

Executive Committee Meeting Minutes

Workshop August 10, 2017

The Executive Committee of the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution met on August 10, 2017, at the Hilton Garden Inn, Columbus, Georgia, State Regent Joyce Ball Patton presiding. The meeting was called to order at 7:45 p.m.

Chaplain Mary Elizabeth "Betty" Brown Harrah opened the meeting with prayer.

State Recording Secretary Eleanor Brinson Quigley called the roll; all were present: State Regent Joyce Ball Patton, First Vice Regent Melodye G. Brown, Second Vice Regent O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle, Chaplain Betty Harrah, Corresponding Secretary Rebecca "Becky" Malone West, Organizing Secretary Phyllis Fox Lawson, Treasurer Deborah "Debbie" Taylor Powell, Registrar Brenda Davison Jessel, Historian Robin Redfearn Towns, Librarian E. Lynn Brackey, Curator Shannon Cowles Logue.

Mrs. Patton reported on the Meadow Garden window restoration, completed by Landmark Preservation, LLC (LP). LP is also developing a long-range plan for Meadow Garden. Items needing immediate attention include: missing bricks around the chimney causing leaks; HVAC pipes which need to be wrapped to stop condensation problems in the attic; and a basement dehumidifier. The State Regent has invited Greg Jacobs, LP, to the State Board of Management to inform Daughters of the long-range restoration plans for Meadow Garden.

Mrs. Patton reported that \$10,000.00 has been raised to purchase a Z-Scanner for the NSDAR Library.

At Mrs. Patton's request, State Second Vice Regent O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle reported on the DAR Schools: Tamassee DAR School: Greg Jacobs of LP is developing a plan for long-range restoration of the Talmadge Auditorium. Funds available at Tamassee are \$100,000.00 in Georgia Fund with \$28,000.00 interest, which may be used to pay for the long-range plan. Immediate needs are replacing leaky window seals and repairing gutters. Berry College: The restoration of Frost Chapel Windows is completed; \$1,000.00 was donated toward restoring Miss Berry's Gazebo. Hindman Settlement School: The funding goal for the "Georgia Office" is \$15,000.00. Fielding Lewis donated \$1,000.00; to date \$5,716.00 has been donated.

State First Vice Regent Melodye Brown announced that the Georgia Tea at Continental Congress will be held on Friday, June 22, 2018, in the Sphinx Ballroom, the Almas Conference Center. The Georgia Continental Congress Hotel is the Hamilton Crown Plaza. State Regent Patton asked the Executive Committee members to invite their corresponding national officer to the GSSDAR Tea.

Second Vice Regent O.B. McCorkle reported on Hindman's Special Project, the Cornerstone Campaign, and possibly funding a "Georgia office." Other special projects are unchanged. Tamassee will complete an Historic Needs Assessment and Long-Range Plan for the May Irwin Talmadge Auditorium and Gymnasium with LP.

State Chaplain Betty Harrah reported as of March 1, 2017, 48 deaths are known. GSS NSDAR has 232 members, 90 or older.

State Corresponding Secretary Becky West reported that *Georgia Gazette* #4 and the Junior Membership newsletter have been compiled and distributed. Georgia *Gazette* #5

was published mid-September. The 2017-2018 State Directory is available. Proceedings labels will be prepared.

Organizing Secretary Phyllis Lawson reported Georgia has several new chapters in various organizing stages: the Kennesaw area, Organizing Regent, Loriann White; the Captain James Kell Chapter, Ellijay, Organizing Regent Kayla Hudson; the Lookout Mountain Chapter, Michelle Workman; the Acworth area, Patricia Hein.

Treasurer Deborah Powell distributed the Treasurer's Balance Sheet. The GSS NSDAR Balance Sheet Summary as of July 1, 2017: Savings \$500.71; Certificates of Deposit \$124,198.70; Checking account balance \$134,933.35; Total Money Market Accounts \$96,958.60; Other Assets, hotel deposit, \$5,000.00. Total Liabilities and Equity \$361,591.36. Meadow Garden Balance Sheet Account Summary as of July 1, 2017: Certificates of Deposit \$373,127.87; Checking account balance \$85,024.13; Total Money Market Accounts \$58,254.52. Petty Cash \$100.00; Go Green Petty Cash \$100.00; Total Current Assets: \$516,606.52; Total Fixed Assets \$257,003.00; Total Liabilities and Equity \$773,609.52.

State Registrar Brenda Jessel reported on membership: Georgia has 8,011 Daughters in 111 Chapters, a 156-member increase over January 1, 2017; there are 340 new members; 58 Juniors, with 589 Junior Members total. New Horizons: 38 Daughters are working on the Leadership Course, 15 are working on the New Members Course.

State Historian Robin Towns attended the 2017 Georgia DAR State Conference and awarded the State Outstanding Teacher of American History to Harry W. Cooper, sponsored by Elijah Clarke Chapter, Athens. At Continental Congress, Mrs. Towns hosted an Open House in the Georgia Room, Peter Tondee's Tavern, with Georgia Daughters in colonial attire.

State Librarian Lynn Brackey reported 25 books have been donated to the DAR Library. Five iPads have been donated to the Crossnore School elementary program; the State Library Fund paid \$1,195.57 including shipping. \$500.00 purchased books for USO Project Wish Books. All *Proceedings* books were scanned by AMAC, Georgia Tech's Accessibility Solutions and Research Center. Voices were sold at District Workshops for four limited edition ornaments and four porcelain dolls.

Curator Shannon Logue reported that the new flag poles with metal joints are working well.

Recording Secretary Eleanor Quigley reported attending two *Proceedings* Committee Meetings. The Executive Committee minutes have been sent to the Executive Committee for editing. A final proofing meeting is scheduled with the State Regent and the Proceedings Committee Chair. Photos for Proceedings have been selected. Reports from Officers, State Chairs, Social Clubs, and Chapter Regents have been collated and edited. The *Proceedings* publishing company was contacted for publishing details and schedule.

2. The Executive Committee recommends that the State Board of Management Approve and Adopt: the addition of a State Regent's project to contribute money to Berry College for necessary repairs to the damaged Gazebo at Berry College. The costs of which, in combination with other State Regent's Projects, not to exceed the totality of all funds collected for the State Regent's Projects. Any excess funds will be applied to establish a Capital Investment/Improvements Checking Account of Meadow Garden, to fund or partially fund projects approved by the Meadow Garden Board which exceed the scope and purpose of the Administrative and Maintenance Checking Account of Meadow Garden. Adopted.

3. The Executive Committee recommends that the State Board of Management Approve and Adopt: the addition of a State Regent's Project to purchase a highspeed scanner as a gift from the Georgia State Society to the National Society, DAR for the use and benefit of the National Society, DAR and its members. The First Vice Regent took the chair, and the State Regent gave her report. The State Regent reported that the past 16 months have been dedicated to the Georgia State Society and the over 8,000 members. The State Regent delivered a synopsis of travels and duties, representing Georgia Daughters at State Conferences and Events: Texas State Conference; Ohio State Conference; Opening of the Revolutionary Museum at Yorktown; Rosalie Historic Home, Natchez, Mississippi; Kansas State Conference; The Historic Marking by Fort Peachtree Chapter in Sparta: National Board of Management, April; District of Columbia State Conference; Kate Duncan Smith DAR School Awards Day and Graduation; Tamassee DAR School Awards Day and Graduation; Continental National Society, Sons of the American Revolution Congress, Knoxville; Congress: Georgia's Outstanding Junior Tea, Morrow; Oklahoma State Conference; New York State Conference; Constitution Week Luncheon; Georgia Society of the Children of the American Revolution Meet and Greet with new N.S.C.A.R National President, Erin Moore, Columbus; Day of Prayer, Fielding Lewis Chapter; National Board of Management, October; Tamassee DAR School Dedication Day; Frost Chapel Window Dedication, Berry College; Kentucky State Board of Management.

Trips to Meadow Garden were made once or twice monthly. Thanks to Debbie and Steve Powell for their hospitality in Augusta.

The Meadow Garden Window restoration project was completed in May by Landmark Preservation, LLC (LP). All work performed by LP is guaranteed for quality and durability.

To help the Georgia State Society accurately interpret Meadow Garden, LP asked to access the time period of the structures. Greg Jacobs of LP and the staff worked at Meadow Garden, looking at the house to see immediate problems: they found bricks fallen from the chimney in the attic and repaired a roof leak. The Meadow Garden Board engaged LP to create a Master Plan for Meadow Garden to help present and future State Regents in deciding the most important items to be cared for first. The plan offers the option of returning Meadow Garden to its original appearance. The SBOM will hear Greg Jacobs share the findings made during LP's research.

Planning for the future is on the mind of State Regents regarding maintenance of Talmadge Auditorium at Tamassee DAR School, a State Project. State Second Vice Regent, O.B. McCorkle, suggested a buildings assessment done by a licensed company which could also do the work. While working with LP, the State Regent, First and Second Vice Regents felt the company should create a Tamassee Master Plan. Lori Bailey, CEO, agreed to use interest from the \$100,000.00 Tamassee Fund given by the Georgia State Society to fund the plan. The Master Plan is in process and will be presented to Tamassee with a copy to the Georgia State Society. John and Rose Elyea Bell donated \$10,000.00 toward gutter guards for the Talmadge DAR School Auditorium; total cost \$13,000.00. The remainder will come from Tamassee State School Funds held by the Georgia State Society. The next project at Talmadge Auditorium may be partial window restoration to stop water entering the building from around windows.

This Regent made many visits, installed Officers, brought greetings, celebrated anniversaries and many patriotic events. Representing the Georgia State Society is an honor. One of the most exciting events was the Organizing Meeting of the new Captain James Kell Chapter, Ellijay, with Kayla Hudson, Organizing Regent. The Georgia State Society has two new chapters organizing soon: Acworth, Patricia Hein, Regent and Lookout Mountain, Michelle Workman, Regent. These, along with the Jacob Braselton Chapter, Caroline Mixon, Regent and the Kennesaw Mountain Chapter, Loriann White, Regent total five new Georgia Chapters in this administration.

Preparing for summer workshops was a great pleasure. The 2017 Summer Workshops had a total registration of 913; the Genealogy Workshops had a registration of 195. Workshops were held in Columbus, Atlanta, St. Simons, and Macon. Thank you to

chapters who made everyone welcome! Workshops were successfully planned and orchestrated by Teresa Floyd, Coordinator of Districts and District Directors: Beverly Baker, Cathy Miller, Charlotte Christian, Amelia Pelton, Bonnie Lashley, and Mary King Givens.

The State Board of Management planned by Donna Owens, spent much time negotiating the contract for the Georgia State Society. Thank you, Donna Owens, Teresa Floyd, and the District Directors. Ladies behind the scenes make sure all details were covered. Two other ladies also work behind the scenes: Kay Ragan, Event's Treasurer, collects money and reports names and numbers to everyone for Registration and Credentials; and Julie Prince, Seating Chair, places ladies according to protocol.

The State Regent thanked Daughters for donating to the Campaign for Vice President General.

Mrs. Patton personally thanked Georgia Daughters for helping those impacted by recent natural disasters, Hurricanes Harvey, Irma, and Marie, helping Daughters, school children, and veterans.

The First Vice Regent congratulated Mrs. Patton on her administration. Georgia Daughters thanked the State Regent with a standing ovation. Mrs. Patton resumed the chair.

First Vice Regent Melodye Brown reported coordinating meetings with the Executive Committee, the Honorary State Regents, the Meadow Garden Board and Docents in development of the Master Plan for Meadow Garden restoration, prepared by Landmark Preservation, L.L.C.(LP). Greg Jacobs, LP, met with groups to share progress made, plans for the future, and to answer questions. Collaboration is beneficial in the overall plan development. It was an honor to speak on the Master Plan at the Georgia Luncheon at Congress and share prospects with the Georgia Daughters. Following Continental Congress, Ms. Brown served as hostess to President General Ann Turner Dillon during her visit to the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution Congress held in Knoxville, Tennessee. Ms. Brown attended all meetings of State Standing Committees, the Meadow Garden Board, Scholarship Night at Berry College, James Waldrop Chapter's tenth anniversary, Fort Peachtree Chapter's Glen Mary marker dedication in Sparta, installed Thomasville Chapter officers, luncheon at Robert Loughridge Chapter, Etowah Chapter's "Patriots on the Square" event, presented a program to Kennesaw Mountain Chapter, Tamassee DAR School Founders Day, Kate Duncan Smith DAR School (KDS) Dedication Day, and the rededication of the stained glass windows at Berry College Frost Chapel. To eliminate conflict with National Congress events, the Georgia event at the 2018 Continental Congress was changed from a luncheon to a tea. The Georgia Tea will be held Friday, June 22, 3:30 to 5:30 p.m., in the Sphinx Ballroom, Almas Conference Center, adjacent to the Hamilton Hotel, Tickets will be available at State Conference.

Second Vice Regent O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle reported as **DAR School Chair**, that Georgia Daughters had wonderful attendance at KDS Dedication Day, Tamassee Founder's Day, and the Window Dedication at Berry College. Tamassee is pursuing an Historic Building Master Plan for the May Irwin Talmadge Auditorium; with LP. Work is nearing completion. A critical gutter issue totaled \$13,000.00. Rose Elyea Bell made a \$10,000.00 donation to begin the work on repairing the gutters; the remaining \$3,000.00 will come from the Georgia State Project Fund. There is also a critical issue with the windows leaking. A planning meeting with Greg Jacobs, LP, and Lori Bailey of Tamassee is scheduled in November to discuss options. The response to special projects is positive. In this fiscal year, \$3,475.00 was donated to the Hindman Settlement School Cornerstone Campaign. With donations in 2016 of \$2,272.00 given through the State Society, Joseph Habersham Chapter's donation of \$2,500.00, and Fielding Lewis Chapter's donation of \$1,000.00, totals are \$9,247.00 toward the Georgia Office at Hindman.

Chaplain Betty Harrah reported working with chapter chaplains to ensure their sending an updated 90+ Birthday list form, Deceased Member Forms, and contacting National with information. The list for 90+ Birthdays is at 259 members; this officer sent 215 Birthday Cards. We have seven members who are 100, two who are 101, three who are 102, three who are 104, two are 106, and one member, Lillian Harris in John Franklin Wren Chapter, who is 107.Since March 1, 2017, 81 member deaths were reported. Sympathy cards were sent to families. Deceased members will be remembered at State Conference, April 2018. Chapter Chaplains were encouraged to keep in contact with members unable to attend meetings.

State Regent Patton asked Recording Secretary Eleanor Brinson Quigley to read **Recommendations from the Executive Committee**. The State Regent asked the First Vice Regent to take the Chair.

Mrs. Quigley read the following: that the Executive Committee recommends that the State Board of Management Approve and Adopt the motion: to amend previous motions approved by the 119th State Conference providing that any excess funds raised as part of the Georgia State Regent's projects would be "applied to the following: (1) the Administrative and Maintenance Checking Account of Meadow Garden; and (2) a donation to Berry College for the continued maintenance and improvement of Berry Frost Chapel" by striking the first and second designations for funds and inserting instead "to establish a Capital Investment/ Improvements Checking Account of Meadow Garden, to fund or partially fund projects approved by the Meadow Garden Board which exceed the scope and purpose of the Administrative and Maintenance Checking Account of Meadow Garden."

As amended, the motion would read: ⁴In combination with other State Regent's Projects, the costs of which not to exceed the totality of all funds collected for the State Regent's Project, with any excess funds applied to establish a Capital Investment/Improvements Checking Account of Meadow Garden, to fund or partially fund projects approved by the Meadow Garden Board which exceed the scope and purpose of the Administrative and Maintenance Checking Account of Meadow Garden." Adopted.

Mrs. Quigley read the following: that the Executive Committee recommends that the State Board of Management Approve and Adopt: the addition of a State Regent's project to contribute money to Berry College for necessary repairs to the damaged Gazebo at Berry College. The costs of which, in combination with other State Regent's Projects, not to exceed the totality of all funds collected for the State Regent's Projects. Any excess funds will be applied to establish a Capital Investment/Improvements Checking Account of Meadow Garden, to fund or partially fund projects approved by the Meadow Garden Board which exceed the scope and purpose of the Administrative and Maintenance Checking Account of Meadow Garden. Adopted.

Mrs. Quigley read the following: that the Executive Committee recommends that the State Board of Management Approve and Adopt: the addition of a State Regent's Project to purchase a high speed scanner as a gift from the Georgia State Society to the National Society, DAR for the use and benefit of the National Society, DAR and its members. The costs of which, in combination with other State Regent's Projects, not to exceed the totality of all funds collected for the State Regent's Projects. Any excess funds will be applied to establish a Capital Investment/ Improvements Checking Account of Meadow Garden, to fund or partially fund projects approved by the Meadow Garden Board which exceed the scope and purpose of the Administrative and Maintenance Checking Account of Meadow Garden. Adopted. Mrs. Quigley read the following: that the Executive Committee recommends that the State Board of Management approve and adopt: the addition of a State Regent's Project to fund or partially fund a Georgia Office at Hindman Settlement School. The costs of which, in combination with other State Regent's Projects, not to

exceed the totality of all funds collected for the State Regent's Projects. Any excess funds will be applied to establish a Capital Investment/Improvements Checking Account of Meadow Garden, to fund or partially fund projects approved by the Meadow Garden Board which exceed the scope and purpose of the Administrative and Maintenance Checking Account of Meadow Garden. Adopted.

The State Regent resumed the Chair and called for the Recording Secretary's Report.

Recording Secretary Eleanor Brinson Quigley announced the 2016-2017 Proceedings of the Patton Administration is available for Regents and Chairs to pick-up at tables staffed by District Directors. Members will be asked to use a provided correction form to report any errors or changes. Daughters who assisted with editing and publishing were thanked: Honorary State Regent Laura Reid, who wrote the eulogy for Honorary State Regent Marie de Lamar, to whom Proceedings was dedicated this year; Stephanie Chasez, for professional help with picture editing; Proceedings Chair Brenda Jessel, past Recording Secretaries Melodye Brown and Becky West, and committee members for editing. The Recording Secretary is the recipient of reports, incorporated into Proceedings. The State Officers' reports are included as presented. The state chair's oral committee reports, presented at SBOM, are included in an abridged version. Mrs. Quigley reported attending Executive Committee Meetings, Workshops and the SBOM. Also attended were the Constitution Week Luncheon at the Piedmont Driving Club; the Frost Chapel window re-dedication at Berry College; the Meadow Garden Master Plan presentation for restoration, presented by Greg Jacobs, LP; the birthday anniversary celebration of Augusta Chapter; and the Capstone Project of Judy Kitchens Howard.

Corresponding Secretary Rebecca Malone West e-mailed Issue #4 of the *Georgia Gazette* in June to State Officers, Honorary State Regents with email access, District Directors, State Chairs, Vice Chairs, and Chapter Regents; hard copies were mailed to all Honorary State Regents. In September emailed and, mailed Issue #5 to the same recipients. Appreciation was extended to State Recording Secretary Eleanor Quigley and VIS member Beverly Vaughan Baker. Notices and announcements were emailed to Georgia Daughters. The 2017-2018 State Directory was prepared and sold at District Workshops. Certificates of Award and Certificates of Appreciation were made available. She worked with the VIS Committee on the Chapter Information Packet prior to District Workshops. The Chapter Officer Report Form (CORF) is sent to the State Corresponding Secretary, postmarked date deadline May 1, 2018.

Organizing Secretary Phyllis Lawson reported attending an organizing meeting, September 5, 2017, for Captain James Kell Chapter, Ellijay; the Chapter organized with 27 organizing members and 14 prospects. Thank you is expressed to Lynn Ware Spratling, Volunteer Genealogist, for her service and to Beth Snider Finley, Sequoyah Chapter, for her support. Patricia Marianne Hein, Acworth and Michelle Workman, Lookout Mountain were approved as Organizing Regents. Information was sent to Northwest District Chapters announcing the two chapters and asking for support. The Organizing Secretary is available to attend chapter meetings or to assist by phone and email. She is available to work with all chapters, share ideas, and help to strengthen chapters.

Treasurer Deborah Taylor Powell distributed the Treasurer's Balance Sheet and reported the Georgia State Society Balance Sheet Summary as of October 20, 2017: Savings \$500.75; Certificates of Deposit \$124,198.70; Checking account balance \$165,430.24; with Total Money Market Accounts \$90,502.93. Total assets are

\$354,342.23; Total Liabilities and Equity \$385,632.62. The Meadow Garden Balance Sheet Account Summary as of October 20, 2017: Certificates of Deposit \$373,127.87; Checking account balance \$81,376.41; with Total Money Market Accounts \$46,829.60. Petty Cash \$100.00; Total Fixed Assets are \$239,828.00; Total Liabilities and Equity \$741,261.88. Mrs. Powell reported the tax return is being prepared by CPA Robin R. McIntire.

Registrar Brenda Davison Jessel reported 85 members representing 46 chapters registered to attend the November 3 Genealogical Workshop with Guest speakers Marcy Carter-Lovick, Texas; and Debbie Duay, Florida. She thanked the State Regent and the SBOM event planning team.

As of November 2, 2017, there are 8,002 Georgia State Society members, including 582 Juniors, in 112 chapters, an increase of 148 members. This is a total of 443 new members with 78 Juniors, verified in 2017; with losses due to death and resignations this is a net gain of 148. There are 41 new applications and 17 reinstatements.

TEAM DAR was thanked: Rene Hardin, Chapter Development and Revitalization Committee Chair; Kitty Watters, Lineage Research Chair; and Marguerite Dyal, Membership. Lineage Research Volunteers assisted in the formation of three new Georgia Chapters, training chapter registrars.

Mrs. Jessel attended District Workshops; the Installation of new officers for Captain James Kell Chapter, Ellijay; KDS Graduation Day; and the Dedication of Berry College Frost Chapel Stained Glass Windows.

As State Proceedings Chair, she worked closely with State Recording Secretary Eleanor Quigley; and thanked her for her diligence and high standards in producing the 2016-2017 GSS NSDAR State Proceedings.

The New Horizons Leadership Course has been completed by 17 Georgia Daughters, 4 of whom will graduated at the SBOM. Forty Georgia Daughters are enrolled and hope to graduate at the 120th GSSDAR State Conference.

Historian Robin Redfearn Towns prepared and submitted the State Historian's Chapter Information Packet Letter and the State Historian's letter for the "Georgia Gazette." Historical materials were received from chapters, and the State Historian's files managed. Mrs. Towns attended the dedication of the Fort Peachtree Chapter's commemorative marker placed on "Glen Mary, The Temple on the Hill, Built Circa 1848," Sparta. The letter of approval from the NSDAR Office of the Historian General has been received for the addition of the name of Revolutionary War soldier Edward Wills to the 2012 marker placed by the Elijah Clarke Chapter in Memorial Park, Athens-Clarke County.

Entries from the chapters for Outstanding Teacher of American History were received and the judges were approved by the State Regent. Judging was completed in early November and the State winner was submitted to the Office of the Historian General.

She served as Vice Chair, Meadow Garden Furnishings, and Docent for the Meadow Garden Open House, July 4th. She prepared holiday decorations for exterior and kitchen areas of Meadow Garden for the Christmas Open House in December.

Librarian E. Lynn Brackey reported since January 2017, twenty-five books have been donated to the NSDAR Library by Georgia Chapters, including a donation in honor of the State Regent by the State Librarian.

Voices for a \$75.00 gift basket were sold at State Conference, raising \$1,280.00; books valued at \$500.00 were purchased for USO Project Wish Book and sold to GA Daughters at State Conference for their donations.

The State Library Fund replaced four bookcases in the NSDAR Library for \$1,500.00; five iPads were donated to Crossnore School for \$1,195.57; and \$5,000.00 was contributed toward the purchase of a \$20,000.00 planetary scanner for the NSDAR Library.

Proceedings books were scanned by AMAC, Georgia Tech's Accessibility Solutions and Research Center. The State Librarian is the Advisor for the Digitization Project Committee.

At the 2017 District Workshops voices were sold for a limited edition DAR ornament; porcelain dolls, dressed by Phyllis King. Books returned to Georgia by the NSDAR Library and private library books were sold. Monies raised were \$1,352.00.

She presented programs; attended Meadow Garden preservation meetings; Continental Congress; District Workshops; October NBOM as National Vice Chair,

Development; the dedication of the Frost Chapel windows, Berry College; and KDS and Tamassee as a member of their Advisory Committees.

Curator Shannon Cowles Logue attended Workshops; the Constitution Week Luncheon at Piedmont Driving Club; the installation of Officers, Captain James Kell Chapter; the Frost Chapel window re-dedication, Berry College; KDS Dedication Day; a Meadow Garden Meeting. Duties include care of State Flags, property preservation, and assisted Seating Chair Julie Prince. An 1868 letter written by Octavia Walton LeVert was purchased as a gift to the Georgia State Society. A Banner is being prepared for the podium at State events. Charlotte Christian was thanked for assisting at Workshops.

Parliamentarian Kate Sievert Cook had no report.

State Regent Patton introduced Greg Jacobs, Landmark Preservation, LLC (LP), who shared information about Meadow Garden's history and a long term plan for restoration.

Mrs. Patton called for the Meadow Garden Committee Reports.

Meadow Garden - FILED: Chair Nancy M. Parks reported the work on restoration of windows at Meadow Garden by Greg Jacobs of Landmark Preservation was almost complete. Fred Ecker of Tidewater Preservation, a company dedicated to conservation. restoration, and preservation of historic structures, joined in the assessment of the building. By temporarily removing flooring, crawl spaces were found and used to evaluate the area under the house. The roof was evaluated, samples were taken of walls to show paint layers, and the historic usage of all areas was analyzed. Requiring immediate repair was a chimney collapse causing a roof leakage. A carpenter bee invasion was treated. LP is developing a plan to address their findings and prepare a budget for short and long term maintenance of the house and site. The Hunt Board was declared the most valuable piece of furniture in the house and moved to front hall. July 4, visitors toured the house after the Signers Monument ceremony. Docents moved large groups of 20-30 from room to room. Pat Colbert brought her dulcimer group and her husband brought displays, objects representing the Revolutionary period and helped install new flags. Georgia Governor Nathan Deal, his wife, grandchildren, staff, and security visited on July 12. Director/Curator Maranda Christy conducted the tour. Debbie Powell installed Square, an inventory and funds management system. Visitors and sales increased over past nine months.

Meadow Garden Docent Report Chair Virginia "Ginger" Nicholson reported docent meetings and training classes were held in September and October. Docents handled three large school groups visiting Meadow Garden. Jan Manos delivered her notes for tours during December, explaining 18th century holiday traditions used during Christmas.

Meadow Garden Furnishings Vice Chair Robin Towns reported on development of Meadow Garden records: the house and contents were sorted, scanned, and put onto hard drive. Original documents put into notebook, indexed, placed into acid free box kept in upstairs board room of the Heritage Education building. Wilhoit McCorkle, Burkhalter Chapter, CE District, candidate for the Office of State First Vice Regent, who will be nominated by Laura Marcella Reid; Mary Elizabeth Harrah, James Waldrop Chapter, CW District, candidate for the Office of State Second Vice Regent, who will be nominated by Phyllis Hill King; Mary King Givens, Barnard Trail Chapter, SW District, candidate for the Office of State Chaplain, who will be nominated by Sylvia Moore Dinkel; Kate Sievert Cook, Oglethorpe Chapter, CW District, candidate for the Office of State Recording Secretary, who will be nominated by Marilyn Lett Wallace; Amy Pittman Lawson, Augusta Chapter, CE District, candidate for the Office of State Corresponding

Secretary, who will be nominated by Laura Marcella Reid; Helen Robertson Powell, Col. The State Regent recognized Teller Chair Rebecca "Becky" Rostron, who gave instructions for voting.

The continuation of Committee Reports was the Order of Business for the morning. Mrs. Patton asked the **State Standing Committees** to report. Bylaws reported: the State Parliamentarian read Article XVI from the State Bylaws defining the procedure for amending the Bylaws. The Bylaws procedures were followed, with the State Bylaws Committee rendering their recommendations.

The State Regent declared that all requirements for amending the Georgia State Bylaws were met and stated the rules for speaking and proposing amendments.

Carolyn Grant Hanf, Bylaws Chair, and Laura Marcella Reid, Vice Chair read the proposed amendments: [1] To amend Article IV. Officers. Section 2 (e), <u>which would</u> <u>then read</u>: To be eligible for the Office of State First Vice Regent, or the office of State Second Vice Regent, a member shall have served a full term as a Chapter Regent in a chapter of the Georgia State Society, and must have served one full term as an executive officer of the Georgia State Society. Lost by Rising Vote.

[2] To amend Article V, Nomination and Election of Officers, Section 1 (d), which would then read: A candidate whose chapter endorsement and statement of intent have been properly received by the State Regent may choose to announce her candidacy separate from the State Regent's Call to State Conference. Such a chapter endorsement and statement of intent shall be received by the State Regent at least thirty (30) days prior to the opening of State Conference at which the election is to take place. Adopted by Rising Vote.

[3] To amend Article V, Nomination and Election of Officers, Section 3, which would then read: The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected biennially at the State Conference. A majority vote shall elect. If there is only one candidate for an office, election shall be by voice vote. For any contested positions, the vote shall be by ballot. Independent candidates shall be listed on the ballot in a separate column from those candidates presented as a slate. Adopted by Rising Vote.

[4] To amend Article VI, Duties of Officers, Section 2, which would then read: The State Regent shall: (a) be the chief executive officer and the official spokesman for the State Society; (b) have general supervision of the affairs of the State Society; (c) preside at all meetings of the State Conference, State Board of Management and the Executive Committee; (d) appoint a State Chair for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society; (e) be ex-officio a member of all committees; (f) appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as advisor in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting; (g) sign all contracts and agreements made in the name of the Georgia State Society with the recorded approval of the Executive Committee and the State Board of Management or the State Conference as directed by these Bylaws; (h) be bonded and have the authority to draw upon funds of the State Society with the approval of the Finance Committee. (i) recommend to the Finance Committee a Certified Public Accountant who shall be approved by the Finance Committee. (j) have the authority to assign additional duties to the officers as required. **Lost by Rising Vote.**

[5] To amend Article VI. Duties of Officers, Section 3, which would then read: The State First Vice Regent shall: (a) Perform the duties of the office of State Regent in the absence or inability of the State Regent; (b) Fill a vacancy in the office of State Regent; (c) Perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent; (d) Serve on those committees as designated by these Bylaws and as directed by the State Regent; (e) Prepare the courtesy resolutions for business meetings of the Georgia State Society for the review and approval of the Resolutions Committee. Adopted by Rising Vote.

[6] To amend Article VI. Duties of Officers, Section 7. With secondary amendments: [6.1] Rebecca M. West moved: To amend Article VI. Duties of Officers, Section 7. subsection (a). Adopted and [6.2] Melodye G. Brown moved: To amend Article VI. Duties of Officers, Section 7. subsection (c). Adopted. Section 7 would then read: The State Corresponding Secretary shall: (a) At the direction of the State Regent, conduct email, postal correspondence and produce publications on behalf of the Georgia State Society. (b) With guidance of the State Regent and State Conference Chair, prepare the State Conference Program and arrange for printing. Present the Program at the State Conference. (c) Prepare the State Directory and maintain updates for inclusion in the Georgia State Society website. (d) Have for sale at all state meetings certificates of appreciation and certificates of award. Adopted by Rising Vote.

[7] To amend Article VI, Duties of Officers, Section 9, which would then read: The State Treasurer Shall: (a) be bonded; (b) be the custodian of the funds of the State Society, placing them in institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance. Place Certificates of Deposit after receiving written approval on rate and term from the State Regent and State Chair of the Finance Committee; (c) receive the state dues and delegate fees from the chapters and receive all sums contributed by the chapters and others for state and national projects, disbursing monthly to the Treasurer General all funds designated for special projects. Receive State Conference registration fees and events funds from the State Conference and Events Treasurer. Disburse other funds only when authorized by the State Regent in writing: (d) upon receipt of verified expenses paid by the State Regent for travel and hotel, reimburse the State Regent for these expenses up to the amount approved in the budget for the State Regent's expenses. (e) keep an account of all sums received or disbursed by using accounting software and keep receipt/copies for all transactions. (f) prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference ten (10) days in advance of each meeting for distribution at the meetings. (g) be a member of the Finance Committee, the Meadow Garden Board, and ex-officio member of the Credentials Committee. (h) prepare reports for the Proceedings Book, Executive Board Meetings, Meadow Garden Board Meetings, and, as needed to State Officers, State Chairmen, and Clubs. (i) monitor chapter filings with the Internal Revenue Service due the 15th day of the fifth month after the close of the chapters fiscal year. (j) prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year, said audit by a Certified Public Accountant, shall be performed and delivered within forty-five (45) days of receipt of books; (k) arrange preparation of both federal and state tax returns by a Certified Public Accountant; filings are due the 15th day of the fifth month after the close of the fiscal year; (I) provide copies of audit and tax returns to the Treasurer General; (m) keep State Treasurer Instructions and Chapter Treasurers instructions current: (n) retain or destroy records according to their schedule provided by the Treasurer General. Adopted by Rising Vote.

[8] To amend Article VI, Duties of Officers, Section 10, <u>which would then read:</u> The State Registrar shall: (a) when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution prove eligibility and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars; (b) report on membership changes, by application, transfers, reinstatements and resignations at State Conference; (c) communicate with Chapter Registrars changes in procedures from the National Society; (d) review e-membership chapter reports and identify problems within chapters and offer assistance; (e) in conjunction with the Membership Committee, communicate with Chapter Registrars concerning the Prospective Member Database (PMD). Adopted by Rising Vote.

[9] To amend Article VI, Duties of Officers, Section 11, which would then read: The State Historian shall: (a) Be in charge, within the state, of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General as well as those authorized by the Georgia State Society. (b) Keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves within the state; (c) Prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General; (d) Promote the study of American history, state and county history and historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the founding of our state and counties; (e) Facilitate the National Society Outstanding Teacher of American History contest. Adopted by Rising Vote.

[10] To amend Article VIII, State Board of Management, Section 2, which would then read: The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting between annual meetings. It may meet whenever called by the State Regent. A minimum of thirty (30) days' notice shall be given as to the time and place of any such meeting. Adopted by Rising Vote.

[11] To amend Article VIII, State Board of Management, Section 5. with secondary amendment: Leslie Watkins moved To amend Article VIII, State Board of Management, Section 5, sentence 2. Adopted. <u>Section 5 would then read</u>: All members in good standing of the Georgia State Society may attend the meeting of the State Board of Management. The State Chairmen, Vice chairmen, committee members of Administrative, Standing, Special, State and Meadow Garden Committees shall be granted the privilege of the floor and the right to speak, but shall not vote. Adopted by Rising Vote.

The State Regent recessed the meeting to attend the DAR School Luncheon; the Business Session to reconvene at 2:00 p.m.

Saturday Afternoon Business Session Minutes April 7, 2018

The 120th State Conference of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, reconvened in the Dunwoody, Crowne Plaza Atlanta Perimeter at Ravinia, at 2:22 p.m., Saturday, April 7, 2018, State Regent Joyce Ball Patton presiding.

The State Regent introduced the Past President General of the National Society Sons of the American Revolution, J. Michael Tomme, Sr., who brought greetings. Mr. Tomme presented Mrs. Patton with a check for \$250.00 for the State Regent's Projects and a check for \$250.00 for Meadow Garden Projects. He presented SAR/DAR Membership Promotion awards: the award for highest percentage of new SAR members was presented to Bainbridge Chapter, and the award for highest total number of new SAR members was presented to the Governor David Emanuel – Adam Brinson Chapter. Twenty-four DAR Chapters referred SAR members this year, an increase in referrals of 15%.

The continuation of Committee Reports was the Order of Business for the afternoon. State Standing Committees, Bylaws continued their report:

[12] To amend Georgia State Bylaw Article IX, Executive Committee, Section 3(d), <u>which would then read</u>: This Executive Committee shall: (d) receive and make recommendations for projects requiring expenditure of funds outside routine expenditures to be considered by the State Conference. This includes the State Regent's Projects within the State of Georgia, at the National Society, and at the DAR-approved schools. Adopted by Rising Vote.

[13] To amend Georgia State Bylaw Article X, Finances, Section 2, <u>which would</u> <u>then read</u>: (a) The annual dues of chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be \$10.00 for each member of the chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1. (b) In the first year of every national administration, the State Conference shall vote upon an increase of the state dues. Lost by Rising Vote.

[14] To amend Georgia State Bylaw Article X, Finances, Section 3, which would then read: (a) Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the state dues, a conference registration fee of \$25.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under these Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether the chapter is represented or not. (b) Honorary State Regents and State Officers shall pay a conference fee of \$25.00 at the time of registration or shall include the conference registration fee in the check for Conference meal reservations. (c) Other members of the Georgia State Society who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a conference fee of \$20.00 at the time of registration or shall include the conference registration fee in the check for Conference meal reservations. Lost by Rising Vote.

[15] To amend Georgia State Bylaw Article XI, Committees, Section 2 (a), <u>which</u> <u>would then read</u>: Bylaws: This committee shall be composed of one (1) Honorary State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and one (1) member from each of the districts; each of the members representing the districts shall not be serving on any other State Standing Committee. The State Parliamentarian shall serve as an advisory member of the committee. The State Regent shall appoint the chair of the committee. Adopted by Rising Vote.

[16] To amend Georgia State Bylaw Article XI, Committees, Section 2 (b), which would then read: Finance: This committee shall be composed of seven (7) members to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer and one (1) Honorary State Regent, one (1) active chapter regent, and two (2) active chapter members from different districts, neither of whom shall be an Honorary State Regent nor a State Officer nor a chapter regent nor from the same district as the appointed active chapter regent. From these seven (7) members the State Regent shall appoint the chair of the committee. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund. This committee shall have charge of all investments of the Georgia State Society's funds. Adopted by Rising Vote.

[17] To amend Georgia State Bylaw Article XI, Committees, Section 2 (d), which would then read: Proceedings: This committee shall be composed of the State Recording Secretary, the immediate past State Recording Secretary, the State First Vice Regent, and four (4) additional members at least one of whom shall be an Honorary State Regent. The four (4) members, including the Honorary State Regent shall represent different districts; and the members, excluding the Honorary State Regent, shall not be serving on any other State Standing Committee. The State Regent shall appoint the chair of the committee. Adopted by Rising Vote.

[18] To amend Georgia State Bylaw Article XIII, Districts, Section 2, <u>which would</u> <u>then read</u>: Workshop(s) shall be held annually, the location(s) shall be strategically chosen to be convenient to the Georgia chapter members. Adopted by Rising Vote.

[19] To amend Article XVI, Amendments, Section 1, <u>which would then read</u>: The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent, the State Parliamentarian, and the State Bylaws Chair at least two weeks prior to the State Board of Management. The proposed amendments should include the date of the proposal with the rationale and the name of the proposer. The State Regent shall send a copy of the proposed amendment to each chapter, at least sixty (60) days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the Call to Conference. Adopted by Rising Vote.

[20] To amend Article XVI, Amendments, <u>which would then read</u>: Section 2. The Bylaws Committee shall forward to the State Regent proposed amendments duly submitted, provided the subject matter is suitable for inclusion in the Bylaws and the proposal is in proper form, and if found not to be suitable subject matter, may reject the proposal, or if not in proper form, may revise, return it to the proposer for redrafting, or take such action as is deemed in order. Section 3. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted. Adopted by Rising Vote.

The State Regent thanked the Bylaws Committee Chair, and asked Mrs. Hanf to introduce her committee. Mrs. Hanf introduced and thanked: Laura Marcella Reid, Camille Redfern Wiley, Peggy Smith Gates, Susan Ansley Lindsey, Jane Greer Durden, Kathryn "Kathy" Alexander Hicks, Teresa Meadows Floyd, Melodye G. Brown, and Advisor, Kate Sievert Cook.

State Chairs of State Standing Committees continued with reports: Brenda Jessel, Proceedings Chair reported. Mrs. Patton thanked the Proceedings Committee.

Resolutions Chair, Edwina Beall, gave the **First Reading of the Courtesy Resolutions**. (*The resolutions in their entirety will be printed at the conclusion of the State Conference minutes.*)

STATE REGENT – Joyce Ball Patton April 6, 2018

Thank You to every Georgia Daughter who gave this State Regent the opportunity to serve as your 63rd State Regent of the Georgia State Society! We are at the end of this exciting, rewarding and highly profitable Patton Administration. None of this would have been possible without a great Team of Officers and State Chairs and the 8,065 Georgia Daughters who keep the fires burning in their chapters and in our State.

The Patton Administration Goals were set and with your help were fulfilled:

1. Membership Growth reached a new level of Over 8,000 Members! Our CDRC TEAM (Chapter Development and Revitalization Commission) assisted chapters with applications; held Workshops all over the State; invited Genealogy Professionals who shared their expertise. We also utilized the America 250 Team on the most difficult applications. Many Volunteer Genealogists were assigned to chapters and assisted them and worked with their Registrars. A big thank you goes to our Membership, Volunteer Genealogists and Lineage Research Teams and our wonderful State Registrar, all of whom traveled the State having workshops. We broke the glass ceiling by attaining 8,100 members in the fall of 2017, but we also lost members to resignation. It is important to encourage members to attend meetings – give members a job, and they will be involved and attend. Georgia is not the largest state in Membership, but we should be known as the State with the Golden Heart.

2. Our Beloved Meadow Garden now has a "Long Range Plan" which details future Restoration and Maintenance. It provides ongoing assistance to obtain certification by the American Alliance of Museums, with plans for future grants and a Budget to accomplish these goals.

3. All the historic, leaded-glass windows at Meadow Garden have been restored. With the same grant we now have the proper paint colors for future painting, including a beautiful faux door that was so popular during the time the Walton family lived there.

4. We installed a new HVAC and dehumidifier for the lower level at Meadow Garden and plan to hide these modern conveniences from view.

5. The gift shop has a new home in the Heritage Education Building with new seating for viewing the Meadow Garden DVD. We also have a new computer for updating the PastPerfect museum software and answering emails.

6. Historic items were donated for Meadow Garden: a book belonging to George Walton, a 1779 Book of new Federal Laws; period furniture; rugs and period clothing. All these items give our visitors a more realistic look into the past.

7. Christmas Open House was held in early December. Meadow Garden had candle lighting and period decoration, bringing a look at early Holidays in Georgia. Carolers sang and dulcimers rang inside the house. The SAR brought their traveling trunk, of great interest to the children. The evening ended with cookies and hot chocolate and a gift of a jar of Meadow Garden jelly. Thank you to the Meadow Garden Board and the-Docents who served in period clothing. Almost \$60,000.00 will be left for future restorations by the State Regent's Project. The Georgia Daughters have made this possible with their hard work and donations

8. The DAR Schools were remembered, beginning with our own Berry College. The State Society restored the historic, stained-glass windows of Frost Chapel, which were originally donated by Georgia. We also have a check for the rebuilding of Miss Berry's Gazebo,

which was blown down during a storm. Total money given for these school projects are: Berry College, \$31,250.00; Crossnore School, \$10,000.00 for the Healthy Child Initiative; Hindman Settlement School, \$25,000.00 for an Executive Office at the Mike Mullins Cultural Center; the KDS Scholarship Fund; \$10,000.00; and to Tamassee DAR School, \$10,446.50 for a Counselor. The Total cash donated from the Georgia State Society will be: \$86,696.50.

9. The Georgia State Society gave \$20,000.00 to the National Society to purchase a Z scanner for the DAR Library.

10. The State Society funded a reading and recording room at the USO in Fort Stewart. Daughters also furnished a play room for the children which has books, a tv, games, tea set and tables and chairs, all in the Dr. Seuss theme. Over 1,000 books were donated by our members at last year's state conference. The soldiers who are being deployed may visit the reading room and record themselves reading to their children. These recordings will be given to the children during their parent's deployment. We have recently heard the children are coming to read and record themselves reading and sending to their deployed parents. Thank you, Leslie Olejnik, for all your hard work in making this possible.

11. Over 100 flags from our chapters were sent to the 82nd Airborne Division in Afghanistan. One came from the Governor and our First Lady, and had flown over the Georgia Capital. Also during the Orchid Society Tea, Daughters donated cigars for these same service men.

It has been your State Regent's pleasure to represent the State Society at the National Board of Management in October and February. Your State Regent has met with the Conference Committee to prepare for this exciting State Conference. It was a pleasure to host two Orchid Society Christmas Teas at my home. Thanks to our State Chair Amy Nation, Beverly Baker, and Teresa Daniels,

This Regent continued to visit the Georgia Chapters. The Society also has five new chapters, thanks to our Organizing Secretary, Phyllis Lawson, who was their go-to source of information. The newest Chapters are Jacob Braselton; Kennesaw Mountain; Captain James Kell; Liberty Hill; and the reorganized Lyman Hall Chapter. We have another Organizing Chapter, Lookout Mountain in Lookout Mountain, Georgia. A huge thank you to the new Regents! Will you please stand and let us show you our appreciation.

Your Regent enjoyed attending the Sons of the American Revolution State Conference in Duluth. Thank you to the SAR for your support. A special Thank You to Shep Hammack and the color guard for the beautiful tricorn hat they donated for Meadow Garden.

One of the wonderful opportunities you have as State Regent is to travel to other State Conferences. Since last Continental Congress your State Regent has visited New York, Mississippi, Connecticut, Florida and Georgia's Children of the American Revolution State Conferences. Thank you for the courtesies offered this State Regent while visiting your states. We also attended the Kentucky State DAR Duncan Tavern Festival in Frankfort. Chapter Treasurer's Instructions and reporting forms have been updated for CIP. Reports and money donated to National Funds were sent to the Treasurer General. STATE LIBRARIAN – E. Lynn Brackey

The 2017 CMR Georgia State Librarian section was completed by 89 chapters. Twentyfour chapters had "No Report". One hundred fifty-nine chapter members representing 50 chapters spent 5,758 hours volunteering in local libraries. Four hundred ninety-nine chapter members representing 76 chapters donated 8.250 books to local libraries valued at \$34,058.00. Thirteen chapters organized book clubs with ninety-one chapter members participating. We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution ("Georgia State Society, NSDAR") (a nonprofit organization), which comprise the statement of financial position - modified cash basis as of June 30, 2018, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows – all under the modified cash basis for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the modified cash basis of accounting; this includes determining that the modified cash basis of accounting is an acceptable basis for the preparation of the financial statements in the circumstances. Management is also responsible for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This summary of significant accounting policies of the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution (the "Organization") is presented to assist in understanding the Organization's financial statements. The financial statements and notes are representations of the Organization's management, who is responsible for their integrity and objectivity.

Nature of Organization

The Organization is a volunteer women's service organization created to promote patriotism, preserve American history and secure America's future through better education for children.

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Organization have been prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting, a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles. Accordingly, revenue is recorded when received rather than when earned, and expenses are recorded when paid rather than when incurred.

Basis of Presentation

Financial statement presentation follows the recommendation of the Financial Accounting Standards Board ("FASB") Accounting Standards Codification ("ASC") 958 *Not for-Profit Entities.* Under ASC 958, the Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted, temporarily restricted, and permanently restricted. A description of the three net asset categories follows:

<u>Unrestricted</u> - Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed restrictions. Unrestricted net assets may be designated for specific purposes by action of the Board of Directors.

<u>Temporarily Restricted</u> - Net assets whose use is subject to donor-imposed restrictions that can be fulfilled by actions of the Organization pursuant to those restrictions or that expire by the passage of time.

<u>Permanently Restricted</u> - Net assets subject to donor-imposed restrictions that they be maintained permanently by the Organization.

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Use of Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts and disclosures. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash, Cash Equivalents, and Certificates of Deposit

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Organization considers all cash on hand, highly liquid bank deposits, and short-term debt securities with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

At June 30, 2018, the Organization had approximately \$502,000 in fixed rate certificates of deposit with varying maturity dates through March 2020, which were stated at cost plus accrued interest, which approximates fair value.

Property and Equipment

Expenditures for property and equipment are capitalized and depreciated over the estimated useful life of the respective asset. Additions and betterments of \$750 or more are capitalized at cost, while maintenance and repairs that do not improve or extend the useful lives of the respective assets are currently expensed. Depreciation is provided for in amounts sufficient to relate the cost of depreciable assets to operations over their estimated service lives, principally using the straight-line and 200% declining balance methods. Management has determined the difference between the 200% declining balance method and the straight-line method is not significant.

The Organization does not capitalize collections and historical treasures, including Meadow Garden. Meadow Garden and its contents are historical treasures and are insured for approximately \$1,945,000.

Depreciation expense for the year ended June 30, 2018 was \$22,761.

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Donated Services

Many volunteers have made significant contributions of their time to develop and promote the programs of the Organization. The value of these donated services is not included in the accompanying financial statements, as such services do not create or enhance nonfinancial assets or require specialized skills. If donated services received either created or enhanced non-financial assets or required specialized skills, which would need to be purchased if not donated, the value of those donated services would be recorded.

Donations

Contributions received are recorded as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted depending on the existence and/or nature of donor restrictions.

Contributions are recognized when received by the Organization. Contributions that are restricted by the donor are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets if the restrictions expire in the fiscal year in which the contributions are recognized. All other donor-restricted contributions are reported as increases in temporarily or permanently restricted net assets depending on the nature of the restrictions. When a restriction expires, restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets.

Membership Dues

Membership dues are recognized when received.

Income Taxes

Georgia State Society, NSDAR, a nonprofit organization operating under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, is exempt from federal, state, and local income taxes, and accordingly, no provision for income taxes is included in the accompanying financial statements for the Organization.

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Income Taxes (Continued)

The modified cash basis of accounting, a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles, requires management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Organization and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Organization has taken an uncertain tax position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the relevant tax authority. Management has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Organization and has concluded that as of June 30, 2018 there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Organization is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. Management believes it is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to June 30, 2015.

During December 2017, the President of the United States of America signed into law the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act. Under this Act, maximum corporate tax rates were reduced from a rate of 35% to a flat rate of 21%. The Organization's tax liability for any potential unrelated business income tax should not be significant. There are other changes to the tax law that may affect the Organization, but the magnitude of such changes has not been determined.

Subsequent Events

Subsequent events have been evaluated through the date of this report, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

NOTE B - FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS AND CONCENTRATIONS OF CREDIT RISK

The Organization's financial instruments that are exposed to concentrations of credit risk consist primarily of cash, cash equivalents and certificates of deposit.

The Organization maintains its cash, cash equivalents and certificates of deposit with highly rated financial institutions and at times, may be in excess of federally insured limits. The Organization has not experienced in losses in such accounts and believes it is not exposed to any significant risk of loss.

NOTE C - AFFILIATES

The Organization collects membership dues and donations from its local Georgia Chapters for the Organization and the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

National Committees: Reports of State Chairs

AMERICAN HERITAGE – Virginia "Ginger" Ranson Nicholson

Chapters gave 69 American Heritage programs this year. Entries in the DAR National Art Contests were: Fiber Arts 12, Arts and Sculpture 16, Crafts 2, Literature and Drama 5, Music 1. Three Chapter Women in the Arts awards. Eight National winners: two first place winners; one in Music, one in Fiber Arts; Three second place winners; one in Crafts, basketry, a twosome group made a hand-thrown pottery plate embellished in China painting. Three third place winners: a Multi-Media Collage; an Arts and Sculpture table top image in glass; an Embroidered sewing box in Fiber Arts. Chapter programs included docents making Regency era costumes and wearing them for Meadow Garden tours at Christmastime and in the Georgia Governor's mansion. Dulcimer musicians played at both of these events. A program of Women's Portrait Painters was featured along with organizing art programs for the public. Members held 39 Open Studio Sessions for the public and volunteered 48 hours to a local art league. An art awards program was instituted in a school system. A Quilt of Valor was made and presented to a WWII veteran.

AMERICAN HISTORY – Rogena 'Gena' Murray Moorhead

Reports were received from 89 chapters. 330 American History Programs presented; 61 Outstanding American Women honored. The American History Essay Contest was sponsored in 223 schools; 3,849 students participating. Chapters awarded 2,061 Certificates of Participation, 233 Certificates of Awards and 124 Bronze Medals. The Christopher Columbus Essay Contest was sponsored in 41 schools; 729 students participating. Chapters awarded 311 Certificates of Participation. Total essay's collected: 4,578. 306 Students were awarded Certificates for Outstanding Work in American History. Thank you to Vice Chair for excellent work supporting this committee: Penne Guffin Baldwin, Kristine Fitch White, Mary Lou Nelson Goehring, Martha Middlebrooks Wells, Lottie Land Holloway and Carol Goff Russell. Outstanding American History Publicity: Suwanee Creek. Outstanding Chapter Program Report: Old Unicoi Trail. Recognition for sponsoring an Essay Contest Winner: Mary Hammond Washington, Thomasville and Apalachee Chapters. Outstanding Chapter winning the Traveling Silver Tray: Philadelphia Winn, "Kitty" Worrell Watters, Regent.

AMERICAN INDIANS – Susan Johnson Gillespie

With 113 Chapters reporting in 2018 through the digital system and with additional reports Georgia Daughters supported the American Indians Activities with enthusiasm. Chapters representing 7927 members presented 533 Indian Minutes; received 28 American Indian Heritage Month Proclamations; offered 73 programs about American Indians; donated \$2,327.00 to the American Indian Scholarship fund, \$1,430.00 to Friends of American Indians, \$852.00 to Bacone College, and \$527.00 to the Chemawa School. In addition to these activities Georgia Daughters raised \$3,020.00 for the Indian Youth of America Camps. An Award with a monetary prize will be awarded to the Chapter completing the most AIC activities. Additional awards will be presented for outstanding achievement, outstanding programs or projects, and over all achievement. Certificates of appreciation will be given to the 20 chapters contributing to the IYA. This chairman would like to thank Vice Chairmen, Alicyne Roth, Ruth McIntire, and Wanda Patterson.

AMERICANISM – Phyllis Hill King

With 114 chapters reporting, 71 chapter members refer to the DAR Manual for Citizenship located on the DAR members' website, 24 members assisted with naturalization classes,

chapters participated at 28 naturalization ceremonies. Distribution of materials included: 13,017 US flags, 2,890 Flag Pins, 5,666 Flag bookmarks, 5,364 copies of the US Pledge to the Flag, 4,807 copies of American Creed. The Georgia State Society's recipient for the DAR Medal of Honor was Mr. Jack Frost, nominated by Jacob Braselton Chapter. Lt. James Monroe Chapter presented a DAR Medal of Honor to Ernest Jackson; The Outstanding Chapter Report Award was given to Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter. Chapters participated in Naturalization ceremonies and gave receptions or goodie bags to new citizens, coordinated numerous patriotic activities, veterans' projects and parades; placed wreaths and flags at memorials; hosted Flag Day, July the Fourth, Veterans Day, presented programs on the Flag; distributed patriotic materials to new citizens, school children, and to communities. Awards were presented to chapters for their outstanding work in each activity of the Americanism Committee.

CHAPTER ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS – Elseon "Elsie" Banner Lawson

100% of Chapters reported electronically. Total points achieved by all chapters equaled 57,760. All chapters achieved either Level I or Level 2. Chair provided material for workshop training sessions, answered questions and assisted chapters needing help. Chair worked with District Directors to assist chapter who had incomplete reports or reports with errors. Six chapters scored over 1000 points and the Jacob Braselton Chapter scored over 2000 points. District winners were: NE Jacob Braselton (2092), NW Fielding Lewis (1498), SE Lachlan McIntosh (666), SW John Benning (624), CE College Hill (996) and CW Oglethorpe (928). This Chair presented State Certificates of Appreciation awards to the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place winners based on chapter size (1-99 members; 100-200 members and 200+ members) and to the winner of each District.

CHAPTER DEVELOPMENT AND REVITALIZATION COMMISSION – Rene' Shows Hardin

The CDRC worked with chapter officers to revitalize 10 existing chapters and assisted 8 newer chapters in development of chapter officers and membership teams. Volunteer Genealogists were assigned to assist chapter registrars. Chapters were encouraged to add membership chairmen and welcome committees, each member participating in membership. Chapter Regents were asked to make chapter meetings fun and inviting and to reach into their community to reach their population of potential DAR members; to consider meeting times, locations. If a chapter cannot fill board positions with eager members, revitalization is needed. Think about new ways to increase membership rather than disbandment or merging. 5 New Georgia chapters were formed during 2017 adding over 120 members to Membership. 6 Genealogy presentations were held at the 2016-2017 State conference. 4 Genealogy Forums were held at each District Workshop with 2 additional genealogy workshops held at Columbus and St Simons Island workshops. Workshops were held by Volunteer Genealogists across Georgia. The Traveling Pewter Pitcher is awarded each Year to the chapter with the largest percentage increase in chapter attendance in chapter meetings, winner this year, Etowah.

CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION – Peggy Reece Bruckner

Young Patriots of the C.A.R. (age birth-22) are lineal descendants of Patriots of the American Revolution. Adult leadership and financial support by the Georgia State Society NSDAR, its chapters, and individual members made possible programs focusing on citizenship, history, patriotism, and service to others. 2017-2018 GSSCAR State President Zachary Paul Frederick's State Project raised funds benefitting the National World War One Memorial in Washington and honoring the sacrifices of all World War One Veterans. Zachary helped create awareness of the Centennial Anniversary of the US entry into WWI. Certificates of Appreciation were presented to sixty-six chapters providing 2017-2018 Senior C.A.R. leaders and financial support at the national, state, and/or local levels.

COMMEMORATIVE EVENTS – Patricia "Pat" Haynes Bradford

Thank you to all of the chapters that sent in Commemorative Reports. 1,761 daughters from across the state participated in Events like 4th of July, 50th anniversary of Viet Nam, Memorial Day, 100th anniversary of the Treaty of Versailles, Anniversary of the American's Creed, the 75th anniversary of D Day and Pearl Harbor and the 100th anniversary of WWI. Awards were given: Chapters participating in Most Chapter Events: First Place James Stewart, Second Place Atlanta, and Third Place tie Andrew McBride and Suwanee Creek; Best Report for Service to Viet Nam Veterans, Apalachee; Commemorating WWI, Elijah Clark; Special Recognition: Sacred Wreath Laying Captain Edward Hagin and Flags across America, General Daniel Newnan.

COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARDS – Beth Snider Finley

Community Service Awards is an opportunity for chapters and states to recognize worthy individuals and/or organizations in communities for unpaid voluntary achievements in cultural, educational, humanitarian, patriotic, historical, citizenship, or environmental conservation. The recipient must have contributed to the community in an outstanding manner through voluntary heroic, civic, benevolent service, by organizing or participating in community activities. Award recipients: Abraham Baldwin, Augustin Clayton, Colonel William Candler, Levi Sapp, Martha Stewart Bulloch, Old Unicoi Trail, Reverend John Andrew, Sequoyah, Vidalia. State awards: Nickey Gregory Company, AMAC Accessibility Solutions.

CONSERVATION – Pamela Ann Lyle

113 chapters completed the CMR Conservation Report. Members reported 235 conservation projects. 296 members attended Earth Day and/or Arbor Day events. 407 conservation minutes were presented at meetings. 162 conservation projects were completed. 74 chapter members reported registering their pollinator gardens on the Million Pollinator Challenge website. 1,165 pollinator seed packets and 729 butterfly garden stakes were distributed throughout the year. During Fall Workshops, visual and printed information was offered for awareness of non-native, invasive plants, and the importance of pollinators. Routine conservation topics were shared via social media. The NSDAR Conservation Medal was submitted and approved from three chapters: Martha Stewart Bulloch, James Stewart and Suwanee Creek. A new butterfly photo contest received 35 entries. The first GSSDAR Conservation Award was given at State Conference to Friends of Disabled Adults and Children (FODAC) for their outstanding accomplishments in recycling. Thanks to Vice Chairman, Cynthia Grantham Davis.

CONSTITUTION WEEK – Lydia Rainey McGill

September 16, 2017, the Constitution Week Luncheon was held at Piedmont Driving Club with 311 attending. State Regent Joyce Patton brought greetings, along with Corresponding Secretary General Virginia Lingelbach, and Presidents of SAR and C.A.R. First Lady of Georgia, Sandra Dunagan Deal, introduced the guest speaker and shared their 50 years of public service to citizens of Georgia. Governor Nathan Deal presented and read the Constitution Week Proclamation and spoke on Constitutional Law. Children's Constitution Books were donated to Mrs. Deal to give to the school children of Georgia. 114 Georgia Chapters reported: bell ringing, Constitution Week Proclamations, reciting Preamble or Constitution Week Minutes, and contacting their legislators. 811 schools were contacted, 458 classrooms visited, 8464 Constitution Week Kits distributed, 1,051,087 Constitution Week Displays, 825 Constitution Week Events, 183 Constitution Week Radio spots. Chapters sent emails, Facebook post, text or tweets. Winners recognized for Constitution Week Scrapbooks. Certificate of Award winners presented to small, medium and large chapters for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place.

A PROCLAMATION CONSTITUTION WEEK

- WHEREAS September 17, 2017, marks the 230th anniversary of the 1787 Constitutional Convention where the world's oldest written constitution was drafted by the United States, thus outlining the fundamental principles by which our nation is governed: and
- WHEREAS: Our Constitution establishes six basic governing principles for our society, including popular sovereignty, the rule of law, federalism, judicial review, individual rights, and a separation of powers accomplished through a system of checks and balances; and
- WHEREAS: Popular sovereignty is the foundation by which our government was created by and for the people, while the rule of law requires that government be guided by a set of laws, rather than by any individual or single group. Federalism provides for the sharing of power between our national government and individual state governments; and
- WHEREAS: The Constitution ensures the distribution of functions and responsibilities among three separate branches and a system of checks and balances to calibrate those powers, guaranteeing individual rights and liberties against government encroachment; and
- WHEREAS: The State of Georgia became the fourth state in the Union to ratify the Constitution, signed by Georgia delegates Abraham Baldwin and William Few, on January 2, 1788. Constitution Week provides an opportunity for all citizens to learn of Georgia's role during our nation's founding; now

I, NATHAN DEAL, Governor of the State of Georgia, do hereby proclaim September THEREFORE: 17-23, 2017, as CONSTITUTION WEEK in Georgia and September 17, 2017, as CONSTITUTION AWARENESS DAY in Georgia.

> In witness thereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the Executive Department to be affixed this 1st day of September in the year of our Lord two thousand seventeen.

94 Georgia chapters participated in DAR Good Citizens; 400 schools contacted, 21 new; 318 schools participated. This year's growth: 319 students recognized with pin, certificate, wallet card. 94 chapters, 345 students participated in the Scholarship Contest. Chapters gave DAR Good Citizens a total of \$18,912.00, a 19% increase over prior year. The State Chair and District Vice Chairs encouraged the use of the Pre-Order form to assist chapters in ordering supplies. They attended all four workshops and offered sales tables at each. State and District Vice Chairs worked directly with chapters. A total of 20 judges participated in selecting the district and state winners. State Chair Judith Sherling, along with District Vice-Chairs Charlotte McCloskey, Dianne Mauldin, Susan Burroughs, Mary Catherine Fouche, Sylvia Dinkel, and Bette Wester.

DAR LIBRARY – E. Lynn Brackey

Statistics, donated books are listed in the State Librarian Report. Eight Georgia Daughters and two Georgia chapters made donations to Friends of Seimes totaling \$1,000.00. Seventeen Georgia Daughters and four Georgia chapters made donations to Friends of the Library totaling \$4,200.00. Five DAR Library programs were presented.

DAR MAGAZINE – Stephanie Kupecky Chasez

The 2017 Georgia State Society's Co-op ad in the November/December Daughters Newsletter proudly honored our State Regent Joyce Ball Patton and her nomination as a Candidate for Vice President General, Corresponding Secretary General Virginia Lingelbach, State Officers, State Outstanding Junior Stephanie Chasez, State Pages, Co-op ad participants, Berry College and Meadow Garden. 100% of Georgia Chapters submitted their DAR Magazine Report. One hundred and two Chapter Regents subscribed to the American Spirit with thirty-six chapters reaching the 30% subscription target for Chapter Achievement Award. President General's message was read at regular meetings from Magazine by one hundred and one chapters. Georgia Chapters reported top three areas of interest for DAR Magazine: 1st Historic Places; 2nd History; 3rd Genealogy.

Winner of the 1st contest and the Traveling Crystal Trophy for the chapter achieving the highest percentage of subscriptions is Jacob Braselton, 115%. Winner of the 2nd contest, and the Traveling Blue Crystal Trophy, for the chapter achieving the largest increase of subscriptions from the previous year is Sunbury.

DAR PROJECT PATRIOT – Mary Caroline Giles Mixon

Georgia chapter regents obtained names and addresses of deployed soldiers and at Christmas sent gift boxes. Reports: National contributions were \$15,093.00 and contributions to DAR centers on the state level, \$7,233.00 and supported state project; at Chapter level, \$35,721.00 for support of Chapter projects. Three chapters received Best Report: Martha Stewart Bulloch, Most Creative Report: Atlanta, Old Unicom Trail with Most Original Alternative; Most Contributions Per Capita to the Deployed: Kennesaw Mountain. Atlanta had a gift of a YouTube presentation, filmed on location in the Middle East, and a visit from the soldiers when they were stateside. Congratulations to the Orchid Society for the humidors of cigars to the 82nd Airborne.

DAR SCHOLARSHIP – Dana McCoy Anderson

Sixteen chapters contributed a combined scholarship total of \$49,789.00 for 35 students. Altamaha gifted the greatest amount (\$15,000.00), followed by Joseph Habersham (\$10,000.00) and Oliver Morton (\$7,000.00). Eight chapters donated over \$1,000.00, another five providing \$100.00 - \$999.00. Thirty-two chapters provided information to the public regarding the NSDAR national scholarships. Three chapters, Elijah Clarke, John Houstoun, and Savannah have endowed scholarships at Georgia universities, included below. Reverend John Andrew established the George W. Brown WWII Memorial Fund for student veterans at the University of Georgia and a JAC Scholarship. Middle Georgia College Foundation completed the transition of the Lydia Napier Jelks Fund to a scholarship for a major in political science, history or education. The University of Georgia four funds pooled assets to create a graduate assistantship in the Master's program in Historic Preservation. The GSSDAR Kate Duncan Smith Scholarship increased by a \$4,448.00 contribution thus ensuring its stability. The Ingram Fund at Valdosta State issued a record value of \$52,383.00 in loans to 30 students. State scholarships totaled \$16,015.00. Assets held at educational institutions total \$ 601,583.59. Combined state and chapter funds supported 77 students awarded \$118,187.50.

DAR SCHOOL – O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle

108 chapters earned the Hightower Award. During the second year of the Patton Administration, over \$56,000.00 was given through the State Society to the DAR Schools by the Special Projects fund and State Regents Projects fund: at Kate Duncan Smith, the GSSDAR Scholarship Fund (\$8,912.00); at Tamassee, the Mental Health Counseling Fund (\$5,446.50); at Berry, the reconstruction of the Gazebo at Oak Hill (\$15,000.00); at Crossnore, the Healthy Child Initiative (\$7,917.00); at Hindman, the Cornerstone Campaign Executive Director's Office (\$19,228.00). Chapters contributed \$8,093.00 for the "Georgia Project at Tamassee," for the maintenance of Talmadge Auditorium/ Gymnasium. The Daughters donated five new IPads to the elementary school at the cost of \$1,200.00. Georgia Daughters reported supporting "Friends of DAR Schools" with \$9,856.00 in donations. Chapters reported \$76,954.00 in total donations to the schools including direct donations, 38,948 box tops, and 43,022 pounds of thrift and other items.

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERANS – Augusta "Peggy" Duncan Freeman

94 Georgia State Society Chapters devoted time and resources serving Veterans in VA Hospitals, Clinics, Operation Reveille, and the Safe America Foundation. Volunteer travel totaled 57,494 miles and monetary donations amounted to \$57,974.61. 617 Youth Volunteers served 1,709 hours and 1,365 Adult Volunteers served 32,925 hours. 12 interviews were conducted in support of the Veterans History Project. The monetary value of donations given totaled \$102,693.04. Chapters donated a total of \$4,565.00 in gift cards to Veterans impacted by Hurricanes Irma and Harvey. Gift cards were sent directly to Puerto Rica. This year's Award winners are; The Outstanding Veteran Volunteer Award: James Lindenmayer, nominated by the Hightower Trail. The Outstanding DAR Service for Veterans Award: Vera Anne Willingham Lockhart, nominated by the Philadelphia Winn.

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA – Helen Elizabeth Story

Three chapters were recognized: General Daniel Newman received recognition at the state level for the number of activities, presentations of flags and flag literature, and scrapbook presented as chapter report for the Flag of the United States of America. Martha Stewart Bulloch attended flag and veteran events, county and holiday events, and presented flags and flag literature. Reverend John Andrew participated in county and holiday events, flag presentations and flag literature to citizens and students and activities in the community, state, and presented flags in another state for two patriots. Robert Loughridge reported on flag presentations and commemorative activities for veterans and patriots at the city and county levels along with presenting gift bags to veterans and quilts made by chapter members and community volunteers.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS – Candice "Candy" Bryan Parrow

During 2017, 34 Georgia Daughters submitted 2,544 unpublished, abstracted, or copied pages to the Genealogical Records Committee. 34 Georgia Daughters participated in the GRC Book Indexing Project and entered a total of 19,561 names. Records will be submitted for publication this month and copies will be delivered to the DAR Library, Georgia Archives, Washington Memorial Library, and Georgia Historical Society. Certificates were issued to Atlanta and Old Unicoi Trail for taking extra steps to recognize preservation efforts in our state. Fort Peachtree is recognized for the issuance of the Historic Preservation Medal to Marilyn Bender Meyers for work preserving Glen Mary, "The Temple on the Hill." Three chapters in Georgia received Certificates for completing 31 Sites and Properties forms, marking the locations of properties, monuments and markers throughout the state: Elijah Clarke, Nancy Hart and Colonel William Candler. Three chapters entered the Project Contest: Reverend John Andrew, Martha Stewart Bulloch and Henry Walton completed outstanding projects. Henry Walton was selected as state winner and sent for judging in the Southeast Division. Sunbury is commended for Outstanding Report, Documenting and applying for the Centennial Farm award.

JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS – Nancy Collins Tims

Over 1,500 students participated in JAC activities, theme ^a100th Anniversary of World War I – Service on the Homefront." In JAC clubs, students researched and presented living histories of famous Americans, made valentines and Christmas cards for veterans and soldiers, beautified their world, gave support to DAR schools, celebrated Constitution Week and participated in placing wreaths. Georgia's Junior American Citizens learned about what makes our country a great place to live and work. They studied the flag code and learned the preamble. They presented their artwork to the GSSCAR state president. This chairman awarded 62 state first place awards. Georgia received 27 Southeast Division first place awards and thirty-eight national awards.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP – Vanessa Watkins-Nutty

In 2017, 89 Georgia Juniors were added. 26 Juniors were chapter officers: 9 state vice chairs, 5 state chairs, 1 national vice chair, 75 chapter chairs. Presided by Vice Chair Dawn Levy, the annual silent auction raised \$3,390.83; proceeds benefitting HPMF, "Friends of GA Pages." District Workshops provided opportunity to educate Daughters about Junior Membership, ways they can support Juniors' goals, projects. Vice Chair Stephani Roohani encouraged fundraising through the "shop til you drop" contest at workshops. Thanks to Vice Chair Melanie Aldred, 19 chapter Outstanding Juniors and one State Outstanding Junior were recognized. Twenty-one chapters qualified for Junior Honor Roll and three chapters were Honorable Mentions. These chapters promoted Junior growth and participation, developed and assisted in Junior fundraising projects, and/or provided quilt squares to Vice Chair Helen Grigsby. LINEAGE RESEARCH – Kitty Worrell Watters

In 2017, 556 new GA applications were received at National, 98 more than 2016. Of those, 528 were verified with no Have Writtens or PreLetters, a 95% success rate. Have Writtens are at a new low of 20 statewide, plus 13 in Six Months Status that are being resolved by America 250! volunteers. Fifty-five chapters reported Lineage Research activity; 40 had Committee Chairs. Image access is granted to 61 members plus every Chapter Registrar. Six chapters utilized National Specialty-Research teams: 2 DNA, 2 African-American, and 2 French. This Chair presented Lineage Research segments in the Genealogy Forums at all four District Workshops, emphasizing the importance of documenting generational links. Two special four-hour Genealogy Workshops were presented during August, in Columbus and in St. Simons. The focus of this Chair was on the genealogical importance of Land records and how to find them. Paper Parties at State Conference and SBOM served over 150 members, and day-long Genealogy Workshops at each function helped to train Georgia's researchers.

LITERACY PROMOTION – Jennifer Whipple Whiddon

In August, 2017, the USO let GSSDAR State Public Relations/ Marketing Chair Leslie Ann Olejnik (Cherokee) that they needed help at Fort Stewart with creating a Reading Room for soldiers who were deployed and their families to share and connect with each other. Ms. Olejnik guided this initiative into a state service project to promote literacy, and a service project promoting our patriots. Georgia Chapters donated close to 1000 books, which they brought to the Georgia State Conference, and donated money, supplies, creative ideas and muscle power to decorate a reading room, library and an adjacent recording room, playroom. Soldiers can record books for their children in the recording room. Fort Stewart is the first army installation to receive financial benefits from the Bob Hope Legacy Foundation. This room is now named the USO Fort Stewart Bob Hope Reading Room where deployed families can visit, read and play. The room was officially dedicated on February 1, 2018, first to be located inside an Army Post in Georgia. Hanging on the wall among the other décor is an official DAR plaque showing the help of the Georgia NSDAR in providing the room.

MEMBERSHIP – Marguerite McEntee Dyal and Rene' Shows Hardin, Co-Chairs

In 2017 the Georgia State Society welcomed 555 new members including 89 Juniors. Total membership count on January 1, 2018 was 8065. Georgia Daughters actively recruited new members and found creative ways to introduce DAR in communities. They set up information tables and booths at community events, participated in patriotic activities, held "meet and greets" at local libraries, publicized in local newspapers and magazines and through social media. Chapters gave welcome packets and chapter yearbooks to new members; communicated by email, "snail mail," phone calls, chapter newsletters, websites and Facebook groups to keep members informed; had weekend meetings to accommodate members who could not attend weekday meetings; held New Member Teas and Coffees; took field trips; and organized special events so that members and prospective members could get better acquainted and HODARs could participate. Thank you to Chapter Registrars and Membership Chairs for their help in keeping the Prospective Member Database updated. The members of Georgia's Graduating Class of the New Horizons Leadership (NHL) and New Member Courses were introduced at the 120th GSSDAR State Conference. The NHL Course is designed to develop future leaders in our Society, leaders who are prepared with knowledge as well as information to lead. Thank you to Amy Lawson, New Member Course chair, for her invaluable assistance throughout this pursuit of excellence in Georgia.

MEMBERSHIP: STATE APPLICATION TEAM (SAT) - Rene Shows Hardin

Prospective Member Database or PMD referrals from national are going through a new process to be assigned to a Georgia Chapter. Marguerite Dyal, State Membership chair, sends each referral the letter of permission for the SAT to work the application. Once the signed letter is acquired the letter is sent to the SAT Chair for assignment. SAT Volunteers begin to communicate with the prospective member to acquire the documents to complete the application. Marguerite Dyal will send the prospective member a list of chapters in her area that she may visit while her application is being completed. The Prospective member will visit chapters to make a final decision about the chapter that fits her. Upon completion of the Application all apps will be sent to the lineage Research team led by Kitty Watters for application review. If no corrections are needed the SAT chair will then make contact with the chapter registrar of the prospective members selection. If the application passes the review process the DAR application and all supporting documents will be transmitted to the chapter registrar for signatures and collection of fees. A chapter may assign their entire PMD or any application to the SAT by acquiring the signed permission letter and emailing this form to the SAT Chair, Rene' Hardin. As the SAT chair receives the signed permission letters from the chapters the prospective will be assigned to an SAT volunteer.

NATIONAL DEFENSE – Dana L. Capaldi

During 2017, 104 Georgia chapters reported devoting at least three minute National Defense minutes, an increase of 19 chapters. Gold ROTC Medals were presented to 31 college cadets; 221 JROTC Bronze Medals were presented to high school cadets and 16 cadets were recognized as DAR Outstanding Cadets. Chapters presented 240 students with Youth Citizenship Medals. Monetary contributions totaled \$2,727.00. Old Unicoi Trail and Old Herod had nominations for the Distinguished Citizen Award. Chapters Martha Stewart Bulloch, Archibald Bulloch, Old Unicoi Trail, and Philadelphia Winn sent additional information for their reports.

PATRIOT RECORDS PROJECT – Anita Smith Mashburn

In 2017, Georgia Daughters from 16 chapters indexed 32,772 patriot names from collections of Revolutionary War era records for the NSDAR Patriot Records Project: Andrew Houser, Andrew McBride, Augusta, College Hill, Colonel Ebenezer Folsom, Fielding Lewis, General Daniel Newnan, Jacob Braselton, Martha Stewart Bulloch, Philadelphia Winn, Reverend John Andrew, Sequoyah, Sukey Hart, Tomochichi, William

Day and Xavier. The three chapters with the most volunteers in 2017 were College Hill, Fielding Lewis and Augusta. The 2017 Georgia Daughter indexing the most names was Lynne James of Martha Stewart Bulloch, followed by Anita Mashburn of Fielding Lewis and Deborah Kyle of William Day. The GSSDAR Patriot Records Project Committee created an informational brochure, District Workshop display and Facebook page in 2017 to relay information about this project and encourage more Georgia Daughters to volunteer. The number of Georgia Daughters volunteering for this project in 2017 more than doubled between June and December.

PRESIDENT GENERAL'S PROJECT – Paula Hannah Osborne

This year 11 chapters earned the President General's Project 100% Chapter Participation Certificate for a total of 32 chapters the first two years of the Dillon administration. An additional 76 chapters made donations towards earning their certificates. Georgia has collected 80% of the money required to earn the state certificate. Some chapters raised additional donations with offering voices, silent auctions, or listing voluntary donations on dues invoices. Individual members donated directly to the President General's Project or through the Sustaining Member program. A total of \$2,145.00 in President General's products was sold at state events bringing the two year total to \$10,755.00. The President General's letter was presented at meetings and/or in newsletters by 94 chapters. President General's Project programs were presented at 18 chapter meetings. This Chair thanks Vice Chair Sue Carlton, Martha Knight, and Betty Lynam for their assistance.

PUBLIC RELATIONS AND MEDIA – Leslie Ann Olejnik

Reports were received from all 113 chapters. Chapters reporting newsletters, 63; members only website and/or social media, 78; brochures, 29; media awards, 90; print coverage, 32: broadcast coverage, 56; electronic media coverage, 14; "Today's DAR" video use, 62; publicity for a commemorative or community event, 4. The USO Ft. Stewart United Through Reading Room project was completed in mid-December after a decorating party to arrange donated furnishing, toys, rugs, lights, TV, recording equipment, and wall hangings. A DAR dedication plaque was presented to the USO during the Grand Opening in February. The 2018 State Conference Community Service project called "I Support the Girls" involved the donations of bras and personal hygiene items for homeless women. Daughters from several Atlanta metro area chapters traveled to WSB-TV in October to participate in the Volunteer Safe America Conference and brought with them enough hygiene products and clothes to fill 150 hygiene kits for homeless veterans. Chapter Highlights included: Archibald Bulloch honoring women in a local newspaper for being "firsts" in their fields, Governor David Emanuel -Adam Brinson PR Chair helped organize a balloon release at a local high school football game to honor fallen soldier Dustin Wright, aired on several local television stations. Teachers tweeted, and then retweeted, for the first time about General Daniel Newnan Chapter's Constitution Week activities at their school. A YouTube video was made showing the organizing ceremony of the newly formed Captain James Kell. Sunbury promoted itself, along with its newly sponsored CAR chapter, at "Spooktaculor". Suwanee Creek produced their own Flag Raising Ceremony video in Sugar Hill, Georgia on Veterans Day.

PUBLIC RELATIONS AND MEDIA, SOCIAL MEDIA – Patricia Marianne Hein

Georgia chapters are using Facebook Groups to keep their members informed about DAR business, and Facebook Pages to promote DAR activities and encourage DAR membership with the public. During the Patton administration, we went from zero to 1,300 Georgia daughters on the Georgia State Society Facebook Group. The Georgia State Society is #2 of all states with the number of members on their respective state Facebook Group. Two hundred Georgia daughters have added original posts and photos on the Georgia State Society Facebook Group promoting DAR service to America. This past year, we encouraged state chairmen to create committee Facebook Groups, and we

SERVICE TO AMERICA! – Lynne Allen Tate

According to the CMR, our Georgia chapters have reported 197,540 volunteer service hours. That is amazing! This chairman will present 25 awards for chapter winners in each of the six districts and an award for the "best report" in each district. Nancy Hart had the best Chapter report and the most hours per member. New chapter, Jacob Braselton, recorded the most new hours for a new chapter. Congratulations to the members and chapter regent.

VOLUNTEER GENEALOGISTS – Rene' Shows Hardin and Marguerite Dyal, Co-Chairs

Volunteer Genealogists donated their time, skills and resources to chapter assignments across the state of Georgia: 29 Volunteer Genealogists were assigned to chapters, 46 workshops were held across the state, 12 first year chapter registrars mentored, 4 State paper parties and numerous chapter paper parties and genealogy events. All Volunteer Genealogists meet the national requirement of GEP II Training. Volunteer Genealogists prepare applications, seek source documents, clear pre letters and Have Writtens, and train chapter registrars. Volunteer Genealogist Vice Chairs offer guidance and assistance to all first year chapter registrars. All Vice Chairs have served as a chapter Registrar and have passed GEP III. The Chapter with the largest number of GEP courses passed by chapter members in 2017 is Sequoyah. The Volunteer Genealogist with the most DAR workshops is Sara Jane Overstreet. The Volunteer Genealogist with the most DAR verified applications is Judy Hall. The chapter working with the CDRC to revitalize with the most Associate members is Colonel Daniel Appling.

VOLUNTEER INFORMATION SPECIALISTS -

Carla James Brown and Catherine "Cathy" Winslett Hyer, Co-Chairs

As of January 1, 2017, the Georgia State Society recorded 7,927 members.100% of the Georgia chapters have a website or use social media. Chapters reported that 205 prospective members contacted them through chapter web sites, and 320 prospective members contacted the chapter through the national site.154 have become DAR members or have papers pending/in progress. 100% of chapters completed the CMR. 50 chapters reported electronic distribution of newsletters or yearbooks, with 60 reporting electronic distribution of both. E-membership is routinely used by Chapter Regents, Vice-Regents, Treasurers, and Registrars, all State Officers and State Chairmen in approved access groups. Thank you to M. Beth Snider Finley, Vice-Chairman of e-Membership and Chapter Master Report; Ruth E. Reed Pendergrass, Vice-Chairman-Webmaster Private Site; Amy Pittman Lawson, Vice-Chairman of Programming and Design. Thank you to the six Vice Chairmen of Website Maintenance and Review, Mary Ann McCullen Foster, Phyllis Ziegler Jackson, Beverly Vaughn Baker, Jena Marie Hazlerigs Carver, Valerie Renee Craft, and Bonnie Lynn Bailey.

WOMEN'S ISSUES – Kathryn "Kitty" Audrey Kelley

Thirty-eight percent of Georgia chapters presented 228 Women's Issues Minutes in 2017. Daughters presented a total of 88 Women's Issues programs: 23 family related issues, 35 career, 30 health-related issues. Popular programs included breast cancer and heart health; women during the Revolution, their times and tasks; historic women and careers, veterans and moms of veterans; wills and trusts. Popular projects focused attention on

issues relevant to today's women included support for domestic violence shelters and personal safety. Georgia Daughters reported many volunteer hours: Women's shelters; quilts for veterans and kids; literacy promotion; mentoring; church activities; homeless outreach; Meals on Wheels; hospital volunteering; shut-in assistance and rides. Thirty-one essays, 258 percent times the number submitted last year, were submitted to Women's Issues Essay Contest, with one chapter holding a Writing Workshop. Several chapters which have Newsletters, featured monthly information on Women's Issues Topics.

National Special Committees: Reports of State Chairs

COMMUNITY CLASSROOM – Suellen Browning Dennis

In 2017, 77 Georgia chapters volunteered endless hours of their gifts and talents to help out the local schools. Monetary donations totaling \$6,717.00 were made to local schools. In addition, 25 chapters supported our Texas daughters by contributing 111 gift cards totaling \$2,840.00 for Hurricane Harvey devastation. Contributions made to local schools by Georgia Daughters: Rev War Patriot Program, Constitution Week packets, Meadow Garden Program, Georgia Day and Veterans Day presentations, assisted Teachers in the classroom by mentoring and tutoring students and adopted a classroom, purchased school supplies, books, clothing, snacks and refreshments, backpacks, flags and art supplies. Participated in Teacher's Appreciation Day, Book Fairs, Field Trips, Fall Festivals, Career Fairs, joined PTA, purchased musical instruments. Four chapters submitted a Success Story this year: first place Philadelphia Winn will be forwarded to National; 2nd place Abraham Baldwin; 3rd place Old Unicoi Trail.

FINANCE COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES

Finance Committee Meeting

November 3, 2017

The Finance Committee of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, met on Friday, November 3, 2017, at the Augusta Marriott Hotel and Conference Center. Committee Secretary, Melodye G. Brown called the meeting to order at 2:35 p.m., in the absence of Chair Harriette Hankinson. Other members attending were Ida "Bea" Best Smith Fischer, Debbie Taylor Powell, Betty Brown Harrah, Charlotte Josephine Christian, and Kathleen "Kitty" Worrell Watters. Ex-Officio member, State Regent Joyce Ball Patton was present.

Ms. Brown welcomed those attending and declared a quorum present. Mrs. Patton asked Ms. Brown to discuss the changes in the proposed annual budget for 2018-2019. Ms. Brown explained she plans to reduce the number of districts from six to four, which will save \$400.00 in DAR Good Citizens awards. The award amount for the state DAR Good Citizen winner has been increased in the budget by \$50.00 so the district and state award amounts for the state winner together total \$500.00 (\$250.00 of the State winner award comes from the National Society). The budgeted amount for the DAR School and Youth Luncheon has been reduced by \$150.00, because the previous budgeted amount has not been needed. The Georgia Hospitality Fund at Continental Congress covers 16 guests at the Georgia event during Congress. Last year this was estimated at \$70.00 per guest, for a total budgeted amount of \$1,120.00. Ms. Brown stated she believed this money would better serve the Georgia Daughters by being used in other ways. She plans to have a Georgia Daughters only event at Congress, a fun event offsite to tour a historical site or visit a site of interest to the members. She plans to put the money saved towards a \$90.00 per month subscription to Constant Contact, or similar email service, which will allow us the possibility of better communication with every member having an email address, through more frequent but shorter communications with a more professional look. The budgeted amount for the Proceedings was increased by \$200.00 because the budget last year was exceeded. Ms. Brown stated she did not know how many copies were ordered or why the Proceedings went over budget. Mrs. Patton said printing costs continue to go up. Ms. Brown explained the amounts saved by reducing certain budget items were all moved into Administrative and Operating Funds to cover the new expenses and allow flexibility. Finally, Ms. Brown stated she had requested the removal of the footnote indicating the \$1,400.00 allocated for workshops and State Board of Management was to go to the Hostess Chapters. There are currently some Bylaws amendments which may impact these meetings, and the meetings are becoming so large the State Society may need to take over some of the functions traditionally conducted by the Hostess Chapters. There may be no change, but flexibility is desirable.

Mrs. Patton said at some time we would need to address a dues increase. Ms. Brown agreed that we are not actually operating on the current dues amount because we continue to require a dollar per member for Meadow Garden, the State Regent's Project, May Erwin Talmadge Auditorium, and other projects of the State Society. There was no further discussion. Debbie Powell moved **"that the committee accept the 2018-2019 Budget as proposed.**" Bea Fischer seconded the motion. **ADOPTED**.

Ms. Brown announced that the Finance Committee will present the 2018-2019 allocation of dues tomorrow at State Board of Management, and the proposed 2018-2019 annual budget will be published with the Call to Conference. Also tomorrow, the motion

adopted by the Finance Committee on May 30, 2017, regarding the transfer of funds to correct the deficit in the 2017 State Conference Fund will be presented to the State Board of Management for ratification.

Treasurer Debbie Powell presented the financial reports, declaring all was in order and up to date. The Account Summaries for the Georgia State Society are as follows: \$500.75 in Savings, \$124,198.70 in Certificates of Deposit, \$165,430.82 in the Checking Account, \$90,502.93 in the Money Market Account, \$5,000.00 Other Assets (Hotel Deposit), and \$385,632.62 Total Liabilities and Equity. Meadow Garden Account Summaries are as follows: \$373,127.87 in Certificates of Deposit, \$81,376.41 in the Checking Account, \$46,829.60 in the Money Market Account, \$100 in Petty Cash, \$239,828.00 Total Fixed Assets, and \$741,261.88. Total Liabilities and Equity.

Mrs. Powell shared that Chattahoochee Bank of Georgia and Entegra Bank had merged on October 1, 2017. We currently have two Certificates of Deposit at Chattahoochee/Integra, both maturing in the next administration (Meadow Garden Capital #3 on September 29, 2018, and Georgia State Society for the Georgia Room on January 18, 2019). There are two more Certificates of Deposit scheduled to mature during this administration, both on March 1, 2018, and both Meadow Garden CD's at Brand Bank. Approval will be obtained from the Committee Chair before reinvestment is made.

Mrs. Powell announced that, in loving support of State Regent Joyce Patton and the Georgia State Society, a group of anonymous donors gave money to clear the outstanding expenses remaining from the 2017 Georgia State Conference, finally bringing that account to a zero balance.

Mrs. Patton stated the May 30 motion would not be brought forward for ratification. Ms. Brown asked that the said motion then be rescinded. Betty Harrah moved "to rescind the May 30 motion to transfer funds to correct the deficit in the State Conference Fund." Charlotte Christian seconded the motion. ADOPTED.

There being no further business, Ms. Brown adjourned the meeting at 2:55 p.m.Approved: February 24, 2018Harriette Foster Hankinson, Chair

The finished project contained information that should prove useful, especially to Regents looking for committee chairs and members.

GEORGIA STATE PAGES – Rebecca Katherine Croft

This year all of the worn-out, older page sashes were replaced, and the Page assignments embroidered onto the sashes. Amy Lawson, Lisa Pittman, and Sue Pittman hemmed the ends. The new sashes were worn by all of Georgia Pages at State Conference. Just over 55 pages served this year at the Georgia DAR State Conference in Atlanta. This includes over 25 Junior Pages (ages 10-18) and Apprentice Junior Pages (9 years old and under.) The Page Club President's Project for this Administration was to lower the hotel costs for pages. A PROCLAMATION **GEORGIA DAY**

WHEREAS: The State of Georgia was founded by General James Edward Oglethorpe, who received a Royal Charter to establish a colony in honor of King George II. Oglethorpe led 116 people from England aboard the HMS Anne and landed near present-day Savannah on February 12, 1733; and

WHEREAS George Walton, Button Gwinnett, and Lymon Hall each signed the Declaration of Independence on behalf of Georgia, which later became the fourth state to ratify the Constitution of the United States on January 2, 1788; and

WHEREAS: Since its founding 285 years ago, Georgia's population has grown to more than 10 million people and now stands as a commercial, financial, and cultural center for the Southeast and our nation; and

WHEREAS: Georgia's magnificent natural beauty, from the mountains to the seashore, its many historical wonders and sites, as well as its distinctive cultural heritage, are all reasons to celebrate this great state: and

WHEREAS: From the Creek Indians and early colonists, to Juliette Gordon Low, Jackie Robinson, and Martin Luther King, Jr., Georgia has been home to many influential leaders who have had monumental impacts on the world for the better; and

WHEREAS: Georgia's storied past provides a strong foundation for a bright future and lends itself to valuable lessons. On Georgia Day, we remember the initial motto of our state as set forth by Oglethorpe, to serve and sacrifice "Not for ourselves but others"; and

WHEREAS: All Georgians are invited to rediscover our state's natural, cultural, and historical wonders and sites, and to encourage individuals throughout our nation and around the world to recognize the people, institutions, and historic events that have shaped Georgia's place in our shared history and global commerce; now

THEREFORE: I, NATHAN DEAL, Governor of the State of Georgia, do hereby proclaim February 12, 2018, as GEORGIA DAY in honor of our state's 285th anniversary and call upon all Georgians to celebrate our proud and rich heritage.

> In witness thereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the Executive Department to be affixed this 9th day of February in the year of our Lord two thousand eighteen.

These books are a history of the Chapter and a valuable source of information. Winners of the 2017 and the 2018 State Scrapbook Contest can be found in the section on awards offered.

STATE HONOR ROLL – Virginia "Ginny" Soth Griffith

All 113 Chapters in Georgia submitted their State Honor Roll report for 2017. The three levels for SHR awards remained the same as last year, Platinum, Gold and Silver. Two additional categories were added to recognize the accomplishments of the four new chapters in our state and to provide recognition to chapters that deserved an Honorable Mention. Chapter award results for Platinum were 67; Gold, 19; and Silver, 1. 29 Chapters achieved Honorable Mention. The four chapters that were formed this year did not have

12 months to achieve SHR requirements. To recognize their accomplishments the category "Special – New Chapter" award was created. All four chapters were recognized. Thank you to the State Officers, State Chairmen and Chapter Officers for their help in verifying each chapter's State Honor Roll award. TIMEKEEPERS – Trudie Bilberry Pabst



Meadow Garden Committees: Reports of State Chairs

MEADOW GARDEN DOCENTS – Virginia "Ginger" Nicholson

We now have 20 trained docents who have been volunteering hours of work at Meadow Garden, including special events such as this year's evening event, "Christmas at Meadow Garden" in December. Two of our docents played their Dulcimer instruments both nights and again in the Governor's Mansion later on in December. All docents who gave tours inside the house and the mansion wore Regency or Colonial era dresses as they told visitors about the customs and décor of the period. Our Furnishings Chairman, Jan Manos, provided research about the period including foods, clothing, decorating, and entertainment the early American citizens enjoyed. During the rest of the year a regular team of about ten gave tours of the historic house to groups when needed. Some enjoyed light cleaning. Most of them attended voluntary monthly meetings in the Stribling room discussing costume details, making additional accessories for their attire, learning new discoveries the archivists have uncovered about the historic house and trading books and articles they came across relating to the history of the Walton family. Altogether, local docents alone contributed over 682 volunteer hours to help spread the influence of the Georgia State Society and Meadow Garden.

MEADOW GARDEN FURNISHINGS – Janice "Jan" Johnson Manos

This chairman completed inventory books that are placed in each room at Meadow Garden to help the docents answer questions from the public. The story of Meadow Garden was expanded to include the life, work and travels of two female slaves, Cloe and Betsy. The computer inventory program was updated, new acquisition forms and policies and procedures were updated. The Historic Meadow Garden website was updated with new photos and history. The furniture on the first floor of Meadow Garden was professionally appraised by Charles Pharr Appraisals and the house architecture was thoroughly evaluated by preservation architect, Greg Jacobs. A Christmas tour, December 1st and 2nd, displayed multiple period vignettes in each of the downstairs spaces. All paper documents relevant to a Furnishings Chairman were collected and stored in the upstairs education building. Documents that related to the house, the furnishings and the residents were scanned and filed into a large notebook. That notebook was indexed to make research much easier, labeled and stored in a large acid free box.

MEADOW GARDEN GIFT SHOP – Marjorie Nolan Wilson

The Meadow Garden Gift Shop would like to thank all the Daughters for their financial support of the Traveling Gift Shop at the State Events, as well as, the Gift Shop at Meadow Garden. Meadow Garden Board Minutes MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

July 25, 2017

The Meadow Garden Board met on Tuesday, July 25, 2017, at the HealthSouth Walton Rehabilitation building in front of Meadow Garden in Augusta, Georgia. Joyce Ball Patton, State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 12:45 p.m. Other voting members attending were: Melodye G. Brown, Nancy McElderry Parks, Shelby Alderman Whitson, Patricia Frederick Croft, Debbie Taylor Powell, Jan Johnson Manos, Marjorie Nolan Wilson, Charlotte Josephine Christian, and Anita Smith Mashburn. Also present were Ex Officio member O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle, and non-voting members Robin Redfearn Towns, Elaine Ingram Dorr, Kathleen Ann Staples, and Beverly Vaughan Baker. Also present was Carole Moore Schenck, State Grants Coordinator.

The State Regent welcomed everyone to the meeting, and introduced new appointments: Kathleen Staples, Vice Chair of Furnishings; Beverly Baker, Vice Chair of Public Relations – Website; and Carole Schenck, State Grants Coordinator. Mrs. Patton expressed her appreciation of the work done by Landmark Preservation LLC, and for the presentations given prior to and after this meeting.

Mrs. Patton related the success of the Independence Day event at Meadow Garden and credited James Hanby for help on television and newspaper publicity for the event, resulting in 250 in attendance. Mrs. Patton suggested a Holiday Open House for December 2. Mrs. Patton suggested increasing the tour fee to \$6.00 for this event, and giving each attendee a jar of jelly.

Ms. Brown made a motion "to approve the minutes of the March 8, May 8, June 1, and June 21, 2017 meetings. Mrs. Wilson seconded the motion. ADOPTED.

Meadow Garden Chair Nancy Parks reported. In conjunction with the celebration of the 125th anniversary of the Augusta Chapter held on May 9, Mrs. Parks transcribed several articles about Meadow Garden that appeared in the Augusta Chronicle in 1900 and 1901. One of the articles describes in great detail the dedication and ceremony at Meadow Garden. It includes the names of every individual in the picture that hangs in the front hall of Meadow Garden. Having the article was helpful to put an exact date, November 21, 1901, and story about the picture when giving tours. Since the window restoration project was finally completed, most items moved during the work have now been placed in order. Mrs. Parks expressed gratitude to Amy Lawson who helped complete the final report. During the restoration work Greg. Jacobs of Landmark Preservation pointed out a serious problem with carpenter bees under the front steps. Traps were placed under the porch and periodically replaced. On May 23, the firm Rid-a-Critter was also contacted and they made recommendations to treat and seal all of the bee holes. The estimated cost is \$350.00. They warned, however, that the bees can be controlled but not prevented as long as you have exposed wood. It remains a serious problem which hopefully will be resolved with upcoming work on the house. Meadow Garden was recently polished and shined with the help of many volunteers and Green and Clean Maid Service. On July 4. following the ceremony conducted by Mr. James Hanby, Sr. at the Signers Monument, the attendees were invited to Meadow Garden. Several announcements were also placed in the Augusta Chronicle. The visitors came in waves of 20 to 30 at a time. To avoid having the visitors stand outside in the blistering heat, we directed them in groups of about 10 to various rooms throughout the house to begin their tour. The Docent Chair, Virginia Nicholson, secured ample trained docents for the occasion. Pat Colbert invited her fellow dulcimer musicians to attend and play their musical instruments inside and out. Pat's husband, Bill, brought his many Revolutionary period exhibits and discussed the items at a table outside and told entertaining stories. Other husbands attended and helped in various ways. Maranda Christy prepared some food for the occasion. With the special sales skills of our State Regent, the gift shop was a profitable spot for Meadow Garden. Governor and Mrs. Nathan Deal, along with six grandchildren, one staff member and two security officers visited Meadow Garden on July 12. Maranda Christy conducted the tour. Ginger Nicholson, Debbie Powell, Ransom Schwerzler and Mrs. Parks accompanied them on the tour. Governor Deal asked many questions and was particularly interested in the dining room table and how the end pieces connected. Since his term of office will end soon, he joked that they would soon be "homeless" and would have to have a house and new furniture.

Mrs. Parks made a motion **"to accept the \$350.00 estimate from "Rid-a-Critter" to address the carpenter bees in the front porch, to be allocated from Maintenance.** Mrs. Manos seconded the motion. **ADOPTED**.

State Treasurer Debbie Powell reported \$373,127.87 in Certificates of Deposit, \$86,332.83 in Checking, \$53,254.52 in the Money Market, \$100.00 in Petty Cash, \$100.00 in Go Green Petty Cash, \$257,003.00 Total Fixed Assets, and \$769,918.22 Total Liabilities and Equity. Mrs. Powell will email out the current balance sheet, and the Meadow Garden budget will be prepared.

The State Regent inquired of Shelby Whitson if some of the funds in the CD's could be used. Mrs. Whitson said there were no restrictions on the funds unless noted in the Standing Rules or Bylaws. Mrs. Whitson said there had never actually been a need to use the funds.

Furnishings Chair Jan Manos reported. The interpretation of Meadow Garden continues to evolve through the meticulous research of Landmark Preservation LLC yielding facts which must be included in the new tours. With the newly expanded time frame of Meadow Garden, 1791 to 1821, the two upstairs bedrooms, formerly referred to as the Boy's Bedrooms, should now be called the children's bedrooms. A doll and doll chair will be moved in to one of the rooms very soon. Docents Chair Virginia Nicholson has been provided with the first Guide's Book, "Meadow Garden Docent's Reference

Notes," found in paperwork from previous Furnishings Chairs. In addition a copy of my Guide's Interpretation was sent, that details new items placed in the downstairs rooms. Each item has an interpretive reason for being there, helping to explain and expand the story of the family who lived in the house. New research has been added regarding slave families who lived and worked at Meadow Garden. Before the Independence Day event, this chair designed, had made and installed five directional signs and one clock plus provided an "Open" flag to draw customers to the Visitor Center and Gift Shop. Mrs. Manos has sorted information left to the Furnishings Chair with notes, inventories legal papers, professional opinions and stories of items in the Meadow Garden Collection, scanned them, printed and put onto a hard drive. The scanned collection has an index so Furnishings Chairs after this will be more knowledgeable and can immediately start to implement the plans of a new administration. The State Regent expressed her wish to have a Holiday Open House on December 2nd. The historic house, inside and out, should be decorated in period detail with everlasting decorations that can be used from year to year. It is best to not use real greenery because it introduces bugs, and the decorative items must last all month. Mrs. Manos expressed her hope that appropriate electric chandeliers might be added to make night time tours and events possible.

Gift Shop Chair Marjorie Wilson reported the Traveling Gift Shop sold over \$8,000.00 at State Conference. In April, Elaine Dorr attended a State Regent's Tea and sold approximately \$175.00. A visit to the Mart was made on May 5 for the biannual Cash and Carry Event. Fifteen hats were purchased plus pearl and jewelry items. The next week Mrs, Dorr and Mrs. Wilson drove all items in inventory to the Augusta Gift Shop, for a more temperature controlled environment than the garage where the inventory had been stored. This provided Maranda Christy an opportunity to include these items on the Square inventory program. Mrs. Wilson does not currently have access to the program. Almost all the hats purchased in May were quickly sold at the Gift Shop after members saw pictures posted on Facebook. The Aromatique items have also been very popular. During a trip to the Mart in June, evening bags and jewelry items were purchased for sale to the members riding the DAR bus to Washington. Mrs. Wilson and Mrs. Dorr met the State Regent and Shannon Logue at the biannual July Accessories Show at the Mart. Twenty-five hats were purchased for the August workshops. Pearl items totaling \$852.00 were purchased. Eight Mary Francis evening bags were purchased. New items purchased were ceramic gift boxes. Children's tea sets and a few blue and white ceramic items were ordered. Linen towels, children's aprons, and bags for walkers were also ordered. The Gift Shop had sales of over \$400.00 during the Independence Day Open House. The Meadow Gift Shop Committee members look forward to presenting our entire inventory to members at the four August Workshops. Meadow Garden gift cards were suagested.

Mrs. Croft, Ms. Christian, and Mrs. Mashburn had no report. There was no report from the Landscaping Chair.

Mrs. Baker reported new content submitted by Mrs. Manos, including information on slaves at Meadow Garden, had been added to the website. She reported that the domain name MeadowGarden.org is owned by Daniel Lawson. Mrs. Patton expressed her desire that that domain name come under the Georgia State Society.

Mrs. Staples reported she was working with Greg Jacobs to locate a resource for paint analysis of the historic house. They are leaning towards a conservator out of Charleston, SC, at present. Mrs. Schenck offered to check her grant files for resources.

The State Regent suggested several items for fundraising. First was a mother-of-pearl pin in recognition of \$100.00 donations. Second was a Meadow Garden Christmas ornament. Third was reprinting of the book on Madame LeVert. These would need to be sold by the printer, as we are not allowed to sell across state lines. No action was taken.

The meeting was adjourned at 2:00 p.m.

August 17, 2017

The Meadow Garden Board met on Thursday, August 17, 2017, at the Best Western Hotel in St. Simons Island, Georgia. Joyce Ball Patton, State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 8:10 p.m. Other voting members attending were: Melodye G. Brown, Debbie Taylor Powell, Virginia Ranson Nicholson, Marjorie Nolan Wilson, Charlotte Josephine Christian, and Anita Smith Mashburn. Also present were Ex Officio member O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle, and non-voting members Robin Redfearn Towns, Shannon Cowles Logue, and Beverly Vaughan Baker.

The State Regent reported Greg Jacobs of Landmark Preservation LLC will be meeting with Williford HVAC tomorrow to discuss options for removing the pipe below the front porch. Mr. Jacobs will be removing boards on the dormers to see if there is any tin remaining on the sides of the dormers. He has spoken with a conservator in Charleston, recommended by Kathleen Staples, about doing the paint analysis. The fee will be \$350.00 per sample plus travel expenses. Mr. Jacobs suggested taking three samples in each room, and doing a few rooms at a time. He also reported the left side of the porch is unsafe and needs repair. They are continuing research on the possible stairway to the cellar. Mrs. Patton reported Mrs. Powell had talked with the exterminators and our contract does not cover carpenter bees, part of the issue with the porch. The State Regent said it would be good to open the front lower level door at the same time the porch is being repaired.

The State Regent announced plans for a Holiday Open House on December 1st and 2nd. Mrs. Manos will decorate the interior of the house, and Mrs. Towns will decorate the exterior. Invitations should be sent to the chapters. The Gift Shop will be open for the event, and docents will be dressed in period attire. Local choral groups should be invited to perform. Mrs. Patton wants to have publicity in the Augusta Magazine, as well as flyers available at Walton Rehab, welcome centers and hotels. Mrs. Patton suggested increasing the admission fee to \$6.00 for this event, and giving each attendee a jar of jelly.

Mrs. Wilson moved "that Meadow Garden host a Holiday Open House from 5:00 until 8:00 p.m. on December 1 and December 2 with admission/tour fee of \$6.00 to include a favor." Mrs. Powell seconded the motion. ADOPTED.

The State Regent suggested fundraising ideas. She suggested a pin in recognition of \$100.00 donations, as well as programs similar to NSDAR's Sustained Giving and Founders Club. Ms. Christian and Mrs. Powell volunteered to investigate possibilities. Mrs. Patton asked them to consult with the State Parliamentarian. Ideas for a Meadow Garden Christmas ornament were discussed. Mrs. Patton has worked with a firm with a minimum order of 250 units, with a six week timeline, but did not have a cost estimate for the minimum order. With the possibility of the look of the house exterior changing, the consensus was not to use an image of the house. Mrs. Nicholson suggested using a miniature portrait of George Walton. Mrs. Wilson volunteered to investigate production of Meadow Garden Christmas ornaments for this holiday season. Kathleen Staples is to provide an estimate for reprinting of the book on Madame LeVert.

Mrs. Patton reported that Carole Schenck had identified possible grants available, including the \$10,000.00 National Trust Cynthia Woods Mitchell Fund for Historic Interiors, which could be used for paint analysis, but the deadline for which is next March. Meadow Garden is a National Historic Landmark, as well as an Organizational member of the National Trust, which makes Meadow Garden eligible. Ms. Christian pointed out that priorities within the Master Plan, yet to come, may affect the timing of which grants should be pursued.

State Treasurer Debbie Powell reported \$373,127.87 in Certificates of Deposit, \$78,654.86 in Checking, \$58,254.52 in the Money Market, \$100.00 in Petty Cash, \$100.00 in Go Green Petty Cash, \$257,003.00 Total Fixed Assets, and \$767,240.25 Total Liabilities and Equity. Mrs. Powell presented the proposed 2017-2018 Meadow Garden budget. Mrs. Wilson moved "that the proposed 2017-2018 Meadow Garden Budget be adopted." Mrs. Nicholson seconded the motion. ADOPTED.

Ms. Brown made a motion **"to approve the minutes of the July 25, 2017 meeting**, which had been distributed to those attending. Ms. Christian seconded the motion. **ADOPTED**.

November 3, 2017

The Meadow Garden Board met on Friday, November 3, 2017, at the Augusta Marriott and Conference Center, Augusta, Georgia. Joyce Ball Patton, State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m. Other voting members attending were: Melodye G. Brown, Nancy McElderry Parks, Patricia Frederick Croft, Patricia Brand Colbert, Debbie Taylor Powell, Virginia "Ginger" Ranson Nicholson, Shelby Alderman Whitson, Janice Johnson Manos, Marjorie Nolan Wilson, and Charlotte Josephine Christian. Also present were Ex Officio member O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle, State Parliamentarian Kate Sievert Cook, and non-voting members Robin Redfearn Towns, Shannon Cowles Logue, Elaine Ingram Dorr and Beverly Vaughan Baker.

The State Regent introduced Greg Jacobs of Landmark Preservation LLC, who gave a slide show presentation on the ongoing research into Meadow Garden. Mr. Jacobs reviewed Meadow Garden's 2016 Mission Statement, saying it coincided with the Master Plan, but if there were any revision, he would need to know as it might affect the Plan. The Mission Statement is the guiding beacon on the direction and purpose of the house and how it is to be interpreted. Mr. Jacobs believes it is really broad enough to leave the precise interpretation open, not just to the people that lived there, but to the period and life during that period in this area. But it is specific enough to define a timeframe, the late 18th and early 19th centuries.

Everyone present had attended Mr. Jacobs' previous presentation on the chronology of the house, so he moved on to recent findings. Additional study of the staircase between the front and rear rooms on the older side was carried out, removing boards which revealed a natural wood wall of vertical planks and an infilled viewing window which would have given natural light into the staircase. The finish on the wood was an early whitewash of a bluish gray color. When first built, the house was rather modest. Looking up into the third generation ceiling of the closet, the boards extend upward. This trip, they took out a larger portion of the floor to see how the original stair case was assembled. Unfortunately, so much of that original material is gone, but they found one original piece of trim that would have encased that opening. They found wood with hand wrought nails coming in from the other side which suggests when the house was built, narrow 24 inch wide trim boards were attached. Several anomalies were discovered. Right in front of the closet door now on the right hand side, flush in the floor, there is an early mortise which suggests there would have been some early vertical support member there. It does not correspond to anything that is there now, so it may yield some information at some point about the exact orientation of the stair. A period appropriate stair might have had 12 inch tall steps, maybe seven or eight inches deep. Curiously, when looking at the vertical boards, one would hope to see some ghosting of the stair. There are a number of ways it could be constructed and it might have been very basic. That vertical wall in its first period was not painted, so any ghost lines that may have corresponded to the stair were subsequently painted over many times. The dormer in the back bedroom was opened up, and they discovered the framing within that dormer space was whitewashed. They are still puzzled by that because, from the attic, they can see into the other structural framing areas and there is no other whitewash, so it doesn't appear to have been an exposed framing system originally. For some reason, when that dormer went away, it was just rough framing for many, many years. The boards that cover it are more modern or recycled. They then went to the front dormer location and removed some of those boards as well. They could see the framing there to support the idea of a dormer, but there was no whitewash on that side so it is just one of those strange anomalies. For many years, when the dormer went away, it was just rather rough.

On the Second Period (right) portion of the house, they have made some significant discoveries relative to the front entrance to the cellar level. They did a lot of digging looking for several things. One was undisturbed soil layers, so they could see what the depth was and if it corresponded with the finished boards. They dug next to the existing piers to see if those piers went down deep enough to support the idea that it had been entirely dug out, and along the wall they wanted to see the same thing. Then they dug two trenches, one from front to back, to see if there was any sign of brick pavers or fieldstone, and one coming out from the entrance as well. What they discovered was undisturbed soil right at the house is certainly at the level that we now know to be the finished floor level of the cellar. But these piers do not go down deep enough to support that it was entirely dug out. So the conclusion that leads to is this having been an accessible entry but nothing formal in any way, used by the house help exclusively. The piers are early; the infilled knee-walls are later. A couple of old photographs show a beaten path just to the right of the steps. In one picture, there is wood stacked and stored at one end of the porch, so it really makes sense that they entered from the side. The soil samples taken support that conclusion. What they look for is the undisturbed dirt layer just to see how it corresponds and if it is consistent. Now there is a little bit of brick paver in front of the doors, but it is more modern brick of the era after DAR took ownership. The whole right side next to the house, there is the current stucco on top of the brick and there is the earlier layer of stucco, and then a vertical line can be seen that is an early score line. The stucco was scored to replicate stone. But it is not done in a neat and orderly fashion. They can see from the earlier layer what the sizing of those blocks would have been. They also discovered that these doors to the cellar which are very early were originally out where the old knee-wall is. Why it was moved back may have been because of water problems. It is difficult to speculate, but without question the framing as can be seen supports that it has been recessed about three feet from where it had been originally. But all of the infill is modern. The door jamb and the door casing is modern. The doors themselves are early. The front door would have been accessible, and also a back door. Just to the right of the little door everyone goes through now to get to the cellar, there is an early brick pier, oddly shaped, and then to the right of that on the outside, there are some recycled vertical boards. On the inside there is modern stucco. Based on this door and its height, having been dropped from where it would have originally been, they have ascertained this door would have been about six and a half feet tall. The back porch would not have been over it as it is now because you need the head height. In all likelihood the folks cooking the meals would come out the back door and up a step to the back door by way of more of a stoop, rather than using the big front doors you see today. It was certainly narrower than you see today, not quite a three foot wide door. A chronology was done on the back porch. In the First Period, there was nothing there. Then when the house was added to in the Second Period, it was first a porch, then an enclosed room. The DAR brought it back to a porch and then re-enclosed it in the 1930's as the kitchen. That is why on the backside of the house, as presented in the previous chronology, there are three separate roof systems here and three rooflines to coincide with the three generations of nothing, porch, and enclosed space.

They did remove some of the brick pavers inside the house to establish where undisturbed soil is. They know there was originally a wood floor system there and they can extrapolate from where the undisturbed dirt layer is, that where the brick floor is now is maybe an inch or so higher than what the original floor elevation would have been. Entering from the front door to the cellar, there is the door going into the back half of the cellar. Underneath and behind the left hand jamb of that doorway is a vertical wood wall. That was a helpful tool in seeing what had been painted on that wall and what had not, reinforcing the idea of where the finished floor was. In the front room of the cellar, what we now know as the solid masonry wall, they discovered that beneath most of it, beneath about one and a half inch of modern plaster and backer board, is again vertical wood walls installed in a very crude way. It truly reinforces the idea this was a very basic service area. It was not elaborate in any way. Again original whitewash paint finish is still on the wood wall.

Previously they had thought there was an interior stairway coming down from the main level. The framing certainly supports that there either had been, or there was intended to be, a staircase. The one area they had left unexplored at that time was the little enclosed triangle underneath the staircase on the main floor. So they made a hole there and discovered that the baseboard, which is painted in the hallway, goes straight underneath and is completely unpainted underneath the staircase. There is no lathe on the framing on that wall whatsoever. Even that infilled area in that little triangle was all on early lathe and plaster. A non-finished underside of the stair wouldn't have been uncommon for a cellar stair, but nevertheless the staircase wasn't there. Whether the family was thinking about it and had a change of heart mid-construction, or wanted to leave the option open for the future, it is certainly framed to accommodate a stair. But the evidence does not support that it was every constructed.

One of the ceiling boards on the right side viewing porch was removed in trying to determine when the side porches were put on. On the right side porch, everything framing and assembly wise above the ceiling supports that it was built when the Second Period addition went on the house. All the framing (handrails, balusters, bottom rails, porch framing, and porch floors) is later material. Everything up above in the roof system is very, very intact. The term "viewing porch" was adopted from some of the DAR archives. It is difficult to say whether steps ever existed because all the original flooring framing is gone. But old photographs show that the left porch had steps at one time. It is a peculiar house and they are certainly peculiar porches. The porch on the canal side was also studied by removing ceiling boards, with inconclusive results. It is known that when DAR changed the front porch roofline, it necessitated replacing a good bit of siding just to get the coursing to work. This porch is believed to be a reconstructed viewing porch from the DAR changes in the early 1900's. None of the framing material is early, even as early as the other side. The house was in disrepair when the DAR took over. In all likelihood, they took down what was left of the viewing porch, if it was still there at all, put up new siding where needed and reconstructed the porch. Everything coincides with that period down to the nail marks on the wood.

The results from paint sample analyses by Frances Horde in Charleston had been received the previous day, and they were reviewed with the Board, although Mr. Jacobs had not had time to study the results in depth. The trim in the front room on the older side of the house was a bluish grey, but not as bright as the current paint. The rear room on the older side had bright red trim. The front door had clear coat finishes, and appears to have had faux graining. On the newer side of the house, there were less layers of paint and more neutral colors in the Second Period.

Mrs. McCorkle thanked Mr. Jacobs and Landmark Preservation LLC for the amount of work they have done. She expressed gratitude for the collaborative process which has kept the board involved and informed as the Plan evolves. It is normal to make new discoveries during the course of the investigations which may impact direction. Mrs. McCorkle stated it was a really exciting process to be involved in all the new discoveries made about Meadow Garden, and thanked Mr. Jacobs. He agreed that it is an exciting process. Meadow Garden is a complicated house because of all the changes and the age. He stated we have now reached a point where we have enough clear information to move forward with the completion of the Master Plan, but the expectation has got to be that as more research is done over time, and more revelations come, and other projects develop, they may uncover something else that steers the Plan in a different direction. The key to the Master Plan is regular update, yearly updates based on findings, based on new

research. It has to be a living adaptable thing. Mrs. McCorkle responded that the Master Plan is something we will be following for years to come, and the time invested to ensure it is done correctly is time well spent.

Meadow Garden Chair Nancy Parks reported that the front porch and arbor were treated for carpenter bees. The treatment should be good for six months. She thanked various members of the board for their assistance in many ways. Patricia Croft, Augusta Chapter Regent, had no report. Patricia Colbert, College Hill Chapter Regent, reported. With the help of SAR member and HODAR, Bill Colbert the flag rope was repaired and replaced. Meadow Garden Chair, Nancy Parks purchased two new flags and these were placed on the pole. Mr. and Mrs. Colbert lowered the flags to half-mast after the Las Vegas shootings. Preparations are underway for the Christmas open house. Mrs. Colbert complimented Docent Chair Ginger Nicholson on a splendid job, saying with the growing number of active docents, we should be well staffed for both evenings. After some difficulty, musicians will be available for both evenings. First Baptist children's choir will sing on Friday evening from 5:00 to 6:00 p.m. on the front porch. Members of The Savannah River Hammers, a local hammered dulcimer group, of which two are members of College Hill Chapter, will perform, in what is now the library, from 6:00 to 7:30 p.m. both nights. Furniture in this room needs to be minimal, but it would be advantageous to have a few chairs so attendees may sit and listen. The Col. William Few Chapter of the SAR has requested permission to use the grounds of Meadow Garden for a small reception after a grave marking planned for May 19, 2018. The marking will probably be between 11:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. The marking will be for George Walton and Lyman Hall at the Signer's monument. Mrs. Colbert moved "that the Col. William Few Chapter SAR be allowed to have a reception on May 19 at Meadow Garden following a grave marking, at no cost to SAR. Additional details to be determined." Mrs. Croft seconded the motion. ADOPTED.

State Treasurer Debbie Powell reported \$373,127.87 in Certificates of Deposit, \$81,376.41 in Checking, \$46,829.60 in the Money Market, \$100.00 in Petty Cash, \$239,828.00 Total Fixed Assets, and \$741,261.88 Total Liabilities and Equity.

Docent Chair Ginger Nicholson reported she conducted a docent meeting followed by a training class on September 9. Six Daughters attended with one being trained. Another docent meeting/training session was held on October 14, with seven attending and two trained. During September and October, Director/Curator, Maranda Christy, asked for docent volunteers to assist with three large school groups. Mrs. Nicholson arranged to have at least six docents at each of these events. Many were in period attire and a few acted as assistants with crowd control and shadowing docents who were trained. She plans another docent meeting on November 18, and a rehearsal for the Christmas event. Furnishings Chair Jan Manos has provided notes for December tours, featuring holiday traditions of the 18th century, which will be used during the Christmas event. Dulcimer musicians will perform in the library both nights and a church children's choir will sing on the front porch Friday evening. The State Regent agreed that the children could tour Meadow Garden for free, and their parents for half price. A member of SAR has volunteered to wear period attire and show articles that would have been in a soldier's possession during the encampment at Valley Forge during the winter of 1777-78. Many Docents are now having period attire made for the open house as well as the Governor's Mansion tour in December. Mrs. Nicholson has contacted Paul Melvin, from the Governor's office, about the Governor's Mansion tour. Thirteen Georgia Daughters have so far signed up to hostess this event on Sunday, December 10, from 2:00 until 4:00 p.m. Mrs. Nicholson requested reimbursement for purchase of 12 identification badges for newly trained Docents. Cost was \$191.98. These badges will add a professional look when worn. Two are marked for the Meadow Garden Chair and the Director/ Curator to wear. None have names on them so that they may be used again and again. They will remain in the docent drawer after each use. Mrs. Nicholson suggested better key control should be discussed by the board. She stated it would be helpful for the Docent Chair to

have a full set of keys when the Director is out sick and the Meadow Garden Chair cannot be reached.

Furnishings Chair Jan Manos has planned and purchased holiday decorations for the downstairs rooms. The decorations will last and can be reused. Robin Towns is in charge of the exterior decorations, including wreathes and luminaries on the steps. Mrs. Manos prepared a tour guide for the docents to interpret Christmas customs of the period. She reported Greg Jacobs has moved the hunt board from the cellar into the hallway, as it is the best piece in the house.

Gift Shop Chair Marjorie Wilson expressed appreciation to all the Daughters for their support of the Meadow Garden Gift Shop. She also extended gratitude for the time and service of Vice-Chair Elaine Dorr, Helen Dalton, Kate Sklikas, Pamela and Dwight Dover. Mrs. Dorr and Mrs. Wilson made multiple trips to America's Mart to purchase items for the Gift Shop. Sales as reported on Square from January 1 to October 30, 2017 were \$21,387.40 with tax of \$1,554.33 for a total of \$22,941.73. The Gift Shop has sold more than 97 hats, 8 evening bags, 30 books, 34 pieces of china including children's tea sets, 20 articles of clothing including scarves, 50 edibles such as jellies, 57 gift items including "Aromatique," 141 home goods including tea towels, and 116 pieces of jewelry. This list does not include items under the miscellaneous category. State Board of Management sales are already over \$2,000.00, including 30 hats sold. The George Walton Christmas ornaments are available now.

Landscaping Chair Debbie Powell reported the exterior lights had been checked and repaired and a problem with the timer resolved. Shannon Logue reported she is planning a Julie Voss jewelry order for anyone who is interested. The State Regent thanked Mrs. Logue for her donation to Meadow Garden of an original letter from Octavia Walton LeVert.

Public Relations Chair Anita Smith Mashburn submitted her report. She is working to publicize the Christmas open house slated for 4:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. on December 1-2. Information about this event has been sent to the Augusta Chronicle newspaper and Augusta Convention and Visitors Bureau for posting on the community events calendars. Public service announcements are in development for broadcast on Augusta area radio stations. Mrs. Mashburn has created a flyer that can be posted on the GSSDAR Facebook page to encourage Georgia Daughters to attend this event. She has also reached out to the Fort Gordon U.S. Army Installation Office of Morale, Wellness and Recreation (MWR) to implement a social media advertising campaign there. At a cost of \$250.00, a two-week Facebook, Twitter and Instagram advertising campaign targeted at the Fort Gordon community from November 18 to December 2 will encourage military families to come to the event in December.

Ms. Brown made a motion "to approve the minutes of the August 17, 2017 meeting," which had been distributed to those attending. Ms. Christian seconded the motion. ADOPTED.

April 4, 2018

The Meadow Garden Board met on Wednesday, April 4, 2018, at the Crowne Plaza Atlanta Perimeter at Ravinia, Atlanta. Joyce Ball Patton, State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. Other voting members attending were: Melodye G. Brown, Patricia Frederick Croft, Patricia Brand Colbert, Debbie Taylor Powell, Virginia "Ginger" Ranson Nicholson, Shelby Alderman Whitson, Marjorie Nolan Wilson, and Charlotte Josephine Christian. Also present were Ex Officio member O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle, non-voting member Shannon Cowles Logue, State Parliamentarian Kate Sievert Cook, and Carole Moore Schenck.

The State Regent introduced Greg Jacobs and Willian Santiago of Landmark Preservation LLC. Mr. Jacobs presented the completed *Historic Preservation and Restoration Master Plan for Meadow Garden*, and reviewed this comprehensive study of the timeline and architectural chronology of Meadow Garden, with detailed conditions assessment, recommendations, prioritization schedule, including operating and capital budget plans.

Mr. Jacobs stressed the necessity of adhering to the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Buildings – Restoration, in Appendix B of the Plan. There are specific Standards for Restoration and Guidelines for Restoring Historic Buildings which must be adhered to, especially in order to obtain grants. Mr. Jacobs pointed out two of these standards in particular. Number 7 states, "A false sense of history will not be created by adding conjectural features, features from other properties, or by combining features that never existed together historically." Number 10 states, "Designs that were never executed historically will not be constructed."

Mr. Jacobs stated that organization of archival information should be a top priority, adding that a copy of the Master Plan must be maintained in the archives (Stribling Room). He recommended a Curator be employed to manage the Master Plan, one who would be involved in everything to do with the maintenance and restoration of the property, and who would have the ability and the authority to manage the process. The key to the Master Plan is regular update, yearly updates based on findings, based on new research. It has to be a living adaptable thing. Mr. Jacobs suggested an exhibit in the Heritage Education Center to tell the story of DAR saving and preserving the historic property. He suggested pursuing non-DAR financial support, through corporate sponsors and other programs. The possibility of having HealthSouth hospital underwrite archaeology of the green spaces was discussed. Mr. Jacobs said implementation of the Master Plan is the next step and he and Landmark Preservation LLC would like to be involved going forward.

Mrs. Patton thanked Mr. Jacobs and Landmark Preservation LLC for the Master Plan. She expressed appreciation for a \$10,000.00 donation by Rose Elyea Bell towards the cost of producing the Plan.

The report of Meadow Garden Chair Nancy Parks was submitted stating a new refrigerator has been ordered for the Heritage Education Center, due to the failure of the current unit. There is no current evidence of carpenter bees on the steps, but this will need to be monitored. Richard Heaton of Heaton Clock Company repaired the grandfather clock in the Best Room. It now chimes on the hour, and must be wound once a week. Mrs. Parks plans to have the soiled chair in the "Library" steam cleaned this spring.

Pat Colbert reported the members of College Hill and the Augusta Chapters have been asked to organize a small reception at Meadow Garden on May 19 following the placing of a memorial at the Signers' Monument by four Georgia SAR Chapters. The reception is to be only for those who participated in the service, not the general public. The two DAR chapters will be responsible for the set-up and take down as well as all food and beverages. Tables and chairs on-site will be used, as well as some brought in. No tents will be set up and all activities will be held on the lawn. It was determined the historic house would remain open for tours at the normal fees on the day of the reception.

Patricia Croft reported that she had created a lesson plan for Meadow Garden as her New Horizons Project because we do not have a lesson plan, and there are no lesson plans from Georgia on the National website for educational resources. The lesson plan had been distributed to the Board prior to the meeting and was endorsed for submission to National. Mrs. Croft suggested we wait to post on the Meadow Garden website until after National had responded to the submission.

State Treasurer Debbie Powell reported \$373,127.87 in Certificates of Deposit, \$119,627.68 in Checking, \$46,866.66 in the Money Market, \$100.00 in Petty Cash, \$239,828.00 Total Fixed Assets, and \$779,550.21 Total Liabilities and Equity. There were two certificates of deposit which renewed at Brand Bank in March: Capital Investment #2 for \$100,000.00, and Capital Investment #3 for \$65,000.00. Both were renewed at 1.74% for 24 months.

Docent Chair Ginger Nicholson reported we now have 20 trained docents who have volunteered for special events such as "Christmas at Meadow Garden" and the holiday open house at the Governor's Mansion. Two docents played dulcimers at both events. Docents at both events wore Regency or Colonial era attire. During the rest of the year, a team of about 10 docents conduct tours of the historic house as needed. Most attend voluntary monthly meetings. Local docents alone contributed over 682 volunteer hours this year.

Gift Shop Chair Marjorie Wilson expressed appreciation to all the Daughters for their support of the Meadow Garden Gift Shop. She also extended gratitude for the time and service of Vice-Chair Elaine Dorr, Helen Dalton, Kate Sklikas, Pamela and Dwight Dover. Multiple trips were made to America's Mart to purchase items for the Gift Shop. Sales as reported on Square for 2017 exceeded \$30,000.00. The Gift Shop has sold more than 200 hats, 14 evening bags, 53 books, 39 pieces of china including children's tea sets, over 400 gift items, and 200 pieces of jewelry.

Patrons Chair Charlotte Christian reported 60 chapter Patrons, 322 individual Patrons, and 267 Volunteer hours logged for 2017.

Ms. Brown made a motion "to approve the minutes of the November 3, 2017 meeting", which had been distributed to those attending. Ms. Christian seconded the motion. ADOPTED.

Standing Rules for Meadow Garden

I MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

- The governing body of a Historic Site, in this instance the Meadow Garden Board, serves the public interest as it relates to Meadow Garden, and must consider itself accountable to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, as well as to Meadow Garden; members should not attempt to act in their individual capacities, but all actions should be taken as a Board, Committee, or otherwise in conformance with the Standing Rules, the Act of Incorporation, or applicable Resolutions.
- 2. The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the three (3) Trustees as named in the Deed from the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, conveying Meadow Garden to the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution; namely, the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the State Chair of Meadow Garden who is appointed by the State Regent; the Chapter Regents of the Augusta Chapter and the College Hill Chapter, both chapters being located in Augusta, who shall serve as Vice Chair to the State Chair of Meadow Garden; the State Treasurer; two Honorary State Regents; and six of the chairmen of Meadow Garden Committees, as appointed by the State Regent.
- 3. No Georgia Daughter shall serve in the same Meadow Garden Chairmanship more than three (3) consecutive terms.
- 4. In addition to the six appointments to the Board which are made by the State Regent, she shall appoint two (2) Honorary State Regents.
- 5. The State Second Vice Regent shall serve as *ex-officio* member of the Meadow Garden Board, being given the privilege of the floor without a vote.
- 6. The State Regent shall serve as Chair of the Meadow Garden Board, and the State First Vice Regent shall serve as Secretary of the Meadow Garden Board.
- 7. The Meadow Garden Board shall met a minimum of three (3) times each year; namely, preceding State Board of Management meeting, preceding annual State Conference and following Continental Congress, and at such other times as deemed necessary by the Chair of the Meadow Garden Board. At least one (1) meeting of the Board shall be held at Meadow Garden each year. The Board may vote by teleconference, fax or email, if necessary.
- 8. The Meadow Garden Board shall have jurisdiction over the operation, maintenance and work of Meadow Garden and shall be the authority for Meadow Garden as long as such authority is not in conflict with the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, the Act of Incorporation for the Georgia State Society, Resolutions adopted by the

Georgia State Society and/or directions which from time to time may be approved by action of the Georgia State Society assembled at its annual State Conference.

- 9. The Meadow Garden Board shall supervise the placing of all insurance to cover the grounds and the Historic House and its contents, including the fine arts, with accredited companies coverage to include fire, theft and liability.
- 10. Five (5) voting members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.
- 11. Minutes shall be kept of each meeting and a copy shall be sent to each member and printed verbatim in the State Proceedings.
- 12. All expenses for maintenance, operation and purchases of furnishings and plantings shall be authorized by the State Regent, as Chair of the Board, and paid by the State Treasurer. Expenditures exceeding \$1,000.00 must have the majority approval of the Board.
- 13. These rules will be binding on the actions of the Board in their operation of Meadow Garden. They may be changed by the following procedure: Members of the Board must have written notification of proposed changes one month prior to the next meeting of the Board; a two-thirds vote of the Board and approval of the State Conference are necessary to effect a change.
- 14. The State Regent shall appoint a Meadow Garden Advisory Board, which would act in an advisory capacity only and be composed of no more than fifteen (15) members representing various areas of expertise.

II OPERATIONS

- 1. Everyone entering Meadow Garden will be requested to sign the Register, including date, time of arrival and time of departure.
- No more than fifteen (15) people with each Docent are to be on tour in the house at a given time. Excess of this number may wait in the reception room or in the garden. The House Manager has the authority to enforce the Meadow Garden rules at all times.
- 3. There will be no smoking on Meadow Garden property.
- 4. No refreshments are to be served in or taken into the Historic House by visitors, including chapters or the public. Should a group, such as a visiting chapter, desire refreshments, the garden is available for use if litter is properly disposed of by the serving group.
- 5. Tour visitors will be asked to pay a fee as set by the Board.
- 6. In August 2006 Dixie Lock and Safe, Inc., installed new locks and keys were made which cannot be duplicated. The State Regent, State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Manager by the direction of one of the two above, are authorized to have new keys made for Meadow Garden.

There shall be two (2) complete sets of keys to Meadow Garden, which are eight (8) keys per set. There shall be four (4) sets of keys comprised of three (3) keys per set, which are the back door key to the historic house, the key to the George Walton Heritage Education Center, and the gate key. There shall be one (1) set of keys for "house" use, which are three (3) keys, one for the kitchen, one for the exterior bath at the historic house, and one for the interior door between the dining room and the old gift shop area. These three (3) "house" keys shall be kept in the old gift shop area for accessibility to all for use on a daily basis. There shall be one (1) gate key assigned to the landscape service company.

Keys are lettered per door of entry: Key # A is to the deadbolt of the three (3) doors of the George Walton Heritage Education Center; Key # B is to the deadbolt lock on the back door of the historic house; Key # C is to the gate; Key # D is to the Stribling Room in the George Walton Heritage Education Center; Key # E is to the kitchen; Key # F is to the deadbolt for the exterior bath at the historic house; Key # G is to the interior door between the dining room and the old gift shop; Key # H is to the office upstairs in the historic house.

<u>Keys are numbered</u> and assigned according to the appointed position on the Meadow Garden Board or as designated. Keys are distributed to the assigned person when they sign a "Meadow Garden Key Distribution Form." When this assigned person leaves her current position, she returns the keys and signs the same form she had signed when she accepted the keys. Keys go with the appointed position not the person.

Distribution of the keys: Key # 1 to State Regent Chair of Meadow Garden Board (complete set of 8 keys); Key # 2 to Meadow Garden Manager (complete set of 8 keys); Key # 3 to Chair of Meadow Garden (keys A, B, C); Key # 4 to Docents Chair (keys A, B, C); Key # 5 to Landscaping Chair (keys A, B, C); Key # 6 for General Docent use (keys A, B, C) – to be checked "out" and "in" when used; Key # 7 are "house" keys (keys E, F, G); Key # 8 to landscape service (key C). Key #9 to Furnishings Chair (Keys A, B, C).

III VOLUNTEERS AND DOCENTS

- 1. Docents, shall be those well screened and trained volunteers who will serve under the direct supervision of a Meadow Garden Chair and/or the House Manager.
- 2. Duties of docents shall include acting as guides, hostesses, working in gift shop, working in yard, cleaning in house, public relations. No volunteer work at or for Meadow Garden shall be done except under the direct guidance of the Meadow Garden Board and the chair of the specific committee for that particular function.
- 3. Cleaning or yard work volunteers shall be under the direction of the House Manager.

IV FURNISHINGS

- 1. Items bought or accepted for the older section of Meadow Garden must pre-date 1821.
- 2. (a) the front room on the main floor, known as the Augusta Room, will be designed as an interpretive center, highlighting people, events, and memorabilia related to George Walton and to the history of Meadow Garden; (b) the back room on the main floor, formerly known as the Board Room, will be used as a gift shop; (c) the front room on the upper floor of the newer section will be furnished as a bedroom/study of the period pre-dating 1850 or be used to display historically significant items relating to Meadow Garden, Augusta and Georgia; (d) the back room on the upper floor of the newer section will be used as an office for the Meadow Garden manager and for storage and supplies for the gift shop.
- 3. Reproductions may be used only when the physical condition of the antiques is jeopardized by exposure in areas where large numbers of visitors have easy access; or when environmental conditions including excessive light, dust, humidity or airborne impurities pose a threat to the preservation of originals.
- 4. Effective March 12, 1983 all items donated to Meadow Garden shall be accepted with the written condition that they become the property of Meadow Garden and may be used, replaced or sold at the discretion of the Meadow Garden Board only.
- 5. All items that postdate 1821, with the exception of those in the six (6) rooms of the newer section and those described in Number 3 of this section, shall be replaced as soon as possible with similar items pre-dating 1821.
- 6. Once an item is placed, it shall not be moved from one location to another without permission of the Meadow Garden Chair of Furnishings who shall report such changes to the Meadow Garden Board in a timely manner.
- 7. Any item donated or purchased must have written documentation of appraisal.
- 8. No items and/or furnishings shall be accepted "on loan."
- 9. A file will be kept of all assets with information as to price paid or market value, date of acquisition, donor or where bought, documentation and appraisal and a description of article. One file will be kept in the reception room accessible to the Docents; a duplicate file will be in the possession of the Chairman of the Board. The Meadow

Garden Furnishings Chair shall maintain and keep current the "Past and Perfect" Program on all items and furnishings.

- 10. All items purchased or donated will be added to the Fine Arts insurance policy. Said policy will be reviewed and updated a minimum of once a year. Major additions to furnishings will be added immediately.
- 11. Future plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the Historic House.

V LANDSCAPING

- 1. The landscape plan adopted by the Board shall be adhered to with no deviation unless recommended by an authority on landscape design and care.
- 2. Donations of shrubbery, plants or trees shall be accepted only when item is part of the master plan.
- 3. Work on the grounds will be under the sole direction of the Meadow Garden Board and the Landscaping Chair. Supervision of actual work will be provided by the Meadow Garden Chair or the Landscaping Chair of Meadow Garden.

VI GIFT SHOP

- 1. The Chair of the committee will be responsible for all purchases, subject to the approval of the Board or the State Regent. The Vice Chair shall assist the Gift Shop Chair with sales at state functions.
- Gift Shop operations will be self-supporting. In the event funds are needed for purchases, they may be advanced from available Meadow Garden funds and must be considered a loan and shall be repaid without interest within one (1) year from date of borrowing.
- **3.** Profit from the Gift Shop shall be accounted for within the State Treasurer's books, with a percentage being transferred at the discretion of the Board at the end of the fiscal year and placed in the Maintenance Account. The audit of the Gift Shop operation shall be included in the annual audit of the Georgia State Society.

VII PATRONS

- 1. Donors to the following categories are eligible to be recognized:
 - A. Meadow Garden Capital Investment Trust Fund
 - B. Furnishings
 - C. Maintenance
 - D. Landscape
 - E. Heritage Education
- 2. Giving categories and levels for annual contributions:
 - \$10 Friends
 - \$25 Supporters
 - \$35 Signers
 - \$50 Patrons
 - \$103* The 1900 Society (*giving level for 2003, giving would increase by \$1
 - each year)
 - \$250 Sons and Daughters of Liberty
 - \$500 Octavia's Legacy
 - \$1,000 George Walton Society
 - \$5,000 Meadow Garden Preservation Society

This information will be publicized in the Meadow Garden brochure and other appropriate places as determined by the Board.

- 3. Chapter gifts, above the State Honor Roll requirements, automatically qualify the chapter to be recognized at an appropriate giving level determined by the categories listed in #2.
- 4. The State Treasurer will report these gifts to the Patrons Chair.

- 5. The Patrons Chair will issue certificates to the qualifying individuals and chapters or groups.
- 6. A permanent book will be kept on public display at Meadow Garden to record the names of those who give at the Patrons level or above.
- 7. The Patrons Chair will enter the names of donors in the appropriate book a minimum of once a year.
- 8. The Meadow Garden Patrons book shall be divided into four parts: (1) Individuals who give a minimum of fifty dollars in one payment, and chapters, organizations, businesses or groups that give a minimum of one hundred dollars in one payment; (2) In-Kind Patrons approved by the Meadow Garden Board in recognition of outstanding and/or unusual gifts of time, talents or expertise toward the betterment of Meadow Garden; (3) Honoraria, which shall list individuals or groups honored by a Patron gift as designated in #1, such listing to show the name of honoree (Patron) and the donor; (4) Memorials of at least fifty dollars which shall list the name of the individual memorialized and the name of the donor.

VIII PLAQUES AND MARKERS

- Plaques/Markers may be placed at Meadow Garden only at the discretion of the Board, and request meets the following criteria: Substantial service and/or contributions that secured the property and the heritage for the GSDAR. Individuals so recognized shall have been deceased for at least 5 years; Plaque/Marker will be paid for by person(s) requesting such recognition.
- 2. Such plaques will be permanently displayed at Meadow Garden and a record of the honoree's service and/or contribution will be recorded and placed in the Meadow Garden file, with Board approval.
- 3. Plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the Historic House. Additional markers shall not be permanently placed on the grounds.

Bylaws

GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION April 2018 Amendments indicated by underlining.

Article I NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II OBJECTS

The objects of this Society shall be:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of the Georgia State Society.

Article IV OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian and a State Curator.

Section 2. (a) To be eligible for state office, a member shall hold and have held membership in a chapter or chapters within the Georgia State Society for at least 5 years prior to her election and have served a full term as chapter officer or state chair.

(b) No member shall be eligible to the same state office for two (2) successive terms. A member having served more than one half of a term in a state office shall be deemed to have served a full term.

(c) No two state officers shall be members of the same chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

(d) To be eligible for the office of State Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State First Vice Regent or as State Second Vice Regent or served in each of these two offices of the Georgia Society.

(e) To be eligible for the office of State First Vice Regent or for the office of State Second Vice Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State Recording Secretary or as State Treasurer of the Georgia State Society and shall have served a full term as a Chapter Regent of a chapter in the Georgia State Society.

Section 3. In recognition of valuable service to the Georgia State Society, a State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent for life by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Article V

NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. (a) A candidate for state office shall request the endorsement of her chapter, taken by a vote at a regular meeting of the chapter held between September and December preceding the State Conference at which state elections are held. The endorsement, signed by the Chapter Recording Secretary, shall include the office the candidate seeks and shall be received by the State Regent with the candidate's statement of intent to be a candidate prior to any announcement or campaigning by the chapter and/or her supporters. The candidate to be endorsed shall be a member of the chapter which endorses her for at least one year."

(b) A candidate for State Regent who wishes to present a slate of officers shall send to the State Regent in one packet the chapter endorsements and the statements of intent for each of her selected candidates. If received by the State Regent no later than December 1, these candidates shall be listed as a slate in the State Regent's Call to State Conference.

(c) Candidates wishing to run independently of a slate, whose chapter endorsements and statements of intent are received by the State Regent no later than December 1 shall be listed as independent candidates in the State Regent's Call to State Conference.

(d) A candidate whose chapter endorsement and statement of intent have been properly received by the State Regent may choose to announce her candidacy separate from the State Regent's Call to State Conference. Such a chapter endorsement and statement of intent shall be received by the State Regent at least <u>thirty (30)</u> days prior to the opening of the State Conference at which the election is to take place.

(e) A candidate who does not meet the requirements of these Bylaws shall be declared disqualified and ineligible for consideration for state office.

(f) A chapter shall endorse no more than one chapter member for state office per election with the possible exception of candidates for State Regent and for State Corresponding Secretary.

(g) In the event of the death, incapacitation or withdrawal of a candidate prior to the election, a replacement shall be made with notification in writing to the State Regent and accompanied by the chapter endorsement and statement of intent as directed by these Bylaws.

Section 2. Nominations of candidates for all state offices shall be made at a designated meeting of the State Conference.

Section 3. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected biennially at the State Conference. A majority vote shall elect. <u>If there is only one candidate for an office, election shall be by voice vote. For any contested positions, the vote shall be by ballot.</u> Independent candidates shall be listed on the ballot in a separate column from those candidates presented as a slate.

Section 4. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two (2) years or until their successors are elected. Their terms of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Section 5. (a) Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become State Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become State First Vice Regent subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. Vacancies in other state offices shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next State Board of Management meeting or State Conference, whichever shall come first.

(b) Any state officer who is absent from the state for a continuous period of six (6) months or longer shall automatically relinquish her position as a state officer.

Section 6. Upon the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Organizing Secretary General.

Section 7. (a) A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot.

(b) The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than eighteen (18) months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

(c) The endorsement shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent with the candidate's name and address to the Recording Secretary General to be received by the first day of the month preceding the designated Continental Congress.

Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall perform the duties prescribed in this article, and parliamentary authority adopted by the Society, and such others as the State Board of Management and the National Society may require.

Section 2. The State Regent shall:

(a) be the chief executive officer and the official spokesman for the State Society;

(b) have general supervision of the affairs of the State Society;

(c) preside at all meetings of the State Conference, State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;

(d) appoint a State Chair for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society;

(e) be ex-officio a member of all committees;

(f) appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as advisor in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting;

(g) sign all contracts and agreements made in the name of the Georgia State Society with the recorded approval of the Executive Committee and the State Board of Management or the State Conference as directed by these Bylaws;

(h) be bonded and have the authority to draw upon funds of the State Society with the approval of the Finance Committee;

(i) recommend to the Finance Committee a Certified Public Accountant who shall be approved by the Finance Committee.

Section 3. The State First Vice Regent shall:

(a) perform the duties of the office of State Regent in the absence or inability of the State Regent;

(b) fill a vacancy in the office of State Regent;

(c) Perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;

(d) serve on those committees as designated by these Bylaws and as directed by the State Regent;

(e) <u>Prepare the courtesy resolutions for business meetings of the Georgia State</u> <u>Society for the review and approval of the Resolutions Committee.</u>

Section 4. The State Second Vice Regent shall:

(a) perform the duties of the office of State First Vice Regent in the absence or inability of the State First Vice Regent;

(b) fill a vacancy in the office of State First Vice Regent;

(c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;

(d) serve on committees as directed by the State Regent.

Section 5. The State Chaplain shall:

(a) open all meetings of the State Conference and the State Board of Management with scripture reading and prayer;

(b) preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and conduct such other religious services as may be required;

(c) be custodian of state properties pertaining to the duties of this office;

(d) be responsible for IN MEMORIAM pages in the Proceedings.

Section 6. The State Recording Secretary shall:

(a) record the proceedings of the meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;

(b) compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and the Proceedings Committee;

(c) submit to the appropriate National officers, the endorsement for Vice President General and the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent by the first day of the month preceding the month of Continental Congress of the year in which said balloting was held.

Section 7. The State Corresponding Secretary shall:

(a) At the direction of the State Regent, conduct email, postal correspondence and produce publications on behalf of the Georgia State Society:

(b) With guidance of the State Regent and State Conference Chair, prepare the State Conference Program and arrange for printing. Present the Program at the State Conference;

(c) Prepare the State Directory and maintain updates for inclusion in the Georgia State Society website:

(d) Have for sale at all state meetings certificates of appreciation and certificates of award.

Section 8. The State Organizing Secretary shall:

(a) assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new chapters;

(b) assist chapters in conjunction with appropriate state officers and chairmen in revitalization.

Section 9. The State Treasurer shall:

(a) be bonded;

(b) be the custodian of the funds of the State Society, placing them in institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance. <u>Place Certificates of Deposit after receiving written approval on rate and term from the State Regent and State Chairman of the Finance Committee;</u>

(c) receive the state dues and delegate fees from the chapters and receive all sums contributed by the chapters and others for state and national projects, disbursing monthly to the Treasurer General all funds designated for special projects. Receive State Conference registration fees and events funds from the State Conference and Events Treasurer. Disburse other funds only when authorized by the State Regent in writing:

(d) upon receipt of verified expenses paid by the State Regent for travel and hotel, reimburse the State Regent for these expenses up to the amount approved in the budget for the State Regent's expenses;

(e) keep an account of all sums received or disbursed by using accounting software and keep receipt/copies for all transactions;

(f) prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference ten (10) days in advance of each meeting for distribution at the meetings; (g) be a member of the Finance Committee, <u>the Meadow Garden Board</u>, and ex-officio member of the Credentials Committee;

(h) prepare reports for the Proceedings Book, Executive Board Meetings, Meadow Garden Board Meetings, and, as needed to State Officers, State Chairmen, and Clubs;

(i) <u>monitor chapter filings with the Internal Revenue Service due the 15th day of the fifth month after the close of the chapters fiscal year.</u>

(j) prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year, said audit by a Certified Public Accountant, shall be performed and delivered within forty-five (45) days of receipt of books;

(k) <u>arrange preparation of both federal and state tax returns by a Certified Public</u> <u>Accountant; filings are due the 15th day of the fifth month after the close of the fiscal year;</u>

(I) provide copies of audit and tax returns to the Treasurer General;

(m) keep State Treasurer Instructions and Chapter Treasurers instructions current;

(n) retain or destroy records according to their schedule provided by the Treasurer General.

Section 10. The State Registrar shall:

(a) when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution prove eligibility and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars;

(b) <u>report on membership changes</u>, by application, transfers, reinstatements and resignations at State Conference;

(c) <u>communicate with Chapter Registrars changes in procedures from the National</u> <u>Society:</u>

(d) review e-membership chapter reports and identify problems within chapters and offer assistance;

(e) <u>in conjunction with the Membership Committee</u>, <u>communicate with Chapter</u> <u>Registrars concerning the Prospective Member Database (PMD)</u>.

Section 11. The State Historian shall:

(a) be in charge, within the state, of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General as well as those authorized by the Georgia State Society;

(b) keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves within the state;

(c) prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General;

(d) promote the study of American history, state and county history and historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the founding of our state and counties;

(e) Facilitates the NSDAR Outstanding Teacher of American History contest.

Section 12. The State Librarian shall:

(a) serve as liaison between the Librarian General and the Georgia Chapters and disseminate general information on the NSDAR Library;

(b) cooperate with the director of the Georgia Department of Archives and History, making the needs of the Archives known to the chapters;

(c) collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing them wherever accepted in such libraries and Archives as may be chosen by the State Board of Management;

(d) solicit, with the approval of the Executive Committee, contributions from the chapters for purchase of such books as requested by the office of the Librarian General, and/or the various libraries in Georgia which the State Society approves;

(e) receive gifts of books and other printed material from the chapters to be donated to the approved libraries and Archives;

(f) maintain a constant supply of bookplates to the NSDAR Library, the Georgia Department of Archives and History and for purchase by the chapters.

Section 13. The State Curator shall: be custodian of the State portable properties and shall have them properly stored and made ready for use at state meetings.

Section 14. All officers will keep a Procedure Book of Instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new officers to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. State Conference:

a) The annual meeting of the Georgia State Society shall be known as the State Conference. It shall be for the purpose of:

(1) receiving reports of officers, committees and Chapter Regents;

(2) electing officers biennially;

(3) promoting programs in furtherance of the objects of the Society;

(4) any other business that may arise:

i. annual budget shall be adopted,

ii. all projects of the State Society requiring funding shall be voted upon at State Conference or ratified by members at State Conference if previously voted upon by the State Board of Management,

iii. no project extending beyond the term of the presiding officer may be accepted at any meeting other than by vote at State Conference.

(b) The State Conference shall be held between February 1 and April 10 but shall not convene during Holy Week.

(c) The State Regent shall fix the time and place of meetings;

(d) The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credentials form to the chapters not less than sixty (60) days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 2. The voting members of the State Conference shall be:

(a) the officers and Honorary State Regents of the State Society;

(b) the officers and honorary officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state;

(c) the Chapter Regent, or in her absence, the Vice Regent or alternate of each chapter;

(d) delegates or alternates of each chapter of the state as designated by the Bylaws of the National Society for representation at Continental Congress.

Section 3. Only a chapter member in good standing whose credentials have been completed in accordance with the instructions of the State Regent and the State Credentials Chair for the State Conference and in accordance with the Standing Rules of the National Society shall be eligible to represent her chapter at state and national meetings.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the chapter, except in the case of the Regent or Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at an annual State Conference, shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the state of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference the privilege of the floor and the right to speak shall be accorded to the State Chairmen and State Vice Chairmen. They may not vote unless they are duly registered as voters of the State Conference.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Society may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen (15) days' notice of the time and place shall be given.

The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Forty-five (45) voting members, representing not less than twenty (20) chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The state officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents and the Regents, or in their absence, the Vice Regents of the chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting <u>between</u> <u>annual meetings</u>. It may meet whenever called by the State Regent. A minimum of <u>thirty</u> (30) days' notice shall be given as to the time and place of any such meeting.

Section 3. Thirty (30) members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference or as proscribed by these Bylaws.

Section 5. All members in good standing of the Georgia State Society may attend the meeting of the State Board of Management. The State chairmen, Vice chairmen, committee members of Administrative, Standing, Special, State and Meadow Garden Committees shall be granted the privilege of the floor and the right to speak, but shall not vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article IX EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, shall attend the meetings, but may not vote.

Section 3. This Executive Committee shall:

(a) perform such duties of the State Board of Management between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient;

(b) meet at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three (3) members of the committee;

(c) vote by teleconference, e-mail or fax, if necessary;

(d) receive and make recommendations for projects requiring expenditure of funds outside routine expenditures to be considered by the State Conference. <u>This includes the State Regent's Projects within the State of Georgia, at the National Society, and at the DAR-approved schools.</u>

(e) make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. Decisions of the Executive Committee shall be acted upon at the next meeting of the State Board of Management or at State Conference, whichever shall come first.

Article X FINANCES

Section 1. (a) The fiscal year of the Georgia State Society shall be July 1 through the last day of June.

(b) The annual budget, prepared by the Finance Committee, shall cover the fiscal year and be prepared on the basis of dues payable for the calendar year beginning December first preceding. (c) The Finance Committee shall propose the per capita amount and distribute according to the annual membership count. The per capita amount and distribution shall be indicated on the budget presented annually. Funds to be included in the per capita designations shall be Friends of DAR Schools, Lucy Cook Peel Fund, McCall Genealogical Fund and Meadow Garden Maintenance.

Section 2. The annual dues of chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be \$10.00 for each member of the chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1.

Section 3. (a) Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the state dues, a conference registration fee of \$15.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under these Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether chapter is represented or not.

(b) Honorary State Regents and State Officers shall pay a conference fee of \$15.00 at the time of registration or shall include the conference registration fee in the check for Conference meal reservations.

(c) Other members of the Georgia State Society who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a conference fee of \$10.00 at the time of registration or shall include the conference registration fee in the check for Conference meal reservations."

(d) All host chapters may charge a registration fee to those not purchasing a meal ticket to off-set the cost of hosting state/district meetings.

Section 4. (a) The State Treasurer and the State Regent and such others entrusted with funds of the Georgia State Society as may be designated by the State Board of Management shall be bonded. (See Article VI, Sections 2 and 9);

(b) The State Treasurer with the approval of the State Regent and the State Chair of the Finance Committee shall place the funds of the Georgia State Society in financial institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage;

(c) The placement of restricted savings funds and investment funds of the Georgia State Society shall be placed to the credit of the Georgia State Society by the State Treasurer under the direction of the Finance Committee. Monies may be invested in U. S. Treasury obligations or other interest bearing obligations of federally insured financial institutions;

(d) The accounts of the State Treasurer shall be annually prepared for audit by a Certified Public Accountant immediately following the end of the State Society fiscal year and no later than July 15 and delivered to the CPA by that date;

(e) Should the State Treasurer be incapacitated, the State Regent, after consultation with the Chair of the Finance Committee and with the approval of the Executive Committee, shall appoint an Acting State Treasurer to serve until such time as the State Treasurer is able to resume her duties or a new State Treasurer is appointed and ratified as stated in Article V, Section 5 (a).

Section 5. The expenses incurred by the State Regent in the performance of duty shall be paid each year from the State Dues Fund:

(a) **Six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00)** shall be taken each year to defray her necessary travel expenses;

(b) Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent, as budgeted, shall be paid by the State Treasurer who shall keep all receipts of these expenses. No expenses exceeding the budgeted amount shall be paid by the State Treasurer.

Section 6. At the close of the books annually, \$5,000.00 shall be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies Fund" so that at the end of each administration a total of \$10,000.00 will be reserved. This money is to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration.

Article XI COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Honorary State Regents of the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution shall function as an advisory committee to the State Regent and to the Georgia State Society.

Section 2. The State Regent shall appoint the following standing committees:

(a) Bylaws: This committee shall be composed of <u>one (1)</u> Honorary State Regent, <u>the</u> <u>State First Vice Regent</u> and one (1) member from each of the districts; each of the members representing the districts shall not be serving on any other State Standing Committee. The State Parliamentarian shall serve as an advisory member of the committee. <u>The State Regent shall appoint the chair of the committee.</u>

(b) Finance: This committee shall be composed of seven (7) members to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, <u>one (1)</u> Honorary State Regent, one (1) active chapter regent, and <u>two (2)</u> active chapter members <u>from different districts</u>, <u>neither of whom</u> shall be an Honorary State Regent nor a State Officer nor a chapter regent nor from the same district as the appointed active chapter regent. From these seven (7) members the State Regent shall appoint the chair of the committee. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund. This committee shall have charge of all investments of the Georgia State Society's funds.

(c) Resolutions: This committee shall be composed of all Honorary State Regents, the State First Vice Regent, the State Parliamentarian, and one chapter member from each district, who is not serving on any other State Standing Committee.

(d) Proceedings: This committee shall be composed of the State Recording Secretary, the immediate past State Recording Secretary, the State First Vice Regent, and four (4) additional members, at least one of whom shall be an Honorary State Regent. The four (4) members, including the Honorary State Regent, shall represent different districts; and the members, excluding the Honorary State Regent, shall not be serving on any other State Standing Committee. The State Regent shall appoint the chair of the committee.

Section 3. The State Regent shall appoint such other committees, standing or special, as the State Conference shall authorize and actions of the State Board of Management and of the National Society shall require. The appointments shall be concurrent with the term of the State Regent making the appointments and shall terminate with the end of the administration.

Section 4. Additional appointments may be made to any of the committees and vacancies shall be filled by the State Regent with timely notification to the membership.

Section 5. The duties of committees shall be such as these Bylaws, the State Conference, the State Board of Management or the National Society shall prescribe.

Section 6. All chairmen will keep a Procedure Book of instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

Article XII CHAPTERS

Section 1. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April 1 in the year of chapter elections. The Chapter Regent shall report annually the names of the elected officers promptly on the form provided by the State Regent for this purpose, with copies to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, and the State Recording Secretary.

Section 2. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent, the State Recording Secretary, and the District Director at the time designated by the State Regent

Article XIII DISTRICTS

Section 1. The State Regent-elect shall divide the state into a minimum of four districts, using logic and geography to determine boundaries.

Section 2. <u>Workshop(s) shall be held annually</u>, the location(s) shall be strategically chosen to be convenient to the Georgia chapter members.

Section 3. The State Regent shall appoint a Coordinator of Districts who shall have served a full two-year term as a District Director, and who is not serving as a chapter regent during her term as Coordinator of Districts. She shall work with the State Regent and the District Directors in coordinating the workshops and the State Regent's official chapter visits in each district; and shall offer guidance to the District Directors.

Section 4. The State Regent shall appoint a District Director to serve in each district. She shall have served a full two-year term as a chapter regent within the district she serves as Director. She shall work with the hostess chapter(s) in planning the workshop within her district and shall work with the State Regent in planning her official visits to the chapters within her district and may accompany the State Regent on these official visits.

XIV

MEADOW GARDEN

Meadow Garden, property owned by the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, shall be operated as follows:

(a) The governing body shall be the Board of Trustees composed of the following members: the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Chair who shall be appointed by the State Regent;

(b) The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the following members: the State Regent who shall serve as Chair; the State First Vice Regent who shall serve as Secretary; the Chair of Meadow Garden; the Regents of the Augusta and College Hill Chapters; the State Treasurer; two (2) Honorary State Regents; and the chairmen of the six (6) subcommittees appointed by the State Regent - Docents, Furnishings, Landscaping, Gift Shop, Patrons and Public Relations.

(c) The Meadow Garden Board shall operate with Standing Rules approved by the State Conference.

Article XV RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. The current edition of *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised*, shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law in matters not covered by these Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

Article XVI AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent, the State Parliamentarian, and the State Bylaws Chair <u>at least two weeks</u> prior to the State Board of Management. The proposed amendments should include the date of the proposal with the rationale and the name of the proposer. The State Regent shall send a copy <u>of the proposed amendment</u> to each chapter, at least sixty (60) days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the Call to Conference.

Section 2. The Bylaws Committee shall forward to the State Regent proposed amendments duly submitted, provided the subject matter is suitable for inclusion in the Bylaws and the proposal is in proper form, and if found not to be suitable subject matter.

may reject the proposal, or if not in proper form, may revise, return it to the proposer for redrafting, or take such action as is deemed in order.

<u>Section 3</u>. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

Article XVII DISSOLUTION

Although the period of duration of the Georgia State Society is perpetual, if for any reason the State Society is to be dissolved or otherwise terminated, no part of the property of the Society or any of the proceeds shall be distributed to or inure to the benefit of any of the officers or members of the Society. Upon the dissolution of the Georgia State Society, assets shall be distributed by the Board of Management and/or the Executive Committee to and only to the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the local United States District Court, exclusively to such organization or organizations as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated within the meaning of section 501 (c)(3), with purposes and objectives consistent with those of the Georgia State Society.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year, a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24, 1899. Bylaws were adopted, and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21) No Conference was held in 1911, the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912," and amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, page 211).

AWARDS

All Chapters competing for awards must send reports to the respective chairs by the listed due dates. See the "Georgia Regents' Calendar" for a compilation of dates or the Individual Chair's Instructions in the CIP (Chapter Information Packet). Both documents are posted on-line on the Georgia Members Website. All reports for awards are based on membership confirmed by the National Society. The reporting year is January 1 - December 31.

BYLAWS

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National or State Bylaws, and a current copy is to be filed with the State Parliamentarian. Proposed Amendments to the State Bylaws shall include the date of the Proposal with the Rationale and name of the Proposer and shall be sent to the State Regent, the State Parliamentarian, and the State Chair of the Bylaws Committee at least two (2) weeks prior to the GSSDAR Fall Board of Management meeting. *Proceedings* amended 2017-2018.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS

Notice of change of address of members shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General on the Membership Change Form or by eMembership; also the State Regent, State Corresponding Secretary, and State Registrar by the Chapter Registrar.

CHANGE OF NAME

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General on the Membership Change Form or by eMembership; also the State Regent, State Corresponding Secretary, and State Registrar by the Chapter Registrar.

CHAPTER ELECTIONS

Chapter elections are to be held before April 1. Names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General by email on "Chapter Officers Report Form" (CORF); and in state by email using the GSSDAR CORF, sent to the State Regent or the State Regent-Elect; the State Recording Secretary; and the State Corresponding Secretary by April 1. The full Christian name of chapter officers shall be given, along with her husband's given name or initials, address, zip code, telephone number, fax and email. In accordance with the National Bylaws, a Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years.

CHAPTER REPRESENTATION AT STATE AND NATIONAL MEETINGS

At the State Board of Management, a chapter is represented by the Chapter Regent or in her absence by the First Vice Regent, and one non-voting member, if invited by the Chapter Regent.

The voting representation of each chapter at State Conference and Continental Congress shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received in the Office of the Treasurer General by December 1. Membership 12-19: Regent only; 20-49: Regent + 1 delegate = 2 votes; 50-99: Regent + 2 delegates = 3 votes; 100-149: Regent + 3 delegates = 4 votes; 150-199: Regent + 4 delegates = 5 votes; 200-249: Regent + 5 delegates = 6 votes; 250-299: Regent + 6 delegates = 7 votes. Chapters with membership of 300 and over will have an additional delegate for each additional 50 members exceeding 299.

CONFERENCE REGISTRATION

On or before December 1, each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer the state dues and a Conference Registration fee of \$15.00 per each delegate to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws. This fee is to be paid whether represented or not and is derived by recommendation of the Finance Committee to the Executive Committee. This is a requirement stated in the Georgia State Bylaws, Article X, Section 3 (a).

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the Conference Registration Fee of \$15.00 at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters, shall pay a Conference Registration Fee of \$10.00 at the time of registration.

DATE FOR ANNUAL AUDIT

The Georgia State Society Fiscal Year is July 1 to June 30. State Bylaws, Article X, Section 1 (a). The State Treasurer should prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year. Bylaw Article VI, Section 9 (j).

DEADLINES

State Officers and Chairs welcome chapter reports when completed. Deadline dates are given to ensure conformity for inclusion in reports to National Officers. Per National Society Bylaws, the deadline date is determined by the United States Postal Service or other carrier, showing cancellation date and not by the date reports are received.

DECEASED MEMBERS

Deaths shall be reported promptly to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Chaplain and the State Registrar by the corresponding Chapter officer. A complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name, and date of death shall be furnished to the State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for the Conference Memorial Service and for State *Proceedings*.

DUES

Before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer sends to the State Treasurer state dues of \$10.00 per member. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the monthly National Board of Management meeting, which is the 5th of every month. Before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer sends to the office of the Organizing Secretary General National dues of \$40.00 per member except Life Members, with check made payable to the Treasurer General NSDAR.

Deadline for a Chapter to forward entries for the scholarship contest to the District Vice Chair is Nov. 1, 2018. State Awards are State Winner/Sponsoring Chapter; District Winners/Sponsoring Chapters; Best Chapter Report; Chapters Sponsoring 10 or More Schools; Largest Single Monetary Award; Largest Total Monetary Awards; Chapters Awarding \$500.00 or More to a Single Student; Chapters Awarding \$500.00 or More in Total Monetary Awards.

DAR LIBRARY

Committee awards are given for Most Books Donated to the DAR Library, Most Books Donated to a Local Library, Most Volunteer Hours in Local Libraries, Largest Chapter Donation to State Library Fund. Deadline is 01 February.

DAR MAGAZINE

State Chair will award two traveling CRYSTAL TROPHIES to the chapters with the highest subscription percentages. Chapter member subscriptions and gift subscriptions both count toward a chapter's totals. Subscriptions are due by December 31, 2018. The Chapter with largest percentage of subscriptions will win the traveling CRYSTAL CUP TROPHY. The Chapter with the largest percentage INCREASE of subscriptions from the previous year will win the traveling BLUE CRYSTAL CUP TROPHY. Any chapter can win, from the smallest chapter to the largest, or the most newly organized chapter to the oldest.

DAR PROJECT PATRIOT

State Chair will present AWARD CERTIFICATES for the Best Overall Chapter Report; Greatest Number of Care Packages sent; Most Coupons sent; Most Donations made National, and locally; and Most Creative Event to Support the Troops

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERANS

State Chair will present an Outstanding Veteran Volunteer Award, Outstanding Youth Volunteer Award, and Outstanding DAR Service for Veterans Award. Deadline for State nominations is December 15, 2018.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS

To be considered for awards submit documents to the State Chair by November 1st. National Awards are given in the six membership categories for the largest number of pages of original source records contributed and a single award for the chapter in the nation submitting the most pages of original source records. State Certificates of Awards are given to the chapter for greatest number of unpublished, abstracted or copied pages; greatest number of chapter members participating; greatest number of names entered in Book Indexing Project; and greatest number of pages synced in Book Indexing Project.

GEORGIA DAY

State Chair will offer Certificates of Appreciation for chapter participation. Reporting deadline is February 1, 2019.

HIGHTOWER DAR SCHOOL AWARD

Ten dollars (\$10.00) is awarded to each chapter meeting the following requirements: Chapter made contributions for Georgia special projects at Tamassee DAR School, Kate Duncan Smith DAR School, AND Berry College totaling a minimum of \$1.00 per member (count on Jan. 1, 2018) on Chapter Treasurer's Annual Report and Remittance Form GTR-01 to State Treasurer by Nov. 1, 2018 and have one full program OR a two minute spot on DAR Schools at each meeting.

HISTORIC PRESERVATION

HP Medals are presented to individuals or groups who have achieved major Historic Preservation efforts. HP Awards are issued to chapters or individuals who are making strides in the area of Historic Preservation. Entries to the Historic Preservation Contest are judged on a State, District and National level. Deadline for entry is January 31. Certificates will be given to participants in all categories as well as the chapter with the best CMR Report.

JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS

State Awards: All entries are due to this state chair before January 1st. All state winners will receive a certificate and be sent for judging at the national level.

National Awards: Classroom Grant Project sponsored by the National Junior Membership Committee allows for teachers (K-12, any subject) to submit a grant proposal which directly benefits students in their classroom. (Award: two \$500.00 grants per state.)

LITERACY PROMOTION

Recognition for: Outstanding service of a DAR member, Outstanding service of a DAR chapter, Outstanding service of a state contest, Deadline: December 31st, 2018.

MEADOW GARDEN PATRONS

MEADOW GARDEN PIN: Patronage at the "Olivia's Legacy" level (\$500.00) or greater or 50 volunteer hours at Meadow Garden qualifies an individual to purchase an elegant Meadow Garden Pin. Each subsequent year's \$50.00 or more Patron donation qualifies for a pearl to attach to the Pin. MEADOW GARDEN PATRON RECOGNITION: Each individual or chapter will be honored with a Meadow Garden Patron Certificate. Individuals or chapters contributing at the "The 1900 Society" level and above will receive special recognition for select Meadow Garden events and/or publications.

MEMBERSHIP

National Award for Chapters with 10% growth in members by new application and less than 2% dropped for nonpayment of dues. GSSDAR Membership Awards: Traveling Silver Bowl is given to an established chapter with the largest number of new members by application.

The Eagle Award is given to an established chapter with the greatest percentage increase in membership by application. Recognition for chapters with Zero dropped members and chapters with less than 2% dropped.

NATIONAL DEFENSE

Awards bestowed by this committee are: Gold ROTC Medal, Bronze ROTC Medal, Silver DAR Outstanding Cadet Medal, DAR Youth Citizenship Medal and DAR Distinguished Citizen Medal.

PATRIOT RECORDS PROJECT

The two state awards are based on numbers that NSDAR tallies automatically for DAR member volunteers who serve on this project: the DAR chapter whose team of Patriot Record Project volunteers indexes the most names and the DAR chapter member who indexes the most names for the Patriot Records Project in the calendar year.

The following will be recognized: 1) Best Use of Social Media 2) Best Overall Publicity 3) Best Press Release.

PRESIDENT GENERAL'S PROJECT

If your chapter submits the entire \$7.50/member in the first year of a new President General's term, your chapter will be recognized at Continental Congress for 100% participation each of the three years of her term! By contributing \$2.50/member/year, your chapter will be recognized at the end of the President General's three-year term.

SERVICE TO AMERICA

The numbers of hours will be reported as an aggregate by chapters via the Online Tally, and individually by members on the members' only website. Emphasis will be placed on the stories associated with this service challenge and reported in the Chapter Master Report. Awards include the First Chapter to complete the national CMR; Certificates of Outstanding Use of a Computer presented to the individuals that our regents nominate on the CMR; (Note: Each regent may nominate one chapter member.) VIS Volunteer of the Year Award is presented to the Daughter, nominated by her regent on the national CMR, who has done the most outstanding work with a computer to meet the goals of VIS and NSDAR at the chapter, state, and national levels. Deadline: The national CMR must be completed online by February 1, 2019.

WOMEN'S ISSUES

State Chair will offer First, Second, and Third place Certificates in each of the three Women's Issues Essay Contest categories: Health, Family, and Career. State Awards: Essay Contest. The deadline for submission is Jan 9, 2019.
