**GEORGIA DELEGATION MEETING
EIGHTY-SECOND CONTINENTAL CONGRESS
WASHINGTON — APRIL 16, 1973**

The meeting of the Georgia Delegation at the 82nd Continental Congress was called to order by the State Regent, Mrs. Arthur H. Waite, at 2:00 P.M. Monday, April 16, 1973 in the Colonial Room of the Mayflower Hotel, Washington. Mrs. L. J. Sixty-six chapters reported their work, some made contributions to Americana Fund; 2 documents were given to the Repository of Americana; Historical Anniversaries celebrated, honoring: Famous Men 44, Famous Women, 41, Events 122 programs; 161 Histriocial programs were given by adults and 78 by children; 567 Radio and 21 TV programs were given covering DAR work and American History; Historical Tours made by 341 adults and 55 children; 1 Revolutionary soldier's grave marked by a chapter, 23 located but unmarked, 6 Daughters and 1 wife marked, 38 DAR members graves marked with Official Insignia, 2 bronze plaques given for their grave stones by their chapters; 17 sketches of Revolutionary soldiers were sent to the Georgia Department of Archives and History; 9 Historical Restorations were begun, 2 completed and 6 marked; 66 chapters reported awards of medals certificates were presented for excellence for essays and American History; 2 chapters contributed to the History Scholarship Funds; 18 History books sent to Tamasse school. Your State Historian attended State Conference, Fall Board of Management and one District meeting.

Eighty-two Chapters reported. Fifty have Librarians. The NSDAR Library requested 3 books and 5 others also sent.

33 Chapters contributed \$84.00 to NSDAR Library Fund. 3 Chapters gave \$41.95 to purchase special books for Museum Reference Library. \$43.68 given for binding Histories of Revolutionary Soldiers.

The Georgia State Archives received 36 books, 16 Xeroxed copied manuscripts, 3 reels microfilms, 3 envelopes containing newspaper clippings on important Georgia data, also several pamphlets.

36 Chapters contributed \$140.00 for State Library work and \$140.00 at .02 per capita is allocated for binding genealogical records. Much and varied work reported for local libraries. Some communities building libraries with special section for Genealogical books and records. 272 books, some pamphlets and 124 subscriptions to DAR Magazine reported given to local libraries. Books and money amounted to \$2,574.48 and magazines were valued at \$735.35. Chapters reported placing book "The Hereditary Register of the United States of America" 1972.

Chapters gave Tamassee and K.D.S. Schools books and visual aids. One Chapter's gift was \$111.84. Also gave books to Tamassee on Presidents of U.S.—Costing \$101.84. Books reported given to Churches, Schools, V.A. Hospitals and Nursing Homes Libraries, also the Georgia Historical Society.

Some Chapters report at meetings on some phase of library work, and have displays. One member is making memorial to her parents by establishing room in new local library. Some Chapters give books in memory of deceased member in lieu of flowers. Several Chapters reported finding genealogical records and rebinding worn books and some indexing done in libraries.

Your State Curator has in her possession the following property of the State Society: One large silk United States Flag, one silk State of Georgia Flag, one silk DAR Flag. Three aluminum flag poles, each in three parts, not manageable for tall poles, encased in blue cloth bag. One brass eagle finial, one brass spear-head finial, three spear-shaped finials in steel, three gold ropes, with tassels, two round brass standard bases, one time clock, one bell. One blue suit case, to hold flags, cords, clock, etc., and ribbons. One large electric DAR Insignia, with bulbs, encased in cloth covered box, held secure with two canvas straps. One leather satchel to help flag bases. One large white pottery urn. Seven large Page's Ribbons, twelve small Page's Ribbons, a box of "Hello" name labels. Permanent name; seat labels, in zippered case for platform chairs. One electric extension cord, forty-two white "Special Guest" badges, 164 DAR Georgia State Delegation badges to be used during Continental Congress.

Last year, Miss Ethel Montgomery, State Curator, before the State Conference, prepared the covered box for the Insignia, and made the platform seat labels for which the State Society is most grateful.

Your State Curator has spoken on DAR Museum, Meadow Garden, at Hawkinsville Chapter, and on "Trends in Education" for the Birdville Chapter. She attended the four District Meetings in August, and the State Board of Management in October in St. Simons Island.

It is an honor and a privilege to serve the State Society as Curator.

Committee Reports National Committees

AMERICAN HERITAGE Mrs. Robert W. Harrison, Jr.

The response from chapters carrying out the programs, projects and activities outlined by the National Chairman of the American Heritage Committee has been excellent.

Eighty-three chapters reported their work of varied and interesting programs and activities, many that stimulated interest in entire communities as well as chapters.

An antique show, a village fair, an arts and craft show, a museum for a day, an American History fair, a published County History, a conducted historical tour, a restored painting and quilt displays are but a few of the activities that drew public attention.

The publicity from these projects has been beneficial toward increasing membership and in telling the DAR story.

AMERICAN INDIANS Mrs. Robert Larkin

Fifty-five chapters reported. Total contributions to Bacone amounted to \$569.00; 10 boxes of clothing valued at \$416.65 sent to Bacone Thrift Shop. St. Mary's received contributions of \$483.50; 19 packages for the Thrift Shop valued at \$1,013.72. American Indian Scholarship Fund received \$66.00, and \$102.00 was earmarked for the General Fund. Twenty-Five dollar scholarship was given to the WRBL TV-3 Indian Fund in Columbus; Indian Lore Museum in Hawkinsville received \$10.00. Twenty-eight Chapters had full programs on the American Indian, one chapter had two! The programs included talks by college professors, historians, recognized area archaeologists, and former reservation teachers and residents. Mrs. Rozell Fabiani, well known personality on WRBL TV-3, Columbus, spoke to several chapters on the subject "The American Indians—Their Gifts, Contributions, and Problems". I presented programs on Georgia Indians to three chapters.

Many chapters had displays of Indian art and artifacts. A model Indian village was shown by a woman in authentic Indian costume at one meeting. Another chapter held a luncheon meeting with Indian table decorations and typical Indian foods. The chapters all discussed St. Mary's and Bacone.

Chapters co-operated in the celebration of "The First American Week", an annual event held in Columbus when Indians from different tribes gather for a week of festivities, special programs, and banquets. One chapter presented the DAR Medal of Honor to Mrs. Rozell Fabiani for her television program "Salute to the First American", which was shown for the fifth year on WRBL TV-3 during "The First American Week". Mrs. Fabiani is the first Georgian to receive this Award.

AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP Mrs. W. T. Gillham

Forty-seven chapters reported. Forty-three repeated the American's Creed at meetings; 33 had Americanism programs; 28 talks given to other organizations. Three chapters presented two hours 40 minutes

time on TV; 13 had 13 hours radio time, one had 279 minutes on school radio to 9 schools. Fourteen chapters had 1,532 inches in newspapers; 23 placed patriotic literature in schools; 21 gave to libraries 213 pamphlets. Three participated in special projects—Promotion of American's Creed; 43 displayed in stores; one county fair; one college; 15 original poems by 6th graders. Seventeen chapters discussed the Constitution; 18 reviewed current State and National legislation; 13 studied qualifications of candidates for public office. One Thousand Two Hundred Forty-three (1,243) Manuals for Citizenship given to applicants for American Citizenship; 46 to Americanization schools; 21 to high schools; 2,740 to interested adult groups. Seven Hundred-fifteen U. S. Flags given to new citizens; 304 welcome cards; 845 patriotic leaflets; 259 American Flag pins. One chapter held a reception for new citizens; another prepared a packet of the Presidents of the U. S., which was announced and distributed by a local radio station. Five hundred emergency kits given to new citizens; one flag code poster made; "Profiles of Freedom" brochures given to all schools in one county; 35 book marks of the American's Creed. Fort Peachtree, Hawkinsville Chapters presented an Americanism award to a naturalized citizen. Oglethorpe, Sergeant Newton Chapters presented Medals of Honor to outstanding native-born Americans. Special recognition goes to 3 Columbus chapters for their co-operative work in the Americanism program. Congratulations to Bonaventure, Archibald Bulloch, Captain Thomas Cobb, Baron DeKalb Chapters.

CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

With the outstanding leadership of our capable President, Jacob E. Varn, Jr., the Georgia State Society, C.A.R. has had an active and busy year.

The Thirty-third State Conference was held in Savannah, hosted by Colonel Henry Lee Society, with 156 members and seniors present. Fifty-five C.A.R. attended National Convention in Washington, April, 1972, including 46 excited C.A.R. and seniors. At the National Convention, Jake Varn accepted first place in Newssheet; Blake Smyth won the President's Award; Four Societies were Gold Merit Award winners: Altama, Commodore Perry, Fort Frederica, and Winona. Howell Cobb won a blue ribbon. Commodore Perry won first place in Patriotic Education Week. Winona won third place on National Merit and C.A.R. — S.A.R. Georgia was proud of the election of Laura Reid, National Recording Secretary; Blake Smyth, National Organizing Secretary; and Mrs. Carlyle M. Ward as Senior National Vice-President, Southeastern Region. Frank Fling was appointed National Band Director.

In July, Georgia C.A.R. had 87 members and seniors attend South-eastern Region in Birmingham. Again, 50 traveled by way of the Georgia Bus. The Bus Tour was once again directed by my husband, Gerald G. Fling.

Workshop in Winder was attended by 56 members and seniors, where we were hosted by the James Watson Society. 50 C.A.R. were present in the State Capitol to witness the signing of the Patriotic Education Week Proclamation signing by Governor Jimmy Carter. October 14 was the date of our State Patriotic Education Seminar held in Perry, where the Commodore Perry Society was our host. It was well

attended by 62 C.A.R. from over the State.

In November, we followed our State President's theme, "Footsteps to the Future — Go an Extra Step for Tamassee", and took a trip to Tamassee.

Something new has been added to the Georgia Society. The Georgia State Patriots. They are now 120 strong. We also have 50 State Promoters, 23 National Promoters, and 7 Life Promoters.

The Georgia CARGoes subscription now totals close to 500. The Georgia Society had an outstanding section in the December, 1972, issue of the C.A.R. Magazine.

Membership in Georgia's 20 C.A.R. Societies, as of February 2, 1973, is 467. This includes 124 new members this year.

Two new Societies have been organized: Uchee Trail Society, in Cochran, and Lucy Spell Raiford Society, in Columbus.

Another Bus Trip is planned for National Convention in April.

"Know Your America: The Key To Your Future" is our National Theme.

CONSERVATION **Mrs. Raiferd L. Drew**

Forty chapters reported. Although each DAR member did not plant a tree as an individual, the total, 8912, exceeded the number for the national project. These along with shrubs, bulbs and flowers were planted in parks, parkways, cemeteries and other public grounds as well as private yards. Several chapters gave seedling trees to schools and other youth groups. One member and her husband were instrumental in saving the nation's largest cherrybark oak tree, which was slated for removal to widen a highway near Albany, Georgia. Chapters reported 1488 shrubs and 2,522 bulbs. Two members planted five bushels of iris rhizomes.

At least seven hundred fed birds with an estimated 12,677 pounds of food. Other wildlife fed were deer, raccoons, rabbits, squirrels, chipmonks, turkeys and ducks. Some food was placed in public parks. One chapter stocked a lake with, and fed, 3,400 fish.

Nine chairmen gave legislation information, and eighty or more letters were written to government officials. At least sixty-seven attended city or county council meetings in the interest of conservation.

Over three hundred women belong to local, state or national conservation groups; among them Georgia Conservancy, Audubon Society and National Wildlife Federation.

DAR members are involved in cleaning up and beautifying their communities, and are concerned with curbing pollution, stopping waste and recycling. There is need for more recycling centers.

I feel the main function of this committee is to inform and give specific guidelines for action.

DAR GOOD CITIZENS **Mrs. Allen L. Brewer**

Miss Susan Sewell of Lakeside High School, Decatur, our last year's Good Citizen, was second in competition for the National Good Citizen! She was sponsored by the Baron DeKalb Chapter, Mrs. A. C. Earl Shepherd, Regent.

Good Citizen pins and certificates were awarded to 188 girls by 56

chapters this year.

District winners and their sponsors were: Miss Kathy Hickman, Briarcliff School, Atlanta, Joseph Habersham Chapter; Miss Rebecca H. Grist, Albany High School, Albany, Commodore Richard Dale Chapter; Miss Mary Bell, Elbert County High, Elberton, Stephen Heard Chapter and Miss Elizabeth Moses, Montgomery County High, Mt. Vernon, Vidalia Chapter. Each winner received an award of \$5.00 from the Georgia State Society.

Miss Elizabeth Moses was chosen the State Good Citizen. She was a guest of the State Society at State Conference in Savannah and was presented a State Good Citizen pin and a \$100.00 bond from the National Society. She has been entered in competition for National Good Citizen.

DAR MAGAZINE

The Georgia Daughters have supported the DAR Magazine with subscriptions that average 31%. Using the 1972 figures, out of the 6,876 members, there were 2,126 who subscribed to the magazine. The chapters which showed the greatest increase in 1973 subscriptions were: Lyman Hall, an increase from 29 to 52; Bonaventure, an increase from 13 to 37; and John Benning, an increase from 4 to 25. Our newest chapter, Colonel Daniel Appling, has pointed the way for all of us by having 100% subscription their very first year. The Archibald Bulloch Chapter has the highest percentage in the state with 128%.

However, there are definite weak spots in the reports. There were three chapters which had no subscriptions, two chapters which had only one, and one chapter which had two. Fifteen chapters showed a loss in their number of subscriptions.

Clearly, there needs to be new interest in this fine magazine. To encourage increase in subscriptions, prizes next year will be offered to the three chapters with the highest percentage **increase**, and recognition will be given to the highest percentage in the State.

Information the DAR Magazine contains is necessary for well informed members. Here are a few suggestions for increasing subscriptions:

1. Include the price of the magazine in the dues of the Chapter.
2. Keep the magazine before the members by bringing items of interest to each meeting.
3. Have a regular program on the DAR Magazine showing its value and how it can be used.

DAR MUSEUM Miss Ethel Montgomery

Letters of information and instruction were sent to all chapters in September. Questionnaires for reporting were sent out the first of January. Eighty-one chapters sent in reports, of these sixty-five made monetary contributions. According to the State Treasurer's record, a total sum of \$1000.75 was contributed for all Museum funds. Contributions for the proposed Georgia Period Room led with the sum of \$315.50. Ten chapters reported having a full program on the Museum. One program was given by the Advisor to the DAR Museum, one by the State Chairman of the DAR Museum and eight were given by chapter members, four chapters using slides. Five books were bought for the Museum Reference Library.

In the past year, the State chairman attended the State Conference, Continental Congress, all four District Meetings and the Board of Management Meeting.

Grateful appreciation goes to the chapters whose work has made this report possible.

D A R SCHOOL
Mrs. Louis Joseph Bahin

Eighty-three chapters reported to the State Chairman on the work done for DAR Schools. Totals from these reports show that \$14,053.07 was contributed to the schools, including the per capita from the State Dues Fund, the \$700.00 allocated for a project honoring the State Regent and two gifts made directly to the schools. An itemized statement of the amounts given to each fund at the individual schools appears in the report of the State Treasurer.

Three hundred forty-five boxes of clothing, weighing 9947³/₄ pounds were sent, at a transportation cost of \$515.69, plus two carloads and one pick-up truck load, not weighed and carried free. Boxes were taken on many visits to the schools, as well as those carried on two bus trips. Free freight was obtained by 8 chapters from the following 5 lines: Georgia Highway Express, Overnite Transportation Co., Five Transportation Co., United Parcels and Brown Trucking Co. Fifteen chapters reporting sending discount coupons to Crossnore, the cash value from only 3 chapters being \$1705.19.

Programs on the schools included Tamasee 61, Kate Duncan Smith 53, Berry 28, and the other approved schools 53. As State Chairman it was my pleasure to accept invitations from 14 chapters where I presented the program. Forty-eight chapters received the Hightower Award.

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERAN-PATIENTS

Mrs. A. C. Rogers

Chapters reported 15 VAVS Certified Members. (54 Chapters reporting).

In Veteran's Hospitals 19 members participating in giving 625 hours of time. Nine parties were given with 37 members participating at a value of \$165.42. Two hundred-nineteen dollars was donated for Canteen Books. The value of gifts to patients—\$435.00, and the value of gifts to hospitals was \$621.89. Twenty-four members participated in 7 programs—value \$90.00. One Hundred forty-nine members spent 569 hours in personal visits. Two Chapters commemorated Patriotic Days.

In Military or Naval Hospitals 22 members spent 130 hours in personal visits, 30 members participated in three parties at a value of \$27.50. Ten dollars was donated for Canteen Books. The value of gifts to patients—\$121.60, and the value of gifts to hospitals was \$98.00. Two programs were given and four Patriotic Days commemorated including Flag Day. Two hours of time spent.

In Private Hospitals 188 members spent 198 hours in personal visits. Ten members participated in two parties at a value of \$20.00. Gifts to patients were valued at \$21.95. Six members participated in a program and 2 hours were spent in commemorating six Patriotic days.

In Convalescent or Nursing Homes: 30 members spent 331 hours in personal visits, several parties given, 4 members participating at a \$3.00 value. Gifts to patients valued at \$22.50, and 9 members participated in 2 programs.

In Private Homes: 88 members spent 44 hours in personal visits, gave gifts valued at \$75.95 to patients, 4 members participated in commemorating 4 Patriotic days —4 hours spent.

In Public Relations: 7 talks made by DAR members. Eleven news stories published at 335¹/₂ inches. 33¹/₄ inches of pictures published. Two Television talks or Interviews taking 30 minutes and valued at \$30.00. 52

Radio talks or Interviews taking 133 minutes and valued at \$425.00.

Four pounds one ounce of weighed canceled postage stamps plus 210 stamps not weighed. These were sent to the Chairman of Stamps for the Wounded.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS

I want to thank the sixty-one chapters which reported, and the twenty-seven chapters that contributed records for binding this year. A total of 540 pages of miscellaneous records were alphabetized by chapter name, paged, and indexed. In addition, 12 manuscripts (1656 pages) were bound separately and submitted to NSDAR Genealogical Records Committee (2196 total pages). A total of 91 Grandparent forms with index cards were submitted to NSDAR. Two reels of microfilm records were placed at Georgia Archives (no page count). Two genealogical workshops were reported held. A total of \$200.00 was reported contributed to the NSDAR microfilm fund. Material for genealogical reference was placed in nine additional local libraries (est. 1500 pages).

On February 1, 1973, the records received were sent to the bindery to be forwarded, original to NSDAR Genealogical Records Committee, first carbon to Georgia Department of Archives and History, second carbon to Washington Memorial Library, Macon, as follows:

The National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution presented to Georgia, 7 first place Contest Prize Awards in 1972; awarded 2 Certificates for Outstanding Leadership to two chapter Chairmen: Miss Dorothy Waldman of the Atlanta Chapter who works for JAC through the Atlanta Boys Club and to Mrs. James F. Ellis who works for JAC through the public schools in DeKalb County. Georgia Society contributed \$125.00 to the National JAC Prize Fund. Georgia has eight chapters with JAC Chairman and sponsors 34,354 members in 732 clubs. The three chapters who sponsored the most JAC members are: Atlanta, Baron DeKalb and Thronateeska. The three chapters sponsoring the most new JAC clubs are: Atlanta, Thomasville and Adam Brinson. Six Thatcher pins were awarded and 1,024 American Flags presented through the JAC clubs. Activities of the clubs were reported as programs on good citizenship, patriotism and community concern. Two chapter regents reported that the JAC work will be the regents' project for this year. MEMBERSHIP

The total membership of the Georgia State Society as of February 1, 1973 was 7181. This year we have 395 new members of which 144 are Juniors and 15 of these Juniors are transfers from C.A.R. Seventeen members were dropped from our rolls. Fifty-nine chapters had a gain in membership, 13 remained the same and we have one new chapter. It has been a pleasure working with the Membership Commission and seeing our Society grow as it has never done before with a net increase of 164 members. NATIONAL DEFENSE

National Defense reports were received from 67 of the 97 chapters in the State. Sixty-one chapters devoted at least one entire meeting to a pertinent topic such as: Equal Rights Amendment, Wheat Deal with Russia, and Constitution of the United States.

At each meeting of 62 chapters at least 5 minutes was devoted to discussion of National Defense; twenty three of these stated that they devoted more time.

The 1972 Resolutions were discussed and studied by 50 chapters.

Fifty-seven chapters had National Defense material available at chapter meetings and 50 chapters made material available to interested individuals. Subjects of material most distributed were: Equal Rights Amendment, Wheat Deal with Russia, and Panama Canal.

Three hundred seventy-three Good Citizenship medals were presented with 25 chapters having presentation made at school assembly. This is an increase of 73 medals over last year. Baron DeKalb Chapter presented 95 medals.

Thirteen chapters participated in ROTC Medal project, giving 13 Bronze medals and 9 gold medals. In addition to the gold medal, Cherokee Chapter gave a \$50 Savings Bond. The number of medals presented this year was also an increase.

The amount of money for Dollars for Defense remained at a high level as 32 chapters contributed \$533.50.

According to reports, 260 interested individuals wrote to Congress concerning pending legislation. No doubt, many more wrote before and after the report deadline but failed to notify the chapter chairman.

Recommendations which the chapters thought were pertinent were included in the report to the National Chairman.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

The publicity for the State Conference in Columbus was excellent and widespread.

Reports were received from 78 chapters and these reported 24,031 inches of publicity in 2034 articles with 636 pictures. Our publicity increases each year.

Five single entry feature articles were submitted to be entered in the national contest.

Keen interest is shown by many chapters and with a little more attention to keeping accurate records the total amount of Georgia's publicity would be phenomenal.

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

Mrs. A. C. Earl Shepherd

Sixty-one Chapters reported and sixty-one reported the Pledge of Allegiance at all meetings; 61 Chapters urged members to fly their flags on holidays; 61 large flags were presented to schools; Scouts; libraries; and Chapters; 145 small flags were presented to naturalized citizens, school children and members of Chapters; 622 Flag posters were given to schools and libraries, they were also used as displays in windows and public places during Flag Month and Constitution Week; 1772 Flag Codes were distributed to school children, Scouts and Chapter members and friends. Flag Code bookmarks and booklets and Flag pledges were given to members and friends; 4 flags for the blind were made and given to Georgia State Academy For The Blind. Thirty-two corrections were made in improper use of Flags. Thirty-five Chapters reported having entire program on the Flag; 60 reported partial programs and 40 reported giving Flag programs to other organizations. 110 newspaper items; 48 radio broadcasts; 4 T.V. programs were presented by news media.

TRANSPORTATION

Thirty-two chapters reported; 10 historical trips made; 6 programs on traffic safety given; 9 chapters reported that the attendance at meetings increased due to the efforts of their transportation chairmen; several chapters distributed safety literature; several chapters attended traffic safety classes.

Due to several factors, the 1972 bus trip showed a profit of \$330.99. This money was applied toward the Kate Duncan Smith track and field project.

This committee will work even harder this year to have even greater attendance at Continental Congress. Your chairman hopes to continue the bus trip. I also urge all chapters to devote more time to traffic safety this year.

Special National Committee Reports

AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH

Mrs. Knight Smothers

In Georgia, American History Month 1973 had a first, with an outdoor billboard in downtown Columbus proclaiming February, our American History Month, sponsored by the three chapters.

Governor Jimmy Carter proclaimed February as American History Month on February 1, 1973; 57 letters were written to Senators and Congressmen in behalf of legislation to permanently name February as American History Month.

Interesting and varied reports were received from sixty-nine chapters. The essay contest, "I Am a Patriot of 1773" was sponsored by 158 schools, 24 for the first time, with 2,884 contestants. Awards presented for the essay contest included 128 bronze and 22 silver medals, 152 American History Certificates, 1,297 Certificates of Appreciation, 206 books on American History, 10 cash awards, one Declaration of Independence, 4 flag pins, 3 ROTC medals and one U.S. Savings Bond. Other school activities included 88 Assembly Programs, 114 discussions, 28 school paper articles, 49 school spot announcements, 4 films and one debate.

Chapter Programs on American History included 74, and 7 scripts were sent to our National Chairmen; 48 displays were placed in banks, libraries, schools and stores; 98 posters and 558 stickers were used. 98 medals for excellence in American History and 125 certificates.

Publicity throughout the State was outstanding, 168 newspaper or magazine articles published and 82 pictures.

With a total of 1,652½ inches publicity, 250 sets of spot announcements for radio and TV were used and 33 members appeared on radio and TV with a total of 1470 minutes.

CONSTITUTION WEEK

Letters of instruction and questionnaires were sent to 97 Chapters. I am pleased to report all 97 Chapters responded.

The Governor, Jimmy Carter, and 91 mayors proclaimed September 17-25 as Constitution Week. The display of the Flag of the United States was urged by 94 Chapters. Publicity: 397 articles, with 6,351 inches and 334 pictures. Radio: 122 programs, with 1,186 spot announcements, with 1,757 on the air; Television: 132 spot announcements with 345 minutes on the air. Displays: in banks 109, stores 27, libraries 85, Post Offices 85, county fairs 81, schools 62, billboards 28, miscellaneous 144. Programs: 24 chapters, 660 schools, Scouts 35, service clubs 56, churches 246 with the ministers as helpers. 36 Chapters purchased their material from the National Office; 4,689 pieces of patriotic literature were distributed.

The Georgia Report was sent to the National Vice-Chairman of NSDAR on November 24, 1972.

It has been a pleasure serving under the leadership of Mrs. Arthur H. Waite, elected Georgia State Regent for the 1972-1974 term.

FRIENDS OF THE MUSEUM

Thirty-three chapters reported a total of \$242.00 given to the Friends of the Museum Committee, including one Life Member and one Participating member. Many chapters reported growing interest in this committee and a desire to enlist more members in the future.

BYLAWS

BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II OBJECTS

The objects of the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution shall be: to promote the aims set forth in the Bylaws of the National Society; to secure the benefits of cooperation of the chapters in the State; the preservation of the memory of its Revolutionary patriots; the study of its history; the education of its youth in patriotic ideals and in the duties of citizenship.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All Chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, located within the State of Georgia shall be members of this organization.

Article IV OFFICERS

The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Curator. The State Regent shall appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as adviser in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure.

Article V ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected at the annual State Conference biennially.

Section 2. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two years or until their successors are elected. Their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regents and of the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Section 3. No member shall be eligible to a State office until she has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years. No member shall be eligible to the same State office for two successive terms. A member having served more than one-half term in the State office shall be deemed to have served a term.

Section 4. Nominations of candidates for office shall be from the floor. The election shall be held by ballot. A majority of the votes cast by the voting members of the State Conference shall elect.

Section 5. Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become acting First Vice Regent, subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. A vacancy in any other State office between annual meetings shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. An election shall be held at the next State Conference to fill the unexpired term. Any State Officer, who is absent from the State for a continuous period of six months or longer automatically relinquishes her position as a State officer.

Section 6. No two State officers shall be members of the same Chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

Section 7. In recognition of valuable service to the organization, any State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Section 8. A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot. The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than fifteen months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

Section 9. On the election of State Regent, and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Recording Secretary General. The endorsement of a candidate for Vice President General shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent to the Recording Secretary General at least two weeks prior to Continental Congress.

Article VI

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, of the State Board of Management, and of the Executive Committee. She shall attend all regular meetings of the National Board of Management. She shall appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees.

Section 2. In the absence of the State Regent from any meeting of the State Conference, or the State Board of Management, the State First Vice Regent, or in her absence, the State Second Vice Regent, shall perform the duties of the State Regent. The State First and Second Vice Regents may be assigned to direct committees and to perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent.

Section 3. The State Chaplain shall open all meetings of the State Conference and of the State Board of Management with Scripture reading and prayer and shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require. She shall preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and shall be responsible for the In Memoriam pages in the Proceedings.

Section 4. The State Recording Secretary shall record the proceedings of the State Conference and of meetings of the State Board of Management and of the Executive Committee. She shall compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and of the Proceedings Committee.

Section 5. The State Corresponding Secretary shall conduct correspondence and send notices in behalf of the State Conference, the State Regent, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as directed by them.

Section 6. The State Treasurer shall be the custodian of the funds of the State Society. She shall collect the State Conference dues and registration fees from the Chapters, and shall receive all sums contributed by the Chapters for State and National projects. All monies received by the State Treasurer shall be placed in a Bank which is a member of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. She shall disburse such sums only when authorized by the State Board of Management of the State Society. Incidental expenses shall be paid from the State Dues Fund when authorized by the State Regent in writing. The State Treasurer shall keep an account of all sums received or paid out and shall keep receipts for all payments. She shall prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference. Her books shall be audited annually by a Certified Public Accountant. She shall be ex-officio a member of the Credentials Committee.

Section 7. The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new Chapters.

Section 8. The State Registrar shall, when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution,* who live in towns and counties in which there are no Chapters, to prove eligibility, and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars in verifying lineage papers. She shall keep a correct list of all members in the State and shall make a report on membership to the State Conference.

Section 9. The State Historian shall be in charge of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General. She shall keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves in the State and shall prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General to Smithsonian Institution. She shall encourage the compilation and publication of County Histories and other unpublished records, especially those of the Revolutionary period. •

Section 10. The State Librarian shall collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing duplicates, wherever possible, in the NSDAR Library and in the Georgia DAR Collections in the State Department of Archives and History. She shall endeavor to obtain the books on the wanted list of the Librarian General for the Georgia Section in the NSDAR Library and is authorized to solicit contributions from the Chapters for the purchase of the same. She shall have custody and supervision of the DAR Genealogical and Historical Collections of the State Department of Archives and History.

Section 11. The State Curator shall receive and be responsible for all gifts of Revolutionary relics to the Museum of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution. She shall be the custodian of the conference properties and shall have them properly stored, insured and made ready for use of the State Conference.

Article VII

MEETINGS

Section 1. The Georgia State Society shall hold an annual State Conference between the first day of February and the time of the meeting of the Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week. The Executive Committee shall fix the time and place of meetings when not fixed by the Conference in session, or when for any reason it may be impracticable to meet at the time or place fixed by the Conference.

Section 2. The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credential blanks to the Chapters not less than sixty days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 3. The voting members of the State Conference shall be State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regent or alternate, and the delegates or their alternates from the Chapters of the State, that are entitled to representation at the Continental Congress. The number of representatives from each Chapter shall be determined by the rules for representation of Chapters in the Continental Congress as given in the National Bylaws.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a Chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the Chapter, except in the case of the Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. No member shall hold, at the same time, two offices carrying a vote at the annual State Conference.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any Chapter in the State of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference, by unanimous consent, the privileges of the floor may be accorded to the State Chairmen with the exception that they may not vote unless they are duly elected delegates or their alternates from their respective chapters.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen days notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Twenty-five voting members, representing not less than ten Chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII

STATE DUES AND CONFERENCE FEES

Section 1. The annual dues of Chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be one dollar for each member of the Chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before February 1. Seventy cents of this amount shall be allocated to the general State Dues Fund and thirty cents shall be used to cover all State required per capita assessments. No Chapter shall be entitled to representation at the annual State Conference until the State dues are paid.

Section 2. The Finance Committee, appointed by the State Regent, shall be composed of seven members, to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State

Treasurer, two Honorary State Regents, one active Chapter Regent, and one active Chapter member. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund.

Section 3. Each Chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State Dues, a Conference registration fee of \$2.00 for each voter to which the Chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Section 4. State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$2.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference fee at the time of registration.

Article IX EXPENSES

Section 1. One thousand dollars shall be taken each year from the State Dues Fund, to be used by the State Regent in defraying her necessary traveling expenses.

Section 2. Necessary expenses of the State Regent and other officers of the State Conference for stationery and postage shall be paid by the State Treasurer from the State Dues Fund, on the presentation of itemized statements approved in writing by the State Regent.

Article X STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, the Honorary State Regents, the Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regents of the Chapters of the State, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the Fall, following the regular meeting of the National Board. It shall meet also at the time of the State Conference and whenever called by the State Regent.

Section 3. Ten members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference.

Section 5. State Chairmen of National and State Standing Committees shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privileges of the floor, but may not vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article XI EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute an Executive Committee. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the Executive Committee, but may not vote. The State Board of Management may authorize this committee to perform such duties of the Board between its meeting, as may from time to time seem expedient. The Executive Committee shall meet

at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three members of the Committee. It shall make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

Article XII

CHAPTERS

Section 1. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April or May. The Chapter Regent shall report the names of the elected officers promptly, on triplicate blanks provided by the State Regent for this purpose, to the Organizing Secretary General, to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary.

Section 2. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent for use in compiling her report, not less than fifteen days before the opening of the annual State Conference. The official Chapter report, not to exceed five hundred words in length, for publication in the Proceedings shall be furnished the State Recording Secretary before the State Conference.

Article XIII

AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent and to the Parliamentarian. The State Regent shall send a copy to each Chapter and each voting member, at least sixty days prior to State Conference with her message carrying the call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

Article XIV

RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. Robert's Rules of Order (Revised) shall be the governing authority in parliamentary law for the State Conference in matters not covered by the Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24. By-laws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21). No conference was held in 1911; the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912"; amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta, "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, p. 21).

Awards

All chapters competing for awards must send reports to the respective chairmen by February 1, 1974.

All reports for awards are based on membership confirmed by the National Society as of February 1 of preceding year (1973).

Bylaws

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National and State Bylaws.

Change of Address

Notice of change of address of members shall be sent to the Organizing Secretary General, Treasurer General, State Regent and State Registrar.

Change of Name

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to State Registrar, Treasurer General and State Regent.

Chapter Elections

Chapter elections shall be held preferably in April or early May and names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, Administration Building, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20006, to the State Regent, and to the State Recording Secretary. The full Christian name of Chapter officers shall be given together with her husband's given name or

Dues

Pay to State Treasurer State Dues of \$1.00 per member preferably on or before January 1, not later than February 1. National Dues of \$7.00 per member sent to the Treasurer General, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20006, before January 1, 1974.

Conference Registration Fee

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State dues (on or before January 1, not later than February 1), \$2.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Rules for representation of chapters at Continental Congress:

"Chapters having less than 50 paid members on February 1, are entitled to be represented by the Regents or in her absence the Vice Regent or alternate; chapters having 50 to 199 paid members on February 1, one delegate in addition to the Regent; chapters having 200 to 299 paid members on February 1, two delegates in addition to the Regent, and for each additional 100 members one additional delegate." (Article XIII, Section 3-C, National Bylaws).

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$2.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. (Article VIII, Section 4, of the State Bylaws).

Contributions

All contributions by Chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

Deceased Members

Deaths shall be reported promptly to Treasurer General and State Chaplain. Complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and a date of death shall be furnished State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for Conference Memorial Service and "In Memoriam" pages for State Proceedings.

Georgia Hospitality Fund

The following resolution which applies to the Georgia Hospitality Fund appears in the Proceedings for 1955:

"WHEREAS, The Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds an annual dinner in Washington each year during Continental Congress, which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society.

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$100.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes:

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this fund shall not be cumulative. Adopted."

GENERAL NEW REGIME FUND BALANCE \$2,500

The following resolution which applies to the General New Regime Fund Balance of \$2,500.00 appears in the Proceedings for 1959-1960, page 41:

"RESOLVED, That at the end of each regime all money in the General Fund above \$2,500.00 be transferred to the Savings Account; when the Supplemental Audit Report is made as of June 1 every two years before the Auditors close out the books this transaction be handled in order to show in this Audit, thus making the General Fund show the same balance of \$2,500.00 at the beginning of each new regime. ADOPTED."

PROCEDURE BOOK OF INSTRUCTIONS FOR OFFICERS AND STATE CHAIRMEN

The following resolution which applies to a Procedure Book of Instruction for Officers and State Chairmen appears in the Proceedings for 1959-1960, Page 41.

"RESOLVED, That all Officers and State Chairmen keep a Procedure Book of Instructions and helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new Officer and Chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities thus providing a continuing continuity of DAR work, ADOPTED.

Genealogical Records

To insure uniformity and convenience in filing, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, 8½ by 11 inches with one-inch margins on left side and bottom, and one and one-half inches at top. One copy retained in Chapter Archives, and three copies shall be sent to the Chairman of Genealogical Records.

Information for Chapter Regents

1. All letters received by Chapter Regents relating to the work of the Society shall be distributed to the corresponding Chapter Chairman and brought to the attention of the members at a chapter meeting.

2. Please follow Resolution No. 11, adopted at 61st Georgia Society State Conference, as follows: "Resolved, That a closing date of February 1 be established for all reports, and all reports be given from February 1 to February 1, regardless of a change of regime or Regent." All awards will be made on this date basis.

State Officers and State Chairmen shall send to the State Regent and to the State Treasurer a copy of any instruction letter mailed to chapters.

"Resolved, that it is the judgment of the Executive Board that announcements for State Regent should not be made . . . earlier than three months prior to the meeting of the Conference and they shall be furnished to the Press for publication."

Proceedings

Three copies of the Proceedings will be sent to each Chapter. One copy to be retained by Regent, one copy given to the Chapter Treasurer and one copy for use in the Chapter. Additional copies, if available, must be secured from the State Recording Secretary at \$1.00 per copy, plus 25 cents for postage if to be mailed.

Reports for Proceedings

State Officers', State Chairmen's and Chapter Regents' reports for Proceedings shall be as concise as possible—not to exceed 250 words—typewritten (DOUBLE SPACED) upon one side of three-hole punched, unruled paper, 8½ by 11 inches, and shall be sent to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary on or before February 15, the ORIGINAL being sent to the Secretary for the Proceedings, CHAPTERS COMPETING FOR THE HONOR ROLL, BY FEBRUARY 1.

A standard HEADING of ALL reports must conform to the Headings found in the Proceedings and must start at least 1½ inches from top of sheet of paper. Leave 1 inch between bottom of Heading and start of report. LEFT MARGIN of report must be 1 inch minimum. Please check previous Proceedings for correct heading. Winners of awards of State Officers and State Chairmen shall be listed on a SEPARATE sheet of paper. State Officers and State Chairmen send to the State Recording Secretary and the State Regent, the awards to be given next year on a SEPARATE sheet of paper — exactly as it is to be printed in the Proceedings.
