### 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

## Nature of Business

The Georgia State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution (the "Society") is a non-profit organization whose primary purpose is to further educational programs related to the history of the United States.

#### Fund Accounting

To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the resources available to the Society, the accounts of the Society are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and the reporting purposes into funds established according to their nature and purposes.

The Society considers all contributions for unrestricted use, unless specifically restricted by the donor. Restricted funds represent primarily contributions from Chapters restricted for specified recipients.

#### Estimates

The preparation of financial statements requires the Society's management to use estimates and assumptions that affect the accompanying financial statements. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### **Cash Basis**

The financial statements of the Society have been prepared on the cash basis, which recognizes income and expenses when received or paid rather than when earned or incurred. Management has not determined the nature and amounts of non-cash assets and liabilities.

#### Plant, Property and Equipment

The Society follows the policy of not capitalizing collections and historical treasures. Meadow Garden and its contents are historical treasures. The house and its contents are insured for approximately \$325,000. Office furniture and fixtures are insured for \$8,000.

Any major preservation or restoration project is capitalized and depreciated over its estimated useful life. These improvements, which are being depreciated over fifteen years, are summarized as follows:

Costs of office equipment are consistently charged to expense because the Society does not deem such amounts to be sufficiently material to warrant capitalization and depreciation.

#### Tax Status

The Society has been granted tax exempt status under Code Section 501(c)(3) of the U.S. Internal Revenue Code.

# **National Committee Reports**

#### AMERICAN HERITAGE - Mrs. Ronald H. Salter

Of the 97 chapters reporting, 32 had very diverse and interesting programs. One chapter entered the national contest. Seven chapters involved youths working in their programs. Three chapters celebrated their unity of spirit and unity of purpose. Eleven chapters had very good and unusual programs. Unfortunately 54 chapters reported "No Report" on their American Heritage. Linda Stephens of Hawkinsville Chapter won first place in the state and division with her "School Girl Samples" in embroidery: A craft entry. Thomasville Chapter won best program with an original drama by Rosemary Henderson involving signers of the Constitution. Unique events: a skit on George Washington written by a member William Marsh and two grandsons, collecting and preserving an antique paper by Philadelphia Winn, writing a guide for schools to teach a mini course in Genealogy by Altamaha Chapter. One minute American highlights at each meeting, John Houston had 800 students write poems about Red-White-Blue.

#### **AMERICAN HISTORY - Mrs. James Forsyth**

Ninety-six chapters reported with 277 American History programs presented to chapters and 91 to other groups. Seventy-four displays were arranged in schools or public places, 300 radio minutes and 100 TV minutes publicized American History. Fifty chapters used spot announcements. Essays on Naval Heroes came from 280 schools with 4,622 entries. Daughters gave 2,324 certificates for essay contest, 300 bronze medals and 30 bronze/silver medals for success in the study of American History as well as 400 certificates for outstanding work in American History. Leon Stratton; NW, Mrs. Larry Drake; SE, Mrs. Ronald E, McCrosky; SW, Mrs. Edward B. Hale. It has been a pleasure to serve the State Society as chairman of American History.

Flags, copies of the American Creed and "What the Constitution Means to You" were distributed and refreshments were served to the new citizens. Georgia Daughters serve in GSCAR in the following numbers: nine as Senior State Officers, three additional Daughters as Senior Society Presidents, and five additional Daughters are Senior State Chairmen. Eight DAR Chapters report having a program on C.A.R., 13 chapters had reports of C.A.R. activities at their meetings and two additional chapters had C.A.R. included in the report of the DAR State Conference and Continental Congress. C.A.R. Members assist at DAR functions in seven chapters, five chapters have joint projects with C.A.R. societies, and three chapters participated with a local C.A.R. society to carry out the goals of the C.A.R.'s "Kids Helping Kids" Committee. Of 106 chapters, a total of 102 reported. Eighteen chapters presented 23 Community Service Awards. ## **CONSERVATION - Mrs. Roy Henderson**

This chairman was pleased to read the chairmen's reports that enumerated the many activities participated in by the chapter members. Twenty-five chapters had significant conservation related achievements in addition to the goals for this year. Volunteer service miles clocked in at 7,525 miles. The tally for stamps for the wounded weighed in at 325 ozs. Three summer youth volunteers were sponsored by one chapter to serve at Veteran's Hospital: one member was registered with Women in Military Service. Two chapters sponsored Adopt-a-Veteran program and four special events for women veteranpatients were recorded. Two chapters reported having a program on the Spanish American War/DAR Hospital Corps. Some of the other activities reported included wreath laying on Veterans Day, community special events, parades, grave flag markings on Memorial Day, exhibits in libraries and museums. Congratulations to the four chapters with outstanding reports: Augustin Clayton, Mary Hammond Washington. Martha Stewart Bulloch, and Burkhalter. It is a privilege to serve our state in this capacity.

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA - Truth Ashby Gamblin One hundred one chapters reported distributing the following number of Flags: 108 large, 1,213 small, and 1,266 table. Seven hundred sixty-eight flag codes were given, 76 certificates were presented and 328 other flag literature items were distributed. All 101 chapters reported saying the Pledge of Allegiance at all meetings. Twenty-seven chapters had Flag Minutes or Flag Care Spots during meetings. Ninety-six chapters encouraged their members to "Keep the Flag Flying," while 75 chapters encouraged their members to use Flag postage stamps. Five chapters had programs on the Flag. Two chapters presented Flag programs to others. Three chapters held Flag retirement ceremonies. Two Flag Day Luncheones were held with other area chapters participating. A television station was prompted by a local DAR chapter to air a community service program on the proper use of the Flag. Perhaps, we should all take note (and follow likewise) that in one community, June is "FLY THE FLAG!" month. Thank you, Georgia Daughters, for "Keeping the Flag Flying" in Georgia. Thank you, Madam State Regent, for allowing me to serve as Flag Chairman.

# **GENEALOGICAL RECORDS - Mrs. Everett E. Porter**

This year 14 chapters submitted a total of 3,565 pages of new genealogical source records. These records have been sent to the DAR Library in Washington, DC, Georgia Archives in Atlanta, Washington Memorial Library in Macon, and Georgia Historical Society in Savannah. One book written by a member was donated to the DAR Library. Two volumes of previously submitted records were indexed this year for Bookworm credit. This chairman plans to have remaining volumes completed by next year. Awards for the most pages in each category go to Roanoke, John Laurens, and Fort Frederica chapters. Thanks to all the dedicated Genealogical Records Chairmen for all their hard work.

### JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS - Mrs. William E. Shubert

# FRIENDS OF THE LIBRARY - Mrs. Fred . Nuss

Of the 99 chapters reporting, 10 chapters donated a total of \$1,423 as follows: Martha Stewart Bulloch gave \$200 to the Friends of the Library; Augustin Clayton gave \$200 in honor of Ruby Marshall; Baron DeKalb donated \$50 to Friends of the Library; Pulaski \$10 in memory of Emily Bailey Wallace; Oothcaloga gave \$100 to Library Centennial Fund and \$200 to Friends of the Library Fund; Commodore Richard Dale gave \$100 to the Friends of the Library; Philadelphia Winn gave \$200 in honor of Mary Elaine McConnell; between Fort Peachtree and Governor David Emanuel, five books were donated. In addition, Fort Peachtree contributed \$38 to NSDAR Library Archives Fund and \$125 to the Computerization Project; Augusta donated \$200 for Life Membership for Ellen Turner. ### LINEAGE RESEARCH - Mrs. C. Lewis Baldwin

This chairman received reports from 98 chapters. Of the 98 reports, 15 chapters requested assistance from the Lineage Research Committee. The State of Georgia had 601 prospective members assisted by local chapters with 219 prospective members approved. Genealogical Workshops were given by 13 chapters with 228 people attending. There were two chapters that had activities involving youth lineage research. The three Outstanding Chapters for the State of Georgia this year are: Old Unicoi Trail Chapter - Each month three members of the chapter offer their assistance in lineage research at their local library. Benjamin Hawkins Chapter - Karan Pittman, Chapter Lineage Research Chairman, participated in a writers workshop sponsored by Andrew College, Cuthbert, Georgia, She spoke on the importance of lineage research. Etowah Chapter - The Chapter, in conjunction with Cherokee Timeland, Woodland School, participated in a youth lineage research program with 90 students attending. This chairman would like to thank the District vice-Chairman for their time and service: Mr. John Singleton, NE; Mrs. Carolyn Wentworth, SE; Mrs. Justin Robinson, NW; and Mrs. Malcolm McPhaul, SW. It has been a privilege to serve Georgia in the position of State Lineage Research Chairman.

### MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE - Mrs. David S. Manker

This chairman built a database of 855 five-digit zip codes from chapters, forwarded 137 referrals, and accepted five chapters' invitations to speak on membership. Seventy-two chapters now have an e-mail address for receiving referrals. The National Society reported that Georgia added 268 new members by application, 33 reinstatements, and 69 transfers-in for a total of 370 new members. Members lost by transfer-out, non-payment of dues, resignation, and death totaled 315, leaving the state with a net gain of 55 members bringing the total chapter members to 6,999 on December 31, 1998. National Membership Chairman's Awards given to Augustin Clayton Chapter for Largest Increase in Membership and also for the Largest Percentage Increase in Membership.

# MEMBERS AT LARGE - Mrs. Moody C. Summers

While chapter membership offers the greatest opportunity for DAR service, it is recognized that distance, lifestyle, and/or personal preference often prevents a member from joining a chapter. The goal of this committee is to open a line of communication with these potential and valuable members. Three such members have been assisted by this Vice Chairman.

### MEMBERSHIP PROMOTION WORKSHOP - Mrs. Everett E. Porter, Jr.

Every member of DAR is a member of the Membership Committee. It is the responsibility of every member to spread the word about DAR and invite friends and relatives to become members. We must all talk about the wonderful things DAR does for the community, state, and nation in order to increase awareness in the community. DAR membership is on a steady decline, so chapters and members must encourage and assist prospective members in every way possible.

# MOTION PICTURE, RADIO and TELEVISION - Mrs. LaVerne E. Stevens

One hundred two chapters reported. One hundred eighty-three standard letters, phone calls and e-mail letters were reported. Best movie for family: PRINCE OF

EGYPT - Best T.V. program for family: TOUCHED BY AN ANGEL, Best movie for children: PRINCE OF EGYPT, Best T.V. program for children: BARNEY. The best report \$10.00 awarded to JOHN HOUSTON CHAPTER, Thomaston. John Holliman, a well-known T.V. news reporter for CNN, was their nominee. His reports were held round the world. With two other colleagues he broadcast LIVE from Baghdad during the Allied attack where he was assigned to report. He was assigned to co-anchor with newscaster Walter Cronkite when John Glenn returned to space. He covered the Pathfinder when it reached Mars, reported from China during the student demonstrations, reported on Hurricane Hugo, he was a farm reporter. Mr. Holliman was a multitalented reporter, we feel he should be recognized by Georgia Daughters of the American Revolution for his outstanding reporting – many times under dangerous conditions. Soon after his name was submitted for the award he died in an automobile crash in Atlanta. We feel close to his family. His mother is a member of the submitting DAR Chapter. ### NATIONAL DEFENSE - Mrs. Mindy Tidmore Kammeyer

This chairman received 102 reports from chapters. All but one chapter had the required three minutes of National Defense Reports at regular meetings. Etowah Chapter presented 17 of them! Thank you to these outstanding chapters. Our chapters are active in promoting voter registration as well as voting. The 1998 NSDAR Resolutions were discussed by 90 chapters. The National Defense Committee continues to be one of the most active and important committees in DAR. It has been a pleasure to be chairman!

Reports from 102 chapters show 1,070 newspaper articles, 516 photos, 310 radio spots, 82 programs initiated, 45 sponsored programs; 36 TV programs, 58 window displays with 200 community events in which chapters participated. Chapters used all media to keep communities aware of DAR projects. Thirty chapters used Internet to further DAR goals. Many participated in volunteer programs at schools, libraries, hospitals, local activities, and 10 involved youth in volunteering to carry out DAR in committee work. Some chapter activities were: one chapter has 23 sets of mother-daughter members, one honored a 100-year-old member, one held an historic

Eighty-one chapters reported 790 members using computers in their DAR work. You have made address labels, published yearbooks and newsletters, researched genealogy on the internet, used the membership database, treasurer's reports, typed minutes and membership application papers, made banners, certificates, designed invitations, brochures and programs, indexed genealogical records. Four hundred forty have used e-mail to correspond and seven have designed web pages. In addition to the Georgia State Web Page, created by Phyllis Porter, the Hightower Trail, John Benson, Hawkinsville, Bonaventure, Martha Stewart Bulloch, Nathaniel Macon and Sukey Hart chapters have web pages linked to the National Society's Web Page. Sixty-five requests for information received through the Georgia State web page have been answered. ### COMMEMORATIVE EVENTS - Mrs. W. Charles Hampton

A total of 103 reports were received and 51 of those had no activity. Seven chapters reported Commemorative Events for the Spanish American War. Wreaths were laid at Spanish American monuments. Two chapters marched to the Spanish American monuments and another chapter made a trifold poster with a memorial roll, information about Dr. McGee and the nurses and also information about the sinking of the Maine which was displayed at two chapter meetings and later put in the public library. A program on the Spanish American War was presented to a local high school which was televised on closed circuit TV and shown to the students. Our Regent gave talks on the nurse's participation in the War. Fifty-two chapters reported other Commemorative programs involving: The Battle of the Bulge, WIMSA, Columbus Day, Pearl Harbor, Siege of Savannah, Georgia Day, Women's History Month, Flag Day, a candlelight vigil at the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC, a Congressional Medal honoree was recognized, a WWII nurse was recognized and a High Tea was given to celebrate the 225th Anniversary of the Boston Tea Party. Three chapters celebrated a 25th Anniversary, a 75th Anniversary and the 100th birthday of a chapter member. respectively. Other events remembered: a State Representative was honored, a veteran's day program was presented to high school seniors, a flag was presented to a Boy Scout Troop, and trees were planted at a State Park.

### MEADOW GARDEN MUSEUM - Mrs. John R. Henry

Meadow Garden's successful year is evidenced by a 40% increase in tourism over 1997 (down some), with 3,850 visitors. Receipts from tourists and museum shop were up 251% over 1998, at \$9,071, due to sales of new Museum Shop and Carl Week's book. Docent hours totaling 1,224 were contributed by: College Hill, Augusta, John Franklin Wren, Captain John Wilson, Edmund Burke, and Kettle Creek chapters. Donations received: Thronateeska Chapter in honor of Dollye Ward, \$10; Sukey Hart C.A.R. Society, \$25; General Robert Cutting for dining room preservation, \$500. The office was relocated upstairs with new heating/air conditioning, telephone, gate alarm, back door bell, and good second-hand furniture. The bottoms of several columns were rebuilt, repairs made to exterior wood and front door threshold, and whole house was treated for termites and powder-post beetles. The canal side of the house was sanded to the bare wood and painted as was the front porch. A new security/storm door was installed at the entrance to the Museum Shop. ### MEADOW GARDEN MUSEUM BOARD

The Meadow Garden Museum Board met Tuesday, June 2, 1998 in the Board Room at Meadow Garden in Augusta, Georgia at 10:30 a.m., with Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall, State Regent, presiding as Chairman of the Board. Others present were Mrs. Billy W. Hunter, Secretary, Mrs. John R. Henry, Mrs. S. D. Lewis, Mrs. Charles Turner, Mrs. Jerido Ward, Mrs. Jules Victor, Jr., Mrs. Roy H. Cagle, Jr., Mrs. Merrill Thompson, and ex-officio member Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr. The opening prayer was given by Mrs. Bell. Minutes of the March 3 meeting were read and approved as corrected. The June 2 financial report was reviewed and filed. Mrs. James Clark, Museum/House Manager, reported that so far this year the Museum has had 1,309 visitors, coming from 34 states and five countries. The months of April and May were especially busy, and several docents were most cooperative in volunteering their time. Mrs. Henry, Meadow Garden Museum Chairman, reported that she has had the house inspected for termites, confirmed that we do have both termites and powder post beetles, and received bids from three companies to treat the infestations. Mrs. Ward moved that we

contract with Bert Hall to treat the termites and powder post beetles at a cost not to exceed \$2,500 and to have an annual maintenance contract. Seconded, Adopted, The damage to the front threshold will be repaired. Mrs. Henry moved that we employ Wade Warner Mechanical Heating and Air Company to add a 2-ton heating and air conditioner to the storage room upstairs, including electrical connections, at a cost of \$3,354.60. Seconded. Adopted. The city has put in a new sewer pipe to the street to fix the sewage problem. During this installation an old brick walkway to the curb was found, the bricks saved and the walkway will be replaced when the city replaces and levels the ground at the front gate. Wade Warner has cut timbers to repair the porch columns. When the repairs are completed Joey Smalley will complete the porch painting. The canal side of the house and all porches, except back, were painted. The Augusta Chapter graciously offered to replace the DAR flag, which was worn and removed from the pole. The 3x4 flag will cost \$122.10. A copy of the Meadow Garden web page was reviewed. On National Museum Day there were 16 visitors and a total income of \$40 for the day. An old "outhouse" has been located that could be used as a tool shed while giving the appearance of a "necessary house." Price will be obtained. Roy Cagle has volunteered to donate labor to build a drain from the back of the house across the lawn to keep the water from standing behind the kitchen. Mrs. Henry and Mrs. Cagle have made slides for a new Medicinal Herb program. A new back screen or storm door is needed to provide security. Mrs. Ward, Docents Chairman, reported that there were 378 total volunteer hours from January to May. New training sessions will be scheduled as soon as possible. According to the Standing Rules for Meadow Garden, volunteer docents shall be DAR members in good standing. Mrs. Victor, Furnishings Chairman, moved that restoration of the oil on canvas portrait of Octavia Walton LeVert be made with cost not to exceed \$800, that the colored print of Gov. Truetlen be cleaned, frame restored, and print reframed with a mat, cost not to exceed \$450, and that the "dedication picture" be framed, cost not to exceed \$80. Seconded. Adopted. Funds will come from the Furnishings Account. Mrs. Cagle, Landscaping Chairman, reported that the Allan Howard Society, CAR, will visit the Museum in September for a work day. They will bring approximately 10 people. Mrs. Thompson. Museum Shop Chairman, in re-doing the shop, will use the dresser and hall tree now in the storage room, curtains will be hung, and a rug placed on the floor. Glass shelves are needed. Many new items will be available for sale. Mrs. Henry recommended that Mrs. Shelby Whitson, who has donated many bulbs, flowers, etc. and Ms. Mary Lou West, who volunteers every Tuesday in the vard, be made Patrons in Kind, Mrs. Hunter moved that Mrs. Henry's recommendation be accepted. Seconded. Adopted. Mrs. Beall announced that the next Board meeting will be held on October 29 in Eastman. There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 12:30 p.m.

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The Meadow Garden Museum Board met Thursday, October 29, 1998 in the State Regent's Suite, Jameson Inn, Eastman, at 1:00 p.m., with Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall, State Regent, presiding as Chairman of the Board. Others present were Mrs. Billy W. Hunter, Secretary, Mrs. John R. Henry, Mrs. S. D. Lewis, Mrs. Merrill Thompson, Mrs. Charles Turner, Mrs. Jerido Ward, and ex officio members Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr. and Mrs. Robert H. Farrow. The opening prayer was given by Mrs. Beall. The minutes of the June 2 meeting were read and approved as read. The financial report was presented by Mrs. Farrow, reviewed and filed. Mrs. Henry, Museum Chairman, reported that the heating and air conditioning unit and a telephone have been installed in the new office upstairs. A used secretary's desk, chair and computer desk were purchased at a cost of \$125. A table and chairs have been placed in the room for docents. The microwave oven is also now upstairs. Roy Cagle has installed a monitoring alarm for the pedestrian gate and a door bell at the Museum Shop door. The rotted columns on the front and viewing porches have been rebuilt and painted by Joey

Smalley, along with the air conditioning pipes, at no charge. Several of the bannisters on the steps and one step tread need replacing. Mrs. Cagle, Dr. Bob Cutting and Mrs. Henry have been chipping paint from the dining room ceiling and walls, after trying a paint removal system which has been used in old Charleston. Dr. Cutting has offered a donation of \$1,000 toward redecoration of the dining room. After talking with Ms. Ann Floyd with the Regional Development Center for Preservation, and doing research. Mrs. Henry thinks the walls were originally painted with white wash (kalcimine), a mixture of olue, water and lime powder, which could be tinted. An architect on the staff of the Georgia Historical Preservation Commission, Mr. Antonio Aquilar, and Ms. Flovd will be asked for advice before anything more than removing the paint is done. Thronateeska Chapter donated \$10 in honor of Dollye Ward to the Museum, and Sydney McRae, President of the C.A.R. Sukey Hart Society, and her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Bridges from Milledgeville, brought a check in the amount of \$25. A record number of tourists have visited during October - to date 1,104. This broke the previous record for a single month of 704. The second week in October 705 visitors came. The estimated total for October is 1,368. The Cagles and the Henrys began tree trimming and cleanup, with Mr. Cagle doing the pruning. Bids for tree trimming have been received, including the removal of the wild cherry tree. A bid from David Matthews Lawn Service to replace Mr. Lollis has been received. Matthews will charge \$120 per month on a 12 month basis, coming once weekly during the winter to rake leaves and keep the yard neat. The Board decided to authorize giving Mr. Matthews a key to the drive gate so that he can come early in the morning. The George Walton brochures need to be reordered. McGowan's bid was the same as for our last order in January. 1997. Five thousand brochures will be ordered at a cost of \$358. Mrs. Henry recommended that the Museum have an advertisement in the DAR Magazine, Mrs. Ward made a motion that Meadow Garden sponsor an ad in the July, 1999 All-Member issue of the DAR Magazine. Funds will come from Maintenance. Seconded, Adopted. Christmas Open House will be held in cooperation with Ezekiel Harris House and Redcliff Plantation on December 12. Refreshments made from old recipes will be served. The Allan Howard C.A.R. Chapter from Atlanta will make their annual working visit on November 14. Mrs. Ward, Docents Chairman, reported that a training session was held on September 24. Both ladies who attended, Mrs. David McNeill, Regent of Captain John Wilson Chapter, and Mrs. Wyatt Albea, Jr., Regent of Kettle Creek Chapter, are helping with tours next week. Mrs. Gloria Clark, House Manager, conducted the training session. Approved. Total 1998 cash receipts reflected a 251% increase over 1997. New merchandise accounted for 38.4% of the increase which occurred during the second half of the year. Dr. Robert Cutting, husband of College Hill Chapter member Frances Cutting, donated \$500 to be used as needed for the restoration of the dining room. Mrs. Henry recommended that Dr. Cutting be made a Patron in appreciation of his donation. Seconded. Approved. Thirty-three copies of Savannah in the Time of Peter Tondee have been sold at \$26.00 each, leaving 17 books in inventory. Total docent hours served in 1998 are 12,235. Local chapters participating were John Franklin Wren, Kettle Creek, Captain John Wilson, Edmund Burke, Augusta, and College Hill, A Museum Shop security/storm door was purchased and installed. A brick walk is under construction at the front entrance of the property. Work is continuing on the dining room walls and ceiling. We are trying to get an appointment with Ann Floyd for expertise on plaster, etc. A vacuum cleaner was purchased. Additional repairs to the railing and bannisters on the front and back porches are needed. The inside top railing needs to be stripped. Painting for the three remaining sides of the house is needed and a bid will be submitted by Joey Smalley. A written appraisal for a document signed by George Walton and offered for purchase by the Museum is needed. A dressform found for the Victorian party dress in the bedroom will be investigated as to size and price. Mrs. Henry and Mrs. Cagle attended a reception for Augusta Mayor-elect Bob Young, hosted by the Arts Council, Mr. Young indicated he would like to bring city visitors to Meadow Garden for picture-taking opportunities. Mrs. Henry will follow up with brochures. After a request to Director of the Canal Authority Dayton Sherrouse, Meadow Garden will be placed back on the Authority's mailing list. The "outhouse" will be installed in late January. Landscaping Chairman Mrs. Cagle reported that weeding, planting bulbs and laying pine straw in the area around the back porch was done by Joey Blackstock. The pine straw was donated by Mrs. Henry. It was recommended that the roofing shingles damaged in the December wind storm be left as is. Mrs. Ward, Docents Chairman, reported that a training session for members interested in becoming a docent will be held soon. Museum Shop Chairman Mrs. Thompson reported that the Shop sales totaled \$865.78 for the last guarter of 1998. New items purchased were primarily seasonal merchandise. The Savannah in the Time of Peter Tondee book sales increased Shop receipts considerably. The Penelope Barker Tea Cake recipe was favorably received during the Christmas Open House, and brought in over \$12.00 in donations. The shop will receive 50% of the proceeds from the sale of the book. # **Standing Rules for Meadow Garden Museum**

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# MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

- The governing body of a museum, in this instance the Meadow Garden Board, serves the public interest as it relates to Meadow Garden, and must consider itself accountable to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, as well as to Meadow Garden; members should not attempt to act in their individual capacities, but all actions should be taken as a Board, Committee, or otherwise in conformance with the Standing Rules, the Act of Incorporation, or applicable Resolutions.
- 2. The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the three (3) Trustees as named in the Deed from the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, conveying Meadow Garden to the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution; namely, the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the State Chairman of Meadow Garden who is appointed by the State Regent; the Chapter Regents of the Augusta Chapter and the College Hill Chapter, both Chapters being located in Augusta, who shall serve as Vice Chairmen to the State Chairman of Meadow Garden; and five of the chairmen of Meadow Garden Committees, as appointed by the State Regent.
- 3. No Georgia Daughter shall serve in the same Meadow Garden Chairmanship more than two (2) consecutive terms.
- 4. Of the six (6) appointments made by the State Regent, at least two (2) shall be Honorary State Regents.
- The State Second Vice Regent and Treasurer shall serve as ex-officio members of the Meadow Garden Board, being given the privilege of the floor without a vote.
- The State Regent shall serve as Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board, and the State First Vice Regent shall serve as Secretary of the Meadow Garden Board.
- 7. The Meadow Garden Board shall meet a minimum of three (3) times each year; namely, preceding Fall Board of Management meeting, preceding annual State Conference and following Continental Congress, and at such other time as deemed necessary by the Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board. At least one (1) meeting of the Board shall be held at Meadow Garden each year.
- 8. The Meadow Garden Board shall have jurisdiction over the operation, maintenance and work of Meadow Garden and shall be the authority for Meadow Garden as long as such authority is not in conflict with the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, the Act of Incorporation for the Georgia State Society, Resolutions adopted by the Georgia State Society and/or directions which from time to time may be approved by action of the Georgia State Society assembled at its annual State Conference.
- 9. Five (5) voting members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.
- 10. Minutes shall be kept of each meeting and a copy shall be sent to each member and printed verbatim in the State Proceedings.
- 11. All expenses for maintenance, operation and purchases of furnishings and plantings shall be authorized by the State Regent, as Chairman of the Board, and paid by the State Treasurer. Expenditures exceeding \$1,000.00 must have the majority approval of the Board.

12. These rules will be binding on the actions of the Board in their operation of "Meadow Garden." They may be changed by the following procedure: Members of the Board must have written notification of proposed changes or additions one month prior to the next meeting of the Board; a two-thirds vote of the Board is necessary to effect a change or addition.

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# OPERATIONS

- 1. Everyone entering Meadow Garden will be requested to sign the Register, including date, time of arrival and time of departure.
- No more than fifteen (15) people with each Docent are to be on tour in the house at a given time. Excess of this number may wait in the reception room or in the garden. The Museum-House Manager/Docent has the authority to enforce the Meadow Garden rules at all times.
- 3. There will be no smoking in Meadow Garden.
- 4. No refreshments are to be served in Meadow Garden or taken into Meadow Garden. Should a group, such as a visiting chapter, desire refreshments, the garden is available for use if litter is properly disposed of by the serving group.
- 5. Tour visitors will be asked to pay a fee as set by the Board.
- 6. There will be only four (4) complete sets of keys to Meadow Garden and 4 keys to the gates of Meadow Garden. Keys to be returned after each administration. New locks may be required. Distribution of Keys: <u>Gate Only</u>: Landscaping Chairman, Augusta Police Department, Georgia Power, and Sizemore Security. <u>Gate & House</u>: Chairman of the Board, Meadow Garden Chairman, Museum House Manager, and Docents Chairman.

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### VOLUNTEERS (DOCENTS)

- 1. Volunteers, docents, shall be members in good standing of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR.
- 2. Duties of volunteers shall include acting as guides, hostesses, working in museum shop, working in yard, cleaning in house, public relations. No volunteer work at or for Meadow Garden shall be done except under the direct guidance of the Meadow Garden Board and the chairman of the specific committee for that particular function.
- Cleaning or yard work volunteers shall be under the direction of the House/ Museum Manager.

# IV

# FURNISHINGS

- 1. Items bought or accepted for the older section of Meadow Garden must pre-date 1821.
- 2. Furnishings for the two (2) main floor rooms and two (2) upstairs rooms in the newer section may be dated post 1820 but these rooms should be considered companion rooms to the rest of the house and furnished accordingly with all efforts made to keep furnishings of these four rooms dated no later than 1850. The Augusta Room furnishings will remain as they were in 1982.
- 3. Reproductions may be used only when the physical condition of the antiques is jeopardized by exposure in areas where large numbers of visitors have easy access; or when environmental conditions including excessive light, dust, humidity or airborne impurities pose a threat to the preservation of originals.

- Effective March 12, 1983 all items donated to Meadow Garden shall be accepted with the written condition that they become the property of Meadow Garden and may be used, replaced or sold at the discretion of the Meadow Garden Board only.
- 5. All items that post date 1821, with the exception of those in the six (6) rooms of the newer section and those described in Number 3 of this section, shall be replaced as soon as possible with similar items pre-dating 1821.
- 6. Once an item is placed, it shall not be moved from one location to another without permission of the Meadow Garden Board. Only the Chairman of the Board may approve the removal of an item from the house, if it is in need of repair or refinishing.
- 7. Any item donated or purchased must have written documentation of appraisal and include an indication as to how the determination was made.
- 8. A file will be kept of all assets with information as to price paid or market value, date of acquisition, donor or where bought, documentation and appraisal and a description of article. One file will be kept in the reception room accessible to the Docents; a duplicate file will be in the possession of the Chairman of the Board.
- All items purchased or donated will be added to the Fine Arts insurance policy. Said policy will be reviewed and updated a minimum of once a year. Major additions to furnishings will be added immediately.
- 10. Future plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the House/ Museum.

### V LANDSCAPING

- 1. The landscape plan adopted by the Board shall be adhered to with no deviation unless recommended by an authority on landscape design and care.
- 2. Donations of shrubbery, plants or trees shall be accepted only when item is part of the master plan.
- 3. Work on the grounds will be under the sole direction of the Meadow Garden Board and the Landscaping Chairman. Supervision of actual work will be provided by the Museum-House Manager or the Landscaping Chairman of Meadow Garden.

### VI MUSEUM SHOP

- 1. The Museum Shop will be operated by a committee appointed by the Chairman of the Board and be responsible to the Board.
- 2. Chairman of the committee will be responsible for all purchases, subject to the approval of the Board or the State Regent.
- Museum Shop operation will be self-supporting. In the event funds are needed for purchases, they may be advanced from available Meadow Garden funds and must be considered a loan and shall be repaid without interest within one (1) year from date of borrowing.
- 4. Profit from the Museum Shop shall be retained in its own account, with a percentage being transferred at the discretion of the Board at end of fiscal year and placed in Maintenance Account. The audit of the Museum Shop operation shall be included in the annual audit of the Georgia State Society.

# VII

- 1. Donors to the following categories are eligible to be known as "Patrons":
  - A. Meadow Garden Capital Investment Trust Fund
  - B. Furnishings
  - C. Maintenance
  - D. Landscape
- 2. Individual gifts of a minimum value of \$50.00 to any of the above categories automatically qualifies the donor as a Patron.
- Chapter or group gifts of a minimum value of \$100.00 or more, above the State Honor Roll requirements, automatically qualifies that chapter or group as a Patron.
- 4. The State Treasurer will report these gifts to the Patrons Chairman.
- 5. The Patrons Chairman will issue certificates to the qualifying individuals and chapters or groups.
- 6. A permanent book will be kept on public display at Meadow Garden to record Patrons gifts.
- 7. The Patrons Chairman will enter the names of donors in the appropriate book a minimum of once a year.

# VIII PLAQUES & MARKERS

- 1. Plaques/Markers may be placed at Meadow Garden only at the discretion of the Board, and request meets the following criteria:
  - A. Substantial service and/or contributions that secured the property and the heritage for the GSDAR;
  - B. Individuals so recognized shall have been deceased for at least 5 years;
  - C. Plaque/Marker will be paid for by person(s) requesting such recognition.
- 2. Such plaques will be permanently displayed at Meadow Garden and a record of honoree's service and/or contribution shall be recorded and placed in the Meadow Garden file, with Board approval.
- 3. Plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the house/museum. Additional markers shall not be permanently placed on the grounds.

# **Bylaws**

# BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

# Article I

## NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

### Article II OBJECTS

The objects of this Society shall be:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

#### Article III MEMBERSHIP

All chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of the Georgia State Society.

#### Article IV OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian and a State Curator.

Section 2. (a) To be eligible for state office, a member shall hold and have held membership in a chapter or chapters within the Georgia State Society for at least 5 years prior to her election and have served a full term as chapter officer or state chairman.

(b) No member shall be eligible to the same state office for two (2) successive terms. A member having served more than one half of a term in a state office shall be deemed to have served a term.

(c) No two state officers shall be members of the same chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

(*d*) To be eligible for the office of State Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State First Vice Regent or as State Second Vice Regent or served in each of these two offices of the Georgia Society.

(e) To be eligible for the office of State First Vice Regent or for the office of State Second Vice Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State Recording Secretary or as State Treasurer of the Georgia State Society and shall have served a full term as a Chapter Regent of a chapter in the Georgia State Society.

<u>Section 3.</u> In recognition of valuable service to the Georgia State Society, a State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent for life by a majority vote of the State Conference.

#### Article V

# NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. (a) A candidate for state office shall request the endorsement of her chapter, taken by vote at a regular meeting of the chapter held between May and January preceding the State Conference at which state elections are held. The endorsement, signed by the Chapter Recording Secretary, shall include the office the candidate seeks and shall be received by the State Regent with the candidate's statement of intent to be a candidate prior to any announcement or campaigning by the candidate and/or her supporters.

(b) A candidate for State Regent who wishes to present a slate of officers shall send to the State Regent in one packet the chapter endorsements and the statements of intent for each of her selected candidates. If received by the State Regent no later than December 1, these candidates shall be listed as a slate in the State Regent's December letter and Call to State Conference.

(c) Candidates wishing to run independently of a slate, whose chapter endorsements and statements of intent are received by the State Regent no later than December 1 shall be listed as independent candidates in the State Regent's December letter and Call to State Conference.

(d) A candidate whose chapter endorsement and statement of intent have been properly received by the State Regent may choose to announce her candidacy separate from the State Regent's December letter and Call to State Conference. Such a chapter endorsement and statement of intent shall be received by the State Regent at least ten (10) days prior to the opening of the State Conference at which the election is to take place.

(e) A candidate who does not meet the requirements of these Bylaws shall be declared disqualified and ineligible for consideration for state office.

(f) A chapter shall endorse no more than one chapter member for state office per election with the possible exception of candidates for State Regent and for State Corresponding Secretary.

(g) In the event of the death, incapacitation or withdrawal of a candidate prior to the election, a replacement shall be made with notification in writing to the State Regent and accompanied by the chapter endorsement and statement of intent as directed by these Bylaws.

Section 2. Nominations of candidates for all state offices shall be made at a designated meeting of the State Conference.

<u>Section 3.</u> The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected biennially by ballot at the State Conference. A majority vote shall elect.

Section 4. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two (2) years or until their successors are elected. Their terms of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Section 5. (a) Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become State Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become State First Vice Regent subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. Vacancies in other state offices shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next State Board of Management meeting or State Conference, whichever shall come first.

(b) Any state officer who is absent from the state for a continuous period of six (6) months or longer shall automatically relinquish her position as a state officer.

<u>Section 6.</u> Upon the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Organizing Secretary General.

Section 7. (a) A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot.

(b) The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than fifteen (15) months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

(c) The endorsement shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent with the candidate's name and address to the Recording Secretary General to be received by April 1 preceding the designated Continental Congress.

### Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall perform the duties prescribed in this article, and parliamentary authority adopted by the Society, and such others as the State Board of Management and the National Society may require.

Section 2. The State Regent shall:

(a) be the chief executive officer and the official spokesman for the State Society;(b) have general supervision of the affairs of the State Society;

(c) preside at all meetings of the State Conference, State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;

(d) appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society;

(e) be ex-officio a member of all committees;

(f) appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as advisor in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting;

(g) sign all contracts and agreements made in the name of the Georgia State Society with the recorded approval of the Executive Committee and the State Board of Management or the State Conference as directed by these Bylaws;

(*h*) be bonded and have the authority to draw upon funds of the State Society with the approval of the Finance Committee.

(*i*) recommend to the Finance Committee a Certified Public Accountant who shall be approved by the Finance Committee.

Section 3. The State First Vice Regent shall:

(a) perform the duties of the office of State Regent in the absence or inability of the State Regent;

(b) fill a vacancy in the office of State Regent;

(c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;

(d) serve on those committees as designated by these Bylaws and as directed by the State Regent.

Section 4. The State Second Vice Regent shall:

(a) perform the duties of the office of State First Vice Regent in the absence or inability of the State First Vice Regent;

(b) fill a vacancy in the office of State First Vice Regent;

(c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;

(d) serve on committees as directed by the State Regent.

Section 5. The State Chaplain shall:

(a) open all meetings of the State Conference and the State Board of Management with scripture reading and prayer;

(b) preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and conduct such other religious services as may be required;

(c) be custodian of state properties pertaining to the duties of this office;

(d) be responsible for IN MEMORIAM pages in the Proceedings.

Section 6. The State Recording Secretary shall:

(a) record the proceedings of the meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;

(b) compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and the Proceedings Committee;

(c) submit to the appropriate National officers, the endorsement for Vice President General and the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent before April 1 of the year in which said balloting was held;

Section 7. The State Corresponding Secretary shall:

(a) conduct correspondence and send notices on behalf of the State Regent, the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as may be directed by them;

(b) receive from the chapters the consolidated reports and distribute to the appropriate state chairmen.

Section 8. The State Organizing Secretary shall:

(a) assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new chapters;

(b) assist chapters in conjunction with appropriate state officers and chairmen in revitalization.

Section 9. The State Treasurer shall:

(a) be bonded;

(b) be the custodian of the funds of the State Society, placing them in institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance;

(c) receive the state dues and State Conference registration fees from the chapters and receive all sums contributed by the chapters for state and national projects, disbursing monthly to the Treasurer General all funds designated for national projects;

(d) disburse other funds only when authorized by the State Regent in writing;

(e) keep an account of all sums received or disbursed by using the basic double entry form of bookkeeping according to accepted accounting procedures and keep receipts for all transactions;

(f) prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference, sending a copy to the State Chairman of the Finance Committee ten (10) days in advance of each meeting;

(g) be a member of the Finance Committee and an ex-officio member of the Credentials Committee;

(*h*) balance and prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year; said audit by a Certified Public Accountant, shall be performed and delivered within forty-five (45) days of receipt of books.

Section 10. The State Registrar shall:

(a) when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American revolution prove eligibility and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars;

(b) keep a correct list of all members in the state;

(c) report on membership to the State Conference;

(d) be in possession of the computer and software owned by the Georgia State Society and see that it is maintained.

Section 11. The State Historian shall:

(a) be in charge, within the state, of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General as well as those authorized by the Georgia State Society;

(b) keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves within the state;

(c) prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General;

(d) promote the study of American history, state and county history and historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the founding of our state and counties.

Section 12. The State Librarian shall:

(a) serve as liaison between the Librarian General and the Georgia Chapters and disseminate general information on the NSDAR Library;

(b) cooperate with the director of the Georgia Department of Archives and History, making the needs of the Archives known to the chapters;

(c) collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing them wherever accepted in such libraries and Archives as may be chosen by the State Board of Management;

(*d*) solicit, with the approval of the Executive Committee, contributions from the chapters for purchase of such books as requested by the office of the Librarian General, and/or the various libraries in Georgia which the State Society approves;

(e) receive gifts of books and other printed material from the chapters to be donated to the approved libraries and Archives;

(*f*) maintain a constant supply of bookplates to the NSDAR Library, the Georgia Department of Archives and History and for purchase by the chapters.

Section 13. The State Curator shall:

(a) receive and be responsible for all gifts of Revolutionary relics to the Museum of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution;

(b) be custodian of the State properties and shall have them properly stored and made ready for use at state meetings.

Section 14. All officers will keep a Procedure Book of Instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new officers to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

#### Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. State Conference:

(a) The annual meeting of the Georgia State Society shall be known as the State Conference. It shall be for the purpose of:

(1) receiving reports of officers, committees and Chapter Regents;

(2) electing officers biennially;

(3) promoting programs in furtherance of the objects of the Society;

(4) any other business that may arise:

i. annual budget shall be adopted,

*ii.* all projects of the State Society requiring funding shall be voted upon at State Conference or ratified by members at State Conference if previously voted upon by the State Board of Management,

*iii.* no project extending beyond the term of the presiding officer may be accepted at any meeting other than by vote at State Conference.

(b) The State Conference will be held between February 1 and the time of the meeting of Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week;

(c) The State Regent shall fix the time and place of meetings;

(*d*) The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credentials form to the chapters not less than sixty (60) days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 2. The voting members of the State Conference shall be:

(a) the officers and Honorary State Regents of the State Society;

(b) the officers and honorary officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state;

(c) the Chapter Regent, or in her absence, the Vice Regent or alternate of each chapter;

(*d*) delegates or alternates of each chapter of the state as designated by the Bylaws of the National Society for representation at Continental Congress;

(e) one additional delegate from each chapter in the state.

Section 3. Only a chapter member in good standing whose credentials have been completed in accordance with the instructions of the State Regent and the State

Credentials Chairman for the State Conference and in accordance with the Standing Rules of the National Society shall be eligible to represent her chapter at state and national meetings.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the chapter, except in the case of the Regent or Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at an annual State Conference, shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the state of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference the privilege of the floor shall be accorded to the State Chairmen. They may not vote unless they are duly registered as voters of the State Conference.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Society may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen (15) days' notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

<u>Section 9.</u> Forty-five (45) voting members, representing not less than twenty (20) chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

## Article VIII STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The state officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents and the Regents, or in their absence, the Vice Regents of the chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the fall, following the October meeting of the National Board. It may meet whenever called by the State Regent. A minimum of twenty (20) days' notice shall be given as to the time and place of any such meeting.

Section 3. Thirty (30) members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference or as proscribed by these Bylaws.

Section 5. State chairmen, vice chairmen, committee members of the National and Standing Committees and one (1) member from each chapter shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privilege of the floor, but may not vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

#### Article IX EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, shall attend the meetings, but may not vote.

Section 3. This Executive Committee shall:

(a) perform such duties of the State Board of Management between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient;

(b) meet at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three (3) members of the committee;

(c) vote by teleconference if necessary;

(d) receive and make recommendations for projects requiring expenditure of funds outside routine expenditures to be considered by the State Conference;

(e) make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. Decisions of the Executive Committee shall be acted upon at the next meeting of the State Board of Management or at State Conference, whichever shall come first.

#### Article X FINANCES

Section 1. (a) The fiscal year of the Georgia State Society shall be May 1 through the last day of April.

(b) The annual budget, prepared by the Finance Committee, shall cover the fiscal year and be prepared on the basis of dues payable for the calendar year beginning December first preceding.

Section 2. (a) The annual dues of chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be \$5.00 for each member of the chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1.

(b) The Finance Committee shall determine the per capita amount and distribution according to the annual membership count. The per capita amount and distribution shall be indicated on the budget presented annually.

Section 3. (a) Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the state dues, a conference registration fee of five dollars (\$5.00) for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under these Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether chapter is represented or not.

(b) State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the five dollars (\$5.00) conference fee at the time of registration.

(c) Other members of the Georgia State Society who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay three dollars (\$3.00) conference fee at the time of registration.

Section 4. (a) The State Treasurer and the State Regent and such others entrusted with funds of the Georgia State Society as may be designated by the State Board of Management shall be bonded. (See Article VI, Sections 2 and 9);

(b) The State Treasurer with the approval of the State Regent and the State Chairman of the Finance Committee shall place the funds of the Georgia State Society in financial institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage;

(c) The placement of restricted savings funds and investment funds of the Georgia State Society shall be placed to the credit of the Georgia State Society by the State Treasurer under the direction of the Finance Committee. Monies may be invested in U. S. Treasury obligations or other interest bearing obligations of federally insured financial institutions;

(*d*) The accounts of the State Treasurer shall be annually prepared for audit by a Certified Public Accountant immediately following the end of the State Society fiscal year and no later than May 15 and delivered to the CPA by that date;

(e) Should the State Treasurer be incapacitated, the State Regent, after consultation with the Chairman of the Finance Committee and with the approval of the Executive Committee, shall appoint an Acting State Treasurer to serve until such time as the State Treasurer is able to resume her duties or a new State Treasurer is appointed and ratified as stated in Article V, Section 5 (a).

Section 5. The expenses incurred by the State Regent in the performance of duty shall be paid each year from the State Dues Fund:

(a) Four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00) shall be taken each year to defray her necessary travel expenses;

(b) Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent, as budgeted, shall be paid by the State Treasurer who shall keep all receipts of these expenses. No expenses exceeding the budgeted amount shall be paid by the State Treasurer.

Section 6. At the close of the books annually, \$3,000.00 shall be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies Fund" so that at the end of each administration a total of \$6,000.00 will be reserved. This money is to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration.

#### Article XI COMMITTEES

Section 1. The State Regent shall appoint the following standing committees:

(a) Bylaws: An Honorary State Regent shall be appointed as chairman and the committee shall be composed of two (2) other Honorary State Regents and one (1) member from each district;

(b) Finance: This committee shall be composed of seven (7) members to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two (2) Honorary State Regents, one (1) active chapter regent and one (1) active chapter member. One of the two Honorary State Regents shall be appointed chairman. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund. This committee shall have charge of all investments of the Georgia State Society funds and the placing of insurance of all kinds with accredited companies;

(c) Resolutions: This committee shall be composed of all Honorary State Regents, the State Parliamentarian and three (3) chapter members;

(d) Proceedings: This committee shall be composed of the State Recording Secretary, the immediate past State Recording Secretary, State First Vice Regent and four (4) additional Daughters, at least one of whom shall be an Honorary State Regent.

Section 2. The State Regent shall appoint such other committees, standing or special, as the State Conference shall authorize and actions of the State Board of Management and of the National Society shall require. The appointments shall be concurrent with the term of the State Regent making the appointments and shall terminate with the end of the administration.

Section 3. No additional appointments to any of the committees shall be made after the roster of chairmen and committees has been compiled and sent to the chapters. Vacancies shall be filled by the State Regent with timely notification to the membership.

Section 4. The duties of committees shall be such as these Bylaws, the State Conference, the State Board of Management or the National Society shall prescribe.

Section 5. All chairmen will keep a Procedure Book of instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

#### ARTICLE XII CHAPTERS

Section 1. To expedite the work of the Society, the chapters of the Georgia State Society shall be placed in geographical districts:

(a) A chairman appointed by the State Regent shall coordinate the work of all chapters as needed; she shall be titled "Coordinator of Districts";

(b) Each district shall have a Director appointed by the State Regent to work as a committee under the direction and supervision of the Coordinator of Districts and the State Regent.

Section 2. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April in the year of chapter elections. The Chapter Regent shall report anually the names of the elected officers promptly on the form provided by the State Regent for this purpose, with copies to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, and the State Recording Secretary.

<u>Section 3.</u> The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent, the State Recording Secretary, and the District Director by February 1.

#### Article XIII MEADOW GARDEN MUSEUM

Meadow Garden, property owned by the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, shall be operated as follows:

(a) The governing body shall be the Board of Trustees composed of the following members: the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Chairman who shall be appointed by the State Regent;

(b) The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the following members: the State Regent who shall serve as Chairman; the State First Vice Regent who shall serve as Secretary; the Chairman of Meadow Garden; the Regents of the Augusta and College Hill Chapters and the chairmen of the five (5) subcommittees appointed by the State Regent; Docents, Furnishings, Landscaping, Museum Shop, Patrons;

(c) The Meadow Garden Board shall operate with Standing Rules approved by the State Conference.

### Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. The current edition of "Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised," shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law in matters not covered by these Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

## Article XV AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent, the State Parliamentarian, and the State Bylaws Chairman. The State Regent shall send a copy to each chapter, at least sixty (60) days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the Call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

#### Article XVI DISSOLUTION

Although the period of duration of the Georgia State Society is perpetual, if for any reason the State Society is to be dissolved or otherwise terminated, no part of the property of the Society or any of the proceeds shall be distributed to or inure to the benefit of any of the officers or members of the Society. Upon the dissolution of the Georgia State Society, assets shall be distributed by the Board of Management and/ or the Executive Committee to and only to the National Society Daughters of the local United States District Court, exclusively to such organization or organizations as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated within the meaning of section 501 (c)(3), with purposes and objectives consistent with those of the Georgia State Society.

# **State Conferences**

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21.) No Conference was held in 1911; the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P.W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912"; amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, p. 211.)

AND FURTHER RESOLVED: This policy will be strictly adhered to and the material not received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1 will be omitted from the Proceedings.

## BYLAWS

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National and State Bylaws.

#### CHANGE OF ADDRESS

Notice of change of address of members shall be sent to the Organizing Secretary General, Treasurer General, State Regent and State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

#### CHANGE OF NAME

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to State Registrar, Treasurer General and State Regent by the Chapter Treasurer.

#### CHAPTER ELECTIONS

As soon as Chapter elections are held, names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, Administration Building, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D.C., 20006-5392, to the State Regent or State Regent-Elect and to the Recording Secretary by May 1. The full Christian name of Chapter officers shall be given together with her husband's given name or initials, address, zip code and telephone number. A Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years. This being added in order for our Bylaws to conform to the National Bylaws.

## CHAPTER REPRESENTATION AT STATE AND NATIONAL MEETINGS

At the State Board of Management, a chapter is represented by the Chapter Regent, or in her absence by the First Vice Regent, and one non-voting member.

The voting representation of each chapter at the State Conference shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received by the State Treasurer **by January 1**. Membership less than 50: Regent, 1 Delegate, 4 Alternates, total votes 2; 50-199: Regent, 2 Delegates, 6 Alternates, total votes 3; 200-299: Regent, 3 Delegates, 8 Alternates, total Votes 4; 300-399: Regent, 4 Delegates, 10 Alternates, total votes 5.

The voting representation of each chapter at Continental Congress shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received in the Office of the Treasurer General **by January 1**. Membership less than 50: Regent, 0 Delegate, 2 Alternates, total votes 1; 50-199: Regent, 1 Delegate, 4 Alternates, total votes 2; 200-299:Regent, 2 Delegates, 6 Alternates, total votes 3; 300-399: Regent, 3 Delegates, 8 Alternates, total votes 4.

#### CONFERENCE REGISTRATION FEE

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer with the State dues on or before December 1, \$5.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether represented or not.

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$5.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$3.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration.

## CONTRIBUTIONS

ALL contributions by Chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

## DATE FOR ANNUAL AUDIT

WHEREAS, every effort must be made to have all material to the printer as early as possible to facilitate delivery of the Proceedings to the members.

RESOLVED: That the end of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, fiscal year for audit purposes be changed from May 31 to April 30.

#### DECEASED MEMBERS

Deaths shall be reported promptly to Treasurer General, State Chaplain and State Registrar by the Corresponding Chapter Officer. Complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and a date of death shall be furnished State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for Conference Memorial Service pages for State Proceedings.

## DUES

Pay to State Treasurer State Dues of \$5.00 per member before December 1. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the December through April Board meetings of the National Society. National Dues of \$25.00 per member sent to the Treasurer-General, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20006-5392, before December 1, 1999.

### GENEALOGICAL RECORDS

To insure uniformity and convenience in binding, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, 8 1/2 x 11 inches, with 1 1/2 to 2 inch margin on left side, 1 1/2 inches at top and 1 inch on right side and at bottom. Four copies shall be sent to State Chairman of Genealogical Records. The booklet "Instructions for Copying Source Records and Their Preparation for Library Use" should be obtained from the office of the Corresponding Secretary General (currently \$1.00) with check made payable to the Treasurer General, NSDAR. This booklet gives the procedure for copying source records.

## **GEORGIA HOSPITALITY FUND**


