


MRS. HENRY ALLAN IRONSIDE Honorary Vice President General National Society Daughters of the American Revolution 1962

MEADOW GARDEN FURNISHINGS

WHEREAS: The National Society Daughters of the American Revolution have by deed duly made and recorded in the land records of Richmond County, Georgia, conveyed to the Trustees named therein title to the property herein described (the same being the family home of George Walton, Signer of the Declaration of Independence), known as "Meadow Garden," upon the condition, among other things, . . . "—that if the Georgia State Society of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, by formal action voluntarily taken, shall instruct the Trustees to sell or dispose of the said property the Trustees then serving must so notify the said National Society and offer to re-convey by deed of gift the said property to the National Society and no other disposition may be made of said property within three years from the date of said offer unless the said National Society, by appropriate action, formally taken shall waive the right reserved to it to re-acquire title to the same and so notify said Trustees. . . . ," and.

WHEREAS: The Georgia State Society, NSDAR, has placed and installed in said Meadow Garden sundry furniture, furnishings and equipment and proposes hereafter to acquire sundry furniture, furnishings and equipment by gift, purchase and loan for installation and exhibition in said Meadow Garden which said furniture, furnishings and equipment will, in the event of a re-conveyance of said property to the National Society in accordance with the conditions of the said deed herein referred to, remain the property of or under the control of the Georgia State Society;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: That the Trustees named in said deed and the National Society as the Grantor named therein be notified of this assertion of independent title and interest by the Georgia Society, NSDAR, in and to the said personal property so that in the event of a re-conveyance by the said Trustees to the National Society of the real property described in said deed pursuant to the terms thereof the said Trustees then serving may be instructed as a matter of record that they, as current Trustees, are not vested with any title to the personal property installed in said premises such as would require or permit the

same to be included in the terms of such a re-conveyance.

RESERVED OFFICER TRAINING

WHEREAS: The policy of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, is to maintain a strong America—morally and economically, to support every effort to achieve internal strength through a well-balanced, well-administered defense team; to strive to keep the public informed, alert to threats to our national security, and prepared scientifically and industrially; to urge continued Congressional authority over the Armed Forces; to foster world-wide peace efforts to avoid wars, if possible, and if not possible, to fight to win; to pledge wholehearted allegiance to our Flag and our nation; to which statements of policy, the officers and members of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, subscribe without reservation; and

WHEREAS: Certain institutions of learning in this nation are contributing to our Armed Forces through over 500 units of the Army, Navy, Air Force Reserve Officers Training Corps, a contribution which at the present time amounts to more than thirty-five per cent of the Officers Corps of these services; and

WHEREAS: Dissident elements in this nation have recently accelerated their attacks on these units and initiated increasingly alarming programs to interfere with, if not destroy, the Reserve Officers Training Corps at these institutions, such actions being inimical to the National Defense of these United States;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: That the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, does hereby deplore these actions and programs designed to destroy the Reserve Officers Training Corps in colleges, universities, and other institutions of learning in these United States, and we take steps to actively support the Reserve Officers Training Corps, seeking legislative assistance, as individuals, from our Congressional representatives as necessary;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That the members of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, as individual citizens actively and vigorously urge that all Federal aid, including land grant privileges, where applicable, be withdrawn from those campuses on which ROTC Units are forced out of existence by the aforesaid dissident elements.

SELLING OF NAMES FROM GOVERNMENT FILES

WHEREAS: According to news release from the office of Congressman Robert H. Steele, the U. S. Government is selling mailing lists to direct mail Advertisers; and,

WHEREAS: The Internal Revenue Service recently sold 140,000 names to licensed Gun Dealers and Collectors, to sixty Buyers, mostly "so-called Junk Mailers"; and,

WHEREAS: The Federal Aviation Administration sell lists of names of pilots; and,

WHEREAS: The sanctity of their lives and the knowledge of their where-abouts are made public to an alarming degree;

BE IT RESOLVED: That the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, encourage the members to be informed of this menace; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That as individuals and as patriotic citizens positive action be taken to control and to eradicate this danger.

U. S. A. BICENTENNIAL OBSERVANCE

WHEREAS: Our forefathers by their inspired wisdom declared their freedom as an independent nation on July 4, 1776; and,

WHEREAS: This Nation has survived longer than any other constitutional republic; and,

WHEREAS: The citizens of the United States of America enjoy freedom unknown to citizens of any other nation; and,

WHEREAS: The ancestors of the Daughters of the American Revolution were at the birth of the United States;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: That the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, do hereby proclaim the year of 1976 as United States Bicentennial Year and urge all chapters to plan suitable celebrations in their communities commemorating the Bicentennial of the United States and events leading thereunto.

BICENTENNIAL STATE PROJECT

STATE REGISTRAR Mrs. Leonard G. DeLamar

Letters of instruction were sent to each chapter in the early Fall. Due to the splendid cooperation of the chapters much needed information has been sent in to bring the State Register up-to-date. Many chapters, however, have failed to send index cards on members for our card files. All newly accepted members through February 1, 1971, have been entered in the Register and all changes in membership have been duly recorded.

Contact with the chapters has been very pleasant, and their cooperation most gratifying.

STATE ORGANIZING SECRETARY Mrs. E. Lee Stephenson

It is a great pleasure to be able to report that Kettle Creek Chapter, in Washington, has had an Organizing Chapter Regent approved by the National Board of Management, January, 1971. The name is Mrs. Charles Wickersham. In other areas of the state efforts are being made to secure 12 members for other chapters. I appreciate the help given by Georgia Daughters in this important work of strengthening and expanding the Georgia State Society.

STATE HISTORIAN Mrs. Henry W. Lively

Sixty chapters reported, some made cash donations to the Americana Fund; three documents given to the Repository of Americana, Increased interest shown in Historical programs-109 given by adults, 34 by school children. Twenty-two famous men, six famous women and 64 events were featured on these programs. Publicity good through press, also 510 radio and 47 TV programs covering some facet of DAR and History. Adults made 71 Historical tours, school children made 40. There were 40 graves of DAR members marked with official Insignia; one soldier's grave marked by chapter; eight located but unmarked; 46 reported marked in previous years; nine Historic restorations were begun and three completed; six Historic markers placed; and 60 chapters reported awards of medals, certificates and other recognition given for excellent in American History. Chapters participated in pageants, parades, and social functions celebrating Historic events. The grave of Georgia's first State Regent, Mrs. Valeria Whitehead Salas who served from 1891 to 1892 was marked.

It has been a privilege and a pleasure serving as your State Historian.

STATE LIBRARIAN Mrs. Carl F. Wagner

Fifty-two chapters reported a total of \$2,484.18 spent on National, State, and local library work. No value was placed on the contributed material and the many hours of time given to local work, so the monetary report is not a true indication of the interest of Georgia Daughters in library work. The greatest interest was in developing local libraries for reference and genealogical research.

Fourteen books, three manuscripts, seven pamphlets, 255 pages of records and 65 subscriptions of historical or genealogical

magazines sent to the NSDAR Library. The following have been acknowledged by the Librarian General: "Descendants of James Epps, 1783-1869, Sussex Co., Va., and wife, Jane Larkin Evans, 1795-1867, Morgan Co., Ga.," Bertha W. Porter, 1968 (pamphlet) through Sergeant Newton Chapter; "Georgia State Society of the National Society Daughters of the American Colonists," 1966-1968, from Mrs. Patience R. Peterson in honor of Sunbury Chapter; "The Southern Indian Trade," Bessie Lewis (pamphlet) from Vidalia Chapter; "Newton Co., Georgia, Cemetery Records," Sara A. and Mary Jane Dixon, Vol. 1,—1968, from Mrs. Sara A. Dixon in honor of Mrs. E. L. Stephenson, Regent, through Sergeant Newton Chapter; "The Narraguagus Valley, Maine—Some Account of Its Early Settlement and Settlers," J. A. Milliken, 1810 (manuscripts), from Hazel W. Battles through Bainbridge Chapter; "Roberts-Wathen and Allied Families," Leta B. Kirby, 1970, from Leta B. Kirby, the compiler, through Atlanta Chapter; "Heckert-Keister-Dyer, Pioneer Families of West Virginia," 1970, "Colonial Ancestors of Edward Jackson, Revolutionary War Soldier," 1967, "Sutler-Hughes-Jackson, Pioneer Families of West Virginia," 1968, all by and from Mrs. Gladys S. Hoffmann the compiler, through Joseph Habersham Chapter; "Jackson C., Georgia Tombstone," Genealogical Enterprises, 1969, "Bone Connections," Dorothy Herring and Jeannette H. Stucki, from Savannah Chapter in memory of Gladys Woods Stanley; and "John Skelton of Georgia," by John W. Skelton, 1970, from the Georgia State Society. The last three were requested from the Georgia State Society by the Librarian General; \$149.50 given to the Rebinding Fund and \$231.00 to the Microfilm Fund. Total amount spent on NSDAR Library work was \$772.30.

Eight books and 270 pages of records have been sent to the Georgia State Society Collection at the Georgia Department of Archives and History; \$22.00 was added toward the fund for the purchase of volumes of "The New England Genealogical and Biographical Register" and "The Virginia Magazine of History and Biography," which makes a balance this year of \$132.00 to be spent when the volumes are available; \$215.00 given to the State Library Fund, with a total of \$308.00 spent on State work; \$5.00 and 108 paperback novels given to the American Merchant Marine Library.

Chapters presented the following to local libraries: 137 books, four booklets, maps, seven reels microfilm, three binders, 22 subscriptions of historical or genealogical magazines, two shelves of DAR and C.A.R. magazines, restoration of portrait, memorabilia, 92 pages of reference material; \$1,403.88 reported for local library work.

One chapter conducted a workshop, open to the public, to assist in research; several were indexing material, one worked to salvage library books damaged by fire and water; one had a bus trip to the Georgia Archives, including a tour of the building and a documentary film.

It has been a pleasure to serve under you, Madam Regent, and my thanks go to the chapters who have made this report possible.

STATE CURATOR Miss Ethel Montgomery

As State Curator, I have in my possession the following items: one large electric DAR insignia, including the bulbs, one silk United States flag, one silk State of Georgia flag, one silk DAR flag, four aluminum flag poles (each in two parts) contained

in a blue cloth bag, one brass eagle finial, one brass spear-shaped finial, three aluminum spear-shaped finials, three gold cords, two round brass flag standards, two iron tripod flag standards, one time clock and bell, one blue suit case (containing the flags, cords and finials), one large white pottery urn, 252 Georgia State Delegation badges, 42 Georgia State Conference special guest badges, 23 small and seven large Page ribbons and a full box of name labels. Permanent seat labels for the State Conference platform seating have been added to the Conference properties.

In August, duplicate letters of instruction regarding the DAR Museum were sent to all 95 chapters and later a DAR Museum pictorial folder in color was sent with a personal note to each chapter. This Curator has been the speaker at four chapters, the subject being the DAR Museum. All District meetings, the Fall Board of Management meeting, and a pre-Conference Planning

meeting have been attended.

It has been an honor and privilege to serve the Georgia State Society this year.

Committee Reports

National Committees

AMERICAN HERITAGE Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox

Even though only 35 chapters reported their work for this committee, I know every chapter has been very conscious of our American Heritage this year. Crafts, both old and new, have captured the interest of many of our members as programs on a variety of old work was given as well as many chapters reported making Christmas decorations, bonnets, needlework and other decorative items. American music was reported used by every chapter with several special programs given on specific American musicians and medleys of American music through the years. Art was also featured by several chapters with an art show being held of the works of a Georgia painter, sculpture studio toured and museums visited. American literature and drama were used in conjunction with many of these other fields. I have mentioned just a few of the areas of interest reported in the hope that these will inspire every chapter to delve into this fertile area next year. Several chapters reported that this has been so interesting to their members and the public and that this has stimulated such good publicity that new members have been attracted and added to their chapters.

AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH Mrs. Robert W. Harrison, Jr.

February, 1971, was proclaimed American History Month by the Governor of the State of Georgia, Jimmy Carter, and 63 letters were written to Congressmen in behalf of legislation designed to permanently designate February as American History Month. Committee letters were sent to all Chapter Regents or Chapter Chairman in September. Fifty-seven chapters reported their work, many showing American History activities throughout the year.

many showing American History activities throughout the year.

The essay contest, "The Constitution of the United States of America and Its Signers" was sponsored in 162 schools with 2,552 contestants; 94 schools participated for the first time. Awards presented for the essay contest included 87 bronze and 33 sterling silver medals, 109 Certificates of Award, 567 Certificates of Appreciation, nine books on American History, five pictures, nine cash awards and three American flags also given. Other school participation included 42 assembly programs, 12 school paper articles, 125 class discussions and 43 sets of spot announcements; 76 students in one school learned the Preamble to the Constitution. Fifty-four chapters had programs on American History Month and four scripts were sent to the National Chairman; 54 American History Month displays were put in libraries, schools, and stores; 716 stickers and 97 posters also used; 75 medals and 17 certificates and 21 cash awards given for excellence in American History. There were 115 newspaper and magazine articles and 76 pictures with more than 1,226 inches of publicity; 446 sets of spot anouncements used on radio, 50 sets on television and 25 members appeared on radio with a total of 1,565 minutes and four members were on television with 262 minutes.

AMERICAN INDIANS Mrs. Jack Kelt

The State Chairman would like to thank the chapters for making it possible for the Georgia State Society to make this report. Also the State Chairman would like to express her appreciation to the National Vice Chairman, Mrs. Harold J. Brewer, for her assistance.

The State Chairman had the pleasure of speaking to several chapters. She also attended three District meetings and the State Board of Management meeting.

Forty-nine chapters submitted reports, with 28 reporting Indian programs; three chapters had programs on TV on "The American Indian"; 480 pounds of clothing, including new and used, valued at \$850.00 was sent to St. Mary's School, and 220 pounds of new and used clothing sent to Bacone College, valued at \$425.00.

Many chapters had outstanding speakers on "Indian History" during the year. Newspapers and televisions were very generous in their publicity concerning the American Indian. A sequoia tree was planted in honor of the Great Sequoyah. Indian literature distributed in three Junior High Schools with the presentation of Indian music, Indian art and displays of Indian artifacts. Jewelry and books sent to St. Mary's and Bacone College

Georgia State Society donated to the following Indians Schools and to the General Indian Fund: St. Mary's, \$281.00; Bacone College, \$250.00; General Indian Fund, \$146.75; and Columbus

College for an Indian scholarship, \$25.00.

AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP Mrs. Marion F. Martin, Jr.

Sixty-three chapters reported; 61 repeated the American's Creed at every meeting; 49 devoted one meeting to Americanism program: 18 gave Americanism talks to other organizations; 23 presented Americanism programs on radio and TV; 41 placed patriotic literature in schools and libraries; 17 participated in special projects promoting American's Creed; 962 DAR Manuals for Citizenship given for use in Americanization classes, and 50 were given to High Schools and Libraries; 1,037 American flags, 432 welcome cards, and 1,458 patriotic leaflets and pamphlets given to New Citizens; four chapters sponsored receptions and teas for same: 25 members worked with Americanization classes and 10 chapters attended Naturalization Courts. Chapters reported 2,040 hours of working on committees to reduce illiteracy, social problems of poverty and disease; 14 chapters sponsored Americanism essay and poster contests in schools; five chapters arranged for young people to attend Naturalization Courts, and four reported promoting constructive projects among young people. There were 2,413 inches of newspaper publicity and 83 hours and 32 minutes of Radio and TV time; \$137.65 was spent on the work of the committee. Cherokee Chapter sponsored a Non-Partisan Political Rally attended by other chapters. Baron DeKalb Chapter had a program on Americanism with the speaker, Mrs. George Friedlander the 1969 recipient of the Americanism award as speaker. Joseph Habersham Chapter awarded Americanism medals to two worthy recipients: (1) John Elias Skandalokis, M.D., Ph.D., FACS, doctor of medicine and surgery, professor of Anatomy, and Director of Medical and Surgical Education at Piedmont Hospital. (2) Mr. B. H. Oortman, Horticulturist, City of Atlanta, recipient of the Horticulturist award of the Men's Garden Clubs of America.

Senior State President

Our year had a rollicking start as I traveled on a chartered bus to Jackson, Mississippi, to attend the Southeastern Regional meeting, July 24-25, 1970. Georgia had 26 members and seniors present.

The State Board of Management meeting and Workshop was held in Perry, August 9-10 with 65 members and seniors participating. The Commodore Perry Society and General Daniel

Stewart DAR Chapter graciously served as hosts.

met on September 4 with members of the C.A.R. State Board to witness Governor Lester Maddox signing the Proclamation declaring October 12-19, 1971, "Patriotic Education Week." We then toured the Capitol. This tour emphasized the themes of the year "Government is People" and "Take Pride in America." The purpose has been to develop among C.A.R. members, senior leaders, and friends a more complete understanding of our democratic form of government and to help build responsible young American citizens who can contribute toward bringing America together as a nation.

The Georgia State Society has gained 98 new members. The membership as of March, 1970, was 430. Ten have transferred to DAR, six to S.A.R., 14 resigned, three dropped, two transferred to other states, and two transferred to at-large. Unofficially we have 491 members. We have prospects of two new societies in Georgia this year which I hope will bring our membership to more

than 500.

The Meadow Garden Society and the Augusta DAR entertained the 32nd State Conference royally, February 19-21, 1971; 173 members, seniors, and guests attended.

Mr. Gerald G. Fling of Savannah has chartered a bus to carry C.A.R. members and seniors to the National Convention in Washington, April 22, 1971, spending two nights in Williamsburg, Virginia, on the return trip.

The CARgoes, our state news sheet, has had four issues this year and has been a great help in communication and information. A special thanks to Blake Smyth and Mrs. Lewis B. Smyth, our editor and advisor, for a job well done.

I want to express my thanks to Laura Reid for being a dedicated and intelligent State President. It has been a real joy to work with her and to serve as Senior State President of the Georgia State Society.

CONSERVATION Mrs. Reuben Garland

In a time of crisis in polution and destruction of our natural resources, the whole country has pushed the panic button. The DAR completed 63 years of conservation work since the creation of this committee. Georgia Daughters this year have taken part in the beautification projects in parks and roadsides in eight counties and in Savannah, assisting in restoration of Colonial Park. Over 20,000 trees were reported planted, and one chapter pushed a project for all the residents to plant 535,600 trees while planting 430 trees and 500 shrubs themselves. Thousands of shrubs and bulbs were reported planted in parks, churches, school grounds, roadsides and a chapter house garden. All chapters reporting told of feeding hundreds of pounds of bird seeds and another planted acres of bird seed and cover. Most chapters reported programs devoted to conservency and heard the men responsible for the saving of air, water and soil from pollution speak.

Two private conservation areas—one of 250 acres along the Chattahoochee with 25 miles of paths through virgin timber and wild plants is used for school groups, scouts and for nature study hikes. Another in the North Georgia mountains is kept in its natural state and used by conservency members and children's groups and C.A.R. as a study place of ecology. Many chapters contributed to the Rose Garden. Others had many original projects—everything from a drive to stop the use of colored tissue to the great pride with which one chapter told of their 10 large compost piles. Georgia Daughters are at work now, but we realize that when all the studies are in and experts have reported to us the next year's program will be much enlarged to support sound resource management policies which offer a real solution to this problem. Conservation must be a way of life—in this war just as in the First and Second World Wars we will stand ready to have a large part. It is a war we will win. We must win!

CONSTITUTION WEEK Miss Annette Alexander

Questionnaires and letters were sent to Chapter Regents and Chapter Chairmen. The name of the Chapter Chairman for Constitution Week had not been sent to me by all of the chapters, but I had the name and address of each Regent and sent letters to them asking that they be given to the proper person.

The Governor of Georgia and 52 Mayors proclaimed Constitution Week. Publicity—2,494 inches, 435 articles, 59 pictures; Radio—2,793 minutes, 4,194 spot announcements, 307 programs; Television—1,395 minutes, 2,472 spot announcements, 125 programs; Displays—25 banks, two billboards, 17 County Fairs, 62 Libraries, 235 Post Offices, 107 schools, 51 stores, miscellaneous 34; Programs—37 chapters, 52 schools, 12 Scouts, 17 Service Clubs, 40 Churches; pieces of patriotic literature distributed—1,470.

I want to thank each Regent, Chapter Chairman and any other person who helped with this work. It was a pleasure to serve under the inspiring leadership of our capable State Regent.

DAR GOOD CITIZENS Mrs. Allen L. Brewer

Good Citizen pins and certificates were awarded to 190 girls this year by 76 chapters. The District winners with their sponsors were: Miss T. Joye Bryant, LaFayette High School, William Marsh Chapter; Miss Susan Beaty, Dougherty High School, Thronateeska Chapter; Miss Anise Cauley, Wayne County High School, Altamaha Chapter, and Miss Elizabeth Goolsby, Jones County Academy, Oliver Morton Chapter. Each winner received a \$5.00 award from the Georgia State Society.

Miss T. Joye Bryant was chosen the State Good Citizen. A senior at LaFayette High School, she was sponsored by the William Marsh Chapter, Mrs. Eugene Weatherly, Regent. The State DAR Good Citizens pin and a \$100.00 bond were presented to her on opening night at State Conference in Macon. Miss Bryant's parents

were invited to share this happy occasion with her. She has been entered in the competition for National Good Citizen.

Number of chapters qualifying for point #8 on the National Honor Roll was 74. Number of chapters contributing to March, 1971, issue was 60. The amount for this issue was \$3,098.00. The total amount for 1970-71 was \$4,075.00.

DAR MUSEUM Miss Jessie J. Mize

Forty-six chapters reported to the DAR Museum Chairman on their work and contributions to the Museum in Washington. Sixteen chapters had full programs on the Museum; five used one or more sets of slides; two chapters had the State Curator for the speaker; two chapters distributed literature about the Museum and explained criteria for articles given to the Museum. DAR SERVICE FOR VETERAN PATIENTS Mrs. J. Ralph Hampton

This committee is now three years old and great strides have been made by the chapters in this work. Fifty-one chapters submitted reports. I found interesting comments written on many reports. One chapter placed special emphasis on Mothers Day in May with a buffet supper for about 450 servicemen at USO, serving homebaked hams and 800 cup cakes, using table linens and silver from their homes. INSIGNIA

Mrs. J. Lamar Newbern, Jr.

The DAR insignia was discussed at all State Workshops and State meetings. Information regarding it was in one State Letter. The State Regent included information regarding the Insignia in her talk "Being a Georgia Daughter." Many insignias were ordered as well as bars, but no accurate figure is available.

JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZEN Miss Judy Neville Ferguson

Eight Georgia chapters registered sponsoring 2,774 Junior American Citizen Clubs with a total membership of 70,091. This reflects an increase of 2.450 members and 753 clubs over last year: 146 new JAC Clubs were organized by Georgia chapters and many were reported being organized at this time. JAC buttons, pins and citations were presented to the members; 57 Georgia chapters contributed \$167.50 to the National JAC Contest Prize Fund. Chapters throughout the state reported numerous contest entries at the local club level; approximately 75 were entered in state competition; 41 entries were submitted for National competition. Georgia was recipient of National Awards at Continental Congress. These awards were reported by the State Chairman and presented at the Fall Board of Management meeting in October. Ninety-seven Thatcher pins and citations, four JAC Banners, contest citation cards, flags, JAC President's pins and special prizes were awarded. Georgia chapters were exceedingly active during the past year with their work ranging from sponsoring special programs ,to planting pine seedlings, to making patriotic bulletin boards, to delivering speeches, to working in slum areas to promote principles of good citizenship and instilling in the youth of our state patriotism, loyalty, and love of country-our great nation. the United States of America.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP Mrs. Edward M. Heron, III

I am happy to report that the Juniors of Georgia have been very active this year. Through the sale of Junior jewelry items, stationery, voices of our lovely doll, "Miss Martha," a Continental Breakfast, the Junior booth at meetings, and your contributions we have made \$896.75 for the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund. We have added 76 new members with an additional 12 papers pending in Washington. My thanks to all the Juniors and to each of you in the chapters for the help and support you have given us.

LINEAGE RESEARCH Mrs. Robert N. Mann

Lineage Research reports were received from 63 chapters. Fifty-nine chapters have a Lineage Research Chairman or the Regent or Registrar acting as Chairman. Four requests for assistance were received from chapters in the state; five requests direct from chapters in other states; and five requests for State Chairmen in other states. One request was sent to a Chapter Regent

in the state. Three hundred and twenty-seven potential members were assisted. Also 80 potential members of the S.A.R., C.A.R., and S.R. were assisted; 157 new members were acquired through the efforts of the Lineage Research Committee Chairmen; 29 programs were given during the year. Of the chapters reporting, 34 have Lineage Research Kits. A suggestion that a detailed article on the duties and functions of the Lineage Research Committee be published in the DAR Magazine was forwarded to the National Committee.

MEMBERSHIP Mrs. Leonard G. DeLamar

On February 1, 1971, membership of the Georgia State Society was 6,932. Gains were 311 new members of which 105 were Juniors; reinstatements, 27; transfers, 19. Losses were: deceased, 89; dropped, 12; resigned, 83; and transfers, 18. For the year we have a net gain of 155 which exceeds any gain shown in at least 15 years. The highest gain during that period was 93. Georgia chapters are to be congratulated on this excellent increase in membership; 20 chapters showed a loss, 14 remained the same, and 61 an increase. When able to secure the address of those who have resigned because they have moved out of state I have notified the Membership Chairman of that state in hope of having the member reinstated in her new residence.

MOTION PICTURE Miss Leila Summerall

One release was mailed giving instructions about the Motion Picture work for 1970-71. In this release it was asked that a narrative report be sent to the State Chairman. Several chapters showed interest in trying to see that the theaters show the proper pictures.

My thanks to the participating chapters. It is my hope that next year more chapters will take part in this program and will give a full report of their accomplishments.

NATIONAL DEFENSE Mrs. Arthur H. Waite, Jr.

A synoposis of the year's work shows a growing concern and interest in the work of this committee. National Defense reports were received from 70 of the 95 chapters; 63 chapters had at least one entire meeting devoted to National Defense with timely and significant subjects such as: campus riots and trends in our Colleges, National Commitments and Power of Treaties, Authority of the Government and Limitations Upon the Powers, ROTC, The United States Constitution, Arms Control and Disarmament, and Lack of Respect for Law and Order. Our National Theme was widely used for programs.

Sixty-one chapters devoted at least five minutes at each meeting to National Defense, 33 chapters gave more time, 60 chapters studied the 1970 Resolutions; 66 chapters had National Defense material as follows: 27 schools, 22 libaries, and 31 interested individuals. Subjects of material distributed: National Defense, DAR Magazine, Flag Codes, Constitution and reprints from the

DAR Magazine. Chapters reported presenting a total of 318 Good Citizenship medals, 61 of these chapters presented the medals at a school assembly; nine chapters participated in the ROTC Medal Project, giving seven bronze medals and six gold medals.

A total of \$195.50 was contributed by 41 chapters for Dollars for Defense to be used for the mailing of the National Defense material, and 21 chapters made an effort to increase subscriptions to the National Defense mailing. Fifty-seven chapters reported that approximately 191 individuals wrote to members of Congress regarding pending legislation and pending treaties, but most of the chapters noted that their figure reported was inaccurate as many members wrote letters and failed to let the National Defense Chairman know.

Topics of great interest to chapters this year were: Genocide Treaty, Commission on Pornography, Drug Abuse, Conservation, World Council of Churches, Trade with Communist countries, United Nations, Disarmament, Pollution, Taxation, Anti-Crime Bill, Schools, Supreme Court Rulings, and Defense Cutback.

I am very gratified at the apparent increase in the interest in the work of the National Defense Committee and the deep concern of the members to be better informed Daughters and to enlighten public opinion with knowledgeable documented information. Recommendations which the chapters thought were pertinent were included in the report to the National Chairman.

NATIONAL HONOR ROLL Mrs. Emory P. Cary

PROGRAM

Mrs. Arthur J. Waterman

The State Chairman attended State Conference, all District meetings, and State Board of Management meeting. Information letters were sent to the chapters. Forty-two Yearbooks, five supplements, and three inserts were submitted to the State Chairman; 14 Yearbooks and five supplements were sent for review to the National Program Chairman's home address. Receiving the 1971 National Outstanding Yearbook Award were: Adam Brinson Chapter, Twin City (perfect Yearbook); Baron DeKalb Chapter. Decatur (perfect Yearbook); Button Gwinnett Chapter, Columbus; Oglethorpe Chapter, Columbus: Peter Early Chapter, Blakely: and Roanoke Chapter, Richland. Yearbook covers showed: a chapter house picture; a DAR emblem; American Flag; picture of the Seimes-Thomas Classroom Building, Kate Duncan Smith School: a flag with an eagle; DAR cut from magazine; and a miniature blue and white DAR Magazine cover. Several chapters made their own Yearbooks-one of these being sent to the National Chairman. Yearbooks contained flag use hints; quotations of George Washington; State Regent's Theme; dues reminders; chapter budgets; chapter Bylaws; chapter histories—including organizing officers; DAR Marching Song; and the Georgia Creed. An explanation of the DAR Emblem was given in several Yearbooks. One chapter listed their committees under Historical, Educational, Patriotic, and special. Eight chapters submitted programs-four of which were sent to the National Program Review Committee. DAR Aims and Objectives: Women of the Past; Christmas Past; and the story of a Revolutionary tanner were subjects of the submitted programs.

Thirty-one program outlines were received. DAR Historical, Edutional, and Patriotic aims stressed. Our State Regent spoke to many chapters on "Being a Georgia Daughter." Georgia's Vice President General spoke on Lineage Research. State Officers and State Chairmen spoke to many chapters. Also scheduled were chapter members; clerymen; educators; law enforcement officers; librarians; historians; businessmen; Judges; attorneys; and genealogists. One chapter scheduled a United States Senator as a speaker. Our DAR Schools were well represented by their personnel. Programs were varied—DAR Committees; our DAR Museum in Washington; Ecology; Drug Abuse; Self-Defense; Conservation; a visit to Fernbank Science Center; a visit to Underground Atlanta; teas honoring Good Citizen and Good Citizenship Award winners; Martha Washington tea; chapter anniversary teas; a picturama; and a UDC chapter was entertained. Slides, films, and manuscripts were ordered from National—including a film from the television program First Tuesday.

The State Chairman was pleased to see that the Children of the American Revolution presented musical programs for several chapters.

PUBLIC RELATIONS Mrs. Alex S. Boyer, Jr.

In October a letter of instruction was mailed to each Chapter Regent and Chapter Public Relations Chairman where same had been reported. A copy of the annual report due on February 1 was enclosed. A postal card reminder was sent out in January with offer of additional copies of annual report where needed. Requests were filled immediately.

Good publicity of Meadow Garden dedication and State Board of Management meeting was obtained in October, 1970, in the two Augusta papers. Reports received from 65 chapters. These reported 17,918 ½ inches of publicity which included 411 pictures. One single article feature story was entered in the National Contest by Baron DeKalb Chapter.

RADIO AND TELEVISION Mrs. Carl Evan Frisby

Reports were received from 73 chapters with a total of: Radio, 84 hours, 10 minutes with special programs; television, 45 hours, four minutes with 68 special programs. A total of 1,612 spot announcements used on radio and television. A copy of the television program material for "Salute to the First American, the American Indian," was sent to the National Society. My deepest appreciation and sincere thanks to the Chapter Chairman for their loyal support.

STUDENT LOAN AND SCHOLARSHIP Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr.

The State Treasurer reports that 80 chapters contributed \$243.50 to the National American History Scholarship Fund. Reports were received from 52 chapters. Nine chapters reported scholarship and loan funds amounting to \$23,403.00, which are administered locally by these chapters. Outstanding among these is the Peter Early Chapter, which has \$10,000.00 in the Fannie Asken Williams DAR Scholarship Fund.

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA Mrs. William E. Abernethy

Seventy-one chapters reported, 71 chapters repeated the Pledge of Allegiance, 48 sang National Anthem, 594 members displayed the Flag every National Holiday and 82 displayed the Flag every day, weather permitting. Eighty-three large Flags were presented to Academies, Kate Duncan Smith School, DAR members, schools, U.D.C., Home for Boys, museums, hospitals, DAR speaker, Courthouse, C.A.R. chapter, families of deceased Vietnam soldiers, libraries, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Play Schools, and as Christmas gifts; 1189 small Flags were presented to chapter members, for marking Veterans' graves, schools, Naturalization Courts, Scouts, social clubs, Federal Building, kindergartens, C.A.R., and an athletic field; 1,068 Flag Codes were presented to schools, DAR members, Civic Clubs, C.A.R. members, National Bank, Naturalization Courts and friends; 28 corrections on improper display of Flag were done at Civic Clubs, schools, plants, chapter meetings, Vacation Bible School, colleges, churches, and stores; 22 chapters studied Codes and 13 gave Flag talks to Historical Society, U.D.C. chapter, schools, and Civic Clubs; 33 gave facts on Flag at chapter meetings. There were 130 newspaper articles on Flag, 14 hours and two minutes of television time and 10 hours and 37 minutes of radio time; 52 had window displays during Constitution Week; 33 had a full program on the Flag; 100 lapel pins presented, 200 car decals, and 16 Flag pins. One chapter surrounded their Courthouse with 12 large Flags and the Boy Scouts placed them on National Holidays. One chapter sold large Flags and the total sales had a retail value of \$1,448.00.

TRANSPORTATION Mrs. Leo L. Phillips, Jr.

Thirty-nine chapters reported assisting members with transportation in order to increase attendance at meetings. This committee was also active in helping other committees accomplish their goals. Many chapters had programs on traffic safety and tried to cooperate with local governments in this area. Ten chapters took trips to historical places or to the DAR Schools. The major goal of this State Chairman was to increase attendance at Continental Congress. A bus trip to Washington was organized with 38 Daughters making plans to go. In addition, many more are planning to meet this group in Washington.

U. S. A. BICENTENNIAL COMMITTEE Mrs. Harold I. Tuthill

Chapters are beginning to appreciate the importance of making plans for the next five years, and are reporting that projects are underway. While some Chairmen have ordered material from the National Society, it is hoped that all will follow the suggestions in the promotional letter sent last fall. Only 18 chapters reported having Chairmen and very few reported any activities. More must have been accomplished than was realized. The Hawkinsville Chapter had a program built around the theme of American Heritage. Sergeant Newton Chapter sponsored a Bicentennial editorial in the Covington News, Fort Peachtree Chapter has two programs planned for 1971 which will probably be sent to the National Program Office. Savannah Chapter is planning an Historical Book Exhibit, a program on Colonial music, and is sponsoring announcements publicizing the Bicentennial. The store windows in the Oglethorpe Shopping Mall will have a display of early American items and costumes.

During last February there were special celebrations in Savannah for the observance of Georgia Day. The three Savannah chapters—Bonaventure, Lachlan McIntosh, and Savannah and the C.A.R. participated. Junior members and some adults dressed in Colonial costumes marched in the parade, and placed wreaths at the monuments of General Oglethorpe and Tomochichi and at Christ Church, the oldest established church in America, and at the Bench marking the spot where Oglethorpe landed. Members of the three chapters attended the Georgia Day Luncheon. During the week the three chapters entertained at the U.D.C. Hall, with many members wearing Colonial costumes. On the Bluff the Savannah Chapter sponsored a booth where items of historic interest were sold, such as Meadow Garden plates and notepaper. The three chapters contributed financially to and participated in the July 4th celebration. Savannah Chapter cooperated with a Garden Club for the restoration of the Colonial Cemetery Park.

The highlight of the Savannah Chapter's contribution to the Bicentennial was the emphasis placed on the proposed Revolutionary Battle Park. Committees on restoring historic spots and the Revolutionary Battle Park on which the Savannah Chapter has the Treasurer and the President (Mrs. William M. Roberts), together with the members of the chapter, had two distinguished Frenchmen for dinner, the purpose being to focus attention on the Park. In April the French Ambassador will also be a guest of the two

committees and the city, again to elicit support of the French government.

On the state level—The Georgia State Society has assumed with the cooperation of the Augusta Chapter the restoration and the refurnishing of Meadow Garden. On October 29 Meadow Garden Day was observed with appropriate ceremony.

AMERICAN MERCHANT MARINE LIBRARY Mrs. Robert V. Burgess

In September I sent to 95 Chapter Regents a letter about the need of the American Merchant Marine Library and for reading material when the seamen are at sea. Seven chapters sent reports. Thirty-three chapters sent to the Treasurer a total of \$108.50. I wish to thank those chapters who sent contributions.

COLLECTING AND PUBLISHING HISTORIES OF REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIERS

Letters were sent out to 95 chapters in November, 1970. Reports received from 14 chapters, three of which sent histories of Revolutionary soldiers. Colonel William Candler Chapter sent three bound copies, each containing copies of their 110 histories of Revolutionary soldiers, which were compiled by Mrs. Hoke S. Nelson, Chapter Registrar. Governor Jared Irwin Chapter sent a total of 22 histories. George Walton Chapter sent three histories to bring up to date the histories submitted by that chapter. The total now stands at 175.

CONFERENCE CREDENTIALS Miss Louise M. Philips

The total registration for the 73rd Georgia State Conference, held in Macon, March 18-20, 1971, was 366, representing 81 chapters. This was an increase of five in chapters represented over the 1970 Georgia State Conference. Credential blanks were sent in by 81 chapters; a few chapters who had not sent in the Credential forms were represented. A check for \$221.00, representing registration fees, has been sent to the State Treasurer. It is a pleasure to serve as Chairman of Credentials.

CONFERENCE CHAIRMAN Mrs. W. D. Akers

The 1971 Conference of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, met at the Hilton Hotel in Macon on March 18-20. Over 300 Daughters attended, including three candidates for National offices and all Georgia officers.

The geographical location of Macon in the center of the State and the glamour of the beautiful new Hilton Hotel contributed to a most successful Conference.

CONFERENCE MUSIC Mrs. Thomas J. Peniston

The Chairman furnished music for the processionals, recessionals, Star-Spangled Banner, and accompaniment for singing at Georgia State Conference, Macon.

CONFERENCE PROCESSIONALS Mrs. Frank Faulk

The Processional on opening night was arranged in the order indicated by the State Regent. The committee members assisted the State officers and guests in arranging their line and all advanced to the rostrum, being preceded by the flag bearers and pages. The Regents' reports at the 1971 Convention were given by towns in alphabetical order and the committee members arranged the line in the hall so that the Regents walked behind the flag bearers and pages to the front rows of the assembly room.

CONFERENCE SEATING Mrs. T. Earle Stribling

It was my pleasure at the Georgia State Conference to assist the State Regent and those in charge in seating the guests according to well-established DAR customs.

COOPERATION OF DAR WITH S.A.R. AND S.R. Mrs. A. C. Earl Shepherd

At the Georgia State Conference in Macon, March 19, 1971, the committee recommended that the funds in the Savings Accounts of the First National Bank of Atlanta, be transferred from a regular Savings Account to Savings Certificates to provide the maximum interest rate for the Georgia State Society.

Other speakers present were Judge Alexander Lawrence, Mr. Tom Gilnilliat of the Georgia Historical Commission, and Mr. Walter Hartridge, researcher.

M. Charles Lucet, the Ambassador of France to the United States, was our guest and guest of the City of Savannah on April 3-4-5. His coming was to focus attention on the Park and to hopefully elicit direct support from the French Government, with a museum or statue to Hon. Charles deEstaing, the Vice Admiral and Commander of the French-American Forces in the "Siege of Savannah." The southernmost battle of the American Revolution was fought

here.

The Georgia State Society voted to honor Mrs. C. H. Leavy with a piece of furniture at Meadow Garden because of her gifts of \$900.00. This has never been done. Mrs. Binford and Mrs. Wallace were asked to locate a piece of furniture needed for restored room and report not later than the Meadow Garden Board meeting.

October 29, 1970.

Mrs. Binford, Mrs. Wallace, and Mrs. Pritchett were asked to work with two members of the Augusta Chapter in placing the Victorian furniture in the front room. Meadow Garden needs two rugs, preferably oriental, one for the restored room and one for the Victorian Parlour. Any furnishings bought or donated must be approved by an authority on period furnishing before it can be placed in the house. At present, the Restoration Fund amounts to \$1,946.67.

The Meadow Garden Patrons have never been listed prior to 1968. Mrs. W. L. Brannen has a book for this purpose. The Patrons contributions varied from \$1.00, \$5.00, \$10.00, to the \$50.00 of 1968. Two persons contributed \$50.00 or more prior to 1968. Mrs. Binford moved: All names of contributors to Meadow Garden Restoration be listed in a Book as individuals or chapters according to the year they contributed. Book is to be placed in Meadow Garden. Seconded by Mrs. Waite. Carried. This list is to be compiled by the State Regent and the Patrons of Meadow Garden Chairman.

At 11:00 a.m., the Custodian Committee from the Augusta

Chapter was invited to sit in on the Board meeting.

Miss Cooper brought out the necessity of keeping the house open to the public at a set time, and the value of a listing in the Georgia Tourist Guide. To have this listing it is necessary to have the house open to the public. Mrs. Smith was asked if the Augusta chapter members would serve on a three-hour a week minimum basis as hostesses, setting up a regular time schedule. She was asked to present this to the Augusta Chapter. Mrs. Waite made motion, seconded by Mrs. Binford that: The Meadow Garden Board express its appreciation to the Augusta Chapter for what has been done for Meadow Garden in the past and what it is doing at this time, and enlists its continued support and cooperation. Carried. Miss Cooper will write a note of appreciation to the Augusta Chapter.

As a matter of clarification the State Regent asked the members of the Board to read the Proceedings, 1962-63, page 55, regarding the Budget for Meadow Garden. This money shall be spent by the Custodial Committee of the Augusta Chapter, according to the Budget. Mrs. Henry, Treasurer of Meadow Garden, was asked to consider and review the Budget, and to submit a revised Budget at the Fall Board of Management meeting in October. In discussing

the Budget Miss Cooper said the Georgia State Society had not sent the \$300.00 Budget payment for April and July. The Board reviewed the bills for the last year and agreed that the bill for the freight on the restored room would come out of the Restoration Fund rather than the Custodian Budget.

The repairing of the fallen plaster in the caretaker's cottage will be taken from the \$250.00 repair fund of the Custodial Budget.

Mrs. Welton discussed the repairing and relocating of the fence damaged by a storm. Mrs. Smith moved that the Custodial Committee procure three bids to relocate the gates in the fence so as to improve the access to the property and these bids be submitted to the State Regent for her approval and authorization. Seconded by Mrs. Binford. Carried.

Mrs. Welton stated that Mrs. Payne is living in the caretaker's cottage on a temporary basis for protective reasons, but does not have a key to Meadow Garden. The Augusta Chapter was asked to continue its efforts in securing a permanent caretaker.

Mrs. Wallace moved that the Secretary furnish copies of the Minutes to the Regent of the Augusta Chapter. Seconded by Mrs.

Smith. Carried.

Plans for the opening of the room October 29 were discussed. Attending Meadow Garden Board meeting: Mesdames Cooper, Waite, Wallace, Binford, Welton, and Smith. Custodial Committee: Mesdames Camp, Henry, Perkins, Wagner, and Smith.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

They are to meet in Atlanta to select materials and obtain prices on rugs, fabrics, paint, and wallpaper.

Mrs. Robert L. Smith, Regent, Augusta Chapter, sent word that a committee and schedule will be set up after October 29 for keeping Meadow Garden open on a regular schedule basis. For the present the Custodial Committee will serve to keep the house open.

Mrs. Payne, the caretaker, now has the key to Meadow Garden. The Custodial Committee is to write a letter of recommendation of Mrs. Payne to be voted on by the Meadow Garden Board, October 29.

New Business: The current coverage of insurance on Meadow Garden was discussed: \$10,000.00 accident; \$14,500.00 on furniture; Building, \$20,000.00; Cottage, \$6,000.00; 4-8-69 to 4-2-72, premium, \$145.00. There is vandalism, but no theft coverage. Also the securing of a Fine Arts policy is to be investigated. Mrs. Wallace moved that the Chairman, Miss Cooper, write for a breakdown of the present coverage, and the cost of increasing the insurance. Carried.

The Meadow Garden Project for the next two years was discussed, and Mrs. Binford moved that the Board endeavor to raise sufficient funds to restore the dining room, and if possible, the kitchen, at Meadow Garden. Carried.

BYLAWS

BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II OBJECTS

The objects of the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution shall be: to promote the aims set forth in the Bylaws of the National Society; to secure the benefits of cooperation of the chapters in the State; the preservation of the memory of its Revolutionary patriots; the study of its history; the education of its youth in patriotic ideals and in the duties of citizenship.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All Chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, located within the State of Georgia shall be members of this organization.

Article IV OFFICERS

The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Curator. The State Regent shall appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as adviser in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure.

Article V ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Geogia State Society shall be elected at the annual State Conference biennially.

Section 2. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two years or until their successors are elected. Their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regents and of the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Section 3. No member shall be eligible to a State office until she has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years. No member shall be eligible to the same State office for two successive terms. A member having served more than one-half term in the State office shall be deemed to have served a term.

Section 4. Nominations of candidates for office shall be from the floor. The election shall be held by ballot. A majority of the votes cast by the voting members of the State Conference shall elect.

Section 5. Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become acting First Vice Regent, subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. A vacancy in any other State office between annual meetings shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. An election shall be held at the next State Conference to fill the unexpired term. Any State Officer, who is absent from the State for a continuous period of six months or longer automatically relinquishes her position as a State officer.

Section 6. No two State officers shall be members of the same Chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the

State Corresponding Secretary.

Section 7. In recognition of valuable service to the organization, any State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Section 8. A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot. The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than fifteen months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

Section 9. On the election of State Regent, and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Recording Secretary General. The endorsement of a candidate for Vice President General shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent to the Recording Secretary General at least two weeks prior to Continental Congress.

Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, of the State Board of Management, and of the Executive Committee. She shall attend all regular meetings of the National Board of Management. She shall appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees.

Section 2. In the absence of the State Regent from any meeting of the State Conference, or the State Board of Management, the State First Vice Regent, or in her absence, the State Second Vice Regent, shall perform the duties of the State Regent. The State First and Second Vice Regents may be assigned to direct committees and to perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent.

Section 3. The State Chaplain shall open all meetings of the State Conference and of the State Board of Management with Scripture reading and prayer and shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require. She shall preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and shall be responsible for the In Memoriam pages in the Proceedings.

Section 4. The State Recording Secretary shall record the proceedings of the State Conference and of meetings of the State Board of Management and of the Executive Committee. She shall compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and of the Proceedings Committee.

Section 5. The State Corresponding Secretary shall conduct correspondence and send notices in behalf of the State Conference, the State Regent, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as directed by them.

Section 6. The State Treasurer shall be the custodian of the funds of the State Society. She shall collect the State Conference dues and registration fees from the Chapters, and shall receive all sums contributed by the Chapters for State and National projects. All monies received by the State Treasurer shall be placed in a Bank which is a member of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. She shall disburse such sums only when authorized by the State Board of Management of the State Society. Incidental expenses shall be paid from the State Dues Fund when authorized by the State Regent in writing. The State Treasurer shall keep an account of all sums received or paid out and shall keep receipts for all payments. She shall prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference. Her books shall be audited annually by a Certified Public Accountant. She shall be ex-officio a member of the Credentials Committee.

Section 7. The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new Chapters.

Section 8. The State Registrar shall, when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, who live in towns and counties in which there are no Chapters, to prove eligibility, and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars in verifying lineage papers. She shall keep a correct list of all members in the State and shall make a report on membership to the State Conference.

Section 9. The State Historian shall be in charge of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General. She shall keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves in the State and shall prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General to Smithsonian Institution. She shall encourage the compilation and publication of County Histories and other unpublished records, especially those of the Revolutionary period.

Section 10. The State Librarian shall collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing duplicates, wherever possible, in the NSDAR Library and in the Georgia DAR Collections in the State Department of Archives and History. She shall endeavor to obtain the books on the wanted list of the Librarian General for the Georgia Section in the NSDA Library and is authorized to solicit contributions from the Chapters for the purchase of the same. She shall have custody and supervision of the DAR Genealogical and Historical Collections of the State Department of Archives and History.

Section 11. The State Curator shall receive and be responsible for all gifts of Revolutionary relics to the Museum of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution. She shall be the custodian of the conference properties and shall have them properly stored, insured and made ready for use of the State Conference.

Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. The Georgia State Society shall hold an annual State Conference between the first day of February and the time of the meeting of the Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week. The Executive Committee shall fix the time and place of meetings when not fixed by the Conference in session, or when for any reason it may be impracticable to meet at the time or place fixed by the Conference.

Section 2. The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credential blanks to the Chapters not less than

sixty days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 3. The voting members of the State Conference shall be State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regent or alternate, and the delegates or their alternates from the Chapters of the State, that are entitled to representation at the Continental Congress. The number of representatives from each Chapter shall be determined by the rules for representation of Chapters in the Continental Congress as given in the National Bylaws.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a Chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the Chapter, except in the case of the Regent or First Vice Rgent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. No member shall hold, at the same time, two offices carrying a vote at the annual State Conference.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any Chapter in the State of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference, by unanimous consent, the privileges of the floor may be accorded to the State Chairmen with the exception that they may not vote unless they are duly elected delegates or their alternates from their respective chapters.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen days notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Twenty-five voting members, representing not less than ten Chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII STATE DUES AND CONFERENCE FEES

Section 1. The annual dues of Chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be one dollar for each member of the Chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before February 1. Seventy cents of this amount shall be allocated to the general State Dues Fund and thirty cents shall be used to cover all State required per capita assessments. No Chapter shall be entitled to representation at the annual State Conference until the State dues are paid.

Section 2. The Finance Committee, appointed by the State Regent, shall be composed of seven members, to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State

Treasurer, two Honorary State Regents, one active Chapter Regent, and one active Chapter member. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund.

Section 3. Each Chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State Dues, a Conference registration fee of \$2.00 for each voter to which the Chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Section 4. State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$2.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference fee at the time of registration.

Article IX EXPENSES

Section 1. One thousand dollars shall be taken each year from the State Dues Fund, to be used by the State Regent in defraying her necessary traveling expenses.

Section 2. Necessary expenses of the State Regent and other officers of the State Conference for stationery and postage shall be paid by the State Treasurer from the State Dues Fund, on the presentation of itemized statements approved in writing by the State Regent.

Article X STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, the Honorary State Regents, the Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regents of the Chapters of the State, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the Fall, following the regular meeting of the National Board. It shall meet also at the time of the State Conference and whenever called by the State Regent.

Section 3. Ten members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference.

Section 5. State Chairmen of National and State Standing Committees shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privileges of the floor, but may not vote

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article XI EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute an Executive Committee. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the Executive Committee, but may not vote. The State Board of Management may authorize this committee to perform such duties of the Board between its meeting, as may from time to time seem expedient. The Executive Committee shall meet

at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three members of the Committee. It shall make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

Article XII CHAPTERS

Section 1. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April or May. The Chapter Regent shall report the names of the elected officers promptly, on triplicate blanks provided by the State Regent for this purpose, to the Organizing Secretary General, to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary.

Section 2. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent for use in compiling her report, not less than fifteen days before the opening of the annual State Conference. The official Chapter report, not to exceed five hundred words in length, for publication in the Proceedings shall be furnished the State Recording Secretary before the State Conference.

Article XIII AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent and to the Parliamentarian. The State Regent shall send a copy to each Chapter and each voting member, at least sixty days prior to State Conference with her message carrying the call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. Robert's Rules of Order (Revised) shall be the governing authority in parliamentary law for the State Conference in matters not covered by the Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth.' (Minutes, p. 21). No conference was held in 1911; the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912"; amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta, "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere

with Lent." (Minutes, p. 21). The dates and places of meeting and the numerical designation of the Conferences after the first Annual Conference (1899) were as follows: (2) Atlanta, November 27-28, 1900. (3) Augusta, November 21-22, 1901. (4) Savannah, November 13-14-15, 1902. (5) Atlanta, November 5-6-7, 1903. (6) Athens, November 9-10-11, 1904. (7) Macon, November 16-17-18, 1905. (8) Columbus, November 21-22-23, 1906. (9) Rome, October 23-24-25, 1907. (10) Covington, November 4-5-6, 1908. (11) Brunswick, November 10-11-12, 1909. Changes in Conference number are so as to count from Conferences of 1895. (13) Savannah, November 22-23, 1910. (14) Marietta, April 9-10-11, 1912. (15) Augusta, March 25-26-27-28, 1913. (16) Macon, February 16-17-18-19, 1914. (17) Atlanta, February 8-9-10-11-12, 1915. (18) Columbus, February 22-23-24-25, 1916. (19) Quitman, February 13-14-15-16, 1917. (20) Athens, April 3-4-5, 1918. Bylaws

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National and State Bylaws.

Change of Address

Notice of change of address of members shall be sent to the Organizing Secretary General, Treasurer General, State Regent and State Registrar.

Change of Name

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to State Registrar, Treasurer General and State Regent.

Chapter Elections

Chapter elections shall be held preferably in April or early May and names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, Administration Building 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D. C. 20006, to the State Regent, and to the State Recording Secretary. The full Christian name of Chapter officers shall be given together with her husband's given name or initials, address and zip code.

Dues

Pay to State Treasurer State Dues of \$1.00 per member preferably on or before January 1, not later than February 1. National Dues of \$3.00 per member sent to the Treasurer General, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D. C. 20006, before January 1, 1972.

Conference Registration Fee

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State dues (on or before January 1, not later than February 1), \$2.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Rules for representation of chapters at Continental Congress:

"Chapters having less than 50 paid members on February 1, are entitled to be represented by the Regents or in her absence the Vice Regent or alternate; chapters having 50 to 199 paid members on February 1, one delegate in addition to the Regent; chapters having 200 to 299 paid members on February 1, two delegates in addition to the Regent, and for each additional 100 paid members one additional delegate." (Article XIII, Section 3-C, National Bylaws).

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$2.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. (Article VIII,

Section 4, of the State Bylaws).

Contributions

All contributions by Chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

Deceased Members

Deaths shall be reported promptly to Treasurer General and State Chaplain. Complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and a date of death shall be furnished State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for Conference Memorial Service and "In Memoriam" pages for State Proceedings.

Georgia Hospitality Fund

The following resolution which applies to the Georgia Hospitality Fund appears in the Proceedings for 1955:

"WHEREAS, The Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds an annual dinner in Washington each year during Continental Congress, which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society.

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$100.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes:

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this fund shall not be cumulative. Adopted."

GENERAL NEW REGIME FUND BALANCE \$2,500.00

The following resolution which applies to the General New Regime Fund Balance of \$2,500.00 appears in the Proceedings for 1959-1960, page 41:

"RESOLVED, That at the end of each regime all money in the General Fund above \$2,500.00 be transferred to the Savings Account; when the Supplemental Audit Report is made as of June 1 every two years before the Auditors close out the books this transaction be handled in order to show in this Audit, thus making the General Fund show the same balance of \$2,500.00 at the beginning of each new regime. ADOPTED."

PROCEDURE BOOK OF INSTRUCTIONS FOR OFFICERS AND STATE CHAIRMEN

The following resolution which applies to a Procedure Book of Instruction for Officers and State Chairmen appears in the Proceedings for 1959-1960, page 41:

"RESOLVED, That all Officers and State Chairmen keep a Procedure Book of Instructions and helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new Officer and Chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities thus providing a continuing continuity of DAR work, ADOPTED."

Genealogical Records

To insure uniformity and convenience in filing, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, 8½ by 11 inches with one-inch margins on left side and bottom, and one and one-half inches at top. One copy retained in Chapter Archives, and three copies shall be sent to the Chairman of Genealogical Records.

Information for Chapter Regents

1. All letters received by Chapter Regents relating to the work of the Society shall be distributed to the corresponding Chapter

Nominations

The following resolution which applies to the announcement of the candidacy for State Regent appears in the Proceedings of the Twentieth State Conference, 1918:

"Resolved, that it is the judgment of the Executive Board that announcements for State Regent should not be made . . . earlier than three months prior to the meeting of the Conference and they shall be furnished to the Press for publication."

Proceedings

Three copies of the Proceedings will be sent to each Chapter. One copy to be retained by Regent, one copy given to the Chapter Treasurer and one copy for use in the Chapter. Additional copies, if available, must be secured from the State Recording Secretary at \$1.00 per copy, plus 25 cents for postage if to be mailed.

Reports for Proceedings

State Officers', State Chairmen's, and Chapter Regents' reports for Proceedings shall be as concise as possible—not to exceed 250 words—typewritten (double spaced) upon one side of three-hole unruled notebook paper, 8½ by 11 inches, and shall be sent to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary on or before February 15, the original being sent to the Secretary for the proceedings, Chapters Competing for Honor Roll by February 1. Winners of awards of State Officers and State Chairmen shall be listed on a separate sheet of paper.

Resolutions

Resolutions to be considered by the Committee shall be typed, with a heading giving subject of the resolution, signed, and sent to the Chairman of the Resolutions Committee two weeks before the date of the State Conference.
