PRISONERS OF WAR

WHEREAS: It is reported that more than 1600 American Servicemen are prisoners of war and missing in action in southeast Asia,

The Georgia State Society, National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, goes on record as deploring the said inhuman treatment of these prisoners of war,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: That the Georgia State Society, National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution urges the governments of southeast Asia to comply with the terms of the Geneva Convention.

AIR OFFENSE

WHEREAS, during the 1960s, pronouncements from national leaders assured the United States citizenry that a policy of detente and peaceful coexistence with the Soviet Union would promote world peace, while the Soviet Union reached parity with the United States in nuclear weaponry, and military surveillance and air defense communication control, and

WHEREAS, parity was reached in 1970 but the Soviet Union has continued to advance in sophisticated new weapon systems, reducing the United States to a second class power;

WHEREAS, the findings of the Armed Services Investigating Committee of the Committee on Armed Services, House of Representatives, dated January 3, 1972, pronounced the existing United States air defense virtually useless, and, because of the failure to maintain a viable

United States air defense system, sovereign United States air space cannot be protected from intrusions by any foreign aircraft or by submarine-launched missiles in a 1500-mile opening in our defense on the southern United States perimeter between Florida and California; and

WHEREAS, Cuban planes piloted the southern United States air space without detection or interception on October 5, 1969, at Homestead Air Force Base in Fiorida and October 26, 1971, at New Orleans; therefore

RESOLVED: That the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution support the recommendations of the Armed Forces investigating Committee regarding the detection of air offense.

MEADOW GARDEN

WHEREAS: The Georgia State Society, NSDAR, has the privilege of being sole owner of Meadow Garden, home of George Walton, one of Georgia's signers of the Declaration of Independence; and,

The work of the 96 Georgia Chapter Regents and the 7,017 Georgia Daughters was outstanding during the past year. Your State Regent was very proud of the interest and accomplishments in the DAR activities. The complete report of the year's work will be found in the reports of the Chapter Regents, the State Officers, and the State Chairmen as published in this book.

Your State Regent represented you at the National Board of Management meeting in April, 1971, October, 1971, February, 1972, and April, 1972, as we'l as the 81st Continental Congress, the Atlanta Sons of the American Revolution meeting, Kate Duncan Smith DAR School, Tamassee DAR School, and at the State Conferences for Mississippi, Illinois,

Michigan and Texas.

During the two years the State Regent was able to accept almost all of the 93 invitations received from the chapters; only six were declined because of previous engagements. Whenever the schedule permitted, the State Regent accepted invitations to chapters visited last year.

Of these, all opened meetings with scripture and prayer and/or the DAR Ritual. Notes to bereaved and ill numbered 624, with more not recorded, as well as 1,078 visits to same, and again many not recorded. Thirty-two chaplains installed chapter officers, 33 prepared and conducted memorial services, 44 members' graves were marked, and memorial gifts to DAR Schools, libraries and Meadow Garden were sent from 24 chapters, including one gift of \$100.00 to Tamassee. Sixty-four chapters made History reports; 2 chapters contributed to the History Scholarship Fund; 34 documents were given to the Repository of Americana; 176 Historical programs were given by adults and 42 by children; 913 radio and 66 TV programs were given; 78 adults and 25 children made Historical Tours; 7 Revolutionary soldiers' graves were marked, 3 wives, 3 daughters and 44 members of DAR; 10 Historical Restorations were begun, 1 completed and 1 marked. A list of all Revolutionary Soldiers reported buried in Georgia has been obtained and hopefully will be published in booklet form by the State Society.

Your State Historian attended State Conference, Fall Board of Management, 1 district meeting and the re-organization of the Kettle Creek Chapter at Washington, Ga.

Speaking on "Our Historical Heritage," she visited the following chapters: Birdsville at Millen, Edmund Burke, Waynesboro, Brier Creek at Sylvania, Nathaniel Macon at Macon, Nancy Hart at Milledgeville, Baron DeKa b at Decatur, Cherokee at Atlanta, John Floyd at Douglas. Also spoke to parents and students of Stapleton Academy, Stapleton, Georgia, and the Rotary Club of Sylvania, Georgia.

I shall always cherish the p'easant, informative and rewarding experience of serving the Georgia Daughters with Miss Cooper, State Regent, and the other lovely State Officers.

STATE LIBRARIAN

Mrs. Carl Wagner

An increasing amount of time and money was spent in DAR library work this year, especially on the local level, with 53 chapters reporting. One chapter reported 800 hours spent on indexing genealogical material and another spent \$392.72 on repairing and binding books and magazines. Another donated 102,812 pages valued at \$1,222.80. Total amount spent on all levels of library work this year was \$4,793.29, more than twice the amount of last year.

I wish each chapter could receive individual credit for the splendid work, but the combined figures are as follows: to the NSDAR Library, 15 books, 692 pages of manuscripts, 9 pamphlets, 47 subscriptions of genealogical magazines, totaling \$339.70; \$93.00 to the Rebinding Fund and \$35.50 to the Microillm Fund, making a total of \$476.29.

The State Archives received 84 books, 653 pages of records and 3 pamphlets, valued at \$1,049.94; 9 microfilm ree's and 4 microcopy rolls, valued at \$85.00; \$135.00 was given to the State Library Fund, making a total for State work of \$1,277.94.

Chapters presented to local and school 'ibraries: 198 books, 2 new sets of encyclopedias to Tamassee and Kate Duncan Smith DAR Schools, 260 magazine subscriptions, 39 binders of historical figures, 13 pictures of historical scenes, 3 pamphlets, 8 reels of microfilm; 67 maps of Alabama counties, 686 magazines, large prints of Constitution to history and social science students in one school, small prints to other schools, totalling \$2,595.63; \$9.00, 156 paperback novels and 63 comic books given to Merchant Marine Library, 257 paperbacks and other magazines to VA Libraries.

A total of \$453.52 was spent on rebinding. Reported amount spent on local library work, \$3,249.65. A large number of the books given this year were from a member's private library, and the value was estimated with the help of Miss Carroll Hart, Director of the State Archives.

Many chapters reported work on indexing genealogical material in local libraries; one chapter copies and binds census records; one uses 10c per member plus donations for their library fund; one gives a memorial book in lieu of flowers. Space does not permit listing names of books given, but may be had on request from the Librarian.

This report was possible because of the splendid response of chapter librarians and members, and my deep appreciation goes to each one of them.

STATE CURATOR

This Curator has been the speaker at the following chapter meetings: Fielding Lewis Chapter and Mary Hammond Washington Chapter, the subject being the DAR Museum.

State Conference, Continental Congress, the Fall Board of Management meeting and all four District meetings have been attended.

Committee Reports National Committees

AMERICAN HERITAGE

Due to a different reporting date this year, only 23 chapters reported in time for the judging for my award. However, the enthusiasm shown in those reports was wonderful. As usual, American Heritage programs caught the fancy of many of our members. Programs on American Art and personal artifacts were two in the fine arts category. In crafts, Georgia silversmiths, porcelain, quilts, American glass, Vil age Fair and dolls were some of the outstanding programs reported. American composers, Christmas and religious music and a musical program at a VA hospital were noted in the musical field. Two skits were presented, one to the State Officers Club. A compilation of Colonial Cookery, writing the History of Stephens County and Tales of Ancestors have kept three chapters busy. We in Georgia are very proud of Briar Creek Chapter. They researched, wrote and presented a program on Dolls which has been accepted by the National Program Committee. As instructed by the State Society, Mrs. Arthur Waterman, State P ogram Chairman, and I purchased a slide program from Mr. J. J. McKay on "The Golden Isles of Georgia and The Marshes of Glynn." This consists of 101 color slides and narrative photographed and written by Mr. McKay. This program has also been sent to the National Program Committee for their consideration. Georgia will exhibit a coverlet belonging to Mrs. Talbot Chandler at a special pre-bicentennial celebration to be held during Continental Congress.

AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH

February, 1972, was proclaimed American History Month by Governor Jimmy Carter, and 78 letters were written to congressmen in behalf of legislation designed to permanently designate February as American History Month.

Committee letters relating to activities for observing February as American History Month were sent to all chapters in September.

Sixty-seven chapters reported their work with varied, informative and interesting programs.

The essay contest, "How My State Acquired Its Name," was sponsored in 103 schoo's, 32 participating for the first time, with 2,270 contestants. Awards presented for the essay contest included 102 bronze and 36 sterling silver medals, 157 certificates of award, 712 certificates of appreciation, 18 books on American History, 15 cash awards, and 6 copies of the Declaration of Independence.

Other school participation included 62 assembly programs, 53 newspaper articles, 138 class discussions and 49 sets of spot announcements. One chapter conducted an art contest in American History in which

four schools participated.

Seventy-one chapter programs on American History were presented and four scripts were sent to the National Chairman; 79 American History Month displays were put in libraries, schools, stores and banks; 176 posters and 1,068 stickers were used; 87 medals, 34 certificates, 6 books and cash awards were given for excellence in American History.

AMERICAN INDIANS

It has been a most rewarding experience to serve as your American Indians Chairman and I am indebted to our State Regent for giving me this privilege. I want to thank her and the Chapters for their cooperation and the fine work they have done in promoting interest in the cul-

ture and welfare of these first Americans.

With 63 Chapters reporting, 51 showed contributions to St. Mary's amounting to \$525.50 and 18 boxes of cothing valued at \$1,731.39; to Bacone College \$563.00 was contributed and 12 boxes valued at more than \$933.15; one box was sent to S.C. Indian School; one Chapter sponsored a student at St. Mary's; one Chapter sent \$1.00 to Cheyenne and \$7.00 to St. Labre; private donations were sent to St. Labre and South West Indian Foundation. Contributions of \$221.00 were earmarked for the General Fund.

Outstanding programs were reported by 37 Chapters. They covered a wide range of historical subjects and were presented by such authorities as Dr. Joseph Mahon, anthropologist and curator of the Columbus Museum of Arts and Crafts; college professors and recognized historians; an Indian Chief; informed members who had visited Indian mounds, excavations and reservations. An author reviewed her soon-to-be-re-leased book, "Revolutionary Indian Activities in Morgan and Green Counties." An original dialogue, "The American Indian," was mailed to the Program Reviewing Committee. Deep concern for the Indians was reflected in many programs. To mention a few, "American Indian Affairs: Deadline for Justice"; "America's Oldest Debt: Justice for the Indians"; "The Trail of Tears"; "The Mounds of Kolomoki"; "Those Amazing Cherokee Indians"; "Our First Inhabitants of the Go den Isles", and others.

One Chapter gave a program on the restoration of Chieftains, the home of John Ridge (Cherokee Chief) and later presented an American flag to Chieftain's Museum. A program on Indian Schools was given by a C.A.R. Society; in another, "The American Indian's Story of Tribes and Customs," was narrated and children dressed in costumes of various tribes assisted. Chapters cooperated in the celebration of The First American Week, an annual event held in Columbus when Indians from different tribes gather for a week of festivities, special programs and banquets. For one week Indians tell their story in a 90-minute program on WRBL-TV. Chapters gave their support by attending these activities as we'l as being on TV each morning during the week.

Chapters discussed St. Mary's and Bacone, their needs and their ac-

complishments. Slides, posters and artifacts gave added meaning to

many programs.

AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP

Sixty-two Chapters reported. Sixty repeated the American's Creed at meetings; 44 devoted one meeting to an Americanism program; 14 gave Americanism talks to other organizations; 17 presented Americanism programs on radio and TV; 40 placed patriotic literature in various places; 9 participated in special project—promotion of American's Creed; 787 DAR Manuals for Citizenship were given to applicants for American citizenship; 18 were given to High Schools, and 2 to Libraries; 30 to Elementary Schools; 358 American flags were given to new citizens; 117 welcome cards and 714 patriotic pamphlets. Two Chapters sponsored receptions for new citizens; 13 members worked with Americanization classes; 13 Chapters attended Natura'ization Courts; 2,458 hours of service were given to committees on social problems; 11 Chapters sponsored Americanism essays and poster contests in schools; 4 arranged for young people to attend Naturalization Ceremonies, and 3 promoted constructive projects among young persons. Joseph Habersham Chapter has papers being processed to present a DAR Americanism Medal, and Hawkinsvil e Chapter has papers being processed for two medals. Special mention and congratulations go to the following Chapters: Joseph Habersham, Hawkinsville, Fort Peachtree, Augusta, Baron DeKalb, Cherokee, and Stephen Heard. It has been a real pleasure to serve as Chairman of this Committee under our capable State Regent, Miss Cooper. I want to thank her for her gracious help and support at all times.

The following chapter programs were reported: 39 on Tamassee, 35 on Kate Duncan Smith, 10 on Berry, 6 on Crossnore, 4 on Hillside, 4 on Hindman, and 3 on Northland.

David Emanuel had a cake sale and with each cake went a sheet of information boasting DAR Schools. Many personal and chapter visits were made to Tamassee and Kate Duncan Smith. Cherokee Chapter members saw the need for a sewing machine in the senior girls dormitory and made the gift. They also gave two new sets of encyclopedias as well as twenty useful books. Coupons and a wide assortment of gifts were given at various times of the year.

The delivery of 351 boxes of clothing was reported with an approxi-

mate weight of 6,850 pounds and an expense of \$584.34. Best of all, many boxes of clothing were personally delivered. Free freight was obtained from Overnite, Georgia Highway Express, Five Transport Corp., and Greyhound and Trailways Buses.

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERAN-PATIENTS

It has been a pleasure to have had the privilege of serving under our capable State Regent on the Veteran-Patient Service Committee this past year. Although this is one of our newest committees, the women throughout the state are finding many ways to show their gratitude to our veterans for the services they have rendered in our behalf.

Activities in the chapters have ranged from sending a subscription to the DAR Magazine to a hospital, making lap robes, visiting veterans in their hospitals, inviting them into their homes, sending gifts to the veterans and to the hospitals and giving them parties and entertainment. One chapter arranged to have an organ sent into a hospital so that there could be an afternoon of good music for the veterans and later regaled them with cookies and punch. Veterans participated in the entertainment and all patients in the hospital were able to enjoy the music through the hospital broadcasting system. Many hours of boredom were relieved for the patients by the donations of good reading material.

There was formerly a mistaken assumption that there were no services to be given unless the chapter was near a Veteran's Hospital. Daughters, not living near a Veteran's Hospital, may assist newly dismissed patients and newly discharged veterans from Vietnam to become adjusted to civilian life, and they will find this service most rewarding and appreciated.

Statistics (75 Chapters reporting):

In the Veteran's hospitals our members gave 483 hours of service; 10 parties; \$373.00 for canteen books; gave 768 gifts to patients at an estimated value of \$447.00; gave 902 gifts to hospitals at an estimated value of \$415.00; 6 programs were given; 263 personal visits were made—amounting to 458 hours; 21 commemorated Patriotic Days.

In military and naval hospitals there were 47 personal visits to members, amounting to 72 hours; \$73.00 was donated for canteen books;

390 gifts given, valued at \$82.50.

In private hospitals: Personal visits by 150 members, totaling 270 hours; 2 parties given; 29 gifts to patients, valued at \$45.00; 3 programs given.

In private homes (for shut-in veteran-patients): Personal visits by 148 members, totaling 117 hours; 1 party given; 71 gifts with values of

\$62.00; 4 programs.

Public Relations: 21 talks were made by DAR members; 11 newsletters published; 1 news picture published; 1 television interview and 2 radio talks.

Sixty-four ounces of stamps were sent in.

To let our veterans know that we care should be the goal for all of our members for the coming year.

Georgia Daughters have been exceedingly active during the past year, both organizing JAC Clubs and working with clubs previously established. There is much organizational effort going on in Georgia now. Numerous chapters throughout the state have written of plans to organize JAC Clubs and of interest in learning more about JAC with the intent to organize JAC Clubs in the future. Georgia Chapters reported sponsoring over 2,000 JAC Clubs with membership exceeding 67,500; 78 new JAC Clubs were founded. Georgia chapters reported a number of contest entries; 57 were entered in National competition. Thatcher Pins and citations were awarded in National Competition. JAC buttons, pins and citations, banners, and flags were presented to the members and clubs.

Georgia was recipient of several National Awards at Continental Congress. These included a first place award for the chapter sponsoring the most JAC members. This award was presented to Georgia by the National Chairman of Junior American Citizens at Continental Congress.

The State Chairman presented a total of eleven awards on the state level at the State Convention in Macon. Two of these were SPECIAL MERIT AWARDS. These were large wooden plaques, hand engraved by woodburning made by the State Chairman

Most importantly they have added to their ranks many outstanding young women. I'm sure that our State Regent is pleased that some 104 are among the new Daughters presented by the chapters. Total funds raised this year are \$351.50.

LINEAGE RESEARCH

Lineage Research reports were received from 68 chapters. Sixty-six chapters have a Lineage Research Chairman or the Regent or Registrar acting as chairman.

Twelve requests for assistance were received from Georgia Chapters; 4 requests from other State Chairmen: 2 requests were sent to Georgia chapters; and 8 requests were forwarded to the National Committee; 247 potential members were assisted; 75 potential members of the S.A.R., C.A.R. and S.R. were assisted. A list of the names and addresses of 70 eligible men for S.A.R. was compiled by the Brier Creek Chapter; 169 new members were acquired through the efforts of the Lineage Research Chairmen; 30 programs were given; 16 corrections were made to existing lineages.

The 159 Georgia counties were assigned to the then 95 chapters. A stamped self-addressed postcard enclosed with the State Chairman's October 1971 letter and Lineage Research material from the National Committee was mailed to each chapter. Names and addresses of volunteer researchers for DAR purposes have been received for 38 counties.

It has been a pleasure to serve as chairman of this committee and to work with our State Regent, Chapter Regents and Committee Chairmen, the State Vice Chairmen and the State Advisor.

MEMBERSHIP

The total membership of the Georgia State Society as of February 1, 1972, was 7,017. This year we have had 353 new members of which 125 were Juniors, and 11 of these Juniors were transferred from C.A.R. Fifty members were dropped from our rolls. Fifty-seven chapters had a gain in membership, 22 a loss, while 16 remained the same. The prospective member blanks were given to all chapters and 9 of these blanks were sent to other states. It has been a pleasure working with the Membership Commission and seeing our membership grow in Georgia as it has never grown before with a net increase of 129 members. Much of our success is due to the enthusiasm and very capable leadership of our State Regent, Miss Martha Cooper.

MOTION PICTURE Miss Leila Summerall

A release was mailed giving instructions as to the requirements for 1971-1972. A report blank was also mailed. Several Chapters returned the blanks, and it is believed that more Chapters are interested and are trying to assist in having better motion pictures. More complete reports were sent this year than were submitted last year.

My appreciation to the participating Chapters for their excellent work. I wish to thank the State Regent for her fine cooperation during

the past two years. It has been a pleasure to serve with her.

NATIONAL DEFENSE

Mrs. Arthur H. Waite

National Defense reports were received from 59 of the 96 chapters in the State. Fifty-five chapters had at least one entire meeting devoted to National Defense with timely and significant subjects such as: The Constitution and Patriotism, Campus riots and unrest, the United States becoming a Second-Class Power, the United Nations, Drug Abuse, Voluntary Army, Communism, the War in Vietnam, Education and the schools situation, Busing, Lack of Respect for Law and Order, Ecology, Federal Control of Children.

Fifty-four chapters devoted at least 5 minutes at each meeting to National Defense, 32 chapters gave more time, 50 chapters studied the 1971 Resolutions, 54 chapters had National Defense material at Chapter meetings, and 53 chapters made National Defense material available to interested individuals. Subjects of material distributed: National Defense mailing each month, the National Defender, DAR Magazine articles,

Flag Codes, and reprints from the DAR Magazine.

Chapters reported presenting a total of 300 Good Citizenship medals, 30 of these chapters presented the medals at school assemb ies, nine chapters participated in the ROTC Medal Project, giving seven bronze medals and four gold medals. One chapter gave a \$50.00 Savings Bond in

addition to the gold medal.

A total of \$654.00 was contributed by 33 chapters for Dollars for Defense, and 32 chapters made an effort to increase subscriptions to the National Defense mailing. Thirty-seven chapters reported that approximately 242 individuals wrote to members of Congress regarding pending legislation and pending treaties, but many of the chapters noted that the figure reported was inaccurate as many members wrote letters and failed to let the National Defense Chairman know.

Topics of great interest to chapters this year were: Drug Abuse, Conservation, Ecology, Schools and Busing, Day Care Centers, Russia's steady growth in power and materials, loss of prestige of the United States, Panama Canal Zone, War in Vietnam, Foreign policy, Disarmament, Child Development Program, Federal Control of Children; Pollution, Campus unrest, United Nations, Deficit financing and Monetary Policy, Welfare reform, Reorganization of State Government, and Re-

apportionment.

Although there was a decline in the number of chapters reporting, there were more varied topics of interest reported, and more individuals were involved. There was an increase in the number of individuals writing to their Congressman (from 191 to 242). There was an increase in the number of chapters increasing subscriptions to the National Defense mailing. There was a most gratifying increase in the Dollars for Defense from \$195.50 last year to \$564.00 this year. This all shows a great increase in the interest in the work of the National Defense Committee and the deep concern of members to be better informed Daughters and to enlighten public opinion with knowledgeable documented information. Recommendations which the chapters thought were pertinent were included in the report to the National Chairman,

The State Chairman spoke to four Chapters about the past, present and future of Meadow Garden, home of George Walton (property of Georgia State Society NSDAR), Augusta, Georgia.

State Board meetings, all District meetings, and State Conference

were attended; two instruction letters, report forms, and over 200 individual Chapter letters mailed.

Two slide programs were sent to the National Program Chairman; GOLDEN ISLES OF GEORGIA AND THE MARSHES OF GLYNN, prepared by Mr. John McKay; and, MEADOW GARDEN-ITS PAST, PRESENT, AND FUTURE, prepared by Mrs. Arthur J. Waterman.

Eight manuscripts have been accepted by the National Program Reviewing Committee.

National Awards given to Georgia for yearbooks and supplements: Outstanding Awards: Andrew Houser Chapter, Fort Peachtree Chapter, Hawthorne Trail Chapter, Nancy Hart Chapter, and Toccoa Chapter, Blue Ribbons: George Walton Chapter, LaGrange Chapter, Mary Hammond Washington Chapter, Oglethorpe Chapter, Xavier Chapter. Mini-Ribbons for Supplements: Baron DeKalb Chapter, Hawkinsville Chapter, and, John Houstoun Chapter.

Fifty-eight reports, 48 yearbooks, 10 supplements, and 5 inserts were sent to the State Chairman. The Regent of Hancock Chapter hand-wrote her Chapter's yearbooks.

Sixty-two program outlines were received. Programs followed DAR objectives. Many programs were ordered from the National Program Office.

Our State Regent, Miss Martha A. Cooper, spoke to many Chapters on BEING A GEORGIA DAUGHTER, MEADOW GARDEN, National Defense, the Constitution, Continental Congress, State Conference plus many other subjects. Georgia's Vice President General and National Membership Chairman, Mrs. Herman Richardson, spoke to our Georgia Chapters.

State Officers, State Chairmen, Congressmen, DAR School officials and alumnae, United States Marines, American Legion, ministers, rectors, and newspaper editors presented programs. C.A.R. was used in many programs. MIRACLE IN THE MOUNTAINS, a film about Berry School, was shown. A genealogical WHAT'S MY LINE was presented, using incidents from the lives of American Revolution ancestors. Response to a Chapter's roll call was answers to WHAT THE CONSTITU-TION MEANS TO AMERICANS. Chapter programs included ecology, conservation, American Indians, Georgia's part in the Revolution, and early Chinese porcelain. MADAM STATE REGENT: it has been a pleasure working with you during the past two years.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

Letters of instruction were mailed in October, 1971, with copy of annual report due on February 1, 1972, enclosed. A postal card reminder was mailed to all chapters not reporting on time. Requests and inquiries were answered promptly.

Excellent publicity for the State Conference in Macon was secured by the hostess chapters.

Reports were received from 79 chapters and these reported 22,8683/4 inches of newspaper publicity in 1,701 articles and 484 pictures; 303 inches of magazine publicity in 21 articles and 18 pictures. This showed an increase over the amount of publicity reported last year.

Four single feature articles and one series were submitted to be entered in the National Contest.

Your State Chairman appreciates the keen interest shown by many chapters and hopes that soon all chapters will send in their reports. It has been an honor to serve for two years under the capable direction of our State Regent.

RADIO AND TELEVISION

Reports were received from 75 chapters with a total of: RADIO—157 hours, 42 minutes; 3,094 spot announcements; 59 programs; and 33 special programs. TV—78 hours, 9 minutes; 7,076 spot announcements; 81 programs; and 2 special programs. These also include American History Month, Fourth of July, Constitution Week, Salute to the First American Week where we present 31 copies of the "In Washington" book in addition to many varied programs on patriotism and current news trends.

I am delighted with the support of the Georgia Daughters in their excellent reports of their "Telling the DAR Story" via radio and TV. It has been a pleasure to serve our State Regent, Miss Martha A. Cooper, as Chairman of this committee.

STUDENT LOAN AND SCHOLARSHIP

The Georgia Society DAR, through the Student Loan and Scholarship Committee, is helping to educate many worthy young people of Georgia. The Chairman wishes to thank each Chapter Chairman who cooperated in committee work and reporting and wishes to express great appreciation to Miss Martha Cooper, State Regent, for her superb leadership, industry, and vision. The Chairman is grateful for the privilege of serving the Georgia Society DAR.

Fifty-two Chapters sent in reports. The State Treasurer reported that 77 Chapters contributed a total of \$236.50 to the American History Scholarship Fund. Leaders in giving were Oglethorpe, Cherokee, Button Gwinnett, Joseph Habersham, and Abraham Baldwin Chapters. Twelve Chapters reported local funds, amounting to \$19,124.19, which were administered locally by these Chapters. Outstanding among these is the Peter Early Chapter, which has \$11,991.56 in the Fannie Asken Williams DAR Scholarship Fund.

DAR funds amounting to approximately \$58,800.00 are on deposit at Berry College, Mercer University, the University of Georgia, Valdosta State College, and Wesleyan College. Loans from the interest accrued on these funds are available upon application to these institutions. A detailed report of these funds follows this report. Our National Chairman urges that a greater effort be made to keep these institutional and local funds in use.

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA Mrs. William E. Abernethy

Sixty-one chapters reported, and 61 repeated the Pledge of Allegiance at meetings; 430 flew their flags on holidays; 112 large flags were presented to local citizens, museums, hospitals, 4-H Clubs, Girl Scouts, libraries, academies, public schools, the deaf and school board building; 711 small flags were distributed at Naturalization Courts, widows of vets, classrooms, church groups of children, kindergartens, chapters and home use; 3,155 flag codes were presented to high schools, churches, chapters, Naturalization Courts, C.A.R., O.E.S. meeting and Girls' Clubs. Thirty-three corrections were made in improper use of flags on streets, in schools, churches, stores, libraries, county assembly of teachers and football games; 76 gave flag talks to other organizations; 166 articles were reported found in newspapers; 35 used the flag in window displays during Constitution Week; 31 chapters had a full program on the flag. Forty chapters reported radio and television broadcasts.

Special Activities listed: DAR chapter requested business firm play patriotic music on its chimes each legal holiday. A poem entitled "It's Our Flag," written by a 12-year-old girl, won the Daughters of the American Revolution poetry contest on the National level. At the presentation of a large flag to a hospital, our State Regent led the Pledge of Allegiance and was the dedication speaker. Two JAC essays were read and patriotic music played. For Veterans' Day, DAR chapters furnished 1,500 flag seals to be placed on front page of newspaper; 25 large flags were so'd to homes and 50 car decals. Two thousand flag codes were distributed to each child in a school.

TRANSPORTATION

Twenty-six chapters reported 17 historical trips, 3 programs on traffic safety and 22 chapters felt that attendance was increased to meetings due to the efforts of their chairmen. A few chapters distributed literature on safety and Oglethorpe Chapter started a transportation safety program in their police department and educational program.

This committee has worked toward increased attendance at Continental Congress. Total cost of the 1971 Bus Trip was under \$90.00. Many reservations were made for other Daughters not taking the bus who were ab'e to use the bus to go back and forth to the meetings in Washington.

Due to several factors, the trip showed a profit of \$320.91; \$220.91 of this amount went to the Martha Ansley Cooper Room and \$100 kept for operating expenses of the 1972 Bus Trip which will be turned over

to the State Treasurer at a later date.

A 1972 Trip is planned and 30 reservations have been received to date. Information concerning the trip and hotel has been sent to each chapter so that anyone can make their personal reservations if they did not want to go by bus.

Hopefully, Georgia can continue the bus trip and devote more time and effort to traffic safety in the coming years. It has been a pleasure working with the State Regent on this project. My thanks to Miss Martha A. Cooper and all Chapter Regents who have spread the word about the Bus Trip.

BYLAWS

BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II OBJECTS

The objects of the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution shall be: to promote the aims set forth in the Bylaws of the National Society; to secure the benefits of cooperation of the chapters in the State; the preservation of the memory of its Revolutionary patriots; the study of its history; the education of its youth in patriotic ideals and in the duties of citizenship.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All Chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, located within the State of Georgia shall be members of this organization.

Article IV OFFICERS

The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Curator. The State Regent shall appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as adviser in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure.

Article V ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Geogia State Society shall be elected at the annual State Conference biennially.

Section 2. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two years or until their successors are elected. Their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regents and of the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Section 3. No member shall be eligible to a State office until she has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years. No member shall be eligible to the same State office for two successive terms. A member having served more than one-half term in the State office shall be deemed to have served a term.

Section 4. Nominations of candidates for office shall be from the floor. The election shall be held by ballot. A majority of the votes cast by the voting members of the State Conference shall elect.

Section 5. Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become acting First Vice Regent, subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. A vacancy in any other State office between annual meetings shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. An election shall be held at the next State Conference to fill the unexpired term. Any State Officer, who is absent from the State for a continuous period of six months or longer automatically relinquishes her position as a State officer.

Section 6. No two State officers shall be members of the same Chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the

State Corresponding Secretary.

Section 7. In recognition of valuable service to the organization, any State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Section 8. A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot. The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than fifteen months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

Section 9. On the election of State Regent, and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Recording Secretary General. The endorsement of a candidate for Vice President General shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent to the Recording Secretary General at least two weeks prior to Continental Congress.

Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, of the State Board of Management, and of the Executive Committee. She shall attend all regular meetings of the National Board of Management. She shall appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees

Section 2. In the absence of the State Regent from any meeting of the State Conference, or the State Board of Management, the State First Vice Regent, or in her absence, the State Second Vice Regent, shall perform the duties of the State Regent. The State First and Second Vice Regents may be assigned to direct committees and to perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent.

Section 3. The State Chaplain shall open all meetings of the State Conference and of the State Board of Management with Scripture reading and prayer and shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require. She shall preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and shall be responsible for the In Memoriam pages in the Proceedings.

Section 4. The State Recording Secretary shall record the proceedings of the State Conference and of meetings of the State Board of Management and of the Executive Committee. She shall compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and of the Proceedings Committee.

Section 5. The State Corresponding Secretary shall conduct correspondence and send notices in behalf of the State Conference, the State Regent, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as directed by them.

Section 6. The State Treasurer shall be the custodian of the funds of the State Society. She shall collect the State Conference dues and registration fees from the Chapters, and shall receive all sums contributed by the Chapters for State and National projects. All monies received by the State Treasurer shall be placed in a Bank which is a member of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. She shall disburse such sums only when authorized by the State Board of Management of the State Society. Incidental expenses shall be paid from the State Dues Fund when authorized by the State Regent in writing. The State Treasurer shall keep an account of all sums received or paid out and shall keep receipts for all payments. She shall prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference. Her books shall be audited annually by a Certified Public Accountant. She shall be ex-officio a member of the Credentials Committee.

Section 7. The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new Chapters.

Section 8. The State Registrar shall, when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, who live in towns and counties in which there are no Chapters, to prove eligibility, and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars in verifying lineage papers. She shall keep a correct list of all members in the State and shall make a report on membership to the State Conference.

Section 9. The State Historian shall be in charge of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General. She shall keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves in the State and shall prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General to Smithsonian Institution. She shall encourage the compilation and publication of County Histories and other unpublished records, especially those of the Revolutionary period.

Section 10. The State Librarian shall collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing duplicates, wherever possible, in the NSDAR Library and in the Georgia DAR Collections in the State Department of Archives and History. She shall endeavor to obtain the books on the wanted list of the Librarian General for the Georgia Section in the NSDA Library and is authorized to solicit contributions from the Chapters for the purchase of the same. She shall have custody and supervision of the DAR Genealogical and Historical Collections of the State Department of Archives and History.

Section 11. The State Curator shall receive and be responsible for all gifts of Revolutionary relics to the Museum of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution. She shall be the custodian of the conference properties and shall have them properly stored, insured and made ready for use of the State Conference.

Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. The Georgia State Society shall hold an annual State Conference between the first day of February and the time of the meeting of the Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week. The Executive Committee shall fix the time and place of meetings when not fixed by the Conference in session, or when for any reason it may be impracticable to meet at the time or place fixed by the Conference.

Section 2. The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credential blanks to the Chapters not less than

sixty days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 3. The voting members of the State Conference shall be State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regent or alternate, and the delegates or their alternates from the Chapters of the State, that are entitled to representation at the Continental Congress. The number of representatives from each Chapter shall be determined by the rules for representation of Chapters in the Continental Congress as given in the National Bylaws.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a Chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the Chapter, except in the case of the Regent or First Vice Rgent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. No member shall hold, at the same time, two offices

carrying a vote at the annual State Conference.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any Chapter in the State of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference, by unanimous consent, the privileges of the floor may be accorded to the State Chairmen with the exception that they may not vote unless they are duly elected delegates or their alternates from their respective chapters.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen days notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Twenty-five voting members, representing not less than ten Chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the

State Conference.

Article VIII STATE DUES AND CONFERENCE FEES

Section 1. The annual dues of Chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be one dollar for each member of the Chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before February 1. Seventy cents of this amount shall be allocated to the general State Dues Fund and thirty cents shall be used to cover all State required per capita assessments. No Chapter shall be entitled to representation at the annual State Conference until the State dues are paid.

Section 2. The Finance Committee, appointed by the State Regent, shall be composed of seven members, to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State

Treasurer, two Honorary State Regents, one active Chapter Regent, and one active Chapter member. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund.

agement the allocation of the State Dues Fund.

Section 3. Each Chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State Dues, a Conference registration fee of \$2.00 for each voter to which the Chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Section 4. State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$2.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference fee at the time of registration.

Article IX EXPENSES

Section 1. One thousand dollars shall be taken each year from the State Dues Fund, to be used by the State Regent in defraying her necessary traveling expenses.

Section 2. Necessary expenses of the State Regent and other officers of the State Conference for stationery and postage shall be paid by the State Treasurer from the State Dues Fund, on the presentation of itemized statements approved in writing by the State Regent.

Article X STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, the Honorary State Regents, the Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regents of the Chapters of the State, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the Fall, following the regular meeting of the National Board. It shall meet also at the time of the State Conference and whenever called by the State Regent.

Section 3. Ten members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference.

Section 5. State Chairmen of National and State Standing Committees shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privileges of the floor, but may not vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article XI EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute an Executive Committee. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the Executive Committee, but may not vote. The State Board of Management may authorize this committee to perform such duties of the Board between its meeting, as may from time to time seem expedient. The Executive Committee shall meet

at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three members of the Committee. It shall make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

Article XII CHAPTERS

Section 1. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April or May. The Chapter Regent shall report the names of the elected officers promptly, on triplicate blanks provided by the State Regent for this purpose, to the Organizing Secretary General, to the State

Regent and to the State Recording Secretary.

Section 2. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent for use in compiling her report, not less than fifteen days before the opening of the annual State Conference. The official Chapter report, not to exceed five hundred words in length, for publication in the Proceedings shall be furnished the State Recording Secretary before the State Conference.

Article XIII AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent and to the Parliamentarian. The State Regent shall send a copy to each Chapter and each voting member, at least sixty days prior to State Conference with her message carrying the call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. Robert's Rules of Order (Revised) shall be the governing authority in parliamentary law for the State Conference in

matters not covered by the Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21). No conference was held in 1911; the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912"; amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta, "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere

with Lent." (Minutes, p. 21). The dates and places of meeting and the numerical designation of the Conferences after the first Annual Conference (1899) were as follows: (2) Atlanta, November 27-28, 1900. Awards

All chapters competing for awards must send reports to the respective chairmen by February 1, 1973.

All reports for awards are based on membership confirmed by the National Society as of February 1 of preceding year (1972).

Bylaws

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National and State Bylaws.

Change of Address

Notice of change of address of members shall be sent to the Organizing Secretary General, Treasurer General, State Regent and State Registrar.

Change of Name

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to State Registrar, Treasurer General and State Regent.

Chapter Elections

Chapter elections shall be held preferably in April or early May and names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, Administration Building 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D. C. 20006, to the State Regent, and to the State Recording Secretary. The full Christian name of Chapter officers shall be given together with her husband's given name or initials, address and zip code.

Dues

Pay to State Treasurer State Dues of \$1.00 per member, preferably on or before January 1, not later than February 1. National Dues of \$3.00 per member sent to the Treasurer General, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D. C. 20006, before January 1, 1973.

Conference Registration Fee

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State dues (on or before January 1, not later than February 1), \$2.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Rules for representation of chapters at Continental Congress:

"Chapters having less than 50 paid members on February 1, are entitled to be represented by the Regents or in her absence the Vice Regent or alternate; chapters having 50 to 199 paid members on February 1, one delegate in addition to the Regent; chapters having 200 to 299 paid members on February 1, two delegates in addition to the Regent, and for each additional 100 paid members one additional delegate." (Article XIII, Section 3-C, National Bylaws).

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$2.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. (Article VIII, Section 4, of the State Bylaws).

Contributions

All contributions by Chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

Deceased Members

Deaths shall be reported promptly to Treasurer General and State Chaplain. Complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and a date of death shall be furnished State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for Conference Memorial Service and "In Memoriam" pages for State Proceedings.

Georgia Hospitality Fund

The following resolution which applies to the Georgia Hospitality

Fund appears in the Proceedings for 1955:

"WHEREAS, The Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds an annual dinner in Washington each year during Continental Congress, which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society.

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$100.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes:

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this fund shall not be

cumulative. Adopted."

GENERAL NEW REGIME FUND BALANCE \$2,500.00

The following resolution which applies to the General New Regime Fund Balance of \$2,500.00 appears in the Proceedings

for 1959-1960, page 41:

"RESOLVED, That at the end of each regime all money in the General Fund above \$2,500.00 be transferred to the Savings Account; when the Supplemental Audit Report is made as of June 1 every two years before the Auditors close out the books this transaction be handled in order to show in this Audit, thus making the General Fund show the same balance of \$2,500.00 at the beginning of each new regime. ADOPTED."

PROCEDURE BOOK OF INSTRUCTIONS FOR OFFICERS AND STATE CHAIRMEN

The following resolution which applies to a Procedure Book of Instruction for Officers and State Chairmen appears in the Pro-

ceedings for 1959-1960, page 41:

"RESOLVED, That all Officers and State Chairmen keep a Procedure Book of Instructions and helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new Officer and Chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities thus providing a continuing continuity of DAR work, ADOPTED."

Genealogical Records

To insure uniformity and convenience in filing, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, 8½ by 11 inches with one-inch margins on right side and bottom, and one and one-half inches at left side and top. One copy retained in Chapter Archives, and three copies shall be sent to the State Chairman of Genealogical Records.

Information for Chapter Regents

1. All letters received by Chapter Regents relating to the work of the Society shall be distributed to the corresponding Chapter

Chairman and brought to the attention of the members at a chapter meeting.

2. Please follow Resolution No. 11, adopted at 61st Georgia Society State Conference, as follows: "Resolved, That a closing date of February 1 be established for all reports, and all reports be given from February 1 to February 1, regardless of a change of regime or Regent." All awards will be made on this date basis.

Information for State Officers and State Chairmen

State Officers and State Chairmen shall send to the State Regent and to the State Treasurer a copy of any instruction letter mailed to chapters.

Meadow Garden

The deed to Meadow Garden property from the National Society, DAR, is in the possession of the State Regent and is also recorded in the Richmond County Courthouse, Augusta, Georgia.

Nominations

The following resolution which applies to the announcement of the candidacy for State Regent appears in the Proceedings of the Twentieth State Conference, 1918:

"Resolved, that it is the judgment of the Executive Board that announcements for State Regent should not be made . . . earlier than three months prior to the meeting of the Conference and they shall be furnished to the Press for publication."

Proceedings

Three copies of the Proceedings will be sent to each Chapter. One copy to be retained by Regent, one copy given to the Chapter Treasurer and one copy for use in the Chapter. Additional copies, if available, must be secured from the State Recording Secretary at \$1.00 per copy, plus 25 cents for postage if to be mailed.

Reports for Proceedings

State Officers', State Chairmen's, and Chapter Regents' reports for Proceedings shall be as concise as possible—not to exceed 250 words—typewritten (double spaced) upon one side of three-hole unruled notebook paper, 8½ by 11 inches, and shall be sent to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary on or before February 15, the original being sent to the Secretary for the proceedings, Chapters Competing for Honor Roll by February 1. Winners of awards of State Officers and State Chairmen shall be listed on a separate sheet of paper.

Resolutions

Resolutions to be considered by the Committee shall be typed, with a heading giving subject of the resolution, signed, and sent to the Chairman of the Resolutions Committee two weeks before the date of the State Conference.
