

Mrs. Hankinson reported the Schools had a good year with an increase in donations; the Talmadge Auditorium/Gym looks good; 48 Tamassee Cookbooks sold; and both Schools will present programs at the DAR School Supper at Continental Congress.

Mrs. Ward informed the Board 190 Georgia Daughters, including 2 past State Officers, would be memorialized at the Memorial Service at St. Paul's Episcopal Church at 2:30 p.m.

Mrs. Hanf reported the 1988 Proceedings was being compiled.

Mrs. Elliott stated the State Conference Program was ready; notes had been sent when requested; and read a note from Mrs. Moody C. Summers, Jr., Registrar, who was unable to attend due to illness of her husband.

The Chaplain General still requests notification of members' 90th birthdays. The National Society would like to see all states have a Lineage Workshop. RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED NINETIETH STATE CONFERENCE MARCH 12, 1988 - AUGUSTA, GEORGIA FEDERAL DAY CARE

WHEREAS: the family is the most important unit of our society and the foundation of this Nation; and

WHEREAS: attempts are being made to undermind the American family by establishing a Federal Day Care Program under which ALL day care would be licensed and supervised by the federal government; and

WHEREAS: under this law as proposed in Senate Bill #1885, all day care would be compelled to be non-religious in order to be certified; and

WHEREAS: such a program is foreign to the traditions of this Country and destructive of the family as we know it;

RESOLVED: that members of the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, as individuals, express strong opposition to any Federal Day Care bill and let it be known by contacting their Senators and Representatives in Congress.

VOLUNTEER PROTECTION ACT

STATE ORGANIZING SECRETARY - Mrs. Sam H. Black

The State Organizing Secretary attended four District Workshops, Fall Board of Management Meeting, State Conference and Executive Board Meetings. At State Conference a poster of the state of Georgia with the location of all the chapters was displayed. The work of this officer is to promote the growth of the State Society through the organization of new chapters and the conservation of existing chapters. Letters of encouragement offering the assistance of State Officers were sent to chapters that were having difficulties functioning. The number of chapters in Georgia now stands at 109. It has been a privilege and pleasure to serve the State Society in this office for the past two years under the capable leadership of our State Regent.

REGISTRAR - Mrs. Moody C. Summers, Jr.

The State Registrar has kept the membership files current for the Georgia State Society according to the printouts received from the Office of the Registrar General after each National Board Meeting. As of February 27, 1987, National shows Georgia having 8181 members; 265 new members by application, 28 by re-instatement, 23 by transfer into the state. Georgia lost 191 members by death, 139 by resignation, 15 by transfer out of state, 66 were dropped by the National Society. These figures show a net loss of 118 members making a total of 8063. This officer is grateful for the loyal service of the Chapter Registrars and their kind consideration of her office. It is an honor to have been a part of the administration of our very capable State Regent.

STATE HISTORIAN - Mrs. Robert G. Fountain

The State Historian attended all 4 District Workshops, Fall Board of Management, State Conference, all Executive Committee meetings, participated in the Independence Day ceremony at monument of Button Gwinnett and gave 4 slide programs on the NSDAR Period Rooms. Letter of Instruction with Questionnaire and Marker File Forms mailed to District Directors. 92 Chapters reported. \$87 reported contributed to AMERICANA COLLECTION. Chapters had 214 Historical programs for adults, 51 for children; 70 anniversaries of famous people celebrated; 50 special events. All Chapters participated in the Bicentennial of the Constitution observance. 37 Historical tours for adults, 5 for children. Graves Marked: Rev. Soldier Robert Loughridge by Robert Loughridge Chapter. Permission has been received by John Floyd Chapter to mark grave of Rev. Soldier Levi Sapp. 2 Historical Markers placed by John Laurens Chapter. Capt. Edward Hagin Chapter placed bronze HONOR ROLL Plaque. Colonel William Few Chapter cataloguing all cemetery graves in County, 2 books of catalogued records placed in local library. 55 DAR Member Markers placed. 11 Chapters reported honoring an Outstanding Teacher of American History. 9 Chapters - Atlanta, Augustin Clayton, Brier Creek, Fort Peachtree, Hightower Trail, John Clarke, John Laurens, Oothcaloga, and Thomasville — sent nominations for 1987-1988 Outstanding Teacher of American History. From resumes, committee of judges selected Vivian Beasley (Mrs. Jim), Outstanding Teacher of American History. Her resume was submitted by the John Clarke Chapter. 10 copies of the History of the Georgia State Society sold. 167 books remain in possession of the Historian. All money received for books has been given to Georgia State Society Treasurer. It has been a pleasure serving the Georgia State Society this year as Historian under the leadership of our State Regent, Mrs. James J. Leitch.

STATE LIBRARIAN - Mrs. Buxton L. Daniel

Reports were received from 94 of Georgia's 109 chapters. Five chapters had programs on the NSDAR Library. Chapters sent through the State Treasurer to the NSDAR Library: \$479.60 for the Library Rebinding Fund; \$50.00 to the Book Purchase Fund; and, \$320.00 for the Reclassification Fund. Chapters donated \$383.05 to the State Library Fund. Chapters donated \$12,074.86 in gifts of historical quarterlies, books, pamphlets, microfilm, bookcases, and cash to state and local libraries. Chapters gave \$301.00 in gifts to the Georgia Department of Archives and History. Chapter members volunteered 3,673 hours to work at state and local libraries. Indexing projects continue at the Georgia Archives and History, at the Washington Memorial Library, and at local libraries. Chapter members spent 1,260 hours indexing genealogical reference material. To have the privilege of serving the Georgia State Society as State Librarian under the inspiring leadership of Mrs. James J. Leitch has been a most gratifying and challenging experience.

The Curator serves as Chairman of Conference Seating and Processional and Vice-Chairman of Protocol. This Officer attended Continental Congress, Four District Workshops, Fall Board of Management Meeting and State Conference. It has been an honor and a privilege serving the Georgia State Society and our most capable and gracious State Regent.

National Committee Reports

AMERICAN HERITAGE, Mrs. James Forsyth

"Preserve the Constitution, Its Meaning, Its Freedoms, and Its Reflections in Our Arts and Culture," has been the theme for American Heritage for 1987-88. Special emphasis has been placed on the period in history when the Constitution of the United States was written. The greatness of our country's heritage in literature, art, music, poetry, drama and crafts was reported as interesting programs and projects from 84 chapters. A total of 146 programs were reported of which 16 were in art, 27 in crafts, 16 in literature, poetry or drama, 39 in music and 45 combined with other committees. Historic preservation projects were reported by 22 chapters. Three chapters sent a slide to the National Historic Preservation slide show. Four Georgia Daughters entered National American Heritage contests. This chairman appreciates the outstanding work done by all chapters in the area of American Heritage. Georgia State Society cookbooks have been sold at all meetings this year. As of February 7, 30 cookbooks remain to be sold. These will be on sale at State Conference. Madame Regent, it has been a pleasure to serve as chairman of this committee.

AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH, Mrs. Spencer W. Closson

ESSAY CONTEST: 61 Chapters participating, 206 schools in Georgia participating, 22 of these schools were participating for the first time, 4,428 Contestants. STATE ES-SAY WINNERS: 5th grade - Jennifer Flores Estaris of Riverdale sponsored by Captain Thomas Cobb Chapter. 6th grade - Andrea Caroline Walker of Hartwell sponsored by John Benson Chapter. 7th grade - Gretchen Leigh Cearley of Cumming sponsored by Fort Peachtree Chapter. 8th grade - Margaret Fulton Holman of Blakely sponsored by Peter Early Chapter. CHAPTER ACTIVITIES: 60 Chapters had American History Month displays. 37 Awards were presented to students with excellence in American History not including essay awards. SPOT ANNOUNCEMENTS: 59 Chapters used spot announcements on the Radio and 11 Chapters used them on TV. PUBLICITY: 8 members appeared on the radio and 6 members appeared on TV for this committee. There were 2,340 inches of newspaper and magazine coverage and 138 pictures. PROCLA-MATIONS: Governor Joe Frank Harris signed a State Proclamation on January 25, 1988. 49 Mayors and Commissioners signed local Proclamations. SOUTHEASERN NA-TIONAL DIVISION WINNER: Margaret Fulton Holman, 8th Grade, Blakely.

AMERICAN INDIANS, Mrs. Dares E. Wirt

Eighty-one of our Georgia Chapters gave a total cash donation of \$1,355. Five hundred and four dollars for the General American Indian Scholarships. To Bacone College: \$70 for National Project, \$167 to General Fund, \$475 for Bacone Scholarships, \$6 to the Christmas Fund. Fifty-six boxes were sent to the Thrift Store with an estimated value of over \$3,000. Several Chapters had "showers" for this project with contributions of most needed items. One thousand six hundred fifty Campbell product labels were mailed. \$122 was sent for St. Mary's School. Several books were placed in Georgia libraries and the DAR Special Library Collection. Awards: Chapter with over 100 members for per capita contributions, First place; Brunswick Chapter. Honorable mention; Fort Peachtree and Joseph Habersham. Chapter with under 100 members, First place: Button Gwinnett, giving over \$1 per member. Honorable mention to Commodore Oliver Bowen and Tallassee. Forty-two programs were presented on topics concerning the Indian culture of Georgia, with speakers who are Cherokee and Creek Indians, members of college faculties, DAR members. For Best Program fully reported; First place, a tie, with awards to Roswell King and Martha Stewart Bulloch. Second place to Matthew Talbot. Honorable Mention to Stephen Heard and Tallassee. A special award to Abraham Baldwin for management of fund raising for reconstruction of a log house, very like the home of Creek Indian Chief, William McIntosh at McIntosh Park, Carroll County, Ga.

AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP, Mrs. Raiferd L. Drew We did a little better this year with 82 chapters reporting (almost 75%). Of these, 75 recited the American's Creed most of the time (some always); 62 recited the Preamble to the Constitution; 28 had Americanism programs and 22 members presented such programs to other groups. The Bicentennial of the Constitution was celebrated by 82 programs at which 635 copies of the Constitution were distributed. Fifteen chapters participated in Naturalization Ceremonies giving 583 flags; 499 Flag codes; 163 flag pins; 1,033 welcome cards; 552 American's Creed Cards and 2,675 pieces of patriotic literature. Fort Peachtree Chapter again presented a rose (national flower) to each new citizen and family at the September Naturalization Court as well as submitting a human interest story to a newspaper. Several chapters took part in city-wide Constitution Day celebrations. Twenty-eight chapters ordered a total of 2,337 Manuals for Citizenship. These were given to regional and school libraries; classes in elementary and high school; civics and language teachers; Army and Navy Bases for foreign military students; lawyers; immigrants; chapters for study and to DAR members for personal use. Nineteen members volunteered over 1,718 hours to help reduce illiteracy and to teach new citizens how to adjust to life in the United States. Lachlan McIntosh Chapter presented the Medal of Honor to outstanding citizen, Thomas Francis Coffey, Jr. and Joseph Habersham presented one to Judge Jeptha Tanksley. It's interesting to learn of the enthusiasm and ingenuity of DAR members in promoting Americanism.

CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION, Miss Frances Hall

Facts from reports were: 21 chapters sponsor a C.A.R. society; 34 new members; 51 are National Promoters; and 1 new Society — Earl of Camdem — confirmed in 1988. Contributions to local, state and national C.A.R. came to a total of \$1,289.00. A C.A.R. detailed report can be found under Georgia State Society, Children of the American Revolution.

CONSERVATION, Mrs. D. Price Eubanks, Jr.

Again, it is with pride that I give this report. Georgia Daughters have enthusiastically cooperated in various Conservation projects by participating in reforestration, recycling programs, beautification, bicentennial gardens, various ceremonies, Arbor Day celebrations, and obtaining publicity in newspapers and radio announcements. Impressive totals were reported: 1,878, 732 Pine trees planted; 2,837 Dogwood trees; 3,559 other trees, 22,618 pounds of birdseed; 14,257 bulbs planted; "many bags" plus 4,038 pounds of aluminum cans and 71, 824 pounds of paper collected for recycling. Many chapters had special projects: John Floyd Chapter participated in the "Georgia Take Pride In America" project; Fielding Lewis sold seed wreaths; John Franklin Wren maintains the Wren Memorial Cemetery; Fort Frederica's project is beautifying St. Simons Island. Fire Prevention contests were sponsored. Georgia Daughters can be proud of their Conservation endeavors and should strive to get all of their work and activities reported. 89 Chapters reported. There were two entrants in the Water Conservation Stamp contest. Let us be persistent in making Georgia beautiful and preserving our natural resources.

CONSTITUTION WEEK, Mrs. Charles H. Hickman

Georgia is Number One in the Fifty States! Georgia won first place in the National Judging of Constitution Week. The general format of the Bicentennial Celebration across Georgia during Constitution Week was pattern of parades, bell ringing, balloon launching, dramas and speakers on the courthouse square of most of the towns and cities of Georgia. Essay contest and poster contests were conducted in schools. Many schools had other activities such as heritage fairs, special assemblies and costume days. On September 16, ABC's "Good Morning America" filmed Constitution Celebration activities at Bethesda Elementary School in Gwinnett County. Lady Huntingdon Chapter, Oxford, Georgia, sponsored a day long symposium, planned and produced by Dr. Randall Lynn, State DAR History Teacher of the Year 1986-1987. Dr. Lynn planned and produced a day-long seminar on September 17, at the local high school. Various Newscasters, State, National and Local Political Leaders and Ambassadors were invited to participate as speakers. The entire high school student body spent their day rotating from speaker to speaker, thus being exposed to many facets of thought and most of the rights guaranteed us by our Constitution. The day's events were picked up by the state's major television stations. Georgia DAR Chapters utilized the resources of the State and National Bicentennial Commissions, combined with their own vigor and ingenuity, to implement a celebration of Constitution Week that Georgia has never known before.

DAR GOOD CITIZENS, Mrs. W. H. Odum

Reports were received from 88 chapters with 81 chapters participating. Two hundred and six Good Citizen pins were awarded and 1,649 inches of publicity were reported. District winners were Betty Jean Beck, NW District, Baron DeKalb Chapter; Geoffrey Dillard, NE District, Tomochichi Chapter; Caroline Wight, SW District, Thomasville Chapter; and Joseph Cowart, SE District, Adam Brinson Chapter. The District winners received \$25.00 from the State Society and the State winner, Betty Jean Beck will receive \$100.00 and the State Citizen pin. Her entry was sent to the National Southeastern Division for judging. Sincere appreciation to the District Vice Chairmen, Mrs. S. Jay Smith, NW District, Joseph Habersham Chapter; Mrs. Ernest L. Boggus, NE District, Toccoa Chapter; Mrs. Rosalyn M. Phillips, SW District, Thomasville Chapter and Mrs. Henry Davis, SE District, Vidalia Chapter. Thank you, Madam State Regent, for the honor and pleasure of serving you and the State Society in this capacity.

DAR MAGAZINE, Mrs. Alex S. Boyer, Jr.

Questionnaires included in the Regents packets during summer workshops were returned by 82 chapters. The main complaint is the magazine's failure to arrive in time for the President General's message to be read at the proper meeting. Some chapters believe the increase in cost caused cancellations; others think the price comparable to that of other periodicals. A few members are of the opinion that the percentage of ads is too high in proportion to the number of articles. National Defense discussions are popular and chapters are interested in much more genealogical information and articles to assist program planners.

DAR MAGAZINE ADVERTISING, Mrs. James L. Quackenbush

This committee had an exceptional year. Honor Roll requirements were met by 93 chapters. One hundred percent participation was reached. Revenue from Georgia totaled \$6,050.00. Co-op ads of 5¼ pages were placed in the magazine for our State Society. Included were full pages honoring Abraham Baldwin and William Few; Mrs. Edward M. Tracy, Jr., Outstanding Junior; Mrs. James J. Leitch, State Regent and Conference Pages; Junior Members and the C.A.R. Societies; the District Directors. A ¼ page paid tribute to Members of the Georgia Commission on the Bicentennial of the United States Constitution. The chapter contributing the most revenue was Commodore Richard Dale. Fort Peachtree and LaGrange tied for second place.

DAR MUSEUM, Mrs. Hugh Peterson, Sr.

The State Chairman of the DAR Museum received reports from 99 chapters. The contributions of money were: Cataloging, \$37.00; General Fund, \$717.60; Georgia Period and State Room, \$650.75. A Queen's Ware mug has been added to the "Long Room", Peter Tondee's Tavern, Savannah, 1776, Georgia Room, DAR Museum. Twelve copies of the book IN THE ARTS were reported as being in the chapters. Pictures of a desk were sent to the curator for approval for the Georgia Room; however, the desk was not approved. The State Chairman thanks the Georgia members for their generosity and interest in the DAR Museum.

DAR SCHOLARSHIP, Mrs. Rod E. Scott

From the 100 chapters reporting to the scholarship chairmen \$264.60 was given to the American History Scholarship Fund, \$182.00 to the Occupational Therapy Fund. The Caroline E. Holt Scholarship Fund received \$118.50. Nine chapters in the state support local scholarships. Five chapters reported special funds given to Berry College. Only 44 chapters reported they made the scholarship information available to the local high schools by the opening of these schools in the fall. There were no entries for the American History Scholarship this year. Loan funds are available at four Georgia schools and the university.

DAR SCHOOL, Mrs. Donald D. Hankinson

Annual reports were received from 103 chapters. Forty-four received the Hightower Award with Fort Peachtree, Nathaniel Macon honored for largest per capita contributions. Twenty-two chapters collected 11,926 soup labels, seven sent 41½ books of stamps while thirty-one collected 13,271 lbs. of clothing. Sixty-seven chapters reported having

a full program on schools with the state chairman giving six. Members from five chapters visited Tamassee, members from four KDS. According to records of State Treasurer, donations totaling \$17,814.25 were sent to DAR Schools. Tamassee received \$10,699.21, KDS \$3,980.96, Berry \$717.08, Crossnore \$1,406, Hillside, \$496.00 and Hindman, \$515.00. Special gifts and projects for Tamassee included: \$3,000 given for Bell Maintenance Fund: \$1,000 for asbestos removal: pair of handmade dolls (valued at over \$600) donated to school for fund raising at Continental Congress, picnic held at Stone Mountain for ten students; money, clothing and toys sent for Christmas along with refurbishing of interior of Talmadge Auditorium and sale of 48 cookbooks by the State Society. Other projects included \$500 given for scholarship at Crossnore, four members from two chapters becoming Friends of the Schools and 4,117 lbs. yarn (valued at \$14,600) donated to Crossnore. Gratitude is expressed by the Georgia State Society, NSDAR to Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Hightower, Jr. for their continuing support of the Hightower Award, an outstanding tribute to the memory of his parents. Sincere appreciation is expressed by this chairman to all who have offered their friendship, hospitality, advice and assistance during these past two years.

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERAN-PATIENTS, Mrs. Heyward Vann

My thanks to all the Georgia DAR members for loving, sharing, and caring for our Veteran-Patients. Eighty Chapters reported. We spent a total of 6,350 hours and a value of \$8,574.68 serving the Veteran-Patients in all facilities this year. These include the VA Medical Centers, Military Hospitals, Private Hospitals, Nursing Homes and Private Homes. This service was accomplished through hours of hospital work, parties for patients, gifts of homemade articles such as lap robes, socks, wheel chair covers, bibs, etc. Eleven hundred eighty-one personal visits were made. We gave 5,840 gifts of an assortment of personal items, and many recreational games, books, magazines, baskets of food and flowers and canteen coupons patients could use to purchase necessities. Chapter public relations consists of talks, news stories and one Braille flag given and 19 Patriotic Days celebrated. All year may we continue our kindness and compassion for our Veteran-Patients.

FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, Mrs. A. Lawrence Liles It is with heartfelt gratitude of this Chairman to have received reports from 95 of our 109 chpaters with news that the chapters have informed, educated and displayed our Flag. The Flag is flying over our State of Georgia. Efforts on behalf of the chapters have had the opening of every meeting with Pledge of Allegiance given 880 times during the past year. There have been 187 large, 576 small and 3,105 miniature flags given to schools, libraries, Scout groups, DAR members, cities and institutions. Flag Codes were distributed to: 942 members, 1,938 schools and youth groups. Twenty-two corrections of the display of our Flag were made. Sixty-three Flag pins were sold, 6 presented as awards and 167 lapel pins were either sold or given as gifts. Georgia chapters urged members to display their flags on holidays with 75% reporting participation. One chapter taught classes on the Flag Code. Children's Flag codes were given to 652 C.A.R. members, schools, libraries and Scout Groups. Four churches and 52 schools were presented copies of the Pledge for the deaf. Three Braille flags were given; one to a school, two to libraries. Members presented 37 books to schools, 14 to libraries and 300 Flag booklets to schools. Thirty-one programs and 14 partial programs were given to chapters. This Chairman presented programs to three organizations as well as to two chapters. Among the outstanding events pertaining to the Flag were: A Flag festival; street displays; marking graves on Memorial Day for Veterans of all wars in the cemetery; participation in Constitution Week ceremonies and Flag Day exercises; talks on Flag etiquette; radio and TV spot announcements; and your State Chairman led the parade for Veterans Day in Waycross. Our Symbol of Freedom has made impact on the Skyline and Countryside of Georgia through efforts of the DAR chapters. Madam State Regent, these two years of serving you and the Georgia State Society have been my pleasure.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS, Mrs. Everett E. Porter, Jr.

Reports were received from all 109 chapters. Twenty-five chapters contributed 2,790 pages of original source records and indexes to be sent to the DAR Library for Honor Roll requirement #10c. Four hundred seventy-nine dollars was contributed to the National Genealogical Records Binding Fund by 91 chapters for Honor Roll requirement #10d. Four thousand seven hundred thirty-seven pages of new records (8 books each) were placed in the Georgia State Archives, Atlanta; the Washington Memorial Library, Macon; and the Georgia Historical Society Library, Savannah. Twelve thousand five hundred forty-seven pages of duplicate material were placed in 53 other libraries. Work is underway to index the unindexed volumes of previously submitted volumes of genealogical records housed at the Georgia Archives. Fifty-one volumes have been indexed, and 4,732 pages of index have been delivered to the Georgia Archives to be bound with the volumes to which they apply. Eighteen Bookworm Pins and 4 Bookworm Bars have been earned and ordered. Five other volunteers earned pins, but do not wish to purchase them. This Chairman has photocopied and submitted 6,266 pages of Bible and Misc. Records contained in 25 early volumes of the Georgia Genealogical Records Collection, which were not found in the DAR Library. This Chairman is also working to catalog the entire collection and to coordinate it with the Georgia Collection at the DAR Library. A record of all source material submitted is on file for quick reference as required by the National Society, NSDAR. Thanks to all Regents and Chairmen who helped this committee to have 100% reporting.

JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS, Mrs. Rena S. Morgan

Thirty-nine Chapters united in the struggle for survival of Junior American Citizens this year. These Daughters sponsored 9,220 JAC members in 52 clubs, 36 of them newly formed. Chapters also contributed \$195.60 to the National JAC Prize Fund, and generated 114 inches of publicity about the committee's activities. The National Theme Contest benefitted from Georgia's participation with 354 entrants. Thirty-four State winners, representing every Contest category, were entered in the Division competition. Certificates and cash awards totaling \$33 are awaiting six Chapters. The Chapter exhibiting the most outstanding effort toward JAC survival has worked for over $2\frac{1}{2}$ years to establish JAC in their area. They sponsor not the most JAC members, nor the most clubs. They do exemplify, however, that in providing for the patriotic education of our youth, it's more often quality, not necessarily quantity, which is a crowning achievement. Please join me in congratulating Oothcaloga Chapter for their outstanding JAC work! My tenure as State JAC Chair comes to a close with this report. My deepest thanks to each Georgia Daughter whose efforts and encouragement aided this most important area of DAR work and this Chairman. While our strides were long, I regret only that we have not achieved our fullest potential. Madame State Regent, it has been my privilege to be of service to you and to Georgia's Daughters; I hope to remain so as may be your further pleasure.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP, Miss Elizabeth Stone

Georgia Junior members have had a busy and productive year. Junior members hold various jobs at various levels — 1 National Vice Chairman, 6 State Chairmen, 1 State Vice Chairman, 6 Chapter Regent, 24 Chapter Officers, and 85 Chapter Chairman. Throughout the State, Junior members have been involved in special chapter and State projects. On the chapter level, Junior members sold American Flags and had booths in town festivals to help raise money for various projects. During the Bicentennial of the Constitution of the United States, Junior members had programs on the Constitution, a community wide worship service, a reception and participated in a Signer's Breakfast. Christmas "goodie bags" were given as gifts from Juniors in one chapter. On the State level, several projects have been underway. To help raise money for the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund, voices were sold on a counted cross-stitched map of the State of Georgia and on the Preamble to the United States Constitution. With profits from the Junior Bazaar, special projects and the sales of DAR stationary, contributions to the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund total \$2,095.50. It has been a great honor for me to serve the State Regent as Junior Membership Chairman.

LINEAGE RESEARCH, Mrs. John H. Singleton

Objectives, procedures and reporting were discussed at the four summer workshops. Eighty-seven chapter reports have been received by this Chairman. Only seven programs on Lineage Research were presented in the DAR chapters. This Chairman received eight requests for assistance in lineage research from Georgia residents and two requests from residents of other states. This Chairman attended all four Workshops, the Fall Board of Management and the State Conference. It has been a pleasure to work with all of the Lineage Research Chairmen.

MEMBERSHIP, Mrs. Robert A. Gibeling

The Georgia State Society has tried hard to promote the National Membership theme "Membership Power — DAR Strength". The winner of the National essay contest is the Baron DeKalb Chapter. Joseph Habersham Chapter is the State Conference Award winner. Eighty-seven out of 109 Chapters sent in reports. Thirty-one Chapters had 1 or more new Junior members. Thirty-one Chapters had at least 4 new members. The total number of new members reported to me was 428. Seventy-five were Juniors. This Chairman has attended all 4 Workshops, Fall Board of Management and State Conference. It has been a pleasure to work with our lovely State Regent, Officers and Chapter Members.

MOTION PICTURE, RADIO AND TELEVISION, Mrs. William C. Lord This committee had 69 chapters reporting and 49 not reporting. The best movie for family was Three Men and a Baby and it also won for adult viewing. Bill Cosby was chosen best for family TV viewing and Murder She Wrote for adult TV viewing. The worst TV programs were all soap operas, nighttime and daytime. The movie Raw and Fatal Attraction tied for worst films. Twenty-five persons appeared on TV for a total of 235 minutes. One person was on radio and 194 minutes of time were sponsored. Seven chapters worked with video equipment. There is no state category for contributions to the NSDAR "Videotape Library". Seven chapters sponsored films for special groups. Seventy-two people mailed 146 letters for approval or disapproval of radio or television station, newspaper or advertiser. Six people are on a motion picture council. No chapter made and contributed a tape to the NSDAR Videotape Library. No chapter presented an award for video programming. First place award went to Joseph Habersham Chapter. Second place award goes to John Laurens Chapter.

NATIONAL DEFENSE, Mrs. James J. Muldrow

Seventy-six Chapters reported full National Defense programs this year. All reporting chapters devoted the required 5 minutes to their National Defense report with 41 Chapters reporting 10 minutes or more at each meeting. Sixty-five Chapters discussed 1987 Resolutions; 47 had extra National Defense materials available. Materials were distributed to schools by 29 Chapters; to libraries by 27 and to interested individuals by 45 Chapters. Two hundred seventy-one Good Citizenship Medals were presented; 89 bronze ROTC medals were presented and 22 gold medals presented. Chapters reported 151 paid subscriptions to the National Defender. Chapters contributed \$436.00 to Dollars for Defense and \$1284.15 to the ROTC program. Four hundred thirty-eight letters were sent by individuals to Senators and Congressmen. Four hundred and eight letters sent by individuals to State Legislators; 650 members are acquainted with their local representatives and 50 Georgia Daughters hold elective office. The possibility of a Constitutional Convention, Social Security, Strategic Defense Initiative, Contra Aid and Education are National Defense subjects of greatest interest to Georgia Daughters. PROGRAM, Mrs. Edward M. Tracy, Jr.

The diligent work of all Georgia's 109 Chapters was reported to this Program Chairman. Fifty-one chapters printed yearbooks for 1987-88 and forty-one chapters printed supplements for a total of 8,312 items. The cost of all the printing was \$6,945.11. Of the fifty-five chapters entering the Correctness of Detail contest there were 11 Blue Ribbons and 30 Tri-color Ribbons awarded. Four of our chapters won Certificates of Merit for perfect yearbooks. These chapters are Fort Peachtree, John Franklin Wren, LaGrange, and Thomasville.

PUBLIC RELATIONS, Mrs. E. Elton Corbitt

The Georgia Chapters told the DAR Story in 1987 in many ways and with great enthusiasm. They told it in print with 2,906 articles, 1,026 photographs for a total of 61,7531/2 inches. The radio record: 8,724 spot announcements and 33 programs for a total of 5,934 minutes. Television coverage amounted to 38 programs, 387 spots, total time - 26,426 minutes. Chapters published 254 Feature Stories on the Bicentennial of the Constitution of the United States. They stressed the Bicentennial in their communities in 26 reported ways, from planting memorial trees to erecting billboards. Local communities were made aware of DAR through History Essay Contests, Good Citizen Awards, ROTC Medals, and many other ways. One Chapter is producing a 5 minute tape once monthly on National Defense for a radio news broadcast. DAR members participated in various community activities such as Blood Drives, Flag Day, High School Honor Day, Farm City Day and DAR booth at 4th of July celebrations. The Public Relations office at National Headquarters received clippings and photographs from 14 Georgia Chapters to be posted on the National Bulletin Board. Awards are being presented to the following chapters for their outstanding efforts in the field of Public Relations: Chapter with membership under 50 - Oothcaloga - 1st place; Chapter with membership 50 to 100 — Colonel William Few - 1st place; Chapter with membership over 100 - Augusta - 1st place. Awards to the 3 Columbus Chapters for their cooperative efforts - Button Gwinnett, George Walton, Oglethorpe. Outstanding Bicentennial report award goes to Benjamin Hawkins.

SEIMES MICROFILM CENTER, Mrs. Charles W. Harrison

Ninety Chapters reported \$664.10 in contributions to the SEIMES MICROFILM CENTER in 1987. Two new Life Members reported as follows: Pamela Clark Whitson of the Fort Peachtree Chapter and Miss May Beth Prichard of the Joseph Habersham Chapter. Sixteen additional Georgia Daughters and HODAR's joined our group in Washington for a week of meetings, fun, and much excitement! Although not planned by this chairman, "Murphy's Law" prevailed the entire week! We weathered a two hour delay in leaving Macon, Ga., a broken foot, six hours of a power outage at our hotel, and FIVE city fire trucks surrounding our hotel in the wee morning hours! !! In August, I attended four District Workshops and encouraged members to be more safety conscious. The importance of the use of seatbelts was stressed and the chapter chairmen were asked to participate in the "We The People Buckle-Up Georgia" contest. Eighty-two chapters have reported carpooling, giving safety-tips at meetings, various safety courses completed by members, and eleven chapters had a full program on safety. First place goes to Philadelphia Winn Chapter and second place to St. Andrew's Parrish.

Special National Committees

BED AND BREAKFAST COMMITTEE, Mrs. Sally Sue Crawford

Bed and Breakfast Committee is new, and it is hoped that is why this State Chairman only had 52% reporting from the Chapters. DAR members can list their homes with the State Chairman and have other DAR members visit them; or they can contact the State Chairman in other states and use Bed and Breakfast homes when they vacation or do research. Each home sets their own fee and conditions. If you get a request to use your home, and you find it's not convenient at that time, then you can tell that to the prospective visitor. Awards and certificates are given to the Chapters listing the most homes this year — you can't count the homes listed last year. Hopefully, this committee will be more active as DAR members find out about it. Presently in Georgia we have twelve (12) homes listed.

BICENTENNIAL OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, Mrs. Dick Barbree

The British Prime Minister Gladstone called the Constitution of the United States of America "the most wonderful work struck off at a given time by the brain and purpose of man". While John Adams said, "it is the greatest single effort of national deliberation that the world has ever seen". But George Washington put it best, I think, when he simply remarked, "the Constitution is a little short of a miracle". The call went out to the nation to remember the 200th birthday of the Constitution and We The People did just that. Celebrations that displayed great respect and love for the document that guarantees to We The People our rights and freedom began. I have been overwhelmed by the spirit of the celebrations and the reports that I have received by over 85% of the Georgia DAR Chapters. It has been my pleasure to serve the Georgia State Society NSDAR as its state chair of the Bicentennial of the Constitution of the United States.

CENTENNIAL JUBILEE NSDAR, Mrs. Frank R. Radford

As the crucial years 1990-91 are rapidly approaching for the celebration of our Centennial Jubilee, it is only natural that the Chapters are showing a quickening awareness and mounting enthusiasm for the long anticipated celebration. The Centennial Logo is becoming a familiar symbol and is being seen more and more frequently wherever the Daughters gather. It is appearing on notebooks, stationery and table flags as well as an important addition to insignia ribbons. The beautiful logo is in a circular design centered with a large blue "C", and bordered with the words "A Century of Service to the Nation 1890-1990". Red stripes and stars on the white background complete the color scheme, and the whole design implies our motto, "God, Home, Country". The circle implies unity (home), the stars denote God, and the stripes represent country. The "C" indicates the 100 years our organization has rendered service to the nation. More interest is also being shown in entering chapter and individual names in the all important pages of the Centennial Call. This permanent record is in the form of a commemorative book and will be preserved for posterity. Sectioned by states and arranged with chapter names in alphabetical order, chapter pages will be inscribed impressively in calligraphy. The remainder of the state section can include names of ancestors, relatives, friends or memorials as well as numbers. This is a wonderful opportunity to have a part in, and be included in the Centennial Celebration. In the "Search and Rescue" Mission, valuable records and information, which will add to the knowledge of the history of the organization, will be of inestimable value.

DAR MEMBERSHIP COMMISSION, Mrs. Moody C. Summers, Jr.

Of the over 8,000 members of the Georgia State Society, 144 of these are listed as members at large. Chapters are urged to encourage members to change to this form of membership when they are unable to participate on chapter levels. The 109 chapters report 59 new Junior members.

FRIENDS OF THE LIBRARY, Miss Kay Yarbrough

Contributions of \$925.00 were received from three chapters and eight individuals for the Friends of the Library committee. Mrs. Coney B. Padgett and Mrs. S. Jay Smith, Sr., both of the Joseph Habersham Chapter, Sue K. McCranie of the John Floyd Chapter and Miss Kay Yarbrough of the Thomasville Chapter became Life members with donations of \$200.00. The committee had one sponsor, Pamela Clark Whitson of the Ft. Peachtree Chapter. The John Clarke Chapter became a sustaining member. In the category of regular membership were the Mary Hammond Washington and Thomasville Chapters. Individuals donating to the regular membership category were Mae B. McCranie of the Colonel William Few Chapter and Mrs. J. P. Walton and Mrs. L. S. Duval of the John Clarke Chapter. Twenty-nine chapters submitted reports. This chairman thanks the participating daughters and chapters for supporting the goals of this committee and the State Regent, Mrs. James J. FRIENDS OF THE MUSEUM, Mrs. Coney B. Padgett

Georgia State Society won 2 National Awards at Continental Congress in April for Friends of the Museum. They were for: The greatest amount of money donated to the Museum and for the greatest number of pins ordered. Excellent reports were received this year. Contributions in the total amount of \$753.55 with 81 chapters reporting. Thirteen chapters gave programs. Twenty-one chapters displayed Museum brochures at their meetings and 12 Arts of Independence books were purchased. LUCY COOK PEEL MEMORIAL, Mrs. Howard C. Evans

A letter stating the purpose and the history of The Lucy Cook Peel Memorial Fund was a part of each Chapter Regents package at all four District Workshops. Instructions for ordering the 1986 edition of the "Membership Roll and Register of the Georgia State Society of the American Revolution" was included in this letter. Books were sold at all District Workshops and at Fall Board of Management. Fifty-eight chapters have purchased a total of 97 books since February, 1987 through February 1, 1988. Books were purchased and sent to Margaret Mitchell Memorial Library, The University of Georgia Library and to individuals not being members of chapters in Georgia. MARKING REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIERS' GRAVES AND RESTORING HISTORIC SPOTS, Miss Mary K. King

Fort Frederica Chapter will install a marker in honor of Benjamin Hart in the Spring and paid \$150 to have a monument in Brunswick cleaned. John Floyd Chapter received a marker and permission to mark the grave of Revolutionary Soldier, Levi Sapp in Adel. Baron DeKalb Chapter contributed \$45 to the restoration of the Atlanta Chapter house. Benjamin Hawkins Chapter has plans underway to replace the brass marker at the site of the first bakery in Savannah. Minutes of the March 11 meeting were approved as read. Mrs. De Lamar presented the Financial Statement which was discussed in detail. A letter from the Georgia Power Company stated that service at Meadow Garden will be terminated unless the meter reader is given a key. Letter attached. Mrs. Agostas will talk with the company and come to a satisfactory arrangement. Rollins Protective Service has advised the Board that our system is out of date. Mrs. Agostas will meet with the Rollins representative and determine the needs. Letter Attached.

Mrs. Agostas reported that Rosemary McNichols left two weeks ago, that no salary is due but she has several small expenses which will be paid from Petty Cash. The side of the house by the canal and porches need another coat of paint. The large crepe myrtle needs to be taken down and the fig bush is coming back. Discussion followed about obtaining a new resident manager. Salary needs to be approximately \$100.00 a week. Check on Social Security and possibility of Army retiree. Motion by Mrs. De Lamar that a salary limit of \$100.00 a week be set. Adopted. Mrs. Agostas moved that the windows be caulked and paint applied where needed to include kitchen, work room, board room, Augusta room, halls, upstairs and downstairs, front and back porches, side of house near canal and back of cottage. Mrs. Cagle, Outgoing Regent, College Hill Chapter, reported a new tourism bureau has been opened in Augusta. It is not affiliated with the Chamber of Commerce and she feels they will be very cooperative. There is a fee to join Historic Augusta and the feeling is that we will not benefit but should keep in touch.

The Chairman reported that the slide program will be updated and pictures taken and sent to the State Program Chairman.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 12:40 p.m.

Bylaws

BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I

NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II OBJECTS

The objects of the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution shall be: to promote the aims set forth in the Bylaws of the National Society, the preservation of the memory of its Revolutionary patriots; the study of its history; the education of its youth in patriotic ideals and in the duties of citizenship.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All Chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of this organization.

Article IV OFFICERS

The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Organizing Secretary, a State

State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Curator. The State Regent shall appoint a Parlimentarian who shall act as adviser in matters pertaining to parlimentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting.

Article V

ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected at the annual State Conference biennially.

Section 2. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for three years or until their successors are elected. Their term of office shall begin at the close of Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and of the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Proviso: This amendment shall not go into effect until the election of state officers in 1992.

Section 3. No member shall be eligible to a State office until she has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years. No member shall be eligible to the same State office for two successive terms. A member having served more than one-half term in the State office shall be deemed to have served a term. Any member holding active membership in a Chapter in the Georgia State Society shall be eligible to hold a State office, provided she has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years.

Section 4. Nomination of candidates for office shall be from the floor. The election shall be held by ballot. A majority of the votes cast by the voting members of the State Conference shall elect.

Section 5. Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become acting First Vice Regent, subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. A vacancy in any other State office between annual meetings shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next Fall Board of Management or State Conference, whichever shall come first. Any State Officer, who is absent from the State for a continous period of six months or longer, automatically relinquishes her position as a State officer.

Section 6. No two State officers shall be members of the same Chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

Section 7. In recognition of valuable service to the organization, any State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Section 8. A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot. The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than fifteen months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated. Section 9. On the election of State Regent, and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Recording Secretary General. The endorsement of a candidate for Vice President General shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent to the Recording Secretary General at least two weeks prior to Continental Congress.

Article VI

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, of the State Board of Management, and of the Executive Committee. She shall appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees.

Section 2. In the absence of the State Regent from any meeting of the State Conference, or the State Board of Management, the State First Vice Regent, or in her absence, the State Second Vice Regent, shall perform the duties of thje State Regent. The State First and Second Vice Regents may be assigned to direct committees and to perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent.

Section 3. The State Chaplain shall open all meetings of the State Conference and of the State Board of Managment with Scripture reading and prayer and shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require. She shall preside at the Memorial Service during State conference and shall be responsible for In Memoriam pages in the Proceedings.

Section 4. The State Recording Secretary shall record the proceedings of the State Conference and of meetings of State Board of Management and of the Executive Committee. She shall compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and of the Proceedings Committee.

Section 5. The State Corresponding Secretary shall conduct correspondence and send notices in behalf of the State Conference, the State Regent, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as directed by them.

Section 6. The State Treasurer shall be the custodian of the funds of the State Society. She shall receive the State Conference dues and registration fees from the Chapters and shall receive all sums contributed by the Chapters for State and National projects. All monies received by the State Treasurer shall be placed only in institutions with accounts covered by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation or by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation, and the amount in any one institution shall not exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage. She shall disburse such sums only when authorized by the State Regent in writing. The State Treasurer shall keep an account of all sums received or paid out and shall keep receipts for all payments. She shall prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference. Her books shall be audited annually by a Certified Public Account. She shall be ex-officio a member of the Credentials Committee.

Section 7. The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new Chapters.

Section 8. The State Registrar shall, when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, who live in towns and counties where there are no Chapters, to prove eligibility, and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars in verifying lineage papers. She shall keep a correct list of all members in the State and shall make a report on membership to the State Conference.

Section 9. The State Historian shall be in charge of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General. She shall keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves in the State and shall prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General to Smithsonian

Institution. She shall encourage the compilation and publication of County Histories and other unpublished records, especially those of the Revolutionary period.

Section 10. The State Librarian shall collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing duplicates wherever possible, in the NSDAR Library and in the Georgia DAR Collections in the State Department of Archives and History. She shall endeavor to obtain the books on the wanted list of the Librarian General for the Georgia Section in the NSDAR Library and is authorized to solicit contributions from the Chapters for the purchase of the same. She shall have custody and supervision of the DAR Genealogical and Historical Collections of the State Department of Archives and History.

Section 11. The State Curator shall receive and be responsible for all gifts of Revolutionary relics to the Museum of the National Society. Daughters of the American Revolution. She shall be custodian of the conference properties and shall have them properly stored, insured and made ready for use at State Conference.

Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. The Georgia State Society shall hold an annual State Conference between the first day of February and the time of the meeting of the Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week. The Executive Committee shall fix the time and place of meetings when not fixed by the Conference in session, or when for any reason it may be impractical to meet at the time or place fixed by the Conference.

Section 2. The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credentials blanks to the Chapters not less than sixty days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 3. The voting members of the State Conference shall be State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regent or alternate, and the delegates or their alternates from the Chapters of the state that are entitled to representations at the Continental Congress. The number of representative from each Chapter shall be determined by the rules for representation of Chapters in the Continental Congress as given in the National Bylaws.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a Chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the Chapter, except in the case of the Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at an annual State Conference, shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any Chapter in the State of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference the privileges of the floor shall be accorded to the State Chairmen with the exception that they may not vote unless they are duly elected delegates or their alternates from their respective chapters.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State conference may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committe. Fifteen days notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Twenty-five voting members, representing not less than ten Chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII

STATE DUES AND CONFERENCE FEES

Section 1. The annual dues of Chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be four dollars for each member of the Chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1. A minimum of \$1.83 shall be used to cover all State per capita assessments,

and the balance shall be allocated to the General State Dues Fund. No Chapter shall be entitled to representation at the annual State Conference until the States dues are paid.

Section 2. The Finance Committee, appointed by the State Regent, shall be composed of seven members, to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two Honorary State Regents, one active Chapter Regent and one active Chapter member. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund.

Section 3. Each Chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State Dues, a Conference registration fee of \$3.00 for each voter to which the Chapter is entitled under the Bylaws, this fee to be paid whether represented or not.

Section 4. State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$3.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Others members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference fee at the time of registration.

Article IX EXPENSES

Section 1. Two thousand dollars (\$2,000) shall be taken each year from the State Dues Fund, to be used by the State Regent in defraying her necessary travel expenses.

Secton 2. Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent shall be paid by the State Treasurer from the State Dues Fund.

Article X

STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Regents, in their absence, the First Vice Regent of the Chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the Fall, following the regular meeting of the National Board. It may meet whenever called by the State Regent.

Section 3. Ten members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management. Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference.

Section 5. State Chairmen, Vice Chairmen and Committee Members of National and Standing Committees shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privileges of the floor, but may not vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article XI

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute an Executive Committee. The Parliamentarian, at the request of the Sate Regent, attends the meetings of the Executive Committee, but may not vote. This Committee performs such duties of the Board between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient. The Executive Committee shall meet the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three members of the Committee. It shall make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Mangement.

Article XII CHAPTERS

Section 1. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April. The Chapter Regent shall report the names of the elected officers promptly, on triplicate blanks provided

by the State Regent for this purpose, to the Organizing Secretary General, to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary.

Section 2. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent for use in compiling her report, not less than fifteen days before the opening of the annual State Conference. The official Chapter report, not to exceed 250 words in length, for publication in the Proceedings shall be furnished the State Recording Secretary before the State Conference.

Article XIII AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent and to the Parliamentarian. The State Regent shall send a copy to each Chapter, at least sixty days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law for the State Conference in matters not covered by the Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21.) No conference was held in 1911; the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912"; amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, p. 211.)

All chapters competing for awards must send reports to the respective chairmen by February 1, 1989.

All reports for awards are based on membership confirmed by the National Society as of February 1 of preceding year (1988). SEE FIGURE BESIDE CHAPTER NAME IN CHAPTER REGENTS DIRECTORY.

BYLAWS

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National and State Bylaws.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS

Notice of change of address of members shall be sent to the Organizing Secretary General, Treasurer General, State Regent and State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHANGE OF NAME

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to State Registrar, Treasurer General and State Regent by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHAPTER ELECTIONS

As soon as Chapter elections are held, names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, Administration Building, 1776 D Street, N. W., Washington, D. C., 20006 to the State Regent or State Regent-Elect and to the Recording Secretary by May 1st. The full Christian name of Chapter officers shall be given together with her husband's given name or initials, address, zip code and telephone number. A Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years. This being added in order for our Bylaws to conform to the National Bylaws.

DUES

Pay to State Treasurer State Dues of \$4.00 per member before December 1. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the February 1 and two April Board meetings of the National Society. National Dues of \$15.00 per member sent to the Treasurer-General, 1776 D Street, N. W., Washington, D. C. 20006 before December 1, 1988.

CONFERENCE REGISTRATION FEE

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer with the State dues on or before December 1, \$3.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether represented or not.

Rules for representation of chapters at Continental Congress:

"Chapters having less than 50 paid members on February 1 are entitled to be represented by the Regent or in her absence the Vice Regent or alternate; chapters having 50 to 199 paid members on February 1, one delegate in addition to the Regent; chapters having 200 to 299 paid members on February 1, two delegates in addition to the Regent, and for each additional 100 members one additional delegate." (Article XIII, Section 3-C, National Bylaws.)

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$3.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. (Article VIII, Section 4, of the State Bylaws.)

CONTRIBUTIONS

ALL contributions by Chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

DECEASED MEMBERS

Deaths shall be reported promptly to Treasurer General, State Chaplain and State Registrar by the Corresponding Chapter Officer. Complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and a date of death shall be furnished State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for Conference Memorial Service pages for State Proceedings.

GEORGIA HOSPITALITY FUND

The following resolution which applies to the Georgia Hospitality Fund appears in the Proceedings for 1955:

"WHEREAS, The Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds a social event in Washington during Continental Congress which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society.

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$300.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes:

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this fund shall not be cumulative." Adopted.

PROCEDURE BOOK OF INSTRUCTIONS FOR OFFICERS AND STATE CHAIRMEN

The following resolution which applies to a Procedure Book of Instruction for Officers and State Chairmen appears in the Proceedings for 1959-60, Page 41.

"RESOLVED, That all Officers and State Chairmen keep a Procedure Book of Instructions and helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new Officers and Chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities thus providing a continuing continuity of DAR work." Adopted.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS

To insure uniformity and convenience in binding, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, $8\frac{1}{2} \times 11$ inches, with $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 inch margin on left side, $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches at top and 1 inch on right side and at bottom. Four copies shall be sent to State Chairman of Genealogical Records.

INFORMATION FOR CHAPTER REGENTS

1. All letters received by Chapter Regents relating to the work of the Society shall be distributed to the corresponding Chapter Chairman and brought to the attention of the members at a chapter meeting.

2. Please follow Resolution No. 11, adopted at 61st Georgia Society State Conference, as follows: "Resolved, That a closing date of February 1 be established for all reports, and all reports be given from February 1 to February 1, regardless of a change of regime or Regent." All awards will be made on this date basis.

NEW ADMINISTRATION RESERVE FOR CONTINGENCIES FUND

For the entire resolution setting up the "General New Regime Fund Balance of \$2,500.00," found on pp. 203-204 of the 1979 Proceedings the following substitute resolution was adopted by the 88th State Conference: RESOLVED that at the end of each administration \$6,000.00 be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies" fund, this money to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration, and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration. All other surplus monies in the General Fund, other than funds which are designated, are to be divided equally between the General Savings Account and the Meadow Garden Capital Investment Fund as provided in the Capital Investment Fund Resolution passed in 1979 (pp. 62-63, 1979 Proceedings). This transaction is to be handled by April 30 every two years before the auditors close out the books of an administration, thus making the General Fund show the same balance of \$6,000.00 at the beginning of each new administration. (This fund is to be known as "New Administration Reserve for Contigencies Fund.") Adopted.

NOMINATIONS

The following resolution which applies to the announcement of the candidacy for State Regent appears in the Proceedings of the Twentieth State Conference, 1918:

WHEREAS, a definite deadline must be established and adhered to for all reports and material to be in the hands of the Proceedings Committee in order to be delivered to the Printer by June 1st.

RESOLVED: That all FINAL reports and materials must be received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1st with the exception of the Auditor's report and any information sent out by the National DAR Headquarters. This does not alter the requirement in the "Items of Information" in the Proceedings that all reports shall be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary on or before February 15th, the ORIGINAL being sent to the Secretary for the Proceedings.

AND FURTHER RESOLVED: This policy will be strictly adhered to and the material not received by the State Recording by May 1st will be omitted from the Proceedings.

REAFFIRMATION

A Gold Star is awarded when a chapter achieves the National Gold Honor Roll three consecutive years. For each additional three consecutive years, another Gold Star is awarded. If a chapter fails to achieve Gold Honor Roll any year, all stars are lost as they are awarded for consecutive achievement. National Honor Roll creditation comes from the National Chairman of the National Honor Roll Committee.

The State Project was: "Help preserve Georgia's coastline". The State President's Theme was: "United, We Stand".

It was a pleasure to announce at the State Conference which was held at the Perimeter Center Marriott in Atlanta, Ga. that the Georgia State Society contributed \$133.00 to Meadow Garden and \$140.00 to the State President's Project.

Georgia State Society C.A.R. has 18 organized societies, which include the disbandment of the Colonel Henry Lee Society and the recent addition to the Georgia C.A.R. family, the Earl of Camden Society in the Woodbine area. Rumor has it that the Georgia Daughters have expressed an interest in organizing at least four more C.A.R. societies, and I would like to encourage your interest in promoting this worthwhile organization. We did not have a NET GAIN in membership this year, but hopefully, with the organization of these societies, the Georgia Society C.A.R. will be able to realize a NET GAIN in membership this year.

The Georgia State Society gave liberally to all National Projects. Contributions were made to the C.A.R. Museum, and the Georgia Society is proud to have an outstanding member, Miss Arian McCullough, honored by her society, The Glass Brothers Society, with a Major Benefactor/Red Apple Pin at the 93rd Annual National Convention of the C.A.R. in Washington, DC.

Georgia societies reported a total of one member transferring to DAR and S.A.R. chapters this year. We had 31 National Promoters, 96 State Promoters, and 160 State Patriots. Of these number, the DAR is largely responsible. Two Endowment Fund pins were presented representing a total of \$468.50 given to this national fund. Other contributions to National Projects by the Georgia C.A.R. were to: Equipment and Maintenance, the Book Binding Fund and the Magazine Sustaining Fund. Money, clothing and soup labels were given to the following schools: Bacone College; Crossnore, Inc.; Kate Duncan Smith School; and Tamassee DAR School.

The Thirty-Seventh Annual Southeastern Regional Meeting was held in Huntsville, Alabama on July 27th and 28th. Forty-one members and seniors represented the Georgia Society C.A.R.

The Georgia State Workshop, 1987 was held July 17-18 with 76 members and seniors in attendance. The Allen Howard Society was the host society. Raymond Johnson is President of that society. The purpose of this workshop was to acquaint local chairmen and officers with their duties. State President Lisa Dawn Sapp presided over this meeting. State Chairmen and Officers who had programs and contests for the year did an exceptional job with their presentations. Prizes for the top presentations were given by the State President and the Senior State President. Winners included: Arian McCullough (The Glass Brothers Society); Mardi Senn (The Glass Brothers Society); Battle Betts (Uchee Trail Society); Emily Stancil (Allen Howard Society); and Kerry Hurst (Gwinnett Society).

The Senior State President was unable to travel to the DAR State Workshops, but was ably represented by members of the Georgia C.A.R. State and Senior State Board. Arian McCullough, President of the Glass Brothers Society and National Conservation Chairman, traveled to Gainesville while the State Second Vice President, John Ethan Boyes, traveled to Carrollton. The State President, Lisa Dawn Sapp, traveled to Brunswick. These enthusiastic C.A.R.s deserve much recognition for their hard work in bringing greetings from the G.S.C.A.R. and presenting the DAR-C.A.R. program.

The Georgia Society, C.A.R. was represented by the State President and the Senior State President on several other occasions, including: visits to the majority of the active societies during the year; visits to two of the DAR Mountain Schools — Tamassee and Kate Duncan Smith DAR Schools; attendance at the DAR-SAR Constitution Day Luncheon held at the Ansley Park Golf Club in Atlanta, among other DAR chapter luncheons, and made contact with inactive societies in order to encourage activities and rebuilding.

The annual Government Studies Seminar was held at Middle Georgia College on October 17 and was hosted by the Uchee Trail Society. Miss JoAnne Phillips and Mrs. A.R. Johnson, Government Studies Chairmen, did a very good job of presenting the Government Studies program for the year for those in attendance. Dr. Robert Weber of Middle Georgia College gave a very informative speech on the Constitution of the United States.

The 49th Annual State Conference held in Atlanta was a great success. The total registration was 156 with 12 societies represented. There were 4 National Officers, 3 National Chairmen, and 1 Senior National Officer present for this occasion. The National President, Lori Lynn Brugier, was among those present. It is always a pleasure to welcome members of the DAR and SAR to our meetings, and therefore, an honor to have Mrs. James J. Leitch, DAR State Regent, in attendance. Both the DAR and the SAR organizations were well represented.

During the state conference, there were member and senior Board of Management Meetings; and on Saturday morning at the General Business Meeting, reports were heard from State Officers and State Chairmen. On Friday evening, the candidates for State Office 1988-1989 were given the opportunity to present their campaign speeches. This was followed by a pool party.

At noon Saturday, voting took place and new officers were elected for the new year. A delightful luncheon was held on Saturday during which Dr. Susan Bratton of the U.S. National Park Service presented a slide show on the Manatee, one of Georgia's Endangered Species.

In the evening, an awards banquet was held and societies were rewarded for their superior work in carrying out the programs of the various committees. Societies carried home newly polished trophies, certificates, and cash prizes. All are to be commended for the outstanding work done prior to the State Conference.

Four issues of the C.A.R. state news sheet, the CARgoes, were printed and distributed to over 400 subscribers. An annual State Yearbook was published and was placed in the information packet distributed at State Workshop.

Thirty-five members and seniors representing 8 societies traveled to the Ninety-Third Annual National Convention in Washington, DC on April 22-24, 1988. At this time, Lisa Dawn Sapp, State President, gave the report for the Georgia State Society as members proudly stood with her. Several awards were won by local societies. The Glass Brothers Society won second place for the National Project by contributing the greatest amount, per member, to the eventual computerization of N.S.C.A.R. Headquarters. The Glass Brothers Society also placed first in the National Conservation contest for the best overall program and project while the Allen Howard Society placed third. The Fort Frederica Society won the first place award for presenting the most innovative and informative program in the National Mountain Schools contest. The Georgia State Society took first place in the National Publications contest for the best state news sheet. The Allen Howard Society placed first for being the local society (25 members or less) which best carried out the contest for National Publicity while the Glass Brothers Society placed first for being the local society (26 members or more) which best carried out the contest for National Publicity. In the National Merit Award, the Glass Brothers Society won the Gold Ribbon as well as the second place trophy while Fort Frederica Society won the Blue Ribbon. Lisa Sapp, State President, won a Red Ribbon for the State President's Activity Guidelines with her report.

During the National Convention, Arian McCullough of the Glass Brothers Society directed the All-States Chorus. John Ethan Boyes, Cherokee Rose Society, carried the C.A.R. Banner while Raymond Johnson, Allen Howard Society, was the Color Bearer for the Georgia State Flag. Margaret Senn, the Glass Brothers Society, served as a Page to the National President. Those serving on various committees included: Holli Oakley, Gwinnett Society; John Ethan Boyes, Cherokee Rose Society; Arian McCullough, the Glass Brothers Society; and Christopher White, Brunswick Society.

The Annual Installation of Officers was held on Sunday during the Pilgrimage Tour. This was the final day of the Convention. The Installation of Officers took place on the grounds of Mount Vernon, home of George and Martha Washington. Impressive ceremonies were held on the banks of the Potomac River, and it was at this time that Miss Holli Kaye Oakley, Gwinnett Society, was installed as the National Vice President of the Southeastern Region and John Ethan Boyes, Cherokee Rose Society, was installed as the State President of Georgia. The Georgia State Society is very proud of these two individuals.

It was also a pleasure to witness the installation of Mrs. R. Clough Carter, Winona Society, as the Senior National Vice President of the Southeastern Region for the term of 1988-1990.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of the wonderful and supportive Georgia DAR members who have been helpful to me this past year. Without their guidance and knowledge, it would be difficult to fulfill the duties of this office. I look forward to serving the Georgia State Societies DAR and C.A.R. for another promising year.
