



MINUTES OF THE STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT GEORGIA SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION CALLAWAY GARDENS, PINE MOUNTAIN, GEORGIA OCTOBER 27, 1967

The regular fall meeting of the State Board of Management of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, convened at the Holiday Inn, Callaway Gardens, Pine Mountain, Georgia, the State Regent, Mrs. Herman M. Richardson, presiding.

The meeting was called to order at 9:30 a.m. by the State Regent, Mrs. Richardson. The State Chaplain, Mrs. James LeRoy Boyd, read from Scripture and offered prayer. The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America was led by Mrs. Jonathan F. Fox, State Chairman; the American's Creed was led by Mrs. Thomas Knox Kendrick; and one stanza of the National Anthem was sung, led by Mrs. Wallace Crouch.

The State Regent presented the following distinguished members: Mrs. Henry Allan Ironside, Honorary Vice President General; Mrs. Benjamin Ivy Thornton, Vice President General; Mrs. Young Harris Yarbrough, Mrs. Leonard Wallace, Mrs. T. Earle Stribling, Mrs. Robert H. Humphrey, Mrs. John F. Thigpen, Mrs. Harold Irvine Tuthill, and Mrs. Thomas Knox Kendrick, Honorary State Regents.

Mrs. Richardson announced that the Georgia State Society had been honored by having Mrs. Thomas Knox Kendrick asked to offer as a candidate for Treasurer General on the ticket of Mrs. Dorothy W. S. Ragan. Mrs. Kendrick was unanimously endorsed. Mrs. R. Hugh Reid, First Vice Regent, moved that telegrams

be sent to Honorary State Regents who were absent. Carried.

Miss Martha Cooper, Second Vice Regent, moved that State Chairmen be given the privilege of the floor without a vote. Seconded by Mrs. Hubert R. Martin. Carried.

The State First Vice Regent, Mrs. R. Hugh Reid, took the chair, and the State Regent, Mrs. Herman M. Richardson, gave her report. She thanked the Daughters for their support of the "Annis Mann Richardson Recreational Area." the Georgia project at Kate Duncan Smith School. The State Regent gave a brief summary of the four District meetings, 365 attending, 63 chapters represented. Mrs. Richardson reported on the National Board of Management meeting October 18; 2,989 applications were accepted, a net gain of 798 members. The President General urged an increase in membership, use of DAR material that has been documented and the DAR Magazine, and for all to present the true image of DAR to the public through our publicity and public relations.

Mrs. R. Hugh Reid thanked the State Regent for her tremendous work and inspiring leadership, and the State Regent resumed the

The State Recording Secretary, Mrs. Arthur H. Waite, Jr., announced that the roll would be taken from the registration and gave the necessary changes in the Proceedings.

The reports of State Officers were presented as follows: State First Vice Regent, Mrs. R. Hugh Reid, also gave National Defense report; State Second Vice Regent, Miss Martha Cooper, also gave DAR Schools report; State Chaplain, Mrs. James LeRoy Boyd; State Recording Secretary, Mrs. Arthur H. Waite, Jr.; State Treasurer, Mrs. Hubert Reynolds Martin; State Organizing Secretary, Mrs. Carlyle Mumford Ward; and State Librarian, Mrs. Vernon Phillips.

Mrs. Harold I. Tuthill moved that in order that students of high school level might have a clearer understanding of Americanism and the dangers of Communism, that each chapter of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, be urged to present to the libraries in the schools in the State suitable collections of reference material on the subject of Americanism vs. Communism. Seconded by Mrs. Robert H. Humphrey. Passed.

State Officers' reports continued with the State Curator, Mrs. Maurice A. Cameron.

Mrs. Young Harris Yarbrough, State Parliamentarian, urged the use of Parliamentary procedure and the DAR Handbook to facilitate business, particularly with reference to policies as well as Bylaws. Chapters do not collect money other than for our own projects.

Mrs. Richardson announced a new National committee, United States of America Bicentennial, and introduced Mrs. Robert H. Humphrey, who was appointed by the President General to serve on the National Committee, and Mrs. Hugh Peterson, State Chairman.

The State Regent called for the reports of the State Chairmen. American Heritage, Mrs. Wallace S. Crouch; American Indians, Mrs. Louis J. Bahin, National Vice Chairman, for Miss Pauline Lewis; Americanism and DAR Manual for Citizenship, Mrs. Samuel Fine; Mrs. Jack Kelt and Mrs. Frank Suttle, Vice Chairmen were introduced. Adviser to DAR Museum, Mrs. Hugh Peterson; CAR, Mrs. John F. Thigpen, Senior President; Conservation, Mrs. Harold J. Brewer; DAR Magazine Advertising, Mrs. Edwin L. Brough; Genealogical Records, Mrs. John H. Terry, introduced Mrs. Leonard D. Wallace, National Vice Chairman, Southeastern Division; Insignia, Mrs. E. J. Smith; Junior American Citizens, Mrs. A. C. She had discovered that the Colonial Bookstore in Baltimore, Maryland, had reprinted some of our DAR books. Rev. Silas Emmett Lucas, Jr., Vidalia, has reprints of four DAR books for sale. The problem of getting all DAR books back in a DAR section at the Georgia Archives Building was that the Archivist office did not have a complete record of our books. Mrs. Young Harris Yarbrough volunteered she had a complete record of Mrs. McCall's books. Mrs. Richardson asked Mrs. Yarbrough to furnish the State with a copy of this list or to allow Mrs. Richardson to have the list copied so the DAR Collection at the State Archives could all be returned to our DAR Section. Mrs. Richardson and Mrs. Vernon Phillips will investigate the status of the copyright of all DAR books and do whatever is necessary to reinstate our copyrights.

Mrs. Richardson reviewed the program for State Conference, gave a list of our Conference guests, and assigned various officers to serve as official hostess to each Conference guest.

RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED AT GEORGIA STATE CONFERENCE MARCH 7, 1968 EXCESSIVE FEDERAL SPENDING

WHEREAS we consider the Federal Government is spending far in excess of its means and far in excess of needs both at home and abroad; and

WHEREAS since women control the ownership shares of great incorporated industries and other wealth of this nation, they should

also exercise some control of government spending of revenue therefrom, therefore:

RESOLVED, That at one of its regular chapter meetings the National Defense Chairman shall furnish members with plain stationery, pens, stamps and addresses of Congressmen and request that each member, as a private citizen, with no reference to the DAR organization, write at least one personal letter to the effect of curbing government spending.

BUYING COMMUNIST IMPORTS

WHEREAS Federal law requires that the country of origin be labeled on all imports until purchased by the ultimate consumer; and

WHEREAS it is requested that all members of NSDAR when purchasing any item note carefully the country of origin;

RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society of the NSDAR urges its members to refrain from purchasing goods coming from Communist countries, since dollars realized by Communist countries give aid to the enemy.

COMPULSORY TRAINING FOR PRE-SCHOOL CHILDREN

WHEREAS the idea of compulsory training for young children below the age of six is now being advanced in our State, and

WHEREAS under such a program the advocates of this system would be able to control the attitudes and behavior patterns of the young without the knowledge or consent of the parents, and

WHEREAS this prepared program is contrary to the freedom of choice in all areas of life on which the country was founded for it is the responsibility of parents, rather than that of the State, to control the early education and to develop the attitudes of the child, therefore;

RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, opposes the establishment of a compulsory program for the training of preschool children, and

RESOLVED, That the State should under no circumstances be be allowed to control the learning experiences of the pre-school child.

ANNIS MANN RICHARDSON RECREATIONAL AREA ENDOWMENT FUND

RESOLVED, That the surplus of \$1,239.01 in the Annis Mann Richardson Recreational Area Fund at Kate Duncan Smith School be placed in an endowment fund by the Kate Duncan Smith School for the maintenance of this Recreational Area.

PROPER SUPPORT AND INTERPRETATION OF LAWS

Whereas the law books on our nation on national, state, county, and local levels are already burdened with laws and rulings for guiding peoples of all walks of life in living harmoniously with one another and respecting the rights of others as set forth by the Ten Commandments, and

WHEREAS these rules are seemingly overlooked as new laws are enacted requiring commissions and committees to be supported by tax monies, and

WHEREAS these conditions present a financial burden to the American people and a lack of respect for existing laws;

RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, support the efforts to have complete and proper interpretation of existing laws, as intended by the framers of our great Constitution, and support those who seek redress through the courts of our land.

COPYRIGHTS

RESOLVED, That each administration of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, review the expiration dates of copyrights of the books published by the Georgia State Society and renew such copyrights when necessary.

JOHN EDGAR HOOVER

WHEREAS fifty years ago one of America's most dedicated and distinguished public servants began his career; and

WHEREAS he has remained more fully in the confidence of the American people than perhaps any other public figure even though he built and still heads the highly efficient FBI; and

WHEREAS he has remained a man dedicated to the enforcement of law and to the preservation of freedom in America;

RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, extends our warmest congratulations to John Edgar Hoover, a truly great American.

SUPPORTING CONGRESSIONAL EFFORTS

WHEREAS American young people, both men and women, are daily facing death and disaster to uphold America's commitment in Vietnam and forty other trouble spots in the world, and

I have attended Continental Congress, all four District meetings, Fall Board of Management meeting, and State Conference each year, which I greatly enjoyed. I have been a guest at several chapter meetings other than my own.

I have helped to organize the Earl of Camden Chapter in Camden County which was confirmed October 18, 1967, and now has 29 members.

Mrs. B. L. Robuck has been appointed the Organizing Regent by the State Regent for a new chapter at Warner Robins and her name has been sent to the Organizing Secretary General who presented it to the National Board of Management for approval at the February Board meeting.

Mrs. Robuck's mother and a daughter are also members of the DAR. Mrs. Robuck's papers were approved in Washington at the February Board meeting.

I would like to express my deep appreciation to Mrs. J. C. Strother for her untiring efforts in establishing new lines in genealogy for the Earl of Camden members, and to Miss Martha A. Cooper for her assistance in the new chapter being organized at Warner Robins.

STATE REGISTRAR Mrs. Frank J. Campbell

In concluding my term of office I report the card index and the ledger records kept by the State Registrar are in order. Duplicates of application papers mailed to me were sent to the Georgia State Archives and to the Memorial Library in Macon.

STATE HISTORIAN Mrs. Luther L. Watson

Georgia chapters contributed \$160.50 to the Cataloging and Indexing of the Americana Collection in the Archives Room. One document was given to the Repository of Americana. Whitehall Inn Chapter gave to the Georgia Society a list of Revolutionary Soldiers' names found between logs of old Fort Edgecome, Wisseasette, Maine.

Fifty-six famous men, 18 famous women, and 132 famous events were celebrated as historical anniversaries. There were 139 historical programs for or by adults and 85 involving school children. American History Month was proclaimed by city and state officials, and awards of medals, certificates, and cash were given for essays and excellence in American History. Fifty-seven historical tours were taken by adults and 25 for or by school children. Elijah Clarke Chapter made a detailed historic tour of their area and celebrated American History Month with a puppet show of historical characters for 150 children. Fifty-five chapters reported observing February as American History Month.

The Hannah Clarke Chapter has given a collection of historical items relating to their section of Georgia, including old hymn books, wills, and church and Bible records.

There were 465 historical broadcasts and spot announcements on radio and 13 on television. There were seven historic restorations begun, three completed, and three marked. There were four historic markers placed.

Thirty-four graves of DAR members were marked and the graves of one "Real Daughter." Nine graves of Revolutionary Soldiers and three graves of wives of Revolutionary Soldiers were marked.

Outstanding speakers have been guests throughout the state and DAR members have become the nucleus of newly-formed historical societies.

Awards given by your Historian are: First place, \$5.00, Peter Early Chapter; second place, \$3.00, Baron DeKalb Chapter; and third place, \$2.00, Savannah Chapter.

STATE LIBRARIAN Mrs. Vernon Phillips

Contributed \$191.00 to State Department of Archives and History, with a balance in this fund, \$575.61; \$125.00 sent to National Library.

Two books on requested list sent to National Library are Index to Printed Virginia Genealogies, including Key and Biography by Robert Armistead Stewart. Reprinted and North Carolina Genealogical Reference, 2nd ed., Seaman Printery, Durham, given by Abraham Baldwin Chapter, Carrollton.

Two New Passenger Lists. Some Early Emigrants to America by Cregoe D. P. Nicholson, also Early Emigrants to America from Liverpool by R. Sharpe France, given by Governor George W. Towns Chapter, Talbotton.

Five rolls of microfilms of the 1820 census of Georgia and six rolls of the 1830 census of Georgia were given by Mrs. Wallace Harris through the Hawkinsville Chapter in honor of the State Regent, Mrs. Herman M. Richardson.

Awards given by the State Librarian are: for the best report on National contributions, \$5.00 to Colonel William Candler Chapter; for the State contributions, Abraham Baldwin Chapter; and Mary Hammond Washington Chapter, \$5.00, for the best work on local or chapter library.

AMERICAN HERITAGE Mrs. Wallace Crouch

It has been exciting to note the interest of the public aroused by American Heritage activities. Whole communities are taking part in aiding and encouraging the preservation of our rich heritage in the fields of art, crafts, drama, literature, and music. In doing so they are learning the aims and accomplishments of the National Society. As we have secured interest and participation, we have received the appreciation and dedication of Americans to our country's rich heritage.

It is almost impossible to have a DAR program that does not include at least one category of the American Heritage Committee. Hence, it is the belief of this Chairman that all 95 chapters did some work in this field, although reports were received from only 56 chapters.

The following chapters receive honorable mention: Brier Creek, Captain Thomas Cobb, Council of Safety, Fort Frederica, John Ball, John Franklin Wren, Mary Hammond Washington, Nathaniel Abney, Roanoke and William Witcher.

A tie for second place goes to the Atlanta Chapter for exceptional musical programs and to the Savannah Chapter for the outstanding celebration of their Diamond Anniversary. The Chairman's award for the best report goes to Baron DeKalb Chapter.

AMERICAN INDIANS Miss Pauline Lewis

Serving the Society for the second year in this phase of our work was both challenging and rewarding. This Chairman appreciates the excellent support of the Georgia Daughters and their promptness in submitting their wonderful reports. Report blanks and two letters with additional information were sent to the chapters. Two years ago we set a high goal for ourselves: to provide ten scholarships for higher education to deserving students during Mrs. Richardson's term as State Regent. Although we did not meet this goal, we did make a showing worthy of recognition. Last year the Chairman offered two awards; this year she offered five awards for outstanding accomplishment.

Forty-five chapters reported the following contributions: \$126.00 to the General Fund; to Bacone College \$386.00 in scholarships, one set of used World Book Encyclopedia, 317% pounds of clothing for the Thrift Shop, and two boxes of jewelry; St. Mary's \$344.00 in scholarships, \$1200.00 for a chair for the National Project—DAR Wing, large box of story books, 212 pounds of used clothing; St. Labre' Mission School for Indians, \$10.00; \$91.61 postage was reported spent for the boxes sent to the schools. The Chairman purchased \$100.00 of jewelry from St. Mary's which was sold, making a grand total of \$966.00 plus \$91.61 postage.

This year the individual chapter's response was better than that

of last year and the overall contributions were greater. During the past two years our gifts were: Bacone \$800.75, St. Mary's \$631.50, the General Fund, \$207.00, St. Labre' \$10.00, jewelry sales over \$100.00, and 529 pounds of clothing. This is a two-year total of \$1,749.45 plus \$113.62 postage. In addition, many books and jewelry were given.

Chapters once again showed inventiveness and ingenuity in telling the American Indian story to their members and their communities. Programs were varied; they included workshops, speakers, tours,

teas, field trips, and school visits.

The display and sale of beadwork made by the Indian girls at St. Mary's was held at State Conference and at several chapter

meetings at which the Chairman spoke.

State Chairman's award of \$5.00 to the chapter with more than 50 members reporting the most outstanding all-inclusive program of the activity goes to Baron DeKalb; \$5.00 to the chapter with less than 50 members reporting the most outstanding all-inclusive program of the activity goes to Abraham Baldwin; \$5.00 to the chapter with more than 50 members making the largest per capita donation to our work at the Indian Schools goes to John Houstoun (\$1.31); \$5.00 to the chapter with less than 50 members making the largest per capita donation to our work at the Indian Schools goes to Abraham Baldwin (\$0.91); and \$5.00 to the chapter making the largest contribution to the Bacone Scholarship Fund goes to John Houstoun (\$100.00).

AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP Mrs. Sam Fine

In September, duplicate letters were mailed to all Chapter Regents and Chairmen, emphasizing the importance of the work of this committee. Instructions and blanks were enclosed for making their reports.

Twenty-five chapters reported having chairmen, 56 chapters sent reports; 20 reported having Americanism programs at chapter meetings; six had programs for the public; 29 repeated the American's Creed at all meetings; five gave 665 American flags to new citizens; five mailed or gave 438 welcome cards; six reported 1,322 pamphlets and patriotic material distributed; five gave 252 hours in community service; 13 gave 1,060 manuals to boy and girl scouts, libaries, and prospective citizens; two chapters had members working with Americanization schools, giving 16 hours of time; one chapter gave 80 volumes and 300 magazines to Veteran's Hospital: two chapters presented four Americanism medals and certificates to four outstanding citizens who met the qualifications for these awards; 13 chapters had 1,143 inches of newspaper publicity; five chapters had 20 hours of radio time; two had three hours of TV time; two reported attending Naturalization Courts; two had teas for new citizens, serving 214 guests; 17 chapters reported spending \$299.75 on Americanism programs; 20 chapters contributed \$33.00 to Occupational Therapy Fund; nine chapters gave 36 Good Citizenship medals for essays written on Citizenship. "Citizen . . . U.S.A." tapes based on DAR Manual for Citizenship were used by three chapters and is scheduled for use by one. Applications have been approved and two additional Americanism medals recommended.

Awards for best report on Americanism will go to: Fort Frederica, Fort Peachtree, Xavier and Baron DeKalb chapters.

My thanks to the Vice Chairmen who wrote letters and 56 Regents who sent reports.

It has been a privilege and pleasure to serve as your State Conservation Chairman. I wish to thank the chapters participating in this most interesting program.

The final project of the Diamond Jubilee Administration was the National Conservation Project, "The Beautification of the

Grounds at Headquarters in Washington."

Georgia's monetary contribution to the National project was \$172.50. Chapters reporting, 62; total plantings, 38,050. Four chapters presented beautiful brochures of their year's work.

First ward to the Elijah Clarke Chapter-Brochure and Historical and Memorial Conservation Work. Elijah Clarke Chapter contributed 75 iris ryzomes from the Historic Ladies Garden Club of Athens, proudly America's first organized Garden Club with DAR Daughters holding membership since its inception. Eighteen Eastern Elms were planted on the grounds of Athens' magnificent new Y.M.C.A., honoring Elijah Clarke's past Regents, to be named "The Avenue of Regents," each tree with a permanent marker. Credit goes to this chapter for securing the services of the State Highway Department for removing and landscaping a historical marker on a North Georgia Highway.

Taylor, Camilla; and Southeastern, Mrs. Earl Hill, Sylvania.

The State Good Citizen, chosen from the four District winners, submitted by the Vice Chairmen, is Miss Carroll Travis of W. F. Dykes High School in Atlanta. She was sponsored by the Joseph

Habersham Chapter in the Northwestern District. Carroll was a guest of the State Society at the State Conference on Wilmington Island and received the State Good Citizen pin and a \$100.00 bond from the National Society. Our State Regent, Mrs. Herman M.

Richardson, made the presentation.

Other District winners who received \$5.00 from the State Society are: Northeastern, Miss Joan Youngblood of Buford High School, sponsored by Colonel William Candler Chapter of Gainesville; Southwestern, Miss Becky Pennell, Hardaway High School, Columbus, sponsored by the three Columbus chapters—Oglethorpe, Button Gwinnett and George Walton; and Southeastern, Miss Janice Marie Byrd, Charlton County High School, Folkston, sponsored by Lyman Hall Chapter of Waycross.

In September, 1967, a mailing was sent to all Chapter Regents as well as to the six Vice Chairmen with a letter of instruction for the selection of the Good Citizens, a sample questionnaire and

a report blank.

The State Chairman's award of \$5.00 to the chapter reporting the best planned programs for presentations to Good Citizens goes to the Thronateeska Chapter at Albany with Mrs. Frank Faulk as Good Citizen Chairman.

Questionnaires mailed to all chapters; 70 chapters reported a total of 1,430 subscriptions; gift subscriptions, 167; 62 chapters reported 25 per cent of membership or more in subscriptions; 32 chapters reported 138 new subscriptions for the month of October, 1967. The State Chairman's award of \$5.00 to the chapter with mem-

The State Chairman's award of \$5.00 to the chapter with membership under 50 goes to Earl of Camden Chapter; \$5.00 award with membership of 50 through 99 goes to Captain Thomas Cobb Chapter; \$5.00 award to chapters with membership of 100 and over goes to Elijah Clarke Chapter; the State Chairman's award of \$10.00 to chapter having largest number of new subscriptions for the month of October, 1967, goes to Earl of Camden Chapter. These awards are given on a per capita basis.

DAR MAGAZINE ADVERTISING Mrs. Edwin L. Brough

In October, 1967, the 95 Georgia chapters, Daughters of the American Revolution, were mailed a copy of the proposed advertisement for the March issue of the National Magazine. This was a cooperative advertisement to which, it was hoped, every chapter would respond.

A copy of the proposed advertisement was sent to each Chapter Regent and to the State Regent. Emphasis was stressed on the \$10.00 per chapter Honor Roll Credit in the correspondence and at State Conferences, by the State Regent and your State Chairman. Chapters were assured that the requested \$10.00 would meet this requirement. It was requested that each chapter include the name of their Regent if a change had been made.

In the advertisement would be included: name of chapter, Regent, membership, District and location. The caption: a three-fourth page picture of the State Capitol.

Fifty-two chapters responded on time. Seven checks were sent to Washington to be added, if possible, to the advertisement, which had been sent to the National Chairman of Advertising before January 5, as per instructions for publication in the Georgia issue of March, 1968.

On January 29, 1968, three checks had to be returned to their respective chapters' Treasurers; 72 chapters met Honor Roll requirements, with a total of 136 advertisements; 13 chapters did not respond, but hopefully, sent their checks direct to Washington. In the October issue of the National Magazine, the Stephen Heard Chapter had a half-page, \$125.00, sponsored by the Granite Association, honoring Founder's Day. The Stephen Heard Chapter has an accepted advertisement for the March issue, 1968, of one page, sponsored by the Granite Sheds (individual), honoring the Granite Bowl in Elberton, Georgia, and as a contribution to the Stephen Heard Chapter, DAR. The Granite Bowl is a recreation center for high school and for football team engagements with other teams, seating capacity, 20,000.

The 1967-68 reports from Washington follows: \$3.00 was paid for mats, \$90.00 for cuts; the amount sent Advertising Chairman for this issue: March, \$4,405.00; total for mats and cuts and advertisements, \$4,498.00. This is an increase over 1966-67 of \$1,203.00. Increase in Honor Roll Credit, 1966-67, 62; increase in Honor Roll Credit, 1967-68, 72.

Awards: \$5.00 to Andrew Houser Chapter, membership under 50; \$5.00 to Stephen Heard Chapter, membership 50 to 100; and \$5.00 to Savannah Chapter, membership over 100.

Your Chairman attended Continental Congress, the four District meetings and the Fall Board of Management meeting, also several chapter meetings stressing the Museum work. The most outstanding chapter meeting I attended was the visit to John Floyd Chapter, when the Second Vice Regent, Miss Martha Cooper and I, enjoyed a luncheon at the home of Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Smith before going to DuPont to attend the chapter meeting held at "White Gables," the home of Mr. and Mrs. G. C. Lee, which is over 100 years old and built by J. P. A. DuPont.

Donations to DAR General Fund was \$104.00.

On March 1, 1967, our balance on the Georgia Room was only \$486.14. However, our donations this year amounted to \$975.50, which more than doubles last year's balance; our total amount today is \$1.461.14.

Through Oconee Chapter, four originals of Watkin's Digest of Georgia Laws dating from 1800 to 1831, were donated to the DAR Museum to be placed in the Georgia Room. The donor, Mrs. Mary Mann Smith, gave these very rare books in memory of her father, Colonel William S. Mann; she also offers to pay for a cabinet to place these books in with suitable name-plate, etc., to be selected at a later date.

As a member of Oconee Chapter, I donated one original Land-Grant, dated 1807, to land in originally Wilkinson, now Telfair County, Georgia, to John Coffee, my great-great-grandfather, for whom Coffee County was named.

The Earl of Camden Chapter donated to the Museum one red cloth woven belt 2½ inches wide with brass buckle. This belt was worn during the War of 1812 by a member of the McCloy family.

My award of \$5.00 goes to the Earl of Camden Chapter for donating the most outstanding gift.

THE PROPOSED "GEORGIA ROOM" AT DAR MUSEUM

Following the request of the Savannah Chapter, the State Society passed a Resolution asking the National Society for space for a State Room in the Museum. Many trips and conferences by the State Regent and the Adviser to the Museum Committee (from Georgia)

were made to try to secure this space.

An effort has been made to secure funds which will be needed to furnish and maintain the room should it be obtained. Miss Ida Sisson, of Washington, D. C., a friend of Georgia members, offered a challenge to the members by contributing a check which was to be matched by chapters or by members. The check was made for \$30.00. The State Chairman or Adviser sent a letter to each chapter and urged that this check be matched many times—not just once. The reply was appreciated, but not as gratifying as had been hoped. Deep appreciation goes to those who contributed: 54 of the 95 chapters contributed; 8 chapters matched the check one time; 4 chapters matched it more than once; 2 chapters matched it twice; 1 chapter gave \$200.00, matching it over 8 times (Vidalia Chapter). Total amount given to "Proposed Room" DAR Museum, \$480.00.

It is hoped that the interest will remain keen for Georgia to have a Period Room at the DAR Museum, and that before so very long the National Administration and the Curator of the Museum

will find or make space for the Room.

The official Insignia was unanimously adopted by the National Board of Management May 26, and patented September 22, 1891, and is therefore the property of the National Society, DAR.

"Do's and Don't's"-a folder on the correct use of the Insignia should be given at Chapter Meetings. The material may be secured

The state chairman's award of \$5.00 was given to the John Franklin Wren Chapter for the most new Insignias during the year.

JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS Mrs. A. C. E. Shepherd

Georgia has ten Chapters which sponsored 1.934 Clubs having a total of 57.483 members. This is an increase of 290 Clubs and 5.663 members over last year. It is good to have this increase and to report that we had several Chapters join us for the first time. Throughout the State approximately 2,500 buttons, pins and citations have been presented. Two JAC Banners were purchased. The following awards were presented: two Thatcher pins, 85 Good Citizenship Medals and six cash awards of \$5.00 each. The total value of awards being \$159.50. Georgia contributed a total of \$12.00 to the National J.A.C. Contest Prize money. There were approximately 110 Contest entries throughout the State. Georgia received the following awards at 1967 Continental Congress: First Place for the largest number of JAC Clubs-\$5.00; First Place for largest number of JAC members-\$5.00; and Second Place for Outstanding JAC work-\$3.00.

Baron de Kalb Chapter leads the State again this year in number of members with a total of 46,767, an increase of 2,080. This Chapter leads the State in the number of Clubs sponsored with a total of 1.758, an increase of 193. Their increase of 193 new Clubs gives them the lead in new Clubs sponsored. The Chairman contacted all school officials and gave help when requested. She personally presented the awards when asked. The Chapter won National First Prize for most JAC members. From the contest entries they sponsored in 1967 the following National awards were won: 5 first place; 2 second place; 3 third place and 3 honorable mention, also 1 special award. Baron de Kalb presented 85 Good Citizenship Medals and 6 cash awards of \$5.00 each.

Thronateecska Chapter is second in the State with the number of members sponsored being 3,00 in 100 clubs. This is very good because

they did not participate last year.

Atlanta Chapter continues their great work in the Boys Clubs of Atlanta. This Chapter leads the State in personal contact because they are not only sponsor but they do all the work also. This year they added ten per cent membership over last year. Along with their regular Citizenship programs they add new interest with varied programs. One this year was on Conservation. Some 50 boys planted pine seedlings while studying the important factors of conservation. They also had very good radio and TV spot announcements.

Other Chapters participating in the JAC program this year are: Stephen Heard, Capt. Thomas Cobb, Benjamin Hawkins, John Clarke,

Ft. Frederica, Oconee and Metter.

The State Chairman's award of \$3.00 for Chapter with the largest increase in number of JAC Clubs goes to Baron de Kalb. An award to \$2.00 to the Chapter with the most Chapter participation goes to the Atlanta Chapter.

I would like to commend all the Chapters that participated in the JAC program and express my appreciation for the priviledge of serving as State Chairman for Mrs. Richardson.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE Mrs. Alvin G. Turley

Fifty-one chapters responded to the questionnaire mailed to the 95 chapters. These reported 343 Junior Members of which 78 are new members. Twenty-three chapters contributed to the Helen Pouch Memorial Scholarship Fund; 8 chapters sold note paper and 11 sold flag pins and ear rings. Two Junior Members served as Chapter Regents and 10 served as other chapter officers. Thirty-four served as committee chairmen and 75 worked on committees. Sixty Juniors subscribe to the DAR Magazine.

The State Chairman's award of \$5.00 for the largest increase in Junior Membership of chapters with membership from 10 to 75 is awarded to Roanoke Chapter. Award of \$5.00 for chapters with membership of 76 and over goes to Mary Hammond Washington Chapter.

Outstanding Junior DAR Member of Georgia Society is Mrs. William S. Stuckey, Jr., of Colonel William Few Chapter.

LINEAGE RESEARCH COMMITTEE Mrs. Leonard G. DeLamar

Letters of instruction and questionnaires were mailed to all chapters. The fifty-eight Georgia chapters that sent to me their reports on Lineage Research work done in their chapters reported 159 potential members assisted, and 113 new members acquired through the efforts of this committee. Twenty-one programs were devoted to this work during the year, and it was my pleasure to present 3 of these

Reguest for assistance was received from the State Chairmen of four other states, while six request were sent to other State Chairman from Georgia.

Work done by the Fort Frederica Chapter was exceptional, and certainly deserving of honorable mention.

It has been a priviledge to serve the Georgia State Society as Chairman of Lineage Research.

MEMBERSHIP Mrs. Frank J. Campbell

The membership of February 1, 1968 in 95 Chapters was 6,558; 324 new members, 25 reinstated, 44 transfers in; 113 resignations, 110 deceased, 77 transfers out. Net gain in membership 70. At large, 32 members.

My awards are as follows: membership 10 through 50, Etowah Chapter tied with General Daniel Stewart Chapter receiving \$2.50 each; membership 51 through 100, Fielding Lewis Chapter \$5.00; membership 101 and over, Savannah Chapter \$5.00. National Chairman's Certificate to Fort Peachtree Chapter.

MOTION PICTURE Mrs. William M. Roberts

Continued high indignation and disapproval of the shocking movies and ads being fed to our youth. In Savannah Georgia a Screening Board was established with the backing of the City fathers. Three new chairman were added to the 25 reported last year. (28)

The award for the best Essy went to Baron DeKalb Chapter, the Subject: A Man for All Seasons. This has been submitted for a National Award. The Chairman Mrs. Harley Brown reported last year she had screened 250 hours of movies.

Much work needs to be done. This committee needs to be continued

and the support of NSDAR given to local governing bodies.

NATIONAL DEFENSE Mrs. R. Hugh Reid

Eighty-one of Georgia's 95 Chapters sent in a report for National Defense this year, which was most encouraging to this chairman. Not only was this an increase in the number of reports received, but the reports themselves indicated increased activity with the work of the National Defense committee.

A total of \$228.50 was contributed by the Chapters to the Dollars for Defense fund. Thirty Chapters reported efforts for increasing the subscribers to the National Defense mailing, which could prove a most helpful contribution to school and public libraries as gifts from local Chapters.

Chapters reported presenting a total of 350 Good Citizenship Medals, many making these presentations at school assemblies and

Chapter meetings.

All Chapter reports received indicated that at least 5 minutes at each Chapter meeting was devoted to some part of the National Defense mailing and literature, and 77 Chapters reported having an entire program on National Defense.

Support for our Armed Forces in Vietnam, concern over the fiscal policies of the United States, the continued threat of Communism to the American way of life, and the United Nations were the areas of greatest concern to the Georgia Daughters, according to the Chapter

reports.

Awards made on best over-all reports of Chapters on all phases of National Defense committee work for the year as follows: first place of \$5.00 for Chapters with membership under 50 to Fort Peachtree, and Honorable mentions of \$1.00 each to John Franklin Wren and Major General John Twiggs; first place of \$5.00 for Chapters with membership 50 to 100 to Commodore Richard Dale, and honorable mention of \$1.00 to Captain Thomas Cobb; first place of \$5.00 for Chapters with membership over 100 to Elijah Clarke, and honorable mention of \$1.00 to Savannah.

PROGRAM

Of the 95 chapters in the State 78 sent in reports. Yearbooks received numbered 29. Three chapters used inserts and 13 printed suppplements. All of these books contained the several requirements for national honor roll with regard to programs. Most of the chapters were aided by the Outline sent from the National Society in preparing their programs. Eight followed it for all programs and three obtained papers from the national file. Many used the DAR Magazine as a basis. Joint meetings with nearby chapters were listed as their most interesting, regardless of topic, with programs on the Flag of the United States of American a close second. There were 16 papers, 1 tape (16 min.) and 1 set of slides sent to the national reviewing committee from 12 chapters.

One of the great joys of serving as chairman of this committee has been that of receiving the beautiful yearbooks which show the outstanding work of the program committees of the chapters in our State. Without exception the programs have been interesting and informative-the results of an active membership. Eighteen yearbooks and 1 supplement have been sent to the National Vice Chairman for display at the Continental Congress.

The State Chairman's award for the best yearbook AND program outline in chapters with 175 members is made to Elijah Clarke Chapter. To chapters with more than 175 members the winning yearbook is that of Mary Hammond Washington, and the winning program outline Atlanta Chapter.

PUBLIC RELATIONS Mrs. George C. Blount

Sixty-four Chapters have reported with a total of 15,703 column inches and 309 photographs appearing in 183 newspapers and magazines. Radio time reported totaled 571/2 hours over 93 stations. TV time reported was 10 hours and 45 minutes on 17 stations. Stephen Heard Chapter reported 61/2 hours radio time. Button Gwinnett Chapter reported 6 hours 50 minutes TV time. Button Gwinnett, Oglethorpe and George Walton participated jointly in DAR activities. All three chapters sent the same material and deserve equal recognition. It has been a rewarding experience to have been the State Press Book Chairman for the term 1966-1968, and a decided pleasure to have had the opportunity to serve under our State Regent, Mrs. Herman M. Richardson.

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox

Sixty chapters reported their work for this committee. Thirty-five large flags and 2204 small flags were presented. Twenty-two chapters studied the Flag Code and 703 Flag Codes were distributed. Eighty-two corrections of incorrect display of the Flag were reported. Forty-two chapters had at least one entire Flag program. The publicity was fair—111 newspaper items, 55 radio broadcasts and six television programs. All 60 reporting chapters used The Pledge of Allegiance at all meetings and 56 chapters urged the use of the Flag on National Holidays. Thirty-four chapters joined in community activities where the flag played an important part. Thirty-seven chapters distributed Flag literature to Naturalization Courts, Boys Clubs, JAC, libraries, schools and Scouts. The winner in the chapters over 100 is Baron DeKalb; hon. mention is Elijah Clarke; 50 to 100 winner is Ft. Frederica; hon. mention is Oglethorpe; under 50 winner is John Franklin Wren; hon. mention is Brier Creek.

TRANSPORTATION Mrs. H. D. Summerall

Questionnaires were sent to all Chapters and fifty-five sent in their reports. Four hundred fifty members assisted in furnishing rides for members who would not otherwise have gone to the meetings. Twenty-five historical places were visited by Chapters while others are planning some later. Thirty reported that they would be represented in Continental Congress in April. Seventy-eight attended the Fall Board of Management Meeting at Callaway Gardens in October. Seventeen Chapters had full programs on safety and other short talks. Sixteen members visited traffic courts.

The Chairman's Award First Place goes to the Savannah Chapter in Savannah for the best report and they are competing for the National Award of \$100.00. Second Place goes to Elijah Clarke Chapter, and Third Place to Baron DeKalb Chapter.

It has been a pleasure to serve as State Chairman of Transportation for the past two years.

Special National Committees

AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH Mrs. Ralph A. Lovelace, State Chairman

American History Month Committee letters were sent to all Chapter Regents in August, 1967, which outlined the Essay Contest, High School participation, Proclamations, National and State Legislation, use of posters and stickers, Chapter Programs, publicity and suggestions for Contestants.

Reports showed many varied, interesting and informative programs presented and popularity of the activities showed a deeper understanding of our American Heritage in order to preserve our

freedom.

Activities including presenting program on American History at Civic Club meeting, teaching American's Creed to Boy Scout troop, students making posters to display in stores, presenting program to CAR group, DAR members attended city council meeting and were presented signed proclamation by Mayor, civic organizations asked to have program on American History during February, American Flags were presented essay contest winners, framed copy of the Constitution was presented a new school, American Flag was presented to a new school, American Flag was presented to a CAR Society, American History students presented program on TV, displays were placed in schools, libraries, banks, city halls, post offices, stores, newspapers printed editorials and articles, radio stations had spot announcements daily, and one Chapter emphasized American History at each meeting by preparing a list of calendar events that were outstanding in American History reading them to the Chapter each month and Chapters presented awards to winners at Chapter meeting having them read their essays; a bank played patriotic music over their loud speaker daily and one Chapter announced a special historical event over radio daily.

Proclamations declaring February as American History Month were issued by the Governor and 26 mayors, participation in the Essy Contest, "An American Inventor," by 106 public schools, 39 new schools and 1083 contestants; school assemblies held in 14 schools with 11 class discussions and 10 articles in school papers. Publicity included 63 stories and editorials, 16 pictures and 631 inches of newspaper publicity. Sets of spot announcements numbered 59 on radio; 13 DAR members appearing on radio with 762 minutes used and 15 DAR members appearing on TV with 36 minutes used. American History Month posters and displays were placed in 86 locations in schools, libraries, banks, stores, filling stations, city halls and post office. Cash awards of \$252.54, History Medals, books and certificates were presented essay winners and students making highest mark in American History and 2 Chapters sent American History

Scripts to National Society.

magazines.

Seventeen Chapters responded to give this Committee an outstanding report for the year: Adam Brinson, 26 pages; Archibald Bulloch, 4; Brunswick, 5; Colonel John McIntosh, 30; Colonel William Few, 34; Governor George W. Towns, 27; Hawkinsville, 69;

John Clarke, 50; Knox-Conway, 28; Lachlan McIntosh, 4; Mary Hammond Washington, 219; Nathaniel Macon, 4; Oconee, 6; Stephen Heard, 8; Thronateeska, 198; William McIntosh, 107; and Xavier, 2. This makes a total of 854 pages to which is added 127 pages sent in last year, making 981 pages. This work was typed in triplicate, giving a grand total of 2,943 pages. Eighteen books were bound as follows: 3—Histories 1966-1967; 3—Mary Hammond Washington Chapter; 3—Thronateeska Chapter; 3—William McIntosh Chapter; 3—Miscellaneous Chapters, Volume I; 3—Miscellaneous Chapters, Volume II.

The Harlem Male Quartet sang "Your Land and My Land" and "God Bless America." Chapter Regent gave the charge to today's patriots and Taps were sounded by a bugler from Fort Gordon. BYLAWS

BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I

NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II OBJECTS

The objects of the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution shall be: to promote the aims set forth in the Bylaws of the National Society; to secure the benefits of cooperation of the Chapters in the State; the preservation of the memory of its Revolutionary patriots; the study of its history; the education of its youth in patriotic ideals and in the duties of citizenship.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All Chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, located within the State of Georgia shall be members of this organization.

Article IV

OFFICERS

The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Curator. The State Regent shall appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as adviser in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure.

Article V

ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected at the annual State Conference biennially.

Section 2. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two years or until their successors are elected. Their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and of the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Section 3. No member shall be eligible to a State office until she has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years.

No member shall be eligible to the same State office for two successive terms. A member having served more than one-half term in the State office shall be deemed to have served a term.

Section 4. Nominations of candidates for office shall be from the floor. The election shall be held by ballot. A majority of the votes cast by the voting members of the State Conference shall elect.

Section 5. Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become acting First Vice Regent, subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. A vacancy in any other State office between annual meetings shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. An election shall be held at the next State Conference to fill the unexpired term. Any State Officer, who is absent from the State for a continuous period of six months or longer automatically relinquishes her position as a State officer.

Section 6. No two State officers shall be members of the same Chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

Section 7. In recognition of valuable service to the organization, any State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Section 8. A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot. The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than fifteen months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

Section 9. On the election of State Regent, and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Recording Secretary General. The endorsement of a candidate for Vice President General shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent to the Recording Secretary General at least two weeks prior to Continental Congress.

Article VI

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, of the State Board of Management, and of the Executive Committee. She shall attend all regular meetings of the National Board of Management. She shall appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees.

Section 2. In the absence of the State Regent from any meeting of the State Conference, or of the State Board of Management, the State First Vice Regent, or in her absence, the State Second Vice Regent, shall perform the duties of the State Regent. The State First and Second Vice Regents may be assigned to direct committees and to perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent.

Section 3. The State Chaplain shall open all meetings of the State Conference and of the State Board of Management with Scripture reading and prayer and shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require. She shall preside at the memorial service during State Conference and shall be responsible for the In Memoriam pages in the Proceedings.

Section 4. The State Recording Secretary shall record the proceedings of the State Conference and of meetings of the State Board of Management and of the Executive Committee. She shall compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and of the Proceedings Committee.

Section 5. The State Corresponding Secretary shall conduct correspondence and send notices in behalf of the State Conference, the State Regent, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as directed by them.

Section 6. The State Treasurer shall be the custodian of the funds of the State Society. She shall collect the State Conference dues and registration fees from the Chapters, and shall receive all sums contributed by the Chapters for State and National projects. All monies received by the State Treasurer shall be placed in a Bank which is a member of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. She shall disburse such sums only when authorized by the State Board of Management of the State Society. Incidental expenses shall be paid from the State Dues Fund when authorized by the State Regent in writing. The State Treasurer shall keep an account of all sums received or paid out and shall keep receipts for all payments. She shall prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference. Her books shall be audited annually by a Certified Public Accountant. She shall be ex-officio a member of the Credentials Committee.

Section 7. The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new Chapters.

Section 8. The State Registrar shall, when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, who live in towns and counties in which there are no Chapters, to prove eligibility, and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars in verifying lineage papers. She shall keep a correct list of all members in the State and shall make a report on membership to the State Conference.

Section 9. The State Historian shall be in charge of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General. She shall keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves in the State and shall prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General to Smithsonian Institution. She shall encourage the compilation and publication of County Histories and other unpublished records, especially those of the Revolutionary period.

Section 10. The State Librarian shall collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing duplicates, wherever possible, in the NSDAR Library and in the Georgia DAR Collections in the State Department of Archives and History. She shall endeavor to obtain the books on the wanted list of the Librarian General for the Georgia Section in the NSDAR Library and is authorized to solicit contributions from the Chapters for the purchase of the same. She

shall have custody and supervision of the DAR Genealogical and Historical Collections at the State Department of Archives and History.

Section 11. The State Curator shall receive and be responsible for all gifts of Revolutionary relics to the Museum of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution. She shall be the custodian of the conference properties and shall have them properly stored, insured and made ready for use of the State Conference.

Article VII

MEETINGS

Section 1. The Georgia State Society shall hold an annual State Conference between the first day of February and the time of the meeting of the Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week. The Executive Committee shall fix the time and place of meetings when not fixed by the Conference in session, or when for any reason it may be impracticable to meet at the time or place fixed by the Conference.

Section 2. The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credential blanks to the Chapters not less than sixty days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 3. The voting members of the State Conference shall be State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regent or alternate, and the delegates or their alternates from the Chapters of the State, that are entitled to representation at the Continental Congress. The number of representatives from each Chapter shall be determined by the rules for representation of Chapters in the Continental Congress as given in the National Bylaws.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a Chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the Chapter, except in the case of the Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. No member shall hold, at the same time, two offices carrying a vote at the annual State Conference.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any Chapter in the State of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference, by unanimous consent, the privileges of the floor may be accorded to the State Chairmen with the exception that they may not vote unless they are duly elected delegates or their alternates from their respective chapters.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen days notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Twenty-five voting members, representing not less than ten Chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII

STATE DUES AND CONFERENCE FEES

Section 1. The annual dues of Chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be one dollar for each member of the Chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before February 1. Seventy cents of this amount shall be allocated to the general State Dues Fund and thirty cents shall be used to cover all State required per capita assessments. No Chapter shall be entitled to representation at the annual State Conference until the State dues are paid.

Section 2. The Finance Committee, appointed by the State Regent, shall be composed of seven members, to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two Honorary State Regents, one active Chapter Regent, and one active Chapter member. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund.

Section 3. Each Chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State dues, a Conference registration fee of \$2.00 for each voter to which the Chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Section 4. State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$2.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference fee at the time of registration.

Article IX

EXPENSES

Section 1. Eight hundred dollars shall be taken each year from the State Dues Fund, to be used by the State Regent in defraying her necessary traveling expenses.

Section 2. Necessary expenses of the State Regent and other officers of the State Conference for stationery and postage shall be paid by the State Treasurer from the State Dues Fund, on the presentation of itemized statements approved in writing by the State Regent.

Article X

STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, the Honorary State Regents, the Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regents of the Chapters of the State, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the fall, following the regular meeting of the National Board. It shall meet also at the time of the State Conference and whenever called by the State Regent.

Section 3. Ten members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between

annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference.

Section 5. State Chairmen of National and State Standing Committees shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privileges of the floor, but may not vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article XI

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute an Executive Committee. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the Executive Committee, but may not vote. The State Board of Management may authorize this committee to perform such duties of the Board between its meeting, as may from time to time seem expedient. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three members of the Committee. It shall make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

Article XII

CHAPTERS

Section 1. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April or May. The Chapter Regent shall report the names of the elected officers promptly, on triplicate blanks provided by the State Regent for this purpose, to the Organizing Secretary General, to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary.

Section 2. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent for use in compiling her report, not less than fifteen days before the opening of the annual State Conference. The official Chapter report, not to exceed five hundred words in length, for publication in the Proceedings shall be furnished the State Recording Secretary before the State Conference.

Article XIII AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent and to the Parliamentarian. The State Regent shall send a copy to each Chapter and each voting member, at least sixty days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. Robert's Rules of Order (Revised) shall be the governing authority in parliamentary law for the State Conference in matters not covered by the Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24. Bylaws were adopted and State Officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21). No conference was held in 1911; the time of meeting having been changed from the fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910, to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912"; amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta, "that we have Conference in the spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, p. 21).

Awards

All chapters competing for awards must send reports to the respective chairmen by February 1, 1969.

All reports for awards are based on membership confirmed by the National Society as of February 1 of preceding year (1968).

Bylaws

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National and State Bylaws.

Change of Address

Notice of change of address of members shall be sent to the Organizing Secretary General, Treasurer General, State Regent and State Registrar.

Change of Name

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to State Registrar, Treasurer General and State Regent.

Chapter Elections

Chapter elections shall be held preferably in April or early May and names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, Administration Building, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D. C. 20006, to the State Regent, and to the State Recording Secretary. The full Christian name of chapter officers shall be given together with her husband's given name or initials, address and zip code.

Dues

Pay to State Treasurer State Dues of \$1.00 per member preferably on or before January 1, not later than February 1. National Dues of \$3.00 per member sent to the Treasurer General, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D. C. 20006, before January 1, 1969.

Conference Registration Fee

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State dues (on or before January 1, not later than February 1), \$2.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Rules for representation of chapters at Continental Congress:

"Chapters having less than 50 paid members on February 1, are entitled to be represented by the Regent or in her absence the Vice Regent or alternate; chapters having 50 to 199 paid members on February 1, one delegate in addition to the Regent; chapters having 200 to 299 paid members on February 1, two delegates in addition to the Regent, and for each additional 100 paid members one additional delegate. (Article XIII, Section 3-C, National Bylaws) State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$2.00

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$2.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, who

are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. Article VIII, Section 4. of the State Bylaws.

Contributions

All contributions by Chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

Deceased Members

Deaths shall be reported promptly to Treasurer General and State Chaplain. Complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and date of death shall be furnished State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for Conference Memorial Service and "In Memoriam" pages for State Proceedings.

Georgia Hospitality Fund

The following resolution which applies to the Georgia Hospitality Fund appears in the Proceedings for 1955:

"WHEREAS, The Georgia Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds an annual dinner in Washington each year during Continental Congress, which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society.

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Georgia Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$100.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes:

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this fund shall not be cumulative. Adopted."

GENERAL NEW REGIME FUND BALANCE \$2,500.00

The following resolution which applies to the General New Regime Fund Balance of \$2,500.00 appears in the Proceedings for 1959-1960, page 41:

"RESOLVED, That at the end of each regime all money in the General Fund above \$2,500.00 be transferred to the Savings Account. When the Supplemental Audit Report is made as of June 1 every two years before the Auditors close out the books this transaction be handled in order to show in this Audit, thus making the General Fund show the same balance of \$2,500.00 at the beginning of each new regime. ADOPTED."

PROCEDURE BOOK OF INSTRUCTIONS FOR OFFICERS AND STATE CHAIRMEN

The following resolution which applies to a Procedure Book of Instruction for Officers and State Chairmen appears in the Proceedings for 1959-1960, page 41:

"RESOLVED, That all Officers and State Chairmen keep a Procedure Book of Instructions and helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new Officer and Chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities thus providing a continuing continuity of DAR work, ADOPTED."

Genealogical Records

To insure uniformity and convenience in filing, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, 8½ by 11 inches with one inch margins on left side and bottom, and one and one-half inches

at top. One copy retained in Chapter Archives, and two copies shall be sent to the Chairman of Genealogical Records.

Information for Chapter Regents

- 1. All letters received by Chapter Regents relating to the work of the Society shall be distributed to the corresponding Chapter Chairman and brought to the attention of the members at a chapter meeting.
- 2. Please follow Resolutions No. 11, adopted at 61st Georgia Society State Conference, as follows: "Resolved, That a closing date of February 1 be established for all reports, and all reports be given from February 1 to February 1, regardless of a change of regime or Regent." All awards will be made on this date basis.

Information for State Officers and State Chairmen

State Officers and State Chairmen shall send to the State Regent and to the State Treasurer a copy of any instruction letter mailed to chapters.

Meadow Garden

The deed to Meadow Garden property from the National Society, DAR, is in the possession of the State Regent and is also recorded in the Richmond County Court House, Augusta, Georgia.

Nominations

The following resolution which applies to the announcement of the candidacy for State Regent appears in the Proceedings of the Twentieth State Conference, 1918:

Twentieth State Conference, 1918:

"Resolved, that it is the judgment of the Executive Board that announcements for State Regent should not be made... earlier than three months prior to the meeting of the Conference and they shall be furnished to the Press for publication."

Proceedings

Three copies of the Proceedings will be sent to each Chapter. One copy to be retained by Regent, one copy given to the Chapter Treasurer and one copy to the Chapter Chairman of Program. Additional copies, if available, may be secured from the State Recording Secretary at \$1.00 per copy, plus 25 cents for postage if to be mailed.

Reports for Proceedings

State Officers', State Chairmen's, and Chapter Regents' reports for Proceedings shall be as concise as possible—not to exceed 500 words—typewritten (double spaced) upon one side of 3-hole unruled notebook paper, 8½ by 11 inches, and shall be sent to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary on or before February 15, the original being sent to the Secretary for the Proceedings.

Resolutions

Resolutions to be considered by the Committee shall be typed, with a heading giving subject of the resolution, signed, and sent to the Chairman of the Resolutions Committee two weeks before the date of the State Conference.
