Other state officers present were: Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr., First Vice Regent; Mrs. Theodore C. Whitson, Second Vice Regent; Miss Laura M. Reid, Recording Secretary; Mrs. Fred K. Nuss, Corresponding Secretary; Mrs. Glenn Vaughn, Jr., Organizing Secretary; Mrs. Weston D. Baxter, Treasurer; Mrs. Robert B. Vance, Sr., Registrar; Mrs. Ronald H. Salter, Historian; Mrs. Chris S. McCorkle, Librarian; Miss Susan deCamp Conger, Curator.

The officers and the State Parliamentarian, Mrs. Enver B. Hoff, Sr., were welcomed by Mrs. Hunter. She expressed appreciation in having her entire Executive Committee present at the Tea honoring the State Regent on the third of June in Social Circle.

The minutes of the March fifth Executive Committee meeting were read and approved as read.

She reviewed the following dates of importance: Tamassee Founders Day activities on October 11, 12 and 13; Kate Duncan Smith Dedication Day activities on October 15, 16 and 17; Constitution Week Luncheon at the Ansley Golf Club in Atlanta on September 16; Fall Board of Management in Covington on November 2 and 3; and Executive Board meeting on November 2. The support of the Georgia State Society to the Children of the American Revolution, as shown through the

purchases at the C.A.R. table during workshops, Fall Board and State Conference, including voices sold, will be credited to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR.

The State Regent spoke of Mrs. Samuel M. Merritt, past Vice President General and Honorary State Regent, and her death on 23 July. Mrs. Merritt was State Regent 1960-1962 when the deed for Meadow Garden was transferred from the National Society to the Georgia State Society. She appointed the first Meadow Garden Board and established the guidelines that we use to govern Meadow Garden today. Mrs. Merritt was the first woman elected to the Georgia General Assembly.

The State Regent announced the return to the small group format for the workshops. She graciously thanked the State Officers for their support and loyalty.

The State First Vice Regent reported of her many visits throughout the state since her installation as State First Vice Regent at Continental Congress in April. Included in these travels were attendance at the State Proceedings Committee meeting in College Park, the Meadow Garden Board meeting in Augusta and the State Finance Committee meeting in Savannah.

The State Second Vice Regent reported a busy travel schedule including the Meadow Garden Board meeting and visits to Tamassee, Crossnore and Berry.

She has been asked to serve on the Crossnore DAR Advisory Council. She reported that Mr. Charles Edmonds, Jr., new High School Principal at KDS, Mr. Stan Mannon, the new Administrator at KDS and Mr. Jason Eller, Development Officer at Tamassee, will be attending the workshops.

The State Chaplain has mailed 95 birthday cards to our 90+ members, acknowledged 38 deaths reported by the chapters, and has notified chapters of deceased members as advised by National.

The State Corresponding Secretary reported Certificates of Award and Appreciation have been printed and are available for sale for \$0.15 each at the workshops. She has prepared the lists of the national appointments and the State Officers, Chapter Regents Directory and State Chairmen's Directory for the Proceedings and for the Regent's letter. The officers and the State Parliamentarian, Mrs. Enver B. Hoff, Sr., were welcomed by Mrs. Hunter.

The Recording Secretary read the minutes of the July 31st Executive Committee meeting. The minutes were approved as read.

The State Treasurer gave the financial report, giving the following summary of accounts as of 25 October 2000: checking account balance was \$7,655.57; money market account balance was \$36,877.96; and certificates of deposit balance was \$35,788.58; making total assets equal \$80,322.11. The financial report was filed.

The State Regent expressed her appreciation to the state officers for their dedication, assistance with problem solving and their loyalty. She stressed the importance of the "call down system" to inform the officers and Honorary State Regents of any official notices.

Mrs. Hunter received a lot of complimentary correspondence for returning to the breakout sessions at the August Workshops. She thanked the members of Exec for their participation in facilitating these sessions. A total of 668 attended the workshops, which is one of the largest attendances we have had. Also sales increased to a total of \$5,696.57.

Three workshops are tentatively planned for 2001: Southwest in Thomasville; Southeast in Valdosta; and Northwest in Jonesboro. A Northeast chapter somewhere on I-20 is being pursued, keeping the workshops south of Atlanta. State Board of Management will be in Columbus next year, hosted by the two Columbus Chapters.

The State Regent shared the following information from the October National Board. Chapter Books should be audited every year. AT&T telephone points have been cancelled. World War II Challenge is still open, and they are encouraging a listing from each Chapter. There is a new national committee concerning the restoration of the Bell Tower at Valley Forge, PA, and a donation of \$100.00 qualifies you to purchase a pin which can be worn on the ribbon. The Georgia State Table at the President General's Banquet will be Table # 61. The Georgia delegation will be seated on the floor in Section 21 of Constitution Hall for the 110th Continental Congress. The TV show, Wheel of Fortune, was taped at Constitution Hall in November and will air in 2001 February 5-9 for College Week and February 22-26 for NFL Football Week. Mrs. R. Hugh Reid and Laura Reid have been asked by the President General to research and update the book, "Wide Blue Ribbon," about our past Presidents General. The Chaplain General reminds all State Chaplains to include national numbers when sending requests for birthday announcements. The last national number given was 800,268. No membership count was available, but 2,357 members have been dropped; 2,191 applications have been received; 1,760 applications have been verified; and, 349 junior members have been accepted. Lady Huntingdon Chapter in Oxford, GA, is now in automatic disbandment. Georgia's new Chapter, James Stewart, was given national number 3119-GA. It's organizing date was 7 October 2000 with 24 members. Mrs. Lela Craft is Organizing Regent. Send in changes of address to National as soon as possible. Cost of the returned July issue of the DAR Magazine was \$3,500. A list of magazine subscribers will be mailed to the chapters in February. The Thrift Shop at Kate Duncan Smith School is officially closed. Changes in the Hightower Award requirements have been made to be effective February 1, 2001. The National Society grossed \$3,235,111 from all mailings (address labels, calendars...) during the Love Administration, with a net profit of \$2,370,413. The Head Genealogist at NSDAR sends the following directive concerning adopted children: "A prospective member, who is adopted, is eligible for membership in the National Society, DAR only through the biological parents." Again this year there will be no banquet tickets sold in Washington. Please let the State Treasurer

know by the first of February if you want a ticket. The National Society has been making really good use of our buildings... there was a wedding held in the Library with a catered reception in the O'Byrne Gallery; there have been musicales held on the portico; and, banquets in the lobby area around Constitution Hall. This is a new source of income for our National Society.

Mrs. Hunter expressed how much she has enjoyed representing the Georgia Daughters as State Regent, and how nice it's been to visit the Chapters and meet with our members. She again expressed thanks to the Board members for serving on her Dream Team.

The State First Vice Regent reported plans are underway for the Chapter Regents' Banquet at State Conference and the Georgia Luncheon to be held 17 April 2001 at the Capital Hilton Hotel, Washington, DC. All monies left in the treasurer were donated to the schools. They have requested disbandment. Lady Huntingdon Chapter has been notified by National they are in automatic disbandment. Their monies have been donated to Meadow Garden. Noble Wymberly Jones has also requested disbandment and all chapter members who are physically able have transferred their memberships to Dawson and other chapters. She reported her proudest moment was the installation of officers for the new chapter, James Stewart, on the seventh of October in Glenn, GA.

The State Historian reported on the receipt of six notifications of grave markings. She reminded us her priority is the focus on history and the recognition of the History Teacher of the Year.

The State Librarian reported that fifteen books and one CD-ROM have been confirmed for acceptance by the NSDAR Library since March 2000. Only books received in the Library on or before December 31 will be credited on this year's report. Bookplates are for sale, five for \$1.00, available only through the State Librarian. Since the District workshops 215 bookplates have been sold. Information about the Bookworm Project sponsored by the Librarian General is available and by completing the project makes you eligible for the purchase of a Bookworm pin that can be worn on your ribbon. She reminded us to remember our local libraries and State Archives when planning year's work. Libraries will accept books, magazine subscriptions, periodicals and other types of publications.

The State Librarian moved that the Georgia State Society make a \$500.00 donation to the NSDAR Library to purchase books for the Georgia Shelf in honor of our State Regent, Rosemary Crow Hunter. The motion was adopted unanimously.

The State Curator reported on the preparations for the State Board of Management meeting. Mrs. Hunter introduced the Timekeepers: Mrs. Vernon J. Holt, Chairman, and Miss Ellagene Baker, Miss Florrie B. Jackson, Mrs. Robert L. Loflin. Time limit for reports is three minutes for State Officers and two minutes for the State Chairmen.

The State Regent presented Miss Mary Kate Tribble, Chairman of Credentials, who gave the first Credentials Report: 11 State Officers, 8 Honorary State Regents, 1 State Parliamentarian, 55 Chapter Regents, 64 chapter members, 2 guests. Total registration without duplication was 131, establishing a quorum.

The progress at Meadow Garden, the state project, continues with the plaster in the Board Room, upstairs hall and downstairs hall being replaced. With this permanent renovation almost complete we can continue to beautify with new paper and paint. She noted that it was gratifying to see the support our Meadow Garden State Project has produced. She noticed from reading the chapter yearbooks that most of the chapters have appointed a chapter chairman of Meadow Garden, and several chapters have printed a history of Meadow Garden in their yearbooks. Mrs. Hunter expressed her gratitude for the support of this state project.

Mrs. Hunter was installed as the 55th State Regent of Georgia in April at the 109th Continental Congress. She attended the National Board of Management Meeting and the President General's Banquet.

The State Regent shared the following information from the October National Board. Chapter Treasurer's books should be audited every year. AT&T telephone points have been cancelled. World War II Challenge is still open, and they are encouraging a listing from each chapter. There is a new national committee concerning the restoration of the Bell Tower at Valley Forge, PA, and a donation of \$100.00 qualifies you to purchase a pin which can be worn on the ribbon. The Georgia table at the President General's Banquet will be table # 61. The Georgia delegation will be seated on the floor in section 21 of Constitution Hall for the 110th Continental Congress. The TV show, *Wheel of Fortune*, was taped at Constitution Hall in November and will air in 2001 February 5-9 for College Week and February 22-26 for NFL Football Week. Mrs. R. Hugh Reid and Laura Reid have been asked by the President General to research and update the book, "Wide Blue Ribbon," about our past Presidents General. The Chaplain General reminds all State Chaplains to include national numbers when sending requests for birthday announcements. The last national number given was 800,268. No membership count was available, but 2,357 members have been dropped; 2,191 applications have been received; 1,760 applications have been verified; and, 349 junior members have been accepted. Lady Huntingdon Chapter in Oxford, GA, is now in automatic disbandment. Georgia's new Chapter, James Stewart, was given national number 3119-GA. It's organizing date is 7 October 2000 with 24 members. Mrs. Lela Craft is Organizing Regent. Send in changes of address to National as soon as possible. Cost of the returned July issue of the DAR Magazine was \$3,500. A list of magazine subscribers will be mailed to the chapters in February. The Thrift Shop at Kate Duncan Smith School is officially closed. Changes in the Hightower Award requirements have been made to be effective February 1, 2001. The National Society grossed \$3,235,111 from all mailings (address labels, calendars...) during the Love Administration, with a net profit of \$2,370,413. The Head Genealogist at NSDAR sends the following directive concerning adopted children: A prospective member who is adopted is eligible for membership in the NSDAR only through her biological parents. Again this year there will be no banquet tickets sold in Washington. Please let the State Treasurer know by the first of February if you want a ticket. The National Society has been making really good use of our buildings... there was a wedding held in the Library with a catered reception in the O'Byrne Gallery; there have been musicales held on the portico; and, banquets in the lobby area around Constitution Hall. This is a new source of income for our National Society.

With regret the State Regent announced the death on 19 October of Mrs. Donald S. Blair, Honorary President General.

Mrs. Hunter expressed her appreciation to the Georgia Daughters for allowing her to serve as State Regent, and she expressed how much she has enjoyed visiting the chapters and meeting with members. The State Regent encouraged us to move forward and work together to have an outstanding report for Georgia at Continental Congress. (State Regent's detailed calendar will be listed under Reports of State Officers.)

The State Regent resumed the Chair and called for the State Officers to report.

The **State First Vice Regent** reported plans are underway for the Chapter Regents' Banquet at State Conference and the Georgia Luncheon to be held 17 April 2001 at the Capital Hilton Hotel, Washington, DC. Tickets for the Georgia luncheon are \$43.00 per person.

The **State Second Vice Regent** and **DAR School Chairman** encouraged support of the DAR Schools and attainment of the Hightower Award.

The **State Chaplain** stressed the importance of receiving a complete address and any address changes in a timely manner.

The **State Recording Secretary** reported the 1999-2000 Proceedings are being dis-

tributed at this meeting. Additional copies are available for purchase at \$10.00 per book. She emphasized the deadlines for reports for the Proceedings.

The **State Corresponding Secretary** reported the Consolidated Reports are available at this meeting and must be completed and returned to her by the first of February.

The **State Organizing Secretary** reported the follow-up with the five Chapter Regents of chapters considering disbandment: Bainbridge, Birdsville, Button Gwinnett, Lady Huntingdon and Noble Wymerly Jones. Bainbridge Chapter with a membership of 37 has decided not to disband at this time and has elected new officers for 2000-2001.

The **State Treasurer** reported total assets as of 25 October 2000 equal \$80,322.11, and Meadow Garden total assets equal \$320,915.29.

Mrs. R. Hugh Reid, **Finance** Chairman, reported a proposed budget for 2001-2002 fiscal year will be enclosed with the State Regent's call to State Conference. The committee directed that the State Regent be authorized to seek a printer for the Proceedings and a certified public accountant to do the annual audit with main considerations being cost, meeting stated deadlines and acceptable presentation. An auditor has been engaged who meets these considerations. By direction of the Finance Committee, Mrs. Reid moved that the State Board approve the purchase of a Martech computer at a total cost of \$856.00 to be taken from the general savings account; this computer replaces the State Registrar's computer, which crashed. The motion was adopted.

The **State Registrar** reported Georgia's membership to be 6,777 members according to dues that have been paid.

The **State Historian** reported that her priority is the recognition of the History Teacher of the Year.

The **State Curator** reported she has in her possession the properties of the Georgia State Society.

After a short break, reporting continued with the State Chairmen, beginning with the Meadow Garden Museum Chairmen. Mrs. John R. Henry, **Meadow Garden Museum**, brought news of the research and planning for the Meadow Garden redecoration, including the replastering of the Board Room, the upcoming plaster work in the halls and stairwell and the stripping of the floors in three rooms the "old-fashion way" with sandpaper, steel wool and elbow grease. Visitors from 38 states and 8 foreign countries have visited Meadow Garden, and 285 attended the Fourth of July Open House. Mrs. Jerido Ward, **Furnishings**, told of the repairing of the chairs from the Board Room; the investigation of repairing the grandfather clock and a wall clock; and, the donation of a 1820 copper wax melter. Mrs. Roy H. Cagle showed pictures of her latest efforts on the **landscaping** at Meadow Garden. Mrs. James H. Elliott, Jr., **Museum Shop**, showed us the new Meadow Garden ornament selling for \$18.00. **Docents**, Mrs. Kathleen Deck Johnson, expressed appreciation to the approximately fifty docents who have given at least 1200 volunteer hours. A full time house manager, Margaret McDonald, has been hired. Mrs. James J. Leitch, **Meadow Garden Patrons**, reported. Miss Sydney McRee, the State Registrar of the Children of the American Revolution, presented a birdhouse, which is a replica of Meadow Garden. The birdhouse was made by Mr. Robert L. Bridges, Jr.

Vance, Sr., and members of the William Day Chapter for their preparation, hardwork and gracious hospitality.

The State Regent wished everyone happy holidays and urged everyone to vote on Tuesday, the ninth. The Benediction was given by the State Chaplain. The State Board of Management was adjourned at 1:40 p.m.

Rationale: The fidelity bond for the State Regent and the State Treasurer as mandated by

WHEREAS, The Pledge of Allegiance to the flag of the United States of America is recited at every Daughters of the America Revolution meeting and function, and the Pledge is also recited in the American schools by millions of pupils, as well as regularly by Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and various fraternal organizations; but many of our citizens are unaware of the name of the man who wrote the Pledge of Allegiance and of the year it was written; and

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting. Georgia State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution prepares its financial statements on the cash basis of accounting. Consistent with this basis, income is recognized when received and expenses are recognized when paid.

Cash Equivalents. Cash equivalents consist of short-term, highly liquid investments, which are readily convertible into cash within ninety (90) days of purchase.

Property and Equipment. The Society follows the policy of not capitalizing collections and historical treasures. Meadow Garden and its contents are historical treasures. The house and its contents are insured for approximately \$ 325,000. Office furniture and fixtures are insured for \$ 8,000. Major preservation or restoration projects are capitalized and depreciated over an estimated useful life of fifteen years.

Income Taxes. Georgia State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution is classified as a non-profit organization and is exempt from income taxes under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

National Committee Reports

American Heritage - Mrs. Virginia G. Lingelbach

Of the 97 chapters reporting, there were 163 programs and projects given on a variety of subjects. Thirty-four involved youth, and 169 youth participated. Two hundred and ten members volunteered at historic sites. Georgia had 24 entries in American Heritage contests as follows: Eight entries in Art with five receiving National Honorable Mention, these are: Sandi Driskell, Thronateeska; Nancy Revnes, Elijah Clarke; Thomasine Mueller, Baron DeKalb; Allene Groote, Colonel John McIntosh; and Mavis Olenksi, Old Unicoi Trail. In Literature and Drama, Georgia had Entries with National Third place in short story going to Linda G. Stephens of Hawkinsville Chapter. Honorable Mention to Jacqueline Keller, George Walton Chapter and two Honorable Mentions to Ethelene Dyer Jones, Old Unicoi Trail. Four entries in Crafts were submitted. Receiving second place in the Southeast Division in quilt or wall hanging was Linda G. Stephens, Hawkinsville Chapter. Honorable Mentions to Violette H. Denney, Abraham Baldwin; Sue Simpson, Nancy Hart; and Millicent Jowdy, Elijah Clarke. Vidalia Chapter submitted the outstanding chapter report and best narrative of a single activity "The Freedom Bell." Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure to serve you and the Georgia State Society. Outstanding Chapter Report and Best Narrative of a single activity was Vidalia Chapter.

AMERICAN HISTORY - Mrs. J. Thomas Bowen

Ninety-nine chapters reported with 247 American History programs presented to chapters and 147 to other groups. One hundred forty-one displays were arranged in schools or public places, 824.5 press inches, 138 radio minutes, 66 television minutes publicized American History. Eighteen chapters used spot announcements. Essays on "If the U. S. Capitol Walls Could Talk" came from 212 schools with 4651 entries. Daughters gave 2432 certificates for essay contests and 155 bronze medals. Three hundred seventy-five certificates and 42 bronze medals were given for Outstanding Work in American History. There were 623 youth volunteers involved in activities and programs of the American History Committee. Daughters reported 1034 hours of volunteer service to youth as part of this committee. The four Georgia essay winners were: 5th grade, Isabelle Lucas, Xavier Chapter; 6th grade, Florence Priester, Oliver Morton Chapter; 7th grade, Jessica Johnson, Pulaski Chapter; 8th grade, Matthew Ogles, Abraham Baldwin Chapter. Christopher Columbus Essay reports came from 43 schools and 525 students entering the contest. Maggie Kicklighter, Altamaha Chapter, was the State Winner. A very special thanks to the four District Vice Chairmen: Northeast Mrs. Albert N. Wren; Northwest, Mrs. Bill J. Otting; Southeast, Mrs. Thomas R. Nisbet, Jr.; Southwest, Mrs. Robert Taylor. It has been a pleasure and a privilege to serve the State Society as American History Chairman.

AMERICAN INDIANS - Mrs. John K. Bretch

Appreciation to the 97 Chapters reporting. The full report will be in the proceedings. Chapters are involving our youth in their activities. Awards - Best overall report tie for first place Abraham Baldwin \$10.00 - Augustin Clayton \$10.00. Best Program Henry Walton \$10.00. Seven Chapters receiving Certificate of Appreciation. Georgia Daughters have supported the Indian Committee with GUSTO! The Camp Scholarship is a teaching process against substance abuse, self-destruction and teaching proper nutrition. There have been problems on the reservations gang leaders from the west coast and we do have campers from the reservations. Young children are easy targets and the threat is always there. We want to reach these children first. Two Prescott, Arizona daughters have been a great help to your State chairman, they were to the Camp last June and were much impressed the camp leader Patricia Gordon also talked with two young Indian men who had been campers, now on the camp staff. A Video is planned for June 2001 in Prescott, Arizona and is hoped a complimentary Video for each state. Camp Scholarship 1st to help improve the lives of Indian Children.

AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP - Mrs. Richard Simpson

Of the 97 chapters reporting, 36 chapters had activity for the Americanism Committee. There were 721 DAR Manuals for Citizenship distributed. Seventy nine members participated in a Naturalization process or ceremony. We have thirty chapters with an Americanism Committee Chairman. One chapter recommended a person for the Medal of Honor. Many Georgia Daughters are participating in the training process for new citizens. Some are helping to teach classes; Others give literature and small American Flags at the ceremonies. Georgia Daughters prepare refreshments and give receptions following the ceremonies. New citizens are given bookmarks with copies of the Pledge of Allegiance and Americans Creed. It has been a pleasure serving as chairman of this committee.

CHAPTER ACHIEVEMENT AWARD - Mindy Tidmore Kammeyer

This Chairman received reports from 87 chapters. All information was verified with the State Treasurer and sent to the National Divisional Vice Chairman by her February 15, 2001 deadline. Awards will be available at Continental Congress. Much appreciation goes to Camille Baxter, State Treasurer, for her assistance in the preparation of the states' forms. The Augustin Clayton Chapter is commended for an outstanding report with over 1000 points verified. The Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter sent a report showing outstanding work for NSDAP, It is a pleasure to chair this committee and review the work of all the Chapters in Georgia.

CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION - Mrs. James A. Harvey, Jr.

Ninety-seven DAR chapters returned reports. Eight chapters reported sponsoring a Society. One chapter reported still being in the organizational stage with its C.A.R. Society, while another was revitalizing a society. Three chapters reported sponsorship of Societies disbanded several years ago. Georgia has six functioning C.A.R. Societies: Allen Howard (Baron DeKalb and Philadelphia Winn), Button Gwinnett (Augustin Clayton), Lucy Spell Raiford (Oglethorpe), Sergeant Newton, Junior (Sergeant Newton), Sons and Daughters of Liberty (Atlanta), and Sukey Hart (Nancy Hart). Forming are Liberty Tree (Sukey Hart) and Count d'Estaing (Elijah Clarke). Six chapters report providing local and state senior leadership. Daughters serving include 8 Senior State Officers, 7 Senior State Chairmen, and 4 Senior Society Presidents, without duplication. The exact amount of financial support provided by DAR is unknown. Donations and sales from Summer Workshop Tour and State Board of Management totaled over \$1200. Notecards and T-shirts were sold to garner funds for the restoration of the Old State Capitol Building in Milledgeville, our President's Project. Twenty-seven shirts were sent for the Tamasee/Crossnore children. On behalf of Paige Rohe, State President, thank you

COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARD - Mrs. Inman D. Jackson, Jr.

Ninety-two DAR chapters returned report forms for this committee. Twenty-four chapters reported giving either the National Community Service Award or a chapter community service award. This chairman forwarded 18 applications from the following 15 chapters to the Southeastern Division National Vice Chairman for approval: Abraham Baldwin, Archibald Bulloch, Augustin Clayton, Captain Edward Hagin, Cherokee, Col. John McIntosh, Col. William Chandler, General Daniel Stewart, Martha Stewart Bulloch, Nathaniel Macon, Pulaski, Sunbury, Thronateeska, William McIntosh, and Xavier. Chapters reported that 30 awards were given to youth in middle or high school. Three chapters reported more than 1,359 volunteer hours for community service.

CONSERVATION - Mrs. Leo S. Jensen

There were 97 chapter reports submitted giving accounts of many wonderful conservation projects. There were 36 chapters describing their most significant conservation related achievements. Also, eight worked with 191 youths spending 58 hours. Thirty chapters educated 567 members about the importance of the organ donor program with 15 programs presented and 68 members involved in an organ donor program. Communities were the recipients of 31 chapters' participation in beautification projects, with 26 chapters educating members concerning wildlife issues, 22 having programs on water quality and safety, 19 planting millennium trees, and 15 participating in Arbor Day activities. There were 47 conservation programs and 952 conservation minutes. Nancy Hart, Capt. Edward Hagen, Sergeant Newton and Augusta Chapters presented Conservation Medals and two more chapters are in the nomination process. Members fed the birds, recycled, picked up litter, cleaned up historical sites, visited Wildlife Centers, participated in community cleanup days, maintained monuments, planted bulbs and trees in their communities, established a butterfly garden. Other members painted birdhouses with a 4H group for an environmental forest, and another became a Master Tree Farmer. There were 95,764 trees planted!

CONSTITUTION WEEK - Mrs. H. Carl Tanner

Georgia Daughters began their celebration of Constitution Week with Governor Roy Barnes' signing of the Proclamation. Attending this ceremony were Mrs. Billy Hunter, State Regent, State Regent, Mrs. Weston Baxter, State Treasurer, Mrs. James Crowe, NW District Director, and this chairman. On September 16, Ansley Golf Club, Atlanta, the State Luncheon featured guest speaker, the Honorable Cathy Cox, Secretary of the State of Georgia, and the presentation of the Proclamation. DAR MAGAZINE - Mrs. James L. McConnell

Reports were received from 98 chapters. Georgia Daughters worked hard selling subscriptions to the DAR Magazine. The General Josiah Tattnall Chapter had 92% of its members taking the magazine. At Continental Congress, Georgia was named winner in the Southeastern Division for Highest Total Advertising and received a \$50 printing coupon. AMERICAN HISTORY SCHOLARSHIP - Miss Donna R. Johnson

Reports were received from 97 chapters and 60 chapters contributed \$289.25 to the American History Scholarship Fund. Applications for this scholarship were placed in the Regents' packets for all four district workshops. The state winner is Patricia Ballantyne sponsored by the Abraham Baldwin Chapter. The winner demonstrates a keen interest in America's historical heritage and an active involvement in school and community. Thank you, Daughters, for your financial support of the National American History Scholarship, encouragement of America's youth to study American history, and the publicizing of DAR's commitment to education.

DAR SCHOOL COMMITTEE - Mrs. Theodore C. Whitson

The Hightower DAR School Award was presented to 63 chapters, with Pulaski and Cherokee Chapters being honored for the largest per capita contributions to the state projects. Seventy chapters had full programs on the schools; 142,263 plus labels; 42,270 pounds of thrift valued at \$126,810.00. Monetary contributions to: Tamasee \$15,229.50 plus \$40,622.72 sent direct; KDS \$5,962.50; Berry College \$3,561.54; Crossnore \$2,386.50; Hillside \$1707.71 and Hindman \$1,742.50 totaling \$30,590.25. Twenty-four became Friends of the DAR Schools. It was a pleasure to have Mr. Jason Eller from Tamasee and Mr. Stan Mannon and Mr. Charles Edmonds, Jr. from KDS participating in the August workshops. Chapter activities included: scholarships, linen showers, donations of Y2K foods, household furnishings, prom dresses, Christmas and birthday gifts, box lunches, sales of gift wrap, AT&T points, outings and parties for students. Please see the DAR School Awards listed in the Proceedings for the State Chairman's awards. Quilt proceeds amounted to \$1,000. The Georgia State Society acknowledges with grateful appreciation the generosity of Mrs. Kay Hightower and her family for funding the Hightower Awards.

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERAN PATIENTS - Mrs. Robert E. Stone

Daughters, our Georgia Veterans salute you! Out of 106 Chapters across the state, 42 reported Veteran activities. Statistics show 1,591 Georgia Daughters gave 1,543 hours of service in participating in 1,551 activities and traveled 10,505 miles.

Contributions included: cash donations, \$2,440; canteen credits, \$1,600; gifts, \$26,336; food items, \$2,211; comfort articles, \$3,738; books and magazines, 4,184; and, stamps, 39.75 pounds. Five Georgia Daughters are on active military duty, and 18 members are veterans.

Certificates of Award were presented to five Chapters. The outstanding VAVS member award was presented at State Conference. It has been an honor to serve our State Society and your administration, Madam State Regent.

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA -Mrs. Robert L. Marchman, III

Ninety-eight chapters reported the following activity: Flags presented included 150 large, 1,795 small and 164 tablesize. Flag materials distributed included 1,698 copies of the Flag Code, 74 Flag certificates, 91 Flag pins and other literature of 1,336 pieces, mostly Pledge of Allegiance bookmarks. Ninety-five chapters reported reciting the Pledge of Allegiance at each meeting, 70 chapters presented "Flag Facts" and 90 chapters encouraged others to "Fly the Flag". Twenty chapters involved youth in Flag promotion activities, however not all chapters reported the total number of hours involved. Fourteen chapters raised funds for the Smithsonian Star-Spangled Banner Project for "Education and Outreach Programs". These totals were way above last year's numbers and the Daughters of the Georgia State Society are to be commended for their outstanding work. We continually need to emphasize proper respect for our Flag in our communities to "Keep the Flag Flying" across our State and country.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS COMMITTEE - Mrs. David S. Mankee

Twenty-one members in 19 Georgia Chapters donated 2,923 pages of unpublished records to the DAR Genealogical Library, Georgia Archives, Washington Memorial Library in Macon, and Georgia Historical Society in Savannah - making a total of 11,692 pages. Ten members received Certificates of Appreciation for Donations of Unpublished Records. Forty-seven chapters donated \$460.00 to the Bookbinding Fund. William Marsh, Hightower Trail, John Laurens placed 1st, 2nd, and 3rd in this category. This chairman gave programs to four chapters, and rewrote instructions in Steps 1 through 15 for preparing unpublished records. Also rearranged Bookworm Pin Project instructions for clarity. Both sets will be distributed at 2001 workshops.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS - Vice Chairman - Indexing - Mrs. W. Charles Hampton

Thirteen ladies from twelve different chapters participated in the Indexing program sponsored by the DAR Library and earned Bookworm credit. Eight of those ladies have completed the indexing and returned their volumes of previously submitted genealogical records. Certificates of Appreciation go to: Faye Dyess - BONAVENTURE, Diane M. JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS COMMITTEE - Mrs. Douglas Lee Moody, Jr., Chairman

This committee chairman received reports from ninety-eight chapters of which nine reported JAC committee activity, and seven reported the sponsorship of twenty-five JAC clubs with eight new clubs being organized. A total of 485 children were JAC Club members, of whom 391 were new members. JAC Club supplies distributed during this school year included 395 membership pins, 365 membership cards, 26 handbooks, one JAC banner, 13 American Flags and 66 fact sheets. \$210 was reported to the State Treasurer for the JAC National Prize Fund. Publicity reported to this chairman included 252 inches with 10 pictures. The theme, "America's Monuments - Historic Greatness Preserved for America's Future," produced many varied and interesting entries for this year's contest. Chapters reported a total of 323 contest participants. Twenty-nine contest entries were received from two chapters, Old Unique Trail and Thomasville, and all were forwarded to the regional level for judging. They included very creative art posters,, stamps, and banners; photo essays; projects for special service in relation to the theme; and creative expression entries. Grades K through 5 and special education children participated in the contest categories. Chapter reported 128 volunteer hours. It has been a blessing for this chairman to work with the JAC Committee this year. Thank you, Madam State Regent, for asking me to serve the Society in this capacity.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP - Mrs. Richard C. Kumpitsch

It's great to see that the Georgia Juniors involvement continues to rise on the chapter, state and, national levels. Ninety-nine chapters reported this year, and we have 52 Juniors serving as chairmen, 15 officers and two Regents. On the state level we have one officer, three chairmen, and two vice chairmen. On the national level we have one vice chairman. Twelve chapters sold Innisbrook products. To start the millennium off right, and to follow the national lead, the Junior Bazaar was changed to the Junior Shoppe. The DAR watches that started in Georgia made their

way to the national Junior Shoppe in 2000. The State Shoppe added great new products like the business case, the "DAR" polo shirt, and the Georgia cookie cutter. A big "thank you" to all daughters for your continued support and contributions. Special thanks to Vice Chairman of Junior Contest, Mrs. Victoria Richards and Vice Chairman Sales, Miss Ashley Towns.

FRIENDS OF THE LIBRARY - Mrs. William D. Wilson

This committee's primary function is to raise funds to give the National Library the privilege to make special purchases of equipment, furnishing and books. Out of the 98 chapters reporting, twelve have donated a total of \$1497. Chapters donating are Augustin Clayton \$600, Robert Loughridge \$200, William Marsh \$200, Old Unicoi Trail \$200, Martha Stewart Bullock \$100, Sukey Hart \$100, Baron DeKalb \$40, Oglethorpe \$25, Commodore Richard Dale \$10, Fort Early \$10, Roanoke \$10, General Daniel Newman \$2. This chairman and the National Library appreciate their generosity. Please make it a 100% reporting next year and see if we can reach a higher goal.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE - Mrs. Richard C. Parsons

The DAR Membership Web Site was created to promote membership and to provide a tool for the Georgia Daughters to share membership information. This chairman e-mailed the names of 232 prospective members to the appropriate chapters (113 from Member Services, 53 from the Georgia State Society's Web Site and 66 from other sources). Membership statistics for 2000: Official Georgia DAR Membership Count on January 1, 2001: 7114; new members by application 258; reinstatements 51; transfers-in 125; transfers-out 123; dropped 113; resignations 124; deaths 150 for a net loss of 56 members 2000. (All numbers include members-at-large and 53 new junior members.) State Membership Certificates of Appreciation for membership achievement were presented to 34 chapters at State Conference. The Membership Committee gave a Certificate of Appreciation to the Nancy Hart Chapter for outstanding membership promotion. One hundred seventy six members-at-large were contacted and offered assistance by Mrs. Norman Thompson, Vice Chairman, Member-at-Large.

NATIONAL DEFENSE - Mrs. J.B. Deal

Georgia Daughters responded to the challenge of national defense, especially through patriotic education at events. Ninety-one chapters had a regular defense report at each meeting; 61 chapters enjoyed one full national defense program. Defense materials were available to members at meetings. In the community we presented a total of 150 ROTC medals, 25 gold and 125 bronze. Patriotism medals were presented to 134 individuals. Almost two-thirds of our chapters were involved in this visible medals program. Twenty chapters also gave cash to the national fund for ROTC medals. Baron DeKalb, Oglethorpe and Etowah are recognized for their outstanding participation. Locally published materials were reported by three chapters. Nancy Hart Chapter is recognized for publication efforts involving national defense. As individuals, 60 persons in our total membership reported engaging in a personal patriotic/national defense experience to share our values. Old Unicoi Trail is cited for its involvement. It has been my pleasure to work with committed Daughters and to learn more about national defense.

PROGRAM - Mrs. Sterling P. Jones

"Outstanding Program Contest" Chapters submitting programs: John Laurens, Nancy Hart, Sunbury, and Augustin Clayton. Chapter Program Awards on State level and seeking to represent Georgia on National level were entries from John Laurens and Augustin Clayton. Ninety-six reports were received from Georgia DAR Chapters. Sixty-three Chapter Yearbooks were received. They were all very good with great programs planned for the year. Selecting a winner in each category was a difficult task. This chairman expresses appreciation to the State Regent for the opportunity to serve the State Society in this worthwhile committee.

PUBLIC RELATIONS - Mrs. John M. Samaras, Chairman

The Georgia Daughters responded to the Public Relations Committee very well this year. Print Media: Articles #747, Photos # 480; Radio: Spots #282, Program Initiated # 8, Participated in #67; Television: Spots #79, Program Initiated #1, Sponsored #1 Participated in # 12; Chapters with Newsletter 37, Chapters with fact Sheet 7, Publicity for Independence Day 18. One chapter had a booth at a fair with literature explaining the Society, one chapter videoed the February meeting for the News. Constitution Week and presentation of ROTC and Good Citizenship awards were used by many chapters for public relations in their communities. A fish fry was held by the Wrens Chapter to thank the fire department for helping save the Chapter House. Several chapters have their own web sites, Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure serving you on this committee.

VOLUNTEER INFORMATION SPECIALIST - Mrs. Everett E. Porter, Jr.

Ninety-nine chapters reported members using computers in many ways: yearbooks, correspondence and address labels, programs, preparing applications, e-mail, newsletters, newspaper articles, genealogy research, secretary and treasurer reports, banners, certificates, invitations, index genealogical records. One member at age 102, has learned to use the internet for genealogy research. E-mail directories were set up and maintained for communication with 102 chapters. Fifty-six requests for membership information were received through the Georgia State Web Site and referred to the State Membership Chairman. Forty-one requests for miscellaneous information were received and answered by this chairman. There are now 15 chapters with web sites linked to the National Society web page. This year 4 additional chapter web sites were submitted for approval: Atlanta, Fort Early, Fort Peachtree and Fort Frederica. There are 12 other chapter web sites being constructed. Special thanks to Linda Stephens, Vice Chairman Web Page Construction for helping these chapter set up their web pages. Special thanks to Linda Hallman, Vice Chairman Georgia Message Page, who redesigned the Message Page with separate sections for chapter e-mail and state officers and chairmen e-mail and maintained these pages.

Special Committee Reports

COMMEMORATIVE EVENTS - Miss Patricia A. Glenn

Reports were received from 98 chapters. 78 participated in many events such as Flag Day, Georgia Day, Constitution Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day and activities with Veterans organizations at hospitals, nursing homes, in various parades, at battlegrounds and wreath laying at war memorials and graves sites. Ground-breaking ceremonies, poster displays at schools, churches and libraries honoring veterans were numerous. Constitution Day proclamations and luncheons and cooperating with SAR groups at many functions were reported along with other varied meetings and outings. 94 volunteer hours were reported, with many young people participating, including school band members, ROTC Units, Flag Corps and other volunteers. Outstanding reports were received from Nathaniel Macon, Xavier, Benjamin Hawkins and Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapters. 7 chapters became members of the Korean War Commemorative Community: Augusta, Chehaw, Cherokee, College Hill, Col. John McIntosh, Nathaniel Macon and Toccoa, and 2 chapters indicated they would join next year. 23 chapters honored Korean War Veterans at luncheons with lapel pins and certificates of appreciation. They, in turn, presented moving eye witness programs of first-hand experiences. The only reported entry in the Korean War Essay Contest was the Fielding Lewis Chapter. Chapters reporting purchases are as follows; Abraham Baldwin (48 members) 1 Insignia 14 other pins \$840.00; Nathaniel Macon (80 members) 1 Insignia 4 other pins \$375.00; John Benson (89 members) 14 pins including Insignia \$840.00; Augusta Clayton (104 members) 44 pins \$2,705.00; Augusta (104 members) 13 pins \$597.00; Mary Hammond Washington (128 members) 26 pins \$1,185.00; Martha Stewart Bulloch (142 members) 5 Insignia 68 other pins \$3,502.00. Fifty-eight Chapters have DAR Banners. Eighty-seven Chapters have Chapter Regent pin. One Chapter purchased a Chapter Regent pin for their Chapter this year. Sixty-three Chapters give Ex-Chapter Regent pin. Eighteen Chapters had Insignia programs this year. A Insignia Committee letter was prepared for Chapter Regents' packets with official listing of DAR pins and placement included in it. At Fall Board of Management meeting, this chairman in her Insignia Committee report and Honorary State Regent Mrs. R. Hugh Reid explained what the sash ribbon designates. Members were encouraged to purchase the 2000 Edition of the booklet "INSIGNIA SEAL BANNER". Pin requirements have been added to the booklet. Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure to serve the Georgia State Society as Insignia Chairman this year under your leadership.

LITERACY CHALLENGE - Mrs. Al K.Ream, Sr.

Ninety-seven reports were received from Georgia DAR Chapters; of these 40 reported no activity. Fifty-seven chapters promoted Literacy through programs at chapter meetings, members teaching English as a second language and reading to individuals and groups. Some members are librarians and give of their time and effort in this way. Members are mentors teaching reading and many donate money and books to reading funds, libraries and literacy programs in their communities. Eight hundred dollars was used for books and educational material by one chapter member in a local school. One chapter donated 250 books to Literacy Volunteers of America.

Chapter members volunteer service in local libraries, participate in story hours at churches and have representatives from Universities speak on how we can help illiterate people in our country. A total of 140 chapter members participated in literacy program. spent in tutoring and helping with adults were 2,953 hours; with children a total of 1,784 hours. Four chapters involved youth volunteers who gave 61 hours. Two community service awards for outstanding achievements in the promotion of Literacy were given by two chapters. Thank you, Madam State Regent, for this opportunity to serve.

VOLUNTEER GENEALOGIST - A Claire Morrison Dixon

Georgia has 14 Volunteer Genealogists and one Field Genealogist. Three others plan to take the training in 2001. Reports were received from five Volunteer Genealogists and one Field Genealogist. Seven chapter workshops were presented, also one workshop preceding Fall Board and two for other groups. Volunteer Genealogists have assisted on 11 new applications; preparation of 24 applications in process, and four supplementals. Chapters have been urged to call on Volunteer Genealogists for assistance.

WORLD WAR II MEMORIAL CHALLENGE - Mrs. John D. Douglas, Jr.

The DAR World War II Memorial Challenge has come to a close. In the year 2000, Georgia Daughters added 217 donors and 423 donations to the DAR Book of Remembrance. Three hundred eighty-seven Military Patriots, 36 Civilian Patriots, and 12 Daughters were recognized. For chapters under 50 members, Old Unicoi Trail had the most donors and General Daniel Stewart had the most donations. Chapters with membership between 50 and 99 were led by William McIntosh in both categories. Chapters having over 100 members were led by Cherokee with the most donors and General James Jackson with the most donations. Over the three years, seventy-one chapters participated. The Georgia Society had 1458 total donations. Oliver Morton is to be commended for leading the state in that category with 89 for 1998-2000. Please see the annual financial statements for the total dollars contributed by our Georgia Daughters. Thank you, Madam State Regent, for this opportunity to serve.

At 12:45 p.m., Mrs. Reid welcomed the committee members, stated the purpose of the meeting and appointed Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr., State First Vice Regent, as Secretary of the committee. Also attending were: Mrs. Weston D. Baxter, Miss Julia A. Farrigan, Mrs. Herman M. Richardson, Miss Mary Kate Tribble, Mrs. Jules Victor, Jr., and Mrs. Billy W. Hunter, State Regent. The blessing was given by Mrs. Victor with the meeting continuing through the luncheon. Mrs. Baxter, State Treasurer, distributed copies of Account Balances for the Georgia State Society and for the Meadow Garden Museum which were reviewed. It was stated that monies donated or purchases for items sold by C.A.R. should not be sent to the Treasurer General, but should be sent to the State Treasurer who in turn sends the funds to the Georgia C.A.R. Society. The State Regent, in her report, should include monies given to the Georgia C.A.R. Society. The State Treasurer was instructed to place the Georgia Room funds in a C.D. Mrs. Richardson moved that a sum not to exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) be withdrawn from the General Savings Account to cover cost of purchase and set-up for new computers to replace the computers in the custody of and for the use of the State Treasurer and the State Registrar and that the new computers be compatible with the system used by the National Society and as recommended by the National Society's Systems Specialist; and further, that if the present computers cannot be traded in to reduce cost of new computers that the outdated computers be given to Tamassee DAR School either for use by the school or as a donation to the Thrift Store. Motion was seconded and adopted. Miss Farrigan moved to recommend that the following proposed amendment to the state bylaws be referred to the State Bylaws Committee: To amend ARTICLE X1. Committees. Section I (b). Finance by striking and the placing of insurance of all kinds with accredited companies;" The last sentence of Section I (b). Finance then would read: This committee shall have charge of all investments of the Georgia State Society funds. Rationale: The only insurance the State Society carries relates to

Meadow Garden and therefore should be determined by the Meadow Garden Board which oversees all Meadow Garden funds. Motion was seconded and adopted. Mrs. Baxter moved to recommend that the Resolutions Committee present the following for consideration of the Fall Board of Management which meets in November 2000: Whereas, the January membership count by Chapters as recorded by the National Society is the annual official Chapter count; and, Whereas, the number of Chapter members with state dues paid to the State Treasurer is consistently less than the National Society's total; Resolved, that Chapter Treasurers be directed to submit all dues for new members including those admitted at the December meeting of the National Board of Management each year; and be it Further Resolved that those Chapters which do not meet this directive be considered in arrears until such dues are paid. Motion was seconded and adopted. Miss Tribble moved to recommend that the Resolutions Committee amend the "Georgia Hospitality Fund" by increasing the fund from four hundred dollars (\$400.00) to five hundred dollars (\$500.00). Motion seconded and adopted. Mrs. Baxter moved that the budgeted funds to be awarded to state winners for the American History DAR Scholarship, the four District winners of the American History Month Essay, the Columbus Essay Winner, the four Good Citizen Awards, the Outstanding American History Teacher Award and the Outstanding Veteran Award be used to purchase United States Savings Bonds in the names of the recipients, such savings bonds to show the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, as purchaser, signed by the State Regent. Motion was seconded and adopted. Mrs. Richardson moved that the State Regent be authorized to investigate recommendations for a new auditor who meets requirements of the state Bylaws and for a new printer for the Proceedings and that she present her recommendations to the respective committees for approval. Main considerations in selections shall be: (1) cost; (2) meeting stated deadlines; and, (3) acceptable presentation. Motion was seconded and adopted. Miss Farrigan moved that the following recommendation be presented for consideration of the March 2001 State Conference: That this action replace all prior rulings and actions in reference to the Hotel Contingency Reserve Fund and that the necessary funds up to an amount not to exceed two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) be withdrawn from the General Savings Account as needed for the required deposit to secure a hotel for State Conference and that the funds restricted to the Conference and Hotel Contingency Fund now deposited in money market be transferred to the General Savings Account. Motion was seconded and adopted. Mrs. Reid stated that the budget will be finalized at the next meeting. There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 3:27 p.m.

The Finance Committee met on Thursday, November 2, 2000, in the Oxford Room at the Best Western -White Columns Inn, Covington. Mrs. R. Hugh Reid, Chairman, called the meeting to order at 3:00 p.m. Others attending were: Mrs. John L Bell, Jr., Secretary; Mrs. Weston D. Baxter; Miss Julia A. Farrigan; Mrs. Herman M. Richardson; Miss Mary Kate Tribble; Mrs. Jules Victor, Jr.; and Mrs. Billy W. Hunter, State Regent. Prayer was offered by Mrs. Victor. The Minutes of the July 31, 2000, were approved as mailed. Mrs. Baxter, State Treasurer, distributed copies of the Summary of Fund Accounts which were reviewed and filed. Miss Farrigan moved that the Finance Committee ratify the purchase of a Martech Computer with Windows 98 program set up, and referral service for the State Registrar at the cost of \$856.00. Motion was seconded and adopted. After reviewing several proposals, Mrs. Richardson moved that the contract offered by Stephen L. Thompson, C.P.A., P.C., to prepare the annual audit for the Georgia State Society and to submit it no later than July first in accordance with the State Bylaws; to prepare the annual 990 form and submit prior to September 15th deadline; to prepare the audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards; and, to meet these stipulations at an annual cost to the State Society of approximately \$3,500.00. Motion was seconded and adopted. The proposed 2001-2002 budget was discussed with the confusion in NSDAR records being noted in determining the membership count to be used as a basis for State dues paid. A schedule and explanation of payment of National and State dues for new members was distributed. Miss Tribble moved that the 2001-2002 budget based on dues of \$5.00 per member for 6,700 members be recommended to the voters at the 2001 State Conference. This budget, totaling \$33,500.00, includes \$11,189.00 per capita funds as designated by the State Bylaws. The motion was seconded and adopted. Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall, Chairman, State Bylaws Committee, called for a motion to change the Rationale for the proposed amendment to the Bylaws. Mrs. Baxter moved that the Rationale for the proposed amendment in reference to insurance be amended by substituting a new Rationale to assure clarity. With the substitution, the following proposal to be referred to the Bylaws Committee: That ARTICLE XI. Committees, Section I (b). Finance. be amended by striking, "...and the placing of insurance of all kinds with accredited companies." The last sentence of Section 1 (b). Finance. then would read: This committee shall have charge of all investments of the Georgia State Society funds. Rationale: The fidelity bond for the state Regent and the State Treasurer as mandated by the state Bylaws is paid through the state dues funds and should be listed in the annual budget as a separate item; insurance premiums on policies covering Meadow

Garden furnishings and liability are paid through Meadow Garden funds and should be determined by the Meadow Garden Board. Motion was seconded and adopted. Mrs. Hunter was asked to consult with Mrs. Leonard G. DeLamar, Chairman, History of the Georgia State Society, to determine the most expedient timing for printing Volume 3. There being no further business, Mrs. Reid adjourned the meeting with prayer at 4:02 p.m.

The celebration of the founding of the Colony of Georgia at Savannah on February 12, 1733 by James Edward Oglethorpe has been a tradition among Georgians since 1734. The educational purpose of this celebration is to encourage a better understanding of and appreciation for Georgia history among people of our State. To that end, the Georgia Society Daughters of the American Revolution seeks to promote the study and preservation of our state's rich history and the historical sites, documents, and other materials which offer us a window on that past. Many events were planned by chapters throughout the state, and I thank you for your reports. There were Mayors' Proclamations, special luncheons and speeches, presentations of the Georgia Flag, essays by school children, laying of wreaths at monuments, tree planting ceremonies, providing Georgia Day booklets to schools, and posters placed at libraries. Each chapter that participated has brought new enthusiasm to the celebration, and I am honored to serve as State Chairman of Georgia Day.

GEORGIA STATE ROOM, DAR MUSEUM - Mrs. Hugh Peterson, Sr.

The Georgia State Room, one of the 28 period rooms in Memorial Continental Hall, is a reproduction of Peter Tondee's Tavern in Savannah. This Tavern was the place where Georgians heard the first reading of the Declaration of Independence. The furnishings of this room are based on the inventory attached to Mr. Tondee's Will, and are the most authentic pieces of any of the period rooms. Georgia Daughters have been very generous in the promotion and the maintaining of this treasure.

HISTORY OF GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY - Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar

The History of the Georgia State Society, last published to cover a ten year period, will now be published to cover ten administrations, with the third volume due for publication in 2012. All data for this publication will be up-to-date when this chairman receives reports from several state chairmen. There is no reason for a chapter or committee to send "no report." Even if your chapter meets only occasionally, you are making history. Madam State Regent, no chairman could enjoy a chairmanship more than this chairman. Thank you for your trust.

LUCY COOK PEEL STATE CHAIRMAN - Mrs. Gray Shattuck

In honor of Mrs. Lawson Peel, who served as Vice President General, the Lucy Cook Peel Memorial Fund was established in 1923 by the Georgia State Society. We now offer four books, published for the preservation of records, in two-volume sets. The first set of two books is The Membership Roll and Registration of Ancestors 1986 edition and The Membership Roll and

Registration of Ancestors 1996 edition, which is available at \$35 for the two-volume set. The second set of two books is The History of the Georgia State Society 1891-1981 and The History of the Georgia State Society 1981-1991, which is available at \$40 for the two-volume set. The grand total collected, by this committee between 1996 and the year 2001, is \$7,427.57. It has been a pleasure serving as chairman of this committee.

MARKING REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIERS GRAVES AND MARKING HISTORIC SPOTS Mrs. Bruce Tucker

This State Chairman received invitations to attend, marking laying wreaths and cleaning the graves of several Revolutionary Soldiers. I attended the invitation from Chehaw Chapter Ga. (Catherine Anglin Whatley, wife of Revolutionary soldier). Also several letters of inquiries were received concerning grave markings for Revolutionary Soldiers. I am proud to announce that the Georgia NSDAR had the following reports: 21 Revolutionary Soldiers' Graves had wreaths placed and marked; 9 spots were restored or repaired; 5 Historic Spots were marked; 4 Chapters attended the grave, markings of Historic Graves being sponsored, by another group; 4 Chapters participated in fund raisers and giving for Restoring Historical Spots; and 2 Chapters are in the process of marking Historic Spots. NSDAR 50 YEAR CLUB - Mrs. Bruce F. Macrae

Redecoration and some re-construction have brought exciting changes, but much more expense than our expectations - repair and plastering of Library/Boardroom, both halls, and stairwell, reconstruction of upstairs hall ceiling. Beautiful floors have emerged after pains-taking hand sanding. With the continuing assistance of consultant Miles Gandy Whitfield, light fixtures, door hardware, etc., are being ordered and plans are being initiated for the continuation of our guest and commitment to make Meadow Garden reflect the life-style of a person of George Walton's stature in the Historic Period 1790-1840. Mr. Albert Ross, Augusta Chronicle feature writer, delightfully pictured "Our Treasure" on July 4th, bringing a record 250 adults and 35 children to tour and admire. Much appreciation and thanks to chapters, patrons, members and other individuals who have generously supported our maintenance program. Also, much appreciation and thanks to the dedicated members who have given much time and labor to the "clean-up brigade." We are already enjoying the donation of a "necessary" (out house) donated by Mr. Wade Warner, which will be restored in the near future. It has been a pleasure and an educational experience to serve in this capacity

MEADOW GARDEN DOCENTS - Mrs. Kathleen Deck Johnson

The chairman appreciates the patience and cooperation of the docents. The house has been closed since before Thanksgiving. On February 15, the chairman trained 2 classes in the new program written by Mrs. John Henry. There was a third class on February 17. MEADOW GARDEN MUSEUM BOARD June 5, 2000

The Meadow Garden Museum Board met Monday, June 5, 2000 in the Board Room at Meadow Garden in Augusta. With Mrs. Billy W. Hunter, State Regent, presiding as Chairman of the Board, the meeting was called to order at 10:31 a.m. Other members present were: Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr., Secretary; Mrs. John R. Henry; Mrs. S. Davis Lewis; Mrs. Charles H. Turner; Mrs. Kathleen Deck Johnson; Mrs. Jerido Ward; Mrs. Roy H. Cagle; Mrs. James H. Elliott, Jr.; Mrs. James J. Leitch; and ex officio, members, Mrs. Weston D. Baxter and Mrs. Theodore C. Whitson.

Following the opening prayer by Mrs. Whitson, Mrs. Hunter welcomed the new members to the Board and thanked all for their willingness to serve. She expressed her love for Meadow Garden and stated that the main State Project during this administration will be the preservation and promotion of Meadow Garden, the State Society's special treasure.

The Secretary distributed copies of the Meadow Garden Museum Board roster and the Standing Rules for the Meadow Garden Museum. Following Mrs. Bell's reading of the Standing Rules, discussion of several items prompted Mrs. Hunter to appoint an Ad Hoc Committee composed of Mrs. Bell, Mrs. Elliott and Mrs. Ward to review the Standing Rules and to bring recommendations needed for clarification and consistency to the next meeting.

It was noted that not all Board members have received the files from their predecessors. The importance of continuity and for the success of the work of Meadow Garden, the need of Board members promptly passing on their files was stressed.

Mrs. Baxter, State Treasurer, presented the financial report, May 1, 2000 through June 5, 2000, which was reviewed and filed. Mrs. Baxter was commended for her clear and concise presentation.

Mrs. Ward moved that \$3,000.00 be transferred from the Museum Shop Money Market Account to the Maintenance Money Market Account. Motion was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Henry, **Museum Chairman**, reported that Mr. Miles Gandy Whitfield, Consultant for Period Restoration, was to be present at this Board meeting to further expound on ideas and information pertinent to the renovation and restoration of the Museum. Due to illness, he was unable to attend.

She announced that because of personal problems, the **House Manager**, Miss Jessica Parrish, has submitted her resignation effective June 15, 2000, and that Mrs. Margaret McDonald has been hired at a salary of \$6.50 per hour for a six month probationary period, beginning June 16, 2000.

The Tour Program script is being up-dated and Mrs. Johnson, Docents Chairman, has been requested to have an orientation meeting for ALL docents. This orientation is to include the grounds as well as the Museum. Mrs. Johnson also is to contact docents asking for their commitment to serve when large groups have scheduled tours.

Mrs. Henry stated that she had received two communications which she plans to further investigate. One is from the Flagler Museum in Palm Beach, Florida, announcing a two week museum course which can be attended by a representative from Meadow Garden, and the other is from a group in Germany making available information on registering Meadow Garden on their Museums of the World online search engine.

Mrs. Henry explained the need to repair the cracks in the walls of the Board Room with sanding and glazing regardless of whether the room is to be painted or papered. An appropriate mantle should be considered and at some later date the fireplaces in the house should be enlarged to their original size.

Mrs. Henry moved that Junior Grantham be employed at a price of \$3,000.00 not to exceed \$4,000.00, depending on the amount of unseen wall damage, for plaster repair to the Board Room. Motion was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Henry moved that Joey Smalley be hired to do wood preparation, as needed, and painting of all wood trim and plaster in the Board Room, not to exceed a cost of \$1,600.00. Motion was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Henry stated that she is preparing a booklet on the refurbishing of the Museum, beginning with the dining room. She also requested that Mr. Miles Whitfield again be named a Patron in Kind for his valuable guidance in the restoration of Meadow Garden. By general consent this request was granted.

Mrs. Johnson, **Docents Chairman**, had no report other than she has mastered using the alarm system at Meadow Garden.

Mrs. Ward, **Furnishings Chairman**, reported that several of the Board Room chairs needing repair have been sent to Mr. Rodney Brooks. One of the chairs in the worst condition is to be repaired at a cost of \$40.00. In addition, the fabric on the chairs is to be removed, cleaned and properly refitted.

A note from Mrs. Jules Victor, Jr., past Furnishings Chairman, was read. She stated that the portrait of George Washington, now in Savannah for re-matting, will be returned to Meadow Garden this summer.

It was mentioned that the silk flowers in Meadow Garden should be replaced with more appropriate dried arrangements.

Mrs. Cagle, **Landscaping Chairman**, reported that *The Augusta Chronicle* had run an article on "College Hill, a Home of George Walton." It was suggested that the article may not be entirely accurate, but perhaps some of the information could be added to the Meadow Garden files on George Walton.

She stated that die Cherokee Rose Garden Club has changed its schedule for volunteer work in the Weavers Garden to the first Monday of each month instead of the third Monday, weather permitting. Donations of apple and peach trees by DAR members will be planted in the fall. All plantings will follow the approved landscape plan. College Hill Chapter member, Frances Cutting and her husband, Brigadier General Robert Cutting, M.D., have been working in the yard - The current yard service company continues to be a problem. Other companies are being investigated for more reliable service at a reasonable cost. The sprinkler system is to be extended to water the new Weavers Garden and areas of the yard not covered at this time. This extended system is to be installed at cost of material only.

Mrs. Elliott, **Museum Shop Chairman**, reported that 24 Sunny Day canaries and 12 blue humming birds with stands were ordered on May first. By consensus, the canaries are to sell for \$8.00 each and the humming birds and stands for \$10.00, tax included. Meadow Garden lighted houses and snow globes were deemed unfeasible for Meadow Garden to purchase due to the large minimum orders required. Since the Christmas ornaments from ChemArt Company have not been ordered and therefore will be unavailable for sale at the District Workshops and Fall Board this year, ordering these items was postponed.

Mrs. Ward stated that she has quite a few wood, flat back cut-outs of Meadow Garden which could be painted and sold. Mrs. Baxter knows of a painter who can be contacted.

An inventory of the Museum Shop items was prepared by Mrs. Merrill Thompson, the previous Shop Chairman, and is in the Museum Shop file.

Mrs. Henry was asked to investigate having Meadow Garden copyrighted.

Mrs. Leitch, **Patrons Chairman**, had no report but stated that she will pick up all records

from the immediate past Patrons Chairman and will see that this information, including the listings in the "Patrons Book", is up to date.

Mrs. Hunter stated that she hopes that a Flag Retirement Ceremony at Meadow Garden can be planned for State Conference next year. She also stated that the insurance policy on the House was renewed on April 30, 2000 for one year at a cost of \$2,325.00. This policy does not include the fine arts which are covered under a separate policy. The question of the location of the inventory of the Museum furnishings was discussed. No consensus was reached as to where this inventory might be other than perhaps in the files in possession of the past State Regent, Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall.

The next meeting of the Board will be held on Thursday, November 2, 2000 at 1:00 p.m. at the Best Western-White Columns Inn in Covington.

Mrs. Hunter thanked the Secretary for the meeting notice post cards.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 12:34 p.m.

The Meadow Garden Museum Board met Thursday, November 2, 2000, in the Oxford Room at the Best Western-White Columns Inn in Covington. With Mrs. Billy W. Hunter, State Regent, presiding as Chairman of the Board, the meeting was called to order at 12:55 p.m. Other members present were: Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr., Secretary; Mrs. John R. Henry; Mrs. S. Davis Lewis; Mrs. Kathleen Deck Johnson; Mrs. Jerido Ward; Mrs. Roy H. Cagle; Mrs. James H. Elliott, Jr.; Mrs. James J. Leitch; and ex officio members, Mrs. Weston D. Baxter and Mrs. Theodore C. Whitson.

Following the opening prayer by Mrs. Leitch, Mrs. Hunter welcomed the members and thanked them for attending the meeting.

The Secretary read the minutes of the June 5, 2000 meeting which were approved as read.

Mrs. Baxter, State Treasurer, presented the Summary of Fund Accounts, May 1, 2000 through October 25, 2000, which was reviewed and filed. Mrs. Hunter thanked Mrs. Baxter for a clear and concise report.

Mrs. Henry moved to ratify the telephone vote on paying \$8,000.00 for plastering up and downstairs halls (walls and ceiling.) Seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Ward moved that the Stribling C.D. be moved to the Maintenance Account to help cover cost of plastering. The amount in the C.D. is \$3,448.33 plus. Seconded and adopted.

Miss Julia Farrigan, who has had experience in obtaining grants for the Butts County Historical Society, was welcomed by Mrs. Hunter. Miss Farrigan reported that she had been asked by Mrs. Hunter to investigate obtaining grants for Meadow Garden. She reviewed her background in this field and stated that it is probably too late this year to apply for aid, but said that she would ghost-write requests which would then be signed by the State Regent. She feels encouraged that Meadow Garden will qualify for help. Miss Farrigan was thanked and excused from the meeting.

Mrs. Henry, **Museum Chairman**, reported that the Board Room has been replastered, painted and is ready for wallpaper; the wallpaper in the halls has been removed and the plaster has been found to be in great need of repair which is scheduled to begin in December; the floors in the Dining Room, Best Room and the Board Room have been stripped and prices for stripping the floors in the Augusta Room, downstairs hall and stairs have been secured. Mrs. Henry told of several interesting messages found on the walls when the wall paper was removed. Mr. Miles Whitfield, Consultant for Period Restoration, is to bring books for drapery design for the Augusta Room and the paint color for the hall is to be discussed when he comes to Augusta. A catalogue for reproduction hardware has been ordered from Ball and Ball and a crystal doorknob is being donated by a member of Old Herod Chapter. Shelves for the walls in the kitchen were suggested and pictures of shelves from Kenmore were shown. Meadow Garden historic designations were reviewed as follows: **Front Gate -Bronze Marker:** (1968) Placed by the Georgia Education and Historical Commission and the Grand Lodge of Georgia, F&AM, recognizing George Walton's services to Georgia and that one county and two Masonic chapters are named in his honor. **Monument in the Garden:** (1936) Erected by the City of Augusta and the W.P.A., Richard E. Allen, Mayor. The plaque says: Meadow Garden, Residence 1792-1804, Signer of the Declaration, - Delegate to Constitutional Convention - Senator - Chief Justice -Twice Governor. **House Entrance Plaque:** (1982) - House was designated as a National Historic

Landmark by the National Park Service because of its national significance. **National Register of Historic Places:** (1976). Over the past several months, fewer people have visited Meadow Garden, but tour income has remained almost constant due to the difference in charges made to drop-ins and to tour groups. Visitors have come from 38 states and eight foreign countries. With the delightful feature in *The Augusta Chronicle*, 250 adults paid and 35-40 children attended the July 4th Open House. Dr. Ed Johnson, Jeannie Johnson's husband, College Hill Chapter, donated a '95 computer, Travel Guide correspondence requesting information and/or participation was received from *Georgia Traveler*, *Directory of Historical Organizations*, and The Saint Louis Art Museum. The Christmas Open House has been canceled due to all the renovation currently in progress. Mrs. Henry moved to pay Joey Smalley \$1,440.00 for sanding all new plaster, and all wood, applying primer latex to plaster walls, prime with color the plaster, caulk all wood as needed, prime and paint wood of all trim with two coats. He also painted the new post on the front porch which was placed as a safety precaution. Seconded and adopted. Mrs. Henry stated that the picture of The Washington Family which hangs in the Board/ Reception Room has been restored. Mrs. Henry announced that she had received the following letter from Mrs. Ellen S. Turner, Regent of the Augusta Chapter:

"To whom it may concern:

This correspondence is at the request of the State Regent, Mrs. Billy W. Hunter, and Mrs. Louise Henry, Meadow Garden House Chairman.

'Mrs. Louis Joseph Bahin was State Regent in 1976 when this Augusta Chapter Regent was asked if our chapter would take the Victorian parlor at Meadow Garden as our bi-centennial project. Our chapter voted to do this as our bi-centennial project and we were assured that it was a one time project and not an on going obligation. Lois T. H. Pietrowski'

The Augusta Chapter, DAR will assume responsibility for the painting of the trim for the Victorian parlor at this time (2000) during renovation. Sincerely, Ellen S. Turner, Regent Augusta Chapter, NSDAR October 30, 2000"

Mrs. Johnson, **Docents Chairman**, reported that she had no report other than she was having trouble coordinating docents and tour groups. Mrs. Henry is reworking the Docents Program.

Mrs. Ward, **Furnishings Chairman**, reported that Englebrooks Antiques will have the chairs from the Reception Room ready for reupholstering by the first of next week. Work on the chairs and trimming the frames for a better fit will be at a cost of approximately \$ 1,000.00. She and Mrs. Henry have dried hydrangeas with which to replace the silk flowers at Meadow Garden. Mrs. Ward stated that she had spoken with a clock repairman in Martinez concerning the cost of obtaining estimates on repairing the old clocks at Meadow Garden. The house call will be \$60.00, plus time spent on checking the clocks. Mrs. Ward recommended that Meadow Garden accept the copper wax melter donated by Sybil Willingham of Nathaniel Macon Chapter. The recommendation was adopted. The wax melter was appraised at \$200.00 and was donated in memory of her step-father's mother who was an active member of the DAR.

Mrs. Cagle, **Landscaping Chairman**, reported that the Cherokee Garden Club is now planting in the Weavers Garden and that her husband, Roy Cagle, has extended the sprinkler system to cover the new garden. An additional section will be added in front of the house. An Eagle Scout troop has offered to help with the digging for the recently donated fruit trees which will be planted this winter. Fall and spring flowers will be planted to beautify the grounds for State Conference in March. The gate alarm had to be replaced due to so much traffic through the gate. Cleaning the area around the fig tree and the Weavers Garden produced so much yard trash that the yard service twice charged an extra fee of \$25.00 for removal. About 15 of the boxwoods have died, but will soon be replaced. In investigating other yard service companies, it was determined that changing firms would be more expensive than staying with the current firm. With more frequent calls to the owner, the current service has improved. Plumbing problems from the stopped-up line from the rest room through the yard had to be addressed.

Mrs. Elliott, **Museum Shop Chairman**, reported that Betty Love Dubbs, Vice Chairman in Charge of Sales, did an excellent job at the District Workshops. An inventory was made before the Workshop tour. A new Meadow Garden Christmas ornament is now in stock and will sell for \$18.00. Mrs. Elliott moved that an attorney be retained to secure a copyright/ trademark on the name and image of Meadow Garden. Motion was seconded and adopted. Mrs. Elliott's daughter, Claudia Callaway, designed a business card for the Museum

Shop and a good supply has been printed. One box was left with the Museum Manager in September. Several vendors who carry upscale gift items have been contacted and samples of gifts from several house museums have been secured. The Shop Chairman is ready to proceed with ordering new items as soon as funds are available.

Mrs. Leitch, **Patrons Chairman**, stated that she does not know where the "Patrons Book" is. Since May 1, 2000, three chapters and 17 individuals have become Patrons.

Mrs. Baxter was asked to investigate having the wooden cut-outs of Meadow Garden painted.

Mrs. Bell reported for the Ad Hoc Committee appointed to review the Standing Rules for Meadow Garden. She thanked Mrs. Ward and Mrs. Elliott for their help in this task. Most of the suggested changes were editorial in nature and were approved by the Board. A proposed amendment to the Standing Rules, Article I - Meadow Garden Board - Section 2, will require an amendment to the State Bylaws. Adding the State Treasurer as a voting member of the Meadow Garden Board was adopted by the Board and if the proposed amendment to the State Bylaws is adopted at State Conference, March 2001, Article I - Meadow Garden Board - Section 2 of the Standing Rules will then read:

The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the three (3) Trustees as named in the Deed from the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, conveying Meadow Garden to the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution; namely, the State Regent, the state First Vice Regent and the State Chairman of Meadow Garden who is appointed by the State Regent; the Chapter Regents of the Augusta Chapter and College Hill Chapter, both chapters being located in Augusta, who shall serve as Vice Chairmen to the State Chairman of Meadow Garden; the State Treasurer; and five of the chairmen of Meadow Garden Committees, as appointed by the State Regent.

It was also adopted by the Board to amend Article I - Meadow Garden Board - Section 3 by striking out "two (2) consecutive terms" and inserting "three (3) consecutive terms." The section would then read:

No Georgia Daughter shall serve in the same Meadow Garden Chairmanship more than three (3) consecutive terms. Rationale The National Society allows National Chairmen and Chapter Regents to serve two consecutive terms of three years each, or six consecutive years. Three consecutive terms on the Georgia State level would be six consecutive years which would be in line with the policies of the National Society.

This change in section 3 will be brought before the March 2001 State Conference for approval.

The next meeting of the Board to be held on Tuesday, January 9, 2001, at 10:30 a.m., in the Board Room at Meadow Garden in Augusta.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 2:48 p.m.

The Meadow Garden Museum Board met Tuesday, January 9, 2001, in the Board Room at Meadow Garden in Augusta. With Mrs. Billy W. Hunter, State Regent, presiding as Chairman of the Board, the meeting was called to order at 1030 a.m. Other members present were: Mrs. John 1. Bell, Jr., Secretary; Mrs. John R. Henry; Mrs. S. Davis Lewis; Mrs. Charles H. Turner; Mrs. Kathleen Deck Johnson; Mrs. Jerido Ward; Mrs. Roy H. Cagle; Mrs. James H. Elliott, Jr.; Mrs. James J. Leitch; and ex officio members, Mrs. Weston D. Baxter and Mrs. Theodore C. Whitson.

Following the opening prayer by Mrs. Leitch, Mrs. Hunter welcomed the members and thanked them for attending the meeting.

The Secretary read the minutes of the November 2, 2000, meeting which were approved as read.

Mrs. Baxter, State Treasurer, presented the Summary of Fund Accounts, May 1, 2000 through December 31, 2000, which was reviewed and filed. Mrs. Hunter thanked Mrs. Baxter and asked her to prepare a detailed Maintenance Report and to mail a copy to each member of the Board. Mrs. Hunter explained that the Stribling C.D. was not cashed because the Joseph Habersham Chapter had so graciously made a generous donation to that fund.

Mrs. Henry moved to ratify the telephone vote to cover the cost of the joist supports, rebuilding the ceiling in the upstairs hall and building an access to the attic. Motion was seconded and adopted.

Miss Julia A. Farrigan, Chairman of the ad hoc Funding Committee, was welcomed and reported that she had visited the Foundation Center in Atlanta where she reviewed some 600 foundation grants, locating ten possible sources for which Meadow Garden might seek funding. She stated that the next step is to formulate a long-range plan of what needs to be done and to establish a budget with costs estimated. She reviewed the information necessary for filing an application and stated that deadlines for filing are usually February 1 and September 1 with notification within 30 days of Board meetings which are held in April and November. Miss Farrigan was thanked and excused from the meeting.

Mrs. Henry, **Museum Chairman**, reported that as of December 13, 2000, Margaret McDonald, House Manager, is no longer employed by Meadow Garden, having been given two weeks' severance pay. Mrs. Ward moved to contract with Sizemore Personnel to provide a House Manager at a cost of \$2.00 per hour maintenance fee plus the hourly salary. Motion was seconded and adopted. Sizemore will handle all paper work. Some health and life insurance will be offered at a reduced rate at employee's expense. Mrs. Henry explained in detail the dangerous condition of the ceiling in the upstairs hall. Following inspection by Eric Montgomery, Historic Augusta; Miles Whitfield, Consultant; Ed Johnson; John Henry; Roy Cagle; and a professional construction carpenter, Ted Baker and his father were hired to remove this old ceiling and rebuild the ceiling, with attic access, using the proper construction. The wall papers for the Library/ Board Room have been, ordered at a cost of about \$2,500.00, should be delivered by the end of January, and installed the first week in February by Richard Johnson at a cost of \$520.00. Mrs. Henry moved that the Meadow Garden Board pay \$2,290.00 to Joey Smalley to complete the hallway and stairwell upstairs and down. Motion was seconded and adopted. This work is to begin on January 15 and will require at least a week to complete. Mrs. Henry reported that in the process of ceiling removal, it was learned that there is no ridge beam in the attic. Some of the timbers in the old house were pegged. Some of the siding from the old house was removed to trim the new ceiling access upstairs and the access cover. The house was a brown color. Some shakes from the original roof of the old house were found. The newer house appeared to have been added to the older house, as previously suspected. Above the stairwell is split lath with some knots, rather than sawed lath. Pig hair seems to have been the bonding ingredient in the plaster. The ceiling of the hall had sawed lath and some other kind of hair in the plaster. There is a large round hole in the chimney in the attic of the newer house. Both chimneys have been rebuilt above the roof line. It has been recommended that the chimneys be sealed so that fires cannot be built in the fireplaces. There is a "clean up volunteer crew" of College Hill Chapter members who will vacuum, mop, and dust when the hall plastering is completed in order to have the house ready for State Conference. All volunteers are new College Hill members: Laurene Buist, Debbie Powell, Maxine Maloney and Becky Bonin. Mrs. Henry reported that she presented a program to Joseph Habersham Chapter in November, at which time a generous donation was given by the chapter for the Meadow Garden renovation projects. In December, she spoke to the Thronateeska Chapter with the chapter donating a copy of *Historical Background of Dougherty County, Georgia 1836-1940*, compiled by W.P.A., for the Meadow Garden Library. The burglar alarm code has been changed and the system has been checked with all batteries being replaced. Sizemore Security has been sold to Bowman Security.

Mrs. Johnson, **Docents Chairman**, reported that due to all the work taking place at Meadow Garden, very few tourists have visited recently, those coming for tours have primarily been school children. Therefore, during this time, few docents have been needed.

Mrs. Ward, **Furnishings Chairman**, reported that Mr. Walker of Walker Clock Co. estimates \$600.00 to \$800.00 to repair each clock. A 75 year warranty is available provided the Walker Clock Co. services the clocks every four years - cost would be \$200.00 per service per clock. Mrs. Ward moved that Mr. Walker of Walker Clock Co. repair the grandfather clock in the Best Room at a cost of \$600.00 to \$800.00. Motion was seconded and adopted. By general consent, the warranty provision was rejected. Thirteen chairs have been repaired, are being stored in Mrs. Ward's garage, and will be returned to Meadow Garden when painting is completed. The copper wax melter was donated by Sybil Willingham in memory of Mrs. John Wesley Brooks (Clifford Gertrude Lewis), descendant of Richard Rivers (NC). Mrs. Elliott has taken the portrait of George Washington to Durrett Studio in Marietta. The cost to restore the painting is \$485.00 and to restore the frame with 22K gold leaf is \$550.00, for a total cost of \$1,035.00, which Mrs. Elliott is graciously donating.

Mrs. Cagle, **Landscaping Chairman**, reported that in December pansies were planted around the Mulberry tree and replacement Boxwoods were purchased and are being planted. Two posts on the split-rail fence were damaged by the yard service. The cost of purchasing replacement posts was deducted from the amount paid to Mr. Matthews in December. The garden club will work in the yard once in January and twice in February to prepare the yard for the Open House during State Conference. Pine straw will be donated by Susan Conger with help from the Boy Scouts to deliver it. The Eagle Scout Troop will begin volunteering in the yard in February.

Mrs. Elliott, **Museum Shop Chairman**, reported that the Museum Shop sales at Fall Board amounted to \$625.75. Mrs. Hunter announced that during her fall District chapter visits, Museum Shop sales totaled \$964.00. Other members of the Board also told of their success in selling the new ornaments and other Shop items. In celebration of Chem Art's 25th anniversary, the company sent Mrs. Hunter a "Peace on Earth" ornament which will be used as a fund raiser.

Mrs. Leitch, **Patrons Chairman**, reported that donations for eight Chapter Patrons totaled \$20,710.00 and 37 Individual Patrons totaled \$1,350.00. She stated that at the suggestion of the State Regent, following a generous contribution of \$20,000.00 to Meadow Garden by the Joseph Habersham Chapter, 11 members of the chapter were named Patrons. By general consent, four individuals were named Patrons-in-Kind: Dr. Edward Johnson who donated a '95 Windows Computer and is instructing Mrs. Henry in its use; Mr. Richard Johnson who hangs the wallpaper at a reduced rate; Mr. Miles Gandy Whitfield, Consultant, who has donated considerable knowledge, talent and time to the Meadow Garden redecoration program; and to Sybil Willingham for her donation of the copper wax melter. Mrs. Leitch moved that the Meadow Garden Board authorize the purchase of 400 Meadow Garden Patron Certificates at a cost of \$51.57. These certificates are to be printed in blue on card stock paper. Motion was seconded and adopted.

The Meadow Garden Open House during State Conference will be on Saturday, March 3, 2001, from 2:30 to 4:30 p.m.

The next meeting of the Board will be held on Thursday, March 1, 2001, at 1:00 p.m. in the Shultz Board Room, Radisson Riverfront Hotel, Augusta.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 12:12 p.m.

The Meadow Garden Museum Board met Thursday, March 1, 2001, in the Shultz Boardroom, Radisson Riverfront Hotel, Augusta. With Mrs. Billy W. Hunter, State Regent, presiding as Chairman of the Board, the meeting was called to order at 1:00 p.m. Other members present were: Mrs. John 1. Bell, Jr., Secretary; Mrs. John R. Henry; Mrs. S. Davis Lewis; Mrs. Charles H. Turner; Mrs. Jerido Ward; Mrs. Roy H. Cagle; Mrs. James H. Elliott, Jr.; Mrs. James J. Leitch; and ex officio members, Mrs. Weston D. Baxter and Mrs. Theodore C. Whitson.

Following the opening prayer by Mrs. Leitch, Mrs. Hunter welcomed the members, thanking them for their dedication, devotion and love for Meadow Garden.

The Secretary read the minutes of the January 9, 2001, meeting which were approved as edited.

Mrs. Baxter, State Treasurer, presented the Summary of Fund Accounts, May 1, 2000 through February 25, 2001, which was reviewed and filed.

A round of applause was given to Mrs. Henry and Mrs. Cagle for all their hard work in getting Meadow Garden Museum and grounds ready for the tour to be held during State Conference.

Mrs. Henry moved that the telephone approved vote to purchase a light fixture for the entrance hall at Meadow Garden at a cost of \$1,500.00 be ratified. Motion was seconded and adopted. The beautiful glass fixture, 1830-1850, was purchased at Mr. Whitfield's professional discount from The Antique Shop in Charleston, SC. Mr. Whitfield will deliver it to Augusta.

Mrs. Henry, Meadow Garden Museum Chairman, reported that the wallpaper was received and installed by Mr. Johnson, paper hanger, in the Library/Boardroom. Excess adhesive needs to be removed from the paper, which was difficult to install. It is hoped that the manufacturer will have a solution. The French manufacturer of the wallpaper trim did

not include instructions for proper positioning, so the trim has not been installed. The downstairs hall floor and the step treads up to the landing have been stripped with pumice stone, with excellent results. All painting in the halls and stairwell has been completed and has turned out beautifully. After State Conference, continuation with the redecoration of the Augusta Room and the Best Room should follow. Mr. Whitfield and Mrs. Henry have discussed the Greek Revival influence to the Augusta Room and are preparing a proposal for redecoration. First, the wallpaper needs to be removed and the paint stripped from the mantle. The Augusta Chapter has agreed to pay for painting the trim. Two light fixtures have been ordered for the upstairs hall ceiling. Susan Wolfe has been employed, through Sizemore Personnel, as the new Museum House Manager, beginning on Monday, February 19, 2001. She is very enthusiastic about her new position and is learning the routine rapidly. Dedicated Daughters from College Hill, Augusta, and Kettle Creek Chapters, Susan Wolfe and many other house cleaners have been busy cleaning a very dusty House Museum due to the removal and, replacement of the plaster. The advertising rates for promoting Meadow Garden on the National Public Radio Station are to be investigated. N.P.R. has state-wide coverage with 14 stations and could be an effective program. The out-house, "necessary", from Burke County and donated by Wade Warner, has been delivered to Meadow Garden and will soon be restored. The needed lap-siding for re-construction will be donated by Mr. Warner.

The Docents Committee report will be filed. There were three classes for a total of twelve docents.

Mrs. Ward, Furnishings Chairman, reported that Chapter contributions to furnishings totaled \$2,111.00 since May 1, 2000. On behalf of the State Society, she expressed appreciation for all the contributions and donations from chapters and individuals. Several pictures are being restored; the chairs in the Board Room have been refurbished; and the grandfather clock from the Best Room is being repaired. Mr. Smith recommends cleaning the furniture twice per year to prevent drying out. Certificates of Appreciation are being presented to Fort Peachtree Chapter for generous contributions and to Sybil Willingham for donating the wax melter.

Mrs. Cagle, Landscaping Chairman, reported that the new C. A.R. State President, Thomas Jackson, would like to have a state project at Meadow Garden. Suggestions included the repair of the three busts, the repair of one of the clocks, or the purchase of the hall lantern. She also reported that work on the Weavers Garden was started in October by the Cherokee Rose Garden Club of Augusta. Pansies have been planted around the yard and a vegetable garden will be planted in the spring. Mrs. Billie Holt donated three peach trees and eight apple trees. They will be planted with the help of an Eagle Scout Troop. Some of the boxwoods had to be replaced around the yard. Weeding has been done in all flower beds. Tree trimming advice will be investigated. Landscaping donations for this year have been \$1,790.50.

Mrs. Elliott, Museum Shop Chairman, reported that since May 1, 2000, sales of Shop items totaled \$5,684.48.

Mrs. Leitch, Patrons Chairman, reported that Meadow Garden Patron Certificates have been printed and envelopes purchased at a cost of \$70.59. Thirty-five chapters and fifty-two DAR members have become Patrons this year. Certificates, signed by the State Regent and the Patrons Chairman, will be issued to all Patrons. By general consent, Billie Patrick Holt, John Clarke Chapter, was named a Patron-in-Kind.

Mrs. Leitch moved that permission be granted to purchase a new book for the recording of Patrons' names. This will enable one book to contain names of Patrons for both years of the present State Regent's regime. The book will remain on display at Meadow Garden. Motion was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Bell will enter the names of Patrons for 1996-2000 in the old book for Mrs. Flew Murphey, past Patrons Chairman.

Mrs. Cagle suggested that the counted cross-stitch picture of Meadow Garden given by Mrs. James J. Muldrow be reproduced, reduced in size and assembled into a kit as a fund raiser. Mrs. Hunter appointed Mrs. Elliott and Mrs. Ward to work as a committee of two on having information to present at the June Board meeting. Voices on the project should be ready to sell by the District Workshops.

Mrs. Hunter reported that Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall's name is still on the Travelers Property Casualty Insurance policy. This policy, covering liability, fire and the fine arts, will increase \$235.00 this year. Since the address for the policy changes every two years with

the change of State Regents, Mrs. Elliott suggested having notices sent to the State Regent in care of Meadow Garden.

The next meeting of the Board will be held on Tuesday, June 5, 2001, at 10:30 a.m. in the Board Room at Meadow Garden in Augusta.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 2:20 p.m.

Standing Rules for Meadow Garden Museum

I MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

1. The governing body of a museum, in this instance the Meadow Garden Board, serves the public interest as it relates to Meadow Garden, and must consider itself accountable to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, as well as to Meadow Garden; members should not attempt to act in their individual capacities, but all actions should be taken as a Board, Committee, or otherwise in conformance with the Standing Rules, the Act of Incorporation, or applicable Resolutions.
2. The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the three (3) Trustees as named in the Deed from the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, conveying Meadow Garden to the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, namely, the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the State Chairman of Meadow Garden who is appointed by the State Regent; the Chapter Regents of the Augusta Chapter and the College Hill Chapter, both chapters being located in Augusta, who shall serve as Vice Chairmen to the State Chairman of Meadow Garden; the State Treasurer; and five of the chairmen of Meadow Garden Committees, as appointed by the State Regent.
3. No Georgia Daughter shall serve in the same Meadow Garden Chairmanship more than three (3) consecutive terms.
4. Of the six (6) appointments made by the State Regent, at least two (2) shall be Honorary State Regents.
5. The State Second Vice Regent shall serve as ex officio member of the Meadow Garden Board, being given the privilege of the floor without a vote.
6. The State Regent shall serve as Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board, and the State First Vice Regent shall serve as Secretary of the Meadow Garden Board.
7. The Meadow Garden Board shall meet a minimum of three (3) times each year; namely, preceding Fall Board of Management meeting, preceding annual State Conference and following Continental Congress, and at such other times as deemed necessary by the Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board. At least one (1) meeting of the Board shall be held at Meadow Garden each year.
8. The Meadow Garden Board shall have jurisdiction over the operation, maintenance and work of Meadow Garden and shall be the authority for Meadow Garden as long as such authority is not in conflict with the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, the Act of Incorporation for the Georgia State Society, Resolutions adopted by the Georgia State Society and/or directions which from time to time may be approved by action of the Georgia State Society assembled at its annual State Conference.
9. The Meadow Garden Board shall supervise the placing of all insurance to cover the grounds and the Museum, with its contents, including the fine arts, with accredited companies - coverage to include fire, theft and liability.
10. Five (5) voting members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.
11. Minutes shall be kept of each meeting and a copy shall be sent to each member and printed verbatim in the State Proceedings.
12. All expenses for maintenance, operation and purchases of furnishings and plantings shall be authorized by the State Regent, as Chairman of the Board, and paid by the State Treasurer. Expenditures exceeding \$1,000.00 must have the majority approval of the Board.
13. These rules will be binding on the actions of the Board in their operation of Meadow Garden. They may be changed by the following procedure: Members of the Board must have written notification of proposed changes one month prior to the next meeting of the Board; a two-thirds vote of the Board and approval of the State Conference are necessary to effect a change.

II OPERATIONS

1. Everyone entering Meadow Garden will be requested to sign the Register, including date, time of arrival and time of departure.
2. No more than fifteen (15) people with each Docent are to be on tour in the house at a given time. Excess of this number may wait in the reception room or in the garden. The Museum Manager has the authority to enforce the Meadow Garden rules at all times.

3. There will be no smoking in Meadow Garden.
4. No refreshments are to be served in or taken into the Museum by visitors, including chapters or the public. Should a group, such as a visiting chapter, desire refreshments, the garden is available for use if litter is properly disposed of by the serving group.
5. Tour visitors will be asked to pay a fee as set by the Board.
6. There will be only five (5) complete sets of keys to Meadow Garden and three (3) keys to the gates of Meadow Garden. Keys are to be returned after each administration. New locks may be required. Distribution of keys: Gate Only: Augusta Police Department, Georgia Power, and Sizemore Security; Gate and House: Chairman of Meadow Garden Board, Meadow Garden Chairman, Museum Manager, Docents Chairman and Landscaping Chairman.

III

VOLUNTEERS AND DOCENTS

1. Docents, shall be members in good standing of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR.
2. Duties of docents shall include acting as guides, hostesses, working in museum shop, working in yard, cleaning in house, public relations. No volunteer work at or for Meadow Garden shall be done except under the direct guidance of the Meadow Garden Board and the chairman of the specific committee for that particular function.
3. Cleaning or yard work volunteers shall be under the direction of the Museum Manager.

IV

FURNISHINGS

1. Items bought or accepted for the older section of Meadow Garden must pre-date 1821.
2. Furnishings for the two (2) main floor rooms and two (2) upstairs rooms in the newer section may be dated post 1820 but these rooms should be considered companion rooms to the rest of the house and furnished accordingly with all efforts made to keep furnishings of these four rooms dated no later than 1850. The Augusta Room furnishings will remain as they were in 1982.
3. Reproductions maybe used only when the physical condition of the antiques is jeopardized by exposure in areas where large numbers of visitors have easy access; or when environmental conditions including excessive light, dust, humidity or airborne impurities pose a threat to the preservation of originals.
4. Effective March 12, 1983 all items donated to Meadow Garden shall be accepted with the written condition that they become the property of Meadow Garden and may be used, replaced or sold at the discretion of the Meadow Garden Board only.
5. All items that post date 1821, with the exception of those in the six (6) rooms of the newer section and those described in Number 3 of this section, shall be replaced as soon as possible with similar items pre-dating 1821.
6. Once an item is placed, it shall not be moved from one location to another without permission of the Meadow Garden Board. Only the Chairman of the Board may approve the removal of an item from the house, if it is in need of repair or refinishing.
7. Any item donated or purchased must have written documentation of appraisal.
8. A file will be kept of all assets with information as to price paid or market value, date of acquisition, donor or where bought, documentation and appraisal and a description of article. One file will be kept in the reception room accessible to the Docents; a duplicate file will be in the possession of the Chairman of the Board.
9. All items purchased or donated will be added to the Fine Arts insurance policy. Said policy will be reviewed and updated a minimum of once a year. Major additions to furnishings will be added immediately.
10. Future plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the Museum.

V

LANDSCAPING

1. The landscape plan adopted by the Board shall be adhered to with no deviation unless recommended by an authority on landscape design and care.
2. Donations of shrubbery, plants or trees shall be accepted only when item is part of the master plan.
3. Work on the grounds will be under the sole direction of the Meadow Garden Board and the Landscaping Chairman. Supervision of actual work will be provided by the Museum Manager or the Landscaping Chairman of Meadow Garden.

VI
MUSEUM SHOP

1. The Museum Shop will be operated by a committee appointed by the Chairman of the Board and will be responsible to the Board.
2. Chairman of the committee will be responsible for all purchases, subject to the approval of the Board or the State Regent.
3. Museum Shop operation will be self-supporting. In the event funds are needed for purchases, they may be advanced from available Meadow Garden funds and must be considered a loan and shall be repaid without interest within one (1) year from date of borrowing.
4. Profit from the Museum Shop shall be accounted for within the State Treasurer's books, with a percentage being transferred at the discretion of the Board at the end of the fiscal year and placed in the Maintenance Account. The audit of the Museum Shop operation shall be included in the annual audit of the Georgia State Society.

VII
PATRONS

1. Donors to the following categories are eligible to be known as Patrons:
 - A. Meadow Garden Capital Investment Trust Fund
 - B. Furnishings
 - C. Maintenance
 - D. Landscape
2. Gifts of a minimum value of \$50.00 to any of the above categories automatically qualifies the donor as a Patron.
3. Chapter or group gifts of a minimum value of \$100.00 or more, above the State Honor Roll requirements, automatically qualifies that chapter or group as a Patron.
4. The State Treasurer will report these gifts to the Patrons Chairman.
5. The Patrons Chairman will issue certificates to the qualifying individuals and chapters or groups
6. A permanent book will be kept on public display at Meadow Garden to record Patrons.
7. The Patrons Chairman will enter the names of donors in the appropriate book a minimum of once a year.

VIII
PLAQUES & MARKERS

1. Plaques/Markers may be placed at Meadow Garden only at the discretion of the Board, and request meets the following criteria:
 - A. Substantial service and/or contributions that secured the property and the heritage for the GSDAR;
 - B. Individuals so recognized shall have been deceased for at least 5 years;
 - C. Plaque/Marker will be paid for by person(s) requesting such recognition.
2. Such plaques will be permanently displayed at Meadow Garden and a record of the honoree's service and/or contribution will be recorded and placed in the Meadow Garden file, with Board approval.
3. Plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the Museum. Additional markers shall not be permanently placed on the grounds.

BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II OBJECTS

The objects of this Society shall be:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of the Georgia State Society.

Article IV OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian and a State Curator.

Section 2. (a) To be eligible for state office, a member shall hold and have held membership in a chapter or chapters within the Georgia State Society for at least 5 years prior to her election and have served a full term as chapter officer or state chairman.

(b) No member shall be eligible to the same state office for two (2) successive terms. A member having served more than one half of a term in a state office shall be deemed to have served a term.

(c) No two state officers shall be members of the same chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

(d) To be eligible for the office of State Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State First Vice Regent or as State Second Vice Regent or served in each of these two offices of the Georgia Society.

(e) To be eligible for the office of State First Vice Regent or for the office of State Second Vice Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State Recording Secretary or as State Treasurer of the Georgia State Society and shall have served a full term as a Chapter Regent of a chapter in the Georgia State Society.

Section 3. In recognition of valuable service to the Georgia State Society, a State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent for life by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Article V NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. (a) A candidate for state office shall request the endorsement of her chapter, taken by vote at a regular meeting of the chapter held between May and January preceding the State Conference at which state elections are held. The endorsement, signed by the Chapter Recording Secretary, shall include the office the candidate seeks and shall be received by the State Regent with the candidate's statement of intent to be a candidate prior to any announcement or campaigning by the candidate and/or her supporters.

(b) A candidate for State Regent who wishes to present a slate of officers shall send to the State Regent in one packet the chapter endorsements and the statements of intent for each of her selected candidates. If received by the State Regent no later than December 1, these candidates shall be listed as a slate in the State Regent's December letter and Call to State Conference.

(c) Candidates wishing to run independently of a slate, whose chapter endorsements and statements of intent are received by the State Regent no later than December 1 shall be listed as independent candidates in the State Regent's December letter and Call to State Conference.

(d) A candidate whose chapter endorsement and statement of intent have been properly received by the State Regent may choose to announce her candidacy separate from the State Regent's December letter and Call to State Conference. Such a chapter endorsement and statement of intent shall be received by the State Regent at least ten (10) days prior to the opening of the State Conference at which the election is to take place.

(e) A candidate who does not meet the requirements of these Bylaws shall be declared disqualified and ineligible for consideration for state office.

(f) A chapter shall endorse no more than one chapter member for state office per election with the possible exception of candidates for State Regent and for State Corresponding Secretary.

(g) In the event of the death, incapacitation or withdrawal of a candidate prior to the election, a replacement shall be made with notification in writing to the State Regent and accompanied by the chapter endorsement and statement of intent as directed by these Bylaws.

Section 2. Nominations of candidates for all state offices shall be made at a designated meeting of the State Conference.

Section 3. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected biennially by ballot at the State Conference. A majority vote shall elect.

Section 4. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two (2) years or until their successors are elected. Their terms of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Section 5. (a) Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become State Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become State First Vice Regent subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. Vacancies in other state offices shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next State Board of Management meeting or State Conference, whichever shall come first.

(b) Any state officer who is absent from the state for a continuous period of six (6) months or longer shall automatically relinquish her position as a state officer.

Section 6. Upon the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Organizing Secretary General.

Section 7. (a) A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot.

(b) The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than fifteen (15) months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

(c) The endorsement shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent with the candidate's name and address to the Recording Secretary General to be received by April 1 preceding the designated Continental Congress.

Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall perform the duties prescribed in this article, and parliamentary authority adopted by the Society, and such others as the State Board of Management and the National Society may require.

Section 2. The State Regent shall:

(a) be the chief executive officer and the official spokesman for the State Society;

(b) have general supervision of the affairs of the State Society;

(c) preside at all meetings of the State Conference, State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;

(d) appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society;

(e) be ex-officio a member of all committees;

(f) appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as advisor in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting;

(g) sign all contracts and agreements made in the name of the Georgia State Society with the recorded approval of the Executive Committee and the State Board of Management or the State Conference as directed by these Bylaws;

(h) be bonded and have the authority to draw upon funds of the State Society with the approval of the Finance Committee.

(i) recommend to the Finance Committee a Certified Public Accountant who shall be approved by the Finance Committee.

Section 3. The State First Vice Regent shall:

(a) perform the duties of the office of State Regent in the absence or inability of the State Regent;

(b) fill a vacancy in the office of State Regent;

(c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;

(d) serve on those committees as designated by these Bylaws and as directed by the State Regent.

Section 4. The State Second Vice Regent shall:

(a) perform the duties of the office of State First Vice Regent in the absence or inability of the State First Vice Regent;

(b) fill a vacancy in the office of State First Vice Regent;

(c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;

(d) serve on committees as directed by the State Regent.

Section 5. The State Chaplain shall:

(a) open all meetings of the State Conference and the State Board of Management with scripture reading and prayer;

(b) preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and conduct such other religious services as may be required;

(c) be custodian of state properties pertaining to the duties of this office;

(d) be responsible for IN MEMORIAM pages in the Proceedings.

Section 6. The State Recording Secretary shall:

- (a) record the proceedings of the meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;
- (b) compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and the Proceedings Committee;
- (c) submit to the appropriate National officers, the endorsement for Vice President General and the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent before April 1 of the year in which said balloting was held;

Section 7. The State Corresponding Secretary shall:

- (a) conduct correspondence and send notices on behalf of the State Regent, the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as may be directed by them;
- (b) receive from the chapters the consolidated reports and distribute to the appropriate state chairmen.

Section 8. The State Organizing Secretary shall:

- (a) assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new chapters;
- (b) assist chapters in conjunction with appropriate state officers and chairmen in revitalization.

Section 9. The State Treasurer shall:

- (a) be bonded;
- (b) be the custodian of the funds of the State Society, placing them in institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance;
- (c) receive the state dues and State Conference registration fees from the chapters and receive all sums contributed by the chapters for state and national projects, disbursing monthly to the Treasurer General all funds designated for national projects;
- (d) disburse other funds only when authorized by the State Regent in writing;
- (e) keep an account of all sums received or disbursed by using the basic double entry form of bookkeeping according to accepted accounting procedures and keep receipts for all transactions;
- (f) prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference, sending a copy to the State Chairman of the Finance Committee ten (10) days in advance of each meeting;
- (g) be a member of the Finance Committee and an ex-officio member of the Credentials Committee;
- (h) balance and prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year; said audit by a Certified Public Accountant, shall be performed and delivered within forty-five (45) days of receipt of books.

Section 10. The State Registrar shall:

- (a) when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American revolution prove eligibility and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars ;
- (b) keep a correct list of all members in the state;
- (c) report on membership to the State Conference;
- (d) be in possession of the computer and software owned by the Georgia State Society and see that it is maintained.

Section 11. The State Historian shall:

- (a) be in charge, within the state, of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General as well as those authorized by the Georgia State Society;
- (b) keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves within the state;
- (c) prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General;
- (d) promote the study of American history, state and county history and historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the founding of our state and counties.

Section 12. The State Librarian shall:

(a) serve as liaison between the Librarian General and the Georgia Chapters and disseminate general information on the NSDAR Library;

(b) cooperate with the director of the Georgia Department of Archives and History, making the needs of the Archives known to the chapters;

(c) collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing them wherever accepted in such libraries and Archives as may be chosen by the State Board of Management;

(d) solicit, with the approval of the Executive Committee, contributions from the chapters for purchase of such books as requested by the office of the Librarian General, and/or the various libraries in Georgia which the State Society approves;

(e) receive gifts of books and other printed material from the chapters to be donated to the approved libraries and Archives;

(f) maintain a constant supply of bookplates to the NSDAR Library, the Georgia Department of Archives and History and for purchase by the chapters.

Section 13. The State Curator shall:

(a) receive and be responsible for all gifts of Revolutionary relics to the Museum of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution;

(b) be custodian of the State properties and shall have them properly stored and made ready for use at state meetings.

Section 14. All officers will keep a Procedure Book of Instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new officers to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. State Conference:

(a) The annual meeting of the Georgia State Society shall be known as the State Conference. It shall be for the purpose of:

(1) receiving reports of officers, committees and Chapter Regents;

(2) electing officers biennially;

(3) promoting programs in furtherance of the objects of the Society;

(4) any other business that may arise:

i. annual budget shall be adopted,

ii. all projects of the State Society requiring funding shall be voted upon at State Conference or ratified by members at State Conference if previously voted upon by the State Board of Management,

iii. no project extending beyond the term of the presiding officer may be accepted at any meeting other than by vote at State Conference.

(b) The State Conference will be held between February 1 and the time of the meeting of Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week;

(c) The State Regent shall fix the time and place of meetings;

(d) The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credentials form to the chapters not less than sixty (60) days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 2. The voting members of the State Conference shall be:

(a) the officers and Honorary State Regents of the State Society;

(b) the officers and honorary officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state;

(c) the Chapter Regent, or in her absence, the Vice Regent or alternate of each chapter;

(d) delegates or alternates of each chapter of the state as designated by the Bylaws of the National Society for representation at Continental Congress;

(e) one additional delegate from each chapter in the state.

Section 3. Only a chapter member in good standing whose credentials have been completed in accordance with the instructions of the State Regent and the State

Credentials Chairman for the State Conference and in accordance with the Standing Rules of the National Society shall be eligible to represent her chapter at state and national meetings.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the chapter, except in the case of the Regent or Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at an annual State Conference, shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the state of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference the privilege of the floor shall be accorded to the State Chairmen. They may not vote unless they are duly registered as voters of the State Conference.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Society may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen (15) days' notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Forty-five (45) voting members, representing not less than twenty (20) chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The state officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents and the Regents, or in their absence, the Vice Regents of the chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the fall, following the October meeting of the National Board. It may meet whenever called by the State Regent. A minimum of twenty (20) days' notice shall be given as to the time and place of any such meeting.

Section 3. Thirty (30) members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference or as proscribed by these Bylaws.

Section 5. State chairmen, vice chairmen, committee members of the National and Standing Committees and one (1) member from each chapter shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privilege of the floor, but may not vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article IX EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, shall attend the meetings, but may not vote.

Section 3. This Executive Committee shall:

(a) perform such duties of the State Board of Management between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient;

(b) meet at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three (3) members of the committee;

- (c) vote by teleconference if necessary;
 - (d) receive and make recommendations for projects requiring expenditure of funds outside routine expenditures to be considered by the State Conference;
 - (e) make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.
- Section 4. Decisions of the Executive Committee shall be acted upon at the next meeting of the State Board of Management or at State Conference, whichever shall come first.

Article X FINANCES

Section 1. (a) The fiscal year of the Georgia State Society shall be May 1 through the last day of April.

(b) The annual budget, prepared by the Finance Committee, shall cover the fiscal year and be prepared on the basis of dues payable for the calendar year beginning December first preceding.

Section 2. (a) The annual dues of chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be \$5.00 for each member of the chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1.

(b) The Finance Committee shall determine the per capita amount and distribution according to the annual membership count. The per capita amount and distribution shall be indicated on the budget presented annually.

Section 3. (a) Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the state dues, a conference registration fee of five dollars (\$5.00) for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under these Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether chapter is represented or not.

(b) State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the five dollars (\$5.00) conference fee at the time of registration.

(c) Other members of the Georgia State Society who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay three dollars (\$3.00) conference fee at the time of registration.

Section 4. (a) The State Treasurer and the State Regent and such others entrusted with funds of the Georgia State Society as may be designated by the State Board of Management shall be bonded. (See Article VI, Sections 2 and 9);

(b) The State Treasurer with the approval of the State Regent and the State Chairman of the Finance Committee shall place the funds of the Georgia State Society in financial institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage;

(c) The placement of restricted savings funds and investment funds of the Georgia State Society shall be placed to the credit of the Georgia State Society by the State Treasurer under the direction of the Finance Committee. Monies may be invested in U. S. Treasury obligations or other interest bearing obligations of federally insured financial institutions;

(d) The accounts of the State Treasurer shall be annually prepared for audit by a Certified Public Accountant immediately following the end of the State Society fiscal year and no later than May 15 and delivered to the CPA by that date;

(e) Should the State Treasurer be incapacitated, the State Regent, after consultation with the Chairman of the Finance Committee and with the approval of the Executive Committee, shall appoint an Acting State Treasurer to serve until such time as the State Treasurer is able to resume her duties or a new State Treasurer is appointed and ratified as stated in Article V, Section 5 (a).

Section 5. The expenses incurred by the State Regent in the performance of duty shall be paid each year from the State Dues Fund:

(a) Four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00) shall be taken each year to defray her necessary travel expenses;

(b) Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent, as budgeted, shall be paid by the State Treasurer who shall keep all receipts of these expenses. No expenses exceeding the budgeted amount shall be paid by the State Treasurer.

Section 6. At the close of the books annually, \$3,000.00 shall be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies Fund" so that at the end of each administration a total of \$6,000.00 will be reserved. This money is to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration.

Article XI COMMITTEES

Section 1. The State Regent shall appoint the following standing committees:

(a) Bylaws: An Honorary State Regent shall be appointed as chairman and the committee shall be composed of two (2) other Honorary State Regents and one (1) member from each district;

(b) Finance: This committee shall be composed of seven (7) members to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two (2) Honorary State Regents, one (1) active chapter regent and one (1) active chapter member. One of the two Honorary State Regents shall be appointed chairman. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund. This committee shall have charge of all investments of the Georgia State Society funds.

(c) Resolutions: This committee shall be composed of all Honorary State Regents, the State Parliamentarian and three (3) chapter members;

(d) Proceedings: This committee shall be composed of the State Recording Secretary, the immediate past State Recording Secretary, State First Vice Regent and four (4) additional Daughters, at least one of whom shall be an Honorary State Regent.

Section 2. The State Regent shall appoint such other committees, standing or special, as the State Conference shall authorize and actions of the State Board of Management and of the National Society shall require. The appointments shall be concurrent with the term of the State Regent making the appointments and shall terminate with the end of the administration.

Section 3. No additional appointments to any of the committees shall be made after the roster of chairmen and committees has been compiled and sent to the chapters. Vacancies shall be filled by the State Regent with timely notification to the membership.

Section 4. The duties of committees shall be such as these Bylaws, the State Conference, the State Board of Management or the National Society shall prescribe.

Section 5. All chairmen will keep a Procedure Book of instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

ARTICLE XII CHAPTERS

Section 1. To expedite the work of the Society, the chapters of the Georgia State Society shall be placed in geographical districts:

(a) A chairman appointed by the State Regent shall coordinate the work of all chapters as needed; she shall be titled "Coordinator of Districts";

(b) Each district shall have a Director appointed by the State Regent to work as a committee under the direction and supervision of the Coordinator of Districts and the State Regent.

Section 2. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April in the year of chapter elections. The Chapter Regent shall report annually the names of the elected officers promptly on the form provided by the State Regent for this purpose, with copies to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, and the State Recording Secretary.

Section 3. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent, the State Recording Secretary, and the District Director by February 1.

Article XIII
MEADOW GARDEN MUSEUM

Meadow Garden, property owned by the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, shall be operated as follows:

(a) The governing body shall be the Board of Trustees composed of the following members: the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Chairman who shall be appointed by the State Regent;

(b) The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the following members: the State Regent who shall serve as Chairman; the State First Vice Regent who shall serve as Secretary; the Chairman of Meadow Garden; the Regents of the Augusta and College Hill Chapters; the State Treasurer; and the chairmen of the five (5) subcommittees appointed by the State Regent; Docents, Furnishings, Landscaping, Museum Shop, Patrons;

(c) The Meadow Garden Board shall operate with Standing Rules approved by the State Conference.

Article XIV
RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. The current edition of "Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised," shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law in matters not covered by these Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

Article XV
AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent, the State Parliamentarian, and the State Bylaws Chairman. The State Regent shall send a copy to each chapter, at least sixty (60) days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the Call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

Article XVI
DISSOLUTION

Although the period of duration of the Georgia State Society is perpetual, if for any reason the State Society is to be dissolved or otherwise terminated, no part of the property of the Society or any of the proceeds shall be distributed to or inure to the benefit of any of the officers or members of the Society. Upon the dissolution of the Georgia State Society, assets shall be distributed by the Board of Management and/ or the Executive Committee to and only to the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the local United States District Court, exclusively to such organization or organizations as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated within the meaning of section 501 (c)(3), with purposes and objectives consistent with those of the Georgia State Society.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21.) No Conference was held in 1911; the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P.W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912"; amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, p. 211.)

The dates and places of meeting and the numerical designations of the Conferences after the First Annual Conference (1899) were as follows: (2) Atlanta, November 27-28, 1900. (3) Augusta, November 21-22, 1901. (4) Savannah, November 13-14-15, 1902. (5) Atlanta, November 5-6-7, 1903. (6) Athens, November 9-10-11, 1904. (7) Macon, November 16-17-18, 1905. This does not alter the requirement in the "Items of Information" in the Proceedings that all reports shall be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary on or before February 15, the ORIGINAL being sent to the Secretary for the Proceedings.

AND FURTHER RESOLVED: This policy will be strictly adhered to and the material not received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1 will be omitted from the Proceedings.

Notice of change of address of members shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent and the State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHANGE OF NAME

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent and the State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHAPTER ELECTIONS

As soon as chapter elections are held, names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, 1776 D Street, NW, Washington, D.C. 20006-5392, the State Regent or the State Regent-Elect, the State Recording Secretary and the State Corresponding Secretary by May 1. The full Christian name of chapter officers shall be given, along with her husband's given name or initials, address, zip code and telephone number. In accordance with the National Bylaws, a Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years.

CHAPTER REPRESENTATION AT STATE AND NATIONAL MEETINGS

At the State Board of Management, a chapter is represented by the Chapter Regent, or in her absence by the First Vice Regent, and one non-voting member.

The voting representation of each chapter at the State Conference shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received by the State Treasurer **by December 1**. Membership less than 50: Regent, 1 Delegate, 4 Alternates, total votes 2; 50-199: Regent, 2 Delegates, 6 Alternates, total votes 3; 200-299: Regent, 3 Delegates, 8 Alternates, total votes 4; 300-399: Regent, 4 Delegates, 10 Alternates, total votes 5.

The voting representation of each chapter at Continental Congress shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received in the Office of the Treasurer General **by December 1**. Membership less than 50: Regent, 0 Delegate, 2 Alternates, total votes 1; 50-199: Regent, 1 Delegate, 4 Alternates, total votes 2; 200-299: Regent, 2 Delegates, 6 Alternates, total votes 3; 300-399: Regent, 3 Delegates, 8 Alternates, total votes 4.

CONFERENCE REGISTRATION FEE

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer with the state dues on or before December 1, \$5.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether represented or not.

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$5.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters, shall pay a \$3.00 Conference fee at the time of registration.

CONTRIBUTIONS

All contributions by chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

DATE FOR ANNUAL AUDIT

WHEREAS, every effort must be made to have all material to the printer as early as possible, to facilitate delivery of the Proceedings to the members.

RESOLVED: That the end of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, fiscal year for audit purposes be changed from May 31 to April 30.

DECEASED MEMBERS

Deaths shall be reported promptly to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Chaplain and the State Registrar by the corresponding Chapter officer. Complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and date of death shall be furnished to the State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for Conference Memorial Service and for State Proceedings.

DUES

Before December 1 the Chapter Treasurer sends to the State Treasurer state dues of \$5.00 per member. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the December through April Board meetings of the National Society.

Before December 1 the Chapter Treasurer sends to the office of Organizing Secretary General National dues of \$25.00 per member, with check made payable to the Treasurer General, NSDAR.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS

To insure uniformity and convenience in binding, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, 8 1/2 x 11 inches, with 1 1/2 inches from top of page, 1 1/2 to 2 inches on left side, 1 inch on right side and at bottom. Four copies shall be sent to the State Chairman of Genealogical Records. The booklet, "Instructions for Copying Source Records and Their Preparation for Library Use," should be obtained from the office of the Corresponding Secretary General.

GEORGIA HOSPITALITY FUND

The following resolution appears in the Proceedings for 1955 and was amended in 2001:

WHEREAS, the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds a social event in Washington during Continental Congress which necessities expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$500.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this fund shall not be cumulative.

For the entire resolution setting up the "General New Regime Fund Balance of \$2,500.00," found on pages 203-204 of the 1979 Proceedings, the following substitute resolution was adopted by the 88th State Conference:

RESOLVED, that at the end of each administration \$6,000.00 be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies Fund," this money to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration, and to pay initial operating cost of the new administration. All other surplus monies in the General Fund, other than funds which are designated, are to be divided equally between the General Savings Account and the Georgia State Society Endowment Fund.

This transaction is to be handled by April 30 every two years, before the auditors close out the books of an administration, thus making the General Fund show the same balance of \$6,000.00 at the beginning of each new administration. This fund is to be known as "New Administration Reserve for Contingencies Fund."

REAFFIRMATION

RESOLVED, that the Georgia State Society reaffirm the following resolution, "Presentation of Awards," adopted at the State Board of Management in Albany, October 23, 1968, which reads as follows:

WHEREAS, all awards are given by State Officers and State Chairmen; and,

WHEREAS, February 1 is the closing date of all work for said awards;



Miss Paige Lee Rohe was installed at Mount Vernon as State President during the 2000 Annual Convention, and Dr. Linda O. Harvey was installed as Senior State President. Mr. Andy Stancil, Honorary State President and Immediate Past Southeast Regional Vice President was installed as Second Vice President of the National Society. The State President's theme was "Conserve and

Restore the Spirit of America.” She chose to raise funds toward the restoration of the Old State Capitol Building in Milledgeville. Golf tournaments were set up for adults and Pee Wee Patriots. Tee shirts and stationery were designed for sale. A total of \$2745 was raised. Miss Rohe presented the restoration officials with \$2000 at Sukey Hart Society’s (Nancy Hart Chapter DAR) Membership Tea. The Southeastern Regional C.A.R. meeting was held in Asheville, NC and was attended by seven members and ten seniors. Miss Sydney McRee paged and Master Kevin Baker served as an aide. G.S.C.A.R.’s State Workshop was sponsored by the Button Gwinnett Society (Augustin Clayton Chapter DAR) and was held on a blustery July day at the Baker home in Hampton. Skits were presented to share information about the object of the national committees. Members cooled off with a pool party. The State President participated in SAR and DAR grave marking events throughout the year by laying eight wreaths on Revolutionary soldiers’ final resting sites. In October, the “Old Capitol Restoration” group was joined by C.A.R. members, Governor Roy Barnes, the French Consul, and others as they reenacted a visit to the site of a Revolutionary soldier, the Marquis de La Fayette. The costumed participants enjoyed the heated event and look forward to future reenactments. Government Studies seminar, chaired by Miss Meredith Barker of Button Gwinnett Society, was sponsored by the Allen Howard Society (Atlanta Chapter SAR) and held at the Women’s Seminary in Lawrenceville on Veteran’s Day November 11. The speaker was from the Augustin Clayton DAR Chapter and she blended two themes, the 56 Signers of the Declaration of Independence and remembrance of veterans’ contributions. In November, Miss Rohe was presented as a debutante at the Patomac: Ball sponsored by the Washington, DC, SAR chapters. Our 62nd State Conference was held in Alpharetta at the Hilton Garden Inn on February 16-17 sponsored by the Sons and Daughters of Liberty Society (Atlanta Chapter DAR). The Outstanding Senior was Mrs. Mary Elizabeth King Jackson. Recognized for General Excellence was the Dutton Gwinnett Society. The Outstanding Society was Sons and Daughters of Liberty.
