Wilhoit McCorkle, Recording Secretary; Marilyn Greer Moulton Wright, Corresponding Secretary; Joyce Ball Patton, Organizing Secretary; Phyllis Johnson Tanner, Treasurer; Melodye G. Brown, Registrar; Therry Nash Deal, Historian; Robin Redfearn Towns, Librarian; Monie Davis Moody, Curator.

Ms. Reid welcomed the officers and the State Parliamentarian, Dorothy Corn Hoff. The State Regent stated the March 26, Executive Committee minutes were mailed to all officers. The minutes were approved as mailed.

The passing of the flower pots for Meadow Garden has proven successful, and Jo Lynne Petriello McEwen. who decorated the flower pots, has been recognized as a Meadow Garden Patron-in-Kind. Others who have been honored as Patrons-in-Kind are: Jeff Vinson, General Manager, Best Buy Store in Morrow; Jerry Leonard, Manager, Lowe's in Fayetteville; and Cathy Hodge, Editor/Publisher, Georgia Voyager Magazine. Other accomplishments to create awareness of Meadow Garden include billboard space to be donated for a period of one to three months and enhanced road signage in the Augusta area. An electronic inventory of items at Meadow Garden is being compiled. Opening Meadow Garden on Saturdays is being studied. The Meadow Garden Patrons Project of "700 in 2007" is well underway. The replacement of the cedar shake shingled roof is to begin this fall.

The State Regent shared the following highlights from the National Board of Management Meetings in July and October. The Georgia delegation's seating at the 116th Continental Congress will be on the floor, section 12. The DAR Store current order blanks are yellow. The 2006-2007 National Directory is available at

the DAR Store. Appointments to the National DAR Speakers' Staff are for the duration of the President General's administration. State DAR Speakers' Staff appointees are for the duration of the State Regent's administration. DAR Magazine subscriptions have increased by 3,000. Georgia had co-op ads in the November/December issue of the Newsletter, and three Georgia articles appeared in the Newsletter. She encouraged all chapters to send an article to the DAR magazine newsletter. A "conservation appraisal" is being done of the NSDAR buildings which will identify maintenance needs, and a capital improvement plan is being developed per the results of this appraisal. National Society is developing a Business Continuation Plan to address how the National Society would function in case of a disaster. All DAR Scholarships are being reviewed. The President General's Project, which was initiated in the past President General's administration, was projected to take nine years to complete at a cost of eighteen million dollars. This project will be completed in six years at a total cost of eight million dollars. By December 1, 2006, the DAR Genealogical Data Base will be available to DAR members. There is a new ornament of Memorial Continental Hall available. The last DAR national number issued is 846841. The fifth annual DAR Christmas Open House will be December 6, 2006. The DAR Library "wish list" is online.

The State Regent expressed appreciation to the Archibald Bulloch Chapter, Patricia Lamb Long, Regent, for hosting the State Board of Management. She praised the members of the Georgia State Society and thanked them for being supportive and receptive to new ideas.

Mrs. Chastain thanked Ms. Reid for her gracious leadership. A rising vote of appreciation was given the State Regent for her efforts on behalf of the Georgia State Society.

The State Regent resumed the chair and introduced the **Chairman of Credentials**, Dianne Brown Cannestra, who gave the first Credentials Committee report. Seventy-one voting members of the State Board of Management representing 72 chapters registered. In attendance were: 12 State Officers, 1 National Officer, 7 Honorary State Regents, 51 Chapter Regents, for a total voting strength of 71. Also registered are 1 State Parliamentarian, 1 National Chairmen, 2 National Vice Chairmen, 28 State Chairmen, 11 State Vice Chairmen, 40 chapter members, and three guests, for a total registration without duplication of 157 representing 72 chapters. By recommendation of the Credentials Committee Mrs. Cannestra moved the adoption of the report. Adopted. The State Regent declared a quorum established as specified in the State Bylaws.

The **State First Vice Regent**, Barbara Blakely Chastain, announced it was her honor to bring greetings at two grave markings on behalf of the State Regent and attend other events with the State Regent. Mrs. Chastain reported the Georgia Luncheon at Continental Congress will be held at the JW Marriott on Friday, June 29, 2007 at noon. The price has not been determined.

The **State Second Vice Regent**, Sally McGlaun Baldwin, announced that over 1700 pounds of thrift were collected for Tamassee and Crossnore schools at the district workshops. She will be collecting more thrift at this meeting. Mrs. Baldwin encouraged members to purchase the National School Chairman's butterfly pins for \$25 each and to support the State Regent's Projects at all of the schools. She also has DVDs and videos of the schools for loan to chapters.

The **State Chaplain**, Virginia Grace Lingelbach, announced there have been 76 deaths reported in the Georgia State Society since State Conference in March 2006, and sympathy cards were mailed to the families. Mrs. Lingelbach stressed the importance of receiving the complete address of the next-of-kin. The Memorial Service at State Conference will be in St. John's Church in Savannah. Birthday cards were sent to members ninety years of age and older.

The **State Recording Secretary**, O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle, stated work is underway on the 2006-2007 Proceedings and asked that instructions be adhered to in the submission of reports. Ms. McCorkle requested the First Vice Regent take the chair while the members vote on a recommendation from the Executive Committee.

The Executive Committee recommends to the State Board of Management that \$500.00 be donated to the NSDAR Library in honor of the Georgia State Regent, Laura Marcella Reid, for purchase of books for the Georgia shelf. The check will be sent after January 1, 2007, for use in that year. Recommendation adopted.

The State Regent resumed the chair and continued with the State Officers' reports.

The **State Corresponding Secretary**, Marilyn Moulton Wright, reported the Master Questionnaire is available at this meeting and is due the first of February. There is also an electronic version available. Mrs. Wright announced all State Directories had been sold. Certificates of Award/Appreciation are available at \$0.15 per copy.

The **State Organizing Secretary**, Joyce Ball Patton, reported two members, one from Fort Peachtree Chapter and one from Augustin Clayton Chapter, have transerred to member-at-large status to become Organizing Chapter Regents. The Lyman Hall Chapter will be disbanded at the February meeting of the National Board of Management.

The **State Treasurer**, Phyllis Johnson Tanner, gave the financial report with the following summary of Georgia State Society accounts as of October 20, 2006; checking balance \$7,021.47; money market account balance \$88,067.82; and certificates of deposit totaling \$36,873.45; making total assets equal \$131,962.74. The financial report was filed.

Marjorie Garner, **Finance Chairman**, reported that the Finance Committee recommends to the State Board of Management that funds for the leasing of a private server, to be used by the Georgia State Society's website at the cost of \$4,200, for a 2-year period, be taken from the Georgia State Society unallocated/general savings money market account. Mrs. Garner moved to amend the recommendation to omit "at the cost of \$4,200, for a 2-year period." The motion to amend the recommendation was seconded and approved.

The amended recommendation, which now reads "that funds for the leasing of a private server, to be used by the Georgia State Society's website, be taken from the Georgia State Society unallocated/general savings money market account." The amended recommendation was seconded and approved.

The **State Registrar**, Melodye G. Brown, reported chapter yearbooks had been received from 90 chapters. The current Georgia membership count is 6,910. Ms. Brown stated that 2,503 new members were approved at the National Board of Management meeting in October which is the largest number in the last twelve

years. The Supplemental Task Force continues progress on the supplemental backlog.

The **State Historian**, Therry Nash Deal, reminded the members of deadlines for the Outstanding Teacher of American History Contest, DAR History Award Medal submissions, and the American History/Christopher Columbus Essay submission.

The **State Librarian** and the State **DAR Library Chairman**, Robin Redfearn Towns, encouraged chapter members to support the NSDAR Library by giving monetary and book donations. She stated there was a new method for ordering Record Copies from the NSDAR Library. Georgia Bookplates are available to personalize books that are donated.

The **State Curator**, Monie Davis Moody, reported it is a pleasure being the caretaker and transporter of the properties of the Georgia State Society.

After a brief break, Edwina Beall asked the First Vice Regent to take the chair while she read the **DAR Schools Per Capita Resolutions**. The resolutions were approved. (The resolutions are printed in their entirety at the conclusion of the State Conference minutes.)

The State Regent resumed the chair and called for reports from other State Chairman: State Honor Roll, Jacqueline Lawrence Keller, reminded everyone of important deadlines. DAR School, Hightower Award, Sally Baldwin, reported each chapter is required to donate to Tamassee and Kate Duncan Smith a total amount that is equal to or above the chapter's official membership count. The official chapter membership count is found next to your chapter name in the 2005-2006 Proceedings. Each chapter should have at least one full program on the DAR Schools or a two-minute spotlight at each of your chapter meetings. State Treasurer, Phyllis Tanner, clarified when new members pay state and national dues. Lanette Reid, Honorary State Regent, explained important information regarding the completion of the Credentials forms for State Conference and Continental Congress.

Meadow Garden Chairmen reported: Francis Rush Nevins, Regent, College Hill Chapter, gave the report for the Meadow Garden Museum Chairman. She announced the Augusta Historic Candlelight Tour is held November 24, 25, and 26, and bake sale items are needed for that event. The Georgia State Society was presented the 2006 Stewardship Award for Preservation of Historic Properties for work at Meadow Garden by Historic Augusta. Meadow Garden was also highlighted in the November issue of the Augusta Magazine featuring a story on George Walton and Meadow Garden. Meadow Garden Furnishings, Patricia Cown Burnam, stated over 1,000 items had already been inventoried, and now the items acquired during year 2006 are being inventoried. Meadow Garden Gift Shop, Charlotte Christian, encouraged members to purchase the items on sale and the new products available at the Meadow Garden table. Meadow Garden Patrons, Joyce Patton, asked all members and chapters consider becoming a Patron of Meadow Garden so that the Society may reach its goal of 700 Patrons in 2007. Meadow Garden Public Relations, Phyllis Fox Lawson, presented to the State Regent a check from the Georgia State Society CAR for \$250.00 to be applied to the restoration of the busts of the three signers of the Declaration of Independence. Mrs. Lawson also presented to the State Regent a copy of the DVD and written program of Meadow Garden. She announced that she had 26 flower pots available for sale that students at the Joseph Sams School had decorated as a community service project.

The State Regent recognized Laura Belle Macrae of the Lachlan McIntosh Chapter, who has been a member for 65 years. Ms. Reid then recognized Barbara Jones Victor, Regent, Savannah Chapter, to make an announcement regarding the 109th State Conference. Mrs. Victor invited the members to Savannah, March 11-14, 2007, for an outstanding State Conference.

Following the Blessing by the State Chaplain, Ms. Reid recessed the meeting for lunch.

At the conclusion of lunch, the meeting was reconvened by the State Regent with the following reminders. (1) Do not limit donations for State Scrapbook to just one item, but share many chapter events. (2) Reporting year is March 1, 2006 through the last day of February 2007. Master Questionnaire is due by February 1. Send February activity information directly to the appropriate chairmen. (3) State Honor Roll Form item #12 the deadline for receipt of Master Questionnaire to be February 1. (4) Chapter yearbooks were to be sent to the State Regent and State Registrar before October 25, 2006. If you wish to participate in the contest, send a copy to the Program Chairman. (5) The 109th State Conference will be in Savannah at the DeSoto Hilton on March 11-14, 2007, due to hotel availability and hotel rates at this time of year in Savannah.

Edwina Beall asked the State First Vice Regent to take the chair while she read the courtesy resolutions. Courtesy resolutions were adopted. (The resolutions are printed in their entirety at the conclusion of the State Conference minutes.)

The State Regent resumed the chair and called for the final credentials report. Dianne Cannestra, gave the final report of the Credentials Committee indicating 12 State Officers, 1 National Officer, 9 Honorary State Regents, 58 Chapter Regents, for a total voting strength of 79. Also registered are 1 State Parliamentarian, 3 National Chairmen, 13 National Vice Chairmen, 43 State Chairmen, 18 State Vice Chairmen, 40 chapter members, and three guests, for a total registration without duplication of 166 representing 79 chapters. By recommendation of the Credentials Committee she moved the adoption of the report. Adopted. Mrs. Cannestra introduced and thanked her committee members: Audrey Litts, Helen Martin, Sandra McPhaul, Julia Prince, Phyllis Tanner, and Melodye Brown.

Reports continued with the State Chairmen/Vice Chairman of National Committees: American Heritage, Betty Keener Samaras, emphasized the categories of competition and stressed the need to pay attention to which vice chairmen entries are to be sent. American Indians, Carolyn Baker Balog, stated the proclamation announcing November as "American Indian Month" was signed by the Governor of Georgia. She presented the proclamation to the State Regent. Conservation, Julia Douglass Spivey, encouraged all chapters to give a conservation award or sponsor a chapter project. DAR Magazine, Betty Brown Harrah, reminded members the co-op ad money is due on February 28 from the chapters and to mail the check directly to her. She also asked for any pictures from chapters that may be used in the six-page spread to be sent to her. DAR Service for Veterans, Rebecca Miller Rostron, encouraged all members to send Christmas cards to veterans and to active military. She would provide a list of

facilities and web addresses for convenience. **National Defense**, Barbara Kelly Tornow, encouraged all members to vote on Election Day.

Scrapbook, Glenda Hendry Carter, requested more articles from chapters be sent for the State Regent's Scrapbook. Awards for this committee will be presented at State Conference. State Genealogy Consultant, Diane McCranie Redkevitch, stated space available at the Genealogy Workshop to be held in Kennesaw, Georgia, on April 24-25, 2007. Travel Coordinator, C. Martelia Cunningham, announced there will be a train trip instead of a bus trip from Georgia to Washington, DC, in June 2007 for Continental Congress, and details will be forthcoming. The State Regent expressed thanks to all for attending and wished everyone a safe trip home. Following announcements, the meeting concluded with the singing of "God Bless America" led by Shelby Whitson. The Benediction was given by the State Chaplain. The State Board of Management Meeting was adjourned at 2:10 p.m.

Called Meeting

May 9, 2007

The Called Meeting of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, met on May 9, 2007, at Idle Hour Country Club in Macon with the **State Regent**, Laura Marcella Reid, presiding and **State Recording Secretary**, O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle, present at the meeting.

The meeting was called to order at 11:35 a.m. for the purpose of voting of the proposed Bylaw amendments. The **State Chaplain**, Virginia Grace Lingelbach, gave the Invocation. The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America was led by Catherine Derst Miller, State Chairman, **Flag of the United States of America**. To amend Article VIII – State Board of Management. Section 5 by substitution. Section 5 as amended would then read, "State Chairmen, vice chairmen, committee members of National and Statnding Committees <u>may</u> attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privilege of the floor and the right to speak but shall not vote. <u>One (1) member from each chapter may attend the meetings, if invited by the chapter regent, and shall be granted the privilege of the floor, but shall not have the right to speak or vote. Adopted.</u>

The State Regent called for the final credentials report. Chairmen, 5 National Vice Chairmen, 15 State Chairmen, 13 State Vice Chairmen, 2 Alternates, 2 chapter members, and 1 guest for a total registration without duplication of 94 representing 37 chapters. By recommendation of the Credentials Committee the chairman moved the adoption of the report. Adopted. Mrs. Cannestra introduced and thanked her committee members: Audrey Litts, Helen Martin, Sandra McPhaul, Julia Prince, Phyllis Tanner, and Melodye Brown.

The blessing was offered by the State Chaplain, Mrs. Lingelbach.

Following lunch and several announcements, the State Regent expressed her gratitute to Anne Murphey for making the arrangements for the meeting at the Idle Hour Country Club. Ms. Reid thanked Mrs. Hanf and the Bylaws Committee for their efficiency and diligence. She thanked all those who attended the meeting.

Reports of State Officers

STATE REGENT Laura Marcella Reid

This State Regent is grateful to each of you for placing your confidence in her to represent you and the Georgia State Society, NSDAR. She is full of pride each time she has an opportunity to brag on the work the Georgia Daughters are accomplishing. You have exceeded this State Regent's expectations and she is grateful to each of you for your continuous efforts to promote the objectives of DAR, and to always offer to "lend a hand." "Daughters hands reach out to serve" has been the perfect way to epitomize a Georgia Daughter. Through the labors of your hands the Georgia State Society has had many achievements. The 2006-2008 State Project of Meadow Garden has made great strides with their goal of relating the story of George Walton and Meadow Garden throughout the state of Georgia. Ultimately this State Regent would like Meadow Garden and George Walton to be "household" names, hoping Meadow Garden will be acclaimed as one of the great attributes of the State of Georgia. Historic Augusta, Inc., at their annual meeting, presented the 2006 Stewardship Award for Historic Preservation to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, for their efforts in historic preservation at Meadow Garden. In November Meadow Garden was one of four historic homes in the Augusta area to participate in the Historic Holiday Candlelight Tour. development, production and distribution of a DVD telling the story of George Walton and Meadow Garden were completed in December. Approximately 561 DVD's were distributed to all public Georgia Middle Schools and to private middle schools with enrollments of 300 plus. Another 110 DVD's and a written program on Meadow Garden were distributed to every Georgia DAR Chapter at the State Board of Management Meeting in November. DVD's are also available in the Meadow Garden Gift Shop. A second DVD, giving a virtual tour of Meadow Garden, is in the process of being developed and will be available soon. The virtual tour will enable us to share a Meadow Garden tour with any physically handicapped visitor who comes to Meadow Garden. Billboard space featuring Meadow Garden has been donated along I-20 and other major highways. The final approval of the artwork for these signs is proximate. Meetings with the Department of Transportation have resulted in a commitment for enhancement of Meadow Garden road signage and additional signage in the Augusta area. An assession and deassession progam for the items at Meadow Garden is being developed and installed on Past & Perfect software. This program will assist us in the enforcement of the guidelines on what items are to be accepted into the collection, and it will help us know what treasures we truly possess, better manage the inventory, and provide us with valuable knowledge. Pedestals for the three busts of the Georgia Signers of the Declaration of Independence have been made to give an appropriate display for the busts. Restoration of these busts shall begin soon. Meadow Garden will be featured as "the historic preservation" segment of a National Membership Video being produced by the Texas State Society and DAR National Headquarters. This video will have a shelf life of ten years. It will make its debut on Opening Night of the 116th Continental Congress. The Meadow Garden Gift Shop has a temporary new home in the Board Room and has

expanded their product line. The tireless work of the Georgia Daughters on the Meadow Garden Board never ceases to amaze me. They are to be commended for their commitment, their knowledge and their enthusiasm. This State Regent wants to acknowledge the State Second Vice Regent, who also serves as State Chairman, DAR Schools, for her efforts in collecting thrift at the state functions and delivering it to Tamassee DAR School and Crossnore School. She has delivered over 15 tons of thrift so far this administration. The 2006-2008 State Projects for the DAR Schools are as follows: (1) The project at Kate Duncan Smith DAR School is the purchase of white boards for the middle and high schools. (2) The Tamassee DAR School project is to ensure the completion of the Whitson Administration Project for the repairs to the interior walls of the May Erwin Talmadge Auditorium, including the correction of the problem causing the deterioration. Then we will pursue the 2006-2008 State Project, which is the replacement of the curtains for the stage, including the proscenium, the legs and the back drop. (3) At Berry College the project is the establishment of a perpetual, annual award named the "Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, Student Teaching Award for Community Service," This award is to be given to a student in the College of Education for outstanding community service, which all students studying education are required to do. The recipient is to be chosen by the Dean and staff of the College of Education and will be awarded at the Awards Night Program in May each year. The minimum amount of the award is \$150.00 paid with the interest earned from the principal. It is named the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Community Service Award, so future administrations that do not have a specific project in mind may increase the principal of this award. Currently the Georgia State Society has over \$461,000.00 in loans or scholarship funds at colleges and universities throughout the state. The majority of these funds are currently not being used by the students due to the requirements to qualify. Negotiations with the University system are in progress to hopefully convert these loan funds to scholarships in order to make the funds more accessible to students. A Chapter Membership Profile has been initiated statewide to identify expertise in a variety of areas and to establish a reference/resource network for internal use for the leadership of the Georgia State Society. The compilation of a Georgia State Society Cookbook is being pursued. Monies raised from the sale of the cookbook will go to the State Regent's Projects. This State Regent has twice visited the Governor's Office for the signing of proclamations. In September with the National Chairman and the State Chairman of Constitution Week for the signing of the Proclamation designating September 17-23, 2006, as Constitution Week in Georgia. In November with the State Chairman of American Indians and the National Southeastern Vice Chairman of Commemorative Events for the signing of the Proclamation designating November 2006 as American Indians Month in Georgia. The President General's Office has just advised that Georgia has 100% Chapter Participation for the President General's Project. The Chapter Regents will receive their 100% Chapter Participation Certificates in their packets this evening. The State's target was \$41,754.00 (based on 6,987 members) and received to date is \$45,568.00. This State Regent is proud to announce the organization of a new chapter, the Sandy Springs Chapter, confirmed at the February National Board of Management. E. Lynn Brackey, Organizing Regent. Congratulations to you! Another chapter is organizing in Fayette County, the John

Waldrop Chapter. Betty Brown Harrah, Organizing Regent, will hopefully be receiving confirmation at the April National Board of Management. And yet another chapter is in the initial stages of forming in Watkinsville, Oconee County, which is attentive to the needs and the schedules of the professionals and working members. Dana McCoy Anderson is the Organizing Regent, and we wish her the very best. All three of these organizing chapters have gained new members for our Society and have resurrected some members through reinstatements. This State Regent commends these organizing leaders for their stamina and their sensitivity in their efforts to make DAR more readily available to those who are interested. The number of awards being offered this year by the State Chairmen will astound you. Georgia Daughters are recognizing those in the community who have contributed to the progress of their communities. Accolades go to Chapter Regent, Marilyn Davis Daniel, and to the members of the General Jared Irwin Chapter in Sandersville for raising \$37,000.00 to have a statue of George Washington created and erected in the DAR Park on Highway 15 in Sandersville, which was dedicated on Washington's birthday, February 22. And this State Regent recently attended a very entertaining Georgia Day Program in Upson County organized and sponsored by members of the John Houstoun Chapter, Peggy Burch Greene, Chapter Regent. As this State Regent travels throughout the state being graciously welcomed and greeted by the Georgia Daughters. Our members are our greatest asset. INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

The Board of Directors Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution Alpharetta, Georgia

We have audited the accompanying statement of financial position – modified cash basis of Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution (Georgia State Society, NSDAR) (a nonprofit organization) as of June 30, 2007, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses and cash flows – modified cash basis for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Organization's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

June 30, 2007

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This summary of significant accounting policies of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR (the Organization) is presented to assist in understanding the Organization's financial statements. The financial statements and notes are representations of the Organization's management, who is responsible for their integrity and objectivity.

1. Nature of Organization

The Georgia State Society, NSDAR (the "Organization") is a volunteer women's service organization created to promote patriotism, preserve American history, and secure America's future through better education for children.

2. Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Organization have been prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting, a comprehensive basis of accounting other than Generally Accepted Accounting Principles. Accordingly, revenue is recorded when received rather than when earned and expenses are recorded when paid rather than when incurred.

3. Basis of Presentation

Financial statement presentation follows the recommendation of the Financial Accounting Standards Board in its Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations. Under SFAS No. 117, the Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted, temporarily restricted, and permanently restricted. A description of the three net asset categories follows:

Unrestricted

Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed restrictions. Unrestricted net assets may be designated for specific purposes by action of the Board of Directors.

Temporarily Restricted

Net assets whose use is subject to donor-imposed restrictions that can be fulfilled by actions of the Organization pursuant to those restrictions or that expire by the passage of time.

Permanently Restricted

Net assets subject to donor-imposed restrictions that they be maintained permanently by the Organization.

4. Use of Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts and disclosures. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, continued

5. Cash and Cash Equivalents

For the purposes of the statement of financial position and the statement of cash flows, the Organization considers all cash on hand, highly liquid bank deposits, and short-term debt securities with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

6. Property and Equipment

Major preservation or restoration projects are capitalized and depreciated over an estimated useful life of fifteen years. Additions and betterments of \$750 or more are capitalized, while maintenance and repairs that do not improve or extend the useful lives of the respective assets are expensed currently. Depreciation is provided for in amounts sufficient to relate the cost of depreciable assets to operations over their estimated service lives, principally using the straight-line and 200% declining balance methods.

The Organization does not capitalize collections and historical treasurers. Meadow Garden and its contents are historical treasures and are insured for approximately \$325,000.

Depreciation expense for the year ended June 30, 2007 was \$5,807.

7. Donated Services

Many volunteers have made significant contributions of their time to develop and promote the programs of the Organization. The value of these donated services is not included in the accompanying financial statements, as such services do not create or enhance non-financial assets or require specialized skills. If donated services received either create or enhance non-financial assets or required specialized skill which would need to be purchased if not donated, the value of those donated services would be recorded in accordance with SFAS No. 116.

8. Other Contributions

In accordance with SFAS No. 116, contributions received are recorded as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted support depending on the existence and/or nature of donor restrictions. Contributions are recognized when received by the Organization. Conditions that are restricted by the donor are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets if the restrictions expire in the fiscal year in which the contributions are recognized. All other donor-restricted contributions are reported as increases in temporarily or permanently restricted net assets depending on the nature of the restrictions. When a restriction expires, restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets.

9. Membership Dues

Membership dues are recognized when received.

10. Advertising

Advertising costs are expensed as incurred. Advertising expense for the year ended June 30, 2007 was \$3,866.

11. Income Taxes

Georgia State Society, NSDAR, a nonprofit organization operating under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, is exempt from federal, state, and local income taxes and, accordingly, no provision for income taxes is included in the accompanying financial statements for the Organization.

NOTE B - FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS AND CONCENTRATIONS OF CREDIT RISK

The Organization's financial instruments that are exposed to concentrations of credit risk consist primarily of cash and cash equivalents.

The Organization maintains its cash deposits with highly rated financial institutions. At times, such deposits may be in excess of federally insured limits. The Organization has not experienced any losses in such accounts and believes it is not exposed to any significant risk of loss.

NOTE C - AFFILIATES

The Organization collects membership dues and donations from its local Georgia Chapters for the Organization and the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

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National Committee Reports

AMERICAN HERITAGE - Betty Keener Samaras

One hundred chapters have worked to preserve historic sites, to help educate others on cultural events and traditions, and to save quilters' stories by entering the various contests within the American Heritage Committee. Eighty-eight chapters reported programs or projects related to Historic Preservation. Twenty-seven chapters had one or more projects on historic preservation this year. Thirty-nine chapters had one or more programs about Historic preservation with a total of seventy- nine programs given. There were fifty-eight programs and projects given by forty-one chapters about cultural events and traditions. There were six Historic Preservation Medals given. Six chapters stated possible changes within this committee's focus in the future.

AMERICAN HISTORY - Ruth Odom Reddick

Reports were received from 102 chapters. American History programs were presented at 277 chapter meetings, and 196 were presented to other groups. Programs on Outstanding American Women numbered 46. selected women for the national project, Outstanding Women in American History. Displays totaled 157: 77 in schools and 80 in public places. American History publicity included 2257 spot announcements, 2592 TV and radio minutes, and 4320 press inches. The American History Essay Contest was sponsored by 60 chapters in 235 schools, with 5055 students in grades five through eight participating. Chapters awarded 3260 Certificates of Participation, 324 Certificates of Award, and 177 Bronze Medals. Christopher Columbus Essay Contest entries totaled 430 students from 36 high schools, with 140 Certificates of Participation presented. Chapters recognized Outstanding Work in American History by awarding 92 Certificates and 68 Bronze Medals. Through the generosity of 61 chapters, \$1950.00 was contributed to the Friends of American History Fund. The Vice Chairmen, Emily Reynolds, Ann Gibson-Adair, Jennifer Altman and Alice Jones, are commended for their excellent work with the chapters in their respective districts. This committee considers it a privilege to serve the State Regent and the State Society.

AMERICAN INDIANS - Carolyn Baker Balog

This Chairman presented 7 programs to 611 people; traveled 985 miles. Georgia Daughters contributed: \$1,423.00 - American Indian Scholarship Fund, \$2,377.50 - Friends of the American Indians, \$300 - other; \$1,526.00 - Indian Youth of America Summer Camp Program, \$780.50 - Bacone College, \$1,694.50 - Chemewa. Chapters programs - 41, "Indian Minutes" - 32, newsletters; and worked in their communities. Observance of American Indian Heritage Month: 14 displays, 18 local proclamations, Proclamation by Georgia Governor Perdue. Georgia Daughters made exemplary contributions to benefit American Indians.

AMERICANISM - Nancy Bunker Bowen

Statistics from 101 chapters prove Georgia Daughters continue to work hard-and creatively-to promote the objects of this committee, even though only 29

chapters have an Americanism chairman. Not only were more than 3,700 U.S. flags presented to schools, newly-naturalized citizens, Scout troops, and Boys and Girls Clubs, but nearly 50 chapters also participated in troop support rallies, welcome home receptions for U. S. military personnel, community parades, and other events celebrating American citizenship. The John Houston Chapter presented a flag once flown over the U.S. Capitol to a new citizen and the Colonel William Candler Chapter developed a citizenship game to assist three Bosnian adults learn about U. S. citizenship. Four chapters identified extraordinarily wellqualified nominees for medals sponsored by the Americanism Committee, all of which were approved by the National Chairman. The Commodore Richard Dale Chapter nominated Haley Kilpatrick (Albany) and the Vidalia Chapter nominated Rebecca Smelser (Vidalia) for the DAR Medal of Honor. The Old Unicoi Chapter presented the DAR Medal of Honor, approved last year, to Roy Hamby in June The Augustin Clayton Chapter nominated John Somchanh Singha (Jonesboro) and the General Daniel Newman nominated Camelia Siminescu (Buford) for the DAR Americanism Medal.

CHAPTER ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS - Mary Elizabeth Jackson

Ninety-four chapters submitted Chapter Achievement Award Forms. The chapter scoring the most points (2,538) in the State was Joseph Habersham. Certificates were presented to the following chapters for the top score in the four state districts: Northeast — Oliver Morton, Southeast — Vidalia, Southwest - Lt. James Monroe and Northwest - Joseph Habersham. Many thanks to Phyllis Tanner, Becky West, Betty Harrah and Sherri Roberts, who supplied this chairman with documentation to verify the reported information.

CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION - Iris Bridges McRee

Georgia daughters' hands have reached out and served the Georgia Society Children of the American Revolution in many ways. Thirty chapters reported participation with C.A.R., twenty chapters sponsored a C.A.R. Society, twenty chapters provided senior leadership for the organization, and fourteen chapters held joint activities with the C.A.R. The Georgia Daughters interacted with the C.A.R. in numerous programs, meetings and functions. During the past year nine young ladies became dual members of C.A.R. and DAR, and four transferred from C.A.R. to DAR as they aged out of C.A.R. Under the leadership of Arthur Hall, State President, the Georgia Society Children of the American Revolution successfully contributed to the American Revolution section of the new Infantry Museum. The Museum is being built at the home of the Infantry at Ft, Benning. GA. I would like to thank the Georgia Daughters for their support of this project, "Following in the Footsteps of Patriots". The future of C.A.R. is alive with more new and organizing societies than ever before. This is due to the leadership, financial support and promotion of membership provided by the Georgia Daughters. Each Daughter is commended for her efforts to train young people as future members of DAR.

COMMUNITY SERVICE - E. Lynn Brackey

The Community Service Award recognizes individuals for outstanding achievements in educational, humanitarian, patriotic, historical or citizenship

endeavors, and for environmental conservation. Contributions must be voluntary accomplished in a heroic, civic or benevolent manner. An individual who has participated in or organized community activities also is eligible. The recipient must not have received any salary or remuneration for services rendered. From 01 February 2006 to 31 January 2007, fourteen Georgia chapters submitted seventeen Community Service Award applications: Augustin Clayton, Chehaw, Cherokee, Col. William Candler (2), Commodore Richard Dale, Elijah Clarke, Fayette Starr's Mill (2), Fielding Lewis, Fort Peachtree, Lt. James Monroe, Martha Stewart Bulloch, Pulaski (2), Vidalia, and William McIntosh. The Georgia award winner was sent to district competition. That winner will be forwarded to National competition. The Commodore Richard Dale Chapter nominee, Haley Kilpatrick, who founded a mentor program for teen age girls, was selected as the Georgia Society's Award Winner for 2006-2007. Second Place - Cherokee Chapter nominee. Letitia Eubank Lanier, who raised funds through a public art event for Heritage Sandy Springs to develop an outdoor entertainment area. Third Place -Col. William Candler Chapter nominee, Dr. Stephen Charles Gurr, who developed original, educational programs for the Northeast Georgia History Center.

CONSERVATION - Julia Douglass Spivey

Reports from 80 chapters indicate that the Daughters have participated in a wide variety of clever conservation projects. Chestatee River Chapter can claim 177 baby bluebirds. The birdhouses were established; then the fledglings counted. Brier Creek assisted in banding wild wood ducks. Fielding Lewis is saving a Civil War battlefield. Fort Frederica is trying to save the monarch butterfly. Martha Stewart Bulloch and Joseph Habersham have selected plots at Oakland cemetery to work on. Brunswick Chapter works on Oak Grove Cemetery. John Houstoun worked on Glenwood Cemetery; John Benning at Westview Cemetery; Lt. James Monroe at Liberty Hill Baptist Church Cemetery. Eight energetic chapters have worked on sprucing up local libraries, nursing homes and school landscapes and providing children's nature walks. All the chapters are planting: trees (John Benson planted a tree at the "Center of the World" marker), wildlife habitat, wildflowers and best report of all Fayette-Starr's Mill is "planting a row for the hungry" and also awarded one of the six Conservation medals that were given state-wide. Awards for Outstanding Chapter projects: 1st Fayette-Starr's Mill, 2nd Fielding Lewis, 3rd Martha Stewart Bulloch.

CONSTITUTION WEEK - Mary Farthing Simonds

The Georgia State Society's Constitution Week celebration began with our Annual Constitution Week Luncheon, which included the presentation of the Georgia Constitution Week Proclamation to our State Regent Laura Reid. The highlight of this event was our speaker, Senator Johnny Isakson, whose message was praised for its relevancy to our nation's current struggles with security, liberty and constitutional issues. The Constitution Week Chapter Chairmen are commended for leading their chapters' promotion of Constitution Week. Ninety-four chapters reported creative Constitution Week activities, especially in education. Chapters visited schools, donated books, distributed educational materials, and sponsored plays, patriotic programs and Constitution signings. One hundred and twenty

proclamations were issued, 207 bells rang out across Georgia, 335 displays were placed in schools, libraries and government offices. Thirty-one chapters read Sidelights at each meeting, 292 public service announcements aired on radio and TV, totaling 473.5 minutes. Seventy-one chapters reported newspaper articles with 146 pictures and publicity totaled 1528 inches with 20 letters to editors. Fifty-three chapters held special commemorative programs, teas, luncheons and banquets. The Augustin Clayton Chapter received this Chairman's Award for Most Outstanding Chapter Report. Madam State Regent, it has been this Committee's honor to serve you and the Georgia State Society.

DAR GOOD CITIZENS - Sherryll Taylor Miles

The Georgia Society had 76 chapters report participation in the DAR Good Citizens contest. These chapters contacted 290 high schools with seven new high schools participating this year. Georgia chapters awarded 198 seniors the DAR Good Citizen award. These students were presented over \$8,800 in awards by Georgia chapters. This chairman was sent newspaper coverage of award ceremonies including luncheons, teas, Christmas award dinners, school honor's day and Board of Education presentations. The Archibald Bulloch Chapter reported representatives from magazine, newspaper and cable news attended their awards ceremony with coverage on CNN Headline News. Chapters reported that 144 students participated in the essay/scholarship portion of the DAR Good Citizens program. The State Winner is Haley May Dennard sponsored by the John Franklin Wren Chapter in the NE District. The SE District winner is Mary Deanna Beal sponsored by the Brier Creek Chapter. The NW District winner is Madeline Sarah Myers sponsored by the William Marsh Chapter. The SW District winner is Savannah Kay Smith sponsored by the Peter Early Chapter. DAR MAGAZINE - Betty Brown Harrah

One hundred three chapters submitted DAR Magazine reports. We are very pleased that eight-eight chapters received chapter achievement credit by participating in the co-op ad, which will enable us to have a six-page ad in the 2007 November/December issue of the Newsletter. The 2006 ad honored our State Regent, Georgia's Vice President General, remembered an Honorary State Regent, 2006-2008 State Officers, Outstanding Junior, 2006 State Debutantes, Meadow Garden, and the Chapters hosting State Conference. I want to thank Lynn Wright for all her help and advice in putting this ad together. Ninety-two chapter regents are subscribers. Sixty-six chapters met the maximum Chapter Achievement Award Credit requirements. The average percentage of chapter subscribers is twenty-seven. Seventy-one gift subscriptions were given to family or friends; ninety-six to public places. Seventy chapters used information from the American Spirit as program material. Seventy-three chapters used the American Spirit to promote DAR to prospective members. Ninety-four reporting chapters read the President General's Message from the Daughters Newsletter. Chapters reported four Georgia Daughters have contributed to the Friends of the Magazine Fund this year. The General Josiah Tattnall chapter will receive a Certificate of Award for having the highest percentage of member subscriptions of 86%. DAR MUSEUM - Mary Gene Everitt Elliott

Georgia Daughters reporting from 100 chapters contributed \$4,841.00 to assist the DAR Museum in the acquisition of new objects and conservation of its existing items. \$2,326.00 was contributed to the Museum Exhibition Fund, \$2,210.00 was contributed to Friends of the DAR Museum Fund, and \$305.00 to the Adopt-An-Object project. DAR SCHOOL COMMITTEE - Sally McGlaun Baldwin

This chairman is proud to give the following report of the work of our chapter's actions with the DAR schools: 88 chapters submitted their Master Questionnaire. 61 full school programs and 50 two minute spots; 39,220 labels were sent to schools: Tamassee received 28,898 pounds of thrift, Crossnore 3,086 pounds, totaling 31.984 pounds (15.992 tons). Thrift will be collected at workshops and State Board. 35 chapters held special projects for the schools netting approximately \$15,679 in either, gifts, trips, parties, foods or linens. 73 chapters submitted Hightower Reports, and 71 met the requirements. Chapters contributed to the State Regent's Projects; KDS \$ 2,822.25; Tamassee \$ 3.428.25; and Berry \$ 941.00. All money given to the schools, through, endowments, scholarships, State Regent's Project, or any category, through chapter/state treasurer for this year totaled: KDS \$7,483.70; Tamassee \$ 14,183.40; Berry \$ 3,338.44; Crossnore \$5,032.75; Hindman \$ 2,510.00; Hillside \$ 2,945.72. Tamassee received \$8,661.00 directly to school. Contributions given by Members-at-large contributions are not included in these figures and the Georgia Society did not receive credit for their contributions. Chapter members need to send all contributions through their chapter treasurer. This is the only way the State Society has to reconciling the amount of contributions given by our members; and for National to see how Georgia supports the schools. Kate Duncan Smith and Tamassee DAR Schools graciously agreed to assist with the decorations at the DAR School/Youth Luncheon. This past year, serving as State Chairman of DAR Schools, has been one the most rewarding positions this officer has held. able to report that the Georgia Society supported "our" Schools in our grand southern way makes an outstanding reporting year. Madam State Regent, thank you for the opportunity to serve in this position in during administration.

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERANS - Becky Miller Rostron

There were 82 chapters who served our special veterans. Daughters gave their time, resources, and gifts to support veterans in VA Medical Centers, nursing homes (local, state, and national), military hospitals, and outpatient clinics. Also, daughters contributed to community events, cemetery projects, Veterans Memorial Parks, Veterans Day ceremonies, and other venues. Georgia had 523 adult volunteers who drove 40,334 miles in support of veteran activities and gave 5,577 hours of service. There were 572 youth volunteers who contributed 888 hours. Total cash donated was \$12,135 and the value of non-cash donations was A total of 566 ounces of stamps were collected and donated. Certificates of Award were presented for outstanding veteran report (15 chapters), veteran activities (6 chapters), outstanding monetary contributions (4 chapters), most adult volunteer hours (4 chapters), 1000 plus volunteer hours (1 chapter), most youth volunteer hours (4 chapters), most miles traveled for veteran activities (5 chapters), and most ounces of stamps donated (1 chapter). The Georgia Outstanding DAR Volunteer for Veterans Award was presented to Violette Harris Denney of the Abraham Baldwin Chapter. Thank you, Madam State Regent. It is an honor and privilege to serve you and this great Georgia State Society!!

VETERANS HISTORY PROJECT - Martha Chappell Vaughan

Georgia Daughters continue to interview and record our veteran's valuable histories. There were 6 women veterans and 111 male veterans interviewed by DAR members. These DAR Daughters were assisted by 50 youth volunteers for this special project. There were 15 chapters who participated and spent 581 hours interviewing and recording our veteran's histories. This is a most valuable project and we urge all chapters to support this project. Thank you, Madam State Regent, for the opportunity to serve the Georgia State Society in this manner.

FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA - Catherine Derst Miller

Georgia Daughters in 101 chapters reported their efforts in keeping the American Flag flying. Flags presented included 225 large, 2159 small, 1275 table-sized and 6 Braille. Flag material distributed included 1545 Flag Codes, 23 Flag certificates, 575 Flag pins, and 2060 pieces of Flag literature, which consisted of Flag stickers, bookmarkers, and the Pledge of Allegiance. Nineteen different songs about the Flag were noted. A chapter compiled and prepared a Flag brochure for distribution at a County Senior Expo. All 101 chapters reported reciting the Pledge of Allegiance at each meeting. Sixty-one chapters presented "Flag Facts", 95 chapters encouraged others to "Fly the Flag". Forty chapters involved the CAR, Scouts, Junior ROTC, and schoolchildren in Flag activities. Thirty-nine chapters held Flag events, which consisted of Flag Day Luncheons and programs on the Thirty-seven chapters participated in Community Flag events such as parades, Retirement Ceremonies, and placing wreaths at courthouses. Twentyseven chapters contributed interesting "Flag Facts" and 10 chapters included "Flag Sayings and Quotes". Georgia Daughters continue to educate their communities with proper usage and respect for the Flag. Madam State Regent, it has been my pleasure to serve the State Society as Chairman of this committee.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS - JoAn Ketterbaugh Childres

Thirteen chapters responded to the call for new genealogical sources of records for three volumes to the DAR Library, the Georgia State Archives, the Washington Memorial Library, and the Georgia Historical Society for a total of 1,698 pages. One chapter sent out of state records which were sent directly to DAR Library and were not included in the three volumes. Nine members were involved in abstracting deeds, will's, records from funeral homes, and funeral markers from 1880 to 1900.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS - Indexing - Vicki Lancaster Cobb

Georgia daughters have been dedicated indexers in 2006. Twenty-six daughters have indexed seventy-six (76) GRC books with over 234,000 entries by participating in the President-General's Every-Name Index Project utilizing the Sky Index program. The top indexer this year goes to Jane Frazer of the Joseph Habersham Chapter for indexing 13 books. Jean Cole Manker (10 books) and Linda Mailman (8 books) were outstanding indexers. Several others indexed four or five books. The LaGrange Chapter had six indexers working on this project. Thanks to all of the daughters who participated. This vice-chairman thanks the State Regent for the opportunity of working with these wonderful indexers on this most worthwhile project.

JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS - Ashley Towns Carter

This chairman put together a packet for the summer workshops that contained information and instructions for the JAC contest. Chapters were invited to participate in sponsoring JAC clubs and JAC contests. The Junior American Citizen committee benefits schools and youth groups, with chapter members distributing member pins, membership cards, handbooks, banners, and U.S. Chapters sponsor JAC contests with this year's theme being the Jamestown Settlement. Students participate in art contests, creative expression, Chapters also reported publicity concerning JAC and community service. participation. This chairman would like to encourage all chapters to submit JAC contest entries, offer JAC materials to schools, and promote the JAC committee. 8 chapters reported participation in the JAC committee. This chairman would also like to encourage more chapters to sponsor JAC clubs in schools and youth Chapters that sponsored JAC Contests: Thomasville, Sweetwater, Colonel William Candler. One hundred eight chapters reported to this chairman, and only eight chapters reported having JAC activities. The eight chapters were Colonel William Candler, Thomasville, Martha Stewart Bulloch, Lieutenant James Monroe, Henry Walton, General Daniel Newnan, Sweetwater, Fielding Lewis. Number of students participating in JAC contests: Art- 410, Creative Expression-120, Community Service- 20.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP - Susan Austin Fitzgerald

This chairman received 101 chapter reports, with Juniors serving the DAR in many capacities throughout Georgia. Juniors served the DAR in Georgia as Chapter Chairmen (50), Chapter Officers (16), Chapter Regents (2), State Vice-Chairmen (5), State Chairmen (2), and as National Vice-Chairmen (1). There were six chapters with Outstanding Junior Members reported for 2007. This committee consists of this State Chairman, Nancy Collins Tims as Vice-Chairman – Contest, and Sherri Lawson Roberts, Vice-Chairman — Junior Shoppe. Georgia Juniors also served as State Conference pages and Continental Congress pages. The Chairman of Conference Pages is Donna Raye Johnson, and the Vice-Chairmen are Ashley Lynne Fincher, Leslie Brannon Frick, and Dawn Villanueva Levy. The Vice-Chairman of Junior Pages is Rebekah Lee Wysong. Georgia daughters also supported the Juniors by donating to the HPMF, purchasing items at the Junior Shoppe, and holding Innisbrook Sales. This chairman looks forward to serving another year in this capacity. Thank you, Madame Regent, for allowing me to serve as the Georgia State Chairman of Junior Membership.

LINEAGE RESEARCH - Kitty Davidson Thompkins

I find it hard to believe that 40 chapters submitted no report/no activities involving lineage research. The remaining chapters reported 120 lineage research volunteers and 50 lineage research lookup volunteers. One hundred eighty-four requests for assistance were resolved at the chapter level. Of the eight requests of the State Chairman, six were answered successfully. Eight requests were made to the National Society Lineage Research Office with seven successfully resolved. Seventy-four prospective members were identified from 63 workshops/workdays. Nineteen became members. Thirty-four chapter members provided DAR information in workshops provided by other organizations with 69 prospective members identified. Ten became members. A total of \$1853 was donated to Friends of Lineage Research. Joseph Habersham Chapter is commended for contributing the majority. George Walton Chapter conducted the The Outstanding Chapter for greatest number of workshops/workdays. promoting lineage research is Old Unicoi Trail. Outstanding lineage research volunteers are Betty Christy and Barbara McPherson of Fielding Lewis Chapter, Margot Dudewicz of George Walton Chapter, and Marguerite Dyal of Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter.

MEMBERSHIP - Rebecca Malone West

The Fort Peachtree Chapter was awarded the traveling silver bowl for Most New Members by Application (25). The Georgia State Society received the names of 245 Prospective Members from National during 2006. The Vice Chairman of Prospective Members, Phyllis Porter, and her District vice chairmen – Dianne Passmore, Jean Brown, Connie Page, and Linda Douglas – referred these PMs to chapters. To date, 59 have become members, with seven additional applications pending at National. Chapters across the state are devising innovative ways to identify potential members: booths at county fairs, genealogical workshops, and chapter brochures in local libraries. One chapter even held a "tea party" and invited the public to attend. NATIONAL DEFENSE - Barbara Kelly Tornow

The Georgia Daughters continue to show their strong interest and participation in National Defense. Of the 100 chapters reporting, 96 gave three-minute reports on National Defense issues and 39 had full programs. Forty-three chapters distributed information to their members and 13 to the general public. Forty-eight chapters presented 227 Good Citizenship Medals. Sixty-four chapters presented 149 Bronze JROTC medals; 16 chapters presented 23 Gold ROTC medals. Eighty-three reporting chapters contributed a total of \$220.50 to the NSDAR ROTC Award Program. Five daughters submitted National Defense articles from local publications and two chapters sent press clippings. Ninety-five chapters encouraged their members to vote. State Chairman Awards: Greatest number of Good Citizenship medals: First Place: Baron Dekalb and Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapters; Second Place: Colonel William Chandler and Thronateeska Chapters; Greatest number of ROTC metals: First Place: Augusta and Baron DeKalb Chapters; Second Place: Augusta Clayton Chapter; Best-published article: Brenda Jessel, General Daniel Newnan Chapter. PROGRAM - Carol Ann Morrison

The State program/yearbook chairman received yearbooks and supplements from 98 chapters and programs from 3 chapters. Forty-eight chapters submitted their yearbooks for judging. All entries were interesting and showed the chapter's plans for the year. The chapter programs are not judged on the state level. These were sent to the national chairman. For program judging, chapters should be very careful of the deadline dates.

PUBLIC RELATIONS - MOTION PICTURE, RADIO & TELEVISION - Dee Russell Cox

Ninety-Eight Chapters reported using publicity to raise awareness in their communities. Eight hundred, eighty-nine print articles were reported along with six hundred, forty-eight photos. Radio spots dramatically increased with two thousand, three hundred and sixteen spots aired, and fifty-one interviews along with one hundred, thirty-one TV spots. Forty-five chapters have chapter newsletters and seventeen sent examples of brochures. Thirty-four chapters reported using National information for chapter use. Sixteen chapters publicized July Forth events: seventy-six for Constitution Week, twenty-nine for Flag Day, fourteen for the two-hundred twenty-fifth anniversary of the Revolutionary War. Thirty-one chapters reported having special projects: fifty-nine are using web sites to get their message out while six gave awards and sixteen made media contacts. Archibald Bulloch Chapter sent in the most comprehensive report. Award Certificates were given to Martha Stewart Bulloch for Best Newsletter. Brunswick Chapter for Best Brochure and Lachlan McIntosh Chapter for Best Publicity Received. It has been a privilege to serve the State Society as Public Relations, Motion Picture. Radio and Television.

SEIMES TECHNOLOGY CENTER - Karan Berryman Pittman

A special thank you is extended to the Joseph Habersham Chapter for donating \$ 1100.00 to the Seimes Technology Center. 2006-2007 to the Seimes Technology Center. Chapters are encouraged to remember the objectives of the Seimes Technology Center that includes building a resource for genealogical research. The Seimes Technology Center provides the DAR genealogy and library staff, members and the public with genealogical resources on microforms, online databases and CD-ROMs. All monies received go to purchasing additional microfilm for Revolutionary War Era records and providing funding for online database licenses in the DAR Library. STATE GENEALOGY CONSULTANT - Dee McCranie Redkevitch

This chairman has been working very hard on Georgia's Second Field Genealogy Workshop to be held in Kennesaw, GA on 25 and 26 April 2007, at the Hilton Garden Inn. We feel confident that the workshop will be full. Many daughters have signed up from Georgia, Florida, Alabama, South Carolina, Washington State, and one from Maine. This is the first class that has invited HODARs and SARs. This chairman has helped many people with their problems for new applications and presented workshops which will continue through the summer. We strive for perfection and shall have many more daughters doing the Field Genie Workshops after April. All chapters may call on them to come help you. The better our applications are in Washington, the sooner they will be verified. Thank you, Madam Regent, for allowing me to chair this committee.

VOLUNTEER INFORMATION SPECIALISTS - Rosemary Lee Henderson

The four VIS District Vice Chairmen: Wendy Fox, NW; Susan Hazel. NE; Cathy Wells, SE; and Sharon Ray, SW reported contacting 110 chapters with only a few having no activity to report. All chapters have websites approved and linked to the National Society website. The VIS District Vice Chairmen continue to be the contact for those chapters who do not feel proficient in website maintenance. Thirty-five chapters reported receiving prospective members through their websites, with 74 attending meetings, 35 becoming members and 34 pending or in progress. The new e-Membership service from NSDAR is known by 89 chapters and used by 80 chapter regents; 65 chapter treasurers; and 69 registrars. Computer use increased by 390 from last year and reported as 2,189 members using computers. State use increased by 161 with a total of 726. National activities such as Patriot Lookup Service and Website review increased by 126 with a total of 615. Six chapters reported holding workshops. Certificates of awards were given to Linda Douglas for Best Use of Chapter Web Site to promote membership; to Melodye Brown for Outstanding Chapter VIS Project and to Adrienne Duncan as VIS Volunteer of the Year.

COMMEMORATIVE EVENTS - Christine Rife Napier

This chairman received ninety-nine reports. Twenty reported no participation. Georgia daughters participated in the National Independence Day Parade in Washington, D.C. and across Georgia. Three chapters reported members having an ancestor who was on the original Lewis and Clark expedition. reported having programs on this in addition to purchasing commemorative pins. This chairman attended the 225th celebration of the Victory at Yorktown October 19th, 2006. Chapters reported having programs on Yorktown plus purchasing Commemorative pins. Chapters encouraged classroom teachers to watch by satellite the program about Jamestown, VA, plus having programs about Our Nations Birthplace. Members laid wreaths commemorative the 225th Battle of Augusta, battles at King's Mountain, Cowpens, Kettle Creek, and the Marietta National Cemetery. Many chapters attended grave markings of revolutionary soldiers throughout the state of Georgia. Chapters reported attending the 5-year 9/11 observance. Georgia daughters attended Constitution Day Luncheons plus attended and hosted Veterans Day luncheons and activities. It gives me great pleasure to announce that the Fayette-Starrs Mill Chapter placed first with their report. Their report has been forwarded to the Southeast director. DAR PROJECT PATRIOT - Martha Middlebrooks Knight

Fifty-five chapters supported our wounded and community efforts in the war on terrorism. Their primary focus was on Landstuhl Medical Center in Germany, but active personnel in Iraq and Afghanistan were also remembered. This effort involved 787 volunteers working 1293.5 hours and traveling 2820 miles. Georgia daughters sent 143 boxes containing clothing, toiletries, 57 backpacks, phone cards, entertainment items and books. An article in one paper notified the public that collection boxes would be placed in the community so they could participate. Patients and active troops were sent 5608 holiday and get well cards. A quilt made by a Georgia daughter was also sent to the hospital. Georgia chapters sent \$3534 to the Treasurer General for this committee. Parades and celebrations for "Send Offs" and 'Welcome Home" events for troops were attended and helped by DAR chapters. Three cakes a month are delivered to the Active Duty Rehab at a local VA hospital to be used for birthdays and special events. A Letter to the Editor entitled, "Do we care about 9/11?" was published. A 9/11 Memorial Service and prayer services were held. Two Proclamations and wreaths honored patriots. Several chapters had programs focusing on the war on terrorism.

DAR SPEAKER'S STAFF - Linda Cunningham Bhame

The objectives of the DAR Speakers Staff Committee are (1) to promote a steady increase in new members, (2) to act as a liaison between the National Society and Chapters, (3) to speak before civic and non-DAR groups in the community, as well as, providing interesting programs for DAR chapters. Members of the Speakers Staff are recommended by the State Regent and appointed by the President General for the National level. This committee is one of the most important committees in NSDAR. It is my pleasure to present the following report for the DAR State Speakers Staff. Our chapters report 95 programs given by Staff Speakers to DAR chapters. Additionally, our speakers presented programs to 44 other groups around the state. These speakers traveled an amazing 11,130 miles to give their programs to DAR, church, civic, and other lineage groups. As a Society, we can be proud of these women and the hard work they do in preparation and research to present informative programs. They work strictly as volunteers to spread our message of patriotism, preservation and education.

FRIENDS OF THE LIBRARY - Robin Redfearn Towns See Librarian's Report

INSIGNIA - Donna McCourry King

This has been and is a banner year. Insignia was promoted throughout the year by this chairman. This has helped to make more people aware of Insignia. Also many questions were answered on the correct way and time to wear Insignia. A form was included in the regent's packet that gave instructions about Insignia. The total sales for the State were \$32,793.48. The Chapter with the most purchases was Augustin Clayton Chapter, followed by Abraham Baldwin. Thank you Madam State Regent for letting me serve the State Society.

LITERACY CHALLENGE - Elizabeth Conaway Ruh

Forty-two had no report. Others reported working with adults and children. Over 240 members were involved in literacy programs in some capacity, 2689 books were donated by chapters to promote literacy. Augustin Clayton had 83 people involved in literacy promotion and donated 967 books. John Houston donated 800 hours to promote adult literacy. The winning chapter in promoting literacy in children was General Daniel Newman, with 1152 hours. Abraham Baldwin member Violette Denney made a quilt that was sold at a silent auction, "Books, Burgers and Blue Grass", providing over 2000 books to children in Carroll County each month. Nathaniel Macon donated 150 books to children at Macon Outreach and 18 books to Washington Memorial Library. Governor David Emanual assisted readers in the learning lab and public library. Colonel William Candler gave community service award to a member for volunteering at Alliance for Literacy and three Bible school, and donating books for a fundraising sale. An award for Outstanding Volunteer was given to member May Coakley for extraordinary volunteer effort at an Adult Education Center and an after-school reading program for Hispanic children. Fielding Lewis spoke about working with students through book fairs, and wrote about understanding why adults are functionally illiterate. I thank you, Madam State Regent, for giving me the chance to read these excellent reports.

PRESIDENT GENERAL'S PROJECT - Bessie Anne Hord Bretch

The President General's Project from 2004-2007 is the preservation and digitization of one million supporting documents and genealogical records now in the DAR Library. Georgia Daughters are answering the call by meeting chapter targets of two dollars per member for the three-year period. Computer capabilities of chapters are many. Chapters do work on the internet and a large amount of word processing. Augustin Clayton chapter - 160 members have computer capabilities and are online. Fort Peachtree chapter - 145 members are computer

literate and 100 members are online. Martha Stewart Bulloch chapter - 140 members are active in word processing and 140 member online. Nancy Hart chapter - placed their chapter genealogical records on disk. Xavier and Archibald Bulloch chapters - single contributions of \$50.00 through the Development Office by members, and they purchased the President General's pin. There were numerous purchases of sales items from the DAR store designated for the project. Georgia Daughters are doing their part to secure our treasured records. \$15,034.00 donated through the State Treasurer to the Project. \$1,665.00 was donated in memory of Mrs. Herman M. Richardson.

WOMEN'S ISSUES - Amy Reece Keeney

Seventy-five Women's Issues programs were presented in Georgia Chapters this year. The programs varied in interesting topics. A few to mention are health, family, career, women's safety, depression, and traits to live by. Women have a lot to juggle in their lives and these programs were very informative and enjoyable. Chapter members participated in, or supported financially, 107 activities such as Relay for Life, March of Dimes, American Heart Association, Breast Cancer Research, Volunteering in Libraries, Hospitals, Voting Polls and in Blood Drives. They sent packages to the Military, had Conservation projects, donated to Gulfport victims and walked for Diabetes, Multiple Sclerosis and other Fund Raisers. Fiftythree chapters helped members learn computer skills; four had computer workshops. Nine ladies entered the Women's Issues Contest with essays; seven chapters were represented. Three state winners from the contest will be forwarded to the S.E. Division. The winner for the category Family is Larealia L. Camp, the category Health is Carole Richard Thompson, and the winner for career is Joyce Ball Patton. Of the 97 reports received, 28 chapters did not have a report. Madam State Regent, it has been an honor to serve you and the Georgia State Society.

The Special Meeting was held on May 9, 2007 in Macon at the Idle Hour Country Club to vote on the proposed changes to the Bylaws. The Finance Committee met before Fall Board Meeting and again before this State Conference. We have also been in communication by e-mail and telephone. The proposed budget for 2007-2008 is based on per capita dues of \$10.00 for 6,900 members. It is the same budget adopted for 2005-2006. The committee unanimously approved this budget, and it was adopted at the 2006 State Conference in Savannah. Other requests for funding plus setting the price for the sale of the Membership Book were worked upon and passed by this

seconded and adopted.

Barbara Chastain moved "that funds for the lease for a private "server" to be used by the Georgia State Society website at the cost of \$4,200 for a two (2) year period, be taken from the Georgia State Society Unallocated/General Savings Money Market account." The motion was seconded and adopted.

The proposed budget for 2006-2007 was discussed briefly.

The four chairs that were returned for repainting two years ago were retrieved by this Chairman driving to Illinois, a total of 2100 miles. They have been placed in the Heritage-Education Center with the approval of the Meadow Garden Board. We are working toward our State Regent's goal for Meadow Garden by acquiring audio-visual equipment to be installed and secured in a built-in corner cabinet designed and built for that purpose to go in the Heritage-Education Center. We have also designed and built pedestals for the three Signers' busts. Travel for this Chairman has resulted in twelve trips to Meadow Garden, three of them overnight, for a total of 6000 miles, only including the trip to Illinois and travel from Macon to Augusta. MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

July 20, 2006

The Meadow Garden Board met on Thursday, July 20, 2006, in the George Walton Heritage Education Center, Augusta, Georgia. State Regent and Chairman of the Board, Laura Marcella Reid, called the meeting to order at 10:35 a.m. Other members present were: Barbara Blakely Chastain, Secretary;

Josephine "Jo" Rhodes Agostas, Frances Yarborough Sideman, Frankie Rush Nevins, Phyllis Johnson Tanner, Patricia Cown Burnam, Margaret Poole Cagle, Charlotte Josephine Christian, Joyce Ball Patton, Phyllis Fox Lawson, Lanette Haar Reid, Shelby Alderman Whitson, and Sally McGlaun Baldwin, Ex-Officio member.

Following the invocation given by Ms. Reid, she asked each member to

introduce themselves and give the name and location of their chapter.

By invitation of the Board, Susan Jackson, House Manager, reported there scheduled tours (189) were down due to school being out; walk-ins (177) were up; total Tourists to date 706 for a total income of \$815.00; total Gift Shop sales: \$293.00; and all scheduling of house tours will be through the House Chairman. A House Chairman Duties directive and July 06 House Maintenance Report was

given to each member.

Chairman of the Board reported the following. 1) The Board considered the cost of renting out the grounds. 2) All locks will be changed at the House and Education Center. These new keys cannot be duplicated for security reasons. 3) A separate security unit will be installed in the George Walton Heritage Education Center. Ben Scott, of A.D.S., will be asked to submit a bid for the cost. After discussion, Mrs. Whitson moved that a security system be installed in the George Walton Heritage Center, with thecost to be paid through Heritage Building funds or maintenance fund. The motion was seconded and adopted. 4) The front outside water spigot will be moved to the upper outside of the Heritage building. 5) Mrs. Agostas and Mrs. Cagle were appointed to explore the cost of replacing the two front exterior doors. The doors need to be solid wood or metal and to replace the bathroom door with a solid core door. 6) Ms. Reid gave each member a copy of the Standing Rules for Meadow Garden amended March 2006.

The Secretary, Barbara Chastain, read the minutes of the March 23, 2006,

meeting. The minutes were approved as read.

Phyllis Tanner, Treasurer, distributed the balance sheet of the Meadow Garden Funds as of July 19, 2006: the certificates of Deposit total \$321,646.10; checking account balance \$70,779.69; Money Market Accounts total \$57,783.46; showing a total Checking/Savings of \$450,209.25. Other Current Assets: Construction in Progress Exp-Shelbys Cedar Shingles \$5,000.00; giving total current assets for Meadow Garden of \$455,209.25. Fixed Assets: Property, Plant & Equipment include accumulated depreciation of (\$16,060.65), George Walton Heritage Education Center \$121,731.44, and Meadow Garden Improvements \$20,710.65 for total fixed assets of \$125,284.44. Total assets are \$580,493.69. Meadow Garden Fund Profit and Loss Statement for July 1, 2006 thru July 19, 2006 was distributed.

Mrs. Agostas, Meadow Garden Chairman, reported James Braswell, roofer, plans to start new cedar hand split shingle roof in October at a verbal telephone bid /cost of twenty-four thousand dollars. There is a written bid submitted for twenty-four thousand five hundred dollars; the Best Room plastered wall will be repaired by the end of the summer by Junior Grantham; because of the poor paint job. Joey Smalley, painter, has promised to repaint the Heritage Education building and the old outhouse. The Augusta Chapter recommends we repaint the woodwork and the mantle the color white in the Augusta Room. Ms. Reid asked Mrs. Agostas check with Mr. Smalley concerning the cost of restoration and change of color of the fireplace in the Augusta Room. Agostas was asked to contact Jimmy Garren concerning construction/installation of a rain run-off shed over all exterior doors of the George Walton Heritage Education building, and Mr. Garren will be asked to submit at Mrs. Agostas reminded the Board that the 2006 Historic least 2 designs. Candlelight Tour will be Friday and Saturday, November 24 & 25, 4-8 p.m. and Sunday, November 26, 1-5 p.m. It was suggested to have a bake sale as a fundraiser during with the tour. Ms. Reid appointed Joyce Patton to organize the bake sale.

Mrs. Nevins, Regent, College Hill Chapter, asked Mrs. Sideman, Regent, Augusta Chapter, to give the report concerning the three plaster busts. Mrs. Sideman stated that Ms. Angler, sculptress, came to review the three plaster busts located in the Meadow Garden Board Room, and would report the cost of restoring said bust to original condition.

In the absence of Mrs. Hunter, Docents Chairman, her report was read and filed. Report for January 2006 through June 30, 2006: Docent hours - 546¹/₄; number of Docents - 23; number of participating chapters - 4. There was an

increase in every area over year 2005.

Mrs. Burnam, Furnishings Chairman, reported the following: 1) A new inventory should be conducted. Ms. Reid requested a photo inventory be made. 2) Concerning the C.A.R. chairs: last contact with Bill Gullberg was June 2006. He has not responded to how soon he will be returning the painted black rockers, to be placed on the front porch of the house. 3) Stated in the November 4, 2005 Minutes of the Board, Mrs. Cagle requested knowledge of furniture given by the Pulaski Chapter. A table has been located in the Library as being given by the Pulaski Chapter in Mrs. Jeffries' inventory of 1909 and again in 1922 inventory. No description of the table was given. 4) Request that copies of the loan papers and/or the donation papers concerning the three busts of the Signers of the Declaration of Independence needs to be located. If not, then contact the August-Richmond County Museum requesting copies of all correspondence concerning the busts. Mrs. Burnam stated that her new Meadow Garden Program, Meadow Garden Furnishings, Past and Present, is in process and that a file has been prepared containing all the Meadow Garden minutes since 1902.

Mrs. Cagle, Landscaping Chairman, reported that the termite treatment system has been installed in the grounds surrounding both buildings by Advanced Services Pest Control*Termite Control. Estimated cost of \$1,250.00 was submitted with a yearly-extended service of \$375.00. No invoice or bill had been received at the time of this meeting. Mrs. Cagle moved that a lightweight, multipurpose, eight to ten foot ladder be purchased and not to exceed \$250.00. The

motion was seconded and adopted.

Ms. Christian, Gift Shop Chairman, discussed new items to be sold at Summer Workshops and Fall Board. One item would be the reprinting of Madam LeVert book. She also passed around a photograph of the Cherokee Roses, taken by Lynn Moulton Wright, to be used on new 5-piece notes to be sold for \$5.00 a pack.

Mrs. Patron, Patrons Chairman, reported twenty-three donations are at Patron Level or above since March 1, 2006, with the Joseph Habersham Chapter achieving the Meadow Garden Preservation Society level of five thousand dollars plus. Plans are underway for the Benefactor's Club Guidelines, which will be

presented at Fall Board.

Mrs. Lawson, Public Relations Chairman, reported plans for production and distribution of DVDs portraying George Walton and Meadow Garden for use at each Georgia Middle School were underway with the contribution of 600 blank DVDs and 600 plastic DVD cases by BEST BUY. Commitments from David Waller, to produce DVDs, and Ted Key, local historian, to portray George Walton have been obtained. Judy Serritella, Coordinator of Library Media Service with the Georgia Department of Education, will include information in state newsletter concerning DVD coming to each school. Ms. Serritella suggested that DVDs be sent to each school librarian. Cost to send DVDs to schools will cost approximately three cents each. Lowe's has donated 127, 4-inch clay pots to be used as follows: One hundred ten will be used by each chapter to collect loose change/bills, and Jo Lynne McEwen will be painting each of these pots. Twenty seven pots will be painted by students of the Joseph Sams School and sold at Fall Board for twenty dollars each with all proceeds to benefit Meadow Garden. A meeting has been set up with the State Regent, Kathy Hodge, Editor of the *Georgia Voyager Magazine* and this chairman for July 31st in Athens.

Shelby Whitson presented the scrapbook photo album dated 1901-1902 for the Board to see. This leather bound book is in very poor condition and is very fragile. The book, purchased for four hundred and fifty dollars contains photos, articles and clippings of Meadow Garden. Inside hand written in ink is the following: "Stella Dyer Loring" Augusta GA Dec 21st 1901 – Jan 20th 1902 Chateau Le Vert." Shelby also passed around an article from the June 2006 issue of Veranda magazine titled: Historic Perspective Dave the Potter, Slavery's Poet Laureate Craftsman text by Tim Revis. Our Dave jugs have been removed from the kitchen and locked in the upstairs office of Meadow Garden.

Ms. Reid offered a Benediction. There being no further business the meeting

The Meadow Garden Board met on Tuesday, August 29, 2006, at the George Walton Heritage Education Center, Augusta, Georgia. Following the opening prayer offered by the Chairman of the Board, Ms.

Reid welcomed the members.

The minutes of the July 20th Meadow Garden Board Meeting were read

and approved as amended.

Ms. Reid reported on estimates for replacing and adding locks to the House and to the Heritage Center. Two estimates were received: Dixie Lock and Safe Inc. for \$1,280.00; and Superior Lock and Safe Inc. for \$3,099.28. Mrs. Nevins moved, "that Dixie Lock and Safe Inc. be awarded the contract to replace locks at a cost of \$1,280.00." Motion was seconded and adopted. The keys will be coded for individual positions and will be returned in at the end of each administration and redistributed according to the position held.

Two estimates on a security system were received: SafePro Security Systems, Inc. \$1,219.00 for new installation and updates, a monitoring fee of \$19.95 per month for a three year contract, and \$6.00 monthly for the open/close reports; ADS Security \$850.00 for new installation and updates, a monitoring fee of \$24.95 per month per house, and \$20.00 per month for the open/close reports, making the monthy fee total \$69.90. Mrs. Tanner moved, "that the Board signs a contract with SafePro Security Systems, Inc. to enhance current system and add a system to the Heritage Education Center and to monitor the system." Motion was seconded and adopted.

Ms. Reid stated that all tours are to be booked through the House Manager, Susan Jackson. One of the three options for State Honor Roll concerning Meadow Garden is for a chapter to visit Meadow Garden, which is

required to be scheduled through the House Manager.

The Board reviewed leases for Meadow Garden: (1) Georgia DAR Chapter for \$35.00; (2) General public for \$150.00; and, (3) Lease of Grounds and Heritage Center. Copies of these leases will be recorded and filed for accurate reporting of usage. Ms. Reid read information of area rental fees showing the Meadow Garden fees were in line with the size of the facility, with a maximum capacity of 45.

Mrs. Tanner, State Treasurer, distributed the Summary of Accounts, as of August 28, 2006. Total assets are: Certificates of Deposit, \$321,646.10; Checking Account, \$73,448.65; and Money Market Accounts \$37,188.04. The accounts

were reviewed and filed for audit. The summer workshop packet money totaled \$605.00 and will be credited to the State Regent's Projects. After some discussion concerning the utility bill, Susan Jackson, House Manager, will contact the utility company to make sure that they are not double billing the society for trash pickup.

Mrs. Agostas, Meadow Garden Chairman, stated Babbitt Plumbing will move the water spigot on the front porch to the side for \$220.00. She received three estimates on the repair/replacement of the front doors, covering over the front and back doors and fixing the bathroom door; Jim Garren, \$19,300.00; Mr. Hoffman, \$3,200.00; Mr. Bennett, \$5,000.00. Mrs. Agostas will meet with an architect from Macon who will render a drawing of the front of the Heritage Center and see the Historic Augusta Committee concerning this addition. She will report to the Board in November. Mr. Bennett will check the upstairs windows in the Stribling Room to see what would be the best way to correct the leakage. The shingle roof on the historic house has been approved by the Historic Augusta Committee and contract work is ready to begin shortly. A door closer will be added to the bathroom door in the Heritage Center to make the door self-closing.

Mrs. Whitson brought an area rug, which she is loaning to be used in the Stribling Room. Mrs. Nevins will talk to a member of her chapter to ask about a

bound carpet remnant large enough to cover the Stribling Room floor.

Mrs. Sideman and Mrs. Agostas received bids for repairing the three busts of the Georgia signers of the Declaration of Independence, which were given to Meadow Garden by the Augusta Museum of History. The estimates were \$2,000.00 to \$3,000.00. They believe that there may be local craftsmen that can submit a bid for the repairs. Ms. Reid will check with museums to get prices on pedestals for the busts. Mrs. Agostas will continue to check for the documented trail of the gift of the "busts".

Mrs. Hunter, Docents Chairman, reported that there will be a fall docent class. No date has been set at this time. She will email the members of the Board

when the date is set.

Mrs. Jackson reported she attended a meeting at the Augusta Museum of History concerning the Gift Shop event on Saturday, December 9, 2006, from 2:00 p.m. until 4:00 p.m. She would like Meadow Garden to participate. Ms. Christian moved, "that the Meadow Garden Gift Shop participate in the joint Gift Shop Open House on Saturday, December 9, with other Augusta Museum Gift Shops." Motion

was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Burnam, Furnishings Chairman, reported the C.A.R. chairs have been refinished and she brought them back to Georgia. Mrs. Reid moved, "that the four chairs made by Mr. Gullberg using funds from the Georgia State Society of C.A.R. given in honor of Rosemary Crow Hunter be placed in the Heritage Center." Motion was seconded and adopted. Mrs. Burnam showed the Board copies of the software she has investigated to use to catalog the Meadow Garden inventory. Mrs. Burnam moved, "that we (Meadow Garden) purchase the *Past Perfect* Museum Software at a cost of \$1,590.00 paid from the Furnishings Account. Be it further moved that we become members of the American Association for State and Local History at an annual fee of \$100.00, which allows us a 20% discount on the purchase of *Past Perfect* Software, making the total cost of \$1,273.40." Motion was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Bumam stated that Mary Gene Elliott has a photograph of an empire

sofa for sale.

Mrs. Cagle, Landscaping Chairman, reported the ladder was purchased for \$42.67. Mrs. Cagle will continue to use Andrew Jones of A&M Lawn Maintenance to do the yard maintenance. He is paid for two visits a month, \$50.00 per visit. She stated the white sign in the yard needs repair. Ed Johnson will make a frame for a new sign if Meadow Garden has the sign made. Ms. Reid asked if Mr. Johnson could do the lettering and sizing of the sign.

Ms. Reid asked Mrs. Hunter if the docents could keep Meadow Garden open on the weekends. Mrs. Hunter will ask if there are any docents that would

work on the weekends. Meadow Garden will continue to open on Monday because other area museums are closed on Monday. Our attendance is higher on Mondays.

Mrs. Cagle reported on a gate alarm. It was the consensus of the Board

to purchase a gate alarm for both gates at a cost of \$150.00.

Mrs. Baldwin asked if a security view point (peep hole) could be installed in the back door of the Meadow Garden House. Mrs. Cagle stated she had one and would have it installed.

Ms. Charlotte Christian, Gift Shop Chairman, reported \$1,156.00 from sales from the summer workshops. She is working on an internet sales shop. She stated a need to order more note cards of Meadow Garden. Lynn Moulton Wright made note cards of the Cherokee rose to sell for Meadow Garden. There will be note cards of the coaster pictures to sell next year. There are still plenty of brochures at this time. It was suggested to change the brochure when they are reprinted to include a picture of George Walton; the Declaration of Independence and the color of paper.

Mrs. Lawson moved, "that the Meadow Garden Gift Shop Chairman receive \$1,000.00 to purchase merchandise for the Gift Shop." Motion was

seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Burnam stated there was a need to create a list of items needed for

Meadow Garden.

Ms. Reid read the report of Mrs. Patron, Patrons Chairman. There are 35 new Patrons, thirty-three individuals and two chapters. The amount from these Patrons is \$2,650.00. Mrs. Patton received 100 Patron pins from Anne Whipple Murphey, Past Patrons Chairman. Mrs. Patton asked that Patrons receive a Patrons ribbon at state conference to be attached to their name tags. The Bake Sale is coming along for the Thanksgiving Weekend event with several chapters participating by bringing baked goods.

Mrs. Reid moved, "that the Chairman of the Patrons be authorized to distribute Meadow Garden Patron ribbons to be worn at State Conference."

Motion was seconded and adopted.

Marjorie Young Garner donated several old DAR magazines containing articles on Meadow Garden. It was voted to place these books in the Stribling Room. Mrs. Whitson stated that the picture album of Chateau Levert is in the hands of Mrs. Cagle. Mrs. Cagle will see Fitz Symms about restoring the album.

Mrs. Lawson, Public Relations Chairman, reported Ted Key has completed a draft of George Walton's introduction for the Meadow Garden program. The filming will be September 18, 2006, at Meadow Garden. Mrs. Lawson contacted Lamar and Fairway Outdoor Advertising Companies. Lamar would donate space if we have the sign made, approximately \$3.00 per square foot. Fairway would also donate space with the same guidelines. Both companies would guarantee the space for a period of one to three months.

Roger Price, Department of Transportation, will install a street sign on 13th Street (turning toward Meadow Garden) with Meadow Garden printed on it in

six-inch letters with an arrow pointing in the direction of Meadow Garden.

Mrs. Lawson played the tape of the first draft of Mr. Key's introduction of George Walton. Sharon Roberts typed the draft. Mrs. Lawson will email Ms. Reid a copy of the script.

The Joseph Sams School painted approximately 26 flower pots, which will be sold at the State Board of Management Meeting. Monies will go to the State

Regent's Projects for Meadow Garden.

The ad hoc committee preparing the presentation of a Meadow Garden Benefactor's Club will report and give details at the next Meadow Garden Board Meeting at State Board of Management.

The next Meadow Garden Board Meeting will be November 3, 2006, from 1:00 - 3:00 p.m., at State Board of Management in Statesboro. The State Regent

asked that all state chairmen have their reports ready to give at State Board of Management.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:10 p.m.

The Meadow Garden Board met on Friday, November 3, 2006, at the Senior Citizens' Building at Fair Road Park, Statesboro, Georgia. Laura Marcella Reid, State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m. Other members present were Barbara Blakely Chastain, Secretary; Josephine Rhodes Agostas, Frances Yarborough Sideman, Frances Rush Nevins, Phyllis Johnson Tanner, Lanette Haar Reid, Shelby Alderman Whitson, Patricia Gown Burnam, Charlotte Josephine Christian, Margaret Poole Cagle, Joyce Ball Patton and Sally McGlaun Baldwin, Ex-Officio member. Absent members were Billie Gardner Hunter and Phyllis Fox Lawson.

Following the opening prayer offered by the Chairman of the Board, Ms.

Reid welcomed the members.

The minutes of the August 29, 2006 Meadow Garden Board Meeting were

read and approved as corrected.

Ms. Reid reported that the Dixie Lock & Safe, Inc. had completed the installation of new locks on September 14, 2006, and keys were distributed on the 14th and 15th. Total cost was \$1,393.00. Each person signed for the keys assigned to her respective position. All keys will be returned and signed-in at the end of this administration for reassignment in the new administration. SafePro Security Systems, LLC, installed and updated security systems in the Heritage Center and the Historic House on September 14th. Cost of installation was \$2,219.00, plus \$550.00 for additional parts (not in the original estimate), plus annual monitoring fee of \$19.95 for 11 months (we get one month free if paid annually) which totaled \$219.45, plus annual payment of electronic open and closing reports of \$6.00 per month for eleven months which totaled \$66.00, making the grand total payment of \$2,054.45. Additional cost of \$450.00 for digging trench for underground wire from Historic House to the Heritage Center to be paid to Greg Bowman & Al with SafePro; Status of the Meadow Garden Advisory Board will be reported at the January 23, 2007, Meadow Garden Board Meeting; Meadow Garden's participation in the Historic Holiday Candlelight Tour, November 24 & 25 from 4:00-8:00 p.m. and November 26, 1:00-5:00 p.m., was discussed. Mrs. Patton has a list of Meadow Garden Board members who will be attending.

The Chairman reported for Susan Jackson, Meadow Garden House Manager. As of October 6, 2006, total combined hours for all chapter docents 914?; total income for walk-in tours \$958.50; total Gift Shop Sales \$617.50; total

donations \$39.00; and total Petty Cash Expenses \$17.08.

The Chairman stated that Meadow Garden will not participate in the Augusta Museum Gift Shops Open House on December 9, 2006 due to cost; Mrs. Reid was appointed to review the Meadow Garden Standing Rules and report

back at the January 23, 2007, Board Meeting.

In the absence of Mrs. Lawson, Public Relations Chairman, Ms. Reid reported that History of George Walton & Tour of Meadow Garden DVD and written programs will be distributed to Chapter Regents at State Board of Management Meeting and the DVD with letter will be mailed to the Librarian at each Georgia school in November 2006. Flowerpots, decorated by the students at the Joseph Sams School, will be sold at the State Board of Management Meeting for \$20.00 each with the monies going to the State Regent's Projects at Meadow Garden.

Mrs. Tanner, State Treasurer, distributed the Summery of Accounts, as of October 20, 2006. Total assets are: Checking Account (RBC Centura), \$69,058.30; Money Market Account (First Georgia Community), \$59,583.58;

Certificates of Deposit, \$301,824.11. Total Income from July 1, 2006 - October 20, 2006: \$15,383.17; total Expenses from July 1, 2006 - October 20, 2006; \$15,011.74 with a total Net Income of \$371.43. The accounts were reviewed and filed for audit. Mrs. Tanner has revised the Meadow Garden Donation form.

Mrs. Agostas, Meadow Garden Chairman, stated that at the Historic Augusta Annual Meeting on October 17, 2006, the 2006 Stewardship Award was presented to the Georgia State Society for the historic preservation work done at Meadow Garden: Membership renewal for the Georgia Trust was discussed. Mrs. Nevins moved that "the Meadow Garden Board renew membership in Georgia Trust for Historic Preservation at the rate of \$55.00." The motion was seconded and adopted. Mrs. Agostas reported that all bed linens and curtains have been washed and Mrs. Katherine Goman, Augusta Chapter, made repairs that were needed. It has been found that the workroom and kitchen walls need repairing and a bid of \$2,500,00 has been obtained for this work from Summerville Renovation Company. Mrs. Patton moved that "we accept the bid from Summerville Renovation Company. The total cost of \$2,500.00 to repair water damage to the Workroom and kitchen walls." The motion was seconded and adopted. Mrs. Agostas showed a sketch that Bill S. Bennett made concerning the proposed porch cover for the Heritage Center building. Mr. Bennett has given a bid of \$5,000.00 for this addition. We hope to get bids from Summerville Renovation Company and from Hoffman Residential Services concerning this porch construction; James Braswell of Braswell Roofing plans to start work this month on the roof of the historic house; Annual payment for pest control service, for both buildings, is \$350.00; An article appeared in the November/December issue, page 17-20, of Augusta Magazine. Mrs. Agostas gave each member a brochure of the upcoming Candlelight Tour and discussed our joining the Augusta Chamber of Commerce. The Chairman asked her to investigate, the advantages of joining the Chamber, and report back at the January 23, 2007 meeting.

Mrs. Sideman, Regent, Augusta Chapter, stated that members will help

with Candlelight Tour.

Mrs. Nevins, Regent, College Hill Chapter reported two (2) luncheons were held at the Heritage Center for DAR members taking Meadow Garden tour.

In the absence of Mrs. Hunter, Docents Chairman, Ms. Reid reported that members were needed to help with the Candlelight Tour in the house and Heritage Center.

Furnishings Chairman, Mrs. Burnam, reported that the software, *Past and Perfect*, has been received and installed on her computer. Following the same procedures as our DAR Museum in Washington, D.C., the Georgia State Society is now a member of the American Association for State and Local History. The cost of this membership was donated and the State Regent is the primary contact for our Society and will receive all information including the newsletter. While cataloging Meadow Garden's vast inventory it was found that there is no record of assessing. As of today, over 1000 items, listing all the information regarding donors, who were honored, provenance, year of acceptance are recorded in the *Past and Perfect* program. Work will continue to find items mentioned in back copies of the Proceedings and these will be entered into the computer. A volunteer will assist the chairman in physically numbering each item. Sample forms have been made for the following: DONOR QUESTIONNAIRE (for Meadow Garden Files), MEADOW GARDEN MUSEUM (Recommendation for Accession of Objects), ACCESSION, and TEMPORARY CUSTODY RECEIPT.

Mrs. Agostas moved that "we accept her offer to have our piano forte repaired by Mr. Bill Fletcher at a cost of \$1,500.00. Mr. Fletcher will have to remove the piano forte into his shop in December." The motion was seconded and

adopted. This will be Mrs. Agosta's gift to Meadow Garden.

Landscaping Chairman, Mrs. Cagle, reported that pine straw has been put around the fruit trees, and the area under fig tree is being cleaned and weeds pulled. The lawn sprinkler has had some work done. Mrs. Cagle has contacted

Georgia Power Company concerning the addition of outdoor security lighting. Discussion followed concerning the cost and the Chairman stated that more information is needed and would Mrs. Cagle report at the next Board Meeting.

Ms. Christian, Museum Shop Chairman, stated that a "grab bag" sale would take place during State Board of Management to help reduce inventory of

older stock.

Mrs. Patton, Patrons Chairman, reported that as of today there are 57 Patrons but the number should rise after State dues and donations are reported: plans are still underway for the 'Bake Sale' during the Candlelight Tour; discussion followed concerning the Recording of Patrons in the Patrons book to include four (4) separate parts. Mrs. Reid moved that: (1) "the Meadow Garden Patrons Book be divided into four parts: (1) Patrons, which will list all individuals who give a minimum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) in one payment, and all Chapters, organizations, businesses or groups that give a minimum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) in one payment; (2) In-Kind Patrons, who shall be approved by the Meadow Garden Board in recognition of outstanding and/or unusual gifts of time, talents or expertise toward the betterment of Meadow Garden; (3) Honoraria, which shall list individuals or groups honored by a Patron gift as designated in #1 above, such listing to show the name of the honoree (Patron) and the donor; (4) Memorials, which shall list memorial gifts of at least fifty dollars (\$50.00) and show the name of the individual memorialized and the name of the donor." (2) Ted Key, historian, for his portrayal of George Walton on the DVD's. (3) Cathy Hodge, Editor/Publisher, Georgia Voyager Magazine, for advice and guidance on the production, publication and distribution of the DVD's through the Georgia school system. (4) Jeff Vinson, General Manager, Best Buy in Morrow, for the donation of 600 DVD's and 600 DVD jackets. (5) Jerry L. Leonard, Manager, Lowe's in Fayetteville, for the donation of 137 clay flowerpots. (6) Jo Lynne Petriello Me Ewen, member of Augustin Clayton Chapter, for painting the clay flowerpots, given to each DAR Chapter for the purpose of collecting funds for the Meadow Garden State Projects. (7) The Joseph Sams School for choosing as one of their community service projects the painting of 26 flower pots to sell for the Meadow Garden Project" The motion was seconded and adopted.

Ms. Reid announced that the next Meadow Garden Board Meeting would be

January 23, 2007

The Meadow Garden Board met on Tuesday, January 23, 2007, at the George Walton Heritage Education Center in Augusta, Georgia. Laura Marcella Reid, State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 10:30 p.m. Other members present were Barbara Blakely Chastain, Secretary, Josephine Rhodes Agostas, Frances Yarborough Sideman, Frances Rush Nevins, Phyllis Johnson Tanner, Lanette Haar Reid, Shelby Alderman Whitson, Patricia Cown Burnam, Charlotte Josephine Christian, Billie Gardner Hunter, Joyce Ball Patton, Phyllis Fox Lawson and Sally McGlaun Baldwin, Ex-Officio member. Absent member was Margaret Poole Cagle.

The opening prayer was offered by Mrs. Lanette Reid. Ms. Laura Reid welcomed members and thanked them for their participation in the Candlelight

Tour, held on November 24, 25 and 26.

The minutes of the November 3, 2006 Meadow Garden Board Meeting

were approved as printed.

Ms. Reid reported that a reception for tourism, city/county officials and press is to be held on February 22, 2007, 5:00 to 7:00 p.m., in the Heritage Center. Status of the Meadow Garden Advisory Board will be reported at the March 11, 2007, meeting. The following were discussed: (1) The Museum Donation Questionnaire and the removal of the rug in the Augusta Room. Mrs. Nevins moved that: "the rug, in the Augusta Room, which has been placed on loan by Mary Gene Elliott, be returned to her, with most grateful thanks, because Board is in fear of damage to the rug due to its fragile condition." The motion was seconded and adopted; (2) Gift Shop: Mrs. Lanette Reid moved that: "the Gift Shop be set up in the Board Room at Meadow Garden and that the kitchen/gift shop be set up for kitchen needs and general office space for staff and volunteers. This change to be tried for a period of one year before final determination is made." The motion was seconded and adopted. Mrs. Burnam moved that "some items, which are located in the Board Room, be moved to an appropriate location within the Museum or Heritage Center until a permanent location be found." The motion was seconded and adopted; (3) Reordering from the Byrd Cookie Company: Mrs. Whitson moved that: "we place a minimum order of 240 tins of Byrd Cookie products to retail for \$10.00, and tins will have Meadow Garden artwork." The motion was seconded and adopted.

The Chairman reported for Susan Jackson, Meadow Garden House Manager. Tourism Report for 2006: total tourist 1125, walk-ins 551, scheduled tours 218, total combined income \$2035.47 and Gift Shop income \$1059.50. Twelve (12) participating DAR Chapters, and forty-six (46) docents, with a total of

1380 hours.

Mrs. Tanner, State Treasurer, reported that on November 23, 2006, the Capital Funds #1 Certificate of Deposit matured and, as directed by the Finance Committee, the \$52,238.04 from this CD was combined with the \$22,320.36 from the Maintenance CD at maturity and \$16,319.40 from Whitson Administration, a total of \$90,877.80, was reinvested in a CD for 12 months at an APR of 5.75%. This CD is located at Integrity Bank, 900 Woodstock Road, Roswell, GA. Mrs. Tanner distributed the Summary of Accounts, as of January 22, 2007. Total assets are: Certificates of Deposit, \$340,877.80; Checking Account (RBC Centura), \$77,429.22; Money Market Account (First Georgia Community), \$21,052.69; Total Current Assets, \$444,359.71; Total Fixed Assets, \$125,284.44; Total Assets, \$569,644.15. Report was filed.

Mrs. Agostas, Meadow Garden Chairman, reported on the following: the Candlelight Tour was very well attended and we made \$1,149.97; the roof replacement is on schedule to start at the end of February by Mr. J.E. Braswell; and three (3) bids have been submitted for the Heritage Education Center porch/roof construction. The Chair asked Mrs. Agostas to find an architect to advise on the design of porch/roof and report to the Board; a bid for the historic house kitchen and workroom repairs was submitted by John Williams. Mrs. Patton moved that: "we accept the bid to make the stucco plaster repairs and painting in the kitchen and workroom of Historic Home, Meadow Garden. The bid was \$4,218.00 from Summerville Renovation Company, owned by John Williams." The motion was seconded and adopted. There was discussion concerning outdoor lighting repair, lighting around the flagpole at \$75.00, and the installation of one 40-watt high pressure sodium flood light on existing pole which is located on Walton Rehabilitation Center property at a cost \$30/month plus maintenance. Discussion followed with no action being taken. Mrs. Agostas brought to the meeting our flax/spinning wheel that is being restored; and that she has an appointment on January 24, 2007, with Linda Mitchell, teacher at Augusta State University, concerning university students helping at Meadow Garden and becoming docents. This may lead to Meadow Garden being open on Saturday and Sunday; Meadow Garden is now on the Augusta, Georgia website (same information as located on our Meadow Garden website).

Mrs. Lawson, Public Relations Chairman, reported that six hundred fifty (650) History of George Walton & Tour of Meadow Garden DVD's were distributed to all Georgia Public Middle Schools, and private and Christian schools with an enrollment of over 300. Extra DVD's may be purchased for \$12.00; Sharon Roberts, Augustin Clayton Chapter member, is typing a draft of Susan Jackson's verbal tour of Meadow Garden. This will be used to tape a virtual tour for the handicapped; bids were submitted from Lamar and Fairway Outdoor Advertising Companies for the production and installation of Meadow Garden "sign-board's", and display to be free one (1) to three (3) months. A full-color sample outdoor sign, designed by Mr. David Brown of the Lamar Outdoor Advertising Company, was shown to the Board. Mrs. Lawson moved that: "we contract with Lamar Outdoor Advertising to produce a sign for Meadow Garden not to exceed \$2,100.00 for 672 square feet. These funds to be taken from the State Regents Project." The motion was seconded and adopted; a DVD was sent to George Walton Academy, Monroe, GA., at their request; Mrs. Lawson will report to the Board on the production of new Meadow Garden Book, using most of material already published or collected plus adding pictures; she is to meet with the SAR State Board of Managers to discuss how the SAR may best help Meadow Garden and will check to see why our "promised" road/path finder signs were not in place at the Riverwatch Parkway/I-20 exit and other designated areas.

Mrs. Patron, Patrons Chairman, reported that as of today there are 199 Patrons with 30 Chapters giving \$100.00 or more; Meadow Garden Christmas Card were sent to donors and asked that a "Spring/Summer" note card be

designed.

Ms. Christian, Museum Shop Chairman, reported that sales from the Candlelight Tour totaled \$252.00, and \$743.00 total was sold at the State Board

of Management

In the absence of the Mrs. Cagle, Landscaping Chairman, Mrs. Agostas gave the report; the light was repaired for the Flag Pole; Roy Cagle can replace the other one for around \$50.00 and reposition it to focus on the front door instead of the flag: the sprinkler heads on either side of the front steps were capped off, per Mrs. Apostas's directions, to see if this will help with the water problems under the Historic House; Mrs. Cagle suggested the following. (1) Motion and/or security light(s) be placed at the drive-in gate and/or end of Heritage Center building, (2) motion light placed on the back steps of Meadow Garden (these lights may be less expensive than the Georgia Power Company lights on the Walton Rehabilitation Center property), (3) to hire, once a month, someone to do the heavy housecleaning.

The meeting recessed for lunch and resumed prior to the report of the

furnishings chairman.

Furnishings Chairman, Mrs. Burnam, reported that recording and cataloging the items at Meadow Garden continues; three (3) trips to Augusta were made; attended two days of classes in Past and Perfect Software instruction held in Warner Robins at the Museum of Aviation; gave Meadow Garden program to the Oliver Morton Chapter; will continue to research cost of tv/dvd/video equipment for the Heritage Education Center, this equipment is to be placed in a locked cabinet. The Board has agreed that a corner cabinet be made, to house the tv/dvd/video equipment, and placed in the right hand corner of the fireplace. The size of the cabinet will determine the size of the TV. We will have to get a cost of making the cabinet. The pedestals for the three busts were discussed. Weight will be a factor in determining the size. Mrs. Reid moved that: "the chairman of furnishings be authorized to purchase three (3) pedestals on which to display the busts of the three Signers of the Declaration of Independence, total cost not to exceed \$600.00, to be paid from the Meadow Garden Furnishings Fund." The motion was seconded and adopted. Mrs. Burnam moved that "the fireplaces that have the interior painted white be repainted black in keeping with their past purpose. This work to be completed with the painting being done by Summerville

Renovation Company." The motion was seconded and adopted. Mrs. Reid moved that: "the dissertation on George Walton, by Dr. Edwin C. Bridges, be placed in the Stribling Room at the Heritage Education Center." The motion was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Hunter, Docents Chairman, discussed cost and reservations for the lunch tour. Mrs. Lawson moved that: "there be a minimum of 10 guests before a lunch tour can be scheduled. Payment due one week before event." The motion

was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Nevins, Regent, College Hill Chapter, passed around a copy of the Historic Augusta News, Autumn 2006/Winter 2007, in which Meadow Garden is named in the article "Seven Buildings Honored with Preservation Awards from Historic Augusta."

Mrs. Sideman, Regent, Augusta Chapter, stated that members enjoyed

working during the Candlelight Tour.

Mrs. Chastain, Chairman Benefactor's Club, reported that the Committee

has nothing to report at this time, as more information is needed.

Mrs. Reid reported that the amendments and revisions to the Meadow Garden Standing Rules would be presented at the next meeting.

Ms. Reid announced that the next Meadow Garden Board Meeting would be Sunday, March 11, 2007, 1:00 to 3:00 p.m., in Savannah at the DeSoto Hilton.

There being no further business, Ms. Reid adjourned the meeting at 3:00 p.m. Approved: March 11, 2007

March 11, 2007

The Meadow Garden Board met on Monday, March 11, 2007, at the Hilton Savannah DeSoto Hotel, Savannah, Georgia. Laura Reid, State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m. Other members present were Barbara Chastain, Secretary; Josephine Rhodes Agostas, Frances Rush Nevins, Phyllis Johnson Tanner, Lanette Haar Reid, Shelby Alderman Whitson, Billie Gardner Hunter, Patricia Cown Burnam, Margaret Poole Cagle, Joyce Ball Patton, Phyllis Fox Lawson and Sally McGlaun Baldwin, Ex-Officio member. Absent were Charlotte Josephine Christian and Frances Yarborough Sideman.

Following the invocation offered by Ms. Reid, she welcomed everyone. Mrs. Chastain, Secretary, stated that each Board member had been sent a copy of the January 23, 2007 Meadow Garden Board Meeting minutes for their review. The Chairman asked if there were any corrections. There being none, the minutes

were approved as printed.

The Chairman reported the following. (1) The filming at Meadow Garden, sponsored by the National Membership Committee, was a great success and the final video would be about ten minutes in it's entirety. Ms. Reid thanked the Board members who participated in this filming. The cost of filming will be paid by the National Society and the Texas Society as part of their on going Historical Preservation project. (2) The Reception for Tourism and City/County Officials will be held on Thursday, May 10, 2007, 5-7 p.m. (3) The status of Meadow Garden Advisory Board will be reported at the next meeting. (4) David Waller will be recognized, with a certificate, at the Opening Night Banquet of this 109th State Conference, for his contribution to the filming of "History of George Walton & Tour of Meadow Garden DVD. (5) During the Meadow Garden breakfast each chairman to give the funniest or worst thing that has happened this past year concerning Meadow Garden.

Mrs. Tanner, State Treasurer, distributed the Summary of Accounts, as of February 28, 2007. Total assets are: Certificates of Deposit, \$340,877.80; Checking Account (RBC), \$116,975.75; Money Market Account (First Georgia Community), \$21,067.89; Total Current Assets, \$478,921.44; Total Fixed Assets, \$125,284.44; Total Assets, \$609,205.88. Report was filed. Patty Burnam,

Furnishings Chairman, suggested that the monetary appraisal of furnishings be added to the Meadow Garden Statement of Assets.

Mrs. Agostas, Meadow Garden Chairman, reported that the historic house kitchen and workroom repairs, of stucco plaster, have been completed and two coats of paint will be applied this week. Stan Woodhurst, architect, submitted a drawing for the Heritage Education building porch roof addition and that Bill S. Bennett submitted a bid of \$6,000.00 and Mr. John Williams submitted a bid of Mrs. Agostas moved that "we accept Mr. \$15,000.00 for the construction. Bennett's estimate of \$6,000.00 to build a porch for the front and back of our Heritage Center in compliance with architect's drawing." The motion was seconded and adopted. Mrs. Agostas stated that a new metal sign is being made for the front yard to include the new open hours for Saturday, 10:a.m. - 4:00 p.m. The Chairman also reported that roof work on the historic house would not start until James Braswell finishes with The Good Shepherd Episcopal Church.

Mrs. Lawson, Public Relations Chairman, passed around a full color scale model of the billboard that will be placed along the I-20 interstate area of Augusta. No definite dates for display had been set. Mrs. Lawson reported the following: that Mr. Waller is creating a new script for a "Virtual Tour" of the Historic House; that a new tri-fold brochure will be ready soon and will include new "last tour" hours of Meadow Garden will be at 3:30 p.m.; that publishers, for potential book on George Walton, will be contacted to give an estimate of cost of ink and paper only and that the road signs giving directions to Meadow Garden are ready. No time was given for the D.O.T. installation of signs.

Mrs. Patton, Patrons Chairman, reported on the status of "700 in 07" and that we were well on our way. Mrs. Patton suggested that a new Patrons pin be designed. Phyllis Lawson moved that "the cost of the new Patrons Pin be paid with Meadow Garden Administrative & Maintenance Funds." The motion was seconded and adopted. It was also stated that the new pin be given, without extra

cost, to each new Patron, along with a certificate.

In the absence of Ms. Christain, Gift Shop Chairman, Ms. Reid reported the Gift Shop had been moved to the "Board Room". New items, such as historical toys and documents, new lotions and etc., had been purchased. Ms. Reid showed the new note cards and the new prices stated. The selling price of the Byrd Cookie tins, with Meadow Garden Historic House on top, was discussed. Mrs. Reid moved that "due to the increase in production cost that the Byrd cookies retail for \$12.00 per tin". The motion was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Cagle, Landscaping Chairman, passed around the January 1996 issue of Augusta Magazine containing an article on Meadow Garden and photographs of Historic House before interior walls were papered. The magazine was given to the furnishings chairman. Mrs. Cagle stated that a new outside light was needed at the car gate and it was suggested that a motion light, a timer light, or some other light be considered. Mrs. Cagle moved that "we purchase an additional swivel light for the flag pole for front area, and a timer light for the Heritage Education building". The motion was seconded and adopted.

The proposed amendments and revisions to the Meadow Garden Standing Rules were discussed. Lanette Reid read the following: II -OPERATIONS Amend #3 by striking "in Meadow Garden" and adding on Meadow Garden property. Number 3 then will read: There will be no smoking on Meadow Garden property. Number 6 relates to distribution of keys. New locks have been installed; keys are to be returned at the end of each administration. With the approval of the State Conference, the distribution will be brought up to date and #6 will be reworded to include the distribution as approved by the Meadow Garden Board. III - VOLUNTEERS AND DOCENTS Amend #2 by substituting Gift (first line, twelfth word) for "museum". The first line then will read: Duties of docents shall include acting as guides, hostesses, working in Gift Shop... IV -FURNISHINGS Amend #6 by striking "Board" (second line, sixth word) and adding Chairman of Furnishings who shall report such changes to the Meadow Garden Board in a timely manner. Add a new #8 and renumber the remaining numbers. The new #8 to read: No items and/or furnishings shall be accepted "on loan." Amend #8, which will become #9 by adding after last sentence: The Meadow Garden Chairman of Furnishings shall maintain and keep current the "Past and Perfect" Program on all items and furnishings. VII - PATRONS Amend by adding a new #8 to read: The Meadow Garden Patrons book shall be divided into four (4) parts: (1) Individuals who give a minimum of fifty dollars in one payment, and chapters, organizations, businesses or groups that give a minimum of one hundred dollars in one payment; (2) In-Kind Patrons approved by the Meadow Garden Board in recognition of outstanding and/or unusual gifts of time, talents or expertise toward the betterment of Meadow Garden; (3) Honoraria, which shall list individuals or groups honored by a Patron gift as designated in #1, such listing to show the name of honoree (Patron) and the donor; (4) Memorials of at least fifty dollars which shall list the name of the individual memorialized and the name of the donor. Mrs. Reid moved that "the proposed amendments to the Meadow Garden Standing Rules as approved by the Meadow Garden Board be approved by the 109th State Conference." The motion was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Burnam, Furnishings Chairman, reported that she met at Meadow Garden with Mr. John Zembiak concerning the design of three (3) pedestals to hold the bust of the three (3) signers of the Declaration of Independence. Mr. Zembiak has now finished the three (3) pedestals, built and finished to our specifications, for a total price of four hundred and forty-one dollars, a savings of one hundred and fifty-nine dollars. Mrs. Burnam, after much research, purchased a Toshiba 32" flat screen HD television from HHGregg Company, in Macon, for nine hundred and forty-nine dollars. The 32" television was the limited size that could be placed in a corner cabinet located in the Heritage Center. Discussion followed concerning the design, submitted by Mr. John Zembiak, and building of one corner cabinet, to be located in the Heritage Center to the left side of the fireplace, to house the video/DVD equipment. Mrs. Burnam moved that "we have the corner cabinet built, per specification by Mr. John Zembiak, not to exceed one thousand dollars." The motion was seconded and adopted. Mrs. Burnam thanked Susan Jackson for her help in moving furniture from the Board Room to make room for the Gift Shop; and requested that volunteers be found to help with the placement of catalog numbers on items that have been recorded in the computer. This will be done this summer.

Mrs. Hunter, Docents Chairman, reported that several college students will help with tours on Monday, April 16, 2007 and Friday, June 1, 2007.

Mrs. Nevins, Regent, College Hill Chapter, stated that no lunches were scheduled until April.

Mrs. Chastain reported that there was no report of the Benefactor's Club Committee.

Mrs. Whitson submitted two proposals concerning the restoration and printing of the old album of photographs, believed to be the interior of the home of Madam LeVert, granddaughter of George Walton. Proposal #1: Fitz-Symms Photography. To copy 84 images to CD and all original artwork, repair and corrections are copyrighted materials of Fitz-Symms Photography and cannot be copied without written consent of the studio management, for a total cost of four hundred and forty-nine dollars and forty cents plus twenty-five dollars for any additional CD's. Proposal #2: Amanda Gainer. Seventy-five dollars to scan photos on an archival CD, one hundred and sixty dollars to print photos for display album on archival paper and ink, six dollars for additional CD's for a total price of two hundred and forty-one dollars. This includes her 25% discount on the scanning and CD. Mrs. Whitson moved that "we engage Amanda Gainer's proposal to scan the LeVert album to a DVD, make a second DVD and print the album from the DVD onto archival paper for a price of \$241.00." The motion was seconded and adopted.

Ms. Reid announced that the next Meadow Garden Board meeting will be Thursday, May 10, 2007, in Augusta at Meadow Garden at 12:30-2:30 a.m. There being no further business, Ms. Reid adjourned the meeting at 3:00 p.m.. Approved: May 9, 2007

Standing Rules for Meadow Garden

I MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

- The governing body of a museum, in this instance the Meadow Garden Board, serves the public interest as it relates to Meadow Garden, and must consider itself accountable to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, as well as to Meadow Garden; members should not attempt to act in their individual capacities, but all actions should be taken as a Board, Committee, or otherwise in conformance with the Standing Rules, the Act of Incorporation, or applicable Resolutions.
- 2. The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the three (3) Trustees as named in the Deed from the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, conveying Meadow Garden to the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution; namely, the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the State Chairman of Meadow Garden who is appointed by the State Regent; the Chapter Regents of the Augusta Chapter and the College Hill Chapter, both chapters being located in Augusta, who shall serve as Vice Chairman to the State Chairman of Meadow Garden; the State Treasurer; two Honorary State Regents; and six of the chairmen of Meadow Garden Committees, as appointed by the State Regent.
- 3. No Georgia Daughter shall serve in the same Meadow Garden Chairmanship more than three (3) consecutive terms.
- In addition to the six appointments to the Board which are made by the State Regent, she shall appoint two (2) Honorary State Regents.
- The State Second Vice Regent shall serve as ex-officio member of the Meadow Garden Board, being given the privilege of the floor without a vote.
- The State Regent shall serve as Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board, and the State First Vice Regent shall serve as Secretary of the Meadow Garden Board.
- 7. The Meadow Garden Board shall met a minimum of three (3) times each year; namely, preceding State Board of Management meeting, preceding annual State Conference and following Continental Congress, and at such other times as deemed necessary by the Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board. At least one (1) meeting of the Board shall be held at Meadow Garden each year. The Board may vote by teleconference, fax or email, if necessary.
- 8. The Meadow Garden Board shall have jurisdiction over the operation, maintenance and work of Meadow Garden and shall be the authority for Meadow Garden as long as such authority is not in conflict with the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, the Act of Incorporation for the Georgia State Society, Resolutions adopted by the Georgia State Society and/or directions which from time to time may be approved by action of the Georgia State Society assembled at its annual State Conference.
- The Meadow Garden Board shall supervise the placing of all insurance to cover the grounds and the Museum and its contents, including the fine arts, with accredited companies – coverage to include fire, theft and liability.
- 10. Five (5) voting members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.
- 11. Minutes shall be kept of each meeting and a copy shall be sent to each member and printed verbatim in the State Proceedings.

- 12. All expenses for maintenance, operation and purchases of furnishings and plantings shall be authorized by the State Regent, as Chairman of the Board, and paid by the State Treasurer. Expenditures exceeding \$1,000.00 must have the majority approval of the Board.
- 13. These rules will be binding on the actions of the Board in their operation of Meadow Garden. They may be changed by the following procedure: Members of the Board must have written notification of proposed changes one month prior to the next meeting of the Board; a two-thirds vote of the Board and approval of the State Conference are necessary to effect a change.
- 14. The State Regent shall appoint a Meadow Garden Advisory Board, which would act in an advisory capacity only and be composed of no more than fifteen (15) members representing various areas of expertise.

II OPERATIONS

- 1. Everyone entering Meadow Garden will be requested to sign the Register, including date, time of arrival and time of departure.
- No more than fifteen (15) people with each Docent are to be on tour in the house at a given time. Excess of this number may wait in the reception room or in the garden. The House Manager has the authority to enforce the Meadow Garden rules at all times.
- 3. There will be no smoking on Meadow Garden property.
- 4. No refreshments are to be served in or taken into the Museum by visitors, including chapters or the public. Should a group, such as a visiting chapter, desire refreshments, the garden is available for use if litter is properly disposed of by the serving group.
- 5. Tour visitors will be asked to pay a fee as set by the Board.
- 6. In August 2006 Dixie Lock and Safe, Inc., installed new locks and keys were made which cannot be duplicated. The State Regent, State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Manager by the direction of one of the two above, are authorized to have new keys made for Meadow Garden.

are authorized to have new keys made for Meadow Garden. There shall be two (2) complete sets of keys to Meadow Garden, which are eight (8) keys per set. There shall be four (4) sets of keys comprised of three (3) keys per set, which are the back door key to the historic house, the key to the George Walton Heritage Education Center, and the gate key. There shall be one (1) set of keys for "house" use, which are three (3) keys, one for the kitchen, one for the exterior bath at the historic house, and one for the interior door between the dining room and the old gift shop area. These three (3) "house" keys shall be kept in the old gift shop area for accessibility to all for use on a daily basis. There shall be one (1) gate key assigned to the landscape service company.

Keys are lettered per door of entry: Key # A is to the deadbolt of the three (3) doors of the George Walton Heritage Education Center; Key # B is to the deadbolt lock on the back door of the historic house; Key # C is to the gate; Key # D is to the Stribling Room in the George Walton Heritage Education Center; Key # E is to the kitchen; Key # F is to the deadbolt for the exterior bath at the historic house; Key # G is to the interior door between the dining room and the old gift shop; Key # H is to the office upstairs in the historic house.

Keys are numbered and assigned according to the appointed position on the Meadow Garden Board or as designated. Keys are distributed to the assigned person when they sign a "Meadow Garden Key Distribution Form." When this assigned person leaves her current position, she returns the keys and signs the same form she had signed when she accepted the keys. Keys go with the appointed position not the person.

Distribution of the keys: Key # 1 to State Regent, Chairman of Meadow Garden Board (complete set of 8 keys); Key # 2 to Meadow Garden Manager (complete set of 8 keys); Key # 3 to Chairman of Meadow Garden (keys A, B, C); Key # 4 to Docents Chairman (keys A, B, C); Key # 5 to Landscaping Chairman (keys A, B, C); Key # 6 for General Docent use (keys A, B, C) – to be checked "out" and "in" when used; Key # 7 are "house" keys (keys E, F, G); Key # 8 to landscape service (key C).

III VOLUNTEERS AND DOCENTS

- Docents, shall be those well screened and trained volunteers who will serve under the direct supervision of a Meadow Garden Chairman and/or the House Manager.
- Duties of docents shall include acting as guides, hostesses, working in gift shop, working in yard, cleaning in house, public relations. No volunteer work at or for Meadow Garden shall be done except under the direct guidance of the Meadow Garden Board and the chairman of the specific committee for that particular function.
- Cleaning or yard work volunteers shall be under the direction of the House Manager.

IV FURNISHINGS

- Items bought or accepted for the older section of Meadow Garden must predate 1821.
- Furnishings for the two (2) main floor rooms and the two (2) upstairs rooms in the newer section may be dated post 1820 but these rooms should be considered companion rooms to the rest of the house and furnished accordingly with all efforts made to keep furnishings of these four rooms dated no later than 1850.
- Reproductions may be used only when the physical condition of the antiques
 is jeopardized by exposure in areas where large numbers of visitors have
 easy access; or when environmental conditions including excessive light,
 dust, humidity or airborne impurities pose a threat to the preservation of
 originals.
- Effective March 12, 1983 all items donated to Meadow Garden shall be accepted with the written condition that they become the property of Meadow Garden and may be used, replaced or sold at the discretion of the Meadow Garden Board only.
- 5. All items that post date 1821, with the exception of those in the six (6) rooms of the newer section and those described in Number 3 of this section, shall be replaced as soon as possible with similar items pre-dating 1821.
- Once an item is placed, it shall not be moved from one location to another without permission of the Meadow Garden Chairman of Furnishings who shall report such changes to the Meadow Garden Board in a timely manner.

- Any item donated or purchased must have written documentation of appraisal.
- 8. No items and/or furnishings shall be accepted "on loan".
- 9. A file will be kept of all assets with information as to price paid or market value, date of acquisition, donor or where bought, documentation and appraisal and a description of article. One file will be kept in the reception room accessible to the Docents; a duplicate file will be in the possession of the Chairman of the Board. The Meadow Garden Chairman of Furnishings shall maintain and keep current the "Past and Perfect" Program on all items and furnishings.
- All items purchased or donated will be added to the Fine Arts insurance policy. Said policy will be reviewed and updated a minimum of once a year. Major additions to furnishings will be added immediately.
- Future plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the Museum.

V LANDSCAPING

- The landscape plan adopted by the Board shall be adhered to with no deviation unless recommended by an authority on landscape design and care.
- 2. Donations of shrubbery, plants or trees shall be accepted only when item is part of the master plan.
- Work on the grounds will be under the sole direction of the Meadow Garden Board and the Landscaping Chairman. Supervision of actual work will be provided by the Meadow Garden Chairman or the Landscaping Chairman of Meadow Garden.

VI GIFT SHOP

- The Chairman of the committee will be responsible for all purchases, subject to the approval of the Board or the State Regent. The Vice Chairman shall assist the Gift Shop Chairman with sales at state functions.
- Gift Shop operations will be self-supporting. In the event funds are needed for purchases, they may be advanced from available Meadow Garden funds and must be considered a loan and shall be repaid without interest within one (1) year from date of borrowing.
- 3. Profit from the Gift Shop shall be accounted for within the State Treasurer's books, with a percentage being transferred at the discretion of the Board at the end of the fiscal year and placed in the Maintenance Account. The audit of the Gift Shop operation shall be included in the annual audit of the Georgia State Society.

VII PATRONS

- 1. Donors to the following categories are eligible to be recognized:
 - A. Meadow Garden Capital Investment Trust Fund
 - B. Furnishings
 - C. Maintenance
 - D. Landscape
 - E. Heritage Education

2. Giving categories and levels for annual contributions:

\$10 Friends \$25 Supporters \$35 Signers \$50 **Patrons** \$103* The 1900 Society (giving level for 2003, giving would increase by \$1 each year) Sons and Daughters of Liberty \$250 \$500 Olivia's Legacy George Walton Society \$1,000 \$5,000 Meadow Garden Preservation Society

This information will be publicized in the Meadow Garden brochure and other appropriate places as determined by the Board.

- Chapter gifts, above the State Honor Roll requirements, automatically qualify the chapter to be recognized at an appropriate giving level determined by the categories listed in #2.
- 4. The State Treasurer will report these gifts to the Patrons Chairman.
- The Patrons Chairman will issue certificates to the qualifying individuals and chapters or groups.
- 6. A permanent book will be kept on public display at Meadow Garden to record the names of those who give at the Patrons level or above.
- 7. The Patrons Chairman will enter the names of donors in the appropriate book a minimum of once a year.

VIII PLAQUES & MARKERS

Plaques/Markers may be placed at Meadow Garden only at the discretion of the Board, and request meets the following criteria: Substantial service and/or contributions that secured the property and the heritage for the GSDAR. Individuals so recognized shall have been deceased for at least 5 years; Plaque/Marker will be paid for by person(s) requesting such recognition.

Plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the Museum. Additional markers shall not be permanently placed on the grounds.

Article VII Patrons

8. The Meadow Garden Patrons book shall be divided into four parts: (1) Individuals who give a minimum of fifty dollars in one payment, and chapters, organizations, businesses or groups that give a minimum of one hundred dollars in one payment; (2) In-Kind Patrons approved by the Meadow Garden Board in recognition of outstanding and/or unusual gifts of time, talents or expertise toward the betterment of Meadow Garden; (3) Honoraria, which shall list individuals or groups honored by a Patron gift as designated in #1, such listing to show the name of honoree (Patron) and the donor; (4) Memorials of at least fifty dollars which shall list the name of the individual memorialized and the name of the donor."

Bylaws

GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II OBJECTS

The objects of this Society shall be:

- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.
- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.
- (3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of the Georgia State Society.

Article IV

- **Section 1.** The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian and a State Curator.
- **Section 2.** (a) To be eligible for state office, a member shall hold and have held membership in a chapter or chapters within the Georgia State Society for at least 5 years prior to her election and have served a full term as chapter officer or state chairman.
- (b) No member shall be eligible to the same state office for two (2) successive terms. A member having served more than one half of a term in a state office shall be deemed to have served a full term.
- (c) No two state officers shall be members of the same chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.
- (d) To be eligible for the office of State Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State First Vice Regent or as State Second Vice Regent or served in each of these two offices of the Georgia Society.
- (e) To be eligible for the office of State First Vice Regent or for the office of State Second Vice Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State Recording Secretary or as State Treasurer of the Georgia State Society and shall have served a full term as a Chapter Regent of a chapter in the Georgia State Society.

Section 3. In recognition of valuable service to the Georgia State Society, a State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent for life by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Article V NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

- **Section 1.** (a) A candidate for state office shall request the endorsement of her chapter, taken by vote at a regular meeting of the chapter held between May and January preceding the State Conference at which state elections are held. The endorsement, signed by the Chapter Recording Secretary, shall include the office the candidate seeks and shall be received by the State Regent with the candidate's statement of intent to be a candidate prior to any announcement or campaigning by the candidate and/or her supporters.
- (b) A candidate for State Regent who wishes to present a slate of officers shall send to the State Regent in one packet the chapter endorsements and the statements of intent for each of her selected candidates. If received by the State Regent no later than December 1, these candidates shall be listed as a slate in the State Regent's Call to State Conference.
- (c) Candidates wishing to run independently of a slate, whose chapter endorsements and statements of intent are received by the State Regent no later than December 1 shall be listed as independent candidates in the State Regent's Call to State Conference.
- (d) A candidate whose chapter endorsement and statement of intent have been properly received by the State Regent may choose to announce her candidacy separate from the State Regent's Call to State Conference. Such a chapter endorsement and statement of intent shall be received by the State Regent at least ten (10) days prior to the opening of the State Conference at which the election is to take place.
- (e) A candidate who does not meet the requirements of these Bylaws shall be declared disqualified and ineligible for consideration for state office.
- (f) A chapter shall endorse no more than one chapter member for state office per election with the possible exception of candidates for State Regent and for State Corresponding Secretary.
- (g) In the event of the death, incapacitation or withdrawal of a candidate prior to the election, a replacement shall be made with notification in writing to the State Regent and accompanied by the chapter endorsement and statement of intent as directed by these Bylaws.
- **Section 2.** Nominations of candidates for all state offices shall be made at a designated meeting of the State Conference.
- **Section 3.** The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected biennially by ballot at the State Conference. A majority vote shall elect. Independent candidates shall be listed on the ballot in a separate column from those candidates presented as a slate.
- **Section 4.** The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two (2) years or until their successors are elected. Their terms of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.
- **Section 5.** (a) Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become State Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become State First Vice Regent subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. Vacancies in other state offices shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next State Board of Management meeting or State Conference, whichever shall come first.
- (b) Any state officer who is absent from the state for a continuous period of six (6) months or longer shall automatically relinquish her position as a state officer.
- **Section 6.** Upon the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Organizing Secretary General.
- **Section 7.** (a) A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot.

- (b) The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than eighteen (18) months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.
- (c) The endorsement shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent with the candidate's name and address to the Recording Secretary General to be received by the first day of the month preceding the designated Continental Congress.

Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall perform the duties prescribed in this article, and parliamentary authority adopted by the Society, and such others as the State Board of Management and the National Society may require.

Section 2. The State Regent shall:

- (a) be the chief executive officer and the official spokesman for the State Society;
- (b) have general supervision of the affairs of the State Society;
- (c) preside at all meetings of the State Conference, State Board of Management and the Executive Committee:
- (d) appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society;
 - (e) be ex-officio a member of all committees;
- (f) appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as advisor in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting;
- (g) sign all contracts and agreements made in the name of the Georgia State Society with the recorded approval of the Executive Committee and the State Board of Management or the State Conference as directed by these Bylaws;
- (h) be bonded and have the authority to draw upon funds of the State Society with the approval of the Finance Committee.
- (i) recommend to the Finance Committee a Certified Public Accountant who shall be approved by the Finance Committee.

Section 3. The State First Vice Regent shall:

- (a) perform the duties of the office of State Regent in the absence or inability of the State Regent;
 - (b) fill a vacancy in the office of State Regent;
 - (c) Perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;
- (d) serve on those committees as designated by these Bylaws and as directed by the State Regent.

Section 4. The State Second Vice Regent shall:

- (a) perform the duties of the office of State First Vice Regent in the absence or inability of the State First Vice Regent;
 - (b) fill a vacancy in the office of State First Vice Regent;
 - (c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;
 - (d) serve on committees as directed by the State Regent.

Section 5. The State Chaplain shall:

- (a) open all meetings of the State Conference and the State Board of Management with scripture reading and prayer;
- (b) preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and conduct such other religious services as may be required:
 - (c) be custodian of state properties pertaining to the duties of this office;
 - (d) be responsible for IN MEMORIAM pages in the Proceedings.

Section 6. The State Recording Secretary shall:

(a) record the proceedings of the meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;

- (b) compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and the Proceedings Committee.
- (c) submit to the appropriate National officers, the endorsement for Vice President General and the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent by the first day of the month preceding the month of Continental Congress of the year in which said balloting was held:

Section 7. The State Corresponding Secretary shall:

- (a) conduct correspondence and send notices on behalf of the State Regent, the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as may be directed by them;
- (b) receive from the chapters the Master Questionnaires and distribute to the appropriate state chairmen.

Section 8. The State Organizing Secretary shall:

- (a) assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new chapters:
- (b) assist chapters in conjunction with appropriate state officers and chairmen in revitalization.

Section 9. The State Treasurer shall:

- (a) be bonded:
- (b) be the custodian of the funds of the State Society, placing them in institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance;
- (c) receive the state dues and State Conference registration fees from the chapters and receive all sums contributed by the chapters for state and national projects, disbursing monthly to the Treasurer General all funds designated for national projects;
 - (d) disburse other funds only when authorized by the State Regent in writing;
- (e) keep an account of all sums received or disbursed by using the basic double entry form of bookkeeping according to accepted accounting procedures and keep receipts for all transactions:
- (f) prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference, sending a copy to the State Chairman of the Finance Committee ten (10) days in advance of each meeting:
- (g) be a member of the Finance Committee and an ex-officio member of the Credentials Committee:
- (h) balance and prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year; said audit by a Certified Public Accountant, shall be performed and delivered within forty-five (45) days of receipt of books.
- (i) An internal review of the State Treasurer's records shall be performed when a change in this office occurs after the close of the fiscal year. Following the review, the records shall be turned over to the new State Treasurer. The committee to review the books shall be composed of the State First Vice Regent, the immediate Past State Treasurer, the immediate past Finance Chairman and a current Chapter Regent appointed by the State Regent.

Section 10. The State Registrar shall:

- (a) when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution prove eligibility and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars;
 - (b) keep a correct list of all members in the state:
 - (c) report on membership to the State Conference;
 - (d) assist with the verification of the credentials;
- (e) be in possession of the computer and software owned by the Georgia State Society and see that it is maintained.

Section 11. The State Historian shall:

 (a) be in charge, within the state, of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General as well as those authorized by the Georgia State Society;

- (b) keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves within the state;
 - (c) prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General;
- (d) promote the study of American history, state and county history and historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the founding of our state and counties.

Section 12. The State Librarian shall:

- (a) serve as liaison between the Librarian General and the Georgia Chapters and disseminate general information on the NSDAR Library;
- (b) cooperate with the director of the Georgia Department of Archives and History, making the needs of the Archives known to the chapters;
- (c) collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing them wherever accepted in such libraries and Archives as may be chosen by the State Board of Management;
- (d) solicit, with the approval of the Executive Committee, contributions from the chapters for purchase of such books as requested by the office of the Librarian General, and/or the various libraries in Georgia which the State Society approves;
- (e) receive gifts of books and other printed material from the chapters to be donated to the approved libraries and Archives;
- (f) maintain a constant supply of bookplates to the NSDAR Library, the Georgia Department of Archives and History and for purchase by the chapters.
- **Section 13.** The State Curator shall: be custodian of the State portable properties and shall have them properly stored and made ready for use at state meetings.
- **Section 14.** All officers will keep a Procedure Book of Instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new officers to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. State Conference:

- a) The annual meeting of the Georgia State Society shall be known as the State Conference. It shall be for the purpose of:
 - (1) receiving reports of officers, committees and Chapter Regents;
 - (2) electing officers biennially;
 - (3) promoting programs in furtherance of the objects of the Society:
 - (4) any other business that may arise:
 - i. annual budget shall be adopted,
 - ii. all projects of the State Society requiring funding shall be voted upon at State Conference or ratified by members at State Conference if previously voted upon by the State Board of Management,
 - iii. no project extending beyond the term of the presiding officer may be accepted at any meeting other than by vote at State Conference.
- (b) The State Conference will be held between February 1 and the time of the meeting of Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week;
 - (c) The State Regent shall fix the time and place of meetings;
- (d) The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credentials form to the chapters not less than sixty (60) days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 2. The voting members of the State Conference shall be:

- (a) the officers and Honorary State Regents of the State Society;
- (b) the officers and honorary officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state;
 - (c) the Chapter Regent, or in her absence, the Vice Regent or alternate of each chapter;
- (d) delegates or alternates of each chapter of the state as designated by the Bylaws of the National Society for representation at Continental Congress.
- Section 3. Only a chapter member in good standing whose credentials have been completed in accordance with the instructions of the State Regent and the State

Credentials Chairman for the State Conference and in accordance with the Standing Rules of the National Society shall be eligible to represent her chapter at state and national meetings.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the chapter, except in the case of the Regent or Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at an annual State Conference, shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the state of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference the privilege of the floor and the right to speak shall be accorded to the State Chairmen and State Vice Chairmen. They may not vote unless they are duly registered as voters of the State Conference.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Society may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen (15) days' notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Forty-five (45) voting members, representing not less than twenty (20) chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The state officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents and the Regents, or in their absence, the Vice Regents of the chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the fall, following the October meeting of the National Board, It may meet whenever called by the State Regent. A minimum of twenty (20) days' notice shall be given as to the time and place of any such meeting.

Section 3. Thirty (30) members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference or as proscribed by these Bylaws.

Section 5. State chairmen, vice chairmen, committee members of the National and Standing Committees may attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privilege of the floor and the right to speak, but shall not vote. One (1) member from each chapter may attend the meetings, if invited by the chapter regent, and shall be granted the privilege of the floor, but shall not have the right to speak or vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article IX EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, shall attend the meetings, but may not vote.

Section 3. This Executive Committee shall:

- (a) perform such duties of the State Board of Management between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient;
- (b) meet at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three (3) members of the committee:
 - (c) vote by teleconference, e-mail or fax, if necessary;

 (d) receive and make recommendations for projects requiring expenditure of funds outside routine expenditures to be considered by the State Conference;

(e) make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. Decisions of the Executive Committee shall be acted upon at the next meeting of the State Board of Management or at State Conference, whichever shall come first.

Article X FINANCES

Section 1. (a) The fiscal year of the Georgia State Society shall be July 1 through the last day of June.

b) The annual budget, prepared by the Finance Committee, shall cover the fiscal year and be prepared on the basis of dues payable for the calendar year beginning December first preceding.

(c) The Finance Committee shall propose the per capita amount and

distribute according to the annual membership count. The per capita amount and distribution shall be indicated on the budget presented annually. Funds to be included in the per capita designations shall be Tamassee DAR School, Kate Duncan Smith DAR School, Berry College, Lucy Cook Peel Fund, McCall Genealogical Fund and Meadow Garden Maintenance.

Section 2. The annual dues of chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be \$10.00 for each member of the chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1.

Section 3. (a) Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the state dues, a conference registration fee of \$10.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under these Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether chapter is represented or not.

(b) State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay a conference fee of \$10.00 at the time of registration.

(c) Other members of the Georgia State Society who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a conference fee of \$7.00 at the time of registration.

(d) All host chapters may charge a registration fee to those not purchasing a meal ticket to off-set the cost of hosting state/district meetings.

Section 4. (a) The State Treasurer and the State Regent and such others entrusted with funds of the Georgia State Society as may be designated by the State Board of Management shall be bonded. (See Article VI, Sections 2 and 9);

(b) The State Treasurer with the approval of the State Regent and the State Chairman of the Finance Committee shall place the funds of the Georgia State Society in financial institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage;

(c) The placement of restricted savings funds and investment funds of the Georgia State Society shall be placed to the credit of the Georgia State Society by the State Treasurer under the direction of the Finance Committee. Monies may be invested in U. S. Treasury obligations or other interest bearing obligations of federally insured financial institutions;

(d) The accounts of the State Treasurer shall be annually prepared for audit by a Certified Public Accountant immediately following the end of the State Society fiscal year and no later than July 15 and delivered to the CPA by that date;

(e) Should the State Treasurer be incapacitated, the State Regent, after consultation with the Chairman of the Finance Committee and with the approval of the Executive Committee, shall appoint an Acting State Treasurer to serve until such time as the State Treasurer is able to resume her duties or a new State Treasurer is appointed and ratified as stated in Article V, Section 5 (a).

Section 5. The expenses incurred by the State Regent in the performance of duty shall be paid each year from the State Dues Fund:

(a) Five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) shall be taken each year to defray her necessary travel expenses;

(b) Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent, as budgeted, shall be paid by the State Treasurer who shall keep all receipts of these expenses. No expenses exceeding the budgeted amount shall be paid by the State Treasurer.

Section 6. At the close of the books annually, \$5,000.00 shall be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies Fund" so that at the end of each administration a total of \$10,000.00 will be reserved. This money is to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration.

Article XI COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Honorary State Regents of the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution shall function as an advisory committee to the State Regent and to the Georgia State Society.

Section 2. The State Regent shall appoint the following standing committees:

- (a) Bylaws: An Honorary State Regent shall be appointed as chairman and the committee shall be composed of two (2) other Honorary State Regents and one (1) member from each district:
- (b) Finance: This committee shall be composed of seven (7) members to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two (2) Honorary State Regents, one (1) active chapter regent and one (1) active chapter member, who shall not be an Honorary State Regent, nor a state officer, nor a chapter regent. One of the two Honorary State Regents shall be appointed chairman. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund. This committee shall have charge of all investments of the Georgia State Society funds.
- (c) Resolutions: This committee shall be composed of all Honorary State Regents, the State Parliamentarian and three (3) chapter members:
- (d) Proceedings: This committee shall be composed of the State Recording Secretary, the immediate past State Recording Secretary, State First Vice Regent and four (4) additional Daughters, at least one of whom shall be an Honorary State Regent.
- **Section 3.** The State Regent shall appoint such other committees, standing or special, as the State Conference shall authorize and actions of the State Board of Management and of the National Society shall require. The appointments shall be concurrent with the term of the State Regent making the appointments and shall terminate with the end of the administration.
- **Section 4.** Additional appointments may be made to any of the committees and vacancies shall be filled by the State Regent with timely notification to the membership.
- **Section 5.** The duties of committees shall be such as these Bylaws, the State Conference, the State Board of Management or the National Society shall prescribe.
- **Section 6.** All chairmen will keep a Procedure Book of instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

Article XII CHAPTERS

Section 1. To expedite the work of the Society, the chapters of the Georgia State Society shall be placed in geographical districts:

- (a) A chairman appointed by the State Regent shall coordinate the work of all chapters as needed; she shall be titled "Coordinator of Districts";
- (b) Each district shall have a Director appointed by the State Regent to work as a committee under the direction and supervision of the Coordinator of Districts and the State Regent.
- Section 2. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April 1 in the year of chapter elections. The Chapter Regent shall report annually the names of the elected officers

promptly on the form provided by the State Regent for this purpose, with copies to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, and the State Recording Secretary.

Section 3. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent, the State Recording Secretary, and the District Director at the time designated by the State Regent.

Article XIII MEADOW GARDEN

Meadow Garden, property owned by the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, shall be operated as follows:

- (a) The governing body shall be the Board of Trustees composed of the following members: the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Chairman who shall be appointed by the State Regent;
- (b) The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the following members: the State Regent who shall serve as Chairman; the State First Vice Regent who shall serve as Secretary; the Chairman of Meadow Garden; the Regents of the Augusta and College Hill Chapters; the State Treasurer; two (2) Honorary State Regents; and the chairmen of the six (6) subcommittees appointed by the State Regent Docents, Furnishings, Landscaping, Gift Shop, Patrons and Public Relations.
- (c) The Meadow Garden Board shall operate with Standing Rules approved by the State Conference.

Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. The current edition of *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised*, shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law in matters not covered by these Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

Article XV AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent, the State Parliamentarian, and the State Bylaws Chairman. The State Regent shall send a copy to each chapter, at least sixty (60) days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the Call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

Article XVI DISSOLUTION

Although the period of duration of the Georgia State Society is perpetual, if for any reason the State Society is to be dissolved or otherwise terminated, no part of the property of the Society or any of the proceeds shall be distributed to or inure to the benefit of any of the officers or members of the Society. Upon the dissolution of the Georgia State Society, assets shall be distributed by the Board of Management and/or the Executive Committee to and only to the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the local United States District Court, exclusively to such organization or organizations as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated within the meaning of section 501 (c)(3), with purposes and objectives consistent with those of the Georgia State Society.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year, a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24, 1899. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21) No Conference was held in 1911, the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912," and amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, page 211).

BYLAWS

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National or State Bylaws, and a current copy is to be filed with the State Parliamentarian.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS

Notice of change of address of members shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, State Regent, State Corresponding Secretary, and the State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHANGE OF NAME

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, and the State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHAPTER ELECTIONS

As chapter elections are to be held before April 1, names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, 1776 D Street, NW, Washington, DC 2006-5303, the State Regent or the State Regent-Elect, the State Recording Secretary and the State Corresponding Secretary by April 1. The full Christian name of chapter officers shall be given, along with her husband's given name or initials, address, zip code, telephone number, fax and e-mail. In accordance with the National Bylaws, a Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years.

CHAPTER REPRESENTATION AT STATE AND NATIONAL MEETINGS

At the State Board of Management a chapter is represented by the Chapter Regent, or in her absence by the First Vice Regent, and one non-voting member,

if invited by the Chapter Regent.

The voting representation of each chapter at State Conference and Continental Congress shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received in the Office of the Treasurer General by December 1. Membership 12-19: Regent only; 20-49: Regent + 1 delegate = 2 votes; 50-99: Regent + 2 delegates = 3 votes; 100-149: Regent + 3 delegates = 4 votes; 150-199: Regent + 4 delegates = 5 votes; 200-249: Regent + 5 delegates = 6 votes; 250-299: Regent + 6 delegates = 7 votes. Chapters with membership of 300 and over will have an additional delegate for each additional 50 members exceeding 299.

CONFERENCE REGISTRATION

On or before December 1, each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer the state dues and a Conference Registration fee of \$10.00 per each delegate to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws. This fee is to be paid whether represented or not and is derived by recommendation of the Finance Committee

to the Executive Committee. This is a requirement stated in the Georgia State

Bylaws, Article X, Section 3 (a).

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the Conference Registration Fee of \$10.00 at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters, shall pay a Conference Registration Fee of \$7.00 at the time of registration.

CONTRIBUTIONS

All contributions by chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

The deadline for chapter contributions to the Georgia co-op ads sent to the State Chairman, DAR Magazine is February 29. The checks are to be made payable to the State Chairman, DAR Magazine and sent to her.

DATE FOR ANNUAL AUDIT

The Georgia State Society Fiscal Year is July 1 to June 30. Bylaw Article X, Section 1. The State Treasurer should prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year. Bylaw Article VI, Section 6, (h).

DEADLINES

State Officers and Chairmen welcome chapter reports when completed. Deadline dates are given to ensure conformity for inclusion in reports to National Officers. Per National Society Bylaws, the deadline date is determined by the Federal Postal Service or other carrier, showing cancellation date and not by the date reports are received.

DECEASED MEMBERS

Deaths shall be reported promptly to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Chaplain and the State Registrar by the corresponding Chapter officer. A complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and date of death shall be furnished to the State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for the Conference Memorial Service and for State Proceedings.

DUES

Before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer sends to the State Treasurer state dues of \$10.00 per member. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the December through February Board meeting of the National Society. Before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer sends to the office of the Organizing Secretary General National dues of \$30.00 per member except Life Members, with check made payable to the Treasurer General NSDAR.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS

To insure uniformity and convenience in binding, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, 8 ½ x 11 ½ inches, with 1 ½ inches from top of page, 1 ½ to 2 inches on left side, 1 inch on right side and at bottom. Two copies shall be sent to the State Chairman of Genealogical Records. The booklet, "Instructions for Copying Source Records and Their Preparation for Library Use," should be obtained from the Corresponding Secretary General.

GEORGIA HOSPITALITY FUND

"WHEREAS, the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds a social event in Washington during Continental Congress which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society:

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed

\$500.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this fund shall not be cumulative." *Proceedings* 1955, amended 2001.

INFORMATION FOR STATE OFFICERS AND STATE CHAIRMEN

State Officers and State Chairmen shall send to the State Regent and the State Treasurer a copy of any letters mailed to chapters.

NOMINATIONS

The following resolution which applies to the announcement of the candidacy for State Regent appears in the Proceedings of the 20th State Conference, 1918:

RESOLVED, that it is the judgment of the Executive Board that announcements for State Regent should not be made earlier than three months prior to the meeting of the Conference and they shall be furnished to the press for publication.

Chapter Regents should exclude NSDAR Chapter Achievement Award and State Honor Roll, as these will be added when confirmed. Your name should be consistent with the lists of Chapter Regents and State Chairmen as found in this *Proceeding*. Winners of awards and awards to be offered shall each be listed on separate sheets identified with the title of the committee and the award. Reports and awards to be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary by the following deadlines; Chapter Regents by February 1: State Officers and State Chairmen by March 1.

PROCEEDINGS MATERIAL, ABSOLUTE DEADLINE FOR

"WHEREAS, a definite deadline must be established and adhered to for all reports and material to be in the hands of the Proceedings Committee in order to be delivered to the printer by June 1:

RESOLVED, that all FÍNAL reports and materials must be received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1 with the exception of the Auditor's Report and any information sent out by the National DAR Headquarters. This does not alter the requirement in the "Items of Information" in the Proceedings that all reports shall be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary on or before February 15, the ORIGINAL being sent to the Secretary for the *Proceedings*

AND FURTHER RESOLVED, this policy will be strictly adhered to and the material not received by the State Recording Secretary by May 1 will be omitted from the *Proceedings*."

HOTEL CONTINGENCY RESERVE: It was moved that the Hotel Contingency Fund for State Conference be increased from \$1,000 to \$2,000. These funds are to secure a hotel for State Conference and are to be replaced from State Conference income reimbursing the fund yearly for the amount used. *Proceedings* 1999-2000 – Finance, page 128; *Proceedings* 200-2001 – Finance, page 129.
