Executive Committee Meeting Minutes

Workshop - August 11, 2016

The Executive Committee of the Georgia State Society National Society Daughters of the American Revolution (NSDAR) met at 4:00 p.m. on Thursday, August 11, 2016, at the Hampton Inn, Moultrie with State Regent Joyce Ball Patton presiding. Officers in attendance were: Joyce Ball Patton, State Regent; Melodye G. Brown, First Vice Regent; Ocie Blanche "O.B." Wilhoit McCorkle, Second Vice Regent; Rebecca Malone West, Corresponding Secretary; Phyllis Fox Lawson, Organizing Secretary; Donna Lynn Owens, Treasurer; Brenda Davison Jessel, Registrar; Robin Redfearn Towns, Historian; E. Lynn Brackey, Librarian; and Shannon Cowles Logue, Curator. Also in attendance was Kate Sievert Cook, Parliamentarian.

State Regent Joyce Patton called the meeting to order. In the excused absences of Chaplain Mary Elizabeth "Betty" Brown Harrah and Recording Secretary Eleanor Brinson Quigley, Mrs. Patton appointed Mrs. McCorkle to serve as Chaplain pro tem and Mrs. Towns to serve as Recording Secretary pro tem during the four 2016 District Workshops and Executive Committee Meeting.

The invocation was given by Mrs. McCorkle.

The State Regent welcomed Committee members and expressed her appreciation for attendance at the successful State Regent's Tea on Saturday, July 30 at Eagles Landing Country Club in Stockbridge. Mrs. Patton reported on progress at Meadow Garden: Students from the University of Georgia Historic Preservation Master's Program will undertake research to determine the dates of the house structures. The window restoration project has been delayed by the grant approval process. The Mulberry Soirée fundraising event will be held at Meadow Garden on Saturday evening, October 1, 2016.

The State Regent praised the two outstanding workshops just held, Wednesday, August 10 in the Athens area, hosted by Apalachee Chapter, and Thursday, August 11 in Marietta, hosted by Fielding Lewis Chapter. Mrs. Patton reported on successful fundraising for the State Regent's projects: Basket Fling proceeds for the first two workshops were \$4,213.00, and State Regent's Project pin sales were \$30,000.00.

The State Regent requested the State Officers' support and attendance for upcoming Georgia State Society events, including the Constitution Week Luncheon on Saturday, September 17, 2016, at Piedmont Driving Club in Atlanta. Bring items for the Juniors' Silent Auction to be held at the State Board of Management at the Atlanta Marriott Gateway Hotel, October 27-29. Mrs. Patton encouraged State Officers to attend State Regent's Visit events held in their area.

Mrs. Patton reported on the State Regent's projects, which have been identified: Berry College: Restoration of the stained-glass windows at Frost Chapel; and Tamassee DAR School: Refurbishment of the front entrance to Talmadge Auditorium. Funds have been donated by Rose and John Bell.

Melodye Brown, First Vice Regent, reported on the continuing project of the DAR Schools Chair at Tamassee DAR School. Ms. Brown and O.B. McCorkle, Second Vice Regent and DAR Schools Chair, expressed the need for an historic building needs assessment to determine the best plan for the maintenance and repair of the Talmadge Auditorium. Ms. Brown moved that the Schools Chair initiate and manage an Historic Building Needs Assessment for the GSSDAR, of the May Erwin Talmadge Auditorium Gymnasium, with funds to be taken from the "Georgia State Project" fund for Tamassee, which is held at Tamassee, not to exceed \$15,000.00. State Board of Management – October 27, 2016

The Executive Committee Meeting of the Georgia State Society NSDAR was held in the Executive Board Room of the Atlanta Airport Marriott Gateway, Atlanta. Thursday, October 27, 2016, at 6:17 p.m., State Regent Joyce Ball Patton presiding. Officers in attendance were: Joyce Ball Patton; Melodye G. Brown, First Vice Regent; Ocie Blanche "O.B." Wilhoit McCorkle, Second Vice Regent; Mary Elizabeth "Betty" Brown Harrah, Chaplain; Eleanor Brinson Quigley, Recording Secretary; Rebecca Malone West, Corresponding Secretary; Phyllis Fox Lawson, Organizing Secretary; Deborah "Debbie" Taylor Powell, Treasurer; Brenda Davison Jessel, Registrar; Robin Redfearn Towns, Historian; E. Lynne Brackey, Librarian; and Shannon Cowles Logue, Curator.

The State Regent called the meeting to order and thanked all officers for being an enthusiastic part of the Patton Administration.

Mrs. Harrah delivered the Invocation.

State Regent Patton deferred her main report until the State Board of Management Meeting (SBOM) but did report on a number of major planning events for State Conference: planning meeting, conference guests, innovative changes and new menus.

The first planning meeting for State Conference has been held. A large number of Daughters are expected to attend State Conference, based on recent record-breaking attendance at events. Georgia has over 7,000 members; conference planners are hoping to see 700 Daughters at State Conference in 2017.

Addressing the Daughters at the Friday night Opening Session will be Mary Bannister Frisch, Registrar General.

The 2017 State Conference will feature a series of themed-based seminars, held prior to the Conference. An opinion survey was taken before Conference with over 300 Daughters responding. Over 70% agreed with the Memorial Service's being moved to Sunday, followed by a prayer breakfast.

First Vice Regent Melodye Brown reported that many State Regents installed in 2016 were present on the DAR Schools Bus Tour. Ms. Brown thanked the Daughters who greeted the buses upon their arrival at Berry College, Rome, GA.

The First Vice Regent moved that the Executive Committee of the Georgia State Society DAR vote to ratify the teleconference vote on the appointment of new State Treasurer Deborah "Debbie" Taylor Powell. Ratified.

The State Regent announced that the protocol of the NSDAR for selecting and approving projects is to thoroughly investigate for information on time to complete and associated price, before proposal and undertaking of said project. Using this mandate, the Executive Committee discussed each separate project of the three major projects under consideration: improvements at Meadow Garden, digitizing Georgia's historic Proceedings library, and restoration of the three stained-glass windows at Frost Chapel on the Berry College Campus, donated by Georgia DAR State Society DAR.

Improvements at Meadow Garden: Both on application and during the paperwork phase of applying for accreditation by the American Alliance of Museums, payments are made. The application takes many months to complete and includes a site visit. Total payments are expected to be approximately \$2,000.00.

Proceedings digitization: The data thus far accumulated for the scanning of Georgia's historic Proceedings collection demonstrates that Daughters are taking approximately an

hour per book to scan each Proceedings volume. Thus the approximate time needed will be three months, giving the ability to project the costs for the rented scanner.

Stained-glass windows at Berry College: The stained glass windows at Berry College were donated by the Georgia Society DAR in honor of the Berry College men who sacrificed their lives in WWII. They will need delicate and age-appropriate cleaning.

The Vice Regent moved that the Executive Committee recommend that the SBOM approve and adopt as State Regent's Projects the three major projects selected by State Regent Joyce Ball Patton. Adopted.

Second Vice Regent and DAR School Chair, O.B. McCorkle, thanked everyone who participated in the DAR Schools Tour and visits to the DAR Schools. Twenty-five Georgia Daughters visited Hindman Settlement School for the Hindman "Day at the Races." Future trips are being planned to familiarize Georgia Daughters with DAR schools. She announced that Berry's Scott Breithaupt is working to initiate private tours of the Berry Campus for DAR Chapters.

The May Erwin Talmadge Auditorium Project at Tamassee DAR School has of necessity been cancelled, with those monies going to the Tamassee Mental Health Counselor Project and to the Hindman Cornerstone Capital Campaign. In explanation, Tamassee declined the offer of the Georgia State Society DAR to pay for a needs-based assessment for work needed for restoration of the Talmadge Auditorium. Tamassee will sponsor an assessment of buildings and cottages within the next six months and will pay for it. Therefore, Georgia's vote is null and void. Georgia will have first request of projects at the next Tamassee Board Meeting. Tamassee used \$1,200.00 to paint the doors of the Talmadge Auditorium. State Regent Patton, on seeing the work done, declared it inappropriate and unprofessional and requested a better job be done with Georgia's money. She also requested that funds spent be removed from the funds provided by John and Rose Bell. Second Vice Regent and School Chair, O.B. McCorkle, requested that the minutes reflect that Tamassee refused the \$100,000.00 of Georgia DAR money; that Tamassee declined the offer of the Georgia DAR to pay for an assessment, as is here stated.

State Chaplain Betty Harrah, deferred her report until SBOM.

Eleanor Quigley, State Recording Secretary, deferred the majority of her report, but delivered grateful thanks to the Committee for their sympathy and loving condolences during her recent bereavement, thanking Robin Towns, past Recording Secretary, for stepping in as Acting Recording Secretary at all Workshop functions. She also thanked State Regent Joyce Patton for her many kindnesses.

State Corresponding Secretary, Becky West, also deferred her report until SBOM.

Phyllis Lawson, State Organizing Secretary, deferred her report.

State Treasurer, Debbie Powell, distributed the Treasurer's Report and reported the Georgia State Society balance sheet summary as of September 30, 2016: Savings \$500.60; Certificates of Deposit \$123,867.96; Checking account balance \$128,799.58; with Total Money Market Accounts \$101,174.09. Total assets are \$354,342.23; Total Liabilities & Equity are \$354,342.23.

The State Regent thanked the new Treasurer and past Treasurer, Betty Harrah, for their work in coordinating and training to achieve current updated results.

Brenda Jessel, Registrar, reported that Georgia has 7,863 members and 109 chapters. This is an increase in membership of 255 since January 1, 2016. She reported that the current membership team, Rene' Hardin, Kitty Watters, and Marguerite Dyal is a true "Dream Team."

Mrs. Jessel also reported that she was honored to be the Chair of the New Horizons Leadership Training Course. Currently, 20 Georgia Daughters are taking the course.

She further reported that 159 members from 47 chapters, plus SAR guests, are enrolled in the SBOM Genealogy Courses.

State Librarian Lynn Brackey moved that \$1,500.00 be donated to the NSDAR Library in order to replace four book shelves near the spiral steps. The new

shelves would be full sized thus accommodating more books. The money would come from \$7,900.00 that had been contributed by chapters. The donation would be made in honor of GSSNSDAR Daughters.

Mrs. Harrah moved that the motion be amended to read that \$1,500.00 be donated to the NSDAR Library in order to replace four book shelves near the spiral steps. The new shelves would be full sized thus accommodating more books. The money would be withdrawn from the State Library Fund. The donation would be made in honor of GSSNSDAR Daughters. Adopted as amended.

Historian Robin Towns announced that there were three entries in the American History Contest. She deferred the remainder of her report until the SBOM.

Curator Shannon Logue displayed to the committee an antique book she purchased as a gift for the Georgia State Society. The book, authored by Octavia Walton Le Vert, was published in 1857. Octavia was "Born in Georgia, the Grandchild of that Walton who was both sage and soldier in the Revolution," quoted from the preface to her book, naming her paternal grandfather, George Walton, Sr., resident of the DAR's Meadow Garden.

The State Regent announced that the 119th State Conference Executive Committee Meeting would be held March 8. Other official meetings would begin March 9.

The First Vice Regent moved that the Executive Committee approve as State Regent's Projects the following three major projects selected by State Regent Joyce Ball Patton: 1. At Meadow Garden: a. To complete any repairs and painting necessary after the window restoration; b. To fund the process of accreditation by the American Alliance of Museums, to be completed prior to June of 2018; c. To provide an appropriate HVAC system for the lower level which will allow the lower level front door to be used as an entrance; d. To fund a display of clothing of the time period 1790-1820, partially on mannequins; e. To provide equipment needed to store records on a server and allow staff to respond to emails and maintain the website, and further 2. To digitize our historic collection of the Proceedings of the Georgia State Society, and make them available to all members on the Georgia State Society Members Web Site, and further 3. To clean and restore three stained glass windows in Berry' College's Frost Chapel, given by the Georgia State Society in memory of Berry students who died in World War II. Adopted.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:20 p.m. Approved April 23, 2017

State Conference – March 8, 2017

The Executive Committee Meeting of the Georgia State Society Daughters of the American Revolution was held in the Juniper Room of the Evergreen Marriott Conference Resort, Stone Mountain, on Wednesday, March 8, 2017, at 5:05 p.m., with State Regent Joyce Ball Patton presiding. Officers in attendance were: Joyce Ball Patton, State Regent; Melodye G. Brown, First Vice Regent; Ocie Blanche "O.B." Wilhoit McCorkle, Second Vice Regent; Mary Elizabeth "Betty" Brown Harrah, Chaplain; Eleanor Brinson Quigley, Recording Secretary; Rebecca Malone West, Corresponding Secretary; Phyllis Fox Lawson, Organizing Secretary; Deborah "Debbie" Taylor Powell, Treasurer; Brenda Davison Jessel, Registrar; Robin Redfearn Towns, Historian; E. Lynn Brackey, Librarian; and Shannon Cowles Logue, Curator., Also in attendance was Kate Sievert Cook, Parliamentarian.

The State Regent called the meeting to order and delivered the opening prayer.

Mrs. Patton thanked all officers for attending the first State Conference of the Patton Administration.

Mrs. Patton stated that at the October 29, 2016 State Board of Management, the Finance Committee recommended that the Georgia State Society hire a firm to search

and establish clear title on the property previously owned by the disbanded Lyman Hall Chapter, Waycross. The motion (found on page 173) was adopted and will be submitted to the State Conference for ratification. Parliamentarian Kate Cook, a litigation attorney, recommended that a real estate attorney in the area be hired. Further, Chapter Bylaws are in effect and removal of restriction of use on the property is financially wise. Affidavits need to be obtained from living individuals who held the named offices of Lyman Hall. The property was valued at \$80,000.00 on tax records, but may be worth more since it is located in a developing commercial area. The YMCA is interested in purchasing the property and is willing to clear the title.

Mrs. Patton announced that Georgia Tech Professor Christopher Lee will begin digitizing Proceedings, starting in May.

Hindman Settlement School has approached the Georgia State Society for funds to aid their dyslexia program. O.B. McCorkle, Second Vice Regent and DAR School Chair proposed that Georgia fund the "Georgia Office" at Hindman, cost \$15,000.00. The facility would serve the children of the counties within the Hindman Dyslexia Program area. First funds will be raised through a "Non-event," when Daughters will be asked to donate funds previously spent on "A Day at the Races."

Mrs. McCorkle recommended asking major donors, individuals and chapters, to pool donations through the state society. The State Regent would propose a new State Regent's Project at the next State Board of Management to fund the "Georgia Office" at Hindman. The project would be ratified at the 120th State Conference, with the donated funds supplemented with any remaining State Project Funds. This would not be a multi-year project, nor would Georgia agree to maintenance. Contributions would be designated as part of the Cornerstone Capital Campaign at Hindman, with extra funds going into the campaign. This would establish Georgia's presence at Hindman Settlement School, as is the case with Kate Duncan Smith DAR School and Tamassee DAR School.

Mrs. Patton reported that a letter to the GSSDAR from Tamassee DAR School stated Tamassee was turned down for a grant to undertake an assessment. Tamassee had been operating from a 1990 assessment, which was primarily cosmetic. The May Erwin Talmadge Auditorium and Gymnasium has a new roof, and the walls have been sealed, so major maintenance has been accomplished. There is no current directive for additional needed maintenance.

Workshops will be held on two consecutive weekends: August 11 in Columbus and August 12 in Atlanta; August 18 in St. Simons and August 19 in Macon. Genealogy Workshops held the same weekends will be in Columbus, August 10 and St. Simons, August 17.

The State Regent announced that over 700 people registered for conference, with over 300 pre-registered for Genealogy Workshops. Other workshops feature computer knowledge, historic preservation and digitizing personal history.

The 2017 State Board of Management will be held November 2-4 at the Augusta Marriott at the Convention Center, giving Daughters an opportunity to see the Meadow Garden window restoration and painting.

The 120th State Conference will be held April 4-8, 2018, at the Crown Plaza Ravinia, Atlanta.

The State Regent asked the officers to report. First Vice Regent Melodye Brown thanked the State Regent for her outstanding leadership and work for the Georgia Society. The Executive Committee showed their appreciation. Ms. Brown announced that tickets for the Georgia Meadow Garden Luncheon at Continental Congress are available from her for \$62.00.

Second Vice Regent and DAR Schools Chair O.B. McCorkle announced that 415 guests were registered for the DAR School Luncheon at State Conference. The Society raised \$18,000.00 for special projects; including monies for the window restoration at Frost Chapel, Berry College, donations total \$34,000.00. Sale of Apple-and-Arrow Pins

equals \$7,500.00 for 298 pins. Georgia plans to be an Apple Sponsor at the National DAR School Luncheon with several tables.

Betty Harrah, Chaplain, reported that at the State Conference Memorial Service, 124 Daughters would be remembered, including two Honorary State Regents.

Recording Secretary Eleanor Quigley deferred her report. Mrs. Patton thanked Mrs. Quigley for the collation of all officer and chair reports for the State Regent's use during meetings.

Becky West, Corresponding Secretary, deferred her report.

Treasurer Debbie Powell reported that the header dates on the Treasurer's Report should be changed to read the correct "As of" date, February 28, 2017. Funds from the State Conference were moved into the money market fund, temporarily inflating the balance by \$60.000.00, to ensure the GSS checking account balance remained below the mandated balance of \$250,000.00. State project fund raising monies would soon decrease, as they were put to designated use for funding Meadow Garden's renovation of the historic windows and the air conditioning

Organizing Secretary Phyllis Lawson reported that the disbanded Metter Chapter sent the Chapter Regent's pin and flags to the Georgia Society. Mrs. Harrah moved **that the antique flags from the Metter Chapter be offered to the next organized chapter in Georgia. The Pin will go into archives at Meadow Garden. Approved.** Mrs. Lawson further reported that the February, 2017 National Board of Management approved the Jacob Braselton Chapter in Braselton, Caroline Giles Mixon, Organizing Regent.

Brenda Jessel, Registrar, thanked the State Regent for TEAM DAR, which works together with the Registrar to increase Georgia membership: State Chairs of Chapter Development & Revitalization Commission and Volunteer Genealogists Rene' Hardin; Lineage Research Kitty Watters; Membership Marguerite Dyal. Georgia Daughters continue completing the GEP classes. Georgia started 2016 with 7,664 members. In 2016, Georgia had 118 member deaths, 127 dropped members, 197 resigned members, 64 former members reinstated; 165 members transferred out with 87 leaving Georgia; 148 transferred in with 70 new to Georgia. Georgia had 452 new members by application. With deaths, resignations, transfers out, Georgia had an increase of 55 members with the final number of Georgia Daughters at year-end 7,854. The State Regent would like to see Georgia's membership reach 8,000 in 2017.

Mrs. Jessel, New Horizons Chair, reported 15 graduates would receive diplomas on Chapter Appreciation Night, State Conference 2017.

Historian Robin Towns reported that the Historian General approved the placement of two commemorative markers and one Revolutionary soldier marker. Five member grave marker reports were received and archived. The 2017 Outstanding Teacher of American History is Harry W. Cooper, Jefferson High School, Athens, nominated by Elijah Clarke Chapter, Mary Ann Hoit Abbe, Regent..

Librarian Lynn Brackey reported voices for a basket will be available at State Conference to support state library funds. USO Wish Book Project books will be available for sale during the State Conference in the USO Wish Book room, which will also accept donated children's books. The State Regent thanked Mrs. Brackey for the "library-box," which brought in \$7,000.00 from chapter donations.

Shannon Logue, Curator, reported the GSSDAR's Insignia was refurbished and three new flag poles with metal joints, appropriate for processionals, were purchased. Also purchased as a gift to the society by Mrs. Logue were gold cords for the flags. The ballot box is available for use.

The Parliamentarian had no report.

Teleconference – June 8, 2017

The State Regent introduced Julia "Judy" Ann Farrigan, Credentials Chair, who reported: 1 National Officer, 8 Honorary State Regents (1 of whom is reported elsewhere), 12 State Officers, 70 Chapter Regents (2 of whom are reported elsewhere), 4 Vice Regents, Total Voting Delegates 92; 1 National Chair, 10 National Vice Chairs (7 of whom are reported elsewhere), 53 State Chairs, 27 State Vice Chairs, 36 chapter members, and 3 guests. Without duplication, 205 representing 84 Chapters were in attendance. Ms. Farrigan moved the adoption of the first Credentials report. Adopted. The Chair declared a Quorum had been established.

Hearing no objections, the Proceedings Committee will approve the minutes of the State Board of Management meeting.

The First Vice Regent took the chair, and the State Regent gave her report.

State Regent Joyce Patton reported the last four months have been a whirlwind of meetings with committees, the Coordinator of Districts, the District Directors and the Membership Team.

During the last week of June the Regent traveled to Augusta for the first Meadow Garden meeting and the Junior Tea.

The State Regent's Tea at Eagles Landing Country Club in Stockbridge was attended by over 300 members and guests. Daughters were thanked for their support.

In August Mrs. Patton greeted 1,135 Georgia Daughters who attended the four State Workshops. She thanked the Hostess Chapters, Apalachee, Fort Peachtree, Barnard Trail, Thronateeska, and Sukey Hart, for their hospitality.

September included visits to the Governor's Office for signing of the Constitution Week Proclamation; a visit to Meadow Garden; and attending a 9/11 Service in Suwanee, hosted by the Suwanee Creek Chapter, Cathy Hyer, Regent. Mrs. Patton spent a few days in Augusta with our State Treasurer, Debbie Powell. The Constitution Week Luncheon was attended by 268 members and guests at the Piedmont Driving Club. Georgia Attorney General, Sam Olens, was the speaker. Sandra Dunagan Deal, Georgia's First Lady, also attended. The State Official Visits began with an event held in the Central East (CE) District, Amelia Rogers Pelton, Director, at the Madison Tea Room and Gardens, September 18. A luncheon was held in Milledgeville September 19 at St. Stephens Episcopal Church with CE chapters. September 20 a luncheon was held at the Dublin Country Club with CE chapters. The last visit of the week was to the Southeast (SE) District, Cathy Miller, District Director, with Savannah area chapters. The Finance Committee met on September 28 to prepare the Budget for the 2016-2017 year.

October featured travel to the National Board of Management in Washington, DC. This State Regent enjoyed the Museum Exhibit with period attire displayed in all the period rooms, including Georgia's Peter Tondee's Tavern. Your State Regent purchased books, patterns and information for period attire from 1790 to 1820. State Regent met the National Chairs and received packets of information. Recommendations from the Executive Committee included the establishment of the America 250! Committee which will encourage, develop, and coordinate the commemoration of the history of the United States leading up to the 250th Anniversary; new artwork was accepted for Donor and Benefactor pins; and the President General's Project and 2017 Budget were approved. The Registrar General reported that from July 1 to September 30, 4,094 applications were received, 4,054 were verified and 728 were Junior Members. The last number issued was 962640. The Organizing Secretary General reported the automatic disbanding of the Metter Chapter from Metter, Georgia. The 2017 Continental Congress will be held June 28-July 2, 2017.

Following the National Board Meeting, Daughters proceeded to the Arrow and Apple buses, which traveled to the DAR Schools. The first stop was Hindman Settlement School, followed by Kate Duncan Smith DAR School, and Georgia's own Berry College. The Georgia State Society paid a portion of the cost to entertain the tour guests. Berry gave a dinner held on the lawn at Martha Berry's home. President General Dillion visited Frost Chapel and viewed the Georgia State Society's gift of three stained glass windows.

The next day the DAR Schools tour traveled to Tamassee DAR School, where more Georgia Daughters were welcomed. They attended an event on Wednesday evening and a meeting at Tamassee on Thursday morning. Four days later 25 Georgia Daughters traveled to Lexington, Kentucky, to participate in the Hindman Day at the Races Fundraiser. Georgia Daughters gave \$2,300.00, the Cameo Society gave \$1,500.00, a total of \$3,800.00 from Georgia Daughters.

State Regent Patton thanked the Daughters for the honor to represent them and stated her gratitude with "God Bless You and God Bless America."

The First Vice Regent thanked the State Regent for her outstanding leadership, and Georgia Daughters showed their appreciation with a standing ovation. The State Regent resumed the chair and called for reports of the Executive Committee.

First Vice Regent Melodye Brown reported that among the duties of the First Vice Regent is the responsibility to serve as Secretary to the Meadow Garden Board and the Finance Committee, as well as serving as a member of the Resolutions, Bylaws (exofficio), and Proceedings Committees. In addition to reporting attending all meetings of State Standing Committees and five meetings of the Meadow Garden Board, Ms. Brown reported that she attended the second annual Mulberry Soiree at Meadow Garden on October 1. She encouraged Georgia Daughters to attend next fall. Ms. Brown represented the Georgia Society at the Berry College Chapel Centennial Celebration on September 18 and reported that National Chair of DAR Schools, Peggy Troxell, represented the National Society at this event, where DAR gifts for the chapel were recognized, including the pew Bibles given in honor of Honorary State Regent Bea Fischer. Along with the State Regent and Constitution Chair Lydia McGill, Ms. Brown attended the signing of the Georgia Constitution Week proclamation in the office of Governor Nathan Deal, where they were joined by Mrs. Deal, Ms. Brown reported that she attended the State Constitution Week Luncheon in Atlanta and Augusta Chapter's Constitution Luncheon and wreath-laying at the grave of William Few. Ms. Brown presented programs and visited with the members of Andrew McBride and George Walton Chapters. Ms. Brown met the National School Tour at Kate Duncan Smith DAR School Dedication Day, Tamassee DAR School Founders Day, and welcomed the President General and the DAR School Tour to her hometown and Berry College. Xavier Chapter hosted a reception for the DAR School Tour in the gardens of Oak Hill, Martha Berry's home. Ms. Brown attended Hindman Settlement School's "Day at the Races." This officer reported that the 2017 Georgia Luncheon at Continental Congress will be held at the Hamilton Crowne Plaza Hotel, at noon on Wednesday, June 28. Tickets will be available at State Conference.

Second Vice Regent O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle reported that as DAR School Chair, she was pleased with the interest that chapters and members have in visiting the DAR Schools. During the DAR School Tour, Georgia Daughters attended KDS Dedication Day, Tamassee Founder's Day, and at Berry College Daughters enjoyed a tour, reception and dinner. She announced that a record number of 25 daughters traveled to Kentucky to Hindman's "Day at the Races" at the Keeneland Racetrack, where the Georgia State Society was a Silver Sponsor of the event. Mrs. McCorkle encouraged chapters and members to visit the DAR schools to create lasting, caring relationships. She reported that response to the special projects has been positive. Following the District Meetings, the special project at Tamassee was changed to the Mental Health Counseling Fund; and the special project at Hindman now includes the Cornerstone Project. Resolutions for the special projects were submitted to the Resolutions Committee and Hightower award requirements were reviewed with chapters. Following the last Executive Committee meeting, Tamassee declined the offer to have a Historic Building Needs Assessment completed for the May Irwin Talmadge Gymnasium/Auditorium which had been voted approved by the GSS Executive Committee.

Chaplain "Betty" Harrah reported that she had been working with chapter chaplains to make sure they are sending updated 90+ Birthday list forms and Deceased Member Forms, as well as contacting NSDAR with this information. The list for 90+ Birthdays is at 271 members and to date this officer has sent 219 birthday cards. Since March 1, 2016, 65 members have died, including Honorary State Regent, Dollye Wren Ward. Sympathy cards have been sent to families when information is available from the Chapter Chaplain. Chapter chaplains have been encouraged to keep in contact with those members who are unable to attend meetings.

State Regent Patton asked Recording Secretary Eleanor Brinson Quigley to read the **Recommendations from the Executive Committee**. Mrs. Quigley read the recommendation that the Executive Committee recommends that the State Board of

Management ratify the appointment of Deborah "Debbie" Taylor Powell to the office of State Treasurer. Ratified.

The State Regent asked the First Vice Regent to take the Chair, Mrs. Quiglev read the recommendation that the Executive Committee recommends that the State Board of Management approve and adopt as State Projects the following projects selected by State Regent Joyce Ball Patton: 1. At Meadow Garden: To complete any repairs and painting necessary after the window restoration; To fund the process of accreditation by the American Alliance of Museums, to be completed prior to June of 2018; To provide an appropriate HVAC system for the lower level which will allow the lower level front door to be used as an entrance; To fund a display of clothing of the time period 1790-1820, partially on mannequins; To provide equipment needed to store records on a server and allow staff to respond to emails and maintain the website;" and further "2. To digitize our historic collection of the Proceedings of the Georgia State Society, and make them available to all members on the Georgia State Society Members Web Site;" and further "3. To clean and restore three stained glass windows in Berry' College's Frost Chapel, given by the Georgia State Society in memory of Berry students who died in World War II."

Honorary State Regent Carolyn Grant Hanf moved that the recommendation be Referred back to a committee of three officers to separate the three items: Meadow Garden, Digitization of Proceedings and Berry College Frost windows, giving an estimated cost of each and where excess funds are to be credited. Adopted. The amended motion was tabled until after lunch. Mrs. Patton appointed three Officers to redraft the Motion: Melodye Brown, Robin Towns and Lynn Brackey, assisted by Parliamentarian Kate Cook and Mrs. Patton ex officio.

Mrs. Quigley read the recommendation that the Executive Committee recommends to the State Board of Management that \$500 be donated to the NSDAR Library in honor of Georgia State Regent, Joyce Ball Patton, for the purchase of books for the Georgia Collection. The check will be sent after 01 January 2017 for use in that year. Adopted.

The State Regent resumed the Chair. Mrs. Quigley read the recommendation that the Executive Committee recommends to the State Board of Management that \$1500.00 be donated to the NSDAR Library in order to replace four book shelves near the spiral steps. The new shelves would be full sized thus accommodating more books. The money would be withdrawn from the State Library Fund. The donation would be made in honor of GSSNSDAR Daughters. Adopted.

Recording Secretary Eleanor Brinson Quigley thanked State Historian Robin Towns, who served as Recording Secretary pro tem during the Workshop Executive Board Meeting and all four Workshops. Mrs. Quigley also thanked the Daughters for sympathy cards and loving expressions of condolence during her recent bereavement. Mrs. Quigley expressed her pleasure in working as Co-Editor of the "Georgia Gazette," and thanked Editor, State Corresponding Secretary Becky West, and Technical Advisor, VIS Co-Chair Carla Brown. Mrs. Quigley reported that she attended the 125th Continental Congress in Washington, DC, where our new State Regent, Joyce Ball Patton and Georgia's National Officer, Corresponding Secretary General, Virginia Grace Lingelbach were sashed. Also attended were the State Regent's Tea, the Constitution Week Luncheon, the 35th Anniversary Tea of this officer's chapter, Captain Edward Hagin, and the Anniversary Luncheon of Xavier Chapter and this SBOM. Mrs. Quigley also welcomed the President General and the DAR School Bus Tour to Berry College in Rome, GA, this officer's home town. Recording Secretary Quigley thanked all Daughters who sent in State Board of Management reports in a timely fashion. The Georgia State Society has many new Chairs, who were thanked. All were reminded of the new paradigm of submitting reports electronically.

Corresponding Secretary Rebecca Malone West reported that in June Issue #1 of The Georgia Gazette was e-mailed to all State Officers, Honorary State Regents with email access. District Directors. State Chairs and Vice Chairs, and Chapter Recents. Hard copies were mailed to all Honorary State Regents. In September Issue #2 was issued to the same recipients. Mrs. West extended appreciation to State Recording Secretary Eleanor Quigley and VIS Co-Chair Carla Brown for assistance in publishing the newsletter. Mrs. West reported that in July the State Directory was prepared and was sold at the District Workshops. Copies are still available for \$5 each. Updates can be found on the GSSDAR members-only website under "Publications." Also in July Mrs. West prepared the Chapter Information Packet (CIP) prior to the District Workshops. Thanks were expressed to VIS Co-chairs Carla Brown and Cathy Hyer, for assistance in preparing the CIP. Mrs. West announced that Certificates of Award and Certificates of Appreciation were available for 20 cents each. Mrs. West reported that the Chapter Officer Report Form (CORF) must be sent to her and to the Organizing Secretary General with a postmarked date of no later than May 1, 2017, even if there are no changes in chapter officers.

Organizing Secretary Phyllis Lawson reported that at the request of the Metter Chapter, this officer began the process of the disbandment of that Chapter due to the drop in membership below the number specified by our National Bylaws. At the October National Board of Management this chapter was automatically disbanded. The goal of this officer and the State Society is to retain membership in the Georgia State Society, assist in the organization of new chapters and is available to help strengthen existing chapters.

Treasurer Deborah Taylor Powell distributed the Treasurer's Balance Sheet and reported the Georgia State Society Balance Sheet Summary as of September 30, 2016: Savings \$500.60; Certificates of Deposit \$123,867.96; Checking account balance \$128,799.58; with Total Money Market Accounts \$101,174.09. Total assets are \$354342.23; Total Liabilities & Equity \$354,342.23. The Meadow Garden Balance Sheet Account Summary as of September 30, 2016: Certificates of Deposit \$373,119.57; Checking account balance \$49,493.04; with Total Money Market Accounts \$73,094.05. Petty Cash \$100.00 and Petty Cash – Go Green \$100.00; Total Fixed Assets are \$257,003.00; Total Liabilities & Equity \$354,342.23. Mrs. Powell reported that the tax return is being prepared by CPA Robin R. McIntire.

Registrar Brenda Davison Jessel reported that 159 members representing 47 chapters registered to attend the Genealogical Workshop on October 28, Cindy Weatherby and Deb Duay speakers. Mrs. Jessel reported that as of October 28, 2016, there are 7,863 members, 567 of whom are Juniors, in the 109 chapters in the Georgia State Society. This reflects an increase of 265 members, over January1, 2016. "Star" Chapters who have already increased their chapter membership by 10% or more are: Colonel William Chandler, Philadelphia Winn, Reverend John Andrew, Martha Stewart Bullock, Patriots of Liberty, James Stewart, and Lieutenant James Monroe. She thanked Phyllis Lawson, State Organizing Secretary, for helping with a smooth transition. Mrs. Jessel reported that the entire TEAM DAR is working overtime to increase membership through the clearing of applications. Rene Hardin, Chapter Development and Revitalization Committee Chair; Kitty Watters, Lineage Research Chair; and Marguerite Dyal, Membership Chair, are diligent in assisting chapter registrars. Lineage Research Volunteers are being assigned to new chapter registrars, and those who need assistance, working to reach the goal of 8,000 Georgia Daughters by year's end. Mrs. Jessel attended the District Workshops, the Official State Regent's Tea, the Abraham Baldwin Genie Workshop, and met the NSDAR DAR Schools Bus Tour at Berry College. In between working with chapter registrars, this officer has completed the 2015-16 GSS NSDAR Proceedings, which is being delivered to recipients during this Fall Board of Management.

Historian Robin Redfearn Towns reported that she was honored to have served as acting State Recording Secretary for Georgia State Society during the time of State Recording Secretary Eleanor Quigley's bereavement. She has recorded and prepared minutes for the Summer Executive Board meeting and each of four DAR Workshops. She also served as Co-chair of the NE District Workshop, sponsored by Apalachee Chapter. Mrs. Towns has received letters of approval from the NSDAR Office of the Historian General for Fort Peachtree Chapter's commemorative marker to be placed on "Glen Mary, The Temple on the Hill, Built Circa 1848," located in Sparta, Hancock County, Georgia, and for the addition of the name of Revolutionary War soldier Edward Wills to the marker placed in 2012 by Elijah Clarke Chapter in Memorial Park, Athens-Clarke County, Georgia. The State Historian has received entries from chapters for the Outstanding Teacher of American History contest and has secured judges for the contest with the approval of the State Regent. Judging of the contest will be completed in early November and the State winner submitted to the Office of the Historian General.

Librarian E. Lynn Brackey reported that she had attended Continental Congress; the State Regent's Tea; four district Workshops; the Constitution Week Luncheon; a WWI Commission meeting; a Day of Remembrance activity; the Mount Vernon SAR Charter Banquet bringing greetings in the absence of State Regent, Joyce Ball Patton; the Meadow Garden Soiree; the NBOM as Vice Chair of Development; participated in the DAR School Tour traveling to KDS, Berry and Tamassee; acted as a member of the Development Committee at KDS and a member of the Advisory Committee at Tamassee: attended the Keeneland races supporting Hindman Settlement School; attended the Cameo Society Luncheon; participated in several, district, official visit events in honor of the State Regent, Joyce Ball Patton. As a member of the State Speaker's Staff, Mrs. Brackey presented eight programs to Georgia Chapters and a program on the DAR Library has been added to her repertoire. As Advisor to the State Digitization Committee, she reported that the task of scanning approximately 117 Proceedings books has begun. Completion of the project will be February 2017. To date donations to the DAR Library included seventeen books donated by ten chapters and a copy of Historic Rural Churches of Georgia donated by the GSSDAR in honor of Lanette Harr Reid. A motion has been made to donate \$500 to the DAR Library for the purchase of books for the Georgia shelf in honor of State Regent, Joyce Ball Patton.

Curator Shannon Cowles Logue attended Continental Congress including the sashing of our new State Regent, Joyce Ball Patton and Corresponding Secretary General, Virginia Grace Lingelbach, the State Regent Tea, District State Regent Teas, four State Workshops, Constitution Week Luncheon at the Piedmont Driving Club, and SBOM. She kept the Flags and State property, and prepared them for meetings, assisted the Seating Chair, Julie Prince, in designing and placing seating cards. She has advised and assisted the Meadow Garden Shop Chair, Marjorie Wilson.

Parliamentarian Kate Sievert Cook had no report.

The State Regent asked for Reports of the State Standing Committees:

Resolutions: Chair Edwina Hall Beall read a Resolution honoring Corresponding Secretary General Virginia Lingelbach. **Adopted.** (Resolutions in their entirety are printed following State Board of Management Minutes.)

Bylaws Chair Carolyn Hanf had no report.

Finance Chair Harriette Foster Hankinson presented the following recommendations from the Finance Committee that the request from the Volunteer Information Specialists (VIS) Committee to subscribe to Adobe Dreamweaver Creative Cloud for teams single application and to Microsoft® Office 365 application for up to five (5) devices be approved for a cost not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500.00) with funds for the subscriptions to be taken from unrestricted/state duesunallocated general savings/checking account. Adopted.

The Finance Committee recommended that the Georgia State Society provide two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) to the Georgia Page Club for the purchase and

embroidery of new page sashes. The purchase to include fifteen (15) rolls of white Ribband brand ribbon cross stitch embroidery fabric and an appropriate amount of blue, silver and gold trim to make approximately sixty (60) new page sashes. Funds for the purchase to be taken from unrestricted/state dues - unallocated/ general savings money market account. Adopted.

The Finance Committee recommended that the Georgia State Society hire appropriate people to search and establish clear title on the property previously owned by the disbanded Lyman Hall Chapter in Waycross and to hire a survey company for a new survey of the property. Funds for these actions to be taken from unrestricted/state dues - unallocated/general savings money market account. Adopted.

Proceedings Chair Brenda Jessel reported that copies of the 2015-2016 Georgia State Proceedings were distributed during this Board of Management with the assistance of the Coordinator of Districts Teresa Floyd and the District Directors at the appropriate District table, including State Chairs. Additional copies were available at the DAR Literature table for \$20.00 each. Mrs. Jessel asked members to report any changes or corrections as soon as possible. A final copy of the Proceedings will be made available on the Georgia Members website. Mrs. Jessel thanked Rebecca Malone West, immediate past Proceedings Chair, for her guidance throughout the process of publication, and to Ida "Bea" Fischer, Honorary State Regent, for the opportunity to serve in her administration.

State Regent Patton recognized and thanked chapters celebrating a Commemorative Anniversary in 2016: Celebrating their 125 Anniversary: Atlanta, Atlanta; their 115 Anniversary: Elijah Clark, Athens; Lachlan McIntosh, Savannah; Stephen Heard, Elberton; and George Walton, Columbus; their 105 Anniversary: John Houstoun, Thomaston; Nathaniel Abney, Fitzgerald; and Old Herod, Dawson; their 100 Anniversary: James Pittman, Commerce and Altamaha, Jesup.

State Regent Patton recessed the meeting until the luncheon at 12:30 p.m.

Mrs. Patton called the Luncheon to order.

The Blessing was given by State Chaplain, Betty Brown Harrah, after which attendees enjoyed their lunch.

The Business Meeting resumed and was called to order by State Regent Joyce Patton. Recording Secretary Eleanor Quigley was asked to present the Executive Committee's Amended Motions for the State Regent's Projects.

The Executive Committee recommended that the State Board of Management approve and adopt as a State Project, selected by State Regent Joyce Ball Patton: At Meadow Garden, to complete any repairs and painting necessary after the window restoration, estimated currently at twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00). In combination with other State Regent's Projects, the costs of which not to exceed the totality of all funds collected for the State Regent's Project, with any excess funds applied to the following: (1) The Administrative and Maintenance Checking Account of Meadow Garden; and (2) a donation to Berry College for the continued maintenance and improvement of Berry Frost Chapel. Adopted.

They further recommended that the State Board of Management approve and adopt as a State Project, selected by State Regent Joyce Ball Patton: At Meadow Garden to fund a display of clothing of the time period 1790-1820, partially on mannequins, estimated currently at two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00). In combination with other State Regent's Projects, the costs of which not to exceed the totality of all funds collected for the State Regent's Project, with any excess funds applied to the following: (1) The Administrative and Maintenance Checking Account of Meadow Garden; and (2) a donation to Berry College for the continued maintenance and improvement of Berry Frost Chapel. Adopted.

They further recommended that the State Board of Management approve and adopt as a State Project, selected by State Regent Joyce Ball Patton: At Meadow Garden to fund the process of accreditation by the American Alliance of Museums, to be completed prior to June of 2018; the costs of which are currently estimated at five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00). In combination with other State Regent's Projects, the costs of which not to exceed the totality of all funds collected for the State Regent's Project, with any excess funds applied to the following: (1) The Administrative and Maintenance Checking Account of Meadow Garden; and (2) a donation to Berry College for the continued maintenance and improvement of Berry Frost Chapel.

Honorary State Regent Laura Reid moved that the following language be struck from the Executive Committee's Recommendation concerning Meadow Garden Accreditation as a State Regent's Project: 'to be completed prior to June, 2018,' which would then read: that the State Board of Management approve and adopt as a State Project, selected by State Regent Joyce Ball Patton: At Meadow Garden to fund the process of accreditation by the American Alliance of Museums; the costs of which are currently estimated at five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00). In combination with other State Regent's Projects, the costs of which not to exceed the totality of all funds collected for the State Regent's Project, with any excess funds applied to the following: (1) The Administrative and Maintenance Checking Account of Meadow Garden; and (2) a donation to Berry College for the continued maintenance and improvement of Berry Frost Chapel. Adopted as Amended

The Executive Committee further recommended that the State Board of Management approve and adopt as a State Project, selected by State Regent Joyce Ball Patton: At Meadow Garden, to provide equipment needed to store records on a server and allow staff to respond to emails and maintain the website, costs of which are currently estimated at two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00). In combination with other State Regent's Projects, the costs of which not to exceed the totality of all funds collected for the State Regent's Project, with any excess funds applied to the following: (1) The Administrative and Maintenance Checking Account of Meadow Garden; and (2) a donation to Berry College for the continued maintenance and improvement of Berry Frost Chapel. Adopted.

They further recommended that the State Board of Management approve and adopt as a State Project, selected by State Regent Joyce Ball Patton: At Meadow Garden, to provide an appropriate HVAC system for the lower level, the costs of which are currently estimated at ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00). In combination with other State Regent's Projects, the costs of which not to exceed the totality of all funds collected for the State Regent's Project, with any excess funds applied to the following: (1) The Administrative and Maintenance Checking Account of Meadow Garden; and (2) a donation to Berry College for the continued maintenance and improvement of Berry Frost Chapel. Adopted.

The Executive Committee further recommended that the State Board of Management approve and adopt as a State Project, selected by State Regent Joyce Ball Patton: To digitize our historic collection of the *Proceedings* of the Georgia State Society, and make them available to all members on the Georgia State Society Members Web Site, the costs of which are currently estimated at ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00). In combination with other State Regent's Projects, the costs of which not to exceed the totality of all funds collected for the State Regent's Project, with any excess funds applied to the following: (1) The Administrative and Maintenance Checking Account of Meadow Garden; and (2) a donation to Berry College for the continued maintenance and improvement of Berry Frost Chapel. Adopted.

They further recommended that the State Board of Management approve and adopt as a State Project, selected by State Regent Joyce Ball Patton: To clean and restore three stained glass windows in Berry College's Frost Chapel, given by the Georgia State Society in memory of Berry students who died in World War II, the costs of which are currently estimated at eighteen thousand dollars (\$18,000.00). In combination with other State Regent's Projects, the costs of which not to exceed the totality of all funds collected for the State Regent's Project, with any excess funds applied to the following: (1) The Administrative and Maintenance Checking Account of Meadow Garden; and (2) a donation to Berry College for the continued maintenance and improvement of Berry Frost Chapel. Adopted.

Mrs. Patton called for reports from Chairs of National Committees: American Heritage: Chair Virginia "Ginger" Ranson Nicholson reported that eight Georgia Daughters won the National American Heritage Award in 2016, and Jean Eaton Gay of the John Benning Chapter, Moultrie, GA, was selected to receive the Women in the Arts Recognition Award. Mrs. Nicholson stated that this year's theme is "Moving Family Traditions Forward with the Arts". She listed the categories and deadlines for entering and reminded contestants of procedure. American History: Martha Middlebrooks Wells presented in the absence of Chair Rogena "Gena" Murray Moorhead due to family bereavement. Mrs. Wells announced that the American History Committee Achievement Award (traveling silver tray) will be awarded to the chapter that demonstrates the most outstanding work in promoting American history and enumerated the requirements. She listed areas of Certificates of Chapter Awards and introduced the Vice Chairs. American Indians: Chair Susan Johnson Gillespie reported that on October 1, 2017, she received the official American Indian Heritage Month Proclamation from Governor Deal. No official photograph was taken with time constraints due to Hurricane Matthew. The Committee's project to raise \$5000 for the 2017 Indian Youth Camps of America is progressing with chapters starting loose change collections. Americanism: Chair Phyllis Hill King explained that the Americanism committee oversees the approval process for the DAR Medal of Honor and the DAR Americanism Medal and encourages DAR members to become involved in their local Naturalization process, assisting new immigrants with citizenship. The chair also offers State Certificates for outstanding Americanism. She announced that DAR Medal of Honor or Americanism recipient recommendation packets must be received by the State Chair no later than December 31, 2016. Chapter Achievement Award: Chair Elseon "Elsie" Banner Lawson announced that the Chapter Achievement Award, a measure of a chapter's health, was found on line within the Chapter Master report. The majority of the report is auto fill. The chair encourages Regents to begin immediately to complete these sections which are manually completed. Chapter Development & Revitalization: Rene Shows Hardin reported that Georgia daughters completed 53 Genealogical Education Program courses in 2016. Georgia chapters with 20 members or less may request a larger Georgia DAR chapter partner; two Georgia chapters have adopted chapters that have requested assistance. The Commission is committed to improving the accuracy of the application process across all chapters, with a goal of growing, training and retaining GSS memberships. Volunteer Genealogists: Co-Chairs Rene Shows Hardin and Marguerite McEntee Dyal. Co-Chair Hardin reported that the team has cleared dozens of pre-verification letters and verified associated applications. Eleven Volunteer Genealogists have been assigned to 13 Georgia chapters that requested a volunteer genealogist. The team held 13 workshops since the district workshops, and offers paper parties, E-membership training sessions, and genealogy classes. All volunteer genealogists are GEP-qualified DAR members who prepare applications and work with prospective members to assist the registrar with application details. The Vice Chairs clear AIRS, pre-letters, and offer guidance and assistance to chapter registrars. All Vice Chairs have served as registrars and are experienced and knowledgeable. As of October 27, 2016, the GSS has seven trained and qualified Volunteer Genealogist vice chairs who are assisting 36 first-year registrars. Children of the American Revolution: Chair Peggy Reece Bruckner announced that the State Theme and Project is Liberty's Joy, a Georgia-based camp program for children with serious illnesses at Camp Twin Lakes. The goal is to sponsor disabled campers; to purchase Freedom Riders, special, sturdy bicycles for disabled children; and camp for

children of disabled veterans, deployed military and fallen soldiers. The sum of \$3,400 has been raised toward the goal of \$10,000 for these projects. There are currently eight new societies organizing, and one previously disbanded society reorganizing. Commemorative Events: Chair Patricia Pat" Haynes Bradford encouraged Chapter Regents to participate in Commemorative Events and to report. She announced that Certificates will be awarded to outstanding Chapters. Community Service Awards: Chair Marcelaine "Marcie" Crockett Fletcher was unable to attend. Her report announced that a Community Service Award article was featured in the State Regent's newsletter to encourage more chapters to participate. Twenty recipients were approved for the award since January 1, 2016, nominated by 12 chapters in Georgia, recognizing and honoring those individuals and/or organizations in the community who contribute unpaid volunteer time. Each chapter can present two awards within a calendar year. Conservation Chair Pamela Ann Lyle announced that all chapter and members are being encouraged to register their gardens, landscaping, or habitat preservation projects with the Million Pollinator Garden Challenge. In keeping with the National goals, Georgia distributed 693 pollinator seed packets during the third guarter. Two chapters have submitted nomination packets for the National Conservation Medal and Certificate, Suwanee Creek Chapter and Thomasville Chapter. National Conservation minutes have been distributed to all chapters in the state. Constitution Week: Chair Lydia Rainey McGill. Vice Chair Ann Story reported. During all four District Meetings, the Constitution Week Chair distributed literature, educated Chapter Regents and CW Chapter Chairs about Constitution Week. The Constitution Week Luncheon was held September 17, 2016, at Piedmont Driving Club in Atlanta with 286 in attendance. The colors were presented by the GSSSAR Color First Lady of Georgia Sandra Deal presented the Constitution Week Guard. Proclamation signed by Governor Deal to the State Regent. Attorney General of Georgia Sam Olens spoke on the Rule of Law. The GSSDAR Chorus presented a patriotic Philadelphia Winn Chapter members were hostesses. DAR Chapters in melodv. Georgia created and presented Constitution Week kits, posters, programs, and displays to youth, rang bells, participated in the Constitution Week poster contest, obtained Proclamations from elected officials, involved junior members, broadcast Constitution Week information on radio, TV, and social media, and educated the public about the Constitution and the 225 anniversary of the Ratification of the Bill of Rights! DAR Genealogy Preservation: Chair Vivian Holder Roberts, No report, DAR Good Citizens: Chair Judith Richards Sherling reported that at the District Meetings the DAR Good Citizens sales table sold 254 certificate-and-pin sets, plus 64 extra certificates for a total of 318 of the 345 certificates. All chapters need new certificates with the signatures of the Dillon Administration. Six District Vice Chairs were recognized and thanked. DAR Magazine: Chair Stephanie Kupecky Chasez reported that ads to be featured in the November/December issue of the With the Daughters Newsletter were submitted. To encourage more Magazine subscriptions, copies of our DAR Magazine and Newsletter have been given to chapters. Two new crystal trophies will be awarded to State Magazine contest winners at State Conference: a clear crystal trophy to the chapter with the largest percentage of magazine subscriptions; a blue crystal trophy to the chapter with the largest percentage increase in subscriptions from last year. DAR Museum Outreach: Chair Linda Overstreet Harvey. No report. DAR Project Patriot: Chair Loriann White thanked Georgia Daughters for contributing towards the National Society's Guinness World Record for the initiative, "the most letters to military personnel collected in one month," 8,336 cards and letters. Chapters were urged to continue with their cards, letters and packages. She announced that special awards will be given out during State Conference. Chapters were urged to remember the USO Stations and the Military K-9's. Conference and Special Events: Chair Loriann White reported that the Patton Administration has combined the existing State Conference Committee with State Events to form the new State Conference and Special Events Committee, or 'State Events' for short. The goal is to support the Georgia State Society, the Patton Administration, and all

State events by embracing Our Traditions Direct Our Paths in Service to God, Home and Country. Ms. White introduced the Vice Chairs: Donna Norton, Lisa Mooney, Alice Bulloch. Lynne Tate and Sharon Sowders. Dates for the 119th State Conference are March 8-12, 2017, at Evergreen Marriott Conference Center in St. Mountain, Georgia. Guestrooms are priced at \$137/night, State Conference rate. The State Conference survey resulted in additions to the State Conference: 1) additional programming to the schedule of events. Bennett Greenspan, President and CEO of Family Tree DNA will present during a complimentary workshop on Thursday and a Juniors Social Thursday night. 2) additional workshops: "Historical Preservation" and "How to Digitalize your Chapter and Ancestral Records." 3) Opening Night speaker is Mary Frisch, Registrar General, and 4) the Memorial Service was moved to Sunday, followed by a prayer brunch. The "Call to Conference" and registration opportunities will be released in early December. State Conference information will also be posted on our members-only website. DAR Service for Veterans: Chair Peggy Duncan Freeman reported that the DAR Service for Veterans display table was well attended at all four Workshops, where packet handouts were distributed to 28 Chapters. Georgia Daughters, representing six Chapters, volunteered at the VA homeless Stand Down at Fort McPherson on Saturday, October 1. Chapters are encouraged to make nominations for Outstanding Veteran Volunteer Award, Outstanding Youth Volunteer Award, and Outstanding DAR Service for Veterans Award. Travel Coordinator: Chair Peggy Duncan Freeman reported that a display of trip facts to Continental Congress, plus handouts, were available to daughters at all four District Meetings. Two side trips have been finalized: The Potomac River Luncheon Cruise and a trip to George Washing's Mount Vernon. The Mount Vernon trip will feature a wreath laving ceremony at the tomb followed by luncheon at the Mount Vernon Inn. Genealogical Records: Chair Candice "Candy" Bryan Parrow reported that the purpose of the committee is two-fold: 1) to collect, preserve, and increase unpublished genealogical source materials in the DAR Library; and to submit these records to the state chair, who compiles collected materials into an indexed volume(s) for mailing to the GRC office at the DAR Library. Particular emphasis is on records of the 1880s and 1890s to help fill the void left by the loss of the 1890 federal census. 2) The GRC Every-Name Indexing Project is the ongoing indexing of the names in the nearly 20,000 GRC volumes currently in the DAR Library collection, done entirely online, from digitized images, using the GRC Indexing website, **Historic Preservation**: Chair Melinda "Mindy" May Wade. No report. Insignia: Chair Camille Redfern Lowery reported on the interest shown at the District Meetings on the protocol of Insignia placement. Junior American Citizens: Chair Nancy Collins Tims announced the year's theme, "Our National Parks: 100 Years of Service to America" and offered suggestions on having a successful local chapter. Junior Membership: Chair Vanessa Michelle Watkins-Nutty encouraged chapters to "Explore Junior Membership" by continuing to gain new Junior members, increasing Junior participation, and supporting the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund. She urged chapters to use the Georgia Junior Honor Roll which provides a checklist of ways to start or expand a chapter's Junior involvement. Chair Watkins-Nutty reported on a new national initiative to create a "States' Honor Roll for Outstanding Support of Junior Membership." It is a goal of the Georgia Juniors to become inaugural and consistent members.

Mrs. Patton called for the **Final Credentials Report.** Ms. Farrigan reported there were no changes in the report and thanked her committee. State Regent Patton thanked the Credentials Committee for an excellent job.

The State Regent asked for **National Committee Reports** to resume. **Lineage Research**: Chair Kitty Worrell Watters reported on the approach taken to increase Georgia's membership and complete applications: a lineage research team of fourteen Vice Chairs who have each completed GEP I and II, tailoring the researcher's skills to an application. Priority has been given to those Pending Members with Have Written Letters who are under Six Months Status and to priority applications for the ill and over 90 members. At the District Workshops two, well-attended Genealogy Forums were presented jointly by CDRC Chair Rene Hardin and this Chair. Vice Chairs were thanked. Literacy Promotion: Chair Jennifer Whipple Whiddon reported on special literacy promotion designated days and encouraged daughters to join with the Communities in Schools Committee and other committees and organizations to help support literacy endeavors. Membership: Co-Chairs Marguerite McEntee Dyal and Rene Shows Hardin. Co-Chair Dyal reported that the Membership Committee serves as part of the Chapter Development and Revitalization Commission and is working with chapters to help increase membership, providing leadership training to create successful chapters. Every chapter is encouraged to have a membership. Every Georgia chapter has been contacted to be sure they know how to use e-membership and the PMD system. Tutorials were sent to Chapter Registrars. Members-at-large are encouraged to affiliate with a chapter. Since the beginning of the Patton administration the State PMD list has been reduced from 897 to 726, a nearly 20% reduction. New Horizons Course: Chair Brenda Davison Jessel reported on the new national training modules, New Horizons Course for leadership training and New Members Course to motivate new members. The online modules are self-directed and are easily accessible on the Georgia Members' website, thanks to the work of Amy Lawson, New Horizons Courses Administrator. National Defense: Chair Dana Bates Capaldi. No report. President General's Project: Chair Paula Hannah Osborne was not present. The report stated that a total of \$6,700 of the President General's Project products was sold at the Workshops and products are being offered at this State Board of Management. Products will also be available at State Conference. Public Relations & Media: Chair Leslie Betty Olejnik reported that at State Regent Patton's request, 33 chapters of 110 Georgia Chapters have a Member Closed Facebook Group and 31 chapters have a Public Facebook. Currently the Georgia State Society Closed Facebook Group has 715 members. Facebook Live was also introduced as a tool for Georgia Daughters to promote workshops, meetings, and other DAR related events. The Atlanta Chapter was the first chapter to use and post a Facebook Live interviewing our State Regent on July 30 at the State Regent's Tea. Future goals of the committee include establishing relationships with several major media outlets in order to better promote DAR events. 

It is an honor to welcome 703 Members and Guests to our 119th State Conference. This is a wonderful opportunity to celebrate your accomplishments and enjoy new and innovative seminars.

Another "Reason to Celebrate" is the 157 first time attendees for this State Conference. They will be wearing the Hot Pink Ribbon, indicating First Time Attendee. Please make them feel welcome!

Georgia Daughters have been heartfelt in "Moving Forward in Service to America," as "Our Traditions Direct Our Paths in Service to God, Home and Country."

This Administration began with dreams and a vision of positive changes we could facilitate over our two years. The excitement of our Officers, Coordinator of Districts, District Directors and State Chairs gave our dreams a solid base, as we moved ever forward during our planning meetings. The First Event for this Administration was a State Regent's Tea, where the Atlanta Chapter Hosted over 300 guests.

In the last eight months, I have enjoyed visiting each of the six districts and seeing you in your home towns and have greeted many Georgia Daughters from most of our **110** chapters. This State Regent has traveled over 10,000 miles in Georgia since June 19, 2016. The Southern Hospitality shown me throughout Georgia will never be forgotten. Everywhere I visited was like coming home. I shared my funny stories and enjoyed your laughter, before I asked for your support of "our State Regents Projects." You have been so generous with your donations.

This Administration designed Two State Pins to be used as a Fund Raiser for the State Regents Projects. A new Orchid Society was formed to show support for these projects in honor of our First President General, Caroline Scott Harrison. With the purchase of both beautiful pins, ladies became Orchid Society members, enjoying discounts for the Meadow Garden Soiree and a special Christmas Tea held at my home. Almost 100 ladies attended, enjoying the friendships, food, fellowship and decorations. I would like to thank the ladies who made this possible. Beverly and Bonnie Baker, Juneil Davis, Virginia Griffith and Teresa Daniels, who decorated, organized and made the most wonderful goodies for a perfect Christmas Tea.

The Georgia Daughters have purchased almost \$50,000 in pins and earrings and another \$7900.00 was raised during Workshop and to our State Chair, Amy Nation and Vice Chair Anastacia Duncan for your efforts in making this a huge success.

The State Regent's Projects at Meadow Garden are being generously funded with donations totaling almost \$25,000.00.

Many visible changes have been made.

The Window Restoration Project and the addition of the new HVAC system will begin in March. The Meadow Garden Gift Shop was moved to the Heritage Education Building and has a new look, thanks to our Gift Shop Chairs and Honorary State Regent Virginia Grace Lingelbach, who spent several weekends with me in Augusta.

Thank you to our Gift Shop Chair and Vice Chair who have taken our gift shop to a new level, with sales totaling almost \$20,000.00 in this Administration.

Georgia's School Projects Donations totaled over \$18,000! What a wonderful way to support the DAR Schools.

Total funds raised for all State Regents Projects was <u>\$101,238.95</u>. Your generosity amazes me and touches my heart. Georgia Daughters you are making a better Georgia State Society!

Membership, has been our number one priority for this Administration. January 1, 2017, our membership was <u>7,854</u>.

In 2016 Georgia State Society welcomed **452** new members by application, including **86** Juniors. VIS reports that **289** of these new members joined through use of websites, both chapter and national.

However, the numbers of members dropped due to non-payment was well over 100. I believe that in this year we will reach our goal of 8000 members. We not only need to reach that goal, but need to reach out to those ladies who have not paid their dues. President General Dillon requested that State Regents contact all those delinquent members. Each officer was assigned several chapters, and we made a difference in the number retained by those personal calls.

A very strong Chapter Development and Revitalization Commission was formed with new ideas and strategies to Educate and Support our Registrars and promote the new GEP online Classes. These Teams faced many obstacles with our large number of "Additional Information Requests, Prewritten letters and one of the largest state Prospective Member Databases.

The Lineage Research team began diligently resolving one issue at a time, resolving the oldest letters first. We have many new members, thanks to Kitty Waters and her Team. Pre-letters have decreased from 50 to 10. This is a good indicator that the quality of the Georgia Applications is improving. The Prospective Member Data Base has decreased from 900 to 686. Marguerite Dyal and her team have certainly accessed and assigned the Prospective Member to a chapter. Rene Hardin assigned 13 Volunteer Genealogist to 16 Georgia Chapters. They have worked on membership papers and trained Registrars and helped to resolve problem applications. They held Workshops and Paper Parties all over the State. A day was added on to our State Board of Management to focus on Genealogy. Over 300 members and guest came to hear Cindy Weatherby and Deb Duay.

We now have 63 members who completed a Genealogy Education Program or GEP class in the past eight months. We currently have 43 who have passed GEP 1-3. One of the Volunteer Genies may have set the record for completing the GEP Classes in the shortest amount of Time. Thank You, Brenda Bush! Thank all of you ladies, for your dedication to Georgia DAR.

Georgia had 100% Reporting on the Chapter Master Questionnaire thanks to our Chapter Regents and our Outstanding Volunteer Information Specialists (VIS) Committee.

The VIS Committee has again found a way to improve our State Website; first by adding a Search Tool, which will aid members in finding information quickly.

Also, Daughters will find a State-Wide Calendar of Events, like you see on the National Website. When planning a Chapter or State Event, send an email immediately to the VIS Committee. They will post your event on the Georgia Calendar, encouraging other chapters to attend.

SAR and CAR Events will be posted on the Calendar as well.

The objective is to have everyone become more aware of how Georgia Chapters are supporting the mission of our Society. Chapters love to support each other; we are one great State Society.

This Officer attended the October and February National Board of Management Meetings. Following the October Board, we began the 2016 School Tour. Your State Regent enjoyed getting to know other State Regents, especially the 37 new Regents and Members of the National Board. We especially enjoyed our own Berry College and the many Georgia Daughters who were there to greet us. Mrs. Dillon enjoyed seeing Frost Chapel and the beautiful stained glass windows this Administration will restore. October continued to be a very busy month as 24 Daughters visited Hindman Settlement School Fund Raiser, the "Day at the Races" in Kentucky.

October ended with a very successful State Board of Management.

A new Organizing Regent was confirmed at the February National Board Meeting, formalizing the birth of a new chapter, with Caroline Mixon serving as Organizing Regent. The Jacob Braselton Chapter of Braselton has begun writing their history in the Georgia State Society. Please Welcome our latest chapter Regent and members.

Chapter Regents please encourage your members to utilize the Georgia State Society or GSS Facebook Page and Members-only Website to keep abreast of all current events. We are very proud of our Public Relations and Social Media Team who have brought the GSS from last to third place with the number of Facebook Members. Thank you, Leslie Olejnik and Patricia Hein and the members of your Team.

Our Scholarship Chair, Dana Anderson, has worked diligently all year to have all Georgia's School Loan Funds converted to Scholarship Funds. The Total Amount given in Scholarship from the GSSDAR and Chapters Total \$41,975.00. The total amount of Scholarship funds held at Educational Institutions is \$568,118.08. Thanks to the vision of our only President General from Georgia, May Irwin Talmadge. Mrs. Talmadge started the first Scholarship Funds in any State and was the First National Chair of Scholarships.

Our state newsletter, "The Georgia Gazette," is newly conceived this year, with an historic name. The original Georgia Gazette was the first newspaper in Georgia, printed in Savannah in 1763. Thank you to Becky West, State Corresponding Secretary, and Eleanor Quigley, State Recording Secretary, for their cooperative effort in writing and editing this informative, colorful and innovatively formatted, electronic newspaper. Chapters, remember to send your information to your District Director.

It is wonderful to read about all that you are doing in your chapter, for the State, and National Societies. Sharing your involvement in your community, both local schools and our DAR Schools, our veterans, conservation, and historic preservation touches every area of our DAR objectives. I am so proud of you.

Thank you Officers, Chairs who sent in State Conference Reports by deadline. Each report answered with personal note, then embedded in Proceedings, 2016-2017. Georgia State Society has many new Regents, Chairs. Special thank you for cooperativity, first time, writing reports. Chapter Regents, Chairs reminded of new paradigm, submitting reports electronically. Georgia following national society's example, converting from paper to computers, being good stewards of earth, practicing

conservation by saving paper. This officer electronically filed all reports received into an electronic Master Document. Great pleasure as Co-Editor, our newspaper, Georgia Gazette, Thank you to Editor, State Corresponding Secretary Becky West and Technical Advisor, VIS Co-Chair Carla Brown for their cooperation and contributions! Also serves as National Vice Chair, South East Division, Women's Issues. Thank you, Madame State Regent, for the privilege and pleasure of serving in your administration.

STATE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY – Rebecca Malone West

The responsibilities of the State Corresponding Secretary are many and varied. Beginning in March2016 this Officer assisted the State Regent in compiling a spreadsheet of state chairs, vice chairs, and committee members and forwarded this list to the Office of the Organizing Secretary General. In May, work began on Issue #1 of The Georgia Gazette, the official newsletter of the Patton Administration. Each issue contains not only news from State Officers and State Chairs but also contains a "With the Chapters" section, which highlights notable activities of chapters around the state. July and August saw the completion of the State Directory and the Chapter Information Packet prior to District Workshops. This Officer sold more than 400 State Directories at the four workshops and continues to offer them for sale at this State Conference. The State Directory is a "moving target," so to speak, with updates occurring on a weekly basis. All updates to the State Directory can be found on the Georgia State Society members-only website under "Publications." Issue #2 of The Georgia Gazette was published in early October, and Issue #3 was published in early January 2017. Each issue of The Georgia Gazette contained more than 70 pages of National, state and chapter news and information. Work on the State Conference program began in December and continued until late February. The 2017 program, containing 36 pages of advertisements, is the largest State Conference program on record. In addition to these varied responsibilities, this Officer has sent out dozens of blast emails on behalf of State Officers and numerous State Chairs, alerting Georgia Daughters to upcoming events, deadlines, and other vital information. This Officer extends appreciation to the following Georgia Daughters who have assisted in preparing various documents during the past year: Beverly Baker, Carla Brown, Stephanie Chasez, Eleanor Quigley, and Loriann White. Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure to serve the Georgia Daughters in this capacity.

STATE ORGANIZING SECRETARY – Phyllis Fox Lawson

This Officer introduced herself at all District Workshops, stating that she would be available to assist in the organization of a new chapter and available to help strengthen existing chapters. This Officer followed up with an email to all Chapter Regents that she was available to attend chapter meetings if invited but always available by phone or email. This Officer has answered all calls and emails concerning the possibility of organizing a chapter and assisted when asked with the organizing process. The February 2017 National Board of Management approved the Jacob Braselton Chapter in Braselton, Caroline Giles Mixon Organizing Regent. At the request of the Metter Chapter, the State Regent asked this officer to begin the process of the disbandment of that chapter due to the drop in membership below the number specified by our National Bylaws. At the October National Board of Management this chapter was automatically disbanded with 8 members. Members transferred to chapters in the area close to where they live or those with health issues remained members-at-large. The goal of this officer and the State Society is to keep membership in the Georgia State Society when possible.

STATE TREASURER – Deborah Taylor Powell

Financial records of Georgia State Society are maintained on QuickBooks Pro 2016. All checking and money market accounts have been reconciled and balanced with all

ledgers. Financial Statements have been prepared for Executive Board, Finance Committee, Board of Management, State Conference, and Meadow Garden Board meetings. Chapter Treasurer's Instructions and reporting forms have been updated for CIP. Reports and money donated to National Funds were sent to Treasurer General. Budgets were prepared for Meadow Garden and Georgia State Society. Credentials, Honor Roll, Chapter Achievement and Hightower donations were verified and reported to appropriate Chair. All Meadow Garden payroll and sales tax returns were prepared. Books are being prepared to take to auditor. Audit Report was sent to appropriate members and CPA for filing the 990 return. Attended Continental Congress, all District Workshops, State Board of Management, Executive, Finance, and Meadow Garden Board Meetings, State Regent's Tea, Constitution Week luncheon, Chapter celebrations. This officer sincerely appreciates the guidance given by the past treasurer and State Regent since assuming office. Madam State Regent, thank you for giving me the opportunity to serve under your leadership in this most rewarding position.

STATE REGISTRAR – Brenda Davison Jessel

This officer has had the privilege of working with the very exciting TEAM DAR. State Chairs of Chapter Development & Revitalization Commission and Volunteer Genealogists Rene' Hardin; Lineage Research Kitty Watters; Membership Marguerite Dyal have worked diligently to increase Georgia membership. Clearing challenging applications has been very rewarding as these applicants became members. Each one is a victory! Chapters have welcomed TEAM DAR as workshops have been presented to increase competence as well as confidence. Volunteer Genealogists have assisted Registrars, trained in proper application procedures. Georgia Daughters continue completing the GEP classes. Georgia started 2016 with 7,664 members. In 2016, Georgia had 118 member deaths, 127 dropped members, 197 resigned members, 64 former members reinstated; 165 members transferred out with 87 leaving Georgia; 148 transferred in with 70 new to Georgia. Georgia had 452 new members by application. With deaths, resignations, transfers out, Georgia had an increase of 55 members with the final number of Georgia Daughters at year-end 7,854. Chapter Registrars continue to work to increase membership. Madam State Regent, it is an honor to serve with these extraordinary Daughters. They exemplify your Scripture: Love one another! They do. It is a privilege to serve you and the Georgia Society.

STATE HISTORIAN – Robin Redfearn Towns

The State Historian has received approvals from the Historian General for the placement of two commemorative markers and one marker for a Revolutionary soldier. Five member grave marker reports have been received and archived. Chapters submitting applications for the Outstanding Teacher of American History contest were Abraham Baldwin, Colonel William Candler, Elijah Clarke, and James Waldrop. Qualified judges for the contest include DAR member Jean Burge Channell, and non-DAR judges, Professor John Waters and COL Clifford C. Lowery. The 2016 Outstanding Teacher of American History is Harry W. Cooper of Athens, GA, nominated by Elijah Clarke Chapter, Mary Ann Hoit Abbe, Regent. Mr. Cooper will be recognized at the DAR School Youth Luncheon, where he will receive a certificate, pin, and cash award. It is indeed an honor to serve the State Society.

STATE LIBRARIAN – E. Lynn Brackey

The 2016 CMR Georgia State Librarian section was completed by eighty-four chapters. Twenty-six chapters had "No Report". Forty-eight chapter members representing fifty-one chapters spent 6,504 hours volunteering in local libraries. Four hundred and five members representing sixty-four chapters donated 8,441 books to local libraries valued at \$37,375.35. Six chapters organized book clubs with a total of forty-three members

participating. Seven Certificates of Appreciation for Outstanding Service in Library and Information Science were presented by six chapters. Twenty-one chapters donated \$709 to the DAR Library. Thirteen chapters and the State Librarian donated twenty-seven books to the DAR Library. Eleven chapters donated \$1,265 to Friends of the Library Fund and eight chapters donated \$940 to Friends of Seimes. Donations made by one hundred and five chapters to the State Library Fund totaled \$1,671. In honor of State Regent, Joyce Ball Patton, \$500 was donated to the DAR Library for the purchase of books. From the State Library Fund \$1,500 was donated to the DAR Library as a contribution towards the replacement of bookshelves. Voices were sold on five gift baskets at District Workshops and SBOM raising \$1,530 and books returned to Georgia by the DAR Library were sold at SBOM raising \$1,172.

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution ("Georgia State Society, NSDAR") (a nonprofit organization), which comprise the statement of financial position - modified cash basis as of June 30, 2017, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows – all under the modified cash basis for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This summary of significant accounting policies of the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution (the "Organization") is presented to assist in understanding the Organization's financial statements. The financial statements and notes are representations of the Organization's management, who is responsible for their integrity and objectivity.

Nature of Organization

The Organization is a volunteer women's service organization created to promote patriotism, preserve American history and secure America's future through better education for children.

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Organization have been prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting, a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles. Accordingly, revenue is recorded when received rather than when earned, and expenses are recorded when paid rather than when incurred.

Basis of Presentation

Financial statement presentation follows the recommendation of the Financial Accounting Standards Board ("FASB") Accounting Standards Codification ("ASC") 958 Not for-Profit *Entities.* Under ASC 958, the Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted, temporarily restricted, and permanently restricted. A description of the three net asset categories follows:

<u>Unrestricted</u> - Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed restrictions. Unrestricted net assets may be designated for specific purposes by action of the Board of Directors.

<u>Temporarily Restricted</u> - Net assets whose use is subject to donor-imposed restrictions that can be fulfilled by actions of the Organization pursuant to those restrictions or that expire by the passage of time.

<u>Permanently Restricted</u> - Net assets subject to donor-imposed restrictions that they be maintained permanently by the Organization.

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Use of Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts and disclosures. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash, Cash Equivalents, and Certificates of Deposit

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Organization considers all cash on hand, highly liquid bank deposits, and short-term debt securities with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

At June 30, 2017, the Organization had approximately \$500,000 in fixed rate certificates of deposit with varying maturity dates through March 2019, which were stated at cost plus accrued interest, which approximates fair value.

Property and Equipment

Expenditures for property and equipment are capitalized and depreciated over the estimated useful life of the respective asset. Additions and betterments of \$750 or more are capitalized at cost, while maintenance and repairs that do not improve or extend the useful lives of the respective assets are currently expensed. Depreciation is provided for in amounts sufficient to relate the cost of depreciable assets to operations over their estimated service lives, principally using the straight-line and 200% declining balance methods. Management has determined the difference between the 200% declining balance method and the straight-line method is not significant.

The Organization does not capitalize collections and historical treasures, including Meadow Garden. Meadow Garden and its contents are historical treasures and are insured for approximately \$1,906,000.

Depreciation expense for the year ended June 30, 2017 was \$22,115.

Donated Services

Many volunteers have made significant contributions of their time to develop and promote the programs of the Organization. The value of these donated services is not included in the accompanying financial statements, as such services do not create or enhance nonfinancial assets or require specialized skills. If donated services received either created or enhanced non-financial assets or required specialized skills, which would need to be purchased if not donated, the value of those donated services would be recorded.

Donations

Contributions received are recorded as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted depending on the existence and/or nature of donor restrictions.

Contributions are recognized when received by the Organization. Contributions that are restricted by the donor are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets if the restrictions expire in the fiscal year in which the contributions are recognized. All other donor-restricted contributions are reported as increases in temporarily or permanently restricted net assets depending on the nature of the restrictions. When a restriction expires, restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets.

Membership Dues

Membership dues are recognized when received.

Income Taxes

Georgia State Society, NSDAR, a nonprofit organization operating under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, is exempt from federal, state, and local income taxes, and accordingly, no provision for income taxes is included in the accompanying financial statements for the Organization.

Income Taxes (Continued)

The modified cash basis of accounting, a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles, requires management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Organization and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Organization has taken an uncertain tax position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the relevant tax authority. Management has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Organization, and has concluded that as of June 30, 2017 there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Organization is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. Management believes it is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to June 30, 2014.

Subsequent Events

Subsequent events have been evaluated through the date of this report, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

NOTE B - FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS AND CONCENTRATIONS OF CREDIT RISK

The Organization's financial instruments that are exposed to concentrations of credit risk consist primarily of cash, cash equivalents and certificates of deposit.

The Organization maintains its cash, cash equivalents and certificates of deposit with highly rated financial institutions and at times, may be in excess of federally insured limits. The Organization has not experienced in losses in such accounts and believes it is not exposed to any significant risk of loss.

NOTE C - AFFILIATES

The Organization collects membership dues and donations from its local Georgia Chapters for the Organization and the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Reports of the State Chairs

National Committees

AMERICAN HERITAGE – Virginia "Ginger" Ranson Nicholson

There were 79 American Heritage programs given this year. Entries in the Art contests: Fiber Arts 11, Arts and Sculpture 16, Crafts 9, Literature and Drama 6. Six Women in the Arts Awards were given. There were eight National winners: 3rd Art & Sculpture, Watercolor; 1st Crafts, Cloth Doll and 3rd Cloth Doll; 3rd Crafts, Clay; 2nd Fiber Arts, Embroidery; 2nd Fiber Arts, Quilt-Hand; 2nd Fiber Arts, Quilt-Wall Hanging; 1st Literature & Drama, Poetry 1-15 lines. Interesting programs were: Preserving historic costumes; Explaining what constitutes an historic sampler; Listening to Early American Immigrant music; Learning basket weaving techniques; Tin ware making techniques; Spinning string techniques; Viewing Revolutionary-era costuming; music of President Thomas Jefferson. Activities: SE Quilt and Textile Museum programs; exhibiting quilts; Sew-in Events; Mardi-Gras costuming and culture; touring the old Governor's Mansion.

AMERICAN HISTORY – Rogena 'Gena' Murray Moorhead

Reports received from 97 chapters. Chapters and individual members presented 307 American History Programs, with 87 Outstanding American Women honored. American History Essay Contest sponsored in 237 schools with 4,845 students participating. Chapters awarded 2,656 Certificates of Participation, 189 Certificates of Awards and 111 Bronze Medals. Christopher Columbus Essay Contest sponsored in 49 schools, 527 students participating, 215 Certificates of Participation awarded. Total essay's collected for American History Committee: 5,372. 87 Students awarded Certificates for Outstanding Work in American History. Outstanding Chapter awarded Traveling Silver Tray: Abraham Baldwin, Alice Robinson, Regent. This Committee is privileged to serve the State Regent and the Georgia State Society.

AMERICAN INDIANS – Susan Johnson Gillespie

With 110 Chapters reporting in 2017 Georgia Daughters supported American Indians activities with great enthusiasm. Chapters representing 7,803 members presented 254 Indian Minutes; received 23 American Indian Heritage Month Proclamations; offered 64 American Indians programs; donated \$1,772 to American Indian Scholarship fund; \$509 to Friends of American Indians; \$1,109 to Bacone College; and \$505 to Chemawa School. In addition, 1,632 Georgia Daughters raised \$2,403 for the Indian Youth of America Camps, from luncheon fundraisers, Christmas basket voices, communities Indian programs, and collecting loose change at meetings. An monetary award will be given to the Chapter completing the most AIC activities. Additional awards will be presented for outstanding achievement, outstanding programs or projects, and over all achievement. Certificates of appreciation will be given to the 18 chapters contributing to IYA. This Chair thanks Vice Chairs Alicyne Roth, Ruth McIntire and Dinah Peevy for advice and cheerleading.

AMERICANISM – Phyllis Hill King

With 110 chapters reporting, 79 chapter members refer to DAR Manual for Citizenship on DAR members' website, 26 members assisted with naturalization classes, chapters participated at 29 naturalization ceremonies. Distribution of materials included: 13,868 US flags, 1,763 Flag Pins, 4,497 Flag bookmarks, 4,129 copies of the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag, 5,901 copies of American Creed. The GSS DAR Medal of Honor was awarded to Lt. Gen. Stayce Harris. Fielding Lewis Chapter presented a DAR Medal of Honor to Vietnam Veteran Donna Rowe. Outstanding Chapter Report Award to Patriots of Liberty. Chapters participated in Naturalization ceremonies and gave receptions or goodie bags to new citizens, coordinated numerous patriotic activities, veteran's projects and parades; placed wreaths and flags at memorials; hosted Flag Day, July 4th, Veterans Day, presented programs on the Flag; distributed patriotic materials to new citizens, school children, and to communities. Awards presented to chapters for outstanding work in each activity of the Americanism Committee.

CHAPTER ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS – Elseon "Elsie" Banner Lawson

100% of Chapters reported electronically. Total points achieved by all chapters were 60,334. 83.2% of chapters achieved Level I; 14.2% achieved Level 2; 1.8% did not achieve a level as they had <125 points. CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION – Peggy Reece Bruckner

Young Patriots of the C. A. R. (age birth-22) are lineal descendants of Patriots of the American Revolution. Adult leadership and support by the Georgia State Society NSDAR, its chapters, and individual members made possible programs focusing on citizenship, history, patriotism, and service to others. For her 2016-2017 GSSCAR State President's Project, Rachel Marie Fitzgerald, chose to provide Freedom Riders and Kids Serve II Camp Days for special needs campers at Camp Twin Lakes. Rachel helped create

awareness of special needs, and raised funds to provide life-changing camp experiences. In 2017, Certificates of Appreciation presented to twenty-three GSSDAR chapters providing adult leadership at national, state, and/or local level, with twenty chapters sponsoring local societies; thirteen chapters supporting activities with C. A. R. in 2016. Nine Certificates of Award were given to chapters for 2016-2017 State Project Financial Support of \$100 or more. Lt. James Monroe was awarded 1st for Highest per-capita contribution. Suwannee Chapter awarded 1st for Best Event outside Normal Events Best for 9/11 event.

CONSERVATION – Pamela Ann Lyle

One hundred ten chapters completed the CMR Conservation Report. Chapters reported 772 pollinator gardens planted throughout the state; 357 members attended Earth Day and/or Arbor Day events. 47 chapters presented conservation minutes at meetings. 188 conservation projects completed. 89 chapters report a conservation program at chapter meeting. 294 members reported some level of participation in citizen's science projects. 826 pollinator seed packets were distributed by Chair. During Fall Workshops, visual and printed information offered for awareness of non-native, invasive plants, the importance of pollinators. Routine conservation topics shared via social media. Conservation minutes electronically sent to 12 chapters by request. NSDAR Conservation Medal was submitted and approved from three chapters during calendar year; one in December from Suwanee Creek. Conservation Chair attended all District workshops and State Board of Management. Many thanks to Vice Chair Cynthia Grantham Davis for support and feedback.

CONSTITUTION WEEK – Lydia Rainey McGill

2016 Constitution Week Proclamation was signed by Governor Nathan Deal in September with First Lady Sandra Deal, State Regent Joyce Patton, First Vice Regent Melodye Brown, Constitution Week State Chair Lydia McGill and Constitution Week Vice Chair Judy Dyer in attendance. September 17 Constitution Week Luncheon at Piedmont Driving Club with 183 attending. State Regent brought greetings along with Presidents of SAR and CAR. Guest speaker Georgia Attorney General, Sam Olens, spoke on The Rule of Law. First Lady Sandra Deal presented the Constitution Week Proclamation to the State Regent. A PROCLAMATION CONSTITUTION WEEK

- WHEREAS: September 17, 2016, marks the 229th anniversary of the 1787 Constitutional Convention where the oldest written constitution in the world was drafted by the United States, thus outlining the fundamental principles by which our nation is governed; and
- WHEREAS: Our Constitution establishes six basic governing principles for our society, including popular sovereignty, the rule of law, federalism, judicial review, individual rights, and separation of powers with a system of checks and balances; and
- WHEREAS: Popular sovereignty allowed our government to be created for and by the people, while the rule of law requires that government be guided by a set of laws, rather than by any individual or single group. Federalism provides for the sharing of power between our national government and individual state governments; and

WHEREAS: The Constitution ensures the distribution of functions and responsibilities among three separate branches and a system of checks and balances to calibrate those powers, guaranteeing individual rights and liberties against government encroachment; and

WHEREAS: The State of Georgia became the fourth state in the Union to ratify the Constitution, signed by Georgia delegates Abraham Baldwin and William Few, on January 2, 1788. Constitution Week affords the opportunity for all citizens to learn about Georgia's role during our nation's founding; now

THEREFORE: I, NATHAN DEAL, Governor of the State of Georgia, do hereby proclaim September 17–23, 2016, as CONSTITUTION WEEK in Georgia and September 17 as CONSTITUTION AWARENESS DAY.

In witness thereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the Executive Department to be affixed this 12th day of September in the year of our Lord two thousand sixteen.

In 2016, 88 Georgia chapters participated in DAR Good Citizens (DAR GC); 382 schools contacted; 28 new; 310 schools participated. 311 students recognized with pin, certificate, and wallet card. 50 chapters and 223 students participated in the Scholarship Contest. Chapters gave DAR Good Citizens a total of \$15,904, an 18% increase over prior year. State and District Vice Chairs once again encouraged pre-ordering materials to assist chapters. District Vice Chairs attended 4 workshops and State Board of Management and offered sales tables at each. Handouts available explaining the difference between DAR Good Citizen and American History essay contests. The State and District Vice Chairs worked directly with chapters to encourage DAR GC participation. Twenty-two judges participated in judging essays. This Chair thanks excellent District Vice Chairs: Charlotte McCloskey; Dianne Mauldin; Susan Burroughs; Mary Catherine Fouche'; Sylvia Dinkel and Bette Wester.

DAR LIBRARY – E. Lynn Brackey

Statistics applicable to this committee and books donated by chapters to DAR Library within State Librarian Report. Additionally, seven Certificates of Appreciation were presented to the following chapters: Most Outstanding Chapter Librarian Report, Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter; Most Books Donated to Local Libraries (1,215 books) Augustin Clayton; Volunteer Hours in Local Libraries (1000 hours/2members); Volunteer Hours in Local Libraries (1000 hours/2members); Volunteer Hours in Local Libraries (1000 hours/7 members), Suwanee Creek, Levi Sapp; Thomasville, Outstanding Project (Public Ancestor Event, Thomas County Public Library); Atlanta, Outstanding Project (Children Read, Head Start Program 3300 books donated); Sandy Springs, State Library Fund (Largest Chapter Donation). Georgia Daughters supported local libraries, Seimes Technology Center, Friends of the DAR Library and State Library Fund by donating books, time, money or a combination of the three. Twelve DAR Library programs presented. It has been an honor to Chair this Committee and work with devoted Chapters and Chapter Librarians.

DAR LIBRARY - FRIENDS OF DAR LIBRARY – Frances "Monie" Davis Moody

Madam State Regent, thank you for inviting me to serve the Georgia State Society, NSDAR in this capacity during your administration. During my trip through the State last August, I was able to meet Georgia Daughters who were interested in supporting the DAR Library by way of making direct donations to the Office of Development and by signing up to become Sustaining Supporters of the Library. Donations made to this fund are used to purchase special equipment, furniture, special or out-of-print books and other important materials for new and existing library resources and programs. This Chair is delighted to report that there were six daughters who generously donated \$1,320.00 to the Friends of the DAR Library Fund. Three daughters gave a onetime donation of \$200.00 each, and three daughters became Sustaining Supporters and donated a total of \$240.00 each. All of these Daughters are eligible to purchase the Friends of the DAR Library Donor pin from Hamilton Jewelers.

DAR MAGAZINE – Stephanie Chasez

The 2016 Georgia State Society's Co-op ad in November/December Daughters Newsletter proudly honored our wonderful State Regent Joyce Ball Patton; Corresponding Secretary General Virginia Grace Lingelbach; the State Officers; and Georgia's three consecutive National General Officers, State Outstanding Junior and National Outstanding Junior Finalist Amy Pittman Lawson; State Pages; Co-op ad participants and Meadow Garden. All Georgia Chapters submitted DAR Magazine Report. Ninety-eight Chapter Regents subscribed to the American Spirit with fifty-four chapters reaching the 30% subscription target for Chapter Achievement Award. President General's message was read at regular meetings by ninety-nine chapters. Sixty-two percent of Georgia Chapters collected Magazine subscriptions along with dues. Georgia Chapters reported top three areas of interest for DAR Magazine: 1st Historic Places; 2nd History; 3rd Genealogy. Winner of first contest and Traveling Crystal Trophy, for chapter achieving the highest percentage of subscriptions is Joseph Habersham with an outstanding 104%! Winner of 2nd contest and Traveling Blue Crystal Trophy, for chapter achieving largest increase of subscriptions from previous year is Patriots of Liberty.

DAR MUSEUM OUTREACH – Linda O. Harvey, Ph.D.

The goal of this committee is to raise awareness and funding for the DAR Museum, inclusive of GSSDAR room "Peter Tondee's Tavern." One hundred twenty-two members reported visiting the tavern while in Washington. Twenty-two chapters reported sharing information about the state room. Outstanding financial support for the Georgia room: LaGrange (\$162); Hawkinsville (\$50); Apalachee (\$5). Chapters excelling in support of the Museum Truck Show Fund Raiser: Fielding Lewis (\$800); Martha Stewart Bulloch (\$582). Leading in Adopt-an-Object: Patriots of Liberty. General Danial Newnan chapter reported having a newsletter article and visual display. Five Docents-in-Training are seeking accreditation. Usage of one Correspondent Docent was reported. Donations to DAR Museum Outreach were led by Atlanta (\$247); Fielding Lewis (\$129); Old Unicoi Trail (\$25); Sequoyah (\$25). Sadly, 46 chapters made no report, 57 chapters made no financial contribution. One "Museum Keeper" donation by a member was reported. We look forward to seeing that donor pin displayed, and a surge of activity supporting of the DAR Museum.

DAR PROJECT PATRIOT – Loriann White

Georgia Daughters sent 722 care packages to 19 countries; 178 specific to "DAR Women Supporting Women in Military Service" by mailing packages to women serving abroad, an overall 200% increase and 191% increase specific to service women with packages valuing \$30,741.79, an 292% increase from previous year. Members clipped 55,059 manufacturer coupons, sent 11,211 cards to active military. Georgia Daughters contributed 8,336 letters towards Guinness World Records for 'Most Letters to Military Personnel collected in One Month' during the 125th Continental Congress. Members supported DAR approved centers, such as Chaplain's Closet at Landstuhl, Germany, Warrior and Family Support Center in San Antonio by sending magazines, paperback books, flip-flops, iTunes, note cards, toiletries, value: \$6,572.29. Value of items donated to GSSDAR Project Patriot: \$10,642.00, a 56% increase. Monetary and value of donations from chapters for specific chapter projects was \$49,905.00, a 44.6% increase. Overall value of items/donations: \$97,861.08, a 45.6% increase over previous year. This increase contributes to 72 chapters direct support for active military, yielding an overall 13.5% increase of participation. Thank you for the opportunity to serve and many thanks to the Daughters for supporting our Troops!

DAR SCHOLARSHIP – Dana McCoy Anderson

Sixteen chapters contributed a combined scholarship total of \$41,975. Altamaha gifted the greatest amount (\$12,000), followed by a tie between Joseph Habersham and Oliver Morton (\$10,000). Another six chapters donated over \$1,000, with an additional seven providing \$100 - \$999. A total of 33 students received assistance. Thirty-three chapters provided information to the public regarding the NSDAR national scholarships. The Georgia College & State University Foundation awarded the first GSSDAR scholarship in 15 years to a junior majoring in Public History (historic preservation) for Fall Semester 2016. Middle George College Foundation completed the transition of the Lydia Napier

Jelks Fund to a cash award for a major in political science, history or education to be awarded Spring 2017. The University of Georgia doubled their payout to \$10,000 on the 4 joint funds held there, which allowed 2 Historic Preservation graduate students to be awarded \$5,000 each for academic year 2016-17. Savannah's endowed Tuthill History Scholarship was awarded for the first time in Fall 2016. The GSSDAR Kate Duncan Smith Scholarship increased by a \$6,000 contribution thus ensuring its stability. Assets held at educational institutions total \$568,118.08.

DAR SCHOOLS – O.B. McCorkle

Georgia Daughters are truly committed to DAR Schools with 100% of chapters completing the Chapter Master Report and ninety-five chapters earning the Hightower Award! In the first seven months of the Patton administration, the Committee's "Special Projects" resulted in \$18,238.95 in donations made through the State Society to DAR Schools. Kate Duncan Smith DAR School, the GSSDAR These special projects funded: Scholarship Fund (\$4,448.50); Tamassee, the Mental Health Counseling Fund (\$6,034); Berry, the restoration of stained glass windows at Frost Chapel (\$1,391,45); Crossnore. the Healthy Child Initiative (\$2,783); Hindman, the Dyslexia Program and the Cornerstone Campaign (\$3,582). Chapters contributed \$8,093 for the "Georgia Project at Tamassee." for maintenance of May Erwin Talmadge Auditorium/Gymnasium. Future improvements on the facility, recommended by Tamassee, are based on a 1990 inspection performed by McKay, Zorn & Assoc. PA. Georgia Daughters supported "Friends of DAR Schools" with \$7,866.62 in donations; chapters reported an additional \$51,635 in total direct donations to the schools, 69,781 labels, and 13,352 pounds of thrift. Georgia Daughters purchased 298 Apple and Arrow pins in first seven months of the Dillon administration totaling \$7.450.

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERANS – Peggy Duncan Freeman

Georgia Daughters devoted excellent time and resources, serving VA Hospitals, Clinics, Stand Down, individuals, and families in 93 chapters. Volunteer participation travel totaled 67,133 miles; monetary donations of \$52,134.33. 663 Youth Volunteers served 1,784 hours; 1,347 Adult Volunteers 31,573 hours. 16 interviews were conducted in the Veterans History Project. Monetary donations valued including clothing, food, gifts, games, books and magazines totaled \$93,628.80.

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA – Claudia Campbell Callaway

Eighty-two chapters participated in paying tribute to the Flag of the United States of America in various projects and activities: Nationalization ceremonies, patriotic concerts, Flag Retirement ceremonies. Programs on the Flag and flag etiquette given by several chapters. Almost 2,400 youth in Flag activities in schools, churches, scouting and JROTC programs. Sixty-five chapters held or participated in 189 flag events. Total flags presented by 52 chapters was an amazing 14,602! Sixty-nine certificates were presented to individuals and groups recognizing efforts in properly displaying the Flag. Thirty-four chapters distributed 4,694 DAR Flag Code brochures. Ninety-Six Braille flags distributed. Chapter Regents incorporated Flag Minutes in 314 meetings. Six chapters excelled and received Certificates of Award: Etowah, General Daniel Newnan, Hightower Trail, Levi Sapp, Patriots of Liberty, and Reverend John Andrew.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS – Candice "Candy" Bryan Parrow

In 2016 forty-two Georgia Daughters submitted 242 unpublished, abstracted, or copied pages to Genealogical Records Committee. 8 Georgia Daughters participated in GRC Book Indexing Project, total of 6,630 names. Published volumes delivered to Georgia Archives, Washington Memorial Library, and Georgia Historical Society. Pleased to

announce Certificates of Award: Greatest number of unpublished, abstracted or copied pages:1st Reverend John Andrew. Greatest number of chapter members participating in abstracting or copying unpublished records: 1st Andrew McBride. Greatest number of names entered in Book Indexing Project: 1st Colonel William Candler. Number of pages synced in Book Sync project: 1st William McIntosh. Please encourage members to preserve bible records by submitting to GRC Committee. Future generations will benefit.

HISTORIC PRESERVATION – Melinda "Mindy" May Wade

Historic Preservation in Georgia is vital and active among chapters. 83 Historic Preservation programs were presented at chapter meetings and 3 chapters General Daniel Newnan, Augustin Clayton and Governor David Emanuel-Adam Brinson presented 5 Recognition Awards to worthy recipients. National Society awards approximately 30 Historic Preservation Medals per year, two of those were presented at State Conference 2016, to George Hart and Sonny Seals, Sandy Springs, and another is being presented at 2017 State Conference to Theresa Brown Thomasville Chapter. Georgia Knows Historic Preservation!! Hightower Trail and Colonel William Candler reported many markers and monuments in Georgia via the Sites and Properties Report. Philadelphia Winn is applauded for outstanding Chapter Report and work completed on Digitization of Records, State Regent's Project. Philadelphia Winn worked with Winn Property to secure Special Projects Grant to benefit the Elisha Winn Plantation One Room Schoolhouse and the Barn, and have assisted in educational goals of Gwinnett Historical Society and Gwinnett County Environmental and Heritage Center. Historic Preservation is alive in Georgia.

INSIGNIA – Camille Redfern Lowery

Insignia Committee was the first committee sanctioned by NSDAR in the late 1800's. At that time, members purchased the familiar spinning wheel pin for \$8.91.....and it was gold and platinum! This Chair attended the 2016 State Conference, four District Workshops sharing the latest Insignia information, including copies of correct placement insignia order information. Workshop tables were well attended showing desire to obtain knowledge and the correct insignia placement and circumstances, proper times and place to wear Insignia.

JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS – Nancy Collins Tims

Georgia chapters were truly outstanding in sponsorship and support of sixteen Junior American Citizens groups. Over 2,000 students participated in various JAC activities with the theme "Our National Parks: 100 Years of Service to America." Junior Membership is growing and working hard to achieve all of its goals. 2016 saw an addition of 86 new Georgia Juniors and record breaking fundraising. Juniors are very involved with 21 Juniors serving chapter officers; 12 state vice chairs; 5 state chairs; 1 NSDAR vice chair; and 57 chapter chairs. Annual silent auction raised a record \$4,025.00 with proceeds benefitting HPMF, "Friends of GA Pages," and the Georgia Junior Club. LINEAGE RESEARCH – Kitty Worrell Watters

Sixty-nine chapters reported Lineage Research Committee activity, up from 51 last year, a 17% increase. Of Georgia's 110 chapters, 53 have a Lineage Research Committee Chair. Image Access is granted to 71 Georgia members plus every Registrar. Georgia members made 67 requests of the Lineage Research Lookup Board and completed 25 requests. National Specialty-Research teams were utilized by 7 chapters: 5 DNA, 1 African-American Patriot, 1 French Patriot. With the assistance of a National Vice Chair, a Georgia African-American Lineage Research Task Force was instituted. This Chair assisted in presenting Genealogy Workshops at all four District Workshops. GSSDAR innovations to help researchers included a Paper Party and day-long Genealogy Workshop before SBOM. Fourteen Vice Chairs and other GA Daughters have worked countless hours on research for new applications and have assisted in clearing Have Writtens/Airs, approximately 60 since June. It takes many heads, hands, and hearts to get hard applications verified. Truly a team effort, Lineage Research has worked with the State Registrar, CDRC, Volunteer Genealogists, Membership, and Registrars to increase membership in the Georgia State Society.

LITERACY PROMOTION – Jennifer Whipple Whiddon

Congratulations to outstanding chapter members Emilie Sandra Dunagan Deal of Colonel William Candler and Debbie Houston of Philadelphia Winn for dedication to Literacy promotion. Philadelphia Winn, Chehaw, Patriots of Liberty, Andrew McBride, Colonel William Candler and Atlanta have done exceptional projects to promote literacy. Three hundred sixty-two Georgia daughters were involved in chapter endeavors. 12,229 hours were given to these projects. Seven thousand eight hundred sixty-seven books were

attending classes, contributing to school spelling bee and supplying after school snacks to students, helping English Language Learners, dedicated reading to children in members' own families, sending supplies to DAR sponsored schools, starting a chapter book swap and check-out display for members are some of the many ways Georgia daughters have promoted literacy. Archibald Bulloch reported most members involved and most money donated; Chestatee River reported most hours spent; most books donated Augustin Clayton.

MEMBERSHIP – Marguerite McEntee Dyal & Rene' Shows Hardin, Co-Chairs In 2016 Georgia State Society welcomed 452 new members, including 86 Juniors. Total membership count on January 1, 2017 was 7854. Georgia Daughters actively recruited new members and found creative ways to introduce DAR in their communities. They participated in parades, set up information tables and booths at community events. participated in Memorial Day activities, held "meet and greets" at local libraries and placed articles in local newspapers and magazines. Chapters gave Welcome Packets and chapter yearbooks to new members; communicated by email, "snail mail," phone calls, chapter newsletters, websites and Facebook groups to keep their members informed; had weekend meetings to accommodate members who could not attend weekday meetings; held New Member Teas and Coffees; took field trips; and organized special events so that members and prospective members could get better acquainted and HODARs could participate. information for their wonderful reports. An incredible thank you goes to chapters reporting National Defense activities including pictures of events.

PRESIDENT GENERAL'S PROJECT – Paula Hannah Osborne

Georgia Daughters support the President General's Project (PG's Project) and are Moving Forward in Service to America." There were 21 chapters earning the President General's Project 100% Chapter Participation Certificate. An additional 84 chapters made donations towards earning their certificates. Several individual members donated directly to the PG's Project or through the Sustaining Member program. Some chapters raised additional donations with offering voices and silent auctions. A total of \$8,610 in President General's products was sold at District Workshops and State Board of Management. Information on projects was distributed at these events. This Chair wishes to thank Vice Chair Sue Carlton and Martha Knight for their assistance. Of 109 chapters 99 reported various activities and displays supporting the President General's Projects. The President General's letter was presented at meetings and/or in newsletters by 96 chapters. PG'S Project programs were presented at 22 chapter meetings. This Chair worked in the President General's salesroom at Congress.

PUBLIC RELATIONS AND MEDIA – Leslie Olejnik

Reports were received from all 110 chapters. Chapters reporting newsletters, 64; members only website and/or social media, 65; brochures, 32; media awards, 3; print coverage, 93; broadcast coverage, 38; electronic media coverage, 62; "Today's DAR" video use, 18; publicity for a commemorative or community event, 75. GSSDAR's service project during State Conference involved purchasing children's books to stock Fort Stewart's new library. Project was in conjunction with USO Wishbook. The book "Historic Rural Churches of Georgia" donated to Governor Nathan Deal and First Lady Sandra Deal. Members attended grave marker dedications, battle commemorations, and wreath laying ceremonies. Georgia Day and American Indian Heritage Month Proclamations were obtained. State Regent was introduced to Georgia in April with an appearance on 11Alive News Today followed by feature article, "Sunday Conversation with Joyce Ball Patton," in Atlanta Journal Constitution newspaper on August 27th. Georgia Daughters' participation in DAR's Guinness World Record Letter Writing to Active Military aired on CBS 46 in June. During Constitution Week, Cherokee and Philadelphia Winn sponsored two 15-second Georgia Public Broadcasting (GPB) Radio spots that reached an estimated 54,000 people.

PUBLIC RELATIONS AND MEDIA, SOCIAL MEDIA – Patricia Hein

Georgia chapters are using Facebook Groups to keep members informed about DAR business, and Facebook Pages to promote DAR activities and encourage DAR membership. 25 chapters have both a Closed Group and public Page with highest percentage in the Northwest district. Chapters recognized in Central West and Central East districts, which have both, for adding their Social Media Vice Chair to their closed Group. Best Use of Facebook awarded: Cherokee, Colonel Ebenezer Folsom, Nathaniel Macon, Governor David Emanuel-Adam Brinson, and Philadelphia Winn. Daughters with original posts represented 53 Georgia chapters. Marchelle Arcucci-Dedina, Atlanta, posted the first Facebook Live on Georgia Facebook Group. 10% of the Georgia daughters are members of Georgia Facebook to keep informed about DAR.

This Chair recognizes a most outstanding chapters, Levi Sapp. Their small chapter of 25 members reported 9,050 hours for 2016! First year registrars were assigned a Volunteer Genealogist vice chair. All vice chairs have served as chapter registrars, passed GEP III and verified at least 20 DAR applications. The first year registrars have someone to ask for help, resulting in many verified applications and the voice of DAR experienced registrars to assist. VOLUNTEER INFORMATION SPECIALISTS – Carla James Brown and Catherine "Cathy" Winslett Hyer, Co-Chairs

As of January 1, 2016, the Georgia State Society recorded 7,803 members. 90 chapters use various forms of social media. Chapters reported 180 prospective members contacted through chapter web sites; 389 prospective members contacted chapter through the NSDAR site. Of those prospective members, 287 joined DAR or have papers pending. 100% of chapters completed the CMR. 78 chapters reported newsletters/yearbooks electronic distribution; 35 reporting electronic distribution of both. E-membership is routinely used by Chapter officers, all State Officers and State Chairs in approved access groups. Thank you to Georgia VIS Committee that spend hours updating and reviewing 100+ GSSDAR chapter and state websites. Thanks to Vice Chairs who make this committee a success: Vice Chair, Programming and Design, Amy Pittman Lawson; M. Beth Snider Finley, Vice Chair, e-Membership & Chapter Master Report; Ruth E. WOMEN'S ISSUES – Kathryn "Kitty" Audrey Kelley

Fifty eight percent of Georgia chapters participated in more than 132 Women's Issues in 2016. In 239 meetings, Women's Issues minutes were read. Georgia Daughters presented a total of 96 Women's Issues programs: 12 family related issues, 1 career, 83

health-related issues. Most popular programs were 28 on women's issues (voting, constitutional amendments, & women in history), 27 on soldiers or women veterans, and 16 women in history programs. Other than health, popular programs and projects that focused attention on issues relevant to today's women included support for domestic violence shelters, book clubs, foster care, and personal safety. Georgia Daughters reported many volunteer hours: Women's shelters; quilts for veterans and kids; literacy promotion; mentoring; church activities; homeless outreach; Meals on Wheels; hospital volunteering; shut-in assistance and rides. Twelve essays submitted to Women's Issues Essay Contest, with one chapter submitting three essays. Service to women by Georgia Daughters is amazing. It is a privilege to serve the Georgia State Society as Women's Issues Committee Chair.

COMMUNITY CLASSROOM – Suellen Browning Dennis

In 2016, 51 chapters participated in the new Community Classroom committee program making a huge impact in local schools. 107 members volunteered 349 hours along with 24 chapters making financial donations to schools ranging from \$10-\$500. Some of the contributions made by Georgia Daughters: Constitution Week materials; Traveling Trunk for Rev War Patriots program; Meadow Garden program; assisting classroom Teachers; purchasing school supplies; book donations; mentoring; providing food and refreshments for various school programs, helping in after school programs, tutoring. Three chapters submitted a success story with article for consideration for the Georgia State submission to NSDAR. Thanks to Georgia Daughters who made a difference in local schools this year.

EDUCATIONAL RESOURCES – Mary Lynn Keener

This National Committee was recently established to provide lesson plans for students from Kindergarten through 12th grade the United States and abroad. The focus is education, in particular, education in the subject areas of government, heritage, history, genealogy, language and/or math topics. Such knowledge will help our youth succeed. The information is submitted in the form of lesson plans utilizing a NSDAR Educational Resources template. Submissions may be made by DAR members or by the public for use in schools, clubs or other groups. Once accepted by NSDAR, the plans are available electronically for teachers worldwide. The goal of the National Chair is to have at least one lesson plan submitted from each state in 2017. Several elementary teachers have been contacted and encouraged to develop and submit a lesson plan. With many current and former educators in GSSDAR, this chair is hopeful the mission of this Committee becomes more widely known by DAR members, the "pool" of lesson plans available on the NSDAR website will grow rapidly.

The three chapters, Henry Walton, Philadelphia Winn, and Thronateeska grants awarded in 2016 for Georgia sponsored applicants totaled \$14,216.00.

Brown, Ida "Bea" Best Smith Fischer, Debbie Taylor Powell, Betty Brown Harrah, Charlotte Josephine Christian and Kitty Worrell Watters for the wisdom and enthusiasm they each bring to this committee. Madam State Regent, thank you for giving me this opportunity to serve you and the Georgia State Society.

FINANCE COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES

September 28, 2016

The first meeting of the Finance Committee of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, for the Patton administration was held on Wednesday, September, 28, 2016, in the Board Room of the Georgia Archives in Morrow. Harriette Foster Hankinson, Committee Chair, called the meeting to order at 11:20 a.m., Secretary Melodye G. Brown being present. Other members attending were Ida "Bea" Best Smith Fischer, Debbie Taylor Powell, Betty Brown Harrah, Charlotte Josephine Christian, and Kathleen "Kitty" Worrell Watters. Ex-Officio member, State Regent Joyce Ball Patton was present.

Mrs. Hankinson gave the Invocation, welcomed those attending and declared a quorum present. She explained the minutes of the last meeting of the Finance Committee were approved by the committee members serving during the Fischer administration, and had been submitted for publication in the 2015-2016 *Proceedings*.

At the State Regent's request, the Chair moved that the firm of Smith & Howard, Certified Public Accountants and Advisors in Atlanta, the firm in use since 2014, be accepted as the Auditor for the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, for the Patton Administration, fiscal years 2016-2018. Adopted.

Financial reports for the Georgia State Society and for Meadow Garden were not complete at this time, due to the recent transition in the office of State Treasurer. State Treasurer Debbie Powell will submit the reports when finalized.

Mrs. Hankinson presented two working budgets for review, one based on 7,700 members and another based on 7,800 members. It was decided to use the more conservative version, with \$10.00 annual dues from 7,700 members for a total of \$77,000.00. The per capita percentages remain the same as in the 2016-2017 Adopted Budget. The proposed budget reflects a decrease in the current expense category of Administration and Operating Fund, with corresponding increases in Chaplain and DAR Schools Luncheon categories, and addition of a new category for Volunteer Information Specialists. Mrs. Harrah moved that the proposed budget for Fiscal Year 2017-2018, as amended, be accepted. Adopted.

Mrs. Fischer gave a report of the 2015-2016 audit from the firm, Smith & Howard, Certified Public Accountants and Advisors in Atlanta. No errors were found and no recommendations made.

Mrs. Patton gave an update on the status of the two grants for restoration of the windows at Meadow Garden, as well as the University of Georgia Scholarship situation. She then presented a brief background on the property of John W. and Julia L. Johnson in Waycross, donated in 1938 to the now-disbanded Lyman Hall Chapter, and the request from the Waycross Young Men's Christian Association to transfer the land to them. Mrs. Harrah moved that the Georgia State Society hire the appropriate people to search and establish clear title on the property previously owned by the disbanded Lyman Hall Chapter in Waycross and to hire a survey company for a new survey. Funds to come from unrestricted/state dues-unallocated/general savings money market account. Adopted.

Mrs. Hankinson presented a request from the Volunteer Information Specialists Committee (Cathy Hyer and Carla Brown, Co-Chairs) for subscription to software to create and maintain the website. Ms. Brown moved to approve the request from the VIS Committee to subscribe to Adobe Dreamweaver Creative Cloud for teams single application, and to subscribe to Microsoft® Office 365 application for up to five devices, cost not to exceed \$500, funds to be taken from unrestricted/state duesunallocated/general savings checking account. Adopted.

Mrs. Hankinson presented a request from the Page Club (Katherine Croft, President) for funds to replenish the state supply of Page sashes. Ms. Christian moved **that the**

Georgia State Society provide \$2,000 to the Georgia State Page Club for the purchase and embroidery of new Page sashes; purchase to include 15 rolls of white Ribband Ribbon Cross Stitch Embroidery Fabric and the appropriate amount of blue, silver, and gold trimming to make approximately 60 new sashes. Funds to come from unrestricted/state dues-unallocated/general savings money market account. Adopted.

Mrs. Hankinson announced the next meeting of the committee would be at the 119th State Conference.

The Chair adjourned the meeting at 2:30 p.m.

March 8, 2017

The Finance Committee of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, met on Wednesday, March 8, 2017, at the Evergreen Marriott Hotel and Conference Center in Stone Mountain. Harriette Foster Hankinson, Committee Chair, called the meeting to order at 11:52 a.m., Secretary Melodye G. Brown being present. Other members attending were Debbie Taylor Powell, Betty Brown Harrah, Charlotte Josephine Christian, and Kathleen "Kitty" Worrell Watters. Ex-Officio member, State Regent Joyce Ball Patton was present.

Mrs. Hankinson gave the Invocation, welcomed those attending and declared a quorum present. Mrs. Patton gave a positive update on the status of Honorary State Regent Ida "Bea" Fischer in her new home in North Carolina. The State Regent expressed appreciation to Mrs. Harrah for her dedicated assistance throughout the transition in Treasurers.

Mrs. Powell presented the financial reports, declaring all was in order and up to date. The Account Summaries for the Georgia State Society are as follows: \$500.65 in Savings, \$124,198.70 in Certificates of Deposit, \$238,453.20 in the Checking Account, \$156,043.61 in the Money Market Account, \$1,000.00 Other Assets (Hotel Deposit), and \$520,196.16 Total Liabilities & Equity. Meadow Garden Account Summaries are as follows: \$373,127.87 in Certificates of Deposit, \$99,300.39 in the Checking Account, \$73,140.87 in the Money Market Account, \$100 in Petty Cash, \$100 in Go Green Petty Cash, \$257,003.00 Total Fixed Assets, and \$802,772.13 Total Liabilities & Equity.

Mrs. Powell shared that \$60,000 had been moved from the Checking Account to the Money Market in order to maintain insured levels during State Conference. Mrs. Patton explained the high amount for literature was owing to purchase of 300 of the newly published Handbooks. Mrs. Powell pointed out charges for excess transactions in certain months, and stated she had requested an increase in the number of allowed transactions.

Mrs. Powell suggested conservative investments could greatly increase our yields over certificates of deposit. She stated Regions Bank handles investments for several DAR State Societies and had offered to assist us. Ms. Christian reported Joseph Habersham Chapter had been able to maintain a good rate of return with conservative investments. It was pointed out the State Bylaws restrict investments to "U.S. Treasury obligations or other interest bearing obligations of federally insured financial institutions." A Bylaws change (at State Conference) would be required in order to alter the investments. Any restrictions on existing funds would need to be investigated. Mrs. Powell was given permission to investigate options for conservative investments.

Mrs. Hankinson announced that the Finance Committee will present the 2017-2018 annual budget for adoption at the Opening Business Session of State Conference, and also present for ratification the three motions which were adopted by the State Board of Management on Oct. 29, 2016.

The next meeting of the Finance Committee will be held in the fall (date and place to be determined) to discuss and prepare the 2018-2019 annual budget.

May 30, 2017

The Finance Committee of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, met on Monday, May 30, 2017, via conference call. The purpose of the called meeting was to discuss "moving funds from the Unrestricted/State Dues-Unallocated/General Savings Money Market Account to the Checking Account to pay a shortage of funds from the 2017 State Conference."

Harriette Foster Hankinson, Committee Chair, called the meeting to order at 10:30 a.m., Secretary Melodye G. Brown being present. Other members attending were Ida "Bea" Best Smith Fischer, Debbie Taylor Powell, Betty Brown Harrah, Charlotte Josephine Christian, and Kathleen "Kitty" Worrell Watters. Ex-Officio member, State Regent Joyce Ball Patton was present.

Mrs. Hankinson thanked those attending and declared a quorum present. Mrs. Hankinson restated the purpose of the meeting to discuss moving funds from the Unrestricted/State Dues-Unallocated/General Savings Money Market Account to the Georgia State Society Checking Account to pay a shortage of funds from the 2017 State Conference. She stated the amount of the overage had been reduced from \$5,796.26 to \$4,596. 26, owing to receipt of a donation in the amount of \$1,200 designated to cover the piano rental fee. As background, Mrs. Hankinson read a list of various items, from 2014 until the present, for which funds had been taken from the Money Market Account, and the action ratified by the State Board of Management.

It was suggested it would be more appropriate for the needed funds to come from Checking Patton Unrestricted State Dues Unallocated, as the expenses were incurred by the current administration. This suggestion was examined, and it was determined there were insufficient funds in the Checking Patton Unrestricted State Dues Unallocated to meet all the upcoming obligations, should the funds be taken from there.

Mrs. Harrah moved that \$4,596.26 be moved from the Money Market State Funds Unrestricted State Dues Unallocated General Savings Fund #1059 to the Unrestricted Patton State Conference Fund #1096 to correct the deficit in the State Conference Fund. This motion shall be taken to the State Board of Management to be ratified. Rationale: If the deficit amount had been taken from the Checking Patton Unrestricted State Dues Unallocated there would not have been enough funds to pay obligations until dues come in. Mrs. Powell seconded the motion. ADOPTED.

A PROCLAMATION

GEORGIA DAY

- WHEREAS: Since its founding 283 years ago, Georgia has grown to over 9 million people and has progressed from a rural state to a commercial, financial, and cultural center for the Southeast region and our nation; and
- WHEREAS: Georgia's magnificent natural beauty from the mountains to the seashore, its many historic wonders and sites, and its distinctive cultural heritage are all reasons to celebrate this great state; and
- WHEREAS: All Georgians are invited to rediscover our natural, cultural, and historic wonders and sites, and to encourage people throughout our nation and the world to recognize the people, institutions, and historic events that have shaped Georgia's significant place in our country's history and global commerce; now
- THEREFORE: I, NATHAN DEAL, Governor of the State of Georgia, do hereby proclaim February 12, 2016, as GEORGIA DAY in honor of our state's 283rd anniversary and call upon all Georgians to celebrate our proud and rich heritage.

In witness thereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the Executive Department to be affixed this 13th day of January in the year of our Lord two thousand sixteen.

STATE REGENT'S PROJECT – Amy Bolin Nation



Approximately 8 docents regularly gave Meadow Garden tours, each volunteering from 1 to 8 hours weekly. We are grateful for the approximate 50 hours of docent time given each month. For special events we are fortunate to have HODAR's, and friends who support our activities utilizing their many talents. The Sewing Guild continued its plan for Regencyperiod (1790-1804) clothing to be displayed at Meadow Garden. Authentic period patterns require transfer to tracing cloth before construction can begin. The feasibility of this project is being studied. Eleven Georgia Daughters were prepped on Meadow Garden and Walton family history by attending a class and Power Point program at SBOM. Eleven Georgia Daughters served as hostesses (two of whom played dulcimers) and represented Meadow Garden at the Governor's Mansion Christmas Open House in Atlanta, December 11. In addition, the Walton Family china tea service was transported from Meadow Garden and displayed in the Governor's Mansion.

MEADOW GARDEN FURNISHINGS – Janice "Jan" Johnson Manos

As Furnishings Chair of Meadow Garden, this Chair has implemented a plan to enlarge the scope of the story told at Meadow Garden, and to broaden the appeal of museum and to encourage customer return visits to help make Meadow Garden self-sustaining. The first step in interpreting the entire house as a family home was to move Director's office and gift shop to Heritage Education Building, the new Visitor Center. The front room was transformed into the Augusta Parlor using chairs and tables already in the room. A small antique sofa was purchased along with a Aubusson carpet and other small items to represent the women who lived at Meadow Garden. The Red Room is now a library. Again furniture already at Meadow Garden was re-located. An antique desk and a large Persian carpet were purchased to create a warm room setting. Today the Meadow Garden story covers the years 1790 to 1821 and includes not only George Walton and his wife and two sons, but also the family of George Walton, Jr., who lived in the house until 1821.

Meadow Garden Board Minutes

June 25, 2016

The Meadow Garden Board met on Saturday, June 25, 2016, at the George Walton Heritage Education Center in Augusta, Georgia. Joyce Ball Patton, State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 11:04.a.m. Other voting members attending were: Melodye G. Brown, Amy Pittman Lawson, Patricia Frederick Croft, Patricia Brand Colbert, Donna Lynne Owens, Shelby Alderman Whitson, Virginia Grace Lingelbach, Trudy Foraker Alexander, Janice Johnson Manos, Marjorie Nolan Wilson, Deborah Taylor Powell, and Charlotte Josephine Christian. Also present were Ex Officio member OB Wilhoit McCorkle, and non-voting members Elaine Ingram Dorr, Robin Redfearn Towns, and Shannon Cowles Logue.

The State Regent offered the Invocation and welcomed everyone to the meeting.

Meadow Garden Director, John G. McBrayer was invited to make a presentation to the Board. Mr. McBrayer reported an energy audit was performed on Meadow Garden by Denise Hamrick of Georgia Power on April 10, in anticipation of applying for energy grant/rebates in the coming year. Our energy use is averaging 30 to 50% less than two years ago, due to upgrading two HVAC units and changes in thermostat settings. Also, no significant loss of energy was detected. The second phase will involve assessment by Georgia Power of all our mechanical / HVAC units as to efficiency, cost of operation, potential savings, etc.

On April 27, the Director and Amy Lawson met with Russell Foster and Rebecca Rogers from the Canal Authority. The Canal Authority is in the planning stages for the next phase of work on the canal, which includes the Meadow Garden area. While any decision regarding the canal has to go through several authorities, they gave every indication that a dock is in the foreseeable future. In addition, they mentioned establishing a partnership that would include Meadow Garden in decisions about signage, recreational areas, etc.

On May 25, Meadow Garden hosted a meeting regarding the Historic Preservation grant for the window restoration project. The Director welcomed attendees, Ann Floyd from the Central Savannah River Area Regional Development Center (CSRA RDC); Carol Moore, Tax Incentive and Grant Coordinator for the Georgia Historic Preservation Division (HPD); Ahn Vu and Paul DeCamp from the Augusta Richmond County Commission. Specific criteria for the grant and various phases of implementation were discussed. Ms. Moore presented Meadow Garden with a Historic Preservation Grant Fund Program banner to be displayed at the beginning of our project. Attendees exchanged contact information to facilitate communication throughout the process.

By the Board's direction, the floors in the front parlor and dining room of George Walton's house have been stabilized in order to prevent further deterioration. The central floor joists were strengthened, jacked up and given substantial new supports and poured concrete footings. Pro-Mark Contractors, a group which has done a tremendous amount of work in our local historic districts, completed the project on April 25 for \$970.

Mr. McBrayer discussed the upcoming July 4th event. He will contact the Augusta Chronicle again this year. Based on last year's attendance, 150 to 175 people are expected. This event needs to be grown incrementally, so that our docents can effectively handle the number of people while keeping Meadow Garden secure. Collecting this number of entrance fees in such a short period of time has presented a problem, and it was recommended that a "donations only" admission policy be instituted for July 4th. The Director believes donations would exceed normal entrance fees, and it would be a gesture of good will towards the community.

The Director presented a plan to get people on-site after hours by providing something other than the standard tour, monthly or on alternate months. Mr. McBrayer envisions a one hour educational event, lecture, or demonstration, in late afternoon or early evening, either in the Heritage Education Center or on the grounds of Meadow Garden. Admission fees would be nominal, depending on whether refreshments are offered or not. Suggested topics were preservation and repairs of historic buildings, period plants and gardening practices, local history, period craft demonstrations, period weaponry demonstrations, children's projects, and period etiquette and courtship.

The Director also requested a date be set for the Mulberry Soiree, in order to provide time to obtain a liquor license, and possibly recruit local business sponsors. Last year's event was reviewed. The first Mulberry Soiree was an outreach to the Augusta community, and included two musicians, a simple catered dinner, and cash bar. The educational component was provided by speaker John Waters. The fee was set at \$20, with expectation that we would lose money on our first attempt, and as we continue to "grow" the event. The first Soiree was used to determine capacity and "flow" with about 60 attending. The State Regent complimented Mr. McBrayer on last year's event. After consulting her calendar, the State Regent determined Oct. 1 would be the best date. Mrs. Patton asked Jan Manos to check with Madison resident, Neil Horstman, formerly President of the White House Historical Association, Resident Director of George Washington's Mount Vernon, and Executive Director of the Historic Savannah Foundation, as a potential speaker for this year's Soiree.

The State Regent distributed the timeline for the Certified Local Government (CLG) Grant managed by the City of Augusta. She reported the National Society has mailed the initial DAR Special Projects Grant payment of \$5,000 for the first phase of the Meadow Garden windows restoration. The other CLG Grant managed by the City of Augusta will not be ready to begin work until Oct. 15, 2016. We have confirmed in writing we have the matching funds for both grants on hand, with no commingling of funds. The NSDAR grant project must be complete by June 30, 2017. Mrs. Patton suggested the Board consider rebidding the project in phases.

Meadow Garden Chair, Amy Lawson suggested having someone certified to inspect the dormers and determine if they can last until October. If so, she recommended using the contractor used by the City of Augusta because they are very experienced with historic buildings and can handle any unexpected situations that may arise. Once the work is begun, it is only expected to take a few months. The State Regent directed Mrs. Lawson to communicate with the City of Augusta, and have someone look at the windows and do whatever may be needed to protect them until October.

Mrs. Lawson reported a grant was received to update brochures. Two brochures are in development; one for distribution at Rest Areas, and one for the Historic House. She is working with Public Relations Chair, Anita Mashburn, to develop a donation "tear-off", which can be mailed out to members. We have the ability to take credit cards. The State Regent expressed her desire that Patron names be listed on our web site. Mrs. Lawson reported the Meadow Garden web site had been redone in the early summer, after an attack. Everything has been repaired, with the exception that not all images have been restored yet. Presenting programs on Meadow Garden will no longer be a State Honor Roll requirement. Mrs. Lawson would like to develop a Meadow Garden wish list, with items of various costs, for which members and chapters may provide funding, not the items themselves. All chairs were encouraged to add needs for their respective areas.

State Treasurer, Donna Owens presented the former State Treasurer Betty Harrah's summary of accounts for July 1, 2015 through June 24, 2016, as follows: \$373,119.57 invested in Certificates of Deposit, \$61,457.17 in the checking account (\$43,875.69 in Admin. & Maintenance), \$56,987.25 in the Money Market Account, \$100.00 in Petty Cash, \$100.00 in the Go Green Petty Cash with an additional \$440.17 in Admin. & Maintenance, \$491,763.99 Total Current Assets (Checking & Savings), \$214,989.40 in Fixed Assets, \$706,753.39 Total Assets, \$706,753.39 in Total Liabilities & Equity. It was reported that

the State Regent's Project account would be zeroed out by Monday, checks having been issued for Phase VI deposit and final payment that totaled \$9,500.00.

The State Regent requested funds be allocated to purchase items for the Gift Shop, rather than expecting the Gift Shop Chair to use her own funds to do so. Shannon Logue, Gift Shop Advisor and past Gift Shop Chair, charged purchases on her own credit card, and turned in the receipts to the Treasurer to be reimbursed. Mrs. Patton stated we need to budget for this, and that she felt a bank card for more than \$10,000 would be needed. It was determined that we do not know what is currently in inventory. Recent purchases of \$3,500 of Staffordshire china and \$800 of jellies were made, but the inventory of jewelry, toys, etc. is not available. A one-time infusion of cash to capitalize the Gift Shop was discussed. Profits from the Gift Shop go into Meadow Garden Maintenance. Mrs. Lawson stated that "Cashier Live" has an inventory system, but that each item must be entered into the system for it to work. It is simple, but monotonous. As soon as this is done, we can fully track sales and inventory. We don't use "SKU" numbers to uniquely identify products. Jewelry, etc. are recorded, when sold, as "item" in the system. Gift Shop Chair Marjorie Wilson was asked to enter each item into the inventory system. Virginia Lingelbach pointed out that we need to know which items are "business related" and which are not, for future IRS purposes. The State Regent estimated there is \$10,000 in current inventory. Charlotte Christian suggested an infusion of \$10,000. The State Regent felt that was not enough, as a single order of jewelry requires an outlay of \$1,500. Ms. Christian inquired if Mrs. Loque had ever been \$10,000 out-of-pocket. Mrs. Loque said she had not. Several members felt that an infusion of \$3,000 to \$5,000 would be sufficient. The State Regent felt this amount was too low, and stated her desire that the Gift Shop become a "destination" shopping location in Augusta. She also expressed the wish to republish the book about Madame LeVert, as an item for the Gift Shop. Mrs. Lingelbach stated that a one-time infusion would not solve the issue of the Chair spending her own funds, and that we needed some other vehicle by which to reimburse the Chair. There was a discussion of prepaid credit cards versus debit cards. Mrs. Lawson pointed out that the Director sometimes has emergency expenses which should also be addressed at this time. Mrs. Lingelbach moved to provide the Meadow Garden Gift Shop Chair with a prepaid bank debit card in the amount of \$5,000 for the purpose of purchasing items for the Meadow Garden Gift Shop, and to provide a \$500 prepaid bank debit card to the Director of Meadow Garden for the purpose of purchasing supplies. Approval of expenses by the Director over \$100 must have prior approval of the State Regent. Funds to be taken from Administration and Maintenance. Deborah Powell seconded the motion. Adopted.

Mrs. Owens presented the proposed budget for Meadow Garden. After addition of a line item for Interior Cleaning, and proper distribution of funds between Landscaping and Lawn Service, Patricia Croft moved **that we accept the proposed budget amended and revised.** Patricia Colbert seconded the motion. **Adopted.**

Docents Chair, Trudy Alexander presented her vision for Meadow Garden Docents' attire, and suggested the Sewing Guild use "Saundra Ros Altman's: Past Patterns #031: Circa 1796-1806 Lewis & Clark Era: Empire Gown," a day dress of the Empire Period. Mrs. Alexander stated her belief that having things as authentic as possible is good, and that DAR should strive for authenticity. But wearing period clothing will be voluntary for the docents, not required. She plans to have children's and men's clothing hanging in the bedrooms. There was a discussion of authentic fabrics. Mrs. Alexander would like to have docents doing period activities, such as knitting, or kitchen activities. Mrs. Croft stated her preference that the period reflected be more 1790 than 1810, because of when George Walton died. It was pointed out that Dorothy Walton lived well beyond George Walton. The State Regent announced that eight to ten docents would be needed on July 4th from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

Virginia Lingelbach moved to waive the tour admission fee and accept donations for both admission to the Meadow Garden grounds and historic home for the 4th of July, 2016, re-enactment and demonstration event. The motion was seconded by Marjorie Wilson. Adopted.

Furnishings Chair, Jan Manos stated her goal to have Meadow Garden's furnishings and accessories reflect each member of the Walton family who lived there, and to reflect the political and social history of early Georgia, 1790 to 1821. The plan she proposed for the first year of the term included transforming the Augusta Room into a ladies parlor, to focus on Dorothy Walton and objects that would have been owned by women into the Empire Period. To this end, she proposed clearing every object from the Augusta Room, repainting the fireplace mantle and woodwork in a cream color, installing window treatments, carpet and accessories of this time, moving several objects that reflect the feminine lifestyle such as the piano from other rooms, purchasing a loveseat and arranging the room with furniture already in the collection and purchasing items that visually help explain life in early Georgia during the Empire Period. She further proposed adding period window treatments in the Blue Front Parlor and Dining Room; and in the Front Hallway, removing the hat rack, adding a painted floor cloth, and bringing the other Windsor chair from the kitchen to make a pair in the hall.

Augusta Chapter Regent, Patty Croft stated her wish to maintain and promote the history of the women in Augusta Chapter, and DAR's, history in the interpretation of the Augusta Room, and not to lose that important component. She pointed out that the Augusta Room is used as a holding area for tours every day. Meadow Garden Chair, Amy Lawson said she had no opposition to Mrs. Manos's plan but that, rather than approving the plan in total, each item in the plan would need to be researched and reviewed on its own. Mrs. Lawson explained that the current appearance of the historic house had been well researched, and things had been done for a reason, and restrictions included in the Standing Rules for a reason. Changes should be justified by ample research, with respect shown to the Daughters who have brought us to this point. The State Regent stated the three busts of the Signers of the Declaration of Independence would have to be moved out of the Historic House. She asked Virginia Lingelbach if a motion was needed. Mrs. Lingelbach read the Standing Rules, which indicated the Furnishings Chair has control of movement of items in Meadow Garden. There was general agreement amongst the Board to move the busts of the Signers to the Heritage Education Center.

Landscaping Chair, Debbie Powell reported Phase VI of the Landscaping Plan was taking place now, and was completely funded. An herb garden with irrigation will be added by July 3. A rain gauge will be added, and the rain basin enlarged to control water. Grading outside the fence, sod and sprinklers will all be finished by July 3. Completion of the west entrance ties into the sidewalk outside to complete a wheelchair ramp. The bushes out front will be removed. Two letters of permission were obtained from HealthSouth; one for the changes to the front for visibility, and one for permission to tie in. Honorary State Regent Bea Fischer felt that written permission would protect us better than verbal agreements, in the case of future management changes at HealthSouth. Mrs. Powell also obtained a letter of permission to move the modern art sculpture in front of Meadow Garden, for a reasonable price. The artist was located and, because of the way the sculpture is anchored, suggested contacting Dr. Dennis Skelley, former CEO of Walton Rehabilitation Health System (now HealthSouth). The sculpture is anchored in an 8' x 8' x 8' piece of concrete, with bolts with 8' rods on the end. When Mrs. Powell met with Dr. Skelley, he explained his role in the development of the area around Meadow Garden. He named the street Independence Drive. He knows a lot about the background of the property and shared the Master Plan of the area with Mrs. Powell. She had two copies made; one for Meadow Garden, and one for Eric Crossan at HealthSouth. Dr. Skelley indicated he "owns" the easement on which the sculpture sits. It may actually

belong to the Walton Foundation for Independence (of which Dr. Skelley is President and CEO) or the Greater Augusta Arts Council (of which he is the Vice President for Public Art). In any case, he will not allow the sculpture to be moved unless it is moved closer to 13th Street. Dr. Skelley's goal is to increase public art. Because of the way the sculpture is anchored, we would keep the platform base on which to put another piece of art, if the current one is moved. Mr. Crossan indicated he had no objection to moving it to another site on HealthSouth property, but we would have to have a new easement granted in order for this to happen. HealthSouth wants to expand the hospital but it must remain one story. There may be a possibility of a park closer to the street in the future if they expand, but it could be slow in coming. The State Regent suggested the property on which the sculpture stands (639 13th Street) be researched to determine who actually has the easement.

Mrs. Powell and Mr. McBrayer have met with photographers for advice on layouts for weddings and receptions. Potential fees for photo shoots and receptions should be determined. She suggested staging a wedding featuring Meadow Garden with donated services to use as advertising for local vendors. The State Regent expressed her appreciation to the Landscaping Chair, Debbie Powell.

Patrons Chair, Charlotte Christian reminded the Board members of requirements for Patron status levels and purchase of the Patron pin. There was a discussion of the different funds to which monies could be directed. The State Regent shared the offer by Deen Day Sanders to host a fundraiser for Meadow Garden at Mrs. Sander's home.

Melodye Brown read a request from Public Relations Chair, Anita Mashburn, for a title search document from Augusta. The State Regent had already obtained the needed document.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:25 p.m. Approved: October 28, 2016

July 16, 2016

The Meadow Garden Board met for a called meeting on Saturday, July 16, 2016, via conference call. Joyce Ball Patton, State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 8:00 p.m. Other voting members attending were: Melodye G. Brown, Patricia Frederick Croft, Patricia Brand Colbert, Lynne Owens, Trudy Foraker Alexander, Anita Smith Mashburn, Marjorie Nolan Wilson, Deborah Taylor Powell, and Charlotte Josephine Christian.

The purpose stated in the call was to discuss: 1) Removal of the tree behind the house damaged by recent storms, and repairs for resulting damages to the fence, 2) Loan of the Busts of the Signers to the Georgia State Archives, and 3) Proposed purchases for the house.

The State Regent explained there was a need for an expenditure exceeding the Standing Rules limit of \$1,000. Landscaping Chair, Debbie Powell reported that high winds in Augusta on July 7 caused two major limbs to fall from the poplar tree at the back of the house, damaging the fence. The first estimates obtained to remove the debris were \$450 to \$500, but it was discovered the limbs were 75 percent rotted, and there was additional rot showing on the tree itself. There is a risk the poplar will drop whole limbs with potential damage to the house. Derek Vanover and an arborist recommended by insurance adjusters in Atlanta had inspected the tree, and determined there has been slow damage since the ice damage. Derek Vanover gave an estimate for full removal at \$3,800. An identical estimate was received from the second Arborist. Mrs. Powell learned about another firm called Big Dog Stump and Tree, and they gave a verbal estimate of \$2,800 for full removal, with a \$300 (or less) estimate to limb the mulberry tree behind the poplar. The verbal estimate is to be followed up by email. Maner Fence and Specialties

was contacted about the fence damage and estimated the repairs at \$200, and said it could be completed within two weeks. Mrs. Powell explained the landscaping would be protected during the process by flagging the sprinklers, laying down plywood over the landscape and hardscape, and hand carrying out the tree sections. Our insurance does not cover the expense of removing standing trees. Mrs. Lawson has requested some of the wood be saved for art projects which could be sold in the shop, and Mrs. Powell agreed to arrange to have some pieces retained. Mrs. Powell moved that she be authorized to contract for the removal of the poplar tree with the broken top, drilling out the stump, removing the dead wood from the mulberry tree located beside the poplar tree and disposal of all debris by Big Dog Tree and Stump at a cost not to exceed \$3,100. The funds to be taken from the Meadow Garden Landscape Account. Seconded by Marjorie Wilson. Adopted. Since the fence repair does not exceed \$1,000, no motion was needed, but it was agreed that Mrs. Powell would proceed with fence repairs to be made by Maner Fence and Specialties.

The State Regent stated there is no room for the Busts of the Signers in the Heritage Education Building, Mrs. Patton has talked with Chris Davidson, Director of the Georgia Archives, about taking the three Busts of the Signers on loan, and he was interested. Mrs. Patton believed this would be advantageous as the busts would be seen by more people at the Archives than at Meadow Garden. We would be responsible for moving the busts to the Archives. It is estimated they each weigh in excess of 50 pounds. Mrs. Croft stated that John McBraver offered to move them for us. Mrs. Patton had spoken with Ginger Nicholson, College Hill Chapter, who had repaired and restored the busts, and Mrs. Nicholson was pleased for them to have a new home with greater exposure. Mrs. Colbert said she likes having the busts at Meadow Garden because children touring the home really enjoy them, but she felt better about the loan, knowing Mrs. Nicholson was in agreement. The State Regent said no motion was needed in order to move the Busts of the Signers, as the Standing Rules state that the Furnishings Chair has authority over items in the house. Furnishing Chair Jan Manos, while not present, had indicated her agreement by email. It was suggested we should have a written agreement drawn up by the Parliamentarian clarifying that the Busts were on temporary loan, the period of the loan, the care of the busts, and that we could reclaim them at any time, especially if they were not on display. Any display should include signage crediting the Georgia State Society DAR, and highlighting Meadow Garden.

Mrs. Patton explained the envisioned transformation of the Augusta Room to focus on the women who lived in the house, as well as the DAR ladies who saved the house. The Regent reviewed the report of Furnishing Chair Jan Manos, who was not present. Mrs. Manos submitted a list of items, with photographs, which she believes need to be purchased to help transform the rooms on the first floor, to bring life and softness to the house, and add objects for more interpretation of life at Meadow Garden after the death of George Walton in 1804, when his widow, son, daughter-in-law and grandchildren lived there. The items are: a painted floor cloth for the entry hall (\$120), an 8'x10' Aubusson carpet for the Augusta Room ((\$1,399), Federal loveseat including shipping from Pennsylvania (\$758), sheer cotton batiste window curtains (eight panels at \$40 each), reproduction fern leaf hold backs for curtains (four pair at \$45 per pair), small check fishtail swags for the Blue Room windows (four at \$22 each), iron hardware for swags (four pair at \$15 per pair), Williamsburg reproduction flatware (four settings at \$32 each), and a small library table for the Red Room when interpreted as an office (\$400). This totals approximately \$3,250. Mrs. Manos stated she had spent hours proposing the most period items for the absolute lowest cost. If the items are ordered soon, the house can be finished by the Mulberry Soiree on October 1.

The State Regent pointed out the only item on the list exceeding the Standing Rules limitation of \$1,000 was the Aubusson carpet. Before putting forth a motion to purchase,

she will attempt to have one donated. Mrs. Patton said she would ask Deen Day Sanders if she had one she would be willing to donate. Then the State Regent shared that Mrs. Sanders has offered to host a fund-raiser at her home, either a seated dinner for 50, a cocktail party for 150, or a drop-in tour for any number.

Mrs. Patton went on to say she hoped we could republish the book on Madame Octavia Walton LeVert, the grand-daughter of George Walton, and sell in the gift shop. She has reached out to Madame LeVert's home in Mobile, Alabama, as well as a niece in Florida, and all would like to see the book reprinted.

Marjorie Wilson reported her recent trip to The Mart, and purchases of hats and jewelry. Approximately \$1,000 was spent on jewelry, \$400 on coloring books and paper dolls, and \$400 on linens. She has completed a full inventory of items, in Excel. There is approximately \$1,700 worth of jewelry in inventory. The State Regent also went to The Mart, in the company of Mississippi State Regent Cindy McNamara. She personally purchased several items which have been successful at Mississippi's "Rosalie," such as candles, scarves and small lamps. Mrs. Patton stated we need to be doubling our money on each item, and that new tags should be put on reduced items rather than striking through the original price. Mrs. Wilson relayed Elaine Dorr's advice that we should have a number of items in the \$10-\$20 range, for hostess gifts. The State Regent stated the smallest minimum order she had found was for \$200; all items must be purchased in quantity. Mrs. Patton wants to use "SKU" numbers on stickers to help track inventory, but is not sure we have a scanner for such at Meadow Garden. The house gift shop is using the inventory features of Cashier Live, but the traveling gift shop is not. Mrs. Patton said that we were test-marketing items, and solicited product suggestions from the board. She hopes to develop into a "destination" gift shop, and mentioned possibly featuring the gift shop in future brochures. The Meadow Garden gift shop will be set up for sales at the State Regent's tea, and at the Meadow Garden Soiree. Mrs. Patton thinks we can accommodate 75 people at the Soiree and she encouraged all Daughters to attend.

Docents Chair Trudy Alexander reported that a 1790-1795 Regency style of dress ("Jane Eyre" style), not a colonial/revolutionary style, had been selected for use at Meadow Garden. The pattern can be made in muslin or silk. She plans to have a dress form with "Dorothy's dress" on it, and purchase a bonnet to go with it. A jacket of a style which could have been worn by George Walton will also be displayed. Mrs. Alexander would to purchase a pair of boots to go with "George's outfit." The State Regent would also like some children's clothes displayed upstairs. Mrs. Alexander has a wish-list, and has added sewing period attire as something chapters and Daughters can do for Docent hours. Docents are not required to wear period attire, but children really enjoy seeing it.

Public Relations Chair Anita Mashburn reported her husband was researching the Augusta property, and needed a deed from Augusta. Mrs. Patton responded that she had the needed document, which had been obtained by Katherine Croft.

The State Regent stated we were not taking action on any of these reports, but wanted everyone to know all that was transpiring. She hopes to use conference calls more in the future, to keep everyone in the loop.

Ms. Brown requested the background regarding an email Mrs. Croft had sent the board on a group wanting to present a monetary award to a local philanthropic couple, using Meadow Garden as the venue. This new award is named after George and Dorothy Walton. Mrs. Patton explained that Honorary State Regent Bea Fischer had been approached by this group last spring, and rather than simply wanting to rent Meadow Garden as a venue for their award, they wanted to partner with us as sponsors of their event, and also have access to our member list. This sort of "affiliation" is prohibited by the National Society, and we do not want to appear to be endorsing other groups of which we have little knowledge. In addition, this apparently is a "for profit" investment group. Mrs. Fischer and Mrs. Patton agreed this would not be in the best interest of Meadow Garden or the Georgia Society, and declined to participate in any way.

August 5, 2016

The Meadow Garden Board met on Friday, August 5, 2016, at the Springhill Suites Hotel in Athens, Georgia. Joyce Ball Patton, State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 3:10 p.m. Other voting members attending were: Melodye G. Brown, Donna Lynne Owens, Virginia Grace Lingelbach, Trudy Foraker Alexander, Janice Johnson Manos, Marjorie Nolan Wilson (by phone), Deborah Taylor Powell, and Anita Smith Mashburn. Also present were Ex Officio member OB Wilhoit McCorkle, and non-voting members Robin Redfearn Towns and Shannon Cowles Logue. State Parliamentarian Kate Sievert Cook was also in attendance.

The State Regent offered the Invocation and welcomed everyone to the meeting.

Docents Chair Trudy Alexander shared a display of designs and fabrics for the planned Docent period attire, and discussed the costs. Mrs. Alexander reported she has ten volunteers for the Sewing Guild. A member of Fielding Lewis Chapter, Lindsey Paris, is a professional in the film industry, and will make the prototype garment with instructions for the other seamstresses.

Furnishings Chair Jan Manos presented pictures and a diagram of furniture placement for her planned re-interpretation of the downstairs rooms. She proposed moving the piano from the Blue Room to the Augusta Room, and adding an Aubusson rug. A reproduction settee (\$125) has been found locally. She plans to retain the Le Vert chairs and étagère, and move a table from another room for a tea service. The sewing table would be moved to a more prominent position. A small rocker with a doll, and the "lolling"/Martha Washington chair would be moved from upstairs. Flowers and asymmetrical drapes would be added, resulting in a softer setting reflecting the activities of women of the period. When it was mentioned that a "parlor guitar" would be desirable, it was discovered that Pat Colbert teaches music on historic instruments. In the Dining Room, Mrs. Manos plans to add a tablecloth and napkins, as well as silverware, an epergne (\$35), and "bug catchers." She identified the wallpaper pattern as "Montpelier."

The State Regent introduced the topic of loaning out the Busts of the Signers. If they are loaned out, they will have to have a space to which to return. It was undecided where they would go. Ginger Nicholson has said the busts were made of plaster of Paris in 1956 in South Carolina for the Georgia State Capitol. The originals are in bronze. These busts were at the old Augusta Museum of History before Mrs. Nicholson restored them.

The subject of the modern sculpture piece in front of Meadow Garden was revisited. The only way Dr. Skelley will only allow it to be moved if it is to be more visible. The sculpture has an easement, and it is doubtful another easement could be obtained from HealthSouth in order to move it. There was discussion of doing a title search on the easement. HealthSouth wants to take down the building fronting 13th Street and extend their hospital into the parking lot.

Landscape Chair Debbie Powell reported the poplar tree has been taken down for the agreed upon price of \$2,800. Amy Lawson is having some gavels made from pieces of the tree. The fence repair estimated at \$200 ended up at a cost of \$821. A panel had to be replaced, rather than repaired.

Gift Shop Advisor Shannon Logue reported \$1,276 was sold at the State Regent's Tea, with 40 percent of that being profit. Additional hats have been purchased by Elaine Dorr. Mrs. Logue asked to be excused to set up sales for the workshop tomorrow. Marjorie

Wilson was contacted by phone and reported there was a large inventory of cookbooks and 55 scarves. The scarves have been reduced from \$35 to \$15, and the cookbooks reduced from \$15 to \$10. Virginia Lingelbach pointed out the difference between sales items within our mission versus those that require sales tax to be paid. There was a discussion of the advantages of Square as opposed to Cashier Live.

The State Regent had talked with Amy Lawson and John McBrayer. Someone was at Meadow Garden today to check on the dormers and prevent water from getting in. Measurements are being made at the same time. Mrs. Patton said she believes Augusta has now accepted the grant.

September 19, 2016

The Meadow Garden Board met for a called meeting on Monday, September 19, 2016, via conference call. Joyce Ball Patton, State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 8:00 p.m. Other voting members attending were: Melodye G. Brown, Amy Pittman Lawson, Patricia Frederick Croft, Janice Johnson Manos, Marjorie Nolan Wilson, Deborah Taylor Powell, and Anita Smith Mashburn.

The purpose stated in the call was to discuss: 1) recommendations from John Waters, Historic Preservation Professor at the University of Georgia, 2) possible projects, including a dependency, 3) the upcoming window restoration and the need to move the office to the Heritage Education Center, and 4) the possibility of having an open house during the holidays, and the upcoming Soiree.

The State Regent suggested the addition of a dependency at Meadow Garden, in the form of a smokehouse behind the historic house. A lot was invested in the landscaping and brick work to help make Meadow Garden an attractive venue for events, but we have no catering facilities, nor storage space for tables and chairs. Mrs. Patton believes an addition solving those shortcomings would help to attract events, and help make money. She announced that First Lady Sandra Deal has invited Meadow Garden Docents to host tours of the Governor's Mansion on December 11, at which time we will be allowed to distribute brochures and garner a lot of exposure for Meadow Garden. She pointed out that the current edition of *Historic Augusta Magazine* includes an article on Meadow Garden. Mrs. Patton stated that nothing promises a return on our money, but she would like to move in this direction, and make the dependency one of her State Regent's Projects. She related that Virginia Lingelbach and Shelby Whitson have said they would not be in favor of this. Mrs. Patton believes if there is ever an effort to dispose of Meadow Garden, the reason will be financial. She wants to move towards making Meadow Garden financially self-supporting. The State Regent asked for input from the Board.

Augusta Regent Patty Croft stated she was in favor of moving the visitor center to the Heritage Education Center, but a lot would need to be done to the building in preparation. John Waters recommended research, but Patty pointed out an inaccuracy in his research. She stated it was not the GSSDAR who bought Meadow Garden; it was the NSDAR who bought Meadow Garden, with the financial assistance of the Augusta Chapter. She stated she had not completed reviewing Water's proposal. Mrs. Croft believes the dependency is a wonderful idea, but that a study to determine exact needs and costs would be necessary in order to increase chances of approval of such a project.

The State Regent clarified that her projects would be presented and voted on at State Board of Management. Meadow Garden Chair Amy Lawson felt there was not enough time to get the needed background for such a project prior to State Board of Management.

State Second Vice Regent, Melodye Brown said she was not convinced there was any interest in renting a small outdoor venue in Augusta. Even if we could rent it, she

expressed concern that additional insurance, staffing, wear and tear, and risk to the property would not be offset by the rental fees. Ms. Brown stated that museums and historic houses are rarely self-sustaining based on entrance fees, sales, and facility rentals. Sustainability comes from one's donor base. Ms. Brown felt that, while we might develop facility rentals over a period of time, that renting tables, chairs, and catering setup would be the responsibility of the customer. This would make more fiscal sense than building yet another building on the property before there was any real need for it.

Furnishings Chair Jan Manos stated she agreed with the State Regent and John Waters, and that you have to spend money to make money. She described herself as a social historian, less concerned with authenticity than with broadening the interest in the community. Mrs. Manos felt what is lacking is agreement within the Board. Because there is no unity or direction, Mrs. Manos was not sure if the State Regent would be well advised to take on this project. She suggested we develop a mission statement.

Mrs. Lawson reminded the board members that a mission statement was developed during Laura Reid's administration, but perhaps it had not been publicized. The fact that we have board members who do not know we have a mission statement indicates a problem. Mrs. Patton suggested we put the mission statement on the Meadow Garden web site. She said it was apparent we all love Meadow Garden and want to do what is best.

Landscaping Chair Debbie Powell suggested a committee to compare pricing for event venues in Augusta, and look into insurance, security, and alcohol issues. We need to fully develop requirements and costs, and make it more attractive for rentals. Mrs. Patton said that contracts for rental were also developed during Laura Reid's administration, but they might need to be brought up to date. The State Regent expressed her belief that a long-range planning committee to lay out a five or ten year plan of projects, would be superior to each new State Regent choosing a project, and two years later the plan and focus changing. Mrs. Powell agreed that we have to do the necessary projects, like the windows, as well as the more fun projects.

The State Regent believes we have the funds to handle whatever may come up in the process of restoring the windows. There was a discussion of Paul deCamp's plans regarding the windows. Mrs. Lawson reported that every single window had a need, but there were very different levels of need. She said there is enough money to cover the windows themselves, but not for the damages that may be found in the process. Past Treasurer Betty Harrah was contacted to determine if the Fischer administration had set aside the matching funds for the grants in a separate windows restoration account. Mrs. Harrah responded in the negative, saying the funds would come either from Administration and Maintenance money market, or Capital Improvements money market.

Returning to the topic of developing a long range plan, Mrs. Lawson explained that, through our membership in the American Association of State and Local History (AASLH), we have the materials available to us for self-evaluation of a local museum, our procedures, etc. Standards and Excellence Program for History Organizations (StEPs) is a process the board goes through, and requires commitment from the board. This is the process for becoming accredited. Mrs. Patton related that she had visited the Augusta Museum of History, and had a conversation with staff there about accreditation. Mrs. Lawson enthusiastically supports pursuing accreditation, but stated three previous administrations had not been willing to go through the process. She felt the current board would be a good group to pursue accreditation, with a mix of old and new members of the board, all of whom are open and honest. Mrs. Patton said there are only eight accredited museums in Georgia, and being accredited would give Meadow Garden more exposure and draw more visitors, as well as the benefit of reciprocal programs and visiting displays. Mrs. Lawson agreed that there was no downside to accreditation, but questioned if it could be a State Regent's Project, since it was not really a financial endeavor. As a project, she

felt it was "beyond valid," and one of the most important things we could do. Changes and updates would have to be made, so there is a cost but it would give us a map for the future. Mrs. Powell brought up that there are multiple accreditation programs, including the American Alliance of Museums, of which we are also a member. She suggested John McBrayer should be consulted for advice on which would best serve us.

Mrs. Manos expressed frustration by the change of direction every two years. She had spent hours in the house today and could not believe the poor condition of the house. She has read through all the minutes and said millions of dollars have been spent on the house. However she felt we did not stay on a consistent path. In order to pursue accreditation, everyone would need to be behind it, and she had concerns about that. The house needs an unbelievable amount of money, but we don't stay on any pathway. Mrs. Manos was frustrated in her efforts to tell the story of the Waltons, Augusta and Georgia as broadly as possible, and felt everything she tried did not work. She asked that the work she had done in the downstairs of the house be left in place until the Soiree.

Mrs. Lawson responded that the beneficial part of accreditation was the process. It pushes the board to fix things, and in the end you have a long range plan. The State Regent asked Mrs. Manos if she had previous experience in going through the process of accreditation at any of the museums with which she has been involved. Mrs. Manos said she had only worked at accredited museums and did not know about the process. Mrs. Lawson suggested that some of Mrs. Manos' frustration with the board may be because she is accustomed to working in environments where the whole board is working towards common goals in an already established mission, while we at Meadow Garden appear to be floundering through changes made every two years. Mrs. Croft added there was no negative in a process that would make us evaluate ourselves and our procedures and make things better.

Mrs. Lawson questioned again if accreditation could be a Regent's project. She felt the smokehouse dependency was not a good option at this time, as we have no long range plan or marketing information. As another option, Ms. Brown asked about moving the office to the Heritage Education Center, and what would be needed to accomplish the move. Mrs. Lawson said a new phone line would be needed, a new computer was needed anyway, and that Mr. McBrayer's rolling containers would need to be painted. In addition, mortar needs to be added around the bricks, and the air conditioning needs to be fixed or replaced (unregulated temperatures cause deterioration in the house and to the books and archives in the Heritage Education Center). The whole porch needs repainting, fascia boards need to be replaced, there is dry rot left of the chimney outside, and the lighting and the kitchen could be upgraded. Mrs. Lawson said the original plans for the Heritage Education Center included a gift shop, a visitor's center, and shelving upstairs. She felt we would be completing work that had been abandoned due to lack of funds. She and Mr. McBrayer (who is willing to make the move) had walked the property, and felt the office, tour groups, and the gift shop would fit downstairs, and the upstairs could be kept for records and meetings. There was general consensus that a "destination" gift shop would be advantageous. Mr. McBrayer's office area would be the front corner with two windows, from which one can see the historic house and both gates. Security is a big issue to the Docents, which would be solved by this move. Many are afraid when alone in the house, and will feel safer in the Heritage Education Building. In addition, there is easy access to the restroom. Mrs. Lawson believes there are many positives for a little outlay of money.

Mrs. Lawson stated the Standing Rules would need to be changed for this move. Mrs. Powell suggested we could try it on a temporary basis, since the windows restoration will require the house to be closed, and necessitate the move. Mr. McBrayer will need some place to work. Mrs. Lawson and Mrs. Croft favor a permanent move, which is supported by a change in the Standing Rules. Ms. Brown added that the Red Room would have to be redefined in Standing Rules, as well. Mrs. Patton said changes in Standing Rules have

to go before the State Conference, with 60 days advance notice. Ms. Brown and Mrs. Manos also were in favor of moving the office and gift shop.

The State Regent said she wanted to pursue accreditation, and moving the office and gift shop. She asked for a motion. Mrs. Lawson stated there was too much to include to prepare a motion "on the fly," and felt it would be best to take few days to prepare a motion including costs, and then submit to the full Meadow Garden Board for approval. Mrs. Patton explained the Resolution for State Board of Management did not need to include a lot of detail. Ms. Brown said the board's internal motion could be as detailed as desired, without requiring the same detail in the Resolution. Mrs. Lawson agreed to prepare a motion within the next few days.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:55 p.m.

October 28, 2016

The Meadow Garden Board met on Friday, October 28, 2016, in the Executive Board Room of the Atlanta Airport Marriott Gateway Hotel, College Park, Georgia. Joyce Ball Patton, State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 2:10 p.m. Other voting members attending were: Melodye G. Brown, Patricia Frederick Croft, Patricia Brand Colbert, Deborah Taylor Powell, Shelby Alderman Whitson, Harriette Foster Hankinson (appointed following the resignation of Virginia Grace Lingelbach), Trudy Foraker Alexander, Marjorie Nolan Wilson, Charlotte Josephine Christian, and Anita Smith Mashburn. Also present were Ex Officio member OB Wilhoit McCorkle, and nonvoting members Robin Redfearn Towns and Shannon Cowles Logue. State Parliamentarian Kate Sievert Cook was also in attendance.

The State Regent offered the Invocation and welcomed everyone to the meeting. She then read the report of Director John G. McBrayer. Mr. McBrayer reported the Augusta Canal was refilled as of yesterday. The Canal Tours are a good source of visitors for Meadow Garden, and a drop off in visitors has been noticed over the summer while the canal was lowered. A tri-fold brochure is being produced using a Convention and Visitors Bureau grant which must be completed by the end of the year. The Mulberry Soiree was successful. Approximately 75 people were fed, including volunteers and musicians. It is estimated we took in between \$1,900 and \$2,000, which will show up in the October financials. Two docents volunteered for Colonial Days at the Living History Park in North Augusta on Oct. 15-16. A new computer system is being implemented for the Gift Shop and for admission fees. We anticipate the Gift Shop and admission sales will be relocated to the Heritage Education Center shortly. Mr. McBrayer reported working with Paul DeCamp of Augusta Planning and Development regarding the grant for windows restoration. They are now ready to advertise for bids on the project.

The State Regent said the Soiree was a beautiful event with great weather, and everyone enjoyed our speaker Neil Horstman. Mrs. Patton reported new Meadow Garden Chair Nancy McElderry Parks was absent today because her husband is in the hospital. The State Regent expressed appreciation for Mrs. Parks accepting the position as Chair, following the resignation of Amy Pittman Lawson. Mrs. Parks submitted a written report of her activities since accepting the Chair, as follows. She met with Furnishing Chair Jan Manos, who provided information she had written about Meadow Garden. Together, they met with Ruth Cox for evaluation of the George Washington portrait. Mrs. Parks met with John McBrayer to discuss general information about Meadow Garden. Debbie Powell indicated that an iPad was being purchased for the Gift Shop and hopefully it will provide all the office capabilities needed for the Director's work. Mrs. Parks met with former Chair Amy Lawson and received the keys in her possession. She hopes to have further conversations with her on various plans in progress. Mrs. Parks attended the Soiree on October 1. While there, State Librarian Lynn Brackey took the Proceedings from 1980 through 2000 to begin the digitization project. She signed a statement that she had taken them and indicated that they would be returned as soon as they are scanned. Mrs. Parks also spoke by phone with former Furnishings Chair Lisa Pittman, who reported there was no working computer for use of the Furnishings Chair; the one in the Heritage Education Center being broken. Ms. Pittman stated that in order to perform the tasks as Furnishings Chair, it had been necessary to install the Past Perfect software on her personal laptop computer. Following the expiration of her term, she stated the software was removed from her computer and all information about the furnishings and the Past Perfect software disks were placed in a file cabinet upstairs in the Heritage Education Center. The keys to that file cabinet are not currently available to the Meadow Garden Chair. It appears we need some additional continuity in knowledge of the Past Perfect software and how it works. If funds allow, Mrs. Parks asked that some consideration be given for the purchase of a laptop computer so that the Past Perfect software and information about the furnishings can be permanently installed. A back-up service such as Carbonite might be considered for purchase to guarantee that digital files are saved off-site. In addition, if we are going to digitize the Proceedings, consideration must be given to the need for permanent storage of those files using an off-site back-up service. Mrs. Parks met with Docent Patsy Ray, on Saturday, October 22, and spent most of the day with her talking about Meadow Garden. Mrs. Ray provided the new Chair with information about procedures, keys, written and "unwritten rules" etc. Also, she has a great deal of knowledge of George Walton, Mrs. Parks accompanied her during a tour of Meadow Garden.

The State Regent reported Furnishings Chair Janice Johnson Manos is still recovering from back surgery. Mrs. Manos' plan was put in place at the historic house prior to the Soiree and most things were enjoyed by those who saw them. There will be more changes prior to the window restoration. The Gift Shop will be moved to the Heritage Education Center for at least the time it takes to restore all the windows. It is hoped this change will be beneficial to the shop, increasing sales. The ability to show the film to guests prior to viewing the house will create more interest. The Director will be able to see both gates and the property better. The docents will feel more secure as they will only go to the historic house for tours.

While at the DAR Museum in Washington, Mrs. Patton viewed period clothing displayed on mannequins in the period rooms, which drew great attention from visitors. She purchased several patterns and books for the use of our members. Hopefully, we will have enough Docents to serve on December 11 at the Governor's Mansion, when all tours will be led by DAR members. The Mansion asked for a few Walton family items to display and the white tea set was chosen to loan.

The State Regent's Projects have been determined and Mrs. Patton expressed her hope all would embrace the projects and be generous in giving. She asked the Board Secretary to read the motion approved by the Executive Committee which will be brought to the floor for a vote at State Board of Management. Ms. Brown read the following motion: "The Executive Committee recommends that the State Board of Management approve and adopt as State Projects the following projects selected by State Regent Joyce Ball Patton: 1. At Meadow Garden: a. To complete any repairs and painting necessary after the window restoration; b. To fund the process of accreditation by the American Alliance of Museums, to be completed prior to June of 2018; c. To provide an appropriate HVAC system for the lower level which will allow the lower level front door to be used as an entrance; d. To fund a display of clothing of the time period 1790-1820, partially on mannequins; e. To provide equipment needed to store records on a server and allow staff to respond to emails and maintain the website. 2. To digitize our historic collection of the *Proceedings* of the Georgia State Society, and make them available to all members on the Georgia State Society Members Web Site. 3. To clean and restore three

stained glass windows in Berry' College's Frost Chapel, given by the Georgia State Society in memory of Berry students who died in World War II." Mrs. Towns asked about the mannequins to be used. Mrs. Alexander said museum quality would be desired, but it would depend on funding.

Mrs. Croft said she would be doing Docent training today, specifically focused on the Governor's Mansion Tours on Dec. 11. They will be using Power Point training focused on why Meadow Garden is important, rather than preparing docents to lead detailed tours at Meadow Garden.

Acting State Treasurer and Landscape Chair Debbie Powell reported Jack Blue and Derek Vanover had done over-seeding, which is included in our contract, and the grass looks fabulous. Mrs. Powell presented the balance sheet summary as of October 31, 2016, as follows: \$373,119.57 invested in Certificates of Deposit, \$49,493.04 in the checking account, \$73,094.05 in the Money Market Account, \$100.00 in Petty Cash, \$100.00 in the Go Green Petty Cash, \$257.003.00 in Fixed Assets, \$752,909.66 Total Assets, \$752,909.66 in Total Liabilities & Equity. The books have been audited by the CPA firm of Smith & Howard, and all is in order. The complete report is in the current *Proceedings*. The tax return is being prepared by Robin R. McGuire, CPA, to be filed by November 15. The Acting Treasurer reported that several Certificates of Deposit have matured and been reinvested at 1.25% for two years, a rate double the previous rate.

Docents Chair Trudy Alexander requested input on the interpretation of the period clothing being developed for display. What level of affluence, position and fashion should be represented? Museum quality clothing is time consuming and expensive to produce, so it needs to be agreed upon. Mrs. Patton stated that George Walton served as a judge, Senator, and Governor, but that Dorothy was the one whose family had social status. Mrs. Croft said the Walton's frequently lived beyond their means and went into debt, and that appearance was very important to them. Dorothy would have been a mature lady of means, and dressed as such, but not in the height of fashion while in the country.

Mrs. Patton and Mrs. Towns described the changes made by Furnishings Chair Jan Manos prior to the Soiree, and how complimentary the attendees were of the appearance of the house. Mrs. Patton shared plans to move the Busts of the Signers to the Red Room and to interpret the room as a library, following the move of the Gift Shop to the Heritage Education Center.

Gift Shop Chair Marjorie Wilson discussed efforts to build the shop inventory and revenue, and develop relationships with vendors at the Mart. The Meadow Garden Gift Shop is continuing to build on the success of the previous chairs. Historical adult and children books including coloring and paper doll books have been ordered. The popular jewelry line has been continued, and this year, many cultured pearl pieces, fancy linen towels, popular hats and fascinators have been added, as well as candles, lamps, and small accessory items including sterling silver gift items. Mrs. Wilson expressed thanks to all the Daughters for their support of the Traveling Gift Shop at State Events. She has already sold half the inventory brought for State Board of Management. Mrs. Patton had some questions related to the Gift Shop accounts. In response, Mrs. Powell brought up the transition from CashierLive to Square. She said it is a much simpler system and easier to use. After much research, she purchased an iPad (only two kinds of iPads are usable with Square), a Square stand with three USB ports, and two ticket scanners (for the onsite and off-site Gift Shops) from Walmart.com for around \$900. The CashierLive fees run over \$800 per year, so the equipment for Square should pay for itself in a year. Mrs. Patton said she had approved the purchase since it was under \$1,000. Mrs. Powell said Square allows use of the cashier drawer and receipt printer we already had. We can print barcode sheets with a program, create a complete inventory, and scan the barcodes at time of purchase. Square tracks the item, applies tax when applicable and prints a receipt, so it will be much easier for Docents. CashierLive is an expense each month, and runs a

full month behind, so we are anxious to get Square fully functioning so we can shut down CashierLive.

Parliamentarian Kate Cook asked about moving Gift Shop inventory into Assets on the balance sheet. The Profit and Loss reflects a deficit because of outstanding inventory. The perception is that the Gift Shop is losing money when that is not the case.

Publicity Chair Anita Mashburn reported she was working with Stephanie Chasez on a new brochure, and attempting to match the colors and design of our website. Mrs. Patton said it must be completed within 30 days in order to make use of the grant funds.

Secretary Melodye Brown stated that minutes of the previous four Board meetings had been distributed by email to the members of the Board for review, and no additions or corrections were received. She moved the minutes for Board meetings on June 25, July 16, August 5, and September 19 of 2016 be approved. Adopted.

Mrs. Croft expressed the need for a new computer for the Director. Mrs. Patton stated this was included in her State Regent's Projects, and one would be purchased when her projects had been approved by the State Board of Management. There was a question about the need for an additional phone line in the Heritage Education Center. Mrs. Powell stated we have one hub line off which all the portable phones are run, at a very low cost, and the wifi signal is strong enough that she thinks we may not need an additional line.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:10 p.m. Approved: March 8, 2017

November 27, 2016

The Meadow Garden Board met for a called meeting on Sunday, November 27, 2016, via conference call. Joyce Ball Patton, State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 8:00 p.m. Other voting members attending were: Melodye G. Brown, Harriette Foster Hankinson, Shelby Alderman Whitson, Nancy McElderry Parks, Patricia Brand Colbert, Janice Johnson Manos, Marjorie Nolan Wilson, Deborah Taylor Powell, Trudy Foraker Alexander, Charlotte Josephine Christian and Anita Smith Mashburn.

The purpose stated in the call was to discuss the resignation of Director/Curator John McBrayer, candidates for replacement, and salary options.

The State Regent reported John McBrayer, the Director/Curator of Meadow Garden is resigning to complete his thesis and will be leaving in December. Mrs. Patton stated she had tried to entice Mr. McBrayer to stay, and asked if more money would change his mind, but he said it was not about the money. Mr. McBrayer offered to continue working with Meadow Garden on as needed basis. The State Regent posted the job on "Linkedin" and asked Professor John Waters and Eric Montgomery for recommendations. Nine resumes have been received. One applicant, Maranda Christy, seems to have the right credentials. She is 26 years old and lives in Graniteville, South Carolina, with her parents. Miss Christy's resume was shared and discussed. She has a MA degree in Cultural Studies from University College London, UK; a BA in English and BA in Political Science from College of Charleston, SC. Miss Christy was invited to come to Meadow Garden while Nancy Parks, Virginia Lingelbach and the State Regent were working on the move to the Heritage Education Center. All were favorably impressed. Miss Christy has experience with Past Perfect software, digitization, running a cash register and giving tours. Mrs. Patton has spoken to only one reference, another volunteer at a museum. Mrs. Patton felt the other applicants did not have the appropriate background or they did not live in the Augusta area.

After almost two years at Meadow Garden, Mr. McBrayer makes \$1600 per month for a 30 hour work week, with the exception of one week a month when he has Saturday off. He has one week vacation, and last Christmas received a \$250 bonus. Mrs. Patton suggested not giving the new employee the Saturday off (which was granted to Mr. McBrayer on request after one year of employment), and raising the salary to \$15.00 per hour. She stated Mrs. Parks is reviewing the employment contract for any changes needed before hiring a replacement. The State Regent said the final meeting on the window restoration project will be December 20. Mrs. Parks and Mrs. Powell will attend with the State Regent, and she stressed the need to have a replacement for Mr. McBrayer in place before the beginning of the project. It would be beneficial if he could introduce the new employee to his contacts among the Historic Augusta community. Mrs. Manos, Mrs. Powell, and Mrs. Mashburn expressed their approval of Miss Christy and her credentials.

There was a question as to whether the salary we offer would be attractive to Miss Christy. The State Regent stated she had told the application we paid in the low \$20,000's. Ms. Brown pointed out that we do not even pay \$20,000. Mrs. Patton said if we raised the hourly pay to \$15.00, we would be paying over \$20,000. She expressed her hope that Miss Christy could increase gift shop sales, as the shop has not done well during Mr. McBrayer's administration. A bonus based on sales targets was suggested. Mrs. Patton questioned Mrs. Hankinson about options, since the Meadow Garden Budget has already been passed, and \$15.00 an hour is more than what was budgeted. Mrs. Hankinson stated there is an option to transfer funds from Gift Shop Sales to Maintenance at the end of the year.

The State Regent recalled that during employee transitions in the past, we had two employees on payroll while one trained the other. Mrs. Powell can train the new employee on the use of Square for credit card transactions as Mr. McBrayer has not used it. Mrs. Patton stated that we needed a Standard Operating Procedures Manual for Meadow Garden, and that creating one should be a task for the new employee. She also said it must be made clear that general housekeeping was part of the job. The State Regent asked Mrs. Parks how she thought the new layout was working. Mrs. Parks said the shop looked great in the Heritage Education Center, but she thought some additional signage was needed to rework the flow of visitors to the right places. Mrs. Patton described the new layout and credited Lynn Tate for her assistance in the design. Mrs. Powell added that the folding tables were in the restroom closet, and that the folding chairs could be stored on the stairway landing.

Ms. Brown asked Mrs. Patton to obtain additional references for Miss Christy, preferably from someone who had managed her, who could verify the credentials on her resume. Mrs. Patton agreed to do so, but wanted approval to offer Miss Christy the position if nothing negative was discovered through the references. Mrs. Alexander suggested she be offered a position with a review in three or six months. Mrs. Colbert agreed that a trial period would be prudent, given this would be Miss Christy's first real job, in which she would be managing herself. There was discussion of starting her at Mr. McBrayer's current salary of \$1600 per month. He was raised to that level following one year's employment.

Mrs. Powell expressed her opinion that the overlap of the two employees should be limited to as short a period as possible, to minimize the possibility of any negative feelings being transferred. Mrs. Manos and Ms. Brown agreed. Mr. McBrayer had said he would leave in December or when we had a replacement. There was some consensus for an end date of December 1, but Mrs. Parks stated she did not want Mr. McBrayer to feel "pushed out." Mrs. Colbert agreed that Mr. McBrayer should be treated with respect, both because we all think well of him, and because of his many connections in the Historic Augusta community. All agreed, and Mrs. Patton said she would discuss the transition, training and end date with Mr. McBrayer, and come to a mutually agreeable plan. Ms. Brown asked if Mr. McBrayer was needed at the December 20 window restoration meeting, and Mrs. Patton said he was not, and then reviewed next steps in the windows project. Mrs. Powell left the call at this point. Mrs. Patton recalled that when Virginia Lingelbach and Bea Fischer had hired new employees at Meadow Garden, they had not consulted the board. She said that she would like agreement to move forward if the references were good. Mrs. Alexander asked to whom Miss Christy would report. Mrs. Patton stated the employment contract has the State Regent as her direct management, but that for day to day issues, she would be supervised by the Meadow Garden Chair, Mrs. Parks, who is at Meadow Garden frequently.

Ms. Brown requested a return to the question of salary. She stated a beginning salary of \$15.00 per hour is \$3,500 a year more than we pay Mr. McBrayer. She felt that even if we were delighted with the performance of Miss Christy, there would be no room for a raise from that level. Ms. Brown said we needed to concern ourselves more with our own budget, than with the employee's needs. She supported an increase to \$13.00 per hour, which would put the annual salary just over \$20,000. Mrs. Colbert again suggested a trial period, since Miss Christy has no real work experience. A three month review was supported by Mrs. Colbert, Mrs. Manos, Mrs. Alexander and Ms. Brown. Mrs. Manos suggested the employment contract be amended to allow for a 90 day probationary period.

The State Regent agreed to contact additional references, and if positive, wished to offer Miss Christy a position with a three month probation, and initial salary of \$13.00 per hour. Mrs. Colbert suggested started her at Mr. McBrayer's salary of just over \$12.00 per hour, and allow for a raise at the end of three months, but not a \$3.00 an hour raise. Ms. Brown asked for a four month probation, so that the end of the probation period would coincide with the next regular Meadow Garden Board meeting at State Conference, but the State Regent thought this was unnecessary. Mrs. Parks expressed her opinion that \$12.00 per hour was too low. Mrs. Colbert countered that the candidate had never had a real job, and Mrs. Alexander added that she was only looking for a part time job at 30 hours a week, and could not expect pay commensurate with a full time job. Ms. Christian pointed out there were far more candidates for this type of position than there were positions. Ms. Brown asked if Jennifer Franks had been paid more than Mr. McBrayer. The State Regent said she thought so, but that Mrs. Franks had insisted on the title of Curator as part of her employment agreement; that titles do matter.

The State Regent stated she would check references and report back, if we were all agreed, to start Miss Christy at \$1600 per month, for 30 hours per week, on a three month probation, with Mrs. Parks to evaluate the employee's performance. There was general agreement to this plan.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:00 p.m. Approved: March 8, 2017

March 8, 2017

The Meadow Garden Board met on Wednesday, March 8, 2017, in the Juniper Room of the Evergreen Marriott Conference Resort Hotel, Stone Mountain, Georgia. In the absence of the State Regent, State Treasurer Deborah Taylor Powell called the meeting to order at 10:10 a.m. Other voting members attending were: Patricia Frederick Croft, Shelby Alderman Whitson, Trudy Foraker Alexander, Marjorie Nolan Wilson, Charlotte Josephine Christian, and Anita Smith Mashburn. Also present were non-voting members Robin Redfearn Towns, Elaine Ingram Dorr and Shannon Cowles Logue. The chair was subsequently relinquished to OB Wilhoit McCorkle, State Second Vice Regent and Ex Officio member, and then to Melodye G. Brown, First Vice Regent, upon their respective arrivals.

State Treasurer Debbie Powell reviewed the Meadow Garden Balance Sheet. As of February 28, 2017, Meadow Garden Account Summaries are as follows: \$373,127.87 in

Certificates of Deposit, \$99,300.39 in the Checking Account, \$73,140.87 in the Money Market Account, \$100 in Petty Cash, \$100 in Go Green Petty Cash, \$257,003.00 Total Fixed Assets, and \$802,772.13 Total Liabilities & Equity.

Mrs. Powell reported that Square was working out well, and that the new Director Maranda Christy was learning and becoming experienced with the system. She said that Miss Christy was not adequately prepared for the duties of her position, and continued training had been needed from Mrs. Powell, Nancy Parks, Patsy Ray and others. Mrs. Powell stated that while Miss Christy showed potential, her probation period had been extended. Mrs. Alexander questioned if the article written by Miss Christy for *Archaeology in Community* had been pre-approved, as she believed there were some inaccuracies in the article.

Mrs. Powell also reported as Landscaping Chair, stating the issue with the sprinklers had been resolved.

Docents Chair, Trudy Alexander reported she had contracted in January for Atlanta seamstress Catherine Thomas to prepare a dress and undergarments, which may be displayed on a mannequin or worn by the Director on occasion. Ms. Thomas is experienced in producing period clothing. The price is very reasonable, considering the time and handwork required. Her basic price is \$300, but additional expenses may be necessary. In February, the cotton day-dress fabric was purchased for \$75.60. On March 5, Ms. Thomas travelled to Meadow Garden to do a fitting, and she intends to have the day dress completed by March 9. In addition, she is lending us a silk dress for Miss Christy to wear for events she will be attending at State Conference. Mrs. Alexander stated that, while the docents enjoyed hostessing at the Governor's Mansion in December, it was not an environment in which Meadow Garden could be promoted. Too many people are pushed through the Mansion for there to be any time to promote Meadow Garden. Mrs. Dorr suggested, rather than the October "Soiree," that a December event at Meadow Garden using local school choirs caroling, resulting in attendance by family members of students, would be more beneficial. Mrs. Alexander pointed out a staging area would be needed if multiple school groups were involved.

Public Relations Chair, Anita Mashburn reported a new tri-fold, full-color informational brochure about Meadow Garden has been printed and is available for distribution. There were 7,500 copies of the new brochure printed on Dec. 13, 2016 at a cost of \$466.34. This total cost includes a shipping and processing cost of \$76.84. Mrs. Mashburn worked with Fielding Lewis Chapter member and graphic artist Stephanie Chasez to produce the new brochure. Copies will be available free of charge during State Conference at the Meadow Garden sales table. The remaining supply will be transferred to Meadow Garden Chair Nancy Parks.

State First Vice Regent Melodye Brown assumed the chair and read the report of the State Regent. Mrs. Patton's report stated the window restoration is in the final phase of signatures from the City of Augusta and Greg Jacobs with Landmark Restorations of Savannah will be starting work no later than April 3, 2017. She also reported two bids were secured for the HVAC System in the basement area of Meadow Garden: Williford Heating and Air for \$5,875.00, and Rand Refrigeration for \$9,580.13. Rand has every detail in their quote and would basically do the same systems. Williford has less detail but say the quote will cover everything other than closing the holes in the wall on the basement level when the air handler pipe is removed from under the porch. The system Williford would like to install, with the aid of duct fans, would heat and cool the right side of the main level. This would be controlled by thermostat and the dehumidifier would be set to come on independently from the HVAC to control the humidity. Ms. Brown delayed any discussion or action on the proposals until the State Regent could join the meeting.

Ms. Brown continued with the State Regent's report. Charles Pharr, with Aardvark Antiques and Appraisals, appraised the furniture on the main level, resulting in some

pleasant surprises. The English antiques had declined in value while the American antiques had increased. Mrs. Patton stated she hoped to have the remainder of the furniture and the small items appraised later in the year. Mrs. Patton's report continued saying the new Director, Maranda Christy, is learning more about Meadow Garden and how to do her job. The State Regent stated, since this is Miss Christy's first job after graduation, it is taking a while for her to understand the process and what her job entails. Mrs. Patton extended appreciation to Jan Manos for re-arranging furniture to create the Library/Walton's Office. A period appropriate desk was obtained with a monetary gift from the George Walton Masonic Lodge. Notes of thanks have been sent to the Lodge with an invitation to visit Meadow Garden. Mrs. Patton's report concluded with a request for suggestions for upcoming events we may want to have in Augusta this year.

Meadow Garden Chair, Nancy Parks was unable to attend but submitted a report, which was read by Ms. Brown. Mrs. Parks reported Maranda Christy was hired December 1 as Director/Curator to replace John McBrayer, who left at the end of December. Maranda was initially trained by Mr. McBrayer. She has worked recently with several of our docents to gain additional knowledge of Meadow Garden and George Walton. The training will continue. The move of the gift shop to the Heritage Education Center has been completed. Period furnishings were placed in the former gift shop, now Library, including a desk and a gout stool. The Walton family china exhibited at the Governor's Mansion has been cleaned and returned to Meadow Garden, placed in a glass door cabinet in the Library for exhibit and safety. An inventory system, Square, was installed with the assistance of State Treasurer Debbie Powell and her husband, Steve. Square creates a report of each transaction, and the report is sent to the Treasurer.

Along with State Regent Joyce Patton, and Debbie Powell, Mrs. Parks attended meetings with the Augusta Planning and Development Staff to review proposals and approve the contractor to restore the windows at Meadow Garden. The company selected, Landmark Preservation, LLC, specializes in historic preservation. The managing partner, Greg Jacobs, has completed projects at many locations including Thomas Jefferson's Monticello in Charlottesville, VA and the Juliette Gordon Low House in Savannah, GA. The project is expected to take approximately six to eight weeks, weather permitting. On President's Day, Mrs. Parks, the State Regent, and Patricia Croft, appeared on the WGAC Radio show "There It Is" with host Deke Copenhaver. The discussions highlighted the history of Meadow Garden, how it was saved by the DAR, and the life, sacrifices and contributions made by George Walton in the struggle for freedom and independence. On February 28, Former Chair, Ginger Nicholson, came to Meadow Garden to discuss new permanent signage for the property. Additional input will be needed. Recommendations and ideas are encouraged and would be appreciated before a proposal is brought to the Board. This concluded Mrs. Parks' report.

Augusta Chapter Regent, Patricia Croft also reported on joining former Augusta Mayor Deke Copenhaver on his radio program to discuss the history of George Walton, Meadow Garden and the Augusta Chapter's unique relationship with it. She reported they were also able to talk about Augusta Chapter's 125th Anniversary. Augusta Chapter members continue to serve as docents at Meadow Garden. The most recent group tour included students from Augusta Christian Schools. This was a younger audience than usual and the docents did an excellent job of keeping their interest and meeting the curriculum needs.

Ms. Brown read the report submitted by Furnishings Chair, Jan Manos. Mrs. Manos reported that, under the direction of the State Regent, a plan has been implemented to enlarge the scope of the story told at Meadow Garden. The purpose is to broaden the appeal of the museum and to encourage return visits to help make our museum more self-sustaining. The first step in interpreting the entire house as a family home was to move the Director's office and Gift Shop to the Heritage Education Center. It is now our new

visitor center. Once that was done the front room was transformed into the Augusta Parlor using chairs and tables already in the room. A small antique sofa was purchased along with an Aubusson carpet and other small items to represent the women who lived at Meadow Garden. The rear Red Room is now a library. Again furniture already at Meadow Garden was relocated. An antique desk and a large Persian carpet were purchased to create a warm room setting. Mrs. Manos' report concluded by saying, today the Meadow Garden story covers the years 1791 to 1821 and includes not only George Walton and his wife and two sons, but also the family of George Walton, Jr., who lived in the house until 1821.

Meadow Garden Gift Shop Chair, Marjorie Wilson reported the entire hat inventory was sold at State Board of Management. Buying was kept to a minimum during a trip to the Atlanta Mart at the end of October, since they were trying to clear out inventory for the year. The traveling Gift Shop was open for sales at three December chapter events in honor of the State Regent. Pre-wrapped items were very popular, as were the new Pimento Cheese Biscuits. Another trip to the Mart was made in January to purchase hats for State Conference, as well as silver items and jewelry boxes. Items in inventory are being added to the Square purchasing program, and 8% tax is being charged on every item.

Gift Shop Vice Chair, Elaine Dorr reviewed items in inventory: 36 cookbooks at a cost of \$7.50 each, 63 scarves at \$17.75 each, 500 boxes of mints at \$2.00 each, and 7,000 postcards. Most of the jewelry purchased in the last administration has sold. Postcards will be given away at State Conference, and the remaining jams and jellies are gradually selling off. Mrs. Dorr reported some small purchases of a variety of new items to test their popularity, such as pewter-ware, silk jewelry bags, T-shirts, and some items purchased by Mrs. Patton, such as fragrance diffusers and lamps. Hats, pearls, tea-sets and linens continue to be good sellers. A \$1,500 purchase of towels and linens was made to take advantage of discounted close-out merchandise. All items are sold for less than they can be purchased online. Mrs. Dorr stressed that the traveling Gift Shop is where the money is made. She had researched gift shop sales at U.S. museums, and the average sale per customer is \$3.50. This means that 1,000 visitors to Meadow Garden will only result in \$3,500 in gross sales. Some display fixtures have been purchased for use with hats and jewelry, and we need to find a way to differentiate those purchases from other inventory. Ms. Brown expressed appreciation for the job that the Gift Shop committee is doing.

Patrons Chair, Charlotte Christian reported another strong year, with over 300 Patron level donors. Most individual patrons for chapters with 100+ members were: 1st – Fort Peachtree, 2nd (tie) – Fielding Lewis and Philadelphia Winn. Most individual patrons for chapters with fewer than 100 members were: 1st – LaGrange, 2nd – William McIntosh, 3rd (tie) – College Hill, Elijah Clarke, and Thronateeska.

Secretary Melodye Brown reported the minutes of the Oct. 28, 2016 Board meeting and the Nov. 27, 2016 Board meeting by conference call had been distributed by email to the members of the board for review. Ms. Christian moved **the minutes of the Board meetings on Oct. 28 and Nov. 27, 2016 be approved. Adopted.**

The State Regent joined the meeting at this point. Ms. Brown relinquished the chair, explaining the determination regarding an HVAC provider had been delayed until Mrs. Patton's arrival.

Mrs. Patton reviewed the two bids detailed in her report above, and answered questions. Rand Refrigeration is in Braselton, and Williford is in Augusta. During the prior administration, we had switched to Williford for our maintenance, and have been happy with them. They suggested a two ton unit would be more efficient than the larger one we have now. The cost of a dehumidifier and UV light to kill mold is included. Ms. Brown, with second by Mrs. Wilson, moved that we accept the bid from Williford Heating and Air

for \$5,875.00 for HVAC system in the basement area of the Historic House, funds to be taken from the State Regent's Project Fund. Adopted.

Mrs. Patton stated work on the windows is scheduled to start April 3. Greg Jacobs of Landmark Preservation, LLC will assess the Historic House as part of his work, so that we can make plans for any needed repairs.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:30 a.m. Approved: July 25, 2017

May 8, 2017

The Meadow Garden Board met on Monday, May 8, 2017, at the Historic House at Meadow Garden in Augusta, Georgia. Joyce Ball Patton, State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 11:00.a.m. Other voting members attending were: Melodye G. Brown, Nancy McElderry Parks, Patricia Frederick Croft, Patricia Brand Colbert, Debbie Taylor Powell, and Virginia Ranson Nicholson. Also present were Ex Officio member OB Wilhoit McCorkle, and non-voting member Robin Redfearn Towns.

The State Regent welcomed everyone to the meeting. She introduced Greg Jacobs of Landmark Preservation LLC of Savannah (the firm restoring the windows at Meadow Garden) and his associate, Frederick H. Ecker II of Tidewater Preservation Inc., one of the nation's experts on Federal Period buildings, and the father of John Ecker, Greg's partner at Landmark Preservation LLC.

At the State Regent's request, over the period of a day and a half, Mr. Jacobs and Mr. Ecker had conducted a preliminary assessment of the historic house, with many interesting findings. The current symmetrical appearance of the exterior is not how the house would have looked when the Waltons lived here. It was a very simple home at that time. The left side of the house is the earlier portion, which they date to the 1790's. The right side of the house is dated approximately 20-30 years later, in the same general period with the same millwork. It was not an existing structure which was moved to adjoin the original house, but an addition built to the original house. The central fireplace in the older side would have been just a white-washed chimney. In the front portion of the house, there are two different rooflines, in the rear are three because of the addition of the rear porch. The different pitches of the roof are still visible in the attic, with original shingles attached. Some original siding was left in the attic, with some remaining siding used as paneling upstairs. The current stairwell originally had access to the basement kitchen, which has been closed up. The original side of the house had a very steep staircase, which was removed, running up the chimney side to the second floor. The upstairs was never finished; the trim and doors upstairs were added much later. The downstairs would have been simple and not extravagant.

One area of immediate concern was discovered. The chimney stack between the Augusta Room and the "library/office"/Red Room is collapsing in the attic area, and there is a related leak from the roof which is causing damage in the former office upstairs. There is a large hole in the chimney and brick is disintegrating. The stack has been rebuilt at some point in the wrong way using modern mortar with the old softer brick. The work is straightforward, but the location is not, as the attic is very tight. It is somewhat structurally dangerous, and they hope to be able to repair it from the inside. Landmark Preservation LLC's estimate for this repair was distributed to the Board in the call to this meeting.

Mr. Jacobs and Mr. Ecker impressed upon the Board that we are stewards of an amazing building, and that it is important to present it honestly and interpret it in the right way. Visitors view the house and go away with the impression that what they have seen is how things were in Walton's time. As stewards of the building, it is our responsibility to represent things as truthfully and accurately as possible. It is normal to want to make a building look better than it actually was, and some of that has happened here. With some

reversals of the additions to the building, it would be easier to present and understand. The house has multiple layers that reflect multiple periods. The efforts to improve on the house and make it look more harmonious have caused lots of changes. While it might look awkward, two roof lines would more accurately tell the story of the house, and would be a clear way to represent the various periods. Each museum must choose the period which they want to interpret. While the DAR period is important, it would not be his preference for interpretation. The house has an interesting chronology, primarily because of the association with George Walton.

Most museums have to operate on a reactive basis. But any treatment of the building should be done in a manner with a goal in mind. What that goal is should be agreed upon for now and the foreseeable future. Mr. Jacobs shared the benefits of a Master Plan to include a capital budget so that major expenditures can be planned for, and more importantly that money is not spent doing something that might need to be undone later because of changing interpretation. Determining the period of interpretation before any decisions are made is the most efficient way to operate. It helps to make the decision making process simpler if you have that plan in place. Our regularly changing leadership would be assisted by a guiding plan in place. The capital budget must be a living document which is updated on a regular basis. You can plan out 25 years for major expenditures, but every year the budget has to be adjusted. The framework of the Master Plan is built on a detailed assessment and agreement among the group as to what the goal is for restoring/conserving the building. The chosen period of interpretation affects everything from paint color to rooflines. Even with the best plan, sometimes there can be discoveries that are game changing as to the interpretation. Having a Master Plan and capital budget in place can also make grant applications be more successful, because you have a real plan with details and budgets.

Mrs. Patton announced that she has appointed Carole Moore as Chair of Grant Writing. Mr. Jacobs and Mr. Ecker led the group on a tour through the house, discussing their findings and addressing questions. Following the tour, the Board addressed business at hand.

Ms. Brown made a motion to approve the bid from Landmark Preservation LLC to repair the chimney stack in the attic between the Augusta Room and the Red Room, and the resulting leak in the former office upstairs. Cost estimated at \$5,500.00 to be taken from the Money Market – Administrative & Maintenance Fund. Mrs. Nicholson seconded the motion. Adopted.

Ms. Brown moved that the Meadow Garden portion of the NSDAR Grant for restoring the historic windows be allocated from the Money Market – Capital Improvements Fund with the total amount not to exceed \$10,000.00. Mrs. Powell seconded the motion. Adopted.

June 1, 2017

The Meadow Garden Board met for a called meeting on Thursday, June 1, 2017, via conference call. Joyce Ball Patton, State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m. Other voting members attending were: Melodye G. Brown, Harriette Foster Hankinson, Nancy McElderry Parks, Patricia Frederick Croft, Marjorie Nolan Wilson, Deborah Taylor Powell, Charlotte Josephine Christian and Anita Smith Mashburn. Ex-officio member OB Wilhoit McCorkle and non-voting member Shannon Cowles Logue also participated.

At the meeting of the Meadow Garden Board on May 8, 2017, the Board approved a motion to request a proposal from Landmark LLC to provide a detailed assessment of the

historic house including a long term master plan with capital budget that is prioritized. Their proposal from Landmark Preservation LLC was received on May 16, 2017, and distributed to the members of the Board in the call to this meeting. The purpose for the meeting as stated in the call was to vote on funding the development of the assessment, master plan and capital budget.

The State Regent reported on how well the historic house looked after the restoration of the windows done by Greg Jacobs and John Ecker of Landmark Preservation LLC. She shared some of the discoveries they had made during a brief assessment, consulting with Fred Ecker of Tidewater Preservation Inc. The stated cost for the Master Plan is \$13,235.00, excluding any travel expenses for Fred Ecker to come from Massachusetts for consultation.

The Treasurer reviewed the balance of funds. The State Regent expressed her view that the funds for the Master Plan should come from the State Regent's Project Fund. Ms. Brown agreed, saying the Master Plan was an important step towards Mrs. Patton's Project to pursue accreditation for Meadow Garden. Ms. Brown explained that the development of the Master Plan would be a collaborative process between Landmark Preservation LLC and the Meadow Garden Board and DAR. Work will be done over the summer, and an initial presentation will be made at Meadow Garden on July 25, 2017, at which the input of the Board will be solicited. The goal is to complete the Plan, and hopefully approve it, by late October, and to present the Plan at the State Board of Management in November. Mrs. McCorkle commented on the impressive depth of experience of the two firms, and the advantages of their expertise in historic preservation, as well as their many contacts around the country with experts in various aspects of historic preservation. Between Mr. Jacobs and the Ecker's, they have experience working on many prominent historic houses, including the White House, Mount Vernon, the Octagon House, and Tudor Place. In Georgia, their projects include Telfair Academy and the Owens-Thomas House. Ms. Brown commented on Mr. Jacobs' and Mr. Ecker's thoughtful and caring approach to Meadow Garden, their appreciation for the site and excitement about the project.

Ms. Brown moved that the proposal dated May 15, 2017, from Greg Jacobs. Managing Partner of Landmark Preservation LLC in Savannah, Georgia, for a Meadow Garden Master Plan be approved. The Master Plan will include the following elements: 1) An assessment of the building's historic and architectural characteristics to include the compilation of the chronological development of the building; 2) A detailed conditions assessment to identify any present deficiencies or elements which deviate from the period of significance for the sake of accurate interpretation; 3) A detailed description of recommendations for the house and site which will work towards the goal of accurately depicting the period of interpretation; 4) A thorough capital budget which will include all aspects of the site's long and short-term maintenance, as well as those projects which will restore the buildings and grounds to depict its period of significance more accurately; 5) Presentation of the compiled Master Plan digitally (flash drive and/or CD) and printed in a bound volume; and 6) Attendance at any required meetings for the sake of presenting the Master Plan, explaining findings and recommendations, and addressing questions and/or concerns. The above work is to be done at a stated firm-fixed fee of \$13,235.00, inclusive of all materials, labor, and equipment; with the exception of any applicable travel expenses (fuel, hotel, meals, airfare) to attend meetings with GSSDAR and/or Meadow Garden representatives, which are to be reimbursed at cost plus 10%. Travel costs are estimated at \$4,765.00, with the entire project not to exceed \$18,000, and funds to be taken from Checking (#1022) - State Regent's Project Patton. Ms. Christian seconded the motion. Adopted.

Mrs. Patton thanked the members participating, and reminded them of the next meeting on July 25 at Meadow Garden. The meeting was adjourned at 10:35 a.m. Approved: July 25, 2017 Joyce Ball Patton, Chair

Standing Rules for Meadow Garden

I MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

- The governing body of a Historic Site, in this instance the Meadow Garden Board, serves the public interest as it relates to Meadow Garden, and must consider itself accountable to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, as well as to Meadow Garden; members should not attempt to act in their individual capacities, but all actions should be taken as a Board, Committee, or otherwise in conformance with the Standing Rules, the Act of Incorporation, or applicable Resolutions.
- 2. The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the three (3) Trustees as named in the Deed from the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, conveying Meadow Garden to the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution; namely, the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the State Chair of Meadow Garden who is appointed by the State Regent; the Chapter Regents of the Augusta Chapter and the College Hill Chapter, both chapters being located in Augusta, who shall serve as Vice Chair to the State Chair of Meadow Garden; the State Treasurer; two Honorary State Regents; and six of the chairmen of Meadow Garden Committees, as appointed by the State Regent.
- 3. No Georgia Daughter shall serve in the same Meadow Garden Chairmanship more than three (3) consecutive terms.
- 4. In addition to the six appointments to the Board which are made by the State Regent, she shall appoint two (2) Honorary State Regents.
- 5. The State Second Vice Regent shall serve as *ex-officio* member of the Meadow Garden Board, being given the privilege of the floor without a vote.
- 6. The State Regent shall serve as Chair of the Meadow Garden Board, and the State First Vice Regent shall serve as Secretary of the Meadow Garden Board.
- 7. The Meadow Garden Board shall met a minimum of three (3) times each year; namely, preceding State Board of Management meeting, preceding annual State Conference and following Continental Congress, and at such other times as deemed necessary by the Chair of the Meadow Garden Board. At least one (1) meeting of the Board shall be held at Meadow Garden each year. The Board may vote by teleconference, fax or email, if necessary.
- 8. The Meadow Garden Board shall have jurisdiction over the operation, maintenance and work of Meadow Garden and shall be the authority for Meadow Garden as long as such authority is not in conflict with the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, the Act of Incorporation for the Georgia State Society, Resolutions adopted by the Georgia State Society and/or directions which from time to time may be approved by action of the Georgia State Society assembled at its annual State Conference.
- 9. The Meadow Garden Board shall supervise the placing of all insurance to cover the grounds and the Historic House and its contents, including the fine arts, with accredited companies coverage to include fire, theft and liability.
- 10. Five (5) voting members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.
- 11. Minutes shall be kept of each meeting and a copy shall be sent to each member and printed verbatim in the State Proceedings.
- 12. All expenses for maintenance, operation and purchases of furnishings and plantings shall be authorized by the State Regent, as Chair of the Board, and paid by the State Treasurer. Expenditures exceeding \$1,000.00 must have the majority approval of the Board.
- 13. These rules will be binding on the actions of the Board in their operation of Meadow Garden. They may be changed by the following procedure: Members of the Board must have written notification of proposed changes one month prior to the next

meeting of the Board; a two-thirds vote of the Board and approval of the State Conference are necessary to effect a change.

14. The State Regent shall appoint a Meadow Garden Advisory Board, which would act in an advisory capacity only and be composed of no more than fifteen (15) members representing various areas of expertise.

II OPERATIONS

- 1. Everyone entering Meadow Garden will be requested to sign the Register, including date, time of arrival and time of departure.
- No more than fifteen (15) people with each Docent are to be on tour in the house at a given time. Excess of this number may wait in the reception room or in the garden. The House Manager has the authority to enforce the Meadow Garden rules at all times.
- 3. There will be no smoking on Meadow Garden property.
- 4. No refreshments are to be served in or taken into the Historic House by visitors, including chapters or the public. Should a group, such as a visiting chapter, desire refreshments, the garden is available for use if litter is properly disposed of by the serving group.
- 5. Tour visitors will be asked to pay a fee as set by the Board.
- 6. In August 2006 Dixie Lock and Safe, Inc., installed new locks and keys were made which cannot be duplicated. The State Regent, State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Manager by the direction of one of the two above, are authorized to have new keys made for Meadow Garden.

There shall be two (2) complete sets of keys to Meadow Garden, which are eight (8) keys per set. There shall be four (4) sets of keys comprised of three (3) keys per set, which are the back door key to the historic house, the key to the George Walton Heritage Education Center, and the gate key. There shall be one (1) set of keys for "house" use, which are three (3) keys, one for the kitchen, one for the exterior bath at the historic house, and one for the interior door between the dining room and the old gift shop area. These three (3) "house" keys shall be kept in the old gift shop area for accessibility to all for use on a daily basis. There shall be one (1) gate key assigned to the landscape service company.

Keys are lettered per door of entry: Key # A is to the deadbolt of the three (3) doors of the George Walton Heritage Education Center; Key # B is to the deadbolt lock on the back door of the historic house; Key # C is to the gate; Key # D is to the Stribling Room in the George Walton Heritage Education Center; Key # E is to the kitchen; Key # F is to the deadbolt for the exterior bath at the historic house; Key # G is to the interior door between the dining room and the old gift shop; Key # H is to the office upstairs in the historic house.

Keys are numbered and assigned according to the appointed position on the Meadow Garden Board or as designated. Keys are distributed to the assigned person when they sign a "Meadow Garden Key Distribution Form." When this assigned person leaves her current position, she returns the keys and signs the same form she had signed when she accepted the keys. Keys go with the appointed position not the person.

Distribution of the keys: Key # 1 to State Regent Chair of Meadow Garden Board (complete set of 8 keys); Key # 2 to Meadow Garden Manager (complete set of 8 keys); Key # 3 to Chair of Meadow Garden (keys A, B, C); Key # 4 to Docents Chair (keys A, B, C); Key # 5 to Landscaping Chair (keys A, B, C); Key # 6 for General Docent use (keys A, B, C) – to be checked "out" and "in" when used; Key # 7 are "house" keys (keys E, F, G); Key # 8 to landscape service (key C). Key #9 to Furnishings Chair (Keys A, B, C).

III VOLUNTEERS AND DOCENTS

- 1. Docents, shall be those well screened and trained volunteers who will serve under the direct supervision of a Meadow Garden Chair and/or the House Manager.
- 2. Duties of docents shall include acting as guides, hostesses, working in gift shop, working in yard, cleaning in house, public relations. No volunteer work at or for Meadow Garden shall be done except under the direct guidance of the Meadow Garden Board and the chair of the specific committee for that particular function.
- 3. Cleaning or yard work volunteers shall be under the direction of the House Manager.

IV FURNISHINGS

- 1. Items bought or accepted for the older section of Meadow Garden must pre-date 1821.
- 2. (a) the front room on the main floor, known as the Augusta Room, will be designed as an interpretive center, highlighting people, events, and memorabilia related to George Walton and to the history of Meadow Garden; (b) the back room on the main floor, formerly known as the Board Room, will be used as a gift shop; (c) the front room on the upper floor of the newer section will be furnished as a bedroom/study of the period pre-dating 1850 or be used to display historically significant items relating to Meadow Garden, Augusta and Georgia; (d) the back room on the upper floor of the newer section will be used as an office for the Meadow Garden manager and for storage and supplies for the gift shop.
- 3. Reproductions may be used only when the physical condition of the antiques is jeopardized by exposure in areas where large numbers of visitors have easy access; or when environmental conditions including excessive light, dust, humidity or airborne impurities pose a threat to the preservation of originals.
- 4. Effective March 12, 1983 all items donated to Meadow Garden shall be accepted with the written condition that they become the property of Meadow Garden and may be used, replaced or sold at the discretion of the Meadow Garden Board only.
- 5. All items that postdate 1821, with the exception of those in the six (6) rooms of the newer section and those described in Number 3 of this section, shall be replaced as soon as possible with similar items pre-dating 1821.
- 6. Once an item is placed, it shall not be moved from one location to another without permission of the Meadow Garden Chair of Furnishings who shall report such changes to the Meadow Garden Board in a timely manner.
- 7. Any item donated or purchased must have written documentation of appraisal.
- 8. No items and/or furnishings shall be accepted "on loan."
- 9. A file will be kept of all assets with information as to price paid or market value, date of acquisition, donor or where bought, documentation and appraisal and a description of article. One file will be kept in the reception room accessible to the Docents; a duplicate file will be in the possession of the Chairman of the Board. The Meadow Garden Furnishings Chair shall maintain and keep current the "Past and Perfect" Program on all items and furnishings.
- 10. All items purchased or donated will be added to the Fine Arts insurance policy. Said policy will be reviewed and updated a minimum of once a year. Major additions to furnishings will be added immediately.
- 11. Future plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the Historic House.

V LANDSCAPING

- 1. The landscape plan adopted by the Board shall be adhered to with no deviation unless recommended by an authority on landscape design and care.
- 2. Donations of shrubbery, plants or trees shall be accepted only when item is part of the master plan.
- 3. Work on the grounds will be under the sole direction of the Meadow Garden Board and the Landscaping Chair. Supervision of actual work will be provided by the Meadow Garden Chair or the Landscaping Chair of Meadow Garden.

VI GIFT SHOP

- 1. The Chair of the committee will be responsible for all purchases, subject to the approval of the Board or the State Regent. The Vice Chair shall assist the Gift Shop Chair with sales at state functions.
- Gift Shop operations will be self-supporting. In the event funds are needed for purchases, they may be advanced from available Meadow Garden funds and must be considered a loan and shall be repaid without interest within one (1) year from date of borrowing.
- 3. Profit from the Gift Shop shall be accounted for within the State Treasurer's books, with a percentage being transferred at the discretion of the Board at the end of the fiscal year and placed in the Maintenance Account. The audit of the Gift Shop operation shall be included in the annual audit of the Georgia State Society.

VII PATRONS

- 1. Donors to the following categories are eligible to be recognized:
 - A. Meadow Garden Capital Investment Trust Fund
 - B. Furnishings
 - C. Maintenance
 - D. Landscape
 - E. Heritage Education
- 2. Giving categories and levels for annual contributions:
 - \$10 Friends
 - \$25 Supporters
 - \$35 Signers
 - \$50 Patrons
 - \$103* The 1900 Society (*giving level for 2003, giving would increase by \$1
 - each year)
 - \$250 Sons and Daughters of Liberty
 - \$500 Octavia's Legacy
 - \$1,000 George Walton Society
 - \$5,000 Meadow Garden Preservation Society

This information will be publicized in the Meadow Garden brochure and other appropriate places as determined by the Board.

- 3. Chapter gifts, above the State Honor Roll requirements, automatically qualify the chapter to be recognized at an appropriate giving level determined by the categories listed in #2.
- 4. The State Treasurer will report these gifts to the Patrons Chair.
- 5. The Patrons Chair will issue certificates to the qualifying individuals and chapters or groups.
- 6. A permanent book will be kept on public display at Meadow Garden to record the names of those who give at the Patrons level or above.

- 7. The Patrons Chair will enter the names of donors in the appropriate book a minimum of once a year.
- 8. The Meadow Garden Patrons book shall be divided into four parts: (1) Individuals who give a minimum of fifty dollars in one payment, and chapters, organizations, businesses or groups that give a minimum of one hundred dollars in one payment; (2) In-Kind Patrons approved by the Meadow Garden Board in recognition of outstanding and/or unusual gifts of time, talents or expertise toward the betterment of Meadow Garden; (3) Honoraria, which shall list individuals or groups honored by a Patron gift as designated in #1, such listing to show the name of honoree (Patron) and the donor; (4) Memorials of at least fifty dollars which shall list the name of the individual memorialized and the name of the donor.

VIII PLAQUES & MARKERS

- Plaques/Markers may be placed at Meadow Garden only at the discretion of the Board, and request meets the following criteria: Substantial service and/or contributions that secured the property and the heritage for the GSDAR. Individuals so recognized shall have been deceased for at least 5 years; Plaque/Marker will be paid for by person(s) requesting such recognition.
- Such plaques will be permanently displayed at Meadow Garden and a record of the honoree's service and/or contribution will be recorded and placed in the Meadow Garden file, with Board approval.
- 3. Plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the Historic House. Additional markers shall not be permanently placed on the grounds.

Bylaws

GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I

NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II OBJECTS

The objects of this Society shall be:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of the Georgia State Society.

Article IV OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian and a State Curator.

Section 2. (a) To be eligible for state office, a member shall hold and have held membership in a chapter or chapters within the Georgia State Society for at least 5 years prior to her election and have served a full term as chapter officer or state chair.

(b) No member shall be eligible to the same state office for two (2) successive terms. A member having served more than one half of a term in a state office shall be deemed to have served a full term.

(c) No two state officers shall be members of the same chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

(d) To be eligible for the office of State Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State First Vice Regent or as State Second Vice Regent or served in each of these two offices of the Georgia Society.

(e) To be eligible for the office of State First Vice Regent or for the office of State Second Vice Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State Recording Secretary or as State Treasurer of the Georgia State Society and shall have served a full term as a Chapter Regent of a chapter in the Georgia State Society.

Section 3. In recognition of valuable service to the Georgia State Society, a State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent for life by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Article V

NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. (a) A candidate for state office shall request the endorsement of her chapter, taken by a vote at a regular meeting of the chapter held between September and December preceding the State Conference at which state elections are held. The endorsement, signed by the Chapter Recording Secretary, shall include the office the candidate seeks and shall be received by the State Regent with the candidate's statement of intent to be a candidate prior to any announcement or campaigning by the chapter and/or her supporters. The candidate to be endorsed shall be a member of the chapter which endorses her for at least one year."

(b) A candidate for State Regent who wishes to present a slate of officers shall send to the State Regent in one packet the chapter endorsements and the statements of intent for each of her selected candidates. If received by the State Regent no later than December 1, these candidates shall be listed as a slate in the State Regent's Call to State Conference.

(c) Candidates wishing to run independently of a slate, whose chapter endorsements and statements of intent are received by the State Regent no later than December 1 shall be listed as independent candidates in the State Regent's Call to State Conference.

(d) A candidate whose chapter endorsement and statement of intent have been properly received by the State Regent may choose to announce her candidacy separate from the State Regent's Call to State Conference. Such a chapter endorsement and statement of intent shall be received by the State Regent at least ten (10) days prior to the opening of the State Conference at which the election is to take place.

(e) A candidate who does not meet the requirements of these Bylaws shall be declared disqualified and ineligible for consideration for state office.

(f) A chapter shall endorse no more than one chapter member for state office per election with the possible exception of candidates for State Regent and for State Corresponding Secretary.

(g) In the event of the death, incapacitation or withdrawal of a candidate prior to the election, a replacement shall be made with notification in writing to the State Regent and accompanied by the chapter endorsement and statement of intent as directed by these Bylaws.

Section 2. Nominations of candidates for all state offices shall be made at a designated meeting of the State Conference.

Section 3. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected biennially by ballot at the State Conference. A majority vote shall elect. Independent candidates shall be listed on the ballot in a separate column from those candidates presented as a slate.

Section 4. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two (2) years or until their successors are elected. Their terms of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Section 5. (a) Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become State Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become State First Vice Regent subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. Vacancies in other state offices shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next State Board of Management meeting or State Conference, whichever shall come first.

(b) Any state officer who is absent from the state for a continuous period of six (6) months or longer shall automatically relinquish her position as a state officer.

Section 6. Upon the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Organizing Secretary General.

Section 7. (a) A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot.

(b) The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than eighteen (18) months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

(c) The endorsement shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent with the candidate's name and address to the Recording Secretary General to be received by the first day of the month preceding the designated Continental Congress.

Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall perform the duties prescribed in this article, and parliamentary authority adopted by the Society, and such others as the State Board of Management and the National Society may require.

Section 2. The State Regent shall:

(a) be the chief executive officer and the official spokesman for the State Society;

(b) have general supervision of the affairs of the State Society;

(c) preside at all meetings of the State Conference, State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;

(d) appoint a State Chair for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society;

(e) be ex-officio a member of all committees;

(f) appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as advisor in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting;

(g) sign all contracts and agreements made in the name of the Georgia State Society with the recorded approval of the Executive Committee and the State Board of Management or the State Conference as directed by these Bylaws;

(h) be bonded and have the authority to draw upon funds of the State Society with the approval of the Finance Committee.

(i) recommend to the Finance Committee a Certified Public Accountant who shall be approved by the Finance Committee.

Section 3. The State First Vice Regent shall:

(a) perform the duties of the office of State Regent in the absence or inability of the State Regent;

(b) fill a vacancy in the office of State Regent;

(c) Perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;

(d) serve on those committees as designated by these Bylaws and as directed by the State Regent.

Section 4. The State Second Vice Regent shall:

(a) perform the duties of the office of State First Vice Regent in the absence or inability of the State First Vice Regent;

(b) fill a vacancy in the office of State First Vice Regent;

(c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;

(d) serve on committees as directed by the State Regent.

Section 5. The State Chaplain shall:

(a) open all meetings of the State Conference and the State Board of Management with scripture reading and prayer;

(b) preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and conduct such other religious services as may be required;

(c) be custodian of state properties pertaining to the duties of this office;

(d) be responsible for IN MEMORIAM pages in the Proceedings.

Section 6. The State Recording Secretary shall:

(a) record the proceedings of the meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;

(b) compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and the Proceedings Committee.

(c) submit to the appropriate National officers, the endorsement for Vice President General and the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent by the first day of the month preceding the month of Continental Congress of the year in which said balloting was held;

Section 7. The State Corresponding Secretary shall:

(a) conduct correspondence and send notices on behalf of the State Regent, the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as may be directed by them;

(b) receive from the chapters the Chapter Master Report and distribute to the appropriate state chairmen.

Section 8. The State Organizing Secretary shall:

(a) assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new chapters;

(b) assist chapters in conjunction with appropriate state officers and chairmen in revitalization.

Section 9. The State Treasurer shall:

(a) be bonded;

(b) be the custodian of the funds of the State Society, placing them in institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance;

(c) receive the state dues and State Conference registration fees from the chapters and receive all sums contributed by the chapters for state and national projects, disbursing monthly to the Treasurer General all funds designated for national projects;

(d) disburse other funds only when authorized by the State Regent in writing;

(e) keep an account of all sums received or disbursed by using the basic double entry form of bookkeeping according to accepted accounting procedures and keep receipts for all transactions;

(f) prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference, sending a copy to the State Chair of the Finance Committee ten (10) days in advance of each meeting;

(g) be a member of the Finance Committee and an ex-officio member of the Credentials Committee;

(h) balance and prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year; said audit by a Certified Public Accountant, shall be performed and delivered within forty-five (45) days of receipt of books.

(i) An internal review of the State Treasurer's records shall be performed when a change in this office occurs after the close of the fiscal year. Following the review, the records shall be turned over to the new State Treasurer. The committee to review the books shall be composed of the State First Vice Regent, the immediate Past State Treasurer, the immediate past Finance Chair and a current Chapter Regent appointed by the State Regent.

(j) upon receipt of verified expenses paid by the State Regent for travel and hotel, reimburse the State Regent for these expenses up to the amount approved in the budget for the State Regent's Expenses.

Section 10. The State Registrar shall:

(a) when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution prove eligibility and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars;

(b) keep a correct list of all members in the state;

(c) report on membership to the State Conference;

(d) assist with the verification of the credentials;

(e) be in possession of the computer and software owned by the Georgia State Society and see that it is maintained.

Section 11. The State Historian shall:

(a) be in charge, within the state, of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General as well as those authorized by the Georgia State Society;

(b) keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves within the state;

(c) prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General;

(d) promote the study of American history, state and county history and historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the founding of our state and counties.

Section 12. The State Librarian shall:

(a) serve as liaison between the Librarian General and the Georgia Chapters and disseminate general information on the NSDAR Library;

(b) cooperate with the director of the Georgia Department of Archives and History, making the needs of the Archives known to the chapters;

(c) collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing them wherever accepted in such libraries and Archives as may be chosen by the State Board of Management;

(d) solicit, with the approval of the Executive Committee, contributions from the chapters for purchase of such books as requested by the office of the Librarian General, and/or the various libraries in Georgia which the State Society approves;

(e) receive gifts of books and other printed material from the chapters to be donated to the approved libraries and Archives;

(f) maintain a constant supply of bookplates to the NSDAR Library, the Georgia Department of Archives and History and for purchase by the chapters.

Section 13. The State Curator shall: be custodian of the State portable properties and shall have them properly stored and made ready for use at state meetings.

Section 14. All officers will keep a Procedure Book of Instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new officers to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. State Conference:

a) The annual meeting of the Georgia State Society shall be known as the State Conference. It shall be for the purpose of:

(1) receiving reports of officers, committees and Chapter Regents;

(2) electing officers biennially;

(3) promoting programs in furtherance of the objects of the Society;

(4) any other business that may arise:

i. annual budget shall be adopted,

ii. all projects of the State Society requiring funding shall be voted upon at State Conference or ratified by members at State Conference if previously voted upon by the State Board of Management,

iii. no project extending beyond the term of the presiding officer may be accepted at any meeting other than by vote at State Conference.

(b) The State Conference shall be held between February 1 and April 10 but shall not convene during Holy Week.

(c) The State Regent shall fix the time and place of meetings;

(d) The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credentials form to the chapters not less than sixty (60) days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 2. The voting members of the State Conference shall be:

(a) the officers and Honorary State Regents of the State Society;

(b) the officers and honorary officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state;

(c) the Chapter Regent, or in her absence, the Vice Regent or alternate of each chapter;

(d) delegates or alternates of each chapter of the state as designated by the Bylaws of the National Society for representation at Continental Congress.

Section 3. Only a chapter member in good standing whose credentials have been completed in accordance with the instructions of the State Regent and the State Credentials Chair for the State Conference and in accordance with the Standing Rules of the National Society shall be eligible to represent her chapter at state and national meetings.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the chapter, except in the case of the Regent or Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at an annual State Conference, shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the state of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference the privilege of the floor and the right to speak shall be accorded to the State Chairmen and State Vice Chairmen. They may not vote unless they are duly registered as voters of the State Conference.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Society may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen (15) days' notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Forty-five (45) voting members, representing not less than twenty (20) chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The state officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents and the Regents, or in their absence, the Vice Regents of the chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the fall, following the October meeting of the National Board, It may meet whenever called by the State Regent. A minimum of twenty (20) days' notice shall be given as to the time and place of any such meeting.

Section 3. Thirty (30) members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference or as proscribed by these Bylaws.

Section 5. State chairmen, vice chairmen, committee members of the National and Standing Committees may attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privilege of the floor and the right to speak, but shall not vote. One (1) member from each chapter may attend the meetings, if invited by the chapter regent, and shall be granted the privilege of the floor, but shall not have the right to speak or vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article IX EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, shall attend the meetings, but may not vote.

Section 3. This Executive Committee shall:

(a) perform such duties of the State Board of Management between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient;

(b) meet at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three (3) members of the committee;

(c) vote by teleconference, e-mail or fax, if necessary;

(d) receive and make recommendations for projects requiring expenditure of funds outside routine expenditures to be considered by the State Conference;

(e) make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. Decisions of the Executive Committee shall be acted upon at the next meeting of the State Board of Management or at State Conference, whichever shall come first.

Article X FINANCES

Section 1. (a) The fiscal year of the Georgia State Society shall be July 1 through the last day of June.

(b) The annual budget, prepared by the Finance Committee, shall cover the fiscal year and be prepared on the basis of dues payable for the calendar year beginning December first preceding.

(c) The Finance Committee shall propose the per capita amount and distribute according to the annual membership count. The per capita amount and distribution shall be indicated on the budget presented annually. Funds to be included in the per capita

designations shall be Friends of DAR Schools, Lucy Cook Peel Fund, McCall Genealogical Fund and Meadow Garden Maintenance.

Section 2. The annual dues of chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be \$10.00 for each member of the chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1.

Section 3. (a) Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the state dues, a conference registration fee of \$15.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under these Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether chapter is represented or not.

(b) Honorary State Regents and State Officers shall pay a conference fee of \$15.00 at the time of registration or shall include the conference registration fee in the check for Conference meal reservations.

(c) Other members of the Georgia State Society who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a conference fee of \$10.00 at the time of registration or shall include the conference registration fee in the check for Conference meal reservations."

(d) All host chapters may charge a registration fee to those not purchasing a meal ticket to off-set the cost of hosting state/district meetings.

Section 4. (a) The State Treasurer and the State Regent and such others entrusted with funds of the Georgia State Society as may be designated by the State Board of Management shall be bonded. (See Article VI, Sections 2 and 9);

(b) The State Treasurer with the approval of the State Regent and the State Chair of the Finance Committee shall place the funds of the Georgia State Society in financial institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage;

(c) The placement of restricted savings funds and investment funds of the Georgia State Society shall be placed to the credit of the Georgia State Society by the State Treasurer under the direction of the Finance Committee. Monies may be invested in U. S. Treasury obligations or other interest bearing obligations of federally insured financial institutions;

(d) The accounts of the State Treasurer shall be annually prepared for audit by a Certified Public Accountant immediately following the end of the State Society fiscal year and no later than July 15 and delivered to the CPA by that date;

(e) Should the State Treasurer be incapacitated, the State Regent, after consultation with the Chair of the Finance Committee and with the approval of the Executive Committee, shall appoint an Acting State Treasurer to serve until such time as the State Treasurer is able to resume her duties or a new State Treasurer is appointed and ratified as stated in Article V, Section 5 (a).

Section 5. The expenses incurred by the State Regent in the performance of duty shall be paid each year from the State Dues Fund:

(a) **Six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00)** shall be taken each year to defray her necessary travel expenses;

(b) Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent, as budgeted, shall be paid by the State Treasurer who shall keep all receipts of these expenses. No expenses exceeding the budgeted amount shall be paid by the State Treasurer.

Section 6. At the close of the books annually, \$5,000.00 shall be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies Fund" so that at the end of each administration a total of \$10,000.00 will be reserved. This money is to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration.

Article XI COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Honorary State Regents of the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution shall function as an advisory committee to the State Regent and to the Georgia State Society.

Section 2. The State Regent shall appoint the following standing committees:

(a) Bylaws: This committee shall be composed of two (2) Honorary State Regents, one of whom shall serve as chair, and one (1) member from each of the districts; each of the members representing the districts shall not be serving on any other State Standing Committee. The State First Vice Regent shall serve as an ex-officio member, and the State Parliamentarian shall serve as an advisory member of the committee.

(b) Finance: This committee shall be composed of seven (7) members to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two (2) Honorary State Regents, one (1) active chapter regent, and one (1) active chapter member, who shall not be an Honorary State Regent, nor a State Officer, nor a chapter regent, nor from the same district as the appointed active chapter regent. From these seven (7) members the State Regent shall appoint the chair of the committee, who shall be either an Honorary State Regent or the past State Treasurer. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund. This committee shall have charge of all investments of the Georgia State Society's funds.

(c) Resolutions: This committee shall be composed of all Honorary State Regents, the State First Vice Regent, the State Parliamentarian, and one chapter member from each district, who is not serving on any other State Standing Committee.

(d) Proceedings: This committee shall be composed of the State Recording Secretary, the immediate past State Recording Secretary, the State First Vice Regent, and four (4) additional members, at least one of whom shall be an Honorary State Regent. The four (4) members, including the Honorary State Regent, shall represent different districts; and the members, excluding the Honorary State Regent, shall not be serving on any other State Standing Committee. The State Regent shall appoint the chair of the committee, and it shall be the Honorary State Regent or the past State Recording Secretary who is serving on the_committee.

Section 3. The State Regent shall appoint such other committees, standing or special, as the State Conference shall authorize and actions of the State Board of Management and of the National Society shall require. The appointments shall be concurrent with the term of the State Regent making the appointments and shall terminate with the end of the administration.

Section 4. Additional appointments may be made to any of the committees and vacancies shall be filled by the State Regent with timely notification to the membership.

Section 5. The duties of committees shall be such as these Bylaws, the State Conference, the State Board of Management or the National Society shall prescribe.

Section 6. All chairmen will keep a Procedure Book of instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

Article XII CHAPTERS

Section 1. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April 1 in the year of chapter elections. The Chapter Regent shall report annually the names of the elected officers promptly on the form provided by the State Regent for this purpose, with copies to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, and the State Recording Secretary.

Section 2. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent, the State Recording Secretary, and the District Director at the time designated by the State Regent.

Article XIII DISTRICTS

Section 1. The State Regent-elect shall divide the state into a minimum of four districts, using logic and geography to determine boundaries.

Section 2. A minimum of four workshops shall be held annually, the location of each shall be strategically chosen to be convenient to the Georgia chapter members.

Section 3. The State Regent shall appoint a Coordinator of Districts who shall have served a full two-year term as a District Director, and who is not serving as a chapter regent during her term as Coordinator of Districts. She shall work with the State Regent and the District Directors in coordinating the workshops and the State Regent's official chapter visits in each district; and shall offer guidance to the District Directors.

Section 4. The State Regent shall appoint a District Director to serve in each district. She shall have served a full two-year term as a chapter regent within the district she serves as Director. She shall work with the hostess chapter(s) in planning the workshop within her district and shall work with the State Regent in planning her official visits to the chapters within her district and may accompany the State Regent on these official visits.

Article IV MEADOW GARDEN

Meadow Garden, property owned by the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, shall be operated as follows:

(a) The governing body shall be the Board of Trustees composed of the following members: the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Chair who shall be appointed by the State Regent;

(b) The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the following members: the State Regent who shall serve as Chair; the State First Vice Regent who shall serve as Secretary; the Chair of Meadow Garden; the Regents of the Augusta and College Hill Chapters; the State Treasurer; two (2) Honorary State Regents; and the chairmen of the six (6) subcommittees appointed by the State Regent - Docents, Furnishings, Landscaping, Gift Shop, Patrons and Public Relations.

(c) The Meadow Garden Board shall operate with Standing Rules approved by the State Conference.

Article XV RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. The current edition of *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised,* shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law in matters not covered by these Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

Article XVI AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent, the State Parliamentarian, and the State Bylaws Chair. The State Regent shall send a copy to each chapter, at least sixty (60) days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the Call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

Article XVII DISSOLUTION

Although the period of duration of the Georgia State Society is perpetual, if for any reason the State Society is to be dissolved or otherwise terminated, no part of the property of the Society or any of the proceeds shall be distributed to or inure to the benefit of any of the officers or members of the Society. Upon the dissolution of the Georgia State Society, assets shall be distributed by the Board of Management and/or the Executive Committee to and only to the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the local United States District Court, exclusively to such organization or organizations as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated within the meaning of section 501 (c)(3), with purposes and objectives consistent with those of the Georgia State Society.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year, a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24, 1899. Bylaws were adopted, and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21) No Conference was held in 1911, the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912," and amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, page 211).

RESOLVED, that in honor of the State Regent, the Georgia State Society contribute one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) to the President General's Project, such fund to be debited from the State Dues unallocated Money Market Account, and the gift to be made the first year of the State Regent's term. *Proceedings*, 2008-2009.

AWARDS

All Chapters competing for awards must send reports to the respective chairs by the listed due dates. See the "Georgia Regents' Calendar" for a compilation of dates or the Individual Chair's Instructions in the CIP (Chapter Information Packet). Both documents are posted on-line on the Georgia Members Website. All reports for awards are based on membership confirmed by the National Society. The reporting year is January 1 - December 31.

BYLAWS

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National or State Bylaws, and a current copy is to be filed with the State Parliamentarian. Proposed Amendments to the Bylaws shall include the date of the Proposal with the Rationale and name of the Proposer and shall be sent to the Chair of the Bylaws Committee two (2) weeks prior to the GSSDAR Fall Board of Management meeting.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS

Notice of change of address of members shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General on the Membership Change Form or by eMembership; also the State Regent, State Corresponding Secretary, and State Registrar by the Chapter Registrar.

CHANGE OF NAME

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General on the Membership Change Form or by eMembership; also the State Regent, State Corresponding Secretary, and State Registrar by the Chapter Registrar.

CHAPTER ELECTIONS

Chapter elections are to be held before April 1. Names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General by email on "Chapter Officers Report Form" (CORF); and in state by email using the GSSDAR CORF, sent to the State Regent or the State Regent-Elect; the State Recording Secretary; and the State Corresponding Secretary by April 1. The full Christian name of chapter officers shall be given, along with her husband's given name or initials, address, zip code, telephone number, fax and e-mail. In accordance with the National Bylaws, a Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years.

CHAPTER REPRESENTATION AT STATE AND NATIONAL MEETINGS

At the State Board of Management, a chapter is represented by the Chapter Regent or in her absence by the First Vice Regent, and one non-voting member, if invited by the Chapter Regent. The voting representation of each chapter at State Conference and Continental Congress shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received in the Office of the Treasurer General by December 1. Membership 12-19: Regent only; 20-49: Regent + 1 delegate = 2 votes; 50-99: Regent + 2 delegates = 3 votes; 100-149: Regent + 3 delegates = 4 votes; 150-199: Regent + 4 delegates = 5 votes; 200-249: Regent + 5 delegates = 6 votes; 250-299: Regent + 6 delegates = 7 votes. Chapters with membership of 300 and over will have an additional delegate for each additional 50 members exceeding 299.

CONFERENCE REGISTRATION

On or before December 1, each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer the state dues and a Conference Registration fee of \$15.00 per each delegate to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws. This fee is to be paid whether represented or not and is derived by recommendation of the Finance Committee to the Executive Committee. This is a requirement stated in the Georgia State Bylaws, Article X, Section 3 (a).

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the Conference Registration Fee of \$15.00 at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters, shall pay a Conference Registration Fee of \$10.00 at the time of registration.

The deadline for chapter contributions to the Georgia co-op ads sent to the State Chair, DAR Magazine is November 1. The checks are to be made payable to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR.

DATE FOR ANNUAL AUDIT

The Georgia State Society Fiscal Year is July 1 to June 30. State Bylaws, Article X, Section 1 (a). The State Treasurer should prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year. Bylaw Article VI, Section 9 (h).

DEADLINES

State Officers and Chairs welcome chapter reports when completed. Deadline dates are given to ensure conformity for inclusion in reports to National Officers. Per National Society Bylaws, the deadline date is determined by the United States Postal Service or other carrier, showing cancellation date and not by the date reports are received.

DECEASED MEMBERS

Deaths shall be reported promptly to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Chaplain and the State Registrar by the corresponding Chapter officer. A complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name, and date of death shall be furnished to the State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for the Conference Memorial Service and for State *Proceedings.*

DUES

Before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer sends to the State Treasurer state dues of \$10.00 per member. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the monthly National Board of Management meeting, which is the 5th of every month. Before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer sends to the office of the Organizing Secretary General National dues of \$40.00 per member except Life Members, with check made payable to the Treasurer General NSDAR.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS

To insure uniformity and convenience in binding, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 11 inches, with 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches from top of page, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 inches on left side, 1 inch on right side and at bottom. Two copies shall be sent to the State Chair of Genealogical Records. The booklet, "Instructions for Copying Source Records and Their Preparation for Library Use," should be obtained from the Corresponding Secretary General.

GEORGIA HOSPITALITY FUND

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, the budgeted amount to be determined by the Finance Committee, to be used for the above purposes; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this fund shall not be cumulative.

Follow the format as seen in "Reports of State Officers" and State Chairs in the Proceedings. Margins should be 1/2 inches from the top of page, 1 1/2 inches from left side, 1 inch from right side, and 1 inch from bottom of page. Chapter Regents should exclude NSDAR Chapter Achievement Award and State Honor Roll, as these will be added when confirmed. Your name should be consistent with the lists of Chapter Regents and State Chairs as found in this *Proceedings*. Winners of awards and awards to be offered shall each be listed separately and identified with the title of the committee and the award. Chapter reports should be sent to the State Regent, District Director, and the State Recording Secretary by February 1. The deadline for State Officers and State Chairs reports and list of awards (if any) is March 1 and should be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary.

These funds are to secure anticipated deposits for State Events and are to be replaced from state fund income, reimbursing the fund yearly for the amount used. To establish the \$10,000.00, the additional \$5,000.00 shall come from the general checking account. *Proceedings* 2009-2010, amended 2012.

ANNUAL MEETING

The Annual Luncheon Meeting of the Georgia Chapter Regents Club, NSDAR was held Friday, March 10th, 2017 at the Evergreen Marriott Conference Resort, Stone Mountain, Georgia.
