## EMPLOYMENT OF ILLEGAL ALIENS

WHEREAS, in the last few years a vast influx of illegal aliens has become a serious problem in this country; and,

WHEREAS, the vast majority are willing to work for very low wages, thus depriving American citizens of employment at minimum wages as prescribed by law; and,

WHEREAS, our economy derives no benefit from their wages, as no taxes are paid and a great portion of the money is sent out of the country; and,

WHEREAS, some unscrupulous employers will hire these aliens for a greedy profit motive and work them under unspeakable conditions;

RESOLVED: that the members of the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, as individuals, encourage support of the proposition that employers be required to verify the credentials of aliens before giving employment to them.

## ENGLISH AS THE ACCEPTED LANGUAGE OF THE UNITED STATES

WHEREAS, The Mayflower Compact, the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution of the United States and all other documents upon which the United States of America is established are written in English; and,

WHEREAS, Arguments and testimonies presented in the Courts of the land, including the Supreme Court of the United States, and the decisions rendered by these Courts are in English; and,

WHEREAS, In both the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Congress of the United States English is the language of oral debate and written bills presented and enacted; and,

WHEREAS: Historically, the common bond that has brought together the peoples of diverse heritages who are the citizens and builders of this great nation has been the common language, English; and,

WHEREAS, The Federal Government recognized the importance of English as the common language for the preservation of the United States and requested the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution to print only in English the DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP, which has been a gift from the Daughters of the American Revolution to all individuals studying to become naturalized citizens; and,

WHEREAS, English has been the accepted and practiced language for communication in all phases of the American Way of Life; and,

WHEREAS, Bilingual ballots are now used in several states for elections at local, state and national levels; and,

WHEREAS, Evidence indicates other bilingual practices, including classroom instructions in courses other than foreign language;

RESOLVED: That the members of the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, as individuals, support efforts to secure English as the accepted language for all citizens of the United States, to encourage emphasis on the teaching of English as a required subject at all levels of education and to promote the use of English as the only language on ballots, licenses and written documents issued at local, state, and national levels of our government.

## PEACE THROUGH STRENGTH

WHEREAS, The Constitution of the United States was ordained and established to assure the people of this great nation that we would have a government which will provide for the common defense and will secure the blessings of Liberty for all generations to enjoy; and,

WHEREAS, The security of these United States is possible only through a strong national defense; and,

WHEREAS, The assurance of peace is determined by the strength of our military forces; RESOLVED: That the members of the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, as individuals, encourage the principles of "Peace through Strength" as endorsed by the President of the United States, the Secretary of Defense, the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff and many members of the Congress.

## BALANCED BUDGET

WHEREAS, Economic solvency is assured only when spending does not exceed income; and,

WHEREAS, Interest on borrowed money denies beneficial use of present income and obligates income not yet received; and,

WHEREAS, The economic policies of government influence private financial planning and determine in large measure funds available for the expansion of private enterprise; and,

WHEREAS, More than half the states of the United States, recognizing the importance of a balanced budget, have enacted laws requiring balanced budgets for their respective states; and, WHEREAS, The plea from the citizens of the United States is to require the Congress to enact into law legislation requiring the federal government to operate on a balanced budget;

RESOLVED: That the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, encourage its members, as individuals, to write their Senators and Congressmen to request enactment of legislation to require the federal government to operate within the framework of a balanced budget and to strengthen such legislation by the enactment of the line-item veto.

# STATE REGISTRAR

# Mrs. Gordon W. Kilgore

Membership in the Georgia State Society at the beginning of the current period, 1984 - 1985, was 8,125. Since that time the Georgia State Society has added 367 new members by application, 37 by reinstatement and 34 by transfer into the State. 27 members were transferred out of Georgia, 123 deceased, 132 resigned and 40 dropped by the National Society. This gives us a present membership of 8,241, net gain 116.

Currently there are 107 chapters in the State, the newest, Hightower Trail of Canton, confirmed by the National Society on February 1, 1985.

The second of the Treasurer General's computer print-out of chapter memberships has been received from 94 chapters. The 12 not responding have been notified. The alphabetical index book of members of the Georgia State Society has been kept up to date; also, the card index files by chapters.

This officer attended Georgia State Conference, Continental Conference, attended and participated in all the August workshops, the Meadow Garden Festival in September and the Fall Board of Management in October. She was privileged to visit several chapters during the year.

A letter has been written to each chapter, to be picked up at this Conference, relative to the publication in 1986 of the *Membership Roll and Register of Ancestors*. Chapters are being urged of the importance of furnishing up-to-date membership rolls of their chapters after the April National Board. Supplementals of all members are to be included.

It has been an honor and a privilege to serve the Georgia State Society and to be associated with all my friends in DAR. Thank you, Madam Regent, for this opportunity to serve.

### STATE HISTORIAN Mrs. Sam H. Black

The State Historian attended two District meetings, Fall Board of Management, State Conference and Executive Board Meeting. Letters of instruction and questionnaires were distributed at District Workshop.

Reports were received from 85 Chapters, 31 original documents and \$4.25 were contributed to the Americana Collection. Chapters reported 194 historical programs for adults and 23 for youth. 30 anniversaries of famous people were celebrated and 70 special events. There were 127 tours to historical spots for adults and 14 for youth. Graves marked this year were: 2 Real Daughters and 73 deceased DAR members, 1 historic marker that had been removed was replaced, 3 historic restoration begun and 7 completed, and 1 Revolutionary Soldiers grave rededicated.

Nine Chapters sent nominations for the 1984 - 1985 Outstanding Teacher of American History. A committee of three judges selected Carole Page Ploeger (Mrs. Paul H. Ploeger) St. Simons Island. She was nominated by the Fort Frederica Chapter of St. Simons Island.

The exact wording of all Historical markers installed in the State by Chapters and Society have been sent to Larlin Publishing Company to be included as an appendix to reprint Georgia Historical Makers. There are 201 copies of History of the Georgia State Society in the possession of the historian.

For best Chapter Reports winners were: 1-5] members, Colonel Daniel Appling; 51-100 members, John Clarke; 101 members and above, Brunswick. Special awards for reporting all marked graves to date and historic sites to Bonaventure, Colonel Daniel Appling, Colenel William Candler and John Clarke.

Thanks, everyone, for your cooperation, making this job most interesting.

## STATE LIBRARIAN Mrs. Robert G. Fountain

The State Librarian sent letters of instruction and report questionnaire to the District Directors in July to be placed in each Chapter Regent's "State Packet." This officer attended the State Conference, all four District Workshops and the Fall Board of Management Meeting.

Reports received from 91 Chapters. 73 Chapters reported having librarians with 12 having programs on the NSDAR Library. The State Treasurer reported the amount sent thru State Treasurer for State Library Fund was \$534.00. Chapters donated \$12,162.91 in gifts of historical quarterlies, microfilm, books, pamphlets, display cabinet, and cash to state and local libraries. The indexing projects continue at the Archives and Washington Memorial Library. Members volunteered time at the Georgia Historical Library.

Funds through the State Treasurer for the NSDAR Library were Rebinding Fund \$258.25, to purchase books \$143.00 and for reclassification \$120.50. One Life Membership in the Friends of the NSDAR Library. Approximately 1,874 hrs. have been spent by chapter members on state and local indexing work. Chapter members volunteered 4,584 hrs. working at local libraries. 27 DAR Magazine subscriptions were given to local libraries. \$10.00 was sent directly to the Treasurer General for the NSDAR Library. One book was given to the NSDAR Library which was on the NSDAR Library - GEORGIA requested books List 1.

25 books from Georgia Chapters were accepted by the NSDAR Acquisitions Librarian for NSDAR Library.

## **AMERICAN HERITAGE**

## Mrs. John H. Singleton, Chairman

"What is honored in a country is what will be cultivated there."

This committee has honored the past and endowed the future by awakening the need of preserving our rich heritage in art, architecture, crafts, literature, drama and music. This year's programs spotlighted local restoration of homes and public buildings, displays of antique handwork and other crafts and presentations of regional music and drama. Reports were received from 86 chapters, of which 27 were late. 14 chapters reported no programs. A total of 186 programs were given on American Heritage: 8 - Art; 9 - Crafts; 23 - Literature, poetry, drama; 61 - Music; 85 combined with other committees. Most outstanding reports: 1st place tie to John Laurens Chapter and Elijah Clarke Chapter. 2nd place to Baron De Kalb Chapter, and 3rd place to Captain John Wilson Chapter, Commodore Richard Dale Chapter, and Brier Creek Chapter. Some progress has been made in the special project of the American Heritage Chairman in compiling the Georgia State Society Cookbook. \$150.00 has been received in ads. You have sent in many excellent recipes which are now being typed and prepared for publication. You will be proud of your very own cookbook, and it will give you an opportunity to better know your DAR friends in Georgia by using their good recipes. Appreciation is expressed to the Chapters who have participated by sending ads and recipes for this book. I have attended, with the exception of 2 workshops, all State meetings and Continental Congress, and presented 23 programs on American Heritage for 11 Chapters and 12 Garden Clubs, and have sent 2 articles for publication in the DAR Magazine.

#### AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH Mrs. R. H. Deen, Jr.

4,380 enthusiastic students from 291 schools participated in the Essay Contest. State winners were: Fifth Grade - Mary Lyn Corwin, St. Marys; Sponsor: Earl of Camden Chapter; Sixth Grade - Glenn Sarigumba, Brunswick; Sponsor: Brunswick Chapter; Seventh Grade - Amy Miller, Athens; Sponsor: Elijah Clarke Chapter; Eighth Grade - Robert Craig Pease, Toccoa Falls; Sponsor: Toccoa Chapter. The American History Month Vice Chairmen were outstanding in their work with the chapters and the judging in their district. Mrs. Jeff Bridges, NE District, Mrs. Thad F. Blackstock, NW District, Mrs. Robert L. Bates, SE District, and Mrs. W. R. Milton, SW District. There were 167 programs on American History with 129 displays. 155 American History Awards were given, not including the Essay Awards. 652 sets of Spot Announcements were used on radio and 161 on T. V.  $160\frac{1}{2}$  inches of publicity appeared in the press. 254 letters were written to Congressmen in Washington urging a bill be permanently designated February as American History Month. Governor Joe Frank Harris and 41 mayors issued an American History Month Proclamation. This chairman would like to express thanks to the 94 chapters who reported.

## AMERICAN INDIANS Miss Jessie J. Mize, Chairman

Reports were received from 77 Chapters. Twenty-four Chapters reported having programs about American Indians. Resource people giving programs included DAR Chapter Members, State Officers and Chairmen, Curators of Museums, state and national park personnel, teachers of American History and qualified local citizens. Tours to several historic sites were reported. Artifacts of Indian origin were exhibited and a book written about a contemporary Indian artist was reviewed. A total of \$1089.50 was contributed to Indian funds, thirty-five Chapters contributed to the National Bus Project at Bacone College; and 34 Chapters gave money for the National Faculty House Project at St. Mary's School for Indian Girls. In additon 12 Chapters sent about 6,000 Campbell Soup labels to St. Mary's School. Clothing and jewelry were sent to both institutions.

The award of \$10.00 goes to Joseph Habersham Chapter of Atlanta for contributing the largest per capita amount toward all Indian funds, with honorable mention to Button Gwinnett Chapter for their overall gifts for Indian funds. The award of \$5.00 goes to John Benning Chapter for the best report of a program on the Georgia Heritage left by the Creek Indians in South Georgia; and honorable mention to the Atlanta Chapter for the visit and tour to New Echota, the famous capital of the Cherokee Indian Nation in North Georgia.

It has been a rewarding experience to serve as this committee chairman with our State Regent, Mrs. A. C. Earl Shepherd, this year.

### AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP Mrs. Charles Q. Hall

Annual reports were received from 70 chapters. 68 chapters reported repeating the American's Creed at every meeting, and 48 chapters devoted at least 1 chapter meeting to an Americanism program. Americanism talks were given to other organizations by 11 chapters and 6 programs were presented on radio and/or TV. 9 chapters studied the Immigration Act or other immigration material, and 17 chapters sponsored Americanism essays and poster contests in schools. 1809 DAR Manuals were given to applicants for American Citizenship and for use in Americanism classes; 110 Manual were purchased for other uses. 7 members taught or worked with Americanism classes giving

44 hours to reduce illiteracy. 70 members attended Naturalization Ceremonies, and 3 chapters arranged for young persons to attend the Ceremonies. New citizens were presented with 794 Flags of the USA, 336 Flag codes, 395 welcome cards, 420 American's Creed Cards, 543 patriotic leaflets, 45 other gifts and 3 chapters sponsored teas or receptions while 2 chapters had other activities. DAR Americanism Awards were presented to Mr. Barry Malac, sponsored by Lachlan McIntosh Chapter, Savannah; Dr. Jacob Sanchez Quiambao, sponsored by Mary Hammond Washington Chapter, Macon; and presented to Ashley Pittman, sponsored by Governor David Emanuel Chapter, Swainsboro. A DAR Medal of Honor was presented to Victoria Swank who was sponsored by College Hill Chapter, Augusta.

#### CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION Mrs. R. Clough Carter

This State Chairman received reports from 47 chapters. The State Chairman would like to see more interest in our potential future members of the DAR and SAR. The work of this important committee has been realized by more DAR members as this State Chairman has talked with them as she has made the tour of state DAR workshops the past two years. Facts gleaned from the reports received by this chairman were: 17 chapters sponsor a C. A. R. Society; 14 provide senior leadership; 6 subscribe to the National C. A. R.; local and state C. A. R. functions were attended by chapter members; 80 DAR are State Promoters; 39 are National Promoters. Contributions to local and state C. A. R. totaled \$998.50. 13 Endowment Fund pins were given for a total of \$1300.00 and \$544.50 was reported given to other projects. Sincere appreciation is expressed to the chapters that cooperated with the Children of the American Revolution committee and the individual societies of the C. A. R. and especially to our lovely State Regent for her sincere interest and support.

## CONSERVATION

#### Mrs. Alex S. Boyer, Jr.

Emphasis was placed on the Animal Kingdom this year with much work continuing in the Vegetable Kingdom. Eighty-six chapters reported 25 programs on conservation; 339,898 trees planted; 1271 shrubs, 6980 bulbs and many wildflowers. Attention was focused on endangered species. Bird seed fed totalled 17,548 lbs, with many bird feeders built and efforts made to attract unusual birds. One chapter alone sold 8150 lbs. of seed. Many put out salt blocks for deer; wild turkeys were placed on member's farm by Wild Turkey Federation; cats and dogs were given away from Animal Shelter on local TV program. Contributions were made to Georgia Conservancy for support of National Forests and other donations made for local park and cemetery upkeep. An additional 10,000 cherry trees were planted in Macon to augument annual Cherry Blossom Festival. Many trees were planted as memorials and special plantings were made on Arbor Day and Georgia Day. Hundreds of pamphlets were distributed not only to chapter members but also to schools; C. A. R. programs on endangered species were planned. Much concern was shown over wasting of natural resources; pollution, destruction of natural habitats. The study of acid rain was begun. One chapter, Augustin Clayton, presented the Conservation Medal and Certificate.

### CONSTITUTION WEEK Mrs. Heyward Vann

My thanks to the Constitution Week Chairmen of each of our 106 Georgia Chapters for reporting and sending in such good material for our state scrapbook which turned out to be interesting and informative. 117 mayor or high ranking public officials proclaimed Constitution Week in their community; 113 articles appeared in newspapers; 1904 spot announcements were made on radio; 4821 minutes on television; 1301 displays were prepared; 561 programs were given and 5599 pieces of literature were distributed. Baron DeKalb Chapter in Decatur had the best report. The best joint report went to Nathaniel Macon and Mary Hammond Washington Chapters in Macon. In membership of 46 - 75 first place went to John Laurens Chapter in Dublin. In membership of 45 and under, first place went to Lady Huntingdon Chapter in Oxford. Chapters with excellent reports, in the joint division, Button Gwinnett, George Walton and Oglethorpe in Columbus; in Chapters with memberships of 75 and over, Hawkinsville in Hawkinsville and Archibald Bulloch in Statesboro; in Chapters with membership of 45 - 75, Governor David Emanuel in Swainsboro and Colonel William Candler in Gainesville; and in Chapters with 46 members or less, Philadelphis Winn in Snellville and Matthew Talbot in Monroe.

#### DAR GOOD CITIZENS Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall

Good Citizen pins, certificates and wallet cards were awarded to 185 Seniors by 66 chapters. District winners and their sponsors were Christine Lee, S. W. District, Augusta Chapter, Augusta Chapter, Augusta; Katherine Anne Carbaugh, S. E. District, Lyman Hall Chapter, Waycross. Each winner received a \$10.00 award from the State Society. Christine Lee was chosen the State Good Citizen. She received a \$100.00 Educational Award and a State Good Citizen pin. She was entered in competition in the National Southeastern Division. #### Mrs. James J. Muldrow

100 chapters contributed \$22,598.75 to the schools with reports received from 93. At Kate Duncan Smith the state project, purchase of band instruments, \$3,692.75; scholarship \$2,061.75; other gifts \$1,287.25. Tamassee state project, improvements for the May Erwin Talmadge Auditorium/Gymnasium, \$3,493.25; scholarship \$2,148.75; other gifts \$5,867.25. The .07 per capita will be invested at the discretion of the Finance Committee for future use at Tamassee. Berry state project, renovation of a summer house \$936.50; scholarship \$267.00; other gifts \$197.00. Total gifts to Crossmore \$840.75; Hillside \$559.25; Hindman Settlement \$715.25. 420 boxes weighing 9,878 pounds were sent at a cost of \$645.97. Five freight companies gave free freight to 9 chapters while 15 members delivered boxes when they visited the schools.

66 chapters reported full school programs; six of these presented by the state chairman. Five chapters obtained TV and radio time with one chapter receiving continuous cable news coverage prior to their school program. 7 pictures and 26 articles appeared. 43 chapters received the Hightower Award.

## DAR SERVICE FOR VETERAN PATIENTS Mrs. W. Elton Corbitt

Reports were received from 96 Chapters. Contributions to the Carl Vinson VA Medical Center in Dublin, VA Medical Centers in Decatur and Augusta were made by these Chapters and included: 3427 hours of volunteer service; 42 parties valued at \$531.00; 5648 hand-made articles and gifts to patients and hospitals valued at \$5374.03: canteen books valued at \$393.50. Veteran patients in Military Hospitals, Private Hospitals and Nursing Homes received: 755 gifts valued at \$1324.64; 187 visits; 62 parties and 965 personal visits. Chapters reported the following statistics on publicity received for their activities: 483" newstories; 133"news pictures; 15 talks made; 66 minutes of Radio talks, and 1 television talk. Eleven Chapters sent in names of DAR members who have served in the U. S. Armed Forces, each Chapter sent 1 name. One chapter sponsored an essay contest in 1 school, 17 certificates of award were presented, 127 Flag Decals given, 10 children's Flag codes were ordered, 7 braille Flag codes presented, 347 Flag Books given, 25 of them to schools and libraries, 4 chapters sposored spot radio announcements. The Georgia Society had 328 new members by application from the February Board Meeting of 1984 up to, but not including, the February, 1985 Board Meeting. There were 23 reinstatements and 32 transfers from other states into Georgia which increased the number of new members to 383. Of these new members, 89 were Juniors. One chapter reported a gain of 17 new members. 41 Certificates of Merit were awarded to chapters with at least 4 new members.

Four Georgia chapters participated in the National Society's Essay Contest — "What My DAR Membership Means To Me". #### MOTION PICTURE, RADIO AND TELEVISION Mrs. Erwin N. Kinne

It was gratifying to see the interest shown in the work of this Committee at the four District summer workshops, but best of all, that interest was reflected by reports received from the Chapters this Spring. 80 reports were received, 19 of which were marked "No Report", leaving 27 Chapters not reporting. It was disappointing that these Chapters did not respond. A total of \$15.00 was contributed for videotaping Continental Congress. Slides were used by 29 Chapters, 31 members appeared on TV, with 17 being on Radio, 17 Chapters sponsored films for Community viewing, 4 Chapters had publicity concerning work of the Committee. 188 letters were written to Broadcasting Companies and/or sponsored voicing favorable or unfavorable reaction to specific programs. 6 Chapters have members on Motion Picture Councils. 2 Chapters gave awards to TV stations for good programming. Georgia Daughters overwhelmingly indicated a preference for "Places in the Heart", as the best movie for all family viewing and "The Thornbirds" best for adults. "Little House on the Prairie" rated first for TV family viewing, with Public TV best for adults. "Dallas" was voted the worst TV show, with "The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas'' leader for the worst Motion Picture. First place of \$10.00 for best overall report went to Colonel Daniel Appling Chapter, Second place of \$5.00 to Baron DeKalb. Honorable Mention Awards went to Nathaniel Macon, Savannah and Statesboro Chapters.

#### NATIONAL DEFENSE Mrs. James J. Leitch

This chairman is pleased to have 100% reporting from chapters of the Georgia State Society. One hundred and six chapters reported: 97 entire programs on National Defense; 104 devoted 5 minutes or more to National Defense each meeting; 84 chapters studied the 1984 Resolutions; 63 chapters had National Defense materials available at meetings and many distributed material to schools, libraries and interested individuals; 398 Good Citizenship Medals were presented; 57 chapters gave \$168.50 to the NSDAR ROTC fund and presented 112 bronze and 16 gold ROTC medals; 57 chapters gave \$584.50 to Dollars for Defense, helping provide National Defense Literature; 170 members subscribed to the National Defender; 782 members wrote to Congressmen and 777 wrote to State Legislators; approximately 5282 members voted in 1984 - 1985 election; 55 members hold elective or appointive public office (among which are Probate Judge, Clerk of Court, City Council member, County Commissioner, Democratic Executive Committee member, Advisory Council of Georgia Citizens and Selective Service Board member); the National Budget, Public Education and Social Security were the issues of greatest interest; National Defense topics frequently discussed were Star Wars, Nuclear Arms Race, Genocide Convention, Protection of the Constitution and Illegal Immigration.

The State National Defense Chairman is grateful for the cooperation of National Defense Chapter Chairman and every effort has been made to keep the mailing list up-to-date. It is a pleasure to work with and seek advise from our capable State Regent.

#### NATIONAL HONOR ROLL Mrs. Buxton L. Daniel

The 1984 - 1985 National Honor Roll report blanks were mailed from NSDAR to Chapter Regents in November 1984. A letter of information was included in the August Workshop packet to Chapter Regents. There were 31 Treaty of Paris programs and 78 fulfilled honor roll requirements in their programs. However, no original programs were submitted as manuscripts, slides or tapes. As for yearbooks, 73 used the Program Outline Guide to help plan. 52 entered the National Theme Contest and 33 entered Conservation of Printing Cost Contests. 84 chapters reported out of 186. 53 printed yearbooks, 7 printed inserts, 11 printed supplementals. 220 Historical Programs were given, 228 Educational and 189 Patriotic. Georgia Daughters have been very creative in seeking out ways to grow and learn.

## PUBLIC RELATIONS

The DAR Story is still much in the public eye. Ninety-five Georgia Chapters reported 17,120 inches of newspaper publicity which included 1483 articles and 491 pictures. Other printed publicity measured 460 inches in 81 articles and 30 pictures. Sixty-two chapters

opened their meetings to the press and 35 gave Washington Landmarks. Archibald Bulloch Chapter of Statesboro received the awards offered by the Public Relations Chairman. This Chapter also won first place in Great Documents and second place certificate from National for the Feature Story Contest. Articles of special interest were forwarded to Washington for display on the national bulletin board.

The committee met at 11 a.m., May 21, 1984 at the home of Mrs. J. L. R. Boyd in Atlanta. Present were: Mesdames James J. Leitch, Ned L. Shuman, Donald Hankinson, Robert W. Giberling, Leonard G. De Lamar and Mrs. A. C. Earl Shepherd, State Regent. Mrs. De Lamar, chairman, presided. The budget for 1984-85 was presented. A motion to approve as presented was made by Mrs. Shuman, seconded by Mrs. Gibel-

ing and adopted. A chart of budgets from the past ten years was distributed, studied and discussed in an effort to find a way to make the 1985-86 budget more in keeping with necessary expenditures now and in the future, taking into consideration the rising cost of printing the proceedings and maintenance of Meadow Garden. Since the only solution was a raise in dues a motion was made by Mrs. Hankinson to recommend that Article 8, Section 1 of the State By-Laws be amended to state, "The annual dues of chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be four (4( dollars for each member of the chapter," thus raising the State dues from two to four dollars per member. The resolution of 1963 resolving "that the Georgia State Society give all possible assistance — to this most worthy project" (the Revolutionary Battle Field Park in Savannah) was discussed and a motion made by Mrs. Shuman to include this item on the report form of the Chapter treasurers was seconded by Mrs. Hankinson and passed. The request for a more substantial flag stand was presented and Mrs. Shuman moved, that since the flag in the old stand was continually falling over, the State Regent be authorized to purchase a new stand with funds from the State Dues account.

A letter was read from Mrs. John Singleton, chairman American Heritage Committee, requesting advice on publication of the cookbook. The committee approved financing this book by sale of ads and pre-publication orders. Three other items were brought before the committee for consideration: Raising the per capita to schools; raising amount given hostess chapter for State Conference to \$200.00; helping hostess chapters for District meetings and Fall Board of Management meetings with expenses. Mrs. Leitch moved that since we were not able to budget amounts needed for the proceedings now that these items should be postponed until after the vote on raising State dues at State Conference 1985. Seconded by Mrs. Hankinson and approved. The meeting was adjourned at 12:30 p.m.

Gibeling and ex-officio member Mrs. A. C. Earl Shepherd, State Regent, Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. State Treasurer, Mrs. Hanf, presented May 1, 1984 - Ocotber 19, 1984 Summary of Fund Accounts: Checking \$6,796.93, Money Market \$54,643.16, Certificates \$56,365.68, a total of \$117,805.77.

The chairman noted that there is a printer's error on page 80 of the 1983-1984 Proceedings. Under Total Income (4th column), \$32,079.16 should be \$32,079.68. Mrs. Kendrick moved that \$1732.50 profit realized from the sale of State Histories be transferred from the Lucy Cook Peel fund to the Meadow Garden Capital Investment fund. Reports reveal that donations have been made to Meadow Garden Painting Fund and to Statue of Liberty restoration. # Standing Rules for Meadow Garden

#### I

# MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

- 1. The governing body of a museum, in this instance the Meadow Garden Board, serves the public interest as it relates to Meadow Garden, and must consider itself accountable to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, as well as to Meadow Garden; members should not attempt to act in their individual capacities, but all actions should be taken as a board, committee, or otherwise in conformance with the Standing Rules, the Act of Incorporation, or applicable Resolutions.
- 2. The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the three (3) Trustees as named in the Deed for the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, conveying Meadow Garden to the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, namely, the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent, and the State Chairman of Meadow Garden who is appointed by the State Regent; the Chapter Regents of the Augusta Chapter and the College Hill Chapter, both Chapters being located in Augusta, who shall serve as vice chairmen to the State Chairman of Meadow Garden; and four of the chairmen of Meadow Garden Committee as appointed by the State Regent.
- 3. No Georgia Daughter shall serve in the same Meadow Garden Chairmanship more than two (2) consecutive terms.
- 4. Of the five (5) appointments made by the State Regent, at least two (2) shall be Honorary State Regents.
- 5. The State Second Vice Regent shall serve as an ex-officio member of the Meadow Garden Board, being given the privilege of the floor without a vote.
- 6. At the invitation of the Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board, chairmen of Meadow Garden Committees not holding a vote on the Meadow Garden Board may attend meetings of the Meadow Garden Board for the purpose of presenting plans and reports.

- 7. The State Regent shall serve as Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board, and the State First Regent shall serve as Secretary of the Meadow Garden Board.
- 8. The Meadow Garden Board shall meet a minimum of three (3) times each year, namely, preceding Fall Board of Management meeting, preceding annual State Conference and following Continental Congress, and at such other time as deemed necessary by the Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board. At least one (1) meeting of the Board shall be held at Meadow Garden each year.
- 9. The Meadow Garden Board shall have jurisdiction over the operation, maintenance and work of Meadow Garden and shall be the authority for Meadow Garden as long as such authority is not in conflict with the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, the Act of Incorporation for the Georgia State Society, Resolutions adopted by the Georgia State Society and/or directions which from time to time may be approved by action of the Georgia State Society assembled at its annual State Conference.
- 10. Five (5) voting members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.
- 11. Minutes shall be kept of each meeting and a copy shall be sent to each voting member and printed verbatim in the State Proceedings.
- 12. All expenses for maintenance, operation and purchases of furnishings and plantings shall be authorized by the State Regent as Chairman of the Board, paid by the State Treasurer. Expenditures exceeding \$1000.00 must have the majority approval of the Board.
- 13. These rules will be binding on the actions of the Board in their operation of "Meadow Garden." They may be changed by the following procedure: Members of the Board must have written notification of proposed changes or additions one month prior to the next meeting of the Board; a two-thirds vote of the Board is necessary to effect a change or addition.

## **OPERATIONS**

- 1. Everyone entering Meadow Garden will be required to sign the Register, including date, time of arrival and time of departure.
- No more than ten (10) people with each Docent are to be on tour in the house at a given time. Excess of this number may wait in the reception room or in the garden.
- 3. There will be no smoking in Meadow Garden.
- 4. No refreshments are to be served in Meadow Garden or taken into Meadow Garden. Should a group, such as a visiting chapter, desire refreshments the garden is available for use if litter is properly disposed of by the serving group.
- 5. Tour Visitors are asked to make donations as follows:
  - \$2.00 for each adult and this includes chapter visits.
    - \$ .50 for children under 12 years of age.
    - \$ .25 each for groups of school children, scout troops, etc.
    - \$1.00 each for tour visitors brought by Historic Augusta.
- 6. There will be only four (4) sets of keys to Meadow Garden and to the gates of Meadow Garden. Two (2) sets will be in the possession of the Resident Manager who will open the house upon request and will secure the house after departure of visitors, making sure the book is signed as stated above. These keys never to leave the possession of the Resident Manager. The third (3rd) set of keys is to be held by the State Chairman of Meadow Garden and is not to leave her possession. The fourth (4th) set of keys is to be in the possession of the Chairman of the Board (State Regent) and to never leave her hands. No duplicate keys are to be made from either of the above sets of keys.

## **VOLUNTEERS (DOCENTS)**

- Volunteers, docents, shall be members in good standing of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR.
- 2. Duties of volunteers can include acting as guides, hostesses, working in gift shop, working in yard, cleaning in house, public relations. No volunteer work at or for

Meadow Garden shall be done except under the direct guidance of the Meadow Garden Board and the chairman of the specific committee for that particular function.

3. Cleaning or yard work volunteers shall be under the direction of the Resident Manager.

#### IV

# FURNISHINGS

- 1. Items bought or accepted for the older section of Meadow Garden must pre-date 1821.
- 2. Furnishings for the two (2) main floor rooms and two (2) upstairs rooms in the newer section may be dated post 1820 but these rooms should be considered companion rooms to the rest of the house and furnished accordingly with all efforts made to keep furnishings of these four rooms dated no later than 1850. The Augusta Room furnishings will remain as they are in 1982.
- 3. Reproductions may be used only when the physical condition of the antiques is jeopardized by exposure in areas where large numbers of visitors have easy access; or when environmental conditions including excessive light, dust, humidity or airborne impurities pose a threat to the preservation of originals.
- Effective March 12, 1983 all items donated to Meadow Garden shall be accepted with the written condition that they become the property of Meadow Garden and may be used, replaced or sold at the discretion of the Meadow Garden Board only.
- 5. All items that post date 1821, with the exception of those in the six (6) rooms of the newer section and those described in Number 3 of this section, shall be replaced as soon as possible with similar items pre-dating 1821.
- 6. Once an item is placed, it shall not be moved from one location to another without permission of the Meadow Garden Board. Only the Chairman of the Board may approve the removal of an item from the house, if it is in need of repair or refinishing.
- 7. Any item donated or purchased must have written documentation of appraisal and include an indication as to how the determination was made.
- 8. A file will be kept of all assets with information as to price paid or market value, date of acquisition, donor or where bought, documentation and appraisal and a description of article. One file will be kept in the reception room accessible to the Docents; a duplicate file will be in the possession of the Chairman of the Board.
- All items purchased or donated will be added to the Fine Arts insurance policy. Said policy will be reviewed and updated a minimum of once a year. Major additions to furnishings will be added immediately.

#### V

## GROUNDS

- 1. The landscape plan adopted by the Board shall be adhered to with no deviation unless recommended by an authority on landscape design and care.
- 2. Donations of shrubbery, plants or trees shall be accepted only when item is part of the master plan.
- 3. Work on the grounds will be under the sole direction of the Meadow Garden Board and the Grounds Chairman (Landscape Chairman). Supervision of actual work will be provided by the Resident Manager of Meadow Garden and the Grounds Chairman.

#### VI

# **GIFT SHOP**

- 1. Gift Shop will be operated by a committee appointed by the Chairman of the Board and be responsible to the Board.
- Chairman of the committee will be responsible for all purchases, subject to the approval of the Board or the State Regent.
- 3. Gift Shop operation will be self-supporting. In the event funds are needed for purchases, they may be advanced from available Meadow Garden funds and must be

considered a loan and shall be repaid without interest within one (1) year from date of borrowing.

4. Any profit over what is needed for stock purchases shall be placed in the Meadow Garden Capital Investment Trust Fund after the annual audit. The audit of the Gift Shop operation shall be included in the annual audit of the Georgia State Society at which time, if there is a profit, it shall be declared and dispersed to the Capital Investment Trust Fund.

#### VII

#### PATRONS

- 1. Donors to the following categories are eligible to be known as "Patrons":
  - A. Meadow Garden Capital Investment Trust Fund
  - B. Furnishings
  - C. Maintenance
  - D. Landscape
- 2. Individual gifts of a minimum value of \$50.00 to any of the above categories automatically qualifies the donor as a Patron.
- 3. Chapter or group gifts of a minimum value of \$100.00 or more, above the State Honor Roll requirement, automatically qualifies that chapter or group as a Patron.
- 4. The State Treasurer will report these gifts to the Patrons Chairman.
- The Patrons Chairman will issue certificates to the qualifying individuals and chapters or groups.
- Two (2) permanent books will be kept on public display at Meadow Garden:
   A. Patrons gifts to the Capital Investment Trust Fund
  - B. Patrons gifts to other categories
- 7. The Patrons Chairman will enter the names of donors in the appropriate book a minimum of once a year.

Furnishings. Adopted at the Meadow Garden Meeting, March 10, 1983. Effective at time of adoption.

## MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

The Meadow Garden Board met Thursday, June 28, 1984, in the Augusta Room of Meadow Garden, Augusta, Georgia. Mrs. A. C. Earl Shepherd, State Regent, presiding as Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 10:15 a.m. and asked Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr. to offer the opening prayer. Others attending were: Mrs. James J. Leitch, Mrs. William N. Agostas, Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar, Mrs. Harold Starr Smith, Mrs. Luther L. Watson, Mrs. Leland J. Malchow, Mrs. Roy H. Cagle, Jr., and Mrs. James J. Muldrow. Mrs. James H. Elliott, Mrs. W. D. Harvey and Mr. Dan Tucker attended by invitation of the Chairman.

Mrs. De Lamar moved to elect Mrs. Leitch as Recording Secretary. The motion was seconded and adopted. Mrs. Leitch read the March 1984 minutes, previously approved, for the purpose of review.

Resident Manager, Mr. Dan Tucker, serving in his 5th year at Meadow Garden, expressed his love and appreciation for this historic home. He noted the need for involvement of a greater number of Chapters at Meadow Garden, as well as, the need to generate interest in the city of Augusta and throughout the State. Mr. Tucker was excused from the meeting. State Chairman of Meadow Garden, Mrs. William N. Agostas, stated that several boards on the house need to be replaced and the back steps repaired. She reported on bids for painting Meadow Garden and the Resident Manager's Cottage. A general discussion followed and other bids for painting will be secured.

Gift Shop Chairman, Mrs. Harold Starr Smith, reported that an inventory had been taken. It was agreed that a general renovation of the shop was needed and should be undertaken with Mrs. Smith's supervision.

Chairman of Meadow Garden Landscaping, Mrs. Luther L. Watson, stated that the goal for the year would be to maintain the recently completed landscaping project. She called attention to the fact that this year the State Society C.A.R. had voted as its project to work with Meadow Garden. Mrs. Watson reported a total of \$1203.65 in Landscaping funds.

Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr., Meadow Garden Patrons Chairman, discussed progress of negotiations concerning insurance on articles stolen from Meadow Garden. She recommended updating the floater policy and an indepth study of the insurance program. Mrs. Alderman then reported plans to stimulate interest and secure a greater number of Patrons for Meadow Garden.

Furnishings Chairman, Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar, reported a meeting of this committee, June 27, to inspect each individual piece of furniture for the purpose of determining: (1) If furniture was of the proper period; (2) If it was a reproduction; (3) If there was need of repair. Committee members, Mrs. De Lamar, Mrs. James H. Elliott and Mrs. W. D. Harvey, requested permission to relocate several items of furniture and to secure professional appraisal of all furnishings. Board approval was forthcoming. The Chairman of Furnishings offered the following motion: By direction of the Furnishings Committee I move that an auction be held of items we do not need and are now being stored, after a professional appraisal has been secured, and that this auction be held at the Meadow Garden Festival with a reserve bid determined by the committee. Motion seconded and adopted. It was noted with appreciation that Mrs. W. D. Harvey had presented a pine commode for use in the Boys Room of Meadow Garden honoring her sister.

Mrs. M. F. Fogleman, Chairman of Meadow Garden Day, was absent but sent written request that no entrance fee be charged in order to encourage attendance and to enable the committee to secure a military band from Fort Gordon. Mrs. Watson made a motion that no fee be charged for entrance to the grounds but that the \$2.00 fee to tour Meadow Garden be continued. The motion was seconded and adopted. Mrs. Williamson, Co-Chairman of Meadow Garden Day, discussed general plans for the Festival. Mrs. Agostas, Meadow Garden Chairman, reported that the Pine Needle and Merryweeders Garden Clubs would hold a flower show at Meadow Garden on festival day.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned at 1:00 p.m.

Mrs. A. C. Fogleman, Mrs. Harold Starr Smith, and Mrs. Roy H. Cagle, Jr. Mrs. Joseph J. Burroughs, Docents Chairman, and Mrs. John Robert Blair, Resident Manager of Meadow Garden, attended by invitation of the Chairman. Minutes of the June 28, 1984 meeting were read and approved as corrected.

Docents Chairman, Mrs. Burroughs, reported on efforts to secure a greater number of DAR members to serve as Docents. She stated that some C.A.R. members were participating in this program. An updated information sheet has been prepared to be used by Docents as they conduct tours.

Gift Shop Chairman, Mrs. Smith, reported on work done in the Gift Shop and on the sale of merchandise. She stated that the entire shop had been painted by the Docents Chairman, Mrs. Burroughs. Mrs. Muldrow has made and placed a curtain around the sink and members of the C.A.R. helped redecorate the restroom.

Landscaping Chairman, Mrs. Watson, reported work on the grape arbor and general upkeep of the grounds. She stated that the floors of Meadow Garden had been waxed.

Patrons Chairman, Mrs. Alderman, suggested that it would be appropriate to recognize volunteer services of non-members by the awarding of Patrons Certificates. She moved that, on the recommendation of Mrs. Agostas, Patrons Certificates be awarded to Mr. Ulmer Savage, Mrs. C. L. Cox and Mr. Dennis Calamas, who made volunteer repairs to Meadow Garden comparable to the Patrons donations. The motion was seconded and adopted.

All monies given honoring individuals have been spent, with the exception of \$400.00 donated in honor of Mrs. Frank G. Binford and suggestions for use of these funds are being considered. A pair of 18th Century prints have been purchased honoring the President General, Mrs. Walter Hughey King, and Mrs. Harold I. Tuthill, as well as, a wine decanter honoring Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr.

Mrs. Harold Starr Smith, Gift Shop Chairman, reported sales in the amount of \$201.84 at the Meadow Garden Festival. She discussed need of inexpensive items for children to purchase. Mrs. Blair sent a detailed written report of duties performed since assuming the position of Resident Manager. This report is attached to the minutes.

Earl Shepherd, State Regent, presiding as Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m. and requested Mrs. Luther L. Watson to offer the opening prayer. Others attending were: Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar, Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr., Mrs. James J. Leitch, Mrs. James J. Muldrow, Mrs. Roy H. Cagle, Jr., Mrs. Leland J. Malchow and Mrs. Harold Starr Smith. Minutes of the October 24, 1984 meeting were read and approved as corrected.

Meadow Garden State Chairman, Mrs. William N. Agostas, was unable to attend and her report was read by Mrs. Harold Starr Smith. Mrs. Agostas reported: Resident Manager's Cottage has been repaired and painted with paint donated by the City of Augusta; \$6985.00 is estimate received for the scraping and painting of Meadow Garden; pads have been placed beneath rugs at Meadow Garden; grass and bulbs have been planted; dirt, donated by the City of Augusta, has been used to improve the condition of the driveway.

Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr., Patron's Chairman, requested permission from the Board to name the Mayor of Augusta as a Meadow Garden Patron in appreciation of his generous and loyal support. Permission granted.

Furnishings Chairman, Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar, has prepared a list of all articles needed for Meadow Garden and this list will be distributed to Chapter Regents. Mrs. De Lamar reported: negotiating for rugs to be made for Meadow Garden; plans for refurbishing of Docent's Room; fixed asset file is complete with pictures; 18th Century Prints have been purchased, honoring Mrs. Walter Hughey King and in memory of Mrs. Harold I. Tuthill.

Gift Shop Chairman, Mrs. Harold Starr Smith, reported total sales at Fall Board of \$96.03 and of \$81.16 since Fall Board. The cost of souvenir pencils is being investigated for the purpose of making available an inexpensive item for the Gift Shop. Mrs. Smith offered the motion that the price of the Meadow Garden ceramic tiles be lowered from \$6.50 plus 4% tax. Adopted. The tiles are now to be sold for \$6.00 plus tax. The State Regent stated that she is investigating candlesticks, made of Georgia clay, as a possible sale item for Meadow Garden. The Gift Shop Chairman was commended for her diligent work and successful operation of the Gift Shop.

Landscaping Chairman, Mrs. Luther L. Watson, said that the landscaping project at Meadow Garden had become one of maintenance-trimming, clipping, tieing, weeding, weeding and weeding. She expressed appreciation to the State Chairman, Mrs. William N. Agostas, for her tremendous help in this area. Mrs. Watson reported that \$445.00 had been designated this year by the Chapters for landscaping.

Patrons Chairman, Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr., said that all Patrons for this past year came from just 32 Chapters. Mrs. Alderman stated that since the Paint Fund Project had come to a successful conclusion, she would stress the Capital Investment Fund in the coming year. Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar read from the minutes of the Finance Committee concerning withdrawal of interest from the Capital Investment Fund. The Finance Committee voted to withdraw interest twice a year. Interest must be withdrawn when available or left in the fund.

Mrs. James J. Muldrow reported on progress made toward the production of a new brochure for Meadow Garden. She showed map, with directions to Meadow Garden, reduced to the proper size for the brochure.

Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar reported on the reviewing and upgrading of Meadow Garden insurance policies as requested by the Board. She stated that the premium would double, becoming \$1500.00 annually, if Meadow Garden is insured according to the appraisal value and including liability.

Mrs. Luther L. Watson offered the recommendation from the Meadow Garden Board to the Finance Committee that the Finance Committee take into consideration the increase of insurance and maintenance of Meadow Garden as they consider the budget for next year. Recommendation adopted.

The Chairman of the Board reported the receipt of an extremely large electric bill and a plumbing charge of \$235.00 resulting from the hard freeze experienced by the Augusta area this past winter.

The monthly report of the Resident Manager, Terri Blair, was discussed. Mrs. Blair reported contacting schools and Senior Citizen Groups in an effort to stimulate interest in Meadow Garden. She asked if a discount rate for Senior Citizens might be considered. The request has come from the Georgia Power Company that a key be issued to them so that the Meter Reader might enter the grounds to read the meter. Mrs. Roy H. Cagle, Jr., College Hill Chapter Regent, will ask the State Chairman to contact the Georgia Power Company concerning this matter. Mrs. Blair also reported that Mr. Clark, who conducts sightseeing bus tours in Augusta, would like to include Meadow Garden on these tours. Mrs. De Lamar made the motion that the feasibility of bus tours visiting Meadow Garden be investigated. Adopted.

The State Regent stated that only one paint contract had been offered and that Mr. Walker's contract would be carefully reviewed. The consensus of the Board was that Mr. Walker's contract, as presented by Mrs. William N. Agostas, should be accepted. Mrs. Agostas and Mrs. Muldrow will check the scraping of the house and stipulate where the paint is to be stored.

Mrs. Leland J. Malchow, Regent of Augusta Chapter, said that Meadow Garden is now listed as a point of historical interest by the Augusta Chamber of Commerce. She reported that the society of DIRECT DESCENDANTS OF THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE would convene in Augusta March 21-23, 1985. Approximately 90 of these members will visit Meadow Garden and the Augusta Chapter requested permission to serve refreshments on the grounds. Permission graciously granted.

Mrs. Malchow called attention to the fact that Augusta will observe the 250th anniversary of its founding from December, 1985 through June, 1986.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned at 3:00 p.m.

Our DAR Meadow Garden Day was held on 22 September 1984 on and near the grounds of Meadow Garden, an Augusta home of George Walton, Georgia's youngest of its three signers of the Declaration of Independence.

DAR activities providing income were the Attic (white elephants and rummage), Sewing/Crafts, Garden, Colonial Kitchen, Food for Lunch, Book Nook, Afghan Voices, Gift Shop, House Tours and Antique Auction. Four Commercial spaces were rented. The C.A.R. also had a space for their fund raising.

Mrs. A. C. Earl Shepherd, State Regent, conducted a program featuring Constitution Week. The Meadow Garden Society C.A.R. officers were installed.

Other events for the day included the Suzuki Strings, Connie's Cloggers, Max Green Fiddlers and the Garden City Chorus. Throughout the day a family from the Kiokee Rifles demonstrated frontier life with spinning, lace making, cooking and rifle firing.

The Antique Auction was a new feature and attracted quite a bit of interest. Funds generated by the days's activities and previous chapter contributions totaled \$2579.84. Subsequent chapter contributions of \$302 brought the total to \$2881.84. There were 87 chapters participating in this effort to maintain Meadow Garden which is owned by our Georgia State Society.

#### MEADOW GARDEN DOCENTS Mrs. Joseph J. Burroughs

In preparation for Meadow Garden Day, some of the docents and I were able to spend time at Meadow Garden cleaning around the house and gardens, as well as painting in the gift shop. Also during the months previous to the festival, I was able to make an accurate and detailed inventory of the furnishings of the house. By comparing this inventory with previous listings and information gathered by others before my time, I was able to remake the docent sheets to be used during Meadow Garden Day and on subsequent occasions when the docents are asked to fill in in the absence of the resident manager giving tours and keeping the house and grounds open to the public when they would otherwise have to be closed.

Present and in use in the house on Meadow Garden Day were docents representing five chapters of the DAR in the surrounding area and two members of the Meadow Garden Chapter of the C.A.R. We were very proud of the job done not only by the older experienced docents from the DAR chapters, but also by the excellent showing of the two C.A.R. members.

Since Meadow Garden Day, various docents from the nearby DAR chapters have been asked to serve at Meadow Garden a total of twenty-two days. The docents generally work for half a day, covering the hours from one o'clock to four o'clock. Working with the help of the resident manager, we have been able to establish a much better procedure for showing the house to large groups. We have attempted to eliminate the tie-up at the foot of the stairs which was a constant source of confusion and congestion during busy times and to make the traffic flow more steady.

Some new pieces of furniture have been added and many have been moved to different locations throughout the house, thus creating the necessity for constant revision and up-dating of the docent sheets. We have also added several new names to the list of available docents and will be continuing to work with both these new ladies and our previous docents to keep them familiar with the house and its furnishings and history.

Standing Rules for furnishings were adopted in 1983 and it has been our duty to see that Meadow Garden is furnished accordingly. The board approved an appraisal of furnishings to update insurance coverage. It was completed by J. H. Elliott Appraisal and Antique Company at a fraction of the usual cost. The fixed asset file, recommended in 1981, was compiled. Each article is pictured on a card containing all known information about the item. We are grateful to Mrs. William Agostas for taking pictures needed. All funds donated honoring someone have been used according to directions: rope bed honoring Mrs. Frank Binford; 18th century print honoring Mrs. Walter Hughey King; 18th century print honoring Mrs. Harold I. Tuthill; wine decanter honoring Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr.; pewter plate honoring Mrs. Godwin and Mrs. Dally of John Clarke Chapter. Other acquisitions include: 18 leather bound books, 2 quilts, 5 feather beds, dough box, pine commode, a kitchen tool. Needed repairs on huntboard and Empire bookcase have been made and seats of 6 side chairs re-upholstered. At auction approved for un-usable items \$700 was realized. We are indebted to Mr. Roy Holland for giving his time and talents to this end. It was found that 8 chairs, given many years ago by Mrs. Jefferies, were no longer needed. They were given to her family according to her directions. This chairman appreciates the dedication of the committee members who made numerous trips to Augusta this year. # **Bylaws**

# BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

#### Article I NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

# Article II OBJECTS

The objects of the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution shall be: to promote the aims set forth in the Bylaws of the National Society; the preservation of the memory of its Revolutionary patriots; the study of its history; the education of its youth in patriotic ideals and in the duties of citizenship.

# Article III MEMBERSHIP

All Chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of this organization.

## Article IV OFFICERS

The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Curator. The State Regent shall appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as adviser in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting.

# Article V ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected at the annual State Conference biennially.

Section 2. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two years or until their successors are elected. Their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and of the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Section 3. No member shall be eligible to a State office until she has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years. No member shall be eligible to the same State office for two successive terms. A member having served more than one-half term in the State office shall be deemed to have served a term. Any member holding active membership in a Chapter in the Georgia State Society shall be eligible to hold a State office, provided she has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years.

Section 4. Nominations of candidates for office shall be from the floor. The election shall be held by ballot. A majority of the votes cast by the voting members of the State Conference shall elect.

Section 5. Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become acting First Vice Regent, subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. A vacancy in any other State office between annual meetings shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next Fall Board of Management or State Conference, whichever shall come first. Any State Officer, who is absent from the State for a continuous period of six months or longer, automatically relinquishes her position as a State officer.

Section 6. No two State officers shall be members of the same Chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

Section 7. In recognition of valuable service to the organization, any State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Section 8. A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot. The

Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than fifteen months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

Section 9. On the election of State Regent, and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Recording Secretary General. The endorsement of a candidate for Vice President General shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent to the Recording Secretary General at least two weeks prior to Continental Congress.

# Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, of the State Board of Management, and of the Executive Committee. She shall appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees.

Section 2. In the absence of the State Regent from any meeting of the State Conference, or the State Board of Management, the State First Vice Regent, or in her absence, the State Second Vice Regent, shall perform the duties of the State Regent. The State First and Second Vice Regents may be assigned to direct committees and to perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent.

Section 3. The State Chaplain shall open all meetings of the State Conference and of the State Board of Management with Scripture reading and prayer and shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require. She shall preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and shall be responsible for the In Memoriam pages in the Proceedings.

Section 4. The State Recording Secretary shall record the proceedings of the State Conference and of meetings of the State Board of Management and of the Executive Committee. She shall compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and of the Proceedings Committee.

Section 5. The State Corresponding Secretary shall conduct correspondence and send notices in behalf of the State Conference, the State Regent, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as directed by them.

Section 6. The State Treasurer shall be the custodian of the funds of the State Society. She shall receive the State Conference dues and registration fees from the Chapters and shall receive all sums contributed by the Chapters for State and National projects. All monies received by the State Treasurer shall be placed only in institutions with accounts covered by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation or by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation, and the amount in any one institution shall not exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage. She shall disburse such sums only when authorized by the State Regent in writing. The State Treasurer shall keep an account of all sums received or paid out and shall keep receipts for all payments. She shall prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference. Her books shall be audited annually by a Certified Public Accountant. She shall be ex-officio a member of the Credentials Committee.

Section 7. The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new Chapters.

Section 8. The State Registrar shall, when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, who live in towns and counties where there are no Chapters, to prove eligibility, and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars in verifying lineage papers. She shall keep a correct list of all members in the State and shall make a report on membership to the State Conference.

Section 9. The State Historian shall be in charge of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General. She shall

keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves in the State and shall prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General to Smithsonian Institution. She shall encourage the compilation and publication of County Histories and other unpublished records, especially those of the Revolutionary period.

Section 10. The State Librarian shall collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing duplicates, wherever possible, in the NSDAR Library and in the Georgia DAR Collections in the State Department of Archives and History. She shall endeavor to obtain the books on the wanted list of the Librarian General for the Georgia Section in the NSDAR Library and is authorized to solicit contributions from the Chapters for the purchase of the same. She shall have custody and supervision of the DAR Genealogical and Historical Collections of the State Department of Archives and History.

Section 11. The State Curator shall receive and be responsible for all gifts of Revolutionary relics to the Museum of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution. She shall be custodian of the conference properties and shall have them properly stored, insured and made ready for use at State Conference.

## Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. The Georgia State Society shall hold an annual State Conference between the first day of February and the time of the meeting of the Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week. The Executive Committee shall fix the time and place of meetings when not fixed by the Conference in session, or when for any reason it may be impracticable to meet at the time or place fixed by the Conference.

Section 2. The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credential blanks to the Chapters not less than sixty days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 3. The voting members of the State Conference shall be State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regent or alternate, and the delegates or their alternates from the Chapters of the state, that are entitled to representation at the Continental Congress. The number of representatives from each Chapter shall be determined by the rules for representation of Chapters in the Continental Congress as given in the National Bylaws.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a Chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the Chapter, except in the case of the Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at an annual State Conference, shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any Chapter in the State of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference the privileges of the floor shall be accorded to the State Chairmen with the exception that they may not vote unless they are duly elected delegates or their alternates from their respective chapters.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen days notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Twenty-five voting members, representing not less than ten Chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

#### Article VIII STATE DUES AND CONFERENCE FEES # 1.83

Section 1. The annual dues of Chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be four dollars for each member of the Chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1. A minimum of at least 2 cents shall be used to cover all State per capita assessments, and the balance shall be allocated to the General State Dues Fund. No Chapter shall be entitled to representation at the annual State Conference until the State dues are paid.

Section 2. The Finance Committee, appointed by the State Regent, shall be composed of seven members, to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two Honorary State Regents, one active Chapter Regent, and one active Chapter member. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund.

Section 3. Each Chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State Dues, a Conference registration fee of \$3.00 for each voter to which the Chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Section 4. State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$3.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference fee at the time of registration.

# Article IX EXPENSES

\$ 2000

Section 1 One thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) shall be taken each year from the State Dues Fund, to be used by the State Regent in defraying her necessary travel expenses.

Section 2. Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent shall be paid by the State Treasurer from the State Dues Fund.

# Article X

# STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regents of the Chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the Fall, following the regular meeting of the National Board. It may meet whenever called by the State Regent.

Section 3. Ten members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management. Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference.

Section 5. State Chairmen, Vice Chairmen and Committee Members of National and Standing Committees shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privileges of the floor, but may not vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

## Article XI EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute an Executive Committee. The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, attends the meetings of the Executive Committee, but may not vote. This Committee performs such duties of the Board between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient. The Executive Committee shall meet the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three members of the Committee. It shall make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

## Article XII CHAPTERS

Section 1. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April. The Chapter Regent shall report the names of the elected officers promptly, on triplicate blanks provided by the State Regent for this purpose, to the Organizing Secretary General, to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary.

Section 2. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent for use in compiling her report, not less than fifteen days before the opening of the annual State Conference. The official Chapter report, not to exceed 250 words in length, for publication in the Proceedings shall be furnished the State Recording Secretary before the State Conference.

# Article XIII AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent and to the Parliamentarian. The State Regent shall send a copy to each Chapter, at least sixty days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

# Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law for the State Conference in matters not covered by the Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

# **State Conferences**

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S.B.C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21.) No conference was held in 1911; the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P.W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912"; amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta, "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, p. 211.)

#### **Bylaws**

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National and State Bylaws.

# **Change of Address**

Notice of change of address of members shall be sent to the Organizing Secretary General, Treasurer General, State Regent and State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

## Change of Name

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to State Registrar, Treasurer General and State Regent by the Chapter Treasurer.

## **Chapter Elections**

As soon as Chapter elections are held, names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, Administration Building, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20006, to the State Regent or State Regent-Elect and to the Recording Secretary by May 1st. The full Christian name of Chapter officers shall be given together with her husband's given name or initials, address, zip code and telephone number. A Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years. This is being added in order for our Bylaws to conform to the National Bylaws.

#### Dues

Pay to State Treasurer State Dues of \$4.00 per member before December 1. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the February 1 and two April Board meetings of the National Society. National Dues of \$13.00 per member sent to the Treasurer-General, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20006 before December 1, 1985.

# **Conference Registration Fee**

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer with the State dues on or before December 1, \$3.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws.

Rules for representation of chapters at Continental Congress:

"Chapters having less than 50 paid members on February 1 are entitled to be represented by the Regent or in her absence the Vice Regent or alternate; chapters having 50 to 199 paid members on February 1, one delegate in addition to the Regent; chapters having 200 to 299 paid members on February 1, two delegates in addition to the Regent, and for each additional 100 members one additional delegate." (Article XIII, Section 3-C, National Bylaws.)

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$3.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. (Article VIII, Section 4, of the State Bylaws.)

## Contributions

ALL contributions by Chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

# **Deceased Members**

Deaths shall be reported promptly to Treasurer General, State Chaplain and State Registrar by the Corresponding Chapter Officer. Complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and a date of death shall be furnished State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for Conference Memorial Service and "In Memoriam" pages for State Proceedings.

# Georgia Hospitality Fund

The following resolution which applies to the Georgia Hospitality Fund appears in the Proceedings for 1955:

"WHEREAS, The Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds an annual dinner in Washington during Continental Congress, which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society.

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$150.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes:

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this fund shall not be cumulative. Adopted."

# Procedure Book of Instructions for Officers and State Chairmen

The following resolution which applies to a Procedure Book of Instruction for Officers and State Chairmen appears in the Proceedings for 1959-60, Page 41.

"RESOLVED, That all Officers and State Chairmen keep a Procedure Book of Instructions and helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new Officer and Chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities thus providing a continuing continuity of DAR work, ADOPTED."

# **Genealogical Records**

To insure uniformity and convenience in binding, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper,  $8\frac{1}{2}$  by 11 inches, with  $1\frac{1}{2}$  to 2 inch margin on left side,  $1\frac{1}{2}$  inches at top and 1 inch on right side and at bottom. Four copies shall be sent to State Chairman of Genealogical Records.

## Information for Chapter Regents

1. All letters received by Chapter Regents relating to the work of the Society shall be distributed to the corresponding Chapter Chairman and brought to the attention of the members at a chapter meeting.

2. Please follow Resolution No. 11, adopted at 61st Georgia Society State Conference, as follows: "Resolved, That a closing date of February 1 be established for all reports, and all reports be given from February 1 to February 1, regardless of a change of regime or Regent." All awards will be made on this date basis.

## New Administration Reserve for Contingencies Fund

For the entire resolution setting up the "General New Regime Fund Balance of \$2500.00," found on pp. 203-204 of the 1979 Proceedings the following substitute resolution was adopted by the Board of Management: RESOLVED that at the end of each administration \$4000.00 be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies" fund, this money to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration, and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration. All other surplus monies in the General Fund, other than funds which are designated, are to be divided equally between the General Savings Account and the Meadow Garden Capital Investment Fund, as provided in the Capital Investment Fund Resolution passed in 1979 (pp. 62-63, 1979 Proceedings). This transaction is to be handled by April 30 every two years before the auditors close out the books of an administration, thus making the General Fund show the same balance of \$4,000.00 at the beginning of each new administration. (This fund is to be known as "New Administration Reserve for Contingencies Fund.") Adopted.

## Nominations

The following resolution which applies to the announcement of the candidacy for State Regent appears in the Proceedings of the Twentieth State Conference, 1918:

"Resolved, that it is the judgment of the Executive Board that announcements for State Regent should not be made . . . earlier than three months prior to the meeting of the conference and they shall be furnished to the Press for publication."

## **Reports for Proceedings**

Reports for Proceedings shall be as concise as possible not to exceed 250 words typewritten (DOUBLE SPACED) upon one side of three-hole punched, unruled paper,  $8\frac{1}{2}$  x 11 inches, and shall be sent to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary, the ORIGINAL being sent to the State Recording Secretary for the Proceedings, Chapter Regents' Reports by February 1, State Officers and State Chairmen's Reports are due on or before February 15.

A standard HEADING of ALL reports must conform to the Headings found in the Proceedings and must start at least 1½ inches from top of sheet of paper. Leave 1 inch between bottom of Headings and start of report. LEFT MARGIN of report must be 1 inch minimum. Please check previous Proceedings for correct heading. Entire report should consist of one paragraph. Winners of awards of State Officers and State Chairmen shall be listed on a SEPARATE sheet of paper. State Officers and State Chairmen send to the State Recording Secretary and the State Regent, the awards to be given next year on a SEPARATE sheet of paper — exactly as it is to be printed in the Proceedings.

#### Date for Annual Audit

WHEREAS, every effort must be made to have all material to the printer as early as possible to facilitate delivery of the Proceedings to the members,

RESOLVED: That the end of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR fiscal year for audit purposes be changed from May 31st to April 30th.

#### Absolute Deadline for Proceedings Material

WHEREAS, a definite deadline must be established and adhered to for all reports and material to be in the hands of the Proceedings Committee in order to be delivered to the Printer by June 1st.

RESOLVED: That all FINAL reports and materials must be received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1st with the exception of the Auditor's report and any information sent out by the National DAR Headquarters. This does not alter the requirement in the "Items of Information" in the Proceedings that all reports shall be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary on or before February 15th, the ORIGINAL being sent to the Secretary for the Proceedings.

AND FURTHER RESOLVED: This policy will be strictly adhered to and the material not received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1st will be omitted from the Proceedings.

## Reaffirmation

RESOLVED: That the Georgia State Society reaffirm the following Resolution adopted at the Fall Board of Management in Albany, October 23, 1981, which reads as follows: "Presentation of Awards" WHEREAS, all awards are given by State Officers and State Chairmen; and, WHEREAS, February 1st is the closing date of all work for said awards; BE IT RESOLVED: That no State Officer nor State Chairman may present her report or award(s) at State Conference unless said report, with list of award(s) is in the hands of the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary at least ten (10) days before State Conference.

## Resolutions

Resolutions to be considered by the Committee shall be typed, with a heading giving subject of the resolution, signed, and sent to the Chairman of the Resolutions Committee two weeks before the date of the State Conference.

# **Gold Honor Roll Stars**

## GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION Mrs. R. Clough Carter, Senior State President 1984 - 1985

The Georgia State Society, C.A.R. members and seniors have had a very active year and have accomplished many worthwhile goals. Miss Karen Frances Youngner was the member President. The State Project was: "Membership, the continued support of Meadow Garden, and the contribution of funds to Georgia's Coastal Museum for the purchase of an Historical Marker." The State President's theme was: "C.A.R.: A Footprint of the Past is a Step Toward the Future."

Georgia Society, C.A.R., has 18 organized societies. Sixteen of these are considered active. Total number of members registered and having dues paid in the state of Georgia is approximately 450.

The State Project was finalized at State Conference which was held in Albany, Georgia — with the Thronateeska Society as host society. Members and senior leaders contributed their time and efforts toward the continued support of Meadow Garden and a total of \$83.25 was given for the purpose of the painting project which the DAR is undertaking. We were proud to have one of our members made a Patron of Meadow Garden by a contribution given in her honor by her parents. The member is Miss Jane Rowell, President-Elect of the Georgia Society, C.A.R., for the year of 1985-1986.

A project of the State President, Karen Youngner, was the contribution of funds to the Coastal Museum at St. Simons Island in order to mark the Grist Stones. A total of \$150.25 was raised for this purpose. Fort Frederica Society contributed the largest amount for this project since this was Karen's home society. They gave \$100.00 for this cause.

Georgia C.A.R. members and seniors contributed generously toward all National Projects. They contributed to the C.A.R. Museum; sent money, clothing, trading stamps, soup labels, and even some household items to the Mountain Schools for re-sale in their thrift shops. The National Project, which the National President, Sam Huddleston, II, chose was: "Contribution of funds to the Statue of Liberty, Ellis Island Fund." Georgia C.A.R. members responded to this in a grand manner by raising and contributing a sum of \$899.82.

Georgia Society, C.A.R., had 2 members transfer into DAR. Three became Dual Members of C.A.R. and DAR. We have 56 National Promoters, 140 State Promoters and 233 State Patriots. Thirteen Endowment Fund pins were presented, 3/300-plus pins were presented, 3 Life Promoter certificates were given and 1 Major Benefactor was given. We are very appreciative for the support the Georgia Daughters of the American Revolution have shown by becoming State Promoters, National Promoters and State Patriots. Other contributions made to national projects by the Georgia C.A.R. were: to the Book Binding Fund, Magazine Sustaining Fund, Equipment and Maintenance.

The Thirty-fourth Annual Southeastern Regional Meeting was held July 13 and 14 at the Holiday Inn on Georgia's beautiful Jekyll Island. Georgia was the host state with Brunswick and Winona Societies serving as the host societies. In attendance were 171 members, seniors and guests representing the five states of the Southeast Region. Georgia had the largest delegation with 73, representing ten societies. Stacey Morgan of the Gwinnett Society was chosen by the National Officers present, as the recipient of the Regional Enthusiast Award.

The 1984 Georgia State Workshop was held August 3 and 4 in Perry, Georgia, with the Commodore Perry Society serving as host. In attendance were 67 members, seniors

and guests with 13 societies represented. The programs and contest for the year were presented in most interesting ways. A contest was held and prizes were given by the State President and Senior State President for the best presentations. The panel of three judges had a very hard chore in deciding the 3 winners. After much deliberation the final choices were: Elizabeth Pohland won 1st prize, Beth Sanders won 2nd and Raymond Johnson won 3rd.

The week following the C.A.R. workshop was a busy time for several senior leaders of C.A.R. as 8 of us are State DAR Chairmen in various capacities. Beginning on Tuesday the DAR Workshops were held in Waycross, Warner Robins, Griffin and Oxford. The Senior State President invited the State President to go along on the tour and help present the needs and work of the C.A.R. during the workshop sessions. Mrs. Youngner accompanied her daughter on the tour.

The State President and the Senior State President attended the DAR Meadow Garden festivities in Augusta, Ga. At this time the officers of the Meadow Garden Society were installed for the year of 1984-1985. The Georgia State Society, C.A.R., set up a booth at the festival at which Christmas ornaments and decorations that had been made and donated by several societies were sold. There were six societies represented that day and C.A.R. members helped not only at their own booth, but loaned their services to various DAR booths.

The annual Government Studies Seminar was held Saturday, October 27, at Middle Georgia College in Cochran. There were 73 members, seniors and guests in attendance. Eleven societies were represented. The Uchee Trail Society was the host society. Ms. Kathy Weaver, U. S. Supervisory Immigration Examiner, was the luncheon speaker. She spoke on the process of immigration and naturalization.

The traditional "Trip to Tamassee" was not held this year. However, representatives from four societies got together and traveled by van to visit the school. These societies were Winona, Brunswick, Commodore Perry and Allen Howard. Those making the trip were privileged to visit the teachers and children at the new Pre-School Development Center at Tamassee. MANY boxes of clothing and other items for the Thrift Shop were carried along with gifts to be used for the children at the school when they have birthdays during the year.

Another milestone in the history of Georgia Society, C.A.R., occurred when the Governor Josiah Tattnall Society held their organizational meeting on December 15, 1984 at the Glennville Public Library in Glennville, Ga. The Senior State President had the honor of conducting the Installation Service and presented a United States Flag to the new president of the new society for their use at future meetings. Miss Margueritte Daniel was installed as the first president of Governor Josiah Tattnall Society.

On March 1, 2, and 3, the 46th annual State Conference was held at Albany, Ga. Total registration was 120 with 15 societies represented. There were eighteen guests present and two out-of-state visitors. Member and Senior Board of Managements were held. At the General Business Meeting on Saturday morning, reports from all societies, state officers and state chairmen were heard. A candidate's party was held on Friday night after which each candidate running for office had a chance to speak. On Saturday voting took place and new officers were elected for the year. A luncheon was held on Saturday and we were privileged to have Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar, Honorary Regent of the Georgia Society, NSDAR, as the featured speaker. Mrs. Gordon W. Kilgore, Georgia Society, DAR State Registrar, brought greetings from the Georgia Society DAR. An awards banquet was held at the State Conference and trophies, certificate awards and cash prizes were awarded to societies.

Four issues of the C.A.R. news-sheet, the CARgoes, were printed. We also published an annual State Yearbook which was placed in the information packet distributed at State Workshop. Georgia State C.A.R. gained 45 new members this year, but some were lost by "ageing out" or resignation.

Twenty-one members and seniors representing seven Georgia societies, traveled by plane and car to the ninetieth Annual Convention of the N.S.C.A.R., April 19-21, 1985. Georgia State Society won the Publications Award for the State society with the best

news sheet. Georgia Society also won the award for Endowment Fund by being the State society contributing the greatest amount. Fort Frederica Society won 1st place for the local society (36 members or more) contributing the greatest amount to the Endowment Fund. Winona Society won 1st place for the local society with membership of 36 and over showing the most originality and thoroughness in the presentation of the program for the year. Winona Society also won 2nd place for the local society with the most originality and thoroughness in the presentation of the program. Karen Youngner won the Gold Award for State President's Guidelines. Allen Howard, Fort Frederica, Meadow Garden and Winona Societies won the Gold Award for National Merit Award. Commodore Perry Society won the Blue Award for National Merit Award.

At National Convention, Stacey Morgan of Gwinnett Society served as page to the National Recording Secretary and also served as a page at the Installation of Officers on Sunday. Raymond Johnson of the Allen Howard Society was the Color Bearer for the Georgia State Flag.

The Annual Installation of Officers was held at Mount Vernon, home of George and Martha Washington. Miss Jana Lynn Rowell of Winona Society, Waycross, was installed as State President of the Georgia Society, C.A.R., at this impressive ceremony on the banks of the Potomac River. Mrs. R. Clough Carter was installed for a second term as Senior State President of Georgia. Miss Polly Malone Kitchens was installed as National Vice President from the Southeastern Region.

It is such a pleasure and I deem it a real privilege to work with the young people of this state in the National Society, Children of the American Revolution. Our hearts swell with pride as we see them step forward as they age-out of C.A.R. and join the ranks of the Daughters and Sons of the American Revolution. We, the senior leaders, feel that our young people will be better equipped for their future as citizens of this great nation by having been a part of this patriotic and historical organization.
