The Minutes of the April 1, 2005 meeting were approved via email and will be printed in the 2005 Proceedings.

The **Chaplain** reported 61 deaths since State Conference. Birthday cards have been mailed to 90 and greater chapter members. Four Regent's Baskets were prepared for the Basket Fling. These baskets contain DAR informational material and eligibility for the drawing will be limited to chapter regents or the regent's representative in each district.

The **Recording Secretary** reported that the proofs of the Proceedings have been proof read and returned to the printer. Upon receipt of the audit the printer will proceed with publication. Thanks were expressed to Dr. Linda O. Harvey, Chairman, Proceedings Committee for her dedication and untiring efforts in proofing the drafts of the book.

The **Corresponding Secretary** reported preparation and mailing of the State Regent's letter #4 and the development of a new, updated State Directory, which was provided to each officer. New Protocol Books have also been prepared and are available at the State Literature table. Those wishing to add information to the Master Questionnaire should submit to her as soon as possible.

The State Regent expressed thanks to the Corresponding Secretary for her assistance in preparation of the Regent's statistical report for the National Proceedings.

The **Organizing Secretary** thanked all who supported the Junior Luncheon at Continental Congress. Mrs. McCorkle advised that interest has been expressed in organizing a chapter targeted toward young, working women in the northeast part of the state. The financial report was filed. The Treasurer reported that five chapters have not yet completed their Chapter Financial Report which is required by the IRS. Noncompliance with this requirement jeopardizes both state and national DAR tax exempt status.

The **Registrar** reported that she had received and posted changes to the Georgia Database from Chapter Registrars and all changes from National Boards of Management. A chapter analysis which gives current figures for the 110 chapters has also been developed.

The **State Regent** initiated a discussion relative to the number of copies of the 2006 Membership Book that should be printed. It was the consensus of the committee to print 500 copies.

The **Historian** reported contact with chapters regarding grave markings and historic site markings. The graves of 18 members have been marked since January.

The **Librarian** expressed thanks for the many expressions of concern during her daughter's accident and surgery. Twenty-three volumes have been accepted by the NSDAR Library, in addition to the 15 volumes purchased with the \$500 state donation. Requests to donate at least fifty additional volumes have been submitted and are pending approval. The NSDAR Library Wish List is now located under Announcements on the website.

The **Curator** reported replacement of all Georgia flags: three at National, one at KDS, one at Meadow Garden and the State Society. A new DAR Banner has been purchased for the State Society and Meadow Garden and fringe added. All properties of the State Society are in proper working order.

The **State Regent** reminded the committee to make hotel reservations for State Board of Management, to be held November 4-5, 2005, at the Holiday Inn and Suites, 203 Newgate Road, Peachtree City.

The Executive Committee expressed appreciation to the State Regent for her service, dedication and leadership to the Georgia State Society.

Mrs. Keller moved that a picture of the State Regent be placed in the 2006 Membership Book. Motion seconded and adopted.

She expressed thanks to the Martha Stewart Bulloch, Nancy Hart, Colonel Daniel Appling and Tallassee Chapters for their amazing work and wonderful hospitality at the workshops. Mrs. Whitson stated that since the "Basket Fling" was such a wonderful success at the workshops, the fund raiser will be repeated, on an optional participation basis, at the State Conference. The money raised will go to cover the cost of the audit with surplus funds going to Meadow Garden Maintenance. Mrs. Whitson expressed thanks for the generosity all have shown to Meadow Garden. She stated that through generous giving, the challenge has been met to complete the Heritage Education Center; replaced the heating/air system, put in a brick handicapped parking area and walk, purchased a dust buster, microwave, and are now working toward replacing the cedar shake shingle roof. She thanked the State Officers for spear-heading the campaign with the roof pins. Mrs. Whitson expressed gratitude for having the privilege of representing the Georgia State Society at other state conferences and various meetings and most especially visiting the chapters. She then thanked Laura Reid for representing the State Society and dedicating the gifts at Kate Duncan Smith DAR School. She expressed pride in having the name of the Georgia State Society on a log at Becker Hall and seeing the progress of the renovation of the high school library. The \$100,000.00 mark on the Endowment Fund for the Auditorium/Gymnasium at Tamassee has been exceeded and work towards new stage curtains is in progress. She noted that the summer weather and rains caused some damage to the interior walls of the auditorium which need attention and that the worshippers at the Berry Chapel are enjoying the new hymnals purchased by the Georgia State Society. New Georgia State Flags have been purchased as the State Regent's project with the remaining funds being put into the McCall Genealogical Binding Fund.

The visiting state regents at the 2006 State Conference will be from Alabama, California, Oregon and Texas. Special guest will be Gale Jones Fixmer, First Vice President General, who will be the opening night speaker.

Mrs. Whitson shared the following items from the National Board of Management: Destroy all old forms and letters and use only those from the 2005-06 national and state packets for reporting. Most can be downloaded either from the national or state members only website. The National Society has hired 11 full-time and three part-time people to work on the back log of supplementals. Application papers must be typed or computer generated. Handwritten papers will be returned. The fee for new applications is \$105.00. The booklet for Chapter Treasurers and Chapter Registrars which is no longer being printed can be downloaded from the national website. It is no longer being printed, nor is the Protocol booklet. The Georgia Protocol booklet titled Parliamentary Procedure, Protocol and Popular Traditions in Georgia DAR is available. Thanks to Carolyn Grant Hanf and her committee for the revision of this booklet. For the Katrina victims in Louisiana and Mississippi, there is still no mail service to certain zip codes; therefore, those desiring to do so may "adopt a daughter" and pay her national dues. The American Spirit Magazine may be renewed online with credit card. Thrift is no longer being accepted at Bacone College. The Valley Forge Bell Tower fund raiser has ended, but Caldwell still has a number of pins. Donations in the amount of \$100 are being accepted on a first come, first serve basis for the pins until January 15. Donations should be made through the NSDAR Development Office. The only changes that can be made through e-membership are address changes. All other changes must be directed to the Organizing Secretary General's Office, Membership Services. Deaths cannot be recorded on e-membership. The crystal finials on the staircases in Memorial Continental Hall have been copied in miniature and are for sale in the DAR Store and Museum Shop for \$95.00. DAR application record copies may now be downloaded in the DAR Library for \$10.00. This must be done on site. In an effort to reduce the number of phone calls to the National Society, it is requested that inquiries be made through the chapter regent, state officer or state chairman before calling headquarters. The President General, Presley Merritt Wagoner, will be inducted into the Brenau University Hall of Fame on November 14. The Office of the Historian General has requested a listing of all properties owned, past and present, by chapters and state societies. The information reported must include what the property is, where it is located, a description and a photo if possible, when it was acquired, how it is used and if sold, when it was sold.

She graciously expressed thanks to all for doing their job so efficiently. She praised the members for their big hearts and dedication.

State First Vice Regent, Laura Reid, reported the following: attended a wreath laying ceremony in observance of Georgia Patriots' Day in St. Simons, presented a program to the Sergeant Newton Chapter, attended Kate Duncan Smith DAR School Graduation, participated in a historic marker dedication sponsored by the Bonaventure Chapter, attended 114th Continental Congress, made arrangements for the Georgia Luncheon and coordinated the Georgia Box hostess schedule. She attended the Meadow Garden Board meetings serving as Secretary and Trustee. Participated in all four District Workshops, attended Constitution Week Luncheon in Atlanta and the Cameo Society Luncheon in Plains. Also attended a meeting with the Accountant and traveled to Tamassee for the Advisory Board Meeting. She represented the State Regent at Kate Duncan Smith DAR School and presented gifts from the Georgia Daughters. Also attended KDS Finance Committee Meeting and Open Board of Management and prepared Courtesy Resolutions for State Board of Management.

State Second Vice Regent and DAR School State Chairman, Barbara Chastain, reported attending the Kate Duncan Smith DAR School Dedication Day. She reported on the Christmas card project at Crossnore School and discussed requirements for the Hightower Award, and encouraged contributions to the State Regent's projects at the schools.

State Chaplain, Sally Baldwin, reported mailing birthday cards to members 90 years of age and older and sympathy cards to the family members of 105 deceased members. Invitations are being issued to participants in the 2006 Memorial Service.

State Recording Secretary, Virginia Lingelbach, reported that the 2004-2005 Proceedings have been published and are being distributed at this meeting, extra copies are

available for \$15.00 each. Thanks were expressed to Linda Harvey for her untiring efforts and watchful eye in proofing and editing the book. Additional information was given relative to reporting requirements for chapter regents and chairmen.

State Corresponding Secretary, Mary Elizabeth Jackson, reported the State Regent's letter #5 was mailed, addresses and e-mail corrections have been processed. The 2005-06 Master Questionnaire was prepared and is distributed at this meeting. This officer assisted the State Treasurer in e-mailing all chapter treasurers regarding payment of state dues and availability of Treasurer forms on the Members Only Website. Reminders were e-mailed to chapter regents regarding the State Board of Management Meeting. A list of "updates" was prepared and distributed with the 2004-05 Proceedings.

State Organizing Secretary, O. B. McCorkle, reported attending Continental Congress, summer workshops, and giving programs at two chapter meetings. Discussions have been held with several Georgia daughters regarding interest in organizing new chapters in the state.

State Treasurer, Joyce Patton, gave the following summary of accounts for the Georgia State Society as of October 21, 2005: checking account balance \$27,687.12; money market balance \$65,651.29; and certificates of deposit balance \$35,816.36; making total assets of \$129,154.77. The statement of assets and fund balances for Meadow Garden was also presented.

State Registrar, Jackie Keller, reported 294 new members as of November 4, 2005, bringing membership in the Georgia State Society to 6,927. She stated work is continuing on the 2006 Membership Roll and Register of Ancestors Book.

State Historian, Joan Millar, reported attending Continental Congress and two summer workshops. She stated that letters were sent to the four districts for the summer packets and gave a reminder that she must receive applications for Outstanding Teacher of American History contest by December 1, 2005.

State Librarian and DAR Library State Chairman, Rena Setters, thanked all for their generosity to the DAR Library. As of September, 62 volumes had been donated to the library this year. Donations may be made through the member website or by contributing to the Friends of the Library or Library Life Member funds. She announced that she, and the Women's Issues Chairman and Volunteer Information Specialists Chairman would conduct a DAR Website usage workshop at state conference.

State Curator, Betty Samaras, reported that all equipment including the insignia, flags, banner, ballot box, time clock and bell are ready when needed.

State Parliamentarian, Dorothy Hoff, reported that she will soon be mailing information relative to updating bylaws.

Reports continued: **Chapter Achievement**, Barbara Bolen Florence, announced that Georgia had the first and fourth highest scores in the National Society this year. She explained how to complete the form, gave helpful hints and offered to work with chapters to ensure proper completion. **Credentials**, Mary Simonds, reviewed the Credentials Form Instruction Sheet and State Conference Credentials Form and discussed the delegate and alternate eligibility to State Conference stressing the due date of February 1, 2006 with copies going to the State Credentials Chairman, State Treasurer, and State Regent. **Membership**, Phyllis Fox Lawson, gave information on the Membership Essay Contest and the Revitalization contest which is based on the chapter with the highest average percentage increase of members in attendance at chapter meetings; **State Honor Roll**, Ann Parker Parsons, reviewed the State Honor Roll Form and emphasized the deadline. E-mail reminders will be sent through February 15th. **Volunteer Information Specialists (VIS)**, Meloye G. Brown, reported that for purposes of the Master Questionnaire each chapter should report in the affirmative to the question concerning their chapter having a website. Further information was given on selection of the Outstanding VIS Volunteer.

Debutante should submit their names and they will be issued a formal invitation from the Georgia State Society to participate in the Debutante Presentation at State Conference; **Community Service Awards**, Judith Lillard Hughes, stated that all pertinent information is contained in her letter distributed in the Regent's packet at workshop or in the current Proceedings; **DAR Good Citizens**, Therry Deal, reported the good citizens pins are available. The deadline for entries to reach district vice chairmen is December 10, and only one entry is accepted from each chapter; **DAR Magazine**, Amy Rose Reece, reported that each chapter must contribute \$40.00 to either a co-op advertisement or individual chapter advertisement by April 1, 2006, in order to receive Chapter Achievement credit; **DAR Museum**, Joyce McIntyre Chadwick, explained the difference between the DAR Museum Docent, Trained DAR Correspondent Docent and Correspondent Docent In Training (CDIT) and the requirements for each; **DAR Scholarship**, Dianne Brown Cannestra, announced that she recently received notification that Georgia has a national scholarship winner this year. The recipient was sponsored by the Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter; **DAR Service for Veterans**, Patricia Mercer, expressed thanks for contributions to VA Centers in support of Hurricane Katrina. For those living near the Florida line, service to VA Centers in Florida will count toward Georgia; **Genealogical Records**, Linda Moore Hallman, reported that additional unpublished records as well as financial support are still needed. The deadline is January 1; **Indexing**, the State Regent reported she had received a letter from the National Society requesting that books being held by members for indexing in excess of six months be returned; **Junior Membership**, Ashley Towns Carter, reported on her activities both at the National and State levels. She requested quilt squares be submitted immediately and reminded everyone to give their chapter name when buying from the Junior Shoppe. She also stated the deadline to submit the chapter outstanding junior is December 6; **Lineage Research**, Joan Ketterbaugh Childres, reported that she continues to receive lookup requests and is currently working on completion of application papers returned by National for additional information; **National Defense**, Phyllis Johnson Tanner, clarified reporting requirements on Chapter Achievement for financial contributions to ROTC; **Volunteer Information Specialists**, Melodye Brown, reported on the Web Page, Georgia Home Page, and updated forms available for downloading; **DAR Project Patriot**, Paula Hannah Osborne, encouraged continued mailing of items in support of this project and stated that monetary donations are also appreciated; **DAR Speakers Staff**, Gwendolyn Meredith Martin, asked speakers staff members to report miles traveled and number in attendance for programs given and reports should reach her by February 1. Speakers Staff Booklets may be ordered for \$2.00; **Insignia**, Dorris Callahan Howell, stated she had given several programs on the correct placement of insignia and how it is earned. Packets containing information relative to the placement and disposal of insignia were provided to all Chapter Insignia Chairmen; **Literacy Challenge**, Bea Smith Fischer, reported all necessary information was in the Regent's Packet and she encouraged all members to participate in the contest for outstanding service for promoting literacy. Certificates and a monetary award will be given; **President General's Project**, Jean Manker, explained that in addition to monetary donations, volunteering time in support of the digitization of records is another way to support this project; **Women's Issues**, Carole Richard Thompson, announced that two Georgia Daughters won first place in the Southeast Division for their essay in the Health and Career categories; **Button Gwinnett Signature**, Vicky Haley Anderson, stated

there is no time limit on the eligibility to purchase a Button Gwinnett pin once the \$200 contribution is made. **Bylaws**, Lanette Haar Reid, reporting for Marjorie Young Garner, the Bylaws Committee met and reviewed two proposed amendments to the bylaws. These were determined to be worthy of consideration by the Georgia Daughters and will be sent out with the Call to Conference for voting at State Conference. One amendment pertains to the make up of the Meadow Garden Board and the other amendment pertains to an alternate audit method should the cost necessitate the need for this option; **Conference Pages**, Charlotte Christian, thanked chapters for sponsoring Pages and encouraged chapters to send in nominations for Pages by December 1. Recognized and thanked for paging at this meeting were: Laney Hunter, Molly Hunter and Sarah Dorney. **Coordinator of Districts**, Robin Towns, expressed congratulations to the Martha Stewart Bulloch, Nancy Hart, Colonel Daniel Appling and Tallassee Chapters for serving as the hostess chapters for the excellent summer workshops, and to the Augustin Clayton Chapter for planning and coordinating the State Board of Management. The District Directors were recognized and thanked for their detailed, efficient and effective planning; **Proceedings**, Linda Harvey, reported on the work of the Proceedings Committee and expressed appreciation to all who participated in the development of the Proceedings; **Travel Coordinator**, Becky Rostron, distributed printed information on the 2006 Georgia Bus to Continental Congress. Cost of the seven night package is \$859.00.

The State Regent continued with the reports of State Chairman of State Special Committees: **Meadow Garden**, Margaret Poole Cagle, reported that Meadow Garden would be on the Augusta Historic Candlelight Tour of historic places scheduled for Thanksgiving weekend. The Heritage Education Center is almost complete; **Meadow Garden Gift Shop**, Camille Baxter, encouraged purchases of Christmas gifts from the shop and thanked the daughters for their generosity resulting in workshop sales of \$1,717.25. **Press Book**, Brenda Davison Jessel, expressed thanks to the 42 chapters which have sent press book clippings and encouraged the remaining chapters to do so; **State Information Help Desk**, Jean Cole Manker, reported she has received and answered 293 requests for information from the Georgia Daughters. When this program was put in place, it gave us the ability to print up to the minute reports on all accounts, do monthly and yearly comparisons, and also give the CPA the ability to audit our financial records online. More than ninety percent of the small business in America use this program and also a high percentage of the NSDAR State Societies are utilizing this program. Another goal was to have a quarterly audit to identify any discrepancies within a four month period, rather than 13 months. The accounting firm of Hargrave and Freeman, P.C. was truly amazed at the size of the Georgia State Society and the amount of money and the number of funds that we control. Their comment was "this is a BIG business," and were very complimentary of all the former Treasurers. After the first full audit they have become more familiar with Georgia State Society DAR and all the funds and have agreed to go forward as our Accounting Firm. They also will file the quarterly and yearly payroll report along with the yearly Georgia Sales Tax Report. May 1st we will begin filing the payroll taxes electronically. There will be no cost to the Georgia State Society as this is a service the bank offers. The Georgia State Society has also earned interest on all checking accounts and RBC Centura has also been a generous donor to Meadow Garden. We also have the accessibility to check our accounts online. During the Whitson Administration, the Georgia Daughters have been very generous. In fact, we actually have a Meadow Garden Angel. I have also learned that when two people are praying for a specific need, prayers can be answered and it will bring such joy to your heart, reminding me of what my Mother often said to me, "Joyce, just have the faith of a mustard seed." STATE REGISTRAR - Jacqueline Lawrence Keller

Since our last State Conference, your State Registrar attended Continental Congress, served as a Workshop co-chairman at all four District Workshops and attended State Board of Management. The Official Membership Count for Georgia as of January 1, 2006 was 6,846. This does not include Members at Large. Official figures reported by the National Society were: New Members 360, Deceased 153, Resignation/Drops 350, Reinstatements 53, Transfers Out 98, and Transfers In 74. Eighty-nine per cent of our chapters sent in yearbooks, and 90 percent of the master Questionnaire reports were filled in. These reports indicate overwhelmingly the use of National Society information and computer resources of the National Society in working with applications and supplementals. Since its inception in October 2005, the Supplemental Task Force has reviewed an estimated 700 supplementals per month, verifying an average of 500 per month. This officer was happy to interact with many of our hard working chapter registrars during the year past, helping them solve problems with applications and supplementals. Up to date information was provided in letters from the Registrar General, and information the State Registrar gleaned from attending meetings at Continental Congress, in the form of Letters to Chapter Registrars. My hat is off to those chapter registrars already contacted, who have diligently

researched my multiple queries to acquire correct information for our Membership Roll and Register of Ancestors, due out in 2006. madam State Regent, thank you for this wonderful opportunity to learn more about our great organization and the honor of being a part of your Administration.

STATE HISTORIAN - Joan Phillips Millar

Since the last State Conference in 2005, your State Historian attended Continental Congress in July, three district meetings, and the Joseph Habersham tea honoring our State Regent and the new members of that chapter. During the past year, this officer spoke at one chapter meeting and ten additional programs were given. She has also followed up with Georgia Chapters regarding grave markings as requested by the Historian General. One hundred four Georgia chapters reported, and of those, sixty-four chapters participated in activities related to this officer's objectives. Ten chapters submitted a nominee for the Outstanding Teacher of American History Award. The State Winner was Mr. David Bradberry, sponsored by Augusta Chapter. Two chapters sponsored a nominee for the DAR History Award Medal. Thirty-five chapters marked graves, conducted wreath laying ceremonies, and held receptions to honor Revolutionary Soldiers. Fifty-two chapters contributed money to various funds, with Joseph Habersham, Augustin Clayton, and Fort Peachtree being the chapters which gave special gifts.

STATE LIBRARIAN - Rena Morgan Setters

For centuries, the written word has served to enlighten the world. Georgia Daughters should certainly be proud of their accomplishments in preserving that tradition. The work of the 105 Georgia Chapters who reported demonstrates a sincere dedication to this form of preservation. Twenty-seven volumes were donated through nineteen Chapters to the NSDAR Library. Kudos to the George Walton and Levi Sapp Chapters for sending the most books. An additional eleven volumes were placed in honor of our State Regent, Shelby Alderman Whitson, bringing the state's total for the calendar year 2005 to 38. In calendar year 2006, we're off to a great start with another twenty-seven volumes accepted by the National Library. Your financial contributions also excelled at every level, with \$1907 donated through Friends of the Library and \$474 in direct NSDAR Library contributions. Joseph Habersham Chapter casts a long shadow with donations in excess of \$7 per member, but Hawkinsville, Fielding Lewis, Trahlyta, Governor Josiah Tattnall, and Fort Peachtree followed closely behind, lighting the path in their respective categories. Governor David Emanuel, General James Jackson and Cherokee Chapters were the shining lights in support of the State Library Fund, whose total contributions were \$587. Even brighter was the light shone in your local communities. Three hundred sixty-eight volumes, valued in excess of \$2400, were donated to facilities throughout the state. Support of the Washington Memorial Library by the Mary Hammond Washington and Nathaniel Macon Chapters was exceptional. Additionally, \$675 was contributed to local facilities, and forty-two plus Daughters spent more than 1700 hours in service to libraries. We recognize the Sergeant Newton, John Benson, Metter and Nancy Hart Chapters for their significant local contributions. The Outstanding Service beacon for Friends of the Library shines on Sarah G. Fenner of the Tomochichi Chapter, who founded two Friends of the Library committees at facilities in Clarkesville and Cornelia, and who currently serves as Director of the Northeast Georgia Regional Library System. Georgia's generous and dedicated Daughters continue to shine the light of service on libraries across our State and in our National home. Men...and women... have certainly seen your good works! Madam State Regent, this officer is eternally grateful to you and each Georgia Daughter for your love and support, and rejoices in the honor of having served as the State's Librarian.



These financial statements are the responsibility of the Organization's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1, these financial statements were prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than U.S. generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the assets, liabilities and net assets of Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution as of June 30, 2006, and its related combined statement of revenues, expenses and other changes in net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended on the basis of accounting described in Note 1.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole. The accompanying schedules on pages 10 – 22 are presented for the purpose of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This summary of significant accounting policies of the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution is presented to assist in understanding the Organization's financial statements. The financial statements and notes are representations of the Organization's management who is responsible for their integrity and objectivity.

A. BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The financial statements of the Organization have been prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting. Accordingly, revenue is recorded when received rather than when earned and expenses are recorded when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred.

B. BASIS OF PRESENTATION

Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board in its Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, *Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations*. Under SFAS No. 117, the Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets.

C. CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

For purposes of the Statement of Cash Flows – Modified Cash Basis, the Organization considers all investments to be cash equivalents – See Note 2 Certificates of Deposit.

D. COLLECTIONS

Collection items acquired either through purchase or donation are not capitalized. Purchases of collection items are recorded as decreases in unrestricted net assets if purchased with unrestricted assets and as decreases in temporarily restricted or permanently restricted net assets if purchased with donor-restricted assets. Contributions of collection items are not recognized in the Statement of Revenue, Expenses and Other Changes in Net Assets – Modified Cash Basis. Proceeds from deaccessions or insurance recoveries are reflected on the Statement of Revenue, Expenses and Other Changes in Net Assets – Modified Cash Basis based on the absence or existence and nature of donor-imposed restrictions.

E. DONATED SERVICES

No amounts have been reflected in the financial statements for donated services; however, a number of unpaid volunteers have made contributions of their time to perform a variety of tasks that assist the Organization with specific assistance programs, campaign solicitations, and various committee assignments. If donated services received either created or enhanced non-financial assets or required specialized skills which would need to be purchased if not donated, the value of those donated services would be recorded in accordance with SFAS No. 116.

F. INCOME TAX STATUS

The Organization is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code. However, income from activities not directly related to the Organization's tax-exempt purpose is subject to taxation as unrelated business income. In addition, the Organization qualifies for the charitable contribution deduction under Section 170 (b) (1) (A) and has been classified as an organization other than a private foundation under Section 509 (a) (2).

G. NATURE OF ACTIVITIES

The Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution carries out programs in the state of Georgia designed for education, public awareness and preservation of the history and heritage of the United States of America.

II. PROPERTY AND EQUIPMENT

The Organization follows the policy of not capitalizing collections and historical treasures. Meadow Garden and its contents are historical treasures. The house and its contents are insured for approximately \$ 325,000. Office furniture and fixtures are insured for \$ 8,000. Major preservation or restoration projects are capitalized and depreciated over an estimated useful life of fifteen years. Additions and betterments of \$ 750 or more are capitalized, while maintenance and repairs that do not improve or extend the useful lives of the respective assets are expensed currently.

I. AFFILIATES

The Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution collects dues and donations from local Georgia Chapters for the Georgia State Society and donations for the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

NOTE 2: CERTIFICATES OF DEPOSIT

Certificates of deposit totaling \$ 357,472 are included in cash and cash equivalents in the accompanying financial statements. The certificates bear interest ranging from 2.43% to 3.47% and have maturities ranging from five to eighteen months, with penalties for early withdrawal. Any penalties for early withdrawal would not have a material effect on the financial statements.

NOTE 3: CONCENTRATIONS OF CREDIT RISK

The Organization maintains cash balances at several financial institutions located in Georgia. Accounts at each institution are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation up to \$100,000. At June 30, 2006, there are no uninsured cash balances.

National Committee Reports

AMERICAN HERITAGE – Martha Middlebrooks Knight

Seventy-five chapters reported programs, projects or contest entries this year. Fifty-three chapters had historic preservation programs or projects. Three chapters, Augustin Clayton, St. Andrews Parish and Nancy Hart, presented Historic Preservation Medals. One Binder titled, "Glenwood Cemetery – A Stroll Along Bethel" was entered in the Historic Preservation Contest. Fifty chapters had programs on Cultural Events and Traditions. Programs on holiday traditions such as food, decorations and music continue to be popular. Family heirlooms, women's apparel, significant historic persons and days were also presented. A "Love of Family" quilt was entered in the Cultural Events and Traditions contest. Thirteen Georgia Daughters from eight chapters submitted entries in the Quilter's S.O.S.: Save Our Stories – the quilt oral history project. Other contest entries were six fiber arts entries including an appliqué flag, a crocheted flag, a wall hanging, a doll, a quilt and a braided rug and three craft items; punched copper panels, collage/paper Mache item and a clay plate. An oil painting, a mural, a photographic entry and sculpture were entered in the Art and Sculpture category; four poems, one essay, two short stories and a drama in the Literature and Drama category

AMERICAN HISTORY – Betty Brown Harrah

Chapter Reports received from 104 chapters. American History Programs presented at 289 meetings; 151 programs in American History given to other groups. Outstanding women in America were the topics of 61 programs. Five chapters selected women for national project Outstanding Women in American History. Total displays 272: 174 in schools; 98 in other public places. American History Publicity included 205 spot announcements; 114 TV/radio minutes. Press inches including photographs totaled 2636. The essay American History Essay Contest, "Benjamin Franklin – More Than a Revolutionary" was conducted by 62 chapters in 196 schools with 4003 students participating. Certificates given for participation 3448, Certificates of Award presented 260; bronze medals awarded 135. Christopher Columbus essay contest had 240 students participating in 24 high schools with 98 certificates of Award given. Certificates given for outstanding work in American History totaled 330, including 75 bronze medals and 12 silver medals. I greatly commend my vice chairman committee, Nancy Gaston, Nancy Bowen, Sandra Keadle and Julia Spivey for their great work with the chapters. It has been an honor to serve our State Regent on this committee.

AMERICAN INDIANS – Carolyn Baker Balog

Contributions from eighty-two chapters to the American Indian Scholarship Fund totaled \$3,839.00. Sixteen chapters and individuals gave money to museums, health care foundations, hospitals, and schools for the benefit of Indians. One member spent a week in a Navajo village helping build and repair homes and schools. Members in nine chapters spent time working with American Indians in their community, donated books, and assisted American Indians with genealogy. Twenty-one chapters gave \$297.50 to Friends of the American Indians. Donations from eighty-four chapters to Bacone College totaled \$779.50, and from fifty-seven chapters, \$935.00 went to Chemewa. There were 4,401 soup labels and 3,500 drink tabs sent to the Indian schools. Thirty-nine Chapters contributed 2,541 Campbell's soup labels to Bacone College, and thirty-three chapters contributed 1,860 labels to Chemewa. One chapter contributed 2,000 drink tabs to Bacone and 1,500 to Chemewa. Chapters had programs on American Indians, supplied items for dorm rooms, sent Christmas gifts, and collected money in support of the Indian Schools. National American Indian Month was observed with proclamations, displays in public buildings and a letter was sent to the newspaper about the Code Talkers in World War II. Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure to serve you and the Georgia State Society.

AMERICANISM – Truth Ashby Gamblin

Only 105 chapters reported representing 6,788 members. Thirteen chapters used internet to access DAR Manuel for Citizenship 31 times. Four chapters referred naturalization applications to Manuel on-line. Patriotic materials were distributed to naturalization applicants: two US Flag pins; 25 bookmarks; 26 copies of American's Creed; 27 copies of Pledge to the US Flag. Patriotic materials were distributed to schools: 745 US Flags; 46 US Flag pins; 1,824 bookmarks; 584 copies of American's Creed; 632 copies of Pledge to the Flag of the United States of America. Sixty-nine members in ten chapters participated in ten naturalization ceremonies. Four chapters recommended an applicant to receive the DAR Medal of Honor: Fort Peachtree – Nicholas Dale Snider; Old Unicoi Trail – Ray E. Hamby; Philadelphia Winn – Terry E. Manning and Xavier – Isaac Harold Storey. Two chapters made recommendations for the Americanism Medal. Edmund Burke – Teresita Perez Smith and Fort Peachtree – Sunny K. Park. All medals were approved. Thirty chapters have Americanism chairman and 21 of them informed chapter of this committee's objectives. Thirty-nine chapters participated in troop support activities or pep rallies. Twenty-one chapters participated in military send off/welcome home events. Fifty-four chapters participated in community events/celebrations. Thirty chapters participated in parades.

CHAPTER ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS – Barbara Bolen Florence

The number one chapter in the State with 3,281 points is Joseph Habersham Chapter. The top five chapters in the State in Chapter Achievement recognition are: Joseph Habersham, Augustin Clayton, Fort Peachtree, Fielding Lewis, Martha Stewart Bulloch. The top five chapters in each category is as follows: Chapters 1-50, Etowah, Lt James Monroe, Fayette-Starr's Mill, Vidalia, Edmund Burke; Chapters 51-100, Brier Creek, Abraham Baldwin, Colonel John McIntosh, General Daniel Newnan, Philadelphia Winn; Chapters 101-150, Cherokee, Baron Dekalb, Mary Hammond Washington, Oglethorpe, Thronateeska; Chapters 200 plus, Augustin Clayton.

CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION – Frances Charlene Hall

The Georgia State C.A.R. Society set new standards of excellence under the outstanding leadership of Sydney Wynn McRee, State President, and the excellent DAR and S.A.R. leaders serving on the Senior Board and the talented C.A.R. members of the State Board of Management. We were delighted to see another solid net gain in membership for 2005. This State Chairman received twenty-nine positive reports from Georgia DAR Chapters, with many of those reporting having hands-on activity in the Georgia C.A.R. Societies. C.A.R. Societies are active through the leadership of General Daniel Newnan, George Walton, Nancy Hart, Augustin Clayton, Xavier, Sergeant Newton, Martha Stewart Bulloch, Philadelphia Winn, Sukey Hart, Bonaventure, Elijah Clarke, Fort Frederica, William Marsh, and Lt. James Monroe. Edmund Burke Chapter is forming a new society with fifteen papers on the way to Washington, and John Benson organized Savannah River Society this year. Augusta, John Houston, and Sweetwater are in the process of organizing societies. This year's State Project raised over \$11,000.00 for the Genealogy and Archives Room at the library in Macon. Access to pay vouchers and other documents will be utilized by DAR researchers for many years to come. Miss McRee's project has become a State Standing Committee, similar to our Meadow Garden and Battle of Kettle Creek Committees for C.A.R. members and seniors to continue to add to the collections of this room.

COMMUNITY SERVICE – Judith Lillard Hughes

The Community Service Award not only recognizes worthy citizens in our communities, but it gives each chapter an opportunity for publicity. Entries submitted between February 1, 2005 and January 31, 2006 count for 2005. The state outstanding recipient of the Community Service Award was submitted by the General Daniel Newnan Chapter. This chapter won first place in the Southeast District Division. Fifteen chapters submitted recommendations for the Community Service Award and they were forwarded to the Southeastern National Division Vice Chairman. She sent them to the National Chairman

for approval. Four chapters sent two each. The National Chairman returned one unapproved. Those submitting are: Augustin Clayton, Colonel Daniel Appling, Colonel William Candler (2), Commodore Oliver Bowen, Fayette-Starr's Mill (2), Fielding Lewis, Fort Peachtree, General Daniel Newnan, John Benson, LaGrange 92), Mary Hammond Washington, Nathaniel Macon, Sunbury, William McIntosh 92) and William Marsh. A total of 19 entries were sent from Georgia. I quote from a letter sent by the National Chairman, "The chapter regent or chairman should verify that the proposed nominee received no salary, reimbursement or other financial reward for the service provided." Thank you Madam State Regent for the opportunity to serve as chairman of this rewarding committee.

CONSERVATION – Mary Johnson McGuffey

Sixty chapters reported they are recycling, learning to conserve water, replanting Long Leaf Pine Forest, helping remove litter, caring for and maintain cemeteries and much more. Some chapters are allowing space in their Newsletters for a Conservation Tip corner. Arbor Day was observed by planting trees several of which were historic. Conservation programs were given at 23 meetings including "A Walk in the Honey Bee Colony." Three NSDAR Conservation Medals are to be awarded. Nineteen chapters shared Conservation Minutes using handouts, posters and allowed response time. Goals were set at the September meeting with members encouraged to help the chapter meet them. The most outstanding report was submitted by Augustin Clayton, second to Edmund Burke. Honorable mention to General Daniel Newnan, Brier Creek and Colonel William Candler. Thank you to all members for your hard work.

CONSTITUTION WEEK – Ruth Odom Reddick

This Chairman commends the ninety-nine chapters who reported a wide range of Constitution Week activities. Eighty-seven proclamations were obtained; 331 bells rung; 400 displays were placed; 273 church bulletins included announcements; 371 spot announcements aired on radio and TV; 35 editorial letters were written, and publicity totaled 1767 inches. Augustin Clayton Chapter placed Constitution Week signs on sixteen tractor trailers which traveled 166,692 miles through sixteen states. Fifty-four chapters included Constitution sidelights at meetings. The educational work reported was outstanding. Chapters visited schools, placed displays, donated books, distributed bookmarks and educational material, and sponsored patriotic programs and Constitution signings. Sixty-nine chapters held commemorative programs and events. A proclamation signed by Governor Sonny Perdue was presented at the Annual State Constitution Week Luncheon, where Mrs. Dorothy Olson, Director of the Georgia State Capitol Museum, spoke on Georgia's signers of the Constitution. The GSSAR Color Guard presented the colors, and Greetings were brought by Mrs. Shelby Whitson, State Regent; Mrs. Rosemary Hunter, National Constitution Week Chairman; Colonel George Thurmond, GSSAR State President, and Miss Sydney McRee, GSCAR State President. Madam State Regent, Dorris Howell, Jane Hampton, Eunice Carr, Mary Kate Tribble and I have appreciated the opportunity to serve on this committee.

DAR GOOD CITIZENS – Therry Nash Deal

One hundred four (104) chapters filed reports. Seventy-six chapters (69%) made a contact with 284 high schools; 20 were first time participants. Awards given to 224 participating seniors; 158 entered the essay contest; four district winners. Four additional chapters began a Good Citizen Outreach. Eighty-four new high schools contacted and 16 new schools giving the award. Four additional seniors wrote the essay. State winner, Lindsay Haines, sponsored by Fielding Lewis Chapter. Participating chapters presented the pin, certificate, wallet card set, and honored winners with teas, luncheons, and assemblies. Monetary gifts totaled \$8,255.00. Outstanding chapter award to Augusta Chapter; 100% of schools in Augusta (13) participated with awards (13). Baron DeKalb contacted the most schools (21). Ten chapters were recognized with awards for sustained participation: George Walton, John Laurens, Oglethorpe, Martha Stewart Bulloch, LaGrange, Elijah Clarke, General Daniel Newnan, Robert Loughridge, Levi Sapp and Old Unicoi Trail.

Fifteen Certificates of Appreciation for contacting new high schools. Largest dollar amount award to Colonel John McIntosh. District Vice Chairman, Susan Leneaus, Carol Ann Morrison, Mary Jon Shubert and Constance Page served with distinction. It is a joy to work with district and local chairmen in a program which recognizes outstanding youth.

DAR MAGAZINE – Amy Reece Keeney

We are pleased that ninety-nine chapters have submitted DAR Magazine reports. Eighty-nine of reporting chapter regents are subscribers. Fifty-five chapters fulfilled the Chapter Achievement award requirements. Sixty-seven of reporting chapters use information from the magazine as chapter program material and sixty-eight use the American Spirit Magazine to promote DAR to prospective members. Ninety-one of reporting chapters read the President General's Message from the Daughters Newsletter at chapter meetings. Eighty-six chapters received chapter achievement by participating in the Georgia co-op ad: six page were including and honored the 2005 state officers; honorary state regents, state conference pages, Georgia's 2005 outstanding junior, state conference debutantes, and our state regent. Chapters reported five Georgia Daughters have contributed to the Friends of the Magazine Fund. Thank you Madam State Regent for the honor of serving you and the State Society.

DAR MUSEUM – Joyce McIntyre Chadwick

Georgia Daughters in 104 chapters contributed \$4,583.00 to assist the Museum in acquisition of new objects and the conservation of existing items in the Museum's outstanding collection. \$1,773.00 was contributed to the Exhibition Fund; \$2,005.00 Friends of the DAR Museum; \$805.00 Adopt-An-Object. The Georgia State Society gratefully acknowledges generous contributions of Joseph Habersham Chapter. Georgia Daughters supported DAR Museum Gift Shop. The Georgia Society hosted the Museum Trunk Show at State Conference raising \$1,414.15 for the Museum Exhibition Fund. Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter hosted the Museum Trunk Show raising \$647.00. Fort Peachtree Chapter hosted the Trunk Show raising \$317.95. The DAR Museum Committee, NSDAR, recognized the Southeastern Division, Georgia, for the Most Trunk Show Sales. Berry \$4,369, Crossnore \$2,236, Hillside \$1,766, Hindman Settlement \$1,320, Kate Duncan Smith \$12,338.25, Tamassee \$34,349.28 + \$25,365.50 (sent direct) totaling \$59,714.78. Donations to State Regent's Project: KDS \$10,562.45 for renovation of High School Library; Tamassee \$9,932.28 to the May Irwin Talmadge Auditorium Gymnasium Endowment Fund; Berry \$2,074.08 to purchase 200 new hymnals for the chapel. Friends of the DAR Schools \$8,155. 44,456 soup labels and 41,211 pounds of thrift were sent to the schools. Fifty "Butterfly" pins were sold for DAR School National Project. The Hightower DAR School Award was presented to 66 chapters with Joseph Habersham, Fort Peachtree and Augusta Chapters receiving the award for Greatest Monetary Donation Per Capita to the State Projects at KDS and Tamassee DAR Schools. The state society wishes to thank the Hightower family for their continuing encouragement to support our DAR Schools. We thank the school representatives from KDS and Tamassee who participated in the 2005 Summer Workshops. 2006 State Conference was attended by: Scott Breithaupt – Berry College; Melynda Pepple – Crossnore; Charles Edmonds, Jr., - Date Duncan Smith; Jeanne Marie Hibberd – Hindman Settlement; H. Dean Bare and Linda Chastain – Tamassee. Each representative brought greetings from their school. Thank you Madam State Regent for two wonderful years serving you, our State Society and the DAR Schools.

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERANS – Pat Patillo Mercer

Georgia Daughters in 79 chapters answered the call to remember those who have rung the "Bells of Freedom" by giving of their time, resources, and gifts to support the veterans programs in VAMCs, local nursing homes, military hospitals, and outpatient clinics. Daughters also contributed to Operation Stand Down, community events, cemetery projects and Veterans Day Ceremonies. Georgia had 386 adult volunteers who contributed 3,267 hours of service. Some 372 youth volunteers contributed 910 hours. Volunteers traveled 17,757 miles in support of veteran activities. Total cash donated totaled \$23,237.90 and the amount of all non-cash donations totaled \$28,833.44. A total of 1,017 ounces of stamps was collected and donated. We are grateful for the wonderful participation and urge all chapters to participate in some way next year. Certificates of Appreciation will be given to the 79 participating chapters. Certificates recognizing outstanding monetary contributions will be given to 14 chapters, three chapters will be recognized for the most adult volunteer hours, one chapter will be honored for the most youth volunteer hours and three chapters will receive recognition for the most miles traveled. The Georgia Outstanding DAR Service for Veterans Award will be presented to Martha Middlebrooks Knight of the Fort Peachtree Chapter. It has been a pleasure to serve the State Regent and the Georgia Society as VAVS chair.

VETERANS HISTORY PROJECT – Martha Hammonds Brown

Georgia Daughters continue to interview and record our veteran's valuable histories. Some 477 hours were spent conducting the interviews and preparing the interview materials. Interviewed were 23 women veterans and 98 male veterans. Our DAR Daughters were assisted by two youth volunteers. Veterans interviewed served in WWII, and Desert Storm. Ten chapters will receive certificates of recognition for their participation in this valuable project. We urge all Chapters to actively support this project. Thank you for the opportunity to serve the Society in this manner.

FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA – Meloye G. Brown

Georgia Daughters in 104 chapters reported efforts to honor the American Flag. Flags presented included 77 large, 3206 small and 828 table size. Flag materials distributed

included 1253 Flag Codes, 54 Flag certificates, 320 Flag pins, and 2687 pieces of other Flag literature. All 104 chapters reported reciting the Pledge of Allegiance at meetings; 59 presented "Flag Facts," 97 chapters encouraged others to fly the Flag. Thirty-six chapters involved youth in Junior ROTC, Scouting, CAR, JAC and school groups in Flag activities. Thirty-two chapters hosted Flag events, such as Flag Day luncheons or programs. Flags were distributed at parades and Veterans events. Fourteen chapters hosted or participated in Flag Retirement Ceremonies. Several presented school programs on Flag history and etiquette. Xavier Chapter initiated a "Pause for the Pledge of Allegiance" at the Rome Braves game on Flag Day, resulting in more than 3000 people pledging the Flag and distribution of 1000 flags as part of this nation-wide Flag Day observance. Augusta Chapter hosted a Flag Coloring Booth at a local Arts event. The booth was visited by over 1000 children, 100 of whom sent drawings and letters to soldiers in Iraq. It has been a privilege to serve on this committee.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS – Linda Moore Hallman

Fourteen chapters responded to the call for new genealogical sources of records for seven volumes to the DAR Library with the same amount to each, the Georgia State Archives, the Washington Memorial Library and the Georgia Historical Society for a total of 5,023 pages. Thank you Madam State Regent for the honor of serving as chairman of this committee.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS – Indexing – Vicki Lancaster Cobb

Twenty-two Georgia Daughters from 16 chapters have been very busy this year indexing 82 volumes of Genealogical records by participating in the President General's Every Name Index utilizing the Sky Index program. They have made approximately 284,000 entries. Jean Cole Manker gets the top award again this year. Over the two year period Mrs. Manker has spent more than 7000 hours indexing. Shirley Shoppe of the Colonel Daniel Appling chapter has indexed four books this year. Jane Frazer and Meg Stephens of Joseph Habersham completed indexes for three books each. Others completed one or two books each. Thanks to all of the Daughters who participated. This Vice Chairman thanks the State Regent for the opportunity of working with these wonderful indexers on this most worthwhile project.

JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS – Billie Jean Goodwin

Junior American Citizens (JAC) participation throughout Georgia this year was outstanding. Eleven chapters went into their communities in an effort to promote good citizenship, history and patriotism utilizing the national theme, "Benjamin Franklin: The Many Talents of an American Patriot," celebrating his 300th birthday in January 2006. Abraham Baldwin, Augusta, Colonel William Candler, George Walton, Lt. James Monroe, Martha Stewart Bulloch, Nancy Hart, Philadelphia Winn, Robert Loughridge, Sweetwater, and Thomasville partnered with 22 schools or youth groups, including five first time participants. School participation consisted of 126 classrooms and 1,948 students. Chapters received 557 Art Contest entries, 108 Creative Expression Contest entries, and one Community Service Contest entry with participation by 774 students. This Chairman received 49 contest entries. Winners in each category and level were forwarded to the region for judging. Chapters sponsored seven JAC Clubs comprised of 100 members. JAC items donated were 653 Member Pins, 447 Membership Cards, 6 Handbooks, 153 Flags, 16 Fact Sheets and 433 Contest Citation Cards. One Chapter, Colonel William Candler, presented the Thatcher Award to an adult who had shown outstanding leadership, dedication and service to the JAC Program.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP – Ashley Towns Carter

Georgia Junior Membership has been very busy in 2005. One hundred and one chapters reported having junior members serve in various capacities. There are four chapters with outstanding juniors and ten chapters that sold Innisbrook Wrap. Junior members give their time to DAR as chapter chairmen (44), chapter officers (19), chapter regents (2), state vice chairmen (2), state chairmen (2), state officers (1), and national vice chairman (1). Georgia

members supported the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund through the purchase of Innisbrook Wraps and supporting the Junior Shoppe. Junior members also served as State Conference pages and Continental Congress pages. The committee consists of this chairman, Lynn Snowden Dorney, Vice Chairman of sales, and Rebekah Lee Wysong, Vice Chairman of Contests. This State Chairman attended the junior luncheon at Continental Congress, one summer workshop and the State Board of Management. This Chairman has enjoyed serving in this capacity under State Regent Shelby Alderman Whitson. Thank you for allowing this chairman to serve as the State Chairman of Junior Membership.

LINEAGE RESEARCH – Joan Ketterbaugh Childres

In accordance with chapters reporting to this Chairman on Lineage Research 2005-5006 Report, a total of 38 chapter members are Lineage Research Lookup Volunteers. Fifty-one workshops were sponsored by chapters with a total of 57 prospective members being identified from workshops. Thirteen of these prospects became new members. A total amount of \$1,805.00 was donated by chapters for lineage research. If any chapter member is interested in becoming a Lineage Lookup Volunteer, forms were placed in chapter regents packets. Martha Brown, Xavier Chapter, is the State Outstanding Lineage Research Volunteer, and Xavier Chapter is the outstanding chapter promoting Lineage Research for 2005-2006.

MEMBERSHIP – Phyllis Fox Lawson

The Augustin Clayton Chapter was awarded the traveling Silver Bowl for gaining most (32) new members by application. A separate listing of awards is in the Proceedings. Our Vice Chairman of Membership (Prospective Members) Violette Denney, her District Vice Chairmen, Marcia Gayle Sweatmon, Barbara Jean McCay, Ann Scott Williams and Glenda Henry Carter referred total of 415 prospective members to chapters in Georgia resulting in 49 new members for our state. Some chapters are changing their meeting times to accommodate their members, using the State Speakers Staff for their programs, helping prospects with their research and applications, typing their papers and providing transportation to meetings. In their chapter size the following members contributed significantly to membership: 12-25 – Jane J. McFerrin and Betty McGaughey, Matthew Talbot Chapter; 26-50 – Sara Carter and Isabel Edmond, Edmund Burke Chapter; 51-75 – Alecia Evans, Brier Creek Chapter; 76-100 – Laura Jean Wells, Nathaniel Macon Chapter; 101-125 – Evelyn Clifton and Janice Edmunds, Thronateeska Chapter; 126-150 – Martha Brown, Xavier Chapter; 151-175 – Dana Anderson, Elijah Clarke Chapter. First place winners in the National Membership Contests were: Photo Contest: Ann Simmons Eldridge, Augustin Clayton Chapter; Essay Contest: Brenda Davison Jessel, General Daniel Newnan Chapter.

NATIONAL DEFENSE – Phyllis Johnson Tanner

National Defense continues to be a priority with Georgia Daughters. Of the 102 chapters reporting, 93 had three minute reports on National Defense issues and 52 had full programs, including three given by this chairman. Forty-three chapters distributed information to their members and 12 to the general public. Fifty chapters presented 221 Good Citizenship Medals. Sixty-two chapters presented 147 Bronze JROTC medals; 16 chapters awarded 28 Gold ROTC medals. Seventy-six chapters contributed a total of \$251.00 to the NSDAR ROTC Award Program. Four daughters submitted National Defense articles; two were printed as "Letters to the Editor" in local publications. Chapters sent cards, letters, and packages to active duty military personnel. State Chairman Awards: Greatest number of Good Citizenship medals; Etowah and Old Unicoi Trail Chapters; Greatest number of ROTC medals: Baron DeKalb and Augusta Chapters; Articles printed: Marcelaine Fletcher, Colonel William Candler Chapter and Brenda Jessel, General Daniel Newnan Chapter; Outstanding Monetary Contribution to NSDAR ROTC Award Program: Fort Peachtree Chapter. Madam State Regent, it has been a privilege to serve you and the State Society as Chairman of this committee.

PROGRAM – Denise Beall Fritze

The State DAR Program Committee received yearbooks or supplementals from 21 Georgia chapters this year, an increase from the 15 chapters who participated in 2005. All entries were interesting and showed hard work on the part of the chapter yearbook chairman. Many chapters included their chapter bylaws in the yearbooks for the first time. Some chapters included an order of business and histories of the chapter. Judging was quite difficult, especially in the Members 50-100 category. The one requirement which many chapters failed to list in the yearbook was the number of members. This may have been the one factor that made a judges decision between two yearbooks, so next year please be sure to include all criteria listed in the Chairman's letter.

PUBLIC RELATIONS – MOTION PICTURE, RADIO and TELEVISION – Donna King

One Hundred three chapters submitted a publicity report and were quite successful in telling the DAR story through 922 newspaper articles and 682 photos. Chapters had 719 radio spots, 9 radio interviews and 73 television spots publicizing DAR. Forty-four chapters published newsletters, and 8 chapters published brochures. This chairman received newsletters from Augusta, Old Unicoi Trail, Thronateeska, Oliver Morton, Joseph Habersham, Edmund Burke, George Walton, Lt. James Monroe, Andrew Houser, Chestatee River, Archibald Bulloch, John Benning, Xavier, Martha Stewart Bulloch, Fort Peachtree, and Etowah Chapters. Sixty-eight chapters had Constitution Week luncheons or some activity commemorating Constitution Week. Ten Chapters had Lewis and Clark Anniversary events. Seventeen Chapters had events for Flag Day; ten Chapters had Lewis and Clark Anniversary events; seventeen Chapters had events for Flag day. The chapters having outstanding publicity for Independence Day, Constitution Week, Flag Day, 225th Anniversary, Lewis and Clark Anniversary were Colonel William Candler, General Daniel Newnan, John Benson, Thronateeska, Commodore Richard Dale, Old Herod, Nancy Hart, and Savannah. Six chapters including Oliver Morton, Bonaventure, Governor David Emanuel, General Daniel Newnan, Brier Creek, and Edmund Burke, published beautiful brochures with informative facts about DAR. Forty certificates of award were given at state conference in Augusta. I extend sincere appreciation to the State Regent for the opportunity to serve the State Society.

SEIMES TECHNOLOGY CENTER – Danette Flynn Wren

This Chairman received 101 chapter reports, 25 chapters reported "no report," and 74 chapters reported contributions ranging from \$1.00 to \$50.00. One chapter, Augustin Clayton, reported a contribution of \$200.00 and Joseph Habersham Chapter reported contributions of \$710.00 for a total of \$1,219.00 to the Seimes Technology Center from Georgia Daughters. Thank you Madam State Regent for allowing me to serve the Georgia State Society in this capacity.

VOLUNTEER INFORMATION SPECIALISTS – Melodye G. Brown

VIS activities were reported by 104 chapters. 109 Georgia chapters have websites approved and linked to the National Society website. Forty-three chapters received prospective member contacts through their websites, resulting in 21 new members approved; 30 applications pending. As a result of website contact, 58 prospective members attended meetings. E-Membership use increased with 73 Regents, 61 Treasurers, 72 Registrars using these tools. Computers were used by 1,799 members for chapter activities, 565 for state activities, and 489 for National activities. Fort Peachtree reported most new members from website contacts with five new members, three applications pending, for total of eight. Chapter projects included creating Chapter brochures. Power Point program presentations, DAR committee displays, and email prayer chains. VIS Volunteer Award goes to Sue Wilson, Fort Frederica, who created and maintains the Georgia public website, as well as her chapter's website. She also serves on the National Society Genealogy preservation Committee. Thanks to your support, the Georgia State Society Members Only website continued to expand in content and use. It will continue to grow and change to meet the needs of the State Society. This Chairman wishes to thank the State Regent for the privilege of serving in this challenging position.

CHAPTER DEVELOPMENT

CHAPTER REVITALIZATION-Phyllis Fox Lawson

A new award was introduced this year with the award going to the chapter with the highest increase in member attendance from 2004-2005. The "traveling" Solid Pewter Pitcher will be presented each year to the succeeding chapter having the highest increase in member attendance for the year. The Pitcher will begin its travel with the Atlanta Chapter who had a 178% increase in member attendance. 2nd place – Thomasville, 3rd place – Governor Treutlen; Honorable Mention –Thronateeska. The following chapters have showed an increase in their chapter's health: Highest increase: 1st – General James Jackson; 2nd – Brier Creek; 3rd – Two way Tie – Colonel John McIntosh and LaGrange; Honorable Mention – Thomasville. The following chapters have shown revitalization efforts within their chapters. Chapter size 12-25 – Matthew Talbot; 26-50 – Edmund Burke; 51-75 – Brier Creek.

COMMEMORATIVE EVENTS-Susan Austin Fitzgerald

This Chairman received 104 chapter reports, with 78 chapters indicating active involvement in commemorating historic and patriotic events. Six chapters had members participate in the National Parade, fifty-three chapters participated in a local parade or celebration on July 4, 2005. Nineteen chapters had programs on the Lewis and Clark Expedition, five chapters planned a field trip in conjunction with the L&C expedition. Members of nine chapters purchased the new L&C commemorative pin. Seven chapters planned programs to learn more about the Washington-Rochambeau Revolutionary Route. Seven chapters had a program on the Victory at Yorktown, and three chapters purchased the Victory at Yorktown pin. Six chapters had a program about our Nation's Birthplace, Jamestown, Virginia. Dated commemorations of note included various Chapter Anniversaries and birthdays, the 80th Anniversary of Edmund Burke, the 100th Birthday of the City of Gray, the 155th Anniversary of the Death of General Daniel Newnan, the 200th Anniversary of the Lewis and Clark Expedition, the 226th Anniversary of Kettle Creek, the 248th Birthday of Lafayette, and the 300th Birthday of Ben Franklin. Other celebrated events included: American Heritage/History Month, Arbor Day, Columbus Day, Constitution Day/Week/Month, Cowpens, Flag Day, Georgia Day, Georgia Heritage Celebration, George Walton Celebration, George Washington's Birthday, Independence Day, Memorial Day, National Day of Prayer, NSDAR Founder's Day, Old Soldier's Day, Patriot's Day, Pause for the Pledge of Allegiance, President's Day, September 11 Remembrance, Veteran's Day, Women's History Day, and Yorktown. Madam State Regent, it has been my privilege to serve as Chairman of this interesting committee.

DAR PROJECT PATRIOT-Paula Hannah Osborne

With the adoption of Landstuhl Regional Medical Center in Germany, 56 of the 103 chapters reporting supported our wounded and community efforts in the war against terrorism. Donations of \$2,981 from 17 chapters were used to purchase phone cards. Chapters sent 5,210 greeting cards, portable DVD players and DVD's, CD's, games, magazines, books, sweatshirts, t-shirts, socks, toiletries, \$670 cash to purchase items needed, letters from children, etc., totaling 272 boxes going to Landstuhl. This effort involved 714 volunteers working 1,085 hours and traveling 3,186 miles. A booth at market days was set up to get cards signed by the community and voices for a quilt were sold. The State Chairman delivered 12 presentations at four district workshops and distributed 85 flat rate boxes to be sent to Landstuhl in addition to presentations at the State Board of Management and two outside groups. Chapters held parties and attended send-offs. Items were also sent to soldiers in Iraq, National Guard Units and Regional Medical Centers

that received wounded from Landstuhl. Programs and memorial services were presented to several outside groups. Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure to serve you and the Georgia State Society.

DAR SPEAKER'S STAFF-Gwendolyn Meredith Martin

The objectives of the DAR Speakers Staff Committee are (1) to promote a steady increase in new members, (2) to act as a liaison between the National Society and Chapters, (3) to speak before civic and non-DAR groups in the community, as well as, providing interesting programs for DAR chapters. Members of the Speakers Staff are recommended by the State Regent and appointed by the President General for the National level. This committee is one of the most important committees in NSDAR. The booklet which was published and placed in each Chapter Regent's packet at 2005 State Conference, listing the Daughter's name, address, phone number and e-mail address was reprinted and made available at the four summer workshops at a cost of \$2.00 each when purchased. Each Speakers Staff member reported to this chairman on their activity for the year. Georgia Daughters gave presentations to approximately 2254 DAR members and approximately 1864 people in other organizations. They spoke to approximately 4118 people. To do this, staff members reported traveling approximately 14,378 miles across the State of Georgia. This chairman attended the Speakers Staff Committee meeting at Continental Congress in July 2005 to learn what was suggested in establishing a Speakers Staff. Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure to serve you and the Georgia State Society during your administration as your Speakers Staff Chairman.

FRIENDS OF THE LIBRARY-Rena Morgan Setters

INSIGNIA-Dorris Callahan Howell

This has been and is a banner year. One hundred and four chapters reported Insignia activity. The Insignia Chairman attended Continental Congress, all state meetings, except State Conference, March 23, 2006, and all four workshops in 2005. Insignia was promoted through all these meetings. Also promotion of Insignia was carried out by visits to chapters, speaking in the chapters, sending regents a packet of information about Insignia and pins. This has helped to make more people aware of Insignia. Also many questions were answered on the correct way and time to wear Insignia. A form was included in the regent's packet that gave instructions on what to do with the pins and Insignia when not used any more by the member. Thank you Madam State Regent for letting me serve the State Society.

LITERACY CHALLENGE-Bea Smith Fischer

One hundred four reports were received from Georgia chapters; of these fifty-six reported no activity. Forty-eight chapters promoted literacy through programs, tutoring, assisting or promoting literacy in adults and children. Chapters donated books and money to reading funds, libraries, and literacy programs in their communities. The Outstanding Service of a Chapter Winner, Colonel William Candler, raised over \$1,200.00 by designing and selling 2006 calendars and bookmarks to support a local literacy project, a Spelling Bee. The Outstanding Service of a DAR member winner, Mable Drowne White Coakley (Mrs. Walter Joseph) of the Fort Peachtree Chapter, has served as Chapter Chairman for the last four years. She volunteers twice each week as a tutor at the Cobb County Education Center for Adult Literacy, volunteers weekly at the Peachtree Presbyterian Church after school program, ARMISTAD, and made a personal contribution to Crossnore to serve as a partial scholarship for teacher training in the Orton-Gillingham method of teaching reading. A total of 248 chapter members participated in literacy programs. Spent in tutoring and assisting with adults were 2,102 hours; with children a total of 11,067. 4,329 books were donated to

promote literacy. Over \$2,000.00 was donated to promote literacy. Thank you Madam State Regent for allowing me to serve the Georgia State Society.

PRESIDENT GENERAL'S PROJECT-Jean Cole Manker

The President General's Project has been promoted by including a section in the Master Questionnaire. The responses indicate that most chapters have been well-schooled on the purpose of the project and the need to support it by donating funds and encouraging chapter members to volunteer to work on the digitization projects. A poster board presentation of the slides shown at 2005 Continental Congress was exhibited at the four summer workshops. At the State Board of Management meetings, the display also included special order blanks and pictures of the President General's Project items for sale at the DAR Store together with an original flyer promoting their purchase as Christmas gifts. This display and order forms are on exhibit in the Sales Room during State Conference. Because the time consuming work on this committee falls on the State Treasurer and the Chapter Treasurers and there is one more year of the term of the current National Society administration, this chairman diverted her unused energy toward working on the digitization projects by indexing 66 books for the Master Index, and worked 300 hours on the Descendants Project. I appreciate the opportunity to have served in this capacity.

VOLUNTEER GENEALOGISTS-Linda Reed Douglas

The Georgia Volunteer Genies have been very active this past year. Volunteer Genies have been assisting their Chapters as Registrars, Lineage Research Chairmen, and Membership Chairmen as well as presenting workshops to the following 20 chapters: Atlanta, Benjamin Hawkins, Edmund Burke, Fayette-Starr's Mill, Fielding Lewis, Ft. Frederica, Ft. Peachtree, General Daniel Newnan, George Walton, Governor Jared Irwin, Governor Treutlen, Lamar-LaFayette, Lt. James Monroe, Nathaniel Macon, Old Unicoi Trail, Pulaski, Sweetwater, William Witcher, and William McIntosh. In addition, this committee presented a workshop at the 2005 State Conference. She also distributed balance sheets for the Meadow Garden accounts as reported at the Meadow Garden Board Meeting.

The Chairman advised the Committee that the motion passed by this Committee to recommend to the Meadow Garden Board that Meadow Garden contribute \$1,000.00 to the cost of the annual audit failed to be adopted by the Meadow Garden Board.

The motion adopted by this Committee at the November 5, 2004, meeting to accept the firm of Hargrave and Freeman, P.C. as the Auditor for the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, for the fiscal years 2004-2005 and 2005-2006 at an annual fee of \$4,000.00 needs to be amended due to increase in the annual fee.

Dollye Ward moved that "the firm of Hargrave and Freeman, P.C., Jonesboro, Georgia, be accepted as Auditor for the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, for the fiscal year 2004-2005 at an annual fee of \$4,000.00 and for the fiscal year 2005-2006 at an annual fee of \$6,900.00." The motion was seconded and adopted.

The 2006-2007 Proposed Budget was distributed. Joyce Patton moved that "we accept the budget as presented." The motion was seconded and adopted.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned at 3:25 p.m.

Lynn Brackett moved that "The Finance Committee recommend to the Executive Committee that each club associated with the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, namely the Georgia State Officers Club, Georgia Chapter Regents Club, Georgia State Chairman's Club, Georgia Cameo Society, Georgia Junior Club and Georgia Page Club, submit a finance report to the State Treasurer with a copy to the State Regent by May first of each year. Each Club should have the names of both the President and the Treasurer on the bank signature card, with only one signature required to authorize a check. The Finance Report should include the name and address of the bank where the Club's funds are on deposit, the names with titles of the two people authorized to sign checks, a copy of the April bank statement and the amount of funds in the account. If the Club has a certificate of deposit, or funds in a savings account, or funds in another bank, this information should also be included."

"Rationale: To insure that the name of the bank holding deposits from any Club is known by the State Regent and the State Treasurer for the protection of the Club's assets." The motion was seconded and adopted.

July 19, 2005

The Meadow Garden Board met on Tuesday, July 19, 2005, in the George Walton Heritage Education Center in Augusta, Georgia. State Regent and Chairman of the Board, Shelby Alderman Whitson, called the meeting to order at 10:59 a.m. Other members present were: Laura Marcella Reid, Secretary; Margaret Poole Cagle; Frances "Frankie" Rush Nevins; Billie Gardner Hunter; Mary Gene Everitt Elliott, Josephine Rhodes Agostas; Edwina Hall Beall; Joyce Ball Patton; and, Barbara Blakely Chastain, Ex-Officio member.

The Invocation was given by Mrs. Whitson and the Chairman welcomed everyone. Minutes of the March 31, 2005, meeting of the Meadow Garden Board were approved June seventh.

The State Treasurer, Joyce Patton, shared with the Board the balance sheet of the Meadow Garden Funds as of June 30, 2005: the Certificates of Deposit total \$321,646.10; the checking account balance is \$51,524.31; the Money Market Accounts total \$22,337.33; less \$975.00 in Suspense; showing current assets of \$394,532.74, with an additional \$2,872.00 of fixed assets, bringing the total assets to \$397,404.74. Mrs. Patton distributed a Profit and Loss Statement from July 1, 2004, through June 30, 2005; and, a breakdown of the Certificates of Deposit showing the amount of principal and the amount of interest each CD has earned since July 1, 2004.

Margaret Cagle, Meadow Garden Chairman, reported: (1) Friday, July 8, 2005, at one of the Georgia Welcome Centers for "Georgia on My Mind" Day, Louise Henry and Margaret Cagle set up a booth and gave out pencils, stickers and discount fliers for visits to Meadow Garden. This event is an opportunity for attractions, lodging facilities and other destinations within the state to showcase their property to encourage tourism. (2) Meadow Garden had an open house from 11:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. on the Fourth of July. The event was covered on the 6:00 p.m. and the 11:00 p.m. local news. (3) The docents at Meadow Garden will work with the Augusta Canal Interpretive Center to educate the Center's tour guides about Meadow Garden since they come by in the boat and talk about Meadow

Garden during the tour. (4) It is requested the Meadow Garden Board recognize Rebecca Rogers with the Augusta Canal Interpretive Center as a Patron-in-Kind for her assistance with making the picture of Meadow Garden that was submitted for entry in the National Parks Service Photo Contest in June. The picture was also printed in the Walton Rehab flier. (5) It has been suggested Meadow Garden create a historic Augusta fan with Meadow Garden on it to sell. (6) A sample packet for printing from Burco International, Inc., was passed around. (7) A book titled, "Georgia's Signers and the Declaration of Independence," by Kenneth H. Thomas, James H. Young, Edwin C. Bridges and Harvey H. Jackson, is available from Cherokee Publishing Company for Meadow Garden Gift Shop to order and sell for \$15.00. (8) Donations of a Meadow Garden coffee mug and two free passes were made to Davidson School. (9) Meadow Garden is in need of a new vacuum cleaner. Mrs. Cagle has been checking on prices.

Margaret Cagle moved that "the Meadow Garden Board authorize the purchase of a vacuum cleaner for Meadow Garden." The motion was seconded and adopted.

The Meadow Garden Chairman continued her report: (10) Macon Music Hall of Fame has contacted Mrs. Cagle about working with the Hall of Fame with exhibits that they have for loan. (11) The Meadow Garden house will be pressure washed in the next couple of weeks and paint will be touched up as needed. (12) In a few weeks, Junior Grantham will repair at no charge the wall that is cracking on the stairway upstairs. There will be no charge due to Mr. Grantham guarantees his work. (13) Last week Ted Baker reinstalled back door knocker on the hall back door, that had fallen off; repaired the back porch railing and the entrance gate lock. There was no charge. (14) May have to have Red Baker look at the door that is swelling due to all the rain making it difficult to close. (15) Bert Hall Exterminating, Inc., has given an estimate for Limited Subterranean Termite Re-treatment Guarantee, which includes termite service and powder post beetle treatment for both Meadow Garden and the George Walton Heritage Education Building. The estimate is dated July 11, 2005, and includes: Initial Treatment Charge for Conventional Termite Service with R&R Warranty is \$1,332.00; Powder Post Beetle Treatment is \$1,235.00; Annual Renewal Inspection for next seven (7) years if \$413.00 per year. Rate is discounted \$374.00 for prepaid for previous service, so balance due is \$2,193.00. This year the annual inspection for Meadow Garden cost \$110.00 (16) There is wood stacked behind the George Walton Heritage Education Building that needs to be removed.

Billie Hunter, Docents Chairman, reported the last docent training workshop that was scheduled no one showed. Augusta Chapter will meet at the Heritage Building on October 11, 2005, for a docent training workshop. There will be no charge to Augusta Chapter for this meeting because it is for docent training.

The Furnishing Chairman, Mary Gene Elliott, reported she will be checking with Bill Gullberg, in Kirkwood, Illinois, about the status of the four (4) chairs that were returned to him to be refinished and properly coated for outside use. Also she will pursue the cost and installation of the protective film for the windows in the Augusta Room.

Landscape Chairman, Josephine Agostas, reported due to heavy rain all beds at Meadow Garden have required a great deal of work. In honor of today, our first meeting in the Heritage Education Center, Mrs. Agostas planted Equisetum (Horsetail) in the back of the building to help with the wash. This plant was used in revolutionary times as a scrub brush. She distributed a landscape plan, guided by Mr. Roger Davis, accomplished landscape architect, for the grounds around the Heritage Education Center and for the driveway to be installed in front of the Center to accommodate the handicapped. These plans have been submitted to the City Preservation Committee and were approved. The Preservation Committee specified that the driveway has to be brick. City recommended chips be put around tree roots or use chips over sand.

Margaret Cagle presented the Certificate of Occupancy, Certificate #2631 A, for the George Walton Heritage Education Building to the Meadow Garden Board Chairman. The certificate indicates the building covers 1400 square feet and the occupant load limitation is forty-five (45).

The lease forms for rental of the George Walton Heritage Education Building were discussed and revised for final print. There are two rental forms, one for DAR Chapters and one for the general public.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 12:20 p.m.

The Meadow Garden Board met on Thursday, 18 August 2005, in the room of the State Regent at the Best Western Inn and Suites in Milledgeville, Georgia. State Regent and Chairman of the Board, Shelby Alderman Whitson, called the meeting to order at 7:40 p.m. Other members present were: Laura Marcella Reid, Secretary; Margaret Pool Cagle; Camille Redfern Baxter; Anne Whipple Murphey; Edwina Hall Beall; Joyce Ball Patton; and, Barbara Blakely Chastain, Ex-Officio member.

The invocation was given by Mrs. Whitson. Minutes of the July 19, 2005, meeting of the Meadow Garden Board were approved as read.

The Chairman of the Board discussed the following for the George Walton Heritage Education Building: (1) kitchenette, cost to be approximately \$9,250.00; (2) the installation of a chimney cover to be installed by Hargrove after the birds hatch and the chimney is cleaned, estimated cost if \$500.00; (3) the sealing of the brick floor; (4) the upcoming flower show, which is postponed until spring of 2006; and (5), the lease for rental of the Heritage Education Center by Georgia DAR Chapters and the lease for general use.

The State Treasurer, Joyce Patton, proposed the possibility of a Meadow Garden Founder's Club to be patterned after the National Society's Heritage Club. Charter members would be those giving \$500.00 the first year from March 2006 through March 2007. Donations to Meadow Garden would be logged individually and the donor would move to the different levels of giving as each monetary goal is met. Donations designated to Meadow Garden granted in someone's will are accepted toward the level goals. There would be an annual event honoring all donors.

Mrs. Patton distributed the balance sheet of the Meadow Garden Funds as of August 15, 2005: the Certificates of Deposit total \$321,646.10; the checking account balance is \$48,198.34; the Money Market Accounts total \$20,692.02; showing total checking/savings of \$390,536.46. Other current assets of Construction in Progress, the George Walton Heritage Education Building, total \$104,409.80; giving total current assets for Meadow Garden of \$494,946.26. Fixed assets include accumulated depreciation of (\$13,890.65) and Meadow Garden improvements of \$16,398.65, yielding total Meadow Garden improvements/fixed assets of \$2,508.00. Total assets are \$497,454.26. Mrs. Patton distributed the Meadow Garden Fund Profit and Loss Statement from July 1, 2005, through August 15, 2005, with the total income and the total expenditures, showing expenditures have exceeded the income.

Anne Murphey moved that "the payment of lawn service, water for sprinklers, be taken out of Meadow Garden Maintenance versus Landscaping." The motion was seconded and adopted.

Margaret Cagle, Meadow Garden Chairman, reported on three estimates obtained to replace the air conditioning unit for Meadow Garden, the main house, excluding the basement. Estimates include the use of the existing ducts. Estimates were obtained from (1) Keith Williford Heating and Air Company, Inc.; (2) David McNamara with Creighton Laircey Company, Inc.; and, (3) Doug Wilson with D & M Heating and Air, Inc.

Mrs. Cagle moved that "the Meadow Garden Board engage D & M Heating and Air, Inc., to install a new Goodman five ton, 12 SEER, heat pump at Meadow Garden, using existing ducts and lines and air flow. Installed cost to be approximately \$4,564.00." The motion was seconded and adopted.

The Meadow Garden Chairman also reported we are waiting to hear from the city of Augusta concerning the water supply's "back flow" system requirement in the new Heritage Education Building.

Camille Baxter moved that "protective window film be installed in the Augusta Room as

suggested by Mary Gene Elliott, who has volunteered to be the installer." The motion was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Whitson distributed a copy of the Standing Rules for Meadow Garden and asked all members to look over these and be prepared to recommend any revisions needed at the next Meadow Garden Board Meeting preceding the State Board of Management.

There being no further business, the Chairman of the Board offered the Benediction, and the meeting adjourned at 9:30 p.m.

The State Treasurer, Joyce Patton, distributed the balance sheet of the Meadow Garden Funds as of November 3, 2005: the Certificates of Deposit total \$321,646.10; the checking account balance is \$36,663.94; the Money Market Accounts total \$20,742.66; showing total checking/savings of \$379,052.70. Other current assets of Construction in Progress, the George Walton Heritage Education Center, total \$118,843.95; giving total current assets for Meadow Garden of \$497,896.65. Fixed assets include accumulated depreciation of (\$14,200.15) and Meadow Garden improvements of \$20,710.65, yielding total Meadow Garden improvements/fixed assets of \$6,510.50. Total assets are \$504,407.15.

Margaret Cagle, Meadow Garden Chairman, reported: (1) Updates were given on the status of the kitchen cabinets, sink and faucet, dishwasher at the George Walton Heritage Education Center; (2) The new air conditioner/heat pump was installed August 22, 2005. (3) The backflow valve was installed in the George Walton Heritage Education Center at a cost of \$661.00. Required inspection of the two existing backflow valves was done at a cost of \$60.00 each, totaling \$120.00, which is a \$30.00 reduction from last year. Next year there will be three backflow valves to be inspected. (4) Christmas Open House, in collaboration with Historic Augusta, will be held on November 25th and 26th from 5:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. and November 27th from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. (5) Estimates for a Termite Bond were obtained from Jeff Annis with Advanced Services Pest Control/Termite Control and from Bert Hall, who currently has a termite contract on the George Walton Heritage Education Center.

Frankie Nevins moved that "Termite Control Contract be awarded to Advanced Services as quoted for Meadow Garden beginning immediately and for the Education building at completion of current contract." The motion was seconded and adopted.

The Advanced Services Termite Control Proposal is to install a Sentricon Colony Elimination System for the main house, 228 linear feet, at a cost of \$800.00 for the first year, with an annual renewal fee of \$225.00. Cost for the George Walton Heritage Education Center, 130 linear feet, is \$450.00 for the first year, with an annual renewal fee of \$150.00. This proposal is one half off the regular selling price. It includes all material, labor and documentation needed. Upon renewal, after the first year, the repair provision will become effective.

Mrs. Cagle continued her report: (6) She inquired if anyone knew about a piece of furniture donated years ago by the Pulaski Chapter, and if we have a centennial Flag on loan to Meadow Garden. (7) Upcoming renewal of membership for the Georgia Trust for Historic Preservation is \$55.00; and for, Classic South, a division of Georgia State Tourism, is \$100.00.

Margaret Cagle moved that "Meadow Garden renew membership in the Georgia Trust for Historic Preservation for \$55.00, and renew its membership in Classic South for \$100.00." The motion was seconded and adopted.

The House Chairman's report continued: (8) Harbor House Books was requested Meadow Garden to sell their books. We would have a choice of what was stocked. There would be no up front cost and we would get a percentage of the sale. Checks would be made payable to Harbor House Books, not to Meadow Garden, in the October 2005 issue of Senior News, which is a monthly publication in Augusta. (10) Needs for the George Walton Heritage Education Center include five to six more chairs, table for upstairs, lateral file cabinets for upstairs, dust buster, microwave and a Flag of the United States of America and a Georgia Flag with poles, stands and finials.

The Furnishings Chairman, Mary Gene Elliott reported an e-mail was sent to Bill Gullberg to paint the four chairs black, that were returned to him to be refinished and properly coated for outside use. Mrs. Elliott indicated she, Edwina Beall and Barbara Chastain will be installing the UV protective film on the inside of the windows in the Augusta Room.

Camille Baxter, Gift Shop Chairman, reported \$1,717.25 was raised from the four District Workshops.

Joyce Patton moved that "the Benefactor Club level be added to our Standing Rules. The criteria to become a member of this club is a cumulative total of giving of \$500.00." The motion was seconded and adopted.

Laura Reid moved that "the Meadow Garden Board approve the following fees for the lease of the George Walton Heritage Education Center by a DAR Chapter of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR: Lease Fee of \$35.00, fee does not include tour of Meadow Garden; Damage Deposit Fee of \$25.00, fee will be returned after event if no damage occurs; Cleaning Deposit Fee of \$25.00, fee will be returned after event, if cleaning is not required, and if cleaning is required, Lessee shall pay \$15.00 per hour; and, Center Staff Fee of \$10.00 per hour per staff member needed after hours, regular hours are 10:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m. Monday through Friday." The motion was seconded and adopted.

Laura Reid moved that "the Meadow Garden Board approve the following fees for the general lease of the George Walton Heritage Education Center: Lease Fee of \$150.00, fee does not include tour of Meadow Garden; Damage Deposit Fee of \$100.00, fee will be returned after event if no damage occurs; Housekeeping Charge of \$50.00, if more than four hours to clean, Lessee shall pay an additional \$15.00 per hour; and, Center Staff Fee of \$10.00 per hour per staff member needed after hours, regular hours are 10:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m. Monday through Friday." The motion was seconded and adopted.

The Meadow Garden Board voted to recommend to the Bylaws Committee the following proposed amendment to the Bylaws: "To amend ARTICLE XIII. Meadow Garden. (b) by substituting six (6) for "five (5)", by adding Public Relations after "Patrons" and by substituting Gift for "Museum" before "Shop." "(b) then will read: The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the following members: the State Regent who shall serve as Chairman; the State First Vice Regent who shall serve as Secretary; the Chairman of Meadow Garden; the Regents of the Augusta and College Hill Chapters; the State Treasurer; two (2) Honorary State Regents; and the chairmen of the six (6) subcommittees appointed by the State Regent – Docents, Furnishings, Landscaping, Gift Shop, Patrons, Public Relations."

There being no further business the meeting adjourned at 2:55 p.m.

The Meadow Garden Board met on Tuesday, the tenth of January 2006, in the George Walton Heritage Education Center in Augusta, Georgia. State Regent and Chairman of the Board, Shelby Alderman Whitson, called the meeting to order at 10:40 a.m. Other members present were: Laura Marcella Reid, Secretary; Frances "Frankie" Rush Nevins; Billie Gardner Hunter; Mary Gene Everitt Elliott; Josephine Rhodes Agostas; Camille Redfern Baxter; Joyce Ball Patton; and, Barbara Blakely Chastain, Ex-Officio member.

The Invocation was given by Mrs. Whitson. The Secretary read the minutes of the November fourth, 2005, meeting of the Meadow Garden Board, which were approved as read.

The State Treasurer, Joyce Patton, distributed the balance sheet of the meadow Garden Funds as of January 9, 2006: the Certificates of Deposit total \$321,646.10; the checking account balance is \$39,645.05; the Money Market Accounts total \$20,742.66; showing total checking/savings of \$382,033.81. Other current assets of Construction in Progress, the George Walton Heritage Education Center, total \$120,883.28; giving total current assets for Meadow Garden of \$502,917.09. Fixed assets include accumulated depreciation of (\$14,200.15) and Meadow Garden improvements of \$20,710.65, yielding total Meadow Garden improvements/fixed assets of \$6,510.50. Total assets are \$509,427.59. A Meadow Garden Fund Profit and Loss Statement from July 1, 2005, through January 9, 2006, and a Profit and Loss Previous Year Comparison were distributed.

The Landscape Chairman, Jo Agostas, reported the landscaping of the George Walton Heritage Education Center has been completed by the Augusta Chapter and the Pine Needle Garden Club. The cost of the brick handicap parking was \$2,532.45 and was donated by Jo Agostas. The landscaping plans were drawn by Landscape Architect, Roger Davis. The scuppernong arbor has been pruned and panolas have been planted in the two beds on the front walk. Name tags are being made for all the plants at Meadow Garden, and Mrs. Agostas is compiling a book of all these plants.

Billie Hunter, Docents Chairman, reported a Docent Training Class was held on October 11, 2005, with three members of the Augusta Chapter Attending. Another Docent Training Class will be planned in the spring.

The Furnishings Chairman, Mary Gene Elliott, reported Mr. Gullberg had e-mailed her requesting the color black we wanted painted on the porch chairs. Mrs. Elliott told him to use his discretion. A 25 foot roll of Madico SB-341-CSR, UV protective film, was purchased at a cost of \$175.00 from Sunburst Window Tinting in Martinez. Barbara Chastain and Mrs. Elliott have installed the UV protective film on the interior of the windows in the Augusta Room. This film should make a difference in the heat/air expenses.

Camille Baxter, Gift Shop Chairman, reported \$575.50 was raised from merchandise sold at the State Board of Management Meeting.

Mrs. Whitson gave the Meadow Garden Museum Chairman's report: (1) A grant is being investigated from the Watson and Brown Foundation, Inc., in Thomson. This grant could possibly assist with the cost of projects at Meadow Garden such as the installation of UV protective film on the interior of the windows, the repair/replacement of front steps of the Museum House, the exterior painting of the Museum House, and the replacement/repair of the water-damaged doors at the George Walton Heritage Education Building. (2) The Christmas Open House, held November 25th – 27th, 2005, had over 100 visitors and generated \$400.00. The only expenses were the decorations. (3) At the George Walton Heritage Center: dishwasher (\$355.00) and microwave (\$399.00) have been installed; kitchen cabinets have been installed at a cost of approximately \$650.00; an icemaker was installed in the refrigerator at a cost of about \$200.00; kitchen sink and faucets were installed and were donated by Mary Gene Elliott; Margaret Cagle made and installed curtains to cover kitchen opening; two black, rough textured, cast iron kick plates, will be installed by Ted Baker after the door is repaired – cost to be \$107.23; Margaret Cagle has applied two coats of poly sealer on the stairs; Roy Cagle fixed the threshold on the two front doors; Louise Henry is checking with someone about enclosing the top of the chimney with a cap, and Jo Agostas is also to contact this person to ensure that the fireplace is cleaned

before installing an enclosure and work is completed prior to the birds returning in the spring; (4) Have spoken with Georgia Power and with D & M concerning the issues with the installation of the new programmable thermostat and the new air/heat system. Georgia Power has implied we will receive a credit on our electric bill in January or February 2006. D & M has agreed to pay for a portion of the November electric bill. (5) Termite service with Bert Hall expires the sixth of May 2006 for the Museum House and the first of August 2006 for the George Walton Heritage Education Center. Will check with Bert Hall to see if the main house was ever treated for powder post beetles. (6) The Gift Shop has on display one of the books from Harbor House, from which Meadow Garden will receive a percentage of the sale. Harbor House is investigating the reprinting of the Madame LaVert book. (7) Membership in the Georgia Trust for Historic Preservation and in Classic South were renewed in November 2005. (8) On the front of the main house, the two front steps are in bad shape and the lower porch steps cannot be used until replaced. Ted Baker has given an estimate of \$1,470.00 to repair/replace the front steps and lower porch steps. Another bid will be obtained before any work is authorized. (9) Meadow Garden has a \$150.00 credit with Mr. Hutto, the plumber.

Camille Baxter moved that "Susan Jackson be made a Patron-in-Kind for her generous contribution of two bronze plaques containing text about George Walton and Button Gwinnett." The motion was seconded and adopted.

The meeting recessed for lunch.

After lunch, the committee members reconvened and reviewed the Standing Rules for Meadow Garden noting changes needed to be made. These changes will be presented and voted on at the 108th State Conference to be held in Augusta in March 2006. The following changes were noted: (1) Item I, Meadow Garden Board, #2, changes if the Bylaw recommendation is adopted, changing "five" to "six" of the chairmen of Meadow Garden Committees. (2) Item II, Operations, #6, delete "Sizemore Security" and insert "security company." (3) Item IV, Furnishings, #6, delete the last sentence. (4) Item VI, "Gift" Shop, delete #1 in entirety; renumber #2 to #1, and add a second sentence, "The Vice Chairman shall be responsible for Gift Shop sales at state functions."; renumber #3 and #4 to #2 and #3 respectively. (5) Item VII, Patrons, #2, delete "will be" and insert after levels "for annual contributions"; add #3, "The Meadow Garden Benefactor's Club is a lifetime, cumulative monetary giving of a minimum of \$500.00, including bequests."; renumber #3, #4, #5, #6 and #7 to #4, #5, #6, #7 and #8 respectively.

Mary Gene Elliott, Furnishings Chairman, moved that "the six Madame LaVert chairs be moved to the Stribling Room in the Heritage Education Center." The motion was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Whitson offered a Benediction. There being no further business the meeting adjourned at 2:00 p.m.

The Meadow Garden Board met on Thursday, March 23, 2006, in the Shultz Boardroom of the Augusta Marriott Hotel & Suites in Augusta, Georgia. State Regent and Chairman of the Board, Shelby Alderman Whitson, called the meeting to order at 1:10 p.m. Other members present were: Laura Marcella Reid, Secretary; Margaret Poole Cagle; Frances "Frankie" Rush Nevins; Billie Gardner Hunter; Mary Gene Everitt Elliott; Camille Redfern Baxter; Anne Whipple Murphey; Edwina Hall Beall; Joyce Ball Patton; and, Barbara Blakely Chastain, Ex-Officio member.

The Invocation was given by Mrs. Whitson. The Secretary read the minutes of the January tenth, 2006, meeting of the Meadow Garden Board, which were approved.

The State Treasurer, Joyce Patton, distributed the balance sheet of the Meadow Garden Funds as of March 21, 2006: the Certificates of Deposit total \$321,646.10; the checking account balance is \$65,420.23; the Money Market Accounts total \$20,809.44;

showing total checking/savings of \$407,875.77. Other current assets of Construction in Progress, the George Walton Heritage Education Center, total zero; giving total current assets for Meadow Garden of \$407,875.77. Fixed assets include accumulated depreciation of (\$16,060.65), George Walton Heritage Education Center of \$120,987.44, and Meadow Garden improvements of \$20,710.65, yielding total Meadow Garden improvements/fixed assets of \$125,637.44. Total assets are \$533,513.21. A Meadow Garden Fund Profit and Loss Statement from March 1, 2005, through March 21, 2006, and a Profit and Loss Year-to-Date Comparison were distributed. Mrs. Patton announced that insurance has gone up to \$6,897.00 and a reimbursement is due back from the Georgia Power Company of about \$380.00.

Frankie Nevins gave information on the roof bids obtained from Enon Hopkins Roofing & Construction Company, Inc., Mizelle Roofing & Construction, Mr. Brazewell and Southern Roofing & Insulating Company. Ms. Nevins moved that "The Meadow Garden Board consider the roofing bid from Hopkins Roofing and discuss with the firm the possible reduction of cost before going to contract." The motion was seconded and adopted.

The proposed changes to the Meadow Garden Standing Rules were reviewed and the following were added and revised: Item I, add # 14 to read: "The State Regent shall appoint a Meadow Garden Advisory Board which would act in an advisory capacity only and be composed of no more than 15 members representing various areas of expertise."; and, Item VI. Gift Shop # 2 – revised 'add a new sentence to read': "The Vice Chairman shall assist the Gift Shop Chairman with sales at state functions."

Mrs. Whitson appointed an ad hoc committee to research and compile a presentation for the formation of a Meadow Garden Benefactor's Club to be presented at the State Board of Management Meeting in the Fall of 2006. The ad hoc committee consists of the incoming First Vice Regent for 2006-2008, who will serve as Chairman; the immediate past State Treasurer; the incoming State Treasurer; the incoming Meadow Garden State Chairman of Patrons, and the immediate past Meadow Garden State Chairman of Patrons.

Margaret Cagle, Meadow Garden Chairman, reported: (1) Need to reprint Meadow Garden flyers. (2) Chimney cap installed on the George Walton Heritage Education Center. (3) Upstairs windows of the George Walton Heritage Education Center will not close properly because the windows were not built to fit the frames. Original work completed by Ted Baker and situation remains to be corrected. (4) Termite bond for the Museum house is scheduled for renewal with Bert Hall or new service the sixth of May 2006. The service with Bert Hall for termites on the George Walton Heritage Education Center expires the first of August 2006.

Joyce Patton moved that "Dr. and Mrs. William Agostas and Virginia Grace Lingelbach and Rena Morgan Setters be made Patrons-in-kind for Meadow Garden." The motion was seconded and adopted. Dr. and Mrs. Agostas donated the cost of the brick parking area in front of the George Walton Heritage Education Center. Virginia Lingelbach donated the cost of the shingle pins to raise money for the replacement of the roof on Meadow Garden. Rena Setters gave Meadow Garden two reproduction men's clay pipes.

The Furnishings Chairman, Mary Gene Elliott, reported that the installation of the UV film on the interior of the windows of the Augusta Room has been finished. Mrs. Elliott has put an Aubusson rug, valued at \$10,000.00, in the Augusta Room. The rug is on loan to Meadow Garden from Mrs. Elliott. She reported she has not heard from Mr. Bill Gullberg concerning the status of the repairs on the chairs donated by the Georgia State Society Children of the American Revolution. She showed the members of the Meadow Garden Board the clay pipes donated by Rena Setters.

Camille Redfern Baxter, Gift Shop Chairman, reported the purchase of more gloves, sequin belts and shawls.

Frankie Nevins reported that the Heritage Hill Garden Club was to tour and have lunch at Meadow Garden. They are to make a contribution of \$147.00.

The Landscape Chairman, Jo Agostas, sent her report, stating that fertilization of the

lawn, plants and fruit trees has been done. On Arbor Day the Pine Needle Garden Club of Augusta planted a Patriotic Tree, a flowering peach, in honor of George Walton.

Mrs. Whitson offered a Benediction. There being no further business the meeting adjourned at 2:45 p.m.

Standing Rules for Meadow Garden

I

MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

1. The governing body of a museum, in this instance the Meadow Garden Board, serves the public interest as it relates to Meadow Garden, and must consider itself accountable to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, as well as to Meadow Garden; members should not attempt to act in their individual capacities, but all actions should be taken as a Board, Committee, or otherwise in conformance with the Standing Rules, the Act of Incorporation, or applicable Resolutions.
2. The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the three (3) Trustees as named in the Deed from the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, conveying Meadow Garden to the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution; namely, the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the State Chairman of Meadow Garden who is appointed by the State Regent; the Chapter Regents of the Augusta Chapter and the College Hill Chapter, both chapters being located in Augusta, who shall serve as Vice Chairman to the State Chairman of Meadow Garden; the State Treasurer; two Honorary State Regents; and six of the chairmen of Meadow Garden Committees, as appointed by the State Regent.
3. No Georgia Daughter shall serve in the same Meadow Garden Chairmanship more than three (3) consecutive terms.
4. In addition to the six appointments to the Board which are made by the State Regent, she shall appoint two (2) Honorary State Regents.
5. The State Second Vice Regent shall serve as ex-officio member of the Meadow Garden Board, being given the privilege of the floor without a vote.
6. The State Regent shall serve as Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board, and the State First Vice Regent shall serve as Secretary of the Meadow Garden Board.
7. The Meadow Garden Board shall meet a minimum of three (3) times each year; namely, preceding State Board of Management meeting, preceding annual State Conference and following Continental Congress, and at such other times as deemed necessary by the Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board. At least one (1) meeting of the Board shall be held at Meadow Garden each year. The Board may vote by teleconference, fax or email, if necessary.
8. The Meadow Garden Board shall have jurisdiction over the operation, maintenance and work of Meadow Garden and shall be the authority for Meadow Garden as long as such authority is not in conflict with the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, the Act of Incorporation for the Georgia State Society, Resolutions adopted by the Georgia State Society and/or directions which from time to time may be approved by action of the Georgia State Society assembled at its annual State Conference.
9. The Meadow Garden Board shall supervise the placing of all insurance to cover the grounds and the Museum and its contents, including the fine arts, with accredited companies – coverage to include fire, theft and liability.
10. Five (5) voting members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.
11. Minutes shall be kept of each meeting and a copy shall be sent to each member and printed verbatim in the State Proceedings.

12. All expenses for maintenance, operation and purchases of furnishings and plantings shall be authorized by the State Regent, as Chairman of the Board, and paid by the State Treasurer. Expenditures exceeding \$1,000.00 must have the majority approval of the Board.
13. These rules will be binding on the actions of the Board in their operation of Meadow Garden. They may be changed by the following procedure: Members of the Board must have written notification of proposed changes one month prior to the next meeting of the Board; a two-thirds vote of the Board and approval of the State Conference are necessary to effect a change.
14. The State Regent shall appoint a Meadow Garden Advisory Board, which would act in an advisory capacity only and be composed of no more than fifteen (15) members representing various areas of expertise.

II OPERATIONS

1. Everyone entering Meadow Garden will be requested to sign the Register, including date, time of arrival and time of departure.
2. No more than fifteen (15) people with each Docent are to be on tour in the house at a given time. Excess of this number may wait in the reception room or in the garden. The House Manager has the authority to enforce the Meadow Garden rules at all times.
3. There will be no smoking in Meadow Garden.
4. No refreshments are to be served in or taken into the Museum by visitors, including chapters or the public. Should a group, such as a visiting chapter, desire refreshments, the garden is available for use if litter is properly disposed of by the serving group.
5. Tour visitors will be asked to pay a fee as set by the Board.
6. There will be only five (5) complete sets of keys to Meadow Garden and three (3) keys to the gates of Meadow Garden. Keys are to be returned after each administration. New locks may be required. Distribution of keys: Gate Only: Augusta Police Department, Georgia Power, and security company; Gate and House: Chairman of Meadow Garden Board, Meadow Garden Chairman, House Manager, Docents Chairman and Landscaping Chairman.

III VOLUNTEERS AND DOCENTS

1. Docents, shall be those well screened and trained volunteers who will serve under the direct supervision of a Meadow Garden Chairman and/or the House Manager.
2. Duties of docents shall include acting as guides, hostesses, working in museum shop, working in yard, cleaning in house, public relations. No volunteer work at or for Meadow Garden shall be done except under the direct guidance of the Meadow Garden Board and the chairman of the specific committee for that particular function.
3. Cleaning or yard work volunteers shall be under the direction of the House Manager.

IV
FURNISHINGS

1. Items bought or accepted for the older section of Meadow Garden must pre-date 1821.
2. Furnishings for the two (2) main floor rooms and the two (2) upstairs rooms in the newer section may be dated post 1820 but these rooms should be considered companion rooms to the rest of the house and furnished accordingly with all efforts made to keep furnishings of these four rooms dated no later than 1850.
3. Reproductions may be used only when the physical condition of the antiques is jeopardized by exposure in areas where large numbers of visitors have easy access; or when environmental conditions including excessive light, dust, humidity or airborne impurities pose a threat to the preservation of originals.
4. Effective March 12, 1983 all items donated to Meadow Garden shall be accepted with the written condition that they become the property of Meadow Garden and may be used, replaced or sold at the discretion of the Meadow Garden Board only.
5. All items that post date 1821, with the exception of those in the six (6) rooms of the newer section and those described in Number 3 of this section, shall be replaced as soon as possible with similar items pre-dating 1821.
6. Once an item is placed, it shall not be moved from one location to another without permission of the Meadow Garden Board.
7. Any item donated or purchased must have written documentation of appraisal.
8. A file will be kept of all assets with information as to price paid or market value, date of acquisition, donor or where bought, documentation and appraisal and a description of article. One file will be kept in the reception room accessible to the Docents; a duplicate file will be in the possession of the Chairman of the Board.
9. All items purchased or donated will be added to the Fine Arts insurance policy. Said policy will be reviewed and updated a minimum of once a year. Major additions to furnishings will be added immediately.
10. Future plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the Museum.

V
LANDSCAPING

1. The landscape plan adopted by the Board shall be adhered to with no deviation unless recommended by an authority on landscape design and care.
2. Donations of shrubbery, plants or trees shall be accepted only when item is part of the master plan.
3. Work on the grounds will be under the sole direction of the Meadow Garden Board and the Landscaping Chairman. Supervision of actual work will be provided by the Meadow Garden Chairman or the Landscaping Chairman of Meadow Garden.

VI
GIFT SHOP

1. The Chairman of the committee will be responsible for all purchases, subject to the approval of the Board or the State Regent. The Vice Chairman shall assist the Gift Shop Chairman with sales at state functions.

2. Gift Shop operations will be self-supporting. In the event funds are needed for purchases, they may be advanced from available Meadow Garden funds and must be considered a loan and shall be repaid without interest within one (1) year from date of borrowing.
3. Profit from the Gift Shop shall be accounted for within the State Treasurer's books, with a percentage being transferred at the discretion of the Board at the end of the fiscal year and placed in the Maintenance Account. The audit of the Gift Shop operation shall be included in the annual audit of the Georgia State Society.

3. Chapter gifts, above the State Honor Roll requirements, automatically qualify the chapter to be recognized at an appropriate giving level determined by the categories listed in #2.
4. The State Treasurer will report these gifts to the Patrons Chairman.
5. The Patrons Chairman will issue certificates to the qualifying individuals and chapters or groups.
6. A permanent book will be kept on public display at Meadow Garden to record the names of those who give at the Patrons level or above.
7. The Patrons Chairman will enter the names of donors in the appropriate book a minimum of once a year.

VIII

PLAQUES & MARKERS

1. Plaques/Markers may be placed at Meadow Garden only at the discretion of the Board, and request meets the following criteria: Substantial service and/or contributions that secured the property and the heritage for the GSDAR. Individuals so recognized shall have been deceased for at least 5 years; Plaque/Marker will be paid for by person(s) requesting such recognition.
2. Such plaques will be permanently displayed at Meadow Garden and a record of the honoree's service and/or contribution will be recorded and placed in the Meadow Garden file, with Board approval.
3. Plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the Museum. Additional markers shall not be permanently placed on the grounds.

Bylaws

GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II OBJECTS

The objects of this Society shall be:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of the Georgia State Society.

Article IV OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian and a State Curator.

Section 2. (a) To be eligible for state office, a member shall hold and have held membership in a chapter or chapters within the Georgia State Society for at least 5 years prior to her election and have served a full term as chapter officer or state chairman.

(b) No member shall be eligible to the same state office for two (2) successive terms. A member having served more than one half of a term in a state office shall be deemed to have served a full term.

(c) No two state officers shall be members of the same chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

(d) To be eligible for the office of State Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State First Vice Regent or as State Second Vice Regent or served in each of these two offices of the Georgia Society.

(e) To be eligible for the office of State First Vice Regent or for the office of State Second Vice Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State Recording Secretary or as State Treasurer of the Georgia State Society and shall have served a full term as a Chapter Regent of a chapter in the Georgia State Society.

Section 3. In recognition of valuable service to the Georgia State Society, a State

Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent for life by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Article V NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. (a) A candidate for state office shall request the endorsement of her chapter, taken by vote at a regular meeting of the chapter held between May and January preceding the State Conference at which state elections are held. The endorsement, signed by the Chapter Recording Secretary, shall include the office the candidate seeks and shall be received by the State Regent with the candidate's statement of intent to be a candidate prior to any announcement or campaigning by the candidate and/or her supporters.

(b) A candidate for State Regent who wishes to present a slate of officers shall send to the State Regent in one packet the chapter endorsements and the statements of intent for each of her selected candidates. If received by the State Regent no later than December 1, these candidates shall be listed as a slate in the State Regent's Call to State Conference.

(c) Candidates wishing to run independently of a slate, whose chapter endorsements and statements of intent are received by the State Regent no later than December 1 shall be listed as independent candidates in the State Regent's Call to State Conference.

(d) A candidate whose chapter endorsement and statement of intent have been properly received by the State Regent may choose to announce her candidacy separate from the State Regent's Call to State Conference. Such a chapter endorsement and statement of intent shall be received by the State Regent at least ten (10) days prior to the opening of the State Conference at which the election is to take place.

(e) A candidate who does not meet the requirements of these Bylaws shall be declared disqualified and ineligible for consideration for state office.

(f) A chapter shall endorse no more than one chapter member for state office per election with the possible exception of candidates for State Regent and for State Corresponding Secretary.

(g) In the event of the death, incapacitation or withdrawal of a candidate prior to the election, a replacement shall be made with notification in writing to the State Regent and accompanied by the chapter endorsement and statement of intent as directed by these Bylaws.

Section 2. Nominations of candidates for all state offices shall be made at a designated meeting of the State Conference.

Section 3. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected biennially by ballot at the State Conference. A majority vote shall elect. Independent candidates shall be listed on the ballot in a separate column from those candidates presented as a slate.

Section 4. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two (2) years or until their successors are elected. Their terms of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Section 5. (a) Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become State Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become State First Vice Regent subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. Vacancies in other state offices shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next State Board of Management meeting or State Conference, whichever shall come first.

(b) Any state officer who is absent from the state for a continuous period of six (6) months or longer shall automatically relinquish her position as a state officer.

Section 6. Upon the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Organizing Secretary General.

Section 7. (a) A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot.

(b) The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than eighteen (18) months in

advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

(c) The endorsement shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent with the candidate's name and address to the Recording Secretary General to be received by the first day of the month preceding the designated Continental Congress.

Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall perform the duties prescribed in this article, and parliamentary authority adopted by the Society, and such others as the State Board of Management and the National Society may require.

Section 2. The State Regent shall:

- (a) be the chief executive officer and the official spokesman for the State Society;
- (b) have general supervision of the affairs of the State Society;
- (c) preside at all meetings of the State Conference, State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;
- (d) appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society;
- (e) be ex-officio a member of all committees;
- (f) appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as advisor in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting;
- (g) sign all contracts and agreements made in the name of the Georgia State Society with the recorded approval of the Executive Committee and the State Board of Management or the State Conference as directed by these Bylaws;
- (h) be bonded and have the authority to draw upon funds of the State Society with the approval of the Finance Committee.
- (i) recommend to the Finance Committee a Certified Public Accountant who shall be approved by the Finance Committee.

Section 3. The State First Vice Regent shall:

- (a) perform the duties of the office of State Regent in the absence or inability of the State Regent;
- (b) fill a vacancy in the office of State Regent;
- (c) Perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;
- (d) serve on those committees as designated by these Bylaws and as directed by the State Regent.

Section 4. The State Second Vice Regent shall:

- (a) perform the duties of the office of State First Vice Regent in the absence or inability of the State First Vice Regent;
- (b) fill a vacancy in the office of State First Vice Regent;
- (c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;
- (d) serve on committees as directed by the State Regent.

Section 5. The State Chaplain shall:

- (a) open all meetings of the State Conference and the State Board of Management with scripture reading and prayer;
- (b) preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and conduct such other religious services as may be required;
- (c) be custodian of state properties pertaining to the duties of this office;
- (d) be responsible for IN MEMORIAM pages in the Proceedings.

Section 6. The State Recording Secretary shall:

- (a) record the proceedings of the meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;
- (b) compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and the Proceedings Committee.
- (c) submit to the appropriate National officers, the endorsement for Vice President

General and the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent by the first day of the month preceding the month of Continental Congress of the year in which said balloting was held;

Section 7. The State Corresponding Secretary shall:

(a) conduct correspondence and send notices on behalf of the State Regent, the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as may be directed by them;

(b) receive from the chapters the Master Questionnaires and distribute to the appropriate state chairmen.

Section 8. The State Organizing Secretary shall:

(a) assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new chapters;

(b) assist chapters in conjunction with appropriate state officers and chairmen in revitalization.

Section 9. The State Treasurer shall:

(a) be bonded;

(b) be the custodian of the funds of the State Society, placing them in institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance;

(c) receive the state dues and State Conference registration fees from the chapters and receive all sums contributed by the chapters for state and national projects, disbursing monthly to the Treasurer General all funds designated for national projects;

(d) disburse other funds only when authorized by the State Regent in writing;

(e) keep an account of all sums received or disbursed by using the basic double entry form of bookkeeping according to accepted accounting procedures and keep receipts for all transactions;

(f) prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference, sending a copy to the State Chairman of the Finance Committee ten (10) days in advance of each meeting;

(g) be a member of the Finance Committee and an ex-officio member of the Credentials Committee;

(h) balance and prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year; said audit by a Certified Public Accountant, shall be performed and delivered within forty-five (45) days of receipt of books.

(i) An internal review of the State Treasurer's records shall be performed when a change in this office occurs after the close of the fiscal year. Following the review, the records shall be turned over to the new State Treasurer. The committee to review the books shall be composed of the State First Vice Regent, the immediate Past State Treasurer, the immediate past Finance Chairman and a current Chapter Regent appointed by the State Regent.

Section 10. The State Registrar shall:

(a) when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution prove eligibility and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars;

(b) keep a correct list of all members in the state;

(c) report on membership to the State Conference;

(d) assist with the verification of the credentials;

(e) be in possession of the computer and software owned by the Georgia State Society and see that it is maintained.

Section 11. The State Historian shall:

(a) be in charge, within the state, of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General as well as those authorized by the Georgia State Society;

(b) keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves within the state;

(c) prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General;

(d) promote the study of American history, state and county history and historical

research in relation to the American Revolution and the founding of our state and counties.

Section 12. The State Librarian shall:

(a) serve as liaison between the Librarian General and the Georgia Chapters and disseminate general information on the NSDAR Library;

(b) cooperate with the director of the Georgia Department of Archives and History, making the needs of the Archives known to the chapters;

(c) collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing them wherever accepted in such libraries and Archives as may be chosen by the State Board of Management;

(d) solicit, with the approval of the Executive Committee, contributions from the chapters for purchase of such books as requested by the office of the Librarian General, and/or the various libraries in Georgia which the State Society approves;

(e) receive gifts of books and other printed material from the chapters to be donated to the approved libraries and Archives;

(f) maintain a constant supply of bookplates to the NSDAR Library, the Georgia Department of Archives and History and for purchase by the chapters.

Section 13. The State Curator shall: be custodian of the State portable properties and shall have them properly stored and made ready for use at state meetings.

Section 14. All officers will keep a Procedure Book of Instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new officers to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. State Conference:

(a) The annual meeting of the Georgia State Society shall be known as the State Conference. It shall be for the purpose of:

(1) receiving reports of officers, committees and Chapter Regents;

(2) electing officers biennially;

(3) promoting programs in furtherance of the objects of the Society;

(4) any other business that may arise:

i. annual budget shall be adopted,

ii. all projects of the State Society requiring funding shall be voted upon at State Conference or ratified by members at State Conference if previously voted upon by the State Board of Management,

iii. no project extending beyond the term of the presiding officer may be accepted at any meeting other than by vote at State Conference.

(b) The State Conference will be held between February 1 and the time of the meeting of Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week;

(c) The State Regent shall fix the time and place of meetings;

(d) The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credentials form to the chapters not less than sixty (60) days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 2. The voting members of the State Conference shall be:

(a) the officers and Honorary State Regents of the State Society;

(b) the officers and honorary officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state;

(c) the Chapter Regent, or in her absence, the Vice Regent or alternate of each chapter;

(d) delegates or alternates of each chapter of the state as designated by the Bylaws of the National Society for representation at Continental Congress;

(e) one additional delegate from each chapter in the state.

Section 3. Only a chapter member in good standing whose credentials have been completed in accordance with the instructions of the State Regent and the State Credentials Chairman for the State Conference and in accordance with the Standing Rules of the National Society shall be eligible to represent her chapter at state and national meetings.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the chapter, except in the case of the Regent or Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at an annual State Conference, shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the state of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference the privilege of the floor and the right to speak shall be accorded to the State Chairmen and State Vice Chairmen. They may not vote unless they are duly registered as voters of the State Conference.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Society may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen (15) days' notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Forty-five (45) voting members, representing not less than twenty (20) chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The state officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents and the Regents, or in their absence, the Vice Regents of the chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the fall, following the October meeting of the National Board, It may meet whenever called by the State Regent. A minimum of twenty (20) days' notice shall be given as to the time and place of any such meeting.

Section 3. Thirty (30) members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference or as proscribed by these Bylaws.

Section 5. State chairmen, vice chairmen, committee members of the National and Standing Committees and one (1) member from each chapter shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privilege of the floor and the right to speak, but may not vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article IX EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, shall attend the meetings, but may not vote.

Section 3. This Executive Committee shall:

(a) perform such duties of the State Board of Management between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient;

(b) meet at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three (3) members of the committee;

(c) vote by teleconference, e-mail or fax, if necessary;

(d) receive and make recommendations for projects requiring expenditure of funds outside routine expenditures to be considered by the State Conference;

(e) make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. Decisions of the Executive Committee shall be acted upon at the next meeting of the State Board of Management or at State Conference, whichever shall come first.

Article X FINANCES

Section 1. (a) The fiscal year of the Georgia State Society shall be July 1 through the last day of June.

(b) The annual budget, prepared by the Finance Committee, shall cover the fiscal year and be prepared on the basis of dues payable for the calendar year beginning December first preceding.

(c) The Finance Committee shall propose the per capita amount and distribute according to the annual membership count. The per capita amount and distribution shall be indicated on the budget presented annually. Funds to be included in the per capita designations shall be Tamassee DAR School, Kate Duncan Smith DAR School, Berry College, Lucy Cook Peel Fund, McCall Genealogical Fund and Meadow Garden Maintenance.

Section 2. The annual dues of chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be \$10.00 for each member of the chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1.

Section 3. (a) Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the state dues, a conference registration fee of \$10.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under these Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether chapter is represented or not.

(b) State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay a conference fee of \$10.00 at the time of registration.

(c) Other members of the Georgia State Society who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a conference fee of \$7.00 at the time of registration.

(d) All host chapters may charge a registration fee to those not purchasing a meal ticket to off-set the cost of hosting state/district meetings.

Section 4. (a) The State Treasurer and the State Regent and such others entrusted with funds of the Georgia State Society as may be designated by the State Board of Management shall be bonded. (See Article VI, Sections 2 and 9);

(b) The State Treasurer with the approval of the State Regent and the State Chairman of the Finance Committee shall place the funds of the Georgia State Society in financial institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage;

(c) The placement of restricted savings funds and investment funds of the Georgia State Society shall be placed to the credit of the Georgia State Society by the State Treasurer under the direction of the Finance Committee. Monies may be invested in U. S. Treasury obligations or other interest bearing obligations of federally insured financial institutions;

(d) The accounts of the State Treasurer shall be annually prepared for audit by a Certified Public Accountant immediately following the end of the State Society fiscal year and no later than July 15 and delivered to the CPA by that date;

(e) Should the State Treasurer be incapacitated, the State Regent, after consultation with the Chairman of the Finance Committee and with the approval of the Executive Committee, shall appoint an Acting State Treasurer to serve until such time as the State Treasurer is able to resume her duties or a new State Treasurer is appointed and ratified as stated in Article V, Section 5 (a).

Section 5. The expenses incurred by the State Regent in the performance of duty shall be paid each year from the State Dues Fund:

(a) Five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) shall be taken each year to defray her necessary travel expenses;

(b) Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent, as budgeted, shall be paid by the State Treasurer who shall keep all receipts of these expenses. No expenses exceeding the budgeted amount shall be paid by the State Treasurer.

Section 6. At the close of the books annually, \$5,000.00 shall be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies Fund" so that at the end of each administration a total of \$10,000.00 will be reserved. This money is to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration.

Article XI COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Honorary State Regents of the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution shall function as an advisory committee to the State Regent and to the Georgia State Society.

Section 2. The State Regent shall appoint the following standing committees:

(a) Bylaws: An Honorary State Regent shall be appointed as chairman and the committee shall be composed of two (2) other Honorary State Regents and one (1) member from each district;

(b) Finance: This committee shall be composed of seven (7) members to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two (2) Honorary State Regents, one (1) active chapter regent and one (1) active chapter member, who shall not be an Honorary State Regent, nor a state officer, nor a chapter regent. One of the two Honorary State Regents shall be appointed chairman. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund. This committee shall have charge of all investments of the Georgia State Society funds.

(c) Resolutions: This committee shall be composed of all Honorary State Regents, the State Parliamentarian and three (3) chapter members;

(d) Proceedings: This committee shall be composed of the State Recording Secretary, the immediate past State Recording Secretary, State First Vice Regent and four (4) additional Daughters, at least one of whom shall be an Honorary State Regent.

Section 3. The State Regent shall appoint such other committees, standing or special, as the State Conference shall authorize and actions of the State Board of Management and of the National Society shall require. The appointments shall be concurrent with the term of the State Regent making the appointments and shall terminate with the end of the administration.

Section 4. Additional appointments may be made to any of the committees and vacancies shall be filled by the State Regent with timely notification to the membership.

Section 5. The duties of committees shall be such as these Bylaws, the State Conference, the State Board of Management or the National Society shall prescribe.

Section 6. All chairmen will keep a Procedure Book of instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

Article XII CHAPTERS

Section 1. To expedite the work of the Society, the chapters of the Georgia State Society shall be placed in geographical districts:

(a) A chairman appointed by the State Regent shall coordinate the work of all chapters as needed; she shall be titled "Coordinator of Districts";

(b) Each district shall have a Director appointed by the State Regent to work as a committee under the direction and supervision of the Coordinator of Districts and the State Regent.

Section 2. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April 1 in the year of chapter elections. The Chapter Regent shall report annually the names of the elected officers promptly on the form provided by the State Regent for this purpose, with copies to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, and the State Recording Secretary.

Section 3. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent, the State Recording Secretary, and the District Director at the time designated by the State Regent.

**Article XIII
MEADOW GARDEN**

Meadow Garden, property owned by the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, shall be operated as follows:

(a) The governing body shall be the Board of Trustees composed of the following members: the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Chairman who shall be appointed by the State Regent;

(b) The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the following members: the State Regent who shall serve as Chairman; the State First Vice Regent who shall serve as Secretary; the Chairman of Meadow Garden; the Regents of the Augusta and College Hill Chapters; the State Treasurer; two (2) Honorary State Regents; and the chairmen of the six (6) subcommittees appointed by the State Regent - Docents, Furnishings, Landscaping, Gift Shop, Patrons and Public Relations.

(c) The Meadow Garden Board shall operate with Standing Rules approved by the State Conference.

**Article XIV
RULES OF ORDER**

Section 1. The current edition of *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised*, shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law in matters not covered by these Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

**Article XV
AMENDMENTS**

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent, the State Parliamentarian, and the State Bylaws Chairman. The State Regent shall send a copy to each chapter, at least sixty (60) days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the Call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

**Article XVI
DISSOLUTION**

Although the period of duration of the Georgia State Society is perpetual, if for any reason the State Society is to be dissolved or otherwise terminated, no part of the property of the Society or any of the proceeds shall be distributed to or inure to the benefit of any of the officers or members of the Society. Upon the dissolution of the Georgia State Society, assets shall be distributed by the Board of Management and/or the Executive Committee to and only to the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the local United States District Court, exclusively to such organization or organizations as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated within the meaning of section 501 (c)(3), with purposes and objectives consistent with those of the Georgia State Society.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year, a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24, 1899. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21) No Conference was held in 1911, the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912," and amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, page 211).

The dates and places of meeting and the numerical designations of the Conferences after the First Annual Conference (1899) were: (2) Atlanta, November 27-28, 1900; (3) Augusta, November 21-22, 1901; (4) Savannah, November 13-14-15, 1902; (5) Atlanta, November 5-6-7, 1903; (6) Athens, November 9-10-11, 1904; (7) Macon, November 16-17-18, 1905; (8) Columbus, November 21-22-23, 1906; (9) Rome, October 23-24-25, 1907; (10) Covington, November 4-5-6, 1908; (11) Brunswick, November 10-11-12, 1909. BYLAWS

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National or State Bylaws, and a current copy is to be filed with the State Parliamentarian.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS

Notice of change of address of members shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, and the State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHANGE OF NAME

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, and the State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHAPTER ELECTIONS

As chapter elections are to be held before April 1, names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, 1776 D Street, NW, Washington, DC 2006-5303, the State Regent or the State Regent-Elect, the State Recording Secretary and the State Corresponding Secretary by April 1. The full Christian name of chapter officers shall be given, along with her husband's given name or initials, address, zip code, telephone number, fax and e-mail. In accordance with the National Bylaws, a Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years.

CHAPTER REPRESENTATION AT STATE AND NATIONAL MEETINGS

At the State Board of Management, a chapter is represented by the Chapter Regent, or in her absence by the First Vice Regent, and one non-voting member.

The voting representation of each chapter at the State Conference shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received by the State Treasurer by December 1. Membership 12-19: Regent + 1 delegate = 2 votes; 20-49: Regent + 2 delegates = 3 votes; 50-99: Regent + 3 delegates = 4 votes; 100-149: Regent + 4 delegates = 5 votes; 150-199: Regent + 5 delegates = 6 votes; 200-249: Regent + 6 delegates = 7 votes; 250-299: Regent + 7 delegates = 8 votes.

The voting representation of each chapter at Continental Congress shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received in the Office of the Treasurer General by December 1. Membership 12-19: Regent only; 20-49: Regent + 1 delegate = 2 votes; 50-99: Regent + 2 delegates = 3 votes; 100-149: Regent + 3 delegates = 4 votes; 150-199: Regent + 4 delegates = 5 votes; 200-249: Regent + 5 delegates = 6 votes; 250-299: Regent + 6 delegates = 7 votes. For every voter, two alternates are authorized for both State Conference and Continental Congress.

CONFERENCE REGISTRATION

On or before December 1, each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer the state dues and a Conference Registration fee of \$10.00 per each delegate to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws. This fee is to be paid whether represented or not and is derived by recommendation of the Finance Committee to the Executive Committee. This

is a requirement stated in the Georgia State Bylaws , Article X, Section 3 (a).

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the Conference Registration Fee of \$10.00 at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters, shall pay a Conference Registration Fee of \$7.00 at the time of registration.

CONTRIBUTIONS

All contributions by chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

DATE FOR ANNUAL AUDIT

The Georgia State Society Fiscal Year is July 1 to June 30. Bylaw Article X, Section 1. The State Treasurer should prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year. Bylaw Article VI, Section 6, (h).

DEADLINES

State Officers and Chairmen welcome chapter reports when completed. Deadline dates are given to ensure conformity for inclusion in reports to National Officers. Per National Society Bylaws, the deadline date is determined by the Federal Postal Service or other carrier, showing cancellation date and not by the date reports are received.

DECEASED MEMBERS

Deaths shall be reported promptly to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Chaplain and the State Registrar by the corresponding Chapter officer. A complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and date of death shall be furnished to the State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for the Conference Memorial Service and for State Proceedings.

DUES

Before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer sends to the State Treasurer state dues of \$10.00 per member. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the December through February Board meeting of the National Society. Before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer sends to the office of the Organizing Secretary General National dues of \$30.00 per member except Life Members, with check made payable to the Treasurer General NSDAR.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS

To insure uniformity and convenience in binding, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, 8 1/2 x 11 inches, with 1 1/2 inches from top of page, 1 1/2 to 2 inches on left side, 1 inch on right side and at bottom. Two copies shall be sent to the State Chairman of Genealogical Records. The booklet, "Instructions for Copying Source Records and Their Preparation for Library Use," should be obtained from the Corresponding Secretary General.

GEORGIA HOSPITALITY FUND

"WHEREAS, the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds a social event in Washington during Continental Congress which

Follow the format as seen in Reports of State Officers and State Chairmen in the *Proceedings*. Margins should be: 1/2 inches from the top of page, 1 1/2 inches from left side, 1 inch from right side, 1 inch from bottom of page. Chapter Regents should exclude NSDAR Chapter Achievement Award and State Honor Roll, as these will be added when confirmed. Your name should be consistent with the lists of Chapter Regents and State Chairmen as found in this *Proceedings*. Winners of awards and awards to be offered shall each be listed on separate sheets identified with the title of the committee and the award. Reports and awards to be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording

Secretary by the following deadlines; Chapter Regents by February 15; State Officers and State Chairmen by March 15.

PROCEEDINGS MATERIAL, ABSOLUTE DEADLINE FOR

"WHEREAS, a definite deadline must be established and adhered to for all reports and material to be in the hands of the Proceedings Committee in order to be delivered to the printer by June 1:

RESOLVED, that all FINAL reports and materials must be received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1 with the exception of the Auditor's Report and any information sent out by the National DAR Headquarters. This does not alter the requirement in the "Items of Information" in the Proceedings that all reports shall be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary on or before February 15, the ORIGINAL being sent to the Secretary for the *Proceedings*

AND FURTHER RESOLVED, this policy will be strictly adhered to and the material not received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1 will be omitted from the *Proceedings*." Adopted.
