

MRS. HENRY ALLAN IRONSIDE Honorary Vice President General National Society Daughters of the American Revolution 1962






MRS. HERMAN M. RICHARDSON Vice President General National Society Daughters of the American Revolution 1969-1972

Waite, Jr., DAR Schools, who recognized Mrs. Leonard D. Wallace, Trustee, Tamassee DAR School, Mrs. Robert H. Humphrey, Trustee, Kate Duncan Smith DAR School, and Mrs. Henry Allan Ironside, who for many years has given dedicated service to the schools, and gives annually the Hightower Awards to chapters for their work for DAR Schools; State Chaplain, Mrs. Hubert R. Martin. Mrs. Reid expressed regret at the absence of the Past Chaplain General, Mrs. T. Earle Stribling. Reports continued with that of the State Recording Secretary, Mrs. Louis Joseph Bahin, who announced necessary corrections and additions to the Proceedings, and offered extra copies for sale. The State Regent expressed gratitude to the Proceedings Committee and to the Recording Secretary for the new book. Feild, who presented the National Vice Chairman, Mrs. Louis Joseph Bahin; U.S.A. Bicentennial, Mrs. Robert H. Humphrey, member of the national committee.

Mrs. Thomas Knox Kendrick was recognized to pose a question concerning the rescinding of a resolution because of possible conflict of two of the recommendations. Mrs. Reid requested the Resolutions Committee to consult the parliamentarian upon this point and to report their findings at the luncheon.

Since the time had arrived for luncheon the meeting was recessed, after necessary announcements by the State Regent.

WHEREAS, This is largely due to total lack of knowledge and understanding of drugs, their distribution, their inherent dangers and the abnormal and violent consequences which result.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, promote widespread education of the dangers of drug abuse, to all age groups.

#### POLLUTION

WHEREAS, The threat of the environment has reached such alarming proportions that the battle against pollution is now one of survival, and

WHEREAS, The President of the United States has characterized the fight as a "now-or-never" one, for the question is no longer one of comfort or esthetics but of life or death, and

WHEREAS, There must be an understanding of the environment and man's use of its resources, and

WHEREAS, Each locality must be alert to its particular dangers, and instigate local wars against projects that would endanger the community,

RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, endorse the action taken by the government to avert national disaster, and also lend support to the programs of environmental study being planned by educational groups for youths and adult citizens.

# IN SUPPORT OF THE MAJORITY OF STUDENTS

WHEREAS, There are many alert and responsible young people who realize that to prepare themselves for the future they must further their education, strengthen their religious beliefs, keep their bodies strong and healthy:

WHEREAS, It is unfair to these citizens to give the minority who instigate, encourage, and support riots and the senseless destruction of property and lives wide publicity,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, commend these institutions which engage in the pursuit and diffusion of learning and the upholding of the law of the land in order to prevent the subversion of our youth.

#### OKEFENOKEE WILDERNESS

WHEREAS, Georgia is fortunate to possess one of the unique wilderness areas of the United States in the great Okefenokee Swamp, "Land of the Trembling Earth," and the home of alligator, bear, deer, beautiful waterfowl and wading birds, and unusual wildlife of an amazing variety, and

WHEREAS, this geologic, biologic, historic, and scenic phenomenon should be preserved in its natural state for the enjoyment of future generations, as well as for a permanent home of many endangered species of wildlife, and

WHEREAS, U.S. Congressman W. S. Stuckey has introduced H.R. 4853 to provide for the protection of the Okefenokee Swamp under the provisions of the National Wilderness Act of 1964, and

WHEREAS, this bill has remained inactive in the House Interior Committee, because of provisions objectionable to the U.S. Interior Department,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, that Congressman Stuckey and the Interior Department be urged to reconcile speedily their differences in a bill which will give the Okefenokee legal protection from defilement from highway construc-

tion, mining, pollution, or other outrages now legally and engineeringly possible.

Be it further resolved that U.S. Senators Richard B. Russell and Herman Talmadge be urged to introduce such legislation immediately in the U.S. Senate and press diligently for its prompt enactment by that body.

#### CUMBERLAND ISLAND

WHEREAS, Cumberland Island on the Georgia coast is one of the largest and most beautiful undeveloped areas of its type remaining on the Atlantic seaboard, with long white beaches, mysterious Spanish moss-draped live oak forests, and sprawling green marshes that produce much of the life in the adjacent sea, and

WHEREAS, Cumberland Island is rich in the early history of our country, including the Revolutionary War period, and one of the early owners of portions of the Island was General Nathanael Greene, Commander of the Southern Department of the Revolutionary Army, and Cumberland was the resting place in death of General Lighthorse Harry Lee, father of General Robert E. Lee, who is well remembered for his services to his country and to General George Washington, and

WHEREAS, U.S. Congressman W. S. Stuckey has introduced H.R. 15686 in Congress to create a Cumberland Island National Seashore for the purpose of providing recreation for the general public while preserving the natural, scenic, recreational, and historical values of Cumberland Island for the benefit of both present and future generations,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, does hereby declare its support for the creation of the proposed Cumberland Island National Seashore, and does hereby commend Congressman W. S. Stuckey for his efforts on its behalf.

Be it further resolved, that U.S. Senators Richard B. Russell and Herman Talmadge be urged to introduce companion measures in the U.S. Senate immediately, and press for their prompt enactment by that body.

#### CHATTOOGA NATIONAL WILD RIVER

WHEREAS, The Chattooga River has been the historical northern boundary between Georgia and South Carolina since the creation of the two states, and

WHEREAS, the Chattooga is one of the most beautiful, longest, and largest free-flowing undeveloped rivers in the Southeastern United States, easily accessible from large population centers of the Eastern United States, and

WHEREAS, visitors to this river are instantly transported into an unspoiled natural whitewater river wilderness, beginning as a sparkling mountain stream cascading down green, heavily forested mountain ridges, over scenic waterfalls and continuous rapids, following a narrow tortuous route through deep gorges, and around islands before reaching Tugaloo Lake and forming the Savannah River, and

WHEREAS, a task force of the U.S. Forest Service, the U.S. Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, and representatives of Georgia, South Carolina, and North Carolina recently completed a detailed study recommending legal protection and classification of the Chattooga as a National Wild River, and

WHEREAS, such action would insure the future preservation of this magnificent river in its natural condition for the enjoyment of future generations.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, does hereby endorse the proposal to declare and designate the

Chattooga River as a National Wild and Scenic River of the United States.

# GEORGIA DELEGATION MEETING SEVENTY-NINTH CONTINENTAL CONGRESS

# WASHINGTON - APRIL 20, 1970

### STATE ORGANIZING SECRETARY Mrs. Maurice A. Cameron

As your Organizing Secretary, I am delighted to announce that GEORGIA was the National winner for the award offered by your Organizing Secretary General, Mrs. Wilson King Barnes, for organizing the largest number of chapters last year.

At the 4 District meetings last June, I asked if there were anyone present who knew of a location for a new chapter, and one member at the Cordele district meeting gave me the name of a person in Hazelhurst, who was interested in having a chapter organized there, and I immediately went to work, however I was unable to find a person who would agree to serve as organizing chapter regent, but they did advise me to visit a person near Alma, who was very anxious to help organize a chapter there, so, Madam Regent, I shall be happy to assist the new State Organizing Secretary in any way I can to get this new chapter organized, and I have all the material that was mailed to me from Washington, which I would like to turn over to her at her convenience.

At the District meeting in Toccoa I also had the name of a former DAR member of the Kettle Creek chapter at Washington, given to me, and was told they were interested in the re-organization of that chapter, I had correspondence with this person, but she did not seem interested at that time.

Madam Regent, It has been a real pleasure serving under your very able leadership.

#### STATE HISTORIAN Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox

43 chapters reported their historical work for this year. 29 chapters contributed \$136.00 to the Americana Fund; 113 separate pages were given to the Repository of Americana and one 244-page book was accepted. A great deal of interest was shown in historically oriented programs this year with 85 programs given by adults, 121 given for or by school children. 40 famous men, 99 famous events and only 9 famous women were the subjects of these programs. Our publicity was good with 663 radio programs and 59 TV programs devoted to the DAR and history. 50 adult historical tours were made and 21 by school children. Of the graves marked this year, 2 soldiers' graves were marked with 6 in the process. Also in the process of being marked are 2 wives of patriots and 6 daughters of patriots. 4 members' ancestors' graves were marked and 25 graves of deceased DAR members. 2 patriots' graves marked in previous years were reported this year and 12 previously unlocated graves were located and reported in 1969. 6 historic markers were placed this year and 1 more is in the process. I believe every chap-

ter in the state observed American History month, the 43 reporting chapters were 100% in this, giving throughout the state, 111 medals, 421 certificates and 236 other awards in recognition of excellence in American History; these other awards included money, books, booklets, maps, The DAR Story, and certificates of appreciation. Reported were county histories worked upon and cooperation with other groups in observance of special days. The grave of our own first State Regent has been located with the help of Mrs. Wimberly and the Edmund Burke chapter. The marking of Mrs. Salas' grave is a project which we hope will be done by the Georgia Society. Thank you all for all your help and cooperation in doing the work of the Society in this one small field.

#### STATE LIBRARIAN Mrs. John H. Terry

Of the 95 Georgia Chapters, 81 have Chapter Librarians, and 45 sent in reports. Chapters and the State Society spent a total of \$2179.93 on National, State and Local library work.

Eleven books, one manuscript and three pamphlets were sent to the National Society DAR Library: "Historical Notes on Jackson County, Georgia" by Elray Elrod, 1967, "Historical Collections of the Joseph Habersham Chapter, DAR", Mrs. Wm. L. Peel, Ed. 3 vols., 1967 (reprint), "Proceedings of the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the DAR Seventy-first Annual State Conference 1969", all from the Georgia State Society; "The Lane Family", Mrs. Jim Patterson, 1968, pamphlet and "The Lane Family" by Mrs. E. W. Lane, 1968 pamphlet from Bonaventure Chapter; "The John Walker Family of Washington County, Georgia 1777-1966" by Charles O. Walker, 1966 from Miss Annie L. Johnson through Gov. E. Mosley, Jr., March 1969 from Vidalia Chapter.

The first four volumes listed above were the ones requested by the Librarian General and were bought at the cost of \$50.00 from the State Library Fund. The cost of only two of the other seven books was reported, this was \$15.00. Georgia Chapters contributed \$117.00 to the NSDAR Library Rebinding Fund this year. Total for NSDAR Library work was \$182.00.

Thirteen books, one manuscript, and 3 reels of microfilm were added to our Georgia Society Collection at the Georgia Department of Archives and History: "Proceedings of the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the DAR Seventy-first annual State Conference 1969"; 3 microfilm reels—"1852 Census of California" (originally from Mrs. Donald Spicer, Historian General NSDAR, first volume (paperback) "Collection in Polk County Historical Commission, Bartow, Florida"; "Florida State Society DAR History and Roster for 1958-68",

"Roster of the Arkansas Society DAR 1909-1959 with Register of Ancestors", "Roster Supplement (paperback) of Oklahoma State Society DAR 1964", all from the Georgia State Society; "The Early History of Upson County, Georgia" by Nottingham and Hannah, and "Chronicles—The Old Guard of the Gate City Guard—Atlanta, Georgia" by Henry Clay Freeman from Atlanta Chapter; "History of Jeffersonville Baptist Church, Jeffersonville, Georgia 1849-1966" by Kathleen J. Carswell 1966, given by Major General John Twiggs Chapter in honor of Mrs. Carswell; "The First Supplement to the DAR Patriot Index" NSDAR 1969 from Peter Early Chapter; "Family, Church and Cemeteries Records of Georgia" by Lawrence M. Edwards 1969, and "Bible Records of Hugh Lide Charles and Carolina Augusta (Bacot) Charles" manuscript from Savannah Chapter; "Royal Blue Book-Leaders of the English Speaking World" and "The Society of Friends of St. George's Chapel and The Descendants of the Knights of the Garter" vol. 9 Annual Report 1967-1968 from Baron DeKalb Chapter; and "Camp-Kemp Family History" vol. 1 by Col. Robert Neville Mann and Catherine Cleek Mann 1967 through Xavier Chapter. The reported cost of 5 of these books was \$113.50.

Our State Society has given \$270.00 to the State Archives this year for purchase of volumes of "The New England Genealogical and Biographical Register" and "The Virginia Magazine of History and Biography". Georgia Chapters contributed \$176.00 to the State Library Fund this year. Your continued interest and cooperation will make completion of this project possible. As of this date no money has been spent this year on maintenance of our DAR Collection at the State Archives.

Georgia Chapters reported placing 90 books and 3 manuscripts of Historical and Genealogical value, and 4 subscriptions to Genealogical Quarterlies in 14 local Libraries and 5 Historical Societies (two of these were out of State) at a cost of \$1,029.58. \$422.85 was spent on local library improvements; for file cases; binding DAR Magazines, lineage books, and proceedings; and in cash contributions. Total spent on local library work was \$1,452.43.

Seven Chapters reported working on indexing genealogical material, one reported indexing a county history and one reported having members indexing old Savannah newspapers for deaths and marriages, and another member indexing the Immigration Records in the Georgia Historical Society.

It has been a privilege and a pleasure serving as your State Librarian. I commend you for the splendid library work you have done this year, for your work has made the above report possible.

#### STATE CURATOR Mrs. Yates W. Little

The report of the State Curator for 1969-70 shows some changes in the State's properties. There are now in the custody of the curator one large, silk 50 star United States flag, one large silk Georgia flag, one silk DAR flag, four aluminum flag poles of two parts each, one light weight wooden pole of two parts, four brass finials, one eagle finial, three brass standards, one aluminum standard, three gold cords; one electrically lighted DAR insignia; one time clock, one bell; one large white pottery urn; badges for state conference, pages ribbons and place cards.

In pursuance with a resolution passed at the State Conference in 1969, the following disposition of the other state properties has been made.

One forty-eight star silk flag, a wooden flag pole and standard was presented to Savannah High School as a nucleus for a proposed collection of flags. A second flag of the same type with pole and standard was presented to Benedictine School for the same purpose.

Two forty-eight star flags and one DAR flag were destroyed by the Flag Chairman of American Legion Post number 135.

Two green pottery flower containers were presented to the Chatham Nursing Home and one to Memorial Nursing Home.

It has been a very real personal pleasure and privilege to serve the state society and our capable, charming Regent during this administration.

# Committee Reports National Committees

#### AMERICAN HERITAGE Mrs. Henry W. Lively

It has been a privilege and pleasure to serve as your State American Heritage Chairman. I wish to thank the Chapters participating in this most important work.

Public interest in DAR aroused by American Heritage activities is most encouraging. Preservation of our noble heritage in the fields of art, crafts, drama, literature and music has been the means of presenting the aims of the National Society. As we have enthusiastically participated in heritage events whole communities have been inspired to a greater appreciation of our country's glorious past. Through enjoyable programs covered by some category of this committee, several chapters have reported an increase in membership. This is such a broad facet of our Society's work surely each chapter did some work in the field of American Heritage, although only 43 reports were received.

#### AMERICAN INDIANS

#### Mrs. Arthur J. Waterman

The State Chairman would like to express her appreciation to the Chapters for making it possible for the Georgia State Society to exceed the report of 1969. Also, the State Chairman would like to thank the National Vice Chairman, Mrs. Harold Brewer, for her help.

The State Chairman had the pleasure of speaking to several Chapters. She also attended State Conference and all of the District Meetings.

55 Chapters submitted reports with 30 Chapters reporting Indian

programs. Many other Chapters reported gifts to the American Indians. Georgia State Society sent a total of \$822.00 to the American Indians. Committee. To Bacone \$429.00: \$222.50 for the National Project; \$112.50 for nursing scholarships; \$92.00 for the general fund; and, \$2.00 for books. To St. Mary's \$378.00: \$17.50 for scholarships; \$231.50 for the National Project; \$68.00 for other donations, and \$61.00 to the general fund. To St. Labre School was sent \$15.00.

140 pounds of clothing valued at \$300.00 was sent to Bacone. 450 pounds of clothing valued at \$700.00 was sent to St. Mary's.

Many chapters had Indian speakers. Included were the Curator of the Indian Section of the Columbus Museum who spoke on the Yuche Indians and the restoration of Westfield. Dr. Henry T. Malone author of "The Cherokees of the Old South" spoke to one Chapter. An archaeologist from Ocmulgee National Park showed slides depicting the life of the early American Indians. A television performer spoke on reservation activities. A member of the Georgia Historical Commission gave facts about Indians and showed slides of New Echota, Georgia.

An Indian princess and the widow of an Indian Chief were two of the many American Indian guests at Chapter meetings.

Numerous members and several regents appeared on television. Newspapers and television were very generous in their publicity concerning the American Indians.

One Chapter had an American Indians Quiz program that stressed the Georgia Indians. Location of tribes were discussed with artifacts being displayed. A collection of pictures of Indian Chiefs were placed behind the artifacts. Histories, Chief's names, tribal names, and the States of the tribes were placed by the pictures. A poem about a Georgia tribe was read. A review of Oglethorpe's treaty with the Creek Indians was given. One Chapter had a program on the Indian potential and need for development.

A reprint of "Cherokee Families and their History" by Emmet Starr was presented to a county library. Commemorative stamps were sent to Bacone. A sequoia tree was planted in honor of the Great Sequoyah.

One Chapter is assisting in the restoration of the home of an Indian trader. Work in an Indian museum; workshops for the American Indian Committee; displays; distribution of Indian literature; presentation of Indian music and Indian art; displays of Indian artifacts; special collections for the American Indians; and, discussions about St. Mary's and Bacone were some of the things done by the Chapters. Jewelry and clothing were sent to the schools.

### AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP Mrs. William E. Abernethy

52 chapters reported, 34 had Americanism programs and 46 repeated the American's Creed at every meeting. Three chapters had programs on the Immigration Act, 8 sponsored essay or poster contests and 184 school awards were presented. 23 hours and 49 minutes of radio time, 13 hours and 10 minutes of television and 1755 inches of publicity were reported. Americanism Medals were presented 7 naturalized citizens. 206 books and magazines were placed in libraries and schools to promote Americanism. 96 members worked on Americanism programs and 533 hours were given by members serving on boards or committees to reduce illiteracy. 308 DAR Manuals were placed in schools, libraries, with scouts, hospitals and doctor's offices. One tea and one party were given honoring new citizens.

The Brunswick Chapter, with Mrs. A. H. Reu, Americanism Chairman honored a naturalized citizen, Mr. Arthur Leotis, who has been naturalized for 38 years and had become an outstanding citizen of the community, leading when any help on patriotism was needed and helping many of his Greek countrymen to become good citizens of the U. S. This was done in conjunction with Federal District Judge Scarlett's Naturalization Court—with speeches, pictures and presentation of Americanism medal in the presence of new citizens. Afterwards they all shared in a celebration party, where refreshments were served and where the new citizens had the opportunity of talking with this man and being inspired by his example.

#### CONSERVATION Mrs. Ralph A. Lovelace

Letters and questionnaire sent to all chapters. Reports showed many varied, interesting and informative programs with speakers and slides presented and the activities showed a deeper understanding covering a broader scope of conservation, more concern for the need of air and water pollution control, a greater interest in conserving our natural resources, in protecting wild life, in restoring historic spots and in beautifying the world about us. Members are serving in County and State work such as a City Beautification Program, the Revolutionary Battle Park in Savannah, attending seminars, meeting with city officials,

civic clubs and youth groups, distributing literature at the meetings, schools, libraries and DAR meetings. Plantings include thousands of pine trees, many dogwoods, various shrubs, bulbs, roses and many others. Special projects include plantings at hospitals, nursing homes, schools, banks, fire stations, church grounds, city parks, making a park in a neglected area, libraries, restoring and landscaping old cemeteries, roadsides, camp sites and chapter houses. Youth work includes giving programs for Scout troops, Boy's Clubs, J.A.C.'s, C.A.R., 4-H Clubs. Many pounds of bird seed used and bird feeding stations built. Money contributed to National Project was \$92.40 and to local projects \$365.00.

#### D A R GOOD CITIZENS Mrs. H. Prentiss Derry

In October a mailing was sent to all Chapter Regents and the four District Vice Chairmen with a letter of instruction for the selection of the good citizen, a sample questionnaire and a report blank.

Reports were received from 76 chapters sponsoring a total of 190 Good Citizens. Each of the girls received a pin and a certificate.

My deep appreciation to the four Vice-Chairmen. They have facilitated the work of this committee for the past two years. The District Vice-Chairmen were: Southeastern, Mrs. John G. Hagen; Southwestern, Mrs. George W. Nelson; Northeastern, Mrs. Thomas J. Moran; Northwestern, Mrs. Harold J. Brewer.

### DAR SERVICE FOR VETERAN-PATIENTS Mrs. John F. Thigpen

38 chapters submitted reports, a gain of 27 over last year. Perhaps the increase was occasioned by the visit of our President General to our Fall Board Meeting when she obligingly explained how this new "special" committee came into being. One enthusiastic VAVS worker proudly stated that she had served 94 hours in the detail clinic of a VA Hospital and "was glad I could try to be cheerful to some of the young men who have given so much to our country."

One chapter reported the "adoption" of three women patients in the Nursing Home of the VA Hospital at Dublin. Three of their members traveled 130 miles to see these patients, who are confined to wheelchairs, and took with them cookies, magazines and gifts. They now have a real friendship with these women patients and plan for this to be a permanent project. The husband of one member occasionally travels in that area and delivers their gifts himself.

One chapter reported that four members had attended the Breakfast for Veteran-Patients at Continental Congress last April. 25 of their members participated in giving 133 hours of service, alternating

in groups of three or four. This service consisted in serving lunch and presenting a program one day a week for five months, value \$130.00.

Other chapters reported donations for Canteen Books totaling \$126.00; Gifts to Patients \$110.00; Gifts to Hospitals \$90.00; and total VAVS Hours 322 with 38 members participating.

In Public Relations there were two news stories, 16 inches, one picture and one radio quiz.

#### GENEALOGICAL RECORDS Mrs. J. C. Strother

Fifty-five chapters have sent in reports with chapters having a Chairman of Genealogical Records. Fifty chapters reported a total of 12,091 pages of source material; 2,465 pages were sent in for the National Society; 2,356 pages of material was sent to the Georgia State Archives. A total of 7,222 was placed in other libraries. Nineteen chapters contributed \$87.00 to the Microfilm Fund.

## INSIGNIA Mrs. Alvin G. Turley

It has been the aim of this chairman to encourage all DAR members to own and wear the beautiful DAR insignia of the National Society and to acquaint them with the correct use of the insignia in the work of the Society. This has been stressed at the chapter, district, State Board meetings and at State Conference by the State Chairman. Many excellent reports were received.

### JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS Mrs. P. I. Dixon

Fourteen Chapters sponsored Junior American Citizens clubs having a total of 67,641 members and 2,021 Clubs. This was an increase of 6,395 members and 1,077 Clubs. Some Chapters sponsored the J.A.C. Program for the first time. All members were presented J.A.C. buttons, pins and citations. Georgia Chapters contributed \$34.50 to the National J.A.C. Contest Prize money. There were approximately 130 Contest entries throughout the state. At the Continental Congress Georgia received First place for the largest number of Clubs, Second Place for the largest number of members of First place for Outstanding J.A.C. work.

Baron DeKalb, with 51,993 members, leads the State in number of members. This is an increase of 4,402 members. This Chapter had an increase of 58 new Clubs. The excellent work of their Chairman makes their report outstanding. The Chairman contacted all school officials and gave help when requested. She personally presented awards and helped with school programs when asked. Her report shows that each category of the program was carried out.

The Atlanta Chapter with 11,007 members was second in the State. The Chairman continued her great work in the Boys' Clubs of Atlanta. They had an increase of 1,768 members and 59 new clubs. Her Christmas

program was most interesting and well done. She contacted the officials of the Boys' Club and worked with them on all Americanism Programs.

Thronateeska Chapter with 4,100 members made a remarkable record. Three new Clubs were organized. Their Chairman works with the schools and co-operates with their program wherever possible. She distributed manuals and presented each member with a J.A.C. pin.

## JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP Mrs. Leo L. Phillips, Jr.

The Georgia Daughters actively worked on Junior goals throughout this year. The 42 chapters reporting represent a 30 percent increase in this number. 51 Juniors were reported to hold offices or chairmanships on the State and local level.

Georgia's contribution to the Helen Pouch Memorial Scholarship Fund and the Junior Membership General Fund totaled \$1,810.88 representing an increase of over 400 percent. The total number of new Juniors has not been reported by the National Society.

Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox, State Historian, was selected by Julius Y. Bishop, Mayor of Athens, Miss Louise McBee, Dean of Student Affairs at the University of Georgia and C. M. Jordan, President of the First National Bank of Vidalia, as the State Outstanding Junior.

My thanks to all of you for your devoted and active participation in meeting Junior goals. It has been through your efforts that Georgia has made so many accomplishments during this report year.

## LINEAGE RESEARCH Mrs. Horace L. McSwain

In October letters were sent to all Chapter Regents and Lineage Research Chairmen. The letter included an announcement of the Genealogical Workshop held at the Washington Library in Macon on October 28, 1969. A number of interested persons attended.

Report blanks were mailed in early January to the Chairmen. Unfortunately all have not been returned to date. There are sixty-two Lineage Research Committee Chairmen or Regents acting as Chairmen.

Five requests for assistance were received from Chapters in the State and sixteen requests came from State Chairmen in other States. One request was sent to the National Lineage Research Committee and two requests were sent to Chairmen of other States. One request was sent to a Chapter Chairman in the State.

A total of two hundred forty-four prospective members were assisted and one hundred twenty-seven new members were acquired with the assistance of the Lineage Research Committees.

We would like to express our thanks to each of the persons that are spending so much time and effort to assist in Lineage Research. Also we are pleased with the many splendid suggestions offered to improve the work of this Committee. Some of the suggestions will be passed on to the succeeding State Lineage Research Chairman.

## MEMBERSHIP Mrs. Carlyle M. Ward

Membership February 1, 1969 was 6712. On February 1, 1970 it was 6777. Gains were 324 new members, 29 reinstatements, and transfers 32. Losses were 120 deceased, 100 resignations, 61 dropped and 26 transfers. Total gain was 351, total loss 307, leaving a net gain of 65 members. There are 68 members-at-large.

14 C.A.R. members were accepted into DAR. There are 95 chapters in the State. Of these 86 chapters reported. Georgia has a printed roster of Revolutionary Soldiers buried in the State. There is not a formally organized State Membership Commission. New National Membership Outline Guides were distributed throughout the State, and the National Membership Commission's page in the DAR Magazine is of great assistance to the members and chapters.

#### MOTION PICTURE Miss Leila Summerall

One release was sent to each Chapter giving information about the work for motion pictures. One questionnaire was sent. Of the 95 DAR Chapters, 25 answered the questionnaire. 11 of those answering have chairmen; 14 of those answering do not have chairmen. Some of the Chapters have shown quite an interest in the subject and are trying to help improve the type of motion pictures shown in the theaters.

### NATIONAL DEFENSE Miss Martha A. Cooper

National Defense reports were received from 75 of the 95 chapters in the State. Of this number 53 reported at least one entire meeting assigned to a National Defense topic. The topics varied but Student Riots on Campus was the most popular. The same 53 chapters reported that 5 minutes were devoted at each meeting to discussion of the National Defense mailings. Of the 53, 25 chapters showed that 10 minutes or more were used for the discussion.

The 1969 Resolutions were studied and discussed by 35 chapters. The National Defense material was available at 33 chapter meetings. This material was passed on to 28 school and college libraries, to 27 public libraries and 36 chapters reported passing the material to interested individuals.

In the State 118 Good Citizenship medals were presented and all except 5 were presented at school assemblies. Only 7 chapters participated in the ROTC project with 4 bronze medals and 2 gold being presented.

For DOLLARS FOR DEFENSE \$294.00 were contributed by 50 chapters. Efforts to increase subscriptions to the National Defense mailings were made by 15 chapters. Georgia Daughters reported that 205 letters were written to Congressmen.

At the National Defense night of 1969 Continental Congress Georgia was recognized from the platform as having more Congressmen in attendance than any other State.

My special thanks go to the National Defense chairmen and Chapter Regents who made this report possible. Also the attendance of Georgia Congressmen at the National meeting is the result of the work of the four vice chairmen of this State Committee and interested Georgia Daughters.

There were 48 reports received from the 95 Georgia chapters. Year-books and/or supplements numbered 31.

The majority of the programs followed the National Outline, and reflected the requirements for National Honor Roll to good advantage. The Georgia State Society can be very proud of the high quality of work shown in the programs and outlines of all the chapters.

## PUBLIC RELATIONS Mrs. Carl Evan Frisby

The following report, covering activities of 81 chapters, reflects the endeavor of these chapters to develop and carry out the ideas and programs concerning our DAR objectives. There was approximately 21,661½ inches of newsprint publicity which was comprised of 1,774 articles. This also included some 345 photographs which represent approximately 2,148½ inches. These 1,774 articles were placed in 5 DAR magazines, 53 daily papers, 27 weekly papers, 1 bi-monthly, 17 school papers, 9 shopping center news sheets, and 6 church bulletins. Seventy-five copies of "In Washington, the DAR Story" were given.

Baron DeKalb Chapter had the Best Report; photos, newsarticles all cataloged, as well as radio programs. One chapter sent a Feature Story contest entry. The most inches of publicity per chapter were reported as follows: George Walton—2,071 inches, Button Gwinnett—2,006½ inches, Atlanta—1,250 inches, Oglethorpe—1,246½ inches, Brier Creek—685 inches, Vidalia—590 inches.

#### STUDENT LOAN AND SCHOLARSHIP Mrs. Wallace L. Harris

William Anthony Murray, Toccoa, sponsored by the Toccoa Chapter will represent Georgia in the National American History Scholarship Competition.

The State Treasurer reports seventy-six Chapters contributed \$257.06 to the National American History Scholarship Fund.

## THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA Mrs. Matthew W. Kantala, Sr.

Sixty-five chapters reported their work for this committee. Ninety-five large flags were presented to Boy and Girl Scouts, J.A.C., schools, libraries, C.A.R., Y.W.C.A., club house, 4-H club, civic center, Court House, church, avenue of flags and Boy's club, Ninety-one jeweled flag pins were sold.

Twenty-three chapters studied the flag code and 1573 flag codes were distributed; 44 corrections of incorrect use of the flag were reported, 17 corrections made in improper disposition of unusable flags were made, 107 short talks on the flag were given, 30 talks at other organizations, 48 chapters had entire programs on the flag, newspaper items and pictures were 126, 10 television and 35 radio broadcasts.

All chapters reporting gave the Pledge of Allegiance at the meetings, 64 sang the National Anthem and 22 chapters gave the Pledge to the Georgia Flag, 54 chapters urged members to display flags and 50 chapters to display the flag on national holidays, 38 chapters asked neighbors to buy and display flags, 49 chapters participated in community activities where the flag played an important part.

## Special National Committees

### AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH Mrs. John Inman Bell, Jr.

Committee letters in reference to the activities for observing February as American History Month were sent to all chapters. Of the 56 chapters reporting, several included detailed information on their varied and interesting work. Newspaper articles were printed featuring: the first doctor of Atlanta with pictures; Baron de Kalb, for whom De-Kalb County is named; pictures and articles including essays of State and National winners of the 1969 American History Month Essay Contest; and several articles with pictures of large celebration in commemoration of Georgia Day with members and students in costume. There also appeared a picture of the booth sponsored by Junior members during this celebration. There were 170 newspaper or magazine articles and 56 pictures published with a total of 2,023 inches of American History Month publicity. Eighty-two sets of Spot Announcements were used on radio; 14 sets on TV. In behalf of this committee, 21 members appeared on radio with total radio time of 1,725 minutes; 20 members on TV with total time of 333 minutes.

Forty-eight chapters had programs on American History; 26 chapters sponsored AHM displays at libraries, schools, and department stores; 56 AHM posters were displayed in banks, post offices, and schools; and 420 AHM stickers were used; 126 medals, 83 certificates, 2 Georgia Historical maps, and a \$10.00 scholarship were awarded to

students for excellence in American History.

Ninety-one schools entered the Essay Contest, "The Declaration of Independence and Its Signers," with contestants numbering 1,635. Awards presented for the Essay Contest included 73 bronze and 16 sterling silver History medals, 90 Certificates of Award, 447 "Certificates of Appreciation," 4 books on American History, 12 cash awards, 2 ribbons, and 2 framed copies of the Declaration of Independence. First place State winners will receive a book on American History from the Georgia State Society, and all winners will receive a note of congratulations from the State Chairman.

Seventy-three schools used the AHM Spot Announcements. Other school participation included 41 school assemblies, 21 school-paper articles, 132 class discussions, displays on school and school library bul-

letin boards, and a 10 minute radio panel of students.

February, 1970, was proclaimed American History Month by Gov. Maddox and sixty letters were written to Congressmen in behalf of legislation permanently designating February as American History Month.

### CONSTITUTION WEEK Mrs. William M. Feild

Constitution Week—September 17-23. Letters of instruction and questionnaires were sent to our State Regent, State Treasurer and to each of our 95 chapters. Many thanks to the 64 chapters who reported their outstanding work. The Governor of Georgia and 56 mayors proclaimed Constitution Week; 55 Chapters urged the display of the Flag of the United States of America. Publicity—2219 inches of newsprint, 154 articles, 30 pictures; radio—1510 minutes, 1539 spot announcements, 44 programs; television—180 minutes, 160 spot announcements, 10 programs. There was a total of 323 displays in public locations and 48 programs in chapters, 67 in schools, 10 in scouts, 53 in service clubs and 67 ministers helped. The Georgia State report was sent to the National Vice Chairman NSDAR the first of December.

## AMERICAN MERCHANT MARINE LIBRARY Mrs. J. L. R. Boyd

In the fall, duplicate letters pertaining to the work of this committee to each chapter regent by your chairman. \$124, a large increase over last year, was sent to the American Merchant Marine Library through the State Treasurer from 34 chapters. A total of 571 books, 198 magazines, with postage cost amounting to \$22.13, was reported to the State Chairman.

A total of three hundred fifty-three (353) histories was received.

## CONFERENCE CREDENTIALS Miss Louise M. Philips

It has been a privilege and pleasure to work under the leadership of our understanding and appreciative State Regent, Mrs. R. Hugh Reid. I have enjoyed, also, the friendship and acquaintance of other members of the State Society.

Some Chapter Regents failed to have the correct number of delegates and alternates elected to represent Chapters at State Conference; also, failed to mail the Credential blanks by the date specified by our State Regent. Three blanks reached me after State Conference.

There was an increase in registration for the Seventy-second State Conference, a total registration of 342, representing 76 Chapters. A check for \$236.00, covering registration fees, has been sent to the State Treasurer.

## COOPERATION OF DAR WITH S.A.R. AND S.R. Mrs. John Crane Peteet

There are 95 Chapters in Georgia but only three showed interest in this category.

These days we have no set of moral guidelines by which the concerned person can measure present day school standards other than the books once used in our school systems (many of which have been discarded). A recent publication of the Department of Education of California offers such a measuring stick, "Guidelines For Moral Instruction In The California Schools". This Textbook Committee advises wide distribution and promotion of this book whenever possible. Although not a DAR project, it was at our suggestion that Governor Lester Maddox reviewed a copy and is placing a marked copy of these guidelines into the hands of every member of every board of education throughout Georgia.

This Textbook Study Committee continues to promote at every opportunity for classroom use, the Study Book Exposing Communism: "The Naked Communist" by W. Cleon Skousen. We continue to expose and denounce the teaching of sex-education and the SIECUS series as detailed in our 1968-1969 Textbook Study Report.

The Chairman of your Textbook Study Committee is a member of Savannah's Chatham County Board of Education and is continuously

striving to bring to the attention of the public the need for re-evaluating the calibre, quality and even subject matter of all textbooks in our school system, with careful emphasis on examination of teacher's manuals. Your Chairman has spoken in different areas of the State focusing attention on critical situations within our school system. Mrs. Armin Hubert of the Staff of Doorstep Savannah (a Patriotic Educational Organization of which your Chairman is Executive Director) and your Chairman have presented textbook seminars to groups organizing private schools. Throughout the year they have shown films and presented programs on Education to Church groups, civic clubs, the Georgia Basic Education Council and parents desirous of questioning the content of textbooks. The "Criteria for DAR Text Book Study Committee" is being widely promoted for use.

Textbook Evaluation Committees should be established throughout Georgia as many of the books available for use, and being used in the Public School System of Georgia are socialistic and frequently designed to destroy the American way of life, deleting much of our important history and consistently teaching socialism.

It is extremely important that reference materials suggested in textbooks be examined. Many textbooks might be approved but the suggested reference materials are frequently questionable or downright dangerous as to content and authorship, and thus insidiously and subtly cause destruction.

Until parents are concerned to the point of active participation, we need expect no improvement in these areas.

# **BYLAWS**

# BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

#### Article I NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

#### Article II OBJECTS

The objects of the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution shall be: to promote the aims set forth in the Bylaws of the National Society; to secure the benefits of cooperation of the Chapters in the State; the preservation of the memory of its Revolutionary patriots; the study of its history; the education of its youth in patriotic ideals and in the duties of citizenship.

#### Article III MEMBERSHIP

All Chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, located within the State of Georgia shall be members of this organization.

### Article IV OFFICERS

The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Curator. The State Regent shall appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as adviser in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure.

#### Article V

#### ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected at the annual State Conference biennially.

Section 2. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two years or until their successors are elected. Their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and of the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Section 3. No member shall be eligible to a State office until she has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years. No member shall be eligible to the same State office for two successive terms. A member having served more than one-half term in the State office shall be deemed to have served a term.

Section 4. Nominations of candidates for office shall be from the floor. The election shall be held by ballot. A majority of the votes cast by the voting members of the State Conference shall elect.

Section 5. Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become acting First Vice Regent, subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. A vacancy in any other State office between annual meetings shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. An election shall be held at the next State Conference to fill the unexpired term. Any State Officer, who is absent from the State for a continuous period of six months or longer automatically relinquishes her position as a State officer.

Section 6. No two State officers shall be members of the same Chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

Section 7. In recognition of valuable service to the organization, any State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Section 8. A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot. The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than fifteen months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

Section 9. On the election of State Regent, and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Recording Secretary General. The endorsement of a candidate for Vice President General shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent to the Recording Secretary General at least two weeks prior to Continental Congress.

#### Article VI

#### DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, of the State Board of Management, and of the Executive Committee. She shall attend all regular meetings of the National Board of Management. She shall appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees.

Section 2. In the absence of the State Regent from any meeting of the State Conference, or of the State Board of Management, the State First Vice Regent, or in her absence, the State Second Vice Regent, shall perform the duties of the State Regent. The State First and Second Vice Regents may be assigned to direct committees and to perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent.

Section 3. The State Chaplain shall open all meetings of the State Conference and of the State Board of Management with Scripture reading and prayer and shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require. She shall preside at the memorial service during State Conference and shall be responsible for the In Memoriam pages in the Proceedings.

Section 4. The State Recording Secretary shall record the proceedings of the State Conference and of meetings of the State Board of Management and of the Executive Committee. She shall compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and of the Proceedings Committee.

Section 5. The State Corresponding Secretary shall conduct correspondence and send notices in behalf of the State Conference, the State

Regent, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as directed by them.

Section 6. The State Treasurer shall be the custodian of the funds of the State Society. She shall collect the State Conference dues and registration fees from the Chapters, and shall receive all sums contributed by the Chapters for State and National projects. All monies received by the State Treasurer shall be placed in a Bank which is a member of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. She shall disburse such sums only when authorized by the State Board of Management of the State Society. Incidental expenses shall be paid from the State Dues Fund when authorized by the State Regent in writing. The State Treasurer shall keep an account of all sums received or paid out and shall keep receipts for all payments. She shall prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference. Her books shall be audited annually by a Certified Public Accountant. She shall be ex-officio a member of the Credentials Committee.

Section 7. The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new Chapters.

Section 8. The State Registrar shall, when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, who live in towns and counties in which there are no Chapters, to prove eligibility, and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars in verifying lineage papers. She shall keep a correct list of all members in the State and shall make a report on membership to the State Conference.

Section 9. The State Historian shall be in charge of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General. She shall keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves in the State and shall prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General to Smithsonian Institution. She shall encourage the compilation and publication of County Histories and other unpublished records, especially those of the Revolutionary period.

Section 10. The State Librarian shall collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing duplicates, wherever possible, in the NSDAR Library and in the Georgia DAR Collections in the State Department of Archives and History. She shall endeavor to obtain the books on the wanted list of the Librarian General for the Georgia Section in the NSDAR Library and is authorized to solicit contributions from the Chapters for the purchase of the same. She shall have custody and supervision of the DAR Genealogical and Historical Collections at the State Department of Archives and History.

Section 11. The State Curator shall receive and be responsible for all gifts of Revolutionary relics to the Museum of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution. She shall be the custodian of the conference properties and shall have them properly stored, insured and made ready for use of the State Conference.

#### Article VII

#### MEETINGS

Section 1. The Georgia State Society shall hold an annual State Conference between the first day of February and the time of the meeting of the Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week. The Executive Committee shall fix the time and place of meetings when not fixed by the Conference in session, or when for any reason it may be impracticable to meet at the time or place fixed by the Conference.

Section 2. The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credential blanks to the Chapters not less than sixty days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 3. The voting members of the State Conference shall be State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regent or alternate, and the delegates or their alternates from the Chapters of the State, that are entitled to representation at the Continental Congress. The number of representatives from each Chapter shall be determined by the rules for representation of Chapters in the Continental Congress as given in the National Bylaws.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a Chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the Chapter, except in the case of the Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. No member shall hold, at the same time, two offices carrying a vote at the annual State Conference.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any Chapter in the State of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference, by unanimous consent, the privileges of the floor may be accorded to the State Chairmen with the exception that they may not vote unless they are duly elected delegates or their alternates from their respective chapters.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen days notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Twenty-five voting members, representing not less than ten Chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

#### Article VIII

#### STATE DUES AND CONFERENCE FEES

Section 1. The annual dues of Chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be one dollar for each member of the Chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before February 1. Seventy cents of this amount shall be allocated to the general State Dues Fund and thirty cents shall be used to cover all State required per capita assessments. No Chapter shall be entitled to representation at the annual State Conference until the State dues are paid.

Section 2. The Finance Committee, appointed by the State Regent, shall be composed of seven members, to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two Honorary State Regents, one active Chapter Regent, and one active Chapter member. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund.

Section 3. Each Chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State dues, a Conference registration fee of \$2.00 for each voter to which the Chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Section 4. State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$2.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference fee at the time of registration.

#### Article IX EXPENSES

Section 1. Eight hundred dollars shall be taken each year from the State Dues Fund, to be used by the State Regent in defraying her necessary traveling expenses.

Section 2. Necessary expenses of the State Regent and other officers of the State Conference for stationery and postage shall be paid by the State Treasurer from the State Dues Fund, on the presentation of itemized statements approved in writing by the State Regent.

#### Article X

#### STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, the Honorary State Regents, the Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regents of the Chapters of the State, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the fall, following the regular meeting of the National Board. It shall meet also at the time of the State Conference and whenever called by the State Regent.

Section 3. Ten members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference.

Section 5. State Chairmen of National and State Standing Committees shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privileges of the floor, but may not vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

#### Article XI

#### EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute an Executive Committee. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the Executive Committee, but may not vote. The State Board of Management may authorize this committee to perform such duties of the Board between its meeting, as may from time to time seem expedient. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three members of the Committee. It shall make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

# Article XII

#### CHAPTERS

Section 1. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April or May. The Chapter Regent shall report the names of the elected officers promptly, on triplicate blanks provided by the State Regent for this purpose, to the Organizing Secretary General, to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary.

Section 2. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent for use in compiling her report, not less than fifteen days before the opening of the annual State Conference. The official Chapter report, not to exceed five hundred words in length, for publication in the Proceedings shall be furnished the State Recording Secretary before the State Conference.

# Article XIII AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent and to the Parliamentarian. The State Regent shall send a copy to each Chapter and each voting member, at least sixty days prior to State Conference with her message carrying the call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

# Article XIV

#### RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. Robert's Rules of Order (Revised) shall be the governing authority in parliamentary law for the State Conference in matters not covered by the Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

# State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24. Bylaws were adopted and State Officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21). No conference was held in 1911; the time of meeting having been changed from the fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910, to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912"; amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta, "that we have Conference in the spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, p. 21).

#### Awards

All chapters competing for awards must send reports to the respective chairmen by February 1, 1971.

All reports for awards are based on membership confirmed by the National Society as of February 1 of preceding year (1970).

#### Bylaws

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National and State Bylaws.

#### Change of Address

Notice of change of address of members shall be sent to the Organizing Secretary General, Treasurer General, State Regent and State Registrar.

#### Change of Name

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to State Registrar, Treasurer General and State Regent.

#### Chapter Elections

Chapter elections shall be held preferably in April or early May and names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, Administration Building, 1776 D Street, N. W., Washington, D. C. 20006, to the State Regent, and to the State Recording Secretary. The full Christian name of Chapter officers shall be given together with her husband's given name or initials, address and zip code.

#### Dues

Pay to State Treasurer State Dues of \$1.00 per member preferably on or before January 1, not later than February 1. National Dues of \$3.00 per member sent to the Treasurer General, 1776 D Street, N. W., Washington, D. C. 20006, before January 1, 1971.

#### Conference Registration Fee

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State dues (on or before January 1, not later than February 1), \$2.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Rules for representation of chapters at Continental Congress:

"Chapters having less than 50 paid members on February 1, are entitled to be represented by the Regent or in her absence the Vice Regent or alternate; chapters having 50 to 199 paid members on February 1, one delegate in addition to the Regent; chapters having 200 to 299 paid members on February 1, two delegates in addition to the Regent, and for each additional 100 paid members one additional delegate. (Article XIII, Section 3-C, National Bylaws)

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$2.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. (Article VIII, Section 4, of the State Bylaws.)

#### Contributions

All contributions by Chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

#### Deceased Members

Deaths shall be reported promptly to Treasurer General and State Chaplain. Complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and date of death shall be furnished State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for Conference Memorial Service and "In Memoriam" pages for State Proceedings.

#### Georgia Hospitality Fund

The following resolution which applies to the Georgia Hospitality Fund appears in the Proceedings for 1955:

"WHEREAS, The Georgia Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds an annual dinner in Washington each year during Continental Congress, which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society,

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Georgia Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$100.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes: "BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this fund shall not be cumula-

tive. Adopted."

#### GENERAL NEW REGIME FUND BALANCE \$2,500.00

The following resolution which applies to the General New Regime Fund Balance of \$2,500.00 appears in the Proceedings for 1959-1960, page 41:

"RESOLVED, That at the end of each regime all money in the General Fund above \$2,500.00 be transferred to the Savings Account; when the Supplemental Audit Report is made as of June 1 every two years before the Auditors close out the books this transaction be handled in order to show in this Audit, thus making the General Fund show the same balance of \$2,500.00 at the beginning of each new regime. ADOPTED."

# PROCEDURE BOOK OF INSTRUCTIONS FOR OFFICERS AND STATE CHAIRMEN

The following resolution which applies to a Procedure Book of Instruction for Officers and State Chairmen appears in the Proceedings for 1959-1960, page 41:

"RESOLVED, That all Officers and State Chairmen keep a Procedure Book of Instructions and helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new Officer and Chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities thus providing a continuing continuity of DAR work, ADOPTED."

#### Genealogical Records

To insure uniformity and convenience in filing, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, 8½ by 11 inches with one inch margins on left side and bottom, and one and one-half inches at top. One copy retained in Chapter Archives, and two copies shall be sent to the Chairman of Genealogical Records.

#### Information for Chapter Regents

1. All letters received by Chapter Regents relating to the work of the Society shall be distributed to the corresponding Chapter Chairman and brought to the attention of the members at a chapter meeting. 2. Please follow Resolution No. 11, adopted at 61st Georgia Society State Conference, as follows: "Resolved, That a closing date of February 1 be established for all reports, and all reports be given from February 1 to February 1, regardless of a change of regime or Regent." All awards will be made on this date basis.

#### Information for State Officers and State Chairmen

State Officers and State Chairmen shall send to the State Regent and to the State Treasurer a copy of any instruction letter mailed to chapters.

#### Meadow Garden

The deed to Meadow Garden property from the National Society, DAR, is in the possession of the State Regent and is also recorded in the Richmond County Court House, Augusta, Georgia.

#### Nominations

The following resolution which applies to the announcement of the candidacy for State Regent appears in the Proceedings of the Twentieth State Conference, 1918:

"Resolved, that it is the judgment of the Executive Board that announcements for State Regent should not be made...earlier than three months prior to the meeting of the Conference and they shall be furnished to the Press for publication."

#### Proceedings

Three copies of the Proceedings will be sent to each Chapter. One copy to be retained by Regent, one copy given to the Chapter Treasurer and one copy for use in the Chapter. Additional copies, if available, may be secured from the State Recording Secretary at \$1.00 per copy, plus 25 cents for postage if to be mailed.

#### Reports for Proceedings

State Officers', State Chairmen's, and Chapter Regents' reports for Proceedings shall be as concise as possible—not to exceed 500 words—typewritten (double spaced) upon one side of 3-hole unruled notebook paper, 8½ by 11 inches, and shall be sent to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary on or before February 15, the original being sent to the Secretary for the proceedings, Chapters Competing for Honor Roll by February 1.

#### Resolutions

Resolutions to be considered by the Committee shall be typed, with a heading giving subject of the resolution, signed, and sent to the Chairman of the Resolutions Committee two weeks before the date of the State Conference.

The Diamond Anniversary Year of the National Society, Children of the American Revolution has been one of excitement, increased interest, and work for the Georgia State Society. Local Societies celebrated with Colonial pageants, teas, and luncheons along with programs honoring their founder, Mrs. Harriet M. Lothrop.
