As part of the 1995 National School Bus Tour in October, she visited Hindman Settlement School, Berry College, Kate Duncan Smith and Tamassee DAR Schools and Crossnore. While on the Schools Tour, with the assistance of Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall, State Schools Chairman, she presented a Colonial Dames of America pin to Dr. Gloria Shatto for the Martha Berry Museum. The pin had belonged to Martha Berry's sister, Eugenia Ruspoli, and her adopted daughter, Princess Droutzkoy, who resides in New York, felt it belonged at Berry. Visits were made to the State Conferences of Alabama, Missouri and Michigan. Appreciation was expressed to state officers, chapter regents and state chairmen for their work in making the Georgia State Society successful and her job easier.

Mrs. Miller thanked the State Regent for her outstanding work and excellent leadership and a rising vote of appreciation was expressed by the assembly.

The State Regent resumed the Chair and called for the State Officers to report: Mrs. Miller, First Vice Regent, stated plans are being made for the Regents Banquet at State Conference and the Georgia Luncheon during Continental Congress. Mrs. Usry reminded chapters of the Outstanding Teacher of American History contest with a deadline of December 15. She requested 3 copies of the application be sent to her.

Mrs. Lee reported attending all summer workshops. Thirty-five books have been placed in the Georgia section of the NSDAR Library, in honor of State Regent, Mrs. Peter S. Hanf. Ninety bookplates have been sold, inquiries answered and thank you letters written to Georgia chapters donating books to the NSDAR Library.

Mrs. Ragan, as Chairman of Seating & Processional, thanked the two vice-chairmen of the committee: Mrs. Edward E. Lusk and Mrs. John M. Samaras.

After a short break, reporting continued with the State Chairmen of National Committees – American Heritage: Mrs. G. E. Linaeus urged chapters to participate in the four contests sponsored by the National Society in the fields of art, crafts, music and literature and drama. American Indians: Mrs. John K. Bretch gave facts and urged chapter participation in the summer camp scholarship fund for Indian youth. Americanism & DAR Manual for Citizenship: Mrs. Enver B. Hoff, Sr., reminded chapter regents of the material in their summer packets and added information which had been distributed. Membership Promotion Workshop: Mrs. Enver B. Hoff, Sr., announced information would be sent to each chapter at a later date. Community Service Awards: Mrs. Hugh Howell, Jr., urged chapters to recognize worthy citizens for outstanding

Porter, Jr., thanked the 72 members who have helped with the indexing project. Anyone wanting to obtain a Bookworm Pin should see her. Honor Roll: Miss Kay Yarbrough reminded regents to use the 2 original Honor Roll or National Achievement colored forms sent to them and not xeroxed copies. Junior American Citizens: Mrs. W. Daniel McCranie II encouraged participation in JAC Clubs and contests and reminded regents of material obtained at summer workshops, emphasizing the deadlines. Junior Membership: Mrs. Ronald D. Kent encouraged shopping at the Junior Bazaar, to benefit the Helen Pouch Fund and chapter involvement in the 1997 National Junior Doll project. She also asked for items to sell in the Junior Bazaar at State Conference. Lineage Research: Mrs. Robert G. Fountain asked that a lineage chart with available documentation be submitted to the District Chairman, explaining a clear description of the problem and the probable locality where the answer may be found. The Lineage Research Committee is not to be used before an application is presented to the Office of the Registrar General and also, is not allowed to work on pending application papers, but may search for an alternate line. Dickey stated the project for the coming year is to continue to work together and to understand the need to run a tight ship. Bylaws: Mrs. R. Hugh Reid stated the proposed amendments the committee will recommend are now being reviewed by the National Parliamentarian. These proposals will be included in the State Regent's December letter and will be presented at State Conference in March. Coordinator of Districts: Mrs. Robert B. Vance, Sr., thanked all chapters involved in the summer workshops and Fall Board of Management and looks forward to the State Conference in Augusta in March. Chapter Regents and District Directors were also thanked for jobs well done. Northeast District Director: Mrs. William L. Frady thanked the Henry Walton regent and members for a successful workshop. Plans are underway for the State Regent's official visits to NE District chapters. Northwest District Director: Mrs. John M. Karlovich reported plans are made for the State Regent's official visits to the NW District in November. Southeast District Director: Mrs. Ronald E. McCrosky thanked the Altamaha Chapter for a successful SE District Workshop. The district chapters were honored to entertain the State Regent during her official visit in the week Sept. 11-16. Conference Pages: In the absence of the Chairman, Mrs. Guy H. Miller, Jr., the State Regent encouraged chapters to send in names for conference pages to include the name, address, telephone and national number. DAR Literature: Mrs. Charles H. Waters encouraged use of the Literature Table, enumerating items for sale. A new item available is an 11-minute cassette on "How to Use TV in Public Relations." The new Handbook will be available October 1996. The chairman thanked her Vice-Chairmen: Mrs. James L. Coleman, Mrs. Robert L. Loflin, and Mrs. Bruce F. Macrae. History of the Georgia State Society: Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar reiterated the necessity for chapter, state officers and state chairmen to send in their history of important happenings. This is to keep the State Society's history up to date for future generations. Lucy Cook Peel Memorial: Mrs. Robert H. Farrow encouraged purchase of the two books: "Membership Roll and Register of Ancestors," 1986 edition and "History of the Georgia State Society, 1981-1991." Marking Revolutionary Soldiers' Graves & Restoring Historic Sites: Mrs. Miriam T. Hickman was pleased to report the dedication of a Revolutionary Soldiers' Monument in Elberton County by the Stephen Heard Chapter. The monument listed 165 names from within the county, with more to come. Parliamentarian: Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr. has continued to render advice on parliamentary matters when requested. Completing the state's file of chapter bylaws is a high priority. Most chapters have cooperated in this effort and others are in the process of coming into compliance with the National Society's requirement. Press Book: Miss Patricia

Knight, Vice Chairman of Museum Sales. Appreciation was expressed to Mrs. Cagle and Mrs. Henry for transporting the sale items from Meadow Garden to the meetings. The closing meeting of the 98th State Conference was held in the Oglethorpe Rooms A, B, C, D, Radisson Riverfront Hotel, Augusta on March 16, 1996. The Processional included the Color Bearers, State Officers, visiting State Regents, the Registrar General, NSDAR, and the State Regent. Music was provided by Mrs. Ed Smith at the piano.

The meeting was called to order by the State Regent, Mrs. Peter S. Hanf, at 9:00 a.m. Scripture and Prayer were offered by Mrs. Moody C. Summers, Jr., State Chaplain. The Pledge to the Flag of the United States of America was led by Mrs. Enver B. Hoff, Sr., State Chairman, Americanism and DAR Manual for Citizenship; the American's Creed by Mrs. James J. Muldrow, Honorary State Regent; "God Bless America" by Mrs. Inman D. Jackson, Jr., State Chairman, DAR Good Citizen, accompanied by Mrs. Ed Smith; and the Pledge to the Georgia Flag led by Mrs. Albert H. Wren, State Chairman, Georgia Day. The Colors were posted and the Pages retired. Mrs. Hanf thanked Mrs. Smith for sharing her talent with the State Society.

There being no objections, the State Regent asked the Proceedings Committee to approve the Minutes of the previous evening meeting and this meeting.

Reports continued from the State Standing Committees: Bylaws, Mrs. R. Hugh Reid, Chairman, presented the proposed amendments to the Georgia State Society Bylaws, meeting all requirements as to chapter advance notification. By direction of the Committee, the following proposed Amendment was withdrawn because of redundancy in words: (#11) reads: **ARTICLE VI: Duties of Officers** - To amend ARTICLE VI, Section 12(a) "serve as liaison between the Librarian General and the Georgia Chapters and shall disseminate general information on the NSDAR Library." The word "shall" is redundant. Calling attention to (#12), the Bylaws Committee proposed an addition to this amendment which reads: **ARTICLE VI, Duties of Officers** - To amend ARTICLE VI, Section 12(d) by adding "by the office of the Librarian General" so Section 12(d) then will read "solicit, with the approval of the Executive Committee, contributions from the chapters for purchase of such books as requested by the office of the Librarian General." The proposed addition reads: "and/or the various libraries in Georgia which the State Society supports." In the discussion, Mrs. James H. Elliott, Jr., suggested the word "approves" be used rather than "support." There being no objections, this change was made. The proposed addition to the amendment was adopted by a two-thirds vote in the affirmative. Mrs. Reid also called attention to (#15) which reads: **ARTICLE VII, Meetings** - To amend ARTICLE VII, Section 1(a)(4)iii by striking "will" and adding "shall" and by striking "at" and adding "of the" preceding "State Conference"; the word will should be may. Mrs. Reid noted that the word "shall" means mandatory, whereas the word "may" means permissible. By direction of the Bylaws Committee, the following proposed amendment was withdrawn because of redundancy in words: (#17) reads: **ARTICLE VII, Meetings** - To amend ARTICLE VII, Section 2(a) "the state officers and Honorary State Regents of the State Society." The word "state" is redundant.

By the direction of the Bylaws Committee, Mrs. Reid moved "that the proposed amendments #1 through #27, with the withdrawal of Numbers 11 and 17, be adopted." Motion adopted by two-thirds vote in the affirmative.

Numbers 28 through 31 relate to the office of Second Vice Regent. These were read individually but one motion was made for adoption.

ARTICLE V, Nomination and Election of Officers

(#28.) To amend ARTICLE V, Section 5(a) by adding to the first sentence "and the State Second Vice Regent shall become State First Vice Regent subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress." so Section 5(a) then will read:

Section 5(a). Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become State Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become State First Vice Regent subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. Vacancies in other state offices shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall

be ratified at the next State Board of Management meeting or at State Conference, whichever shall come first. No discussion.

(#29.) To amend ARTICLE V, Section 5 by striking (b) which reads: "An appointment to fill the vacancy of State First Vice Regent, after ratification by members of the Georgia State Society, shall be submitted to the National Board of Management for confirmation." and by relettering (c) to (b). No discussion.

ARTICLE VI, Duties of Officers

(#30.) To amend ARTICLE VI, Section 4 by adding a colon after "shall," by striking "perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent" and by adding:

(a) perform the duties of the office of State First Vice Regent in the absence or inability of the State First Vice Regent;

(b) fill a vacancy in the office of State First Vice Regent;

(c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;

(d) serve on committees as directed by the State Regent.

So Section 4 then will read:

Section 4. The State Second Vice Regent shall:

(a) perform the duties of the office of State First Vice Regent in the absence or inability of the State First Vice Regent;

(b) fill a vacancy in the office of State First Vice Regent;

(c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;

(d) serve on committees as directed by the State Regent.

No discussion.

(#31.) To amend ARTICLE VI, Section 6(d) by striking Section 6(d), which reads: "call the meeting to order in the absence of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent and preside until a chairman pro tempore is elected." No discussion.

By direction of the Bylaws Committee, Mrs. Reid moved the adoption of the proposed amendment numbers 28 through 31. Adopted by two-thirds vote.

ARTICLE IV, Officers

There being no objections, proposed amendments numbers 32 and 33 were considered together:

(#32.) To amend ARTICLE IV, Section 2(d) by changing Section 2(d) to Section 2(e), by striking "State Regent," by adding "State Second Vice Regent," by adding "full before "term as a Chapter Regent" and by editing for clarification, so Section 2(e) then will read:

Section 2(e) To be eligible for the office of State First Vice Regent or for the office of Second Vice Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State Recording Secretary or as State Treasurer of the Georgia State Society and shall have served a full term as a Chapter Regent of a chapter in the Georgia State Society.

(#33.) To amend ARTICLE IV, Section 2 by adding a new Section 2(d) to read:

Section 2(d) To be eligible for the office of State Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State First Vice Regent or as State Second Vice Regent or served in each of these two offices of the Georgia State Society. By direction of the Bylaws Committee, Mrs. Reid moved the adoption of proposed amendments numbers 32 and 33. No discussion. Adopted by two-thirds vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE V, Nomination and Election of Officers

(#34.) To amend ARTICLE V, Section 1 by changing Section 1(d) to Section 1(g) and by adding "and statement of intent as directed by these Bylaws," by striking Section 1(a), (b), (c) and (e) and by adding new Section 1(a), (b), (c), (d), (e) and (f) so Section 1 then will read:

(a) A candidate for state office shall request the endorsement of her chapter, taken by vote at a regular meeting of the chapter held between May and January preceding

the State Conference at which state elections are held. The endorsement, signed by the Chapter Recording Secretary, shall include the office the candidate seeks and shall be received by the State Regent with the candidate's statement of intent to be a candidate prior to any announcement or campaigning by the candidate and/or her supporters.

(b) A candidate for State Regent who wishes to present a slate of officers shall send to the State Regent in one packet the chapter endorsements and the statements of intent for each of her selected candidates. If received by the State Regent no later than December 1, these candidates shall be listed as a slate in the State Regent's December letter and Call to State Conference.

(c) Candidates wishing to run independently of a slate, whose chapter endorsements and statements of intent are received by the State Regent no later than December 1 shall be listed as independent candidates in the State Regent's December letter and Call to State Conference.

(d) A candidate whose chapter endorsement and statement of intent have been properly received by the State Regent may choose to announce her candidacy separate from the State Regent's December letter and Call to State Conference. Such a chapter endorsement and statement of intent shall be received by the State Regent at least ten (10) days prior to the opening of the State Conference at which the election is to take place.

(e) A candidate who does not meet the requirements of these Bylaws shall be declared disqualified and ineligible for consideration for state office.

(f) A chapter shall endorse no more than one chapter member for state office per election with the possible exception of candidates for State Regent and for State Corresponding Secretary.

(g) In the event of the death, incapacitation or withdrawal of a candidate prior to the election, a replacement shall be made with notification in writing to the State Regent and accompanied by the chapter endorsement and statement of intent as directed by these Bylaws.

By direction of the Bylaws Committee, Mrs. Reid moved the adoption of proposed amendment #34. No discussion. Adopted by two-thirds vote.

ARTICLE VI, Duties of Officers

(#35.) To amend ARTICLE VI, Section 2 by adding a new paragraph (i) to read:

(i) recommend to the Finance Committee a Certified Public Accountant who shall be approved by the Finance Committee.

By the direction of the Bylaws Committee, Mrs. Reid moved the adoption of proposed amendment #35. No discussion. Adopted by two-thirds vote.

ARTICLE IX, Executive Committee

(#36.) To amend ARTICLE IX by adding a new Section 4 to read:

Mrs. Reid noted editing by the Bylaws Committee: the first word in the proposal should be changed from "actions" to decisions"; the word "ratified" should be changed to "acted upon."

Section 4. Decisions of the Executive Committee shall be acted upon at the next meeting of the State Board of Management or at State Conference, whichever shall come first.

By the direction of the Bylaws Committee, Mrs. Reid moved the adoption of proposed amendment #36. No discussion. Adopted by two-thirds vote.

ARTICLE X, Finances

There being no objections, proposed amendments numbers 37, 38 and 39 were considered together.

(#37.) To amend ARTICLE X, Section 3(a) by striking "as set by a preceding conference" and adding "five dollars (\$5.00)," in the last sentence by striking "to" and

adding "shall" and by adding "Chapter is" before "represented," so Section 3(a) then will read:

Section 3(a) Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State Dues, a conference registration fee of five dollars (\$5.00) for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under these Bylaws. This fee shall be paid whether chapter is represented or not.

(#38.) To amend ARTICLE X, Section 3(b) by adding before "conference fee" the amount of five dollars (\$5.00), so Section 3(b) then will read:

Section 3(b) State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the five dollars (\$5.00) conference fee at the time of registration.

(#39.) To amend ARTICLE X, Section 3(c) by striking "the" and adding "three dollars (\$3.00)" before "conference fee" so Section 3(c) then will read:

Section 3(c) Other members of the Georgia State Society who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay three dollars (\$3.00) conference fee at the time of registration.

By the direction of the Bylaws Committee, Mrs. Reid moved the adoption of proposed amendment numbers 37, 38 and 39. No discussion. Adopted by two-thirds vote in the affirmative.

Mrs. Reid thanked the Bylaws Committee and the patience of the Georgia Daughters. Mrs. Hanf thanked Mrs. Reid and the Bylaws Committee for the time and effort they spent studying the Bylaws and bringing these proposed amendments.

Bell, Jr.; Press Book, Miss Patricia Woods; Proceedings: In the absence of Mrs. James J. Leitch, Mrs. Arthur H. Waite reported; Protocol, Mrs. Herman M. Richardson congratulated Mrs. Gordon B. Ragan for her efficiency in seating and processions; Resolution, Mrs. Charles F. Wysong. The following Resolutions were presented: "Patriotic Legacy," submitted by the Atlanta Chapter and approved at the October 27, 1995 Fall Board of Management for ratification at State Conference - Ratified. Working with and visiting the Chapters has been a pleasure, and serving as State Treasurer both an honor and a challenge. STATE REGISTRAR - Mrs. James Forsyth

The State Registrar has kept the membership files current for the Georgia State Society according to the print-outs received from the Offices of the Registrar General and the Organizing Secretary General and the chapters in the state. Current membership in the state is 7,309, including members-at-large. During the year the state has had 245 admitted by application, 74 of which were juniors; 69 by transfer-in and 48 reinstatements. Georgia lost 218 by resignation, 170 by death, 56 transfer-out and 117 dropped. Reports were received from 103 chapters. Of those reporting, all reported checking application papers for accuracy and using "Is That Lineage Right" and "Is That Service Right." Much of this year has been spent compiling the 1996 MEMBERSHIP ROLL AND REGISTER OF ANCESTORS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION. This book includes the current membership of the Georgia State Society as well as

deceased members for 1995-1996. A special word of thanks to all chapter regents and registrars who provided information for the book. It has been a pleasure to serve the Georgia State Society under the leadership of Mrs. Peter S. Hanf, State Regent.

STATE HISTORIAN - Mrs. Harold F. Usry

This officer received reports from 100 chapters. These reports showed that Georgia Daughters have been involved in various historical restoration projects. These include maintaining and renovating chapter houses and other historic homes and buildings; cleaning cemeteries, cataloging graves, participating in and making contributions to local historical festivals. The area around a historical marker was landscaped, markers were cleaned, the Nancy Hart Highway Marker in Wrightsville was rededicated, a marker honoring the Revolutionary War Soldiers buried in Upson County was dedicated, and the grave of Mrs. Rebecca Wright Mann, a daughter of a Revolutionary War Soldier, was cleaned and marked. Eight chapters entered candidates in the Outstanding Teacher of American History Contest. Mr. Timothy R. Howard, sponsored by the Robert Loughridge Chapter, was chosen as Georgia's Outstanding Teacher of American History. The graves of 24 members were marked and reported. The American History Award was presented to Dr. John Lupold (3 Columbus chapters), Dr. Bradley Rice, Paul S. Hudson (Fort Peachtree) and Dr. Tom Scott (Fielding Lewis). Contributions to the Americana Room were \$184 and Friends of the Americana Collection were \$15. It has been a great honor to serve the Georgia Daughters under the leadership of our State Regent, Mrs. Hanf.

STATE LIBRARIAN - Mrs. Grover C. Lee

The State Librarian attended the 4 District Workshops, Fall Board of Management, State Conference, Continental Congress and all meetings of the Executive Committee. Letters of Instruction and Report Questionnaire for each Chapter's State Packet mailed to the District Directors. Received reports from 88 chapters with 22 having programs on the NSDAR Library and the local library. Members volunteered at local libraries and all Georgia Archives 7,280 hours; donated 59 copies of A CENTURY OF SERVICE: THE STORY OF THE DAR to speakers, libraries and Good Citizens; 21 books valued at \$656 were donated to the NSDAR Library; 473 books donated to local libraries, valued at \$7,500; 67 DAR magazines were given to local libraries; 5 members are working on the Bookworm project, with one earning her pin this year. Chapters sent through the State Treasurer: Library Centennial, \$225; Book Rebinding, \$75; Book Purchases, \$10; Genealogical Records Rebinding, \$16; Reference Library Cataloguing, \$10; and State Library Fund, \$197.50. Total number of bookplates sold \$26. Thirty-five books were placed in the Georgia section of the NSDAR Library in honor of the State Regent, Mrs. Peter S. Hanf. It has been a rewarding experience to serve the Georgia State Society under the leadership of our State Regent.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

The Members and Officers

Georgia State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution

We have audited the accompanying combined financial statements - cash basis of the Georgia State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, and its individual fund financial statements as of and for the year ended April 30, 1996. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Society's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion of these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1, these financial statements were prepared on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the combined financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the assets and fund balances of the Georgia State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution at April 30, 1996, and the results of its operations resulting from cash transactions for the year then ended in conformity with the cash basis of accounting as described in Note 1. Also, in our opinion, the individual fund financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the individual funds of the Georgia State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution at April 30, 1996 and the results of their operation for the year then ended.

Our audits were made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements - cash basis taken as a whole and on the individual fund financial statements. The accompanying financial information listed as supporting schedules in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the combined and individual fund financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of Business

The Georgia State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution is a non-profit organization whose primary purpose is to further educational programs related to the history of the United States.

Fund Accounting

To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the resources available to the Society, the accounts of the Society are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and the reporting purposes into funds established according to their nature and purposes.

The Society considers all contributions available for unrestricted use, unless specifically restricted by the donor.

Cash Basis

The financial statements of the Society have been prepared on the cash basis which recognizes income and expenses when received or paid rather than when earned or incurred. Management has not determined the nature and amounts of non-cash assets and liabilities.

Plant, Property and Equipment

Meadow Garden and its contents are historical treasures, and therefore are not subject to depreciation. The house and its contents are insured for \$80,560 and \$240,750, respectively. Office furniture and fixtures are insured for \$7,500.

Any major preservation or restoration project, however, is capitalized and depreciated over its estimated useful life. These improvements, which are being depreciated over fifteen years, are summarized as follows:

At the time the Meadow Garden property was contributed by the National Society to the Georgia State Society, its fair market value was deemed to be immaterial.

Costs of office equipment are consistently charged to expense because the Society does not deem such amounts to be sufficiently material to warrant capitalization and depreciation.

Tax Status

The Society has been granted tax exempt status under Code Section 501(c)(3) of the U.S. Internal Revenue Code.

National Committee Reports

AMERICAN HERITAGE - Mrs. George E. Leneaus

Only 2 questions asked for reports: Programs or Projects; and National Contest Entries. Response was from 100 chapters with 46 reporting only programs. Chapters with programs and contest entries - 12. No program, but contest entries - 5. Total chapters reporting National Contest Entries - 17. This is an increase of 7 chapters participating in the national contests. Most entries in the national contest was Thronateeska with 7 entries. Fielding Lewis Chapter sent 6 and Fort Frederica sent 4, one in each field. Number of entries in each field from chapters: Art - 9; Crafts - 5; Music - 14; Literature & Drama - 13. Best report was by John Benson Chapter. Best Program or Project, Captain Edward Hagin Chapter. They sponsored a fund raiser for the Veteran Memorial in Paulding County. An afternoon gala was held for over 200 guests and raised \$1,350. Runner-up Peter Early Chapter; made slides of Continental Hall for a program and discussed Mrs. William Cabell and her efforts to place the Hall on the National Registry of Historical Landmarks. Other excellent programs were reported by John Clarke, Hannah Clarke, Button Gwinnett and Savannah Chapters. No report was given by 37 chapters. It has truly been a pleasure and an honor to serve as chairman of this committee. See Winners of Awards, 1996.

AMERICAN HISTORY - Mrs. Ronald H. Salter

Work by the American History Committee was reported by 99 chapter with 209 American History programs presented to chapters and 103 to other groups. Mayors from 31 cities signed Proclamations, 188 History Month posters displayed and 20 radio stations carried DAR History spots. Essays on "Explorers of America" came from 187 schools with 4,569 entries. Daughters gave 3,136 certificates, 100 bronze medals and 121 silver medals for success in the study of American History, as well as for essay winners. We gave 115 certificates in outstanding work in American History. The 4 Georgia essay winners were: 5th grade - Kyle Kornegay, Peter Early Chapter; 6th grade - Laine Bradshaw, Burkhalter Chapter; 7th grade - Mary Kathryn Fouts, Tomochichi Chapter; and 8th grade - Omar L. Douglas, Brunswick Chapter. The District Vice Chairmen adhered to all criteria and deadlines and inspired their districts to 4,569 essays: NE, Mrs. Dallas Bahm; NW, Miss Julia Farrigan; SE, Mrs. W. A. Wentworth; and SW, Mrs. Roy Henderson.

AMERICAN INDIANS - Mrs. John K. Bretch

Georgia Daughters responded to new National Indians Summer Camp Scholarships with \$932.90 for 10-14 age from impoverished families for happy experiences and learn to be proud to be an Indian. Chapters reporting, 98; food labels, 4,409; pounds of clothing, 807 to Indian schools, total contributions, \$1,914.90. Colonel William Candler program, 4th grade class gave Navajo legends in costume. Philadelphia Winn program, C.A.R. production of Pocahontas. Historic treaty, Eastern Cherokees and Lower Muskogee Creek Tribes, "Burying the Hatchet" at McIntosh Reserve, Susan Leneaus in attendance. Reserve is project of Abraham Baldwin Chapter. Indian Committee contributions: chapters \$100+, Baron DeKalb, Martha Stewart Bulloch, Andrew Houser, Nathaniel Macon; \$60+, William Marsh, Oglethorpe, Fort Peachtree; \$40+, Captain Edward Hagin, Fielding Lewis, Governor David Emanuel, John Houstoun. Proclaimed Indian Heritage Month: Fort Peachtree Chapter, Chamblee

Mayor. Button Gwinnett participated in annual Columbus College Indian Festival. Colonel Daniel Appling speaker helped build Indian Church. Captain Thomas Cobb's, Ann Glankler, National Archives volunteer, helps Indians trace ancestors, average 3 weekly. Burkhalter program, member trip to Southwest, poverty but praised Indian Culture. AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP

Ninety-nine chapters reported the distribution of 3,520 Manuals for Citizenship to schools, libraries, churches, individuals, applicants and to the Immigration Courts. Three chapters furnish teachers for applicants. Three chapters participate in the Naturalization Courts. Two chapters give flags to new citizens, two give cards with the American's Creed and furnish speakers and prepare a tea for the new citizens. Three chapters entered the ILLUSTRATING AMERICANISM BY PRESERVING HISTORY Contest and one Community Service Award was given.

CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

The Georgia State Society, N.S.C.A.R., is made up of 13 societies with 8 active on the state level. Ninety-eight DAR Chapters responded to the C.A.R. Committee with \$549 to the state treasury and \$442 to the national treasury with many serving as senior leaders, state patriotis and promoters, purchasing honor pins and placing names on the Honor Board. The Georgia C.A.R. has had many outstanding activities and functions. The C.A.R. state project surpassed its goal with a \$400 contribution to the Cobb Youth Museum. Two new societies formed: Button Gwinnett in Columbus and John Clarke in Social Circle. The Benjamin Hawkins Society in Macon is under reorganization. The incoming National President of C.A.R., David Campaigne, was in attendance and brought greetings to the State Conference held at the Northwest Atlanta Hilton in Atlanta on February 23-24. The Allen Howard Society was named the Most Outstanding Society and Mary Elizabeth Jackson was named the Most Outstanding Senior. See Winners of Awards, 1996.

COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARDS - Mrs. Hugh H. Howell, Jr.

There were 103 of the 105 Georgia Chapters reporting with 29 presenting awards. Number of Community Service Awards presented - 33, with letter of appreciation given to 9 people who participated in community cooperation and one National DAR Medal of Honor awarded. Two chapters have awards pending: Abraham Baldwin and John Clarke.

CONSERVATION - Mrs. Dares E. Wirt

It was encouraging to see increased participation in all phases of conservation. Of the 98 reports, some of the smallest chapters made the most outstanding achievements. DAR Conservation medals presented - 5. Four chapters worked with Adopt-A-Highway; others cleaned Lake Alltoona, the Chattahoochee, a watershed, and planted wildflowers. Fifteen chapters planted trees on Arbor Day, with several ceremonies, one honoring WWII Veterans. Birds fed 11,080 lbs. of seed, 26 feeders made, 1,038 birdhouses and 1 owl house hung. Hummingbirds and butterflies were encouraged. Trees planted - 745; slash pines - 156,450 and over 1,000 shrubs and azaleas, bulbs and flowers planted. Many Earth Day celebrations held with the largest in a stadium. In Georgia, deaths from fire were highest ever. Fire Prevention was stressed with programs, participation of firemen and handouts for home safety. Old Mountain Hill School (Harris Co.) was saved for useful life. Trees replaced in flooded areas and

landfill space preserved by recycling thousands of lbs. of glass, plastic, aluminum and paper. Thanks for observing the 3 R's "Recycle, Re-use, Re-forest." See under 1996 Awards. Thanks for the hard work to preserve our ENVIRONMENT, our only home forever.

CONSTITUTION WEEK - Mrs. Robert H. Gladney

Georgia Daughters continued to lead the Nation in Constitution Week observances in 1995, placing first Display Feet and Print Inches, second Broadcast Minutes and third Bells Across America. Continental Congress awards to chapters were John Laurens second Print Inches, Thomasville second Broadcast Minutes, Tomochichi third Print Inches. Outstanding observances 1995: 81 chapter proclamations, 39 Constitution Week programs involving 50 chapters, 2,540 inches print, 3,749 broadcast minutes, 3,528 square feet displays, 53 chapters had Constitution Minutes or Sidelights each meeting, 1,500+ pocket Constitutions distributed. Much fine work in these statistics. Lamar-LaFayette's newspaper conducted Man-on-the-Street quiz "What does the Constitution mean to you" with three replies and photographs published. Albany group had a magnificent Avenue of Flags lining the country club entrance for program with 12 chapters, one SAR. Columbus group had Fort Benning Army Band concert at the Mall and at Bell Ringing, publicity three TV stations, five radio stations, 18 civic club bulletins. Brunswick had State Attorney General speaker. Governor Zell Miller signed proclamation with State Regent and four members at photo session. Ninety-four chapters reported with 79 participating in the selection of 200 Good Citizens from 225 schools contacted. District winners: Northeast - Ashley Brooke McElreath, sponsored by Elijah Clarke Chapter; Northwest - Sarah Culpepper Burson, sponsored by Pulaski Chapter; Southeast - April Michelle Brooks, sponsored by John Laurens Chapter; Southwest - Natalie Karen Pope, sponsored by Bainbridge Chapter. Ashley Brooke McElreath, the State Winner of the DAR Good Citizen contest, was presented the State Winner's pin, certificate and \$250 in prize money at State Conference. Each district winner received \$50 in prize money. Chapters honor their winner with special award ceremonies including teas, luncheons and meetings which include parents and sponsors when pins and certificates are presented. Eleven chapters awarded a total of \$695 in cash and bonds to their winners and one chapter awards 2 quarters of tuition at a local college. Reports were received from 98 chapters with 79 meeting requirement for State Honor Roll. There were 1,002 renewals, 180 new subscriptions, 75 gift subscriptions, making a total of 1,257 subscriptions. Genealogy, National Defense, State sponsored ads and letters from the chapters were the most interesting features to the Georgia chapter members. Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure and a privilege to serve under your capable leadership.

DAR MAGAZINE ADVERTISING - Mrs. James L. Fritze

Seventy-two chapters participated in the 1995 Co-op ads, placing 6 full pages of ads honoring the State Officers, Honorary State Regents, District Directors, State Conference Pages, National American History Essay Contest Winner, and State Chairmen.

Georgia received credit for \$3,875 in ad revenues for the August-September issue. Three chapters placed full page ads recognizing accomplishments of their chapters. Seventeen individual ads were placed by chapters. Total combined revenue from 89 Georgia chapters in 1995 was \$5,615. The interest-bearing money market account established by this chairman for magazine advertising funds accrued interest of \$26.36 for the year. The current balance is \$1,159.72. DAR SCHOOL - Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall

Reports were received from 99 chapters. The Hightower DAR School Award was presented to 36 chapters with Commodore Richard Dale and Edmund Burke Chapters honored for largest per capita contributions; receiving award for the most poundage to KDS and/or Tamassee were William Marsh and Hightower Trail Chapters. Seventy-three chapters had a full program on the school; 30,302 labels; 26,785 lbs. of

resale items; 69 books of trading stamps. Contributions were: Tamassee, \$8,355.77; KDS, \$8,253.95; Berry, \$1,393.60; Crossnore, \$1,202.50; Hillside, \$628.50; Hindman, \$654.50, totaling \$20,488.82. Contributions to state projects at Berry, KDS and Tamassee, \$11,547.32. Cherokee Chapter donated 450 children's books, had an art show to raise funds for the schools, took 14 Tamassee children on a picnic, took 14 Tamassee girls to lunch and Nutcracker performance and sent a set of encyclopedias to KDS. DAR SERVICE FOR VETERANS-PATIENTS - Miss Mary King

Georgia Daughters honored hospitalized veterans with service and support. In addition to the VA Medical Centers in Atlanta, Augusta and Dublin, veterans at 16 other facilities were served. Out of 98 chapters reporting, 79 reported 418 volunteers made 960 visits to medical facilities, requiring 12,951 travel miles and 1,942 hours; 57 parties were given, costing \$1,805 and 511 hours. Cash/canteen books totaled \$3,389.50; comfort items \$4,638.15; magazines and books \$9,558.90; gifts \$4,302.46. Over 160 ozs. cancelled stamps were sent to local facilities and over 165 ozs. mailed to "Stamps for the Wounded." State Indexing Project - Mrs. Everette E. Porter, Jr. - Vice Chairman

Eleven indexes were completed this year. One Bookworm Pin and 2 bars were earned by volunteers. The remaining unindexed volumes (about 20) will be completed in 1996. This year a special award will be presented at State Conference to Dr. Jessie J. Mize, who began indexing the volumes of the DAR Genealogical Records collection more than 20 years ago. Thank you, Dr. Mize, for beginning this project and being the inspiration to those who now complete it.

HONOR ROLL - CHAPTER ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS

Reports were received from all of Georgia's 105 chapters. New award categories were implemented this year to include Category A Chapter Achievement Award (chapters with 49 or fewer members); Category B Chapter Achievement Award (chapters with 50-199 members) and Category C, Honor Roll (mandatory for chapters with membership over 200, but eligible for all chapters regardless of membership count). JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS - Mrs. W. Daniel McCranie, II

Reports were received from 98 chapter chairmen. This state chairman received 17 entries for judging on the state level, with 15 entries receiving first place recognition and being sent to the S.E. Division Vice-Chairman. A total of \$240 was given by chapters in the state for support of JAC work.

Georgia Juniors were recognized with 2 awards at the 1995 Junior Breakfast during Continental Congress. Our success must be contributed to Mrs. Peter S. This is a new committee this year and just getting under way. There were several workshops held throughout the state by chapters in an effort to attract prospective members. There will be an *NSDAR Membership Promotion Workshop Manual* available this spring. Workshops and this manual will serve to provide information in promoting membership and improving the preparation of application papers. These workshops will be valuable to anyone working on their lineage and especially to chapter registers.

MOTION PICTURE, RADIO and TELEVISION - Mrs. Alton K. Bruce

The Motion Picture, Radio and Television Committee was established to encourage better films, radio and television programs for public viewing. We must continue promoting sound cultural values and high standards in these medias. Thirty chapters wrote letters to the media. Button Gwinnett, Colonel Daniel Appling, Council of Safety, Hightower Trail and Tallassee Chapters recognized individuals with gifts, certificates of appreciation, medals, plaques and wrote letters to individuals holding elective office. This chairman encourages each DAR member in every chapter to use their "Eyes and Ears" and become a "Watch-Dog" of this committee. Together we can make a difference. In 1994-1995, Georgia's report was Southeastern Division Winner. Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure to serve as chairman of this committee.

NATIONAL DEFENSE - Mrs. J. Donald Millar

Annual reports were received from 99 chapters, with 92 chapters having the required minutes of National Defense and 84 having a full program. Eighty-seven furnished extra material at meetings, 23 provided materials for schools and 40, materials for libraries; 201 Good Citizenship medals and 74 certificates were presented; 120 bronze ROTC medals were presented to cadets in high schools and 26 gold ROTC medals to students in colleges and universities; 32 chapters reported giving \$116 to ROTC Award Program and \$52 to Dollars for Defense. Spot announcements and programs were heard and seen on radio and television promoting DAR events and patriotism. Ninety-eight chapters received 1,036 newspaper articles and 512 photographs; 1,616 radio spots, 2 television programs, 3,047 television spots. SEIMES MICROFILM CENTER - Mrs. Rod Scott

Due to the popularity of the Seimes Microfilm Center at National Headquarters, the equipment is wearing out and is outdated. There is a great need for 3 new readers and 1 new printer. Funds are also needed for obtaining the United States Census Records for the years 1800-1840. These will cost the Center \$23 per roll. The Center continues to function ONLY on contributions from chapters around the nation. Contributed this year from 98 Georgia chapters was \$833. Life membership memorials were given by the following chapters: John Clarke, John Franklin Wren, Martha Stewart Bulloch and Fort Peachtree. My appreciation to all the participating chapters. It has been a pleasure to serve as chairman for this most worthwhile committee.

VOLUNTEER COMMUNITY SERVICE - Mrs. Jerido Ward

Reports were received from 97 chapters, with many hours of volunteer service given. Chapter members donated 9,088 hours to museums, 12,874 to libraries, 19,996 to hospitals, 1,277 to nursing homes, 1,976 to community centers, 3,064 to schools and 9,184 to other community activities, which included: Habitat for Humanity, Meals on Wheels, Soup Kitchens, Boy and Girl Scouts, and many others. Volunteer hours from our Consolidated Report Form totaled 57,459. Congratulations to each of you for your service in your communities. VOLUNTEER INFORMATION SPECIALISTS - Margene W. Roberts

The VIS Committee operates with computer on-line services, with the ability to reach a potential audience of 30 million people. There are over 400 DAR members available nationwide on 3 on-line services to look up patriots, refer prospective members to an on-line Daughter in their state, who would then put them in touch with the State Membership Chairman and then the location of a chapter near their home; go to the National Archives without leaving home, procure documents for each other and

potential members by using local resources and also have the ability to transmit photos. VIS also gives an inactive member or member-at-large an opportunity to become involved. National Officers are on-line to advise and answer pertinent questions. This service could be used to identify DAR members with special skills in handicrafts, stitchery, quilting and dollmaking, etc. Research questions can be fielded by experts. Computer clubs are already being formed. Through Prodigy, this committee has been able to pass along approximately 15 names of persons interested in DAR. The DAR application form is on computer disk now, both in DOS and MAC versions. Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure to have served in your administration.

Members of the Finance Committee were telephoned to discuss the \$1,800 over budget cost of the 1995 Proceedings which was caused by an increase in the shipping and mailing costs and which left the state dues account low in funds. The Committee voted to transfer \$1,800 from the general savings fund money market account to the state dues fund checking account.

A regular meeting of the Finance Committee was held October 26, 1995, in the Oxford Room of the Best Western White Columns Inn, Covington. Harriette F. Hankinson, Chairman, called the meeting to order at 5:00 p.m. Others in attendance were Edwina H. Beall, Rosemary C. Hunter, Kay D. Miller, Mary Kate Tribble, Shelby A. Whitson, Anne W. Murphey, and State Regent, Carolyn G. Hanf. Edna D. Kendrick was fondly remembered by the members of the committee. Following a moment of shared silence, Shelby Whitson opened the meeting with prayer. The chairman welcomed Anne Murphey to the committee. Mary Kate Tribble moved that the Finance Committee recommend the proposal from Classic Printing of Albany to the Executive

Committee for the printing of the 1996 edition of the Membership Roll and Register of Ancestors. Motion was seconded and adopted. The Summary of Funds of the Georgia State Society and the Summary of Fund Accounts of the Meadow Garden Museum were distributed for review and the State Treasurer gave her report to the committee. Anne W. Murphey moved that the Finance Committee recommend that the 1996-1997 Budget of the Georgia State Society be based on the income of dues from 7,100 members. Motion was seconded and adopted. Rosemary C. Hunter moved that \$1,800 transferred from the general savings fund money market account to the state dues fund checking account, due to the unexpected cost increase in the 1995 Proceedings does not have to be repaid. Motion was seconded and adopted. Rosemary C. Hunter moved that, beginning with the 1996 Proceedings, the C.A.R. receive four (4) free pages in the Proceedings and the Junior Membership Club receive one (1) free page. The total cost of the Proceedings will be used as the basis for determining the per page cost and all other clubs will be billed accordingly. Motion was seconded and adopted. Kay D. Miller moved that the Finance Committee recommend that the Proceedings Committee examine ways to reduce the cost of mailing the Proceedings. Motion was seconded and adopted. There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 6:16 p.m.

On October 26, 1995, members of the Finance Committee adopted a motion to recommend the proposal from Classic Printing of Albany to the Executive Committee for the printing of the 1996 edition of the Membership Roll and Register of Ancestors. On March 15, 1996, members of the Finance Committee attending the 98th State Conference in Augusta were polled to authorize a price for the forthcoming book. After discussion, the members approved a pre-publication price of \$25 and set the regular price at \$30.

A Called Meeting of the Finance Committee was held on April 17, 1996. Members of the Finance Committee attending the 105th Continental Congress were polled in the Hall to authorize the dispersal of \$3,000 from general savings fund money market account to refurbish the chairs in the Georgia State Box in Constitution Hall. Members present and voting to approve the action were Edwina H. Beall, Rosemary C. Hunter, Harriette H. Hankinson, Shelby A. Whitson and Carolyn G. Hanf. The other members of the committee were notified subsequently and approval was given also by Kay D. Miller, Mary Kate Tribble and Anne W. Murphey.

GEORGIA DAY - Mrs. Albert H. Wren

Georgia Day reports were received from 97 chapters with 56 honoring our state, a 17% increase over last year. Activities included: posters in libraries; proclamations by mayors; books and DAR Georgia maps donated to schools and libraries; encourages schools to recognize Georgia Day; shared Georgia products and pamphlets with schools and presented quizzes and slides on Georgia history; placed wreaths on markers of Oglethorpe and Tomochichi and wrote articles for newspapers. Thirteen chapters attended Georgia Day luncheons. Subjects for programs included: Georgia authors, poets, heroes, flag, history, founding fathers, flowers and trees, Georgia Signers of Constitution; Salzburgers, Georgia Day History, James Habersham, James Edward Oglethorpe, Peter Tondee, Governor Alfred Colquitt, first circuit rider pastor, historic customs, Macon's past and present and facts and fancy of Aunt Nancy (Hart). The most outstanding celebration was by Fort Peachtree Chapter, presenting the History Medal to Paul Stephen Hudson, Oglethorpe University Registrar and Lecturer in History. The Chapter was also invited to participate in celebrating Oglethorpe Day

which included unveiling a Historic Marker. It has been an honor to serve as Georgia Day Chairman. See 1996 Awards in Proceedings.

GEORGIA STATE ROOM, DAR MUSEUM - Mrs. Hugh Peterson, Sr.

Georgia Daughters are encouraged to visit the Peter Tondee Room at the DAR Museum in Washington, D.C. This year, Georgia Daughters contributed \$786.50 to the Georgia Room. This chairman thanks the chapters for their continued support, interest and generosity.

HISTORY OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY - Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar
Reports from 98 chapters show that Georgia Daughters have become more involved in community activities by conservation projects to help beautify our cities, presentation of Community Service Awards, and many volunteer hours by members. They reveal that history has been preserved with chapter members compiling and publishing books and observance of World War II events throughout the year. Many veterans were recognized and honored. There is added interest in the American Indians and we are becoming better acquainted with our DAR Schools by having school personnel speak at chapter meetings. Bylaws of many chapters have been revised and the history of a number of chapters have been written. 1995 is now history and the activities of Georgia Chapters this year will be an interesting addition to The History of the Georgia State Society when volume 3 is published. For the privilege of continuing in this chairmanship, this chairman extends her heartfelt thanks, Madam State Regent.

LUCY COOK PEEL MEMORIAL - Mrs. Robert H. Farrow

The Lucy Cook Peel Memorial Fund was established by the Georgia State Society in 1923 to honor Mrs. William Lawson Peel. This tribute to Mrs. Peel, who served as Vice President General from Georgia, is for the preservation of records. Since 1946, the Georgia State Society has published the Membership Roll and Register of Ancestors of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR every 10 years. The 1986 edition is available at a cost of \$12.50 from the chairman, or \$15.00 by mail. Thirty-two copies have been purchased this year with a small number remaining. Contributions this year have totaled \$501.50, which includes book purchases of \$411.50 and chapter contributions of \$90. The 1996 edition is being printed and will be available this summer. Pre-publication price is \$25 with cost after publication of \$30 plus any postage if mailed. Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure serving you and the State Society in this capacity.

Restoring Historic Spots: GENERAL JAMES JACKSON CHAPTER, with the Valdosta Chapter #471, United Daughters of the Confederacy and The Wymodis Club were able to place their co-owned, The Woman's Building, on the National Register of Historic Places. JOHN LAURENS CHAPTER rededicated the Nancy Hart Highway marker in Wrightsville after it was moved to a more appropriate location.

Scheduled events are the Walton Rehabilitation Hospital Fair on September 9, 1995 and the 2nd Annual Canal Discovery Day on November 4, 1995. Mrs. Cagle, Meadow Garden Museum Chairman, reported that the postcards will be ordered in November, and will cost \$375 plus shipping; AT&T resumed service without the \$5.00 minimum monthly charge; pink flyers have been reordered; handrails on the front steps need to be replaced; Canal Discovery Day was canceled; *Tourist Book* ad listed wrong amount for fee and will be corrected; dining room ceiling continues to peel, solutions being looked into; documentary featuring Meadow Garden will be aired December 2, 1995 at 7:00 p.m. and December

4, 1995 at 7:30 p.m. by Georgia Public Television; a new *Travel Host Magazine* may list Meadow Garden at no cost. Mrs. James Clark, Museum/House Manager, attended Classic South's workshop on marketing tourists. At the suggestion of the Augusta-Richmond County Convention and Visitors Bureau, Mrs. Cagle and Mrs. Henry will open the Meadow Garden Museum on a trial basis one Saturday a month from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. in conjunction with Augusta activities. The Christmas "Open House" will be December 2 and 3, 1995. The Augusta Chapter will decorate the Augusta Room, and other chapters have expressed some interest in decorating, and serving as Docents. A notice on the "Open House" will be distributed at the Fall Board of Management Meeting. Mrs. Beall showed and delivered the new sundial given in memory of Margaret Bunn Watson by the Board. Mrs. Henry, Landscape Chairman, stated that the land survey and plat was completed at a cost of \$125. A copy was sent to Mrs. Hanf, a copy was placed in the "Best Room" desk, and in the files of the Landscape Chairman. Sonny Reese is still working on the museum appraisal. The new lawn service has been prompt and thorough. C.A.R. members from Atlanta came for a tour/work visit in October. They removed vines from the fence. The iris bed has been enlarged to accommodate the iris donated by Mrs. Dee Mitchell, College Hill Chapter. Mrs. Shelby A. Whitson, Fielding Lewis Chapter, donated daffodil bulbs. Beds have been weeded, shrubbery pruned and pansies planted. The Kitchen Garden is being planted with winter vegetables. Walter Cox, a History teacher at Richmond Academy, has volunteered to work on the Herb Garden. He will be working under the supervision of Mrs. Henry. A letter has been written to *Southern Living Magazine* to elicit their interest in Meadow Garden. Mrs. Elliott, Museum Shop Chairman, reported that everything was selling well. Mrs. Hanf stated that she, Peter S. Hanf, and Mr. and Mrs. Russell Newton visited Meadow Garden July 6, 1995, and were met by Mrs. Cagle and Mrs. Henry to discuss the proposed Gate House in order to prepare drawings for review. Mr. Newton is agreeable to draw the plans as a donation, and Mr. Hanf's architect stamp could be used if the Board would make a hold-harmless agreement to Mr. Hanf. This is to indemnify the architect stamping the drawing from litigation, and indicates Meadow Garden will be responsible for any debts incurred stemming from litigation against the architect. An alternative would be to have a local architect take the responsibility, and liability for preparation of construction documents sufficient to receive a building permit; thereby, assuming that liability through his own corporate insurance. Perhaps Meadow Garden may offer to pay the deductible in the event of a lawsuit, but agreeing only after discovering the amount of the deductible. Mrs. Hanf will reschedule a meeting with Mayor De Vaney. Mrs. Hanf recommended bars be installed over the window on the stair landing. It was suggested that the bars be placed on the inside. Mrs. Elliott moved that the Board lend an item or items for a short period of time (2 years) to the Georgia State Museum of Science and Industry for display during 1996-1998. Item(s) to be returned before July 30, 1998. Seconded. Adopted. Mrs. Hanf announced that the Board will meet January 16, 1996 in the Meadow Garden Museum Board Room at 10:00 a.m. There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 2:45 p.m.

The Meadow Garden Museum Board met Tuesday, January 16, 1996 at Meadow Garden with Mrs. Peter S. Hanf, State Regent, presiding as Chairman of the Board. The meeting was called to order at 10:10 a.m. The prayer was given by Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall, ex-officio member. Others present were Mrs. Fred A. Miller, Jr., Mrs. Roy

H. Cagle, Jr., Mrs. Claude Brown, Mrs. Charles H. Turner, Mrs. John R. Henry, Mrs. Flew Murphey and ex-officio member, Mrs. Billy W. Hunter. Minutes of the October 26, 1994 meeting were read and approved as read. The Financial Statement was reviewed. Mrs. James Clark, Museum/House Manager, stated that 2,742 tourists visited the museum in 1995, and all items in the Museum Shop were selling well including the beautiful new Meadow Garden postcards. Mrs. Hanf thanked Mrs. Clark and she was excused. The Board voted to make Mrs. Clark a patron for her dedication to Meadow Garden. Mrs. Cagle, Meadow Garden Museum Chairman, reported that bars over the window on the stair landing will be installed at a cost of \$75; the Georgia State Museum of Science and Industry rejected the item or items; front porch rails will be repaired at a cost of approximately \$200; a calculator with tape will be purchased for the Museum Shop; tourist increase of 22% for 1995; Sizemore Security has increased fee for monthly monitoring service; picture and information was sent to *Colonial Home Magazine* in New York to consider featuring Meadow Garden in the magazine; Meadow Garden is included in the new *Travel Host Magazine* at no charge. Mrs. Cagle moved that an ad be placed in the *Augusta Magazine Tourist Guide* for 1996 at a reasonable rate. Seconded. Adopted. Mrs. Hunter, Docents Chairman, stated that there are 11 docents. The docents assisted at the Christmas Open House. Mrs. Henry, Landscaping Chairman, reported that the daffodil bulbs donated by Mrs. Shelby A. Whitson have been planted; old bricks were purchased and the walk pattern was built into the herb garden (a 15" square was constructed for its base and the Memorial Sundial was placed in the center of the garden); the cleaning of the Meadow Garden Historical marker was begun; lawn service and yard help continues to be satisfactory; Walter Cox has come several times to help with the herb garden; supervised the decorating of Meadow Garden for the Christmas Open House (2 members from Augusta Chapter, 13 from College Hill Chapter and 3 from John Franklin Wren Chapter assisted). Mrs. Henry moved that all diseased or damaged trees between the front walk and back gates be removed and the 4 crepe myrtles near the flag pole be removed and replaced with indigenous trees which will be donated. Seconded. Adopted. Mrs. Murphey, Patron Chairman, announced that 9 chapters and 25 individuals became patrons. Mrs. Hanf stated that Russell Newton will draw the plans for the Gate House; however, it will take longer than expected, since the Newton's have moved recently. During State Conference there will be a Meadow Garden Tea and tour, Friday, March 15, 1996 from 2:00-4:30 p.m. Augusta has combined the city and county management and there is no longer a mayor. Larry Sconyers is the Commission Chairman. The Board viewed the documentary featuring Meadow Garden that was aired in December by Georgia Public Television. Mrs. Hanf thanked everyone for coming. There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 1:00 p.m.

MEADOW GARDEN MUSEUM BOARD - March 13, 1996

The Meadow Garden Museum Board met Wednesday, March 13, 1996 in the Shultz Room, Radisson Riverfront Hotel, Augusta, with Mrs. Peter S. Hanf, State Regent, presiding as Chairman of the Board. The meeting was called to order at 1:06 p.m. The prayer was given by Mrs. Billy W. Hunter, ex-officio member. Others present were Mrs. Fred A. Miller, Jr., Mrs. Roy H. Cagle, Jr., Mrs. Claude Brown, Mrs. Charles H. Turner, Mrs. John R. Henry, Mrs. James H. Elliott, Jr., and ex-officio member, Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall. Minutes of the January 16, 1996 meeting were read and approved as read. The Financial Statement was reviewed. Mrs. James Clark, Museum/House

Manager, reported a 20% tourist increase over last year, representing 24 states and 4 countries. There are Staffordshire pitchers in stock and 38 have cracking to some degree. Even if the price was reduced no one would want to buy them. Flyers need to be reordered. They are placed in 15 Visitation Centers. A sign saying "Entrance to Meadow Garden" is needed. On overcast days, lighting is not adequate. The Daves Jugs located in the kitchen are probably under valued. Mrs. Betty Watkins has requested a letter stating that Mr. and Mrs. Franklin Williams lived in the caretaker cottage and cared for Meadow Garden in the 1970's. This would be handed down in her family history. Mrs. Hanf thanked Mrs. Clark and she was excused. Mrs. Cagle, Meadow Garden Museum Chairman, informed the Board that the bars over the window on the stair landing have been installed, and the front porch rails have been repaired. There are 2 loose shingles on the roof, and the roofing company will be contacted. The porch floor needs to be painted with a water sealer. Mrs. Cagle and Mrs. Henry met in January with Larry Sconyers, Mayor/Chairman, and asked for additional signs. Five new signs have been placed (2 on Walton Way, 2 on Thirteenth Street and 1 on Telfair Street). The Meadow Garden Tea and Tour during State Conference will be Friday, March 15, 1996 from 2:00 - 4:30 p.m. Mrs. Henry, Landscaping Chairman, reported that the ivy, grape vines, fig trees have been pruned, and a tallow tree has been planted. She stated that large orange trees and a palm from the 1800's are among today's specimens at Mt. Vernon. Sonny Reese, Appraiser, has brought a potential problem to our attention. The site plan by Harbin & Associates could not be completed with metes and bounds because of the lack of recorded information concerning the front boundary points. This has been a concern in producing a proper appraisal of the property. The land referred to is the front 20 feet. In the *History of the Georgia State Society DAR 1899-1981*, page 223, an additional piece of land was bought a few years prior to 1960. Jay M. Sawilowsky, Attorney, stated that we should have records for the legal work he did on Meadow Garden. If these records do not produce a plot which can be recorded, Mr. Reese recommends that we have a Title Search made and properly recorded. For an additional payment of \$200 the plat can be completed. Mrs. James H. Elliott, Jr., Museum Shop Chairman, reported that \$50 worth of toys for children had been ordered. Mrs. Hanf thanked everyone for serving on the Board. There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 2:30 p.m.

Standing Rules for Meadow Garden

I

MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

1. The governing body of a museum, in this instance the Meadow Garden Board, serves the public interest as it relates to Meadow Garden, and must consider itself accountable to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, as well as to Meadow Garden; members should not attempt to act in their individual capacities, but all actions should be taken as a Board, Committee, or otherwise in conformance with the Standing Rules, the Act of Incorporation, or applicable Resolutions.
2. The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the three (3) Trustees as named in the Deed from the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, conveying Meadow Garden to the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution; namely, the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the State Chairman of Meadow Garden who is appointed by the State Regent; the Chapter Regents of the Augusta Chapter and the College Hill Chapter, both Chapters being located in Augusta, who shall serve as Vice Chairmen to the State Chairman of Meadow Garden; and five of the chairmen of Meadow Garden Committees, as appointed by the State Regent.
3. No Georgia Daughter shall serve in the same Meadow Garden Chairmanship more than two (2) consecutive terms.
4. Of the six (6) appointments made by the State Regent, at least two (2) shall be Honorary State Regents.
5. The State Second Vice Regent and Treasurer shall serve as ex-officio members of the Meadow Garden Board, being given the privilege of the floor without a vote.
6. The State Regent shall serve as Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board, and the State First Vice Regent shall serve as Secretary of the Meadow Garden Board.
7. The Meadow Garden Board shall meet a minimum of three (3) times each year; namely, preceding Fall Board of Management meeting, preceding annual State Conference and following Continental Congress, and at such other time as deemed necessary by the Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board. At least one (1) meeting of the Board shall be held at Meadow Garden each year.
8. The Meadow Garden Board shall have jurisdiction over the operation, maintenance and work of Meadow Garden and shall be the authority for Meadow Garden as long as such authority is not in conflict with the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, the Act of Incorporation for the Georgia State Society, Resolutions adopted by the Georgia State Society and/or directions which from time to time may be approved by action of the Georgia State Society assembled at its annual State Conference.
9. Five (5) voting members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.
10. Minutes shall be kept of each meeting and a copy shall be sent to each member and printed verbatim in the State Proceedings.

11. All expenses for maintenance, operation and purchases of furnishings and plantings shall be authorized by the State Regent, as Chairman of the Board, and paid by the State Treasurer. Expenditures exceeding \$1,000.00 must have the majority approval of the Board.
12. These rules will be binding on the actions of the Board in their operation of "Meadow Garden." They may be changed by the following procedure: Members of the Board must have written notification of proposed changes or additions one month prior to the next meeting of the Board; a two-thirds vote of the Board is necessary to effect a change or addition.

II OPERATIONS

1. Everyone entering Meadow Garden will be requested to sign the Register, including date, time of arrival and time of departure.
2. No more than fifteen (15) people with each Docent are to be on tour in the house at a given time. Excess of this number may wait in the reception room or in the garden. The Museum-House Manager/Docent has the authority to enforce the Meadow Garden rules at all times.
3. There will be no smoking in Meadow Garden.
4. No refreshments are to be served in Meadow Garden or taken into Meadow Garden. Should a group, such as a visiting chapter, desire refreshments, the garden is available for use if litter is properly disposed of by the serving group.
5. Tour visitors will be asked to pay a fee as set by the Board.
6. There will be only four (4) complete sets of keys to Meadow Garden and 4 keys to the gates of Meadow Garden. Keys to be returned after each administration. New locks may be required. Distribution of Keys: Gate Only: Landscaping Chairman, Augusta Police Department, Georgia Power, and Sizemore Security. Gate & House: Chairman of the Board, Meadow Garden Chairman, Museum House Manager, and Docents Chairman.

III VOLUNTEERS (DOCENTS)

1. Volunteers, docents, shall be members in good standing of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR.
2. Duties of volunteers shall include acting as guides, hostesses, working in museum shop, working in yard, cleaning in house, public relations. No volunteer work at or for Meadow Garden shall be done except under the direct guidance of the Meadow Garden Board and the chairman of the specific committee for that particular function.
3. Cleaning or yard work volunteers shall be under the direction of the House/Museum Manager.

IV FURNISHINGS

1. Items bought or accepted for the older section of Meadow Garden must pre-date 1821.

2. Furnishings for the two (2) main floor rooms and two (2) upstairs rooms in the newer section may be dated post 1820 but these rooms should be considered companion rooms to the rest of the house and furnished accordingly with all efforts made to keep furnishings of these four rooms dated no later than 1850. The Augusta Room furnishings will remain as they were in 1982.
3. Reproductions may be used only when the physical condition of the antiques is jeopardized by exposure in areas where large numbers of visitors have easy access; or when environmental conditions including excessive light, dust, humidity or airborne impurities pose a threat to the preservation of originals.
4. Effective March 12, 1983 all items donated to Meadow Garden shall be accepted with the written condition that they become the property of Meadow Garden and may be used, replaced or sold at the discretion of the Meadow Garden Board only.
5. All items that post date 1821, with the exception of those in the six (6) rooms of the newer section and those described in Number 3 of this section, shall be replaced as soon as possible with similar items pre-dating 1821.
6. Once an item is placed, it shall not be moved from one location to another without permission of the Meadow Garden Board. Only the Chairman of the Board may approve the removal of an item from the house, if it is in need of repair or refinishing.
7. Any item donated or purchased must have written documentation of appraisal and include an indication as to how the determination was made.
8. A file will be kept of all assets with information as to price paid or market value, date of acquisition, donor or where bought, documentation and appraisal and a description of article. One file will be kept in the reception room accessible to the Docents; a duplicate file will be in the possession of the Chairman of the Board.
9. All items purchased or donated will be added to the Fine Arts insurance policy. Said policy will be reviewed and updated a minimum of once a year. Major additions to furnishings will be added immediately.
10. Future plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the House/ Museum.

V

LANDSCAPING

1. The landscape plan adopted by the Board shall be adhered to with no deviation unless recommended by an authority on landscape design and care.
2. Donations of shrubbery, plants or trees shall be accepted only when item is part of the master plan.
3. Work on the grounds will be under the sole direction of the Meadow Garden Board and the Landscaping Chairman. Supervision of actual work will be provided by the Museum-House Manager or the Landscaping Chairman of Meadow Garden.

VI

MUSEUM SHOP

1. The Museum Shop will be operated by a committee appointed by the Chairman of the Board and be responsible to the Board.

2. Chairman of the committee will be responsible for all purchases, subject to the approval of the Board or the State Regent.
3. Museum Shop operation will be self-supporting. In the event funds are needed for purchases, they may be advanced from available Meadow Garden funds and must be considered a loan and shall be repaid without interest within one (1) year from date of borrowing.
4. Profit from the Museum Shop shall be retained in its own account, with a percentage being transferred at the discretion of the Board at end of fiscal year and placed in Maintenance Account. The audit of the Museum Shop operation shall be included in the annual audit of the Georgia State Society.

VII PATRONS

1. Donors to the following categories are eligible to be known as "Patrons":
 - A. Meadow Garden Capital Investment Trust Fund
 - B. Furnishings
 - C. Maintenance
 - D. Landscape
2. Individual gifts of a minimum value of \$50.00 to any of the above categories automatically qualifies the donor as a Patron.
3. Chapter or group gifts of a minimum value of \$100.00 or more, above the State Honor Roll requirements, automatically qualifies that chapter or group as a Patron.
4. The State Treasurer will report these gifts to the Patrons Chairman.
5. The Patrons Chairman will issue certificates to the qualifying individuals and chapters or groups.
6. A permanent book will be kept on public display at Meadow Garden to record Patrons gifts.
7. The Patrons Chairman will enter the names of donors in the appropriate book a minimum of once a year.

VIII PLAQUES & MARKERS

1. Plaques/Markers may be placed at Meadow Garden only at the discretion of the Board, and request meets the following criteria:
 - A. Substantial service and/or contributions that secured the property and the heritage for the GSDAR;
 - B. Individuals so recognized shall have been deceased for at least 5 years;
 - C. Plaque/Marker will be paid for by person(s) requesting such recognition.
2. Such plaques will be permanently displayed at Meadow Garden and a record of honoree's service and/or contribution shall be recorded and placed in the Meadow Garden file, with Board approval.
3. Plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the house/museum. Additional markers shall not be permanently placed on the grounds.

The petition of the three persons whose names are signed hereto and who presently are respectively the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent, and the State Recording Secretary, of the unincorporated Georgia State Society of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, Inc., respectively shows:

1.

That the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution was created a body corporate and politic, in the District of Columbia, for patriotic, historical and educational purposes, to perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American independence, by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebration of all patriotic anniversaries; to carry out the injunction of Washington, in his farewell address to the American people "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge; to cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom; to foster true patriotism and love of Country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty." Said Charter being granted by the Congress of the United States by the Act of February 20, 1896 (Title 36, Sections 18, 18a, 18b, Federal Code Annotated).

2.

Said Act authorized said Society "to hold real and personal estate in the United States so far only as may be necessary to its lawful ends" and "to adopt a constitution and make bylaws not inconsistent with law, adopt a seal, and have its headquarters or principal office at Washington, in the District of Columbia."

3.

That the Georgia State Society of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, Inc., was organized, under the authority of the National Society, in Atlanta, Georgia, May 23, 24, 1899, as a voluntary and unincorporated organization, for the same purposes and with the same rights and powers as those granted by the Congress of the National Society.

4.

That the officers and members of the Georgia State Society desire, and now petition this Honorable Court, to be incorporated, made a body corporate and politic, for the same purposes and with the same rights, powers, authority, and privileges as those now enjoyed by and granted to the National Society by the Congress in said Act of February 20, 1896; including –

A. The right to have, establish, and maintain its principal office and headquarters within the State of Georgia, from time to time, at the place of residence of the duly elected and installed State Regent of the Georgia State Society, or of the residence of the First Vice Regent in the event of the death, disability or removal of the Regent;

B. The right to buy, own, hold, improve, maintain, preserve, sell and convey real and personal property suitable or necessary for carrying out the purposes for which the Georgia State Society was organized and incorporated, including any and all now held or owned by the Georgia State Society or by any of its members for and in its behalf;

C. The right to prepare, adopt, enforce, modify, change, repeal and amend bylaws for the guidance of the operations of the Georgia State Society, its officers, chapters and members; including, but not limited to, the State officers, their duties, authority, responsibilities, term of office; the time, method and manner of electing State Officers and members of committees; the removal of State Officers; the election and term of office of the members of an Executive Committee and the duties, rights, qualifications and authority of the members of such committee; the qualifications of the voting members of the Georgia State Society, their alternates, and the manner of their selection; and all other rules and regulations found or considered necessary or advisable for carrying out the purposes and activities of the Georgia State Society, for the exercise of its corporate powers, and the management, regulation and government of its affairs and property.

5.

The Georgia State Society was not organized for pecuniary gain or profit and, when incorporated as herein prayed, will be without capital stock and will not be operated for pecuniary gain or profit, but only for the purposes hereinabove described.

6.

Attached hereto is a certificate from the Secretary of State declaring the name of the proposed corporation, that is, "The Georgia State Society of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, Inc.," is not the name of any other presently existing corporation in the records of the Secretary of State.

7.

That the incorporation of the Georgia Society as herein prayed, and the filing of this petition, was considered, approved and directed at a meeting of the State Board of Management of the Georgia State Society at its meeting in Macon, Georgia, October 24, 1961.

Wherefore, petitioners pray that the Georgia State Society of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, Inc., be incorporated for the term of thirty-five (35) years, as provided by Sections 22-1802 (e) 22-1871, 22-1881, and 22-1827 of the Code of Georgia.

Bylaws

BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II OBJECTS

The objects of this Society shall be:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of the Georgia State Society.

Article IV OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian and a State Curator.

Section 2. (a) To be eligible for state office, a member shall hold and have held membership in a chapter or chapters within the Georgia State Society for at least 5 years prior to her election and have served a full term as chapter officer or state chairman.

(b) No member shall be eligible to the same state office for two (2) successive terms. A member having served more than one half of a term in a state office shall be deemed to have served a term.

(c) No two state officers shall be members of the same chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

(d) To be eligible for the office of State Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State First Vice Regent or as State Second Vice Regent or served in each of these two offices of the Georgia Society.

(e) To be eligible for the office of State First Vice Regent or for the office of State Second Vice Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State Recording Secretary or as State Treasurer of the Georgia State Society and shall have served a full term as a Chapter Regent of a chapter in the Georgia State Society.

Section 3. In recognition of valuable service to the Georgia State Society, a State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Article V

NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. (a) A candidate for state office shall request the endorsement of her chapter, taken by vote at a regular meeting of the chapter held between May and January preceding the State Conference at which state elections are held. The endorsement, signed by the Chapter Recording Secretary, shall include the office the candidate seeks and shall be received by the State Regent with the candidate's statement of intent to be a candidate prior to any announcement or campaigning by the candidate and/or her supporters.

(b) A candidate for State Regent who wishes to present a slate of officers shall send to the State Regent in one packet the chapter endorsements and the statements of intent for each of her selected candidates. If received by the State Regent no later than December 1, these candidates shall be listed as a slate in the State Regent's December letter and Call to State Conference.

(c) Candidates wishing to run independently of a slate, whose chapter endorsements and statements of intent are received by the State Regent no later than December 1 shall be listed as independent candidates in the State Regent's December letter and Call to State Conference.

(d) A candidate whose chapter endorsement and statement of intent have been properly received by the State Regent may choose to announce her candidacy separate from the State Regent's December letter and Call to State Conference. Such a chapter endorsement and statement of intent shall be received by the State Regent at least ten (10) days prior to the opening of the State Conference at which the election is to take place.

(e) A candidate who does not meet the requirements of these Bylaws shall be declared disqualified and ineligible for consideration for state office.

(f) A chapter shall endorse no more than one chapter member for state office per election with the possible exception of candidates for State Regent and for State Corresponding Secretary.

(g) In the event of the death, incapacitation or withdrawal of a candidate prior to the election, a replacement shall be made with notification in writing to the State Regent and accompanied by the chapter endorsement and statement of intent as directed by these Bylaws.

Section 2. Nominations of candidates for all state offices shall be made at a designated meeting of the State Conference.

Section 3. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected biennially by ballot at the State Conference. A majority vote shall elect.

Section 4. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two (2) years or until their successors are elected. Their terms of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Section 5. (a) Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become State Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become

State First Vice Regent subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. Vacancies in other state offices shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next State Board of Management meeting or State Conference, whichever shall come first.

(b) Any state officer who is absent from the state for a continuous period of six (6) months or longer shall automatically relinquish her position as a state officer.

Section 6. Upon the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Organizing Secretary General.

Section 7. (a) A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot.

(b) The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than fifteen (15) months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

(c) The endorsement shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent with the candidate's name and address to the Recording Secretary General to be received by April 1 preceding the designated Continental Congress.

Article VI

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall perform the duties prescribed in this article, and parliamentary authority adopted by the Society, and such others as the State Board of Management and the National Society may require.

Section 2. The State Regent shall:

(a) be the chief executive officer and the official spokesman for the State Society;

(b) have general supervision of the affairs of the State Society;

(c) preside at all meetings of the State Conference, State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;

(d) appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society;

(e) be ex-officio a member of all committees;

(f) appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as advisor in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting;

(g) sign all contracts and agreements made in the name of the Georgia State Society with the recorded approval of the Executive Committee and the State Board of Management or the State Conference as directed by these Bylaws;

(h) be bonded and have the authority to draw upon funds of the State Society with the approval of the Finance Committee.

(i) recommend to the Finance Committee a Certified Public Accountant who shall be approved by the Finance Committee.

Section 3. The State First Vice Regent shall:

(a) perform the duties of the office of State Regent in the absence or inability of the State Regent;

(b) fill a vacancy in the office of State Regent;

(c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;

(d) serve on those committees as designated by these Bylaws and as directed by the State Regent.

Section 4. The State Second Vice Regent shall:

- (a) perform the duties of the office of State First Vice Regent in the absence or inability of the State First Vice Regent;
- (b) fill a vacancy in the office of State First Vice Regent;
- (c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;
- (d) serve on committees as directed by the State Regent.

Section 5. The State Chaplain shall:

- (a) open all meetings of the State Conference and the State Board of Management with scripture reading and prayer;
- (b) preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and conduct such other religious services as may be required;
- (c) be custodian of state properties pertaining to the duties of this office;
- (d) be responsible for IN MEMORIAM pages in the Proceedings.

Section 6. The State Recording Secretary shall:

- (a) record the proceedings of the meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;
- (b) compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and the Proceedings Committee;
- (c) submit to the appropriate National officers, the endorsement for Vice President General and the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent before April 1 of the year in which said balloting was held;

Section 7. The State Corresponding Secretary shall:

- (a) conduct correspondence and send notices on behalf of the State Regent, the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as may be directed by them;
- (b) receive from the chapters the consolidated reports and distribute to the appropriate state chairmen.

Section 8. The State Organizing Secretary shall:

- (a) assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new chapters;
- (b) assist chapters in conjunction with appropriate state officers and chairmen in revitalization.

Section 9. The State Treasurer shall:

- (a) be bonded;
- (b) be the custodian of the funds of the State Society, placing them in institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance;
- (c) receive the state dues and State Conference registration fees from the chapters and receive all sums contributed by the chapters for state and national projects, disbursing monthly to the Treasurer General all funds designated for national projects;
- (d) disburse other funds only when authorized by the State Regent in writing;
- (e) keep an account of all sums received or disbursed by using the basic double entry form of bookkeeping according to accepted accounting procedures and keep receipts for all transactions;
- (f) prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference, sending a copy to the State Chairman of the Finance Committee ten (10) days in advance of each meeting;
- (g) be a member of the Finance Committee and an ex-officio member of the Credentials Committee;
- (h) balance and prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year; said audit by a Certified Public Accountant, shall be performed and delivered within forty-five (45) days of receipt of books.

Section 10. The State Registrar shall:

(a) when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American revolution prove eligibility and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars ;

(b) keep a correct list of all members in the state;

(c) report on membership to the State Conference;

(d) be in possession of the computer and software owned by the Georgia State Society and see that it is maintained.

Section 11. The State Historian shall:

(a) be in charge, within the state, of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General as well as those authorized by the Georgia State Society;

(b) keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves within the state;

(c) prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General;

(d) promote the study of American history, state and county history and historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the founding of our state and counties.

Section 12. The State Librarian shall:

(a) serve as liaison between the Librarian General and the Georgia Chapters and disseminate general information on the NSDAR Library;

(b) cooperate with the director of the Georgia Department of Archives and History, making the needs of the Archives known to the chapters;

(c) collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing them wherever accepted in such libraries and Archives as may be chosen by the State Board of Management;

(d) solicit, with the approval of the Executive Committee, contributions from the chapters for purchase of such books as requested by the office of the Librarian General, and/or the various libraries in Georgia which the State Society approves;

(e) receive gifts of books and other printed material from the chapters to be donated to the approved libraries and Archives;

(f) maintain a constant supply of bookplates to the NSDAR Library, the Georgia Department of Archives and History and for purchase by the chapters.

Section 13. The State Curator shall:

(a) receive and be responsible for all gifts of Revolutionary relics to the Museum of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution;

(b) be custodian of the State properties and shall have them properly stored and made ready for use at state meetings.

Section 14. All officers will keep a Procedure Book of Instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new officers to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. State Conference:

(a) The annual meeting of the Georgia State Society shall be known as the State Conference. It shall be for the purpose of:

(1) receiving reports of officers, committees and Chapter Regents;

(2) electing officers biennially;

(3) promoting programs in furtherance of the objects of the Society;

(4) any other business that may arise:

i. annual budget shall be adopted,
ii. all projects of the State Society requiring funding shall be voted upon at State Conference or ratified by members at State Conference if previously voted upon by the State Board of Management,

iii. no project extending beyond the term of the presiding officer may be accepted at any meeting other than by vote at State Conference.

(b) The State Conference will be held between February 1 and the time of the meeting of Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week;

(c) The State Regent shall fix the time and place of meetings;

(d) The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credentials form to the chapters not less than sixty (60) days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 2. The voting members of the State Conference shall be:

(a) the officers and Honorary State Regents of the State Society;

(b) the officers and honorary officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state;

(c) the Chapter Regent, or in her absence, the Vice Regent or alternate of each chapter;

(d) delegates or alternates of each chapter of the state as designated by the Bylaws of the National Society for representation at Continental Congress;

(e) one additional delegate from each chapter in the state.

Section 3. Only a chapter member in good standing whose credentials have been completed in accordance with the instructions of the State Regent and the State Credentials Chairman for the State Conference and in accordance with the Standing Rules of the National Society shall be eligible to represent her chapter at state and national meetings.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the chapter, except in the case of the Regent or Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at an annual State Conference, shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the state of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference the privilege of the floor shall be accorded to the State Chairmen. They may not vote unless they are duly registered as voters of the State Conference.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Society may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen (15) days' notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Forty-five (45) voting members, representing not less than twenty (20) chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII

STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The state officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents and the Regents, or in their absence, the Vice Regents of the chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the fall, following the October meeting of the National Board. It may meet whenever called by the State Regent. A minimum of twenty (20) days' notice shall be given as to the time and place of any such meeting.

Section 3. Thirty (30) members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference or as proscribed by these Bylaws.

Section 5. State chairmen, vice chairmen, committee members of the National and Standing Committees and one (1) member from each chapter shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privilege of the floor, but may not vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article IX EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, shall attend the meetings, but may not vote.

Section 3. This Executive Committee shall:

(a) perform such duties of the State Board of Management between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient;

(b) meet at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three (3) members of the committee;

(c) vote by teleconference if necessary;

(d) receive and make recommendations for projects requiring expenditure of funds outside routine expenditures to be considered by the State Conference;

(e) make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. Decisions of the Executive Committee shall be acted upon at the next meeting of the State Board of Management or at State Conference, whichever shall come first.

Article X FINANCES

Section 1. (a) The fiscal year of the Georgia State Society shall be May 1 through the last day of April.

(b) The annual budget, prepared by the Finance Committee, shall cover the fiscal year and be prepared on the basis of dues payable for the calendar year beginning December first preceding.

Section 2. (a) The annual dues of chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be \$5.00 for each member of the chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1.

(b) A minimum of \$1.83 shall be used to cover all State per capita assessments, with \$1.50 of this per capita being used for Meadow Garden maintenance, and the balance shall be allocated to the General State Dues Fund.

Section 3. (a) Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the state dues, a conference registration fee of five dollars (\$5.00) for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under these Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether chapter is represented or not.

(b) State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the five dollars (\$5.00) conference fee at the time of registration.

(c) Other members of the Georgia State Society who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay three dollars (\$3.00) conference fee at the time of registration.

Section 4. (a) The State Treasurer and the State Regent and such others entrusted with funds of the Georgia State Society as may be designated by the State Board of Management shall be bonded. (See Article VI, Sections 2 and 9);

(b) The State Treasurer with the approval of the State Regent and the State Chairman of the Finance Committee shall place the funds of the Georgia State Society in financial institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage;

(c) The placement of restricted savings funds and investment funds of the Georgia State Society shall be placed to the credit of the Georgia State Society by the State Treasurer under the direction of the Finance Committee. Monies may be invested in U. S. Treasury obligations or other interest bearing obligations of federally insured financial institutions;

(d) The accounts of the State Treasurer shall be annually prepared for audit by a Certified Public Accountant immediately following the end of the State Society fiscal year and no later than May 15 and delivered to the CPA by that date;

(e) Should the State Treasurer be incapacitated, the Chairman of the Finance Committee is authorized, with the written approval of the State Regent, to serve as the Acting State Treasurer until such time as the State Treasurer is able to resume her duties or a new State Treasurer is appointed and ratified as stated in Article V, Section 5 (a).

Section 5. The expenses incurred by the State Regent in the performance of duty shall be paid each year from the State Dues Fund:

(a) Four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00) shall be taken each year to defray her necessary travel expenses;

(b) Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent, as budgeted, shall be paid by the State Treasurer who shall keep all receipts of these expenses. No expenses exceeding the budgeted amount shall be paid by the State Treasurer.

Section 6. At the close of the books annually, \$3,000.00 shall be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies Fund" so that at the end of each administration a total of \$6,000.00 will be reserved. This money is to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration.

Article XI COMMITTEES

Section 1. The State Regent shall appoint the following standing committees:

(a) Bylaws: An Honorary State Regent shall be appointed as chairman and the committee shall be composed of two (2) other Honorary State Regents and one (1) member from each district;

(b) Finance: This committee shall be composed of seven (7) members to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two (2) Honorary State Regents, one (1) active chapter regent and one (1) active chapter member. One of the two Honorary State Regents shall be appointed chairman. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund. This committee shall have charge of all investments of the Georgia State Society funds and the placing of insurance of all kinds with accredited companies;

(c) Resolutions: This committee shall be composed of all Honorary State Regents, the State Parliamentarian and three (3) chapter members;

(d) Proceedings: This committee shall be composed of the State Recording Secretary, the immediate past State Recording Secretary, State First Vice Regent and four (4) additional Daughters, at least one of whom shall be an Honorary State Regent.

Section 2. The State Regent shall appoint such other committees, standing or special, as the State Conference shall authorize and actions of the State Board of Management and of the National Society shall require. The appointments shall be concurrent with the term of the State Regent making the appointments and shall terminate with the end of the administration.

Section 3. No additional appointments to any of the committees shall be made after the roster of chairmen and committees has been compiled and sent to the chapters. Vacancies shall be filled by the State Regent with timely notification to the membership.

Section 4. The duties of committees shall be such as these Bylaws, the State Conference, the State Board of Management or the National Society shall prescribe.

Section 5. All chairmen will keep a Procedure Book of instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

ARTICLE XII CHAPTERS

Section 1. To expedite the work of the Society, the chapters of the Georgia State Society shall be placed in geographical districts:

(a) A chairman appointed by the State Regent shall coordinate the work of all chapters as needed; she shall be titled "Coordinator of Districts";

(b) Each district shall have a Director appointed by the State Regent to work as a committee under the direction and supervision of the Coordinator of Districts and the State Regent.

Section 2. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April in the year of chapter elections. The Chapter Regent shall report annually the names of the elected officers promptly on the form provided by the State Regent for this purpose, with copies to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, and the State Recording Secretary.

Section 3. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent, the State Recording Secretary, and the District Director by February 1.

Article XIII MEADOW GARDEN

Meadow Garden, property owned by the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, shall be operated as follows:

(a) The governing body shall be the Board of Trustees composed of the following members: the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Chairman who shall be appointed by the State Regent;

(b) The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the following members: the State Regent who shall serve as Chairman; the State First Vice Regent who shall serve as Secretary; the Chairman of Meadow Garden; the Regents of the Augusta and College Hill Chapters and the chairmen of the five (5) subcommittees appointed by the State Regent; Docents, Furnishings, Landscaping, Museum Shop, Patrons;

(c) The Meadow Garden Board shall operate with Standing Rules approved by the State Conference.

Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. The current edition of "Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised," shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law in matters not covered by these Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

Article XV AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent, the State Parliamentarian, and the State Bylaws Chairman. The State Regent shall send a copy to each chapter, at least sixty (60) days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the Call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21.) No Conference was held in 1911; the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P.W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912"; amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, p. 211.)

This does not alter the requirement in the "Items of Information" in the Proceedings that all reports shall be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary on or before February 15, the ORIGINAL being sent to the Secretary for the Proceedings.

AND FURTHER RESOLVED: This policy will be strictly adhered to and the material not received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1 will be omitted from the Proceedings.

All reports for awards are based on membership confirmed by the National Society as of January 1 of preceding year (1996). SEE FIGURE BESIDE CHAPTER NAME IN CHAPTER REGENTS' DIRECTORY.

BYLAWS

Chapter Bylaws **MUST NOT** conflict with the National and State Bylaws.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS

Notice of change of address of members shall be sent to the Organizing Secretary General, Treasurer General, State Regent and State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHANGE OF NAME

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to State Registrar, Treasurer General and State Regent by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHAPTER ELECTIONS

As soon as Chapter elections are held, names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, Administration Building, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D.C., 20006-5392, to the State Regent or State Regent-Elect and to the Recording Secretary by May 1. The full Christian name of Chapter officers shall be given together with her husband's given name or initials, address, zip code and telephone number. A Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years. This being added in order for our Bylaws to conform to the National Bylaws.

CHAPTER REPRESENTATION AT STATE AND NATIONAL MEETINGS

At the State Board of Management, a chapter is represented by the Chapter Regent, or in her absence by the First Vice Regent, and one non-voting member.

The voting representation of each chapter at the State Conference shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received by the State Treasurer **by January 1**. Membership less than 50: Regent, 1 Delegate, 4 Alternates, total votes 2; 50-199: Regent, 2 Delegates, 6 Alternates, total votes 3; 200-299: Regent, 3 Delegates, 8 Alternates, total Votes 4; 300-399: Regent, 4 Delegates, 10 Alternates, total votes 5.

The voting representation of each chapter at Continental Congress shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received in the Office of the Treasurer General **by January 1**. Membership less than 50: Regent, 0 Delegate, 2 Alternates, total votes 1; 50-199: Regent, 1 Delegate, 4 Alternates, total votes 2; 200-299: Regent, 2 Delegates, 6 Alternates, total votes 3; 300-399: Regent, 3 Delegates, 8 Alternates, total votes 4.

CONFERENCE REGISTRATION FEE

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer with the State dues on or before December 1, \$5.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

This fee to be paid whether represented or not.

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$5.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$3.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration.

CONTRIBUTIONS

ALL contributions by Chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

DATE FOR ANNUAL AUDIT

WHEREAS, every effort must be made to have all material to the printer as early as possible to facilitate delivery of the Proceedings to the members.

RESOLVED: That the end of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, fiscal year for audit purposes be changed from May 31 to April 30.

DECEASED MEMBERS

Deaths shall be reported promptly to Treasurer General, State Chaplain and State Registrar by the Corresponding Chapter Officer. Complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and a date of death shall be furnished State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for Conference Memorial Service pages for State Proceedings.

DUES

Pay to State Treasurer State Dues of \$5.00 per member before December 1. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the December through April Board meetings of the National Society. National Dues of \$25.00 per member sent to the Treasurer-General, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20006-5392, before December 1, 1996.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS

To insure uniformity and convenience in binding, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, 8 1/2 x 11 inches, with 1 1/2 to 2 inch margin on left side, 1 1/2 inches at top and 1 inch on right side and at bottom. Four copies shall be sent to State Chairman of Genealogical Records. The booklet "Instructions for Copying Source Records and Their Preparation for Library Use" should be obtained from the office of the Corresponding Secretary General (currently \$1.00) with check made payable to the Treasurer General, NSDAR. This booklet gives the procedure for copying source records.

GEORGIA HOSPITALITY FUND

The following resolution which applies to the Georgia Hospitality Fund appears in the Proceedings for 1955:

"WHEREAS, The Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds a social event in Washington during Continental Congress which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society.

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$400.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes:

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this fund shall not be cumulative." Adopted.

NEW ADMINISTRATION FOR CONTINGENCIES FUND

For the entire resolution setting up the "General New Regime Fund Balance of \$2,500.00," found on pgs. 203-204 of the 1979 Proceedings the following substitute resolution was adopted by the 88th State Conference: RESOLVED that at the end of each administration \$6,000.00 be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies" fund, this money to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration, and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration. All other surplus monies in the General Fund, other than funds which are designated, are to be divided equally between the General Savings Account and the "Georgia State Society Endowment Fund," "DAR School" Resolutions 1991 page 62 of the 1992 Proceedings. This transaction is to be handled by April 30 every two years before the auditors close out the books of an administration, thus making the General Fund show the same balance of \$6,000.00 at the beginning of each new administration. (This fund is to be known as "New Administration Reserve for Contingencies Fund.") Adopted.

Numerals shall be used throughout the report with the exception of the beginning of a sentence.

Georgia State Society Children of the American Revolution 1995 - 1996

The Georgia State Society began the new century of service of the National Society when the State President, Claire Irene Richardson, was installed at the C.A.R. National Convention in April 1995 at Constitution Hall in Washington, D.C. The state theme, "Experiencing the Past to Insure the Future," was chosen; and the State President's Projects: increasing membership and raising \$300 to fund the Cobb Youth Museum, were selected. Tee shirts were designed and printed to encourage members to work for the state society during the 1995-1996 year.

The state workshop, hosted by the Abraham Musick Society, Allen Howard Society and Sons and Daughters of Liberty Society, was held in Pine Log at a historical Methodist Church campground. Approximately 40 members, guests and seniors registered for the event. Presentations were made by officers and chairmen to encourage participation in the state and national contests. Eleven members and seniors, including the State and Senior State Presidents, attended the Southeastern Regional meeting at Raleigh, North Carolina, where members of the society served on the program. State President, Claire Richardson, represented the state society and reported; and Jeff Johnson, Honorary State President, served as Regional Recording Secretary.

Officers of the society accompanied the Senior State President as they attended all meetings on the DAR Workshop Tour. These officers presented the Children of the American Revolution program. Members and seniors also collected over \$200 in donations and sales during the tour. The C.A.R. was represented at the DAR-SAR Constitution Day Luncheon in September when the State President and Rena Morgan, Honorary Senior State President, brought greetings. Four members served as Flag Bearers and four seniors were guests. The President's trip to the Cobb Youth Museum also took place in September. Members gathered at the museum to enjoy a historic program and take part in reenactments. The state society contributed \$400 for this state project.

The annual Government Studies Seminar was hosted by the Cherokee Rose Society and was held at the Peachtree Presbyterian Church in Atlanta. The State Society studied the Three Branches of Government and participated in a song contest about these branches.

The C.A.R. Fifty-Seventh Annual State Conference was hosted by the Allen Howard and Lucy Spell Raiford Societies and was held in Atlanta at the Northwest Atlanta Hilton on February 23, 24, 1996. Among the 79 in attendance at this conference was the National Chaplain, David Campaigne, who was elected National President for 1996-1997. The conference began with the candidates evening, held on Friday night when all candidates for state office campaigned and was followed by the state and senior state boards of management meetings. The business session was held on Saturday morning when reports of all officers, chairmen, and society presidents were given. Voting followed the business meeting. A luncheon held on Saturday gave the distinguished DAR, SAR, and C.A.R. an opportunity to greet the Society. At the awards banquet on Saturday night, Spence Cooksey was named the Most Outstanding Member; Mary Elizabeth Jackson was named the Most Outstanding Senior, and the Allen Howard Society was named the Most Outstanding Society.

At the DAR State Conference in March, the Senior State President brought greetings from the Georgia State Society C.A.R., at the opening meeting and gave the Children of the American Revolution report at the first business session. On Regents' Night, the Senior State President presented three DAR Debutantes during a beautiful debutante ceremony. These debutantes from C.A.R. were escorted by their father, grandfather or uncle, and were presented to the State Regent to be invited to join DAR. Debutantes were Tara Louise Barker, Button Gwinnett Society; Heather Anne Hardigree, Sukey Hart Society; and Laura Ford Turbyfill, The Glass Brothers Society.

At the SAR State Conference in April, the State C.A.R. Society was represented by Jeff Johnson, Honorary State President, and Mrs. Ernestine B. Johnson, Senior State President. Jeff brought greetings from the state society.

Sixteen members, seniors, and guests from Georgia attended the 101st National Conference in Alexandria, Virginia. At this conference, Claire Richardson served as the state's representative and reported, and Andy Stencil served as the Georgia Flag

Bearer. Georgia had five delegates eligible to vote in the national election. During the awards banquet, the Sons and Daughters of Liberty Society received the Gold Merit Award Banner. On Sunday morning, in an impressive ceremony held at Mt. Vernon, the home of George Washington, Emily Stancil was installed as the 1996-1997 Georgia State President, the Promise of the Future, as Claire Richardson became an Honorary State President, the Pride of the Past.
