

WHEREAS, the failure of the ESA is due largely to the regulatory regime it engenders which has violated the rights of individuals, particularly the rights of private property owners, and it has destroyed and devalued property; and

WHEREAS, the huge administrative costs of the Act have been hidden by foisting these costs on private individuals and by imposing significant burdens on state, county and local governments;

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

The Members and Officers Georgia State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution

We have audited the accompanying combined financial statements - cash basis of the Georgia State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, and its individual fund financial statements as of and for the year ended April 30, 1998. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Society's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of Business

The Georgia State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution is a nonprofit organization whose primary purpose is to further educational programs related to the history of the United States.

Fund Accounting

To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the resources available to the Society, the accounts of the Society are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and the reporting purposes into funds established according to their nature and purposes.

The Society considers all contributions available for unrestricted use, unless specifically restricted by the donor.

Cash Basis

The financial statements of the Society have been prepared on the cash basis which recognizes income and expenses when received or paid rather than when earned or incurred. Management has not determined the nature and amounts of non-cash assets and liabilities.

Plant, Property and Equipment

Meadow Garden and its contents are historical treasures, and therefore are not subject to depreciation. The house and its contents are insured for \$83,000 and \$240,750, respectively. Office furniture and fixtures are insured for \$8,000.

Any major preservation or restoration project, however, is capitalized and depreciated over its estimated useful life. These improvements, which are being depreciated over fifteen years, are summarized as follows:

At the time the Meadow Garden property was contributed by the National Society to the Georgia State Society, its fair market value was deemed to be immaterial.

Costs of office equipment are consistently charged to expense because the Society does not deem such amounts to be sufficiently material to warrant capitalization and depreciation.

Tax Status

The Society has been granted tax exempt status under Code Section 501(c)(3) of the U.S. Internal Revenue Code.

National Committee Reports

AMERICAN HERITAGE - Mrs. Wexton D. Baxter

Of the 101 chapters reporting, 56 had an American Heritage program. Seven chapters entered national contests: Field of Art - Baron DeKalb, College Hill, Fort Frederica, John Benson; Field of Crafts - Old Unicoi Trail; Field of Music - John Benson (Honorable Mention for Alice P. Baker's song "America's My Home"), Old Unicoi Trail; Literature and Drama - Baron DeKalb, Brier Creek, John Laurens (3rd place for poem "Honoring Veterans On Their Day" by Mrs. E. B. Claxton, Jr.). State awards included: Best Report - Thomasville; Most Entries: Baron DeKalb, Brier Creek, John Benson (3 way tie); Best Program - William Marsh on "our Country's Historic Christmas Customs," showing how one family's traditions have been passed down from early colonists to present generations, and on to succeeding generations and how many of these traditions have become American traditions. The Lap Robe Contest winner is Old Unicoi Trail. Serving the State Society during this administration has been a great pleasure.

AMERICAN HISTORY - Mrs. Sterling P. Jones

One hundred five chapters reported with 216 American History programs presented to chapters and 50 to other groups. Eighty-one displays were arranged in schools or public places, 135 radio minutes and 60 TV minutes publicized American History. Thirty chapters used spot announcements. Essays on Forts in American History came from 250 schools with 4,785 entries. Daughters gave 2,986 certificates for essay contest, 329 bronze medals and 45 bronze/silver medals for success in the study of American History, as well as 504 certificates for outstanding work in American History. There were 86 youth volunteers involved in programs and activities of the American History Committee, Georgia essay winners were: 5th grade - Amanda Craig, Tomochichi Chapter; 6th grade - Rebecca Jarrett, Hawkinsville Chapter; 7th grade - Kyle Kornegay, Peter Early Chapter; 8th grade - Matthew Nicholson, Thomasville Chapter. Christopher Columbus Essay reports came from 11 schools with 75 students entering the contest, Jennifer Feldman, Commodore Richard Dale Chapter, was the State winner. A very special thanks to the 4 District Vice-Chairmen: NE - Mrs. Perry Havmore, NW - Mrs. Richard Massie, SE - Mrs. Harriett Claxton, SW - Mrs. Ernestine Thompson. It has been an honor and a pleasure serving as chairman of this committee.

AMERICAN INDIANS - Mrs. Fred K. Nuss

Of 104 Georgia chapters reporting, 23 chapters donated 7,359 food labels to Indian schools, John Houston Chapter alone contributed 2.558. Total of 1.984 pounds of clothing sent to the Indian schools as well as toiletries, \$170 cash and books. Chapters contributed \$372 to American Indian Scholarship Fund, \$900 to the Friends of the American Indian Scholarship Fund, \$424.50 to Bacone College, \$341.50 to Chemawa Indian High School, and \$510 to Indian Youth of America, Inc. Camp Scholarship Program for a total of \$2,548. William McIntosh Chapter assisted in restoration of Indian Spring Hotel. Sergeant Newton Chapter is working with county to move Hightower Trail Monument to more visible place. Martha Stewart Bulloch and Old Unicoi Trail chapters chartered a bus to Young Harris College to hear Indian program. Programs on Kochina dolls, Bacone and Chemawa schools, Indian Princess Nancy Ward, native American dances and history were among the topics covered in 41 excellent chapter programs. Many presenters used charts, artifacts, costumes, slides and videos. This chairman participated in State Conference, Continental Congress. District Workshops, Fall Board, expanded slide program on Bacone and Chemawa presenting program to two chapters, attended two luncheon meetings and C.A.R. State meeting, See Winners of Awards, 1998.

AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP - Mrs. Julian McKinley Of the 105 chapters reporting, 19 chapters distributed 3,026 manuals for Citizenship to libraries, schools, and immigrants studying for citizenship. Ten chapters participated in the Naturalization Court. Two chapters gave flags and served refreshments to new citizens. Three chapters presented Americanism Medals - Fort Frederica honored Ms. Victoria Sims; Nathaniel Macon honored Dr. Miguel Angel Faria; and Martha Stewart Bulloch honored Yung Krall. Mrs. Krall will be the principal speaker and will have her medal presented by the President General on National Defense Evening at Continental Congress.

CHAPTER ACHIEVEMENT AWARD COMMITTEE - Mrs. Robert H. Gladney Chapter Achievement points for 1997 work will be made available at April 1998 Continental Congress when our State Regent will be given the reports. Participating chapters will be notified during or soon after Congress. Performance for 1996 showed 35 chapters 325+ points for Level 3; 47 chapters 200-324 points Level 2; 12 chapters 125-199 points Level 1; 4 No Awards and 7 No Reports. This year Level 1 becomes 325+ points, Level 3 will be 125-199 points, and Level 2 unchanged. Grateful thanks to all who compiled the reports and for the privilege of serving on this committee.

CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION - Mrs. Inman D. Jackson, Jr. One hundred and four DAR chapters returned report forms for this committee. Nine chapters sponsor C.A.R. Societies and 11 chapters provide senior leadership for the Georgia State Society, Children of the American Revolution. Elijah Clarke Chapter is in the process of reorganizing the Count D'Estaing C.A.R. Society. Another society is being organized in the Gainesville area. In the state of Georgia, 101 DAR members were former C.A.R. members, approximately half joined DAR directly from C.A.R. The Georgia State Society, Children of the American Revolution, has 9 societies active on the state level. The State Project, raising funds to replace windows in the Indiana All States Cottage at Tamassee DAR School, exceeded its goal of \$500. Twelve Tamassee students plus chaperones joined Georgia C.A.R. members for the awards banquet and dance at the 59th Annual State Conference in February 1998. Adam Barker from the Button Gwinnett Society was named Most Outstanding Member, Dr. Linda O. Harvey from Sons and Daughters of Liberty Society was named the Most Outstanding Senior, and The Glass Brothers Society was named the Most Outstanding Society.

COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARD - Mrs. Douglas L. Moody

Our chapters have been busy this year honoring individuals for unselfishly giving of their time and talents to their communities for the betterment of those communities. Of 106 chapters, a total of 102 reported. Twenty-seven chapters presented 36 Community Service Awards. Additionally, 10 chapters presented 40 certificates of community service to youth. One chapter gave a monetary donation to a shelter for battered and homeless women and children. Madam State Regent, thank you for allowing me to serve as chairman of this committee.

CONSERVATION - Mrs. L. E. Stevens

One hundred five Georgia chapters reported this year. Fifteen chapters presented a Conservation Program. Conservation Medals with Certificates were presented to 4 people, 36 programs regarding organ and tissue donations were presented, 24 chapters recycled aluminum, paper, glass, etc., 55,788 pounds of bird seed were bought for birds, 28 chapters took part in the PROJECT FEEDER WATCH, chapter members built 84 bird houses, 10 members installed energy saving devices, 124 members installed smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. One member wrote regarding environmental legislation. 10,423 trees were planted, 15 chapters ADOPTED-A-HIGHWAY, 24 chapters mulched leaves, grass clippings, etc., 2 chapters cleaned rivers, Stephen Heard Chapter is awarded \$10.00 for most trees planted, Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter is awarded \$10.00 for the Best Conservation

Georgia Daughters were very enthusiastic this year. Number Chapters reporting: 104 out of 105. Totals include: # proclamations 133. # special observances 74, # display sq. ft. 2,594, libraries 365, # Banks 140, # stores 47, # schools 215, # other 136, minutes radio 706, minutes TV 631, total print inches 1,703, # pictures 106, Youth Volunteer hours (new) 231, # bells rung 181, # receiving certificates for both "Bells Across America" and Sidelights 43 (an increase of 11 from last year). These will be listed with Chapter Awards for 1997. Chapters celebrated with many luncheons and speakers. Some joined other chapters for this. Nathaniel Macon had their Fire Dept. ring the bell. The total number of subscriptions for 1997 was 1,699. This number represents 24% of the membership subscribing to the DAR Magazine. Four chapters, Edmund Burke, General Josiah Tattnall, John Ball, and Martha Stewart Bulloch had 50% or more of their members subscribing to the Magazine. DAR SCHOOL COMMITTEE - Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr.

The Hightower DAR School Award was presented to 50 chapters, with Cherokee and Philadelphia Winn chapters honored for the largest per capita contributions to the state projects. The State Chairman's awards went to William Marsh and Andrew Houser chapters. Eighty chapters had school programs, 32,188 labels and 42,505 pounds of resale items valued at \$127,515 were donated. DAR SERVICE FOR VETERAN PATIENTS - Mrs. R. E. Scott

Special thanks to Vice Chairman Junior Contest, Alline Kent; Vice Chairman Sales: NE Candice Davis, NW Donna Johnson, SE Julia Johnson, SW Beth Miller; 1997 National Junior Doll Chairman Jan Best. It has been a privilege to serve the state as Junior Membership Chairman.

LINEAGE RESEARCH - Mrs. Emmett T. Bragg

Reports were received from 114 chapters; of this number, 14 chapters indicated "no report." Chapters reported assisting 667 prospective members with 272 being approved by NSDAR for membership. Thirteen chapters requested assistance from the National Lineage Research Committee. Public genealogical workshops were sponsored by 16 chapters with a total of 248 attending. This chairman thanks the district vice chairmen for their cooperation: Mrs. John Singleton, NE; Mrs. J. E. Preston, Jr., NW; Mrs. Thomas Stafford, SE; and Mrs. W. H. Askew III, SW. Thank you, Madam State Regent, for allowing me the opportunity to serve on this committee.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE - Laura M. Reid

One hundred one of Georgia's 106 chapters reported to this chairman with 37 chapters reporting a total gain of 296 new members. We also welcomed 33 reinstatements and 37 transfers from other states, for a total gain in membership of 366. Regretfully this Chairman reports a loss of 259 members: 77 transferred out of state; 148 were lost by death; 34 were dropped by the National Society for nonpayment of dues; and we lost 119 by resignation. The Georgia State Society's total membership as of February 1, 1997 was 6,946. As of February 2, 1998, our state membership stands at 7,268. Based on the National Society's reports, this chairman's award for the largest percentage increase in membership goes to Sunbury Chapter for membership under 50; there is a tie for the largest percentage increase in membership for chapters of 50 to 100 members: the awards go to the Augustin Clayton and the Martha Stewart Bulloch chapter; and, in the over 100 membership chapter category, the Atlanta Chapter receives the award. National recognition for the largest increase in membership by application from January 1997 to January 1998 goes to the Augustin Clayton and Martha Stewart Bulloch chapters.

MOTION PICTURE, RADIO and TELEVISION - Mrs. Edward E. Lusk

Georgia Daughters made 97 contacts to the media by letters, e-mail or phone calls, commenting, pro or con, on the programs they watch. Three chapters presented awards to someone in the media. One chapter reported; "no award but thank you notes written." Another chapter reported that their DAR house and members were used in the filming of the TV series, SAVANNAH. The topic for a chapter program given by a newly appointed publisher of a local paper, THE PHILOSOPHY OF A SMALL TOWN NEWSPAPER. *TOUCHED BY AN ANGEL* again was reported to be the Best TV program for a family; BARNEY, the Best TV program for children. FLUBBER and TITANIC tied for the Best Movie for the family; ANASTASIA, Best Movie for children. Madam State Regent, it's been my pleasure to serve as the chairman of this committee.

NATIONAL DEFENSE - Mrs. William E. Shubert

National Defense reports were made by 104 chapters showing that 103 had three minutes of information on National Defense. Sixty-five chapters had a full program with topics covering the Military, Education, Patriotism and Good Government. In addition to having materials available at chapter meetings, 30 chapters provided them to local schools and 35 to area libraries. Sixty-nine chapters presented a total of 19 gold and 141 bronze ROTC medals. Dollars for Defense contributions totaled \$74 and \$130 was sent for ROTC program work at NSDAR. National and State Resolutions were discussed by 74 chapters and voting was encouraged by 87 chapters. This chairman expresses gratitude to those chapters who presented ROTC medals to all eligible schools in their area and particularly to those who contributed medals to be presented outside the chapter's membership regions. A special thanks to Mrs. Joan Millar and Mrs. Betty Jo Hopkins for their continuing efforts for the National Defense Committee. It has been a pleasure to serve the State Regent and the Georgia State Society.

PROGRAM - Mrs. James A. Harvey, Jr.

Twelve entries vied for honors and to represent Georgia in the National Best Program Contest. State winners in specified categories were: Augustin Clayton, Youth and Adult Education/Conservation; Xavier, Patriotic Education/Constitution; Joseph Habersham, Membership/Junior; John Laurens, Public Relations/Commemorative Events; and Briar Creek, Volunteer Services/Lineage Research. The entry from John Laurens was a Southeastern Regional winner. While 66 yearbooks and 28 supplements were prepared, 21 chapters submitted either yearbooks or supplements for evaluation as an "Outstanding" Chapter Yearbook. Eight chapters have utilized materials from the state program collection. The total number of reported programs by category were: Youth & Adult Education 140, Historic Preservation 141, Patriotic Education 144, Genealogy 52, Volunteer Services 34, Public Relations 36, Membership 30, DAR Schools 88, and Contributions 11. Seventeen chapters used Correspondent Docents while 27 used DAR Speaker's Staff presenters. Twenty-five report working through the National Program Office. It has been instructional to promote the work of this committee and to see the response of our Georgia Daughters in meeting the objectives. Thank you for the opportunity to serve our state in this chairmanship.

PUBLIC RELATIONS - Mrs. Alex S. Boyer, Jr.

All 105 chapters reported with 1,295 newspaper articles, 418 photos, 301 radio spots, 36 TV spots, 67 window displays, 76 radio programs, 41 TV programs, participation in 163 community events, 18 chapters using Internet and three involved in new Youth Volunteer Committee. Publicity has been outstanding with photos and accounts of meetings as well as special projects. Chapter members give countless hours of service as volunteers for community programs. Participation in youth activities has increased with award ceremonies publicized. Celebrations of DAR anniversaries and special events were observed with increased newspaper coverage. Communities are now more aware of DAR commitment to God. Home and Country. Visibility of chapters in community increased with gifts of flags, public forum on flag disposal, school essay contests, parties for Veterans, genealogy workshops, bell-ringing, community service and conservation awards along with participation in city and county observances. Location of an American Patriot's grave and its subsequent marking by the local chapter presented an opportunity for three timely feature articles. The announcement of State Conference dates gave another chapter a feature tracing the history of our organizations.

SEIMES MICROFILM - Mrs. Alton Bruce

The purpose of the Seimes Microfilm Center is to build a resource for genealogical research for DAR members, prospective members, and the public. Please see the annual financial statements for total contributions to the Center.

VOLUNTEER COMMUNITY SERVICE - Mrs. Davis King

Many chapters reported volunteer hours in their communities. The three chapters with the highest number of volunteer hours are: 1st place with 4,500 hours of volunteer time is Stephen Heard Chapter of Elberton; 2nd place is Lamar-LaFayette of Barnesville with 3,095; 3rd place is Lachlan McIntosh of Savannah with 2,923 hours. Chapter members donated many hours to museums, libraries, hospitals, nursing homes, community centers, schools, and to other community activities. Approximately 55,753 hours of community service were reported. Congratulations to each of you for your service in your communities. This chairman expresses appreciation to the State Regent for the opportunity to serve the State Society in this worthwhile committee.

VOLUNTEER INFORMATION SPECIALISTS - Mindy Tidmore Kammeyer

What a difference a year can make! The GA VIS Committee received positive responses from 70 chapters this year. They reported that 561 members use computers and 269 regularly use e-mail. The members are using their computers for record keeping by the Regent, Treasurer and Secretary, with the yearbook preparation most useful. The Application Disk is very popular for Registrars. At least 10 chapters reported how much easier this is for preparing papers. Another major interest is in the area of genealogical research on the Internet. This chairman was pleased to give one program on Internet Research. Lastly, we are pleased that many chapters received names of prospective members through e-mail. This fast and easy communication tool is what the VIS Committee is all about. Many thanks go to Phyllis Porter and Ann Darwin for their continued help with this committee. It has been a pleasure to serve the GA State Society as chairman of the VIS Committee for 1996-1998.

Special National Committee Reports

COMMEMORATIVE EVENTS - Mrs. Alvin V. Palmer

Reports were received from 105 chapters; of these, 52 chapters reported no activity in the Commemorative Events Program. The remaining 53 chapters reported participation in Commemorative Events involving Memorial Day Services, Flag Day, American History, Constitution Week including Bell Ringing, Columbus Day, Veterans' Day, Presidents' Day, Georgia Day, Pearl Harbor Day, Fourth of July parades, Indian Heritage Month, and Arbor Day. Wreaths were laid at National Cemeteries in Marietta, Kings Mountain Memorial, Battle of Cowpens Memorial, and James E. Oglethorpe Monument. One program commemorated with SAR the difficult winter at Valley Forge. A program was presented on Wagon Trains going west and the history of the Wagon Train replica in Washington. Historical artifacts were displayed in a courthouse lobby. Two women veterans of World War II were honored. DAR members attired in period dress for tour of historic building; others served as trustees for historic Goodall Dell House. United States flags were presented to schools, colleges, placed on veterans graves, and presented to naturalized citizens. These varied activities involved not only DAR members but also the American Legion, Boy Scouts, SAR, Reserve Units, and state and local dignitaries.

FRIENDS OF THE LIBRARY - Mrs. H. Randolph Holder

Two chapters, Augustin Clayton (Joyce Ball Henderson) and Cherokee (Camille Baxter), made contributions of \$200 each to Friends of the Library, four others made contributions totaling \$196, for a total of \$596. The total to the Library Centennial Fund \$217. Those who sent reports to this chairman were sent letters of appreciation. In our second century of this remarkable genealogical research library we continue to need funds to maintain, update, upgrade and provide genealogical assistance to our members, to prospective members, and to the public, through shelved records, microfilm and copying capabilities. Those chapters which have been generous, and those who contemplate gifts, are gratefully appreciated. The chairman has provided the necessary information. Response is in the hands of the membership. We fell short of our goal this year, by half. It is greatly to be hoped that next year will see a more active response to this need.

INSIGNIA - Mrs. Raiferd L. Drew

Georgia Daughters did themselves proud! One hundred chapters reported that 53 own a DAR banner, 83 own a Chapter Regent's pin, 63 present an Ex-Regent's pin to the outgoing Regent, 19 had programs on Insignia. Members "sparkle plenty" with over \$20,000 worth of pins and Insignia. Several chapters purchased more than \$1,000 each. Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter members bough 50 pins at a cost of \$2,400, promoted Insignia purchased in chapter newsletter, passed order forms at each meeting and included one in each new member packet. Great ideas. Any rulings pertaining to Insignia or new pins approved by the National Board of Management are published in the NSDAR Magazine. The only new pin approved for all members is a commemorative one – "European Trails to the American Revolution." It will be placed beneath other commemorative pins on a ribbon. "Guard that which is committed to thy trust!"

LITERACY CHALLENGE - Mrs. Hugh Howell, Jr.

Approximately 2/3 chapters presented excellent reports. Very few returned no activity. Eleven special programs were presented. Many members participate by volunteering most or all of their time at schools, churches, local or community drives, libraries and in their homes. Many county-wide literacy programs are carried out by members. Tutorial programs for ESL, adults, GED preparation, summer kindergartens including one 600 minutes for Literacy program. Retired teachers spend more and more time helping tutor individual students in Math, History, Science, English and in the use of

the Computer. A total of 695 volunteer hours were reported. Chapters reporting had an average of 3 or more members tutoring or donating magazines, books to kindergarten and hospitals, working fulltime in E.S.L. or fund raising. One member painted a mural on a downtown mall depicting help for literacy. Monetary donations were made by several chapters. One member helped set up a Spanish School. Thanks to all chapters who supported this challenging cause and for your cooperation and your work well done. Your chairman, Madam Regent, thanks you for the honor and opportunity to serve you and the State Society.

MEMBERSHIP PROMOTION WORKSHOP - Mrs. Robert B. Vance, Sr.

A thank you to 17 chapters who either had or participated in holding a Membership Promotion Workshop, with 124 chapter members trained to correctly prepare DAR application papers. Chapter members have reported 124 MPW manuals. Members assisting one or more prospective members with her DAR application papers are 287. Ten chapters held chapter workshops to train additional members to correctly prepare applications papers, with 144 in attendance. Chapters reporting gained 330 new members; however, 269 new members were gained by assisting prospective members. Fifty-four members use the DAR Computer Disk for application papers. Many thanks to Vice Chairmen: NE - Victoria Richards; SE - Helen Bradley; SE - Kate Hale; NW - Phyllis Porter (taught 5 workshops), and the Chapter Regents who planned the workshops. This chairman did a workshop for MS State Society in Jackson with 40 in attendance. It has been a pleasure to serve under your capable leadership, Madam State Regent.

NSDAR MUSEUM CORRESPONDENT DOCENTS - Mrs. W. Franklin Chastain Georgia has 18 Correspondent Docents, an increase from last year. They have worked hard to sell the story of our DAR Museum, using slide programs that show the beautiful items in our Museum. It has been a pleasure to work with this committee.

PRESIDENT GENERAL'S PROJECT - Mrs. John K. Bretch

"Keys to the Columns - Every Member Project." With unselfish and devoted effort, 71 chapters completed the \$4.00 per member for this three-year period. Many members bought Kemper items at the chairman's exhibit; this area was identified by two white columns. General Daniel Newnan Chapter, Mrs. Robin Tornow, Regent, added to the seats for Constitution Hall making <u>26</u> seats purchased by Georgia Chapters and Daughters, translated is \$13,000, which went direct to the President General's office. Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter held a chapter auction for the President General's project and chapter work netted over \$1,800. \$7,894.66 for the President General's project went through our State Treasurer's books. From our smallest chapter to the largest, Georgia Daughters know the importance of keeping our National Headquarters in Prime Condition. Your chairman thanks each member for this devotion. A Certificate of Appreciation to General Daniel Newnan Chapter. Madam Regent, it has been my pleasure to serve this committee as its chairman. Thank you.

VOLUNTEER GENEALOGIST - Mrs. Robert B. Vance, Sr.

Georgia has 7 NSDAR Volunteer Genealogists: Anne Darwin - Young Harris; Claire Dixon - Warner Robins; Judith Hughes - Jonesboro; Mindy Kammeyer - Atlanta; Velma Klyder - Columbus; Joye Quinn - Stone Mountain; and Marilyn Vance - Atlanta. Darwin, Dixon, Hughes, Quinn have their VG pin. Marilyn Vance has verified over 300 Supplemental papers for the 300 bar on the pin. These VG's are eligible to instruct the Membership Promotion Workshops - please ask them! Thank you, Madam State Regent, for the pleasure to serve this new committee in the State Society.

In 1997, this committee has distributed a total of 1,870 pieces of free informative DAR literature. A total of 1,591 items from National Headquarters was sold for a total of \$1,518.30. DAR literature was available at district workshops, Fall Board of Management and State Conference. We can also order supplies when needed on an individual basis. Order blanks are on hand from the DAR Literature Committee. Vice Chairmen Mrs. Robert Gibeling, Mrs. Robert L. Loflin, and Mrs. Ted Morgan join me in expressing our pleasure in serving the Georgia State Society.

FINANCE COMMITTEE - Mrs. Jonathan W. Fox

The Finance Committee met at 5:00 p.m. on August 6, 1997 in Americus, Georgia. Present were the chairman, Mrs. Jonathan Fox, Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall, Mrs. Peter S. Hanf, newly appointed Honorary State Regent, Mrs. Gordon B. Ragan, Mrs. Billy W. Hunter, Mrs. J. B. Deal, and Mrs. Paul F. Brennerman, Jr. The meeting opened with prayer by Mrs. Hanf. Mrs. Fox then thanked Mrs. Beall and Mrs. Ragan for their

extraordinary efforts this past year as the State Society lost to death the State Regent and the Chairman of the Finance Committee. The need for a computer for the use of the State Treasurer was discussed. It was moved and passed to purchase a computer for the treasurer as well as the program for keeping the books using the computer fund augmented by funds from the General Savings Money Market account. Mrs. Hanf. Mrs. Deal and Mrs. Brennerman were appointed to research the market for a computer that will meet our needs. They will make their report at the next meeting of the Finance Committee at the Fall Board of Management meeting. The membership will be asked to fund this project if the computer account funds are insufficient. Mrs. Ragan then distributed copies of the proposed budget for 1998-99. It was decided that for this budget we would keep the base of 6,900 members. Each item was then discussed. The section of per capitas was discussed in anticipation of a future decrease in membership. Mrs. Hanf moved, seconded by Mrs. Hunter, and passed by the committee the following motion to be referred to the Resolutions Committee: "The Finance Committee recommends that the Bylaws Committee reword Article X. Sec. 2(b) to read that the per capita be adjusted by the Finance Committee according to the annual membership count. The per capita amount will be shown on the budget and not in the bylaws." Reasoning: This allows for fluctuating membership, and will allow the Finance Committee to prepare a more realistic budget. The following changes were made in the proposed budget: 1. Administrative Operating Expense will list the expenses of the State Regent and the State Treasurer; 2. American History Month Essay Awards District Winners increased to \$200; 3. Outstanding Veteran Patient Award reduced to \$100; 4. Printing of the Proceedings decreased to \$6.300; 5. Meadow Garden Gatehouse Fund deleted; 6. Outstanding Junior Pin decreased to \$50 - actual cost is less than this. The total of expenditures will remain at \$34,500 as in the previous year. Our expenditures in some areas exceed the budgeted amount and the overage is covered by monies in the General Savings Account. This is a questionable practice, especially for the future. A discussion then followed of the major expense: the printing and distribution of the Proceedings. It was moved, seconded and passed that the following recommendations be sent to the Proceedings Committee: 1. Get the cost down for 1998-99 to a maximum of \$6,000 with the effort to bring it eventually further down, because the next finance committee may perhaps cut the amount budgeted; 2. Check out other printers; 3. Check cost of camera ready as compared to current set-up ... the finance committee is prepared to include the cost of a professional typist in the overall cost if this will greatly reduce the cost; 4. Check out the amount of books remaining for past 3 years to determine if orders can be reduced ... smaller amount means less postage, etc. It is urgent that the future expense of this project be reduced. It was agreed by the committee to reimburse Mrs. Beall for her telephone bills and extraordinary expenses incurred during the final illness and death of Mrs. Miller, our State Regent, Mrs. Ragan informed us that all the State Regent's travel account funds had been sent by Mrs. Miller to Mrs. Beall before her death and all the administrative operating expenses had been paid by the State Treasurer as approved. The transfer of accounts signatures, bonding and other details has been accomplished. After further discussion about the need to contain costs and to try to be innovative in this endeavor, the meeting adjourned.

The Meadow Garden Museum Board met Tuesday, June 3, 1997 in the Meadow Garden Board Room, Augusta. In the absence of the Chairman of the Board, Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall presided. The meeting was called to order at 10:45 a.m. Praver was given by Mrs. Jerido Ward. Others present were Mrs. Claude Brown, Mrs. Roy H. Cagle, Jr., Mrs. John R. Henry, and ex-officio members, Mrs. Billy W. Hunter and Mrs. Gordon B. Ragan. Hearing no objections, Mrs. Hunter was appointed Secretary pro tem by the Presiding Officer. Minutes of the March 5, 1997 meeting were read and approved as corrected. The Financial Statement was reviewed. Mrs. James Clark, Museum/House Manager, reported that tourism has been average, with visitors from 40 states and 6 foreign countries. In order to create interested in the schools about the Museum she suggested a docent speak at facility or PTA meetings. Furnace needs to be inspected and filters changed on a timely basis. Motion was made by Mrs. Cagle that "a heating and air-conditioning company be contacted to set up a contract to service heat pump twice a year, to include changing filters." Seconded. Adopted. Mrs. Cagle, Mseum Chairman, reported that the house has been pressure-washed at a cost of \$350. The canal-side of the house needs re-painting, roof shingles on small porch, parts of the front porch railings, and the flooring on the side porch need replacing. Motion was made by Mrs. Ward that "repairs to porch and painting of canal (South) side, rails and column on front and floor on porch on North side be made not to exceed \$10,000." Seconded. Adopted. Repairs were made to the sprinkling system at a cost of \$29.30. Mrs. Cagle will get an estimate to replace the flooring in the bathroom, which also has a leak in the ceiling. Mrs. Clark will keep the Museum open on July 4 for tours. Income from use of the property: Canoe Trip in April - \$100, Bike Riders in June -\$100. Plexiglass is needed in the doorway between Board Room and Augusta Room. Sign needed for the upstairs storage room. Long distance telephone carrier is still being investigated. Mrs. Ward, Docents Chairman, reported that during April and May 18 docents volunteered 153.5 hours at the Museum. Mrs. Henry, Landscaping Chairman. reported that the Medicinal Herb "Physick Garden" is growing well, and she has made plant markers for each herb. Pat Roach, who previously donated herbs, donated a Bee Skep for the garden. The Cherokee Rose has been removed from the corner fence. Plans are to plant a Dyer's Garden in the area provided when the fence is moved, which will include plants used to make dyes. Steps will be installed where the canal gate opens into the grounds. Permission was also given to plan and install a parking area at the back gate entrance, surrounded by a split rail fence. Included in the lunch today will be lettuce, green pepper, cucumbers and cabbage from the kitchen garden. Also, Lemon Balm tea. Reporting for the Furnishings Chairman, Mrs. Henry pointed out that the English mahogany stand has been placed in the Board Room. Mr. Barney Lamar is to come and offer his opinion of how to restore the dining room ceiling. and also the framing of Octavia's picture. Historic maps of Georgia will be ordered from the Savannah Chapter and sold in the Museum Shop. Governor Treutlen's oil portrait needs to have the glass removed because it is causing the paint to separate from the canvas. Mrs. Victor will investigate the possibility of the gift of a sofa to the Museum. Mrs. Beall reported that the DAR Banner is now in place on the flag pole. The status of Dave's jugs is still being investigated. There being no further business the meeting adjourned at 12:30 p.m.

Beall, State Regent, presiding as Chairman of the Board. Others present were Mrs. Roy H. Cagle, Jr., Mrs. O. Lee Gentry, Mrs. John R. Henry, Mrs. Billy W. Hunter, Mrs. Jules Victor, Jr., Mrs. Jerido Ward, and ex-officio members, Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr., and Mrs. Gordon B. Ragan. Mrs. Beall stated that Mrs. Hunter was confirmed as State First Vice Regent at the October National Board meeting and will now serve as Secretary of the Meadow Garden Board, Minutes of the June 3, 1997 meeting were read and approved as read. The Financial Statement was reviewed. Motion was made by Mrs. Henry to "transfer Meadow Garden lawn service from landscaping to Meadow Garden maintenance account." Seconded. Adopted. Mrs. Cagle, Museum Chairman, reported that the Museum now has a furnace maintenance contract with the Craighton Lairsey Company for an annual cost of \$238. The Allen Howard Society C.A.R. installed the box after having a meeting on the grounds. They spent the day doing yard work as a C.A.R. project. A load of top soil was added to the yard at a cost of \$25. Mr. Robert Riley donated a computer to the Museum House and a surge protector and a 6-foot cord were purchased. Plexiglass has been installed between the Board Room and Augusta Room. The fence at the corner of the vard has been moved. Replacement Staffordshire jugs have arrived from England at no charge except for shipping costs. Repairs to the roof, side porch and railings are scheduled. No price has been obtained as yet on painting the House. The Greater Augusta Historic House Partnership was formed with Meadow Garden, Ezekiel Harris House and Redcliff Plantation. Squirrels have invaded the roof and the problem is being handled. A picture of the House showing members of the Augusta Chapter at the Nov. 21, 1901 opening and dedication of Meadow Garden has been donated. Barbara Shaw, Captain Thomas Cobb Chapter, donated for display her grandmother's white dress, petticoat and lace jacket. The dress was worn on her 16th birthday. Several documents dated 1775, some with the signature of George Walton, owned by Debbie Coggins, will be appraised by the Georgia Historical Society director. Ann Harris, Director of Augusta Tours, has been informed that regular rates will be charged for after hour tours. Mrs. Ward, Docents Chairman, had no report. Mrs. Victor, Furnishings Chairman, had no report. Mrs. Henry, Landscaping Chairman, reported that planting of the Weaver's Garden will begin soon. Brick steps and a walkway have been completed from the back canal gate to the back patio. After removing the grass, wild ginger, ajuga and anemone have been planted by the walkway. An "Entrance Sign" is needed beside the back steps. LeAnn Brown, a spinner, has inspected the loom and spinning wheels to determine what is needed to make them operational. She has offered to hold a demonstration with the large spinning wheel in the "work room" during the Christmas Open House. She also offered to teach a basket-weaving class on the grounds. A prospective member of the College Hill Chapter has donated many hours working in the garden, brick laying and helping with plant research. Pepper vinegar, made by Mrs. Henry from peppers grown in the kitchen garden, herb plants and grape vine wreaths will be offered for sale at the Fall Board meeting. Docents will be needed for the Open House on December 6. Scuppernongs will be pruned when the leaves fall. The Cherokee Rose needs a support. Reporting for the Museum Shop Chairman, Mrs. Cagle stated that the blue birds have been reordered and received. The supply of saucers is low and they will be

reordered. Reporting for the Patrons Chairman, Mrs. Ragan stated that there are four new individual patrons and one new Chapter patron. Mrs. Beall inquired as to the status of Governor Truetlen's portrait, and stated that it is very important that the glass be removed as soon as possible in order to preserve the painting. The dining room ceiling continues to peel and should be attended to as soon as possible. Mrs. Henry has learned that Dave's jugs are now very expensive. The Board will meet at Meadow Garden on January 13 at 10:30 a.m. There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 2:20 p.m.

The Meadow Garden Museum Board met Tuesday, January 13, 1998 at the Museum with Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall, State Regent, presiding as Chairman of the Board. The meeting was called to order at 10:30 a.m. The invocation was given by Mrs. Jules Victor, Jr. Others present were Mrs. Roy H. Cagle, Mrs. Jerido Ward, Mrs. John R. Henry, Mrs. Flew Murphey, Mrs. Guy Best, and ex-officio members Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr., Second Vice Regent, and Mrs. Gordon B. Ragan, Treasurer. Due to the absence of the Secretary, Mrs. Billy W. Hunter, because of family illness, Mrs. Victor was appointed Secretary pro tem by the Chairman. Minutes of the October 30 meeting were read and approved. The financial statement was reviewed. Mrs. James Clark. Museum-House Manager, reported 39 states and eight countries were represented this past year. Mrs. Beall thanked Mrs. Clark, and she was excused. Mrs. Cagle, Meadow Garden Museum Chairman, reported she is still trying to get loose shingles on the roof taken care of, and the estimate on scraping, caulking and painting the canal side of the house is \$4,380, the stripping and staining of porches is \$1,760, a total of \$6,140. Joey Smalley will be contacted to begin work as motion was approved at the June meeting. The condition of the ceiling in the dining room was discussed, and it was decided to scrape the entire ceiling and not paint. Mrs. Cagle was asked to get an electrical estimate for rewiring the house. Mrs. Ward, Docents Chairman, reported that 27 members, representing four chapters, contributed a total of 892 hours to the Museum, Mrs. Victor, Furnishings Chairman, read a letter from Frank T. Wheeler, Assistant Director of the Georgia Historical Society in Savannah, concerning legal documents which related to George Walton's time on the Bench. Mrs. Henry, Landscaping Chairman, appeared on WRDW's midday program "Once Upon a Christmas," and a taped program about Meadow Garden was aired December 23 and 27, 1997. She decorated the Museum for "Open House" December 6, 1997 with the help of 18 members from several chapters. Sixty visitors attended the occasion. Total amount collected was \$141.25. Leann Brown gave a spinning wheel demonstration, and a bagpipe was enjoyed for several hours. Jan Best, Museum Shop Chairman, reported sales in shop and tourists were less than the year before. Mrs. Murphey, Patrons Chairman, stated \$1,300 was received from 20 individual patrons and three chapters. She urged all chapters to donate to the Kay Dyal Miller Memorial Fund. She announced Gloria Clark and Preston Sizemore of Sizemore Security Company were declared Patrons in recognition of their outstanding services to the Museum. Mrs. Beall announced, under old business, that the portrait of Governor John Truetlen should have the glass covering removed. Mrs. Victor stated since she lives in Savannah, it would not be possible for her to attend to this. Mrs. Beall asked Mrs. Cagle and Mrs. Henry to attend to this, and they agreed. At the State Conference on March 4-5-6, 1998 in Savannah, the book on Peter Tondee's Tavern by Carl Salona Weeks will be offered for sale at \$26.00. The author will be present to autograph purchased copies. It was voted to purchase 150 of these books through the Meadow Garden Gift Shop to be available during the convention at the Meadow Garden sales table. Profits from the books will go to the Georgia Room Fund, National Headquarters, Washington, D.C. After the conference, the profits will go to Meadow Garden. The Board will meet again at State Conference in Savannah, Tuesday, March 3, 1998 at 2:00 p.m. in the Regent's Suite. Mrs. Beall urged all to attend. She asked Louise Henry and Noni Victor to plan a short program using a few slides at the Meadow Garden breakfast Friday, March 6. There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 12:45 p.m., and everyone enjoyed a delicious lunch prepared by Mrs. Henry and Mrs. Cagle while viewing via TV a short program on the Museum featuring Louise Henry.

The Meadow Garden Museum Board met Tuesday, March 3, 1998 in the State Regent's Suite, DeSoto Hilton, Savannah, Georgia at 2:00 p.m., with Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall, State Regent, presiding as Chairman of the Board. Others present were Mrs. Billy W. Hunter, Secretary, Mrs. Guy Best, Mrs. O. Lee Gentry, Mrs. John R. Henry, Mrs. Flew Murphey, Mrs. Jerido Ward, Mrs. Jules Victor, Jr., and ex-officio members Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr. and Mrs. Gordon Ragan. The opening prayer was given by Mrs. Murphey. Minutes of the January meeting were read and approved as corrected. A corrected financial statement dated January 13 was submitted by the Treasurer. The March 3 financial report was reviewed and filed. Due to the absence of the House Manager, Mrs. Cagle, Mrs. Henry reported for her. Repair work is progressing on the canal side of the house. The floor has been redone and is ready for painting. Roof shingles have been replaced. Ben Dietz has replaced the floor trim and support to the street side porch. The lease to rent the grounds has been rewritten to require leasors to furnish bath room facilities. Plans for moving the office upstairs will require wiring for a light and a computer connection. A telephone will need to be installed and a portable telephone acquired for downstairs. A generic, or garage sale computer-table, will be needed. The microwave and refrigerator will remain downstairs. Nothing has been done to rewire the house as it would have to be inspected and this could be expensive. Mrs. Henry was asked to get two estimates for rewiring the house. The supply of the pink advertising flyers is exhausted, and Mrs. Henry will get an estimate on reprinting them. The Classic South advertisement will be dropped. Yellow page advertisement will not be renewed as we have a free white page. Nothing has been done about the dining room ceiling or the picture of Octavia. Mrs. Henry, Landscaping Chairman, reported that Joey Smalley has replaced one window pane in the museum shop and cleaned all the windows. The canal side of the house has been sanded to the wood, an oil-based primer and two coats of flat acrylic paint applied, with both the primer and paint having a mildew retardant added. All porches, except the back, have been sanded, and a stain matched to the previous paint applied. Measuring and graphing has been done in preparation for the installation of the split rail fence around the parking area at the back entrance gate. Grape vines are being pruned. Planting of vegetables and work in the herb garden will begin as soon as weather permits. A slide program for the Meadow Garden Breakfast at Conference has been prepared. Fred Helberg has found borer holes under the front entrance and recommends an immediate termite inspection. Front floor is not supported, and until repairs are made no one is allowed to enter through the front door. Mrs. Ward, Docents Chairman, reported that nine docents had 71.5 volunteer hours during January-February. Mrs. Victor, Furnishings Chairman, inquired as to where the framing of Octavia's portrait could be done, and will look both in Augusta and Savannah to find an appropriate frame shop. Mrs. Best. Museum Shop Chairman, reported that we have sold all Christmas cards in stock. Mrs. Ward moved that we order 2,500 Meadow Garden Christmas cards at a cost not to exceed \$700, Seconded, Approved, Mrs. Murphey, Patrons Chairman, explained the cost of becoming a Patron: Individual DAR members - \$50.00; Individual non-DAR members - \$100. Listings for honorariums and memorials will include only the name of the person being honored or memorialized. Mrs. Beall announced that the Board will meet on June 2, 1998 at 10:30 a.m. in the Board Room at Meadow Garden. There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 3:10 p.m.

Standing Rules for Meadow Garden

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MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

- The governing body of a museum, in this instance the Meadow Garden Board, serves the public interest as it relates to Meadow Garden, and must consider itself accountable to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, as well as to Meadow Garden; members should not attempt to act in their individual capacities, but all actions should be taken as a Board, Committee, or otherwise in conformance with the Standing Rules, the Act of Incorporation, or applicable Resolutions.
- 2. The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the three (3) Trustees as named in the Deed from the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, conveying Meadow Garden to the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution; namely, the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the State Chairman of Meadow Garden who is appointed by the State Regent; the Chapter Regents of the Augusta Chapter and the College Hill Chapter, both Chapters being located in Augusta, who shall serve as Vice Chairmen to the State Chairman of Meadow Garden; and five of the chairmen of Meadow Garden Committees, as appointed by the State Regent.
- No Georgia Daughter shall serve in the same Meadow Garden Chairmanship more than two (2) consecutive terms.
- 4. Of the six (6) appointments made by the State Regent, at least two (2) shall be Honorary State Regents.
- 5. The State Second Vice Regent and Treasurer shall serve as ex-officio members of the Meadow Garden Board, being given the privilege of the floor without a vote.
- The State Regent shall serve as Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board, and the State First Vice Regent shall serve as Secretary of the Meadow Garden Board.
- 7. The Meadow Garden Board shall meet a minimum of three (3) times each year; namely, preceding Fall Board of Management meeting, preceding annual State Conference and following Continental Congress, and at such other time as deemed necessary by the Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board. At least one (1) meeting of the Board shall be held at Meadow Garden each year.
- 8. The Meadow Garden Board shall have jurisdiction over the operation, maintenance and work of Meadow Garden and shall be the authority for Meadow Garden as long as such authority is not in conflict with the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, the Act of Incorporation for the Georgia State Society, Resolutions adopted by the Georgia State Society and/or directions which from time to time may be approved by action of the Georgia State Society assembled at its annual State Conference.
- 9. Five (5) voting members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.
- 10. Minutes shall be kept of each meeting and a copy shall be sent to each member and printed verbatim in the State Proceedings.
- 11. All expenses for maintenance, operation and purchases of furnishings and plantings shall be authorized by the State Regent, as Chairman of the Board, and paid by the State Treasurer. Expenditures exceeding \$1,000.00 must have the majority approval of the Board.

12. These rules will be binding on the actions of the Board in their operation of "Meadow Garden." They may be changed by the following procedure: Members of the Board must have written notification of proposed changes or additions one month prior to the next meeting of the Board; a two-thirds vote of the Board is necessary to effect a change or addition.

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OPERATIONS

- 1. Everyone entering Meadow Garden will be requested to sign the Register, including date, time of arrival and time of departure.
- No more than fifteen (15) people with each Docent are to be on tour in the house at a given time. Excess of this number may wait in the reception room or in the garden. The Museum-House Manager/Docent has the authority to enforce the Meadow Garden rules at all times.
- 3. There will be no smoking in Meadow Garden.
- 4. No refreshments are to be served in Meadow Garden or taken into Meadow Garden. Should a group, such as a visiting chapter, desire refreshments, the garden is available for use if litter is properly disposed of by the serving group.
- 5. Tour visitors will be asked to pay a fee as set by the Board.
- 6. There will be only four (4) complete sets of keys to Meadow Garden and 4 keys to the gates of Meadow Garden. Keys to be returned after each administration. New locks may be required. Distribution of Keys: <u>Gate Only</u>: Landscaping Chairman, Augusta Police Department, Georgia Power, and Sizemore Security. <u>Gate & House</u>: Chairman of the Board, Meadow Garden Chairman, Museum House Manager, and Docents Chairman.

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VOLUNTEERS (DOCENTS)

- 1. Volunteers, docents, shall be members in good standing of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR.
- Duties of volunteers shall include acting as guides, hostesses, working in museum shop, working in yard, cleaning in house, public relations. No volunteer work at or for Meadow Garden shall be done except under the direct guidance of the Meadow Garden Board and the chairman of the specific committee for that particular function.
- 3. Cleaning or yard work volunteers shall be under the direction of the House/ Museum Manager.

IV

FURNISHINGS

- 1. Items bought or accepted for the older section of Meadow Garden must pre-date 1821.
- 2. Furnishings for the two (2) main floor rooms and two (2) upstairs rooms in the newer section may be dated post 1820 but these rooms should be considered companion rooms to the rest of the house and furnished accordingly with all efforts made to keep furnishings of these four rooms dated no later than 1850. The Augusta Room furnishings will remain as they were in 1982.
- 3. Reproductions may be used only when the physical condition of the antiques is jeopardized by exposure in areas where large numbers of visitors have easy access; or when environmental conditions including excessive light, dust, humidity or airborne impurities pose a threat to the preservation of originals.

- 4. Effective March 12, 1983 all items donated to Meadow Garden shall be accepted with the written condition that they become the property of Meadow Garden and may be used, replaced or sold at the discretion of the Meadow Garden Board only.
- 5. All items that post date 1821, with the exception of those in the six (6) rooms of the newer section and those described in Number 3 of this section, shall be replaced as soon as possible with similar items pre-dating 1821.
- 6. Once an item is placed, it shall not be moved from one location to another without permission of the Meadow Garden Board. Only the Chairman of the Board may approve the removal of an item from the house, if it is in need of repair or refinishing.
- 7. Any item donated or purchased must have written documentation of appraisal and include an indication as to how the determination was made.
- 8. A file will be kept of all assets with information as to price paid or market value, date of acquisition, donor or where bought, documentation and appraisal and a description of article. One file will be kept in the reception room accessible to the Docents; a duplicate file will be in the possession of the Chairman of the Board.
- All items purchased or donated will be added to the Fine Arts insurance policy. Said policy will be reviewed and updated a minimum of once a year. Major additions to furnishings will be added immediately.
- Future plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the House/ Museum.

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LANDSCAPING

- 1. The landscape plan adopted by the Board shall be adhered to with no deviation unless recommended by an authority on landscape design and care.
- 2. Donations of shrubbery, plants or trees shall be accepted only when item is part of the master plan.
- 3. Work on the grounds will be under the sole direction of the Meadow Garden Board and the Landscaping Chairman. Supervision of actual work will be provided by the Museum-House Manager or the Landscaping Chairman of Meadow Garden.

VI MUSEUM SHOP

- 1. The Museum Shop will be operated by a committee appointed by the Chairman of the Board and be responsible to the Board.
- 2. Chairman of the committee will be responsible for all purchases, subject to the approval of the Board or the State Regent.
- Museum Shop operation will be self-supporting. In the event funds are needed for purchases, they may be advanced from available Meadow Garden funds and must be considered a loan and shall be repaid without interest within one (1) year from date of borrowing.
- 4. Profit from the Museum Shop shall be retained in its own account, with a percentage being transferred at the discretion of the Board at end of fiscal year and placed in Maintenance Account. The audit of the Museum Shop operation shall be included in the annual audit of the Georgia State Society.

VII PATRONS

- 1. Donors to the following categories are eligible to be known as "Patrons":
 - A. Meadow Garden Capital Investment Trust Fund
 - **B.** Furnishings
 - C. Maintenance
 - D. Landscape
- 2. Individual gifts of a minimum value of \$50.00 to any of the above categories automatically qualifies the donor as a Patron.
- Chapter or group gifts of a minimum value of \$100.00 or more, above the State Honor Roll requirements, automatically qualifies that chapter or group as a Patron.
- 4. The State Treasurer will report these gifts to the Patrons Chairman.
- 5. The Patrons Chairman will issue certificates to the qualifying individuals and chapters or groups.
- 6. A permanent book will be kept on public display at Meadow Garden to record Patrons gifts.
- 7. The Patrons Chairman will enter the names of donors in the appropriate book a minimum of once a year.

VIII

PLAQUES & MARKERS

- 1. Plaques/Markers may be placed at Meadow Garden only at the discretion of the Board, and request meets the following criteria:
 - A. Substantial service and/or contributions that secured the property and the heritage for the GSDAR;
 - B. Individuals so recognized shall have been deceased for at least 5 years;
 - C. Plaque/Marker will be paid for by person(s) requesting such recognition.
- 2. Such plaques will be permanently displayed at Meadow Garden and a record of honoree's service and/or contribution shall be recorded and placed in the Meadow Garden file, with Board approval.
- 3. Plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the house/museum. Additional markers shall not be permanently placed on the grounds.

Bylaws

BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I

NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II OBJECTS

The objects of this Society shall be:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of the Georgia State Society.

Article IV OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian and a State Curator.

Section 2. (a) To be eligible for state office, a member shall hold and have held membership in a chapter or chapters within the Georgia State Society for at least 5 years prior to her election and have served a full term as chapter officer or state chairman.

(b) No member shall be eligible to the same state office for two (2) successive terms. A member having served more than one half of a term in a state office shall be deemed to have served a term.

(c) No two state officers shall be members of the same chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

(d) To be eligible for the office of State Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State First Vice Regent or as State Second Vice Regent or served in each of these two offices of the Georgia Society.

(e) To be eligible for the office of State First Vice Regent or for the office of State Second Vice Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State Recording Secretary or as State Treasurer of the Georgia State Society and shall have served a full term as a Chapter Regent of a chapter in the Georgia State Society.

Section 3. In recognition of valuable service to the Georgia State Society, a State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Article V

NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. (a) A candidate for state office shall request the endorsement of her chapter, taken by vote at a regular meeting of the chapter held between May and January preceding the State Conference at which state elections are held. The endorsement, signed by the Chapter Recording Secretary, shall include the office the candidate seeks and shall be received by the State Regent with the candidate's statement of intent to be a candidate prior to any announcement or campaigning by the candidate and/or her supporters.

(b) A candidate for State Regent who wishes to present a slate of officers shall send to the State Regent in one packet the chapter endorsements and the statements of intent for each of her selected candidates. If received by the State Regent no later than December 1, these candidates shall be listed as a slate in the State Regent's December letter and Call to State Conference.

(c) Candidates wishing to run independently of a slate, whose chapter endorsements and statements of intent are received by the State Regent no later than December 1 shall be listed as independent candidates in the State Regent's December letter and Call to State Conference.

(d) A candidate whose chapter endorsement and statement of intent have been properly received by the State Regent may choose to announce her candidacy separate from the State Regent's December letter and Call to State Conference. Such a chapter endorsement and statement of intent shall be received by the State Regent at least ten (10) days prior to the opening of the State Conference at which the election is to take place.

(e) A candidate who does not meet the requirements of these Bylaws shall be declared disqualified and ineligible for consideration for state office.

(f) A chapter shall endorse no more than one chapter member for state office per election with the possible exception of candidates for State Regent and for State Corresponding Secretary.

(g) In the event of the death, incapacitation or withdrawal of a candidate prior to the election, a replacement shall be made with notification in writing to the State Regent and accompanied by the chapter endorsement and statement of intent as directed by these Bylaws.

Section 2. Nominations of candidates for all state offices shall be made at a designated meeting of the State Conference.

<u>Section 3.</u> The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected biennially by ballot at the State Conference. A majority vote shall elect.

<u>Section 4.</u> The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two (2) years or until their successors are elected. Their terms of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Section 5. (a) Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become State Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become State First Vice Regent subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. Vacancies in other state offices shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next State Board of Management meeting or State Conference, whichever shall come first.

(b) Any state officer who is absent from the state for a continuous period of six (6) months or longer shall automatically relinquish her position as a state officer.

Section 6. Upon the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Organizing Secretary General.

Section 7. (a) A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot.

(b) The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than fifteen (15) months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

(c) The endorsement shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent with the candidate's name and address to the Recording Secretary General to be received by April 1 preceding the designated Continental Congress.

Article VI

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall perform the duties prescribed in this article, and parliamentary authority adopted by the Society, and such others as the State Board of Management and the National Society may require.

Section 2. The State Regent shall:

(a) be the chief executive officer and the official spokesman for the State Society;(b) have general supervision of the affairs of the State Society;

(c) preside at all meetings of the State Conference, State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;

(d) appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society;

(e) be ex-officio a member of all committees;

(f) appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as advisor in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting;

(g) sign all contracts and agreements made in the name of the Georgia State Society with the recorded approval of the Executive Committee and the State Board of Management or the State Conference as directed by these Bylaws;

(*h*) be bonded and have the authority to draw upon funds of the State Society with the approval of the Finance Committee.

(i) recommend to the Finance Committee a Certified Public Accountant who shall be approved by the Finance Committee.

Section 3. The State First Vice Regent shall:

(a) perform the duties of the office of State Regent in the absence or inability of the State Regent;

(b) fill a vacancy in the office of State Regent;

(c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;

(d) serve on those committees as designated by these Bylaws and as directed by the State Regent.

Section 4. The State Second Vice Regent shall:

(a) perform the duties of the office of State First Vice Regent in the absence or inability of the State First Vice Regent;

(b) fill a vacancy in the office of State First Vice Regent;

(c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;

(d) serve on committees as directed by the State Regent.

Section 5. The State Chaplain shall:

(a) open all meetings of the State Conference and the State Board of Management with scripture reading and prayer;

(b) preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and conduct such other religious services as may be required;

(c) be custodian of state properties pertaining to the duties of this office;

(d) be responsible for IN MEMORIAM pages in the Proceedings.

Section 6. The State Recording Secretary shall:

(a) record the proceedings of the meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;

(b) compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and the Proceedings Committee;

(c) submit to the appropriate National officers, the endorsement for Vice President General and the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent before April 1 of the year in which said balloting was held;

Section 7. The State Corresponding Secretary shall:

(a) conduct correspondence and send notices on behalf of the State Regent, the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as may be directed by them;

(b) receive from the chapters the consolidated reports and distribute to the appropriate state chairmen.

Section 8. The State Organizing Secretary shall:

(a) assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new chapters;

(b) assist chapters in conjunction with appropriate state officers and chairmen in revitalization.

Section 9. The State Treasurer shall:

(a) be bonded;

(b) be the custodian of the funds of the State Society, placing them in institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance;

(c) receive the state dues and State Conference registration fees from the chapters and receive all sums contributed by the chapters for state and national projects, disbursing monthly to the Treasurer General all funds designated for national projects;

(d) disburse other funds only when authorized by the State Regent in writing;

(e) keep an account of all sums received or disbursed by using the basic double entry form of bookkeeping according to accepted accounting procedures and keep receipts for all transactions;

(f) prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference, sending a copy to the State Chairman of the Finance Committee ten (10) days in advance of each meeting;

(g) be a member of the Finance Committee and an ex-officio member of the Credentials Committee;

(*h*) balance and prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year; said audit by a Certified Public Accountant, shall be performed and delivered within forty-five (45) days of receipt of books.

Section 10. The State Registrar shall:

(a) when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American revolution prove eligibility and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars ;

(b) keep a correct list of all members in the state;

(c) report on membership to the State Conference;

(d) be in possession of the computer and software owned by the Georgia State Society and see that it is maintained.

Section 11. The State Historian shall:

(a) be in charge, within the state, of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General as well as those authorized by the Georgia State Society;

(b) keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves within the state;

(c) prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General;

(d) promote the study of American history, state and county history and historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the founding of our state and counties.

Section 12. The State Librarian shall:

(a) serve as liaison between the Librarian General and the Georgia Chapters and disseminate general information on the NSDAR Library;

(b) cooperate with the director of the Georgia Department of Archives and History, making the needs of the Archives known to the chapters;

(c) collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing them wherever accepted in such libraries and Archives as may be chosen by the State Board of Management;

(d) solicit, with the approval of the Executive Committee, contributions from the chapters for purchase of such books as requested by the office of the Librarian General, and/or the various libraries in Georgia which the State Society approves;

(e) receive gifts of books and other printed material from the chapters to be donated to the approved libraries and Archives;

(f) maintain a constant supply of bookplates to the NSDAR Library, the Georgia Department of Archives and History and for purchase by the chapters.

Section 13. The State Curator shall:

(a) receive and be responsible for all gifts of Revolutionary relics to the Museum of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution;

(b) be custodian of the State properties and shall have them properly stored and made ready for use at state meetings.

Section 14. All officers will keep a Procedure Book of Instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new officers to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. State Conference:

(a) The annual meeting of the Georgia State Society shall be known as the State Conference. It shall be for the purpose of:

(1) receiving reports of officers, committees and Chapter Regents;

(2) electing officers biennially;

(3) promoting programs in furtherance of the objects of the Society;

(4) any other business that may arise:

i. annual budget shall be adopted,

ii. all projects of the State Society requiring funding shall be voted upon at State Conference or ratified by members at State Conference if previously voted upon by the State Board of Management,

iii. no project extending beyond the term of the presiding officer may be accepted at any meeting other than by vote at State Conference.

(b) The State Conference will be held between February 1 and the time of the meeting of Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week;

(c) The State Regent shall fix the time and place of meetings;

(d) The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credentials form to the chapters not less than sixty (60) days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 2. The voting members of the State Conference shall be:

(a) the officers and Honorary State Regents of the State Society;

(b) the officers and honorary officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state;

(c) the Chapter Regent, or in her absence, the Vice Regent or alternate of each chapter;

(d) delegates or alternates of each chapter of the state as designated by the Bylaws of the National Society for representation at Continental Congress;

(e) one additional delegate from each chapter in the state.

Section 3. Only a chapter member in good standing whose credentials have been completed in accordance with the instructions of the State Regent and the State

Credentials Chairman for the State Conference and in accordance with the Standing Rules of the National Society shall be eligible to represent her chapter at state and national meetings.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the chapter, except in the case of the Regent or Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at an annual State Conference, shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.

<u>Section 6.</u> Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the state of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

<u>Section 7.</u> At the opening of the annual State Conference the privilege of the floor shall be accorded to the State Chairmen. They may not vote unless they are duly registered as voters of the State Conference.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Society may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen (15) days' notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

<u>Section 9.</u> Forty-five (45) voting members, representing not less than twenty (20) chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The state officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents and the Regents, or in their absence, the Vice Regents of the chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the fall, following the October meeting of the National Board. It may meet whenever called by the State Regent. A minimum of twenty (20) days' notice shall be given as to the time and place of any such meeting.

Section 3. Thirty (30) members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference or as proscribed by these Bylaws.

Section 5. State chairmen, vice chairmen, committee members of the National and Standing Committees and one (1) member from each chapter shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privilege of the floor, but may not vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article IX EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, shall attend the meetings, but may not vote.

Section 3. This Executive Committee shall:

(a) perform such duties of the State Board of Management between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient;

(b) meet at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three (3) members of the committee;

(c) vote by teleconference if necessary;

(d) receive and make recommendations for projects requiring expenditure of funds outside routine expenditures to be considered by the State Conference;

(e) make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. Decisions of the Executive Committee shall be acted upon at the next meeting of the State Board of Management or at State Conference, whichever shall come first.

Article X FINANCES

Section 1. (a) The fiscal year of the Georgia State Society shall be May 1 through the last day of April.

(b) The annual budget, prepared by the Finance Committee, shall cover the fiscal year and be prepared on the basis of dues payable for the calendar year beginning December first preceding.

Section 2. (a) The annual dues of chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be \$5.00 for each member of the chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1.

(b) The Finance Committee shall determine the per capita amount and distribution according to the annual membership count. The per capita amount and distribution shall be indicated on the budget presented annually.

Section 3. (a) Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the state dues, a conference registration fee of five dollars (\$5.00) for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under these Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether chapter is represented or not.

(b) State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the five dollars (\$5.00) conference fee at the time of registration.

(c) Other members of the Georgia State Society who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay three dollars (\$3.00) conference fee at the time of registration.

Section 4. (a) The State Treasurer and the State Regent and such others entrusted with funds of the Georgia State Society as may be designated by the State Board of Management shall be bonded. (See Article VI, Sections 2 and 9);

(b) The State Treasurer with the approval of the State Regent and the State Chairman of the Finance Committee shall place the funds of the Georgia State Society in financial institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage;

(c) The placement of restricted savings funds and investment funds of the Georgia State Society shall be placed to the credit of the Georgia State Society by the State Treasurer under the direction of the Finance Committee. Monies may be invested in U. S. Treasury obligations or other interest bearing obligations of federally insured financial institutions;

(d) The accounts of the State Treasurer shall be annually prepared for audit by a Certified Public Accountant immediately following the end of the State Society fiscal year and no later than May 15 and delivered to the CPA by that date;

(e) Should the State Treasurer be incapacitated, the Chairman of the Finance Committee is authorized, with the written approval of the State Regent, to serve as the Acting State Treasurer until such time as the State Treasurer is able to resume her duties or a new State Treasurer is appointed and ratified as stated in Article V, Section 5 (a).

Section 5. The expenses incurred by the State Regent in the performance of duty shall be paid each year from the State Dues Fund:

(a) Four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00) shall be taken each year to defray her necessary travel expenses;

(b) Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent, as budgeted, shall be paid by the State Treasurer who shall keep all receipts of these expenses. No expenses exceeding the budgeted amount shall be paid by the State Treasurer.

Section 6. At the close of the books annually, \$3,000.00 shall be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies Fund" so that at the end of each administration a total of \$6,000.00 will be reserved. This money is to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration.

Article XI COMMITTEES

Section 1. The State Regent shall appoint the following standing committees:

(a) Bylaws: An Honorary State Regent shall be appointed as chairman and the committee shall be composed of two (2) other Honorary State Regents and one (1) member from each district;

(b) Finance: This committee shall be composed of seven (7) members to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two (2) Honorary State Regents, one (1) active chapter regent and one (1) active chapter member. One of the two Honorary State Regents shall be appointed chairman. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund. This committee shall have charge of all investments of the Georgia State Society funds and the placing of insurance of all kinds with accredited companies;

(c) Resolutions: This committee shall be composed of all Honorary State Regents, the State Parliamentarian and three (3) chapter members;

(d) Proceedings: This committee shall be composed of the State Recording Secretary, the immediate past State Recording Secretary, State First Vice Regent and four (4) additional Daughters, at least one of whom shall be an Honorary State Regent.

Section 2. The State Regent shall appoint such other committees, standing or special, as the State Conference shall authorize and actions of the State Board of Management and of the National Society shall require. The appointments shall be concurrent with the term of the State Regent making the appointments and shall terminate with the end of the administration.

Section 3. No additional appointments to any of the committees shall be made after the roster of chairmen and committees has been compiled and sent to the chapters. Vacancies shall be filled by the State Regent with timely notification to the membership.

<u>Section 4.</u> The duties of committees shall be such as these Bylaws, the State Conference, the State Board of Management or the National Society shall prescribe.

<u>Section 5.</u> All chairmen will keep a Procedure Book of instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

ARTICLE XII CHAPTERS

<u>Section 1.</u> To expedite the work of the Society, the chapters of the Georgia State Society shall be placed in geographical districts:

(a) A chairman appointed by the State Regent shall coordinate the work of all chapters as needed; she shall be titled "Coordinator of Districts";

(b) Each district shall have a Director appointed by the State Regent to work as a committee under the direction and supervision of the Coordinator of Districts and the State Regent.

Section 2. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April in the year of chapter elections. The Chapter Regent shall report anually the names of the elected officers promptly on the form provided by the State Regent for this purpose, with copies to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, and the State Recording Secretary.

<u>Section 3.</u> The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent, the State Recording Secretary, and the District Director by February 1.

Article XIII MEADOW GARDEN

Meadow Garden, property owned by the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, shall be operated as follows:

(a) The governing body shall be the Board of Trustees composed of the following members: the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Chairman who shall be appointed by the State Regent;

(b) The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the following members: the State Regent who shall serve as Chairman; the State First Vice Regent who shall serve as Secretary; the Chairman of Meadow Garden; the Regents of the Augusta and College Hill Chapters and the chairmen of the five (5) subcommittees appointed by the State Regent; Docents, Furnishings, Landscaping, Museum Shop, Patrons;

(c) The Meadow Garden Board shall operate with Standing Rules approved by the State Conference.

Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. The current edition of "Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised," shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law in matters not covered by these Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

Article XV AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent, the State Parliamentarian, and the State Bylaws Chairman. The State Regent shall send a copy to each chapter, at least sixty (60) days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the Call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

Article XVI DISSOLUTION

Although the period of duration of the Georgia State Society is perpetual, if for any reason the State Society is to be dissolved or otherwise terminated, no part of the property of the Society or any of the proceeds shall be distributed to or inure to the benefit of any of the officers or members of the Society. Upon the dissolution of the Georgia State Society, assets shall be distributed by the Board of Management and/ or the Executive Committee to and only to the National Society Daughters of the local United States District Court, exclusively to such organization or organizations as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated within the meaning of section 501(c)(3), with purposes and objectives consistent with those of the Georgia State Society.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21.) No Conference was held in 1911; the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P.W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912"; amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, p. 211.)

ABSOLUTE DEADLINE FOR PROCEEDINGS MATERIAL

WHEREAS, a definite deadline must be established and adhered to for all reports and material to be in the hands of the Proceedings Committee in order to be delivered to the Printer by June 1.

RESOLVED: That all FINAL reports and materials must be received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1 with the exception of the Auditor's Report and any information sent out by the National DAR Headquarters. This does not alter the requirement in the "Items of Information" in the Proceedings that all reports shall be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary on or before February 15, the ORIGINAL being sent to the Secretary for the Proceedings.

AND FURTHER RESOLVED: This policy will be strictly adhered to and the material not received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1 will be omitted from the Proceedings.

AWARDS

All chapters competing for awards must send reports to the respective chairmen by February 1, 1999.

All reports for awards are based on membership confirmed by the National Society as of January 1 of preceding year (1998). SEE FIGURE BESIDE CHAPTER NAME IN CHAPTER REGENTS' DIRECTORY.

BYLAWS

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT confict with the National and State Bylaws.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS

Notice of change of address of members shall be sent to the Organizing Secretary General, Treasurer General, State Regent and State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHANGE OF NAME

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to State Registrar, Treasurer General and State Regent by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHAPTER ELECTIONS

As soon as Chapter elections are held, names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, Administration Building, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D.C., 20006-5392, to the State Regent or State Regent-Elect and to the Recording Secretary by May 1. The full Christian name of Chapter officers shall be given together with her husband's given name or initials, address, zip code and telephone number. A Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years. This being added in order for our Bylaws to conform to the National Bylaws.

CHAPTER REPRESENTATION AT STATE AND NATIONAL MEETINGS

At the State Board of Management, a chapter is represented by the Chapter Regent, or in her absence by the First Vice Regent, and one non-voting member.

The voting representation of each chapter at the State Conference shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received by the State Treasurer **by January 1**. Membership less than 50: Regent, 1 Delegate, 4 Alternates, total votes 2; 50-199: Regent, 2 Delegates, 6 Alternates, total votes 3; 200-299: Regent, 3 Delegates, 8 Alternates, total Votes 4; 300-399: Regent, 4 Delegates, 10 Alternates, total votes 5.

The voting representation of each chapter at Continental Congress shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received in the Office of the Treasurer General **by January 1**. Membership less than 50: Regent, 0 Delegate, 2 Alternates, total votes 1; 50-199: Regent, 1 Delegate, 4 Alternates, total votes 2; 200-299:Regent, 2 Delegates, 6 Alternates, total votes 3; 300-399: Regent, 3 Delegates, 8 Alternates, total votes 4.

CONFERENCE REGISTRATION FEE

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer with the State dues on or before December 1, \$5.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether represented or not.

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$5.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$3.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration.

CONTRIBUTIONS

ALL contributions by Chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

DATE FOR ANNUAL AUDIT

WHEREAS, every effort must be made to have all material to the printer as early as possible to facilitate delivery of the Proceedings to the members.

RESOLVED: That the end of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, fiscal year for audit purposes be changed from May 31 to April 30.

DECEASED MEMBERS

Deaths shall be reported promptly to Treasurer General, State Chaplain and State Registrar by the Corresponding Chapter Officer. Complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and a date of death shall be furnished State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for Conference Memorial Service pages for State Proceedings.

DUES

Pay to State Treasurer State Dues of \$5.00 per member before December 1. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the December through April Board meetings of the National Society. National Dues of \$25.00 per member sent to the Treasurer-General, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20006-5392, before December 1, 1998.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS

To insure uniformity and convenience in binding, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, 8 1/2 x 11 inches, with 1 1/2 to 2 inch margin on left side, 1 1/2 inches at top and 1 inch on right side and at bottom. Four copies shall be sent to State Chairman of Genealogical Records. The booklet "Instructions for Copying Source Records and Their Preparation for Library Use" should be obtained from the office of the Corresponding Secretary General (currently \$1.00) with check made payable to the Treasurer General, NSDAR. This booklet gives the procedure for copying source records.

GEORGIA HOSPITALITY FUND

The following resolution which applies to the Georgia Hospitality Fund appears in the Proceedings for 1955:

"WHEREAS, The Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds a social event in Washington during Continental Congress which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society.

"THÉREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$400.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes:

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this fund shall not be cumulative." Adopted.

NEW ADMINISTRATION FOR CONTINGENCIES FUND

For the entire resolution setting up the "General New Regime Fund Balance of \$2,500.00," found on pgs. 203-204 of the 1979 Proceedings the following substitute resolution was adopted by the 88th State Conference: RESOLVED that at the end of each administration \$6,000.00 be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies" fund, this money to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration, and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration. All other surplus monies in the General Fund, other than funds which are designated, are to be divided equally between the General Savings Account and the "Georgia State Society Endowment Fund," "DAR School" Resolutions 1991 page 62 of the 1992 Proceedings. This transaction is to be handled by April 30 every two years before the auditors close out the books of an administration, thus making the General Fund show the same balance of \$6,000.00 at the beginning of each new administration. (This fund is to be known as "New Administration Reserve for Contingencies Fund.") Adopted.
