

BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUNTION

Article I NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II OBJECTS

The objects of this Society shall be:

- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.
- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.
- (3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of the Georgia State Society.

Article IV OFFICERS

- **Section 1.** The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian and a State Curator.
- Section 2. (a) To be eligible for state office, a member shall hold and have held membership in a chapter or chapters within the Georgia State Society for at least 5 years prior to her election and have served a full term as chapter officer or state chairman.

- (b) No member shall be eligible to the same state office for two (2) successive terms. A member having served more than one half of a term in a state office shall be deemed to have served a full term.
- (c) No two state officers shall be members of the same chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.
- (d) To be eligible for the office of State Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State First Vice Regent or as State Second Vice Regent or served in each of these two offices of the Georgia Society.
- (e) To be eligible for the office of State First Vice Regent or for the office of State Second Vice Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State Recording Secretary or as State Treasurer of the Georgia State Society and shall have served a full term as a Chapter Regent of a chapter in the Georgia State Society.

Section 3. In recognition of valuable service to the Georgia State Society, a State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent for life by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Article V NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

- Section 1. (a) A candidate for state office shall request the endorsement of her chapter, taken by vote at a regular meeting of the chapter held between May and January preceding the State Conference at which state elections are held. The endorsement, signed by the Chapter Recording Secretary, shall include the office the candidate seeks and shall be received by the State Regent with the candidate's statement of intent to be a candidate prior to any announcement or campaigning by the candidate and/or her supporters.
- (b) A candidate for State Regent who wishes to present a slate of officers shall send to the State Regent in one packet the chapter endorsements and the statements of intent for each of her selected candidates. If received by the State Regent no later than December 1, these candidates shall be listed as a slate in the State Regent's Call to State Conference.
- (c) Candidates wishing to run independently of a slate, whose chapter endorsements and statements of intent are received by the State Regent no later than December 1, shall be listed as independent candidates in the State Regent's Call to State Conference.
- (d) A candidate whose chapter endorsement and statement of intent have been properly received by the State Regent may choose to announce her candidacy separate from the State Regent's Call to State Conference. Such a chapter endorsement and statement of intent shall be received by the State Regent at least ten (10) days prior to the opening of the State Conference at which the election is to take place.
- (e) A candidate who does not meet the requirements of these Bylaws shall be declared disqualified and ineligible for consideration for state office.
- (f) A chapter shall endorse no more than one chapter member for state office per election with the possible exception of candidates for State Regent and for State Corresponding Secretary.
- (g) In the event of the death, incapacitation or withdrawal of a candidate prior to the election, a replacement shall be made with notification in writing to the State Regent and accompanied by the chapter endorsement and statement of intent as directed by these Bylaws.

Section 2. Nominations of candidates for all state offices shall be made at a designated meeting of the State Conference.

Section 3. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected biennially by ballot at the State Conference. A majority vote shall elect.

- **Section 4**. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two (2) years or until their successors are elected. Their terms of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.
- Section 5. (a) Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become State Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become State First Vice Regent subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. Vacancies in other state offices shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next State Board of Management meeting or State Conference, whichever shall come first.
- (b) Any state officer who is absent from the state for a continuous period of six(6) months or longer shall automatically relinquish her position as a state officer.
- **Section 6**. Upon the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Organizing Secretary General.
- **Section 7**. (a) A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot.
- (b) The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than eighteen (18) months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.
- (c) The endorsement shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent with the candidate's name and address to the Recording Secretary General to be received by the first day of the month preceding the designated Continental Congress.

Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall perform the duties prescribed in this article, and parliamentary authority adopted by the Society, and such others as the State Board of Management and the National Society may require.

Section 2. The State Regent shall:

- (a) be the chief executive officer and the official spokesman for the State Society;
 - (b) have general supervision of the affairs of the State Society;
- (c) preside at all meetings of the State Conference, State Board of Management and the Executive Committee:
- (d) appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society;
 - (e) be ex-officio a member of all committees;
- (f) appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as advisor in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting;

- (g) sign all contracts and agreements made in the name of the Georgia State Society with the recorded approval of the Executive Committee and the State Board of Management or the State Conference as directed by these Bylaws;
- (h) be bonded and have the authority to draw upon funds of the State Society with the approval of the Finance Committee.
- (i) recommend to the Finance Committee a Certified Public Accountant who shall be approved by the Finance Committee.

Section 3. The State First Vice Regent shall:

- (a) perform the duties of the office of State Regent in the absence or inability of the State Regent;
 - (b) fill a vacancy in the office of State Regent:
 - (c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;
- (d) serve on those committees as designated by these Bylaws and as directed by the State Regent.

Section 4. The State Second Vice Regent shall:

- (a) perform the duties of the office of State First Vice Regent in the absence or inability of the State First Vice Regent;
 - (b) fill a vacancy in the office of State First Vice Regent;
 - (c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;
 - (d) serve on committees as directed by the State Regent.

Section 5. The State Chaplain shall:

- (a) open all meetings of the State Conference and the State Board of Management with scripture reading and prayer;
- (b) preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and conduct such other religious services as may be required;
 - (c) be custodian of state properties pertaining to the duties of this office;
 - (d) be responsible for IN MEMORIAM pages in the Proceedings.

Section 6. The State Recording Secretary shall:

- (a) record the proceedings of the meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;
- (b) compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and the Proceedings Committee;
- (c) submit to the appropriate National Officers, the endorsement for Vice President General and the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent by the first day of the month preceding the month of Continental Congress of the year in which said balloting was held.

Section 7. The State Corresponding Secretary shall:

- (a) conduct correspondence and send notices on behalf of the State Regent, the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as may be directed by them;
- (b) receive from the chapters the Master Questionnaire and distribute to the appropriate state chairmen.

Section 8. The State Organizing Secretary shall:

- (a) assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new chapters;
- (b) assist chapters in conjunction with appropriate state officers and chairmen in revitalization.

Section 9. The State Treasurer shall:

(a) be bonded;

- (b) be the custodian of the funds of the State Society, placing them in institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance:
- (c) receive the state dues and State Conference registration fees from the chapters and receive all sums contributed by the chapters for state and national projects, disbursing monthly to the Treasurer General all funds designated for national projects;
- (d) disburse other funds only when authorized by the State Regent in writing; (e) keep an account of all sums received or disbursed by using the basic double entry form of bookkeeping according to accepted accounting procedures and keep receipts for all transactions;
- (f) prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference, sending a copy to the State Chairman of the Finance Committee ten (10) days in advance of each meeting;
- (g) be a member of the Finance Committee and an ex-officio member of the Credentials Committee:
- (h) balance and prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year; said audit by a Certified Public Accountant, shall be performed and delivered within forty-five (45) days of receipt of books.
- (i) An internal review of the State Treasurer's records shall be performed when a change in this office occurs after the close of the fiscal year. Following the review, the records shall be turned over to the new State Treasurer. The committee to review the books shall be composed of the State First Vice Regent, the immediate Past State Treasurer, the immediate past Finance Chairman and a current Chapter Regent appointed by the State Regent.

Section 10. The State Registrar shall:

- (a) when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution prove eligibility and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars;
 - (b) keep a correct list of all members in the state;
 - (c) report on membership to the State Conference;
- (d) be in possession of the computer and software owned by the Georgia State Society and see that it is maintained.

Section 11. The State Historian shall:

- (a) be in charge, within the state, of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General as well as those authorized by the Georgia State Society;
- (b) keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves within the state;
 - (c) prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General;
- (d) promote the study of American history, state and county history and historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the founding of our state and counties.

Section 12. The State Librarian shall:

- (a) serve as liaison between the Librarian General and the Georgia Chapters and disseminate general information on the NSDAR Library;
- (b) cooperate with the director of the Georgia Department of Archives and History, making the needs of the Archives known to the chapters;

- (c) collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing them wherever accepted in such libraries and Archives as may be chosen by the State Board of Management:
- (d) solicit, with the approval of the Executive Committee, contributions from the chapters for purchase of such books as requested by the office of the Librarian General, and/or the various libraries in Georgia which the State Society approves;
- (e) receive gifts of books and other printed material from the chapters to be donated to the approved libraries and Archives;
- (f) maintain a constant supply of bookplates to the NSDAR Library, the Georgia Department of Archives and History and for purchase by the chapters.

Section 13. The State Curator shall be custodian of the State portable properties and shall have them properly stored and made ready for use at state meetings.

Section 14. All officers will keep a Procedure Book of Instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new officers to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. State Conference:

- (a) The annual meeting of the Georgia State Society shall be known as the State Conference. It shall be for the purpose of:
 - (1) receiving reports of officers, committees and Chapter Regents;
 - (2) electing officers biennially;
 - (3) promoting programs in furtherance of the objects of the Society;
 - (4) any other business that may arise:
 - i. annual budget shall be adopted,
 - ii. all projects of the State Society requiring funding shall be voted upon at State Conference or ratified by members at State Conference if reviously voted upon by the State Board of Management.
 - iii. no project extending beyond the term of the presiding officer may be accepted at any meeting other than by vote at State Conference.
- (b) The State Conference will be held between February 1 and the time of the meeting of Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week;
 - (c) The State Regent shall fix the time and place of meetings;
- (d) The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credentials form to the chapters not less than sixty (60) days before the time of the State Conference.
 - Section 2. The voting members of the State Conference shall be:
 - (a) the officers and Honorary State Regents of the State Society;
- (b) the officers and honorary officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state;
- (c) the Chapter Regent, or in her absence, the Vice Regent or alternate of each chapter;
- (d) delegates or alternates of each chapter of the state as designated by the Bylaws of the National Society for representation at Continental Congress;
 - (e) one additional delegate from each chapter in the state.
- **Section 3**. Only a chapter member in good standing whose credentials have been completed in accordance with the instructions of the State Regent and the State

Credentials Chairman for the State Conference and in accordance with the Standing Rules of the National Society shall be eligible to represent her chapter at state and national meetings.

- **Section 4.** A member shall have belonged to a chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the chapter, except in the case of the Regent or Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.
- **Section 5**. A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at an annual State Conference, shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.
- **Section 6**. Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the state of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.
- **Section 7.** At the opening of the annual State Conference the privilege of the floor shall be accorded to the State Chairmen. They may not vote unless they are duly registered as voters of the State Conference.
- **Section 8.** Special meetings of the State Society may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen (15) days' notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.
- **Section 9**. Forty-five (45) voting members, representing not less than twenty (20) chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

- **Section 1**. The state officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents and the Regents, or in their absence, the Vice Regents of the chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.
- **Section 2.** The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the fall, following the October meeting of the National Board. It may meet whenever called by the State Regent. A minimum of twenty (20) days' notice shall be given as to the time and place of any such meeting.
- **Section 3**. Thirty (30) members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.
- **Section 4.** The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference or as proscribed by these Bylaws.
- **Section 5.** State chairmen, vice chairmen, committee members of the National and Standing Committees and one (1) member from each chapter shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privilege of the floor, but may not vote.
- **Section 6**. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article IX EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, shall attend the meetings, but may not vote.

Section 3. This Executive Committee shall:

- (a) perform such duties of the State Board of Management between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient;
- (b) meet at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three (3) members of the committee:
 - (c) vote by teleconference if necessary;
- (d) receive and make recommendations for projects requiring expenditure of funds outside routine expenditures to be considered by the State Conference;
 - (e) make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.
- **Section 4**. Decisions of the Executive Committee shall be acted upon at the next meeting of the State Board of Management or at State Conference, whichever shall come first.

Article X FINANCES

- **Section 1**. (a) The fiscal year of the Georgia State Society shall be May 1 through the last day of April.
- (b) The annual budget, prepared by the Finance Committee, shall cover the fiscal year and be prepared on the basis of dues payable for the calendar year beginning December first preceding.
- (c) The Finance Committee shall propose the per capita amount and distribute according to the annual membership count. The per capita amount and distribution shall be indicated on the budget presented annually. Funds to be included in the per capita designations shall be Tamassee DAR School, Kate Duncan Smith DAR School, Berry College, Lucy Cook Peel Fund, McCall Genealogical Fund and Meadow Garden Maintenance.
- **Section 2**. The annual dues of chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be \$7.00 for each member of the chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1.
- **Section 3**. (a) Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the state dues, a conference registration fee of five dollars (\$5.00) for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under these Bylaws, this fee to be paid whether chapter is represented or not.
- (b) State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the five dollars (\$5.00) conference fee at the time of registration.
- (c) Other members of the Georgia State Society who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay three dollars (\$3.00) conference fee at the time of registration.
- **Section 4.** (a) The State Treasurer and the State Regent and such others entrusted with funds of the Georgia State Society as may be designated by the State Board of Management shall be bonded. (See Article VI, Sections 2 and 9);
- (b) The State Treasurer with the approval of the State Regent and the State Chairman of the Finance Committee shall place the funds of the Georgia State Society in financial institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage;
- (c) The placement of restricted savings funds and investment funds of the Georgia State Society shall be placed to the credit of the Georgia State Society by the State Treasurer under the direction of the Finance Committee. Monies may be

invested in U. S. Treasury obligations or other interest bearing obligations of federally insured financial institutions;

- (d) The accounts of the State Treasurer shall be annually prepared for audit by a Certified Public Accountant immediately following the end of the State Society fiscal year and no later than May 15 and delivered to the CPA by that date;
- (e) Should the State Treasurer be incapacitated, the State Regent, after consultation with the Chairman of the Finance Committee and with the approval of the Executive Committee, shall appoint an Acting State Treasurer to serve until such time as the State Treasurer is able to resume her duties or a new State Treasurer is appointed and ratified as stated in Article V, Section 5 (a).
- **Section 5**. The expenses incurred by the State Regent in the performance of duty shall be paid each year from the State Dues Fund:
- (a) Four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00) shall be taken each year to defray her necessary travel expenses;
- b) Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent, as budgeted, shall be paid by the State Treasurer who shall keep all receipts of these expenses. No expenses exceeding the budgeted amount shall be paid by the State Treasurer.
- **Section 6.** At the close of the books annually, \$5,000.00 shall be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies Fund" so that at the end of each administration a total of \$10,000.00 will be reserved. This money is to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration. [Proviso: The funds needed to increase the "Reserve for Contingencies Fund" at the end of this [2002-2004] administration shall be taken from the Money Market/General Savings Account and not from the current operating funds.]

Article XI COMMITTEES

Section 1. The State Regent shall appoint the following standing committees:

- (a) Bylaws: An Honorary State Regent shall be appointed as chairman and the committee shall be composed of two (2) other Honorary State Regents and one (1) member from each district;
- (b) Finance: This committee shall be composed of seven (7) members to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two (2) Honorary State Regents, one (1) active chapter regent and one (1) active chapter member. One of the two Honorary State Regents shall be appointed chairman. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund. This committee shall have charge of all investments of the Georgia State Society funds.
- (c) Resolutions: This committee shall be composed of all Honorary State Regents, the State Parliamentarian and three (3) chapter members;
- (d) Proceedings: This committee shall be composed of the State Recording Secretary, the immediate past State Recording Secretary, State First Vice Regent and four (4) additional Daughters, at least one of whom shall be an Honorary State Regent.
- **Section 2.** The State Regent shall appoint such other committees, standing or special, as the State Conference shall authorize, or actions of the State Board of Management or the National Society shall require. The appointments shall be concurrent with the term of the State Regent making the appointments and shall terminate with the end of the administration.

Section 3. Additional appointments may be made to any of the committees and vacancies shall be filled by the State Regent with timely notification to the membership.

Section 4. The duties of committees shall be such as these Bylaws, the State Conference, the State Board of Management or the National Society shall prescribe.

Section 5. All chairmen will keep a Procedure Book of instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

Article XII CHAPTERS

- **Section 1**. To expedite the work of the Society, the chapters of the Georgia State Society shall be placed in geographical districts:
- (a) A chairman appointed by the State Regent shall coordinate the work of all chapters as needed; she shall be titled 'Coordinator of Districts";
- (b) Each district shall have a Director appointed by the State Regent to work as a committee under the direction and supervision of the Coordinator of Districts and the State Regent.
- **Section 2.** Chapter elections shall be held no later than April 1 in the year of chapter elections. The Chapter Regent shall report annually the names of the elected officers promptly on the form provided by the State Regent for this purpose, with copies to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, and the State Recording Secretary.
- **Section 3**. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent, the State Recording Secretary, and the District Director at the time designated by the State Regent.

Article XIII MEADOW GARDEN MUSEUM

Meadow Garden, property owned by the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, shall be operated as follows:

- (a) The governing body shall be the Board of Trustees composed of the following members: the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Chairman who shall be appointed by the State Regent;
- (b) The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the following members: the State Regent who shall serve as Chairman; the State First Vice Regent who shall serve as Secretary; the Chairman of Meadow Garden; the Regents of the Augusta and College Hill

Chapters; the State Treasurer; and the chairmen of the five (5) subcommittees appointed

by the State Regent - Docents, Furnishings, Landscaping, Museum Shop, and Patrons;

(c) The Meadow Garden Board shall operate with Standing Rules approved by the State Conference.

Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. The current edition of "Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised," shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law in matters not covered by these Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

Article XV AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent, the State Parliamentarian, and the State Bylaws Chairman. The State Regent shall send a copy to each chapter, at least sixty (60) days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the Call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

Article XVI DISSOLUTION

Although the period of duration of the Georgia State Society is perpetual, if for any reason the State Society is to be dissolved or otherwise terminated, no part of the property of the Society or any of the proceeds shall be distributed to or inure to the benefit of any of the officers or members of the Society. Upon the dissolution of the Georgia State Society, assets shall be distributed by the Board of Management and/or the Executive Committee to and only to the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the local United States District Court, exclusively to such organization or organizations as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated within the meaning of section 501 (c)(3), with purposes and objectives consistent with those of the Georgia State Society.

CHAPTER ELECTIONS

As soon as chapter elections are held, names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, 1776 D Street, NW, Washington, D.C. 20006-5303, the State Regent or the State Regent-Elect, the State Recording Secretary and the State Corresponding Secretary by May 1. The full Christian name of chapter officers shall be given, along with her husband's given name or initials, address, zip code, telephone number, fax and e-mail. In accordance with the National Bylaws, a Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years.

CHAPTER REPRESENTATION AT STATE AND NATIONAL MEETINGS

At the State Board of Management, a chapter is represented by the Chapter Regent, or in her absence by the First Vice Regent, and one non-voting member. The voting representation of each chapter at the State Conference shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received by the State Treasurer by December 1. Membership less than 50: Regent, 1 Delegate, 4 Alternates, total votes 2; 50-199: Regent, 2 Delegates, 6 Alternates, total votes 3; 200-299: Regent, 3 Delegates, 8 Alternates, total votes 4; 300-399: Regent, 4 Delegates, 10 Alternates, total votes 5.

The voting representation of each chapter at Continental Congress shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received in the Office of the Treasurer General by December 1. Membership less than 50: Regent, no Delegate, 2 Alternates, total votes 1; 50-199: Regent, 1 Delegate, 4 Alternates, total votes 2; 200-299: Regent, 2 Delegates, 6 Alternates, total votes 3; 300-399: Regent, 3 Delegates, 8 Alternates, total votes 4.

CONFERENCE REGISTRATION FEE

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer with the state dues on or before December 1, \$5.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws, this fee to be paid whether represented or not.

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$5.00 Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters, shall pay a \$3.00 Conference fee at the time of registration.

CONTRIBUTIONS

All contributions by chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

DATE FOR ANNUAL AUDIT

"WHEREAS, every effort must be made to have all material to the printer as early as possible, to facilitate delivery of the Proceedings to the members,

RESOLVED: That the end of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR fiscal year for audit purposes be changed from May 31 to April 30." Adopted.

DECEASED MEMBERS

Deaths shall be reported promptly to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Chaplain and the State Registrar by the corresponding Chapter officer. A complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and date of death shall be furnished to the State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for the Conference Memorial Service and for State Proceedings.

DUES

GEORGIA HOSPITALITY FUND

The following resolution appears in the Proceedings for 1955 and was amended in 2001:

"WHEREAS, the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds a social event in Washington during Continental Congress which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$500.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this fund shall not be cumulative." Adopted.

NEW ADMINISTRATION RESERVE FOR CONTINGENCIES FUND

For the entire resolution setting up the "General New Regime Fund Balance of \$2,500.00," found on pages 203-204 of the 1979 Proceedings, the following substitute resolution was adopted by the 88th State Conference:

RESOLVED, that at the end of each administration \$6,000.00 be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies Fund," this money to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration, and to pay initial operating cost of the new administration. All other surplus monies in the General Fund, other than

funds which are designated, are to be divided equally between the General Savings Account and the Georgia State Society Endowment Fund. (DAR School Resolutions 1991, page 62 of the 1992 Proceedings) This transaction is to be handled by April 30 every two years, before the auditors close out the books of an administration, thus making the General Fund show the same balance of \$6,000.00 at the beginning of each new administration. This fund is to be known as "New Administration Reserve for Contingencies Fund." Adopted.

The following resolution was adopted at the 104th State Conference:

"WHEREAS, the Georgia State Society is sole owner of Meadow Garden and is responsible for all costs of maintenance and operation of this historic property in Augusta; and,

WHEREAS, surplus funds over and above the \$6,000.00 designated for a new administration to be used for the payment of the Proceedings of the previous administration and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration is allocated for specific savings or money market accounts;

RESOLVED that such available funds over and above said \$6,000.00 be designated as one half to Meadow Garden Maintenance Money Market account, to be transferred to one of the certificates of deposit at such time as a certificate is renewed, and the remaining one half to be deposited to the Georgia State Society General Fund money market account; and, be it further

RESOLVED that this resolution replace all previous directives for said surplus, namely those adopted in 1976 and in 1991." Adopted.

The following resolution which applies to the announcement of the candidacy for State-Regent appears in the Proceedings of the 20th State Conference, 1918:

"RESOLVED, that it is the judgment of the Executive Board that announcements for State Regent should not be made earlier than three months prior to the meeting of the Conference and they shall be furnished to the press for publication." Adopted.

PROCEDURE BOOK OF INSTRUCTIONS FOR STATE OFFICERS AND STATE CHAIRMEN

The following resolution which applies to a Procedure Book of Instruction for State Officers and State Chairmen appears in the Proceedings for 1959-60, page 41, and was amended in March 2001 to read as follows:

"RESOLVED, that all Officers and State Chairmen keep a Procedure Book of Instructions and helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new Officers and Chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities thus providing a continuing continuity of DAR work, and that such Procedure Books, with all other data and items pertaining to the office or chairmanship, be so distributed no later than May 15 following the election of new State Officers." Adopted.

Margins should be: 1 1/2 inches from top of page; 1 1/2 to 2 inches from left side; 1 inch from right side; 1 inch from bottom of page. Chapter Regents should exclude NSDAR Chapter Achievement Award and State Honor Roll, as these will be added when confirmed. Your name should be consistent with the Directory of Chapter Regents and State Chairmen as found in this Proceedings. Winners of awards and awards to be offered shall each be listed on separate sheets identified with the title of the committee and the award. Reports and awards to be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary by the following deadlines: Chapter Regents by February 1; State Officers and State Chairmen by March 1.

STATE CONFERENCES

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year, a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24, 1899. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized, and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p.21) No Conference was held in 1911, the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912", and amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, p.211)

The dates and places of meeting and the numerical designations of the Conferences after the First Annual Conference (1899) were: (2) Atlanta, November 27-28, 1900; (3) Augusta, November 21-22, 1901; (4) Savannah, November 13-14-15, 1902; (5) Atlanta, November 5-6-7, 1903; (6) Athens, November 9-10-11, 1904; (7) Macon, November 16-17-18, 1905; (8) Columbus, November 21-22-23, 1906; (9) Rome, October 23-24-25, 1907; (10) Covington, November 4-5-6, 1908; (11) Brunswick, November 10-11-12, 1909. The State Board of Management Meeting will be November 1-2, 2002, in Jackson. A new format will include a Membership Development Workshop. Chapters are encouraged to send a team of members.

The State Conference will be held in Atlanta, March 27-30, 2003 at the Westin Atlanta North at Perimeter.

Mrs. Bell recognized Mrs. Hughes, Augustin Clayton Chapter, for receiving First Place in Chapter Achievement Award for "Most Points in the Nation" – 1,723. The Augustin Clayton Chapter won First Place in the Nation for "Most New Members by Application for 2001 – 2002"; Mrs. Manker, past State Chairman, Genealogical Records, for receiving First Place in Membership Category 5,000 – 7,999, for "Submitting the Most Unpublished Source Records, 2001 – 2002, First Place over all other states"; and, Bessie Ann Hord Bretch, who received a Certificate of Award for "Outstanding Service to the American Indians Committee, 2001 – 2002".

The State Regent expressed thanks to the Board for support of changes, new ideas and projects taking place on both the State and National levels.

The First Vice Regent reported the Georgia Luncheon at Continental Congress will be July 9, 2003, Opening Night, at the J. W. Marriott Hotel, from 12:00 – 1:45 pm. Mrs. Whitson was installed as First Vice Regent at Continental Congress.

The Second Vice Regent reported a survey sheet would be given to members at the workshop and mailed or emailed to Chapter Regents. Miss Farrigan stated a need for chapters to host the State Board of Management meeting and the Summer Workshops for 2003. The State Board of Management meeting in 2003 will be November 7-8.

The Chaplain reported birthday remembrances have been sent to 90 plus members. Condolences have been mailed to deceased members' families. Ms. Reid expressed the importance of having correct information about deceased members mailed to her as soon as possible. She reported the 2001 - 2002 Proceedings Books are being

distributed at the workshops. The books are \$15.00. Having the Proceedings at workshops has given chapters the state and national information early and cut postage costs.

The Recording Secretary reported the minutes of the March meeting were completed and mailed to the Board. As DAR Museum Vice Chairman of the Georgia Room, Mrs. Baldwin reported a telephone conversation with Patrick Sherry, NSDAR, Room Furnishings Manager. When asked about purchasing a desk, Mr. Sherry stated the room would not have had a desk. He feels the room is complete.

The Corresponding Secretary reported, editing and publishing the *Georgia Drummer* Newsletter. Of the 6,700 newsletters mailed, only 366 were returned. Mrs. Manker printed 1,000 certificates, costs 6 cents each and selling for 15 cents each. She printed 200 State Directories to sell for \$5.00 each. An update will be on the Internet in September. She stated all but two chapters have email addresses. Mrs. Manker requested correct addresses for mail outs.

The Organizing Secretary reported working on new chapters; Jasper-Ellijay; Cumming; and Forsyth areas. The Governor Treutlen Chapter is having attendance problems and needs assistance. Mrs. Hughes will be working with the chapter members.

The Treasurer reported the State and Meadow Garden books are being set up on the computer.

The Registrar reported updating the mailing list and labels for the *Georgia Drummer* Newsletter. Many addresses were not correct and chapters had to be contacted for corrections. Mrs. Porter requested updated addresses be sent to her.

The Historian reported preparing letters for the Chapter Regent's packets. Mrs. McCorkle reported fifteen markers for DAR members and one for a Revolutionary Soldier have been installed and dedicated. She needs a box(s) for the 3 x 5 cards that contain marker information.

The Librarian reported meeting with Bridgett Wiggins at National about bookplates and collecting books for the library. The report period for the Librarian is January 1 to December 31. Mrs. Lingelbach reported that books being donated to the DAR Library must be approved and received before December 31. Allow at least 90 days before the deadline to process paperwork.

The Curator reported receiving the flags and other items from the past Curator. As Furnishing Chairman of Meadow Garden Museum Board, Mrs. Henry reported a presentation to Meadow Garden may be made during the State Board of Management Meeting, through the Archibald Bulloch Chapter. She has received quotes for work at Meadow Garden.

Mrs. Bell is investigating a climate control storage area for State records. One price for a 5' x 5' space is \$45.00/month. More information will be gathered and presented.

The Georgia State Society needs the new Georgia State flag. Miss Farrigan said she would request a free flag from her Legislator, purchase trim and attach the trim to the flag. The State Regent stated the DAR Schools will also need the new Georgia flag.

The Recording Secretary asked how her duties as Recording Secretary per State Bylaws, would correspond with the Proceedings Production Committee. Mrs. Bell stated reports would be mailed to the Recording Secretary; she would compile, edit and mail all materials to the Proceedings Production Chairman for setup and typing. The Committee would be responsible for all typing of the State Proceedings book. The Recording Secretary would proof the blue lines.

The next Executive Committee meeting will be November 1, 2002 at 8:00 pm. in Jackson.

Ms. Reid gave the Benediction and the meeting adjourned at 10:37 pm.

Ms. Reid, State Chaplain, offered prayer.

The State Regent welcomed officers and Parliamentarian, Dorothy Corn Hoff. The Recording Secretary read the minutes of the August 21, 2002 meeting. The minutes were approved as corrected.

Dorothy Corn Hoff, State Parliamentarian read from the State Bylaws, Article IX, Executive Committee, Section 3 (d) and (e) and Section 4.

The success of the Membership Development Workshop is the result of many dedicated Georgia Daughters. Marilyn Clark Gilhuly worked with State Senator Charlie Tanksley to bring the Georgia Sales Tax Exemption before the State Legislature and through to final passage. To use this exemption, the State must use a state check for purchases, which will result in a good savings on the State Proceedings and the newsletter.

Mrs. Bell reported on the October National Board of Management Meeting: Georgia will be seated on the floor at Continental Congress in Section 8; confirmed as Organizing Chapter Regents were: Jane Joyner Hampton - Forsyth, Jean Fortson Kirby - Cumming, Nina Mayes Hill - Jasper; address changes are to be sent to the Office of Organizing Secretary General; a donation of \$200 made toward the Button Gwinnett Signature will entitle members to purchase the Button Gwinnett pin as well as the Americana pin; chapters are encouraged to keep chapter records in their possession; the new Patriot Index will be available by Continental Congress; April 11, 2003 is date of the National Board bus trip to Valley Forge to see the Bell Tower; Public Relations for 2002 – 2003 will focus on (1) outreach to children through J.A.C. Clubs and scholarships, and (2) minority memberships; the new four color brochures given to prospective members are not free; use the new logo with discretion; chapters are asked to award worthy recipients; advertising in the National DAR Newsletter costs the Society about \$850.00 per page to print; Constitution Hall and Library receipts are down; queries in the National DAR Newsletter are \$1.00 per word; the Library Project is to replace the library tables and lamps and to purchase out of print books. Seimes Microfilm Center will focus on state records; funds derived from the Friends of the Museum will be used to purchase items for the Museum Collections; Chapter and State Treasurer's books need to be audited; the National Society mails note cards, address labels, etc. to members and, after three no responses, the member's name is deleted from the mailing; celebrate the Lewis and Clark Trail Commemoration; make chapter meetings convenient to Junior Members; the Chapter Regents' packet will have information on the Marion Anderson issue; Master Card and VISA are the only two credit cards accepted by the DAR Store; Carol Rilling, National Chairman of the Chapter Development Committee, announced 12 working women chapters are in process.

Mrs. Bell expressed her appreciation for the privilege of serving the Georgia Daughters as State Regent.

The First Vice Regent reported the Georgia Luncheon at Continental Congress will be Friday, July 11, 2003 at the J.W. Marriot Hotel, from 12:00-1:45 p.m. Ticket prices are to be determined.

The Second Vice Regent reported the newly designed Georgia Flag will be used tomorrow at the meeting. Mrs. Henry moved the Georgia State Society sell voices on the State of Georgia 1956-design flag which was made in 1999. Voices could be sold for \$1.00 each or six for \$5.00, drawing to be held at the State Conference in 2004. Proceeds would benefit the Meadow Garden Maintenance Fund. The motion was seconded and adopted. Miss Farrigan stated over 250 members had signed up for the workshop. The survey sheets from the first and second week of summer workshop have been reviewed. There was a marked improvement in the second week's comments.

The Chaplain reported birthday remembrances have been sent to 90 plus members. Condolence cards have been mailed to the families of the deceased members. Ms. Reid stated printouts of the Meadow Garden Chairman listings, omitted from the current State Proceedings, have been given to the Literature Sales Chairman and the Recording Secretary. She gave dates of: November 24 - National Bible Week and May 1 - National Day of Prayer.

The Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Manker, showed a copy of the SAR Newsletter, which was a 16 page, color newsletter, costing SAR members 81 cents each. She stated the increase for the Fall Board of Management Workshop was due to all members receiving the registration form in the *Georgia Drummer* Newsletter.

The Organizing Secretary reported working with Organizing Regents of the following chapters: Jasper – Nina Mayes Hill; Cumming – Jean Fortson Kirby; Forsyth – Jane Joyner Hampton. The Lt. James Monroe Chapter will hold their organizing meeting November 24, 2002. Mrs. Hughes is assisting several chapters with membership decreases.

The financial report was filed. Mrs. Parsons reported the old state treasurer's computer would be delivered to Tamassee DAR School.

The Registrar reported 7090 members in the state with 196 Members-at-Large with a net gain this year of 96 members. Mrs. Porter stated updated addresses have been received.

The Librarian reported 19 books have been accepted by the National Library. Mrs. Lingelbach mailed letters and a bookplate to each chapter. The letter gave a listing of county books available at National. She requested chapters submit their county books, if in print, that are not in the National Library. Mrs. Lingelbach moved the Georgia State Society make a \$500.00 donation to the NSDAR Library to purchase books for the Georgia Shelf in honor of our State Regent, Rose Elyea Bell. The motion was seconded and adopted.

The Curator reported the state flags have been put on the newer flagpoles. Mrs. Henry moved the Georgia State Society offer for sale the old flag poles with finials and bases. The motion was seconded and approved.

The State Regent reported investigating general liability insurance prices. This insurance would cover state events only. The lowest premium for one million dollars coverage is \$350.00 per year. Miss Farrigan moved "the Georgia State Society purchase general liability insurance to cover state meetings in the amount of one million dollars coverage, not to exceed \$500.00 in premium per year." The motion was seconded and adopted.

The State Regent stated the DAR Schools need the newly designed Georgia Flag. Miss Farrigan stated flags could be obtained free from state legislators. Several officers volunteered to check on obtaining flags.

Mrs. Bell reported a National Museum of Patriotism would be located on Spring Street in Atlanta. She feels support of the museum would be good publicity for the DAR and will contact National about giving written support for the Museum. The museum opening will be during the fall of 2003.

The State Regent asked Mrs. Manker to report on the Genealogical Records Committee. Mrs. Manker reported \$583.37 in the Binding Fund. In the past, a monetary donation had been a requirement on the State Honor Roll. This money assisted in the cost of binding the records. At this time, a chapter must submit four copies of the records. The Society does not have the money to pay for the additional copies to be bound. Many chapters do not send the \$10.00 fee per copy to the State.

Mrs. Manker moved "Effective immediately, that Georgia DAR Chapters be required to submit only two sets of unpublished records to the Georgia State Chairman, Genealogical Records Committee, one set for the DAR Genealogical Records Library in Washington, DC, and one set for the Georgia Archives". Chapters may submit CD-ROM disks, but a hard copy would be required because of the unproven durability/shelf-life of a CD-ROM. The State Regent will inform the Washington Memorial Library in Macon and the Georgia Historical Society in Savannah of the Committee's decision. The motion was seconded and adopted.

Jackie Lawrence Keller, State Chairman of Genealogical Records, made a presentation to the Committee about missing volumes from the Georgia Section in the National Library. She found there are 74 volumes missing. Mrs. Manker moved "a one-time project to replace the 74 volumes of missing Genealogical Records Committee Records in the GRC Library in Washington, DC, be developed by Mrs. Keller, State GRC Chairman, and announced in the January 2003 edition of the *Georgia Drummer* Newsletter." The motion was seconded and adopted. Mrs. Keller will issue a challenge to raise the money to replace the 74 volumes.

The 2003 Summer Workshops will be moved up one week in August.

The next Executive Committee meeting is scheduled Friday morning, March 28, 2003, at 9:00 a.m. in Atlanta at the Westin – Atlanta North Hotel, prior to the State Conference.

Ms. Reid gave the Benediction and the meeting adjourned at 11:30 p.m.

The State Regent, Mrs. Bell reported on the October National Board of Management Meeting: Georgia will be seated on the floor in Section 8 at Continental Congress; confirmed as Organizing Chapter Regents were: Jane Joyner Hampton -Forsyth; Jean Fortson Kirby - Cumming; Nina Mayes Hill - Jasper; address changes are to be sent to the Office of the Organizing Secretary General; a donation of \$200.00 made toward the purchase of the Button Gwinnett Signature will entitle members to purchase the Button Gwinnett pin as well as the Americana pin; chapters are encouraged to keep chapter records out of public areas; the new Patriot Index will be available by Continental Congress; April 11, 2003 is the date for the National Board bus trip to Valley Forge to see the Bell Tower; Public Relations for 2002 -2003 will focus on (1) Outreach to children through J.A.C. Clubs and scholarships and (2) minority memberships; the new four color brochures given to prospective members are not free; use the new logo with discretion; chapters are asked to give awards to worthy recipients; advertising in the DAR Newsletter cost the Society about \$850.00 per page to print; Constitution Hall and Library receipts are down; queries in the DAR Newsletter are \$1.00 per word; the Library Project is to replace library

tables and lamps, and raise funds to purchase out of print books; Seimes Microfilm Center would like to focus on State records; funds derived from the Friends of the Museum will be used to purchase items for the Museum Collections; Chapter and State Treasurer's books need to be audited; the National Society mails note cards, address labels, etc, to members and after three no responses from members, their names will be deleted from the mailing list; celebrate the Lewis and Clark Trail commemoration; make chapter meetings convenient to Junior Members; the Chapter Regent's packet will include information on the Marion Anderson episode; Master Card and VISA are the only two credit cards accepted by the DAR Store; Carol Rilling, National Chairman of the Chapter Development Committee, announced 12 working women chapters in process.

Mrs. Bell expressed her appreciation for the privilege of serving the Georgia Daughters as State Regent.

Mrs. Whitson thanked the State Regent for her hard work for the Society.

Miss Farrigan gave instructions for the Workshops. The non-voting members were excused for the Workshops. All State Officers, officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents and the Regents, or in their absence, the Vice Regents of chapters of the state were instructed to remain in the meeting.

The State Recording Secretary gave a report of the Executive Committee and read the following recommendations from the Executive Committee:

- (1) That the State Society sell voices on the 1956 Georgia State flag purchased in 1999. Voices will sell for \$1.00 or six for \$5.00, with the drawing to be held at State Conference 2004 and proceeds to benefit Meadow Garden Maintenance Fund. Adopted.
- (2) That the Georgia State Society offer for sale the old flag poles with finials and bases that are no longer needed. Adopted.
- (3) That the Georgia State Society purchase general liability insurance to cover state meetings in the amount of one million dollars coverage, not to exceed \$500.00 in premium per year. Adopted.

The State Treasurer gave the financial report. Mrs. Reid, Chairman of the Finance Committee, reported \$5000.00 would be returned to the money market account when dues are paid.

Mrs. Gilhuly, Chairman of the Resolutions Committee, presented three DAR School Per Capita Resolutions, and the courtesy resolutions relating to the District Workshops and the State Board of Management meeting. Mrs. Gilhuly, by the direction of the Resolutions Committee, moved the adoption of the resolutions. Mrs. Whitson, First Vice Regent, called for the vote on the School Per Capita Resolutions honoring the State Regent, and the resolution expression appreciation to the State Regent on the excellence of the meeting. Resolutions were adopted. Mrs. Bell called for the vote on the remaining resolutions. The resolutions were adopted. . (The Resolutions are printed in their entirety at the conclusion of the State Conference minutes.)

The morning session was recessed for the Membership Development Team Workshop sessions and will reconvene at the luncheon.

The State Board of Management reconvened at 12:20 p.m., with the Blessing given by the State Chaplain. Mrs. Setters, Credentials Chairman, gave the final

credentials report: 89 voting members representing 81 chapters; State Officers 12, National Officers 2, Honorary State Regents 9, Chapter Regents 66, National Chairmen/Vice Chairmen 18, State Chairmen/Vice Chairmen 77, Chapter members 117, Guests 2; total without duplication 259. Mrs. Setters moved to adopt the report. The report was adopted.

The State Regent asked Mrs. Hudson and the members of the William McIntosh Chapter, the State Second Vice Regent/Coordinator of Districts, Miss Farrigan, and the West Central District Director, Mrs. Patton, to stand and receive thanks from the members.

Mrs. Bell asked members of the Membership Committee, Mary Barfield Thompson; Vice Chairman, Membership Development Team, Linda Reed Douglas; and the other Team Presenters: Judith Lillard Hughes, State Organizing Secretary; Nancy Bunker Bowen, Public Relations; Diane McCranie Redkevitch, Volunteer Genealogists; Jane Joyner Hampton, Volunteer Information Specialists, and Anita Enquist, Genealogist, to stand and receive thanks.

Ann Bell Ragan, Director, led the Georgia DAR Chorus in a patriotic program.

The William McIntosh Chapter distributed door prizes. Mrs. Bell reminded the members to exercise their privilege to vote on November 5.

There were several announcements concerning lost and found items. Mrs. Bell wished everyone Happy Holidays. Ms. Reid gave the benediction and the meeting adjourned at 2:35 p.m. Members were dismissed for the afternoon workshop sessions.

- A committee of no more than five Past Treasurers be appointed to review the State Treasurer's job to determine if changes need to be made to lessen the workload before the next administration. Adopted
- 3. That the Fort Morris site be marked by the GSDAR, at a cost not to exceed \$3000.00, pending approval from the Georgia Department of Natural Resources, the Georgia State Society and the National Society DAR. If approved, the funds are to be taken from the money market account. Adopted
- The 1999 2000 and any past years of State's Proceedings be sold for \$5.00 at the 105th State Conference. Adopted
- The Georgia State Society, NSDAR, endorse Bonaventure Chapter's seeking approval by the National Society of a Commemorative Pin honoring the 225th Anniversary of the First Multinational Force to fight on American soil on October 9, 1779 at the Siege of Savannah. Adopted
- The motion dealing with the disposition of the old Georgia Flag be rescinded until such time as the issue is settled by the State Legislature and/or the citizens of the state of Georgia. Adopted
- 7. Permission be granted to pay the bills as they come in from the General Savings. These bills include the Newsletter, Proceedings, postage and literature: The money to be repaid as the dues are collected or items sold. This procedure is a continuation of past practices. Adopted

Mrs. Setters, Chairman, Credentials Committee, gave the second Credentials Report: 174 voting members, 76 Chapters represented, a total registration without duplication, 364. By direction of the Committee, Mrs. Setters moved the adoption of the second Credentials Report. The report was adopted.

Mrs. Bell gave an overview of the restoration and other activities at Meadow Garden. Mrs. Whitson, Secretary and Trustee of the Meadow Garden Board read a recommendation from the Board: "That a new multipurpose building be built at the Meadow Garden Museum, home of George Walton. The primary focus of this multiuse building is Heritage Education. Funds have been donated or pledged to cover 90% of the estimated building cost." Therry Nash Deal moved that the recommendation be amended to add "That up to \$3,000.00 be allocated for a feasibility study for the interpretive center and storage area at Meadow Garden, {the study to include} the requirements to preserve National Historic Register designation and financial plans." Motion was seconded and adopted. The Board Recommendation was approved as amended.

In accordance with the State Bylaws, Article XIII, Meadow Garden Museum, Section (C), which states "The Meadow Garden Board shall operate with Standing Rules approved by the State Conference.", the Meadow Garden Board recommends the following four proposed amendments to the Standing Rules:

- Article VII Patrons Section 1 amend by striking out the words "known as Patrons" and substituting the word "recognized" and by adding a new item E. Heritage Education. Section 1 would then read: "Donors to the following categories are eligible to be known as Patrons: A. Meadow Garden Capital Investment Trust Fund; B. Furnishings; C. Maintenance; D. Landscape; E. Heritage Education." Adopted
- 2. Article VII Patrons Section 2 amend by striking out the entire section and substituting a new Section 2. Section 2 would then read: "Giving categories and levels will be determined by the Meadow Garden Board. This information will be publicized in the Meadow Garden brochure and other appropriate places determined by the Board. Levels of support will be: A. \$10.00 Friends; B. \$25.00 Supporters; C. \$35.00 Signers; D. \$50.00 Patrons; E. \$103.00* The 1900 Society; F. \$250.00 Sons and Daughters of Liberty; G. \$500.00 Olivia's Legacy; H. \$1,000.00 George Walton Society; I. \$5,000.00 Meadow Garden Preservation Society. (*Giving level for 2003; those recognized at this level must increase their giving level by \$1.00 each year. In 2004, one would give \$104.00; in 2005, \$105.00.)" Adopted
- 3. Article VII Patrons Section 3 amend by striking out the entire section and substituting a new section 3. The new section would then read: "Chapter gifts above the State Honor Roll requirements automatically qualify the chapter to be recognized at an appropriate giving level determined by the categories listed in Section 2." Adopted
- 4. Article VII Patrons Section 6 amend by adding the words "the names of those who give at the" after the word "record" and by adding the words "level or above" after the word "Patrons." Section 6 would then read: "A permanent book will be kept on public display at Meadow Garden to record the names of those who give at the Patrons level or above." Adopted

 To amend Article IV Officers, Section 2 (b) by inserting "full" before term. Section 2 (b) would then read: "(b) No member shall be eligible to the same state office for two (2) successive terms. A member having served more

- than one half of a term in a state office shall be deemed to have served a full term." Amendment adopted
- To amend Article V Nomination and Election of Officers, Section 1 (b) by deleting "December letter and". The second sentence of Section 1 (b) would then read: "If received by the State Regent no later than December 1, these candidates shall be listed as a slate in the State Regent's Call to State Conference." Amendment adopted.
- 3. To amend Article V Nomination and Election of Officers, Section 1 (c) by deleting "December letter and." Section 1 (c) would then read: "(c) Candidates wishing to run independently of a slate, whose chapter endorsements and statements of intent are received by the State Regent no later than December 1, shall be listed as independent candidates in the State Regent's Call to State Conference." Amendment adopted.
- 4. To amend Article V Nomination and Election of Officers, Section 1 (d) by deleting "December letter and". The first sentence of Section 1 (d) would then read: "A candidate whose chapter endorsement and statement of intent have been properly received by the State Regent may choose to announce her candidacy separate from the State Regent's Call to State Conference." Amendment adopted.
- 5. To amend Article V Nomination and Election of Officers, Section 7 (b) deleting "fifteen (15)" and inserting eighteen (18). Section 7 (b) would then read: "(b) The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than eighteen (18) months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated." Amendment adopted
- 6. To amend Article V Nomination and Election of Officers, Section 7 (c) by deleting "April 1" and inserting "by the first day of the month". Section 7 (c) would then read: "(c) The endorsement shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent with the candidate's name and address to the Recording Secretary General to be received by the first day of the month preceding the designated Continental Congress." Amendment adopted.
- 7. To amend Article VI Duties of Officers, Section 2 (g) by deleting "with the recorded approval of the Executive Committee and the State Board of Management or the State Conference as directed by the Bylaws." Section 2 (g) would then read: "(g) sign all contracts and agreements made in the name of the Georgia State Society." Proposed amendment lost.
- 8. To amend Article VI Duties of Officers, Section 6 (c) by deleting "before April 1" and insert "by the first day of the month preceding the month of Continental Congress." The section would then read: "(c) Submit to the appropriate National Officers, the endorsement for Vice President General and the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent by the first day of the month preceding the month of Continental Congress of the year in which said balloting was held." Amendment adopted.
- 9. To amend Article VI Duties of Officers, Section 7 (b) by deleting "consolidated reports" and inserting "Master Questionnaire". The section would then read: "(b) Receive from the chapters the Master Questionnaire and distribute to the appropriate state chairmen." Amendment adopted
- To amend Article VI Duties of Officers, Section 9 (h) by inserting the words "records for an annual review or audit fifteen (15) days after the close of the

administration's first fiscal year, said review/audit by a Certified Public Accountant shall be performed and delivered within forty-five (45) days of receipt of records." following the words "balance and prepare the". Section 9 (h) would then read: "(h) balance and prepare the records for an annual review or audit fifteen (15) days after the close of the administration's first fiscal year, said review/audit by a Certified Public Accountant shall be performed and delivered within forty-five (45) days of receipt of records." Proposed amendment lost.

- 11. To amend Article VI Duties of Officers, Section 9 by adding a new subsection at the end of Section 9. Section 9 (i) would read: "(i) An internal review of the State Treasurer's records shall be performed when a change in this office occurs after the close of the fiscal year. Following the review, the records shall be turned over to the new State Treasurer." Carolyn Grant Hanf moved to amend the proposal by adding the following sentence to the amendment. "The committee to review the books shall be composed of the State First Vice Regent, the immediate Past State Treasurer, the immediate past Finance Chairman and a current Chapter Regent appointed by the State Regent." The motion to include the additional sentence was seconded and adopted. Amendment adopted as amended.
- 12. To amend Article VI Duties of Officers, Section 13 (a) by deleting the entire section. Amendment adopted.
- 13. To amend Article VI Duties of Officers, Section 13 (b) by inserting "portable" between the words "State" and "properties". The Section would then read: "Section 13. The State Curator shall be custodian of the State portable properties and shall have them properly stored and made ready for use at state meetings." Amendment adopted.
- 14. To amend Article X Finances, Section 2 (b) by moving entire section to 1 (c) and delete the word "determine" and insert "propose". Section 1 (c) would then read: "(c) The Finance Committee shall propose the per capita amount and distribute according to the annual membership count. The per capita amount and distribution shall be indicated on the budget presented annually." Mrs. Reid moved that the following sentence be added to the end of the amendment. "Funds to be included in the per capita designations shall be Tamassee DAR School, Kate Duncan Smith DAR School, Berry College, Lucy Cook Peel Fund, McCall Genealogical Fund and Meadow Garden Maintenance." Amendment seconded and adopted. Amendment adopted as amended.
- 15. Article X Finances, Section 3 (c) by deleting "three dollars (\$3.00)" and inserting "five dollars (\$5.00)." Edwina Hall Beall moved that the proposed amendment be sent back to the Bylaws Committee for revision, and considered at the next State Conference. Motion seconded and adopted.
- 16. To amend Article X Finances, Section 6, by deleting in the first line "\$3,000.00" and inserting "\$5,000.00" and by deleting "\$6,000.00" in the third line and inserting "\$10,000.00". Section 6 would then read: "Section 6. At the close of the books annually, \$5,000.00 shall be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies Fund" so that at the end of each administration a total of \$10,000.00 will be reserved. This money is to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration." Miss Farrigan moved to amend the proposed amendment by adding the following proviso: "If

adopted, the Funds needed to increase the "Reserve for Contingencies Fund" at the end of this administration shall be taken from the Money Market/General Savings Account and not from the Current operating funds." The Proviso was seconded and adopted. Amendment with the Proviso was adopted.

- 17. To amend Article XI Committees, Section 2 by deleting "and" and inserting "or" after the words "authorize" and "Management". The first sentence of Section 2 would then read: "The State Regent shall appoint such other committees, standing or special, as the State Conference shall authorize, or actions of the State Board of Management or the National Society shall require." Amendment adopted
- 18. To amend Article XI Committees, Section 3, by deleting the first sentence and inserting "Additional appointments may be made to any of the committees and". Section 3 would then read: "Section 3. Additional appointments may be made to any of the committees and vacancies shall be filled by the State Regent with timely notification to the membership." Amendment adopted
- 19. To amend Article XII Chapters, Section 2 by inserting "1" after April. The first sentence of Section 2 would then read: "Chapter elections shall be held no later than April 1 in the year of chapter elections." Amendment adopted
- 20. To amend Article XII Chapters, Section 3 by deleting "February 1" at the end of the second line and inserting "at the time designated by the State Regent". Section 3 would then read: "Section 3. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent, the State Recording Secretary, and the District Director at the time designated by the State Regent." Amendment adopted

The Finance Committee Chairman, Lanette Haar Reid, reported on the Proposed Budget. Following discussion, Mrs. Reid moved that, "The proposed budget for 2003 –2004 be considered at the State Board of Management meeting and that a copy of the proposal be sent to Chapter Regents, Honorary State Regents and State Officers no later than 3 weeks prior to date of State Board." The motion was seconded and adopted.

Last July 7th, when your State Regent-Elect stood on the platform in the beautiful DAR Constitution Hall to receive the sash of State Regent, she never dreamed of what a busy and demanding year lay ahead. Now, some 8 1/2 months later, it is with a great sense of humility and accomplishment that the results of much determination, dedication, cooperation and extra effort are to be summarized.

When you returned from Continental Congress last year, you were met with the first issue of the *Georgia Drummer*, this state's first every member State Newsletter. Increasing the number of Districts from four to six, took our Summer Workshops closer to the members, making it much more convenient with results of record breaking attendance. All data from paper files beginning May 1, 2002 for the Georgia State Society and Meadow Garden Museum were transferred to computer files. Since the beginning of this administration, records were managed using Excel spreadsheets on the computer. All four checking accounts were reconciled and are in balance with the Georgia State Society and Meadow Garden Museum ledgers. Monies with the monthly reports were sent to the Treasurer General. Chapter Achievement monies and State Honor Roll monies were verified and reports sent to the respective State Chairmen. Acknowledgements of donations over \$25.00 were sent. National and State meetings attended include: Continental Congress; Treasurer General's Workshop; all six district workshops, leading the Treasurer's sessions; Fall Board of Management; and, all Executive, Finance and Meadow Garden meetings. Sincere appreciation is extended to Past State Treasurers, State Officers and chapter members for their assistance.

STATE REGISTRAR Phyllis Malone Porter (Mrs. Everett E.)

It was a great honor to be elected as your State Registrar at the 2002 State Conference. It has been a very busy year for this officer. She attended all meetings of the State Society and Continental Congress. The membership files of the State Society were kept current with 339 new members, 97 transfers in, 99 transfers out, 132 deaths, 160 resignations/drops and 64 reinstatements from the national printouts. Most chapters did an excellent job of reporting the changes in their chapter membership. Many questions have been answered by phone and e-mail. Many chapter problems and membership errors have been straightened out. In addition to the regular duties of this position, this officer provided a total of approximately 15,000 address labels for two editions of the Georgia Drummer. Chapter yearbooks or membership lists were received from 97 chapters, and the address of every member was checked. Following each mailing of the Georgia Drummer, approximately 300 were returned by the post office. Each chapter was contacted to confirm the correct address. The National Society implemented the e-Membership Database website, which has provided invaluable information about the status of chapters and members. Thank you, Madame State Regent, for the opportunity to serve the State Society.

STATE HISTORIAN Ocie B. Wilhoit McCorkle (Mrs. Chris S.)

Since the last State Conference in 2002, your State Historian attended Continental Congress in July, five district meetings in August, the Fort Peachtree tea honoring our State Regent, Rose Elyea Bell, Tamassee Founders Day in October, and Fall Board of Management in November. During the past year, this officer spoke at two chapter meetings. This officer has also followed up with Georgia Chapters regarding grave markings and historic site markings as requested by the Historian General. Ninety-eight Georgia chapters reported, and of those, sixty-seven chapters participated in activities related to this officer's objectives.

Eight chapters submitted a nominee for the Outstanding Teacher in American History. The State Winner was Mrs. Margaret Wingate, sponsored by Fielding Lewis Chapter. She also was selected as one of two in the Honorable Mention category for the National competition.

Sixteen chapters throughout the state marked graves, conducted wreath-laying ceremonies, and held receptions to honor Revolutionary Soldiers. This officer has worked diligently in researching the possible marking of Fort Morris in Sunbury, GA. Special thanks to the Col. John McIntosh Chapter for bringing this project to the State Society's attention.

Ninety-two chapters contributed money to various funds, and the total donations made through the State Treasurer are as follows: Americana Collection (including Button Gwinnett): \$77,502.00; NSDAR Archives: \$799.00. The award for the largest contribution to the Americana Collection from a GA DAR chapter (not all of which went through the State Treasurer) goes to the William Day Chapter with a donation \$51,220.00. The largest contribution to the Americana Collection that went through the State Treasurer goes to Joseph Habersham Chapter with a donation of \$10,650.

STATE LIBRARIAN Virginia Grace Lingelbach (Mrs.)

Your State Librarian attended Continental Congress in July, all Executive Board meetings, six District Workshops, and four events commemorating Constitution Week. This Officer wrote thank you letters to chapters for book donations and answered many queries. In an effort to enhance the book collection pertaining to Georgia at the NSDAR Library, this officer, through the use of the on-line library catalog, retrieved and sent to each Chapter Regent an inventory of the books pertaining to the county in which her chapter is located. Along with this listing a bookplate and a Gift Approval and Donation Form were enclosed. Much positive feedback has resulted from this initiative. Chapters sent, through the State Treasurer, \$283.00 to the State Library Fund, \$1,335.00 to Friends of the Library, and \$300.00 to Friends of Seimes Microfilm. The Georgia State Society donated \$500.00 to purchase books for the NSDAR Library in honor of our State Regent Rose Elyea Bell. Georgia Chapters donated 30 books to the NSDAR Library in calendar year 2002. A list of these books will be in the Proceedings as well as a detailed report from this officer. INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

Board of Trustees Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution Atlanta, Georgia

We have audited the accompanying combined statements of assets and fund balances - modified cash basis of Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution (a not-for-profit organization) as of April 30, 2003, and the related combined statements of revenue and expenditures and changes in fund balances and cash flows - modified cash basis for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Organization's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the assets, liabilities and fund balances of Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution as of April 30, 2003, and its revenue and expenditures and the changes in its fund balances and its cash flows for the year then ended on the basis of accounting described in Note I.

As described in Note 1, these financial statements were prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole. The accompanying schedules on pages 8 – 16 are presented for the purpose of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

<u>Basis of Accounting</u>. The financial statements of the Organization have been prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting. Accordingly, revenue is recorded when received rather than when earned and expenses are recorded when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred.

Basis of Presentation. Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board in its Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations. Under SFAS No. 117, the Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets.

<u>Cash and Cash Equivalents</u>. For purposes of the Statements of Cash Flows, the Organization considers all highly liquid investments with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

<u>Collections</u>. Collection items acquired either through purchase or donation are not capitalized. Purchases of collection items are recorded as decreases in unrestricted net assets if purchased with unrestricted assets and as decreases in temporarily restricted or permanently restricted net assets if purchased with donor-restricted assets. Contributions of collection items are not recognized in the Statement of Activities. Proceeds from deaccessions or insurance recoveries are reflected on the statement of activities based on the absence or existence and nature of donor-imposed restrictions.

<u>Donated Services</u>. No amounts have been reflected in the financial statements for donated services. The Organization generally pays for services requiring specific expertise. However, many individuals volunteer their time and perform a variety of tasks that assist the Organization with specific assistance programs, campaign solicitations, and various committee assignments. No amounts have been reflected in the financial statements, as the fair value of those services is not susceptible to objective valuation or measurement.

Income Tax Status. The Organization is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code. However, income from activities not directly related to the Organization's tax-exempt purpose is subject to taxation as unrelated business income. In addition, the Organization qualifies for the charitable contribution deduction under Section 170 (b) (1) (A) and has been classified as an organization other than a private foundation under Section 509 (a) (2).

<u>Nature of Activities</u>. The Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution carries out programs designed for education, public awareness and preservation of the history and heritage of the United States of America.

NOTE 1 - (cont'd)

<u>Property and Equipment</u>. The Society follows the policy of not capitalizing collections and historical treasures. Meadow Garden and its contents are historical treasures. The house and its contents are insured for approximately \$ 325,000. Office furniture and fixtures are insured for \$ 8,000. Major preservation or restoration projects are capitalized and depreciated over an estimated useful life of fifteen years. Additions and betterments of \$ 750 or more are capitalized, while maintenance and repairs that do not improve or extend the useful lives of the respective assets are expensed currently.

NOTE 2 - CERTIFICATES OF DEPOSIT

Certificates of deposit totaling \$ 350,174 are included in cash in the accompanying financial statements. The certificates bear interest ranging from 2.7% to 4.92% and have maturities ranging from three to sixteen months, with penalties for early withdrawal. Any penalties for early withdrawal would not have a material effect on the financial statements.

NOTE 3 - FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

<u>Concentrations of Credit Risk Arising from Cash Deposits</u>. The Organization maintains cash balances at several financial institutions located in Georgia. Accounts at each institution are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation up to \$ 100,000. At April 30, 2003, there are no uninsured cash balances.

NOTE 4 - PRIOR PERIOD ADJUSTMENTS

Certain errors resulting in an understatement of reported cash balances as of April 30, 2002 were discovered during the current year. Accordingly, an adjustment of \$ 8,753 was made during 2003 to cash balances as of the end of the previous administration at April 30, 2002. A corresponding entry was made to increase previously reported net assets. The correction has no effect on the results of the current year's activities; however, the cumulative effect increases net assets by \$ 8,753.

NATIONAL COMMITTEES

AMERICAN HERITAGE and CONSERVATION Linda G. Stephens (Mrs. James D.), Chairman

Of the 104 chapters in our state, 100 chapters reported American Heritage activity, and 82 Chapters reported having programs and projects regarding American Heritage. Many members volunteered at historic sites and incorporated programs or projects involving youth. Sixty-three chapters had programs or projects on Cultural Events and Traditions. Thirty-one chapters participated in planting trees for a total of 17,747 trees! Twenty chapters participated in Conservation and Environmental Awareness projects, with one chapter distributing several thousand pounds of birdseed! Thirtyone chapters educated members on organ donation. Four chapters awarded Conservation Medals and two chapters presented Historic Preservation Awards. Georgia has many entries in the American Heritage contests. The Augustin Clayton Chapter submitted the most outstanding chapter report in American Heritage activity. The Lamar-Lafayette Chapter submitted the best narrative of a single activity. The Vice Chairmen for this Committee are: C. Martelia Cunningham, Ouida Newby Smith, Jean Everett Johnson, and Kathryn Burgsteiner Stevens. Thank you, Madame State Regent, for asking me to serve the Society in this capacity. I serve with great pleasure.

AMERICAN HISTORY

Therry Nash Deal (Mrs. J. B.), Chairman

Reports were received from ninety-nine Chapters. American History programs were the focus of 242 meetings; 98 programs in American History were given to other groups. Displays totaled 182 with 71 of these in public sites other than schools; publicity on American History included 1,373 spot announcements for a total of 1,139 minutes of radio and TV. Press inches tallied 4,687.

The essay contest, "A Letter from Valley Forge: Winter 1777-1778", was conducted in 234 schools with 5,309 students participating. Three thousand two hundred five (3,205) certificates and 127 bronze medals were given by Chapters to these American History essayists. Christopher Columbus essay contest involved 108 high school students with certificates awarded to 38. Fifty-three (53) certificates for outstanding work in American History and 44 medals were presented. Monetary awards were over \$300.00. Outstanding women in America were the topic of twenty-two programs. Three women were selected for the new National project to identify American women of historical significance.

It has been a privilege to work with the district Vice Chairmen; appreciation for their service and competent work is given to Annette Johnson, Martha Wright, Constance Page, Denise Fritze, Dedra Shuman and Donna King. Serving the Society has been an honor and a labor of love.

AMERICAN INDIANS

Ann Scott Williams (Ms.), Chairman

My goal for us was to provide a scholarship for Intervention and Prevention for "Drugs and Gangs not the way". Summer Camp 2003 was rallied by Georgia Daughters to make it a reality. The following was accomplished by the 97 chapters reporting: food labels; monetary contributions; creative programs; and remembering America's first people with "Indian Minutes". As a result of work put forth by these chapters, our standard was elevated to a higher level of achievement. Therefore, the

objectives of the National Society were accomplished. Madame State Regent, I am honored to have been given this opportunity to serve.

AMERICANISM and DAR MANUAL for CITIZENSHIP Jean Wallace Brown (Mrs. Julian A., Sr.), Chairman

Of the 98 chapters reporting, 22 chapters reported "activity" for the Americanism Committee. There are 44 chapters that have an Americanism Chairman. There were 795 DAR Manuals for Citizenship given to applicants. Approximately 300 manuals were given to schools, public libraries, and volunteer instructors of the applicants. Georgia Daughters continue to volunteer many hours to teach English as a second language to immigrants studying to become American citizens. Brunswick, College Hill, Fort Frederica, Martha Stewart Bulloch and Savannah Chapters actively participated in 12 Naturalization ceremonies. They welcomed new citizens, and gave a short overview of the DAR. They gave the new citizens copies of "The American's Creed", the National Anthem, "What America Means To You", small American flags, and pamphlets explaining the DAR organization. CHILDREN of the AMERICAN REVOLUTION Frances Charlene Hall (Ms.), Chairman

2002-2003 has been the year of accepting and meeting C.A.R. challenges. Presented to Georgia DAR members during the summer workshops, the challenges for the Georgia Daughters consisted of gaining new members and fund-raising for the Georgia State Society Children of the American Revolution.

Twenty-seven Georgia chapters reported taking these challenges, and five proved exemplary in their efforts. One C.A.R. Society was organized this year, Liberty Tree Society in Warner Robins, sponsored by the Sukey Hart Chapter, and one was reorganized, Count D'Estaing Society, Athens, sponsored by the Elijah Clarke Chapter. Additionally, Sukey Hart Chapter met a second challenge by contributing the most funds to the Georgia State Society. Hightower Chapter followed closely behind. Augustin Clayton Chapter met the challenge of including C.A.R. and the Button Gwinnett C.A.R. Society in numerous programs and meetings. Nancy Hart, George

DAR SCHOOL

Phyllis Johnson Tanner (Mrs. H. Carl), Chairman

The Hightower Award was presented to 65 chapters with Joseph Habersham and Brunswick being honored for the greatest per capita contributions to the state projects. Ninety-one (91) chapters presented full programs or two-minute spots on the schools: 41,761 plus labels; 33,822 plus pounds of thrift; 6 Friends of the Schools with 6 eligible for pins. Chapter activities supporting the schools included: Christmas and Halloween parties: sale of Christmas ornaments; Easter baskets; scholarships; donations of school, craft, cleaning and paper supplies; clothing; personal necessities; linens; a SUV; costume jewelry; ink cartridges; box tops; a computer; books; sending birthday gifts and cards; Angel Tree fund; trips to Atlanta area; and, providing "extras" for a graduating senior at Tamassee. The Georgia Society acknowledges with grateful appreciation the generosity of Mrs. Kay Hightower and her family for funding the Hightower Award.

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERANS

Seventy-five chapters participated in activities honoring our veterans and gave of their time, gifts, and services at VAMCs, State Veterans' Homes and nursing homes. Six hundred and fifteen Georgia Daughters including 18 knitters and 35 youth volunteers gave 4,522 hours of service and participated in 177 activities. Their contributions included: cash/canteen - \$2,812.83; comfort items - \$3,336.06; food - \$7,813.40; magazines/books - \$3,820.00; gifts - \$9,302.21; stamps - 69.09 pounds; and, 13,037 miles traveled. JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS Ellen Canup Hale (Mrs. B. Edward), Chairman

As Junior American Citizens Chairman, I received 95 chapter reports. thrilled to announce that 1,317 Georgia school age youth experienced the enthusiasm of 20 chapters who sponsored or participated in JAC activities. Sixty-one classrooms or groups from fourteen schools participated in a wide array of activities; two new youth groups were sponsored. Contributions to the National JAC Prize Fund totaled \$322.00. Chapters distributed over 2,200 pieces of JAC supplies during this school year, including 44 American flags. This Chairman was captivated by the level of artistic and creative imagination that was presented through contest entries to depict this year's theme, "America the Beautiful". Chapter reported receiving 457 contest This Chairman received thirty-three contest entries from four chapters: Abraham Baldwin; Fielding Lewis; Martha Stewart Bulloch; and, Thomasville. Youth from K through 12: created artistic banners, posters, stamps and photographic essays; expressed their thought through poetry and short stories; and, presented community service documentaries. JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP

It is such an encouragement to see the increase in Georgia Junior involvement in all levels of DAR service – chapter, state and national. Ninety-eight chapters reported having 25 Juniors serving as chapter officers, 48 as chapter chairmen and three as Regents. Changes have included: a new Junior Shoppe website, which allows Daughters to shop online anytime; the computerization of Junior Shoppe inventory and sales figures; and collaboration with Junior Shoppes in other states to introduce many new and exciting products. There has been an overwhelming response from the Georgia Daughters, resulting in record sales for the Juniors! A few chapters have even had the good fortune to be able to shop at chapter meetings! As always, all profits from Junior Shoppe sales benefit the

Helen Pouch Memorial Fund. This Vice-Chairman would like to give a big "Thank You" to the Georgia Daughters for the amazing support you have shown for the Georgia Junior Shoppe!

LINEAGE RESEARCH Sylvia Brown Jensen (Mrs. Leo S.), Chairman

Of the 97 chapter reports received, 52 chapters reported activity in Lineage Research. There were 59 Look-up Volunteers responding to 272 requests as well as 80 requests made to the Lineage Research Committee with 51 successful completions. Also, 60 requests were submitted to the LRLV board. Chapters sponsored 68 Lineage Workshops resulting in the completion of 31 applications. Ten applications have been verified and the others are pending. There were 47 chapters whose members participated in genealogy workshops sponsored by other organizations and/or provided them with DAR information. As a result, there were 15 applications and five new members. Eight other Georgia Daughters have provided me with lists of sources they are willing to search. Internet research by chapters using Persi, ancestry.com, rootsweb, USGOV sites, Family search, county genealogy pages, and the Patriot Index provided useful information. Also, the workshops at Fall Board were very helpful and the upcoming workshop in April is anticipated. Chapters reported the opportunity to use and receive instruction at school computer laboratories. Many thanks to all that have volunteered to do look-ups.

MEMBERSHIP

Mary Barfield Thompson (Mrs. Billy H.), Chairman

For the third consecutive year, the traveling Silver Bowl was presented to the Augustin Clayton Chapter for the most new members by application; 42. Six hundred fourteen (614) prospective member referrals for 2002 were sent to chapters from the following sources: National Member Services, Patriot Look-up, State VIS Chairman, members, and individuals interested in membership. Appreciation is expressed to chapters which faithfully contacted these referrals. In October, 2002, the National Society created a database system which greatly enhanced referral procedures. Official NSDAR membership count for Georgia on January 1, 2003: 7078 in 104 chapters. There were 339 new members by application and a net overall gain of 82 members for 2002. Under the superb leadership of Linda Douglas, Vice Chairman of Membership Development, the first ever Membership Workshop was held at Fall Awards given at State Conference: 62 Certificates for membership achievement were given to 39 chapters, 12 individual Certificates in appreciation for support of Georgia membership, 26 chapters received certificates for excellence in contacting referrals. Four chapter awards were given in each of these areas: publicity, retaining membership, and getting new members involved. Eight Georgia Daughters entered National's 2003 Essay Contest.

MEMBERSHIP DEVELOPMENT TEAM Linda Reed Douglas (Mrs. John D., Jr.), Vice Chairman

This Vice Chairman coordinated the first ever Workshops at Fall Board, attendance 156 members representing 74 chapters. There were six general interest sessions covering Basic Computer, Publicity, Census Records, Application Updates, Programs/Newsletters/Joint Meetings, and Military/Land Records. Four teams met with chapters requesting assistance to increase membership. A Forum for membership applications is planned with the Volunteer Genealogists State Chairman

for State Conference. This Vice Chairman has given three membership programs to the Chehaw, Colonel Daniel Appling and Hawkinsville Chapters, and one genealogy program to Thronateeska. Three chapters were assisted with genealogy workshops for the public: Leiutenant James Monroe, John Houstoun and Governor Treutlen. Application workshops were conducted for the Colonel Daniel Appling, Captain Thomas Cobb, Nathaniel Macon, Thomasville, Oglethorpe, and General James Jackson Chapters. Thank you, Madame State Regent, for the privilege of serving the State Society in this new, dynamic position.

NATIONAL DEFENSE

Camille Redfern Baxter (Mrs. Weston D.), Chairman

This National Defense Chairman is happy to announce 100% reporting from the 104 chapters in the Georgia State Society! One hundred one (101) chapters kept members informed by devoting at least three minutes to National Defense at each meeting. Sixty-five chapters had full programs, including three programs given by this Chairman. Forty-four chapters distributed National Defense materials to members and the public. Community involvement was at its finest when fifty-four chapters gave 225 Good Citizenship medals. Fifty-four chapters recognized excellent ROTC students who demonstrate loyalty and patriotism with 225 ROTC medals and twenty-eight gold medals. Seventy chapters were generous with their dollars, donating \$451.00 to the NSDAR ROTC award program. Nineteen chapters proudly reported that they have three members on active duty and twenty-seven members retired from the Armed Forces. Chapters offered minimal suggestions to enhance work of the Committee. This Chairman attended eight Cherokee Chapter meetings, the 105th Georgia State Conference, the 111th Continental Congress, and six District Workshops where she made six presentations for the National Defense Committee. Complete information was compiled in a 3-page letter included in the Regent's Serving Georgia Daughters continues to be a source of great pleasure. Thank, you, Madame State Regent, for that opportunity and that honor.

PUBLIC RELATIONS, MOTION PICTURE, RADIO AND TELEVISION Nancy Bunker Bowen (Mrs. J. Thomas), Chairman

Reports from ninety-nine chapters indicate increased public awareness of DAR through public relations. Chapter activities and programs were published in 834 print articles, a 36% increase over last year! Also featuring GSDAR were 589 photographs, 1,503 radio spots, 22 radio news programs, 189 television spots, and four television news programs. Thirty-nine chapters published membership newsletters; six chapters produced informational brochures designed to assist in membership development. Independence Day activities sponsored by 19 Georgia chapters were publicized, and 58 chapters reported publicity about chapter-sponsored Commemorative Events such as Constitution Week or Flag Day. The Vidalia Chapter reported 1,096 inches of newspaper coverage, much of it about their sponsorship of the 6th grade National winner of the DAR American History Essay Contest and co-sponsorship of the Concert in the Park musical series. Chapters reported increased use of the Internet, the use of email to contact media, and the development of on-line chapter newsletters and websites. Many chapters still reported disappointment about the number of news and feature articles published; efforts will be made to develop a more competitive approach to the news media. It has been a pleasure, a privilege, and a challenge to serve the State Society as Public Relations Chairman.

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA Donna Rave Johnson (Miss). Chairman

Georgia Daughters in ninety-nine chapters have been proudly flying the American Flag in their communities during this past year. Flags presented included 295 large. 1,291 small, and 1,287 table. Flag materials distributed included 2,615 copies of the Flag Code, 31 Flag certificates, 320 Flag pins, and other literature of 2,500 pieces, mostly Pledge of Allegiance bookmarks and Old Glory. Ninety-six chapters reported reciting the Pledge of Allegiance at each meeting; sixty-one chapters presented "Flag Facts"; and, ninety-three chapters encouraged others to "Fly the Flag". Twenty-eight chapters involved youth in C.A.R., JAC, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, church groups, and school children in Flag promotion activities. Georgia Daughters continue to provide schools and other community locations with American Flags, Georgia Flags, and even flag poles. Programs have been presented to Chapter Daughters and to the public on the American Flag, including its origin and meaning, its history throughout the ages, the man who wrote the Pledge of Allegiance, restoration of the Star Spangled Banner, how to fold the Flag, and retirement ceremonies to show the proper disposal of an old, worn-out Flag. VOLUNTEER INFORMATION SPECIALISTS Jane Joyner Hampton (Mrs. W. Charles), Chairman

Ninety-eight of the 104 Georgia Chapters reported this year. Sixty-three members worked on chapter projects, 15 worked on State projects and 28 worked on National projects. Members used their computers in various ways: web page designing, newsletters, genealogy research, State Committee work, National Indexing jobs, directories, writing books, hosting GenWeb site, printing programs, yearbooks, correspondence, buying on-line and disseminating DAR news. This Chairman participated in the Computer Workshop at the Fall Board and is participating in a National Project gathering information regarding all past Vice Presidents General from Georgia. Fourteen new web sites were added this year for a total of 45 web pages currently linked to the National Page. This Chairman contacted all 104 Georgia Chapters by E-mail or postal mail. Web page contact addresses were confirmed. Ten chapters had new E-mail contacts listed with National. Currently only four remain unlinked with E-mail. Thirteen chapters had web pages linked to National; one is currently awaiting approval. All Chapters without web pages were given instructions on creating a web page and the offer of

SPECIAL NATIONAL COMMITTEES

DAR PROJECT PATRIOT

Project Patriot is a committee all Daughters can join! Whether donating \$25.00 for Patriot packages and sending greeting cards (Phases I and II) and/or sending Christmas cards and phone cards (Phase III), all Daughters are encouraged to participate to show appreciation and support of our troops on the nuclear aircraft carrier, USS John C, Stennis stationed in the Persian Gulf. This Chairman provided information regarding Project Patriot in the summer packet; complete information is available on the Internet at www.projectpatriot.com. Master questionnaire reports were not included in the summer packet, and consequently, this Chairman received none. However, three Georgia chapters did report to this Chairman, one on the form provided by the web site and the other two by note. The State Treasurer reported two chapters made cash donations through her office. The National Chairman, Beth Bugbee, has requested that cash donations be made directly to the Treasurer General. Please remember that this project is a National Society approved project created to show our love and support of our young men and women involved in protecting our freedom – both yours and mine – in the war against terrorism. DAR SPEAKERS STAFF Judith Lillard Hughes (Mrs. Charles T.), Chairman

The objectives of the DAR Speakers Staff Committee are: (1) to promote a steady increase in new members; (2) to act as a liaison between the National Society and the chapters; and (3) to speak before civic and non-DAR groups in the community. Members of the Speakers Staff are recommended by the State Regent and appointed by the President General. There are 31 members on the Georgia State Society's Speakers Staff. These members speak on DAR objectives and general policies among other topics. During the reporting period, 140 programs were given, 84 to DAR groups and 43 to non-DAR groups. Eight talks were given outside of the state. The estimated total number of people reached was 4,034. The two most requested topics were Membership-Genealogy and the U. S. Flag. When your chapter or a group in your community requests a speaker, refer to the State Directory or the Proceedings for the list of members available.

INSIGNIA

Joan Phillips Millar (Mrs. J. Donald), Chairman

Reports were received from two chapters. Both did an outstanding job and purchased insignia and pins totaling \$9,046.78. This Chairman presented two Insignia workshops, attended all six district workshops, Fall Board of Management and State Conference, informing members of pins that are available and proper placement. New Caldwell order forms were made available as well as information and sources for pin guards and ribbons. Members were urged to redeem DAR pins found in flea markets, garage sales, and on the Internet. Members were also urged to enter the awards contest this Chairman presented, and to wear their pins proudly at all appropriate occasions. Madame Regent, it was a pleasure to work with you.

LITERACY CHALLENGE Barbara Phillips Nuss (Mrs. Fred K.), Chairman

One hundred twenty-six members of 53 chapters volunteered a total of 9,181 hours working and helping children and adults to read or become more literate. Many mentored children through literacy programs in schools, libraries, pre-school and Head Start programs. Members tutored adults for them to pass their GEDs and get a diploma, enabled a 35-year old man to read and one member is working with a 70-year old dyslexic man who is making progress. Books, magazines and money were also donated to literacy programs. Members helped immigrants to learn our language, particularly colloquial phrases. One member tutored and three others read to adults and children with limited vision. One of our members received a Community Service Award for 50 years of work with illiterates for the court system. Another member teaches in her local jails and started a "learn to read" program there. We can be so proud of our Daughters for giving of their time, skills and money to help others to be able to read and speak our language.

PRESIDENT GENERAL'S PROJECT

Amy Louise Jester Fountain (Mrs. Robert G., Sr.), Chairman

The President General's Project spans three years of donation to it from the chapter members through their chapters. This is the second year chapters have been contributing to this administration's President General's Project. Each chapter should have reached the two-thirds giving level at this conference. Through the date of 2-12-2003, we had 36 chapters who have reached the one-third level, 34 chapters at the two-thirds level and eight chapters who have attained 100%. Madame State Regent, I will try and have 100% level participation for our chapters at the close of our final year for the Watkins Administration. This has been a difficult year for me with the death of my husband during our District Workshops, and two other family members this February. Thank you for your patience and understanding. I have enjoyed serving on this committee under you leadership.

VOLUNTEER GENEALOGISTS Diane McCranie Redkevitch (Mrs. Zenon), Chairman

Preparations for the Field Genealogy Workshop, which will be held at the end of April in Atlanta, started last July. Publicity and registration forms were made available in August. Reservations for the Workshop were quickly filled and a long waiting list was established. The Workshop trains Field Genealogists in the NSDAR methods of preparing membership application papers. Attendees can then present teaching seminars to application preparers. This is the first time Georgia is

sponsoring such a genealogy workshop, and we are very excited to be involved. Staff genealogists fro NSDAR will present the Workshop, and the National Registrar and National Chairman of Volunteer Genealogists will attend.

I have spoken at DAR meetings, S.A.R. meetings, genealogy forums, and the Fall Board on various subjects. My goal for the State is for each chapter to have a Field and/or Volunteer Genealogist to help with applications and supplementals. The better our papers the quicker they will all be verified. We now have 20 Volunteer Genealogists in Georgia. Linda Douglas, a Field Genealogist, has presented teaching seminars throughout the state, visiting College Park, Baxley, Thomasville, Columbus, Macon and Valdosta. The Augustin Clayton Chapter membership has soared due to help from their Volunteer Genealogists.

WOMEN'S ISSUES

Sally Richardson Hardin (Mrs. Joseph W.), Chairman

While this committee is relatively new, there was good participation this year. The number of essays was disappointing, but the number and variety of programs was quite encouraging. Georgia Daughters do show a depth of concern for each other, and the population as a whole.

The statistical report for this committee shows of the 98 chapter reporting, 53 had no report, seven chapters had participants in the essay contest, and 24 had programs on women's issues. The activities of the 45 chapters who reported included participation in: breast cancer events, including the Race for the Cure; voting machine education; Relay for Life as sponsors and participants; help in New York City following the 9/11 disaster; dental health; women's rights here and abroad; volunteer hospice speakers; brain disorders; Red Cross blood banks; American Heart Association; multiple sclerosis; Habitat for Humanity; United Way; League of Women Voters; and, many local charities.

Leitch, Miss Susan deCamp Conger, Mrs. David S. Manker, and Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr., State Regent. Prayer was offered by Mrs. Baxter.

The Chairman welcomed the committee and thanked them for their attendance.

The Minutes of the November 1, 2002 meeting were approved as mailed. With no objections, the Chairman will appoint a committee of three to approve the March Minutes for the Proceedings.

Mrs. Parsons, State Treasurer, distributed copies of the Summary of Accounts for the Georgia State Society and the Meadow Garden Museum Fund which were reviewed and filed. All statements are reconciled with the bank statements. The error in the 941 form occurring January 2002 has been cleared and letters on file. It was noted all credits and debits against budgeted items have been made from the additional income from sales of Proceedings and directories. As an added comment, the State Treasurer advised against purchasing a computer for the State Treasurer because of cost and maintenance and need of up-grading.

The Chairman distributed information on the Resolution adopted in reference to use of funds under "New Administration for Contingencies Fund" as stated on page 86 of the 2001-2002 State Proceedings. A total of \$8,726.19 was transferred to the Money Market Account for Meadow Garden on 30 April 2002. This total, less the difference of \$73.52 which is for the cost of the auditor in reference to a tax issue with Meadow Garden from the previous administration less the amount of the refund received, is to be credited to Capital Investment Funds #2 and #3 when each matures. Capital Investment Fund #2 matures on 24 July 2003. At that time \$4,260.27 shall be added to said fund, making the Capital Investment Fund #2 a jumbo account, totaling \$100,000.00. When Capital Investment Fund #3 matures on 13 August 2003, the

difference of \$4,392.40 will be added to the new certificate, bringing the total principal in that account to \$97,046.92.

Mrs. Bell distributed copies of the revised proposed budget for 2003-2004. Miss Conger moved "the budget presented on March 27, 2003 at the Finance Committee meeting be adopted." Seconded by Mrs. Whitson and adopted. This budget will be presented to the State Conference. The Chairman requested the State Regent have copies made of the new proposed budget for distribution to the Conference voters at the opening business session of the Conference. Miss Conger volunteered to have copies made of the proposed budget.

Indexed by ancestor, this book is helpful to registrars, members, and prospective



MEADOW GARDEN MUSEUM - BOARD MINUTES

The Meadow Garden Museum Board met Tuesday, July 23, 2002, in the Board Room at Meadow Garden in Augusta, GA. State Regent and Chairman of the Board, Rose Elyea Bell, called the meeting to order at 10:30 a.m. Other members present were: Shelby Alderman Whitson, Secretary; Billie Gardner Hunter, Susan deCamp Conger, Jean Everett Johnson, Margaret Poole Cagle, Louise Lockhart Henry, Josephine Rhodes Agostas, Tommie Elaine Shattuck, Alae Risse Barron Leitch and Ann Parker Parsons.

Following the opening prayer by Mrs. Leitch, Mrs. Bell welcomed the members and being the first meeting of the new Board, asked everyone to introduce themselves. Mrs. Bell thanked each one for their dedication and willingness to serve on the Board. Referring to the Bylaws of the State Society and Standing Rules of Meadow Garden Museum, Mrs. Bell noted there was no provision for any substitutions if any member would be unable to attend a meeting.

The Minutes of the June 4, 2002 Board Meeting were distributed to those present and a copy of the Standing Rules for the Meadow Garden Museum. The Minutes of the previous Board meeting were approved by the Chairman of the Board and will be published in the *Proceedings* which would be available at the upcoming August District Workshops. Secretary, Mrs. Whitson, read the Standing Rules for the Meadow Garden Museum.

Mrs. Parsons, State Treasurer, stated she had no report since the financial records had not been received from the auditor. She distributed copies of the June 3, 2002 Meadow Garden Summary of Fund Accounts and Maintenance Report and a copy of the Bank of America transaction history of the Meadow Garden Museum checking account June 3, 2002 – July 17, 2002. All checks written by the previous State Treasurer have not yet cleared the bank. Balance in checking as of July 19, 2002 was \$12,589.42. Expenditures since July 17, 2002 include \$680.27 Payroll, \$199.92 FTD, \$202.98 Georgia Power for a total of \$1,184.17. Mrs. Parsons noted the Certificate of Deposit of the Gatehouse Fund, at the First National Bank of Baldwin County in Milledgeville, would mature August 16th and will be reinvested rather than rolled over.

Mrs. Bell stated the contract with the Public Broadcasting for the weekly radio spot for Meadow Garden had expired. This spot was aired once a week, usually between the hours of 6- 9:00 a.m., at a cost of \$143.00 per month. After discussion, Miss Conger made the motion "to renew the contract." There being no second, the contract will not be renewed. It was noted most money came from walk-ins with many learning of Meadow Garden through Triple A.

Mrs. Hunter, Museum Chairman, had no report. She recommended raising the salary of House Manager, Susan Jackson. Mrs. Cagle moved "to increase Susan's salary on the 1-1/2 year anniversary of her employment to \$8.00 an hour." Motion was seconded by Mrs. Shattuck and adopted. It was noted this anniversary date would begin with the September 2002 check for August work. Mrs. Hunter also asked for opinions on continued participation in the Heritage Days which is in February. Mrs. Henry moved "to continue to support Heritage Days in Augusta." Motion was seconded by Mrs. Hunter and adopted. Mrs. Hunter and the Docents Chairman will be in charge.

Mrs. Cagle, Docents Chairman, stated another workshop was needed and a date would be set for September. Each workshop is approximately two and one half hours. The date will be announced at the District Workshops in August.

Ms. Susan Jackson, House Manager, was invited to give her report. Since January 1, 2002, total tourists numbered 1,018 of which 388 were walk-ins. \$1,783.00 was the total income from tours and, the Museum Shop sales at Meadow Garden totaled \$1,214.00. Since June 2002, fourteen Docents representing five chapters volunteered 161 hours and 20 minutes. Total volunteer hours year to date are 525 hours and 30 minutes. Five members of the Cherokee Rose Garden Club worked a total of 12 and 3/4 combined hours.

Mrs. Henry, Furnishing Chairman, displayed the 1894 Victorian Party dress, a blouse and camisole, which had been hand cleaned by Chris Hudson of Madison. The camisole had some repair work done also. Mrs. Henry will look into a protective cover for the party dress.

Mrs. Henry reported the late 1700's musket, identified by Gordon Blaker of the Augusta History Museum as a hunting musket, made by Wilson Minories, (which was the name found on the gun) and likely used in battle. It had been stripped of its

decorations prior to coming to Meadow Garden. It will be displayed in one of the bedrooms.

Picture boards have been made so that handicapped people not able to see the actual room, may see how the rooms appear.

Five rooms and both halls have been completed in the revision of the Docents' Manual. Work continues on the revision.

Contact will be made with a new furniture appraiser, who is used by the Augusta History Museum, for the furniture in the Augusta Room. The black furniture in the Augusta Room is dated too late (1860's) for use at Meadow Garden Museum. Two people have shown interest in purchasing the furniture. Furniture for the room should be of the Greek Revival Period dating 1815-1845.

The Windsor Chairs for the front porch will be ordered. Construction will begin about five months after the order and a check for half the cost is received. This is made possible from a donation from the Georgia State Society, Children of the American Revolution.

Two reproduction Windsor Chairs – a rocker and a side chair - were donated by Mrs. Mary Herndon and her family. The chairs were purchased in 1949. Presently, they are in the boy's bedroom and will remain there until more is learned about the actual date of the chairs.

It was noted that the black etagere in the Board Room was from the family of Mr. Bob Walton, who had bought the piece from the son of Madame LaVert. Mrs. Agostas, who knows the family, will inquire about any other Walton furniture the family may have.

Going on to the Restoration Report, Mrs. Henry told the group of the illness of Miles Whitfield which she had learned about through his assistant, Phillip Greene. He is having to adjust to medication, rest and a new diet but anticipates getting back to work.

Joey Smalley has rewrapped the H/AC pipes and water pipes. He replaced the insulation under the old house and installed polyurethane under the house. The pipes in the kitchen and workroom were painted brown to match the ceiling beams. The new back porch railing, the rebuilt front railing, and the back steps were painted. The new yard sign posts were painted and a kitchen window was recaulked and painted. The charge was \$2,090.25.

Ted Baker installed a borrowed hinge (from Augusta Room door) to make the front door operational. Replacement hinges need to be ordered from Ball and Ball as there are no stock sizes. This will need to be a special order. Mrs. Shattuck moved "that Louise Henry be allowed to buy four hinges." Motion was seconded by Mrs. Cagle and adopted. Mr. Baker also brought an estimate for carpentry work and materials for the office. This would consist of a base cabinet similar to a kitchen cabinet with counter top on the right side; behind the door a tall cabinet with two fold-back doors in which to store museum shop items, and an open bookcase-type cabinet would be used for office supplies. The side wall would be opened with two open-out doors to make some storage under the eaves. Estimate for the work is \$1,500.00

Junior Grantham will come to look at the kitchen and workroom walls. This will have to be done before any cabinetry work is done in the office. Mrs. Cagle moved "to postpone the discussion on the work in the office to build shelves and prepare walls until the next Board meeting." Motion was seconded by Miss Conger and adopted. Mrs. Henry will get an estimate on the wall work to report at the next Board meeting.

Wade Warner will install the new downstairs AC climate control by the end of July. This work was approved at the previous June meeting.

Mrs. Henry passed around a clipping of a possible Gazebo type design which might be appropriate in lieu of a Gatehouse for Meadow Garden. The design shape could have glass wall inserts with several sliding glass doors. The building could be used for instructional classes, lunches or small meetings. She also noted we were out of pink flyers and had investigated a different sort of flyer with a new design. She will order new flyers and perhaps have them at State Board in November.

Landscaping Chairman, Mrs. Agostas, had no report but was looking for a new person to care for the lawn. By general consent, she will ask her own yard man. She may also talk with the people at the Walton Rehab Center.

Mrs. Shattuck, Museum Shop Chairman, told the Board of her contact with Professor John Waters, who is willing to give a free proposal for further development and land acquisition for Meadow Garden. Louise Henry will contact him for further discussion. By general consent, Mrs. Shattuck will compare prices with two different companies on the regular Meadow Garden stationery and additional sheets showing interior rooms. After discussion, Miss Conger moved "that an amount not to exceed \$800.00 be advanced to the Meadow Garden Museum Gift Shop Chairman for the purchase of sales items for the Meadow Garden Gift Shop." Motion was seconded by Mrs. Leitch and adopted.

Mrs. Leitch, Patrons Chairman, reported she had added the names from the previous administration to the Patrons Book. She will write thank you notes to Mrs. Herndon for the Windsor Chairs and to the disbanded Birdsville Chapter for their monetary donation of \$50.41.

Under Unfinished Business: Mrs. Bell read a letter from Richard Kennedy, who appraised the brass shell casing dated September 1901. He stated it was a six inch Naval shell casing, valued at approximately \$200. Mrs. Henry moved "that the shell casing, dated 1901 manufacture, be donated to the Augusta Museum of History to its Curator, Gordon Blaker." Motion was seconded by Mrs. Agostas and adopted. Mrs. Henry added that Mr. Blaker had given numerous volunteer hours of his expertise to Meadow Garden and was desirous of the shell casing for the History Museum.

New Business: Mrs. Bell stated that the subject of copyrighting or trademarking the name of Meadow Garden had come up in the past but had not been pursued. She contacted a Columbus DAR member, Teresa Howard, who is an attorney, about possible help. The name could be trademarked for \$375.00. After discussion, Mrs. Henry moved "to trademark the name Meadow Garden." Motion was seconded by Mrs. Agostas and adopted. Teresa Howard will help with the paper work (image, picture, copy right) and the Board would file it. Mrs. Henry moved "to trademark an appropriate picture of the home of George Walton of Meadow Garden." Motion was seconded by Mrs. Shattuck and adopted.

Mrs. Bell called the Board's attention to the previous June Minutes about the cost of protecting the windows at Meadow Garden. This was only to make the new Board aware this was brought up and the information available.

Mrs. Bell reported the acceptance of a \$500.00 check from the National Society, S.A.R. to the Georgia DAR for giving the most help in obtaining new members for their Society. This is the 7th year in a row that Georgia DAR has received this award. By general consent, the money would preferably be used for other Walton family pieces.

Mrs. Whitson read a letter from DAR member, Jean Cole Manker, who on behalf of the Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter, presented a book to Meadow Garden in Mrs.

Bell's honor, *Historical Collections of Georgia Chapters, NSDAR, Volume II*, published 1929. The book was abstracted and compiled in 1927 by Grace Gilliam Davidson (Mrs. John Lee) who was Georgia State Historian 1926-1928. The total volume focused on the early records of Augusta and Richmond County and included a section on the Walton family.

Mrs. Bell asked the Patrons Chairman to review a more variety in Patron Levels. Suggestions were made: Benefactor \$1,000; Sustaining \$500; Donor \$300, Chapter \$100, Individual \$50 and Friend \$25. This will necessitate a change in the Meadow Garden Standing Rules voted on by the Meadow Garden Museum Board and to be approved at the 2003 State Conference. Offering to help Mrs. Leitch were Miss Conger and Mrs. Johnson.

Mrs. Bell then told of her visit to the Byrd Cookie Company in Savannah about the possibility of a fund raiser for Meadow Garden. She brought samples of the Key Lime Coolers and Chocolate Mint Cookies. A design for a cover for the cookie tin will be submitted. A box of cookies would cost approximately \$6.00 and could be sold for \$10-12.00, realizing a \$4-6.00 profit. Mrs. Shattuck moved "that Meadow Garden Museum Sales be approved to sell Byrd Cookies." Motion was seconded by Mrs. Hunter and enthusiastically adopted. Mrs. Shattuck will be in charge of the project.

Mrs. Bell stated that Sue Wilson of Brunswick was working on the Georgia Home Page Web Site with a link on Meadow Garden.

The next Meadow Garden Board meeting will be Friday, November 1st at 2:00 p.m. at the Plantation Lodge in Jackson, Georgia.

There being no further business, the blessing was offered by Mrs. Leitch and the meeting was adjourned for lunch at 1:40 p.m.

The Meadow Garden Museum Board met on Friday, November 1, 2002 at the Plantation Lodge in Jackson, GA. State Regent and Chairman of the Board, Rose Elyea Bell, called the meeting to order at 2:20 p.m. Other members present were Shelby Alderman Whitson, Secretary; Billie Gardner Hunter, Jean Everett Johnson, Margaret Poole Cagle, Louise Lockhart Henry, Alae Risse Barron Leitch, Ann Parker Parsons, ex-officio member Julia Ann Farrigan and Advisor, Edwina Hall Beall.

Following the opening prayer by Mrs. Leitch, Mrs. Bell welcomed the members and thanked them for attending the meeting.

The Secretary read the Minutes of the July 23, 2002 meeting and were approved with two editorial changes.

Mrs. Parsons, State Treasurer, distributed the Summary of Fund Accounts, May 11, 2002 through October 20, 2002 which was reviewed and filed. She noted the Gatehouse Fund had been split into two C.D.'s for different maturity dates and better interest rates. Letters regarding the exemption of state sales tax had been written to Bell South and Georgia Power. An explanation was given regarding the unusual sum labeled "miscellaneous". This included disbursements from the previous administration during the interim period from May to July. Mrs. Cagle moved "to move \$8,000 from the money market to the checking account." Motion was seconded by Mrs. Whitson and adopted.

Mrs. Bell stated she had made an emergency decision by phone to replace the compressor on the furnace. Mrs. Henry moved "that the replacement of the compressor which was made by phone be ratified." Motion was seconded by Mrs. Whitson and adopted.

Mrs. Hunter, Museum Chairman, reported the pest control company had inspected for termites on September 27 and everything looked good. The telephone had been replaced with a new one and plans for Open House on December 7th were complete.

Mrs. Cagle, Docents Chairman, reported that she and Mrs. Hunter had met with the Cotton Exchange to discuss tour prices and rules for late tours or cancellations. She suggested that docents have a certain time limit for tours in order that all finish at the same time. If tour groups are late and tours have already begun, the docents will speak to the group outside and then walk them through the house. Mrs. Cagle moved "that there be a price change to be more in line with other Augusta Tours through the Cotton Exchange: \$3.50 for adults, \$2.00 Senior Citizens and \$1.00 for school children." Motion was seconded by Mrs. Hunter and adopted. A docent workshop was held on September 30th with five trainees in attendance. Mrs. Cagle moved "that we enter the Annual Preservation Award from the Georgia Trust for Renovation of Meadow Garden with an application fee of \$25." Motion was seconded by Mrs. Hunter and adopted.

Mrs. Henry, Furnishings Chairman, reported she was organizing a small group to review and make recommendations as to the acceptance or rejection of items offered to Meadow Garden Museum. This group will also research questionable items already in the Museum. The 1860 Victorian horsehair chairs and sofas were appraised by Lynn Thompson at a total price of \$2,525 with a breakdown of \$850 and \$1,000 for the two sofas respectively, one arm chair at \$175 and four side chairs at \$125 each. Interest in the furniture has been expressed by Gordon Blaker of the Augusta History Museum and Erick Montgomery at the Woodrow Wilson house. Miss Thompson also has interested clients. Mrs. Whitson moved "to accept bids for the Augusta Room furniture; i.e., one arm chair, four side chairs and two sofas, not to be less than \$2,525 and accept the highest bid." Motion was seconded by Mrs. Henry and adopted. Mrs. Henry stated she had made forms (based on similar forms used by the Augusta History Museum), which will be completed and kept on file for the accessioning and de-accessioning of items in the permanent collection. She has also secured prices of \$800 and \$1,200 for the construction of a Plexiglas cover for the 1894 Victorian party dress. The Shelf Clock, repaired and case restored by the Walker Clock Company, has been returned to the Museum. This restoration was a gift from Ellen Turner of the Augusta Chapter. The four Sack Windsor Chairs donated by the Georgia Society, Children of the American Revolution, will be delivered in mid November with the balance due before delivery. Dedication plans are in progress. The funds remaining in the C.A.R. donation will be used for other front porch needs. Pictures of the style of Greek Revival furniture suggested for the Augusta Room were distributed.

In the absence of Josephine Rhodes Agostas, Landscaping Chairman, Mrs. Cagle reported that the new yard man, Omer Steedley, cuts and edges the yard weekly. Along the canal side, an area by the cedar tree has been created for oak leaf hydrangeas and pomegranates to be edged with daylilies. Master Gardeners from the Cherokee Rose Garden Club maintain the "Weavers Garden" and have created a bed on the left side of the house for hydrangeas, viola and phlox. A vegetable garden of collards, turnips and onions was planted next to the herb garden. Plans are being made for a raised bed for a Knot Garden next to the grape arbor. Preparation would include removal of the grass and loads of dirt brought in at a minimum of \$200. Mrs. Cagle

moved "to proceed with the Knot Garden to spend an initial cost of \$200." The motion was seconded by Mrs. Johnson and adopted. A diagram of a Knot Garden was distributed. It was noted the C.A.R. will come to work in the yard on November 8th.

The Board was saddened to learn of the serious illness of Tommie Elaine Shattuck, Museum Shop Chairman. She sent her report. Total sales from the Workshop Tour amounted to \$3,285. An additional account was opened with Balloons, Inc. for possible purchase of novelty items. A contract was set with the Byrd Cookie Company of Savannah to purchase 240 tins of cookies (180 tins of Key Lime Coolers and 60 tins of Chocolate Mint cookies). The cost per tine of cookies is \$4.95 and 60 cents for the label. The tins will have a Meadow Garden label affixed and will sell for \$10 per tin. There was a \$24 charge for affixing the Meadow Garden labels on the tins. Inquiries have been made regarding notecards with views of the interior rooms at Meadow Garden Museum.

Mrs. Leitch, Patrons Chairman, reported that thank you notes have been written to eight member patrons, four chapter patrons and four patrons-in-kind.

Mrs. Henry reported on the continued restoration of Meadow Garden Museum. Ted Baker has re-hung the Augusta Room door with new hinges with a pair of hinges in reserve. Storage space has been created under the eaves at a cost of \$175. Mr. Johnson has removed the wallpaper from the office walls at a price of \$150. Half of the ceiling and the outside end wall had been sheet-rocked. Part of the plastered ceiling needs repair and most of the slip-coat is pealing away. The braided rug needs cleaning. Junior Grantham, plasterer, has given a price of \$3,500 to do the necessary work before the paper removal. When the plastering, painting, etc. is completed, Ted Baker will build the cabinetry in his shop and assemble them in the office. Mrs. Henry is looking for two small lantern type fixtures for the upstairs hall ceiling and an electric wall sconce for the office wall near the door. Mrs. Henry presented ideas for a "Meadow Garden Dependency" to accommodate space for instructional classes, meetings, luncheon or waiting space on inclement days. Also needed would be a handicap restroom and storage space. Current construction costs are running about \$120 per square foot. The suggested site location is near the car gate, running parallel to Independence Drive. The footprint would be 30' x 20', with clapboard siding and shake roof, one and a half stories. The floor would be brick at ground level so that a ramp would not be needed. The bottom floor of 600 square feet would have a fireplace, handicap restroom, storage room and steps to a small room upstairs. It would be necessary to make applications to the Historic Preservation Committee for the county and the Richmond County Planning and Zoning at a charge of \$125 combined cost. Sample pictures of dependencies were distributed. Mrs. Henry suggested that already having a Gatehouse Fund, perhaps this might present a "grant opportunity". Miss Farrigan stated she had made inquiries into grant money but to date had received no call backs. She will continue to check into other sources.

The next Board meeting will be Tuesday, January 7, 2003, at 10:30 a.m. in Augusta at Meadow Garden.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 4:15 p.m.

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The Meadow Garden Museum Board met on Tuesday, January 7, 2003 in the Board Room at Meadow Garden in Augusta, GA. State Regent and Chairman of the

Board, Rose Elyea Bell, called the meeting to order at 10:30 a.m. Other members present were Shelby Alderman Whitson, Secretary; Billie Gardner Hunter, Susan deCamp Conger, Jean Everett Johnson, Margaret Poole Cagle, Louise Lockhart Henry, Josephine Rhodes Agostas, Alae Risse Barron Leitch, Ann Parker Parsons and ex-officio member, Julia Ann Farrigan.

Following the opening prayer by Mrs. Leitch, Mrs. Bell welcomed the members and thanked them for driving to Augusta for the meeting.

The Secretary read the Minutes of the November 1, 2002 meeting and were approved as read.

Mrs. Parsons, State Treasurer, distributed the Summary of Fund Accounts, May 1, 2002 through December 20, 2002 which was reviewed and filed. Accounts were reconciled with the bank statements and a 941C form has been filed along with the 4th quarter 941 form to the IRS. This corrects the FDIC and withholding errors made in the first quarter of the previous year (2002).

Mrs. Hunter, Museum Chairman deferred her reporting to the individual chairmen.

Mrs. Cagle, Docents Chairman presented laminated writings and articles on Meadow Garden that had been published in *The Augusta Chronicle*. Adopted changes in tour rules regarding prices and chaperones have been sent to the Cotton Exchange. She noted the \$25 application fee to enter the Annual Preservation Award from the Georgia Trust was waived for non-profit groups, which included Meadow Garden Museum.

Susan Jackson, House Manager, was invited to come in to give her report. She gave a break down for the month of December and a year to date accounting of the number of tourists, income from tours and income from the Museum Shop Sales. Two members of the Cherokee Rose Garden Club helped in decorating for Christmas. Three non-DAR docents and 29 DAR members worked during December. Combined income year-to-date from tours and Museum Shop sales was \$3,128.00.

Mrs. Henry, Furnishings Chairman, reported delivery of the Sack Windsor Chairs would probably be in February. Mr. Gullberg, owner of Chairwright, offered free delivery of the chairs in exchange for permission to use Meadow Garden in advertisement. After discussion, Mrs. Henry moved "that Meadow Garden accept Mr. Bill Gullberg's, President of Chairwright, offer for free delivery of four Windsor chairs in exchange for advertising the chairs pictured on Meadow Garden's porch. We reserve the right to approve the script and will show our trademark pending logo." Motion was seconded by Mrs. Johnson and adopted. Mrs. Cagle moved "that the plexiglas case for the Victorian Party dress with a bid of approximately \$600 be approved." Motion was seconded by Mrs. Henry and adopted. Mrs. Henry showed a picture of the family of George Washington that needs restoration. The frame had been restored several years ago. An original drawing of Meadow Garden has been framed and installed on the stairway wall. Mrs. Henry also plans to get a copy of the exterior elevations from the Library of Congress. The heat/air conditioning units will be installed when there are several days of suitable weather.

Mrs. Henry continued with a report of the restoration. Brick piers for the outhouse have been built. Weather permitting, Ted Baker will begin building the floor base on January 11. Unable to find matching cedar siding to replace missing or damaged boards, the existing boards will be used and similar pine siding will be purchased. Mrs. Henry reiterated the need for a dependency for storage, meetings and handicap restroom. An architect has advised that before making application to the Historic

Preservation Committee for the county and the Richmond County Planning and Zoning Board, drawings would be needed of the four exterior elevations, a cross section and floor plans of the proposed dependency. He could provide these for a fee of \$3,000. Mrs. Bell and Mrs. Henry will meet with some members of the Atlanta Chapter to share knowledge of securing grants for restoration and construction. Miss Conger will seek any advice from the Georgia Trust.

Mrs. Agostas, Landscaping Chairman, reported pruning of the grape arbor, fig bush and stray trees and bushes along the fence. She credited Mr. Steedley, the yard man, for the well groomed appearance of the yard. The fruit trees were winterized and readied for spring fertilizing. The Allen Howard C.A.R. Society from Atlanta worked in November and made the grapevine wreaths used in the Christmas decorations. The Cherokee Rose Garden Club continues to care for the Weavers' Garden. The Earl Babbitt Plumbing Company replaced a cover on the open overflow box in the sidewalk without charge.

Mrs. Shattuck, Museum Shop Chairman, sent her report by Mrs. Cagle. Seventytwo boxes of Byrd Cookies have been sold to date. The labels on the cookie tins will be reworked because they are too thick and do not adhere to the tin.

Mrs. Leitch, Patrons Chairman, reported a total of 16 member patrons, 7 chapter patrons and 5 patrons-in-kind. Notes of appreciation have been written to each.

Miss Conger reported on the progress of revising the patrons level, recognizing different levels of giving. A change in the Standing Rules, Article VII will be written up for presentation at the March meeting.

Miss Conger, Regent of the Augusta Chapter, called attention to a motion made at the November 1, 2002 meeting that was in conflict with the Meadow Garden Standing Rule #2. She moved "that the motion to accept bids for the Augusta Room furniture, ie, one arm chair, four side chairs and two sofas, not to be less than \$2,525 and accept the highest bid', adopted November 1, 2002, be rescinded." Motion was seconded by Mrs. Whitson and adopted. By consensus of the Board, an investigative group consisting of two members each, of the Augusta and College Hill Chapters respectively, will determine the status of the Augusta Room furniture and the possibility of restoring the horsehair upholstery.

The next Board meeting will be held at the Westin Atlanta North at Perimeter Hotel, Atlanta, Georgia on Thursday, March 27th at 1:00 p.m. There being no further business, the blessing was offered by Mrs. Leitch and the meeting was adjourned for lunch at 12:45 p.m.

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The Meadow Garden Museum Board met on Thursday, March 27, 2003 at the Westin Atlanta North at Perimeter Hotel in Atlanta, Georgia. State Regent and Chairman of the Board, Rose Elyea Bell, called the meeting to order at 1:12 p.m. Other members present were Shelby Alderman Whitson, Secretary; Susan deCamp Conger, Jean Everett Johnson, Margaret Poole Cagle, Louise Lockhart Henry, Josephine Rhodes Agostas, Alae Risse Barron Leitch, Ann Parker Parsons; ex-officio member, Julia Ann Farrigan and Advisor, Edwina Hall Beall.

Following the opening prayer by Mrs. Leitch, Mrs. Bell welcomed the members and thanked them for attending the meeting.

The Secretary read the Minutes of January 7, 2003 meeting and were approved as corrected.

Mrs. Parsons, State Treasurer, distributed the Summary of Fund Accounts, May 1, 2002 through February 28, 2003 which were reviewed and filed for Audit. The error in the 941 form occurring in January 2002 has been cleared with the IRS and a refund received. Letters are on file to this effect.

In the absence of Mrs. Hunter, Museum Chairman, her report was given by Mrs. Cagle. Meadow Garden participated with Historic Augusta in Heritage Day. Bayvale and Garrett Schools received complimentary tours of the house. Christmas Open House was on December 7, 2002. A new compressor was installed, portable telephone installed and termite inspection made. Group tours were discussed with the Cotton Exchange. Spring tours will include the Bar Association of Georgia with 40 people and Georgia Retired Educators Association with 90 people.

Mrs. Cagle, Docents Chairman, proudly announced that Meadow Garden had received an award from the Georgia Historic Trust for "Excellence in Stewardship." There are now 36 registered docents and five new docents attended a workshop in September 2002. A docents' orientation class will be held May 5, 2003 at 10:30 a.m. with an anticipated 5-6 persons. During the year, 35 group tours required docents and 22 docents were used during the Christmas Open House. Mrs. Cagle stated she was following the future plans for the Augusta Canal since Meadow Garden is in a prime location.

Mrs. Henry, Furnishing Chairman, displayed a framed cross-stitch of Meadow Garden to offer for voices at this State Conference and summer Workshops with drawing to be held at the November 2003 Fall Board of Management. Voices will sell for \$1.00 each or 6 for \$5.00. Copies of an Accession and De-accession Policy was distributed to all members for discussion. This policy is patterned after a similar one used by the Augusta History Museum. Mrs. Henry moved "that the Meadow Garden Board approve a policy for the Accession and Deaccession of Inventory at Meadow Garden and the forms which will be required for the implementation of this policy." Seconded by Mrs. Agostas. After discussion, Miss Conger moved "that the motion relating to the consideration of a Collections Management Policy be postponed until the next Meadow Garden Board meeting." Seconded by Mrs. Whitson and adopted. Twenty pieces of Rockingham-Bennington yellow-ware pottery, valued at \$2,500 -\$3,000 were given by Lewis and Sally Baldwin in honor of Rosemary Crow Hunter during her term of State Regent. A new outdoor American Flag for the flagpole was donated by Shelby Whitson. Mrs. Mary Dykes of North Augusta has donated a feather bed mattress. A possible forthcoming gift from William Rossignol will be formal Victorian chairs belonging to Madame LeVert. It was noted that this furniture cannot be used in the Augusta Room as long as "Standing Rules for Meadow Garden Museum, Article IV, FURNISHINGS, Section 2" includes the last sentence, which states, "the Augusta Room furnishings will remain as they were in 1982." All the wooden furniture has been cleaned and polished with Orange Oil. Due to the dryness of the wood, this will be done three times a year for two years instead of the previous twice a year. Bids for the upholstering of the Augusta Room horsehair furniture were discussed. For two sofas, four chairs and two footstools, using black broadcloth, bids ranged \$3,194, \$3,862 and \$4,035. By consensus of the Board, the discussion was postponed until the next Board meeting.

Mrs. Henry reported on the continued restoration at Meadow Garden. Estimates were received from Ted Baker to build three pieces of cabinetry to house the Museum Shop inventory, records and supplies for the house and a counter top for the copy

machine and storage underneath. Mrs. Henry moved "that the Meadow Garden Board approve the expenditure of \$1500 for the construction of cabinetry for the Meadow Garden office." Seconded by Mrs. Johnson and adopted. The office has been replastered by Junior Grantham. The walls have been sanded, sealed, primed and painted a green/gray color and the trim is in the same off-white color as the other upstairs rooms. The baseboard is painted the same black/green color. Mrs. Henry moved "that the January telephone poll which approved the plastering price of \$3,000 for the office at Meadow Garden be ratified." Seconded by Mrs. Johnson and adopted. The poll was taken in order to secure the services of Mr. Grantham between other commitments.. The Out-House restoration has been completed except for termite treatment and painting, which will be white. Mrs. Henry gave a brief resume of Miles Whitfield, restoration consultant.

Mrs. Agostas, Landscaping Chairman, reported the grounds, trees and plants have been fertilized and made ready for spring. Broken bricks have been replaced and new herbs added. The Pine Needle Garden Club has planted oak hydrangea, pearl bushes, daylilies, iris and phlox near the fence on the canal side of the house. Mondo grass has been planted around the tulip poplar. The Cherokee Rose Garden Club continues to maintain the Weavers Garden

In the absence of Mrs. Shattuck, Museum Shop Chairman, her report was given by Mrs. Cagle. A second order of Byrd Cookies, including key lime and chocolate mint, were delivered March 24, 2003. There are approximately 20 tins left to sell from the first order.

Mrs. Leitch, Patrons Chairman, reported there were 34 individuals as Patrons for 2002-2003, 23 Chapter Patrons and 6 Patrons-in-Kind for a total of 63. Monies from these Patrons were designated for Maintenance (\$2,617), Furnishings (\$1,981), Landscaping (\$565) for a total of \$5,163. Patron names have been recorded in the Patrons Book which is permanently displayed at Meadow Garden and Certificates of Awards have been issued to all. All Patrons received notes of appreciation from this chairman. Mrs. Leitch moved "that the generous gift of Rockingham-Bennington Pottery, valued at \$2,500-\$3,000, given 'In Honor of Rosemary Crow Hunter', by Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Baldwin, thus making them Patrons-in-Kind, be graciously accepted with sincere appreciation by this Meadow Garden Board." Seconded by Mrs. Henry and adopted. Mrs. Leitch moved "that the gift of a Camel-back doll trunk, Victorian period, given by Camille Baxter, 'in Honor of Rosemary Crow Hunter', be graciously accepted by the Meadow Garden Board, thus making Camille Baxter a Patron-in-Kind." Seconded by Mrs. Parsons and adopted. Both of the above named gifts were donated during Mrs. Hunter's term of office of State Regent.

Miss Charlotte Christian, Regent of the Joseph Habersham Chapter, was invited to speak to the Board. The Joseph Habersham Chapter has pledged \$50,000 towards the construction of a new building. The gift is given "in Honor of Alae Risse Barron Leitch." \$25,000 to be gifted this year (2003) and \$25,000 next year (2004). Mrs. Henry moved "that the Meadow Garden Board approve the expenditure of \$3000 to Al Cheatham, Architect, firm of Cheatham, Fletcher, Scott and Sears, for the preparation of architectural drawings which are required for submission to Planning and Zoning and Historic Preservation Boards of Richmond County to apply for approval for a construction license." Seconded by Mrs. Johnson and adopted.

Unfinished Business: Miss Conger distributed copies of the suggested changes in levels of giving, an alternative version of Standing Rule VII – Patrons. Miss Conger moved "that giving categories and levels be determined by the Meadow Garden Board. This information would be publicized in the Meadow Garden brochure and

other appropriate places as determined by the Board." Seconded by Mrs. Parsons and adopted.

Recommendations from the Meadow Garden Board to be presented to the 105th State Conference:

The Board recommends that a new multipurpose building be built at the Meadow Garden Museum, home of George Walton. The primary focus of this multi-use building is Heritage Education. Funds have been donated or pledged to cover 90% of the estimated building cost.

The Board recommends the following four proposed amendments to Standing Rules:

Article VII - Patrons.

Section 1 – amend by striking out the words "known as Patrons" and substituting the word "recognized" and by adding a new item E. Heritage Education.

Section 2 – amend by striking out the entire section and substituting a new Section 2 to read "Giving categories and levels will be determined by the Meadow Garden Board. This information will be publicized in the Meadow Garden brochure and other appropriate places as determined by the Board."

Section 3 – amend by striking out the entire section and substituting a new Section 3 to read "Chapter gifts, above the State Honor Roll requirements, automatically qualify the chapter to be recognized at an appropriate giving level determined by the Meadow Garden Board."

Section 6 – amend by adding the words "the names of those who give at the" after the word "record" and by adding the words "level or above" after the word "Patrons." Notices will be sent announcing the next Meadow Garden Museum Board meeting.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 3:30 p.m.

STANDING RULES FOR MEADOW GARDEN MUSEUM

I MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

- 1. The governing body of a museum, in this instance the Meadow Garden Board, serves the public interest as it relates to Meadow Garden, and must consider itself accountable to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, as well as to Meadow Garden; members should not attempt to act in their individual capacities, but all actions should be taken as a Board, Committee, or otherwise in conformance with the Standing Rules, the Act of Incorporation, or applicable Resolutions.
- 2. The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the three (3) Trustees as named in the Deed from the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, conveying Meadow Garden to the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution; namely, the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the State Chairman of Meadow Garden who is appointed by the State Regent; the Chapter Regents of the Augusta Chapter and the College Hill Chapter, both chapters being located in Augusta, who shall serve as Vice Chairman to the State Chairman of Meadow Garden; the State Treasurer; and five of the chairmen of Meadow Garden Committees, as appointed by the State Regent.

- 3. No Georgia Daughter shall serve in the same Meadow Garden Chairmanship more than three (3) consecutive terms.
- 4. In addition to the six (6) appointments to the Board which are made by the State Regent, she shall appoint two (2) Honorary State Regents to serve as Advisors to the Board, each of whom shall be given privilege of the floor without a vote unless also serving as one of the six (6) appointed chairman.
- 5. The State Second Vice Regent shall serve as ex-officio member of the Meadow Garden Board, being given the privilege of the floor without a vote.
- The State Regent shall serve as Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board, and the State First Vice Regent shall serve as Secretary of the Meadow Garden Board.
- 7. The Meadow Garden Board shall meet a minimum of three (3) times each year; namely, preceding Fall Board of Management meeting, preceding annual State Conference and following Continental Congress, and at such other times as deemed necessary by the Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board. At least one (1) meeting of the Board shall be held at Meadow Garden each year.
- 8. The Meadow Garden Board shall have jurisdiction over the operation, maintenance and work of Meadow Garden and shall be the authority for Meadow Garden as long as such authority is not in conflict with the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, the Act of Incorporation for the Georgia State Society, Resolutions adopted by the Georgia State Society and/or directions which from time to time may be approved by action of the Georgia State Society assembled at its annual State Conference.
- The Meadow Garden Board shall supervise the placing of all insurance to cover the grounds and the Museum and its contents, including the fine arts, with accredited companies – coverage to include fire, theft and liability.
- 10. Five (5) voting members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.
- 11. Minutes shall be kept of each meeting and a copy shall be sent to each member and printed verbatim in the State Proceedings.
- 12. All expenses for maintenance, operation and purchases of furnishings and plantings shall be authorized by the State Regent, as Chairman of the Board, and paid by the State Treasurer. Expenditures exceeding \$1,000.00 must have the majority approval of the Board.
- 13. These rules will be binding on the actions of the Board in their operation of Meadow Garden. They may be changed by the following procedure: Members of the Board must have written notification of proposed changes one month prior to the next meeting of the Board; a two-thirds vote of the Board and approval of the State Conference are necessary to effect a change.

II OPERATIONS

- 1. Everyone entering Meadow Garden will be requested to sign the Register, including date, time of arrival and time of departure.
- No more than fifteen (15) people with each Docent are to be on tour in the house at a given time. Excess of this number may wait in the reception room or in the garden. The Museum Manager has the authority to enforce the Meadow Garden rules at all times.
- 3. There will be no smoking in Meadow Garden.
- No refreshments are to be served in or taken into the Museum by visitors, including chapters or the public. Should a group, such as a visiting chapter, desire

- refreshments, the garden is available for use if litter is properly disposed of by the serving group.
- 5. Tour visitors will be asked to pay a fee as set by the Board.
- 6. There will be only five (5) complete sets of keys to Meadow Garden and three (3) keys to the gates of Meadow Garden. Keys are to be returned after each administration. New locks may be required. Distribution of keys: Gate Only: Augusta Police Department, Georgia Power, and Sizemore Security; Gate and House: Chairman of Meadow Garden Board, Meadow Garden Chairman, Museum Manager, Docents Chairman and Landscaping Chairman.

III VOLUNTEERS AND DOCENTS

- Docents, shall be those well screened and trained volunteers who will serve under the direct supervision of a Meadow Garden Museum Chairman and/or the Museum Manager.
- Duties of docents shall include acting as guides, hostesses, working in museum shop, working in yard, cleaning in house, public relations. No volunteer work at or for Meadow Garden shall be done except under the direct guidance of the Meadow Garden Board and the chairman of the specific committee for that particular function.
- Cleaning or yard work volunteers shall be under the direction of the Museum Manager.

IV FURNISHINGS

- Items bought or accepted for the older section of Meadow Garden must pre-date 1821.
- 2. Furnishings for the two (2) main floor rooms and the two (2) upstairs rooms in the newer section may be dated post 1820 but these rooms should be considered companion rooms to the rest of the house and furnished accordingly with all efforts made to keep furnishings of these four rooms dated no later than 1850. The Augusta Room furnishings will remain as they were in 1982.
- 3. Reproductions may be used only when the physical condition of the antiques is jeopardized by exposure in areas where large numbers of visitors have easy access; or when environmental conditions including excessive light, dust, humidity or airborne impurities pose a threat to the preservation of originals.
- 4. Effective March 12, 1983 all items donated to Meadow Garden shall be accepted with the written condition that they become the property of Meadow Garden and may be used, replaced or sold at the discretion of the Meadow Garden Board only.
- 5. All items that post date 1821, with the exception of those in the six (6) rooms of the newer section and those described in Number 3 of this section, shall be replaced as soon as possible with similar items pre-dating 1821.
- 6. Once an item is placed, it shall not be moved from one location to another without permission of the Meadow Garden Board. Only the Chairman of the Board may approve the removal of an item from the house, if it is in need of repair or refinishing.

- 7. Any item donated or purchased must have written documentation of appraisal.
- 8. A file will be kept of all assets with information as to price paid or market value, date of acquisition, donor or where bought, documentation and appraisal and a description of article. One file will be kept in the reception room accessible to the Docents; a duplicate file will be in the possession of the Chairman of the Board.
- All items purchased or donated will be added to the Fine Arts insurance policy.
 Said policy will be reviewed and updated a minimum of once a year. Major additions to furnishings will be added immediately.
- 10. Future plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the Museum.

V LANDSCAPING

- The landscape plan adopted by the Board shall be adhered to with no deviation unless recommended by an authority on landscape design and care.
- Donations of shrubbery, plants or trees shall be accepted only when item is part of the master plan.
- Work on the grounds will be under the sole direction of the Meadow Garden Board and the Landscaping Chairman. Supervision of actual work will be provided by the Museum Manager or the Landscaping Chairman of Meadow Garden.

VI MUSEUM SHOP

- 1. The Museum Shop will be operated by a committee appointed by the Chairman of the Board and will be responsible to the Board.
- Chairman of the committee will be responsible for all purchases, subject to the approval of the Board or the State Regent.
- Museum Shop operation will be self-supporting. In the event funds are needed for purchases, they may be advanced from available Meadow Garden funds and must be considered a loan and shall be repaid without interest within one (1) year from date of borrowing.
- 4. Profit from the Museum Shop shall be accounted for within the State Treasurer's books, with a percentage being transferred at the discretion of the Board at the end of the fiscal year and placed in the Maintenance Account. The audit of the Museum Shop operation shall be included in the annual audit of the Georgia State Society.

- 5. The State Treasurer will report these gifts to the Patrons Chairman.
- The Patrons Chairman will issue certificates to the qualifying individuals and chapters or groups.
- 7. A permanent book will be kept on public display at Meadow Garden to record the names of those who give at the Patrons level or above.
- 8. The Patrons Chairman will enter the names of donors in the appropriate book a minimum of once a year.

VIII PLAQUES & MARKERS

- Plaques/Markers may be placed at Meadow Garden only at the discretion of the Board, and request meets the following criteria:
- Substantial service and/or contributions that secured the property and the heritage for the GSDAR.
- 3. Individuals so recognized shall have been deceased for at least 5 years;
- 4. Plaque/Marker will be paid for by person(s) requesting such recognition.
- Such plaques will be permanently displayed at Meadow Garden and a record of the honoree's service and/or contribution will be recorded and placed in the Meadow Garden file, with Board approval.
- Plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the Museum. Additional markers shall not be permanently placed on the grounds.
