Tamassee DAR School - Board of Trustees: Mrs. Peter S. Hanf; Advisory Committee: Mrs. Peter S. Hanf, Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall, Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr., Mrs. Inman D. Jackson, Jr., Mrs. Calvin C. Kammeyer, Mrs. Fred A. Miller, Jr., Mrs. James J. Muldrow, Mrs. Arthur H. Waite, and Mrs. Jerido Ward. Mrs. James J. Muldrow is also a member of the Tamassee Long Range Planning Committee.

Mrs. Bell read Article VIII, Sections 1,2,3,4,5, and 6 of the State Bylaws pertaining to the Fall Board of Management.

Mrs. Rena S. Morgan, Credentials Chairman, gave the first credentials report of 80 registered, establishing a quorum.

Mrs. Hanf introduced Mrs. J. L. R. Boyd and Miss Mary Kate Tribble, Timekeepers for the meeting. State Officers are allowed 3 minutes to report and State Chairmen 2 minutes.

The State First Vice Regent, Mrs. Fred A. Miller, Jr., took the Chair while the State Regent reported. Mrs. Hanf thanked the Georgia Chapters for being hard at work and giving her the opportunity to greet them at the elegant tea hosted by the Atlanta Chapter. She has visited 11 chapters in addition to meeting with chapters in the NE and NW Districts; installed officers, given talks, presented medals and attended grave markings for Revolutionary soldiers and DAR members; represented the State Society at an S.A.R. meeting, the C.A.R. Southeastern Regional meeting and a U.D.C. reception honoring their National President, Mrs. Anthony J. LaCavera, Sr.; her picture was made with Governor Zell Miller as he signed the Constitution Week Proclamation. She also attended Proceedings and Finance Committee meetings and finalized plans for the 1995 and 1996 Fall Board of Management. March 1995 State Conference plans are well underway also. The Historian General would like old scrapbooks or any other old material dealing with chapters. Check with her office before sending anything. A colored brochure on Constitution Hall will be available around the first of the year. The Program Committee has 5 videos: 3 on the environment, one on the Statue of Liberty and one that deals with the U.S. Senate. A new catalog will be available in the spring. Credentials should be sent in promptly and with only one check. This year, the Georgia delegation will be seated downstairs at Continental Congress. DAR School, as well as the ribbon cutting for the new Lunchroom. Mrs. Miller thanked the State Regent for her outstanding report and excellent leadership and a rising vote of appreciation was given by the assembly.

Seventeen programs have been given and 4 chapter visits. Chapter Officer Report forms have been received from 105 chapters. Proceedings for 1993-94 are available for \$5.00 and \$1.00 postage if mailed.

Mrs. Harvey, Corresponding Secretary, attended a grave marking ceremony, mailed the State Regent's two letters, compiled an alphabetical roster and correction sheet for the 1993-94 Proceedings. Consolidated Report forms are to be picked up by Regents or someone from the chapter. She asked to know of any problem in receiving the mail from her.

Mrs. R. Hugh Reid, Honorary State Regent, requested to speak to the importance of meeting the dues deadline. Chapters may not have a voting representation at Continental Congress if the dues deadline is not met. This means dues must be in the hands of the Treasurer General before December 1.

In the absence of Mrs. Donald D. Hankinson, Finance Committee Chairman, the State Regent announced the Finance Committee would report at State Conference.

Mrs. Forsyth, Registrar, reported Georgia membership at 7,645 with 22 transfers out, 21 transfers in, 15 transfers within the state, 4 to go at large, 39 deceased, 42 resignations, 8 reinstatements and 64 new members with 48 regular and 16 juniors. On the national level, 2,049 have been dropped, 951 new life members and 275 reinstated. The last NSDAR number was 762,209. All files have been transferred onto the new computer owned by the Georgia State Society with everything in place.

Mrs. Usry, Historian, stressed the deadline for selecting the outstanding American History teacher is December 15. The paper work for marking a DAR member's grave now goes through the Organizing Secretary General's office and not the Historian General.

Mrs. Lee, Librarian, stated 10 books have been given to the NSDAR Library; deadline for credit for 1994 is December 31. Georgia bookplates are available from her for 5/\$1.00. She also has information on the Bookworm Project and lists of books and magazines needed by the Library pertaining to Georgia.

Mrs. Ragan, Curator, reported she had attended 2 grave marking ceremonies. All flags were in place at all summer workshops and Fall Board of Management and all properties have been kept in good repair.

After a short break, reporting continued from the State Chairmen of National Committees - American Heritage: Mrs. G. E. Lenaeus announced the 1994-95 theme, "The Richness of the Past, Preserved for the Future," and encouraged participation in the 4 contests in the fields of art, crafts, literature and music. American History: Mrs. Ronald H. Salter gave the topic for the essay contest, "Living in America in Colonial Days 1607-1776." The Vice Chairman from each district was recognized. American Indians: Mrs. John K. Bretch announced Governor Zell Miller had signed the Proclamation for November 1994 to be AMERICAN INDIAN HERITAGE MONTH and construction will soon begin on a Youth Center at Bacone College, Chapter treasurers should note if contributions are not designated, donations will go into the American Indian General Fund. Americanism and DAR Manual for Citizenship: In the absence of Mrs. Enver B. Hoff, Chairman, Mrs. George C. Clark, SE Vice Chairman, stated 2 Medals of Honor have been approved and one chapter has entered the "Illustrating America" contest. Manuals for Citizenship are available from the State Chairman, 3-29¢ stamps to mail. Children of the American Revolution: Mrs. Earl Johnson announced the state theme, "The Sound of Youth on the March," and the state project is to raise \$500.00 to become a bronze medal sponsor for the Georgia Special Olympics 1995 Indoor Winter Games. The Georgia C.A.R. hosted the Southeastern Regional Meeting in July where over \$4,000.00 was raised for the Centennial Project. The Georgia C.A.R. State President accompanied Mrs. Johnson

on the DAR Workshop tour in August. Their presentation centered on the theme, "Get Around Tuit and Support Georgia C.A.R." At the State Government Studies Seminar, the eagle, the C.A.R. patriotic symbol, will be celebrated and the members will study the F.B.I. Constitution Week: Mrs. Robert H. Gladney awaits all the reports on Constitution Week that will be compiled into a Georgia Society report for judging in the Southeastern Division. Proclamations signed by Governor Zell Miller are available, DAR Good Citizens; Mrs. Inman D. Jackson, Jr., stressed important points to note on the application papers for Good Citizen candidates, the deadline of January 1, 1995 and that pins and certificates can only be purchased through the State Chairman, DAR Magazine Advertising: Mrs. James L. Fritze announced 75 chapters participated in the Co-op ads which appeared in the August-September 1994 issue of the DAR Magazine. There were 6 pages of ads with a total of \$2,400.00 in revenue. Individual chapter and campaign ads totalled an additional \$1,155,00. The deadline for the 1995-96 Co-op Ads is May 1, 1995. DAR Museum: Mrs. Raiferd L. Gibeling gave suggestions for chapter programs and emphasized the proper respect and care of the flag. Genealogical Records: Mrs. Wrenshaw W. Vice Chairman, State Indexing Project: Mrs. Everett E. Porter, Jr., stated that work is completed on the catalog of the more than 500 volume collection at the Georgia Archives and, work continues on the indexing of individual volumes. Honor Roll: Miss Kay Yarbrough, State Chairman of the National Honor Roll, encouraged chapters to strive for the national honor roll. She pointed out 3 major stumbling blocks: dues, membership and magazine. Junior Membership: Mrs. Ronald D. Kent thanked the State Regent for her support in the Junior projects. A Junior Handbook and Directory have been published and a newsletter started as well as regional coffees. A Junior Member Club has been formed, officers being: Mrs. James F. Fritze, President; Mrs. Fred A. Miller, Jr., Vice President; Mrs. Jonathan Fox, Treasurer; and Mrs. William L. Bush, Secretary, Gratitude was expressed to Mrs. Edward E. Lusk for piecing and quilting the quilt presented to Mrs. Jerido Ward, Honorary State Regent. Lineage Research: Mrs. Robert G. Fountain urged chapters to let her know of any prospective member having difficulty with documentation or contact the district chairman. Lineage workshops were encouraged. Membership: In the absence of Chairman, Mrs. Wilbur Avera, Mrs. Forsyth, State Historian, reported that 32 names have been referred to Georgia chapters from the NSDAR; 13 names have been referred to Georgia chapters from a California computer service. Four favorable responses have been received back from chapters. National Defense: Mrs. John D. Millar reported that all chapters have someone listed as national defense chairman with the National Defense committee, some being regents. Chapters supporting the Metro Atlanta ROTC units should send checks to this chairman. Deadline is December 31. Program: Mrs. William E. Shubert reminded regents to send her their chapter yearbooks for judging and to submit entries for the best program contest. The following programs are available through this state chairman: Berry School, the Washington Memorial Carillon, Meadow Garden Museum and the 100th Anniversary Celebration of the NSDAR. Seimes Microfilm Center: Mrs. R. E. Scott stated the project of the microfilm center was to acquire the 2000 rolls of service records of Revolutionary War soldiers. Cost is \$23.00 each and chapters were urged to donate one roll.

After a short break, the State Chairmen of Special National and State Committees reported. Commemorative Events: Mrs. James L. Brown related the two questions on the consolidated report form; special celebrations commemorating the 50th Anniversary of World War II and, any other special event. A list of events that can be celebrated is in the summer packet. Friends of the Library: Miss Florrie B. Jackson reported that two chairs had been purchased for the "special chair project" for the NSDAR Library; Ellagene Baker of the William Marsh Chapter and Florrie Jackson of the Oothcaloga Chapter. Another project needing financial support is the updating of the computer system of the NSDAR Library. Insignia: Miss Patricia A. Glenn has the Caldwell new order forms as well as Garnay order forms. Members were reminded to be on the "lookout" at flea markets or antique shops for DAR Insignia or pins for sale. President General's Project: Mrs. Harry L. Dickey stated chapters striving for the 100% participation in the Blair Administration's President General's Project should send their final contribution this year. Thirty-seven chapters have reached this goal this far. Honor Roll requirements were reiterated. Bylaws: Mrs. R. Hugh Reid reported this committee of seven have met and discussed the Standing Rules for the Georgia State Society and hope to present them for consideration at the 1995 State Conference along with a full report of the Bylaws. The chairman commended the 1992-94 Bylaws Committee for their excellent work in the revision of the Bylaws. Coordinator of Districts: Mrs. Robert E. Vance, Sr., reported that 7 pages of instructions was written and placed in 3-ring binders for all District Directors. These binders will be passed on to future appointments. Hostess regents and chapters of the District Workshops and Fall Board for 1994 were thanked for their hospitality and successful work. Northeast District Director: Mrs. William L. Frady reported 161 present at the NE Workshop hosted by the Philadelphia Winn and Sunbury Chapters. She accompanied the State Regent on her official visits to chapters in the NE District. The 1995 NE Workshop will be hosted by the Henry Walton Chapter in Madison. Northwest District Director: Mrs. John M. Karlovich recognized the William McIntosh Chapter for a successful NW Workshop with 180 in attendance and delightful reception in the hotel built by Chief McIntosh and Joel Bailey. She expressed her pleasure in accompanying the State Regent to luncheons, teas and receptions hosted by 18 chapters, the Governor's signing of the Constitution Week Proclamation and two grave markings. She was also a participant in the SAR-DAR Constitution Day luncheon, Southeast District Director: Mrs. Ronald E. McCrosky stated 170, many from the SW District, had attended the 1994 District Workshop hosted by the Archibald Bulloch Chapter. The State Regent's official visits have been coordinated with the chapters. The Altamaha Chapter will host the 1995 Workshop in Jesup. Southwest District Director: Mrs. Glenn Vaughn, Jr., expressed gratitude and appreciation to the hostess chapters of the District Workshops for inviting members from the SW District to attend other workshops since flood waters necessitated the cancelling of the SW District Workshop. Conference Pages: The State Regent urged that names be sent to the State Chairman, Mrs. Peggy Usry, Cooperation of DAR with SAR and S.R.: Mrs. Hugh H. Howell, Jr., told of a successful DAR-SAR luncheon held in September with Mr. Hal Suit speaking on his World War II experiences. One hundred thirty-seven attended and even more are expected next year, September 16, 1995, when Mrs. Denton, Secretary to President Eisenhower, will be the speaker.

DAR Literature: Mrs. Charles H. Waters happily reported that most everything had been sold but there were newly revised order forms. Some bargain books were still available that would make excellent speaker gifts. History of the Georgia State Society: Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar stressed the importance of histories from state officers, state chairmen and regents with complete details; relating what, who, where, when and how. Lucy Cook Peel Memorial: Mrs. Robert H. Farrow stated the Membership Roll and Register of Ancestors of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, 1986 edition, was for sale, \$12.50 and if mailed, an additional \$3.00. Marking Revolutionary Soldiers' Graves and Restoring Historic Spots: Mrs. Miriam T. Hickman reported that graves of 2 Revolutionary War soldiers have been marked. Parliamentarian: Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr., emphasized the necessity of Chapter Bylaws conforming to the model found on page 230 in the 1993 NSDAR Handbook. Everything in italics is required. Problem areas underlined were: under Article III. Section 2, the sentence "the chapter may not discriminate ..." must be included; Article IV, Section 3, "dues ... shall be credited to the next succeeding calendar year," not May 1 or October 1 as in some Chapter Bylaws; Article IV, Section 4, it is suggested to put in what the chapter dues are plus the amount for the national and state dues. Article XIII, this is not required by the National Society, but is strongly suggested because the IRS is very interested in what will be done with the monies in the event of disbandment. The State Parliamentarian should have an updated and current copy of each chapter's Bylaws. Press Book: Miss Patricia Woods told members it was not too late to send a newspaper clipping to be included in the State Press Book. The clipping must include the front banner of the paper and the dateline from top of the page on which the article appears. Proceedings: Mrs. Arthur H. Waite reported in the absence of Mrs. James J. Leitch. Mrs. Waite thanked Mrs. W. Franklin Chastain and all others responsible for the early publishing of the 1993-94 Proceedings. She stressed the urgency of getting reports for the Proceedings in by the deadline. Protocol: Mrs. Thomas Knox Kendrick stated that Protocol Procedure begins on page 180 in the 1993 NSDAR Handbook. These are the principles for ethics, courtesy, good manners and successful meetings. Resolutions: In the absence of Chairman, Mrs. Charles F. Wysong, Mrs. Thomas Knox Kendrick read four Resolutions and moved their adoption; DAR Schools Per Capita Allocation, adopted; Appreciation to the State Regent, Mrs. Peter S. Hanf, adopted with a rising vote; Courtesy Resolutions, adopted; Best Wishes to Mrs. Jerido Ward, adopted with a rising vote.

Reports continued. Scrapbook: Mrs. William L. Bush, Jr., reminded the members of the rules and guidelines in preparing their chapter scrapbook, deadlines and awards to be given at the 1995 State Conference. Textbook Study: Mrs. Calvin C. Kammeyer urged members to become involved in the textbook and library book selection process. The Public Relations people of school boards are available to speak to chapters about textbooks and library book selections. Transportation: Mrs. Charles H. Kezar announced the bus trip to Continental Congress, leaving on Monday, April 17, 1995 and returning Sunday, April 23 with a total cost (meals not included) of \$470.00. Deposit of \$50.00 due now and a LSASE to this state chairman.

Reports of Meadow Garden Museum Chairmen – Meadow Garden Chairman: Mrs. John R. Henry reported for Mrs. Roy H. Cagle, Jr. The Augusta Magazine featured Meadow Garden in the October/November issue; there were more than 1200 visitors from 40 states and 11 foreign countries; two Open Houses with the Walton Rehabilitation Hospital and the Augusta Canal Authority; a December Christmas feature will be in the Augusta magazine and on T.V. Channel 6. Silk flowers have been placed in several rooms with live ferns in 3 rooms. A slide presentation is being updated for programs and photographs will be available in the Museum Shop. Grapevine wreaths

and fresh rosemary are being sold now. Docent, Gloria Clark, was recognized for her competency and enthusiasm. Meadow Garden Furnishings: Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar spoke of the beauty of the house museum. Fern stands, prior to 1820, are needed as well as contributions for the purchase of such stands; needed is some extremely life-like food. Leather bound books and old silver, both of the period before 1820, are also desired. Meadow Garden Landscaping: Mrs. John R. Henry related the wonderful vegetables growing in the kitchen garden and herbs in the herb garden. A walk from the front walk to the new back patio will soon be installed and the sprinkler system extended and automated. Meadow Garden Patrons: Mrs. Flew Murphey invited everyone to become a patron; chapters for \$100.00, individuals for \$50.00 and businesses for \$100.00. Anyone can be a patron. Total registration without duplication, 175. (Represented in this number are 4 National Chairmen/Vice Chairmen and 72 State Chairmen/Vice Chairmen.) By direction of the Committee, Mrs. Morgan moved the adoption of the credentials report. Report was adopted. Mrs. Morgan presented the Credentials Committee, Miss Ellagene Baker, Mrs. Paul F. Brennaman and Mrs. David A. Roth.

Mrs. Whitson called the roll of the Board of Management Meeting. After announcements and the drawing for the complimentary room, sweatshirts and Junior Bazaar gift, the assembly stood for the singing of "God Bless America" and recessed for lunch

At lunch, the blessing was brought by Mrs. Moody C. Summers, Jr., State Chaplain. Mrs. Peter S. Hanf, State Regent, presented the hostess chapter regents, Mrs. Emmett T. Bragg, Oliver Morton, Mrs. Paul E. Gardner, Nancy Hart, the Honorary State Regents as a group, and the State Officers and Parliamentarian as a group. After lunch, Mrs. Hanf introduced Mr. Marty Willett, noted for his portrayal of Sidney Lanier. Your Organizing Secretary has attended State Conference, 4 District Workshops and Executive Board Meetings. All correspondence concerning preservation and growth of chapters has been answered. Follow-up contacts have been made and workshops have been discussed with 2 chapters that requested help. Your officer is grateful for the opportunity to serve the State Society in this office under the leadership of our capable State Regent

STATE TREASURER - Mrs. B. W. Hunter

This officer has kept the financial records of the Georgia State Society and the Meadow Garden Museum. Financial statements for the meetings of the Meadow Garden Board, Finance Committee, Fall Board of Management and State Conference were prepared. Monies with monthly reports were sent to the Treasurer General. State Officers and Chairmen received reports of contributions concerning their committees. Materials for the workshops and Chapter Treasurer's Report Forms were prepared and distributed. State Honor Roll certificates were presented to 53 Chapters and 22 Chapters earned Honorable Mention. This officer attended State Conference; Continental Congress, the Treasurer General's workshop, and served for the third year as Chairman of the Lost and Found House Committee; four district workshops, co-leading the session on "Money"; Tamassee Founders' Day; Fall Board of Management; and all Executive, Finance and Meadow Garden Board meetings. Working with the chapters has been a pleasure, and this officer wishes to thank you, Madam State Regent, and all Georgia Daughters for the privilege of serving as State Treasurer. (The Audit Report follows on page 96.)

STATE REGISTRAR - Mrs. James Forsyth

The State Registrar has kept the membership files current for Georgia State Society according to the printouts received from the offices of the Registrar General and the Organizing Secretary General. The National Society reported 7,662 members in the Georgia State Society in February. During the year, we have had 350 members admitted by application, 64 of which were Juniors; 15 members by transfer into the state and 23 reinstatements. Georgia lost 268 by resignation, 156 by death, 20 by transfer out of state and 56 were dropped. Chapter Registrars reported work in 79 chapters. Seventy chapters reported using "Step by Step." Seventy-five chapters reported having "Is that Lineage Right?" and "Is that Service Right?". Seventy-nine chapters reported encouraging applicants to keep a copy of all material sent to National Headquarters. Seventy-six reported sending changes to the State Registrar and to the Organizing Secretary General - Membership. Special thanks to all Chapter Registrars for the good reports and work that is done in the chapters. It has been a privilege to serve the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, under the leadership of Mrs. Peter S. Hanf, State Regent.

STATE HISTORIAN - Mrs. Harold F. Usry

This officer received reports from 102 chapters. These reports showed that Georgia Daughters have been involved in 21 historical restoration projects. These include restoring and renovating chapter houses, digging for archeological artifacts, restoring and dedicating a podium, financial contributions toward local historical projects and homes and completing research and paper work to get sites on the Historical Register. Nine chapters entered candidates in the Outstanding Teacher of American History contest. Mrs. Carolyn P. Hansen, sponsored by the Elijah Clarke Chapter, was chosen as Georgia's Outstanding Teacher of American History. The graves of 26 members were marked and reported. The graves of 3 Revolutionary Soldiers were marked: James Kell, John Holloway and John Torrence. The John Laurens Chapter presented the American History Award to Mr. Scott Thompson. Contributions to the Americana Collection were \$111. Over 100 programs were presented to adults and children during the year. It has been a great honor to serve the Georgia Daughters under the leadership of our State Regent, Mrs. Hanf.

STATE LIBRARIAN - Mrs. Grover C. Lee

Georgia Daughters continue to be most generous in their contributions and time given to libraries on the local, state and national levels. Seventy-eight chapters reported, with 12 having programs on either local or NSDAR Libraries. Members volunteered at local libraries and the Carter Center in Atlanta 5,922 hours, 67 copies of A CENTURY OF SERVICE: THE STORY OF THE DAR was given to local libraries, schools, speakers and Good Citizens. Twenty-one books were sent to NSDAR Library valued at \$1,045. On the local libraries there were 510 books given at a value of \$5,334. Members used 134 Georgia bookplates. One member earned a Bookworm Pin and 2 others are working on theirs. National Book Purchasing Fund, \$21; Book Rebinding Fund \$28; Reference Library Cataloguing \$10; State Library \$230.00. Twenty-one books were confirmed accepted by the NSDAR Library. All queries were answered promptly, and thank you letters were written to chapters for confirmed book donations. Serving the Georgia State Society has been a challenging and rewarding experience. Thank you for the honor of serving under the leadership of our capable State Regent.

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING RULES

Fund Accounting

To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the resources available to the Society, the accounts of the Society are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and the reporting purposes into funds established according to their nature and purposes.

The Society considers all contributions available for unrestricted use, unless specifically restricted by the donor.

Cash Basis

The financial statements of the Society have been prepared on the cash basis.

Plant, Property and Equipment

Meadow Garden and its contents are historical treasurers, and therefore are not subject to depreciation. The house and its contents are insured for \$80,560 and \$240,750, respectively. Office furniture and fixtures are insured for \$7,500.

Any major preservation or restoration project, however, is capitalized and depreciated over its estimated useful life. These improvements, which are being depreciated over fifteen years, are summarized as follows:

At the time the Meadow Garden property was contributed by the National Society to the Georgia State Society, its fair market value was deemed to be immaterial.

Costs of office equipment are consistently charged to expense because the Society does not deem such amounts to be sufficiently material to warrant capitalization and depreciation.

Tax Status

The Society has been granted tax exempt status under Code Section 501(c)(3) of the U.S. Internal Revenue Code.

Ninety chapters reported and all encouraged members to conserve and recycle. Two NSDAR Conservation Medals were awarded. Earth Day was observed by cleaning lakeshores and roadsides; giving 50 Earth Day T-shirts to school children and saving wildlife. Arbor Day was celebrated with special plantings at schools and parks. One chapter observed Fire Prevention Week with a fire drill in an adult apartment building. Conservation programs on soil, water, air, animal and bird habitats were given. Chapter members were very involved with water purification and support for Georgia flood victims. A historic home and cabin are being restored. Birds were fed over 13,000 lbs. of seed, 54 bird houses were hung with 39 built. Chapters built butterfly gardens, nature trails and a Song Bird Arboretum. One million forty-four thousand pine trees were planted on tree farms (documented) and 1130 shade trees and 1113 flowers and shrubs were planted to beautify schools, cemeteries and cities. So much more. Thanks to all members who worked so hard.

CONSTITUTION WEEK - Mrs. Robert H. Gladney

Ninety-seven chapters reported on their observances with 104 chapters proclamations plus the statewide proclamation by Governor Zell Miller. Publicity reports showed 3380 column inches, 5021 radio and TV broadcast minutes and 5322 square feet of display. Bells Across America totaled 3952 participants in 206 schools, 168 churches, 44 libraries, and in banks, cultural centers, historic sites and home communities. Statistics cannot show the enthusiasm, originality and patriotism reflected in the reports. Noticeable was increased use of local cable TV announcements and school intercom use. Beautiful displays were placed in schools, libraries, manufacturing plants, the National Archives at East Point, local government buildings; and the message was shown on flashing sign boards, billboards and motel marquees. The Columbus chapters distributed over 1000 Constitution booklets plus much other materials. Thomasville Chapter sponsored a remarkably successful school poster contest for grades 1-8. Fort Peachtree had a proclamation signed by Atlanta Mayor Bill Campbell. At least 11 chapters mentioned the presence of our State Regent at their observances. Benjamin Hawkins Chapter's program at Randolph-Clay High School had Lt. Gov. Pierre Howard the speaker before 2800 audience. These few highlights scarcely tell the wonderful works throughout the state. The award for best overall participation goes to John Laurens Chapter. Every school, church, the entire community, was involved.

DAR GOOD CITIZENS - Mrs. Inman D. Jackson, Jr.

One hundred chapters reported with 86 participating in the selection of 248 Good Citizens from the 279 schools contacted. The four District winners are: Northeast District - Janet Christin Fleming, sponsored by the John Franklin Wren Chapter; Northwest District - Kristin LaUna Glover, sponsored by the Baron DeKalb Chapter; Southeast District - Heather Nicole Watkins, sponsored by the Brunswick Chapter; Southwest District - Emily Kathryn Brunk, sponsored by the Commodore Richard Dale Chapter, Janet Christin Fleming, the State Winner of the DAR Good Citizen contest, was presented the State Winner's pin, certificate and \$350.00 in prize money at State Conference. Each district winner received \$50.00 in prize money. Many chapters honor their winner with special award ceremonies including teas, luncheons and meetings which include parents when pins and certificates are presented. Eighteen chapters awarded a total of \$790 in cash and bonds to their winners and one chapter awards two quarters of tuition at a local college. DAR MAGAZINE - Mrs. Charles W. Ennis

Georgia had an increase in DAR Magazine subscriptions this year with 1558 of the membership subscribing and 72 chapters meeting the requirement for State Honor Roll. Among those features in the magazine found most interesting were Lineage Research, historical articles, Minutes of the Board Meetings and reports from the chapters. Our Chapter DAR Magazine Chairmen are to be congratulated for their extra work in the increase of 244 subscribers. Many thanks for all you have done.

DAR MAGAZINE ADVERTISING - Mrs. James L. Fritze

Seventy-five chapters participated in the 1994 Co-op ads, placing six full pages of ads honoring the State Officers, State Conference Pages, National American History Essay Contest Winner, Georgia's Outstanding Junior, C.A.R. Debutantes and War veterans. Georgia received credit for \$3555.00 in ad revenues for the August-September issue. One chapter placed a full page ad honoring their chapter; 26 individual ads were placed by chapters. Total combined revenue from 89 Georgia chapters in 1994 was \$6154.75. This chairman established an interest-bearing money market account for magazine advertising funds. The account opened in April with a balance of \$2287.47 and interest accrued is \$14.96. DAR SCHOOLS - Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall

Reports were received from 100 chapters. The Hightower DAR School Award was presented to 49 chapters with Commodore Richard Dale and William Marsh Chapters honored for largest per capita contributions. Chapters receiving award for the most poundage to KDS and/or Tamassee were Hightower Trail and Xavier Chapters, Sixtythree chapters had a full program on the schools. 32,987 labels, \$45,173.84 in cash register receipts sent to KDS and 18,418 pounds of resale items were contributed by 100 chapters, School contributions; Tamasse, \$11,727,15; KDS, \$4,831,65; Berry, \$1,234.68; Crossnore, \$1,090.50; Hillside, \$486.50; Hindman, \$502.50 - Totaling \$19,872.98. \$8,566.98 has been contributed to the State Projects at Berry, KDS and Tamassee. DAR SERVICE FOR VETERANS-PATIENTS - Miss Mary King

Georgia Daughters continued their devoted service to Veteran Patients. In addition to the VA Medical Centers in Atlanta, Augusta and Dublin, 19 other facilities were helped. One hundred and one chapters reported 1431 visits to medical facilities requiring 17,000 miles of travel; 65 parties given; cash, magazines, books and gifts totaled \$25,000. Over 300 ounces of cancelled stamps sent Veteran Patient facilities for therapy use. Gifts included many comfort items as well as puzzles, cards, candy, etc. Daughters handmade lap robes and wheelchair bags, pillows and covers. Holidays were celebrated with food, gifts, flags and decorations. This chairman attended Veteran Service Organization meetings in Dublin and Atlanta as well as the 22nd Anniversary Salute to Hospitalized Veterans in Atlanta. Georgia Daughters have been busy promoting our Flag. Chapters opened their meetings with the Pledge of Allegiance and urged members to fly their flag on holidays. Reports from 95 chapters were received. Fifty-nine large flags were

presented, 868 small and miniature flags were given out; 11,025 flag codes given to schools, chapter members, mall shoppers, dental offices, Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts. Forty booklets on "Our Flag" were distributed, 250 flag bookmarks, 150 flag pins, 100 flag stickers and 969 pamphlets. Twenty-seven special programs on or near Flag Day were presented on the American Flag. Ads were placed in newspapers to encourage people to fly the flag. Four chapters had Flag replacement ceremonies. Veterans' graves were decorated with American Flags. It has been a privilege to serve under your capable leadership, Madam State Regent.

Reports were received from 79% of Georgia's 107 chapters, with 65% of the chapters receiving recognition in one of the three Honor Roll categories. Pending confirmation from National, Georgia should receive 33 Gold, 25 Silver and 16 Honorable Mention awards. Totals are subject to change as final confirmation is not received until Continental Congress. The most frequently missed questions on the 94-95 questionnaire were 2A and 2B, dealing with increases in membership and the admittance of a Junior member; 6A, magazine subscriptions totaling 20% and question 10, chapter involvement in DAR work with a minimum of eight questions answered in the affirmative.

JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS - Mrs. W. Daniel McCranie, II

This Chairman is pleased to report 21 new JAC Clubs; with a total of 112 Clubs with membership of 3686 individuals. Total chapter contributions were \$237.00. Special recognition to Abraham Baldwin and Thomasville Chapters for outstanding work in JAC; Lamar-LaFayette Chapter for most new clubs and to Baron DeKalb Chapter, for most money contributed. Received reports from 103 chapters. A special thanks to Mrs. Hanf, our State Regent, for allowing me to serve the state society in this capacity.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP - Mrs. Ronald D. Kent

THE YEAR OF THE JUNIOR has been a great success in Georgia! There has been an increase in Junior membership and Junior participation in DAR activities. A total of 97 chapters reported that 52 new Juniors have been added to Georgia's roster this year. Junior members serve as State Chairmen, Vice Chairmen, Chapter Regents, Officers and Chairmen. We have published a Junior Directory, Junior Handbook and started a Junior newsletter, The Acorn. The Georgia Junior Member Club, open to any Georgia Daughter who joined as a Junior, was chartered this year. Our first Fall Board function, the 4th of July in October celebration, was a great success with 72 ladies in attendance. In appreciation of her support of Junior Membership, Georgia Juniors presented the Friends of Junior Membership pin to our State Regent, Mrs. Peter S. Hanf. Regional Junior functions were held honoring Juniors and prospective Juniors. Georgia's contribution to the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund was \$749.75. Georgia's 1995 Outstanding Junior is Peggy Swann Usry from the Peter Early Chapter. This chairman would like to thank and recognize Mrs. Jerry A. Davis, Vice Chairman, Sales, and Mrs. Guy H. Miller, Jr., Vice Chairman, Contest, for their hard work and dedication.

LINEAGE RESEARCH - Mrs. Robert G. Fountain, Sr.

Reports were received from 99 chapters. Chapters reported assisting 440 prospective members; accepting 216 for membership and 62 application papers pending approval in Washington. Sixteen chapters reported they did not help assist any prospective members; 21 reported having purchased the new Lineage Research Kit; six had publicized public genealogical workshops to assist prospective members and citizens in their community. Georgia Lineage Research Committee Vice Chairmen have been scheduling and holding workshops to help chapters with prospective members having difficulty finding needed information requested on application papers. Through this Committee, one chapter was successful in helping a prospective member find a revolutionary ancestor enabling her to become a member of NSDAR. The Committee has tried to help all chapters requesting help. Thank you, Madam State Regent, for giving me the opportunity to serve the Georgia State Society as Lineage Research Chairman.

MEMBERSHIP - Mrs. Wilbur K. Avera

One hundred chapters filed membership reports for this year. From this material we learn that we have gained 218 new members by application, 16 members by reinstatement and 72 members transferred. We also find we have lost 394 members due to death, resignation and dropped. Statewide we lost 88 more members than we gained. Forty-four referrals have been passed on to the chapters from NSDAR and 13 referrals have been sent to chapters from a computer source. Seventy-one chapters have welcomed new or reinstated members. We praise these hardworking chapters and encourage others to follow their example. These chapters received \$5.00 for the most new members by application based on percentage increase: Membership (1-49) Sunbury; (50-99) Martha Stewart Bulloch; (100 plus) Fort Peachtree. An award was presented to Cherokee for having the most new Junior members. The National Membership Chairman's State Conference Award went to Sunbury Chapter for a 15% increase in their membership. MOTION PICTURE, RADIO and TELEVISION - Mrs. Alton K. Bruce

The project of this committee is to extend NSDAR Videotape Library of tapes available for DAR Programs. Please continue to use the tapes for programs and contribute monetary gifts through the Treasurer General for purchasing tapes. Be active and informed, PRAISE the good, REBUKE or PROTEST violence, explicit sex and profanity. Sponsor or show quality film or videos to special groups. It is imperative to show we care. Forty-six chapters reported on this committee; 38 letters were written to the networks, 12 members appeared on TV, 27 on radio and one member was in a feature film. Movies voted best were: Family, "Little Women"; Children, "Lion King"; Adults, "Forrest Gump." Television shows voted best were: Family, "Dr. Quinn, Medicine Woman." We must be concerned about the programs and videos the media produces; these are so readily available for public listening, purchasing and viewing. Awards were made by Abraham Baldwin, Commodore Richard Dale, Joseph Habersham and Thomasville. Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure to serve as Chairman of this Committee.

NATIONAL DEFENSE - Mrs. John D. Millar

Annual reports were received from 103 chapters, with 103 chapters having five minutes of National Defense and 87 having a full program. Ninety-eight furnished extra material at meetings, 33 provided material for schools and 44 materials for libraries. Good Citizenship medals were presented to 165 young people with 107 certificates presented. One hundred eight bronze medals were presented to cadets in high schools; and gold medals were presented to 39 students in colleges and universities. Fifty chapters reported giving \$185.00 to the ROTC Award Program and \$51.00 to Dollars for Defense. The 1994 Resolutions adopted at Congress were discussed in 92 chapters. Chairmen in 102 chapters encouraged their members to vote in every election. Defense topics of greatest interest were: Education, GATT-WTO and Illegal Immigration. Nine chapters submitted entries in the National Best Program Contest. In addition, three chapters were recognized in the report to the Southeastern Division for overall good program committee work: Hightower Trail, Martha Stewart Bulloch, and Oglethorpe Chapters. From the four yearbook supplements submitted for State judging, Council of Safety and Elijah Clarke Chapters receive Certificates of Award. Yearbook awards are: membership under 50 - Roswell King Chapter; 51 to 100 - Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter; and over 100 - Atlanta Chapter. PUBLIC RELATIONS - Mrs. William D. Wilson, Sr.

Appreciation to the Georgia Daughters for the wonderful job you did in promoting the DAR Story. Spot announcements and programs were heard and seen on radio and television promoting DAR events and patriotism. Editorials, feature articles and photographs were published in a variety of newspapers. The DAR Story was spread well across Georgia. One hundred four chapters reporting - Newspaper: 1467 articles, 533 photographs, total 14,157 inches; Radio: six programs, 1501 spots, total minutes 3597; Television: seven programs, 789 spots, total minutes 2726. It has been an honor to serve our State Regent.

SEIMES MICROFILM CENTER - Mrs. Rod E. Scott

One thousand one hundred fifty rolls of the Service Records of Revolutionary War Soldiers are now on file in Seimes Microfilm Center. This year the National Chairman has worked to complete this series of film plus the Records of Naval Personnel During the Revolutionary War. Readers continually need repairs, and new readers are needed. Seimes Microfilm Center continues to function only on contributions from chapters around the nation. Our State Treasurer received \$1,037.00 from Georgia chapters this year. Out of our 107 chapters, 72 participated. COMMEMORATIVE EVENTS - Mrs. James L. Brown

The Commemorative Events Committee received reports from 102 Georgia Chapters. Forty-four chapters reported celebrations commemorating the 50th Anniversary of World War II. Forty-nine chapters celebrated other special days of commemoration. Including in their reports a myriad of activities, marking graves, preparing special packages for the veteran patients, enjoying the music of the war years, and searching for veterans of the World War I period. Certificates of Award go to the following chapters: 1st Place, John Laurens Chapter, for their work as a "Commemorative Community" in focusing community attention on the anniversary of World War II, and their continued work with and for veterans at the Carl Vinson Medical Center, particularly on Four Chaplains Day and Arbor Day; 2nd Place, Commodre Richard Dale Chapter for their World War II program on Prisoners of War in the Philippines and their special observance of 12 commemorative dates; 3rd Place, Elijah Clarke Chapter for their World War II theme, decorations and display at the 1994 State Conference, and their program of recognition for World War II veteran members. My appreciation to all the participating chapters for their promotion and support of this committee.

FRIENDS OF THE LIBRARY - Florrie Jackson

Reports were received from 101 Chapters. The committee's emphasis for the summer of 1994 was for donations toward the purchase of chairs for the NSDAR Library. Two chapters were given credit for purchasing chairs - the Oothcaloga Chapter and the William Marsh Chapter. The Fort Peachtree Chapter is credited with a Life Membership. The total amount contributed through the Friends of the Library was \$727.00. INSIGNIA - Miss Patricia A. Glenn

Reports were received from 100 chapters, and awards in various membership categories are listed in the Awards Section of these Proceedings. Chapters reported the following: 49 have a DAR banner; four will obtain one within the year; 79 have a Chapter Regent's pin; 44 present an Ex-Regent's pin to their outgoing Regent; 14 had a program on Insignia. Georgia Daughters purchased a total of 341 Insignia and ribbon pins and 99 other DAR items including charms, rings, Centennial items, spoons, recognition pins, flag pins and other items. Over 90 books were given as well as pencils, pads, pens, literature on hygiene and voting instructions. writing skills; house goods, cloths, transportation, and tutoring to Migrant workers. One chapter participated in the first ever TV program for securing potential GED graduates, another chapter set up literacy classes at a mobile home center housing cannery workers. Awards were given to: 1st Place - Xavier Chapter, 2nd Place - Elijah Clarke Chapter, and 3rd Place - Oliver Morton Chapter, for their outstanding work. Honorable Mention to: General James Jackson, Hawkinsville, and Tomochichi Chapters. This chairman thanks every Georgia Daughter who has given of her talent, time, or donations to improve the quality of life for others.

NSDAR MUSEUM CORRESPONDENT DOCENTS - Melodye G. Brown

One hundred and two chapters made reports to the DAR Museum Correspondent Docents Committee. Meadow Garden has had a very busy year with a 31.5% increase in tourism over last year. Special events included Peach State Radio hosting the Augusta Canal Canoe Trip with a barbecue on the grounds of Meadow Garden; Walton Hospital hosted National Rehabilitation Week and Meadow Garden was opened for tours and a video was on display at the hospital; the house was open for tours on Augusta Canal Discovery Day. The Georgia Historical Society winter quarterly meeting was held in Augusta and the members toured the Museum. Meadow Garden was decorated for Christmas and an Open House was held on December 10 and 11. Docents were provided by the Augusta, College Hill and Wrens Chapters. Meadow Garden's 1994 Open House pictures will be featured in the Augusta Magazine next Fall; advertising purchased in an Olympic magazine to be produced by Augusta Magazine which will have a minimum printing of 10,000. Brochures are at all Georgia Welcome Centers and other tourist attractions. A slide presentation will be available this spring for use by chapters for programs. The security system has been replaced with a new and updated model. The Meadow Garden Museum Board appreciates the increased interest from the Georgia Daughters and look forward to your visits. MEADOW GARDEN MUSEUM BOARD - June 8, 1994

The Meadow Garden Museum Board met Wednesday, June 8, 1994 at Meadow Garden with Mrs. Peter S. Hanf, State Regent, presiding as Chairman of the Board. The meeting was called to order at 10:04 a.m. The Invocation was given by Mrs. James H. Elliott, Jr., Museum Shop Chairman. Others present were: Mrs. Fred A. Miller, Jr., Mrs. Roy H. Cagle, Jr., Mrs. Hugh H. Harris, Mrs. Charles H. Turner, Mrs. R. M. Hunter, Mrs. John R. Henry, Mrs. Flew Murphey and ex-officio members, Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall and Mrs. Billy W. Hunter. By invitation of the Chairman, Mrs. Jerido Ward and Mrs. Bennett W. Burns, Jr., attended briefly and gave a final report. Mrs. Ward stated work on the south side is finished, lattice work on the canal side completed and the patio finished. The dining room ceiling continues to peel and this needs to be checked. She expressed appreciation for having the opportunity of serving as Chairman of the Meadow Garden Museum. She expressed hope that the farm bell would be moved to the back of the kitchen and the back gate closed. Mrs. Hanf, on behalf of the Board, thanked Mrs. Ward and Mrs. Burns for their service. Copies of Standing Rules for the Meadow Garden Museum were passed out and Standing Rules Nos. 2, 4 and 5 were read by Mrs. Miller. Reference was made to Rule #7 stating that the State First Vice Regent shall serve as Secretary of the Board. Minutes of the March 9, 1994 meeting were read and approved. Copies of the financial statement were distributed. On the motion of Mrs. Cagle, it was moved and seconded that the Meadow Garden Museum Board recommend to the Finance Committee that the Meadow Garden Museum have its own checking account and that the money market funds pertaining to the Meadow Garden Museum be separated from the Georgia State Society money market funds. Adopted. The Stribling Certificate of Deposit was discussed and the Board decided that the interest from the Stribling CD would go back into the CD. Mrs. James Clark, Museum/House Manager, joined the Board and reported a tourist increase of 321/2% for the first five months of this year. She recommended purchasing a new cord for the barrier post, a 13 star flag for the Board Room and a small electric heater for the Museum Shop, Mrs. Hanf thanked Mrs. Clark for her dedication to her job and she was excused. The Board gave approval for the heater, not to exceed \$50.00 and for the cord. Mrs. Cagle, Meadow Garden Museum Chairman, reported that the state engineer would put up the old Historical Marker in July and if the Board wanted a new marker, with the correct wording, the Board would have to petition the Historical Commission. Additional signs will be installed on the canal side. Mrs. Cagle moved that motion detectors be installed on gates to monitor them while unlocked and not to exceed \$200.00. Seconded. Adopted. Violators are still using our five parking places. The Board stated that the five parking places must be protected. Mrs. Hanf will go by the police station and inquire about towing violations. On the motion of Mrs. Turner, it was moved and seconded that admission fees of \$4.00 per adult, \$2.00 per student (8-12), \$1.00 per student (K-7) be charged for regular tours and that group rates are available. Adopted. Mrs. Hunter, Docent Chairman, stated that docents are needed. In the absence of Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar, Furnishings Chairman, Mrs. Hanf reported the book on Meadow Garden will be available at the Fall Board of Management meeting and that two handleless cups were broken. Mrs. Hanf will check with the insurance company about the cups. Mrs. De Lamar was honored as a patron by the Board in appreciation for compiling the book on Meadow Garden, Mrs. Henry, Landscaping Chairman, informed the Board of the dissatisfaction with the lawn service company and suggested purchasing a lawn mower, hoe, sprayer and to continue to use Joey for cutting, etc. The Board gave approval not to exceed \$200.00. The Board accepted the bid of \$300.00 from McCall's Tree Service to trim two large mulberry trees with branches extending over the roof of the house. The Board gave approval to move the farm bell to the back of the kitchen. Mrs. Henry reported the back left corner of yard was naturalized with pine straw, kitchen garden built and planted, herb garden under construction, a pecan tree from the LBJ Ranch planted, cherokee roses planted on fence post, terra cotta pots planted with acuba, iris collected and planted in bed by canal fence, daffodil bulbs dug and some replanted behind the museum shop. She suggested the sale of grapevine wreaths and possible pepper jelly and figs. Mrs. Hanf stated that Mrs. James H. Harvey, Jr. (Atlanta Chapter) suggested selling seeds from Meadow Garden plants. The Board recommended that Mrs. Henry get prices on a sundial and marker for the herb garden in memory of Mrs. Luther L. Watson and Chippendale park benches. Mrs. Elliott, Museum Shop Chairman, reported that 5,000 note cards have been ordered at a cost of \$559.58 and the Historical Georgia maps sell well and will be reordered from the Savannah Chapter. She asked the State Treasurer to check and make sure that Mrs. Brand had received commissions on the sales of her books. Patron Chairman, Mrs. Flew Murphy, urged Board members to lead the way and become patrons. Flyers have been placed in 12 Visitation Centers. Ten thousand flyers will be ordered at a cost of \$374.83. The Board discussed new locks and resetting the security system. It was decided to keep the same locks and Mrs. Cagle volunteered her husband to reset the security alarm. On the motion of Mrs. Elliott, it was moved and seconded that the Meadow Garden Board recommend to the Proceedings Committee that the Meadow Garden listing be removed as formerly printed and consolidated as "Meadow Garden Museum Chairman" and "Meadow Garden Museum Trustees and Board" and consolidation be placed after "State Chairmen of State Standing Committees." Adopted. There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 2:50 p.m.

The Meadow Garden Museum Board met Thursday, October 27, 1994 at the Radisson Hotel, Macon, with Mrs. Peter S. Hanf, State Regent, presiding as Chairman of the Board. The meeting was called to order at 1:05 p.m. The prayer was given by Mrs. Fred A. Miller, Jr., Secretary of the Board. Others present were: Mrs. Roy H. Cagle, Jr., Mrs. Hugh Harris, Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar, Mrs. John R. Henry, Mrs. Flew Murphey and ex-officio member, Mrs. Billy W. Hunter. Minutes of the June 8, 1994 meeting were read and approved. The Financial Statement was reviewed. The checking account and money market funds have been separated from the General Account of the State Society, The Stribling Certificate of Deposit was renewed at 5.25%. Mrs. Cagle and Mrs. Henry showed new Meadow Garden Museum slides. One updated set of slides will be sent to the State Program Chairman and one set will be retained at the Meadow Garden Museum. The Meadow Garden Museum Chairman, Mrs. Cagle, stated that the Historical Sign had been put up. The sign at Thirteen and Independence has been removed by city workers. A call was made requesting that the city put the sign back up. The city has not put the sign up. There are problems with the alarm system and the company might replace it with a new system. Walton Rehabilitation Hospital continues to use our five parking places. The Board stated that the five parking places must be protected. Mrs, Clark will be instructed to call the police and have them issue warning tickets. Several painters and a paint company representative checked the dining room ceiling and gave recommendations. The Board suggested that someone with expertise in restoration needs to check the dining room ceiling. Some tourists have complained about the \$4.00 adult admission fee. On the motion of Mrs. De Lamar, it was moved and seconded to rescind the motion on increasing the adult admission fee to \$4.00 at the June 8, 1994 meeting. Adopted. Mrs. Cagle moved to set the adult fee at \$3.00. Seconded. Adopted. The booklet type brochures need to be reordered. Advertising was discussed and Mrs. Henry moved that \$160.00 be paid to advertise in Southern Hospitality Council's "cardpack." Seconded. Adopted. The 13 Star Flag and mounting set will cost \$158.00. Mrs. Hunter stated that her own John Clarke Chapter might donate the \$158.00 for the flag set. Mrs. Cagle discussed items for sale in the Museum Shop. There are only a few of the Historical maps left and they need to be reordered from the Savannah Chapter. There is only one tile left. Will they be reordered? No decision. Mrs. Cagle reported for Mrs. James Clark, Museum/House Manager. There has been a 33% tourist increase over last year, 40 states represented and 14 countries. The curtains donated by Mrs. Hanf and hung on the upstairs hall window got lots of compliments. Mrs. Clark recommends the following: The desk in the Augusta Room needs to be repaired, halls (upstairs and down) re-wallpapered, lower section of walls beneath wallpaper in the Reception Room primed and painted (water spots where it leaked prior to repairs), back steps need repair and a weak section in the floor of the back porch needs some reinforcement underneath. Mrs. De Lamar, Furnishings Chairman, informed the Board that the two handleless cups were insured at \$400.00 and after the \$250.00 deduction, the insurance company will pay \$175.00. The cups have been repaired. She stated that fern stands and plastic food are needed. It was suggested a list be made of affordable items that chapters may donate, i.e., fern stands. Mrs. Henry, Landscape Chairman, reported that work continues on the herb and kitchen gardens and walkway beside the magnolia tree, sprinkler system extended and automated, James Clark mowing and trimming as needed (\$35.00 per cutting), farm bell relocated, outside benches in place, silk flower arrangements in Best Room, Augusta Room, upstairs hall and kitchen, three live ferns in Best Room, Augusta Room and dining room. Meadow Garden Museum will be decorated for Christmas. The estimated cost of the brick walk connecting the front walk to the new back patio to be laid to match existing walks (price to include 1,000 old brick) is \$1,100.00. On the motion of Mrs. Henry, it was moved and seconded that Mrs. Henry find some type of post for the new sign that will be put up. Patron Chairman, Mrs. Murphey, asked the Board members to encourage chapters to become patrons. Mrs. Hanf, on behalf of the Board, thanked Mrs. De Lamar for compiling the book on Meadow Garden. The Stribling gift of \$2,500.00 was dismissed. Mrs. Hanf suggested that it be used for the Gate House and that the Gate House be named the Stribling Gate House. Approved. Mrs. Hanf's husband, who is an architect, and one of his associates will make an onsite study and draw plans for the Stribling Gate House. There is an original letter from George Walton's granddaughter, Octavia, that needs to be protected. Framing was suggested, A letter was received from the Augusta Historic Preservation Commission because our property is located in the Downtown Historic District. The letter stated that a Certificate of Appropriateness must be obtained before any structure or site changes be made. The insurance company has requested an updated appraisal on the museum and furnishings, Mrs. De Lamar will get an updated appraisal from James H. Elliott, Jr. Mrs. Murphey offered to contact the Georgia Trust for Historical Preservation and ask them for a real estate appraisal. Mrs. Hanf announced that the Meadow Garden Museum Board will meet January 12, 1995 at Meadow Garden. There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 2:55 p.m.

The Meadow Garden Museum Board met Thursday, January 12, 1995 at Meadow Garden with Mrs. Peter S. Hanf, State Regent, presiding as Chairman of the Board. The meeting was called to order at 10:30 a.m. The prayer was given by Mrs. Flew Murphey, Patron Chairman. Others present were Mrs. Fred A. Miller, Jr., Mrs. Roy H. Cagle, Jr., Mrs. Hugh H. Harris, Mrs. Charles H. Turner, Mrs. John R. Henry and ex-officio members, Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall and Mrs. Billy W. Hunter. Minutes of the October 27, 1994 meeting were read and approved as corrected. The Financial Statement was reviewed. Mrs. James Clark, Museum/House Manager, reported that 2.249 tourists visited the museum in 1994; the parking problem has improved after Mrs. Cagle and Mrs. Henry talked with Dennis Skelley of Walton Rehabilitation Hospital: the 13 Star Flag and mounting set, donated by the John Clarke Chapter, gets lots of compliments; a new outside flag is needed. She asked the Board to please write three letters. One letter to Ann Harris, Discover Augusta Tours, stating rates and method of payment. Previously stated orally - \$1.00 per person with no distinction for children and to be paid at the time of the tour. She forgets periodically. One letter to Historic Augusta stating rates for the record - \$1.00 for adults, 50¢ for children and a deadline for payment. They now pay when they want to and sometimes they are six months behind. One letter to Mayor DeVaney asking the city to replace the signs they removed at Thirteen and Independence and to work with us in getting some signs put up throughout the city, Mrs. Hanf thanked Mrs. Clark and she was excused. The Board will write the letters and Mrs. Hanf will call on Mayor DeVaney later this year. The Augusta and College Hill Chapters are considering buying the outside flag. Mrs. Cagle, Meadow Garden Museum Chairman, stated that the outer motor of the heating unit had to be replaced at a cost of \$258.77; the Sizemore Security Company will replace the outdated alarm system with a new alarm system at no charge; the sprinkler system is working; Mr. Cagle will hook up an electric signal that will give an alert when someone is on the grounds. The open house at Christmas was a success with 80 attending. The Augusta Chronicle wrote an outstanding page and a half article with

pictures publicizing the open house. Mrs. Henry has written a thank you note to the editor and when it is published it should get us more publicity. The January and February issue of the Macon Magazine wrote a page and a fourth article with pictures on the museum. The Board gave approval for the annual Canal Cruise and the association will fulfill the \$100.00 donation; approval for nearby chapters to participate in the Walton Rehabilitation Hospital Fair - September 9, 1995 and the Canal Discovery - November 4, 1995. Advertising was discussed and Mrs. Cagle moved that \$505.75 be spent for a fourth page ad in the Augusta-Richmond County Visitors Guide for 1995. Seconded. Adopted. Mrs. Hanf asked Mrs. Cagle to work up an ad to show at State Conference and ask for donations. In the absence of Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar, Furnishings Chairman, Mrs. Hanf reported that James H. Elliott, Jr., has volunteered to reappraise all items at the Meadow Garden Museum. He will try to have it completed by April 30, 1995. Mrs. Turner informed the Board that the secretary and table in the Augusta Room are being repaired. Mrs. Hanf informed the Board that the insurance company stated that when the claim was paid (\$175.00) the cups would belong to the insurance company for salvage purposes. James H. Elliott, Jr., was called and he said, "that all insurance companies have the right to a broken or damaged item after the claim has been paid in full." The check has not been deposited at this time. Mrs. Hanf will talk to the insurance company again. The Landscape Chairman, Mrs. Henry, reported that the brick walk connecting the front walk to the back patio is finished; work continues on the kitchen and herb gardens; benches need to be painted yearly with a water sealer; windows need washing. Mrs. Hanf suggested a garden below the side porch and the front walk. Mrs. Henry will get a bid for the replacement of the back porch. The Record Book has been updated. Mrs. Cagle and Mrs. Henry have started pictures and slides on house construction and inventory. Mrs. Hanf reported for Mrs. James H. Elliott, Jr., Museum Shop Chairman. The saucers were ordered in October and the tiles will not be reordered. The Museum Shop needs to be painted, Mrs. Cagle donated a microwave oven, Mrs. Murphey, Patron Chairman, reported that eight chapters and 15 individuals have become patrons. She still plans to contact the Georgia Trust for Historical Preservation and ask them for a real estate appraisal and to have them look at the dining room ceiling. Mrs. Hanf will call the Georgia Department of Archives for suggestions on the best way to protect the original letter from George Walton's granddaughter, Octavia. In the spring, Peter S. Hanf and Russell Newton will look at the property and site for the Gate House and will also look at the dining room ceiling. In light of increasing demands of time and attention for the Meadow Garden Museum, the Board recommends that the responsibilities of the Chairman of the Board be transferred from the State Regent to the State First Vice Regent in order that the Georgia State Society and the Meadow Garden Museum be better served. The completed new slide presentation on the Meadow Garden Museum was given by Mrs. Henry. On the motion of Mrs. Turner, it was moved and seconded that the Meadow Garden Museum Board meet at least four times a year. Adopted. There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 3:30 p.m.

MEADOW GARDEN MUSEUM BOARD - March 8, 1995

The Meadow Garden Museum Board met Wednesday, March 8, 1995, at the Atlanta Marriott Northwest Hotel, Atlanta, with Mrs. Peter S. Hanf, State Regent, presiding as Chairman of the Board. The meeting was called to order at 1:08 p.m. The prayer was given by Mrs. James H. Elliott, Jr. Others present were Mrs. Fred A. Miller, Jr., Mrs. Charles H. Turner, Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar, Mrs. John R. Henry, and ex-

officio members, Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall and Mrs. Billy W. Hunter. Minutes of the January 12, 1995 meeting were read and approved as corrected. The Financial Statement was reviewed. Mrs. Henry reported for Mrs. James Clark, Museum/House Manager. During January and February more than 400 visitors toured the house representing 23 states, Japan and Canada. Several names have been added to our list of docents. Mrs. Clark looks forward to having three Georgia DAR chapters visit in April and May, In the absence of Mrs. Roy H. Cagle, Jr., Meadow Garden Museum Chairman, Mrs. Henry reported that the gate alarm had been installed with a cutoff in the Museum Shop. Sizemore Security Company has installed the new alarm system in the house at no charge. A contract will be drawn up with Augusta Canal Canoe Trip for protection of grounds, especially with relations to sprinkler system damage. The \$1.60 repair service charge each month on the phone bill will be discontinued because we don't need it. Mrs. Cagle and Mrs. Henry will paint the Museum Shop the first week in April. A painter will paint the dining room door. Some of the pictures in the Augusta Room desk drawer will be displayed, and the soldier's picture in the Museum Shop will be moved. A cork poster board will be placed in the Museum Shop with four different pictures on display (outside of museum, old front bedroom, kitchen and Best Room). The price of the pictures will be \$1.00 each. The Board gave Walton Rehabilitation Hospital permission to make outside pictures of the museum for their fair brochure. Mrs. De Lamar, Furnishings Chairman, stated that she is looking for fern stands. The picture of coins that now hangs in the boy's bedroom above the mantel will be moved to a place where it can be seen. On the motion of Mrs. De Lamar, it was moved and seconded that James H. Elliott, Jr., be engaged to make a new appraisal of the Meadow Garden Museum furnishings for \$500.00. Adopted. Mrs. Henry, Landscape Chairman, informed the Board that she is still looking for a sundial and a carved pedestal to use for a base. The Cherokee Roses have been pruned. Mrs. Henry moved that the back porch and steps be replaced according to the bid from Jay Dempsey at the price of \$2500.00. Seconded. Adopted. Yard maintenance was discussed. Mrs. Hunter reported that at the request of the State Regent she telephoned John Singleton, CPA, to clarify questions as to tax responsibilities of the museum toward casual labor hired for upkeep of the lawns and yards. John Singleton stated that this is a very "sticky situation" with "no absolute answers." Taxes will have to be paid on a "regular part-time" worker who is under supervision. Mr. Singleton said the key words are "control and supervision." He also asked if the worker would be using our equipment. If we hire a casual laborer and pay them less than \$600.00/annually we are under no obligation to file any tax returns or report amount paid. If we pay a worker \$1000.00 or more, we will be obligated to file a "Non-employee misc. 1099 form." Mrs. Miller stated that an independent contractor would be responsible for paying for their own payroll taxes, Museum Shop Chairman, Mrs. Elliott, informed the Board that items from the Museum Shop would be for sale at State Conference. Mrs. Cagle donated a small refrigerator to be used in the Museum Shop. Mrs. Hunter reported for Mrs. Flew Murphey, Patron Chairman. Seventeen chapters and 20 individuals have become patrons. Mrs. Hanf stated the Georgia Trust for Historical Preservation will not do a real estate appraisal. Mrs. Henry moved that a real estate appraisal be made not to exceed \$3000.00. Seconded. Adopted. Mrs. Hanf informed the Board that the Georgia Department of Archives suggested that the letter from George Walton's granddaughter, Octavia, be put between acid free paper and in a folder. They should be placed where there is proper climate control; i.e., Archives, University of Georgia. Plans for the First Vice Regent to become Chairman of the Meadow Garden Museum Board, and the Second Vice Regent to become Secretary requires changes in the Bylaws and will be looked into more thoroughly. Mrs. Henry will show the Meadow Garden Museum slides at the Meadow Garden Museum Breakfast. Over 100 people will attend the breakfast. Mrs. Hanf announced that the Board will meet in the Meadow Garden Museum Board Room, Tuesday, June 13, 1995 at 10:30 a.m. There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 3:00 p.m.

Standing Rules for Meadow Garden

I MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

- 1. The governing body of a museum, in this instance the Meadow Garden Board, serves the public interest as it relates to Meadow Garden, and must consider itself accountable to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, as well as to Meadow Garden; members should not attempt to act in their individual capacities, but all actions should be taken as a Board, Committee, or otherwise in conformane with the Standing Rules, the Act of Incorporation, or applicable Resolutions.
- 2. The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the three (3) Trustees as named in the Deed from the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, conveying Meadow Garden to the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution; namely, the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the State Chairman of Meadow Garden who is appointed by the State Regent; the Chapter Regents of the Augusta Chapter and the College Hill Chapter, both Chapters being located in Augusta, who shall serve as Vice Chairmen to the State Chairman of Meadow Garden; and five of the chairmen of Meadow Garden Committees, as appointed by the State Regent.
- 3. No Georgia Daughter shall serve in the same Meadow Garden Chairmanship more than two (2) consecutive terms.
- 4. Of the six (6) appointments made by the State Regent, at least two (2) shall be Honorary State Regents.
- The State Second Vice Regent and Treasurer shall serve as ex-officio members of the Meadow Garden Board, being given the privilege of the floor without a vote.
- The State Regent shall serve as Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board, and the State First Vice Regent shall serve as Secretary of the Meadow Garden Board.
- 7. The Meadow Garden Board shall meet a minimum of three (3) times each year; namely, preceding Fall Board of Management meeting, preceding annual State Conference and following Continental Congress, and at such other time as deemed necessary by the Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board. At least one (1) meeting of the Board shall be held at Meadow Garden each year.
- 8. The Meadow Garden Board shall have jurisdiction over the operation, maintenance and work of Meadow Garden and shall be the authority for Meadow Garden as long as such authority is not in conflict with the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, the Act of Incorporation for the Georgia State Society, Resolutions adopted by the Georgia State Society and/or directions which from time to time may be approved by action of the Georgia State Society assembled at its annual State Conference.

- 9. Five (5) voting members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.
- Minutes shall be kept of each meeting and a copy shall be sent to each member and printed verbatim in the State Proceedings.
- 11. All expenses for maintenance, operation and purchases of furnishings and plantings shall be authorized by the State Regent, as Chairman of the Board, and paid by the State Treasurer. Expenditures exceeding \$1,000.00 must have the majority approval of the Board.
- 12. These rules will be binding on the actions of the Board in their operation of "Meadow Garden." They may be changed by the following procedure: Members of the Board must have written notification of proposed changes or additions one month prior to the next meeting of the Board; a two-thirds vote of the Board is necessary to effect a change or addition.

II OPERATIONS

- 1. Everyone entering Meadow Garden will be requested to sign the Register, including date, time of arrival and time of departure.
- No more than fifteen (15) people with each Docent are to be on tour in the house at a given time. Excess of this number may wait in the reception room or in the garden. The Museum-House Manager/Docent has the authority to enforce the Meadow Garden rules at all times.
- 3. There will be no smoking in Meadow Garden.
- 4. No refreshments are to be served in Meadow Garden or taken into Meadow Garden. Should a group, such as a visiting chapter, desire refreshments, the garden is available for use if litter is properly disposed of by the serving group.
- 5. Tour visitors will be asked to pay a fee as set by the Board.
- 6. There will be only four (4) complete sets of keys to Meadow Garden and 4 keys to the gates of Meadow Garden. Keys to be returned after each administration. New locks may be required. Distribution of Keys: <u>Gate Only</u>: Landscaping Chairman, Augusta Police Department, Georgia Power, and Sizemore Security. <u>Gate & House</u>: Chairman of the Board, Meadow Garden Chairman, Museum House Manager, and Docents Chairman.

III VOLUNTEERS (DOCENTS)

- Volunteers, docents, shall be members in good standing of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR.
- Duties of volunteers shall include acting as guides, hostesses, working in museum shop, working in yard, cleaning in house, public relations. No volunteer work at or for Meadow Garden shall be done except under the direct guidance of the Meadow Garden Board and the chairman of the specific committee for that particular function.
- Cleaning or yard work volunteers shall be under the direction of the House/ Museum Manager.

IV FURNISHINGS

 Items bought or accepted for the older section of Meadow Garden must pre-date 1821.

- 2. Furnishings for the two (2) main floor rooms and two (2) upstairs rooms in the newer section may be dated post 1820 but these rooms should be considered companion rooms to the rest of the house and furnished accordingly with all efforts made to keep furnishings of these four rooms dated no later than 1850. The Augusta Room furnishings will remain as they were in 1982.
- 3. Reproductions may be used only when the physical condition of the antiques is jeopardized by exposure in areas where large numbers of visitors have easy access; or when environmental conditions including excessive light, dust, humidity or airborne impurities pose a threat to the preservation of originals.
- Effective March 12, 1983 all items donated to Meadow Garden shall be accepted
 with the written condition that they become the property of Meadow Garden and
 may be used, replaced or sold at the discretion of the Meadow Garden Board only.
- 5. All items that post date 1821, with the exception of those in the six (6) rooms of the newer section and those described in Number 3 of this section, shall be replaced as soon as possible with similar items pre-dating 1821.
- Once an item is placed, it shall not be moved from one location to another without permission of the Meadow Garden Board. Only the Chairman of the Board may approve the removal of an item from the house, if it is in need of repair or refinishing.
- Any item donated or purchased must have written documentation of appraisal and include an indication as to how the determination was made.
- 8. A file will be kept of all assets with information as to price paid or market value, date of acquisition, donor or where bought, documentation and appraisal and a description of article. One file will be kept in the reception room accessible to the Docents; a duplicate file will be in the possession of the Chairman of the Board.
- All items purchased or donated will be added to the Fine Arts insurance policy. Said policy will be reviewed and updated a minimum of once a year. Major additions to furnishings will be added immediately.
- Future plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the House/ Museum.

V LANDSCAPING

- 1. The landscape plan adopted by the Board shall be adhered to with no deviation unless recommended by an authority on landscape design and care.
- Donations of shrubbery, plants or trees shall be accepted only when item is part of the master plan.
- Work on the grounds will be under the sole direction of the Meadow Garden Board and the Landscaping Chairman. Supervision of actual work will be provided by the Museum-House Manager or the Landscaping Chairman of Meadow Garden.

VI MUSEUM SHOP

The Museum Shop will be operated by a committee appointed by the Chairman
of the Board and be responsible to the Board.

- Chairman of the committee will be responsible for all purchases, subject to the approval of the Board or the State Regent.
- Museum Shop operation will be self-supporting. In the event funds are needed for purchases, they may be advanced from available Meadow Garden funds and must be considered a loan and shall be repaid without interest within one (1) year from date of borrowing.
- 4. Profit from the Museum Shop shall be retained in its own account, with a percentage being transferred at the discretion of the Board at end of fiscal year and placed in Maintenance Account. The audit of the Museum Shop operation shall be included in the annual audit of the Georgia State Society.

VII PATRONS

- 1. Donors to the following categories are eligible to be known as "Patrons":
 - A. Meadow Garden Capital Investment Trust Fund
 - B. Furnishings
 - C. Maintenance
 - D. Landscape
- 2. Individual gifts of a minimum value of \$50.00 to any of the above categories automatically qualifies the donor as a Patron.
- Chapter or group gifts of a minimum value of \$100.00 or more, above the State Honor Roll requirements, automatically qualifies that chapter or group as a Patron.
- 4. The State Treasurer will report these gifts to the Patrons Chairman.
- The Patrons Chairman will issue certificates to the qualifying individuals and chapters or groups.
- A permanent book will be kept on public display at Meadow Garden to record Patrons gifts.
- The Patrons Chairman will enter the names of donors in the appropriate book a minimum of once a year.

VIII PLAQUES & MARKERS

- Plaques/Markers may be placed at Meadow Garden only at the discretion of the Board, and request meets the following criteria:
 - A. Substantial service and/or contributions that secured the property and the heritage for the GSDAR;
 - B. Individuals so recognized shall have been deceased for at least 5 years;
 - C. Plaque/Marker will be paid for by person(s) requesting such recognition.
- 2. Such plaques will be permanently displayed at Meadow Garden and a record of honoree's service and/or contribution shall be recorded and placed in the Meadow Garden file, with Board approval.
- Plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the house/museum. Additional markers shall not be permanently placed on the grounds.

PETITION for INCORPORATION

To the Honorable, the Judge of the Superior Court of Sumter County, Georgia.

The petition of the three persons whose names are signed hereto and who presently are respectively the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent, and the State Recording Secretary, of the unincorporated Georgia State Society of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, Inc., respectively shows:

1.

That the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution was created a body corporate and politic, in the District of Columbia, for patriotic, historical and educational purposes, to perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American independence, by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebration of all patriotic anniversaries; to carry out the injunction of Washington, in his farewell address to the American people "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge; to cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom; to foster true patriotism and love of Country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty." Said Charter being granted by the Congress of the United States by the Act of February 20, 1896 (Title 36, Sections 18, 18a, 18b, Federal Code Annotated).

2

Said Act authorized said Society "to hold real and personal estate in the United States so far only as may be necessary to its lawful ends" and "to adopt a constitution and make bylaws not inconsistent with law, adopt a seal, and have its headquarters or principal office at Washington, in the District of Columbia."

3.

That the Georgia State Society of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, Inc., was organized, under the authority of the National Society, in Atlanta, Georgia, May 23, 24, 1899, as a voluntary and unincorporated organization, for the same purposes and with the same rights and powers as those granted by the Congress of the National Society.

4

That the officers and members of the Georgia State Society desire, and now petition this Honorable Court, to be incorporated, made a body corporate and politic, for the same purposes and with the same rights, powers, authority, and privileges as those now enjoyed by and granted to the National Society by the Congress in said Act of February 20, 1896; including –

A. The right to have, establish, and maintain its principal office and headquarters within the State of Georgia, from time to time, at the place of residence of the duly elected and installed State Regent of the Georgia State Society, or of the residence of the First Vice Regent in the event of the death, disability or removal of the Regent;

B. The right to buy, own, hold, improve, maintain, preserve, sell and convey real and personal property suitable or necessary for carrying out the purposes for which the Georgia State Society was organized and incorporated, including any and all now held or owned by the Georgia State Society or by any of its members for and in its behalf:

C. The right to prepare, adopt, enforce, modify, change, repeal and amend bylaws for the guidance of the operations of the Georgia State Society, its officers, chapters and members; including, but not limited to, the State officers, their duties, authority, responsibilities, term of office; the time, method and manner of electing State Officers and members of committees; the removal of State Officers; the election and term of office of the members of an Executive Committee and the duties, rights, qualifications and authority of the members of such committee; the qualifications of the voting members of the Georgia State Society, their alternates, and the manner of their selection; and all other rules and regulations found or considered necessary or advisable for carrying out the purposes and activities of the Georgia State Society, for the exercise of its corporate powers, and the management, regulation and government of its affairs and property.

5.

The Georgia State Society was not organized for pecuniary gain or profit and, when incorporated as herein prayed, will be without capital stock and will not be operated for pecuniary gain or profit, but only for the purposes hereinabove described.

6.

Attached hereto is a certificate from the Secretary of State declaring the name of the proposed corporation, that is, "The Georgia State Society of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, Inc.," is not the name of any other presently existing corporation in the records of the Secretary of State.

7.

That the incorporation of the Georgia Society as herein prayed, and the filing of this petition, was considered, approved and directed at a meeting of the State Board of Management of the Georgia State Society at its meeting in Macon, Georgia, October 24, 1961.

Wherefore, petitioners pray that the Georgia State Society of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, Inc., be incorporated for the term of thirty-five (35) years, as provided by Sections 22-1802 (e) 22-1871, 22-1881, and 22-1827 of the Code of Georgia.

Bylaws

BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II OBJECTS

The objects of this Society shall be:

- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.
- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American Citizens.
- (3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of this organization.

Article IV OFFICERS

<u>Section 1.</u> The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian and a State Curator.

Section 2. (a) To be eligible for state office, a member shall hold and have held membership in a chapter or chapters within the Georgia State Society for at least 5 years prior to her election and have served a full term as chapter officer or state chairman.

- (b) No member shall be eligible to the same State office for two (2) successive terms. A member having served more than one half of a term in a State office shall be deemed to have served a term.
- (c) No two State officers shall be members of the same chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.
- (d) To be eligible for the office of State Regent or State First Vice Regent, a member shall have served a full term as either State Recording Secretary or State Treasurer of

the Georgia State Society and have served a term as a Chapter Regent of a Georgia Chapter.

<u>Section 3.</u> In recognition of valuable service to the organization, any State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Article V NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

<u>Section 1.</u> (a) Candidates for any executive office of the State Society may be announced only after the adjournment of the Continental Congress preceding the State Conference at which the election for those officers is to be held.

- (b) A candidate for the office of State Regent shall list the names of candidates who are offering to serve with her, and the office for which they are candidates. This list shall be submitted to the State Regent no later than seventy (70) days before the State Conference at which the election is to be held so that it will be included in the official "Call to Conference."
- (c) All candidates for State office must have the endorsement in writing of their chapter. A chapter shall only endorse one (1) member per election with the possible exception of candidates for State Regent and State Corresponding Secretary. Endorsement shall be sent to the State Regent by the Chapter Regent no later than seventy (70) days prior to the scheduled election.
- (d) In the event of the death, incapacitation or withdrawal of a candidate within the 70 days prior to the election, a replacement shall be made with notification in writing to the State Regent and accompanied by written endorsement by the candidate's chapter.
- (e) Nomination of qualified candidates may be made from the floor at the time of nominations provided that the consent of the member has been obtained and written endorsement by the nominee's chapter be given to the State Regent prior to the nomination.

<u>Section 2.</u> Nominations of candidates for all State offices shall be made at a designated meeting of the State Conference.

<u>Section 3.</u> The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected biennially by ballot at the State Conference. A majority vote shall elect.

Section 4. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two (2) years or until their successors are elected. Their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Section 5. (a) Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become Regent. Vacancies in other State offices shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next State Board of Management meeting or State Conference, whichever shall come first.

- (b) An appointment to fill the vacancy of State First Vice Regent, after ratification by members of the Georgia State Society, shall be submitted to the National Board of Management for confirmation.
- (c) Any State officer who is absent from the State for a continuous period of six (6) months or longer shall automatically relinquish her position as a State Officer.

<u>Section 6.</u> On the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Organizing Secretary General.

<u>Section 7.</u> (a) A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot.

- (b) The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than fifteen (15) months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.
- (c) The endorsement shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent with her name and address to the Recording Secretary General to be received by April 1 preceding the Continental Congress.

Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

<u>Section 1.</u> The officers of the Georgia State Society shall perform the duties prescribed in this article, and parliamentary authority adopted by the Society, and such others as the State Board of Management and the National Society may require.

Section 2. The State Regent shall:

- (a) be the chief executive officer and the official spokesman for the State Society;
- (b) have general supervision of the affairs of the State Society;
- (c) preside at all meetings of the State Conference, State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;
- (d) appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society;
 - (e) be ex-officio a member of all committees;
- (f) appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as advisor in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting;
- (g) sign all contracts and agreements made in the name of the Georgia State Society with the recorded approval of the Executive Committee and the State Board of Management or the State Conference as directed by these Bylaws;
- (h) be bonded and have the authority to draw upon funds of the State Society with the approval of the Finance Committee.

Section 3. The State First Vice Regent shall:

- (a) perform the duties of the office of State Regent in the absence or inability of the State Regent;
 - (b) fill a vacancy in the office of State Regent;
 - (c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;
 - (d) serve on the Finance Committee.

<u>Section 4.</u> The State Second Vice Regent shall perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent.

Section 5. The State Chaplain shall:

- (a) open all meetings of the State Conference and the State Board of Management with scripture reading and prayer;
- (b) preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and conduct such other religious services as may be required;
 - (c) be custodian of State properties pertaining to duties of this office;
 - (d) be responsible for IN MEMORIAM pages in the Proceedings.

Section 6. The Recording Secretary shall:

- (a) record the proceedings of the meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;
- (b) compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and the Proceedings Committee;
- (c) submit to the appropriate National officers, the endorsement for Vice President General and the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent before April 1 of the year in which said balloting was held;

(d) call the meeting to order in the absence of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent and preside until a chairman pro tempore is elected.

Section 7. The State Corresponding Secretary shall:

- (a) conduct correspondence and send notices on behalf of the State Conference, the State Regent, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as directed by them;
- (b) receive from the chapters the consolidated reports and distribute to the appropriate State chairmen.

Section 8. The State Organizing Secretary shall:

- (a) assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new chapters;
- (b) assist chapters in conjunction with appropriate state officers and chairmen in revitalization.

Section 9. The State Treasurer shall:

- (a) be bonded;
- (b) the custodian of the funds of the State Society, placing them in institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance;
- (c) receive the State dues and State Conference registration fees from the chapters and receive all sums contributed by the chapters for State and National projects, disbursing monthly to the Treasurer General all funds designated for National projects;
 - (d) disburse other sums only when authorized by the State Regent in writing;
- (e) keep an account of all sums received or disbursed by using the basic double entry form of bookkeeping according to accepted accounting procedures and keep receipts for all transactions;
- (f) prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference, sending a copy to the State Chairman of the Finance Committee ten (10) days in advance of each meeting;
- (g) be a member of the Finance Committee and an ex-officio member of the Credentials Committee;
- (h) balance and prepare the books for an annual audit within 15 days of the close of the State fiscal year; said audit by a Certified Public Accountant, to be performed and delivered within 45 days of receipt of books.

Section 10. The State Registrar shall:

- (a) when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American revolution prove eligibility, and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars in verifying lineage papers;
 - (b) keep a correct list of all members in the State;
 - (c) report on membership to the State Conference;
- (d) be in possession of the computer and software owned by the Georgia State Society and to see that it is maintained.

Section 11. The State Historian shall:

- (a) be in charge, within the State, of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General as well as those authorized by the Georgia State Society;
- (b) keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves within the State;
 - (c) prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General;
- (d) promote the study of American history, State and county history and historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the founding of our State and counties.

Section 12. The State Librarian shall:

- (a) serve as liaison between the Librarian General and the Georgia chapters and disseminate general information on the NSDAR Library;
- (b) cooperate with the director of the Georgia Department of Archives and History, making the needs of the Archives known to the chapters;
- (c) collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing them wherever accepted in such Libraries and Archives as may be chosen by the State Board of Management;
- (d) solicit, with the approval of the Executive Committee, contributions from the chapters for purchase of such books as requested;
- (e) receive gifts of books and other printed material from the chapters to be donated to the approved Libraries and Archives;
- (f) maintain a constant supply of bookplates to the NSDAR Library, the Georgia Department of Archives and History and for purchase by the chapters.

Section 13. The State Curator shall:

- (a) receive and be responsible for all gifts of Revolutionary relics to the Museum of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution;
- (b) be custodian of the State properties and shall have them properly stored and made ready for use at State meetings.

<u>Section 14.</u> All Officers will keep a Procedure Book of Instructions and helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new Officers to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. State Conference:

- (a) The annual meeting of the Georgia State Society shall be known as the State Conference. It shall be for the purpose of:
 - (1) receiving reports of officers, committees and Chapter Regents;
 - (2) electing officers biennially;
 - (3) promoting programs in furtherance of the objects of the Society;
 - (4) any other business that may arise:
 - i. annual budget shall be adopted,
- *ii.* all projects of the State Society requiring funding shall be voted upon at State Conference or ratified by members at State Conference if previously voted upon by the State Board of Management,
- iii. no project extending beyond the term of the presiding officer may be accepted at any meeting other than by vote at State Conference.
- (b) The State Conference will be held between February 1 and the time of the meeting of Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week;
 - (c) The State Regent shall fix the time and place of meetings;
- (d) The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credentials form to the chapters not less than sixty (60) days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 2. The voting members of the State Conference shall be:

- (a) the officers and Honorary State Regents of the State Society;
- (b) the officers and honorary officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State;
- (c) the chapter regents, or in their absence, the vice regent or alternate of each chapter;

(d) delegates or alternates of each chapter of the state that is entitled to representation at the Continental Congress as determined by the Bylaws of the National Society;

(e) one additional delegate from each chapter in the State.

Section 3. Only a chapter member in good standing whose credentials have been completed in accordance with the instructions of the State Regent and the State Credentials Chairman for the State Conference and in accordance with the Standing Rules of the National Society shall be eligible to represent her chapter at State and National meetings.

<u>Section 4.</u> A member shall have belonged to a chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the chapter, except in the case of the Regent or Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

<u>Section 5.</u> A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at an annual State Conference, shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.

<u>Section 6.</u> Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the State of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

<u>Section 7.</u> At the opening of the annual State Conference the privilege of the floor shall be accorded to the State Chairmen. They may not vote unless they are duly elected delegates or alternates from their respective chapters.

<u>Section 8.</u> Special meetings of the State Society may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen (15) days' notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

<u>Section 9.</u> Forty-five (45) voting members, representing not less than twenty (20) chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

<u>Section 1.</u> The State Officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, the Honorary State Regents, the Regents, or in their absence, the Vice Regents of the chapters of the State, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the fall, following the regular meeting of the National Board. It may meet whenever called by the State Regent. A minimum of 20 days' notice shall be given as to the time and place of any such meeting.

Section 3. Thirty (30) members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

<u>Section 4.</u> The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference or as proscribed by these Bylaws.

<u>Section 5.</u> State Chairmen, Vice Chairmen, Committee members of the National and Standing Committees and one (1) member from each chapter shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privilege of the floor, but may not vote.

<u>Section 6.</u> The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article IX EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

<u>Section 1.</u> The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute an Executive Committee.

<u>Section 2.</u> The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, shall attend the meetings, but may not vote.

Section 3. This Executive Committee shall:

- (a) perform such duties of the State Board of Management between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient;
- (b) meet at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three (3) members of the committee:
 - (c) vote by teleconference if necessary;
- (d) receive and make recommendations for projects requiring expenditure of funds outside routine expenditures to be considered by the State Conference;
 - (e) make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

Article X FINANCES

<u>Section 1.</u> (a) The fiscal year of the Georgia State Society shall be May 1 through the last day of April.

(b) The annual budget, prepared by the Finance Committee, shall cover the fiscal year and be prepared on the basis of dues payable for the calendar year beginning December first preceding.

Section 2. (a) The annual dues of chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be \$5.00 for each member of the chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1.

(b) A minimum of \$1.83 shall be used to cover all State per capita assessments, with \$1.50 of this per capita being used for Meadow Garden maintenance, and the balance shall be allocated to the General State Dues Fund.

<u>Section 3.</u> (a) Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the State Dues, a conference registration fee as set by a preceding conference for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under these Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether represented or not.

- (b) State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the conference fee at the time of registration.
- (c) Other members of the Georgia State Society who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay the conference fee at the time of registration.
- <u>Section 4.</u> (a) The State Treasurer and the State Regent and such others entrusted with funds of the Georgia State Society as may be designated by the State Board of Management shall be bonded. (See Article VI, Sections 2 and 9)
- (b) The State Treasurer with the approval of the State Regent and the State Chairman of the Finance Committee shall place the funds of the Georgia State Society in financial institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage.
- (c) The placement of restricted savings funds and investment funds of the Georgia State Society shall be placed to the credit of the Georgia State Society by the State Treasurer under the direction of the Finance Committee. Monies may be invested in U. S. Treasury obligations or other interest bearing obligations of Federally insured financial institutions.
- (d) The accounts of the State Treasurer shall be annually prepared for audit by a Certified Public Accountant immediately following the end of the State Society fiscal year and no later than May 15 and delivered to the CPA by that date.

(e) Should the State Treasurer be incapacitated, the Chairman of the Finance Committee is authorized, with the written approval of the State Regent, to serve as the Acting State Treasurer until such time as the State Treasurer is able to resume her duties or a new State Treasurer is appointed and ratified as stated in Article V, Section 5(a).

<u>Section 5.</u> The expenses incurred by the State Regent in the performance of duty shall be paid each year from the State Dues Fund:

- (a) Four thousand dollars (\$4000.00) shall be taken each year to defray her necessary travel expenses.
- (b) Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent, as budgeted, shall be paid by the State Treasurer who shall keep all receipts of these expenses. No expenses exceeding the budgeted amount shall be paid by the State Treasurer.

Section 6. At the close of the books annually, \$3000.00 will be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserved for Contingencies Fund" so that at the end of each administration a total of \$6000.00 will be reserved. This money is to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration.

Article XI COMMITTEES

Section 1. The State Regent shall appoint the following standing committees:

- (a) Bylaws: An Honorary State Regent shall be appointed as chairman and the committee shall be composed of two (2) other Honorary State Regents and one (1) member from each district.
- (b) Finance: This committee shall be composed of seven (7) members to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two (2) Honorary State Regents, one (1) active chapter regent and one (1) active chapter member. One of the two Honorary State Regents shall be appointed chairman. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund. This committee shall have charge of all investments of the Georgia State Society funds and the placing of insurance of all kinds with accredited companies.
- (c) Resolutions: This committee shall be composed of all Honorary State regents, the State Parliamentarian and three (3) chapter members.
- (d) Proceedings: This committee shall be composed of the State Recording Secretary, the immediate past State Recording Secretary, State First Vice Regent and four (4) additional Daughters, at least one of whom shall be an Honorary State Regent.

Section 2. The State Regent shall appoint such other committees, standing or special, as the State Conference shall authorize and actions of the State Board of Management and of the National Society shall require. The appointments shall be concurrent with the term of the State Regent making the appointments and shall terminate with the end of the administration.

<u>Section 3.</u> No additional appointments to any of the committees shall be made after the roster of chairmen and committees has been compiled and sent to the Chapters. Vacancies shall be filled by the State Regent with timely notification to the membership.

<u>Section 4.</u> The duties of committees shall be such as these Bylaws, the State Conference, the State Board of Management or the National Society shall prescribe.

<u>Section 5.</u> All chairmen will keep a Procedure Book of Instructions and helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

ARTICLE XII CHAPTERS

<u>Section 1.</u> (a) To expedite the work of the Society, the chapters of the Georgia State Society shall be placed in geographical districts.

(a) A chairman appointed by the State Regent shall coordinate the work of all chapters as needed; she shall be titled "Coordinator of Districts."

(b) Each district shall have a Director appointed by the State Regent to work as a committee under the direction and supervision of the Coordinator of Districts and the State Regent.

<u>Section 2.</u> Chapter elections shall be held no later than April. The Chapter Regent shall report the names of the elected officers promptly on form provided by the State Regent for this purpose, with copies to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, and the State Recording Secretary.

<u>Section 3.</u> The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent, the State Recording Secretary, and the District Director by February 1.

Article XIII MEADOW GARDEN

Meadow Garden, property owned by the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, shall be operated as follows:

(a) The governing body shall be the Board of Trustees composed of the following members: the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Chairman who shall be appointed by the State Regent.

(b) The Meadow Garden Board will be composed of the following members: the State Regent who shall serve as Chairman; the State First Vice Regent who shall serve as Secretary; the Chairman of Meadow Garden; the regents of the Augusta and College Hill Chapters and the chairmen of the five (5) subcommittees appointed by the State Regent; Docents, Furnishings, Landscaping, Museum Shop, Patrons.

(c) The Meadow Garden Board shall operate with Standing Rules approved by the State Conference.

Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

<u>Section 1.</u> Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law for the State Conference in matters not covered by these Bylaws.

<u>Section 2.</u> The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

Article XV AMENDMENTS

<u>Section 1.</u> The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent, the State Parliamentarian, and the State Bylaws Chairman. The State Regent shall send a copy to each chapter, at least sixty (60) days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the Call to Conference.

<u>Section 2.</u> Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21.) No Conference was held in 1911; the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P.W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912"; amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, p. 211.)

ABSOLUTE DEADLINE FOR PROCEEDINGS MATERIAL

WHEREAS, a definite deadline must be established and adhered to for all reports and material to be in the hands of the Proceedings Committee in order to be delivered to the Printer by June 1.

RESOLVED: That all FINAL reports and materials must be received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1 with the exception of the Auditor's Report and any information sent out by the National DAR Headquarters. This does not alter the requirement in the "Items of Information" in the Proceedings that all reports shall be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary on or before February 15, the ORIGINAL being sent to the Secretary for the Proceedings.

AND FURTHER RESOLVED: This policy will be strictly adhered to and the material not received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1 will be omitted from the Proceedings.

AWARDS

All chapters competing for awards must send reports to the respective chairmen by February 1, 1996.

All reports for awards are based on membership confirmed by the National Society as of January 1 of preceding year (1995). SEE FIGURE BESIDE CHAPTER NAME IN CHAPTER REGENTS' DIRECTORY.

BYLAWS

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT confict with the National and State Bylaws.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS

Notice of change of address of members shall be sent to the Organizing Secretary General, Treasurer General, State Regent and State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHANGE OF NAME

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to State Registrar, Treasurer General and State Regent by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHAPTER ELECTIONS

As soon as Chapter elections are held, names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, Administration Building, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D.C., 20006-5392, to the State Regent or State Regent-Elect and to the Recording Secretary by May 1. The full Christian name of Chapter officers shall be given together with her husband's given name or initials, address, zip code and telephone number. A Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years. This being added in order for our Bylaws to conform to the National Bylaws.

CHAPTER REPRESENTATION AT STATE AND NATIONAL MEETINGS

At the State Board of Management, a chapter is represented by the Chapter Regent, or in her absence by the First Vice Regent, and one non-voting member.

The voting representation of each chapter at the State Conference shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received by the State Treasurer by January 1. Membership less than 50: Regent, 1 Delegate, 4 Alternates, total votes 2; 50-199: Regent, 2 Delegates, 6 Alternates, total votes 3; 200-299: Regent, 3 Delegates, 8 Alternates, total Votes 4; 300-399: Regent, 4 Delegates, 10 Alternates, total votes 5.

The voting representation of each chapter at Continental Congress shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received in the Office of the Treasurer General **by January 1**. Membership less than 50: Regent, 0 Delegate, 2 Alternates, total votes 1; 50-199: Regent, 1 Delegate, 4 Alternates, total votes 2; 200-299; Regent, 2 Delegates, 6 Alternates, total votes 3; 300-399; Regent, 3 Delegates, 8 Alternates, total votes 4.

CONFERENCE REGISTRATION FEE

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer with the State dues on or before December 1, \$5.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether represented or not.

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$5.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$3.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration.

CONTRIBUTIONS

ALL contributions by Chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

DATE FOR ANNUAL AUDIT

WHEREAS, every effort must be made to have all material to the printer as early as possible to facilitate delivery of the Proceedings to the members.

RESOLVED: That the end of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, fiscal year for audit purposes be changed from May 31 to April 30.

DECEASED MEMBERS

Deaths shall be reported promptly to Treasurer General, State Chaplain and State Registrar by the Corresponding Chapter Officer. Complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and a date of death shall be furnished State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for Conference Memorial Service pages for State Proceedings.

DUES

Pay to State Treasurer State Dues of \$5.00 per member before December 1. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the December through April Board meetings of the National Society. National Dues of \$25.00 per member sent to the Treasurer-General, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20006-5392, before December 1, 1995.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS

To insure uniformity and convenience in binding, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, 8 1/2 x 11 inches, with 1 1/2 to 2 inch margin on left side, 1 1/2 inches at top and 1 inch on right side and at bottom. Four copies shall be sent to State Chairman of Genealogical Records. The booklet "Instructions for Copying Source Records and Their Preparation for Library Use" should be obtained from the office of the Corresponding Secretary General (currently \$1.00) with check made payable to the Treasurer General, NSDAR. This booklet gives the procedure for copying source records.

GEORGIA HOSPITALITY FUND

The following resolution which applies to the Georgia Hospitality Fund appears in the Proceedings for 1955:

"WHEREAS, The Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds a social event in Washington during Continental Congress which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society.

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$400.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes:

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this fund shall not be cumulative." Adopted.

INFORMATION FOR CHAPTER REGENTS

- 1. All letters received by Chapter Regents relating to the work of the Society shall be distributed to the Corresponding Chapter Chairman and brought to the attention of the members at a chapter meeting.
- 2. Please follow Resolution No. 11, adopted at 61st Georgia Society State Conference, as follows: "Resolved, That a closing date of February 1 be established for all reports, and all reports be given from February 1 to February 1, regardless of a change of regime or Regent." All awards will be made on this date basis.

INFORMATION FOR STATE OFFICERS AND STATE CHAIRMEN

NEW ADMINISTRATION FOR CONTINGENCIES FUND

For the entire resolution setting up the "General New Regime Fund Balance of \$2,500.00," found on pgs. 203-204 of the 1979 Proceedings the following substitute resolution was adopted by the 88th State Conference: RESOLVED that at the end of each administration \$6,000.00 be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies" fund, this money to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration, and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration. All other surplus monies in the General Fund, other than funds which are designated, are to be divided equally between the General Savings Account and the "Georgia State Society Endowment Fund," "DAR School" Resolutions 1991 page 62 of the 1992 Proceedings. This transaction is to be handled by April 30 every two years before the auditors close out the books of an administration, thus making the General Fund show the same balance of \$6,000.00 at the beginning of each new administration. (This fund is to be known as "New Administration Reserve for Contingencies Fund.") Adopted.

Georgia State Society Children of the American Revolution 1994-1995

The Georgia State Society began this centennial year of the National Society when the State President, Jeffrey P. Johnson, and Senior State President, Ernestine B. Johnson, were installed at the C.A.R. National Convention in April 1994 in Alexandria, Virginia. The National Society was founded by Harriett Lothrop on April 5, 1895, making this the 100th year of C.A.R. The state theme, "The Sound of Youth on

the March," was chosen; and the State President's Projects, increasing membership and raising \$500 to become a Bronze Medal Sponsor for the Georgia Special Olympics 1995 Indoor Winter Games, were selected. Tee shirts were designed and printed to encourage members to work for the state society during the 1994-1995 year.

In June, C.A.R. and DAR met with the Yamaha-Suzuki School of Music in Dunwoody to present five keyboards and music to the department of music at Kate Duncan Smith DAR School. Those attending this presentation were Colonel and Mrs. Hal Dayhuff representing DAR and SAR, C.A.R. State President, Jeff Johnson, and his grandfather, Ernest Braziel, C.A.R. Honorary State President, Adelaide McCullough and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. William C. McCullough.

The Georgia State Society hosted the Southeastern Regional Meeting in July in Atlanta. This Regional was the largest in the nation and earned more than \$4,000 for the Centennial Project of placing a bronze sculpture of an eagle in flight at the National Zoo in Washington. Over 40 members, seniors, and guests from Georgia, including the State and Senior State Presidents, attended the meeting. The State Workshop, hosted by the General David Blackshear Society, was held in Americus at the historical Windsor Hotel the last weekend in July. A record breaking 85 members, seniors, and guests registered for the event. Presentations were made by officers and chairmen to encourage participation in the state and national contests.

The State President accompanied the Senior State President as they attended all meetings on the DAR Workshop Tour. There he presented the Children of the American Revolution Program. The presidents also collected over \$250 in donations and sales during the tour. The C.A.R. was represented at the DAR-SAR Constitution Day Luncheon in September when the State and Senior State Presidents brought greetings and five C.A.R. members served as Flag Bearers.

The annual Government Studies Seminar was hosted by the Sukey Hart Society and was held at the Rock Eagle 4-H Center near Eatonton. The State Society celebrated the Bald Eagle, this year's patriotic symbol, and studied the FBI. The event was attended by over 55 members, guests, and seniors.

Our goal of the State Presidents was to visit the active local societies in the state. General David Blackshear entertained these presidents at a picnic for prospective members in June. Prospective members from two nearby societies trying to organize as well as prospective members of the host society were invited to the picnic. The Sons and Daughters of Liberty, Gwinnett, The Glass Brothers, Allen Howard, and Lucy Spell Raiford societies invited the State Presidents to a June Birthday celebration at the VA Nursing Home in Decatur. The State Presidents attended the September meeting of the Sukey Hart Society and studied the role of history in the entertainment industry. In December, these presidents met with the Brunswick Society at the St. Simons Island Pier to encourage active participation in the state. Letters of greetings and encouragement were sent to all other active, inactive, and organizing societies in Georgia.

A State History was compiled during this Centennial year. This history includes all information that could be obtained on societies that have been organized in Georgia. It also includes rosters of state presidents, senior state presidents, state conferences, and 1994-1995 members.

The C.A.R. State Project of contributing \$500 to Georgia Special Olympics was achieved in January. The State and Senior State Presidents representing the State Society were honored at a sponsor's reception and at the Olympic Games in Marietta on February 10, 1995. The experience of these events was fulfilling and created a pride in the work completed by the State Society. The state membership was increased by 31 new members.

The Fifty-Sixth Annual C.A.R. State Conference was hosted by the Gwinnett Society along with the Sons and Daughters of Liberty Society and the Philadelphia Winn Chapter DAR. The conference was held in Tucker February 24-25, 1995, and celebrated the Centennial of the National Society. Among the 89 in attendance at this conference were three national C.A.R. officers and one chairman and one senior chairman, the C.A.R. Florida State President and one senior officer, the Georgia DAR State Regent and two Honorary State Regents, and the Georgia SAR State President. The conference began with the candidates' evening held on Friday night when all candidates for state office campaigned and was followed by the state and senior state board of management meetings. The business session was held on Saturday morning when reports of all officers, chairmen, and society presidents were given. Voting followed the business meeting. A luncheon held on Saturday gave the distinguished C.A.R., DAR, and SAR an opportunity to greet the society. At the awards banquet on Saturday night, Jonathan Jackson was named the Most Outstanding Member, Rena Morgan was named the Most Outstanding Senior, and the General David Blackshear Society was named the Most Outstanding Society. Claire Richardson was elected State President for 1995-1996.

At the DAR State Conference in March, the Senior State President brought greetings from the Georgia State Society C.A.R. at the opening meeting and gave the Children of the American Revolution report at the first business session. On Regents' Night the State President presented four DAR Debutantes during a beautiful ceremony. These debutantes from C.A.R. were escorted by their fathers and presented to the State Regent to be invited to join DAR. Debutantes were Adelaide McCullough, The Glass Brothers; Alice Leigh Morrison, Lucy Spell Raiford; and Ellen Hardy Fortson and Loy Elizabeth Stone, Sergeant Newton, Jr.

At the SAR State Conference in April, the State C.A.R. Society was represented by Wendy Roberts, State Recording Secretary, and Ms. Donna Johnson, Senior State Historian. Wendy brought greetings from the state society.

Thirty-six members, seniors, and guests from Georgia attended the 100th National Conference in Alexandria, Virginia. At this conference, Adelaide McCullough served as Magazine Fund Chairman and reported, Jeff Johnson served as the state's representative and reported, Page Rohe served as personal aide to the Senior National President, Jimmy Daniel served as the Georgia Flag Bearer, and Jeff Johnson served as Flag Bearer for the S.R. traveling banner. Georgia had nine delegates eligible to vote in the national election. During the awards banquet several members were presented with Life Membership and Centennial Pins. The State Society won the Regional Vice President's Award for the Best State History in the Southeastern Region, Sons and Daughters of Liberty received the Gold Merit Award Banner, and Jeff Johnson earned the Gold Merit Award for State Presidents. On Sunday morning during the memorial service the Georgia Society stood in memory of Leslie Hamilton Towns, a member lost in a shooting incident. This centennial year in C.A.R. came to an end for the Georgia Society when in an impressive ceremony at Constitution Hall, Claire Richardson was installed as the 1995-1996 Georgia State President, the Promise of the Future, as Jeff Johnson became an Honorary State President, the Pride of the Past.
