EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETINGS Thursday, August 18, 2011

The Executive Committee of the Georgia State Society NSDAR met August 18, 2011 at the Holiday Inn Lanier Center Hotel in Gainesville at 4:00 p.m., with Sally McGlaun Baldwin, State Regent, presiding.

Others present were: Virginia Grace Lingelbach, First Vice Regent; Ida "Bea" Best Fischer, Second Vice Regent; Melodye G. Brown, Chaplain; Mary Farthing Simonds, Recording Secretary; Brenda Davison Jessel, Corresponding Secretary; Charlotte Josephine Christian, Organizing Secretary; Dianne Brown Cannestra, Treasurer; Susan Durden Lemesis, Registrar; Catherine "Cathy" Derst Miller, Historian; Paula Hannah Osborne, Librarian; Billie Jean Goodwin, Curator; Rebecca "Becky" Malone West, Parliamentarian.

The State Regent called the meeting to order and welcomed the members of the Executive Committee. The Invocation was given by Melodye Brown, State Chaplain.

The First Vice Regent reported 176 members and guests were in attendance at the 2011 Georgia Luncheon at Continental Congress. Mrs. Lingelbach shared plans in progress for the 2012 Georgia Luncheon, with the theme of "Peaches and Pearls." The luncheon will be held at the J.W. Marriott Hotel on Friday, June 29th at 12:00 noon. Tickets will be available at State Conference at the cost of \$53.00. As Secretary of the Meadow Garden Board, Mrs. Lingelbach attended all meetings, recorded minutes and forwarded them to the State Recording Secretary for inclusion in the Proceedings. Mrs. Lingelbach continues to work with the State Regent on the planning of State Conference.

The Second Vice Regent reported that the School Committee continues to sell the National DAR School pins. Chapter donations of health and clinic items for KDS, snack foods for Tamassee and school supplies for Hindman will be collected at workshops. Thrift for the Tamassee "Special Times" Boutique will also be collected. There will be four school representatives at the Gainesville workshop and two at the Perry workshop. Mrs. Fischer announced the retirement of H. Dean Bare effective January 15, 2012. Due to family concerns, Ruth Reddick has resigned as a DAR

School Committee member. Gena Moorhead has accepted her position, giving District 4 a representative on the committee. Mrs. Fischer announced that Georgia Daughters donated \$48,421 to the DAR Schools for the National year that ended February 28, 2011, the most given by any state.

Mrs. Baldwin announced that \$5,432.98 had been donated to the State Regent's Project at Kate Duncan Smith DAR School. The KDS classroom will be dedicated in October 2011.

The Chaplain reported the deaths of 31 Georgia Daughters since State Conference. Among these were past State Officers Marilyn Vance and Mary Elizabeth Vaughn, as well as the tragic death of Dale Couey, Regent of the Nathaniel Abney Chapter. Condolences have been sent when notification was sent by the next-of-kin. A note of condolence was sent to Honorary President General Ann Fleck on the death of her husband. Fifty-two birthday cards have been sent since State Conference to members age 90 and above. The Chaplain's supply of birthday cards was replenished with an order of 250 cards. Mrs. Brown encouraged everyone to send a personal birthday card to Honorary State Regent and Past Vice President General, Evelyn Waite on her 101st birthday, September 1.

The Recording Secretary reported that copies of the minutes of the April 28, 2011 Executive Committee meeting were previously provided to the State Officers and State Parliamentarian by e-mail. There being no further corrections, the minutes were approved as printed. Mrs. Simonds announced that she will meet with the Proceedings Committee to proof and approve the 2010 – 2011 Proceedings. Proceedings will be sent to the printer and distributed at the State Board of Management meeting. Mrs. Simonds discussed the posting of the 2010 – 2011 Proceedings on the Georgia Members' Web Site with the exclusion of the financial statements and possibly the Directory. Mrs. Simonds moved that "the Executive Committee recommend to the State Board of Management that the 2010 – 2011 Proceedings be posted on the Georgia Members' Web Site as a searchable document, with the stipulation that all financial statements be excluded. Hard copies will still be distributed as indicated in the Proceedings "Items of Information"." Adopted.

The Corresponding Secretary reported that the State Regent's letter #4, along with workshop attachments, was prepared and e-mailed to the Georgia State Society e-mail distribution lists including: State Officers, Honorary State Regents, Coordinator of Districts and District Directors, Chapter Regents, State Chairmen and Vice Chairmen. For the Honorary State Regents and the five Chapter Regents without e-mail, copies were sent by US Mail. Many e-mails of information and direction were sent at the instruction of the State Regent to these groups. A letter from the Corresponding Secretary was prepared for inclusion in the Chapter Information Packet (CIP) on-line. Fifty copies of the CIP were printed and delivered to Coordinator of Districts M.G. Whittle for distribution at State District Workshops. Mrs. Jessel coordinated with Lynn Wright, State Directory Chairman, to complete the 2011 - 2012 State Directory to be sold at District Workshops. Mrs. Jessel interfaced with Amy Lawson, Chairman, and Jenny Jacoby, Vice Chairman, Volunteer Information Services Committee, to update information on the GSS Members' Web Site.

The Organizing Secretary reported the Suwanee Creek Chapter will hold their organizing meeting on October 8. Ms. Christian announced that a new Chapter is being organized by Robbin Wheatley with approval hopefully at the next Board of Management meeting. The Fort Early Chapter was officially disbanded on April 9, 2011. Ms. Christian continues to work with the members of struggling chapters, William Witcher and Oothcaloga, on the possibility of finding new chapter homes.

State Chaplain Melodye Brown stated that the Xavier Chapter had sent invitations to these chapters for their members to attend the Xavier Chapter meetings.

The Treasurer gave the financial report, giving the following summary of accounts for the Georgia State Society as of June 30, 2011: checking account balance \$62,840.03; money market balance \$47,416.76; certificates of deposit \$120,332.62; deposits to hotels, \$3,850.00; making total assets of \$235,439.41. The Meadow Garden accounts as of June 30, 2011 were summarized as follows: checking account balance \$43,605.06; money market balance \$75,005.01; certificates of deposit \$350,000.00; fixed assets of \$167,830.65; petty cash \$100.00; making total assets of \$636,540.72. The financial reports were filed. Mrs. Cannestra reported that the books are currently at the auditor's and should be returned by the end of August. She continues to work on all the Proceedings reports, which will be finalized after the audit report is received. The William Witcher Chapter was contacted by the State Regent and Mrs. Cannestra due to non-payment of State Dues and Conference Fees. The State Treasurer's Instructions and Forms for 2011 -2012 have been posted on the State Web Site and have also been sent to the Chapter Treasurers via e-mail. Mrs. Cannestra gave details of a major change by the National Society in the way donations will be credited. Rather than soliciting donations from many funds as in the past, Chapters will be encouraged to donate to only four categories of funds. The change will give the National Society more flexibility in where they donate needed funds.

The Registrar reported that Georgia's current membership count as of August 17, 2011 is at 7,305, with a gain of 248 new members and 12 pending at the next National Board of Management. With deaths and resignations, the net gain is 159. Georgia welcomed 39 new Juniors for a total of 452 Junior Members. Ninety-one point nine percent (91.9%) of chapters are accessing e-Membership, with nine chapters showing no access in 180 days.

The Historian received four Member Marker Report forms for DAR member grave markers and one notification of a rededication grave marking ceremony for a Revolutionary War soldier. Mrs. Miller encouraged Chapters to send in nominations for the Outstanding Teacher of American History Contest, with a postmarked deadline of December 1.

The Librarian reported that 14 books were donated to the NSDAR Library in honor of the State Regent and seven book credits have been donated by six chapters. While at Continental Congress Mrs. Osborne visited the DAR Library staff, presenting them with 150 Georgia bookplates. The staff continues to work with the IT Department to develop PDF versions of all state bookplates that can be printed onto adhesive paper. When completed, this will eliminate the need for the states to provide bookplates in the future. Mrs. Osborne ordered 500 bookplates for \$75 from Litho Press Printers in Macon. The bookplates have been repackaged with 5 for \$1. Year to date, a total of six packages have been sold. Mrs. Osborne contacted the State Chairmen assigned to her workshop session to encourage participation.

The Curator reported that the property of the Georgia State Society is accounted for and in good condition.

Ms. Goodwin announced that Junior Member events would be held during State Board of Management and State Conference, with details posted on the Georgia Web Site.

The State Parliamentarian has to date received the bylaws of 83 Georgia chapters, responding with suggestions designed to bring bylaws into compliance with the National Society and the Georgia State Society. Twelve chapters have already sent their revised bylaws while others will bring their bylaws into compliance when the

new chapter year begins in September. Most recently, Mrs. West received the bylaws and Standing Rules of the Suwanee Creek Chapter, which will hold its organizational meeting in October 8, 2011. Mrs. West continues to answer chapter inquiries and responds in a timely manner to each question. Mrs. West reminded members that the 11th Edition of Roberts Rules of Order will appear in stores in September 2011 and the new version of the DAR Handbook and National Bylaws will be available through the DAR Store in October 2011.

Under new business, the State Regent moved that "a \$1,000 contribution be made in honor of Mary Ann T. Wright, President General, to be given to the President General's Project, with monies to be taken from the GSS State Dues Unallocated Fund." Adopted.

Mrs. Lingelbach suggested that contributions to the President General's Project be included in the State Budget.

There being no further business, Melodye Brown, State Chaplain, gave the Benediction. The meeting was adjourned at 5:25 p.m.

The State Regent gave a brief summary of the business conducted in the Finance, Bylaws and Resolutions Committees held earlier in the day. Mrs. Baldwin circulated a sign up sheet for service on Congress Committees and asked that the names of those interested in serving as either State or Congress Pages be submitted to her or to the State Page Chairman. She announced that the Chapter Bazaar would again be held at State Conference and is scheduled for Friday, April 29, 2012 from 8 to 4 p.m., and will be closed for the Memorial Service. Table rental is \$30 for a whole table and \$20 for half a table.

The State First Vice Regent announced that plans have been finalized for the Georgia Luncheon at Continental Congress and the contract has been signed. Tickets will be available for sale at State Conference.

The State Second Vice Regent reported she attended the Chestatee River Chapter's "Dine with the Daughters" picnic, attended Constitution Week luncheon, and attended the organizing meeting of the Suwanee Creek Chapter where she installed the chapter officers. She expressed gratitude for the overwhelming support of the Georgia Daughters in support of the collections of formal attire, snack food, clinic supplies and school supplies for the DAR Schools. She reported on her attendance at the Tamassee DAR School Founders Day and Kate Duncan Smith

DAR School Dedication Day where she also participated in the combined Finance, Endowment and Advisory Committee Meeting.

The State Chaplain reported the deaths of 54 members since state conference, which included the death of Honorary State Regent Evelyn Waite, and State Chairman of State Regent's Projects Beth DeLorme. The State Corresponding Secretary reported that the Georgia State Society Master Questionnaire 2011-2012 pages have been coordinated with the appropriate officers and chairs and uploaded onto the GSS members' website. She acknowledged the hard work and expertise of VIS Chairman Amy Lawson, GSS eMQ Chair, Teresa Floyd and VIS Vice Chair Jenny Jacoby which have made this technological advance possible.

The State Organizing Secretary reported that a new chapter has been approved since the last Board of Management Meeting and is being formed in District 1.

The State Treasurer gave the total assets of the Georgia State Society as \$235,772.85, total Meadow Garden assets as \$690,492.92. The audit has been completed.

The State Registrar reported current membership at 7,291 as of October 27, 2011. William Witcher Chapter has lost 16 members and may disband in the near future. She also reported that we have experienced a larger than usual number of resignations which is attributed to financial reasons.

The State Historian stated the requirement for chapters to send in nominations for the Outstanding Teacher of American History Contest, the deadline is a postmark date of December 1, 2011.

The State Librarian reported that fourteen books were donated to the NSDAR Library in honor of the State Regent and that eight additional books have been donated by seven chapters and individuals. A total of 35 bookplates have been sold this year.

The State Curator reported that all state property is accounted for and in good condition.

The State Parliamentarian reported all parliamentary matters are in good order. As State Conference chairman she reported that a new form had been developed and would be used for meal reservations for state conference and will be included in the State Regent's Call to Conference.

The State Regent announced the next Executive Committee meeting would be Wednesday, May 2, 2012.

That amount included \$4,600 to complete the KDS DAR School classroom project, \$5,000 for DAR Scholarships at KDS and \$2,000 to Hindman Settlement School in memory of Mike Mullins. Chapters donated 14,000 pounds of thrift and 49,977 labels. The Oliver Morton Chapter donated over 9,000 labels and seven chapters each donated over 1,000 labels. Hightower Awards will be presented to 67 chapters. Mrs. Fischer stated that her full report would be given at the School / Youth Luncheon. A total of 24 reservations have been received for the School Supper at Continental Congress, and with six more reservations the Georgia State Society will have three "Gold Balloon" tables.

The Chaplain reported that condolences were sent on the passing of Centennial President General Marie Yochim. Aside from the carnations which will be delivered on the morning of the service, everything is prepared for the memorial service on Thursday, May 3, 2012. The Georgia State Society will be remembering 117 Georgia Daughters, including Past State Regent Evelyn Sears Waite. Ms. Brown thanked Charlotte Christian for handling arrangements for the Page Reunion so that she could focus on the memorial service and Brenda Jessel for agreeing to give the Blessing at the Executive Breakfast tomorrow.

The Recording Secretary reported the 2010-2011 Proceedings had been published and is being distributed at this conference and for the first time is posted on the State Web Site. Mrs. Simonds expressed her appreciation to Amy Lawson, VIS Chairman, for her invaluable assistance in posting the State motion card and Proceedings on the State Web Site. Mrs. Simonds moved "that with the posting of the 2010-2011 State Proceedings on the Georgia Members' Web Site, with the exclusion of all financial statements, the Executive Board recommend that all

future Proceedings be made available to members in a PDF format on the Georgia Members' Web Site at the time of each book's publication."

Mrs. Lingelbach questioned if the Proceedings would continue to be printed. Mrs. Baldwin assured everyone that the book would still be published and distributed according to the bylaws. Mrs. Baldwin stated that having the Proceedings online is an added benefit to the membership and that she herself had found it an advantage to her while traveling. Mrs. Baldwin commented she had received positive input during the Regents' Forums, and Mrs. Simonds had agreed that she had also received comments from members supporting the online posting. Mrs. Baldwin gave a second reading of the motion. **Adopted**.

Mrs. Simonds went on to report that the cost to print each Proceedings book is \$21.48 but is sold for \$20.00, raising the possibility of a price increase. Ms. Brown commented that the majority of the books are given free to officers, chairmen and chapter regents, and that very few are actually sold, making the benefit of a price increase negligible. Mrs. Baldwin suggested that in the future orders could be taken for the book and the book could also be made available as a CD.

Mrs. Simonds stated the flash drives containing past administrations' Proceedings and the 2010-2011 Proceedings will be given to the next State Recording Secretary at this conference. Work continues on the 2011-2012 Proceedings, which will be distributed at the 2012 State Board of Management. Mrs. Simonds requested permission to order the printing of motion cards by Litho Press in Macon to replenish the nearly depleted stock. Mrs. Baldwin agreed to the request. Mrs. Simonds extended her appreciation to Brenda Jessel for printing the Proceedings labels, Mrs. Lingelbach for taking the minutes at State Board of Management in her absence, and Mrs. Baldwin for her support and friendship.

The Corresponding Secretary reported 500 copies of the 114th Georgia State Conference program were available for Conference attendees. Georgia chapters used the e-Master Questionnaire for National as well as for Georgia State reporting. Copying and postage savings through electronics is incalculable and time saved invaluable. Those few who do not receive email do continue to receive mailings as requested. The *Parliamentary Procedure, Protocol and Georgia Traditions* booklet has been updated and reprinted and is available at State Conference for \$5.00 at the Literature table. Mrs. Baldwin is presenting a copy to each chapter regent. The enthusiastic response to the booklet might require a second printing. Mrs. Jessel expressed her appreciation to Shelby Whitson, Barbara Chastain and Becky West for their invaluable assistance in proofing the booklet. Mrs. Jessel stated that she has received chapter officer report forms and will be sending them to the next Corresponding Secretary for input into the 2012-2013 State Directory.

The Organizing Secretary announced that a new chapter had been organized, the Old Noonday Chapter, which will be located in the Fulton / Cobb County area. The chapter will be approved at the National Board of Management Meeting on June 25, 2012, and will hold an informal organizational meeting on that date. A formal meeting will be held in September. Ms. Christian reported that the Metter and the Mineral Springs Chapters had fallen below the required number of members and have been granted a one-year grace period to raise their membership. The Oothcaloga and William Witcher Chapters are disbanding and will be officially disbanded as of the National Board of Management Meeting on June 25, 2012. Lynn Brackey has been granted an exception to the six-year limit to serve as regent and will continue for another term as the Sandy Springs Chapter Regent.

The Treasurer deferred the financial reports until the business session. Mrs. Cannestra stated she had disposed of three containers of records and was in the

process of setting up accounts for the new administration and preparing the books for audit.

The Registrar reported the State Society had 7,248 members as of January 1, 2012, and 7,327 as of May 1, 2012. Last year there was a net gain of 170 members. Since January 1, 2012, the State Society had 205 new members including 53 new Juniors, a net gain of 99 members since the first of the year. Reports of 86 chapters were received. The percentage of chapters utilizing e-Membership to report changes is 98.2 percent and most are completing applications and conducting research online.

The Historian also deferred her report until the business session. Mrs. Miller stated she would present the Outstanding Teacher of American History Award at the Junior Appreciation Banquet. She added that since the recipient could not attend, sponsoring chapter member Betty Samaras would be accepting the award on the recipient's behalf.

The Librarian reported a total of 63 books were donated this year to the DAR Library by 15 chapters and 34 individuals. Of the 63 books donated, 14 books were donated in honor of the State Regent.

The Curator reported the property of the Georgia State Society is accounted for and in good condition. The property is now residing in Augusta to be turned over to the next Curator.

The State Parliamentarian deferred her report until the business session.

Mrs. Simonds presented Mrs. Baldwin with the motion card stating that the Executive Board had recommended her election as Honorary State Regent. Mrs. Baldwin expressed her sincere appreciation for the honor.

The minutes of the August 18, 2011, and the October 28, 2011, Executive Committee Meetings were previously provided to the State Officers and State Parliamentarian by email. There being no further corrections, the minutes were **approved** as printed.

On behalf of the Executive Board, Mrs. Lingelbach presented gifts to the State Regent, in appreciation of her service to the Georgia State Society, her leadership and the many accomplishments during her administration. Mrs. Baldwin expressed her gratitude for the gifts and thanked the State Officers for their support during the past two years.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 5:36 p.m.

State Board of Management Meeting October 29, 2011

The State Board of Management of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, met on October 29, 2011, at the Macon Marriott City Center Hotel, in Macon, with the State Regent, Sally McGlaun Baldwin presiding and State First Vice Regent, Virginia Grace Lingelbach serving as Recording Secretary Pro Tem.

The meeting was called to order at 9:00 a.m. The colors were presented by the Rutland High School ROTC Color Guard. The invocation was given by Melodye G. Brown, State Chaplain. The Pledge to the Flag of the United States of America was recited in unison. The first verse of the National Anthem was led by Catherine "Cathy" Derst Miller, State Historian. The American's Creed was led by Brenda Davison Jessel, State Corresponding Secretary. The Pledge to the Georgia Flag was led by Charlotte Josephine Christian, State Organizing Secretary. The colors were retired.

The State Regent presented the Coordinator of Districts, Mary Grace "M.G." Whittle who in turn presented the following District Directors: District 1, Phyllis Fox Lawson; District 2, Rebecca "Becky" Miller Rostron; District 3, Dr. Louise Greene Henry; and District 4, Ann Scott Williams. Time Keepers, Frieda Clark Gibby, State Chairman, and Jean Wallace Brown were presented.

The State Parliamentarian, Becky West, read Article VIII, Section 1, 3, 4, 5 of the State Bylaws pertaining to the State Board of Management.

The State Regent introduced Audrey Struble Litts, Chairman, Credentials, who gave the **first credentials report**: 69 voting members registered representing 71 chapters. In attendance were: 11 State Officers, 2 National Officers, 8 Honorary State Regents, 50 Chapter Regents. Also present were: 1 State Parliamentarian, 6 National Chairmen, 9 National Vice Chairmen, 32 State Chairmen, 24 State Vice Chairmen, 43 Chapter members and 1 Guest. Without duplication 141 Georgia Daughters representing 71 Chapters were in attendance. Including the one guest, the total registration for the 2011 State Board of Management was 142. Mrs. Litts **moved the adoption of the first Credentials report. Adopted.** A quorum was established.

The **State Regent** reported on information she received at the National Board of Management Meeting. Mrs. Baldwin circulated thank you notes received from Kate Duncan Smith (KDS) DAR School for clinic supplies donated by the Georgia Daughters. She commented on the dedication of the classroom in the new building addition at KDS which is sponsored by the Georgia State Society and proudly displayed the red ribbon used at the official opening and dedication of the new classroom. Mrs. Baldwin announced the new DAR Handbook and National Bylaws and the NSDAR Directory have been published and may be ordered from the DAR Store in Washington, D.C. The National membership information was given by the State Regent as follows: from June 24 to October 5, 2011 – 931 deceased; 1,163 resignations, 300 reinstatements, one chapter disbanded, one organizing regent was appointed, one chapter confirmed. Mrs. Baldwin circulated a sign up form for those wishing to serve on a Congress committee or serve as a Page during Continental Congress.

The **State First Vice Regent**, Mrs. Lingelbach, reported that plans have been finalized for the Georgia Luncheon at the 121st Continental Congress. The event is scheduled for Friday, June 29, 2012, at the J. W, Marriott Hotel. As Trustee and Recording Secretary of the Meadow Garden Board, she stated that all meetings were attended and minutes transcribed and disseminated in a timely manner. Mrs. Lingelbach announced that she would accompany the President General on her visit to the overseas units and would have the opportunity to visit wounded soldiers at the Landstuhl Regional Hospital in Germany on Veterans Day.

The **State Second Vice Regent**, Bea Fischer, announced that a new DAR Schools Booklet is available and may be ordered free from the DAR Store. Plans are underway for the Schools/Youth Luncheon at the Georgia State Conference on Friday, May 4, 2012. Mrs. Fischer recognized the following members of the DAR School Committee: Sharlene Griffin Cochran, Phyllis Garner Davis, Joan Phillips Millar, Gena Moorehead, Lisa C. Pingel, and Janet Stovall Sherling.

The **State Chaplain**, Melodye Brown, stated 54 deaths of Georgia Daughters have been reported since State Conference, which includes the passing of our beloved Honorary State Regent Evelyn Waite, who died shortly after her 101st birthday, Past State Registrar Marilyn Herndon Vance and the tragic and untimely deaths of State Chairman of State Regent's Projects Beth Watts DeLorme and Nathaniel Abney Chapter Regent Dale Paulk Couey. Condolence notes have been sent to family members whenever the names of next of kin have been provided. Birthday greetings have been sent on behalf of the Georgia State Society to our 180 known members age 90 and above. Ms. Brown stated it was her honor to represent the Georgia State Regent at Tamassee DAR School Founders Day.

The **State Corresponding Secretary**, Brenda Jessel, reported that the Georgia State Society Master Questionnaire (MQ) 2011-2012 pages have been coordinated with appropriate officers and chairs, uploaded onto the GSS Members website for chapters to download and complete on writable individual forms. Chapter regents have been asked to download the NSDAR Master Questionnaire from the DAR members' only website and to direct questions pertaining to VIS GSS eMQ to either the state Corresponding Secretary or to VIS Vice Chairman Teresa Meadows Floyd. Deadline for National and Georgia Master Questionnaires to the appropriate State Officers, State Chairmen, and to the State Corresponding Secretary is on or before February 1, 2012. Mrs. Jessel thanked VIS Chairman Amy Lawson, VIS Vice Chairman - GSS eMQ chairman, Teresa Floyd and VIS Vice Chairman — Webmaster GSSDAR Private Site, Jennifer "Jenny" B. Jacoby for making these many technological advances possible. She further announced that Certificates of Award and Appreciation and State Directories are available for sale.

The **State Organizing Secretary**, Charlotte Christian, reported that a third new chapter is being organized since the inception of this Administration and it will be located in District 1.

The **State Treasurer**, Dianne Cannestra, gave the following summary of accounts for the Georgia State Society as of September 30, 2011: Certificates of Deposit \$120,386.56, Checking \$64,352.17, Money Market Account \$49,834.12, Hotel Deposits \$1,200; making total assets of \$235,772.85. The Meadow Garden Accounts as of September 30, 2011 were summarized as follows: Certificates of deposit \$350,000.00, Checking \$26,052.46, Money Market Accounts \$128,962.73, Petty Cash \$100.00, Total Fixed Assets \$185,377.73, Total Assets \$690,492.92. Complete financial reports will be published in the Proceedings. **Finance Chairman**, Shelby Whitson, reported the Finance Committee met to prepare the 2012-2013 budget which will be published in the "Call to Conference" letter and will be presented for vote at State Conference.

The **State Registrar**, Susan Lemesis, presented national statistics received from NSDAR as follows: Applications received 3,409 with 2,872 having been verified, 567 new Junior members, 1,450 supplementals 1,099 having been verified, supplementals pending 4,115. Total number of papers verified 3,971, 160 new ancestors verified, last DAR number issued 898407. Georgia statistics are as follows: Georgia State Society Membership as of this month is 7,291 and

Fielding Lewis is now the largest chapter in Georgia with 225 members. Martha Stewart Bulloch is the second largest chapter with 217 members. The smallest chapter is Mineral Springs with 11 members.

The **State Historian**, Cathy Miller, encouraged chapters to send in nominations for the Outstanding Teacher of American History contest. The deadline is a postmark date of no later than December 1, 2011. One original and four copies are required.

The **State Librarian**, Paula Osborne, reported that the Georgia State Society has 22 book credits from seven chapters and the Georgia State Society as of September 30, 2011. A total of 35 bookplates have been sold. Chapters are encouraged to donate genealogy books to the DAR Library in Washington. Members are encouraged to make monetary donations to Friends of the DAR Library or Friends of Seimes Technology Center.

The State Curator, Billie Goodwin, filed her report.

The **State Parliamentarian**, Becky West, reminded Chapter Regents to send updated copies of chapter bylaws to her as soon as possible.

Mrs. Baldwin presented the Coordinator of Districts, "M. G." Whittle and the District Directors who gave information relative to the State Conference. Mrs. Whittle announced the dates of the conference are May 2-5, 2012, starting on Wednesday and ending on Saturday. Regent's Night has been renamed Chapter Appreciation Night in order to acknowledge the accomplishments of all chapter members. In the absence of the Chapter Regent, a member of the chapter may participate in the processional and be recognized. Additional information will be published in the State Regent's letter.

District 1 Director, Phyllis Lawson reminded the Daughters that she still has award certificates to be picked up. **District 2 Director,** Becky Rostron announced the organization of the new Suwanee Creek Chapter, Karen Buck Sokol Regent. Colonel John McIntosh Chapter celebrated their 90th anniversary this month and Oliver Morton Chapter will be celebrating their 90th anniversary in February 2012. The State Regent's visits were conducted during the week of September 11th. **District 3 Director,** Dr. Louise Greene Henry reported the grateful cooperation of all District 3 chapters in hosting events and working together for commemorative celebrations and for their support to Meadow Garden. Dr. Henry encouraged all chapter regents to begin work on the Master Questionnaire as early as possible and for chapter nominating committees to consider the importance of technology when selecting candidates for certain positions. **District 4 Director,** Ann Scott Williams announced that District 4 chapters strongly support Veterans' Day and also look forward to the visits of the State Regent.

The reports of the State Chairmen of NATIONAL COMMITTEES and NATIONAL SPECIAL COMMITTEES were presented: The following Chairmen reported and gave detailed instructions: Chapter Achievement, Eleanor Brinson Quigley conducted a review of and gave detailed instructions on completion of the chapter achievement form and identified electronic sources of information for further guidance. She further stressed the need for making certain contributions directly to the National Development Office.

Chapter Development and Revitalization, Julia "Julie" Brooks Prince offered her assistance to chapters needing help or advice and encouraged all chapters to host a workshop periodically to educate their members and possibly gain the interest of new prospective members. Mrs. Prince stressed the importance of using the National Members Website to learn of innovative ways to strengthen chapters.

DAR Service for Veterans Teresa Jackson Roby, Vice Chairman, Veterans History Project reported on the three contests available under this Committee. She

stated that the state veterans project "Adopt a Veteran" has been very successful and chapters have found many unique ways to say "thank you" and express their gratitude to our veterans. Awards to chapters participating in this project will be presented at State Conference. American Heritage, Marcelaine "Marcie" Crockett Fletcher announced the national theme and guidelines and helpful tips for those entering the various contests. She stated that additional information could be found online or in the National Information Packet (NIP). She also noted that several new categories had been added. Pins are now available for purchase from Hamilton Jewelers for first, second and third place winners. Constitution Week, Joyce Patton expressed her pleasure at having the National Chairman, Connie Grund, in attendance at the Georgia Constitution luncheon celebration and noted that Mrs. Grund disseminated several Constitution Week posters to those in attendance. She gave a reminder for timely and thorough submission of reports to her. Fact sheets were available for those not receiving one at workshops and she issued a reminder to start preparations now for next years celebration. Volunteer Genealogy, Dee Redkevitch gave detailed information on electronic preparation of application papers. She stated that online classes have replaced the classes previously held in Washington and that "Volunteer Genie" submissions must include more detailed information which is to be provided on the Master Questionnaire. Junior Membership, Junior Shoppe, Mary Ann Hawthorne stated the Junior Shoppe has a new supply of cupcake pins and many other lovely items for sale. A catalogue of junior items has been created and placed online which will enable ordering by mail. Mrs. Hawthorne discussed the Outstanding Junior Contest, Junior Appreciation night at state conference as well as other ways to support Junior membership.

Following a brief recess, Mrs. Baldwin continued with the reports of the State Chairmen of STATE COMMITTEES. Meadow Garden, Margaret Poole Cagle reported the College Hill Chapter is still providing the luncheons with tours of the house. Susan Jackson, House Manager may be called to schedule a tour. Historic Augusta will not do a Christmas tour of historic places this year. All chapters participating in "Georgia on My Mind" are reminded to report that information. Meadow Garden, Docents, Billie Gardner Hunter expressed thanks to the more than 50 ladies who visited Meadow Garden last year and participated in the docent class. Information will be provided about the possibility of a docent class in May. Meadow Garden, Gift Shop, Phyllis Lawson recognized Edwina Beall for her extraordinary efforts in promoting sales in support of the Meadow Garden Gift Shop. She stated that donations to the Meadow Garden Gift Shop meet one of the State Honor Roll requirements and pre-approved donations will be accepted until February 29, 2012. Meadow Garden, Patron, Jane Joyner Hampton announced that 71 chapters have achieved Patron status thus far and she expressed her appreciation to those chapters. She encouraged all chapters and individuals to make donations.

Mrs. Baldwin continued with reports of Chairmen of **STATE STANDING COMMITTEES. Bylaws**, Lanette Reid reported the Bylaws committee met the previous day for a very productive meeting. Proposed amendments to the Bylaws will be published in the State Regent's Call to Conference. Mrs. Reid noted that one of the most important changes would be the inclusion of the district and district director concept being officially addressed in the Bylaws.

Resolutions, Laura Reid stated that anyone wishing to submit a Resolution for consideration should refer to the instructions contained in the Items of Information in the Proceedings. Ms. Reid read these instructions to the assembly and on behalf of the committee she presented the proposed Resolutions. The resolutions are printed in their entirety at the conclusion of the State Conference minutes.

Mrs. Baldwin continued with the State Chairmen of NATIONAL COMMITTEES. American Indians, Patricia "Pat" Pattillo Mercer reported that November is American Indian Heritage month and she encouraged all to recognize the cultural value and contributions of Native Americans and to pay special attention to changes in this category when completing report form. Community Service Awards, Helen Robertson Powell reported the purpose of this committee is to recognize volunteers at the local level. She explained the process involved in obtaining approval at state, district and national levels and the criteria for judging submissions. DAR Good Citizens, JoAn Johnson Chewning explained the process for participating in this program and the requirement to contact a public or private high school and ask them to select one outstanding member of the senior class to be their DAR Good Citizen. Mrs. Chewning stated she had the award materials available for sale at this meeting. DAR Museum, Therry Nash Deal expressed thanks to the chapters for their report submissions last year which resulted in Georgia receiving the Southeast Division first place award. There will be a meeting of Georgia Daughters at Continental Congress on Thursday morning at 8:00 a.m. in the Peter Tondee Tavern. All are encouraged to attend. She stressed the need to work with the chapter treasurer when completing the Master Questionnaire as well as in the preparation of narrative reports. Lineage Research, Marguerite McEntee Dyal reported significant changes to this committee in building a completely new Lineage Research Look Up Board (LRLB) system, details of which will be publicized when operational. Mrs. Dyal reported on several new projects as follows: volunteers will be assigned to work on select lines that have previously been closed due to lack of supporting documentation, and that Lineage Research is now on Facebook. Every DAR members is welcome to join at www.facebook.com/lineageresearch.nsdar. She encouraged all chapters to have at least one workshop a year to assist in completion of papers. Commemorative Events, Betty Brown Harrah gave a reminder of significant dates in history which should be recognized by commemorative services, most significant were the 70th anniversary of the bombing of Pearl Harbor and the 200th anniversary of the War of 1812. DAR Genealogy Preservation, Scarlette Murphy Moyer explained the goal of this committee is to provide genealogical information through data bases thereby significantly enhancing the application process. A new project has been added which is the supporting documentation project with more than six million items of data provided and available online. DAR Project Patriot, Elizabeth "Betty" Garlington Christy stated that this is the official DAR committee that supports military service personnel currently involved in conflict and that veterans activities should not be reported on the Master Questionnaire under this committee. Georgia placed first last year in contributions to Project Patriot and she encouraged chapters to strive for first place again this year. Protocol, Barbara Chastain thanked the Daughters for their questions and calls and issued a reminder for the proper wearing of Insignia. She encouraged a warm welcome be extended to all new and prospective chapter members. **President General's Project**, Carol Goff Russell

explained the ten year plan for the renovation/restoration of the NSDAR building complex in Washington and explained the \$2.00 per year per member donation program which supports this initiative. She further explained the contribution levels for Benefactor and Donor Wall recognition. **Special Projects Grants**, Vicki Lancaster Cobb explained this new committee and issued a reminder that the grants are available only during the Wright Administration. Applications must be submitted by February 1, 2012 or 2013. Georgia received one grant this year sponsored by the General Daniel Stewart Chapter. Further information and instructions are contained in the Chapter Information Packet (CIP) and on the member's website. **Women's**

National Committee Reports

AMERICAN HERITAGE - Marcelaine Crockett Fletcher

Forty-two Georgia chapters reported having programs on American Heritage as defined by this committee, and 15 chapters reported members' participation in various contest categories. Two chapters reported having an approved Women in the Arts Recognition Award recipient. They are: Lynda Holmes, nominated by the Colonel William Candler Chapter, and Kathryn Fincher, nominated by the William Day Chapter. Vice Chairmen Audrey Knight, Donna Owens, and Eloise Wolfersteig are commended for their outstanding support of this committee. The 2012 Georgia winners of Fiber Arts categories are listed in the Awards section of the Proceedings. The First Place entries were forwarded to the Southeast Region for judging. Other American Heritage category winners from Georgia will be announced at Continental Congress and will be listed in the Congress Awards section of the Proceedings. This committee is honored to serve the State Regent and the Georgia State Society.

AMERICAN HISTORY COMMITTEE – Martha W. Dykes

Reports were received from 100 chapters. Chapters and individual members presented 542 American History programs, with 111 programs focusing on outstanding American women. The American History Essay Contest was sponsored in 195 schools, with 4,660 students in grades five through eight participating. Chapters awarded 2,054 Certificates of Participation, 202 Certificates of Award, and 99 bronze medals. The Christopher Columbus Essay Contest was sponsored in 31 schools, with 137 students participating. Chapters awarded 73 Certificates of Participation. Chapters also presented 129 certificates, 51 bronze medals and five silver medals for Outstanding Work in American History. Chapters arranged 214 American History displays in schools and/or public places and had 584 "spot" announcements. Three chapters were recognized for Outstanding Chapter Projects: The Fort Frederica members are re-enactors in local schools, Augusta members had several displays at various schools, and Oglethorpe members lobbied for the entire month of February to be "Georgia Month". Vice Chairmen Sharon Sowders, Fran Passmore, Lisa Rozier, and Judy Smith are commended for their excellent work in support of this committee and the chapters in their respective districts. This committee is privileged to serve the State Regent and the Georgia State Society.

AMERICAN INDIANS - Patricia Patillo Mercer

Georgia Daughters were most active in activities supporting the American Indian Projects. Fifty-five chapters had special programs and 70 chapters reported a total of 435 Indian Minutes. Seventeen chapters issued 27 proclamations. The MQ reported over \$2,000 for the American Indian Scholarship Fund and \$1,055.56 donated to the Indian Youth Summer Camp Program. Twenty-one chapters reported special events and activities and 2,957 Campbell Soup Labels were sent to Bacone College.

AMERICANISM - Rachel Cole Colbert

One hundred and two Chapters used the eMQ, with 86 Chapters reporting Americanism activities. 17 Chapters participated in 29 Naturalization Ceremonies/Receptions. 150 members from 28 Chapters referred to the DAR Manual on Citizenship. Distribution of Patriotic materials was as follows: 4181 U.S. Flags by 51 Chapters; 2285 Flag pins by 26 Chapters; 1477 Flag bookmarks by 19 Chapters; 4601 copies of the Pledge of Allegiance by 42 Chapters; and 8098 copies of the

American's Creed by 40 Chapters. Other Patriotic activities were reported by 35 Chapters. These activities included participating in parades, placing of wreaths, presentation of Flags, hosting Flag Day and Constitution Week luncheons, presenting programs on the American Flag and Patriot's Day, 9/11 programs and activities, distributing copies of the DAR Manual for Citizenship, presenting copies of the Constitution and the Preamble, sponsoring dramas and musicals, Veteran's Day programs, and making gift bags for naturalized citizens and for veterans. Two chapters had outstanding participation in the distribution of Patriotic materials--Earl of Camden and General Daniel Newnan. Four Chapters submitted recommendations for Medal of Honor awards; two have been approved by National-- James Waldrop Chapter presented the DAR Medal of Honor to Major General Theodore Franklin Mallory III of Fayetteville; John Benning Chapter sponsored Colonel Hoyt Holland of Moultrie for the DAR Medal of Honor, which will be presented to him at the 2012 State Conference.

CHAPTER ACHIEVEMENT AWARD – Eleanor Brinson Quigley

Final Report: 100% (111) Georgia Chapters submitted Chapter Achievement Award (CAA) Reports. The electronic format, eCAA, came on-line January 3, 2012. Chapters were informed with accompanying instructions via email and GSSDAR Website. Regents submitting paper copies were tutored, then entered their data electronically. The last three days of January were spent calling 26 chapters which had not completed their eCAA. This Chairman enjoyed talking to Georgia Regents and helping them with the new eCAA. All active GA Chapters are on-line with the eCAA. Two disbanding Chapters submitted only paper copies. Six Chapters scored over 1000 points: Andrew McBride, Atlanta, Fielding Lewis, Martha Stewart Bullock, Philadelphia Winn, and Xavier. Eighty-six Chapters achieved Level One; Fourteen Chapters, Level Two; Six Chapters, Level Three. Chapter scoring most points in Georgia: newly organized, Andrew McBride. COMMUNITY SERVICE – Helen Robertson Powell

Georgia Daughters honored 24 outstanding men and women with DAR Community Service Awards for "voluntary achievements in cultural, educational, humanitarian, patriotic, historical and citizenship endeavors, or in environmental conservation." On the state level, First Place winner was Kathleen Kirk Swahn honored by Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter for volunteer efforts with The Drake House, a residential assessment center for homeless women and their minor children in North Fulton County. Second Place was a Group Award sponsored by James Waldrop Chapter recognizing Doug Higgins, Dave Clark and Craig Wiley as the founders of Square Foot Ministry, a Christian based home repair and construction ministry located in Fayette County. Third Place was a Group Award sponsored by General Daniel Stewart Chapter honoring five individuals —Wayne Chapman, William Loudermilk,

Charles and Nelle Shelton, and Terre Moody Walker--for leadership, organization, research, renovation, restoration and more for the Perry Area Historical Museum in Houston County. CONSERVATION - Melinda J. Wade

One Hundred twelve chapters reported completing 143 projects with 44 conservation programs presented at chapter meetings. Three hundred seventy-one "Conservation Minutes" were reported at chapter meetings and 249 chapter members reported having attended either Earth Day or Arbor Day activities. Recycling / composting and water conservation are very dear subjects to our members. Two thousand six hundred and ninety-two members report participating in composting and recycling activities while 1,137 members participate in the use of rain barrels or other water conservation efforts. Over 100 members drive hybrid vehicles (104 reported); 828 indicated that they work toward controlling phantom electricity and those swirly compact fluorescent bulbs are now being used by 2,468 of our members.

CONSTITUTION WEEK – Joyce Ball Patton

State Regent Sally Baldwin, Vice-Chairman Trudy Alexander, Lisa Simpson and I met with Governor Sonny Perdue where he signed the 2011 Constitution Week Proclamation. The photograph and Proclamation was framed and given to our State Regent for her memory wall. The keynote speaker was Bob Barr former House of Representative member and a Constitution Scholar. Mr. Barr answered questions and signed autographs and enjoyed the Georgia Daughters and guest. The second event on September 17, Constitution Day was an afternoon with the Atlanta Braves and the New York Mets who celebrated "We The People" night. A wonderful fun filled day to celebrate Constitution Day and start off the week's activities for the Georgia Daughters. Events all over the State Continued with this recap: 182 Proclamations received, 231 Bell Ringing Events, 347 Constitution Week Events, 6433 Constitution Week Kits distributed, 292 Classes adopted, 717 Articles in Print Media, 425 Constitution Week Displays, 4874 Square Feet of Displays, 119,976 Broadcast Minutes, 93 Reciting the Preamble or Constitution Week Sidelights. With these numbers it is evident that the Georgia Daughters celebrated Constitution Week all over the state of Georgia.

DAR GOOD CITIZENS - Jo An Johnson Chewning

DAR Good Citizens exemplify the qualities of dependability, service, leadership, and patriotism. Eligible students are seniors who attend accredited high schools. Seventy-six Georgia chapters contacted 351 high schools; 32 schools were new participants. DAR Good Citizens pins, certificates, and wallet cards were given to 280 seniors, and special events were held by chapters to celebrate their winners. Gifts by chapters: \$12,830.71. Andrew McBride, Augusta, Colonel William Candler, Martha Stewart Bulloch, Oglethorpe, Savannah, and William Day chapters sponsored 10 or more schools. Pulaski Chapter made the largest monetary award. District winners received \$100 checks: 1- Mary Allyson Chastain (Fielding Lewis); 2- Sally Ann Jones (Old Unicoi Trail); 3- Isabella Rael Connor (Nathaniel Abney); 4- James Harrison Hill Thomas (Peter Early). Georgia State Winner Mary Allyson Chastain (Fielding Lewis) will receive a framed state winner's certificate, pin, and check for \$250.00. This

chairman thanks our Georgia State Regent, Sally Baldwin; district vice chairmen Mae Ora O'Shields, Betty Lynam, Mary Jane Espinosa, and Kitty Thompkins; participating chapter chairmen; and all 78 Georgia chapters that honored outstanding Georgia students.

DAR MAGAZINE – Marilyn Moulton Wright

One hundred eleven chapters submitted DAR Magazine reports. Seventy-three chapters received Chapter Achievement Award credit by participating in the Georgia co-op ad which will allow us to have a one page memorial for Evelyn Waite in the 2012 January/February issue and 4 pages in the 2012 November/December issue. The 2011 ad honored our Georgia Daughters serving the National Society, State Officers, Chapter Regents, District Directors, new chapter Andrew McBride, State Chairmen, State Conference Pages and State Outstanding Junior. Sixteen chapters submitted articles to *With the Chapters*. One hundred chapter regents are magazine subscribers. Fifty-two chapters met the Chapter Achievement Award requirement for subscriptions of 30% of members. 30.6% of Georgia Daughters subscribe to the magazine. Ninety-two reporting chapters read the President General's message from the Daughters Newsletter at meetings. The Old Herod had the highest percentage of subscriptions at 63%.

DAR MUSEUM – Therry Nash Deal

Reports received from 102 (93%) chapters with some museum participation in 36% of our chapters. Georgia Room received \$795 and national projects \$1,201 for a total of \$1,986. Chapters had 19 programs on the DAR Museum. Three chapters, Atlanta, Nancy Hart, and Philadelphia Winn received the Liberty Girl Award for a second time. Several chapters had innovative ideas which have been sent with the national report: Atlanta, James Stewart, John Benson, Oglethorpe, Philadelphia Winn. Martha Wright reports 13 active Correspondent Docents; four are CDiT. One is new CDiT. Six of our CD worked in the Georgia Room during last Congress. Ann Murphey Whipple, leader for our Peter Tondee Room reports 35 people enjoyed the room during Congress at which time we teased our "fan lady" State Regent with a caricature portrait and gave attendees a recipe for potent Tondee Liberty Punch guaranteed to "fan the flames of liberation". We were privileged to have the National Curator join us. The committee believes over the two year term being in the Georgia Room in Washington has increased for a much wider group of Daughters our pride in this wonderful space and the outstanding collection of artifacts representing our Georgia history; the tavern sign may yet come. What an opportunity to share with our nation this avenue of DAR service. Thank you, chapters which supported this work. Our committee appreciates the opportunity to serve.

DAR SCHOLARSHIP - Tommie Elaine Shattuck

For FY2012 the Georgia State Society NSDAR, with an eMembership of 7,227 members, reports that the College and University Scholarship Fund Balance is \$493,211.28 or \$188.99 more than last year and with \$21,384.36 awarded to 36 recipients. Georgia Daughters are still very generous with reportedly contributing Chapter Scholarship Funds of \$72,151.00 awarded to 48 Georgia students while 19 Georgia students vied for National Society DAR Scholarships. The total reported dollar amount of scholarships Georgia Daughters awarded is still over half a million dollars at a total of \$565,362.28 with 53 recipients, 23 of whom were invited to attend a chapter meeting, and 21 of whom received a certificate. Plus, Georgia Daughters

contributed \$631.00 to the Friends of DAR Scholarships making a reported grand total for FY2012 of \$565,993.28.

DAR SCHOOL - Ida Bea Best Fischer

One hundred and two chapters submitted their Master Questionnaires. Eightv-four chapters submitted Hightower Reports - Sixty-seven chapters earned the Hightower Award. Eighty-one chapters had full school programs or two-minute spots. We sent to schools 49,977 labels and box tops (9,726 from one chapter), 14,906 lbs. of thrift (3,500 from one chapter) and 13,265 other items. Georgia donated \$54,507, (\$16,100 from one chapter) to schools, \$3,406 to Friends of DAR Schools and \$1,025 from sales of School Pins for a total of \$58,938. The "Under \$5.00" projects continued. We sent School supplies to Hindman Settlement School, medical items to Kate Duncan Smith DAR School Clinic, school snacks to Tamassee DAR School. 675 lbs. of thrift was delivered from Workshops and SBM for the "Special Times Boutique". Chapters participated in "My Coke Rewards", "Publix Partners for Education", and "Food Lion MVP Rewards Program". Chapters hosted Christmas parties, sponsored cottages, and outings for the children. One chapter participated in a golf tournament to benefit Tamassee - raising over \$15,000. All Certificates and Cash Awards will be announced at the DAR School/Youth Luncheon. Thank you Georgia daughters for generous donations of your time, talents and resources. Madam State Regent, it has been an honor to serve in this position.

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERANS – Kelly Calabrese Becker

With 102 chapters reporting, there were 89 chapters who served our veterans. Daughters gave their time, talents, resources, gifts and found creative ways to support veterans in VA Medical Centers, nursing homes (local, state, and national), and outpatient clinics. Also, daughters supported our veterans through their participation in various community events at schools, Memorial Day services, Veterans Day ceremonies, parades and other venues. Georgia had 611 adult volunteers who drove 50,246 miles in support of veteran activities and gave 11,222 hours of service. There were 256 youth volunteers who contributed 747 hours. Total cash and non-cash donations were \$94,508. Certificates of Award were presented for most outstanding veteran reports (4 chapters), outstanding veteran activities (18 chapters), most adult volunteer hours (3 chapters), 600 plus volunteer hours (4 chapters), most adult volunteers (3 chapters), outstanding monetary contributions (3 chapters), most youth volunteer hours (3 chapters), most youth volunteers (4 chapters), most miles traveled for veteran activities (3 chapters), outstanding Adopta-Veteran Program (4 chapters), and most interviews for the Veterans History Project (6 chapters). Madam State Regent, it has been an honor to serve you and the Georgia State Society.

VETERANS HISTORY PROJECT – Teresa Jackson Roby

Georgia Daughters continue to interview and record our veterans' valuable histories. There were 9 chapters who participated and recorded 35 histories. Congratulations Daughters! This is a most valuable project and we encourage all chapters to support this project. Thank you, Madam State Regent, for the opportunity to serve the Georgia State Society in this manner.

FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA - Kathleen Ward Hart

Georgia Daughters in 78 chapters participated in paying tribute to the Flag of the United States of America through various projects and activities. Chapters attended Nationalization ceremonies, held Flag Retirement ceremonies and sent cards to our veterans in hospitals and nursing homes. Programs and Flag Etiquette workshops were given by several chapters. Forty four chapters reported involving over 11,819

youth in various Flag activities through schools, churches, scouting and JROTC programs. Fifty six chapters held or participated in 341 flag events. The total number of flags presented by 51 chapters was 9,185. One hundred forty nine certificates were presented to individuals and groups recognizing their efforts in properly displaying the Flag. Thirty five chapters distributed 9,500 DAR Flag Code brochures. Twenty five chapters distributed 9,651 other forms of flag literature. Seventeen Braille flags were distributed. Five chapters excelled in all areas and will receive Certificates of Award at State Conference. These chapters are: Martha Stewart Bulloch, Sandy Springs, Fort Frederica, General Daniel Newnan, and Oglethorpe. Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure serving the Georgia Daughters as State Chairman of the Flag Committee.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS – Sherrin Newsome Willis

Georgia Daughters from five chapters submitted records to GRC for the 2012 reporting period. Five volumes, with a total page count of 1,159, were presented to the NSDAR Library. A copy of each volume was also placed in the Georgia Archives, the Washington Memorial Library and the Georgia Historical Society, for a total count of 4,636 pages. The most pages submitted by membership categories were: Reverend John Anderson Chapter, 0-50 members; John Houstoun Chapter, 50-100 members; Philadelphia Winn Chapter, 100-150 members. Philadelphia Winn Chapter made the largest page count submission. At the time of this report, members from eight Georgia chapters are transcribing unpublished cemetery surveys, wills, school records, church and funeral home records, as well as store ledgers for future submission to the GRC. Fifteen Georgia Daughters are diligently working on the Every-Name Indexing Project. Madam State Regent, this chairman appreciates the opportunity to have served the GRC for the state of Georgia.

HISTORIC PRESERVATION – E. Lynn Brackey

The Historic Preservation Committee established in 2008 assists the National Society by encouraging recognition of significant volunteer efforts in historic preservation at the community, state and national levels and by cataloging NSDAR properties. The Historic Preservation Medal, Donna Johnson, Vice Chairman, is a National Award honoring an individual whose efforts to historic preservation have made a distinguished contribution on the regional, state or national level for many years. Two applications for the DAR Historic Preservation Medal were submitted to the National Chairman and approved. The Historic Preservation Recognition Award, Donna Johnson, Vice Chairman, recognizes individuals and groups for outstanding, voluntary achievements in all areas of historic preservation. Four Historic Preservation Recognition Awards were submitted to the National Vice Chairman and approved. The Historic Preservation Project Contest, Melissa Daniellson, Vice Chairman, recognizes projects related to the preservation of a historic site, landmark, historic district or property. Sixteen chapters reported ongoing restoration, renovation, and preservation projects but did not enter the Project Contest. Historic Sites and Property Management - Two additional properties were identified this year as owned or maintained by Georgia Chapters. This brings the total to twentyeight in Georgia with one property, Meadow Garden, owned by the State Society. These properties have been compiled in a national database of all DAR owned or managed properties in collaboration with the Historian General's Office. Sixty-nine programs on Historic Preservation were presented to chapters during 2011-2012.A Certificate of Award for Best Chapter Report was presented to the Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter, NSDAR.

JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS - Louise Williams Jones

Nine of the Georgia DAR chapters sponsored JAC groups or contests involving 1,231 children in grades Pre K-8. The national theme, "Enhance the Present", produced many beautiful and interesting entries for this year's contest. Georgia sent 53 winning entries including 7 banners, 7 posters, 9 poems, 2 photo essays, 8 short stories, 2 community service awards, and 18 stamps to the Southeastern Divisional level for judging. Thomasville Chapter received a certificate of award for Outstanding Sponsorship of JAC Participation, involving 1,119 children. Colonel William Candler Chapter received a certificate of award for a good report. Thanks to the Georgia Chapters who worked with the schools to make JAC a way for teaching patriotism and love for our country to all children. Madam State Regent, it has been an honor to serve you in this capacity.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP – Amy Pittman Lawson

Junior Membership reports were overflowing with numerous accolades for Georgia's Juniors. In addition to Juniors serving as state chairmen and vice chairmen, there are currently over 50 Juniors serving as chapter officers and chairmen. The goals of this Committee are to gain new Junior Members, build a well-informed Junior Membership, encourage active participation at all levels, and support National and State Junior fundraisers. The Committee is here to help all chapters achieve these goals. The Georgia State Society added an average of one Junior every 11 days....what an accomplishment! Philadelphia Winn members Sue Kirves, Betty Looper and Cathy Hyer participated in the Lineage Research Facebook group, and LaRee Madsden researched for members at the Family History Library in Salt Lake City, Utah; Reverend John Andrew member Dana Anderson, a LRLV, responded to five requests for assistance: Robert Loughridge were instructed in use of the library online. resulting in completion of applications and supplementals; Stephen Heard held two workshops with local research historian, Larry Wilson; Tallassee had a successful workshop at Moultrie Technical School with the assistance of Julie Prince: Thronateeska held a workshop on use of internet resources and DAR website; William Marsh heard a presentation, "Supplementals...Hunting for Additional Patriots." MEMBERSHIP - Barbara P. Fincher

The Georgia State Society gained 430 members, including 53 Juniors during 2011, for an overall membership being 7,248. Of the 90 chapters reporting that had membership goals this past year; 56% of them met their goals; and 6 chapters exceeded them. Georgia had approximately 330 prospective members to utilize emembership; 114 became members. Deserving of recognition are: James Stewart Chapter (Franklin) for its outstanding prospective member packet; Fielding Lewis Chapter (Marietta) for its new member packet; Philadelphia Winn Chapter (Lawrenceville) for its initiation/ welcoming ceremony; Atlanta Chapter – in helping the Atlanta Chapter of the SAR to revitalize itself, reaped the added benefit of receiving 12 prospective DAR members; Hightower Trail (Canton) for its information orientation "class" before each meeting; Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter (Roswell) for the best overall membership report; Augusta Chapter for adding the most new Junior Members (8); Captain John Wilson Chapter (Thomson) for 100% of new members being Juniors.

NATIONAL DEFENSE – Carolyn B. Balog No report

PROGRAM - Marci Walker Swetmon

This Chairman received reports from 102 of the 112 Chapters in the State realizing a 6% increase year over year. Of the 102 reporting Chapters, 24 utilized National's Online Program bank which was a 14% increase over last year. The Colonel William Candler Chapter, Regent & program author, Marcelaine Crocket Fletcher, submitted an original program for National Review. The program manuscript was submitted for

the categories of American Indians and National Defense. Entitled "Native American Indians Code Talkers" the program was presented 3 times in October, 2011 and was submitted to the National Chairman for consideration. Best overall Program Report in the State was submitted by the Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter, Regent Donna L. Owens. Both Chapter Regents were presented with certificates of appreciation by this Chairman. Madam State Regent, thank you for permitting me to serve the Georgia State Society as Program Chairman.

PUBLIC RELATIONS AND MEDIA - Marilyn Moulton Wright

Ninety-three chapters reported using publicity to raise awareness of DAR in their communities. Seventy-three chapters report print articles and thirty-one chapters report radio and TV coverage. Sixty-five chapters have newsletters and twenty-seven have chapter brochures. Eleven chapters use "Today's DAR" video in interesting and innovative ways. Thirty-five chapters are using web sites and social media to publicize their projects, and one chapter presented a local media award to a local program or a member of the film, radio, or television industries for outstanding work. Certificates of Award were given to Augusta Chapter for Best Newsletter, James Stewart Chapter for Best Brochure and Augusta Chapter for Best Publicity for a single event James Stewart Chapter's brochure was the Southeast Division winner and has been sent on for the national judging.

VOLUNTEER INFORMATION SPECIALISTS – Amy Pittman Lawson

As of January 1, 2012, the Georgia State Society recorded 7,248 members. Chapters reported that 175 prospective members contacted them directly through their individual web sites. Of those prospective members, 120 have become DAR members or have papers pending/in progress. 93 Georgia chapters used the Electronic Master Questionnaire for reporting. 65 chapters distribute newsletters electronically, and many nice examples were sent to this state chairman, including beautiful samples from the Augusta and Xavier Chapters. E-membership is now routinely used by chapter regents, vice-regents, treasurers, and registrars, as well as all state officers and state chairmen in approved access groups. Georgia Daughters logged thousands of hours on special NSDAR projects. The VIS Volunteer of the Year award goes to Sherrin Willis, Xavier Chapter. In addition to numerous examples of outstanding use of a computer at the chapter level, Sherrin is described as the "goto" computer person in the Xavier Chapter, putting together their monthly online chapter newsletter, creating brochures, making birthday cards, printing committee information for chairmen, etc....I wish I had space to list all of her accomplishments! Thank you to the 7 vital members of the Georgia VIS Committee that, along with many chapter webmasters, spend incalculable hours updating and reviewing the 100+ Georgia State Society chapter and state web sites. It has been an honor to serve our State Regent and the Georgia State Society.

COMMEMORATIVE EVENTS – Betty Brown Harrah

This Chairman received 102 reports with 93 chapters participating in Commemorative Events. July 4th parades/celebrations included 882 Daughters participating. Daughters placed Flags, laid wreaths in cemeteries, commemorated Revolutionary War Battle Sites. Daughters commemorated the 70th Anniversary of Pearl Harbor Attack, Veterans Day, Constitution Week, rang bells, Patriots Day, Mothers Day, Presidents Day, Arbor Day, DAR Founders Day, Flag Day, D-Day, Old Soldiers Day, Georgia Day, National Day of Prayer, Election Day, Armed Forces Day, Labor Day, Earth Day, Wreaths Across America, Christmas Day, Thanksgiving Day, Columbus Day, Treaty of Paris, Founding of Washington, DC, Bicentennial of the War of 1812, Native American Indians, birthdays of George Washington, Marque de Lafayette, Abraham Lincoln, visited the Vietnam Traveling Wall. Daughters commemorated 9/11 with banners, certificates, memorials, special programs and thanked first responders all over statewide; Earth Day. Daughters lined streets for active and fallen soldiers when they came home. Many events were with SAR, C.A.R members. Chapters celebrating birthdays were Atlanta 120 years, Andrew McBride, Swuanee Creek celebrated their organizing. Best Chapter Report William Day, 2nd place General Daniel Newnan, 3rd place Martha Stewart Bulloch. Best Scrapbook William Day. Thank you for the opportunity to serve on this committee during this administration.

DAR GENEALOGY PRESERVATION – Scarlette Murphy Moyer

The Genealogy Preservation Committee goal is to index DAR genealogical and membership information into computerized, search able databases. This work will assist in preserving these valuable records for posterity and significantly enhance the application approval and membership record retrieval processes. The Descendant's Project which consisted of indexing all available applications was completed July 30, 2011. The committee's next goal is the Supporting Documentation Project. This involves categorizing over six million documents used by members to support the lineage submitted on their DAR applications.

DAR PROJECT PATRIOT - Betty Garlington Christy

Fifty-seven (57) chapters reported a total of \$28,123.40 given to Project Patriot in the form of donated goods or cash. This is an increase of 71% over last year's contribution to this project. There were twenty-two (22) donations of \$100 from members and chapters which qualified them to purchase the Project Patriot pin. Three hundred and twelve (312) boxes of clothing and comfort items were sent to the Landstuhl Regional Hospital in Germany or men and women deployed in Iraq or Afghanistan. One chapter raised \$2100 through the sale of their patriotic calendar. Other chapters have had silent auctions to raise money to send to National. Chapters have welcomed troops with refreshments as they passed through the Atlanta airport or with "Welcome Home" bags as they arrived home. Collected cell phones to be

reprogrammed for use by overseas personnel for free of charge calls. Made wheelchair/walker bags and sent to Landstuhl. Adopted a member's son or daughter deployed overseas, or adopted a platoon. Supported Army doctor in Afghanistan by sending clothing for local children. Held "themed" donations for each month: "morale," "clean as a whistle," "something to keep you cozy." All chapters are thanked for their participation.

INSIGNIA - Sherri Lawson Roberts

Reports were received from 78 Georgia chapters. There was \$36,950.18 of insignia purchases reported. The largest amount reported by a chapter was \$4,848 by the Andrew McBride chapter. Other chapters reporting purchases over \$1,000 were: Archibald Bulloch, Atlanta, Augusta, James Waldrop, Martha Stewart Bulloch, Philadelphia Winn, Reverend John Andrew, Sandy Springs, and William Day. Several chapters reported that insignia was a topic in their monthly newsletter. The Chapter Regent for the Hightower Trail chapter presented an orientation program for new members, "Pins are a Girl's Best Friend," to talk about insignia, pin protocol, and how to obtain pins. Other chapters made insignia information available at chapter meetings. Georgia Daughters should continue to utilize the Insignia Committee website to get the most current information on insignia.

LITERACY PROMOTION - O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle

Three hundred twenty-four Georgia Daughters participated in literacy programs such as tutoring adults and children, volunteering in libraries, donating books to various locations, providing reading materials to homeless shelters, traveling abroad to teach English, writing scripts for radio shows, setting up book fairs, serving on library boards and community action teams. Over 3200 hours were spent tutoring, and promoting literacy in adults. Over 9000 hours were spent promoting literacy in children. Over 6000 books and magazines were donated by Georgia chapters. Many chapters reported participation with the Ferst Foundation of Childhood Literacy in their communities. Through Lynda Holmes's excellent leadership as Literacy Promotion Chair, Colonel William Candler raised money, conducted programs, and initiated a variety of activities throughout the year to promote literacy in the Gainesville-Hall County, Georgia. Outstanding Service of a DAR Member - Lynda Holmes; Outstanding Service of a Chapter - Colonel William Candler. Certificates of Great Chapter Work for Literacy - Oglethorpe Chapter.

PRESIDENT GENERAL'S PROJECT - Carol Goff Russell

Eighty-four (84) of the one hundred three (103) chapters sent in reports. Of those reporting, seventy-five (75) contributed funds towards the President General's Project. Nineteen (19) chapters had members that donated more than \$6.00. The chapters are: Atlanta, Augustin Clayton, Barnard Trail, Brunswick, Chehaw, Commodore Richard Dale, Elijah Clarke, Fielding Lewis, Fort Peachtree, Governor Truetlen, Hawkinsville, James Stewart, James Waldrop LaGrange, Nathaniel Abney, Oglethorpe, Philadelphia Winn, Reverend John Andrew, Sandy Springs, Sergant Newton, Sukey Hart, and Thronateeska.

PROTOCOL - Barbara Blakely Chastain

I have enjoyed the opportunity to work with our Georgia chapters this year and provide guidance on matters related to Protocol. The chapters are to be commended for taking the initiative to seek advice on the proper conduct of business to ensure they are responding in the best manner to circumstances at hand.

SPECIAL PROJECTS GRANT - Vicki Lancaster Cobb

Georgia daughters from three chapters have responded to the call to sponsor local organizations for grants from the Special Projects Grants provided by the NSDAR. Two of the chapters applied during last year with a grant being awarded in May, 2011 to the Perry Area Historical Museum Outdoor Classroom with the General Daniel Stewart Chapter as sponsor. The Pulaski chapter partnered with the Griffin-Spalding Historical Society for an unfunded grant; however, the daughters raised \$1,100.00 for the matching funds. The Oglethorpe Chapter sponsored the Sunnyside Historical Foundation for a grant which is in process now. If awarded, this grant will provide funds for repairs to a 1920 community school house that is used as a community center. These projects have provided recognition to the DAR chapters through newspaper, television, newsletters, plaques and the other organizations. With one year left in the life of this project, I encourage other chapters to join with the Atlanta Chapter in submitting applications for funding in 2013. Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure serving you and the State Society on this worthwhile committee.

VOLUNTEER GENEALOGISTS – Dee McCranie Redkevitch

I am so very proud of our Georgia Daughters this year. Fourteen (14) took the 4 Day class in Washington; 50 chapters presented workshops; 881 members attended those workshops; 100 daughters attended the workshop given in the summer by trained genealogists receiving a booklet to use for teaching; 127 attended non DAR workshops such as History Expo and Georgia Genealogy Society; 56 Georgia daughters assisted other chapters. The scoring to choose a Volunteer Genealogist for the year has changed. It is done by counting points, such as giving 10 points for giving a workshop for your chapter, 20 points for giving one for another chapter, 20 points for member to member for your chapter, 25 points for member to member for other chapters, 50 points for taking the Genealogy Consultant Class in DC, 25 points for taking a Volunteer Genealogy Education Program on line, 20 points for a new patriot, 15 for another child, etc. The Volunteer Genealogist for the year is Rachel Colbert who has twice as many points as anybody else. Congratulations Rachel!

WOMEN'S ISSUES - Sara Stone Carter

Of the 68 chapters reporting, thousands of volunteer hours were reported, with one chapter reporting over 5,000 volunteer hours. Eleven members wrote essays and six chapters read a winning essay at their meetings. Nine chapters presented programs on domestic violence, home invasion and self-defense. Hospice care programs were presented to 11 chapters. Seven chapters celebrated Women's History Month. Programs on women's shelters and nursing homes were well received. Health concerns were widely addressed, with 30 programs on breast cancer, 21 on heart health, seven on Alzheimer's and five on diabetes. Programs were also given on how to interpret food labels. Chapters and members continue to share their knowledge and information through programs and essays in all areas of women's issues.

FINANCE COMMITTEE - Shelby Alderman Whitson

This committee met before the State Board of Management Meeting on October 28, 2011 with Shelby Whitson presiding and all members present. The proposed budget for 2012-2013 was discussed and approved to be presented for vote at the 2012 State Conference. The Committee met again before the State Conference on May 2, 2012. The proposed budget for 2012-2013 was adopted as presented at the State Conference.

MINUTES Finance Committee Meetings October 28, 2011

The Finance Committee met on Friday, October 28, 2011 at the Marriott Macon City Center Hotel in Macon with the Chairman and Honorary State Regent, Shelby Whitson presiding. The meeting was called to order at 1:30 p.m. with the Chairman offering the invocation. The following members were present: Virginia Lingelbach, Secretary: Dianne Cannestra, State Treasurer; Bea Fischer, Past State Treasurer; Elaine Lester, Chapter Regent; Sally Baldwin, State Regent. Mrs. Whitson stated the minutes of the April 28, 2011 meeting were approved and submitted for publication in the Proceedings. Dianne Cannestra, State Treasurer provided copies of the Treasurer's report consisting of the Balance Sheet as of September 30, 2011; Profit and Loss Statement from July through September 2011; and the Meadow Garden Balance Sheet as of September 30, 2011. As of September 30 Georgia State Society had \$120,386.56 invested in Certificates of Deposit, \$64,352.17 in Checking, \$49,834.12 in the Money Market Account, \$1,200 in Hotel Deposits for total assets of \$235,772.85. The Meadow Garden Accounts as of September 30, 2011 were summarized as follows: \$350,000.00 invested in Certificates of Deposit, \$26,052.46 in Checking, \$128,962.73 in the Money Market Account, \$100 in Petty Cash; \$185,377.73 in Fixed Assets, Total Assets \$690,492.92. A display case money market fund was set up with a little over \$8,000 being moved into that fund. Mrs. Cannestra suggested the hotel contingency fund be raised from \$5,000 to \$8,000/\$10,000 due to the fact that hotels and other venues are asking for larger deposits and contracts are having to be signed 12 to 18 months or more prior to the event. The following amendment to the resolution was prepared to increase the amount in this fund. Resolved: "That the Resolution entitled "State Events Contingency Fund" be amended to read \$10,000,00. These funds are to secure anticipated deposits for State Events and are to be replaced from state fund income, reimbursing the fund yearly for the amount used. To establish the \$10,000 the additional \$5,000 shall come from the general fund checking account." Rationale: Hotels and other venues require larger and additional deposits. The proposed Resolution was submitted to the Resolutions Committee. Mrs. Whitson reviewed the proposed budget for 2012-2013 which will be presented for adoption at the 2012 State Conference. It was recommended that in order to comply with the newly established guidelines of the National Society the Per Capita line item identifying donations to three specific schools be changed to read "Friends of the DAR Schools Fund." In a subsequent electronic meeting it was further suggested that the per capita for the schools be reduced by \$700 with this amount being allocated to the "Meetings" budget line item. A proposed Bylaw Amendment to this affect was submitted to the Bylaws Committee. It was the general consensus of the Finance Committee that the monetary gift in honor of the President General for her project which is traditionally presented in the year of her attendance at the Georgia State

Conference be taken from the General Fund. There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 2:30 p.m.

STATE SPEAKERS STAFF - Christine Rife Napier

State Speaker's Staff is made up of volunteers appointed by the State Regent and those members who are on the National Speakers Staff are appointed by the President General. Speakers have researched and written various programs on topics of interest to our members and the community. These speakers are willing to travel to chapters to present programs, enhance chapter meetings, and encourage attendance. Thirty seven chapters submitted reports, using from one to five speakers. Speakers also shared topics with local civic clubs, church groups, other lineage societies, and SAR chapters. A total of 91 programs were given and a total of 6,234 miles were traveled to accomplish this. Last June a new black wrought iron fence was installed to replace the over 50 year old chain link fence, which involved lots of activity for this chairman and the landscaping chairman taking turns letting the workmen in at 6 a.m. and closing up when they finished. We have had lots of compliments on the fence from the public. Walton Rehab has been very supportive and installed a bench just outside our new gate for the use of MG guests. This winter the canal side of the house was repaired with new wood and painted, windows glazed and front and back porches repaired and painted. A security camera was installed on the front porch pointing to our new entrance with two monitors inside the house. An addition of glass break detectors to the alarm system was installed and work was done on the bathroom. Timers have been installed on all the outside lights. With the State Conference in Augusta last year, a tea at Meadow Garden gave the Georgia daughters a chance to see 'their house". It has been an honor to serve as Chairman and have a part in all the improvements at Meadow Garden.

MEADOW GARDEN DOCENTS - Billie Gardner Hunter

During 2011 the Docents at Meadow Garden acted as hostesses, tour guides, decorators and in sales in the Gift Shop. We also had volunteers that worked in the yard. In addition to those people we had volunteers to work in the absence of the manager. The Augusta Chapter was well represented in having volunteers to train as Docents. I personally was at Meadow Garden 15 times, partially as tour guide, hostess or manager substitute. This report is late as a direct result of conducting a tour at Meadow Garden I fainted and went directly to the hospital where I spent three days. It has been my pleasure to serve as Meadow Garden Docent Chairman.

MEADOW GARDEN FURNISHINGS - Patricia Cown Burnam

his Chairman has completed her third term as Chairman of this committee. She has committed herself to helping subsequent Furnishings Chairmen by continuing with the research of past records and history of gifts and donations made since the acquisition of Meadow Garden by the National Society NSDAR and through this administration. She will assist and continue, with the permission of the State Regent, to enter into Past Perfect all the new information obtained, and pass her knowledge on to the incoming Chairmen of Furnishings as long as her assistance is needed. Virginia Nicholson, member Furnishings Committee, Historical Restoration, researched through Sotheby's to locate an auction company to handle the sale of the valuable pottery pieces donated some years ago to Meadow Garden. She also finished the restoration of the engravings started last year by having them also reframed. This Chairman thanks the State Regent, Sally Baldwin, for this opportunity serve in this capacity during her administration.

MEADOW GARDEN GIFT SHOP – Phyllis Fox Lawson

Meadow Garden Gift Shop had a very successful two years with the help of Georgia Daughters who donated crocheted, knitted, hand sewn and other items of the period for sale which netted the Gift Shop clear profit when sold. The Gift shop continued to promote historical education by selling toys, books, paper dolls, and coloring books of

the Colonial Period. Jams and jellies continue to be big sellers along with the Meadow Garden blue and white china. The overall sales for the last two years were over \$15,000, which should make the Georgia Daughters very proud of their support of their own National Historic Landmark, Meadow Garden. This chairman would like to thank the Gift Shop committee members and the Meadow Garden Chairman for their help during the sales and support of the Gift Shop.

MEADOW GARDEN LANDSCAPING – Jean Bethea Lenderman

The beginning of the new fence construction, in June 2011, caused many changes to the yard. Some of the old brick walkways needed to be redirected, bushes and vines on the fence that had been allowed to grow uncontrolled were trimmed back and two old stumps were removed. Bartlett Tree Service trimmed and applied three treatments to the dogwood tree to kill and prevent borers that were causing the leaves to drop. Three landscape companies were interviewed and Daniel's Landscape Maintenance was chosen. This company also works for Walton Rehab (which surrounds Meadow Garden). We had first- hand knowledge of the excellent work they do on a weekly basis. Britt Bohannon cleaned out the area under the back of the house to be used for storage of tools. He has also completed the renovation of the grape arbor and it looks great. Top soil and new grass seed will be put out in May (this is necessary because of the removal of the old brick walkways). In May 2011, The Meadow Garden Society of the CAR planted herbs and strawberries in the kitchen garden. Plant identification markers were placed in the herb gardens. They also decorated Meadow Garden for Christmas (along with the two DAR Chapters in Augusta). In January 2012, The Allen Howard Society of the CAR visited Meadow Garden for a tour and donated a bird feeder for the yard.

MEADOW GARDEN LIAISON TO CIVIC AUGUSTA - Frankie Rush Nevins

Meadow Garden was promoted state-wide as a tourism destination to approximately 1500 visitors who were welcomed by Georgia Daughters at Georgia On My Mind Days, held at Welcome Centers across the state on designated days throughout spring and summer. Displays showing views of Meadow Garden were featured, and literature describing the site was distributed. Each adult was presented with an American flag lapel pin. Children were given washable tattoos in patriotic designs. Local day care centers took advantage of the day as an educational and cultural experience for their clients. Radio and television stations promoting the events and urging visitors to tourism sites throughout the state recognized Meadow Garden and DAR. Chapters receiving Honor Roll credit for participation are: Brier Creek, Savannah, Lachlan McIntosh, Fort Frederica, John Benson, Abraham Baldwin, LaGrange, William Marsh, Augusta, College Hill, Sweetwater, and John Wrens. The Chairman and Civic Liaison of Meadow Garden participated in a sales mission with the Augusta Convention and Visitors Bureau marketing team, where Meadow Garden was promoted as major tourism site to Atlanta area press and tour companies. They also met with the staff of the Georgia State Tourism Office. The Civic Liaison arranged for a permanent display in a kiosk at the I-20 Welcome Center in Augusta, and assisted in the design of the display to promote Meadow Garden. Augusta and College Hill chapter members serve as greeting hostesses at the center one day each month.

MEADOW GARDEN PUBLIC RELATIONS – Marilyn Moulton Wright

We applied for and received a 2011 Tourism Grant for \$6,700, which was awarded in April 2011. This grant included a reprinting of the Meadow Garden brochure as well

as an ad in the Georgia State Travel Guide. Meadow Garden had ads in the Augusta CVB Guide and the Masters issue of the Augusta Magazine. We received an \$18,000 grant from Watson-Brown Foundation for historic preservation of Meadow Garden; this grant is a matching grant and will be used for restoration and painting of the outside of the house. *Georgia Backroads* magazine will have an article about Meadow Garden in the June (summer) 2012 issue. Georgia chapters have worked to contact Welcome Centers throughout Georgia and supply Meadow Garden brochures where needed.

MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

August 1, 2011

The Meadow Garden Board met on Monday, August 1, 2011 at the George Walton Heritage Education Center. Sally McGlaun Baldwin, State Regent and Chairman of the Board called the meeting to order at 10:30 a.m. Other voting members present were: Virginia Lingelbach, Secretary, Margaret Cagle, Nancy Parks, Dianne Cannestra, Lanette Reid, Shelby Whitson, Billie Hunter, Patty Burnam, Jean Lenderman, Phyllis Lawson, and Lynn Wright. Also attending were Ex Officio member Bea Fischer and non-voting members Frankie Nevins and Jean Johnson.

The State Regent offered the invocation and welcomed everyone to the meeting. The roll call was given by Virginia Lingelbach, Board Secretary.

The State Regent reported on the auction of four pieces of pottery which sold for \$64,575.00 resulting in a profit of \$58,117.50. This money was placed in the Money Market Administrative/Maintenance Account.

Mrs. Cagle, Meadow Garden House Chairman and Trustee, reported that although the fence is completely installed there is some work remaining, however, the extreme temperatures have prevented the completion of this work. Walton Rehabilitation Center paid for the bricks and installation of the new walkways which are still under construction. Mr. Cagle recently installed two security cameras at both gates and repositioned the gate alarms. One new gate alarm was also purchased. Mrs. Cagle reported on maintenance issues as follows: The heat pump systems in the house and the Heritage Education Center were serviced at a cost of \$434.00; cleaning under the house is being accomplished; the railing on the right side of the back porch was repaired, and a vent in the Heritage Education Center has been repaired. Maintenance work still remains to be done on the front door floor and the back steps as well as insulation under the house need to be re-installed. Mrs. Cagle reported a leak in the water meter which has been fixed by the city and a cut off valve has been installed on the toilet. Various problems exist with the bathroom in the house to include the possible need to replace the old pipes coming from the street to the house and the flooring in order to eventually accommodate a new toilet. This will require extensive work to include possible removal and replacement of the walkway. This work is estimated to run between \$600 - \$1500. The Georgia Power Company has changed the electrical meters to automatic meters. Reading of the meters will

now be done from a central office; therefore they have no further need to have their lock on our gate. Mrs. Cagle reported a problem with the Magic Jack phone and Mrs. Baldwin authorized the purchase of a new phone if the problems cannot be resolved. Mrs. Cagle is continuing to investigate cleaning services. Mrs. Cagle discussed the need for a scanner in the Stribling Room to accommodate reproduction of records. In order to accommodate a recent chapter's need, Mrs. Cagle purchased a scanner and installed it in the room. Mrs. Lingelbach moved, "we purchase from Margaret Cagle a scanner for \$30.00." Adopted. It was decided by the Board to charge ten cents per copy for black and white and forty cents per copy for color copies, regardless of whether or not paper is supplied. Mrs. Cagle further discussed the issue of the temperature and humidity stating that a new two ton system estimated at \$5,294.00 has been recommended. The current duct work and insulation are inadequate to maintain proper temperature in the upstairs. Mrs. Baldwin discussed the subject of insulation in the upstairs and between floors. Mrs. Lawson moved, "that we proceed with estimates for blown in insulation to be funded by money from a portion of the Dave the Slave pottery sales." Adopted. The State Regent also recommended we have a lock box installed on the thermostat thereby preventing unauthorized changes. Mrs. Baldwin stated that if necessary an electronic vote would be taken on the installation of the insulation.

Mrs. Wright, Chairman, Public Relations, reported that an \$18,000 grant had been received from the Watson-Brown Foundation for renovation on the canal side of the house. This is a matching grant with matching funds being approved by the Meadow Garden Board by electronic vote on June 7, 2011. Mrs. Wright will provide Mrs. Baldwin and Mrs. Cagle with specific criteria for complying with the grant requirements. Mrs. Baldwin addressed the voting procedure for electronic voting and assured all Board members that all votes are counted, regardless of how the vote is cast. Mrs. Wright continued her report stating that we had received a 2011 Tourism Grant of \$6,700.00 which was presented at state conference; the article in *Georgia Backroads* on Meadow Garden by Jackie Peronne has not yet been published, we will have advertisement in *Classic South* for the Masters edition. Mrs. Cagle and Mrs. Nevins represented Meadow Garden at the Augusta Convention and Visitors Bureau, Atlanta Media/Sales mission on May 5, 2011. Mrs. Wright addressed the need for a Meadow Garden Fact Sheet to be given to news media when developing stories on the property and stated she will work on this.

Mrs. Jackson, House Manager, presented a comparison report for tourism for the first six months of years 2010 and 2011. Tourism is up by 44% as follows: Total tourist: 2010-275, 2011-627; Total Walk In Tourist: 2010-176- Income \$527.00, 2011-390- Income \$723.00; Total Scheduled Tourist: 2010-99- Income \$\$155.00, 2011-237- Income \$\$393.00; Total Combined Income: 2010-\$682.00, 2011-\$1,116.00. The Tourism Report year to date ending July 2011 is as follows: Total Tourists: 736; Total Tour Income: \$1,365.50; Total Gift Shop Sales: \$982.00.

Mrs. Nevins, Liaison to Civic Augusta, distributed copies of *Georgia's Classic South* Brochure which includes information on Meadow Garden and presented a traveling roll-up display board featuring Georgia's Three Signers of the Declaration of Independence. Mrs. Baldwin approved the production of a Meadow Garden poster for display at the Georgia Welcome Station.

Mrs. Cannestra, Treasurer, distributed the Treasurer's report, Income and Expenses Compared to Budget spread sheet, and Balance Sheet. The Treasurer's report showed total assets of \$636,540.72. Mrs. Cannestra presented the Proposed Operating Budget 2011-2012. Mrs. Cannestra moved, "the adoption of the

proposed budget for 2011-2012." Adopted. It was noted that continued use of the Past Perfect software support is justified and is included in the Budget.

Mrs. Hunter, Docents Chairman, reported that a docent class will be held on August 3, 2011, at 10:30 a.m. with four people currently scheduled to attend. She also indicated that another large docent class will be scheduled for later in the year. Mrs. Hunter suggested that thank you notes be sent to the docents at Christmas time. Mrs. Baldwin recommended suggestions be offered for different ways to recognize and thank the docents for their devoted service. Mrs. Reid stated that she felt something should be done at State Conference to express appreciation to the Docents. Docents and hours for all participating chapters year to date are: 40 Docents volunteering 692 total hours. The C.A.R. Meadow Garden Society donated 20 hours and the Cherokee Rose Garden Club donated 44.50 hours.

Mrs. Lenderman, Landscaping Chairman, reported that the large, old dogwood tree has a borer infestation and Bartlett Tree Experts has given an estimate of \$558.00 for three treatments plus pruning. Mrs. Lenderman moved,

"that we hire Bartlett Tree Experts to prune the dogwood tree and perform three bark treatments to help suppress borers. Pruning is \$78.00 and \$480.00 for three treatments, plus, follow-up treatments yearly at \$160.00 until healthy." Adopted. Mrs. Lenderman reported on the need for stump grinding and moved that "we hire Chad Ligon to grind the stumps in the side yard at a price not to exceed \$150.00." Adopted. Mrs. Lenderman stated that much landscaping work remains to be done as a result of fence construction including clean up and leveling the area around the bottom of the fence. Mrs. Lenderman further stated that the previously approved plaque honoring Jo Agostas would be placed on the front gate. At the request of Mrs. Baldwin, Mrs. Reid agreed to provide the wording for the plaque. Clean up under the house and preparation of storage for yard equipment continues. The sprinkler system was extended and new sprinkler heads installed by Mr. Cagle.

Mrs. Lawson, Gift Shop Chairman, reported that voices will be sold at the summer workshops on a double strand coin pearl necklace donated by Shannon Logue of the Cherokee Chapter. Three previously donated necklaces have sold for \$100.00 each and several bracelets donated by Mrs. Logue have sold for \$25.00 each. The drawing will be at the workshop in Perry. Mrs. Lawson expressed thanks to Mrs. Nicholson for returning the inventory to Meadow Garden after the State Conference and to Mrs. Jackson for completion of gift shop inventory.

Mrs. Burnam, Furnishings Chairman, reported that she had met with Amy Lawson and gave her the Past Perfect software discs and copies of Excel Spreadsheet, as well as backup of the inventory and pictures. The software has tentatively been placed on the Meadow Garden computer in Mrs. Jackson's office. Mrs. Burnam stated that she had worked at Meadow Garden for nine days from January 2011 through today, bringing her total days at Meadow Garden since July 2010 to 17 days. Mrs. Burnam recommended the development of an overall plan to address and prioritize future needs of the house. Mrs. Burnam reported for Mrs. Nicholson on the need for conservation of textiles and prints. The report is filed.

Mrs. Cagle reported that Mrs. Nicholson is working on a design for the display/sales cabinet for the gift shop. Mrs. Baldwin requested a drawing and an estimate for the cost of construction of the cabinet be presented at the next Meadow Garden meeting.

Mrs. Baldwin requested Board members to list the names of those to be recognized as Patrons-In-Kind on a circulating sheet.

Mrs. Baldwin addressed the matter brought up at State Conference relative to funds remaining from the previous Administration's State Regent's project, as well as Mrs. Baldwin's obligation to respond to questions regarding this matter. Her proposed letter to Chapter Regents was circulated for review by the Board and will be released via email in the immediate future. Proceeds from the cookbook were stipulated in various source documents as being clearly earmarked for Meadow Garden maintenance.

Mrs. Baldwin stated that our insurance policy premium is \$8,000 annually and stipulates no alcohol can be served on the premises. Our rental contract allows for the serving of alcohol. Mrs. Baldwin indicated she would retype the rental contract to bring it in compliance with our insurance policy.

Mrs. Baldwin stated the next Meadow Garden Board Meeting would be Thursday, October 20, 2011, at 10:30 a.m. at the Heritage Education Center in Augusta.

The meeting was adjourned at 2:20 p.m.

Meadow Garden Electronic Vote August 16, 2011

An electronic meeting of the Meadow Garden Board was conducted by the State Regent via email on Tuesday, August 16, 2011 for the purpose of presenting a motion relative to insulation for the house. Mrs. Cagle moved "that we remove 216 feet of existing insulation under the house, clean out all animal nests and replace with waterproof sheets of insulation and install secure material around the perimeter of the under part of the house to keep out animals. Also, install 12 inch thick insulation in the attic of the Meadow Garden House. All work to be accomplished by Advanced Services at a cost not to exceed \$3,000 with funds to be paid from the Administrative and Maintenance Account." Motion seconded and adopted by electronic vote.

October 20, 2011

The Meadow Garden Board met on Thursday, October 20, 2011 at the George Walton Heritage Education Center. Sally McGlaun Baldwin, State Regent and Chairman of the Board called the meeting to order at 10:30 a.m. Other voting members present were: Virginia Lingelbach, Secretary, Nancy Parks, Dianne Cannestra, Lanette Reid, Shelby Whitson, Billie Hunter, Jean Lenderman, Lynn Wright. Also attending were Ex Officio member Bea Fischer and non-voting attendee Jean Johnson.

Mrs. Lenderman, Landscaping Chairman, stated that upon receipt of the original agreement with Mr. Steedley dated 2008, provided by Mrs. Reid, which stated that Mr. Steedley would keep the weeds out of the brick walkways and driveways and weed one bed per week, she spoke with Mr. Steedley about his responsibilities. It is the opinion of the Landscaping Chairman that the contract has not been fulfilled and therefore it is recommended that we consider other contractors for this service. Mr. Skelley of Walton Rehabilitation Center has recommended an alternate landscaping service. It was the decision of the board to open the service for bids from all interested contractors.

Mrs. Cannestra, Treasurer, distributed the Treasurer's report, Income and Expenses and Balance Sheet. The Treasurer's report showed total fixed assets as of September 30, 2100, \$690,492.92.

Mrs. Hunter, Docents Chairman, reported that a docent training session was held on August 3, 2011 for three people from the Augusta Chapter and that one other person is scheduled for training next week. She expressed the need to recognize the docents with a certificate of appreciation. Mrs. Wright offered to prepare the certificates.

Mrs. Nicholson, Member Historic Preservation, Meadow Garden Gift Shop, reported the cleaning and preservation of antique linens had been completed and the items conserved in acid free tissue and boxes. Cost of reimbursement to Mrs. Nicholson is \$212.86. Mrs. Nicholson presented a design drawing of cabinets for the Gift Shop designed by Mr. John Zembiak. His quote for construction of both rolling cabinets with locking wheels is \$894.00. Mr. Zembiak has done work for Meadow Garden in the past and is considered to be the lowest priced carpenter for the best quality work. After discussion, Mrs. Whitson moved, "That Mr. John Zembiak make two display counters to be used in the Gift Shop, and that we set aside between \$900 and \$1,000 to be used for the storage/display/cashier area. I move that we write a check now for \$500 for Mr. Zembiak's materials to start work." Motion seconded and adopted. Funds to be taken from the Chastain Display Case Fund, Money Market. At the request of Mr. Zembiak, the down payment was modified by the State Regent to cover an increase of \$144.00 for a total down payment of \$644.00. Mrs. Reid moved "to authorize the purchase of a cash register for use in the Gift Shop, cost not to exceed \$250 to be paid from the Chastain display case fund." Motion seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Nicholson continued her report with the suggestion that we consider applying for the 2012 Conservation Assessment Program (CAP), administered by Heritage Preservation, a national non-profit organization dedicated to preserving the cultural heritage of the United States. This program is available to any not-for-profit museum that cares for and owns or uses tangible objects, exhibits them on a regular basis, is open to the public at least 90 days annually, has at least one full time paid or volunteer staff person or the equivalent, and is located in one of the 50 states of the Union, the District of Columbia or US Territories is eligible to apply. This is funded through the National Park Service and Department of the Interior for the protection of museums and historic properties.

No action was taken on this matter and Mrs. Nicholson will continue her research of this program.

In the absence of Mrs. Burnam, Furnishings Chairman, Mrs. Baldwin reported. Mrs. Burnam's written report stated marking had been completed on most of the furnishings, including mirrors, portraits and pictures in several rooms. One of the restored engravings has been hung in the Best Room for Board approval. Mrs. Burnam suggested a clock repairer be contacted to work on the grandfather clock. This clock is one of only a few remaining items that were accessioned by the Meadow Garden Board as "on loan" prior to discontinuation of that practice.

Mrs. Jackson, House Manager, gave the Tourism Report. As of September 30, 2011 – total tourists for the month: 60, year to date 841; total walk in tourists: 53, year to date 564; total scheduled tourist: 7, year to date 27; total income from walk in tourism: \$167.00, year to date \$1,228.00; total income from scheduled tourists: \$14.00, year to date \$452.00; total combined income \$181.00, year to date \$1,680.00; total Gift Shop sales \$188.00, year to date \$1,215.00; total petty cash expenses \$28.82, year to date \$415.75; total donations \$25.00, year to date \$200.50. Mrs. Jackson further reported that Walter Cox, a landscaping docent volunteer, has retired from volunteer work at Meadow Garden.

Mrs. Baldwin reported the cleaning project under the house has been completed. She asked that recommendations for Patron In Kind recognition be submitted to her. The next meeting of the Meadow Garden Board will be on Monday, January 16, 2012 at 10:30 at the Heritage Education Center in Augusta.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:30 a.m.

January 30, 2012

The Meadow Garden Board met on Monday, January 30, 2012, at the George Walton Heritage Education Center. Sally McGlaun Baldwin, State Regent and Chairman of the Board called the meeting to order at 10:30 a.m. Other voting members present were. Virginia Lingelbach, Secretary, Nancy Parks, Betty Jean Durshimer, Dianne Cannestra, Shelby Whitson, Billie Hunter, Jean Lenderman, Phyllis Lawson, Jane Hampton, and Lynn Wright. Non-voting member Virginia "Ginger" Nicholson and Susan Jackson, House Manager were also in attendance. The minutes of the October 20, 2011 meeting were approved.

Mrs. Jackson, House Manager, gave the 2011 Tourism Report as follows: This report reflects the percentage increase from 2010 in parentheses. Total tourists: 1,120 (54%); walk in tourists 673 (51%); scheduled tourists 347 (59%); income for walk in tourism \$1,544.50 (66%); scheduled income \$572 (58%); combined income \$2,116.50 (64%). Total Gift Shop Sales for Meadow Garden only \$1,564.70. This does not include state conference sales. Combined gift shop sales proceeds are reflected in the Treasurer's report.

In the absence of Mrs. Cagle, Chairman of Meadow Garden, Mrs. Jackson reported that Mr. Coleman of J. H. Coleman & Associates, Inc. visited the house and submitted bids on the repair work for the canal side of the house. Mr. Coleman recommended the use of western cypress as it is just as appropriate to the period as heart of pine and more cost effective. Bids from J.H. Coleman & Associates, Inc. and Capers and Associates are filed. Mr. Coleman also submitted a separate bid on additional work he identified during his visit which involved rear stairway repairs.

Mrs. Baldwin stated that both firms were given the exact same criteria on which to bid and she then presented the estimates each company submitted as follows: J. H. Coleman & Associates - \$24,671.54; Capers & Associates - \$39,760.00. Mrs. Wright stated that the Watson Brown Foundation recommended J.H. Coleman & Associates. Mrs. Cannestra moved, "we accept the bid submitted by Coleman and Associates for the matching grant work." Adopted.

A separate bid was provided by J.H. Coleman and Associates for the additional repair work to the back porch stairway in the amount of \$4,592.92.

Mrs. Cannestra questioned the propriety of using the remaining grant funds for this additional work since it was not covered in our grant application. Because the estimate of work came in lower than the total amount of the grant plus matching funds, it was suggested the Watson Brown Foundation be contacted to request permission to use the remainder of the money on the other needed repair work identified by Mr. Coleman. Mrs. Wright stated she could make the request. Mrs. Lawson moved "that we contract with Coleman & Associates to repair the back porch at the cost of \$5,000 as outlined in their contract." Adopted.

Mrs. Jackson further reported on the services provided by the cleaning lady. It was noted she does not clean the basement each time; however, her work is satisfactory. She is scheduled to clean once a month. Mrs. Jackson suggested we consider a cleaning service with a full crew as opposed to one individual.

Mrs. Wright, Public Relations Chairman, reported her final report was sent to the Augusta Convention Visitors Bureau. She noted the article on Meadow Garden for *Georgia Backroads* magazine will be in the June 2012 (summer) issue. The check for \$18,000 from the Watson Brown Foundation Grant was received on January 16, 2012. This grant is for repair/painting of the canal side of the house. Mrs. Wright passed out to each attendee a mission card statement which reads, "The mission of Meadow Garden is to collect, preserve and interpret history in relation to the life and lifestyle of persons living in the period, 18th to mid 19th centuries, and particularly that of George Walton, Patriot and Legislator and Georgia Signer of the Declaration of Independence."

Mrs. Lenderman, Landscaping Chairman, reported that on December 3, 2011, the Meadow Garden Society, CAR, along with members of the Augusta and College Hill Chapters, DAR, decorated Meadow Garden for the holidays and met again on December 17th to remove the decorations. Two bids have been obtained from two landscaping companies for the weekly landscape upkeep of Meadow Garden. Daniel's Landscape Maintenance gave a price of \$90 per week. Bella Lawn Care gave a price of \$75 per week. Each company also gave estimates for additional work needed on the grounds. Mr. Steedley gave a price of \$75 which includes cleaning out one flower bed per week. Mrs. Lenderman moved, "that we hire Daniel's Landscaping to provide weekly maintenance at \$90 a week. Additional services provided at additional cost." Adopted. It was noted that Daniel's Landscape Maintenance also provides the service for Walton Rehabilitation Center.

Mrs. Cannestra, Treasurer, distributed the Treasurer's report, Balance sheet,

and Profit and Loss Detail, July through December 2011. The Treasurer's report showed total assets as of December 31, 2011, \$680,344.32. Mrs. Cannestra suggested we move \$4,000 from the State Regent's Project fund to Administration in order to offset the negative balance created by the purchase of cook books. She further noted that almost \$10,000 remains in the fence fund. The "jug" money was put into the Money Market Administration account which allows for more flexibility in use.

Mrs. Hunter, Docents Chairman, reported that on January 12, she and Patsy Ray from the Augusta Chapter gave a tour to five students from the Allen Howard Society CAR, Covington. JoAn Chewning, William Day Chapter, and her husband accompanied the group to Augusta. They brought and installed a new bird house, and repaired the old one and donated a large bag of sunflower seed. Mrs. Hunter reported docent volunteer data for 2011 as follows: 60 Docents from 17 chapters volunteered 1321.25 hours. Walter Cox a non-DAR member had 64.25 hours. Cherokee Rose Garden Club had 3 people volunteering 65 hours and Meadow Garden Society CAR 14 members volunteering 38 hours. Mrs. Hunter stated that she would like to give small tokens of appreciation to approximately twelve volunteer Docents. After discussion it was the consensus of the Board that name tags would be appropriate. Mrs. Hunter moved, "that we obtain name tags from "Cudos" to present to docents who have served well and for Susan Jackson, not to exceed \$125.00. Adopted.

Mrs. Nicholson, Vice Chairman, Gift Shop, reported that she had painted the newly completed cabinets for the Gift Shop in time for the Chairman to rearrange items in the shop before the Christmas holidays. As Preservation Chair, she presented information at the last Board meeting about the 2012 Conservation Assessment Program (CAP). Since the Board deferred action on this program to a future date, the proposal will be tabled until the fall of 2012 for the 2013 application time line. Mrs. Nicholson further reported that she has two items to turn over to Mrs. Burnam, Furnishings Chairman. The first is the original letter from Octavia Walton

LeVert, which was discovered and needs protection from the elements within an acid free cover. The second item, a linen underskirt, was washed according to preservation standards and ironed and is ready to be displayed or stored.

Mrs. Hampton, Patrons Chairman, reported that patron donations are down.

Patron ribbons will be handed out at the registration table at state conference.

Mrs. Lawson, Gift Shop Chairman, reported that we continue to receive items from Daughters to sell in the Gift Shop and all of this is clear profit. The small jellies are a good selling item. She reported she is working on a "Cat's Meow" item featuring Meadow Garden which will be sold for \$20.00 each. Mrs. Lawson recommended that Shannon Logue be given special Patron-In-Kind recognition for her generous donation of her hand made pearl jewelry to the Meadow Garden Gift Shop. The Board approved the award of a plaque for her contributions.

Mrs. Lingelbach, State First Vice Regent, asked the Board to consider endorsing the submission of a resolution to the Resolution Committee honoring Margaret Cagle for her untiring efforts for many years on behalf of Meadow Garden. Mrs. Lingelbach moved, "to submit a resolution for consideration at State Conference to commend Margaret Cagle for her long standing dedication to Meadow Garden, especially during her recent bout with cancer, and to submit it to the Resolution Committee after approval by the voting members of the Meadow Garden Board." Adopted.

Under old business, Mrs. Baldwin stated that the original missing motion cards from the March 25, 2010, Meadow Garden Meeting which moved "to designate the funds in the Capital Investment Money Market Account be invested in a Certificate of Deposit – which shall be designated to build a gate/wall/fence" had been found. Accordingly, Mrs. Baldwin directed the record reflect this motion was proper and would stand as adopted.

Mrs. Baldwin announced the next meeting of the Meadow Garden Board will be on Tuesday, February 21 at 10:30 and the last meeting before state conference is scheduled for Tuesday, April 24 at 10:30, both meetings at the Heritage Education Center.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:45 p.m.

April 24, 2012

The Meadow Garden Board met on Tuesday, April 24, 2012, at the George Walton Heritage Education Center. Sally McGlaun Baldwin, State Regent and Chairman of the Board called the meeting to order at 10:30 a.m. Other voting members present were: Virginia Lingelbach, Secretary, Margaret Cagle, Nancy Parks, Betty Jean Durshimer, Dianne Cannestra, Lanette Reid, Shelby Whitson, Billie Hunter, Jean Lenderman, Phyllis Lawson and Lynn Wright. Susan Jackson, House Manager, and non-voting members Jean Johnson, Virginia Nicholson and Maxine Maloney were also in attendance. The minutes of the January 30, 2012 meeting were approved. Mrs. Jackson was excused after giving her report.

Mrs. Baldwin extended a warm welcome and gave the invocation.

Mrs. Baldwin stated there had been a break in at the House on the Friday before Easter. The Augusta Police and Walton Rehabilitation Center Security responded to the alarm. Nothing was stolen and only a broken basement window was noted as damage. The security system will be enhanced in the basement area and in the front rooms on the first floor.

Mrs. Jackson, House Manager, gave the following report for March: total tourists: 199; income from walk in tourism \$219.50, year to date, \$457.00; scheduled tourists: 36, year to date, 57; total income from scheduled tourism, \$46.00, year to date, \$80.00; total combined income, \$265.50, year to date, \$537.50. Gift Shop sales year to date, \$140.50.

Mrs. Lingelbach read a proposed Resolution honoring Margaret Poole Cagle for her loyal 28 years of service to Meadow Garden. Mrs. Reid moved "to approve the resolution entitled "Honoring Margaret Poole Cagle." Adopted. Resolution will be submitted to the State Resolutions Committee for adoption at State Conference.

Mrs. Cannestra, Treasurer, distributed the Treasurer's report, Balance sheet, and Profit and Loss Detail, July 2011 through March 2012. The Treasurer's report showed total assets as of March 31, 2012, \$677,809,69. She noted a negative balance in the cookbook checking account due to the fact that the cookbook expenses have not as yet been recouped. Excel spread sheet of "Actual Income and Expenses Compared to Budget" was provided for review and file.

Mrs. Cagle reported that Walton Rehab has installed a bench just outside of our new gate for the use of Meadow Garden guests. Additionally, the Walton Rehabilitation Center Director has instructed their Security Staff to provide immediate response to any and all calls from Meadow Garden personnel. Mrs. Lawson moved, "that we make Walton Rehabilitation Center Security Staff a Patron-In-Kind." Adopted. New phones have been purchased and installed for the docent room and for the house manager's office upstairs. Mrs. Baldwin authorized the purchase of a new refrigerator for the Docent's room at a cost of approximately \$180 to be funded from the State Regent's project money. Mrs. Cagle presented information on the AT&T bundle system which provides unlimited long distance, call waiting, caller ID and internet. A three year contract is \$122.61 per month. Mrs. Cagle moved "that we contract for three years with AT&T for \$122.61 per month for phone/internet bundle." Adopted. Mrs. Cagle reported that the individuals cleaning the House had lost the check for last month's cleaning fee and are requesting re-issuance of the check. This month's cleaning was more extensive due to the break-in which involved broken glass, soiled bed linen, etc. An itemized listing was presented which included cleaning of the Heritage Education Center. Mrs. Cagle moved "that we approve the extra cost of cleaning the house due to the break-in in the basement and the repair of the bell rope." Adopted. Mrs. Cagle moved "that our maid service, Sue and Tommy Cox, not exceed \$100 each cleaning unless extra work is authorized not to exceed \$200." Adopted. Mrs. Cagle discussed the need for replacement of interior light bulbs, flag lights and timers for outside lighting. Mrs. Baldwin approved the replacement of bulbs with energy efficient bulbs.

Mrs. Hunter reported that since January Docent training has been slow. She stated that ten name badges were ordered from Cudos for volunteers as well as for Susan Jackson. They were \$13.00 each plus tax for a total of \$134.90. Tours are on schedule and three volunteers have been available each time for large groups.

Mrs. Nicholson reported that she had inspected the loose UV film on the windows in the main house and found that some needed to be replaced. She stated that it is impossible to determine which ones were put on by the film company and which ones she herself attached after the broken windows were replaced. In replacing the films an old bottle of window film solution was used which could have contributed to this problem. Therefore a new bottle will be purchased and the fallen films will be replaced.

Mrs. Lenderman reported that Daniel's Landscape Service has taken over and done an excellent job thus far. Herbicide has been applied where needed in the yard and beds, new pine straw added, the fig tree has been trimmed and grass seed and top soil have been applied where the old walkways were removed. Mrs. Lenderman met with Katie McAlpin, an historic landscape consultant, who has offered assistance with the plantings in the yard. She is awaiting further contact from her. A storm took down half of the cedar tree at the front of the house, which resulted in half of the weeping mulberry and a fig limb also being destroyed. After obtaining three estimates, it was determined that Big Dog Tree Service was the winning bidder. On March 30, they took down the cedar tree, trimmed up the weeping mulberry, took down the fig limb and trimmed up the other two mulberry trees. Total bill was \$1,275.00. Mr. Banks repaired the borders of two brick patios and created a brick gutter for the drive-thru gate. He also cleaned up all of the partial bricks from behind the Heritage building. Total bill was \$425.00. Our insurance company rejected the claim to cover any portion of this work. Kim Overstreet with Sacred Heart Church called last week to obtain approval to include Meadow Garden in their brochure for an upcoming Garden Tour and Festival. A new metal bench was placed in the garden with money from the State Regent's Meadow Garden Fund.

Mrs. Cannestra stated that we are paying Mike Norkus \$49.95 per month to distribute Meadow Garden brochures within the city limits of Augusta. After discussion by the Board the general consensus was that we are not getting enough tourism from this distribution to warrant the cost of continuation of this service. This service is not covered by grant money. Mrs. Lingelbach moved to "discontinue the distribution service for the Meadow Garden Brochure provided by Mike Norkus which is currently costing \$49.95 per month". Adopted. Mrs. Cannestra will write Mr. Norkus a letter to discontinue this service.

Mrs. Reid presented a resolution in tribute to Josephine (Jo) Rhodes Agostas and moved "to approve the resolution entitled "Tribute to Josephine (Jo) Rhodes Agostas." Adopted. It is noted for the record that this resolution contains the stipulation that the main entrance to Meadow Garden be known as the Jo Agostas entrance; and, that at some future date an appropriate decorative gate replace the present gate, and that said gate be installed in memory of Josephine (Jo) Rhodes Agostas. Mrs. Reid further moved "to recommend to the State Resolutions Committee any resolutions approved by this meeting of the Meadow Garden Board." Adopted.

Mrs. Baldwin scheduled the next meeting of the Meadow Garden Board for Wednesday, June 13, 2012 at 10:30 a.m. at the Heritage Education Center.

Meeting adjourned at 12:15 p.m.

Sally McGlaun Baldwin, State Regent and Chairman of the Board called the meeting to order at 10:30 a.m. Other voting members present were: Virginia Lingelbach, Secretary, Margaret Cagle, Nancy Parks, Betty Jean Durshimer, Dianne Cannestra, Shelby Whitson, Billie Hunter, Jean Lenderman, Phyllis Lawson and Lynn Wright. Susan Jackson, House Manager, and non-voting members Ida"Bea" Best Fischer, Jean Johnson, Virginia Nicholson, Maxine Maloney and State Treasurer-elect Paula Osborne, were also in attendance. The minutes of the April 24, 2012 meeting were approved.

Mrs. Baldwin extended a warm welcome and gave the invocation.

Mrs. Baldwin stated that those having keys to the Meadow Garden property should turn them in to the House Manager by the end of June.

Mrs. Jackson, House Manager, gave the following report for May: total tourists: 97, year to date 423; income from walk in tourism \$236.00, year to date, \$853.50; scheduled tourists: 15, year to date, 151; total income from scheduled tourism, \$22.00, year to date, \$197.00; total combined income, \$258.00, year to date \$1,050.50; Gift Shop sales \$128.50, year to date, \$376.50. Mrs. Jackson was excused after giving her report

Mrs. Cannestra, Treasurer, distributed the Treasurer's report, Balance sheet, and Profit and Loss Detail, July 2011 through May 2012. The Treasurer's report showed total assets as of May 12, 2012, \$677,911.45. She noted a negative balance in the cookbook checking account due to the fact that the cookbook expenses have not as yet been recouped, and a negative balance in the Administrative and Maintenance Fund. Excel spread sheet of "Actual Income and Expenses Compared to Budget" was provided for review and file. Mrs. Cannestra noted that the actual income is \$76,829.91 higher than the budgeted income. Some expenses were higher than budgeted. Increases in expenses such as insurance, office supplies, lawn service, security, etc., were beyond our control. Mrs. Cannestra stated that expenses were well below income and Meadow Garden accounts are fiscally sound.

Nicholson, Vice Chairman Meadow Garden Furnishings, Historic Preservation, reported in this capacity on many of the more significant accomplishments during the past two years. An ancient coin collection was professionally appraised, re-matted and re-framed to preserve the collection. Old quilts and linens were carefully washed and cotton batting placed between linens and mattresses in order to prevent further deterioration. Clothing items were also cleaned, ironed and stored in preservation acid-free boxes. A 1927 glass and wooden display case was refurbished and brass name plaques were attached to the individual podiums of the three Signer's. Two "Dave the Slave" jugs and two other Edgefield County pottery pieces were sold at auction in June 2011. Two 18th century French engravings were professionally cleaned and newly reframed to preserve them. A twentieth Century Persian carpet was expertly repaired, cleaned, fumigated and new padding cut to preserve the carpet underneath. Two multifaceted counters were designed and custom made for the Gift Shop. A new cash register was also purchased for the Gift Shop. 3M tinted UV film was professionally placed on all windowpanes in the house. Mrs. Nicholson expressed thanks for the help provided by so many Augusta professionals and vendors who reduced the costs for their time and expertise to benefit Meadow Garden.

Mrs. Cagle, Meadow Garden Chairman, reported that the window air conditioner in the office has to be replaced. A repairman was called who determined that the compressor was not working and three other parts are broken and replacement parts are no longer available from the manufacturer. Cost to install a new energy efficient unit of the proper size is \$4,037.00. After discussion, Mrs. Cagle moved, "that the air conditioner unit in the office be replaced at a cost of \$4,037.00, money to come from Maintenance, Money Market, and savings account." Motion adopted. Mrs. Cagle further reported the purchase of a computer desk, floor mat, safe and power strip, from the State Regent's project money. She stated that Walton Rehab had paid for walkways outside the fence at the new entrance and the employee entrance as well as installation of a bench outside of the new entrance for use of Meadow Garden guest.

Mrs. Baldwin reported that both the front and back porches have been painted with money from the State Regent's project fund.

Mrs. Lawson, Gift Shop Chairman, reported that after state conference items not needed at Meadow Garden were packed for District Workshops and given to the incoming Chairman. All jellies went back to Meadow Garden along with items donated by chapters. Susan Jackson completed an inventory of donated items which is attached to these minutes.

Mrs. Lenderman, Landscaping Chairman, reported that another metal bench has been added to the yard from the State Regent's Meadow Garden fund. The Meadow Garden Society of the C.A.R. planted in the herb garden on Sunday, May 20. The children planted while Nancy Parks and other parents weeded the beds. Tommy Cox dug up two old signs at the old entrance gate and replaced the Meadow Garden sign at the new entrance gate. The other sign was placed outside the new fence at the old entrance gate. Tommy Cox painted the sign at the front gate.

Mrs. Wright, Public Relations Chairman, reported that the magazine article about Meadow Garden which was written by Jackie Peronne has been published in the Summer 2012 issue of *Georgia Backroads* which is now available at newsstands.

Mrs. Maloney, College Hill Chapter Regent, donated a DAR table runner for use at Meadow Garden. Mrs. Baldwin graciously accepted her gift.

Standing Rules for Meadow Garden

I MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

- 1. The governing body of a Historic Site, in this instance the Meadow Garden Board, serves the public interest as it relates to Meadow Garden, and must consider itself accountable to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, as well as to Meadow Garden; members should not attempt to act in their individual capacities, but all actions should be taken as a Board, Committee, or otherwise in conformance with the Standing Rules, the Act of Incorporation, or applicable Resolutions.
- The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the three (3) Trustees as named in the Deed from the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, conveying Meadow Garden to the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution; namely, the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the State Chairman of Meadow Garden who is appointed by the State Regent; the Chapter Regents of the Augusta Chapter and the College Hill Chapter, both chapters being located in Augusta, who shall serve as Vice Chairman to the State Chairman of Meadow Garden; the State Treasurer; two Honorary State Regents; and six of the chairmen of Meadow Garden Committees, as appointed by the State Regent.
- 3. No Georgia Daughter shall serve in the same Meadow Garden Chairmanship more than three (3) consecutive terms.
- 4. In addition to the six appointments to the Board which are made by the State Regent, she shall appoint two (2) Honorary State Regents.
- The State Second Vice Regent shall serve as ex-officio member of the Meadow Garden Board, being given the privilege of the floor without a vote.
- The State Regent shall serve as Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board, and the State First Vice Regent shall serve as Secretary of the Meadow Garden Board.
- 7. The Meadow Garden Board shall met a minimum of three (3) times each year; namely, preceding State Board of Management meeting, preceding annual State Conference and following Continental Congress, and at such other times as deemed necessary by the Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board. At least one (1) meeting of the Board shall be held at Meadow Garden each year. The Board may vote by teleconference, fax or email, if necessary.
- 8. The Meadow Garden Board shall have jurisdiction over the operation, maintenance and work of Meadow Garden and shall be the authority for Meadow Garden as long as such authority is not in conflict with the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, the Act of Incorporation for the Georgia State Society, Resolutions adopted by the Georgia State Society and/or directions which from time to time may be approved by action of the Georgia State Society assembled at its annual State Conference.
- The Meadow Garden Board shall supervise the placing of all insurance to cover the grounds and the Historic House and its contents, including the fine arts, with accredited companies – coverage to include fire, theft and liability.
- 10. Five (5) voting members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.
- 11. Minutes shall be kept of each meeting and a copy shall be sent to each member and printed verbatim in the State Proceedings.

- 12. All expenses for maintenance, operation and purchases of furnishings and plantings shall be authorized by the State Regent, as Chairman of the Board, and paid by the State Treasurer. Expenditures exceeding \$1,000.00 must have the majority approval of the Board.
- 13. These rules will be binding on the actions of the Board in their operation of Meadow Garden. They may be changed by the following procedure: Members of the Board must have written notification of proposed changes one month prior to the next meeting of the Board; a two-thirds vote of the Board and approval of the State Conference are necessary to effect a change.
- 14. The State Regent shall appoint a Meadow Garden Advisory Board, which would act in an advisory capacity only and be composed of no more than fifteen (15) members representing various areas of expertise.

II OPERATIONS

- Everyone entering Meadow Garden will be requested to sign the Register, including date, time of arrival and time of departure.
- No more than fifteen (15) people with each Docent are to be on tour in the house at a given time. Excess of this number may wait in the reception room or in the garden. The House Manager has the authority to enforce the Meadow Garden rules at all times.
- There will be no smoking on Meadow Garden property.
- 4. No refreshments are to be served in or taken into the Historic House by visitors, including chapters or the public. Should a group, such as a visiting chapter, desire refreshments, the garden is available for use if litter is properly disposed of by the serving group.
- 5. Tour visitors will be asked to pay a fee as set by the Board.
- 6. In August 2006 Dixie Lock and Safe, Inc., installed new locks and keys were made which cannot be duplicated. The State Regent, State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Manager by the direction of one of the two above, are authorized to have new keys made for Meadow Garden.

There shall be two (2) complete sets of keys to Meadow Garden, which are eight (8) keys per set. There shall be four (4) sets of keys comprised of three (3) keys per set, which are the back door key to the historic house, the key to the George Walton Heritage Education Center, and the gate key. There shall be one (1) set of keys for "house" use, which are three (3) keys, one for the kitchen, one for the exterior bath at the historic house, and one for the interior door between the dining room and the old gift shop area. These three (3) "house" keys shall be kept in the old gift shop area for accessibility to all for use on a daily basis. There shall be one (1) gate key assigned to the landscape service company.

Keys are lettered per door of entry: Key # A is to the deadbolt of the three (3) doors of the George Walton Heritage Education Center; Key # B is to the deadbolt lock on the back door of the historic house; Key # C is to the gate; Key # D is to the Stribling Room in the George Walton Heritage Education Center; Key # E is to the kitchen; Key # F is to the deadbolt for the exterior bath at the historic house; Key # G is to the interior door between the dining room and the old gift shop; Key # H is to the office upstairs in the historic house.

<u>Keys are numbered</u> and assigned according to the appointed position on the Meadow Garden Board or as designated. Keys are distributed to the assigned person when they sign a "Meadow Garden Key Distribution Form." When this assigned person leaves her current position, she returns the keys and signs the same form she had signed when she accepted the keys. Keys go with the appointed position not the person.

<u>Distribution of the keys</u>: Key # 1 to State Regent, Chairman of Meadow Garden Board (complete set of 8 keys); Key # 2 to Meadow Garden Manager (complete set of 8 keys); Key # 3 to Chairman of Meadow Garden (keys A, B, C); Key # 4 to Docents Chairman (keys A, B, C); Key # 5 to Landscaping Chairman (keys A, B, C); Key # 6 for General Docent use (keys A, B, C) – to be checked "out" and "in" when used; Key # 7 are "house" keys (keys E, F, G); Key # 8 to landscape service (key C).

III VOLUNTEERS AND DOCENTS

- Docents, shall be those well screened and trained volunteers who will serve under the direct supervision of a Meadow Garden Chairman and/or the House Manager.
- Duties of docents shall include acting as guides, hostesses, working in gift shop, working in yard, cleaning in house, public relations. No volunteer work at or for Meadow Garden shall be done except under the direct guidance of the Meadow Garden Board and the chairman of the specific committee for that particular function.
- Cleaning or yard work volunteers shall be under the direction of the House Manager.

IV FURNISHINGS

- Items bought or accepted for the older section of Meadow Garden must predate 1821.
- (a) the front room on the main floor, known as the Augusta Room, will be designed as an interpretive center, highlighting people, events, and memorabilia related to George Walton and to the history of Meadow Garden; (b) the back room on the main floor, formerly known as the Board Room, will be used as a gift shop; (c) the front room on the upper floor of the newer section will be furnished as a bedroom/study of the period pre-dating 1850 or be used to display historically significant items relating to Meadow Garden, Augusta and Georgia; (d) the back room on the upper floor of the newer section will be used as an office for the Meadow Garden manager and for storage and supplies for the gift shop.
- Reproductions may be used only when the physical condition of the antiques is jeopardized by exposure in areas where large numbers of visitors have easy access; or when environmental conditions including excessive light, dust, humidity or airborne impurities pose a threat to the preservation of originals.
- 4. Effective March 12, 1983 all items donated to Meadow Garden shall be accepted with the written condition that they become the property of Meadow

- Garden and may be used, replaced or sold at the discretion of the Meadow Garden Board only.
- 5. All items that post date 1821, with the exception of those in the six (6) rooms of the newer section and those described in Number 3 of this section, shall be replaced as soon as possible with similar items pre-dating 1821.
- 6. Once an item is placed, it shall not be moved from one location to another without permission of the Meadow Garden Chairman of Furnishings who shall report such changes to the Meadow Garden Board in a timely manner.
- Any item donated or purchased must have written documentation of appraisal.
- 8. No items and/or furnishings shall be accepted "on loan."
- 9. A file will be kept of all assets with information as to price paid or market value, date of acquisition, donor or where bought, documentation and appraisal and a description of article. One file will be kept in the reception room accessible to the Docents; a duplicate file will be in the possession of the Chairman of the Board. The Meadow Garden Chairman of Furnishings shall maintain and keep current the "Past and Perfect" Program on all items and furnishings.
- All items purchased or donated will be added to the Fine Arts insurance policy. Said policy will be reviewed and updated a minimum of once a year. Major additions to furnishings will be added immediately.
- 11. Future plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the Historic House.

V LANDSCAPING

- The landscape plan adopted by the Board shall be adhered to with no deviation unless recommended by an authority on landscape design and care.
- Donations of shrubbery, plants or trees shall be accepted only when item is part of the master plan.
- Work on the grounds will be under the sole direction of the Meadow Garden Board and the Landscaping Chairman. Supervision of actual work will be provided by the Meadow Garden Chairman or the Landscaping Chairman of Meadow Garden.

VI GIFT SHOP

- 1. The Chairman of the committee will be responsible for all purchases, subject to the approval of the Board or the State Regent. The Vice Chairman shall assist the Gift Shop Chairman with sales at state functions.
- Gift Shop operations will be self-supporting. In the event funds are needed for purchases, they may be advanced from available Meadow Garden funds and must be considered a loan and shall be repaid without interest within one (1) year from date of borrowing.
- 3. Profit from the Gift Shop shall be accounted for within the State Treasurer's books, with a percentage being transferred at the discretion of the Board at the end of the fiscal year and placed in the Maintenance Account. The audit of the Gift Shop operation shall be included in the annual audit of the Georgia State Society.

VII PATRONS

- 1. Donors to the following categories are eligible to be recognized:
 - A. Meadow Garden Capital Investment Trust Fund
 - B. Furnishings
 - C. Maintenance
 - D. Landscape
 - E. Heritage Education
- Giving categories and levels for annual contributions:

This information will be publicized in the Meadow Garden brochure and other appropriate places as determined by the Board.

- 3. Chapter gifts, above the State Honor Roll requirements, automatically qualify the chapter to be recognized at an appropriate giving level determined by the categories listed in #2.
- 4. The State Treasurer will report these gifts to the Patrons Chairman.
- 5. The Patrons Chairman will issue certificates to the qualifying individuals and chapters or groups.
- 6. A permanent book will be kept on public display at Meadow Garden to record the names of those who give at the Patrons level or above.
- 7. The Patrons Chairman will enter the names of donors in the appropriate book a minimum of once a year.
- 8. The Meadow Garden Patrons book shall be divided into four parts: (1) Individuals who give a minimum of fifty dollars in one payment, and chapters, organizations, businesses or groups that give a minimum of one hundred dollars in one payment; (2) In-Kind Patrons approved by the Meadow Garden Board in recognition of outstanding and/or unusual gifts of time, talents or expertise toward the betterment of Meadow Garden; (3) Honoraria, which shall list individuals or groups honored by a Patron gift as designated in #1, such listing to show the name of honoree (Patron) and the donor; (4) Memorials of at least fifty dollars which shall list the name of the individual memorialized and the name of the donor.

VIII PLAQUES & MARKERS

 Plaques/Markers may be placed at Meadow Garden only at the discretion of the Board, and request meets the following criteria: Substantial service and/or contributions that secured the property and the heritage for the GSDAR. Individuals so recognized shall have been deceased for at least 5

- years; Plaque/Marker will be paid for by person(s) requesting such recognition.
- Such plaques will be permanently displayed at Meadow Garden and a record
 of the honoree's service and/or contribution will be recorded and placed in
 the Meadow Garden file, with Board approval.
- 3. Plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the Historic House. Additional markers shall not be permanently placed on the grounds.

Bylaws

GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II OBJECTS

The objects of this Society shall be:

- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.
- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.
- (3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of the Georgia State Society.

Article IV OFFICERS

- **Section 1.** The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian and a State Curator.
- **Section 2.** (a) To be eligible for state office, a member shall hold and have held membership in a chapter or chapters within the Georgia State Society for at least 5 years prior to her election and have served a full term as chapter officer or state chairman.
- (b) No member shall be eligible to the same state office for two (2) successive terms. A member having served more than one half of a term in a state office shall be deemed to have served a full term.
- (c) No two state officers shall be members of the same chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.
- (d) To be eligible for the office of State Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State First Vice Regent or as State Second Vice Regent or served in each of these two offices of the Georgia Society.

- (e) To be eligible for the office of State First Vice Regent or for the office of State Second Vice Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State Recording Secretary or as State Treasurer of the Georgia State Society and shall have served a full term as a Chapter Regent of a chapter in the Georgia State Society.
- **Section 3.** In recognition of valuable service to the Georgia State Society, a State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent for life by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Article V NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

- **Section 1.** (a) A candidate for state office shall request the endorsement of her chapter, taken by vote at a regular meeting of the chapter held between May and January preceding the State Conference at which state elections are held. The endorsement, signed by the Chapter Recording Secretary, shall include the office the candidate seeks and shall be received by the State Regent with the candidate's statement of intent to be a candidate prior to any announcement or campaigning by the candidate and/or her supporters.
- (b) A candidate for State Regent who wishes to present a slate of officers shall send to the State Regent in one packet the chapter endorsements and the statements of intent for each of her selected candidates. If received by the State Regent no later than December 1, these candidates shall be listed as a slate in the State Regent's Call to State Conference.
- (c) Candidates wishing to run independently of a slate, whose chapter endorsements and statements of intent are received by the State Regent no later than December 1 shall be listed as independent candidates in the State Regent's Call to State Conference.
- (d) A candidate whose chapter endorsement and statement of intent have been properly received by the State Regent may choose to announce her candidacy separate from the State Regent's Call to State Conference. Such a chapter endorsement and statement of intent shall be received by the State Regent at least ten (10) days prior to the opening of the State Conference at which the election is to take place.
- (e) A candidate who does not meet the requirements of these Bylaws shall be declared disqualified and ineligible for consideration for state office.
- (f) A chapter shall endorse no more than one chapter member for state office per election with the possible exception of candidates for State Regent and for State Corresponding Secretary.
- (g) In the event of the death, incapacitation or withdrawal of a candidate prior to the election, a replacement shall be made with notification in writing to the State Regent and accompanied by the chapter endorsement and statement of intent as directed by these Bylaws.
- **Section 2.** Nominations of candidates for all state offices shall be made at a designated meeting of the State Conference.
- **Section 3.** The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected biennially by ballot at the State Conference. A majority vote shall elect. Independent candidates shall be listed on the ballot in a separate column from those candidates presented as a slate.
- **Section 4.** The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two (2) years or until their successors are elected. Their terms of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.
- **Section 5.** (a) Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become State Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become State First Vice Regent subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. Vacancies in other state offices shall be filled by appointment of the

Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next State Board of Management meeting or State Conference, whichever shall come first.

- (b) Any state officer who is absent from the state for a continuous period of six (6) months or longer shall automatically relinquish her position as a state officer.
- **Section 6.** Upon the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Organizing Secretary General.
- **Section 7**. (a) A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot.
- (b) The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than eighteen (18) months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.
- (c) The endorsement shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent with the candidate's name and address to the Recording Secretary General to be received by the first day of the month preceding the designated Continental Congress.

Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall perform the duties prescribed in this article, and parliamentary authority adopted by the Society, and such others as the State Board of Management and the National Society may require.

Section 2. The State Regent shall:

- (a) be the chief executive officer and the official spokesman for the State Society;
- (b) have general supervision of the affairs of the State Society;
- (c) preside at all meetings of the State Conference, State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;
- (d) appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society;
 - (e) be ex-officio a member of all committees;
- (f) appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as advisor in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting;
- (g) sign all contracts and agreements made in the name of the Georgia State Society with the recorded approval of the Executive Committee and the State Board of Management or the State Conference as directed by these Bylaws;
- (h) be bonded and have the authority to draw upon funds of the State Society with the approval of the Finance Committee.
- (i) recommend to the Finance Committee a Certified Public Accountant who shall be approved by the Finance Committee.

Section 3. The State First Vice Regent shall:

- (a) perform the duties of the office of State Regent in the absence or inability of the State Regent;
 - (b) fill a vacancy in the office of State Regent;
 - (c) Perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;
- (d) serve on those committees as designated by these Bylaws and as directed by the State Regent.

Section 4. The State Second Vice Regent shall:

(a) perform the duties of the office of State First Vice Regent in the absence or inability of the State First Vice Regent;

- (b) fill a vacancy in the office of State First Vice Regent;
- (c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;
- (d) serve on committees as directed by the State Regent.

Section 5. The State Chaplain shall:

- (a) open all meetings of the State Conference and the State Board of Management with scripture reading and prayer;
- (b) preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and conduct such other religious services as may be required;
 - (c) be custodian of state properties pertaining to the duties of this office;
 - (d) be responsible for IN MEMORIAM pages in the Proceedings.

Section 6. The State Recording Secretary shall:

- (a) record the proceedings of the meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;
- (b) compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and the Proceedings Committee.
- (c) submit to the appropriate National officers, the endorsement for Vice President General and the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent by the first day of the month preceding the month of Continental Congress of the year in which said balloting was held:

Section 7. The State Corresponding Secretary shall:

- (a) conduct correspondence and send notices on behalf of the State Regent, the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as may be directed by them;
- (b) receive from the chapters the Master Questionnaires and distribute to the appropriate state chairmen.

Section 8. The State Organizing Secretary shall:

- (a) assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new chapters;
- (b) assist chapters in conjunction with appropriate state officers and chairmen in revitalization.

Section 9. The State Treasurer shall:

- (a) be bonded:
- (b) be the custodian of the funds of the State Society, placing them in institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance;
- (c) receive the state dues and State Conference registration fees from the chapters and receive all sums contributed by the chapters for state and national projects, disbursing monthly to the Treasurer General all funds designated for national projects;
 - (d) disburse other funds only when authorized by the State Regent in writing;
- (e) keep an account of all sums received or disbursed by using the basic double entry form of bookkeeping according to accepted accounting procedures and keep receipts for all transactions:
- (f) prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference, sending a copy to the State Chairman of the Finance Committee ten (10) days in advance of each meeting;
- (g) be a member of the Finance Committee and an ex-officio member of the Credentials Committee;
- (h) balance and prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year; said audit by a Certified Public Accountant, shall be performed and delivered within forty-five (45) days of receipt of books.
- (i) An internal review of the State Treasurer's records shall be performed when a change in this office occurs after the close of the fiscal year. Following the review, the records

shall be turned over to the new State Treasurer. The committee to review the books shall be composed of the State First Vice Regent, the immediate Past State Treasurer, the immediate past Finance Chairman and a current Chapter Regent appointed by the State Regent.

Section 10. The State Registrar shall:

- (a) when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution prove eligibility and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars;
 - (b) keep a correct list of all members in the state;
 - (c) report on membership to the State Conference;
 - (d) assist with the verification of the credentials;
- (e) be in possession of the computer and software owned by the Georgia State Society and see that it is maintained.

Section 11. The State Historian shall:

- (a) be in charge, within the state, of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General as well as those authorized by the Georgia State Society;
- (b) keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves within the state:
 - (c) prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General;
- (d) promote the study of American history, state and county history and historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the founding of our state and counties.

Section 12. The State Librarian shall:

- (a) serve as liaison between the Librarian General and the Georgia Chapters and disseminate general information on the NSDAR Library;
- (b) cooperate with the director of the Georgia Department of Archives and History, making the needs of the Archives known to the chapters;
- (c) collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing them wherever accepted in such libraries and Archives as may be chosen by the State Board of Management;
- (d) solicit, with the approval of the Executive Committee, contributions from the chapters for purchase of such books as requested by the office of the Librarian General, and/or the various libraries in Georgia which the State Society approves;
- (e) receive gifts of books and other printed material from the chapters to be donated to the approved libraries and Archives;
- (f) maintain a constant supply of bookplates to the NSDAR Library, the Georgia Department of Archives and History and for purchase by the chapters.
- **Section 13.** The State Curator shall: be custodian of the State portable properties and shall have them properly stored and made ready for use at state meetings.
- **Section 14.** All officers will keep a Procedure Book of Instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new officers to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. State Conference:

- a) The annual meeting of the Georgia State Society shall be known as the State Conference. It shall be for the purpose of:
 - (1) receiving reports of officers, committees and Chapter Regents;
 - (2) electing officers biennially;
 - (3) promoting programs in furtherance of the objects of the Society;

- (4) any other business that may arise:
 - i. annual budget shall be adopted,
 - ii. all projects of the State Society requiring funding shall be voted upon at State Conference or ratified by members at State Conference if previously voted upon by the State Board of Management,
 - iii. no project extending beyond the term of the presiding officer may be accepted at any meeting other than by vote at State Conference.
- (b) The State Conference will be held between February 1 and the time of the meeting of Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week;
 - (c) The State Regent shall fix the time and place of meetings;
- (d) The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credentials form to the chapters not less than sixty (60) days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 2. The voting members of the State Conference shall be:

- (a) the officers and Honorary State Regents of the State Society;
- (b) the officers and honorary officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state:
- (c) the Chapter Regent, or in her absence, the Vice Regent or alternate of each chapter;
- (d) delegates or alternates of each chapter of the state as designated by the Bylaws of the National Society for representation at Continental Congress.
- **Section 3**. Only a chapter member in good standing whose credentials have been completed in accordance with the instructions of the State Regent and the State Credentials Chairman for the State Conference and in accordance with the Standing Rules of the National Society shall be eligible to represent her chapter at state and national meetings.
- **Section 4.** A member shall have belonged to a chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the chapter, except in the case of the Regent or Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.
- **Section 5.** A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at an annual State Conference, shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.
- **Section 6.** Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the state of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.
- Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference the privilege of the floor and the right to speak shall be accorded to the State Chairmen and State Vice Chairmen. They may not vote unless they are duly registered as voters of the State Conference.
- **Section 8.** Special meetings of the State Society may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen (15) days' notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.
- **Section 9.** Forty-five (45) voting members, representing not less than twenty (20) chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

- **Section 1.** The state officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents and the Regents, or in their absence, the Vice Regents of the chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.
- Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the fall, following the October meeting of the National Board, It may meet whenever called by the

State Regent. A minimum of twenty (20) days' notice shall be given as to the time and place of any such meeting.

- **Section 3.** Thirty (30) members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.
- **Section 4.** The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference or as proscribed by these Bylaws.
- **Section 5.** State chairmen, vice chairmen, committee members of the National and Standing Committees may attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privilege of the floor and the right to speak, but shall not vote. One (1) member from each chapter may attend the meetings, if invited by the chapter regent, and shall be granted the privilege of the floor, but shall not have the right to speak or vote.
- **Section 6.** The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article IX EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

- **Section 1.** The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.
- **Section 2.** The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, shall attend the meetings, but may not vote.

Section 3. This Executive Committee shall:

- (a) perform such duties of the State Board of Management between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient;
- (b) meet at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three (3) members of the committee:
 - (c) vote by teleconference, e-mail or fax, if necessary;
- (d) receive and make recommendations for projects requiring expenditure of funds outside routine expenditures to be considered by the State Conference;
 - (e) make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.
- **Section 4.** Decisions of the Executive Committee shall be acted upon at the next meeting of the State Board of Management or at State Conference, whichever shall come first.

Article X FINANCES

- **Section 1.** (a) The fiscal year of the Georgia State Society shall be July 1 through the last day of June.
- b) The annual budget, prepared by the Finance Committee, shall cover the fiscal year and be prepared on the basis of dues payable for the calendar year beginning December first preceding.
 - (c) The Finance Committee shall propose the per capita amount and
- distribute according to the annual membership count. The per capita amount and distribution shall be indicated on the budget presented annually. Funds to be included in the per capita designations shall be Tamassee DAR School, Kate Duncan Smith DAR School, Berry College, Lucy Cook Peel Fund, McCall Genealogical Fund and Meadow Garden Maintenance.
- **Section 2.** The annual dues of chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be \$10.00 for each member of the chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1.

- **Section 3.** (a) Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the state dues, a conference registration fee of \$10.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under these Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether chapter is represented or not.
- (b) State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay a conference fee of \$10.00 at the time of registration.
- (c) Other members of the Georgia State Society who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a conference fee of \$7.00 at the time of registration.
- (d) All host chapters may charge a registration fee to those not purchasing a meal ticket to off-set the cost of hosting state/district meetings.
- **Section 4.** (a) The State Treasurer and the State Regent and such others entrusted with funds of the Georgia State Society as may be designated by the State Board of Management shall be bonded. (See Article VI, Sections 2 and 9);
- (b) The State Treasurer with the approval of the State Regent and the State Chairman of the Finance Committee shall place the funds of the Georgia State Society in financial institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage;
- (c) The placement of restricted savings funds and investment funds of the Georgia State Society shall be placed to the credit of the Georgia State Society by the State Treasurer under the direction of the Finance Committee. Monies may be invested in U. S. Treasury obligations or other interest bearing obligations of federally insured financial institutions;
- (d) The accounts of the State Treasurer shall be annually prepared for audit by a Certified Public Accountant immediately following the end of the State Society fiscal year and no later than July 15 and delivered to the CPA by that date;
- (e) Should the State Treasurer be incapacitated, the State Regent, after consultation with the Chairman of the Finance Committee and with the approval of the Executive Committee, shall appoint an Acting State Treasurer to serve until such time as the State Treasurer is able to resume her duties or a new State Treasurer is appointed and ratified as stated in Article V, Section 5 (a).
- **Section 5.** The expenses incurred by the State Regent in the performance of duty shall be paid each year from the State Dues Fund:
- (a) Five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) shall be taken each year to defray her necessary travel expenses;
- (b) Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent, as budgeted, shall be paid by the State Treasurer who shall keep all receipts of these expenses. No expenses exceeding the budgeted amount shall be paid by the State Treasurer.
- **Section 6.** At the close of the books annually, \$5,000.00 shall be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies Fund" so that at the end of each administration a total of \$10,000.00 will be reserved. This money is to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration.

Article XI COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Honorary State Regents of the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution shall function as an advisory committee to the State Regent and to the Georgia State Society.

Section 2. The State Regent shall appoint the following standing committees:

- (a) Bylaws: An Honorary State Regent shall be appointed as chairman and the committee shall be composed of two (2) other Honorary State Regents and one (1) member from each district;
- (b) Finance: This committee shall be composed of seven (7) members to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two (2)

Honorary State Regents, one (1) active chapter regent and one (1) active chapter member, who shall not be an Honorary State Regent, nor a state officer, nor a chapter regent. One of the two Honorary State Regents shall be appointed chairman. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund. This committee shall have charge of all investments of the Georgia State Society funds.

- (c) Resolutions: This committee shall be composed of all Honorary State Regents, the State Parliamentarian and three (3) chapter members;
- (d) Proceedings: This committee shall be composed of the State Recording Secretary, the immediate past State Recording Secretary, State First Vice Regent and four (4) additional Daughters, at least one of whom shall be an Honorary State Regent.
- **Section 3.** The State Regent shall appoint such other committees, standing or special, as the State Conference shall authorize and actions of the State Board of Management and of the National Society shall require. The appointments shall be concurrent with the term of the State Regent making the appointments and shall terminate with the end of the administration.
- **Section 4.** Additional appointments may be made to any of the committees and vacancies shall be filled by the State Regent with timely notification to the membership.
- **Section 5.** The duties of committees shall be such as these Bylaws, the State Conference, the State Board of Management or the National Society shall prescribe.
- **Section 6.** All chairmen will keep a Procedure Book of instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

Article XII CHAPTERS

- **Section 1.** To expedite the work of the Society, the chapters of the Georgia State Society shall be placed in geographical districts:
- (a) A chairman appointed by the State Regent shall coordinate the work of all chapters as needed; she shall be titled "Coordinator of Districts;"
- (b) Each district shall have a Director appointed by the State Regent to work as a committee under the direction and supervision of the Coordinator of Districts and the State Regent.
- **Section 2.** Chapter elections shall be held no later than April 1 in the year of chapter elections. The Chapter Regent shall report annually the names of the elected officers promptly on the form provided by the State Regent for this purpose, with copies to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, and the State Recording Secretary.
- **Section 3.** The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent, the State Recording Secretary, and the District Director at the time designated by the State Regent.

Article XIII MEADOW GARDEN

Meadow Garden, property owned by the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, shall be operated as follows:

- (a) The governing body shall be the Board of Trustees composed of the following members: the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Chairman who shall be appointed by the State Regent;
- (b) The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the following members: the State Regent who shall serve as Chairman; the State First Vice Regent who shall serve as Secretary; the Chairman of Meadow Garden; the Regents of the Augusta and College Hill

Chapters; the State Treasurer; two (2) Honorary State Regents; and the chairmen of the six (6) subcommittees appointed by the State Regent - Docents, Furnishings, Landscaping, Gift Shop, Patrons and Public Relations.

(c) The Meadow Garden Board shall operate with Standing Rules approved by the State Conference.

Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

- **Section 1**. The current edition of *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised*, shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law in matters not covered by these Bylaws.
- **Section 2.** The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

Article XV AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent, the State Parliamentarian, and the State Bylaws Chairman. The State Regent shall send a copy to each chapter, at least sixty (60) days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the Call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

Article XVI DISSOLUTION

Although the period of duration of the Georgia State Society is perpetual, if for any reason the State Society is to be dissolved or otherwise terminated, no part of the property of the Society or any of the proceeds shall be distributed to or inure to the benefit of any of the officers or members of the Society. Upon the dissolution of the Georgia State Society, assets shall be distributed by the Board of Management and/or the Executive Committee to and only to the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the local United States District Court, exclusively to such organization or organizations as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated within the meaning of section 501 (c)(3), with purposes and objectives consistent with those of the Georgia State Society.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year, a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24, 1899. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21) No Conference was held in 1911, the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912," and amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, page 211).

RESOLVED, that in honor of the State Regent, the Georgia State Society contribute one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) to the President General's Project, such fund to be debited from the State Dues unallocated Money Market Account, and the gift to be made the first year of the State Regent's term. *Proceedings*, 2008-2009.

AWARDS

All Chapters competing for awards must send reports to the respective chairmen by February 15. All reports for awards are based on membership confirmed by the National Society. SEE FIGURE BESIDE CHAPTER NAME IN CHAPTER REGENTS' DIRECTORY. The reporting year is March 1 – February 28 (leap years February 29).

BYLAWS

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National or State Bylaws, and a current copy is to be filed with the State Parliamentarian.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS

Notice of change of address of members shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, State Regent, State Corresponding Secretary, and the State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHANGE OF NAME

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, and the State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHAPTER ELECTIONS

As chapter elections are to be held before April 1, names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, 1776 D Street, NW, Washington, DC 2006-5303, the State Regent or the State Regent-Elect, the State Recording Secretary and the State Corresponding Secretary by April 1. The full Christian name of chapter officers shall be given, along with her husband's given name or initials, address, zip code, telephone number, fax and e-mail. In accordance with the National Bylaws, a Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years.

CHAPTER REPRESENTATION AT STATE AND NATIONAL MEETINGS

At the State Board of Management a chapter is represented by the Chapter Regent, or in her absence by the First Vice Regent, and one non-voting member, if invited by the Chapter Regent.

The voting representation of each chapter at State Conference and Continental Congress shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received in the Office of the Treasurer General by December 1. Membership 12-19: Regent only; 20-49: Regent + 1 delegate = 2 votes; 50-99: Regent + 2 delegates = 3 votes; 100-149: Regent + 3 delegates = 4 votes; 150-199: Regent + 4 delegates = 5 votes; 200-249: Regent + 5 delegates = 6 votes; 250-299: Regent + 6 delegates = 7 votes. Chapters with membership of 300 and over will have an additional delegate for each additional 50 members exceeding 299.

CONFERENCE REGISTRATION

On or before December 1, each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer the state dues and a Conference Registration fee of \$10.00 per each delegate to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws. This fee is to be paid whether represented or not and is derived by recommendation of the Finance Committee to the Executive Committee. This is a requirement stated in the Georgia State Bylaws, Article X, Section 3 (a).

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the Conference Registration Fee of \$10.00 at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters, shall pay a Conference Registration Fee of \$7.00 at the time of registration.

DAR MAGAZINE

The deadline for chapter contributions to the Georgia co-op ads sent to the State Chairman, DAR Magazine is November 1. The checks are to be made payable to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR.

DATE FOR ANNUAL AUDIT

The Georgia State Society Fiscal Year is July 1 to June 30. State Bylaws, Article X, Section 1 (a). The State Treasurer should prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year. Bylaw Article VI, Section 9 (h).

DEADLINES

State Officers and Chairmen welcome chapter reports when completed. Deadline dates are given to ensure conformity for inclusion in reports to National Officers. Per National Society Bylaws, the deadline date is determined by the Federal Postal Service or other carrier, showing cancellation date and not by the date reports are received.

DECEASED MEMBERS

Deaths shall be reported promptly to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Chaplain and the State Registrar by the corresponding Chapter officer. A complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and date of death shall be furnished to the State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for the Conference Memorial Service and for State Proceedings.

DUES

Before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer sends to the State Treasurer state dues of \$10.00 per member. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the December through February Board meeting of the National Society. Before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer sends to the office of the Organizing Secretary General National dues of \$30.00 per member except Life Members, with check made payable to the Treasurer General NSDAR.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS

To insure uniformity and convenience in binding, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 11 inches, with 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches from top of page, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 inches on left side, 1 inch on right side and at bottom. Two copies shall be sent to the State Chairman of Genealogical Records. The booklet, "Instructions for Copying Source Records and Their Preparation for Library Use," should be obtained from the Corresponding Secretary General.

GEORGIA HOSPITALITY FUND

WHEREAS, the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds a social event in Washington during Continental Congress which necessitates expenditures for decorations and a maximum of sixteen (16) guests (to include one representative per DAR School) invited by the Georgia Society:

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, the budgeted amount to be determined by the Finance Committee, to be used for the above purposes; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this fund shall not be cumulative. *Proceedings* 1955, amended 2001, 2009 and 2011.

INFORMATION FOR CHAPTER REGENTS

All letters received by Chapter Regents relating to the work of the Society shall be distributed to the corresponding Chapter officer or chairman and brought to the attention of the members at a chapter meeting.

INFORMATION FOR STATE OFFICERS AND STATE CHAIRMEN

State Officers and State Chairmen shall send to the State Regent and the State Treasurer a copy of any letters mailed to chapters.

MEADOW GARDEN

RESOLVED, that it is the judgment of the Executive Board that announcements for State Regent should not be made...earlier than three months prior to the meeting of the Conference and they shall be furnished to the press for publication.

Follow the format as seen in Reports of State Officers and State Chairmen in the Proceedings. Margins should be 1/2 inches from the top of page, 1 1/2 inches from left side, 1 inch from right side, and 1 inch from bottom of page. Chapter Regents should exclude NSDAR Chapter Achievement Award and State Honor Roll, as these will be added when confirmed. Your name should be consistent with the lists of Chapter Regents and State Chairmen as found in this *Proceedings*. Winners of awards and awards to be offered shall each be listed on separate sheets identified with the title of the committee and the award. Reports and awards to be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary by the following deadlines: Chapter Regents by February 1; State Officers and State Chairmen by March 1.

Evelyn Sears Waite Scholarship - (\$11,740.00) Established at Tamassee DAR School, this scholarship honors Mrs. Arthur H. Waite (Evelyn Sears Waite), Past Vice President General and Honorary State Regent.
