

#### GEORGIA DELEGATION MEETING EIGHTY-THIRD CONTINENTAL CONGRESS WASHINGTON-APRIL 15, 1974

The annual meeting of the Georgia Delegation to Continental Congress was held in the Colonial Room of the Mayflower Hotel, Washington, D.C., at 2:15 p.m. on Monday, April 15, 1974, Mrs. Arthur H. Waite, State Regent, presiding. The State Chaplain, Mrs. John Inman Bell, Jr., opened the meeting with prayer. Mrs. Young Harris Yarbrough, Honorary State Regent, led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America. Miss Martha Cooper, Vice President General from Georgia, was introduced, as were the Honorary State Regents present, including Mesdames Yarbrough, Wallace, Stribling, Humphrey, Thigpen, Reid and Richardson. Members were asked to register with Mrs. Wysong, State Corresponding Secretary, giving name, Chapter and Washington address. Mrs. Waite then presented the State Officers present. They included Mesdames Watson, Bahin, Bell, Wysong, DeLamar, Terry, Kantala and Peterson.

Mrs. Watson, State First Vice Regent, announced that tickets to the Georgia Dinner were still available. The State Regent also stated that there were 154 Georgia Daughters who signed the register at Congress and that Georgia had two buses coming to Washington. The State Regent announced that Mrs. Henry Allan Ironside, Honorary Vice President General, was present for Congress. She announced that Georgia's two candidates for national office would have box seats for all sessions. that honorary State Regents would fill the remainder of the seats in the Georgia box in the evenings, and members of the Georgia Delegation would fill them during the day. Mrs. Waite asked that she be informed of any awards to be received by chapters, if such awards were announced to the chapters in advance. It was announced that Brier Creek Chapter received national commendation for weekly publicity on the Bicentennial: that Georgia had won the Evelyn Cole Peters award for the second time, and that Georgia would receive second place for Motion Picture work. Members were urged to go to see the Press Book. Mrs. Reid and Mrs. Richardson invited members to visit their respective campaign headquarters. Proposed Bylaws changes were explained. Mrs. Waite presented Mrs. Luther L. Watson, State Regent-elect.

She told of the installation of the new State Regent and State Regent and State First Vice Regent to be held on Friday morning, April 19, 1974. Mrs. Watson announced that Georgia would have six tables at the President General's Banquet on Friday evening. #### GEORGIA DINNER - CONTINENTAL CONGRESS APRIL 16, 1974

STATE REGENT Mrs. Arthur H. Waite

In this report of the second year of my term as State Regent, I find it difficult to adequately express my thanks to the State Officers, Honorary State Regents, State Chairmen, Chapter Regents, and all Georgia Daughters for your loyalty, cooperation and confidence extended to me during these two wonderful years. Your many courtesies and gracious hospitality will always be among my most cherished memories. The tremendous and notable accomplishments of the State Society are evidence of your enthusiastic team work.

I have presided over all District meetings, Fall Board of Management and State Conference, traveled over 21,000 miles, not including the trips to Washington. With the 66 chapter visits last year, the 64 visits this year bring the total to 130. The Summer Packet was compiled and six letters of instruction and information mailed. I attended the April, October, and February National Board meetings, the first National DAR Historical Tour, Kate Duncan Smith Graduation in May and Dedication Day in October, Tamassee Board meeting in June and Founders Day in October. I also served as Hostess to the three out-of-state buses, Illinois, Michigan, Ohio, at Berry in October, and held several Meadow Garden Board meetings.

One of the highlights of the year was the visit to Augusta by Mr. Charles G. Dorman, Curator of Independence Mall, for consultation on Meadow Garden.

Much thought and concentration were given to the internal structure of the State Society work, resulting in up-dating and revising the State Bylaws. When the financial situation was analyzed it became obvious that registration for State Conference and the price of the Proceedings would have to be raised. Through your vote this was accomplished at State Conference.

My sincere thanks and appreciation go to the State Society for the Track and Field Area at Kate Duncan Smith, the lighting of the elementary school building and painting the May Erwin Talmadge Auditorium at Tamassee, the display cabinets in the Martha Berry Museum, and the creation of the "Walkways of Life" Memorial Garden at the Berry Museum. My deep appreciation also goes to my chapter, Cherokee, for serving as hostess to the State Conference and for the beautiful reception in my honor at the Governor's mansion.

We welcome the Augustin Clayton Chapter, Jonesboro, confirmed June 8, 1973, and the Mineral Springs Chapter, Nahunta, confirmed June 7, 1974, and offer congratulations to the new Organizing Regent in Covington.

The 83rd Continental Congress was a tremendous success with 153 Georgia Daughters registered, making this the largest Georgia delegation in history, 90 making the bus trip.,204 attending the Georgia Dinner and 61 attending the President General's Banquet. This record-breaking attendance held true at all other State functions.

My talks throughout the year concentrated on the so-called Equal Rights Amendment in an effort to alert the Daughters to the dangers of this amendment. The defeat of ERA by the House of Representatives was due in great measure, I am sure, to the work of the Georgia Daughters.

I am honored to serve on the Steering Committee of the DAR National Bicentennial Committee and the Georgia Bicentennial Commission.

Attending the State conferences of Florida and Virginia were a very pleasant highlight in completing my term as State Regent. I regret having to decline six other invitations to State conferences due to conflicts.

It was most gratifying the accept the certificate at Continental Congress for Georgia's 100% contribution to the "Gift to the Nation," which was over-subscribed by approximately \$600.00.

I want to thank you for the privilege of serving you, the Georgia Society and the National Society. I also want to express my sincere appreciation for being elected an Honorary State Regent and for your endorsement to run for Vice President General in 1975.

Each chapter reported having observed American History Month by presenting bronze and silver medals, certificate of awards, U.S. savings bonds, displaying posters, decorating American History Month windows and members using American History month stickers. A large number of Certificates of Appreciation were given in the essay contest on "A Child of 1776." #### STATE LIBRARIAN Mrs. R. T. Ragan

Fifty-eight chapters reported. All have Librarians. 4 books requested sent to NSDAR Library, also 14 others. 27 chapters contributed \$510.62 to National DAR Library work. Books given \$111.55, magazine subscriptions \$595.00, Seimes Microfilm \$56.00, and rebinding fund \$22.00. One chapter gave 2 pamphlets \$21.20 and Museum Library fund \$28.70.

Contributed State Archives Library \$565.50. Books given Archives valued \$371.30.

475 books of Historical and Genealogical value placed in local libraries amounting to \$7,982.12. Other books reported not valued. \$202.65 given for binding, and \$373.00 in cash donated. Books given other libraries valued \$42.50.

Chapters reported collection of many years DAR magazines bound for their libraries. One chapter donated Microfilm Reader at \$200.00, others Microfilm reels. Another typed list of 158 histories of Revolutionary soldiers for National, Archives and Washington Memorial Libraries.

# Committee Reports National Committees

# AMERICAN HERITAGE Mrs. Robert W. Harrison, Jr.

It has been a privilege and pleasure to serve as American Heritage Chairman under the very capable leadership of our State Regent, Mrs. Arthur Waite.

98 chapters reported their work in American Heritage and the reports revealed the enthusiasm of members. Many of the activities created interest throughout the communities.

Art shows, antique shows, displays of needlework, glass, pewter and silver, old bottles, dolls and many other items were shown at meetings and in various business houses. Most of the chapters had a program on music or included it as a part of a program. Books and original skits and papers were sent to the NSDAR library.

Publicity from these projects have stimulated interest in chapters, have been beneficial toward increasing membership and have helped to make the public aware of our great American Heritage.

#### AMERICAN INDIANS Mrs. Robert F. Larkin

I received reports from 69 chapters. \$253.50 was contributed to "Bricks for St. Mary's" and \$48.00 for scholarships. Chapters sent clothing and other items valued at \$989.45 to the St. Mary's Thrift Shop. \$250.50 was contributed to the National Project at Bacone, \$48.00 for scholarships and \$579.00 worth of clothing and other items for the Thrift Shop. \$286.00 was earmarked for the American Indian General Fund. One chapter contributed \$30.00 to the WRBT TV 3 American Indian Scholarship Fund and \$20.00 to the Crow Indian Boys Home.

Thirty (30) chapters had programs on the American Indian, 2 of which were presented by the State Chairman. Dr. Garold D. Holstine, President of Bacone College, spoke to one chapter. Another chapter heard Miss Carroll Hart, Director of the Georgia Department of Archives and History, who spoke on William McIntosh. Other programs included a young girl in authentic Indian dress who recited a story-poem, an informative talk on Mary Musgrove, Professor John A. Tumblin, Jr. from Agnes Scott College, "The Folklore of American Indians", and "The Cherokees Valuable Knowledge in Preserving the Land." Several chapters made trips to the Ocmulgee Mounds in Macon, the Vann House, and the Etowah Mounds.

Several chapters assisted with First American Week, an annual event in Columbus. Indians gather for a week of special programs and banquets and tell their story on WRBL-TV.

#### AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP Mrs. W. T. Gillham

Forty-Eight (48) chapters reported that all repeated the American's Creed. 46 had Americanism programs in the chapters and 18 gave pro-

grams to others: C.A.R., social studies classes and Girl Scouts. 15 radio programs (7<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> hours time) on Americanism. Four chapters had TV programs. Eight chapters studied American's Creed as special project. 830 DAR Manuals for Citizenship were given to Americanism classes and new citizens. 604 American flags, 1381 leaflets, 528 Welcome cards and 1 tea were given to new citizens. Three chapters worked with Americanism classes; 3 chapters attended Naturalization courts; 583 hours were given by chapter members serving on committees to reduce illiteracy and social problems. Americanism Awards were given to Naturalized Citizens by Vidalia, Hawkinsville, Gov. George Towns, Ft. Peachtree, Lyman Hall and John Floyd Chapters. Medals of Honor were given to native-born Americans by Joseph Habersham, Hawkinsville, and Gov. George Towns Chapters. Congratulations to Baron DeKalb, Vidalia, Oglethorpe and George Walton Chapters.

#### CONSERVATION Mrs. Raiferd L. Drew

It isn't possible in this limited space to report the many and varied conservation efforts of our members, but after all it's the doing and not the reporting that really counts.

Fifty (50) chapters reported. As in the past, members planted trees, 1913, shrubs, bulbs; fed birds and wildlife with over 8 tons of food; stocked lakes; cleaned and beautified their communities. These things are important and must be continued; however, there are other aspects of conservation, and it is encouraging to learn that many Georgia Daughters are realizing the serious problems confronting us and are attempting solutions.

At least 38 chapters had conservation programs, some given by experts in the field of ecology. Most are following guidelines for saving fuel and energy. Where possible recycling is being done. Several members traveled over the state speaking to interested groups. Many women wrote or contacted legislators and attended hearings and meetings concerning environmental issues such as protection of rivers, marshlands, seashores, wilderness areas.

We have a second American heritage of abundant natural resources, unpolluted water and air which we've abused. We can never restore all that is lost, but it is our duty to clean up our earth for our descendants. We must make some radical changes in our life style and soon. In order to do so we must first really care, second, study and become well informed, third, inform others and fourth, let government and industry know our wishes.

Make no mistake; our voices are heard and heeded.

Each winner received a \$5.00 award from the Georgia State Society. Miss Deborah L. Gathany was chosen State Good Citizen. She was a guest of the State Society at State Conference in Atlanta at which time she was presented a State Good Citizen pin and a \$100 bond. She was entered in competition for the National Good Citizen.

Miss Elizabeth Moses of Montgomery County High School, our State Good Citizen last year, was third runner-up in competition for National Good Citizen. She was sponsored by the Vidalia Chapter.

# DAR MUSEUM Miss Ethel Montgomery

Letters of information and instruction were sent to all chapters in September. Questionnaires for reporting were sent the first of January. Of the 98 chapters, 80 sent in reports, of these 70 made monetary contributions.

A total sum of \$1075.95 was contributed for all Museum funds. Contributions for the proposed Georgia Period Room led with the sum of \$435.00. Twenty chapters had full programs on the Museum, eight chapters having part-time programs. Three programs were given by the State Curator and Advisor to the Museum, Mrs. Hugh Peterson and three were given by the State Chairman of Museum; all others were given by chapter members, seven chapters using Museum slides.

Two books were bought for the Museum Reference Library.

In the past year, the State Chairman has attended the State Conference, Continental Congress, one District Meeting, and the Board of Management Meeting. Grateful appreciation goes to the chapters whose work has made this report possible.

#### DAR SCHOOL Mrs. Louis Joseph Bahin

Eighty-seven chapters reported, with totals showing that \$14,296.71 was contributed to the schools, including the per capita from the State Dues Fund, and the \$700.00 allocated for a project honoring the State Regent. At Kate Duncan Smith this project was the development of a Track and Field Area, to be completed this summer. At Tamassee the funds will be used for painting and repairing the School and the May Er-

win Talmadge Auditorium. All scholarship funds will honor the late Mrs. Talmadge. A \$1000.00 scholarship was given to KDS honoring Mrs. Herman M. Richardson, National Chairman of Membership, and a \$1000.00 scholarship to Tamassee honoring Miss Amanda Thomas, National Chairman of DAR Schools, gifts of a member through her chapter. At Berry, a Memorial Walkway will be constructed from the Museum to original sites of the school, in memory of Miss Berry. An itemized statement of amounts to the individual schools appears in the report of the State Treasurer.

Four hundred sixty-six boxes of clothing, weighing 11,953 pounds, were sent at a transportation cost of \$704.01, plus 3 carloads and many boxes, not weighed, and carried by members on visits to Tamassee, KDS and Crossnore, and on one bus trip to KDS. A console sewing machine, pencil sharpener and 4 large boxes of books were also delivered. Free freight was obtained by 7 chapters from the following lines: Georgia Highway Express; United Parcels (Baxley); Owens Freight Line; Brown Transport Co., Five Transportation; and Overnite Transportation. 12 chapters sent books of trading stamps to Crossnore and Tamassee.

Programs on the schools included: Tamassee 66; KDS 65; Berry 33; and other Approved Schools 42. It was my privilege to accept invitations from 12 chapters where I presented the program and/or spoke on the schools.

Forty-six chapters received the Hightower Award.

#### DAR SERVICE FOR VETERAN-PATIENTS Mrs. A. C. Rogers

Chapters reporting: 78. Certified: 5. 36 members gave 555 hours in VA Hospitals. \$175.00 for Canteen books. Activities in Veteran, Military, Naval, Private Hospitals, in Convalescent, Nursing or Private homes:

1695 hours in 1103 personal visits. 18 parties - 50 participating - Value \$242.24. 519 gifts to patients - Value \$1,897.10. 41 gifts to hospitals -Value \$92.00. 7 programs involving 19 members - Value \$15.00. Patriotic days commemorated 13 times using 10 hours of time. In Public Relations 18 talks, 8 newstories using 8 inches, 6 news pictures published using 6 inches and 4 radio talks using 95 minutes - value \$400.00. 125 ounces of stamps, plus 275, unweighed, sent to Stamps for the Wounded. One Chapter had eight members helping with this project.

Following items, mostly to VA Hospitals: 199 paper-backs, 94 hardbacks, 882 magazines, 85 Christmas cards, 25 Christmas stockings, 151 stationery items, 18 pair socks, 12 handkerchiefs, 12 pair pajamas, 29 lap-robes, 16 wheel-chair bags, 14 game items, 30 packs gum, buckets and pounds of candy, cookies, 8 turkeys, home-made foods, home-grown flowers, and assorted gift collections. 4 Flags for the Blind made, \$150.00 worth of items to Disabled Veterans, \$10.00 gift to Marine Library, and 47 Certificates of Honor presented to deceased Veterans families.

Interesting and unusual activities: Memorial Day Parade, Mother's Day Buffet, providing music for Chapel Services and other musical programs - even for Veteran patient's wedding. On Sundays one husband rolled Veterans to Chapel services. One member befriends a blind Veteran every day, even takes him to Church on Sunday. Flags placed on Veteran's graves, bracelets worn for POW's, and one Chapter member even talked another club to which she belonged into giving money to the VA. Special appreciation goes to the Chapter giving assistance to C.A.R.'s in their State Project - helping Veterans! — and to the Chapter not forgetting our lady Veterans also! Working on this Committee with the Chapters and for our able State Regent has been a pleasure.

# GENEALOGICAL RECORDS Dr. Jessie J. Mize

Forty-five chapters contributed material this year, yielding a total page count of 10,689. Seventy-seven chapters reported. The quality and content of work was very commendable.

Three Volumes containing miscellaneous records have been arranged alphabetically by Chapter name, paged, indexed and are being bound. Three sets will be distributed as follows: original manuscripts to Genealogical Records Committee, NSDAR; first carbon to Georgia Department of Archives and History; second carbon to Washington Memorial Library (Macon). Additional material was placed in local and regional libraries. Ten volumes, separately bound, have been distributed, also.

# JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS Mrs. James F. Ellis

This year finds 12 chapters involved in Junior American Citizens and participating on some level of the committee work . . . organizing clubs,

entering contests, etc. This is an increase in chapter participation of 33-1/3% statewide. The 185 more clubs reported represent a healthy interest of Georgia chapters in the youth of our state, and a willingness to support and guide them.

One of our Georgia JAC girls was given a distinct honor last spring, when the National JAC Chairman awarded her one of nine special awards given across our nation in recognition of her outstanding contest entry. This was a poster of precancelled Bicentennial stamps which is a collectors item. There were 24 National winners in the JAC contest from Georgia. Upon the recommendation of your state chairman, four JAC leaders from Georgia received a Continental Congress Citation for Outstanding Leadership and Dedication. Your state chairman awarded 9 Thatcher pins to the sponsors deserving merit for their service in JAC. Georgia received recognition from Continental Congress for 2nd place as state with the largest number of JAC clubs, and 2nd place for the state with the largest number of JAC members.

Thanks go to the 49 chapters who returned the JAC questionnaire. It has been a joy to hear from you, and a privilege to work with you.

# JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP Mrs. J. R. Frey, Jr.

The Juniors of Georgia have been very active this year. We have made \$843.21 for the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund through the sale of Jewelart Jewelry, Insignia Stationery, a Continental Breakfast, Junior Bazaars, and the Junior State Project, and your contributions. We have 132 new Junior members this year. Reports from individual chapters show that the Juniors have been busy workers on chapter projects, as committee chairmen, and as chapter officers. Some are State Committee Chairmen and we also have a National Vice-Chairman.

Many thanks to all the Juniors and to each of you in the chapters for all your help and support. Our special thanks to the John Franklin Wren Chapter for donating the Afghan for this year's State Project.

#### LINEAGE RESEARCH Mrs. E. Lee Stephenson

95 of our 98 Chapters reported. 348 new Chapter members, 3 members at large. 314 of this number received assistance to some degree from Chapter chairmen, Regent, Registrar or state and national committee.

80 C.A.R.s were assisted; 26 S.A.R.s; 15 SRs given assistance with applications in forming a new Chapter. 96 out-of-state queries were answered, giving valuable help in most cases.

16 chapters reported no new members.

Six Chapters held workshops; 46 had programs on lineage research. 136 books donated to research shelves in libraries. 156 magazines; 12 census records in printed form, 251 total. 53 microfilms of census records: \$424.00 in value. A reader for microfilm and a copying machine were given to a new research and history room at the Bradley Memorial Library, the three Columbus chapters cooperating in this Bicentennial Project.

263 DAR members attended the workshops. Two large workshops were held, one in Macon, one in Savannah, DARs cooperating with Washington Memorial Library, Macon, and Georgia Historical Society in Savannah. 175 pages were published in magazines of genealogical materials; 36 pages by the chapter chairman who conducted monthly workshops open to the public in Statesboro. Seven County Histories were compiled; 2 published; 51 Family Histories were compiled.

I have enjoyed working with our charming State Regent, all of the state officers and chairmen, and chapter chairmen. My thanks to each of you for your splendid work.

#### MEMBERSHIP Mrs. Claude H. Blount, Jr.

The total membership of the Georgia State Society as of February 1, 1974 was 7286. This year we have 393 new members of which 132 are Juniors and 4 of these Juniors are transfers from C.A.R. Thirty-three members were dropped from our rolls. Fifty-one chapters had a gain in membership as did our at-large membership and 17 remained the same. We have one new chapter, Augustin Clayton with 21 members. It has been a pleasure working with the Membership Commission and all of the Chapters. The cooperation of everyone and the fine leadership of our State Regent, Mrs. Waite made it possible for us to have an increase in membership of 105.

## MOTION PICTURE Miss Leila Summerall

Reports from the Chapters show that many DAR members are intensely interested and concerned about the type of motion pictures shown in the theaters. Many are urging the theater managers to do all they can to secure pictures suitable for young people as well as for older people.

Many thanks to the Chapters participating in Motion Picture projects. Thanks to Mrs. Arthur H. Waite, State Regent for giving me the privilege of working with this Committee. My appreciation to Mrs. Charles Todd Lee, National Chairman, who has been most helpful with her suggestions.

# NATIONAL DEFENSE

#### Mrs. Luther L. Watson

National Defense reports were received from 72 of the 98 chapters in the state. Sixty-five chapters had at least one entire meeting devoted to timely National Defense subjects such as: The Armed Forces and Military Strength of the U.S., Patriotism, Russian Trade, Equal Rights Amendment, and the Energy Crisis.

Sixty-eight chapters devoted at least five minutes of each meeting to National Defense, 39 chapters gave more time, 56 chapters studied the 1973 resolutions, 63 chapters had National Defense material at chapter meetings, and 59 chapters made National Defense material available to interested individuals.

Chapters reported presenting a total of 366 Good Citizenship Medals, 33 of these chapters presenting them at school assemblies. Baron DeKalb chapter presented 92 medals.

Twenty-one chapters participated in ROTC Medal project, giving 25 bronze medals and 7 gold medals. John Houstoun Chapter presented a sabre.

A total of \$575.25 was contributed by 47 chapters for Dollars for Defense. Thirty-seven chapters increased subscriptions to the National Defense mailing.

There was an increase from last year reported in the number of interested individuals who wrote their congressman or senator (form 260-556).

Topics of great interest to chapters this year were: Equal Rights Amendment, Soviet-American Trade, Red Military Build-up, Panama Canal, Closing of Census Records, Detente', Genocide Treaty, Education in Public Schools, and Effect of Decaying Politics on American Way of Life.

Several chapters requested that NSDAR fight obscenity on television, and to keep up interest on HB7762 which concerns the closing of certain census records.

She attended State Board of Management Meeting, all the District Meetings, and State Conference.

The coverage was more varied and more fully told the DAR Story. The State Regent's visits to the Chapters, Good Citizenship Awards, Constitution Week, American History Month, Schools, and guest speakers were given good coverage. Graves of Revolutionary soldiers and graves of DAR members were marked. Chapter Histories were printed as were articles of historical interest.

Five chapters sent entries for the national feature story competition. Archibald Bulloch Chapter submitted the best single feature article and Vidalia Chapter the best series. These were sent for National competition.

It was a pleasure to have had this contact with the University of Georgia, the nation's oldest state-chartered university and celebrating its 189th anniversary on January 27th, 1974.

Ten Chapters reported local funds; please in the future give the total amount of money invested. Georgia has made a great contribution in the educational field and it would be well for our state to get **this credit**.

Special recognition to Joseph Habersham, Cherokee, Abraham Baldwin, Oliver Morton, George Walton, Andrew Houser, and Archibald Bulloch for excellent work.

# THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

## Mrs. A. C. Earl Shepherd

Although only 61 of 98 Chapters reported, many outstanding reports were submitted with increased interest shown in flag work over that reported last year.

63 large and 512 small flags presented. 372 flag code posters were purchased and used as displays in banks, libraries, post offices, community fairs; Patriots' display at City Square and schools. Posters were given to schools. Several Chapters used posters that had been purchased prior to 1973. 14 Braille Flags made and given to Georgia Federation of the Blind, VA Hospital and blind people in the local county. 10 made by one Chapter.

Two outstanding programs: One, "Evolution of the American Flag," written and given at Chapter meeting by the Flag Chairman was sent directly to Program Committee with appropriate slides. Another was written and presented to a Chapter by an 8th grade student. One Chapter presented a flag strip program to 20 classes in a county school.

29 Chapters gave flag literature to newspapers, schools, Naturalized Citizens, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Boys Clubs, Churches, Members, Garden Clubs, Senior Citizens and Homemakers' Council. 1173 codes; bookmarkers with Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States booklets on **Our Flag and Our Presidents** and **The Flag of the U.S.A.**; the book, **The Flag of the US, Symbol of our Republic** and posters were among the items of literature presented.

31 Chapters had entire programs, 60 partial and 44 given to other organizations. Publicity included 101 newspaper, 116 radio and 9 TV.

#### TRANSPORTATION

#### Mrs. William R. Craven, Jr.

Forty-two chapters reported 29 historical trips, 18 programs on traffic safety and 32 chapters felt that their attendance was increased at meetings due to the efforts of the Chapter Transportation Chairman. Many chapters distributed literature on safety.

The bus trip to Continental Congress was very successful with two full bus loads, one from Atlanta and one from Macon, making the trip. We changed to the Howard Johnson Motel in Washington and everyone seemed very pleased.

# Special National Committee Reports

## AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH Mrs. Knight Smothers

American History Month 1974 has been a most rewarding experience for this chairman. To all of the local chairmen from every Chapter my sincere thanks for your kindness and response in many ways this year. I am pleased to report an increase of 14 reports over last year. 80 chapter reports included: 179 schools participated, 31 for the first time; 3,221 contestants. 117 Bronze Medals, 30 Silver Medals and 9 books, 12 cash prizes, 345 History Certificates were awarded. 1,287 Certificates of Appreciation were presented. Reported were 61 school assemblies, 25 school paper articles, 135 class discussions. 30 schools using spot announcements, 93 chapter programs. 8 scripts were sent to the National Chairman. There were 47 American History Month displays, 152 displays of American History Month posters, 945 stickers. 113 medals for Excellence in American History awarded; 204 Certificates and \$167.00 given. 239 newspaper or magazine articles published and 118 pictures published with a total of 1,608 inches. 722 sets of spot announcements used; 25 members appeared on radio with a total of 2000 minutes: 130 spots and 14 members appeared on TV for a total of 43.417 minutes. 56 letters were written to Senators on behalf of legislation permanently designating February as "American History Month."

# **ByLaws**

# BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE

## NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE

# AMERICAN REVOLUTION

# Article I

# NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

# Article II

#### **OBJECTS**

The objects of the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution shall be: to promote the aims set forth in the Bylaws of the National Society; the preservation of the memory of its Revolutionary patriots; the study of its history; the education of its youth in patriotic ideals and in the duties of citizenship.

# Article III MEMBERSHIP

All Chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of this organization.

# Article IV OFFICERS

The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Curator. The State Regent shall appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as adviser in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting.

## Article V ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected at the annual State Conference biennially.

Section 2. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two years or until their successors are elected. Their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and of the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Section 3. No member shall be eligible to a State office until she has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years. No member shall be eligible to the same State office for two successive terms. A member having served more than one-half term in the State office shall be deemed to have served a term. Any member holding active membership in a Chapter in the Georgia State Society shall be eligible to hold a State office, provided she has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years.

Section 4. Nominations of candidates for office shall be from the floor. The election shall be held by ballot. A majority of the votes cast by the voting members of the State Conference shall elect.

Section 5. Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become acting First Vice Regent, subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. A vacancy in any other State office between annual meetings shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. An election shall be held at the next State Conference to fill the unexpired term. Any State Officer, who is absent from the State for a continuous period of six months or longer, automatically relinquishes her position as a State officer.

Section 6. No two State officers shall be members of the same Chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

Section 7. In recognition of valuable service to the organization, any State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Section 8. A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot. The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than fifteen months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

Section 9. On the election of State Regent, and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Recording Secretary General. The endorsement of a candidate for Vice President General shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent to the Recording Secretary General at least two weeks prior to Continental Congress.

#### Article VI

## DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, of the State Board of Management, and of the Executive Committee. She shall attend all regular meetings of the National Board of Management. She shall appoint a State Chairman for the work ofeach of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees. Section 2. In the absence of the State Regent from any meeting of the State Conference, or the State Board of Management, the State First Vice Regent, or in her absence, the State Second Vice Regent, shall perform the duties of the State Regent. The State First and Second Vice Regents may be assigned to direct committees and to perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent.

Section 3. The State Chaplain shall open all meetings of the State Conference and of the State Board of Management with Scripture reading and prayer and shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require. She shall preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and shall be responsible for the In Memoriam pages in the Proceedings.

Section 4. The State Recording Secretary shall record the proceedings of the State Conference and of meetings of the State Board of Management and of the Executive Committee. She shall compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and of the Proceedings Committee.

Section 5. The State Corresponding Secretary shall conduct correspondence and send notices in behalf of the State Conference, the State Regent, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as directed by them.

Section 6. The State Treasurer shall be the custodian of the funds of the State Society. She shall receive the State Conference dues and registration fees from the Chapters and shall receive all sums contributed by the Chapters for State and National projects. All monies received by the State Treasurer shall be placed in a Bank which is a member of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. She shall disburse such sums only when authorized by the State Board of Management of the State Society. Incidental expenses shall be paid from the State Dues Fund when authorized by the State Regent in writing. The State Treasurer shall keep an account of all sums received or paid out and shall keep receipts for all payments. She shall prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference. Her books shall be audited annually by a Certified Public Accountant. She shall be ex-officio a member of the Credentials Committee.

Section 7. The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new Chapters.

Section 8. The State Registrar shall, when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, who live in towns and counties in which there are no Chapters, to prove eligibility, and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars in verifying lineage papers. She shall keep a correct list of all members in the State and shall make a report on membership to the State Conference.

Section 9. The State Historian shall be in charge of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General. She shall keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves in the State and shall prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General to Smithsonian Institution. She shall encourage the compilation and publication of County Histories and other unpublished records, especially those of the Revolutionary period. Section 10. The State Librarian shall collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing duplicates, wherever possible, in the NSDAR Library and in the Georgia DAR Collections in the State Department of Archives and History. She shall endeavor to obtain the books on the wanted list of the Librarian General for the Georgia Section in the NSDAR Library and is authorized to solicit contributions from the Chapters for the purchase of the same. She shall have custody and supervision of the DAR Genealogical and Historical Collections of the State Department of Archives and History.

Section 11. The State Curator shall receive and be responsible for all gifts of Revolutionary relics to the Museum of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution. She shall be the custodian of the conference properties and shall have them properly stored, insured and made ready for use at State Conference.

# Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. The Georgia State Society shall hold an annual State Conference between the first day of February and the time of the meeting of the Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week. The Executive Committee shall fix the time and place of meetings when not fixed by the Conference in session, or when for any reason it may be impracticable to meet at the time or place fixed by the Conference.

Section 2. The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credential blanks to the Chapters not less than sixty days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 3. The voting members of the State Conference shall be State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regent or alternate, and the delegates or their alternates from the Chapters of the state, that are entitled to representation at the Continental Congress. The number of representatives from each Chapter shall be determined by the rules for representation of Chapters in the Continental Congress as given in the National Bylaws.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a Chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the Chapter, except in the case of the Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. No member shall hold, at the same time, two offices carrying a vote at the annual State Conference.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any Chapter in the State of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference the privileges of the floor shall be accorded to the State Chairmen with the exception that they may not vote unless they are duly elected delegates or their alternates from their respective chapters. Section 8. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen days notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Twenty-five voting members, representing not less than ten Chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

## Article VIII

## STATE DUES AND CONFERENCE FEES

Section 1. The annual dues of Chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be one dollar for each member of the Chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before February 1. Seventy cents of this amount shall be allocated to the general State Dues Fund and thirty cents shall be used to cover all State required per capita assessments. No Chapter shall be entitled to representation at the annual State Conference until the State dues are paid.

Section 2. The Finance Committee, appointed by the State Regent, shall be composed of seven members, to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two Honorary State Regents, one active Chapter Regent, and one active Chapter member. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund.

Section 3. Each Chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State Dues, a Conference registration fee of \$3.00 for each voter to which the Chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Section 4. State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$3.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference fee at the time of registration.

# Article IX

# EXPENSES

Section 1. One thousand dollars shall be taken each year from the State Dues Fund, to be used by the State Regent in defraying her necessary traveling expenses.

Section 2. Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent shall be paid by the State Treasurer from the State Dues Fund.

## Article X

## STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regents of the Chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management. Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the Fall, following the regular meeting of the National Board. It may meet whenever called by the State Regent.

Section 3. Ten members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference.

Section 5. State Chairmen, Vice Chairmen and Committee Members of National and Standing Committees shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privileges of the floor, but may not vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

#### Article XI

## EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute an Executive Committee. The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, attends the meetings of the Executive Committee, but may not vote. This Committee performs such duties of the Board between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three members of the Committee. It shall make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

## Article XII

## CHAPTERS

Section 1. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April or May. The Chapter Regent shall report the names of the elected officers promptly, on triplicate blanks provided by the State Regent for this purpose, to the Organizing Secretary General, to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary.

Section 2. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent for use in compiling her report, not less than fifteen days before the opening of the annual State Conference. The official Chapter report, not to exceed 250 words in length, for publication in the Proceedings shall be furnished the State Recording Secretary before the State Conference.

# Article XIII AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent and to the Parliamentarian. The State Regent shall send a copy to each Chapter and each voting member, at least sixty days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the call to Conference. Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

# Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law for the State Conference in matters not covered by the Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

# State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan. State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21). No conference was held in 1911; the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912"; amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta, "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, p. 21).

## ACT OF INCORPORATION

## Awards

All chapters competing for awards must send reports to the respective chairmen by February 1, 1975.

All reports for awards are based on membership confirmed by the National Society as of February 1 of preceding year (1974).

#### **Bylaws**

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National and State Bylaws.

#### **Change of Address**

Notice of change of address of members shall be sent to the Organizing Secretary General, Treasurer General, State Regent and State Registrar.

## **Change of Name**

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to State Registrar, Treasurer General and State Regent.

## **Chapter Elections**

Chapter elections shall be held preferably in April or early May and names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, Administration Building, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20006, to the State Regent, and to the State Recording Secretary. The full Christian name of Chapter officers shall be given together with her husband's given name or initials, address and zip code.

#### Dues

Pay to State Treasurer State Dues of \$1.00 per member preferably on or before January 1, not later than February 1. National Dues of \$7.00 per member sent to the Treasurer General, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20006, before January 1, 1975.

## **Conference Registration Fee**

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State dues (on or before January 1, not later than February 1), \$3.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Rules for representation of chapters at Continental Congress: "Chapters having less than 50 paid members on February 1 are entitled to be represented by the Regents or in her absence the Vice Regent or alternate; chapters having 50 to 199 paid members on February 1, one delegate in addition to the Regent; chapters having 200 to 299 paid members on February 1, two delegates in addition to the Regent, and for each additional 100 members one additional delegate." (Article XIII, Section 3-C, National Bylaws). State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$3.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. (Article VIII, Section 4, of the State Bylaws).

#### Contributions

All contributions by Chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

#### **Deceased Members**

Deaths shall be reported promptly to Treasurer General and State Chaplain. Complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and a date of death shall be furnished State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for Conference Memorial Service and "In Memoriam" pages for State Proceedings.

## **Georgia Hospitality Fund**

The following resolution which applies to the Georgia Hospitality Fund appears in the Proceedings for 1955:

"WHEREAS, The Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds an annual dinner in Washington each year during Continental Congress, which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society.

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$100.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes:

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this fund shall not be cumulative. Adopted."

## **GENERAL NEW REGIME FUND BALANCE \$2,500**

The following resolution which applies to the General New Regime Fund Balance of \$2,500.00 appears in the Proceedings for 1959-1960, page 41:

"RESOLVED, That at the end of each regime all money in the General Fund above \$2,500.00 be transferred to the Savings Account; when the Supplemental Audit Report is made as of June 1 every two years before the Auditors close out the books this transaction be handled in order to show in this Audit, thus making the General Fund show the same balance of \$2,500.00 at the beginning of each new regime. ADOPTED."

#### PROCEDURE BOOK OF INSTRUCTIONS FOR OFFICERS AND STATE CHAIRMEN

The following resolution which applies to a Procedure Book of Instruction for Officers and State Chairmen appears in the Proceedings for 1959-1960, Page 41. "RESOLVED, That all Officers and State Chairmen keep a Procedure Book of Instructions and helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new Officer and Chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities thus providing a continuing continuity of DAR work, ADOPTED.

## **Genealogical Records**

To insure uniformity and convenience in filing, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper,  $8^{1/2}$  by 11 inches with one-inch margins on left side and bottom, and one and one-half inches at top. One copy retained in Chapter Archives, and three copies shall be sent to the Chairman of Genealogical Records.

## Information for Chapter Regents

1. All letters received by Chapter Regents relating to the work of the Society shall be distributed to the corresponding Chapter Chairman and brought to the attention of the members at a chapter meeting.

2. Please follow Resolution No. 11, adopted at 61st Georgia Society State Conference, as follows: "Resolved, That a closing date of February 1 be established for all reports, and all reports be given from February 1 to February 1, regardless of a change of regime or Regent." All awards will be made on this date basis.

## Information for State Officers and State Chairmen

State Officers and State Chairmen shall send to the State Regent and to the State Treasurer a copy of any instruction letter mailed to chapters.

"Resolved, that it is the judgment of the Executive Board that announcements for State Regent should not be made... earlier than three months prior to the meeting of the Conference and they shall be furnished to the Press for publication."

#### Proceedings

Two copies of the Proceedings will be sent to each Chapter. One copy to be retained by Regent, one copy given to the Chapter Treasurer. Additional copies, if available, must be secured from the State Recording Secretary at \$2.00 per copy, plus 35 cents for postage if to be mailed.

#### **Reports for Proceedings**

State Officers', State Chairmen's and Chapter Regents' reports for Proceedings shall be as concise as possible-not to exceed 250 words-typewritten (DOUBLE SPACED) upon one side of three-hole punched, unruled paper, 8<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> by 11 inches, and shall be sent to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary on or before February 15, the ORIGINAL being sent to the Secretary for the Proceedings, CHAPTERS COMPETING FOR THE HONOR ROLL, BY FEBRUARY 1.

A standard HEADING of ALL reports must conform to the Headings found in the Proceedings and must start at least 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> inches from top of sheet of paper. Leave 1 inch between bottom of Heading and start of report. LEFT MARGIN of report must be 1 inch minimum. Please check previous Proceedings. for correct heading. Winners of awards of State Officers and State Chairmen shall be listed on a SEPARATE sheet of paper. State Officers and State Chairmen send to the State Recording Secretary and the State Regent, the awards to be given next year on a SEPARATE sheet of paper-exactly as it is to be printed in the Proceedings.
