EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETINGS

May 5, 2012

The inaugural meeting of the Executive Committee of the Lingelbach Administration was held at the Augusta Marriott Hotel & Suites, Augusta, GA, on May 5, 2012. Those present were Virginia Grace Lingelbach, State Regent-elect; Ida "Bea" Best Fischer, First Vice Regent-elect; Joyce Ball Patton, Second Vice Regent; Brenda Davison Jessel, Chaplain; Rebecca "Becky" Malone West, Recording Secretary; Catherine "Cathy" Derst Miller, Corresponding Secretary; Julia "Julie" Brooks Prince, Organizing Secretary; Paula Hannah Osborne, Treasurer; Diane "Dee" McCranie Redkevitch, Registrar; Dianne Brown Cannestra, Historian; Carol Goff Russell, Librarian; Any Pittman Lawson, Curator; and Melodye G. Brown, Parliamentarian.

Mrs. Lingelbach called the meeting to order at 12:15 PM. Mrs. Jessel offered an opening prayer. Mrs. Lingelbach welcomed the members of the Committee and thanked each for agreeing to serve in the Lingelbach Administration.

Mrs. Lingelbach presented each Committee member with several gifts: an evening bag fashioned from drapery formerly hanging in Constitution Hall, a decorative silver box, and a GSSDAR State Officer's name badge. Afterwards, she circulated her State Regent's Project pin, a circle enclosing a silver gift box, reflecting the State Regent's theme: "Find your gift and use it for God, Home and Country." The pin, created by Pamela Wright, will go on sale at the State Regent's tea in July for \$25 each.

The State Regent distributed folders to each officer. She asked all members of the Committee to adhere to a confidentiality policy in regard to all discussions that occur during Committee meetings.

Mrs. Lingelbach discussed the three areas that her Administration will focus on: DAR schools and DAR-approved schools, Meadow Garden projects, and restoration of the chandeliers in the NSDAR Library. She spoke about the change in the funding policy regarding DAR schools. She will be writing to the Hightower family regarding the Hightower Award, hoping that she will be able to implement changes in the requirements for the award. At Meadow Garden, she wishes to concentrate on conserving fragile textiles and prints, upgrading the Docents' Restroom, and purchasing a hot water heater.

She noted the dates for District Workshops: Aug. 15, District 4 at Pine Mountain; August 16, District 3 at Vidalia; August 17, District 1 at Jonesboro; and August 18, District 2 at Dacula. The dates for the 115th State Conference will be Thursday – Sunday, March 13-17, 2013, at the Waverly Hotel in Atlanta.

Mrs. Lingelbach encouraged all officers to attend the Constitution Week luncheon which will be held Sept. 22, 2012, at Ansley Golf Club in Atlanta. With the assistance of the Joseph Habersham Chapter, Charlotte Christian, State Chairman of Constitution Week, has already retained a guest speaker, Dr. Brion McClanahan.

Mrs. Miller questioned how districts will be identified during this administration, and Mrs. Lingelbach responded that they will remain Districts 1-4. Mrs. Lawson noted that the districts are still identified as NE, NW, SE and SW on the State website and this will need to be changed.

The State Regent-elect noted that invitations to serve in her administration are ready to be mailed, and she has set a deadline of May 14 for responses. She hopes

to publish her State Regent's Letter #1 by June 1 and asked the officers to send her items to be included in the letter.

Mrs. Lingelbach announced Lynn Brackey will serve as chairman of State Honor Roll. The Regent-elect has decided to discontinue some of the Meadow Garden requirements in order to assist smaller chapters in meeting State Honor Roll requirements. She is proposing an additional requirement of a donation of \$1 per member to the State Regent's Project at NSDAR (the chandeliers). Total cost of project – including the sconces – is currently unknown but is estimated at \$15,000. If for some reason all of the funds cannot be raised during this administration, Mrs. Lingelbach believes it will be agreeable to continue the project in the next administration.

Mrs. Lingelbach is planning a Georgia bus trip to Continental Congress in 2013 and 2014. The JW Marriott will be the official hotel in 2013, but in 2014 the Grand Hyatt will become the official hotel. Since the Grand Hyatt is farther away from Constitution Hall and the cost of taxis can be expensive, Mrs. Lingelbach feels Georgia Daughters might be interested in riding the Georgia bus. Peggy Freeman has agreed to serve as state chairman of Travel. There was discussion concerning streamlining the Georgia bus trip by eliminating side trips, perhaps making the experience more attractive. Mrs. Miller asked if there would be availability on the bus for individuals who did not travel to Washington aboard the Georgia bus, and Mrs. Lingelbach responded that this was one of many details that would have to be worked out.

One of the honors as a state officer is to serve as hostess in the Georgia Box during the daytime sessions, Mrs. Lingelbach stated; therefore, all officers will take a turn hosting the Georgia Box. Mrs. Fischer will be in charge of dispensing tickets to officers and will work around individual officer's schedules. Mrs. Lingelbach suggested that officers invite a state chairman to sit in the box during her corresponding national chairman's report.

Mrs. Lingelbach handed out copies of *Parliamentary Procedure, Protocol and Popular Traditions in Georgia DAR* to officers who did not have a copy and suggested they review the material in the booklet, adding that there was an extensive section on the Georgia Box in the booklet.

The State Regent-elect reminded the officers that they are responsible for hosting the Friday and Saturday night receptions in the State Regent's suite during State Conference. The State First Vice Regent will handle assignments, and all officers are responsible for refreshments and/or floral arrangements.

Concerning her official visits around the state, Mrs. Lingelbach noted the State Regent is required to visit chapters, and she plans to share information about what is happening at the National level as well as within the GSSDAR during these visits. For this reason, she does not see the need for separate forums.

Mrs. Lingelbach commented she would like to see the Georgia State Society return to the practice of showing respect for Honorary State Regents since they are our advisors.

EMembership access for additional state officers including the Chaplain and the Registrar was discussed, and Mrs. Lingelbach said that she would look into this.

The State Regent-elect expressed her desire for the officers to work as a cohesive team, adding she may ask certain officers to take on additional responsibilities if the need arises.

Mrs. Lingelbach reported on a personnel matter.

August 14, 2012

The Executive Committee of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, met August 14, 2012, at 4:00 PM in the Conference Center of the Mountain Creek Inn in Pine Mountain with Virginia Grace Lingelbach, State Regent, presiding. Others present were Ida Best Fischer, First Vice Regent; Joyce Ball Patton, Second Vice Regent; Brenda Davison Jessel, Chaplain; Rebecca Malone West, Recording Secretary; Catherine Derst Miller, Corresponding Secretary; Paula Hannah Osborne, Treasurer; Diane McCranie Redkevitch, Registrar; Dianne Brown Cannestra, Historian; Carol Goff Russell, Librarian; Amy Pittman Lawson, Curator; and Melodye G. Brown, Parliamentarian.

The State Regent called the meeting to order. Mrs. Jessel gave the Invocation. Mrs. Lingelbach welcomed the members of the Executive Committee to the meeting and thanked them for their attendance at the State Regent's Tea in Warner Robins on Saturday, July 21.

Mrs. Lingelbach reminded those in attendance of the importance of maintaining confidentiality with regard to the content of meetings of the Executive Committee.

The State Regent thanked Mrs. Miller, Mrs. Osborne, and Mrs. Lawson for accomplishing a large volume of work since taking office in May.

The State Regent read a statement for the record: "This officer has received no files or documents of any sort from the Past State Regent. I bring this up because I want it to be a matter of record and since the next State Regent is sure to come from this group, I want to state that I will only be able to pass on my files as well as those miscellaneous documents given to me by Laura Reid, Shelby Whitson, and Barbara Chastain."

Mrs. Lingelbach reported that two new chapters are being formed in Georgia. The Old Noonday Chapter will charter on August 21. Robbin Wheatley is the organizing Regent; the chapter is located in Roswell. The Apalachee Chapter will charter in October with approximately 70 members. Bonnie Lashley is the organizing Regent; the chapter is located in Bogart.

The State Regent gave an update on Honorary State Regent Dollye Wren Ward, who was taken to a hospital while attending Continental Congress. Mrs. Lingelbach reported that Mrs. Ward has been diagnosed with lung cancer and asked that members of the Executive Committee keep Mrs. Ward in their prayers. Mrs. Lingelbach further requested this information be kept in confidence until Mrs. Ward wishes to release this information.

Mrs. Lingelbach reported the First Vice Regent and the Second Vice Regent accompanied her to the office of Gov. Nathan Deal for the signing of the Constitution Week proclamation and suggested members of the Executive Committee who brought their laptops might want to check out the governor's Web site to see if photos of the event were online. Mrs. Lingelbach reminded the officers of the Constitution Week luncheon at Ansley Golf Club on Saturday, September 22 at 11:00 AM. The cost is \$38 per person. Checks should be made payable to the GSSDAR and sent to Carla Brown, State Conference and Events Treasurer.

Mrs. Lingelbach noted that as State Regent of Georgia, one of the 13 original States, she has been invited to attend the 225th Anniversary celebration of the signing of the Constitution, which will be held in Philadelphia in September. The State Regent added that receiving such an invitation was an honor.

The State Regent circulated the photos that will appear in the Georgia section of the *Daughters Newsletter* in the November/December issue.

The State Regent gave an update on arrangements for the 115th State Conference, which will be held at the Renaissance Waverly Hotel in Atlanta, March 15-17, 2013. She reported the room rate is the same as last year and the parking is free, but meal prices will be higher. State guests will be Debbie Jamison, State Regent of California; Janet Whittington, State Regent of Mississippi; and Julia Rogers, State Regent of the District of Columbia. A fourth guest, Peggy Troxell, State Regent of North Carolina, may be added. Lieutenant Colonel Jennifer Minas will be the keynote speaker.

The 116th State Conference will be held March 28-30, 2014, the site to be determined. President General Lynn Forney Young will be attending and will give the keynote address.

Mrs. Lingelbach reported that the format for Chapter Appreciation Night will be changed, and she welcomes suggestions from the state officers. The format currently being considered is to present chapter certificates and the State Regent's gift to the chapter Regents following the evening photo session. The State Regent added that Conference Chairman Helen Powell is extremely organized and well into the planning of the conference.

The Meadow Garden Board met July 16, with financial matters and the passing of a budget being the two major focus areas, Mrs. Lingelbach reported. In addition, the Board addressed the problem of wood rot on the exterior of the Heritage Education Center, which is due, in part, to the lack of gutters and poor drainage problems. The wood rot will require immediate attention. The other area to be addressed is the only restroom in the House, which could prove to be a costly undertaking since the plumbing may be original to the House. Mrs. Lingelbach stated a large portion of her State Regent's Project funds will be directed toward this second pressing need at Meadow Garden. The State Regent noted the Meadow Garden Board voted to discontinue serving home-prepared catered lunches due to liability and safety concerns.

The State Regent reported attendance slated for the four District Workshop sessions is approximately 800: District 1: 190, District 2: 250, District 3: 189, and District 4: 170. Mrs. Lingelbach felt attendance is up this year because there are four sessions, allowing members to travel to and from a workshop during the day, saving the expense of an overnight stay. Mrs. Lawson has prepared a PowerPoint presentation for the Chapter Regents' Forum, and it will cover the most important forms required for State and National reports.

Mrs. Lingelbach announced Melinda "Mindy" Tidmore Kammeyer is offering for the position of Reporter General as a member of the Young Associates at the 122nd Continental Congress. Mrs. Lingelbach encouraged the state officers to purchase all of their Young Associates items in Georgia since each state's participation is taken into consideration when National appointments are made.

The State Regent announced the Passkey for the JW Marriott hotel reservations in conjunction with the 122nd Continental Congress will open at 4:00 PM EDT on October 21.

The State Regent provided the officers with additional information regarding a Georgia Bus to Continental Congress. There will be a sign-up sheet at the Directory Sales Table at each of the four workshops.

Mrs. Lingelbach is considering an overhaul of the State Regent's Newsletter and hopes to add full-color photos of Georgia Daughters engaged in activities that reflect the objectives of the NSDAR. Such a newsletter, in her opinion, would appear in column form rather than paragraph form. She added that both Mrs. Pittman and Mrs. Thomas Wright, State Chairman of the DAR Magazine, would assist the State Corresponding Secretary in implementing the new format. Mrs. Lingelbach requested that each officer review the work of her position and, if there is a need to publicize certain information, to write an article and submit it to the State Regent as soon as possible.

The State Regent remarked that *The Membership Roll and Register of Ancestors of the Georgia State Society*, published in 1996, has been transported around the state and stored in various locations for the past eight administrations. These books have been made available at each workshop and State Board of Management meeting, and there are still 280 unsold books. Mrs. Redkevitch moved that the books be given to chapter Regents attending the 2012 workshops. Mrs. Jessel seconded the motion. The motion carried.

The State Regent reported the roof of the May Irwin Talmadge Auditorium/Gymnasium at Tamassee DAR School was damaged by a hailstorm. Prior to the storm the roof was in poor condition and will now have to be replaced. Since the damage is attributed to the hailstorm, the insurance company will pay for the major part of the replacement roof, but the GSSDAR is responsible for the \$1,650 deductible. When the damaged roof is removed, contractors will be able to determine if the roof decking was also damaged in the storm.

Mrs. Lingelbach addressed the Georgia State Endowment Fund for the Talmadge Auditorium/Gymnasium, which currently contains \$24,813.55 in an undesignated fund and \$5,702.00 in the State Regent's Project Fund. In the opinion of the State Regent, the future of this endowment fund must be addressed since NSDAR has instituted a new funding policy for all projects at DAR-sponsored schools. The GSSDAR is not in a position to act contrary to NSDAR's policy on the DAR schools, she added.

The next item on the agenda was the future of the two GSSDAR scholarships at Berry College, both of which were established in the mid-1960s. The "Edna DeLamar Kendrick Scholarship" now contains \$52,130.00 and the "Janet M. Merritt Scholarship" contains \$26,296.00. The GSSDAR has not contributed to either of these scholarships in many years. The State Regent plans to investigate the advantages of combining these into one scholarship, which will be known as "The Georgia State Scholarship." She will confer with Mr. Alexander "Whit" Whitaker, Chief of Staff at Berry College. The State Regent acknowledged that the two families involved must give their approval if the plan is to move forward.

The State Regent announced that the William Day Chapter won a National First Place at Continental Congress for their Commemorative Events report and was the only Georgia chapter to receive such an honor. Some time during Continental Congress the notebook containing the report went missing. It needs to be located and returned to the William Day Chapter.

Award certificates from Continental Congress will be given to the chapter Regents during the workshops.

First Vice Regent Ida "Bea" Fischer reported she will preside at the Chapter Regents' Night banquet at State Conference. Members of the committee associated with the event will meet August 29, 2012. Mrs. Fischer added she would be contacting each officer regarding the receptions hosted by the GSSDAR at State Conference.

Second Vice Regent Joyce Patton reported her first responsibility after assuming office was to invite representatives of the DAR-sponsored schools to attend the District Workshops. She stated that Heather Green from KDS and Jason Eller from Tamassee will attend the sessions. There will be no representative from Hindman following the death of Mike Mullins, and there will be no representative from

Crossnore following the death of Dr. Phyllis Crain. Whit Whitaker is currently working on his PhD and will be taking final exams in North Carolina this week and is therefore unable to attend the sessions.

Mrs. Patton added that KDS is requesting empty wine bottles for an art class project. Those members traveling to KDS in October should plan to transport their empty bottle to the school.

Mrs. Patton stated the major focus during her term will be encouraging Georgia Daughters to contribute to the Friends of the Schools Fund. During this year's Continental Congress the NSDAR awarded in excess of \$100,000 to the schools. Although the schools may not completely agree with the new funding policy implemented by the NSDAR, the policy will show our adherence to IRS Code 501(c)3 and will improve our position as a non-profit organization.

Chaplain Brenda Jessel is continuing the policy of sending birthday cards to GSSDAR members aged 90 and older and sending sympathy cards to the family of deceased members. Chapters should report the names of deceased members to both the Chaplain and the Office of the Chaplain General. She encourages chapters to stay in contact with members who may not be able to attend chapter meetings.

Recording Secretary Rebecca "Becky" West reported three forms had been sent to NSDAR following State Conference in May: the "Certificate of Election," the "Certificate of Endorsement" for the candidacy of Sally McGlaun Baldwin, and the "Annual Report of State Officers." At present, the State Regent and the Recording Secretary are reviewing the Motion Card to determine if any changes are warranted. If so, new cards will be printed in time for the State Board of Management in October.

Mrs. West reviewed the procedure for disseminating copies of the Executive Committee minutes. Minutes will be sent first to the State Regent for review and then to the officers. Mrs. West reminded officers that their reports for the *Proceedings* are due no later than March 1, 2013.

Corresponding Secretary Catherine "Cathy" Miller has sent out the State Regent-Elect's Letter #1 and other important correspondence from the State Regent to all state officers, Honorary State Regents, state committee chairmen, and chapter Regents via email. Hard copies were mailed to those Honorary State Regents and state chairmen who do not have email. Mrs. Miller also has compiled the State Directory, which will be available for sale at all District Workshop sessions. In addition, the Corresponding Secretary will be selling Certificates of Award and Certificates of Appreciation.

Treasurer Paula Osborne reported the Georgia State Society balance sheet summary as of August 13, 2012, is as follows: checking account balance \$46, 672.27; money market balance \$66, 726.74; certificates of deposit \$121,297.12; deposits (hotels) \$3,000.00; total assets \$237,696.13. The Meadow Garden balance sheet summary as of August 13, 2012, is as follows: checking account balance \$28,570.22; money market balance \$44,974.25; certificates of deposit \$408,117.50; petty cash \$100.00; fixed assets \$185,377.73; and total assets \$667,139.70. The Meadow Garden budget was approved by the Meadow Garden Board at the July 16, 2012, meeting. Both reports will be filed. Mrs. Osborne expressed her appreciation to both Mrs. Fischer and Mrs. Cannestra for their guidance and cooperation in the transition to a new State Treasurer.

Registrar Diane "Dee" Redkevitch has planned two Genealogy Workshops for the District Workshops sessions, one in Vidalia and one in Dacula. Since the workshops were announced, she has registered participants for the workshops and has collected money to cover the cost of the updated workshop booklet. State Volunteer Genealogist Chairman Rachel Colbert will be unable to participate following surgery;

Elizabeth "Betty" Christy, District 1 Vice Chairman of Membership, will serve as her substitute. Mrs. Redkevitch announced that the Georgia State Society has gained 299 new members from January 1 – August 13, 2012.

Historian Dianne Cannestra announced two significant changes in her areas of responsibility. First, the state award for the Outstanding Teacher of American History has been increased from \$300 to \$1,000. She expressed her hope that the increase will motivate more chapters to submit an application. The second change involves moving the deadline for the award from December 1 to October 15 in order to meet the Historian General's new deadline. Mrs. Cannestra has received two requests to place a DAR marker at the grave of a Revolutionary soldier/patriot and two requests to place a DAR marker on a member's grave.

Librarian Carol Russell reported that she visited the DAR Library and spoke to staff members during Continental Congress. She has been in communication via email with staff members as well as the Librarian General. The Archibald Bulloch Chapter has donated three books to the DAR Library: *James D. Bulloch: Secret Agent and Mastermind of the Confederate Navy; Hey, America, Your Roots Are Showing;* and *Lightkeeper's Legacy: A Personal History of Presque Isle.* She concluded her report by announcing she has Georgia State Society bookplates for sale. A packet of ffive costs \$1.00.

Curator Amy Lawson had no report relating to her duties.

Parliamentarian Melodye Brown had no report.

The State Regent reminded all in attendance of the reception hosted by the Oglethorpe Chapter to be held at the Chipley Women's Club of Pine Mountain, beginning at 6:00 PM.

Following the Benediction, the meeting was adjourned.

October 26, 2012

The Executive Committee of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, met October 26, 2012, at the Marriott Macon City Center Hotel in Macon, with Virginia Grace Lingelbach, State Regent, presiding. Others present were Ida "Bea" Best Fischer, First Vice Regent; Joyce Ball Patton, Second Vice Regent; Brenda Davison Jessel, Chaplain; Rebecca Malone West, Recording Secretary; Catherine Derst Miller, Corresponding Secretary; Julia "Julie" Prince, Organizing Secretary; Paula Hannah Osborne, Treasurer; Diane McCranie Redkevitch, Registrar; Dianne Brown Cannestra, Historian; Carol Goff Russell, Librarian; Amy Pittman Lawson, Curator; and Melodye G. Brown, Parliamentarian.

The State Regent called the meeting to order, and Mrs. Jessel gave the Invocation. Mrs. Lingelbach welcomed the members of the Executive Committee to the meeting.

In her report on the October National Board of Management meeting, the State Regent noted both the Oothcaloga and William Witcher chapters have been officially disbanded, and the Roanoke Chapter is in the process of disbanding. The Apalachee Chapter, Bogart, was confirmed with 97 members, 53 of whom are new to DAR. The GSSDAR currently stands at 111 chapters with 7,417 members. Counting members-at-large, the membership total is 7,601.

The State Regent announced a number of changes for Continental Congress in 2013. Numerous committees will meet at the JW Marriott Hotel rather than the DAR Headquarters building. There will be a Congress Banquet rather than a Congress Reception on Saturday evening. The event will be held at the Grand Hyatt Washington, which will become the official NSDAR hotel in 2014. The cost of the

banquet will be approximately \$100 per person. She drew two tables for the banquet, #21 and #32, and there are ten seats per table. State Officers and Honorary State Regents will be given priority for banquet seating and then National Chairmen. The Georgia section at this year's Continental Congress will be Section 20 on the floor. It was announced publicly that the Congress shuttle over a five-year period was subsidized in the amount of \$107,000; therefore, Mrs. Lingelbach does not expect NSDAR to resume the shuttle bus service. The 2012 Continental Congress was first one which did not run a deficit.

Mrs. Lingelbach reported a significant Chapter Achievement Award (CAA) change is being proposed. Section 1 now allows a chapter to earn 20 points if all members' dues are paid by Dec. 1. Under the new proposal, that item will be split into two parts: 20 points if all dues are paid by Dec. 1 and another 20 points if a chapter does not have any drops or resignations during the year. This will be implemented in the 2014 CAA report. In addition, Friends of Museum Exhibition in Section 5 will be dropped from the form next year.

The State Regent reported the Meadow Garden Heritage Education Center sustained a considerable amount of wood rot, extending onto the porch, which was caused by standing water and improper installation of flashing. Repairs were made, a French drain was installed, and portions of the building were painted. The total cost was approximately \$5,000. Funds for the French drain were taken from the Landscaping Fund since the area was not properly graded when the building was initially constructed. The Maintenance Fund paid for repairs, and there is a line item in the budget for painting. Renovation of the restroom is still being considered. There are 170 cookbooks remaining, and the State Regent is open to novel suggestions for marketing these books. The State Treasurer has received \$3,100 in Patrons to date. The Furnishings Chairman has been given her own key.

Mrs. Lingelbach attended Founders' Day at Tamassee DAR School and noted there is a new roof on the May Erwin Talmadge Auditorium/Gymnasium. Georgia funds on account at Tamassee are \$109,000 in an endowment fund; \$24,000 in an unrestricted fund; and \$5,000 in a restricted fund.

Mrs. Lingelbach attended Dedication Day at Kate Duncan Smith (KDS) DAR School. The current enrollment is approximately 1,300 students, 60% of whom are below the poverty level. Second Vice Regent Joyce Patton initiated the "Sole Sisters" project, which has raised \$6,430 to date. Mrs. Patton reported more than \$1,500 has been given to Tamassee, more than \$3,000 to KDS, and approximately \$1,800 to The Crossnore School, Inc.. Mrs. Lingelbach stated chapters are eligible for credit on the Chapter Achievement Award form, Sections 7 and 8, by giving gift cards through the "Sole Sisters" fund.

The State Regent noted the Georgia Bus trip is doing well, and there are only eight seats still available.

Mrs. Lingelbach stated Honorary State Regent Carolyn Hanf, chairman of the Finance Committee, will bring a motion before the Board of Management meeting to move \$1,000 into a line item called the "Friends of Pages Fund." This fund will be used to defray some costs Pages incur attending State Conference. Another motion will place "seed money" into the Junior Shoppe to allow for the purchase of new merchandise. This will be one-time transfer made with the understanding that Juniors are going to help themselves as much as possible. Any profit from tonight's dinner will also go into the Friends of Pages Fund. Mrs. Lingelbach expressed her hope that Georgia State Society clubs will also donate to the Friends of Pages Fund.

The State Regent reported Mrs. Patton and Mrs. Osborne are reviewing GSSDAR insurance policies with the goal of saving money.

The State Regent announced the schedule for the 2013 District Workshops: August 14, District 2, Apalachee Chapter hosting; August 15, District 1, Joseph Habersham Chapter hosting; August 16, Commodore Richard Dale, Thronateeska, and Chehaw chapters hosting; August 17, District 3, Sukey Hart Chapter hosting. Genealogy Workshops will be conducted in Districts 1 and 4.

Mrs. Lingelbach announced the President General will visit the 2014 State Conference, March 14-16. The location has not been determined although she noted the need to lock in dates as soon as possible. She has not heard from the President General's administrative assistant regarding the suitability of these dates for the new President General, but Mrs. Lingelbach has conferred with the state regents of other states in the eastern zone, and these dates will accommodate their scheduled conferences.

The State Regent gave information concerning the 2013 State Conference. Friday evening's events will include keynote speaker Lt. Col. Jennifer Minus, and the group "Homeland." Chapter Appreciation Night on Saturday will feature a shorter banquet session. The State Honor Roll will be announced and the DAR State Chorus, featuring a guest soloist, will perform during the Saturday evening session in the theater. Mrs. Lingelbach noted the meals at this conference will be more expensive, but she and Mrs. Osborne will speak to hotel management concerning the GSSDAR's tax-exempt status.

Mrs. Fischer passed around a sign-up sheet for food items for the State Regent's receptions at State Conference. In addition, each State Officer will be responsible for set-up on one evening and clean-up on the other. Mrs. Fischer added the Georgia Luncheon at Continental Congress in 2013 will see an increase in cost, and Mrs. Lingelbach confirmed the price will be \$55 per person.

The State Regent announced that her guests for the 2013 State Conference will be District of Columbia State Regent Julia Rogers, California State Regent Debbie Jamison, North Carolina State Regent Peggy Troxell, and an additional state regent.

Mrs. Russell brought a motion before the Executive Committee that \$500 be donated to the NSDAR Library in honor of the State Regent Virginia Grace Lingelbach for purchase of books for the Georgia shelf. Adopted.

Due to time constraints, the remaining State Officers deferred their reports until the Board of Management on the following day.

Mrs. Jessel gave the Benediction. Mrs. Lingelbach adjourned the meeting at 5:25 PM.

Mrs. Lingelbach noted the format for Chapter Appreciation Night will be changed substantially; Chapter Regents will receive a special ribbon to wear when registering as well as gifts from the State Regent when their photos are made. All Chapter Regents' reports have been posted on the state Web site in lieu of reports by the District Directors.

Mrs. Lingelbach noted there would be four guests at the State Conference: LTC Minus and three visiting state regents. She requested that each state officer serving as a hostess for a visiting dignitary escort her guest to all functions.

The State Regent gave a status report of the State Regent's Projects: The cost of restoring the DAR Library chandeliers and sconces totaled \$11,360 and has been completely funded. The Georgia State Society has funded the restoration of a complete lay light panel at a cost of \$40,000 (\$20,000 of which was a personal donation.)

Mrs. Lingelbach also reported the Georgia Bus to Continental Congress is completely full, and there is a waiting list. The State Regent noted one change which will be added: all chapters will be required to send chapter bylaws electronically to the Parliamentarian, and bylaws must contain a Dissolution clause.

The 116th State Conference is scheduled for March 14-16, 2014, at the Evergreen Conference Center, Stone Mountain, and the President General will be the GSSDAR's special guest. Accommodations have been priced at \$125/room.

The State Regent discussed the possibility of discontinuing of the publication of the hard-bound volume *History of the Georgia State Society NSDAR* and would like to bring a recommendation from the Executive Committee to the membership. Mrs. Lingelbach noted the *Proceedings* is the official record of the Georgia State Society; publication of the hard-bound volume is a duplication of information. Julie Prince moved: "that the publication of the *History of the Georgia State Society Daughters of the American Revolution* as a hard-bound edition be discontinued as it is a duplication of information." Adopted.

Brenda Jessel moved: "to install in the Meadow Garden historic house HVAC duct work in the upstairs and additional unit capacity, if needed, in order to insure consistent heat, air, and humidity control; funding through the State Regent's Project and money requested through the Finance Committee." Adopted.

The First Vice Regent, Second Vice Regent, Chaplain, Recording Secretary, and Corresponding Secretary deferred their reports until the opening business session.

Organizing Secretary Julie Prince reported the John Floyd and Roanoke chapters planned to disband. Mrs. Lingelbach will consult with Glenna Acord in the Office of the Organizing Secretary General concerning the correct procedure.

A PROCLAMATION CONSTITUTION WEEK

WHEREAS:

September 17, 2012 marks the 225th anniversary of the 1787 Constitutional Convention where the oldest written constitution in the world was drafted by the United States, thus outlining the fundamental principles by which our nation is governed; and

- WHEREAS: Our Constitution establishes six basic governing principles for our society, including popular sovereignty, the rule of law, federalism, judicial review, individual rights, and separation of powers with a system of checks and balances; and
- WHEREAS: Popular sovereignty allowed our government to be created for and by the people, while the rule of law requires that government be guided by a set of laws, rather than by any individual or single group. Federalism provides for the sharing of power between our national government and individual state governments; and
- WHEREAS: The Constitution ensures the distribution of functions and responsibilities among three separate branches and a system of checks and balances to calibrate those powers, guaranteeing individual rights and liberties against government encroachment; and
- WHEREAS: The State of Georgia became the fourth state in the Union to ratify the Constitution, signed by Georgia delegates Abraham Baldwin and William Few, on January 2, 1788. Constitution Week affords the opportunity for all citizens to learn about Georgia's role during our nation's founding; now
- THEREFORE: I, NATHAN DEAL, Governor of the State of Georgia, do hereby proclaim September 17-23, 2012 as CONSTITUTION WEEK in Georgia and September 17 as CONSTITUTION AWARENESS DAY.

In witness thereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the Executive Department to be affixed this 28th day of August in the year of our Lord two thousand twelve.

The May Erwin Talmadge Auditorium/Gymnasium has received a new roof following hail damage, funded by an insurance policy and the Georgia Endowment Fund. Mrs. Lingelbach expressed appreciation to State Corresponding Secretary Cathy Miller and her HODAR, George, for the redesign of the State Regent's newsletter, *The Georgia Daughters Quill*. Future plans are to feature broad coverage of chapters and special chapter events. Chapters were instructed to send newsworthy items for *The Quill* to their District Director.

The State Regent announced that to date Georgia Daughters have contributed a little over \$9,500 to the NSDAR Lay Light Project. The State Regent's goal of funding the restoration of a quarter panel, at a cost of \$10,000, is in sight. Mrs. Lingelbach thanked Bessie Anne Bretch, who made an individual contribution of \$20,000 toward the project, making Georgia's total contribution more than \$29,500.

The restoration of the chandeliers in the DAR Library, which the GSSDAR has agreed to fund, is in progress, and the goal is well within reach. Mrs. Lingelbach invited members to view "before" and "after" posters of one of the chandeliers which has been restored.

Mrs. Lingelbach reported on the National Board of Management meeting in October. Georgia's newest chapter, Apalachee in Bogart, was approved with Bonnell "Bonnie" Wheeler Lashley as Regent and Robin RedfearnTowns as Registrar. The chapter chartered with 98 members, 53 of whom are new DAR members. Total Georgia chapters stands at 111; total membership is over 7,400.

The State Regent resumed the chair and called for the reports of the members of the Executive Committee. **State First Vice Regent** Bea Fischer reported attending all meetings of the Meadow Garden Board and Finance Committee. She represented the State Society at a wreath-laying ceremony in Augusta for William Few, a Georgia signer of the U. S. Constitution. She attended the signing of the State of Georgia Constitution Week proclamation in the office of Gov. Nathan Deal as well as the Constitution Week luncheon in Atlanta. Plans are under way for the Georgia Luncheon during Continental Congress. The theme for the luncheon will be "Fiddle-Dee-Dee" and will be held at the JW Marriott on Friday, June 28, 2013. Tickets will be available at the 2013 State Conference at a cost of \$55 from Mrs. Fischer.

The **State Second Vice Regent and DAR Schools** Chairman, Joyce Patton, reported traveling to KDS for Dedication Day and Tamassee for Founder's Day, October 8-12. Mrs. Patton instituted the "Sole Sisters Project" to purchase gift cards to enable the purchase of new shoes and coats for students. To date she has collected \$6,525 from 225 Georgia members and chapters. Distribution was as follows: \$1527 to Tamassee, \$3072.50 to KDS, and more than \$1500 to Crossnore. While at Tamassee, Mrs. Patton met with the new CEO, Amy Twitty, who is making positive changes at the school. Mrs. Patton reminded Chapter Regents of the requirements for achieving the Hightower Award as well as points toward the Chapter

Achievement Award. The Second Vice Regent thanked the Georgia Daughters for their generous contributions to the schools.

The **State Chaplain**, Brenda Jessel, expressed appreciation to those chapters who have updated their "over 90" birthday lists. As of October 25, birthday cards have been sent to 90 Georgia Daughters. As of October 20, Mrs. Jessel has received notices of 54 deceased members. She encouraged chapter chaplains to stay in contact with members who may not be able to attend meetings.

State Recording Secretary Becky West reported she has completed the minutes of two Executive Committee meetings and the four District Workshops. Copies of the 2011-2012 *Proceedings* were being distributed at today's meeting. Chapter regents, state officers, and state chairmen were reminded of reporting deadlines. Mrs. West asked the State First Vice Regent to take the chair and then read the recommendation from the Executive Committee that \$500 be donated to the NSDAR Library in honor of Georgia State Regent Virginia Grace Lingelbach for purchase of books for the Georgia shelf. Adopted.

The State Regent resumed the chair.

Cathy Miller, **State Corresponding Secretary**, reported she had mailed or emailed *The Georgia Daughters Quill* to State Officers, Honorary State Regents, State Chairmen, and Chapter Regents. Mrs. Miller advised Chapter Regents to email the Georgia Master Questionnaire and the e-Master Questionnaire to this officer and to appropriate State Chairmen by Feb. 1, 2013. Chapter Officer Report forms should be sent to this officer, the State First Vice Regent, and to National by May 1. State directories, Certificates of Award and Certificates of Appreciation are available for purchase.

State Organizing Secretary Julie Prince expressed appreciation to Dee Redkevitch for leading their District Workshop sessions in her absence. She expressed her pleasure in the formation of the Apalachee Chapter but regretted to inform members there are several chapters which will be disbanding. She expressed optimism about the possibility of new chapters being formed. Mrs. Prince recommended that anyone interested in forming a new chapter should follow NSDAR guidelines, which can be found on the NSDAR Web site, and should inform the State Regent or this officer of her intent.

State Treasurer Paula Osborne gave the following summary of accounts for the Georgia State Society as of October 15, 2012: certificate of deposits \$121, 313.64; checking account balance \$64,237.89; money market balance \$65,401.83; deposits at hotels \$2,500.00. Total assets \$253,453,36. The summary of the Meadow Garden balance sheet as of October 15 is as follows: certificates of deposit \$408,117.50; checking account balance \$26,411.37; money market balance \$38.765.57: petty cash \$100.00: fixed assets \$232.172.22. Total Assets \$705,566.66. Mrs. Osborne reported the audit had been completed by Santini & Associates and is printed in the *Proceedings*. The tax return is being prepared by Robin R. McIntire, CPA, and will be filed by Nov.15. The Chapter Treasurer's Annual Report for 2012, Friends of DAR Schools and DAR magazine co-op monies are due by Nov. 1. Chapter dues and Conference fees are due by Dec. 1. State dues for new members approved at the October National Board of Management should be paid with the chapter's dues by Dec. 1. New members' state dues should always be paid in a timely manner and will be tracked going forward.

Dee Redkevitch, **State Registrar**, reported two genealogy workshops were held during the District Workshops, one in Vidalia (42 attendees) and one in Dacula (85 attendees). As of Oct 24, Georgia has 411 new members for a total of 7,417 chapter members. With the addition of 173 members-at-large, the total membership in

Georgia is 7,601. Mrs. Redkevitch mentioned changes in the application process and Volunteer Genealogist curriculum.

State Historian Dianne Cannestra noted two significant changes. First, the state award for the Outstanding Teacher of American History has been increased from \$300 to \$1000. Second, the deadline for applications has been moved from Dec. 1 to Oct. 15. Four applications were received by the new deadline. She noted the receipt of two requests to mark graves of Revolutionary War soldiers. At the request of the State Regent, Mrs. Cannestra, president of the Friends of the Georgia Archives and History (FOGAH), gave members a timeline of events relating to the proposed closure of the Georgia Archives. She recommended that members contact their state legislators requesting they restore the Archives' budget to its prior level. Members may also make a donation to the "Save the Archives" fund.

Carol Russell, **State Librarian**, met with NSDAR Library staff during Continental Congress to acquaint herself with the responsibilities of her office. She presented programs about the NSDAR Library to three chapters and one school. Mrs. Russell has sold four packets of bookplates. She reminded members of the NSDAR Library's "Wish List" of Georgia books.

State Curator Amy Lawson reported all State Society property is accounted for. Several items are being professionally cleaned. The lighted insignia is undergoing complete restoration and will be on display at the 2013 State Conference. Mrs. Lawson has begun a research project, investigating the history of each item in the Curator's possession. When completed, a notebook will contain a photo and synopsis of each item. As **Volunteer Information Specialist (VIS)** committee vice chairman, Mrs. Lawson has spent months training new members and updating the state Web site to reflect the Lingelbach Administration. The VIS Committee will no longer build websites for individual chapters but will offer programming assistance. The Georgia Master Questionnaire is now on the GSSDAR website. As State Chairman, Seating, Mrs. Lawson expressed thanks to Vice Chairman, Lanette Reid, Carolyn Hanf, and past chairmen.

Melodye Brown, **State Parliamentarian**, noted the answers to many procedural questions can be found in the State Bylaws, the *DAR Handbook and National Bylaws*, and the booklet *Parliamentary Procedure*, *Protocol*, *and Popular Traditions in Georgia DAR*. The newest edition of *Robert's Rules of Order* contains a section entitled "Suggestions for Inexperienced Presiding Officers."

Before the break, the State Regent announced chapters celebrating 100th anniversaries in 2012-2013: Baron DeKalb, Peter Early, Thomasville, John Benson, Colonel William Few, and William McIntosh. Those in attendance were invited to share in the celebration, and a birthday cake was provided.

Following the break, Mrs. Lingelbach announced that proceeds from the silent auction at the Junior-sponsored event Friday evening netted \$1,224 for the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund.

Shelby Whitson, Chairman, **Resolutions Committee**, presented five resolutions. The First Vice Regent took the chair, and Mrs. Whitson presented a resolution **State Projects Honoring State Regent**. **Adopted**. The State Regent resumed the chair, and Mrs. Whitson presented additional resolutions: **Support of Sally McGlaun Baldwin Candidate for the Office of Vice President General. Adopted**. **Support of Mindy Tidmore Kammeyer Candidate for National Executive Office. Adopted**. Amended resolution relating to the **Georgia Hospitality Fund**. **Adopted**. **Support of Georgia State Archives**. **Adopted**. (The resolutions in their entirety will be printed at the conclusion of the State Conference minutes.) Carolyn Hanf, Chairman, Finance Committee, read two recommendations from the committee. The first, the transfer of funds from the Money Market General Savings Account to the General Checking Account for the establishment of two funds for the Juniors to be designated as (1) Junior Sales Shoppe Purchases with the transfer of \$1,500 and (2) a "Friends of Pages Fund" with the transfer of \$1,000. This is a one-time transfer. Adopted.

The second recommendation, that \$4,000 be transferred from the Money Market Library Fund to the General Checking Account to go toward the restoration of four chandeliers and 26 sconces in the NSDAR Library that is a project of the State Society, and any excess funds be used for a project to be decided upon by the Finance Committee. Adopted. Mrs. Hanf gave her report as chairman. The budget has been completed and will be in the State Regent's Call to Conference letter.

Lingelbach called for reports from State Chairmen of NATIONAL Mrs. COMMITTEES and NATIONAL SPECIAL COMMITTEES: American Heritage -Bonnie Lashley stated this year's theme is "Invest in the Future: Creating Tomorrow's Family Heirlooms." Mrs. Lashley gave instructions for submitting entries for the various contests: Fiber Arts, Mar. 1, 2013; all other contests, Apr. 1, 2013. American History - Elsie East Clark reminded members all essays must be postmarked by Dec. 15. Members were encouraged to submit spot announcements to the media and to use them in chapter meetings. American Indians - Donna Lynne Owens reported Georgia Daughters have given generously to the DARsponsored American Indian schools, scholarships, and the Indian Youth Summer Camp program. She and the State Regent will receive a proclamation from Gov. Deal recognizing November as Native American Heritage Month in Georgia. Americanism - Robin Towns encouraged chapters to award the DAR Medal of Honor and the DAR Americanism Medal and to become involved in local naturalization ceremonies. She will offer certificates at State Conference to chapters completing work in this area. Chapter Achievement Award - Eleanor Brinson Quigley reported on several improvements to the CAA electronic form. Chapter Regents should contact Mrs. Quigley if their chapter information from National does not agree with chapter records. Community Service Award - Linda Harvey has received 12 applications for the 2013 award. She encouraged Chapter Regents to nominate a deserving individual or group, thereby placing the DAR in a positive light. Constitution Week - Charlotte Josephine Christian reported over 200 Georgia Daughters and guests attended the state luncheon. She reminded Chapter Regents to turn in their reports by the stated deadline. DAR Good Citizens - Vicki Lancaster Cobb noted the deadline for applications to the district vice chairmen is Nov. 1. Chapter Regents should refer to the CIP for additional information. DAR Magazine -Lynn Wright announced the Georgia co-op ad will be in November/December issue. Due to a rise in advertising costs, there will be only four Georgia pages. To date, 80 chapters have contributed to the ad, and the deadline is Nov. 1. DAR Museum -Catherine "Cathy" Winslett Hyer thanked members for contributions to the Museum Keepers Fund, Exhibition Fund, Adopt-an-Object Fund, and Friends of DAR Museum. Send copies of DEV-1003 forms to Mrs. Hyer for verification of gifts. DAR Scholarship - Lois Elaine Thames directed Chapter Regents to the CIP regarding scholarship requirements. DAR Service for Veterans - Marcie Fletcher reminded members that all of the information for her committee can be found in the CIP and encouraged chapters to nominate someone for one of the awards sponsored by this committee. The deadline is Dec. 1. DAR Service for Veterans, Veterans History **Project** – Therry Nash Deal, vice chairman, asked members to make interviewing

veterans a priority. The Flag of the United States of America - Tommie Elaine Shattuck recommended Chapter Regents include stories about the use of the flag in their report. Genealogical Records - Sharon Rennard Sowders spoke of the two goals of this committee. Regents were asked to invite chapter members to submit their own Bible records. The deadline is Dec. 15. The second goal is to volunteer for the "Every Name Indexing Project." Historic Preservation – Lisa Mitcham Simpson gave details about the Historic Preservation Recognition Award and the Historic Preservation Medal. Mrs. Simpson also mentioned the Historic Preservation Project Contest, which is open to all chapters. Membership - Susan "Susie" Koerner Morrison reported she has contacted all chapters and updated her records with each chapter's meeting dates, times and places. Approximately 250 referrals have come from NSDAR since July. Each Chapter Regent should impress upon the Registrar the necessity of keeping the Prospective Member Database (PMD) up to date. National Defense - Katherine "Kathy" Ward Hart is planning a special project for State Conference, a collage of Georgia Daughters who are serving or who have served in the United States armed forces. Program - Camille Redfern Baxter reminded members of the programs available at the NSDAR Web site. Mrs. Baxter also encouraged members to submit a program for consideration by the National Society, and she announced that a program entitled "Native American Indian Code Talkers," submitted by Marcie Fletcher, had been accepted by the National Society. Public Relations - Priscilla Grant Doster reminded members that only print copies of chapter newsletters will be eligible for awards, not electronic copies. Chapter Development and Revitalization Commission - Linda Reed Douglas noted the theme is "Gain-Train-Retain." The commission consists of Membership, Lineage Research, Volunteer Genealogists and the State Organizing Secretary. Commemorative Events – Becky Rostron encouraged chapters to celebrate events identified by the National Society. All reports must be postmarked by Jan. 28, 2013. DAR Project Patriot - Martha Knight noted that due to the constant changing of deployment, it has been difficult to keep addresses current on the Web site; therefore, the National Society is encouraging chapters to send "care packages" to relatives of chapter members. Insignia - Christine Andreasen Lanzing announced a contest to run January 1 - December 31, 2013. The chapter submitting the best program on DAR insignia will be awarded an enamel recognition pin. The deadline is February 1, 2014. President General's Project - Linda Rutledge Robinson reported the Lay Light Project is well under way although the completion date has not been determined. She reported 70 chapters have obtained 100% participation in the President General's Project. Special Projects Grants - Billie Jean Goodwin encouraged chapters to submit an application. Chapters should refer to the NSDAR web site for additional information. The deadline for submissions to the National Chairman is Feb.1, 2013. Volunteer Genealogists - Rachel Cole Colbert reported 13 Georgia Daughters have completed Genealogy Education Programs (GEP): six at Level I, three at Level II, and four at Level III. Chapter Regents were encouraged to nominate an outstanding volunteer genealogist by the deadline of Feb. 1, 2013. Women's Issues - Dawna Morrow Godfrey announced the Women's Issues Essay Contest is now open, and members may submit an essay in one of three categories: Women and Families, Women's Health, and Women in Careers.

Reports continued with State Chairmen of **STATE STANDING COMMITTEES** and **STATE COMMITTEES: Conference Chairman** – Helen Robertson Powell reminded members of the dates of the conference, March 14-17, 2013, at the Renaissance Waverly Hotel in Atlanta. **Cooperation of the DAR with SAR and SR** – Anna Hicks Thompson encouraged members to engage in activities with these groups and

to invite these men to DAR meetings. DAR Literature – Diane Robertson Guest has order forms available for anyone who might need supplies before State Conference. Georgia Day – Joan Smith Hutcheson reminded Georgia Daughters to file reports by the deadlines stated in the CIP. Meadow Garden - Virginia "Ginger" Ranson Nicholson reported on a number of maintenance projects undertaken during the first three months of the Lingelbach Administration. Mrs. Nicholson noted Meadow Garden will no longer be serving meals. All Meadow Garden chairmen are enthusiastic about their assignments and bring great skills to their positions. NSDAR **50 Year Club** – Louise Jester Fountain introduced the other members of the club present, Lanette Reid and Bessie Anne Bretch. Mrs. Fountain clarified the club's membership policy. Processional - Rena Morgan Setters reminded members to pack their white gloves for State Conference. Scrapbook - Christine Lanzing reminded members of the State Honor Roll requirement. She added that Mindy Wade, vice chairman, has changed the date for submitting chapter scrapbooks for judging to Friday, instead of Thursday as stated in the CIP. State Honor Roll – Lynn Brackey reminded attendees of the deadline for submitting the chapter's report. **Travel Coordinator** – Augusta Ann "Peggy" Freeman announced the Georgia Bus to Continental Congress is full, with one member on the waiting list.

Shelby Whitson, Chairman, **Resolutions,** presented the Courtesy Resolution. **Adopted.** (The resolution in its entirety will be printed at the conclusion of the State Conference minutes.) Mrs. Whitson asked the State First Vice Regent to take the chair and read a courtesy resolution expressing appreciation to State Regent Virginia Grace Lingelbach for her conscientious leadership and an excellent Board of Management meeting. **Adopted.**

The State Regent resumed the chair, and the meeting was recessed until after lunch. State Chaplain Brenda Jessel gave the Blessing.

At the conclusion of lunch, the meeting was reconvened. Members of the Junior Club modeled a number of new items for sale in the Junior Shoppe. Mrs. Lingelbach drew the winning ticket for the patriotic quilt, which was won by Jean Osteen.

The State Regent thanked the Coordinator of Districts and District Directors for their detailed planning of the Board of Management.

A PROCLAMATION

GEORGIA DAY

- WHEREAS: The State of Georgia was founded by General James Edward Oglethorpe, who received a Royal Charter for establishing a colony in honor of King George II and led 116 people from England on the *HMS Anne*, landing near present-day Savannah on February 12, 1733; and
- WHEREAS: George Walton, Button Gwinnett, and Lymon Hall each signed the Declaration of Independence on behalf of Georgia, which later became the fourth state to ratify the U.S. Constitution, on January 2, 1788; and
- WHEREAS: Since its founding 280 years ago, Georgia has grown to over 9 million people and has progressed from a rural state to a commercial, financial, and cultural center for the Southeast and nation; and
- WHEREAS: All Georgians are invited to rediscover our natural, cultural and historic wonders and sites, and to encourage people throughout our nation and the world to recognize the people, institutions, and historic events that have shaped Georgia's significant place in our country's history and global commerce; now
- THEREFORE: I, NATHAN DEAL, Governor of the State of Georgia, do hereby proclaim February 12, 2013, as GEORGIA DAY in honor of our state's 280th anniversary and call upon all Georgians to celebrate our proud and rich heritage.

In witness thereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the Executive Department to be affixed this 11th day of January in the year of our Lord two thousand thirteen.

Reports of State Officers

STATE REGENT VIRGINIA GRACE LINGELBACH

It is a joy to welcome you to the 115th State Conference of the Georgia State Society. Your State Regent is blessed by the large and enthusiastic attendance at this conference. Georgia Daughters, you have certainly shared your GIFTS of time, talent, donations, and your generous spirit as you have energetically fulfilled our mission of promoting historic preservation, education and patriotism. It has been eight and a half months since being installed as State Regent, and every day has been filled with new opportunities and challenges, lots of time on the road or in air travel, and countless hours at my computer. Four trips have been made to the Governor's office for proclamations and many, many trips to Meadow Garden in including one to receive the mayor's proclamation declaring Meadow Augusta, Garden Day in Augusta. As the Regent of one of the 13 original Colonies, this officer was proud to represent her state in Philadelphia in September at the observance of the 225th anniversary of the signing of the U. S. Constitution. But, by far, the most important and enjoyable duty of this officer has been the visits to the chapters. To date, she has visited 96 chapters. Thank you, Georgia Daughters, for your gracious hospitality and warm welcome at each of these events. If this officer has not yet visited your chapter, please extend an invitation; there is plenty of time left in this administration, and her gas card is not yet maxed out.

Our membership is at its highest with 7,406 members and 111 chapters. Our District Workshops last summer saw record-breaking attendance with close to 850 members attending four workshop sessions, and revenues from sales at these events totaled \$16,632.50, another record-breaking statistic. Our VIS Committee is the best, and notwithstanding our frustration with our computers at times, they have pulled us into the 21st century and have expedited communications, information, and reporting. For the first time, we can boast 100% eMaster Questionnaire reporting. Please visit the state Web site often for updates on what's happening in the Georgia State Society.

Your State Regent is also proud to serve on Boards at Tamassee DAR School and Kate Duncan Smith DAR School, and the Advisory Council at Crossnore. Due to a fall, hail storm in South Carolina in the the May Irwin Talmadge Gymnasium/Auditorium, which we, the Georgia Daughters sponsor, received a new roof courtesy of insurance funds, with only the deductible being funded from our And donations from the Georgia Daughters for the Marie Yochim account. Classroom Building at KDS totaled in excess of \$22,000, which were dedicated by this Officer at the school's Dedication Day last fall. Our State School Chairman's "Sole Sister" Project has topped \$8,000 in gift card donations, with cards going to KDS, Tamassee and Crossnore schools. It is with regret that this Officer reports that although Georgia Daughters were very generous to the schools with monetary donations, Georgia will not receive credit for a good portion of these funds as they were donated outside the new guidelines established by the National Society.

Your love for the Children of the American Revolution and our Juniors has been demonstrated by your donations to C.A. R. and your support of the Georgia State Society's "Friends of Pages" fund, which will be addressed during this conference. A donation to C.A.R. in the amount of \$2,000 will be made later today at the

School/Youth Luncheon. This calendar year to date, our Georgia Juniors have donated \$4,581.74 to the Helen Pouch Fund which gives support to our DAR Schools.

As you know, a primary goal of this Administration was to establish two projects under the "State Regent's Project." These two projects encompassed one project at our National Headquarters in Washington, D.C., and the other at Meadow Garden, our historic property in Augusta. The project at our National Headquarters was to restore the four beautiful chandeliers and 26 sconces in the DAR Library. These fixtures are original to the building, circa 1905. In addition, the Georgia State Society was asked to fund the restoration of one Lay Light panel at a cost of \$10,000. Your State Regent is thrilled to report that we have fulfilled these obligations and then some. In the first eight months of this Administration, the Georgia Daughters donated the full cost of the chandelier and sconce restoration project: \$11,360, and funded not one , but two Lay Light panels at a cost of \$20,000. One very generous Georgia Daughter, Bessie Ann Bretch, donated an additional \$20,000, which allows Georgia to be credited with a full \$40,000 section of Lay Lights. Thank you, Georgia Daughters, and thank you, Bessie Ann.

Georgia Daughters, ever mindful of historic preservation and our obligation to maintain our historic property here in Georgia, were equally as generous to the project of renovating the only bathroom in the historic house at Meadow Garden, which is actually on the back porch of the house. Funds and materials sufficient to renovate the bathroom, install a hot water heater, and make a few necessary modifications to the kitchen were donated. This Officer is happy to report, this project, too, has been completed and paid for. You will hear about this in detail when the House Chairman, Ginger Nicholson, reports. Again, thank you, Georgia Daughters, and a special thanks to the Joseph Habersham Chapter for their most generous donation. Your Meadow Garden Board is enthusiastic and welcomes your suggestions, ideas and, most especially, your visits to this wonderful treasure, the home of George Walton, one of Georgia's three signers – and the youngest signer – of the Declaration of Independence.

Our State Treasurer and our Finance Chairman have seen to it that our State Society remains financially stable and strong. Continued adherence to IRS requirements is mandatory, and you will hear more about this during the officer reports. Please listen to the reports of your state officers and chairmen. They have worked hard, given generously, and traveled extensively through the state to achieve the goals and objectives of this Administration.

Feedback from the members regarding our new newsletter format, *The Georgia Daughters Quill*, has been extremely positive. This new format allows chapters to publish news about their chapter that has state-wide interest, and the pictures seem to entice the members to read more. Your many compliments are appreciated and our thanks are extended to our State Corresponding Secretary for her hard work on this project.

Also of great pride to this State Regent is the chartering of a new chapter with 98 members, the revitalization of the 50-Year Club, the organization of a Georgia Bus to Continental Congress – the first such trip since 2006 – and the production of a DVD featuring the Georgia Room, Peter Tondee's Tavern in the NSDAR Museum. This DVD is the work of Cathy Hyer, Museum Chairman and is narrated by Lanette Reid. Copies of this DVD will be available to all chapters.

Your chapter reports were wonderful! They reflect chapter involvement with your community, both your local schools and our DAR Schools, our veterans,

conservation, historic preservation and, in fact, touch every area of our DAR objectives. The State Regent wishes there were time to recognize each one of you individually. You have encouraged and supported our projects and given this Officer the GIFT of your friendship, your support, and your prayers. It is an honor to serve as the 61st State Regent of Georgia, and I thank you from the bottom of my heart for this privilege and for your many kindnesses as we work together in support of God, Home and Country. Thank you, Georgia Daughters, for your love and devotion.

National Committee Reports

AMERICAN HERITAGE – Bonnell Wheeler Lashley

This chairman is pleased to report 132 programs about American Heritage were presented by 48 chapters. There were 24 Arts and Sculpture entries from six chapters, 22 Fiber Arts entries from ten chapters, six Crafts entries from five chapters, 13 Literature and Drama entries from nine chapters, and four entries for Women in the Arts. This chairman has presented the following awards: Most Outstanding Chapter Report, Most American Heritage Programs Presented, Most Contest Entries in One Category, Most Contest Entries in Multiple Categories, Best Entry Supporting Veterans, Wall Hangings – Hand-Sewn and Machine-Sewn, Quilts – Hand-Quilted and Machine-Quilted, Cross Stitch, Crochet, Embroidery, Hooked Rugs, and "Other." All winning entries in the Fiber Arts categories were forwarded to the appropriate National Vice Chairmen for judging competition. All other entries were submitted directly to the National Vice Chairman. Regents, you just may have an untapped talent within your membership. AMERICAN HISTORY – Elsie East Clark

Reports were received from 111 chapters. Chapters and individual members presented 425 American History programs, with 74 programs focusing on outstanding American women. Chapters awarded 2,116 Certificates of Participation, 204 Certificates of Award, and 112 bronze medals. AMERICAN INDIANS – Donna Lynne Owens

A total of 279 chapter members referred to the DAR Manual for Citizenship located on-line on the DAR Members' Web site. A total of 5,905 flags, 5,159 flag pins, and 7,975 flag bookmarks were distributed; 6,240 copies of the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag were distributed; and 8,400 copies of the American's Creed were distributed. Numerous awards were presented to chapters by this State Chairman for their dedication to patriotism and their outstanding work in each activity of the Americanism Committee.

CHAPTER ACHIEVEMENT AWARD - Eleanor Brinson Quigley

Final Report: 100% (111) Georgia chapters submitted Chapter Achievement Award (CAA) reports. The electronic format, eCAA, was used for all reports. This Chairman introduced the 2012S eCAA at District Workshops during Regents and Treasurers Forums, using her newly developed PowerPoint presentation. Chapters were informed of additional information via email and the GSSDAR Web site. Chapters with discrepancies or incomplete applications and chapters which had not begun the eCAA process were contacted. New Chapter Regents were contacted with more extensive help given, answering questions about committees and projects and helping Regents access eMembership and eCAA. Five chapters scored over 1.000 points: Apalachee, Atlanta, Fielding Lewis, Martha Stewart Bulloch, and Philadelphia Winn. Ninety chapters achieved Level One; 12 chapters achieved Level Two; three chapters achieved Level Three. District winners - District One: Fielding Lewis, District Two: Apalachee, District Three: Brunswick, District Four: LaGrange. Chapter scoring most points was newly organized, Apalachee. This Chairman thanks all Georgia chapters that went on-line with eCAA; State Treasurer Paula Osborne for providing chapter financial verifications; National CAA Vice Chairman SE Division, Peggy Johnson, and National Chairman LeAnn Turbyfill for their helpfulness; and State Corresponding Secretary Cathy Miller and State Regent Virginia Lingelbach for encouraging assistance.

CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION – Christine Rife Napier

This state chairman is pleased to report that 100 chapters contributed \$1,652 to C.A.R. State President Lily Garnett's project "Finishing The Fight." The Martha

Stewart Bulloch Chapter contributed \$200 and was the First Place winner. Runner-up chapters were Joseph Habersham and Suwanee Creek, each contributing \$100. Honorable Mention goes to Augusta, Cherokee, George Walton, and Oglethorpe chapters for contributing \$50 -\$100.

COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARD - Linda O. Harvey, Ph.D.

Recognizing outstanding service to the community beyond one's vocation or personal gain is the task of this committee. Randall Frost; Elijah Clarke, Terry Peeler; Fayette Starr's Mill, Sally Nelson; Governor David Emanuel-Adam Brinson, Wilber Stephens; James Stewart, Willie Barfield; James Waldrop, Debbie Ragsdale; Mary Hammond Washington, Katherine Oliver; Oglethorpe, Wendy Wecht Harding; Sandy Springs, Alec Nash; Sukey Hart, Carolyn Schomer; Vidalia, Dr. Lloyd H. The twenty-one recipients were notable in their accomplishments. What better way to show our gratitude for their gift to their communities than to bestow the NSDAR Community Service Award.

CONSTITUTION WEEK – Charlotte Josephine Christian

State Regent Virginia Lingelbach, State First Vice Regent Ida "Bea" Fischer, State Second Vice Regent Joyce Patton and this chairman met with Governor Nathan Deal for his signing of the 2012 Constitution Week proclamation. The Governor's official photographer took photos of the event, which were available on the Governor's Web site for purchase by chapters. This Chairman presented the State Regent with a framed copy of the Constitution Week proclamation at the GSSDAR Constitution Week Luncheon, September 22, 2012, at Ansley Golf Club. The keynote speaker was Dr. Brion McClanahan, professor of American history at Chattahoochee Valley Community College and author of *The Founding Fathers' Guide to the Constitution*. One hundred five chapters reported reciting the Preamble 676 times, obtained 825 proclamations, participated in 436 bell-ringing events, and 664 Constitution Week events. Georgia chapters also reported 4,852 Constitution Week kits disbursed; 733 classrooms adopted; 196 articles/editorials submitted to print media; 607 displays; 139,236 square feet of displays; and 59,871 broadcast minutes.

DAR LIBRARY – Carol Goff Russell

Eighty chapters completed the eMaster Questionnaire for this committee. A total of 9,942 items were donated to local libraries. Georgia chapters donated \$1,529 to the State Library Fund. The committee was pleased to have donated a first-edition two-volume set of books entitled *The History of Georgia, Containing Brief Sketches of the Most Remarkable Events. Up to the Present Day* by Hugh McCall (1767-1823). These books, valued at \$3,300, were presented to the First Lady of Georgia, Sandra Deal, in a ceremony at the Governor's Mansion.

DAR MAGAZINE – Marilyn Moulton Wright

One hundred three chapters submitted DAR Magazine reports. Ninety-seven chapters received Chapter Achievement Award credit by participating in the Georgia co-op ad which will allow us to have a six-page ad in the 2013 November/December issue of the *Daughters Newsletter*. The 2012 ad honored our State Regent, State

Officers, new organizing chapters Suwanee Creek Chapter and Old Noonday Chapter, State Conference Pages, and Karen Sokol, State Outstanding Junior. Philadelphia Winn Chapter had an individual half-page ad in honor of their 30thth anniversary. Seventeen chapters submitted articles to "With the Chapters." Ninetynine chapter Regents are magazine subscribers. Fifty-eight chapters met the Chapter Achievement Award requirement for subscriptions of 30% of members. The average percentage of subscribers in Georgia is 32.5%. Sixty-four chapters gave 145 gift subscriptions with Colonel William Candler giving ten. Eighty-five reporting chapters read the President General's message from the *Daughters Newsletter* at meetings. The Joseph Habersham Chapter will receive a National Certificate of Award for having the highest percentage of subscriptions at 119%.

DAR MUSEUM – Catherine Winslett Hyer

Reports were received from 103 chapters, with participation in 43% of Georgia chapters. A total of \$2,567 was reported on the MQ in donations to the DAR Museum. The Gov. David Emanuel-Adam Brinson Chapter donated two pairs of 1920s shoes in original boxes, stockings, and undergarments to the DAR Museum. Thanks are expressed to the correspondent docents who presented programs on the DAR Museum. This Chairman would like to remind the correspondent docents the annual reporting form from the NSDAR private Web site states, "two programs must be presented during an administration." Madam State Regent, thank you for authorizing the purchase of new Leviton sensors for the lights in the Georgia Room. The DAR Museum committee has written and produced a short DVD about the Georgia Period Room, Peter Tondee's Tavern. Each chapter Regent, State Officer and Honorary State Regent will receive a copy of the DVD. We should have 100% of our chapters reporting a program about the DAR Museum on the GSSDAR MQ for 2013! This Chairman thanks Vice Chairmen Judith Lillard Hughes and Anne Whipple Murphey for their service. Our committee appreciates the opportunity to serve you, Madam Regent, and the Georgia State Society.

DAR SCHOLARSHIP – Lois Elaine Thames

During 2012-2013, eighteen Georgia DAR Chapters provided scholarship funds to outstanding students in the amount of \$29,500. These scholarships were supported by individual Georgia chapters. Three chapters invited students to their meetings to receive notifications of the scholarships. In addition, a number of Georgia colleges and universities maintain DAR Loan Funds, some of which were founded as early as 1916. DAR Loan Funds are maintained by Berry College, Georgia College and State University, Middle Georgia College, University of Georgia, and Valdosta State University.

DAR SCHOOLS – Joyce Ball Patton

This State Chairman was delighted to have 100% of Georgia chapters submit their Master Questionnaire for the 2012 reporting year. Eighty-nine chapters submitted Hightower reports, and 68 earned the coveted Hightower Award. Georgia Daughters donated the largest amount of \$5 items ever, and the large vans belonging to KDS and Tamassee could not carry all the supplies back to Alabama and South Carolina. The very successful "Sole Sisters" Project raised \$8,000 and is being shared among KDS, Tamassee, and Crossnore. A total of 37,913 labels were donated along with Box Tops for Education and Coke Rewards points. Over 11,700 pounds of thrift was donated. Many chapters had special projects for the schools such as Christmas, Easter, and Halloween parties; personal gift cards; sports equipment, and evening gowns. Scholarships and many other worthy gifts were donated to the schools. Recorded monetary donations by Georgia chapters and members amounted to \$7,617 to the "Friends of the DAR Schools" and \$39,318 directly to the schools.

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERANS – Marcelaine Crockett Fletcher

Ninety-two Georgia chapters reported serving our veterans with compassion, creativity, and generosity in many ways at VA Medical Centers, nursing homes, outpatient clinics, and community events. Vice Chairmen Violette Denney, Pat Mercer, and Becky Rostron are commended for their outstanding support of this committee. Georgia had 495 adult volunteers who traveled 48,087 miles and served 13,207 hours to support veterans. Youth volunteers numbered 396 with 1,699 hours. Cash donations totaled \$22,204.16; non-cash donations totaled \$69,302.88; the combined total was \$91,507.04. Certificates of Award/Appreciation are presented in the following categories: Most Outstanding Veterans Report (3 chapters plus 3 Honorable Mention), Greatest Number of Youth Volunteers (3 chapters), Greatest Number of Youth Volunteer Hours (3 chapters), Greatest Number of Adult Volunteers (3 chapters), Greatest Number of Adult Volunteer Hours (3 chapters), Most Miles Traveled (3 chapters), Most Money Donated (3 chapters), Most Total Value of Non-Cash Donations (3 chapters), Outstanding Veteran Activities (16 chapters), and Most Veterans History Project Interviews (9 chapters). Certificates of Award and Appreciation will be listed in the Proceedings under "State Awards." It is a privilege to serve the State Regent and the Georgia State Society on such a vitally important committee for our deserving veterans.

VETERANS HISTORY PROJECT – Therry Nash Deal

Priceless veterans' stories continue to be preserved by our Georgia Daughters in collaboration with the Library of Congress. Nine chapters participated; 24 histories were recorded. This Chairman gave 14 short presentations about the project, and 250 information sheets were distributed. It is a joy to serve the Georgia State Society and National Society through this work.

CONSERVATION – Martha Wood Dykes

One hundred three chapters reported completing 181 conservation projects with 59 conservation programs presented at chapter meetings. Three hundred sixty-seven "Conservation Minutes" were reported at chapter meetings, and 357 chapter members reported having attended either Earth Day or Arbor Day activities. Recycling/composting and water conservation are very important to our members. A total of 2,9,01 members reported participation in composting and recycling activities; while 1,413 members participated in the use of rain barrels or other water conservation efforts. One hundred thirty-three members drive hybrid vehicles, 980 indicated that they work toward controlling phantom electricity, and compact fluorescent bulbs are now being used by 2,515 members. Twenty-four chapters reported planting trees in parks, cemeteries, schools, and other public areas.

DAR GOOD CITIZENS – Vicki Lancaster Cobb

DAR Good Citizens are seniors from accredited public or private high schools who exemplify the qualities of dependability, service, leadership and patriotism. Eightyone Georgia chapters sponsored 269 Good Citizens. Nineteen students were from schools participating for the first time. Forty-eight of the chapters submitted an essay for district competition. Students were recognized with receptions; luncheons; seated dessert parties; banquets; school Honors Day programs; award ceremonies at chapter meetings; and Board of Education meetings, where they were presented certificates, pins, and monetary awards. Chapters awarding \$500 or more were Colonel John McIntosh, General Daniel Newnan, George Walton, Governor David Emanuel - Adam Brinson, Martha Stewart Bulloch, Pulaski, Robert Loughridge and William Marsh. Chapters sponsoring ten or more schools were Augusta, Earl of Camden, and George Walton. Martha Stewart Bulloch contacted the most schools (16). **Best Report:** Andrew McBride. District winners were awarded \$200 each; the state winner received a certificate, pin, and check for \$425. This chairman expresses appreciation to Vice Chairmen Trudie Bilberry Pabst, Diana Allen Simmons, Sara Stone Carter, and Annette Miles Mouchet for their outstanding work. The committee is privileged to have served the State Regent and the Georgia State Society.

FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA – Tommie Elaine Shattuck

In response to the request of the National Chairman, Virginia Poffenburger, to encourage a strong patriotic feeling and respect for the Flag of the United States through chapter-sponsored activities and projects with the objective of keeping the flag flying, two chapters reported television coverage. One chapter's Flag Retirement Ceremony aired on local television on all major holidays. Three chapters reported publication of flag-related newspaper articles. Four chapters presented businesses with a total of 21 Flag certificates. Six Flag events included other DAR chapters; ten included SAR; five included C.A.R.; 32 included veterans' groups; ten included either Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, or Cub Scouts; and six events coincided with Naturalization ceremonies. These events involved 22,106 youth; 5,226 small flags; 115 Flag certificates; 4,730 copies of the U. S. Flag Code; and an additional 9,178 other pieces of Flag literature. Four Braille flags were presented. In addition, Georgia Daughters reported retiring 68 flags and presenting 16 large flags, either to chapter program speakers, to schools, or to their community. Nineteen members reported flying their flag 365 days a year while many others reported flying their flag on holidays. The Overall Best Chapter Report goes to the Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS – Sharon Rennard Sowders

Georgia Daughters from six chapters submitted records to the Genealogical Records Committee for the 2012 reporting period. These records were submitted to the DAR Library as GRC Series 1, Volume 685. Reorganization and budget cuts in the State of Georgia have created a change in procedure for distributing copies of GRC volumes to the Georgia Archives, the Washington Memorial Library and the Georgia Historical Society. The cost to bind the volumes will be the responsibility of GSSDAR, which means the donation of \$10 from chapters submitting records will now be required rather than suggested. The chapter submitting the most number of pages in 2012 is the Sequoyah Chapter. The top three indexers for the "Every Name Indexing Project" are Nancy Olsen of the General Daniel Newnan Chapter with 56,754 entries; Lynn Spratling of the Xavier Chapter with 38,698 entries; and Jane Fraser of the Joseph Habersham Chapter with 36,730 entries. Madam State Regent, it is my pleasure to serve the Georgia Daughters as State Chairman of the Genealogical Records Committee.

HISTORIC PRESERVATION – Lisa Mitcham Simpson

This Committee has four areas of focus. Forty-one chapters reported Historic Preservation activities on the Master Questionnaire. Sixty-eight programs were given

at meetings. The Historic Preservation Project Contest recognizes chapters completing projects. Many chapters reported participating in numerous projects, yet did not enter the contest. The Historic Preservation Recognition Award is presented to individuals or groups who have completed outstanding work in Historic Preservation. Three awards were approved by the National Vice Chairman. The Historic Preservation Medal is awarded to an outstanding individual's contributions over a long period of time. There were no nominations for this medal. Three Chapters submitted seven DAR chapter-owned or -maintained historic sites and properties to be included in the National database. Many chapters reported locations of properties maintained; however, they did not submit them for inclusion in the National database. Chapters reported participation in festivals, educational programs, cemetery work, graveyard surveys, historic events, decorating historic rooms and buildings, preserving monuments and buildings, grave markings, planting of historic gardens, archiving records and erecting historic markers at significant locations. Chapters gave over \$3,000 in donations toward preservation efforts.

JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS – Jennifer Whipple Whiddon

The Junior American Citizens contests are held to promote citizenship and patriotism among youth in all grades Pre-K through 12. The theme for the 2012-2013 year was "Invest in America's Future." There were many different posters submitted – all unique and wonderful, and the decision was difficult at times. All participants are congratulated for a job well done. The winning submissions will be forwarded to compete in the Southeast Division and then at the National level. Seven chapters are participating in the JAC contests: James Pittman, John Laurens, Commodore Oliver Bowen, Hawkinsville, Thomasville, Sandy Springs, and Colonel William Candler. There was a wonderful on-line documentary, "Development of a New JAC Club," an outstanding submission by the Reverend John Andrew Chapter, Laura Sherman, Chapter Chairman. A complete list of winners can be found in the "Awards" section of the *Proceedings.*

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP – Kate Sievert Cook

This Committee's purpose is to encourage Junior membership and participation and to support the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund (HPMF). To promote these goals, this Chairman has established a quarterly Juniors Newsletter and a Georgia Junior Honor Roll; individuals and chapters have responded overwhelmingly. Eighteen Chapter Outstanding Juniors and one State Outstanding Junior were recognized during the 115th State Conference, thanks to Vice-Chair Nancy Tims' efforts. Vice-Chair Karen Sokol's "remodeled" Junior Shoppe has enjoyed record profits, and provided the most pleasurable of shopping experiences during State functions. This Chairman believes she may speak for Ms. Sokol in attributing part of the Shoppe's success to the hard work and creativity of committee members Vanessa Watkins and Lisa Pittman. The Junior Membership Committee also hosted a dinner and silent auction during State Board of Management to benefit the HPMF. Lastly, ten chapters qualified for the Honor Roll by promoting Junior participation, assisting Junior fundraising projects and/or providing guilt squares to Vice-Chair Lisa Pittman as she prepares a new guilt for the 116th State Conference. This chairman expresses thanks to all Junior Membership Committee members for their dedication. Thank you, Madam State Regent, for the honor to serve you in this capacity.

LINEAGE RESEARCH – Sherrin Newsome Willis

Fifty-eight chapters submitted Lineage Research Committee reports on the Master Questionnaire. The chapters have a total of 50 Lineage Research Lookup Volunteers (LRLVs). Chapters asked the LRLV Board for assistance 49 times and asked the Lineage Research Chairman for help 23 times. Twenty-five Prospective Member Workshops were sponsored in partnership with Membership, Lineage Research, and Volunteer Genealogists committees. Several chapters reported that the Chapter Development and Revitalization Commission (CDR) chairman presented programs at chapter meetings. Other chapters used training videos, webinar videos, and conversations at district and state events to get ideas to improve chapters. Chapters conducted genealogy research workshops for DAR members and community members, used the Build an App application, conducted workshops on preparing applications for prospective members and supplemental applications, and had workshops on using online and genealogy library resources. Members attended online genealogy classes, did research at historical societies, local libraries, genealogy libraries, the NSDAR Library, and state and national archives. Members volunteered in genealogy rooms at local libraries, conducted local research for people living outside a community, worked on the Genealogy Preservation Project, assisted SAR and SR prospective members with their research and applications, and wrote a book about the chapter's DAR patriots.

MEMBERSHIP – Susan Koerner Morrison

We can be very proud of our Georgia State Society in 2012, gaining 546 new members including 71 Juniors. Our membership count January 1, 2013, was 7,336, which is a net gain of 88 members. The Appalachee Chapter in Bogart and the Old Noonday Chapter in Roswell joined our State Society in 2012. Membership statistics: 111 Chapters; 414 Prospective Members came through eMembership, with 74 becoming members; with 90 chapters reporting, 49.5% either met or exceeded their membership goals. Registrars utilized eMembership to update prospective members thus making this Membership Chairman's job much easier. Chapters who went above and beyond with their reports: Robert Loughridge for their outstanding New Member notebook; Philadelphia Winn for the Best Overall Report; Martha Stewart Bulloch for their impressive and involved Membership Committee; Atlanta Chapter for their notable Prospective Member workshop; Chestatee River for their Prospective Member Packets

and the Atlanta and Fielding Lewis chapters for adding seven new Juniors. This Chairman wishes to thank all the Registrars and Membership Committees for their dedication and hard work this past year. Madam State Regent, it is an honor and pleasure to serve this Society as Membership Chairman.

NATIONAL DEFENSE – Kathleen Ward Hart

This Chairman received reports from 100 of the 111 chapters in the state. There were 38 chapters reporting a full National Defense program, and 100 chapters reporting three-minute presentations on National Defense. Gold medals were awarded to 32 ROTC recipients by 22 chapters, bronze medals were awarded to 184 ROTC recipients by 67 chapters, and Good Citizenship Medals were awarded to 245 recipients by 50 chapters. The NSDAR ROTC Award Program received contributions from 18 chapters. Georgia chapters recognized for awarding the most Gold and Bronze Medals combined are Augusta (1st Place), Atlanta and Hightower Trail (tie for 2nd). Chapters recognized for awarding the most Good Citizenship Medals are Tomochichi (1st) and Martha Stewart Bulloch (2nd). Members from three chapters had an editorial or letter to the editor published and are therefore eligible to enter the NSDAR National Defense Contest. General Daniel Newnan Chapter receives special recognition for an innovative and worthy National Defense project benefitting the Military Doctor Veterinarian Services. Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure serving Georgia Daughters as State Chairman of the National Defense Committee.

PROGRAM COMMITTEE - Camille Redfern Baxter

The Program Library of the Office of Reporter General is a gift from the National Society to the Chapters. 111 chapters reported. Chapters used 51 programs from the Program Library, including two CDs, nine DVDs, seventeen manuscripts, and three videos. Several chapters have started DVD libraries from the Program Library for future use. Commodore Richard Dale Chapter used Program Library manuscripts for most of their programs which were presented by members. Three Georgia Daughters submitted programs which were accepted by the National Program Chairman for inclusion in the Program Library. Marcie Fletcher of the Colonel William Candler Chapter submitted a program entitled "Native American Code Talkers of World War II," and the Sequoyah Chapter has already presented Marcie's program! Celeste Johns of the Hawkinsville Chapter submitted a program entitled "A Mother and Daughter Christmas Story." Judy Hughes of the Fayette-Starr's Mill Chapter submitted two programs, one entitled "Sacagawea, the Young Woman and the Myth" and a shorter program entitled "Sacagawea and the Myth." Marcie, Judy, and Celeste will receive this State Chairman's Award for "Program Accepted to Program Library of Office of Recorder General." Congratulations and many thanks to our three Georgia Daughters for bringing honor to our great State Society!

PUBLIC RELATIONS AND MEDIA – Priscilla Grant Doster

Georgia Daughters have been very busy this year spreading the word about the good work of the Georgia State Society. This chairman received reports from 108 chapters and received additional materials from a significant number of chapters. Eighty-five chapters reported organized means of communication within chapters; email, postal mail, and telephone were the most frequent means of internal communication. Newsletters and yearbooks were mentioned as means of communicating important dates and events to chapter members; sixty-three chapters reported having a chapter newsletter. Thirty-two chapters communicate with chapter members through a

members-only Web site or other social media; twenty-nine chapters reported having a chapter brochure. Twenty-nine chapters reported television/radio/Internet announcements of DAR events. Fifteen chapters have used the "Today's DAR" video for recruitment at joint DAR/SAR events or as a training tool at an Executive Board meeting. Local events receiving the most publicity included the 225th anniversary of the U. S. Constitution, Veterans Day, Memorial Day, and Flag Day. Other events receiving coverage were commemorative events concerning the War of 1812, the Civil War, American Indian Heritage Month, and Georgia Day. One chapter presented an award to a local media professional

VOLUNTEER INFORMATION SPECIALISTS Jenny Beth Jacoby & Amy Pittman Lawson

As of January, 1, 2013, the Georgia State Society recorded 7,336 members. Chapters reported that 118 prospective members contacted them directly through their individual chapter Web sites; of those prospective members, 85 have become DAR members or have application papers pending. For the first time GSSDAR can boast 100% eMaster Questionnaire reporting. Sixty-four chapters distribute newsletters electronically. Thanks are expressed to all chapters that include VIS on their email lists throughout the year. Emembership is now routinely used by chapter regents, vice regents, treasurers, and registrars as well as state officers and state chairmen in approved access groups. Georgia Daughters logged thousands of hours on special NSDAR projects. The "VIS Volunteer of the Year" is Phyllis Jackson of the Nathaniel Macon Chapter. The "Best Electronic Newsletter" is a tie between Baron DeKalb and Chestatee River. The "Best Yearbook" award is given to the Augusta Chapter. Thanks are extended to the members of the GSSDAR VIS Committee who spend incalculable hours updating and reviewing the 100+ chapter and state Web sites: Lisa Anne Pittman, Catherine "Cathy" Winslett Hyer, Teresa Meadows Floyd, and Alice Griffith Dixon. A PROCLAMATION PEARL HARBOR REMEMBRANCE DAY

WHEREAS: On the Sunday morning of December 7, 1941, "a date which will live in infamy," the United States Navy stationed at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, was attacked without warning by the Imperial Japanese Navy; and

WHEREAS: More than 2,400 Americans died and 1,100 were wounded during the attack that marked the beginning of America's involvement in World War II; and

WHEREAS: The attack on Pearl Harbor brought the United States into a world war unlike any previous conflict. Servicemen and women, along with civilians, displayed utmost resolve and courage to win World War II, preserving freedom and liberty around the world; and

WHEREAS: Today we pause in observance of the 71st anniversary of the Attack on Pearl Harbor and remember those who perished on that day while recognizing those who are still with us. The servicemen and women who were at Pearl Harbor displayed outstanding patriotism and courage and are an inspiration to us all; now

THEREFORE: I, NATHAN DEAL, Governor of the State of Georgia, do hereby proclaim December 7, 2012, as PEARL HARBOR REMEMBRANCE DAY in Georgia and urge all citizens of our great state to take cognizance of this event and participate fittingly in its observance.

In witness thereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the Executive Department to be affixed this 6^{th} day of November in the year of our Lord two thousand twelve.



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CHIEF OF STAFF

National Special Committee Reports

CHAPTER DEVELOPMENT AND REVITALIZATION – Linda Reed Douglas

Fifty-seven chapters have participated by sending in Attendance Award forms. This chairman has had contact with leaders of ten chapters, meeting with two chapters in person. Four more visits are scheduled in the near future. Our commission members have also been busy helping chapters to gain members. This chairman wishes to thank the State Organizing Secretary, Sate Registrar, the Coordinator of Districts, and state chairmen of Membership, Volunteer Genealogists, and Lineage Research for their work in this area. Our motto, "Gain, Train, and Retain" is accomplished by using our special gifts to serve God, Home, and Country.

COMMEMORATIVE EVENTS – Rebecca Miller Rostron

This chairman received 111 reports indicating 86 chapters were involved in commemorating historic and patriotic events. Georgia Daughters participating in July 4th celebrations/parades totaled 1.227. One member participated in the ceremony at the American Cemetery in Normandy, while another was at Luxembourg laying a wreath on Gen. George Patton's grave. Daughters placed flags, placed wreaths at cemeteries, and commemorated Revolutionary War battle sites. The Andrew McBride Chapter commemorated the 71st anniversary of Pearl Harbor with an outstanding program. Daughters observed Veterans Day, Constitution Week by ringing bells, Patriots Day, President's Day, Arbor Day, DAR Founders Day, Flag Day, D-Day, Old Soldiers Day, Georgia Day, the national Day of Prayer, 100th anniversary of the sinking of the Titanic, Armed Forces Day, Labor Day, 9/11, Earth Day, Wreaths Across America, Christmas Day, Thanksgiving, Columbus Day, the Treaty of Paris, the War of 1812, Native Americans, Medal of Honor anniversary as well as birthdays of George Washington, Marguis de LaFayette, Abraham Lincoln. Many events included C.A.R. and SAR participation. 100th anniversaries included Baron DeKalb, Thomasville, and Tomochichi. Best Chapter Report: William Day, 2nd Reverend John Andrew, 3rd Chestatee River. Best Scrapbook: William Day, 2rd Andrew McBride, 3rd Martha Stewart Bulloch.

DAR GENEALOGY PRESERVATION – Glenda Hendry Carter

The goal of the Genealogy Preservation Committee is to index DAR genealogical and membership information into computerized, searchable databases. Our work assists in preserving these valuable records for posterity and significantly enhancing the application approval and membership record retrieval processes. The current project is the Supporting Documentation Project. This activity involves categorizing over six million documents used by members to support the lineage submitted on their DAR applications. Volunteers are able to work on the project at their convenience 7 days a week, 24 hours a day. This chairman received a report from NSDAR that 26 Georgia Daughters from 20 chapters faithfully entered 22,509 images into the national database. The chapter with the most volunteers is Philadelphia Winn, with four. The chapter with most images entered is Atlanta with 5,528; chapter member Yvonne Steger entered 4,995 of those images. Twenty Georgia volunteers who entered at least 100 images are being presented with a Certificate of Appreciation by this chairman. All chapters who had volunteers receiving certificates for this project will be listed in the Awards section in the Proceedings. Madam State Regent, thank you for the opportunity to serve your administration in this capacity.

DAR PROJECT PATRIOT - Martha Middlebrooks Knight

Fifty-four chapters reported donations and/or activities involving U.S. active military personnel. Ninety-three boxes/packages valued at \$5,552.65 were sent to women serving abroad. Comfort items, pillows, sweets, and magazines were sent to platoons, relatives of chapter members, and even a DAR member who delivers supplies to U.S. Army veterinarians working with Army canines in Afghanistan. Items and monetary donations valued at \$5,998.32 were sent to the Chaplain's Closet at Landstuhl, Germany, and the Warrior and Family Support Center in Texas. There was not one specific state project, but \$1,675.18 was donated by chapters to support the DAR Project Patriot Committee. Packages were sent to a Georgia deputy sheriff/reservist who was deployed to Afghanistan. Children with military parents received books specifically written for them. In addition, chapters participated in many projects including assistance to the USO, Quilts for Valor, Hearts to Heroes, Wounded Warriors, Treats for Troops, Solar Showers for Afghanistan, and Herobox (chapter provided postage for items being sent to soldiers). Other activities included an auction of chapter members' items to raise funds, collecting cell phones, and sending care packages to military service personnel in Irag, Afghanistan, El Salvador, and Kosovo. Monetary donations and/or value of these projects totaled \$11,582.45.

INSIGNIA – Christine Andreasen Lanzing

Reports were received from 102 chapters. Insignia purchases for 2012 totaled \$50,456. The largest amount reported by a chapter was \$ 3,944 by the Philadelphia Winn Chapter. Other chapters reporting purchases over \$3,000 were Archibald Bulloch and Martha Stewart Bulloch. Andrew McBride, Atlanta, Augusta, Bainbridge, Barnard Trail, Brunswick, Chestatee River, Colonel William Candler, College Hill, Edmund Burke, Fort Peachtree, General Daniel Newnan, James Waldrop, Kettle Creek, Nathaniel Macon, Oglethorpe, and Old Noonday all reported purchases over \$1,000. Members are encouraged to keep accurate records of purchases and to report what they did to promote the increased awareness of our DAR insignia. A DAR recognition pin will be awarded at the 2014 State Conference to the chapter with the best report on the Master Questionnaire.

LITERACY PROMOTION – Lynn Baldwin Briggs

Two hundred eighty-nine Georgia Daughters participated in literacy programs such as tutoring adults and children; volunteering in libraries; donating books and other reading materials to schools, libraries, veterans, active military, and senior citizen organizations; writing scripts for radio programs; writing skits for school districts; participating in reading marathons; assisting groups in securing grants; and serving on library and school advisory boards and community action teams. Over 2,000 hours were spent tutoring and promoting literacy in adults. Almost 11,000 hours were spent tutoring and promoting literacy in children. Over 8,000 books and other reading materials were donated by Georgia chapters. **Outstanding Service of a Chapter**: Colonel William Candler. **Outstanding Service of a Member**: Carolyn Jane Dickson Schomer, Sukey Hart. **Great Work of a Chapter**: Oglethorpe. **Great Work of a Member**: Linda Adams Holmes, Colonel William Candler.

PRESIDENT GENERAL'S PROJECT – Linda Rutledge Robinson

Georgia Daughters are to be commended for their generous donations to the President General's lay light project. This year 71 out of 111 chapters sent in their

reports by the deadline. Contributions to President General Wright's projects totaled \$12,787.50 in 2012. A total of 102 chapters fulfilled the \$6.00 donation requirement over a three-year period. This chairman expresses her appreciation to every chapter that donated more than the required \$6.00. Over \$1,600 of lay light merchandise was sold at the District Workshops. This chairman encourages every chapter to continue supporting future projects of our President General. It is an honor to serve the Georgia State Society as chairman of this committee.

PROTOCOL – Laura Marcella Reid

Protocol provides members guidance in proper and correct etiquette for recognizing and honoring those in leadership positions. The fundamental principles of protocol are dictated by ethics, courtesy, and common sense. The order for receiving lines, processions, and seating at DAR functions has bee prepared and revised through the years by members with knowledge of the rules and customs of the State Society and the National Society and with advice from the Protocol Division of the United States Department of State. During the year this state chairman has responded to all inquiries addressed to her. Madam State Regent, it is an honor and a pleasure to serve the Georgia Daughters under your capable and gracious leadership.

SPECIAL PROJECTS GRANTS – Billie Jean Goodwin

Five chapters sponsored organizations in applying for grants during 2012. The College Hill Chapter sponsored the application of the Augusta Genealogical Society, Inc., for \$8,500 to replace single-pane un-insulated windows and repair moisture-damaged walls. The Captain John Wilson Chapter sponsored the application of the McDuffie Museum, Inc., for \$2,734 for a professional recording system for an oral history program. The Chestatee River Chapter sponsored the application of the Colonel Hiram Parks Bell Southern History and Genealogical Research Center, Inc., for \$5,000 to purchase the L.P. Thomas Collection. The Hightower Trail Chapter sponsored the application of Reinhardt University for \$20,000 for the Funk Heritage Center's hickory log-cabin project. The Levi Sapp Chapter sponsored the application of the Midway Museum, Inc., for \$6,000 for water damage repairs to the library.

VOLUNTEER GENEALOGISTS – Rachel Cole Colbert

One hundred and eleven chapters used the eMQ, with 57 chapters reporting Volunteer Genealogist activities. The Georgia State Society has 121 NSDAR-trained Volunteer Genealogists; Fielding Lewis Chapter has the most, with 16. In 2012, 16 Georgia State Society members completed GEP I, 11 members completed GEP II, and four members completed GEP III. Various chapters presented a total of 41 genealogy workshops, with 27 of those led by trained Volunteer Genealogists. Attendance at these workshops totaled 642. One hundred forty members attended non-DAR sponsored workshops and classes. Marguerite Dyal of the Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter is Georgia's Outstanding Volunteer Genealogist; she received her award at the 2013 State Conference.

WOMEN'S ISSUES – Dawna Morrow Godfrey

More than half of Georgia chapters reported participation in the area of Women's Issues with a state total of 144 Women's Issues programs. Fifty-two chapters included Women's Issues articles in their newsletters, and many reported having a "Women's Issues Minute" at their meetings. The most popular Women's Issues programs were on Breast Cancer Awareness (31), Heart Health (26), Disease

Prevention through Prescreening (21), Legal Issues for Women (22), Women in History, Women Veterans, and the 75th anniversary of Women's Suffrage (21). One Georgia Daughter gave \$250,000 to complete a shelter for women veterans; one Georgia Daughter provided disaster relief for victims of Hurricane Sandy by assisting in feeding over 6,000 people per day for eight days. Another knitted 500 caps for premature babies for a local hospital. One chapter reported over 7,000 volunteer hours in their community. Another chapter raised \$2,000 for Relay for Life. One chapter collected 19 pounds of aluminum pull tabs for the Ronald McDonald House and also volunteered to design a meditation garden there. Thirteen Women's Issues essays were submitted this year representing 12 Chapters. This chairman is honored to serve in this capacity and proud of all Georgia Daughters for their generosity and volunteerism.

The Finance Committee met on September 20, 2012, before the October State Board of Management meeting to allow time to discuss finances and prepare the proposed budget for 2013-2014. All members were present and recommendations were made to be voted on at the State Board of Management (see Finance Committee minutes). The proposed budget for 2013-2014 was adopted as presented at State Conference held at the Renaissance Atlanta Waverly Hotel on March 16, 2013.

MINUTES

September 20, 2012

The Finance Committee met on Thursday, September 20, 2012, at the home of Betty Harrah in Fayetteville, with Chairman Carolyn Hanf presiding. The meeting was called to order at 10:45 a.m. with the Chairman offering an Invocation. Members present: Bea Fischer, Paula Osborne, Marjorie Garner, Trudy Alexander, and Betty Harrah. Also present was the State Regent, Virginia Lingelbach. Mrs. Hanf thanked those attending and expressed appreciation to Mrs. Osborne for help in preparing the proposed 2013-2014 Budget.

Mrs. Fischer read the minutes of the May 2, 2012, meeting that were approved by the previous Finance Committee. The State Treasurer presented reports with explanations. The Georgia State Society as of September 10, 2012, has a total of \$121,297.12 in Certificates of Deposit, \$56,868.21 in Checking Accounts, and \$66,743.20 in Money Market Accounts for a Total of \$244,908.53 in Current Assets. Hotel/Events deposits \$3,000.00 for a total in Assets of \$247,908.53. Meadow Garden \$408,117.50 in Certificates of Deposit, \$28,430.41 in Checking Accounts, \$40,958.49 in Money Market Accounts, \$100.00 in Petty Cash for a total Current Assets \$477,606.40, \$232,172.22 in Fixed Assets for Total Assets of \$709,778.62.

After review and discussion, a motion was made to move \$849.05 from the Georgia State Society Money Market Undesignated Funds to the Continental Congress Georgia Luncheon Checking Account. **Motion Adopted.** Copies of the 2012-2013 Budget and copies of a Proposed Budget for 2013-2014, one of which had explanations, were presented. After review, discussion, and a few minor

adjustments, a motion was made and seconded to accept the 2013-2014 Proposed Budget. **Motion Adopted.** The Proposed Budget for 2013-2014 will be included in the State Regent's Call to Conference to be presented for vote at State Conference.

There was a discussion that due to increases in travel cost and requirements in the State Regent's travel obligations that the 2014-2015 budgeted amount may need to be increased.

Motion was made to recommend to the Board of Management the transfer of funds from the Georgia State Society Money Market General Savings Account to the General Checking Account for the establishment of two funds for the Juniors to be designated as: 1) Junior Sales Shoppe purchases with the transfer of \$1,500, and 2)"Friends of Pages Fund" with the transfer of \$1,000. **Motion Adopted.** Motion made to recommend to Board of Management that \$4,000. be transferred from the Money Market Library Fund to the General Checking Account to go toward the restoration of four chandeliers and 26 sconces in the NSDAR Library that is a project of the State Society, and any excess funds be for a project to be decided by the Finance Committee. **Motion Adopted.**

Motion made to recommend to the Bylaws Committee to set up Standing Rules, selecting from Items of Information and Resolutions dealing with finances. **Motion Adopted.**

Motion was made to send a recommendation to the Bylaws Committee to make a Ruling that if the State Regent invites more guests to Congress than the number allotted, which is 16 guests, the State Regent will be personally responsible for paying for the extra guests. **Motion Adopted.**

After a discussion regarding the Annual Audit, it was the consensus of the Finance Committee to appoint an Audit Committee composed of the State Regent, First Vice Regent, and Second Vice Regent to seek several bids for next year's audit. After a discussion about awards offered by the State Society, it was decided that the State Regent will notify the appropriate Committee Chairmen that these awards should be included their respective CIP Letters. Meeting was adjourned at 1:00 p.m.

State Committee Reports

COOPERATION OF DAR WITH SAR/S.R. – Anna Hicks Thompson

This has been a great year for cooperation of DAR with SAR/SR, with a total of 91 chapters reporting and 56 reporting activity. Sixty-two percent of DAR chapters participated with an SAR chapter or SAR state event. Fifty-four SAR applications were submitted by DAR; 34 members have been approved, with eight pending; 12 supplemental applications were submitted and approved. Certificates of Appreciation were presented to eight chapters. Certificates of Award were presented to the top five chapters, based on special events or total overall participation: Old Noonday, General Daniel Newnan, Apalachee, Chestatee River, and Vidalia. Donations will be made by this Chairman to the President General's Project in honor of these chapters. The judging process was very difficult as chapters had many different events reported. This Chairman's choice as the outstanding chapter for 2012-2013 is the Old Noonday Chapter. This Chairman encourages all chapters to continue to participate in local and state SAR activities and to invite SAR chapters to attend your DAR functions. This interaction is very rewarding and is a tribute to those Patriots who gave their lives for our freedom. Please support activities of your local SAR chapters, thereby showing respect for these Patriots.

COORDINATOR OF DISTRICTS – Phyllis Fox Lawson

It has been a pleasure working with the four District Directors to make our District Workshops and Board of Management such a success. Our goal was to serve Georgia Daughters by making their time at these events a pleasant and informative experience – all of which was enhanced by our bejeweled tennis shoes as we scurried here and there, trying to be everywhere as needed. This Coordinator would like to thank the Oglethorpe, Vidalia, Augustin Clayton, William Day and Suwanee Creek chapters for hosting the District Workshops, and a special "thank you" for their generous contributions to the State Society. The State Speakers Staff is made up of members appointed by the State Regent, and members of the National Speakers Staff are appointed by the President General. The speakers are volunteers who have researched and written various programs of interest. They are utilized by chapters to enhance regular meetings and to encourage good attendance, and they are willing to share topics with local civic groups, church groups, and other lineage societies. Georgia Daughters who are on the Speakers Staff provided 72 programs throughout the past year to DAR chapters, and they provided 23 programs about DAR to non-DAR groups. Twenty-one installations and/or other ceremonies were performed over the past year by Speakers Staff members for DAR chapters. Some of the favorite programs were the U. S. Constitution, programs about the American flag, the DAR Schools, and programs on the subject of veterans. In total, Georgia Daughters traveled thousands of miles around the state to speak to hundreds of people promoting the objectives of DAR.

GEORGIA DAY – Joan Smith Hutcheson

Governor Nathan Deal signed the Georgia Day proclamation celebrating the 280th anniversary of the founding of Georgia and presented the proclamation to State Regent Virginia Lingelbach and this State Chairman. Chapters used the proclamation in various ways: giving out copies at chapter meetings; in press releases; on chapter websites; in displays at libraries, schools and even an airport; Georgia products such as Coca-Cola, peanuts, pecans, peaches, and Georgia-

shaped cookies were used as refreshments or as table decorations. Other decorations included pine cones and branches from native trees. Programs included trivia quizzes, an explanation of symbols on the Georgia flag, and speeches by authors and historians. One chapter gave books about Georgia's part in the Revolutionary War to a school library. Chapters reported singing "Georgia" at their February meeting. One chapter recognized Georgia Patriots whose descendants are current members of Georgia chapters. Wreaths were laid at a Revolutionary War historic site.

The visiting State Regents were also honored: Peggy Troxell, North Carolina ("Carolina Moon"); Debra Jamison, California ("California, Here I Come"); and Julia Rogers, District of Columbia ("Diamonds Are a Girl's Best Friend") – with a little help from Marilyn Monroe! Musical tributes to State Regent Virginia Lingelbach included "California, Here She Comes" followed by "Sweet Virginia" to the tune of "Sweet Georgia Brown."


TELLERS – Marci Walker Sweatmon No Report

In an effort to continue the proud tradition, established by previous Georgia Daughters in maintaining and improving the Meadow Garden campus, the following major accomplishments have been undertaken by this Chairman since July 2012: A thorough renovation of the 1903 bathroom and kitchen; Repairs made to one air conditioner; Repair of rotten wood siding; Installation of a catch basin and French drain; Restoration of the flag pole; Replacing signage; Increasing tour costs to the public; Reduction of the rental fee to the Heritage Center for Georgia Daughters. It is a pleasure to serve our State Regent and the Georgia Daughters.

MEADOW GARDEN DOCENTS - Patsy Powell Ray

In 2012, eight NSDAR chapters provided 46 docents working 1388 hours. Two N.S.C.A.R. chapters had 15 docents serving 85 hours. We had help from one NSSAR chapter and one garden club. Docents serve as tour guides on week-ends and in the absence of the manager. They assist with school tours and other larger groups. We were part of a local church singles day tour in August. Two docent training classeshave been held since this chairman assumed her position. Both used a PowerPoint program that this chairman developed. One NSSAR member attended. New instructions were written for opening and closing the house, and cards were made and laminated to provide talking points for each room. All will require revision in mid-2013 to reflect changes made within the house. Meadow Garden was featured in the November/December issue of *Suffolk Living* magazine, published in Virginia. Docents from two chapters provide four hours hostess duty each month to the Georgia Welcome Center on I-20 in Augusta. This chairman spoke to the Sergeant Newton Chapter in Covington on May 15 and offered the PowerPoint training program.

MEADOW GARDEN FURNISHINGS – Lisa Anne Pittman

The care of Meadow Garden is a non-stop process, and the curation needs for all objects are constantly being assessed and reevaluated. During the first six months of this administration, this chairman has continued the digitization of Meadow Garden inventory by inputting data into the Past Perfect IV museum inventory software, and familiarizing herself with the large catalog of objects in the process. Numerous digital photographs have been taken of objects, and written records have been scanned to a digital format and transcribed. This chairmanis currently in the process of properly evaluating and archiving our varied documents collection for future storage and rotating display.

MEADOW GARDEN GIFT SHOP – Evelyn Ragan Swanson

Meadow Garden Gift Shop has seen some exciting products and beautifully crafted items over the past year. This chairman wants to thank the many Georgia Daughters who spent their time, energy, and resources to make items such as bonnets, scarves, bookmarks, hot pads, and even a painting of our beloved Meadow Garden. Thank you, ladies! Each of these items, along with the many other customized products, such as the new Meadow Garden Christmas ornament, updated the Gift Shop with some exciting new items. Additionally, the Gift Shop has been updated with new displays and shelving to produce a fresh, inviting look. The traveling Gift Shop sold items at all four District Workshops, the Constitution Week luncheon and Board of Management meeting, as well as marketed and sold items at several chapter meetings across the state. This traveling road show helped to produce sales in excess of \$4,000 from summer until January 31, 2013. This chairman thanks the volunteers and vice chairman of the Gift Shop and especially the Meadow Garden Chairman for her support and endless efforts in all aspects of Meadow Garden.

MEADOW GARDEN LANDSCAPING – Deborah Taylor Powell

Since joining the Meadow Garden Board as the Chairman of Landscaping, a new landscaping firm was hired that has addressed many of the past lawn-care problems. Due to the natural slope of the property, rain-water-run-off has caused the loss of topsoil, leaving behind sand that is not supportive of a quality lawn. As a test project, this chairman added pavers and dwarf-boarder grass around the Heritage Center for aesthetics and to avoid continued topsoil run-off. The effort has proven successful thus far. Four bails of peat moss have been sprinkled on the grass for root support and to encourage the grass to fill in barren spots, naturally leveling the yard. Concerns with the brick-support walls of the herb and flower gardens are being reviewed for alternative solutions. Upon reviewing the 30-year-old landscaping plan, many inconsistencies were discovered: the security fence has been moved, the Heritage Center has been added, sidewalks and entrances have been shifted, trees and herb gardens are placed differently than originally planned. Inquiries have been made with the University of Georgia, where the original plans were drawn concerning updated plans which will be reviewed by the Board as they are made available.

MEADOW GARDEN BOARD MINUTES

July 16, 2012

The Meadow Garden Board met on Monday, July 16, 2012, at the George Walton Heritage Education Center. Virginia Grace Lingelbach, State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 10:30 a.m. Other voting Board members present were Ida "Bea" Fischer, Secretary; Virginia Nicholson; Daphne Hopson; Maxine Maloney; Paula Osborne; Edwina Beall; Laura Reid; Patsy Ray; Lisa Pittman; and Lynn Wright. Also attending were *ex officio* member Joyce Patton and non-voting member Amy Lawson.

The State Regent offered the Invocation and asked attending members to introduce themselves. Mrs. Lingelbach outlined her projects for Meadow Garden: preservation and restoration of the interior of the house as well as conservation of the

period pieces such as paintings, prints, maps, china, and linens; improving the interior lighting; construction of elliptical platforms and necessary infrastructure maintenance such as renovations to the plumbing.

The meeting was recessed so that members could tour the House, following which the business meeting reconvened.

Susan Jackson, House Manager, gave her report. A total of 503 visitors have toured the house year to date. Three hundred fifty-two "walk in" visitors generated \$1,101.50 and 151 scheduled tours resulted in an additional \$197.00. Gift shop sales year to date are \$511.00. At the conclusion of her report, Ms. Jackson was excused.

Following the House tour, Board members discussed their observations. Concern was expressed as to the efficiency of the new air conditioner recently installed in the upstairs office. It was noted that this unit does not provide humidity control as is required for the preservation of artifacts, and the cooling efficiency was also in question. It was further noted that the office door must remain open in order to accommodate any flow of air to the other rooms, thereby compromising the security of a private business environment. Further study of this matter will be pursued.

Paula Osborne, State Treasurer, presented the Meadow Garden proposed Operating Budget 2012-2013. Copies of the budget and financial summary were distributed. As of June 30, 2012, Certificates of Deposit (CD) investment totaled \$350,000.00, Money Market Accounts totaled \$133,351.25, and Petty Cash totaled \$100.00. Total in current assets is \$483,451.25. Fixed Assets totaled \$185,377.73. Total assets are \$668,828.98. Following a discussion concerning the lack of funds in the Administrative/Maintenance Checking Account, Mrs. Osborne moved "that \$5,000.00 be moved from the Meadow Garden Money Market Gift Shop Fund to the Meadow Garden Checking Gift Shop Fund as start-up money for gift shop purchases." Motion adopted. Mrs. Osborne moved "that the Meadow Garden Money Market Gift Shop Fund, \$15,396.93 be moved to Meadow Garden Administration/Maintenance Checking Account as start-up money for the Administration/Maintenance bills that will come in before the per capita distribution in February." Motion adopted. Mrs. Osborne moved "that the Meadow Garden Money Market Fence Fund, \$9,862.57, be moved to Meadow Garden Administration/Maintenance Checking Account as start-up money for the Administration/Maintenance bills that will come in before the per capita distribution in February." Motion adopted. Mrs. Osborne moved "that the Meadow Garden Money Market Display Case Fund, \$7,141,38 be moved to Meadow Garden Administration/Maintenance Checking Account as start-up money for the Administration/Maintenance bills that will come in before the per capita distribution in February." Motion failed. Mrs. Osborne moved "that the Meadow Garden Money Market Stoneware Undesignated Fund \$58,117.50 be withdrawn from United Community Bank (UCB) and used to buy a CD in another bank. The State Society has over \$250,000.00 invested at UCB, and moving this money out of this bank would reduce the investment to under \$250,000.00." Motion adopted.

The proposed budget 2012-2013 was reviewed. After review and discussion, Mrs. Osborne moved "the proposed budget be adopted for the period July 1, 2012 - June 30, 2013." Motion adopted. A copy is attached to these minutes.

Ms. Pittman, Furnishings Chairman, brought to the attention of the Board that there is a problem with wood rot at the left corner of the Heritage Education Center building. There is also a severe drainage problem which is contributing to the building damage as well as an erosion problem. Mrs. Nicholson stated she would have this looked into immediately.

After a discussion regarding potential liability, Mrs. Beall moved "that home catering of food to Meadow Garden be discontinued due to food safety and liability concerns." Motion adopted. Maxine Maloney, College Hill Chapter Regent, stated that their chapter appreciates the opportunity given them to serve lunch to visiting chapters in the past.

Mrs. Lingelbach distributed a preliminary draft copy of a proposed position description for the Meadow Garden House Manager. She asked Board members to review the document before the next meeting and email comments and suggestions to her.

Mrs. Nicholson, Meadow Garden Chairman, gave her report. Following a discussion of the house restroom she moved "that the Meadow Garden Chairman contact three local contractors familiar with restoring houses of this age, to request bids for renovating the only bathroom located in the historic house at Meadow Garden and present the selected bid for action at a future board meeting for approval." Motion adopted.

Mrs. Lawson, Advisory Board Member, brought a request from the Junior Membership Committee. After discussion, Ms. Pittman moved "that the Georgia Junior Membership be allowed to host the 2012 Junior Workshop at the Heritage Education Center on the evening of October 6, 2012, from 3:00 p.m. to 9:00 a.m., October 7, 2012. Motion adopted.

Mrs. Ray, Docents Chairman, reported that the median adult group from Warren Baptist Church has planned a "Daycation in Augusta" for Saturday, July 28. They will go four places for under \$10, and Meadow Garden will be one of those places. They estimate 20 will take part. Channel 6 News will attend their first event at the Saturday Farmer's Market but will not accompany them on the remainder of the trip, which also includes the Augusta Museum and Woodrow Wilson's boyhood home.

Mrs. Ray has also been approached by the judge form DE who plans the July 4th program at the Signers Monument and one of the men who assists in Augusta, about having Meadow Garden open on July 4, 2013, for a few hours – probably 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the most.

Mrs. Wright, Public Relations Chairman, distributed copies of the Meadow Garden Mission Statement which reads: The mission of Meadow Garden is to collect, preserve and interpret history in relation to the life and lifestyle of persons living in the period, 18th to mid-19th centuries, and particularly that of George Walton, Patriot, Legislator, and Georgia Signer of the Declaration of Independence."

Mrs. Lingelbach announced the next meeting of the Meadow Garden Board is scheduled for September 24, 2012, at 10:30 a.m. Approved: Virginia Grace Lingelbach, Chairman

Also

attending were *ex officio* member Joyce Patton and non-voting members Amy Lawson and Katherine Croft.

The State Regent offered the Invocation and welcomed everyone to the meeting. The roll call was taken by Mrs. Fischer.

Mrs. Lingelbach recommended to the Board that the Meadow Garden Standing Rules be amended to provide for the Furnishings Chairman to have keys. Evelyn Swanson moved, "that the Furnishings Chairman be authorized a key designated Key #9 – Keys A, B, C, & D." Motion adopted.

Mrs. Nicholson, Meadow Garden Chairman and Trustee, gave her report. Her Husband, Tom, replaced a burned-out floodlight at the base of the flag pole and noticed the flag pole needs to be shortened and painted and the flag's rope needs to be replaced. She will look into getting someone with a large cherry-picker truck to make the repairs. She contacted a heating and air company concerning the problem with the air conditioning in the Heritage Education Center, which resulted in a frozen unit. She will look into getting bids for a maintenance contract for the HVAC units. After a discussion continued from the previous meeting, Mrs. Nicholson moved "that entrance fees be changed to: \$5.00 adults; \$4.00 seniors (62 or older), discounters, and military with ID; and retain the \$1.00 fee for students up to 12th grade. Motion adopted. Mrs. Nicholson further moved "that the rental fee for Heritage Building for Georgia DAR Chapters and Clubs be lowered from \$35.00 to \$20.00." Motion adopted.

Mrs. Nicholson reviewed the bids to repair the Heritage Education Center and moved, "that we accept John H. Coleman & Associates' bid in the amount of \$4,392.43 subject to contract (not to exceed \$5,500.00) on the construction and repair of the Heritage Building. Amount to be prorated between Landscaping Money Market, Maintenance Money Market and Painting Money Market Accounts." Motion adopted. Mrs. Nicholson reported on the quotes received to renovate the restroom in the main house. She reviewed the written criteria given for bids. She recommended the bid by Tudor Home Improvements, LLC, of \$4,809.13. After a discussion regarding flooring material, the foundation, and zoning, it was decided to wait for a revised bid.

Paula Osborne, State Treasurer, gave her report. As of September 20, 2012, Certificates of Deposit (CD) investments totaled \$408,117.50. This total includes the opening of the Stoneware CD, \$58,117.50, funds transferred from the Money Market Account. Checking Accounts \$26,699.31. Money Market Accounts \$40,958.49 and Petty Cash \$100.00. Current Assets totaled \$475,875.30. Fixed Assets totaled \$232,172.22. Total Assets are \$708,047.52. Mrs. Osborne recommended that the annual contract for Past Perfect Software not be renewed. Service calls would cost less than an annual contract. The contract expires October 22, 2012. Mrs. Fischer moved "to not renew the contract." Motion adopted.

Evelyn Swanson, Gift Shop Chairman, gave her report. She has spent time learning about the products sold at Meadow Garden and reviewing inventories. She attended and sold merchandise at all four District Workshops, at a chapter meeting, and at the Constitution Week luncheon, and created four separate baskets auctioned at the workshops. She visited Meadow Garden and had a work day to enhance the look of the gift shop. Sales for the gift shop items sold at the above locations totaled \$2,400.00 for the first quarter. She plans to order Christmas ornaments.

Joyce Patton, State Second Vice Regent, reported she is working with several members who have items of the period for possible donation to Meadow Garden.

Patsy Ray, Docent Chairman, gave her report. As of August 31, five chapters, with a total of 31 docents, have donated 549.25 hours. Two C.A.R. societies, Allen Howard Society and The Meadow Garden Society, with 15 docents, have donated 73.50 hours. One SAR Chapter, Button Gwinnett, with three docents, has donated 21 hours. Cherokee Rose Garden Club, with one docent, has donated 19.25 hours. She has written new detailed opening and closing instructions for the house and posted them in the Docent Room. Copies are available for those who have keys. A Docent class is scheduled for October 16. Local chapter Regents have been notified. Points of emphasis are being developed for each room in the house for Power Point training, and these will be placed on laminated flip cards which will hang in the Docent Room. She has contacted the local SAR Chapter expressing our interest in having SAR docents.

Virginia Strickland, Patrons Chairman, gave her report. She reviewed the inventory of items turned over to her from the previous chairman. Included are charms that could be sold in the Gift Shop. She reviewed the Patron categories and her duties as listed in Section VII of the Standing Rules. She stressed the importance of communication regarding the Patron categories and contacting previous Patrons to thank them and possibly encouraging more donations.

Deborah Powell, Landscaping Chairman, gave her report. She walked the grounds with the House Manager, House Chairman, and Docent Chairman and spoke with the previous Landscaping Chairman concerning the poor performance of the current lawn service. Mrs. Powell moved "to dismiss the current lawn service. She will secure two bids – from Southern Boys Landscaping & Lawn Care and Two State Lawn Service. New company will begin service in October." Motion adopted. She had the sprinkler system activated and found that some sprinklers were not rotating and some were damaged. The coverage of the watering field also needs to be adjusted. She is going to contact individuals and groups that have volunteered their time and talents to the care and maintenance of the flower and herb gardens. Also, the lawn care companies that are being considered understand that they will be expected to maintain the lawn inside the fence and outside the gate at the street, as well as the flowers/herb beds. She has begun a photo journey to document lawn/bed conditions and contents from season to season. The hope is these photos will assist in recording documentation and planting guides. There is a serious problem with the lawn having a wide range of grass types and weed types. The yard has low and high areas which need to be corrected to have grass retention. Also, where the sidewalks were removed, the terrain is uneven and needs to be corrected. There are weeds. flowers, and herbs intermingled throughout the flower beds. Many shrubs are in need of trimming, fertilizing and replacement. She will consult with the lawn care company and county agent to insure that we are using the best grass variety for successful growth in the sun and shade. Ant treatment needs to be applied on a regular schedule. She will review the original landscape plan.

Daphne Hobson, Augusta Chapter Regent, announced that the Augusta Genealogical Society has magazines, past proceedings, and other items that they might donate to Meadow Garden.

Mrs. Nicholson announced there is a George Walton-signed document for sale on eBay. After discussion, it was recommended that the Furnishing Chairman check on this item.

Maxine Maloney, College Hill Chapter Regent, announced that the members of the College Hill and Augusta chapters will host a Tea in honor of Virginia Grace

Lingelbach, Georgia State Regent, on November 8 in the Heritage House at Meadow Garden.

Susan Jackson, House Manager, is on vacation. Her report was filed with the minutes.

Mrs. Lingelbach announced there will be a "clean out day and inventory day" for Meadow Garden on Monday, November 26, at 10:30 a.m. The next Meadow Garden Board Meeting will be Monday, January 7, 2013, at 10:30 a.m. at the Heritage Education Center in Augusta.

Virginia Grace Lingelbach, State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 10:30 a.m. Other voting Board members present were: Ida "Bea" Fischer, Secretary, Virginia Nicholson, Daphne Hopson, Maxine Maloney, Paula Osborne, Edwina Beall, Laura Reid, Patsy Ray, Lisa Pittman, Evelyn Swanson, Debbie Powell, Virginia Strickland, and Lynn Wright. Also attending were *ex officio* member Joyce Patton and non-voting members Amy Lawson and Katherine Croft.

The State Regent offered the invocation and welcomed everyone to the meeting. The roll call was taken by Mrs. Fischer.

Mrs. Fischer called for corrections or additions to the March 14, 2013, minutes. Two editorial corrections were noted and the minutes were approved as corrected.

The report of Susan Jackson, House Manager, was filed as she was on vacation.

Mrs. Osborne, State Treasurer, reported. As of April 30, 2013, \$408,117.50 invested certificates of deposit; \$41,229.71 in checking account; \$33,667.05 in money market account; \$100.00 in petty cash; and \$232,172.22 in fixed assets for total assets of \$715,286.48. There was a review of the Income Statement noting the repair and maintenance items that have exceed budgeted amounts and a review of the Investments and the maturity dates. It was noted CD #3 matured May 17, 2013.

Mrs. Lingelbach stated that for many years the Meadow Garden Board had been advised there was insufficient space in the attic of the house to install the duct work necessary to provide air conditioning to the second floor. She further stated that Mrs. Nicholson, Meadow Garden Chairman and Trustee, recently had extensive professional studies performed by reputable HVAC companies as well as Georgia Power. After receiving their written reports it was determined that the attic space of the house is more than adequate to accommodate conventional duct work.

Ginger Nicholson reported. The lack of climate control on the second floor endangers the preservation of artifacts that are on display. Additionally, the control of the temperature is so inadequate that it causes discomfort to visitors and staff during tours. The first floor lacks humidity control used to preserve the artifacts. The airflow is unsatisfactory and the outside unit is noisy which interferes with docent tours. The ductwork is failing in some areas, thus causing air leakage which subsequently causes the system to run longer thereby increasing the power bills. After extensively researching alternatives, three different solutions were proposed by two local HVAC companies with reliable reputations. She also had Georgia Power review these solutions. The Board reviewed all proposed solutions from both companies. After extensive discussion, Mrs. Nicholson moved "that we choose option #1 on both floors from the Plunkett HVAC Company for new heating and air units for the Main House in Meadow Garden. Funds to come from the State Regent's Project, not to exceed \$25,000.00. Motion adopted.

After discussing the immediate need to start this project and the lack of funds until the State Regent's Project funds become available, Miss Reid moved "to transfer \$100,000 CD # 3 to a money market account at PNC Bank, Union City, with an interest rate of 0.65% for six-months for an advance payment, not to exceed \$30,000.00 for new HVAC systems and installation for ductwork on the first and second floor of Meadow Garden's historic house. Advanced funds to be paid back to the Money Market Account from the State Regent's Projects Funds. Motion adopted.

Mrs. Lingelbach passed around pictures made at the Governor's Mansion during the presentation to the First Lady of Georgia, Sandra Deal, first edition Volumes I and II of *The History of Georgia, 1811 and 1816* by Hugh McCall (1767-1823). One of the photographs displayed a table in the library of the Mansion believed to have been the property of George Walton (Meadow Garden) with provenance through the estate of his granddaughter, Madam Octavia Walton Levert.

Deborah Powell, Landscaping Chairman, reported. The Flower and Herb Gardens constructional support wall repair was completed on six of the flower and herb gardens. Kevin and Mark Snoddy completed the support walls and widened the internal brick walkways. Remaining buried metal fencing, concrete, rods, and other debris left behind from the replacement and installation of the security fence were excavated and removed. Also removed were dead shrubs and trees from the pathways and beds, four very large concrete chunks of old sidewalk that were partially buried in the yard near the grape arbor and the overgrowth in all the beds, but most notably in the Weavers Garden in the front yard near the canal. The loose bricks that were in, around, and buried in the beds, were stacked in the corner under the grape Boxwood shrubs around the monument in the center of the yard were arbor. transplanted, saving the healthiest, and spacing them so that they could regain their correct round shape in the months to come. Mrs. Powell reported that she was at Meadow Garden the days, weekends and evenings when this work was performed, working alongside and answering any questions as they arose. After consulting with

the Richmond County Agriculture Agent, Mrs. Powell made leaf and chicken manure mulch for herb gardens to save money. This was repeated in the 11 beds nearest Many plants were transplanted to organize for better the Heritage Center. identification, seed gathering, and management. In the bed to the right of the front of the house, the one with the older mulberry tree, there was a need for hand sifting to remove bulbs from wild onions and various weeds - work done by the Powell Crew*. This bed will need additional transplanting for better-suited bulb plants. The County Agent suggested pine bark for the flower beds as a contrast and also in the herb garden. The old flower pots were emptied and sorted, storing reusable ones and disposing of others. The dirt has been used to fill low areas in the yard. The concrete running edge remaining from the original chain-link fence at the back of the property has been broken and removed by the Powell Crew*. Two of the fence posts were set in concrete and buried three feet underground. The existing border grass is to be extended from one bed to the next. The Powell Crew* reworked the sprinkler system, repairing and replacing the broken sprinkler at the brick sidewalk near the front door. Beyond the Weavers Garden next to the fence near the canal, a long stretch of sprinklers pipe was lying above ground interfering with the lawn care service. This pipe was buried, and these sprinklers were repaired. Twenty bales of pine straw were purchased, and ten have been spread by the Powell Crew* with the balance to be used later. The mulberry and the wisteria trees have been trimmed. An uncountable number of plants have been transplanted. Weeding is an ongoing endeavor. Tomato, bell pepper, dill, and strawberry plants have been purchased. and will be transplanted from the Powells' personal gardens along with those from other patrons. Plans are to continue the same schedule: saving, transplanting and reusing what is functional. The fruit-bearing plants will soon be a part of the new adventure at Meadow Garden.

The State Regent expressed her thanks to the Powell Crew,* consisting of Debbie Powell, her husband and family, her personal gardener, and others.

Evelyn Swanson, Gift Shop Chairman, reported. She showed a mockup of playing cards available as one deck (price \$8.00) or a double deck (price \$15.00). She also showed a mockup of scarves, one 8x45 and one 21x21. Tumblers were discussed. After discussion, the scarfs were the one item everyone loved/wanted. The 8x45 scarf was the preferred one. Cost is the driving factor. It was decided that if we decided to go forward with the scarf, we would have an electronic vote.

Patsy Powell Ray, Docent Chairman, reported. Two ladies who attended docent class have returned for a tour, and one has completed all training. More docents are needed as several have to attend all tours. March and April have been exceptionally good months for tourists. In April, we had 173 tourists of which 66 were walk-ins and 107 were scheduled. In March, we were visited by a student group from Augusta Christian School and by Philadelphia Winn Chapter members. Our April tours included Westminister School (two groups), Governor John Treutlen Chapter members, Discover Tours from Augusta Visitor Center, and Trinity on the Hill Methodist Church seniors. Mrs. Ray spent four hours on the SUNDAY beginning Masters Week at the Georgia Welcome Center promoting Meadow Garden. Changes in the viewing of the parlor are to be discussed with Ginger Nicholson and Lisa Pittman. Docent name tags will be ordered for those who do not have them. Mrs. Ray also reported that she had written and placed three guide books for docents in their gift shop drawer.

Jean Strickland, Patrons Chairman, reported. Donations have been received since the February 1 deadline for the year 2013-2014. As of May 17, they include: State

Chairman's Club @ \$750 (Octavia's Legacy); Chapter Regents Club @ \$200 (1900 Society); Individual Patrons: two @ \$500 (Octavia's Legacy); one @ \$250 (George Walton Society); one @ \$200 (1900 Society); four @ \$100; six @ \$50; Additional non-qualifying donations from chapters and individuals total \$230. Total: \$3,330. The amount for the 1900 Society this next year is \$113. Those who donated \$100 this past year will be encouraged to consider an additional \$13 or more this year. Mrs. Strickland will write and thank all chapters and members for their support. Special thanks were expressed to Paula Osborne for her excellent records and advice, and to Lynn Wright for her assistance and updating templates used for the certificates. Chapters and individuals have been generous in their financial support and in-kind donations to our wonderful historic House Museum. Mrs. Strickland extended an invitation to all to visit "**your house**" and see the improvements that have been made this year." There were 72 Chapter Patrons, 90 Individual Patrons, and 13 Patrons-in-Kind for the year 2012-2013.

Standing Rules for Meadow Garden

MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

- 1. The governing body of a Historic Site, in this instance the Meadow Garden Board, serves the public interest as it relates to Meadow Garden, and must consider itself accountable to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, as well as to Meadow Garden; members should not attempt to act in their individual capacities, but all actions should be taken as a Board, Committee, or otherwise in conformance with the Standing Rules, the Act of Incorporation, or applicable Resolutions.
- 2. The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the three (3) Trustees as named in the Deed from the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, conveying Meadow Garden to the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution; namely, the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the State Chairman of Meadow Garden who is appointed by the State Regent; the Chapter Regents of the Augusta Chapter and the College Hill Chapter, both chapters being located in Augusta, who shall serve as Vice Chairman to the State Chairman of Meadow Garden; the State Treasurer; two Honorary State Regents; and six of the chairmen of Meadow Garden Committees, as appointed by the State Regent.
- 3. No Georgia Daughter shall serve in the same Meadow Garden Chairmanship more than three (3) consecutive terms.
- 4. In addition to the six appointments to the Board which are made by the State Regent, she shall appoint two (2) Honorary State Regents.
- 5. The State Second Vice Regent shall serve as ex-officio member of the Meadow Garden Board, being given the privilege of the floor without a vote.
- 6. The State Regent shall serve as Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board, and the State First Vice Regent shall serve as Secretary of the Meadow Garden Board.
- 7. The Meadow Garden Board shall met a minimum of three (3) times each year; namely, preceding State Board of Management meeting, preceding annual State Conference and following Continental Congress, and at such other times as deemed necessary by the Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board. At least one (1) meeting of the Board shall be held at Meadow Garden each year. The Board may vote by teleconference, fax or email, if necessary.
- 8. The Meadow Garden Board shall have jurisdiction over the operation, maintenance and work of Meadow Garden and shall be the authority for Meadow Garden as long as such authority is not in conflict with the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, the Act of Incorporation for the Georgia State Society, Resolutions adopted by the Georgia State Society and/or directions which from time to time may be approved by action of the Georgia State Society assembled at its annual State Conference.
- 9. The Meadow Garden Board shall supervise the placing of all insurance to cover the grounds and the Historic House and its contents, including the fine arts, with accredited companies coverage to include fire, theft and liability.
- 10. Five (5) voting members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.

- 11. Minutes shall be kept of each meeting and a copy shall be sent to each member and printed verbatim in the State Proceedings.
- 12. All expenses for maintenance, operation and purchases of furnishings and plantings shall be authorized by the State Regent, as Chairman of the Board, and paid by the State Treasurer. Expenditures exceeding \$1,000.00 must have the majority approval of the Board.
- 13. These rules will be binding on the actions of the Board in their operation of Meadow Garden. They may be changed by the following procedure: Members of the Board must have written notification of proposed changes one month prior to the next meeting of the Board; a two-thirds vote of the Board and approval of the State Conference are necessary to effect a change.
- 14. The State Regent shall appoint a Meadow Garden Advisory Board, which would act in an advisory capacity only and be composed of no more than fifteen (15) members representing various areas of expertise.

II

OPERATIONS

- 1. Everyone entering Meadow Garden will be requested to sign the Register, including date, time of arrival and time of departure.
- 2. No more than fifteen (15) people with each Docent are to be on tour in the house at a given time. Excess of this number may wait in the reception room or in the garden. The House Manager has the authority to enforce the Meadow Garden rules at all times.
- 3. There will be no smoking on Meadow Garden property.
- 4. No refreshments are to be served in or taken into the Historic House by visitors, including chapters or the public. Should a group, such as a visiting chapter, desire refreshments, the garden is available for use if litter is properly disposed of by the serving group.
- 5. Tour visitors will be asked to pay a fee as set by the Board.
- 6. In August 2006 Dixie Lock and Safe, Inc., installed new locks and keys were made which cannot be duplicated. The State Regent, State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Manager by the direction of one of the two above, are authorized to have new keys made for Meadow Garden.

There shall be two (2) complete sets of keys to Meadow Garden, which are eight (8) keys per set. There shall be four (4) sets of keys comprised of three (3) keys per set, which are the back door key to the historic house, the key to the George Walton Heritage Education Center, and the gate key. There shall be one (1) set of keys for "house" use, which are three (3) keys, one for the kitchen, one for the exterior bath at the historic house, and one for the interior door between the dining room and the old gift shop area. These three (3) "house" keys shall be kept in the old gift shop area for accessibility to all for use on a daily basis. There shall be one (1) gate key assigned to the landscape service company.

Keys are lettered per door of entry: Key # A is to the deadbolt of the three (3) doors of the George Walton Heritage Education Center; Key # B is to the deadbolt lock on the back door of the historic house; Key # C is to the gate; Key # D is to the Stribling Room in the George Walton Heritage Education Center; Key # E is to the kitchen; Key # F is to the deadbolt for the exterior bath at the historic house; Key # G is to the interior door between the dining

room and the old gift shop; Key # H is to the office upstairs in the historic house.

<u>Keys are numbered</u> and assigned according to the appointed position on the Meadow Garden Board or as designated. Keys are distributed to the assigned person when they sign a "Meadow Garden Key Distribution Form." When this assigned person leaves her current position, she returns the keys and signs the same form she had signed when she accepted the keys. Keys go with the appointed position not the person.

Distribution of the keys: Key # 1 to State Regent, Chairman of Meadow Garden Board (complete set of 8 keys); Key # 2 to Meadow Garden Manager (complete set of 8 keys); Key # 3 to Chairman of Meadow Garden (keys A, B, C); Key # 4 to Docents Chairman (keys A, B, C); Key # 5 to Landscaping Chairman (keys A, B, C); Key # 6 for General Docent use (keys A, B, C) – to be checked "out" and "in" when used; Key # 7 are "house" keys (keys E, F, G); Key # 8 to landscape service (key C).

III

VOLUNTEERS AND DOCENTS

- 1. Docents, shall be those well screened and trained volunteers who will serve under the direct supervision of a Meadow Garden Chairman and/or the House Manager.
- 2. Duties of docents shall include acting as guides, hostesses, working in gift shop, working in yard, cleaning in house, public relations. No volunteer work at or for Meadow Garden shall be done except under the direct guidance of the Meadow Garden Board and the chairman of the specific committee for that particular function.
- 3. Cleaning or yard work volunteers shall be under the direction of the House Manager.

IV

FURNISHINGS

- 1. Items bought or accepted for the older section of Meadow Garden must predate 1821.
- 2. (a) the front room on the main floor, known as the Augusta Room, will be designed as an interpretive center, highlighting people, events, and memorabilia related to George Walton and to the history of Meadow Garden; (b) the back room on the main floor, formerly known as the Board Room, will be used as a gift shop; (c) the front room on the upper floor of the newer section will be furnished as a bedroom/study of the period pre-dating 1850 or be used to display historically significant items relating to Meadow Garden, Augusta and Georgia; (d) the back room on the upper floor of the newer section will be used as an office for the Meadow Garden manager and for storage and supplies for the gift shop.
- Reproductions may be used only when the physical condition of the antiques is jeopardized by exposure in areas where large numbers of visitors have easy access; or when environmental conditions including excessive light, dust, humidity or airborne impurities pose a threat to the preservation of originals.
- 4. Effective March 12, 1983 all items donated to Meadow Garden shall be accepted with the written condition that they become the property of Meadow

Garden and may be used, replaced or sold at the discretion of the Meadow Garden Board only.

- 5. All items that post date 1821, with the exception of those in the six (6) rooms of the newer section and those described in Number 3 of this section, shall be replaced as soon as possible with similar items pre-dating 1821.
- 6. Once an item is placed, it shall not be moved from one location to another without permission of the Meadow Garden Chairman of Furnishings who shall report such changes to the Meadow Garden Board in a timely manner.
- 7. Any item donated or purchased must have written documentation of appraisal.
- 8. No items and/or furnishings shall be accepted "on loan."
- 9. A file will be kept of all assets with information as to price paid or market value, date of acquisition, donor or where bought, documentation and appraisal and a description of article. One file will be kept in the reception room accessible to the Docents; a duplicate file will be in the possession of the Chairman of the Board. The Meadow Garden Chairman of Furnishings shall maintain and keep current the "Past and Perfect" Program on all items and furnishings.
- 10. All items purchased or donated will be added to the Fine Arts insurance policy. Said policy will be reviewed and updated a minimum of once a year. Major additions to furnishings will be added immediately.
- 11. Future plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the Historic House.

V

LANDSCAPING

- 1. The landscape plan adopted by the Board shall be adhered to with no deviation unless recommended by an authority on landscape design and care.
- 2. Donations of shrubbery, plants or trees shall be accepted only when item is part of the master plan.
- 3. Work on the grounds will be under the sole direction of the Meadow Garden Board and the Landscaping Chairman. Supervision of actual work will be provided by the Meadow Garden Chairman or the Landscaping Chairman of Meadow Garden.

VI

GIFT SHOP

- 1. The Chairman of the committee will be responsible for all purchases, subject to the approval of the Board or the State Regent. The Vice Chairman shall assist the Gift Shop Chairman with sales at state functions.
- Gift Shop operations will be self-supporting. In the event funds are needed for purchases, they may be advanced from available Meadow Garden funds and must be considered a loan and shall be repaid without interest within one (1) year from date of borrowing.
- 3. Profit from the Gift Shop shall be accounted for within the State Treasurer's books, with a percentage being transferred at the discretion of the Board at the end of the fiscal year and placed in the Maintenance Account. The audit of the Gift Shop operation shall be included in the annual audit of the Georgia State Society.

VII

PATRONS

- 1. Donors to the following categories are eligible to be recognized:
 - Meadow Garden Capital Investment Trust Fund A.
 - B. **Furnishinas**
 - С Maintenance
 - Landscape D.
 - E. Heritage Education
- Giving categories and levels for annual contributions: 2.
 - \$10 Friends \$25 Supporters \$35 Signers \$50 Patrons \$103* The 1900 Society (giving level for 2003, giving would increase by \$1 each year) Sons and Daughters of Liberty \$250 \$500 Olivia's Legacy \$1,000 George Walton Society Meadow Garden Preservation Society \$5.000

This information will be publicized in the Meadow Garden brochure and other appropriate places as determined by the Board.

- 3. Chapter gifts, above the State Honor Roll requirements, automatically qualify the chapter to be recognized at an appropriate giving level determined by the categories listed in #2.
- 4. The State Treasurer will report these gifts to the Patrons Chairman.
- The Patrons Chairman will issue certificates to the qualifying individuals and 5 chapters or groups.
- 6. A permanent book will be kept on public display at Meadow Garden to record the names of those who give at the Patrons level or above.
- The Patrons Chairman will enter the names of donors in the appropriate 7. book a minimum of once a year.
- 8. The Meadow Garden Patrons book shall be divided into four parts: (1) Individuals who give a minimum of fifty dollars in one payment, and chapters, organizations, businesses or groups that give a minimum of one hundred dollars in one payment; (2) In-Kind Patrons approved by the Meadow Garden Board in recognition of outstanding and/or unusual gifts of time, talents or expertise toward the betterment of Meadow Garden: (3) Honoraria. which shall list individuals or groups honored by a Patron gift as designated in #1, such listing to show the name of honoree (Patron) and the donor; (4) Memorials of at least fifty dollars which shall list the name of the individual memorialized and the name of the donor.

VIII

PLAQUES & MARKERS

1. Plaques/Markers may be placed at Meadow Garden only at the discretion of the Board, and request meets the following criteria: Substantial service and/or contributions that secured the property and the heritage for the GSDAR. Individuals so recognized shall have been deceased for at least 5

years; Plaque/Marker will be paid for by person(s) requesting such recognition.

- 2. Such plaques will be permanently displayed at Meadow Garden and a record of the honoree's service and/or contribution will be recorded and placed in the Meadow Garden file, with Board approval.
- 3. Plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the Historic House. Additional markers shall not be permanently placed on the grounds.

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II OBJECTS

The objects of this Society shall be:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of the Georgia State Society.

Article IV OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian and a State Curator.

Section 2. (a) To be eligible for state office, a member shall hold and have held membership in a chapter or chapters within the Georgia State Society for at least 5 years prior to her election and have served a full term as chapter officer or state chairman.

(b) No member shall be eligible to the same state office for two (2) successive terms. A member having served more than one half of a term in a state office shall be deemed to have served a full term.

(c) No two state officers shall be members of the same chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

(d) To be eligible for the office of State Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State First Vice Regent or as State Second Vice Regent or served in each of these two offices of the Georgia Society.

(e) To be eligible for the office of State First Vice Regent or for the office of State Second Vice Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State Recording Secretary or as State Treasurer of the Georgia State Society and shall have served a full term as a Chapter Regent of a chapter in the Georgia State Society.

Section 3. In recognition of valuable service to the Georgia State Society, a State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent for life by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Article V NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. (a) A candidate for state office shall request the endorsement of her chapter, taken by vote at a regular meeting of the chapter held between May and January preceding the State Conference at which state elections are held. The endorsement, signed by the Chapter Recording Secretary, shall include the office the candidate seeks and shall be received by the State Regent with the candidate's statement of intent to be a candidate prior to any announcement or campaigning by the candidate and/or her supporters.

(b) A candidate for State Regent who wishes to present a slate of officers shall send to the State Regent in one packet the chapter endorsements and the statements of intent for each of her selected candidates. If received by the State Regent no later than December 1, these candidates shall be listed as a slate in the State Regent's Call to State Conference.

(c) Candidates wishing to run independently of a slate, whose chapter endorsements and statements of intent are received by the State Regent no later than December 1 shall be listed as independent candidates in the State Regent's Call to State Conference.

(d) A candidate whose chapter endorsement and statement of intent have been properly received by the State Regent may choose to announce her candidacy separate from the State Regent's Call to State Conference. Such a chapter endorsement and statement of intent shall be received by the State Regent at least ten (10) days prior to the opening of the State Conference at which the election is to take place.

(e) A candidate who does not meet the requirements of these Bylaws shall be declared disqualified and ineligible for consideration for state office.

(f) A chapter shall endorse no more than one chapter member for state office per election with the possible exception of candidates for State Regent and for State Corresponding Secretary.

(g) In the event of the death, incapacitation or withdrawal of a candidate prior to the election, a replacement shall be made with notification in writing to the State Regent and accompanied by the chapter endorsement and statement of intent as directed by these Bylaws.

Section 2. Nominations of candidates for all state offices shall be made at a designated meeting of the State Conference.

Section 3. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected biennially by ballot at the State Conference. A majority vote shall elect. Independent candidates shall be listed on the ballot in a separate column from those candidates presented as a slate.

Section 4. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two (2) years or until their successors are elected. Their terms of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Section 5. (a) Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become State Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become State First Vice Regent subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. Vacancies in other state offices shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next State Board of Management meeting or State Conference, whichever shall come first.

(b) Any state officer who is absent from the state for a continuous period of six (6) months or longer shall automatically relinquish her position as a state officer.

Section 6. Upon the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Organizing Secretary General.

Section 7. (a) A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot.

(b) The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than eighteen (18) months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

(c) The endorsement shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent with the candidate's name and address to the Recording Secretary General to be received by the first day of the month preceding the designated Continental Congress.

Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall perform the duties prescribed in this article, and parliamentary authority adopted by the Society, and such others as the State Board of Management and the National Society may require.

Section 2. The State Regent shall:

(a) be the chief executive officer and the official spokesman for the State Society;

(b) have general supervision of the affairs of the State Society;

(c) preside at all meetings of the State Conference, State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;

(d) appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society;

(e) be ex-officio a member of all committees;

(f) appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as advisor in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting;

(g) sign all contracts and agreements made in the name of the Georgia State Society with the recorded approval of the Executive Committee and the State Board of Management or the State Conference as directed by these Bylaws;

(h) be bonded and have the authority to draw upon funds of the State Society with the approval of the Finance Committee.

(i) recommend to the Finance Committee a Certified Public Accountant who shall be approved by the Finance Committee.

Section 3. The State First Vice Regent shall:

(a) perform the duties of the office of State Regent in the absence or inability of the State Regent;

(b) fill a vacancy in the office of State Regent;

(c) Perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;

(d) serve on those committees as designated by these Bylaws and as directed by the State Regent.

Section 4. The State Second Vice Regent shall:

(a) perform the duties of the office of State First Vice Regent in the absence or inability of the State First Vice Regent;

(b) fill a vacancy in the office of State First Vice Regent;

(c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;

(d) serve on committees as directed by the State Regent.

Section 5. The State Chaplain shall:

(a) open all meetings of the State Conference and the State Board of Management with scripture reading and prayer;

(b) preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and conduct such other religious services as may be required;

(c) be custodian of state properties pertaining to the duties of this office;

(d) be responsible for IN MEMORIAM pages in the Proceedings.

Section 6. The State Recording Secretary shall:

(a) record the proceedings of the meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;

(b) compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and the Proceedings Committee.

(c) submit to the appropriate National officers, the endorsement for Vice President General and the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent by the first day of the month preceding the month of Continental Congress of the year in which said balloting was held;

Section 7. The State Corresponding Secretary shall:

(a) conduct correspondence and send notices on behalf of the State Regent, the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as may be directed by them;

(b) receive from the chapters the Master Questionnaires and distribute to the appropriate state chairmen.

Section 8. The State Organizing Secretary shall:

(a) assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new chapters;

(b) assist chapters in conjunction with appropriate state officers and chairmen in revitalization.

Section 9. The State Treasurer shall:

(a) be bonded;

(b) be the custodian of the funds of the State Society, placing them in institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance;

(c) receive the state dues and State Conference registration fees from the chapters and receive all sums contributed by the chapters for state and national projects, disbursing monthly to the Treasurer General all funds designated for national projects;

(d) disburse other funds only when authorized by the State Regent in writing;

(e) keep an account of all sums received or disbursed by using the basic double entry form of bookkeeping according to accepted accounting procedures and keep receipts for all transactions;

(f) prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference, sending a copy to the State Chairman of the Finance Committee ten (10) days in advance of each meeting;

(g) be a member of the Finance Committee and an ex-officio member of the Credentials Committee;

(h) balance and prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year; said audit by a Certified Public Accountant, shall be performed and delivered within forty-five (45) days of receipt of books.

(i) An internal review of the State Treasurer's records shall be performed when a change in this office occurs after the close of the fiscal year. Following the review, the records shall be turned over to the new State Treasurer. The committee to review the books shall be composed of the State First Vice Regent, the immediate Past State Treasurer, the immediate past Finance Chairman and a current Chapter Regent appointed by the State Regent.

Section 10. The State Registrar shall:

(a) when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution prove eligibility and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars;

(b) keep a correct list of all members in the state;

(c) report on membership to the State Conference;

(d) assist with the verification of the credentials;

(e) be in possession of the computer and software owned by the Georgia State Society and see that it is maintained.

Section 11. The State Historian shall:

(a) be in charge, within the state, of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General as well as those authorized by the Georgia State Society;

(b) keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves within the state;

(c) prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General;

(d) promote the study of American history, state and county history and historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the founding of our state and counties.

Section 12. The State Librarian shall:

(a) serve as liaison between the Librarian General and the Georgia Chapters and disseminate general information on the NSDAR Library;

(b) cooperate with the director of the Georgia Department of Archives and History, making the needs of the Archives known to the chapters;

(c) collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing them wherever accepted in such libraries and Archives as may be chosen by the State Board of Management;

(d) solicit, with the approval of the Executive Committee, contributions from the chapters for purchase of such books as requested by the office of the Librarian General, and/or the various libraries in Georgia which the State Society approves;

(e) receive gifts of books and other printed material from the chapters to be donated to the approved libraries and Archives;

(f) maintain a constant supply of bookplates to the NSDAR Library, the Georgia Department of Archives and History and for purchase by the chapters.

Section 13. The State Curator shall: be custodian of the State portable properties and shall have them properly stored and made ready for use at state meetings.

Section 14. All officers will keep a Procedure Book of Instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new officers to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. State Conference:

a) The annual meeting of the Georgia State Society shall be known as the State Conference. It shall be for the purpose of:

(1) receiving reports of officers, committees and Chapter Regents;

(2) electing officers biennially;

(3) promoting programs in furtherance of the objects of the Society;

(4) any other business that may arise:

i. annual budget shall be adopted,

ii. all projects of the State Society requiring funding shall be voted upon at State Conference or ratified by members at State Conference if previously voted upon by the State Board of Management,

iii. no project extending beyond the term of the presiding officer may be accepted at any meeting other than by vote at State Conference.

(b) The State Conference will be held between February 1 and the time of the meeting of Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week;

(c) The State Regent shall fix the time and place of meetings;

(d) The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credentials form to the chapters not less than sixty (60) days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 2. The voting members of the State Conference shall be:

(a) the officers and Honorary State Regents of the State Society;

(b) the officers and honorary officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state;

(c) the Chapter Regent, or in her absence, the Vice Regent or alternate of each chapter;

(d) delegates or alternates of each chapter of the state as designated by the Bylaws of the National Society for representation at Continental Congress.

Section 3. Only a chapter member in good standing whose credentials have been completed in accordance with the instructions of the State Regent and the State Credentials Chairman for the State Conference and in accordance with the Standing Rules of the National Society shall be eligible to represent her chapter at state and national meetings.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the chapter, except in the case of the Regent or Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at an annual State Conference, shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the state of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference the privilege of the floor and the right to speak shall be accorded to the State Chairmen and State Vice Chairmen. They may not vote unless they are duly registered as voters of the State Conference.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Society may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen (15) days' notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Forty-five (45) voting members, representing not less than twenty (20) chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The state officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents and the Regents, or in their absence, the Vice Regents of the chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the fall, following the October meeting of the National Board, It may meet whenever called by the State Regent. A minimum of twenty (20) days' notice shall be given as to the time and place of any such meeting.

Section 3. Thirty (30) members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference or as proscribed by these Bylaws.

Section 5. State chairmen, vice chairmen, committee members of the National and Standing Committees may attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privilege of the floor and the right to speak, but shall not vote. One (1) member from each chapter may attend the meetings, if invited by the chapter regent, and shall be granted the privilege of the floor, but shall not have the right to speak or vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article IX EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, shall attend the meetings, but may not vote.

Section 3. This Executive Committee shall:

(a) perform such duties of the State Board of Management between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient;

(b) meet at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three (3) members of the committee;

(c) vote by teleconference, e-mail or fax, if necessary;

(d) receive and make recommendations for projects requiring expenditure of funds outside routine expenditures to be considered by the State Conference;

(e) make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. Decisions of the Executive Committee shall be acted upon at the next meeting of the State Board of Management or at State Conference, whichever shall come first.

Article X FINANCES

Section 1. (a) The fiscal year of the Georgia State Society shall be July 1 through the last day of June.

b) The annual budget, prepared by the Finance Committee, shall cover the fiscal year and be prepared on the basis of dues payable for the calendar year beginning December first preceding.

(c) The Finance Committee shall propose the per capita amount and distribute according to the annual membership count. The per capita amount and distribution shall be indicated on the budget presented annually. Funds to be included in the per capita designations shall be distributed to the Friends of the DAR Schools, Lucy Cook Peel Fund, McCall Genealogical Fund, and Meadow Garden Maintenance.

Section 2. The annual dues of chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be \$10.00 for each member of the chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1.

Section 3. (a) Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the state dues, a conference registration fee of \$10.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under these Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether chapter is represented or not.

(b) State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay a conference fee of \$10.00 at the time of registration.

(c) Other members of the Georgia State Society who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a conference fee of \$7.00 at the time of registration.

(d) All host chapters may charge a registration fee to those not purchasing a meal ticket to off-set the cost of hosting state/district meetings.

Section 4. (a) The State Treasurer and the State Regent and such others entrusted with funds of the Georgia State Society as may be designated by the State Board of Management shall be bonded. (See Article VI, Sections 2 and 9);

(b) The State Treasurer with the approval of the State Regent and the State Chairman of the Finance Committee shall place the funds of the Georgia State

Society in financial institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage;

(c) The placement of restricted savings funds and investment funds of the Georgia State Society shall be placed to the credit of the Georgia State Society by the State Treasurer under the direction of the Finance Committee. Monies may be invested in U. S. Treasury obligations or other interest bearing obligations of federally insured financial institutions;

(d) The accounts of the State Treasurer shall be annually prepared for audit by a Certified Public Accountant immediately following the end of the State Society fiscal year and no later than July 15 and delivered to the CPA by that date;

(e) Should the State Treasurer be incapacitated, the State Regent, after consultation with the Chairman of the Finance Committee and with the approval of the Executive Committee, shall appoint an Acting State Treasurer to serve until such time as the State Treasurer is able to resume her duties or a new State Treasurer is appointed and ratified as stated in Article V, Section 5 (a).

Section 5. The expenses incurred by the State Regent in the performance of duty shall be paid each year from the State Dues Fund:

(a) Five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) shall be taken each year to defray her necessary travel expenses;

(b) Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent, as budgeted, shall be paid by the State Treasurer who shall keep all receipts of these expenses. No expenses exceeding the budgeted amount shall be paid by the State Treasurer.

Section 6. At the close of the books annually, \$5,000.00 shall be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies Fund" so that at the end of each administration a total of \$10,000.00 will be reserved. This money is to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration.

Article XI COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Honorary State Regents of the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution shall function as an advisory committee to the State Regent and to the Georgia State Society.

Section 2. The State Regent shall appoint the following standing committees:

(a) Bylaws: An Honorary State Regent shall be appointed as chairman and the committee shall be composed of two (2) other Honorary State Regents and one (1) member from each district;

(b) Finance: This committee shall be composed of seven (7) members to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two (2) Honorary State Regents, one (1) active chapter regent and one (1) active chapter member, who shall not be an Honorary State Regent, nor a state officer, nor a chapter regent. One of the two Honorary State Regents shall be appointed chairman. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund. This committee shall have charge of all investments of the Georgia State Society funds.

(c) Resolutions: This committee shall be composed of all Honorary State Regents, the State Parliamentarian and three (3) chapter members;

(d) Proceedings: This committee shall be composed of the State Recording Secretary, the immediate past State Recording Secretary, State First Vice Regent

and four (4) additional Daughters, at least one of whom shall be an Honorary State Regent.

Section 3. The State Regent shall appoint such other committees, standing or special, as the State Conference shall authorize and actions of the State Board of Management and of the National Society shall require. The appointments shall be concurrent with the term of the State Regent making the appointments and shall terminate with the end of the administration.

Section 4. Additional appointments may be made to any of the committees and vacancies shall be filled by the State Regent with timely notification to the membership.

Section 5. The duties of committees shall be such as these Bylaws, the State Conference, the State Board of Management or the National Society shall prescribe.

Section 6. All chairmen will keep a Procedure Book of instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

Article XII CHAPTERS

Section 1. To expedite the work of the Society, the chapters of the Georgia State Society shall be placed in geographical districts:

(a) A chairman appointed by the State Regent shall coordinate the work of all chapters as needed; she shall be titled "Coordinator of Districts;"

(b) Each district shall have a Director appointed by the State Regent to work as a committee under the direction and supervision of the Coordinator of Districts and the State Regent.

Section 2. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April 1 in the year of chapter elections. The Chapter Regent shall report annually the names of the elected officers promptly on the form provided by the State Regent for this purpose, with copies to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, and the State Recording Secretary.

Section 3. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent, the State Recording Secretary, and the District Director at the time designated by the State Regent.

Article XIII MEADOW GARDEN

Meadow Garden, property owned by the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, shall be operated as follows:

(a) The governing body shall be the Board of Trustees composed of the following members: the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Chairman who shall be appointed by the State Regent;

(b) The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the following members: the State Regent who shall serve as Chairman; the State First Vice Regent who shall serve as Secretary; the Chairman of Meadow Garden; the Regents of the Augusta and College Hill Chapters; the State Treasurer; two (2) Honorary State Regents; and the chairmen of the six (6) subcommittees appointed by the State Regent - Docents, Furnishings, Landscaping, Gift Shop, Patrons and Public Relations.

(c) The Meadow Garden Board shall operate with Standing Rules approved by the State Conference.

Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. The current edition of *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised,* shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law in matters not covered by these Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

Article XV AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent, the State Parliamentarian, and the State Bylaws Chairman. The State Regent shall send a copy to each chapter, at least sixty (60) days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the Call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

Article XVI DISSOLUTION

Although the period of duration of the Georgia State Society is perpetual, if for any reason the State Society is to be dissolved or otherwise terminated, no part of the property of the Society or any of the proceeds shall be distributed to or inure to the benefit of any of the officers or members of the Society. Upon the dissolution of the Georgia State Society, assets shall be distributed by the Board of Management and/or the Executive Committee to and only to the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the local United States District Court, exclusively to such organization or organizations as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated within the meaning of section 501 (c)(3), with purposes and objectives consistent with those of the Georgia State Society.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year, a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24, 1899. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21) No Conference was held in 1911, the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912," and amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, page 211).

AWARDS

All Chapters competing for awards must send reports to the respective chairmen by February 15. All reports for awards are based on membership confirmed by the National Society. SEE FIGURE BESIDE CHAPTER NAME IN CHAPTER REGENTS' DIRECTORY. The reporting year is January 1 - December 31.

BYLAWS

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National or State Bylaws, and a current copy is to be filed with the State Parliamentarian.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS

Notice of change of address of members shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, State Regent, State Corresponding Secretary, and the State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHANGE OF NAME

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, and the State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHAPTER ELECTIONS

As chapter elections are to be held before April 1. Names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, 1776 D Street, NW, Washington, DC 2006-5303; the State Regent or the State Regent-Elect; the State Recording Secretary; and the State Corresponding Secretary by April 1. The full Christian name of chapter officers shall be given, along with her husband's given name or initials, address, zip code, telephone number, fax and e-mail. In accordance with the National Bylaws, a Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years.

CHAPTER REPRESENTATION AT STATE AND NATIONAL MEETINGS

At the State Board of Management a chapter is represented by the Chapter Regent, or in her absence by the First Vice Regent, and one non-voting member, if invited by the Chapter Regent.

The voting representation of each chapter at State Conference and Continental Congress shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received in the Office of the Treasurer General by December 1. Membership 12-19: Regent only; 20-49: Regent + 1 delegate = 2 votes; 50-99: Regent + 2 delegates = 3 votes; 100-149: Regent + 3 delegates = 4 votes; 150-199: Regent + 4 delegates = 5 votes; 200-249: Regent + 5 delegates = 6 votes; 250-299: Regent + 6 delegates = 7 votes. Chapters with membership of 300 and over will have an additional delegate for each additional 50 members exceeding 299.

CONFERENCE REGISTRATION

On or before December 1, each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer the state dues and a Conference Registration fee of \$10.00 per each delegate to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws. This fee is to be paid whether represented or not and is derived by recommendation of the Finance Committee to the Executive Committee. This is a requirement stated in the Georgia State Bylaws, Article X, Section 3 (a).

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the Conference Registration Fee of \$10.00 at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters, shall pay a Conference Registration Fee of \$7.00 at the time of registration.

DATE FOR ANNUAL AUDIT

The Georgia State Society Fiscal Year is July 1 to June 30. State Bylaws, Article X, Section 1 (a). The State Treasurer should prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year. Bylaw Article VI, Section 9 (h).

DEADLINES

State Officers and Chairmen welcome chapter reports when completed. Deadline dates are given to ensure conformity for inclusion in reports to National Officers. Per National Society Bylaws, the deadline date is determined by the United States Postal Service or other carrier, showing cancellation date and not by the date reports are received.

DECEASED MEMBERS

Deaths shall be reported promptly to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Chaplain and the State Registrar by the corresponding Chapter officer. A complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name, and date of death shall be furnished to the State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for the Conference Memorial Service and for State *Proceedings*.

DUES

Before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer sends to the State Treasurer state dues of \$10.00 per member. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the December through February Board meeting of the National Society. Before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer sends to the office of the Organizing Secretary General National dues of \$37.00 per member except Life Members, with check made payable to the Treasurer General NSDAR.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this fund shall not be cumulative.

Chapter Regents should exclude NSDAR Chapter Achievement Award and State Honor Roll, as these will be added when confirmed. Your name should be consistent with the lists of Chapter Regents and State Chairmen as found in this Proceedings. Winners of awards and awards to be offered shall each be listed on separate sheets identified with the title of the committee and the award. Chapter reports should be sent to the State Regent, District Director, and the State Recording Secretary by February 1. The deadline for

State Officers and State Chairmen reports and list of awards (if any) is **March 1** and should be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary.

To establish the \$10,000, the additional \$5,000 shall come from the general checking account. *Proceedings* 2009-2010, amended 2012.

RESOLUTIONS

Resolutions to be considered by the Committee shall be typed, with a heading which gives subject of the resolution. The proposed resolution shall be signed, dated and sent to the Chairman of the Resolutions Committee two weeks before the date of State Conference.
