Past Chapter Regent of Tomochichi Chapter, Mrs. Stribling devoted many years of selfless service to the Daughters of the American Revolution. Her willingness to help others and to share her talents at every level of work in our Society, she exemplified the finest ideals of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Of all her accomplishments as State Regent, she took special pride in the gift she encouraged Georgia Daughters to make to Berry Schools. Three stained glass windows behind the altar in Frost Memorial Chapel at Berry were a gift of the Georgia Daughters as a memorial to the Berry students who made the supreme sacrifice in World War II.

As Chaplain General, Mrs. Stribling led the efforts to see the deed to Meadow Garden in Augusta, home of George Walton, a Signer of the Declaration of Independence, transferred from the National Society to the Georgia State Society. She reminded the voters at the 1960 Continental Congress that Georgia Daughters had preserved and maintained the property for many years and should rightfully own that which they had kept at no expense to the National Society. During her term as Chaplain General she also served as advisor to the Kansas Daughters as they developed the Kansas Chapel in Memorial Continental Hall.

In 1950 Mrs. Stribling was named by the National Defense Committee of the National Society as Defense Woman of the Year. From 1974 to 1976 she served the National Officers Club as Second Vice President.

On August 26, two days after her 94th birthday, Lenamae French Stribling passed from this Life Militant to enter the Life Triumphant. An inspiration to all who knew her, she was truly —

The Proposed Amendment: Article V, Section 1, Election of Officers

To add "by ballot" and to editorially rearrange. The Section would then read:

The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected biennially by ballot at the annual State Conference.

Mrs. Bahin, by direction of the Bylaws Committee, moved the adoption of the amendment. Amendment adopted.

The Proposed Amendment: Article V, Section 3, Election of Officers

To editorially rearrange the first sentence of section three, add *and shall have served a full term as a chapter regent or chapter officer of a Georgia chapter prior to her election*, and to delete the entire last sentence which says essentially the same thing as the first sentence. The Section would then read:

To be eligible for state office, a member shall have held membership in a chapter within the Georgia State Society for at least five (5) years prior to her election and shall have served a full term as a chapter regent or chapter officer of a Georgia chapter prior to her election. No member shall be eligible to the same State office for two successive terms. A member having served more than one-half term in the State office shall be deemed to have served a term.

Mrs. Bahin, by direction of the Bylaws Committee, moved the adoption of the amendment. Amendment adopted.

The Proposed Amendment: Article V, Section 4, Election of Officers

To delete Section 4 and adopt a new Section 4. The Section would then read:

Nominations for State office shall be made by the state nominating committee and may be made from the floor. (a) The state nominating committee shall consist of five (5) members. The members and one alternate for each, shall be elected by ballot at the

annual state conference immediately preceding the biennial election. A majority shall elect. (b) No member of the state nominating committee shall serve twice in succession. Members and alternates elected to the committee shall have been members of a Georgia chapter for at least five (5) years, shall be in good standing in their chapter, shall have been either a chapter regent or officer or a state committee chairman and must have attended at least two (2) state meetings during the last two years. (c) The chairman shall be elected by the members of the committee. Only elected members, or their elected alternate, may attend and serve at any meeting of the committee. The quorum shall be three (3). (d) Chapters may send recommendations with qualifications and endorsement to the state nominating committee until October first of the year preceding the biennial election. In October, the committee shall send uniform blanks to the regents of the chapters which have submitted recommendations with the request for confirmation of the chapter's endorsement, nominee's consent and nominee's qualifications. These blanks shall be returned to the chairman by November fifteenth and from these the nominating committee shall prepare a ticket consisting of one or more candidates for each office. By December first, the chairman shall send a copy of the ticket to the State Regent so that she may include the ticket in her call to State Conference. (e) The chairman of the state nominating committee shall report at the first business meeting of the State Conference. Open nominations may be made from the floor provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained and the nominee has the endorsement of her chapter in writing. (f) The state nominating committee shall provide ballots for the election carrying the names of all candidates for office. (g) Uniform blanks for recommendation for state office shall be distributed through the state packet and shall be available at all state meetings at the state literature table.

On the motion of Mrs. W. A. Shubert, it was moved and seconded that (before the State Society amends this section) the Bylaws Committee actively solicits input from the chapters (on the composition and election of a state nominating committee). Adopted.

On the motion of Mrs. Samuel M. Merritt, it was moved and seconded that the amendment to Article V, Section 4 be referred back to the Bylaws Committee for further study. Adopted.



She is grateful for the opportunity to serve the State Society in this office and under the leadership of our capable State Regent.

STATE REGISTRAR - Miss Kay Yarbrough

The State Registrar has kept the membership files current for the Georgia State Society according to the printouts received from the Office of the Registrar General. The National Society reported 7908 members of the Georgia State Society in February, 1991. During the year we have had 309 new members admitted by application of which 72 are Juniors, 33 by reinstatement and 83 by transfer in. Georgia lost 175 members by death, 142 by resignation, 76 by transfer out and 68 members were dropped by the National Society for nonpayment of dues. The membership at large stands at 182. The official membership count as of February 1992 is 7872. This officer attended State Conference, Continental Congress, District Workshops, Fall Board of Management, and all Executive Board Meetings. The primary project of the office of State Registrar has been to computerize the files of the Georgia membership. This was completed in December 1991. It has been a privilege to serve the Daughters of the Georgia State Society under the leadership of Mrs. Donald D. Hankinson, State Regent.

STATE HISTORIAN - Mrs. James F. Forsyth

A special word of thanks to chapter regents and historians for reporting work done in 102 chapters. Chapters reported \$416.00 contributed to the Americana Room. This was quite an increase from last year. Reports showed that 180 historical programs were given for adults and 35 for school children. Rebecca Sykes Chambers (Mrs. Alan) was selected as Georgia's "Outstanding Teacher of American History." Mrs. Chambers was sponsored by the Baron DeKalb Chapter. Graves marked were: 4 Revolutionary Soldiers, and 55 DAR members. Four Historical Markers were placed; 6 historic restorations were begun and 3 completed. The graves of Revolutionary Soldiers were rededicated by the Etowah Chapter, Nancy Hart Chapter and as a joint project by the Oglethorpe, George Walton, and Button Gwinnett Chapters. The grave of Honorary State Regent, Mrs. John F. Thigpen, was marked by the Joseph Habersham Chapter. This officer completed and returned to the office of Historian General, a NSDAR Centennial Records Management Project Report. Many hours have been spent typing the supplement of the *History of the Georgia State Society*. Thank you, Madam State Regent, for the opportunity to serve the State Society as historian.

STATE LIBRARIAN - Mrs. Sterling P. Jones

Georgia Daughters continue to be enthusiastic and generous in their contributions to library work on the local, State, and National levels. Your State Librarian attended 4 District Workshops, Fall Board of Management, State Conference, and all Executive Board Meetings, wrote thank you letters to chapters for book donations and answered all queries. Ninety-seven chapters reported with 10 having programs on the NSDAR Library and/or local libraries. Chapters have donated gifts of books, Bibles, subscriptions, genealogy material, and funds to State and local libraries. Chapters have given \$143 to the NSDAR Library Purchase Fund; \$32 to the Rebinding Fund; \$157 to Indian

Collection; 160 hours volunteered to Georgia Department of Archives and History and National Archives; over 6000 hours to local libraries; 281 books donated to genealogy, 34 to microfilm, 133 to periodicals and subscriptions that valued over \$6600; 5815 books given to VA hospital, 6 to women's collection; and 6 worked toward Bookworm Pin. Chapters continued their support through the Friends of the Library with \$463 being contributed. Twenty-six books were confirmed accepted by the NSDAR Library. This past year has been a very rewarding year for this officer under the capable leadership of our State Regent.

National Committee Reports

AMERICAN HERITAGE, Mrs. Donald S. McClain

Great response from 97 chapters reporting to this chairman. American Heritage programs statewide included: Family Heirlooms, Art of Rughooking, Christmas at Williamsburg Through Design and Music, Historical Flags of the United States and Georgia, Ball Gowns of First Ladies, Basketweaving in Colonial Era, Early American Silver, Dolls in America, and Changes in Fashion, 1957-1991, were a few of the 177 programs given. There were more than 94 Historic tours which interested our Georgia Daughters at Pebble Hill Plantation in Thomasville, Bulloch Hall in Roswell, Rev. Sam Jones Home, Roselawn, in Cartersville, and the Colonial Coast of Georgia. We had 237 volunteers working in historic sites and 131 members serving on historic preservation committees. Repairs made to museums and buildings, historic markers, quilt projects, and laminating old newspapers were accomplished by chapter members. One chapter offered a sign for Dell-Goodall House while restoration was continued in Pearson-Boyer Home. Another restoration was started in a 76 year old farmhouse in Cherokee County. A Chapter gave \$7000 toward reconstruction of a home at McIntosh Reserve. What great strides and many hours of labor have been faithfully given by wonderful Georgia Daughters to preserve our American Heritage!

AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH, Mrs. Buxton L. Daniel

One hundred-one of Georgia's 108 chapters reported the diligent work of the American History Month Committee. Seventy-eight chapters, 273 schools, and 4,802 contestants participated with the American History Essay Contest. Twenty-five schools participated for the first time. Georgia's winners are: 8th grade: Treah Rebecca Caldwell, Baron DeKalb Chapter; 7th grade: Candler Baxley, Peter Early Chapter; 6th grade: Elizabeth Hudson Garrett, Governor Jared Irwin Chapter; and 5th grade: Richard Moore, Peter Early Chapter. Ninety-three chapters had American History programs, 46 observed George Washington's birthday, 43 had displays, and 37 recognized outstanding history students. Forty-six chapters had spot announcements on radio, 15 on TV, and 42 in schools. There were 75 pictures and 1,860 inches in the newspapers. Governor Zell Miller and 48 Mayors issued Proclamations naming February as American History Month. There were 129 posters and 170 stickers purchased. Excellent students in American History received 175 medals, 1,264 certificates, 23 books, and 213 other gifts. The American History Vice-Chairman were very helpful and conscientious, and I am grateful to them. They are: NE - Mrs. William E. Shubert; NW - Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr.; SE - Mrs. Lynn Grice Walshak; and SW - Mrs. Perry L. Bridges. It has been an honor and a privilege serving the Georgia State Society.

AMERICAN INDIANS, Mrs. Lawrence Avery

Ninety-five DAR Chapters reported. Thirty-nine Chapters listed interesting programs on American Indians. There was active participation in all phases of this Committee. The largest single contribution in financial assistance was made by Abraham Baldwin

Chapter which raised \$7000 for the reconstruction of Creek Indian Chief William McIntosh's log house at McIntosh Reserve in Carroll County. Brunswick Chapter sent 11 packages of clothing valued at \$2,000 to Bacone's Thrift Shop. John Laurens Chapter provided 368 Campbell Soup labels. All chapters are to be commended for their continued support of this very important committee. Bonaventure Chapter, Betty Tomat, Chairman, was awarded First Place Certificate (\$10.00) for the best report. LaGrange Chapter, Mrs. B. P. Moores, Chairman, was awarded Second Place Certificate (\$5.00). Colonel John McIntosh Chapter, Ethel Joiner, Chairman, was awarded Certificate (\$10.00) for the best overall report. Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure serving on this committee during your Administration.

AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP, Miss Mary King

The American's Creed was repeated at meetings by 95 chapters; the Preamble to the Constitution by 48, appearing in 47 yearbooks. Fifty-nine had Americanism programs with 8 presenting 1 on radio/TV or elsewhere. Six had a program on the Immigration Act and 84 on the Constitution. Sixty-seven chapters placed patriotic literature in schools and libraries. Twenty-two sponsored Americanism essays and poster contests. Over 6,000 DAR Manuals were given to citizenship applicants and 260 purchased for others. Twenty-six chapters reported over 30 members working with Americanism classes or to reduce illiteracy, spending 3180 hours. (A praiseworthy increase.) Fourteen chapters regularly attended Naturalization ceremonies, giving 365 flags, 710 Flag Codes, 200 Welcome Cards, 460 American Creed Cards and 120 other items. Two sponsored receptions. John Laurens Chapter gave an Americanism Award to Margot Prada with presentation in the Federal Courthouse by the U.S. District Judge and hosted a luncheon and tea in her honor. Outstanding publicity. Vidalia Chapter presented an Americanism Award to Elizabeth Nasser Holmes at a dinner meeting. Also outstanding publicity. Joseph Habersham Chapter presented an Americanism Award to George Yacoubian, with publicity, and also a Medal of Honor to Deen Day Smith.

CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION, Mrs. R. E. Scott

Twenty Chapters sponsor C.A.R. Societies. Two new societies were organized this year. One Sons and Daughters of Liberty and Sukey Hart. Thirty-two DAR Chapters provide senior leadership with 12 Daughters being C.A.R. Senior State Officers. Twenty-three Daughters serve as Senior State Chairmen and 13 as Senior Society Presidents of C.A.R. Societies. Over 100 Daughters became State Patriots and Promoters. Five became National Promoters. One Daughter is a National Officer. Two Daughters serve on the National Board of Management. One Daughter contributed \$100.00 toward the National Endowment Fund. One contributed \$100.00 toward the C.A.R. National Project. Twelve contributed \$25.00 for State Honor Pins. More than 70 Daughters participated in C.A.R. state functions during the year. Many Chapters invited C.A.R. to luncheons, while other Chapters invited C.A.R. to other functions. In keeping with the State President's project, 10 societies contributed \$100.00 toward Meadow Garden. C.A.R. contributed 2 bricks (\$25.00 each) to the Tamassee brick walk in honor of the State President, William C. Hurst, Jr., and Senior State President, Mrs. R. E. Scott. Contributions to the local and State C.A.R. totaled almost \$2000.00. We would like for more Chapters to give more help and show more interest in C.A.R., the future of Daughters and Sons of the American Revolution. CONSERVATION, Mrs. John K. Bretch

"Good Caretakers of God's World," Georgia Daughters are doing just that. Sixteen Chapters have 100% membership buying or contributing to recycling. Plantings: shrubs 786, trees 499,609, bulbs 959. Recycling: 9475 lbs. paper, 1280 lbs. cans, plastic 50 lbs.,

glass 1125 lbs. Chapter gave money to Nature Conservancy and Forest Service for Tropical Rain Forest, planting of seedlings in National Forest. Four Chapters planted trees commemorating The Bill of Rights. Chapters worked with SAR, C.A.R., Boy Scouts. Chapter members attended conservation workshop including this chairman. Governor Jared Irwin Chapter owns, maintains park in Sandersville. Trees have been planted on school grounds, Habitat for Humanity Home, public property, Tamasee, Berry College. Conservation exhibits: school libraries, city library, department store. Abraham Baldwin Chapter was honored by "Take Pride In America" national awards program for work on public lands. Drawing held by Chapter winner received membership to Conservation Society. Soil Conservation, fire, Arbor Day observed. In 1990, the Constitution Week committee was named 1st place winner in the Nation and Peter Early Chapter - 3rd place. State winners were Benjamin Hawkins Chapter - 2nd place and John Laurens Chapter - 3rd place. Button Gwinnett, George Walton and Oglethorpe Chapters were 1st place Joint Chapter winners. Five Georgia Daughters, Mrs. James J. Leitch, Historian General; Mrs. Donald D. Hankinson, State Regent; Mrs. Billy W. Hunter, NE District Director; Mrs. Charles E. Beams, NW District Director and Mrs. Robert B. Vance, Sr., co-host of annual SAR-DAR Constitution Week Luncheon, joined the State Chairman in Atlanta where we witnessed the Honorable Zell Miller, Governor, proclaim September 17-23, 1991 as Constitution Week. Georgia Chapters again outdid themselves during the week with 82 reporting. Different Chapters stressed the excellent involvement from the youngest school children to the senior citizens with over 6,000 inches of publicity, radio and television, stores, restaurants, libraries, schools, banks, post offices, courthouses, churches, nursing and retirement homes decorated with creative posters and displays, gaily colored banners and flags flying - who could not be touched! DAR GOOD CITIZENS, Mrs. Moody C. Summers, Jr.

One hundred Chapters reported with 89 participating in the selection of 250 Good Citizens from the 292 Schools contacted. The 4 District winners are: Northeast District, Katherine Virginia Elmore sponsored by Philadelphia Winn Chapter; Southeast District, Joshua Eric Kight sponsored by John Laurens Chapter; Northwest District, John Wesley Waller sponsored by John Houstoun Chapter and Southwest District, Margaret Fulton Holman sponsored by Peter Early Chapter. Each District winner will receive \$50.00 and the State winner, John Wesley Waller, will receive \$250.00 and the State Good Citizen Pin. Most Chapters honor their winners with special award ceremonies including teas, luncheons and meetings that include their parents when the pins and certificates are presented. There was a total of \$415.00 cash and a \$50.00 savings bond presented. One-fourth of a year's tuition was given by a local Community College and 1 Chapter offers the same. DAR MAGAZINE ADVERTISING, Mrs. Theodore C. Whitson

The Georgia State Society celebrated its 100th birthday on April 15, 1991 and this was commemorated in the August-September Georgia issue of the DAR Magazine. The total revenue from Georgia was \$7,575.00. Sixty-eight chapters participated in the 1991 Co-op ads. Reports were received by 101 chapters. Hightower Award presented to 53 chapters with Fielding Lewis and Sunbury honored for largest per capita contributions. Seventy-two chapters had full program, 46,546 labels, 7,536 trading stamps and coupons, and resale items 19,869 pounds were contributed by 89 chapters. School contributions: Tamasee, \$9,423.70; KDS, \$3,953.20; Berry, \$1,189.34; Crossnore, \$1,018.00; Hillside, \$706.00; Hindman, \$727.00 - totaling \$17,017.24. Participation has been enthusiastic for the

Endowment Trust Fund for the Talmadge Auditorium/Gymnasium with \$6,975.50 being received. This administration with this year's contributions, per capita, interest from checking and surplus monies after closing of books will have completed the 1st \$25,000.00 of the \$50,000.00 required for the Endowment Fund. This money will be combined with the \$14,440.00 CD at Tamasee. Stage curtains and backdrops for the Tamasee Auditorium were installed in time for Founders' Day. Thanks to P. Collins, Ltd. (fabric) and Greenville Stage Equipment Co., Inc. (construction and installation) for making this possible for \$2,287.00. Amount to be repaid on Stage Curtains is paid with approval being given at Finance Committee 3/8/92. The Society was glad to have Mr. Gary Cantrell, Tamasee, attend District Workshops. The continuing support of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Hightower, Jr., for the Hightower Award is appreciated by the Georgia State Society. Berry College Scholarship recipients are: Barbara Buchanan, Janet M. Merritt Scholarship; Shannon Baker, Edna De Lamar Kendrick Scholarship. The Georgia Daughters were pleased Mr. J. Brendan McGowan, Hillside School, and Mr. Mike Mullins, Hindman Settlement School, were able to attend the Georgia Luncheon at Continental Congress and gave a brief statement.

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERAN-PATIENTS, Mrs. William P. Tillman

Georgia DAR members have done outstanding work this year for Veteran-Patients and I congratulate each Chapter Chairman. Ninety-nine chapters reported; 428 members made 648 visits to VA facilities; \$12,517 gifts, cash donated by chapters; \$1,800 by one member's employer for 500 Christmas stockings. Included were hours of volunteer service in VA Medical Centers, Military Hospitals, Nursing Homes, Private Hospitals, and other institutions. Gifts consisted of lap robes, afghans and other handmade items, books, games, cash for canteen books and clothes for men and women patients. All patriotic days were celebrated with programs and parties; flags were put on Veterans' graves; many news articles told of DAR participation in local events. Thank each of you for your participation and support of this committee.

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, Miss Patricia A. Glenn

Reports were received from 99 Chapters. 3,711 Flags reported presented; 3,486 Flag Codes; 590 Children's Flag Codes; 3,494 books and pamphlets and 2 Braille Flags given. 31 Flag Certificates were presented; 382 Flag spots on radio, 6 on TV, and 60 newspaper articles written. 46 programs were presented on the Flag including those by Mrs. Theodore C. Whitson on all the Flags of Georgia, and the continued delightful portrayal by Mrs. Gordon W. Kilgore, Sr., as Betsy Ross. 16 Chapters reported they kept a scrapbook on the Flag; 29 presented Flag Facts at every meeting; 74 used Flag Stamps on mailings; 53 checked classrooms for Flags; 87 urged members to fly the Flag and 93 opened their meetings with Pledge of Allegiance. Chapters included wonderful narrative reports of their special activities selling flags, giving them to classrooms, being part of patriotic parades, civic ceremonies, welcoming troops home from the Gulf conflict and demonstrating the proper retirement of worn or soiled flags as well as correct ways to fly or display the Flag. Many chapters had returning veterans of Operation Desert Storm as program speakers, learning firsthand about their participation in the war. Working with this Committee has been an honor and privilege.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS, Mrs. Everett E. Porter, Jr.

Twelve chapters submitted 1,123 pages of original source records and indexes to be sent to the NSDAR Library. The Georgia Archives, Washington Memorial Library, and the Georgia Historical Society Library received a total of 3,369 pages of new records (5 books each). Work is under way to complete the indexing of the unindexed volumes of previously submitted volumes of genealogical records housed at the Georgia Archives. A total of 6 volumes were indexed this year, bringing the total volumes which have been indexed to 157. Volunteers are working to index about 30 more volumes to complete this project. Two Bookworm Pins and 2 Bookworm Bars have been earned this year, bringing the total to 53 pins and 24 bars earned through this project. This Chairman is also working

to catalog the entire collection and to coordinate it with the Georgia Collection at the NSDAR Library. So far 300 volumes have been cataloged and the catalogs are in use at the Georgia Archives. Many researchers have been aided in the use of these valuable records by this catalog. Catalogs for the remaining 200 volumes will be completed in 1992, at which time the catalogs for the entire 500 volume collection will be sent to the NSDAR Library.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS FROM GEORGIA - 1992

This year 12 chapters have submitted new genealogical records. These records have been sent to the NSDAR Library, Georgia Department of Archives and History in Atlanta, Washington Memorial Library in Macon, and the Georgia Historical Society in Savannah. HONOR ROLL, Mrs. James L. Brown

For the 6th consecutive year, Georgia has had 100% reporting, with reports to this Committee received from all of Georgia's 108 chapters. Seventy-eight percent of Georgia's 108 chapters should receive Honor Roll recognition. Pending confirmation from National, Georgia should receive 46 Gold, 23 Silver, and 15 Honorable Mention awards. State totals may change following Congress, as confirmation is not received until then. Georgia has been honored to have Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall serving as National Vice Chairman of the Southeastern Division. This Chairman thanks the Chapter Regents, Honor Roll Chairmen, and Treasurers for their cooperation, and the State Regent, Mrs. Donald D. Hankinson, for the opportunity of serving the Georgia State Society as the Chairman of National Honor Roll.

JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZEN, Mrs. Ronald H. Salter

Thirty-seven chapters contributed \$137 to the JAC national prize fund. Many thanks to Oothcaloga and Thomasville Chapters for continuing to contribute to the JAC contest. Seven chapters have youth groups with at least 19 schools involved in JAC. 1420 pins were issued; 1420 membership cards were given; 42 handbooks for JAC clubs were distributed. Fort Peachtree Chapter gave 1479 flags. Two clubs had participants in the JAC contest; Thomasville Chapter had 720 and Oothcaloga Chapter had 65. Therefore, our state, region, and national winnings will be contained in 2 chapters. We have 4 less participating chapters than in 1991. All but 7 chapters sent in a "no report" to your state chairman. Our youth is our heritage; we must increase our support.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP, Mrs. Don Allmond

A total of 93 chapters reported with 31 chapters having a Junior serving as their committee chairman. Other Juniors have served as Chapter Regent, Officer, Chairman, State Chairman and Vice Chairman as well as Pages. Seventy-two new Juniors have been added to Georgia's roster this year. This committee is honored to have 2 Georgia "Juniors-at-Heart" serving on the National level: Mrs. Calvin C. Kammeyer as National Chairman,

and Miss Melodye G. Brown as National Vice Chairman of the Southeastern Division. Throughout the state, Junior members have actively participated in all phases of DAR work, especially the Junior Membership Committee. They have supported the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund through the sales and purchases of DAR approved items such as jewelry, Innisbrook Wraps, stationery, and the Junior Bazaar. Their efforts have earned \$1,766.00. Georgia's outstanding Junior member for 1992 is Mrs. Ronald D. Kent of Sukey Hart Chapter. This Chairman would like to recognize and thank Mrs. James E. Hernandez, Jr., Vice Chairman of Contest, and Mrs. William Daniel McCranie, II, of Sales. Madam Regent, it has been an exciting 2 years. Thank you for allowing this Chairman the opportunity to serve our State Society.

LINEAGE RESEARCH, Mrs. Robert B. Vance, Sr.

Annual reports were received from 96 chapters, all beautifully prepared. Workshops were held by 19 chapters, with 260 potential members assisted, and 90 members acquired. Chapter Chairman received 223 requests with 7 requests sent to the State Chairman. Lineage Research Kits purchased were 11, and 24 Kits given by 1 chapter. Fifteen chapters had Lineage Research programs with subjects: "Supplementals, how to do research and fill out papers" - "Ways to verify proofs for acceptance of Applications and Supplementals," etc. This Chairman assisted, researched, and typed 42 SAR applications - all were approved. Eighteen chapters have suggested ways this committee can be of help to the chapters as: Establish a yearly workshop in districts - More books for local libraries - County Library or Historical Society refer questions to DAR Chapters - Services offered at local libraries by DAR, etc. Georgia is honored to have Mrs. Fred A. Miller, Jr., serving as National Vice Chairman of the Southeastern Division. Thanks to the chapters for better reports this year, and to the Vice Chairmen of this committee for programs and research when called upon. Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure to serve this committee under your capable leadership.

MEMBERSHIP, Mrs. Calvin C. Kammeyer

Congratulations to the 99 Chapters reporting on membership. This chairman found that 667 prospective members were contacted about applying for membership in the DAR in the 1991-1992 year. The following pieces of DAR literature were dispensed by Georgia Chapters: 326 DAR In Action; 760 Fact Sheets; 700 Know the DAR; 156 Membership Guides. The membership guide is a very important and helpful brochure. This chairman hopes it will be used more in the future. The following Chapters receive thanks for entering the National Prospective Member Contest: Cherokee, Etowah, Martha Stewart Bulloch, Philadelphia Winn, William Marsh and Joseph Habersham. Membership is the Future of DAR. Tell the story of this great organization and continue to get new members! It has been a pleasure to serve the Georgia State Society.

MOTION PICTURE, RADIO AND TELEVISION, Mrs. Gordon W. Kilgore, Sr.

To the 92 chapters reporting, thank you! Two chapters presented awards to media personnel for support in reporting DAR and other activities. 109 letters of praise and 98 letters of rebuke were written concerning programs on TV and Radio. The best TV shows for viewing by adults were: 60 Minutes, Murder She Wrote and the National Geographic Series. For children the winners were: Sesame Street, Cosby Show and Disney Series. For the best motion pictures for adults the vote was for: Home Alone, Beauty and the Beast, Driving Miss Daisy. For children: Home Alone, Beauty and the Beast, Robin Hood. Preference for radio programs were: News, Sports and Classical Music. Chapters reported 58 members as having appeared on TV or Radio programs either to promote DAR or Civic organizations. One chapter reported excellent success in getting news of DAR on TV. It is important that the public let the media know its feelings on their selection of good materials for viewing. Also, to let them know that indecent programs will not be tolerated. Letters addressed to advertisers may help in this way to get better programs.

NATIONAL DEFENSE, Mrs. Jerido Ward

Annual reports were received from 98 chapters. At least 5 minutes were devoted to a National Defense report by all chapters reporting; 90 had one entire program on a National Defense topic. The 1991 resolutions adopted at Continental Congress were discussed by 94 chapters; 93 chapters had extra National Defense materials available at chapter meetings; and 24 made materials available to schools and 25 to libraries. Good Citizenship Medals were presented to 231 students; 109 Bronze Medals were presented to cadets in high schools and junior colleges; and Gold Medals were presented to 20 students in colleges and universities. 36 chapters reported giving \$206.00 to the ROTC Award Program, and 18 chapters contributed \$568.00 to Dollars for Defense. Chapter Chairman in 92 chapters encouraged their members to vote in every election. National Defense topics of greatest interest were: Desert Storm, Break-up of the Soviet Union and Women's Issues. Appreciation is expressed to the following chapters for their contributions of ROTC Medals to units in the Atlanta School System: Lyman Hall, Barnard Trail, Thomasville, John Floyd, Peter Early, Sergeant Newton, Hightower Trail, Xavier, Fort Frederica, Lamar-LaFayette, Tomochichi, Roswell King, Hancock, and John Franklin Wren (2).

PROGRAM, Mrs. Lance G. Davis

Again this year our Chapters have excelled. Over half sent in beautiful yearbooks for judging. It is increasingly difficult to select winners because they are so good. Supplements: 1 to 50, 1st place Bonaventure Chapter, 2nd place St. Andrew's Parish Chapter; 51 to 100, 1st place John Houstoun Chapter; 101 and over, 1st place Nancy Hart Chapter, 2nd place Savannah Chapter. This year the National Program has 5 categories and we are represented in 4: Centennial, 1st place John Laurens Chapter; Educational, 1st place John Laurens Chapter, 2nd place Fort Peachtree Chapter, 3rd place Sergeant Newton Chapter; Historical, 1st place Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter, 2nd place Sukey Hart Chapter, 3rd place William Witcher Chapter; Patriotic, 1st place Fort Peachtree Chapter, 2nd place Elijah Clarke Chapter, 3rd place Sergeant Newton Chapter. Awards for the National program will be made in Washington at Continental Congress. Films on Meadow Garden and Berry School as well as the tape on the 100th Anniversary Celebration were used and enjoyed for Chapter programs. Thanks again to our State Regent for the opportunity of serving.

PUBLIC RELATIONS, Mrs. Robert Wiltshire

All Georgia chapters made excellent progress in spreading our name and ideals throughout their communities with good media coverage. They were also creative in getting the word out by: distributing the DAR magazine to their local libraries; donating a copy of "The DAR Story" to a regional library; presenting a play to the public featuring the first President General and our 4 founders; buying advertising in local newspapers; regular announcements in church bulletins; conducting a DAR video screening at their Historical Society meeting; sponsoring information and sales booths at festivals; and many visual displays at Post Offices, libraries and schools. Activities in the community which kept our society visible included awards to schools and their students; Welcome speeches at citizenship ceremonies; co-op conservation projects with other civic organizations; welcome home celebrations for Desert Storm personnel; 4th of July parades; genealogy workshops and Constitution Week activities. SEIMES MICROFILM CENTER, Miss Elizabeth F. Stone

The Seimes Microfilm Center continued its Centennial project of completing the 1900 Census Soundex. 67 Georgia chapters worked toward completing this project by sending in \$535. The Elijah Clarke Chapter honored Miss Jessie J. Mize with a Life Membership to the Seimes Microfilm Center. The John Franklin Wren Chapter gave a Memorial to the Center in memory of Betty Stone DeLoach. Thank you, Madam State Regent, for allowing me to serve under your leadership. It has been an honor and a privilege to serve our great Society.

Special National Committee Reports

BICENTENNIAL OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, Mrs. J. L. Henderson

Eighty-eight chapters had programs on the Bill of Rights or Constitution, with 68 taking part in other activities promoting them. These activities included Mayor's proclamations, teas, luncheons, posters, exhibits, radio, TV shows, public forums, parades and newspaper articles. Georgia Daughters spoke before 34 adult groups and 79 young people's groups. Forty-eight chapters promoted "Let Freedom Ring" on December 15th with bells, carillons, sermons and church programs proclaiming Bill of Rights Day. One-hundred-thirteen Bicentennial trees were planted, 80 of these by the 3 Columbus Chapters at 15 schools. Over 1,485 "Bill of Responsibilities" were distributed. Peter Early Chapter sponsored a poster contest with the winning poster displayed in Washington, D. C., by Senator Wyche Fowler, and re-named a civic park in Blakely "Constitution Park." A Henry Walton Chapter member was instrumental in naming a park "U.S. Bicentennial of the Constitution Park" in Morgan County. Governor Treutlen Chapter sponsored a Bill of Rights forum with a judge, lady attorney, and black college professor conducting. This was taped and will be shown 4 times on Channel 31. George Walton Chapter distributed over 200 pocket-sized U.S. Constitutions to 1 school. Other outstanding reports by William Marsh, Cherokee, John Laurens and John Houstoun Chapters.

CENTENNIAL JUBILEE, NSDAR, Mrs. Erwin N. Kinne

"No report" was the response from 35 chapters. A total of 27 chapter subscriptions to the Centennial Call for the years 1987-1991 were sent in. Contributions to the Centennial Call were made by 41 chapter members. Centennial programs were held by 35 chapters. Centennial pins were purchased by 64 members. The video "A Century of Service to the Nation" is owned by 8 chapters. Centennial plates were purchased by 10 chapter members. Chapter records were checked for accuracy against National records of the Centennial Call Committee before preparation of the Centennial Call Book. It has been a privilege and pleasure to serve the State Society under the leadership of our capable and dynamic State Regent.

COLUMBUS QUINCENTENNIAL, Mrs. Alex S. Boyer, Jr.

Ninety-four chapters reported; 36 had programs. Celebrations are planned for October, 1992 but activities have laid ground work. State Regent spoke to several chapters and State Chairman is scheduled. One DAR is member of State Commission and 9 on local committees. Many will attend the celebration in Columbus, our Quincentennial City; other in Columbus, Ohio. Visits will be made to port cities when the 3 ships from Spain dock in the U.S. Programs have featured Columbus; Indians and Columbus; Before Columbus. Books have been distributed to public schools, who also received book marks with Columbus logo and slide shows. "Quincentennial Update" given at chapter meetings. Projects included art exchange between students in Athens, Ga., and Cartona, Italy; display from University Spanish and Art classes; cooperation with SAR and local genealogical societies; public displays and flags. Columbus Quincentennial pin available from Caldwell. Orders taken for pewter Jefferson cup engraved with crest of Columbus family. Postcards available and feature Nina, Pinta and Santa Maria and copy of first commemorative stamp printed by U. S. Postal Service.

ELLIS ISLAND RESTORATION, Mrs. William Dennis

This State Chairman had the honor of visiting Ellis Island on July 31, 1991. It was indeed spectacular to behold, but it was more than that. As I disembarked there came over me a great feeling of pride that so many came through this island to seek freedom, equality, justice and humanity, and that this great country spread out her arms of love and welcomed them, and they in turn flourished and made her great. This year 90 chapters reported the following activities: 17 full programs, 30 partial programs on Ellis Island; 3 programs were given to other organizations; 30 chapters discussed the Ellis Island Project; 1 chapter donated to the maintenance fund; 4 Daughters visited Ellis Island. News articles were displayed by 8 chapters and 3 chapters distributed leaflets describing the project. FRIENDS OF THE LIBRARY, Miss Melodye G. Brown

Contributions of \$372.00 were reported from 40 chapters and 42 individuals for the Friends of the Library Committee. Contributing at the Sponsor level was Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter. The Committee had 1 Sustaining member, Miss Florrie B. Jackson, of William Marsh Chapter. Chapters contributing at or above the Sustaining level were Baron DeKalb, Cherokee, John Clarke, and Oglethorpe. In the category of regular memberships were Augusta, Elijah Clarke, Fielding Lewis, Henry Walton, John Floyd, Nathaniel Macon, and Savannah Chapters. LITERACY CHALLENGE, Mrs. Edward L. McCranie

Chapters of the DAR and individual members have accepted the literacy challenge. Members served as volunteers in school and church literacy projects, correctional institutions, senior citizen centers and mental health centers. They have provided public relations concerning literacy by making speeches to civic and professional organizations to make them aware of the scope of the literacy problem. Twenty chapters had a program on literacy. The outstanding report listing projects and activities in 5 areas of support for the literacy program was submitted by Governor David Emanuel Chapter, Mrs. John Loren Dekle, Chapter Literacy Chairman. Volunteers worked at the Vocational-Technical School. Another volunteer taught a Chinese woman, proprietor of a new Chinese Restaurant, to learn to read and speak English. Others worked with the story hour at the library, while 1 member provided supervision of the Peer-Teaching Group. Colonel William Few Chapter continues with active support of the literacy program under the leadership and guidance of Mrs. Cary Bullock. They continue to develop new projects and activities. It has been an honor and privilege to be able to serve as chairman of this committee.

NSDAR MUSEUM CORRESPONDENT DOCENTS, Mrs. John A. Dunaway

Twenty-three programs were presented by the Docents to garden clubs, study clubs, schools and DAR chapters. Over 484 individuals enjoyed programs on our museum, toys, quilts and silver. New members were gained through the presentations and needed funds were donated to the museum. Three new docents were added to the committee this year: Mrs. Wrenshaw W. Belew, Miss Melodye G. Brown, and Mrs. Theodore C. Whitson. There are now 21 docents who are qualified and would appreciate being called to present a program.

PRESIDENT GENERAL'S PROJECT, Mrs. Leonard M. Andrus

It is an excellent report this chairman has compiled of the contributions made by all 108 Georgia Chapters to the President General's Project. The total contributions are \$6,067.08 for the current year. 32 chapters will receive 100% Certificates. 100% certificates have been earned by 90 chapters over the past 2 years. A very special "thank you" to John Houstoun and Sunbury Chapters. These 2 chapters will receive a 100% certificate again this year. This chairman is happy to report there were 4 chapters in Georgia contributing 200% or more over the past 2 years. Thank you, Madam State Regent, it has been a joy to serve the Georgia State Society as chairman of this committee.

State Standing Committee Reports

COORDINATOR OF DISTRICTS, Mrs. Theodore C. Whitson

Please read in the Proceedings the reports of the District Directors and the Minutes of the District Workshops and the Fall Board of Management meeting. This chairman has attended all state meetings and workshops during her 2 year term. The 2nd year began with a planning meeting of the State Regent, District Directors and the Coordinator of Districts. A letter of information was placed in every regent's summer packet. The format of the workshops was the same as 1990. Summer workshops were well attended as well as the Fall Board of Management meeting. Mrs. Hanf informed the members that the May Erwin Talmadge Auditorium was in need of new stage curtains, and as she has secured a very good price for fabric, she asked the committee to consider providing some of the funds for this project. On the motion of Mrs. Corbitt, it was moved and seconded that up to and no more than \$2,500.00 be drawn from the General Savings account to purchase fabric, construct and install stage curtains for the May Erwin Talmadge Auditorium at Tamassee DAR School. Motion passed. Mrs. Hankinson informed the committee on the status of the painted beaufet for the Georgia Room at the DAR Museum. The cost of the beaufet is \$25,000.00, \$16,000.00 has been paid as a down payment, and the balance needs to be paid by October 1, 1991. With the contributions that have been received to date, she said \$3,000.00 was needed to complete their transaction. On the motion of Mrs. McCranie, it was moved and seconded that \$3,000.00 be withdrawn from General Savings Account to be placed in the Georgia Room account for the purchase of the painted beaufet to be placed in the Georgia State Room in the DAR Museum in Washington. The money to be replaced as funds are credited to this account. Motion passed. Mrs. Kendrick informed the committee that there was a need for a printed guide of duties for the finance chairman and committee. Backdrops were included in the total cost. To date \$1,406.44 is needed to complete this project. Mrs. Hankinson informed the committee that the outstanding balance for the painted beaufet for the Georgia Room, NSDAR Museum, has been paid. She said that \$1,873.70 had been borrowed from the General Savings Account. The cost of shipping and handling was \$1,140.22. The ex officio members were given the privilege of the floor without a vote. The proposed budget, 1992-1993, was distributed and discussed. On the motion of Mrs. Corbitt, it was moved and seconded that the Continental Congress Hospitality Fund be adjusted from \$200.00 to \$300.00 with the additional \$100.00 to come from

the Capital Investment Fund thus making that fund \$1,633.00. Motion passed. A resolution, submitted by the DAR School Committee, was discussed. The resolution states that at the end of each administration, after all bills are paid and all designated funds established, 50% of any surplus monies will be deposited to the Georgia State Society Endowment Fund for the Talmadge Auditorium/Gymnasium, with the remaining 50% of surplus monies deposited to the General Savings Account of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR. Reports were received from 99 chapters and of this number 53 having an observance of Georgia Day with 34 having a program or partial program on Georgia. The programs were Georgia poets and writers, the history of the Georgia Flag, the founding and early history of Georgia, Georgia songs and outstanding Georgians. Among other activities were Georgia Flags presented to schools, several chapters had a quiz on Georgia history and 3 celebrated the occasion with a luncheon with another organization as their guests. One chapter taught a preschool class the pledge to the Georgia Flag and when they had learned the pledge presented them with miniature Georgia Flags. Notices were placed in newspapers, church bulletins, spot announcements on radio. Several members visited classrooms to talk on Georgia history. Wreaths were placed on Tomochichi and Oglethorpe's markers and the pamphlet "Georgia Firsts" was given to the members. It has been a pleasure to have served as Georgia Day chairman the past two years.

GEORGIA STATE ROOM, DAR MUSEUM, Mrs. Hugh Peterson, Sr.

The Georgia State Room, DAR Museum, depicting the "Long Room," Peter Tondee's Tavern, Savannah, 1770-1783, continues to be of interest to visitors to the museum. Many years have gone into the research, planning, and execution of putting this State Room into the proper way to depict an historic example of how the Patriots and Liberty

Boys planned and plotted to win liberty and freedom from the despot King George III. By using the inventory of Peter Tondee as a guideline, only relics mentioned therein, were gotten. One item, a "Painted Beaufet", was difficult to find; however, now it has been secured. In June 1991 word was received by this chairman that the long-sought "Painted Beaufet", as mentioned in Peter Tondee's inventory, could be secured. The persons who owned and loved this heirloom would now let the Georgia Society have it for the Georgia Room, DAR Museum. Under personal supervision, the Beaufet was shipped out of Savannah (its home for over 200 years) to the DAR Museum in Washington, D. C., where it was received with much interest and enthusiasm by the President General, Curator General, and all the staff. The price was \$25,000. Our Georgia Room fund, which the members had so faithfully built up, was not sufficient for payment; however, with a loan from the State Society, we were able to act. All loans have been repaid, thanks to generous, loyal members. The Beaufet is on loan to the museum for 20 years. The Beaufet will be dedicated in April during Continental Congress. Heartfelt appreciation to all who contributed to the success of this project. Especially do we thank the persons outside our DAR society who joined in as loyally with generous donations to support this patriotic venture. One-hundred-one chapters responded with contributions from members and friends of over \$6,985.75.

HISTORY OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY, Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar

The past decade flew by as Georgia Daughters wove into the fabric of time their historic, educational and patriotic efforts. The numerous accomplishments of Georgia chapters and chairmen have been truly amazing and of great value to God, Home and Country. From yearly reports of chapters, chairmen, and officers and a great deal of additional research this chairman has compiled the history of this state society as pertains to work done February 1981 through January 1991, thus bringing up to date the *History of the Georgia State Society 1890-1981* that was published 10 years ago. MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

The Meadow Garden Board met Friday, August 16, 1991 at Meadow Garden with Mrs. Donald D. Hankinson, State Regent, presiding as Chairman of the Board. The meeting was called to order at 10:20 a.m. The invocation was offered by Mrs. Luther L. Watson, landscaping chairman. Others present were: Mrs. Jerido Ward, Mrs. James H. Elliott, Jr., Mrs. Roy H. Cagle, Jr., Mrs. Theodore P. deTreville, and ex officio member, Mrs. Peter S. Hanf.

The minutes of the March 22, 1991 meeting were read. They had been approved by the proceedings committee, May 1991.

Gloria Clarke, caretaker, was introduced and she expressed her delight at being able to work at Meadow Garden. She informed the Board that she had not been notified of any tours for school children, but does expect some. She also informed the Board that the wall in the kitchen, just to the right of the door, needed attention as it is deteriorating.

Mrs. Hankinson gave the financial statement and told the Board that the Treasurer's books are in audit. Copies of the financial statement will be mailed to the Board at a later date.

Mrs. Cagle, chairman, reported that due to a series of break ins locks had been installed on the doors of the cottage and locks of the house had been changed. It was decided that the gate at the back of the property nearest the canal served no purpose and should be closed permanently and barbed wire added to the top. She reported that several items had been purchased including a guest book, paint and general cleaning supplies. No-slip strips for the back steps were discussed. Sand had been added to the last coat of paint, and helps some but is not enough. The no-slip strips that are used in bathtubs was mentioned and will be investigated, as to the feasibility. She informed the Board that the picture that was in the Walton bedroom is deteriorating and as soon as a good restorer can be found it will be restored. Bylaws

BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II OBJECTS

The objects of the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution shall be: to promote the aims set forth in the Bylaws of the National Society, the preservation of the memory of its Revolutionary patriots; the study of its history; the education of its youth in patriotic ideals and in the duties of citizenship.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All Chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of this organization.

Article IV OFFICERS

The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Curator. The State Regent shall appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as adviser in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting.

Article V ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected biennially by ballot at the annual State Conference.

Section 2. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two years or until their successors are elected. Their term of office shall begin at the close of Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and of the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Section 3. To be eligible for state office, a member shall have held membership in a chapter within the Georgia State Society for at least five (5) years prior to her election and shall have served a full term as a chapter regent or chapter officer of a Georgia chapter prior to her election. No member shall be eligible to the same State office for two successive terms. A member having served more than one-half term in the State office shall be deemed to have served a term.

Section 4. Nomination of candidates for office shall be from the floor. The election shall be held by ballot. A majority of the votes cast by the voting members of the State Conference shall elect.

Section 5. Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become acting First Vice Regent, subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. A vacancy in any other State office between annual meetings shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next Fall Board of Management or State Conference, whichever shall come first. Any State Officer, who is absent from the State for a continuous period of six months or longer, automatically relinquishes her position as a State officer.

Section 6. No two State officers shall be members of the same Chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

Section 7. In recognition of valuable service to the organization, any State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Section 8. A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot. The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than fifteen months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

Section 9. On the election of State Regent, and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Recording Secretary General. The endorsement of a candidate for Vice President General shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent to the Recording Secretary General at least two weeks prior to Continental Congress.

Article VI

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, of the State Board of Management, and of the Executive Committee. She shall appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees.

Section 2. In the absence of the State Regent from any meeting of the State Conference, or the State Board of Management, the State First Vice Regent, or in her absence, the State Second Vice Regent, shall perform the duties of the State Regent. The State First and Second Vice Regents may be assigned to direct committees and to perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent.

Section 3. The State Chaplain shall open all meetings of the State Conference and of the State Board of Management with Scripture reading and prayer and shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require. She shall preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and shall be responsible for In Memoriam pages in the Proceedings.

Section 4. The State Recording Secretary shall record the proceedings of the State Conference and of meetings of State Board of Management and of the Executive Committee. She shall compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and of the Proceedings Committee.

Section 5. The State Corresponding Secretary shall conduct correspondence and send notices in behalf of the State Conference, the State Regent, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as directed by them.

Section 6. The State Treasurer shall be the custodian of the funds of the State Society. She shall receive the State Conference dues and registration fees from the Chapters and shall receive all sums contributed by the Chapters for State and National projects. All monies received by the State Treasurer shall be placed only in institutions with accounts covered by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation or by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation, and the amount in any one institution shall not exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage. She shall disburse such sums only when authorized by the State Regent in writing. The State Treasurer shall keep an account of all sums received or paid out and shall keep receipts for all payments. She shall prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference. Her books shall be audited annually by a Certified Public Accountant. She shall be ex-officio a member of the Credentials Committee.

Section 7. The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new Chapters.

Section 8. The State Registrar shall, when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, who live in towns and counties where there are no Chapters, to prove eligibility, and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars in verifying lineage papers. She shall keep a correct list of all members in the State and shall make a report on membership to the State Conference.

Section 9. The State Historian shall be in charge of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General. She shall keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves in the State and shall prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General to Smithsonian

Institution. She shall encourage the compilation and publication of County Histories and other unpublished records, especially those of the Revolutionary period.

Section 10. The State Librarian shall collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing duplicates wherever possible, in the NSDAR Library and in the Georgia DAR Collections in the State Department of Archives and History. She shall endeavor to obtain the books on the wanted list of the Librarian General for the Georgia Section in the NSDAR Library and is authorized to solicit contributions from the Chapters for the purchase of the same. She shall have custody and supervision of the DAR Genealogical and Historical Collections of the State Department of Archives and History.

Section 11. The State Curator shall receive and be responsible for all gifts of Revolutionary relics to the Museum of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution. She shall be custodian of the conference properties and shall have them properly stored, insured and made ready for use at State Conference.

Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. The Georgia State Society shall hold an annual State Conference between the first day of February and the time of the meeting of the Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week. The Executive Committee shall fix the time and place of meetings when not fixed by the Conference in session, or when for any reason it may be impractical to meet at the time or place fixed by the Conference.

Section 2. The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credentials blanks to the Chapters not less than sixty (60) days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 3. The voting members of the State Conference shall be State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regent or alternate, and the delegates or their alternates from the Chapters of the state that are entitled to representation at the Continental Congress. The number of representatives from each Chapter shall be determined by Article XIV, Section 3, of the National Bylaws, increasing representation at State Conference by one delegate per Chapter.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a Chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the Chapter, except in the case of the Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized Chapter.

Section 5. A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at an annual State Conference, shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any Chapter in the State of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference the privileges of the floor shall be accorded to the State Chairmen with the exception that they may not vote unless they are duly elected delegates or their alternates from their respective Chapters.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen (15) days' notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Twenty-five (25) voting members, representing not less than ten (10) Chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII STATE DUES AND CONFERENCE FEES

Section 1. The annual dues of Chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be four dollars for each member of the Chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1. A minimum of \$1.33 shall be used to cover all State per capita assessments, and the balance shall be allocated to the General State Dues Fund. No Chapter shall

be entitled to representation at the annual State Conference until the State Dues are paid.

Section 2. The Finance Committee, appointed by the State Regent, shall be composed of seven (7) members, to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two (2) Honorary State Regents, one (1) active Chapter Regent and one (1) active Chapter member. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund.

Section 3. Each Chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State Dues, a Conference registration fee of \$3.00 for each voter to which the Chapter is entitled under the Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether represented or not.

Section 4. State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$3.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, who are not duly elected voters from their respective Chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference fee at the time of registration.

Article IX EXPENSES

Section 1. Four thousand dollars (\$4,000) shall be taken each year from the State Dues Fund, to be used by the State Regent in defraying her necessary travel expenses.

Section 2. Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent shall be paid by the State Treasurer from the State Dues Fund.

Article X STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Regents, in their absence, the First Vice Regent of the Chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the Fall, following the regular meeting of the National Board. It may meet whenever called by the State Regent.

Section 3. Ten (10) members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference.

Section 5. State Chairmen, Vice Chairmen, Committee Members of National and Standing Committees and one (1) member from each Chapter shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privileges of the floor, but may not vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article XI EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute an Executive Committee. The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, attends the meetings of the Executive Committee, but may not vote. This Committee performs such duties of the Board between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient. The Executive Committee shall meet the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three members of the Committee. It shall make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

Article XII CHAPTERS

Section 1. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April. The Chapter Regent shall report the names of the elected officers promptly, on triplicate blanks provided

by the State Regent for this purpose, to the Organizing Secretary General, to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary.

Section 2. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent for use in compiling her report, not less than fifteen (15) days before the opening of the annual State Conference. The official Chapter report for publication in the Proceedings shall be furnished the State Recording Secretary before the State Conference.

Article XIII AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent and to the Parliamentarian. The State Regent shall send a copy to each Chapter, at least sixty (60) days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law for the State Conference in matters not covered by the Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21.) No Conference was held in 1911; the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912"; amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, p. 211.)

ABSOLUTE DEADLINE FOR PROCEEDINGS MATERIAL

WHEREAS, a definite deadline must be established and adhered to for all reports and material to be in the hands of the Proceedings Committee in order to be delivered to the Printer by June 1st.

RESOLVED: That all FINAL reports and materials must be received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1st with the exception of the Auditor's report and any information sent out by the National DAR Headquarters. This does not alter the requirement in the "Items of Information" in the Proceedings that all reports shall be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary on or before February 15th, the ORIGINAL being sent to the Secretary for the Proceedings.

AND FURTHER RESOLVED: This policy will be strictly adhered to and the material not received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1st will be omitted from the Proceedings.

ACTS OF INCORPORATION

AWARDS

All chapters competing for awards must send reports to the respective chairmen by February 1, 1993.

All reports for awards are based on membership confirmed by the National Society as of February 1 of preceding year (1992). SEE FIGURE BESIDE CHAPTER NAME IN CHAPTER REGENTS' DIRECTORY.

BYLAWS

Chapter Bylaws **MUST NOT** conflict with the National and State Bylaws.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS

Notice of change of address of members shall be sent to the Organizing Secretary General, Treasurer General, State Regent and State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHANGE OF NAME

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to State Registrar, Treasurer General and State Regent by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHAPTER ELECTIONS

As soon as Chapter elections are held, names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, Administration Building, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D.C., 20006-5392, to the State Regent or State Regent-Elect and to the Recording Secretary by May 1st. The full Christian name of Chapter officers shall be given together with her husband's given name or initials, address, zip code and telephone number. A Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years. This being added in order for our Bylaws to conform to the National Bylaws.

CHAPTER REPRESENTATION AT STATE AND NATIONAL MEETINGS

At the State Board of Management, a chapter is represented by the Chapter Regent, or in her absence by the First Vice Regent, and one non-voting member.

The voting representation of each chapter at the State Conference shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received by the State Treasurer **by January 1st**. Membership less than 50: Regent, 1 Delegate, 4 Alternates, total votes 2; 59-199: Regent, 2 Delegates, 6 Alternates, total votes 3; 200-299: Regent, 3 Delegates, 8 Alternates, total votes 4; 300-399: Regent, 4 Delegates, 10 Alternates, total votes 5.

The voting representation of each chapter at Continental Congress shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received in the Office of the Treasurer General **by January 1st**. Membership less than 50: Regent, 0 Delegate, 2 Alternates, total votes 1; 50-199: Regent, 1 Delegate, 4 Alternates, total votes 2; 200-299: Regent, 2 Delegates, 6 Alternates, total votes 3; 300-399: Regent, 3 Delegates, 8 Alternates, total votes 4.

CONFERENCE REGISTRATION FEE

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer with the State dues on or before December 1, \$3.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether represented or not.

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$3.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. (Article VIII, Section 4, of the State Bylaws).

CONTRIBUTIONS

ALL contributions by Chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

DATE FOR ANNUAL AUDIT

WHEREAS, every effort must be made to have all material to the printer as early as possible to facilitate delivery of the Proceedings to the members.

RESOLVED: That the end of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, fiscal year for audit purposes be changed from May 31st to April 30th.

DECEASED MEMBERS

Deaths shall be reported promptly to Treasurer General, State Chaplain and State Registrar by the Corresponding Chapter Officer. Complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and a date of death shall be furnished State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for Conference Memorial Service pages for State Proceedings.

DUES

Pay to State Treasurer State Dues of \$4.00 per member before December 1. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the February 1 and two April Board meetings of the National Society. National Dues of \$15.00 per member sent to the Treasurer-General, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20006-5392, before December 1, 1992.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS

To insure uniformity and convenience in binding, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, 8½x11 inches, with 1½ to 2 inch margin on left side, 1½ inches at top and 1 inch on right side and at bottom. Four copies shall be sent to State Chairman of Genealogical Records.

GEORGIA HOSPITALITY FUND

The following resolution which applies to the Georgia Hospitality Fund appears in the Proceedings for 1955:

“WHEREAS, The Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds a social event in Washington during Continental Congress which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society.

“THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$300.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes:

“BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this fund shall not be cumulative.” Adopted.

INFORMATION FOR CHAPTER REGENTS

1. All letters received by Chapter Regents relating to the work of the Society shall be distributed to the corresponding Chapter Chairman and brought to the attention of the members at a chapter meeting.

2. Please follow Resolution No. 11, adopted at 61st Georgia Society State Conference, as follows: “Resolved, That a closing date of February 1 be established for all reports, and all reports be given from February 1 to February 1, regardless of a change of regime or Regent.” All awards will be made on this date basis.

NEW ADMINISTRATION RESERVE FOR CONTINGENCIES FUND

For the entire resolution setting up the "General New Regime Fund Balance of \$2,500.00," found on pp. 203-204 of the 1979 Proceedings the following substitute resolution was adopted by the 88th State Conference: **RESOLVED** that at the end of each administration \$6,000.00 be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies" fund, this money to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration, and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration. All other surplus monies in the General Fund, other than funds which are designated, are to be divided equally between the General Savings Account and the Meadow Garden Capital Investment Fund as provided in the Capital Investment Fund Resolution passed in 1979 (pp. 62-63, 1979 Proceedings). This transaction is to be handled by April 30 every two years before the auditors close out the books of an administration, thus making the General Fund show the same balance of \$6,000.00 at the beginning of each new administration. (This fund is to be known as "New Administration Reserve for Contingencies Fund.") Adopted.

NOMINATIONS

The following resolution which applies to the announcement of the candidacy for State Regent appears in the Proceedings of the Twentieth State Conference, 1918:

"Resolved, that it is the judgment of the Executive Board that announcements for State Regent should not be made . . . earlier than three months prior to the meeting of the conference and they shall be furnished to the Press for publication."

Leave 1 inch between bottom of Headings and start of report. **LEFT MARGIN** of report must be 1 inch minimum. Please check previous Proceedings for correct heading. Entire report should consist of ONE PARAGRAPH. Winners of awards of State Officers and State Chairmen shall be listed on a SEPARATE sheet of paper. State Officers and State Chairmen send to the State Recording Secretary and the State Regent, the awards to be given next year on a SEPARATE sheet of paper — exactly as it is printed in the Proceedings.

Numerals shall be used throughout the report with the exception of the beginning of a sentence.

RESOLUTIONS

Resolutions to be considered by the Committee shall be typed, with a heading giving subject of the resolution, signed, and sent to the Chairman of the Resolutions Committee two weeks before the date of the State Conference.

Georgia State Society Children of the American Revolution 1991 - 1992

The Georgia State Society C.A.R., under the leadership of William C. Hurst, Jr., has accomplished many worthwhile goals during the year. The State Project was twofold. One, to obtain new members (we gained 28). Two, to raise \$100.00 as a gift to Meadow Garden, so that Georgia State Society C.A.R. could become a Patron of Meadow Garden. Both were accomplished. The State Society also gave 2 bricks (\$25.00 each) toward the new brick walk at Tamasee. One brick was in honor of the State President, William

C. Hurst, Jr., and the other in honor of the Senior State President, Mrs. R. E. Scott. Georgia has added 2 societies this year to the C.A.R. family. One at Mableton, Sons and Daughters of Liberty. The organizing Senior President was Mrs. James A. Harvey, Jr. The second society is Sukey Hart with the organizing Senior President, Mrs. Frank Brown, in Milledgeville. This brings our total to 20 active societies.

The state society contributed generously to the C.A.R. national project, to help raise funds for the new lunchroom office at Kate Duncan Smith DAR School. The state also contributed generously to all other National Projects such as the C.A.R. Museum, Book Binding Fund and the Endowment Fund.

As always we appreciate the support given to us by the Georgia Daughters. During the DAR Workshops more than 100 Daughters became State Patriots and/or promoters. This again enabled Georgia to win first place award at the National C.A.R. Convention in April 1992.

In July 1991 many Georgia members and senior leaders attended Southeastern Regional in Charleston, S. C. Georgia's youngest member (6 months old, from Brunswick Society) attended with his mother, Brunswick's senior president.

A very successful workshop was held in Albany with members and seniors from 10 societies attending.

Government Studies Seminar was held in Cochran at Middle Georgia College with a good turnout. The 2 Government Studies Chairmen presented a delightful and informative program. A visit from Betsy Ross who discussed the different flags of our country was enjoyed by everyone.

The last weekend of February the 53rd Annual State Conference was held in Cartersville with Abraham Musick Society as the host society. President William C. Hurst, Jr., conducted the meetings. On Friday night candidates for office for 1992-1993 made their campaign speeches after which a "sock hop" was held.

On Saturday morning at the business meeting, State Officers, Chairmen and Society Presidents gave their reports which showed outstanding work done by the societies. Contributions of cash, clothing, Christmas and birthday gifts were sent to all the mountain and Indian schools.

We are always proud to have DAR and SAR members meet with us. Mrs. Donald D. Hankinson, Georgia State Regent, again met with us and brought greetings from the DAR.

Mr. Charles H. Dayhuff, III, State President, SAR, also met with us and brought greetings from the State SAR. He was presented a Georgia State Honor Pin by Brunswick Society.

During the luncheon a very interesting talk and slide show was presented by Professor J. B. Tate (Kennesaw College) on the Indian removal from Georgia to the Indian reservation in Oklahoma. Following this a retirement ceremony for trophies no longer usable was conducted by the trophies chairmen. New trophies given by seniors and members in honor or memory of someone were accepted. The retired trophies were returned to those who originally gave them. This was the first time such a ceremony has been conducted and was very impressive.

Saturday night an awards banquet was held and societies were awarded trophies and money for their superior work in carrying out the program of the various committees. All are to be commended for the excellent work accomplished during the year. The newly elected officers were installed with the exception of the new state president who is always installed at National Convention in Washington in April.

Following the banquet, the Grand March was held preceding the outgoing president's ball. All senior leaders were allowed to observe the March only. Then to the tune of "Good Night Seniors" they left with only the assigned chaperones remaining.

During the year 4 excellent issues of the State news sheet, CARGoes, were assembled by the first vice president, Amy Richardson of Lucy Spell Raiford Society, and her senior advisor, Mrs. Donald Rowell. These were printed and mailed to over 350 subscribers.

During the weekend of April 24-26, (10) members and seniors traveled, by various methods, to Washington for the National Convention. On Wednesday, Senior National Historian, Mrs. R. Clough Carter, and Senior State President, Mrs. R. E. Scott, attended the National Board of Management Meeting. On Thursday they attended the National Officers Club luncheon. The Georgia delegation was proud to stand while Georgia State President, William C. Hurst, Jr., gave his report.

All of Georgia should be proud that our State President, William C. Hurst, Jr., was invited to lay the wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier at Arlington National Cemetery during the ceremonies. The Georgia delegation was so very proud of William who was dressed in his U.S. Marine Reserve uniform, as we stood in the misting rain for the ceremony. Following this buses carried the 500 member delegates and seniors to the George Washington Masonic Temple for the installation ceremonies. It had to be held inside this year due to rain. Here our 2 new state presidents were installed. This year it is a mother-daughter team as Amy Richardson, State President, and her mother, Mrs. Fred Richardson, Senior State President, will lead Georgia into achieving much in Georgia C.A.R.
