She feels that any encroachment upon this property would be highly undesirable and she knew of nothing we could do as DAR members but that as individuals we could voice an opinion. It was suggested that a petition be drawn up and sent to Mr. Thomas B. Moreland, Commissioner of Transportation, Atlanta, requesting that plans for extension of Redmond Road through Oak Hill property be discontinued as it would do great damage to the property which is a vital part of Berry School. The petition will be circulated at the Workshops and those who wish to sign it may do so as individuals.

The Georgia State Society has been requested to release the time at which the Georgia dinner is usually held at National Congress so that the National Schools supper can be held that evening. Plans are being considered for a Georgia breakfast the morning of April 30.

There will be a special celebration October 7-8, commemorating the 200th Anniversary of the Battle of King's Mountain. Detailed information about the bus schedule and cost of the trip will be announced at the luncheons.

Mrs. De Lamar mentioned the letter which had been sent out by Mrs. Fox concerning the drive for funds in support of the Meadow Garden Capital Investment Fund. She stated that the project would be discussed at the Workshops and the support of the Regents solicited.

In 1978 the Georgia State Society agreed to let the State Archives make Xerox copies of DAR Genealogical records to be given to the Georgia Historical Society in Savannah. Cost of the project to be paid from the Library Fund. Mrs. De Lamar pointed out that \$450 has been paid for Xeroxing and binding and just recently she received a bill in the amount of \$91.36 from the Archives for Xeroxing Revolutionary Soldiers' histories. No one seems to know why we are being asked to bear this expense as it is not the understanding that the histories would be included in the genealogical records to be copied. We will pay the bill this year but will ask the chapters to send an extra copy of their genealogical material which will be sent to the Historical Society in Savannah. The Archives will be advised that we will no longer pay for thisXeroxing.

The Georgia State Society sent in \$6960 from 62 chapters for ads in the August-September DAR Magazine. The amount last year was \$7790.79 from 89 chapters.

There was no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE October 28, 1980

The Executive Committee of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, met at 9:30 p.m. at the Perimeter North Inn & Conference Center, Atlanta, with Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar, State Regent, presiding. Mrs. James J. Leitch, State Chaplain, opened the meeting with prayer.

Other members present were Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr., Mrs. A. C. Earl Shepherd, Mrs. Allen L. Brewer, Mrs. James L. Pierce, Mrs. James J. Muldrow, Mrs. Julius B. Dodd, Jr., Mrs. Donald D. Hankinson, Mrs. Jerido Ward, Mrs. Ned L. Shuman, Mrs. Charles W. Ennis and Mrs. Hubert R. Martin, Parliamentarian.

The State Regent announced that Mrs. Richard Denny Shelby, President General, will be a guest of the Georgia State Society during State Conference and the speaker on opening night. Other events being planned are a Meadow Garden Breakfast and a Junior Breakfast. The National Chairman, Junior Membership, will be present and a special program under the direction of Mrs. Wade E. Brown, will be presented at the Junior Breakfast.

Mrs. De Lamar stated that she had received an additional bill of \$180 from the State Archives for Xeroxing and binding copies of Revolutionary Soldiers' Histories. In 1978 the Georgia State Society authorized the Archives to Xerox genealogical records to be given to the Georgia Historical Society in Savannah but it was not understood that the Revolutionary Soldiers' Histories were to be included. \$91.36 was paid last year for Xeroxing and binding these histories which makes this an expensive project when it was estimated that the entire cost would be about \$100 per year. The Archives has continued to Xerox and bind these histories at our expense. After discussion it was decided that the State Society could not continue to bear this cost and that chapters would be asked to submit an extra copy of their generalogical material to the Archives which would be sent to the Historical Society in Savannah. Mrs. Muldrow recommended that the original records now bound at the Archives be sent to Washington with the \$10 binder fee prior to March so that we can get credit for the source material in the year in which it was submitted. Mrs. De Lamar stated that there are 920 pages of Revolutionary Soldiers' records which will count this vear.

The State Regent announced that a Resolution will be presented to the State Board of Management tomorrow to publish a history of the Georgia State Society. Hopefully enough pre-publication copies can be sold to pay for it. The net profit from the History will go to the Meadow Garden Capital Investment Fund.

Mrs. De Lamar stated that some time ago the Savannah Chapter contributed \$2,000 with which to buy chairs for Tondee's Tavern. Two chairs were purchased and carried to Washington by Mrs. Hugh Peterson. They were not acceptable to the Curator of the Museum and were brought back to Georgia. The Savannah Chapter wants its money returned. Since the money has been put into a Savings Certificate it will be impossible to return it.

The State Regent pointed out that the cost for printing the Proceedings had increased \$700 and to help cut the cost this year a copy will not be sent to all of the 54 State Regents. Mrs. James L. Pierce moved that one Proceedings be sent to a chapter instead of two as in the past. Motion was seconded by Mrs. James J. Muldrow. Motion passed. This recommendation from the Executive Committee will be sent to the Proceedings Committee for consideration. Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr., First Vice Regent and National Defense Chairman, announced that the services of a consultant have been made available to the National Defense Office. He is Major General Crittenberger who will serve on the staff using DAR Headquarters as his address. He may be contacted there to answer questions pertaining to National Defense. Mrs. Alderman stated that she would coordinate ROTC Medals in the Atlanta area and urged everyone to invite her Congressman to National Defense Night at Continental Congress.

Mrs. A. C. Earl Shepherd, Second Vice Regent and DAR Schools Chairman, stated that it was decided an invitation would be extended to a graduate of KDS to speak at the Schools Luncheon this year. Mr. Henry L. Click, Administrator of KDS and Mr. James D. Marett, Administrator of Tamassee, have accepted invitations to come to State Conference.

Mrs. James J. Leitch, Chaplain, is working on the Memorial Service for State Conference.

Mrs. James L. Pierce, Corresponding Secretary, made a list of changes to the Proceedings which will be distributed. Certificates have been printed which may be used for Historical and other awards and are available for 10° each.

Mrs. James J. Muldrow, Treasurer, stated that she is having trouble with her adding machine. She has been quoted a price of \$99.00 for a new Sharp Calculator with tape. Discussion followed but no action was taken.

Mrs. Julius B. Dodd, Jr., Organizing Secretary, reported that Mrs. E. C. Mercer was approved at the National Board meeting in October as Organizing Regent of the Dallas Chapter. The Dunwoody Chapter with Mrs. Dale V. Gaudier as Organizing Regent will be officially organized in the near future.

Mrs. Donald D. Hankinson, Registrar, reported a membership of 7764, a loss of 38 during the period February 3 to October 10, 1980.

Mrs. Jerido Ward, Historian, is in the process of preparing a workable file for Revolutionary Soldiers' graves which have been marked.

Mrs. Ned L. Shuman, Librarian, gave an update on indexing by Georgia Daughters at the State Archives and the Washington Memorial Library in Macon.

The State Regent announced that the Georgia State Society will have a breakfast instead of a dinner at Continental Congress this year. It will be in the East Room of the Mayflower Hotel on Thursday morning at eight o'clock. The Georgia meeting will be in the Presidential Room from twothirty to three-thirty that afternoon.

MINUTES OF THE STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION PERIMETER NORTH INN & CONFERENCE CENTER

The Board of Management of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, held the Fall meeting at the Perimeter North Inn & Conference Center in Atlanta, Georgia on October 29, 1980 with the State Regent, Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar, presiding.

The meeting was called to order at 9:30 a.m. and Mrs. James J. Leitch, State Chaplain, gave the invocation. The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America was led by Mrs. Moody C. Summers, Jr., State Chairman, Flag of the United States of America. Mrs. Alvin G. Turley, State Chairman of Americanism and DAR Manual for Citizenship, led the American's Creed. The Pledge to the Georgia Flag was led by Mrs. Summers. The "Star Spangled Banner" was led by Mrs. Louis Joseph Bahin, Vice President General from Georgia and Honorary State Regent.

Mrs. Peter S. Hanf, Regent of the Atlanta Chapter, welcomed the assembly. Mrs. De Lamar, State Regent, responded by thanking Mrs. Hanf and the Atlanta Chapter for their warm hospitality and the lovely dinner at the Craigie House the evening before. She expressed appreciation to Mrs. R. A. Garland for giving an interesting history of Craigie House and the gavel which is being used this morning. Mrs. Blanche Kell Hood, Pianist, and Mrs. Thomas R. Burnett, Chairman of Conference Pages, were presented.

Mrs. De Lamar introduced the following distinguished Georgia Daughters: Mrs. Louis Joseph Bahin, Vice President General from Georgia and Honorary State Regent; Mrs. Young Harris Yarbrough, Honorary State Regent and past Vice President General; Mrs. Thomas Earle Stribling, past Chaplain General, past Vice President General and Honorary State Regent; Mrs. John Thigpen, Honorary State Regent; Mrs. Thomas Knox Kendrick, Honorary State Regent; Mrs. Herman M. Richardson, past Registrar General, past Vice President General and Honorary State Regent; Mrs. R. Hugh Reid, Honorary State Regent; Mrs. Arthur H. Waite, past Vice President General and Honorary State Regent; Mrs. R. Hugh Reid, Honorary State Regent; Mrs. Luther L. Watson, Honorary State Regent and Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox, Honorary State Regent and Candidate for Vice President General at Continental Congress.

Mrs. A. C. Earl Shepherd moved that the Corresponding Secretary send notes of regret to the Honorary State Regents who could not be present. Mrs. Hubert R. Martin seconded the motion. Motion was adopted.

Mrs. De Lamar introduced the Parliamentarian, Mrs. Hubert R. Martin, and Co-Parliamentarian, Mrs. Herman M. Richardson.

Mrs. Allen L. Brewer, State Recording Secretary, read Article X, Sections 1, 2 and 5 (Bylaws) pertaining to State Board of Management.

Mrs. De Lamar stated that we were deeply saddened at the loss of many Georgia Daughters during the year and the recent passing of Mrs. Benjamin I. Thornton, past Vice President General and Honorary State Regent on October 1, 1980. She asked for a moment of silent prayer in her memory.

The hymn "Faith of our Fathers" was sung by the audience.

Dr. Jessie Mize, Credentials Chairman, gave the first report of the Credentials Committee which indicated 130 had registered. By direction of the committee she moved its adoption. It was adopted and a quorum was established.

Mrs. J. L. R. Boyd, Timekeeper, was presented.

Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr., State First Vice Regent, took the chair and the State Regent reported on the work of the State Society. Mrs. De Lamar stated that the Georgia State Society is actively participating in all phases of work in the National Society, that we have set our goals high knowing that by hard work and Faith we will accomplish them. The State Regent visited two North Georgia Districts in September which involved 41 chapters and she expects to visit chapters in the two South Georgia Districts in November and January. She attended Continental Congress and has attended two meetings of the National Board of Management, two of Tamassee Board of Trustees, one of the KDS Board as well as those of the State Finance, Proceedings and Resolutions Committees. Mrs. De Lamar presided at each of the district workshops in August. She expressed appreciation to Mrs. Edward E. McBride, Coordinator of Districts, the district directors, hostess chapters and to all who contributed to the success of the workshops.

A trip was made to Meadow Garden in June at which time Mr. and Mrs. Dan Tucker were engaged as caretakers. On a return visit in August she found the house and grounds to be in excellent condition.

The State Regent attended Founders Day at Tamassee and Dedication Day at KDS, along with four Honorary State Regents and two State Officers. She was present in Rome to greet the group on the National DAR Schools Tour and served as hostess at a breakfast given for the group at Oak Hill prior to a tour of Berry Campus.

Announcement was made that two special committees were authorized at the National Board of Management in October. One is the "Energy Ethics Committee" whose objectives are based on Preservation, Information and Conservation. Mrs. Harry E. Harmon III has been appointed as State Chairman to this committee. The second, the "Yorktown Bicentennial Committee" which is for the purpose of commemorating the 200th Anniversary of the Battle of Yorktown. There will be more information on this committee in a letter from the State Regent.

The Curator General announced a gift to the Museum which will be of interest to Georgians. Descendants of Eli Whitney presented a silver wine cooler to the National Society. Its inscription reads that Catherine Green (widow of Nathaniel Green) presented it to Eli Whitney in 1792.

Eleven new chapters have been formed since Continental Congress making a total of 3125 chapters in the National Society. Georgia placed first in amount of advertising in the DAR Magazine for August-September and was first in total revenue and commercial ads in the October issue.

Mrs. Alderman expressed appreciation to Mrs. De Lamar for her outstanding leadership and the assembly responded with a rising voice of thanks.

The State Regent resumed the chair, presented the State Officers and each gave her report:

Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr., State First Vice Regent and National Defense Chairman, announced that the services of a Consultant, Maj. Gen. Crittenberger, have been made available to us through the National Defense office. He is to work with the National Defense Committee and will use National Headquarters as his address. She urged the awarding of ROTC medals and asked chapters to invite their Congressmen to the National Defense Program.

Mrs. A. C. Earl Shepherd, State Second Vice Regent and DAR Schools Chairman, urged support of the State Regent's projects, which are renovation of the Home Economics Building at KDS and replacement of the roof on the May Erwin Talmadge Gymnasium at Tamassee. Mrs. Shepherd announced that her project was to sell shingles for the gym at Tamassee. She displayed a model of the gym with sections marked off representing shingles. She had copies of the shingles made from cardboard and ten will be sent to each chapter to be sold for \$5.00 each. There are 3,000 shingles to be sold.

Mrs. James J. Leitch, Chaplain, requested that each chapter provide at least one program annually on a Biblical Personage. She stated that the Chaplain General's Contest for 1980-81 will be Religious Wall-Hanging Needle-work Samplers and urged that each chapter enter one or more Samplers in the contest. A Chaplain's General Prayer Missal is being compiled and it is the duty of the Chapter Chaplain to send one or more Christian Prayers from her chapter to the Chaplain General for inclusion in the Missal.

Mrs. Allen L. Brewer, Recording Secretary, stressed the importance of sending reports on time for the 1981 Proceedings.

Mrs. James L. Pierce, Corresponding Secretary, announced that certificates have been printed which may be used for Historical and other awards and are available for ten cents each. She distributed a printed list of corrections to the Proceedings which came about after the Proceedings were printed.

Mrs. James J. Muldrow, Treasurer, urged that chapter contributions be sent to her as soon as possible and emphasized deadline for doing so. Copies of the tentative budget and summary of accounts were distributed.

Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox, Chairman, Finance Committee, moved the adoption of the tentative budget. The motion was adopted. Mrs. Fox stated that she regretted the plan for obtaining funds for the maintenance of Meadow Garden would not go into effect. The method for securing contributions was not approved by the National Society. A letter of new instructions will be sent out the first of the year.

Mrs. Julius B. Dodd, Jr., Organizing Secretary, announced the appointment of Mrs. E. C. Mercer as Organizing Regent of a new chapter in Dallas. This appointment was confirmed at the October meeting of the National Board of Management. Mrs. Dale V. Caudier, Organizing Regent of the proposed chapter in Dunwoody, is making plans for official confirmation of the Roswell King Chapter. The State Regent announced the resignation of Mrs. T. Norvell Ashburn, Sr., as Registrar and stated that Mrs. Donald D. Hankinson was elected by the Executive Committee to fill the vacancy.

Mrs. Donald D. Hankinson, Registrar, reported a membership of 7784, a loss of 38 since February. Her report continued: 159 admissions, 7 reinstatements, 44 resignations, 119 deaths, 53 dropped, 2 transfers out of state and 14 transfers into state.

Mrs. Jerido Ward, Historian, stated that her objective for the next two years is to compile a history of the chapters of Georgia. She discussed the information she would need and requirements for its preparation.

Mrs. Ned L. Shuman, Librarian, called attention to the project of the Librarian General which includes reindexing all books in the Library as to state, family name, or general information to make them more accessible. She encouraged chapters to supply funds, manuscripts and genealogical records to the Library which will help preserve the records of our heritage.

Mrs. Charles W. Ennis, Curator, stated that she is custodian of articles removed from Rhodes Memorial Hall as well as those of the State Society.

Mrs. Hubert R. Martin, Parliamentarian, gave a step-by-step procedure for tabling a motion and removing it from table.

The State Regent introduced the National Appointees from Georgia: Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox, Chairman, National Standing Committee of Auditing; Mrs. James J. Muldrow, Chairman, National Special Committee of Membership Commission. National Vice-Chairmen of the Southeastern Division as follows: Mrs. Luther L. Watson, Children of the American Revolution; Mrs. Robert G. Fountain, DAR Magazine; Mrs. Fred A. Miller, Jr., Flag of the United States of America. Other National appointments are as follows: Mrs. Hugh Peterson, Sr., Adviser, DAR Museum; Mrs. Louis Joseph Bahin, Resolutions; Mrs. Herman M. Richardson, Kate Duncan Smith DAR School - Advisor to President General; Mrs. Arthur H. Waite, Tamassee Board of Trustees. VAVS Representatives: Dublin, Mrs. John J. Harris; Atlanta, Mrs. Blanche Kell Hood; Augusta, Mrs. Robert E. Gallaway. DAR School appointments are as follows: Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox and Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar, Kate Duncan Smith Board of Trustees, Advisory Committee; Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar, Tamassee Board of Trustees; Mrs. Louis Joseph Bahin, Public Relations Committee, Tamassee.

The meeting continued with reports from State Chairmen:

American Heritage Chairman, Mrs. Robert H. Kenney, stated that she expected every Georgia chapter to make a Sampler in crewel or needlepoint. The design must relate to our National Theme.

American Indians, Mrs. Claude M. Hamrick, Jr., stated that her report comes through Western Union instead of by mail due to the urgency of funds for the Indian schools. She cited specific needs for Bacone College and St. Mary's School.

Americanism & DAR Manual for Citizenship, Mrs. Alvin G. Turley, announced that the vacancy created by the death of Mrs. Carl Wagner, Vice Chairman, Northeast District, had been filled by Mrs. R. H. Brown. She urged attendance at Naturalization Court.

Conservation, Mrs. Kenneth A. Riddle, encouraged planting trees, suggesting dwarf apple, maple and pine as appropriate ones. She urged the building of nesting houses for Blue Birds which are native to America. DAR Good Citizens, Mrs. Sam H. Black, DAR Magazine, Mrs. J. B. Goddard, and Magazine Advertising, Mrs. Gordon Kilgore, also reported. DAR Museum, Mrs. Robert L. Loflin, reported that Georgia won first place in contributions to the Museum last year. DAR Scholarship Fund, Mrs. Frank R. Radford, called attention to our program assets mentioning the scholarships which are available to students who need them. The scholarships are loans not gifts with interest of only 3%. Flag of the United States of America, Mrs. Moody C. Summers, Jr., recognized Mrs. Fred A. Miller, Jr., who had 100% reporting last year. She encouraged proper display of the Flag. DAR Service for Veteran Patients, Mrs. Buxton L. Daniel, solicited services of chapter members in filling needs of patients in Veteran's Hospitals, nursing and convalescent homes as well as those in local communities who need help. Vice chairmen of the committee, Mrs. James Watterson, Mrs. Blanche Kell Hood, Mrs. Sam Cochran III and Mrs. Heyward Boyette, were introduced.

State Chairmen's reports continued with Genealogical Records, Mrs. Fred R. Thomas; Junior Membership, Mrs. R. H. Deen, Jr.; Lineage Research, Mrs. Gilbert R. Frith. Membership Commission, Mrs. E. Lee Stephenson, gave her report and presented the National Committee Chairman, Mrs. James J. Muldrow; National Honor Roll, Mrs. Wade E. Brown; Press Book, Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beal stated she has received clippings from 58 chapters. She pointed out that this is an Honor Roll requirement and read names of chapters which had not sent in clippings.

Reports were heard from the Special National Committees: American History Month, Mrs. Edgar W. Duskin, announced that Representative Dawson Mathis introduced House Joint Resolution #219, officially making February American History Month. She asked that we write our Congressman in support of this Bill; Constitution Week, Mrs. John H. Goddard, Jr., asked that this program be widened next year by going into grammar schools and encouraging participation in the program; Friends of the Museum, Mrs. Thornton Winter, Jr., encouraged donations to this committee; NSDAR Fifty Year Club, Mrs. Hugh Peterson, Sr., stated the Fifty Year Club was organized three years ago with annual dues of \$2.00 and meets once a year in Washington. Any 50-year member is eligible to become a member of the State Club. Mrs. Peterson continued to solicit funds for the Georgia Room: Protocol, Mrs. Thomas K. PATRIOTISM THROUGH MUSIC IN THE SCHOOLS

- WHEREAS there seems to be an ever increasing lack of respect for the Flag of the United States, the National Anthem and other patriotic hymns (songs) among the people of America; and WHEREAS these words and music were formerly stressed in the schools of our country but no longer receive this emphasis; and
- WHEREAS knowledge of the meaningful words, especially of the National Anthem and of America, would add real understanding of patriotism and love of country to all who learned them;
- RESOLVED that the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, encourage the recent upsurge of patriotism, and, as individuals and in the chapters work toward implementation of the very first resolution passed by the National Society at the First Continental Congress, held in February 1892 — forty years before the adoption of the Star Spangled Banner as our National Anthem —

"Whereas, the Flag of our Country is the emblem of our Nation, and deserves the homage of every true American citizen; and

"Whereas, the only distinctive national song we have is the 'Star Spangled Banner'; be it therefore

"Resolved, That we, the First Continental Congress of the Daughters of the American Revolution, earnestly request all American citizens, native born and adopted, whenever that song is sung or played in their presence, to show their respect and love for our country by rising and standing until it is finished.

"Resolved Further, That we also respectfully and earnestly recommend that the song be sung at least once a week in all the public schools of the United States, so that all American children may learn the words of the song, and learn to honor the 'Stars and Stripes.' "

RESOLVED That copies of this resolution be sent to the Governor of the State of Georgia and to the State Board of Education, as well as to the local boards.

- WHEREAS Miss Martha Berry, a native Georgian and educational pioneer whose influence and impact upon education were felt throughout our nation, was committed to the idea that every young person should have the opportunity to become the best he or she is capable of being; and

- WHEREAS For many years the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, has, through the Approved Schools program of the National Society D A R, and through its own scholarships and gifts, lent support and aid to the school founded by this devoted citizen of our State;
- RESOLVED That the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, support the efforts to have issued a Commemorative Stamp honoring the memory of this outstanding woman whose remarkable life touched the lives of so many.

With the permission of the State Society, copies of this resolution will be sent to the President General, National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution; the Chairman of the Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee, U.S. Postal Service; to the Governor of the State of Georgia; to the Representatives in the Congress and the U.S. Senators from Georgia; and to the officials of the Berry Schools, Mt. Berry, Georgia.

MEDALS — The Attempted Mission To Rescue The Former Prisoners in Iran

- WHEREAS Efforts are afoot to request the President of the United States of America to recognize, with the highest medal suitable under the circumstances, the bravery and sacrifice of the men who volunteered for the mission to attempt to free our former captives in Iran the survivors of the attempted mission and the families of those who gave their lives; and WHEREAS
- WHEREAS two of the volunteers who made the supreme sacrifice were Georgians, namely Captain Lynn D. McIntosh and Staff Sergeant Dewey Johnson;
- RESOLVED That the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, urge its members, as individuals, to support these efforts in whatever way possible, and to enlist the aid of their Congressmen to bring about the success of this project.

YORKTOWN BICENTENNIAL

As chairman of the Board of Trustees, 2 trips have been made to Augusta, three meetings of the board conducted and many letters and numerous phone calls were made in conducting the business pertaining to Meadow Garden.

Extreme cold weather, high winds and heavy rains have not dealt kindly with Meadow Garden this year, but the storm clouds had a silver lining. We were fortunate to have secured the services of an excellent caretaker who is vitally interested in the house and its history.

The State Regent has been saddened by the death of many Georgia Daughters who have given so much of themselves to this society in past years, but her heart is gladdened as she is privileged to witness the Junior members growing in knowledge of and love for DAR.

She is grateful to the chapters who have worked . . . each in its own way . . . to reach our objectives; to the State Chairmen who have made and executed plans and urged the chapters on to even greater achievements; to the Coordinator of Districts and the District Directors who have worked so well together and have been a valuable source of strength and help in carrying out the duties of this office.

And last, but certainly not least, to the State Officers. They have been ever ready to perform any task asked of them. Their enthusiasm has been contagious and has spread over the state.

This State Officer is pleased to report that the National Board of Management at its February 6, 1981 meeting confirmed the reappointment of Mrs. Dale V. Gaudier as Organizing Regent of the Primary Chapter in Dunwoody. Roswell King is the name chosen for this chapter.

On October 10, 1980, the National Board of Management confirmed the appointment of Mrs. E. C. Mercer of Dallas as Organizing Regent in Paulding County. The guidance and encouragement given to this organizing chapter by Mrs. Donald Hankinson, Registrar, Mrs. Peter Hanf, District Director, and Mrs. E. Lee Stephenson, Membership Chairman, is appreciated.

Both of these organizing chapters will meet primarily in the evening or week-ends to accommodate the business and professional women in these areas.

It has been a pleasure working with these organizing chapters and the State Regent's interest, enthusiasm and leadership in the work with these chapters is greatly appreciated.

STATE REGISTRAR

The card files of membership by chapter and the alphabetical last name index of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, are current.

On February 6, 1981, the State Society's membership reached 7880. (With this increase of 58 members our Society achieved its 16th consecutive expansion.) 295 members were accepted by application, 13 members were reinstated and 23 members were acquired through transfer from other state societies. 145 members were lost by death, 74 through resignation and 54 were dropped by the National Society for non-payment of dues.

During 1980-1981, 17 chapters remained the same, 57 chapters gained in membership and 29 chapters lost members with 12 chapters acquiring no members through application, reinstatement or transfer.

The second copy of the Treasurer General's computer printout of chapter membership has been received from 96 out of 103 Georgia chapters. Chapters which have not responded have been sent a request for assistance.

All duties of the State Registrar have been performed. This officer attended and participated in the District workshops as well as the Fall Board of Management. She served as the chairman of the Membership Commission. During the year, she had the pleasure of visiting two chapters — Baron DeKalb on the occasion of the State Regent's visit and Hawkinsville to deliver a talk on Textbook Study.

It has been a privilege to serve the Georgia State Society under the capable leadership of our State Regent, Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar.

STATE HISTORIAN

Mrs. Jerido Ward

Eighty chapters sent in reports after letter of instruction and questionnaire were distributed in the Fall. One original document and \$176 in contributions were sent to the Americana Collection. Historical programs given by/for adults numbered 166, by/for school children 21; anniversaries celebrated; famous people, 34, famous events, 30. Historical tours for adults numbered 34, for school children 6. Among the graves marked by the chapters were, one First State Regent, one Real Daughter, seven Revolutionary Soldiers, and 61 DAR members. Two Historical Markers were placed and three historical restorations begun. Many chapters have completed histories of their chapters. It has been a pleasure to serve the Georgia State Society.

STATE LIBRARIAN

Mrs. Ned L. Shuman

Georgia Daughters are ever mindful of the importance of involvement in library work on the local, state, and national level. Of the 103 chapters in the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, 94 reported to the State Librarian.

These chapters made worthwhile contributions on the local level including gifts of money, flags, cabinets, 86 rolls of microfilm, 340 books, and 23 *DAR Magazine* subscriptions all of which are valued at more than \$18,698.68. The chapters report 640 volunteer hours for indexing and a total of 2,592 volunteer hours to local libraries. Numerous local libraries now have a generalogical "shelf" as a result of efforts of Georgia Daughters.

Dr. Jessie Mize reported that Daughters have indexed 8 volumes (2,224 pages) at the Georgia Archives for a total of 74 volunteer hours, 7 volumes (1,293 pages) at Washington Memorial Library, and the entire volume (382 pages) of Series III *Bible and Family Histories.* Other contributions on the state level include \$210.00 to the State Library Fund, and 2 books and 4 letters to the Georgia Archives.

Hundreds of copies of the brochure "National Society Daughters of the American Revolution Generalogical Library" have been given at Fall Board and chapter meetings. Eleven chapters reported having a full program on the NSDAR Genealogical Library. Contributions to the NSDAR Library include \$424.20 for general use and rebinding, 12 books, and state bookplates.

AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP

Annual reports received from 63 chapters. Much has been done to assist new citizens. One chapter furnished two homes and another gave a three piece suit. One chapter takes charge of a play room at medical center outpatient clinic. A chapter pinned a red carnation with tiny flag on new citizen at Naturalization Court ceremony. Fifteen talks on Americanism were given to other organizations. 28 chapter members attended Naturalization Court. 38 chapters devoted one meeting to a full program on Americanism. 39 Chapters worked with community groups to reduce illiteracy, poverty and disease.

678 copies of DAR Manual for Citizenship were distributed through the United States Department of Justice Bureau of Immigration Courts for applicants studying for citizenship.

Annual reports were received from 59 chapters. 1980-1981 was to see DAR Blue in more bluebird nesting boxes (169 additional boxes were put up this year) and in blueberry bushes planted (3517 bushes plus 2 acres by the Mineral Springs Chapter).

Trees as always give energy and Georgia now has 78,083 more trees plus 3 acres of pine trees planted by the John Floyd Chapter and 68 acres of pine trees planted by the Mineral Springs Chapter. There were 7 programs on Conservation plus a Clean Community Day participation, assistance given to recycling and Conservation Connie hints to members. Conservation became a National Committee in 1909 and is worthy of our support everyday. Thank each of you who did something for Conservation. DAR MUSEUM

Letters and report forms were distributed at summer workshops or mailed to 103 chapters. Reports received from 68 chapters. 48 chapters contributed to Museum funds. Museum General Fund received \$21.00. Cataloging Fund received \$199.00. Total - \$220.00 contributed by Georgia Daughters for support of the DAR Museum. This is about half of last year's contribution. Perhaps this is due to inflation and tight money, but it may be caused to some extent by the fact that many confuse this committee with Friends of the Museum, which is a separate committee.

24 chapters had partial programs on the Museum - several of these were included in reports by delegates to Continental Congress. 5 chapters had full programs, most of which were on the Georgia Room. 1 chapter had 2 full programs.

Special recognition certificates to Andrew Houser and Captain John Wilson Chapters.

D A R SCHOLARSHIP FUND

Georgia's representative for the National American History Award this year is Michele Rodgers of Cartersville.

The State Treasurer reports that Georgia Daughters from ninety Chapters have contributed this year \$386.70 to the American History Scholarship and \$340.60 to the Occupational Therapy Scholarship. Joseph Habersham Chapter again took the lead in contributions.

The Scholarship Committee seeks to promote the NSDAR emphasis on education by offering scholarships and loans to help worthy students attain their goals. There are several types of scholarships and loans available. These are on the national, state, and local level.

93 Chapters reported with 90 Chapters contributing a total of \$19,107.80 to the schools. This total includes the per capita gifts from the State Society. Tamassee, \$5,293.50 for the State Project, reroofing of the May Erwin Talmadge Auditorium Gymnasium Building, Scholarship \$3,936.25, Miscellaneous \$1,471.25; Kate Duncan Smith, \$2,822.70 for the State Project, one-fourth the cost of the kitchen in the Jeannette Osborne Baylies Home Economic Building, Scholarship \$1,564.95, Miscellaneous \$962.45; Berry \$902.50 for the State Project, the Walkway to Barstow Library, Scholarship \$655.50, Miscellaneous \$198.00; Crosnore \$543.50; Hillside \$379.50; Hindman \$377.00.

Chapters reported 52 full school programs with 10 being given by the State Chairman. Several Chapters reported short programs. 76 Chapters sent 413 boxes to the schools with many being delivered by members and free freight from Overnite Transportation Co., Georgia Highway Express, Inc., Bowman Transportation Inc., Downs Transportation Co., Inc., and Scripto Co., Doraville, Ga. Total weight of boxes 10,188 pounds and total cost for shipping \$578.22. Newspapers published 85 articles, 13 pictures. There were 13 spot TV and 74 radio announcements. 49 Chapters received the Hightower Award.

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERAN-PATIENTS

Mrs. Buxton L. Daniel

100% of Georgia's chapters reported the diligent work and services performed for Veteran-Patients in the VA Medical Centers and in our communities.

Georgia's three VA Medical Centers have been excellently served. 188 volunteers gave 2,291 hours of volunteer service. Donations and gifts include: 38 parties costing \$615.20; 485 handmade articles taking 1,074 hours; 4,774 gifts for patients totaling \$6,510; 82 Canteen Book donations totaling \$929.10; and 735 gifts for hospitals totaling \$1,314.50. 694 personal visits totaling 1,948 hours have been made. Other activities include: participation with the "Fall Festival Games"; a weekly "Sing-along"; organ music played for patriotic holidays and other occasions; music therapy in a mental ward; coffee served to patients waiting for out-patient service; monthly Bingo parties; a "Birthday for Everyone" party; a "Mother's Day Buffet"; and 9 American Flags to Decatur's VA Medical Center. One chapter provided transportation for Veteran-Patients to attend the Memorial Service for Staff Sergeant Dewey L. Johnson who died in Great Salt Desert, Iran attempting to rescue the American hostages.

Veteran-Patients were found and helped in our local communities. 211 gifts for patients totaling \$1,284 including a Bennett Breathing Machine for one Veteran-Patient; 22 parties costing \$139; 2 Braille Flags, 26 oz. of "Stamps for the Wounded"; and 42 oz. of stamps for individual patients were given. 1,342 personal visits totaling 3,282 hours were made. A \$500 Memorial was given to a local hospital.

Public Relations included: 21 talks; 204 inches of news stories and 65 inches of news pictures; and 10 minutes of radio time.

Patriotic Days were commemorated.

FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

Georgia Daughters presented 575 large flags, 9 of these for the "Avenue of Flags" at the Va hospital in Decatur, 707 small flags and 437 miniature flags, 16 braille flags were presented to the blind. 1,610 flag codes, 1,234 "Our Flag" booklets and 432 flag posters were presented. 60 corrections were made because of incorrect display of the flag. 26 full programs and 44 partial programs were presented. 27 programs were given to other organizations and 1 script sent to National Program Reviewing Committee.

Six chapters sponsored an essay on "What the Flag of the United States Means to Me." The 185 participants were presented 42 bronze medals, 9 sterling silver medals and 134 certificates of appreciation.

Publicity included 69 articles and 44 pictures with a total of 548 inches, 36 radio broadcasts and 4 television programs.

Chapters worked with C.A.R., City Government, libraries, new citizens, scouts, schools, VA hospitals and other organizations.

My sincere "Thank You" to our State Regent for the privilege and honor of serving on this committee and to those 89 chapters sending in reports for showing "love and respect for our most important visible symbol of freedom and liberty."

MEMBERSHIP COMMISSION

Personnel of this committee were privileged to work together this year to aid Mrs. E. C. Mercer, Organizing Regent, in the development of a primary chapter in the Dallas area.

On November 22, 1980, Mrs. Julius B. Dodd, State Organizing Secretary, Mrs. Donald Hankinson, State Registrar, and Mrs. Peter S. Hanf, Northwest District Director, met with eligible members at large and prospective applicants to present the purposes and opportunities found in DAR membership and to provide information concerning the preparation of their application papers.

A second meeting was held January 10, 1981. Mrs. Dodd enlisted the assistance of Mrs. E. Lee Stephenson, State Membership Committee, who provided valuable individual assistance to the prospective members in the manner of obtaining acceptable data and documental proof to complete their application papers. Mrs. Hanf also attended to provide assistance.

Letters of information and instruction concerning this commission were prepared for distribution at the four district meetings. Members of the commission were introduced at each workshop and the manner of assistance which we can provide was detailed.

MOTION PICTURE, RADIO AND TELEVISION COMMITTEE

A letter of instructions and suggestions with a questionnaire enclosed was mailed to each chapter during August. In early January a reminder was sent urging 100% reporting and requesting a contribution to video tape Continental Congress.

At the State Board of Management Meeting in October a list of films recommended by the National Chairman was released.

Sixty-eight chapters reported varying degrees of activity with more promised in the months ahead.

For the best motion picture, Georgia Daughters indicated a preference for *Kramer vs Kramer* with *Ordinary People* given second place. For the best television program, the choice was *Sixty Minutes* with *The Waltons* second.

Eleven chapters contributed \$38.00 for video-taping Continental Congress.

Concern for the Clean-Up Campaign to help eliminate undesirable motion pictures and reprehensible television programs was indicated by the participating chapters. Seventy-five letters were written and ten telephone calls reported.

Many chapters are including a two-to-five minute report at chapter meetings on films, radio and television programs viewed or listened to, combining it in some instances with National Defense. Use is being made of films for chapter meetings, for showings to senior citizens and to children. Reports show that many Georgia Daughters are appearing on TV or Radio Programs.

For the best overall report the first place award of \$10.00 went to Baron DeKalb Chapter with the second place award of \$5.00 to Archibald Bulloch Chapter. Savannah, Cherokee and Thomasville Chapters were accorded Honorable Mention.

Appreciation is expressed to the participating chapters, to the National Chairman for her assistance and to the State Regent, Mrs. De Lamar, for the privilege of serving the State Society in this capacity.

NATIONAL DEFENSE

This Chairman is grateful to fourteen Vice Chairmen and each Chapter Regent and Chapter Chairman for one hundred per cent reporting.

One hundred and three Chapters reported: 95 entire programs on National Defense and 88 studies of 1980 Resolutions; 101 devoted five minutes to National Defense at each meeting and 64 gave more; 81 had material at meetings and 64 gave material to schools and libraries; 453 Citizenship Medals were presented to students; 83 Chapters gave \$208.50 to ROTC fund and 106 bronze and 15 gold ROTC medals; 38 Chapters gave \$445.50 for Dollars for Defense, providing National Defense literature; 166 paid subscriptions to the National Defender; 682 members wrote to congressmen; 609 wrote to State Legislators; approximately 5078 voted in 1980-81 elections; approximately 43 DAR members hold public office (among which are judges, Clerk of Superior Court, Head of Census Office, County Commissioners, council members, members of Boards of Library, Welfare, Planning and Zoning, Historical District, State Park and Restoration); ERA was the legislative issue of greatest interest; National Defense topics of greatest interest were Education (bilingualism, Christmas carols and voluntary prayer in schools, rampant illiteracy); military preparedness, women as soldiers, Soviet threat and strategic arms limitation.

Serving Georgia State Society in this vital area has been most rewarding.

NATIONAL HONOR ROLL

Congratulations chapters for this is the third consecutive year Georgia Chapters have been 100% in reporting for National Honor Roll. This chairman sincerely appreciates your cooperation and supportive efforts this past year and wishes to thank Chapter Regents, Honor Roll Chairmen and members who have worked diligently to maintain excellence in all areas of DAR in Georgia.

Regrettably, due to very strict National judging, many chapters which customarily attain honor roll status failed to do so. This State Chairman is continuing in your behalf to have these results reversed.

As tallied from the National report 22 chapters attained Gold Honor Roll, 44 attained Silver and 11 attained Honorable Mention.

GEORGIA 100% REPORTING

This is the first year sending newspaper articles to the State Press Book chairman has been a State Honor Roll requirement. The response was most rewarding.

PROGRAM

The response follows: 75 Chapters reported; 10 presented full program on Transportation & Traffic Safety; 65 regularly used carpools to monthly meetings, to attend State Conference, Fall Workshops, Board Management Meetings, visited DAR Schools and Historic Sites, VA Hospitals, graves of Revolutionary Soldiers; 21 Chapters used public transportation often; 52 Members rode the bus to Continental Congress 1980; 9 Chapters presented a "Tip-Of-The-Month" on Transportation & Traffic Safety. One Chapter planned a program on cardiac care. Chapters deserving recognition for achievement are: Peter Early, with Mrs. W. M. Barksdale chairman, an outstanding project completed with preservation of the Old Covered Bridge-Coheelee Creek. This Chapter serves as custodian of The Old Bridge and promoted building of new bridge to divert traffic . . . formal opening Nov. 1980. Members are made aware of hazardous intersections, notify and work with local and State DOT officials to improve Traffic Safety in needed places. Elijah Clarke, with Mrs. E. N. Kinne Chairman, has promoted and coordinated all trips related to Chapter functions and needs; sponsored visit of 200 people to grave of Hiram Howard; sponsored caravan to visit graves of 9 other Revolutionary Soldiers. AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH

Essay contest topic and rules were given to regents at District Workshops. Chapter questionnaire and later information was mailed to regents in early October. 91 chapters reported, 198 schools sponsored the contest, "A Military Leader of the Battle of Yorktown," 49 for the first time, having 4795 contestants. 96 programs on American History were presented by 86 chapters. 55 sponsored American History Month displays.

203 awards were given for excellence in American History, 1202 radio spot announcements and 181,672 TV spot announcements (counting cable TV repetitions) were made. 43 daughters appeared on radio programs and 4 on TV promoting American History. Governor Busbee and 34 mayors proclaimed February 1981 as American History Month with 303 letters written by DAR members urging legislation permanently designating February as American History Month.

CONSTITUTION WEEK

Mrs. Alderman offered the following motion: "I move that the State Society undertake a campaign to raise funds for the Meadow Garden Capital Investment Fund under the direction of the Finance Committee in cooperation with the Meadow Garden Board. Expenses to the State Society for this campaign shall be reimbursed from monies received." Seconded by Mrs. Shepherd. Methods of raising such funds were then discussed in detail and it was decided that a solicitation from citizens of Georgia would be made with the help of each chapter who will be asked to supply a list of names of members of their communities who would be interested in historic preservation. Motion adopted unanimously.

The budget for the coming year was discussed and with minor changes was adopted by the committee and prepared for submission to the Fall Board of Management to be adopted at that time. The meeting adjourned at 7:45 p.m. The Finance Committee met at 1:00 p.m. on October 28, 1980 in Salon C of the Perimeter North Inn and Conference Center. Present were Mesdames Howard Vann, George E. Stratman, Louis C. Alderman, A. C. Earl Shepherd, James J. Muldrow, Jonathan W. Fox and the State Regent, Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar.

The chairman, Mrs. Fox, called the meeting to order. She presented the following agenda for discussion.

The finance committee reaffirmed its recommendation to change the Bylaws so that the due date for state dues would correspond to that for national dues.

Report from the National Executive Committee and the President General through the National Parliamentarian that the Georgia Society could not have a fund drive among non DAR members for the Meadow Garden Capital Investment Fund. Alternate methods of raising money for this fund were discussed. No decision was reached and the matter remains open for discussion until such time as a workable plan is proposed.

A request for return of a monetary gift was discussed. Since this gift has already been included in the State Financial Report and audited and since this type request has not been answered in the affirmative in past years and since the gift is for a designated purpose and will be used for this same purpose in the future, the committee unanimously voted to deny this request. As there was no further business, the meeting adjourned at 2:00 p.m.

The Finance Committee met at 4:00 p.m. in the Magnolia Room of the Downtowner Inn, Albany, Georgia on March 11, 1981. Present were Mesdames George Stratman, Thomas Knox Kendrick, Louis C. Alderman, James J. Muldrow, A. C. Earl Shepherd, Jonathan W. Fox and the State Regent, Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar. Mrs. Fox, Chairman, presided and read the minutes of the last meeting. Mrs. Muldrow, State Treasurer, distributed copies of the Summary of Funds. These were discussed in detail. Because of the growing amounts of monies in interest accruing accounts. Mrs. Muldrow was instructed to check on the tax status of these funds, especially the Meadow Garden Capital Investment Trust Fund. Mrs. Kendrick brought to the attention of the committee that the accountant, Mr. John Singleton, had not presented the State Society with a bill for his services for the last two years but was giving his services to the Society. Since this is a budgeted item, Mrs. Muldrow was instructed to talk to Mr. Singleton about this arrangement with the view of the State Society paying him for his efforts in the future. The budget for 1981-82 was reviewed. No change was made in the base for the budget which meant that the amount available for use by the State Society remains the same. Mrs. Alderman moved and Mrs. Shepherd seconded that \$460.00 credited to the Contingency Fund in the 1980-81 Budget be credited to the State Proceedings Fund for 1981-82 as this would more accurately reflect the actual cost of printing the Proceedings. Motion passed. A proposal by the Meadow Garden Board to raise money for the Capital Investment Trust Fund was discussed. They proposed that every chapter be asked to donate \$500.00 to this fund this year. For this amount, their chapter regent's name would be placed in a container. Her name would also be placed in said container for every \$100.00 over this amount. At the 1982 State Conference, a drawing would be held and the winning regent would receive a free trip to Continental Congress on the Georgia Bus. After discussion, Mrs. Kendrick recommended the project of the Meadow Garden Board be endorsed and presented favorably to the conference for passage. Mrs. Stratman seconded the motion; passed.

Meeting adjourned at 5:00 p.m.

GEORGIA STATE ROOM, DAR MUSEUM

It is most gratifying to this Chairman, to see enthusiastic support and interest shown by the members of the State Society in our Georgia Room DAR Museum. It is reported that Peter Tondee's Tavern continues to be a favorite with visitors to the Museum, especially with the Children. For Continental Congress, Tea cakes have been taken from our kitchen, and a plate full put on the large table, in April. What a surprise it was in October, to see the Tea cakes still there as neat as you please, waiting for someone to serve Tea.

It has been decided to complete the original drawing done by the Savannah Architect and put cabinets in. Two open cupboards are being built in on either side of the fireplace. Since Peter Tondee left no cupboard to be listed in his Inventory, these cupboards will furnish a place for the 108 pieces of Queen's ware, that was listed, in case we find them. Research in Savannah as to the color and shape is being done, to follow the way they would have been in 1760-1776.

These cupboards were not put in originally as the funds were not sufficient. They will cost much more now, however, two chapters have agreed to help finance them.

The search continues for Eighteenth Century Chairs, a painted Beaufet, desks, iron candlesticks, pewter bowl and other articles listed in the Inventory.

With the fine cooperation and generous spirit of the Chapters this goal is sure to be gained in the near future. Records of many years show by their contributions that each Chapter has supported this project to its limit, and the Chairman deeply appreciates every effort put forth in this presentation in the Museum, of the early History of our State and the Nation.

MEADOW GARDEN BOARD MEETING

June 25, 1980

The Meadow Garden Board met in Augusta at Meadow Garden on June 25, 1980, with Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar, State Regent and Chairman of Meadow Garden Board, presiding. At 9:20 a.m., Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr., opened with a prayer. Those present were Mesdames De Lamar, Alderman, Lester Furman, Luther L. Watson, Jonathan W. Fox, Joseph P. Campbell, Frank G. Binford, and C. S. Foreman.

Mrs. Fox moved and Mrs. Watson seconded that Mrs. Alderman be elected secretary of the Board. The motion carried. March minutes were approved as read.

Mrs. De Lamar distributed a financial statement compiled by Mrs. A. C. Earl Shepherd, outgoing State Treasurer. A copy is attached.

Mrs. De Lamar thanked Mr. and Mrs. Furman for cleaning Meadow Garden grounds and the caretaker's cottage.

Mrs. Watson explained that the \$60.00 bill from J. W. Martin Construction Company, Route 2, Box 127 B, Metter 30439, represented \$25.00 for tacking up insulation under Meadow Garden and the caretaker's cottage and \$35.00 for fixing two holes in the floor and wrapping and sealing pipes to stop water.

Mrs. Watson urged that the large Patrons Book, given by Mrs. Zada B. Brannen, be placed at Meadow Garden. Mrs. Binford requested that the item as well as the donor be listed. Mrs. De Lamar asked that a duplicate record be kept by the Chairman of Patrons.

Mrs. Binford then reported that a tall clock, given by John Houstoun Chapter to honor the memory of Miss Annie (Mrs. Henry Allan Ironside), has been placed in the dining room; a mirror has been hung over a chest in an upstairs bedroom; and an oil painting, restored by Dave Jones, has been hung in the Reception Room. She noted that a brass plaque is needed on the frame of the painting. Mrs. Furman volunteered to mount the brass plaque. Mrs. Binford volunteered to refinish the frame. Mrs. Binford noted that the tagged clock key is in the secretary in the Best Room.

Mrs. De Lamar thanked Mr. and Mrs. Binford for the new Meadow Garden sign on Thirteenth Street and reported having written appreciation to the Mayor of Augusta for installing the sign.

Because there are two new flags on hand at Meadow Garden, College Hill Chapter's offer of flags was declined.

Mrs. De Lamar cited a plan by the Finance Committee to launch a Meadow Garden Capital Investment Fund drive among business leaders in the state. Mrs. Fox, Chairman of the Finance Committee, distributed a letter to be mailed to chapters asking for lists of thirty or forty names of possible donors to comprise the mailing list. The letter is attached. Mrs. Fox explained that this would be a one time effort. Expenses, expected to be minimal, would be paid from funds collected and would not be a financial burden to the Georgia State Society. The Finance Committee asked for approval and cooperation of the Meadow Garden Board.

Mrs. De Lamar reported that the State Parliamentarian had ruled that a voluntary drive does not require a resolution or a vote by the membership. Motion for approval and cooperation was made and was unanimously carried.

Mrs. Fox then asked for suggestions for giving recognition to the donors. After discussion it was decided to place names in a separate section of the Patrons Book and to send certificates of appreciation to donors. Motion was made by Mrs. Campbell, seconded by Mrs. Binford, and carried.

Mrs. De Lamar reviewed the rules governing Meadow Garden and explained that it has become necessary for each individual in a tour group to pay the \$1.00 admission fee. Historic Augusta will send the sum to the State Treasurer. Each Board member was given a copy of the rules.

Mrs. De Lamar praised Mrs. Furman for her careful work in securing applications for caretaker.

Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Dan Tucker, Jr., were chosen after interviews with Mrs. De Lamar, Mrs. Watson, and Mrs. Fox. This young couple and their two sons hope to remain in the position for a number of years and come with very good recommendations.

A discussion followed concerning the sale of items at Meadow Garden. It was noted that Meadow Garden plates are sold by the Augusta Chapter. Selling booklets and post cards of Meadow Garden was suggested. Mrs. De Lamar reported that Mrs. Farmer, former Program Chairman, is soon completing work on a slide program.

Mrs. De Lamar expressed hope that the large boxwoods and aimless front walk be removed. Mrs. Binford made the motion, Mrs. Furman seconded, and the motion carried.

Mrs. Watson deplored the closing of the street (closer to the entrance) by the city, and Mrs. De Lamar determined to investigate Meadow Garden's rights involving access.

A motion that the State Second Vice Regent be made a full voting member of the Meadow Garden Board was made by Mrs. Fox, seconded by Mrs. Alderman, and carried unanimously. A new listing of the Board is attached.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:45 a.m.

TEXTBOOK STUDY

A letter of instruction, information and report blank was distributed to chapter regents at each of the district workshops. Bylaws

BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II OBJECTS

The objects of the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution shall be: to promote the aims set forth in the Bylaws of the National Society; the preservation of the memory of its Revolutionary patriots; the study of its history; the education of its youth in patriotic ideals and in the duties of citizenship.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All Chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of this organization.

Article IV OFFICERS

The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Curator. The State Regent shall appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as adviser in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting.

Article V ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected at the annual State Conference biennially.

Section 2. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two years or until their successors are elected. Their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and of the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Section 3. No member shall be eligible to a State office until she has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years. No member shall be eligible to the same State office for two successive terms. A member having served more than one-half term in the State office shall be deemed to have served a term. Any member holding active membership in a Chapter in the Georgia State Society shall be eligible to hold a State office, provided she has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years.

Section 4. Nominations of candidates for office shall be from the floor. The election shall be held by ballot. A majority of the votes cast by the voting members of the State Conference shall elect.

Section 5. Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become acting First Vice Regent, subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. A vacancy in any other State office between annual meetings shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next Fall Board of Management or State Conference, whichever shall come first. Any State Officer, who is absent from the State for a continuous period of six months or longer, automatically relinquishes her position as a State officer.

Section 6. No two State officers shall be members of the same Chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

Section 7. In recognition of valuable service to the organization, any State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Section 8. A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot. The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than fifteen months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

Section 9. On the election of State Regent, and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Recording Secretary General. The endorsement of a candidate for Vice President General shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent to the Recording Secretary General at least two weeks prior to Continental Congress.

Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, of the State Board of Management, and of the Executive Committee. She shall appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees.

Section 2. In the absence of the State Regent from any meeting of the State Conference, or the State Board of Management, the State First Vice Regent, or in her absence, the State Second Vice Regent, shall perform the duties of the State Regent. The State First and Second Vice Regents may be assigned to direct committees and to perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent.

Section 3. The State Chaplain shall open all meetings of the State Conference and of the State Board of Management with Scripture reading and prayer and shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require. She shall preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and shall be responsible for the In Memoriam pages in the Proceedings. Section 4. The State Recording Secretary shall record the proceedings of the State Conference and of meetings of the State Board of Management and of the Executive Committee. She shall compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and of the Proceedings Committee.

Section 5. The State Corresponding Secretary shall conduct correspondence and send notices in behalf of the State Conference, the State Regent, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as directed by them.

Section 6. The State Treasurer shall be the custodian of the funds of the State Society. She shall receive the State Conference dues and registration fees from the Chapters and shall receive all sums contributed by the Chapters for State and National projects. All monies received by the State Treasurer shall be placed only in institutions with accounts covered by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation or by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation, and the amount in any one institution shall not exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage. She shall disburse such sums only when authorized by the State Regent in writing. The State Treasurer shall keep an account of all sums received or paid out and shall keep receipts for all payments. She shall prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference. Her books shall be audited annually by a Certified Public Accountant. She shall be ex-officio a member of the Credentials Committee.

Section 7. The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new Chapters.

Section 8. The State Registrar shall, when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, who live in towns and counties in which there are no Chapters, to prove eligibility, and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars in verifying lineage papers. She shall keep a correct list of all members in the State and shall make a report on membership to the State Conference.

Section 9. The State Historian shall be in charge of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General. She shall keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves in the State and shall prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General to Smithsonian Institution. She shall encourage the compilation and publication of County Histories and other unpublished records, especially those of the Revolutionary period.

Section 10. The State Librarian shall collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing duplicates, wherever possible, in the NSDAR Library and in the Georgia DAR Collections in the State Department of Archives and History. She shall endeavor to obtain the books on the wanted list of the Librarian General for the Georgia Section in the NSDAR Library and is authorized to solicit contributions from the Chapters for the purchase of the same. She shall have custody and supervision of the DAR Genealogical and Historical Collections of the State Department of Archives and History.

Section 11. The State Curator shall receive and be responsible for all gifts of Revolutionary relics to the Museum of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution. She shall be the custodian of the conference properties and shall have them properly stored, insured and made ready for use at State Conference.

Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. The Georgia State Society shall hold an annual State Conference between the first day of February and the time of the meeting of the Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week. The Executive Committee shall fix the time and place of meetings when not fixed by the Conference in session, or when for any reason it may be impracticable to meet at the time or place fixed by the Conference.

Section 2. The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credential blanks to the Chapters not less than sixty days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 3. The voting members of the State Conference shall be State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regent or alternate, and the delegates or their alternates from the Chapters of the state, that are entitled to representation at the Continental Congress. The number of representatives from each Chapter shall be determined by the rules for representation of Chapters in the Continental Congress as given in the National Bylaws.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a Chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the Chapter, except in the case of the Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. No member shall hold, at the same time, two offices carrying a vote at the annual State Conference.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any Chapter in the State of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference the privileges of the floor shall be accorded to the State Chairmen with the exception that they may not vote unless they are duly elected delegates or their alternates from their respective chapters.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen days notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Twenty-five voting members, representing not less than ten Chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII STATE DUES AND CONFERENCE FEES

Section 1. The annual dues of Chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be two dollars for each member of the Chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1. A minimum of at least 72 cents shall be used to cover all State per capita assessments, and the balance shall be allocated to the General State Dues Fund. No Chapter shall be entitled to representation at the annual State Conference until the State dues are paid.

Section 2. The Finance Committee, appointed by the State Regent, shall be composed of seven members, to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two Honorary State Regents, one active Chapter Regent, and one active Chapter member. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund.

Section 3. Each Chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State Dues, a Conference registration fee of \$3.00 for each voter to which the Chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Section 4. State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$3.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference fee at the time of registration.

Article IX EXPENSES

Section 1. One thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) shall be taken each year from the State Dues Fund, to be used by the State Regent in defraying her necessary travel expenses.

Section 2. Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent shall be paid by the State Treasurer from the State Dues Fund.

Article X

STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regents of the Chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the Fall, following the regular meeting of the National Board. It may meet whenever called by the State Regent.

Section 3. Ten members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference.

Section 5. State Chairmen, Vice Chairmen and Committee Members of National and Standing Committees shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privileges of the floor, but may not vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article XI EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of he Georgia State Society shall constitute an Executive Committee. The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, attends the meetings of the Executive Committee, but may not vote. This Committee performs such duties of the Board between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient. The Executive Committee shall meet the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three members of the Committee. It shall make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

Article XII CHAPTERS

Section 1. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April or May. The Chapter Regent shall report the names of the elected officers promptly, on triplicate blanks provided by the State Regent for this purpose, to the Organizing Secretary General, to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary.

Section 2. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent for use in compiling her report, not less than fifteen days before the opening of the annual State Conference. The official Chapter report, not to exceed 250 words in length, for publication in the Proceedings shall be furnished the State Recording Secretary before the State Conference.

Article XIII AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent and to the Parliamentarian. The State Regent shall send a copy to each Chapter and each voting member, at least sixty days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law for the State Conference in matters not covered by the Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21.) No conference was held in 1911; the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912"; amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta, "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, p. 211.)

Awards

All chapters competing for awards must send reports to the respective chairmen by February 1, 1982.

All reports for awards are based on membership confirmed by the National Society as of February 1 of preceding year (1981). SEE FIGURE BESIDE CHAPTER NAME IN CHAPTER REGENTS DIRECTORY.

Bylaws

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National and State Bylaws.

Change of Address

Notice of change of address of members shall be sent to the Organizing Secretary General, Treasurer General, State Regent and State Registrar.

Change of Name

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to State Registrar, Treasurer General and State Regent.

Chapter Elections

As soon as Chapter elections are held, names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, Administration Building, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D. C. 20006, to the State Regent, and to the Recording Secretary by May 1st. The full Christian name of Chapter officers shall be given together with her husband's given name or initials, address and zip code.

Dues

Pay to State Treasurer State Dues of \$2.00 per member before December 1. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the February 1 and two April Board meetings of the National Society. National Dues of \$10.00 per member sent to the Treasurer-General, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D. C. 20006 before December 1, 1981.

Conference Registration Fee

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer with the State dues on or before December 1, \$3.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Rules for representation of chapters at Continental Congress:

"Chapters having less than 50 paid members on February 1 are entitled to be represented by the Regent or in her absence the Vice Regent or alternate; chapters having 50 to 199 paid members on February 1, one delegate in addition to the Regent; chapters having 200 to 299 paid members on February 1, two delegates in addition to the Regent, and for each additional 100 members one additional delegate." (Article XIII, Section 3-C, National Bylaws.)

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$3.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. (Article VIII, Section 4, of the State Bylaws.)

Contributions

ALL contributions by Chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

Deceased Members

Deaths shall be reported promptly to Treasurer General, State Chaplain and State Registrar. Complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and a date of death shall be furnished State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for Conference Memorial Service and "In Memoriam" pages for State Proceedings.

Georgia Hospitality Fund

The following resolution which applies to the Georgia Hospitality Fund appears in the Proceedings for 1955:

"WHEREAS, The Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds an annual dinner in Washington during Continental Congress, which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society.

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$150.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes:

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this fund shall not be cumulative. Adopted."

Procedure Book of Instructions for Officers and State Chairmen

The following resolution which applies to a Procedure Book of Instruction for Officers and State Chairmen appears in the Proceedings for 1959-1960, Page 41.

"RESOLVED, That all Officers and State Chairmen keep a Procedure Book of Instructions and helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new Officer and Chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities thus providing a continuing continuity of DAR work, ADOPTED."

Genealogical Records

To insure uniformity and convenience in binding, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, $8\frac{1}{2}$ by 11 inches, with $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 inch margin on left side, $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches at top and 1 inch on right side and at bottom. Four copies shall be sent to State Chairman of Genealogical Records.

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Information for Chapter Regents

1. All letters received by Chapter Regents relating to the work of the Society shall be distributed to the corresponding Chapter Chairman and brought to the attention of the members at a chapter meeting.

2. Please follow Resolution No. 11, adopted at 61st Georgia Society State Conference, as follows: "Resolved, That a closing date of February 1 be established for all reports, and all reports be given from February 1 to February 1, regardless of a change of regime or Regent." All awards will be made on this date basis.

State Officers and State Chairmen shall send to the State Regent and to the State Treasurer a copy of any instruction letter mailed to chapters.

The deed to Meadow Garden property from the National Society, DAR, is in the possession of the State Regent and is also recorded in the Richmond County Courthouse, Augusta, Georgia.

New Administration Reserve for Contingencies Fund

For the entire resolution setting up the "General New Regime Fund Balance of \$2500.00," found on pp. 203-204 of the 1979 Proceedings the following substitute resolution was adopted by the Board of Management: RESOLVED that at the end of each administration \$4000.00 be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies" fund, this money to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration, and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration. All other surplus monies in the General Fund, other than funds which are designated, are to be divided equally between the General Savings Account and the Meadow Garden Capital Investment Fund, as provided in the Capital Investment Fund Resolution passed in 1979.. (pp 62-63, 1979 Proceedings). This transaction is to be handled by May 31st every two years before the auditors close out the books of an administration, thus making the General Fund show the same balance of \$4000.00 at the beginning of each new administration. (This fund to be known as the "New Administration Reserve for Contingencies Fund.") Adopted.

The following resolution which applies to the announcement of the candidacy for State Regent appears in the Proceedings of the Twentieth State Conference, 1918:

"Resolved, that it is the judgment of the Executive Board that announcements for State Regent should not be made . . . earlier than three months prior to the meeting of the Conference and they shall be furnished to the Press for publication."

Leave 1 inch between bottom of Headings and start of report. LEFT MARGIN of report must be 1 inch minimum. Please check previous Proceedings for correct heading. Entire report should consist of one paragraph. Winners of awards of State Officers and State Chairmen shall be listed on a SEPARATE sheet of paper. State Officers and State Chairmen send to the State Recording Secretary and the State Regent, the awards to be given next year on a SEPARATE sheet of paper — exactly as it is to be printed in the Proceedings.
