## REAFFIRMATION ON AMERICAN HISTORY

- 1. In favor of more emphasis being given to the teaching of American History in our public schools (page 37 of 1961 Proceedings).
- 2. Protection of the valuation of the American dollar and the importance of the government's encouraging independence of its citizens in monetary matters (page 35 of 1961 Proceedings and page 47 of 1964 Proceedings).

## HISTORY OF REVOLUTIONARY ANCESTORS

WHEREAS many members of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, have established their lineage on Revolutionary Soldiers who were not living or buried in Georgia; and

WHEREAS by restricting the publishing of the Histories to Georgia Revolutionary Soldiers we limit the value of this work; therefore

RESOLVED, That the name of the committee be changed to "Collecting and Publishing Histories of the Revolutionary Ancestors of Georgia members."

#### PRAYER

WHEREAS the Senate of the United States has rejected a Constitutional amendment that would specifically authorize voluntary prayer in the public schools, and

WHEREAS there will be efforts to have such amendment passed both in the State Legislature and the Congress; therefore

## GEORGIA DELEGATION MEETING

#### SEVENTY-SIXTH CONTINENTAL CONGRESS

## WASHINGTON - APRIL 17, 1967

The meeting of the Georgia Daughters attending Continental Congress was held in the Assembly Room of the Administration Building at 2:30 p.m. on Monday, April 17, 1967. Mrs. Herman M. I also want to thank you for giving the chandelier in the Adele Erb Sullivan Building at Tamassee DAR School, and for the Scholarships at Tamassee and Berry in my honor. It has been most heart-warming to have so many generous gifts made in my honor. These expressions of confidence will always be treasured.

Georgia had a National winner in the American History Essay Contest, Evans Simmons, Carnegie, Georgia, sponsored by the Benjamin Hawkins Chapter, Cuthbert. We won first place in Class C for our Press Book this year. Other awards won were: In DAR Magazine Advertising Georgia won third place for States with membership 4,000-8,000. Abraham Baldwin Chapter was first place State winner in recognition of \$720.00 in ads—all commercials, also received National Honorable Mention. Andrew Houser Chapter was second place State winner. JAC awards for Georgia were: State Awards—First Place for largest number of JAC Clubs, First Place for largest number of JAC Members, Second Place for outstanding JAC work. Georgia chapters contributed \$147.50 to the Cataloging and Indexing of the Americana Collection in the Archives Room. Seven documents and items were given to the Repository of Americana. The rare signature of Governor John Adam Treutlen was secured on an indefinite loan and is now on display in the Americana Room in the collection of states' first governors.

Five graves of Revolutionary Soldiers were marked and three more located. One grave of a "Real Daughter" was marked as were six graves of Revolutionary Soldiers' wives and three daughters of Revolutionary Soldiers. One member's ancestor's grave was marked and 29 graves of DAR members. The Savannah Chapter continued its work toward establishing the Revolutionary Battle Site Park. Important French officials are now working with DAR and Savannah city officials on this project.

Historical anniversaries of 133 famous events were celebrated during the year, as were 87 of famous men and 16 famous women. There were 128 historical programs involving adults and 63 for or by school children. American History Month was proclaimed by mayors and awards of cash and medals were given for essays and excellence in American History. Including spot announcements there were 641 historical broadcasts on radio and 17 on television. There were 16 historical restorations begun, eight completed and five marked. An historical marker was placed near Thomson on the site where the home of Colonel William Few stood. Four more historic markers were placed and three are in preparation. Brier Creek Chapter has begun restoration of the old Goodall-Dell house which was deeded to the chapter. The Oconee Chapter celebrated its 50th anniversary.

The Mary Hammond Washington and Nathaniel Macon chapters furnished hostesses for the historic P. L. Hay house once a week. One Georgia flag and one United States flag were given to schools. School libraries have been enriched by gifts of county and State histories, volumes of "American Heritage" and "Pictorial Encyclopedia of American History." Members have assisted in compiling two church histories. Sixty-nine chapters observed American History Month.

Awards given by your Historian are: First place, \$5.00, Savannah Chapter; second place, \$3.00, Baron DeKalb and third place, \$2.00, General James Jackson.

# AMERICAN HERITAGE

## Mrs. Wallace Crouch

The response from the 56 chapters reporting has indicated a highly successful year. The programs planned and executed by the chapters, from the single small chapter to participation by whole communities, have been inspiring. Some of the outstanding ways in which chapters promoted the American Heritage Committee are listed: Programs on art, music, glassware, pewter, DAR Museum; displays of American music, old and new; exhibits of arts, crafts, coins and legal papers. The George W. Towns Chapter presented to the Museum for the Georgia Room, an Ironstone plate, a coin silver teaspoon, and a child's cane-bottomed chair which once belonged to Governor George W. Towns. Other gifts were made to the Museum, State Room and the Americana Room. One chapter assembled and bound the reports of that chapter from 1912 through 1960, and other chapters displayed histories of chapters.

Our objectives will remain the same. This Committee is vitally interested in cooperating with the preservation and restoration of historical sites, and urges the members to assist in holding fast the American past.

The following chapters deserve honorable mention for good work: Benjamin Hawkins, Roanoke, Mary Hammond Washington, Nathaniel Macon, Governor George W. Towns, Fort Frederica, Oconee, John Franklin Wren, Savannah, General James Jackson and Whitehall Inn; second place was won by the Atlanta Chapter. The State Chairman's award for the greatest accomplishment in the field of American Heritage goes to the Baron DeKalb Chapter, with Mrs. H. W. Scrivener as Chairman.

## AMERICAN INDIANS

## **Miss Pauline Lewis**

Serving the Society in this phase of our work has been an interesting and rewarding experience. This Chairman appreciates the support of the Georgia Daughters and the excellent reports sent in by them. Letters of instruction went to all Chapter Regents and Chairmen in October. Our State Project, to provide 10 scholarships for higher education to deserving students during Mrs. Richardson's term as State Regent, was begun. We sincerely hope that every chapter will wholeheartedly support and participate in this endeavor to its successful completion in 1968. It is a project worthy of our best efforts. For your convenience and to assist you in reporting ALL work completed by this Committee, report blanks will be furnished in addition to our letter of instruction. The Chairman is offering additional awards in 1968 for outstanding chapter accomplishments.

Sixty-five chapters made cash contributions toward DAR work with American Indians: 27 to General Fund; 54 to Bacone; and 47 to St. Mary's. To Bacone College we sent \$394.75 for scholarships, \$20.00 for sewing machines, and 241 pounds of clothing for the Thrift Shop; \$10.68 was reported spent for freight for the boxes. To St. Mary's School for Indian Girls we sent \$233.50 for scholarships, \$20.00 for a plaque for the Helen Griffin Thornton Room in the new dormitory, \$24.00 for two chairs, \$10.00 for other furnishings, and 78 pounds of used clothing, with freight costs of \$11.33 reported. In addition, seven boxes of jewelry and beads were sent. The General Indian Scholarship Fund received \$81.00. The cash totals were: Bacone \$414.75, St. Mary's \$287.50, and the General Fund \$81.00, making a grand total of \$783.25.

the General Fund \$81.00, making a grand total of \$783.25. Our chapters showed inventiveness and ingenuity in arousing community interest in and raising funds for the American Indian. Several chapters sponsored teas with American Indian motif, presented programs to schools and women's organizations, had authorities on American Indians as guest speakers, held clothespacking sessions for the Indian schools, conducted field trips for students in search of Indian relics, visited Indian mounds, made posters and prepared displays for the public.

The display and sale of beadwork made by the girls at St. Mary's was held at State Conference and the proceeds sent to the schools. The State Chairmen, along with State Regent and other State Officers and Chairmen, attended ceremonies at Kolomoki Indian Mounds at Blakely, marking official recognition of the mounds and museum as a National Park. Members of Governor Sanders' staff and other dignitaries took part in the ceremonies which received front page publicity in the Blakely newspaper.

State Chairman's award of \$5.00 to chapter reporting most outstanding program of activity goes to Baron DeKalb Chapter; and \$5.00 for largest per capita donation to schools to John Houstoun Chapter.

Letters with instruction on the work of Americanism and DAR Manual for Citizenship Committee, with report blanks included, were mailed to all Chapter Regents in September. Extra copies to be given to Chairman were enclosed in these letters. Twenty chapters reported chairmen; 31 sent reports. Twenty chapters reported Americanism programs at meetings; 13 Americanism programs for the public. Twenty chapters repeated the American's Creed at all meetings; five gave 194 American flags to new citizens; seven chapters sent 209 welcome cards; one chapter reported 24 kits containing patriotic material given to new citizens; one chapter gave seven subscriptions to DAR Magazine to schools and libraries; two chapters had members working with Americanization schools, giving 284 hours of time; eight chapters distributed 2,351 pieces of patriotic material in schools and libraries to help reduce illiteracy and to promote Americanism in their communities; three chapters worked with Naturalization Courts: one chapter gave 160 volumes and 500 magazines to Veterans Administration Hospital: one chapter presented Americanism medal and certificate to an outstanding citizen who met the qualifications for this award; six chapters reported 15 hours and 35 minutes of radio time; 10 reported 393 inches of newspaper publicity; seven chapters gave 1,779 hours in community service to help reduce illiteracy, social problems and disease; six chapters gave 851 DAR Manuals to prospective citizens; "Citizens . . . U.S.A." tapes based on DAR Manual for Citizenship were used by three chapters; five school programs; 10 public programs; one school program over intercom; tapes scheduled for use by several chapters. Total amount of money spent on Americanism program, and reported was \$272.00. Five dollar award goes to Baron DeKalb Chapter for the best all-round work on Americanism.

# CONSERVATION

#### Mrs. Harold J. Brewer

The Conservation Committee deals with our National resources, including national, state, and local parks. Concern for the Conservation of both human and natural resources has long been a part of our DAR program. The Committee dates from 1909 by action of the 18th Continental Congress. In 1965-66 the NSDAR Executive Committee passed a ruling urging the membership to cooperate in the White House program to maintain the natural beauty of this nation as part of the DAR Conservation Program and the Society's Conservation education into our public schools and youth groups.

My sincere appreciation to Chapter Chairmen for excellent reports: 54 chapters reporting, 43 reported full Conservation and beautification programs. Four chapters reported "Historic and Memorial Tree Planting":

Henry Walton Chapter: At the Morgan County Hospital, a memorial plot of magnolia and dogwood trees, designed by the eminent landscape architect, Mrs. Florence Henderson. This plot is a memorial for three outstanding young men from Morgan County who lost their lives in Viet Nam.

Council of Safety Chapter: Historic elm planted on the Sumter County Courthouse lawn, a scion of the famed Washington Elm under which General George Washington was sworn in as Commander of the Continental Army in 1775 in Cambridge, Mass. This historic tree was presented by Mr. John H. Gray of Shelton, Washington, a native of Americus, and a member of the SAR. This was a magnificent civic and historic affair. The chapter honored Mr. Gray with an Open House.

St. Andrews Parish: Replaced the famous Oglethorpe Oak which stood on the courthouse square in Darien. The State Regent, Mrs. Herman M. Richardson, was present for this occasion to dedicate the tree. A marker will designate the planting by the DAR.

Elijah Clarke Chapter: Planted two trees on the front lawn of the Athens YWCA, honoring two past Regents. This is an established custom to plant trees in honor of their past Regents. The YWCA grounds have been chosen for the planting of seven trees. This year Mrs. Herbert Breedlove and Mrs. Julius Bishop were honored. A most interesting note—three "50-year members" have been honored on these grounds, Mrs. J. Y. Carithers—62-year member, Miss Laura Blackshear—53-year member, and Mrs. Julius Y. Talmadge, former President General—52-year member.

The above mentioned chapters received awards.

Most of the chapters reported money contributions to the National Conservation Fund and the Meadow Garden Landscaping Memorial Fund. Books and pamphlets were placed in school libraries and youth clubs. Window displays and posters have publicized Conservation. Water and air pollution have been studied. Radio and TV spot announcements have been given; 33,527 trees were reported planted. "Save the Redwoods" was stressed.

Sergeant Newton Chapter was recognized for outstanding restoration and beautification work at the "Historical Cemetery" at Emory-at-Oxford.

The first award for civic and beautification efforts went to the Savannah Chapter, National Park project. This project was given top publicity in the Atlanta Journal, a story by Andrew Sparks— "Where a Thousand Frenchmen Died in Georgia." Mrs. Adrienne Roberts has worked for six years to get a Revolutionary Battle Park built on the site of a Savannah slum called Frogtown.

The Atlanta Chapter has reactivated their Conservation Committee. An award went to this Committee for youth work.

Awards presented to Joseph Habersham Chapter for Radio and TV and to Baron DeKalb Chapter for a beautiful brochure containing their year's Conservation work. Honorable mention to Augusta Chapter, John Franklin Wren Chapter, General James Jackson Chapter, William McIntosh Chapter and Governor David Emanuel Chapter.

On September 9, 1965, duplicate letters were mailed to the 95 Georgia DAR Chapter Magazine Advertising Chairmen and to the State Regent. The letter emphasized the pro-rata share each chapter would contribute to the proposed cooperative advertisement. At the State Board of Management meeting, Stone Mountain, the Regent reported that the additional funds added to the prorata share could be expanded to \$10.00 and thus count for Honor Roll credit. Letters of instruction were given out at our four District meetings to all Chapter Regents and Museum Chairmen, and those who did not attend the District meetings were mailed a letter of instruction.

Your Chairman attended Continental Congress, the four District meetings and the Fall Board of Management meeting. She also visited many of the chapters and told the need for a Georgia Room at our NSDAR Headquarters in Washington. She urged support of our DAR Museum by sending cash donations, as well as memorial gifts.

The following report was received from the State Treasurer: Nineteen chapters contributed \$186.00 to the NSDAR "Friends of the Museum" with \$100.00 of this amount being a memorial tribute to Mrs. W. F. Dykes, a former Regent of Joseph Habersham Chapter. The NSDAR balance on the Georgia Room was \$175.14, this year \$311.00 was donated, making a total of \$486.14; \$109.00 was the total for the Museum's General Fund. Hawkinsville Chapter mailed a check for \$48.00 to Museum for a carton of Caroline Scott Harrison notepaper; Nathaniel Macon Chapter sent in \$10.00 for notepaper.

Many chapters reported having teas and displaying Museum pieces. The cash donations received at the tea were sent to DAR Museum, and chapters also reported showing slides of the Museum and the State Rooms.

The Georgia State Society through the DAR Schools honored our capable State Regent at the Kate Duncan Smith DAR School by plans for the Annis Gay Mann Richardson Recreational Area; at Tamassee School by the Annis Gay Mann Richardson scholarships and by a chandelier in the Adele Erb Sullivan Building; and at Berry School by a Work Opportunity Fund. A total of \$5,511.20 was contributed for these projects, including the per capita from the State dues. The total amount contributed to the two DAR Schools and to the seven DAR Approved Schools was \$8,777.50, including the per capita from the State dues.

Chapters reported DAR Schools programs as follows: Tamassee 69, Kate Duncan Smith 62, Berry 37, Blue Ridge 16, Crossnore 28, Hillside 15, Hindman 16, Lincoln Memorial University 16, and Northland College 14. The chapter led the State this year in Clubs and members with a membership of 44,687 and 1,565 Clubs with 35 of these Clubs being new ones. In the Essay Contest they won one first place, two second places, four third places and five honorable mentions with a special award going to the Kitridge School JAC Club for its American Indian Project. Again this year they have entered every category in the National Contests and have given 76 Good Citizenship awards. Their Chairman has contacted all principals and some teachers of 76 schools and has given talks to new schools beginning the JAC work for the first time.

Atlanta Chapter ranks second in membership with a membership of 6,540 and 61 Clubs with one of these being new this year. The Chairman, Miss Dorothy J. Waldman, works with the Boys Clubs located in five different sections of Atlanta. She is a very dedicated worker for she has worked with the Boys Clubs for 28 years and has been JAC Chairman for her chapter for 27 years. She is personally in charge of the groups up to 10 years of age and personally arranges all JAC programs, including groups older than ones she directs, and has made over 300 talks on JAC work. The children have been taught Patriotism and Good Citizenship through programs, field trips, and JAC material and gifts of American flags. This Chairman and 26 members of the Atlanta Chapter are doing a wonderful job with their dedicated efforts. They realize that talk alone is not enough, for these Clubs are located in underprivileged areas. Therefore, they are teaching Americanism through their gifts of food to the families where it is needed. They gave one Thacher pin and placed one entry in the contest.

Stephen Heard Chapter is third with 141 members and five Clubs. They have had quizzes on the Flag, slides on historical spots in Europe, given leaflets on historical spots in Georgia and have given 14 talks on JAC work.

Georgia contributed \$11.00 to the National Contest JAC Fund. The State Chairman's award of \$3.00 for chapter with the largest increase in number of JAC Clubs goes to Baron DeKalb and \$2.00 to the chapter with the most chapter participation goes to the Atlanta Chapter.

I would like to commend all the chapters that participated in the JAC Program and would like to encourage all to join us next year.

#### JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP

All 95 Georgia chapters were mailed a questionnaire and 59 chapters responded. These reported 341 Junior members of whom 69 are new members; 20 chapters contributed to the Helen Pouch Memorial Scholarship Fund; six chapters sold notepaper for the Scholarship Fund and two sold jeweled Flag Lapel pins. Two Junior members served as Chapter Regents; 16 serve as other chapter officers; 29 as Chairmen and 73 others served on DAR committees; 65 Junior members subscribe to the DAR Magazine. The State Chairman's award of \$5.00 for the largest increase

The State Chairman's award of \$5.00 for the largest increase in membership of chapters with membership of 10 to 75 was won by the John Franklin Wren Chapter. The award of \$5.00 for chapters with membership of 76 and over, with the largest increase in Junior membership, is divided among four chapters as follows: Elijah Clarke, Joseph Habersham, Mary Hammond Washington and Thronateeska.

Mrs. Lewis H. Swan, Jr. of the Fort Peachtree Chapter was named by the judges the winner of the Outstanding Junior Member Contest for Georgia. Her picture and qualifications have been forwarded to the National Vice-Chairman for the Southeastern District.

#### LINEAGE RESEARCH COMMITTEE

Report blanks were sent to all chapters; 50 of the 55 chapters replying reported having Lineage Research Committees. I received three requests from Georgia chapters and three from other states. I have enlisted the aid of six chapters to help locate data for these out-of-state requests; 60 requests have been sent to the National Committee. Our Georgia chapters have assisted 195 potential members and through these efforts have acquired 121 new members; 43 chapters report qualifying for the Honor Roll by checking Lineage Research.

I feel sure many of the 40 chapters not filing reports have done important work in helping potential members, and it is my hope that all chapters will report next year so that the record of this committee will be complete. I have given programs at two chapter meetings, but it is with regret that I cannot report having had workshops or seminars in Georgia.

#### MEMBERSHIP

The membership of February 1, 1967, in 95 chapters was 6,487; 313 new members, 29 reinstated, 39 transfers in, gains 381; 175 resigned, 21 dropped, 128 deceased, 22 transfers out, losses 346. Net gain in membership 35. At large 51 members.

My awards are as follows: Membership 10 through 50, \$5.00, to John Franklin Wren Chapter; membership 51 through 100, \$5.00, to Brunswick Chapter; membership 101 and over, \$5.00, to John Floyd Chapter; the National Membership Chairman's certificate for the largest increase in membership is awarded to John Franklin Wren Chapter, an increase of 56.66 per cent.

#### MOTION PICTURE

Not only was an interest in the "Green Sheet" shown but an effort was made by the members to screen and recommend movies for the young to see. Much indignation was shown and expressed at the letting down of morals and also disapproval of the advertisements that accompany the movies today. Twenty-five chapters reported Chairmen. The Archibald Bulloch Chapter of Statesboro receives the Chairman's award, not only for the work done but for a grasp of the subject.

#### NATIONAL DEFENSE

#### Mrs. R. Hugh Reid

Seventy-seven of Georgia's 96 chapters sent to me their National Defense reports. Only two of those reporting did not have an entire chapter meeting devoted to National Defense. All those reporting devoted at least five minutes at each chapter meeting to National Defense, with most reporting more time given than this minimum. According to these reports, 324 Good Citizenship medals were awarded to boys or girls in the sixth, ninth, or twelfth grades in Georgia schools. A total of \$165.50 was given to Dollars for Defense.

Chapters reporting showed that 493 Daughters had written their Representatives or Senators on National issues. These letters, written by the Daughters as individuals, covered such areas as Viet Nam, American History Month, Genocide Convention, Consular Treaty, Medicare, Educational expenditures and American Fiscal Policy.

Awards of this Chairman are as follows: Chapter with membership under 50, Fort Peachtree; chapter with membership from 50 to 100, Commodore Richard Dale Chapter; chapter with membership over 100, Baron DeKalb Chapter. These awards are for the best over-all reports.

Programs of the individual chapters of the Georgia Society have been of exceptional quality this year. I am grateful to the Chairmen and Chapter Regents who helped us have such a splendid report for the National Chairman.

Reports were received from 77 chapters and 48 Yearbooks were received: 14 of these were thought to be of award quality and have been sent to the National Vice-Chairman to be judged; 72 chapters used the National Theme for the year: "Be ye Doers of the Word and Not Hearers Only"; 62 reported good publicity; 68 followed the objectives in choosing the topics and fulfilled the new National Honor Roll requirements; 69 used the Outline of Suggested Programs sent by the National Chairman; 41 had an entire program on National Defense; 73 had a talk on National Defense at each meeting; 71 presented the President General's message at each meeting; and 52 chapters invited State Officers and/or Chairmen to speak to them. One of the aims of the committee is to share the best of our programs with all chapters over the nation. To this end 15 papers were sent to the National Program Office from 10 chapters. Elijah Clarke Chapter sent six. Commendation should be made also of the custom followed by Adam Brinson Chapter of adapting each of their programs for presentation on radio each month. Let me thank the many Chairmen who presented their program outlines in such beautiful form. The judges found it most difficult to choose any single one as being THE best. The same is true for the fine Yearbooks.

Award for the best program outline goes to Elijah Clarke Chapter, with honorable mention to Atlanta, Augusta and Baron DeKalb chapters. For the best Yearbook—a tie—Major General John Twiggs and Mary Hammond Washington chapters.

## PUBLIC RELATIONS

#### Mrs. George C. Blount

Fifty-four chapters have reported with a total of 14,241 column inches and 258 photographs appearing in 179 newspapers and magazines. Radio time reported totaled 53 hours and 18 minutes over 67 stations. TV time reported was eight hours and six minutes on 14 stations. Atlanta Chapter had 15 hours and 20 minutes on four radio stations. Baron DeKalb Chapter had 35 minutes on three TV stations.

Other radio time reported was: Stephen Heard Chapter, six hours and 30 minutes; Elijah Clarke Chapter, five hours and 15 minutes; and Baron DeKalb Chapter, four hours and 30 minutes on seven stations. Several chapters reported uncalculated spot announcements. All reporting chapters cooperated with other patriotic and/or civic groups in their communities in promoting DAR objectives giving details of how this was done in each case. Several chapters issued a Newsletter at regular intervals. All except three Chapter Public Relations Chairmen subscribe to DAR Magazine.

Eleven chapters submitted entries in the Feature Story Contest. The Chairman's award of \$15.00 offered to chapters best telling the DAR Story in news media is divided as follows: Elijah Clarke with  $1201\frac{1}{2}$  inches—\$6.00; Peter Early with  $1057\frac{1}{2}$  inches— \$4.00.

To the following five chapters, all having 600 inches or more-\$1.00 each: Abraham Baldwin, 702 inches; Oglethorpe, 626 inches; George Walton, 619 inches; Council of Safety, 612 inches; and Vidalia, 600 inches.

## THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

Sixty-eight chapters reported their activities on behalf of this committee; 30 large flags and 13,488 small flags were presented this year; 26 chapters studied the Flag Code and 11,674 Flag Codes were distributed; 80 correction in the use of the flag were reported; 39 chapters had an entire program on the flag. There was excellent publicity given to the work of the chapter Flag Committee with 75 newspaper articles, the reprint of 850 American Flags, 2,051 radio broadcasts and 22 television programs. Each chapter reported having the Pledge of Allegiance at every meeting and I am sure that all of Georgia's chapters do this and thus do work for this committee; 61 chapters urged others to "Keep the Flag Flying" and reported good to excellent response; 36 chapters participated in community activities in which the flag played on important part, such as observing Flag Day, Independence Day, Georgia Day, Memorial Day, and others; 27 chapters presented flag literature to Naturalization Courts, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Public Libraries, Schools and with sale of small flags.

The Chairman's award to chapter with membership over 100 is Atlanta Chapter; to chapter with membership of 51 to 100 is John Houstoun; and to the chapter with membership under 50 is Stone Castle.

## TRANSPORTATION

#### Mrs. H. D. Summerall

Questionnaires were sent to all 95 chapters and 62 sent in reports; 290 members assisted in furnishing rides for members who would not otherwise get to the meetings. The Council of Safety Chapter reports that they have several transfer members who live at Magnolia Manor Residence Home in Americus. They are carried to the meetings by helpful members who drive; 16 chapters had programs on Traffic Safety; 19 tours were made to many historical places in Georgia, also to all parts of the United States. One chapter carried the CAR members to the Indian Mounds in Toombs County and on a field trip to Montgomery County. Another chapter arranged a tour for a Girl Scout Troop earning badges on historical study, with two guides familiar with the history of Oxford Historical Cemetery at Oxford, Ga. Several chapter members furnished gas and also cars for Driver Education Program in High School; 321 attended State Conference, 77 attended Continental Congress in Washington and 88 attended the Fall Board of Management meeting at Stone Mountain in October.

First place award of \$3.00 goes to the Baron DeKalb Chapter for the best report. Second place award of \$2.00 goes to Council of Safety Chapter.

# Special National Committees

## AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH

## Mrs. Ralph A. Lovelace

American History Month Committee letters were sent to all Chapter Regents in August, 1966, which outlined the Essay Contest, High School participation, Proclamations, National and State Legislation, Use of Posters and Stickers, Chapter Programs, Publicity and Suggestions for Contestants.

Reports showed many varied, interesting and informative programs presented and popularity of the activities showed a deeper understanding of our American Heritage in order to preserve our freedom.

Activities included presentation of George Washington picture to school library, program on American History to Boy Scout Troop, presentation of American Heritage Pictorial Atlas of United States History to Library, planting of a Washington Elm from the original tree under which Washington was sworn in as Commander of the Continental Army at Cambridge, Mass., in 1775, display showing official uniform of every American soldier and soldier of every Amercan war from the Revolution to the present, with 24 books on those wars. Display of prehistoric rocks of the area presenting piece to the school collection of minerals, program on Colonial America displaying Colonial coins, flags and silverware, presenta-tion of Historical Encyclopedia to Library, presenting four pieces of flag material, including pledge creed, flag pin, pamphlet teaching flag etiquette and flag history to 5,900 school children, presenting American History Month programs to other clubs, and one newspaper printed the entire list of spot announcements for each day of February.

Proclamations declaring February as American History Month were issued by the Governor and 27 mayors, participation in the Essay Contest, "American Naval Battles," by 98 public schools and 832 contestants; four parochial schools, and 267 contestants; school assemblies held in 31 schools with eight class discussions and three school articles written. Publicity included 105 stories and editorials, nine pictures and 588 inches of newspaper publicity. Spot announcements numbered 279 on radio; 61 DAR members appearing on radio with 785 minutes used and five DAR members appearing on TV with 28 minutes used. American History Month posters were placed in 246 locations in schools, libraries, banks, stores, filling stations, motels, chamber of commerce and post office; 52 displays. Cash awards of \$240.75, History medals, books and certificates were presented essay winners and students making highest mark in American History.

Awards for best reports are: First place—\$5.00 to John Houstoun Chapter; second place—\$3.00 to General James Jackson Chapter; third place—\$2.00 to Stephen Heard Chapter. Honorable Mention—Xavier Chapter.

Governor Sanders and 55 mayors issued proclamations, 166 articles and 41 pictures were published, making a total of 1796<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> inches of newsprint; 18 special programs and 897 spot announcements were made on the radio networks, totaling 1673 minutes; television presented four special programs and 38 spot announcements, totaling 89 minutes. Window displays or bulletin boards were placed in 36 banks, 53 department stores, 38 libraries, eight post offices, 173 schools and one fair exhibit; 37 chapters presented a program on Constitution Week at regular meetings; 35 in schools; 18 at Scout meetings, six at other civic or service clubs, and 35 chapters promoted special church services or church bulletin announcements in all churches in their locale.

Congratulations to the winner of the three awards: First—\$6.00 to the Oglethorpe, Button Gwinnett and George Walton chapters who worked together; second—\$3.00 to John Franklin Wren Chapter; and third—\$2.00 to Elijah Clarke Chapter. Honorable mention to each chapter that mailed me a report on the marvelous efforts made by the Georgia Daughters to promote the comprehension of our cornerstone of freedom.

- 3. Ga.-1810—Dr. Elizur and Esther Butler, Missionaries to the Cherokees, at the request of Mrs. Jack D. Summerbell, Xavier Chapter, Rome, Ga. (To be dedicated later).
- 4. First Headquarters of Girl Scouts in America; at the request of Mrs. Fred Wessels, Jr., President of the Girl Scout Council of Savannah, Ga., Inc., member Savannah Chapter. (To be dedicated).
- Savannah's First Burying Ground; a Wall Plaque granted at the request of Mrs. Eugene A. Stanley, Savannah Chapter, Savannah, Ga. (To be erected).

#### MEADOW GARDEN BOARD MEETING

#### STONE MOUNTAIN - OCTOBER 27, 1966

Mrs. Herman M. Richardson, Regent of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, as Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board, called the meeting to order on October 27, 1966, at Stone Mountain.

The first order of business was the election of a Secretary. Mrs.

R. Hugh Reid, State First Vice-Regent, was elected. A plat of the Meadow Garden property was shown to explain the proposed Medical Center for Augusta and the streets to and from said property which are now in existence and which are being considered for changes. Mrs. Richardson read the correspondence between her and the Augusta city officials in regard to the closing of the main street. Mrs. Richardson replied to the request with a very specific permission to assure ingress and egress to Meadow Garden at all times.

The Chairman also shared with the Board members present the correspondence between her and Mr. Cummings of the Georgia Historical Commission. In reply to Mr. Cumming's statement that Meadow Garden had never been the home of George Walton, Mrs. Richardson had prepared an outline of reply which Board ap-proved, which stated that the property had indeed been George Walton's home, although not recorded in his name. A copy of the Cordle Report was suggested as an enclosure in the letter to be sent to Mr. Cummings.

The Board approved Mrs. Richardson's suggestion that copiesof her letter to Mr. Cummings also be sent to the other members: of the Historical Commission.

Mrs. Clifford J. Welton shared with the Board members copies: of the Augusta Chamber of Commerce Magazine, which gave a writeup of Meadow Garden, and also showed recent newspaper clippings on Meadow Garden.

Mrs. Thomas K. Kendrick made a motion that the Meadow Garden Board recommend to the Resolutions Committee that the Georgia State Society request the National Society to review the deed of August 9, 1961, in regards to properties known as Meadow Garden in Augusta, Georgia, and reissue said deed of Meadow Garden to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, in fee simple. The motion was seconded and passed.

The fact that the Georgia Society had bought land adjoining the original Meadow Garden property and that this is not included in the deed from the National Society was brought out.

The Board members requested the State Regent to contact the Governor to see if the state would be able to offer the Georgia Society any financial or advisory assistance with the restoration of Meadow Garden.

Senate Bill 3035 was discussed, which would offer matching funds for the preservation of historical sites. This would not require the relinquishing of any deeds or rights to the property, and may prove of some help for Meadow Garden.

Mrs. Hugh Peterson was appointed as Chairman of a group consisting of Mrs. Welton, Mrs. Robert H. Humphrey, and Mrs. Reid, to write Mr. Gordon Gray in Washington, D. C., to ascertain what assistance might be available through the National Trust. This was offered as a motion by Mrs. Frank G. Binford, seconded and passed.

## MEADOW GARDEN BOARD MEETING

#### MACON - MARCH 8, 1967

On March 8, 1967, at 10 o'clock p.m., the members of the Meadow Garden Board met at the Dempsey Hotel in Macon.

Mrs. Herman M. Richardson, State Regent, and Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board, gave a report on her meeting in Augusta with the Augusta Chapter on February 21. Other Meadow Garden Board members present at this meeting were: Mrs. Leonard D. Wallace, Mrs. Robert H. Humphrey, and Mrs. Frank G. Binford.

Mrs. Richardson asked the Secretary to read the recommendations presented by the Augusta Chapter Regent, Mrs. Bledsoe, a copy of which is attached. Mrs. Richardson told Mrs. Bledsoe that the Board would take the recommendations under advisement and would report on them at the next meeting of the Board.

The Secretary read, at the Regent's request, a portion of the 69th Continental Congress Proceedings to substantiate the background facts on Meadow Garden and to affirm the fact that the deed was originally purchased by the National Society, DAR.

Discussion of the members brought out the fact that Augusta Chapter had never owned Meadow Garden, although members did contribute greatly to the expenses for repairs after the purchase was made.

A letter from Miss Gladys Buckner, member of the Augusta Chapter, was read by the Secretary, at the request of Mrs. Richardson.

Mrs. Hugh Peterson reported on the possible steps to approach

the National Trust for Historic Preservation, for help in the restoration of Meadow Garden, since the National Trust will have a part in distributing Federal funds for restoration and preservation of historical houses throughout the Nation.

Mrs. Clifford J. Welton reported on conditions at Meadow Garden as follows:

- (1) some means of roping to discourage tourists from walking all over the house and through rooms might be considered
- (2) Mrs. Huff, the Custodian, is facing major surgery and wonders if Meadow Garden can be closed until the recovery of Mrs. Huff will permit her returning.
   Mrs. Frank Binford, seconded by Mrs. Peterson, moved that

Mrs. Frank Binford, seconded by Mrs. Peterson, moved that sympathy be extended to Mrs. Huff and that Meadow Garden be closed to tours until Mrs. Huff recovers from her surgery. The motion was carried.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

It is further recommended:

3. That it be recorded with State Meadow Garden Board that if ever the State Society wishes to be relieved of the responsibility of Meadow Garden that the Augusta Chapter be notified and given first opportunity of requesting the deed and assuming the respon-

sibility.

4. That any resolution concerning Meadow Garden be presented to the State Meadow Garden Board for discussion and approval before being presented on the floor of State Conference by the Resolutions Committee.

5. That all Minutes of Meadow Garden Board meeting be typed and sent to each Board member.

6. That since Meadow Garden is prominently visible because of improved city conditions we recommend that the State Meadow Garden Board initiate an immediate beautification project in cooperation with the Custodial Committee.

It was early to determine what could be done, but we were assured that our request would be considered. Help for Meadow Garden has been sought in other lines, such as consulting members of large Foundations to see what could be done. This endeavor will be continued.

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# BYLAWS

# BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE

## AMERICAN REVOLUTION

## Article I

## NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

## Article II

## OBJECTS

The objects of the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution shall be: to promote the aims set forth in the Bylaws of the National Society; to secure the benefits of cooperation of the Chapters in the State; the preservation of the memory of its Revolutionary patriots; the study of its history; the education of its youth in patriotic ideals and in the duties of citizenship.

#### Article III

## MEMBERSHIP

All Chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, located within the State of Georgia shall be members of this organization.

## Article IV

## OFFICERS

The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Curator. The State Regent shall appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as adviser in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure.

## Article V

## ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected at the annual State Conference biennially.

Section 2. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two years or until their successors are elected. Their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and of the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Section 3. No member shall be eligible to a State office until she has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years. No member shall be eligible to the same State office for two successive terms. A member having served more than one-half term in the State office shall be deemed to have served a term.

Section 4. Nominations of candidates for office shall be from the floor. The election shall be held by ballot. A majority of the votes cast by the voting members of the State Conference shall elect.

Section 5. Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become acting First Vice Regent, subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. A vacancy in any other State office between annual meetings shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. An election shall be held at the next State Conference to fill the unexpired term. Any State Officer, who is absent from the State for a continuous period of six months or longer automatically relinquishes her position as a State officer.

Section 6. No two State officers shall be members of the same Chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

Section 7. In recognition of valuable service to the organization, any State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Section 8. A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot. The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than fifteen months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

Section 9. On the election of State Regent, and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Recording Secretary General. The endorsement of a candidate for Vice President General shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent to the Recording Secretary General at least two weeks prior to Continental Congress.

## Article VI

#### DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, of the State Board of Management, and of the Executive Committee. She shall attend all regular meetings of the National Board of Management. She shall appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees.

Section 2. In the absence of the State Regent from any meeting of the State Conference, or of the State Board of Management, the State First Vice Regent, or in her absence, the State Second Vice Regent, shall perform the duties of the State Regent. The State First and Second Vice Regents may be assigned to direct committees and to perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent.

Section 3. The State Chaplain shall open all meetings of the State

Conference and of the State Board of Management with Scripture reading and prayer and shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require. She shall preside at the memorial service during State Conference and shall be responsible for the In Memoriam pages in the Proceedings.

Section 4. The State Recording Secretary shall record the proceedings of the State Conference and of meetings of the State Board of Management and of the Executive Committee. She shall compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and of the Proceedings Committee.

Section 5. The State Corresponding Secretary shall conduct correspondence and send notices in behalf of the State Conference, the State Regent, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as directed by them.

Section 6. The State Treasurer shall be the custodian of the funds of the State Society. She shall collect the State Conference dues and registration fees from the Chapters, and shall receive all sums contributed by the Chapters for State and National projects. All monies received by the State Treasurer shall be placed in a Bank which is a member of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. She shall disburse such sums only when authorized by the State Board of Management of the State Society. Incidental expenses shall be paid from the State Dues Fund when authorized by the State Regent in writing. The State Treasurer shall keep an account of all sums received or paid out and shall keep receipts for all payments. She shall prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference. Her books shall be audited annually by a Certified Public Accountant. She shall be ex-officio a member of the Credentials Committee.

Section 7. The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new Chapters.

Section 8. The State Registrar shall, when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, who live in towns and counties in which there are no Chapters, to prove eligibility, and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars in verifying lineage papers. She shall keep a correct list of all members in the State and shall make a report on membership to the State Conference.

Section 9. The State Historian shall be in charge of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General. She shall keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves in the State and shall prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General to Smithsonian Institution. She shall encourage the compilation and publication of County Histories and other unpublished records, especially those of the Revolutionary period.

Section 10. The State Librarian shall collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing duplicates, wherever possible, in the NSDAR Library and in the Georgia DAR Collections in the State Department of Archives and History. She shall endeavor to obtain the books on the wanted list of the Librarian General for the Georgia Section in the NSDAR Library and is authorized to solicit contributions from the Chapters for the purchase of the same. She shall have custody and supervision of the DAR Genealogical and Historical Collections at the State Department of Archives and History.

Section 11. The State Curator shall receive and be responsible for all gifts of Revolutionary relics to the Museum of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution. She shall be the custodian of the conference properties and shall have them properly stored, insured and made ready for use of the State Conference.

## Article VII

## MEETINGS

Section 1. The Georgia State Society shall hold an annual State Conference between the first day of February and the time of the meeting of the Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week. The Executive Committee shall fix the time and place of meetings when not fixed by the Conference in session, or when for any reason it may be impracticable to meet at the time or place fixed by the Conference.

Section 2. The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credential blanks to the Chapters not less than sixty days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 3. The voting members of the State Conference shall be State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regent or alternate, and the delegates or their alternates from the Chapters of the State, that are entitled to representation at the Continental Congress. The number of representatives from each Chapter shall be determined by the rules for representation of Chapters in the Continental Congress as given in the National Bylaws.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a Chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the Chapter, except in the case of the Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. No member shall hold, at the same time, two offices carrying a vote at the annual State Conference.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any Chapter in the State of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference, by unanimous consent, the privileges of the floor may be accorded to the State Chairmen with the exception that they may not vote unless they are duly elected delegates or their alternates from their respective chapters.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen days notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Twenty-five voting members, representing not less than ten Chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

# Article VIII

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## STATE DUES AND CONFERENCE FEES

Section 1. The annual dues of Chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be one dollar for each member of the Chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before February 1. Seventy cents of this amount shall be allocated to the general State Dues Fund and thirty cents shall be used to cover all State required per capita assessments. No Chapter shall be entitled to representation at the annual State Conference until the State dues are paid.

Section 2. The Finance Committee, appointed by the State Regent, shall be composed of seven members, to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two Honorary State Regents, one active Chapter Regent, and one active Chapter member. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund.

Section 3. Each Chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State dues, a Conference registration fee of \$2.00 for each voter to which the Chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Section 4. State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$2.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference fee at the time of registration.

## Article IX

#### EXPENSES

Section 1. Eight hundred dollars shall be taken each year from the State Dues Fund, to be used by the State Regent in defraying her necessary traveling expenses.

Section 2. Necessary expenses of the State Regent and other officers of the State Conference for stationery and postage shall be paid by the State Treasurer from the State Dues Fund, on the presentation of itemized statements approved in writing by the State Regent.

## Article X

# STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, the Honorary State Regents, the Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regents of the Chapters of the State, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the fall, following the regular meeting of the National Board. It shall meet also at the time of the State Conference and whenever called by the State Regent.

Section 3. Ten members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference.

Section 5. State Chairmen of National and State Standing Committees shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privileges of the floor, but may not vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

#### Article XI

## EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute an Executive Committee. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the Executive Committee, but may not vote. The State Board of Management may authorize this committee to perform such duties of the Board between its meeting, as may from time to time seem expedient. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three members of the Committee. It shall make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

#### Article XII

#### CHAPTERS

Section 1. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April or May. The Chapter Regent shall report the names of the elected officers promptly, on triplicate blanks provided by the State Regent for this purpose, to the Organizing Secretary General, to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary.

Section 2. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent for use in compiling her report, not less than fifteen days before the opening of the annual State Conference. The official Chapter report, not to exceed five hundred words in length, for publication in the Proceedings shall be furnished the State Recording Secretary before the State Conference.

## Article XIII AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent and to the Parliamentarian. The State Regent shall send a copy to each Chapter and each voting member, at least sixty days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

#### Article XIV

#### RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. Robert's Rules of Order (Revised) shall be the governing authority in parliamentary law for the State Conference in matters not covered by the Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

# State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24. Bylaws were adopted and State Officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21). No conference was held in 1911; the time of meeting having been changed from the fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910, to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912"; amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta, "that we have Conference in the spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, p. 21).

#### Awards

All chapters competing for awards must send reports to the respective chairmen by February 1, 1968.

All reports for awards are based on membership confirmed by the National Society as of February 1 of preceding year (1967).

#### Bylaws

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National and State Bylaws.

## **Change of Address**

Notice of change of address of members shall be sent to the Organizing Secretary General, Treasurer General, State Regent and State Registrar.

## Change of Name

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to State Registrar, Treasurer General and State Regent.

#### **Chapter Elections**

Chapter elections shall be held preferably in April or early May and names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, Administration Building, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D. C. 20006, to the State Regent, and to the State Recording Secretary. The full Christian name of chapter officers shall be given together with her husband's given name or initials, address and zip code.

## Dues

Pay to State Treasurer State Dues of \$1.00 per member preferably on or before January 1, not later than February 1. National Dues of \$3.00 per member sent to the Treasurer General, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D. C. 20006, before January 1, 1968.

#### **Conference Registration Fee**

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State dues (on or before January 1, not later than February 1), \$2.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Rules for representation of chapters at Continental Congress:

"Chapters having less than 50 paid members on February 1, are entitled to be represented by the Regent or in her absence the Vice Regent or alternate; chapters having 50 to 199 paid members on February 1, one delegate in addition to the Regent; chapters having 200 to 299 paid members on February 1, two delegates in addition to the Regent, and for each additional 100 paid members one additional delegate. (Article XIII, Section 3-C, National Bylaws) State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$2.00

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$2.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, who not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. Article VIII, Section 4, of the State Bylaws.

## Contributions

All contributions by Chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

#### **Deceased Members**

Deaths shall be reported promptly to Treasurer General and State Chaplain. Complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and date of death shall be furnished State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for Conference Memorial Service and "In Memoriam" pages for State Proceedings.

## Georgia Hospitality Fund

The following resolution which applies to the Georgia Hospitality Fund appears in the Proceedings for 1955:

"WHEREAS, The Georgia Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds an annual dinner in Washington each year during Continental Congress, which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society,

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Georgia Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$100.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes:

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this fund shall not be cumulative. Adopted."

## **GENERAL NEW REGIME FUND BALANCE \$2,500.00**

The following resolution which applies to the General New Regime Fund Balance of \$2,500.00 appears in the Proceedings for 1959-1960, page 41:

"RESOLVED, That at the end of each regime all money in the General Fund above \$2,500.00 be transferred to the Savings Account. When the Supplemental Audit Report is made as of June 1 every two years before the Auditors close out the books this transaction be handled in order to show in this Audit, thus making the General Fund show the same balance of \$2,500.00 at the beginning of each new regime. ADOPTED."

#### PROCEDURE BOOK OF INSTRUCTIONS FOR OFFICERS AND STATE CHAIRMEN

The following resolution which applies to a Procedure Book of Instruction for Officers and State Chairmen appears in the Proceedings for 1959-1960, page 41:

"RESOLVED, That all Officers and State Chairmen keep a Procedure Book of Instructions and helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new Officer and Chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities thus providing a continuing continuity of DAR work, ADOPTED."

## **Genealogical Records**

To insure uniformity and convenience in filing, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper,  $8\frac{1}{2}$  by 11 inches with one inch margins on left side and bottom, and one and one-half inches

at top. One copy retained in Chapter Archives, and two copies shall be sent to the Chairman of Genealogical Records.

## Information for Chapter Regents

1. All letters received by Chapter Regents relating to the work of the Society shall be distributed to the corresponding Chapter Chairman and brought to the attention of the members at a chapter meeting.

2. Please follow Resolutions No. 11, adopted at 61st Georgia Society State Conference, as follows: "Resolved, That a closing date of February 1 be established for all reports, and all reports be given from February 1 to February 1, regardless of a change of regime or Regent." All awards will be made on this date basis.

#### Information for State Officers and State Chairmen

State Officers and State Chairmen shall send to the State Regent and to the State Treasurer a copy of any instruction letter mailed to chapters.

## Meadow Garden

The deed to Meadow Garden property from the National Society, DAR, is in the possession of the State Regent and is also recorded in the Richmond County Court House, Augusta, Georgia.

#### Nominations

The following resolution which applies to the announcement of the candidacy for State Regent appears in the Proceedings of the Twentieth State Conference, 1918:

Twentieth State Conference, 1918: "Resolved, that it is the judgment of the Executive Board that announcements for State Regent should not be made . . . earlier than three months prior to the meeting of the Conference and they shall be furnished to the Press for publication."

## Proceedings

Three copies of the Proceedings will be sent to each Chapter. One copy to be retained by Regent, one copy given to the Chapter Treasurer and one copy to the Chapter Chairman of Program. Additional copies, if available, may be secured from the State Recording Secretary at \$1.00 per copy, plus 25 cents for postage if to be mailed.

## Reports

State Officers', State Chairmen's, and Chapter Regents' reports for Proceedings shall be as concise as possible—not to exceed 500 words—typewritten (double spaced) upon one side of 3-hole unruled notebook paper,  $8\frac{1}{2}$  by 11 inches, and shall be sent to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary on or before February 15, the original being sent to the Secretary for the Proceedings.

## Resolutions

Resolutions to be considered by the Committee shall be typed and sent to the Chairman of the Resolutions Committee two weeks before the date of the State Conference.

The Georgia State Society, C.A.R., has 21 Societies, three inactive, with a total membership of 408. There were nine Gold Honor Roll Societies, Altama and Winona tying for tri-color ribbons.

Meadow Garden Society, organized in 1965, shows a gain of seven members. Other Societies with marked gains in membership were Benjamin Hawkins, Currahee, James Watson and Dolly Madison. Sandtown Trail now has eight members. Another Society on its way, the Captain Howell Cobb Society of Marietta, is being reactivated by Mrs. Sammy Garner.
