The Recording Secretary reported that she received the 2008-2009 Proceedings books from Melodye Brown, Past Recording Secretary, during the Executive Committee meeting March 30, 2010. The Proceedings would be placed at the Literature sales table for \$20 per book. Mrs. Simonds discussed posting the motion card on the Georgia Members' web site as a writeable PDF document. The three-part hardcopy motion card would still be available at all State functions. In June Mrs. Simonds attended the Proceedings Committee meeting to assist in proofing the 2009-2010 Proceedings book.

The Corresponding Secretary reported investigating mailing options for the State Regent's Letter #1, with First Class mail being the most cost effective method. Only the first State Regent's Letter was to be mailed. All others would be emailed and posted on the Georgia State Members' web site. In preparing the letter corrections were made to mailing addresses, phone numbers and email addresses. The Regent's Letter was mailed on June 10-11, 2010 to State Officers, Honorary State Regents, Chapter Regents, and State Chairmen and Vice Chairmen, with follow up email attachments. Mrs. Jessel prepared a letter for inclusion in the Chapter Information Packet online. Copies of the CIP were printed and delivered to Mary Grace "M.G." Whittle, Coordinator of Districts, to be distributed at State District Workshops, Mrs. Jessel coordinated efforts with Jean Cole Manker, State Directory Chairman, and Lynn Moulton Wright, Assistant State Directory Chairman, to compile the 2010-2011 State Directory to be sold at District workshops. A meeting was held with Amy Lawson, State Chairman, Volunteer Information Specialists, and Jonathan Melville of Melville Associates to establish new Georgia Public and Georgia State Society Members' Web Sites. Mrs. Jessel expressed her appreciation to Martha Middlebrooks Knight, Past State Corresponding Secretary, for providing information needed for preparing labels and envelopes and the preliminary State Directory.

The Organizing Secretary reported the merger of the Adam Brinson Chapter with the Governor David Emanuel Chapter on August 5, 2010. Ms. Christian extended thanks to M.G. Whittle, Coordinator of Districts, and Dr. Louise Henry, District 3 Director, for their assistance in the merger. Two chapters have been in danger of disbanding but were still in the one-year grace period. Julie Brooks Prince, Chapter Development and Revitalization Chairman, is giving assistance to these chapters. Ms. Christian reported that she would be meeting with two organizing chapters.

The Treasurer gave the following summary of accounts for the Georgia State Society as of August 23, 2010. Checking account balance \$18,069.73; money market balance \$45,235.54; and certificates of deposit \$118,864.24; making total assets of \$184, 569.51. The financial report was filed. The Meadow Garden accounts as of August 23, 2010 were summarized as follows: checking account balance \$32,179.74; money market balance \$56,040.53; certificates of deposit \$400,000.00; petty cash \$100.00; fixed assets of \$656,150.92. The Meadow Garden budget was approved at the July 15, 2010 board meeting. Mrs. Cannestra expressed her gratitude to Bea Fischer, Past Treasurer, for her guidance and cooperation in transferring 16 containers of past Treasurer records. Mrs. Cannestra also reported that she was appointed to serve as National Credentials Chairman 2010-2013.

The Registrar reported that the Georgia State Society had 7,297 members as of August 23, 2010. That number reflected 33 registrations, 13 deaths reported, and 1 transfer out of state. Ninety applications had been submitted and 30 verified that would be admitted at the next National Board of Management. The Georgia State

Society's total number of new members for the calendar year was 241. There were 42 new Junior members year-to-date and a total of 470 Junior members. Mrs. Lemesis attended the Georgia State Conference, Continental Congress, the Georgia Luncheon, the Registrar General's Workshop and the State Regent's Tea. Mrs. Lemesis also participated with the State Organizing Secretary in a preliminary meeting regarding the forming of a new chapter.

The Historian reported that she had reviewed the responsibilities of the Office of the State Historian and would serve to the best of her ability. Mrs. Miller attended Continental Congress and served on the Wright Associates Campaign Committee.

The Librarian reported visiting the DAR Library and staff members while attending Continental Congress. Mrs. Osborne stated that she had been in contact with the Librarian General. Liaison Committee Chairmen were contacted and encouraged to attend District Workshops. In researching the costs of printing the Georgia bookplates, Litho Press in Macon was the preferred quote with 300 copies for \$0.21 per unit. Mrs. Osborne stated the Georgia State Society had 30 packages with 4 bookplates per package for \$1.00. It was determined that bookplates could be ordered if needed or before the supply was depleted. The Georgia State Society had 13 book credits from 6 chapters. Mrs. Osborne moved "The Executive Committee recommends to the State Board of Management that \$500.00 be donated to the NSDAR Library in honor of Georgia State Regent, Sally McGlaun Baldwin, for the purchase of books for the Georgia Shelf. The check will be sent after March 1, 2011 for use in that fiscal year." The motion was seconded and adopted.

The Curator reported that the property of the Georgia State Society was accounted for and in good condition.

The State Parliamentarian stated that she had thoroughly read Roberts Rules of Order and was taking an online course in parliamentary procedure. Mrs. West reported that she would also be taking a full course on parliamentary procedure in the fall from the Dogwood unit of the National Parliamentarians Association.

In new business, the Curator brought up the possibility of retiring the lighted wooden Insignia to be replaced with a banner. The State Regent stated that displaying the Insignia was becoming cost prohibitive, with \$200 to \$300 required at event sites for each mounting and bulb replacement. Ms. Goodwin recommended a packet be assembled to include voter badges, copies of the proposed budget, and bylaw changes, to control the confusion associated with handing out these items during Georgia State Society business meetings. The packet could be handed out at the Credentials table. The State Regent recommended that the Treasurer discuss the possibility of assembling this packet with M.G. Whittle, Coordinator of Districts. Mrs. Cannestra suggested the profit and loss statement be made available before the meeting, possibly on a specified secure web page. Only the financial summary would be included in the packet. The Registrar inquired if the Treasurer's records, totaling 16 containers, could be more conveniently and securely stored if relocated to a storage facility. Ms. Christian suggested that the records could be easily scanned and digitized. It was determined that research would be conducted on the costs of storing the hardcopy records versus digitization.

There being no further business, the Chaplain gave the Benediction. The meeting was adjourned at 4:12 pm.

October 29, 2010

The Executive Committee of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, met October 29, 2010, in the Heritage Education Center at Meadow Garden in Augusta, at 3:45 p.m. with Sally McGlaun Baldwin, State Regent, presiding.

Others present were: Virginia Grace Lingelbach, First Vice Regent; Ida "Bea" Best Fischer, Second Vice Regent; Melodye G. Brown, Chaplain; Mary Farthing Simonds, Recording Secretary; Brenda Davison Jessel, Corresponding Secretary; Charlotte Josephine Christian, Organizing Secretary; Dianne Brown Cannestra, Treasurer; Susan Durden Lemesis, Registrar; Catherine Derst Miller, Historian; Paula Hannah Osborne, Librarian; Billie Jean Goodwin, Curator; Becky Malone West, Parliamentarian.

The State Regent called the meeting to order. The invocation was given by Melodye Brown, State Chaplain. Mrs. Baldwin then welcomed the members of the Executive Committee. The minutes of the August 25, 2010 Executive Committee Meeting and the July 13, 2010 "virtual" meeting were previously provided to the State Officers and State Parliamentarian. There being no corrections, the minutes were approved as printed.

The Treasurer gave the financial report, giving the following summary of accounts as of September 30, 2010: checking account balance \$30,036.25; money market balance \$41,478.85; and certificates of deposit \$118,864.24; making total assets of \$190,479.34. The Meadow Garden accounts as of September 30, 2010 were as follows: certificates of deposit \$400,000.00; checking account balance \$29,538.09; money market balance \$56,097.66; fixed assets \$167,830.65; petty cash \$100.00; making total assets of \$653,566.40. The financial reports were filed. Treasurer forms are now available on the Georgia Members web site. The deadline for chapter dues and conference fees is December 1. Mrs. Cannestra stated that she had researched the possibility of scanning State Treasurer's records, contacting Direct Data Capture Group (DDC Group) of Atlanta for an estimate. With 38,000 pages and at six cents per page, the cost was estimated at \$3,000. Mrs. Cannestra expressed her concerns on the search capabilities with the DVDs and recommended that the idea of scanning and moving the records at this time be abandoned. Mrs. Cannestra extended her appreciation to Bea Fischer for filing the State Society's payroll taxes and to Robin McIntire, CPA, for filing the State Society's tax returns, at no charge.

The State Regent expressed her appreciation to Meadow Garden for accommodating the Meadow Garden Board, Finance, Bylaws and Resolutions Committee meetings and the Executive Board Meeting at the Heritage Center during the day. Meadow Garden hosted two successful docent training classes, with over 55 Daughters in attendance.

Mrs. Baldwin reviewed the State Board of Management meeting agenda and the items to be addressed by the State Officers. Mrs. Baldwin stated her intent to bring the "Annual State Society Contribution to the President General's Project" resolution to the State Board of Management as a recommendation from the Executive Board (2009-2010 Proceedings, Items of Information, page 233).

Discussion was held on the Meadow Garden Board recommendation to replace the fence at Meadow Garden. Mrs. Baldwin reviewed the overall project, explaining the basic structure along with alternative designs and cost estimates being considered. Mrs. Lingelbach, Meadow Garden Secretary, read the Meadow Garden Board recommendation for clarification. Mrs. Lemesis moved that "the Executive Board recommend that the State Board of Management accept the Meadow Garden Board recommendation to replace the fence once approved by Historic

Augusta with the cost not to exceed \$50,000.00." The motion was seconded and adopted.

The State Regent addressed an issue that occurred at the Perry Workshop: members eating lunch without paying. To prevent a recurrence of this, State Board of Management Registration and Luncheon fees were combined. This means the luncheon will be a working lunch, with reports and business conducted.

Mrs. Baldwin announced that J. Michael Tomme, Sr., representing the Georgia Society, Sons of the American Revolution, will be our guest at lunch and will make a special presentation to the Georgia State Society.

The State Regent reported that Laura Belle Macrae, 50-Year Club State Chairman, requested a replacement be found for her chairmanship due to ill health. Mrs. Baldwin asked officers to notify Nancy Collins Tims, State Page Chairman, if they knew of any Juniors interested in paging at State Conference or Continental Congress. Those interested in serving on a Congressional Committee will be able to sign up at the Credentials table at this State Board of Management. To minimize time and effort in distributing the Treasurer's report during State Conference meetings, a voters packet was suggested to include the Treasurer's report, any bylaw changes, and resolutions which could be handed out at the Credentials table. The annual Chapter Bazaar will be held at State Conference on Friday, April 29. The choice of printer for the State Conference program will be the responsibility of the Corresponding Secretary. Officers with program submissions were advised to contact the Corresponding Secretary for deadlines.

The First Vice Regent announced plans for the 2011 Georgia Luncheon at Continental Congress to be held on Friday, July 1, 2011 at the J.W. Marriott Hotel. The theme for the luncheon will be "Fanfare Extraordinaire." Tickets will be available at State Conference at a cost of \$50. Mrs. Lingelbach discussed the plans for evening receptions at State Conference and the State Officers' hosting duties and responsibilities.

The Second Vice Regent reported that the School Committee had sold 110 National DAR School "Soar With Education" pins to date, totaling \$2,750. She announced that a sales table is available at this State Board of Management with pins, information on the schools and school donations. Thrift items are to be collected for the "Special Times Boutique" and snacks for Tamassee DAR School as well as health items for the Kate Duncan Smith DAR School. Requests for chapter contributions of these under \$5.00 items received an overwhelming response at workshops. Mrs. Fischer expressed her appreciation to Betty Brown Harrah and Phyllis Fox Lawson for their help with sales and collections. Mrs. Fischer reported on her trip on the National DAR School Tour, commending the National DAR School Tour Co-Chairmen Virginia Lingelbach and Phyllis Lawson for their hard work and dedication in making it such a success. Georgia had a total of eight Daughters on the tour.

The Chaplain reported the deaths of 83 Georgia Daughters since State Conference. Birthday greetings have been sent on behalf of the Georgia Society to members 90 and above. A dozen yellow roses were sent to Honorary State Regent Evelyn Waite on her 100th birthday. As past Recording Secretary, Ms. Brown announced the publication of the 2009-2010 Proceedings with distribution at this State Board of Management. Due to the changes in National and State administrations, some appointments were made after publication. These additions are on the Georgia Members web site and will be in the next State Regent's letter. Softcopies of the 2007-2008, 2008-2009 and 2009-2010 Proceedings were given to the State Recording Secretary. Ms. Brown recommended that the State Society keep

a softcopy library of the Proceedings, to be maintained by each succeeding Recording Secretary.

The Recording Secretary reported on the progress in compiling the 2010-2011 State Proceedings. Mrs. Simonds stated that the State Society will continue to use Litho Press Printers in Macon to publish the Proceedings. An estimate was requested from Litho Press and submitted to the Finance Committee. The total cost for a 250 book count with a double glued binding is \$5,371. The Georgia State Society motion cards are now available on the Georgia Members' Web Site as a PDF writable document, with the three-part hardcopy still available at all state functions. Mrs. Simonds extended her gratitude to past State Recording Secretary Melodye Brown for her guidance.

The Corresponding Secretary reported the State Regent's letter was distributed by email and posted on the Georgia Members web site. The State Directory is being kept up to date on the Georgia Members web site. The Georgia Master Questionnaire is being distributed at this State Board of Management, with instructions on retrieving the NSDAR Master Questionnaire from the DAR Members web site. The Georgia Master Questionnaire is also now on line as writable pages to be downloaded.

The Organizing Secretary announced the verification of two Organizing Regents, Helen Busbin and Karen Sokol, approved at National Board on October 9, 2010. The Governor David Emanuel - Adam Brinson merged chapter is in the process of combining their respective properties. Two chapters in danger of disbanding are working with Julie Brooks Prince, Chapter Development and Revitalization Chairman.

The Registrar reported that Georgia's current membership count is at 7,256, with a gain of 327 new members this year and a loss of 249 members, which included 165 resignations and 84 deaths. This represented a net increase of 78 members. Georgia welcomed 54 new Juniors for a total of 462 Junior members. Chapters are in the process of submitting chapter yearbooks. Questions on accessing e-Membership are now on the Master Questionnaire. Only eight chapters have not accessed e-Membership in the last 80 days.

The Historian has received 10 Member Marker report forms for DAR member grave markers. Information has been submitted on Meadow Garden, owned by the Georgia State Society, and on homes previously and presently owned by local chapters. Mrs. Miller encouraged chapters to send nominations for the Outstanding Teacher of American History Contest with a deadline of December 1.

The Librarian reported the Georgia State Society has 17 book credits from nine chapters as of September 30, 2010. A total of six packages of bookplates were sold at workshops. During the National DAR School Tour, Mrs. Osborne met with Joan McInnes Hunter, Librarian General, to discuss updates on the DAR Library.

The Curator reported that property of the Georgia State Society is accounted for and in good working order.

The Parliamentarian reported receiving bylaws from 38 chapters to date, reviewing them for compliance with National Society and Georgia State Society Bylaws. After review, her suggestions are made to those chapters via email in order to bring their bylaws into compliance. Chapter Parliamentarian contact information has been requested from each chapter.

The State Regent reported that the Philadelphia Winn Chapter had requested that the Georgia State Society co-sponsor with Task Force Patriot, Inc. a charity golf tournament to benefit Tamassee DAR School. After extensive research by Becky West, State Parliamentarian, and consultation by both Mrs. Baldwin and Mrs. West with the President General and the National Parliamentarian, it was concluded that the State Society's participation would be in conflict with NSDAR policy. Mrs. Baldwin

stated she had sent a letter to Chapter Regent Peggy Freeman explaining the decision not to participate.

In new business, Ms. Brown stated that over 200 Proceedings copies spanning 15 years are now in inventory, making storage, transport, and sales difficult and burdensome. All Proceedings prior to the administration of the immediate past State Regent have been on sale for \$1.00 since August of 2009, without a significant decrease in inventory. A policy needs to be put in place to manage the inventory, such that no more than four years (two administrations) of Proceedings are maintained at any given time. Ms. Brown moved "that prior to the publication of the first Proceedings (at the last State Board of Management) of the current administration, all copies of the Proceedings prior to the administration of the immediate past State Regent, which are in the possession of the State Recording Secretary and/or the DAR Literature Committee, shall be properly disposed of by those in possession. Prior to disposal the Recording Secretary shall be responsible for ensuring a copy of each Proceedings issue to be disposed of has been placed in the Waite Collection in the Stribling Room at Meadow Garden." Motion seconded and adopted.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 6:13 p.m.

April 28, 2011

The Executive Committee of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, met April 28, 2011, in Augustino's Restaurant at the Augusta Marriott Hotel and Suites in Augusta, at 4:45 p.m., with Sally McGlaun Baldwin, State Regent presiding.

Others present were: Virginia Grace Lingelbach, First Vice Regent; Ida "Bea" Best Fischer, Second Vice Regent; Melodye G. Brown, Chaplain; Mary Farthing Simonds, Recording Secretary; Brenda Davison Jessel, Corresponding Secretary; Charlotte Josephine Christian, Organizing Secretary; Dianne Brown Cannestra, Treasurer; Susan Durden Lemesis, Registrar; Catherine Derst Miller, Historian; Paula Hannah Osborne, Librarian; Billie Jean Goodwin, Curator; Becky Malone West, Parliamentarian.

The State Regent called the meeting to order. The invocation was offered by State Chaplain Melodye Brown. Mrs. Baldwin then welcomed the members of the Executive Committee.

The State Regent shared her concerns at the news of the devastating storms throughout Georgia and inquired of any new information on the storm damage, especially at Berry College. The First Vice Regent received an email from Alexander "Whit" Whitaker, Chief of Staff, describing the worst storm damage in the history of Berry College, with the loss of 100-year-old trees and the destruction of two log cabins on campus. Luckily no injuries were incurred and the school, with no power, was still open for classes. Mr. Whitaker reported that he would be in attendance at State Conference.

The minutes of the October 29, 2010 Executive Committee Meeting were previously provided to the State Officers and State Parliamentarian by email. There being no further corrections, the minutes were **approved** as sent.

The State Regent shared some of the details of State Conference events, especially those at Meadow Garden. The reception at Meadow Garden will include a tour, group pictures, and a C.A.R. flag donation presentation to Meadow Garden. The Walton Rehabilitation Center generously agreed to open their back gate to facilitate easy access to the bus. During the Opening Night Banquet several guests will be

honored for their dedicated service to Meadow Garden. Brigadier General James Sehorn will be the keynote speaker. The visiting State Regents will be Ree Curtis, State Regent of Mexico and Sharon Thorne-Sulima, State Regent of the District of Columbia. Mrs. Baldwin discussed some of the items on the agenda for the business meeting, such as the security fence at Meadow Garden and the Executive Board recommendation.

The State Regent reviewed some of the calendar of events for 2011-2012. Two District Workshops will be held in August, one on August 19 in Gainesville and in Perry on August 20, with the Executive Board meeting on August 18 in Gainesville. The Constitution Week Luncheon will be held on Saturday, September 17 in Atlanta. The State Board of Management will be held in Augusta, October 28-29, 2011, and State Conference being held at the Marriott in Macon, May 3-6, 2012.

Mrs. Baldwin urged each officer to review the State Society procedures or items related to their office to identify which are applicable or no longer applicable. Mrs. Baldwin and Mrs. Lemesis cited a few examples that they felt were no longer necessary to their office. Mrs. Baldwin encouraged officers to send their input on this matter as soon as possible to the Corresponding Secretary in order to ensure the correct content in the Chapter Information Packet.

The First Vice Regent reported that 43 tickets had been sold to date to the Georgia Luncheon at 120th Continental Congress, which included reservations for two National Officers. Mrs. Lingelbach stated that she had tickets available at a cost of \$50.

The Second Vice Regent waived her report until the School / Youth Luncheon. Mrs. Fischer stated that the DAR School Supper at Continental Congress would be held on Friday, July 1, 2011 at 4:30 p.m., with tickets available for \$58. The Georgia State Society is hoping to sponsor two Gold Balloon tables.

The Chaplain reported that 152 Georgia Daughters would be remembered at the Memorial Service on Friday, April 29, 2011. Ms. Brown asked to be excused from the Executive Breakfast shortly after giving the Blessing in order to make final arrangements for the 10:00 a.m. service.

The Recording Secretary reported that soft copies of the State Proceedings from the past administration and the 2010-2011 working copy have been stored in a safe deposit box for security. Mrs. Simonds stated that she is researching the possibility of posting the 2010-2011 State Proceedings as a document on the Georgia Members' Web Site. Volunteer Information Specialist Chairman and Webmaster, Amy Pittman Lawson, confirmed that the Proceedings could be easily posted in book form and/or as a searchable document. The possibility of leaving the audit out of the book was discussed. Mrs. Simonds also reported that many of the chapter regents had not picked up their Proceedings at State Board of Management and asked for suggestions on a more reliable method of distribution at State Conference. Mrs. Baldwin suggested that the books be given to the Awards Page to have them included in the Regents Awards packet. Mrs. Simonds concurred and agreed to deliver them to the Awards Page.

The Corresponding Secretary handed out the Georgia 113th State Conference Program to all the Officers and the Parliamentarian. The State Regent stated that only procedural changes would be made from the podium and all other changes should be submitted in writing to Mrs. Jessel.

The Organizing Secretary reported attending the organizing meeting of the Andrew McBride Chapter in McDonough in February. Ms. Christian and other officers in attendance at their organizing meeting agreed that it was a very special event with 58 members in total, two-thirds being new DAR members. Two new chapters are

being formed, one in Suwanee and another in the North Fulton / East Cobb area. Two chapters are disbanding: the Fort Early Chapter, by choice, and the Oothcaloga Chapter due to declining membership. It was advised that the Oothcaloga Chapter members should become members-at-large.

The Treasurer distributed the financial statement packets for delegates to all the Officers and the Parliamentarian. Mrs. Cannestra thanked Mrs. Fischer, past State Treasurer, for her invaluable assistance in sorting out the confusion of Quick Books.

The Registrar reported the official membership count as of January 1, 2011 was 7146, indicating a net loss of 32 from January 1, 2010. The current membership count is 7271, including 457 Junior members. This is a net gain of 147 members. There were 44 drops, which included 13 from William Witcher Chapter, and 10 from the Earl of Camden Chapter. A possible penalty was discussed for those chapters that do not pay their State dues. Mrs. Baldwin suggested that Lanette Haar Reid, State Chairman, By Laws Committee be consulted on the issue of non-payment of State dues.

The Historian waived her report until the business session. Mrs. Miller stated that she would present the Outstanding Teacher of American History Award at the Opening Night Banquet.

The Librarian reported that bookplates had been ordered from Litho Press Printers in Macon based on their competitive pricing. Mrs. Osborne announced that books had been donated to the DAR Library in honor of the State Regent. Mrs. Osborne stated that she would make requests of the Georgia Daughters to identify books on Georgia to add to the DAR Library Wish List.

The Curator was happy to announce that the banner to replace the wooden, lighted Insignia was picked up at Southern Tailors in Atlanta by her this morning. The banner, gonfalon style, was designed by Amy Lawson. Ms. Goodwin extended her gratitude to the State Regent for her input and approval, Mrs. Lawson for her beautiful design and Mrs. Cannestra.

The Parliamentarian also waived her report until the business session. Mrs. West distributed seating charts to those officers responsible for Conference events and requested they review the charts and floor plans for any changes that might be needed.

Mrs. Cannestra encouraged support for Shelby Alderman Whitson as a candidate for Honorary Vice President General for Life. Mrs. Lingelbach stated that a formal resolution to endorse Mrs. Whitson as a candidate for Honorary Vice President General would be presented by the Resolutions Committee.

The First Vice Regent gave details on the amendment to the "Georgia Hospitality Fund" which will be presented at this State Conference. Mrs. Lingelbach went on to state that the amended resolution should be included in the 2010-2011 Proceedings under Items of Information.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 5:55 p.m.

State Board of Management Meeting October 30, 2010

The State Board of Management of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, met on October 30, 2010 at the Riverfront Marriott Hotel in Augusta, with the State Regent, Sally McGlaun Baldwin, presiding and State Recording Secretary, Mary Farthing Simonds, present at the meeting.

The meeting was called to order at 9:06 a.m. The Invocation was given by Melodye G. Brown, State Chaplain. Kathleen Ward Hart, State Chairman, Flag of the United States of America, led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America. The American's Creed was led by Nancy McElderry Parks, Regent of the Augusta Chapter. The first verse of the National Anthem was led by Betty McAdams Durshimer, Regent of the College Hill Chapter. The Pledge to the Georgia Flag was led by Karen Buck Sokol, Organizing Chapter Regent. The Colors were posted and the Color Guard was retired.

The State Regent thanked the members of the Academy of Richmond County Junior ROTC Color Guard and presented Sergeant Major Noel Cartoginia, Commander of the Color Guard, with a Certificate of Appreciation for its participation.

The State Regent welcomed everyone to State Board of Management and to Augusta. Mrs. Baldwin expressed her appreciation to Meadow Garden for hosting the committee meetings and the docent classes. A special thank you was extended to Pat Olds Bracy and her committee for organizing the wonderful reception for the traveling group. Mrs. Baldwin also extended her thanks to the hostess chapter for the enjoyable gift basket received upon her arrival.

The Regent recognized Nancy Parks, Regent of Augusta Chapter, who brought greetings from the hostess chapter members.

The State Regent expressed how honored the Georgia State Society was to have two National Officers and introduced **distinguished Georgia Daughter** Laura Marcella Reid, Chaplain General, Honorary State Regent. Barbara Blakely Chastain, Vice President General, Honorary State Regent, could not attend due to her mother's illness.

The First Vice Regent, Virginia Grace Lingelbach, recognized **Honorary State Regents and Past National Officers**: Laura Reid, Chaplain General, Honorary State Regent; Lanette Haar Reid, Honorary State Regent; Anne Whipple Murphey Honorary State Regent; Alae Risse Barron Leitch, Honorary State Regent, Past Historian General; Dollye Wren Ward, Honorary State Regent; Carolyn Grant Hanf, Honorary State Regent, Past Treasurer General, Past Vice President General; Edwina Hall Beall, Honorary State Regent; Rosemary Crow Hunter, Honorary State Regent, Past Vice President General; Shelby Alderman Whitson, Honorary State Regent, Past Vice President General. The State Regent asked the Veterans Affairs Voluntary Service (VAVS) representatives and deputies to stand and be recognized: Augusta: Betty McAdams Durshimer, representative; Decatur: Rebecca "Becky" Miller Rostron, representative; Martha Middlebrooks Knight, deputy; Dublin: Patricia "Pat" Pattillo Mercer, deputy.

Mary Grace "M.G." Finney Whittle, Coordinator of Districts, presented District Directors: Phyllis Lawson, District 1; Becky Rostron, District 2; Louise Greene Henry, District 3; Ann Scott Williams, District 4. The State Regent thanked each for their professionalism and dedication in keeping the state and chapters running smoothly.

The State Regent recognized the Timekeepers: Chairman, Freida Clark Gibby, and members Bessie Anne Hord Bretch and Jean Wallace Brown.

The State Parliamentarian read article VIII, Sections 1,3,4,5 of the State Bylaws pertaining to the State Board of Management.

The State Regent introduced Audrey Struble Litts, Chairman, Credentials, who gave the **first Credentials report**: 78 voting members registered, representing 70 chapters. In attendance were: 11 State Officers, 1 National Officer, 9 Honorary State Regents (1 of whom are reported elsewhere) and 59 chapter Regents (1 of whom are reported elsewhere). Also present were: 1 State Parliamentarian, 7 National Chairmen (7 of whom are reported elsewhere), 10 National Vice Chairmen (6 of whom are reported elsewhere), 44 State Chairmen (17 of whom are reported elsewhere), 28 State Vice Chairmen (19 of whom are reported elsewhere), 44 chapter members and 4 Guests. Without duplication, 163 Georgia Daughters were in attendance. Mrs. Litts **moved the adoption of the first Credentials report**. **Adopted**. A quorum was established.

The State Regent stated if there were no objections, the Proceedings Committee would approve the minutes of the State Board of Management Meeting. Hearing none, the Proceedings Committee will approve the minutes of this meeting.

The State First Vice Regent took the chair while the State Regent gave her report.

The **State Regent** experienced warm fellowship and true Southern hospitality at each tea and luncheon on official visits to District 1 chapters with District

1 Director, Phyllis Lawson. Like many State Regents before her, Mrs. Baldwin stated that visiting with the chapters has been a highlight of serving as State Regent and leaves her looking forward to visiting with District 2 chapters in the coming months. She expressed thanks to members who attended each chapter visit, not only for their support of the administration but for their show of friendship. The State Regent participated in the National School Tour, with attendance at KDS DAR School Dedication Day and a memorable lunch and dinner at Berry College. Mrs. Baldwin thanked members for their support of the schools and noted each trip to a school helps contribute to the success in the education of a child.

Mrs. Baldwin reported attending the National Board of Management Meeting in October and shared news from National. The D Street taxi ramp curb is being leveled off for easier access and member safety. The President General's pin and the Benefactor pins are now available. Only two logos are authorized by the National Society: the official insignia and the DAR logo. Chapter logos are not allowed. In making hotel reservations for Continental Congress, roommates may be added by simply modifying the reservation. State buses to Continental Congress will be charged a \$75 daily parking fee. The shuttle bus during Congress will not be available due to a \$25,000 deficit. The DAR Store is offering new and updated items: flag code brochures, Chapter Regent's manual, gift bags, presentation certificate folders and 9/11 banners. The Registrar General reported 463 Juniors approved, 260 new ancestor lines and a total of 3,722 applications verified. From July 1, 2010 to October 7, 2010 the Organizing Secretary reported 250 members reinstated, 1115 resignations and 888 deaths. For those members interested in serving on a Congressional Committee the State Regent encouraged members to place their name in a sign-up notebook circulated at this meeting and at State Conference. Mrs. Baldwin thanked the assembly for their commitment and hard work in service to the Georgia State Society.

On behalf of the Georgia Daughters, Mrs. Lingelbach indicated the applause of the assembly represented their love and appreciation for the State Regent and their dedication and support of this administration.

The State Regent resumed the chair and called for the reports of the officers. State First Vice Regent, Virginia Lingelbach reported on the duties of her office and responsibilities as Secretary of the Meadow Garden Board and Finance Committee, attending all meetings, as well as serving as a member of the Proceedings Committee. Mrs. Lingelbach participated in the NSDAR National School Tour and was honored to represent the Georgia State Regent at the dedication ceremony at Tamassee DAR School, dedicating the gifts of the Georgia Daughters. On behalf of the State School Chairman, Mrs. Lingelbach delivered clinic supplies to Kate Duncan Smith DAR School. Mrs. Lingelbach announced the plans for the Georgia Luncheon at Continental Congress with the theme of "Fanfare Extraordinaire." The luncheon will be held on Friday, July 1, 2011 at 12:00 noon at the J. W. Marriott Hotel, with tickets available at State Conference for \$50.

The **State Second Vice Regent** and **DAR School** Chairman, Bea Fischer reported Georgia sales of the "Soar With Education" DAR School pins have resulted in proceeds totaling \$2,750. Evening gowns for the "Special Times" boutique and snacks for Tamassee DAR School and Health Clinic items for KDS DAR School are being collected today. Collections at workshops for the under \$5 items received an overwhelming response. Mrs. Fischer thanked the Georgia Daughters for their generosity to the schools. Mrs. Fischer was privileged to participate in the National DAR School Tour, with a total of eight Georgia Daughters on the trip. The Second

Vice Regent encouraged members to attend the School / Youth Luncheon at State Conference on April 30, 2011.

The **State Chaplain**, Melodye Brown, as past State Recording Secretary, announced the publication of the 2009 – 2010 Proceedings, with distribution at this meeting. Updates to the Proceedings may be found on the Georgia Members' Web Site. Any corrections may be made on the blue forms at the distribution table and submitted to the current Recording Secretary, Mary Simonds. Ms. Brown expressed her appreciation to Barbara Chastain and to Lynn Wright for their support and contributions to the Proceedings. The State Chaplain reported the deaths of 83 Georgia Daughters since State Conference. Notes of condolence have been sent when the names of the next of kin were provided. Birthday greetings have been sent on behalf of the Georgia State Society to members age 90 and above. Ms. Brown encouraged Chapter Chaplains to send in the names of members age 90 and over; even if their birthdays have been sent in previously. A dozen yellow roses were sent to Honorary State Regent Evelyn Waite on the occasion of her 100th birthday.

The **State Recording Secretary** and **Proceedings** Chairman, Mary Simonds reported that the goal for the 2010 – 2011 Proceedings Committee was to achieve complete, accurate and timely reporting. Officers, chairmen and chapter regents were reminded of Proceedings deadlines and reporting requirements. The State Recording Secretary offered assistance to chapter recording secretaries. Mrs. Simonds announced the Georgia State Society motion cards are now available on the Georgia Members' Web Site as a PDF writeable document, with the three-part hardcopy still available at all state meetings.

The Recording Secretary requested the First Vice Regent take the chair.

The State Recording Secretary read the following recommendation: "The Executive Committee recommends to the State Board of Management that \$500 be donated to the NSDAR Library in honor of Georgia State Regent Sally McGlaun Baldwin, for the purchase of books for the Georgia shelf. The check is to be sent after March 1, 2011, for use in that fiscal year." The recommendation was adopted.

Mrs. Simonds read the following recommendation: "The Executive Committee recommends that the State Society contribute \$1,000 to the President General's Project in honor of State Regent, Sally McGlaun Baldwin." Adopted..

The State Regent resumed the chair. The State Recording Secretary continued to read Executive Committee recommendations. Mrs. Simonds read the following recommendation: "The Executive Committee recommends that the State Board of Management ratify the appointment of Ida Bea Fischer to the office of State Second Vice Regent." Ratified.

Mrs. Simonds read the following recommendation: "The Executive Committee recommends the State Board of Management ratify the appointment of Dianne Brown Cannestra to the office of State Treasurer." Ratified.

The State Recording Secretary, Mrs. Simonds, read the following recommendation: "The Executive Board recommends the State Board of Management ratify the appointment of Catherine Derst Miller to the office of State Historian." Ratified.

Mrs. Simonds read the following recommendation: "The Executive Committee recommends that the State Board of Management accept the Meadow Garden Board proposal to replace the fence once approved by Historic Augusta. The cost not to exceed \$50,000." Adopted.

The **State Registrar**, Susan Lemesis, reported the following: the current membership count is 7,256 with 325 new members. There are 462 Junior members in the State Society, 54 of whom are new members. Mrs. Lemesis was gratified that chapter regents and registrars are using e-membership in reporting the status of their members. Mrs. Lemesis encouraged chapters to send in their yearbooks, emphasizing the fact that yearbook submissions are an Honor Roll requirement.

The **State Corresponding Secretary**, Brenda Jessel, reported the distribution of the 2010 – 2011 Georgia State Society Master Questionnaire at the State Board of Management. Chapter regents may download the NSDAR Master Questionnaire from the DAR Members' Web Site. In addition, the Georgia Master Questionnaire pages are available on the Georgia Members' Web Site as writeable individual forms. The deadline for these reports is on or before February 1, 2011. Mrs. Jessel recognized the expertise of Volunteer Information Specialists Chairman Amy Pittman Lawson and Vice Chairman Jenny Beth Jacoby in making this technological advance possible. Mrs. Jessel encouraged the purchase of certificates of award and appreciation, and State Directories. Mrs. Jessel also reported that numerous information emails had been sent to state email lists in order to keep members up to date.

The **State Organizing Secretary**, Charlotte Christian, reported the merging of two Chapters and welcomed their two Organizing Regents, Helen Barham Busbin and Karen Sokol. Ms. Christian stated that several chapters were in jeopardy of disbanding. The State Organizing Secretary offered her assistance to any chapter in need of her guidance and suggested chapters also contact Julie Brooks Prince, State Chairman, Chapter Development and Revitalization.

The State Regent addressed a financial issue that occurred at the Perry Workshop, non-payment for luncheon meals. To avoid this situation registration and lunch fees will be combined.

The **State Treasurer**, Dianne Cannestra gave the following summary of accounts for the Georgia State Society as of September 30, 2010: certificates of deposit \$118,864.24; checking account balance \$30,036.25; money market balance \$41,578.85; making total assets of \$190,479.34. The Meadow Garden accounts as of September 30, 2010 were summarized as follows: certificates of deposit \$400,000.00; checking account balance \$29,538.09; money market balance \$56,097.66; petty cash balance \$100.00; fixed assets \$167,830.65 making total assets of \$653,566.40 filed. Chapter dues and Conference fees are due December 1. Treasurer forms are now available on the Georgia Members' Web Site.

Shelby Whitson, Chairman of the **Finance** Committee, reported the committee met on October 29, 2010 to prepare the 2011-2012 Georgia State Society proposed budget. This proposed budget will be published in the Call to Conference letter.

The **State Historian**, Cathy Miller reported receiving ten Member Marker forms for DAR member grave markers. Information and updates were received on Meadow Garden, and on homes previously and presently owned by Georgia chapters. Mrs. Miller stated the chapter nominations for the Outstanding Teacher of American History Award Contest are due by December 1, 2010.

The **State Librarian and DAR Library Chairman**, Paula Osborne reported the Georgia State Society has 17 book credits from nine chapters as of September 30, 2010. In total, 24 bookplates have been sold. A package of four bookplates may be purchased for \$1. Mrs. Osborne stressed the need for the addition of Georgia genealogy books to the Georgia Wish List. Mrs. Osborne encouraged chapter book

donations as well as monetary donations to the Friends of the NSDAR Library and Friends of the Seimes Technology Center.

The **State Curator**, Billie Goodwin, reported the property of the State Society was accounted for and was in good condition.

The **State Parliamentarian**, Becky West reviewed chapter bylaw requirements in order to comply with the National Society and Georgia State Society. The deadline for submission of chapter bylaws was October 1, 2010. Mrs. West urged chapters to send in their bylaws as soon as possible. Wording for model chapter bylaws can be found in the *DAR National Handbook* or in *Robert's Rules of Order*. Mrs. West also requested that each chapter submit the name and contact information of their chapter parliamentarian.

The State Regent called for the Reports of the Coordinator of Districts and District Directors. The Coordinator of Districts, M. G. Whittle reported a successful summer Workshop tour, especially with the Genealogy, Master Questionnaire and VIS sessions at Perry Workshop. Mrs. Whittle thanked the District Directors for their leadership and guidance in working with the chapter regents and in planning the State Regent's chapter visits. Mrs. Whittle announced the location and dates of the 2011 Workshops, one to be held at the Georgia Mountain Center in Gainesville on Friday, August 19, 2011 and the other at the Agriculture Center in Perry on August 20, 2011. Mrs. Whittle encouraged chapter regents and members to attend workshops. District 1 Director Phyllis Lawson reported on the State Regent's visits to District 1 chapters. Informal lunches and were well attended and enjoyed by all. District 2 Director Becky Rostron reported the celebration of three chapter anniversaries and announced the State Regent's visit will be held the week of November 14. As a VAVS representative, Mrs. Rostron addressed the new Federal regulations at all the VA facilities. Mrs. Rostron also encouraged members to purchase tickets for the "Belk Charity" drive to benefit veterans. District 3 Director Louise Henry reported the merging of two District 3 chapters, Governor David Emanuel and Adam Brinson. Dr. Henry announced State Regent's District 3 Visits will be held in February 2011 and encouraged chapters to notify her of their intentions of scheduling an event. District 4 Director Ann Williams reported the regents and chapter members of District 4 continue to stir "the Flames of Patriotism" for the Baldwin administration. Ms. Williams reported the organization of a new chapter for District 4.

Following a brief recess, the business meeting resumed, with the State Regent urging State Officers and State Chairmen to submit articles by email for the State Regent's newsletter by December 1, 2010.

Mrs. Baldwin announced reporting would continue with the Meadow Garden Committee Chairmen. Meadow Garden State Chairman Margaret Poole Cagle reported for the Docents and Landscaping Chairmen. Mrs. Cagle reported the docent classes at the Heritage Center on October 29 were well attended. The dilapidated outhouse was removed and repair of the walkway from the door to the street was completed. Mrs. Cagle announced Christmas at Meadow Garden would begin on December 13th and encouraged members to schedule a holiday visit. Furnishings, Patricia Cown Burnam reported donations from Georgia daughters and patrons, including a computer, a painting of Meadow Garden and a book on George Walton. Heritage Preservation. Virginia Ranson Nicholson reported the restoration of a Federal Period coin collection and the evaluation of at-risk items. Gift Shop, Phyllis Lawson encouraged members to visit the sales table and view the new items. Mrs. Lawson asked chapter regents to pick up packets of Meadow Garden brochures for their local welcome centers or chambers of commerce for Honor Roll credit.

Patrons, Jane Joyner Hampton reported sending emails to chapters, encouraging support of Meadow Garden by becoming individual or chapter patrons.

The State Regent asked Virginia Lingelbach, Secretary, Meadow Garden Board, to the recommendation from the board. The Meadow Garden Board recommends to the State Board of Management "that the fence at Meadow Garden be replaced once approved by Historic Augusta. Costs not to exceed \$50,000." Carolyn Hanf moved that "the motion be tabled until State Conference, with its larger attendance, and asked that the Meadow Garden Board then present plans once approved by Historic Augusta." After further discussion, Mrs. Hanf withdrew her motion from the floor. Priscilla Doster moved to amend the original motion by striking the last sentence. The motion would then read" The fence at Meadow Garden be replaced once approved by Historic Augusta." Adopted.

Mrs. Baldwin called for reports from State Chairmen of National Committees: Americanism, Rachel Cole Colbert reported the Medal of Honor and the Americanism Medal entry forms may be found on the DAR Members' Web Site. Mrs. Colbert announced committee awards offered; Chapter Achievement, Eleanor Brinson Quigley reviewed requirements for Chapter Achievement awards and stressed each section of the form be reviewed to achieve maximum points: Community Service Awards, Helen Robertson Powell encouraged chapters to their communities. recognize volunteer service in Mrs. Powell reported recommendation service award packets for five individuals had been received, with the approval of four. Chapters may submit only two individuals for the award each year; Constitution Week, Joyce Patton reported a record number of attendees at the Georgia State Society Constitution Week Luncheon. Chapters were encouraged to send in their reports and scrapbooks for judging. Mrs. Patton reminded members of the Poster Contest with a deadline of November 5; DAR Good Citizens, Jo An Johnson Chewning outlined the process of sponsoring and recognizing DAR Good Citizens; DAR Magazine, DAR Public Relations and Media, State Directory, Lynn Moulton Wright reminded chapters that in order to receive Chapter Achievement Award credit for the November / December co-op chapter ads, checks must be received by December 1. Magazine subscriptions for the Chapter Achievement Award percentage are counted as of December 31. Mrs. Wright requested that examples of promotional materials be submitted directly to her, and reported on the Master Questionnaire. Chapters were encouraged to make submissions to the chapter newsletter and brochure contests, with a deadline of February 15. State Directories were available for \$5 at the Literature Table or by contacting the State Corresponding Secretary. All corrections are posted on the Georgia Members' Web Site; DAR Museum, Therry Nash Deal reviewed the Georgia State questions on the Master Questionnaire and encouraged chapters to answer in order to receive state awards. Mrs. Deal announced an informal gathering for Correspondent Docents will be held during State Conference. The State Regent asked all DAR Museum Correspondent Docents stand and be recognized. DAR Service for Veterans, Kelly Calabrese Becker reported a successful launch of the new "Adopt-a-Veteran" project and outlined the many ways chapters could support the project. Three National Contests are offered, with the deadline for nominations of December 1; Genealogical Records, Sherrin Newsome Willis reported that 650 pages of original source documents had been submitted since Workshop; Historic Preservation, Lynn Brackey reported one nomination for the Historic Preservation Recognition Award. Chapters are encouraged to recognize outstanding contributions in all areas of historic preservation; Lineage Research, Marguerite McEntee Dyal announced significant improvements in the Lineage Research web page under the DAR

Members' Web Site and encouraged chapters to conduct public prospective member workshops with the Lineage Research, Membership and Volunteer Genealogy Committees.

Reports continued with State Chairmen of National Special Committees: Chapter Development and Revitalization, Julie Prince reported an analysis of chapter statistical information would be instrumental in identifying chapter problems. Mrs. Prince requested that chapters submit their attendance records by the February 1 deadline to be eligible for awards; Commemorative Events. Betty Brown Harrah announced a poster contest in recognition of the 10th anniversary of 9/11. Mrs. Harrah reported on the Appling Sword State Regent's Project to contribute toward the ceremonial sword of Lt. Colonel Daniel Appling, Georgia hero of the War of 1812, and gave details for member support; DAR Project Patriot, Betty Garlington Christy requested chapters read and review the committee Chapter Information Packet (CIP) letter. Mrs. Christy reported that no Christmas cards should be sent directly to Landstuhl Hospital in Germany; Special Project Grants, Vickie Lancaster Cobb reported that grants provide financial support to projects that exemplify the mission of NSDAR. Mrs. Cobb provided application guidelines and examples of grant funding; Volunteer Genealogists, Dee McCranie Redkevitch reported that the National Society had discontinued all Genealogy, to be replaced by webinars conducted by professionals. Mrs. Redkevitch announced that a Genealogy Workshop will be held during State Conference. Mrs. Baldwin requested that all Volunteer Genealogists stand to be recognized. Women's Issues, Sara Stone Carter urged chapters to plan programs on Women's Issues and encouraged members to enter the committee contest by submitting articles on any issues that affect women, such as health and financial management.

The State Regent called for reports from State Chairmen of **State Standing Committees**. **Proceedings**, Mary Simonds advised that guidelines for Proceedings reporting could be found in the 2009-2010 Proceedings, under Items of Information. **Resolutions**, Laura Marcella Reid asked the First Vice Regent to take the chair while she read the **DAR School Per Capita resolution**. **Adopted**. The State Regent resumed the chair. Ms. Reid read the **Appling Sword**. **Adopted**. The State Regent read the **Chaplain General's Wish List**. **Adopted** by a standing vote. Ms. Reid expressed appreciation for the support and generosity of all Georgia Daughters. The First Vice Regent took the chair to read the **Courtesy Resolution** honoring the State Regent. **Adopted** by a standing vote. Ms. Reid read the Courtesy Resolutions. **Adopted**. The resolutions are printed in their entirety at the conclusion of the State Conference minutes. Mrs. Baldwin asked the Resolutions Committee to stand as a group and be recognized.

Mrs. Reid gave the second reading of the "Hospitality to DAR School Reps" resolution. Adopted. Mrs. Reid gave the second reading of the "Candidate for Honorary Vice President General – Support for Shelby Alderman Whitson." The resolution was adopted by a rising vote of the assembly. Mrs. Reid read the Courtesy Resolutions, which were adopted. Chapter chaplains are to be commended for maintaining close connections with members, providing spiritual support and making each member feel part of our organization. Chapters were encouraged to highlight America's spiritual heritage, and to observe NSDAR and National Days of Prayer. Reports were received from 95 chapters. Chaplains contacted 3,596 members unable to attend meetings, gave 781 "sunshine reports," and sent birthday greetings to members age 90 and above. Several chapters reported "card showers" for members over 90. NSDAR Day of Prayer was observed by 40 chapters. Special holiday prayers were sent to members by email. Departed members were remembered with memorial donations, 66 chapter memorial services, and 48 grave markers placed. Flags and flowers were placed on graves of all former regents and members in a cemetery. This officer sent birthday greetings to 178 members celebrating 90th and greater birthdays. Reports of 134 member deaths were received, and condolence notes were sent to families of the deceased. Scripture and prayers were prepared for all state meetings, and plans were made for yesterday's Memorial Service. This officer expresses deep appreciation to those on the Memorial Service Committee for their participation and assistance in this remembrance of our departed Georgia Daughters.

STATE RECORDING SECRETARY - Mary F. Simonds

This officer attended a Proceedings Committee meeting in June 2010 to proof the 2009-2010 Proceedings. Copies of the 2009-2010 Proceedings are now available for purchase at this State Conference at the DAR Literature table. At the 2010 State Board of Management this officer received boxes of the 2009-2010 Proceedings as well as softcopies of all Proceedings from the last three administrations. To ensure security these softcopies, along with a back-up softcopy of the Proceedings in progress, are being secured offsite. Your State Recording Secretary works to advise and consult with Chapter Recording Secretaries, encourage the purpose of our State Proceedings and to compile and proof the next Proceedings. A printing estimate was received from Litho Press Printers, Macon for a 250 book count with a double glued binding. The estimate of \$5,371 was submitted to the Finance Committee for inclusion in the 2011-2012 Georgia State Budget. Minutes have been recorded at four Executive Committee Meetings and one "virtual" meeting, three District workshops, State Board of Management, and this State Conference. Reports for the 2010-2011 Proceedings have been received from State Officers, State Chairmen and Chapter Regents. The 2010-2011 Proceedings will be distributed at the 2011 State Board of Management. The Georgia State Society motion cards are now posted on the Georgia Members' Web Site as a PDF downloadable document, with the three part hardcopy still available at all state functions. This officer wishes to express her appreciation to our State Regent, our Past Recording Secretary Melodye Brown, and Past Proceedings Chairman Linda Harvey for their support and advice. Madam State Regent, I am honored to have been given the opportunity to serve you and our State Society.

STATE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY - Brenda Davison Jessel

"To serve with Gladness" from Psalm 100 has been this officer's vision this year. "Electronics" may not immediately bring to mind a vision of Gladness, however, the ease of electronic mailing has increased effective communication and movement of information as well as significant cost saving for 2010-2011. It describes well the activities of this state officer. Literally hundreds of emails, including letters from State Regent, announcements and information have been prepared and sent to Honoraries, Officers, Chapter Regents, chairmen and members. Efficient communication of information has been the goal. One hundred four Chapters - 94% - responded to the MQ with positive feedback on the ease of using the eMQ. Chapters and others who do not receive email receive postal mailing as requested. Special thanks to Lynn Wright and Jean Manker in preparation of the Georgia State Directory, and to VIS Chair Amy Lawson and Jenny Jacoby for their fast responses and good humor in all situations. Madam State Regent, this has been a year of Gladness in working with other State Officers and chairmen, in serving you and the Georgia State Society. Thank you for the opportunity.

STATE ORGANIZING SECRETARY – Charlotte Christian

This officer has answered questions regarding the transfer of members, merging of chapters, disbanding of chapters and formation of new chapters. She is pleased to have assisted two groups in organizing new chapters, Andrew McBride in McDonough, Georgia and Suwanee Creek in Suwanee, Georgia. Andrew McBride Chapter was officially organized on February 5, 2011, with 58 initial members. Suwanee Creek is expected to be organized before the end of 2011. Unfortunately, Fort Early Chapter was disbanded in April, 2011. This officer has been working with Julie Prince, Chairman, Chapter Development and Revitalization to assist all chapters

within the Georgia State Society to become the strongest chapters they can be. She began the year by attending Continental Congress and served on the House Committee as a Corridor Hostess, followed by all District Workshops, State Board of Management and all meetings of the Executive Committee. She also participated in welcoming the President General and members of the DAR School Tour during their stop at Berry College. Madam State Regent, it has been an honor and privilege to serve the State Society in your administration.

STATE TREASURER - Dianne Brown Cannestra

The financial records of Georgia State Society are maintained on Quick Books Pro for Non-Profit. All accounts have been reconciled and balanced. Financial Statements have been prepared for Executive Board, Finance Committee, State Board of Management, State Conference, Meadow Garden Board, and Proceedings. Monthly reports and money donated to national funds were sent to Treasurer General. Chapter treasurers' instructions and financial reporting forms were prepared for CIP and the State Web Site. Budgets were prepared for Meadow Garden and Georgia State Society. Credentials, Honor Roll and Chapter Achievement donations were verified and reported to Chairmen. All Meadow Garden payroll and sales tax returns were prepared. This officer attended Continental Congress, Treasurer General's Forum, District Workshops, State Board of Management, all Executive, Finance, and Meadow Garden meetings. Thank you, State Chairmen and Chapter Treasurers for your patience as this State Treasurer transitioned into her position. This Officer appreciates all of the guidance from the former State Treasurer, Bea Fischer, Madam State Regent, thank you for giving me the opportunity to serve you and the State Society.

STATE REGISTRAR - Susan Durden Lemesis

This State Officer attended Continental Congress, State Workshop tours, Fall Board of Management and executive board meetings. She gave programs for DAR, SAR, various hereditary and civic groups. Inquiries on DAR membership and eligibility of ancestors from non-members were answered by e-mail and telephone. She assisted the Organizing Secretary with the formation of the Andrew McBride Chapter. The State Society had 7,178 members as of January 1, 2010 and currently has 7,255. We have 483 new members. Reports of 101 chapters were received. Ninety three chapters are preparing their applications on the computer and 95 are fully utilizing e-membership. Thank you, daughters, for your dedication to our society. Thank you, Madame Regent, for the opportunity to serve.

STATE HISTORIAN – Catherine Derst Miller

This State Officer attended the 119th Continental Congress, Executive Board meetings, all District Workshops, teas in honor of Chaplain General, Laura Marcella Reid, and State Regent, Sally McGlaun Baldwin, State Constitution Week Luncheon, State Board of Management, National DAR School Tour, and brought greetings from the Georgia Daughters at the 72nd Georgia State Society, N.S.C.A.R. State Conference. Augusta Chapter submitted a book of biographical sketches of all Chapter Charter members, their Revolutionary ancestors and activities including helping to save Meadow Garden. Reports were received from 96 chapters. Received 24 member grave markers. NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

June 30, 2011

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This summary of significant accounting policies of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR (the Organization) is presented to assist in understanding the Organization's financial statements. The financial statements and notes are representations of the Organization's management, who is responsible for their integrity and objectivity.

1. Nature of Organization

The Organization is a volunteer women's service organization created to promote patriotism, preserve American history, and secure America's future through better education for children.

2. Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Organization have been prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting, a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles. Accordingly, revenue is recorded when received rather than when earned, and expenses are recorded when paid rather than when incurred.

3. Basis of Presentation

Financial statement presentation follows the recommendation of the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 958 Not-for-Profit Entities. Under ASC 958, the Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted, temporarily restricted, and permanently restricted. A description of the three net asset categories follows:

Unrestricted

Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed restrictions. Unrestricted net assets may be designated for specific purposes by action of the Board of Directors.

Temporarily Restricted

Net assets whose use is subject to donor-imposed restrictions that can be fulfilled by actions of the Organization pursuant to those restrictions or that expire by the passage of time.

Permanently Restricted

Net assets subject to donor-imposed restrictions that they be maintained permanently by the Organization.

4. Use of Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts and disclosures. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

June 30, 2011

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, continued

5. Cash and Cash Equivalents

For the purposes of the statement of financial position and the statement of cash flows, the Organization considers all cash on hand, highly liquid bank deposits, and short-term debt securities with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

6. Property and Equipment

Major preservation or restoration projects are capitalized and depreciated over an estimated useful life of fifteen years. Additions and betterments of \$750 or more are capitalized, while maintenance and repairs that do not improve or extend the useful lives of the respective assets are currently expensed. Depreciation is provided for in amounts sufficient to relate the cost of depreciable assets to operations over their estimated service lives, principally using the straight-line and 200% declining balance methods.

The estimated useful lives in determining depreciation are:

The Organization does not capitalize collections and historical treasurers. Meadow Garden and its contents are historical treasures and are insured for approximately \$439,000.

Depreciation expense for the year ended June 30, 2011 was \$10,191.

7. Donated Services

Many volunteers have made significant contributions of their time to develop and promote the programs of the Organization. The value of these donated services is not included in the accompanying financial statements, as such services do not create or enhance non-financial assets or require specialized skills. If donated services received either create or enhance non-financial assets or required specialized skill, which would need to be purchased if not donated, the value of those donated services would be recorded in accordance with FASB ASC 958.

8. Other Contributions

In accordance FASB ASC 958, contributions received are recorded as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted support depending on the existence and/or nature of donor restrictions. Contributions are recognized when received by the Organization. Conditions that are restricted by the donor are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets if the restrictions expire in the fiscal year in which the contributions are recognized. All other donor-restricted contributions are reported as increases in temporarily or permanently restricted net assets depending on the nature of the restrictions. When a restriction expires, restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets.

9. Membership Dues

Membership dues are recognized when received.

10. Advertising

Advertising costs are expensed as incurred. Advertising expense for the year ended June 30, 2011 was \$5,237.

11. Income Taxes

Georgia State Society, NSDAR, a nonprofit organization operating under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, is exempt from federal, state, and local income taxes, and accordingly, no provision for income taxes is included in the accompanying financial statements for the Organization.

12. Subsequent Events

Subsequent events have been evaluated through August 12, 2011, which is the date the financial statements were issued.

NOTE B - FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS AND CONCENTRATIONS OF CREDIT RISK

The Organization's financial instruments that are exposed to concentrations of credit risk consist primarily of cash and cash equivalents.

The Organization maintains its cash deposits with highly rated financial institutions. At times, such deposits may be in excess of federally insured limits. The Organization did not have any deposits in excess of federally insured limits at June 30, 2011. The Organization has not experienced any losses in such accounts and believes it is not exposed to any significant risk of loss.

NOTE C - AFFILIATES

The Organization collects membership dues and donations from its local Georgia Chapters for the Organization and the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

National Committee Reports

AMERICAN HERITAGE - Marcelaine Crockett Fletcher

The National theme, "Preserving the Past Through Family Traditions," produced outstanding and creative results with 94 chapters reporting. There were 65 chapters presenting programs on American Heritage, and 46 entries in the various contest categories. Vice Chairmen Eloise Wolfersteig, Donna Owens, and Audrey Knight are commended for their support and excellent work on this committee. Winners in the Fiber Arts category are listed in the Awards section of the Proceedings. Other American Heritage category winners from Georgia will be listed in the Congress Awards section. This committee is honored to serve the State Regent and the Georgia State Society.

AMERICAN HISTORY COMMITTEE - Martha W. Dykes

Reports were received from 96 chapters. Chapters and individual members presented 473 American History programs, with 110 programs focusing on outstanding American women. The American History Essay Contest was sponsored in 218 schools, with 4673 students in grades five through eight participating. Chapters awarded 2685 Certificates of Participation, 268 Certificates of Award, and 121 bronze medals. The Christopher Columbus Essay Contest was sponsored in 56 schools, with 316 students participating. Chapters awarded 114 Certificates of Participation. Chapters also presented 570 certificates, 65 bronze medals and seven silver medals for Outstanding Work in American History. Three chapters were recognized for Outstanding Chapter Projects: General Daniel Newnan Chapter ordered 11 copies of DAR founder Ellen Hardin Walworth's biography Indomitable Spirit to use as a book study. Archibald Bulloch Chapter converted different historical slide show programs into DVDs. Levi Sapp Chapter has an exhibit at the Cook County Museum which features a variety of historical objects. Vice Chairmen Sharon Sowders, Fran Passmore, Lisa Pingel Rozier, and Judy Smith are commended for their excellent work in support of this committee and the chapters in their respective districts. This committee is privileged to serve the State Regent and the Georgia State Society.

AMERICAN INDIANS - Patricia Patillo Mercer

One hundred and three Georgia Chapters reported American Indian activities. Fifty Chapters indicated having a program on Native Americans and fifty-three chapters observed the American Indian minute. Proclamations were obtained by 24 chapters. Monetary contributions included: American Indian Scholarship Fund, \$722; Friends of the American Indian Scholarship Fund, \$717; Bacone College \$442; Chemawa Indian School \$447; and Indian youth of American Summer Camp Program, \$797. Campbell soup labels sent to Bacone College totaled 3,179.

AMERICANISM - Rachel Cole Colbert

This Chairman received 97 reports with 74 chapters participating in Americanism activities. Twenty chapters participated in 26 Naturalization Ceremonies/Receptions. The DAR Manual on Citizenship was referenced by 188 members from 38 chapter. Distribution of Patriotic materials was as follows: 3588 U.S. Flags by 46 chapters; 1436 Flag pins by 28 chapters; 3417 Flag bookmarks by 26 chapters; 6417 copies of the Pledge of Allegiance by 39 chapters; and 4701 copies of the American's Creed by 38 chapters. Other Patriotic activities were reported by 31 chapters. These activities

included participating in parades, placing of wreaths, presentation of Flags, hosting Flag Day and Constitution Week luncheons, presenting programs on the American Flag and Patriot's Day, distributing copies of the DAR Manual for Citizenship, presenting copies of the Constitution and the Preamble, sponsoring dramas and musicals, Veteran's Day programs, re-enactments, and making gift bags for naturalized citizens. Two chapters reported activity in all MQ areas--General Daniel Newnan and Oglethorpe. Xavier Chapter presented a DAR Medal of Honor to Reverend Warren Lee Jones of Rome. Levi Sapp Chapter member, Linda Ward Meadows, helped a former student attain eligibility to become a naturalized citizen.

CHAPTER ACHIEVEMENT AWARD – Eleanor Brinson Quigley

Final Report: 100% (111) Georgia Chapters returned Chapter Achievement Award Reports. Ninety-three of 111 Georgia Chapters, 84%, turned in Chapter Achievement Award Forms by the deadline. Using eMembership plus information from the State Treasurer, completed CAA Reports were emailed to Chapters with missing reports. Accompanying notes explained how to complete the form with Chapter self-reporting information; follow-up phone calls were made. If no response, second CAA reports were sent by email with follow-up note plus phone call. Further contact involved mailing completed CAA Forms, letters, and stamped self-addressed envelopes. Chapters missing reports were contacted minimally six times. All Chapters with discrepancies in CAA were contacted and discrepancies explained. Seventy-four Chapters achieved Level One; 27 Chapters, Level Two; 3 Chapters Level Three. Chapters scoring most points: District One: Atlanta, District Two: Colonel William Candler, District Three Vidalia, District Four: George Walton. Chapter scoring most points in Georgia: Colonel William Candler. This Chairman thanks: All Georgia Chapters for turning in CAA Forms; State Treasurer Dianne Cannestra for responsiveness and cooperation in providing Chapter financial verifications; National CAA Vice-Chairman, SE Division Peggy Johnson, and National Chairman LeAnn Turbyfill for their helpfulness; and State Regent Sally Baldwin for chapter email encouragement.

CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION - Elizabeth Grimes

The Children of the American Revolution has received outstanding support from the Georgia DAR. Thirteen chapters reported sponsoring a C.A.R society. Twenty one chapters had Senior Leaders for C.A.R and numerous chapters made monetary donations and spent many hours supporting and having joint activities with the C.A.R societies. Four chapters had a C.A.R program presented at their meeting and nineteen chapters invited C.A.R members to attend their meetings or special events. Two DAR chapters had a total of 52 C.A.R members who entered DAR contests. Our Georgia Daughters have outdone themselves supporting our young people of CAR.

COMMUNITY SERVICE – Helen Robertson Powell

Georgia Daughters honored 17 outstanding individuals from their local communities with the DAR Community Service Award for their "voluntary achievements in cultural, educational, humanitarian, patriotic, historical and citizenship endeavors, or in environmental conservation." On the state level, first place winner was Susan Hosford honored by the Colonel William Candler Chapter for her volunteer community service and leadership focused on children, substance abuse and cancer. Second place was Bob Niederriter recognized by the Vidalia Chapter for his work helping people with disabilities in Toombs and Montgomery counties by designing wheelchair ramps and coordinating volunteers to build them. Third place was

Christopher Lamar Snell honored by the Philadelphia Winn Chapter for his support of youth activities and servant leadership with South Gwinnett's first after-school program. Honorable mention went to Linda Spencer North recognized by the James Waldrop Chapter, Jack Frost honored by the Colonel William Candler Chapter and John Winsness recognized by the Oglethorpe Chapter. Chapters receiving certificates for recognizing local volunteers with Community Service Awards are: Augustin Clayton, Chehaw, Colonel William Candler, Fort Frederica, James Waldrop, LaGrange, Oglethorpe, Philadelphia Winn, Sukey Hart, Sunbury, Vidalia, William Marsh, and William McIntosh.

CONSERVATION - Melinda J. Wade

Ninety-four chapters reported 230 projects, 29 programs, "conservation minutes" used in 247 meetings, participation in Earth Day and Arbor Day activities by 228 members and 18 trees planted. Collectively, 556 Chapter members have reduced their carbon footprint by 5000 lbs. or more each. 1980 members are recycling or composting, 1055 conserve water, 1743 use compact florescent lights, 417 control phantom electricity and 121 drive hybrid vehicles. No Conservation Awards were applied for as of this time. First place Best Chapter Report awarded to the General Daniel Newnan Chapter for their outstanding work on three conservation projects at a senior citizen retirement community as well as their other more unusual recycling projects. Second place is awarded to the Fielding Lewis Chapter for their detailed report and efforts regarding tree planting and dedication involving community members and local school children. Third place is awarded to the Oliver Morton Chapter for their community maintenance and Arbor Day involvement.

CONSTITUTION WEEK – Joyce Ball Patton

State Regent Sally Baldwin, Vice-Chairman Trudy Alexander, Lisa Simpson and I met with Governor Sonny Perdue for his signing of the 2010 Constitution Week Proclamation. The GSSDAR photographer made pictures of the signing for our memories book. This Chairman presented to the State Regent a large framed photo and the Constitution Week Proclamation for her memory wall and presented both at the Constitution Week Luncheon on September 18, 2010. The keynote speaker was Dr. Richard Lee, who is the editor of the Patriots Bible and the founder of the First Redeemer Church in Forsyth County. Ninety-seven chapters reported reciting the Preamble 644 times and giving sidelights, obtained 128 Proclamations, 161 bell ringing events, 322 Constitution events. Constitution Week Kits dispersed – 5253; classrooms adopted – 289; inches of print coverage – 263; display – 1217; total square feet - 11,462; and broadcast minutes - 47,398.

DAR GOOD CITIZENS - Jo An Johnson Chewning

DAR Good Citizens exemplify the qualities of dependability, service, leadership, and patriotism. Eligible students are seniors who attend accredited high schools. Seventy Georgia chapters contacted 452 high schools; 12 were new participants. Awards were given to 207 seniors. Chapter winners received DAR Good Citizens pins, certificates, and wallet cards and special events were held by chapters to recognize their winners. Gifts by chapters: \$14,667.79. Chapter sponsoring 10+ schools: Augustin Clayton. Chapter making the largest monetary award: Col. John McIntosh. District winners received \$100 checks: 1- Sophie Ela Schulman (Sandy Springs); 2-William Rodgers Ealick (Augusta); 3- John Thomas Hosey (Savannah); 4- Anna Logan Cotney (John Houstoun). Georgia State winner, Sophie Ela Schulman, (Sandy Springs), received a state certificate, pin, and check for \$250. This chairman thanks

our State Regent, district vice chairmen Mae Ora O'Shields, Betty Lynam, Mary Jane Espinosa, and Kitty Thompkins; participating chapter committee chairmen, and all 70 Georgia chapters which honored outstanding Georgia students through this program.

DAR MAGAZINE - Marilyn Moulton Wright

Ninety-five chapters submitted DAR Magazine reports. Eighty-eight chapters received chapter achievement award credit by participating in the Georgia co-op ad which will allow us to have a seven page ad in the 2011 November/December issue of the newsletter. The 2010 ad honored our State Regent, State Officers, Georgia Daughters serving the National Society, Chapter Regents, State Conference Pages and Meadow Garden. I want to thank Kate Stirk Sklikas for her help in putting the ad together. Savannah Chapter had a full page ad honoring Chaplain General Laura Marcella Reid and William Marsh Chapter had an individual ad in honor of their 100th anniversary. Twelve chapters submitted articles to "With the Chapters." Eighty-five reporting chapters read the President General's message from the *Daughters Newsletter* at meetings. One hundred chapter regents are magazine subscribers. Fifty-four chapters met the Chapter Achievement Award requirement for subscriptions of 30% of members. The average percentage of subscribers in Georgia is 32%--the highest average in Region 3. Governor David Emanuel-Adam Brinson Chapter with 95% subscriptions is a National Gold level winner.

DAR MUSEUM – Therry Nash Deal

Reports received from 102 chapters indicated 26 programs included the Museum as major focus; seven of these were presented by DAR Museum Correspondent Docents. State Treasurer books indicate \$799 in Georgia Room gifts and \$1,350 to National for a total of \$2,149 in gifts. Thirteen chapters or 11% attained the Liberty Girl Award. The Outstanding Chapter Award received by Philadelphia Winn. The highest per capita giving overall was Lachlan McIntosh. Awards in three chapter sizes: large, medium and small went to Philadelphia Winn, Augusta and Lachlan McIntosh. The Liberty Girls met at Tondee's Tavern, our Georgia Room in the DAR Museum in Washington, D.C. on July 8, 2010 to celebrate a temporary exhibit of our facsimile copy of the Declaration of Independence. We look forward to introducing family members of Peter Tondee soon in that room, reports our Georgia Room Vice-Chairman Anne Murphey. Vice Chairman for Docents, Martha Wright reports correspondent docents worked in the Georgia Room last July at Congress. There were 12 Active Correspondent Docents and two Correspondent Docents in Training this year. Exciting reports were made by chapters which used the Traveling Trunk Education materials with children in classrooms. Georgia continues to raise the level of awareness of the DAR Museum among its members.

DAR SCHOLARSHIP - Tommie Elaine Shattuck

The Georgia State Society 2011 Scholarship Award applicant for the Irene and Daisy MacGregor National Medical Scholarship, Alice W. Rooke National Medical Scholarship, and Dr. Francis Anthony Beneventi National Medical Scholarship is Matthew Jones. The sponsoring chapter is Augusta, Nancy Parks Regent. Our 7,146 Georgia Daughters continued to contribute this year to chapter scholarships in the amount of \$46,861, with \$3,689 to national scholarships. There were 60 Georgia recipients this year, nine more recipients than last year. Fortunately, the college and University Fund Balance is \$491,728.87 or \$15,069.57 more than last year, with \$9,585.42 awarded to 49 recipients. That is \$49,499.68 less awarded this year to four fewer recipients. Georgia Daughters have over half a million dollars in scholarship

money (\$538,589.87). The Georgia State Society had 15 national scholarship applications to all three medical scholarships, the J. E. Caldwell National Scholarship and the Alice W. Rooke National Scholarship. Seventeen chapters recognized an applicant with an invitation to a chapter meeting, 16 with certificates, and 29 with monetary gifts. Also, \$3,689 was donated to NSDAR National Scholarship Funds.

DAR SCHOOL COMMITTEE - Ida Bea Best Fischer

Ninety-seven chapters submitted their Master Questionnaires. Seventy-four chapters submitted Hightower reports with 68 chapters earning the Hightower Award. Seventynine chapters had full school programs or two-minute spots. 34,132 labels and box tops (2,484 from one chapter) 21,814 lbs. of thrift (8,905 from one chapter) and 3,408 other items were sent to schools. Georgia daughters donated \$43,252.52 (\$6,014.00 from one chapter) to schools, \$1,400.00 to Friends of DAR Schools and \$3,450.00 from sales of School Pins a total of \$48,102.52. The "Under \$5.00" projects continued. School supplies were sent to Hindman Settlement School, medical items to Kate Duncan Smith DAR School Clinic, school snacks to Tamassee DAR School, and funds for Hindman "Christmas in August" project. 550 lbs. of thrift were delivered from SBOM for the "Special Times Boutique." Chapters participated in "My Coke Rewards," "Publix Partners for Education," and "Food Lion MVP Rewards Program." Chapters hosted Christmas parties, sponsored cottages, and outings for the children. One chapter's auction netted \$1,500. Another chapter participated in a golf tournament to benefit Tamassee – raising over \$15,000. Georgia daughters are thanked for generous donations of your time, talents and resources. Madam State Regent, it is an honor to serve you and the Georgia State Society.

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERANS – Kelly Calabrese Becker

With 96 chapters reporting, there were 79 chapters who served our veterans. Daughters gave their time, talents, resources, and gifts to support veterans in VA Medical Centers, nursing homes (local, state, and national), and outpatient clinics. Also, daughters supported our veterans through their participation in various community events at schools, Memorial Day services, Veterans Day ceremonies, parades and other venues. Georgia had 397 adult volunteers who drove 43,160 miles in support of veteran activities and gave 6,985 hours of service. There were 79 youth volunteers who contributed 415 hours. Total cash and non-cash donations were \$77,814. Certificates of Award were presented for most outstanding veteran reports (3 chapters), outstanding veteran activities (13 chapters), most adult volunteer hours (3 chapters), 600 plus volunteer hours (3 chapters), most adult volunteers (4 chapters), outstanding monetary contributions (3 chapters), most youth volunteer hours (3 chapters), most youth volunteers (3 chapters), most miles traveled for veteran activities (3 chapters), outstanding Adopt-a-Veteran Program (3 chapters), and most interviews for the Veterans History Project (4 chapters). Madam State Regent, it is an honor to serve you and the Georgia State Society.

VETERANS HISTORY PROJECT – Teresa Jackson Roby

Georgia Daughters continue to interview and record our veterans' valuable histories. There were 14 chapters who participated and recorded 38 histories. Congratulations Daughters! This is a most valuable project and we encourage all chapters to support this project. Thank you, Madam State Regent, for the opportunity to serve the Georgia State Society in this manner.

FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA - Kathleen Ward Hart

Georgia Daughters in 74 chapters participated in paying tribute to the Flag of the United States of America through various projects and activities. Chapters attended Nationalization ceremonies, held Flag Retirement ceremonies and sent cards to our veterans in hospitals and nursing homes. Programs and Flag Etiquette workshops were given by several chapters. Thirty nine chapters reported involving over 11,189

youth in various Flag activities through schools, churches, scouting and JROTC programs. Fifty five chapters held or participated in 174 flag events. The total number of flags presented by 41 chapters was 5,072. Seventy one certificates were presented to individuals and groups recognizing their efforts in properly displaying the Flag. Thirty two chapters distributed 7,083 DAR Flag Code brochures. Two chapters participated in Flag presentations that were particularly noteworthy and will receive Certificates of Award at State Conference. These chapters are: Martha Stewart Bulloch (Mary Elizabeth Kidd, Regent), and Sandy Springs (Lynn Brackey, Regent). Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure serving the Georgia Daughters as State Chairman of the Flag Committee.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS – Sherrin Newsome Willis

Georgia Daughters from seven chapters submitted records to GRC for the 2011 reporting period. One volume of miscellaneous records and one volume of land grants and deeds from South Carolina, with a combined page count of 245, were presented to the NSDAR Library. A copy of each volume was also placed in the Georgia Archives, the Washington Memorial Library and the Georgia Historical Society, for a total count of 980 pages. The most pages submitted by membership categories were: Oliver Morton Chapter, 50-100 members; Atlanta Chapter, 101-150 members; Elijah Clark Chapter, 150 plus members. Elijah Clark made the largest page count submission. Two books of obituaries from Carroll County were compiled and donated to both the NSDAR Library and the Georgia Archives by Violette Denney of the Abraham Baldwin Chapter. Currently, 12 members are working on cemetery surveys, will abstractions and the transcription of school, church and funeral home records from 1880-1900. Other reported actives include scanning miscellaneous legacy documents, transcribing chapter minutes, and copying deteriorating books. Also, seventeen Georgia Daughters are diligently working on the Every-Name Indexing Project. Madam State Regent, this chairman and vicechairman appreciate the opportunity to serve on this rewarding and highly enjoyable committee.

HISTORIC PRESERVATION – E. Lynn Brackey

The Historic Preservation Committee established in 2008 assists the National Society by encouraging recognition of significant volunteer efforts in historic preservation at the community, state and national levels and by cataloging NSDAR properties. The Historic Preservation Committee has three Vice Chairmen who serve in the following areas: Historic Preservation Medal - a National Award honoring an individual whose efforts to historic preservation have made a distinguished contribution on the regional, state or national level for many years. The Historic Preservation Recognition Award recognizes individuals and groups for outstanding, voluntary achievements in all areas of historic preservation. Vice Chairman, Donna Johnson, reports that one application for the DAR Historic Preservation Medal was submitted to the National Vice Chairman and approved. Historic Preservation Recognition Awards submitted totaled three and all were approved by the National Vice Chairman. Historic Preservation Project Contest - recognizes projects related to the preservation of a historic site, landmark, historic district or property. Vice Chairman, Melissa Danielsson, received one chapter application which has been submitted to the National Vice Chairman. This application will compete with others in the division as a winning entry. Twenty-six chapters reported ongoing restoration, renovation, and preservation projects but did not enter the Project Contest. Claudia Callaway, Vice Chairman of Historic Sites and Property Management, reports twenty-six properties

identified as owned or maintained by Georgia Chapters and one property owned by the State Society. These reports have been submitted to the National Vice Chairman and the information will contribute to a national database listing of all DAR owned or managed properties in collaboration with the Historian General's Office. Sixty-one programs on Historic Preservation were presented to chapters during 2010-2011.

JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS - Louise Williams Jones

Five of the Georgia DAR Chapters sponsored 73 JAC groups involving 2,397 children in grades Pre K-8. The national theme, "Preserving America's Past," produced many beautiful and interesting entries for this year's contest. Georgia sent 56 winning entries including 5 banners, 10 posters, nine poems, 4 photo essays, 11 short stories, 1 community service and 16 stamps to the Southeast Divisional level for judging. Thomasville Chapter received a Certificate of Award for Outstanding Sponsorship of JAC, with 67 clubs involving 1301 children. Thanks to the Georgia Chapters who worked with the schools to make JAC a way for teaching patriotism and love for our country to all children.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP - Amy Pittman Lawson

Junior Membership reports were overflowing with numerous accolades for Georgia's Juniors. In addition to Juniors serving as state chairmen and vice chairmen, there are currently over 30 Juniors serving as chapter officers and chairmen. Chapters are actively working to recruit and retain Junior Members by trying to meet their unique needs, providing flexibility and relevance. There were six Chapter Outstanding Juniors nominated: Augusta - Lisa Pittman; Hightower Trail - Rachael Lawrence; Joseph Habersham - Mary Ann Hawthorne; Oglethorpe - Kate Cook; Roswell King - Amy Lawson; Xavier - Melanie Aldred. A particularly nice example of newspaper recognition was submitted by the Xavier Chapter. The Outstanding Junior Contest winner will be announced Friday evening during the banquet. Thank you to the tireless members of the Junior Committee: Brittney Dorr Elwell -Vice Chairman Outstanding Junior Contest, Mary Anne Hawthorne - Vice Chairman Junior Sales, Virginia Baker, Martha Hill, and Karen Sokol. It is with great sadness that our committee reports the loss a member, Carol Abadie. Cards of sympathy were sent to her husband, Ron Abadie, expressing our support and ongoing prayers. LINEAGE RESEARCH - Marguerite McEntee Dyal

Chapters reported 53 members as Lineage Research Lookup Volunteers (LRLV), made 49 requests to the LRLV Board and 19 requests to the State Chairman. Thirtytwo workshops for prospective members and the general public were conducted along with online webinars and a program on Chapter Development and Revitalization. The Chapter Development and Revitalization (CDR) Commission responded to requests from or offered assistance to 7 chapters to increase chapter membership and/or attendance at meetings. Outstanding chapter activities: Barnard Trail held a summer workshop followed by a field trip to the Ellen Payne Odom Genealogy Library in Moultrie resulting in two new members, applications in progress and supplemental applications awaiting approval; College Hill has five members who work with the Augusta Genealogical Society and several members who have written books on genealogy; Fielding Lewis held a workshop "Finding Your Revolutionary Patriot Ancestor" with the Cobb County Genealogical Society and the Georgia Room of the Cobb County Library-Central; LaGrange has two members who assist in lineage research at a local Senior Center. Nancy Hart held a workshop at Georgia College and State University with the help of archivist Joshua Kitchens; Fort Frederica and Philadelphia Winn provided research assistance for six out-of-state requests for DAR and SAR prospects. My sincere thanks to Vice Chairmen Liz Grimes, Libby Anderson, Glenda Carter and Larealia Camp.

MEMBERSHIP - Barbara P. Fincher

Although Georgia Society gained 413 members, including 75Juniors during 2010, the overall membership decreased to 7,146, a net loss of 32. The e-Membership web site continues to be an excellent resource for chapters; additionally, chapters have been creative in attracting and welcoming new members. The Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter, Roswell, (Marybeth Kidd, Regent, and Marguerite Dyal, Registrar) submitted the best overall report. There is a tie for awarding the traveling silver bowl for the most new members: Colonel William Candler Chapter, Gainesville and Philadelphia Winn Chapter, Lawrenceville. The Eagle Award for the chapter with the greatest percentage increase in membership goes to the Colonel Ebenezer Folsom Chapter, Vidalia (Linda Brown, Regent, and Cathy Wells, Registrar).

NATIONAL DEFENSE - Carolyn B. Balog

Reports from 94 chapters show the importance Georgia Daughters place on National Defense. There were 87 chapters reporting three-minute presentations on National Defense at each meeting, and 46 chapters had 51 full programs. Gold Medals were awarded to 34 ROTC recipients by 24 chapters, Bronze Medals were awarded to 173 ROTC recipients by 53 chapters, and Good Citizenship Medals were awarded to 274 recipients by 59 chapters. The National Defense Award Fund received contributions from 74 chapters. Georgia chapters recognized for awarding the most Gold and Bronze Medals combined are Baron DeKalb and Augusta. Chapters recognized for awarding the most Good Citizenship Medals are Elijah Clarke and Martha Stewart Bulloch. Oliver Morton earned honorable mention. Members from 3 chapters had editorials or a letter to the editor that were published and, therefore eligible to enter the National Defense Contest in Washington.

PROGRAM - Marci Walker Swetmon

This Chairman received reports from 96 of the 112 chapters in the state. Of the 96 reporting chapters, 74 chapters did not utilize any of the National programs offered; 21 chapters presented 25 Programs from National's On-line Program bank. Martha

Steward Bulloch Chapter, Regent Marybeth Richardson Kidd and Chapter Program Chairman Donna Owens, submitted an original program for National Review for category Constitution Week, titled "The Constitutional Convention" created by chapter member Paula Nelson. As of this report, the program has been presented 46 times to 10 elementary schools - 3 of these schools have requested hand give a copy of the program for their internal use. The program has been shared and presented with several Georgia chapters. Commodore Richard Dale Chapter, Regent Frances Anne Miller and Chapter Chairman Mary Louise Hollowell, submitted an original program for category History titled "Importance of Salt During the Civil War" for the NSDAR outstanding program contest for 2010-2011. The program was passed on to the SE Program Chairman for consideration. Madam Regent, thank you for permitting me to serve the Georgia State Society as Program Chairman.

PUBLIC RELATIONS AND MEDIA - Marilyn Moulton Wright

Ninety-one chapters reported using publicity to raise awareness of DAR in their communities. Seventy-four chapters report print articles and forty-two chapters report radio and TV coverage. Fifty-seven chapters have newsletters and twenty-nine have chapter brochures. Twenty-two chapters use "Today's DAR" video in interesting and innovative ways. Thirty-five chapters are using web sites and social media to publicize their projects and four chapters presented local media awards to a local program or a member of the film, radio, or television industries for outstanding work. Certificates of Award were given to Sandy Springs Chapter for Best Newsletter, Augusta Chapter for Best Brochure and Xavier Chapter for Best Publicity.

VOLUNTEER INFORMATION SPECIALISTS – Amy Pittman Lawson

As of January 1, 2011, the Georgia State Society recorded 7,146 members. Chapters reported that 187 prospective members contacted chapters directly through their individual web sites. Of those prospective members, 77 have become DAR members or have papers pending/in progress. Over half of Georgia chapters used the Electronic Master Questionnaire for reporting. Fifty-three chapters distributed newsletters electronically, and many nice examples were sent to this state chairman, including excellent samples from Archibald Bulloch, Augusta, Chestatee River, and Roswell King. E-membership is now routinely used by chapter regents, vice-regents, treasurers, and registrars, as well as all state officers and state chairmen in approved access groups. Georgia Daughters logged thousands of hours on special NSDAR projects. The VIS Volunteer of the Year award goes to Cathy Hyer, Philadelphia Winn Chapter. In addition to numerous examples of outstanding use of a computer at the chapter level, Cathy redesigned her chapter's web site, which was recognized by the NSDAR as the Web Site of the Month for November 2010. Thank you to the seven vital members of the Georgia VIS Committee that, along with many chapter webmasters, spend incalculable hours updating and reviewing the 100+ Georgia State Society chapter and state web sites. It has been an honor to serve our State Regent and the Georgia State Society.

National Special Committee Reports

CHAPTER DEVELOPMENT AND REVITALIZATION – Julie Brooks Prince

This Chairman has communicated with many Georgia Chapters whose membership and / or meeting attendance numbers have declined over the past five years. Many

chapters contacted responded favorably and requested assistance in rebuilding and attracting new prospective members. A very successful workshop was held for one chapter with several prospective members being assisted in completing their papers and others being assisted with furthering their research and acquiring the correct proofs. This Chairman continues to communicate with other chapters desiring assistance. Visits to several chapters are scheduled in the next few months and other workshops are in the planning stage. This Chairman is pleased to announce the results of the winner of the traveling pewter pitcher award for the highest increase in (member) attendance at scheduled meetings. First place: William Day, Betty Lynam, Regent; Second Place: Sandy Spring, E. Lynn Brackey, Regent; Third Place: Philadelphia Winn, Peggy Freeman, Regent. Congratulations to these chapters on their outstanding performance. Madam State Regent, thank you for the opportunity to serve your administration in this capacity. It has been a pleasure and a valuable learning experience.

COMMEMORATIVE EVENTS – Betty Brown Harrah

This Chairman received 104 reports with 85 chapters participating in Commemorative Events. July 4th parades/celebrations included 981 Daughters participating. Daughters placed Flags, laid wreaths in cemeteries and commemorated Revolutionary War battle sites. Daughters commemorated Veterans Day, Constitution Week, rang bells, Patriots Day, Mother's Day, Presidents Day, Arbor Day, DAR Founders Day, Flag Day, D-Day, Georgia Day, National Day of Prayer, Election Day, September 11th, Armed Forces Day, Labor Day, Christmas Day, Thanksgiving Day, Columbus Day, the Treaty of Paris, the Founding of Washington, DC, the Bicentennial of the War of 1812, Native American Indians, birthdays of George Washington, Marque de Lafayette, Abraham Lincoln. They celebrated the restoration of Coweta County Courthouse, Tift College, Monroe County Courthouse; participated in Wreaths across America, Earth Day. Daughters lined streets for active and fallen soldiers when they came home. Chapters celebrating birthdays Elijah Clarke, 109 years; Ft. Frederica, 50 years; Gov. Jared Irwin and John Benning, 100 years; Mary Hammond Washington, 117 years; Nancy Hart, 110 years. Best Chapter Report to William Day Chapter, 2nd place to Oglethorpe Chapter, 3rd place to Xavier Chapter. It is an honor to serve in this capacity during this administration.

DAR GENEALOGY PRESERVATION – Scarlette Murphy Moyer

The Genealogy Preservation Committee goal is to index DAR genealogical and membership information into computerized, search able databases. This work will assist in preserving these valuable records for posterity and significantly enhance the application approval and membership record retrieval processes. The Descendant's Project which consists of indexing all available applications will completed July 30, 2011. The committee's next goal is the Supporting Documentation Project. This involves categorizing over six million documents used by members to support the lineage submitted on their DAR applications.

DAR PROJECT PATRIOT - Betty Garlington Christy

With 55 chapters reporting, a total of \$16,487.61 was given to Project Patriot in the form of donated goods or cash. \$8,133.83 went to national projects or to the Treasurer General. \$8,253.78 went to projects on a local level. In addition, 11 members made \$100 contributions to Project Patriot which qualified them to purchase the Project Patriot Pin. At least 111 care packages were mailed to soldiers in either Iraq, Afghanistan or Landstuhl. Other activities included distributing food and

phone cards to soldiers traveling through the Atlanta airport, sending tee shirts and phone cards to Landstuhl Regional Hospital in Germany, and sending toiletry and feminine products to deployed women. One chapter had a Girl Scout cookie mailing campaign honoring Valentine's Day. Several chapters participated in "welcome home" activities for local units. In support of troops in conflict areas, a deployed soldier's family was adopted for Christmas and received gift cards to Kroger and Walmart as well as toys and clothing. Blue Star flags were distributed. One chapter started a project to give children of deployed soldiers a book called "Dear Baby I'm Watching Over You." All chapters are thanked for their participation.

INSIGNIA - Sherri Lawson Roberts

Reports were received from 96 Georgia chapters. There was \$32,177.25 of insignia purchases reported. The largest amount reported by a chapter was \$1,973 reported by the Xavier Chapter. Other chapters reporting purchases over \$1,000 were: Atlanta, Rev. John Andrew, Augusta, James Waldrop, Baron DeKalb, Colonel William Candler, Fielding Lewis, Philadelphia Winn, Savannah, Martha Stewart Bulloch, and Fort Peachtree. Some of chapters reported having insignia as a topic at their meetings. Examples include: William McIntosh reported had an insignia minute in their monthly newsletter; College Hill had an Honorary State Regent present a program on insignia; Elijah Clarke chapter had available and/or passed out insignia brochures at their meetings; Captain Thomas Cobb chapter mentioned insignia each time the DAR magazine was distributed; Xavier's Insignia Chairman presented a program on insignia to her chapter; insignia was mentioned during chairman's reports at Sergeant Newton chapter meetings; and Governor Jared Irwin chapter reported insignia information was presented to the members by their Regent. Georgia Daughters are encouraged to utilize the Insignia Committee web site to review current information on insignia. Also, Hamilton Jewelers has an updated web site at Hamiltoninsignia.com.

LITERACY PROMOTION - O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle

Ninety-eight chapters were actively involved in literacy promotion. There was participation in literacy programs by 309 Georgia daughters. A total of 11,065 hours were accumulated by Daughters from tutoring, assisting, or promoting literacy. Over 4000 books and magazines were donated by Georgia chapters to promote literacy. Many chapter members serve as members of local Friends of the Library organizations. Other activities reported were: a John Benning member directed a summer program targeting autism; a Tallassee member wrote grants for volunteers to create a family/health literacy class for parents; a Nathaniel Macon member conducted a book review each month at a local assisted living center; a Levi Sapp member dressed as Cat in the Hat, a clown, or Mrs. Santa when she read to school children. The following chapters reported participation with the Ferst Foundation of Childhood Literacy in their communities: Oglethorpe, John Benson, James Stewart, Burkhalter. State contest winners are: Member category - Lynda Adams Holmes of Colonel William Candler Chapter; Chapter category - Colonel William Candler. Through Lynda Holmes's excellent leadership as Literacy Promotion Chair, Colonel William Candler raised money, conducted programs, and initiated a variety of activities throughout the year to promote literacy in the Gainesville-Hall County area.

PRESIDENT GENERAL'S PROJECT - Carol Russell

SPECIAL PROJECTS GRANT - Vicki Lancaster Cobb

The purpose of this committee project is to give financial support to projects in local communities that exemplify the mission of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution (NSDAR) to promote historic preservation, education, and patriotism. To accomplish this, NSDAR will make grants available to fund initiatives in these three mission areas. Non-profit 501(c)(3) entities may contact their local DAR chapter for grant guidelines. These proposals will be submitted to the national chairman, Special Projects Grants Committee, and will be evaluated by independent judges selected for this purpose. Successful applicants will be notified by NSDAR and will be required to complete all projects within one year of the awarding of the grant. Communications about these grants to all units of NSDAR, compliance, monitoring, and final completion reporting are the responsibility of the national chairman, Special Projects Grants Committee. Funding for the grants will be provided through the President General's Project Fund. A new national chairman, Special Projects Grants Committee, administers this new committee, serving with three national vice chairmen who will be responsible for the three grant areas of historic preservation, education, and patriotism. Non-profit 501(c)(3) entities may apply for these funds. Grants will be awarded for projects that relate directly to the mission and objectives of historic preservation, education, and patriotism.

VOLUNTEER GENEALOGISTS – Dee McCranie Redkevitch

There were 33 workshops presented in Georgia this year by chapters. A workshop of 100 people was given at the Perry Summer Workshop which included daughters from all over the State. That will be repeated this April on Saturday at State Conference. This was taught by Betty Christy, Rachel Colbert, and me. Handouts were made into a spiral booklet and given to each attendee. They were to take them back to their chapters and give workshops to prospective members and members. We still maintain the reputation in Washington as a state that submits complete and fully prepared documented papers. I continue to help with problem papers and how to do an analysis. Don't hesitate to e-mail me when you have a problem. I have done chapter programs on "How to Climb Your Family Tree" which were well received. FINANCE COMMITTEE - Shelby Alderman Whitson

This committee met before the State Board of Management Meeting on October 29, 2010 with Shelby Whitson presiding and all members present. The Finance Committee will recommend to the Resolutions Committee before State Conference, to rescind the Resolution "Georgia Hospitality Fund" or amend it to strike "not to exceed \$600.00" and insert " budgeted amount to be determined by the Finance Committee," with the rationale, each time prices escalate in Washington, the resolution has to be amended. There being no further business and the allotted time expiring, the meeting was adjourned at 1:40 p.m.

With 63 chapters responding, 225 SAR/S.R. members attended DAR functions, 322 DAR members attended SAR/S.R. meetings. Twenty-six DAR members received SAR/S.R. Medals/Certificates. GA State Society, NSDAR was well represented at SAR/S.R. Grave Markings, Kings Mountain, Cowpens, Kettle Creek, Battle of Guilford Courthouse, National Congress, National Trustees, Spring and Fall Leadership Meetings, State Conference, George Washington dinners. Twelve DAR members prepared thirty-three approved SAR/S.R. applications. DAR and SAR/S.R. worked together on parades, radio programs, press releases, bell ringing, GA Day, Veteran's Projects, Chapter programs, Flag ceremonies, Memorial Day, 4th of July, Constitution Week, Veteran's Day and a Resolution promoting Georgia Day at the House of Representatives, Georgia State Capitol. 
TELLERS COMMITTEE - Gwen Garner Brogdon

Nancy Parks moved "we support the development of a patch and program to be used by the Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, home schooled children and C.A.R. who visit Meadow Garden." Motion adopted. Margaret Cagle will advise Mrs. Youngsman of the approval.

Susan Jackson, House Manager, reported that tourism is down at Meadow Garden this year, as well as at other historic sites in and around Augusta. A total of 275 visitors have toured the house thus far this year. One hundred seventy six "walkins" generated \$527.00 and 99 scheduled tours resulted in an additional \$155.00 in revenue. This is compared to 376 visitors for this same period last year, which

included DAR chapters. Gift shop sales were also down. Sales thus far this year total \$1,093.50. There is continued interest in the cookbook and the George Walton Book.

Mrs. Baldwin led a discussion relative to the immediate need to purchase a new outdoor American Flag for the flag pole. Margaret Cagle suggested we develop a written procedure to use as a guideline for flag replacement and purchase. Mrs. Cagle further recommended that a list be provided to the chapters so they may donate flags as needed. Mrs. Whitson recommended "Flag Source Southeast," in Marietta, Georgia as a vendor. She indicated they give a 10% discount. Mrs. Baldwin asked Mrs. Whitson to purchase one flag for immediate installation and to research the cost, size and other information on which guidelines can be developed and disseminated to chapters.

Mrs. Baldwin stated that the dust buster used by the house manager is in need of replacement. Patty Burnam "moved the purchase of a new dust buster for the House Manager since the one she now uses does not work." Motion adopted.

Mrs. Baldwin reported on the status of the Web Site as mentioned in the State Regent-elect's letter. A company has been secured to design two Web sites, a Georgia State Society Web site and a Meadow Garden Web site. The quote for design and start up is approximately \$1,700 to \$2,000. Amy Lawson is working with this company and reports the new Web site will be extremely user friendly and can easily be updated by chairmen and others. Money budgeted for Meadow Garden airport advertising which was discontinued at the end of the contract will be used in part to fund the Web site. The Web site will enhance the communications and advertisement relating to Meadow Garden and increase tourism. Mrs. Whitson "moved that one half of the expense of the new Web site be paid by Meadow Garden, not to exceed \$1,000." Motion adopted.

In a related matter, acquisition of a new computer with internet service and long distance phone service capability was also discussed. Mrs. Cannestra graciously offered to donate one of her personal desk top computers to Meadow Garden. Her gift was accepted by the Board. Mrs. Wright "moved we purchase an all in one printer, fax and scanner for use by the House Manager with internet service to be added for use of the Web site." Motion adopted. Mrs. Durshimer volunteered her husband to install the computer and related equipment. It was also voted to procure the internet service through AT&T.

Mrs. Baldwin brought up the subject of the need for an admission sign for the fence and door. Margaret Cagle will research sign companies.

Mrs. Baldwin instructed all chairmen and members to use their home address, rather than the Meadow Garden address in corresponding with outside firms. Direct correspondence will expedite communications.

At the recommendation of the House Manager, Mrs. Baldwin reported the need for proper destruction of the frayed American Flags and recommended a Flag Burning ceremony during the weekend of State Board of Management meeting. The ceremony would be on Friday prior to the Board of Management meeting. Margaret Cagle will contact the Girl Scouts regarding a ceremony.

Mrs. Baldwin requested that a picture of currency hanging in the upstairs of the House be reframed. Mrs. Burnam will take appropriate action.

The subject of the condition of the "out house" was discussed. After a tour of the facility, Mrs. Lingelbach "moved the destruction and removal of the outhouse from the Meadow Garden property." Motion adopted. Mrs. Cagle will arrange for appropriate removal services.

Mrs. Burnam "moved the cast iron wash pot currently being used as a flower container in the yard be moved to the kitchen." Motion adopted.

Margaret Cagle, Meadow Garden Chairman, reported the purchase of a year's supply of furnace filters for the heat pump, and the painting of the electric outlets to match the base boards. She recommended painting the wall in the Best Room where the plaster was repaired, application of weather stripping on the bottom of the front and back doors, the need to paint the banister in the Walton Education Center, discovery of a hole in the wood under the window in the Walton bedroom, and the need for the clock in the Walton bedroom to be leveled. Mrs. Cagle noted the need for documentation by the House Manager of the name of the printing firm and cost of printing of the Walton Book. The matter of 4th of July publicity was discussed in order to promote that Meadow Garden will be open for tours on the July 4th Holiday.

Billie Hunter, Docents Chairman, reported that no docents classes have been conducted since no one has expressed interest; however, a class will be held on October 29, which is the Friday preceding the State Board of Management meeting.

Patty Burnam, Furnishings Chairman, reported the presentation of a program on Meadow Garden Furnishings, Past and Present to fifteen chapters. She further reported the compilation of files of information and past histories given to her by the past Furnishings Chairmen, researching each item of furniture to be entered in the computerized Past Perfect Program. These files are kept under lock in the Stribling Room in the George Walton Heritage Education Center in hard copy form. She assisted Phyllis Lawson in the reproduction and reframing of photographs, assisted in accession of two very fine paintings of Meadow Garden, reproduced and framed four magazines with cover articles depicting Meadow Garden, hung these as well as framed copies of the Declaration of Independence and other pictures of historical value. Obtained permission to move items of furniture to include the pianoforte and gold leaf mirror to the Best Room and moved a large display case and contents from upstairs to the Augusta Room which has been designated the George Walton Interpretive Center. Met with Ginger Nicholson, restorer of the Signers Busts to select a tint for the pedestals and repainted the pedestals. Locks were changed on the media cabinet in the George Walton Heritage Education Center and she arranged to have the outside benches resealed. Arrangements were made for the repair of several pieces of furniture through the auspices of the "Furniture Doctor." Mrs. Burnam reported her continuation of work on inventory and in obtaining appraisals for insurance purposes. A photo album of past State Regents is also being prepared.

Jean Lenderman, Landscaping Chairman, reported that the current landscaping service seems to be working well. Mr. Cagle made several sprinkler system repairs. On April 6, members of the Oliver Morton Chapter DAR in Gray, spent the day working in the house and weeding the herb gardens and the cast iron bed. In May, the Meadow Garden Society, C.A.R. worked in the herb garden. In June, the Allen Howard Society, C.A.R. weeded and planted the annual bed by the back steps. They also donated \$50.00 to purchase a bird bath. Members of the Cherokee Rose Garden Club have agreed to work in the yard once a month starting in September 2010. Mrs. Lenderman also expressed the need to use pine straw in the flower beds and stated her concern relative to the unsafe and dangerous condition of the outhouse.

Jane Hampton, Patron Chairman, received pre-addressed appreciation cards from the State Regent. These cards will provide a system whereby the Patron Chairman can send expressions of appreciation to past contributors and will also serve as a reminder that patronage is renewable through yearly donation.

Lynn Wright, Public Relations Chairman, led a discussion regarding various types of publicity and the need to be pro-active with publicity especially in the weeks leading up to the Masters Golf Tournament.

Nancy Parks, Augusta Chapter Regent, no report. Betty Durshimer, College Hill Chapter Regent, no report.

Dianne Cannestra, State Treasurer, presented the Meadow Garden proposed Operating Budget 2010-2011. Copies of the budget and financial summary were distributed. Mrs. Cannestra reported that it had been decided at an earlier Meadow Garden meeting to move some of the money from the Money Market to an additional Certificate of Deposit (CD); however, the amount was not decided. The recommendation of the previous Treasurer, Mrs. Fischer, was that conservatively \$50,000 should be moved. Mrs. Fischer's additional recommendation was to move all of the Capital Investment Money and a portion of the Administrative and Maintenance Money to reach the agreed upon amount. After discussion, Mrs. Cannestra "moved the use of all \$26,944.64 from the Capital Investment Account and enough from the Administrative and Maintenance Account to equal \$50,000 to purchase a new CD; the CD being earmarked for the Meadow Garden Fence." Motion adopted. Mrs. Cannestra moved "the adoption of the 2010-2011 proposed budget as presented." Motion adopted. The budget will be presented for vote at the State Board of Management Meeting.

Mrs. Baldwin announced the next meeting of the Meadow Garden Board is scheduled for September 15th at 10:30 a.m. at Meadow Garden.

Mrs. Baldwin disseminated copies of Chapter Information Packet (CIP) information inserts as examples for use by the new committee chairmen.

The benediction was given by the State Regent and the meeting was adjourned at 12:22 p.m.

September 15, 2010

The Meadow Garden Board met on Wednesday, September 15, 2010 at the George Walton Heritage Education Center. Sally McGlaun Baldwin, State Regent and Chairman of the Board called the meeting to order at 10:30 am. Other voting members present were: Virginia Lingelbach, Secretary, Margaret Cagle, Nancy Parks, Lanette Reid, Shelby Whitson, Billie Hunter, Patty Burnam, Jean Lenderman, Phyllis Lawson, Jane Hampton, Lynn Wright. Also attending in a non-voting status were Virginia "Ginger" Nicholson, Frankie Nevins, and Susan Jackson, House Manager.

The State Regent offered the invocation and welcomed everyone to the meeting. Mrs. Baldwin announced the absence of Mrs. Cannestra was due to the pending surgery of her husband. The roll call was given by Virginia Lingelbach, Board Secretary.

The Meadow Garden Board minutes of the July 15, 2010 meeting were approved as printed.

Susan Jackson, House Manager, gave the report of tourism as follows for August 2010: total tourist 56; total walk in tourist 51; total scheduled tourist 5; total walk in income \$142.50, total income scheduled tours \$15.00, total combined income \$157.50. Gift shop sales \$128.50. A comparison to figures for 2009 indicated an increase in every category.

Mrs. Cagle, Chairman and Trustee, reported the dust buster for the house had been purchased.

In the absence of Mrs. Cannestra, Mrs. Whitson distributed the Treasurer's Report which was filed for audit. Mrs. Baldwin noted the proposed budget was attached to the State Regent's second letter.

Mrs. Baldwin called for reports on motions adopted at the July meeting: Mrs. Cagle reported she had received notification from Mrs. Youngsman that the Girl Scouts would not approve the Meadow Garden children's patch program as presented at the last meeting. Mrs. Youngsman will continue to pursue this as a C.A.R project. Mrs. Cagle further reported that Mr. Durshimer will install the computer donated by Mrs. Cannestra and a printer will be purchased and installed in the George Walton Heritage Education Center. The Internet has been set up with AT&T, and the email address is meadowgarden@att.net. Mrs. Cagle moved "the purchase of a computer phone for long distance calls at \$40.00 the first year and \$20.00 per year after that." Motion adopted.

Mrs. Lawson, Gift Shop Chairman, reported the \$19,000 grant which we lost will be resubmitted and if approved the grant money is to be used for painting.

The status of the outhouse removal was discussed. Mrs. Cagle reported the removal has been delayed but should be accomplished by the date of the State Board of Management meeting. Mrs. Burnam reported the cast iron wash pots have been moved under the back porch of the house, but need to be blackened before placing in the kitchen. Mrs. Burnam read the wash pot description and appraisal from J. H. Brannan, III, a qualified appraiser - appraised value of \$165.00.

Mrs. Cagle moved that "we purchase two signs for the front porch and gate giving tour prices and a sign for the grape arbor that reads, do not pick the fruit."

Motion adopted. Approximate cost is \$120.00.

Ginger Nicholson, Member, Historic Preservation, Meadow Garden Gift Shop, reported on the information obtained from a Coin Conservator relative to the antique coin collection. The coins are old silver which are of French, Portuguese and Spanish origin. Based on the recommendations of the conservator, Mrs. Nicholson suggested the coins be placed in an acid free backed mounting, UV glass, and new frame. Mrs. Burnam read an assessment from 1905 but there was no accompanying appraisal. Mrs. Burnam moved "that the framed coins and artifacts, given by Dr. Teague prior to 1909, be reframed and appraised beforehand (for the sum of \$200 for framing) and cost of appraisal to be determined, if any, and approved by the State Regent."

Billie Hunter, Docents Chairman, reported visits of two C.A.R. Societies with 6 children and 49.25 hours; two SAR Chapters, 2 Docents and 17 hours; one outside docent who contributed 31 hours. A fall Docent class is scheduled for Wednesday October 6, at 11:00 am. The winter schedule for classes is Wednesday, March 2, 2011 at 11:00 am. The spring session is scheduled for Wednesday, June 1, 2011, 11:00 am. In August three chapters were represented with 64.25 hours and nine docents. Totals for the year are 17 chapters and 674.25 hours and 36 docents. Docent classes will also be held on October 29, 2010 at 1:00 and 3:00 pm. Open slots are still available for those interested.

Margaret Cagle reported that the flag burning would require the approval of the fire department and she is checking with the SAR the Girl Scouts and the Boy Scouts to perform the actual ceremony. The State Regent suggested 3:15 to 6:00 pm on October 29, or defer until the State Conference in order to provide more time to prepare the flags.

The State Regent reported that the Meadow Garden Board would meet from 10:00 am to noon on October 29, and that other State Committees would also meet at Meadow Garden during State Board of Management.

Jean Lenderman, Landscaping Chairman, reported the purchase of a bird bath with funds donated by the Allen Howard Society of the C.A.R. and the purchase of a

bird feeder with the left over money. Mrs. Lenderman reported that she had communicated with Omer Steedley, a representative of our landscape maintenance company who explained that his weekly fee includes the cutting of the grass, edging, trimming, putting out pine straw and weeding. She further reported meeting with Mr. Steedley to review the herbs and weeds in the Kitchen and Physick Garden. Cherokee Rose Garden Club will complete the weeding of these gardens on September 16. Mr. Steedley has removed a dead apple tree and plans to replace it with a plum tree or eliminate it altogether due to crowding. The landscaping plans for winter are to redo the size of the cast iron bed between the two gates and all bulbs will be transplanted and reused in other beds.

Mrs. Reid, Honorary State Regent, stated as a reminder that the landscaping plan for the grounds is located in the Stribling Room and should be reviewed prior to new planting.

Mrs. Lawson, Gift Shop Chairman, discussed the problem of uneven brick walkways which create a hazardous condition and could cause accidents. Mrs. Lenderman moved "that a brick mason be contacted to restore the brick walkways to a level condition, with the State Regent to give final approval to have work completed by State Board of Management 2010." Motion approved.

Mrs. Cagle reported progress on several minor painting jobs, and the need for several small interior repair jobs. Mrs. Reid inquired into the decision to repaint the Best Room and suggested that the room be painted a color more in keeping with a farm house. Mrs. Cagle further reported that she had leveled the clock in the Best Room, however, due to the instability of the clock the services of a professional clock repairer should be obtained. The need for a cleaning service was discussed and Mrs. Cagle will pursue estimates for this service. Mrs. Cagle addressed the fence project and circulated a brochure picturing the fence style preferred by the State Regent. Estimates from Maner Building Supply were presented. The Board entered into discussions relative to various fence styles, metals and prices. Mrs. Reid stated that given the magnitude of the project, it should be referred to State Conference for discussion and vote. Mrs. Cagle further reported that seven chapters are signed up for tours and lunch in the coming months.

Mrs. Baldwin discussed the reception to be held at Meadow Garden during State Conference, which is scheduled for Friday afternoon from 2:00 to 3:30 pm, shuttle bus transportation will be provided and all Proceedings Book pictures will be taken on the premises.

Virginia "Ginger" Nicholson presented a comprehensive Meadow Garden plan prioritizing items needing attention by urgency of action. Each room was addressed with prioritization of work coded by A, B, C, D ranging from work that must be done now to prevent further deterioration, areas that can wait, wish list areas, and items to sell or rotate for later use or safe storage. The complete report is attached to these minutes. Mrs. Nicholson further discussed the problems with the old display cabinet in the gift shop. Mrs. Baldwin asked Mrs. Nicholson to draw up a plan for a new cabinet for the gift shop with plans to subsequently de-acquisition the old cabinet. Mrs. Nicholson also discussed the immediate need to properly hang the sword to prevent its further deterioration and to restore and preserve the antique quilts.

Mrs. Reid addressed the need for UV protection on the windows on the canal side of the house in order to protect the furnishings and art objects as well as the need to consider selling those objects and paintings not appropriate to the period so that other items may be better displayed. Mrs. Reid moved "that the Furnishings Committee be given approval to draw from the furnishings account a total sum

of no more than \$1,000 to be used toward minor repairs and needs for Meadow Garden." Motion adopted.

The State Regent discussed the need for advertisement. It was determined that money had already been set aside in the budget for continued membership with Historic Augusta. Mrs. Lawson moved "Meadow Garden subscribe as a member to Augusta Convention and Visitors Bureau and Classic South." Motion adopted. Mrs. Baldwin will authorize the Treasurer to pay for membership subscriptions with Historic Augusta, Augusta Convention and Visitors Bureau and Classic South.

Mrs. Baldwin stated that she had contacted Polly Grimes, Vice President General, Mississippi, for information relative to Rosalie (historic property owned by Mississippi Daughters). This information was disseminated to the Board.

Mrs. Baldwin discussed the possibility of inserts to the Meadow Garden Cook Book and cook book reprints.

Following a discussion on this subject, Mrs. Lawson moved "that 300 Meadow Garden Cook Book reprints be ordered from the Morris Cook Book Company, cost \$6.90 plus shipping." Motion adopted. Mrs. Baldwin discussed the possibility of lesson plans for children being added to our Web site as a possible future endeavor. Mrs. Jackson discussed the idea of giving out free coloring books/crayons to children visiting Meadow Garden. After discussion, it was decided by consensus that pencils imprinted with Meadow Garden will be given to school children at the conclusion of their tour of the house.

Mrs. Hampton, Patrons Chairman, reported that she has included a flyer in the Chapter Information Packet. To date eleven Patron donations have been received for a total of \$550. At State Board of Management, envelopes for donations will be available and a poster will be on display.

Mrs. Reid moved "that archival data and furnishings in the Stribling Room be limited to those items and furnishings approved by the Meadow Garden Board which pertain to Meadow Garden, George Walton, the history of the Georgia State Society and such furnishings as are needed and are in keeping with the furnishings of the room. The Stribling Room and the Heritage Building will not be used for the storage of supplies which are the responsibility of any state officers or state chairmen." Motion adopted. Mrs. Reid further moved, "that the Meadow Garden Board accept for the Stribling Room the four leather bound scrapbooks compiled during the 1952-1954 State Regency of Mrs. T. Earle Stribling for whom the room is named. These books are a gift from Charles Stribling, son of Mrs. Stribling who was an Honorary State Regent, a past Chaplain General and a past Vice President General." Motion adopted.

Mrs. Lawson presented no formal report but thanked Ginger Nicholson and Barbara Florence for sharing their artistic talents in the redesign of the Gift Shop layout. She stated additional jars of jelly are being ordered for State Board of Management. She also suggested that chapters pick up their Meadow Garden Brochures for visitor center distribution at State Board of Management.

Mrs. Nevins, Liaison to Civic Augusta, reported she will send "Georgia On My Mind" dates to Amy Lawson for Web site publication. She also recommended we look into renting a booth at several of the cultural and art festivals being held in Augusta at various times throughout the year. Mrs. Baldwin directed she obtain further information and report to the Board at the next meeting.

The State Regent announced the next Board meeting will be October 29, 2010 at 10:00 am at the Heritage Education Center. It was determined that Monday,

December 13th would be set aside as the date to decorate the house for Christmas and December 20th as the removal date.

Mrs. Burnam presented for donation on behalf of Jean Lenderman a book pertaining to George Walton. Mrs. Burnam moved "we accept a donation of a booklet entitled George Walton American Leader and Patriot Extraordinarily" Motion adopted.

Mrs. Burnam further moved "that the small desk purchased for the Docents Room be moved to the Gift Shop to be used for display." Motion adopted.

Mrs. Cagle expressed the need for at least one additional 8 foot table to be used in the Heritage Education Center. The consensus of the Board was to approve the purchase of two additional 8 foot tables for this purpose.

The benediction was given by the State Regent and the meeting was adjourned at 2:15 pm.

October 29, 2010

The Meadow Garden Board met on Friday, October 29, 2010 at the George Walton Heritage Education Center. Sally McGlaun Baldwin, State Regent and Chairman of the Board called the meeting to order at 10:00 am. Other voting members present were: Virginia Lingelbach, Secretary, Margaret Cagle, Nancy Parks, Betty Jean Durshimer, Dianne Cannestra, Lanette Reid, Shelby Whitson, Billie Hunter, Patty Burnam, Jean Lenderman, Phyllis Lawson, Jane Hampton, Lynn Wright. Also attending were Ex Officio member Bea Fischer, and non-voting members Jerry West, Virginia "Ginger" Nicholson, Frankie Nevins, and Susan Jackson, House Manager.

The State Regent offered the invocation and welcomed everyone to the meeting. The roll call was given by Virginia Lingelbach, Board Secretary.

Susan Jackson, House Manager, gave the report of tourism as follows for October 2010: total tourist 81; total walk in tourist 35; total scheduled tourist 46; total walk in income \$100.00, total income from scheduled tours \$76.00, total combined income \$177.50. Gift shop sales \$169.00. The following chapters and members scheduled visits in the month of October: Baron DeKalb 9; John Benson 13; Fielding Lewis 2; Bonaventure 2; Joseph Habersham 2; Lachlan McIntosh 2; and John Houston 1.

Mrs. Baldwin announced that Meadow Garden would be closed to tours on the scheduled days of the Meadow Garden Board meetings in order for the House Manager to participate in the meeting.

Mrs. Cannestra, Treasurer, distributed the Treasurer's Report as of September 30, 2010, showing total assets of \$653,566.40. The report was filed for audit.

Mrs. Baldwin called for reports on motions adopted at the previous Board meetings:

Mrs. Nicholson, Member, Historic Preservation, Meadow Garden Gift Shop, reported on the framing of the coins which were on display having been framed and hung in the Heritage Education Center. Although the value of the coins themselves was appraised at only \$250, the finished product properly matted and framed with historical provenance documented is estimated to be worth approximately \$1,000.

Mrs. Lenderman, Landscaping Chairman, reported on the repair to the walkway. An estimate of \$400 was received from Mr. Banks to repair the walkway covering the area from the door to the street. The estimate was accepted and the work was

completed on October 1, 2010. Mrs. Lenderman further reported the removal of the outhouse was accomplished on October 13 at a cost of \$175.00.

Mrs. Baldwin stated the cookbooks had been re-ordered and the small desk has been moved to the Gift Shop.

Mrs. Cagle reported the purchase of a magic jack and telephone, both of which have been paid for and installed. She further reported that a computer and computer desk have been installed in the Stribling Room and the printer will be moved from the house for use with this equipment. Mrs. Cagle announced the four signs discussed in the previous meeting had been completed and installed.

Mrs. Baldwin opened the discussion relative to the acquisition of a new fence. Mrs. Cannestra stated the \$50,000 earmarked for the fence has been placed in a short term certificate of deposit (CD) maturing on January 11, 2011. Mrs. Cagle presented fence design options and cost estimates and reported on suggestions received from Walton Rehabilitation Center. It was recommended that the fence be of steel construction with aluminum gates. The Walton Rehabilitation Center suggested we place the main entry gate in front of the house adjacent to the bus parking area and they offered to absorb the cost of building a walkway directly to the front door of the house with appropriate landscaping. The possibility of a sliding walk-in gate and drive through gate on the Walton Rehabilitation Center side was also recommended. The cost estimate presented which included two walk-in gates, removal of old fence and cleanup is \$41,678. Mrs. Reid, Honorary State Regent, suggested we obtain the approval of Historic Augusta prior to moving forward with a contract on this project. Mrs. Cagle moved "to recommend to the State Board of Management that the fence at Meadow Garden be replaced once approved by Historic Augusta, cost will not exceed \$45,000." Motion adopted. After discussion, Mrs. Reid moved "to amend the motion of the fence to increase the amount from \$45,000 to \$50,000," Motion adopted. Mrs. Lawson further moved "that the main entry gate for Meadow Garden, with the new fencing, be moved to the front of the house adjacent to bus and handicapped parking." Motion adopted. Mrs. Baldwin announced that all members of the Board are welcome to visit Maner Building Supply, 3801 Martinez Boulevard in Augusta to review different styles of fence.

Betty Durshimer, Regent, College Hill Chapter, reported her husband had installed the computer in the Stribling Room and plans to install a wireless router to access the Internet.

Mrs. Cagle reported on the subject of flag burning. She stated that Fall is not a good time of year for burning due to dry conditions. Plans are for the Boy Scouts to conduct the flag burning ceremony in conjunction with the American Legion at a future date.

Mrs. Hunter, Docents Chairman, reported on the status of docent training. She indicated she had received approximately three dozen contacts for docent classes. She has two classes scheduled today at 1 and 3 pm and will be assisted by Susan Jackson, Margaret Cagle and Patsy Ray from the Augusta Chapter. She encourages each participant to purchase the \$8.00 book on George Walton.

Mrs. Cagle reported on pressure washing the house prior to State Conference, and she recommends it be done approximately two weeks before the State Conference, but after the Masters Golf Tournament. Joey Smalley has been contacted to do this work.

A discussion was led by Mrs. Cagle relative to a cleaning service to clean the house.

Mrs. Cagle suggested Lisa Buster who is licensed and bonded and comes highly recommended. Mrs. Hampton moved that "Lisa Buster be contacted to have

her clean the house once a month, on a trial basis, for six months at a cost of approximately \$50 per month." Motion adopted. Mrs. Cagle reported on the need for weather stripping various doors and she further stated that the opinion of the clock repairer is that it is not worth spending a lot of money on and should be considered mostly as a decorative item. The State Regent stated that the railing on the far side of the back porch is in poor condition creating a safety hazard and should be repaired prior to State Conference.

Mrs. Baldwin stated that extra Patrons envelopes had been printed and given to the State Corresponding Secretary for dissemination to Chapter Regents.

Mrs. Parks, Regent, Augusta Chapter, reported the donation to the gift shop of 137 jar lid covers by the Augusta Chapter.

Mrs. Durshimer reported the College Hill Chapter members served meals on September 30, October 1 and 8. Gift shop sales were \$76.50, \$46.50 and \$66.00 respectively on those dates. Augusta and College Hill Chapter members substituted for the House Manager during her vacation week, and also weeded the flower beds near the Heritage Education Center.

Mrs. Burnam, Furnishings Chairman, reported that following the September meeting she remained in Augusta two additional days during which time she and Mrs. Nicholson visited with a reputable coin dealer obtaining an appraisal on the old coin collection donated by Mr. Teague, and overseeing the re-matting and framing of the coins along with the historical provenance which adds immensely to the value of the collection. Marking of items in the house dining room was also accomplished. Mrs. Burnam further reported that she had been contacted by a reporter relative to an article on Meadow Garden furnishings for the Georgia Backroads Magazine. The docent's information sheets were revised and brought up to date which was necessitated by the movement of furniture and merging of rooms. Mrs. Burnam stated her aim is to continue with the inventory and research with emphasis on the discovery of little known facts regarding portraits and furnishings.

Mrs. Nicholson reported that identifying plaques had been affixed to the busts of the Signers on display in the Interpretative Room. She further reported on the results of her research into the UV protective covering for the windows. She stated that the 3M window film, offered through Coastal Companies, appears to be the best as it is used by many historic properties around the world and is also applied by trained technicians. The covering is transparent, optically clear and blocks 99.9 percent of UV, thereby reducing heating and cooling bills, makes the glass shatter resistant, and may lower insurance premiums. The better series of film carries a 15 year warranty and is estimated to last 60 years. The quote for all windows of the house (excluding basement) was a little over \$4,200 with normal preparation work. After discussion, it was decided to include the basement in the window coverage resulting in all windows receiving treatment. Mrs. Burnam moved "to approve that Coastal Companies be contacted to apply 3M film to all windows at Meadow Garden at a cost not to exceed \$4,750, such cost to be debited against the Administrative and Maintenance Fund." Motion adopted.

Mrs. Baldwin reported on painting of the Best Room. She indicated that samples of paint would be applied to the walls which would give an opportunity to look at the paint samples in various shades of daylight prior to making a final color selection.

Mrs. Nicholson reported the rug in the Best Room in front of the settee requires repair. Mrs. Burnam moved "that the Turkish rug in the Best Room be repaired at a cost not to exceed \$500." Motion adopted.

Mrs. Lawson, Gift Shop Chairman, encouraged chapters to continue with donations to the Gift Shop. She reported on the status of the various jellies being offered.

Mrs. Hampton, Patrons Chairman, presented a poster encouraging Patronage which she plans to display at State Conference and State Board Meetings. Mrs. Reid suggested that we recognize as a patron in kind a gentleman who has volunteered many hours as a docent at Meadow Garden. Mrs. Hampton moved that "Walter Cox be designated a patron in kind because of his volunteerism and support of Meadow Garden." Motion adopted.

Mrs. Wright, Public Relations Chairman, reported that Beth DeLorme, one of the Meadow Garden grant writers, submitted a grant application to the Augusta Convention and Visitors Bureau requesting \$9,700 for various advertising opportunities provided by the Augusta CVB. Grants were previously received in 2009 and 2010. Their decision is pending. She further reported that Jackie Peronne, a writer for Georgia Backroads, spent a day at Meadow Garden in preparation for an article to be published sometime next year. Mrs. Wright recommended that we place an announcement about the Christmas tours on the Meadow Garden web site. The C.A.R. State Conference will be held in February in Savannah, and 200 Meadow Garden brochures will be provided for the goody bags given to each attendee.

Mrs. Nevins, Liaison to Civic Augusta, reported that a program is being put together for eighth grade teachers to bring students to Meadow Garden in November. A Christmas celebration will be held at the Welcome Center on December 10, and Meadow Garden will have a table to sell Christmas decorations and advertise tours.

Under new business, Mrs. Baldwin reported that she, Phyllis Lawson and Barbara Florence had visited the High Museum of Art in Atlanta in an effort to offer the Dave the Slave Jugs for display. No response has been received from them. Mrs. Baldwin further reported on the lawsuit filed by the painter. John Manton, a lawyer here in Augusta, has been engaged to handle our interests in this matter for a flat fee of \$1,500. This was accepted rather than an hourly rate.

Mrs. Baldwin further reported on her investigation into flood insurance for Meadow Garden. She has been informed of the process and was advised to contact Walton Rehabilitation Center for a comparable plat before proceeding.

Mrs. Baldwin stated that the next Meadow Garden Board meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, January 12, 2011 at 10:30 am at the Heritage Education Center.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:10 noon.

January 19, 2011

The Meadow Garden Board met on Wednesday, January 19, 2011 at the George Walton Heritage Education Center. Sally McGlaun Baldwin, State Regent and Chairman of the Board called the meeting to order at 10:30 a.m. Other voting members present were: Virginia Lingelbach, Secretary, Margaret Cagle, Nancy Parks, Dianne Cannestra, Lanette Reid, Billie Hunter, Patty Burnam, Jean Lenderman, Phyllis Lawson, and Lynn Wright. Also attending were Ex Officio member Bea Fischer, non-voting member Virginia "Ginger" Nicholson, and Susan Jackson, House Manager. Mrs. Maloney, First Vice Regent, College Hill Chapter, was also in attendance.

The State Regent offered the invocation and welcomed everyone to the meeting. The roll call was given by Virginia Lingelbach, Board Secretary.

Susan Jackson, House Manager, gave the report of tourism as follows for December 2010: total tourist 25; total walk in tourist 14; total scheduled tourist 11; total walk in income \$45.50, total income from scheduled tours \$27.00, total combined income \$72.50. Gift shop sales \$96.00. The totals for 2010 were as follows: total tourist 551; total walk in tourist 344; total scheduled tourist 207; total walk in income \$1,026; total income from scheduled tours \$333.00; total combined income \$1,359; gift shop sales \$1,931.75. The William McIntosh Chapter visited Meadow Garden for lunch and a tour on December 15, 2010. She also presented comparison figures for 2009/2010. She gave a report of the gallery passes purchased from the Convention Bureau in the Reid Administration. Because only two of the ten were sold, we are being reimbursed \$128.00 for the unsold passes as per agreement with Miss Reid.

Margaret Cagle, Meadow Garden House Chairman and Trustee, reported she had submitted the application for the new fence to the Historic Preservation Commission of Augusta along with a check in the amount of \$50.00. The public meeting for consideration of our proposal will be held on Thursday, January 27 at 5:30 pm. All interested parties are invited to attend. Mrs. Cagle will present the fence plan on behalf of the Meadow Garden Board. Mrs. Cagle provided fence designs for consideration. After discussion, Mrs. Lawson moved "that we use the straight rails fence – The Lafayette with pressed pointed tops – for our replacement fence. This fence style will be installed on all four sides upon approval of Historic Augusta." Motion adopted.

Mrs. Cagle further reported that she continues to work with the Boy Scouts relative to scheduling a flag burning ceremony. Due to a full state conference schedule, it was recommended the ceremony be scheduled to coincide with State Board of Management meeting in the fall of 2011.

The subject of a cleaning service was discussed. Mrs. Cagle advised that the recommended service provider, Lisa Buster, was booked and other recommendations were unavailable for cleaning during the week.

Mrs. Cagle contacted Britt Bohannon Construction Company, a private contractor specializing in preservation of historic buildings. He recently visited the Meadow Garden property and reviewed the four small projects in need of attention. Those projects being: installation of air vent cover in the Heritage Education Center, repair to side porch railing, repair to back porch railing, and repair of gaps at the threshold of the front door of house. His fee is \$50.00 per hour. Mrs. Cagle moved "that we hire Britt Bohannon at \$50.00 per hour to repair four items: the vent in the Heritage Building, back porch railing, small porch side railing, and front door floor gap, not to exceed \$1,000 labor plus materials to be paid from the Maintenance Fund." Motion adopted. Repair of the windows and painting of the Best Room will be deferred until the leakage of water from outside is addressed. Mrs. Cagle stated that the parking signs for the front of the house are also on hold pending further decisions relative to the new entrance. Walton Rehabilitation Center will help with this.

Mrs. Nicholson, Member, Historic Preservation, Meadow Garden Gift Shop, reported that the house windows were tinted with 3M UV film last week by the Coastal Applied Systems, LLC. Total cost was \$4,936.00. Some damage was done to a few window panes, which should be corrected soon. The damage was attributed to the age of the house and the windows having cracks. Due to the urgent nature of the situation, Mrs. Cagle obtained the services of a carpenter to address the problem. It was discovered that many of the windows did not have glazing to secure the panes and when slight pressure was applied the panes would dislodge. The problem of re-

glazing and painting should be addressed before the windows are cleaned on the outside. The panes can be re-glazed from the outside without jeopardizing the tint, and every effort will be made to save the old panes. Mrs. Nicholson read a full report from the carpenter which identified the problem with the windows and addressed the repairs. Mrs. Nicholson continued with a report on the status of the repairs and cleaning of the Turkish carpet located in the parlor. The carpet was completely washed, moth-proofed, repaired and a pad supplied to give added protection. Mr. Paul Boulus, owner of the Iran Rug Company, 1925 Walton Way, Augusta, Georgia completed \$1,200 worth of work for \$500. Mrs. Parks, Regent, Augusta Chapter, moved "that Mr. Paul Boulus, the shop owner who repaired the Turkish rug from the Parlor, be recognized as a Patron-in-Kind for his exceptional repair and cleaning of the Turkish Rug at a greatly reduced cost as a gift to Meadow Garden." Motion adopted. Mrs. Burnam noted this carpet was given in honor of Lanette Reid some years ago and is now valued at over \$2,000.

The State Regent announced that the new shipment of cook books has been received and are available for sale in the gift shop.

Mrs. Cannestra, Treasurer, distributed the Treasurer's Report as of December 31, 2010, showing total assets of \$644,942.92. The report was filed for audit.

Mrs. Hunter, Docents Chairman, reported that for the year 2010 19 chapters were represented with 52 docents, totaling 1426½ hours for the year. The following organizations have participated as docents. Lafayette SAR 1 person, 7 hours; Button Gwinnett SAR 1 person, 10 hours; Allen Howard Society C.A.R. 4 people, 43¼ hours; Meadow Garden Society C.A.R. 5 people, 16 hours; Walter Cox (outside docent) 41½ hours. During the Fall Board meeting on October 29, 2010 47 people attended the docent training classes. Two docents were present during the Christmas Season.

Mrs. Burnam, Furnishings Chairman, stated she had assisted the Backroads of Georgia Magazine reporter by answering her request for information on certain items of furniture at Meadow Garden. She further reported on the repairs to the ladies desk in the Augusta Room and the cleaning, repair and reupholstering of the piano stool in the Best Room. Repairs to the piano stool included removal of horsehair stuffing, cleaning, and reupholstering with fabric donated by the Furnishings Chairman. This work was performed at a greatly reduced fee by Mr. Bruce Smith (The Furniture Doctor). Total cost \$195.00. Mr. Smith agreed to examine other pieces of furniture for minor or major repairs. The trundle bed is one of the pieces requiring immediate attention. Mrs. Burnam moved "to recognize Bruce Smith, doing business as The Furniture Doctor, as a Meadow Garden Patron-in-Kind in appreciation for his outstanding work in restoring the ladies desk." Motion adopted. Mrs. Burnam would like it noted that until now Meadow Garden has never had an official inventory, rather we have only had lists of items acquired over the years which have been referred to as inventories. Mrs. Burnam read a recap of her work since 2006 as Meadow Garden Furnishings Chairman. The Board gave her a round of applause for her outstanding work.

Mrs. Nicholson reported on her visit to Gunston Hall in Virginia (home of George Mason), and shared some of the ideas for item display which she observed while there, one item being their use of museum quality display cases. The need for plexiglas display cases for the protection of certain Meadow Garden items was addressed.

Mrs. Lenderman, Landscaping Chairman, stated that on November 10, 2010, she was approached by a representative of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity at Augusta State University regarding adoption of a flower garden at Meadow Garden. His fraternity would keep the bed weeded and plant gold chrysanthemums. A small sign

acknowledging the fraternity would be installed at the fraternity's expense. Mrs. Lenderman moved "that Omega Psi Phi Fraternity at Augusta State University be allowed to put a 4x6 inch sign in the old weavers garden stating they have adopted the old weavers garden and will plant flowers and maintain the garden upon receipt of a letter of understanding from the fraternity." Motion adopted. Mrs. Lenderman further stated the Cherokee Rose Garden Club worked the morning of November 12 weeding the herb and kitchen gardens and the house was decorated by College Hill and Augusta Chapters and the Meadow Garden Society C.A.R. on December 12.

Mrs. Wright, Public Relations Chairman, reported that we were approved for a Tourism Grant of \$6,700 from the Augusta Convention and Visitors Bureau. We should receive the check in March 2011, the exact amount is predicated on the amount of hotel tax received. The final report on the 2010 grant has been submitted. We were offered the opportunity to purchase advertisement for the Masters Program and for Classic South. The State Regent has signed these contracts. Application has been submitted for a grant for the canal side of the house for \$19,933. The application is due February 15 and will be mailed on January 24, 2011. The grant is from the Watson Brown Foundation and will be made in 2011. The Groupon opportunity which was previously explained in material provided to all board members was discussed and it was the consensus that we would not participate in this coupon program. Mrs. Wright further stated she needed to provide one more photo for the article in the *Georgia Backroads Magazine*. The publication date is unknown at this time. She expressed thanks to Mrs. Cagle and Mrs. Burnam for their assistance with this article.

Mrs. Lawson, Gift Shop Chairman, reported on gift shop activities. She expressed thanks to Georgia Daughters who have donated items for Gift Shop sales and displayed several recently donated items. She stated that the 5 oz. jellies are very popular and FROG Jams and Old Fashion Peach Preserves have been added to the inventory. Mrs. Lawson reported on her contacts with the High Museum of Art in Atlanta relative to display of the Dave the Slave Jugs. Our offer was not accepted due to the fact that they already have several of these jugs in their collection. Subsequent contacts were made with the Atlanta History Center and the Folk Pottery Museum of Northeast Georgia. The latter expressed interest in displaying the jugs in July after their current display ends. Mrs. Lawson moved "that we rent a vault from an insured storage vault company/bank to house the Dave the Slave Jugs." Motion adopted. Mrs. Nicholson stated that she had previously talked with an appraiser recommended by Sotheby's who is an expert on Edgefield, South Carolina pottery. After discussion, Mrs. Lingelbach moved that "a certified appraiser recommended by Sotheby's be contracted to provide a written appraisal on the Dave the Slave Jugs and other items of pottery subject to the State Regent's approval of the appraisers fee. The appraisal will be conducted on site with the money to come from the Money Market." Motion adopted. Mrs. Nicholson will contact the appraiser and report to the State Regent. It was decided that the jugs would not be placed on loan until an appraisal was obtained and insurance was purchased.

The State Regent discussed the reception to be held at Meadow Garden from 2:00 to 3:30 p.m. on Friday during State Conference. It was decided that 400 cookies would be ordered from a local bakery.

Mrs. Baldwin reported she has received no news on the lawsuit.

Mrs. Reid reminded the Board that the final approval for the fence requires a vote at State Conference.

Mrs. Reid discussed the need for a tool shed for storage of lawn supplies and equipment. Mrs. Reid moved "to get an estimate to build a small storage house to be placed behind the heritage center at the northwest corner to be used to store garden items and such other items as necessary so that nothing is stored under the back or front porch at Meadow Garden or left in the open." Motion adopted. The State Regent asked Mrs. Cagle to obtain an estimate.

Mrs. Baldwin asked for a list of recommendations to receive Patron-in-Kind recognition. Mrs. Cagle moved "that Mr. Ed Durant, of The Frame Shoppe, be made a Patron-in-Kind for his generous work on framing the antique coin collection at a greatly reduced price and advice." Motion adopted. Mrs. Lenderman moved that "Patron-in-Kind certificates be given to: Omer Steedley for yard service for over six years, and Lisa Miner and Betsy Ristroph from Cherokee Rose Garden Club for extraordinary service to Meadow Garden." Motion adopted.

Mrs. Baldwin will invite Mr. and Mrs. Boulus and his mother, Walter Cox, Bruce Smith, Ed Durant, and Jennifer Bowen, Dennis Skelley from Walton Rehabilitation Center and a representative of Historic Augusta to opening night of state conference as guests of the state society.

Mrs. Baldwin stated that the next Meadow Garden Board meeting is scheduled for Thursday, March 24, 2011 at 10:30 a.m.

The meeting was adjourned at 2:55 p.m.

March 24, 2011

The Meadow Garden Board met on Thursday, March 24, 2011 at the George Walton Heritage Education Center. Sally McGlaun Baldwin, State Regent and Chairman of the Board called the meeting to order at 10:30 a.m. Other voting members present were: Virginia Lingelbach, Secretary, Nancy Parks, Betty Jean Durshimer, Dianne Cannestra, Lanette Reid, Shelby Whitson, Billie Hunter, Jean Lenderman, Phyllis Lawson, and Lynn Wright. Also attending were Ex Officio member, Bea Fischer, and non-voting members Jean Everett Johnson, Jerry West, Virginia "Ginger" Nicholson, and Frankie Rush Nevins, and Susan Jackson, House Manager. Joining the meeting for the afternoon session were voting members Margaret Cagle and Billie Hunter.

The State Regent offered the invocation and welcomed everyone to the meeting. The roll call was given by Virginia Lingelbach, Board Secretary.

Mrs. Nicholson, Member, Historic Preservation, Meadow Garden Gift Shop, introduced Mr. Ronald D. Long, President and Senior Auctioneer, Charlton Hall Auction House, West Columbia, South Carolina. Mr. Long provided each attendee a copy of the Charlton Hall catalogue for the auction of March 26 and 27, 2011, as a sample of their work. Mrs. Nicholson briefed the Board on the workings of the auction house and the opportunities they will afford us with specific reference to the Edgefield and "Dave" pottery pieces. Mrs. Nicholson continued with a summary of the researched appraisal value range of each of the four pieces of pottery in the Meadow Garden Collection. The entire report with estimated appraisal values is attached to these minutes. Mr. Long gave an extensive overview of his firm's procedures with regard to advertising, promotion, transport and other details of the operation of a high-end auction house. At the conclusion of his presentation he answered questions from Board members. Mrs. Nicholson brought out the fact that the jugs are not of the period of the Meadow Garden property, do not have proper display cases, security if

an issue, and the jugs are not insured and the insurance would be very costly. The proceeds from the sale could be invested and used in the upkeep of the Meadow Garden property. Following discussion, Jean Lenderman moved "to sell the earthenware which includes two "Dave the Slave" jugs and two "Edgefield" pottery items. Motion adopted. After further discussion, Mrs. Lingelbach moved "that we allow Charlton Hall Galleries to sell the four Edgefield Pottery pieces, to include the two "Dave" jugs, at their auction house this year, according to the agreement spelled out by Mr. Ron Long, the owner and without reference/identification of the owners." Motion adopted.

Mrs. Lenderman, Landscaping Chairman, reported the Cherokee Rose Garden Club worked in the herb garden on Friday, January 28^{th} from 9:30-12:00. Mr. Steedley, our lawn service owner, has been reminded that State Conference is April 29^{th} and he will refresh all pine straw by that date and prepare the yard for the reception.

Mrs. Cannestra, Treasurer, distributed the Treasurer's Report as of March 21, 2011 showing total assets of \$668,480.73. The report was filed for audit. Mrs. Cannestra also distributed a sheet entitled "Actual Income and Expenses Compared to Budget," which is filed with these minutes.

Mrs. Baldwin stated she had received a letter from Bea Fischer requesting a motion be entered into the record to correct the minutes of the March 25, 2010 Meadow Garden Board Meeting, by removing the motion which reads "to designate the funds in the Capital investment Money Market Account be invested in a Certificate of Deposit – which shall be designated to build a gate/wall/fence."

Mrs. Cannestra reported that a Certificate of Deposit (CD) was purchased on July 21, 2010, which incorporated all of the Capital Investment money and part of the Administrative and Maintenance money to equal \$50,000. The CD was purchased for 6 months and upon maturity the money was put back in the Money Market Account and is now designated for the Meadow Garden Fence. It was noted that a subsequent motion to this affect was made on July 15, 2010. Mrs. Lingelbach moved "to delete from the March 25, 2010 meeting minutes the motion which stated "to designate the funds in the Capital Investment Money Market Account be invested in a Certificate of Deposit which shall be designated to build a gate/wall/fence." Motion adopted.

Mrs. Nicholson reported that at the request of Mrs. Burnam, Furnishings Chairman, she located a conservator to restore the fine art prints which hang in the Best Room. Renewell, Inc. in South Carolina was selected to do the work at an estimated cost of \$700. Mrs. Durshimer moved "that we approve spending up to \$700 for the restoration of two fine art prints located in the Best Room, by Renewell, Inc., cost to be taken from Furnishings Fund." Motion adopted.

Mrs. Nevins, Liaison to Civic Augusta, reported that grants will be awarded on Wednesday, March 30, 2011 and will be picked up by a member of the Meadow Garden Board and formally presented to the State Regent at State Conference. She further reported the new Classic South brochure is now at the printer and Meadow Garden will be featured in this publication. She asked the Board to consider taking a space at the Westabou Arts in the Heart Festival in September. Further information to be provided. Mrs. Nevins requested permission to order flag pins for "Georgia On My Mind" day at a cost of \$12.00 for 72 pins. Permission granted by the State Regent.

Susan Jackson, House Manager, gave the tourism report for March 2011 as follows: total tourist 99; total walk in tourist 53; total scheduled tourist 46; total income from scheduled tourist \$101.00; total income from walk in tourist \$155.00; total combined income \$273.25, which includes \$75.00 from cook book sales.

Based on anticipated high attendance during state conference, the State Regent asked that those members who took the Docents Course be contacted and asked to serve as sales personnel in the gift shop during state conference.

The State Regent reported on the status of the Lawsuit. A total of \$4,000 was spent in settlement. The Legal fees were \$1,500 and the settlement itself was \$2,500. We have a signed release which closes this matter.

Mrs. Baldwin commented on the motion made during the previous Meadow Garden meeting relative to construction of a tool shed. It was subsequently determined that the proposed location was impractical since it would limit accessibility to the heating and air conditioning units behind the Heritage Education Center. Mrs. Reid discussed the identification of space under the house which could be used for storage once properly cleaned and prepared. Mrs. Reid moved, "to amend the motion in reference to construction of a storage shed for yard equipment, supplies and other items by striking specific location and adding "a location as found most useful, economic and accessible." Motion adopted.

Mrs. Baldwin discussed the reception to be held at Meadow Garden during state conference with the following assignments being made. Cookies (400) - Margaret Cagle; Mints, nuts, napkins and ice - Susan Jackson; punch cups and doilies - Sally Baldwin; white tablecloths - Virginia Lingelbach and Betty Durshimer; punch bowl - Frankie Nevins; glass trays - Jerry West; natural flower arrangement centerpiece - Jean Lenderman. Invitations are being prepared by Lynn Wright. Mrs. Baldwin circulated a notebook for listing of names and addresses of patrons-in-kind who are to be invited to the reception.

Mrs. Baldwin presented two books she recently found which include information on Meadow Garden and offered to donate these books to be placed in the Stribling room. Phyllis Lawson, Gift Shop Chairman, moved "that the Board accept two books White Columns in Georgia and National Landmarks, America's Treasures for reference in the Stribling Room, books given by Sally Baldwin." Motion adopted.

Mrs. Cagle, Meadow Garden House Chairman and Trustee, discussed the proposed new main entrance for Meadow Garden and suggested new signage for the bus bay parking area which would indicate either cars or buses are permitted to park. A brick walkway from parking to the gate would be installed with assistance from Walton Rehabilitation Center and we would have the responsibility of continuing with the walkway to the front of the house. A new drive through gate and a separate walk through gate would be installed on Independence Dr. positioned approximately where the current gates are located. Mrs. Cagle further stated that the proposed new fence would be modified somewhat from the original design in that every other post would be staggered in height. The fence company recommends this design for added security. Walton Rehabilitation Center will be asked to prune their bushes away from the fence area in order to prepare the site for the new fence installation. A poster with a picture of the new fence will be on display at state conference.

With regard to the fence, Mrs. Baldwin asked the Board to compose the official recommendation to be presented for vote at state conference. The Meadow Garden Board recommends to the Georgia State Society Daughters of the American Revolution, "That a steel wrought iron security fence, 5001 feet, Warrior style – two rail with a maximum of three walk through gates and one slide drive through gate be installed by the Maner Fence and Specialties Company of Augusta around the perimeter of the Meadow Garden property. This fence was approved by the Augusta Historic Preservation Commission on January 28, 2011. The quote from Maner Fence and Specialties as of October 27, 2010 is

\$41,678.00. This quote is subject to increase depending on the price of materials, with a maximum cost of \$45,000.00. The price includes the materials and installation, the removal of the old fence and bushes." Recommendation passed. The vote of the Board was unanimous. The Meadow Garden report will be given at state conference immediately following the reports of the state officers.

Mrs. Cagle discussed the trimming of the grape arbor and suggested a second frame be built under the arbor for support.

Mrs. Baldwin stated the next Meadow Garden Board meeting would be Thursday, April 28, at 2:00 p.m. for the purpose of setting up for the reception. Those members not otherwise involved in conference meetings were requested to attend. The next official Meadow Garden Board business meeting is scheduled for Thursday, July 21, 2011, at 10:30 a.m. at Meadow Garden.

The meeting was adjourned at 2:10 p.m.

Meadow Garden Electronic Vote June 7, 2011

An electronic meeting of the Meadow Garden Board was conducted by the State Regent via email on Tuesday, June 7, 2011, for the purpose of presenting a time sensitive recommendation from the Chairman of the Board and the State Treasurer. Notification was received from the Watson Brown Foundation that Meadow Garden had been approved to receive a grant in the amount of \$18,000 provided matching funds are ready and available for use. The Foundation requires a notarized letter attesting to the above be submitted prior to the release of funds. The Chairman of the Board and the State Treasurer moved that: "We match the grant with \$15,000 from the Money Market Administration/Maintenance Account and \$3,000 from the Checking Account Administration/Maintenance Account." Motion seconded and adopted by electronic vote. The State Regent will authorize the release of the requested letter of funding.

Standing Rules for Meadow Garden

I MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

- The governing body of a Historic Site, in this instance the Meadow Garden Board, serves the public interest as it relates to Meadow Garden, and must consider itself accountable to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, as well as to Meadow Garden; members should not attempt to act in their individual capacities, but all actions should be taken as a Board, Committee, or otherwise in conformance with the Standing Rules, the Act of Incorporation, or applicable Resolutions.
- The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the three (3) Trustees as named in the Deed from the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, conveying Meadow Garden to the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution; namely, the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the State Chairman of Meadow Garden who is appointed by the State Regent; the Chapter Regents of the Augusta Chapter and the College Hill Chapter, both chapters being located in Augusta, who shall serve as Vice Chairman to the State Chairman of Meadow Garden; the State Treasurer; two Honorary State Regents; and six of the chairmen of Meadow Garden Committees, as appointed by the State Regent.
- 3. No Georgia Daughter shall serve in the same Meadow Garden Chairmanship more than three (3) consecutive terms.
- 4. In addition to the six appointments to the Board which are made by the State Regent, she shall appoint two (2) Honorary State Regents.
- The State Second Vice Regent shall serve as ex-officio member of the Meadow Garden Board, being given the privilege of the floor without a vote.
- The State Regent shall serve as Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board, and the State First Vice Regent shall serve as Secretary of the Meadow Garden Board.
- 7. The Meadow Garden Board shall met a minimum of three (3) times each year; namely, preceding State Board of Management meeting, preceding annual State Conference and following Continental Congress, and at such other times as deemed necessary by the Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board. At least one (1) meeting of the Board shall be held at Meadow Garden each year. The Board may vote by teleconference, fax or email, if necessary.
- 8. The Meadow Garden Board shall have jurisdiction over the operation, maintenance and work of Meadow Garden and shall be the authority for Meadow Garden as long as such authority is not in conflict with the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, the Act of Incorporation for the Georgia State Society, Resolutions adopted by the Georgia State Society and/or directions which from time to time may be approved by action of the Georgia State Society assembled at its annual State Conference.
- The Meadow Garden Board shall supervise the placing of all insurance to cover the grounds and the Historic House and its contents, including the fine arts, with accredited companies – coverage to include fire, theft and liability.
- 10. Five (5) voting members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.
- 11. Minutes shall be kept of each meeting and a copy shall be sent to each member and printed verbatim in the State Proceedings.

- 12. All expenses for maintenance, operation and purchases of furnishings and plantings shall be authorized by the State Regent, as Chairman of the Board, and paid by the State Treasurer. Expenditures exceeding \$1,000.00 must have the majority approval of the Board.
- 13. These rules will be binding on the actions of the Board in their operation of Meadow Garden. They may be changed by the following procedure: Members of the Board must have written notification of proposed changes one month prior to the next meeting of the Board; a two-thirds vote of the Board and approval of the State Conference are necessary to effect a change.
- 14. The State Regent shall appoint a Meadow Garden Advisory Board, which would act in an advisory capacity only and be composed of no more than fifteen (15) members representing various areas of expertise.

II OPERATIONS

- 1. Everyone entering Meadow Garden will be requested to sign the Register, including date, time of arrival and time of departure.
- No more than fifteen (15) people with each Docent are to be on tour in the house at a given time. Excess of this number may wait in the reception room or in the garden. The House Manager has the authority to enforce the Meadow Garden rules at all times.
- There will be no smoking on Meadow Garden property.
- 4. No refreshments are to be served in or taken into the Historic House by visitors, including chapters or the public. Should a group, such as a visiting chapter, desire refreshments, the garden is available for use if litter is properly disposed of by the serving group.
- 5. Tour visitors will be asked to pay a fee as set by the Board.
- 6. In August 2006 Dixie Lock and Safe, Inc., installed new locks and keys were made which cannot be duplicated. The State Regent, State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Manager by the direction of one of the two above, are authorized to have new keys made for Meadow Garden.

There shall be two (2) complete sets of keys to Meadow Garden, which are eight (8) keys per set. There shall be four (4) sets of keys comprised of three (3) keys per set, which are the back door key to the historic house, the key to the George Walton Heritage Education Center, and the gate key. There shall be one (1) set of keys for "house" use, which are three (3) keys, one for the kitchen, one for the exterior bath at the historic house, and one for the interior door between the dining room and the old gift shop area. These three (3) "house" keys shall be kept in the old gift shop area for accessibility to all for use on a daily basis. There shall be one (1) gate key assigned to the landscape service company.

Keys are lettered per door of entry: Key # A is to the deadbolt of the three (3) doors of the George Walton Heritage Education Center; Key # B is to the deadbolt lock on the back door of the historic house; Key # C is to the gate; Key # D is to the Stribling Room in the George Walton Heritage Education Center; Key # E is to the kitchen; Key # F is to the deadbolt for the exterior bath at the historic house; Key # G is to the interior door between the dining room and the old gift shop; Key # H is to the office upstairs in the historic house.

<u>Keys are numbered</u> and assigned according to the appointed position on the Meadow Garden Board or as designated. Keys are distributed to the assigned person when they sign a "Meadow Garden Key Distribution Form." When this assigned person leaves her current position, she returns the keys and signs the same form she had signed when she accepted the keys. Keys go with the appointed position not the person.

<u>Distribution of the keys</u>: Key # 1 to State Regent, Chairman of Meadow Garden Board (complete set of 8 keys); Key # 2 to Meadow Garden Manager (complete set of 8 keys); Key # 3 to Chairman of Meadow Garden (keys A, B, C); Key # 4 to Docents Chairman (keys A, B, C); Key # 5 to Landscaping Chairman (keys A, B, C); Key # 6 for General Docent use (keys A, B, C) – to be checked "out" and "in" when used; Key # 7 are "house" keys (keys E, F, G); Key # 8 to landscape service (key C).

III VOLUNTEERS AND DOCENTS

- Docents, shall be those well screened and trained volunteers who will serve under the direct supervision of a Meadow Garden Chairman and/or the House Manager.
- Duties of docents shall include acting as guides, hostesses, working in gift shop, working in yard, cleaning in house, public relations. No volunteer work at or for Meadow Garden shall be done except under the direct guidance of the Meadow Garden Board and the chairman of the specific committee for that particular function.
- Cleaning or yard work volunteers shall be under the direction of the House Manager.

IV FURNISHINGS

- Items bought or accepted for the older section of Meadow Garden must predate 1821.
- (a) the front room on the main floor, known as the Augusta Room, will be designed as an interpretive center, highlighting people, events, and memorabilia related to George Walton and to the history of Meadow Garden; (b) the back room on the main floor, formerly known as the Board Room, will be used as a gift shop; (c) the front room on the upper floor of the newer section will be furnished as a bedroom/study of the period pre-dating 1850 or be used to display historically significant items relating to Meadow Garden, Augusta and Georgia; (d) the back room on the upper floor of the newer section will be used as an office for the Meadow Garden manager and for storage and supplies for the gift shop.
- Reproductions may be used only when the physical condition of the antiques is jeopardized by exposure in areas where large numbers of visitors have easy access; or when environmental conditions including excessive light, dust, humidity or airborne impurities pose a threat to the preservation of originals.
- 4. Effective March 12, 1983 all items donated to Meadow Garden shall be accepted with the written condition that they become the property of Meadow

- Garden and may be used, replaced or sold at the discretion of the Meadow Garden Board only.
- 5. All items that post date 1821, with the exception of those in the six (6) rooms of the newer section and those described in Number 3 of this section, shall be replaced as soon as possible with similar items pre-dating 1821.
- 6. Once an item is placed, it shall not be moved from one location to another without permission of the Meadow Garden Chairman of Furnishings who shall report such changes to the Meadow Garden Board in a timely manner.
- Any item donated or purchased must have written documentation of appraisal.
- 8. No items and/or furnishings shall be accepted "on loan."
- 9. A file will be kept of all assets with information as to price paid or market value, date of acquisition, donor or where bought, documentation and appraisal and a description of article. One file will be kept in the reception room accessible to the Docents; a duplicate file will be in the possession of the Chairman of the Board. The Meadow Garden Chairman of Furnishings shall maintain and keep current the "Past and Perfect" Program on all items and furnishings.
- 10. All items purchased or donated will be added to the Fine Arts insurance policy. Said policy will be reviewed and updated a minimum of once a year. Major additions to furnishings will be added immediately.
- 11. Future plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the Historic House.

V LANDSCAPING

- The landscape plan adopted by the Board shall be adhered to with no deviation unless recommended by an authority on landscape design and care.
- Donations of shrubbery, plants or trees shall be accepted only when item is part of the master plan.
- Work on the grounds will be under the sole direction of the Meadow Garden Board and the Landscaping Chairman. Supervision of actual work will be provided by the Meadow Garden Chairman or the Landscaping Chairman of Meadow Garden.

VI GIFT SHOP

- 1. The Chairman of the committee will be responsible for all purchases, subject to the approval of the Board or the State Regent. The Vice Chairman shall assist the Gift Shop Chairman with sales at state functions.
- Gift Shop operations will be self-supporting. In the event funds are needed for purchases, they may be advanced from available Meadow Garden funds and must be considered a loan and shall be repaid without interest within one (1) year from date of borrowing.
- 3. Profit from the Gift Shop shall be accounted for within the State Treasurer's books, with a percentage being transferred at the discretion of the Board at the end of the fiscal year and placed in the Maintenance Account. The audit of the Gift Shop operation shall be included in the annual audit of the Georgia State Society.

VII PATRONS

- 1. Donors to the following categories are eligible to be recognized:
 - A. Meadow Garden Capital Investment Trust Fund
 - B. Furnishings
 - C. Maintenance
 - D. Landscape
 - E. Heritage Education
- Giving categories and levels for annual contributions:

This information will be publicized in the Meadow Garden brochure and other appropriate places as determined by the Board.

- 3. Chapter gifts, above the State Honor Roll requirements, automatically qualify the chapter to be recognized at an appropriate giving level determined by the categories listed in #2.
- 4. The State Treasurer will report these gifts to the Patrons Chairman.
- The Patrons Chairman will issue certificates to the qualifying individuals and chapters or groups.
- 6. A permanent book will be kept on public display at Meadow Garden to record the names of those who give at the Patrons level or above.
- 7. The Patrons Chairman will enter the names of donors in the appropriate book a minimum of once a year.
- 8. The Meadow Garden Patrons book shall be divided into four parts: (1) Individuals who give a minimum of fifty dollars in one payment, and chapters, organizations, businesses or groups that give a minimum of one hundred dollars in one payment; (2) In-Kind Patrons approved by the Meadow Garden Board in recognition of outstanding and/or unusual gifts of time, talents or expertise toward the betterment of Meadow Garden; (3) Honoraria, which shall list individuals or groups honored by a Patron gift as designated in #1, such listing to show the name of honoree (Patron) and the donor; (4) Memorials of at least fifty dollars which shall list the name of the individual memorialized and the name of the donor.

VIII PLAQUES & MARKERS

 Plaques/Markers may be placed at Meadow Garden only at the discretion of the Board, and request meets the following criteria: Substantial service and/or contributions that secured the property and the heritage for the GSDAR. Individuals so recognized shall have been deceased for at least 5

- years; Plaque/Marker will be paid for by person(s) requesting such recognition.
- 2. Such plaques will be permanently displayed at Meadow Garden and a record of the honoree's service and/or contribution will be recorded and placed in the Meadow Garden file, with Board approval.
- 3. Plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the Historic House. Additional markers shall not be permanently placed on the grounds.

Bylaws GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II OBJECTS

The objects of this Society shall be:

- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.
- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.
- (3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of the Georgia State Society.

Article IV OFFICERS

- **Section 1.** The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian and a State Curator.
- **Section 2.** (a) To be eligible for state office, a member shall hold and have held membership in a chapter or chapters within the Georgia State Society for at least 5 years prior to her election and have served a full term as chapter officer or state chairman.
- (b) No member shall be eligible to the same state office for two (2) successive terms. A member having served more than one half of a term in a state office shall be deemed to have served a full term.
- (c) No two state officers shall be members of the same chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.
- (d) To be eligible for the office of State Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State First Vice Regent or as State Second Vice Regent or served in each of these two offices of the Georgia Society.

- (e) To be eligible for the office of State First Vice Regent or for the office of State Second Vice Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State Recording Secretary or as State Treasurer of the Georgia State Society and shall have served a full term as a Chapter Regent of a chapter in the Georgia State Society.
- **Section 3.** In recognition of valuable service to the Georgia State Society, a State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent for life by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Article V NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

- **Section 1.** (a) A candidate for state office shall request the endorsement of her chapter, taken by vote at a regular meeting of the chapter held between May and January preceding the State Conference at which state elections are held. The endorsement, signed by the Chapter Recording Secretary, shall include the office the candidate seeks and shall be received by the State Regent with the candidate's statement of intent to be a candidate prior to any announcement or campaigning by the candidate and/or her supporters.
- (b) A candidate for State Regent who wishes to present a slate of officers shall send to the State Regent in one packet the chapter endorsements and the statements of intent for each of her selected candidates. If received by the State Regent no later than December 1, these candidates shall be listed as a slate in the State Regent's Call to State Conference.
- (c) Candidates wishing to run independently of a slate, whose chapter endorsements and statements of intent are received by the State Regent no later than December 1 shall be listed as independent candidates in the State Regent's Call to State Conference.
- (d) A candidate whose chapter endorsement and statement of intent have been properly received by the State Regent may choose to announce her candidacy separate from the State Regent's Call to State Conference. Such a chapter endorsement and statement of intent shall be received by the State Regent at least ten (10) days prior to the opening of the State Conference at which the election is to take place.
- (e) A candidate who does not meet the requirements of these Bylaws shall be declared disqualified and ineligible for consideration for state office.
- (f) A chapter shall endorse no more than one chapter member for state office per election with the possible exception of candidates for State Regent and for State Corresponding Secretary.
- (g) In the event of the death, incapacitation or withdrawal of a candidate prior to the election, a replacement shall be made with notification in writing to the State Regent and accompanied by the chapter endorsement and statement of intent as directed by these Bylaws.
- **Section 2.** Nominations of candidates for all state offices shall be made at a designated meeting of the State Conference.
- **Section 3.** The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected biennially by ballot at the State Conference. A majority vote shall elect. Independent candidates shall be listed on the ballot in a separate column from those candidates presented as a slate.
- **Section 4.** The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two (2) years or until their successors are elected. Their terms of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.
- **Section 5.** (a) Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become State Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become State First Vice Regent subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. Vacancies in other state offices shall be filled by appointment of the

Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next State Board of Management meeting or State Conference, whichever shall come first.

- (b) Any state officer who is absent from the state for a continuous period of six (6) months or longer shall automatically relinquish her position as a state officer.
- **Section 6.** Upon the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Organizing Secretary General.
- **Section 7**. (a) A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot.
- (b) The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than eighteen (18) months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.
- (c) The endorsement shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent with the candidate's name and address to the Recording Secretary General to be received by the first day of the month preceding the designated Continental Congress.

Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall perform the duties prescribed in this article, and parliamentary authority adopted by the Society, and such others as the State Board of Management and the National Society may require.

Section 2. The State Regent shall:

- (a) be the chief executive officer and the official spokesman for the State Society;
- (b) have general supervision of the affairs of the State Society;
- (c) preside at all meetings of the State Conference, State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;
- (d) appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society;
 - (e) be ex-officio a member of all committees;
- (f) appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as advisor in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting;
- (g) sign all contracts and agreements made in the name of the Georgia State Society with the recorded approval of the Executive Committee and the State Board of Management or the State Conference as directed by these Bylaws;
- (h) be bonded and have the authority to draw upon funds of the State Society with the approval of the Finance Committee.
- (i) recommend to the Finance Committee a Certified Public Accountant who shall be approved by the Finance Committee.

Section 3. The State First Vice Regent shall:

- (a) perform the duties of the office of State Regent in the absence or inability of the State Regent;
 - (b) fill a vacancy in the office of State Regent;
 - (c) Perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;
- (d) serve on those committees as designated by these Bylaws and as directed by the State Regent.

Section 4. The State Second Vice Regent shall:

(a) perform the duties of the office of State First Vice Regent in the absence or inability of the State First Vice Regent;

- (b) fill a vacancy in the office of State First Vice Regent;
- (c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;
- (d) serve on committees as directed by the State Regent.

Section 5. The State Chaplain shall:

- (a) open all meetings of the State Conference and the State Board of Management with scripture reading and prayer;
- (b) preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and conduct such other religious services as may be required;
 - (c) be custodian of state properties pertaining to the duties of this office;
 - (d) be responsible for IN MEMORIAM pages in the Proceedings.

Section 6. The State Recording Secretary shall:

- (a) record the proceedings of the meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;
- (b) compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and the Proceedings Committee.
- (c) submit to the appropriate National officers, the endorsement for Vice President General and the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent by the first day of the month preceding the month of Continental Congress of the year in which said balloting was held:

Section 7. The State Corresponding Secretary shall:

- (a) conduct correspondence and send notices on behalf of the State Regent, the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as may be directed by them;
- (b) receive from the chapters the Master Questionnaires and distribute to the appropriate state chairmen.

Section 8. The State Organizing Secretary shall:

- (a) assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new chapters;
- (b) assist chapters in conjunction with appropriate state officers and chairmen in revitalization

Section 9. The State Treasurer shall:

- (a) be bonded:
- (b) be the custodian of the funds of the State Society, placing them in institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance:
- (c) receive the state dues and State Conference registration fees from the chapters and receive all sums contributed by the chapters for state and national projects, disbursing monthly to the Treasurer General all funds designated for national projects;
 - (d) disburse other funds only when authorized by the State Regent in writing;
- (e) keep an account of all sums received or disbursed by using the basic double entry form of bookkeeping according to accepted accounting procedures and keep receipts for all transactions:
- (f) prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference, sending a copy to the State Chairman of the Finance Committee ten (10) days in advance of each meeting;
- (g) be a member of the Finance Committee and an ex-officio member of the Credentials Committee;
- (h) balance and prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year; said audit by a Certified Public Accountant, shall be performed and delivered within forty-five (45) days of receipt of books.
- (i) An internal review of the State Treasurer's records shall be performed when a change in this office occurs after the close of the fiscal year. Following the review, the records

shall be turned over to the new State Treasurer. The committee to review the books shall be composed of the State First Vice Regent, the immediate Past State Treasurer, the immediate past Finance Chairman and a current Chapter Regent appointed by the State Regent.

Section 10. The State Registrar shall:

- (a) when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution prove eligibility and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars;
 - (b) keep a correct list of all members in the state;
 - (c) report on membership to the State Conference;
 - (d) assist with the verification of the credentials;
- (e) be in possession of the computer and software owned by the Georgia State Society and see that it is maintained.

Section 11. The State Historian shall:

- (a) be in charge, within the state, of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General as well as those authorized by the Georgia State Society;
- (b) keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves within the state:
 - (c) prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General;
- (d) promote the study of American history, state and county history and historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the founding of our state and counties.

Section 12. The State Librarian shall:

- (a) serve as liaison between the Librarian General and the Georgia Chapters and disseminate general information on the NSDAR Library;
- (b) cooperate with the director of the Georgia Department of Archives and History, making the needs of the Archives known to the chapters;
- (c) collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing them wherever accepted in such libraries and Archives as may be chosen by the State Board of Management;
- (d) solicit, with the approval of the Executive Committee, contributions from the chapters for purchase of such books as requested by the office of the Librarian General, and/or the various libraries in Georgia which the State Society approves;
- (e) receive gifts of books and other printed material from the chapters to be donated to the approved libraries and Archives;
- (f) maintain a constant supply of bookplates to the NSDAR Library, the Georgia Department of Archives and History and for purchase by the chapters.
- **Section 13.** The State Curator shall: be custodian of the State portable properties and shall have them properly stored and made ready for use at state meetings.
- **Section 14.** All officers will keep a Procedure Book of Instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new officers to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. State Conference:

- a) The annual meeting of the Georgia State Society shall be known as the State Conference. It shall be for the purpose of:
 - (1) receiving reports of officers, committees and Chapter Regents;
 - (2) electing officers biennially;
 - (3) promoting programs in furtherance of the objects of the Society;

- (4) any other business that may arise:
 - i. annual budget shall be adopted,
 - ii. all projects of the State Society requiring funding shall be voted upon at State Conference or ratified by members at State Conference if previously voted upon by the State Board of Management,
 - iii. no project extending beyond the term of the presiding officer may be accepted at any meeting other than by vote at State Conference.
- (b) The State Conference will be held between February 1 and the time of the meeting of Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week;
 - (c) The State Regent shall fix the time and place of meetings;
- (d) The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credentials form to the chapters not less than sixty (60) days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 2. The voting members of the State Conference shall be:

- (a) the officers and Honorary State Regents of the State Society;
- (b) the officers and honorary officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state:
- (c) the Chapter Regent, or in her absence, the Vice Regent or alternate of each chapter;
- (d) delegates or alternates of each chapter of the state as designated by the Bylaws of the National Society for representation at Continental Congress.
- **Section 3**. Only a chapter member in good standing whose credentials have been completed in accordance with the instructions of the State Regent and the State Credentials Chairman for the State Conference and in accordance with the Standing Rules of the National Society shall be eligible to represent her chapter at state and national meetings.
- **Section 4.** A member shall have belonged to a chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the chapter, except in the case of the Regent or Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.
- **Section 5.** A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at an annual State Conference, shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.
- **Section 6.** Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the state of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.
- Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference the privilege of the floor and the right to speak shall be accorded to the State Chairmen and State Vice Chairmen. They may not vote unless they are duly registered as voters of the State Conference.
- **Section 8.** Special meetings of the State Society may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen (15) days' notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.
- **Section 9.** Forty-five (45) voting members, representing not less than twenty (20) chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

- **Section 1.** The state officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents and the Regents, or in their absence, the Vice Regents of the chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.
- Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the fall, following the October meeting of the National Board, It may meet whenever called by the

State Regent. A minimum of twenty (20) days' notice shall be given as to the time and place of any such meeting.

Section 3. Thirty (30) members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference or as proscribed by these Bylaws.

Section 5. State chairmen, vice chairmen, committee members of the National and Standing Committees may attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privilege of the floor and the right to speak, but shall not vote. One (1) member from each chapter may attend the meetings, if invited by the chapter regent, and shall be granted the privilege of the floor, but shall not have the right to speak or vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article IX EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

- **Section 1.** The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.
- **Section 2.** The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, shall attend the meetings, but may not vote.

Section 3. This Executive Committee shall:

- (a) perform such duties of the State Board of Management between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient;
- (b) meet at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three (3) members of the committee:
 - (c) vote by teleconference, e-mail or fax, if necessary;
- (d) receive and make recommendations for projects requiring expenditure of funds outside routine expenditures to be considered by the State Conference;
 - (e) make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.
- **Section 4.** Decisions of the Executive Committee shall be acted upon at the next meeting of the State Board of Management or at State Conference, whichever shall come first.

Article X FINANCES

Section 1. (a) The fiscal year of the Georgia State Society shall be July 1 through the last day of June.

- b) The annual budget, prepared by the Finance Committee, shall cover the fiscal year and be prepared on the basis of dues payable for the calendar year beginning December first preceding.
 - (c) The Finance Committee shall propose the per capita amount and

distribute according to the annual membership count. The per capita amount and distribution shall be indicated on the budget presented annually. Funds to be included in the per capita designations shall be Tamassee DAR School, Kate Duncan Smith DAR School, Berry College, Lucy Cook Peel Fund, McCall Genealogical Fund and Meadow Garden Maintenance.

Section 2. The annual dues of chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be \$10.00 for each member of the chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1.

- **Section 3.** (a) Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the state dues, a conference registration fee of \$10.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under these Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether chapter is represented or not.
- (b) State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay a conference fee of \$10.00 at the time of registration.
- (c) Other members of the Georgia State Society who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a conference fee of \$7.00 at the time of registration.
- (d) All host chapters may charge a registration fee to those not purchasing a meal ticket to off-set the cost of hosting state/district meetings.
- **Section 4.** (a) The State Treasurer and the State Regent and such others entrusted with funds of the Georgia State Society as may be designated by the State Board of Management shall be bonded. (See Article VI, Sections 2 and 9);
- (b) The State Treasurer with the approval of the State Regent and the State Chairman of the Finance Committee shall place the funds of the Georgia State Society in financial institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage;
- (c) The placement of restricted savings funds and investment funds of the Georgia State Society shall be placed to the credit of the Georgia State Society by the State Treasurer under the direction of the Finance Committee. Monies may be invested in U. S. Treasury obligations or other interest bearing obligations of federally insured financial institutions;
- (d) The accounts of the State Treasurer shall be annually prepared for audit by a Certified Public Accountant immediately following the end of the State Society fiscal year and no later than July 15 and delivered to the CPA by that date;
- (e) Should the State Treasurer be incapacitated, the State Regent, after consultation with the Chairman of the Finance Committee and with the approval of the Executive Committee, shall appoint an Acting State Treasurer to serve until such time as the State Treasurer is able to resume her duties or a new State Treasurer is appointed and ratified as stated in Article V, Section 5 (a).
- **Section 5.** The expenses incurred by the State Regent in the performance of duty shall be paid each year from the State Dues Fund:
- (a) Five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) shall be taken each year to defray her necessary travel expenses;
- (b) Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent, as budgeted, shall be paid by the State Treasurer who shall keep all receipts of these expenses. No expenses exceeding the budgeted amount shall be paid by the State Treasurer.
- **Section 6.** At the close of the books annually, \$5,000.00 shall be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies Fund" so that at the end of each administration a total of \$10,000.00 will be reserved. This money is to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration.

Article XI COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Honorary State Regents of the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution shall function as an advisory committee to the State Regent and to the Georgia State Society.

Section 2. The State Regent shall appoint the following standing committees:

- (a) Bylaws: An Honorary State Regent shall be appointed as chairman and the committee shall be composed of two (2) other Honorary State Regents and one (1) member from each district;
- (b) Finance: This committee shall be composed of seven (7) members to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two (2)

Honorary State Regents, one (1) active chapter regent and one (1) active chapter member, who shall not be an Honorary State Regent, nor a state officer, nor a chapter regent. One of the two Honorary State Regents shall be appointed chairman. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund. This committee shall have charge of all investments of the Georgia State Society funds.

- (c) Resolutions: This committee shall be composed of all Honorary State Regents, the State Parliamentarian and three (3) chapter members;
- (d) Proceedings: This committee shall be composed of the State Recording Secretary, the immediate past State Recording Secretary, State First Vice Regent and four (4) additional Daughters, at least one of whom shall be an Honorary State Regent.
- **Section 3.** The State Regent shall appoint such other committees, standing or special, as the State Conference shall authorize and actions of the State Board of Management and of the National Society shall require. The appointments shall be concurrent with the term of the State Regent making the appointments and shall terminate with the end of the administration.
- **Section 4.** Additional appointments may be made to any of the committees and vacancies shall be filled by the State Regent with timely notification to the membership.
- **Section 5.** The duties of committees shall be such as these Bylaws, the State Conference, the State Board of Management or the National Society shall prescribe.
- **Section 6.** All chairmen will keep a Procedure Book of instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

Article XII CHAPTERS

- **Section 1.** To expedite the work of the Society, the chapters of the Georgia State Society shall be placed in geographical districts:
- (a) A chairman appointed by the State Regent shall coordinate the work of all chapters as needed; she shall be titled "Coordinator of Districts;"
- (b) Each district shall have a Director appointed by the State Regent to work as a committee under the direction and supervision of the Coordinator of Districts and the State Regent.
- **Section 2.** Chapter elections shall be held no later than April 1 in the year of chapter elections. The Chapter Regent shall report annually the names of the elected officers promptly on the form provided by the State Regent for this purpose, with copies to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, and the State Recording Secretary.
- **Section 3.** The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent, the State Recording Secretary, and the District Director at the time designated by the State Regent.

Article XIII MEADOW GARDEN

Meadow Garden, property owned by the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, shall be operated as follows:

- (a) The governing body shall be the Board of Trustees composed of the following members: the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Chairman who shall be appointed by the State Regent;
- (b) The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the following members: the State Regent who shall serve as Chairman; the State First Vice Regent who shall serve as Secretary; the Chairman of Meadow Garden; the Regents of the Augusta and College Hill

Chapters; the State Treasurer; two (2) Honorary State Regents; and the chairmen of the six (6) subcommittees appointed by the State Regent - Docents, Furnishings, Landscaping, Gift Shop, Patrons and Public Relations.

(c) The Meadow Garden Board shall operate with Standing Rules approved by the State Conference.

Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

- **Section 1**. The current edition of *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised*, shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law in matters not covered by these Bylaws.
- **Section 2.** The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

Article XV AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent, the State Parliamentarian, and the State Bylaws Chairman. The State Regent shall send a copy to each chapter, at least sixty (60) days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the Call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

Article XVI DISSOLUTION

Although the period of duration of the Georgia State Society is perpetual, if for any reason the State Society is to be dissolved or otherwise terminated, no part of the property of the Society or any of the proceeds shall be distributed to or inure to the benefit of any of the officers or members of the Society. Upon the dissolution of the Georgia State Society, assets shall be distributed by the Board of Management and/or the Executive Committee to and only to the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the local United States District Court, exclusively to such organization or organizations as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated within the meaning of section 501 (c)(3), with purposes and objectives consistent with those of the Georgia State Society.

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State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year, a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24, 1899. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21) No Conference was held in 1911, the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912," and amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, page 211).

RESOLVED, that in honor of the State Regent, the Georgia State Society contribute one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) to the President General's Project, such fund to be debited from the State Dues unallocated Money Market Account, and the gift to be made the first year of the State Regent's term. *Proceedings*, 2008-2009.

AWARDS

All Chapters competing for awards must send reports to the respective chairmen by February 15. All reports for awards are based on membership confirmed by the National Society. SEE FIGURE BESIDE CHAPTER NAME IN CHAPTER REGENTS' DIRECTORY. The reporting year is March 1 – February 28 (leap years February 29).

BYLAWS

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National or State Bylaws, and a current copy is to be filed with the State Parliamentarian.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS

Notice of change of address of members shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, State Regent, State Corresponding Secretary, and the State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHANGE OF NAME

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, and the State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHAPTER ELECTIONS

As chapter elections are to be held before April 1, names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, 1776 D Street, NW, Washington, DC 2006-5303, the State Regent or the State Regent-Elect, the State Recording Secretary and the State Corresponding Secretary by April 1. The full Christian name of chapter officers shall be given, along with her husband's given name or initials, address, zip code, telephone number, fax and e-mail. In accordance with the National Bylaws, a Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years.

CHAPTER REPRESENTATION AT STATE AND NATIONAL MEETINGS

At the State Board of Management a chapter is represented by the Chapter Regent, or in her absence by the First Vice Regent, and one non-voting member, if invited by the Chapter Regent.

The voting representation of each chapter at State Conference and Continental Congress shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received in the Office of the Treasurer General by December 1. Membership 12-19: Regent only; 20-49: Regent + 1 delegate = 2 votes; 50-99: Regent + 2 delegates = 3 votes; 100-149: Regent + 3 delegates = 4 votes; 150-199: Regent + 4 delegates = 5 votes; 200-249: Regent + 5 delegates = 6 votes; 250-299: Regent + 6 delegates = 7 votes. Chapters with membership of 300 and over will have an additional delegate for each additional 50 members exceeding 299.

CONFERENCE REGISTRATION

On or before December 1, each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer the state dues and a Conference Registration fee of \$10.00 per each delegate to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws. This fee is to be paid whether represented or not and is derived by recommendation of the Finance Committee to the Executive Committee. This is a requirement stated in the Georgia State Bylaws, Article X, Section 3 (a).

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the Conference Registration Fee of \$10.00 at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters, shall pay a Conference Registration Fee of \$7.00 at the time of registration.

The deadline for chapter contributions to the Georgia co-op ads sent to the State Chairman, DAR Magazine is December 1. The checks are to be made payable to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR.

DATE FOR ANNUAL AUDIT

The Georgia State Society Fiscal Year is July 1 to June 30. State Bylaws, Article X, Section 1 (a). The State Treasurer should prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year. Bylaw Article VI, Section 9 (h).

DEADLINES

State Officers and Chairmen welcome chapter reports when completed. Deadline dates are given to ensure conformity for inclusion in reports to National Officers. Per National Society Bylaws, the deadline date is determined by the Federal Postal Service or other carrier, showing cancellation date and not by the date reports are received.

DECEASED MEMBERS

Deaths shall be reported promptly to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Chaplain and the State Registrar by the corresponding Chapter officer. A complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and date of death shall be furnished to the State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for the Conference Memorial Service and for State Proceedings.

DUES

Before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer sends to the State Treasurer state dues of \$10.00 per member. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the December through February Board meeting of the National Society. Before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer sends to the office of the Organizing Secretary General National dues of \$30.00 per member except Life Members, with check made payable to the Treasurer General NSDAR.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS

To insure uniformity and convenience in binding, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 11 inches, with 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches from top of page, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 inches on left side, 1 inch on right side and at bottom. Two copies shall be sent to the State Chairman of Genealogical Records. The booklet, "Instructions for Copying Source Records and Their Preparation for Library Use," should be obtained from the Corresponding Secretary General.

GEORGIA HOSPITALITY FUND

WHEREAS, the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds a social event in Washington during Continental Congress which necessitates expenditures for decorations and a maximum of sixteen (16) guests (to include one representative per DAR School) invited by the Georgia Society:

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, the budgeted amount to be determined by the Finance Committee, to be used for the above purposes; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this fund shall not be cumulative. *Proceedings* 1955, amended 2001, 2009 and 2011.

INFORMATION FOR CHAPTER REGENTS

All letters received by Chapter Regents relating to the work of the Society shall be distributed to the corresponding Chapter officer or chairman and brought to the attention of the members at a chapter meeting.

INFORMATION FOR STATE OFFICERS AND STATE CHAIRMEN

State Officers and State Chairmen shall send to the State Regent and the State Treasurer a copy of any letters mailed to chapters.

NOMINATIONS

The following resolution which applies to the announcement of the candidacy for State Regent appears in the Proceedings of the 20th State Conference, 1918:

RESOLVED, that it is the judgment of the Executive Board that announcements for State Regent should not be made...earlier than three months prior to the meeting of the Conference and they shall be furnished to the press for publication.

Follow the format as seen in Reports of State Officers and State Chairmen in the Proceedings. Margins should be 1/2 inches from the top of page, 1 1/2 inches from left side, 1 inch from right side, and 1 inch from bottom of page. Chapter Regents should exclude NSDAR Chapter Achievement Award and State Honor Roll, as these will be added when confirmed. Your name should be consistent with the lists of Chapter Regents and State Chairmen as found in this *Proceedings*. Winners of awards and awards to be offered shall each be listed on separate sheets identified with the title of the committee and the award. Reports and awards to be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary by the following deadlines: Chapter Regents by February 1; State Officers and State Chairmen by March 1.
