

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

The State Regent thanked the members of Executive Committee for their continued loyalty and support. She noted the 2000-2001 Proceedings were printed and available for distribution at these District Workshops, and that we have a readable audit of the Treasurer's books.

Mrs. Hunter told of some of the changes being made with the new administration: new national chairmen; committees being combined; new committees established; the "Daughters Magazine" changed to "American Spirit", which will be mailed six times a year; a "Daughters of the American Revolution Newsletter" for members only to be mailed ten times a year. At National Board of Management on April 20, sixty-eight recommendations from the new Executive Committee were presented for consideration. Continental Congress will be July 3-9, 2002. The Georgia State Society has requested through the President General's Office that the Georgia Brunch be reserved for 9:30 a.m. on the Fourth of July at the J. W. Marriott. The State First Vice Regent reported representing the Georgia State Society at the SAR Annual State Conference in Atlanta, where she brought greetings. Mrs. Hunter reported the highlights of the February meeting of the National Board of Management. Some of the highlights included the following: topic for the American History Essay Contest will be "A Letter from Valley Forge: Winter 1777-1778:" topic for the Christopher Columbus Essay Contest will be "How did the voyages of Christopher Columbus express the general political, social and scientific outlook of the 15th century?" The President General's project is "New Ancestor DATA Base with an all-member index." Field Genealogy Workshops are scheduled in Kentucky and Arizona in 2002. Georgia hopes to host a Field Genealogy Workshop in 2003. The last National Number issued was #809706. On February 28th the Georgia House of Representatives passed a bill exempting the Georgia State Society from paying Georgia State Sales Tax. Mrs. Hunter expressed a special thank you to Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr., for taking the initiative and bringing this bill to fruition.

The State Regent expressed her joy in serving with each of the Executive officers and wished them the best with their DAR work in the future. She expressed appreciation to them for being her Dream Team.

The State First Vice Regent reported arrangements for the Chapter Regents Banquet to be held Saturday have been completed. Three chapters will be celebrating their 110th birthdays this year. Final plans are being made for the Georgia Brunch on the Fourth of July to begin at 9:30 a.m. in Salon G at the J. W. Marriott Hotel, Washington, DC. Tickets are \$30.00 and are available from the State First Vice Regent.

The State Second Vice Regent reported on news from the schools. Twenty-three "Care Bear" pins have been sold and 50 are available for sale. Upon the request of the State Regent the replacement cost of the stage curtains in the auditorium at Tamassee has been obtained from the Nu-Idea School Supply Company in Sumter, SC. The approximate cost to replace the black back-drop curtains would be \$4,650.00, including delivery and installation. The burgundy draw curtains would cost \$4,450.00 to replace. If both are done at the same time, the cost would be \$8,700.00. These prices do not include sales tax. Even though the curtains are in need of replacing, it was determined that we did not have enough money at this time to pursue this endeavor.

The State Curator reported it's been a pleasure to be the caretaker of the properties of the Georgia State Society.

The State Chaplain has sent 259 birthday cards to our 90+ members this year. She wrote 128 letters of sympathy and mailed these to the next of kin for the 168 deceased members for whom reports were submitted. The State Chaplain is responsible for the prop-

erties affiliated with the Memorial Service. With an average of 160 deceased members annually, the Georgia State Society has two urms that can be utilized. Two bubble vases are inadequate to accommodate the needs of the Memorial Service. The State Chaplain made a motion that the bubble vases be donated to the Meadow Garden Sales table, and if not sold they be donated to the Tamassee Thrift Shop. Motion seconded and adopted.

The State Recording Secretary reported meeting with T-Square Graphics to begin the publication process for the 2001-2002 Proceedings. Seventy-two 2001 Proceedings have been sold at \$15.00 per book, generating \$1,080.00, which helps offset the cost of the

Proceedings.

The State Corresponding Secretary reported the receipt of 97 Master Questionnaires for Chapters, which were processed for distribution to the appropriate state officer and/or state chairman. The State Regent's Letter #6 was mailed, and a special Regent's letter mailed to Honorary State Regents, State Officers and Chapter Regents in reference to the Financial Seminar being offered at State Conference.

The State Organizing Secretary reported Georgia State Society's new chapter in Valdosta, Colonel Ebenezer Folsom, was confirmed December 18, 2001, with 32 organizing members.

The State Historian expressed gratitude to the chapters which submitted nominations for the American History Teacher of the Year.

The State Librarian reported a total of 64 books were donated and confirmed for acceptance by the NSDAR Library during 2001. The following donations were received: \$222.00 for the State Library Fund; \$1,410.00 for Friends of the Library; and, \$530.00 for Seimes Microfilm Center. This year 340 bookplates have been sold.

The State Parliamentarian told of guidelines for writing perfect Bylaws will be ready in

the spring.

The State Regent informed the Executive members of the opportunity of the National Society to purchase an authentic Button Gwinnett signature, which would complete the National Society's Americana Collection of the signatures of the Signers of the Declaration of Independence. Pledging will take place during State Conference.

There being no further business, the Benediction was given by the

State Chaplain. The meeting adjourned at 10:40 a.m.

Mrs. Hunter excused the non-members while the business meeting was conducted. The State First Vice Regent took the Chair while the State Regent gave her report.

The State Regent noted we are half way through our second year together and she continues to be pleased with the cooperation and exciting ideas being generated across the state. She stated that visiting the Chapters has been the best part of this wonderful job. She expressed her appreciation to everyone for welcoming her with smiles, gifts and many courtesies and for giving her lifetime memories. She thanked all for allowing her to be our leader.

The progress at Meadow Garden, our state project, continues. Meadow Garden celebrates its centennial year as a house museum on December first.

Unexpected repair had to be completed from the damage to the roof from a wind storm, which occurred the first part of October. Mrs. Hunter expressed gratitude to each Georgia Daughter and to each Chapter for their generous support of our Meadow Garden treasure.

Mrs. Hunter expressed it was an honor to represent the Georgia State Society at Continental Congress in March, and to preside at the Georgia Luncheon, and to report on State Regents' Night. The State Regent dedicated the portrait of Mrs. Julius Y. Talmadge, Honorary State Regent from Georgia who served as President General 1944-1947. The portrait hangs in the stairwell across from the Georgia Room. Mrs. Hunter attended two National Board of Management meetings.

The State Regent passed out a communication from the President General concerning mail coming from the National Society in reference to the precautions being taken to ensure safety from anthrax concerns. She advised any remittance or payments sent to National should be sent UPS and addressed to the correct office at 1776 D Street.

The State Regent shared the following information from the October 6, 2001. National Board of Management. Motion was made and adopted that all endorsements for VPG received by the candidates at 2001 State Conferences be certified. The President General stated that during this time of changes in our National Society we have to be flexible. Noble Wymberly Jones Chapter in Shellman was disbanded. The Georgia delegation seating in the Hall at Continental Congress July 2002 will be in Tiers Section 28. The DAR Store is open from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. We are asked not to send credit card orders through the mail. The last national number given was #807325. The National Board voted to increase the subscription price of the magazine/newsletter to \$18.00, beginning January 1, 2002. If you renew your subscription prior to January 1, 2002, you can renew at the old rate of \$12.00. The President General is appointing more vice chairmen to involve more members in leadership positions and to build a stronger National Society. During the September 11 terrorists attacks the Officers and staff worked to protect our buildings. Many valuables were moved to the basement. Security is very high. The President General had a conference with representatives from Caldwell about issues with insignia orders. A new book is being compiled entitled "DAR Women who Served in the Service." It was stressed to emphasize our National Defense reports in the Chapters and to encourage support for our President. We are discouraged from writing on any stationary which has an American Flag in the background. The National Membership Chairman advised to try to find a more compatiable chapter if unhappy, rather than resign. The President General's Project to be approved at Congress in July 2002 is a three-pronged project: 1.

Membership Development, 2. Preservation of Records, and 3. Development of Revenue. Our DAR Magazine and Newsletter is not mailed from the DC area but from Burlington, Vermont. They are mailed in sealed polymer bags, which will protect them from contamination. When sending mail to the National Society, you are encouraged to put your chapter code on the outside of the mailing to help verify it is legitmate.

Mrs. Hunter expressed her appreciation to the Georgia Daughters for the privilege to serve as State Regent, and she expressed how much she has enjoyed visiting the chapters and meeting with members. The State Regent encouraged us to continue to work together as we finish our second year. (State Regent's detailed calender will be listed under Reports of State Officers.)

Mrs. Bell thanked Mrs. Hunter for her outstanding report and leadership. A rising vote of appreciation was given the State Regent for her efforts on behalf of the Georgia State Society.

The State Regent resumed the Chair and called for the State Officers to report.

The **State First Vice Regent** reported about meeting with the staff at the J. W. Marriott concerning plans for the Georgia Brunch to be held July Fourth from 9:30 a.m. until noon. Mrs. Bell, with the State Regent's consent, has investigated the rules relating to organizations being granted exemption from the Georgia State Sales Tax. She and Mrs. Michael Gilhuly, Regent, Fielding Lewis Chapter, have been working with State Senator Charles Tanksley. At the beginning of the 2002 legislature session, Senator Tanksley will introduce a bill to relieve the Georgia State Society from the burden of paying Georgia State Sales Tax.

The **State Second Vice Regent** and **DAR School Chairman** encouraged support for the DAR Schools through the National School Chairman's project, "Caring for the Schools," with the purchase of a "Care

Bear" pin for a \$25.00 donation. She stressed the state school projects: at KDS to achieve our commitment for ten computer packages for the elementary school; and, at Tamassee contributions to increase the principal of the Talmadge Auditorium and Gymnasium Endowment. She asked we keep Dr. Phyllis Crain, Executive Director of Crossnore School, in our prayers as she is diagnosed with breast cancer and is in Houston, Texas for treatment.

The **State Chaplain** reported that she sends a monthly report of the deaths of Georgia Daughters to the National Society. Since State Conference she has received notice of 80 deceased members and has acknowledged 71 of these with the next-of-kin. She did not receive next-of-kin information on the other nine. She has sent 154 birthday cards to our 90+ members.

The **State Recording Secretary** reported the 2000-2001 Proceedings were available; 233 were distributed at the August District Workshops; and, 49 sold at \$15.00 per book. The Georgia State Society ordered 350 books for a total cost, including tax, of \$7,270.54. A 2% discount was received if paid within ten days of invoice, so the total paid was \$7,125.13. Actual cost per book is \$20.36.

The **State Corresponding Secretary** reported the Master Questionnaire for Chapters is available at this meeting and must be completed and returned to her by the first of February.

The **State Organizing Secretary** reported the Georgia State Society has a new chapter proposed in Valdosta named Colonel Ebenezer Folsom. The Organizing Regent is Madelyn Peace Hightower.

The **State Treasurer** reported total assets as of 20 October 2001 in the Georgia State Society's General Fund equal \$79,734.83, and Meadow Garden total assets equal \$329,348.13.

Mrs. R. Hugh Reid, **Finance** Chairman, reported a supplemental audit would be done for the interim period of May first through July tenth.

The **State Historian** reported that nominations for the Outstanding American History Teacher of the Year are due to her by December fourth.

The **State Librarian** and **DAR Library Chairman** reported 51 books have been donated and confirmed by the NSDAR Library since January 2001. The following donations have been received: \$600.00 for Friends of the Library; \$300.00 for Seimes Microfilm Center; and, \$300.00 for the Library Centennial Fund. Since State Conference 195 bookplates have been sold. Information about the Bookworm Project is available.

The State Curator reported she has made the necessary preparations for this State

Board of Management. So seating arrangements can be made, she requested names of guests, honorees and family members who would be attending State Conference, be submitted to her by the first of February.

After a short break, reporting continued with the State Chairmen, beginning with the Meadow Garden Museum Chairmen. Mrs. John R. Henry, Meadow Garden Museum, invited everyone to the Meadow Garden Centennial Celebration and Open House on December first. Mrs. Jerido Ward, Furnishings, told of items which have been hung in the Board Room. Mrs. Edward C. Moses, Regent, Vidalia Chapter, presented a teacup and saucer in the Hoby Bird (Phoenix) pattern to Meadow Garden in honor of Mrs. Billy W. Hunter, State Regent. Mrs. Roy H. Cagle, Landscaping, told of fall flowers being planted in anticipation for the December Open House. Mrs. James H. Elliott, Jr., Museum Shop, expressed appreciation for the patronage of the sale table. Mrs. James J. Leitch, Meadow Garden Patrons, told of how to become a Patron of Meadow Garden.

RESTORATION OF AN AMERICAN TREASURE

WHEREAS, Benjamin Franklin, 1706-1790, one of the founding fathers of our country and one of America's greatest citizens, was a man of tremendous historical importance, a participant in the creation of the United States Constitution, as well as making his mark as a printer, inventor, diplomat, politician, scientist, and philosopher; and

WHEREAS, Benjamin Franklin, as an agent of the Pennsylvania Assembly, was sent to England to lobby the Crown and Parliament about grievances the Assembly had towards the Penn family, owners of the Proprietary Province of Pennsylvania, during which time, for sixteen years between 1757 to 1762 and from 1764 to 1775, he rented rooms in a Georgian residence at 36 Craven Street, in London, the only house standing in the world today in which Franklin lived, a house which also served as the first de facto American embassy; and

WHEREAS, as a result of the establishment in 1978 of Friends of the Benjamin Franklin House, a non profit tax free 501 (c) (3) organization, along with other corporate supporters, restoration work began in 1996 to turn 36 Craven Street, the world's only remaining structure in which Benjamin Franklin resided, into a dynamic museum and educational facility by the close of 2002, therefore be it

RÉSÓLVED, that the Georgia State Society Daughters of the American Revolution encourages chapters and Daughters to learn more of the efforts to restore and preserve the house at 36 Craven Street, in London, known as the Benjamin Franklin House, which was designated in 2000 as an American "Treasure' by the United States National Trust for Historic Preservation and the White House, the first such designation outside the United States, and be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be submitted to the National Chairman of the Resolutions Committee for consideration at the One Hundred and Eleventh Continental Congress in July 2002.

STATE LIBRARIAN - Mrs. Chris S. McCorkle

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

<u>Basis of Accounting.</u> Georgia State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution prepares its financial statements on the cash basis of accounting. Consistent with this basis, income is recognized when received and expenses are recognized when paid.

<u>Cash Equivalents.</u> Cash equivalents consist of short-term, highly liquid investments, which are readily convertible into cash within ninety (90) days of purchase.

Property and Equipment. The Society follows the policy of not capitalizing collections and historical treasures. Meadow Garden and its contents are historical treasures. The house and its contents are insured for approximately \$325,000. Office furniture and fixtures are insured for \$8,000. Major preservation or restoration projects are capitalized and depreciated over an estimated useful life of fifteen years.

Income Taxes. Georgia State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution is classified as a non-profit organization and is exempt from income taxes under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

<u>Basis of Accounting.</u> Georgia State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution prepares its financial statements on the cash basis of accounting. Consistent with this basis, income is recognized when received and expenses are recognized when paid.

<u>Cash Equivalents.</u> Cash equivalents consist of short-term, highly liquid investments, which are readily convertible into cash within ninety (90) days of purchase.

Property and Equipment. The Society follows the policy of not capitalizing collections and historical treasures. Meadow Garden and its contents are considered historical treasures. The house and its contents are insured for approximately \$ 325,000. Office furniture and fixtures are insured for \$ 8,000. Major preservation or restoration projects are capitalized and depreciated over an estimated useful life of fifteen years.

Income Taxes. Georgia State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution is classified as a non-profit organization and is exempt from income taxes under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

National Committee Reports

AMERICAN HERITAGE - Mrs. Virginia G. Lingelbach

Of the 92 chapters reporting, more than one-third presented a program on American Heritage. Among these were programs on the history of Christmas carols, quilt making and preservation, headstones and epitaphs, early American music, the history of Blue Willow china and the tradition of tea drinking. Members in thirteen chapters volunteered at historic sights. The restoration efforts at Meadow Garden were documented through the preparation of a booklet with color photography and slides for submission to the National Society. Georgia Daughters submitted contest entries in art, crafts, literature, fiber art, and historic preservation. Increased emphasis was placed on maintenance and preservation of historic properties. Notable among these were obtaining a grant to re-roof a historic school, cleaning, repairing and repositioning the Battle of Etowah Monument, dedicating a marker to a Revolutionary soldier, erecting a wrought iron cemetery gate, helping to preserve the Indian Springs Hotel, and placing a marker at the home of May Erwin Talmadge, the only past President General from Georgia. Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure to serve you and the Georgia State Society.

AMERICAN HISTORY - Mrs. J. Thomas Bowen

Ninety-six chapters reported with 301 American History programs presented to chapters and 212 to other groups. Many chapters featured outstanding American women at chapter programs. One hundred four displays were arranged in schools or public places, 1899 press inches, 127 radio minutes, 43 television minutes publicized American History. Fifteen chapters used spot announcements. Essays titled "As editor of the Philadelphia Gazette, interview at least two Signers of the Declaration of Independence and write an article for the July 5, 1776 edition" came from 215 schools with 5354 entries. Chapters statewide gave 2842 certificates for essay contests, 155 bronze medals and nearly \$500 in cash awards to Georgia students for their participation in American History contests. Four hundred forty-three certificates and 81 bronze medals were given for Outstanding Work in American History. Christopher Columbus essay reports came from 25 schools with 444 students entering the contest. A very special thanks to the four District Vice Chairmen: Northeast, Mrs. Albert N. Wren; Northwest, Mrs. Bill J. Otting; Southeast, Mrs. Thomas R. Nisbet, Jr.; Southwest, Mrs. Robert Taylor. It has been a pleasure and a privilege to serve the State Society as American History Chairman.

AMERICAN INDIANS - Mrs. John K. Bretch

Promoting DAR through the Native American Indian committee has been the focus of the 92 Chapters reporting. Chapters continue generous monetary contributions, food labels, clothing, school supplies, bedding to Bacone and Chemawa. Augustin Clayton with Button Gwinnett C.A.R. constructed dreamcatchers and Native culture. Sergeant Newton's C.A.R. visited Indian mounds, Pow Wow and presented program to Chapter. Helen Martin, member of Colonel William Candler and fourth grade teacher, had the class research an Indian tribe presented reports in tribal dress. Dedicated Mrs. E. D. Dunn, Commodore Richard Dale gets to meetings reporting "Indian Minutes". Chapter newsletters, Philadelphia Winn and Martha Stewart Bulloch. Chapter programs included artifacts, remembering family members on "Trail of Tears" and reservation life for a week. Janice Thurmond, chairman Fielding Lewis, one of many creative ideas, "Chip in your Change for Chemawa." Indian Youth of America, Video Camp Scholarship is available, drugs and gangs not the way. Heartful thanks to all Chapters and members, remembering the America's First People.

AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP - Mrs. Richard Simpson

Of the 97 chapters reporting, 35 chapters had activity for the Americanism Committee. There are 28 chapters that have an Americanism Committee Chairman. There were 772 DAR Manuals for Citizenship given to applicants, 110 Manuals given to schools and 136 distributed to others. Thirty nine members participated in 14 Naturalization Ceremonies. Georgia Daughters continue to help teach classes where needed. Approximately 120 hours of instruction was given by Daughters of Elijah Clarke Chapter. Daughters distributed small American flags and cards printed with the Oath of Allegiance and American Creed to new

citizens. Several chapters gave receptions and provided refreshments at the conclusion of the ceremonies. It has been a pleasure to serve as chairman of this committee. Thank you, Madam State Regent.

CHAPTER ACHIEVEMENT AWARD - Mrs. Raymond I. Patton

Good news! I am pleased to report that we had 100% participation in the National Chapter Achievement. Thank you Chapter Regents and Chapter Achievement Chairmen for doing a Great Job. The Overall Winner with the highest number of points was Augustin Clayton with 1,730 points. Ladies, congratulations, you are to be commended. Madame State Regent, thank you for allowing me to be the Georgia Chapter Achievement Chairman for 2001.

CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION - Mrs. James A Harvey, Jr.

Thirty-six chapters reported something positive about achievements in meeting the objectives of this committee. Comments ranged from "talking-up" membership to hosting programs and providing leadership. State membership increased by seven, Five societies reported endorsing at least two youngsters for membership. More chapters are having programs presented by C.A.R. and are involving C.A.R. in events. Support provided Button Gwinnett Society by the Augustin Clayton DAR was exemplary. Button Gwinnett was recognized as the Most Outstanding Society, Miss Meredith Barker was the Most Outstanding C.A.R. Member, and Virginia Baker, the Most Outstanding Senior, Mr. Hal Dayhuff (HODAR) was presented the Silver CAR/SAR Appreciation Medal for support to CAR. Four DAR/C.A.R. debutantes will be presented: Miss Kinsley Belew, Miss Emily Gaudier, Miss Wendy Roberts, and Miss Amanda Strickland, Mr. Thomas Jackson, State President, presented a check to the Meadow Garden Board for \$3,500.00 to purchase porch furniture. While the home may be a "Hidden Treasure" to many, it is well known to the G.S.C.A.R. Sukey Hart Chapter's Liberty Tree Society is to be organized next month. Congratulate the ladies on the achievement! Appreciation goes to Mary Jackson for her leadership and to Madame State Regent for the opportunity to serve.

COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARD - Mrs. Inman D. Jackson, Jr.

Ninety-six DAR chapters returned report forms for this committee. Thirty-one chapters reported giving either the National Community Service Award or recognizing someone for outstanding community service at the chapter level. This chairman forwarded 25 applications from the following chapters to the Southeastern Division National Vice Chairman for approval: Abraham Baldwin, Altamaha, Archibald Bulloch, Augusta, Augustin Clayton, Benjamin Hawkins, Cherokee, Chehaw, College Hill, Fielding Lewis, Fort Frederica, General James Stewart, Henry Walton, John Benson, Joseph Habersham, Oglethorpe, Nancy Hart, Robert Loughridge, Sukey Hart, Tomochichi, and William McIntosh. Four of these chapter sent entries for two Community Service Awards. Chapters reported chapter programs given by former recipients of the Community Service Award and members volunteering in many community activities.

CONSERVATION - Mrs. Leo S. Jensen

One hundred Chapters submitted reports. Thirty-six Chapters reported special presentations on organ donation. Other programs were: "Understanding Our Forests", "Native Plants of Georgia and Their Conservation", "The Trust for Public Land Project", "Conservation of Natural Resources", "Water Conservation", "Georgia Trust for Historic Preservation" and "Farmland Preservation". Twenty-four Chapters reported planting a variety of trees in their communities. Twelve held special commemorative ceremonies. Another eight Chapters participated in the President General's Special Project entitled "American Heritage Tree Plantings". In this category, those planted were Mt. Vernon Red Maple, Tulip Poplar, Willow Oak and Dogwood. A total of 1272 trees were planted. Fifteen pounds of cosmos seeds were sown and 20 coreopsis plants were set out for highway beautification. Recyclable materials collected were computer cartridges, newspapers, magazines, cardboard, glass, cans and plastic. Members provided wild animal feed, birdseed, feeders, birdbaths and bird friendly shrubbery, composted and purchased goods made from recycled materials. One member reported buying 5200 pounds of birdseed per year. Others planted to attract and protect butterflies. Fourteen Chapters reported 50 participants in art, crafts, literature and music categories, two receiving honorable mention. Four Chapters awarded Conservation Medals.

CONSTITUTION WEEK - Mrs. H. Carl Tanner

The observance of Constitution Week began in June with Governor Roy Barnes welcoming Mrs. Billy W. Hunter, State Regent, Mrs. John 1. Bell, Jr., State First Vice Regent, Mrs. Raymond I. Patton, State Chairman -Chapter Achievement Award, and this chairman to his office to witness the signing of the official State Proclamation, which was later presented to the State Regent at the State Luncheon. In the wake of the September 11th tragedy, the Constitution and the rights it guarantees took on new significance. The quandary of preserving Constitutional rights versus maintaining national security was addressed by Bob Barr, Congressman, Georgia's 7th District, at the State Luncheon, September 22, Ansley Golf Club, Atlanta. Georgia Daughters from 90 chapters submitted excellent reports of activities including: 94 proclamations; 65 special observances; 83 promoted Bells Across America with 157 institutions participating; 44 presented Sidelights; Displays: 232 (4276 ft); Publicity: Print: 2588 in.; Broadcast: 13,227 minutes; Website displays: two. Chapters also celebrated with luncheons, special speakers, prayer services, programs in schools, poster contests, and distribution of flags.

DAR GOOD CITIZEN - Mrs. Julian A. Brown, Sr.

Georgia Daughters honor, recognize and encourage Good Citizens of our high school seniors throughout the state. This chairman received reports from 96 chapters. Seventy seven percent of our Georgia High Schools were contacted. Thirteen high schools were new participants. Chapters honored 230 high school seniors. The winners were honored at chapter meetings, teas, luncheons, and at Honor's Day Programs in schools. The winners and sponsoring chapters received much press recognition. All winners received the DAR Good Citizen pin, certificate, and wallet card. Gifts of savings bonds, cash, scholarships and books were awarded. The total value of awards given by chapters was \$7,033.80. Special thanks to all chapter chairmen and Regents who participated in the Good Citizen Committee for their diligence in communicating with the schools in their area and for meeting the deadlines. A very special thanks to the District Vice Chairman: NE Mrs. William Frady; NW Mrs. Julian C. McKinley; SE Mrs. Burley Page,Sr.; SW Mrs. Jimmy S. Taylor. It has been a pleasure to serve the State Society as the chairman of the DAR Good Citizen Committee.

DAR LIBRARY - Mrs. Chris S. McCorkle

Georgia Daughters have been most generous in their contributions to Library work on the local, state and national levels. Ninety-six chapters reported, with eleven having programs on NSDAR Library or local libraries. Chapters donated 763 items valued at \$7,090, to local libraries, including books, pictures, and historical periodicals. Members volunteered 65 hours at the Georgia Archives, 7725 hours in local libraries and other libraries. Chapters donated 77 DAR Magazines to local libraries. Seven members earned the Bookworm Pin this year, and chapters have 17 members working toward Bookworm Pins. Chapters sent, through the State Treasurer, \$222.00 to State Library Fund, \$1,410.00 to Friends of the Library, and \$530.00 to Friends of Seimes Microfilm. A total of 340 Georgia bookplates were purchased. The Georgia State Society donated \$500.00 to purchase books for the NSDAR Library in honor of the State Regent, Mrs. Billy W. Hunter, and eighteen books were purchased with these funds. Georgia chapters also donated forty-six books to the NSDAR Library, for a grand total of sixty-four books donated to the NSDAR Library in year 2001. A list of these books will be in the Proceedings, as well as a detailed report from this officer. Thank you, Madam State Regent, for this opportunity to serve the State Society as the Library Committee Chairman under your capable leadership.

FRIENDS OF THE LIBRARY - Mrs William. D. Wilson

Georgia Daughters responded to the challenge for an increase in the funds for the Friends of the Library. I asked that we have a higher goal this year, and you Daughters did just that. We had an increase of \$1181.00 over last year. The total for this year is \$2678.00. There were 84 chapters reporting with the money being given from 21 chapters. Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure to serve the Georgia State Society as Vice Chairman of Friends of the Library this year under your leadership. Thank You.

SEIMES MICROFILM CENTER - Mrs. James F. Forsyth

A special word of thanks to the Martha Stewart Bulloch, Augustin Ćlayton, and Baron DeKalb Chapters for special contributions totaling \$330.00 to the Seimes Microfilm Center

for 2001-2002. Chapters are urged to remember the objectives of the Seimes Microfilm Center which include building a resource for genealogical research for DAR members, prospective members, and the public engaged in research and to encourage individuals, chapter and state organizations to contribute funds for the purchase of microfilm, microfiche and CD-Roms for use in the Center. Thank you, Madame State Regent for this opportunity to serve the State Society.

DAR MAGAZINE - Mrs. James L. McConnell

Eighty-six chapters received chapter achievement by participating in the co-op ad which made possible seven black and white pages in the July-September issue of the new DAR Newsletter. These pages honored the 2000-2002 State Officers; Honorary State Regents and guests at the 103rd State Conference; our State Regent and her state project the restoration of Meadow Garden; 2001 State Conference Pages; a historical site in each of our four Districts; and recognition of co-op ad participating chapters. Chapters with individual ads during the year were Augustin Clayton, Colonel William Chandler, John Benson, Martha Stewart Bulloch, and Thronateeska. Six Georgia Daughters contributed \$100 each to become Friends of DAR Magazine. The excellence of the new American Spirit magazine has increased Georgia's subscriptions to the DAR magazine. Thanks to all chapters for spreading the word about the American Spirit and for your support in contributions and the co-op ads.

DAR MUSEUM - Mrs. Robert H. Farrow

Individuals from Georgia chapters contributed \$1,150 to the Friends of the DAR Museum Fund this year, which allows for acquisition by purchase of new objects for the museum collections, as well as for conservation of objects already in the collection. With 96 chapters reporting, there were 54 who reported contributions to the DAR Museum Exhibition Fund. Thirty-six chapters acknowledged that they had purchased merchandise from the Museum shop or catalog, with one listing: "a DAR mouse pad!" Museum and/or Correspondent Docents gave museum programs all over the state, among topics such as Quilts, Toys, Shoes, Antique Costumes, Headstones and Epitaphs, and Becoming a Docent. Several reported using slides of the period rooms, which they rented or purchased through the Museum. Chapters are encouraged to contact these docents or the DAR Museum for excellent programs. Madam State Regent, these have been two delightful years to have served with you.

DAR SCHOLARSHIP - Mrs. William E. Shubert

Reports from 94 chapters indicated that 62 are involved in scholarship programs. Fifty-two chapters gave a total of \$2,035 to National scholarship funds. Offering scholarships to students entering post-secondary programs: Abraham Baldwin \$250 to Billijo Rush, West Georgia College & State University; Augustin Clayton, \$6,000 to seniors at Jonesboro and Henry County High Schools: Brunswick, \$500 at Coastal Community College: Colonel John McIntosh, Dorothy Davis Memorial Scholarship of \$500 to Good Citizens: John David Umbriaco, Katie Beth Tarbush, and Carrie Suzanne Rhoades: Etowah, the Henson Scholarship Fund; General James Jackson, Claude Davis Ingram Loan Fund, Valdosta State University; Hawkinsville, Jelks Scholarship, Middle Georgia College; John Benson, \$1,000 Carpenter Scholarship to Ben DeWitt; Oothcaloga, Ida Hamilton Boston Scholarship of \$2,000, Kristen Renee Harris; Old Unicoi Trail, Anne McNeil Darwin \$500 Scholarship, Aaron Wersing; Oliver Morton, ten four year renewable \$1,000 awards to John Bellflower, Lacie Brown, Kiley Garrett, Maryanne Irwin, Thomas Kitchens, Ginger Pittman, Leslie Sheffield, Russell Thompson, Ashley Tyson, Jessica Williams; Savannah, Hazel B. Tuthill American History scholarship Fund of \$ 1,000 to Lyle Perkins; Thomasville, \$500 to Nancy Beth Clarke; John Laurens, \$500 to Harriett Claxton. In addition, chapters give scholarship awards to the winners of American History Essay Contests, those chosen Good Citizens, those given the Patriotism Medals . Nancy Hart, Henry Walton and Elijah Clarke award scholarships to students at Tamassee. George Walton gave \$500 to Shi Qiu, Good Citizen; Pulaski awarded Richard Chewning \$500; Council of Safety awarded \$1,000 to John Mitchum, Rebecca Hand, Lawanda Williams and Amber Pike. John Franklin Wren gives the Emily Stone Scholarship for books; Edmund Burke sponsors the Vera C. Wardlaw at Tamassee; Martha Stewart Bulloch, a scholarship at Tamassee for Sylvia Crooks. Other Tamasse scholarships are given by Joseph Habersham, Cherokee and Philadelphia Winn.

DAR AMERICAN HISTORY SCHOLARSHIP - Miss Donna R. Johnson

Georgia Daughters contributed a total of \$309.00 to the American History Scholarship. Special mention goes to the following chapters for the amount of their contributions: Fort Peachtree which gave \$50.00; La Grange which gave \$25.00; and Captain Edward Hagin and Joseph Habersham who each gave \$10.00. Applications for this scholarship were placed in the Regents' packets for all four District workshops. The state winner is Chris Campbell of Carrollton High School who is sponsored by the Abraham Baldwin Chapter. The winner demonstrates high academic achievement, an active involvement in school and community, and an extremely strong interest in America's historical heritage. This year, there was a second place winner - Cody Staton of Sequovah High School who is sponsored by the Hightower Trail Chapter. Thank you, Daughters, for your financial support of the NSDAR American History Scholarship, encouragement of America's youth to study American history, and the publicizing of DAR's commitment to education.

DAR SCHOOL COMMITTEE - Mrs. Theodore C. Whitson

The Auditorium at Tamassee has new carpet in the front and back, down the aisles and on the choir risers; restored and refinished floors in the entry hall and stage area plus four large exhaust fans in the Gymnasium. Berry College has a new track lighting system in the temporary exhibit gallery and KDS has computers in the elementary school. These were the state projects at the schools during this administration. Eleven programs were presented this year on the schools and 36 "Care Bear" pins were sold. The Hightower DAR School Award was presented to 58 chapters, with Cherokee and Joseph Habersham Chapters being honored for the greatest per capita contributions to the state projects. Seventy-seven chapters had full programs on the schools; 55,274 plus food labels; 31,769 plus pounds of thrift; 26 Friends of the Schools with 11 of those eligible for pins. Monetary contributions: Tamassee: \$41,869.57 (includes a \$25,000.00 scholarship) plus \$46,586.20 sent direct: KDS: \$5,336.50; Berry College: \$2,028.10; Crossnore: \$10,783.00; Hillside: \$1,565.00; Hindman: \$1,876.00 totalling \$110,044.37. Participating in the summer workshops were Jason Eller from Tamassee and Stan Mannon from KDS. Chapter activities for the schools: Parties, Teas and Gifts, Visits to Atlanta and Macon, New shoes and costumes for the Tamassee Cloggers, Angel Tree Fund, Box Lunch Auction, Scholarships, HODAR visits, Costume Jewelry. Showers for linens, cleaning supplies, socks; Ingles Card, Ink Cartridges, Upromise Points, Musical instruments, 50 Beanie Babies to Tamassee, 500 coats to KDS, projector to Crossnore, student dictionaries and books and contributions to the Tamassee Academy. Please see the DAR School Awards listed in the Proceedings for the State Chairman's awards. The Georgia State Society acknowledges with grateful appreciation the generosity of Mrs. Kay Hightower and her family for funding the Hightower Awards.

DAR Service for Veterans - Mrs. I. Thomas Knight

Eighty Georgia Chapters reported activities honoring and serving veterans or having made contributions to the VAMCs, state hospitals, and nursing homes. Georgia Daughters, with their youth volunteers and knitters, gave 7630 hours of service, participated in 534 activities and traveled 18,888.5 miles. Contributions included: cash/canteen, \$4117; food, \$2274.96; books/magazines, \$2972.12; gifts, \$11,877.61; stamps, 72 lbs. 9 oz.; and comfort items, \$6057.34. Four Georgia Daughters are on active duty, one is a CPT with the Georgia State Defense Force, and 47 members are veterans. Madame State Regent, thank you for the opportunity to serve during your administration.

The Flag of the United States of America - Mrs. Robert L. Marchman III

Ninety-six chapters reported the following activity: Flags presented included 64 large, 935 small, 817 table-size, Flag materials distributed included 3.377 Flag Codes, 73 Certificates. 603 Flag pins and 1,586 other pieces of Flag materials. All reporting Chapters have included the Pledge of Allegiance and encouraged others to fly the Flag. Approximately 30 chapters reported events with youth and community Flag events. In the wake of the events of 9/11/01, these figures are significant. This Committee's special recognition is directed to Vidalia Chapter's excellent report, which will be sent to the National Chairman, Also, special recognition to Augustin Clayton and Benjamin Hawkins. However, my personal recognition is directed to the Vidalia Chapter. The Vidalia Chapter exhibited not only outstanding patriotism but also the extraordinary value of community support in their project of a U.S. Flag in a city park of central location. This Chapter was successful in raising an American Flag (with pole) in a central city park within two months of the attacks on September 11 and a bronze plaque shortly to follow thereafter. Etowah Chapter, in their report, with their Flag Code count, reported 500 Flag Codes distributed "...after September 11, no explanation needed." That says it all. Americans who had never flown flags in their lives were flying them with no knowledge of any Code - but our gals gave them the knowledge. The appreciation of the National Society goes to all of the Georgia chapters who responded to the call of "God, Home and Country."

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS COMMITEE - Mrs. David S. Manker

Georgia Daughters more than doubled the amount of unpublished records submitted at any previous time. This year, 26 Georgia Daughters in 18 Chapters donated **10,533** pages in 38 volumes to the DAR Genealogical Library, and the same amount each to the Georgia Archives, Washington Memorial Library in Macon, and Georgia Historical Society in Savannah - making a grand total of **42,132** pages. Special awards were given to Benjamin Hawkins and Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapters for submitting personal chapter history collections.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS - Indexing - Mrs. W. Charles Hampton

Of the twenty-four ladies who volunteered to index books, 2 returned their books not done and 7 are stiff working on their books. That leaves fifteen ladies from 10 different chapters who have indexed one or more books this reporting year. It was a GREAT indexing year. Thank you ladies for all your hard work.

JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS - Mrs. Douglas Lee Moody, Sr.

This committee chairman received reports from ninety-five chapters of which eight reported JAC committee with sponsorship of twenty-five JAC including eight new clubs being organized. A total of 407 children were JAC Club members with 319 being new members. JAC Club supplies distributed during this school year included 235 membership pins, 135 membership cards, 35 handbooks, 6 JAC banners, 29 American Flags and 62 fact sheets. Publicity reported to this chairman included 169 inches with 16 pictures. The national theme, "America - Born on the Fourth of July," produced many varied and interesting entries for this year's contest. Chapters reported a total of 407 contest participants. Thirty-three contest entries were received from three chapters, Abraham Baldwin, Martha Stewart Bullock and Thomasville, and the winners from each category were forwarded to the regional level for judging. They included very creative posters, stamps, and banners; photo essays; community service projects; and creative expression entries. Children in grades K through 8 participated in the contest categories. Madam State Regent, it has been a blessing for this individual to serve as State Chairman of the JAC Committee this year. Thank you for asking me to serve the Georgia Society in this capacity.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP - Mrs. Richard C. Kumpitsch

It's great to see that the Georgia Juniors involvement continues to rise on the chapter, state and national levels. Ninety-six chapters reported this year, and we have 27 Juniors serving as chairmen, 12 as officers and 5 as Regents. On the state level we have I officer, 3 chairmen, and 3 vice chairmen. On the National level we have I vice chairman and 1 chairman. We had 8 chapters that sold Innisbrook products. The Junior Shoppe continues to raise money for the Helen Pouch Fund by adding great new products. The Georgia Chapters pulled together to create beautiful squares for the quilt we presented to our State Regent, Mrs. Billy W. Hunter. I want to give a big "thank you" to all Daughters for your continued support and contributions. Special thanks to my Vice Chairman of Sales, Miss Ashley Towns, for her great job with the Junior Shoppe.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE - Mrs. Richard C. Parsons

The Membership Committee presented an engraved silver bowl to the Georgia State Society NSDAR to be presented each year to the chapter with the most new members for that year. This chairman e-mailed to the appropriate chapters the names of 266 prospective members received from Member Services, National Web Site, VIS State Chairman, Patriot Lookup Service and other sources. Membership statistics for the year 2001: official Georgia DAR Membership Count on January 1, 2002, 7040 members in 103 Chapter; new members by application 360; reinstatements 38; transfers-in 122; transfers-out 115; dropped 93; resignations 192; deaths 171 for a net loss of 51 members in 2001 (all numbers include 73 new junior and 3 new CAR members). Ninety-five State Membership Certificates of Appreciation for membership achievement were presented to 29 Chapters at State Conference.

NATIONAL DEFENSE - Mrs. J. B. Deal

The call to National Defense and Patriotism was answered this year by Georgia Daughters in a time of crisis. Ninety-eight chapters returned reports. Personal involvement in sharing the meaning of freedom and responsibility as citizens to persons outside NSDAR was doc-

umented by 28 chapters and engaged at least 233 individual members who took action. Awards go to a chapter in every district in the Georgia State Society. This is a new category of involvement during this chairman's term; the creativity in meaningful ways to share the message of freedom was exciting to see. Education of members was conducted by 94 chapters with regular national defense information. Recognizing and encouraging youth in patriotic service resulted in 58 chapters presenting 186 Good Citizenship (Patriotism) medals and 173 ROW medals (19 Gold, 154 Bronze). Our Society also contributed \$129.00 to NSDAR to support ROTC medals in unfunded locations. Educating the public through written materials was undertaken in 7 chapters. Monetary awards are given to eight chapters. Certificates of participation given to 20 chapters. The goal of the chairman was to inspire each Daughter to tell the story of patriotism to others and thus encourage growth in good citizenship in our nation. Thank you for the opportunity to work with such talented Daughters.

PROGRAM - Mrs. Sterling P. Jones

Fifty two Chapter Yearbooks and ten Supplements were received from Georgia DAR Chapters. They were all extremely good with great programs planned for the year. This Chairman expresses appreciation to the State Regent for the opportunity to serve the State Society in this worthwhile committee.

PUBLIC RELATIONS - MOTION PICTURE, RADIO, AND TELEVISION - Mrs. John M. Samaras

The Georgia Daughters responded to the Public Relations Committee very well this year. Print Media: Articles 611. Photos 448, Radio: Spots 259. Program Participated 6 Television: Spots 10. Program Participated 4, Chapters with Newsletter 39. Chapters with fact Sheet 4. Publicity for Independence Day 18. Constitution Week 18. Bells were rung for Bells Across America by 6 chapters. Revolution 16. Number of Newsletters submitted to the National Chairman 19. Awards presented to media 1. Letters. e-mail and/or phone calls made to the media 205. Several chapters have their own websites. One chapter talked with JAC Clubs as a part of Constitution Week Services. Another chapter had three members interviewed for about 40 minutes concerning our DAR objectives, activities. membership etc. A different chapter had a letter to the Editor of a local newspaper concerning Constitution Week published on Sunday - the week of Sept 16. 2001. Many of the Georgia Chapters had articles about their American History Essay Winners. Most chapters had their meetings announced as events coming in their local paper. Flag ceremonies were covered by the media in 3 chapters. One chapter participated in an Old Soldiers Parade.

VOLUNTEER INFORMATION SPECIALIST - Mrs. Everett E. Porter, Jr.

Ninety-eight chapters reported members using computers in many ways. E-mail directories were set up and maintained for communication with 97 chapters. Forty-five DAR Newsletters were sent by e-mail containing state and national news. Chairman spoke at State Chairman's Breakfast at 2001 State Conference about Genealogy Research on the Internet. Seventy requests for membership information were received through the Georgia State Web Site and referred to the State Membership Chairman. Eighty-five requests for miscellaneous information were received and answered by this chairman. Thirty-one chapters now have web sites linked to the National Society web page, with 12 approved this year: Baron Dekalb, Captain Thomas Cobb, Elijah Clarke, General Daniel Stewart, General David Blackshear, General James Jackson, John Benning, Joseph Habersham, Lyman Hall, Sergeant Newton, Thronateeska, and William McIntosh. Georgia has 21 volunteers assisting the National Society with its All Members Database Project. Special thanks to Linda Stephens, Vice Chairman Web Page Construction, for helping these chapter set up their web pages. Special thanks to Linda Hallman, Vice Chairman Georgia Message Page, who redesigned the Message Page with separate sections for chapter e-mail and state officers and chairmen e-mail and maintained these pages.

Special Committee Reports

COMMEMORATIVE EVENTS - Miss Patricia A. Glenn

Reports were received from 96 chapters, all reporting activities associated with Constitution Week. As this event occurred only six days after the tragedy of September 11, it served as a way to show one's patriotism publicly, to proclaim our Constitution and what we believe, as well as mourn for all who were lost in New York, Washington and Pennsylvania. The tremendous surge of patriotism, public prayers, and church services helped deal with the honors of that day. Excellent reporting of 9/11 activity goes to Vidalia Chapter who promoted a community-wide project in two months to raise funds, erect and dedicate an illuminated flag pole in Vidalia on Veterans Day to pay lasting tribute to the victims and heroes of that tragic day. Forty-seven chapters reported activities for Independence Day, 40 commemorated the Korean War, 5 Patriot's Bell Tower, 4 Louisiana Purchase, 7 Lewis and Clark, and 5 Washington-Rochambeau Trail. 50 chapters observed prescribed holidays. Reports listing multiple commemorative events were reported by 27 chapters. Two national essay winners on the Korean War last year made Georgia Daughters proud: Marilyn Gilhuly of Fielding Lewis and Leland Draper of Sunbury.

INSIGNIA - Mrs. Robert G. Fountain, Sr.

This chairman attended the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, District workshops in August. She made a poster to explain the sash ribbon, National, State, Chapter Insignia pins and the NSDAR Heritage Club. Since workshop, my poster has been on loan to those wishing to use it for an Insignia program. This year The Special Committee Insignia was changed to a committee to function only at the national level. This committee will serve as a clearing house for new pin requests to better coordinate the design and approval process. No reports are needed from the states and chapters as these are supplied by J. E. Caldwell & Co. Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure to serve under your direction the Georgia State Society as State Chairman of this Committee.

LITERACY CHALLENGE - Mrs. Al K. Ream, Sr.

Ninety-eight reports were received from Georgia DAR Chapters. Forty-eight chapters promoted literacy through programs at chapter meetings, members teaching English as a second language and reading to individuals and groups. Many donated money and books to reading funds, libraries, and literacy programs in their communities. Chapter members volunteer their service in local libraries and churches by participating in story hours. One chapter's entire chapter project was literacy. One member teaches classes at a University and involves the students to volunteer their time to the community by reading to the children. One chapter hosted a Christmas party for 70 tutors and students. Another chapter donated 70 boxes of used books to the American Association of University Women's Bookfair. Proceeds from this Bookfair support educational opportunities for girls and women. Two hundred thirty chapter members participated in literacy programs. The total number of hours tutoring or promoting literacy in adults were 2,879 and in children a total of 13,112 hours. Seven chapters presented a Community Service award to an individual who promoted literacy in a praiseworthy manner. Thank you, Madam State Regent, for this opportunity to serve.

MUSEUM CORRESPONDENT DOCENTS - Mrs. Thomas A. Stafford

The Georgia Correspondent Docents have been quite busy presenting programs on the DAR Museum. Thirteen Docents reported presenting a total of 27 programs to schools, community groups and DAR Chapters. The State Society has 27 Correspondent Docents, four of whom are recent additions to the committee. There are Docents in each district, each ready to present an interesting program. One of the most popular programs is "A Step in Time." Eight Docents have reported that they have earned their pin.

PRESIDENT GENERAL'S PROJECT - Mrs. Hugh Howell, Jr.

The President General's Project Committee was established in 1963. This important committee empowers each member and each chapter with a method of participation in the National Society. (1) The chapters may contribute \$6 per member. Chapters may budget this or ask their individual members to contribute this amount. (2) Members may purchase from the office of the Corresponding Secretary General items that have been selected by the President General's Project Committee. (3) Members may donate through mailing. (4)

Members may contribute directly to the project. (5) Members may qualify for a Benefactor Pin. Our focus must be on the present and future needs of our members and the needs of the National Society. Your President General's Project Chairman thanks all the participating Daughters and chapters for supporting the goals of this committee. Thank you, Madam State Regent, for the opportunity of serving you and the State Society in this chairmanship.

VOLUNTEER GENEALOGIST - Linda Reed Douglas

This has been a very busy year for the Volunteer Genealogist Committee. We have added 3 more Volunteer Genealogists, bringing our total to 18 with one also being a Field Genealogist. A 2-day Field Genealogist training has been requested by the State Regent. This State Chairman has presented 8 workshops/programs in the last year to the following chapters: Col. William Few, Toccoa, Fielding Lewis, George Walton, John Laurens, Abraham Baldwin, Martha Stewart Bulloch, and Nathaniel Macon. Four other chapters had members attending workshops. Our Volunteer Genies have been busy in the field assisting prospective members, doing programs on applications and genealogy. Five of the GA Volunteer Genies attended the week long work session at National in Feb. 2002 on supplemental verifications. Our nomination for Volunteer Genealogist of the Year is Susan Lemesis & for Field Genealogist is Linda Douglas. Madam State Regent, it has been a joy to serve you and the State Society in this capacity.

WOMEN'S ISSUES - Mrs. Robert A. Balog

Ninety-eight reports were received from Georgia DAR chapters. Forty chapters reported participation, and fifty-eight reported no participation. Twenty chapters featured women's issues through one or more programs. One chapter presented three-minute spots at all meetings. Programs were presented about Careers; Women in the Military; Women During the American Revolution; Recognition of Women Veterans in the Chapter; Colonial Poet, Anne Bradstreet. Programs about Health such as Fitness; Cancer in Women; Organ/Tissue Donor Program: Depression: Battered Women: Health Issues of Women and Children in Belarus, Russia; Volunteering at Ground Zero in New York City. Programs about Family Issues such as Issues for Women in Constitutional History, Women's Rights, Victim's Advocacy Program and Investment. Twenty-nine Chapters participated in activities reflecting a woman's issue. Activities included participation and sponsorship in Relay for Life, Sav-A-Life Walk, Breast Cancer Walks and Awareness Programs, Muscular Sclerosis Walk, Women's Wellness Center Programs at local hospital, Women's Health Initiative, crisis pregnancy services advocating abortion prevention counseling and post-abortion counseling, leadership role in prevention of child abuse and domestic violence in Georgia, and political affairs involving Women's Issues in Georgia Legislature, work with homeless women, Hart Haven Safe House Run/Walk, and work with voter registration and the League of Women Voters. Augustin Clayton Chapter is the only chapter to participate in the Women's Issues Essay Contest. Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure to serve the Georgia State Society as Women's Issues Chairman this year under your leadership.

Hugh Reid, Chairman, called the meeting to order at 3:33 p.m. Others attending were: Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr., Secretary; Mrs. Weston D. Baxter; Miss Julia A. Farrigan; Mrs. Herman M. Richardson; Miss Mary Kate Tribble; and Mrs. Billy W. Hunter, State Regent. Prayer was offered by Mrs. Richardson.

The Minutes of the April 5, 2001, meeting were not read as they were approved as mailed and appear in the 2000-2001 State Proceedings.

Mrs. Baxter, State Treasurer, distributed copies of the Summary of Fund Accounts which were reviewed and filed. Mrs. Reid complimented Mrs. Baxter on her work as treasurer and stated that the C.P.A., Mr. Stephen L. Thompson, was very complimentary of the Georgia State Society's handling of its funds. The accounting firm will file form 990.

Miss Farrigan moved that with the purchase of the new computer for the use of the State Registrar and the updated membership diskettes from the National Society at a total cost of \$1,275.50, and with the assurance from the State Treasurer that a new computer for the use of that state office is not needed at this time that the motion adopted at the meeting of the Finance Committee on 31 July 2000 to authorize the purchase of computers for these two state offices be closed and that no further funds be made available for such purchases as directed by said motion. Motion was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Reid reminded the group that the proposed 2002-2003 Budget and any proposed amendments to the bylaws must be included in the State Regent's call to State Conference.

Mrs. Richardson moved that the Finance Committee recommend an increase in state dues from five dollars (\$5.00) to seven dollars (\$7.00) and that such a proposed amendment to the State Bylaws be prepared for consideration of the 104th State Conference of the Georgia State Society. If adopted an amended Budget for 2002-2003 shall be presented at the Fall Board of Management meeting in 2002. Motion was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Reid will present the following proposed bylaws amendment to the Bylaws Committee:

INCREASE IN STATE DUES

To amend ARTICLE X. Finances. Section 2 (a), which reads:

"The annual dues of Chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be \$5.00 for each member of the chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1," by striking \$5.00 and adding \$7.00.

ARTICLE X. Finances. Section 2(a) then will read:

2(a) The annual dues of Chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be \$7.00 for each member of the chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1.

RATIONALE: To assure that the work of the State Society can operate in the black although membership count has dropped.

NOTE: When adopted an amended 2002-2003 budget will be prepared for consideration at the Fall Board of Management in 2002.

The large number of books which the State Society still has for sale, including the Georgia State Society History books, the Ancestor Rosters and the Georgia State Proceedings, were discussed.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 5: 10 p.m.

The minutes of the July 3 1, 2001, meeting were approved as mailed.

Mrs. Baxter, State Treasurer, distributed copies of the Summary of Fund Accounts which were reviewed and filed. She noted that as certificates of deposit are renewed, there will be a loss of revenue to the State Society due to much lower interest rates at this time.

Mrs. Reid distributed the proposed 2002-2003 State Budget which was discussed.

Miss Farrigan moved that we return to the proposed State Budget \$50.00 to be awarded to the DAR Good Citizen State winner. Motion was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Baxter moved that the notation designating a time at which amended budget will be presented be stricken from the recommendation to the Bylaws Committee for a raise in dues. Motion was seconded and adopted.

The following resolution addressing the distribution of the State Society's surplus funds was presented:

NEW ADMINISTRATION FOR CONTINGENCIES FUND

WHEREAS, the Georgia State Society is sole owner of Meadow Garden and is responsible for all costs of maintenance and operation of this historic property in Augusta; and, WHEREAS, surplus funds over and above the \$6,000.00 designated for a new administration to be used for the payment of the Proceedings of the previous administration and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration is allocated for specific savings or money market accounts:

RESOLVED: that such available funds over and above said \$6,000.00 be designated as one half to Meadow Garden Maintenance Money Market account, to be transferred to one of the certificates of deposit at such time as a certificate is renewed; and the remaining one half to be deposited to the Georgia State Society General Fund money market account; and.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: that this resolution replace all previous directives for said surplus, namely those adopted in 1976 and in 1991.

Following discussion, Miss Farrigan moved that the Finance Committee recommend the resolution to designate distribution of surplus funds at the end of an administration and that this resolution be presented to the Resolutions Committee. Motion was seconded and adopted. There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 4:07 p.m.

Mrs. Reid welcomed the members and thanked those in attendance for coming.

The Minutes of the November 1, 2001, meeting were not read as they were approved

Mrs. Baxter, State Treasurer, distributed copies of the Summary of Fund Accounts, May 1, 2001 through February 20, 2002, which were reviewed and filed. Again it was noted that as certificates of deposit are renewed, lower rates of interest can be anticipated.

Following background information on the National Society's possible acquisition of a document on which Button Gwinnett's signature appears, Mrs. Richardson moved that the Finance Committee recommend to the Resolutions Committee a resolution to be considered at the 2002 State Conference showing support for the purchase of the Button Gwinnett signature to be available the 27th of March 2002. Mrs. Hunter moved that \$1,500.00 be withdrawn from the General Savings Money Market account and given to the Treasurer General's project in honor of our Treasurer General, Carolyn Grant Hanf, a Georgia Daughter, Motion was seconded and adopted. Mrs. Reid stated that she would offer a motion to this effect during a business meeting of the State Conference for final approval.

Mrs. Bell distributed copies of an announcement from the National Parliamentarian, Joan Lucas Blankenship, issued on January 9, 2002, for the benefit of NSDAR State and Chapter Regents regarding change of Continental Congress dates and related procedures which stated the National Society's position on double audits. It was recommended that "an internal audit should be sufficient for the two or three month period before the term of the newly elected officers begin."

LUCY COOK PEEL - Mrs. Gary Shattuck

In honor of Mrs. Lawson Peel, who served as Vice President General, the Lucy Cook Peel Memorial Fund was established in 1923 by the Georgia State Society. We now offer four books, published for the preservation of records, in two-volume sets. The first set of two books is The Membership Roll and Registration of Ancestors 1986 edition and The Membership Roll and Registration of Ancestors 1996 edition, which is available at \$35 for the two-volume set. The second set of two books is The History of the Georgia State Society 1891-1981 and The History of the Georgia State Society 1981-1991, which is available at \$40 for the two-volume set. The grand total collected, by this committee between 1996 and the year 2002, is \$8,156.57. Indeed, it has been a pleasure serving as state chairman of this committee for six years and for three State Regents

MARKING REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIERS' GRAVES AND RESTORING HISTORIC SPOTS – Mrs. Bruce M. Tucker

MEADOW GARDEN MUSEUM - Mrs. John R. Henry.

Beautiful progress in Meadow Garden's Restoration program has been accomplished, or is in progress. The Library/Board Room, the Augusta Room, the Best Room, Halls, and the Victorian Bedrooms have been replastered, wall papered, painted, and the floors restored, as was needed. The front porch restoration includes replacement and/or repair of three supporting beams, and replacement of both newels at the bottom of the 1792 steps. Piers have been built under the 1792 house to support the beams and reinforce the brick wall underneath the house. Fourth of July and Centennial Celebration/Christmas Open House were well attended and Christmas decorations and Revolutionary recipes were enjoyed. Lunch on the front porch was served to 4 groups, totaling 69 guests and enjoyed by all. Donations accepted include a new computer printer from Dr. Ed Johnson, a copy machine from Randall Floyd, a portrait of George Walton as an older man from Billy Rosignal. Gordon Blaker identified and cleaned an 1806 *English Osborn* saber which was already in our possession. A framed copy of a 1733 *Boston Gazette* was located. This chairman has coordinated the restoration program and has given Meadow Garden or 1700 Medicinal Herb slide programs to 17 groups of people.

MEADOW GARDEN FURNISHINGS - Mrs. Jerido Ward

During the past year chapters have contributed \$5,712.56. The Eagle Scouts planted peach and apple trees this year that were donated in honor of Regent Mrs. Billy W. Hunter by Mrs. Billie Holt and Regent Hunter's mother and sisters. Landscaping donations for the year were \$910.00. Severe pruning was done to the mulberry tree at the rear of house, which grows over the museum shop roof: The Cherokee Garden Club master gardeners continue the work on the Weaver's dye garden. -They helped put out pine straw, weeded the flowerbeds and planted pansies before the Christmas Open House. Pat Roach has begun making terra cotta markers for the gardens to identify the plants. The retaining wall beside the canal was extended to control sprinkler and other water accumulation. A French drain was built along the street side of the house to control moisture collection in the kitchen wall. Several sprinkler heads were capped to prevent water from getting under the front porch. This chairman was also in charge of refreshments served on the patio during the Open House in December. MEADOW GARDEN MUSEUM BOARD June 5, 2001

The Meadow Garden Museum Board met Tuesday, June 5, 2001, in the Board Room at Meadow Garden in Augusta. With Mrs. Billy W. Hunter, State Regent, presiding as Chairman of the Board, the meeting was called to order at 10:30 a.m. Other members present were: Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr., Secretary; Mrs. John R- Henry; Mrs. S. Davis Lewis; Mrs. Charles H. Turner; Mrs. Kathleen Deck Johnson; Mrs. Jerido Ward; Mrs. Roy H. Cagle; Mrs. James H. Elliott, Jr.; Mrs. James J. Leitch; Mrs. Weston D. Baxter; and ex officio member, Mrs. Theodore C. Whitson.

Following the opening prayer by Mrs. Leitch, Mrs. Hunter welcomed the members and thanked them for attending the meeting.

The minutes of the March 1, 2001, meeting, having been approved by mail for inclusion in the 2001 State Proceedings, were not read.

Mrs. Baxter, State Treasurer, presented the Summary of Fund Accounts, May 1, 2000 through June 1, 200 1, which was reviewed and filed.

Mrs. Henry, **Museum Chairman**, shared with the members a copy of an article with picture of Meadow Garden, which appeared in the April 5, 2001, edition of The Augusta Chronicle (Richmond County Neighbor.) She then reported that the new employee, Susan Jackson, is proving to be a good House Manager. She invited Ms. Jackson to come in and

meet the members of the Board. Mrs. Ward moved to rescind the motion adopted on January 9, 2001, to contract with Sizemore Personnel Services for hiring a house manager and handling the paper work. Motion was seconded and adopted. Mrs. Henry moved that the Board cancel the contract concerning the House Manager with Sizemore Personnel Contract Services as of June 11, 2001 and that employee, Susan Jackson, be placed on the Meadow Garden payroll. Motion was seconded and adopted. Mrs. Turner moved that the Board increase the salary of the House Manager, Susan Jackson, in the amount of \$0.25 per hour. Motion was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Henry stated that since the Museum reopened at the end of February, there have been 214 adults and 387 children who have paid to tour Meadow Garden. In addition there were over 133 DAR members who visited Meadow Garden during State Conference. The admission price schedule was reviewed and adjusted. The Butler's Chest, which has been placed in the upstairs hall, has been cleaned and repaired by The Furniture Doctor at a cost of \$650.00. A cabinet for the Museum Shop has been designed. Ted Baker's bid of \$540.00 also includes building a bottom shelf in the existing part of the cabinet and extending the shelf in the already standing cabinet, \$30.00 is included for repairing the front door to Meadow Garden, Mr. Billy Rosignol has donated a photograph of a painting of George Walton Reab who was George Walton's great grandson, Octavia Levert's grandson, Mr. Rosignol will also donate a painting which he is completing of George Walton in judicial robes. Mrs. Bell has verified that the George Walton Locket is in the possession of the Yale University Peabody Museum. The Augusta Room's wallpaper and crown molding have been removed by Richard Johnson. Patching, crack repair and room replastering is bid at \$800.00 by Junior Grantham, who did the previous plastering. Joey Smalley will charge \$765.00 to sand ceiling and walls, prime ceiling with 1.2.3 latex primer, apply two coats of finish paint on ceiling, prime wall (tint) to match wall paper using 1.2.3 primer. The Augusta Chapter has offered to pay for all wood painting, which includes sanding trim, spot priming bare wood, an additional coat of paint on mantle, caulk cracks and joints fill in blemishes on trim, paint to match trim in Boardroom, two coats of finish paint (dark green on baseboards), at a cost of \$705.00. Meadow Garden is listed, by name, on the Metropolitan Convention and Visitors' Bureau Map of Augusta attractions. A separate picture ad on the page, called a "Supporter" (13/4" wide by 2" tall) would cost \$650.00, plus \$65.00 for production charges. This is an Augusta Pad Map which is circulated by the Convention Bureau. As a form of advertising for Meadow Garden, information was secured from Jeanie Allen, local Corporate Account Executive for Georgia Public Radio, She suggested a 32 word "Spot" which would read, "Morning Edition (one of the "spots" where the ad would be read) is made possible in part by the Daughters of the American Revolution, preserving Meadow Garden, the 1792 Augusta home of Georgia's youngest signer of the Declaration of Independence - Open 10-4 weekdays and weekends by appointment." (Meadow Garden would be listed on the GPR web site, if we had a web site.) Mrs. Baxter moved that a weekly ad on National Public Radio be purchased at a cost of \$33.00 per spot (\$143.00 per month or \$1,716.00 annually.) Motion was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Johnson, **Docents Chairman**, reported that it is difficult to find people interested in serving as docents. Approximately 20 have completed the training class and she has the names of 13 additional prospects.

Mrs. Ward, **Furnishings Chairman**, reported that the antique lantern has been installed in the front hall and that it will be added to the fine arts insurance policy.

Mrs. Cagle, **Landscaping Chairman**, reported that Dan McCall has estimated the pruning of trees, including both mulberry trees, to be \$300.00; Eagle Scouts have planted four apple and three peach trees in the front yard; flowers and vegetables have been planted in the garden; and the Garden Club has completed several plantings. She stated that the Meadow Garden reserved street parking continues to be a problem. By general consent, five additional signs will be installed, one at each parking space, warning violators that their cars will be towed.

Mrs. Elliott, **Museum Shop Chairman**, reported that Vice Chairman, Ms. Betty Love Dubbs, has resigned. Sale of items and the voices sold on the Chem Art ornament at State Conference totaled \$1,063.00. Mrs. Elliott announced that the restoration of the portrait of George Washington by artist, John Trumbull, has been completed. By general consent, the Board agreed to purchase from the artist, Dorothy McClain, Brunswick Chapter, note paper for the Gift Shop, depicting the portrait of Mrs. Julius Y. Talmadge, Georgia's only President General, 1944-1947.

Mrs. Leitch, **Patrons Chairman**, reported that since State Conference, the Patrons account has received \$605.00. The current Patrons Book is filled. Mrs. Hunter requested Mrs. Baxter to order a new book from the National Library Bindery Co. of GA in Roswell. Mrs. Turner presented a check to Meadow Garden in the amount of \$1,325.00 for the repair of the Seth Thomas clock. The repair is to service and rebuild the movement and to refinish the case. Mrs. Turner was warmly thanked for her generous donation.

Mrs. E. Lee Stephenson (Margaret Budd), Sergeant Newton Chapter, offered Meadow Garden a pewter plate, dated 1833. By general consent, this gift was graciously accepted. Mrs. Henry introduced Mr. Miles Whitfield, Consultant, who presented a short slide program on Georgia historic houses and buildings in the Piedmont Region. Questions and discussion followed on plans for the continuing renovation and restoration of Meadow

Garden.

Following the opening prayer by Mrs. Leitch, Mrs. Hunter welcomed the members and thanked them for attending the meeting.

The Secretary read the minutes of the June 5, 200 1, meeting which were approved as read.

Mrs. Baxter, State Treasurer, presented the Summary of Fund Accounts, May 1, 2001 through October 20, 2001, which was reviewed and filed.

Mrs. Henry moved that the payment of a \$2,000.00 bill for the Augusta Room plaster be ratified by the Board as the work has been completed. Motion was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Ward moved that \$4,000.00 be transferred from the Museum Shop checking account to the Maintenance checking account. Motion was seconded and adopted.

A picture of the portrait of George Walton, by artist Billy Rosignol, hanging in Meadow Garden appeared in the *Augusta Chronicle* (Richmond County Neighbors). The clipping with the caption, "Walton back in his home," was circulated for the Board to enjoy.

Mrs. Hunter welcomed Mrs. Virginia G. Linglebach, State Chairman, American Heritage Committee, who gave a brief description and sought the Board's endorsement for a proposed Meadow Garden pamphlet depicting Meadow Garden as the home of George Walton, a brief history of Meadow Garden, the Georgia State Society's restoration project, Meadow Garden's role in the community and acknowledgments. The purpose of the pamphlet is to document and record the ownership, maintenance and restoration of Meadow Garden for the NSDAR Archives as requested by the American Heritage and Conservation National Committee in conjunction with the Curator General. (Special Project 2001-2002). By general consent the request was granted and Mrs. Linglebach was thanked and she excused herself from the meeting.

Mrs. Hunter presented to Mrs. Henry an adding machine and cord for Meadow Garden.

Mrs. Henry, **Museum Chairman**, reported total visitors to date: 284 adults; 315 children; total out of town, 240; total lunches served, 55. She then reported that House Manager, Susan Jackson, is proving to be a good employee. Mrs. Turner moved that the Meadow Garden Board raise the salary of the Manager to \$7.00 an hour. Motion was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Baxter moved that Susan Jackson, House Manager, receive a \$25.00 Christmas bonus. Motion was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Henry stated that the architectural trim has been installed in the Library/Board

Room; the Augusta Room floor has been restored, including the replacement of a termite damaged plank; the house has been pressure washed and touch-up painted at a cost of \$250.00 per the contract with Joey Smalley except that he did not charge for the labor of the two men who washed the house; and the painting estimate for the Best Room and mantle in the Augusta Room is \$1,910.00.

Mrs. Ward moved that Joey Smalley paint the Best Room and trim and re-do the mantle in the Augusta Room for \$1,910.00. Motion was seconded and adopted.

Gordon Blaker, Curator, Augusta Museum of History, has expressed an interest in obtaining from Meadow Garden the Civil War shell casing from the U.S.S. Augusta for a special display from this period. Mrs. Elliott is to inquire from Mr. Dick Kennedy, owner of The Gun Shop in Marietta, as to the appropriate appraiser of old swords. According to the Standing Rules for Meadow Garden Museum, furnishings for the rooms in the newer section of the house should be dated no later than 1850. (See 2001 State Proceedings, page 145.) Mrs. Henry stated that the AAA Association, as a part of their expanded program of self-directed tours which they are inaugurating in Georgia, has invited Meadow Garden to participate. The Meadow Garden Christmas Open House and Centennial Celebration will be held on Saturday, December 1, 200 1, from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. The Augusta Chronicle has offered to print a feature article covering this event and radio and TV stations will be contacted. Price of the tickets will be \$2.00 for everyone over 15 years of age. Refreshments, using old recipes for cookies, etc., and hot punch, will be served.

Randall Floyd has offered a used copy machine to Meadow Garden - complete with cartridges. By general consent, the question on the copying machine was postponed to the January 2002 Board meeting. Mrs. Henry announced that the Augusta Convention Bureau has invited Meadow Garden to participate in its new, one price ticket program which will be known as the "Augusta Grand Slam! "to be launched in January 2002. After learning the details of this new program, no decision was made to participate.

In the absence of the **Docents Chairman**, Mrs. Henry reported there have been two Docents classes resulting in five new docents, making a total of 15 available docents. She stressed the need for many more docents to cover the number of tourists we are now serving. She suggested that the Meadow Garden Standing Rules be amended to include responsible non-DAR members, under supervision, to help with this critical function.

Mrs. Ward, **Furnishings Chairman**, reported the following items have been hung in the Board Room: a collage using existing documents, pictures, etc.; a new picture of George Walton, painted and presented by Billy Rosignol; existing pictures were re-hung by Dr. Ed Johnson; and a 1733 Boston Gazette. Mr. Gordon Blaker, Curator of the Augusta Museum of History, identified and cleaned a 1805 Osborn saber. A shadow box built by Ted Baker, stained by Mrs. Cagle and lined by Mrs. Henry was made to display the saber and has been hung in the Board Room. Several other pictures and mirrors have been cleaned, repaired and re-hung in other areas of the house.

Mrs. Cagle, **Landscaping Chairman**, reported that five signs at a cost of \$53.93 were purchased from Fastsigns. The signs read: "No Hospital Parking Violators will be towed." The garden club continues coming once a month. Mulberry trees at the back and side of house were trimmed, the rose bush on back gate was pruned and fall flowers will be planted before the December Open House. Telephone long distance service was discontinued due to high cost. Eighty cents is still owed on the previous bill and a phone card at a cost of \$17.35 was purchased for long distance use at the house under the control of the House Manager.

Mrs. Elliott, **Museum Shop Chairman**, reported that she attended all four District Workshops with the Meadow Garden Museum Shop open for each meeting. With the assistance of Mrs. W. Franklin Chastain, Vice Chairman, Museum Sales, State Functions, sales totaled \$1,272.85 for the four workshops. New items have been purchased for Fall Board. Note cards and Staffordshire saucers need to be re-ordered. Chem-Art has donated ten U.S. Flag pins for our use or sale.

Mrs. Leitch, **Patrons Chairman**, returned the old Patrons Book and presented the new Patrons Book to Meadow Garden. She reported that from June through October, ten chapters at \$ 100.00 each and 17 members at \$50.00 each have become Patrons for a total of \$2,085.00. Patrons-in-Kind to be named are: Pat Roach for the terra cotta garden markers and new skep (bee hive) home; Billy Rosignol for the new George Walton portrait which he painted and donated; and Margaret Merry for miscellaneous donations.

Mrs. Bell distributed copies of the up-dated Standing Rules for Meadow Garden

Museum. She then moved to amend the Standing Rules for Meadow Garden Board - Section 1, Meadow Garden Board, #4, by striking out: "Of the six (6) appointments made by the State Regent, at least two (2) shall be Honorary State Regents." and substituting:

In addition to the six (6) appointments to the Board which are made by the State Regent, she shall appoint two (2) Honorary State Regents to serve as Advisors to the Board, each of whom shall be given the privilege of the floor without a vote unless also serving as one of the six (6) appointed chairmen.

Rationale: To allow more flexibility in the selection of the Meadow Garden chairmen. Motion was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Henry gave bay leaves from Meadow Garden to the members.

The next meeting of the Board will be held on Tuesday, January 8, 2002, at 10:30 a.m. in the Board Room at Meadow Garden in Augusta.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 2:59 p.m.

The Meadow Garden Museum Board met Tuesday, January 8, 2002, in the Board Room at Meadow Garden in Augusta. With Mrs. Billy W. Hunter, State Regent, presiding as Chairman of the Board, the meeting was called to order at 10:34 a.m. Other members present were: Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr., Secretary; Mrs. John R. Henry; Mrs. S. Davis Lewis; Mrs. Charles H. Turner; Mrs. Kathleen Deck Johnson; Mrs. Jerido Ward; Mrs. Roy H. Cagle; Mrs. James H. Elliott, Jr.; Mrs. James J. Leitch; Mrs. Weston D. Baxter; and ex officio member, Mrs. Theodore C. Whitson.

Following the opening prayer by Mrs. Leitch, Mrs. Hunter welcomed the members and thanked them for attending the meeting.

The Secretary read the minutes of the November 1, 2001, meeting which were approved as corrected.

Mrs. Baxter, State Treasurer, presented the Summary of Fund Accounts, May 1, 200 1., through January 1, 2002, which was reviewed and filed. Mrs. Hunter emphasized that the interest being earned by the Investment Trust Funds is dropping and the monthly income to the House will fall drastically in the coming years.

Mrs. Hunter stated that the Meadow Garden Centennial Open House held on December 1, 2001, was very successful and she showed pictures of this special occasion. She reported that she had sold Meadow Garden items totaling \$167.50 during her District visits. She also stated that she had written several letters thanking donors for various donations made to Meadow Garden.

Mrs. Henry, **Museum Chairman**, reported that the wallpaper and molding have been removed in the Victorian Bedroom by Mr. Johnson at a cost of \$250.00. She has obtained an estimate of \$476.00 to hang 24 single rolls of wallpaper for the walls and ten rolls for the ceiling if the removed wallpaper is replaced.

Mrs. Henry moved that Junior Grantham be paid \$2,500 for needed re-plastering in the Victorian Bedroom beginning January 9, 2002. Motion was seconded and adopted.

Fred Helberg has been contacted in reference to restoring the upstairs bedroom and hall floors, and remaining stairs. He is to make reproduction shutters for the Victorian Bedroom and hall windows which are to match those in the other bedrooms. Mrs. Henry is to contact Joey Smalley to repaint all wood and trim in the bedrooms the same "Snowflake" as the Board Room.

The Cotton Exchange has requested that Meadow Garden reduce its price to them for tours - this being necessary for them to bring tour groups to Meadow Garden. After discussion of charges made by other historic buildings, by general consent, \$3.00 was designated as the Meadow Garden tour price for the Cotton Exchange and Historic Augusta. Mrs. Henry stated that she has been in contact with Lavern McCauley, Director of AAA's Travel Industry Alliances. The "Traveling America" tours are expected to begin in Augusta within the next couple of months. Dr. Ed Johnson purchased and installed a new printer for the computer which he donated to Meadow Garden. He is to help put Meadow Garden's local sales inventory on the computer in order to facilitate reporting. Mrs. Henry has contacted Erick Montgomery, Historic Augusta, to determine their interest in purchasing the

horse hair furniture for the Woodrow Wilson House. It was decided that this furniture should be appraised before moving forward with a possible sale. Mrs. Ted Spivey, Regent, Fort Frederica Chapter, has donated twelve 30 minute prepaid AT&T phone cards as an In-Kind contribution. Miles Whitfield has suggested that the Library/Board Room be used to interpret the House's history. In doing so, more Greek Revival style decor would be used in the Augusta Room after moving the "ladies" from that room to the Board Room. The insulation under the house needs to be replaced and the pipes in the kitchen, the workroom and under the front porch need to be re-wrapped.

Mrs. Johnson, **Docents Chairman**, reported that two training meetings have been held since the last Board meeting. She shared with the group a write-up which appeared in the Waynesboro, Burke County, newspaper. Ms. Susan Jackson, Museum/House Manager, was invited in to report: 55 active docents and 1,030 tourists since January 1, 2001; several Eagle Scouts made visits to plant and care for the fruit trees; and 120 hours were donated in the garden by the Cherokee Rose Garden Club.

Mrs. Ward, **Furnishings Chairman**, reported that Ms. Mary Y. Herndon, Albany, Georgia, has offered to donate four Windsor chairs to Meadow Garden, pictures of which were circulated. Mrs. Ward is to contact Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar in an effort to obtain more information on the chairs. She expressed appreciation to Mrs. Henry for her assistance with furnishings.

Mrs. Cagle, Landscaping Chairman, reported that voices sold on the bird house total \$111.00 thus far. The Cherokee Rose Garden Club assisted with the yard work in anticipation of the December Centennial Open House. A new mat was purchased for the back steps and a new phone was purchased for the house. Mrs. Cagle has made a video tape of the house renovations on the first floor which she showed following the meeting. She would like to have the walk finished from the fence to the back door, plans to plant ajuga and plans to pine straw the area where grass will not grow. The water sprinkler is to be relocated so as to keep the water from hitting the front porch. One sprinkler has been repaired.

Mrs. Elliott, **Museum Shop Chairman**, reported that all items taken to the Fall Board of Management meeting were sold and the patriotic jewelry proved to be very popular. Mrs. W. Franklin Chastain, Vice Chairman, Museum Sales, State Functions, has re-bought and sent items to Meadow Garden four times. A portrait of George Washington in Masonic attire was shown.

Mrs. Leitch, **Patrons Chairman**, reported that from October to December, 14 individuals became Patrons -\$6,845.50 since 2001 State Conference; three chapters became Patrons - \$21,856.00 since the 2001 State Conference; grand total - \$28,701.50. Forty-seven thank you notes were written. Mr. Gordon Blaker, Curator, Augusta Museum of History, is to be named a Patron-in-Kind.

Mrs. Henry moved that the Confederate shell casing on the Meadow Garden inventory be donated to the Augusta Museum of History, Gordon Blaker, Curator, to be used in the Confederate display. Motion was seconded and postponed to the next meeting.

Mrs. Henry moved that Meadow Garden accept the copy machine, including cartridges, offered to Meadow Garden by Randall Floyd. Motion was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Bell moved that a copy of all contracts and invoices pertaining to Meadow Garden be kept in a file at Meadow Garden. Motion was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Cagle offered to donate a two-drawer file cabinet for use in the Meadow Garden office. Mrs. Turner donated a new outdoor USA flag. Mrs. Baxter donated to Meadow Garden, in honor of Mrs. Hunter, a Newhall rice bowl, stand and kettle hook. All of these gifts were graciously accepted.

The next meeting of the Board will be held Thursday, March 7, 2002, at 1:00 p.m. in Meeting Room D, Georgia Center for Continuing Education, University of Georgia, Athens.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 12:30 p.m. following the blessing by Mrs. Leitch.

The Meadow Garden Museum Board met Thursday, March 7, 2002, in Meeting Room C in the Georgia Center for Continuing Education, Athens. With Mrs. Billy W. Hunter,

State Regent, presiding as Chairman of the Board, the meeting was called to order at 1:05 p.m. Other members present were: Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr., Secretary; Mrs. John R. Henry; Mrs. S. Davis Mrs. Jerido Ward; Mrs. Roy H. Cagle; Mrs. James H. Elliott, Jr.; Lewis; Mrs. Charles H. Turner, Mrs. James J. Leitch; Mrs. Weston D. Baxter; and ex officio member, Mrs. Theodore C. Whitson.

Following the opening prayer by Mrs. Leitch, Mrs. Hunter welcomed the members.

The Secretary read the minutes of the January 8, 2002, meeting which were approved as read.

Mrs. Baxter, State Treasurer, presented the Summary of Fund Accounts, May 1, 2001 through February 22, 2002, which was reviewed and filed.

Mrs. Hunter stated that a Meadow Garden article with picture, along with articles on two Georgia DAR chapter houses, is to appear in the May-June issue of the American Spirit DAR Magazine. She said this may be the first issue of the magazine to be sold on newsstands. She gave a letter from Georgia Power Company offering a security light to Mrs. Cagle. It was noted that Meadow Garden already has a security light and lighting on the flag pole. In the past, the cost for the security light was \$5.00 per month.

Mrs. Henry, Museum Chairman, reported that the restoration of the museum continues with the Victorian Bedroom having been re-plastered. Mrs. Ward assisted in selecting the wall paper and in some rearrangement of the furniture in the house. The two older bedrooms have been repainted and, excluding the office, all floors upstairs, the remaining steps and landing have been restored. The restroom, will be painted pale tangerine next Monday and the floor will be restored at an approximate cost of \$556.00. The Outhouse will soon be restored. A window has been built to replace the bottom section of the window in the office. It will soon be installed. A dehumidifier has been installed in the kitchen. The walls need to be re-stuccoed in the kitchen and work room. Mrs. Baxter suggested that heating and air conditioning with return air vents be installed. Piers have been built under the older section of the house for additional needed support. There have been 108 visitors during January and February. New publicity will soon be forthcoming. The AAA program is about to begin. Federal Judge Dudley Bowen is bringing to Meadow Garden a group of judges who will be in Augusta next week for the Circuit Court Meeting. New plates, stainless forks and old checkered table cloths have been purchased to serve front porch luncheon guests. Several groups have been scheduled for this Spring.

Mrs. Henry moved that the telephone poll to have the upstairs floors cleaned with pumice and sandpaper and wiped with turpentine and three pairs of shutters (two for the Victorian Bedroom and one for the hall upstairs) at a cost of \$7,195.44 be ratified. Motion was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Ward, Furnishings Chairman, gave a summary of the past year's work. Chapters contributed \$5,712.56 for furnishings. Donations included: Augusta Chapter, clock repair; Old Herod Chapter, period door knob for upper bedroom; Savannah Chapter, copy of a drawing of Meadow Garden from chapter's yearbook, 1935-1936; and Vidalia Chapter, tea cup and saucer in the Hoby Bird pattern. Donations from Mr. Billy Rosignol included a photograph of a painting of George Walton Reab, George Walton's great grandson and Octavia Levert's grandson, and a painting of George Walton in judicial robes by Mr. Rosignol. An antique lantern has been hung in the downstairs entrance hall and many items have been cleaned and repaired. There has been no response to the letter written on February 7, 2002, in reference to the Windsor chairs offered to Meadow Garden by Ms. Mary Y. Herndon, Albany. Mrs. Ward stated that the shell casing was probably early 1900s (W.W.I era.) Mr. Joseph Logan has been paid \$75.00 for appraising the sofa, settee, parlor chair and man's chair in the Augusta Room - all of which were appraised with a lower value than some years ago. Another appraiser will be sought. During the State Conference, the Savannah Chapter plans to donate to Meadow Garden a chocolate cup and saucer in the Hoby Bird pattern honoring Mrs. Jules Victor, Jr. Mrs. Ward acknowledged the gracious guidance of the chairman, Mrs. Henry, and thanked Mrs. Hunter for the opportunity to continue serving the State Society in this chairmanship.

Mrs. Cagle, Landscaping Chairman, reported that she and Mrs. Henry planted four fruit trees in February. Landscaping donations for the year were \$910.00. The walk from the parking lot to the back walk was finished and the rail fence gate was moved to line up with the walk. An opening was made on the side of the fence for the lawn service to use for their equipment. The weaver's dye garden is progressing. A retaining wall beside the canal was extended to control sprinkler and other water accumulation. Several sprinkler

heads were capped to prevent water from getting under the front porch. A French drain was built along the street side of the house to control moisture collection in the kitchen wall. The rose bushes were trimmed.

Mrs. Elliott, **Museum Shop Chairman**, reported that she and Mrs. W. Franklin Chastain, Vice Chairman, Museum Sales, State Functions, have restocked patriotic items. The wholesale houses have about depleted their inventory and will not restock these items. Other Shop items which have sold out have been restocked. According to the State Treasurer, total Museum Shop sales for the year were \$5,185.23. Mr. Dick Kennedy, owner of The Gun Room in Smyrna said he would appraise/identify the shell casing if measurements and close-up pictures of the shell were sent to him. Mrs. Elliott went to Meadow Garden last week to pack up, with the help of Ms. Susan Jackson, for the sales table at State Conference.

Mrs. Leitch, **Patrons Chairman**, reported that this year there were 49 Individual Patrons for contributions of \$8,255.50; 31 Chapter Patrons for contributions of \$24,154.00; making a total of \$32,409.50 in Patron contributions. She read a note from Ellagene Baker acknowledging the sympathy note sent on behalf of the Meadow Garden Board in memory of Florrie Jackson.

The following amendment to the Standing Rules for Meadow Garden which was proposed by Mrs. Henry, seconded by Mrs. Turner, and mailed to the members of the Board was adopted. It will take effect only if approved by the State Conference.

Section III - Volunteers And Docents -

1. - Amend by striking out the entire #1. and substituting a new #1.

The existing #1. states:

Docents shall be members in good standing of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR.

The new A. would read:

Docents shall be those well screened and trained volunteers who will serve under the direct supervision of a Meadow Garden Museum Chairman and/or the Museum Manager.

Rationale: To help alleviate the shortfall in staffing docents if Meadow Garden is to continue to serve the large number of tourists currently interested in visiting this historic house museum.

Mrs. Elliott told of her experience of going to Meadow Garden recently and the problem of getting up the porch steps covered with thick ice caused by the freezing of the water from the sprinkler system. Mrs. Hunter stated that the water from the sprinkler system cannot continue to hit the house. Mrs. Baxter voiced her concern over the lack of safety due to the design of the back steps. Mrs. Hunter questioned if light fixtures for upstairs had been investigated and/or found. Mrs. Hunter announced that the next meeting of the Board will be held on Tuesday, June 4, 2002, at 10:30 a.m. at Meadow Garden in Augusta. Mrs. Henry stated that it would be nice to extend an invitation for lunch at the next Board meeting to the members of the Cherokee Rose Garden Club who volunteer at Meadow Garden. By general consent, this suggestion was approved.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 2:37 p.m.

Hunter, State Regent, presiding as Chairman of the Board, the meeting was called to order at 10:30 a.m. Other members present were: Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr., Secretary; Mrs. John R. Henry; Mrs. Charles H. Turner; Mrs. Kathleen Deck Johnson; Mrs. Jerido Ward; Mrs. Roy H. Cagle; Mrs. James J. Leitch; Mrs. Weston D. Baxter; and ex officio member, Mrs. Theodore C. Whitson.

Following the opening prayer by Mrs. Leitch, Mrs. Hunter welcomed the members.

Mrs. Hunter questioned the presence of a visitor who was introduced as Mrs. W. Edwin Johnson, Jr., recently installed Regent of College Hill Chapter. It was noted that this was a meeting of Mrs. Hunter's Board which includes Mrs. S. Davis Lewis, Regent, College Hill Chapter, 2000-2002, rather than the 2002-2004 Regent. Mrs. Ward suggested that since there is such confusion with the change of administrations this year, Mrs. Johnson be allowed to remain. Mrs. Hunter welcomed her as a guest.

The Secretary read the minutes of the March 7, 2002, meeting which were approved as corrected

Mrs. Baxter, State Treasurer, presented the Summary of Fund Accounts, May 2, 2002 through June 3, 2002, which was reviewed and filed. A letter was read, dated April 6, 2002 from Betty and Ronald Harrah requesting that their \$5,000.00 contribution to Meadow Garden honoring Mrs. Hunter and designated for "Maintenance" be changed to "Furnishings" to be used for a sofa:or sideboard, etc.

Mrs. Hunter called attention to the article in the American Spirit DAR Magazine featuring Meadow Garden. Mrs. Virginia G. Lingelbach, State Chairman, American Heritage Committee, was credited with taking the photograph of the house. Also circulated was an article with picture of Meadow Garden which appeared in the April 8, 2002 issue of Pie Augusta Chronicle.

Ms. Susan Jackson, House Manager, was invited in to give her report. Since January 1, 2002, total tourists numbered 651 of which 304 were walk-ins. \$1,169.00 was the total income from tours and the Museum Shop sales at Meadow Garden totaled \$905.65. Twenty-six Docents representing nine chapters volunteered 455 hours and 10 minutes. Nine members of the Cherokee Rose Garden Club worked a total of 613/4 combined hours.

Mrs. Henry, Museum Chairman, reported that completed projects include:

(1) The Victorian Bedroom has been papered and the furniture rearranged. (2) The case which was made for the 1805 Saber is now the display case for construction material which was retrieved from the 1792 attic and hall when the ceiling was rebuilt. These items include original brown siding, cedar shakes, lath, pig hair plaster, horse hair plaster and an assortment of hand made nails. (3) The powder room has been painted a bright yellow with white trim. The floor has been stripped, sanded and a protective finish applied. (4) The lower half of the office window was reproduced by Augusta Sash and installed by Ted Baker, Joev Smalley sent a painter to put a finish coat, over the primer applied by Ted Baker and the railing on the front steps has been repaired. (5) The new Meadow Garden sign has been installed in the side yard facing Independence Drive, between the two gates. Scheduled repair work includes re-caulking of the kitchen window, more repair to the front steps and railing, and the addition of an additional hand rail on the back steps. Joey Smalley will replace the insulation on the heat/ac pipes. Ted Baker and Mrs. Henry checked the kitchen wall and found the previous damp areas are dry. He feels that the foundation is all right, but the old plaster needs to be removed and new stucco applied. Most of the kitchen and work room walls do have stucco on them. He needs to replace the molding on the Independence Drive inside kitchen window. Mrs. Henry stated that she had researched protective windows for the exterior of the house and secured some representative prices - West Window Corporation produces the windows which are approved by the Historic Register organization. The aluminum frames have a baked enamel paint and a picture window style which could have a green tint was recommended. Protective windows for the Best Room would be \$283.54 each; Augusta Room, \$355.64; transom, \$192.78; and kitchen, \$286.88. To protect all the windows would cost \$8,000.00 to \$10,000.00. John Owens at Georgia Carolina Construction Company is the local representative. Mrs. Hunter asked that the question of the protective windows be referred to the new Board, Mrs. Henry stated that she had talked to two Windsor Chair manufacturers. The Sack Back chair style, 1750-1825, is the style which would be appropriate for Meadow Garden. They are made from three kinds of wood and can be finished for porch use but would need to have wax applied every two years. \$550.00 would be the approximate cost per chair and delivery time would be eight weeks to five months.

Mrs. Ward moved that four Sack Back chairs, custom made by Chairwright Co., be purchased using the money donated and designated by C.A.R. for this purpose. Approximate cost of each chair is \$550.00. Motion seconded and adopted. This contribution was made in honor of the State Regent.

Mrs. Hunter asked that the question of ordering stationary/note paper and new flyers be referred to the next administration. The AAA program has begun, but Meadow Garden has not yet had any tourists from this effort. Meadow Garden will not be open for the 4th of July due to the lack of a sufficient number of Docents. Mrs. Henry will notify the Augusta Chronicle. Mr. Ed Johnson will be coming to help enter the Museum Shop inventory, The Docent's Manual, record form for Tourists, etc., on the computer.

Mrs. Cagle moved that Mrs. Pat Roach be made a Patron-in-Kind for her donation of

garden markers. Notion was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Johnson. **Docents Chairman**, stated that she had no report except that she continues to beg for Docents. Mrs. Henry has scheduled a Docents' Orientation program for June 14 with three ladies signed up to participate. She will be contacting several more who may be interested.

Mrs. Ward, Furnishings Chairman, showed candlesticks donated by Mary Elizabeth Jackson and a wagon chair donated by Dorothy Hoff. Mrs. Baxter donated a Victorian, antique doll trunk to Meadow Garden in honor of Mrs. Hunter.

Mrs. Ward moved that an appraisal by an expert of any Meadow Garden item, including furniture, shall be made prior to consideration of the sale of such item or furniture. Motion was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Cagle, Landscaping Chairman, reported that her husband had closed off the heads of the sprinkler system that were spraying water on the front and back steps. Several new heads have been installed and the heads that were cut off will be rerouted. The balance in the Landscaping account is \$892.06. The vinca ground cover around the back porch is being replaced with pine straw. The Cherokee Rose Garden Club continues to come once a month to work in the Weavers Garden and, time permitting, in other areas of the yard.

Mrs. Leitch, **Patrons Chairman**, reported that a shadow box, to hold items found in the walls of Meadow Garden, has been given by Joan Millar. This gift was made in loving memory of Betty Jo Hopkins and Helen Boyd whose families have been informed of the memorial by the Patrons Chairman. As of April 30, 2002, the total received from Patrons for the upkeep and restoration of Meadow Garden is \$8,505.50.

It was noted that the fire extinguishers need to be serviced.

Since the markings on the shell casing cannot be read, Mrs. Bell will take the piece to Atlanta for inspection by Mr. Dick Kennedy, owner of The Gun Shop.

Mrs. Leitch moved that no items shall be stored at Meadow Garden except those listed on the inventory or purchased for sale in the Museum Shop. Motion was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Henry stated that she would be meeting Tommie Elaine Shattuck in Madison next week to see about having the old dress in the upstairs bedroom cleaned. No light fixtures for upstairs have yet been found.

Mrs. Baxter moved that W.E. Warner Mechanical install heating vents and air conditioning in the lower level of Meadow Garden at a cost of \$4,791.28. Motion was seconded and adopted.

Following adjournment at 12:17 p.m., luncheon was served on the porch. Members of the Cherokee Rose Garden. Club were guests of the Board. While gathered on the porch, Mrs. Hunter presented two Meadow Garden Patron-in-Kind certificates: one to Pat Roach for making and donating terra cotta plant markers and for her donation of another bee skep. The second certificate was presented to the Cherokee Rose Garden Club for their continuing maintenance of the Weavers Garden.

Standing Rules for Meadow Garden Museum

MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

- 1. The governing body of a museum, in this instance the Meadow Garden Board, serves the public interest as it relates to Meadow Garden, and must consider itself accountable to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, as well as to Meadow Garden; members should not attempt to act in their individual capacities, but all actions should be taken as a Board, Committee, or otherwise in conformance with the Standing Rules, the Act of Incorporation, or applicable Resolutions.
- 2. The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the three (3) Trustees as named in the Deed from the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, conveying Meadow Garden to the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution; namely, the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the State Chairman of Meadow Garden who is appointed by the State Regent; the Chapter Regents of the Augusta Chapter and the College Hill Chapter, both chapters being located in Augusta, who shall serve as Vice Chairmen to the State Chairman of Meadow Garden; the State Treasurer; and five of the chairmen of Meadow Garden Committees, as appointed by the State Regent.
- No Georgia Daughter shall serve in the same Meadow Garden Chairmanship more than three (3) consecutive terms.
- 4. In addition to the six (6) appointments to the Board which are made by the State Regent, she shall appoint two (2) Honorary State Regents to serve as Advisors to the Board, each of whom shall be given the privilege of the floor without a vote unless also serving as one of the six (6) appointed chairmen.
- 5. The State Second Vice Regent shall serve as ex officio member of the Meadow Garden Board, being given the privilege of the floor without a vote.
- The State Regent shall serve as Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board, and the State First Vice Regent shall serve as Secretary of the Meadow Garden Board.
- 7. The Meadow Garden Board shall meet a minimum of three (3) times each year; namely, preceding Fall Board of Management meeting, preceding annual State Conference and following Continental Congress, and at such other times as deemed necessary by the Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board. At least one (1) meeting of the Board shall be held at Meadow Garden each year.
- 8. The Meadow Garden Board shall have jurisdiction over the operation, maintenance and work of Meadow Garden and shall be the authority for Meadow Garden as long as such authority is not in conflict with the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, the Act of Incorporation for the Georgia State Society, Resolutions adopted by the Georgia State Society and/or directions which from time to time may be approved by action of the Georgia State Society assembled at its annual State Conference.
- The Meadow Garden Board shall supervise the placing of all insurance to cover the grounds and the Museum with its contents, including the fine arts, with accredited companies - coverage to include fire, theft and liability.
- 10. Five (5) voting members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.
- 11. Minutes shall be kept of each meeting and a copy shall be sent to each member and printed verbatim in the State Proceedings.
- 12. All expenses for maintenance, operation and purchases of furnishings and plantings shall be authorized by the State Regent, as Chairman of the Board, and paid by the State Treasurer. Expenditures exceeding \$1,000.00 must have the majority approval of the Board.
- 13. These rules will be binding on the actions of the Board in their operation of Meadow Garden. They may be changed by the following procedure: Members of the Board must have written notification of proposed changes one month prior to the next meeting of the Board; a two-thirds vote of the Board and approval of the State Conference are necessary to effect a change.

II OPERATIONS

- Everyone entering Meadow Garden will be requested to sign the Register, including date, time of arrival and time of departure.
- 2. No more than fifteen (15) people with each Docent are to be on tour in the house at a

- given time. Excess of this number may wait in the reception room or in the garden. The Museum Manager has the authority to enforce the Meadow Garden rules at all times.
- 3. There will be no smoking in Meadow Garden.
- 4. No refreshments are to be served in or taken into the Museum by visitors, including chapters or the public. Should a group, such as a visiting chapter, desire refreshments. the garden is available for use if litter is properly disposed of by the serving group.
- Tour visitors will be asked to pay a fee as set by the Board.
- There will be only five (5) complete sets of keys to Meadow Garden and three (3) keys to the gates of Meadow Garden. Keys are to be returned after each administration. New locks may be required. Distribution of keys: Gate Only: Augusta Police Department, Georgia Power, and Sizemore Security; Gate and House: Chairman of Meadow Garden Board, Meadow Garden Chairman, Museum Manager, Docents Chairman and Landscaping Chairman.

VOLUNTEERS AND DOCENTS

- 1. Docents, shall be those well screened and trained volunteers who will serve under the direct supervision of a Meadow Garden Museum Chairman and/or the Museum Manager.
- 2. Duties of docents shall include acting as guides, hostesses, working in museum shop, working in yard, cleaning in house, public relations. No volunteer work at or for Meadow Garden shall be done except under the direct guidance of the Meadow Garden Board and the chairman of the specific committee for that particular function.
- 3. Cleaning or yard work volunteers shall be under the direction of the Museum Manager.

FURNISHINGS

- 1. Items bought or accepted for the older section of Meadow Garden must pre-date 1821.
- 2. Furnishings for the two (2) main floor rooms and two (2) upstairs rooms in the newer section may be dated post 1820 but these rooms should be considered companion rooms to the rest of the house and furnished accordingly with all efforts made to keep furnishings of these four rooms dated no later than 1850. The Augusta Room furnishings will remain as they were in 1982.
- 3. Reproductions may be used only when the physical condition of the antiques is jeopardized by exposure in areas where large numbers of visitors have easy access; or when environmental conditions including excessive light, dust, humidity or airborne impurities pose a threat to the preservation of originals.
- Effective March 12, 1983 all items donated to Meadow Garden shall be accepted with the written condition that they become the property of Meadow Garden and may be used, replaced or sold at the discretion of the Meadow Garden Board only.
- 5. All items that post date 1821, with the exception of those in the six (6) rooms of the newer section and those described in Number 3 of this section, shall be replaced as soon as possible with similar items pre-dating 1821.
- 6. Once an item is placed, it shall not be moved from one location to another without permission of the Meadow Garden Board. Only the Chairman of the Board may approve the removal of an item from the house, if it is in need of repair or refinishing.
- 7. Any item donated or purchased must have written documentation of appraisal.
- 8. A file will be kept of all assets with information as to price paid or market value, date of acquisition, donor or where bought, documentation and appraisal and a description of article. One file will be kept in the reception room accessible to the Docents; a duplicate file will be in the possession of the Chairman of the Board.
- 9. All items purchased or donated will be added to the Fine Arts insurance policy. Said policy will be reviewed and updated a minimum of once a year. Major additions to furnishings will be added immediately.
- 10. Future plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the Museum.

LANDSCAPING

- 1. The landscape plan adopted by the Board shall be adhered to with no deviation unless recommended by an authority on landscape design and care.
- 2. Donations of shrubbery, plants or trees shall be accepted only when item is part of the master plan.
- 3. Work on the grounds will be under the sole direction of the Meadow Garden Board and

VI MUSEUM SHOP

- The Museum Shop will be operated by a committee appointed by the Chairman of the Board and will be responsible to the Board.
- Chairman of the committee will be responsible for all purchases, subject to the approval of the Board or the State Regent.
- Museum Shop operation will be self-supporting. In the event funds are needed for purchases, they may be advanced from available Meadow Garden funds and must be considered a loan and shall be repaid without interest within one (1) year from date of borrowing.
- 4. Profit from the Museum Shop shall be accounted for within the State Treasurer's books, with a percentage being transferred at the discretion of the Board at the end of the fiscal year and placed in the Maintenance Account. The audit of the Museum Shop operation shall be included in the annual audit of the Georgia State Society.

VII PATRONS

- 1. Donors to the following categories are eligible to be known as Patrons:
 - A. Meadow Garden Capital Investment Trust Fund
 - B. Furnishings
 - C. Maintenance
 - D. Landscape
- Gifts of a minimum value of \$50.00 to any of the above categories automatically qualifies the donor as a Patron.
- 3. Chapter or group gifts of a minimum value of \$100.00 or more, above the State Honor Roll requirements, automatically qualifies that chapter or group as a Patron.
- 4. The State Treasurer will report these gifts to the Patrons Chairman.
- The Patrons Chairman will issue certificates to the qualifying individuals and chapters or groups.
- 6. A permanent book will be kept on public display at Meadow Garden to record Patrons.
- The Patrons Chairman will enter the names of donors in the appropriate book a minimum of once a year.

VIII

PLAQUES & MARKERS

- Plaques/Markers may be placed at Meadow Garden only at the discretion of the Board, and request meets the following criteria:
 - A. Substantial service and/or contributions that secured the property and the heritage for the GSDAR;
 - B. Individuals so recognized shall have been deceased for at least 5 years;
 - C. Plaque/Marker will be paid for by person(s) requesting such recognition.
- Such plaques will be permanently displayed at Meadow Garden and a record of the honoree's service and/or contribution will be recorded and placed in the Meadow Garden file, with Board approval.
- Plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the Museum. Additional markers shall not be permanently placed on the grounds.

Bylaws

BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUNTION

Article I NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II

The objects of this Society shall be:

- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.
- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of the Georgia State Society.

Article IV

<u>Section 1.</u> The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian and a State Curator.

Section 2. (a) To be eligible for state office, a member shall hold and have held membership in a chapter or chapters within the Georgia State Society for at least 5 years prior to her election and have served a full term as chapter officer or state chairman

- (b) No member shall be eligible to the same state office for two (2) successive terms. A member having served more than one half of a term in a state office shall be deemed to have served a term.
- (c) No two state officers shall be members of the same chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

(d) To be eligible for the office of State Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State First Vice Regent or as State Second Vice Regent or served in each of these two offices of the Georgia Society.

(e) To be eligible for the office of State First Vice Regent or for the office of State Second Vice Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State Recording Secretary or as State Treasurer of the Georgia State Society and shall have served a full term as a Chapter Regent of a chapter in the Georgia State Society.

<u>Section 3.</u> In recognition of valuable service to the Georgia State Society, a State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent for life by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Article V NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. (a) A candidate for state office shall request the endorsement of her chapter, taken by vote at a regular meeting of the chapter held between May and January preceding the State Conference at which state elections are held. The endorsement, signed by the Chapter Recording Secretary, shall include the office the candidate seeks and shall be received by the State Regent with the candidate's statement of intent to be a candidate prior to any announcement or campaigning by the candidate and/or her supporters.

(b) A candidate for State Regent who wishes to present a slate of officers shall send to the State Regent in one packet the chapter endorsements and the statements of intent for each of her selected candidates. If received by the State Regent no later than December 1, these candidates shall be listed as a slate in the State Regent's

December letter and Call to State Conference.

(c) Candidates wishing to run independently of a slate, whose chapter endorsements and statements of intent are received by the State Regent no later than December 1 shall be listed as independent candidates in the State Regent's December letter and Call to State Conference.

- (d) A candidate whose chapter endorsement and statement of intent have been properly received by the State Regent may choose to announce her candidacy separate from the State Regent's December letter and Call to State Conference. Such a chapter endorsement and statement of intent shall be received by the State Regent at least ten (10) days prior to the opening of the State Conference at which the election is to take place.
- (e) A candidate who does not meet the requirements of these Bylaws shall be declared disqualified and ineligible for consideration for state office.
- (f) A chapter shall endorse no more than one chapter member for state office per election with the possible exception of candidates for State Regent and for State Corresponding Secretary.
- (g) In the event of the death, incapacitation or withdrawal of a candidate prior to the election, a replacement shall be made with notification in writing to the State Regent and accompanied by the chapter endorsement and statement of intent as directed by these Bylaws.

<u>Section 2.</u> Nominations of candidates for all state offices shall be made at a designated meeting of the State Conference.

<u>Section 3.</u> The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected biennially by ballot at the State Conference. A majority vote shall elect.

<u>Section 4.</u> The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two (2) years or until their successors are elected. Their terms of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Section 5. (a) Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become State Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become State First Vice Regent subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. Vacancies in other state offices shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next State Board of Management meeting or State Conference, whichever shall come first.

(b) Any state officer who is absent from the state for a continuous period of six (6) months or longer shall automatically relinquish her position as a state officer.

<u>Section 6.</u> Upon the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Organizing Secretary General.

<u>Section 7.</u> (a) A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot.

- (b) The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than fifteen (15) months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.
- (c) The endorsement shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent with the candidate's name and address to the Recording Secretary General to be received by April 1 preceding the designated Continental Congress.

Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

<u>Section 1.</u> The officers of the Georgia State Society shall perform the duties prescribed in this article, and parliamentary authority adopted by the Society, and such others as the State Board of Management and the National Society may require.

Section 2. The State Regent shall:

(a) be the chief executive officer and the official spokesman for the State Society;

(b) have general supervision of the affairs of the State Society;

- (c) preside at all meetings of the State Conference, State Board of Management and the Executive Committee:
- (d) appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society;

(e) be ex-officio a member of all committees;

- (f) appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as advisor in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting;
- (g) sign all contracts and agreements made in the name of the Georgia State Society with the recorded approval of the Executive Committee and the State Board of Management or the State Conference as directed by these Bylaws;

(h) be bonded and have the authority to draw upon funds of the State Society with

the approval of the Finance Committee.

(i) recommend to the Finance Committee a Certified Public Accountant who shall be approved by the Finance Committee.

Section 3. The State First Vice Regent shall:

(a) perform the duties of the office of State Regent in the absence or inability of the State Regent;

(b) fill a vacancy in the office of State Regent;

- (c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;
- (d) serve on those committees as designated by these Bylaws and as directed by the State Regent.

Section 4. The State Second Vice Regent shall:

(a) perform the duties of the office of State First Vice Regent in the absence or inability of the State First Vice Regent;

(b) fill a vacancy in the office of State First Vice Regent;

(c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;

(d) serve on committees as directed by the State Regent.

Section 5. The State Chaplain shall:

- (a) open all meetings of the State Conference and the State Board of Management with scripture reading and prayer;
- (b) preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and conduct such other religious services as may be required;
 - (c) be custodian of state properties pertaining to the duties of this office;
 - (d) be responsible for IN MEMORIAM pages in the Proceedings.

Section 6. The State Recording Secretary shall:

(a) record the proceedings of the meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;

(b) compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under

the supervision of the State Regent and the Proceedings Committee;

(c) submit to the appropriate National officers, the endorsement for Vice President General and the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent before April 1 of the year in which said balloting was held;

Section 7. The State Corresponding Secretary shall:

- (a) conduct correspondence and send notices on behalf of the State Regent, the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as may be directed by them;
- (b) receive from the chapters the consolidated reports and distribute to the appropriate state chairmen.

Section 8. The State Organizing Secretary shall:

- (a) assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new chapters;
- (b) assist chapters in conjunction with appropriate state officers and chairmen in revitalization.

Section 9. The State Treasurer shall:

(a) be bonded:

- (b) be the custodian of the funds of the State Society, placing them in institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance;
- (c) receive the state dues and State Conference registration fees from the chapters and receive all sums contributed by the chapters for state and national projects, disbursing monthly to the Treasurer General all funds designated for national projects;

(d) disburse other funds only when authorized by the State Regent in writing;

- (e) keep an account of all sums received or disbursed by using the basic double entry form of bookkeeping according to accepted accounting procedures and keep receipts for all transactions;
- (f) prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference, sending a copy to the State Chairman of the Finance Committee ten (10) days in advance of each meeting:
- (g) be a member of the Finance Committee and an ex-officio member of the Credentials Committee:
- (h) balance and prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year; said audit by a Certified Public Accountant, shall be performed and delivered within forty-five (45) days of receipt of books.

Section 10. The State Registrar shall:

- (a) when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American revolution prove eligibility and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars;
 - (b) keep a correct list of all members in the state;
 - (c) report on membership to the State Conference;
- (d) be in possession of the computer and software owned by the Georgia State Society and see that it is maintained.

Section 11. The State Historian shall:

- (a) be in charge, within the state, of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General as well as those authorized by the Georgia State Society;
- (b) keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves within the state:
 - (c) prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General:
- (d) promote the study of American history, state and county history and historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the founding of our state and counties.

Section 12. The State Librarian shall:

- (a) serve as liaison between the Librarian General and the Georgia Chapters and disseminate general information on the NSDAR Library;
- (b) cooperate with the director of the Georgia Department of Archives and History, making the needs of the Archives known to the chapters;
- (c) collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing them wherever accepted in such libraries and Archives as may be chosen by the State Board of Management;
- (d) solicit, with the approval of the Executive Committee, contributions from the chapters for purchase of such books as requested by the office of the Librarian General, and/or the various libraries in Georgia which the State Society approves;
- (e) receive gifts of books and other printed material from the chapters to be donated to the approved libraries and Archives:
- (f) maintain a constant supply of bookplates to the NSDAR Library, the Georgia Department of Archives and History and for purchase by the chapters.

Section 13. The State Curator shall:

- (a) receive and be responsible for all gifts of Revolutionary relics to the Museum of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution;
- (b) be custodian of the State properties and shall have them properly stored and made ready for use at state meetings.

<u>Section 14.</u> All officers will keep a Procedure Book of Instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new officers to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. State Conference:

- (a) The annual meeting of the Georgia State Society shall be known as the State Conference. It shall be for the purpose of:
 - (1) receiving reports of officers, committees and Chapter Regents;

(2) electing officers biennially:

- (3) promoting programs in furtherance of the objects of the Society;
- (4) any other business that may arise:

i. annual budget shall be adopted,

- ii. all projects of the State Society requiring funding shall be voted upon at State Conference or ratified by members at State Conference if previously voted upon by the State Board of Management.
- iii. no project extending beyond the term of the presiding officer may be accepted at any meeting other than by vote at State Conference.
- (b) The State Conference will be held between February 1 and the time of the meeting of Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week;

(c) The State Regent shall fix the time and place of meetings;

(d) The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credentials form to the chapters not less than sixty (60) days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 2. The voting members of the State Conference shall be:

- (a) the officers and Honorary State Regents of the State Society;
- (b) the officers and honorary officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state;
- (c) the Chapter Regent, or in her absence, the Vice Regent or alternate of each chapter;
- (d) delegates or alternates of each chapter of the state as designated by the Bylaws of the National Society for representation at Continental Congress;
 - (e) one additional delegate from each chapter in the state.
- Section 3. Only a chapter member in good standing whose credentials have been completed in accordance with the instructions of the State Regent and the State

Credentials Chairman for the State Conference and in accordance with the Standing Rules of the National Society shall be eligible to represent her chapter at state and national meetings.

<u>Section 4.</u> A member shall have belonged to a chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the chapter, except in the case

of the Regent or Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

<u>Section 5.</u> A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at an annual State Conference, shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.

<u>Section 6.</u> Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the state of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference the privilege of the floor shall be accorded to the State Chairmen. They may not vote unless they are duly

registered as voters of the State Conference.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Society may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen (15) days' notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

<u>Section 9.</u> Forty-five (45) voting members, representing not less than twenty (20) chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

<u>Section 1.</u> The state officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents and the Regents, or in their absence, the Vice Regents of the chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

<u>Section 2.</u> The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the fall, following the October meeting of the National Board. It may meet whenever called by the State Regent. A minimum of twenty (20) days' notice shall be given as to the time and place of any such meeting.

Section 3. Thirty (30) members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of

Management.

<u>Section 4.</u> The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference or as proscribed by these Bylaws.

<u>Section 5.</u> State chairmen, vice chairmen, committee members of the National and Standing Committees and one (1) member from each chapter shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privilege of the floor, but may not vote.

<u>Section 6.</u> The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article IX EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

<u>Section 1.</u> The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

<u>Section 2.</u> The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, shall attend the meetings, but may not vote.

Section 3. This Executive Committee shall:

(a) perform such duties of the State Board of Management between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient;

(b) meet at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three (3) members of the committee;

(c) vote by teleconference if necessary;

(d) receive and make recommendations for projects requiring expenditure of funds outside routine expenditures to be considered by the State Conference;

(e) make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

<u>Section 4.</u> Decisions of the Executive Committee shall be acted upon at the next meeting of the State Board of Management or at State Conference, whichever shall come first.

Article X

<u>Section 1.</u> (a) The fiscal year of the Georgia State Society shall be May 1 through the last day of April.

(b) The annual budget, prepared by the Finance Committee, shall cover the fiscal year and be prepared on the basis of dues payable for the calendar year beginning December first preceding.

Section 2. (a) The annual dues of chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be \$7.00 for each member of the chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before

December 1.

(b) The Finance Committee shall determine the per capita amount and distribution according to the annual membership count. The per capita amount and distribution shall be indicated on the budget presented annually.

<u>Section 3.</u> (a) Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the state dues, a conference registration fee of five dollars (\$5.00) for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under these Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether chapter is represented or not.

(b) State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the five dollars (\$5.00)

conference fee at the time of registration.

(c) Other members of the Georgia State Society who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay three dollars (\$3.00) conference fee at the time of registration.

Section 4. (a) The State Treasurer and the State Regent and such others entrusted with funds of the Georgia State Society as may be designated by the State Board of

Management shall be bonded. (See Article VI, Sections 2 and 9);

(b) The State Treasurer with the approval of the State Regent and the State Chairman of the Finance Committee shall place the funds of the Georgia State Society in financial institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage;

(c) The placement of restricted savings funds and investment funds of the Georgia State Society shall be placed to the credit of the Georgia State Society by the State Treasurer under the direction of the Finance Committee. Monies may be invested in U. S. Treasury obligations or other interest bearing obligations of federally insured

financial institutions;

(d) The accounts of the State Treasurer shall be annually prepared for audit by a Certified Public Accountant immediately following the end of the State Society fiscal

year and no later than May 15 and delivered to the CPA by that date;

(e) Should the State Treasurer be incapacitated, the State Regent, after consultation with the Chairman of the Finance Committee and with the approval of the Executive Committee, shall appoint an Acting State Treasurer to serve until such time as the State Treasurer is able to resume her duties or a new State Treasurer is appointed and ratified as stated in Article V, Section 5 (a).

Section 5. The expenses incurred by the State Regent in the performance of duty

shall be paid each year from the State Dues Fund:

(a) Four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00) shall be taken each year to defray her necessary travel expenses;

(b) Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent, as budgeted, shall be paid by the State Treasurer who shall keep all receipts of these expenses. No expenses exceeding the budgeted amount shall be paid by the State Treasurer.

<u>Section 6.</u> At the close of the books annually, \$3,000.00 shall be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies Fund" so that at the end of each administration a total of \$6,000.00 will be reserved. This money is to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration.

Article XI COMMITTEES

Section 1. The State Regent shall appoint the following standing committees:

- (a) Bylaws: An Honorary State Regent shall be appointed as chairman and the committee shall be composed of two (2) other Honorary State Regents and one (1) member from each district:
- (b) Finance: This committee shall be composed of seven (7) members to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two (2) Honorary State Regents, one (1) active chapter regent and one (1) active chapter member. One of the two Honorary State Regents shall be appointed chairman. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund. This committee shall have charge of all investments of the Georgia State Society funds.
- (c) Resolutions: This committee shall be composed of all Honorary State Regents, the State Parliamentarian and three (3) chapter members;
- (d) Proceedings: This committee shall be composed of the State Recording Secretary, the immediate past State Recording Secretary, State First Vice Regent and four (4) additional Daughters, at least one of whom shall be an Honorary State Regent.
- <u>Section 2</u>. The State Regent shall appoint such other committees, standing or special, as the State Conference shall authorize and actions of the State Board of Management and of the National Society shall require. The appointments shall be concurrent with the term of the State Regent making the appointments and shall terminate with the end of the administration.
- <u>Section 3</u>. No additional appointments to any of the committees shall be made after the roster of chairmen and committees has been compiled and sent to the chapters. Vacancies shall be filled by the State Regent with timely notification to the membership.

<u>Section 4</u>. The duties of committees shall be such as these Bylaws, the State Conference, the State Board of Management or the National Society shall prescribe.

<u>Section 5.</u> All chairmen will keep a Procedure Book of instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

ARTICLE XII CHAPTERS

<u>Section 1.</u> To expedite the work of the Society, the chapters of the Georgia State Society shall be placed in geographical districts:

- (a) A chairman appointed by the State Regent shall coordinate the work of all chapters as needed; she shall be titled "Coordinator of Districts":
- (b) Each district shall have a Director appointed by the State Regent to work as a committee under the direction and supervision of the Coordinator of Districts and the State Regent.

<u>Section 2.</u> Chapter elections shall be held no later than April in the year of chapter elections. The Chapter Regent shall report annually the names of the elected officers promptly on the form provided by the State Regent for this purpose, with copies to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, and the State Recording Secretary.

Section 3. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent, the State Recording Secretary, and the District Director by February 1.

Article XIII MEADOW GARDEN MUSEUM

Meadow Garden, property owned by the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, shall be operated as follows:

(a) The governing body shall be the Board of Trustees composed of the following members: the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Chairman who shall be appointed by the State Regent;

(b) The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the following members: the State Regent who shall serve as Chairman; the State First Vice Regent who shall serve as Secretary; the Chairman of Meadow Garden; the Regents of the Augusta and College Hill Chapters; the State Treasurer; and the chairmen of the five (5) subcommittees appointed by the State Regent; Docents, Furnishings, Landscaping, Museum Shop, Patrons;

(c) The Meadow Garden Board shall operate with Standing Rules approved by the State Conference

Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

<u>Section 1.</u> The current edition of "Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised," shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law in matters not covered by these Bylaws.

<u>Section 2.</u> The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

Article XV AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent, the State Parliamentarian, and the State Bylaws Chairman. The State Regent shall send a copy to each chapter, at least sixty (60) days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the Call to Conference.

<u>Section 2.</u> Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

Article XVI DISSOLUTION

Although the period of duration of the Georgia State Society is perpetual, if for any reason the State Society is to be dissolved or otherwise terminated, no part of the property of the Society or any of the proceeds shall be distributed to or inure to the benefit of any of the officers or members of the Society. Upon the dissolution of the Georgia State Society, assets shall be distributed by the Board of Management and/ or the Executive Committee to and only to the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the local United States District Court, exclusively to such organization or organizations as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated within the meaning of section 501 (c)(3), with purposes and objectives consistent with those of the Georgia State Society.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21.) No Conference was held in 1911; the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P.W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912"; amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, p. 211.)

Items of Information

ABSOLUTE DEADLINE FOR PROCEDDINGS MATERIAL

WHEREAS, a definite deadline must be established and adhered to for all reports and material to be in the hands of the Proceedings Committee in order to be delivered to the printer by June 1.

RESOLVED: That all FINAL reports and materials must be received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1 with the exception of the Auditor's Report and any information sent out by the National DAR Headquarters. This does not alter the requirement in the "Items of Information" in the Proceedings that all reports shall be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary on or before February 15, the ORIGINAL being sent to the Secretary for the Proceedings.

AND FURTHER RESOLVED: This policy will be strictly adhered to and the material not received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1 will be omitted from the Proceedings.

AWARDS

All chapters competing for awards must send reports to the respective chairmen by February 1.

All reports for awards are based on membership confirmed by the National Society. SEE FIGURE BESIDE CHAPTER NAME IN CHAPTER REGENTS' DIRECTORY.

BYLAWS

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National and State Bylaws.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS

Notice of change of address of members shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent and the State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHANGE OF NAME

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent and the State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHAPTER ELECTIONS

As soon as chapter elections are held, names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, 1776 D Street, NW, Washington, D.C. 20006-5303, the State Regent or the State Regent-Elect, the State Recording Secretary and the State Corresponding Secretary by May 1. The full Christian name of chapter officers shall be given, along with her husband's given name or initials, address, zip code, telephone number, fax and e-mail. In accordance with the National Bylaws, a Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years.

CHAPTER REPRESENTATION AT STATE AND NATIONAL MEETINGS

At the State Board of Management, a chapter is represented by the Chapter Regent, or in her absence by the First Vice Regent, and one non-voting member.

The voting representation of each chapter at the State Conference shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received by the State Treasurer **by December 1**. Membership less than 50: Regent, 1 Delegate, 4 Alternates, total votes 2; 50-199: Regent, 2 Delegates, 6 Alternates, total votes 3; 200-299: Regent, 3 Delegates, 8 Alternates, total votes 4; 300-399: Regent, 4 Delegates, 10 Alternates, total votes 5.

The voting representation of each chapter at Continental Congress shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received in the Office of the Treasurer General **by December 1**. Membership less than 50: Regent, 0 Delegate, 2 Alternates, total votes 1; 50-199: Regent, 1 Delegate, 4 Alternates, total votes 2; 200-299: Regent, 2 Delegates, 6 Alternates, total votes 3; 300-399: Regent, 3 Delegates, 8 Alternates, total votes 4.

CONFERENCE REGISTRATION FEE

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer with the state dues on or before December 1, \$5.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether represented or not.

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$5.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters, shall pay a \$3.00 Conference fee at the time of registration.

CONTRIBUTIONS

All contributions by chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

DATE FOR ANNUAL AUDIT

WHEREAS, every effort must be made to have all material to the printer as early as possible, to facilitate delivery of the Proceedings to the members.

RESOLVED: That the end of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, fiscal year for audit purposes be changed from May 31 to April 30.

DECEASED MEMBERS

Deaths shall be reported promptly to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Chaplain and the State Registrar by the corresponding Chapter officer. Complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and date of death shall be furnished to the State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for Conference Memorial Service and for State Proceedings.

DUES

Before December 1 the Chapter Treasurer sends to the State Treasurer state dues of \$7.00 per member. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the December through April Board meetings of the National Society.

Before December 1 the Chapter Treasurer sends to the office of Organizing Secretary General National dues of \$25.00 per member except Life Members, with check made payable to the Treasurer General, NSDAR.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS

To insure uniformity and convenience in binding, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, 8 1/2 x 11 inches, with 1 1/2 inches from top of page, 1 1/2 to 2 inches on left side, 1 inch on right side and at bottom. Four copies shall be sent to the State Chairman of Genealogical Records. The booklet, "Instructions for Copying Source Records and Their Preparation for Library Use," should be obtained from the office of the Corresponding Secretary General.

GEORGIA HOSPITALITY FUND

The following resolution appears in the Proceedings for 1955 and was amended in 2001:

WHEREAS, the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds a social event in Washington during Continental Congress which necessities expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$500.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this fund shall not be cumulative.

INFORMATION FOR CHAPTER REGENTS

1) All letters received by Chapter Regents relating to the work of the Society shall be distributed to the corresponding Chapter officer or chairman and brought to the attention of the members at a chapter meeting.

2) Please follow Resolution # 11, adopted at Georgia's 61st State Conference, which reads as follows: "Resolved, that a closing date of February 1 be established for all reports, and all reports be given from February 1 to February 1, regardless of a change of regime or Regent." All awards will be made on this date basis.

INFORMATION FOR STATE OFFICERS AND STATE CHAIRMEN

State Officers and State Chairmen shall send to the State Regent and the State Treasurer a copy of any instruction letter mailed to chapters.

NEW ADMINISTRATION RESERVE FOR CONTINGENCIES FUND

For the entire resolution setting up the "General New Regime Fund Balance of \$2,500.00," found on pages 203-204 of the 1979 Proceedings, the following substitute resolution was adopted by the 88th State Conference:

RESOLVED, that at the end of each administration \$6,000.00 be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies Fund," this money to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration, and to pay initial operating cost of the new administration. All other surplus monies in the General Fund, other than funds which are designated, are to be divided equally between the General Savings Account and the Georgia State Society Endowment Fund.

The following resolution was adopted at the 104th State Conference: Whereas, the Georgia State Society is sole owner of Meadow Garden and is responsible for all costs of maintenance and operation of this historic property in Augusta; and, Whereas, surplus funds over and above the \$6,000.00 designated for a new administration to be used for the payment of the Proceedings of the previous administration and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration is allocated for specific savings or money market accounts; Resolved that such available funds over and above said \$6,000.00 be designated as one half to Meadow Garden Maintenance Money Market account, to be transferred to one of the certificates of deposit at such time as a certificate is renewed; and the remaining one half to be deposited to the Georgia State Society General Fund money market account; and, Be It Further Resolved that this resolution replace all previous directives for said surplus, namely those adopted in 1976 and in 1991.

This transaction is to be handled by April 30 every two years, before the auditors close out the books of an administration, thus making the General Fund show the same balance of \$6,000.00 at the beginning of each new administration. This fund is to be known as "New Administration Reserve for Contingencies Fund."

NOMINATIONS

The following resolution which applies to the announcement of the candidacy for State Regent appears in the Proceedings of the 20th State Conference, 1918:

RESOLVED, that it is the judgment of the Executive Board that announcements for State Regent should not be made . . . earlier than three months prior to the meeting of the Conference and they shall be furnished to the press for publication."

PROCEDURE BOOK OF INSTRUCTIONS FOR STATE OFFICERS AND STATE CHAIRMEN

The following resolution which applies to a Procedure Book of Instruction for State Officers and State Chairmen appears in the Proceedings for 1959-60, page 41, and was amended in March 2001 to read as follows:

RESOLVED, that all Officers and State Chairmen keep a Procedure Book of Instructions and helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new Officers and Chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities thus providing a continuing continuity of DAR work, and that such Procedure Books, with all other data and items pertaining to the office or chairmanship be so distributed no later than May 15 following the election of new State Officers.

The remaining copies are to be sent to the State Recording Secretary to be sold for \$15.00 per book plus \$2.00 postage, check made payable to State Treasurer.

REAFFIRMATION

RESOLVED, that the Georgia State Society reaffirm the following resolution, "Presentation of Awards," adopted at the State Board of Management in Albany, October 23, 1968, which reads as follows:

WHEREAS, all awards are given by State Officers and State Chairmen; and,

WHEREAS, February 1 is the closing date of all work for said awards;

BE IT RESOLVED, that no State Officer nor State Chairman may present her report or award(s) at State Conference unless said report, with list of award(s) is in the hands of the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary at least ten(10) days before State Conference.

Reports of State Officers, Chapter Regents and State Chairmen are to be 200 or less words, typed and double spaced, on 8 1/2 x 11 inch unlined paper. DO NOT USE ANY TYPE OF LETTERHEAD. Follow the format seen in Reports of State Officers and State Chairmen in the Proceedings.
