Mrs. Whitson welcomed the newly elected officers, extended her congratulations and presented each with a memento of the occasion.

The State Regent-elect announced her scriptural theme, "Let your light so shine forth..." Mrs. Whitson further stated that a pin is being developed which will be offered to those who wish to participate in the "Shining Light Club" with funds going toward the State Regent's projects. The State Regent's Project as well as the School Projects will be announced at a later date.

The State Regent stated she had written two new programs, answered hundreds of emails and numerous phone messages and met with the current and immediate past State Treasurers. She stated the State Regent's Project was doing extremely well with over 300 candle pins given for a \$10 donation each. Guests at the March 2005 State Conference will be Shirley J. Gilkeson, West Virginia; Jane H. Barbot, North Carolina; Dorothy E. Winter, Iowa and Marcia M Seifert, Ohio, An invitation has been issued to the President General and awaiting a reply.

The First Vice Regent reported the plans for the Georgia Luncheon at the 114th Continental Congress are underway. The luncheon will be at the J.W. Marriott Hotel on Friday, July 8, 2005 from 12:00 – 2:00 p.m.. Ticket prices are yet to be determined. The theme will be "Christmas in July."

The Chaplain reported 61 birthday remembrances have been sent to age 90 plus members. One hundred eight deaths have been reported and sympathy cards mailed to the families of the deceased members. Copies of chapter memorial lists will be provided to each chapter chaplain in order to ensure all deaths have been reported.

The Recording Secretary reported that Minutes of all meetings have been recorded and transcribed and several estimates on publication of the *Proceedings* book have been obtained and provided to the State Regent and the Finance Committee.

The Corresponding Secretary reported the State Regent's Letter #2 was prepared and mailed. The 2004-2005 Master Questionnaire sections were updated, with input from the appropriate State Officers and Chairmen, copied and labeled for distribution. Corrections to the State Directory were prepared and are being disseminated at this meeting. The State Board of Management agenda and directives were emailed to attendees.

Many chapter membership changes have been received and 72 yearbooks or membership lists have been received, logged and filed. Mrs. Keller stated she is formulating plans for printing of the 2006 *Membership Roll and Register of Ancestors* book.

The Curator reported the ballot box is locked and she believes the key may be inside. Assistance may be required to have the box opened.

New Business items included the following recommendations from the Executive Committee to be brought before the State Board of Management:

- 1. That \$500 be donated to the NSDAR Library in honor of Georgia State Regent, Shelby Alderman Whitson, for purchase of books for the Georgia shelf. The check is to be sent after January 1, 2005.
- 2. That the term "privileges of the floor" and the right to speak be accorded to those authorized to attend the State Board of Management.
- 3. That chapter members attending the district workshops who do not attend the luncheon and closing assembly pay a \$10.00 registration fee. (Recommendation from the Finance Committee.)
- 4. That each chapter send to the State Treasurer, with the state dues, a \$10.00 conference registration fee for each voter to which the chapter is entitled, this fee to be paid whether the chapter is represented or not. State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the \$10.00 conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$7.00 conference fee at the time of registration. (Recommendation from the Finance Committee.)
- 5. That if the 2003-2004 Proceedings is printed and ready for distribution before December 31, 2004 that it be mailed book rate; if it is not ready for distribution until after January 1, 2005 that it be distributed at State Conference. (Recommendation from the Finance Committee.)

The State Regent announced dates for the 2005 District Workshops are August 16-20. Tentative dates for the 2006 District Workshops are August 15-19. Plans are being made for the Wine and Cheese party hosted by the State Officers following the Opening Night Session at State Conference. The First Vice Regent will send invitations.

Mrs. McCorkle extended an invitation to the Executive Committee to attend the National Junior Luncheon to be held

on Saturday, July 9, 2005 at noon at the J.W. Marriott Hotel.

It was noted by the State Regent that for many years the tradition within the Georgia State Society had been to place unpublished copies of genealogical records at three locations within the State of Georgia. While a motion had been adopted at the November 1, 2002 Executive Committee meeting to discontinue this practice, the idea was revisited in an effort to better serve the needs of Georgia Daughters. After discussion by the Executive Committee, Mrs. Baldwin moved to reinstate the practice of providing genealogical records to the original four repositories; ie, the DAR Genealogical Records Library in Washington, D.C.; the Georgia Archives; the Georgia Historical Society in Savannah and the Washington Memorial Library in Macon. Motion was seconded and adopted. The McCall Genealogical Fund has been added to the State Honor Roll and adequate funding is available for this purpose.

Mrs. Whitson announced the Atlanta History Center will have a Benjamin Franklin Exhibit in 2007 and she received an invitation to serve on the board. Due to prior commitments the State Regent will be represented by the State Second Vice Regent at the meeting on April 15.

The **Second Vice Regent** reported the total monetary contributions to the schools this year was \$75,816.00. Mrs. Chastain reported that she presented eight programs to chapters and completed arrangements for the DAR School/Youth Luncheon to be held at this conference.

The **Chaplain** reported deaths of 181 Georgia Daughters who will be remembered at the Memorial Service today. This year Chapter Regents will place the flowers for their chapter's deceased members.

The **Recording Secretary** reported that minutes of the District Workshops and State Board of Management have been transcribed. The Proceedings book is being compiled for publication and input of data is in progress.

The **Corresponding Secretary** reported the State Regent's Letter #3 was prepared and mailed. The State Conference Program was compiled and printed and the 2005 revision to the *Parliamentary Procedure Protocol and Popular Traditions in Georgia DAR* was proofed and prepared for printing in booklet form. Copies were distributed to officers and additional copies are available at \$5.00.

The **Organizing Secretary** reported she attended the organizational meeting of the Trahlyta Chapter on September 9, 2004. Approval had been received from the Organizing Secretary General to grant an extension to the term of office for the Regent of the Matthew Talbot Chapter in Monroe, Georgia. Mrs. McCorkle encouraged attendance at the Juniors Luncheon at Continental Congress and stated she will reserve a table for Georgia Daughters if enough interest is indicated.

The **Historian** reported funds are not available to place a plaque at Fort Morris at this time; however, when funds do become available a letter of approval must be obtained from the Director of the site before proceeding.

The **Librarian** reported for the 2004 calendar year, Georgia Daughters provided 416.5 hours of library service, 882 books/periodicals, and a bottom-line financial contribution in books, goods and donations of \$10,999. Mrs. Setters announced that Garland Crowe DuPree of the Nathaniel Abney Chapter donated her personal collection of 136 volumes of genealogical and historical references valued at \$3,600 to her county library.

The **Curator** reported all equipment of the Georgia State Society has been inspected and is in order for State meetings.

The **Parliamentarian** reported she has reviewed all chapter by-laws and is sending letters to every chapter advising of the legal requirement for a Dissolution clause to be incorporated in the chapter bylaws. Mrs. Hoff stated that stapling the clause at the end of the bylaw section does not satisfy the requirements of the law.

Mrs. Patton suggested that in an effort to improve donations to Kate Duncan Smith DAR School, the Schools Chairman and the Travel Coordinator jointly look into the possibility of developing a bus trip to KDS for Dedication Day in October. Mrs. Patton further suggested that all chairmen put their committee information on the Georgia Web site.

Mrs. Baldwin suggested the state officers prepare four baskets containing various DAR publications and instructional materials for the 2005 Workshop Basket Fling. A drawing for the baskets will be held among Chapter Regents in each of the four districts during District Workshops. This idea was enthusiastically adopted by the officers.

Ms. Reid announced the State Conference for 2007 will be March 11-14 in Savannah at the Desoto Hilton Hotel.

Following the Benediction by the Chaplain, the meeting was adjourned at 10:30 a.m.

Also recognized: Fielding Lewis Chapter, Ellen Canup Hale, Regent, as number one chapter in the nation, and Augustin Clayton Chapter, Barbara Bolen Florence, Regent, as the number three chapter in the nation in Chapter Achievement. All who received awards at Continental Congress were asked to stand and be recognized.

Mrs. Whitson recognized the National appointees from Georgia: **National Chairmen**: Rosemary Crow Hunter, Constitution Week; Edwina Hall Beall, Corridor Hostesses. Also announced was Mindy Tidmore Kammeyer, DAR School.

Mrs. Whitson announced the **Veterans Affairs Voluntary Service (VAVS) Representatives** and asked those present to stand and be recognized: Carolyn Gough Ingrando, Harriett Jones Claxton, Mary Jo Curry Graham and Patricia Patillo Mercer.

Mrs. Whitson recognized the **Timekeepers**: Billie Gray Patrick Holt, State Chairman; Lynabel Price Crowe, Willa Davis Johnson and Christine Rife Napier, Vice Chairmen.

The State Regent announced the format for this meeting would be different from years past. Chapter Regents were asked to bring with them various forms which are to be completed in January. Those officers and chairmen who have responsibility for these forms will address the reporting requirements, clarify and answer questions. This will be followed by the reports and information from other chairmen.

Dorothy Corn Hoff, State Parliamentarian, read Article VII, Sections 1,3, 4, and 5 of the State Bylaws pertaining to the State Board of Management.

The State Regent introduced the Chairman of Credentials, Mary Farthing Simonds, who gave the first Credentials Committee report. Forty-five voting members of the State Board of Management representing 27 chapters registered. In attendance were: 10 State Officers, 1 National Officer, 8 Honorary State Regents, 1 State Parliamentarian, 26 Chapter Regents, 45 Chapter members. Total registration without duplication 111. Represented in this number were: 12 National Chairman/Vice Chairmen, 30 State Chairmen/Vice Chairmen. The State Regent declared a guorum established as specified in the State Bylaws.

Mrs. Whitson stated that there being no objections, the Proceedings Committee would approve the minutes of this meeting. No objections were noted.

The State Regent asked the State First Vice Regent, Laura Marcella Reid, to take the Chair. Mrs. Whitson expressed thanks for the encouragement, support and prayers of the Georgia Daughters as she carries out the daunting responsibility of guiding the Georgia State Society in moving forward. Thanks were also expressed to the Fielding Lewis Chapter members for hosting the lovely tea at the Aviation Museum Art Gallery in Warner Robins in her honor. She stated the August workshops were very well attended and noted that many positive comments had been expressed. Mrs Whitson stated that since being installed as the 57th State Regent, her calendar had been filled with chapter visits, programs, luncheons, teas, grave markings and wreath lavings. She attended meetings with new chairmen, district directors, Meadow Garden Board meetings and Executive Committee meetings. Additionally, she attended National Board of Management, participated in the NSDAR School Tour and was a guest at the West Virginia State Conference. She stated it was her privilege to dedicate the State Projects of Mrs. Bell's administration at KDS and Tamassee. During the National School Tour she attended the Board of Trustees meetings at both schools, the Finance meeting at KDS, the Building and Grounds and Advisory Committee meetings at Tamassee, and the DAR Advisory Council at Crossnore. Mrs. Whitson expressed her appreciation for the pledges in support of the George Walton Heritage Education Building at Meadow Garden, and thanked the Georgia Daughters for their overwhelming response with donations for the candle pins which will benefit the replacement of Georgia flags with those of the new design, new DAR Banner, and the McCall Genealogical Records Fund.

Mrs. Whitson announced the visiting state regents at the 2005 State Conference will be from Iowa, Ohio, North Carolina, and West Virginia. An invitation has been extended to the President General and she is awaiting her response.

Mrs. Whitson shared the following items from the National Board of Management meeting: On October 9, the Trahlyta Chapter in Dahlonega became our newest Georgia Chapter with 13 members: Georgia seating at the 2005 Continental Congress will be on the floor, section 18: all old forms must be destroyed, the DAR Store form color is lilac; there is a new booklet for Chapter Treasurers and Registrars, destroy the 1995 booklet; application papers must be typed or computer generated, any handwritten ones will be returned and it is hoped the problems with the MAC application CD will be resolved soon. At least six months is necessary for approval of a marker; complete supporting material must accompany the request and when marking a grave in another state, notify the state regent and the local chapters, and obtain permission from the family and sometimes the cemetery; there is a backlog of supplementals and new applicants are given first priority; Bacone College requests clothing donations no longer be sent, instead they ask for classroom needs and personal items, and a list may be found on the Chapter Achievement Website; a new DAR Handbook will be published next Fall, changes should be sent to Gale Jones Fixmer, First Vice President General: all resolutions submitted by states must be national in scope; a new protocol book is to be published soon; the J. W. Marriott is sold out for the 2005 Congress, however, cancellations come in monthly and alternative hotels at the same rate are available; opening night at the 2005 Congress is Wednesday, July 6; there are now two Speakers Staffs, a National Speakers Staff for those who are willing to speak to the press and outside organizations about the national society's mission, projects and programs, and a State Speakers Staff for those who have programs to give to chapters in the state. No National Society appointments have yet been made.

Mrs. Whitson thanked all for keeping their "lights shining" and expressed her appreciation for this wonderful opportunity to represent the Georgia Daughters. She stated that it is the combined effors of the state officers, state chairmen and vice chairmen, chapter regents and, most of all the members that will make this a successful year. A rising vote of appreciation was given the State Regent for her outstanding leadership on behalf of the state society.

Ms. Reid thanked Mrs. Whitson for so graciously representing the Georgia Daughters and for her outstanding report.

The State Recording Secretary asked the First Vice Regent to take the Chair and gave a recommendation from the Executive Committee:

That \$500 be donated to the NSDAR Library in honor of the Georgia State Regent, Shelby Alderman Whitson, for purchase of books for the Georgia shelf. The check to be sent after January 1, 2005. Rationale: This donation is customarily made for each new State Regent. The funds come from the State Library Fund. Adopted.

The State Regent resumed the chair and the Recording Secretary continued with recommendations from the Executive Committee:

That all listed in Section 5, Article VIII who are given the privilege of the floor also be granted the right to speak. Adopted.

That chapter members attending the summer workshops who do not attend the luncheon and closing assembly shall pay a \$10.00 registration fee. Adopted.

That each chapter send to the State Treasurer, with the state dues, a \$10.00 conference registration fee for each voter to which the chapter is entitled, this fee to be paid whether the chapter is represented or not. State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay a \$10.00 conference fee at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters, shall pay a \$7.00 conference fee at the time of registration. Adopted.

That if the 2003-2004 Proceedings is printed and ready for distribution before December 31, 2004 that it be mailed book rate; if it is not ready for distribution until after January 1, 2005, that it be distributed at State Conference. Adopted.

The **State First Vice Regent** reported plans are underway for the Georgia Luncheon which will be held on Friday, July 8, from 12:00 - 2:00 p.m. and the price of the tickets has not yet been determined. The theme will be "Christmas in July."

The State Second Vice Regent and DAR School Chairman reported: she participated

in the National School Tour, explained the requirements of the Hightower Award, and emphasized that the chapter contribution is based on the number of chapter members as stated in the Proceedings. Questions from attendees were answered. She further stated that Georgia has projects at three of the six schools: renovation of the High School library at KDS; the donation of funds to the principle of the May Irwin Talmadge Auditorium/Gymnasium Endowment Fund; and the purchase of hymnals for the chapel at Berry College. She asked that each chapter in Georgia buy at least one hymnal at a cost of \$8.00. She reminded all to continue to collect soup labels and gave instructions relative to collecting and cutting.

The **State Chaplain** reported 108 deaths since state conference and the mailing of sympathy cards to the families of departed members. Sixty-one birthday cards were sent to the 90 and greater members. A reminder was issued to send the multi-colored form to her as soon as possible after receipt of death notification in order that condolences may be expressed in a timely manner and members can be included in the Memorial Service.

The **State Recording Secretary** stated that work is underway on the 2004-2005 Proceedings, gave reporting information and asked that instructions disseminated at workshop be adhered to in the submission of reports.

The **State Corresponding Secretary** stated the Master Questionnaire for chapters is available at this meeting and must be picked up, completed and returned to her with a copy to the State Regent by February 1, 2005. She also stated that an electronic version of the Questionnaire is available upon request. She stressed the importance of keeping a copy for chapter records and stated the State Directory updates are also available for those who purchased Directories. Directories may be purchased for \$5.00 and Certificates of Award/Appreciation for fifteen cents per copy. She requested corrections of addresses, emails and telephone numbers of those individuals listed in the State Directory be sent to her.

The **State Organizing Secretary** extended congratulations to the newly organized Trahlyta Chapter and to Bonnie Pierce Bell, Organizing Regent. The Junior Membership Luncheon at Continental Congress will be Saturday, July 9, 12:00 - 2:00 p.m.

The **State Treasurer** reported the accounts of the Georgia State Society have been put on the "Quick Books for Non Profits" computer program and checking account funds have been placed in interest bearing accounts. She commended the Chapter Treasurers for their outstanding job in sending in correct transmittal forms with checks and clarified the conference registration fee increase from \$5.00 to \$10.00. The Summary of Funds was distributed. Total assets reported as of October 22, 2004 in the Georgia State Society's General Fund equal \$107,259.67, and Meadow Garden total assets equal \$436,876.35.

Rosemary Crow Hunter, **Finance Chairman**, reported the firm of Hargrave and Freeman, P.C. in Jonesboro, Georgia was accepted as auditor for the Georgia State Society for fiscal years 2004-2005 and 2005-2006. She stated it is the goal of our State Regent and this committee, to have the audit of the books completed in a timely manner in order to have the Proceedings printed and ready for distribution at the workshops in late August.

The **State Registrar** reported 102 new applications were verified at the October National Board of Management. She thanked chapters for sending in their yearbooks and stressed that in order to publish the *Membership Roll and Register of Ancestors of the Georgia State Society*; it is essential she have all Yearbooks with ancestors and supplementals.

The State Librarian and DAR Library Chairman reported eleven books have been donated and confirmed by the NSDAR Library with more known to be pending approval.

The **State Curator** reported that the State Society plans to replace the old Georgia flags with the purchase of three new ones to be placed at National, one at Kate Duncan Smith School, and one for the Georgia State Society and a new DAR Banner.

The **State Parliamentarian** reported that for the first time the National Parliamentarian has information on the national website pertaining to Bylaws. She encouraged all to print this information and follow the guidance.

Reports continued with Chairman responsible for special forms: Chapter Achievement, Barbara Bolen Florence stressed that all dues must be paid on time, old chapter achievement forms must be destroyed and only the new 2004-2005 forms may be used, the

official chapter membership count as of January 1, 2004 is found in the 2003-2004 Proceedings and the Chapter Treasurer as well as the Chapter Regent or Chapter Achievement Chairman must sign the form; Credentials, Mary Farthing Simonds reviewed the Credentials Form Instruction Sheet and official State Conference Credentials Form and discussed the delegate and alternate eligibility to State Conference stressing the credentials due date of February 1, 2005 with copies going to the State Credentials Chairman, State Regent and State Treasurer; Membership, Phyllis Fox Lawson gave tips for increasing membership and discussed the Membership contests; State Honor Roll, Ann Parker Parsons, reviewed the State Honor Roll form and emphasized the deadlines with particular emphasis on the dues deadline of December 1; Volunteer Information Specialist (VIS), Melodye G. Brown, announced a new members only website for the Georgia State Society and provided a handout listing Georgia State and National websites.

The State Regent continued with a roll call of other State Chairmen and Vice Chairmen: American Heritage, Quilters' S.O.S. (Save Our Stories), Jean Culpepper Goodson, stated the guilt must have been made by a DAR and does not have to be an original design, can be machine or hand stitched and the interview should be on a cassette tape and approximately 30 minutes; Art and Sculpture, Literature, Drama and Music, Mary Hill Lucik, stated that the entries in this category will go directly to National; Fiber Arts, Crafts, Cultural Events and Traditions, Jacqueline Fatherree Baker, stressed the importance of entering the contests and stated the deadline for this category is February 17, items should be sent no earlier than February 1; Historic Preservation, Amy Louise Jeeter Fountain, stated this category is to encourage the preservation, restoration and maintenance of historic property and to recognize a deserving person for the DAR Historic Preservation Medal Award: American History, Betty Brown Harrah, issued a reminder that the deadline for the American History and Christopher Columbus Essay Contests is December 15, to the District Vice Chairman, late entries will be disqualified: American Indians. Carolyn Baker Balog, stated November is National Native American Heritage Month and encouraged the writing of proclamations, an Indian minute at chapter meetings and support of the Summer Youth Camp for Native Americans; C.A.R. Debutantes, Robin Redfearn Towns, announced the requirements for presentation as a debutante at the 2005 State Conference and stated invitations would be sent to those expressing interest; Community Service Awards. Judith Lillard Hughes, stated all pertinent information is contained in her letter issued at workshop; DAR Magazine. Victoria Holley Richards, issued a reminder to send in co-op money by February 28 in order to participate in the 2005 advertisements; DAR Museum, Joyce McIntyre Chadwick, announced plans to have the DAR Museum Shop trunk show at State Conference thereby making available to members via mail order items found only in the national gift shop; DAR Museum Correspondent Docents, Louise Lockhart Henry, announced the availability of forms for becoming a Museum Corespondent Docent; DAR Service for Veterans. Patricia Patillo Mercer, called attention to the Master Questionnaire. Item #3, Women Veteran Project, and asked that all DAR member veterans please stand and be recognized; Indexing and Volunteers, Vicki Lancaster Cobb, reported a total of 22 members participating in indexing, and eight books completed this summer; Junior Membership, Ashley Redfearn Towns, requested everyone visit the Junior Shop and stated completed applications for the Outstanding Junior Contest must be postmarked by December 6.

The State Regent called for reports from State Chairmen of National Special Committees: **DAR Project Patriot**, Paula Hannah Osborne, stated Project Patriot continues to support the 5,200 crew members of the USS John C. Stennis, the new project has not yet been announced; **DAR Speakers Staff**, Gwendolyn Meredith Martin, explained the establishment of two Speakers Staffs, a National Speakers Staff and a State Speakers Staff and asked that those recommended please respond by November 12 along with their list of programs and choice of national or state staff or both; **Insignia**, Dorris Callahan Howell, requested all Regents appoint a chapter Insignia Chairman, and members be aware of the correct placement of insignia; **President General's Project**, Jean Cole Manker, outlined the various ways to support the President General's Project which is the digitization of

genealogical records and application papers; **Women's Issues**, Carole Richard Thompson, stated this committee encompasses family, health and career issues and requested each chapter to have at least one related program; **Resolutions**, Marilyn Herndon Vance, asked the First Vice Regent to take the chair while she read a resolution expressing appreciation to the State Regent, Shelby Alderman Whitson, for the gracious and efficient manner in which she transitioned the Georgia State Society into the new administration and for her adherence to traditions resulting in well planned and informative meetings. The resolution was adopted by a rising vote from the assembly. Mrs. Vance continued with the reading of a second resolution dedicating the seventh edition of the *Membership Roll and Register of Ancestors of the Georgia State Society*, to Shelby Aldlerman Whitson with love and appreciation for her many years of loyal service. Mrs. Vance presented three DAR School Per Capita Resolutions honoring the State Regent. Resolutions were adopted.

Mrs. Whitson resumed the chair and the remaining courtesy resolutions were read and adopted. (The resolutions are printed in their entirety at the conclusion of the State Conference minutes.)

The State Regent continued with the report of State Chairmen of State Standing Committees: Bylaws, Marjorie Young Garner, reported the Bylaws Committee met November 4, recommendations were considered and will be presented at State Conference; Cooperation of DAR with SAR and S.R., Jane Joyner Hampton, thanked those who participated in some way with SAR, she stressed the importance of using the instructions in the Regent's packet when typing and researching for their members; Coordinator of Districts, Robin Redfearn Towns, commended the hostess chapters of the four district workshops for a job well done and recognized and thanked the district directors for their efficiency and effectiveness in keeping the chapters informed and involved; Georgia State DAR Chorus, Ann Bell Ragan, requested all interested in singing in the chorus to register with her. The chorus will sing twice at State Conference including the Memorial Service; History of the Georgia State Society, Marie Derry De Lamar, requested Chairmen and Regents send reports for inclusion in the book, the publication date of which is undetermined at this time; Proceedings 2004-2005, Linda Overstreet Harvey, stressed reporting dates for submission of Regents and Chairmen reports to be sent to the State Recording Secretary; Travel Coordinator, Becky Miller Rostron, disseminated copies of information detailing a seven night trip to Continental Congress at a cost of \$798.00.

Mrs. Whitson continued with reports of State Chairmen of State Special Committees: NSDAR 50 Year Club, Laura Belle Wyatt Macrae, asked that she be advised of all 50 year members, particularly those who became 50 year members in 2004 and 2005; Press Book, Brenda Davison Jessel, expressed her appreciation to the 30 chapters that sent newspaper articles and requested submissions from the remaining chapters; State Information Help Desk, Jean Cole Manker, reported she had received 114 requests for information which were answered through e-mails, regular mail, phone calls and faxes; State Regent's Project, C. Martelia "Telia" Cunningham, stated Candle Pins are available for a \$10.00 donation to the State Regent's projects; Traditions and Policies, Carolyn Grant Hanf, reported revision of the manual is underway and should be ready by State Conference; Meadow Garden Museum, Camille Redfern Baxter, expressed thanks to attendees for their generous support of the Meadow Garden gift shop and exhibited new items.

The following Chairmen reported no committee activity but were available for questions: Americanism, Truth Ashby Gamblin, Conservation, Mary Johnson McGuffey, Flag of the United States of America, Melodye G. Following the Blessing by the State Chaplain, Mrs. Whitson recessed the meeting for lunch.

OPENING BANQUET - Friday, April 1, 2005

The Opening Banquet of the 107th State Conference of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, was held in the Cobb Ballroom, Atlanta Marriott Northwest Hotel, Marietta, at 6:00 p.m., Friday, April 1, 2005. Shelby Alderman Whitson, State Regent, presided. After a warm welcome from Mrs. Whitson, the Invocation was given by the State Chaplain, Sally McGlaun Baldwin.

- 1. To amend Article V. Nomination and Election of Officers, Section 3, by adding a new sentence to read "Independent candidates shall be listed on the ballot in a separate column from those candidates presented as a slate." Amendment adopted.
- 2. To amend Article VII. Meetings, Section 7, by inserting in the first sentence and the right to speak following "privilege of the floor" and by adding at the end of the sentence and State Vice Chairmen. The first sentence of Section 7 will read: "At the opening of the annual State Conference the privilege of the floor and the right to speak shall be accorded to the State Chairmen and State Vice Chairmen..." Amendment adopted.
- 3. To amend Article VIII. State Board of Management, Section 5, by adding and the right to speak following "privilege of the floor." Section 5 then will read: State Chairmen, Vice Chairmen, Committee members of the National and Standing Committees and one (1) member from each chapter shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privilege of the floor and the right to speak, but may not vote." Amendment adopted.
- 4. To amend Article X. Finances. Section 2, by striking "\$7.00" and adding ten dollars (\$10.00.) Section 2 will read "The annual dues of chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be ten dollars (\$10.00) for each member of the chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1." Amendment adopted.
- 5. To Amend Article X. Finances. Section 3(a), by inserting of ten dollars (\$10.00) after "conference registration fee" and striking the last sentence. Section 3(a) will read: "Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the state dues, a conference registration fee of ten dollars (\$10.00) for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under these Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether Chapter is represented or not." Amendment adopted.
- 6. To amend Article X. Finances. Section 3(b), by inserting of ten dollars (\$10.00) after conference fee and by striking the second sentence. Section 3(b) will read: "State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay a conference fee of ten dollars (\$10.00) at the time or registration.." Amendment adopted.
- 7. To amend Article X. Finances. Section 3(c) by inserting of seven dollars (\$7.00) after "conference fee" and by striking the second sentence. Section 3(c) will read: "Other

members of the Georgia State Society who are not duly elected voters for their respective chapters shall pay a conference fee of seven dollars (\$7.00) at the time of registration." Amendment adopted.

- 8. To amend Article X. Finances. Section 4(d), by <u>striking "May 15"</u> and inserting <u>July 15.</u> <u>Section 4(d) will read</u>: "The accounts of the State Treasurer shall be annually prepared for audit by a Certified Public Accountant immediately following the end of the State Society fiscal year and no later than <u>July 15</u> and delivered to the CPA by that date." Amendment adopted.
- 9. To amend Article X. Finances. Section 5(a), by striking "Four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00) and inserting Five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00.) Section 5(a) will read: "Five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) shall be taken each year to defray her necessary travel expenses." Amendment adopted.
- 10. Add to Article XI a new section 1 and renumber the remaining sections. <u>Section 1 will read</u>: "The Honorary State Regents of the Georgia State Society of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution shall Function as an advisory committee to the State Regent and to the Georgia State Society." Amendment adopted.
- 11. To amend Article XI. Committees. Section 1(b), by adding who shall not be an Honorary State Regent, nor a state officer nor a chapter regent, after "one (1) active chapter member." The first sentence of Section 1(b) will read: Finance: This committee shall be composed of seven (7) members to include the State First Vice Regent, one (1) active Chapter Regent and one (1) active chapter member who shall not be an Honorary State Regent, nor a state officer, nor a chapter regent." Amendment adopted.
- 12. To amend Article XIII. Meadow Garden Museum. (b), by inserting two (2) Honorary State Regents after "state treasurer". Section (b) will read: "The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the following members: the State Regent who shall serve as Chairman; the State First Vice Regent, who shall Serve as Secretary; the Chairman of Meadow Garden; the Regents of the Augusta and College Hill Chapters; the State Treasurer; two (2) Honorary State Regents; and the chairmen of the five (5) subcommittees appointed by The State Regent Docents, Furnishings, Landscaping, Museum Shop and Patrons." Amendment adopted.

How exciting it is for me to spotlight the work of the 102 Georgia Chapters who contributed in some form toward DAR Library activities! Eight hundred sixty-seven books valued at more than \$6885 were donated to local hospitals and libraries with 342 of these being genealogical or historical publications. One Chapter donated bookcases and a typewriter to its library, and the American Spirit magazine continues to be a popular gift to offices and libraries across the state. Special recognition shines on Garland Crowe DuPree of the Nathaniel Abney Chapter who donated her 136 volume personal genealogical and historical references values at \$3600 to her county library. Fifteen volumes of acceptable references and periodicals were donated to the NSDAR Library in Washington; \$579 was provided

directly to the Library, and \$1560 donated through Friends of the Library. The State's Library Fund and Georgia Bookplates netted \$655. Georgia Daughters provided 416.5 hours of library service, 882 books/periodicals, and a bottom-line financial contribution in books, goods and donations of \$10,999. Madam State Regent, the candle of service that burns so brightly in your heart also shines in the DAR Library through Georgia's dedicated and generous Daughters. I thank them and you for the privilege of serving you both as State Librarian.

NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This summary of significant accounting policies of the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution is presented to assist in understanding the Organization's financial statements. The financial statements and notes are representations of the Organization's management who is responsible for their integrity and objectivity.

A. BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The financial statements of the Organization have been prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting. Accordingly, revenue is recorded when received rather than when earned and expenses are recorded when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred.

B. BASIS OF PRESENTATION

Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board in its Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations. Under SFAS No. 117, the Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets.

C. CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

For purposes of the Statements of Cash Flows, the Organization considers all highly liquid investments with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

D. COLLECTIONS

Collection items acquired either through purchase or donation are not capitalized. Purchases of collection items are recorded as decreases in unrestricted net assets if purchased with unrestricted assets and as decreases in temporarily restricted or permanently restricted net assets if purchased with donor-restricted assets. Contributions of collection items are not recognized in the Statement of Activities. Proceeds from deaccessions or insurance recoveries are reflected on the statement of activities based on the absence or existence and nature of donor-imposed restrictions.

E. DONATED SERVICES

No amounts have been reflected in the financial statements for donated services. The Organization generally pays for services requiring specific expertise. However, many individuals volunteer their time and perform a variety of tasks that assist the Organization with specific assistance programs, campaign solicitations, and various committee assignments. No amounts have been reflected in the financial statements, as the fair value of those services is not susceptible to objective valuation or measurement.

F. INCOME TAX STATUS

The Organization is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code. However, income from activities not directly related to the Organization's tax-exempt purpose is subject to taxation as unrelated business income. In addition, the Organization qualifies for the charitable contribution deduction under Section 170 (b) (1) (A) and has been classified as an organization other than a private foundation under Section 509 (a) (2).

G. NATURE OF ACTIVITIES

The Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution carries out programs designed for education, public awareness and preservation of the history and heritage of the United States of America.

H. PROPERTY AND EQUIPMENT

The Organization follows the policy of not capitalizing collections and historical treasures. Meadow Garden and its contents are historical treasures. The house and its contents are insured for approximately \$ 325,000. Office furniture and fixtures are insured for \$ 8,000. Major preservation or restoration projects are capitalized and depreciated over an estimated useful life of fifteen years. Additions and betterments of \$ 750 or more are capitalized, while maintenance and repairs that do not improve or extend the useful lives of the respective assets are expensed currently.

NOTE 2: CERTIFICATES OF DEPOSIT

Certificates of deposit totaling \$ 357,472 are included in cash in the accompanying financial statements. The certificates bear interest ranging from 2.43% to 3.47% and have maturities ranging from five to eighteen months, with penalties for early withdrawal. Any penalties for early withdrawal would not have a material effect on the financial statements.

NOTE 3: CONCENTRATIONS OF CREDIT RISK

The Organization maintains cash balances at several financial institutions located in Georgia. Accounts at each institution are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation up to\$ 100.000. At June 30, 2005, there are no uninsured cash balances.

NOTE 4: CONSTRUCTION IN PROGRESS

Construction in progress consists of a new building on the property of Meadow Garden in Augusta Georgia. The building will be used for educational purposes as well as meetings. It is expected to be completed in the fall of 2005.

National Committee Reports

AMERICAN HERITAGE - Martha Middlebrooks Knight

Seventy-six chapters reported programs, projects and contest entries this year. Twentyeight chapters assisted financially or physically with the restoration or preservation of homes, buildings such as a jail and a courthouse, cemeteries, a World War I monument as well as the Star Spangled Banner. Two chapters, Fort Frederica and Nathaniel Macon, presented Historic Preservation Medals. Captain Thomas Cobb Chapter has two members whose homes are on the National Historic Registry. Fifty-nine chapters had programs on cultural events and traditions. Christmas and Thanksqiving traditions, toys and music were especially popular this year. Several chapters had programs on Native Americans and Scots-Irish traditions. Some chapters attended festivals where various crafts were demonstrated and displayed. Nine Georgia daughters from five chapters submitted entries for the Quilter's S.O.S.: - Save Our Stories project. Other contest entries included one cultural events and traditions binder, one clay craft project, one floral arrangement, an oil painting and three fiber arts entries including cross stitch, crochet and a guilt wall hanging. One chapter entered a binder in the outstanding American Heritage chapter in Georgia, (1) presented a program in the best program contest and (2) poems and (1) short story were entered in the Literature and Drama category.

AMERICAN HISTORY - Betty Brown Harrah

Chapter reports received from 105 chapters. American History Programs presented at 303 meetings; 201 programs in American History given to other groups. Outstanding women in America were the topics of 59 programs. Four chapters selected women for national project Outstanding Women in American History. Total displays 150: 81 in schools; 69 in other public places. American History Publicity included 205 spot announcements; 114 TV/radio minutes. Press inches including photographs totaled 2482. The essay American History Essay Contest, "Along the Trail with Lewis and Clark and the Corps of Discovery, May 1804 – September 1806" was conducted by 60 chapters in 220 schools with 4331 students participating. Certificates given for participation 2865, Certificates of Award presented 276; bronze medals awarded 125. Christopher Columbus essay contest had 361 students participating in 58 high schools with 116 Certificates of Award given. Certificates given for outstanding work in American History totaled 105, including 41 bronze medals and 18 silver medals. I greatly commend my Vice Chairman Committee, Nancy Gaston, Nancy Bowen, Sandra Keadle and Julia Spivey for their great work with the chapters. It has been an honor to serve our State Regent on this committee.

AMERICAN INDIANS - Carolyn Baker Balog

One hundred two chapters reported contributions of 6,666 Campbell's Soup labels, 1,450 Betty Crocker points, and two pounds of drink can tabs. Thirty-seven chapters held programs on American Indians, and 41 observed an "Indian Minute" in each chapter meeting. In the November observance of American Indian Heritage Month two chapters obtained a proclamation, one chairman's letter to the editor was published in a local newspaper, and one chapter placed a display in a local school. Daughters attended the unveiling of a Historical Marker commemorating the "Battle of the Blankets," collected money to erect a monument to Mary Musgrove, and visited the Cherokee National Museum and the new Smithsonian Native American Center in Washington, DC. One thousand eight hundred twenty-three dollars was donated to the American Indian Scholarship Fund, and the Friends of the American Indians. One thousand eight hundred fifty dollars and fifty cents was donated to the general and scholarship funds of Bacone College and Chemewa Indian School, Other donations went to the St. Labre Indian School, St Joseph's Indian School, and the Southwest Indian Foundation. Dorm and personal item, school supplies, Christmas and January gifts, and thrift were sent, Support for the American Indian Youth Camp was designated in the amount of \$905.00. Daughters assisted a Cherokee woman with genealogical research, another researched Pine Log Village with descendants of the area back to 1540. Daughters attended American Indian gatherings, volunteered to work at American Indian Museums, and with local historical societies making and interpreting American Indian displays, and helped with preservation and restoration of sites pertinent to American Indians in Georgia. Madam State Regent, it has been an honor to have served you and the Georgia State Society for the past year.

AMERICANISM - Truth Ashby Gamblin

One hundred five chapters reported representing 6,765 members. Seventeen chapters used the Internet to access the DAR Manuel for Citizenship 49 times. Eight chapters referred naturalization applicants to the Manuel on-line. Patriotic materials were distributed to naturalization applicants: 423 Flags of the United States of America; 27 United States Flag pins; 58 bookmarks; 493 copies of the American's Creed; 831 copies of the Pledge to the Flag of the United States of America. Twenty nine members in seven chapters participated in ten naturalization ceremonies. Three chapters recommended an applicant to receive the DAR Medal of Honor. The Lt. James Monroe Chapter presented the Medal of Honor to Daniel Stewart, Forsyth. The other two medals are pending approval. No recommendations for the Americanism Medal were received. Thirty-one chapters have an Americanism chairman and 24 of them informed the chapter of this committee's objectives. Forty-two chapters participated in troop support activities or pep rallies. Twenty-six chapters participated in military send off/welcome home events. Sixty-five chapters participated in community events/celebrations. Thirty-seven chapters participated in parades.

CHAPTER ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS - Barbara Bolen Florence

Georgia had 100% reporting in Chapter Achievement. Many chapters are working harder and that makes the Georgia State Society stronger. Chapters receiving Level 1 - 62, Level 2 - 36, Level 3 - 6. The chapters winning monetary awards are: Chapters 0-50 members: from 1st to 5th place: Fayette-Starr's Mill, Tallassee, Lt. James Monroe, Trahlyta, and Edmund Burke. Chapters 51-100: Philadelphia Winn, General Daniel Newnan, Colonel John McIntosh, Augusta, and Nathaniel Macon. Chapters 101-150: Xavier, Mary Hammond Washington, Fort Frederica, Thronateeska and Baron DeKalb. Chapters 151-200: Augustin Clayton, Joseph Habersham, Fort Peachtree, Martha Stewart Bulloch and Elijah Clarke. Chapter with the most points: Augustin Clayton, 2150 points. This year Georgia had five chapters with over 1000 points. They are: Martha Stewart Bulloch – 1008, Fort Peachtree – 1133, Philadelphia Winn – 1157, Joseph Habersham – 1288, Augustin Clayton – 2150.

CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION - Frances Charlene Hall

The Georgia State C.A.R. Society saw a net gain in membership of 56 for 2004. This is tremendously significant for our State Society as it reveals a growing interest in the Children of the American Revolution. With new societies scattered from the highest mountains in the north, to the coastal shores, from the western rivers region, to the Atlanta to Savannah highway, our Society is increasing. New faces, new members, new seniors, all make for one exciting time in Georgia. Other Georgia societies are breathing fresh air - C.A.R. enthusiasm - as great senior leaders and new members come into their groups. Xavier, Fort Frederica, Bonaventure, Martha Stewart Bulloch, William Marsh, and General Daniel Newnan DAR Chapters are to be commended for their sponsorship of new organizing Societies during the past year. Augustin Clayton Chapter receives this year's award for the most financial contributions to the State Society, and Nancy Hart Chapter receives the award for the best overall support of a C.A.R. Society. Georgia C.A.R.s supported State President, Martha Charlotte Lincoln, in raising over \$3,000 for event seating at The National Museum of Patriotism. This new Museum located in Atlanta, Georgia, was also the site of our Government Studies Seminar in October. Another well attended event was our State Society's sixty-sixth annual State Conference held in February at the historic Partridge Inn in Augusta. A highlight of the conference was the dedication ceremony of the porch chairs at Meadow Garden, a previous C.A.R. State Project. Honored guests including, the DAR State Regent, and the first joint C.A.R. – SAR Color Guard made this a very special event. The Georgia State Society looks forward to another outstanding year in C.A.R. – DAR cooperation in 2005-2006.

COMMUNITY SERVICE - Judith Lillard Hughes

The Community Service Award not only recognizes worthy citizens in our communities, but it gives each chapter an opportunity for publicity. The state outstanding recipient of the Community Service Award was submitted by the Fort Peachtree Chapter. You may read about this presentation in the Jan/Feb 2005 national newsletter on page 17. Seventeen chapters sent applications for the Community Service Award which this chairman forwarded to the Southeastern Division National Vice Chairman for approval. Four Chapters sent two each. Those submitting are: Archibald Bulloch, Augustin Clayton (2), Baron DeKalb, Cherokee, Council of Safety, Fayette-Starr's Mill, Fort Peachtree (2) Fort Frederica (2), James Stewart, John Benson (2), Knox-Conway, Lt. James Monroe, Martha Stewart Bulloch, Nancy Hart, Sunbury, William McIntosh, and Xavier. A total of 21 entries were sent from Georgia. I quote from a letter just received from the National Chairman: "The chapter regent or chairman should verify that the proposed recipient received no salary. reimbursement or other financial reward for the service provided." Processing now takes six to eight weeks, not four to six. Thank you Madam State Regent for the opportunity to serve on a committee in which this chairman could learn of the many worthy Georgia volunteer citizens.

CONSERVATION - Mary Johnson McGuffey

Sixty-five chapters were very busy this year with conservation projects in many areas of their communities. One chapter organized and coordinated the county- wide "Great American Cleanup". Beautification of roadways, schools, libraries, cemeteries, parks and riverbanks was enhanced by tree planting or trash removal. Programs were given by local Forest Service, DNR or State Park personnel to keep members current on local conservation issues. Many chapters are working on Wildlife Backyard Habitats. Arbor Day was celebrated by 23 chapters. General Daniel Newnan Chapter submitted the most outstanding report. Edmund Burke Chapter received the second best report award. Three Conservation Medals were Awarded.

CONSTITUTION WEEK - Ruth Odom Reddick

It was with appreciation and interest that this chairman read eighty-two chapter reports listing varied Constitution Week activities. Sixty-nine proclamations were obtained from local officials; 235 bells pealed out across Georgia; 208 Constitution Week displays were Placed in schools, libraries, churches and public buildings; 54 church bulletins included announcements, and publicity totaled 864 inches. Thirty-six chapters reported special commemorative programs and events. Especially notable was the educational work reported. Chapters donated books; visited schools; distributed teaching packets and bookmarks, and sponsored Constitution signings. One chapter sponsored and funded costuming for a dramatic production. Reenactment of the Signing of the Constitution. presented by elementary students. A Proclamation signed by Governor Sonny Perdue was presented at the Annual Constitution Week Luncheon. Despite the September storms which caused power outage, an excellent speaker, Mr. David Carmichael, Director of the Georgia Archives, the participation of the GASSAR Color Guard and the presence of the National Chairman, Rosemary Crow Hunter, made this a memorable occasion Madam State Regent, Dorris Howell, Jane Hampton, Eunice Carr, Mary Kate Tribble and I wish to thank you for the opportunity to serve on this committee.

DAR GOOD CITIZENS - Therry Nash Deal

One hundred six chapters filed reports. Seventy-three chapters (66.3% of the chapters in

our state) participated in the Good Citizens Award program. Over 200 high schools participated with awards given to 219 seniors. Nineteen of these schools were first time school participants. One hundred fifty-eight of these awardees entered the essay contest. Each of the four districts selected a winner. The state winner is Kathy May Tran sponsored by the Sukey Hart Chapter. Participating chapters presented the pin, certificate, wallet card set. Several chapters presented monetary gifts. Many chapters honored winners at teas, luncheons and assemblies. The most schools sponsored were 21 by Baron DeKalb. George Walton and Oglethorpe cooperated to present a \$1,000 scholarship to their high school winner. Total dollar amount invested throughout the state was \$8,418.00. Our four district vice chairmen, Susan Lenaeus, Carol Ann Morrison, Mary Jon Shubert and Constance Page are jewels. It is a joy to work with outstanding vice-chairmen and chapter chairmen. Serving youth helps to implement the ideals of our Society; we appreciate the opportunity for service.

DAR MAGAZINE - Victoria Wren Richards

We are pleased that 106 chapters have submitted DAR Magazine reports. Ninety-three of reporting Chapter Regents are subscribers. Fifty-seven chapters fulfilled the Chapter Achievement Award requirements of 25% member subscribers. Sixty-seven percent of reporting chapters use information from magazine as chapter program material and 70% use the American Spirit Magazine to promote DAR to prospective members. Ninety-six percent of reporting chapters read the President General's Message from the Daughters Newsletter at chapter meetings. Seventy-eight chapters received Chapter Achievement by participating in the Georgia co-op ad: five black and white pages in the November/December 2004 issue of the DAR Newsletter. These pages honored the 2004 State Officers; Honorary State Regents; State Conference Pages; dedication of building at Meadow Garden and Georgia's 2004 Outstanding Junior. Chapters reported seven Georgia Daughters have contributed to the Friends of the Magazine Fund. Thank you, Madam State Regent for the honor of serving you and The Georgia State Society.

DAR MUSEUM - Joyce McIntyre Chadwick

Georgia Daughters in 79 chapters contributed \$2,470.00 to assist the Museum in acquisition of new objects, as well as the conservation of existing items in the Museum's outstanding collection. Museum programs were given around the state by both chapters and Museum Correspondent Docents. The Correspondent Docents provided slide presentations on the DAR Museum and Period Rooms, as well as "Toys In the Attic," and "In Step with Time." One chapter reported having a Christmas program on "Historical Dolls." Another chapter reported Having the DAR Trunk show and sale. We encourage each chapter to utilize our 34 Museum Correspondent Docents when planning next Year's programs. A very special thanks to our Georgia State Room Advisor and Honorary State Regent, Mrs. Herman M. Richardson, who over the years has provided invaluable assistance. Also, a special thanks to Vice-Chairman, NSDAR Museum Correspondent docents, Mrs. John R. Henry. Thank you Madam State Regent for this opportunity to serve the State Society as the DAR Museum Chairman under your capable leadership.

DAR SCHOLARSHIP - Dianne Brown Cannestra

Reports from 106 chapters indicated that 54 chapters are involved in scholarship programs. Forty-four chapters gave a total of \$7,476.20 to National scholarship funds. Chapter scholarships awarded to 37 recipients statewide totaled \$24,000. Two American History Scholarships were judged at the State Level. The winner, Craig Atkinson, sponsored by the Oothcaloga Chapter, was forwarded to the Division Vice President for judging at the next level. The Oliver Morton Chapter awarded ten \$,1000 scholarships to students from Jones County. Council Of Safety awarded two \$1,000 scholarships to high school seniors. John Benson awarded two scholarships totaling \$1,500. Colonel John McIntosh awarded three \$500 scholarships to DAR Good Citizen Award Winners. Savannah, Martha Stewart Bulloch and Augustin Clayton each awarded \$1,000 in scholarships. John Laurens gave

one student a \$750 scholarship. Thomasville, Philadelphia Winn, Old Unicoi Trail, Oglethorpe, George Walton, Fort Frederica, and Etowah each awarded \$500 scholarships. John Houstoun awarded \$400 to a graduating high school senior. General Daniel Newnan awarded a \$300 scholarship. General James Jackson, Abraham Baldwin and Brunswick each awarded a \$250 scholarship. William Witcher, Nathaniel Abney, and Commodore Oliver Bowen each awarded \$100 in Scholarships. Eighty-two chapters reported having a DAR School program, with six programs given by this Chairman. Monetary contributions to all DAR Schools totaled \$75,816.40. Berry

College \$3,222.50, Crossnore \$5,494, Hillside \$3,994, Hindman Settlement, \$2.556. Kate Duncan Smith \$7,080.67, Tamassee \$21,260 plus \$32,208.63 (sent direct) for a total of \$53,468.63. Donations to State Regent's Project at: Kate Duncan Smith DAR School \$3,328,17 toward the renovation of the High School Library, at Tamassee DAR School \$10.579.00 added to the May Irwin Talmadge Auditorium Gymnasium Endowment Fund, and Berry College \$1,513.50 toward the purchase of 200 new hymnals for the chapel. Friends of the DAR Schools \$3,039. Nineteen "Butterfly" pins were sold with monies going to National for DAR Schools. Total labels to schools 46,539; total stamps 1,113; total thrift 30,625. The Hightower DAR School award was presented to 60 chapters with Philadelphia Winn and Brunswick chapters receiving the award for Greatest Monetary Donation Per Capita to the State Projects at KDS and Tamassee DAR Schools. Each representative brought greetings from their school. Dr. Mike Mullins, Hindman Settlement School, was unable to attend because of illness. Thank you Madam State Regent, for the honor of serving you, our State Society, and the DAR Schools.

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERANS - Pat Patillo Mercer

Eighty-one chapters responded to the call to remember those who have rung the "Bell of Freedom" by giving of their time and gifts at VAMC's, local nursing homes, military hospitals, and outpatient clinics. Three-hundred sixty-one Daughters volunteered 3,319 hours, traveled 13,672 miles. Chapter members contributed \$7,955.08 in cash and \$25,518.14 in non-cash items. Some 119 youth volunteers contributed 331 hours. Two contributions were made to the Women's Veteran Project. Georgia Daughters were involved in many activitites honoring our veterans and our current men and women on active duty. Eight chapters will receive Certificates for Outstanding Service to Veterans at State Conference. Certificates of Appreciation will be presented to all chapters for their generous contributions to our service to veterans. It has been a pleasure to serve the society as VAVS Chairman.

VETERANS HISTORY PROJECT - Martha Hammonds Brown

Georgia Daughters continue to interview and record our veteran's valuable histories. Eighteen women veterans and 46 male veterans were Interviewed by DAR members assisted by 14 youth volunteers for the Veterans History Project. Some 241 hours were spent interviewing and recording our veteran's histories. This is a most valuable project and we urge all chapters to continue to interview and record our veteran's histories. Thank you for the privilege of serving the society in this way.

FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA - Melodye G. Brown

Georgia Daughters in 105 chapters reported efforts to honor the American Flag. Flags presented included 94 large, 1176 small, 223 table, and 10 Braille. Flag materials distributed included 2900 Flag Codes, 54 Flag certificates, 670 Flag pins, and 1383 pieces of other Flag literature. All 105 chapters reported reciting the Pledge of Allegiance at meetings; 74 chapters presented "Flag facts," and 99 chapters encouraged others to fly the Flag. Thirty chapters involved youth in Junior ROTC, Scouting, church and school groups in Flag activities. Thirty chapters hosted Flag events, such as Flag Day luncheons or Flag programs. Nine chapters sponsored Flag Retirement Ceremonies. Awards go to Benjamin Hawkins, Brier Creek, John Laurens, and Tomochichi Chapters for holding Flag Retirement Ceremonies involving youth. Best Report goes to Brier Creek. Awards go to Commodore

Richard Dale and Thronateeska Chapters for holding Flag Retirement Ceremonies involving other chapters and SAR. The award for Outstanding Chapter Flag Project goes to Augustin Clayton. They obtained an old library book return bin, which they refurbished and placed at the local VFW. It will now be used as a community receptacle for worn Flags awaiting proper Retirement

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS - Linda Moore Hallman

This year eleven chapter contributed a total of 2,908 pages of new genealogical source records in three volumes to the DAR Genealogical Library, and the same amount each to the Georgia Archives, Washington Memorial Library in Macon, and Georgia Historical Society in Savannah - making a grand total of 7,308. Two books were written by members and were donated to the DAR Library. Chapters with the most pages were: 1st Mary Hammond Washington, 2nd Martha Stewart Bullock and 3rd General Daniel Newnan. Members contributing the most pages were 1st. Mary Daniel Matthews Haas, 2nd Margaret House Gunning 3rd Larealia Camp and 4th Stephanie Whitney. Additional certificates have been awarded by category to the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and Honorable Mentions winners. Chapters winning first class by category: 0-50, Etowah, 51-100, General Daniel Newnan, 101-150, Mary Hammond Washington. Members winning first place by category: 0-50, Kathryn London Stirk, Etowah; 51-100, Larealia Camp, General Daniel Newnan. 101-200, Mary Daniel Matthews Haas. ceremonies. This project demonstrates excellence in community service and public relations

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS - Indexing - Vicki Lancaster Cobb

This has been a great year for indexing and volunteering in Georgia. Ten daughters from eight chapters have joined the ranks of approximately eighteen other daughters who are actively participating in the President General's Every-Name Index of GRC volumes utilizing the Sky Index. The group has indexed 35 plus books with over 170,000 entries. The top indexer goes to Jean Cole Manker for indexing more than 50,000 entries. Sunni Winkler has indexed five books and Priscilla Doster has earned her Bookworm Pin. Thanks to the many other Daughters who have contributed. This vice-chairman thanks the State Regent for the opportunity of working with this most worth while project.

JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS - Billie Jean Goodwin

Junior American Citizens (JAC) participation throughout Georgia this year was outstanding. Nine Chapters went into their communities in an effort to promote good citizenship, history and patriotism utilizing the national theme, "Patriots in Pinafores - America's Amazing Women". Our theme this year emphasized studying the incredible scope of contributions to American life and culture by women. Our nine chapters, Abraham Baldwin, Benjamin Hawkins, Col. William Candler, John Benson, Lt. James Monroe, Nancy Hart, Philadelphia Winn, Robert Loughridge, Sergeant Newton, Stephen Heard, Sweetwater, and Thomasville, partnered with 11 schools or youth groups, seven of which were first time participants. School participation consisted of 102 classrooms. Our Georgia JAC work this year involved 1,401 students, kindergarten through twelfth grade. Chapters reported receiving 280 Art Contest entries, 15 Creative Expression Contest entries, and two Community Service Contest entries with participation by 395 students. This chairman received 52 contest entries. Winners in each category and level were forwarded to the region for judging. Our nine chapters sponsored six JAC Clubs which were comprised of 109 members. JAC items donated consisted of 177 Member Pins, 177 Membership Cards, 10 Handbooks, 128 Flags, 10 Fact Sheets and 100 Contest Citation Cards. In addition, two chapters presented the Thatcher Award to an adult who had shown outstanding leadership, dedication and service to the JAC Program. Thank you for the opportunity to serve the Georgia State Society, NSDAR.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP - Ashley Towns Carter

The Junior Membership of Georgia has been busy throughout the year with DAR. One hundred four chapters reported having junior members serve in many capacities within DAR. There are eight chapters with outstanding juniors and eight chapters that sold Innisbrook Wrap. Georgia has junior members working as doctors, pharmacists, lawyers,

teachers, real estate agents, sales managers and many other professions. Junior members give their time to DAR as chapter chairmen (43), chapter officers (22), chapter regents (3), state vice chairmen (1), state chairmen (4) state officers (1), and national vice chairmen (1). Georgia supported Junior Membership and the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund through the purchase of Innisbrook Wraps and buying items from the Junior Shoppe. Junior members also served DAR as state pages and national pages. This committee consists of this state chairman, Lynn Snowden Dorney, Vice Chairman of Sales and Rebekah Lee Wysong, Vice Chairman of Contests. This State Chairman attended one summer workshop and the State Board of Management and looks forward to serving another exciting year under this administration. Thank you for allowing me to serve as the Georgia State Chairman of Junior Membership.

LINEAGE RESEARCH - Joan Ketterbaugh Childres

In accordance with the chapters reporting to this chairman on Lineage Research 2004-2005 Report, a total of 49 chapter members are Lineage Research Lookup Volunteers. Thirty workshops were sponsored by chapters with a total of 47 new applications received as a result of workshops. Twenty-six of the applicants already have become DAR members as of reporting date. A total monetary amount of \$743.00 was donated to Friends of Lineage Research. If any member is interested in becoming a Lineage Research Lookup Volunteer, forms were given to chapter regents in the Regent's Packets.

MEMBERSHIP - Phyllis Fox Lawson

The Augustin Clayton Chapter was awarded the traveling Silver Bowl for gaining most (39) new members by application. A separate listing of awards is in the Proceedings. Georgia gained 425 new members, 81 of whom are juniors. Our Vice-Chairman of Membership (Prospective Members) Violette Denney, her District Vice-Chairmen, Marcia Gayle Sweatmon, Barbara Jean McCay, Ann Scott Williams, and Glenda Henry Carter sent 275 referrals from National to chapters over the state resulting in 50 of these prospects joining the Georgia Society. State Chapters are having new member orientations; genealogy workshops; short, informational meetings; night meetings; and booths at community events. Five Georgia Daughters entered National's photo contest and seven Daughters entered the essay contest. A criterion for earning the Member for Member pin has changed effective December 11, 2004: both the member submitting the proposal and a member assisting with the research and completion of the prospective member's application paper may receive credit regardless of the chapter which the applicant joins or if she applies as Member-at-Large.

NATIONAL DEFENSE - Phyllis Johnson Tanner

Georgia Daughters continue to be active in promoting National Defense. Of the 106 chapters reporting, 99 had three minute reports on National Defense issues and 50 had full programs, including one given by this chairman. Forty-nine chapters distributed information to their members and 11 to the general public. Fifty chapters presented 237 Good Citizenship Medals. Sixty-eight chapters presented 150 Bronze JROTC medals; fifteen chapters awarded 18 Gold ROTC medals; and one ceremony was videotaped and shown on local television. Eighty-seven chapters contributed a total of \$277.00 to the NSDAR ROTC Award Program. Two daughters submitted National Defense articles; one was published in the National Defender. Chapters sent cards, letters, and packages to active duty military personnel. Voices were sold on a quilt with \$450 donated to area ROTC programs. State Chairman Awards: Greatest number of Good Citizenship Medals: Etowah and Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapters; Greatest number of ROTC medals; Baron Dekalb and Fielding Lewis Chapters; Articles submitted: Beatrice Hite, Joseph Habersham Chapter, and Jane Hampton, Lt. James Monroe Chapter; Outstanding Contribution to ROTC Programs: Knox-Conway Chapter. Madame State Regent, it is a privilege to serve you and the State Society as chairman of this committee.

PROGRAM - Denise Beall Fritze

The State DAR Yearbook Committee was reinstated this year by National for participation by all states. Only 15 Georgia chapters submitted yearbooks or supplements to this

chairman for consideration in the contest. This is a low percentage of the total number of chapters in our state and this chairman challenges chapters to submit their yearbook in 2005-2006. All entries were excellent and interesting to read. Many included histories of the chapter. Some were bound in 3-ring binders, while others were printed with glossy covers. No matter how fancy or how plain, all contained the necessary information required by State and National for the contest, making the judging quite difficult. Winners are as follows: Members under 50: 1st place – Gov. David Emanuel, 2nd place- Col. John McIntosh, 3rd place tie- Nathaniel Abney & Col. William Candler; Members 50-100: 1st place- Sgt. Newton, 2nd place- Augusta, 3rd place- Nathaniel Macon; Members over 100: 1st place Martha Stewart Bulloch, 2nd place tie Elijah Clarke & Savannah, 3rd place- John Benson. Madame State Regent, it has been a privilege to serve the society in this chairmanship.

PUBLIC RELATIONS – MOTION PICTURE, RADIO AND TELEVISION – Donna King One hundred and four chapters submitted a publicity report to this chairman. Many chapters were successful in telling the DAR story through 1158 newspaper articles with 443 photos. These chapters had 179 radio spots and thirty-one television spots. Forty-eight chapters produced informative newsletters, and eleven chapters produced fact sheets or brochures. All mediums of publicity were used very effectively to promote and educate the public about the educational, patriotic and historical goals of our society. Chapters reported the many activities that keep the importance of the society before the public's eye. Many chapters volunteered at schools, libraries, hospitals, and nursing homes, and presented DAR awards in the various categories. The work of the society must be told, and this chairman is pleased and honored to serve in the capacity of state publicity chairman. I extend sincere appreciation to the State Regent for the opportunity to serve the State Society and to the many chapters who helped tell the DAR story.

SEIMES TECHNOLOGY CENTER - Danette Flynn Wren No Report

VOLUNTEER INFORMATION SPECIALISTS - Melodye G. Brown

VIS activities were reported by 104 chapters. All Georgia chapters have websites, with the exception of Trahlyta Chapter, which has a website under construction. Twenty-nine chapters received prospective member contacts through their websites, resulting in 28 new members already approved, and 33 applications pending. Fifty-one prospective members attended meetings as a result of website contact. Use of e-Membership continues to grow with 67 Regents, 53 Treasurers, and 69 Registrars using these tools. A total of 1,598 members used computers for chapter activities, 501 for state activities, and 447 for National activities. The award for Best use of Chapter website to Promote Membership goes to Fort Peachtree. They reported the most new members from website contacts with 6 new members, and three applications pending, for a total of nine. Outstanding Chapter VIS Project goes to Etowah Chapter for creating an Excel spreadsheet index for information in three volumes of Chapter applications, past and current. VIS Volunteer Award goes to Elaine Lester, Bonaventure Chapter, for outstanding work in Genealogy Preservation Project, Elaine was also invaluable in preserving and transferring the chapter website files to this Chairman. National Special Committee Reports

CHAPTER DEVELOPMENT

CHAPTER REVITALIZATION - Phyllis Fox Lawson

Chapter Health Assessment forms were distributed by the State Organizing Secretary to all

attendees at our District Workshops. Both the State Organizing Secretary and I were available to chapters across the State for programs and/or support. General Josiah Tattnall Chapter was awarded the "Small Chapter Revitalization Growth Award." The "Chapter Revitalization Growth Award" went to Edmund Burke Chapter.

COMMEMORATIVE EVENTS - Susan Austin Fitzgerald

This Chairman received 104 chapter reports, with 74 chapters indicating active involvement in commemorating historic and patriotic events. Five chapters had members participate in the National Parade, while fifty-two chapters participated in a local parade or celebration on July 4, 2004. Twenty-three chapters had programs on the Lewis and Clark Expedition, two chapters planned a field trip in conjunction with the L&C anniversary, and five have chapter members with an ancestor on the original L&C expedition. Ten members purchased the new L&C commemorative pin. Three chapters had a program on the Victory at Yorktown, and six chapters purchased the Victory at Yorktown pin. Five chapters had a program about Our Nation's Birthplace, Jamestown, VA. Celebrated anniversaries of note included the 60th Anniversary of the Normandy, France Invasion; the 125th Anniversary of Georgia Military College; the 200th Birthday of Philadelphia Winn; and the 225th Anniversary of the Siege of Savannah. Other events included: Arbor Day; Cowpens; Centennial of Nathaniel Macon Chapter: Citizenship Day: Edmund Burke Organization Day: First Thanksgiving: Flag Day; Fort King George Reenactment; Georgia Day; George Washington's Birthday, Inauguration as President, and Death; Independence Day; Kettle Creek; King's Mountain; Korean War; Memorial Day; National Bible Week; Old Soldier's Day; Patriot's Day; Pike's Bluff Naval Victory; President's Day; September 11 Remembrance; Valley Forge; Veteran's Day; World War Iⅈ Vietnam; and Yorktown. Chapters participated by dedicating monuments; ringing church bells; wreath laying; grave marking; parades, programs, and memorial services; visiting historical sites; creating website information and submitting local newspaper articles; serving in historic homes; and teaching school programs. Madame State Regent, it has been my privilege to serve as Chairman of this very remarkable committee.

DAR PROJECT PATRIOT - Paula Hannah Osborne

Of the 106 chapters reporting, 38 supported DAR Project Patriot and community efforts regarding the war against terrorism. The USS John C. Stennis, nuclear aircraft carrier, received phone cards through \$1,293 being donated by 13 chapters, gift items, e-mails, and 240 plus cards and letters. Meetings, chapter newsletters, schools, posters and place cards were used to spread the word on DAR's support of the crew. This chairman prepared material for the Summer Packet, delivered 12 presentations at four district workshops in addition to presentations at the State Board of Management and to an outside group. One member sent 100 boxes of Girl Scout cookies to the troops in Iraq. Chapters attended July 4th celebrations and farewells of local troops donated money to a farewell dinner and four bicycles to a local base; sent packages, USO packages, cards, phone cards to troops and Walter Reed Army Medical Center; and tied yellow ribbons on trees. Two hundred sixteen volunteers gave 139 hours of their time and traveled 1,181 miles to show our support. Please pray for the safe return of our troops. Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure to serve you and the Georgia State Society.

DAR SPEAKER'S STAFF - Gwendolyn Meredith Martin

The objectives of the DAR Speakers Staff Committee are: (1) to promote a steady increase in new members, (2) to act as a liaison between the National Society and Chapters, (3) to speak before civic and non-DAR groups in the community, as well as, providing interesting programs for DAR chapters. Members of the Speakers Staff are recommended by the State Regent and appointed by the President General for both State and National levels. This committee is one of the most important committees in NSDAR. At the recommendation of the State Regent, this chairman extended 33 invitations. There were 31 responses with 30 accepting the invitation. Each Daughter accepting the invitation was

asked to send a list of every program she is prepared to present. A booklet has been published listing the Daughter's name, address, phone number and e-mail address. A booklet was placed in each Chapter Regent's packet at the 2005 State Conference. Each Speakers Staff member reported to this chairman on their activity for the year. Georgia Daughters gave presentations to 95 DAR Chapters and 33 other organizations. They spoke to approximately 2664 people. This chairman stands ready to be of assistance in anyway possible. The publication of this booklet should assist in finding an appropriate speaker for meetings.

FRIENDS OF THE LIBRARY - Rena Morgan Setters

INSIGNIA - Dorris Callahan Howell

Ninety-eight percent of all chapters reported to this State Chairman. Thank you for the outstanding reports. A tremendous job was accomplished with accuracy and grace. This chairman presented three mini workshops to chapters. Information about insignia was presented at district workshops. Explanations of pin availability and placement were given and order forms from J.E. Caldwell were available. Proper procedure for disposal of pins was emphasized, pointing out that insignia should not be allowed to reach flea markets. It was a great time for purchasing insignia. A total of \$57,657.23 was purchased for the year 2004-2005. Our members wear their insignia proudly. Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure to serve you and the Georgia State Society as Insignia Chairman.

LITERACY CHALLENGE - Bea Smith Fischer

One hundred five reports were received from Georgia chapters. Of these, 45 reported no activity. Sixty chapters promoted literacy through programs, tutoring, assisting or promoting literacy in adults and children. Chapters donated books and money to reading funds, libraries, and literacy programs in their communities. The Outstanding Service of a Chapter winner, Colonel William Candler, raised \$1,200 by designing and selling 2005 calendars and bookmarks to support a local literacy project, a Spelling Bee. The Outstanding Service of a DAR member winner, Rosemary Wood Dodd, contributed 870 volunteer hours at the Northeast Georgia History Center, using a novel approach which is sharing her knowledge about the Ed Dodd/Mark Trail Collection to encourage students to improve their reading and writing skills. A total of 137 chapter members participated in literacy programs. Spent in tutoring and assisting were 2,948 hours; with children a total of 11,290 hours. One thousand three hundred books were donated to promote literacy. Thank you Madam State Regent for allowing me to serve the Georgia State Society.

PRESIDENT GENERAL'S PROJECT - Jean Cole Manker

It is easier to contribute generously to causes in which we believe; but, first, we must fully understand why our money and time are necessary. In this instance, DAR's cause is the President General's Project, and each Georgia Daughter should be fully aware that the Project is the digitization of all of DAR's records. It is vital to the safety of the records and financial support of DAR's agenda. This project was begun in the last administration with the cooperation of the current one, and it will take another administration or so to complete. This year, Georgia Chapters are off to a good start toward 100% participation by July 2007. Seven chapters have already paid in full the \$6-per-member requested contribution during this administration. Ninety-two (92) additional chapters have paid \$2.00 (one-third) or more per member. Fourteen (14) chapters reported additional monetary contributions to the project by purchase of the Liberty Bell pins, labels, notepads, calendars, and other project items. We look forward to having the remaining 18 chapters make contributions in the coming year. The recent Master Questionnaire survey results included suggestions on a variety of ways some chapters have devised to raise money in support of the President General's Project. Daughters may also volunteer for data input on several of the digitization

programs. If you have any questions in this regard, this Chairman will be delighted to answer by phone, fax, e-mail or regular mail.

VOLUNTEER GENEALOGISTS – Linda Reed Douglas

This has been a very busy year for the Volunteer Genealogist Committee. We have added three more Volunteer Field Genealogist and two new Genealogy Consultants. At least 11 of our Volunteer Genies have been presenting workshops to the Georgia Daughters. Our Volunteer Genealogist of the year is Diane Redkevitch, The Field Genealogist of the year is Pat Mercer and our Genealogy Consultant of the Year is Betty Christy. We have three Georgia Daughters serving at the National level: Julia Farrigan as Units Overseas: Italy; Diane Redkevitch, Vice Chairman on the Chapter Development team and Melodye Brown as Southeast Vice Chairman of Volunteer Genealogists. The following seven chapters have reported Genealogy Workshops: John Benning, Edmund Burke, Lamar-Lafayette, Fort Frederica, Xavier, William Witcher and Fort Peachtree. This State Chairman has presented or assisted with five workshops in the past year including the Workshop and Forum at this State Conference. Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure to serve you and the State Society in this capacity.

WOMEN'S ISSUES - Carole Richard Thompson

Daughters in Georgia impressed this chairman by the quality of their Women's Issues programs, and their generous support of activities important to women. responses, 44 had no report. Members submitted 9 essays, 3 category winners sent to Divisional Chair. Thirty-eight chapters had programs of special interest to women, including Health Issues Affecting Women Most, Women's Fitness, Women and Heart Disease, Breast Cancer Awareness and Research, Organ Donation (given by a woman heart transplant recipient), Women's Safety and Self-Defense, Changing Role of Women in the Last 100 Years, Importance of Women's Right to Vote, Women in the Military, Battered Women and their Children. Nine chapters used short spots at meetings. Chapters reported most members involved in events such as Relay for Life. Fundraisers for American Cancer Society, American Heart Association, Alzheimer's, CPR and first-aid training, teaching mammography courses, supporting Safe Houses for abused women and their children. volunteering in soup kitchens, pregnancy crisis centers, visiting and serving meals at nursing homes, serving on Boards of American Cancer Society, American Heart Association, supporting Libraries, children's programs and assisting in voter registration. Lynn Brackey; Patricia Cown Burnam. Others present were the State Regent, Shelby Alderman Whitson, and the State Parliamentarian. Dorothy Corn Hoff.

An Opening Prayer was given by Dollye Ward. The Chairman of the Board welcomed everyone and asked that they introduce themselves.

Joyce Patton, State Treasurer, gave a Finance Report. As of October 22, 2004, the balances in the Georgia State Society's checking account was \$14,660.31; Money Market account was \$60,229.65; the Certificates of Deposit were \$32,369.71; totaling \$107,259.67. On recommendation of the Executive Committee, Joyce Patton moved "that the interest earned on the Georgia State Society checking account be credited to the McCall Genealogical Fund during the 2004-2006 Administration." The motion was seconded by Patricia Burnam and adopted.

Dollye Ward moved "that the Finance Committee recommend to the Executive Committee the following Conference registration fee: 1. Each Chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the state dues, a \$10.00 Conference registration fee for each voter to

which the chapter is entitled. This fee to be paid whether the chapter is represented or not. 2. State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay a \$10.00 conference fee at the time of registration. 3. Other members of the Georgia State Society who are not fully elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a \$7.00 conference fee at the time of registration." The motion was seconded by Ann Parsons and adopted. Ann Parsons moved "that the Finance Committee recommend to the Executive Committee that chapter members attending the summer workshops who do not attend the luncheon and closing assembly shall pay a \$10.00 registration fee." The motion was seconded by Dollye Ward and adopted.

Joyce Patton moved "that the firm of Hargrave and Freeman, P.C., Jonesboro, Georgia, be accepted as Auditor for the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, for the fiscal years 2004-2005 and 20050-2006 at an annual fee of \$4,000.00." The motion was seconded by Laura Reid and adopted. The State Treasurer explained the bookkeeping method of Quick Books for Non-Profit Organizations, which is currently being used by the Georgia State Society.

Lynn Brackey moved "that if the 2003-2004 Proceedings is printed and ready for Distribution before December 31, 2004, that it be mailed book rate; if it is not ready for distribution until after January 1, 2005, that it be distributed at State Conference." The motion was seconded by Dollye Ward and adopted. Dollye Ward moved "that the Finance Committee recommended to the Bylaws Committee that dues be increased from \$7.00 to \$10.00 to be effective for the 2005-2006 fiscal year." The motion was seconded by Joyce Patton and adopted. The proposed budget for 2005-2006 was distributed and discussed briefly. There being no further business the meeting was adjourned at 3:45 p.m.

The meeting of the Finance Committee of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, met on Thursday, March 31, 2005, at the Atlanta Marriott Northwest Hotel in Marietta, Georgia. Rosemary Crow Hunter, State Chairman of the Finance Committee, called the meeting to order at 3:10 p.m. Other members present were: Dollye Wren Ward; Laura Marcella Reid, Secretary; Joyce Ball Patton; Ann Parker Parsons; E. Lynn Brackey; Patricia Cown Burnam. Also in attendance was the State Regent, Shelby Alderman Whitson.

An Opening Prayer was given by Dollye Ward. After the Chairman welcomed everyone, the Secretary read the minutes of the November 5, 2004, meeting of the Finance Committee, which were approved as read.

Joyce Patton, State Treasurer, gave a Finance Report. As of February 28, 2005, the books of the Georgia State Society have been audited and the balances are: \$43,185.30 in checking account; \$57,472.91 in the Money Market account; \$35,445.23 in Certificates of Deposit. These totals \$136,103.44.

The Finance Committee Chairman distributed two Proposed Budgets for 2005-2006, one based on \$7.00 annual dues and one based on \$10.00 annual dues. The appropriate proposed budget will be distributed to the delegates of the State Conference, depending on the results of the vote of the recommended Bylaw amendment to increase dues from \$7.00 to \$10.00.

Dollye Ward moved "that the Finance Committee recommend to the Meadow Garden Board that \$1,000.00 be contributed toward the cost of the annual audit of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, which includes the audit of the financial records of Meadow garden. This money to be taken from the Meadow Garden Maintenance Fund." The motion was seconded by Patricia Burnam and adopted.

Lynn Brackey moved "that the Finance Committee recommend to the Executive Committee the following procedure for the various clubs and hostess chapters in the Georgia State Society to follow when sponsoring a meal during any meeting of the State Society:

1a. The State Regent's Call to Conference letter shall include a list of all meals of sponsoring clubs, with amount due for each reservation and to whom check is to be sent, always payable to the Treasurer of the sponsoring club.

- b. The club Treasurer shall remit to the State Treasurer the total amount due for the number of reservations credited. If possible this remittance should be sent in tow (2) payments, with the first check sent three (3) weeks prior to Conference and to include all reservations received to that date, and the second check is to be received by the State Treasurer prior to the opening of State Conference. A breakdown for the number of reservations for each meal shall be included with the check.
- c. The club Treasurer remits only the total cost of the meal as it is charged charged by the hotel, said total to include actual cost of the meal and gratuity. Any balance remains in the club's treasury. The State Society pays for meals for the out-of-state guests who have Been invited by the State Regent.
- 2. Reservations for official Conference meals (Opening Banquet, School/Youth Luncheon, Chapter Regent's Banquet, Final Day Breakfast) shall be made by check payable to the hostess Chapter and sent to the Conference Treasurer. The Hostess Chapter Treasurer shall send to the State Treasurer a check to cover total collected, said remittance sent in two (2) payments, the first due three (3) weeks before State Conference and the balance paid prior to the opening of State Conference. A breakdown for the number of reservations for each meal shall be included with the check.
- 3. Meal reservations for District Workshops and for Fall Board of Management shall be made by check payable to the hostess Chapter Treasurer, who shall submit to the State Treasurer one check to cover total cost of meal and gratuity. Any balance over cost of meal and amount collected shall remain in the treasury of the hostess Chapter. This remittance to the State Treasurer shall be made prior to the start of the meeting and shall include the total number of reservations the check covers.
- 4. This directive shall be kept in the files of the State Regent, the State Treasurer, the Presidents of all sponsoring clubs, the Coordinator of Districts, the District Directors and is to be passed on to each successor.
- 5. The above procedure is to be followed to assure that each DAR group does not have to pay Georgia state sales tax, which can only be exempted if the bills are paid by the State Treasurer with a Georgia State Society check."

The motion was seconded by Joyce Patton and adopted. A copy of this motion will be given to the presidents of the various clubs, the Coordinator of Districts and the District Directors

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned at 3:35 p.m.

Since 1946 Membership Roll and Register of Ancestors of the Georgia State Society has been published every ten years. HERITAGE EDUCATION – Louise Lockhart Henry

Meadow Garden Heritage Education, a long recognized need by Meadow Garden Board. is also a purpose of the DAR Organization. Meadow Garden is a perfect venue for this program since George Walton, its 1792 owner, was a Patriot, Signer of the Declaration of Independence, and Governor of Georgia. To implement this program, space has always been the major impediment since the house is completely furnished. After many years of design consideration for a plan which would compliment the "Big House," the 2003 Meadow Garden Board approved a "kitchen dependency," The exterior resembles as 18th century kitchen pictured in Back of the Big House, by John M. Vlach. Compatibility was approved by the National Register of Historic Places and the Richmond County Historic Preservation Commission. Using invested funds, donated for this purpose over many years and thoughtful donations by many Georgia Daughters, an attractive outbuilding dependency painted Cap Cod Gray, 1 ? stories, is nearing completion. Its interior wooden walls are white, authentic fireplace with warming oven resembling George Mason's at Alexandria, Virginia, a handicap rest room and upstairs room to house State records, consumes most of the space. Programs for children and adults will soon be implemented. My sincere appreciation for much personal support during this period and for donations of items which will be used in the building.

NSDAR 50-YEAR CLUB - Laura Belle Wyatt Macrae

As of February 1, 2005 there are 181 daughters who are members of Georgia's 50 Year Club from 64 chapters. There are 19 Life Members of the National DAR Club. Congratulatory letters were sent to the new members with encouragement to join the National Club. Dues received were forwarded to the National Club. A file is maintained by the State. Appreciation goes to the chapters who responded to my request.

The National Park Service took pictures of Meadow Garden to be placed on the National Park Service website. We participated in a 200th year anniversary death of George Walton in February 2004 with a ceremony on the front porch. The heat pump motor was replaced. The water backflow prevention assembly was worked on. The front porch was repaired and painted and a new railing was built. Roots were removed from the plumbing line. Dormer windows were repaired. The American Flag was replaced and the outhouse was moved to make room for the new building. Our Meadow Garden Brochures were revised and 5000 cards were ordered.

MEADOW GARDEN DOCENTS - Billie Gardner Hunter

Our docent program at Meadow Garden is going strong. Docents are used for special events and large group tours. Special events were: July 4th Open House, Garden Tour with Historic Augusta and the Christmas Candlelight Tour with the Ezekiel Harris House. Twenty docents were used over three days for the Candlelight Tour. Large group tours require three or four docents each time. We are always in need of new docents. Call Meadow Garden if you are interested. The September docent training was cancelled because of bad weather. A class was held on October 25, 2004 from 10:00 a.m. to noon. There were two people in attendance, Betty Love and B.J. Lester from the Augusta Chapter. The Chairman and Susan Jackson, House Manager, conducted the class.

MEADOW GARDEN FURNISHINGS - Mary Gene Everitt Elliott

Our furnishings are in excellent condition at this time due to the daily care and supervision of our House Manager, Susan Jackson. Many thanks to her for her dedication. An updated room by room inventory has been completed by Louise Henry and given to this chairman. Also, at the request of the insurance company, Strawn and Co., of McDonough, all items have been reappraised and values raised. Four Windsor style chairs for the front porch were given to Meadow Garden in honor of Rosemary Crow Hunter, Past State Regent, by the Georgia State Society, C. A. R. The chairs were dedicated in an impressive ceremony on February 19, 2005. It is a privilege and pleasure to serve Meadow Garden and the Georgia State Society under the direction of the State Regent.

MEADOW GARDEN LANDSCAPING - Josephine Rhodes Agostas

The completed Georgia Historic Landscape Survey form and documentation for Meadow Garden in Augusta was sent to the Cherokee Garden Library. This valuable information will be included in Garden Club of Georgia's on going project to document historic gardens throughout the State of Georgia. Staci Catron-Sullivan, Director of the Cherokee Garden Library, stated, "the level of detail and professionalism in your survey and supportive documentation is remarkable. MEADOW GARDEN BOARD July 16, 2004

The Meadow Garden Board met on Friday, July 16, 2004, at Meadow Garden in Augusta, Georgia. State Regent and Chairman of the Board, Shelby Alderman Whitson, called the meeting to order at 10:45 a.m. Other members present were: Laura Marcella Reid, Secretary; Margaret Poole Cagle; Susan deCamp Conger; Elizabeth "Betty" Powell Hughes; Billie Gardner Hunter; Mary Gene Everitt Elliott; JosephineRhodes Agostas; Camille Redfern Baxter; Anne Whipple Murphey; Barbara Blakely Chastain, ex-officio member; and, Edwina Hall Beall, Advisor.

The Invocation was given by Mrs. Whitson. The Chairman of the Board welcomed everyone and asked that they introduce themselves. The Standing Rules for Meadow Garden, copies of which were sent to all Board members prior to this meeting, were read by the Secretary. Mrs. Whitson stated that the minutes of the May 11, 2004, called meeting of the Meadow Garden Board were approved by the previous Board and will be recorded in the Proceedings.

The Chairman reminded everyone reports should be written with copies given to the Chairman and to the Secretary. All motions must have a maker and be seconded.

In the absence of the Treasurer, the Chairman shared the Treasurer's information that has been received to date from the previous administration. Summary of Funds Accounts as of July 15, 2004, in the checking account in the Royal Bank of Canada Centura is a balance of \$28,848.65. This week the Treasurer received \$25,000.00 from the Joseph Habersham Chapter for the Alae Risse Barron Leitch Fund, making the total assets held by the State Treasurer for Meadow Garden \$53,848.65. This \$25,000.00 donation is to be added to the \$25,000.00 given previously by the Joseph Habersham Chapter designated

for the Alae Risse Barron Leitch Fund, to be invested in a \$50,000.00 Certificate of Deposit, interest from which is designated for maintenance of Meadow Garden.

Meadow Garden House Manager, Susan Jackson, gave her report for January through June 2004, which included the following: (1) Number of tourists visiting Meadow Garden was up 280 from last year; number of scheduled tours was 453, walk-ins 235 and no charge (February 7th Commemoration Ceremony of the Death of George Walton, March Garden Tour, teachers with school groups, and guests of Meadow Garden) were 386, for a total of 1,074. (2) Income from tours was down \$154.50; school tours were down due to lack of funding. (3) Shop sales were \$1,473.25, which was up \$426.75. (4) There were five lunch tours in April and May. (5) Total docent and volunteer participation combined is up this year from last year; two Augusta garden clubs, Cherokee Rose Garden Club and Pine Needle Garden Club, have volunteered time. (6) Two Docent classes were held in January 2004 with two DAR Chapters, Augusta Chapter and College Hill Chapter, represented; the total number of "Docents in qualification" was six.

Margaret Poole Cagle, Meadow Garden Chairman, reported: (1) As a member of the Augusta Chamber of Commerce, Meadow Garden could target market on an internet mapping system for \$309.00 for two years; to be included on the internet website would cost \$269.00; Mrs. Cagle will obtain additional information on this type of advertising. (2) March of Dimes Convention will be September 23rd in Augusta and has requested Meadow Garden brochures for its packets. (3) Fred Danes, President, Greater Augusta Stamp Club, wrote that the theme for their annual October stamp show to be the 200th anniversary of the death of George Walton: the club designs a cacheted envelope that reflects the theme, and would like to coordinate the planning and the design of the cover with the Meadow Garden Board; the Greater Augusta Stamp Club would pay for the printing of the cover, design the canceling device and procure the necessary stamps to use at the show; the covers would sell at the show for \$2.00, and the Meadow Garden gift shop could purchase "at little if any over cost"; (4) Previous Meadow Garden Board approved annual alarm system inspection, city water meter inspection, fire extinguisher inspection and the pressure washing of the house by Joey Smalley; these items have not yet been done nor have they been paid. (5) The annual termite inspection has been completed by Bert Hall and the bill is \$107.00, which is being submitted for payment; an inspection for powder post beetles is needed. (6) Tabled for the next Meadow Garden Board meeting are the repair of the cedar shake roof and the repair of plaster walls. (7) Needs for the house are another electric fan, an adding machine with a tape and a metal file cabinet. (8) The monthly \$50.00 petty cash was discussed. (9) Brochures for Meadow Garden need to be revised prior to printing of any additional brochures, (10) Air conditioner for the Meadow Garden House that cools the main floor and the upper floor needs repair or replacement; estimates are needed. Mrs. Whitson suggested we develop a "Wish List for Meadow Garden."Meadow Garden Docents Chairman, Billie Gardner Hunter, referred to the House Manager's report regarding the docent and volunteer hours and training. She announced there would be Docent training in September 2004.

Mary Gene Everitt Elliott, Meadow Garden Furnishings Chairman, reported the light fixtures in the upstairs hall were not in keeping with the Meadow Garden House and should be considered for replacement. Susan Conger moved "John P. Elliott perform an appraisal of the furnishings at Meadow Garden at a cost not to exceed \$1,200.00." The motion was seconded by Laura Reid and adopted. Josephine Rhodes Agostas, Meadow Garden Landscaping Chairman, referenced a letter from Richard Cloues, Survey and National Register Manager, Deputy State Historic Preservation Officer for the Georgia Department of Natural Resources, Historic Preservation Division, regarding a proposed installation of a safety railing on the front porch of Meadow Garden. Mr.Cloues recommended, "a simple, wood railing, painted white, similar to but not identical with the existing porch railing . . ." Anne Murphey, moved "an appropriate white wooden railing be placed on split level line of front porch, as recommended by Georgia Department of Natural Resources Historic Preservation Division in correspondence to Mrs. Agostas." (in letter dated March 4, 2004). The motion was seconded by Jo Agostas and adopted.

Mrs. Agostas reported the grounds of Meadow Garden have been cared for by vardman, Omer Steadley, the Cherokee Rose and the Pine Needle Garden Clubs, Mr. Roy Cagle maintains the sprinkler system. In July the Nancy Hart Chapter and the C.A.R. Society from Milledgeville visited and worked in the yard. The fruit trees, fig bush and grape arbor are producing an abundant harvest for all to enjoy. Jo Agostas moved "Augusta Council of Garden Clubs be allowed to have a flower show at Meadow Garden in the fall of 2005." The motion was seconded by Elizabeth P. Hughes and adopted. Anne Murphey requested it be noted in the minutes, "The grounds have never looked more beautiful than they do today under Jo Agostas' supervision."

Meadow Garden Shop Chairman, Camille Redfern Baxter, reported on the inventory of items available for sale in the Meadow Garden Shop and the need for four to five people at the sales table at the District Workshops.

Mrs. Whitson offered a Blessing at 1:00 p.m. and everyone enjoyed a boxed lunch. At 1:20 p.m.

Anne Whipple Murphey, Chairman, Patrons, reported. She reminded everyone that "patrons-in-kind" are voted on by the Board.

There was discussion concerning the Heritage Education Center and the need for more professional advice. It was suggested the status of the Advisor and the ex-officio member of the Meadow Garden Board be changed from non-voting members to voting members. and that this be presented at the State Board of Management. Mrs. Murphey commented that one of the most valuable resources of the Georgia State Society is the Honorary State Regents. A rental agreement needs to be drawn up for the rental of the Heritage Education Center and needs to be reviewed by legal counsel. A Certificate of Insurance needs to be included as part of the rental agreement, and a clause concerning the clean-up agreement needs to be included. Mrs. Murphey requested the record show "this Meadow Garden Board pledges to serve and support our new State Regent, so she has a pleasant and productive experience." The State Regent expressed that all actions of the Meadow Garden Board and the Georgia State Society be honest, legal and protective of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR. Margaret Cagle moved "the DAR Chapters be allowed to use the Educational Building for a Patron or above level donation to be used for Maintenance Fund." The motion was seconded by Elizabeth P. Hughes and adopted. It was noted that no one can occupy or use the new Heritage Education Center until it is completed and has "Certificate of Occupancy."

Augusta Chapter Regent, Susan deCamp Conger, discussed the brochures available at the Georgia State Welcome Centers and how the Meadow Garden brochure compares. She reported an anonymous member of the former Meadow Garden Board gave the Georgia State Society an annual corporate membership to the Georgia Trust for Historic Preservation. Miss Conger moved "the Meadow Garden join Historic Augusta, Inc., as a corporate member. The annual dues are \$50.00 per year." The motion was seconded by Camille Baxter and adopted. Miss Conger mentioned that Jeanie Johnson, immediate past Chapter Regent of the College Hill Chapter, is investigating the potential of Meadow Garden's participation in the Arts in Heart of Augusta to be held in September. Miss Conger stated that the Meadow Garden Board should have a budget to present when attempting to receive a tourism grant. The meeting adjourned at 2:00 p.m.

October 4, 2004

The Meadow Garden Board met on Monday, October 4, 2004, at Meadow Garden in Augusta, Georgia. State Regent and Chairman of the Board, Shelby Alderman Whitson, called the meeting to order at 11:00 a.m. Other members present were: Margaret Poole Cagle; Billie Garner Hunter; Mary Gene Everitt Elliott; Josephine Rhodes Agostas; Camille Redfern Baxter; Anne Whipple Murphey; Joyce Ball Patton, State Treasurer; Barbara Blakely Chastain, ex-officio member; and, Edwina Hall Beall, Advisor.

The Invocation was given by Mrs. Whitson. The Chairman of the Board welcomed

everyone and asked Billie Hunter, in the absence of the Recording Secretary, to read the minutes of the July 16, 2004, meeting. The minutes were approved as read.

Joyce Patton, State Treasurer, distributed the Summary of Funds July 1, 2004 – September 27, 2004, showing total assets of \$411,286.07. The summary was reviewed and filed. It was suggested that the next budget include the cost of audit, joining Historic Augusta and other unforeseen expenses. The Treasurer stated that the Joseph Habersham Chapter had given \$5,000.00 and will give another \$5,000.00 if the first donation is matched by the Georgia State Society.

Chairman, Mrs. Cagle, reported the following: (1) That we participate in a 200th anniversary of the death of George Walton/Meadow Garden First Day Cover event sponsored by the Augusta Stamp Club. No action was taken. (2) The house (1st and 2nd floors) air conditioner was repaired and the cost was under the estimated amount. (3) Our Meadow Garden Brochures need to be revised to read "last tour begins at 3:00" and it was suggested that the picture of George Walton be placed in an oval frame. (4) That the shake roof be repaired at a later date when all information has been obtained and reviewed. (5) Our Patron pins sell for \$5.00 each for a \$50.00 donation, but a free Patron pin should be given for a larger donation. Mrs. Cagle moved that: "A Patron pin be given to people who donate \$250.00 or more to Meadow Garden." Motion was seconded by Mrs. Elliott and adopted. Historic Augusta has asked that we participate in a three day, three house, "Holiday Happening" during Thanksgiving weekend, November 26, 27 and 28, 5:00 to 8:00 p.m. and 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. on Sunday. Tickets will be \$15.00 and DAR members would be given a discount. Meadow Garden would share one third of the profits. Mrs. Cagle moved that: "we support a candlelight open house on Thanksgiving weekend with Historic Augusta." Motion was seconded by Mrs. Murphey and adopted.

Mrs. Hunter, Chairman of Docents, stated that the September Docent Training Meeting was canceled because of bad weather and is rescheduled for Monday, October 18, 2004.

Mrs. Agostas, Landscaping Chairman, reported that the new yard man, Steve Harrison, is to be paid \$50.00 per trip and that two Garden Clubs still help with the yards. Mrs. Agostas moved that: "we employ Ted Baker to build a banister between the two porches for \$400.00 for safety reasons." The motion was seconded by Mrs. Baxter and adopted.

Mrs. Elliott, Furnishings Chairman, moved that: "the last sentence in Section IV, #2 of the Standing Rules, "The Augusta Room furnishings will remain as they were in 1982," be deleted." The motion was seconded by Mrs. Patton and adopted. Mrs. Baxter moved that: "John Elliott be paid \$320.00 for clerical fees in conjunction with the appraisal of the furnishings." The motion was seconded by Mrs. Patton and adopted. The chairman read Section I MEADOW GARDEN BOARD #4 of Standing Rules. Mrs. Elliott moved to: strike the word "without" and insert "with." # 4 would then read: "In addition to the six (6) appointments to the Board which are made by the State Regent, she shall appoint two (2) Honorary State Regents to serve as Advisors to the Board, each of whom shall be given privilege of the floor with a vote unless also serving as one of the six (6) appointed chairmen." The motion was seconded by Mrs. Hunter and adopted.

Mrs. Baxter, Shop Chairman, suggested that more china items be purchased for the Gift Shop. Items considered were Roth Company blue and white 10 1/2" plate, 7" plate, coaster and trinket box. Mrs. Cagle stated that more mugs were needed and suggested that the chairman consider bridge cards. Mrs. Murphey moved that: "an order of blue Staffordshire china be placed with the Roth Company for sale in the Meadow Garden Shop." The motion was seconded by Mrs. Cagle and adopted. The Board reaffirmed that the Gift Shop chairman would be allotted \$800.00 for Gift Shop purchases.

Mrs. Agostas stated that the family of Madam LaVert may be willing to give several lovely chairs to Meadow Garden. Mrs. Elliott stated that all donations will first be submitted by photograph, accompanied with an accredited appraisal as to age and value, for consideration. The Victorian horse hair furniture repairs were discussed. Mr. John Elliott, appraiser, said the value would go down if repaired. The Chairman gave Mrs. Elliott photos of the Empire sofa that Betty B. Harrah wishes to donate. Mrs. Patton moved that: "the request from Betty B. Harrah concerning the \$5,000.00 that she gave to Meadow Garden

Furnishings Fund in 2001, be moved to the Heritage Education Center Fund." The motion was seconded by Mrs. Elliott and adopted. The Chairman read from the Standing Rules, Section VIII PLAQUES & MARKERS. The Invocation was given by Mrs. Whitson. The Chairman of the Board welcomed everyone. The Secretary of the Board read the minutes of the October 4, 2004, called meeting of the Meadow Garden Board. Joyce Patton moved that "the Meadow Garden Board give the house manager, Susan Jackson, a 3% cost of living raise, effective January 1, 2005." The motion was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Patton moved that "the Meadow Garden Board pay the house manager, Susan Jackson, a monthly salary, rather than an hourly rate." The motion was seconded and adopted.

Margaret Cagle, Meadow Garden Chairman, reported: (1) Candlelight Christmas Tour with the Ezekiel Harris House and the Woodrow Wilson House will be held on November 26th and 27th from 5:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. Tickets are \$10.00 for adults and \$5.00 for students, K through twelve. (2) The stamped envelope from the Greater Augusta Stamp Club commemorating the 200th anniversary of the death of George Walton will be sold in the gift shop for \$1.00, giving Meadow Garden a 50% profit. (3) Five thousand (5,000) brochure cards have been ordered. (4) Thank you notes to the staff were received from the National Society of Washington Family Assemblage, who toured Meadow Garden. (5) More information will be gathered on the powder post beetle situation and treatment to eliminate. (6) National Park Service came and took pictures of Meadow Garden to be placed on the National Park Service website. The Park Service's Cultural Resources Division offers free consultation. (7) A Docent Workshop was held October 25, 2004, by

Mrs. Hunter, Docent Chairman, and Susan Jackson, House Manager. Two members of the Augusta Chapter attended. (8) Augusta Chapter received letter from the Superintendent of Richmond County Schools, Dr. Charles Larke, granting permission for members of the Augusta Chapter to visit all public schools to Meadow Garden Board Meeting – November 5, 2004 promote patriotic activities and contests as approved by the National and State Societies of NSDAR.

Susan Conger moved that "the Standing Rules of Meadow Garden as published in the 2003 and 2004 Proceedings be revised and updated, in compliance with Section I, Rule 13 of the Standing Rules of Meadow Garden, and be presented to the 2005 State Conference of the GSDAR. The motion was seconded. By ballot vote the motion was

lost. The State Regent noted that the State Bylaws Committee will address some changes in the Georgia State Society's Bylaws which will effect the Meadow Garden and the Meadow Garden Standing Rules.

Dr. John Waters, Professor, School of Environmental Design, University of Georgia, and sixteen of his graduate students visited Meadow Garden November third. In 1982 Dr. Waters and his students created plans for Meadow Garden's arbor, beds and fruit trees.

Meadow Garden Shop Chairman, Camille Baxter, reported new items have been purchased for sale in the gift shop and at the District Workshops.

Anne Murphey, Chairman, Patrons, reported Patron pins for \$5.00 are available for a donation of \$50.00 or more. With a donation of \$250.00 plus, a free Patron pin will be given to the donor.

Mrs. Whitson announced the next Meadow Garden Board Meeting will be January 18th at 10:30 a.m. The meeting adjourned at 2:40 p.m.

The Meadow Garden Board met on Tuesday, January 18, 2005, at Meadow Garden in Augusta, Georgia. State Regent and Chairman of the Board, Shelby Alderman Whitson, called the meeting to order at 10:45 a.m. Other members present were: Laura Marcella Reid, Secretary; Margaret Poole Cagle; Susan deCamp Conger; Elizabeth Powell Hughes; Billie Gardner Hunter; Mary Gene Everitt Elliott; Josephine Rhodes Agostas; Camille Redfern Baxter; Joyce Ball Patton; and, Edwina Hall Beall, Advisor.

The Invocation was given by Mrs. Whitson. After the Chairman welcomed everyone, the Secretary read the minutes of the November 5, 2004, meeting of the Meadow Garden Board, which were approved as read.

The State Treasurer, Joyce Patton, shared with the Board the balance sheet of the Meadow Garden Fund as of January 17, 2005: the Certificates of Deposit total \$321,646.10; the checking account balance is \$55,087.77; the Money Market Accounts total \$23,101.80; showing current assets of \$399,835.67, with an additional \$3,054.00 of fixed assets, bringing the total assets to \$402,889.67. Mrs. Patton distributed a Profit and Loss Statement from July 1, 2004, through January 17, 2005; a detailed expense report of the Heritage Education Center; and, a breakdown of the Certificates of Deposit showing the amount of principal and the amount of interest each CD has earned since July 1, 2004.

Margaret Cagle, Meadow Garden Chairman, reported: (1) The heat pump motor of the heating unit was replaced in December 2004. (2) Ted Baker installed the new railing on the front porch. (3) A minimum order of 10,000 "track" brochures were ordered through McGowan Printing and 11,000 brochures were received. The cost was \$464.03. (4) In

October/November the city did its annual inspection of the sewer's backflow prevention assembly at Meadow Garden and identified some major work to be done on it within the year. (5) Investigating the cost of the purchase of the filters for the heating and air units through Home Depot instead of through Wade Warner. (6) Repairs are needed to the plaster in the corner of the upstairs hall and a loose board on the landing of the stairway. (7) The replacement of roof shingles, which are coming off on a regular basis, needs to be addressed. The estimate for this work is \$21,000,00. (8) A new Flag of the United States of America is needed. (9) A dedication of the chairs given by the Georgia State Society, Children of the American Revolution, honoring Rosemary Hunter, will be Saturday, February 19, 2005, at 2:00 p.m. at Meadow Garden. The Augusta Chapter and the College Hill Chapter will be hostesses for the dedication. It was noted that the chairs are in need of repainting and are still under warranty. This is being addressed. (10) It was suggested that if a Meadow Garden Festival is planned that it be listed in the Augusta paper on the monthly events schedule. (11) Information is being collected regarding the repair of the busts of the Signers of the Declaration of Independence. (12) The Augusta Historical Society is sending Meadow Garden a check in the amount of \$256.66 for their share for participating in the Candlelight Christmas Tour that was held on November 26th and 27th.

Billie Hunter, Docent Chairman, reported three Docent Workshops were held in 2004 on January 13th, January 26th and October 25th. Eight docents were qualified and there was participation from both the Augusta Chapter and the College Hill Chapter.

The Furnishings Chairman, Mary Gene Elliott, reported the chairs attributed to Madame LaVert were donated with the understanding they may not meet the qualifications to be placed in Meadow Garden. The donor gave permission for the Meadow Garden Board to donate these to another house museum if they could not be used at Meadow Garden. Chairman Mrs. Whitson reminded Mrs. Agostas that the appraisal of the chairs is needed for the records. Mrs. Elliott also reported a letter will be sent to Betty Harrah expressing regrets that the empire sofa she offered cannot be accepted because it has been refinished.

Camille Baxter moved that: "The Meadow Garden Board follow the Standing Rules as stated in The Proceedings and appoint a committee to evaluate the interpretation on a yearly basis." The motion was seconded and was loss.

Josephine Agostas, Meadow Garden Landscaping Chairman, reported pruning is being done; beds have been cleaned and new pine straw applied; a solid wood post, that was removed from the front porch when the new railing was installed, has been made into a bird feeder and placed in the kitchen herb garden; landscaping plans for the Heritage Education Center area are being made to include the use of cross ties to protect the building; aspidistra and mondo grass will be planted under the large oak; there will be no room for cars to be parked on the property. Mrs. Agostas recommends we open a gate on the canal side of the property and encourage parking in the five parking spaces that Walton Rehab has given to Meadow Garden. Three of these five spaces are handicap designated. Mrs. Agostas had a gate designed by landscape architect Roger Davis for the canal side of Meadow Garden. The gate design was shared with Board members. Plans are being made for the September flower show, which is titled "Back in Time." The show will have exhibits on arrangements, horticulture and education. The show is being written by Opal Davis and will highlight the Walton family, especially Madame LaVert, George and Dorothy Walton's granddaughter.

Meadow Garden Shop Chairman, Camille Baxter, reported on the four tatted snowflakes that were donated to Meadow Garden and how they would be sold. Potential craft items, including cotton-vine wreaths, preserves and mop caps, were discussed. Six of the cotton-vine wreaths will be ordered for the Shop.

Susan Jackson, House Manager, gave an annual report for 2004, which included the following: (1) Total tourists for the year were 1,524, which includes 386 non-paying visitors who attended the special events. Tourists for the year were up versus 2003. (2) Special events in 2004 were the February 7th celebration of the "200 Year Commemoration of the Death of George Walton" and the March 19th, 20th and 21st Garden Tour. (3) Scheduled

tours were down 296 from the previous year. This is mainly attributed to the school traffic being down due to lack of funding. (4) The number of walk-in, paying tourists was up from the previous year. (5) In 2004 the total combined income from scheduled tours and walk-in tours was \$2,219.00 compared to \$2,421.50 in 2003. (6) The income in 2004 from the Meadow Garden Shop was \$1,918.25 versus \$2,550.70 in 2003.

The Chairman of the Board offered a blessing and the meeting was recessed for lunch. When the meeting resumed, Mrs. Baxter made a motion that: "The Meadow Garden Board adhere to the Standing Rules as printed in The Proceedings and review the Standing Rules yearly as to the interpretation." The motion was seconded and adopted.

Betty Hughes moved that: "The ramps and the porches of the Heritage Education Center be made into one continuous porch with a code approved wheelchair turnaround." The motion was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Whitson shared with the members of the Board Susan Conger's letter of resignation from the Meadow Garden Board.

Mrs. Whitson announced the next Meadow Garden Museum Board Meeting will be in March prior to State Conference in Marietta. The meeting adjourned at 1:10 p.m.

The Meadow Garden Board met on Thursday, March 31, 2005, at the Atlanta Marriott Northwest in Marietta, Georgia. State Regent and Chairman of the Board, Shelby Alderman Whitson, called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m. Other members present were: Laura Marcella Reid, Secretary; Margaret Poole Cagle; Mary Gene Everitt Elliott; Camille Redfern Baxter; Anne Whipple Murphey; Joyce Ball Patton; Barbara Blakely Chastain, Ex-Officio member; and, Edwina Hall Beall, Advisor.

The Invocation was given by Mrs. Whitson. After the Chairman welcomed everyone, the Secretary read the minutes of the January 18, 2005, meeting of the Meadow Garden Board, which were approved as read.

The Finance Committee made a recommendation to the Meadow Garden Board requesting the Meadow Garden Board contribute \$1,000.00 toward the cost of the annual audit of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, which includes the audit of the financial records of Meadow Garden. This money is to be taken from the Medow Garden Maintenance Fund.

Anne Murphey moved that: "The members of the Meadow Garden Board have considered the recommendation of the Finance Committee as to Meadow Garden's paying \$1,000.00 of the audit expense as a separate entity and feel it is not feasible. Meadow Garden is entirely a valid part of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR. The Board of Meadow Garden rejects the recommendation." The motion was seconded and adopted.

The cornerstone of the George Walton Heritage Education Center has been replaced with a blue granite, typical cornerstone, engraved with the name of the center and the dates MMIV. The cost of \$225.00 for the replacement of the cornerstone was paid by private funds.

Laura Reid reported that Lieutenant Neal Brown, the Fire Inspector of the Augusta Fire Department, has advised that the maximum occupancy of the George Walton Heritage Education Center depends on the use of the building, which is determined by the guidelines of the Georgia State Fire Code. If used as a classroom with tables and chairs, the maximum capacity is 35. If used set in theatre style, the maximum is 50 people. When used for receptions with standing room only, the maximum capacity is approximately 90 people. The certificate of occupancy can be for the use of receptions, but if the building is used as a classroom with tables and chairs or theatre style, the maximum occupancy must comply with the Georgia State Fire Code for each specific use.

Margaret Cagle moved that: We set the maximum number for the occupancy of the George Walton Heritage Education Building to comply with the Georgia State Fire Code for the use of receptions, which will be approximately 90 persons. This number will be stated

on our certificate of occupancy." The motion was seconded and adopted.

Margaret Cagle moved that: "The lease for rental of the George Walton Heritage Education Building will designate the number of occupancy as specified by the Georgia State Fire Code for the specific use of the building." The motion was seconded and adopted.

The State Treasurer, Joyce Patton, shared with the Board the balance sheet of the Meadow Garden Funds as of February 28, 2005, which have all been reviewed and audited as of February 28th: the Certificates of Deposit total \$321,646.10; the checking account balance is \$63,168.70; the Money market Accounts total \$23,337.33; showing current assets of \$408,152.13, with an additional \$2,872.00 of fixed assets, bringing the total assets to \$411,024.13. Mrs. Patton distributed a Profit and Loss Statement from July 1, 2004, through February 28, 2005; and, a breakdown of the Certificates of Deposit showing the amount of principal and the amount of interest each CD has earned since July 1, 2004. Mrs. Patton reported that the total cost of the insurance for the find arts and heritage building was \$5,530.00. We ratified the payment of the Worker's Unemployment Tax and the Workers Compensation Policy.

Margaret Cagle, Meadow Garden Chairman, reported: (1) suggested that the Board allot sick leave days for the manager of Meadow Garden so she will not have to use her comp time. Margaret Cagle moved that: "Susan Jackson, Meadow Garden employee, receive five (5) days sick leave per year." The motion was seconded and adopted. (2) Meadow Garden was featured on the front cover of the Augusta, Georgia, maps. (3) Renewal of membership in the Augusta Metro Chamber of Commerce is \$100.00. The Board agreed to renew membership in the Augusta Metro Chamber of Commerce. (4) Georgia Council of Garden Clubs will hold a Flower Show at Meadow Garden the first and second of October 2005. Margaret Cagle moved that: "we charge \$2.00 per person to the Council of Garden Clubs Flower Show at Meadow Garden on October first and second, 2005." The motion was seconded and adopted. (5) meadow Garden donated four (4) tickets to March of Dimes Auction. (6) Trash is coming into the Gift Shop from the roof and the attic. (7) A previous estimate to replace the roof with single, cedar shake shingles is \$21,000.00. Mrs. Cagle is getting a more current estimate for this replacement. Currently we do not have the money for this and will need to raise it.

The Furnishings Chairman, Mary Gene Elliott, reported the four (4) chairs, given in honor of Mrs. Billy W. Hunter by the Georgia State Society Children of the American Revolution, were returned to Bill Gullberg, in Kirkwood, Illinois, to be refinished and properly coated for outside use. The cost of shipping was \$374.21.

Meadow Garden Shop Chairman, Camille Baxter, reported on the new Staffordshire china: plates, coasters and trinket boxes. Prices on items are as follows: 7" plates' retail price is \$18.00; 101/2" plates retail for \$25.00; coasters retail for \$10.00; and, trinket boxes retail for \$20.00. Special orders will be taken for teapots and coffee pots. These items will retail for approximately \$100.00 each.

Anne Murphey, Meadow Garden Docents Chairman, recognized and commended Joyce Patton for her many efforts in raising money for the completion of the George Walton Heritage Education Center.

The members of the Board decided to raise money for a new roof for Meadow Garden by selling shingles for \$25.00 each.

Mrs. Whitson announced the next Meadow Garden Board Meeting will be Tuesday, July 19th, in Augusta at Meadow Garden. There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 3:00 p.m.

Standing Rules for Meadow Garden

MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

- The governing body of a museum, in this instance the Meadow Garden Board, serves
 the public interest as it relates to Meadow Garden, and must consider itself
 accountable to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, as well as to Meadow Garden;
 members should not attempt to act in their individual capacities, but all actions should
 be taken as a Board, Committee, or otherwise in conformance with the Standing Rules,
 the Act of Incorporation, or applicable Resolutions.
- 2. The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the three (3) Trustees as named in the Deed from the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, conveying Meadow Garden to the Georgia State Society Daughters of the American Revolution; namely, the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the State Chairman of Meadow Garden who is appointed by the State Regent; the Chapter Regents of the Augusta Chapter and the College Hill Chapter, both chapters being located in Augusta, who shall serve as Vice Chairmen to the State Chairmen of Meadow Garden; the State Treasurer; two Honorary State Regents and five of the chairmen of Meadow Garden Committees, as appointed by the State Regent.
- No Georgia Daughter shall serve in the same Meadow Garden Chairmanship more than three (3) consecutive terms.
- 4. In addition to the six (6) appointments to the Board which are made by the State Regent, she shall appoint two (2) Honorary State Regents to serve as Advisors to the Board, each of whom shall be given privilege of the floor without a vote unless also serving as one of the six (6) appointed chairman.
- The State Second Vice Regent shall serve as ex-officio member of the Meadow Garden Board, being given the privilege of the floor without a vote.
- The State Regent shall serve as Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board, and the State First Vice Regent shall serve as Secretary of the Meadow Garden Board.
- 7. The Meadow Garden Board shall meet a minimum of three (3) times each year; namely, preceding Fall Board of Management meeting, preceding annual State Conference and following Continental Congress, and at such other times as deemed necessary by the Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board, At least one (1) meeting of the Board shall be held at Meadow Garden each year.
- 8. The Meadow Garden Board shall have jurisdiction over the operation, maintenance and work of Meadow Garden and shall be the authority for Meadow Garden as long as such authority is not in conflict with the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, the Act of Incorporation for the Georgia State Society, Resolutions adopted by the Georgia State Society and/or directions which from time to time may be approved by action of the Georgia State Society assembled at its annual State Conference.
- The Meadow Garden Board shall supervise the placing of all insurance to cover the grounds and the house and its contents, including the fine arts, with accredited companies - coverage to include fire, theft and liability.
- 10. Five (5) voting members of the Board shall constitute a guorum.
- Minutes shall be kept of each meeting and a copy shall be sent to each member and printed verbatim in the State Proceedings.
- 12. All expenses for maintenance, operation and purchases of furnishings and plantings shall be authorized by the State Regent, as Chairman of the Board, and paid by the State Treasurer. Expenditures exceeding \$1,000.00 must have the majority approval of the Board.
- 13. These rules will be binding on the actions of the Board in their operation of Meadow Garden. They may be changed by the following procedure: Members of the Board must have written notification of proposed changes one month prior to the next meeting of the Board; a two-thirds vote of the Board and approval of the State Conference are necessary to effect a change.

II OPERATIONS

- Everyone entering Meadow Garden will be requested to sign the register, including date, time of arrival and time of departure.
- No more than fifteen (15) people with each Docent are to be on tour in the house at a given time. Excess of this number may wait in the reception room or in the garden. The Museum Manager has the authority to enforce the Meadow Garden rules at all times.
- 3. There will be no smoking in Meadow Garden.
- 4. No refreshments are to be served in or taken into the Museum by visitors, including chapters or the public. Should a group, such as a visiting chapter, desire refreshments, the garden is available for use if litter is properly disposed of by the serving group.
- 5. Tour visitors will be asked to pay a fee as set by the Board.
- 6. There will be only five (5) complete sets of keys to Meadow Garden and three (3) keys to the gates of Meadow Garden. Keys are to be returned after each administration. New locks may be required. Distribution of keys: Gate Only: Augusta Police Department, Georgia Power, and Sizemore Security; Gate and House: Chairman of Meadow Garden Board, Meadow Garden Chairman, Museum Manager, Docents Chairman and Landscaping Chairman.

III VOLUNTEERS AND DOCENTS

- Docents shall be those well screened and trained volunteers who will serve under the direct supervision of a Meadow Garden Chairman and/or the Manager.
- Duties of docents shall include acting as guides, hostesses, working in museum shop, working in yard, cleaning in house, public relations. No volunteer work at or for Meadow Garden shall be done except under the direct guidance of the Meadow Garden Board and the chairman of the specific committee for the particular function.
- 3. Cleaning or yard work volunteers shall be under the direction of the Museum Manager.

IV FURNISHINGS

- 1. Items bought or accepted for the older section of Meadow Garden must pre-date 1821.
- Furnishings of the two (2) main floor rooms and the two (2) upstairs rooms in the newer section may be dated post 1820 but these rooms should be considered companion rooms to the rest of the house and furnished accordingly with all efforts made to keep furnishings of these four rooms dated no later than 1850.
- Reproductions may be used only when the physical condition of the antique is jeopardized by exposure in areas where large numbers of visitors have easy access; or when environmental conditions including excessive light, dust, humidity or airborne impurities pose a threat to the preservation of originals.
- Effective March 12, 1983 all items donated to Meadow Garden shall be accepted with the written condition that they become the property of Meadow Garden and may be used, replaced or sold at the discretion of the Meadow Garden Board only.
- All items that post date 1821, with the exception of those in the six (6) rooms of the newer section and those described in Number 3 of this section, shall be replaced as soon as possible with similar items pre-dating 1821.
- Once an item is placed, it shall not be moved from one location to another without permission of the Meadow Garden Board. Only the Chairman of the Board may approve the removal of an item from the house, if it is in need of repair or refinishing.
- 7. Any item donated or purchased must have written documentation of appraisal.
- 8. A file will be kept of all assets with information as to price paid or market value, date of acquisition, donor or where bought, documentation and appraisal and a description of article. One file will be kept in the reception room accessible to the Docents; a duplicate file will be in the possession of the Chairman of the Board.
- 9. All items purchased or donated will be added to the Fine Arts insurance policy. Said

policy will be reviewed and updated a minimum of once a year. Major additions to furnishings will be added immediately.

10. Future plagues shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings on the property.

V LANDSCAPING

- 1. The landscape plan adopted by the Board shall be adhered to with no deviation unless recommended by an authority on landscape design and care.
- Donations of shrubbery, plants or trees shall be accepted only when item is part of the master plan.
- 3. Work on the grounds will be under the sole direction of the Meadow Garden Board and the Landscaping Chairman. Supervision of actual work will be provided by the Meadow Garden Chairman or the Landscaping Chairman of Meadow Garden.

VI GIFT SHOP

- The Gift Shop will be operated by a committee appointed by the Chairman of the Board and will be responsible to the Board.
- Chairman of the committee will be responsible for all purchases, subject to the approval of the Board or the State Regent.
- Gift Shop operations will be self-supporting. In the event funds are needed for purchases, they may be advanced from available Meadow Garden funds and must be considered a loan and shall be repaid without interest within one (1) year from date of borrowing.
- 4. Profit from the Gift Shop shall be accounted for within the State Treasurer's books, with a percentage being transferred at the discretion of the Board at the end of the fiscal year and placed in the Maintenance Account. The audit of the Gift Shop operation shall be included in the annual audit of the Georgia State Society.

Bylaws

GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II OBJECTS

The objects of this Society shall be:

- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.
- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.
- (3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of the Georgia State Society.

Article IV OFFICERS

- **Section 1.** The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian and a State Curator.
- **Section 2.** (a) To be eligible for state office, a member shall hold and have held membership in a chapter or chapters within the Georgia State Society for at least 5 years prior to her election and have served a full term as chapter officer or state chairman.
- (b) No member shall be eligible to the same state office for two (2) successive terms. A member having served more than one half of a term in a state office shall be deemed to have served a full term.
- (c) No two state officers shall be members of the same chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.
- (d) To be eligible for the office of State Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State First Vice Regent or as State Second Vice Regent or served in each of these two offices of the Georgia Society.
- (e) To be eligible for the office of State First Vice Regent or for the office of State Second Vice Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State Recording Secretary or as State Treasurer of the Georgia State Society and shall have served a full term as a Chapter Regent of a chapter in the Georgia State Society.

Section 3. In recognition of valuable service to the Georgia State Society, a State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent for life by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Article V NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

- **Section 1.** (a) A candidate for state office shall request the endorsement of her chapter, taken by vote at a regular meeting of the chapter held between May and January preceding the State Conference at which state elections are held. The endorsement, signed by the Chapter Recording Secretary, shall include the office the candidate seeks and shall be received by the State Regent with the candidate's statement of intent to be a candidate prior to any announcement or campaigning by the candidate and/or her supporters.
- (b) A candidate for State Regent who wishes to present a slate of officers shall send to the State Regent in one packet the chapter endorsements and the statements of intent for each of her selected candidates. If received by the State Regent no later than December 1, these candidates shall be listed as a slate in the State Regent's Call to State Conference.
- (c) Candidates wishing to run independently of a slate, whose chapter endorsements and statements of intent are received by the State Regent no later than December 1 shall be listed as independent candidates in the State Regent's Call to State Conference.
- (d) A candidate whose chapter endorsement and statement of intent have been properly received by the State Regent may choose to announce her candidacy separate from the State Regent's Call to State Conference. Such a chapter endorsement and statement of intent shall be received by the State Regent at least ten (10) days prior to the opening of the State Conference at which the election is to take place.
- (e) A candidate who does not meet the requirements of these Bylaws shall be declared disqualified and ineligible for consideration for state office.
- (f) A chapter shall endorse no more than one chapter member for state office per election with the possible exception of candidates for State Regent and for State Corresponding Secretary.
- (g) In the event of the death, incapacitation or withdrawal of a candidate prior to the election, a replacement shall be made with notification in writing to the State Regent and accompanied by the chapter endorsement and statement of intent as directed by these Bylaws.
- **Section 2.** Nominations of candidates for all state offices shall be made at a designated meeting of the State Conference.
- **Section 3.** The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected biennially by ballot at the State Conference. A majority vote shall elect. Independent candidates shall be listed on the ballot in a separate column from those candidates presented as a slate.
- **Section 4.** The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two (2) years or until their successors are elected. Their terms of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.
- **Section 5.** (a) Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become State Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become State First Vice Regent subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. Vacancies in other state offices shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next State Board of Management meeting or State Conference, whichever shall come first.
- (b) Any state officer who is absent from the state for a continuous period of six (6) months or longer shall automatically relinquish her position as a state officer.
- **Section 6.** Upon the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Organizing Secretary General.
- **Section 7**. (a) A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot.

- (b) The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than eighteen (18) months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.
- (c) The endorsement shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent with the candidate's name and address to the Recording Secretary General to be received by the first day of the month preceding the designated Continental Congress.

Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall perform the duties prescribed in this article, and parliamentary authority adopted by the Society, and such others as the State Board of Management and the National Society may require.

Section 2. The State Regent shall:

- (a) be the chief executive officer and the official spokesman for the State Society;
- (b) have general supervision of the affairs of the State Society;
- (c) preside at all meetings of the State Conference, State Board of Management and the Executive Committee:
- (d) appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society;
 - (e) be ex-officio a member of all committees:
- (f) appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as advisor in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting;
- (g) sign all contracts and agreements made in the name of the Georgia State Society with the recorded approval of the Executive Committee and the State Board of Management or the State Conference as directed by these Bylaws;
- (h) be bonded and have the authority to draw upon funds of the State Society with the approval of the Finance Committee.
- (i) recommend to the Finance Committee a Certified Public Accountant who shall be approved by the Finance Committee.

Section 3. The State First Vice Regent shall:

- (a) perform the duties of the office of State Regent in the absence or inability of the State Regent;
 - (b) fill a vacancy in the office of State Regent;
 - (c) Perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;
- (d) serve on those committees as designated by these Bylaws and as directed by the State Regent.

Section 4. The State Second Vice Regent shall:

- (a) perform the duties of the office of State First Vice Regent in the absence or inability of the State First Vice Regent;
 - (b) fill a vacancy in the office of State First Vice Regent;
 - (c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;
 - (d) serve on committees as directed by the State Regent.

Section 5. The State Chaplain shall:

- (a) open all meetings of the State Conference and the State Board of Management with scripture reading and prayer;
- (b) preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and conduct such other religious services as may be required;
 - (c) be custodian of state properties pertaining to the duties of this office;
 - (d) be responsible for IN MEMORIAM pages in the Proceedings.

Section 6. The State Recording Secretary shall:

(a) record the proceedings of the meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;

- (b) compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and the Proceedings Committee.
- (c) submit to the appropriate National officers, the endorsement for Vice President General and the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent by the first day of the month preceding the month of Continental Congress of the year in which said balloting was held;

Section 7. The State Corresponding Secretary shall:

- (a) conduct correspondence and send notices on behalf of the State Regent, the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as may be directed by them:
- (b) receive from the chapters the Master Questionnaires and distribute to the appropriate state chairmen.

Section 8. The State Organizing Secretary shall:

- (a) assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new chapters;
- (b) assist chapters in conjunction with appropriate state officers and chairmen in revitalization.

Section 9. The State Treasurer shall:

- (a) be bonded:
- (b) be the custodian of the funds of the State Society, placing them in institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance:
- (c) receive the state dues and State Conference registration fees from the chapters and receive all sums contributed by the chapters for state and national projects, disbursing monthly to the Treasurer General all funds designated for national projects;
 - (d) disburse other funds only when authorized by the State Regent in writing;
- (e) keep an account of all sums received or disbursed by using the basic double entry form of bookkeeping according to accepted accounting procedures and keep receipts for all transactions:
- (f) prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference, sending a copy to the State Chairman of the Finance Committee ten (10) days in advance of each meeting:
- (g) be a member of the Finance Committee and an ex-officio member of the Credentials Committee:
- (h) balance and prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year; said audit by a Certified Public Accountant, shall be performed and delivered within forty-five (45) days of receipt of books.
- (i) An internal review of the State Treasurer's records shall be performed when a change in this office occurs after the close of the fiscal year. Following the review, the records shall be turned over to the new State Treasurer. The committee to review the books shall be composed of the State First Vice Regent, the immediate Past State Treasurer, the immediate past Finance Chairman and a current Chapter Regent appointed by the State Regent.

Section 10. The State Registrar shall:

- (a) when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution prove eligibility and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars;
 - (b) keep a correct list of all members in the state;
 - (c) report on membership to the State Conference;
 - (d) assist with the verification of the credentials;
- (e) be in possession of the computer and software owned by the Georgia State Society and see that it is maintained.

Section 11. The State Historian shall:

 (a) be in charge, within the state, of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General as well as those authorized by the Georgia State Society;

- (b) keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves within the state:
 - (c) prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General;
- (d) promote the study of American history, state and county history and historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the founding of our state and counties.

Section 12. The State Librarian shall:

- (a) serve as liaison between the Librarian General and the Georgia Chapters and disseminate general information on the NSDAR Library;
- (b) cooperate with the director of the Georgia Department of Archives and History, making the needs of the Archives known to the chapters;
- (c) collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing them wherever accepted in such libraries and Archives as may be chosen by the State Board of Management:
- (d) solicit, with the approval of the Executive Committee, contributions from the chapters for purchase of such books as requested by the office of the Librarian General, and/or the various libraries in Georgia which the State Society approves;
- (e) receive gifts of books and other printed material from the chapters to be donated to the approved libraries and Archives;
- (f) maintain a constant supply of bookplates to the NSDAR Library, the Georgia Department of Archives and History and for purchase by the chapters.

Section 13. The State Curator shall: be custodian of the State portable properties and shall have them properly stored and made ready for use at state meetings.

Section 14. All officers will keep a Procedure Book of Instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new officers to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. State Conference:

- (a) The annual meeting of the Georgia State Society shall be known as the State Conference. It shall be for the purpose of:
 - (1) receiving reports of officers, committees and Chapter Regents;
 - (2) electing officers biennially;
 - (3) promoting programs in furtherance of the objects of the Society;
 - (4) any other business that may arise:
 - i. annual budget shall be adopted.
- ii. all projects of the State Society requiring funding shall be voted upon at State Conference or ratified by members at State Conference if previously voted upon by the State Board of Management,
- iii. no project extending beyond the term of the presiding officer may be accepted at any meeting other than by vote at State Conference.
- (b) The State Conference will be held between February 1 and the time of the meeting of Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week;
 - (c) The State Regent shall fix the time and place of meetings;
- (d) The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credentials form to the chapters not less than sixty (60) days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 2. The voting members of the State Conference shall be:

- (a) the officers and Honorary State Regents of the State Society;
- (b) the officers and honorary officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state;
 - (c) the Chapter Regent, or in her absence, the Vice Regent or alternate of each chapter;
- (d) delegates or alternates of each chapter of the state as designated by the Bylaws of the National Society for representation at Continental Congress;
 - (e) one additional delegate from each chapter in the state.

Section 3. Only a chapter member in good standing whose credentials have been

completed in accordance with the instructions of the State Regent and the State Credentials Chairman for the State Conference and in accordance with the Standing Rules of the National Society shall be eligible to represent her chapter at state and national meetings.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the chapter, except in the case of the Regent or Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at an annual State Conference, shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the state of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference the privilege of the floor and the right to speak shall be accorded to the State Chairmen and State Vice Chairmen. They may not vote unless they are duly registered as voters of the State Conference.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Society may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen (15) days' notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Forty-five (45) voting members, representing not less than twenty (20) chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The state officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents and the Regents, or in their absence, the Vice Regents of the chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the fall, following the October meeting of the National Board, It may meet whenever called by the State Regent. A minimum of twenty (20) days' notice shall be given as to the time and place of any such meeting.

Section 3. Thirty (30) members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference or as proscribed by these Bylaws.

Section 5. State chairmen, vice chairmen, committee members of the National and Standing Committees and one (1) member from each chapter shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privilege of the floor and the right to speak, but may not vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article IX EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, shall attend the meetings, but may not vote.

Section 3. This Executive Committee shall:

- (a) perform such duties of the State Board of Management between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient;
- (b) meet at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three (3) members of the committee:
 - (c) vote by teleconference, e-mail or fax, if necessary;

- (d) receive and make recommendations for projects requiring expenditure of funds outside routine expenditures to be considered by the State Conference;
 - (e) make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. Decisions of the Executive Committee shall be acted upon at the next meeting of the State Board of Management or at State Conference, whichever shall come first.

Article X FINANCES

Section 1. (a) The fiscal year of the Georgia State Society shall be July 1 through the last day of June.

- (b) The annual budget, prepared by the Finance Committee, shall cover the fiscal year and be prepared on the basis of dues payable for the calendar year beginning December first preceding.
- (c) The Finance Committee shall propose the per capita amount and distribute according to the annual membership count. The per capita amount and distribution shall be indicated on the budget presented annually. Funds to be included in the per capita designations shall be Tamassee DAR School, Kate Duncan Smith DAR School, Berry College, Lucy Cook Peel Fund, McCall Genealogical Fund and Meadow Garden Maintenance.
- **Section 2.** The annual dues of chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be \$10.00 for each member of the chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1.
- **Section 3.** (a) Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the state dues, a conference registration fee of \$10.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under these Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether chapter is represented or not.
- (b) State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay a conference fee of \$10.00 at the time of registration.
- (c) Other members of the Georgia State Society who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a conference fee of \$7.00 at the time of registration.
- (d) All host chapters may charge a registration fee to those not purchasing a meal ticket to off-set the cost of hosting state/district meetings.
- **Section 4.** (a) The State Treasurer and the State Regent and such others entrusted with funds of the Georgia State Society as may be designated by the State Board of Management shall be bonded. (See Article VI, Sections 2 and 9);
- (b) The State Treasurer with the approval of the State Regent and the State Chairman of the Finance Committee shall place the funds of the Georgia State Society in financial institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage;
- (c) The placement of restricted savings funds and investment funds of the Georgia State Society shall be placed to the credit of the Georgia State Society by the State Treasurer under the direction of the Finance Committee. Monies may be invested in U. S. Treasury obligations or other interest bearing obligations of federally insured financial institutions;
- (d) The accounts of the State Treasurer shall be annually prepared for audit by a Certified Public Accountant immediately following the end of the State Society fiscal year and no later than July 15 and delivered to the CPA by that date;
- (e) Should the State Treasurer be incapacitated, the State Regent, after consultation with the Chairman of the Finance Committee and with the approval of the Executive Committee, shall appoint an Acting State Treasurer to serve until such time as the State Treasurer is able to resume her duties or a new State Treasurer is appointed and ratified as stated in Article V, Section 5 (a).

Section 5. The expenses incurred by the State Regent in the performance of duty shall be paid each year from the State Dues Fund:

(a) Five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) shall be taken each year to defray her necessary travel expenses;

(b) Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent, as budgeted, shall be paid by the State Treasurer who shall keep all receipts of these expenses. No expenses exceeding the budgeted amount shall be paid by the State Treasurer.

Section 6. At the close of the books annually, \$5,000.00 shall be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies Fund" so that at the end of each administration a total of \$10,000.00 will be reserved. This money is to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration.

Article XI COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Honorary State Regents of the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution shall function as an advisory committee to the State Regent and to the Georgia State Society.

Section 2. The State Regent shall appoint the following standing committees:

- (a) Bylaws: An Honorary State Regent shall be appointed as chairman and the committee shall be composed of two (2) other Honorary State Regents and one (1) member from each district:
- (b) Finance: This committee shall be composed of seven (7) members to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two (2) Honorary State Regents, one (1) active chapter regent and one (1) active chapter member, who shall not be an Honorary State Regent, nor a state officer, nor a chapter regent. One of the two Honorary State Regents shall be appointed chairman. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund. This committee shall have charge of all investments of the Georgia State Society funds.
- (c) Resolutions: This committee shall be composed of all Honorary State Regents, the State Parliamentarian and three (3) chapter members;
- (d) Proceedings: This committee shall be composed of the State Recording Secretary, the immediate past State Recording Secretary, State First Vice Regent and four (4) additional Daughters, at least one of whom shall be an Honorary State Regent.
- **Section 3.** The State Regent shall appoint such other committees, standing or special, as the State Conference shall authorize and actions of the State Board of Management and of the National Society shall require. The appointments shall be concurrent with the term of the State Regent making the appointments and shall terminate with the end of the administration.
- **Section 4.** Additional appointments may be made to any of the committees and vacancies shall be filled by the State Regent with timely notification to the membership.
- **Section 5.** The duties of committees shall be such as these Bylaws, the State Conference, the State Board of Management or the National Society shall prescribe.
- **Section 6.** All chairmen will keep a Procedure Book of instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

Article XII CHAPTERS

Section 1. To expedite the work of the Society, the chapters of the Georgia State Society shall be placed in geographical districts:

- (a) A chairman appointed by the State Regent shall coordinate the work of all chapters as needed; she shall be titled "Coordinator of Districts":
- (b) Each district shall have a Director appointed by the State Regent to work as a committee under the direction and supervision of the Coordinator of Districts and the State Regent.

Section 2. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April 1 in the year of chapter elections. The Chapter Regent shall report annually the names of the elected officers promptly on the form provided by the State Regent for this purpose, with copies to the

Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, and the State Recording Secretary.

Section 3. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent, the State Recording Secretary, and the District Director at the time designated by the State Regent.

Article XIII MEADOW GARDEN

Meadow Garden, property owned by the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, shall be operated as follows:

- (a) The governing body shall be the Board of Trustees composed of the following members: the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Chairman who shall be appointed by the State Regent;
- (b) The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the following members: the State Regent who shall serve as Chairman; the State First Vice Regent who shall serve as Secretary; the Chairman of Meadow Garden; the Regents of the Augusta and College Hill Chapters; the State Treasurer; two (2) Honorary State Regents; and the chairmen of the five (5) subcommittees appointed by the State Regent Docents, Furnishings, Landscaping, Shop, Patrons;
- (c) The Meadow Garden Board shall operate with Standing Rules approved by the State Conference.

Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. The current edition of *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised*, shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law in matters not covered by these Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

Article XV AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent, the State Parliamentarian, and the State Bylaws Chairman. The State Regent shall send a copy to each chapter, at least sixty (60) days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the Call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

Article XVI DISSOLUTION

Although the period of duration of the Georgia State Society is perpetual, if for any reason the State Society is to be dissolved or otherwise terminated, no part of the property of the Society or any of the proceeds shall be distributed to or inure to the benefit of any of the officers or members of the Society. Upon the dissolution of the Georgia State Society, assets shall be distributed by the Board of Management and/or the Executive Committee to and only to the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the local United States District Court, exclusively to such organization or organizations as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated within the meaning of section 501 (c)(3), with purposes and objectives consistent with those of the Georgia State Society.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year, a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24, 1899. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21) No Conference was held in 1911, the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912," and amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, page 211).

BYLAWS

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National or State Bylaws, and a current copy is to be filed with the State Parliamentarian.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS

Notice of change of address of members shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent and the State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHANGE OF NAME

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent and the State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHAPTER ELECTIONS

As soon as chapter elections are held, names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, 1776 D Street, NW, Washington, DC 2006-5303, the State Regent or the State Regent-Elect, the State Recording Secretary and the State Corresponding Secretary by May 1. The full Christian name of chapter officers shall be given, along with her husband's given name or initials, address, zip code, telephone number, fax and e-mail. In accordance with the National Bylaws, a Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years.

CHAPTER REPRESENTATION AT STATE AND NATIONAL MEETINGS

At the State Board of Management, a chapter is represented by the Chapter Regent, or in her absence by the First Vice Regent, and one non-voting member.

The voting representation of each chapter at the State Conference shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received by the State Treasurer by December 1. Membership less than 50: Regent, 1 Delegate, 4 Alternates, total votes 2; 50-199: Regent, 2 Delegates, 6 Alternates, total votes 3; 200-299: Regent, 3 Delegates, 8 Alternates, total votes 4; 300-399: Regent, 4 Delegates, 10 Alternates, total votes 5.

The voting representation of each chapter at Continental Congress shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received in the Office of the Treasurer General by December 1. Membership less than 50: Regent, no Delegate, 2 Alternates, total votes 1; 50-199: Regent, 1 Delegate, 4 Alternates, total votes 2; 200-299: Regent, 2 Delegates, 6 Alternates, total votes 3; 300-399: Regent, 3 Delegates, 8 Alternates, total votes 4.

CONFERENCE REGISTRATION FEE

On or before December 1, each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer the state dues and a Conference Registration Fee of \$10.00 per each delegate to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws. This fee is to be paid whether represented or not and is derived by recommendation of the Finance Committee to the Executive Committe.

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the Conference Registration Fee of \$10.00 at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters, shall pay a Conference Registration Fee of \$7.00 at the time of registration.

CONTRIBUTIONS

All contributions by chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

The Georgia State Society Fiscal year is July 1 to June 30. Bylaw Article X, Section 1. The State Treasurer should prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year. Bylaw Article VI, Section 6, (h).

DECEASED MEMBERS

Deaths shall be reported promptly to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Chaplain and the State Registrar by the corresponding Chapter officer. DUES

GEORGIA HOSPITALITY FUND

"WHEREAS, the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds a social event in Washington during Continental Congress which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society:

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$500.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes; and,

NOMINATIONS

The following resolution which applies to the announcement of the candidacy for State Regent appears in the Proceedings of the 20th State Conference, 1918:

RESOLVED, that it is the judgment of the Executive Board that announcements for State Regent should not be made...earlier than three months prior to the meeting of the Conference and they shall be furnished to the press for publication."

PROCEDURE BOOK OF INSTRUCTIONS FOR STATE OFFICERS AND STATE CHAIRMEN

If typed and submitted by mail, the report should be double spaced, on 8 1/2 x 11 inch unlined paper. DO NOT USE ANY TYPE OF LETTERHEAD. Follow the format as seen in Reports of State Officers and State Chairmen in the Proceedings. Margins should be: 11/2 inches from top of page 1 1/2 inches from left side; 1 inch from right side; 1 inch from bottom of page. Chapter Regents should exclude NSDAR Chapter Achievement Award and State Honor Roll, as these will be added when confirmed. Your name should be consistent with the lists of Chapter Regents and State Chairmen as found in this *Proceedings*. Winners of awards and awards to be offered shall each be listed on separate sheets identified with the title of the committee and the award. Reports and awards to be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary by the following deadlines; Chapter Regents by February 1; State Officers and State Chairmen by March 1.

PROCEEDINGS MATERIAL, ABSOLUTE DEADLINE FOR

"WHEREAS, a definite deadline must be established and adhered to for all reports and material to be in the hands of the Proceedings Committee in order to be delivered to the printer by June 1.

RESOLVED: That all FINAL reports and materials must be received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1 with the exception of the Auditor's Report and any information sent out by the National DAR Headquarters. This does not alter the requirement in the "Items of Information" in the Proceedings that all reports shall be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary on or before February 15, the ORIGINAL being sent to the Secretary for the Proceedings.

AND FURTHER RESOLVED: This policy will be strictly adhered to and the material not received by the State Recording Secretary by Mar 1 will be omitted from the Proceedings." Adopted.

PROCEEDINGS DISTRIBUTION

Three copies to the State Regent and three copies to the State Recording Secretary. One copy each to the following: immediate past State Regent; Honorary State Regents; State Officers; immediate past State Officers; Chapter Regents for use in the chapter; State Chairmen and State Vice Chairmen of State and National Committees; immediate past State Chairmen and State Vice Chairmen of State and National Committees. In addition, the following copies are provided: one copy to the National Parliamentarian, NSDAR, 1776 D Street, NW, Washington, DC 20006-5303; one copy to the Hightower family; and, one copy to the family of a deceased member to whose memory the Proceedings is dedicated. RESERVE FOR CONTINGENCIES FUNDS

NEW ADMINISTRATION RESERVE: At the close of the books annually, \$5,000.00 shall be kept in the General Fund, so that at the end of each administration a total of \$10,000.00 will be reserved. This money is to be used to pay for the *Proceedings* of the previous administration and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration. Proceedings 2003-2004, Bylaws: Article X – Finance, Section 6.
