

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

# BYLAWS OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

# Article I

#### NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

# Article II OBJECTS

The objects of this Society shall be:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

#### Article III MEMBERSHIP

All chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of the Georgia State Society.

### Article IV OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian and a State Curator.

Section 2. (a) To be eligible for state office, a member shall hold and have held membership in a chapter or chapters within the Georgia State Society for at least 5 years prior to her election and have served a full term as chapter officer or state chairman.

(b) No member shall be eligible to the same state office for two (2) successive terms. A member having served more than one half of a term in a state office shall be deemed to have served a full term.

(c) No two state officers shall be members of the same chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

(d) To be eligible for the office of State Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State First Vice Regent or as State Second Vice Regent or served in each of these two offices of the Georgia Society.

(e) To be eligible for the office of State First Vice Regent or for the office of State Second Vice Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State Recording Secretary or as State Treasurer of the Georgia State Society and shall have served a full term as a Chapter Regent of a chapter in the Georgia State Society.

Section 3. In recognition of valuable service to the Georgia State Society, a State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent for life by a majority vote of the State Conference.

### Article V

#### NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. (a) A candidate for state office shall request the endorsement of her chapter, taken by vote at a regular meeting of the chapter held between May and January preceding the State Conference at which state elections are held. The endorsement, signed by the Chapter Recording Secretary, shall include the office the candidate seeks and shall be received by the State Regent with the candidate's statement of intent to be a candidate prior to any announcement or campaigning by the candidate and/or her supporters.

(b) A candidate for State Regent who wishes to present a slate of officers shall send to the State Regent in one packet the chapter endorsements and the statements of intent for each of her selected candidates. If received by the State Regent no later than December 1, these candidates shall be listed as a slate in the State Regent's Call to State Conference.

(c) Candidates wishing to run independently of a slate, whose chapter endorsements and statements of intent are received by the State Regent no later than December 1 shall be listed as independent candidates in the State Regent's Call to State Conference.

(d) A candidate whose chapter endorsement and statement of intent have been properly received by the State Regent may choose to announce her candidacy separate from the State Regent's Call to State Conference. Such a chapter endorsement and statement of intent shall be received by the State Regent at least ten (10) days prior to the opening of the State Conference at which the election is to take place. (e) A candidate who does not meet the requirements of these Bylaws shall be declared disqualified and ineligible for consideration for state office.

(f) A chapter shall endorse no more than one chapter member for state office per election with the possible exception of candidates for State Regent and for State Corresponding Secretary.

(g) In the event of the death, incapacitation or withdrawal of a candidate prior to the election, a replacement shall be made with notification in writing to the State Regent and accompanied by the chapter endorsement and statement of intent as directed by these Bylaws.

**Section 2.** Nominations of candidates for all state offices shall be made at a designated meeting of the State Conference.

**Section 3.** The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected biennially by ballot at the State Conference. A majority vote shall elect.

Section 4. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two (2) years or until their successors are elected. Their terms of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.

Section 5. (a) Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become State Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become State First Vice Regent subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. Vacancies in other state offices shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next State Board of Management meeting or State Conference, whichever shall come first.

(b) Any state officer who is absent from the state for a continuous period of six (6) months or longer shall automatically relinquish her position as a state officer.

Section 6. Upon the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Organizing Secretary General.

Section 7. (a) A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot.

(b) The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than eighteen (18) months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

(c) The endorsement shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent with the candidate's name and address to the Recording Secretary General to be received by the first day of the month preceding the designated Continental Congress.

# Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall perform the duties prescribed in this article, and parliamentary authority adopted by the Society, and such others as the State Board of Management and the National Society may require.

Section 2. The State Regent shall:

(a) be the chief executive officer and the official spokesman for the State Society;

(b) have general supervision of the affairs of the State Society;

(c) preside at all meetings of the State Conference, State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;

(d) appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society;

(e) be ex-officio a member of all committees;

(f) appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as advisor in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting;

(g) sign all contracts and agreements made in the name of the Georgia State Society with the recorded approval of the Executive Committee and the State Board of Management or the State Conference as directed by these Bylaws;

(h) be bonded and have the authority to draw upon funds of the State Society with the approval of the Finance Committee.

(i) recommend to the Finance Committee a Certified Public Accountant who shall be approved by the Finance Committee.

Section 3. The State First Vice Regent shall:

(a) perform the duties of the office of State Regent in the absence or inability of the State Regent;

(b) fill a vacancy in the office of State Regent;

(c) Perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;

(d) serve on those committees as designated by these Bylaws and as directed by the State Regent.

Section 4. The State Second Vice Regent shall:

(a) perform the duties of the office of State First Vice Regent in the absence or inability of the State First Vice Regent;

(b) fill a vacancy in the office of State First Vice Regent;

(c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;

(d) serve on committees as directed by the State Regent.

Section 5. The State Chaplain shall:

(a) open all meetings of the State Conference and the State Board of Management with scripture reading and prayer;

(b) preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and conduct such other religious services as may be required;

(c) be custodian of state properties pertaining to the duties of this office;

(d) be responsible for IN MEMORIAM pages in the Proceedings.

Section 6. The State Recording Secretary shall:

(a) record the proceedings of the meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;

(b) compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and the Proceedings Committee.

(c) submit to the appropriate National officers, the endorsement for Vice President General and the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent by the first day of the month preceding the month of Continental Congress of the year in which said balloting was held;

Section 7. The State Corresponding Secretary shall:

(a) conduct correspondence and send notices on behalf of the State Regent, the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as may be directed by them;

(b) receive from the chapters the Master Questionnaires and distribute to the appropriate state chairmen.

Section 8. The State Organizing Secretary shall:

(a) assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new chapters;

(b) assist chapters in conjunction with appropriate state officers and chairmen in revitalization.

Section 9. The State Treasurer shall:

(a) be bonded;

(b) be the custodian of the funds of the State Society, placing them in institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance;

(c) receive the state dues and State Conference registration fees from the chapters and receive all sums contributed by the chapters for state and national projects, disbursing monthly to the Treasurer General all funds designated for national projects;

(d) disburse other funds only when authorized by the State Regent in writing;

(e) keep an account of all sums received or disbursed by using the basic double entry form of bookkeeping according to accepted accounting procedures and keep receipts for all transactions;

(f) prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference, sending a copy to the State Chairman of the Finance Committee ten (10) days in advance of each meeting;

(g) be a member of the Finance Committee and an ex-officio member of the Credentials Committee;

(h) balance and prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year; said audit by a Certified Public Accountant, shall be performed and delivered within forty-five (45) days of receipt of books.

(i) An internal review of the State Treasurer's records shall be performed when a change in this office occurs after the close of the fiscal year. Following the review, the records shall be turned over to the new State Treasurer. The committee to review the books shall be composed of the State First Vice Regent, the immediate Past State Treasurer, the immediate past Finance Chairman and a current Chapter Regent appointed by the State Regent.

Section 10. The State Registrar shall:

(a) when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution prove eligibility and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars;

(b) keep a correct list of all members in the state;

(c) report on membership to the State Conference;

(d) assist with the verification of the credentials;

(e) be in possession of the computer and software owned by the Georgia State Society and see that it is maintained.

Section 11. The State Historian shall:

(a) be in charge, within the state, of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General as well as those authorized by the Georgia State Society;

(b) keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves within the state;

(c) prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General;

(d) promote the study of American history, state and county history and historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the founding of our state and counties.

Section 12. The State Librarian shall:

(a) serve as liaison between the Librarian General and the Georgia Chapters and disseminate general information on the NSDAR Library;

(b) cooperate with the director of the Georgia Department of Archives and History, making the needs of the Archives known to the chapters;

(c) collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing them wherever accepted in such libraries and Archives as may be chosen by the State Board of Management;

(d) solicit, with the approval of the Executive Committee, contributions from the chapters for purchase of such books as requested by the office of the Librarian General, and/or the various libraries in Georgia which the State Society approves;

(e) receive gifts of books and other printed material from the chapters to be donated to the approved libraries and Archives;

(f) maintain a constant supply of bookplates to the NSDAR Library, the Georgia Department of Archives and History and for purchase by the chapters.

Section 13. The State Curator shall: be custodian of the State portable properties and shall have them properly stored and made ready for use at state meetings.

Section 14. All officers will keep a Procedure Book of Instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new officers to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

#### Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. State Conference:

(a) The annual meeting of the Georgia State Society shall be known as the State Conference. It shall be for the purpose of:

(1) receiving reports of officers, committees and Chapter Regents;

(2) electing officers biennially;

(3) promoting programs in furtherance of the objects of the Society;

(4) any other business that may arise:

i. annual budget shall be adopted,

ii. all projects of the State Society requiring funding shall be voted upon at State Conference or ratified by members at State Conference if previously voted upon by the State Board of Management,

iii. no project extending beyond the term of the presiding officer may be accepted at any meeting other than by vote at State Conference.

(b) The State Conference will be held between February 1 and the time of the meeting of Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week;

(c) The State Regent shall fix the time and place of meetings;

(d) The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credentials form to the chapters not less than sixty (60) days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 2. The voting members of the State Conference shall be:

(a) the officers and Honorary State Regents of the State Society;

(b) the officers and honorary officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state;

(c) the Chapter Regent, or in her absence, the Vice Regent or alternate of each chapter;

(d) delegates or alternates of each chapter of the state as designated by the Bylaws of the National Society for representation at Continental Congress;

(e) one additional delegate from each chapter in the state.

Section 3. Only a chapter member in good standing whose credentials have been completed in accordance with the instructions of the State Regent and the State Credentials Chairman for the State Conference and in accordance with the Standing Rules of the National Society shall be eligible to represent her chapter at state and national meetings. Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the chapter, except in the case of the Regent or Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at an annual State Conference, shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.

**Section 6.** Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the state of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference the privilege of the floor shall be accorded to the State Chairmen. They may not vote unless they are duly registered as voters of the State Conference.

**Section 8.** Special meetings of the State Society may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen (15) days' notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

**Section 9.** Forty-five (45) voting members, representing not less than twenty (20) chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

### Article VIII

#### STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The state officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents and the Regents, or in their absence, the Vice Regents of the chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

**Section 2.** The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the fall, following the October meeting of the National Board, It may meet whenever called by the State Regent. A minimum of twenty (20) days' notice shall be given as to the time and place of any such meeting.

Section 3. Thirty (30) members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference or as proscribed by these Bylaws.

Section 5. State chairmen, vice chairmen, committee members of the National and Standing Committees and one (1) member from each chapter shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privilege of the floor, but may not vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

#### Article IX

#### EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, shall attend the meetings, but may not vote.

Section 3. This Executive Committee shall:

(a) perform such duties of the State Board of Management between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient;

(b) meet at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three (3) members of the committee;

(c) vote by teleconference, e-mail or fax, if necessary;

(d) receive and make recommendations for projects requiring expenditure of funds outside routine expenditures to be considered by the State Conference;

(e) make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. Decisions of the Executive Committee shall be acted upon at the next meeting of the State Board of Management or at State Conference, whichever shall come first.

# Article X FINANCES

**Section 1.** (a) The fiscal year of the Georgia State Society shall be July 1 through the last day of June.

(b) The annual budget, prepared by the Finance Committee, shall cover the fiscal year and be prepared on the basis of dues payable for the calendar year beginning December first preceding.

(c) The Finance Committee shall propose the per capita amount and distribute according to the annual membership count. The per capita amount and distribution shall be indicated on the budget presented annually. Funds to be included in the per capita designations shall be Tamassee DAR School, Kate Duncan Smith DAR School, Berry College, Lucy Cook Peel Fund, McCall Genealogical Fund and Meadow Garden Maintenance.

Section 2. The annual dues of chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be \$7.00 for each member of the chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1.

Section 3. (a) Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the state dues, a conference registration fee for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under these Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether chapter is represented or not. This fee shall be set by a recommendation of the Finance Committee to the Executive Committee.

(b) State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay a conference fee at the time of registration. This fee shall be set with a recommendation of the Finance Committee. (c) Other members of the Georgia State Society who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a conference fee at the time of registration. This fee shall be set with a recommendation of the Finance Committee.

(d) All host chapters may charge a registration fee to those not purchasing a meal ticket to off-set the cost of hosting state/district meetings.

**Section 4.** (a) The State Treasurer and the State Regent and such others entrusted with funds of the Georgia State Society as may be designated by the State Board of Management shall be bonded. (See Article VI, Sections 2 and 9);

(b) The State Treasurer with the approval of the State Regent and the State Chairman of the Finance Committee shall place the funds of the Georgia State Society in financial institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage;

(c) The placement of restricted savings funds and investment funds of the Georgia State Society shall be placed to the credit of the Georgia State Society by the State Treasurer under the direction of the Finance Committee. Monies may be invested in U. S. Treasury obligations or other interest bearing obligations of federally insured financial institutions;

(d) The accounts of the State Treasurer shall be annually prepared for audit by a Certified Public Accountant immediately following the end of the State Society fiscal year and no later than May 15 and delivered to the CPA by that date;

(e) Should the State Treasurer be incapacitated, the State Regent, after consultation with the Chairman of the Finance Committee and with the approval of the Executive Committee, shall appoint an Acting State Treasurer to serve until such time as the State Treasurer is able to resume her duties or a new State Treasurer is appointed and ratified as stated in Article V, Section 5 (a).

Section 5. The expenses incurred by the State Regent in the performance of duty shall be paid each year from the State Dues Fund:

(a) Four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00) shall be taken each year to defray her necessary travel expenses;

(b) Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent, as budgeted, shall be paid by the State Treasurer who shall keep all receipts of these expenses. No expenses exceeding the budgeted amount shall be paid by the State Treasurer.

Section 6. At the close of the books annually, \$5,000.00 shall be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies Fund" so that at the end of each administration a total of \$10,000.00 will be reserved. This money is to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration.

# Article XI COMMITTEES

Section 1. The State Regent shall appoint the following standing committees:

(a) Bylaws: An Honorary State Regent shall be appointed as chairman and the committee shall be composed of two (2) other Honorary State Regents and one (1) member from each district;

(b) Finance: This committee shall be composed of seven (7) members to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two (2) Honorary State Regents, one (1) active chapter regent and one (1) active chapter member. One of the two Honorary State Regents shall be appointed chairman. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund. This committee shall have charge of all investments of the Georgia State Society funds.

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(c) Resolutions: This committee shall be composed of all Honorary State Regents, the State Parliamentarian and three (3) chapter members;

(d) Proceedings: This committee shall be composed of the State Recording Secretary, the immediate past State Recording Secretary, State First Vice Regent and four (4) additional Daughters, at least one of whom shall be an Honorary State Regent.

Section 2. The State Regent shall appoint such other committees, standing or special, as the State Conference shall authorize and actions of the State Board of Management and of the National Society shall require. The appointments shall be concurrent with the term of the State Regent making the appointments and shall terminate with the end of the administration.

Section 3. Additional appointments may be made to any of the committees and vacancies shall be filled by the State Regent with timely notification to the membership.

Section 4. The duties of committees shall be such as these Bylaws, the State Conference, the State Board of Management or the National Society shall prescribe.

Section 5. All chairmen will keep a Procedure Book of instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

#### Article XII CHAPTERS

**Section 1.** To expedite the work of the Society, the chapters of the Georgia State Society shall be placed in geographical districts:

(a) A chairman appointed by the State Regent shall coordinate the work of all chapters as needed; she shall be titled "Coordinator of Districts"; (b) Each district shall have a Director appointed by the State Regent to work as a committee under the direction and supervision of the Coordinator of Districts and the State Regent.

Section 2. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April 1 in the year of chapter elections. The Chapter Regent shall report annually the names of the elected officers promptly on the form provided by the State Regent for this purpose, with copies to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, and the State Recording Secretary.

Section 3. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent, the State Recording Secretary, and the District Director at the time designated by the State Regent.

### Article XIII

## **MEADOW GARDEN MUSEUM**

Meadow Garden, property owned by the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, shall be operated as follows:

(a) The governing body shall be the Board of Trustees composed of the following members: the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Chairman who shall be appointed by the State Regent;

(b) The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the following members: the State Regent who shall serve as Chairman; the State First Vice Regent who shall serve as Secretary; the Chairman of Meadow Garden; the Regents of the Augusta and College Hill Chapters; the State Treasurer; and the chairmen of the five (5) subcommittees appointed by the State Regent - Docents, Furnishings, Landscaping, Museum Shop, Patrons;

(c) The Meadow Garden Board shall operate with Standing Rules approved by the State Conference.

### Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. The current edition of "Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised," shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law in matters not covered by these Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

# Article XV

# AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent, the State Parliamentarian, and the State Bylaws Chairman. The State Regent shall send a copy to each chapter, at least sixty (60) days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the Call to Conference. Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

# Article XVI DISSOLUTION

Although the period of duration of the Georgia State Society is perpetual, if for any reason the State Society is to be dissolved or otherwise terminated, no part of the property of the Society or any of the proceeds shall be distributed to or inure to the benefit of any of the officers or members of the Society. Upon the dissolution of the Georgia State Society, assets shall be distributed by the Board of Management and/or the Executive Committee to and only to the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the local United States District Court, exclusively to such organization or organizations as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated within the meaning of section 501 (c)(3), with purposes and objectives consistent with those of the Georgia State Society.

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent and the State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

# **CHAPTER ELECTIONS**

As soon as chapter elections are held, names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, 1776 D Street, NW, Washington, DC 2006-5303, the State Regent or the State RegentElect, the State Recording Secretary and the State Corresponding Secretary by May 1. The full Christian name of chapter officers shall be given, along with her husband's given name or initials, address, zip code, telephone number, fax and e-mail. In accordance with the National Bylaws, a Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years.

# CHAPTER REPRESENTATION AT STATE AND NATIONAL MEETINGS

At the State Board of Management, a chapter is represented by the Chapter Regent, or in her absence by the First Vice Regent, and one nonvoting member.

The voting representation of each chapter at the State Conference shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received by the State Treasurer by December 1. Membership less than 50: Regent, 1 Delegate, 4 Alternates, total votes 2; 50-199: Regent, 2 Delegates, 6 Alternates, total votes 3; 200-299: Regent, 3 Delegates, 8 Alternates, total votes 4; 300-399: Regent, 4 Delegates, 10 Alternates, total votes 5.

The voting representation of each chapter at Continental Congress shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received in the Office of the Treasurer General by December 1. Membership less than 50: Regent, no Delegate, 2 Alternates, total votes 1; 50-199: Regent, 1 Delegate, 4 Alternates, total votes 2; 200-299: Regent, 2 Delegates, 6 Alternates, total votes 3; 300-399: Regent, 3 Delegates, 8 Alternates, total votes 4.

#### **CONFERENCE REGISTRATION FEE**

Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer with the state dues on or before December 1, a fee set by recommendation of the Finance Committee to the Executive Committee for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws, this fee to be paid whether represented or not.

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the Conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters, shall pay a Conference fee at the time of registration.

#### CONTRIBUTIONS

All contributions by chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

#### DATE FOR ANNUAL AUDIT

"WHEREAS, every effort must be made to have all material to the printer as early as possible, to facilitate delivery of the Proceedings to the members,

**RESOLVED**: That the end of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR fiscal year for audit purposes be changed from May 31 to April 30." Adopted.

### **DECEASED MEMBERS**

Deaths shall be reported promptly to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Chaplain and the State Registrar by the corresponding Chapter officer. A complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and date of death shall be furnished to the State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for the Conference Memorial Service and for State Proceedings.

#### DUES

Before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer sends to the State Treasurer state dues of \$7.00 per member. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the December through February Board meetings of the National Society. Before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer sends to the office of the Organizing Secretary General National dues of \$30.00 per member except Life Members, with check made payable to the Treasurer General, NSDAR.

### **GENEALOGICAL RECORDS**

To insure uniformity and convenience in binding, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, 8  $\frac{1}{2} \times 11$  inches, with 1  $\frac{1}{2}$  inches from top of page, 1  $\frac{1}{2}$  to 2 inches on left side, 1 inch on right side and at bottom. Two copies shall be sent to the State Chairman of Genealogical Records. The booklet, "Instructions for Copying Source Records and Their Preparation for Library Use." should be obtained from the office of the Corresponding Secretary General.

### **GEORGIA HOSPITALITY FUND**

The following resolution appears in the Proceedings for 1955 and was amended in 2001:

**"WHEREAS**, the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds a social event in Washington during Continental Congress which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society:

**THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$500.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes; and,

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that this fund shall not be cumulative." Adopted.

All letters received by Chapter Regents relating to the work of the Society shall be distributed to the corresponding Chapter officer or chairman and brought to the attention of the members at a chapter meeting.

Your name should be consistent with the Directory of Chapter Regents and State Chairmen as found in this Proceedings. Winners of awards and awards to be offered shall each be listed on separate sheets identified with the title of the committee and the award. Reports and awards to be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary by the following deadlines; Chapter Regents by February 1; State Officers and State Chairmen by March 1.

Resolutions to be considered by the Committee shall be typed, with a heading which gives subject of the resolution. The proposed resolution shall be signed, dated and sent to the Chairman of the Resolutions Committee two weeks before the date of State Conference.

# STATE CONFERENCES

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year, a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24, 1899. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21) No Conference was held in 1911, the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912," and amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, page 211).

An additional \$6,100.00 has been pledged.

Printed copies of motions and statements beginning in 1989 and quoted from the minutes of the Georgia State Society and the Meadow Garden Board relating to the history of the demolition of the caretaker's cottage at Meadow Garden and the need for a gatehouse/reception area/office space/gift shop were distributed and with the use of an overhead projector, Miss Farrigan read the material to the assembly. Discussion followed. Mrs. Hanf called for the question, and seconded. Mrs. Shubert reminded the State Regent that she had moved for a ballot vote. Her motion was seconded and adopted. Mrs. Beall called for a standing vote for the ballot vote as non-voters may have voted. A standing vote was taken. There being a majority vote in the affirmative, the motion to have a ballot vote was adopted.

Mrs. Beall asked that a Credentials Report be given before the vote. Mrs. Setters stated 32 chapters were late sending the form or did not send the form to the Chairman, State Treasurer or State Regent. Ten of the 32 never submitted any Credentials Form. Of the chapters/persons attending the Conference, 13 potential delegates from four chapters were denied the right to represent their chapter as the chapter's dues were not paid in accordance with the State Bylaws. No delegate was denied a vote solely to late submission of the Credentials Form. The Credentials Report was adopted.

To amend Article VIII State Board of Management, Section 1. Delete "the Honorary State Regents." Section 1 will then read: The state officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state and the Regents, or in their absence, the Vice Regents of the chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management. Proposed amendment lost.

To amend Article IX Executive Committees, Section 3 (C) after teleconference add "e-mail or fax". Section 3. (C) will then read: [The Executive Committee shall:] vote by teleconference, e-mail or fax, if necessary. Amendment adopted.

To amend Article X Finance, Section 1 (a) Delete "May 1 through the last day of April" and add: July 1 through the last day of June. Section 1 (a) would then read: The Fiscal Year of the Georgia State Society shall be July 1 through the last day of June. Amendment adopted.

To amend the following sections as a group:

Section 3 (a) Delete "five dollars (\$5.00)" and insert "fee shall be set by a recommendation of the Finance Committee to the Executive Committee". Section 3. (a) will then read: Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the state dues, a conference registration fee for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under these Bylaws, this fee to be paid whether chapter is represented or not. This fee shall be set by a recommendation of the Finance Committee to the Executive Committee.

Section 3 (b) Delete "five dollars (\$5.00)" and insert "fee shall be set by a recommendation of the Finance Committee to the Executive Committee". Section 3. (b) will then read: State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay a conference fee at the time of registration. This fee shall be set with a recommendation of the Finance Committee to the Executive Committee.

Section 3. (c) Delete "three dollars (\$3.00)" and insert "as set by a recommendation of the Finance Committee to the Executive Committee." Section 3. (c) Will then read: Other members of the Georgia State Society who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a conference fee at the time of registration. This fee shall be set by a recommendation of the Finance Committee to the Executive Committee. Above, Article X Finance, Section 1 (a) through Section 3 (c) were considered as a group. Amendments adopted.

To amend Section 3. Add (d) "All host chapters may charge a registration fee to those not purchasing a meal ticket to off-set the cost of hosting state/district meetings. Amendment adopted.

To amend Section 1. Delete "(a,b,c,d)". Section 1 will then read: "The State Regent shall appoint the following standing committees, Bylaws, Finance, Resolutions, and Proceedings". Proposed amendment lost.

Also, my sincere appreciation for capturing the vision of expanding this education opportunity by approving the long-talked-about Heritage Education Building in order that we might offer lectures, demonstrations, workshops, and summer camps for children, along with providing suitable storage space for the Society's ever-growing collection of records.

Having more Districts also gave more opportunities for service on several State Committees. We have increased the visibility of the DAR for our Society members through our new Georgia Web Site and by publishing an all-member newsletter which was promised as part of the rationale for the dues increase two years ago. Also published for the first time was the very popular State Directory and calendars with month by month DAR instructions which were given to all Chapter Regents and Treasurers. Your State Proceedings has a new look and will stay open for ease in using and not be so prone to fall apart. We have assisted with program planning by publishing a Speakers Staff programs listing and a Georgia Roadmap to Membership for new members. All 108 Georgia chapters have web sites. We have successfully funded the "Georgia 74 Club" thereby making possible the addition to the NSDAR Library the 74 missing Volumes of Georgia Genealogical Records. Vast improvement was made in streamlining the Regents' Night program and we have even brought to you delicious Meadow Garden cookies.

Georgia Daughters, many of you have worked very hard to bring to fruition many new and progressive ideas. I am very proud of those of you who dared to move forward with boldness and courage and I am very proud of your many accomplishments.

And, thank you, Georgia Daughters, for the memories of these past two years and for the love and admiration I have for so many of you. Your cooperation and support have made it all worthwhile. Again, thank you, and God Bless.

Materials for District Workshops, including the Chapter Transmittal form, State Dues and Conference Fees form, Meadow Garden Transmittal form, The Chapter Treasurer's Annual Report form, the State Dues and Conference Fee Report form and the Chapter Financial Form were prepared and distributed. State Officers and Committee Chairmen received reports of contributions concerning their committees. Credential forms were verified and forwarded to the Credentials State Chairman. Chapter Achievement monies and State Honor Roll monies were verified and reports sent to the respective state chairmen.

National and State Meetings attended include Continental Congress, Treasurer General's Workshop, all six district workshops, leading the Treasurer's sessions; Fall Board of Management; and all Executive, Finance and Meadow Garden Board meetings. Sincere appreciation is extended to Rose E. Bell, State Regent, Julia Farrigan, Past State Treasurer, and chapter members for their support and encouragement during these past two years.

### STATE REGISTRAR

### Phyllis Malone Porter (Mrs. Everett E., Jr.)

It has been a very busy year for this officer. She attended all meetings of the State Society. The membership files of the State Society were kept current with 412 new members, 120 transfers in, 113 transfers out, 162 deaths, 206 resignations/drops and 38 reinstatements from the national printouts. Most chapters did an excellent job of reporting the changes in their chapter membership. Many questions have been answered by phone and e-mail. Many chapter problems and membership errors have been straightened out.

In addition to the regular duties of this position, this officer provided a total of approximately 15,000 address labels for two editions of the

Georgia Drummer. Chapter yearbooks or membership lists were received from 102 chapters, and the address of every member was checked. Following each mailing of the Georgia Drummer, approximately 300 were returned by the post office. Each chapter was contacted to confirm the correct address. The National Society continues to improve the e-Membership Database website, which has provided invaluable information about the status of chapters and members. Thank you, Madam State Regent, for the opportunity to serve the State Society.

## STATE HISTORIAN Ocie Wilhoit McCorkle (Mrs. Chris S.)

This State Historian attended Continental Congress, three district meetings, and Kate Duncan Smith Dedication Day and Tamassee Founders Day. This officer has followed up with chapters regarding grave markings and historic site markings per the Historian General. All records have been entered into Excel spreadsheet, over 250,000 entries into an updated digital format. One hundred chapters reported, seventy chapters participated in activities related to the objectives of this office. Five chapters submitted a nominee for the Outstanding Teacher in American History. The State Winner, Mrs. Judith Bishop, was sponsored by Fort Frederica Chapter.

Fifteen chapters marked graves, conducted wreath-laying ceremonies, and held receptions to honor Revolutionary Soldiers. Sixty-one chapters contributed money to various Americana Collection; and to NSDAR Archives. This officer submitted an application to mark the historic site of Fort Morris at Sunbury. Special thanks to the Col. John McIntosh Chapter. Much gratitude is expressed to Anne Kennedy Bumgardner, Fort Peachtree Chapter for vital research in Washington and locating primary documentation needed for the application. The State Society is awaiting permission before scheduling the marking ceremony. Thank you Madam State Regent for allowing me to serve the State Society in this office.

# STATE LIBRARIAN

## Virginia Grace Lingelbach (Mrs.)

Your State Librarian attended Continental Congress, all Executive Board meetings, five district workshops, and three Constitution Week luncheons, the Kate Duncan Smith School Dedication Day and graduation at Crossnore School. Ninety-nine Chapters sent reports on library work contributed on the local, state and national level. Georgia Daughters volunteered 8,841 hours to local libraries and chapters donated over 1,000 items with an estimated value of \$4,600. Seventy-six subscriptions to the American Spirit magazine were donated to local and school libraries. Three members earned the Bookworm Pin this year. Chapters sent, through the State Treasurer, \$318.00 to the State Library Fund, \$2,401.00 to Friends of the Library, and \$800.00 to Friends of Seimes Microfilm. The Georgia State Society donated \$500.00 to purchase books for the NSDAR Library in honor of the State Regent and six books were purchased for the Georgia shelf with these funds. Georgia chapters also donated 47 books to the NSDAR Library, for a grand total of 53 books donated to the NSDAR Library in 2003.

### NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting. The financial statements of the Organization have been prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting. Accordingly, revenue is recorded when received rather than when earned and expenses are recorded when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred.

Basis of Presentation. Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board in its Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, *Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations*. Under SFAS No. 117, the Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets.

<u>Cash and Cash Equivalents</u>. For purposes of the Statements of Cash Flows, the Organization considers all highly liquid investments with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

<u>Collections</u>. Collection items acquired either through purchase or donation are not capitalized. Purchases of collection items are recorded as decreases in unrestricted net assets if purchased with unrestricted assets and as decreases in temporarily restricted or permanently restricted net assets if purchased with donor-restricted assets. Contributions of collection items are not recognized in the Statement of Activities. Proceeds from deaccessions or insurance recoveries are reflected on the statement of activities based on the absence or existence and nature of donor-imposed restrictions.

Donated Services. No amounts have been reflected in the financial statements for donated services. The Organization generally pays for services requiring specific expertise. However, many individuals volunteer their time and perform a variety of tasks that assist the Organization with specific assistance programs, campaign solicitations, and various committee assignments. No amounts have been reflected in the financial statements, as the fair value of those services is not susceptible to objective valuation or measurement.

Income Tax Status. The Organization is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code. However, income from activities not directly related to the Organization's taxexempt purpose is subject to taxation as unrelated business income. In addition, the Organization qualifies for the charitable contribution deduction under Section 170 (b) (1) (A) and has been classified as an organization other than a private foundation under Section 509 (a) (2).

<u>Nature of Activities</u>. The Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution carries out programs designed for education, public awareness and preservation of the history and heritage of the United States of America.

### NOTE 1 - (cont'd)

<u>Property and Equipment</u>. The Society follows the policy of not capitalizing collections and historical treasures. Meadow Garden and its contents are historical treasures. The house and its contents are insured for approximately \$ 325,000. Office furniture and fixtures are insured for \$ 8,000. Major preservation or restoration projects are capitalized and depreciated over an estimated useful life of fifteen years. Additions and betterments of \$ 750 or more are capitalized, while maintenance and repairs that do not improve or extend the useful lives of the respective assets are expensed currently.

### NOTE 2 - CERTIFICATES OF DEPOSIT

Certificates of deposit totaling \$ 337,146 are included in cash in the accompanying financial statements. The certificates bear interest ranging from 1.78% to 4.16% and have maturities ranging from three to sixteen months, with penalties for early withdrawal. Any penalties for early withdrawal would not have a material effect on the financial statements.

### NOTE 3 - FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

<u>Concentrations of Credit Risk Arising from Cash Deposits</u>. The Organization maintains cash balances at several financial institutions located in Georgia. #### **NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

Basis of Accounting. The financial statements of the Organization have been prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting. Accordingly, revenue is recorded when received rather than when earned and expenses are recorded when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred.

Basis of Presentation. Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board in its Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, *Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations*. Under SFAS No. 117, the Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets.

<u>Cash and Cash Equivalents</u>. For purposes of the Statements of Cash Flows, the Organization considers all highly liquid investments with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

<u>Collections</u>. Collection items acquired either through purchase or donation are not capitalized. Purchases of collection items are recorded as decreases in unrestricted net assets if purchased with unrestricted assets and as decreases in temporarily restricted or permanently restricted net assets if purchased with donor-restricted assets. Contributions of collection items are not recognized in the Statement of Activities. Proceeds from deaccessions or insurance recoveries are reflected on the statement of activities based on the absence or existence and nature of donor-imposed restrictions.

Donated Services. No amounts have been reflected in the financial statements for donated services. The Organization generally pays for services requiring specific expertise. However, many individuals volunteer their time and perform a variety of tasks that assist the Organization with specific assistance programs, campaign solicitations, and various committee assignments. No amounts have been reflected in the financial statements, as the fair value of those services is not susceptible to objective valuation or measurement.

Income Tax Status. The Organization is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code. However, income from activities not directly related to the Organization's taxexempt purpose is subject to taxation as unrelated business income. In addition, the Organization qualifies for the charitable contribution deduction under Section 170 (b) (1) (A) and has been classified as an organization other than a private foundation under Section 509 (a) (2).

Nature of Activities. The Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution carries out programs designed for education, public awareness and preservation of the history and heritage of the United States of America.

#### NOTE 1 - (cont'd)

<u>Property and Equipment</u>. The Society follows the policy of not capitalizing collections and historical treasures. Meadow Garden and its contents are historical treasures. The house and its contents are insured for approximately \$ 325,000. Office furniture and fixtures are insured for \$ 8,000. Major preservation or restoration projects are capitalized and depreciated over an estimated useful life of fifteen years. Additions and betterments of \$ 750 or more are capitalized, while maintenance and repairs that do not improve or extend the useful lives of the respective assets are expensed currently.

#### NOTE 2 - CERTIFICATES OF DEPOSIT

Certificates of deposit totaling \$ 300,914 are included in cash in the accompanying financial statements. The certificates bear interest ranging from 1.78% to 4.16% and have maturities ranging from three to sixteen months, with penalties for early withdrawal. Any penalties for early withdrawal would not have a material effect on the financial statements.

#### **NOTE 3 - FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS**

Concentrations of Credit Risk Arising from Cash Deposits. The Organization maintains cash balances at several financial institutions located in Georgia. Accounts at each institution are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation up to \$ 100,000. At June 30, 2004, there are no uninsured cash balances.

# NATIONAL COMMITTEES

# AMERICAN HERITAGE AND CONSERVATION Linda Luke Stephens (Mrs. James D.), Chairman

100% participation. 69 programs or projects on Historic Preservation, 64 on Cultural Events and Traditions, 21 on Tree Planting. 40 chapters had programs or educational materials on Organ Donation, three presented Conservation Medals, two presented Historic Preservation Awards. Fifteen participated in the Arts, Crafts, Literature, and Music contests. Forty-nine assisted financially or physically with the preservation and restoration of homes, cemeteries, historical markers, or tours of historic places. One Confederate grave, seven Revolutionary graves, two World War I markers, and one Viet Nam marker. Seven programs on the history and preservation of quilting, nine on document restoration and preservation. Especially interesting program was preserving history through letter writing and daily journals. Unique project was use of turn-ofthe-century postcards to produce magnets that were sold. Another project that stood out was "Georgia Rivers on My Mind". Sixty-four chapters participated in Cultural Events and Traditions, members brought family Christmas "Treasures from the attic" to share. Colonial-era music and instruments, and one on Revolutionary poetry. Twenty-one participated in the Tree Planting project, planting more that 100 trees. Forty participated in Conservation programs, many on water, river, tree conservation and wildlife conservation.

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# AMERICAN HISTORY

# Therry Nash Deal (Mrs. J. B.), Chairman

Chapter reports were received from 101 Chapters. American History programs were presented at 277 meetings; 401 programs in American History presented to other groups. Displays totaled 190; 87 of these in public sites other than schools. Publicity on American History included 301 spot announcements, for a total of 1,154 minutes of radio and TV. Press inches tallied 2,492. The essay contest, "The Louisiana Purchase - Thomas Jefferson's Presidential Legacy," was conducted by 66 chapters in 220 schools, 4,863 students participated. Certificates (3,791) and 104 bronze medals were given to these American History essayists. Christopher Columbus essay contest involved 32 schools and 178 high school students with certificates of award to 71. Certificates (130) and medals (44) for outstanding work in American History were presented. Chapter and state monetary awards were over \$2,000.00. Outstanding women in America were topics of 36 programs. Four chapters selected a member for the national project to identify American women of historical significance. Great appreciation to the competent committee district Vice Chairmen: Annette Johnson, Martha Wright, Constance Page, Denise Fritze, Dedra Shuman, and Donna King. Serving the Society under our dedicated State Regent has been an honor.

## AMERICAN INDIANS Ann Scott Williams (Ms.), Chairman

One hundred chapters reported contributions of 7,060 Campbell's Soup Labels, 41 creative programs on Native Americans. 36 Chapters gave "Indian Minute" prepared by Chapter chairman at each meeting. \$442.00 was given to Friends of the American Indians. \$2,418.85 was given to Bacone College and Chemawa Indian School, for general funds. Dorm/personal items and Christmas gifts were also given. One chapter made a monetary gift to the first Native American female soldier to die in combat in Iraq to be used for education of her children. As a result of efforts given by Georgia Daughters, much was accomplished. I am proud to report that the Georgia Daughters have again met the challenge of support to Indian Youth Summer Camp. Madame State Regent, it has been a great honor to have served you and the Georgia State Society for the past two years.

## AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP Jean Wallace Brown (Mrs. Julian A., Sr.), Chairman

101 chapters reported, 82 reported activity. National Society reported DAR Manual for Citizenship will not be reprinted and is not available. Chapters having manuals may distribute them. Eleven chapters, Augusta, Bonaventure, Brunswick, Fort Frederica, George Walton, Lachlan McIntosh, Martha Stewart Bulloch, Philadelphia Winn, Savannah, Stephen Heard and Sukey Hart participated in Naturalization Ceremonies. New citizens welcomed with flags, copies of "The American's Creed," "What America Means to You," The National Anthem, Flag Codes and pamphlets explaining DAR. Receptions were given, courtrooms decorated. Included in reporting this year were patriotic materials distributed to schools. Chapters distributed 705 US flags, 31 flag pins, 534 bookmarks, 244 copies of The American's Creed, and 619 cards with the Pledge of Allegiance. Thanks to the generosity of Georgia Daughters, two of the State School Projects have been completed. Berry College Museum's upper gallery has been enclosed and track lighting installed to prevent ultra-violet radiation damage to the exhibits. Tamassee's Talmadge Auditorium has updated theatrical lighting and the ladies facilities in the gymnasium have been renovated. By the end of summer 2004, the KDS High School Library's carpet will be replaced with tile and the walls painted. Participating in the summer workshops were Stan Mannon and Scott Bonds from KDS and Linda Chastain from Tamassee. Ninety-five percent of the chapters reported, 59 chapters received the Hightower Award with Toccoa and William Day being honored for the greatest per capita donations to the state projects at KDS and Tamassee; eight programs were given on the schools, 66 chapters had full school programs; 26 gave two minute School Spots at meetings; seven "Care Bears: were sold; 58,492 plus food labels; 42,276 plus pounds of thrift; ten Friends of the Schools with seven eligible for pins. In 2004, Georgia Daughters in 12 chapters contributed 3,501 pages of unpublished records in 16 volumes to the DAR Library, plus credit for 71 Volumes, 15,485 pages, duplicated from Georgia Archives master copies, totaling 87 volumes, 18,986 pages. The Georgia Archives received 16 volumes, 3,501 pages; Washington Memorial Library and Georgia Historical Society received three volumes, 2,564 pages. The grand total of all pages thus far is 25,051. The Georgia 74 Club raised a total of \$2,139.00, contributed by members and chapters of the Georgia Society, for use in binding and shipping costs of this project to place duplicate copies of seventy-four volumes currently missing from the DAR Library shelves, but contained in the Georgia DAR master set (with the exception of three volumes presently unaccounted for) at the Georgia Archives. Shipments from the Archives have begun and the process is underway to complete the Georgia Collection in the DAR Library. Library Director Eric Grundset has allowed full credit for the duplicated copies, as the volumes were deemed "not received" at the DAR Library.

## GENEALOGICAL RECORDS - INDEXING AND VOLUNTEERS Linda Reed Douglas (Mrs. John D., Jr.), Vice Chairman

We currently have a total of 19 Daughters from nine chapters indexing books. Seventeen have the Sky Indexing Program and are participating in the President General's Every-Name Index of GRC volumes. Much appreciation goes to Evelyn Bugg, Violette Denney, Vickie Cobb, and Jacqueline Keller who earned their Bookworm pins this past year. Thank you Madam State Regent for the opportunity to work with these indexing projects.

# JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS Ellen Canup Hale (Mrs. B. Edward), Chairman

As Junior American Citizens Chairman, I received 101 chapter reports. I am thrilled to announce that 1,251 Georgia school age youth experienced the enthusiasm of 14 chapters who sponsored or participated in JAC activities. Eighty classrooms or groups from thirteen schools participated in a wide array of activities; six new youth groups were sponsored. \$256.00 was contributed to the National JAC Prize Fund. JAC supplies distributed during this school year included 178 member pins, 178 membership cards, 23 handbooks, ten JAC banners, 89 USA flags, ten JAC fact sheets, and 100 contest citation cards. This chairman was captivated by the level of artistic and creative imagination that was presented through contest entries to depict this year's theme, "America-One Nation, Many Peoples." Chapters reported receiving 572 contest entries. This chairman received 53 contest entries from six chapters: Abraham Baldwin, Fielding Lewis, Martha Stewart Bulloch, Sweetwater, Thomasville, and William Marsh. Youth from K through 12 created artistic banners, posters, stamps, and photographic essays; expressed their thought through poetry and short stories; and presented community service documentaries. Winners from each level were forwarded to the regional level for judging. Madam State Regent, thank you for asking me to serve the Daughters and youth of the state of Georgia.

# JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP

#### Anne Johnson Henry (Mrs. James H.), Chairman

We are excited to report the increase in Georgia Junior Member involvement in all levels of DAR Service - chapter, state and national. Twelve chapters actively sold Innisbrook Wrap, Ninety chapters reported having 22 Juniors serving as chapter officers, 45 as chapter chairmen and two as Regents. On the State level we have one officer, one state chairman and three state vice chairmen. On the National level we have one chairman and one vice chairman, eighteen Georgia chapters participated in Junior sponsored events. Many chapters are actively recruiting new Junior members and prospective members. Ten chapters elected Chapter Outstanding Juniors. The State Outstanding Junior Contest has a winner (Ocie "O.B." Wilhoit McCorkle of the Burkhalter Chapter, Warrenton). Georgia chapters reported having twenty-four Junior members attending State conference and all twenty-four of these served as Pages. Eight Junior members attended Continental Congress and seven of these served as Pages. Our beautiful website has allowed members to shop online. # LINEAGE RESEARCH

# Sylvia Brown Jensen (Mrs. Leo S.), Chairman

Of the 102 chapters returning reports there are 45 lineage Research Lookup Volunteers. Also, there was assistance from the Lineage Research Lookup Volunteer Board for 119 requests. Information concerning their sources was sent to the National Chairman by four members. Lineage Research responded to 222 requests and there were 98 chapter requests made to the Lineage Research Committee with 76 being answered successfully. Chapters sponsored 20 Lineage Workshops resulting in 39 new applications, 31 becoming members. Participation, 39 times in workshops sponsored by other organizations or by providing DAR information to them was reported resulting in 38 new applications and 38 DAR members! Donations, by members of three chapters, were made to the Friends of Lineage Research. Chapters used the Patriot Index and Internet sites. One Chapter had a computer learning lab for members; another gave a computer printout to each member of their genealogical history. Another provided computer output of Patriots in the local library and those from the chapter approved applications, creating considerable Certificates were presented. Eight other State Requests interest. 34 completed. Lineage Workshop presented at Fall Board. Thank you, LRLV's for volunteering and for all the lookups!

## MEMBERSHIP

# Mary Barfield Thompson (Mrs. Billy H.), Chairman

The Fielding Lewis chapter received the traveling Silver Bowl for gaining 28 new members by application. A separate listing of awards is in the Proceedings. Georgia gained 408 new members, a net membership increase of 96. Georgia Daughters are to be commended for their diligence in making this increase possible. Our Vice Chairman of Membership (Prospective Members), Kitty Thompkins, sent 480 referrals, necessitating much detailed correspondence. Linda Douglas, Vice Chairman of Membership Devolvement and her Team conducted a second successful Fall Board Membership Devolvement Workshop. This report will be separate in the Proceedings. A booklet containing ideas for new member packets was sent to each Georgia chapter. Contents were contributed by Georgia chapters who actively distribute New Member Packets. Faye Dyess edited and printed Georgia's Roadmap to DAR, a booklet containing a wealth of DAR information beneficial not only to new members but to all Daughters. Seventy-two Georgia chapters have e-Membership passwords which enables them to access chapter records. The site has been updated this year to include a list of pending Supplementals, a continuous printable form of each chapter's listing, and the capability of printing mailing address labels. Two Georgia Daughters entered National's Photograph contest.

# MEMBERSHIP DEVELOPMENT TEAM

This vice chairman coordinated the Membership Forum at the 2003 State Conference. Four members of the Membership Develop Team did a 15 minute presentation on Lineage Research, Application Updates, Courthouse Research and Documentation. Attendees were then able to ask questions of the panel. Workshops were again held in conjunction with Fall Board. Thirty-two chapters registered with chapter profiles. There were six general interest sessions, covering: The computer as A DAR Tool, Land Records, Documentation, Communication Tools, Archive Research, and Lineage Research. In addition, there was a team meeting for chapters requesting assistance in attracting and retaining members. This Vice Chairman has given Membership programs to William Day and General James Jackson Chapters. Application workshops were conducted for six chapters: Augusta, Fort Peachtree, Knox-Conway, John Benson, Barnard Trail, and Vidalia chapters. This Vice Chairman also assisted with Workshops for two organizing chapters, in Douglasville and Dahlonega. Thank you Madam State Regent for the privilege of serving the State Society in this capacity.

# NATIONAL DEFENSE Camille Redfern Baxter, Chairman

National Defense continues to be hot topic everywhere, and it is back in style! Ninety-five chapters gave 3-minute reports at each meeting from National Defender. Sixty-two chapters received full programs. Forty-two chapters distributed National Defense materials to members, twelve chapters to public. Forty-nine chapters awarded 218 Good Citizenship medals. Sixty-six chapters awarded 149 bronze ROTC medals. Thirteen chapters awarded 16 gold ROTC medals. Sixty-nine chapters contributed \$271.00 to ROTC Award Program. One chapter sent letter/editorial to National Defender Contest. One chapter sent press clippings for National Defender. Three chapters made suggestions to enhance work of National Defense Committee. This Chairman gave National Defense programs to ten DAR chapters, one DAC chapter, one retirement home. This Chairman prepared instructions and material for Summer Packet and attended five District Workshops giving 15 presentations and encouraged Daughters to subscribe to National Defender for \$4.00/year. It is an honor to continue serving the Georgia Daughters.

# PUBLIC RELATIONS, MOTION PICTURE, RADIO AND TELEVISION

## Nancy Bunker Bowen (Mrs. J. Thomas), Chairman

Reports from 108 chapters indicate Georgia Daughters worked hard – with excellent results - increasing awareness of chapter projects. More than 761 news articles and 636 photographs illustrating chapter activities and programs, 453 radio news or feature spots, and Georgia chapter projects in 79 television news or feature spots. Thirty-four chapters publish newsletters! Five chapters produce chapter informational brochures. Thirtyone chapters utilized the public relations materials produced by NSDAR. Constitution Week activities 67 chapters, Flag Day 23. Programs commemorating significant dates during the Revolutionary War (16) and other historical events (e.g., Louisiana Purchase, the Lewis and Clark Expedition) provided opportunities for chapter publicity and projects. Archibald Bulloch Chapter's historic postcard "Magnet Project" celebrating Statesboro's bicentennial resulted in national publicity in special interest magazine. Bonaventure Chapter was featured in *American Spiri*t, and thanks to the efforts of the General James Jackson Chapter, the *Valdosta Daily Times* published a full-color photograph of NSDAR Memorial Continental Hall and story about Continental Congress! Vidalia Chapter reported 677 inches of local newspaper coverage, Augustin Clayton Chapter reported 99 news articles of various lengths. Ninety-four photographs were published locally. It has been a pleasure and a privilege to serve the State Society as Public Relations Chairman.

## THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA Donna Raye Johnson (Miss), Chairman

Daughters in ninety-nine chapters continue to keep the American Flag visible in communities throughout the state of Georgia. Flags presented included 219 large, 1,371 small, and 335 table. Flag material distributed included 3,120 copies of the Flag Code, 16 Flag certificates, 511 Flag pins, and other patriotic literature of 2,254 pieces, mostly Flag etiquette, Pledge of Allegiance and Flag book markers, and the Star Spangled Banner.

Ninety-eight chapters reported reciting the Pledge of Allegiance at each meeting; sixty-three chapters presented "Flag Facts", and ninety-three chapters encouraged others to "Fly the Flag". Forty-three chapters involved youth in Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Junior ROTC, church groups, and school children in Flag promotion activities. Georgia Daughters continue to provide schools and other community locations with American Flags. Programs have been presented to Chapter Daughters and to Georgia communities on the history of the American Flag and the Pledge of Allegiance as well as on the proper way to dispose of an old worn-out Flag and the significance of the thirteen folds. Twenty-six chapters received Certificates for their excellence in promoting the American Flag. Continue to keep "Old Glory" flying so that all may salute the Red, White and Blue. Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure to serve the State Society as Chairman of this Committee. Thank you.

## VOLUNTEER INFORMATION SPECIALIST Jane Joyner Hampton (Mrs. W. Charles), Chairman

One hundred two chapters reported. All 108 chapters have a Web Site. Forty-one chapters received prospective member contacts through the website and of those, 82 attended a meeting. Forty-one of those 82 became members and 19 memberships are still pending. Joseph Habersham reported the most new members from referrals from their web site. Fifty-one Regents, 53 Treasurers and 56 Registrars reported using the e-Membership Service. Twelve chapters have more than 50% of their members using computers: Augustine Clayton, Bonaventure, Colonel William Candler, Fayette-Starr's Mill, General Daniel Newnan, General Josiah Tattnall, John Houstoun, Lt. James Monroe, Martha Stewart Bulloch, Pulaski, Sukey Hart and William McIntosh. A total of 1,214 members use their computers. 287 participated in National Member Projects and 240 participated in other DAR projects/activities. Fort Frederica and Sukey Hart each held a Computer Workshop. Faye Dyess, Mary Thompson, Jacqueline Keller and Jean Manker were recognized as performing outstanding service to the VIS Committee. Outstanding VIS Project winners were Gretchen Reese recognized for her "Library of Ancestors", Sande Smith and Vicki Cobb for their work on the Chapter

Level. General Daniel Newnan, Colonel William Candler and Elijah Clarke recognized for participation in National projects.

# VOLUNTEER INFORMATION SPECIALIST CHAPTER WEB PAGES

## Faye Booth Dyess (Mrs. James R.), Vice Chairman

All chapter web contacts were checked and a list of the addresses maintained for quick contact. All web pages were checked for content and links checked. Remaining chapters with no web page, including three new chapters, were contacted with the offer of assisting with the creation of a chapter web page. On 29 November 2003 permission was given by State Regent, Rose Elyea Bell, to make Georgia 100% with chapters having web pages. Chapters were notified of the plans to do this, allowing them one week to refuse. No chapters declined. Some chapters replied immediately that they would like a web page and those pages were completed first. On 23 December 2003 the final chapter was approved by National giving Georgia 100% chapters with web pages. This includes three new chapters for a total of 108 chapters with web pages. Chapters that currently have no one to maintain their web pages were given basic pages that will require no maintenance. If the chapter later decides to create its own web page or take over the maintenance of the current page, all information will be passed to them. At the end of the year all pages were checked again for content and working links. Georgia Sampler, used on many pages (contained the old state flag) was updated with the new state flag and the chapters that requested the sampler be updated had the old replaced with the new. Files were maintained on each chapter web page containing all information including a complete copy of the web page and the source file.

# SPECIAL NATIONAL COMMITTEES

# DAR PROJECT PATRIOT Camille Redfern Baxter, Chairman

Georgia Daughters have shown their appreciation and support of our troops, both men and women, on the nuclear aircraft carrier, USS John C. Stennis, stationed in the Persian Gulf, by participating in DAR Project Patriot. Thirty-two chapters sponsored programs, events, and/or activities in support. Twenty-seven chapters participated in community efforts in the war against terrorism. Two hundred seventy-seven Georgia Daughters volunteered their time in support. One Hundred sixty-nine hours were volunteered. \$5,067,00 was collected from chapters and individuals. Over 642 miles were traveled in support. Volunteers stuffed ditty bags at Continental Congress. Christmas cards were mailed to the Stennis personnel. Childrens' artwork was mailed to NSDAR Public Relations Office. Elijah Clarke Regent talked about Project Patriot on radio talk show. This chairman prepared material for the Summer Packet and delivered 15 presentations at five District Workshops. This Chairman encourages all Georgia Daughters to continue supporting our men and women on the USS John C. Stennis by contributing to and volunteering for Project Patriot. None of the wonderful freedoms we enjoy would be

possible without them. Please pray for peace and the safe return of our troops. It is an honor to continue serving the Georgia Daughters.

## DAR SPEAKERS STAFF

### Judith Lillard Hughes (Mrs. Charles T.), Chairman

The objectives of the DAR Speakers Staff Committee are 1) to promote a steady increase in new members, 2) to act as a liaison between the National Society and chapters, and 3) to speak before civic and non-DAR groups in the community. Members of the Speakers Staff are recommended by the State Regent and appointed by the President General. There are 31 members on the Georgia State Society's Speakers Staff. At the suggestion of the State Regent, this Chairman prepared a seven page brochure that lists the members, with two program titles that each member is prepared to present. Also, listed is her address, phone number, and email. Every chapter regent has received a brochure. Many thanks to the State Second Vice Regent for the typing. When a group in your community requests a speaker, refer to this source for the list of members available. During the past year, 136 programs were given with 99 to DAR groups and 37 to non-DAR groups. An estimated 3,798 people were reached during the reporting period. Historical and Genealogical programs are the two most requested topics.

#### INSIGNIA

Reports were received from nine chapters. All did an outstanding job and purchased insignia and pins which totaled \$9,923.00. This chairman presented two Insignia programs and attended all six workshops, Fall Board of Management, and State Conference. She informed members of pins that are available and their proper placement. New Caldwell order forms were available as well as information and sources for pin guards and ribbons. Members were urged to redeem DAR pins found in flea markers, garage sales and on the Internet. Members were also urged to enter the awards contest that this chairman presented and to wear their pins proudly at all appropriate occasions.

#### LITERACY CHALLENGE

#### Sylvia Jordan Ream (Mrs. Alexander K., Sr.), Chairman

One hundred reports were received from Georgia DAR chapters; of these forty-two reported no activity. Fifty-eight chapters promoted literacy through programs at chapter meetings, members teaching English as a second language and reading to individuals and groups. Many donated money and books to reading funds, libraries, and literacy programs in their communities. One chapter entered a local spelling bee and raised \$520.00 for literacy programs in the community. One member teaches a training program for tutors who teach English to immigrants. This is through Literacy Volunteers. Four members participated in Georgia Read-A-Thon for Literacy Day. One member in a chapter reads to prisoners in a jail. A total of 313 chapter members participated in literacy programs. Spent in tutoring and helping with adults were 3,873 hours; with children a total of 8,967 hours. 1,541 books were donated by chapter members to promote literacy. Two community service awards for outstanding achievements in

promotion of literacy were given by two chapters. Thank you, Madam State Regent, for this opportunity to serve.

## PRESIDENT GENERAL'S PROJECT

Contributions made through chapters through July 1, 2004, will count toward the Millennium Administration President General's Project. Georgia chapter contribution to the President General's Project December 2003, totaled \$27,200.00 with still time for additional chapter contributions. This chairman attended State Conference, 112<sup>th</sup> Continental Congress, Fall Board of Management and two District Workshops. All chapters received a letter of information in their Regent's Packets. In November, all chapters received from this chairman, a report of the amount their chapter had contributed, chapter membership count and amount remaining to obtain \$6.00 per member to the President General's Project. Madam State Regent it has been a pleasure under your leadership to serve as Georgia State Society President General's Project Committee chairman.

#### VOLUNTEER GENEALOGISTS

#### Diane McCranie Redkevitch (Mrs. Zenon), Chairman

It has been a pleasure and joy to chair the Volunteer Genealogist Committee. In April Georgia's first Field Genealogy Workshop presented by two staff genealogists from Washington. Two day workshop was open to all DAR members. Response was excellent. Total attendance was 85 and a waiting list of 24. Attendees from: Alabama, Colorado, California, Virginia, South Carolina and Georgia. Trained 72 Georgia Daughters. Now 74 Field Genealogists in Georgia. This helps considerably with ensuring correct application and supplemental papers sent to Washington, minimizing turn around time. Daughters have traveled the state giving 20 workshops touching 150 daughters. If your chapter would like to sponsor a workshop, Field Genealogists are listed in the State Directory. Volunteer Genealogy Committee has undergone major changes in its operation. Annual Training session in Washington was discontinued. In its place will be the newly formed four day class called the DAR Genealogy Consultant. As part of this new program, New Volunteers will no longer verify supplemental papers unless they live in the DC area. They will learn how to do proper Application and Supplemental papers, how to work with headquarters, use the DAR Library from home and review the verification process. Thank you, Madam State Regent, for allowing me to serve in this capacity.

#### WOMEN'S ISSUES

This chairman was impressed with the many types of programs and activities in which Georgia daughters participated. Of the 99 responses received, 45 had no report. 25 chapters used American Spirit Magazine for information, three chapters had short spots at each meeting. The Finance Committee met on Friday, November 7, 2003 at the Holiday Inn Express and Suites, Griffin, Georgia, Lanette Haar Reid, Chairman, called the meeting to order at 4:00 p.m. Others attending were Shelby Alderman Whitson, Secretary, Ann Parker Parsons, Camille Redfern Baxter, Alae Risse Barron Leitch, Susan deCamp Conger, Jean Cole Manker, and Rose Elyea Bell, State Regent. Prayer was offered by Mrs. Whitson.

The Chairman welcomed the committee and thanked them for their attendance.

The Minutes of the March 27, 2003 meeting were approved for the *Proceedings* by a committee composed of Mrs. Reid, Mrs. Leitch and Mrs. Baxter and mailed to committee members.

Mrs. Parsons, State Treasurer, distributed copies of the Summary of Accounts for the Georgia State Society and Meadow Garden Museum Fund from May 1, 2003 - October 31, 2003. They were reviewed and filed. The Chairman commended the State Treasurer for her excellent record keeping.

Mrs. Bell reported she had been notified that the NSDAR Library is missing seventy-four (74) volumes in the Georgia Collection of Genealogical Records and would like to have the complete set. Being too expensive for the Georgia Archives to copy each book, the problem could be resolved with the Georgia Archives shipping the books, five at a time, to the NSDAR Library, where each book would be copied and returned to the Georgia Archives. The Georgia State Society would pay the cost of the shipping and the NSDAR Library would bear the cost of copying the books. Mrs. Bell stated the "74 Club" was formed to accept donations for the binding of the books.

Mrs. Whitson moved "that the Finance Committee recommend to the Executive Committee that an amount up to one-thousand dollars (\$1,000) be made available from the General Savings Money Market to be applied toward the cost of shipping books to and from the Georgia Archives and the NSDAR Library to permit the Library an opportunity to copy Georgia Records not presently available in the Georgia Collection at the NSDAR Library." The motion was seconded by Mrs. Manker and adopted.

The proposed budget for 2004-2005 was discussed briefly. The cost of the 2002-2003 *Proceedings* has to be known in order for this same cost to be included in this proposed budget for the 2003-2004 *Proceedings*. The Chairman requested the State Regent provide this figure by mid February in preparation for the Finance Meeting in March. The State Regent was also asked to share with the Finance Committee Chairman and in-coming State

Regent the name and address of the company holding the Fidelity Bond and also the name and address of holder of the spectrum policy and annual cost for the coverage.

Mrs. Reid stated the State Regent requested that guidelines for the Junior Membership Sales be implemented. Mrs. James H. Henry, State Chairman of Junior Membership was invited to join the meeting for this discussion. Mrs. Manker moved "that the recommended guidelines for the State Vice Chairman, Junior Membership, Junior Sales be adopted and presented to the State Chairman-Junior Membership for implementation." The motion was seconded by Mrs. Whitson and adopted.

Mrs. Whitson stated she had to give a five hundred dollar (\$500) deposit to the hotel to hold the dates for the 2005 State Conference. She asked if it would be appropriate for the Finance Committee to direct the State Treasurer to reimburse her from the hotel contingency fund when the contract was signed. Mrs. Baxter moved "that the State Treasurer reimburse Shelby Whitson for the 2005 State Conference deposit of \$500 when the contract is signed." The motion was seconded by Mrs. Leitch and adopted.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned at 4:50 p.m. Approved: March 25, 2004

The Chairman welcomed the committee and thanked them for their attendance.

The Minutes of the November 7, 2003 meeting were approved as mailed.

Mrs. Parsons, State Treasurer, distributed copies of the Summary of Accounts for the Georgia State Society and Meadow Garden Museum from May 1, 2003 - February 29, 2004. Questions were answered regarding the anticipated construction costs of the Meadow Garden Museum Heritage Education building (approximately \$78,000.00 with approximately \$74,000.00 in the account.) It was also noted that the architect's fees were paid from the Stribling Fund. Mrs. Manker moved "that the Treasurer's report be accepted." Seconded by Miss Conger and adopted.

In anticipation of the printing of the 1996-2006 Membership Roll and Register of Ancestors of the Georgia State Society, Mrs. Whitson moved "the Lucy Cook Peel Fund be moved from the Certificate of Deposit to the Money Market Account at the time of maturity." Motion was seconded by Mrs. Baxter and adopted.

The holding company for the Fidelity Bond is Gunby Insurance Agency at 3720 Longview Drive, Suite #8, Atlanta, GA 30341. Paid \$233.89 on July 22, 2003. The holding company of the Spectrum Policy is Hartford Fire Insurance Company at Strawn & Co. Insurance, P. O. Box 38 in McDonough, GA 30253. Agent is Jay Mercer. Paid \$350.00 on October 14, 2003.

The Committee discussed the Junior Sales. The incoming Vice Chairman of the Junior Shoppe cannot be expected to take stock without inventory and record of payments made on sales, record of credit given to chapters for sales and credit on the State Treasurer's books for the \$500.00 seed money. The State Regent will see to the matter before the inventory is turned over to the incoming Vice Chairman.

The Proposed Budget for the Fiscal Year of 2004-2005 was discussed. The Chairman noted the increase in the per capita for each item listed. It was also noted that the State Bylaws state that ".....no expenses exceeding the budgeted amount shall be paid by the State Treasurer." The State Treasurer was given instructions on final items before closing the books on 30 April 2004 and transference to the new State Treasurer.

#### MEADOW GARDEN LANDSCAPING

#### Josephine Rhodes Agostas (Mrs. William N.), Chairman

Meadow Garden, Augusta's oldest existing house museum, was the home of George Walton, one of Georgia's three signers of the Declaration of Independence. It is a Registered Historic Landmark and is now a national shrine, owned and maintained by the Georgia Society Daughters of the American Revolution. Meadow Garden is open to the public Monday through Friday, 10 AM - 4 PM. In 1900, the DAR purchased Meadow Garden thereby saving it from destruction. The DAR opened the property to the public in 1901. We have maintained it for 103 years for posterity. For 212 years, Meadow Garden has been a physical structure, which connects us with our historic past. The Landscape Committee, composed of the Cherokee Rose (25 members) and the Pine Needle (39 members) Garden Clubs, maintains the grounds with 18 beds. They consist of seven new projects and eleven new phases of old projects. We are pleased to be a part of Augusta's Sacred Heart Cultural Center "Garden Festival" tour, March 19-21, 2004.

# MEADOW GARDEN MUSEUM - BOARD MINUTES July 18, 2003

The Meadow Garden Museum Board met on Friday, July 18, 2003 in the Board Room at Meadow Garden in Augusta, GA. State Regent and Chairman of the Board, Rose Elyea Bell, called the meeting to order at 10:30 a.m. Other members present were Shelby Alderman Whitson, Secretary; Billie Gardner Hunter, Susan deCamp Conger, Jean Everett Johnson, Margaret Poole Cagle, Louise Lockhart Henry, Josephine Rhodes Agostas, Alae Risse Barron Leitch, Ann Parker Parsons and Advisor, Edwina Hall Beall. Absent were Tommie Elaine Shattuck and ex-officio member, Julia Ann Farrigan.

Following the opening prayer given by Mrs. Leitch, Mrs. Bell welcomed the members and thanked them for coming to Augusta for the meeting.

Every member received a copy of the March meeting Minutes by mail which were approved in order to be included in the *Proceedings*. With no objection, the Minutes were not read although copies were available for members as well as the addition to the Patron Levels in the Standing Rules.

**Mrs. Parsons, State Treasurer**, distributed the Summary of Accounts, May 1, 2003 - June 30, 2003. Total assets are: Certificates of Deposits, \$305,567.47; Checking Account, \$19,997.33 and Money Market Account, \$55,816.59. The accounts were reviewed and filed for audit.

**Mrs. Bell** reviewed a letter received by each board member from the Joseph Habersham Chapter, redirecting their pledge of \$50,000 for the proposed dependency building and requesting that a C.D. be purchased designated as the "Alae Risse Barron Leitch Fund" for the maintenance of Meadow Garden. Since approval by the State Conference had been given to pay \$3,000 for architectural drawings for a proposed dependency, the Board had to determine from which account this was to be paid. Mrs. Johnson moved "that the bill from Cheatham, Fletcher, Scott and Sears for the architectural drawings for the Heritage Education Building be paid from the funds donated by the Joseph Habersham Chapter in May 2003 or from the Stribling, Fund if the Joseph Habersham Chapter does not approve this expenditure." Seconded by Mrs. Whitson and adopted.

With the change in funding of the proposed dependency, the Board discussed whether to proceed. Mrs. Henry presented pictures of dependencies at various Virginia Plantations. She also presented the educational use and income producing information from Kenmore at Fredericksburg, VA. The Board reviewed the architectural drawings with the design and specifications and discussed the overall design of the interior and exterior. Following discussion of reasons for building the building and possible uses, the consensus of the Board was to proceed. Mrs. Parsons moved "that the Heritage Education Building at Meadow Garden be built. Funding and financial support may begin now." Seconded by Mrs. Cagle and adopted.

**Mrs. Bell** read recommendations from an Ad Hoc Committee chaired by Julia Ann Farrigan. Other members of the committee were Judith Lillard Hughes, Josephine Rhodes Agostas, Susan deCamp Conger, Louise Lockhart Henry and Tommie Elaine Shattuck. Mrs. Bell also read an encouraging letter from DAR member, Bessie Anne Bretch. After much discussion and review of the architectural plans, Mrs. Whitson moved "we accept Location 2 for the placement of the dependency as recommended by architects, Cheatham, Fletcher, Scott and Sears and Historic Augusta." Seconded by Mrs. Cagle and adopted.

**Mrs. Bell** stated the VIS Vice Chairman, Faye Booth Dyess and Susan deCamp Conger had been working on a new Web site to link Meadow Garden to the Convention and Visitors Bureau and to various Travel and Tourism Sites. By general consensus of the Board, there would be no opposition to this as long as the link would be free and maintained.

Mrs. Bell introduced Eunice Gillespie, member of the William Day Chapter, Duluth, GA who works with the Trusco Capital Management, Inc. as the business development officer. Ms. Gillespie presented Evan Melcher, investment officer with the firm and Melissa M. Cliett, Relationship Manager of SunTrust Bank. These three work with non-profit organizations in development, solicitation and marketing. Ms. Gillespie brought these co-workers to introduce them to Meadow Garden and to present to them the needs of Meadow Garden with no obligation or commitment from the Board.

The meeting was recessed for lunch prepared by Margaret Cagle and Louise Henry.

The meeting resumed with the reports of the chairmen.

**Mrs. Cagle** read the report of Museum Chairman, Mrs. Hunter. The fire extinguisher had been checked and approved, oval rug had been delivered from the cleaners and the air conditioner repaired. The termite inspection will be July 21. Notices were in newspapers regarding July 4<sup>th</sup> Open House. Pink brochures need to be reordered. "Welcome Augusta" would like to come to distribute bags to DAR members when they visit Meadow Garden. Letters were received from AAA about advertising in their Tour Book, a letter from Trademark, a U.S. Trademark Protection Agency and \$3.50 check from Yellow-Page to be applied toward an ad. Problems in plumbing will require a new sewer line sometime in the future at an approximate cost of \$2,290.

Mrs. Cagle, Docents Chairman, thanked the College Hill Chapter for their docent help for the July 4<sup>th</sup> Open House. Forty visitors came to the Open House. Five attended the May workshop and another workshop will be held on September  $9^{\text{th}}$ . Twenty-six docents from six chapters worked a total of 640 hours as of June 30, 2003. Three non-DAR docents worked  $15^{3/4}$  hours. Fifty-seven lunches were served during April and May. In May, the Georgia Retired Teachers Tour brought 80 people from all over the state.

Susan Jackson, House Manager, submitted a written year to date report which states 607 tourists, 187 walk-ins for a combined income of \$1,334.50. Total sales from the Museum Shop for 2003 is \$1,046.50.

Furnishing Chairman, Mrs. Henry, reported six pictures commissioned by the National Parks Service to document Houses of Historical Significance had been ordered from the Library of Congress. These pictures are three elevations of Meadow Garden as it appeared in the mid 1930's and three pictures which include the mantle in the Best Room. the front door of the 1792 house and the mantle located in the front bedroom upstairs. The pictures will be framed by the husband of College Hill Chapter member Maxine Maloney. Mrs. Henry moved "that the Meadow Garden Board accept a donation of a 23" cast iron footed wash pot which was appraised at \$165.00." Seconded by Mrs. Parsons and adopted. This wash pot, used for washing clothes, was donated by State Organizing Secretary, Judith Lillard Hughes. It was appraised by Branon Antiques in Fayetteville, GA. Mrs. Henry also moved "that permission be granted to remove the 'Washington Family' portrait and taken to Ponsford, LJD Conservator, in Acworth, GA to give an estimate to remove "foxing". The phone estimate, \$500-750, if approved would be acceptable." Seconded by Mrs. Whitson and adopted. The restoration to remove "foxing" caused by acids is needed on the 24" x 27" picture. The frame has been restored. Mrs. Henry also stated she had attended the Georgia Humanities Grant Council Program and received helpful information and literature.

**Mrs. Johnson** stated the Augusta Room furniture was covered in a horsehair fabric. The subject was postponed for further investigation.

Mrs. Agostas, Landscaping Chairman, reported the replacement of lawn sprinkler heads is almost complete. The Meadow Garden grounds are well cared for weekly by the yard man. The Cherokee Rose and Pine Needle Garden Clubs come once a month to attend their beds. Lenten Roses and gifts of a shade garden have been donated by Genie Lehmon. Master Gardeners are offering a grant which has been applied for to put brick around the bell at the back door and to purchase two garden benches. Wisteria bushes have been donated and plans have been made to plant four miniature apple trees beside the walk to the outhouse. The fig bush and grape arbor are producing nice crops.

In the absence of the Museum Shop Chairman, Mrs. Shattuck, Mrs. Bell showed a book offered by Mardell Conger Shambach, featuring sketches of churches and antebellum homes by her father, Ledlie William Conger, with the text by Ruth Dunlop Conger. The book will sell for \$30 and Meadow Garden will receive \$15. The Byrd Cookies will be available at the August Workshops.

Mrs. Leitch, Patrons Chairman, reported the approval of the new levels of giving at the 2003 State Conference. These levels are listed in the Meadow Garden Museum Board Standing Rules in Article VII, Patrons.

These new levels are hoped to increase the number of donors and funds donated. Presently, there are two donors for 2003.

Mrs. Henry reported on the continued water seepage under the house on the kitchen level. Recommendations from Mr. Irvin Hart, soil engineer from the U.S. Dept. Of Agriculture included (1) a mixture of sand and clav soil be placed under the front porch and graded away from the house. Weep holes, an inch in diameter and lined with PCV pipe, need to be drilled through the brick at the low end of the porch, so that rain or sprinkler accumulation of water will have a means of escape into the French drain. Cost of soil and delivery charge is \$170 for two 8 yard loads plus labor to spread soil and drill weep holes - approved; (2) the drain under the back walk coming from the kitchen door toward the front walk is either clogged or collapsed and needs replacing. Craig Speer wants to accept this project as an "Eagle Scout" project which has been approved by his Scout Master after consultation with Mr. Hart. Mr. Speer will provide the materials and labor to replace the drainage pipe in its present location - approved; (3) regrade or cover the ground around the flagpole to prevent the water which collects there from seeping under the house. Mr. Hart has approved extending the brick patio to cover the area which will allow the run-off from the patio to reach the yard which already slopes toward the street. Mr. Graham, who laid the patio and walk-way bricks has been contacted for this purpose for a uniform appearance. Mrs. Henry moved "that the patio be extended 12' x 15' to cover the ground which puddles from rain water, etc. at a cost of \$1,775 (materials, labor and clean-up) to Graham Bricklayers at the recommendation of Mr. Irvin Hart, U.S. D.A., moisture control." Seconded by Mrs. Agostas and adopted.

The next Meadow Garden Museum Board meeting will be Friday, November 7, 2003 at 1:00 p.m. at the Holiday Inn Express and Suites, Griffin, GA. There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 3:40 p.m.

#### November 7, 2003

The Meadow Garden Museum Board met on Friday, November 7, 2003 at the Holiday Inn Express and Suites in Griffin, Georgia. State Regent and Chairman of the Board, Rose Elyea Bell, called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m. Other members present were Shelby Alderman Whitson, Secretary; Susan deCamp Conger, Jean Everett Johnson, Margaret Poole Cagle, Louise Lockhart Henry, Alae Risse Barron Leitch, Ann Parker Parsons and ex-officio member, Julia Ann Farrigan. Absent were Billie Gardner Hunter, Josephine Rhodes Agostas, Tommie Elaine Shattuck and Advisor, Edwina Hall Beall.

Following the opening prayer given by Mrs. Leitch, Mrs. Bell welcomed the members to the meeting and thanked them for coming.

Every member received a copy of the July 18, 2003 Minutes by mail and were approved as mailed. With no objection, the Minutes were not read.

Mrs. Parsons, State Treasurer, distributed the Summary of Accounts, May 1, 2003 - October 31, 2003. Total assets are: Certificates of Deposit, \$289,648.66; Checking Account, \$19,564.02 and Money Market Account, \$70,936.66. The accounts were reviewed and filed for audit.

**Mrs. Henry** moved that "Six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00) be removed from Meadow Garden Museum Shop Account and transferred to the Maintenance Account." Seconded by Mrs. Cagle and adopted.

The Chairman read an email from Charlotte Christian, Regent of the Joseph Habersham Chapter, requesting information regarding the chapter's \$25,000.00 donation which they wished to be redirected from the Meadow Garden Dependency account to the Maintenance Account. Mrs. Bell stated she had conferred with a CPA, attorneys and the Comptroller of the National Society and understood the transfer would have to have the agreement of both parties After discussion, Mrs. Bell read a "Statement of Policy" as follows: 'Once a donation has been made to Meadow Garden and it has been entered on the Treasurer's books, the donor may not request that it be refunded nor may the gift be redirected without the documented approval of the Meadow Garden Board.' This directive is in line with the policies of the National Society and of most, if not all, 501 (c)(3) organizations.

**Mrs. Henry** moved that "the Statement of Policy be accepted as written." Seconded by Mrs. Johnson and adopted.

The Board discussed a raise for the House Manager, Susan Jackson. Mrs. Leitch moved that "Susan Jackson's salary be increased to ten dollars (\$10) per hour, effective immediately. The Christmas gift of fifty dollars (\$50) be continued." Seconded by Mrs. Cagle and adopted.

The State Treasurer was directed to settle the account with Mardel Shambach for the books sold at \$30 per book with the Meadow Garden Museum receiving \$15 per book.

**Mrs. Henry** presented bids for construction of the Meadow Garden Dependency. She gave explanations of each bid and how the ones chosen were determined. The bids presented were in the \$75,000 range excluding the brick floor, kitchen and roof. Mrs. Henry moved that "the bids which have been presented be accepted for construction of the Meadow Garden Dependency for Education." Seconded by Mrs. Johnson and adopted.

An Insurance Report was given by Miss Farrigan. After a review of the liability insurance by agent, Jay Mercer of Strawn and Company, it was determined that the coverage for the museum was adequate and should not be changed. As for the Meadow Garden Dependency, construction insurance is available from the Zurich Company, which is a Builder's Risk Policy, up to \$85,000 for 12 months at a cost of \$350. After construction, the liability insurance for the building will be rolled into the current Hartford policy and will cost an additional \$270 for \$85,000 coverage - replacement costs and will follow the current liability with one million dollar coverage per event. The cost will raise the Hartford Policy from \$350 annually to \$620. This means the Georgia State Society would pay \$350 and Meadow Garden Museum would pay \$270 annually. It was stressed that nothing be changed with the Meadow Garden Travelers' Insurance Policy.

Meadow Garden note paper prepared by Lynn Wright will be further investigated.

Due to time, the following reports were filed with the secretary; Landscaping Chairman, Mrs. Agostas reported a patio has been added around the bell, zoysia grass planted and the hedge cut to the ground. Application has been made for an Award - Historic Garden Project from The Principal Financial Group. Patrons Chairman, Mrs. Leitch reported as of October 8, 2003, a total of \$895 from 14 patrons has been donated to Maintenance, Furnishings, Landscaping and Heritage Education. House Manager, Susan Jackson, reported in October, five lunch tours were presented, tours for third grade classes from two schools and the Georgia Council for Social Studies Teachers. New sod was laid with help from the Pine Needle Garden Club. Work has begun on the H/AC. Christmas Open House is December 6.

The next Meadow Garden Museum Board meeting will be January 6, 2004 at Meadow Garden at 10:30 p.m.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:07 p.m.

Absent was Tommie Elaine Shattuck.

Following the opening prayer given by Mrs. Leitch, Mrs. Bell welcomed the members and thanked them for coming to Augusta for the meeting.

The Secretary read the Minutes of the November 7, 2003 meeting and were approved as read.

**Mrs. Parsons, State Treasurer**, distributed the Summary of Accounts, May 1, 2003 - December 31, 2003. Total assets are: Certificates of Deposits, \$289,648.66; Checking Account, \$22,113.23 and Money Market Accounts, \$86,034.35. The accounts were reviewed and filed for audit. Mrs. Parsons stated accounts had been settled with Mardel Shambach.

The Chairman stated that on November 2, 2000, a motion was adopted "that the Stribling C.D. be moved to the Maintenance Account to help cover cost of plastering. The amount in the C.D. is \$3,448.33 plus." This motion should be rescinded because, as was explained by Rosemary Crow Hunter at the January 9, 2001 meeting - "the Stribling C.D. was not cashed because the Joseph Habersham Chapter had so graciously made a generous donation to that fund."

**Mrs. Henry** moved "that the motion adopted on 2 November 2000 to transfer the Stribling Account to Maintenance for plastering be rescinded." Motion was seconded by Mrs. Parsons and adopted.

Committee reports were given: Meadow Garden Museum Chairman, Mrs. Hunter, had no report.

Mrs. Cagle, Docents Chairman, stated a Docents' Workshop would be held on Friday, January 9, 2003 at 11:00 a.m. The Christmas Open House expenses of \$10 will be handled through petty cash. Mrs. Cagle suggested guidelines be established for holiday opening and closing times and payments for Susan Jackson, the House Manager.

Susan Jackson, the House Manager was invited to come give her report. Year to date figures include 923 scheduled tourists, 404 walk-in tourists, \$1,278.50 from scheduled tours, \$1,143.00 from walk-in tours, Museum Shop Sales \$2,550.70, excluding sales at state meetings. Total volunteer hours were 1902 hours. Detailed report is attached.

**Mrs. Henry, Furnishings Chairman**, reported the George Washington family portrait has been re-hung in the downstairs hall having "foxing" removed by Ponsford Conservator and re-framed by "Frame It Now." The 2003 Stewardship Award from the Georgia Trust has been framed and hung with the collage in the Board Room. The 1933 Library of Congress pictures of Meadow Garden are ready to be hung in the upstairs hall. An Associated Press article showing the dining room table decorations at Christmas time was reviewed.

**Mrs. Henry** moved "that the hand-made bricks and Wafer Iron donated by Eleanora Hoemle be accepted by the Meadow Garden Board." Motion was seconded by Mrs. Hunter and adopted.

**Mrs. Henry** showed pictures of shelves for the kitchen that could be reproduced using wood stored in the attic that had been salvaged from the original attic (1792) when the hall ceiling was replaced.

**Mrs. Agostas, Landscaping Chairman**, reported that landscape architect, Roger Davis, had visited Meadow Garden and made suggestions for the beds around the fig bush. He also suggested a front entrance on the 13<sup>th</sup> Street side would be appropriate and offered to give a plan for the gate and plantings. Meadow Garden is eligible for matching grants for the preservation of Georgia's historic gardens and landscapes. Maximum grant award id \$3,000 to be matched with cash only. Mrs. Agostas moved "that \$3,000 be provided for this project in front and to move the large gate on Independence Drive in order to build the Dependency and paint the fence." After discussion, Miss Conger moved "that the motion offered by Mrs. Agostas be tabled for consideration later in this meeting of January 6, 2004". Motion was seconded by Mrs. Whitson and adopted.

In the absence of Mrs. Shattuck, Mrs. Bell showed a sample of the note paper prepared by Lynn Wright featuring a colored picture of Meadow Garden. The cards can be produced in-house. Mrs. Henry moved "that a new note paper for Meadow Garden be prepared for sale at State Conference." Motion was seconded by Mrs. Leitch and adopted. Mrs. Bell will pursue the project and set a price. Mrs. Cagle stated the need to sell all cookies at State Conference. By general consent, the following information will be placed on the Meadow Garden Web Site: sales information of Meadow Garden cookies, ornaments and other selected gift items and information on how to donate to Meadow Garden.

**Mrs. Leitch, Patrons Chairman**, reported as of December 11, 2003, \$17,537 had been donated from 27 Patrons. Notes of appreciation have been written to 25 by the Patrons Chairman. Mrs. Leitch moved "that Meadow Garden pins be sold at State Conference to anyone who is or has been a Patron. Pins to be sold for \$5 as long as they last." Motion seconded by Mrs. Parsons and adopted.

Mrs. Bell stated that at the March 27, 2003 Board Meeting, the motion of Mrs. Henry "that the Meadow Garden Board approve a policy for the

Accession and Deaccession of Inventory at Meadow Garden and the forms which will be required for the implementation of the policy", was postponed until the next Board Meeting. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Agostas. After discussion, Miss Conger moved "that the Collections Management Policy for Meadow Garden Museum previously presented be accepted." Motion was seconded by Mrs. Henry and adopted.

**Mrs. Bell** distributed copies detailing the history of a building fund for a gatehouse and gift shop for Meadow Garden. Mrs. Henry gave a detailed account of the construction bids. Report is attached. Estimated cost is \$91,721.00 including insurance. Mrs. Parsons stated \$97,372.91 was in the building fund. Following discussion with questions and answers, Mrs. Henry moved "that the Meadow Garden Board approve the construction of the Heritage Education Building, to begin construction as soon as practicable, and completed by June 1, 2004." Motion was seconded by Mrs. Hunter and adopted with one dissenting vote by Mrs. Leitch.

Miss Conger reported that the Sacred Heart Garden Tour in March requested Meadow Garden be a part of the tour. She moved "that Meadow Garden participate in the Sacred Heart Garden Festival, March 19-21, 2004, noon - 5p.m. daily." Motion was seconded by Mrs. Cagle and adopted.

The Augusta Metropolitan Convention and Visitors Bureau has invited the Meadow Garden Museum to participate in a pilot program which would involve a booklet of tickets to historic places in Augusta to sell to visitors. The docent would tear the ticket from the booklet for Meadow Garden and return it to the Visitors Bureau for payment. By consensus the Board agreed to participate in this program.

The next Meadow Garden Museum Board Meeting will be Thursday, March 25, 2004 at 1:00 p.m. at the Wyndham Peachtree Hotel and Conference Center in Peachtree City, GA.

There being no further business, following the Blessing for lunch by Mrs. Leitch, the meeting was adjourned at 1:55 p.m.

The Meadow Garden Museum Board met on Thursday, March 25, 2004 at the Wyndham Peachtree Hotel and Conference Center in Peachtree City, GA. State Regent and Chairman of the Board, Rose Elyea Bell, called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m. Other members present were Shelby Alderman Whitson, Secretary; Susan deCamp Conger, Jean Everett Johnson, Margaret Poole Cagle, Louise Lockhart Henry, Alae Risse Barron Leitch, Ann Parker Parsons, Julia Ann Farrigan, ex-officio member and Edwina Hall Beall, Advisor. Absent were Billie Gardner Hunter, Josephine Rhodes Agostas and Tommie Elaine Shattuck.

Following opening prayer by Mrs. Leitch, Mrs. Bell welcomed the members to the meeting.

The Minutes of the January 6, 2004 meeting were read and approved as corrected. The Minutes on the January 17, 2004 called meeting were read and approved as read.

**Mrs. Parsons, State Treasurer**, distributed the Summary of Accounts, May 1, 2003 - February 29, 2004. Total assets are: Certificates of Deposit, \$289,648.66 with Interest removed to Maintenance of \$7,358.56; Checking Account, \$42,014.71 and Money Market Account, \$86,190.98. The accounts were reviewed and filed for audit. Mrs. Parsons noted the money market interest rates were better right now than the certificates of deposit.

In the absence of Mrs. Hunter, Mrs. Henry reported a new Stars and Stripes flag was donated by Mrs. Whitson and installed by the Augusta Fire Department. Flag lights were also repaired. Fire extinguishers were inspected. The annual contracts for house pressure washing as well as termite inspection for the main house and the outhouse were performed. Mr. Cagle had updated the gate alarm and sprinkler heads. The back porch was repainted and the braided rug in the office cleaned.

**Mrs. Cagle** attended the Planning Council of Augusta for the Revitalization and Development of Augusta. She exhibited a drawing of the master plan. Mrs. Cagle moved "that we support the 2004 City Center Master Plan of Augusta for the revitalization and development of Augusta." Motion was seconded by Miss Conger and adopted. Mrs. Bell will sign a letter to the Planning Council showing the Board's support. Mrs. Cagle reported two docent workshops in January for the Garden Tour. Newspaper items of the Sacred Heart Cultural Center Garden Tour including Meadow Garden were given to the members.

#### Furnishings Chairman, Mrs. Henry had not report.

**Mrs. Henry** then reported on the continued Restoration. She noted the Museum was visited on March 20, by the Secretary of the Interior, Gail A. Norton. A front porch column was reproduced by Augusta Sash and Door Company and installed by Ted Baker and Joey Smalley. The painting contractor primed and painted the column at no cost. Mrs. Henry stated the sewer drain from the house to the street needs replacement at an estimated cost of \$1,000.00. The drain has been kept usable by scheduled applications of copper sulfate. While on the roof to inspect the dormer windows, Ted Baker found that some of the shakes need to be replaced.

In the absence of Mrs. Agostas, Miss Conger reported the Landscaping Committee was assisted by 25 members of the Cherokee Rose Garden Club and 39 members of the Pine Needle Garden Club in maintaining 18 beds.

In the absence of Mrs. Shattuck, Mrs. Cagle reported that approximately ten more books of Mardel Shambach's have been found to be sold. They are currently in the possession of LeAnna Walton in Albany. Mrs. Cagle also stated there was an offer to sell Civil War books for \$10, making approximately a 50% profit.

**Mrs. Leitch** reported a total of 67 Patrons contributing \$28,053.00. With the addition of the Joseph Habersham Chapter Capital Investment Fund for Maintenance of \$25,000.00, the total of gifts is \$53,053.00. Notes of appreciation have been written to all contributors. It was noted that 84 Meadow Garden Patron Pins have been donated to the Gift Shop to be sold for \$5.00 to any Patron.

The Chairman then called for the report of the Ad Hoc Committee appointed at the January 17, 2004 meeting to establish policies concerning acceptance of future gifts and grants. Serving on the committee were Mrs. Parsons, Mrs. Henry and Miss Farrigan. Mrs. Parsons moved "by direction of the Committee, to reaffirm the motions adopted on November 7, 2003 and January 17, 2004." Adopted.

**Miss Conger** distributed a letter from Congressman, Charlie Norwood supporting the upcoming Heritage Education Center. Mrs. Henry stated the Ground Breaking would take place sometime after the Masters Golf Tournament April 5-12, 2004. Miss Conger also reported on the success of the Sacred Heart Garden Festival and the Commemoration of the the Bicentennial of George Walton's Death. Meadow Garden will participate in a pilot project of One Price Ticket Promotion through the Augusta Metropolitan Convention & Visitors Bureau. Miss Conger set up and

hosted a Meadow Garden display at the Visitors Bureau's Travel Writers Augusta Golf and Garden Tour.

Miss Farrigan reported the Travelers Insurance Company was no longer writing insurance in Georgia. We investigated another company for Liability and Fine Arts Coverage for Meadow Garden. Utilizing our agent Jay Mercer with Strawn & Co., who wrote the State Society Liability Insurance, we were able to get a policy quote from the Zurich Co. The proposed policy will cover both Liability and Fine Arts at a cost of \$2,589.00. The current policy expires on April 20, 2004. Mrs. Henry moved "that the Meadow Garden Board accept the Precision Premier Insurance quote from Zurich Insurance Company." Motion was seconded by Mrs. Whitson and adopted.

#### May 11, 2004

The Meadow Garden Museum Board met on Tuesday, May 11, 2004 at Meadow Garden in Augusta, GA. State Regent and Chairman of the Board, Rose Elyea Bell, called the meeting to order at 2:30 p.m. Other members present were Shelby Alderman Whitson, Secretary; Billie Gardner Hunter, Susan deCamp Conger, Jean Everett Johnson, Margaret Poole Cagle, Louise Lockhart Henry, Josephine Rhodes Agostas, Tommie Elaine Shattuck, Alae Risse Barron Leitch, Ann Parker Parsons, Julia Ann Farrigan, ex-officio member and Edwina Hall Beall, Advisor.

Following the opening prayer given by Mrs. Leitch, Mrs. Bell thanked the members for coming. Mrs. Whitson read the Minutes of the April 13, 2004 Called Meeting which were approved as read. The Minutes of the March 25, 2004 meeting were approved as mailed.

**Mrs. Parsons, State Treasurer**, distributed the Summary of Accounts, May 1, 2003 - April 30, 2004. Total assets are: Certificates of Deposit, \$289,722.91; Checking Account, \$44,675.49 and Money Market Account, \$83,224.80. She noted there was approximately \$80,000.00 in the Heritage Education Building Fund. The accounts were reviewed and filed for audit.

There being no objection, report of the Heritage Education Building was given by Mrs. Henry before other chairmen reports. She showed the building permit she had received and explained the building had to have eleven different inspections with signatures on the permit at each inspection. She also showed the architectural plans with the official stamp. The general contractor will be Ted Baker. Mrs. Bell stated congratulatory letters had been received from Georgia Governor Sonny Perdue and U.S. Representative Max Burns.

In discussion of the naming of the new building, Mrs. Bell read from the Minutes of October 24, 1994 which stated: "The Stribling gift of \$2,500.00 was discussed. Mrs. Hanf suggested that it be used for the Gate House and that the Gate House be named the Stribling Gate House. Approved. Mrs. Whitson moved that "the apparent motion dated October 24, 1994, suggesting the naming of the Gate House, the Stribling Gate House, be rescinded." Seconded by Mrs. Henry and adopted. Mrs. Johnson moved that "the new building be named 'The George Walton Heritage Education Center.' Seconded by Mrs. Henry and adopted. Discussion then followed on honoring Mrs. Stribling. Mrs. Cagle moved that "the upstairs Archival area be named 'The Lenamae French Stribling (Mrs. T. Earle) Archives. Georgia State Society, NSDAR.'" Seconded by Mrs. Agostas and adopted. Miss Conger moved that "The George Walton Heritage Education Center be marked with a granite marker." Seconded by Mrs. Shattuck and adopted. Miss Farrigan presented a suggestive wording of the marker, costing between \$275 - 300.00. The tentative date for dedication of the building in June 26, 2004. Miss Farrigan will be responsible for the invitations to the dedication.

**Mrs. Bell** showed a painting of Meadow Garden as it appeared circa 1895 presented to her by Augusta Chapter artist, Betty Eubanks, to be placed in the Heritage Education Center. A New Logo Banner for Meadow Garden was presented to Mrs. Bell by Susan Conger which was a gift from a member of the Mexico State Society.

There was no reporting from Museum Chairman, Mrs. Hunter and Docent Chairman--Mrs. Cagle. Mrs. Cagle stated that the lawn sprinkler system had been cut off in the construction area of the new building.

Mrs. Henry, Furnishings Chairman, stated Meadow Garden was actually a business and should be managed as such. With more than \$350,000 in its inventory, it is a serious concern and therefore reported the insurance coverage of \$350,000.00 of Meadow Garden was inadequate and needed updating. Mrs. Henry is currently in the process of compiling a complete room by room inventory. She stated several items in the Museum were not included in the 1995 appraisal. Mrs. Henry moved that "the Meadow Garden Board provide a job description for the Furnishings Chairman. This description would be made a part of the Meadow Garden Standing Rules. One item will be a bi-yearly inventory record's update, kept in duplicate, with one copy and picture inventory residing outside the house." Seconded by Mrs. Cagle and adopted. Mrs. Henry also moved that "a licensed antique appraiser be employed at least every ten years to furnish a guideline for adequate coverage in our insurance. A current appraisal (2004) is needed to update the new policy which is placed with Strawn & Co., in McDonough and required by the company." Seconded by Mrs. Johnson and adopted. Mrs. Henry moved that "Ted Baker be employed, at an estimated cost of \$250.00 to build several display shelves for the kitchen. The shelving will be brown siding from the 1792 house which was salvaged when the upstairs hall ceiling was reconstructed during the hall restoration." Seconded by Mrs. Johnson. Miss Conger moved "to postpone the decision on how to use the 1792 wood siding until the first regular board meeting of the next administration." Seconded by Mrs. Agostas and not adopted. Mrs. Henry's original motion on the use of the brown siding was adopted.

**Mrs. Henry** displayed a Persian area rug presented by Mrs. Shattuck. Mrs. Sshattuck moved that "the Meadow Garden Board accept the 1890-1910 Persian Oriental rug, valued between \$1,000 - \$3,000 for the George Walton Heritage Education Center." Seconded by Mrs. Henry and adopted. Miss Conger moved that "the Meadow Garden Board accept the 1974 painting of Meadow Garden, circa 1895, by artist Betty Eubanks for The George Walton Heritage Education Center, value to be determined at a later date." Seconded by Mrs. Shattuck and adopted.

Referring to the Minutes of the April 13, 2004 called meeting about the sewer line, Mrs. Henry stated the trouble may be with tree roots bending the pipes and it may not be necessary to replace the entire line.

Mrs. Agostas, Landscaping Chairman, reported the Meadow Garden Museum is participating in the "Be a Tourist in Your Own Hometown" project during National Tourism Week, May 9 - 15. She stated the sprinkler system needs repairing and enlarging with possible need of a new system altogether. Many flower beds need hand watering.

Mrs. Shattuck, Museum Shop Chairman, reported seven more books of the Ledie William Conger drawings had been found and would be for sale at a price of \$30 with \$15 to Meadow Garden and \$15 to Mardel Shambach. One extra book is personally autographed. A determination as to whom this book may belong, and an attempt be made to contact that person to receive the book. Mrs. Shattuck presented two different compact disks from her company, "Finishing Touches" - showcasing George Washington's 110 Rules of Civility and Decorum. Ten additional copies of each will be for sale in the Museum Gift Shop for \$20 for the set of 2 with \$10 of the proceeds going to the Heritage Education Center.

Mrs. Leitch, Patrons Chairman, delivered the Annual Report of 2003-2004 at the 106<sup>th</sup> Georgia State Conference. All donors had been recognized and received Certificates of Appreciation. Names of all donors have been recorded in the Meadow Garden Patrons Book and the book placed on permanent display at Meadow Garden.

### STANDING RULES FOR MEADOW GARDEN MUSEUM

#### I

#### MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

- The governing body of a museum, in this instance the Meadow Garden Board, serves the public interest as it relates to Meadow Garden, and must consider itself accountable to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, as well as to Meadow Garden; members should not attempt to act in their individual capacities, but all actions should be taken as a Board, Committee, or otherwise in conformance with the Standing Rules, the Act of Incorporation, or applicable Resolutions.
- 2 The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the three (3) Trustees as named in the Deed from the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, conveying Meadow Garden to the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution; namely, the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the State Chairman of Meadow Garden who is appointed by the State Regent; the Chapter Regents of the Augusta Chapter and the College Hill Chapter, both chapters being located in Augusta, who shall serve as Vice Chairmen to the State Chairmen of Meadow Garden; the State Treasurer; and five of the chairmen of Meadow Garden Committees, as appointed by the State Regent.
- 3. No Georgia Daughter shall serve in the same Meadow Garden Chairmanship more than three (3) consecutive terms.
- 4. In addition to the six (6) appointments to the Board which are made by the State Regent, she shall appoint two (2) Honorary State Regents to

serve as Advisors to the Board, each of whom shall be given privilege of the floor without a vote unless also serving as one of the six (6) appointed chairman.

- 5. The State Second Vice Regent shall serve as ex-officio member of the Meadow Garden Board, being given the privilege of the floor without a vote.
- 6. The State Regent shall serve as Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board, and the State First Vice Regent shall serve as Secretary of the Meadow Garden Board.
- 7. The Meadow Garden Board shall meet a minimum of three (3) times each year; namely, preceding Fall Board of Management meeting, preceding annual State Conference and following Continental Congress, and at such other times as deemed necessary by the Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board, At least one (1) meeting of the Board shall be held at Meadow Garden each year.
- 8. The Meadow Garden Board shall have jurisdiction over the operation, maintenance and work of Meadow Garden and shall be the authority for Meadow Garden as long as such authority is not in conflict with the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, the Act of Incorporation for the Georgia State Society, Resolutions adopted by the Georgia State Society and/or directions which from time to time may be approved by action of the Georgia State Society assembled at its annual State Conference.
- 9. The Meadow Garden Board shall supervise the placing of all insurance to cover the grounds and the Museum and its contents, including the fine arts, with accredited companies - coverage to include fire, theft and liability.
- 10. Five (5) voting members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.
- 11. Minutes shall be kept of each meeting and a copy shall be sent to each member and printed verbatim in the State Proceedings.
- 12. All expenses for maintenance, operation and purchases of furnishings and plantings shall be authorized by the State Regent, as Chairman of the Board, and paid by the State Treasurer. Expenditures exceeding \$1,000.00 must have the majority approval of the Board.
- 13. These rules will be binding on the actions of the Board in their operation of Meadow Garden. They may be changed by the following procedure: Members of the Board must have written notification of proposed changes one month prior to the next meeting of the Board; a two-thirds vote of the Board and approval of the State Conference are necessary to effect a change.

### П

### **OPERATIONS**

- 1. Everyone entering Meadow Garden will be requested to sign the register, including date, time of arrival and time of departure.
- 2. No more than fifteen (15) people with each Docent are to be on tour in the house at a given time. Excess of this number may wait in the reception room or in the garden. The Museum Manager has the authority to enforce the Meadow Garden rules at all times.3.There will be no smoking in Meadow Garden. 4. No refreshments are to be

served in or taken into the Museum by visitors, including chapters or the public. Should a group, such as a visiting chapter, desire refreshments, the garden is available for use if litter is properly disposed of by the serving group.

- 5. Tour visitors will be asked to pay a fee as set by the Board.
- 6. There will be only five (5) complete sets of keys to Meadow Garden and three (3) keys to the gates of Meadow Garden. Keys are to be returned after each administration. New locks may be required. Distribution of keys: Gate Only: Augusta Police Department, Georgia Power, and Sizemore Security; Gate and House: Chairman of Meadow Garden Board, Meadow Garden Chairman, Museum Manager, Docents Chairman and Landscaping Chairman.

#### ш

#### VOLUNTEERS AND DOCENTS

- 1. Docents shall be those well screened and trained volunteers who will serve under the direct supervision of a Meadow Garden Museum Chairman and/or the Museum Manager.
- 2. Duties of docents shall include acting as guides, hostesses, working in museum shop, working in yard, cleaning in house, public relations. No volunteer work at or for Meadow Garden shall be done except under the direct guidance of the Meadow Garden Board and the chairman of the specific committee for the particular function.
- 3. Cleaning or yard work volunteers shall be under the direction of the Museum Manager.

#### IV

#### FURNISHINGS

- 1. Items bought or accepted for the older section of Meadow Garden must pre-date 1821.
- 2. Furnishings of the two (2) main floor rooms and the two (2) upstairs rooms in the newer section may be dated post 1820 but these rooms should be considered companion rooms to the rest of the house and furnished accordingly with all efforts made to keep furnishings of these four rooms dated no later than 1850. The Augusta Room furnishings will remain as they were in 1982.
- 3. Reproductions may be used only when the physical condition of the antique is jeopardized by exposure in areas where large numbers of visitors have easy access; or when environmental conditions including excessive light, dust, humidity or airborne impurities pose a threat to the preservation of originals.
- 4. Effective March 12, 1983 all items donated to Meadow Garden shall be accepted with the written condition that they become the property of Meadow Garden and may be used, replaced or sold at the discretion of the Meadow Garden Board only.
- 5. All items that post date 1821, with the exception of those in the six (6) rooms of the newer section and those described in Number 3 of this section, shall be replaced as soon as possible with similar items predating 1821.

- 6. Once an item is placed, it shall not be moved from one location to another without permission of the Meadow Garden Board. Only the Chairman of the Board may approve the removal of an item from the house, if it is in need of repair or refinishing.
- Any item donated or purchased must have written documentation of appraisal.
- 8. A file will be kept of all assets with information as to price paid or market value, date of acquisition, donor or where bought, documentation and appraisal and a description of article. One file will be kept in the reception room accessible to the Docents; a duplicate file will be in the possession of the Chairman of the Board.
- All items purchased or donated will be added to the Fine Arts insurance policy. Said policy will be reviewed and updated a minimum of once a year. Major additions to furnishings will be added immediately.
- 10. Future plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the Museum.

#### V

### LANDSCAPING

- 1. The landscape plan adopted by the Board shall be adhered to with no deviation unless recommended by an authority on landscape design and care.
- 2. Donations of shrubbery, plants or trees shall be accepted only when item is part of the master plan.
- 3. Work on the grounds will be under the sole direction of the Meadow Garden Board and the Landscaping Chairman. Supervision of actual work will be provided by the Museum Manager or the Landscaping Chairman of Meadow Garden.

#### VI

#### MUSEUM SHOP

- •1. The Museum Shop will be operated by a committee appointed by the Chairman of the Board and will be responsible to the Board.
  - 2. Chairman of the committee will be responsible for all purchases, subject to the approval of the Board or the State Regent.
  - 3. Museum Shop operations will be self-supporting. In the event funds are needed for purchases, they may be advanced from available Meadow Garden funds and must be considered a loan and shall be repaid without interest within one (1) year from date of borrowing.
  - 4. Profit from the Museum Shop shall be accounted for within the State Treasurer's books, with a percentage being transferred at the discretion of the Board at the end of the fiscal year and placed in the Maintenance Account. The audit of the Museum Shop operation shall be included in the annual audit of the Georgia State Society.

#### VII

#### PATRONS

I.Donors to the following categories are eligible to be recognized: Meadow Garden Capital Investment Trust Fund Furnishings Maintenance Landscape

- 2. Giving categories and levels will be:
  - \$10 Friends
  - \$25 Supporters
  - \$35 Signers
  - \$50 Patrons
  - \$103 The 1900 Society (giving level for 2003; giving would increase by \$1 each year)
  - \$250 Sons and Daughters of Liberty
  - \$500 Olivia's Legacy
  - \$1,000 George Walton Society
  - \$5,000 Meadow Garden Preservation Society

This information will be publicized in the Meadow Garden brochure and other appropriate places as determined by the Board.

- 3. Chapter gifts, above the State Honor Roll requirements, automatically qualify the chapter to be recognized at an appropriate giving level determined by the categories listed in #2.
- 4. The State Treasurer will report these gifts to the Patrons Chairman.
- 5. The Patrons Chairman will issue certificates to the qualifying individuals and chapters or groups.
- 6. A permanent book will be kept on public display at Meadow Garden to record the names of those who give at the Patrons level or above.
- 7. The Patrons Chairman will enter the names of donors in the appropriate book a minimum of once a year.

#### VШ

#### **PLAQUES & MARKERS**

- 1. Plaques/Markers may be placed at Meadow Garden only at the discretion of the Board, and request meets the following criteria:
  - A. Substantial service and/or contributions that secured the property and the heritage for the GSDAR.
  - B. Individuals so recognized shall have been deceased for at least 5 years;
  - C. Plaque/Marker will be paid for by person(s) requesting such recognition.
- 2. Such plaques will be permanently displayed at Meadow Garden and a record of the honoree's service and/or contribution will be recorded and placed in the Meadow Garden file, with Board approval.
- Plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the Museum. Additional markers shall not be permanently placed on the grounds.
