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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

The Members and Officers

Georgia State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution

We have audited the accompanying combined financial statements - cash basis of the Georgia State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, and its individual fund financial statements as of and for the year ended April 30, 1997. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Society's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. Also, in our opinion, the individual fund financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the individual funds of the Georgia State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution at April 30, 1997 and the results of their operation for the year then ended.

The accompanying financial information listed as supporting schedules in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the combined and individual fund financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of Business

The Georgia State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution is a non-profit organization whose primary purpose is to further educational programs related to the history of the United States.

Fund Accounting

To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the resources available to the Society, the accounts of the Society are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and the reporting purposes into funds established according to their nature and purposes.

The Society considers all contributions available for unrestricted use, unless specifically restricted by the donor.

Cash Basis

The financial statements of the Society have been prepared on the cash basis which recognizes income and expenses when received or paid rather than when earned or incurred. Management has not determined the nature and amounts of non-cash assets and liabilities.

Plant, Property and Equipment

Meadow Garden and its contents are historical treasures, and therefore are not subject to depreciation. The house and its contents are insured for \$83,000 and \$240,750, respectively. Office furniture and fixtures are insured for \$8,000.

Any major preservation or restoration project, however, is capitalized and depreciated over its estimated useful life. These improvements, which are being depreciated over fifteen years, are summarized as follows:

At the time the Meadow Garden property was contributed by the National Society to the Georgia State Society, its fair market value was deemed to be immaterial.

Costs of office equipment are consistently charged to expense because the Society does not deem such amounts to be sufficiently material to warrant capitalization and depreciation.

Tax Status

The Society has been granted tax exempt status under Code Section 501(c)(3) of the U.S. Internal Revenue Code.

National Committee Reports

AMERICAN HERITAGE - Mrs. Wade E. Brown

Ninety-seven chapters reported with 50 chapters reporting programs on American Heritage. Participation in National contests was as follows: College Hill, Mary Hammond Washington, Fort Frederica, Henry Walton, John Ball and Martha Stewart Bulloch reported entries in the National Arts contest; Fort Frederica and Henry Walton chapters reported entries in the National Crafts Contest; John Benson, Colonel John McIntosh, Fort Frederica, Brunswick, and Baron DeKalb reported entries in the National Music Contest; Baron DeKalb, Cherokee, Fort Frederica, and Henry Walton reported entries in the National Literature and Drama Contest. Commodore Richard Dale Chapter participated in the lap robes for veterans project. State Awards included the following: Best American Heritage Program - Cherokee Chapter for their program on the George Washington campaign button; Most Entries in a National Contest - Fort Frederica Chapter.

AMERICAN HISTORY - Mrs. Sterling P. Jones

Work by the American History Committee was reported by 99 chapters with 206 American History programs presented to chapters and 45 to other groups. Mayors from 35 cities signed Proclamations, 60 posters were displayed and 25 radio stations carried DAR History spot announcements. Essays on "Trails West" came from 221 schools with 6,779 entries. Daughters gave 2,580 certificates, 164 bronze medals, and 50 silver medals for success in the study of American History, as well as 116 certificates given for outstanding work in American History. The 4 Georgia essay winners were: 5th grade-Smith Mathews, Archibald Bulloch Chapter; 6th grade-Patrick Warren, Metter Chapter; 7th grade-Bess Wyche, Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter; 8th grade-Minnie Quartey, General James Jackson Chapter. The Christopher Columbus Essay reports came from 8 schools with 206 students entering the new contest. Marie Moser was the State winner, General James Jackson Chapter. A very special thanks to the 4 District Vice Chairmen: N.E., Mrs. Perry Haymore; N.W., Mrs. Richard Massie; S.E., Mrs. Harriet Claxton; S.W., Mrs. Ernestine Johnson. It has been an honor and a pleasure serving as chairman of this committee.

AMERICAN INDIANS - Mrs. Fred K. Nuss

Of 99 Georgia chapters reporting, 25 chapters donated 8,744 food labels to Indian schools. Tomochichi and Council of Safety Chapters each donated 1,050 and 1,052 labels. Chapters contributed \$281 to American Indian Scholarship Fund, \$428 to Bacone College, \$261 to Chemawa Indian High School, \$316 to Indian Youth of America, Inc. Camp Scholarship Program, and \$5.00 to the Old Indian Meeting House for a total of \$1,291. Button Gwinnett Chapter donated \$300 to Indian Heritage Center, Ft. Mitchell, AL. Total of 1,521 pounds of clothing sent to the Indian schools as well as toiletries and books. Button Gwinnett and Oglethorpe Chapters participated in Southeast Indian Festival. Excellent programs given by 26 chapters. Five chapters had programs on Bacone and Chemawa presented by State Chairmen. Twelve chapter programs concerned Georgia Native Americans. Many presenters used charts, artifacts, weapons, and costumes in their programs. Chapter and state chairmen, officers, regents attended various Indian programs presented at luncheon meetings. One chapter took trip to Ocmulgee National Monument, Macon. This chairman participated in Summer Workshops, Fall Board, prepared a slide program on Indian schools and presented it to 2 chapters, attended teas, 3 luncheon meetings, and 2 Indian Festivals. AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP

Ninety-nine chapters reported to this chairman. There were 2,375 Manuals for Citizenship distributed to libraries, schools, and immigrants studying for citizenship.

Five chapters participated in the Naturalization Court. Fort Frederica Chapter member, Mrs. Hubert Lang, was recognized by the Judge for her 25 years of participation in the Naturalization Ceremony. Three chapters gave flags and furnished refreshments for the new citizens. One chapter had a program presented by a naturalized citizen. John Laurens Chapter presented the Americanism Medal to Mrs. Gertrude Klopfer Lord. The DAR Medal of Honor was presented to Mrs. Charlotte Clonts by the Captain Edward Hagin Chapter.

CHAPTER ACHIEVEMENT AWARD COMMITTEE

There has been a bit of confusion in getting the reports, apparently caused by the name change of the committee. Next year will be better, however, only five chapters have not sent reports. We will not have a report on standings until after Continental Congress, but it appears that Georgia will have 37 chapters at Level 3, 52 at Level 2, and 9 at Level 1 or under with over 92 percent receiving recognition. There has been contact with every chapter. This chairman wants to thank the chapter regents, treasurers, and committee chairmen for their cooperation, and especially our State Regent for this privilege.

CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Mrs. Inman D. Jackson, Jr.

Ninety-eight DAR chapters reported for this committee. Eleven chapters provide Senior leadership for the Georgia State Society, Children of the American Revolution. General Daniel Newnan and Tallassee chapters are organizing C.A.R. Societies. In the state of Georgia, 87 DAR members were C.A.R. members, most of these joined DAR directly from C.A.R. The Georgia State Society, Children of the American Revolution, has nine societies active on the state level. The State Project, raising funds for the renovation of the Media Center at Tamassee Elementary School, greatly exceeded its goal of \$500.00. Voices on the "Reaching for the Stars" quilt raised \$644.00, society donations and fund raising activities added \$165.00 and at State Conference, Mr. Inman D. Jackson, Jr., announced that he would contribute the amount needed to make \$1,000.00. Jimmy Harvey of Sons and Daughters of Liberty Society was named Most Outstanding Member; Mrs. Virginia Johnson of the Allen Howard Society was named the Most Outstanding Senior; and The Glass Brothers was named the Most Outstanding Society.

COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARDS - Mrs. Douglas L. Moody

A total of 28 awards were presented this year. Community service activities recognized included: founding a newspaper which focuses good things; opening a museum; cleaning a World War I statue; providing transportation for the elderly; contributing to Veterans-Affairs projects; dedication to local Red Cross Chapter and the Red Cross Disaster Team; founding the "Mothers' Discussion Group"; serving as chairman for a Nurse Recruitment Scholarship Committee; organizing a Seniors Center; organizing the Seniors Enriched Living Program; service to a local historical society; and for time and dedication directed toward the location and preservation of cemeteries.

CONSERVATION - Mrs. L. E. Stevens

Ninety-six chapters reported, 48 chapters educated members regarding tissue and organ donations. Tallassee Chapter won the best program on Conservation award of \$10.00. Their chapter's speaker, the recipient of a heart, spoke of his experiences and urged members to sign Donor Cards, explaining that skin could be donated by anyone regardless of age. He is age 60. One chapter reported a member who has received a cornea transplant. 61 Chapters urged installation of smoke and carbon monoxide detectors, 11 Chapters Adopted-a-Highway, 2 Chapters, Cherokee and Martha Stewart Bulloch, received special recognition for presenting Conservation Medals and Certificates, 24 Chapters put up bird houses, 15,179 pounds of bird seed were purchased by chapter members and fed to birds. Fort Peachtree Chapter reported that

41,527 trees were planted winning the \$10.00 award for most trees planted. Together all chapters totaled 76,257 trees planted. Excellent reports from 105 Georgia chapters.

Georgia Daughters did well and worked hard in 1997 reporting period for Constitution Week Celebrations. Reporting Chapters totaled 99 out of 105. Displays at Libraries 69, Banks 27, Stores 38, Schools 106, Other 41, for total of 3,527 square feet. Proclamations totaled 111. Chapters participating in "Bells Across America" and Constitution Sidelights at all meetings were 31. These will be listed with Chapter awards for 1997. She attended state conference, many chapter meetings, the state regent's visit, all district workshops, SAR, and a reception was held for her at Fall Board. LINEAGE RESEARCH - Mrs. Emmett T. Bragg

Reports were received from 100 chapters; of these 100, 9 indicated "no report." Of the 91 chapters reporting activity, 515 prospective members were assisted by the chapters, with 200 members approved for membership. Assistance was requested from the National Lineage Committee by 10 chapters. Twelve chapters sponsored public genealogical workshops, with a total of 169 persons attending. Vice-Chairmen serving on the Lineage Research Committee have rendered assistance when requested; they were Mrs. John Singleton, N.E.; Mrs. J. E. Preston, Jr., N.W.; Mrs. Thomas Stafford, S.E.; and Mrs. W. H. Askew III, S.W. Thank you, Madam State Regent, for the opportunity to serve as Chairman for this committee.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE - Laura M. Reid

Reports were received from 99 chapters with 72 chapters reporting a total gain of 246 new members. We also welcomed 34 reinstatements and 24 transfers from other states, for a total gain in membership of 304. Regretfully this Chairman reports a lost

of 390 members: 21 transferred out of state; 125 were loss by death; 58 were dropped by the National Society for non-payment of dues; and, our greatest loss was 186 by resignation. The Georgia State Society's total membership as of February 1, 1996, was 7,032. As of February 1, 1997, our state membership stands at 6,946. We received 46 referrals from the National Society, and these were shared with 166 chapter contacts for followup. This Chairman's awards for the largest percentage increase in membership go to Sunbury Chapter for membership under 50; to Augustin Clayton Chapter for membership of 50 to 100; and, to Fielding Lewis Chapter for membership over 100.

MOTION PICTURE, RADIO and TELEVISION - Mrs. Edward E. Lusk

The 1-1/2 inches allotted to this chairmanship on the consolidated report form was of no interest to 64 chapters who wrote "No Report." But to the chapters who did report some activity in the area of this committee, this chairman expresses her thanks and enjoyment in reading their reports. Georgia Chapters wrote 70 letters of praise or criticism to media, TV networks and radio stations. Two chapters reported giving awards. Nine chapters sent in nominations for the National award given at Continental Congress. Madam State Regent, it has been my joy to serve as chairman of this committee.

NATIONAL DEFENSE - Mrs. William E. Shubert

Annual reports were received from 101 chapters, with 93 chapters having the required 3 minutes of National Defense. Eighty-five provided extra material at meetings, 27 sent materials to local schools and 39 gave materials to libraries. One hundred and seventy-three Good Citizenship medals, 124 bronze, and 27 gold ROTC medals were presented by 74 chapters. A total of \$102 was given by 42 chapters to the ROTC Program and \$44 to Dollars for Defense by 6 chapters. Programs at chapter meetings included Veteran's Day recognitions/celebrations; speakers on Court Systems, the Balanced Budget Deliberations, and discussions of Resolutions from Continental Congress. This chairman thanks particularly those chapters donating ROTC medals to schools in the Atlanta area. It is an honor to serve the State and the National Society as a part of this administration.

PROGRAM - Mrs. James A. Harvey, Jr.

Eighty-five excellent yearbooks/supplements were reported as being prepared and sent to the State Regent, while 75 were mailed to this chairman. Twenty-one chapters reported using a total of 45 programs from the national program office and 20 reported using state owned programs. Correspondent Docents presented 23 programs. The DAR Speaker's Staff representatives provided 30 programs. Eight chapters submitted entries in the BEST PROGRAM contest. The state may have one winner in each category. Our entries fell into two categories only. The winners were in Patriotic Education: "The History of Nursing and the DAR," submitted by Fort Frederica Chapter, and Youth and Adult Education: "The First Declaration of Independence," submitted by the Lyman Hall Chapter. These entries represented the state in the Southeastern Division competition and Fort Frederica Chapter's entry was a division level winner. Certificates of Appreciation went to the following chapters: Colonel John McIntosh, General Daniel Newnan, Nancy Hart, Robert Loughridge, and Sunbury. The outstanding quality of the programs presented was greatly appreciated.

PUBLIC RELATIONS - Mrs. Alex S. Boyer, Jr.

Reports from 99 chapters show 1,095 newspaper articles, 494 photos, 710 spots, 27 radio programs, 18 TV programs, 157 window displays with 169 community events in which chapters participated. Chapters utilized all media to keep communities aware of DAR projects. One chapter has one-half page of print and photos after each meeting; several chapters had series of feature stories focusing on individual members' involvement in all community affairs. Many participate in volunteer programs at schools, libraries, hospitals, local drives, hosted Olympic participants and families. One chapter had flag-burning ceremony during city festival attended by estimated

5,000. All special DAR anniversaries and sponsored events were celebrated; award ceremonies were publicized. The State Regent honored me in asking that I serve in this, my chosen field.

SEIMES MICROFILM - Mrs. Alton Bruce

Chapter contributions to the Seimes Microfilm Center totaled \$275, plus Life Memberships totaling \$200. Chapters are encouraged to continue to support the Seimes Microfilm Center.

VOLUNTEER COMMUNITY SERVICE - Mrs. Davis King

Reports were received from 39 chapters with many hours of volunteer service given. Chapter members donated many hours to museums, libraries, hospitals, nursing homes, community centers, schools, and to other community activities which included Habitat for Humanity, Meals on Wheels, Soup Kitchens, Boy and Girl Scouts and others. Volunteer hours from the Consolidated Report Form totaled 36,407 hours. Congratulations to each of you for your service in your communities. This chairman expresses appreciation to Mrs. Fred A. Miller, Jr., State Regent, for the opportunity to serve the State Society in this worthwhile committee.

VOLUNTEER INFORMATION SPECIALISTS - Mindy Tidmore Kammeyer

This VIS Committee Chairman received a reply from seven chapters of her summer packet questionnaire. John Laurens Chapter and Elijah Clarke Chapter seem to be the most active on computers. Nationally, there are over 500 Daughters on four online services available to help! Many State Societies now have their own Home Page. The VIS Committee is an ever changing and exciting committee. It has been a pleasure to serve the GA State Society as Chairman.

Special National Committee Reports

COMMEMORATIVE EVENTS - Mrs. Alvin V. Palmer

Reports were received from 98 of our chapters, with 54 of them reporting Commemorative Events as diverse as the members themselves. Members have worked with local Historic Societies, SAR, Huguenot Society, township parades, laid wreaths at Memorial Services, assisted in dedication of historic marker, and presented national and state flags and flag booklets. We in Georgia had the rare opportunity to host the Centennial Olympics, and 14 chapters reported participation in Olympic events. Members hosted athletes in their homes, served as volunteers in visitor centers, churches, athletic events, and tours of historic homes and museums. One member translated the John Wesley prayer into French, Japanese, Russian, Italian, and German, and provided these translations with meals served to visitors by her church. The most unusual report was from Archibald Bulloch Chapter, which wrote about DAR for a Time Capsule that will be opened in 100 years. Madam Regent, this Chairman appreciates the opportunity to serve under your capable leadership.

FRIENDS OF THE LIBRARY - Mrs. H. Randolph Holder

The Friends of the Library Committee's purpose is to provide the NSDAR Library with funds to computerize the Library's card catalog, cataloging and acquisition procedures. This committee was established as a Special National Committee in June 1986 by the NSDAR's National Board of Management. My appreciation to the Georgia Chapters for promoting the "Friends of the Library" special project. Total amount reported by 20 chapters, \$2,175. were received for Mary Ida Holman, Madge T. Tate, Mrs. Flew Murphey and Clementi Holder, as well as Centennial Contributions totaling \$1,600, along with other contributions. Thank you, Madam State Regent, for the privilege of serving the Georgia State Society as Chairman of the Friends of the Library Committee.

INSIGNIA - Mrs. Raiferd L. Drew

Ninety-seven chapters reported that 16 had a program on Insignia, 47 own a DAR banner, 80 own a Chapter Regent's pin, 60 present an Ex-Chapter Regent's pin to the outgoing Regent. Georgia Daughters purchased pins and Insignia in the amount of \$23,660.00; however, Caldwell at this time does not keep a record by states of purchases made at Continental Congress. The amount could be even higher. This represents a considerable investment. Your chairman urges owners to keep a written record of all DAR jewelry with, perhaps, a photo copy of ribbons and pins and their cost in case of loss or theft.

LITERACY CHALLENGE - Mrs. Hugh Howell, Jr.

Thank you for working to make us better. This way – in our way – or one way to make a lasting difference. Literacy for all people is a lofty goal, and our chapters know that. Ninety-eight chapters reported work on this committee. Fifty-two were organizing a program or were unable at this time to do anything. Forty-six chapters worked diligently and creatively. Many hours of volunteer service were given by Georgia Daughters helping correct our greatest problems for failure. English as a second language took many hours, At Risk students, migrant workers were helped to understand paychecks and doctors. Books, monies, and assistance as mentors were given to word literacy problems, teaching reading, comprehension of materials and writing skills. Programs were given in Chapters, hospitals, schools, churches and technical schools and some manufacturing plants where in-house programs existed. The literacy challenge message was promoted at all four workshops and at Fall Board. For the privilege of continuing service to the State Society, this chairman extends her heartfelt thanks, Madam State Regent.

MEMBERSHIP PROMOTION WORKSHOP - Mrs. Robert B. Vance, Sr.

Registrar General's Forum at State Conference, 150 + or – in attendance. Five Membership Promotion workshops have been held. Those in attendance were encouraged to assist and encourage prospective members with application papers and have local workshops. The State was divided into 4 Districts with Vice Chairmen in charge of setting up workshops. Locations: Southwest - Albany; Southeast - Jesup; Northeast - Atlanta; Northwest - Hartwell. Thirty chapters and one SAR chapter were represented for a total of 77. All chapters were contacted and most chapters have one or more Membership Promotion Manuals. How many new members were gained by assisting prospective members is unknown, but this chairman has had 10 approved this year. A called meeting of the Finance Committee was held on August 6, 1996 in Tifton to discuss the budget for the upcoming year. The chairman called the meeting to order and asked Mrs. Fox to open with prayer. Members were welcomed with special welcome to the State Regent and Mrs. Ward, Proceedings Chairman. At the request of the State Regent, Mrs. Muldrow explained an expense of not more than \$1,000.00 to repair leakage on the breezeway between the school and the auditorium/gymnasium at Tamassee. Among the cuts suggested and adopted were bulk mailing the Proceedings; clubs to pay total cost per page; cutting down on the second year edition and negotiating with the printer. Mrs. Ward will obtain estimates and let us know the results by mid-September. The Budget for 1996-97 will be based on 6,900 members with cuts made in State Conference Expenses and the Meadow Garden Gatehouse Fund. There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

A meeting was held at the White Columns Inn, Covington, on October 17, 1996 at 4:00 p.m. with the chairman presiding. Those present included Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox, Mrs. Billy W. Hunter, Mrs. Gordon Ragan, and Mrs. Fred A. Miller, Jr. Mrs. Fox made the motion to adopt the proposed 1996-97 budget. Motion seconded and adopted.

Tourism at Meadow Garden continues to increase each year. We had a 21.4% increase over 1995. Since 1991 we have had a 268.5% increase. 1,645 children toured in 1996 compared to only 519 in 1991. The number has more than tripled thanks to those of you who have spread the word. Chapter chairmen are encouraged to continue to support Meadow Garden. Gloria Clark, our Tour Director, is always available to help with suggestions on publicity. Meadow Garden was featured in several local area newspapers for our Christmas Open House as well as on four local T.V. stations. *The Augusta Chronicle* ran a 4th of July feature and several T.V. stations featured us on the news reports. The bell was rung 13 times at 10:00 a.m. Tourism was brisk. The annual Public State Radio Canal Cruise was held and the grounds were used for the barbecue. North Augusta and Augusta Parks and Recreation held a Bike Ride and the grounds were used for entertainment and dinner. We also participated in the 2nd annual Canal Discovery Day in September sponsored by Walton Rehab Hospital. Hours were extended for the Summer Olympics. 41 states and 12 countries were represented in our tourists this year.

MEADOW GARDEN LANDSCAPING - Mrs. John R. Henry

The Survey of Meadow Garden has been completed and the corrected Plat has been registered with Richmond County. Garden slides have been updated to show garden improvements. A Tallow tree has been donated by Walter Cox, and dead and unsightly trees have been removed. Daffodil, daylily, and iris gardens bloomed and a "Shade Garden" is being planted beneath the "Viewing Porch." This is a late blooming garden of English Hyacinth bulbs donated by Shelby Whitson. Our 1700's Medicinal Herb garden is taking shape with such plantings as Penny Royal, Tansy, Fever Few, Foxglove, Lamb's Ear, Hydrangea, Thyme, etc. Four large pots are placed in the garden, with two containing Sweet Bay which will be trained as Topiaries. Experimentation continues as to which plants will grow. A list of 1700-1800 vegetables and a list of Medicinal Herbs, and their uses, continues to be compiled. A written program for a Garden Tour is being prepared. "Meadow Garden" oregano, lemon balm, and garlic chives in small clay pots will be sold in the Museum Shop. It is a pleasure to serve in this capacity and with this Meadow Garden Board.

MEADOW GARDEN MUSEUM SHOP - Miss Jan R. Wren

Museum Shop sales have decreased slightly over 1996 with sales totalling \$958.65 down from \$1,038.55 in 1995. Visitors representing 41 states and 12 foreign countries registered; 12 books about the life of Madame Levert were sold and 6 copies of "The History of the Georgia State Society, DAR" were sold. A motion was made by Mrs. Henry that Octavia LeVert's picture be framed to match George Walton's picture in the Augusta Room. Seconded and adopted. Mrs. Miller appointed Mrs. Ward to have this done with the approval of Mrs. Victor, Furnishings Chairman. Mrs. Ward has permission to take George Walton's picture to the framer so it can be duplicated. Mrs. Henry, Landscaping Chairman, reported she has begun the planting of the 1700's Medicinal Herb

garden. She is preparing a "hand out" information sheet on Medicinal Herbs. She also reported the Iris bed has been expanded and a kitchen garden has been planted with appropriate vegetables. Mrs. Ward made a motion that the frame at the S.W. corner of the Meadow Garden property be moved to enclose the 12' x 59' section outside the fence and contact Harbin and Associates to survey the property with this addition at a cost not to exceed \$200.00. No response has been received from AmeriSuites concerning the coupon. Plumbing under the house is leaking and will be repaired. A platform built under the house to store the lawnmower will correct the problem. Obtaining postcards of Augusta scenes is being looked into and the Convention Bureau would like to sell our Meadow Garden cards. New locks were purchased for the gates. The answering machine is broken, and approval was given to purchase a new one, cost not to exceed \$60. Supply of the GEORGE WALTON brochures is low. Motion was made by Mrs. Henry to order 5,000 GEORGE WALTON brochures. Seconded. Adopted. Mrs. Cagle recommended that the Board consider a wage increase for Mrs. James Clark, Museum/House Manager, including a one-week paid vacation. Motion was made by Mrs. Murphey to increase Mrs. Clark's hourly wage to \$6.50 per hour plus one week's paid vacation a year, beginning November, 1996, and for the remainder of the term of the current Administration. Seconded. Adopted. Guidelines are needed for future raises. Ad in Love Atlanta will not be renewed. Ben Dietz, who repaired the bottom part of the railing on the porch, will submit an estimate to repair the top railing. Mrs. Ward, Docents Chairman, reported that twelve members from four chapters attended the training sessions on October 3 and 5. From this group seven new docents have volunteered their time, including one that was unable to attend the sessions. Mrs.

Victor, Furnishings Chairman, has confirmed that Madam LaVert's portrait is painted in oil on canvas, and no mat will be needed when it is framed. The Curator of the Morris Museum in Augusta will be consulted about the cleaning of the portrait and the type of frame needed. Mrs. John R. Henry, Landscaping Chairman, reported that the survey of the property has been completed, with the right front corner marker corrected. The plat will be recorded when received and the fence relocated. With a generous monetary gift from Mrs. Shelby Whitson, additional daffodil bulbs for the front garden have been ordered, also blue and white English wood hyacinths to make a garden below the viewing porch. Assistance will be needed on December 5 and 6 to decorate for the Open House, and docents will be needed on December 7 for the Open House. Cagle, Jr., Mrs. O. Lee Gentry, Mrs. John R. Henry, Mrs. Jules Victor, Jr., Miss Jan R. Wren, and ex-officio members, Mrs. Billy W. Hunter and Mrs. Gordon B. Ragan. Hearing no objections, Mrs. Hunter was appointed Secretary Pro Tem by the Presiding Officer. Minutes of the October 17, 1996 meeting were read and approved as corrected. Mrs. Beall read a letter from Mrs. James Clark, Museum/House Manager, thanking the Board for her salary increase. The Financial Statement was reviewed. Mrs. Ward moved that approval be given to the transfer made on July 31, 1996 of \$15,000 from Money Market Maintenance Account to a Certificate of Deposit at the Century Bank & Trust, Milledgeville, Ga., drawing 5.4% interest with a 12 month maturity. Seconded. Approved. Mrs. Cagle, Meadow Garden Museum Chairman, reported that tourism continues to grow, with a 21.4% increase over 1995. Since 1991 we have had a 268.5% increase, with 1,645 children visiting in 1996 compared to only 519 in 1991. Tourists from 41 states and 12 countries visited the Museum this year. The Christmas Open House received publicity in several local newspapers as well as four local television stations. The Museum also received publicity on July 4 from the newspapers and television stations. The annual Public State Radio Canal Cruise was held and the grounds were used for the barbecue. North Augusta and Augusta Parks and Recreation held a Bike Ride and the grounds were used for entertainment and dinner. The Museum also participated in the Second Annual Canal Discovery Day in September. Hours were extended for the Summer Olympics. A sign was installed to direct the traffic flow from Independence Drive because 13th Street will be closed for 6 months due to canal work. Maner Fence Company will submit an estimate for removal of the

fence on the Canal side of the property. An alternative to the barbed wire now on top of the fence (to keep people from climbing over the fence) is necessary because of possible liability. Call-waiting on the telephone is needed and approval was given to add this service. Approval was given to purchase a new light fixture and switch to replace the hanging light in the shop. Replacement pickets and repairs to the rail on the front porch were made at a cost of \$200. A 1/4 page advertisement in Classic South was purchased at a cost of \$312 for two years. Advertisement in the Real Yellow Pages was renewed. The yard flag rigging needs replacing and a 6x10 flag is needed. The status of Dave's jugs is still being investigated. Mrs. Ward, Docents Chairman, reported that 21 certificates of appreciation were presented to workers at the Museum. Furnishings Chairman, Mrs. Victor, reported that a fern stand had been located by Mrs. Henry. Motion was made by Mrs. Victor that a English hand-carved fern stand c.1850 be purchased at a cost of \$595 to be paid from the furnishings fund. Seconded. Adopted. Mrs. Henry, Landscaping Chairman, reported that the December 7 Christmas Open House was well-attended. Assistance was received from fourteen volunteers from College Hill Chapter, three from Augusta Chapter and one from John Franklin Wren Chapter. Crepe myrtle trees that were in the way of the fence re-location were removed. L & L Landscaping & Lawn Service submitted an estimate of \$150 to wash the windows inside and outside of the house, and an estimate of \$350 to pressure wash the exterior of the house and remove the mildew. Planting the Spring and Summer garden has begun with potatoes, cabbage, and garlic, and will continue as the weather warms. Miss Wren, Museum Shop Chairman, reported that sales decreased slightly this year. Christmas cards of Meadow Garden are now available, and many other new items have been added. Patrons Chairman, Mrs. Murphey, reported that 10 chapters and 20 individuals have become patrons during the past year. Mrs. Beall reported that there is no new information concerning the DAR Banner. Mrs. F. Harrison Miller, State Regent of the District of Columbia, will submit an appraisal to frame the portrait of Octavia LaVert. There being no further business the meeting adjourned at 3:10 p.m.

Standing Rules for Meadow Garden

I MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

1. The governing body of a museum, in this instance the Meadow Garden Board, serves the public interest as it relates to Meadow Garden, and must consider itself accountable to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, as well as to Meadow Garden; members should not attempt to act in their individual capacities, but all actions should be taken as a Board, Committee, or otherwise in conformance with the Standing Rules, the Act of Incorporation, or applicable Resolutions.
2. The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the three (3) Trustees as named in the Deed from the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, conveying Meadow Garden to the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution; namely, the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the State Chairman of Meadow Garden who is appointed by the State Regent; the Chapter Regents of the Augusta Chapter and the College Hill Chapter, both Chapters being located in Augusta, who shall serve as Vice Chairmen to the State Chairman of Meadow Garden; and five of the chairmen of Meadow Garden Committees, as appointed by the State Regent.
3. No Georgia Daughter shall serve in the same Meadow Garden Chairmanship more than two (2) consecutive terms.
4. Of the six (6) appointments made by the State Regent, at least two (2) shall be Honorary State Regents.
5. The State Second Vice Regent and Treasurer shall serve as ex-officio members of the Meadow Garden Board, being given the privilege of the floor without a vote.
6. The State Regent shall serve as Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board, and the State First Vice Regent shall serve as Secretary of the Meadow Garden Board.
7. The Meadow Garden Board shall meet a minimum of three (3) times each year; namely, preceding Fall Board of Management meeting, preceding annual State Conference and following Continental Congress, and at such other time as deemed necessary by the Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board. At least one (1) meeting of the Board shall be held at Meadow Garden each year.
8. The Meadow Garden Board shall have jurisdiction over the operation, maintenance and work of Meadow Garden and shall be the authority for Meadow Garden as long as such authority is not in conflict with the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, the Act of Incorporation for the Georgia State Society, Resolutions adopted by the Georgia State Society and/or directions which from time to time may be approved by action of the Georgia State Society assembled at its annual State Conference.
9. Five (5) voting members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.
10. Minutes shall be kept of each meeting and a copy shall be sent to each member and printed verbatim in the State Proceedings.
11. All expenses for maintenance, operation and purchases of furnishings and plantings shall be authorized by the State Regent, as Chairman of the Board, and paid by the State Treasurer. Expenditures exceeding \$1,000.00 must have the majority approval of the Board.

12. These rules will be binding on the actions of the Board in their operation of "Meadow Garden." They may be changed by the following procedure: Members of the Board must have written notification of proposed changes or additions one month prior to the next meeting of the Board; a two-thirds vote of the Board is necessary to effect a change or addition.

II OPERATIONS

1. Everyone entering Meadow Garden will be requested to sign the Register, including date, time of arrival and time of departure.
2. No more than fifteen (15) people with each Docent are to be on tour in the house at a given time. Excess of this number may wait in the reception room or in the garden. The Museum-House Manager/Docent has the authority to enforce the Meadow Garden rules at all times.
3. There will be no smoking in Meadow Garden.
4. No refreshments are to be served in Meadow Garden or taken into Meadow Garden. Should a group, such as a visiting chapter, desire refreshments, the garden is available for use if litter is properly disposed of by the serving group.
5. Tour visitors will be asked to pay a fee as set by the Board.
6. There will be only four (4) complete sets of keys to Meadow Garden and 4 keys to the gates of Meadow Garden. Keys to be returned after each administration. New locks may be required. Distribution of Keys: Gate Only: Landscaping Chairman, Augusta Police Department, Georgia Power, and Sizemore Security. Gate & House: Chairman of the Board, Meadow Garden Chairman, Museum House Manager, and Docents Chairman.

III VOLUNTEERS (DOCENTS)

1. Volunteers, docents, shall be members in good standing of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR.
2. Duties of volunteers shall include acting as guides, hostesses, working in museum shop, working in yard, cleaning in house, public relations. No volunteer work at or for Meadow Garden shall be done except under the direct guidance of the Meadow Garden Board and the chairman of the specific committee for that particular function.
3. Cleaning or yard work volunteers shall be under the direction of the House/Museum Manager.

IV FURNISHINGS

1. Items bought or accepted for the older section of Meadow Garden must pre-date 1821.
2. Furnishings for the two (2) main floor rooms and two (2) upstairs rooms in the newer section may be dated post 1820 but these rooms should be considered companion rooms to the rest of the house and furnished accordingly with all efforts made to keep furnishings of these four rooms dated no later than 1850. The Augusta Room furnishings will remain as they were in 1982.
3. Reproductions may be used only when the physical condition of the antiques is jeopardized by exposure in areas where large numbers of visitors have easy access; or when environmental conditions including excessive light, dust, humidity or airborne impurities pose a threat to the preservation of originals.

4. Effective March 12, 1983 all items donated to Meadow Garden shall be accepted with the written condition that they become the property of Meadow Garden and may be used, replaced or sold at the discretion of the Meadow Garden Board only.
5. All items that post date 1821, with the exception of those in the six (6) rooms of the newer section and those described in Number 3 of this section, shall be replaced as soon as possible with similar items pre-dating 1821.
6. Once an item is placed, it shall not be moved from one location to another without permission of the Meadow Garden Board. Only the Chairman of the Board may approve the removal of an item from the house, if it is in need of repair or refinishing.
7. Any item donated or purchased must have written documentation of appraisal and include an indication as to how the determination was made.
8. A file will be kept of all assets with information as to price paid or market value, date of acquisition, donor or where bought, documentation and appraisal and a description of article. One file will be kept in the reception room accessible to the Docents; a duplicate file will be in the possession of the Chairman of the Board.
9. All items purchased or donated will be added to the Fine Arts insurance policy. Said policy will be reviewed and updated a minimum of once a year. Major additions to furnishings will be added immediately.
10. Future plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the House/ Museum.

V

LANDSCAPING

1. The landscape plan adopted by the Board shall be adhered to with no deviation unless recommended by an authority on landscape design and care.
2. Donations of shrubbery, plants or trees shall be accepted only when item is part of the master plan.
3. Work on the grounds will be under the sole direction of the Meadow Garden Board and the Landscaping Chairman. Supervision of actual work will be provided by the Museum-House Manager or the Landscaping Chairman of Meadow Garden.

VI

MUSEUM SHOP

1. The Museum Shop will be operated by a committee appointed by the Chairman of the Board and be responsible to the Board.
2. Chairman of the committee will be responsible for all purchases, subject to the approval of the Board or the State Regent.
3. Museum Shop operation will be self-supporting. In the event funds are needed for purchases, they may be advanced from available Meadow Garden funds and must be considered a loan and shall be repaid without interest within one (1) year from date of borrowing.
4. Profit from the Museum Shop shall be retained in its own account, with a percentage being transferred at the discretion of the Board at end of fiscal year and placed in Maintenance Account. The audit of the Museum Shop operation shall be included in the annual audit of the Georgia State Society.

**VII
PATRONS**

1. Donors to the following categories are eligible to be known as "Patrons":
 - A. Meadow Garden Capital Investment Trust Fund
 - B. Furnishings
 - C. Maintenance
 - D. Landscape
2. Individual gifts of a minimum value of \$50.00 to any of the above categories automatically qualifies the donor as a Patron.
3. Chapter or group gifts of a minimum value of \$100.00 or more, above the State Honor Roll requirements, automatically qualifies that chapter or group as a Patron.
4. The State Treasurer will report these gifts to the Patrons Chairman.
5. The Patrons Chairman will issue certificates to the qualifying individuals and chapters or groups.
6. A permanent book will be kept on public display at Meadow Garden to record Patrons gifts.
7. The Patrons Chairman will enter the names of donors in the appropriate book a minimum of once a year.

**VIII
PLAQUES & MARKERS**

1. Plaques/Markers may be placed at Meadow Garden only at the discretion of the Board, and request meets the following criteria:
 - A. Substantial service and/or contributions that secured the property and the heritage for the GSDAR;
 - B. Individuals so recognized shall have been deceased for at least 5 years;
 - C. Plaque/Marker will be paid for by person(s) requesting such recognition.
2. Such plaques will be permanently displayed at Meadow Garden and a record of honoree's service and/or contribution shall be recorded and placed in the Meadow Garden file, with Board approval.
3. Plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the house/museum. Additional markers shall not be permanently placed on the grounds.

Bylaws

BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II OBJECTS

The objects of this Society shall be:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of the Georgia State Society.

Article IV OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian and a State Curator.

Section 2. (a) To be eligible for state office, a member shall hold and have held membership in a chapter or chapters within the Georgia State Society for at least 5 years prior to her election and have served a full term as chapter officer or state chairman.

(b) No member shall be eligible to the same state office for two (2) successive terms. A member having served more than one half of a term in a state office shall be deemed to have served a term.

(c) No two state officers shall be members of the same chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

(d) To be eligible for the office of State Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State First Vice Regent or as State Second Vice Regent or served in each of these two offices of the Georgia Society.

(e) To be eligible for the office of State First Vice Regent or for the office of State Second Vice Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State Recording Secretary or as State Treasurer of the Georgia State Society and shall have served a full term as a Chapter Regent of a chapter in the Georgia State Society.

Section 3. In recognition of valuable service to the Georgia State Society, a State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Article V NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. (a) A candidate for state office shall request the endorsement of her chapter, taken by vote at a regular meeting of the chapter held between May and January preceding the State Conference at which state elections are held. The endorsement, signed by the Chapter Recording Secretary, shall include the office the candidate seeks and shall be received by the State Regent with the candidate's statement of intent to be a candidate prior to any announcement or campaigning by the candidate and/or her supporters.

(b) A candidate for State Regent who wishes to present a slate of officers shall send to the State Regent in one packet the chapter endorsements and the statements of intent for each of her selected candidates. If received by the State Regent no later than December 1, these candidates shall be listed as a slate in the State Regent's December letter and Call to State Conference.

(c) Candidates wishing to run independently of a slate, whose chapter endorsements and statements of intent are received by the State Regent no later than December 1 shall be listed as independent candidates in the State Regent's December letter and Call to State Conference.

(d) A candidate whose chapter endorsement and statement of intent have been properly received by the State Regent may choose to announce her candidacy separate from the State Regent's December letter and Call to State Conference. Such a chapter endorsement and statement of intent shall be received by the State Regent at least ten (10) days prior to the opening of the State Conference at which the election is to take place.

(e) A candidate who does not meet the requirements of these Bylaws shall be declared disqualified and ineligible for consideration for state office.

(f) A chapter shall endorse no more than one chapter member for state office per election with the possible exception of candidates for State Regent and for State Corresponding Secretary.

(g) In the event of the death, incapacitation or withdrawal of a candidate prior to the election, a replacement shall be made with notification in writing to the State Regent and accompanied by the chapter endorsement and statement of intent as directed by these Bylaws.

Section 2. Nominations of candidates for all state offices shall be made at a designated meeting of the State Conference.

Section 3. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected biennially by ballot at the State Conference. A majority vote shall elect.

Section 4. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two (2) years or until their successors are elected. Their terms of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Section 5. (a) Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become State Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become State First Vice Regent subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. Vacancies in other state offices shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next State Board of Management meeting or State Conference, whichever shall come first.

(b) Any state officer who is absent from the state for a continuous period of six (6) months or longer shall automatically relinquish her position as a state officer.

Section 6. Upon the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Organizing Secretary General.

Section 7. (a) A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot.

(b) The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than fifteen (15) months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

(c) The endorsement shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent with the candidate's name and address to the Recording Secretary General to be received by April 1 preceding the designated Continental Congress.

Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall perform the duties prescribed in this article, and parliamentary authority adopted by the Society, and such others as the State Board of Management and the National Society may require.

Section 2. The State Regent shall:

(a) be the chief executive officer and the official spokesman for the State Society;

(b) have general supervision of the affairs of the State Society;

(c) preside at all meetings of the State Conference, State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;

(d) appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society;

(e) be ex-officio a member of all committees;

(f) appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as advisor in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting;

(g) sign all contracts and agreements made in the name of the Georgia State Society with the recorded approval of the Executive Committee and the State Board of Management or the State Conference as directed by these Bylaws;

(h) be bonded and have the authority to draw upon funds of the State Society with the approval of the Finance Committee.

(i) recommend to the Finance Committee a Certified Public Accountant who shall be approved by the Finance Committee.

Section 3. The State First Vice Regent shall:

(a) perform the duties of the office of State Regent in the absence or inability of the State Regent;

(b) fill a vacancy in the office of State Regent;

(c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;

(d) serve on those committees as designated by these Bylaws and as directed by the State Regent.

Section 4. The State Second Vice Regent shall:

(a) perform the duties of the office of State First Vice Regent in the absence or inability of the State First Vice Regent;

(b) fill a vacancy in the office of State First Vice Regent;

(c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;

(d) serve on committees as directed by the State Regent.

Section 5. The State Chaplain shall:

(a) open all meetings of the State Conference and the State Board of Management with scripture reading and prayer;

(b) preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and conduct such other religious services as may be required;

(c) be custodian of state properties pertaining to the duties of this office;

(d) be responsible for IN MEMORIAM pages in the Proceedings.

Section 6. The State Recording Secretary shall:

- (a) record the proceedings of the meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;
- (b) compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and the Proceedings Committee;
- (c) submit to the appropriate National officers, the endorsement for Vice President General and the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent before April 1 of the year in which said balloting was held;

Section 7. The State Corresponding Secretary shall:

- (a) conduct correspondence and send notices on behalf of the State Regent, the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as may be directed by them;
- (b) receive from the chapters the consolidated reports and distribute to the appropriate state chairmen.

Section 8. The State Organizing Secretary shall:

- (a) assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new chapters;
- (b) assist chapters in conjunction with appropriate state officers and chairmen in revitalization.

Section 9. The State Treasurer shall:

- (a) be bonded;
- (b) be the custodian of the funds of the State Society, placing them in institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance;
- (c) receive the state dues and State Conference registration fees from the chapters and receive all sums contributed by the chapters for state and national projects, disbursing monthly to the Treasurer General all funds designated for national projects;
- (d) disburse other funds only when authorized by the State Regent in writing;
- (e) keep an account of all sums received or disbursed by using the basic double entry form of bookkeeping according to accepted accounting procedures and keep receipts for all transactions;
- (f) prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference, sending a copy to the State Chairman of the Finance Committee ten (10) days in advance of each meeting;
- (g) be a member of the Finance Committee and an ex-officio member of the Credentials Committee;
- (h) balance and prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year; said audit by a Certified Public Accountant, shall be performed and delivered within forty-five (45) days of receipt of books.

Section 10. The State Registrar shall:

- (a) when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution prove eligibility and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars ;
- (b) keep a correct list of all members in the state;
- (c) report on membership to the State Conference;
- (d) be in possession of the computer and software owned by the Georgia State Society and see that it is maintained.

Section 11. The State Historian shall:

- (a) be in charge, within the state, of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General as well as those authorized by the Georgia State Society;
- (b) keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves within the state;
- (c) prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General;
- (d) promote the study of American history, state and county history and historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the founding of our state and counties.

Section 12. The State Librarian shall:

(a) serve as liaison between the Librarian General and the Georgia Chapters and disseminate general information on the NSDAR Library;

(b) cooperate with the director of the Georgia Department of Archives and History, making the needs of the Archives known to the chapters;

(c) collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing them wherever accepted in such libraries and Archives as may be chosen by the State Board of Management;

(d) solicit, with the approval of the Executive Committee, contributions from the chapters for purchase of such books as requested by the office of the Librarian General, and/or the various libraries in Georgia which the State Society approves;

(e) receive gifts of books and other printed material from the chapters to be donated to the approved libraries and Archives;

(f) maintain a constant supply of bookplates to the NSDAR Library, the Georgia Department of Archives and History and for purchase by the chapters.

Section 13. The State Curator shall:

(a) receive and be responsible for all gifts of Revolutionary relics to the Museum of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution;

(b) be custodian of the State properties and shall have them properly stored and made ready for use at state meetings.

Section 14. All officers will keep a Procedure Book of Instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new officers to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. State Conference:

(a) The annual meeting of the Georgia State Society shall be known as the State Conference. It shall be for the purpose of:

(1) receiving reports of officers, committees and Chapter Regents;

(2) electing officers biennially;

(3) promoting programs in furtherance of the objects of the Society;

(4) any other business that may arise:

i. annual budget shall be adopted,

ii. all projects of the State Society requiring funding shall be voted upon at State Conference or ratified by members at State Conference if previously voted upon by the State Board of Management,

iii. no project extending beyond the term of the presiding officer may be accepted at any meeting other than by vote at State Conference.

(b) The State Conference will be held between February 1 and the time of the meeting of Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week;

(c) The State Regent shall fix the time and place of meetings;

(d) The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credentials form to the chapters not less than sixty (60) days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 2. The voting members of the State Conference shall be:

(a) the officers and Honorary State Regents of the State Society;

(b) the officers and honorary officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state;

(c) the Chapter Regent, or in her absence, the Vice Regent or alternate of each chapter;

(d) delegates or alternates of each chapter of the state as designated by the Bylaws of the National Society for representation at Continental Congress;

(e) one additional delegate from each chapter in the state.

Section 3. Only a chapter member in good standing whose credentials have been completed in accordance with the instructions of the State Regent and the State

Credentials Chairman for the State Conference and in accordance with the Standing Rules of the National Society shall be eligible to represent her chapter at state and national meetings.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the chapter, except in the case of the Regent or Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at an annual State Conference, shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the state of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference the privilege of the floor shall be accorded to the State Chairmen. They may not vote unless they are duly registered as voters of the State Conference.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Society may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen (15) days' notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Forty-five (45) voting members, representing not less than twenty (20) chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The state officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents and the Regents, or in their absence, the Vice Regents of the chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the fall, following the October meeting of the National Board. It may meet whenever called by the State Regent. A minimum of twenty (20) days' notice shall be given as to the time and place of any such meeting.

Section 3. Thirty (30) members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference or as proscribed by these Bylaws.

Section 5. State chairmen, vice chairmen, committee members of the National and Standing Committees and one (1) member from each chapter shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privilege of the floor, but may not vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article IX EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, shall attend the meetings, but may not vote.

Section 3. This Executive Committee shall:

(a) perform such duties of the State Board of Management between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient;

(b) meet at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three (3) members of the committee;

- (c) vote by teleconference if necessary;
 - (d) receive and make recommendations for projects requiring expenditure of funds outside routine expenditures to be considered by the State Conference;
 - (e) make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.
- Section 4. Decisions of the Executive Committee shall be acted upon at the next meeting of the State Board of Management or at State Conference, whichever shall come first.

Article X FINANCES

Section 1. (a) The fiscal year of the Georgia State Society shall be May 1 through the last day of April.

(b) The annual budget, prepared by the Finance Committee, shall cover the fiscal year and be prepared on the basis of dues payable for the calendar year beginning December first preceding.

Section 2. (a) The annual dues of chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be \$5.00 for each member of the chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1.

(b) A minimum of \$1.83 shall be used to cover all State per capita assessments, with \$1.50 of this per capita being used for Meadow Garden maintenance, and the balance shall be allocated to the General State Dues Fund.

Section 3. (a) Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the state dues, a conference registration fee of five dollars (\$5.00) for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under these Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether chapter is represented or not.

(b) State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the five dollars (\$5.00) conference fee at the time of registration.

(c) Other members of the Georgia State Society who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay three dollars (\$3.00) conference fee at the time of registration.

Section 4. (a) The State Treasurer and the State Regent and such others entrusted with funds of the Georgia State Society as may be designated by the State Board of Management shall be bonded. (See Article VI, Sections 2 and 9);

(b) The State Treasurer with the approval of the State Regent and the State Chairman of the Finance Committee shall place the funds of the Georgia State Society in financial institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage;

(c) The placement of restricted savings funds and investment funds of the Georgia State Society shall be placed to the credit of the Georgia State Society by the State Treasurer under the direction of the Finance Committee. Monies may be invested in U. S. Treasury obligations or other interest bearing obligations of federally insured financial institutions;

(d) The accounts of the State Treasurer shall be annually prepared for audit by a Certified Public Accountant immediately following the end of the State Society fiscal year and no later than May 15 and delivered to the CPA by that date;

(e) Should the State Treasurer be incapacitated, the Chairman of the Finance Committee is authorized, with the written approval of the State Regent, to serve as the Acting State Treasurer until such time as the State Treasurer is able to resume her duties or a new State Treasurer is appointed and ratified as stated in Article V, Section 5 (a).

Section 5. The expenses incurred by the State Regent in the performance of duty shall be paid each year from the State Dues Fund:

(a) Four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00) shall be taken each year to defray her necessary travel expenses;

(b) Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent, as budgeted, shall be paid by the State Treasurer who shall keep all receipts of these expenses. No expenses exceeding the budgeted amount shall be paid by the State Treasurer.

Section 6. At the close of the books annually, \$3,000.00 shall be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies Fund" so that at the end of each administration a total of \$6,000.00 will be reserved. This money is to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration.

Article XI COMMITTEES

Section 1. The State Regent shall appoint the following standing committees:

(a) Bylaws: An Honorary State Regent shall be appointed as chairman and the committee shall be composed of two (2) other Honorary State Regents and one (1) member from each district;

(b) Finance: This committee shall be composed of seven (7) members to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two (2) Honorary State Regents, one (1) active chapter regent and one (1) active chapter member. One of the two Honorary State Regents shall be appointed chairman. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund. This committee shall have charge of all investments of the Georgia State Society funds and the placing of insurance of all kinds with accredited companies;

(c) Resolutions: This committee shall be composed of all Honorary State Regents, the State Parliamentarian and three (3) chapter members;

(d) Proceedings: This committee shall be composed of the State Recording Secretary, the immediate past State Recording Secretary, State First Vice Regent and four (4) additional Daughters, at least one of whom shall be an Honorary State Regent.

Section 2. The State Regent shall appoint such other committees, standing or special, as the State Conference shall authorize and actions of the State Board of Management and of the National Society shall require. The appointments shall be concurrent with the term of the State Regent making the appointments and shall terminate with the end of the administration.

Section 3. No additional appointments to any of the committees shall be made after the roster of chairmen and committees has been compiled and sent to the chapters. Vacancies shall be filled by the State Regent with timely notification to the membership.

Section 4. The duties of committees shall be such as these Bylaws, the State Conference, the State Board of Management or the National Society shall prescribe.

Section 5. All chairmen will keep a Procedure Book of instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

ARTICLE XII CHAPTERS

Section 1. To expedite the work of the Society, the chapters of the Georgia State Society shall be placed in geographical districts:

(a) A chairman appointed by the State Regent shall coordinate the work of all chapters as needed; she shall be titled "Coordinator of Districts";

(b) Each district shall have a Director appointed by the State Regent to work as a committee under the direction and supervision of the Coordinator of Districts and the State Regent.

Section 2. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April in the year of chapter elections. The Chapter Regent shall report annually the names of the elected officers promptly on the form provided by the State Regent for this purpose, with copies to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, and the State Recording Secretary.

Section 3. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent, the State Recording Secretary, and the District Director by February 1.

Article XIII MEADOW GARDEN

Meadow Garden, property owned by the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, shall be operated as follows:

(a) The governing body shall be the Board of Trustees composed of the following members: the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Chairman who shall be appointed by the State Regent;

(b) The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the following members: the State Regent who shall serve as Chairman; the State First Vice Regent who shall serve as Secretary; the Chairman of Meadow Garden; the Regents of the Augusta and College Hill Chapters and the chairmen of the five (5) subcommittees appointed by the State Regent; Docents, Furnishings, Landscaping, Museum Shop, Patrons;

(c) The Meadow Garden Board shall operate with Standing Rules approved by the State Conference.

Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. The current edition of "Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised," shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law in matters not covered by these Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

Article XV AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent, the State Parliamentarian, and the State Bylaws Chairman. The State Regent shall send a copy to each chapter, at least sixty (60) days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the Call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

Article XVI DISSOLUTION

Although the period of duration of the Georgia State Society is perpetual, if for any reason the State Society is to be dissolved or otherwise terminated, no part of the property of the Society or any of the proceeds shall be distributed to or inure to the benefit of any of the officers or members of the Society. Upon the dissolution of the Georgia State Society, assets shall be distributed by the Board of Management and/or the Executive Committee to and only to the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the local United States District Court, exclusively to such organization or organizations as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated within the meaning of section 501(c)(3), with purposes and objectives consistent with those of the Georgia State Society.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21.) No Conference was held in 1911; the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P.W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912"; amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, p. 211.)

ABSOLUTE DEADLINE FOR PROCEEDINGS MATERIAL

WHEREAS, a definite deadline must be established and adhered to for all reports and material to be in the hands of the Proceedings Committee in order to be delivered to the Printer by June 1.

RESOLVED: That all FINAL reports and materials must be received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1 with the exception of the Auditor's Report and any information sent out by the National DAR Headquarters. This does not alter the requirement in the "Items of Information" in the Proceedings that all reports shall be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary on or before February 15, the ORIGINAL being sent to the Secretary for the Proceedings.

AND FURTHER RESOLVED: This policy will be strictly adhered to and the material not received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1 will be omitted from the Proceedings.

AWARDS

All chapters competing for awards must send reports to the respective chairmen by February 1, 1998.

All reports for awards are based on membership confirmed by the National Society as of January 1 of preceding year (1997). SEE FIGURE BESIDE CHAPTER NAME IN CHAPTER REGENTS' DIRECTORY.

BYLAWS

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National and State Bylaws.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS

Notice of change of address of members shall be sent to the Organizing Secretary General, Treasurer General, State Regent and State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHANGE OF NAME

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to State Registrar, Treasurer General and State Regent by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHAPTER ELECTIONS

As soon as Chapter elections are held, names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, Administration Building, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D.C., 20006-5392, to the State Regent or State Regent-Elect and to the Recording Secretary by May 1. The full Christian name of Chapter officers shall be given together with her husband's given name or initials, address, zip code and telephone number. A Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years. This being added in order for our Bylaws to conform to the National Bylaws.

CHAPTER REPRESENTATION AT STATE AND NATIONAL MEETINGS

At the State Board of Management, a chapter is represented by the Chapter Regent, or in her absence by the First Vice Regent, and one non-voting member.

The voting representation of each chapter at the State Conference shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received by the State Treasurer **by January 1**. Membership less than 50: Regent, 1 Delegate, 4 Alternates, total votes 2; 50-199: Regent, 2 Delegates, 6 Alternates, total votes 3; 200-299: Regent, 3 Delegates, 8 Alternates, total Votes 4; 300-399: Regent, 4 Delegates, 10 Alternates, total votes 5.

The voting representation of each chapter at Continental Congress shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received in the Office of the Treasurer General **by January 1**. Membership less than 50: Regent, 0 Delegate, 2 Alternates, total votes 1; 50-199: Regent, 1 Delegate, 4 Alternates, total votes 2; 200-299: Regent, 2 Delegates, 6 Alternates, total votes 3; 300-399: Regent, 3 Delegates, 8 Alternates, total votes 4.

CONFERENCE REGISTRATION FEE

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer with the State dues on or before December 1, \$5.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether represented or not.

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$5.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$3.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration.

CONTRIBUTIONS

ALL contributions by Chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

DATE FOR ANNUAL AUDIT

WHEREAS, every effort must be made to have all material to the printer as early as possible to facilitate delivery of the Proceedings to the members.

RESOLVED: That the end of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, fiscal year for audit purposes be changed from May 31 to April 30.

DECEASED MEMBERS

Deaths shall be reported promptly to Treasurer General, State Chaplain and State Registrar by the Corresponding Chapter Officer. Complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and a date of death shall be furnished State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for Conference Memorial Service pages for State Proceedings.

DUES

Pay to State Treasurer State Dues of \$5.00 per member before December 1. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the December through April Board meetings of the National Society. National Dues of \$25.00 per member sent to the Treasurer-General, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20006-5392, before December 1, 1997.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS

To insure uniformity and convenience in binding, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, 8 1/2 x 11 inches, with 1 1/2 to 2 inch margin on left side, 1 1/2 inches at top and 1 inch on right side and at bottom. Four copies shall be sent to State Chairman of Genealogical Records. The booklet "Instructions for Copying Source Records and Their Preparation for Library Use" should be obtained from the office of the Corresponding Secretary General (currently \$1.00) with check made payable to the Treasurer General, NSDAR. This booklet gives the procedure for copying source records.

GEORGIA HOSPITALITY FUND

The following resolution which applies to the Georgia Hospitality Fund appears in the Proceedings for 1955:

"WHEREAS, The Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds a social event in Washington during Continental Congress which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society.

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$400.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes:

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this fund shall not be cumulative." Adopted.

INFORMATION FOR CHAPTER REGENTS

1. All letters received by Chapter Regents relating to the work of the Society shall be distributed to the Corresponding Chapter Chairman and brought to the attention of the members at a chapter meeting.

2. Please follow Resolution No. 11, adopted at 61st Georgia Society State Conference, as follows: "Resolved, That a closing date of February 1 be established for all reports, and all reports be given from February 1 to February 1, regardless of a change of regime or Regent." All awards will be made on this date basis.

NEW ADMINISTRATION FOR CONTINGENCIES FUND

For the entire resolution setting up the "General New Regime Fund Balance of \$2,500.00," found on pgs. 203-204 of the 1979 Proceedings the following substitute resolution was adopted by the 88th State Conference: RESOLVED that at the end of each administration \$6,000.00 be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies" fund, this money to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration, and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration. All other surplus monies in the General Fund, other than funds which are designated, are to be divided equally between the General Savings Account and the "Georgia State Society Endowment Fund," "DAR School" Resolutions 1991 page 62 of the 1992 Proceedings. This transaction is to be handled by April 30 every two years before the auditors close out the books of an administration, thus making the General Fund show the same balance of \$6,000.00 at the beginning of each new administration. (This fund is to be known as "New Administration Reserve for Contingencies Fund.") Adopted.

NOMINATIONS

The following resolution which applies to the announcement of the candidacy for State Regent appears in the Proceedings of the Twentieth State Conference, 1918:

Proceedings. Chapter Regents' Reports by February 1. State Officers and State Chairmen's Report are due on or before February 15.

A standard HEADING of ALL reports must conform to the Headings found in the Proceedings and must start at least 1 1/2 inches from top of sheet of paper. Leave 1 inch between bottom of Headings and start of report. LEFT MARGIN of report must be 1 inch minimum. Please check previous Proceedings for correct heading. Entire report should consist of ONE PARAGRAPH. Winners of awards of State Officers and State Chairmen shall be listed on a SEPARATE sheet of paper. 
MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING
