MEADOW GARDEN FESTIVAL

Augusta June 19, 1982

The first annual Meadow Garden Festival, sponsored by the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, was held in Augusta, Georgia, June 19, 1982, at the home of George Walton, one of the three signers of the Declaration of Independence from Georgia.

There were 350 Georgia Daughters and guests present, many wearing Colonial costumes, representing 65 Chapters.

Activities began at 10:00 A.M. with Dorothy Walton's Attic, George Walton's Garden, the Colonial Kitchen, the Book Nook, Arts and Crafts Booths, and the Blood Pressure Clinic open for business.

The first event of the day was Youth Competition conducted by the Meadow Garden Society, C.A.R., Rob Dennis, Chairman. Competition included beanbag, dress-up, potato, and running relays, tug-of-war, 50 and 100 yard dash.

At 12:00 noon Augusta civic leaders assembled on the porch platform for a speaking ceremony with the State Regent, Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, presiding. The invocation was given by Mrs. James J. Four entries were received for the Religious Wall-Hanging Sampler Contest. Philadelphia Winn Chapter was judged the State winner and this Sampler was forwarded to National Headquarters for further competition.

The State Recording Secretary reported having received Chapter Regent's reports from all but 2 chapters.

State Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Frank R. Radford, stated that the

State Regent's letter had been received promptly except in the Atlanta area. She distributed a list of changes for the Proceedings and announced she had Award Certificates for sale at 10° each.

This Award will be presented at the Opening Banquet. There are 207 remaining copies of the original 500 printed, of *The History of the Georgia State Society*.

Librarian Mrs. Charles W. Ennis was not present due to illness.

Curator Mrs. Peter S. Hanf reported that all property items of the Georgia State Society were at the Conference and in their proper places.

Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr., State Regent, made several announcements, including hospitality plans for distinguished Conference guests. She reported an increase in the number of reports received and said a check list of required reports would be included in the Regent's Packet next year. *The Press Book* is ready for National judging and Mrs. Thomas R. Burnett is commended for an excellent job.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:00 A.M.

Mrs. Hubert R. Martin, State Parliamentarian, was presented and read Article X, Sections 1, 2, and 5 of the Bylaws which pertain to the State Board of Management.

Mrs. Sam H. Black, Credentials Chairman, gave the first report. With 116 members of the State Board of Management registered, a quorum was established. Mrs. J. L. R. Boyd, Timekeeper, was presented. The Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Frank R. Radford, called attention to the necessary corrections in the 1981-1982 Proceedings of the Georgia State Society.

Mrs. A. C. Earl Shepherd, First Vice Regent, took the chair while the State Regent reported on the work of the Society. Mrs. Alderman reminded the assembly of Honor Roll requirements, announced work had begun on the Semiquincentenary Landscaping Project at Meadow Garden, remarked that visits to the Northeast and Northwest Districts had been successful and enjoyable, and stated that attending National Board had been a memorable experience. She announced the confirmation of the Sukey Hart Chapter at Warner Robbins, October 7, 1982, Mrs. W. F. Daniels, Jr., Regent, making the 107th. Chapter in the State Society.

The State Regent resumed the chair, presented the State Officers who gave their report:

Mrs. A. C. Earl Shepherd, State First Vice Regent and National Defense Chairman, urged the awarding of ROTC medals and reminded the delegation of National Defense requirements for Honor Roll attainment. She presented the National Defense Committee Vice-Chairmen and noted that Congressional redistricting had resulted in changes and all Vice-Chairmen had been notified.

Mrs. Allen L. Brewer, State Second Vice Regent and DAR School Chairman, reported on visits to Tamassee and Kate Duncan Smith Schools. She stressed the importance of DAR continuing to provide educational opportunities and requested that Chapters keep schools in mind as they delegate funds. She called attention to the approved schools: Berry, Hillside, Hindman, and Crossnore. Mrs. Brewer stated that schools still have need of new and used clothing and are continuing to collect trading stamps. The State school projects for the year have been chosen with great care and consideration.

Mrs. James J. Muldrow, Chaplain, requested that the Chapter Chaplains include zip code in the address of the "next of kin" when reporting the death of a member. Entries for the Religious Wall-Hanging Needle Work Sampler Contest must include the word Love and be sent to the State Chaplain by December 15. Chapter Chaplains should send reports by January 10.

Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Frank R. Radford, reported that the State's 3rd. Class mail-outs should require no more than 4 days for delivery.

Treasurer, Mrs. Donald D. Hankinson, distributed a letter of clarification from Mrs. Richard H. Thompson, Jr., Treasurer General, relating to the Internal Revenue Service. Copies of the proposed budget and summary of accounts were also distributed. The Treasurer reminded the assembly that dues are due by December 1, 1982.

Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox, Chairman, Finance Committee, presented the proposed Budget and by direction of the Finance Committee, moved its adoption. The motion carried. At the request of the State Regent Mrs. Fox outlined the importance of every Chapter's adopting a budget.

Organizing Secretary, Mrs. Ned L. Shuman, announced the confirmation of Sukey Hart Chapter, Warner Robbins, October 7, 1982. Mrs. W. F. Daniels, Jr., Organizing Regent, was presented. Mrs. Shuman requested suggestions of locations for new chapters and emphasized the importance

of keeping existing chapters strong and vital.

Mrs. Jerido Ward, Registrar, reminded Chapter Treasurers to send the Registrar one copy of the computer print-out with corrections and Chapter Registrars to notify State Registrar and Treasurer General's office of all changes in status of membership. As Chairman of the Correspondent Docents Committee she reported the availability of a slide program featuring the 30 period rooms of the Museum. Mrs. Hanf asked for volunteers to serve as Docents. This concluded the reports of officers.

The assembly was led in singing the Hymn of the Year, "Love Divine, All Loves Excelling," by Mrs. Herman M. Richardson, accompanied by Mrs. Lamb.

The meeting continued with reports from State Chairmen:

Americanism and DAR Manual for Citizenship Chairman, Mrs. Hodges, stated that the goal of this committee is to assist native and foreign born individuals to become better citizens and stressed the importance of informed citizenship.

Conservation Chairman, Mrs. William Christie Lord, encouraged the use of feeders and bird houses to attract bluebirds, reported the planting of a tree commemorating George Washington's birthday and stated that the Georgia State Society had received a plaque, in 1981, for the number of trees planted.

DAR Good Citizens Chairman, Mrs. R. H. Deen, Jr., was not present but the committee Vice Chairmen were introduced. Pins and certificates were available.

DAR Magazine Advertising Chairman, Mrs. Thorne S. Winter, commended the 91 Chapters that contributed \$10,930.00 in advertising for the Legacy Issue. The February issue is the next DAR Magazine designated for Georgia advertising.

State Chairmen's reports continued with DAR Museum, Mrs. Alvin G. Turley, Chairman, asking chapters to contribute generously to the Library Research Fund; DAR Service for Veteran Patients, Mrs. Edward E. McBride, Chairman, stressed the need for Volunteers; Flag of the United States of America Chairman, Mrs. Zay, urged special projects and programs for Flag Day; Genealogical Records Chairman, Mrs. Charles S. Kirkland, stressed the use of the correct type of paper and proper margin space for acceptable records.

Junior American Citizens, Mrs. W. Elton Corbitt, Chairman, requested use of special materials for Clubs such as buttons, membership cards and handbook. She asked that reports be sent in on time. Junior Membership Chairman, Mrs. Buxton L. Daniel, made a plea for more Junior Members, noted December 6 as deadline for Outstanding Junior nominees and stated that crafts will be sold at State Conference benefiting the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund. Lineage Research Chairman, Mrs. George W. Murphy, reminded the assembly that DAR assisted in research for new members and

suggested that Chapters have Workshops on such research. Membership Chairman, Mrs. E. Lee Stephenson, reported 41 new members and 17 reinstatements at the National Board in October.

Motion Picture, Radio and T.V. Chairman, Mrs. George Wing, urged members to write program sponsors expressing either praise or criticism. She reminded members to view Bruce Cotton's "The Blue and the Gray." National Honor Roll Chairman, Dr. Jessie Mize, hopes for 100% reporting. Requirements are to be found in the May issue of the DAR Magazine and in the Georgia State Proceedings. Press Book Chairman, Mrs. Thomas R. Burnett, needs news clippings from each of the 107 Chapters to compile a Scrapbook for competition in the National Society. Public Relations Chairman, Mrs. Alex S. Boyer, Jr., urged DAR to tell about its good deeds. The Chairman stated that a Guide to Public Relations may be purchased from the National Society and noted deadlines for Feature Stories and Series of Articles competition. Seimes Microfilm Center Chairman, Mrs. Gerald G. Fling, suggested the gift of lifetime membership as a wonderful way to honor outstanding members and stated that contributing to the Center is an Honor Roll requirement. Transportation and Safety Chairman, Mrs. James L. Quackenbush, announced plans for the DAR Bus Trip to Continental Congress in April, to Meadow Garden in May and the possibility of one to Columbus for State Conference. She asked Chapters to plan programs on Safety.

Reports were heard from the Special National committees:

Energy Ethics Committee Chairman, Mrs. Fred L. Miller, Jr., remarked that this new committee related to a very vital issue of our time, asked Regents to appoint Chapter Chairmen and to report work by February. Friends of the Museum Committee Chairman, Mrs. W. Lamar Harrell, appealed for contributions. Mrs. Coney B. Padgett, Insignia Chairman, urged members to order insignia, to wear it proudly and correctly. A slide program on insignia is available. NSDAR Fifty Year Club Chairman, Mrs. Hugh Peterson, Sr., asked for the names of 50-year members. President General's Project Chairman, Mrs. A. Lawrence Liles, reported on the importance of a Legacy Preserved. Protocol Chairman, Mrs. Louis Joseph Bahin, requested all members to observe DAR protocol.

Mrs. James J. Leitch, Recording Secretary, called the roll.

Reports continued from State Standing Committees:

Bylaws Chairman, Mrs. Herman M. Richardson, reminded the assembly that State Bylaws must conform to National Bylaws and no vote is required. Copies of Amendments to the Bylaws of the National Society were distributed relative to Articles IV, XI, XIV, and XVI. In Article XII, Section I, of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, it is recommended that the words "or May" be struck, making the first sentence read: "Chapter Elections shall be held no later than April."

Coordinator of Districts, Mrs. John Singleton, reported 612 members in attendance, 94 Chapters represented and 89 Regents present at District Workshops. Northeast District Director, Mrs. Moody C. Summers, reported all but 3 Chapters represented; Northwest District Director, Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall, reported an attendance of 181 in Atlanta; Southeast District Director, Mrs. Robert G. Fountain, reported 136 present and packets distributed; Southwest District Director, Mrs. William F. Daniels, Sr., reported good representation with the new Chapter Sukey Hart in attendance.

Collecting and Publishing Revolutionary Soldiers' History Chairman, Mrs. Charles R. Simmons, Jr., asked that the names of Chapter Chairmen be sent to her. DAR Bookplates Chairman, Mrs. Russell B. Gladding, urged use of Bookplates when books are donated. Georgia Day, 1983, Semi-quincentenary Chairman, Miss Sandlin, stated that Savannah would be the focal point of Georgia Day Celebration. Mrs. Hugh Peterson, Chairman of the Georgia State Room, DAR Museum, remarked that the Corner Cabinets were in place and 4 chairs were being considered for purchase. Parliamentarian, Mrs. Martin, stated that Bylaws should provide that "Chapter Regents shall hold office for 2 (or 3) years or until a successor is elected." The Co-Parliamentarian, Mrs. Herman M. Richardson, was recognized. Proceedings Committee Chairman, Mrs. Arthur H. Waite, expressed appreciation to Mrs. Allen L. Brewer for a job well done as Recording Secretary

and in compiling the Proceedings for the past 2 years.

A resolution was presented regulating membership of the Meadow Garden Board. This Resolution is to be taken under advisement and voted on at the 86th. State Conference.

Miss Mary Anna Leroy, Chairman of Tellers, and her committee were recognized. Textbook Study Chairman, Mrs. Heyward Vann, suggested that Chapters appoint committees to know teachers and observe textbooks in use.

Reports of the State Standing Committee Chairmen continued: Mrs. Herman M. Richardson, Chairman of Bylaws Committee, read by the direction of the Committee a proposed amendment and moved its adoption: Article XII, Section I, Page 199, Proceedings of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, 1981-1982:

CHAPTERS

To amend Article XII, Section 1, first sentence, by striking out the words "or May". Article XII, Section 1, first sentence will then read, "Chapter elections shall be held no later than April". The motion was adopted.

Mrs. Charles R. Simmons, Jr., Chairman Collecting and Publishing Histories of Revolutionary Soldiers, reported having received 855 pages from 15 Chapters relating to this project. Mrs. Robert L. Mrs. Alfred Harms, Regent Savannah Chapter, read an invitation from Bonaventure Chapter, Mrs. Lindsay J. Anderson, Regent, Lachlan McIntosh Chapter, Mrs. B. F. Malac, Regent, and the Savannah Chapter for the 86th State Conference to be held in Savannah, March 8, 9, and 10, 1934. The invitation was accepted with pleasure.

It was reported that Mrs. Binford had donated shutters to complete the window treatment at Meadow Garden. Also, Mr. Binford and many friends donated generously toward furnishing the Boys Bedroom, honoring Mrs. Binford. The Savannah Chapter purchased an 18th Century print, which will be hung in the Master Bedroom, honoring Mrs. Harold I. Tuthill. Mrs. John R. Williamson announced the Meadow Garden Festival, May 14, 1983, urging everyone to come and dress in costume. Mrs. Harold Starr Smith, Chairman Meadow Garden Docents, thanked John Franklin Wren and College Hills Chapters for their participation and requested more volunteers. Meadow Garden Gift Shop Chairman, Miss Elizabeth Stone, urged everyone to come to the Gift Shop and take home souvenirs. Mrs. Luther L. Watson, Chairman Meadow Garden Landscaping, stated that \$9,287 had been received for the Semiquincentenary Project and reported on Professor Water's plans for restoration and landscaping. RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED EIGHTY-FIFTH STATE CONFERENCE MARCH 11, 1983 COLUMBUS, GEORGIA

RESOLUTION RESCINDING THE COMPOSITION OF THE MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

WHEREAS the functions and duties of the Meadow Garden Board, as created by Resolution adopted at the 64th Annual State Conference of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, in 1962, have grown and diversified these past two decades; and,

WHEREAS, the need for clarification of responsibilities of the members of the Meadow Garden Board needs to be more clearly defined; therefore, BE IT RESOLVED that the Resolution concerning the Meadow Garden Board as adopted in 1962, with amendment to said Resolution adopted in 1963, be rescinded and replaced by the following Resolution.

RESOLUTION CREATING THE COMPOSITION OF THE MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

RESOLVED that the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, designate as members of the Meadow Garden Board the following:

- 1. The three (3) Trustees as named in the deed from the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, conveying Meadow Garden to the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, namely, the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent, and the State Chairman of Meadow Garden who is appointed by the State Regent.
- 2. The Chapter Regents of the Augusta Chapter and the College Hill Chapter, both Chapters being located in Augusta; these two (2) Chapter Regents shall serve as Vice Chairmen to the State Chairman of Meadow Garden.
- 3. Four of the chairmen of Meadow Garden Committee as appointed by the State Regent; no Georgia Daughter shall serve in the same Meadow Garden Chairmanship more than two (2) consecutive terms.
- 4. Of the five (5) appointments made by the State Regent at least two (2) shall be Honorary State Regents.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:

- The State Second Vice Regent shall serve as an ex-officio member of the Meadow Garden Board, being given the privilege of the floor without a vote.
- 2. At the invitation of the Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board, chairmen of Meadow Garden Committees not holding a vote on the Meadow Garden Board may attend meetings of the Meadow Garden Board for the purpose of presenting plans and advising the members of the Board ways in which the Board members can assist their respective committees.
- 3. Officers of the Board shall be the Chairman and the Secretary. The State Regent shall serve as Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board, and the State First Vice Regent shall serve as Secretary of the Meadow Garden Board.
- 4. The Meadow Garden Board shall meet a minimum of three (3) times each year, namely, preceding Fall Board of Management meeting, preceding annual State Conference and following Continental Congress,

and at such other times as deemed necessary by the Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board. At least one (1) meeting of the Board shall be held

at Meadow Garden each year.

5. The Meadow Garden Board shall have jurisdiction over the operation, maintenance, and work of Meadow Garden and shall be the authority for Meadow Garden so long as such authority is not in conflict with the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, the Act of Incorporation for the Georgia State Society, Resolutions adopted by the Georgia State Society and/or directions which from time to time may be approved by action of the Georgia State Society assembled at its annual State Conference.

6. Five (5) voting members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.

7. This resolution, when adopted, shall become effective at the close of the 86th Annual State Conference of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution.

RESOLUTION HONORING MRS. FRANK G. BINFORD

The Chairman's gift of a \$100 scholarship to each school was given in honor of Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr., Regent of the Georgia State Society, and of the Chairman's Daughter, Mrs. Donald Douglas Duncan, Regent of the California State Society.

The first-place award of \$10 to the Chapter submitting the best overall report on a per capita basis goes to the Joseph Habersham Chapter. AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP

Annual reports were received from 80 chapters, 67 chapters reported repeating the American's Creed at every meeting and 41 chapters devoted at least one chapter meeting to an Americanism program. Americanism talks to other organizations were given by 9 chapters and 9 programs were presented on radio and/or TV. 7 chapters studied the Immigration Act or other Immigration material; 11 chapters sponsored Americanism essays and poster contests in schools. 957 DAR Manuals were given to applicants for American Citizenship and for use in Americanization classes; 27 purchased for use in high schools, 78 placed in libraries, 28 given to youth groups and 5 for other uses. 12 members were reported teaching or working with Americanization classes and 71 hours given serving in this committee to reduce illiteracy. 63 members attended Naturalization Courts from 13 chapters and 4 chapters arranged for young persons to attend Naturalization Ceremonies. New citizens were presented 89 flags of the USA, 191 flag codes, 586 welcome cards, 85 American Creed cards, 159 patriotic leaflets and pamphlets. The 3 Columbus chapters as a joint project took photographs of newly naturalized citizens on the steps of the Federal Courthouse and sent prints to all who requested them.

CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

The State Project — Membership and CAR participation with DAR, SAR, and SR — was carried out in a grand manner. According to National Headquarters, Georgia had a net gain in membership. Superb reports were received concerning CAR participation with DAR, SAR, and SR.

Three State meetings were held beginning with a most profitable Workshop held in the Atlanta area in August. Seventy-eight members and seniors attened the workshop. Next came Government Studies Seminar on the beautiful campus of Middle Georgia College in Cochran, on October 30. The unique Columbus Ironworks Convention and Trade Center is the site for the 1983 State Conference.

In addition to these meetings, a Georgia delegation of thirty-seven attended the Southeastern Region meeting in Birmingham, Ala., in July and National Convention in Washington, D.C., was attended by a total of thirteen representatives from Georgia.

DAR Chapters were contacted during the year with a view to organizing a CAR Society. One society organized and had their first meeting on the 250th Anniversary of the founding of Georgia. One society reorganized, two have names approved in preparation for organizing, four more are preparing to form societies and one more preparing to reorganize.

At least six societies visited Tamassee and carried clothing, gifts and TV stamps, others mailed theirs. National and State guidelines were followed in planning programs. Four issues of the CAR news sheet, "CARgoes," were printed and approximately 1,800 were mailed. Radio, TV, and newspapers were used in order to publicize CAR.

This chairman thanks our gracious State Regent and all members for your support.

CONSERVATION

The efforts of the DAR members were tremendously appreciated in the 97 chapter reports that were received. First should be mentioned the Georgia Semiquincentenary Landscape project at Meadow Garden. \$9,082.88 was the total given by our Daughters to help restore the landscape. 4 chapters observed Conservation Day. 10 chapters observed fire prevention week. 9 chapters observed Arbor Day. The Georgia Daughters planted 452,818 trees, 450,000 pines, 1,513 dogwood, 1,305 mixed varieties. 28½ acres of wild flowers were planted. 18 chapters fed wild animals. 44 chapters fed birds with approximately 191 birdhouses built, 112 feeders and wildlife were fed as quail, deer, turkey, squirrel, Canadian geese and duck. 28 trees were planted in honor of George Washington.

7,400 pounds of birdseed was sold with profits going to DAR projects.

There were 30 programs on Conservation.

The Conservation Award goes to Nancy Hart Chapter for the opening of the William Bartram Nature Study Trail on the Fort Wilkinson property owned by the Nancy Hart Chapter. They preserve and restore the types of wildlife appropriate to the time of his travels in 1775. Honorable mention goes to Xavier Chapter which sold over 6,000 pounds of birdseed contributing their profits to KDS, Tamassee, Meadow Garden Landscaping, and placing DAR markers on 21 unmarked graves. It also goes to the John Franklin Wren Chapter for contributing \$1,000 to the Memorial Cemetery fund for clean-up and giving 500 dogwood and 500 pines with the garden club to the city of Wrens.

DAR GOOD CITIZENS

Each winner received a \$10 award from the State Society. Shirley Rholetter was chosen the State Good Citizen. She received a \$100 Educational Award and a State Good Citizen pin. She was entered in competition in the

National Southeastern Division.

DAR MAGAZINE

Reports were received from 99 chapters representing 7,455 members. The total number of subscriptions was reported as 2,195, which is 29.44% of the membership — a slight increase over last year. There were 325 new subscriptions and 118 gift subscriptions. 83 chapters met Honor Roll requirements. 16 chapters had 40% or more subscribers. Those chapters having 50% or more subscribers are: Governor George W. Towns - 50%, John Ball — 50%, Captain Thomas Cobb — 53%, Edmund Burke — 53%, Hancock — 54%, Kettle Creek — 58%, Philadelphia Winn — 66%, Roswell King — 67%, and Captain Edward Hagin — 81%. The Georgia State Society had 100% chapter participation for 1982-83. One hundred chapters attained honor roll status. Twenty-nine full pages related to Georgia chapters and Georgia State Society. Fifty-one chapters participated in co-op ads. Sixty chapters placed chapter ads in the magazine. Of this amount \$492 was designated for the General Fund; \$93 to Textile Storage; \$49 to air conditioning the Museum; \$84 to Cataloging Fund; \$51 to Museum Research Fund; and \$368 was designated for State Room Fund. One individual sponsor gift of \$50 was sent by Fort Peachtree Chapter. One gift of Chinese export porcelain bowls and other serving dishes made around 1770 was given through General James Jackson Chapter. Ten other DAR Museum Gift Forms denote Georgia State Society as donor.

Twelve full programs and 16 partial programs on the DAR Museum were given. Having corresponding museum docents available to give programs illustrated with slides creates interest in this phase of DAR work.

In compliance with a request from the Curator General, the Georgia State Society sent an authentic, carefully made copy of the first Girl Scout uniform which was designed and created by Mrs. Juliette Gordon Low in 1912 at Savannah. This is now a part of the Museum Fashion Show being shown at State Conferences.

DAR SCHOLARSHIP

Mrs. Daisy A. McClure

By action of the NSDAR Executive Committee two new scholarships were established in October, 1982:

(1) ENID HALL GRISWOLD MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP: \$1,000 annual award to a junior or senior attending an accredited college or university;

(2) ARTHUR AND LILLIAN DUNN SCHOLARSHIP: \$1,000 annually for 4 years to 6 deserving sons and/or daughters of active NSDAR members. An additional 4 years may be provided to outstanding students.

Miss Amanda White, Doraville, was awarded a Caroline E. Holt Scholarship in October. The American History Scholarship is being sought by Miss Leslie Elizabeth Snow, Brunswick.

The Joseph Habersham Chapter, Atlanta, led all chapters in donations to the several schools (St. Mary's, Hindman Settlement, KDS and Tamassee) and scholarship funds for a total of \$2,542.

The Victor Davidson Scholarship is administered by the John Ball Chapter, Macon, which is the owner of a certificate bought from the proceeds of an historical book by Mr. Davidson and given to the chapter. Scholarships are awarded by the Chapter to students attending the School of Law at Mercer University, Mr. Davidson's Alma Mater.

According to the State Treasurer, 98 chapters contributed \$15,040.60 to the schools, which includes the per capita gifts from the State Society. Tamassee State Regent's Project \$3,116.55, Scholarship \$3,387.00, General Fund \$1,155.00; Kate Duncan Smith State Regent's Project \$2,955.55, Scholarship \$1,207.00, General Fund \$636.00; Berry State Regent's Project \$775.00, Scholarship \$171.50, General Fund \$112.50; Crossnore \$493.50; Hillside \$270.50; Hindman \$760.50. \$427 was given to the Hightower Memorial Fund.

595 boxes of clothing weighing 18,942 pounds were shipped at a cost of \$817.00. Several chapters used free hauling by members, Southeastern Freight, Georgia Highway Express, Overnight Express, Gipp Manufacturing Co., Owen's Freight Line, Five Transportation and Brown Transportation.

70 Chapters reported having a full or partial program on the schools. Several chapters had special projects to benefit the schools. There were 22 Golden Rule Benefactors in Georgia. 44 Chapters received the Hightower Award.

The Georgia State Society NSDAR is deeply grateful to Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Hightower, Jr., for continuing the Hightower Award in memory of his mother, Mrs. Henry Allan Ironside.

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERAN PATIENTS

Mrs. Edward E. McBride, Jr.

All 107 Georgia Chapters submitted reports on their dedicated work and outstanding services performed for Veteran Patients throughout the state.

The VA Medical Centers in Georgia, which are located in Decatur, Dublin and Augusta, have been well served. 1,925 hours of voluntary service in the hospitals were contributed by 117 volunteers. Additionally, 199 hours were spent in conducting 319 parties for patients at a cost of \$2,664.00; 1,747 hours were expended in making 412,675 handmade articles (lap robes, bibs, wheel chair cushions, etc.) valued at \$3,198.00; 1,391 hours were spent in collecting, making and delivering books and other gifts valued at \$6,990.00; canteen books valued at \$6,874.00 were donated and gifts to the hospitals amounted to \$2,100.00 VA Medical Center patients also received 322 visits by DAR members for a total of 906 hours.

Army and Navy Military Hospitals received 636 gifts valued at \$1,897.00; 156 members held parties at a cost of \$633.00. 1,426 hours were spent on personal visits to patients. The husband of a volunteer pushes wheel chair patients to weekly Sunday worship services and the organist donates her time.

Private Homes, Nursing Homes, Private Hospitals, etc., received 287 visits and gifts valued at \$840.00. Parties were presented by 214 members at a cost of \$1,596. Patients received 1,149 personal visits for a total of 1,480 hours.

Public Relations included 9 talks, 212 inches of newspaper publicity, one radio talk and 162 5" x 7" pictures. Three Braille Flags and 256 ounces of "Stamps for Wounded" were donated. Four patients received 4 oz. of stamps and 889 stamps were sent to veterans in Tuscon, Az. Five Patriotic Days were commemorated for Veteran Patients.

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

Reports were received from 90 chapters, reminder cards mailed in mid-January to chapter chairmen, 60 large flags, 292 small flags and 300 miniature flags were presented. 20 Braille flags presented, 1,500 flag cards. 983 "Our Flag" booklets, 65 flag posters, 25 flag book-marks were also presented. 25 full programs and 40 partial programs were presented, 15 programs to other organizations.

Publicity included 165 articles and 22 pictures with a total of 604 inches, 40 radio broadcasts and 1 TV spot. 10 letters were written to institutions properly displaying the flag. Chapters participated in Flag Day programs, school assemblies, Veterans' Day celebrations and Meadow Garden Day. Flag posters displayed in libraries, stores, banks, museums, Chambers of Commerce and post offices.

The success of this chairman is due to the responsible Flag Chairmen and Chapter Regents who not only sent reports in on time, but also put forth the extra effort to make Flag Awareness a reality.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP

100% of Georgia's chapters reported the diligent work of our 663 Junior Members. Georgia has gained 102 new Juniors since March 1, 1982. Georgia Juniors hold the positions of 9 State Chairmen, 1 state Vice Chairman, 3 Chapter Regents, 31 Chapter Officers and 118 Chapter Chairmen. Contributions to the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund total \$1,118.56. Five

Junior Membership programs have been given. Ester Raye Deen (Mrs. Ronald H., Jr.) of John Floyd Chapter is Georgia's Outstanding Junior Member and has the honor of being the National South Eastern Divisional Winner.

LINEAGE RESEARCH

Reports were received from 98 Chapters, an increase of 18 over last year. 72 Chapters have Lineage Research Chairmen. There were 277 requests for assistance and 96 new members were acquired through that assistance. There are 20 papers pending in Washington. 20 programs or workshops were given on Lineage Research to DAR Chapters and 14 to other organizations. We have 45 DAR Volunteer Researchers listed in the Laura Thompson Blue Book covering 92 Georgia counties. MEMBERSHIP

This chairman attended all 4 workshops, fall board and State Conference. The question-answer period at workshops seemed especially fruitful this year. An effort was made to seek the answers to specific problems encountered by chapter membership chairmen. Ideas for holding the interest of members to prevent resignation, and increased attendance at meetings were exchanged. Extra attention to reaching Juniors continued to be stressed. Georgia tied for a national award for most new junior members in 1982. We are proud of our Juniors! Computer print-outs have improved, but still leave much to be desired. Nothing can replace the all-important chapter reports. Reported to me were: 299 new members by application; 53 of them Juniors; 47 members reinstated; 44 members transferred from out of state into Georgia chapters; 60 members transferred within the state of Georgia; 203 members resigned; 165 deceased. 30 Certificates of Merit were awarded to chapters with at least 4 new members. It was a pleasure to work with our charming State Regent, officers and chapter members.

\$44.00 were contributed for videotaping the Continental Congress. Fifty-five letters were written to broadcasting companies and advertisers to express approval and disapproval of programming.

NATIONAL DEFENSE

Ninety-four chapters reported: 91 entire programs on National Defense; 44 devoted five minutes to National Defense each meeting and 49 gave more time; 93 studied 1982 Resolutions; 84 had material available at meetings and 129 gave material to schools, libraries and individuals; 524 Good Citizenship Medals were presented to students; 84 chapters gave \$170.25 to the NSDAR ROTC fund and 90 bronze and 14 gold ROTC medals; 53 gave \$605.00 to Dollars for Defense, helping to provide National Defense literature; 165 members subscribed to the National Defender; 775 members wrote to Congressmen; 826 members wrote to State Legislators; approximately 4,484 members voted in 1982-1983; 43 members hold elective or appointive public office (among which are Superior Court Judge, Judge of Probate Court, County Commissioners, city council members, members and chairmen of Boards of Library, Education, County Draft Board, Planning and Zoning Commission, Public Health Board.) Legislative issues of greatest interest: ERA, defense budget, social security, nuclear freeze and English official language. National Defense topics of greatest interest were immigration, proposed amendment regarding English for universal language, military buildup, nuclear freeze, and defense budget. This chairman is grateful to the 14 Vice Chairmen that assisted her during the year, to the chapters that sent a report and the State Regent for her continuous support.

It took six days' travel, but I will say the hostess chapters made my stay one that I will want to remember always.

I also attended the Fall Board of Management and reemphasized the importance of keeping these records in different places. I must say that most of the chapters' reports showed they appreciated our effort by following the simple instructions.

There were 38 reports with 15 chapters contributing 855 pages. Copies of these histories are sent to the Archives in Atlanta, the Washington Memorial Library in Macon and the Historical Society in Savannah.

FINANCE

The finance committee met at 11:00 a.m., May 14, 1982, in the American Room, Georgia Hall, Middle Georgia College, Cochran, GA. Present were Mrs. Louis C₄ Alderman, State Regent, Mrs. Jonathan Fox, Chairman, Mrs. Donald Hankinson, Mrs. James J. Muldrow, Mrs. A. C. Earl Shepherd, Mrs. Leyton Colvin, Mrs. John Terry. Mrs. Robert Humphrey joined us later. With Mrs. Fox presiding, Mrs. Muldrow opened with prayer. The proposed budget for 1982-83 was reviewed. A discussion on the cost of the Proceedings resulted in several recommendations to be forwarded to the Proceedings Committee. Mrs. Shepherd moved, seconded by Mrs. Terry, to recommend to the Proceedings Committee to remove out of state recipients with the exception of conference guests from the mailing list

for the Proceedings. Motion passed. Mrs. Terry moved, seconded by Mrs. Muldrow, to request the State Regent to query the National Board of Management and the Executive Officers about the number and offices that would benefit from receiving our Proceedings; motion passed. Mrs. Terry then moved to ask that the Proceedings committee diligently endeavor to stay within the budgeted figure for the cost of the Proceedings; seconded by Mrs. Hankinson; motion passed. The committee then unanimously agreed to recommend adoption of the proposed budget to the Fall Board of Management.

Mrs. Alderman discussed the efforts of Mrs. Adrienne Roberts to secure aid for the Revolutionary War Battle Park in Savannah. Mrs. Roberts has been appointed State Chairman of Marking Revolutionary Soldiers' Graves and Restoring Historic Spots. In her capacity as State Chairman she may have as one of her committee projects a fund raising drive to help build a structure to house the bust of Comte d'Estaing. All monies donated by DAR chapters for this project will be sent to the State Treasurer. Mrs. Alderman asked Mrs. Fox to write to Mrs. Roberts about this decision of the State Regent.

The certificates of deposit held by the State Society were the next order of business. The certificate maturing in May has been redeemed, bill for the Georgia Room in the NSDAR Museum has been paid out of this money and the balance is on passbook savings awaiting the final audit of the treasurer's books before being forwarded to the current treasurer. Two certificates will mature June 2, at which time Mrs. Muldrow, immediate past state treasurer, has been empowered by this committee to redeem them and send the money in a certified check to Mrs. Hankinson, current state treasurer. The money from all certificates will be reinvested with the provision that money needed for specified projects may be kept in a more easily accessible account.

Mrs. Alderman moved to commend Mrs. Muldrow for effectively handling the closing of the state books a month earlier than usual and for a smooth transition of funds during this year of date change, Mrs. Shepherd seconded the motion and it was passed unanimously. Mrs. Alderman then expressed appreciation for the new members serving this term and for the other members who had agreed to again serve. The meeting adjourned at 12:00 noon, October 26, 1982.

The finance committee met at 2:30 p.m. Tuesday, October 26, 1982, in the Lamplighter Room of the Howard Johnson Restaurant in Macon, Georgia. Present were Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox, Chairman; Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, State Regent; Mrs. Leyton Colvin; Mrs. Donald Hankinson; Mrs. Robert Humphrey; Mrs. James J. Muldrow; Mrs. A. C. Earl Shepherd; Mrs. John Terry. Mrs. Fox read the minutes of the last meeting. In response to the letter written to the Chairman of the Proceedings Committee with the suggestions of the Finance Committee on the cost of the Proceedings, Mrs. Fox read a letter from Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar, immediate past State Regent, Mrs. De Lamar wished to have it recorded in the minutes of this committee that the recommendations had previously been taken care of in an effort to keep the cost of the Proceedings within budget. She pointed out that copies of the Georgia Proceedings have not been sent to out of state Regents, including conference guests, since 1980. Also in 1980, the National Society was asked about the need for copies of the Georgia Proceedings. The Proceedings Committee was informed that copies were needed by the President General, Recording Secretary and Parliamentarian; it is only to these that copies now are sent. In response to the request that they stay within budget, it was replied that for the past 2 years, 5 or 6 bids were secured with the lowest being accepted. Every effort is being made to stay within the budget but the suggestion was made by Mrs. De Lamar that the only way to do so today would be not to print the Proceedings on a yearly basis or to obtain more members upon which the budget is based as the cost is per page, which varies from year to year.

Mrs. Hankinson, State Treasurer, distributed copies of the Summary of Funds. She commented on each entry and discussed the composition of the current certificates of deposit.

Mrs. Fox thanked each member for coming early to the Fall Board of Management in order to attend this meeting. As there was no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 3:00 p.m.

March 9, 1983

Mrs. Hankinson, State Treasurer, distributed the Summary of Funds for the year to date. She discussed each item. This was followed by a discussion of the investment of the Capital Investment Trust Fund. At this time, Mrs. Hankinson can invest the money in this fund for 7 years at 11% interest with interest withdrawal available. Mrs. Muldrow moved that the money in the Capital Investment Trust Fund be invested at 11% for 7 years with interest payments twice a year; seconded by Mrs. Terry; motion passed. The Meadow Garden Board had requested that \$5,000.00 be taken from the State Savings Account and put into the Meadow Garden Maintenance Fund because of the expense of unexpected repairs at the house. A motion to that effect was made by Mrs. John Terry, seconded by Mrs. Colvin. In the discussion which followed, it was noted that this was not a loan and would not be repaid to the Savings Account. The motion to recommend this to the State Society was passed. As there was no further business, the meeting adjourned at 5:00 p.m.

MARKING REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIERS' GRAVES AND RESTORING HISTORIC SPOTS

The 250th Birthday of Georgia was the occasion chosen to focus attention on our most historic spots, Meadow Garden in Augusta, the home of a Signer, George Walton was one of them. Chapters were urged to support our regents' project. Also since 1963 DAR has persevered to claim and preserve the Revolutionary Battle Park in Savannah, known as the Siege or The Rehearsal for Yorktown, where one of the bloodiest battles of the war was fought and where a thousand casualties resulted and many were buried in a common grave. A goal was accomplished when this hallowed ground recently changed hands from the railroad to become a part of the Savannah Park System. The DAR and the Revolutionary Battle Park, Inc., were awarded certification by the Semiquincentenary Commission, permitting us to use the 250 logo. In addition, Georgia Daughters in one chapter reorganized an historical society; another marked a grave and published a Huguenot Hymn Book; a contribution was sent to Mt. Vernon for preservation and another cooperated in preserving the architectural integrity of the new court house and succeeded in reusing old columns from the one built in 1904; cooperated with the Highway Dept. in relocating marker; ceremonies held at soldiers grave; marked graves of John Gresham, Sr., John Johnson, Samuel Cartlidge and Francis Richard Sanders; 30 chapters reported. Next year further plans for a marker to the establishment of the Battle Park will be presented, trusting for your approval and financial assistance. Much appreciation for this opportunity.

MEADOW GARDEN

The various activities of Chapters and members can be given more space by each chairman involved. Remember that it is the combination of Landscaping, Furnishings, Patrons, Investment Trust Fund, Gift Shop, Docents, Meadow Garden Day that makes progress at Meadow Garden possible. Most important of all is the continued effort by each Georgia Daughter. This Chairman is grateful for your support of Meadow Garden.

MEADOW GARDEN BOARD MEETING

The Meadow Garden Board met on Friday, May 14, 1982, in Georgia Hall, Middle Georgia College, Cochran, Georgia. Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr., State Regent, presiding as Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 12:45 p.m. and asked Mrs. R. Hugh Reid to offer the opening prayer. Others attending were Mrs. A. C. Earl Shepherd, Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar, Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox, Mrs. William N. Agostas, Mrs. Allen L. Brewer, Mrs. Luther L. Watson, Mrs. Frank G. Binford and Mrs. Harold Starr Smith.

Mrs. Watson moved to elect Mrs. Shepherd Secretary. Mrs. De Lamar seconded the motion which was then adopted. March, 1982 Minutes were approved as corrected.

The new members were welcomed to the Board.

She reported on available booths, concessions, entertainment and special events. At the end of her report Mrs. Williamson was thanked and excused. The business of the Board was continued.

Two (2) sets will be in the possession of the Resident Manager, who will open the house upon request and will secure the house after departure of visitors, making sure the book is signed as stated above. These keys are never to leave the possession of the Resident Manager. The third set of keys is to be held by the State Chairman of Meadow Garden and is not to leave her possession. The fourth set of keys is to be in the possession of the Chairman of Meadow Garden Board and to never leave her hands.

No duplicate keys are to be made from any of the above sets of keys."

Mrs. Fox moved that all reference to "Caretaker" be changed to "Resident Manager." Motion was seconded by Mrs. Reid and adopted.

Mrs. Alderman distributed copies of Proposed Standing Rules for Meadow Garden to be studied and discussed at the next Board Meeting. Mrs. Fox moved to table further discussions concerning "Rules Governing Meadow Garden." Motion was adopted.

Mrs. Alderman reported that the loom in the weaving room is in need of repair and that Mr. Tucker is working to get this repair done and that he hopes to have the loom working by the Festival Day. Mrs. Alderman asked Mrs. Reid to check into the repair of the porch floor. If this repair cannot be completed by the Festival Date temporary arrangements will be made in order that the porch will be presentable.

Mrs. De Lamar reported that plans are being made for the dedication of the "National Historic Landmark Plaque" on June 19, 1982.

Mrs. Smith, Chairman of Docents, reported that she has a tape, made by Mr. Tucker, with information and instructions for the Docents at Meadow Garden. Mrs. Smith will have individual sheets of information on each room available for use by the Docents on the days that they are on duty at Meadow Garden.

Mrs. Reid moved that for the day of the Festival an exception be made for the number of people who can be on tour at one time, to allow groups of no more than ten (10) on each floor. Motion was seconded by Mrs. Fox and adopted.

Mrs. Binford brought the coverlet donated by Mr. and Mrs. Dixon Wadsworth, given in memory of his mother, and stated that the coverlet will be placed on the bed that was given in honor of Mrs. T. Earle Stribling. Plans are being made to dedicate the bed at the time of District Meeting in Augusta in August, 1982.

Mrs. Alderman reported that the tiles are now in the Gift Shop. Mrs. Reid moved that the selling price of the tiles be increased from \$6.00 to \$7.50 each. Motion was seconded by Mrs. Fox and adopted.

Mrs. De Lamar reported that Mrs. Frank Sczurek, Senior State President, CAR, is working on the drawings for the coloring book and that Mrs. Sczurek requested that one half (½) of the profits go to CAR.

Mrs. Watson reported that overtures have been made concerning the landscaping and that she will mail letters of information to the Board Members for approval of the plan. It was agreed that the members may vote by mail to avoid delay in this work.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 2:50 p.m.

9:40 p.m. and asked Mrs. Allen L. Brewer to offer the opening prayer. Others attending were Mrs. A. C. Earl Shepherd, Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar, Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox, Mrs. Luther L. Watson, Mrs. Frank G. Binford and Mrs. Harold Starr Smith. Minutes of the May, 1982 meeting were approved as corrected.

Mrs. Alderman reported on the success of the first Meadow Garden Festival held June 19, 1982 and said that Mrs. John R. Williamson, Chairman of the Festival, is working now on the second Festival which is to be held May 14, 1983. Mrs. Alderman asked the Secretary to read the narrative on the Festival that was written by the State Recording Secretary. Mrs. Fox moved that the Narrative of the Meadow Garden First Festival Day, written by the State Recording Secretary, be included in the Proceedings of this year as a record of this event. Should the report of the Festival Chairman be a duplication, the inclusion of the Narrative would not be required. Motion was seconded by Mrs. Watson and adopted. Mrs. Fox thanked Mrs. Alderman, on behalf of the Board, for her diligent interest and work in making the first Festival a success.

Mrs. Alderman reported on Meadow Garden publicity in the Atlanta Journal-Constitution, Week-end Magazine Section, dated July 24, 1982, and written by Howard Pousner.

Mrs. Reid sent a report to Mrs. Alderman because she (Mrs. Reid) was unable to attend the meeting due to family obligations. Mrs. Alderman read Mrs. Reid's report which was on needed repairs and equipment at Meadow Garden. There will be further details and discussion at the October, 1982 meeting.

Mrs. Smith reported that she has the names of four (4) members who will serve as Docents. She also told about a costume that she made to wear when serving as a Docent. Mrs. Smith was asked to look into the possibility of all Docents wearing costumes similar to hers when serving as Docents.

Mrs. Alderman gave a report on the Gift Shop. It was agreed by the Board that the Gift Shop loan would be repaid as follows: The State Treasurer will repay from the Gift Shop Fund \$250.00 by September 1, 1982 and \$250.00 quarterly thereafter until the loan is paid in full.

Mrs. De Lamar moved that a sales tax be added to the price charged for merchandise sold in the Gift Shop. Motion was seconded by Mrs. Fox and adopted.

Mrs. Watson reported that Professor John Waters, of the Environmental Design School at the University of Georgia, and Dr. Hubert Owens, Past Dean of this School, have offered to work with the Board on the Semi-quincentenary project of the State Society, which is "Landscaping of Meadow Garden."

Mrs. Watson moved that the Meadow Garden Board grant permission to our State Regent to negotiate with Professor Waters who will develop plans for Board approval. Motion was seconded and approved.

It was brought to the attention of the Board that inadvertently omitted from the Minutes was a motion made at the October 28, 1980 Board Meeting to include all four (4) Meadow Garden Funds, i.e.: Furnishings, Landscaping, Maintenance and Capital Investment Fund, which meet the requirements of the Patrons Committee to be eligible to become Patrons. This will be included in the Minutes of today (August 11, 1982) to clarify the eligibility of Patrons.

Mrs. Fox moved that one-half $(\frac{1}{2})$ of the profits from the coloring books go to the CAR. Motion was seconded by Mrs. De Lamar and approved.

Mrs. Fox moved to remove from the table the consideration of the proposed Standing Rules. Motion was seconded by Mrs. Watson and approved.

Mrs. Fox moved to postpone until October 26, 1982, the discussion and disposition of the proposed Standing Rules. Motion was seconded by Mrs. De Lamar and approved.

Mrs. Binford reported that the bed, Honey Bee Candlesticks, maps and pewter plates have been placed in Meadow Garden.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, it was adjourned at 11:30 p.m.

MEADOW GARDEN BOARD MEETING

The Meadow Garden Board met on Tuesday, October 26, 1982 at the Howard Johnson Motel in Macon, Georgia. Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr., State Regent, presiding as Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 10:10 a.m. and read the Scripture from I Cor. 14:40 — "Let all things be done properly and in an orderly manner." She then asked Mrs. De Lamar to offer the opening prayer. Others attending were Mrs. A. C. Earl Shepherd, Mrs. R. Hugh Reid, Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox, Mrs. Luther L. Watson, Mrs. Frank G. Binford and Mrs. Harold Starr Smith. Minutes of the August, 1982 meeting were approved as read.

Mrs. Reid gave an extensive report on the repairs and renovations needed on the Resident Manager's Cottage, especially concerning the renovation needed in the bathroom. Mrs. Fox moved that Mrs. Reid pursue the renovation of the bathroom within the Cottage and when she is able to satisfactorily agree on a contract of repair, to proceed with the work. Motion was seconded by Mrs. Watson and approved. Mrs. Reid reported that Baron DeKalb Chapter had requested permission to have a copy of the Meadow Garden slides and script to present to the State Department of Archives as a Chapter Semiquincentenary Project. Mrs. Reid moved that the Meadow Garden Board approve having the Baron DeKalb Chapter make a copy of the Meadow Garden slides and script to present to the State Department of Archives as a Chapter Project. Motion was seconded by Mrs. De Lamar and approved.

Mrs. Alderman reported that Mrs. Williamson, Meadow Garden Day Chairman, has been visiting other festivals handing out flyers to booth operators and is having more flyers made. She (Mrs. Williamson) plans to have seventy (70) booths available in 1983 and has begun working on the program. It was agreed that the price of booth space should be \$15.00 each.

Mrs. Smith reported on the Docents and advised that the Docent costumes will be made by the festival time in May, 1983. Information on the rooms and furnishings is now available for the Docents' use when serving as Docents at Meadow Garden. At the request of Mrs. Smith, the Board agreed to prepare a card index file, with detailed information on the furnishings, to be used by the Docents while conducting tours through the house.

It was reported that Mrs. Henry had inquired if the coverlet she had given to Meadow Garden was being used. Mrs. Binford stated that there were other items given with the understanding the items would be returned to the donor if it is no longer used at Meadow Garden, one being the tall clock given by the John Houstoun Chapter in memory of Mrs. Henry Allen Ironside. Mrs. Binford will write Mrs. Henry our gratitude for the coverlet which is being used on an upstairs bed. Mrs. Binford showed a picture of a reproduction bed, similar to one in Meadow Garden, which was in the October, 1982 issue of the *Country Living* magazine. She reported that the washstand is of the period 1760-1810 and the writing box is of the early 19th Century. Mrs. Watson moved that we reaffirm that the inventories in the hands of the State Regent, State Chairman of Meadow Garden, and the Resident Manager be kept updated at all times. Motion was seconded by Mrs. Shepherd and approved.

Mrs. Alderman reported that the first payment of \$250.00 on the Gift Shop loan has been made and that sales tax collection began October 1, 1982 as recommended by Mr. Singleton, CPA. The certificate is posted on the wall of the Gift Shop as requested by the Secretary of State's Office. Four percent (4%) sales tax is required in Augusta.

It was reported that Professor John Waters took seven students from the University of Georgia recently to spend the day looking and sketching the grounds of Meadow Garden. Many good suggestions came from the brainstorming activity. Mrs. Reid moved that the Meadow Garden Board approve the expense of approximately \$300.00 to have an engineer, chosen by the landscape architect, to do a plat of the Meadow Garden property as a preliminary to the landscaping of the Meadow Garden grounds. Motion was seconded by Mrs. Fox and approved.

Mrs. Alderman commended Mrs. Reid for the news article she wrote, at Mrs. Agostas' request, for the bed dedication in August.

Mrs. Alderman has checked with Mr. Jerry Dye, Attorney, concerning changing the names on the Meadow Garden deed from the Trustees to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Inc. The President General has given assurance that this correction will be made.

Mrs. Alderman moved that the Board authorize the Meadow Garden Chairman, at her discretion, to pursue multiple repairs at Meadow Garden, according to arrangement worked out with Mr. Jack Williford. Motion was seconded by Mrs. Shepherd and approved.

Mrs. Alderman reported that tours and visitors were slow in July, August and September but that as of this date October had recorded 125 visitors.

Mrs. Fox read a summary of a study she had made on use of reproductions in historical places. Mrs. Fox prepared this study because of her concern as to what type of museum we are consummating and because she feels that a specific guideline should be established for future use at Meadow Garden. This study was a result of writing 47 historic places with replies being received from 31 covering 105 buildings selected from the book An American Heritage Guide to Historic Places. Mrs. Fox moved that Meadow Garden be a Historic House Museum which will depict accurately and truthfully the lifestyle of George Walton as a patriot, lawyer, politician and small landholder, living in the house from 1790-1804 and his family living there until 1821. Motion was seconded by Mrs. De Lamar and approved. It was recommended that further study be made, especially concerning places located in the Southeastern section of the country.

The consideration of the proposed Standing Rules for Meadow Garden was the next order of business. All of Section I relating to Meadow Garden, with the exception of Item 2 concerning members of the Board, was adopted. Action on the members of the Board will be taken at the March State Conference in 1983. The sections on Operations, Volunteers (Docents), Grounds, Gift Shop and Patrons were also adopted. All sections adopted to become effective as of October 27, 1982.

Mrs. Reid moved that the section concerning Furnishings be considered at the Board Meeting in March, 1983. Motion was seconded and approved.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 2:30 p.m.

Earl Shepherd, Mrs. R. Hugh Reid, Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar, Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox, Mrs. William N. Agostas, Mrs. Luther L. Watson and Mrs. Harold Starr Smith.

Mrs. Alderman asked Mrs. John R. Williamson to give her report on the Meadow Garden Festival to be held May 14, 1983. She stated that she had six (6) booths paid for with five (5) others coming. There has been extensive advertising in statewide magazines and newspapers and there will also be coverage on two (2) TV stations in Augusta. The festival will be from 10:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. Mrs. Williamson also reported that she had been trying to get several businesses to sponsor an advertising banner that would cost \$300.00. At the time of the Board Meeting she had only been able to get one business to give \$50.00 toward this banner. Mrs. Reid moved that the Meadow Garden Board approve an amount not to exceed \$250.00 to cover cost of a banner for Meadow Garden Day, with the understanding that contributions from local businesses to meet this expense will be used before determining the amount to be paid from the festival fund. Motion was seconded by Mrs. Fox and approved.

Mrs. Alderman told about the invitation to join the Greater Arts Council of Augusta for a fee of \$15.00 per year. This membership will make available advertising space (at no extra cost) in the magazine that is published and distributed throughout the State. Mrs. Fox moved that the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, join the Greater Arts Council of Augusta for a fee of \$15.00 per year. Motion was seconded by Mrs. De Lamar and approved.

Mrs. Williamson ended her report and was thanked for her continued endeavors to make the festival a success. Mrs. Alderman excused her from the meeting and the business of the Board continued.

Mrs. Alderman distributed the Meadow Garden financial statement and asked for any discussion or questions.

The consideration of the Furnishings Section of the Proposed Standing Rules was discussed and adopted to become effective as of March 12, 1983.

Mrs. Reid reported that some work had been done on the needed repairs to Meadow Garden and the Resident Manager's Cottage. It was stated that the cost of the work done on the needed repairs along with the regular maintenance has resulted in the Maintenance Fund having a zero balance. Mrs. Reid moved that the Board request that the Finance Committee approve \$5,000.00 from the General Funds account be given to Meadow Garden Maintenance for payment of operations cost. Motion was seconded by Mrs. Watson and approved.

It was also reported that Annis Exterminators has increased the cost of service. The Board asked Mrs. Alderman to investigate other companies that may have lower rates before making a new contract with Annis Exterminators.

Mrs. Alderman gave each member of the Board the "Project Outline and Design Philosophy" for the landscaping by Sybil H. Argintar (the landscape architect).

Mrs. Reid reported that, due to illness, Mrs. Binford would send a letter of resignation to the State Regent. Mrs. Reid then moved that the Board send a Resolution honoring Mrs. Frank G. Binford to the Resolutions Committee for consideration. Motion was seconded by Mrs. Watson and approved.

Mrs. Fox moved that the Chairman of the Board and the Secretary approve the minutes of the October 26, 1982 meeting. Motion was seconded by Mrs. Watson and approved.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 4:30 p.m.

Meadow Garden Festival Day, 1982, was held June, 1982, at 1320 Nelson Street in Augusta, Georgia. It was attended by about five hundred people.

The day began at 8:00 a.m. with seven booth people bringing their articles to sell. At 10:00 a.m. the festival began. Eighty-one DAR chapters participated by giving money or items for the booths. There were booths of food, genealogical materials, a Dorothy Walton attic (white elephants), plants, flags, and a food booth both by the Georgia Daughters and Meadow Garden Society, Augusta CAR.

Door prizes were given out four times during the day. Mr. Charles DeVaney representing the Mayor's office, Travis Barns of the Richmond Co. Commission, and Congressman Doug Barnard were guest speakers. A plaque was presented to the Georgia Society DAR by the Department of the Interior designating Meadow Garden as a National Historic Landmark. The Community Band played by 1:30, the Sweet Adelines sang, and Mr. Fred Rosenberg and Mr. Nathan Bindler played violin-viola duets. During part of this time docents were having tours of Meadow Garden.

\$1,499.43 was the money from this that went into the Capital Investment Trust Fund.

Bylaws

BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II OBJECTS

The objects of the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution shall be: to promote the aims set forth in the Bylaws of the National Society; the preservation of the memory of its Revolutionary patriots; the study of its history; the education of its youth in patriotic ideals and in the duties of citizenship.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All Chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of this organization.

Article IV OFFICERS

The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Curator. The State Regent shall appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as adviser in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting.

Article V ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected at the annual State Conference biennially.

Section 2. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two years or until their successors are elected. Their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and of the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Section 3. No member shall be eligible to a State office until she has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years. No member shall be eligible to the same State office for two successive terms. A member having served more than one-half term in the State office shall be deemed to have served a term. Any member holding active membership in a Chapter in the Georgia State Society shall be eligible to hold a State office, provided she

has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years.

Section 4. Nominations of candidates for office shall be from the floor. The election shall be held by ballot. A majority of the votes cast by the voting members of the State Conference shall elect.

Section 5. Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become acting First Vice Regent, subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. A vacancy in any other State office between annual meetings shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next Fall Board of Management or State Conference, whichever shall come first. Any State Officer, who is absent from the State for a continuous period of six months or longer, automatically relinquishes her position as a State officer.

Section 6. No two State officers shall be members of the same Chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

Section 7. In recognition of valuable service to the organization, any State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Section 8. A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot. The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than fifteen months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

Section 9. On the election of State Regent, and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Recording Secretary General. The endorsement of a candidate for Vice President General shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent to the Recording Secretary General at least two weeks prior to Continental Congress.

Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, of the State Board of Management, and of the Executive Committee. She shall appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees.

Section 2. In the absence of the State Regent from any meeting of the State Conference, or the State Board of Management, the State First Vice Regent, or in her absence, the State Second Vice Regent, shall perform the duties of the State Regent. The State First and Second Vice Regents may be assigned to direct committees and to perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent.

Section 3. The State Chaplain shall open all meetings of the State Conference and of the State Board of Management with Scripture reading and prayer and shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require. She shall preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and shall be responsible for the In Memoriam pages in the Proceedings.

Section 4. The State Recording Secretary shall record the proceedings of the State Conference and of meetings of the State Board of Management and of the Executive Committee. She shall compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and of the Proceedings Committee.

Section 5. The State Corresponding Secretary shall conduct correspondence and send notices in behalf of the State Conference, the State Regent, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as directed by them.

Section 6. The State Treasurer shall be the custodian of the funds of the State Society. She shall receive the State Conference dues and registration fees from the Chapters and shall receive all sums contributed by the Chapters for State and National projects. All monies received by the State Treasurer shall be placed only in institutions with accounts covered by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation or by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation, and the amount in any one institution shall not exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage. She shall disburse such sums only when authorized by the State Regent in writing. The State Treasurer shall keep an account of all sums received or paid out and shall keep receipts for all payments. She shall prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference. Her books shall be audited annually by a Certified Public Accountant. She shall be ex-officio a member of the Credentials Committee.

Section 7. The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new Chapters.

Section 8. The State Registrar shall, when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, who live in towns and counties in which there are no Chapters, to prove eligibility, and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars in verifying lineage papers. She shall keep a correct list of all members in the State and shall make a report on membership to the State Conference.

Section 9. The State Historian shall be in charge of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General. She shall keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves in the State and shall prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General to Smithsonian Institution. She shall encourage the compilation and publication of County Histories and other unpublished records, especially those of the Revolutionary period.

Section 10. The State Librarian shall collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing duplicates, wherever possible, in the NSDAR Library and in the Georgia DAR Collections in the State Department of Archives and History. She shall endeavor to obtain the books on the wanted list of the Librarian General for the Georgia Section in the NSDAR Library and is authorized to solicit contributions from the Chapters for the purchase of the same. She shall have custody and supervision of the DAR Genealogical and Historical Collections of the State Department of Archives and History.

Section 11. The State Curator shall receive and be responsible for all gifts of Revolutionary relics to the Museum of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution. She shall be the custodian of the conference properties and shall have them properly stored, insured and made ready for use at State Conference.

Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. The Georgia State Society shall hold an annual State Conference between the first day of February and the time of the meeting of the Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week. The Executive Committee shall fix the time and place of meetings when not fixed by the Conference in session, or when for any reason it may be impracticable to meet at the time or place fixed by the Conference.

Section 2. The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credential blanks to the Chapters not less than sixty days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 3. The voting members of the State Conference shall be State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regent or alternate, and the delegates or their alternates from the Chapters of the state, that are entitled to representation at the Continental Congress. The number of representatives from each Chapter shall be determined by the rules for representation of Chapters in the Continental Congress as given in the National Bylaws.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a Chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the Chapter, except in the case of the Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at an annual State Conference, shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any Chapter in the State of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference the privileges of the floor shall be accorded to the State Chairmen with the exception that they may not vote unless they are duly elected delegates or their alternates from their respective chapters.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen days notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Twenty-five voting members, representing not less than ten Chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII STATE DUES AND CONFERENCE FEES

Section 1. The annual dues of Chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be two dollars for each member of the Chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1. A minimum of at least 72 cents shall be used to cover all State per capita assessments, and the balance shall be allocated to the General State Dues Fund. No Chapter shall be entitled to representation at the annual State Conference until the State dues are paid.

Section 2. The Finance Committee, appointed by the State Regent, shall be composed of seven members, to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two Honorary State Regents, one active Chapter Regent, and one active Chapter member. This

committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund.

Section 3. Each Chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State Dues, a Conference registration fee of \$3.00 for each voter to which the Chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Section 4. State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$3.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference fee at the time of registration.

Article IX EXPENSES

Section 1. One thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) shall be taken each year from the State Dues Fund, to be used by the State Regent in defraying her necessary travel expenses.

Section 2. Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent shall be paid by the State Treasurer from the State Dues Fund.

Article X STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regents of the Chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the Fall, following the regular meeting of the National Board. It may meet whenever called by the State Regent.

Section 3. Ten members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference.

Section 5. State Chairmen, Vice Chairmen and Committee Members of National and Standing Committees shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privileges of the floor, but may not vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article XI EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of he Georgia State Society shall constitute an Executive Committee. The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, attends the meetings of the Executive Committee, but may not vote. This Committee performs such duties of the Board between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient. The Executive Committee shall meet the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three members of the Committee. It shall make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

Article XII CHAPTERS

Section 1. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April. The Chapter Regent shall report the names of the elected officers promptly, on triplicate blanks provided by the State Regent for this purpose, to the Organizing Secretary General, to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary.

Section 2. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent for use in compiling her report, not less than fifteen days before the opening of the annual State Conference. The official Chapter report, not to exceed 250 words in length, for publication in the Proceedings shall be furnished the State Recording Secretary before the State Conference.

Article XIII AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent and to the Parliamentarian. The State Regent shall send a copy to each Chapter and each voting member, at least sixty days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law for the State Conference in matters not covered by the Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21.) No conference was held in 1911; the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912"; amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta, "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, p. 211.)

Bylaws

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National and State Bylaws.

Change of Address

Notice of change of address of members shall be sent to the Organizing Secretary General, Treasurer General, State Regent and State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

Change of Name

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to State Registrar, Treasurer General and State Regent by the Chapter Treasurer.

Chapter Elections

As soon as Chapter elections are held, names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, Administration Building, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D. C. 20006, to the State Regent, and to the Recording Secretary by May 1st. The full Christian name of Chapter officers shall be given together with her husband's given name or initials, address and zip code. A Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years. This is being added in order for our Bylaws to conform to the National Bylaws.

Dues

Pay to State Treasurer State Dues of \$2.00 per member before December 1. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the February 1 and two April Board meetings of the National Society. National Dues of \$10.00 per member sent to the Treasurer-General, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D. C. 20006 before December 1, 1983.

Conference Registration Fee

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer with the State dues on or before December 1, \$3.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Rules for representation of chapters at Continental Congress:

"Chapters having less than 50 paid members on February 1 are entitled

to be represented by the Regent or in her absence the Vice Regent or alternate; chapters having 50 to 199 paid members on February 1, one delegate in addition to the Regent; chapters having 200 to 299 paid members on February 1, two delegates in addition to the Regent, and for each additional 100 members one additional delegate..." (Article XIII, Section 3-C, National Bylaws.)

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$3.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. (Article VIII, Section 4, of the State Bylaws.)

Contributions

ALL contributions by Chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

Deceased Members

Deaths shall be reported promptly to Treasurer General, State Chaplain and State Registrar by the Corresponding Chapter Officer. Complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and a date of death shall be furnished State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for Conference Memorial Service and "In Memoriam" pages for State Proceedings.

Georgia Hospitality Fund

The following resolution which applies to the Georgia Hospitality Fund appears in the Proceedings for 1955:

"WHEREAS, The Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds an annual dinner in Washington during Continental Congress, which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society.

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$150.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes:

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this fund shall not be cumulative. Adopted."

Procedure Book of Instructions for Officers and State Chairmen

The following resolution which applies to a Procedure Book of Instruction for Officers and State Chairmen appears in the Proceedings for 1959-60, Page 41.

"RESOLVED, That all Officers and State Chairmen keep a Procedure Book of Instructions and helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new Officer and Chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities thus providing a continuing continuity of DAR work, ADOPTED."

Genealogical Records

To insure uniformity and convenience in binding, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, 8½ by 11 inches, with 1½ to 2 inch margin

on left side, 1½ inches at top and 1 inch on right side and at bottom. Four copies shall be sent to State Chairman of Genealogical Records.

Information for Chapter Regents

1. All letters received by Chapter Regents relating to the work of the Society shall be distributed to the corresponding Chapter Chairman and brought to the attention of the members at a chapter meeting.

2. Please follow Resolution No. 11, adopted at 61st Georgia Society State Conference, as follows: "Resolved, That a closing date of February 1 be established for all reports, and all reports be given from February 1 to February 1, regardless of a change of regime or Regent." All awards will be made on this date basis.

Information for State Officers and State Chairmen

State Officers and State Chairmen shall send to the State Regent and to the State Treasurer a copy of any instruction letter mailed to chapters.

New Administration Reserve for Contingencies Fund

For the entire resolution setting up the "General New Regime Fund Balance of \$2500.00," found on pp. 203-204 of the 1979 Proceedings the following substitute resolution was adopted by the Board of Management: RESOLVED that at the end of each administration \$4000.00 be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies" fund, this money to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration, and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration. All other surplus monies in the General Fund, other than funds which are designated, are to be divided equally between the General Savings Account and the Meadow Garden Capital Investment Fund, as provided in the Capital Investment Fund Resolution passed in 1979 (pp. 62-63, 1979 Proceedings). This transaction is to be handled by April 30 every two years before the auditors close out the books of an administration, thus making the General Fund show the same balance of \$4000.00 at the beginning of each new administration. (This fund to be known as the "New Administration Reserve for Contingencies Fund.") Adopted.

Date for Annual Audit

WHEREAS, every effort must be made to have all material to the printer as early as possible to facilitate delivery of the Proceedings to the members, RESOLVED: That the end of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR fiscal year for audit purposes be changed from May 31st to April 30th.

Absolute Deadline for Proceedings Material

WHEREAS, a definite deadline must be established and adhered to for all reports and material to be in the hands of the Proceedings Committee in order to be delivered to the Printer by June 1st,

RESOLVED: That all FINAL reports and materials must be received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1st with the exception of the Auditor's report and any information sent out by the National DAR Headquarters. This does not alter the requirement in the "Items of Information" in the Proceedings that all reports shall be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary on or before Februry 15th, the ORIGINAL being sent to the Secretary for the Proceedings.

AND FURTHER RESOLVED: This policy will be strictly adhered to and the material not received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1st will be omitted from the Proceedings.

Reaffirmation

RESOLVED: That the Georgia State Society reaffirm the following Resolution adopted at the Fall Board of Management in Albany, October 23, 1981, which reads as follows: "Presentation of Awards" WHEREAS, all awards are given by State Officers and State Chairmen; and, WHEREAS, February first is the closing date of all work for said awards; BE IT RESOLVED: That no State Officer nor State Chairman may present her report or award(s) at State Conference unless said report, with list of award(s) is in the hands of the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary at least ten (10) days before State Conference.

Resolutions

Resolutions to be considered by the Committee shall be typed, with a heading giving subject of the resolution, signed, and sent to the Chairman of the Resolutions Committee two weeks before the date of the State Conference.

Gold Honor Roll Stars

A Gold Star is awarded when a chapter achieves the National Gold Honor Roll three consecutive years. For each additional three consecutive years, another Gold Star is awarded. If a chapter fails to achieve Gold Honor Roll any year, all stars are lost as they are awarded for consecutive achievement. National Honor Roll creditation comes from the National Chairman of the National Honor Roll Committee.

GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY CHLDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION Mrs. R. Clough Carter, Senior State President 1982-1983

The Georgia State Society, C.A.R., has been truly an active and enthusiastic organization during the past year under the very capable leadership of our State President, Keith Nolan Carter. The State Project was Membership and Participation with DAR, S.A.R. and S.R., with the State President's Theme, "C.A.R.: A foundation for the future."

Georgia has twenty organized societies. Total number of members registered and having dues paid in the state of Georgia is three hundred eighty-nine (389) according to the records of the Senior State Registrar. We have, through the efforts of twelve societies, obtained seventy-eight new members.

We have had two societies to organize since our last report. We have two more approved and organizing Senior Presidents appointed. At this time we have four Organizing Presidents. One society disbanded during this year because of lack of senior leadership.

Participation with DAR, S.A.R. and S.R., the State President's project was put into action when seven young ladies either transferred into DAR Chapters or became dual members. Three young men joined or became dual members in S.A.R. The State President was one of these three.

Georgia C.A.R. members contributed to the C.A.R. Museum; sent money, clothing, trading stamps and soup labels to the Indian Schools and Mountain Schools. Three Endowment Fund pins were presented and other contributions were made to Book Binding, Magazine Sustaining Fund, Equipment and Maintenance and the National Project this year was "To provide funds for the Capitol Fund Drive for Mount Vernon, Home of George Washington: and "A Legacy Preserved" -Restoration of the historic building comprising NSDAR National Headquarters."

We have a total of 218 State Patriots reported. Most of these are reported to have come from DAR, S.A.R., and from parents and friends of C.A.R. Many new names have appeared on our list because of the efforts of many, and the DAR Chapters in Georgia, really rallied to the cause and helped tremendously to support us in this endeavor. We also have sixty-six State Promoters and Forty-six National Promoters for 1982-1983.

July 9th and 10th found 37 members and seniors from Georgia in Birmingham, Ala., for the Southeastern Region Meeting. Our state won first place with the largest attendance, Best State Yearbook, Best State Newsletter and placed third with our Scrapbook.

The State President along with Mrs. Charles Q. Hall, Honorary Senior State President, and Fran Hall, toured the state attending DAR District Workshops. Keith left the tour after the Workshop in Eastman to travel

back to Atlanta to visit the Habersham Society and to prepare for the C.A.R. State Workshop. Mrs. Hall and Fran traveled on to Tifton for the fourth DAR workshop. The morning of the 13th of August the Georgia C.A.R. Summer Workshop convened. There were 78 members and seniors in attendance. The Workshop was deemed a successful one. While at the Workshop, President Carter installed the officers of the Cherokee Rose Society.

A Government Studies Seminar was held in Cochran, Ga. at Middle Georgia College on October 30, 1982. There were fifty-six (56) members and seniors from nine societies registered. We were entertained by the Middle Georgia College Ensemble which got things off to a good start. At the luncheon Dr. Louis Alderman, Jr., President, Middle Georgia College and First Vice President of the Georgia State S.A.R., welcomed those present. Our gracious Georgia State Regent, Daughters of the American Revolution, Mrs. Louis Alderman, Jr., also gave words of welcome. Mr. Norman Taylor spoke on Coin Collecting. Uchee Trail Society was our host.

Tamassee DAR School in South Carolina was one of the many highlights of a three day trip through Georgia taken by members and seniors from five societies over the state. The State President coordinated the tour and was accompanied by a delegation from Brunswick, Fort Frederica, Winona, Lucy Spell Raiford and Allen Howard societies. They were entertained on their way to and from Tamassee by the following societies -James Watson, Currahee, Cherokee Rose, Sergeant Newton, Jr., and Uchee Trail. the members and seniors visited the Thrift Shop at Tamassee and left good used clothes to be put to good use and many Christmas gifts for the children at Tamassee.

The 44th annual State Conference was held in Columbus, March 11-13, 1983. Fourteen societies were represented with 136 registered. Member and Senior Board Meetings were held. During the general meeting reports from all societies, officers and chairmen were given. 40 traveling trophies, 126 certificate awards and cash prizes were awarded to eleven societies. There were ten National Officers and Chairmen in attendance.

Twenty members and seniors, representing five Georgia Societies, traveled by train and plane to the Eighty-Eighth Annual Convention of the N.S.C.A.R., April 22-24, 1983. The state of Georgia tied for first place for ths S.R. Traveling Banner. We again received an award for the most State and National Promoters. (This was a first place award). Individual societies from Georgia won first place awards. Keith Carter, State President, had the distinction of being one out of five state Presidents, to win the Gold Award for answering all questions yes, on the State President's Guidelines. Keith also placed the wreath on the tomb of Martha Washington at ceremonies at Mt. Vernon on Sunday. Alida Stancil served as a page while Ben Hartman and Raymond Johnson served as color bearers. Mrs. Rodman E. Scott served as a hostess for the senior reception. Keith Carter served as chairman of the Resolutions Committee.

The Anual Installation of Officers was held in the Cotillion Room of the Sheraton-Washington Hotel on Sunday morning, April 24, due to rain. During the cermony, the following Georgians were installed in their respective offices.

 One society, Winona, celebrated their 50th Anniversary during this year. Through the efforts of our efficient Organizing Secretary, Mrs. Rod E. Scott, one new society - Gwinnett Society in Snellville, and one reorganized society - General David Blackshear in Rochelle, was added to our state C.A.R. family.

Four issues of the C.A.R. news sheet for Georgia, the CARgoes, were printed and approximately 1800 were mailed. We published an annual State Yearbook which was placed in the information packet distributed at State Workshop.
