Harvey, Jr.; State Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. James L. Fritze; State Organizing Secretary, Mrs. Theodore C. Whitson; State Treasurer, Miss Julia A. Farrigan; State Registrar, Mrs. W. Daniel McCranie, II; State Historian, Mrs. Glenn Vaughn, Jr.; State Librarian, Mrs. Audrey C. Karlovich; and State Curator, Miss Laura M. Reid. The State Parliamentarian, Mrs. Enver B. Hoff, was also present.

An Invocation was given by Mrs. Perry L. Bridges, State Chaplain.

Mrs. James A. Harvey, Jr., State Recording Secretary, read the minutes of the October 29, 1998 meeting which were approved.

Mrs. Beall introduced Miss Julia A. Farrigan the new State Treasurer and thanked her for being willing to serve the State Society. Miss Farrigan reviewed the Summary of Funds for the period ending March 4, 1999. She reported total assets and fund balances of the Georgia State Society to be \$81,326.53 and the Meadow Garden Museum to be \$278,022.35. Mrs. Beall authorized the purchase of a \$10,000 Certificate of Deposit using money derived from the sale of books through the Lucy Cook Peel Committee. The report was filed.

The following State Officers reported. Mrs. Beall reported that no portrait of Mrs. Julius Y. Talmadge had been located. A sponsor is needed to fund the project to acquire a portrait to be hung in NSDAR National Headquarters. The National Society also wanted a collection of facts and remembrances from Mrs. Talmadge's friends for publication in a book about the lives of the Presidents General. It was suggested that a letter informing the membership about the needed funds be written. State Officers planning to attend Continental Congress were reminded to manage the Georgia State Box so there would be continual representation. The Good Citizenship Award has been changed to be the DAR Patriotism Award. Reprint of the Wide Blue Ribbon is coming. The DAR Quilt Collection is travelling in Japan and being displayed in department stores rendering it more accessible to the public. The National Society is working on a manual for new state regents. The last national number was 789955, with 719 applications pending. One thousand one hundred applications were recently

verified. There were 298 supplementals received; 155 have been verified. There were 298 supplementals received; 155 have been verified. New life members totaled 1,284 at \$800 each. There will no longer be a rental fee for programs. The NSDAR Library catalogue will soon be available on the internet.

Mrs. Billy W. Hunter, State First Vice Regent, reported that the Chapter Regent's

Banquet would be Saturday night.

Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr., State Second Vice Regent, reported that the KDS Choral group would be providing entertainment at the DAR School Luncheon and thanked the State

Regent for finding accommodations for the group.

Mrs. Perry L. Bridges, State Chaplain, has created a database of the 255 members with the 90+ birthdays. To date 249 cards have been mailed to those members. The planned Memorial Service for the State Conference remembers 166 members from 74 chapters, and two members-at-large. Mrs. Beall and Mrs. Julian McKinley were cited as assisting in the effort. Only 39 sympathy cards could be sent, due to lack of sufficient mailing information. Two large glass bowls, two boxes of silk carnations, and a box of star-shaped candle holders were delivered to Mrs. Chris McCorkle, Junior Membership Chairman.

Mrs. James A. Harvey, Jr., State Recording Secretary, reported that 94% of the chapters and 70% of the State Chairman's reports for the Proceedings were in.

Mrs. James L. Fritze, State Corresponding Secretary, provided corrections to the

1997-1998 Proceedings.

Mrs. Theodore C. Whitson, State Organizing Secretary, reported that John Ball Chapter would continue with disbandment possible in April. There was no new information on the formation of a chapter in Heard County.

Mrs. W. Daniel McCranie, II, State Registrar, reported 140 new members, 29 reinstatements, with current membership of 7,185 inclusive of 241 Members-at-Large.

Mrs. Glenn Vaughn, Jr., State Historian, spoke about the Outstanding Teacher of American History contest, contributions to the National project, and marking Revolutionary soldiers' graves.

Mrs. Audrey C. Karlovich, State Librarian, indicated that Mrs. Sally Gray, the Acquisitions Librarian NSDAR, had acknowledged receipt of \$500 from the Georgia Society and the purchase of 12 books for the Georgia Shelf honoring Mrs. Beall.

Miss Laura M. Reid, State Curator, announced that she had received a customized case for the ballot box, and that a replacement flag had not yet been found.

Hunter moved the recommendation from the Finance Committee that due to the quantity of copies of the State History (Volume I - 56, Volume II - 300) and Ancestor rolls from 1986 (132), 1996 (500), the items be carried as sets thus lowering the cost and encouraging sales. Volumes I and II of the Georgia State History to be sold as a set for \$40 plus postage, there being 56 sets. The Ancestor Rolls 1986-1996 to be sold as a set for \$35 plus postage until gone, there being 132 sets. Adopted.

Mrs. Beall presented the following schedule for the 1999 District Workshops: August 2-6 - NW, LaFayette, William Marsh Chapter; NE, Atlanta, William Day Chapter; SW, Tifton, Tallassee Chapter; SE, Vidalia, Vidalia Chapter.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:25 a.m.

The Executive Committee Meeting of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, convened in the Georgian Room of the Ramada Inn, Carrollton, at 8:05 p.m. Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall, State Regent, presided. State Recording Secretary, Mrs. James A. Harvey, Jr., kept the minutes.

Attending were: State First Vice Regent, Mrs. Billy W. Hunter; State Second Vice Regent, Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr.; State Chaplain, Mrs. Perry L. Bridges; State Recording

Secretary, Mrs. Harvey; State Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. James L. Fritze; State Organizing Secretary, Mrs. Theodore C. Whitson; State Treasurer, Miss Julia A. Farrigan; State Registrar, Mrs. W. Daniel McCranie, II; State Librarian, Mrs. Audrey C. Karlovich; and State Curator, Miss Laura M. Reid.

An opening prayer was given by Mrs. Perry L. Bridges, State Chaplain.

Mrs. Harvey read the minutes of the August 2 meeting which were approved.

The State Regent reported on the events of the DAR Schools Tour during which she served as hostess of Tour Bus #2. She left the tour at Tamassee due to illness.

Mrs. Beall also reported that American Indian and Constitution Week Web pages were now linked to the DAR page; new handbooks were available through the Corresponding Secretary General's Office and our DAR Literature Table. Chapters were notified not to use the May *DAR Magazine* copy of the Chapter Achievement Award form for reporting. The one sent to the chapter regent must be utilized. Census records of larger cities before 1860 are now on microfiche, and members were being encouraged by National to become Friends of the Library.

Only administrators from the DAR Schools will bring greetings at Continental

Congress. The students will be heard at School Supper activities.

National requested that the State Regents reinstate Genealogical Records Requirements to their State Honor Rolls. Communities were asked to apply to become 50th Anniversary Korean War Communities. Announcements about the Korean War were provided to be read at chapter meetings. An essay contest will be instituted, and Korean War 50 Year Medals will be available for presentation to veterans. The World War II Challenge will continue through December 2000. Certificates for member donors will be available from National on a gratis basis. During the period April, 1998 to October, 1999 the President General's Project has netted \$1,040,399.

As of January 1, 1999 we have 167,719 paid members to NSDAR. They represented 6,109 new members; 2,942 active chapters; 2,113 verified applications; 860 verified supplementals; with 2,965 pending supplementals. The last National number was 794,498. There were 1,286 new Life Members. The Organizing Secretary General has asked that any changes in membership be sent to that office immediately after occurrence. Georgia's membership increased to 6,977. The current state membership total inclusive of members-at-large is 7,214.

Again this year there will be no banquet tickets sold in Washington during Continental Congress. Notify the State Treasurer, Miss Julia A. Farrigan, by February 1, 2000 if you want any tickets so that they may be purchased in advance by Mrs. Beall. Seating for the Georgia Delegation at Continental Congress will be in the tiers, but the exact location will not be known until after the December National Board meeting.

Mrs. Beall requested a report from the ad hoc committee formed to review the Proceedings mailing list. Mrs. Harvey, Chairman, reported that a letter would be included in this mailing of the book requesting information from the recipients. Responses would be reviewed and a decision made.

Mrs. Beall reported that on October 9, 1999 the John Ball Chapter was disbanded.

The following State Officers reported.

State First Vice Regent, Mrs. Hunter, announced that the Georgia Luncheon would be Tuesday, April 18, 2000 at the Capitol Hilton, South American Room at noon. Tickets would be \$41. Plans for the Chapter Regent's Banquet, March 4, are under way for the Georgia State Conference in Macon.

State Parliamentarian, Mrs. Enver B. Hoff, Sr., reported that she noted chapter regents needed clarification on some points which were presented in a recent national mailing and asked Mrs. Beall to stress the appropriate actions to be taken in the upcoming State Board Meeting.

State Second Vice Regent, Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr., is planning the DAR School Luncheon to be held at state conference. She has visited the May Irwin Talmadge Gymnasium/Auditorium at Tamassee and reports that the newly painted foyer and auditorium look wonderful. Hopefully, the new fascia boards, gutters, and downspouts have stopped the leaks. The Georgia Park at Kate Duncan Smith School inclusive of

a footbridge with handrails, two stone columns, and a bronze dedication plague has been completed. The Oak Hill picnic site at Berry College located directly behind the Gift Shop has 12 tables with seating to accommodate 100 people and is landscaped in keeping with the other Oak Hill grounds. Funding to complete the payment for the works is appreciated.

State Chaplain, Mrs. Bridges, reported that 61 birthday greeting cards for 90+ year old members have been mailed since August, Ann Parsons, VIS Chairman, was recognized as assisting to secure an updated mailing list, thus making the mailing more effective. Seventy-six deaths have been posted. Birthday and Sympathy cards will need to be replenished early in the next administration. In her possession are: two clear glass bubble vases, a State Chaplain's pin, the classic urn, the brass candelabra, the brass candle lighters, the files, the birthday cards and sympathy notes. The Memorial Service at state conference will be in the hotel.

State Recording Secretary, Mrs. Harvey, reported that the Proceedings were prepared for dissemination on the next morning to chapter regents and state chairmen. Copies for the state officers were brought to the meeting. Copies for registered Honorary State Regents were also provided.

Motion was made to secure permission from the Finance Committee to purchase a 4x6 flag at a cost from 1,100-1,200 dollars from existing funds. Adopted. The lights in the wall insignia have been rewired, and a carrying case, which conformed to the shape of the insignia, has been donated and will easily fit into a car trunk.

There was no unfinished business.

There was no new business.

Prayer was offered by Mrs. Bridges, and the meeting was adjourned by Mrs. Beall at 9:27 p.m.

The Executive Committee Meeting of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, met in the suite of the State Regent, Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall, at the Crown Plaza Hotel, Macon, Friday, March 3, 2000. Mrs. Beall convened the meeting at 9:10 a.m. and presided.

State Officers attending were: State First Vice Regent, Mrs. Billy W. Hunter; State Second Vice Regent, Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr.; State Chaplain, Mrs. Perry L. Bridges; State Recording Secretary, Mrs. James A. Harvey, Jr.; State Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. James L. Fritze; State Organizing Secretary, Mrs. Theodore C. Whitson; State Treasurer, Miss Julia A. Farrigan; State Registrar, Mrs. W. Daniel McCranie, II; State Historian, Mrs. Glenn Vaughn, Jr.; State Librarian, Mrs. Audrey C. Karlovich; and State Curator, Miss Laura M. Reid. Mrs. R. Hugh Reid attended as Parliamentarian pro tem.

An Invocation was given by the State Chaplain, Mrs. Bridges.

Minutes were read by the State Recording Secretary, Mrs. Harvey, and approved as corrected.

State First Vice Regent, Mrs. Hunter, took the chair while the State Regent reported on her own and National's activities. The following items were stressed at the February National Board of the NSDAR. Chapter registrars were asked to notify members when their supplementals were passed. Chapters were asked to check with their area naturalization courts to determine if the DAR Manuals for Citizenship were being used to prepare new citizens. Richard L. Rutledge had been hired as the new administrator at NSDAR. A controller has been hired, but his name has not been released. The microfilm room at headquarters has been moved to the lower level, now being located in the O'Bryne room. It has been reported that the Chaplain General's report will soon be on line. Eight hundred thirty-seven papers have been verified: the last National number processed was 796464. The Finance Committee presented a balanced budget. Kate Duncan Smith DAR School graduation will be May 12 and 13, while events at Tamassee DAR School will be May 15 through 17. The DAR Address Label program netted \$1,256,000, while the President General's Project resulted in revenue gains of \$1,375,000. Rental of Constitution Hall has garnered \$52,000. A recent film production entitled "West Wing" filmed on the portico is expected to be aired on NBC. Wednesday, March 8th at 9:00 p.m. The Treasurer General has asked that all regents stress to members that funds donated to any DAR project must go through the State and National treasurers. Accurate accounting of financial support is necessary to maintain the tax exempt status granted through the Internal Revenue Service. States are required to send their annual financial reports to the NSDAR Organizing Secretary General, Chapters are required to file their annual financial reports with the State Treasurer. The name of the DAR Service to Veteran Patients Committee has been changed to become the DAR Service to Veterans Committee. Mrs. Beall reported attending the unveiling and rededication of the conserved portrait of Mrs. William H. Pouch, National President, 1937-1939, National Society Children of the American Revolution. She also toured the capital seeing the elegant ceilings in the Cox corridor and the "Great Experiments" funded in 1976 as a Bicentennial Project of the NSDAR. The Georgia delegation to Continental Congress will be seated in the tiers, in an unspecified area. Three tables have already been filled for the President General's Banquet. Registration at Continental Congress will be located in the O'Byrne Gallery.

Mrs. Beall resumed the chair and called for the report of the Ad-Hoc Committee reviewing the mailing of the *Proceedings*. Chairman, Mrs. Harvey, reported on the findings and made the recommendation to the Executive Committee to leave to the Proceedings Committee the establishment of the recipients of gratis copies of the *Proceedings* and to clarify the responsibility for generating the mailing labels for the *Proceedings* distribution.

State Chaplain reported the following. The files had been updated. A gift prayer book had been compiled and printed. A state conference pre-planning meeting had been attended. A Memorial Service for 165 members from 70 chapters had been planned. Thirty-one letters of condolence had been written and 84 birthday cards had been sent to members over ninety years of age. A letter of instructions for chapter chaplains bearing the name and address of the new State Chaplain had been prepared. A poetical tribute honoring the State Regent was shared.

State Curator, Miss Laura M. Reid, reported that the 4'x6' ceremonial Georgia State Flag had been purchased from the Flag Source Southeast, Marietta, at a cost of \$1,194.00. The Flag of the United States of America and the DAR Banner were both dry cleaned in preparation for this conference. A blue duffel bag had been donated for storage of the necessary placards, leather flag holsters, the timer and bell, and miscellaneous materials. Those persons potentially having guests and the Honorary

State Regents had been requested to provide their names and attendance plans by the 25th of February to ensure proper seating. It was noted that working with the Abraham Baldwin Chapter on arrangements for the State Board of Management was pleasurable. She had also attended the pre-planning session for this State Conference.

State Registrar, Mrs. W. Daniel McCranie, II, reported keeping membership files current according to the printouts received from the offices of the National Society. The statistical accounting appears in the State Officer Reports area of this *Proceedings*.

The State Officers who had reported were excused to prepare for the Memorial Service.

The State First Vice Regent reported that arrangements for the Chapter Regents Banquet to be held this Saturday evening had been completed. Seven chapters were to be celebrating milestone birthdays: two 100 years, four 75 years, and one 50 year. Regents are expected to be attending. Arrangements for the Georgia Luncheon to be held during Continental Congress continue to progress. Luncheon will be Tuesday, April 18, in the South American Room at the Capitol Hilton. Tickets are \$41.00 and only available from Mrs. Hunter prior to Continental Congress.

The State Second Vice Regent, Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr., reported that four DAR schools would be represented at the DAR School Luncheon to be held Saturday. Entertainment would be provided by cloggers from Tamassee DAR School. The new administrator from Hillside will attend the Georgia Luncheon at Continental Congress.

The Recording Secretary reported that upon noting that the DAR School Luncheon and Chapter Regents Banquet were omitted from the 1999 Proceedings materials for an insert were prepared and distributed to members via the December State Letter. She expressed appreciation to the State Corresponding Secretary and State Regent for their assistance in the mailing process. Findings of the Ad Hoc Committee reviewing the *Proceedings* mailing list were shared and a recommendation was made to the Executive Committee.

The State Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. James L. Fritze, reported helping the State Regent with the December letter and electronic correspondence. Directories of the chapter regents and state chairmen were updated. The 95 Consolidated Report Forms were received, sorted, cut apart, and separately mailed to the 43 state chairmen. There was concern about chapters still not adhering to stated deadlines and following procedures. Certificates of Award and Appreciation were mailed as requested.

The State Organizing Secretary, Mrs. Theodore C. Whitson, reported that Lela Craft of Glenn in Heard County had been granted permission to organize a chapter in that area. Two chapters had requested disbandment: Button Gwinnett in Columbus and Noble Wimberly Jones in Shellman. Necessary information had been sent. Nearby chapters had been contacted asking them to invite the members to their chapters for possible transfer. Members were responding favorably. Lady Huntingdon Chapter in Oxford was reported as having some difficulty. A packet for the incoming State Organizing Secretary had been prepared with a job description and information on work in progress.

The State Historian, Mrs. Glenn Vaughn, Jr., reported that 18 chapters honored an Outstanding Teacher of American History with the state winner, Robert W. Pollock, being sponsored by the Fort Peachtree Chapter. Seventeen chapters sponsored a nominee for the DAR History Medal.

The State Regent introduced Mrs. R. Hugh Reid, Honorary State Regent, who was serving as Parliamentarian *pro tem* in the absence of Mrs. Enver B. Hoff. Mrs. Reid reported on the health of Mrs. Samuel M. Merritt, Honorary State Regent. Mrs. Merritt's daughter, Jane, was reported as stating that concerned persons wishing to honor her mother were requested to contribute to the Janet M. Merritt Scholarship at Berry College through the State Treasurer.

The State Librarian, Mrs. Audrey C. Karlovich, reported that chapter donations totaled 1,917 books with 54 going to the NSDAR Library and 1,863 distributed to the

Georgia Archives and local libraries. J. P. Stevens Company has delivered 1,000 new bookplates at a cost of \$176.89 inclusive of shipping.

The State Treasurer, Miss Julia A. Farrigan, reviewed and updated the Summary

of Accounts for the State and for Meadow Garden Museum.

Under unfinished business the request was made by the State Recording and State Corresponding Secretaries that a new heading be placed on the Report of Chapter Officers Form. It would direct chapter regents to send copies to the Office of the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, the State Recording and State Corresponding Secretaries, and to direct chapters to send the form upon election, not installation, of their new slate of officers. The change was authorized.

New Business items included the following. An amendment to the program presented by the State Corresponding Secretary to insert the Installation of New Officers ceremony as the last item of business on Sunday, March 5 was passed. INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

The Members and Officers Georgia State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution

We have audited the accompanying statement of assets and fund balances - cash basis of Georgia State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution as of April 30, 2000, and the related statement of income and expenditures and changes in fund balances - cash basis for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Society's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1, these financial statements were prepared on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles.

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of Business

The Georgia State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution (the "Society") is a non-profit organization whose primary purpose is to further educational programs related to the history of the United States.

Fund Accounting

To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the resources available to the Society, the accounts of the Society are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and the reporting purposes into funds established according to their nature and purposes.

The Society considers all contributions for unrestricted use, unless specifically restricted by the donor. Restricted funds represent primarily contributions from Chapters restricted for specified recipients.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements requires the Society's management to use estimates and assumptions that affect the accompanying financial statements. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash Basis

The financial statements of the Society have been prepared on the cash basis, which recognizes income and expenses when received or paid rather than when earned or incurred. Management has not determined the nature and amounts of non-cash assets and liabilities.

Plant, Property and Equipment

The Society follows the policy of not capitalizing collections and historical treasures. Meadow Garden and its contents are historical treasures. The house and its contents are insured for approximately \$325,000. Office furniture and fixtures are insured for \$8,000.

Any major preservation or restoration project is capitalized and depreciated over its estimated useful life. These improvements, which are being depreciated over fifteen years, are summarized as follows:

Costs of office equipment are consistently charged to expense because the Society does not deem such amounts to be sufficiently material to warrant capitalization and depreciation.

Tax Status

The Society has been granted tax exempt status under Code Section 501(c)(3) of the U.S. Internal Revenue Code.

National Committee Reports

AMERICAN HERITAGE - Mrs. Ronald H. Salter

Of the 91 chapters reporting, there were 132 programs and projects given of diverse subjects. Thirty-nine programs or projects involved youth; and 232 youth were involved. There were 31 public projects encompassing a greater community than just DAR. One program was submitted for national viewing. Twenty-one chapters reported "No Report," which is better than the 54 last year. Our state had 15 contest entries: one in Art, two in Crafts, eight in Literature and Drama, and four in Music. Mary Anne Harris of Augusta's College Hill Chapter won 1st nationally "Multi-Media." Marguerite Fogleman, 2nd national in Photography. Linda Stephens, Hawkinsville Chapter, 1st Nationally in Embroidery; Olivia Davenport, Peter Early Chapter, 1st in state for Thread Crochet. Ethlene Dyer Jones, Old Unicoi Trail Chapter for Poetry 1st nationally. Ethel Joiner and Alice Long, Col. John McIntosh, National 1st place; Best of Show. Brier Creek Chapter was the Outstanding Chapter Report. Best Narrative of a single activity was Fielding Lewis Chapter "A Heritage of Quilts." Our 90 year member had poem published in DAR Magazine for Aug.-Sept. 1999.

AMERICAN HISTORY - Mrs. James Forsyth

Ninety-nine Chapters reported with 245 American History programs presented to chapters and 101 to other groups. One hundred one displays were arranged in schools or public places, 1904 press inches, 710 radio minutes and 150 TV minutes publicized American History, Forty chapters used spot announcements, Essays on An Obituary for George Washington 1732-1799 came from 258 schools with 6797 entries. Daughters gave 3022 certificates for essay contests, and 153 bronze medals. Two hundred certificates and 50 bronze medals were given for outstanding work in American History. There were 975 youth volunteers involved in activities and programs of the American History Committee, Daughters reported 403 hours of volunteer service to youth as a part of this committee. The four Georgia essay winners were: 5th grade Emily Kay Henderson, Brunswick Chapter; 6th grade James Newberry, Oliver Morton Chapter; 7th grade James Blair Van Meter, Captain Thomas Cobb Chapter; 8th grade Matthew Carlton, Thomasville Chapter. The Christopher Columbus Essay reports came from 26 schools and 297 students entering the contest. Travis Waldroup. Old Unicoi Trail Chapter, was the State winner, A very special thanks to the 4 District Vice Chairmen: NE, Mrs. G. Leon Stratton; NW, Mrs. Larry Drake; SE, Mrs. Ronald E. McCrosky; and SW, Mrs. Edward B, Hale, It has been a pleasure to serve the State Society as chairman of American History.

AMERICAN INDIANS - Mrs. George E. Lenaeus

Chapters reporting - 104. Total statistics: American Indian Scholarship Fund - 73 responding, \$989. Friends of the American Indians - 6 responding. Bacone College: General Fund - 65 responding, \$326.50. Ataloa Lodge - 3 responding. Library American Indian Collection - 4. Treasure Chest - 8 responding, 276 lb. Chemewa School: General Fund - 61 responding, \$129.50. Personal items - one response. Christmas Presents - one response, 87 items. Campbell Soup labels - 14 responding, 2,046. Indian Youth of America Summer Camp Scholarship - 21 responding, \$939. Programs - 44. "Indian Minutes" at each meeting - 13. Presidents Summit for America's Future 1, 2 hours, one youth involved. Nancy Hart sent 87 pair of Christmas socks to Chemewa Indian School. Outstanding Programs: Birdsville and Edmund Burke cosponsored "Native American Heritage Day" at Burke County Museum and program "History and Culture of the Lower Muskogee Creek Tribe" with primitive tool making. Old Unicoi Trail had program on Cherokee Indians, "The Principal People" with prayer in Native language. Chairman gave two programs on Bacone and Chemewa. Attended all four Summer Workshops.

AMERICAN INDIAN SCHOLARSHIP - Mrs. James Gaston

This chairman received notification of one major benefactor of the scholarship fund. The donor was from the Augustin Clayton Chapter. Donations are always greatly appreciated, and they should be handled through the chapter and state treasurers for proper credit.

CHAPTER ACHIEVEMENT AWARD - Mrs. Harold F. Usry

The Chapter Achievement Award forms have been sent to the Southeastern Divisional Chairman for verification. At this time, this chairman would like to recognize the Augustin Clayton Chapter for a job well done on the 1998-1999 Chapter Achievement Award. A very special thank you goes to the State Treasurer for assisting with the verification process. The chairman also wants to thank our State Regent for all of her help and support.

CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION - Mrs. Inman D. Jackson, Jr.

Ninety-four DAR chapters returned report forms for this committee. Eight chapters reported that they sponsor a C.A.R. Society. Two chapters report they are planning to organize a society and one has an appointed Organizing President. Six chapters report providing senior leadership for a local society or the Georgia State Society, Children of the American Revolution. Georgia Daughters serve in GSCAR in the following numbers, nine as Senior State Officers, three more as Senior Society Presidents and six others as Senior State Chairmen. Five DAR Chapters reported having a program on C.A.R., 12 chapters had reports of C.A.R. activities at their meetings and two additional chapters had C.A.R. included in the report of the DAR State Conference and Continental Congress, C.A.R. members assist at DAR functions in six chapters and five chapters have joint projects with C.A.R. societies. DAR members provided one Life Promoter and 17 State Promoters for C.A.R. Seven chapters reported donating funds to National C.A.R. and/or to GSCAR. Three chapters reported buying CAR items at state workshop. The exact dollar amount that Georgia DAR members contributed to GSCAR this year can not be calculated, but DAR members bought voices, t-shirts, totebags, Christmas ornaments, Honor Board Plates and Honor Pins which allowed the state and local societies to complete several goals and objectives. The CAR members and seniors wish to express their thanks for this continued financial support.

COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARDS - Mrs. Robert J. Lee

A total of 102 chapters reported. Fifteen chapters presented 18 DAR Community Service Pins and Certificates. In addition, eight chapters gave 11 chapter recognition awards for community service. This chairman would like to thank the chapters giving these awards and to encourage all chapters to consider giving a Community Service Award as this is one way to help the community to learn more about the DAR. Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure for me to serve the State Society as Chairman of this committee. Thank you.

CONSERVATION - Mrs. Roy Henderson

Conservation is well and alive with Georgia Daughters. Comprehensive reports were received from 78 chapters. Most projects are unique to each community. Chapters near the seaside are involved in listing and monitoring ocean debris. On Sapelo Island, members plant native trees and build nature trails. Baron DeKalb members cleaned up sites in Gwinnett County. Butterfly gardens were planted as George Washington Bicentennial projects. Beautification of Historical downtown St. Mary's is an ongoing project by Earl of Camden. Several chapters maintain and beautify cemeteries in their communities. Highways are adopted by chapters. Most importantly chapter members beautified their own yards to enhance their neighborhoods. Monica Walters, Lamar County High School Media Specialist, gave a program on "Trees." A local County

Extension Coordinator, Mrs. Jule-Lynne Macie, gave a program on "Conservation of Water, Trees and Wetlands." Dee West, Director of the Alpharetta Environmental Services, presented a program on "The Environment from a Historical Perspective." A number of chapters gave programs or gave information on organ donation. Lamar-LaFayette Chapter involved students in DAR beautification projects. Forty-eight chapters encouraged their members to install smoke and carbon dioxide detectors. Three chapters were in the process of nominating local people for the Conservation Medal. Georgia Chapters, Daughters of the American Revolution, observed Constitution Week, September 17-23 despite Hurricane Floyd dampening the east coast and causing evacuation of the coastal areas to more inland areas. There were 96 chapters reporting from a total of 104 chapters. Seventy chapters held special observances with some chapters holding joint celebrations. At Continental Congress, Georgia was named winner in Southeastern Division with Highest Total Advertising which includes a \$50 coupon. Eighty-seven chapters participated in the COOP ad

which made possible seven black and white pages in the August-September issue. These honored the State officers 1998-2000; Honorary State Regents; State Chairmen, 1998-2000; 1998 Outstanding Junior, Jan Renee Wren Best; Terri Melvin, winner of Irene and Daisy McGregor Memorial Scholarship; Visiting State Regents at 101 State Conference, and State Conference pages. DAR MUSEUM - Mrs. Thomas P. McIntosh

AMERICAN HISTORY SCHOLARSHIP - Mrs. James L. McConnell

Reports were received from 92 chapters and 99 chapters contributed \$147 to the American History Scholarship Fund. Georgia Daughters created a surge of interest in this scholarship in 1999. Several regents requested applications at district workshops and five contacted this chairman for information. Four high school seniors expressed an interest in applying for the scholarship. Applications were received from three very qualified students. For the first time, Georgia was able to send the Division Vice Chairman the requested two candidates for this scholarship. The state winner is Thomas Henry Camp, sponsored by the Abraham Baldwin Chapter. Runnerup is Timothy Linder, sponsored by the Hightower Trail Chapter. All of this year's candidates portray the active youth of America who are keenly interested in our historical heritage and actively involved in school and community. Thank you, Daughters, for your support by encouraging our youth to study American History and informing the schools about the DAR's strong desire to aid young people in their pursuit of knowledge.

DAR SCHOOL COMMITTEE - Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr.

The Hightower DAR School Award was presented to 55 chapters, with Old Unicoi Trail and Pulaski Chapters honored for the largest per capita contributions to the state projects. The State Chairman's awards for the most thrift to KDS and Tamassee went to William Marsh and Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapters. Sixty-nine chapters had school programs, 36,821 labels and 43,742 pounds of resale items valued at \$130,926 were donated. Monetary contributions to: Tamassee, \$62,963.00 (including \$24,158.20 sent direct); KDS, \$5,636.00 (including \$850.00 sent direct); Berry, \$1,569.50; Crossnore, \$984.50; Hillside, \$518.00; and Hindman, \$776.00, totaling \$72,447.00. DAR SERVICE FOR VETERAN PATIENTS - Mrs. Robert E. Stone

Georgia Daughters continue their service to hospitalized veteran patients. Out of 51 chapters reporting we are proud to report the following: gifts - \$17,657; comfort items - \$4,373; books/magazines - \$2,878; cash/canteen - \$980; food - \$1,338; stamps - 30 pounds; and miles traveled - 6,007. JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS - Mrs. William E. Shubert

"George Washington - An American Hero," the year's theme, was reported on by 15 chapters. Seven chapters reported sponsorship of 21 JAC clubs, nine of which were new. JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP - Mrs. Chris S. McCorkle

It's great to have Juniors involved on the chapter, state and National levels. Ninety-three chapters reported this year, and chapters have 46 Juniors serving as chairmen, 14 officers and one Regent. On the state level, two chairmen, and four vice chairmen. Innisbrook products were sold by 10 chapters. 1999 brought the return of Georgia garment bags, name badges, and DAR watches to the Junior bazaar, plus new items like the DAR denim shirt was added. FRIENDS OF THE LIBRARY - Mrs. Fred K. Nuss

The primary function of this committee is to raise needed funds to enable the DAR Library to make special purchase of books, equipment, and furnishings. Therefore, this chairman happily reports that of the 95 chapters reporting, nine have donated a total of \$1,730. Specifically, Ft. Peachtree, Old Unicoi Trail, Roanoke, and William Day Chapters donated a total of \$1,000 to Life Membership, Augusta, Augustin Clayton, and Roanoke Chapter donated \$600 to the Friends of the Library, Baron DeKalb Chapter donated \$20 and Oglethorpe Chapter \$10 to the Regular Fund, and Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter contributed \$100 to the Centennial Library Fund. The DAR and this chairman appreciate their generosity.

LINEAGE RESEARCH - Mrs. C. Lewis Baldwin

This chairman received reports from 93 chapters of the 106 chapters in Georgia. Of

the 93 reports, 15 chapters requested assistance from the Lineage Research Committee. The State of Georgia had 248 prospective members assisted by local chapters with 142 prospective members approved. Three chapters reported that the Lineage Research Committee was successful in completing research needed for applicants. Genealogical Workshops were given by 16 chapters with 123 people attending. Forty-two chapters reported using the Internet for Lineage Research. The three Outstanding Chapters in State of Georgia this year were: Col. William Candler Chapter - The DAR Chapter worked jointly with the SAR with a Genealogical Workshop; Kettle Creek Chapter - Chapter member worked with the Mary Willis Library Children's Workshop on Lineage Research; Old Unicoi Trail Chapter - Two Chapter members offer Lineage Research help at the local library once a month. This chairman would like to thank the District Vice Chairmen for their time and service: Mrs. John Singleton, NE; Mrs. Carolyn Wentworth, SE; Mrs. Justin Robinson, NW; and Mrs. Malcolm McPhaul, SW. It has been a privilege to serve Georgia and this State Regent in the position of State Lineage Research Chairman.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE - Mrs. David S. Manker

The online referral system was completed in 1999, and this chairman e-mailed the names of 294 prospective members to the appropriate chapters (119 from Member Services, 47 from the Georgia DAR Home Page, 58 from Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter's web site, and 70 from other sources. Membership statistics for 1999: new members by application - 333, reinstatements - 46, transfers in - 89, transfers out - 85, dropped - 87, resignations - 157, deaths - 163 for a net loss of 24 members in 1999. (All numbers include members-at-large and 73 new junior members.) Official Georgia DAR Membership Count on January 1, 2000 - 7105. State Membership Certificates of Award for membership achievement were presented to 70 chapters at State Conference, Additionally, the Membership Committee gave a Certificate of Award to each of the following: Ann Parsons, State VIS Chairman, for Outstanding Service to Georgia DAR Membership, and the Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter, Roswell, for Outstanding Membership Publicity with 812" of printed publicity. The three National Membership Committee Awards were won by Oothcaloga Chapter, Adairsville, for Most New Members by Application (17) and Largest Increase in Membership (13), and the William Day Chapter, Duluth, for Largest Percentage Increase in Membership (31-1/2%).

Ninety-eight chapters responded to this committee from the State Regent's Consolidated Report. One hundred forty-three regular letters, e-mail letters and phone calls were made to the media. NATIONAL DEFENSE - Mindy Tidmore Kammeyer

This committee sees that all R.O.T.C. Units in the State of Georgia receive gold or bronze medals for outstanding cadets. There were 20 gold medals and 160 bronze medals distributed. The Baron DeKalb Chapter is to be commended for giving 19 bronze medals to students. Of the 93 responses to the questionnaire, all reported having the required three minute National Defense Report at their meetings. The DAR Patriotism Medal was given by 25 chapters to 104 young people. Etowah Chapter

gave 18 of these medals and Andrew Houser gave 14. Thank you, chapters, for outstanding work in National Defense. The most frequent topics given for programs this year were on "Our Flag," "World War II," "The Fundamentals of Americanism," "Should Women Go Into Combat?," "Military Preparedness," and "Veterans." Georgia chapters continue to view the National Defense Committee as important and a central part of the NSDAR. It has been my pleasure to chair this committee.

PUBLIC RELATIONS - Mrs. Sterling P. Jones

Reports from 96 chapters show 749 newspaper articles, 369 photos, 240 radio spots, 63 programs initiated, 28 sponsored programs, 90 TV spots, 114 window displays with 245 community events in which chapters participated. Chapters used all media to keep communities aware of DAR projects. Forty-five chapters used Internet to further DAR goals. Twenty-three chapters have a newsletter with seven having their own fact sheet. Many participated in volunteer programs at schools, libraries, hospitals, local activities, and 15 involved youth in volunteering to carry out DAR in committee work. Three chapters planned special millennium publicity. This chairman expresses appreciation to the State Regent for the opportunity to serve the State Society in this worthwhile committee.

VOLUNTEER INFORMATION SPECIALIST - Ann Parker Parsons

Ninety-four chapters reported members using computers to: make address labels; publish yearbooks and newsletters; research genealogy on the internet; use the membership database; type treasurer's reports, minutes and membership application papers; make banners and certificates; design invitations, brochures and programs; index genealogical records. E-mail directories for the four districts now include 155 email addresses for 95 chapters. Five hundred twenty-eight e-mail messages were received and answered by the VIS State Chairman. Fifty-four requests for membership information received through the Georgia State Web Site were referred to the State Membership Chairman, The John Houstoun, Oglethorpe, Old Unicoi Trail, Oliver Morton and Pulaski Chapters have web sites linked to the National Society's Web Page in addition to the eight web sites created last year. Certificates of Outstanding Service for Web Site Construction were presented to the twelve chapters who developed web sites. Twenty-nine messages were posted on the Georgia State Society Message Page, developed in September 1999. Two additional pages were created and linked to the Georgia State Message Page for e-mail contacts to Georgia Chapters and State Chairmen. In January 2000, a third page was also created adding links to 12 pages of the National VIS Chairman's handbook.

Special National Committee Reports

COMMEMORATIVE EVENTS - Jane J. Hampton

Of 94 reports received, 18 had no activity, one had no chapter name, and two were on last year's form. Six chapters, Cherokee, William Witcher, Peter Early, Nathaniel Macon, Abraham Baldwin and Stephen Heard, were Korean Commemorative Communities. John Houstoun, William McIntosh and Nathaniel Macon used the "Korean Minutes" at their meetings and Augustin Clayton contributed \$100 to the Korean War Monument in Washington, DC. Nine chapters honored Korean Veterans. Events sponsored were: Bells Across America, Flag Day, Memorial Day, Columbus Day and Veterans' Day. A flag retirement ceremony was held. Wreaths were placed at Kettle Creek, Andersonville and on veterans' graves. Three chapters had television time. Marchman, III The commemoration of the 200th anniversary of the death of George Washington on December 14, 1999 brought a great deal of national attention to our first president during the entire year. Our chapters can be proud of their accomplishments in this regard with the outstanding cooperation they demonstrated to the Mount Vernon Ladies' Association. Special recognition is given to the Augustin Clayton Chapter and the Nathaniel Macon Chapter for forwarding their outstanding reports. The Cherokee Chapter co-sponsored the exhibit at the Atlanta History Center entitled "Treasures from Mount Vernon" with a \$5,000 donation. This chairman was also notified by National that a donation was made to the DAR Museum Exhibition Fund as a tribute to the memory of George Washington. DAR was not alone, of course, in this commemorative effort; an SAR chapter in Gainesville unveiled a bronze statue of George Washington in downtown Gainesville, along with other tributes during the year by our Georgia SAR chapters. Congratulations to all of our chapters and new "Official George Washington Bicentennial Communities" throughout the state. LITERACY CHALLENGE - Mrs. James H. Henry

Ninety-two reports were received from Georgia DAR chapters; of these 44 reported no activity. Eleven programs were given on Literacy at chapter meetings. Thirty-three chapters described how they had promoted literacy in their communities. Various

members are involved in teaching English, math and reading to groups in places such as churches, schools, libraries, homeless shelters and even in a washeteria. One member spent five weeks in Honduras and taught English while there. One chapter program was devoted to "Education Today" putting special emphasis on literacy. Books and wholesome reading material was distributed to libraries, schools, churches and medical clinics. One chapter donated books to all of the DAR School libraries. Another purchased flower bulbs from a local literacy organizations fund raiser. Some chapters simply gave money. One chapter sponsored a Read-A-Thon for Literacy Volunteers of America. In every way imaginable, literacy was promoted throughout Georgia. A total of 216 members participated in Literacy Challenge programs in their areas working with both adults and children. Spent in tutoring and helping with adults were 1,991 hours. With children 2,019 hours were spent. Two chapters involved nine youth volunteers who gave 25 hours. One certificate of award was presented and one recommendation for the national contest "Making an Outstanding Difference in the Promotion of Literacy." Thank you, Madam State Regent, for this opportunity to serve.

NSDAR MUSEUM CORRESPONDENT DOCENTS - Mrs. Robert G. Fountain, Sr. Georgia State Society had three new Docents accepted as Docents-in-Training this year giving us 21 NSDAR MUSEUM Correspondent Docents. The new Docents are Virginia Lingelbach Holland, Elaine McConnell, and Virginia McIntosh. We have 10 Correspondent Docents-in-Training and 11 Correspondent Docents who have completed the requirements to wear the Correspondent Docent pin. Shelby Whitson completed the requirements to wear the pin this year. The Commodore Richard Dale Chapter had this Committee send them the Quilt program and used it for a program. Many Chapters ask members of this Committee to bring them programs that do not meet the Docent-in-Training credit requirements, which we are happy to do for the Chapters; but this is the reason Docents-in-Training are often a long time meeting qualifications to receive their NSDAR Museum Correspondent Docent pin. Madam State Regent, I hope I have been able to enlighten our Chapters about the wonderful programs our Docents can bring their chapters and it has been a pleasure serving as State Chairman of this Committee under your leadership.

PRESIDENT GENERAL'S PROJECT - Mrs. Robert B. Vance, Sr.

The President General's Project is continuing the restoration of the Headquarters Building for the second year. Chapters are asked to donate \$6.00 per member including those verified at the February Board. 98/99 year, 106 Chapters with 99 giving \$17,609 – 99/2000 year, 105 Chapters with 85 Chapters giving \$12,488 making a total of \$30,460 for two years. 2000/2001 will be the final given for the three years of this administration. Membership figures may change, check with your treasurer to see if there were increases or decreases after the February Board Meeting. These are figured in the total. Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure to serve on the Board under your capable leadership.

WORLD WAR II MEMORIAL CHALLENGE - Mrs. John D. Douglas, Jr.

The WWII Memorial Challenge has been met by Georgia Daughters. The year of 1999 added 495 donors and 955 donations to the first DAR Book of Remembrance. Georgia Daughters will have a total of 537 donors, 1,035 donations/honorees. Sixty-two chapters participated with 968 military patriots, 67 civilian patriots, and 45 Daughters recognized. Oliver Morton is to be commended for leading the state in both number of donors and number of donations. For chapters under 50 members, Chehaw had the most donors and Sukey Hart the most donations. Chapters with membership between 50 and 99 were led by Oliver Morton in both categories. Chapters having over 100 members were led by General James Jackson with most donors and with most donations. TEXTBOOK STUDY - Mrs. J. B. Deal

In comparing two years of work on textbook study, approximately the same percentage of chapters were involved (22 or 23%). However, diversity and depth of review increased this year. It is clear that one curriculum area must be selected by a chapter. History is the number one choice. Geography, science (evolution), literature ("Goosebumps"), technology were included. One chapter reported the school administration permitted no community reviewers. Integration of textbooks with essay contests was mentioned. The Meadow Garden Museum Board met Tuesday, June 1, 1999 in the Board Room at Meadow Garden, Augusta, at 10:30 a.m., with Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall, State Regent, presiding as Chairman of the Board, Others present were Mrs. Billy W. Hunter, Secretary: Mrs. John R. Henry, Mrs. S. D. Lewis, Mrs. Flew Murphey, Mrs. Roy H. Cagle, Jr., Mrs. Merrill Thompson, Mrs. Charles Turner, Mrs. Jerido Ward, and ex officio members Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr., and Ms. Julia A. Farrigan. Before the business meeting, a Flag Retiring Ceremony, led by Lt. Col. (Retired) Ray Howard and the Honor Guard of the Richmond County American Legion Post #63 was held in the yard. Augusta television station WJBF had a camera person present to record the ceremony for televising on the 6:00 news program. Mrs. Murphey opened the meeting with prayer. The minutes of the March meeting were read by Mrs. Hunter and approved as corrected. Ms. Farrigan presented the financial report, which was reviewed and filed. Mrs. Henry, Museum Chairman, reported that the back side of the House has been sanded, primed and painted. The entire House has been pressure washed and touchup painting, per warranty, was done on the Canal side. Total cost: \$5,120. Mr. Joey Smalley submitted a price of \$560 to lightly sand, spackle as needed and paint the wood trim in the Board Room. Walton Rehab has repaired a broken sprinkler head that caused water to accumulate under the porch. Ted Baker has submitted a proposal to repair the railings, porch column, stair treads, and clapboards on the street side porch. New plastic has been installed behind the replaced lattice under the Museum Shop. A copy of the Museum ad copy to be published in the July all-member DAR Magazine was approved. On May 20, Miles Whitfield, Consultant for Historic Preservation. inspected the House and offered his services at no cost. Information offered: Older part of the House could predate 1790 because of the mantle construction. Some of the wainscoting has new nails. The firebox size has been reduced and the brick lining is not original. The dining room paneling is not original, and the plaster is probably early 1900's. The firebox has been altered. A proper primer is available and could be applied that would allow the paint to remain on the walls when the current paint is stripped. The Augusta Room is a beautiful example of the Victorian style, especially the mantle. The Library of Congress has information about Meadow Garden which was compiled in 1934. The information consists of two interior photos, four exterior photos, two data sheets, including architectural drawings, elevations and various notes. He has ordered a copy for the House. Open House will be held July 3 from 10:00 until 4:00, and July 4 from 1:00 until 5:00. To publicize the event, Mrs. Henry will appear on the Mary Morrison television show. TV Channel 12 at 6:30 and announcements will be made on radio. Christmas Open House will be held on December 10 and 11, in cooperation with the Ezekiel Harris House and Redcliff Plantation, and expenses will be shared. Battery operated candles will be used in the House, and luminaries along the walkways, Mrs. Shelby Whitson has donated 130 miniature boxwoods for the gardens. A sign for the front walk will be made from two swinging doors which were found under the House. The hand-painted DAR emblem donated by the Mary Hammond Washington Chapter has been fragmed, matted and hung in the Board Room. Mrs. Henry reported for the Furnishings Chairman. Mrs. Susan Dick of the Georgia Historical Society has verified that the George Walton signature on the document is authentic, and permission was given to have the document appraised. Mrs. Ward. Docents Chairman, reported that 33 docents representing seven Georgia DAR Chapters have volunteered this calendar year, for a total of 602.75 volunteer hours. Mrs. Cagle, Landscaping Chairman, reported that beans, peppers, squash, tomatoes and cucumbers have been planted in the vegetable garden, Impatiens planted by the back porch and the rose bushes on the fence trimmed. Volunteer hours donated for work in the yard totaled 16. Mrs. Thompson, Museum Shop Chairman, reported new merchandise increased sales for the January through April period by 25%. White cups with black printing showing Meadow Garden Museum on one side and George Walton on the opposite have been ordered. Mrs. Murphey, Patrons Chairman, urged all members of the Board to become a Patron. Mrs. Clark, House Manager, reported 2,000 tourists have visited during the months of January through May, a 51.5% increase over the same period last year. Included in this total were visitors from 32 states and 16 foreign countries. Approval was given to purchase two fan-shaped red/white/blue buntings to be hung on each side of the walk-through gate for the July 4th Open House. Mrs. Beall brought an example of a Christmas ornament and the Board agreed that Mrs. Thompson contact ChemArt, the manufacturer, and order a similar ornament, showing a picture of Meadow Garden, to be sold in the Museum Shop. The Job Description for the House Manager was reviewed and updated. The State Honor Roll requirement that chapters contact three community organizations about scheduling day trips to Meadow Garden will be deleted. The next meeting of the Board will be held on October 28 in Carrollton. There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 1:40 p.m.

Sunday hours are from 1:00 until 4:00 p.m. Permission was given to lower the Board Room chandelier 1.5 feet. Electric and battery operated candles will be used. Docents have been contacted. Area chapters will be responsible for decorating a room. Those participating will be College Hill, Augusta, John Franklin Wren, Captain John Wilson, Kettle Creek and Edmund Burke. Docents will be dismissed whenever scheduled tours are more than 20 minutes late and the tour director notified. The security contract with Sizemore has been renewed. A waterhouse wallpaper for the dining room, with complementing trim and baseboard paint, and red paint with a wallpapered trim with dark green baseboards for the Board Room were discussed. Decision was postponed until January when the Board will meet at the House. Joey Smalley has submitted an estimate of \$2,160 for work to be done in the Board Room, and \$1,040 for the dining room. This includes all the trim work, but does not include

scraping the plaster walls or hanging wallpaper. The DAR Banner in the yard is fraying and will need to be replaced. Pictures of the House obtained from the Library of Congress were shown. Mrs. Cagle, Landscaping Chairman, reported that yard work continues every month. Pine straw donated by the Cherokee Rose Garden Club has been placed in the flower beds and fall vegetables are being planted. The members of the Garden Club have volunteered to help in the yard once a month under the direction of the Landscaping Chairman. Mrs. Henry and Mrs. Cagle prepared lunch and served the Club on the front porch. This can be a money-making project for the Museum if Chapters or other organizations would like to arrange a luncheon-tour. The Garden Club is also investigating the availability of a grant for the Museum. The Augusta Chapter has donated and planted a red maple tree in the yard. Needed seeds were also donated. A wall has been built on the canal side of the House to divert water from flowing under the House. Mrs. Thompson, Museum Shop Chairman, reported that there are several new items in the gift shop. Mrs. Hunter read the minutes of the October meeting and they were approved as read. Ms. Farrigan presented the financial report which was reviewed. Discussion was held concerning the Capital Investment Maintenance Fund now at the Bank of America which will mature on February 25. Mrs. Henry will continue to stay in touch with the mayor's office. Mrs. Ward, Docents Chairman, reported that there were 1,490.5 volunteer hours donated in 1999, representing eight chapters. Mrs. Thompson, Museum Shop Chairman, reported that new Spring merchandise is coming into the shop. The purchase of Christmas ornaments from ChemArt Company is being investigated, and should be in inventory for the Summer Workshops. The Board voted Mrs. Thompson a Patron in Kind for sewing and donating the period costumes worn by the docents at the Christmas open house. Landscaping Chairman, Mrs. Cagle, reported that the Cherokee Rose Garden Club continues to help with yard maintenance under the supervision of the Chairman. Cleaning around the fig tree and roses in the front yard has been completed. The grape vines have been trimmed. A drain on the Museum Shop side was cleaned, and insulation for the heating

ducts under the front porch have been repaired. The yard was cleaned and decorations were put on the outside of the house for the Christmas Open House. Ms. Farrigan reported that there are a total of 73 patrons for 1999. This includes both Chapter and individuals. Mrs. Henry, Chairman, reported that the Fundraising Challenge from Augusta Mayor Bob Young was a huge success. The members of the State Society more than matched his offer of \$2,500 in one month, by donating \$5,379.32. These funds are designated to exterior painting of the House. Mrs. Murphey, Patrons Chairman, helped facilitate this success by writing a letter to all past Patrons, and Mary Ann Harris put a memorandum on the DAR Message Board on the internet. The Once Upon a Christmas open house was a Candlelight Tour which was attended by about 100 visitors. Recommendations for next year include dropping the Sunday afternoon session, having an early pre-planning session to involve more volunteers in the decorating, docents, advertising, refreshments, etc., areas of the event. The front and the east side of the exterior remain to be painted. Paul King from Rex Property and Construction Management has offered to include Meadow Garden in the 102 downtown Augusta locations on a web site aimed at bringing attention to downtown activities. The first six months are offered free of charge with no obligation. Mrs. Henry introduced Mr. Miles Whitfield, a preservation expert who presented a slide program of a house he had restored in Troup County. Afterwards he offered advice on restoration of the Dining and Board Rooms of the House. He said that George Walton was probably a very cosmopolitan man who was educated, well traveled, and who visited in extremely well-to-do homes of his time. Although a "farm house," he probably decorated Meadow Garden to the standards of his station in life. In his opinion the Dining Room is of the Federal Style and the Board Room is representative of the Victorian Style. The Board will decide "how we want Mr. Walton's home to look," He gave his opinion of the wallpaper and paint samples that Mrs. Henry had selected, and advised that we should select those that are true to the age of the House. For the Dining Room, the Board agreed to paint the baseboards dark green, selected a fruited wallpaper (Waterhouse #269467) which is true to the period, and to paint the wood trim a steel-blue to match the blue in the paper. For the Board Room, the baseboards will be painted dark green, crown molding installed below the present molding, walls painted a shade of red to blend with the chair seats, and all the wood trim painted either cream or white. Mr. Whitfield also suggested that at some future time the fireplaces could be investigated and restored to their original size, which would be larger than they are at this time. After a luncheon served by Mrs. Henry and her chairmen, the Board re-convened in the Board Room to review the extensive recommendations made during the administration of Mrs. Flew Murphey (Mrs. Louis C. Alderman, Jr.) who was State Regent 1982-1984. Mrs. Turner reported that the new DAR Banner has been ordered and will be a gift to Meadow Garden from the Augusta Chapter. The next meeting of the Board will be held on March 2 at 1:00 p.m. in the State Regent's Suite at the Crowne Plaza Hotel in Macon. There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 2:00 p.m.

Mrs. Turner moved that the Meadow Garden Museum hire Miss Parrish at \$6.50 per hour for a probationary period of six months. At that time, her position and salary will be reviewed. Seconded. Adopted. Wall preparation and painting of the Dining Room has been completed. Mr. Joey Smalley was paid \$1,880 for this job. Sanding, then priming with several coats of sealer was applied to the wall to prepare it for the paper. All woodwork was sanded, filled as necessary, primed and painted with "Cherish," a Benjamin Moore historical paint. The same color is in the George Mason house. (It was decided to change the slate blue color approved at the January Board meeting because the yellow enhances the wallpaper.) Miles Whitfield, Consultant, ordered the new wallpaper at this cost. We will pay freight but no tax. The paper has been delivered but a paper hanger has not been chosen. Total income from Mayor Young's \$2,500 Challenge was \$7,880. The street drainage problem was corrected promptly, and has not recurred. The windows were cleaned on the inside and the floors vacuumed and mopped by the Sizemore Security and Cleaning Service for a cost of \$96.13. Outside painting will continue in April or May, depending upon the weather. A bid of \$2,160 has been secured to begin work in the Board Room. This includes stripping the wallpaper, applying three coats of paint to the walls; stripping the molding and applying two coats of off-white paint. Mrs. Cagle moved that the Board Room renovation be delayed until the June Board meeting. Furnishings Chairman, Mrs. Victor, reported that the Museum needs small items such as old leather books, etc. Mrs. Cagle, Landscaping Chairman, reported that the Cherokee Rose Garden Club has prepared the area next to the fig tree on the canal side of the yard for the Weavers Garden. We are still following the master plan set up by Mrs. Murphey (Alderman) when she was State Regent. Some of the fruit trees need to be replaced. Lawn Service, Etc., who currently mows and cleans the yard, has increased their monthly charge to \$130. Because they continually cause damage while mowing Mrs. Cagle has sent a letter to Mr. Mathews asking that the increase be reconsidered. Mrs. Thompson, Museum Shop Chairman, reported that 13 dozen English Staffordshire coasters have been ordered. The Christmas ornaments should be available soon. Mrs. Murphey, Patrons Chairman, thanked the Georgia Daughters for their overwhelming response to her letter requesting help to meet the challenge from the Augusta mayor. The Chapters are showing more interest in our Museum. Mr. Miles Whitfield was voted a Patron in Kind for his advice and help in redecorating the House, and for presenting the program at the Meadow Garden Breakfast at State Conference. There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 2:50 p.m.

Standing Rules for Meadow Garden Museum

I MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

- 1. The governing body of a museum, in this instance the Meadow Garden Board, serves the public interest as it relates to Meadow Garden, and must consider itself accountable to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, as well as to Meadow Garden; members should not attempt to act in their individual capacities, but all actions should be taken as a Board, Committee, or otherwise in conformance with the Standing Rules, the Act of Incorporation, or applicable Resolutions.
- 2. The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the three (3) Trustees as named in the Deed from the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, conveying Meadow Garden to the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution; namely, the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the State Chairman of Meadow Garden who is appointed by the State Regent; the Chapter Regents of the Augusta Chapter and the College Hill Chapter, both Chapters being located in Augusta, who shall serve as Vice Chairmen to the State Chairman of Meadow Garden; and five of the chairmen of Meadow Garden Committees, as appointed by the State Regent.
- 3. No Georgia Daughter shall serve in the same Meadow Garden Chairmanship more than two (2) consecutive terms.
- Of the six (6) appointments made by the State Regent, at least two (2) shall be Honorary State Regents.
- The State Second Vice Regent and Treasurer shall serve as ex-officio members of the Meadow Garden Board, being given the privilege of the floor without a vote.
- The State Regent shall serve as Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board, and the State First Vice Regent shall serve as Secretary of the Meadow Garden Board.
- 7. The Meadow Garden Board shall meet a minimum of three (3) times each year; namely, preceding Fall Board of Management meeting, preceding annual State Conference and following Continental Congress, and at such other time as deemed necessary by the Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board. At least one (1) meeting of the Board shall be held at Meadow Garden each year.
- 8. The Meadow Garden Board shall have jurisdiction over the operation, maintenance and work of Meadow Garden and shall be the authority for Meadow Garden as long as such authority is not in conflict with the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, the Act of Incorporation for the Georgia State Society, Resolutions adopted by the Georgia State Society and/or directions which from time to time may be approved by action of the Georgia State Society assembled at its annual State Conference.
- 9. Five (5) voting members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.
- Minutes shall be kept of each meeting and a copy shall be sent to each member and printed verbatim in the State Proceedings.
- 11. All expenses for maintenance, operation and purchases of furnishings and plantings shall be authorized by the State Regent, as Chairman of the Board, and paid by the State Treasurer. Expenditures exceeding \$1,000.00 must have the majority approval of the Board.

12. These rules will be binding on the actions of the Board in their operation of "Meadow Garden." They may be changed by the following procedure: Members of the Board must have written notification of proposed changes or additions one month prior to the next meeting of the Board; a two-thirds vote of the Board is necessary to effect a change or addition.

II OPERATIONS

- Everyone entering Meadow Garden will be requested to sign the Register, including date, time of arrival and time of departure.
- No more than fifteen (15) people with each Docent are to be on tour in the house at a given time. Excess of this number may wait in the reception room or in the garden. The Museum-House Manager/Docent has the authority to enforce the Meadow Garden rules at all times.
- 3. There will be no smoking in Meadow Garden.
- 4. No refreshments are to be served in Meadow Garden or taken into Meadow Garden. Should a group, such as a visiting chapter, desire refreshments, the garden is available for use if litter is properly disposed of by the serving group.
- 5. Tour visitors will be asked to pay a fee as set by the Board.
- 6. There will be only five (5) complete sets of keys to Meadow Garden and three (3) keys to the gates of Meadow Garden. Keys to be returned after each administration. New locks may be required. Distribution of Keys: <u>Gate Only</u>: Augusta Police Department, Georgia Power, and Sizemore Security. <u>Gate & House</u>: Chairman of the Board, Meadow Garden Chairman, Museum House Manager, Docents Chairman, and Landscaping Chairman.

III VOLUNTEERS (DOCENTS)

- Volunteers, docents, shall be members in good standing of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR.
- Duties of volunteers shall include acting as guides, hostesses, working in museum shop, working in yard, cleaning in house, public relations. No volunteer work at or for Meadow Garden shall be done except under the direct guidance of the Meadow Garden Board and the chairman of the specific committee for that particular function.
- Cleaning or yard work volunteers shall be under the direction of the House/ Museum Manager.

IV FURNISHINGS

- Items bought or accepted for the older section of Meadow Garden must pre-date 1821.
- Furnishings for the two (2) main floor rooms and two (2) upstairs rooms in the newer section may be dated post 1820 but these rooms should be considered companion rooms to the rest of the house and furnished accordingly with all efforts made to keep furnishings of these four rooms dated no later than 1850. The Augusta Room furnishings will remain as they were in 1982.
- 3. Reproductions may be used only when the physical condition of the antiques is jeopardized by exposure in areas where large numbers of visitors have easy access; or when environmental conditions including excessive light, dust, humidity or airborne impurities pose a threat to the preservation of originals.

- Effective March 12, 1983 all items donated to Meadow Garden shall be accepted
 with the written condition that they become the property of Meadow Garden and
 may be used, replaced or sold at the discretion of the Meadow Garden Board only.
- 5. All items that post date 1821, with the exception of those in the six (6) rooms of the newer section and those described in Number 3 of this section, shall be replaced as soon as possible with similar items pre-dating 1821.
- Once an item is placed, it shall not be moved from one location to another without permission of the Meadow Garden Board. Only the Chairman of the Board may approve the removal of an item from the house, if it is in need of repair or refinishing.
- 7. Any item donated or purchased must have written documentation of appraisal and include an indication as to how the determination was made.
- 8. A file will be kept of all assets with information as to price paid or market value, date of acquisition, donor or where bought, documentation and appraisal and a description of article. One file will be kept in the reception room accessible to the Docents; a duplicate file will be in the possession of the Chairman of the Board.
- All items purchased or donated will be added to the Fine Arts insurance policy.
 Said policy will be reviewed and updated a minimum of once a year. Major additions to furnishings will be added immediately.
- Future plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the House/ Museum.

V LANDSCAPING

- 1. The landscape plan adopted by the Board shall be adhered to with no deviation unless recommended by an authority on landscape design and care.
- Donations of shrubbery, plants or trees shall be accepted only when item is part of the master plan.
- Work on the grounds will be under the sole direction of the Meadow Garden Board and the Landscaping Chairman. Supervision of actual work will be provided by the Museum-House Manager or the Landscaping Chairman of Meadow Garden.

VI MUSEUM SHOP

- The Museum Shop will be operated by a committee appointed by the Chairman of the Board and be responsible to the Board.
- Chairman of the committee will be responsible for all purchases, subject to the approval of the Board or the State Regent.
- Museum Shop operation will be self-supporting. In the event funds are needed for purchases, they may be advanced from available Meadow Garden funds and must be considered a loan and shall be repaid without interest within one (1) year from date of borrowing.
- 4. Profit from the Museum Shop shall be retained in its own account, with a percentage being transferred at the discretion of the Board at end of fiscal year and placed in Maintenance Account. The audit of the Museum Shop operation shall be included in the annual audit of the Georgia State Society.

VII PATRONS

- 1. Donors to the following categories are eligible to be known as "Patrons":
 - A. Meadow Garden Capital Investment Trust Fund
 - B. Furnishings
 - C. Maintenance
 - D. Landscape
- Individual gifts of a minimum value of \$50.00 to any of the above categories automatically qualifies the donor as a Patron.
- Chapter or group gifts of a minimum value of \$100.00 or more, above the State Honor Roll requirements, automatically qualifies that chapter or group as a Patron.
- 4. The State Treasurer will report these gifts to the Patrons Chairman.
- The Patrons Chairman will issue certificates to the qualifying individuals and chapters or groups.
- A permanent book will be kept on public display at Meadow Garden to record Patrons gifts.
- 7. The Patrons Chairman will enter the names of donors in the appropriate book a minimum of once a year.

VIII PLAQUES & MARKERS

- Plaques/Markers may be placed at Meadow Garden only at the discretion of the Board, and request meets the following criteria:
 - A. Substantial service and/or contributions that secured the property and the heritage for the GSDAR;
 - B. Individuals so recognized shall have been deceased for at least 5 years;
 - C. Plaque/Marker will be paid for by person(s) requesting such recognition.
- Such plaques will be permanently displayed at Meadow Garden and a record of honoree's service and/or contribution shall be recorded and placed in the Meadow Garden file, with Board approval.
- 3. Plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the house/museum. Additional markers shall not be permanently placed on the grounds.

Bylaws

BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II OBJECTS

The objects of this Society shall be:

- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.
- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.
- (3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of the Georgia State Society.

Article IV OFFICERS

<u>Section 1.</u> The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian and a State Curator.

<u>Section 2.</u> (a) To be eligible for state office, a member shall hold and have held membership in a chapter or chapters within the Georgia State Society for at least 5 years prior to her election and have served a full term as chapter officer or state chairman.

- (b) No member shall be eligible to the same state office for two (2) successive terms. A member having served more than one half of a term in a state office shall be deemed to have served a term.
- (c) No two state officers shall be members of the same chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.
- (d) To be eligible for the office of State Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State First Vice Regent or as State Second Vice Regent or served in each of these two offices of the Georgia Society.
- (e) To be eligible for the office of State First Vice Regent or for the office of State Second Vice Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State Recording Secretary or as State Treasurer of the Georgia State Society and shall have served a full term as a Chapter Regent of a chapter in the Georgia State Society.

<u>Section 3.</u> In recognition of valuable service to the Georgia State Society, a State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent for life by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Article V NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

<u>Section 1.</u> (a) A candidate for state office shall request the endorsement of her chapter, taken by vote at a regular meeting of the chapter held between May and January preceding the State Conference at which state elections are held. The endorsement, signed by the Chapter Recording Secretary, shall include the office the candidate seeks and shall be received by the State Regent with the candidate's statement of intent to be a candidate prior to any announcement or campaigning by the candidate and/or her supporters.

(b) A candidate for State Regent who wishes to present a slate of officers shall send to the State Regent in one packet the chapter endorsements and the statements of intent for each of her selected candidates. If received by the State Regent no later than December 1, these candidates shall be listed as a slate in the State Regent's December letter and Call to State Conference.

(c) Candidates wishing to run independently of a slate, whose chapter endorsements and statements of intent are received by the State Regent no later than December 1 shall be listed as independent candidates in the State Regent's December letter and Call to State Conference.

(d) A candidate whose chapter endorsement and statement of intent have been properly received by the State Regent may choose to announce her candidacy separate from the State Regent's December letter and Call to State Conference. Such a chapter endorsement and statement of intent shall be received by the State Regent at least ten (10) days prior to the opening of the State Conference at which the election is to take place.

(e) A candidate who does not meet the requirements of these Bylaws shall be declared disqualified and inclinible for consideration for state office.

(f) A chapter shall endorse no more than one chapter member for state office per election with the possible exception of candidates for State Regent and for State Corresponding Secretary.

(g) In the event of the death, incapacitation or withdrawal of a candidate prior to the election, a replacement shall be made with notification in writing to the State Regent and accompanied by the chapter endorsement and statement of intent as directed by these Bylaws.

<u>Section 2.</u> Nominations of candidates for all state offices shall be made at a designated meeting of the State Conference.

<u>Section 3.</u> The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected biennially by ballot at the State Conference. A majority vote shall elect.

<u>Section 4.</u> The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two (2) years or until their successors are elected. Their terms of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Section 5. (a) Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become State Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become State First Vice Regent subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. Vacancies in other state offices shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next State Board of Management meeting or State Conference, whichever shall come first.

(b) Any state officer who is absent from the state for a continuous period of six (6) months or longer shall automatically relinquish her position as a state officer.

<u>Section 6.</u> Upon the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Organizing Secretary General.

<u>Section 7.</u> (a) A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot.

(b) The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than fifteen (15) months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

(c) The endorsement shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent with the candidate's name and address to the Recording Secretary General to be received by April 1 preceding the designated Continental Congress.

Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

<u>Section 1.</u> The officers of the Georgia State Society shall perform the duties prescribed in this article, and parliamentary authority adopted by the Society, and such others as the State Board of Management and the National Society may require.

Section 2. The State Regent shall:

(a) be the chief executive officer and the official spokesman for the State Society;

(b) have general supervision of the affairs of the State Society;

- (c) preside at all meetings of the State Conference, State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;
- (d) appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society;
 - (e) be ex-officio a member of all committees;
- (f) appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as advisor in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting:
- (g) sign all contracts and agreements made in the name of the Georgia State Society with the recorded approval of the Executive Committee and the State Board of Management or the State Conference as directed by these Bylaws;
- (h) be bonded and have the authority to draw upon funds of the State Society with the approval of the Finance Committee.
- (i) recommend to the Finance Committee a Certified Public Accountant who shall be approved by the Finance Committee.

Section 3. The State First Vice Regent shall:

- (a) perform the duties of the office of State Regent in the absence or inability of the State Regent;
 - (b) fill a vacancy in the office of State Regent;
 - (c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;
- (d) serve on those committees as designated by these Bylaws and as directed by the State Regent.

Section 4. The State Second Vice Regent shall:

- (a) perform the duties of the office of State First Vice Regent in the absence or inability of the State First Vice Regent;
 - (b) fill a vacancy in the office of State First Vice Regent;
 - (c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent:
 - (d) serve on committees as directed by the State Regent.

Section 5. The State Chaplain shall:

- (a) open all meetings of the State Conference and the State Board of Management with scripture reading and prayer;
- (b) preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and conduct such other religious services as may be required;
 - (c) be custodian of state properties pertaining to the duties of this office;
 - (d) be responsible for IN MEMORIAM pages in the Proceedings.

Section 6. The State Recording Secretary shall:

(a) record the proceedings of the meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;

(b) compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under

the supervision of the State Regent and the Proceedings Committee;

(c) submit to the appropriate National officers, the endorsement for Vice President General and the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent before April 1 of the year in which said balloting was held;

Section 7. The State Corresponding Secretary shall:

- (a) conduct correspondence and send notices on behalf of the State Regent, the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as may be directed by them;
- (b) receive from the chapters the consolidated reports and distribute to the appropriate state chairmen.

Section 8. The State Organizing Secretary shall:

- (a) assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new chapters;
- (b) assist chapters in conjunction with appropriate state officers and chairmen in revitalization.

Section 9. The State Treasurer shall:

(a) be bonded;

- (b) be the custodian of the funds of the State Society, placing them in institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance;
- (c) receive the state dues and State Conference registration fees from the chapters and receive all sums contributed by the chapters for state and national projects, disbursing monthly to the Treasurer General all funds designated for national projects;
 - (d) disburse other funds only when authorized by the State Regent in writing;
- (e) keep an account of all sums received or disbursed by using the basic double entry form of bookkeeping according to accepted accounting procedures and keep receipts for all transactions;
- (f) prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference, sending a copy to the State Chairman of the Finance Committee ten (10) days in advance of each meeting;
- (g) be a member of the Finance Committee and an ex-officio member of the Credentials Committee;
- (h) balance and prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year; said audit by a Certified Public Accountant, shall be performed and delivered within forty-five (45) days of receipt of books.

Section 10. The State Registrar shall:

- (a) when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American revolution prove eligibility and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars;
 - (b) keep a correct list of all members in the state;
 - (c) report on membership to the State Conference;
- (d) be in possession of the computer and software owned by the Georgia State Society and see that it is maintained.

Section 11. The State Historian shall:

- (a) be in charge, within the state, of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General as well as those authorized by the Georgia State Society;
- (b) keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves within the state;
 - (c) prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General;
- (d) promote the study of American history, state and county history and historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the founding of our state and counties.

Section 12. The State Librarian shall:

- (a) serve as liaison between the Librarian General and the Georgia Chapters and disseminate general information on the NSDAR Library;
- (b) cooperate with the director of the Georgia Department of Archives and History, making the needs of the Archives known to the chapters;
- (c) collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing them wherever accepted in such libraries and Archives as may be chosen by the State Board of Management;
- (d) solicit, with the approval of the Executive Committee, contributions from the chapters for purchase of such books as requested by the office of the Librarian General, and/or the various libraries in Georgia which the State Society approves;
- (e) receive gifts of books and other printed material from the chapters to be donated to the approved libraries and Archives;
- (f) maintain a constant supply of bookplates to the NSDAR Library, the Georgia Department of Archives and History and for purchase by the chapters.

Section 13. The State Curator shall:

- (a) receive and be responsible for all gifts of Revolutionary relics to the Museum of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution;
- (b) be custodian of the State properties and shall have them properly stored and made ready for use at state meetings.

<u>Section 14.</u> All officers will keep a Procedure Book of Instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new officers to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. State Conference:

- (a) The annual meeting of the Georgia State Society shall be known as the State Conference. It shall be for the purpose of:
 - (1) receiving reports of officers, committees and Chapter Regents;
 - (2) electing officers biennially;
 - (3) promoting programs in furtherance of the objects of the Society;
 - (4) any other business that may arise:
 - i. annual budget shall be adopted,
- *ii.* all projects of the State Society requiring funding shall be voted upon at State Conference or ratified by members at State Conference if previously voted upon by the State Board of Management.
- iii. no project extending beyond the term of the presiding officer may be accepted at any meeting other than by vote at State Conference.
- (b) The State Conference will be held between February 1 and the time of the meeting of Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week;
 - (c) The State Regent shall fix the time and place of meetings;
- (d) The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credentials form to the chapters not less than sixty (60) days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 2. The voting members of the State Conference shall be:

- (a) the officers and Honorary State Regents of the State Society:
- (b) the officers and honorary officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state;
- (c) the Chapter Regent, or in her absence, the Vice Regent or alternate of each chapter;
- (d) delegates or alternates of each chapter of the state as designated by the Bylaws of the National Society for representation at Continental Congress;
 - (e) one additional delegate from each chapter in the state.
- Section 3. Only a chapter member in good standing whose credentials have been completed in accordance with the instructions of the State Regent and the State

Credentials Chairman for the State Conference and in accordance with the Standing Rules of the National Society shall be eligible to represent her chapter at state and national meetings.

<u>Section 4.</u> A member shall have belonged to a chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the chapter, except in the case of the Regent or Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

<u>Section 5.</u> A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at an annual State Conference, shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.

<u>Section 6.</u> Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the state of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

<u>Section 7.</u> At the opening of the annual State Conference the privilege of the floor shall be accorded to the State Chairmen. They may not vote unless they are duly registered as voters of the State Conference.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Society may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen (15) days' notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

<u>Section 9.</u> Forty-five (45) voting members, representing not less than twenty (20) chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

<u>Section 1.</u> The state officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents and the Regents, or in their absence, the Vice Regents of the chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

<u>Section 2.</u> The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the fall, following the October meeting of the National Board. It may meet whenever called by the State Regent. A minimum of twenty (20) days' notice shall be given as to the time and place of any such meeting.

<u>Section 3.</u> Thirty (30) members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

<u>Section 4.</u> The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference or as proscribed by these Bylaws.

<u>Section 5.</u> State chairmen, vice chairmen, committee members of the National and Standing Committees and one (1) member from each chapter shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privilege of the floor, but may not vote.

<u>Section 6.</u> The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article IX EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

<u>Section 1.</u> The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

<u>Section 2.</u> The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, shall attend the meetings, but may not vote.

Section 3. This Executive Committee shall:

(a) perform such duties of the State Board of Management between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient;

(b) meet at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three (3) members of the committee;

(c) vote by teleconference if necessary;

(d) receive and make recommendations for projects requiring expenditure of funds outside routine expenditures to be considered by the State Conference;

(e) make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. Decisons of the Executive Committee shall be acted upon at the next meeting of the State Board of Management or at State Conference, whichever shall come first.

Article X FINANCES

Section 1. (a) The fiscal year of the Georgia State Society shall be May 1 through the last day of April.

(b) The annual budget, prepared by the Finance Committee, shall cover the fiscal year and be prepared on the basis of dues payable for the calendar year beginning December first preceding.

<u>Section 2.</u> (a) The annual dues of chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be \$5.00 for each member of the chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1.

(b) The Finance Committee shall determine the per capita amount and distribution according to the annual membership count. The per capita amount and distribution shall be indicated on the budget presented annually.

<u>Section 3.</u> (a) Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the state dues, a conference registration fee of five dollars (\$5.00) for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under these Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether chapter is represented or not.

(b) State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the five dollars (\$5.00) conference fee at the time of registration.

(c) Other members of the Georgia State Society who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay three dollars (\$3.00) conference fee at the time of registration.

<u>Section 4.</u> (a) The State Treasurer and the State Regent and such others entrusted with funds of the Georgia State Society as may be designated by the State Board of Management shall be bonded. (See Article VI, Sections 2 and 9);

(b) The State Treasurer with the approval of the State Regent and the State Chairman of the Finance Committee shall place the funds of the Georgia State Society in financial institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage;

(c) The placement of restricted savings funds and investment funds of the Georgia State Society shall be placed to the credit of the Georgia State Society by the State Treasurer under the direction of the Finance Committee. Monies may be invested in U. S. Treasury obligations or other interest bearing obligations of federally insured financial institutions:

(d) The accounts of the State Treasurer shall be annually prepared for audit by a Certified Public Accountant immediately following the end of the State Society fiscal year and no later than May 15 and delivered to the CPA by that date;

(e) Should the State Treasurer be incapacitated, the State Regent, after consultation with the Chairman of the Finance Committee and with the approval of the Executive Committee, shall appoint an Acting State Treasurer to serve until such time as the State Treasurer is able to resume her duties or a new State Treasurer is appointed and ratified as stated in Article V, Section 5 (a).

<u>Section 5.</u> The expenses incurred by the State Regent in the performance of duty shall be paid each year from the State Dues Fund:

(a) Four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00) shall be taken each year to defray her necessary travel expenses;

(b) Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent, as budgeted, shall be paid by the State Treasurer who shall keep all receipts of these expenses. No expenses exceeding the budgeted amount shall be paid by the State Treasurer.

<u>Section 6.</u> At the close of the books annually, \$3,000.00 shall be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies Fund" so that at the end of each administration a total of \$6,000.00 will be reserved. This money is to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration.

Article XI COMMITTEES

Section 1. The State Regent shall appoint the following standing committees:

- (a) Bylaws: An Honorary State Regent shall be appointed as chairman and the committee shall be composed of two (2) other Honorary State Regents and one (1) member from each district;
- (b) Finance: This committee shall be composed of seven (7) members to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two (2) Honorary State Regents, one (1) active chapter regent and one (1) active chapter member. One of the two Honorary State Regents shall be appointed chairman. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund. This committee shall have charge of all investments of the Georgia State Society funds and the placing of insurance of all kinds with accredited companies:
- (c) Resolutions: This committee shall be composed of all Honorary State Regents, the State Parliamentarian and three (3) chapter members;
- (d) Proceedings: This committee shall be composed of the State Recording Secretary, the immediate past State Recording Secretary, State First Vice Regent and four (4) additional Daughters, at least one of whom shall be an Honorary State Regent.
- <u>Section 2.</u> The State Regent shall appoint such other committees, standing or special, as the State Conference shall authorize and actions of the State Board of Management and of the National Society shall require. The appointments shall be concurrent with the term of the State Regent making the appointments and shall terminate with the end of the administration.
- <u>Section 3.</u> No additional appointments to any of the committees shall be made after the roster of chairmen and committees has been compiled and sent to the chapters. Vacancies shall be filled by the State Regent with timely notification to the membership.
- <u>Section 4.</u> The duties of committees shall be such as these Bylaws, the State Conference, the State Board of Management or the National Society shall prescribe.

<u>Section 5.</u> All chairmen will keep a Procedure Book of instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

ARTICLE XII CHAPTERS

<u>Section 1.</u> To expedite the work of the Society, the chapters of the Georgia State Society shall be placed in geographical districts:

- (a) A chairman appointed by the State Regent shall coordinate the work of all chapters as needed; she shall be titled "Coordinator of Districts";
- (b) Each district shall have a Director appointed by the State Regent to work as a committee under the direction and supervision of the Coordinator of Districts and the State Regent.

<u>Section 2.</u> Chapter elections shall be held no later than April in the year of chapter elections. The Chapter Regent shall report anually the names of the elected officers promptly on the form provided by the State Regent for this purpose, with copies to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, and the State Recording Secretary.

<u>Section 3.</u> The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent, the State Recording Secretary, and the District Director by February 1.

Article XIII MEADOW GARDEN MUSEUM

Meadow Garden, property owned by the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, shall be operated as follows:

(a) The governing body shall be the Board of Trustees composed of the following members: the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Chairman who shall be appointed by the State Regent;

(b) The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the following members: the State Regent who shall serve as Chairman; the State First Vice Regent who shall serve as Secretary; the Chairman of Meadow Garden; the Regents of the Augusta and College Hill Chapters and the chairmen of the five (5) subcommittees appointed by the State Regent; Docents, Furnishings, Landscaping, Museum Shop, Patrons;

(c) The Meadow Garden Board shall operate with Standing Rules approved by the

State Conference.

Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

<u>Section 1.</u> The current edition of "Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised," shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law in matters not covered by these Bylaws.

<u>Section 2.</u> The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

Article XV AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent, the State Parliamentarian, and the State Bylaws Chairman. The State Regent shall send a copy to each chapter, at least sixty (60) days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the Call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at

which it is so adopted.

Article XVI DISSOLUTION

Although the period of duration of the Georgia State Society is perpetual, if for any reason the State Society is to be dissolved or otherwise terminated, no part of the property of the Society or any of the proceeds shall be distributed to or inure to the benefit of any of the officers or members of the Society. Upon the dissolution of the Georgia State Society, assets shall be distributed by the Board of Management and/ or the Executive Committee to and only to the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the local United States District Court, exclusively to such organization or organizations as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated within the meaning of section 501(c)(3), with purposes and objectives consistent with those of the Georgia State Society.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21.) No Conference was held in 1911; the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P.W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912"; amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, p. 211.)

ABSOLUTE DEADLINE FOR PROCEEDINGS MATERIAL

WHEREAS, a definite deadline must be established and adhered to for all reports and material to be in the hands of the Proceedings Committee in order to be delivered to the Printer by June 1.

RESOLVED: That all FINAL reports and materials must be received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1 with the exception of the Auditor's Report and any information sent out by the National DAR Headquarters. This does not alter the requirement in the "Items of Information" in the Proceedings that all reports shall be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary on or before February 15, the ORIGINAL being sent to the Secretary for the Proceedings.

AND FURTHER RESOLVED: This policy will be strictly adhered to and the material not received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1 will be omitted from the Proceedings.

All chapters competing for awards must send reports to the respective chairmen postmarked by January 20, 2001.

BYLAWS

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National and State Bylaws.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS

Notice of change of address of members shall be sent to the Organizing Secretary General, Treasurer General, State Regent and State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHANGE OF NAME

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to State Registrar, Treasurer General and State Regent by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHAPTER ELECTIONS

As soon as Chapter elections are held, names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, Administration Building, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D.C., 20006-5392, to the State Regent or State Regent-Elect and to the Recording Secretary by May 1. The full Christian name of Chapter officers shall be given together with her husband's given name or initials, address, zip code and telephone number. A Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years. This being added in order for our Bylaws to conform to the National Bylaws.

CHAPTER REPRESENTATION AT STATE AND NATIONAL MEETINGS

At the State Board of Management, a chapter is represented by the Chapter Regent, or in her absence by the First Vice Regent, and one non-voting member.

The voting representation of each chapter at the State Conference shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received by the State Treasurer **by January** 1. Membership less than 50: Regent, 1 Delegate, 4 Alternates, total votes 2; 50-199: Regent, 2 Delegates, 6 Alternates, total votes 3; 200-299: Regent, 3 Delegates, 8 Alternates, total Votes 4; 300-399: Regent, 4 Delegates, 10 Alternates, total votes 5.

The voting representation of each chapter at Continental Congress shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received in the Office of the Treasurer General **by January 1**. Membership less than 50: Regent, 0 Delegate, 2 Alternates, total votes 1; 50-199: Regent, 1 Delegate, 4 Alternates, total votes 2; 200-299: Regent, 2 Delegates, 6 Alternates, total votes 3; 300-399: Regent, 3 Delegates, 8 Alternates, total votes 4.

CONFERENCE REGISTRATION FEE

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer with the State dues on or before December 1, \$5.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether represented or not.

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$5.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$3.00 Conference Fee at the time of registration.

CONTRIBUTIONS

ALL contributions by Chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

DATE FOR ANNUAL AUDIT

WHEREAS, every effort must be made to have all material to the printer as early as possible to facilitate delivery of the Proceedings to the members.

RESOLVED: That the end of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, fiscal year for audit purposes be changed from May 31 to April 30.

DECEASED MEMBERS

Deaths shall be reported promptly to Treasurer General, State Chaplain and State Registrar by the Corresponding Chapter Officer. Complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and a date of death shall be furnished State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for Conference Memorial Service pages for State Proceedings.

DUES

Pay to State Treasurer State Dues of \$5.00 per member before December 1. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the December through April Board meetings of the National Society. National Dues of \$25.00 per member sent to the Treasurer-General, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20006-5392, before December 1, 2000.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS

To insure uniformity and convenience in binding, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, 8 1/2 x 11 inches, with 1 1/2 to 2 inch margin on left side, 1 1/2 inches at top and 1 inch on right side and at bottom. Four copies shall be sent to State Chairman of Genealogical Records. The booklet "Instructions for Copying Source Records and Their Preparation for Library Use" should be obtained from the office of the Corresponding Secretary General (currently \$1.00) with check made payable to the Treasurer General, NSDAR. This booklet gives the procedure for copying source records.

GEORGIA HOSPITALITY FUND

The following resolution which applies to the Georgia Hospitality Fund appears in the Proceedings for 1955:

"WHEREAS, The Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds a social event in Washington during Continental Congress which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society.

All awards will be made on this date basis.

NEW ADMINISTRATION FOR CONTINGENCIES FUND

For the entire resolution setting up the "General New Regime Fund Balance of \$2,500.00," found on pgs. 203-204 of the 1979 Proceedings the following substitute resolution was adopted by the 88th State Conference: RESOLVED that at the end of each administration \$6,000.00 be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies" fund, this money to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration, and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration. All other surplus monies in the General Fund, other than funds which are designated, are to be divided equally between the General Savings Account and the "Georgia State Society Endowment Fund," "DAR School" Resolutions 1991 page 62 of the 1992 Proceedings. This transaction is to be handled by April 30 every two years before the auditors close out the books of an administration, thus making the General Fund show the same balance of \$6,000.00 at the beginning of each new administration. (This fund is to be known as "New Administration Reserve for Contingencies Fund.") Adopted.

NOMINATIONS

The following resolution which applies to the announcement of the candidacy for State Regent appears in the Proceedings of the Twentieth State Conference, 1918:

"Resolved, that it is the judgment of the Executive Board that announcements for State Regent should not be made . . . earlier than three months prior to the meeting of the conference and they shall be furnished to the Press for publication."

BE IT RESOLVED: That no State Officer nor State Chairman may present her report or award(s) at State Conference unless said report, with list of award(s) is in the hands of the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary at least ten (10) days before State Conference.

Exclude NSDAR Chapter Achievement and State Honor Roll. These will be added later. Drop one inch to begin writing the paragraph. Keep a left martin of at least one inch. Numbers less than ten are to be written out; all others appear as written numerals, except those beginning a sentence. Proofread your report. Use your consistently presented name. Send copies to State Recording Secretry and State Regent. Chapter Regents send by February 1. State Officers and Chairmen send by February 15 and enclose separate sheets bearing names of winners of Awards and Awards offered for the next year – exactly as it is to be printed in the *Proceedings*.

A Life Membership is available to members at \$30.00 for those 55 years of age and over and \$45.00 under 55 years of age. Minutes of the Annual Meeting March 2, 2000

The meeting of the Georgia Cameo Society, Georgia State Society, NSDAR, was held at 7:00 PM on Thursday, March 2, 2000 in Preservation Hall 3, Crowne Plaza Hotel in Macon, Georgia with the President, Mrs. James W. Simonds, presiding, After a buffet of desserts and coffee, Mrs. Simonds called the meeting to order and greeted everyone. Mrs. Carl Tanner, Chaplain, gave the Invocation. The President welcomed members and quests to the first anniversary meeting. Executive Board members present were individually introduced by Mrs. Simonds and received a well deserved thank you for their support and diligence in their duties. In the absence of the Secretary, Mrs. Simonds, President, read the minutes of the Charter Meeting held on March 4, 1999. The minutes were approved as read for file. Each member of the Executive Board was requested to give a report of her office. Mrs. Richard C. Kumpitsch, Vice President and volunteer Newsletter Editor, announced the publication of the Society's first newsletter in January 2000, with the plan to issue the newsletter every six months. Mrs. Carl Tanner, Chaplain, urged the membership to keep her informed of any births, sickness, and deaths within the Society. Mrs. Robert F. Towns, Treasurer, issued a report of dues totaling \$2,815.00 and expenditures of \$668.37, leaving an ending balance at \$2,146.63, with the outstanding bills for this meeting yet to be paid. The document was filed. Historian Karla Wall invited members to view the scrapbook on display and to accept copies of memento photographs taken at the Charter Meeting. Mrs. Simonds thanked the membership for the input over the past year, especially those questions concerning possible changes in the Bylaws. Discussion of those changes at a Board meeting and the resulting proposed amendments to the Bylaws were published at the January newsletter. Mrs. Simonds recognized Bylaws Chairman, Mrs. Richard C. Kumpitsch, who presented the proposed amendments to the Bylaws. Propose adding to Article No. 3 Regarding Eligibility: Grandmother and Granddaughter Membership. Membership in the Georgia Cameo Society shall be open to any member of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution who can show concurrent active membership in conjunction with a mother and/or daughter(s) or a grandmother and/or granddaughter(s). The mother/daughter(s) or grandmother/granddaughter(s) may be active members in different State Societies. Additionally, for the period beginning March 4, 1999 and ending March 31, 2000, membership will be open to any mother/ daughter or grandmother/granddaughter who can show membership with a now deceased mother/daughter or grandmother/granddaughter. Also, if a mother/daughter or grandmother/granddaughter dies the associated mother/daughter or grandmother/granddaughter may retain her membership in the Georgia Cameo Society. Mrs. Kumpitsch moved the adoption of the amendment, Adopted. Propose adding to

Article No. 4 Regarding Dues: Grandmother/Granddaughter, If a Charter member has joined in conjunction with a deceased mother/daughter or grandmother/granddaughter, the application fee must be paid for the deceased member but no dues are expected. Mrs. Kumpitsch moved the adoption of the amendment, Adopted, Propose adding in Article No. 4 following the sentence, "Active members must pay both the initial application fee (\$4.00) and the yearly dues (\$4.00) for a total of \$8.00 the first year": Regarding Life Membership, Upon payment of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) a member may become a life member. She shall make her request to the Society's Treasurer, forwarding her check with her request, Lanette H. Reid proposed the following addition to the amendment; seconded by Rose E. Bell. "Life membership dues shall be deposited in an interest bearing account in the name of Life Membership for Georgia Cameo Society and the interest shall be withdrawn annually and credited to the Society's general checking account." Discussion ensued on the financial viability of this proposed Bylaw. Due to the division of opinion, Mrs. Reid moved the proposal go back to committee for reconsideration. Seconded by Billie Holt. The amendment was not adopted. Propose to insert in Article No. 8 in the Treasurer's duties following the sentence, "When arrears have continued for a period of one year, delinquent members must be dropped by the Board and the member notified of such action": Regarding Reinstatement. A member having resigned in good standing may be reinstated by a vote of the Executive Board upon payment of current dues. A member having been dropped may be reinstated upon payment of a "reinstatement fee" of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) and payment of current dues. Mrs. Kumpitsch moved the adoption of the amendment. Adopted. Propose to change in Article No. 8 in Treasurer's duties the Date December 1st to May 1st and modify to read as follows. She shall keep an account between the Society and the members. issue notices for dues one (1) month in advance; and one (1) month after the Annual Meeting send notices in arrears, which notices, remaining unanswered until May 1st must be followed by a second notice. Mrs. Kumpitsch moved the adoption of the amendment, Adotped, Propose changes in reference to the Georgia State Society where it appears throughout the Georgia Cameo Society Bylaws as GADAR (Georgia Daughters of the American Revolution), shall hereafter be changed to read as GSSDAR (Georgia State Society Daughters of the American Revolution). The Chair recognized Mrs. Denise Fritze, who stated that the proposed change in the Bylaws in the reference to the Georgia State Society should be revised to read GSDAR not the proposed GSSDAR. The Chair concurred, Mrs. Kumpitsch moved for the adoption of the revised proposal, Adopted, Mrs. Simonds outlined a proposal by the Executive Board to allocate Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) per year from the Society Treasury to establish a scholarship fund at Tamassee. Mrs. Towns, Treasurer, indicated sufficient funds were available and proposed the allocation. Seconded. The proposal was adopted. Before adjournment several announcements were made. One such announcement included a report by the President that a nominating committee appointed by the Board would be nominating officers for year 2001. Mrs. Simonds closed the announcements by thanking members and guests for coming. The Benediction was given by Chaplain, Mrs. Carl Tanner, There being no further business, Mrs. James W. Simonds adjourned the meeting.
