The Recording Secretary read the minutes of the October Executive Committee Meeting. The minutes were approved as read.

The State Regent announced that this State Conference would have as honored guests: President General, NSDAR; National Chairman, DAR School Committee; State Regents of Alabama, Florida and North Carolina. The Conference theme, "A Tribute to the Founder" was suggested by Dr. Jessie Mize and will be highlighted throughout the Conference. Mrs. Alderman stated that Mrs. T. Earle Stribling would install newly elected officers at the conclusion of the Conference.

The motion was made that in the event the Traveling Fashion Show is dismantled and costumes are returned to the States, the replica of Juliette Low's Leader Uniform, currently being used as a part of the Show, be presented to Girl Scout Headquarters in Savannah with the provision that the Georgia State Society may have use of it for special occasions. Motion adopted.

As Parliamentarian, Mrs. Martin stated that the Standing Rules for State Conferences should be up-dated and asked approval to do so. Approval enthusiastically granted.

Request has been received from the National Society for \$200.00 to reupholster chairs in the Georgia Box. This request will be presented to the assembly by the Finance Committee for ratification.

State First Vice Regent announced that tickets might be purchased from her for the Georgia Breakfast at Continental Congress. Second Vice Regent said that plans were complete for the School Luncheon. State Chaplain reported 151 Georgia Daughters, 2 past State Officers and a past President General will be remembered at the Memorial Service. Recording Secretary stated that a number of of reports have not yet been received for the Proceedings. Corresponding Secretary said that necessary changes and corrections for the 1982-1983 Proceedings would be included in the Regent's mail-out. The meeting was adjourned at 11:00 a.m. A delightful breakfast had preceded this meeting, graciously hosted by the State Regent, Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr., honoring the distinguished guests of the State Conference.

Her busy schedule included: a visit with Metter Chapter; attending Board Meetings at Kate Duncan Smith and Tamassee DAR Schools; representing DAR at the S.A.R. National Congress in Atlanta (Dr. Louis C. Alderman, Jr. serves S.A.R. as Georgia State President); traveling in England with the Friends of Oglethorpe in celebration of Georgia's birthday; many trips to Meadow Garden for committee meetings and business engagements; representing the President General, NSDAR, in Atlanta at the Meeting of the National Ladies Auxiliary of Jewish War Veterans; attending the signing of the Constitution Week Proclamation by the Governor of Georgia: visiting in Savannah for a planning session with the 1984 State Conference Committee; two weeks of Chapter visits in September; and attending the October DAR National Board Meeting in Washington. Mrs. Peter S. Hanf, Curator and Chairman of DAR Museum Correspondent Docents Committee, reported all property items in place and seating for luncheon in order. She introduced the DAR Museum Correspondent Docents Committee members and said they would be pleased to provide Chapter programs.

Mrs. Hugh Peterson, Chiarman DAR 50 Year Club, will provide forms on which to report 50 year members, a record of offices held in Chapter and in State Society. 50 Year Members present were recognized and asked to stand. As Chairman of the Georgia Room, NSDAR Museum, Mrs. Peterson is compiling a record of gifts from Chapters to the Georgia Room since 1966. Mrs. Lawrence A. Liles, President Generals Project Chairman, reported completion of this project. Mrs. Louis Joseph Bahin, Protocol Chairman, referred members to the DAR Handbook for directions concerning DAR practices and policies. She presented the other members of this committee.

The roll of Chapters was called by the Recording Secretary.

State Standing Committee reports began:

She reported a total attendance of 564 with 79 Regents present and 92 Chapters represented. Mrs. Singleton recognized District Directors and hostess Chapters for the Workshops. Mrs. Charles W. Simmons, Jr., Chairman of Collecting and Publishing Revolutionary Soldiers Histories, expressed gratitude for the leadership that led to the preserving of this information and called attention to the report form for this committee in the Regent's Packet. Mrs. Gerald G. Fling, Conference Chairman, enthusiastically encouraged everyone to attend the 1984 State Conference in Savannah. Mrs. Robert L. Loflin, Cooperation of DAR with S.A.R. and S.R. Chairman, called attention to the unique fact that while Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr., serves as Regent of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Dr. Alderman serves S.A.R. as Georgia State President. She reported a successful S.A.R. National Conference in Atlanta and made a plea for DAR members to help recruit for S.A.R. Mrs. Russell Gladding, DAR Bookplates Chairman, displayed the engraved bookplates of the Georgia State Society and asked that they be placed in all books that are donated. Miss Leila Sandlin, Semiquincentenary, Georgia Day Chairman, showed a poster featuring an historical map of Georgia. She asked that these maps be purchased. Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar, as Chairman of the History of the Georgia State Society requested current reports to keep the history up-to-date. Hugh Reid, Meadow Garden Chairman, the State Regent reported on damage to Meadow Garden as a result of highway construction in Augusta, of the need of repairs to the Resident Manager's Cottage, the high cost of monthly utility bills and the need to paint Meadow Garden after certain repairs are made. Mrs. John R. Williamson, Meadow Garden Festival Chairman, reported a profit of \$1,612.66 from the Festival. Mrs. Harold Starr Smith, Meadow Garden Docents Chairman, said 6 Chapters were represented by Docents. Mrs. Luther L. Watson, Meadow Garden Landscaping Chairman, reported that bids for planting and the sprinkler system have been accepted. She presented the Vice Chairmen of this committee. Mrs. Robert L. Mrs. Heyward Vann, Textbook Study Chairman, requested each Chapter to appoint a committee for Textbook Study and strive to become acquainted with teachers in the local school system. American Education Week will be observed November 14-18. Mrs. Gwendolyn S. Edenfield, Chairman of Conference Pages, reported the need for more pages at Continental Congress and stated she

had 20 pages for State Conference.

Mrs. William D. Wilson, Sr., serving for Mrs. Sam Black, gave the final Credentials report: State Officers, 12; Parliamentarian, 1; National Officer, 1; National Chairman and Vice Chairman, 7; Honorary State Regents, 9 (less National Officer, 1); State Chairmen and Vice Chairmen, 31 (reported elsewhere 13); Chapter Regents, 41 (reported elsewhere 7); Chapter Members, 19. Total Registration without duplication, 121.

After several announcements the meeting was declared in recess.

Luncheon was served at 12:30 p.m. in the Pulitzer Plaza. The State Chaplain offered the blessing. Distinguished Georgia Daughters seated at the head table were presented. The State Regent again thanked the Brunswick and Fort Frederica Chapters for their gracious hospitality and for the lovely Dessert Party at the home of Mrs. Raiford L. Drew.

The group enjoyed a delightful musical program by Mrs. Raiford L. Drew, accompanied by Mrs. Charles Jones.

International Month is October's theme for the Georgia Semiquincentenary celebration. Appropriately, the Fall Board of Management enjoyed hearing highlights of recent tours taken by DAR members. Mrs. Samuel M. Merritt spoke of an Ireland Ramble taken with the Georgia Trust of Historic Preservation Group. Mrs. Thomas Knox Kendrick told of trips to Japan and Canada taken with a number of leading Georgia industrialists. Mrs. Louis Joseph Bahin, President of the National Society of the Daughters of Founders and Patriots of America, reported on a visit to Yorktown this October where she was the presiding officer at the annual Yorktown Celebration.

Miss Leila Sandlin reported on her trip to France for the celebration of the Treaty of Paris Bicentennial. As members of the special DAR Tour Group Miss Sandlin and Mrs. Robert G. # RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED EIGHTY-SIXTH STATE CONFERENCE MARCH 9, 1984 SAVANNAH, GEORGIA

### BALANCED BUDGET

WHEREAS the United States of America was established on the principles of fiscal responsibility, and

WHEREAS while it maintained that principle the Nation grew and prospered as no other nation in history, and,

WHEREAS under this system the people of the United States enjoyed freedom from undue control by the government and prospered as a result of their individual initiative, and

WHEREAS since the government abandoned these principles and brought about a debt ridden Nation, and

WHEREAS Americans have become burdened with excessive taxes, causing great anguish and a great loss of freedom,

RESOLVED that the members of the Georgia State Society, National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, as individuals, urge the members of Congress to support a balanced budget amendment to the United States Constitution which would mandate a return to fiscal responsibility.

#### FREEDOM AT RISK\*

WHEREAS the United National Educational Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) was organized for the purpose of fostering the exchange of educational, scientific, and cultural programs and information throughout the world; and

WHEREAS the Third World and Soviet-bloc nations have used UNESCO to politicize virtually every area of focus; has exhibited hostility toward basic institutions of a free society, a free press, and free enterprise; and demonstrated unrestrained budgetary expansions; and

WHEREAS information control (control of a 'free press') is the primary tool of tyrants and totalitarian functionaries today; and

WHEREAS American taxpayers were assessed 25% (50 million dollars in 1983) of UNESCO's budget (200 million dollars in 1983) based upon United Nations membership regulation; and

WHEREAS UNESCO has increased the 1984 budget to 374 million, which will cost American taxpayers \$93 million; and

WHEREAS the United States has only one vote out of 158 nations determining policy, while funding one-fourth of this elephantine bureaucracy's budget, and thereby is subsidizing the steady inoculation of the world with degraded political language, manipulated by America's enemies; and

WHEREAS 1984 could be the year for the United States to weigh the cost — financial, political, and moral — of continued participation of the United Nations.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the members of the Georgia State Society, National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, as individuals, commend the President of the United States, Ronald W. Reagan, and the Secretary of State, George P. Schultz, for addressing this issue of paramount importance to America's freedom. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the members of the Georgia State Society, National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, contact members of the Congress of the United States expressing support of American withdrawal from UNESCO and their refusal to fund an organization hostile to the United States and freedom throughout the world.

# THE ULTIMATE RESPONSIBILITY\*

WHEREAS IN November, 1984, American Citizens will elect a President and Vice President of the United States and men and women to many other important elective offices; and

WHEREAS national indifference is as great a threat to our American way of life as is the most potent foreign power; and,

WHEREAS the future of this representative republic is placed in the hands of the American voter; and

WHEREAS the privilege of voting for the candidates of choice was established in the Bill of Rights, yet can be exercised only through the acceptance of responsibility of each citizen by casting a ballot; and

WHEREAS the prerequisite to the right to vote is based upon registration prior to elections: and

WHEREAS startling statistics indicate that millions of eligible voters are apathetic about exercising the privilige of the vote: of the approximately 150 million people of voting age, only 98.2 million (65%) were registered for the 1980 Presidential election; and WHEREAS of this number of those registered, a mere 61 million voters cast their ballot; and

WHEREAS statistics reveal that approximately 53% of those eligible to vote were women, which places an additional responsibility on members of the DAR to exercise and proclaim the basic duty of good citizenship.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the members of the Georgia State Society, National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, diligently encourage registration of all eligible citizens and admonish all registered voters to exercise their right to cast a ballot.

"Grant that we may feel the full measure of our responsibility; that we may feel we have a holy trust committed to our care; that we may not carry it lightly, but as in Thy sight, knowing that if our institutions are perpetuated we must do our part. Give us grace at this time and with one accord to realize what a heritage is ours. Help us to guard with jealous care our freedom and liberty."

#### DOGWOOD TREES

WHEREAS, the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, was privileged to present 300 dogwood trees to the people of Paris and of France as part of the Bicentennial celebration of the Treaty of Paris; and,

WHEREAS, these trees are being planted in areas of Paris, including the residence of the United States Ambassador, at the Chateau of the Comte de Rochambeau at Vendome, and at Chavanic, the birthplace of LaFayette, and also are being planted at nurseries of the French government to encourage future growth and reproduction for continued plantings of the Georgia dogwood tree in France; therefore.

BE IT RESOLVED That the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, through the State Regent, express to Senator Gillis and to Mr. Mixon and his staff the appreciation of the Georgia Daughters for the cooperation the State of Georgia gave to the National Society and to the President General in making possible this gift of dogwood trees to the people of France.

# BICENTENNIAL OF THE UNITED STATES CONSTITUTION

WHEREAS the observance of the Bicentennial Era of the United States concludes in 1987 with the adoption of the Constitution of the United States of America on September 17, 1787; and,

WHEREAS the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, has supported the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, in the observances of the events of this Bicentennial Era, which began with the Battle of Lexington on April 19, 1775, and has included: the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776, which declared the intent of the Colonists to form a free and independent nation; the Victory at Yorktown, when Cornwallis surrendered to the colonial Army on October 19, 1781; the signing of the Treaty of Paris on September 3, 1783, which established the United States as a free and independent nation, recognized by all nations of the world; and, WHEREAS the adoption of the Constitution of the United States completed the process from intent of the Colonists to the reality of a new nation under God; therefore, BE IT RESOLVED That the Georgia State Society, National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, begin plans for the Bicentennial of the Constitution of the United States and support efforts of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, in planning for this significant Bicentennial celebration which will reaffirm the principles upon which our great Republic is established.

### STATUE OF LIBERTY

WHEREAS the Statue of Liberty, a gift to the people of the United States from the people of France, will observe its Centennial on July 4, 1984; and,

WHEREAS this symbol of freedom on Ellis Island offered hope to over 17 million immigrants between 1892 and 1954, and has welcomed home countless thousands returning from foreign soil in times of war and of peace; and,

WHEREAS the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, has been identified with the work done at Ellis Island and the Statue of Liberty from organizing occupational therapy programs for the immigrants to the presentation of the DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP to those desiring to become naturalized citizens; and, WHEREAS the Statue of Liberty-Ellis Island Foundation, Inc., is raising funds for the restoration of this historically significant part of the American heritage to which today more than 100 million Americans trace the beginning of their American forebears; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED That the Georgia State Society, National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, take an active part in the promotion of this project, including both the encouraging of contributions and the understanding of the history and the symbolism of the Statue of Liberty and Ellis Island.

#### HONORABLE LAWRENCE P. (LARRY) MCDONALD

WHEREAS the Honorable Lawrence P. (Larry) McDonald, a native Georgian representing the 7th District of Georgia, was a responsible member of the United States Congress, and

WHEREAS Congressman McDonald was a patriotic American dedicated to the preservation of this Nation under the Constitution of the United States, and

WHEREAS Congressman McDonald worked diligently to keep this nation free from the inroads of communism, and

WHEREAS Congressman McDonald was killed in the Russian attack on the unarmed passenger plane, KAL - 007, in August, 1983, and

WHEREAS Congressman McDonald's contribution to this Nation was made at great personal sacrifice,

RESOLVED that the Georgia State Society, National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, express its regret to his family at the violent and untimely death of the Honorable Lawrence P. (Larry) McDonald, Congressman from Georgia, who made the supreme sacrifice in service to his country.

#### COST OF PUBLIC EDUCATION

WHEREAS the cost of educating the youth of the United States is not maintaining the fundamental economic requirement of showing a fair return for the taxpayers' investment, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED That the Georgia State Society, National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, encourage its members, as individual concerned citizens and tax-payers, to support all efforts at national, state and local levels to re-examine the philosophy of the public education system in order to stabilize a realistic ratio between the investment by the taxpayers and the results the students obtain in the basic courses of reading, writing, arithmetic and grammar.

# **Reports of State Officers**

STATE REGENT

Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr.

In May a second annual Meadow Garden Festival successfully raised money for the Capital Investment Trust Fund and served as a happy day of fellowship for Georgia Daughters. As has been the case in previous years, the upkeep and enhancement of Meadow Garden have been an ever present concern.

The period landscaping has been a focal point and its completion as a Semiquincentenary project is rewarding. In early summer final plans by Sybil Argintar Bowers were approved and Barry Smith, of Heritage Garden Center, was chosen to do the work. A sprinkler system was installed, transplanting and fall planting were done, a grape arbor, benches and brick walkways were constructed, and finally came spring planting and reseeding of grass.

Maintenance has included the replacement of broken window panes, repair of porch floors and some columns and redoing the brick foundations, repairing the under house area, adding locks for greater security, replacing shingles and checking the roof, repair and painting of cottage walls and ceiling and doors, recovering the cottage kitchen floor, renovating the bathroom, replacement of a burst cottage pipe, strengthening the cottage foundation, and replacement of all water pipes on the place.

Board meetings, Dedication Day, Founders Day, Graduation, and other special events were enjoyed at KDS and Tamassee in May, June and October. National Board Meetings, with their outstanding entertainment events, were attended in October, February and April. Three television interviews in Macon and Savannah and news accounts of chapter visits helped to tell what the Daughters do.

The number of Georgia Chapters was reduced by one to 106 when the members of Stone Castle Chapter transferred to Dorothy Walton Chapter, thereby causing automatic disbandment of Stone Castle Chapter. The name of Dorothy Walton Chapter was changed to Old Herod Chapter.

There was a net membership increase of 183. One hundred and six of these were new Junior Members. The need for new members continued to be emphasized, and an increased effort was made to help with genealogical research. A membership forum was held at District Workshop.

#### STATE ORGANIZING SECRETARY Mrs. Ned L. Shuman

This officer has had the pleasure of participating in all four District Workshops, Fall Board of Management, State Conference, Meadow Garden Festival and all Executive Board Meetings. A display related to the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution and the Georgia State Society, NSDAR was set up at State Conference and the Meadow Garden Festival. Programs were presented to three chapters.

Efforts to conserve chapters who were on the verge of disbandment have been rewarded with the continuation of these chapters. This officer greatly appreciates those state officers, state chairmen, and chapter members who contributed to these efforts.

#### STATE REGISTRAR Mrs. Jerido Ward

On March 2, 1983, the National Society reported 7,942 members of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR. Since then, 364 members were accepted by application, 103 of these were juniors, 28 were reinstatements, and 29 members were acquired through transfer from other State Societies. 110 members were lost by death, 74 through resignation and 54 members were dropped for non-payment of dues. With a net gain of 183. Georgia Daughters now number 8,125. All duties of the State Registrar have been performed. Information received from Chapter Registrars has been posted. The card file of members by chapter and the alphabetical last name index of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR are current. This officer attended State Conference, all Workshop sessions, Fall Board of Management, and all Executive Committee meetings. The copy of the Treasurer General's computer print-out of chapter membership was received from 105 Georgia chapters. Madam State Regent, it has been a rewarding experience to serve the Georgia State Society, NSDAR under your leadership. I am most grateful.

#### STATE HISTORIAN Mrs. Gordon W. Kilgore

Attended 85th State Conference, four summer workshops, and Fall Board of Management meeting. On February 12 attended Savannah observance of Georgia Day, Semi-quincentenary. Records of State Historian in good order; card files made for all reported marked graves and historic sites. Marked graves of deceased daughters on file, 455; Real daughters, 22; daughters Rev. Soldiers, 6; Rev. Soldiers, 383. 170 historical markers in files. Feel many have not been reported to this office; hopefully chapters will continue to work on this project.

Reports received from 88 chapters on time, 1 late. Unsold on hand 191 copies of History of the Georgia State Society, plus some at Meadow Garden. Fourteen chapters nominated Outstanding Teachers of American History. Three judges assessed these; 1983-84 winner, Esther Raines Mallard (Mrs. Jack Duron) Statesboro, nominated by Archibald Bulloch Chapter.

For best chapter reports winners were: 1-50 members, Captain John Wilson Chapter; 51-100 members, Lachlan McIntosh Chapter; 100 members, up, Brunswick Chapter. Special awards for *reporting* all marked graves to date and historic sites to Joseph Habersham Chapter, Old Herod Chapter, Nancy Hart Chapter and Stephen Heard Chapter.

Privileged to attend Rededication of Historic Marker "Ft. Mitchell and Soldiers of 1812" by invitation of Hawkinsville Chapter. Appreciation expressed to all chapters for invitations during year — impossible to attend all.

List of all Historical markers installed in State by chapters and Society sent to Cherokee Publishing (now Larlin) to be included as an appendix to reprint of GEORGIA HISTORY MARKERS, with approval of the Executive Board at State Conference.

Thanks, everyone, for your cooperation, making this job most interesting.

#### STATE LIBRARIAN Mrs. Charles W. Ennis

Georgia Daughters continue to be enthusiastic and generous in their contribution to library work on the local, State and National level.

On the local level 78 chapters reported having librarians with 11 having programs on the NSDAR Library. Over 300 pamphlets on the NSDAR Library were distributed. Genealogical and literary resources continue to grow with gifts of 424 books, 94 microfilm reels, 12 subscriptions to the DAR magazine, historical quarterlies and magazines, cabinets and paintings and cash donations totaling \$13,338.29 were donated. Approximately 1,981 hours reported in volunteer work with 1,285 spend in indexing.

Interest in the Georgia Archives continues with 10 books valued at \$280.45 and one microfilm reel donated. An 8 volume set entitled *Biography and Genealogy Master Index* was presented to the Archives.

Contributions to the NSDAR Library include \$239.60 to the Rebinding Fund, \$245.70 to Book Preservation, \$35.00 to Book Purchase and \$10.00 for Equipment Purchase. 18 books totaling \$326.50 in value were given by Georgia chapters.

The Chairman's gift of a \$100 Scholarship to each school is given in honor of the President General, Mrs. Walter Hughey King, and of the National Chairman of the American Indian Committee, Mrs. Walter D. Carroll.

This Chairman's first-place Award of \$10.00 to the chapter submitting the best overall report on a percapita basis goes to the Joseph Habersham Chapter with a contribution of \$500.00. Honorable mention is awarded to Lyman Hall Chapter and to the Savannah Chapter.

Of the forty-five chapters reporting special Indian Programs eight sent newspaper clippings with photographs giving a synopsis of their programs. Two chapters, Roswell King and Nancy Hart, met the requirement of complete copies of the script. The Chairman's Award of \$5.00 for the best program submitted goes to Roswell King Chapter with a second Award of \$3.00 to the Nancy Hart Chapter.

Since the work of this committee has been both enjoyable and rewarding this Chairman wishes to express appreciation to the Regent of the Georgia State Society, Mrs. Louis J. Alderman, Jr., for giving her this privilege, and to the chapters of the Georgia State Society whose untiring efforts made the compilation of this report possible she voices her gratitude.

## AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP Mrs. Chester Hodges

Annual reports were received from 88 chapters. 78 chapters reported repeating the American's Creed at every meeting and 58 chapters devoted at least 1 chapter meeting to an Americanism program. Americanism talks were given to other organizations by 10 chapters and 8 programs were presented on radio and/or TV. 7 chapters studied the Immigration Act or other immigration material; 12 chapters sponsored Americanism essays and poster contests in schools. 2025 DAR Manuals were given to applicants for American Citizenship and for use in Americanism classes; 45 were purchased for use in high schools; 18 placed in libraries; 25 for adult groups and 20 for other uses. 5 taught or worked with Americanism classes giving 346 hours to reduce illiteracy. 35 members attended Naturalization Ceremonies and 3 chapters arranged for young persons to attend Naturalization Ceremonies. New citizens were presented 569 Flags of the USA, 5 Flag Pins, 548 Flag Codes, 312 Welcome Cards, 312 American Creed Cards, 386 Patriotic Leaflets and Pamphlets, and 3 Chapters sponsored teas or receptions.

DAR Medal of Honor Awards were presented to Dr. Leila D. Denmark, sponsored by Joseph Habersham Chapter and to H. Randolph Holder, sponsored by Elijah Clarke Chapter.

#### CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION Mrs. R. Clough Carter

This State Chairman received reports from 70 Chapters. Each of these reports showed a growing interest in the work of the Children of the American Revolution.

The work of this important committee and its objects of helping our young people to acquire a better knowledge of American History; to preserve and restore places of Historical Importance; to ascertain the deeds and honor the memories of the men, women and children who rendered service to the cause of the American Revolution; to promote the celebration of patriotic anniversaries; to honor and cherish the flag of the United States of America above every other flag; and to love and extend the principles of American liberty and patriotism was noticed by this chairman as she made the tour of state DAR workshops last summer and also by the reports sent to the chairman.

Some facts gleaned from the reports were: 16 chapters sponsor a C.A.R. Society; 18 provide Senior Leadership; 14 subscribe to the Magazine; 46 new C.A.R. members were secured by the chapters; local and state C.A.R. functions were attended by chapter members; 59 DAR are State Promoters; 52 DAR are National Promoters; 1 Life Promoter was given by a chapter.

Contributions to local and state C.A.R. totaled \$1,030.00. Contributions to the Endowment Fund totaled \$1,235.00 and \$211.00 was reported given to other projects.

Sincere appreciation is expressed to the chapters for their cooperation, and particularly to our State Regent for her continuing support.

#### CONSERVATION Mrs. William C. Lord

The Georgia Daughters are contributing to the future well being of our state through the 101 chapters reporting. They should be particularly pleased with the insight into history through their Meadow Garden Landscape to which they contributed \$3,110.50 this year. Internationally they have given 300 dogwood trees to the people of France through the NSDAR in the Treaty of Paris Bicentennial Celebration. We had 7 chapters observe Conservation Day, 9 Fire Prevention Week, 10 Arbor Day, and 7 Wildlife Protection.

We planted 761,813 trees. 13 chapters planted wildflowers, 20 fed wild animals, 16 fed birds with an estimated 11,462 pounds of birdseed used overall. This year there were two National Conservation medals given. 63 trees were planted in memory of someone, 35 gardens were planted and there were 28 Conservation Programs and 8 chapters had Conservation Publicity. Best overall report goes to Joseph Habersham Chapter. Best program award also goes to Joseph Habersham Chapter which described native Georgia plants. Tied for Best Chapter Projects are John Franklin Wren for its cemetery upkeep and the planting of two trees per member and to Xavier Chapter for selling 7,800 pounds of birdseed and giving the funds to DAR projects.

#### DAR GOOD CITIZENS Mrs. R.H. Deen, Jr.

Good Citizen pins and certificates were awarded to 228 Seniors by 87 chapters. District winners and their sponsors were Karen McCray, N.W. District, sponsored by Abraham Baldwin Chapter, Andy Eberhard, N.E. District, sponsored by Elijah Clarke Chapter, Aubrey Edge, S.W. District, sponsored by Hawkinsville Chapter, Bryan Andrzejewski, S.E. District, sponsored by Brunswick Chapter.

Each winner received \$10.00 award from the State Society. Karne McCray was chosen the State Good Citizen. She received \$100.00 Educational Award and a State Good Citizen pin. She was entered in competition in the National Southeastern Division.

#### DAR MAGAZINE Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr.

All 106 Georgia chapters submitted reports on their participation in subscribing to the DAR Magazine, their articles entered for publication, and their particular interests in the various items appearing in the Magazine. The total number of subscriptions reported was 2,253, which is 29% of the membership. There were 103 new subscriptions and 54 gift subscriptions. 85 chapters met Honor Roll requirements. 21 chapters had 40% or more subscribing. Those chapters having 50% or more subscribing are: John Ball - 50%, Sukey Hart - 80%, and Oothcaloga - 96%. Nine articles, seven with pictures, were sent to be published in "With the Chapters", and six feature articles were submitted for publication in the DAR Magazine. Features of the Magazine most interesting to the members, in order of preference, were historical and other feature articles, National Defense, "With the Chapters", and genealogical information. Least interesting to the members were the ads featuring pictures of candidates for office. Several chapters commented on the beautiful new cover pages of the Magazine. Thank you, Madam State Regent, for giving this chairman the honor and pleasure of serving the State Society in this capacity.

#### DAR MAGAZINE ADVERTISING

#### Mrs. Thorne Winter

The Georgia State Society had 98% chapter participation for 1983-84. Georgia placed second nationally in the amount of money raised for ads. California was first with \$9,680 and Georgia second with \$8,100. This amount was from twenty-seven pages of ads from Georgia, including co-op, chapter and commercial ads. Sixty-eight chapters paid for our four co-op pages. In addition, forty-five chapters sent chapter ads to NSDAR and twenty chapters sold commercial ads.

It has been a wonderful experience working with Georgia's wonderful chapters, chairmen and officers.

#### DAR MUSEUM Mrs. Alvin G. Turley

Letters of information and report forms were sent to District Directors for distribution at summer workshops. Chairman presented work of this committee at the four workshops. In response 88 reports were received, and Georgia chapters can be proud of contributing \$643.05 in cash to the DAR Museum. Of this amount 422.05 was designated for the General Fund. One individual sponsor gift of \$50 was sent in by Fort Peachtree Chapter. Other breakdown of figures indicates: State Room, \$247; Textile Storage, \$19; Air Conditioning Museum, \$13; Cataloguing, \$36.50; and Research, \$1.00. Twenty-four full programs and 10 partial programs were given on the DAR Museum. Eight Docents were reported.

In October 1983 Mrs. Pat Hopkins of LaGrange Chapter and her daughter, Mrs. Sally Sue Crawford, Organizing Regent of Philadelphia Winn Chapter, gave to the Museum a small handmade wooden doll, circa 1792-95, which has been passed down in their family 192 years. A pewter platter valued at \$300 was presented by John Franklin Wren Chapter. Four Windsor arm chairs ca. 1780 of New England origin were presented in June from the Georgia Society.

#### DAR SCHOLARSHIP Mrs. Daisy A. McClure

Of the 106 State Chapters, 56 reported to the state chairman. Many reporting have no Scholarship Committee Chairman.

The State Treasurer reported that 92 Chapters contributed \$287.95 to American History Scholarship Fund and \$241.95 to Occupational Therapy Scholarship Fund.

The Joseph Habersham Chapter granted the sum of \$2736 in scholarships in addition to their \$670 contributed to the various schools.

Student loans are administered by, and available at, the following institutions: University of Georgia, Athens; Georgia College, Milledgeville; Valdosta State College, Valdosta; Berry College, Rome; and Mercer University, Macon.

#### Mrs. Allen L. Brewer

The State Treasurer reports that \$19,268.20 was contributed to the schools. Tamassee State Regent's Project \$3,074.10, Scholarship \$3,577.75, General Fund \$3,972.25, Water System \$477.25; Kate Duncan Smith State Regent's Project \$2,170.60, Scholarship \$1,201.75, General Fund \$1,805.75, Auditorium \$182.25; Berry State Regent's Project \$600.50, Scholarship \$315.00, General Fund \$121.50; Crossnore \$636.25; Hillside \$558.25; Hindman 574.75.

76 of the 100 chapters reporting gave programs on the schools. 91 chapters sent 442 boxes of clothing weighing 12,545 pounds at a cost of \$868.60. 12 chapters had projects to benefit the schools. Several reported good newspaper and radio coverage as well as TV coverage for special events. Reports indicated that a large number of DAR visited the schools, many taking with them clothing and other gifts. #### DAR SERVICE FOR VETERAN PATIENTS Mrs. Edward E. McBride, Jr.

Our State Society received a National First Place Award for outstanding services performed for veteran patients during 1982.

This chairman is grateful to her four vice chairmen, chapter regents and chapter chairmen for 100% reporting of the diligent work and services performed for our veteran patients during 1982 and again during 1983.

Contributions to the VA Medical Centers in Decatur, Dublin and Augusta included: 3883 hours of voluntary service, 478 parties valued at \$3310.00, 42,632 hand made gifts valued at \$4093.00, 7734 comfort items valued at \$8142.00 and 5974 canteen books valued at \$7299.00.

Veteran patients in military hospitals, private homes, nursing homes and private hospitals received 2100 gifts valued at \$4088.00 and 1116 parties valued at \$3400.00.

The purpose of the Junior American Citizens Committee is to teach the children of all races, creeds and economic levels, love and loyalty to the United States of America. This is being done by the 13 Georgia Chapters that sponsor JAC clubs. 479 Georgia children entered the contest at the local level. This chairman sent 44 first place winners to the National Contest chairman.

Following are some of the activities reported by JAC Clubs:

- Visited a county courthouse where officials explained their duties and conducted a tour of facilities.
- One fifth grade club centered its activities around research on the American Revolution and Revolutionary heroes. Their officers assumed the responsibility of learning the rules of parliamentary procedure.

3. Participated in DAR American History Month program.

- A Drama Group organized by members is working on an original play with a Revolutionary period setting.
- National JAC Day proclaimed by the Mayor of Thomasville with club members leading in the celebration activities.
- 6. Books about Georgia History were made and decorated by club members.

7. One Club enjoyed a field trip to Plains, Ga.

 Individual books with information about the Constitution and including facts about the American Revolution were made by one Club.

This Chairman appreciates the work of all 13 Chapters that sponsor JAC Clubs; but she wishes to recognize the outstanding work done by the JAC Chairmen of the following Chapters: Thomasville, Baron DeKalb and Philadelphia Winn.

#### JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP Mrs. Buxton L. Daniel

100% of Georgia's chapters reported the diligent work of our 645 Junior Members. Georgia has gained 103 new Juniors since March 1, 1983. Georgia Juniors hold the positions of 1 National Chairman, 9 State Chairmen, 1 State Vice Chairman, 7 Chapter Regents, 34 Chapter Officers and 120 Chapter Chairmen. Contributions to the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund total \$1,061.44. 7 Junior Programs have been given. A Junior Directory is almost complete. 80 Chapters have responded to the National Junior Survey. Gwendolyn Sue Edenfield of the Earl of Camden Chapter in Camden County is Georgia's Outstanding Junior. Linda Jean Williams Closson (Mrs. Spencer W.) of the Fort Peachtree Chapter in Atlanta is the First Runner-up in the Outstanding Junior Contest.

#### LINEAGE RESEARCH Mrs. George W. Murphy

Reports were received from 93 Chapters. 82 have Lineage Research Chairmen, an increase of 10 over last year. The Chapter Lineage Chairmen received 300 requests for assistance and 67 new members were acquired through that help. There are 67 papers

pending in Washington. 12 programs or workshops were given to DAR Chapters and 6 to other organizations. We have 62 Volunteer Researchers listed in the Laura Thompson Blue Book and 34 new ones will be added next year. This chairman has received 10 requests for assistance from Georgia and one from out of state. It has been a pleasure to serve the Georgia State Society, NSDAR.

#### MEMBERSHIP Mrs. E. Lee Stephenson

This has been a membership-minded year in the Georgia Society. 95 out of 106 chapters reported. 34 chapters had at least four new members. 56 chapters had one or more new Junior members. Two chapters had eighteen new members. One chapter had seven new Junior members. 352 new members were reported to me: 117 were Juniors. 31 members were reinstated; 36 transferred within the state; 68 resigned; 76 deceased. This chairman attended all four summer work-shops and State Conference. Mrs. Alderman instituted special sessions on membership at each work-shop. These were well attended and seemed very worthwhile, Mrs. Herman Richardson and other skilled lineage specialists answered specific questions about problems encountered in completing applications. All queries and requests for assistance were answered promptly. Computer print-outs are still improving, and chapter reports were most gratifying. It was a pleasure to work with our state officers, chapter chairmen and state chairmen, and our State Regent. Enthusiasm has been maintained at a high level, so much so that one chapter has decided they have enough members, and is trying to draft a by-law that will make it possible for the executive board to prevent prospective members from going before the chapter for vote by entire membership. That is a pretty serious situation to this chairman. Perhaps a new chapter is called for, small enough to be comfortable for those few who want to limit the chapter's membership.

#### MEMBERSHIP COMMISSION Mrs. Jerido Ward

Membership being stressed, the Membership commission held three meetings during the year. This chairman chaired the Membership Forum held during the third session of District Workshops. Thanks to Mrs. E. Lee Stephenson and Mrs. Herman M. Richardson for their assistance at this Forum. This chairman attended State Conference, District Workshops and Fall Board of Management Meeting. There are 106 Chapters in Georgia, with a membership of 8,125 (133 of these are members at large). Madam State Regent, it has been a privilege to serve the Georgia State Society, NSDAR under your guidance.

## MOTION PICTURE, RADIO AND TELEVISION Mrs. George Wing

Considerable interest in the work of this committee was evidenced at the summer workshops where objectives, procedures, and reporting were discussed.

A total of \$34.50 was contributed for videotaping the Continental Congress. 164 letters were written to broadcasting companies and/or sponsors to voice favorable or unfavorable reactions to specific programs.

The best movie for all family viewing was "The Prodigal" with "Terms of Endearment" as the best for adults. "Little House on the Prairie" rated first as the TV Series for family viewing and "60 Minutes" as the first choice for adults. Designated as the worst movie was "Day After" and the worst TV Series was "Dallas".

The first award of \$10.00 for the best overall report went to Colonel Daniel Appling chapter with a three-way tie for second place to Archibald Bulloch, John Laurens, and Brunswick chapters. Each received \$5.00. Special recognition went to the following: Colonel William Candler, Savannah, Atlanta, and Lyman Hall.

#### NATIONAL DEFENSE Mrs. A.C. Earl Shepherd

National Defense reports were received from 84 of the 106 chapters in the State. 80 chapters devoted at least one entire program to National Defense topics; 79 devoted

five minutes to National Defense each meeting and 50 gave more time; 77 studied the 1983 Resolutions; 71 had material available at meetings and 55 Chapters gave material to 28 schools, 26 libraries, 50 interested individuals; 58 Chapters gave 350 Good Citizenship Medals; 58 Chapters gave \$144.50 to the NSDAR ROTC fund, 77 bronze medals and 13 gold medals; 32 Chapters contributed \$561.50 to NSDAR National Defense fund; 153 paid subscriptions to the National Defense mailings; 459 members wrote to Congressmen; 548 members wrote to State Legislators; approximately 3,142 members voted in 1983-1984; 37 members hold elective or appointed public office.

Legislative issues of greatest interest: Budget, Defense, Nuclear Freeze, Education and Taxes.

National Defense topics of greatest interest were Defense measures; Nuclear Deception, Americanism is our Responsibility; Peace through Strength and Educational Dismay.

This chairman is grateful to the 14 Vice Chairmen that have assisted her; to the Chapters that sent reports and to the State Regent for her leadership and support.

#### NATIONAL HONOR ROLL Dr. Jessie J. Mize

The 1983-1984 National Honor Roll report blanks were mailed from NSDAR to Chapter Regents in November 1983. A letter of information was included in the August Workshop packet to Chapter Regents. Reminder post cards were mailed to twenty-two Regents when the reporting date shown on the colored blank was approaching. Reports were not received from three Chapters.

Verification is made in the National DAR office of information about membership and payment of annual dues for all members received before Dec. 1, as well as other required information. There were discrepancies for 30 Chapters between these records and that on the report form in 1984.

Appreciation is expressed to chapter officers achieving the Gold Award for three consecutive years. It has been a great pleasure to serve as Chairman with Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, State Regent.

## TREATY OF PARIS BICENTENNIAL CELEBRATION Mrs. Robert G. Fountain

Letter mailed in July to all Chapter Regents giving them information about the TREATY OF PARIS BICENTENNIAL CELEBRATION and instructions to mail a report of their activities to me by Feb. 1. Posters made and carried to District Meetings to help Chapters make posters for local displays and schools. Mailed 33 pkgs of duplicate material of posters shown at District Meetings to members making posters before leaving on Aug. 21 with NSDAR members from 32 States on the NSDAR TREATY OF PARIS BICENTENNIAL TOUR.

Chapter reports showed the Chapters had excellent cooperation in their cities and towns in celebrating the TREATY OF PARIS BICENTENNIAL. The importance of the TREATY OF PARIS document to our country was new knowledge to many. This important treaty which has been passed over without much emphasis placed on its importance in history studies became an interesting lesson during its bicentennial celebration for many students and adults.

Chapters found their cities and towns were interested in learning more about the TREATY OF PARIS and most of them were able to obtain good publicity on TV, radio and in their newspress. Lack of knowledge by many about the TREATY OF PARIS added to its interest and made many towns more interested in the TREATY OF PARIS BICENTENNIAL CELEBRATION. Chapters had outstanding programs on the TREATY OF PARIS. Many towns learned about the TREATY OF PARIS thru the material and programs made available by DAR Chapters in and near their towns. Chapters had church bells rung, church bulletins carried announcements of the historic event, ministers included the TREATY OF PARIS BICENTENNIAL CELEBRATION in their sermon, displays, exhibits, posters in libraries, schools and stores, plays and skits were put on by chapters, slide programs shown, many mayors signed proclamations with DAR Chapter members present.

Five Georgia daughters attended the TREATY OF PARIS BICENTENNIAL CELEBRATION in Paris and Versialles, France. They were Mrs. R. Hugh Reid, NSDAR Parliamentarian; Miss Laura M. Reid; Mrs. Robert G. Fountain, Miss Leila S. Sandlin, Mrs. W.M. Roberts. Mrs. Fountain and Miss Sandlin were members of the TREATY OF PARIS NSDAR BICENTENNIAL TOUR.

## FINANCE Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox

The committee met at 4:00 p.m., March 9, 1983 in the Savannah Room at the Columbus Hilton Hotel. Present were Mesdames James J. Muldrow, Leyton Colvin, Donald Hankinson, A.C. Earl Shepherd, Robert Humphrey, John Terry, Jonathan Fox and Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, State Regent. Mrs. Fox presided. Mrs. Hankinson, State Treasurer, distributed the Summary of Funds for the year to date. She discussed each item. This was followed by a discussion of the investment of the Capital Investment Trust Fund. At this time, Mrs. Hankinson can invest the money in this fund for 7 years at 11% interest with interest withdrawal available. Mrs. Muldrow moved that the money in the Capital Investment Trust Fund be invested at 11% for 7 years with interest payments twice a year; seconded by Mrs. Terry; motion passed. The Meadow Garden Board had requested that \$5000.00 be taken from the State Savings Account and put into the Meadow Garden Maintenance Fund because of the expense of unexpected repairs at the house. A motion to that effect was made by Mrs. John Terry, seconded by Mrs. Colvin. In the discussion which followed, it was noted that this was not a loan and would not be repaid to the Savings Account. The motion to recommend this to the State Society was passed. As there was no further business, the meeting adjourned at 5:00 p.m.

The finance committee met on October 26, 1983 at the Jekyll Island Hilton Hotel. Present were Mesdames Fox, Hankinson, Humphrey, Muldrow and Shepherd. Mrs. Louis

Alderman, State Regent, was also present. Mrs. Fox, chairman, presided and read the minutes of the last meeting. An addition to the minutes noting that the budget for 1983-84 was discussed and not changed from the current budget was made; the minutes were approved as corrected. Mrs. Hankinson, State Treasurer, distributed the Summary of Funds; it was noted that the account for Bookplates should be part of the Librarian's Fund and not shown as a separate account. Mrs. Hankinson also explained in detail Exhibit A under Unallocated Funds noting that of this amount, \$3,390.52 is State Dues and \$5,393.51 is credited to General Savings Account in the Money Market.

Mrs. Alderman was asked by the chairman for remarks at which time Mrs. Alderman discussed the 1982 conference expenses and also reminded the State Treasurer to bill groups for their pages in the Proceedings. Mrs. Alderman also discussed the need for using the interest from the Capital Investment Fund for work at Meadow Garden. Mrs. Fox read the resolution establishing the Fund which designates how and when it may be used. The finance committee must approve use of said funds. The fund has now reached \$50,000.00 and the interest may be used. The current interest available for use is \$3,122.26. Mrs. A.C. Earl Shepherd moved to place this \$3,122.26 interest earned on the Capital Investment Fund into the Meadow Garden Maintenance Account to enable repair work to be done on the house to correct damage caused by city road work; Mrs. Humphreys seconded. Following a discussion, the motion was put to a vote; motion carried.

Mrs. Humphreys thanked our State Regent for taking such good care of her duties and responsibilities. Mrs. Alderman in turn thanked the State Treasurer for her good stewardship. Meeting Adjourned at 4:00 p.m.

The finance committee met at 4:00 p.m. in the State Regent's suite of the DeSoto Hilton Hotel, Savannah on March 7, 1984. Present were Mesdames Alderman, Fox, Terry, Hankinson, Muldrow, Humphrey and Shepherd. Mrs. Fox presided. She read the minutes of the last meeting; approved as read. Mrs. Hankinson distributed the Summary of Funds. She pointed out that \$4420.66 of CD's were in the Money Market. The due dates for the CD's at First Atlanta is March 14, 1990 and at Bank South October 7, 1985. \$8429.15 interest was earned on deposited funds from May 1, 1983 - March 3, 1984. The school funds were discussed in detail. The two year total for the schools is as follows:

KDS — \$10,693.43 with \$5,625.65 to the State Regent's Project Tammassee — \$18,882.40 with \$6,288.15 for St. Regent's Project Berry — \$2,405.00 total with \$1,684.50 for the State Regent's Project

Mrs. Alderman moved that the interest from First Atlanta Capital Investment Fund for Meadow Garden be removed at next available time and placed into a fund to be used for painting Meadow Garden; seconded by Mrs. Humphrey. In the discussion which followed, it was pointed out that when this fund was established at First Atlanta, this committee voted to withdraw interest twice a year. This will be the second withdrawal for this year. Motion passed. Mrs. Shepherd moved that the fund be established immediately (for painting) using the remainder of the interest earned this fiscal year; motion seconded by Mrs. Humphrey; passed. This is \$1,950.56. Meeting adjourned at 3:55 p.m.

Addition: Members of the committee present for the conference were polled asking for their approval of a motion to allow the State Regent to use \$200.00 out of State Dues fund to refurbish the chairs in the Georgia box at Continental Congress; the money being available, all contacted gave their approval.

Knowledge gleaned from 75 reporting chapters revealed 17 chapters contributed to the Meadow Garden project. One chapter awarded the DAR Medal of Honor to a former P.O.W. incarcerated in Germany during World War II. A C.A.R. chapter

## GEORGIA STATE ROOM — DAR MUSEUM Mrs. Hugh Peterson

The State Chairman thanks the members for their spontaneous response and generous contributions given to have Georgia secure space for a State Period Room in the Museum of beautiful Memorial Continental Hall. Our Room is set up to represent the Long Room in Peter Tondee's Tayern, 1760-1780, in Sayannah. It represents a very historic spot in Georgia for in this room the President of the Assembly, Archibald Bulloch, was elected. It was from the porch that he read the Declaration of Independence to the citizens of Georgia when it arrived from Philadelphia. In the Long Room the young Patriots plotted and planned ways to become free from harsh laws and taxes imposed by the King of England. Gun powder was stolen from the arsenal and sent to be used in the Battle of Bunker Hill. A Liberty Flag was hoisted to the top of the flag pole while cannons fired shots in celebration. This State Period Room is furnished in accordance with Peter Tondee's Inventory. Almost every Chapter reported to the State Chairman and contributions have been generous. Slightly over \$700.00 was contributed. The search is still on for the painted "beaufet" and we have hopes of finding it. Damage to the ceiling and walls required fresh paint and this has been taken carre of. Thank you every Georgia Daughter for your help! The files now contain the records of four years work ready for the second volume of our history. All in all it is evident that Georgia Daughters have done their duty in all things.

Thank you Madam Regent for the privilege of continuing the work of compiling the material for the History of the Georgia State Society.

## LUCY COOK PEEL MEMORIAL Mrs. George E. Stratman

The 1976 edition of the Membership Roll and Register of Ancestors fo the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution went well with 90 books sold at Chapter meetings, District Workshops, Fall Board and State Conference plus some mail orders. The small number remaining may still be obtained for \$10.00 or ordered for \$11.50 which includes postage. This Chairman is grateful for the support shown in the sales.

## MARKING REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIERS' GRAVES AND RESTORING HISTORIC SPOTS

Mrs. W.M. Roberts

The response to this committee was more than expected as Georgia Semiquincentenary is just over and Georgia Daughters were active. Completion of Meadow Garden was a requirement. However sixty three chapters reported. Four chapters restored Revolutionary soldiers' graves. Marked was the grave of Richard Heard by the Oglethorpe Chapter. Another chapter restored, relocated and rededicated at expense of \$350.00 to the memory of Ft. Marshall soldier of 1812, a grave to Jesse Richardson at Santee, Ga. They also cleaned graves honoring veterans Past and Present. Another chapter marked three graves. They were: John Wright, William Heard and Dudley Poole. Three chapters sent donations. Others expressed interest when this project is further along. It now can be told, the long awaited for Revolutionary Battle Park will have its kickoff this year. Known now as the GREAT AMERICAN EXPOSITION it embraces more than the effort to "restore and preserve architecturally significant railroad buildings and to commemorate the Seige of Savannah", it will depict many other aspects of Georgia History. This will be done with Living History and occupy many buildings. Attendance anticipated is in excess of 565,000 visitors a year. The development is now in the hands of the City of Savannah and a firm known as Parsons Brinkerhoff working with \$1.8 million block grant and \$7 million private capital.

## MEADOW GARDEN Mrs. R. Hugh Reid

One hundred of Georgia's 106 Chapters reported to this Chairman, and of these, 75 met State Honor Roll requirements for Meadow Garden. State Treasurer's books indicated a total in excess of \$13,500 contributed to Meadow Garden Funds. Reports reflect many hours volunteered at Meadow Garden and to further the work for Meadow Garden. This Chairman is most grateful for the interest and support of the Georgia Daughters. Extensive repairs to the Resident Manager's Cottage have been completed this year, in addition to the maintenance and upkeep of the home of George Walton. Reports of various Meadow Garden Chairmen and the minutes of the Board will give details. This Chairman expresses gratitude especially to the members and Chapters which have done more than the minimum requested, especially to the Chapters in and near Augusta, whose members consistently serve as Docents, contacts and helpers. A visit to Meadow Garden is an opportunity to be in touch with history. That we are privileged to share this home of a Signer of the Declaration of Independence with others gives added meaning to our efforts. With gratitude, the Chairman thanks you all.

## Standing Rules for Meadow Garden

#### MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

- The governing body of a museum, in this instance the Meadow Garden Board, serves the public interest as it relates to Meadow Garden, and must consider itself accountable to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR as well as to Meadow Garden; members should not attempt to act in their individual capacities, but all actions should be taken as a board, committee, or otherwise in conformance with the Standing Rules, the Act of Incorporation, or applicable Resolutions.
- 2. The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the three (3) Trustees as named in the Deed for the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, conveying Meadow Garden to the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, namely, the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent, and the State Chairman of Meadow Garden who is appointed by the State Regent; the Chapter Regents of the Augusta Chapter and the College Hill Chapter, both Chapters being located in Augusta, who shall serve as vice chairmen to the State Chairman of Meadow Garden; and four of the chairmen of Meadow Garden Committee as appointed by the State Regent.

 No Georgia Daughter shall serve in the same Meadow Garden Chairmanship more than two (2) consecutive terms.

 Of the five (5) appointments made by the State Regent, at least two (2) shall be Honorary State Regents.

5. The State Second Vice Regent shall serve as an ex-officio member of the Meadow Garden Board, being given the privilege of the floor without a vote.

- 6. At the invitation of the Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board, chairmen of Meadow Garden Committees not holding a vote on the Meadow Garden Board may attend meetings of the Meadow Garden Board for the purpose of presenting plans and reports.
- The State Regent shall serve as Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board, and the State First Vice Regent shall serve as Secretary of the Meadow Garden Board.
- 8. The Meadow Garden Board shall meet a minimum of three (3) times each year, namely, preceding Fall Board of Management meeting, preceding annual State Conference and following Continental Congress, and at such other time as deemed necessary by the Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board. At least one (1) meeting of the Board shall be held at Meadow Garden each year.
- 9. The Meadow Garden Board shall have jurisdiction over the operation, maintenance and work of Meadow Garden and shall be the authority for Meadow Garden as long as such authority is not in conflict with the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, the Act of Incorporation for the Georgia State Society, Resolutions adopted by the Georgia State Society and/or directions which from time to time may be approved by action of the Georgia State Society assembled at its annual State Conference.
- 10. Five (5) voting members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.
- Minutes shall be kept of each meeting and a copy shall be sent to each voting member and printed verbatim in the State Proceedings.
- 12. All expenses for maintenance, operation and purchases of furnishings and plantings shall be authorized by the State Regent as Chairman of the Board, paid by the State Treasurer. Expenditures exceeding \$1000.00 must have the majority approval of the Board.
- 13. These rules will be binding on the actions of the Board in their operation of "Meadow Garden". They may be changed by the following procedure: Members of the Board must have written notification of proposed changes or additions one month prior to the next meeting of the Board; a two-thirds vote of the Board is necessary to effect a change or addition.

#### II OPERATIONS

- Everyone entering Meadow Garden will be required to sign the Register, including date, time of arrival and time of departure.
- No more than ten (10) people with each Docent are to be on tour in the house at a given time. Excess of this number may wait in the reception room or in the garden.
- 3. There will be no smoking in Meadow Garden.
- 4. No refreshments are to be served in Meadow Garden or taken into Meadow Garden. Should a group, such as a visiting chapter, desire refreshments the garden is available for use if litter is properly disposed of by the serving group.
- 5. Tour Visitors are asked to make donations as follows:
  - \$2.00 for each adult and this includes chapter visits.
  - \$ .50 for children under 12 years of age.
  - \$ .25 each for groups of school children, scout troops, etc.
  - \$1.00 each for tour visitors brought by Historic Augusta.
- 6. There will be only four (4) sets of keys to Meadow Garden and to the gates of Meadow Garden. Two (2) sets will be in the possession of the Resident Manager who will open the house upon request and will secure the house after departure of visitors, making sure the book is signed as stated above. These keys never to leave the possession of the Resident Manager. The third (3rd) set of keys is to

be held by the State Chairman of Meadow Garden and is not to leave her possession. The fourth (4th) set o keys is to be in the possession of the Chairman of the Board (State Regent) and to never leave her hands. No duplicate keys are to be made from either of the above sets of keys.

## III VOLUNTEERS (DOCENTS)

- Volunteers, docents, shall be members in good standing of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR.
- Duties of volunteers can include acting as guides, hostesses, working in gift shop, working in yard, cleaning in house, public relations. No volunteer work at or for Meadow Garden shall be done except under the direct guidance of the Meadow Garden Board and the chairman of the specific committee for that particular function.
- Cleaning or yard work volunteers shall be under the direction of the Resident Manager.

## IV FURNISHINGS

- Items bought or accepted for the older section of Meadow Garden must pre-date 1821.
- Furnishings for the two (2) main floor rooms and two (2) upstairs rooms in the
  newer section may be dated post 1820 but these rooms should be considered companion rooms to the rest of the house and furnished accordingly with all efforts
  made to keep furnishings of these four rooms dated no later than 1850. The Augusta Room furnishings will remain as they are in 1982.
- 3. Reproductions may be used only when the physical condition of the antiques is jeopardized by exposure in areas where large numbers of visitors have easy access; or when environmental conditions including excessive light, dust, humidity or airborne impurities pose a threat to the preservation of originals.
- Effective March 12, 1983 all items donated to Meadow Garden shall be accepted
  with the written condition that they become the property of Meadow Garden and
  may be used, replaced or sold at the discretion of the Meadow Garden Board only.
- All items that post date 1821, with the exception of those in the six (6) rooms
  of the newer section and those described in Number 3 of this section, shall be
  replaced as soon as possible with similar items pre-dating 1821.
- 6. Once an item is placed, it shall not be moved from one location to another without permission of the Meadow Garden Board. Only the Chairman of the Board may approve the removal of an item from the house, if it is in need of repair or refinishing.
- Any item donated or purchased must have written documentation of appraisal and include an indication as to how the determination was made.
- 8. A file will be kept of all assets with information as to price paid or market value, date of acquisition, donor or where bought, documentation and appraisal and a description of article. One file will be kept in the reception room accessible to the Docents; a duplicate file will be in the possession of the Chairman of the Board.
- All items purchased or donated will be added to the Fine Arts insurance policy.
   Said policy will be reviewed and updated a minimum of once a year. Major additions to furnishings will be added immediately.

## GROUNDS

- The landscape plan adopted by the Board shall be adhered to with no deviation unless recommended by an authority on landscape design and care.
- Donations of shrubbery, plants or trees shall be accepted only when item is part of the master plan.

 Work on the grounds will be under the sole direction of the Meadow Garden Board and the Grounds Chairman (Landscape Chairman). Supervision of actual work will be provided by the Resident Manager of Meadow Garden and the Grounds Chairman.

## VI GIFT SHOP

- Gift Shop will be operated by a committee appointed by the Chairman of the Board and be responsible to the Board.
- Chairman of the committee will be responsible for all purchases, subject to the approval of the Board or the State Regent.
- Gift Shop operation will be self-supporting. In the event funds are needed for purchases, they may be advanced from available Meadow Garden funds and must be considered a loan and shall be repaid without interest within one (1) year from date of borrowing.
- 4. Any profit over what is needed for stock purchases shall be placed in the Meadow Garden Capital Investment Trust Fund after the annual audit. The audit of the Gift Shop operation shall be included in the annual audit of the Georgia State Society at which time, if there is a profit, it shall be declared and dispersed to the Capital Investment Trust Fund.

## VII PATRONS

- 1. Donors to the following categories are eligible to be known as "Patrons":
  - A. Meadow Garden Capital Investment Trust Fund
  - B. Furnishings
  - C. Maintenance
  - D. Landscape
- Individual gifts of a minimum value of \$50.00 to any of the above categories automatically qualifies the donor as a Patron.
- Chapter or group gifts of a minimum value of \$100.00 or more, above the State Honor Roll requirement, automatically qualifies that chapter or group as a Patron.
- 4. The State Treasurer will report these gifts to the Patrons Chairman.
- The Patrons Chairman will issue certificates to the qualifying individuals and chapters or groups.
- Two (2) permanent books will be kept on public display at Meadow Garden:
   A. Patrons gifts to the Capital Investment Trust Fund
  - B. Patrons gifts to other categories
- The Patrons Chairman will enter the names of donors in the appropriate book a minimum of once a year.

## THESE STANDING RULES FOR MEADOW GARDEN ADOPTED AND EFFECTIVE AS FOLLOWS:

**Items 1, 12, 13, 14, 15** Adopted at the Meadow Garden Board Meeting, March 10, 1983. Effective at time of adoption.

Operations, Volunteers (Docents), Grounds, Gift Shop, Patrons; Adopted at the Meadow Garden Board Meeting October 27, 1982. Effective at time of adoption.

Furnishings: Adopted at the Meadow Garden Board Meeting, March 10, 1983. Effective at time of adoption.

#### MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

The Meadow Garden Board met May 13, 1983 at the Medical Center Inn in Augusta, Georgia. Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr., State Regent, presiding as Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 5:45 P.M. and asked Mrs. Luther L. Watson to offer

the opening prayer. Others attending were Mrs. A.C. Earl Shepherd, Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar, Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox and Mrs. William N. Agostas.

Mrs. Alderman stated that the purpose of this meeting was to act upon necessary items regarding the landscaping of Meadow Garden and to hear a progress report from Miss Sybil H. Argintar, Landscape Architect, who is preparing the landscape plans for Meadow Garden.

Mrs. Alderman reported that there are great problems with the sewerage drainage because of tree roots in the sewer line. This is causing the water to back up and damage the Resident Manager's Cottage. The age and condition of the water supply line into the house was also discussed. Mrs. Fox moved that an inspection be made of the water supply lines and the sewer lines at Meadow Garden before the landscape work is done and if necessary both be repaired. Motion was seconded by Mrs. De Lamar and approved.

Mrs. Agostas, Regent of the Augusta Chapter, recommended that a sprinkler system for the Meadow Garden grounds be included in the landscape plans. Mrs. Fox moved that the Board receive the recommendation on an automatic sprinkler system for the Meadow Garden grounds and if feasible install it at the same time the water and sewer line work is being done and prior to the landscape work-planting. Motion was seconded by Mrs. De Lamar and approved.

Mrs. Agostas moved that Mrs. Alderman ask Mr. Tucker to compare natural gas rates and the cost of connection lines and report to the Chairman. This in consideration of changing the Meadow Garden system from propane gas to natural gas. Motion was seconded by Mrs. Shepherd and approved.

Mrs. Alderman reported that the Baldwin and Cranston Associates, Inc. charges for the topographic map of Meadow Garden was \$500.00. Mrs. Watson moved that the Board ratify the difference of designated amount for charges of topographic map of Meadow Garden by Baldwin and Cranston Associates, Inc., of Augusta, Georgia. Motion was seconded by Mrs. Fox and approved.

Miss Argintar presented and explained the proposed landscape plans to this date. She stated that the final plan will be completed and ready for approval by the next meeting of the Board on July 9, 1983. The cost of Miss Argintar's work to date is \$279.00.

Mrs. Agostas reported that the Augusta Chapter has the book Mrs. Robert A. Parks, State Regent, DAR, Georgia Society which was printed in 1901. This book has a copy of the old deeds to Meadow Garden therein. Mrs. Alderman asked Mrs. Agostas to make copies of the Meadow Garden information for the Meadow Garden files.

There being no further business to come before the meeting it was duly adjourned at 7:45 P.M.

The Meadow Garden Board met July 9, 1983 at the Best Western Motel in Macon, Georgia. Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr., presiding as Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 11:05 A.M. and asked Mrs. Allen L. Brewer to offer the opening prayer. Other members attending were Mrs. A.C. Earl Shepherd, Mrs. R. Hugh Reid, Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar, Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox, Mrs. Wilbur W. Stone, Mrs. William N. Agostas, Mrs. Luther L. Watson and Mrs. Harold Starr Smith. The following members of the furnishings committee were present by invitation of the Board Chairman: Mrs. James H. Elliott, Jr., Mrs. W.D. Harvey and Mrs. J.G. McReynolds, Jr. Mrs. Stone was presented as the new chairman of the furnishings committee. Minutes of the May 1983 meeting were approved as corrected.

Mrs. Steve Bowers (formerly Miss Argintar), Landscape Architect, reported that there is a Federal Law requiring places on the National Register of Historical Places to have an archeological dig for artifacts prior to any landscape work. The Board requested that Mrs. Bowers check further to see how this law will affect the landscaping at Meadow

Garden. At this time Mrs. Reid gave Mrs. Stone a piece of glass that was dug up under the porch of Meadow Garden. Mrs. Reid stated that it looked like it could be a top to a cruet bottle.

Mrs. Bowers presented her final landscape plan for Meadow Garden to the Board. The cost of Phase I to be about \$14,926.00. Mrs. Fox moved that the landscape plan for Meadow Garden, as presented by Mrs. Bowers, be accepted as presented, and that a breakdown on estimated cost by phases be submitted for presentation to the members. Motion was seconded by Mrs. De Lamar and approved. Mrs. Watson moved that Mrs. Bowers get three (3) bids from Landscape Contractors to do construction and plantings. The plantings to be done only after sprinkler system and plumbing is completed. Motion was seconded by Mrs. Reid and approved.

Mrs. Alderman reported that the gas system for the Resident Manager's cottage cannot be changed to natural gas because there is no gas line on the street.

Mrs. Agostas reported that she would need a copy of the landscape plan before she could get bids on the sprinkler system. Mrs. Bowers will send copies of the plan to Mrs. Agostas. Mrs. Agostas also reported that the low bid on the plumbing work was from Collins Plumbing Co. at a cost of \$900.00. Mrs. Reid moved that the Meadow Garden Board accept the bid from Collins Plumbing Co. to replace water and sewer lines on Meadow Garden property. Motion was seconded by Mrs. Shepherd and approved.

Mrs. Alderman excused Mrs. Bowers and the business was continued. Mrs. Smith reported that she had taken care of Meadow Garden while the Tucker family was on vacation. Mrs. Fox reminded the Board that the Resident Manager is required to give notice of plans to be absent to the Meadow Garden Chairman or the State Regent two (2) weeks in advance prior to leaving. Mrs. Smith also reported that Mr. Tucker had two (2) keys made for the back door of Meadow Garden. This was done because there was no key that would unlock that door.

Mrs. Reid reported that Mr. and Mrs. Frank Binford had given three (3) pairs of shutters to be used in the upstairs bedrooms. Mrs. Stone reported that Mrs. Reid had delivered these shutters to her at this meeting (July 9, 1983).

The Board members approved a release form to be used when accepting gifts for Meadow Garden.

It was reported that the Savannah Chapter has given \$190.00 to purchase a print to be given in honor of Mrs. Harold I. Tuthill. Mrs. Alderman reported that Mrs. Leonard M. Andrus gave to Meadow Garden a vase honoring her mother, Mrs. Wilbur W. Stone and Mr. and Mrs. Frank Binford. This vase was given through the John Franklin Wren Chapter and is a genuine antique faience - 1775; value about \$350.00. Mrs. Stone, Furnishings Chairman, reported that Mrs. James L. Quackenbush gave two (2) quilts, a leather bound book and a cooking tool for Meadow Garden. Mrs. Stone stated that she will give a farm bell, post and rope to be used at the entrance to Meadow Garden.

Mrs. Reid reported that the roof and bedroom wall in the Resident Manager's cottage needs repair and that we continue to have problems with squirrel damage to the Meadow Garden roof.

It was the decision of the Board to have the revised Standing Rules in the Proceedings this year.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned at 3:15 P.M.

## **Bylaws**

# BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

#### Article I NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

#### Article II OBJECTS

The objects of the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution shall be: to promote the aims set forth in the Bylaws of the National Society; the preservation of the memory of its Revolutionary patriots; the study of its history; the education of its youth in patriotic ideals and in the duties of citizenship.

#### Article III MEMBERSHIP

All Chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of this organization.

#### Article IV OFFICERS

The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Curator. The State Regent shall appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as adviser in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting.

#### Article V ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected at the annual State Conference biennially.

Section 2. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two years or until their successors are elected. Their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and of the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Section 3. No member shall be eligible to a State office until she has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years. No member shall be eligible to the same State office for two successive terms. A member having served more than one-half term in the State office shall be deemed to have served a term. Any member holding active

membership in a Chapter in the Georgia State Society shall be eligible to hold a State office, provided she has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years.

Section 4. Nominations of candidates for office shall be from the floor. The election shall be held by ballot. A majority of the votes cast by the voting members of the State Conference shall elect.

Section 5. Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become acting First Vice Regent, subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. A vacancy in any other State office between annual meetings shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next Fall Board of Management or State Conference, whichever shall come first. Any State Officer, who is absent from the State for a continuous period of six months or longer, automatically relinquishes her position as a State officer.

Section 6. No two State officers shall be members of the same Chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

Section 7. In recognition of valuable service to the organization, any State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Section 8. A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot. The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than fifteen months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

Section 9. On the election of State Regent, and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Recording Secretary General. The endorsement of a candidate for Vice President General shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent to the Recording Secretary General at least two weeks prior to Continental Congress.

#### Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, of the State Board of Management, and of the Executive Committee. She shall appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees.

Section 2. In the absence of the State Regent from any meeting of the State Conference, or the State Board of Management, the State First Vice Regent, or in her absence, the State Second Vice Regent, shall perform the duties of the State Regent. The State First and Second Vice Regents may be assigned to direct committees and to perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent.

Section 3. The State Chaplain shall open all meetings of the State Conference and of the State Board of Management with Scripture reading and prayer and shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require. She shall preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and shall be responsible for the In Memoriam pages in the Proceedings.

Section 4. The State Recording Secretary shall record the proceedings of the State Conference and of meetings of the State Board of Management and of the Executive Committee. She shall compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and of the Proceedings Committee.

Section 5. The State Corresponding Secretary shall conduct correspondence and send notices in behalf of the State Conference, the State Regent, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as directed by them.

Section 6. The State Treasurer shall be the custodian of the funds of the State Society. She shall receive the State Conference dues and registration fees from the Chapters and shall receive all sums contributed by the Chapters for State and National projects.

All monies received by the State Treasurer shall be placed only in institutions with accounts covered by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation or by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation, and the amount in any one institution shall not exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage. She shall disburse such sums only when authorized by the State Regent in writing. The State Treasurer shall keep an account of all sums received or paid out and shall keep receipts for all payments. She shall prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference. Her books shall be audited annually by a Certified Public Accountant. She shall be ex-officio a member of the Credentials Committee.

Section 7. The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new Chapters.

Section 8. The State Registrar shall, when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, who live in towns and counties in which there are no Chapters, to prove eligibility, and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars in verifying lineage papers. She shall keep a correct list of all members in the State and shall make a report on membership to the State Conference.

Section 9. The State Historian shall be in charge of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General. She shall keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves in the State and shall prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General to Smithsonian Institution. She shall encourage the compilation and publication of County Histories and other unpublished records, especially those of the Revolutionary period.

Section 10. The State Librarian shall collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing duplicates, wherever possible, in the NSDAR Library and in the Georgia DAR Collections in the State Department of Archives and History. She shall endeavor to obtain the books on the wanted list of the Librarian General for the Georgia Section in the NSDAR Library and is authorized to solicit contributions from the Chapters for the purchase of the same. She shall have custody and supervision of the DAR Genealogical and Historical Collections of the State Department of Archives and History.

Section 11. The State Curator shall receive and be responsible for all gifts of Revolutionary relics to the Museum of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution. She shall be custodian of the conference properties and shall have them properly stored, insured and made ready for use at State Conference.

#### Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. The Georgia State Society shall hold an annual State Conference between the first day of February and the time of the meeting of the Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week. The Executive Committee shall fix the time and place of meetings when not fixed by the Conference in session, or when for any reason it may be impracticable to meet at the time or place fixed by the Conference.

Section 2. The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credential blanks to the Chapters not less than sixty days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 3. The voting members of the State Conference shall be State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regent or alternate, and the delegates or their alternates from the Chapters of the state, that are entitled to representation at the Continental Congress. The number of representatives from each Chapter shall be determined by the rules for representation of Chapters in the Continental Congress as given in the National Bylaws.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a Chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the Chapter, except in the case of the Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at an annual State Conference, shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any Chapter in the State of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference the privileges of the floor shall be accorded to the State Chairmen with the exception that they may not vote unless they are duly elected delegates or their alternates from their respective chapters.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen days notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Twenty-five voting members, representing not less than ten Chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

## Article VIII STATE DUES AND CONFERENCE FEES

Section 1. The annual dues of Chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be two dollars for each member of the Chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1. A minimum of at least 72 cents shall be used to cover all State per capita assessments, and the balance shall be allocated to the General State Dues Fund. No Chapter shall be entitled to representation at the annual State Conference until the State dues are paid.

Section 2. The Finance Committee, appointed by the State Regent, shall be composed of seven members, to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two Honorary State Regents, one active Chapter Regent, and one active Chapter member. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund.

Section 3. Each Chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State Dues, a Conference registration fee of \$3.00 for each voter to which the Chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Section 4. State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$3.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference fee at the time of registration.

#### Article IX EXPENSES

Section 1. One thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) shall be taken each year from the State Dues Fund, to be used by the State Regent in defraying her necessary travel expenses.

Section 2. Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent shall be paid by the State Treasurer from the State Dues Fund.

# Article X STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regents of the Chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the Fall, following the regular meeting of the National Board. It may meet whenever called by the State Regent.

Section 3. Ten members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference.

Section 5. State Chairmen, Vice Chairmen and Committee Members of National and Standing Committees shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privileges of the floor, but may not vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

#### Article XI EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute an Executive Committee. The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, attends the meetings of the Executive Committee, but may not vote. This Committee performs such duties of the Board between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient. The Executive Committee shall meet the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three members of the Committee. It shall make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

#### Article XII CHAPTERS

Section 1. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April. The Chapter Regent shall report the names of the elected officers promptly, on triplicate blanks provided by the State Regent for this purpose, to the Organizing Secretary General, to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary.

Section 2. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent for use in compiling her report, not less than fifteen days before the opening of the annual State Conference. The official Chapter report, not to exceed 250 words in length, for publication in the Proceedings shall be furnished the State Recording Secretary before the State Conference.

#### Article XIII AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent and to the Parliamentarian. The State Regent shall send a copy to each Chapter and each voting member, at least sixty days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

#### Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law for the State Conference in matters not covered by the Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

## State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S.B.C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21.) No conference was held in 1911; the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P.W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912"; amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta, "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, p. 211.)

#### Awards

All chapters competing for awards must send reports to the respective chairmen by February 1, 1985.

All reports for awards are based on membership confirmed by the National Society as of February 1 of preceding year (1984). SEE FIGURE BESIDE CHAPTER NAME IN CHAPTER REGENTS DIRECTORY.

#### **Bylaws**

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National and State Bylaws.

#### Change of Address

Notice of change of address of members shall be sent to the Organizing Secretary General, Treasurer General, State Regent and State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

#### Change of Name

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to State Registrar, Treasurer General and State Regent by the Chapter Treasurer.

#### Chapter Elections

As soon as Chapter elections are held, names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, Administration Building, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D. C. 20006, to the State Regent or State Regent-Elect and to the Recording Secretary by May 1st. The full Christian name of Chapter officers shall be given together with her husband's given name or initials, address, zip code and telephone number. A Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years. This is being added in order for our Bylaws to conform to the National Bylaws.

#### Dues

Pay to State Treasurer State Dues of \$2.00 per member before December 1. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the February 1 and two April Board meetings of the National Society. National Dues of \$10.00 per member sent to the Treasurer-General, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D. C. 20006 before December 1, 1984.

#### Conference Registration Fee

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer with the State dues on or before December 1, \$3.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Rules for representation of chapters at Continental Congress:

"Chapters having less than 50 paid members on February 1 are entitled to be represented by the Regent or in her absence the Vice Regent or alternate; chapters having 50 to 199 paid members on February 1, one delegate in addition to the Regent; chapters having 200 to 299 paid members on February 1, two delegates in addition to the Regent, and for each additional 100 members one additional delegate." (Article XIII, Section 3-C, National Bylaws.)

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$3.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the Ameri-

can Revolution, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. (Article VIII, Section 4, of the State Bylaws.)

#### Contributions

ALL contributions by Chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

#### Deceased Members

Deaths shall be reported promptly to Treasurer General, State Chaplain and State Registrar by the Corresponding Chapter Officer. Complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and a date of death shall be furnished State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for Conference Memorial Service and "In Memoriam" pages for State Proceedings.

#### Georgia Hospitality Fund

The following resolution which applies to the Georgia Hospitality Fund appears in the Proceedings for 1955:

"WHEREAS, The Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds an annual dinner in Washington during Continental Congress, which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society.

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$150.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes:

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this fund shall not be cumulative. Adopted."

#### Procedure Book of Instructions for Officers and State Chairmen

The following resolution which applies to a Procedure Book of Instruction for Officers and State Chairmen appears in the Proceedings for 1959-60, Page 41.

"RESOLVED, That all Officers and State Chairmen keep a Procedure Book of Instructions and helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new Officer and Chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities thus providing a continuing continuity of DAR work, ADOPTED."

#### Genealogical Records

To insure uniformity and convenience in binding, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper,  $8\frac{1}{2}$  by 11 inches, with  $1\frac{1}{2}$  to 2 inch margin on left side,  $1\frac{1}{2}$  inches at top and 1 inch on right side and at bottom. Four copies shall be sent to State Chairman of Genealogical Records.

#### Information for Chapter Regents

- 1. All letters received by Chapter Regents relating to the work of the Society shall be distributed to the corresponding Chapter Chairman and brought to the attention of the members at a chapter meeting.
- 2. Please follow Resolution No. 11, adopted at 61st Georgia Society State Conference, as follows: "Resolved, That a closing date of February 1 be established for all reports, and all reports be given from February 1 to February 1, regardless of a change of regime or Regent." All awards will be made on this date basis.

#### Information for State Officers and State Chairmen

State Officers and State Chairmen shall send to the State Regent and to the State Treasurer a copy of any instruction letter mailed to chapters.

#### New Administration Reserve for Contingencies Fund

For the entire resolution setting up the "General New Regime Fund Balance of \$2500.00," found on pp. 203-204 of the 1979 Proceedings the following substitute resolution was adopted by the Board of Management: RESOLVED that at the end of each administration \$4000.00 be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies" fund, this money to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration, and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration. All other surplus monies in the General Fund, other than funds which are designated, are to be divided equally between the General Savings Account and the Meadow Garden Capital Investment Fund, as provided in the Capital Investment Fund Resolution passed in 1979 (pp. 62-63, 1979 Proceedings). This transaction is to be handled by April 30 every two years before the auditors close out the books of an administration, thus making the General Fund show the same balance of \$4000.00 at the beginning of each new administration. (This fund to be known as the "New Administration Reserve for Contingencies Fund.") Adopted.

#### **Nominations**

The following resolution which applies to the announcement of the candidacy for State Regent appears in the Proceedings of the Twentieth State Conference, 1918:

"Resolved, that it is the judgment of the Executive Board that announcements for State Regent should not be made . . . earlier than three months prior to the meeting of the Conference and they shall be furnished to the Press for publication."

#### Reports for Proceedings

Reports for Proceedings shall be as concise as possible not to exceed 250 words type-written (DOUBLE SPACED) upon one side of three-hole punched, unruled paper, 8½ x 11 inches, and shall be sent to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary, the ORIGINAL being sent to the State Recording Secretary for the Proceedings, Chapter Regents' Reports by February 1, State Officers and State Chairmen's Reports are due on or before February 15.

A standard HEADING of ALL reports must conform to the Headings found in the Proceedings and must start at least 1½ inches from top of sheet of paper. Leave 1 inch between bottom of Headings and start of report. LEFT MARGIN of report must be 1 inch minimum. Please check previous Proceedings for correct heading. Entire report should consist of one paragraph. Winners of awards of State Officers and State Chairmen shall be listed on a SEPARATE sheet of paper. State Officers and State Chairmen send to the State Recording Secretary and the State Regent, the awards to be given next year on a SEPARATE sheet of paper — exactly as it is to be printed in the Proceedings.

#### Date for Annual Audit

WHEREAS, every effort must be made to have all material to the printer as early as possible to facilitate delivery of the Proceedings to the members,

RESOLVED: That the end of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR fiscal year for audit purposes be changed from May 31st to April 30th.

#### Absolute Deadline for Proceedings Material

WHEREAS, a definite deadline must be established and adhered to for all reports and material to be in the hands of the Proceedings Committee in order to be delivered to the Printer by June 1st.

RESOLVED: That all FINAL reports and materials must be received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1st with the exception of the Auditor's report and any information sent out by the National DAR Headquarters. This does not alter the requirement in the "Items of Information" in the Proceedings that all reports shall be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary on or before February 15th, the ORIGINAL being sent to the Secretary for the Proceedings.

AND FURTHER RESOLVED: This policy will be strictly adhered to and the material not received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1st will be omitted from the Proceedings.

#### Reaffirmation

RESOLVED: That the Georgia State Society reaffirm the following Resolution adopted at the Fall Board of Management in Albany, October 23, 1981, which reads as follows: "Presentation of Awards" WHEREAS, all awards are given by State Officers and State Chairmen; and, WHEREAS, February 1st is the closing date of all work for said awards; BE IT RESOLVED: That no State Officer nor State Chairman may present her report or award(s) at State Conference unless said report, with list of award(s) is in the hands of the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary at least ten (10) days before State Conference.

#### Resolutions

Resolutions to be considered by the Committee shall be typed, with a heading giving subject of the resolution, signed, and sent to the Chairman of the Resolutions Committee two weeks before the date of the State Conference.

#### Gold Honor Roll Stars

A Gold Star is awarded when a chapter achieves the National Gold Honor Roll three consecutive years. For each additional three consecutive years, another Gold Star is awarded. If a chapter fails to achieve Gold Honor Roll any year, all stars are lost as they are awarded for consecutive achievement. National Honor Roll creditation comes from the National Chairman of the National Honor Roll Committee.

# GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION Mrs. R. Clough Carter, Senior State President 1983-1984

The Georgia State Society, C.A.R., has had an active year and under the leadership of Robert W. Moore, State President, has accomplished many worthwhile goals. The State Project was "To contribute to the preservation of Meadow Garden in Augusta, Georgia, Home of George Walton, Signer of the Declaration of Independence." The State President's theme was "Work for C.A.R., C.A.R. Works For You."

Georgia has 17 organized societies. Fifteen of these are considered active. Total number of members registered and having dues paid in the state of Georgia is approximately 390. We had one society to disband due to lack of senior leadership.

The State Project was finalized at State Conference which was held at Suwannee, Ga., on March 2-4, 1984. Members and senior leaders had contributed their time and efforts toward the goal of giving at least \$100.00 toward the landscaping of the grounds of Meadow Garden in Augusta, Ga., Home of George Walton. The money raised for this project was presented to the State Regent of Georgia Society DAR, Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr., at the State DAR Conference in Savannah, Ga., on March 8-10. The presentation was made in the form of a check and was presented to Mrs. Alderman for the use of the Georgia State DAR on behalf of the Georgia State C.A.R., by Robert Weathersby Moore, State C.A.R. President. We were all delighted to discover that the \$100.00 which we contributed made us a Patron of Meadow Garden. Several individual members, seniors and societies gave contributions for the purchase of Cherokee Rose bushes, a bench for the grape-arbor and other pieces of shrubbery for this project of the DAR.

As ever before — Georgia C.A.R. members contributed to the C.A.R. Museum; sent money, clothing, trading stamps, soup labels, even a used sewing machine and two used typewriters to the Indian Schools and Mountain Schools. The National Project of the C.A.R. was "To provide funds for the purchase of a copying machine for St. Mary's School for Indian Girls." For this project, Georgia C.A.R. members gave a total of \$89.50. Ten Endowment pins were given, one 300-plus pin was given and 1 Life Promoter Certificate was presented. Other contributions were made to Book Binding, Magazine Sustaining Fund, Equipment and Maintenance.

Georgia Society, C.A.R., had three members transfer to DAR and 2 to S.A.R. We have 55 National Promoters, 83 State Promoters and 191 State Patriots. We are most grateful to the Georgia Daughters of the American Revolution for their support in becoming State and National Promoters and State Patriots.

The State President and Senior State President attended the DAR Meadow Garden Day festivities in Augusta where they participated on the program and State President, Robert Moore, installed the Meadow Garden C.A.R. Society officers for 1983-84. Both the State President and Senior State President were the guests of the Allen Howard Society as they celebrated the 4th of July, Independence Day, by riding with the Allen Howard Society float in the WSB/TV "Salute to America Parade" in downtown Atlanta.

A trip to Winter Park, Fla., for the Southeastern Region Meeting was on the agenda for June 21-22 for Georgia members and we had 38 members, seniors and guests attend. Our state won second place, to the host state of Florida, for attendance, 1st place for State Yearbook, 3rd place for State Scrapbook.

The State President and Miss Fran Hall attended the DAR District Workshop in LaGrange, Ga., on August 12. The next day, the 13th, in Perry, Ga., Mr. Moore and Miss Hall were joined by Senior State President, Mrs. Carter, at the DAR District Workshop. Mrs. Carter then traveled on with the DAR District Workshop tour and was joined in Statesboro, Ga., by Miss Karen Youngner, State 1st Vice President of Georgia C.A.R. and as the tour continued on to Thomson, Ga., these two continued on with it. The C.A.R. members considered the occasion of being on the panel presentations of the DAR at their workshops as a golden opportunity to present the objects of C.A.R. to those assembled for the workshops.

At our own Georgia State Workshop held the week before the DAR Workshops on August 5-6 at Perry, Ga., we had a very good turnout with 71 registered. We had a most informative workshop for members and a senior seminar was held. Much information was gleaned from these meetings. A member Board Meeting was held as well as a senior Board of Management Meeting.

A Government Studies Seminar was conducted at Middle Georgia College in Cochran, Ga., on October 22, 1983. A total of 71 members and seniors from 10 societies attended. Dr. Head from Middle Georgia College spoke to us about Treaties. A joint Board of Management Meeting was held previous to the group being entertained by the Middle Georgia College Ensemble. At the luncheon, Dr. Louis C. Alderman, Jr., President of Middle Georgia College and President of Georgia State S.A.R., welcomed those at-

tending. Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr., State Regent, Georgia Daughters of the American Revolution, brought greetings on behalf of all Georgia Daughters.

The traditional "Trip to Tamassee" was made this year and included members from several societies throughout Georgia. Other societies were visited on the way to and from Tamassee DAR School. Many Christmas gifts and pounds and pounds of good used clothing were gathered on the way to the school and were dropped off by the C.A.R. members before leaving to return to their homes.

Everyone was pleasantly surprised when we discovered that the attendance at the 45th annual State Conference, at Suwannee, Ga., had topped that of the State Conference held the previous year in Columbus, Ga. The Senior State Registrar reported that we had a total registration of 161, with 15 societies represented. Member and Senior Board of Management Meetings were held. During the General Business Meeting, reports from all societies, state officers and state chairmen were heard. A candidates party was held on Friday night after which each candidate running for office had a chance to speak. On Saturday voting took place and new officers were elected for the year. A luncheon was held on Saturday at which time Ms. Jane Adams, Archivist with the Georgia Department of Archives and History, spoke to us. Mrs. A. C. Earl Shepherd, Regent Elect, of the Georgia State Society, DAR, brought greetings from the Georgia Society, DAR.

An awards banquet was held at the State Conference and 40 traveling trophies, 119 certificate awards and cash prizes were awarded to societies.

Seventeen members and seniors, representing six Georgia Societies, traveled by plane and automobile to the Eighty-Ninth Annual Convention of the N.S.C.A.R., April 19-22, 1984. Georgia, again for the third year in succession, won first place award for the most State and National Promoters. Individual societies from Georgia won second and third place awards. Robert W. Moore, State President, placed the wreath on the tomb of George Washington at ceremonies at Mt. Vernon on Sunday. Stacey Morgan of the Gwinnett Society served as a platform page at the convention, while Charles Tait, IV, from the Brunswick Society was Color Guard for the United States of America Flag and the National C.A.R. Flag. Miss Fran Hall from Lucy Spell Raiford Society in Columbus, Ga., was Publicity Chairman.

The Annual Installation of Officers was held at Mount Vernon, Home of George and Martha Washington. At this time, Miss Karen Frances Youngner of Fort Frederica Society, St. Simons Island, was installed as State President of the Georgia Society, C.A.R.

Again this year four issues of the C.A.R. news-sheet, the CARgoes, were printed. Our news-sheet won 1st place in the nation of all the state news-sheets submitted for judging. We also published an annual State Yearbook which was placed in the information packet distributed at State Workshop.

Georgia State C.A.R. gained fifty-five (55) new members this year, but some were lost from members "ageing out" or some resigning due to apathy. We hope to make up for this loss during our next year. We have a state C.A.R. Society with some very good workers both among our members and seniors leaders. We feel that we have had a most rewarding year and we can look back and say "well done."

It is not only a privilege, but a pleasure to work with the young people of this state in the National Society, Children of the American Revolution, as we have a hand in shaping their future, not only as citizens of this great nation but as future Daughters and Sons of the American Revolution.
