrs. Julius Talmadge and Mrs. Howard McCall, who were absent because of bereavement, informing them of their election.

"And so the State Officers' Club of Georgia DAR came into being."

A Nominating Committee was elected as follows: Mrs. T. Earle Stribling, Miss Martha Cooper, Mrs. Frank F. Faulk, Mrs. William C. Robinson, and Mrs. J. Carleton Vaughn.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.
