MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

August 2, 1978

The Executive Committee of the Georgia Society, NSDAR, met at 9:30 p.m. at the Crest Motel at Covington. The State Regent, Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox, presided. Mrs. Allen Brewer, State Chaplain, opened the meeting with prayer.

Mrs. Leonard G. DeLamar, First Vice Regent and National Defense Chairman, reported that this committee would encourage chapters to award ROTC medals.

It was announced that courtesy resolutions would be written for approval at Fall Board of Management.

Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Second Vice Regent and DAR Schools Chairman, reported that the Georgia Society plans to furnish equipment for the Kate Duncan Smith DAR School Home Economics Building. She also urged chapters to contribute to the Hightower Fund for the Annie Hightower Memorial awards given each year. Dates and arrangements for the National Schools Tour were announced. The State Regent's Project at Berry Schools has not been decided. The gymnasium floors at Tammassee School will be refinished and restroom facilities renovated. The playground for the kindergarten class will be re-constructed with the installation of a 300 ft. chain length fence. It was recommended that any left-over funds go into an endowment fund.

Mrs. Allen Brewer, State Chaplain, discussed plans for the Memorial Service at State Conference, adding that Mrs. Edward McBride, Jr., Regent of Baron DeKalb Chapter, offered her assistance for the service which will be held at the Century Center Hotel. Personal notes were recommended to be sent to families of deceased members rather than printed sympathy cards.

Mrs. Fox explained changes in the program schedule at State Conference, noting that there would be no afternoon business session.

Mrs. A. C. Earl Shepherd, State Treasurer, reported that as of this date all bills were paid and the books were posted properly.

Mrs. Fox discussed the possibility of increasing annual state dues from \$1.00 per member to \$2.00. This recommendation would come from the Finance Committee and would require a by-laws change. The possibility of raising the per capita requirement to \$.72 per member with \$.50 of this per capita amount being allocated to Meadow Garden was discussed. The State Regent noted that the present \$1,000 allocated for travel expenses for the State Regent is not sufficient to cover all necessary expenses of travel. The possibility of increasing this allocation to \$1,200.00 was discussed. These recommendations would have to come from the Finance Committee and would require by-laws changes.

Mrs. Fox reported on the progress of the Meadow Garden restoration, stating that the contractor and architect have a personal interest in their work.

Mrs. James J. Muldrow, State Registrar, announced the following changes from the Treasurer General's office: National Honor Roll requires 2 new members by application for each chapter. A prospective member must document their ancestry from the first generation on back. This would include a birth certificate and marriage license. A member must document (prove) the first three generations for supplementals.

Mrs. T. Norvell Ashburn, State Historian, announced that she was compiling a list of all DAR Historic Markers in Georgia. She will ask all chapters to assist her in this project. The State Highway Department is constructing pull-off areas for cars so motorists can read markers safely. The Historian will ask the State to replace markers and have pamphlets printed listing DAR historic markers. The Governor of Georgia will be asked to make a proclamation for American History Month.

Mrs. Fox announced that the Governor of Georgia had been invited to speak to members at State Conference.

It was reported that the Georgia Society lost 94 members (53 deaths, 12 transfers from state, 29 resignations) as of this date. A net gain of 57 members was reported.

Mrs. Jerido Ward, Librarian, discussed card indexing at the Archives.

The State Regent announced the appointment of Mrs. Lester Furman to serve as chairman of the Meadow Garden Docents Committee. Four chapters have committees to serve as tour guides, to assist in polishing brass and keeping Meadow Garden attractive to visitors. Meadow Garden, through the Meadow Garden Board, has been asked by Historic Augusta, Inc., to become a part of their regular tours.

MINUTES OF THE STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT GEORGIA SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION ELK'S CLUB, GRIFFIN, GEORGIA

October 26, 1978

The Board of Management of the Georgia Society, NSDAR held the fall meeting at the Elk's Club in Griffin, Georgia on October 26, 1978, the State Regent, Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox, presiding.

At 9:30 a.m., the meeting was called to order and Dr. Bruce Morgan, First Baptist Church of Griffin, offered prayer. The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America was led by Mrs. Fred Miller, Jr., State Chairman, The Flag of the United States of America. Mrs. Robert G. Fountain, State Chairman, Americanism and DAR Manual for Citizenship, led the American's Creed. The Pledge to the Georgia Flag was led by Mrs. Louis J. Bahin, Vice-President General. Mr. Frank A. Thomas sang the "Star Spangled Banner."

Mrs. John H. Goddard, Regent of Pulaski Chapter, welcomed the members. Mrs. Fox, State Regent, responded by thanking Mrs. Goddard and Pulaski Chapter for their warm hospitality and especially the Oktober Fest-buffet the night before.

Mrs. Fox introduced the Pages: Miss Cynthia Jones, Miss Kim McKneely and Miss Dawn DeBenedittis.

Mrs. Fox then introduced the following distinguished Georgia Daughters: Miss Martha Cooper, Librarian General, Past Vice-President General and Honorary State Regent; Mrs. Louis J. Bahin, Vice-President General from Georgia and Honorary State Regent; Mrs. Young Harris Yarbrough, Mrs. Leonard Wallace, Mrs. T. Earle Stribling, Mrs. Robert Humphrey, and Mrs. John Thigpen, Honorary State Regents; Mrs. Herman M. Richardson, Past Registrar General and Honorary State Regent; Mrs. Arthur H. Waite and Mrs. Luther L. Watson, Honorary State Regents.

Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr., moved that the Corresponding Secretary send notes to the absent Honorary State Regents expressing our regret that they could not be with us. Mrs. Hubert R. Martin seconded the motion. The motion was adopted.

Mrs. Fox then introduced the Parliamentarian, Mrs. Hubert R. Martin and Co-Parliamentarian, Mrs. Herman M. Richardson and thanked them for their work on "Parliamentary Procedure, Protocol and Popular Traditions in Georgia." She announced that a few copies at 50¢ are available and that she hoped they will find this small booklet informative and helpful in their chapter life. She stated that some traditions were not included and hopefully, in the future, it will become more complete in this area.

Mrs. Julius B. Dodd, Jr., Recording Secretary read Article X, Sections 1, 2 and 5 (by-laws) pertaining to State Board of Management.

Mrs. Dennis J. E. Beall, Credentials Chairman, gave the first report of the Credentials Committee. With 99 members of the State Board of Management registered, a quorum was established. Mrs. J. L. R. Boyd, Timekeeper, was presented.

The First Vice-Regent, Mrs. Leonard G. DeLamar, took the chair and the State Regent, Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox, reported on the work of the State Society.

The State Regent received word that the Georgia Society was eligible to receive a \$10,000.00 grant in matching funds for further restoration of Meadow Garden. This opportunity came to the Society through the City of Augusta from the State Dept. of Natural Resources and Ga. Heritage Trust. The Society secured the services of Mr. Stan Woodhurst of Woodhurst and O'Brien, Architects, in Augusta, as architect and "project manager". He in turn secured Mobley Construction Company of Augusta as contractors with Mr. Newt Goldman, Vice-President, as contractor in charge of the State Society's work. On August 9, the Meadow Garden Board met in Augusta with these gentlemen and respresentatives from the Dept. of Natural Resources and others. On August 26, the State Regent received official notification that the application for this grant had been approved. A contract with Mobley Construction Company was signed on September 26, 1978. At present, the work at Meadow Garden is going along fine. Meadow Garden, through the Meadow Garden Board, has been asked by Historic Augusta, Inc. to become a part of their regular tours beginning in January, 1979. Mrs. Lester Furman has been appointed chairman of the Docents Committee.

Dr. Jessie Mize, Coordinator of District Workshops, with assistance from the District Directors, hostess chapters, state officers and chairmen, did an outstanding job in presenting 4 workshops throughout the state during the first week of August. 571 members attended these meetings.

The first week of the State Regent's visits to a district was held September 11 - 14 within the SE District. Fourteen chapters were represented with nearly 375 members in attendance. Mrs. Frank Radford, District Director, accompanied the State Regent. She has attended 2 National Board meetings and joined the National Schools Tour which included Tammassee, KDS, Berry, Hindman Settlement and Crossnore. The State Regent expressed gratitude to Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr., State Schools Chairman, the Xavier Chapter and all Georgia Daughters who helped entertain the tour while at Berry. She officially greeted the National Tour upon its arrival in Rome and Mrs. Alderman presented each tour member with packets of information about Georgia. Berry festivities included a tour of the campus, a visit to the museum, coffee at Oak Hill and lunch was enjoyed.

From National Board, the State Regent reported that the President General's Project should be completed by April, 1979; Chaplain General has special plans for Memorial Services at Continental Congress on Easter Sunday before Congress begins; National Membership Committee reports that all new applications submitted prior to Sept. 14, 1978 have been studied; 2454 new members approved, 1810 pending, 250 new lines established, 8 new chapters confirmed. The last National Number was 633983; Historian General recommended a book entitled *Home Life in Colonial Days*by Alice Morse Earle, to be useful for the History Essay contest; National Conservation Medal is available to give to an outstanding conservationist; Georgia ranked 1st place in total number of magazine ads in Sept., Aug. and Oct. issues.

From the Georgia Society, membership as of June 1978: 32 deceased, 6 resigned, 45 dropped for non-payment of dues, 8 reinstated, 26 new members which includes 5 Jrs. for a net loss of 39. However, the membership report from the October National Board meeting was more encouraging. Special goals of the Georgia Society include the President General's Project to receive \$1.00 per member payable over a 2 year period; support of the schools projects over a 2 year period; support of the Hightower Awards Fund; support for the Georgia Room — Tondee's Tavern — to acquire additional furniture; financial help from all chapters to complete the Meadow Garden restoration and to become self-sustaining; a net membership goal of 8,000 by 1980; increase C.A.R. membership by 325 this year.

Mrs. DeLamar thanked Mrs. Fox and the assembly rose in appreciation of her leadership and of her dedication.

State officers were presented and each gave her report: Mrs. Leonard G. DeLamar, First Vice Regent and National Defense Chairman, after introducing her vice-chairmen, urged members to participate in ROTC program, contact their congressmen, study the Constitution; Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Second Vice Regent and DAR Schools Chairman, urged members to contribute to our 3 school projects at Tammassee, KDS and Berry, give one full program this year on DAR schools, send financial support to the Hightower Awards Fund. She thanked the State Regent for her participation and warm hospitality shown to members of the National Bus Tour; Mrs. Allen L. Brewer, State Chaplain, stated that the Chaplain General wished to supplement the Chapter ritual and requested material be sent in by Jan. 1st. She recommended the devotional book entitled Come Sing His Praises to be used in chapter meetings; Mrs. Julius B. Dodd, Jr., Recording Secretary, gave information on reporting for the Proceedings and announced corrections; Mrs. Robert Kenny, Corresponding Secretary, was absent; Mrs. A. C. Earl Shepherd, State Treasurer, distributed copies of the proposed budget and summary of accounts. Each of the 3 DAR schools projects were divided into 3 categories of funding. Each Chapter was requested to designate to the Treasurer which category it wished to fund. The State Treasurer urged support of the State Regent's projects.

Mrs. Arthur H. Waite, Chairman of the Finance Committee, moved the adoption of the Tentative Budget. Adopted. Mrs. Waite also moved that \$5,000 be taken from the Georgia Society General Fund Savings Account to

be applied toward the \$10,000 matching grant and that all Meadow Garden Funds be applied toward this matching grant except that part of the Patrons Fund designated for special purposes. Motion adopted. Mrs. Waite then recommended a change in the By-Laws, ARTICLE VIII, Section 1, to read as follows: "The Annual dues of Chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be two dollars for each member of the Chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before February 1. One dollar and twenty-eight cents of this amount shall be allocated to the General State Dues Fund and seventy-two cents shall be used to cover all State required per capita assessments. No Chapter shall be entitled to representation at the annual State Conference until the State dues are paid". This recommendation to be sent out by the State Regent in her "Call to Conference" to be voted upon at the 1979 State-Conference. The Finance Committee Chairman moved that the per capita requirement be raised to \$.72 per member with \$.50 of this per capita amount being allocated to the Meadow Garden Maintenance Fund. Motion adopted. Mrs. Waite stated that State dues had not been increased since 1956.

Mrs. James J. Leitch, Organizing Secretary, displayed a picture of the State of Georgia, denoting the location of all DAR Chapters. She stated that there are many areas in the state without chapters, namely, Dalton and Folkston, and asked other chapters to promote interest in these areas. The State Regent has requested the appointment of an Organizing Regent, Mrs. Richard Barbree, Albany, Ga.

Mrs. James J. Muldrow, Registrar, reported a membership of 7805. She urged all chapters to increase their membership, thereby supporting the State Regent's goal of 8000 members by February, 1980. Mrs. Muldrow reported 82 new members (October Board), 4 transferred to State, 45 dropped for non-payment of dues, 6 transferred from State, and 18 deaths. Mrs. Muldrow offerred a \$25.00 award for the chapter with greatest the increase in membership.

Mrs. T. Norvell Ashburn, Historian, urged every chapter to aid in placing DAR markers on every grave of Real Daughters.

Mrs. Jerido Ward, Librarian, recognized Miss Martha Ansley Cooper, Georgia Daughter, who is now Librarian-General, and urged more books for DAR Library and local libraries. The Library project is a continuation of the project to index the McCall Collection and to catalog genealogical material at the State Archives.

Mrs. Ned L. Shuman, Curator, recognized Mr. Allen Brewer and thanked him for his assistance in setting up flags and other DAR properties for state meetings.

Mrs. Fox introduced the National Appointees from Georgia: Mrs. James J. Muldrow, National Chairman of Genealogical Records; Mrs. A. C. Earl Shepherd, National Vice-Chairman, Southeastern Division, American Indians; Mrs. J. B. Dodd, Jr., National Vice-Chairman, Southeastern Division, Conservation; Mrs. Lewis B. Smyth, National Vice Chairman, Southeastern Division, Honor Roll; Mrs. R. T. Ragan, National Vice Chairman, Southeastern Division, Insignia; Mrs. Arthur J. Waterman, National Vice Chairman of Schools; Mrs. Hugh Peterson, Sr., Advisor, DAR Museum; Mrs. Herman M. Richardson, Mrs. Arthur H. Waite and Mrs. Luther L. Watson, DAR Speakers Staff; Mrs. Waite, Resolution Committee; Mrs. Watson and Mrs. Fox, Tamassee Board of Trustees; Mrs. Robert H. Humphrey, KDS Board of Trustees; Mrs. Richardson, Advisory Member of KDS

Board of Trustees.

State Chairmen's reports were begun.

Mrs. Robert G. Fountain, Americanism and DAR Manual for Citizenship Chairman, urged all of America's citizens to obey its laws, respect its Flag and noted that government power must be controlled.

Mrs. Charles Q. Hall, C.A.R. Chairman, reported 20 societies in Georgia and set her goal at 325 members in 1979.

Mrs. G. Frank Battles, Jr., DAR Good Citizens Chairman, introduced her Vice Chairmen, Mrs. Arthur J. Waterman, Mrs. Jefferson Brock, Mrs. R. H. Deen, Jr. and Mrs. William F. Daniels and urged participation in the Good Citizens program.

Reports continued with Mrs. Robert L. Loflin, DAR Magazine; Mrs. John Singleton, DAR Magazine Advertising, called attention to the full page picture of Mrs. Henry Allan Ironside, affectionately known as "Miss Annie" in the DAR Magazine; Mrs. Hugh Peterson, Sr., DAR Museum, expressed the need for articles dating before 1830 to be placed in the Georgia Room (Tondee's Tavern); Mrs. Gilbert R. Frith, Genealogical Records, introduced the National Chairman, Mrs. James J. Muldrow. Chapters were urged to keep permanent files of genealogical records; Mrs. Peter S. Hanf, Junior American Citizens; Mrs. Wade E. Brown, Junior Membership, urged chapters to sell Junior Member products and make a quilt square for their project; Mrs. Gerald G. At the suggestion of the Chaplain General, the State Chaplain urged members to order Easter lilies as memorials to be used at memorial services on Easter Sunday at Continental Congress: Mrs. Julius B. Dodd, Jr., State Recording Secretary, made corrections in the Proceedings, Mrs. A.C. Earl Shepherd, State Treasurer, distributed copies of Summary of Funds Accounts to the assembly. Mrs. Arthur H. Waite, Chairman of the Finance Committee, and by direction of the Finance Committee moved the ratification of the tentative Budget adopted at the Fall Board of Management Meeting, Motion Adopted, The Chairman of the Finance Committee and By-Laws Committee then proposed the following By-Laws revision:

Present By-Laws, Article VIII, Section 1, reads as follows:

"The annual dues of Chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be one dollar for each member of the Chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before February 1. Seventy cents of this amount shall be allocated to the general State Dues Fund and thirty cents shall be used to cover all State required per capita assessments. No Chapter shall be entitled to representation at the annual State conference until the State dues are paid."

The Proposed amendment, Article VIII, Section 1; reads as follows:

"The annual dues of Chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be two dollars for each member of the Chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before February 1. One dollar and twenty-eight cents of this amount shall be allocated to the general State Dues Fund and seventy-two cents shall be used to cover all State required assessments. No chapter shall be entitled to representation at the annual State Conference until the State dues are paid." The Finance Chairman, by direction of the Finance Committee and the By-Laws Committee moved the adoption of the proposed amendment to Article VIII, Section 1 of the By-Laws of the Georgia State Society. Motion adopted.

The following motion was recommended by the Finance Committee and By-Laws Committee for voting at the State Conference, March 13, 14, and 15, 1979 concerning the proposed per capita allocations:

"The per capita requirement shall be raised to \$.72 per member with \$.50 of this per capita amount being allocated to the Meadow Garden Maintenance Fund." Motion was adopted.

Mrs. James J. Leitch, State Organizing Secretary, presented Mrs. Coray H. Miller, Organizing Secretary General. Mrs. Richard Barbree has been appointed State Organizing Regent for the purpose of organizing a chapter in Albany for business and professional women.

Mrs. James J. Muldrow, State Registrar and Membership Chairman,

reported 7752 DAR members in Georgia, reflecting a net gain in membership.

81st STATE CONFERENCE

MARCH 15, 1979

ATLANTA, GEORGIA

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT GIVING THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA STATE STATUS

WHEREAS: A proposed Constitutional Amendment for purposes of District of Columbia representation in both houses of Congress is being presented to the States for ratification within seven years, and

WHEREAS the Constitution of the United States of America provides that "the Congress shall exercise exclusive legislation over such district — as may be the seat of Government—", and

WHEREAS the Congress has instituted a mayor-council form of government in the District of Columbia with three electoral votes in the presidential elections and a non-voting delegate in the House of Representatives who sits and votes in Committees; and

WHEREAS the proposed amendment if adopted by three-fourths of the State would actually (1) grant special privileges and power to the Federal City mayor-council form of government as though it were a State Legislature, (2) would give unwarranted power to the resident Federal bureaucracy whose dominant activity is the daily business of the Federal Government and (3) would further violate the Federal principle by granting the relatively small Federal City two senators as well as a representative, whose salaries would come from the general taxpayers, in addition to the millions of dollars already supporting this crime-ridden city;

RESOLVED: That the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, alert its members to this attempt to override protective constitutional law, and urge defense of federal principles, believing that the success or failure of representative government depends upon the maintenance and integrity of the Constitution of the United States of America.

CAPITAL INVESTMENT FUND

WHEREAS: Meadow Garden, home of George Walton, Signer of the Declaration of Independence from Georgia, is an historic site of importance to the State of Georgia as it is the only home of a Signer now extant in this State; and

WHEREAS: the said property is owned, maintained and operated by the Georgia State Society, NSDAR; and

WHEREAS: This is the only State Society owning a home of a Signer of the Declaration of Independence;

RESOLVED: That a Capital Investment Fund for Meadow Garden be established, this fund to be financed by donations from individuals, chapters, and, at the discretion of the State Regent, by a requirement on the State Honor Roll;

RESOLVED: That, at the end of each administration, after all bills are paid and all designated funds established, 50% of any surplus monies will be deposited in this fund, with the remaining 50% of surplus monies deposited to the General Savings Account of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, until such time as \$100,000.00 is accumulated in the Capital Investment Fund; and

RESOLVED: That interest from this fund shall be applied to the principal until a balance of \$50,000.00 is reached, at which time the interest may be used for the maintenance and care of the property known as Meadow Garden. No principal may be used until the amount in the Fund reaches a total of \$75,000.00, at which time, if the need arises and/or the opportunity is given for matching grants, up to \$20,000.00 may be borrowed from the Fund, without interest, for major repairs or to match a grant for such repairs. This money shall be repaid to said Fund as speedily as possible. These transactions must be approved by the Finance Committee.

RESOLVED: That all monies given for the Capital Investment Fund be

placed in an interest bearing account at any Federally insured financial institution where the rate of interest will be greatest. Should the time come that the property known as Meadow Garden is no longer owned by the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, the monies accumulated in said Fund will revert to the General Fund of the Georgia State Society, the disposition of which will be decided by the membership at the next annual State Conference.

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Committee Reports National Committees

AMERICAN HERITAGE

Mrs. Robert F. Larkin

Seventy-five chapters reported 112 American Heritage programs in the categories of Art, Crafts, Literature, and Music. Some outstanding programs included the subjects of stained glass windows, early cooking utensils, weaving and pioneer medicine. Several chapters are involved in the restoration of historic homes and buildings.

One chapter entered the National Crafts Contest, 3 entered the National Poetry Contest, 1 entered the National Drama Contest, and 2 entered the National Music Contest. 3 chapters sent material to the National Program Office.

Almost half of the chapters used the National Anthem during their chapter meetings.

Chapters have been most responsive with recipes for the State American Heritage Cookbook to be published next year.

AMERICAN INDIANS

Mrs. Alex S. Boyer, Jr.

In response to forms mailed in January, reports were received from 86 chapters. The chairman cited needs of this committee at one District workshop and provided material for presentation at the others. Emphasis was placed on Printing Room project at Bacone College and Arts & Crafts Room project at St. Mary's School for Indian Girls.

In addition to monetary contributions to the Indian Schools, many chapters sent boxes of clothing, Campbell Soup labels, S&H Green Stamps, jewelry, and gave flags to Indian children. Response was made to the appeal for "hours of energy".

Programs featured North Georgia Indians, a real Indian princess, monthly talks highlighting aspects of individual Indian schools, Indians of Today and their problems, Northwest Indians, Indians in Georgia, and Tomochichi. One chapter devoted its regular meeting time to a visit to Echota, the capital of the Cherokee Nation, now being restored. Others made trips to Indian mounds and held joint meetings with C.A.R. with programs on American Indians.

AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP

Americanism And DAR Manual For Citizenship reports were received from 66 chapters. All reporting chapters repeated the American's Creed at all meetings. Seven chapters had one full program devoted to the subject of the responsibilities of citizenship. Two 10 minute TV programs, 45 minutes on radio and 4 newspaper articles devoted to Americanism topics other than National Defense, The Constitution, American Flag and American History. Chapters placed patriotic literature in schools, colleges, libraries, doctor's offices, banks, court houses, post offices, welcome center, nursing homes and church bulletins. Five chapters studied the Immigration Act. Eleven members worked with Americanism classes. Working with community groups to reduce illiteracy, poverty, disease or other social problems were 158 members. Twenty chapters helped in the supplying of DAR Manuals For Citizenship for use by prospective citizens. Given to new citizens were 152 American's Creed cards, 923 patriotic literature, 817 Flag Codes, 5 Flag pins, 299 American Flags, 215 Welcome cards. One chapter gave new citizens "Pledge to American Flag" book markers. One chapter gave a reception for new citizens and members of one chapter, which was helping two prospective citizens to become naturalized, attended Naturalization Court when the two prospective citizens became naturalized and invited them to a group luncheon. According to the State Treasurer, \$12,912.84 was contributed to schools: Tamassee State Regent's Project \$3,583.87, Scholarship \$1,792.00, General Fund \$201.50; Kate Duncan Smith State Regent's Project \$2,690.20, Scholarship \$1,518.50, General Fund \$289.00; Berry State Regent's Project \$953.41, Scholarship \$617.75, General Fund \$34.00; Crossnore \$507.05; Hillside \$360.00; Hindman \$365.56.

Clothing gifts filled 518 boxes, weighing 12,038 pounds and shipping at \$761.04. Thirty-five chapters sent 163 boxes at 3,784 pounds free, courtesy of Tamassee, Gipp Manufacturing Company, United Parcel Service, Owens Transfer, Georgia Highway Express, Overnight Transportation Company, and members' cars. Christmas gifts, flag, rugs, stove, dishwasher, and three refrigerators were donated.

Chapters reporting: 84. Certified VAVS Representatives and Deputies for 3 VA Hospitals. Service hours by members: 5509. Canteen book donations: \$597.00. Activities in hospitals, nursing and private homes included 665 personal visits: 47 parties with 77 members participating, value \$648.80: 1133 gifts to patients and hospitals, value \$2,555.00. Miscellaneous gifts include cakes, cookies, candy and fruit. Countless books, magazines and games were sent. "Stamps for the Wounded" and "Stamps for Individual Veteran-Patients": 59 ounces. Sewing projects provided much needed afghans, wheel chair bags, bed socks, cushion covers and many other handmade items. 7 Braille Flags and numerous individual American Flags were given, value \$191.00. Public relations included 8 talks by members, 7 news stories, 7 pictures and 1 television interview of 90 minutes. THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

Reports were received from 102 chapters. These chapters presented 108 large flags, 441 small flags and 1324 miniature flags. 10 flags were made for the blind. A framed picture of the American Flag and Pledge of Allegiance done in cross stitch and 2 beautifully framed pictures of the Flag were presented. 3392 flag codes, 10 Braille Flag codes, 10 "Our Flag" records, 10 "Flag of the USA" books, 3244 "Our Flag" booklets and 312 flag posters were distributed. 72 corrections were made because of incorrect display of the Flag. 44 entire programs and 36 partial flag programs were presented. 57 programs were given to other organizations and 1 script was sent to NSDAR.

Eight chapters sponsored an essay on "What The USA Flag Means To Me". 22 schools participated, with 1011 contestants. These chapters presented 24 Bronze History Medals, 3 Sterling Silver History Medals, 3 Jeweled Flag Pins, 177 miniature flags, several USA Flags (13 Stars), several books, 2 -\$50 Savings Bonds and 335 Certificates of Appreciation. JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP

Georgia Juniors have had an exciting and rewarding year. As tallied from the 75 reporting chapters, we have 541 Juniors with 68 new Juniors. Positions held by Juniors in the State include 1 State Officer, 3 State Chairmen, 2 State Vice Chairmen, 9 Chapter Regents, 21 Chapter Officers and 78 Chapter Chairmen. Work for the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund has been very good with profits and contributions totaling \$1017.19. For a two-year State project, Juniors are working on beautifully designed handmade squares for the Junior Quilt to be offered at State Conference in 1980 as a fund raising project. A State Junior Scrapbook to cover a two year period was begun this year with Juniors State-wide sending material to represent their chapter activities. The Scrapbook was placed on display at State Conference this year and will be displayed again next year. Gladys Rose Shuman, who is a member of the Vidalia Chapter and is presently serving the State Society as Curator, is Georgia's Outstanding Junior Member for 1979.

LINEAGE RESEARCH

At the District Workshops, each regent was given a letter for her Chapter Lineage Research Chairman, with information on how this Committee functions and specific questions about the chapter's participation. The response to the questions show that 84 prospective members were assisted with 8 becoming members in Georgia. There were 11 chapters assisting each other and 7 out of state chapters assisted. 18 C.A.R. prospects and 10 S.A.R. prospects were assisted to become members of their respective organizations. 5 programs on Lineage Research were reported.

Your State Lineage Research Chairman gave programs on Lineage Research to 2 chapters: Birdsville and Lachlan McIntosh. She completely retyped the listing of County Volunteer Researchers for the National Lineage Research Chairman. Your State Chairman taught a course on Genealogy at Armstrong State College, and appeared on TV, publicizing both the course and the DAR State Lineage Research Committee. Your Chairman conducted an all day Genealogical Workshop, in June, for the Pace Society of America. She assists in a History class, for majors in that field, showing genealogical methods, also at Armstrong State College.

It is a rare privilege to work with this Committee and know the benefits it holds for our Georgia DAR Society.

MEMBERSHIP

Mrs. James Joseph Muldrow

One hundred and two Georgia chapters have a membership of 7,752. 288 new members were admitted; 80 of these being juniors. 42 former members have been reinstated and 27 have transferred into the State. 114 members have resigned; 45 have been dropped for non-payment of dues; 34 have transferred from the State and 143 have died.

Fifty-five chapters showed an increase in membership while 38 showed a decrease and 9 chapters remained the same.

Chapters received a favorable response to membership packets distributed during the District Meetings. These packets are planned for once in each National Administration and, it is hoped, will make membership growth increase.

The National Chairman's award for greatest percentage gain in new members by application goes to John Laurens Chapter, Mrs. E.B. Claxton, Jr., Regent, with 19%.

Madam Regent, it has been a real pleasure to serve you and the Georgia State Society in this capacity and I look forward to the year to come.

MEMBERSHIP COMMISSION

This chairman attended District Workshop, Fall Board of Management, and State Conference. Letters were distributed by District Directors through Dr. Mize's cooperation, whose help is invaluable. Letters were written to members dropped for non-payment of dues. Several were reinstated, and one transferred to chapter after reinstatement. Resigned members were less agreeable to reinstatement. Assisted C.A.R.s in transferring to DAR, and helped with research and filling out application papers. One class was taught to an Honors Class in Middle School, at their request, on methods of starting a Family History. Participated in one all-day Seminar at Middle Georgia College also on methods and procedures of starting a Family History. Assisted the Genealogical Department Director of Atlanta Public Library in planning for a Seminar free to the public next fall, at the Atlanta Public Library, also on researching a family history. This chairman still counts transfer and reinstatements as new chapter members for the current year. It was a pleasure to work with the other members of the commission, our State Regent, officers and chairmen, and chapter registrars.

MOTION PICTURE AND TELEVISION

Letters were written to all chapters in the state with suggestions for clean films and film appreciation. Communicate with sponsors, local theatre managers, motion picture councils, editors of newspapers, music and art instructors, local radio stations, local police asking that they patrol movies for violations of X Rated movies. Write letters of appreciation for good movies and criticism of the undesirable. 33 reports received. First place award to Baron DeKalb, second place to George Walton.

NATIONAL DEFENSE

Mrs. Leonard G. DeLamar

The work with the National Defense Committee has been most rewarding. The 14 Vice Chairmen working in the 10 Congressional districts have added much to the efficiency of this committee's work. One Defense Alert was sent, received favorably with request for more. Of the 99 chapters reporting 98 had at least 5 minutes of National Defense news at each meeting; 88 giving more time to this when necessary. 94 had a full program on National Defense; 94 discussed the 1978 Resolutions; 45 had material available for schools; 56 to libraries; 69 to interested individuals; number of Good Citizenship medals increased greatly to 378; 53 chapters gave 92 bronze ROTC medals, 11 gold medals, 1 sabre; 57 chapters contributed \$649.00 to Dollars for Defense. There was also an increase in paid subscriptions to the National Defender to 377; It was disappointing that only 760 individuals reported having written their Congressman and Senators regarding legislation and treaties, and that only 3077 reported having voted this year. 1610 members wrote to their State Legislators however, and 15 members hold elective or appointed public offices. ERA and the Panama Canal again led the list of issues of greatest interest, with the National Defense budget and education following close behind.

My grateful appreciation goes to all chapters for the excellent work done this year and to our very efficient State Regent for her advice and guidance.

Georgia had the distinction of being the only State in the Southeastern Division to attain 100% status. The State Chairman's Award of \$25.00 given to the State Regent's Project for 100% reporting was in turn applied by the State Regent to the Baylies Home Economics Building at Kate Duncan Smith DAR School.

The State Chairman again offers a \$25.00 Award for 100% reporting by Georgia chapters for the coming year which will be designated for the State Regent's Project at Tamassee DAR School.

PRESS BOOK

102 chapters are represented in the Georgia Press Book, with 25,697.75 column inches, which includes 783 pictures from 177 newspapers and magazines.

The Press clippings show that all phases of DAR work are being carried out each month in Geogia.

The coverage highlights the State Regent's visit to chapters, DAR Good Citizens and Good Citizenship Awards, Constitutional Week, DAR magazine advertising.

The response from chapters has been rewarding, and it has been a pleasure working with Mrs. Fox, our capable State Regent.

PROGRAM

Mrs. Ralph E. Farmer

The State Program Chairman received annual reports from 48 chapters. Yearbooks, Supplements and Inserts were received from 58 chapters.

All books were judged at the State level according to the National Rules.

Thirty-eight Yearbooks, Supplements and Inserts meriting Blue ribbons were sent to the National Program Chairman. From among these, the National Chairman award Tri-Color ribbons to 33 Yearbooks and Tri-Color ribbons with Gold Stars to four Supplements and one Insert.

State ribbons included 12 Blue awarded for Excellent Books, eight Red for Very Good Books, 46 Gold for Excellent Overall Program Content, 12 Green for "Cost" control in printing; a Special Merit Award was presented for an Outstanding Original Manuscript.

A majority of chapter program outlines included reports on Meadow Garden and DAR oriented programs using the three categories: Historical, Educational and Patriotic.

To date, the state chairman has received no report on Certificates for "Theme in Title" and "Costs in Printing" contests.

The Georgia State Society may take pride in its chapters' fine accomplishments in programs, overall content and appearance of Yearbooks, Supplements and Inserts submitted for 1978-79.

All entries were on display at State Conference in Decatur.

Working in this area of DAR activity has been a privilege and an inspiring learning experience. The chairman expresses deep appreciation to Madame Regent for such a challenging opportunity to serve. She also thanks the Daughters for their wonderful helpfulness and cooperation.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

In May of 1978 press releases were sent to 40 newspapers in the state listing new officers and chairmen for the Georgia Society. In July press releases were prepared and sent to the district chairmen for their use in publicizing the August workshops. A four page folder was prepared for each chapter and distributed at the district workshops. This gave special instructions for public relations chairmen to help in writing news stories, feature stories and how to tell the "DAR Story". Included also was a list of awards offered and a year-end report form. 21 news releases concerning the Fall Board meeting in October were mailed. I attended the Fall Board meeting and took with me, for each chapter, a prepared special sheet of instructions outlining the correct manner for submitting feature stories. 45 news releases concerning the 81st State Conference were mailed in February of 1979. Was in communication with Mrs. M.A. Risko, public relations chairman of Baron DeKalb Chapter, and most pleased with her preparations for publicity for the 81st State Conference.

58 chapters reported a total of 26,674 inches, 1618 articles and 659 pictures. 12 feature stories were received and the 3 winning articles sent to the southeast district chairman in Jacksonville for judging in the district. 4 articles were mailed to Washington for use on the National bulletin board. I attended the Founders' Day program at Tamassee DAR School in October, 1978, and wrote a feature story for newspaper publication and use on the National bulletin board.

This chairman is pleased with the cooperation of chapter chairmen and various officers and is hoping for even more participation in 1979. My assignment is most interesting and has given me much pleasure.

RADIO AND TELEVISION

The Radio and Television Chairman received sixty-two reports from the 101 NSDAR chapter in Georgia. Twenty-five of these chapters reported having some radio and television coverage in 1978. In addition, twentyseven reported having only radio coverage. Ten chapters reported that they had no radio and televison coverage during the past year.

John Floyd Chapter, Homerville, gave the most for the Seimes Center -\$150.00, with Baron DeKalb Chapter, Decatur, next - \$96.00. Joseph Habersham, Atlanta, and John Floyd Chapters gave the largest amount for Filming - \$150.00 each. John Floyd Chapter gave the largest amount for 1900 Census - \$312.00.

77 chapters sent reports to the State Chairman - 24 having a chapter chairman for this National Committee. The reports indicated \$328.50 to the Center, \$157.00 to Filming, \$308 to the 1880 Soundex, \$73.00 to Maintenance, \$132.00 toward microfilm for State and County Records, and one \$100.00 Life Membership - Total: \$1,098.50.

The Life Membership was given by John Floyd Chapter honoring Mrs. H.D. Summerall (Geraldine Westbury).

Augusta Chapter, Augusta, honored their Regent, Mrs. Edward L. Petrowski, with their contribution to the Center.

The chapters reported that more than 100 members have visited the Center, and several reported having obtained copies of the new Center Index.

It has been a pleasure serving as Chairman of this Committee, and I feel confident that interest will continue to grow and participation will increase.

TRANSPORTATION

Mrs. Mac W. Edwards

The function of this committee is to promote two programs, Transportation and Traffic Safety as related to chapter needs and special events. A letter was mailed to chapter regents September, 1978 emphasizing the importance of promoting these two programs, also giving addresses and information on obtaining Traffic Safety material. A questionaire was enclosed requesting a return by February 1, 1979. An application for reservations for transportation and hotel accommodations for those planning to attend Continental Congress was mailed to all chapters January 1, 1979.

Seventy-four chapters returned questionaire. TRANSPORTATION: 25 chapters reported having a chairman with an active committee; 25 had carpools, visiting DAR Museums, schools, historic sites, genealogical libraries, and dedication services; 32 chapters reported transporting school groups, scouts, senior citizens, and disabled members. TRAFFIC SAFETY: 18 chapters reported having safety programs; 10 ordered traffic safety material, "America Runs on Wheels", "What To Do When An Accident Happens", "A Guide for Pleasant Motoring on the Nations Highways, 55 Saves". Officers from local transportation and police departments were invited to give talks and/or programs. Brochures, pamphlets, and Georgia Drivers Manual were distributed to members, and open discussions were held.

One chapter enjoyed an informative, educational, and delightful fourday tour, including Meadow Garden, Tamassee DAR School, King's Mt. National Park, and other historical sites in the four states traveled; Ga., S. C., N.C., & Tenn., combining the pleasure and fun of the Fall Foliage to the Great Smoky Mts., a pilgrimage to our heritage and God's beauty.

Special National Committees

AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH Mrs. Alvin C. Turley

Letter of Instruction and Chapter Questionnaire were received by Regents by mail or at District Meetings. 58 chapters reported their American History Month activities. American History Month Committee Essay Contest was sponsored in 146 schools and 2,440 contestants participated, 29 of those schools participating for the first time. Subject of Essay Contest was "Travel in the Thirteen Colonies." 57 chapters had a total of 115 programs on American History and 30 chapters sponsored American History Month displays. 169 bronze and 19 sterling silver medals were awarded essay contestants. 632 radio spot announcements and 195 TV spot announcements were made.

127 awards were presented to students for excellence in American History. Seven members appeared on radio and seven on TV in behalf of this committee.

Governor Busbee proclaimed February 1979 as American History Month and 94 letters were written to Congressmen in behalf of legislation permanently designating February as American History Month.

MEADOW GARDEN BOARD MEETING

August 9, 1978

The Meadow Garden Board met in Augusta at 'Meadow Garden on August 9, 1978 at 11:00 AM. Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox, State Regent, presided and the meeting was opened with a prayer by Mrs. R. Hugh Reid. Present were: Mrs. Fox, Mrs. Reid, Mrs. Luther L. Watson, Mrs. Frank G. Binford, Mrs. Edward L. Pietrowski, Mrs. John Terry, Mrs. Leonard G. DeLamar and Mrs. Lester Furman. Mrs. Furman was introduced as the chairman of the newly organized Docent Committee.

Rules governing Meadow Garden were read and the price of admission was discussed. Mrs. Binford moved that rule No. 9 be changed to read "ten dollars (\$10.00) for a group of ten (10) or more including Georgia Chapters". This was seconded by Mrs. Reid. Carried. This rule now reads: "Tour visitors are asked to make a donation as follows, and this includes chapter visits: \$1.00 each for adults; \$10.00 for a group of ten (10) or more including Georgia Chapters; 50¢ for children under 12 years of age; 25¢ each for groups of school children."

Mrs. Binford moved that the chairman of Meadow Garden Docents Committee be given a key. Approved. This changes the reading of rule No. 3 to read: "There will be only three (3) keys to Meadow Garden and to the gates of Meadow Garden. One key will be in the possession of the Caretaker who will open the house upon request and will secure the house after departure of visitors, making certain that the book is signed as stated above. This key is never to leave the possession of the caretaker. The second set of keys will be held by the State Chairman of Meadow Garden and is not to leave her possession except at the request of the State Regent. The third set of keys to be in the possession of the Chairman of Meadow Garden Docents Committee and to never leave her hands. No duplicate keys are to be made from either of the above mentioned sets of keys."

Mrs. Furman reported that members of John Franklin Wren and College Hill Chapters had expressed interest in the Docents Committee. Mrs. Pietrowski suggested that members of Captain John Wilson Chapter be asked to join the group and said that the Augusta Chapter will help. It was decided that Mrs. Fox would write to all chapters within a 50 mile radius of Augusta and ask their cooperation with this new committee. When the committee of docents is ready to start to work they will meet with members of the board and be given a tour of the house and grounds at which time instructions will be given and they will receive a commentary to learn which will aid them in showing the house and answering questions of visitors.

Mrs. Lee Ann Caldwell Swann, director of tours, Historic Augusta Inc. joined the group and was introduced. She asked that Meadow Garden be included on the tour of Historic Augusta to portray the life of George Walton as a local and national figure and how the people in Augusta lived during the Revolutionary War era. She explained that there would be training classes which our docents would attend, teaching how to answer questions and give a professionally guided tour. If Meadow Garden is included on these tours it would mean being open 5 days a week from 10 AM to 4 PM. These tours would begin in January 1979. Mrs. Swann also asked that Meadow Garden be on a special tour for six hundred persons attending a Historic Preservation Conference in Augusta in November for which Historic Augusta would be able to pay \$200.00 for admissions.

Mrs. Reid and Mrs. Watson were asked to prepare historic information sheets and have this material ready for the docents by the end of August. It was the opinion of the entire board that only members of the DAR be allowed to conduct tours through Meadow Garden, in addition to the caretaker. Mrs. DeLamar suggested that perhaps a dress of the period be provided for Mrs. Newman to wear when she conducted visitors through the house. Mrs. Swann was thanked for meeting with the board and she departed.

The pros and cons of being a part of the Historic Augusta Tours was discussed in detail. It was decided that any tour of Historic Augusta would have to include Meadow Garden and that Mrs. Fox would write Mrs. Swann of this decision, but to state that regular tours of the house could not be started until after our docent committee is completely set up and the docents trained. It was moved by Mrs. Reid that we cooperate with the group for the November tour dependant on the progress of restoration. Second by Mrs. Watson. Mrs. Terry moved that help to do the heavy cleaning one day a month, not to exceed a cost of about \$25.00, be hired. Seconded by Mrs. Reid. Approved. The meeting adjourned for lunch.

After a short recess for lunch the board reconvened meeting with Mr. Stan Woodhurst, architect, and Mr. H.N. Goldman, representing Mobley Construction Company. The gentlemen explained in detail the work that needed to be done.

Interior Work

1. Remove paint in dining room and repaint. Paint walls of kitchen, weaving room, and hallway on lower level after removing the whitewash.

2. Installation of wooden shutters for 3 windows.

3. Install a fire and smoke detection system with remote siren.

Exterior Work

4. Grading areas at rear of house and cottage and installing drainage to keep surface water away from the buildings. Water proof 150 lineal feet of walls on lower level.

5. Examine chimney and install sheet metal caps to keep birds, squirrels and water from coming into the house.

6. Paint house and cottage.

7. Calk and seal open joints at windows, doors and trim.

8. Repair front porch flooring, railings and columns.

9. Install retaining wall behind caretakers cottage.

10. Remove brick curtain wall in front and front steps. Add two sets of steps to replace the one to be removed.

This work would come to approximately \$24,000.00. Mr. Woodhurst and Mr. Mobley both will donate a good portion of their fee which can be used to match the \$10,000.00 grant from the State. There was much discussion concerning the financing of this projected work and Mrs. Fox pointed out that at present there was not enough money available to take care of all of the work at this time. It was the concensus of the board that the work had to be done to protect the investment the State Society already had in the property, and that any of the items taken off to be done at a later time would only end up in costing much more when finally done. Mrs. Reid moved that the proposal of Mr. Woodhurst and Mr. Goldman be accepted to do the

work at the projected fee. Mrs. Watson seconded. Approved.

At 2:30 Miss Carole Griffith, Miss Karen Lewis and Mr. Steve Norris, all of the Department of Natural Resources, joined the board members and the architect and contractor to discuss the proposed work and the grant offered by the State Department of Natural Resources. Miss Griffith explained that the cost was flexible depending on how much of the proposed work was done; that the Georgia Society was to pay the contractor and present the paid bills to the department at which time the State Society would be reimbursed for half of the cost up to \$10,000.00. This may be done on a monthly basis or on any one segment of work as it is completed and paid for. In regard to fees donated or materials donated she said that a statement from a company that they had donated "X" amount of material could be presented in place of a paid bill. A time sheet or statement of fee could be presented in case of the services donated. Miss Griffith was concerned about the present roof line and the possible restoration to the original roof on two levels. It was explained to her that the present roof had just recently been put on at a great cost and it was felt that nothing could be done about this until such time as a new roof was needed. After a tour of the house and grounds she requested that a list be presented to her department giving all plans for restoration according to their priority on a long range scale stating where the cottage fits into the plan, listing the steps at the front of the house and remodeling the roof line last. Mrs. Watson moved that this be our long range plan for restoration. Seconded by Mrs. DeLamar. Approved.

After the departure of the gentlemen and the representatives from the Department of Natural Resources, Mrs. Fox read a recommendation for a change in the By-Laws raising the per capita amounts. She also read a recommendation to raise the per capita for Meadow Garden to 50¢ contingent upon passage of the By-Laws change. This met with the approval of the members of the board, and will be recommended to the By-Laws and the Finance Committees. The need of a fund to take care of regular maintanence and future repairs and upkeep of Meadow Garden was taken under consideration and the establishment of a capital fund for this purpose discussed. It will be recommended by the Finance Committee that this fund be established with a goal of \$50,000.00, all funds to be placed in an interest bearing account. Only the interest to be used and when the goal is reached a minumum balance of \$50,000.00 to be maintained. In addition to this fund it will be recommended that at the end of each regime after all accounts and projects are completed, any amount over the amount required to be left in the State Dues account will be applied to the Meadow Garden Captial Fund until it reaches the required amount of \$50,000.00.

Money making projects were discussed to help with maintenance and the above mentioned fund, including corsages made of play money and sold at State Conference, the proceeds to go to Meadow Garden. The idea of a Meadow Garden Breakfast at Conference was also entertained. These suggestions to be discussed at a later date.

As there was no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 6:00 PM.

The Meadow Garden Board met in Griffin at Holiday Inn on October 25, 1978 at 3:00 PM. The State Regent, Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox, presided. Those present were: Mrs. Fox, Mrs. Leonard G. DeLamar, Mrs. Luther L. Watson, Mrs. John Terry, Mrs. R. Hugh Reid, Mrs. Frank Binford. Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Mrs. Watson, State Chairman of Meadow Garden reported that Annis, Inc., exterminators, has examined the house and found no termites. She showed samples of money corsages to be sold at State Conference for the benefit of Meadow Garden.

Mrs. Terry displayed a lovely framed picture of Meadow Garden. Orders for the picture and corsages will be taken at Fall Board of Management meeting.

A progress report was given by Mrs. Fox on the restoration work being done. Drainage and grading have been completed and a rusty pipe that was leaking has now been replaced. Brick panels in front of the house have been rebuilt. Porch has been completed and retaining wall behind the house of the caretaker has been rebuilt.

Mrs. Reid moved that the Meadow Garden Board approve as recognition as Patron of Meadow Garden for those individuals, chapters and other donors who give service, acceptable gifts or other contributions for Meadow Garden...if such gifts be in the catagory of the cash donation already designated for Patrons of Meadow Garden. Seconded by Mrs. Watson. Carried.

Mrs. Fox read a report from Mrs. Furman, Chairman of Meadow Garden Docents committee in which she reported that with a few more docents there will be no problem keeping Meadow Garden open five (5) days a week.

A discussion concerning board membership followed and Mrs. Reid moved that the Chairman of the Board invite the State Chairman of the Docents Committee to become an advisory member of the Meadow Garden Board. Seconded by Mrs. DeLamar. Carried.

Mrs. Fox said that the minutes of the Meadow Garden Board meetings will be published in the proceedings verbatim, and that a copy of the contract with the Department of Natural Resources will also appear therein. She explained the recommendation of the finance committee that \$5,000.00 be transferred from the State Society Savings account to the Meadow Garden Restoration account to meet our obligations for the work being done at this time and announced that the recommendation for a Capital Investment Fund will not be recommended this year. Hopefully it will be advisable to bring this recommendation up next year.

Members of the board expressed their gratitude and appreciation to Mrs. Fox for her efficient handling of the work at Meadow Garden and her willingness to keep the members of the Board well informed of all progress.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:40 PM.

MEADOW GARDEN BOARD MEETING

March 12, 1979

The Meadow Garden Board met in Atlanta at Century Center Hotel on March 12, 1979, at 2:00 P.M. The State Regent, Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox presided. Those present were: Mrs. Fox, Mrs. Luther L. Watson, Mrs. Leonard Wallace, Mrs. R. Hugh Reid, Mrs. Frank Binford, Mrs. John Terry and Mrs. Leonard G. DeLamar. Mrs. Reid opened with prayer. The minutes of the October meeting were read and approved.

Chairman's report was given by Mrs. Watson. While visiting Meadow Garden she found that Mr. Woodhurst had taken care of most of the small details of restoration which would soon be complete. She said that a profit of about \$4.00 will be made on each money corsage sold for this State Conference. Mrs. Newman had been given material and pattern to make a period dress which she will wear when showing Meadow Garden. Cost of dress was \$26.11 which will be deducted from corsage profits. She reported that voices will be sold at the Junior booth for a red headed doll, Miss Marge, which had been donated for the benefit of Meadow Garden.

Mrs. Terry, reporting for the Patrons Committee, announced that the sons of Mrs. Henry Allan Ironside had given, through the John Houstoun Chapter, \$1,000.00 in memory of Miss Annie. This donation to be used for furnishings. She reported a total of \$3,101.80 given for furniture and matching funds.

The possibility of having new slides made for a Meadow Garden program was discussed.

Mrs. Binford told of material she had showing flowers, shrubs and trees used in the 18th century gardens; reported that the settle was now in the house, but that some ducts would have to be temporarily taken down to move it into the kitchen, and that she had found the water cut off on her last visit. Mrs. Newman will be notified that the water is never to be cut off because of the humidifier. She also said that a Windsor chair and a chest had been put in the bedroom.

Mrs. Fox asked for an estimate of furniture needed to complete the furnishing of the house and the approximate cost. Some of the furniture needed is a bed, grandfathers clock, an iron lantern for the kitchen, a simple lantern for the entrance hall, and light fixtures for the dining room and conference room; a single bed for the back bedroom, a tea kettle, ink stand, something for the mantle in the dining room, refinishing furniture now in the house. No cost could be determined.

The inventory of furnishings in the house was discussed and it was suggested that the board meet during the summer and take this inventory. Mrs. Binford was requested to send the chairman a list of furnishings purchased this year.

A report from Mrs. Furman, Chairman of Meadow Garden Docents, was read stating that she had attended lectures concerning Meadow Garden and George Walton. Material had been given to all docents to be used on tours on November 18th when 150 tourists visited Meadow Garden. Nine chapters will serve beginning February 2nd, rotating by the month. She said that necessary repairs to the caretaker's cottage will be made by caretaker and an interested volunteer with the materials being donated. From June 1978 to January 1, 1979 180 adults and 67 children had toured Meadow Garden.

Mrs. A.C. Earl Shepherd, State Treasurer, was asked to attend the

meeting and present to the board an itemized statement of Meadow Garden funds. This complete statement showed that the following funds were transferred to the restoration fund to meet matching grant from the Department of Natural Resources:

Mrs. Shepherd was thanked for her excellent report and for attending the meeting.

Plans for landscaping will be worked up by an interested party and it is hoped that proper landscaping of the grounds will soon be accomplished. Mr. Woodhurst sent an estimate of about \$300.00 for the insulation of the caretaker's cottage.

Mrs. Reid moved that the charge for groups be changed to \$1.00 per person instead of \$10.00 for a group of ten or more. Seconded by Mrs. Watson. Carried.

Mrs. Furman sent a request asking permission to have a tea for docents in Meadow Garden. Mrs. DeLamar moved that permission be given to have a garden party; seconded by Mrs. Watson. Carried.

Mrs. Fox read a resolution to come before the resolutions committee concerning a Capital Investment Fund. Mrs. Reid moved that the Meadow Garden Board go on record as supporting the proposed resolution to establish a Capital Investment Fund as a source of future revenue for the maintenance of Meadow Garden. Seconded by Mrs. DeLamar.Carried unanimously.

The Patrons Fund was discussed and Mrs. Reid made the following motion: That the three Meadow Garden Funds listed on the books of the State Treasurer be listed as: Landscaping, Furnishings, Maintenance and Restoration. She further moved that Patrons shall be those who contribute \$50.00 or more annually as individuals and chapters which contribute \$100.00 or more annually in addition to the per capita and honor roll requirements to any of the above named funds. Seconded by Mrs. Watson. Carried.

Mrs. Fox spoke to the board on the importance of Meadow Garden and the responsibility of the Board to Meadow Garden. The meeting was adjourned at 3:30 P.M.

COPY OF CONTRACT

WITH THE DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES STATE OF GEORGIA COUNTY OF RICHMOND

THIS AGREEMENT (hereinafter referred to as the "Agreement") made and entered into this 26th day of April, 1978, by and between the City of Augusta, State of Georgia (hereinafter sometimes referred to as the "CITY"), and the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution (hereinafter referred to as the "OWNER")

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the provision of adequate public recreation and park facilities, equipment, and areas; the preservation of scenic, historic, ecological, and scientific sites; and, the safe maintenance of such areas and facilities is an obligation of State government and a benefit to all the people; and

WHEREAS, the Ga. Laws 1937, pp. 264, 267 (Ga. Code Ann. Section 43-122) as amended, requires the Department of Natural Resources to provide the above mentioned services and facilities; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Natural Resources is authorized by Ga. Laws 1974, p. 273, to contract and make cooperative agreements, leases, and rental agreements, with the United States Government, any county, municipality, local government, or any combination of same, any public or private corporation, firm or any persons whatsoever, any public authority, agency, commission or institution, or between State agencies, for any of the services, purposes, duties, responsibilities or functions vested in the Department of Natural Resources; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Natural Resources administers the Georgia Heritage Trust local assistance program for preservation of properties listed on the National Register of Historic Places; and

WHEREAS, the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution owns MEADOW GARDEN, 1320 Nelson Street, Augusta, Georgia, further described in Exhibit A, attached hereto and by reference incorporated herein (hereinafter referred to as the "SITE"), which SITE is listed on the National Register of historic places; and

WHEREAS, the CITY OF AUGUSTA has duly applied for and been awarded a matching state grant (hereinafter referred to as the "GRANT"), in an amount not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for the restoration of the SITE.

I, NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of said GRANT, the OWNER Hereby agrees as follows:

A. The OWNER agrees to restore the SITE, pursuant to and in strict accordance with: (1) the "Responsibilities of Recipients of State Assistance," as set forth in Exhibit "B", attached hereto and by reference incorporated herein; (2) the proposed project work and estimated costs of such work, as shown on Exhibit "C", attached hereto and by reference incorporated herein; and (3) the detailed plans and specifications for the project work to be submitted to and approved by the Department of Natural Resources.

B. The OWNER shall begin the project work within one year from the date of this Agreement, but in no event shall the project work begin without the prior written approval of the detailed plans and specifications by the Department of Natural Resources.

C. For a period beginning on the date OWNER receives written approval by the Department of Natural Resources of the detailed plans and specifications for the project work and ending not more than thirty (30) years from said date, OWNER covenants and agrees that OWNER will:

1. maintain, repair and administer the SITE in order that its historical integrity, features, materials, workmanship and environment will be preserved;

2. provide such public access to the SITE as may be necessary to enable the public to view and appreciate the historical qualities of the SITE and the results of the project work, such public access to be provided for at least twelve (12) calendar days per year and said days of access to be reasonably spaced throughout the year in accordance with a schedule of access days to be submitted by OWNER to the DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES for the DEPARTMENT'S approval immediately following the completion of the project work;

3. if the SITE is located in an area which is designated as a "special flood hazard area" by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and if the community in which the SITE is located shall be a participant in the National Flood Insurance Program, OWNER shall immediately (or upon designation of the area as a "special flood hazard area" and participation, if any, of the community in which the SITE is located) purchase and shall maintain for said period flood insurance with limits not less than the maximum amount of the GRANT.

4. not engage in, authorize or permit new construction on the SITE without the prior written approval of the Department of Natural Resources that the historical integrity of the SITE is not adversely affected.

D. The OWNER convenants and agrees that it will execute and file in the records of the Clerk of the Superior Court of Richmond County, an affidavit affecting title to real property which will:

1. be prepared in conformity with Ga. Code Ann. Section 38 638 (Ga. Laws 1955, p. 614);

2. reference the deed by which the SITE was required;

3. state that the SITE has been restored with funds from the Department of Natural Resources and that in consideration of such funds and the disbursal and administration thereof by the CITY, the OWNER has entered into certain convenants (being those covenants contained in paragraph 1 C of this Agreement) with the CITY which covenants are real, running with the land for a period beginning on the date OWNER receives written approval by the Department of Natural Resources of the detailed plans and specifications for the project work and ending not more then thirty (30) years from said date.

4. recite said covenants, being those covenants contained in paragraph I C (and the subparagraphs thereof) of this Agreement, in full, Said affidavit shall be recorded within twenty (20) days after OWNER receives written approval by the Department of Natural Resources of the detailed plans and specifications for the project work. OWNER shall submit two (2) certified copies of the recorded affidavit to the CITY within five (5) days after recording thereof.

II. In consideration of the foregoing covenants and agreements of the OWNER, the CITY will disburse the GRANT to the OWNER, said GRANT to be in an amount not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars (10,000.00), the amount of said GRANT to be matched dollar for dollar by

expenditures of the OWNER. Said GRANT shall be payable upon completion of the project work and upon submission to and approval by the CITY of all financial documentation concerning the project work.

III. It is further mutually agreed between the parties hereto that:

A. In the event that the OWNER shall breach this agreement by failing fully to perform those obligations which OWNER has hereinabove covenanted and agreed to perform, the CITY, at its option, may terminate this Agreement as follows: CITY shall give ten (10) days written notice to OWNER of such breach and CITY'S intention to terminate as a result thereof. If OWNER shall not have cured said breach within said ten (10) day period, CITY may, by written notification thereof to OWNER, declare this Agreement to be terminated. Upon breach of this Agreement by the OWNER, and regardless of whether CITY elects to exercise its option to terminate this Agreement, the CITY may avail itself of any and all remedies as are now or may hereafter be authorized by law, including but not limited to return of any GRANT funds theretofore disbursed by CITY to OWNER, if any, which funds shall be immediately due and payable to CITY by OWNER and other civil actions in courts of this State.

B. No failure of the CITY at any time to exercise any right or power given to the CITY hereunder or to insist upon strict compliance by the OWNER with its covenants, agreements, duties, and obligations under this Agreement, and no custom or practice of the CITY at variance with the covenants, agreements, duties, obligations, provisions, terms and conditions provide for in this Agreement shall constitute a waiver of CITY'S right to demand exact and strict compliance by the OWNER with the covenants, agreements, duties, obligations, terms and conditions of this Agreement.

C. All notices required to be given hereunder shall be in writing, and shall be addressed to the party(ies) to whom it is to be delivered as follows:

TO OWNER: Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox, State Regent

TO CITY: Mayor of the City of Augusta, Georgia City County Building Augusta, Georgia 30902

TO DEPARTMENT: Department of Natural Resources Historic Preservation Section 270 Washington Street, S. W. Atlanta, Georgia 30334

The date upon which such notice is mailed shall be treated as the date of service thereof and all such notices shall be sent by U. S. Certified or Registered Mail — Return Receipt Requested.

D. Except as provided in paragraph III E below, neither this Agreement, nor the proceeds hereof shall be assignable by the OWNER to any party without the written consent of the CITY first having been had and obtained. Any assignment without such consent shall be void and of no legal force or effect and notwithstanding any of the provisions of paragraph III A hereinabove, shall render this Agreement subject to immediate termination at the option of the CITY whereupon any and all GRANT sums theretofore disbursed by CITY to OWNER shall become immediately due and payable to the CITY.

E. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to prohibit or preclude OWNER from conveying to a third party by deed to secure debt, mortgage, deed of trust or other similar instrument, the SITE as security for and in consideration of a loan the proceeds of which shall be applied to the SITE (either in acquisition or restoration thereof) provided however that OWNER covenants and agrees that any such deed to secure debt, mortgage, deed of trust or other similar instrument of conveyance shall provide that the grantee thereof shall be bound by the covenants contained in paragraph I C of this Agreement for the periods stated therein. The giving of such deed to secure debt, mortgage, deed of trust or other similar instrument shall not be construed as an assignment within the provisions of paragraph III D hereinabove.

F. Any amounts payable to the CITY under this Agreement and not paid when due shall bear interest from the due date at the legal rate. If it becomes necessary for the CITY to bring suit for the collection of, or collect through an attorney at law, any amounts due hereunder, OWNER agrees to pay any and all costs and expenses that the CITY may incur in so doing, including reasonable attorneys' fees

G. It is mutually covenanted, understood and agreed by and between the CITY and the OWNER that each of the covenants, provisions, duties, obligations, terms and conditions of this Agreement shall apply, extend to, be binding upon and inure to the benefit or detriment of not only OWNER and CITY but to legal representatives, devisees, legatees, successors and assigns of CITY and to the legal representatives, devisees, legatees, successors and assigns of OWNER and the covenants contained in paragraphs I C and III E hereof shall be deemed and treated as covenants real, running with the SITE for the periods stated in paragraphs I C hereinabove. Whenever a reference is made to OWNER or CITY, such references shall be deemed to include the legal representatives, devisees, legatees, successors and assigns of the CITY and the legal representatives, devisees, legatees, successors and assigns of the OWNER.

H. It is mutually covenanted, understood and agreed by and between the CITY and the OWNER that this Agreement shall be governed, construed, performed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Georgia and shall be performed at all times in accordance with applicable laws and regulations of the United States and of the State of Georgia, including but not limited to those laws referred to in Exhibit "B".

IV. This Agreement represents the sole, complete and entire Agreement between the parties hereto and shall not be changed, modified or amended in any manner or respect whatsoever, except in writing, signed by the parties hereto, appropriately attested and witnessed.

LEGAL DESCRIPTION OF PROPERTY TO BE RESTORED

MEADOW GARDEN, Home of George Walton situated on Lots 30, 31 and 32 in the City of Augusta, beginning at a point on Nelson St. 400' from the intersection of 13th St. & Nelson St. at the NE corner of Lot 30 & running 120' to the NW corner of Lot 32; thence running 147' with the western line of Lot 32 to a street along the Augusta Canal at the SW corner of Lot 32; thence 120' along said street & canal to the SE corner of Lot 30; thence 147' with the eastern line of Lot 30 to the point of beginning, containing approximately 2/5 acre.

EXHIBIT B

RESPONSIBILITIES OF RECIPIENTS OF STATE ASSISTANCE UNDER THE GEORGIA HERITAGE TRUST LOCAL ASSISTANCE GRANT PROGRAM

1. A sign acknowledging State assistance in the restoration of the SITE shall be erected on the SITE immediately following RECIPIENT's receipt of approval by the DEPARTMENT of the detailed plans and specifications for the project work and shall be maintained until the restoration work is completed. Wording of the sign shall be subject to approval of the DEPARTMENT and shall be supplied by the DEPARTMENT at the RECIPIENT'S request.

2. Fees for admission to the SITE may be charged; provided however, that such fees shall be consistent with fees charged for admission to similar facilities in the area and shall not, in any event, constitute a discouragement to public visitation to the SITE.

3. One black and white glossy photograph of the SITE, one set of plans, specifications, historical documentation, and cost estimates of the proposed project work, and such other documentary material as may be required by the DEPARTMENT must be submitted to the DEPARTMENT for review and approval before work begins.

4. Professional levels of preservation standards in accomplishment of the restoration work specifically regarding craftmanship, research, techniques, and materials shall be maintained.

5. Accurate records must be kept of any donated property, services, equipment or materials, the value of which is to be used as a part of the local match. Records must include the type, estimated value, source and date of each such donation. The recorded value of these donations must be the estimated fair market value at the time of donation; provided however, RECIPIENT may estimate said fair market value and need not obtain appraisals of appraisable donations. Donated services must be provided by persons professionally qualified to perform such services. Time sheets verifying the amounts of donated service time must be submitted to the DEPARTMENT upon request by the DEPARTMENT.

6. RECIPIENT shall maintain, for a period of three years or until a successful audit has been completed by the DEPARTMENT or until the DEPARTMENT has notified the RECIPIENT in writing that such records are no longer needed, whichever shall occur later, financial documentation concerning the restoration of the SITE. Copies of such records or any portion thereof shall be supplied to the DEPARTMENT upon request.

7. For a period of three years or until the RECIPIENT has been notified in writing by the DEPARTMENT that such records are no longer needed, RECIPIENT shall maintain records of any other sources of State funding for the restoration in order that duplication of work or matching capability may be prevented.

8. The restoration of the SITE must be completed by July 1, 1980.

9. One copy of a completion report must be submitted within sixty (60) days of the completion of the restoration work. This report must include, but shall not necessarily be limited to the following: a narrative description of the project accomplishments; a statement of how public benefit and maintenance and administration requirements will be satisfied; an 8 X 10 black and white glossy current photograph; a copy of the deed of the SITE; and such other information as is requested by the DEPARTMENT. Special problems encountered and any solutions developed therefore shall also be included in said completion report for the benefit of other recipients with similar projects. Photographs taken and logs maintained during the course of the restoration work should also be included in said completion report.

10. Once every three years or so long as the DEPARTMENT shall require, the RECIPIENT shall submit to the DEPARTMENT one copy of a status report which shall include among other things a statement of the public benefit derived from the SITE and a description of the physical appearance and the administration fo the SITE together with one or more photographs thereof.

11. The project may be terminated by the RECIPIENT only upon the prior approval of the DEPARTMENT. Request for such approval must be accompanied by a full explanation of the circumstances which RECIPIENT believes justifies the termination of the project.

12. Recipient must submit written notification to the DEPARTMENT concerning any change in the use or the administration of the SITE.

13. Upon request of the DEPARTMENT, RECIPIENT shall also submit to the DEPARTMENT within sixty (60) days an audit of the restoration records certified by a Georgia registered and licensed certified public accountant; provided however, that such requirements may be made not more than once.

14. RECIPIENT agrees to permit authorized representatives of the DEPARTMENT to enter upon and inspect the SITE at reasonable hours and upon reasonable notice to RECIPIENT.

15. MEADOW GARDEN DOCENTS

Mrs. Lester Furman, Chairman

Upon accepting the Chairmanship of the Meadow Garden Docents' Committee, I wrote introductory letters to 13 chapters in a 75 mile radius of Augusta explaining the duties of the committee and requesting that each chapter participate in this new project. Follow-up letters and self-addressed postal cards were enclosed with pertinent information for reply to be checked and signed for service on the committee.

Each active member of College Hill Chapter was contacted by letter explaining the duties of the Docents and requesting that they participate in this endeavor.

I attended lectures given by the Coordinator of Historic Sites on George Walton and his home. Each participating chapter was furnished with copies of biographical information on George Walton, plus description and history of Meadow Garden, including architectual details.

A schedule was implemented for Docents to serve on November 18 when 150 tourists visited Meadow Garden. The time and location was coordinated for each docent to enlighten the guests on George Walton and Meadow Garden. I have assisted the caretakers with bus tours when my help was needed. Letters to 9 chapters assigning each one month to serve as docents beginning February 2. If this program materializes, Meadow Garden will be open five days a week from 10:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M.

I have arranged for necessary repairs to the caretakers' cottage at no ex-

pense to the State. This will begin as soon as weather permits. The work will be done by the caretaker and an interested volunteer. The materials will be donated.

An inventory of the contents of Meadow Garden is to be taken in the near future.

From June 1978 through December 1978 180 adults and 67 children have toured Meadow Garden.

Since the inception in June 1978 of the Meadow Garden Docents' Committee, the interest of the chapters in the surrounding area has been enthusiastic.

MEDALS AND PRIZES

BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE

NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE

AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II OBJECTS

The objects of the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution shall be: to promote the aims set forth in the Bylaws of the National Society; the preservation of the memory of its Revolutionary patriots; the study of its history; the education of its youth in patriotic ideals and in the duties of citizenship.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All Chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of this organization.

Article IV OFFICERS

The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Curator. The State Regent shall appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as adviser in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting.

Article V ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected at the annual State Conference biennially.

Section 2. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two years or until their successors are elected. Their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and of the State First Vice Regent are confirmed. Section 3. No member shall be eligible to a State office until she has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years. No member shall be eligible to the same State office for two successive terms. A member having served more than one-half term in the State office shall be deemed to have served a term. Any member holding active membership in a Chapter in the Georgia State Society shall be eligible to hold a State office, provided she has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years.

Section 4. Nominations of candidates for office shall be from the floor. The election shall be held by ballot. A majority of the votes cast by the voting members of the State Conference shall elect.

Section 5. Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become acting First Vice Regent, subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. A vacancy in any other State office between annual meetings shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. An election shall be held at the next State Conference to fill the unexpired term. Any State Officer, who is absent from the State for a continuous period of six months or longer, automatically relinquishes her position as a State officer.

Section 6. No two State officers shall be members of the same Chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

Section 7. In recognition of valuable service to the organization, any State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Section 8. A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot. The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than fifteen months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

Section 9. On the election of State Regent, and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Recording Secretary General. The endorsement of a candidate for Vice President General shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent to the Recording Secretary General at least two weeks prior to Continental Congress.

Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, of the State Board of Management, and of the Executive Committee. She shall attend all regular meetings of the National Board of Management. She shall appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees.

Section 2. In the absence of the State Regent from any meeting of the State Conference, or the State Board of Management, the State First Vice Regent, or in her absence, the State Second Vice Regent, shall perform the duties of the State Regent. The State First and Second Vice Regents may be assigned to direct committees and to perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent.

Section 3. The State Chaplain shall open all meetings of the State Conference and of the State Board of Management with Scripture reading and prayer and shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require. She shall preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and shall be responsible for the In Memoriam pages in the Proceedings.

Section 4. The State Recording Secretary shall record the proceedings of the State Conference and of meetings of the State Board of Management and of the Executive Committee. She shall compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and of the Proceedings Committee.

Section 5. The State Corresponding Secretary shall conduct correspondence and send notices in behalf of the State Conference, the State Regent, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as directed by them.

Section 6. The State Treasurer shall be the custodian of the funds of the State Society. She shall receive the State Conference dues and registration fees from the Chapters and shall receive all sums contributed by the Chapters for State and National projects. All monies received by the State Treasurer shall be placed in a Bank which is a member of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. She shall disburse such sums only when authorized by the State Board of Management of the State Society. Incidental expenses shall be paid from the State Dues Fund when authorized by the State Regent in writing. The State Treasurer shall keep an account of all sums received or paid out and shall keep receipts for all payments. She shall prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference. Her books shall be audited annually by a Certified Public Accountant. She shall be ex-officio a member of the Credentials Committee.

Section 7. The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new Chapters.

Section 8. The State Registrar shall, when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, who live in towns and counties in which there are no Chapters, to prove eligibility, and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars in verifying lineage papers. She shall keep a correct list of all members in the State and shall make a report on membership to the State Conference.

Section 9. The State Historian shall be in charge of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General. She shall keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves in the State and shall prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General to Smithsonian Institution. She shall encourage the compilation and publication of County Histories and other unpublished records, especially those of the Revolutionary period.

Section 10. The State Librarian shall collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing duplicates, wherever possible, in the NSDAR Library and in the Georgia DAR Collections in the State Department of Archives and History. She shall endeavor to obtain the books on the wanted list of the Librarian General for the Georgia Section in the NSDAR Library and is authorized to solicit contributions from the Chapters for the purchase of the same. She shall have custody and supervision of the DAR Genealogical and Historical Collections of the State Department of Archives and History.

Section 11. The State Curator shall receive and be responsible for all gifts of Revolutionary relics to the Museum of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution. She shall be the custodian of the conference properties and shall have them properly stored, insured and made ready for use at State Conference.

Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. The Georgia State Society shall hold an annual State Conference between the first day of February and the time of the meeting of the Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week. The Executive Committee shall fix the time and place of meetings when not fixed by the Conference in session, or when for any reason it may be impracticable to meet at the time or place fixed by the Conference.

Section 2. The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credential blanks to the Chapters not less than sixty days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 3. The voting members of the State Conference shall be State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regent or alternate, and the delegates or their alternates from the Chapters of the state, that are entitled to representation at the Continental Congress. The number of representatives from each Chapter shall be determined by the rules for representation of Chapters in the Continental Congress as given in the National Bylaws.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a Chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the Chapter, except in the case of the Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. No member shall hold, at the same time, two offices carrying a vote at the annual State Conference.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any Chapter in the State of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference the privileges of the floor shall be accorded to the State Chairmen with the exception that they may not vote unless they are duly elected delegates or their alternates from their respective chapters.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen days notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Twenty-five voting members, representing not less than ten Chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII

STATE DUES AND CONFERENCE FEES

Section 1. The annual dues of Chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be two dollars for each member of the Chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before February 1. One dollar and twenty-eight cents of this amount shall be allocated to the general State Dues Fund and 72 cents shall be used to cover all State required per capita assessments. No Chapter shall be entitled to representation at the annual State Conference until the State dues are paid.

Section 2. The Finance Committee, appointed by the State Regent, shall be composed of seven members, to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two Honorary State Regents, one active Chapter Regent, and one active Chapter member. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund.

Section 3. Each Chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State Dues, a Conference registration fee of \$3.00 for each voter to which the Chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Section 4. State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$3.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference fee at the time of registration.

Article IX EXPENSES

Section 1. One thousand dollars shall be taken each year from the State Dues Fund, to be used by the State Regent in defraying her necessary traveling expenses.

Section 2. Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent shall be paid by the State Treasurer from the State Dues Fund.

Article X STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regents of the Chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the Fall, following the regular meeting of the National Board. It may meet whenever called by the State Regent.

Section 3. Ten members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference.

Section 5. State Chairmen, Vice Chairmen and Committee Members of National and Standing Committees shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privileges of the floor, buy may not vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article XI EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute an Executive Committee. The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, attends the meetings of the Executive Committee, but may not vote. This Committee performs such duties of the Board between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient. The Executive Committee shall meet the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three members of the Committee. It shall make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

Article XII CHAPTERS

Section 1. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April or May. The Chapter Regent shall report the names of the elected officers promptly, on triplicate blanks provided by the State Regent for this purpose, to the Organizing Secretary General, to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary.

Section 2. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent for use in compiling her report, not less than fifteen days before the opening of the annual State Conference. The official Chapter report, not to exceed 250 words in length, for publication in the Proceedings shall be furnished the State Recording Secretary before the State Conference.

Article XIII AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent and to the Parliamentarian. The State Regent shall send a copy to each Chapter and each voting member, at least sixty days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law for the State Conference in matters not covered by the Bylaws. Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21). No conference was held in 1911; the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912"; amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta, "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, p. 211).

Awards

All chapters competing for awards must send reports to the respective chairmen by February 1, 1980.

All reports for awards are based on membership confirmed by the National Society as of February 1 of preceding year (1979). SEE FIGURE BESIDE CHAPTER NAME IN CHAPTER REGENTS DIRECTORY.

Bylaws

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National and State Bylaws.

Change of Address

Notice of change of address of members shall be sent to the Organizing Secretary General, Treasurer General, State Regent and State Registrar.

Change of Name

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to State Registrar, Treasurer General and State Regent.

Chapter Elections

Chapter elections shall be held preferably in April or early May and names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, Administration Building, 1776 D Street, N. W., Washington, D. C. 20006, to the State Regent, and to the Recording Secretary. The full Christian name of Chapter officers shall be given together with her husband's given name or initials, address and zip code.

Dues

Pay to State Treasurer State Dues of \$2.00 per member before December 1. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the February 1 and two April Board meetings of the National Society. National Dues of \$10.00 per member sent to the Treasurer-General, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20006 before December 1, 1979.

Conference Registration Fee

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer with the State dues on or before December 1, \$3.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Rules for representation of chapters at Continental Congress: "Chapters having less than 50 paid members on February 1 are entitled to be represented by the Regent or in her absence the Vice Regent or alternate; chapters having 50 to 199 paid members on February 1, one delegate in addition to the Regent; chapters having 200 to 299 paid members on February 1, two delegates in addition to the Regent, and for each additional 100 members one additional delegate." (Article XIII, Section 3-C, National Bylaws).

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$3.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. (Article VIII, Section 4, of the State Bylaws).

Contributions

All contributions by Chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

Deceased Members

Deaths shall be reported promptly to Treasurer General and State Chaplain. Complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and a date of death shall be furnished State Chaplain priot to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for Conference Memorial Service and "In Memoriam" pages for State Proceedings.

Georgia Hospitality Fund

The following resolution which applies to the Georgia Hospitality Fund appears in the Proceedings for 1955:

"WHEREAS, The Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds an annual dinner in Washington each year during Continental Congress, which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society.

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$100.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes:

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this fund shall not be cumulative. Adopted."

GENERAL NEW REGIME FUND BALANCE \$2,500

The following resolution which applies to the General New Regime Fund Balance of \$2,500.00 appears in the Proceedings for 1959-1960, page 41: "RESOLVED, That at the end of each regime all money in the General Fund above \$2,500.00 be transferred to the Savings Account; when the Supplemental Audit Report is made as of June 1 every two years before the Auditors close out the books this transaction be handled in order to show in this Audit, thus making the General Fund show the same balance of \$2,500.00 at the beginning of each new regime. ADOPTED."

Procedure Book of Instructions for Officers and State Chairmen

The following resolution which applies to a Procedure Book of Instruction for Officers and State Chairmen appears in the Proceedings for 1959-1960, Page 41.

"RESOLVED, That all Officers and State Chairmen keep a Procedure Book of Instructions and helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new Officer and Chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities thus providing a continuing continuity of DAR work, ADOPTED.

Genealogical Records

To insure uniformity and convenience in binding, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, $8\frac{1}{2}$ by 11 inches, with $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 inch margin on left side, $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches at top and 1 inch on right side and at bottom. Three topies shall be sent to State Chairman of Genealogical Records.

Information for Chapter Regents

1. All letters received by Chapter Regents relating to the work of the Society shall be distributed to the corresponding Chapter Chairman and brought to the attention of the members at a chapter meeting.

2. Please follow Resolution No. 11, adopted at 61st Georgia Society State Conference, as follows: "Resolved, That a closing date of February 1 be established for all reports, and all reports be given from February 1 to February 1, regardless of a change of regime or Regent." All awards will be made on this date basis.

State Officers and State Chairmen shall send to the State Regent and to the State Treasurer a copy of any instruction letter mailed to chapters.

Nominations

The following resolution which applies to the announcement of the candidacy for State Regent appears in the Proceedings of the Twentieth State Conference, 1918:

"Resolved, that it is the judgment of the Executive Board that announcements for State Regent should not be made... earlier than three months prior to the meeting of the Conference and they shall be furnished to the Press for publication."

Proceedings

Two copies of the Proceedings will be sent to each Chapter. One copy to be retained by Regent, one copy given to the Chapter Treasurer. Additional copies, if available, must be secured from the State Recording Secretary at \$2.00 per copy, plus \$1.00 for postage if to be mailed.

Reports for Proceedings

State Officers', State Chairmen's and Chapter Regents' reports for Proceedings shall be as concise as possible-not to exceed 250 words-typewritten (DOUBLE SPACED) upon one side of three-hole punched, unruled paper, 8¹/₂ by 11 inches, and shall be sent to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary on or before February 15, the ORIGINAL being sent to the Secretary for the Proceedings, CHAP-TERS COMPETING FOR THE HONOR ROLL, BY FEBRUARY 1.

A standard HEADING of ALL reports must conform to the Headings found in the Proceedings and must start at least $1^{1/2}$ inches from top of sheet of paper. Leave 1 inch between bottom of Heading and start of report. LEFT MARGIN of report must be 1 inch minimum. Please check previous Proceedings for correct heading. Winners of awards of State Officers and State Chairmen shall be listed on a SEPARATE sheet of paper. State Officers and State Chairmen send to the State Recording Secretary and the State Regent, the awards to be given next year on a SEPARATE sheet of paper-exactly as it is to be printed in the Proceedings.

Resolutions

CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION Mrs. Charles Quillian Hall Senior State President

The Georgia Society C.A.R. has had a very active, busy, and exciting year with the very capable leadership of our State President, Herbert Miller, Jr.

The Thirty-Ninth Annual State Conference was held on February 24, 25, 26, 1978, at Callaway Gardens in Pine Mountain, hosted by the Brunswick and Lucy Spell Raiford Societies. One Hundred and seventy-six members and seniors attended this most successful conference.

A delegation of 29 traveled by mini-bus, train, and plane to represent Georgia at the 83rd Annual National Convention, April 21-23, 1978. Highlights were: Georgia winning first place State award for the Endowment Fund, Winona Society winning first place Society award for Endowment Fund, and our 1977-1978 State President, Carol-King Russell, received one of the State President's awards.

Four Georgians were installed in impressive ceremonies at Mount Vernon. Mr. Gerald Glenn Fling was installed as Senior National Second Vice-President, Mrs. Charles Quillian Hall was installed as Senior State President, Jonathan Alderman was installed as National Vice President of the Southeastern Region, and Herb Miller was installed as State President for 1978-1979.

The 28th Annual Southeastern Regional Conference, presided over by Jonathan Alderman of Georgia, was held in Winter Park, Florida, on July 28-29, 1978. National President, William H. Rardin, III, and Senior National President, Mrs. Stanleigh Swan, led a list of 30 distinguished National and State Officers from throughout the USA. A first place award for the Best State Newssheet, the CARgoes, and a first place award for the Best State Yearbook were won by Georgia. The Fort Frederica Society received the second place award for the Best Society Scrapbook.

The Georgia State Workshop, held August 11-12, 1978, in Atlanta, Georgia, was hosted by Allen Howard, Cherokee Rose, Habersham, and Sergeant Newton, Jr. Societies. C.A.R. State packets, similar to the C.A.R. National Summer packets, were presented and explained by the State Chairmen to be used as guidelines for the coming year. 40 members, 19 DAR and S.A.R., and five guests attended.

On November 4, 1978, 52 members and seniors representing thirteen of Georgia's 20 Societies met in Savannah for the Government Studies Seminar. A representative from the Department of the Interior presented a program on the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. During the afternoon, members toured the Fort Pulaski Monument as the National Heritage Tour for the seminar, and attended a reception at the home of Mr. and Mrs. G. G. Fling.

Georgia has 20 sponsored C.A.R. Societies with 494 members. 77 new members this year has fulfilled our State President, Herbert Miller's, State Project of Membership and his state theme of "I Will Plant Companionship Thick as Trees Along the Riverbanks of America." Programs by the local Societies have followed the National Theme of "A Past to Remember — A Future to Mold." Visits by the State President and Senior State President were made for special Society Programs: Annual installation of the Winona, Fort Frederica, and Lucy Spell Raiford Societies, A S.A.R. Organizational meeting given by the James Watson Society, Dedication of the Pace House and Tea with the Uchee Trail Society, a visit to the Amos Giles Rhodes Memorial Hall with Habersham Society, a visit to the Cherokee Rose and Allen Howard Society for their Indian Program with a Cherokee Indian Princess as guest, and an Indian Arrowhead hunt and dance with Martha Stewart Bulloch Society.

Georgia State and Senior State C.A.R. officers took part in the Yorktown Day Celebration in Virginia, Kings Mountain March in South Carolina, Sesquicentennial Celebration in Columbus, Georgia, WSB-TV "Salute to America Parade" in Atlanta, Georgia, DAR State Conference in Atlanta, and DAR Workshops, and the S.A.R. State Conference in Macon.

Georgia *CARgoes* continues to be one of the top four newssheets in the Nation. 94 State Patriots help support this interesting and informative newssheet which should be read in every C.A.R.-DAR Home. Georgia also has the Top Yearbook in the Nation. Georgia has 31 National Life Promoters, 44 National Promoters, and 63 State Promoters, continuing to grow. One Major Benefactor Pin, eight Endowment Fund Pins, and five "300" Club Pins were awarded during the year.

Georgia C.A.R. Members completed a year of accomplishment at the Fortieth Annual State Conference March 2-4, 1979, held on Jekyll Island, hosted by Fort Frederica Society, with a registration of 132, representing 14 of the 20 societies, and attended by 11 C.A.R. National and Senior National Officers. 37 First place awards with traveling silver trophies were won by nine top Societies, with six other Societies winning second and third place awards.

It has been an honor and privilege to serve the Georgia State Society, N.S.C.A.R., as Senior State President for 1978-1979. One of the pleasures of this office has been the friendships that I and my family have made throughout the year in the Nation and State. Another pleasure is the growth I have seen in our members of our Georgia Society. This has been a very busy year, filled with hours of preparation of meetigs, reports, and travel; it has been one of the most satisfying and productive years of my life.
