# 1. Accounting policies -

The Georgia Society considers all contributions available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor.

The Georgia Society has prepared its financial statements on a cash basis for all years prior to May 31, 1975. The statement for the year ended May 31, 1976 was converted to the accrual basis of accounting. However, due to the nature of the accounts and operations of the Society, the accounting procedures have been converted back to the cash basis of accounting. Our report has been made on the cash basis.

It is the policy of the Georgia Society that property be expensed when purchased.

# 2. Prior period adjustments -

Since the records were converted to the cash basis of accounting for the year ended May 31, 1977, it was necessary to record several adjustments to the beginning balances as follows:

Ocmulgee Chapter in Warner Robins was officially disbanded in June, leaving us with 101 chapters.

At the National Board Meeting in October, Mrs. Buxton Daniel was appointed Organizing Regent to form a chapter in Claxton.

# STATE REGISTRAR

Letters of instruction detailing procedures for reporting membership changes were given to each chapter. About 75 chapters are up-to-date on their reporting. This year chapter treasurers were sent a third copy of the membership print-out from the Treasurer General's office, which copy was to be mailed to the state Registrar. Since our Society is increasingly on the move, this is an effective method for your Registrar to have the current address of each member. This year we had 424 new admissions of which 128 were Juniors, with 11 transferring from C. A. R.; and 57 reinstatements. For the fourteenth consecutive year the Georgia State Society has shown an increase in membership. This year's increase of 178 (last year active members 7435; this year active members 7613) shows 58 chapters with an increase and 10 chapters remaining the same. This net gain of 178 exceeds any net gain in the past twenty years. New chapters that have been added are Lady Huntingdon, Robert Loughridge and College Hill.

I have enjoyed my association with the chapters and it has been a privilege to serve under the capable leadership of our State Regent.

# AMERICAN HERITAGE

Only 53 Chapters reported, but their enthusiasm and fine work were outstanding. Programs were combined with Bicentennial, Indian, the Flag, American History, Americanism, Conservation and Museum. Programs covered the Arts, Crafts, Drama and Literature, Music and family Heritage with emphasis on Drama and Music. Accent on heritage in the community as inspired by our DAR Chapters is very gratifying. There were dramas, pageants, parade floats, booths and displays in various community activities. One Chapter completed the restoration of an historic home in the area, one helped establish a Heritage Center. Most emphasized our heritage at Chapter meetings with American music and displays of some sort. The National Anthem was included in most Chapter meetings. Three programs were sent to the National Program Office and six articles sent to the DAR Magazine. Three Chapters entered the National Poetry Contest. The response to the State Special Project of collecting heirloom histories and family legend anecdotes for a State Heritage Booklet was not as great as hoped for, but should be much better next year. We are especially pleased to present the National American Heritage Certificate for outstanding achievement to Brier Creek Chapter, Sylvania.

# AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP

Four Medal of Honor awards were given this year. Application for two Americanism awards were submitted and are awaiting approval.

The American's Creed was repeated at meetings by 68 chapters. 53 chapters had an Americanism program. 1,780 Manuals for Citizenship were given for use in Americanization classes and 254 were purchased for other groups.

11 members worked with Americanization classes. Flags, flag codes, American's Creed cards and other patriotic gifts and literature were presented.

Hawkinsville Chapter presented DAR Manuals for Citizenship to foreign brides of two American soldiers and secured someone to teach them. The girls were naturalized in July 1976.

It is hoped that other chapters will report interesting ways of carrying out the work of this committee.

#### CONSERVATION

61 chapters reported activities. Thirteen chapters reported Bi-centennial Conservation Projects. Holly trees were planted at a civic center in memory of Georgia's Revolutionary Patriots and a bronze marker was unveiled. Ginkgo trees were planted at a government center by 3 chapters with plans for placing a bronze marker. Other activities included the planting of 100 pine trees, the planting of trees in a park as a living memorial to the spirit of the USA. This chapter raised \$300 to purchase trees and bronze plaque. Chestnuts were distributed to chapter members to be planted in January. One NSDAR Conservation Medal was awarded to a Chapter member. A local ordinance was acquired to forbid cutting of trees without sanction of the city council. A "Neighborhood Bird Project" was sponsored and new feeders with bird feed were put up throughout the entire neighborhood. 14 chapters participated in youth education work in schools, 4-H clubs, Scouts and C. A. R. 2 DAR members teach conservation in schools. A chapter spoke to 4 scout groups. 43 chapters had conservation programs on energy conservation, wood fiber needs, recycling, clean air, wild life and legislation. A chapter had "Plant a Tree For Century Three" project. Many "Bicentennial Trees" were planted. A chapter reports collecting glass, selling it to a bottling company and sending profits to Meadow Gardens, 8 chapters fostered tree stand improvement; 4 had "Adopt a Tree" projects. Much interest shown in energy conservation.

97 out of 101 chapters contributed \$15,356.58 to the schools with reports received from 96. Tamassee — State Regents project, the lobby of the Smith Mettetal Building, \$4,666.00; Scholarships \$1,941.00; other gifts \$733.00. Kate Duncan Smith — State Regents project, renovation of a room in Old Main, \$3,316.08; Scholarships \$1,465.00; other gifts \$90.00. Berry — State Regents project \$1,053.50; Scholarships \$693.50. Total gifts to Crossnore \$617.00; Hillside \$345.00; Hindman Settlement \$436.50. 59 chapters reported full school programs with 6 being given by the state chairman. Several chapters had 10 minute school reports each month. Representatives of 20 chapters visited the schools personally delivering boxes while 10 others received free freight. 585 boxes weighing 12,954 pounds were sent at a cost of \$529.99. Newspapers published 43 articles and 7 pictures on the DAR Schools. Information and instruction booklets have been prepared for each new chapter to help them with their work for our schools. 55 chapters received Hightower award.

# DAR SERVICE FOR VETERAN-PATIENTS

Chapters reporting: 46. Certified representatives for 3 VA Hospitals. Service hours by members: 1552. Canteen book donations: \$328.00. Activities for veteran patients in all hospitals, also private homes included 893 personal visits; 39 parties with 57 members participating. Value \$654.50; 2579 gifts to patients and hospitals, value \$1797. Miscellaneous gifts include countless books and magazines, also paper backs and puzzles, and "Stamps for Individual Veteran Patients", 94-1/2 ounces. Sewing projects provided much needed afghans, wheel-chair bags, booties, and many other hand-made items. Public relations included 12 talks made by members, 13 newstories, 13 pictures. Special activities at VA Hospitals include a weekly coffee for patients coordinated by 10 chapters, a Mother's Day Buffet, monthly birthday parties, patriotic days commemorated for veteran-patients, and a Bicentennial observance. In their own communities, chapter members have located veteran-patients and have shown their concern in many varied ways: carried patients for treatment, sent meals to homes of paralyzed patients, wrote letters for patientes, typed term papers, sent Christmas cards. Two DAR members each gave over 100 hrs. service to VA Hospitals. Thank you, DAR Members, for your excellent cooperation and prompt reports.

- 109 new DAR members acquired through the services of these volunteers
  - 25 programs, workshops, or seminars held on lineage research
- 32 such workshops attended by these volunteers.

This is a splendid record. An increasing use of the Blue Book has been made as people become more aware of it. Many favorable comments

have been received of this new method of assisting other chapters and states with lineage research in obtaining new members. Many thanks for the help of everyone. Our desire to give service has been so great, neither the State Regent nor this chairman, has been able to say "no", even when men have written. We hope they will not make a habit of this though.

# MEMBERSHIP

On February 1, 1977, membership of the 101 chapters of the Georgia State Society was 7,613. There were 424 new admissions of which 128 were Juniors, with 11 transferring from C. A. R.; 57 reinstatements and a net gain of 5 transfers. For the year we have a net gain of 178 which exceeds any gain shown in over 20 years. 58 chapters showed an increase with 10 chapters remaining the same. This information with questionnaire, plus a news-letter with an application for reservations on one of two buses chartered to travel to 86th Continental Congress, April 16-22, 1977 were mailed to Chapter Regents & Transportation Chairmen on Dec. 1, 1976. The response is stated: 39 Chapters returned questionnaires and reported; 33 Chapters made a survey to determine transportation needs of members; 152 members were provided transportation on regular basis and 92 occasionally; 35 Chapters made historic trips, 33 historic sites or areas visited, 19 within the State, including Meadow Garden & Rhodes Hall: 272 members visited historic sites as a group, 40 traveled individually, 41 trips made by car pools, 8 by bus, 2 otherwise; 48 members represented 14 Chapters traveled by DAR chartered buses to the 85th Continental Congress, Traffic Safety: 3 Chapters participated in community safety programs; 13 Chapters reported improvements in roads, streets, bridges & 9 Chapters reported having participated in encouraging improvements: One Chapter had a program on safety: 27 Chapters reported having specially trained school bus drivers; 7 communities, 3 schools, 5 recreational areas have defined bike paths; One Chapter recommended materials on safety to a school or club and the material was used.

Letter of instruction and Chapter Questionnaire in all Regent's State Packet at District meetings. 56 Chapters reported their American History Month activities. American History Month Committee Essay Contest was sponsored in 143 schools, 26 participating for the first time, with 4036 contestants. Subject of Essay Contest BATTLES OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION. 132 Chapters had programs on American History and 40 sponsored displays; 77 posters were displayed in banks, libraries, schools and 749 stickers were used. 128 bronze and 18 sterling silver American History medals awarded essay contestants; 20 cash awards, 5 books, 128 American History Certificates of Award, 1590 Certificates of Appreciation, ribbons presented contestants. 61 school assemblies, 28 school paper articles, 56 schools used Spot Announcements, 107 medals awarded to students for excellence in American History.

There were 103 magazine or newspaper articles and 70 pictures published with a total of 1113 inches of American History Month publicity. 709 sets of Spot Announcements were used on radio, 14 sets on TV. 14 members appeared on radio and 13 on TV in behalf of this committee with a total radio time 1156 minutes and 61 TV minutes.

February 1977 was proclaimed American History Month by Gov. Busbee and 40 letters were written to Congressman in behalf of legislation permanently designating February as American History Month. One copy of letter mailed office of Historian General, NSDAR.

Promotional letter and two questionnaires sent to regents, one for 1976-1977, the other for 1967-1977 which conformed to National. Early deadline stressed. Suggestions made at Board and District meetings. Congratulations on your reports which show varied and interesting projects and programs and an active community participation: 64 Bicentennial programs; 97 projects, 9,008 inches of publicity; 2,755 minutes of TV and Radio time. There have been 15 chapter publications this year: county histories, tombstone records, historic houses, marriage records, famiy and church records, streets and squares, and articles in the DAR Magazine.

ADAM BRINSON - Two family histories compiled and given to State and National Archives, libraries, family and friends, published five family history booklets (1,000). ALTAMAHA - compiled history of Chapter. ANDREW HOUSER-Exhibit of 18th century costumes, silver and furniture, etc. Featured was a mannequin costumed in replica of the gown worm by Mrs. Harrison, first President General, NSDAR. The chapter was requested to continue the exhibit for two more weeks.

ARCHIBALD BULLOCH-Program on the Revolution in Fiction and Poetry, 178 certificates and 13 medals awarded, AUGUSTA-restored the Victorian parlor in Meadow Garden; AUGUSTIN CLAYTON-sponsored Bicentennial Celebration, officially recognized, Patch contest, Art Department, Installation of Gas Light Memorial to two doctors, Hosted Heritage Train Parade. BAINBRIDGE-25 family histories researched and published in local paper, placed granite marker in park in memory of four Revolutionary patriots, descendants contributed the marker, 13 papers carried the story. BARNARD TRAIL-placed plaque for preservation of cornerstone first Worth County High School (cost \$342), replaced Thigpen Trail marker on new highway. DAR publication "North County History", Vol. II (Sold circa \$7,000 of these books). BARON DEKALB-Tribute to America was a "Liberty" luncheon, all programs were Bicentennial oriented, hosted the opening night of "Cry of Eagles". a drama based on life of DeKalb, an original program "America's Singing Heart" made available to schools and churches. JOHN BENSON-an audio history of Hart County. 37 interviews were taped and slides made which were placed in library. Historical markers of Revolutionary soldiers, presented narrated pageant at the close of historical parade of 24 organizations. BRIER CREEK-Restoration of the Seaborn-Goodall House (\$40,000), published "A Worthy House". BRUNSWICK-published "Streets and Squares of Olde Brunswick" and a map. BUTTON GWINNETT-Project Genealogical Room and sent 35 slides to National Chairman, CAPTAIN THOMAS COBB-made a survey of DAR grave markers. CHEROKEE-placed a 12 x 14 bronze plaque commemorating the Bicentennial in the entrance of the Hall of Fame, State Capitol where the busts of Georgia signers of the Declaration are placed, published in DAR Magazine "Declaration of Independence, a Family Affair", by Mrs. L. C. Buzzett: coverage by two TV stations, 18 minutes, 16 inches of newsprint, COLONEL DANIEL APPLING-located site of first courthouse in County and will place marker (\$750) before March. COLONEL JOHN McINTOSH-the Historical Society sponsored by the chapter restored old jail and railroad station, compiled histories of Rockdale and Conyers, compiled and printed 1,000 copies of all 65 churches. COLONEL WILLIAM CANDLER-initiated first official "Family Day", July 3 and 4 festival. COLONEL WILLIAM FEW-erected flag pole and furnished flags at Dodge County Hospital, two bronzed plaques placed, cooperated in placing a marker in memory of those lost in all wars. ELIJAH CLARKE-Certificates given members were deposited in bank for 100 years. ETOWAH-Revolutionary musical program. JOHN CLARKburied capsule on Court House lawn; JOHN LAURENS - restored old cemetery. marked grave of a real daughter. HABERSHAM-cooperated in project to move the Georgia Liberty Bell

to the Capitol Plaza Park and to place it on a cement stand. KETTLE CREEK-participated in Community July 4th celebration, antiques displayed, LYMAN HALL-gave a cabinet for the Library (\$275), famous flags presented to school, a roll call of ancestors of Chapter members from 1907-1972. MAJOR GENERAL JOHN TWIGGS-sponsored historical room in County library, published History of Twiggs County. MINERAL SPRINGS - Flags placed on Revolutionary soldiers graves and graves marked. NANCY HART-Restoration of Captain John Howard's grave, continuation of map of graves of Revolutionary soldiers, of Revolutionary ancestors of members. compiled histories NATHANIEL MACON-Hepplewhite chairs given Meadow Garden, 17 lectures by Sequin (in costume) on Continental Soldiers. OGLETHORPE-Genealogical room in library is a continuing project, program on the History of Church Squares, OLIVER MORTON-a restoration of historic home. PULASKI-In process of erecting a replica of Washington's monument in city park. ROANOKE - A symposium written by member set to patriotic music. ST. In the "Long Room" of Peter Tondee's Tavern in Savannah, 1770-1776, the Liberty Boys met to plot and plan actions of grievance in opposition to King George, III of England, and his treatment of the Colonists. It was there on January 23, 1775 that Peter Tondee and others were chosen delegates to the Continental Congress in Philadelphia. There, May 10, 1775, the decision was made to sever ties with England. It was in the Long Room that the Council of Safety was elected. June 21, 1775 the first "Liberty Flag" to fly in Georgia was raised in front of the tavern. On July 4, 1775 the first Provincial Congress of Georgia met there, and on August 10, 1776 Archibald Bulloch read the Declaration of Independence for the first time in Georgia, from the steps of Tondee's Tavern, to the people gathered there.

Perseverance of the State Chairman and her committee, with the enthusiastic cooperation of National Officers, and dedicated support of the Georgia Daughters throughout the years resulted in the formal opening and dedication of the room at 9:45 A. M. on April 18, 1977. State Chairman of the Georgia State Room, since 1964, Mrs. Hugh Peterson, Sr. Committee members: Mrs. Young Harris Yarbrough, Mrs. Herman M. Richardson, Mrs. T. Board voted to accept Olin Plunkett Co., Inc. bid of \$798.00 for heater; gas line to Meadow Garden will be an additional \$817.74, bringing cost total to \$1615.74. Restoration Committee to price insulation and make decision later.

Board recommended acknowledgement cards be sent by State Treasurer upon receipt of Patrons' money.

#### MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

On August 13, 1976 the Meadow Garden Board met in Augusta with the following members present: Mrs. Louis Joseph Bahin, State Regent and Chairman of the Board; Mrs. R. Hugh Reid; Mrs. Edward L. Pietrowski: Mrs. Frank Binford.

Basic rules for the management of Meadow Garden were discussed and it was the consensus of those present that such rules should be drawn up for consideration and put into effect as soon as practicable, taking into consideration the activity of workmen during the period of restoration. Mrs. Reid was directed to compile said rules for the consideration of the Board, and upon final approval, to distribute to all Chapters. The Board also directed that a copy be given to the caretakers.

The recommendation of the auditor of the State Society's books concerning the accounts for Meadow Garden was discussed. Because of his suggestion that all monies should show on the books of the State Society, both income and disbursements, a motion was made by Mrs. Reid that the Board request the Meadow Garden Custodial Committee Treasurer to notify all creditors that bills should be sent direct either to the State Regent or to the State Treasurer and that the local account funds on hand from the quarterly payments made by the State Treasurer to the Custodial Committee be submitted to the State Treasurer for re-entry into the State Society's records and accounts. Said motion was seconded and carried unanimously. Mrs. Reid was directed to write Mrs. Henry, the Custodial Committee treasurer, of this action.

The Board members present agreed to ask the caretakers to be responsible for all monies received from tour visitors and to hold same until the State Chairman checked the records with the caretakers, at which time one half of said receipts would be given to the caretakers, and the remaining one half would be submitted to the State Treasurer.

Mr. Olin Plunkett met with the Board members to discuss the possibilities of replacing the oil furnace with a General Electric heat pump. Mr. Plunkett agreed to submit an itemized estimate for this, for proper insulation of Meadow Garden to be completed, and to submit an estimate for a gas furnace and insulation of the caretakers cottage. He was asked to include also the cost of a humidifier for Meadow Garden.

Mrs. Pietrowski was asked to contact Earl Babbitt to see if he would submit an itemized estimate for repairs to plumbing and pipes at Meadow Garden and at the caretakers cottage.

A highlight of the day was the interview conducted by Jim Davis of WJBF-TV with Mrs. Bahin and Mrs. Pietrowski which was shown on that evening's news in which Mrs. Bahin announced that Meadow Garden has been placed on the National Register of Historic Places.

#### MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

The Meadow Garden Board convened at 3:00 p.m., October 27, 1976 at the Quality Inn, Cartersville, Ga. Present were Mesdames Louis J. Bahin, Chairman of the Board; R. Hugh Reid, Chairman of Meadow Garden; Jonathan W. Fox; Leonard Wallace; Frank Binford; Luther L. Watson.

Mrs. Bahin, presiding, opened the meeting with the Lord's Prayer. Mrs. Fox read the minutes of the May and August meetings. Approved. Formal announcement was made that Mrs. L. M. Andrus has moved out of the state. Mrs. R. Hugh Reid has been appointed the new Chairman of Meadow Garden.

Mrs. Reid reviewed the new list of rules for Meadow Garden. She then discussed the plans for renovation of Meadow Garden and the caretaker's cottage. As was authorized in the last meeting, after discussion with Mr. Plunkett on furnace and gas lines for Meadow Garden, it was decided to use a heat pump and humidifier for necessary temperature and humidity control for proper maintenance of house and furnishings.

Total cost \$3,771.67. The present heating system in the caretaker's cottage is also unsatisfactory and outmoded . . . total cost \$803.00. Plumbing repairs were the next item on the agenda. The plumbing company doing the work is Earl L. Babbit, Inc. Maintenance Fund will cover the cost of plumbing work.

Needed repairs to Meadow Garden have been discussed with Mr. John Adams and his son-in-law by Mrs. Reid. Mr. Adams will give separate estimates for outside and inside work.

Mrs. Luther Watson reported on the work done in the Augusta Chapter Room which that chapter is doing. It has been painted and repapered. The floor has not yet been refinished. Several pieces of furniture have been chosen to be reupholstered.

Mrs. Watson, Restoration Committee, presented a bill for \$10.00 to cover the expenses of worker who cleaned out from under the porch and the storage room. Left in the storage room are: 1 fairly good lawnmower, several tools, 3 blinds in fair condition, pieces of a spinning wheel placed on a plastic sheet in a dry place. Within Meadow Garden in upstairs storage room are: 33 chairs, 16 standards.

Mrs. Reid then moved to offer the pictures of the Presidents General which are at Meadow Garden to the Committee for the Georgia Room at Rhodes Memorial. Mrs. Watson seconded; motion passed.

Appreciation was expressed for the gifts given by Mrs. Frank Binford. He has made and installed appropriate locks for the doors and paneled shutters for the inside of the windows in the Best Room and Dining Room. A receipt acknowledging the value of the shutters to be \$600.00 was sent Mr. Binford.

Mrs. Binford, Furnishings Committee, announced that there is some money for furnishings and purchases will be announced as made. Copies of the inventory of recent purchases were given to each Board member. Mrs. Bahin again thanked Mr. and Mrs. Binford for their generosity to Meadow Garden.

Mrs. Reid announced that the present caretakers, the Stoughs, are leaving at the end of October. The Medical College of Georgia has been contacted to see if a married student and family would like living accommodations in exchange for acting as caretakers.

Insurance coverage of property was the next item on the agenda. Discussed was the need to change the agent and company. The insurance coverage has been updated to fit today's values and changing status of Meadow Garden and the caretaker's cottage. Contingent upon the installation of smoke detectors, the board was presented the following policy for approval: Southern Finance Insurance Agency, Augusta, Ga. . . . Fireman's Fund . . . annual premium \$441.00. This includes a Fine Arts Coverage which will automatically rise as new purchases are made. Cost minimum. Motion made by Mrs. Binford, seconded by Mrs. Fox, to accept the chairman's report and also to accept decisions made as to contracts, insurance and method of payments. Passed.

New Business: Caretakers Cottage, soon to be empty for a time, needs major renovation to be livable and attractive. Resolution passed by Board to ask for up to \$5000.00 from State Society Savings Accounts to

do job properly, not piece-meal. Will include heating, insulation, scraping and painting outside, kitchen and other necessary repairs. Mrs. Reid moved, seconded by Mrs. Watson, that we present this resolution to Resolutions Committee for action at this State Board of Management meeting; passed.

Plans were then discussed for a Bicentennial Celebration to be held at Meadow Garden on the first day of the 1977 State Conference which will be in Augusta. Hopefully, work at Meadow Garden will be completed by then. Tentative plans are for Open House to begin at 10:30 a.m. with booths, band concert and basket lunch on the grounds.

As there was no further business, the meeting adjourned at 4:45 p.m.

### MEADOW GARDEN BOARD MINUTES

Meadow Garden Board meeting was held March 7, 1977 at 3:00 p.m. in the Apple Room of the Executive House, Augusta, Georgia. Present were Mrs. Louis J. Bahin, State Regent; Mrs. R. Hugh Reid, Chairman of Meadow Garden; Mrs. Luther L. Watson; Mrs. Frank J. Binford, Mrs. Edward L. Pietrowski and Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox. Mrs. Bahin presided. Mrs. Watson opened with prayer. Mrs. Fox, Secretary, read the minutes of the last meeting; approved.

Mrs. Reid gave the Chairman's report which consisted of the following: report on distribution of funds which will be shown in the State Treasurer's report. Insurance policy which had been discussed at last meeting has been finalized with the following changes: Coverage on contents now is \$5,000.00. The Fine Arts rider will cost \$8 per \$1000 of value. The total value of the furnishings is to be found in the State Regent's Meadow Garden file and in the State Treasurer's books.

Mrs. Reid expressed her deep personal disappointment that the work at Meadow Garden has not been completed in time for the opening of this state conference thus not allowing the festivities which had been tentatively planned in the fall. She announced that the paint and wallpaper had been obtained from Pittsburg Paint Co. at a discount. The painting and papering is now in progress. The plumbing work has been completed. Furnace and humidifier installed and insulation work completed. The inside of the caretaker's cottage has been completely refurbished; new self-cleaning range, frost-free refrigerator-freezer purchased from Georgia Power Co. at great savings—\$509.85 total. Outside of caretaker's cottage still to be painted. Mr. Adams is at work on structural repairs to Meadow Garden as outlined in October Board meeting. Wiring changes are completed. Smoke detectors will be installed after wall-paper is hung for they will be battery operated. Work completed has been paid for. Work still in progress has had some payment.

Motion was made and passed to sell old outside shutters for \$5.00 a pair as is.

During work, a leak at water meter on city side was discovered. We had been receiving free water. After notification of leak which is not yet fixed, city began charging us for water. Mrs. Reid wrote to city officials about this but we are still receiving bill.

New caretakers which have been employed since November 1, 1976 will leave April 1, 1977. This necessitates search for caretakers.

Mrs. Pietrowski was asked to check with Annis Exterminating Co. We cannot find a contract with them but receive a quarterly bill. We would like to investigate this coverage.

# **ByLaws**

# BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

# Article I NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

## Article II OBJECTS

The objects of the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution shall be: to promote the aims set forth in the Bylaws of the National Society; the preservation of the memory of its Revolutionary patriots; the study of its history; the education of its youth in patriotic ideals and in the duties of citizenship.

# Article III MEMBERSHIP

All Chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of this organization.

# Article IV OFFICERS

The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Curator. The State Regent shall appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as adviser in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting.

# Article V ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected at the annual State Conference biennially.

Section 2. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two years or until their successors are elected. Their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and of the State First Regent are confirmed.

Section 3. No member shall be eligible to a State office until she has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years. No member shall be eligible to the same State office for two successive terms. A member having served more than one-half term in the State office shall be deemed to have served a term. Any member holding active membership in a Chapter in the Georgia State Society shall be eligible to hold a State office, provided she has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years.

Section 4. Nominations of candidates for office shall be from the floor. The election shall be held by ballot. A majority of the votes cast by the

voting members of the State Conference shall elect.

Section 5. Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become acting First Vice Regent, subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. A vacancy in any other State office between annual meetings shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. An election shall be held at the next State Conference to fill the unexpired term. Any State Officer, who is absent from the State for a continuous period of six months or longer, automatically relinquishes her position as a State officer.

Section 6. No two State officers shall be members of the same Chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corre-

sponding Secretary.

Section 7. In recognition of valuable service to the organization, any State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Section 8. A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot. The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than fifteen months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

Section 9. On the election of State Regent, and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Recording Secretary General. The endorsement of a candidate for Vice President General shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent to the Recording Secretary General at least two weeks prior to Continental Congress.

# Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, of the State Board of Management, and of the Executive Committee. She shall attend all regular meetings of the National Board of Management. She shall appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees.

Section 2. In the absence of the State Regent from any meeting of the State Conference, or the State Board of Management, the State First Vice Regent, or in her absence, the State Second Vice Regent, shall perform the duties of the State Regent. The State First and Second Vice Regents may be assigned to direct committees and to perform such du-

ties as may be requested by the State Regent.

Section 3. The State Chaplain shall open all meetings of the State Conference and of the State Board of Management with Scripture reading and prayer and shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require. She shall preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and shall be responsible for the In Memoriam pages in the Proceedings.

Section 4. The State Recording Secretary shall record the proceedings of the State Conference and of meetings of the State Board of Management and of the Executive Committee. She shall compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervi-

sion of the State Regent and of the Proceedings Committee.

Section 5. The State Corresponding Secretary shall conduct correspondence and send notices in behalf of the State Conference, the State Regent, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as directed by them.

Section 6. The State Treasurer shall be the custodian of the funds of the State Society. She shall receive the State Conference dues and registration fees from the Chapters and shall receive all sums contributed by the Chapters for State and National projects. All monies received by the State Treasurer shall be placed in a Bank which is a member of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. She shall disburse such sums only when authorized by the State Board of Management of the State Society. Incidental expenses shall be paid from the State Dues Fund when authorized by the State Regent in writing. The State Treasurer shall keep an account of all sums received or paid out and shall keep receipts for all payments. She shall prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference. Her books shall be audited annually by a Certified Public Accountant. She shall be ex-officio a member of the Credentials Committee.

Section 7. The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State

Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new Chapters.

Section 8. The State Registrar shall, when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, who live in towns and counties in which there are no Chapters, to prove eligibility, and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars in verifying lineage papers. She shall keep a correct list of all members in the State and shall make a report on membership to the State Conference.

Section 9. The State Historian shall be in charge of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General. She shall keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves in the State and shall prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General to Smithsonian Institution. She shall encourage the compilation and publication of County Histories and other unpublished records, especially those of the Revolution-

ary period.

Section 10. The State Librarian shall collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing duplicates, wherever possible, in the NSDAR Library and in the Georgia DAR Collections in the State Department of Archives and History. She shall endeavor to obtain the books on the wanted list of the Librarian General for the Georgia Section in the NSDAR Library and is authorized to solicit contributions from the Chapters for the purchase of the same. She shall have custody and super-

vision of the DAR Genealogical and Historical Collections of the State

Department of Archives and History.

Section 11. The State Curator shall receive and be responsible for all gifts of Revolutionary relics to the Museum of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution. She shall be the custodian of the conference properties and shall have them properly stored, insured and made ready for use at State Conference.

# Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. The Georgia State Society shall hold an annual State Conference between the first day of February and the time of the meeting of the Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week. The Executive Committee shall fix the time and place of meetings when not fixed by the Conference in session, or when for any reason it may be impracticable to meet at the time or place fixed by the Conference.

Section 2. The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credential blanks to the Chapters not less than sixty days

before the time of the State Conference.

Section 3. The voting members of the State Conference shall be State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regent or alternate, and the delegates or their alternates from the Chapters of the state, that are entitled to representation at the Continental Congress. The number of representatives from each Chapter shall be determined by the rules for representation of Chapters in the Continental Congress as given in the National Bylaws.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a Chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the Chapter, except in the case of the Regent or First Vice Regent of a

newly organized chapter.

Section 5. No member shall hold, at the same time, two offices carry-

ing a vote at the annual State Conference.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any Chapter in the State of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference the privileges of the floor shall be accorded to the State Chairmen with the exception that they may not vote unless they are duly elected delegates or their alternates from their respective chapters.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen days notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Twenty-five voting members, representing not less than ten Chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

# Article VIII STATE DUES AND CONFERENCE FEES

Section 1. The annual dues of Chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be one dollar for each member of the Chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before February 1. Seventy cents of this amount shall be allocated to the general State Dues Fund and thirty cents shall be used to cover all State required per capita assessments. No Chapter shall be entitled to representation at the annual State Conference until

the State dues are paid.

Section 2. The Finance Committee, appointed by the State Regent, shall be composed of seven members, to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two Honorary State Regents, one active Chapter Regent, and one active Chapter member. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund.

Section 3. Each Chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State Dues, a Conference registration fee of \$3.00 for each voter to which

the Chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Section 4. State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$3.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference fee at the time of registration.

# Article IX EXPENSES

Section 1. One thousand dollars shall be taken each year from the State Dues Fund, to be used by the State Regent in defraying her necessary traveling expenses.

Section 2. Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent shall be paid by the State Treasurer from the State Dues Fund.

# Article X STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regents of the Chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the Fall, following the regular meeting of the National Board. It

may meet whenever called by the State Regent.

Section 3. Ten members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board

of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference.

Section 5. State Chairmen, Vice Chairmen and Committee Members of National and Standing Committees shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privileges of the floor, buy may not vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

# Article XI EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute an Executive Committee. The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, attends the meetings of the Executive Committee, but may not vote. This Committee performs such duties of the Board between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient. The Executive Committee shall meet the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three members of the Committee. It shall make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

# Article XII CHAPTERS

Section 1. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April or May. The Chapter Regent shall report the names of the elected officers promptly, on triplicate blanks provided by the State Regent for this purpose, to the Organizing Secretary General, to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary.

Section 2. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent for use in compiling her report, not less than fifteen days before the opening of the annual State Conference. The official Chapter report, not to exceed 250 words in length, for publication in the Proceedings shall be furnished the State Recording Secretary before the State Conference.

# Article XIII AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent and to the Parliamentarian. The State Regent shall send a copy to each Chapter and each voting member, at least sixty days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

# Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law for the State Conference in matters not covered by the Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

# State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21). No conference was held in 1911; the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912"; amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta, "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, p. 211).

## Bylaws

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National and State Bylaws.

# Change of Address

Notice of change of address of members shall be sent to the Organizing Secretary General, Treasurer General, State Regent and State Registrar.

#### Change of Name

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to State Registrar, Treasurer General and State Regent.

#### Chapter Elections

Chapter elections shall be held preferably in April or early May and names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, Administration Building, 1776 D Street, N. W., Washington, D. C. 20006, to the State Regent, and to the Recording Secretary. The full Christian name of Chapter officers shall be given together with her husband's given name or initials, address and zip code.

#### Dues

Pay to State Treasurer State Dues of \$1.00 per member before December 1. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the February 1 and two April Board meetings of the National Society. National Dues of \$7.00 per member sent to the Treasurer-General, 1776 D Street, N. W., Washington, D. C. 20006 before December 1, 1977.

#### Conference Registration Fee

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer with the State dues on or before December 1, \$3.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Rules for representation of chapters at Continental Congress: "Chapters having less than 50 paid members on February 1 are entitled to be represented by the Regent or in her absence the Vice Regent or alternate; chapters having 50 to 199 paid members on February 1, one delegate in addition to the Regent; chapters having 200 to 299 paid members on February 1, two delegates in addition to the Regent, and for each additional 100 members one additional delegate." (Article XIII, Section 3-C, National Bylaws).

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$3.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. (Article VIII, Section 4, of the State Bylaws).

#### Contributions

All contributions by Chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

#### Deceased Members

Deaths shall be reported promptly to Treasurer General and State Chaplain. Complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and a date of death shall be furnished State Chaplain priot to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for Conference Memorial Service and "In Memoriam" pages for State Proceedings.

#### Georgia Hospitality Fund

The following resolution which applies to the Georgia Hospitality Fund appears in the Proceedings for 1955:

"WHEREAS, The Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds an annual dinner in Washington each year during Continental Congress, which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society.

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society. Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$100.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this fund shall not be cumula tive. Adopted."

#### General New Regime Fund Balance \$2,500

The following resolution which applies to the General New Regime Fund Balance of \$2,500.00 appears in the Proceedings for 1959-1960 page 41:

"RESOLVED, That at the end of each regime all money in the General Fund above \$2,500.00 be transferred to the Savings Account; when the Supplemental Audit Report is made as of June 1 every two years before the Auditors close out the books this transaction be handled in order to show in this Audit, thus making the General Fund show the same

balance of \$2,500.00 at the beginning of each new regime, ADOPTED."

#### Procedure Book of Instructions for Officers and State Chairmen

The following resolution which applies to a Procedure Book of Instruction for Officers and State Chairmen appears in the Proceedings for 1959-1960, Page 41.

"RESOLVED, That all Officers and State Chairmen keep a Procedure Book of Instructions and helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new Officer and Chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities thus providing a continuing continuity of DAR work, ADOPTED.

#### Genealogical Records

To insure uniformity and convenience in binding, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, 8½ by 11 inches, with 1½ to 2 inch margin on left side, 1½ inches at top and 1 inch on right side and at bottom. Three copies shall be sent to State Chairman of Genealogical Records.

#### Information for Chapter Regents

1. All letters received by Chapter Regents relating to the work of the Society shall be distributed to the corresponding Chapter Chairman and brought to the attention of the members at a chapter meeting.

2. Please follow Resolution No. 11, adopted at 61st Georgia Society State Conference, as follows: "Resolved, That a closing date of February 1 be established for all reports, and all reports be given from February 1 to February 1, regardless of a change of regime or Regent." All awards will be made on this date basis.

#### Information for State Officers and State Chairmen

State Officers and State Chairmen shall send to the State Regent and to the State Treasurer a copy of any instruction letter mailed to chapters.

#### Meadow Garden

#### Nominations

The following resolution which applies to the announcement of the candidacy for State Regent appears in the Proceedings of the Twentieth State Conference, 1918:

"Resolved, that it is the judgment of the Executive Board that announcements for State Regent should not be made... earlier than three months prior to the meeting of the Conference and they shall be furnished to the Press for publication."

#### **Proceedings**

Two copies of the Proceedings will be sent to each Chapter. One copy to be retained by Regent, one copy given to the Chapter Treasurer. Additional copies, if available, must be secured from the State Recording Secretary at \$2.00 per copy, plus 45 cents for postage if to be mailed.

#### Reports for Proceedings

State Officers', State Chairmen's and Chapter Regents' reports for Proceedings shall be as concise as possible-not to exceed 250 words-type-written (DOUBLE SPACED) upon one side of three-hole punched, unruled paper, 8½ by 11 inches, and shall be sent to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary on or before February 15, the ORIGINAL being sent to the Secretary for the Proceedings, CHAPTERS COMPETING FOR THE HONOR ROLL, BY FEBRUARY 1.

A standard HEADING of ALL reports must conform to the Headings found in the Proceedings and must start at least 1½ inches from top of sheet of paper. Leave 1 inch between bottom of Heading and start of report. LEFT MARGIN of report must be 1 inch minimum. Please check previous Proceedings for correct heading. Winners of awards of State Officers and State Chairmen shall be listed on a SEPARATE sheet of paper. State Officers and State Chairmen send to the State Recording Secretary and the State Regent, the awards to be given next year on a SEPARATE sheet of paper-exactly as it is to be printed in the Proceedings.

#### Resolutions

Resolutions to be considered by the Committee shall be typed, with a heading giving subject of the resolution, signed, and sent to the Chairman of the Resolutions Committee two weeks before the date of the State Conference.

The Thirty-Seventh Annual State Conference was held in Statesboro, at Georgia Southern College, on February 27, 28, 29, 1976. Two hundred members and seniors were in attendance. Georgia was deeply honored to have the National President, Michelle B. Loughery, with us. Martha Stewart Bulloch Society hosted the Conference.

The C. A. R. National Convention in April, 1976, was well attended by Georgians. A chartered bus, filled with enthusiastic members and seniors drove to Washington. On the way to the convention, we made stops in Philadelphia, Valley Forge and Annapolis. Our Bus Committee Chairman, Mr. Gerald G. Fling, and his Co-Chairman, Mr. G. Later that afternoon we attended a Bicentennial Tea given by the Benjamin Hawkins Society in the Sidney Lanier Cottage in honor of the State President and the Senior State President.

November arrived and so did our State Presidents Project 'Trip To Tamassee'. Those who missed the trip to the mountains of South Carolina and the mountain school really missed an important part of our year. 'Trip To Tamassee' was truly a learning experience.

December was a very busy month. I had to turn my attention to family; but, I assure you, C. A. R. kept in the foreground as usual.

January; I began to return to C. A. R. duties completely and never, never did I realize before just what went into planning a State Conference.

On the sixth of February, 1977, our newest society held their organizational meeting, the Rebecca Carter Appling Society in Baxley. This meeting was well attended by members and seniors from all over the state. A lovely reception was given afterwards by the society.

Societies continue to work together, and this is the basis for a unified State Society, one of which we are all proud. We continue to have wonderful C.A.R. boosters in the Georgia State Patriots, Georgia State Promoters, National Promoters, and Life Promoters. Membership in the Georgia State Society is now over five hundred, with a gain of one hundred and one new members. A membership drive is already underway throughout the state. We are still growing. To date we have twenty-two active societies and we hope to organize more this year with the help of our many DAR Chapters in the state. The Georgia CARgoes remain one of the outstanding news sheets in the nation and is a must in every Georgia C.A.R. home.
