In addition, there is a need for docents. Mrs. De Lamar urged members who live in the Augusta area to offer their services for one or two days a month to serve in this capacity. The slide program on Meadow Garden is not completed but will be ready later this year.

The President General's project, "A Legacy Preserved," is the restoration of our beautiful and historic buildings in Washington. Mrs. De Lamar pointed out that in 1949 each member contributed \$6.00 to the building fund and over half of it was paid the first year. Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr., moved that the Corresponding Secretary send notes of regret to the Honorary State Regents who could not be present. Mrs. Hubert R. Martin seconded the motion. The motion was adopted.

Mrs. De Lamar introduced the National Appointees from Georgia: Chairman National Standing Committee - Auditing, Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox; Chairman National Special Committee - Membership Commission, Mrs. James J. Muldrow. National Vice-Chairman of the Southeastern District as follows: Mrs. Luther L. Watson, Children of the American Revolution; Mrs. Robert G. Fountain, DAR Magazine; Mrs. Fred A. Miller, Jr., Flag of the United States of America. Other National appointments are: Mrs. Hugh Peterson, Sr., Adviser, DAR Museum; Miss Martha Ansley Cooper, Mrs. Herman M. Richardson, Mrs. Arthur H. Waite, Mrs. Luther L. Watson and Mrs. Louis Joseph Bahin, DAR Speakers Staff Area Representatives. Kate Duncan Smith DAR School - Adviser to the President General, Mrs. Herman M. Richardson; Resolutions, Mrs. Louis Joseph Bahin; Tamassee Board of Trustees, Mrs. Arthur H. Waite; VAVS Representatives: Dublin, Mrs. John J. Harris, Atlanta, Mrs. Blanch Kell Hood, Augusuta, Mrs. Robert E. Gallaway. DAR School Appointments are as follows: Kate Duncan Smith Board of Trustees, Advisory Committee, Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox, Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar, and Mrs. Arthur H. Waite. Kate Duncan Smith Finance Committee, Mrs. Louis Joseph Bahin; Tamassee Board of Trustees, Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar; Procurement and Gold Key Committee, Mrs. Louis Joseph Bahin. Congressional Committees - Chaplain General's Memorial Committee, Mrs. T. Earle Stribling.

Mrs. Hubert R. Martin, Parliamentarian, was presented and read Article X, Sections 1, 2 and 5 of the Bylaws which pertain to the State Board of Management.

Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall, serving in the absence of Dr. Jessie Mize, Credentials Chairman, gave the first report of the Credentials Committee. With 80 members of the State Board of Management registered, a quorum was established. Mrs. J. L. R. Boyd, Timekeeper, was presented.

Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr., First Vice Regent, took the chair while the State Regent reported on the work of the State Society. Mrs. De Lamar announced confirmation of the Roswell King Chapter at Dunwoody which makes the 105th Chapter in the State Society. She regretted to report that the VAVS Program in Augusta has been dropped by the Veterans' Administration because our representatives there were not attending meetings as required. VAVS Representatives are appointed by the President General and it is regrettable that this action had to be taken.

Members are urged to follow channels in correcting or solving problems which may arise. The State Regent or Parliamentarian should be contacted

for help but no one should go out of the state or to the President General for help.

An invitation to page at Continental Congress is extended by the President General. When one receives an invitation she should reply promptly whether or not she is going to serve. Not only does courtesy demand a response but the President General needs to know your plans so that she can complete her list of pages.

Each Chapter Regent should pick up a packet today which contains chapter report forms and the forms for listing your chapter officers. The latter will be submitted next spring after the election of chapter officers. This method of getting material to you is for the purpose of saving postage and it has worked beautifully.

If any chapter has a life member please send her name, address, and National number immediately to the State Regent. She would like, also, to have the same information for a life member who is now deceased.

The National Society has reaffirmed a recommendation made in 1934 which would convert grounds containing the site of the Battle of Saratoga in New York State into a National Monument. The battle was the turning point in the Revolutionary War. Senate Bill #1450 will, if passed, make possible this National Monument and you are requested to contact your elected representatives to support this piece of legislation.

Mrs. Alderman thanked the State Regent for her outstanding work and leadership, and the assembly rose as an expression of appreciation to Mrs. De Lamar.

Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr., First Vice Regent and National Defense Chairman, stressed the importance of writing elected representatives to oppose ratification of the ERA in Georgia. This should be done as individuals, not as members of the DAR. Mrs. Alderman announced that the Georgia meeting during Continental Congress will be held from 2:30 to 3:30 the afternoon of April 20, 1982, in the Chinese Room of the Mayflower Hotel. The Georgia breakfast will be held at 7:30 the following morning in the Chinese Room. Tickets will be available at \$11.25 each. Mrs. Alderman presented Mrs. Charles F. Wysong who spoke briefly on the Equal Rights Amendment.

Mrs. A. C. Earl Shepherd, Second Vice Regent and DAR School Chairman, discussed the schools' projects to which we are committed this year. She pointed out that a total of \$15,474.00 will be needed to meet obligations at Tamassee, Kate Duncan Smith and the Berry Schools.

Mrs. James J. Leitch, Chaplain, reported the death of 83 members since last March.

Mrs. Allen L. Brewer, Recording Secretary, pointed out the change in date for submitting all reports for the Proceedings.

The State Regent announced that Mrs. James L. Pierce had resigned as Corresponding Secretary in order to go with her husband to Australia. Mrs. Gordon Kilgore was appointed by the Executive Committee to fill this vacancy. She read from the Bylaws of the Georgia Society, Article 5, Section 5, and asked that the action of the Executive Committee be ratified. This was done.

Mrs. James J. Muldrow, State Treasurer, announced that a contribution of \$50.00 or more to the schools will be acknowledged. Last year the requirement for acknowledgement was \$100.00. She discussed the procedure for sending contributions to Meadow Garden, pointing out that they must be earmarked for the project chosen by the contributor.

Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox, Chairman, Finance Committee, presented the tentative budget and by direction of the Finance Committee, moved its adoption. The motion was carried. Mrs. Fox stated that the drawing for the free bus trip to Continental Congress will be held during State Conference. She discussed a recommendation by the Finance Committee to help establish a gift shop at Meadow Garden to be run by the Meadow Garden Board, and that \$1,000 be transferred from the State Savings Account to the Meadow Garden Board for this purpose. The loan is to be repaid from sale of goods before a profit is declared. After discussion, Mrs. Fox then moved that this recommendation be accepted. Passed.

Mrs. Donald D. Hankinson, Registrar, reported 127 new members since August 10, 1981. Total membership in the State Society is 8,014.

Mrs. Jerido Ward, Historian, stated that an increasing number of DAR members are buying grave stones before their death and several have requested permission to have the DAR Insignia placed on the tombstone. She explained that this can be done if a member will pay state and national dues 10 years in advance and sign a statement with her chapter that this has been done. If a member is still living after 10 years she will be required to continue to pay dues. When these requirements are met the Historian General is willing to give permission for the Insignia to be placed on a tombstone.

Mrs. Ned L. Shuman, Librarian, pointed out that the DAR Library is always in need of funds for various projects, particularly, for reclassification, binding, and for the purchase of new books. She stated that there is a new slide program on the DAR Library and urged chapters to use it.

Mrs. De Lamar announced that the DAR Library and Genealogical Records Committee are working on a restoration project for old genealogical source records by having them retyped on acid free paper. Chapters are requested to participate in this program, for which they will receive National Honor Roll credit. Only a State Regent is allowed to take records from the National office and she must return them. Mrs. De Lamar had in her possession 1949-1950 records which she had brought to be retyped.

Mrs. Charles W. Ennis, Curator, reported that all State properties are accounted for.

Mrs. Luther L. Watson, Patrons of Meadow Garden Committee, explained how chapters and individuals can qualify as patrons of Meadow Garden. She pointed out that all donations must be designated for one or more of four Meadow Garden funds, namely, maintenance, landscaping, furnishings, or Meadow Garden Capital Investment Trust Fund.

Mrs. R. Hugh Reid, member, Meadow Garden Board, reminded the Daughters that we are the owners of a building, Meadow Garden. Many items in the building have been given by individuals or to honor individuals and we need a bed in one of the upstairs rooms. "We have felt for sometime that there is a Georgia Daughter we want to recognize. She is the person who researched and found the deed to Meadow Garden. Through her efforts the Meadow Garden property was transferred to the Georgia State Society during her term of office as Chaplain General, 1959-1962. During the last few months, it has been our privilege to raise \$1,480 from chapters, friends and Daughters who have long wanted to recognize this individual, Mrs. Lena Mae Stribling. So a bed for Meadow Garden will be purchased in Lena Mae's honor."

Mrs. Stribling responded by stating that this research was one of the crowning glories of her administration as Chaplain General. This is the first she knew of the bed and she did not know how it was kept from her. She ex-

pressed sincere appreciation to all who had made this gift possible.

Mrs. Reid stated that by virtue of these contributions, 11 individuals and two chapters will be added to Mrs. Watson's book of Patrons this year.

State Chairmen's Reports were begun.

Americanism and DAR Manual for Citizenship, Mrs. Alvin G. Turley, urged members to attend Naturalization Court and to let it be known that you are there as a DAR.

Conservation, Mrs. Kenneth A. Riddle, reported on the Bluebird Contest stating that 5,245 pounds of Pennington bird seed were sold for a profit of \$657.57. A sample package of the seed was given to Mrs. Young Harris Yarbrough.

DAR Good Citizens, Mrs. Sam H. Black, requested that chapters report to her whether or not they participated in the Good Citizens program as she is striving for 100% reporting; DAR Magazine, Mrs. J. B. Godard, was unable to report due to a fall she received after arriving at the Board of Management meeting; DAR Magazine Advertising, Mrs. Gordon Kilgore, stated that the National Advertising Committee will offer a special award for ads using color. She then presented some changes and additions to be made to the 1980-1981 Proceedings.

State Chairmen's reports continued with Flag of the United States of America, Mrs. Moody C. Summers, Jr.; Genealogical Records, Mrs. Fred R. Thomas, explained the work of this committee and gave instructions for collecting and preparing source material. Junior Membership, Mrs. R. H. Deen, Jr.; DAR Scholarship, Mrs. Frank R. Radford, referred to pages 106-109 of the Proceedings for a list of colleges participating in this program. She stated that school counselors should be advised of the availability of scholarship money through the DAR. DAR Service for Veteran Patients, Mrs. Buxton L. Daniel, stated that one of her goals is to give more hours of service to patients in Veterans' Hospitals as well as to patients in other hospitals. Lineage Research, Mrs. Gilbert R. Frith; Membership, Mrs. E. Lee Stephenson; Motion Picture, Radio and TV, Mrs. William James Summerall; Program, Mrs. George Wing; Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall, Press Book Chairman.

At this point the group stood and sang "O God, Our Help in Ages Past" with Mrs. Louis Joseph Bahin at the piano.

The meeting continued with reports from the Special National Committees: American History Month, Mrs. Edgar W. Duskin, requested members to write their senators and congressmen urging passage of legislation permanently designating February as American History Month. Energy Ethics Committee, Mrs. Harry E. Harmon, III, stated that this committee made the first page of the Wall Street Journal on August 28, 1981. NSDAR Fifty Year Club, Mrs. Hugh Peterson, Sr., stated that the Fifty Year Club has now a membership of 90. If an eligible Daughter wishes to become a life member she may do so. Reporting on the Georgia Room, she announced that the cabinets should be installed this week. Protocol, Mrs. Thomas Knox Kendrick, stated that this is a committee that does not cost money but it is a reflection of our Society, courtesy and using correct terminology. She encouraged the purchase of a DAR Handbook which is an excellent source for information on protocol.

Reports continued with the State Standing Committees:

Bylaws, Mrs. Herman M. Richardson, stated that there is no change to the Bylaws but that the following item will be added to Items of Information in the Proceedings: "A Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years." This is being added in order for our Bylaws to conform to the National Bylaws.

Coordinator of Districts, Mrs. Edward E. McBride, Jr., presented the four District Directors and thanked them for their outstanding work. She announced that State Conference will be in Atlanta on March 18, 19 and 20, 1982, with Cherokee Chapter hosting the conference. Mrs. McBride introduced Mrs. Thomas Charles Zay, Sr., Regent of Cherokee Chapter. Mrs. De Lamar recognized the District Directors and stated that these ladies are replacing what used to be the Time and Place Committee.

Collecting and Publishing Revolutionary Soldiers' Histories, Mrs. Robert G. Fountain, stated that a change has been made in submitting records of this committee. They will no longer go to the National Society but will be sent to the State Archives, Washington Memorial Library and to the Georgia Historical Society. Marking Revolutionary Soldiers' Graves and Restoring Historic Spots, Mrs. Fred A. Miller, Jr., requested members to continue searching for unmarked Revolutionary Soldiers' graves. Markers may be obtained free of charge for marking these graves. The State Regent reported for Mrs. Lester Furman, Chairman, Meadow Garden Committee, stating that tour after tour is visiting Meadow Garden. The utility room has been turned into a gift shop. Parliamentarian, Mrs. Hubert R. Martin, stated that she is always ready to give advice but she can give it only when called upon.

Mrs. Arthur H. Waite, Proceedings Committee, gave her report and urged everyone to be aware of the change in dates for submitting reports to the Proceedings Committee.

Mrs. Louis Joseph Bahin, Chairman of the Resolutions Committee, presented Resolutions for consideration of the Board of Management. Mrs. Bahin, with Mrs. Alderman in the chair, read the courtesy resolution expressing sincere appreciation to Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar, State Regent, for her careful planning and execution of the work of the State Society. Resolution adopted with a standing vote of approval. Mrs. Bahin then read the other Resolutions. Upon her motions, each Resolution was voted upon separately and adopted.

Mrs. Arthur H. Waite, Proceedings Chairman, stated that since the Fall Board of Management under Article 10, Section 4 of the Bylaws has all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference, moved that the Resolutions "Date for Annual Audit," "Absolute Deadline for Proceedings Material" and "Reaffirmation," take effect at the Eighty-Fourth State Conference, March 18, 19 and 20, 1982 in Atlanta, and that these Resolutions be included in the State Regent's "Call to Conference" and included in the "Items of Information" in the Proceedings, as a reminder.

Committee Reports continued.

Conference Credentials, Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall serving for Dr. Jessie Mize, gave the final registration: State Officers-11; Parliamentarian-1; National Officers-1; National Chairmen and National Vice Chairmen-4 (reported elsewhere-2); Honorary State Regents-1 (less National Officers-1); State Chairmen and State Vice Chairmen-20 (reported elsewhere-12); Chapter Regents-30; Chapter Members-13; Guests-0. Total Registration without duplication-80.

Mrs. Allen L. Brewer, Recording Secretary, called the roll.

Mrs. De Lamar requested that the Georgia Daughters go with her to

Yorktown. Truly she did take the audience on an exciting trip to the Bicentennial Celebration, which included events along the way, in Williamsburg and Washington, D. C. She was eloquent in her description of the colorful and exciting events of the Celebration. Our tour was enhanced by the use of a large bulletin board filled with color pictures of many of the activities, personages and clippings from newspapers. She was glad that the DAR was a participant in this great celebration and that a large delegation from Georgia was in attendance. Mrs. De Lamar received a standing ovation for her outstanding report and for the manner in which it was presented.

There was no further business to come before the Board at this time. The

meeting was recessed.

Luncheon was served at 1:00 p.m. Mrs. James J. Leitch, State Chaplain, gave the blessing.

Mrs. De Lamar expressed appreciation to the members of the General James Jackson Chapter and its Regent, Mrs. Harry E. Harman, for their hospitality and preparations for this meeting.

Mrs. Harman responded and then read the recipe for a beet salad served at the lovely dinner the evening before for which she had received many

requests.

Mrs. De Lamar stated that she wanted to add an item to the report on Yorktown which she had given earlier. She announced that the Savannah Chapter contributed to the Bicentennial Celebration by giving a tent to the 86th Regiment, the main Regiment of the French Forces at Yorktown, also, two handmade French Flags which were made locally. In attendance from Savannah was Mrs. William Roberts who contributed much to the Revolutionary Battle Park restoration in Savannah.

The State Regent thanked all who had attended the meeting. There were several announcements and after the benediction by Mrs. Louis Joseph

Bahin, the meeting was adjourned.

She was appreciative of the enthusiastic help given by the Georgia Daughters in building the Meadow Garden Capital Investment Fund to almost \$35,000 and was glad that the conflict on access rights to the Meadow Garden site has been successfully resolved.

Publication of the History of the Georgia State Society, 1899-1981, was

a highlight in her administration.

Mrs. De Lamar was delighted that two new chapters had been organized during her term in office and was confident that others would be approved soon.

The correspondence files of Mrs. Julian Y. Talmadge, which included those written while she was President General, NSDAR, were presented to the State Regent with the request that they be kept in a safe and proper place. The President General, Mrs. Richard Denny Shelby, and Mrs. John Ray Williams, Historian General, were anxious that these papers be stored by the National Society with papers of other Presidents General. They are now being processed and will be available for research in the future.

Mrs. Alderman thanked Mrs. De Lamar for her fine report and excellent leadership and a rising vote of appreciation was given by the assembly.

The State Regent resumed the chair. Reports of other officers and chairmen began. Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr., First Vice Regent and National Defense Chairman, expressed appreciation to Vice Chairmen, Chapter Regents and Chapter Chairmen for their outstanding work. She was gratified at the defeat of ERA and commended Mrs. Charles Wysong for her endeavor to defeat the bill. She pointed out that Mrs. T. Earle Stribling was named "Defense Woman of the Year" by the National Society in 1951. The National Defense vice chairmen were introduced. Mrs. A. C. Earl Shepherd, Second Vice Regent and DAR School Chairman, represented the State Regent at the Augusta Chapter Yorktown Bicentennial at Meadow Garden. Mrs. Shepherd will make her school report at the School Luncheon today. Mrs. James J. Leitch, State Chaplain, announced that a Memorial Service was held Thursday, March 18, 1982, in memory of 135 Daughters. Reports continued with Mrs. Allen L. Brewer, State Recording Secretary; Mrs. Gordon Kilgore, State Corresponding Secretary, prepared the revised Parliamentary Procedure and Protocol of the Georgia DAR for the printer, Mrs. James J. Muldrow, State Treasurer, distributed copies of Summary of Funds Account to the assembly. Her books will close April 30.

Mrs. Julius B. Dodd, Jr., Organizing Secretary, reported that the Captain Edwin Hagin Chapter had been confirmed with Mrs. E. C. Mercer serving as Organizing Regent; Mrs. W. F. Daniels, Jr., was appointed Organizing Regent of the Warner Robins Chapter. Mrs. James B. Crawford's appointment as Organizing Regent of a chapter in Snellville has been confirmed. The name chosen for this chapter is Philadelphia Winn.

Mrs. Donald D. Hankinson, State Registrar, stated that on February 5, 1982, membership of the Georgia State Society reached 8,071, with this increase of 195 members, the Society achieved its 17th consecutive expansion.

Mrs. Jerido Ward, Historian, compiled and edited the chapter histories for the book, *History of the Georgia State Society*, 1892-1981.

Mrs. Ned L. Shuman, Librarian, reported considerable interest in library activities, including support for the NSDAR Library and the Georgia State Archives.

Conservation, Mrs. Kenneth A. Riddle; DAR Good Citizen, Mrs. Sam H. Black, reported that 220 Senior girls and boys were recipients of Good Citizens pins and certificates from 73 chapters; DAR Magazine, Mrs. J. B. Godard, reported a total number of subscriptions to the DAR Magazine from 101 chapters was 2,249. DAR Magazine Advertising, Mrs. Gordon W. Kilgore, pointed out that Georgia placed first in the August/September. 1981, issue with ad revenue of \$7,600 for the State; 104 chapters participated in ads for the magazine this year. Mrs. Robert L. Loflin reported that Georgia Daughters responded with \$364 from 54 chapters for the DAR Museum; DAR Scholarship Fund, Mrs. Frank R. Radford; DAR Service for Veteran Patients, Mrs. Buxton L. Daniel; Mrs. Fred R. Thomas, Genealogical Records, reported on material contributed by chapters to the various libraries; Junior Membership, Mrs. R. H. Deen, Jr., reported that Georgia has 100 new Junior members this year; Lineage Research, Mrs. Gilbert R. Frith; Membership, Mrs. E. Lee Stephenson; Motion Picture, Radio and Television, Mrs. William J. Summerall, reported that use is being made of the Georgia Public Television Series through monthly program guides; National Honor Roll, Mrs. Wade E. Brown, presented \$10.00 to the State Regent to be used for any project she wishes. Mrs. De Lamar expressed her appreciation and stated that it would go to KDS. Press Book, Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall, named the winners of her awards; Program, Mrs. George Wing, announced that thirty-four chapter entries were evaluated and recommended for National Tri-Color ribbons and thirteen for National Blue ribbons.

Transportation and Safety, Mrs. Mac Edwards; Miss Zeph Pate reported for Mrs. Edwards who stated that one bus will leave Macon on April 19 for National Congress.

Reports of Special National Committees continued with American History Month, Mrs. Edgar M. Duskin, who reported that 4,732 students from 175 schools participated in the essay contest with topic, "A Famous American Born in February"; Constitution Week, Mrs. John H. Goddard, Jr.; Energy Ethics Committee, Mrs. Harry E. Harmon, III, Chairman, was not present, but an informative report was presented by Miss Jane Sowell, National Chairman, Energy Ethics Committee. Some of the points she made were: 1. Learn to live with change. 2. Plan carefully. 3. Preservation of energy. 4. Next to world peace, nothing is more important to our nation than energy.

Friends of the Museum, Mrs. Thorne Winter, Jr., received \$558 in contributions from 75 chapters; Insignia, Miss Zeph Pate, announced that 357 Insignia were purchased at a cost of \$16,570; NSDAR Fifty Year Club, Mrs.

Hugh Peterson, Sr. Mrs. Peterson reported that there are 237 members with memberships of 50 years or more in DAR. The earliest date of admittance was 1905. Mrs. Peterson reported on the Georgia Room and stated that approximately \$2,700 had been donated to the Georgia Room during the year. The cupboards have been built on either side of the fireplace. State Chairmen continued with their reports: DAR Book Plates, Mrs. W. D. Harvey, reported 425 book plates were sold for a total of \$63.75; Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox, Chairman, Finance Committee, explained that the Finance Committee had recommended passage of a Resolution from the Resolutions Committee concerning a contribution of \$1.00 or more from each Georgia Daughter to a fund set up for the restoration of Mount Vernon as an appropriate gift in celebrating the 250th Anniversary of George Washington's Birthday. It would be understood that the contribution would be on a voluntary basis by each individual and that the gift will not appear as a requirement on any list of the Georgia State Society.

Mrs. Fox brought before the Assembly the fact that there was not enough money to meet our obligations in funding the State Projects at two schools. A balance of \$885.58 is due at Kate Duncan Smith DAR School on construction of the kitchen and the amount due at the Berry School is \$298.06 on the walkway for the handicapped. RESOLVED that the Georgia State Society, National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, strongly urge its members, as individuals, to write and/or call their senators and representatives in the State Legislature, requesting them to continue to vote AGAINST ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment.

DATE FOR ANNUAL AUDIT

WHEREAS every effort must be made to have all material to the printer as early as possible to facilitate delivery of the Proceedings to the members, RESOLVED That the end of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, fiscal year for audit purposes be changed from May 31st to April 30th.

ABSOLUTE DEADLINE FOR PROCEEDINGS MATERIAL

WHEREAS a definite deadline must be established and adhered to for all reports and material to be in the hands of the Proceedings Committee in order to be delivered to the Printer by June 1st,

RESOLVED That all FINAL reports and materials must be received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1st with the exception of the Auditor's report and any information sent out by the National DAR Headquarters. Reports of State Officers

STATE REGENT Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar

It is with mixed emotions that this officer reports to you today for the past two years have revolved almost completely around duties to the State and National Societies. Jet lag is nothing compared to the "responsibility lag" that is sure to follow such a demanding and busy period in one's life. Shakespeare exhausted words and imagined new ones. This officer has exhausted all adjectives in the dictionary, but has not the imagination to coin a word to express her thanks to chapters who have combined their meetings with those of other chapters for her convenience thus conserving both time and energy and making it possible for her to meet with members of each Georgia Chapter. Hostess chapters have done an outstanding job of providing for the State Conferences, Fall Board of Management Meetings and District Meetings. Many thanks to the wonderful Regents and members of Georgia's 105 Chapters.

The Honorary State Regents have been a source of moral support, information, and many times of comfort. Thank you.

The State Officers have done everything asked of them and more. Their support has been fantastic and greatly appreciated. They were urged to "Think Big." This they have done as their reports will show.

Special appreciation is expressed to the State Chairmen who have endured the Chairman's Forum both years only to be proded, pushed, reminded and encouraged not only to achieve our goals, but to go that extra mile by researching and learning about the work of each committee from its conception until today. If each chairman only turns over a booklet of information and instruction to their successor these forums will have been worthwhile, but they have done more than this. They have done an outstanding job of getting information to the chapters and seeing that our work was done.

During this two year period the State Regent has presided at State Conference, Fall Board of Management and District meetings. She has traveled with the District Directors from the Golden Isles to the Tennessee border in sunshine, rain, sleet and snow; made six trips to Washington for meetings of the National Board of Management and Continental Congress; attended board meetings at Tamassee and Kate Duncan Smith DAR Schools; presided at eight meetings of the Meadow Garden Board of Trustees; and attended all meetings of the Finance, Proceedings and Resolutions committees.

Emerson said that nothing great was ever accomplished without enthusiasm. This officer wanted enthusiasm to be the key word of her administration. What we have experienced has been enthusiastic cooperation from every Georgia Daughter in accomplishing our goals, and our goals have been many!

One was to build up the Meadow Garden Capital Investment Trust Fund. In these times of inflation chapters have done remarkably well bringing the total of this fund to almost \$35,000. A gift shop was opened at Meadow Garden in an effort to increase this fund so that this historic property will always be properly maintained. A record number of people have become Patrons of Meadow Garden and the slide program that has been in a state of preparation for so long is now completed and ready for chapter use.

Because of misunderstandings in years past there developed a problem regarding the right of way giving us access to our property on more than one side. Through the efforts of an attorney, engaged for this purpose, an agreement has now been reached between the Meadow Garden Board and the Richmond County Hospital Authority by which we may now circle this property by car or bus and put into use, should we wish, all of the gates to the Meadow Garden property.

While researching old proceedings it was found that the State Society had purchased many years ago, two vase type pitchers that had belonged to the Walton family. These were presented to the Museum in Memorial Continental Hall in 1920, but to anyone's knowledge had never been displayed there. Having never heard of these items the State Regent contacted the Curator General inquiring as to the possibility of having one of them on indefinite loan at Meadow Garden. The result of this inquiry was that they were deaccessioned to the Georgia State Society and this officer brought them back to Georgia as carry-on luggage in early February of this year. They are here today for you to view and will be taken to Meadow Garden where they will be on display.

Another new piece at Meadow Garden is an 18th century pewter serving spoon given by Mrs. J. L. Quackenbush through the John Clarke Chapter. Friends of Mrs. T. Earle Stribling contributed funds to purchase a much needed bed for the house in her honor. Meadow Garden has had a good year.

Another goal was the publication of the HISTORY OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY 1899-1981. Deep appreciation is expressed to you, the Georgia Daughters, for allowing the State Regent to compile this much needed history of the work done by Georgia Daughters through the years. It is a great disappointment that this book cannot be delivered to you at this State Conference as planned, but one third of the manuscript was lost in the Atlanta Post Office for one month. Due to this unfortunate occurrence the delivery date will be mid-April. Publishing this book was a gigantic undertaking that could not have been accomplished without the combined efforts of the Honorary State Regents, State Officers, especially the State Historian, Mrs. Jerido Ward, who compiled active and disbanded Chapter Histories, the State Chairmen, and last, but certainly not least, the Chapter Regents. Truly a labor of love on the part of this officer, she would like to thank Mrs. Stribling for the loan of her collection of proceedings which made it possible to do more of the needed research at home. This is a book that is long overdue and it should prove to be both informative and interesting to all. It is hoped that every chapter will present a copy to the local libraries. Anyone who has not placed their order should do so today with Mrs. Ward, the State Historian.

A surprise acquisition this year was the correspondence files of Mrs. Julian Y. Talmadge which were presented to the State Regent with the request that they be deposited in a safe and proper place. After speaking with the President General, Mrs. Shelby and with Mrs. Williams the Historian General, it was found that correspondence of all past Presidents General were being sought so that the National Society could have a complete file. These papers and letters that were written during the years Mrs. Talmadge was President General have already proven to be useful to the President General for they contained information for which she was seeking. These papers will be processed by the office of the Historian General and will be available for research in the future.

With the 250th anniversary of the founding of Georgia approaching in 1983 it was resolved at the 83rd State Conference in 1981 that the State Regent appoint a committee to serve with her as chairman for the purpose of planning appropriate and suitable events to celebrate this occasion. Those serving were Mrs. George E. Stratman, Mrs. W. Capers Andrews, Miss Jessie Mize and Mrs. Herman M. Richardson. It is hoped that the committee appointed to direct the Georgia State Society Semiquincentenary celebration will profit by our efforts.

Two new chapters have been organized and are growing. Another has the required number of applicants approved and will be confirmed at the National Board meeting before Continental Congress.

The Georgia Bus will once again travel to Washington for Continental Congress in April and the State Regent hopes to see every Georgian at the Georgia meeting and Georgia Breakfast. By all means buy your ticket from the State First Vice Regent today.

The Battle of Yorktown, the battle that won American Independence, was studied, proclaimed and celebrated all over Georgia. Bells rang out on October 19, 1981 signalling a Day of Prayer and Thanksgiving, a Day of Remembrance as chapters joined together in salute to the epic victory at Yorktown. NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

ELEVEN MONTHS ENDED APRIL 30, 1982

1. Accounting Policies -

The Georgia Society considers all contributions available for unrestricted use, unless specifically restricted by the donor.

The Georgia Society has prepared its financial statements on a cash basis for all years except the year ended May 31, 1976. The statements and accounting procedures were converted back to the cash basis for the year ended May 31, 1977. The current statements have been prepared on the cash basis.

Effective June 1, 1981, the Georgia Society changed its fiscal year end to April 30. Therefore, the current statements cover the eleven months from June 1, 1981 to April 30, 1982.

It is the policy of the Georgia Society that property be expensed when purchased.

2. Ceneral Comment -

The Georgia Society has been granted tax exempt status by the Internal Revenue Service under Code Section 501 (c) (3), and thus is not subject to taxation on profits. All required returns for organizations exempt from income tax (Form 990) have been prepared.

The State Organizing Secretary is pleased to report that the National Board of Management, at its May 5, 1981 meeting, confirmed the newly organized Captain Edward Hagin Chapter. This Chapter, with Mrs. E. C. Mercer serving as Organizing Regent, held its Organizing Meeting in Dallas on May 2, 1981. On October 15, 1981, the Roswell King Chapter held its Organizing Meeting in Dunwoody and was confirmed on this date at the meeting of the National Board of Management. STATE REGISTRAR

The card files of membership by chapter and the alphabetical last name index of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, are current.

On February 5, 1982 the State Society's membership reached 8071. (With this increase of 195 members the Society achieved its 17th consecutive expansion.) 423 members were accepted by application, 24 members were reinstated and 23 members were acquired through transfer from other state societies. 99 members were lost by death, 103 through resignation and 73 through previous actions now completed.

The second copy of the Treasurer General's computer printout of chapter membership has been received from 102 out of 103 Georgia chapters. (Newly confirmed Captain Edward Hagin and Roswell King chapters were not included in this total.) The chapter which has not responded has been sent a request for assistance.

All the duties of the State Registrar have been performed. This officer attended and participated in the District workshops as well as the Fall Board of Management. She served as the chairman of the Membership Commission. Data on the office of Registrar was compiled and submitted to the State Regent for inclusion in the *History of the Georgia State Society*. During the year, she had the pleasure of visiting three chapters: Hancock, Joseph Habersham and Pulaski on the occasion of the State Regent's visit.

STATE HISTORIAN

The State Historian attended two District Meetings, Fall Board of Management Meeting, State Conference, Continental Congress, and all Executive Committee Meetings. This officer compiled and edited the chapter histories for the book "History of the Georgia State Society, 1892-1981." Eightyone chapters sent in reports after letter of instruction and questionnaire were distributed at District Workshop. Two original documents and \$178 were sent to the Americana Collection. Historical programs given by/for adults numbered 196, by/for school children 58; anniversaries celebrated; famous people 34, famous events 67. Historical tours for adults numbered 44, for school children 12. Graves marked for DAR members numbered 36.. The Augusta Chapter reported locating the grave of Revolutionary Soldier, Robert Munson. Chapters reported marking graves of 6 Revolutionary Soldiers: John Tillman, James Jones by Archibald Bulloch Chapter; John Johnson, James Cartledge, Samuel Cartledge by Kettle Creek Chapter; Isaiah Goldsby-Goolsby by Hancock Chapter. Two Historical markers were placed and 5 historical restorations were begun. Nine Chapters submitted a teacher for the Outstanding American History Teacher Award. Patricia Bass Riner, submitted by Nancy Hart Chapter is Georgia's first recipient of this award. It has been a most rewarding experience serving the Georgia State Society under the capable leadership of our State Regent, Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar.

STATE LIBRARIAN

This State Officer attended 4 District Workshops, Fall Board of Management, State Conference and all Executive Board Meetings. It was a pleasure to present programs at meetings of the Hawkinsville Chapter and the General Josiah Tattnall Chapter.

It is with joy that this officer may report that monies were spent from the State Library Fund to purchase 18 books and Federal Census Indexes for the NSDAR Library for a total of \$620.00. Georgia Chapters presented the NSDAR Library 12 books valued at \$275.00. Contributions by Chapters to the Rebinding Fund totaled \$371.75 and to the General Fund, \$3.00. Eleven Chapters had programs on the NSDAR Library and 3 Chapters participated in the GRC Restoration Program.

Interest in the Georgia Archives continues to be high with Georgia Daughters working 997 volunteer hours and contributing 12 books valued at \$311.00. Six books costing \$159.00 were donated through the State Library Fund.

On the local level, genealogical and historical literary resources continue to grow with gifts of money, books, magazines, microfilm, globes, etc., totaling at more than \$11,729.52. Georgia Daughters worked 1,190 volunteer hours in local libraries.

It has been a pleasure to have the opportunity to serve the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, as State Librarian and to work with enthusiastic Daughters and officers.

DAR SCHOOLS

85 Chapters reported that 73 Chapters had programs on schools with 7 being given by the State Chairman. 71 Chapters sent clothing and other items to the schools with many boxes being delivered by members or friends. Several Chapters had articles and pictures in the newspapers and spot announcements on TV and radio. 10 Chapters had special projects to benefit the schools. There were 8 Golden Rule Benefactors in Georgia.

According to the State Treasurer, 99 Chapters contributed a total of \$18,565.40 to the schools. This total includes the per capita gifts from the State Society. Tamassee: State Project \$6,414.21; Scholarships \$3,410.00; Miscellaneous \$659.72. Kate Duncan Smith: State Project \$3,730.72; Scholarships \$1,262.50; Miscellaneous \$742.47. Berry: State Project \$809.44; Scholarships \$158.00; Miscellaneous \$158.84. Crossnore: \$583.50; Hillside: \$302.50 and Hindman: \$333.50. \$309.00 was also given to the Hightower Memorial Fund.

The Georgia State Society is deeply grateful to Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Hightower, Jr. for continuing the Hightower Award and for increasing it from \$5.00 to \$10.00. 43 Chapters received this award with Fort Peachtree and Joseph Habersham having the largest per capita gifts. Stone Castle, Commodore Richard Dale and Baron DeKalb received the Chairman's award for largest contributions to State Projects.

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERAN-PATIENTS

Mrs. Buxton L. Daniel

100% of Georgia's chapters reported the diligent work and services performed for Veteran-Patients. This Chairman is grateful to four Vice Chairmen and each Chapter Regent and Chapter Chairman for this distinction for the second consecutive year.

Georgia's VA Medical Centers have been excellently served. 107 volunteers gave 2,462 hours of volunteer service. Donations and gifts include: 53 parties costing \$852; 589 hand-made articles taking 1,505 hours to make with a value of \$3,208; 1707 Canteen Books totaling \$2,727; and 140 gifts for Hospitals totaling \$2,226. 313 personal visits totaling 670 hours were made. Activities include: donating American Flags for the Avenue of Flags project; bringing flowers and baked goods; hosting monthly parties; serving coffee and cookies weekly to Out-Patients and their families; providing Music Therapy and Garden Therapy programs; remembering Veteran-Patients on their Birthdays, Easter, Christmas and Valentine's Day; recruiting youth as volunteers; participating with Fall Carnival; having a "Cash Shower" for the Chaplain's Fund; and honoring Veteran-Patients on Memorial Day, Independence Day and Veteran's Day.

Veteran-Patients were found and helped in local communities. Donations and gifts included: 429 gifts for patients totaling \$773; 1 hospital gift of \$40; 33 parties costing \$208; and 780 visits totaling 1150 hours. Activities included: "adopting" a WW1 Veteran-Patient to help; donating American Flags; giving fruit baskets with an American Flag; hosting a "Mother's Day Buffet," giving 4 Braille Flags totaling \$8; sending 51 ounces of stamps to "Stamps for Wounded"; and 28 ounces of stamps for individual patients. Patriotic Days were commemorated.

Public Relations included 20 talks, 128 inches of news stories and 72 inches of news pictures.

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATE OF AMERICA

Reports were received from 87 chapters, reminder cards had been mailed to 104 chapters regents in early January, 88 large flags, 164 small flags and 81 miniature flags were presented. 8 braille flags presented. 2477 flag cards. 1,052 "Our Flag" booklets, 100 flag posters, 75 flag book-marks were also presented. 73 corrections made for incorrect display of the flag. 33 full programs and 34 partial programs were presented, 20 programs to other organizations, with 1 script sent to the National Program Reviewing Committee. 6 chapters sponsored an essay on "What the Flag of the United States of America Means to Me." The 208 participants were presented 52 bronze

medals, 6 American History awards, and 1 \$50.00 U.S. Treasury bond. 72 jeweled Flag pins were presented. Publicity included 98 articles and 34 pictures with a total of 872 inches, 58 Radio broadcasts, and 4 TV spots. 3 certificates of awards were presented to institutions properly displaying the Flag. Chapters participated in Flag Day programs, Veterans Day, and two Yorktown celebrations. Many flags given by Chapter and members to V.A. Hospital in Decatur.

More awareness of the flag has come to this chairman and I am grateful for the opportunity to serve under the leadership of our State Regent on this committee.

MEMBERSHIP COMMISSION

Letters of information and instruction concerning this committee were prepared for distribution at the four district meetings. Members of the commission were introduced at each workshop and the manner of assistance which the commission can provide was detailed.

Data on the membership commission was compiled and submitted to the State Regent for inclusion in the *History of the Georgia State Society*.

On November 11, 1981, Mrs. Donald Hankinson, State Registrar, and Mrs. E. Lee Stephenson, State Membership Chairman, met with Mrs. James B. Crawford, Organizing Regent, 29 prospective applicants and eligible members at large from the Snellville-Lawrenceville area.

The State Registrar presented the purposes and opportunities to be found in DAR membership as well as a brief history of the National Society. Mrs. Stephenson provided individual assistance to the prospective members of the primary chapter in the manner of obtaining acceptable data and documental proof to complete their application papers. "Know the DAR" booklets and copies of the DAR Magazine were provided for distribution by the Membership chairman. The four volumes of the Membership Roll and Register of Ancestors of the Georgia State Society and the two volumes of the DAR Patriot Index were available for reference. Following the meeting, a number of completed application papers were reviewed for accuracy of documentation and required signatures.

MOTION PICTURE, RADIO AND TELEVISION

Reports were received from 85 chapters, an increase of 18 over last year's total showing increased interest and activity in the work of this committee. The chairman's newsletter was distributed to chapters at the four workshop meetings which she attended and discussed ways for achieving the committee's goals. This was repeated at the Fall Board of Management Meeting in October. In late January cards were sent to chapters not yet reporting with some results.

It is gratifying to learn that extensive use is being made of the Georgia Public Television Series through the monthly program guides. The use of tapes and slides for chapter programs and the appearance of members on radio and television is increasing. Eight chapters contributed forty dollars for video-taping Continental Congress bringing the total for the two-year period to seventy-eight dollars. The Clean-Up Campaign continues with one hundred twenty-eight letters being written to Broadcasting Companies and Advertisers expressing approval or disapproval.

Georgia Daughters indicated a preference for Raiders of the Lost Ark as the best movie for all family viewing with On Golden Pond for adults. Little House on the Prairie rated first as the TV Series for family viewing with The New Sixty Minutes as the choice for adults. Designated as the worst moving picture was Caligula and the worst TV Series was Flamingo Road.

Special commendation goes to the Savannah Chapter for the TV presentation of their Yorktown Celebration in which French Flags made by a member were given to a local resident who took the part of Rochambeau at the celebration in Virginia. Outstanding work was done by a high school English Department in the areas of advertising and publicity using all media under the direction of Mrs. Leon Green, Chapter Chairman of the Motion Picture, Radio and Television Committee. She also circulated current materials to members designating the best and the worst movies being shown in her community.

The chairman's award of \$10.00 for the best overall report went to the John Laurens Chapter of Dublin with a tie for the second place award by Savannah and Baron DeKalb Chapters. Each received \$5.00.

Appreciation is expressed to the 85 chapters who reported, to the National Chairman for her assistance and to the State Regent, Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar, for the privilege of serving the Georgia State Society.

NATIONAL DEFENSE

This chairman is grateful for one hundred per cent reporting. One hundred and five chapters reported: 96 entire programs on National Defense; 103 devoted five minutes to National Defense each meeting and 61 gave more time; 96 studied 1981 Resolutions; 98 had material available at meetings and 65 gave material to schools, libraries and individuals; 443 Good Citizenship Medals were presented to students; 86 chapters gave \$272.75 to the NSDAR ROTC fund and gave one saber and 102 bronze and 16 gold ROTC medals; 43 gave \$410.05 to Dollars for Defense, helping to provide National Defense literature; 201 members subscribed to the National Defender; 823 members wrote to Congressmen; 1,044 members wrote to State Legislators; approximately 6,418 members voted in 1981-1982; 43 members hold elective or appointive public office (among which are judges, clerk of Superior Court, County Commissioners, city council members, chairman of Chamber of Commerce, members and chairmen of Boards of Library, Election, Education, Selective Service, Appeals, Planning and Zoning, Recreation, Affairs of Aging, and Restoration); ERA was the legislative issue of greatest interest; National Defense topics of greatest interest were military preparedness against the Soviet threat, problems in our educational system, the American spirit, immigration, the rising crime rate, and the economy. This chairman is grateful to 14 District Vice Chairmen for serving as a communications network and to the State Regent for her enthusiastic support.

This is the second year requiring press book participation for State Honor Roll credit. I am pleased there was 100% chapter reporting. PROGRAM Mrs. George Wing

Informative and interesting programs were presented to the chapters throughout the year. Administration and National themes were emphasized. Chapter program outlines included reports on National Defense, Meadow Garden, and DAR oriented programs using the three categories: Historical, Educational, and Patriotic. Meadow Garden slides and tapes were available for chapter programs for the first time.

Yearbooks, supplements, and inserts, prepared by half of the chapters, were judged at the State level in accordance with National criteria. State and National ribbons for yearbooks, supplements, and inserts were awarded, and monetary awards were given for the best "Theme in Title" and

"Costs in Printing" contests. Several chapters were recognized with Honorable Mention certificates. Specifically, thirty-four chapter entries were evaluated and recommended for National TriColor ribbons and 13 for National Blue ribbons. At the State level red ribbons (DAR oriented program calendars) were given to 50 entries; yellow ribbons for Use of Theme in program calendars were awarded to 32 chapters, and green ribbons (Cost in Printing) were given to six chapters. Entries were on display at the State Conference in Atlanta.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

Several important matters have received attention during the past year. First, the 83rd Georgia State Conference of March 1981 in Albany was reported in the June/July issue of the DAR Magazine, complete with a photograph of Georgia State Regent, Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar, and President General, NSDAR, Mrs. Richard Denny Shelby. Second, during the year three different letters were sent to each chapter regent concerning summer workshops, Fall Board Meeting, State Conference and instructions about reporting. Third, more than a dozen items were accepted by the National Public Relations Chairman for use on the National Bulletin Board; fourth, 98 chapters reported to the State Public Relations Chairman - considerably more than in previous years; fifth, use of cable television and radio spots was a great deal more than last year, a true reflection of our culture and a great way of telling the DAR story. Seventh, an added category of award for the best over-all reporting of chapter work resulted in some very fine reports by the chapters of their own special emphases. Eighth, the date of reporting for next year has been changed to include American History Month; reports by the chapters will be due on February 28, 1983 to the Public Relations State Chairman. Ninth, hopefully, the measurement of articles and ads for publicity was clarified by the National Chairman in the November DAR Magazine, on page 903, items 9 and 10. Tenth, the rules for submitting feature stories were given in the December issue of DAR Magazine, page 1015.

ENERGY ETHICS

The Energy Ethics Committee has been operational for just a few months. In that time each Regent of each Georgia chapter has been presented with a local contact on energy; a source for speakers on the subject of Energy; and a choice of two audio-visual presentations to spotlight the importance and the place of energy in our society.

Also prepared for distribution is a Energy Ethics kit for each chapter. It contains: outline for an Energy workshop of four sessions, each session outlined in detail; two scripts for Energy presentations, either slide and tape or slide and script; a 44 page primer on how to conserve energy; a list of sources where additional information may be obtained; a precise, easilyunderstood guide to reading your own electric meter, with diagramatic instructions; the dollars and cents aspect of energy consumption — and conservation; a complete HOW-TO on how to upgrade the insulation, and thereby reduce consumption, of home electricity. Specifics include how to weatherstrip doors, insulating the ducts, what routine maintenance is required of water heaters, heating and cooling equipment, shower flow controls, heat pumps, and replacement of units. These are the mechanics. On a broader plane, our national chairman, Miss Jane Grey Sowell asks each chapter three questions: What have you done to make your community, and your fellow-daughters more energy conscious; what do you propose to do in that connection for the future, and finally, do you think there should be a continuance of the Energy Ethics Committee? At present, it is a Special Committee, therefore temporary,

FINANCE COMMITTEE

October 27, 1981

The Finance Committee met October 27, 1981 in the Edsel Room of the Holiday Inn in Valdosta, Ga. Present were Mesdames Leonard G. De Lamar, State Regent, James J. Muldrow, Louis C. Alderman, Jr., Thomas Knox Kendrick, A. C. Earl Shepherd, Heyward Vann and Jonathan Fox. The Chairman, Mrs. Fox, called the meeting to order at 4:00 p.m. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. Mrs. Muldrow, State Treasurer, reported on her conversation with Mr. John Singleton, accountant, concerning the tax status of our interest bearing accounts. Before they can be taxed, the ratio of interest earned to total receipts must remain below a certain percentage. The percentage fluctuates yearly and therefore no determination on tax status can be made prior to the audit. It was the feeling that our percentage ratio would remain well below the taxable level. Mrs. Muldrow also reported on her meeting with Mr. Singleton and paying him \$500 for his services as auditor. This is a budgeted item but Mr. Singleton had in the past given his services free.

Mrs. Muldrow reported receiving \$2983.81 during the summer for the Meadow Garden Capital Investment Trust Fund. She then gave each member a copy of the Summary of Funds. Discussion ensued on reinvestment of the Certificates of Deposit coming due next month. It was decided to place the Georgia Room funds in a separate certificate.

Discussion then followed on financing a gift shop at Meadow Garden. Mrs. Muldrow moved, seconded by Mrs. Alderman, to recommend to the Board of Management to advance \$1000.00 from the State General Savings Account from the certificate maturing 5 Nov. 1981 to Meadow Garden to help establish a gift shop and this will be repaid from sale of goods before a profit is declared. Motion passed. It was the consensus of the finance committee that the State Treasurer establish a separate account for the Meadow Garden Gift Shop.

The next order of business was the discussion of the resolution being presented to the Resolutions Committee recommending that our fiscal

year end on April 30 instead of May 31. This would expedite the closing of the books and the smooth passage of fiscal responsibility from one administration to another. Mrs. Kendrick moved, Mrs. Alderman seconded, to add our recommendation for passage of this resolution.

Meeting adjourned at 5:00 p.m.

March 17, 1982

The finance committee met at 4:00 p.m. in the Savannah Room of Dunfey's Hotel, Atlanta, Ga. Present were Mesdames Leonard G. De Lamar, State Regent, James T. Muldrow, Thomas Knox Kendrick, A. C. Earl Shepherd, Hayward Vann, George E. Stratman and Jonathan Fox. The chairman, Mrs. Fox, called the Meeting to order and read the minutes of the last meeting. Mrs. Muldrow, State Treasurer, distributed copies of the Summary of Funds. Repayment of the loan to the gift shop at Meadow Garden was discussed. Mrs. Kendrick moved that the loan of \$1000.00 for refurbishing gift items in the Meadow Garden Gift Shop given on October 27, 1981 be repaid in quarterly installments of \$250.00 beginning with September 1, 1982 until the loan is repaid. Motion seconded by Mrs. Stratman; carried. Discussion then centered on Certificate # 10639 which will come due before the end of the month. It was decided to reinvest all of the monies there except the Contingency Fund money and the Georgia Room money. Mrs. Kendrick moved the above, seconded by Mrs. Alderman; motion carried. A resolution concerning a gift of \$1.00 or more from each Georgia Daughter to the fund to help restore Mount Vernon as an appropriate gift to celebrate the 250th anniversary of George Washington's Birth was referred to the finance committee by the chairman of resolutions. After discussion, Mrs. Stratman moved, seconded by Mrs. Vann that we recommend passage of this resolution to the Resolutions Committee with the understanding that this be strictly voluntary on the part of the individual members and that a gift to this fund will appear on no required list of the Georgia State Society. Motion passed. Mrs. Shepherd brought to the attention of the committee that the funding of the State projects at Kate Duncan Smith DAR School was \$885.58 short of our commitment and at Berry was \$298.06 short of our commitment. As the time for the meeting had expired, the chairman declared the committee in recess until after the end of the Resolutions Committee meeting.

Meeting recessed at 5:00 p.m. Reconvened at 5:45 p.m. Continuing the discussion on how best to complete these two projects of the State Society, Mrs. Kendrick moved to present the problem to the conference and then to meet our commitment and make up the deficit out of the State Dues Fund. Mrs. Alderman seconded the motion; carried. Meeting adjourned at 5:50 p.m.

The drive to increase the funding of the Meadow Garden Capital Investment Trust Fund which was a project of this committee, was most successful in raising nearly \$15,000.00 since the last conference. MEADOW GARDEN BOARD MEETING

June 4, 1981

Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar, Georgia State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting of the Meadow Garden Board to order at 9:08 a.m. in Augusta at Meadow Garden on June 4, 1981. Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr. was asked to pray the opening prayer. Others present were Mrs. Lester Furman, State Chairman of Meadow Garden, and Mrs. Luther L. Watson, Honorary State Regent and Patrons Chairman.

Minutes of the March meeting were approved as read.

Mrs. Furman reported that pewter plates, silver inkstand, dishes, and wash stand have been placed in Meadow Garden and listed on the Fine Arts floater.

Mrs. De Lamar reported the need for a plumber to check for broken pipes under the cottage. She then distributed the State Treasurer's report on Meadow Garden accounts, which is attached.

Mrs. Alderman made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Watson and unanimously adopted, to increase the declaration of value on the Caretaker's Cottage to \$20,000 for insurance purposes and to change the name of owner to the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Mrs. Furman made a motion to ask tour visitors to make a donation of \$2.00 per adult, \$.50 per child under twelve, \$.25 each for groups of children, with Historic Augusta rates remaining at \$1.00 per person. Mrs. Watson seconded and the Board adopted.

Mrs. De Lamar shared correspondence concerning the closing of Fenwick Street and reported on the 22 pages of related information sent to Mr. Jerry Dye, of Augusta, our legal counsel, and reported on the meeting at Meadow Garden on June 3, 1981, with Mr. Dye, Mr. E. M. Gillespie, University Hospital Administrator, and Mr. C. O. Phillips, Executive Secretary to the Mayor and Clerk of the City Council.

A motion was made by Mrs. Alderman, seconded by Mrs. Watson and adopted, to sell butter chip dishes picturing Meadow Garden, with the profit to go to the Meadow Garden Capital Investment Fund.

Purchase of a green felt cloth (as used in Williamsburg) to protect the meeting room table when the table is in use was moved by Mrs. Alderman, seconded by Mrs. Watson and adopted.

Mrs. Watson moved and Mrs. Alderman seconded that Mobley Construction Company be contacted for a solution to the problem of water washing under the double front door in the basement. This was adopted.

The group moved outside to the front of Meadow Garden to examine problems of porch floor, columns and steps, loose catches on blinds, plywood under front steps, overhanging limbs, and missing shingles.

Mrs. Tucker brought refreshments to the picnic table, where the meeting was continued.

Mrs. Watson moved to authorize Mr. Dan Tucker to get three bids to purchase a lawn mower and a gas weeder. Mrs. Alderman seconded the motion, and it was adopted.

Mr. Tucker was asked to join the group and give his ideas concerning how to make Meadow Garden self supporting. He discussed a possible gift shop in the utility room and the possibility of special day events at Meadow Garden. Flag day, June 14, 1982, evolved as a possible day.

Mr. Tucker noted that 858 visitors have toured Meadow Garden in the past 11 months. He urged that a Meadow Garden brochure be placed in Welcome Centers, motels, etc.

The meeting was adjourned at 1:00 p.m.

MEADOW GARDEN BOARD MEETING

The Meadow Garden Board met on Monday, August 10, 1981, in the State Regent's room at La Quinta Motel in College Park. The meeting was called to order at 4:00 p.m. by the State Regent, Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar, who asked Mrs. R. Hugh Reid to open with prayer. Others present were Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr., Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox, Mrs. A. C. Earl Shepherd and Mrs. Frank G. Binford. Minutes of the June meeting were approved as corrected.

Mrs. De Lamar summarized agreements reached in further correspondence concerning the Fenwick Street closing as follows:

The Hospital Authority will remove the middle iron posts in Fenwick Street and connect a chain to the two outer posts to close the street. Chain will be secured by lock; key to be kept by Caretaker of Meadow Garden and by Richmond County Hospital Authority.

Hospital Authority will grant us access on Fenwick Street to 13th Street. If Fenwick Street is ever closed, an easement of thirty feet would be established to give a circular drive in front of Meadow Garden. The Hospital Authority will maintain the street in front of the nursing home.

Mrs. Reid made a motion to accept the recommendation of our attorney with the understanding that it is a first step toward recovering that portion of Fenwick Street and that portion between Fenwick Street and the canal. Mrs. Fox seconded the motion, which was adopted.

Mrs. De Lamar opened a discussion of "Meadow Garden Day" as a festive occasion of community activity in keeping with the period reflected at Meadow Garden. Mrs. Fox made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Shepherd, that the State Regent and State First Vice Regent be appointed as a committee to make preliminary plans for June 14, 1982. Adopted.

Mrs. De Lamar reported that three items are now ready for sale at Meadow Garden for the Meadow Garden Capital Investment Trust Fund:

Meadow Garden tote bags

Meadow Garden post cards

Georgia and the Revolution, Ronald G. Killion and Charles T. Waller Mrs. Fox made a motion that a gift shop be opened at Meadow Garden, with the profits to be applied to the Meadow Garden Capital Investment Trust Fund. Mrs. Binford seconded the motion, which was adopted.

Mrs. Reid pointed out the problem of poor drainage beneath the front porch and the clogged drainage grate on Nelson Street. These problems will be referred to Mrs. Furman.

It was the concensus to remove the kitchen curtains and leave the windows bare for the time being.

Mrs. De Lamar read for approval the history of Meadow Garden as compiled to be used in the book soon to be published, *History of the Georgia State Society*, 1899-1981.

Mrs. De Lamar reported plans to investigate renewing the copyright on the DAR Georgia Historic Map for reprinting the map to sell at Meadow Garden.

The State Treasurer's report on Meadow Garden funds was distributed. The meeting was adjourned at 5:45 p.m.

MEADOW GARDEN BOARD MEETING

On Tuesday, October 27, 1981, the Meadow Garden Board met in the State Regent's suite at the Holiday Inn in Valdosta. Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar, State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 1:30 p.m. Prayer was led by Mrs. R. Hugh Reid. Minutes of the August meeting were read and approved. Other members attending were Mesdames Louis C. Alderman, Jr., Luther L. Watson, Jonathan W. Fox, A. C. Earl Shepherd and Frank G. Binford.

Patrons Chairman Mrs. Watson planned to remind all attending the Fall Board of Management meeting that Patrons may be named by giving the designated amount to any one of the three Meadow Garden funds.

Furnishings Chairman Mrs. Binford reported that a member of Oglethorpe Chapter has offered a bed coverlet, said to be like one used on George Washington's bed. The coverlet is being sent to an appraiser for tax purposes.

Mrs. De Lamar reported on the status of the Historical Map of Georgia, for which the copyright was given to Savannah Chapter in 1949-1950.

Regent Miss Leila Sandlin was asked whether or not the copyright was renewed by Savannah Chapter, in view of the map's being reproduced and sold in the Meadow Garden gift shop, with the profit to benefit the Meadow Garden Capital Investment Trust Fund. A letter of response from Miss Sandlin was read, saying that an answer is forthcoming, pending a meeting of the Savannah Chapter Board.

Mrs. De Lamar said it is possible that one of two china pitchers, formerly owned by George Walton and given by the Georgia State Society to the NSDAR Museum, might be returned for display at Meadow Garden, according to the Curator General and the Curator of the NSDAR Museum.

Mrs. De Lamar reported that copies of pictures of Meadow Garden, believed to be dated between 1903 and 1920, are available from the State Archives.

Having agreed at our last meeting to allow Meadow Garden to be nominated as a National Historic Landmark, the Board heard a letter from Benjamin Levy, Acting Chief Historian, National Park Service, including a description of Meadow Garden, consent papers for signature, and nomination papers for use as designation for National Register of Historic Places. The Board agreed to use the description of Meadow Garden in our history, now being published.

Mrs. De Lamar read a letter from Mr. Rainwater, of Augusta, an official of Georgia Power Company, declining to publish brochures of Meadow Garden gratis, a practice which has been done in past similar situations, saying unless there is a rate change, this action would be financially

inappropriate.

Mr. De Lamar reported that our auditor advises a fixed asset file on items in Meadow Garden to record object, period, date acquired, cost (or market value, if a donated item), identifying number, restrictions on asset, and a good description, including donor's name and name in whose memory or honor the gift was made. We have also been advised to keep a file of written appraisal of each item purchased or acquired, such file to be kept in duplicate, with one copy being kept by the Chairman of the Board and one copy being kept by the Meadow Garden Chairman.

Mrs. Fox made a motion that a card file be established to document the furnishings of Meadow Garden. Mrs. Reid seconded, and the motion was

adopted.

Mrs. Watson made a motion, which was seconded by Mrs. Shepherd, that this file be kept in the custody of the State Regent. Adopted.

Mrs. De Lamar has been advised by Rollins Protective Service of a ten

percent increase, which will add \$2.60 to our monthly bill.

Mrs. De Lamar reported that Mr. Jerry Dye, our Augusta attorney, advises removing the blockade on Fenwick Street, as Fenwick Street has not been abandoned officially by the City of Augusta. Mr. Dye is still negotiating an agreement with the Hospital Authority.

Mrs. De Lamar announced that Augusta Chapter has paid to have the flag pole restrung. A fireman has offered to paint the pole for \$100. It was

agreed to wait until Spring to consider painting.

Mrs. Fox made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Reid, to have a bell and a sign saying "Ring the Bell" mounted on the gate. The motion was adopted.

Mrs. De Lamar reported that the caretakers have removed the kitchen curtains. The curtains are being cleaned and placed in the gift shop windows.

Mrs. Furman has resigned as Chairman of Meadow Garden because of

family responsibilities due to accident and illness.

Mr. Dan Tucker, caretaker, reported to Mrs. De Lamar that Mr. Lamb of Kings Mill has indicated he could get the loom set up in working order with the cost donated. Mr. Tucker also said the bed in the weaving room needs repair and a mattress and coverlet.

A successful report was given on the gift shop by Mrs. De Lamar. An inventory and record keeping system have been activated. New items for sale are being investigated. The Board agreed to go ahead with the sale of the note paper.

Mrs. Alderman reported paper items and prices available from the Charles H. Overly Studios, of Harvard, Massachusetts. The Board agreed to purchase the sale of matted prints of Meadow Garden at the present time.

Mrs. Reid reported 70 Georgia Daughters from 14 Chapters have contributed \$1110 to buy a bed for Meadow Garden in honor of Mrs. T. Earle Stribling.

The State Treasurer's report on all Meadow Garden funds was distributed. As there was no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 3:20 p.m.

MEADOW GARDEN BOARD MEETING

March 17, 1982

The Meadow Garden Board met on March 17, 1982, in the Savannah Room of Dunfey Atlanta Hotel in Atlanta. Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar, State Regent, presiding as Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 2:15 p.m. and asked Mrs. R. Hugh Reid to offer the opening prayer. Others attending were Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr., Mrs. Luther L. Watson, Mrs. A. C. Earl Shepherd, Mrs. Joseph P. Campbell, Jr., Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox and Mrs. Frank G. Binford. Minutes of the October meeting were approved as read.

Mrs. Watson reported that 102 patrons, the largest number for a one year period, would be presented certificates.

Mrs. Binford reported that she hoped to have placed in the house by June six Windsor chairs given by Mrs. Leonard J. Mederer through the General James Jackson Chapter and a bed from New England given by friends in honor of Mrs. T. Earle Stribling.

Mrs. De Lamar read a letter from Miss Leila Sandlin, Regent of Savannah Chapter, saying the Chapter wishes to retain ownership of the historical map of Georgia and will sell copies to the State Society to be sold in the Meadow Garden Shop to benefit the Meadow Garden Investment Trust Fund. They suggested that Chapters be encouraged to use the maps for various student awards.

Mrs. De Lamar displayed two pitchers that had belonged to George Walton and had been given by the State Society to the NSDAR Museum. The pitchers have now been returned for display at Meadow Garden.

New acquisition displayed were a pewter serving spoon (valued at \$125.00 and dated 1700-1740 from America or England) from John Clarke Chapter, (a duplicate was given to the NSDAR Museum) and a pewter tea pot from Barnard Trail Chapter.

Mrs. De Lamar was notified on February 4 that Meadow Garden has been officially named a National Historic Landmark. A certificate will be sent

later and application has been sent to the U.S. Department of the Interior for a bronze marker to be mounted at the front door.

Mrs. Binford reported that a coverlet donated by Mr. and Mrs. Dixon Wadsworth (Oglethorpe Chapter) in memory of his mother has been appraised as an 18th century coverlet and valued at \$500.00.

Mrs. De Lamar reported that the slide program of Meadow Garden has

been completed and will be shown here Friday afternoon.

The water wash under the front porch has been controlled and the duct has been supported where the partition was removed. The hole in the wall of lower hall has been patched.

Mrs. Binford reported that Mrs. McReynolds and Mrs. Reid accompanied her to Meadow Garden and helped exchange portraits, to place portrait of General Glascock in the reception room and portrait of George Washington

in the dining room.

Mrs. De Lamar said Hospital Authority has signed an agreement to remove the center posts on Fenwick Street, leaving locked chain across street, both parties to have a key. Should Fenwick Street ever be abandoned officially, Hospital Authority has agreed in writing to open a street across the front of Meadow Garden.

Mrs. Jerry Dye will change name of ownership to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, getting acknowledgement from the National Society. It was agreed by the Board to keep a separate deed on the later land purchases.

250th OBSERVANCE OF GEORGE WASHINGTON'S BIRTHDAY

Georgia chapters responded enthusiastically to the unprogrammed call to observe the 250th Anniversary of George Washington's birth. In imaginative and varied methods. George Washington's birthday was celebrated throughout the state. From the mountains to the sea, Georgia daughters, with dedicated patriotism, directed their efforts towards promoting the commemoration of this important occasion. With exciting programs, birthday parties, tree plantings and school and media communication, the birthday of the Father of our country was proclaimed. They made it an enjoyable occasion with festive meetings, special guests, members in costumes, birthday cakes and refreshments and decorations carrying out the theme. Cherries were served in great variety, with cherry pie and tarts the favorites. Music of the colonial period was played, special prayers loved by Washington were recited, and pieces of his favorite poetry were read. There were plays and vignettes written and performed by members. Flags were flown at members' homes, schools, public buildings, and at the entrance to St. Simons, an array of 75 flags greeted all visitors.

On TV, there were 79 announcements, with 77 members appearing and 200 minutes of time on air. On the radio, there were 505 announcements, 3 members were on 1 hour talk shows, for

a total air time of 546 minutes. There were 22 tree plantings, with cherry predominating.

A granite marker, commemorating the event, was donated by the Mayor of Elberton and placed on the City Square with the cherry tree planted. Two portraits of Washington were given to schools and 150 brochures distributed. One flag was given and 4 books, "George Washington Walked Here" by Mollie Somerville, were given to libraries. Chapters emphasized promotion of the anniversary at schools. Events at the schools included: sponsoring lookalike contest, poster contests, birthday party, and spot announcements on the school intercom.

Bylaws

BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II OBJECTS

The objects of the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution shall be: to promote the aims set forth in the Bylaws of the National Society; the preservation of the memory of its Revolutionary patriots; the study of its history; the education of its youth in patriotic ideals and in the duties of citizenship.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All Chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of this organization.

Article IV OFFICERS

The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Curator. The State Regent shall appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as adviser in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting.

Article V ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected at the annual State Conference biennially.

Section 2. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two years or until their successors are elected. Their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and of the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Section 3. No member shall be eligible to a State office until she has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years. No member shall be eligible to the same State office for two successive terms. A member having served more than one-half term in the State office shall be deemed to have served a term. Any member holding active membership in a Chapter in the Georgia State Society shall be eligible to hold a State office, provided she

has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years.

Section 4. Nominations of candidates for office shall be from the floor. The election shall be held by ballot. A majority of the votes cast by the voting members of the State Conference shall elect.

Section 5. Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become acting First Vice Regent, subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. A vacancy in any other State office between annual meetings shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next Fall Board of Management or State Conference, whichever shall come first. Any State Officer, who is absent from the State for a continuous period of six months or longer, automatically relinquishes her position as a State officer.

Section 6. No two State officers shall be members of the same Chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

Section 7. In recognition of valuable service to the organization, any State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary

State Regent by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Section 8. A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot. The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than fifteen months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

Section 9. On the election of State Regent, and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Recording Secretary General. The endorsement of a candidate for Vice President General shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent to the Recording Secretary General at least two weeks prior to Continental Congress.

Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, of the State Board of Management, and of the Executive Committee. She shall appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees.

Section 2. In the absence of the State Regent from any meeting of the State Conference, or the State Board of Management, the State First Vice Regent, or in her absence, the State Second Vice Regent, shall perform the duties of the State Regent. The State First and Second Vice Regents may be assigned to direct committees and to perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent.

Section 3. The State Chaplain shall open all meetings of the State Conference and of the State Board of Management with Scripture reading and prayer and shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require. She shall preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and shall be responsible for the In Memoriam pages in the Proceedings.

Section 4. The State Recording Secretary shall record the proceedings of the State Conference and of meetings of the State Board of Management and of the Executive Committee. She shall compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and of the Proceedings Committee.

Section 5. The State Corresponding Secretary shall conduct correspondence and send notices in behalf of the State Conference, the State Regent, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as directed by them.

Section 6. The State Treasurer shall be the custodian of the funds of the State Society. She shall receive the State Conference dues and registration fees from the Chapters and shall receive all sums contributed by the Chapters for State and National projects. All monies received by the State Treasurer shall be placed only in institutions with accounts covered by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation or by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation, and the amount in any one institution shall not exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage. She shall disburse such sums only when authorized by the State Regent in writing. The State Treasurer shall keep an account of all sums received or paid out and shall keep receipts for all payments. She shall prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference. Her books shall be audited annually by a Certified Public Accountant. She shall be ex-officio a member of the Credentials Committee.

Section 7. The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new Chapters.

Section 8. The State Registrar shall, when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, who live in towns and counties in which there are no Chapters, to prove eligibility, and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars in verifying lineage papers. She shall keep a correct list of all members in the State and shall make a report on membership to the State Conference.

Section 9. The State Historian shall be in charge of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General. She shall keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves in the State and shall prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General to Smithsonian Institution. She shall encourage the compilation and publication of County Histories and other unpublished records, especially those of the Revolutionary period.

Section 10. The State Librarian shall collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing duplicates, wherever possible, in the NSDAR Library and in the Georgia DAR Collections in the State Department of Archives and History. She shall endeavor to obtain the books on the wanted list of the Librarian General for the Georgia Section in the NSDAR Library and is authorized to solicit contributions from the Chapters for the purchase of the same. She shall have custody and supervision of the DAR Genealogical and Historical Collections of the State Department of Archives and History.

Section 11. The State Curator shall receive and be responsible for all gifts of Revolutionary relics to the Museum of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution. She shall be the custodian of the conference properties and shall have them properly stored, insured and made ready for use at State Conference.

Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. The Georgia State Society shall hold an annual State Conference between the first day of February and the time of the meeting of the Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week. The Executive Committee shall fix the time and place of meetings when not fixed by the Conference in session, or when for any reason it may be impracticable to meet at the time or place fixed by the Conference.

Section 2. The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credential blanks to the Chapters not less than sixty days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 3. The voting members of the State Conference shall be State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regent or alternate, and the delegates or their alternates from the Chapters of the state, that are entitled to representation at the Continental Congress. The number of representatives from each Chapter shall be determined by the rules for representation of Chapters in the Continental Congress as given in the National Bylaws.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a Chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the Chapter, except in the case of the Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. No member shall hold, at the same time, two offices carrying a vote at the annual State Conference.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any Chapter in the State of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference the privileges of the floor shall be accorded to the State Chairmen with the exception that they may not vote unless they are duly elected delegates or their alternates from their respective chapters.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen days notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Twenty-five voting members, representing not less than ten Chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII STATE DUES AND CONFERENCE FEES

Section 1. The annual dues of Chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be two dollars for each member of the Chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1. A minimum of at least 72 cents shall be used to cover all State per capita assessments, and the balance shall be allocated to the General State Dues Fund. No Chapter shall be entitled to representation at the annual State Conference until the State dues are paid.

Section 2. The Finance Committee, appointed by the State Regent, shall be composed of seven members, to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two Honorary State Regents, one active Chapter Regent, and one active Chapter member. This

committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund.

Section 3. Each Chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State Dues, a Conference registration fee of \$3.00 for each voter to which the Chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Section 4. State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$3.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference fee at the time of registration.

Article IX EXPENSES

Section 1. One thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) shall be taken each year from the State Dues Fund, to be used by the State Regent in defraying her necessary travel expenses.

Section 2. Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent shall be paid by the State Treasurer from the State Dues Fund.

Article X STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regents of the Chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the Fall, following the regular meeting of the National Board. It may meet whenever called by the State Regent.

Section 3. Ten members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference.

Section 5. State Chairmen, Vice Chairmen and Committee Members of National and Standing Committees shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privileges of the floor, but may not vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article XI EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of he Georgia State Society shall constitute an Executive Committee. The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, attends the meetings of the Executive Committee, but may not vote. This Committee performs such duties of the Board between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient. The Executive Committee shall meet the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three members of the Committee. It shall make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

Article XII CHAPTERS

Section 1. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April or May. The Chapter Regent shall report the names of the elected officers promptly, on triplicate blanks provided by the State Regent for this purpose, to the Organizing Secretary General, to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary.

Section 2. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent for use in compiling her report, not less than fifteen days before the opening of the annual State Conference. The official Chapter report, not to exceed 250 words in length, for publication in the Proceedings shall be furnished the State Recording Secretary before the State Conference.

Article XIII AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent and to the Parliamentarian. The State Regent shall send a copy to each Chapter and each voting member, at least sixty days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law for the State Conference in matters not covered by the Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21.) No conference was held in 1911; the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912"; amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta, "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, p. 211.)

Awards

All chapters competing for awards must send reports to the respective chairmen by February 1, 1983.

All reports for awards are based on membership confirmed by the National Society as of February 1 of preceding year (1982). SEE FIGURE BESIDE CHAPTER NAME IN CHAPTER REGENTS DIRECTORY.

Bylaws

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National and State Bylaws.

Change of Address

Notice of change of address of members shall be sent to the Organizing Secretary General, Treasurer General, State Regent and State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

Change of Name

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to State Registrar, Treasurer General and State Regent by the Chapter Treasurer.

Chapter Elections

As soon as Chapter elections are held, names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, Administration Building, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D. C. 20006, to the State Regent, and to the Recording Secretary by May 1st. The full Christian name of Chapter officers shall be given together with her husband's given name or initials, address and zip code. A Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years. This is being added in order for our Bylaws to conform to the National Bylaws.

Dues

Pay to State Treasurer State Dues of \$2.00 per member before December 1. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the February 1 and two April Board meetings of the National Society. National Dues of \$10.00 per member sent to the Treasurer-General, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D. C. 20006 before December 1, 1982.

Conference Registration Fee

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer with the State dues on or before December 1, \$3.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Rules for representation of chapters at Continental Congress:

"Chapters having less than 50 paid members on February 1 are entitled

to be represented by the Regent or in her absence the Vice Regent or alternate; chapters having 50 to 199 paid members on February 1, one delegate in addition to the Regent; chapters having 200 to 299 paid members on February 1, two delegates in addition to the Regent, and for each additional 100 members one additional delegate..." (Article XIII, Section 3-C, National Bylaws.)

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$3.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. (Article VIII, Section 4, of the State Bylaws.)

Contributions

ALL contributions by Chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

Deceased Members

Deaths shall be reported promptly to Treasurer General, State Chaplain and State Registrar by the Corresponding Chapter Officer. Complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and a date of death shall be furnished State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for Conference Memorial Service and "In Memoriam" pages for State Proceedings.

Georgia Hospitality Fund

The following resolution which applies to the Georgia Hospitality Fund

appears in the Proceedings for 1955:

"WHEREAS, The Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds an annual dinner in Washington during Continental Congress, which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society.

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$150.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes:

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this fund shall not be cumulative. Adopted."

Procedure Book of Instructions for Officers and State Chairmen

The following resolution which applies to a Procedure Book of Instruction for Officers and State Chairmen appears in the Proceedings for 1959-60, Page 41.

"RESOLVED, That all Officers and State Chairmen keep a Procedure Book of Instructions and helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new Officer and Chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities thus providing a continuing continuity of DAR work, ADOPTED."

Genealogical Records

To insure uniformity and convenience in binding, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, $8\frac{1}{2}$ by 11 inches, with $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 inch margin

on left side, 1½ inches at top and 1 inch on right side and at bottom. Four copies shall be sent to State Chairman of Genealogical Records.

Information for Chapter Regents

1. All letters received by Chapter Regents relating to the work of the Society shall be distributed to the corresponding Chapter Chairman and brought to the attention of the members at a chapter meeting.

2. Please follow Resolution No. 11, adopted at 61st Georgia Society State Conference, as follows: "Resolved, That a closing date of February 1 be established for all reports, and all reports be given from February 1 to February 1, regardless of a change of regime or Regent." All awards will be made on this date basis.

State Officers and State Chairmen shall send to the State Regent and to the State Treasurer a copy of any instruction letter mailed to chapters.

New Administration Reserve for Contingencies Fund

For the entire resolution setting up the "General New Regime Fund Balance of \$2500.00," found on pp. 203-204 of the 1979 Proceedings the following substitute resolution was adopted by the Board of Management: RESOLVED that at the end of each administration \$4000.00 be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies" fund, this money to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration, and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration. All other surplus monies in the General Fund, other than funds which are designated, are to be divided equally between the General Savings Account and the Meadow Garden Capital Investment Fund, as provided in the Capital Investment Fund Resolution passed in 1979 (pp. 62-63, 1979 Proceedings). This transaction is to be handled by May 31st every two years before the auditors close out the books of an administration, thus making the General Fund show the same balance of \$4000.00 at the beginning of each new administration. (This fund to be known as the "New Administration Reserve for Contingencies Fund.") Adopted.

Nominations

The following resolution which applies to the announcement of the can-

didacy for State Regent appears in the Proceedings of the Twentieth State Conference, 1918:

"Resolved, that it is the judgment of the Executive Board that announcements for State Regent should not be made . . . earlier than three months prior to the meeting of the Conference and they shall be furnished to the Press for publication."

State Officers and State Chairmen's Reports are due on or before February 15.

A standard HEADING of ALL reports must conform to the Headings found in the Proceedings and must start at least 1½ inches from top of sheet of paper. Leave 1 inch between bottom of Headings and start of report. LEFT MARGIN of report must be 1 inch minimum. Please check previous Proceedings for correct heading. Entire report should consist of one paragraph. Winners of awards of State Officers and State Chairmen shall be listed on a SEPARATE sheet of paper. State Officers and State Chairmen send to the State Recording Secretary and the State Regent, the awards to be given next year on a SEPARATE sheet of paper — exactly as it is to be printed in the Proceedings.

Date for Annual Audit

WHEREAS, every effort must be made to have all material to the printer as early as possible to facilitate delivery of the Proceedings to the members, RESOLVED: That the end of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR fiscal year for audit purposes be changed from May 31st to April 30th.

Absolute Deadline for Proceedings Material

WHEREAS, a definite deadline must be established and adhered to for all reports and material to be in the hands of the Proceedings Committee in order to be delivered to the Printer by June 1st,

RESOLVED: That all FINAL reports and materials must be received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1st with the exception of the Auditor's report and any information sent out by the National DAR Headquarters. This does not alter the requirement in the "Items of Information" in the Proceedings that all reports shall be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary on or before Februry 15th, the ORIGINAL being sent to the Secretary for the Proceedings.

AND FURTHER RESOLVED: This policy will be strictly adhered to and the material not received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1st will be omitted from the Proceedings.

Reaffirmation

RESOLVED: That the Georgia State Society reaffirm the following Resolution adopted at the Fall Board of Management in Albany, October 23, 1981, which reads as follows: "Presentation of Awards" WHEREAS, all awards are given by State Officers and State Chairmen; and, WHEREAS, February first is the closing date of all work for said awards; BE IT RESOLVED: That no State Officer nor State Chairman may present her report or award(s) at State Conference unless said report, with list of award(s) is in the hands of the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary at least ten (10) days before State Conference.

Resolutions

Resolutions to be considered by the Committee shall be typed, with a heading giving subject of the resolution, signed, and sent to the Chairman of the Resolutions Committee two weeks before the date of the State Conference.

Gold Honor Roll Stars

A Gold Star is awarded when a chapter achieves the National Gold Honor Roll three consecutive years. For each additional three consecutive years, another Gold Star is awarded. If a chapter fails to achieve Gold Honor Roll any year, all stars are lost as they are awarded for consecutive achievement. National Honor Roll creditation comes from the National Chairman of the National Honor Roll Committee.

Waite seconded and the officers were elected unanimously for 1982-1984.

Mrs. Raiferd Drew conducted the installation of the new officers.
