Sarah May Yarbrough, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. John B. May, was born in Circleville, Ohio, October 16, 1885. She died September 5, 1989 in Milledgeville, Georgia. She and Dr. Young Harris Yarbrough were married in 1911. They settled in Milledgeville where Dr. Yarbrough had charge of the Central State Hospital.

In 1924 Mrs. Yarbrough became a member of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution through the Nancy Hart Chapter. She served as Registrar, Treasurer and Regent. She also held various chapter chairmanships. On the state level she served as Librarian, Historian, Consulting Registrar, Organizing Secretary, First Vice Regent and Regent. She was elected Vice President General, NSDAR, from Georgia in 1951. She continued as an active member up to the last days of her life. Her knowledge of genealogy was remarkable, not only her own, but of the many friends she aided in establishing their ancestors' Revolutionary War services. Other than her devotion to DAR, which came first, she was active in civic affairs as a leader.

"Miss Sarah", as she was affectionately known, was loved, respected and honored by many.



Mrs. Muldrow read a statement from the President General, NSDAR, concerning the rental 50 years ago of Constitution Hall to Marion Anderson, the negro vocalist. This statement explains the laws of Washington, D.C. at the time and the NSDAR's policies, then and now.

Dr. Jessie Mize, Chairman of Conference Credentials, gave the first credentials report. She reported 149 registered establishing a quorum.

The State Regent asked for ratification of the appointment of Mrs. Charles W. Ennis to fill the vacancy of the office of State Corresponding Secretary created by the resignation of Mrs. C. Howard Evans. Ratification was by unanimous vote of the assembly and Mrs. Ennis will serve until the next State Conference.

Mrs. Muldrow introduced Mrs. J. L. R. Boyd and Mrs. Gilbert R. Frith, Timekeepers for the meeting. State Officers are allowed 3 minutes to report and State Chairmen are allowed 2 minutes.

The State First Vice Regent, Mrs. Donald D. Hankinson, took the Chair while the State Regent reported. Mrs. Muldrow thanked all for the honor of serving as State Regent and she thanked the Honorary State Regents, officers, chairmen, regents and members for their support and advice. She reported visits with 17 chapters. On June 14 while visiting with the Brunswick area chapters, Mrs. Muldrow presented an American Flag won by our State Society at the last Continental Congress to Mr. Mark Rushlow, Director of Support Services of Youth State in Brunswick. This organization provides treatment for troubled boys. At the last State Conference, the State Regent was directed, by Resolution, to request the Washington Memorial Library, in Macon, to release all NSDAR lineage papers, and copies, in its possession and to report to the Board of Management the completion of this task. All papers have been retrieved and placed in the hands of the Registrar General, NSDAR. Mrs. Muldrow reported District Workshops very well attended with 599 members participating. She has attended all meetings of the National Board of Management, Graduation and Honors Day at Kate Duncan Smith, the October Board Meeting at KDS and the October and May Board Meetings at Tamassee. She is working on plans for the 1990 State Conference at Jekyll Island, has presided at Meadow Garden Board meetings in Augusta and attended a Finance meeting in Columbus. Mrs. Muldrow regretfully reported the deaths of 2 Honorary State Regents, Mrs. John F. Thigpen who died July 2, 1989 and Mrs. Young Harris Yarbrough who died September 5, 1989. Mrs. Muldrow brought announcements from the National Board of Management. She told of the loss of 2,213 members nationally in June because of nonpayment of dues. Of this number 6% had been members for less than 3 years, 131/2 % had been members from 3 to 6 years, and 4% had been members for more than 50 years. NSDAR now has 201,701 members in 3,082 chapters. NSDAR is losing about 6,000 members a year. The State Regent announced that the President General's project will be the continued restoration of the buildings in Washington; There will be a Centennial Edition of the DAR Patriot Index; The Ellis Island Museum will not open on schedule, so names are still being accepted for the Wall of Honor; Volunteer Genealogists are needed to work on the 2000 supplemental papers awaiting verification. Mrs. Muldrow regretfully announced that she will not offer for the office of Vice President

General at the 1990 Continental Congress. Mrs. Hankinson expressed appreciation to Mrs. Muldrow on behalf of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, for her dedication and leadership.

The State Regent resumed the Chair and presented the State Officers who reported: Mrs. Hankinson, First Vice Regent and National Defense Chairman, reported on meetings attended. She installed the officers of one chapter and spoke to several chapters. She co-chaired the "Patriotic" sessions during the August workshops. She reported that 6 chapters have agreed to award bronze ROTC medals. Eleven more are needed.

Mrs. Ward, Second Vice Regent, told that this year our State Project will focus on the resurfacing of the Annis Mann Richardson recreation area. She announced that the School Committee is offering a new pin — a \$25.00 contribution will be divided among the 6 schools.

Mrs. Drew, Chaplain, reported 93 known deaths since State Conference. She has a list of 20 members 90 years and older and birthday greetings are sent to them.

Mrs. Elliott, Recording Secretary, announced the 1989 Proceedings were available and she gave corrections and additions. She thanked Mrs. Waite and the State Regent for their help.

Mrs. Ennis, Corresponding Secretary, has mailed all letters under the direction of the State Regent and she announced that the Regent's Consolidated Report Forms were available and asked that each Regent pick up her forms. She read a thank you note for a copy of the Proceedings from the Recording Secretary General.

Mrs. Corbitt, Treasurer, distributed the budget and summary of accounts. She reported a balance as of 9/30/89:

Mrs. Hanf, Registrar, reported that since February there have been 176 new members (47 Juniors), 23 reinstatements, 38 transfers in, 40 transfers out, 40 resignations, 101 deceased and 70 dropped June 1 by NSDAR. Volunteer Genealogists are urgently needed to go to Washington to help with verification of supplemental papers.

Mrs. Miller, Historian, asked that each chapter pick an outstanding American History teacher for the chapter to honor. She also reminded each chapter to send in the appropriate form to the Historian General and the State Historian when graves are marked, not at the end of the year.

Mrs. Chastain, Librarian, requested help in finding a 5 volume set of *Roster of Confederate Soldiers of Georgia*, 1860-1865. This set is needed for donation to the NSDAR library. Fourteen books have been donated this year.

Mrs. Kezar, Curator and State Transportation Chairman, reported all flags and necessary items in place at all meetings. The bus trip to Washington will be April 13-21, 1990 and it is likely there will be 2 buses, cost to be \$486.00.

Beall, Honor Roll, announced that she has to have a monetary value stated on the honor roll forms for any contributions made by a chapter, not just a check mark; Mrs. Ronald Salter reporting for Mrs. Raymond A. Phillips, Junior American Citizens, reminded the members that the JAC Committee has been working to instill good citizenship in youth of all races since 1901 and any publicity from these activities would be appreciated; Mrs. Enver B. STATE ORGANIZING SECRETARY - Mrs. Buxton L. Daniel

The State Organizing Secretary attended 4 District Workshops, Fall Board of Management, State Conference, and all Executive Committee meetings. The work of this officer is to promote the growth of the State Society through the organization of new chapters and the conservation of existing chapters. Letters and brochures have been sent to those who have expressed an interest in forming new chapters, and follow-up contacts have been made. This officer has contacted chapters that needed encouragement. To have the honor and privilege of serving the Georgia State Society as State Organizing Secretary under the inspiring leadership of Mrs. James J. Muldrow has been a most gratifying and challenging experience.

STATE REGISTRAR - Mrs. Peter S. Hanf

This officer has kept the membership files current for the Georgia State Society according to the printouts received from the Office of the Registrar General. On February 23, 1989, the National Society reported 7,989 members of the Georgia State Society. During the year we have had 276 new members by application of which 72 are Juniors, 44 by reinstatement, 72 by transfer into the state and 157 members at large. Georgia lost 161 by death, 119 by resignation, 72 by transfer out, and 70 dropped by the National Society. These figures show a net loss of 30 members giving the state a membership count of 7,959. It was most enjoyable to have assisted the Lineage Research Chairman with 2 Lineage Workshops. This officer attended State Conference, Continental Congress, District Workshops, Fall Board of Management, all Executive Board Meetings and the Proceedings Committee Meeting. The State Registrar is grateful to the Georgia Daughters and the State Regent for the opportunity of serving in this office.

STATE HISTORIAN - Mrs. Fred A. Miller, Jr.

Congratulations chapters for 100% reporting! Appreciation is expressed to the Regents and Historians for making this possible. Fifty-three gifts were given to the NSDAR Archives. Twenty documents and \$1409 were contributed to the Americana Collection. The following became Friends of the Americana Collection: Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall, Mrs. J. L. R. Boyd, Mrs. John K. Bretch, Mrs. W. Franklin Chastain, Mrs. Peter S. Hanf, Mrs. Charles Hickman, Mrs. J. M. Karlovich, Mrs. G. C. Lee, Mrs. James J. Leitch, Mrs. Hubert R. Martin, Mrs. Fred A. Miller, Jr. and Mrs. Theodore C. Whitson. Chapters had 206 historical programs for adults and 63 for school children. 16 copies of the History of the Georgia State Society were sold and \$400 was sent to the State Treasurer. 141 books remain. Linda Ward Meadows (Mrs. Russell) was selected as Georgia's "Outstanding Teacher of American History", John Floyd Chapter, sponsor. Graves marked were: 33 Revolutionary Soldiers, 1 wife of a Revolutionary Soldier, 4 daughters of Revolutionary Soldiers and 174 DAR members. Forty Historical markers were placed and 6 historic restorations were begun and 4 completed. Joseph Habersham Chapter painted and installed a new heating and cooling system at historic Habersham Hall. Abraham Baldwin Chapter raised an additional \$892 toward the restoration of the historic McIntosh House. William McIntosh Chapter raised \$1000 toward the restoration of the historic Indian Springs Hotel. Button Gwinnett, George Walton and Oglethorpe Chapters restored the historic Cooper Cemetery. John Clarke Chapter restored the historic Green-Malcom Cemetery. Thomasville Chapter restored the 1889 Bandstand in Paradise Park. The State Historian Award goes to the John Laurens Chapter. It has been an honor and privilege to serve as Historian.

STATE LIBRARIAN - Mrs. W. Franklin Chastain

Your State Librarian attended Continental Congress, four district workshops, and Fall Board of Management. Gave four programs on the NSDAR Library to chapters, sent three NSDAR Library programs to chapters for their use, handed out 225 NSDAR Library brochures, wrote thank you letters to chapters for book donations and answered all queries. Participated in 3 Lineage workshops. Georgia chapters have given \$18.00 to the

NSDAR Library Book Purchase Fund; \$101.00 to the Rebinding Fund; \$133.00 to Reclassification Fund; \$432.00 to our State Library Fund; 6 programs on NSDAR and/or local libraries. Chapters also donated over \$2,000.00 in gifts of microfilm, books, genealogical material and funds to state and local libraries. Many hours were volunteered at the Georgia Department of Archives and History as well as to local libraries. Chapters continue their indexing projects on state and local levels and to support our NSDAR Library through the Friends of the Library fund. This past year has been an excellent learning and sharing experience for this officer under the leadership of our State Regent, and friend, Mrs. James J. Muldrow.

The Curator has in her custody the property of the State Society. This includes the most used articles: the National, State and DAR flags, their staffs, cords and tassels, finials and stands, the DAR insignia, 3 white leather carrying belts for flags, 1 carrying case for 3 flags, 1 carrying case for 3 flags stands, bell, and ballot box. These articles have been available, as required, at the 4 District Workshops, Fall Board of Management, and State Conference. Several boxes of pictures, including those of Past Presidents General, Georgia State Regents, and old pictures of Revolutionary Soldiers were turned over to Mrs. James J. Muldrow, State Regent and taken to Meadow Garden. The Curator serves as Chairman of Conference Seating and Processional. I have attended State Conference, Continental Congress, all District Workshops, Fall Board of Management, and all Executive Board Meetings. This has truly been 2 years of "coming together" and I am proud to have been a part of our progress. It has been a privilege to serve the Georgia Society under the leadership of our efficient and most capable State Regent.

National Committee Reports

AMERICAN HERITAGE, Mrs. R. Clough Carter

Thank you and much appreciation to the 103 chapters reporting to this chairman. Programs presented by chapters were concerning our heritage in art (as shown in slide presentations); baskets; crafts; hats from the past; music; guilts; poetry; period architecture. One chapter made a video tape titled, "A Colonial Christmas" which was written and performed by chapter members. Many other chapters wrote and presented skits on our American Heritage. For Historic Preservation, chapter members wrote and published family genealogies and histories. Others compiled histories of their towns and communities. Some members work with Historic Preservation Committees. Members worked to help preserve a post office (c. 1830); worked to restore and enhance their chapter house; worked to restore old railroad stations; have actively helped with restoration of an historic hotel and garden; gave funds for the preservation of an old Huguenot Church; worked to preserve crumbling tombstones and clean grounds in historic cemeteries: lobbied to save old oak trees; typed pages for State Indexing Project. This chairman is delighted to announce that Mrs. Roger McAfee from John Laurens Chapter has won Honorable Mention in the field of cross stitch on the National level and her work will be displayed in Washington at Continental Congress. Thanks to our State Regent for allowing me to serve as chairman for this wonderful committee.

AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH, Mrs. Dares E. Wirt

103 Chapters reported. Eighty-three Chapters participated in the Essay Contest, 251 schools took part, with 43 of these for the first time, with 6,885 contestants. Georgia Essay Winners were: 5th Grade, Ginger Knowles of McRae, sponsored by Oconee Chapter, 6th Grade, Terry Leia Brooks of Canton, sponsored by Hightower Trail Chapter. 7th Grade, Elizabeth Canfield from Athens, sponsored by Elijah Clarke Chapter. 8th Grade, Elizabeth Landon Lattimore of Savannah, sponsored by Lachlan McIntosh Chapter. 94 Chapters had American History Programs, 61 had Displays, 133 awards were given for Excellence in American History. Georgia heard about American History Month with 183 radio spots, 48 TV spots, 28 members on radio and TV, 147 pictures and 2,164 inches of publicity in the press. Our Governor Harris signed a special Proclamation naming February as American History Month, as did 71 Mayors. Over 160 Winner certificates and 319 Appreciation Certificates, four \$50.00 and eight \$25.00 U.S. Bonds, and over 80 posters were given by Chapters. This Chairman gave 8 books. AMERICAN INDIANS, Mrs. John K. Bretch

Most encouraging receipt of 102 Chapter reports, continuing search for greater understanding the American Indian. Honors and memorials given to Bacone by Fort Frederica Chapter. Baron DeKalb knitted 100 caps and saved 868 Campbell Soup Labels. John Laurens Chapter project "Pen and Paper" school supplies total \$157.70 for Bacone. Elijah Clarke "Growing Up at Bacone" by Dr. John Foster, father was on Bacone faculty. Abraham Baldwin contribution to preserving Georgia's Indian Culture, restoring home of Creek Chief William McIntosh, raised over \$8000.00 for this continuing project. This committee has given "Happily May I Walk" by Arlene Hirschfelder to DAR Library Special Indian Collection in Honor of State Regent, Mrs. James J. Muldrow, and for Continental Congress Indian Breakfast the committee gave "Historic Indian Trails of Georgia" by Marion Hemperley. AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP, Mrs. Edward M. Tracy, Jr.

Georgia Daughters have diligently promoted Americanism throughout the State. One hundred chapters reported to this State Chairman. There were 38 inspiring programs on Americanism. Georgia Daughters ordered 8,550 copies of the DAR Manual for Citizenship and sent over 5,500 copies to Naturalization and District Courts. 16 chapters helped with Naturalization ceremonies, and provided refreshments 22 times. 1,408 American Flags, 1,222 Flag codes, 329 Flag pins, 1,079 Welcome Cards, 979 American's Creed Cards, and 1,868 patriotic leaflets or pamphlets were distributed. Georgia Daughters gave 39,971 hours to reduce illiteracy. This State Chairman is pleased that during this administration Medals of Honor have been given to the following: Judge Curtis Tillman was honored by the Baron DeKalb Chapter; Mrs. James M. Heiskell was honored by the Joseph Habersham Chapter; the Honorable Hardwick Smith Johnson, Jr. was honored by the General Daniel Newnan Chapter; Charlie W. Shedd was honored by the Elijah Clarke Chapter; Mr. Hugh Bennett Brown was honored by the Lyman Hall Chapter; Donald Chapman Johnson was honored by the John Laurens Chapter; Dr. Thomas J. Gleaton was honored by the Atlanta Chapter; and, John Atys Mills, III was honored by the Brier Creek Chapter. This State Chairman is pleased that Mrs. Lancy Wu was honored by the Lachlan McIntosh Chapter and presented with the Americanism Medal.

CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION, Mrs. Rod E. Scott

This chairman is grateful for the opportunity of serving on this very important committee. Nineteen Chapters sponsor C.A.R. Societies. 36 Chapters provide senior leadership with 7 Daughters being C.A.R. Senior State Officers, 18 being Senior State Chairmen, and 11 being Senior Society Presidents. 62 Daughters became State Patriots, 30 became State Promoters, while 11 became National Promoters. One Daughter is a National Officer. Four daughters contributed \$100.00 each for Endowment Fund Pins, 4 contributed \$25.00 each for the State Honor Pin. More than sixty Daughters participated in C.A.R. State Functions during the year. Many Chapters had programs given by C.A.R. Societies, or gave programs for C.A.R. Some Chapters invited C.A.R. to their luncheons, while other Chapters invited C.A.R. to other functions. Thirty Daughters became State Conference Patrons, while 15 became South Eastern Regional Patrons. Contributions to local and state C.A.R. totaled approximately \$1500.00. Two Chapters are in the process of organizing new societies. Some Chapters and Daughters have put forth much effort to help and keep C.A.R. alive and active. Much appreciation is extended to the Chapters and individuals that cooperated with the Children of the American Revolution Committee and with the individual societies. We would like to see more interest and attention given to C.A.R. by more Chapters in the State. Special appreciation goes to our gracious State Regent for her sincere interest and assistance in all the activities of this great and deserving group of young people.

CONSERVATION, Miss Mary King

Georgia chapters reported involvement in widely ranging conservation concerns: water protection, reforestation, landscape beautification, recycling newspapers, aluminum cans and glass; mulching Christmas trees; education, wildlife protection. Chapters reporting - 106. Thirty-five observed one or more "special" days. Reported plantings were 155,642 pine trees, 3,394 other trees; numerous bulbs and flowers. Approximately 1500 members fed birds, using 51,000 pounds of birdseed. Forty chapters reported conservation programs with 92 mini programs. Money given for conservation was \$1794 and publicity 107 inches. Trees were planted at public buildings and parks by Captain Edward Ha-

gin, College Hill, Commodore Richard Dale, Elijah Clarke, Etowah, Fort Frederica, General Josiah Tatnall, John Clarke, Lyman Hall, Metter, Nancy Hart, Nathaniel Macon, Oliver Martin, and St. Andrew's Parish Chapters. Sergeant Newton gave bird houses to 2 nursing homes. Roswell King, including 10 children, did a cleanup at Lake Allatoona. Robert Loughridge planted daisies at historic Blount House. Pulaski gave \$125 as a memorial to "Plant the Future". John Franklin Wren maintained a cemetery. John Clarke adopted an endangered turtle. Governor Treutlen sponsored a water plant tour for children. Fielding Lewis sold seed wreaths. Captain Thomas Cobb gave children pine seedlings. Andrew Houser's member rescued a great horned owl. Baron DeKalb's member preserved an era when her home was chosen as Miss Daisy's in "Who's Driving Miss Daisy". Atlanta refurbished the grounds of its historic chapter house thanks to support of members, Tech students, landscape architect and nurseries. It was a good year.

CONSTITUTION WEEK, Mrs. Randolph A. Malone, III

September 17th in Georgia heralds the culmination of many weeks and months of planning for the annual celebration of Constitution Week, 1989 certainly was in keeping with this tradition as evidenced by the 88 glowing reports received from across the state. 100 communities followed Governor Joe Frank Harris in issuing a proclamation designating September 17 to 23 as Constitution Week all across Georgia. For Georgia this week was indeed a memorable one! Flags were flown, trees were planted, speeches were given, luncheons were attended, school children gave plays, wrote poems, made displays, sermons pointed to our country and her faith, over 10,000 pieces of patriotic material were given to interested citizens, and for 7 glorious days this state turned her eyes on the Constitution, its origin, its present significance and its destiny. A quote from Georgia's Constitution Week winner sums up this report for the state also. That statement is, "Several older chapter members stated that this was the best observance of the week that Peter Early has ever had. The work was made worthwhile as we reached more people this year than in any previous year and we received many comments from many people saying that because of the DAR Constitution Week activities they had become more aware of the freedoms that our country has and of the document that safeguards the principles that make our nation great." As the narratives were read from north to south and from east to west, many chapter reports gave a similar response. More Georgians had been reached and a new awareness truly seems to be coming upon our nation and her people concerning the need to preserve and protect our Constitution.

DAR GOOD CITIZENS, Mrs. J. C. Serrato, Jr.

This Chairman received reports from 103 Chapters with 97 Chapters participating in the selection of 241 DAR Good Citizens from the 273 schools contacted. The DAR Good Citizens were honored in various ways; awards were presented at Chapter meetings, special teas, coffees, luncheons or Honors Day at the winners' schools. Cash prizes, personal gifts, savings bonds and scholarships totaling \$1,175.00 were also awarded. The 4 district winners are: from the Southeast District, Anthony Davis, sponsored by the Governor David Emanuel Chapter; Northeast District, Sara Coker, sponsored by the Tomochichi Chapter; Northwest District, Christy Darden, sponsored by the Andrew Houser Chapter; and Southwest District, Christie Clark, sponsored by Noble Wimberly Jones Chapter. Each District winner will receive \$25,00 from the State Society and the State winner, Christy Darden will receive \$100 and a State Good Citizen pin. I would like to thank the District Vice Chairmen for their interest and assistance: Southeast, Mrs. Wesley Ferguson; Northeast, Mrs. James L. Quackenbush; Northwest, Mrs. Richard H. Rice; and Southwest, Mrs. Dan Harris. Madam State Regent, I would also like to thank you for the privilege and the honor of serving you and the State Society in this capacity.

DAR MAGAZINE, Miss Kay Yarbrough

One hundred and three of Georgia's 109 chapters reported to the DAR Magazine Committee. Seventy-eight chapters acquired subscriptions of 20% or greater and met the State

and National Honor Roll requirement. One feature article and 13 "With the Chapters" articles were submitted to the magazine. Miss Kay Yarbrough of the Thomasville Chapter became a member of the DAR Magazine Endowment Fund. Ideas and suggestions from 15 chapters were received. These comments will be forwarded to the national chairman for consideration and possible implementation.

DAR MAGAZINE ADVERTISING, Mrs. Theodore C. Whitson

The total revenue for Georgia's 1989 DAR Magazine Advertising was \$5,699.75 for the ad space plus \$180.00 for photographs. Seventy-four chapters participated in the Co-op ads; 25 chapters submitted 28 chapter ads and 3 chapters sold a total of 18 commercial ads with one chapter submitting 12 of these ads. Reports were received from 104 of the 109 chapters. Included in the Co-op ads were full pages honoring the State Regent, Georgia's 50 Year Club, State Conference Pages, State Chairmen and the Outstanding Junior. Half pages honored the Georgia C.A.R. Societies and the Co-op Participating Chapters. Special recognition and \$5.00 each goes to the following chapters: Abraham Baldwin, LaGrange and Fort Peachtree. Honorable Mention and \$3.00 each goes to Colonel Daniel Appling, Etowah, Andrew Houser and Baron DeKalb Chapters. Madam State Regent, thank you for giving me this opportunity to serve the Georgia State Society under your capable leadership. It has been a privilege and pleasure.

DAR MUSEUM, Mrs. Calvin C. Kammeyer

It is with pleasure that this Chairman reports for 103 Georgia Chapters that contributed to the NSDAR Museum. There were 34 programs given on the Museum, period rooms or on other museums this year. Honor roll credit was received for 18 of those programs. Special thanks are given to Mrs. Enver Hoff and Mrs. Dennis Beall who each gave 4 programs! Over 1500 brochures of the Museum were distributed in Georgia. Five books, *The Arts of Independence*, were purchased from the Museum gift shop and all were donated to libraries. A total of 97 Chapters donated \$344.00 to the General Fund and \$122.00 to the Museum period rooms and catalogue library. Joseph Habersham, Sukey Hart and Cherokee Chapters gave exceptional contributions of \$50.00, \$30.00 and \$25.00 respectively. Mrs. Ralph Farmer became a Friend of the Museum by her donation of \$200.00 in honor of Mrs. James J. Leitch, Historian General, NSDAR. My thanks to Mrs. Muldrow, State Regent, for allowing me to serve as the Chairman of the NSDAR Museum.

DAR SCHOLARSHIP, Miss Pauline Lewis No report.

DAR SCHOOL, Mrs. Jerido Ward

It was a special treat to have Mr. Gary Cantrell, Director of Public Relations at Tamassee DAR School, with us on District Workshop tour. Mr. Cantrell spoke to us at lunch and showed Tamassee videos during the breaks. Our thanks to him for being with us. Annual reports, received from 102 chapters, showed that Georgia Chapters are actively supporting the DAR Schools. 74 chapters had a full program on our schools, an increase from last year. 33,125 labels, 103 books plus 15,865 coupons and 20,979 pounds of resalable items were contributed by 67 chapters, also an increase. Yarn totaling 3,692 pounds and valued at \$12,433 was sent to Crossnore by the Hightower Trail Chapter. According to the records of the State Treasurer donations totaling \$14,316.13 were sent to the DAR Schools: Tamassee received \$7,624.13; Kate Duncan Smith, \$3,519.00; Berry College \$1,043.50; Crossnore, \$879.50; Hillside \$613.50; and Hindman \$636.50. 2 chapters contributed to the Friends of the Schools. Special extra projects were sponsored by the following chapters: Baron DeKalb, Cherokee Juniors, Joseph Habersham, Cherokee, Hightower Trail, Nancy Hart, and John Benson. The Hightower Award was presented to 54 chapters with the highest per capita awards going to Joseph Habersham and Oglethorpe Chapters. The Georgia State Society expresses sincere appreciation to Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Hightower, Jr. for their continued support of this award. Recipients of 1989-90 scholarships included: Janet M. Merritt Scholarship to Mindy Haynes, a junior from Snellville; Edna DeLamar Kendrick Scholarship to Faye Smith, a sophomore from Riverdale; and Helen McGarity Shepherd Scholarship to Kenneth K. Clark, a student from Tamassee. This scholarship is through the Baron DeKalb Chapter, given by all members of Mrs. Shepherd's family.

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERAN-PATIENTS, Mrs. D. Price Eubank

Georgia DAR members have done outstanding work this year for Veteran-Patients and I congratulate each Chapter Chairman. 101 chapters reported a grand total value of \$29,145.51, about \$7,000.00 more than last year. Included were hours of volunteer service in VA Medical Centers, Military Hospitals, Nursing Homes, Private Hospitals, and other institutions. Gifts consisted of lap robes, afghans and other handmade items, books, games, cash for canteen books and clothes for men and women patients. One chapter gave \$375.00 for a major item. All patriotic days were celebrated with programs and parties; flags were put on Veterans' graves; many news articles told of DAR particiaption in local events. Thank each of you for your participation and support of this committee.

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, Mrs. Gordon Kilgore

Reports were received from 102 chapters. 2855 flags reported as presented; 1569 flag codes given; 200 children's flag codes given; 3565 books, pamphlets and 5 Braille flags given. Chapters reported flag certificates given, spots on Radio, TV and newspaper articles. Programs given at schools and in chapters. Chapters have cooperated with Veterans' organizations in placing and removing flags from graves. Some chapters have sold flags and used money to place flags in schools, retarded citizens homes, etc. Flags presented to civic organizations for use in the "avenue of flags" in the towns. One chapter sent in a beautiful scrapbook of flag clippings. This state chairman continued to give programs in costume, entitled "Betsy Ross and The Flag" — 11 in all to chapters and civic organizations and gave out over 150 flag code booklets and various flag literature.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS, Mrs. Everett E. Porter, Jr.

Honor Roll credit was received by 25 chapters, which submitted 2,297 pages of original source records and indexes to be sent to the DAR Library. Indexes were completed for 21 volumes of previously submitted volumes of genealogical records, and the volunteers did not want the credit applied toward Bookworm Pins. These indexes, which totaled 2,459 pages, bring Georgia's total to 4,756 pages submitted this year. Chapters contributed \$140 to the National Genealogical Records Binding Fund. The Georgia State Archives in Atlanta, the Washington Memorial Library in Macon, and the Georgia Historical Society Library in Savannah received a total 6,891 pages of new records (8 books each). Work is underway to index the unindexed volumes of previously submitted volumes of genealogical records housed at the Georgia Archives. A total of 42 volumes were indexed this year, bringing the total volumes which have been indexed to 135. Volunteers are working to index about 50 more volumes to complete this project. The completed indexes have been delivered to the Georgia Archives to be bound with the volumes to which they apply. Eight Bookworm Pins and 9 Bookworm Bars have been earned this year, bringing the total to 46 pins and 20 bars earned through this project. This Chairman is also working to catalog the entire collection and to coordinate it with the Georgia Collection at the DAR Library.

JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS, Mrs. Raymond A. Phillips

Seven chapters worked with Junior American Citizens this year, 5 most actively. Special praise to Thomasville, Roswell King, Atlanta, Oothcaloga, and Baron DeKalb for hard work on the JAC contest. Of the 7,125 JAC members in the state, 1,805 took part in the contest. Fifty three first prize entries were sent on for national judging. Baron DeKalb sponsored 2,772 members, and Thomasville 2,381. Thomasville had the most publicity, the most contest entries and most outstanding contributions to the contest. Throughout the state 3,941 member pins were distributed. Thomasville gave 2 of the special Thatcher awards. Stephen Heard chapter is commended for contributing \$50 to the National JAC fund. Twenty five other chapters made a contribution to the fund. Thanks and a small award to Oothcaloga and Atlanta chapters for sending me publicity. I urge more chapters to consider work on this committee. In spite of the sponsoring of new members, the number of JAC members in the state is about 2,000 less than last year. It is extremely rewarding to the students of your communities, and the schools think well of the DAR as a result.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP, Mrs. Robert Wiltshire

Junior members of Georgia have had a productive year. Even though our net membership has declined, Juniors continue to be active and involved, holding various positions of responsibility at all levels. Out of 82 chapters reporting, we learn that we have 2 Juniors serving as State Chairmen, 4 as State Vice-Chairmen, 2 Chapter Regents, 15 Chapter Officers and 38 Chapter Chairmen, Georgia is particularly honored to have 2 of our "Juniors-at-Heart" serving on the National level: Mrs. Calvin Kammeyer as National Chairman of Junior Membership and Miss Melodye Brown as Vice-Chairman of the Southeastern Division, Georgia had 72 new members admitted as Juniors this year. Juniors were involved in many special chapter and state projects. We presented our State Regent with a beautiful handmade quilt, a labor of love in which 21 chapters across the state participated. Juniors began a new fund-raising campaign through Innisbrook Gift Wrap, in which the individual chapters are able to retain up to 40% of the profits for their own use. LINEAGE RESEARCH, Mrs. Enver B. Hoff

The Lineage Research Committee has assisted 734 prospective members and 227 new members during the past year. Seventeen workshops were held and 23 programs were given on Lineage Research. One hundred and three chapters reported.

MEMBERSHIP, Miss Elizabeth Stone

Georgia daughters have had DAR membership on their minds. Approximately 998 prospective members have been contacted. Chapters have held teas and luncheons, conducted genealogical workshops, paid personal visits, made phone calls, distributed thousands of pieces of DAR Membership Literature, printed articles in newspapers, told the DAR story on radio, and manipulated conversations to include DAR accomplishments, activities and efforts, in order to attract new members. MOTION PICTURE, RADIO AND TELEVISION, Mrs. Erwin N. Kinne

Many thanks to the 105 chapters who sent in reports. Forty-four chapters reported work of the Committee. Sixty-one reported no work. The best movie for family viewing was "The Littlest Mermaid"; for adult viewing "Steel Magnolias". "The Bill Cosby Show" was almost a unanimous choice for best TV family viewing and best for adult viewing was "Murder She Wrote". Sally Jessie Raphael and Oprah Winfrey, Geraldo and all soap operas were the worst TV shows. Fifteen chapters reported members on TV shows. Eight chapters reported members on Radio. The TV shows were "Good Citizen Award", "Liberty Bell Award", "Constitution Week" and others. The radio shows were "American History Essay Winners" and "Constitution Week" programs. Twenty-five chapters reported letters of praise to major TV networks and 7 chapters to local TV. Four chapters reported letters of praise to local radio stations. 42 chapters wrote letters concerning ads. This Chairman attended the 4 summer workshops, Fall Board of Management and State Conference. It has been a privilege and pleasure to serve under the leadership of our dynamic State Regent.

NATIONAL DEFENSE, Mrs. Donald D. Hankinson

Annual reports were received from 85 chapters; 82 reported a full program on National Defense; 77 studied the 1989 Resolutions; 78 devoted the required 5 minutes to National Defense, 49 allotted 10 minutes or more, one devoted no time. Extra materials were available at the meetings of 52 chapters; 30 distributed materials to schools, 30 to libraries and 44 to interested individuals. Good Citizenship medals were presented to 365 young people. Students in ROTC units received 127 bronze medals, 17 gold medals, a silver tray and a saber. Chapters reported 92 paid subscriptions to the National Defender. According to the records of the State Treasurer, \$226.50 was contributed to ROTC Award Program, \$411 to Dollars for Defense. Letters were written to members of Congress by 602 individuals, to State Legislators by 547. 1,151 members are personally acquainted with their U.S. Senator and/or Congressman. 72 chapter chairmen urged members to vote, 59 provided voting assistance. 43 Georgia Daughters hold elective or appointive public office. Education, catastrophic health insurance and rescission of the call for a Constitutional Convention were the legislative issues of greatest interest; Panama, events in Europe and Russia and desecration of the United States Flag were the top 3 National Defense topics. PROGRAM, Miss Patricia A. Glenn

It was evident from the 101 chapter reports received by this chairman, that much hard work and innovative planning had been done by chapters to attain excellence in the preparation of their yearbooks and supplements as they look forward to the celebration of our Centennial. 57 chapters submitted entries in Correctness of Detail Contest, 37 hoping to earn the coveted Certificate of Merit signifying a "perfect" yearbook from the President General. Bylaws

BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II OBJECTS

The objects of the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution shall be: to promote the aims set forth in the Bylaws of the National Society, the preservation of the memory of its Revolutionary patriots; the study of its history; the education of its youth in patriotic ideals and in the duties of citizenship.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All Chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of this organization.

Article IV OFFICERS

The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian, and a State Curator. The State Regent shall appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as adviser in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting.

Article V ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected at the annual State Conference biennially.

Section 2. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for three years or until their successors are elected. Their term of office shall begin at the close of Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and of the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Proviso: This amendment shall not go into effect until the election of state officers in 1992.

Section 3. No member shall be eligible to a State office until she has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years. No member shall be eligible to the same State office for two successive terms. A member having served more than one-half term in the State office shall be deemed to have served a term. Any member holding active membership in a Chapter in the Georgia State Society shall be eligible to hold a State office, provided she has been a member of a Chapter in this State for at least five years.

Section 4. Nomination of candidates for office shall be from the floor. The election shall be held by ballot. A majority of the votes cast by the voting members of the State Conference shall elect.

Section 5. Should the office of State Regent beccome vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become acting First Vice Regent, subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. A vacancy in any other State office between annual meetings shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next Fall Board of Management or State Conference, whichever shall come first. Any State Officer, who is absent from the State for a continuous period of six months or longer, automatically relinquishes her position as a State officer.

Section 6. No two State officers shall be members of the same Chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

Section 7. In recognition of valuable service to the organization, any State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Section 8. A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot. The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than fifteen months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

Section 9. On the election of State Regent, and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Recording Secretary General. The endorsement of a candidate for Vice President General shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent to the Recording Secretary General at least two weeks prior to Continental Congress.

Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, of the State Board of Management, and of the Executive Committee. She shall appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees.

Section 2. In the absence of the State Regent from any meeting of the State Conference, or the State Board of Management, the State First Vice Regent, or in her absence, the State Second Vice Regent, shall perform the duties of the State Regent. The State First and Second Vice Regents may be assigned to direct committees and to perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent.

Section 3. The State Chaplain shall open all meetings of the State Conference and of the State Board of Management with Scripture reading and prayer and shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require. She shall preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and shall be responsible for In Memoriam pages in the Proceedings.

Section 4. The State Recording Secretary shall record the proceedings of the State Conference and of meetings of State Board of Management and of the Executive Committee. She shall compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and of the Proceedings Committee.

Section 5. The State Corresponding Secretary shall conduct correspondence and send notices in behalf of the State Conference, the State Regent, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as directed by them.

Section 6. The State Treasurer shall be the custodian of the funds of the State Society. She shall receive the State Conference dues and registration fees from the Chapters and shall receive all sums contributed by the Chapters for State and National projects. All monies received by the State Treasurer shall be placed only in institutions with accounts covered by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation or by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation, and the amount in any one institution shall not exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage. She shall disburse such sums only when authorized by the State Regent in writing. The State Treasurer shall keep an account of all sums received or paid out and shall keep receipts for all payments. She shall prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference. Her books shall be audited annually by a Certified Public Accountant. She shall be ex-officio a member of the Credentials Committee.

Section 7. The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new Chapters.

Section 8. The State Registrar shall, when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, who live in towns and counties where there are no Chapters, to prove eligibility, and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars in verifying lineage papers. She shall keep a correct list of all members in the State and shall make a report on membership to the State Conference.

Section 9. The State Historian shall be in charge of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General. She shall keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves in the State and shall prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General to Smithsonian Institution. She shall encourage the compilation and publication of County Histories and other unpublished records, especially those of the Revolutionary period.

Section 10. The State Librarian shall collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing duplicates wherever possible, in the NSDAR Library and in the Georgia DAR Collections in the State Department of Archives and History. She shall endeavor to obtain the books on the wanted list of the Librarian General for the Georgia Section in the NSDAR Library and is authorized to solicit contributions from the Chapters for the purchase of the same. She shall have custody and supervision of the DAR Genealogical and Historical Collections of the State Department of Archives and History.

Section 11. The State Curator shall receive and be responsible for all gifts of Revolutionary relics to the Museum of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution. She shall be custodian of the conference properties and shall have them properly stored, insured and made ready for use at State Conference.

Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. The Georgia State Society shall hold an annual State Conference between the first day of February and the time of the meeting of the Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week. The Executive Committee shall fix the time and place of meetings when not fixed by the Conference in session, or when for any reason it may be impractical to meet at the time or place fixed by the Conference.

Section 2. The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credentials blanks to the Chapters not less than sixty (60) days before the time of the

State Conference.

Section 3. The voting members of the State Conference shall be State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regent or alternate, and the delegates or their alternates from the Chapters of the state that are entitled to representation at the Continental Congress. The number of representatives from each Chapter shall be determined by Article XIV, Section 3, of the National Bylaws, increasing representation at State Conference by one delegate per Chapter.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a Chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the Chapter, except in the case of the Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized Chapter.

Section 5. A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at an annual State Conference, shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any Chapter in the State of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference the privileges of the floor shall be accorded to the State Chairmen with the exception that they may not vote unless they are duly elected delegates or their alternates from their respective Chapters.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Conference may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen (15) days' notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Twenty-five (25) voting members, representing not less than ten (10) Chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII STATE DUES AND CONFERENCE FEES

Section 1. The annual dues of Chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be four dollars for each member of the Chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1. A minimum of \$1.33 shall be used to cover all State per capital assessments, and the balance shall be allocated to the General State Dues Fund. No Chapter shall be entitled to representation at the annual State Conference until the State Dues are paid.

Section 2. The Finance Committee, appointed by the State Regent, shall be composed of seven (7) members, to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two (2) Honorary State Regents, one (1) active Chapter Regent and one (1) active Chapter member. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund.

Section 3. Each Chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State Dues, a Conference registration fee of \$3.00 for each voter to which the Chapter is entitled under the Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether represented or not.

Section 4. State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$3.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, who are not duly elected voters from their respective Chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference fee at the time of registration.

Article IX EXPENSES

Section 1. Four thousand dollars (\$4,000) shall be taken each year from the State Dues Fund, to be used by the State Regent in defraying her necessary travel expenses.

Section 2. Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent shall be paid by the State Treasurer from the State Dues Fund.

Article X STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Regents, in their absence, the First Vice Regent of the Chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the Fall, following the regular meeting of the National Board. It may meet whenever called by the State Regent.

Section 3. Ten (10) members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference.

Section 5. State Chairmen, Vice Chairmen, Committee Members of National and Standing Committees and one (1) member from each Chapter shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privileges of the floor, but may not vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article XI EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute an Executive Committee. The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, attends the meetings of the Executive Committee, but may not vote. This Committee performs such duties of the Board between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient. The Executive Committee shall meet the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three members of the Committee. It shall make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

Article XII CHAPTERS

Section 1. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April. The Chapter Regent shall report the names of the elected officers promptly, on triplicate blanks provided by the State Regent for this purpose, to the Organizing Secretary General, to the State Regent and to the State Recording Secretary.

Section 2. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent for use in compiling her report, not less than fifteen (15) days before the opening of the annual State Conference. The official Chapter report, not to exceed 250 words in length, for publication in the Proceedings shall be furnished the State Recording Secretary before the State Conference.

Article XIII AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent and to the Parliamentarian. The State Regent shall send a copy to each Chapter, at least sixty (60) days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law for the State Conference in matters not covered by the Bylaws. Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21.) No Conference was held in 1911; the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912"; amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, p. 211.)

AWARDS

All chapters competing for awards must send reports to the respective chairmen by February 1, 1991.

All reports for awards are based on membership confirmed by the National Society as of February 1 of preceding year (1990). SEE FIGURE BESIDE CHAPTER NAME IN CHAPTER REGENTS' DIRECTORY.

BYLAWS

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National and State Bylaws.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS

Notice of change of address of members shall be sent to the Organizing Secretary General, Treasurer General, State Regent and State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHANGE OF NAME

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to State Registrar, Treasurer General and State Regent by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHAPTER ELECTIONS

As soon as Chapter elections are held, names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, Administration Building, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D.C., 20006-5392, to the State Regent or State Regent-Elect and to the Recording Secretary by May 1st. The full Christian name of Chapter officers shall be given together with her husband's given name or initials, address, zip code and telephone number. A Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years. This being added in order for our Bylaws to conform to the National Bylaws.

DUES

Pay to State Treasurer State Dues of \$4.00 per member before December 1. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the February 1 and two April Board meetings of the National Society. National Dues of \$15.00 per member sent to the Treasurer-General, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20006-5392, before December 1, 1990.

CONFERENCE REGISTRATION FEE

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer with the State dues on or before December 1, \$3.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether represented or not.

Rules for representation of chapters at Continental Congress:

"Chapters having less than 50 paid members on February 1 are entitled to be represented by the Regent or in her absence the Vice Regent or alternate; chapters having 50 to 199 paid members on February 1, one delegate in addition to the Regent; chapters having 200 to 299 paid members on February 1, two delegates in addition to the Regent, and for each additional 100 members one additional delegate." (Article XIII, Section 3-C, National Bylaws).

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$3.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$1.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. (Article VIII, Section 4, of the State Bylaws).

CONTRIBUTIONS

ALL contributions by Chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

DECEASED MEMBERS

Deaths shall be reported promptly to Treasurer General, State Chaplain and State Registrar by the Corresponding Chapter Officer. Complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and a date of death shall be furnished State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for Conference Memorial Service pages for State Proceedings.

GEORGIA HOSPITALITY FUND

The following resolution which applies to the Georgia Hospitality Fund appears in the Proceedings for 1955:

"WHEREAS, The Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds a social event in Washington during Continental Congress which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society.

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$300.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes:

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this fund shall not be cumulative." Adopted.

PROCEDURE BOOK OF INSTRUCTIONS FOR OFFICERS AND STATE CHAIRMEN

The following resolution which applies to a Procedure Book of Instruction for Officers and State Chairmen appears in the Proceedings for 1959-60, Page 41.

"RESOLVED, That all Officers and State Chairmen keep a Procedure Book of Instructions and helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new Officers and Chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities thus providing a continuing continuity of DAR work." Adopted.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS

To insure uniformity and convenience in binding, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, $8\frac{1}{2}$ x11 inches, with $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 inch margin on left side, $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches at top and 1 inch on right side and at bottom. Four copies shall be sent to State Chairman of Genealogical Records.

INFORMATION FOR CHAPTER REGENTS

- 1. All letters received by Chapter Regents relating to the work of the Society shall be distributed to the corresponding Chapter Chairman and brought to the attention of the members at a chapter meeting.
- 2. Please follow Resolution No. 11, adopted at 61st Georgia Society State Conference, as follows: "Resolved, That a closing date of February 1 be established for all reports, and all reports be given from February 1 to February 1, regardless of a change of regime or Regent." All awards will be made on this date basis.

INFORMATION FOR STATE OFFICERS AND STATE CHAIRMEN

State Officers and State Chairmen shall send to the State Regent and to the State Treasurer a copy of any instruction letter mailed to chapters.

NEW ADMINISTRATION RESERVE FOR CONTINGENCIES FUND

For the entire resolution setting up the "General New Regime Fund Balance of \$2,500.00," found on pp. 203-204 of the 1979 Proceedings the following substitute resolution was adopted by the 88th State Conference: RESOLVED that at the end of each administration \$6,000.00 be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies" fund, this money to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration, and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration. All other surplus monies in the General Fund, other than funds which are designated, are to be divided equally between the General Savings Account and the Meadow Garden Capital Investment Fund as provided in the Capital Investment Fund Resolution passed in 1979 (pp. 62-63, 1979 Proceedings). This transaction is to be handled by April 30 every two years before the auditors close out the books of an administration, thus making the General Fund show the same balance of \$6,000.00 at the beginning of each new administration. (This fund is to be known as "New Administration Reserve for Contingencies Fund.") Adopted.

NOMINATIONS

The following resolution which applies to the announcement of the candidacy for State Regent appears in the Proceedings of the Twentieth State Conference, 1918:

"Resolved, that it is the judgment of the Executive Board that announcements for State Regent should not be made . . . earlier than three months prior to the meeting of the conference and they shall be furnished to the Press for publication."

Chapter Regents' Reports by February 1. State Officers and State Chairmen's Report are due on or before February 15.

A standard HEADING of ALL reports must conform to the Headings found in the Proceedings and must start at least 1½ inches from top of sheet of paper. Leave 1 inch between bottom of Headings and start of report. LEFT MARGIN of report must be 1 inch minimum. Please check previous Proceedings for correct heading. Entire report should consist of ONE PARAGRAPH. Winners of awards of State Officers and State Chairmen shall be listed on a SEPARATE sheet of paper. State Officers and State Chairmen send to the State Recording Secretary and the State Regent, the awards to be given next year on a SEPARATE sheet of paper — exactly as it is printed in the Proceedings.

Numerals shall be used throughout the report with the exception of the beginning of a sentence.

DATE FOR ANNUAL AUDIT

WHEREAS, every effort must be made to have all material to the printer as early as possible to facilitate delivery of the Proceedings to the members.

RESOLVED: That the end of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, fiscal year for audit purposes be changed from May 31st to April 30th.

ABSOLUTE DEADLINE FOR PROCEEDINGS MATERIAL

WHEREAS, a definite deadline must be established and adhered to for all reports and material to be in the hands of the Proceedings Committee in order to be delivered to the Printer by June 1st.

RESOLVED: That all FINAL reports and materials must be received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1st with the exception of the Auditor's report and any information sent out by the National DAR Headquarters. This does not alter the requirement in the "Items of Information" in the Proceedings that all reports shall be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary on or before February 15th, the ORIGINAL being sent to the Secretary for the Proceedings.

AND FURTHER RESOLVED: This policy will be strictly adhered to and the material not received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1st will be omitted from the Proceedings.

REAFFIRMATION

RESOLVED: That the Georgia State Society reaffirm the following Resolution adopted at the Fall Board of Management in Albany, October 23, 1981, which reads as follows: "Presentation of Awards" WHEREAS, all awards are given by State Officers and State Chairmen; and WHEREAS, February 1st is the closing date of all work for said awards; BE IT RESOLVED: That no State Officer nor State Chairman may present her report or award(s) at State Conference unless said report, with list of award(s) is in the hands of the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary at least ten (10) days before State Conference.

RESOLUTIONS

Resolutions to be considered by the Committee shall be typed, with a heading giving subject of the resolution, signed, and sent to the Chairman of the Resolutions Committee two weeks before the date of the State Conference.

GOLD HONOR ROLL STARS

A Gold Star is awarded when a chapter achieves the National Gold Honor Roll three consecutive years. For each additional three consecutive years, another Gold Star is awarded. If a chapter fails to achieve Gold Honor Roll any year, all stars are lost as they are awarded for consecutive achievement. National Honor Roll creditation comes from the National Chairman of the National Honor Roll Committee.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING March 15, 1990

The State Officers Club met in the Colony Hall of the Holiday Inn, Jekyll Island, Georgia, on the above date. The meeting was called to order at 12:00 noon by the President, Annis Richardson. The invocation was given by chaplain, Helen Bahin, followed by the Pledge to the Flag of the United States of America led by Dorothy Boyer. The Parliamentarian, Sally Martin, read Standing Rule #1, at which time the President appointed Ann Alderman as Acting Auditor and requested that she collect any fines due under this rule. The President then welcomed all present to the 60th Anniversary of the Club and noted that this year we have 60 members. She then asked the State Regent, Sue Eileen Muldrow, to introduce her guests. They were: Suzanne Golden (Mrs. James), Vice President General from Colorado; Margaret De Moville, State Regent of Mississippi; Frances Dietzel (Mrs. Joe M.), State Regent of North Carolina; Mildred Warren (Mrs. James O., Jr.), State Regent of South Carolina. Annis Richardson then presented the Conference Chairman, Dorothy McClain (Mrs. Donald S.); she then recognized the past presidents of the club present: Edna Kendrick and Lanette Reid. The Corresponding Secretary read letters from two absent past presidents who were unable to attend, Janet Merritt and Rose Bell, after which the President presented the officers of the club.

Following lunch, Edna Kendrick gave a short history of the presidents of the club, naming those still living and giving their dates of service.

The Historian, Edwina Beall, gave a brief history of the club beginning with May Erwin Talmadge (Mrs. Julius Y.) who in 1924 visited the Alabama Conference where she was a guest of their State Officers Club. May was greatly impressed and wanted to start a club in Georgia. The Georgia State Officers Club was organized on March 25, 1930 in Newnan, Georgia with Blanche Gaffney (Mrs. Herbert Fay) as State Regent and May Talmadge as the first president of the club. There were 45 members. Edwina in giving this history used the married name of each of these ladies for which she was fined \$2.50. However, the members seated at her table joined in and the club treasury was enriched by \$6.00!

Edna Kendrick was recognized as being the member with the longest years of service and was presented with a gift (60th Anniversary Plate) by the president. Sue Eileen Muldrow was asked to share her plans for State Conference which is the celebration of the Centennial for NSDAR. She and her guests were then excused so that they might visit the Chapter Regents Club. Annis presented each a gift as they were leaving.

The Chaplain conducted a memorial service for two members who have died this past year. They were Ethel Thigpen (Mrs. John) and Sarah Yarbrough (Mrs. Young Harris).

Jessie Mize, Treasurer, reported that the balance on hand as of March 13, 1990, in the checking account in the Durden Banking Company, was \$1,177.44 with bills yet to pay for this meeting. In the savings account in Atlanta Federal, the balance as of this date is \$600.00. Ann Alderman, Acting Auditor, reported that the books are in order for the year.

Annis Richardson then greeted the Historian General, Alae Risse Leitch, who is one of our members. The Parliamentarian was asked to present changes in the standing rules: Add the State Conference Chairman to the guest list for the club and have all invitations sent by the Corresponding Secretary instead of by the President. Passes.

Following the drawing for the doorprizes, the President thanked Edwina Beall and her committee for the decorations. The report of the nominating committee was made. Those nominated for office for 1990-1992 are as follows:

SKETCH OF 60 YEAR HISTORY OF THE GEORGIA STATE OFFICERS CLUB GIVEN MARCH 15, 1990

In 1924, when May (Mrs. Julius Y.) Talmadge was State Regent, she visited Alabama. While there, she was greatly impressed with their State Officer's Club, and determined that Georgia should organize one. However, it was not until 1930 that the actual organization took place.

The very first meeting was held on Tuesday, March 25 at Newnan, Georgia, in the Hotel - "Virginia House." Blanche (Mrs. Herbert) Gaffney, State Regent, in a beautiful tribute, nominated Miss May, past Vice President General and Honorary State Regent, for President. Blanche's name was presented for First Vice President, and she too was unanimously elected as were the other officers who would serve the club for the first term.

Blanche appointed Mrs. Julian McCurry as chairman of a committee to draft a tentative set of By-Laws, which was acted upon at a called meeting during the Newnan Conference, and adopted. Thus came into being The State Officer's Club, Georgia Society, National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution. There were 45 charter members.

On Tuesday, March 23, 1931 the club, being a social organization, met for luncheon at the Dempsey Hotel in Macon. It was at this meeting Miss May reported the design for a club pin had been made and accepted by the Executive Board. The term of office was set at 3 years without eligibility to re-election.

The third annual meeting was held at Hotel Ware, Waycross. At this meeting it was voted that the yearly club luncheons be paid for out of the treasury. Also the President asked that "distinguished guests" for the club luncheons include the regents of the hostess chapters. The motion was adopted.

Fifty-seven years ago today, March 15, 1933, the State Officer's Club met at the Henry Grady Hotel, Atlanta. It was noted that the gavel used was made from a catalpa tree owned by Richard Stockton, New Jersey's signer of the Declaration of Independence. The tree bloomed for the first time on July 4, 1776.

A resolution was passed stating "That if any member of the Officer's Club fails to use the first name when speaking to or of a member, while the club is in session, that member will be fined five cents, which will be put in the Constitution Hall debt fund."

Among the distinguished guests of honor present at the March 14, 1939 meeting at the Biltmore Hotel in Atlanta was Helen (Mrs. William H.) Pouch, of New York, National President of C.A.R. Helen gave a silver spoon to be presented by the Georgia State Officer's Club, in the name of the Children of the American Revolution, to the first baby or grandbaby born to a club member. It was voted to present the spoon to Anne (Mrs. Leonard) Wallace of Madison, State Director of the C.A.R. of Georgia, for her young son who was 2 years old. Helen expressed great pleasure in the decision and stated that she would send a duplicate spoon to the club to be given as originally planned.

The 14th annual meeting was held again at the Biltmore Hotel. Josephine (Mrs. Thomas C.) Mell, immediate past State Regent, was introduced as a candidate for Vice President General. Miss May, candidate for President General in 1944, was also presented.

At the 15th annual meeting once again at the Biltmore, there was an unanimous vote to purchase a \$50.00 War Bond to apply to the endowment scholarship fund at Tamassee School. They also voted to contribute an additional \$50.00 to the Blood Plasma Fund.

At the 16th annual meeting February 26, 1945, Miss May was introduced as President General. Miss May thanked the Georgia Daughters for standing by her so loyally and helping elect her to the high office of President General. Regret was expressed that Continental Congress would not be held this year.

It was at the 19th annual meeting in 1948 that officers were elected for the first 2 year term.

At the 25th annual meeting, dues were raised to \$2.00 per year and every member was asked to pay for her own meal.

By 1964 the membership had risen to 64.

In 1968, the club discontinued the practice of making a \$25.00 personal gift to the outgoing President and instead donated that amount to any project of the club in honor and recognition.

It was at the 41st annual meeting in 1970, when Evelyn (Mrs. Arthur H.) Waite proposed "that since we were in a state of inflation we should raise the name fine from five cents to ten cents." Motion carried.

The 44th annual meeting changed the outgoing President's gift to \$50.00 for any project she chose.

By the 50th meeting the standing rule for the name fine had been upped to twenty-five cents.

The 52nd meeting brought our dues to \$3.00 per year. They added an initiation fee of \$2.00 and our checking account soared to nearly \$600.00.

There have been many projects of the Officer's Club. But they have been steadfast and true to the needs of Meadow Garden.

The Georgia State Officer's Club has been graced over the years by visits from Presidents General to National Officers and Chairmen. And the Georgia State Officer's Club has produced some outstanding leaders at the National level. Congratulations to all who have served in this capacity. We should all be so very proud of our club and the work we have accomplished over the last 60 years.

After the delicious luncheon, Mrs. Kinne recognized Mrs. Herbert Dean, Past President of the Georgia Chapter Regents Club. Mrs. Kinne also recognized our own State

Regent, Mrs. James J. Muldrow, who brought greetings to the Club, and introduced her special guests to State Conference, including Mrs. James T. Golden, Jr., Vice-President General from Colorado; Mrs. Margaret De Moville, State Regent of Mississippi; Mrs. Joe M. Dietzel, State Regent of North Carolina, and Mrs. James O. Warren, Jr., State Regent of South Carolina.

The minutes of the 1989 meeting were read and approved.

Mrs. Everett E. Porter, Jr., Treasurer, introduced new members of the Georgia Chapter Regents Club, and then introduced guests of the Luncheon. Mrs. Porter reported a beginning balance of \$1,618.76 on March 14, 1989. A complete report from the Treasurer is attached hereto.

Mrs. A. Lawrence Liles, Vice-President, presented the awards for Regents of the Year from the Districts. These included Mrs. Hugh C. Embry, from the Northeast District, for Chapters with membership of 50-100; Mrs. Robert Hunter, Northeast District, for Chapters with membership of over 100; Mrs. W. W. Belew, from the Northwest District, for Chapters with membership 12-50; Mrs. James J. Harvey, from the Northwest District, for Chapters with membership over 100, and Mrs. Lynn G. Walshak, Southeast District, for Chapters with membership over 100. There was no Regent of the Year from the Southwest District. Mrs. Walshak was named outstanding Chapter Regent of the Year for the State.

The Secretary read recommendations from the Executive Committee as follows:

1. It is recommended that the Georgia Chapter Regents Club donate \$200.00 to Tamassee DAR School for the dining hall in honor of Mrs. James J. Leitch, Historian General and Honorary State Regent.

2. It is recommended that the Georgia Chapter Regents Club donate \$200.00 to Kate Duncan Smith DAR School to be used for the Annis Mann Richardson Recreation Area in honor of Mrs. Herman M. Richardson, Past Registrar General, Past Vice-President General and Honorary State Regent.

3. It is recommended that the Georgia Chapter Regents Club donate \$100.00 to Meadow Garden, designating Mrs. James J. Muldrow, State Regent, a Meadow Garden Patron.

All 3 recommendations were approved by the members of the Georgia Chapter Regents Club.

The Executive Committee also recommended the following changes in the rules of the Regent of the Year contest:

In order to increase participation in the Regent of the Year Contest, the Executive Committee urges each Regent to enter the Contest as soon as she goes out of office. It is not necessary for the Regent to be nominated by the Chapter. Each Regent should fill out the application form showing the Chapter's accomplishments during the Regent's entire term. If this Contest is to be continued, increased participation is necessary.

The Secretary read the Nominating Committee's slate of officers for the 1990-1992 term as follows: President (Southeast District) - Mrs. Lynn G. The Georgia State Society C.A.R., under the leadership of Alida Jayne Stancil, has accomplished many worthwhile goals. The state project was "To learn all you can about Button Gwinnett and to contribute to the fund for placing an appropriate historic Button Gwinnett marker (hopefully on the State Capitol Grounds) by the society." The State President's theme was "Foundations of the Past Build Bridges Into the Future."

Georgia State C.A.R. has 17 organized societies. 15 of these are considered active. The total number of members registered and having paid dues in the state is approximately 380. One society, Habersham, was disbanded due to the lack of senior leadership. No new societies were organized during this year. We have one society in the process of organizing. Two DAR chapters and 1 SAR chapter have indicated they wish to organize new societies. This will be pursued during the coming months. We would like to encourage your interest in organizing more societies.

The State Society contributed generously to all National projects. Generous contributions were sent to the C.A.R. Museum, Book Binding Fund, Magazine Fund, Endowment Fund, and Maintenance Equipment Fund.

As always, we appreciate the support given to us by the Georgia Daughters. During the year, 25 became State Patriots, 15 became State Promoters, and 7 National Promoters. This enabled Georgia to win a first place award at National Convention 1990.

The 39th annual Southeastern Regional meeting was hosted by Georgia on St. Simons Island in July at Sea Palms. Brunswick, Winona (Waycross) and Thronateeska (Albany) were the host societies. There was good representation from Florida, Alabama, South Carolina, North Carolina and Georgia. Mrs. Rubye C. Carter (Waycross) and Susan Nock of South Carolina (the senior and member national vice presidents of Southeastern

Region) conducted the meeting. The 2 national presidents, Elizabeth Jones and Mrs. Howard Bryne, Jr., and many other national officers were in attendance.

Immediately following the Southeastern meeting, a tri-state workshop was held with

Florida, South Carolina and Georgia participating.

On Friday night, candidates for officers for 1990-1991 gave their campaign speeches.

Following this, a "Meet the Candidates" and Bingo party was held.

On Saturday morning at the business meeting, State Officers, Chairmen and Society Presidents gave their reports which showed outstanding work by the societies. Contributions to Tamassee totaled \$79.00 cash plus 200 pounds of clothing, Christmas and birthday gifts and soup labels. \$53.00 in cash, 100 pounds of clothing, gifts and soup labels were sent to Crossnore. To Kate Duncan Smith, \$30.00 in cash, 65 pounds of clothing, soup labels, and gifts were sent. \$38.00 in cash, clothing and gifts were sent to Bacone Indian School. A total of \$659.00 was sent to National for the national project.

At noon Saturday, voting took place for the officers for 1990-1991. A delightful luncheon was held at which time an informative and interesting speech on Keep America Clean and Beautiful was given by Mrs. Connie Wiggins.

In the evening, an awards banquet was held and societies were awarded for their superior work in carrying out the programs of various committees. Many beautiful silver trophies, certificates of award and cash prizes were carried home by the societies. All are to be commended for the excellent work accomplished during the year. The newly elected officers were installed by the State Chaplain, Amy Richardson of Lucy Spell Raiford Society.

Following the banquet, the Grand March was held proceeding the Ball. All senior leaders were allowed to observe the March only, and to the tune of "Good Night Seniors" they left with only the assigned chaperones remaining.
