Dr. Jessie Mize, Chairman of Conference Credentials, gave the first credentials report. She reported 155 registered establishing a quorum.

Mrs. Muldrow introduced Mrs. J.L.R. Boyd and Mrs. Gilbert R. Frith, Timekeepers for the meeting. State Officers are allowed 3 minutes and State Chairmen 2 minutes.

Mrs. Donald D. Hankinson, State First Vice Regent, took the Chair while the State Regent reported. Mrs. Muldrow stated that she had made 10 chapter visits in addition to a week of visits to the Northwest District since taking office. A tea was given in her honor by the Hancock and Nancy Hart Chapters. The Resident Manager of Meadow Garden died suddenly on August 23 and replacements are being interviewed. During the brief closing of Meadow Garden, Susan Conger, Executive Director of Historic Augusta, Inc. answered all phone calls for Meadow Garden and placed notices of the closing in the news media. Mrs. Muldrow expressed her gratitude to Miss Conger. She announced that Miss Conger is also a member of DAR and National Chairman of Congress Seating. During June plans were finalized for the 1989 State Conference in Albany. The 1990 State Conference will be at Jekyll Island. On July 19 Mrs. Muldrow delivered a car load of food to Tamassee DAR School after the dining hall was destroyed by fire. She reported \$9,000.00 sent to the School Emergency Fund by Georgia Daughters. By August 15 part of the gymnasium in the May Erwin Talmadge Building was placed in use as a temporary dining hall for the students. Mrs. Muldrow reported that much time had been spent on the planning and preparation of the Consolidated Reporting Ouestionnaire and asked for cooperation in using it. She reported 640 in attendance at the August District Workshops and that she witnessed the signing of the Constitution Week Proclamation by Governor Joe Frank Harris. Mrs. Muldrow stated that the National Society has lost 2,414 members since the last report. Georgia has added 108 new members, 33 of them are Juniors. Other news from the National Society included repairs on our buildings, savings on the Proceedings, rules for use of lineage papers, dates for Continental Congress and the establishment of a new Fund, Friends of the Americana Collection. A video on the preparation of application papers can be ordered from the office of the President General for \$29.00.

The State Regent resumed the Chair and presented the State Officers who reported: Mrs. Hankinson, First Vice Regent and National Defense Chairman, reported that she had attended a weekend seminar on the Constitution of the United States conducted by the NSDAR National Defense Committee Chairman in St. Louis, Missouri. She attended the Board of Trustees meetings at Tamassee and KDS as well as their Founders Day and Dedication Day exercises where she dedicated the state projects and gifts.

Mrs. Ward, Second Vice Regent, gave instructions on shipping used clothing and on how to receive proper credit for monetary contributions to the schools. She urged each chapter to have at least one donor to the Friends of DAR Schools Fund.

Mrs. Drew, Chaplain, told of meeting with the State Regent to help with arrangements for the 1990 State Conference at Jekyll Island. She reported 98 deaths since last March and she urged the chapters to be prompt on reporting deaths.

Mrs. Elliott, Recording Secretary, requested that reports be sent in on time and announced 1988 Proceedings were available. The State Regent at this time thanked Mrs. Waite and Mrs. Hanf for the work done to print the 1988 Proceedings.

Mrs. Evans, Corresponding Secretary, gave changes to be made in the Proceedings. She thanked the Hancock and Nancy Hart Chapters for the tea given in her and Mrs. Muldrow's honor and reported that she has Certificates of Award for sale at 10 cents each and that she has the Consolidated Reporting Forms.

Mrs. Corbitt, Treasurer, distributed the budget and summary of accounts. She reported a balance as of 10/1/88:

She asked that all contributions for the Emergency Fire Fund for Tamassee DAR School be sent through the State Treasurer.

Mrs. Kendrick, Finance Committee Chairman, reported that the Finance Committee met after the Workshop in Atlanta to give approval for dispersal of funds for emergency repair work on the gutters and roof of the May Erwin Talmadge Auditorium/Gymnasium. The Committee also voted to give Mrs. Everett Porter, Genealogical Records Chairman, \$500.00 to continue indexing the past DAR Genealogical Records submitted from Georgia.

Mrs. Daniel, Organizing Secretary, gave suggestions for promoting membership growth and preventing disbandments.

Mrs. Hanf, Registrar and DAR Membership Commission Chairman, reminded the chapters to be sure and report to her promptly. Since February there have been 174 new members (52 Juniors), 24 reinstatements, 32 transfers in, 36 transfers out, 56 resignations, 114 deaths and 72 dropped by the National Board of Management. The Membership Commission wants to assist the chapters in increasing their membership.

Mrs. Miller, Historian, asked that informaton on grave markings be sent to her as they occur. She is selling copies of *History of the Georgia State Society* for \$25.00.

Mrs. Chastain, Librarian, thanked everyone for the time, hard work and support given toward the growth of our libraries. She reported generous donations both in publications and funds and announced she has copies of the "Book Want List" from the DAR Library in Washington.

Mrs. Kezar, Curator and Transportation and Safety Chairman, reported all flags in place for Fall Board and Workshops. She announced that Mrs. J.C. Serrato, Jr. has given the State Society 3 wooden flag poles, 1 gold stand, 1 gold eagle, 2 gold finials and 2 carrying cases for the flags. Two buses will go to Continental Congress and only 22 reservations are left. There will be a side trip of 2 days and nights in Williamsburg.

Following the reporting of the officers, Mrs. Muldrow asked Mrs. Roy H. Cagle, Meadow Garden Chairman and Mrs. Theodore deTreville, Meadow Garden Docents Chairman, to report as they had to return to Augusta to conduct 2 tours. Mrs. Cagle told of the work in progress on Meadow Garden at the time of the death of Mr. Wilson and that the work is being completed. Mrs. deTreville reported she is trying to keep the house open on the days the Historic Augusta Trolley comes by.

Mrs. Elliott called the roll of the Board of Management Meeting.

Reports continued with State Chairmen of National Committees: Mrs. Dares E. Wirt, American History Month, gave the rules for the History Essay and introduced her district vice chairmen. Mrs. John K. Bretch, American Indians, told of her trip to Bacone College, the only independent Christian college for American Indians in the United States. Mrs. Edward M. Tracy, Jr., Americanism and DAR Manual for Citizenship, reviewed the goals of this committee and reminded the chapters to learn and use the American's Creed and introduced her vice chairmen. Mrs. Rena S. Morgan, Senior State President of C.A.R. and C.A.R. Chairman, reported that members had attended workshops, regional meetings and the first Tamassee - C.A.R. Olympics. They are looking forward to a gain in membership. Miss Mary King, Conservation, reported that this year's emphasis is water conservation. Mrs. Randolph A. Malone, III, Constitution Week, reminded the chapters that National Honor Roll requires your celebration and report. Mrs. J.C. Tillman, DAR Literature, reported giving out over 2,000 pieces of free literature. Mrs. Sam H. Black, Georgia Day, asked for observance of Georgia Day and for report in by February 12. Mrs. Hugh Peterson, Sr., Georgia State Room and 50 Year Club, recognized her committee and reported a good amount in fund for Georgia Room, List of 50 year members still needed from each chapter. SUPPORT OF THE GEORGIA DEPARTMENT OF ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

WHEREAS: The DAR Genealogical Library Collecton has now grown to almost five hundred volumes, and the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, feels proud of this collection of records, as it carries out one of the purposes for which the National Society was organized - the preservation and publication of genealogical and historical data; and

WHEREAS: Many members of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, would not be members of this Society without access to these records;

Visits with members of 54 chapters have truly been the highlight of this first year. The opportunity to greet old friends and meet new friends whose hard work and dedication have made possible the fine reports you heard during the 91st State Conference, will always be a cherished memory. These visits have been most enjoyable for me and I wish to express my deepest appreciation to each one for the gracious hospitality shown me by each chapter and for the beautiful parties, luncheons and other gestures of friendship.

In April, October, February and again this April, I attended the National Board of Management meetings in Washington and have attended C.A.R. Workshop and State Conference. I have presided at 4 District Workshops, the Fall Board of Management and State Conference, all of which were well attended.

My very special thanks go to the Georgia Daughters for state projects at our schools. The flush system and resurfacing of the Annis Mann Richardson playground at KDS, the special fund for maintaining the May Erwin Talmadge Auditorium/Gymnasium at Tamassee and the replacement of trees at Berry will all make a more pleasant environment for the students at these schools.

Many awards were received by Chapters and the State Society at Continental Congress. These include second place, Constitution Week Observance for the State Society; second place Constitution Week for the Thomasville Chapter; also Outstanding Reports for the State and Thomasville Chapter in the Southeastern Division. First place, Category C, Junior Membership Committee for most new junior members. First place for Drawing, American Heritage Committee in the field of art; fourth place, crafts, American Heritage Committee; third place for poetry, American Heritage Committee. 100% participation for the State, President General's Project. Honorable Mention, Genealogical Records. First place, flagpole contest, The Flag of the United States of America; Outstanding Chairman, The Flag of the United States of America. The first year of Consolidated Reporting is complete. By the first of February deadline, reports had been received from 101 chapters. There is room for improvements in the questionnaire. The tragic fire that destroyed the dining hall at Tamassee distressed all Daughters. Georgia Daughters responded quickly with food and money. As of February first, more than \$13,800.00 had been sent to the emergency fund at Tamassee. The DAR School Chairman's report gives the details.

When I became your State Regent at the 97th Continental Congress, I knew I had a big job ahead of me. It is a big job but has been most rewarding through your efforts. The support of the State Officers and Chairmen is most gratifying and this officer is indebted to the Honorary State Regents for their support and willingness to lend a hand whenever requested. To the Chapter Regents and members, without your dedication to our great Society, there would be no State Society. My deepest appreciation goes to every one of you. The Georgia Society has worked together and is successful.

The State Organizing Secretary attended 4 District Workshops, Fall Board of Management, State Conference and all Executive Committee meetings. At State Conference a poster of the State of Georgia with the location of all the chapters was displayed. The work of this officer is to promote the growth of the State Society through the organization of new chapters and the conservation of existing chapters. Letters and brochures have been sent to those who have expressed an interest in forming new chapters. Follow-up contacts have been made. To have the privilege of serving the Georgia State Society as State Organizing Secretary under the inspiring leadership of Mrs. James J. Muldrow has been a most gratifying and challenging experience.

REGISTRAR - Mrs. Peter S. Hanf

The State Registrar has kept the membership files current for the Georgia State Society according to the printouts received from the Office of the Registrar General after each National Board Meeting. As of February 25, 1988, National shows Georgia as having 8092 members. During the year we have had 267 new members by application of which 76 are Juniors, 42 by re-instatement, 72 by transfer into the state. Georgia lost 174 members by death, 182 by resignation, 71 by transfer out of state, and 72 dropped by the National Society. These figures show a net loss of 103 members making a total of 7989. This officer attended State Conference, Continental Congress, District Workshops, Fall Board of Management and all Executive Board Meetings. Appreciation is expressed to all those who have promptly notified this officer of chapter member changes. It has been an honor and a privilege to serve the Georgia State Society under the capable leadership of our State Regent.

STATE HISTORIAN - Mrs. Fred A. Miller, Jr.

Congratulations chapters for 100% reporting! Appreciation is expressed to the Regents and Historians for making this possible. I gift was given to the NSDAR Archives and \$118 contributed to the AMERICANA COLLECTION. Chapters had 288 Historical programs for adults and 164 for school children. 10 copies of the History of the Georgia State Society were sold and \$250 was sent to the State Treasurer. 157 books remain in the possession of the State Historian. A committee of 3 judges (non DAR) selected Anne S. Clarke (Mrs. Albert E.) as GEORGIA'S OUTSTANDING TEACHER OF AMERICAN HISTORY. She was sponsored by the Colonel William Few Chapter. Graves marked this year were: 14 Revolutionary Soldiers, 3 Daughters of Revolutionary Soldiers, 4 wives of Revolutionary Soldiers and 102 DAR members. 23 Historical Markers were placed and 25 historic restorations were begun. Abraham Baldwin Chapter has started Chief McIntosh Plantation restoration and has raised \$7,000 toward replacing the house and park. Colonel William Few Chapter and Oothcaloga Chapter have been cataloguing cemetery records. Some of these cemeteries have been lost to the public and these were cleaned up. Nancy Hart Chapter was responsible for getting county commissioners to pave a road to an old historical cemetery. It is an honor and a privilege to serve the Georgia State Society as Historian under the capable leadership of our lovely State Regent, Mrs. James J. Muldrow.

STATE LIBRARIAN - Mrs. W. Frank Chastain

Your State Librarian attended Continental Congress, 4 district workshops, and Fall Board of Management. Distributed over 300 brochures on the NSDAR Library and answered all queries. 107 chapters reported the following: \$409.95 given to the NSDAR Library Book Purchase Fund; \$352.00 to the Rebinding Fund; \$65.00 to Reclassification Fund; and \$266.50 to our State Library Fund. 5 programs were given on NSDAR and local libraries, and 5 daughters serve on local Library Boards. Chapters donated \$10,976.83 in gifts of microfilm, books, file cabinet, genealogical material given and 690 hours volunteered at the Georgia Department of Archives and History. 5,015.5 hours volunteered at state and local libraries. Members continue their indexing projects on state and local levels. It is an honor to serve Georgia daughters under the capable guidance of our State Regent, Mrs. James J. Muldrow.

The Curator has in her custody the property of the State Society. The Curator serves as Chairman of Conference Seating and Processional. This officer has attended State Conference, Continental Congress, 4 District Workshops, Fall Board of Management Meeting, and all Executive meetings. Serving as your State Curator under the leadership of our State Regent has been an honor and a privilege.

National Committee Reports

AMERICAN HERITAGE, Mrs. R. Clough Carter

One hundred and three chapters participated in the American Heritage program this year. There were 83 programs/projects on American Heritage in 1988-89. There were 176 tours to historic homes, sites, or museums. Fifty chapters and/or members did historic preservation or restoration work. One chapter reported sending a slide to the DAR historic preservation slide show. Seven chapters had a public program/project on American Heritage. Nine members entered the American Heritage Contest. One chapter submitted a program to the National Program Committee. Programs presented by chapters were music; religion; quilts; period architecture; poetry; "Colonial Food Ways"; Colonial crafts; guided tours of historic homes; "Heritage in Christmas Cards"; the restoration of an old fort; and skits. For historic preservation 1 chapter chairman prepared a driving map of a civil war area; I chapter raised money to help restore and contributed furniture to a museum; chapter members wrote and published family genealogies and histories; chapter members work with Historic Preservation Committees; 1 chapter member embroidered 2 quilt squares depicting the history of her city; some chapters have members on "Main Street Project" and Historic Preservation Societies; 1 chapter helped restore their old city clock; 1 chapter cleaned, preserved and framed a 48 star American Flag and gave it to a military college. Much appreciation, from this chairman, to the Georgia chapters for outstanding work. Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure to serve as chairman of this committee.

AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH, Mrs. Dares E. Wirt

Reports were received from 102 Chapters. Seventy-four Chapters participated in the Essay Contest, with 226 schools taking part, 51 of these for the first time, with 6,664 contestants. Georgia Essay winners are: 5th Grade, Hunter Hopkins of Thomaston, sponsored by John Houstoun Chapter. 6th Grade, Gilbert McLemore of Jekyll Island, sponsored by Brunswick Chapter. 7th Grade, Katherine Baxley of Blakely, sponsored by Peter Early Chapter. Sixty-five Chapters had American History Programs, and 63 had Displays. Thirty-seven Chapters presented awards for Excellence in American History. This report does not show how many programs, displays, or awards were presented, but many Chapters gave numbers of each. Georgia heard about American History Month when 66 Chap-

ters sponsored Radio Spots, 16 had TV Announcements, and 14 DAR members took part. Over 1,836 inches of publicity and 157 pictures appeared in newspapers. Gov. Joe Frank Harris signed a beautiful Proclamation naming February as American History Month, and 61 Chapters had Proclamations signed by Mayors. Thanks to all the hardworking Chapters - one had proclamations from all Mayors in their county, one used 100 stickers, one recorded students reading their Essays to be broadcast on radio, others honored participants, parents and teachers. I give many thanks to the Vice Chairman who judged the Essays at District level - NE, Mrs. Robert Smith of Lady Huntingdon Chapter, NW, Mrs. William Thones of Atlanta Chapter, SE, Mrs. Elizabeth Moore of John Laurens Chapter, and SW, Mrs. William Scheer of Chehaw Chapter.

AMERICAN INDIANS, Mrs. John K. Bretch

Thank you and appreciation to the 97 Chapters reporting. Programs were given by Chapter members, professors, Park personnel, State Chairmen and a Creek Seminole Indian. Concern of 1 Chapter member, drinking water on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation, contributed toward the well digging project. Free material from Bacone given out, Indian Artifacts on display. Xavier Chapter helped with exhibit "Of Sky and Earth" in the Rotunda of State Capital during Indian Heritage Week. Mrs. J. Henderson was Oothcaloga Chapter docent in restored Rev. Worcester House for "Trail of Tears" 150th Anniversary. Your State Chairman also attended. Contributions by Chapters: \$386.00, General Scholarship - \$182.00, National project Bacone - \$226.00, Bacone Scholarship fund - \$2,206.27, Value Clothing sent - \$9.00, Christmas fund - \$123.50, General fund - 830 labels sent. Best program \$10.00 LaGrange Chapter "Welsh Speaking Indians". Best completed annual report \$10.00 Tomochichi. Two Chapters tied for second place Chapter programs: \$5.00 Joseph Habersham and \$5.00 Oothcaloga Chapter. American Indians have given us much — Our Response — a genuine concern for the Indian Youth to have a quality academic education in a Christian environment. Thank you Madam State Regent for the opportunity to serve on this committee.

CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION, Mrs. Rena S. Morgan This Chairman appreciates her opportunity to serve both the Daughters and the Children of Georgia. The 99 of 109 Chapters reporting announced C.A.R. activities were heard at 98 Chapter meetings, while 18 Chapters keep in touch via C.A.R. magazine subscriptions. Enjoying first hand 53 C.A.R. functions were 127 Daughters. Seventytwo Chapters donated \$531.00 to the State Society, \$600.00 to the National Endowment Fund, and more than \$2,150.00 to local Society activities/projects. We deeply appreciate those who hosted local/State functions, gave programs to the children, provided their transportation, participated in local fund raisers, and shouldered the burden of postage; and are most grateful for the 83 Daughters who are State Patriots, our 46 State Promoters, 9 National Promoters, and 1 National Life Promoter. Twenty-two Chapters sponsor 18 of 20 Societies in our State. Thirteen Chapters secured 43 new C.A.R.s. with another 7 applicants soon to join. One Georgia Daughter serves as a National Officer; 9 as State Officers; 17 as State Chairmen; and 13 as Local Senior Presidents. Four Chapters are attempting to organize new Societies. Of the 22 Chapters who sponsor C.A.R. Societies, Chehaw, Commodore Richard Dale, and Thronateeska Chapters share the honors for Best Overall Support. Best Overall Support provided from among the 87. non-sponsoring Chapters is awarded to Hancock Chapter. Special recognition is awarded to Kettle Creek Chapter, who organized War Hill at Kettle Creek Society with 14 members (in less than 4 months), and to Etowah Chapter, who organized Abraham Musick Society with 11 members.

CONSERVATION, Miss Mary King

Georgia Daughters supported water conservation, reforestation, landscape beautification, aluminum can and newspaper recycling, education of children, protection of wildlife, celebration of special days. Ninty-nine chapters reported. Eight hundred twenty-three thousand nine hundred thirty-eight pine trees, 583 dogwoods, 1,968 other trees, and 13,380

bulbs, flowers and shrubs were planted. One thousand eight hundred fourteen members fed birds, using 38,214 pounds of birdseed and putting up 154 bird houses. One hundred fifty thousand four hundred thirty-two pounds of paper were recycled and many pounds of aluminum cans. Twenty-seven chapters reported programs on conservation. Special projects: Fielding Lewis sold 144 seed wreaths; Xavier's profit from birdseed sales went to purchase grave markers and Atlanta's to purchase flags. Augusta worked on Meadow Garden's grounds; John Franklin Wren maintained a cemetery. St. Andrews Parish participated in a beach sweep; Sergeant Newton in "adopt a road" cleanup. Button Gwinnett had Christmas trees ground for mulch. Nathaniel Macon held contests for recycling newspapers and feeding birds; John Clarke's contest on recycling netted \$101 for Tamassee. Pulaski planted oak seedlings at every school in the county; Nancy Hart, 8 crepe myrtles at Boys Club and beautified Constitution Park; Tallassee, 2 trees at Agrirama on Georgia Day. Sukey Hart, one eight-foot Yoshima cherry at the Air Force Museum; Lyman Hall, a magnolia in park on Arbor Day; Henry Walton, tree on library grounds; Burkhalter, live oak at high school and cherry trees in 2 towns. General Josiah Tatnall gave pine seedlings to children through schools. Let's continue the good work.

CONSTITUTION WEEK, Mrs. Randolph A. Malone, III

Georgia Daughters again distinguished themselves with a National Second Place in their observance of Constitution Week. Four thousand sixty-two inches of publicity made up of 224 articles, 116 pictures and 33 editorials covered the state. On television, 8,687 spot announcements were seen and 11 programs presented which covered more than 23 complete hours of viewing time. One thousand five hundred eighty-two spot announcements were aired on radio and 34 programs were broadcast covering 1,362 minutes. Activity included 37 displays in banks, 17 on billboards, 105 in libraries, 25 on marquees, 6 in museums, 15 in post offices, 196 in schools, and 133 in stores. Constitution Programs were given by 7 Scout troops, 20 service clubs, and 22 women's organizations. One hundred eighty-four churches were most cooperative in printing announcements in bulletins, and 106 ministers gave sermons or portions of sermons on the Constitution and its founding fathers. Twenty-two schools participated in the Chapter Poster Contest, 34 in the Chapter Essay Contest and 36 in the National Essay Contest. Ten thousand seven hundred seventy-seven pieces of patriotic material were obtained and distributed. The major aspect of the celebration was the involvement of thousands of children in 196 schools across the state. They made flags, wrote plays and presented programs. They made placemats for nursing homes, flag cakes to serve at schools, wrote patriotic songs and poems, dressed in colonial costumes, learned the preamble to the Constitution, wrote President Reagan, just to name a few of their endeavors. Constitution Week Essay Contest winner was Julie Rowell of Abraham Baldwin Chapter.

DAR GOOD CITIZENS, Mrs. J. C. Serrato, Jr.

This Chairman received reports from 104 Chapters with 93 Chapters participating in the selection of 249 DAR Good Citizens from the 305 schools contacted. The 4 district winners are from the Southeast, Renee Banks, sponsored by the Vidalia Chapter; Northeast, Andrew Durrence, sponsored by the Edmund Burke Chapter; Northwest, Daniel Budnitz, sponsored by the Baron DeKalb Chapter; and Southwest, Nam K. Cho, sponsored by the 3 Columbus Chapters, George Walton, Oglethorpe and Button Gwinnett. The Georgia Daughters believe in rewarding their winners. One Chapter gave a \$50 savings bond, another started a \$100 Book scholarship and 3 chapters, working together in the same community arranged for a \$400 scholarship for one quarter of study at Columbus College. Each District winner will receive \$25.00 from the State Society and the State winner, Nam K. Cho will receive \$100 and the State Good Citizen pin. Our State winner's entry was sent to the National Southeastern Division for judging where she won Second Place. I would like to thank the District Vice Chairman; Southeast, Mrs. Wesley Ferguson, Northeast, Mrs. James L. Quackenbush, Northwest, Mrs. Richard H. Rice and Southwest, Mrs. Dan Harris for their interest and assistance. Madam State Regent, I would also like to thank you for the privilege and the honor of serving you and the State Society in this capacity.

DAR MAGAZINE, Miss Kay Yarbrough

One hundred percent of Georgia's 109 Chapters reported to the DAR Magazine Committee. Seventy-two Chapters acquired subscriptions of 20% or greater and met the Honor Roll requirement. Two feature articles were submitted to the magazine and 6 articles were submitted to "With the Chapters" section. Mrs. Lawrence Avery of Joseph Habersham Chapter, Mrs. Theodore Whitson of Fort Peachtree Chapter and Mrs. Hoyt Gladney of Oothcaloga Chapter became members of the DAR Magazine Endowment Fund. Winners of the magazine subscription awards were Nathanial Abney Chapter: 53% subscription rate, Oothcaloga Chapters; 50% subscription rate and Captain Thomas Cobb Chapters; 45% subscription rate.

DAR MAGAZINE, Mrs. Theodore C. Whitson

The Georgia State Society is to be commended for its Chapter participation in the DAR Magazine Advertising for 1988. Reports were received from 98 of the 109 Chapters. Seventy-six Chapters participated in the Co-op Ads, 24 Chapters submitted their own Chapter Ads and 2 Chapters sold a total of 8 commercial ads with one Chapter selling 7 of them. Total Georgia revenue was \$7,655.00 for ad space plus \$570.00 for photographs and logos. Included in the Co-op Ads were full pages honoring the new State Officer, Outstanding Junior, Georgia Veteran Daughters and the Georgia State Room of the DAR Museum. Two-thirds page honored the Outstanding Veteran Patient and half pages honored Meadow Garden and the Co-op participating Chapters. Honorable Mention and \$3.00 each goes to Matthew Talbot, John Benson, Fort Peachtree and Peter Early Chapters. DAR MUSEUM, Mrs. Calvin Kammeyer

This chairman is pleased to report she received 101 responses from Georgia Daughters concerning the NSDAR Museum. Ninty-four chapters contributed \$414.00 to the Museum General Fund; 54 chapters contributed \$188.00 to the Curator General's Fund; 32 chapters reported having programs on the Museum; 20 chapters reported purchasing 3 books and contributing \$76.00 to the Museum Reference Library; 24 Arts of Independence: The DAR Museum Collection, were purchased by Georgia chapters; and 200 Museum brochures were distributed to chapters at District Workshops or through the mail. The Augusta Chapter - Miss Marville Lombard, Chairman, is to receive my award of \$10.00 for the most active chapter participation for the Museum. The chapter purchased 12 copies of *The Arts of Independence*. This lovely book tells the story of our Museum and has beautiful pictures of the colleciton. DAR SCHOLARSHIP, Miss K. Pauline Lewis

Seventy-six chapters reported; 18 chapters gave \$58.00 to American History Scholarship; 5 gave \$6.00 to Caroline Holt Nursing Scholarship; 17 gave \$44.00 to the NSDAR Occupational Therapy Scholarship; 1 chapter gave \$1.00 to the Lillian and Arthur Dunn Scholarship (for sons or daughters of DAR members). Three chapters reported local scholarships they started; Augustin Clayton Chapter has a local Jeanette Morrow Lamb Scholarship named in honor of a charter member in 1989. The scholarship is not new but the name is new and is made a matter of record. The value is \$424.00. DAR SCHOOL, Mrs. Jerido Ward

Annual reports were received from 102 chapters. The Hightower Award was presented to 45 chapters with Fort Peachtree and Joseph Habersham honored for largest per capita contributions. Sixty-three chapters had a full program on the schools. Twenty-six thousand three hundred eight labels and 3,300 coupons were sent by 64 chapters and 74 chapters sent 18,630 lbs. of items for resale. Thirteen thousand seven hundred nintyseven dollars and seventy-five cents has been contributed to the Emergency Fire Fund at Tamassee. Cherokee Chapter was presented a certificate for their outstanding contributions to the immediate need at Tamassee. According to records of the State Treasurer, donations totaling \$16,972.51 were sent to DAR Schools. Tamassee received \$9,720.61: KDS \$4,222.00; Berry College, \$1,159.90; Crossnore, \$814.50; Hindman, \$521.50; and Hillside \$534.00. One chapter had a Friends of DAR Schools. Chapters sponsored various activities for students at Tamassee. Activities included: a weiner roast for C.A.R. and all Tamassee students; Christmas gifts; trip to the circus in Atlanta; cookout at Stone Mountain; trip to Disney Ice Skating Follies in Atlanta and a lunch treat at Seneca, S.C. Yarn was sent to Crossnore and one member spent over \$500 in the Weaving House. Special programs included a tour of Berry College; a trip to Tamassee; H. Dean Bare, Administrator of Tamassee, was guest speaker at 2 chapter meetings. Voices were sold for a painting with donations going to the schools. Sincere appreciation is expressed to Mr. and Mrs. W.H. Hightower, Jr. for their continuing support of the Hightower Award. Gratitude is expressed to those who extended their assistance to this chairman.

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERAN-PATIENTS, Mrs. D. Price Eubank Georgia DAR members have been most generous and caring for the Veteran-Patients

in the VA Medical Center, Military Hospitals, Private Hospitals and Nursing Homes. Total hours of volunteer workers in hospitals was 2,458. Gifts of handmade items, Christmas stockings, canteen coupons, food for parties, assorted personal articles, books, recreational games, and many other contributions came from 99 chapters who reported. The total value of all of these services to our Veteran-Patients amounted to \$21,741.66. Many chapters had news stories, talks and celebrated 19 Patriotic Days with interesting programs and parties for the patients. May we continue to enthusiastically support these who have given so much to our Nation's freedom.

FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, Mrs. Gordon Kilgore

Reports were received from 104 chapters - 5 did not report. Over 2,500 flags of all sizes were presented this year. Over 200 flag programs were given at chapter meetings and at other organization meetings. Over 2,800 members reported flying the flag on special days. Over 2,400 pieces of flag literature were given. Many chapters reported working with other organizations to display avenues of Flags in the town. Several chapters have cooperated with the Veterans organizations to place flags on graves, then to take them off afterwards. Chapters have reported special ceremonies to properly dispose of worn flags which have been collected over the towns. There were reports of around 140 corrections to the proper display of the Flag. Chapters have worked with school children in learning the proper way to present the Flag at special programs. One chapter had a flyer put in the local church bulletin together with small flags, asking them to wear these on Constitution Day. There have been proclamations by Mayors on Flag Day. One chapter raised over \$1,600.00 this year from the sale of Flags in the community. Then they used this money to buy and donate flags to every classroom in 2 counties. This chairman has prepared a skit in costume entitled "Betsy Ross and The Flag" which she is presenting not only to DAR chapters but to other organizations.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS, Mrs. Everett E. Porter, Jr.

Honor Roll credit was received by 25 chapters, which submitted 2,694 pages of original source records and indexes to be sent to the DAR Library. This Chairman has photocopied and submitted an additional 2,369 pages of Bible and Misc. Records contained in

7 early volumes of the Georgia Genealogical Records Collection, which were not found in the DAR Library. Chapters contributed \$359 to the National Genealogical Records Binding Fund. The Georgia State Archives in Atlanta, the Washington Memorial Library in Macon, and the Georgia Historical Society Library in Savannah received at total 6,534 pages of new records (8 books each). Numerous libraries received 47,015 pages of duplicate material. Work is underway to index the unindexed volumes of previously submitted volumes of genealogical records housed at the Georgia Archives. Forty-three volumes were indexed this year, bringing the total volumes which have been indexed to 93. Volunteers are working to index about 100 more volumes to complete this project. The completed indexes have been delivered to the Georgia Archives to be bound with the volumes to which they apply. Twenty Bookworm Pins and 7 Bookworm Bars have been earned this year, bringing the total to 38 pins and 11 bars earned through this project. This Chairman is also working to catalog the entire collection and to coordinate it with the Georgia Collection at the DAR Library.

JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZEN, Mrs. Raymond A. Phillips

Eleven Chapters worked on JAC this year, while others donated to the national prize fund. Six chapters were particularly active in the national JAC contest: Thomasville, Baron DeKalb, Atlanta, Oothcaloga, Roswell King and Fort Peachtree. Entries were very impressive. One hundred students will receive state recognition for their work, and I proudly sent 47 student poems, essays, stamp designs, banners, special projects, posters and a community service project on for national judging. Fifty-eight schools or clubs were enrolled this year with a total of 9,257 members. Twenty clubs participated for the first time. Busy chairmen distributed 83 handbooks. Six Thatcher awards were presented. My first prize will go to Thomasville for outstanding work, publicity, and quality of contest entries. Baron DeKalb, with its 5,882 members, is a close second. Special thanks to Oothcaloga for sending me the publicity that I needed. Captain Edward Hagin and Joseph Habersham will split my award for greatest amount sent to the National Prize Fund, and their generosity is appreciated. This committee introduces the DAR to students in a most rewarding manner, and I urge more chapters to participate.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP, Mrs. Robert Wiltshire

Georgia Juniors have had another active and productive year. Junior members hold various positions at all levels: 4 State Chairmen, 5 State Vice-Chairmen, 2 Chapter Regents, 19 Chapter Officers, and 68 Chapter Chairmen. Georgia has won an award on the National level for the most new Juniors in our division, a total of 76 admitted this year. Your Junior members have been involved in many special chapter and state projects. They have hosted teas and luncheons; presented chapter programs; sold flags, tote bags, DAR stationary and jewelry; served as Pages for Workshop, Fall Board, State Conference and Continental Congress. They have contributed much time and effort in support of the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund, raising money within their own chapters, running another successful Junior Bazaar at State Conference and selling voices on an original oil painting, "Flowers of the Field" by Atlanta artist Virginia Veal. Their hard work has produced total contributions of \$1,873.74 for the fund this year. Georgia's Outstanding Junior Member for 1989 is Mrs. Don Allmond of the John Franklin Wren Chapter. We are very proud and excited to have Karen representing our state. This chairman would like to recognize and thank her Vice-Chairman in charge of the Contest, Mrs. Guy H. Miller, for all her hard work and support of this committee. It has been a great honor to serve our State Regent as Junior Membership Chairman.

LINEAGE RESEARCH, Mrs. Enver B. Hoff

The Lineage Research Committee has assisted 703 prospective members in the past year. Sixteen of those have become members and most of the others are still working on papers with hopes of becoming members. Twenty-three chapters held programs on Lineage Research and 6 Workshops are planned for the coming year. The committee will again hold Workshops for any chapter in the state that wishes one and encourages chapters to request assistance.

MEMBERSHIP, Miss Elizabeth Stone

The National Membership theme: "Membership Power: Strengthening the Foundation of Tomorrow's Society" was stressed at District Workshops, Fall Board and Chapter meetings. Chapters throughout the state contacted prospective members (approximate-ly 950) by personal visits and phone calls. Prospective members were invited to Chapter meetings, teas and luncheons. DAR membership literature was distributed. Chapter scrapbooks were put on display in local libraries to tell the DAR story. Newspaper articles and good publicity were used to attract members. DAR went to C.A.R. to get members and their mothers. One Chapter started a "Each Member Get a Good Member" campaign. Of Georgia's 109 chapters, 80 gained new members through application. New Junior members were gained by 42 chapters. Georgia's chapters had 275 new applications approved for membership.

MOTION PICTURE, RADIO AND TELEVISION, Mrs. Erwin N. Kinne

This chairman received 69 chapter reports, 40 forms saying "no report". The best movie for family viewing was "Who Framed Roger Rabbit?"; for adult viewing "Rainman" was chosen. "The Bill Cosby Show" was almost a unanimous choice for the best family TV viewing and "Murder She Wrote" for adult TV viewing. The worst TV programs were all soap operas and "Geraldo". The "Last Temptation of Christ" was voted the worst film. Eighteen chapters had programs or reports using TV. Thirty-eight members appeared on TV for a total of 365 minutes. Ten members were on radio for a total of 60 minutes. Fifteen chapters worked with video equipment. Three chapters sponsored films for special groups. Three hundred thirty-eight letters were written for approval or disapproval of radio, motion picture and TV programs. Fifteen chapters have members active on a motion picture council. One chapter made a monetary contribution and contributed a tape to the NSDAR videotape library. No chapter presented an award to a media for quality programming. This chairman attended the 4 summer Workshops, Fall Board of Management and State Conference. It has been a privilege to serve with our dynamic State Regent.

NATIONAL DEFENSE, Mrs. Donald D. Hankinson

Annual reports were received from 100 chapters: 91 reported a full program on National Defense; 77 studied the 1988 Resolutions; 53 devoted the required 5 minutes to National Defense, 46 allotted 10 minutes or more, one devoted no time. Extra materials were available at the meetings of 54 chapters; 30 distributed materials to schools, 24 to libraries and 46 to interested individuals. Good Citizenship medals were presented to 344 young people. Students in ROTC units received 95 bronze medals, 15 gold medals, a silver tray and a saber. Chapters reported 110 paid subscriptions to the *National* Defender. According to the records of the State Treasurer, \$79.25 was contributed to ROTC Award Program, \$544.00 to Dollars for Defense. Letters were written to members of Congress by 424 individuals, to State Legislators by 368. One thousand nintynine members are personally acquainted with their U.S. Senator and/or Congressman. Seventy-seven chapter chairmen urged members to vote, 53 provided voting assistance. Forty-eight Goergia Daughters hold elective or appointive public office. The budget deficit, education and a state lottery were legislative issues of greatest interest; SDI, education, terrorism, U.S.-Russian relations and drug control were rated as the top 5 National Defense topics. Appreciation is expressed to the following chapters for their contribution of ROTC medals to units in the Atlanta Public School System: Barnard Trail, Brier Creek, Captain Edward Hagen, Hancock, Hightower Trail, John Floyd, LaGrange, Lamar LaFayette, Oliver Morton, Peter Early, Sergeant Newton, Thomasville and Xavier.

PROGRAM, Miss Patricia A. Glenn

Ninty-nine Chapters reported to this chairman, indicating great care and innovative planning by yearbook and program chairmen to attain excellence in preparing and printing yearbooks and supplements. Sixty-one submitted entries in the Correctness of Detail contest, earning 34 Tri-color and 13 Blue Ribbons. Eight Chapters attained the coveted Certificate of Merit for perfect yearbooks. They were: Abraham Baldwin, Augusta, Fort Frederica, Fort Peachtree, Hancock, Hawkinsville, Oliver Morton and College Hill. Winners in the Use in Theme contest were: Cherokee, Fort Peachtree, LaGrange and Augusta (Honorable Mention). Winners in the Cost Conservation in Printing yearbooks were: Fort Peachtree, Burkhalter, Tomochichi and Barnard Trail (Honorable Mention); in Supplementals: Oliver Morton, John Clarke and Captain John Wilson. The Meadow Garden slide program was used every month, and 5 Chapters used the videotape program on Berry Schools, which qualified for Honor Roll credit.

PUBLIC RELATIONS, Mrs. G. Don Allmond

Reports were received from 92 of the 109 Georgia chapters. Members shared the DAR story with their communities through 1,332 printed articles and 492 phogographs for a total of 18, 283 inches. They were responsible for 15 radio programs and 2,414 radio spots for a total of 1,416 minutes. In addition to the radio, they also had 18 television programs and 1,091 television spots for a total of 751 minutes. The Public Relations office at National Headquarters received 47 articles and 28 photographs from 17 chapters. The NSDAR Centennial celebration is now being planned by a reported 26 chapters in varous ways such as teas, media programs, formation of Centennial committees, increasing news, radio and television coverage, planting trees, writing chapter histories, presenting plays, using Century of Service flags and notebook planners, increasing membership with drives and showing the film "A Portrait of a Daughter". This report shows that Georgia daughters have been geographically diversified, and obtained their objectives by giving freely of their time to others with the motto, "God, Home and Country" as their guide. Thank you, Madam State Regent, for the honor and pleasure of serving you and the State Society.

SEIMES MICROFILM CENTER, Mrs. Robert G. Fountain

Reports were received from 100 Chapters with 90 Chapters meeting NSDAR Honor Roll requirement of a gift of \$1.00 or more contributed for Seimes Microfilm Center. Chapters designated \$531.00 be used for National Chairman's Project, 1900 Soundex Index; Equipment \$83.00; not designated \$235.00. Sponsor Chapters (\$25-\$50) Archibald Bulloch, Commodore Richard Dale, John Clarke. Patron Chapters (\$50-\$100) Baron DeKalb. Life Member (\$100 or more) Augustin Clayton in honor of Mary Morris Morgan (Mrs. T.H. Jr.) and Joseph Habersham in honor of Jean Jordan Alday (Mrs. W.). On April 15, 43 Georgia Daughters left by a chartered Greyhound bus bound for the 97th Continental Congress. Joining us at our hotel were 8 Daughters and 2 HODARS. We visited the Amish country in Penn., and toured many historical sites in Washington area. Business meetings, special evening events, many luncheons, and banquets kept us busy the entire week. During August I attended 4 District Workshops encouraging each chapter to sponsor a Safety for Children project. One hundred one chapters have reported to me. Many chapters continue to carpool and safety tips are given at each meeting. First place winner is Fort Peachtree, and second place winner is Elijah Clarke. Thank you Madam Regent for allowing me to serve the State Society in this capacity.

Special National Committees

BED AND BREAKFAST COMMITTEE, Mrs. Dale V. Gaudier

A total of 92 chapters reported to this committee. Nine new homes were added to the list in Georgia this year, bringing the total to 25. There is a need for homes to be listed along the I-95 corridor. There were several inquiries about B&B, including one from out-of-state, although only 2 members have reported using this service this year. My awards go to Fort Early (chapters under 50 members). Nancy Hart (chapters with 51-100 members), and Thomasville (chapters 101+).

BICENTENNIAL OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, Mrs. William D. Wilson

We should never forget the effect the signing of the Constitution has had on every person who has ever lived in the United States. All of that freedom was the second most precious possession of man only to life. The enthusiasm has continued this year. The Chapters will be remembering in April the 200th Anniversary of the Inauguration of George Washington as the first President of the United States of America. Let us remember our obligations to our forefathers who gave us our Constitution, the Bill of Rights, independent Supreme Court, and a Nation of Free Men.

CENTENNIAL JUBILEE, NSDAR, Mrs. Rod E. Scott

The Daughters of the American Revolution is fast approaching its once in a lifetime centennial milestone. Chapters in Georgia are showing a mounting increase in interest in the Centennial Jubilee Celebration. Wherever the Georgia Daughters are gathered one can see more and more Centennial Jubilee pins being worn. The beautiful pin is circular in design with a large blue "C" in the center with red stripes and stars on a white background with the words "A Century of Service" circling the pin. The Centennial Logo also appears on the Centennial Flag and many flags have been purchased for use in decorating and distribution by Georgia chapters. In the Search and Rescue Mission much valuable information is being collected to be added to the history of our organization. Several Georgia chapters have participated in this mission. Twelve chapters this year have subscribed to the Centennial Call magazine. Four chapters have subscribed since 1984. Four chapters have had individual subscriptions among their members. The state organization has subscribed each year since 1984. Twenty-five chapters have ordered items from the Centennial Corner. Twenty-six new Centennial Jubilee pins were purchased during the year. Twenty-one chapters bought the Centennial Planner notebook, an item all chapters should have. Nine chapters contributed a total of \$90.00 to the Centennial Jubilee Honor Roll. One chapter distributed 300 Centennial Jubilee folders, 1 ordered 40 Centennial Jubilee Flags for use in table decorations and distribution. One chapter had Centennial Jubilee minute profiles at each chapter meeting.

DAR MEMBERSHIP COMMISSION, Mrs. Peter S. Hanf

This Committee is continuing efforts to make DAR membership grow. Our aim is for more new members, more new Chapters and stronger Chapters. We are encouraging chapters to increase their membership by having workshops for prospective members and scheduling some of their meetings to accommodate those who cannot attend weekday meetings. As of February 23, 1989, the Registrar's records show there are 7,989 members in the Georgia State Society, 154 of these are listed as Members At Large. Chapters are urged to encourage members to change to this form of membership when they are unable to participate on chapter levels. The 109 chapters report 76 new Juniors.

ELLIS ISLAND RESTORATION, Mrs. Charles E. Beams

Georgia Daughters have "Remembered the Dream" and Ellis Island Restoration. Of the 100 chapters reporting, 8 have contributed \$1,400.00 to THE ANCESTOR WALL OF HONOR — Fielding Lewis being the highest with Captain Thomas Cobb second highest. One hundred twenty-five dollars was given to the general DAR fund. The National Society slide program has been presented twice by this chairman with 2 additional showings scheduled. Two chapters reported showing the slides or holding an Ellis Island program. The slides are available from the national program office for the rental fee of \$6.00. Our National Chairman has asked that we give our best efforts to a final promotion for this national museum. Therefore, you will find "pick-ups" available on a table in the display area. There are 2 press articles and several spot announcements for radio - all you need do is add your chapter's name. Think of the inches of publicity you can report next year! ! ! Time is running out - opening is scheduled for Fall 1989. DAR has supported Ellis Island since 1921 - let us follow through now and become a part of a new era by placing an ancestor's name on THE WALL OF HONOR. Borrowing funds from the State Dues Fund has been previously established when needed for State Projects. A Resolution authorizing borrowing funds to make the necessary repairs was prepared.

The Georgia Members of NSDAR with faithful work and generosity are producing a display of our Revolutionary activities for all to see. More is to be done and the search goes on for 18th Century relics as mentioned in the inventory. This year 79 chapters contributed to the fund. A 1747 Signature Wine Bottle has been given by the General James Jackson Chapter DAR at an enormous purchase price. The State chairman thanks the chapters for their fine reports.

MARKING REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIER'S GRAVES AND RESTORING HISTORIC SPOTS, Mrs. Charles H. Hickman

Bainbridge Chapter is getting credit this year for marking the graves of Revolutionary War soldiers Jacob Harrell, Thomas Fain and Zoath Spoon. Brunswick Chapter marked the grave of William Page; Elijah Clarke Chapter, Captain John Miller; John Laurens Chapter, Lt. Charles Jackson. Elijah Clarke Chapter marked the grave of Jane Fleming Ash, wife of Revolutionary War soldier William Ash; Mary Clarke Mackie, wife of a Revolutionary War soldier, Rachel Ramsey, wife of Revolutionary War soldier James Ramsey. Augustin Clayton Chapter marked the grave of Revolutionary War soldier J. Robert Selfridge, and this marker notes the grave of his wife, Agnes (Nancy) Posey Selfridge. The graves of the following daughters of Revolutionary War soldiers were marked; Benjamin Hawkins Chapter, Susan H. Douglas, daughter of William Pearman; Bainbridge Chapter, Judith Woodson Swann Allen, daughter of Revolutionary War soldier Joseph Woodson; Harriet Nevile Camles Swann, daughter of Lt. William Camles. All graves that have been located have not been marked. The meeting was called to order at 11:10 a.m. The invocation was given by Landscaping chairman, Mrs. Luther L. Watson. Others in attendance were: Mrs. Donald D. Hankinson, Mrs. Roy H. Cagle, Jr., Mrs. Joseph J. Burroughs, Mrs. James H. Elliott, Jr., Mrs. Theodore P. deTreville, Mrs. Harold Starr Smith, Mrs. Robert Hoverkamp and ex-officio member Mrs. Jerido Ward.

Standing rule #7 was read by the First Vice Regent and the chairman declared that Mrs. Hankinson would serve as Secretary of the Board.

Minutes of the March 9, 1988 meeting were read and approved as corrected.

Susan Tucker, Gift Shop chairman, announced that sales tax is now charged on all items.

Resident Manager, Richard Wilson reported that maintenance of the grounds is being done on a regular basis. Income realized from tours and gift shop sales for the first five months of 1988 totaled \$896.11. The monthly totals were: January - \$29.00 tours, \$11.04 sales; February - \$21.00 tours, \$23.75 sales; March - \$93.50 tours, \$41.94 sales; April - \$229.00 tours, \$71.60 sales; May - \$194.50 tours, \$180.78 sales.

The summary statement of assets was distributed and discussed. (copy is attached). Mrs. Cagle, Meadow Garden chairman, stated that estimates of \$500-525 and \$700-725 were submitted for installing the stove, water heater and furnace in the resident manager's cottage.

On the motion of Mrs. Hovenkamp, it was moved and seconded that: (1) the new gas appliances (stove and water heater) be returned to the companies from which they were purchased. (2) the Meadow Garden chairman should contact the gas company about their appliance purchase and installation policy before restarting the purchasing process. (3) after estimates and information have been obtained, the State Regent and Meadow Garden chairman should select the most appropriate course of action. Adopted.

A donation of ammonium nitrate has been obtained. To assure that it is handled properly, the chairman and/or vice chairman will oversee all applications and will be responsible for its safe keeping.

It is believed that the water leak has been fixed.

Mrs. Cagle reported that income realized from the May 1st WACG Spring Canal Canoe Cruise was reflected in Mr. Wilson's May figures. Security procedures and cleanup arrangements made by the sponsor were adequate.

Board approval was given for Meadow Garden to be a part of the 1989 Spring Canal Canoe Cruise.

It is estimated that the cost of building an enclosure for the water heater at the rear of the cottage will be \$50. Donated materials will be used whenever possible.

An effort will be made to train the Cherokee roses to grow down the fence. Canes will be woven in and out of the fence links, the tops of the bushes will be sheared even with the top of the fence.

Many floor boards on the front porch are very thin, a portion of the east front corner column and east bannister need repair, and the porch floor needs to be painted.

On the motion of Mrs. Watson, it was moved and seconded that the front porch be repaired as follows: (1) sturdy boards should be taken from both sides of the porch and used to repair the older side. (2) pressurized treated boards should be purchased for the newer side. (3) all necessary repairs should be made to the steps, columns and bannisters. (4) two coats of floor and deck enamel should be applied to both the front and back porches and steps. (5) for better visibility a contrasting color (white or yellow) should

be applied to the top board and step separating the two levels of the porch. (6) for safety a sturdy colored rope should be attached above the porch step-down. Adopted.

The Meadow Garden vice chairman will remove the maple growing in the corner of the arbor.

A thank you note from Jeannie C. Allen, Marketing Department, WACG Radio was read by Mrs. Cagle.

On the motion of Mrs. Smith, it was moved and seconded that all organizations who use Meadow Garden for civic functions should be told that the Georgia State Society, NSDAR owns the property and that this ownership should appear in all publicity. Adopted.

Furnishings chairman, Mrs. Elliott stated that 5 recently acquired silver spoons will be placed in a shadow box to match those previously mounted.

On the motion of Mrs. Cagle, it was moved and seconded that whenever a suitable bed for the Walton bedroom is found the Furnishings chairman and the State Regent should purchase it. Adopted.

On the motion of Mrs. Elliott, it was moved and seconded that the furniture in the "Victorian bedroom" be re-upholstered in appropriate fabric with money to come from the Furnishings fund. Adopted.

As a means of encouraging greater participation, Mrs. deTreville, Docents chairman, would like to hold a training session for new docents.

Mrs. Watson will place rosemary and sage in the perennial bed.

The Secretary will gather all approved policy statements and will make them available to members of the Board.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 1:00 p.m.

Bylaws

BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I

NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II

OBJECTS

The objects of the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution shall be: to promote the aims set forth in the Bylaws of the National Society, the preservation of the memory of its Revolutionary patriots; the study of its history; the education of its youth in patriotic ideals and in the duties of citizenship.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All Chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of this organization.

Article IV OFFICERS

The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Curator. The State Regent shall appoint a Parlimentarian who shall act as adviser in matters pertaining to parlimentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting.

Article V

ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected at the annual State Conference biennially.

Section 2. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for three years or until their successors are elected. Their term of office shall begin at the close of Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and of the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Proviso: This amendment shall not go into effect until the election of state officers in 1992.

Section 3. No member shall be eligible to a State office until she has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years. No member shall be eligible to the same State office for two successive terms. A member having served more than one-half term in the State office shall be deemed to have served a term. Any member holding active membership in a Chapter in the Georgia State Society shall be eligible to hold a State office, provided she has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years.

Section 4. Nomination of candidates for office shall be from the floor. The election shall be held by ballot. A majority of the votes cast by the voting members of the State Conference shall elect.

Section 5. Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become acting First Vice Regent, subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. A vacancy in any other State office between annual meetings shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next Fall Board of Management or State Conference, whichever shall come first. Any State Officer, who is absent from the State for a continous period of six months or longer, automatically relinquishes her position as a State officer.

Section 6. No two State officers shall be members of the same Chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

Section 7. In recognition of valuable service to the organization, any State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Section 8. A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot. The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than fifteen months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

Section 9. On the election of State Regent, and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Recording Secretary General. The endorsement of a candidate for Vice President General shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent to the Recording Secretary General at least two weeks prior to Continental Congress.

Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, of the State Board of Management, and of the Executive Committee. She shall appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees.

Section 2. In the absence of the State Regent from any meeting of the State Conference, or the State Board of Management, the State First Vice Regent, or in her absence, the State Second Vice Regent, shall perform the duties of thje State Regent. The State First and Second Vice Regents may be assigned to direct committees and to perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent.

Section 3. The State Chaplain shall open all meetings of the State Conference and of the State Board of Managment with Scripture reading and prayer and shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require. She shall preside at the Memorial Service during State conference and shall be responsible for In Memoriam pages in the Proceedings.

Section 4. The State Recording Secretary shall record the proceedings of the State Conference and of meetings of State Board of Management and of the Executive Committee. She shall compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and of the Proceedings Committee.

Section 5. The State Corresponding Secretary shall conduct correspondence and send notices in behalf of the State Conference, the State Regent, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as directed by them.

Section 6. The State Treasurer shall be the custodian of the funds of the State Society. She shall receive the State Conference dues and registration fees from the Chapters and shall receive all sums contributed by the Chapters for State and National projects. All monies received by the State Treasurer shall be placed only in institutions with accounts covered by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation or by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation, and the amount in any one institution shall not exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage. She shall disburse such sums only when authorized by the State Regent in writing. The State Treasurer shall keep an account of all sums received or paid out and shall keep receipts for all payments. She shall prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference. Her books shall be audited annually by a Certified Public Account. She shall be ex-officio a member of the Credentials Committee.

Section 7. The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new Chapters.

Section 8. The State Registrar shall, when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, who live in towns and counties where there are no Chapters, to prove eligibility, and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars in verifying lineage papers. She shall keep a correct list of all members in the State and shall make a report on membership to the State Conference.

Section 9. The State Historian shall be in charge of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General. She shall keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves in the State and shall prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General to Smithsonian Institution. She shall encourage the compilation and publication of County Histories and other unpublished records, especially those of the Revolutionary period.

Section 10. The State Librarian shall collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing duplicates wherever possible, in the NSDAR Library and in the Georgia DAR Collections in the State Department of Archives and History. She shall endeavor to obtain the books on the wanted list of the Librarian General for the Georgia Section in the NSDAR Library and is authorized to solicit contributions from the Chapters for the purchase of the same. She shall have custody and supervision of the DAR Genealogical and Historical Collections of the State Department of Archives and History.

Section 11. The State Curator shall receive and be responsible for all gifts of Revolutionary relics to the Museum of the National Society. Daughters of the American Revolution. She shall be custodian of the conference properties and shall have them properly stored, insured and made ready for use at State Conference.

Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. The Georgia State Society shall hold an annual State Conference between the first day of February and the time of the meeting of the Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week. The Executive Committee shall fix the time and place of meetings when not fixed by the Conference in session, or when for any reason it may be impractical to meet at the time or place fixed by the Conference.

Section 2. The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credentials blanks to the Chapters not less than sixty days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 3. The voting members of the State Conference shall be State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regent or alterinate, and the delegates or their alternates from the Chapters of the state that are entitled to representations at the Continental Congress. The number of representative from each Chapter shall be determined by the rules for representation of Chapters in the Continental Congress as given in the National Bylaws.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a Chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the Chapter, except in the case of the Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at an annual State Conference, shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any Chapter in the State of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference the privileges of the floor shall be accorded to the State Chairmen with the exception that they may not vote unless they are duly elected delegates or their alternates from their respective chapters.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State conference may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committe. Fifteen days notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Twenty-five voting members, representing not less than ten Chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII

STATE DUES AND CONFERENCE FEES

Section 1. The annual dues of Chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be four dollars for each member of the Chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1. A minimum of \$1.83 shall be used to cover all State per capita assessments, and the balance shall be allocated to the General State Dues Fund. No Chapter shall be entitled to representation at the annual State Conference until the States dues are paid.

Section 2. The Finance Committee, appointed by the State Regent, shall be composed of seven members, to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two Honorary State Regents, one active Chapter Regent and one active Chapter member. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund.

Section 3. Each Chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State Dues, a Conference registration fee of \$3.00 for each voter to which the Chapter is entitled under the Bylaws, this fee to be paid whether represented or not.

Section 4. State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$3.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Others members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference fee at the time of registration.

Article IX EXPENSES

Section 1. Two thousand dollars (\$2,000) shall be taken each year from the State Dues Fund, to be used by the State Regent in defraying her necessary travel expenses.

Secton 2. Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent shall be paid by the State Treasurer from the State Dues Fund.

Article X

STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section I. The State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Regents, in their absence, the First Vice Regent of the Chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the Fall, following the regular meeting of the National Board. It may meet whenever called by the State Regent.

Section 3/Ten members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference.

Section 5 State Chairmen, Vice Chairmen and Committee Members of National and Standing Committees shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privileges of the floor, but may not vote. Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article XI EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute an Executive Committee. The Parliamentarian, at the request of the Sate Regent, attends the meetings of the Executive Committee, but may not vote. This Committee performs such duties of the Board between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient. The Executive Committee shall meet the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three members of the Committee. It shall make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Mangement.

Article XII CHAPTERS

Section 1. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April. The Chapter Regent shall report the names of the elected officers promptly, on triplicate blanks provided by the State Regent for this purpose, to the Organizing Secretary General, to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary.

Section 2. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent for use in compiling her report, not less than fifteen days before the opening of the annual State Conference. The official Chapter report, not to exceed 250 words in length, for publication in the Proceedings shall be furnished the State Recording Secretary before the State Conference.

Article XIII AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent and to the Parliamentarian. The State Regent shall send a copy to each Chapter, at least sixty days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law for the State Conference in matters not covered by the Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21.) No conference was held in 1911; the time of meeting having been changed from

the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912"; amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, p. 211.)

BYLAWS

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National and State Bylaws.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS

Notice of change of address of members shall be sent to the Organizing Secretary General, Treasurer General, State Regent and State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHANGE OF NAME

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to State Registrar, Treasurer General and State Regent by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHAPTER ELECTIONS

As soon as Chapter elections are held, names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, Administration Building, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D.C., 20006 to the State Regent or State Regent-Elect and to the Recording Secretary by May 1st. The full Christian name of Chapter officers shall be given together with her husband's given name or initials, address, zip code and telephone number. A Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years. This being added in order for our Bylaws to conform to the National Bylaws.

DUES

Pay to State Treasurer State Dues of \$4.00 per member before December 1. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the February 1 and two April Board meetings of the National Society. National Dues of \$15.00 per member sent to the Treasurer-General, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20006 before December 1, 1989.

CONFERENCE REGISTRATION FEE

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer with the State dues on or before December 1, \$3.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether represented or not.

Rules for representation of chapters at Continental Congress:

"Chapters having less than 50 paid members on February 1 are entitled to be represented by the Regent or in her absence the Vice Regent or alternate; chapters having 50 to 199 paid members on February 1, one delegate in addition to the Regent; chapters having 200 to 299 paid members on February 1, two delegates in addition to the Regent, and for each additional 100 members one additional delegate." (Article XIII, Section 3-C, National Bylaws).

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$3.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. (Article VIII, Section 4, of the State Bylaws).

CONTRIBUTIONS

ALL contributions by Chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

DECEASED MEMBERS

Deaths shall be reported promptly to Treasurer General, State Chaplain and State Registrar by the Corresponding Chapter Officer. Complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and a date of death shall be furnished State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for Conference Memorial Service pages for State Proceedings.

GEORGIA HOSPITALITY FUND

The following resolution which applies to the Georgia Hospitality Fund appears in the Proceedings for 1955:

"WHEREAS, The Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds a social event in Washington during Continental Congress which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society.

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$300.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes:

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this fund shall not be cumulative." Adopted.

PROCEDURE BOOK OF INSTRUCTIONS FOR OFFICERS AND STATE CHAIRMEN

The following resolution which applies to a Procedure Book of Instruction for Officers and State Chairmen appears in the Proceedings for 1959-60, Page 41.

"RESOLVED, That all Officers and State Chairmen keep a Procedure Book of Instructions and helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new Officers and Chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities thus providing a continuing continuity of DAR work." Adopted.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS

To insure uniformity and convenience in binding, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, $8\frac{1}{2}$ x11 inches, with $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 inch margin on left side, $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches at top and 1 inch on right side and at bottom. Four copies shall be sent to State Chairman of Genealogical Records.

INFORMATION FOR CHAPTER REGENTS

1. All letters received by Chapter Regents relating to the work of the Society shall be distributed to the corresponding Chapter Chairman and brought to the attention of the members at a chapter meeting.

2. Please follow Resolution No. 11, adopted at 61st Georgia Society State Conference, as follows: "Resolved, That a closing date of February 1 be established for all reports, and all reports be given from February 1 to February 1, regardless of a change of regime or Regent." All awards will be made on this date basis.

INFORMATION FOR STATE OFFICERS AND STATE CHAIRMEN

State Officers and State Chairmen shall send to the State Regent and to the State Treasurer a copy of any instruction letter mailed to chapters.

NEW ADMINISTRATION RESERVE FOR CONTINGENCIES FUND

For the entire resolution setting up the "General New Regime Fund Balance of \$2,500.00," found on pp. 203-204 of the 1979 Proceedings the following substitute resolution was adopted by the 88th State Conference: RESOLVED that at the end of each administration \$6,000.00 be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies" fund, this money to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration, and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration. All other surplus monies in the General Fund, other than funds which are designated, are to be divided equally between the General Savings Account and the Meadow Garden Capital Investment Fund as provided in the Capital Investment Fund Resolution passed in 1979 (pp. 62-63, 1979 Proceedings). This transaction is to be handled by April 30 every two years before the auditors close out the books of an administration, thus making the General Fund show the same balance of \$6,000.00 at the beginning of each new administration. (This fund is to be known as "New Administration Reserve for Contingencies Fund.") Adopted.

NOMINATIONS

The following resolution which applies to the announcement of the candidacy for State Regent appears in the Proceedings of the Twentieth State Conference, 1918:

"Resolved, that it is the judgment of the Executive Board that announcements for State Regent should not be made . . . earlier than three months prior to the meeting of the conference and they shall be furnished to the Press for publication."

A standard HEADING of ALL reports must conform to the Headings found in the Proceedings and must start at least 1½ inches from top of sheet of paper. Leave 1 inch between bottom of Headings and start of report. LEFT MARGIN of report must be 1 inch minimum. Please check previous Proceedings for correct heading. Entire report should consist of ONE PARAGRAPH. Winners of awards of State Officers and State Chairmen shall be listed on a SEPARATE sheet of paper. State Officers and State Chairmen send to the State Recording Secretary and the State Regent, the awards to be given next year on a SEPARATE sheet of paper — exactly as it is printed in the Proceedings.

Numerals shall be used throughout the report with the exception of the beginning of a sentence.

DATE FOR ANNUAL AUDIT

WHEREAS, every effort must be made to have all material to the printer as early as possible to facilitate delivery of the Proceedings to the members.

RESOLVED: That the end of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, fiscal year for audit purposes be changed from May 31st to April 30th.

ABSOLUTE DEADLINE FOR PROCEEDINGS MATERIAL

WHEREAS, a definite deadline must be established and adhered to for all reports and material to be in the hands of the Proceedings Committee in order to be delivered to the Printer by June 1st.

RESOLVED: That all FINAL reports and materials must be received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1st with the exception of the Auditor's report and any information sent out by the National DAR Headquarters. This does not alter the requirement in the "Items of Information" in the Proceedings that all reports shall be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary on or before February 15th, the ORIGINAL being sent to the Secretary for the Proceedings.

AND FURTHER RESOLVED: This policy will be strictly adhered to and the material not received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1st will be omitted from the Proceedings.

REAFFIRMATION

RESOLVED: That the Georgia State Society reaffirm the following Resolution adopted at the Fall Board of Management in Albany, October 23, 1981, which reads as follows: "Presentation of Awards" WHEREAS, all awards are given by State Officers and State Chairmen; and WHEREAS, February 1st is the closing date of all work for said awards; BE IT RESOLVED: That no State Officer nor State Chairman may present her report or award(s) at State Conference unless said report, with list of award(s) is in the hands of the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary at least ten (10) days before State Conference.

If a chapter fails to achieve Gold Honor Roll any year, all stars are lost as they are awarded for consecutive achievement. MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING March 9, 1989

Georgia State Society Children of the American Revolution 1988 - 1989

It is indeed my pleasure to report the work of the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Children of the American Revolution for the year 1988-1989. The State President, John Ethan Boyes, chose as his theme "EXCEED THE LIMITS," a goal-surpassing challenge which each Georgia Society met with enthusiasm and vigor. Working in hand with the National Society, the State President began a program that would both inspire us at the State level, and would foster support of the National President's theme, "WAKE UP, AMERICA; TIME FOR C.A.R."

The State President, along with this Senior State President, was honored to represent Georgia's 400+ C.A.R. members and Senior leaders at a reception honoring the State Regent, Mrs. James J. Muldrow, and her Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. C. Howard Evans, in June. Held at Glen Mary Plantation near Sparta, this event provided an excellent opportunity for our youth and DAR members to get to know and appreciate each other.

C.A.R. participation in the DAR District Workshop tour also enhanced the relationship between the 2 organizations. We sincerely thank the State Regent, Mrs. Muldrow, for providing us the opportunity to bring the C.A.R. message to Daughters during the luncheon skit entitled, "Wake up!! It's time for C.A.R.!" The skit depicted a C.A.R. member's dream about the potential loss of a local Society due to the lack of Senior leadership and a visit with the "Pin People"; it ended on an up note as the member dreamed of a solution to the Society's problem, only to be awakened by the announcement of an impending C.A.R. meeting. Many thanks are expressed also to the DAR and C.A.R. members who participated in the skit in each of the 4 Districts, and to the DAR who then, and since, have been so complimentary of the children.

The Southeastern Regional meeting of the N.S.C.A.R. and Georgia C.A.R.'s own State Workshop were also held during the summer months. We were indeed proud that 2 Georgians, Miss Holli Kay Oakley of the Gwinnett Society, Snellville, and Mrs. R. Clough Carter of the Winona Society, Waycross, presided over the Southeastern Regional meeting as the National Vice Presidents, member and Senior respectively, of the Region. The Regional was held July 8th and 9th in Fort Meyers, Florida, home of the National President, Donald J. E. Molloy. Twenty-six members and 18 Seniors made the journey to Florida, and enjoyed immensely the program presentations of the National Officers and Chairmen, the tour of Thomas A. Edison's summer home, and the social gatherings at the Senior meetings and reception, the member pool party, and the Regional banquet and dance.

Thronateeska Society hosted our 1988 Georgia State Workshop the weekend of July 22nd and 23rd in Albany. Our State officers and Chairmen presented their programs and contests to 66 members and Senior leaders. Meetings of the State and Senior State Boards of Management were held, and everyone delighted in the tour of the Thronateeska Heritage Museum. The Saturday evening banquet featured the reports of local Society Presidents and their plans for "Exceeding the Limits." The highlight of Workshop however was the Toga Party, and the appearance of our special guest, State Regent Mrs. James J. Muldrow, in her finest Greek revival regalia. Our deepest appreciation is expressed to the Thronateeska Society, and to its sponsoring DAR Chapters of Chehaw, Commodore Richard Dale and Thronateeska, for a most rewarding and pleasurable weekend.

Twenty-seven members and Seniors of the State Society visited Cherokee, N.C., in August. Together, we viewed the outdoor drama, "Unto These Hills," and toured the Oconaluftee Indian Village. In September, the State Society, along with Gwinnett Society and its sponsor, Philadelphia Winn Chapter, hosted the first Tamassee-C.A.R. Olympics on the campus of the Tamassee DAR School. Though the day dawned rainy and overcast, nearly 100 students, faculty, C.A.R. members and Senior leaders turned out for fun and games, which included three-legged races, tug-o-war, balloon tosses, and a wiener roast. Great fun was had by all! Almost immediately, plans for the coming year's event were begun, and we hope we have initiated an annual gathering that will grow to include C.A.R. in all the surrounding states.

The State's final meeting before State Conference, our annual Government Studies Seminar, was held on December 10th at the Holiday Inn in Macon. Prior to the meeting, a joint session of the State Boards of Management was convened. Forty-six members and Seniors were then enthralled by our guest speaker, Mr. Joe Mizereck, who delivered a rousing dissertation on civic responsibility. Mr. Mizereck is Executive Director of the Southern Scholarship Foundation, and serves on the Bicentennial of the United States Constitution Commission at the Regional level, in the State of Florida, and in Leon and Pinellas Counties. A mock election for President of the United States was also held after speeches by the candidates Harold Higginbotham (aka Ethan Boyes) and Patrick Schaeffer (aka Chris White) were heard.

Visits with the local Societies were a definite highlight of the year. These visits provide an excellent sample of the programs undertaken at the local Society level, including the study of immigration and the writing of the Constitution at the Cobb County Youth Museum attended by the Allen Howard, Gwinnett, Lucy Spell Raiford and The Glass Brothers Societies; Conservation studies at the Okefenokee Swamp with the Brunswick and Winona Societies, and at the Chehaw Wild Animal Park with the Thronateeska and General David Blackshear Societies; an American Indian program and Tour of the Tullie Smith House with The Glass Brothers Society; a visit to the Weiman Mineral Museum with the Abraham Musick Society; wreath-layings at 5 Revolutionary Soldiers' graves on Armed Forces Day with Gwinnett Society; a joint DAR, SAR and C.A.R. dinner with the Uchee Trail Society; and an update on computerization during a tour of the IBM Tower with the Cherokee Rose Society. Of major importance was attendance at the organizational meetings of 2 new Georgia C.A.R. Societies — Abraham Musick Society in Cartersville and the War Hill at Kettle Creek Society in Washington.

To recant the efforts of each Society in Georgia would indeed reassure the reader that the future of our country, as well as the adult organizations of DAR and SAR, is in good hands with these our children, but alas the demands of space require that only their collective accomplishments be reported. Cash contributions by the Children included \$207.00 to Tamassee DAR School, \$78.00 to KDS, and \$74.00 to Crossnore; \$49.00 to American Indians via Bacone College; \$58.50 to the National C.A.R. Museum; \$29.00 toward the Equipment and Maintenance fund: \$54.00 toward the National Magazine Fund: \$4.00 toward maintenance of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier of the American Revolution: \$34.00 to the Book Binding fund: \$18.25 to the National Endowment fund; and \$250.00 toward the National Computerization Project. In addition, 6 Endowment Fund pins were purchased, and 11 State Officer pins were procured for rotational use. Although 43 new members were obtained, Georgia had a net loss of 21 members, bringing the state-wide total to 399. One member joined DAR this year. The Children actively pursued the support of the adult organizations securing 106 State Patriots, 51 State Promoters and 14 National Promoters. The financial backing of these groups continues to be a blessing, as more than \$2,250.00 was contributed directly to local Society work. The Georgia DAR Chapters contributed \$531.00 to the State Society.

These accomplishments, and others, were celebrated at our Fiftieth Annual State Conference, held February 17-19, 1989 at the Peachtree Corners Marriott in Norcross. With a theme of "Georgia C.A.R. - Past, Present and Future," the Conference opened on Friday evening with attendees dressed in 1938 style to hear campaign speeches of slated candidates from aback a train caboose constructed for the event. Following Board meetings and get-acquainted parties, the guests retired, and awoke in the "present" for the Saturday session, which featured reports of the State Officers, State Chairmen, and local Society Presidents on their year's work. Lunch was box-style aboard buses as the conventioneers headed for the Georgia State Capitol, Rave reviews were heard for the tour and for our guide, Mrs. Dorothy Olson, who served as our hostess for the afternoon. Our State Memorial service was also held at this time in the rotunda of the Capitol. The excitement mounted as the hour for the Awards Banquet approached. Jay Lyles of the Uchee Trail Society, Cochran, and Mrs. R. Clough Carter of the Winona Society, Waycross, were named the Outstanding Member and Senior for the year. Some 120 other awards were presented, and 7 of Georgia's 20 Societies attained State Standard of Excellence awards. New State Officers, excluding the President-elect, were installed, and are listed in advance of this report. The Banquet closed as State President, John Ethan Boyes, brought the audience to tears and its feet with his farewell address. The members and adults then enjoyed a look into the future as members dressed in "2038" costumes attended the State President's Ball. It was indeed a most memorable Golden Anniversary. Many thanks to the Gwinnett Society and its Senior President, Mrs. J.H. Morgan, for all their hard work as our hosts, and to Philadelphia Winn Chapter, their sponsors, for their support. Also, our appreciation is extended to the many special guests who joined in making our "big 5-0" so enjoyable, including Miss Elizabeth Anne Jones, National First Vice President N.S.C.A.R.; Mrs. Howard E. Byrne, Senior National President N.S.C.A.R.; Mrs. James J. Muldrow, State Regent GSDAR; and, Mr. Andrew S. Davis, President, Georgia State Society SAR.

Again, the State and Senior State Presidents were honored to represent Georgia C.A.R. as guests of the State Regent at the Opening Banquet and Business Session of the Georgia DAR State Conference in Albany. The State Président, John Ethan Boyes, brought greetings to the Daughters and thanked them for their continuing support of the State's children. We are also gratified that many of our C.A.R. girls served as Pages at this

event. Shortly thereafter, the State President-elect, Alida Stancil, the Senior State President, and 2 other C.A.R. members traveled to Columbia, S.C., for South Carolina's C.A.R. State Conference.

April brought National C.A.R. Convention and a special night with the Daughters during Continental Congress. Arriving on Thursday evening, April 20th, 27 members and Seniors from Georgia were among the guests of the President General, Mrs. Raymond F. Fleck, for this session of Continental Congress. The State President, Mr. John Ethan Boyes, was a guest in the Georgia box at the invitation of the State Regent. All delighted in the presentation of the C.A.R. National officers, the special tribute to Mrs. David D. Porter, retiring Executive Secretary, and the spirited musical entertainment. The slide review of the President General's term in office was also very interesting.

On Friday, April 21st, the Children's Convention began in earnest. Many Georgians helped to ensure a wonderful convention by their work on various Convention committees, including Mrs. Rena Morgan, Senior Chairman-Credentials; Mrs. R.E. Scott, Credentials; John Ethan Boyes, Chairman-Election Posters; Christopher C. White, Chairman-Publicity; Mrs. W. Frank Chastain, Senior Vice Chairman-Tellers; Mrs. Spencer Closson, Mrs. Dale Gaudier, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Moore, and Mr. W. Dorsey Stancil, Tellers; Mardi Senn, Timekeeper; Mr. Robert Moore, Usher; and, Stacey Morgan, Nominating Committee. John Ethan Boyes, Jay Lyles, Arian McCullough, Holli Oakley, and Chris White sang in the All State Chorus. Battle Betts, Ethan Boyes and Jay Lyles served as Color Bearers, and Emily Stancil served as a Page.

The Friday evening session featured the reports of National Chairmen, and included that of Christopher White of Brunswick Society, National Publicity Chairman. Also given were campaign speeches by the National Candidates which included Arian McCullough (National Recording Secretary) and Holli Oakley (National Treasurer).

Saturday's session contained the reports of National Officers, among them Miss Holli Kay Oakley, National Vice President of the Southeastern Region. The reports of the State Presidents followed, and all 27 Georgians attending were indeed proud to stand with John Ethan Boyes as he delivered his last official message as State President. Elections were also held on Saturday, and we are most pleased to announce Miss Holli Kay Oakley successfully competed for the office of National Treasurer. Saturday evening's agenda featured the National Awards Banquet, and again, Georgia was well-represented among the winners with the State Society garnering a first place award for the largest number of State, National and Life Promoters, and with 3 awards to individual local Societies including 2nd place in National Heritage for The Glass Brothers Society; Gold National Merit Awards for Thronateeska and The Glass Brothers Societies; Blue National Merit Award for Gwinnett Society. A Blue ribbon was also awarded John Ethan Boyes for his compliance with the State Presidents Activity Guidelines.

The National Memorial Service was held at the Old Presbyterian Meeting House in Alexandria, Virginia, followed by a wreath-laying at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier of the American Revolution in the churchyard. It was then time to say good-bye to another C.A.R. year and to C.A.R. friends as we headed home to Georgia.
