

The Executive Committee of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, met August 20, 2008, in the Comfort Inn Hotel in Tifton, at 8:00 P.M. with Barbara Blakely Chastain, State Regent, presiding.

The State Regent called the meeting to order and offered the Invocation. Mrs. Chastain then welcomed the members of the Executive Committee, and thanked them for the get-together prior to the meeting. Copies of the minutes of the March 30, 2008, Executive Committee Meeting were previously provided to the State Officers and State Parliamentarian. There being no corrections, the minutes were approved as printed.

The State Regent reviewed a questionnaire to be given to all workshop attendees for use in future planning. Mrs. Chastain asked that each officer notify her respective liaison committees the 2008-2009 Master Questionnaire had just been posted on the National members' website. Wendy Fox, VIS Chairman is working on a user friendly site for members, on which state and chapter information will be posted. The State Regent asked Registrar Robin Towns to serve as her representative to bring greetings to the SAR National Assembly meeting in Atlanta on July 6, 2009. The Regent will be attending Continental Congress at that time. The State Regent solicited ideas for the 2009 Daughters newsletter magazine ads. Mrs. Chastain read a letter from the Tennessee State Regent asking permission for Tennessee daughters who are Georgia residents to contact Georgia schools in counties where there is no Georgia DAR chapter. The Regent suggested contacting the closest Georgia chapters and asking if they would like to contact the schools. If no one in Georgia wishes to pursue it, then permission could be given on a very specific and time limited basis. A new IRS directive regarding state club accounts was explained. The State Treasurer must now be a signer on all state club accounts, and club monies must go into the State Treasury accompanied by new transmittal forms. The Regent stated the need for "up-front" monies for workshops was becoming prohibitive for hostess chapters. In order to guarantee locations when planning meetings without having to pay large up front charges, obtaining a "corporate" credit card for the State Society is under consideration. The State Regent will be attending the State Conferences of the Alabama, Florida, South Carolina, and Iowa Societies. The State Regent announced Charles Edmonds had accepted a position at another school and was no longer Director of KDS DAR School. Mr. Edmonds had expressed to the Regent his desire for benches to be placed around the KDS campus at a cost of \$300 each. He had also suggested the possibility of expanding the areas covered by brick pavers. The new State Regent's Project pin will be sold by Nina Hill.

The Regent shared the following information from National: The National Directory and Handbook will be available in October. Resolutions and Proceedings will be due to National earlier this year. Caldwell filled orders for 15,900 pins last year. The National Society now has over 30,000 chapters. All school contributions should be quickly submitted. The IRS requires chapters to spend at least 75 percent of chapter income on DAR programs. Twenty-five percent may go to chapter management. A "temporary restricted fund" is recommended, when setting up new funds. Chapters should encourage all transfers to take place after December 1, and any resignations prior to December 1. Life membership of \$800 is tax-deductible. All new members now receive a new member packet from the National Society. The Registrar General would like to be notified if new members are not receiving the packets. New "OnBase" software is being used at National for Member/Genealogy.

The First Vice Regent reported plans for the 2009 Georgia Luncheon had been made with the JW Marriott hotel, and the necessary form filed with the National Society. Mrs. Baldwin attended the Meadow Garden Board meeting, serving as secretary. She coordinated the surprise get-together with the State Officers and Honorary State Regents in honor of the State Regent prior to the Executive Committee meeting. Mrs. Baldwin reminded each officer to contribute \$80 to cover normal Executive Committee expenses over the next two years.

The Second Vice Regent reported corresponding with representatives at four DAR schools in preparation for their attendance at District Workshops. Mrs. Lingelbach attended the grand opening of the Pulliam Center and Tamassee DAR School Thrift Store on June 21, delivering gowns and dressy dresses for a "Special Times" boutique sponsored by Georgia Daughters. Donations for the boutique are being collected at all three district workshops; bulk thrift (two bags per chapter per school) will only be collected at State Board of Management. The policy regarding collection of thrift has been changed to reflect value of thrift rather than pounds. Mrs. Lingelbach reported corresponding with Mrs. Kay Hightower relative to changes to the Hightower Award criteria. Voices on a quilt will be offered at workshop, with the drawing at State Board of Management and proceeds going to the State Regent's School Projects, Lady Bug pins in support of the National DAR School Chairman's projects are being sold at the workshops for \$25.00 each. Mrs. Lingelbach will be collecting needed items for the KDS health clinic. The Second Vice Regent expressed her appreciation for having a DAR Schools committee for the first time. The Second Vice-Regent attended the Meadow Garden Board meeting, the Kate Duncan Smith DAR School Graduation Awards Ceremony, and Continental Congress.

The Chaplain was not present following an automobile accident, but submitted the following report: Mrs. Patton expressed thanks for prayers and condolences during her father's illness and death. balance \$107,656.29; and certificates of deposit \$40,866.08; making total assets of \$161,135.78. The financial report was filed. Mrs. Fischer reported the checking account had been moved to Wachovia, to facilitate deposits made by State Chairmen at locations state-wide. The Meadow Garden accounts as of August 15, 2008, were summarized as follows: certificates of deposit: \$350,000.00; checking account balance \$71,851.34; money market balance \$29,769.30; fixed assets \$144,693.12; making total assets of \$596,413.76. The Meadow Garden budget was approved at the last board. Mrs. Fischer expressed appreciation to Mrs. Tanner, the previous Treasurer. Mrs. Tanner stated the books of the previous administration were currently at the auditors and should be returned by September 1.

The Registrar reported the State Society's membership database was received from the previous Registrar, along with excellent instructions for the duties of the office. Mrs. Towns had begun processing membership changes from the National Society and the chapters. The membership count as of January 1, 2008 was 6,989. The current membership count is 7,127, with 138 new members since the first of the year. There are 458 Junior members in the State Society. The Registrar attended Continental Congress and the State Regent's tea hosted by Fort Peachtree Chapter.

The Historian reported the graves of three members had been marked. Chapters should allow at least six months for obtaining approval from the Historian General's office for placement of any marker. Mrs. Lemesis attended Continental Congress. The Historian was designated to sell remaining State Button Gwinnett pins with all proceeds going to the Americana collection.

The Librarian reported attending Continental Congress and Fort Peachtree Chapter's "Sunshine Tea" held on July 26th in honor of State Regent and State Corresponding Secretary. Mrs. Wright had two copies of *Forgotten Patriots: African Americans and American Indians in the Revolutionary War* and is placing one in Macon Library and asked for suggestions for placement of the other copy.

The Curator reported the Flags and banner would be present at all the workshops.

The Parliamentarian stated the new process for assembling the Chapter Information Packets had worked well. The packets went together quickly and easily, and the cost was approximately \$3 each. Mrs. Setters explained seating for the workshops.

The State Regent reminded officers they represent all Georgia daughters and must not take sides in internal chapter problems. The Parliamentarian reminded officers to use caution in making written and verbal statements.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at: 9:45 p.m.

Friday, October 31, 2008

The Executive Committee of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, met October 31, 2008, in the Holiday Inn Hotel in Roswell, at 6:55 p.m. with Barbara Blakely Chastain, State Regent, presiding.

Others present were: Sally McGlaun Baldwin, First Vice Regent; Virginia Grace Lingelbach, Second Vice Regent; Joyce Ball Patton, Chaplain; Melodye G. Brown, Recording Secretary; Martha Middlebrooks Knight, Corresponding Secretary; Phyllis Johnson Tanner, Organizing Secretary; Ida Best Fischer, Treasurer; Susan Durden Lemesis, Historian; Marilyn Moulton Wright, Librarian; Charlotte Josephine Christian, Curator; Rena Morgan Setters, Parliamentarian.

The State Regent called the meeting to order and offered the Invocation. Mrs. Chastain then welcomed the members of the Executive Committee. Ms. Brown read the August 20 Executive Committee Meeting minutes. There being no corrections, the minutes were approved as read.

The State Regent announced plans for four workshops in 2009. Hostess chapters will be Fort Frederica, Saint Andrew's Parish and Brunswick in Saint Simons on August 19. Thronateeska in Albany on August 20. Fielding Lewis in Marietta on August 21, and Philadelphia Winn in Lawrenceville on August 22. Mrs. Chastain asked each officer to notify her respective liaison committees the Georgia 2008-2009 Master Questionnaire has been given to Chapter Regents and is available on the Georgia Society's members' website. The State Treasurer now handles all state club accounts, and all checks must be made to the State Society. The State Regent displayed the new issue of American Spirit featuring Meadow Garden on its cover. The Georgia co-op ads in the Daughters newsletter were also viewed. Permission has been obtained to use the design of the Georgia state pin on ads and on note cards, the sale of which will benefit Meadow Garden, Mrs. Chastain and the State Chaplain attended a lecture on the Edgefield, South Carolina potter, "Daye the Slave", at the Atlanta History Center where she shared photographs of three, possibly four, jugs made by Dave which are owned by the Georgia State Society and housed at Meadow Garden. The State Society has been asked by the National Society to participate in a Virtual Tour of the NSDAR Museum Period Rooms by funding a 360 degree photo tour of Peter Tondee's Tavern. Mrs. Baldwin, on recommendation of the Finance Committee, moved "the State Regent participate in the NSDAR Museum Period Rooms Virtual Tour at the cost of \$300.00 and to be paid from the Georgia Room Fund." The motion was adopted. The date for the 2009 State Board of Management was changed from November 6-7 to October 23-24. The State Regent commended Wendy Tyson Fox and Amy Pittman Lawson for the excellent job they have done in redesigning the State Society websites. Mrs. Chastain stated the best part of being State Regent is being invited to the many chapter events, which she has so enjoyed attending.

The First Vice Regent reported the request form for the 2009 Georgia Luncheon has been submitted to the National Society, menu plans made with the JW Marriott hotel, and luncheon decorations are being prepared with the help of Mrs. Lingelbach and Mrs. Setters. Mrs. Baldwin, on recommendation of the Meadow Garden and Finance Committees, moved "all back copies of the Lucy Cook Peel books will be offered for sale for \$1.00. Orders will be taken and shipped by the State Chairman or orders will be taken at State Conference." The motion was adopted. Mrs. Baldwin attended two Meadow Garden Board meetings, serving as secretary. She attended the Finance Committee meeting earlier in the day. Mrs. Baldwin reported giving several chapter programs.

The Second Vice Regent reported Georgia sales of the Lady Bug pin supporting the DAR schools have resulted in proceeds totaling \$1,600 thus far. Over 300 gowns and dressy dresses, along with jewelry, purses, and shoes have been placed at the new Tamassee Thrift store for the Georgia sponsored "Special Times" boutique rack. Clinic supplies estimated at \$1,500 were donated to Kate Duncan Smith DAR School. Snack and drink mixes for the children's cottages at Tamassee DAR School will be collected tomorrow. Voices sold on the quilt thus far have netted over \$600 for the State Regent's School Projects. Mrs. Lingelbach will be collecting thrift during State Board of Management for delivery to Crossnore and Tamassee, to enable chapters to meet the Hightower Award requirements.

The Chaplain stated 75 deaths have been reported by Georgia chapters. Notes of condolence have been sent when addresses were provided. Birthday cards

have been sent to 60 Georgia Daughters age 90 or above. Plans for the 2009 Memorial service are underway. Mrs. Patton reported problems with the current candle lighters, and suggested they be replaced. Mrs. Tanner moved "the Georgia State Society purchase two 36 inch candle lighters with wood handles at a cost of \$176.00 plus tax and shipping, to be paid from the Georgia State Society General Fund." The motion was seconded and adopted. Mrs. Patton reiterated the great interest currently in "Dave the Slave" pottery, and shared a book written on his pottery, Carolina Clay.

The Recording Secretary reported the 2007-2008 Proceedings will be distributed at this State Board of Management. Work continues on the 2008-2009 Proceedings. Ms. Brown thanked Mrs. Baldwin for ordering a supply of three part motion cards for use during this administration. Ms. Brown attended the Constitution Week Luncheon, a tea for the State Regent in Fayetteville, and presented programs to Hightower Trail and Xavier Chapters.

The Corresponding Secretary reported contact information in the Directory was updated as changes were received, and changes communicated to the Recording Secretary for the Proceedings. Labels were printed for distribution of the 2007-2008 Proceedings. In September the Regent's letter # 2 was emailed. Mailing the letters electronically reduced costs from \$650.36 on Regent's letter # 1 to \$35.22 on letter # 2. The Georgia State Society Master Questionnaire was compiled and printed for distribution at this State Board of Management.

The Organizing Secretary reported the Regent of Edward Hagin Chapter has requested assistance with membership. In response, Dee McCranie Redkevitch, Volunteer Genealogists Chairman, will conduct a Field Genealogist workshop in the Dallas area next spring to include the Sons of Liberty Chapter, SAR, and the Paulding County Historical Society. The Fort Early Chapter has applied to National to disband. Mrs. Tanner offered any assistance the chapter may require during the disbandment process. Proper transfer of disbanded chapter assets to the State Society was discussed.

The Treasurer gave the following summary of accounts for the Georgia State Society as of October 16, 2008: checking account balance \$25,302.74; money market balance \$51,066.66; and certificates of deposit \$91,320.04; making total assets of \$169,189.44. The financial report was filed. The Meadow Garden accounts as of October 16, 2008, were summarized as follows: certificates of deposit: \$350,000.00; checking account balance \$69,288.55; money market balance \$29,703.28; fixed assets \$171,258.69; making total assets of \$620,350.52. Treasurer's forms are now available on the Georgia Members website. Club accounts are being closed; all funds must now go through the Treasurer. New procedures will begin as of tomorrow's State Board of Management.

The Registrar was not present due to illness, but submitted the following report: The current membership count is 7,090, with 104 new members since the first of the year. There are 444 Junior members in the State Society, 64 of whom are new members. The Registrar attended the Constitution Week Luncheon and has given programs to several chapters.

The Historian reported only one submission thus far for Outstanding Teacher of American History. Mrs. Lemesis had consulted with one chapter regarding establishment of a chapter award for a local student of American History, as well as assisting another chapter in preparing an application for the American History Award, a National award. The graves of two members have been marked. Mrs. Lemesis presented four programs to DAR and SAR chapters. The State Regent stated the National Society has now approved burial urns with the DAR insignia, and a list of approved manufacturers is being assembled.

The Librarian reported the Georgia State Society had 21 book credits from seven chapters as of October 31, 2008. Mrs. Wright moved "the Executive Committee recommend to the State Board of Management that \$500.00 be donated to the NSDAR Library in honor of the Georgia State Regent, Barbara Blakely Chastain, for purchase of books for the Georgia Shelf. The check will be sent after January 1, 2009, for use in that year." The motion was seconded and adopted.

The Curator, Ms. Christian reported the Flags and banner will be present at State Board of Management. The State Regent requested the ballot box be present at State Conference.

The Parliamentarian reported there were currently no problems with Georgia chapters. Sales of the State Regent's Project pins have netted \$7000 thus far. Mrs. Setters stated permission was obtained for reprinting a 1946 booklet on Real Daughters attributed to the state of Georgia. History on Real Daughters is being sought from chapters to include in the reprint.

The State Regent announced Honorary State Regent Marie Derry De Lamar is working on the history of the Georgia State Society with the assistance of Vice Chairman Brenda W. Bush. The State Chaplain asked for information on a set of officer pins once owned by the State Society. Each pin's design was unique to the specific office it represented. Most have been lost through the years, but the Chaplain's pin still remains. If the original pins can be located, J.E. Caldwell can reproduce them so Georgia officers may purchase these special pins. Mrs. Chastain announced Mindy Tidmore Kammeyer has transferred her membership to the state of Washington. Mrs. Kammeyer's service at the national level has reflected well on Georgia for many years. The State Regent expressed her hope Mrs. Kammeyer will be able to take an active role in her new state of residence.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at: 9:15 p.m.

March 3, 2009

The members of the Executive Committee of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, were contacted by email March 2, 2009, by Barbara Blakely Chastain, State Regent, for a called "virtual" meeting.

Officers emailed were: Sally McGlaun Baldwin, First Vice Regent; Virginia Grace Lingelbach, Second Vice Regent; Joyce Ball Patton, Chaplain; Melodye G. Brown, Recording Secretary; Martha Middlebrooks Knight, Corresponding Secretary; Phyllis Johnson Tanner, Organizing Secretary; Ida Best Fischer, Treasurer; Robin Redfearn Towns, Registrar; Susan Durden Lemesis, Historian; Marilyn Moulton Wright, Librarian; Charlotte Josephine Christian, Curator; Rena Morgan Setters, Parliamentarian.

The State Regent called the "virtual" meeting of the Executive Board in order to vote on two recommendations to the Resolutions Committee, in order that they may be brought as business before the 111th State Conference. Officers responded by email and the vote was completed on March 3, 2009 to approve the following recommendations:

1. A recommendation to amend the resolution: "GEORGIA HOSPITALITY FUND" on page 228-229 of the 2007-2008 State Proceedings by striking the amount \$500.00 in the first Resolve and inserting the amount \$600.00. Costs and attendance at the Georgia Luncheon during Continental Congress both continue to rise each year; adopting this recommendation would provide

more needed money to this Committee. (The result of this amendment will be reflected in the 2009-2010 STATE BUDGET). **ADOPTED**;

amend the resolution: A recommendation to "PROCEEDINGS MATERIAL, ABSOLUTE DEADLINE FOR" on page 230 of the 2007-2008 State Proceedings by striking sentence 2 from the first Resolve. Sentence 2 presently reads: "This does not alter the requirement in the "Items of Information" in the Proceedings that all reports shall be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary on or before February 15, the ORIGINAL being sent to the Secretary for the Proceedings". As processes for reporting have changed over the years, it has become necessary to maintain some flexibility to adjust reporting deadlines within the State. Sentence 2 lends little value to the intent of the resolution, i.e. establishing a hard deadline for the receipt of reports/materials in the Proceedings, and confuses other deadline schedules currently in practice and published in other ways (This recommendation will reduce or eliminate confusion with other published deadlines.) ADOPTED.

In one other item of business, the Executive Committee voted to approve a request from Teila Cunningham to be reimbursed for \$1170.00 charged on her personal credit card for the guarantee of the "Bus to Continental Congress" in 2007. Lack of member reservations dictated cancellation of the bus trip, but the deposit was non-refundable. The State accounts for the Reid administration had already been closed and sent to the auditor when the request for reimbursement was received.

There being no further business, the virtual meeting was adjourned when the voting was completed on March 3, 2009.

The State Regent called the meeting to order and offered the Invocation. Mrs. Chastain then welcomed the members of the Executive Committee. Copies of the minutes of the October 31, 2008 Executive Committee Meeting were previously provided to the State Officers and State Parliamentarian. There being no corrections, the minutes were approved as printed. Ms. Brown read the minutes of the virtual meeting held March 3, 2009. There being no corrections, the minutes were approved as read.

The State Regent followed up on the amendments to resolutions proposed at the March 3 meeting. The amendment to "GEORGIA HOSPITALITY FUND" was passed by the Resolutions Committee and will be presented at this State Conference. The Committee decided to withdraw, in its entirety, the Resolution "PROCEEDINGS MATERIAL, ABSOLUTE DEADLINE FOR", so no amendment will be needed. "Items of Information" was determined to be a more flexible place to set deadlines. Officers were asked to remind their liaison committee chairmen that only the State Regent

may make contracts for the State Society. The State Regent explained some changes in the Conference Program. Mrs. Chastain enjoyed attending the Florida State Conference, Sue C. Bratton, State Regent, and was invited by the Mississippi State Regent, Polly H. Grimes, to act as a hostess at Rosalie, located in Natchez. A 3-ring binder format has been selected for the Cookbook, to sell for \$15.00 with proceeds going to Meadow Garden. Suggestions were solicited for the DAR Newsletter magazine ads. Mrs. Wright suggested an ad page presenting all living Honorary State Regents. An excellent virtual tour of the DAR Museum Georgia State Room, "Peter Tondee's Tavern" is online. The State Regent expressed her pride in the accomplishments of the members of the VIS Committee, and her hope for a newsletter in the future. The 2009 workshops will be in St. Simons, Albany, Marietta, and Duluth, August 19-22. Executive Board will be on August 18. State Board of Management will be October 24, with Executive Board on October 23, tentatively near Lake Blackshear.

The Parliamentarian had no report and was excused to attend to her duties as Conference Chairman.

The First Vice Regent reported the 2009 Georgia Luncheon will be noon on July 10, with a cost of \$45.00. The theme will be the "Georgia Land Lottery". Names and titles of any guests should be provided to the First Vice Regent. Assistance setting up for the luncheon early on Friday morning will be welcome. Mrs. Baldwin is coordinating schedules for tickets to the Georgia Box. This State Conference, six chapters will celebrate centennial anniversaries on Chapter Regents Night. Mrs. Baldwin reminded officers of the work schedule for evening receptions in the Regent's suite. Each officer was asked for an additional \$10.00 to cover breakfast prior to the meeting.

The Second Vice Regent reported 313 will be attending the School Luncheon, including representatives from five schools. The Hightower Award will go to 57 chapters.

The Chaplain reported 117 Georgia Daughters will be remembered at the Memorial Service today. The new candle lighters have been received and will be used at the service today. Mrs. Patton has received many expressions of appreciation for the birthday cards and notes of condolence sent. She encouraged everyone to remember the Honorary State Regents who have been unwell.

The Recording Secretary discussed the need for better adherence to reporting guidelines and deadlines, and getting Proceedings books to the chapters. Suggestions for conveying reporting requirements more effectively in future were discussed. The Proceedings Committee meeting will be held on May 9.

The Corresponding Secretary emailed the Master Questionnaire to all chapters, except one which received a hard copy. Mrs. Knight reported a total of 106 completed Master Questionnaires were received, sorted and mailed to the appropriate Chairmen and Officers. The Conference Program was typed, proofed and sent to the printers, then proofed again and delivered to this State Conference. Mrs. Knight thanked Mrs. Wright and Mrs. Setters for their assistance.

The Organizing Secretary reported the Fort Early Chapter Regent confirmed the chapter had notified the Organizing Secretary General and State Regent of the decision to disband. This notice has not been received by the State Regent. Mrs. Tanner is staying in contact with the chapter to ensure proper procedures are followed. Several chapters having difficulties have been contacted, and all seem to be stable at this time.

The Treasurer gave the following summary of accounts for the Georgia State Society as of February 28, 2009: checking account balance \$71,733.45; money market balance \$50,826.05; certificates of deposit \$92,273.60; and deposits at hotels

of \$2,250.00; making total assets of \$217,083.10. The financial report was filed. The Meadow Garden accounts as of February 28, 2009, were summarized as follows: certificates of deposit: \$350,000.00; checking account balance \$97,923.67; money market balance \$29,986.63; fixed assets \$171,258.69; making total assets of \$649,268.99. The upcoming Auditor's review will cost \$7500; cost to be shared by Meadow Garden. Mrs. Fischer has been careful to keep funds at individual banks within FDIC limits. She stressed the 990-N form is required by the IRS, and each chapter must file within four and a half months following the end of their fiscal year. The Treasurer announced a credit card for the State Society was obtained, with a limit of \$50,000.

The Registrar reported the official membership count for Georgia as of January 1, 2009 was 7085, a net gain of 96 members for the year. For 2008, Georgia had 488 new members by application, 36 reinstatements, 120 deceased, 291 drops and resignations, 50 transfers out, 30 transfers in, and a total of 453 Juniors. Mrs. Towns stated the chapter registrars are doing an excellent job and using the e-Membership tools effectively.

The State Regent added that Membership Chairman, Phyllis Porter, has done a wonderful job on prospective members. Mrs. Chastain has received 280 prospective member referrals since taking office. The State Regent thanked Mrs. Towns for bringing greetings from the Georgia Daughters at the upcoming SAR Convention, while Mrs. Chastain will be attending the South Carolina State Conference.

The Historian reported she had received several inquiries on locations of Patriot graves, and was able to provide with the help of a spreadsheet created by former Historian, O.B. McCorkle. There is confusion about what constitutes "marking" a grave. Mrs. Lemesis reviewed the awards she would present the following day.

The State Regent thanked Mrs. Lemesis for chairing the Historic Preservation Seminar, which will be on Saturday afternoon. Also participating in the seminar will be the Historian General and Dr. Ray Luce, Director of Historic Preservation, Georgia Department of Natural Resources.

The Librarian reported 110 bookplates sold. Georgia Chapters sent \$889.00 to the State Library Fund, \$2,013.75 to Friends of the Library, and \$450.50 to Friends of Seimes Microfilm. As of February 28, 2009, the Georgia State Society has 54 book credits from 14 chapters.

The Curator reported all property of the State Society is present and in good working order.

In new business, the Corresponding Secretary inquired if the \$180 annual fee for bulk mailing should be paid. The State Society already has envelopes with bulk mail permit on them, as well as mailing labels, on hand for the June letter. It was decided to send the June letter in hard copy format and by email also. The State Regent expressed the desire that the Georgia State Society support National projects in a more significant way, comparable to other states.

There being no further business, the State Regent gave the Benediction. The meeting was adjourned at: 11:15 a.m.

The State Regent recognized the Timekeepers: State Chairman Eloise Smith Wolfersteig, and Vice Chairmen Bessie Anne Hord Bretch, Jean Connett McCrary, and Madelyn Rose Stark.

The State Parliamentarian read Article VIII, Sections 1,3,4,5 of the State Bylaws pertaining to the State Board of Management.

The State First Vice Regent took the chair while the State Regent gave her report.

The **State Regent**, Barbara Chastain, reported the state of the State Society is excellent and moving forward under the capable leadership of the State Officers, Honorary State Regents, State Chairmen and Committees, and the Chapter Regents. The economy is not what it has been and the future is uncertain, but support for our DAR purpose is clear as we continue the good works of our society. The President General has stressed hospitality in reaching the goals of our National Society as well as our State Society. Since being installed at the 117th Continental Congress, overwhelming hospitality has been extended to the State Regent by the chapters, members and friends as she represented the Georgia Daughters at the following: two National Board of Management meetings held in Washington, D.C.; chaired three Meadow Garden Board Meetings; two Executive Board Meetings; three State Workshops; and accompanied Betty Brown Harrah, Constitution Week Chairman, to Governor Sonny Perdue's office for the signing of the Constitution Week Proclamation and again with Carolyn Baker Balog for the Governor's signing of the American Indian Heritage Month Proclamation.

The State Regent was warmly welcomed at the following events: her own Fort Peachtree Chapter's "Sunshine Tea" honoring Mrs. Chastain and Martha Knight, State Corresponding Secretary; an afternoon tea given by the Benjamin Hawkins and Old Herod Chapters honoring the State Regent; a tea at Hollingsworth House given by the James Waldrop, Fayette-Starr's Mill, General Daniel Newnan, James Stewart, LaGrange, Pulaski and William McIntosh Chapters to honor the State Regent; an old fashioned social gathering hosted by the Nathaniel Macon, Mary Hammond Washington, and Lt. James Monroe Chapters; the James Waldrop Chapter luncheon celebrating the birth of the Marquis de Lafayette and the 225th anniversary of the signing of The Treaty of Paris; Constitution Week programs presented by the State Regent to the Abraham Baldwin, Augustin Clayton, Chehaw, Commodore Richard Dale, Savannah, Tallassee, and Thronateeska Chapters; and the Atlanta area Constitution Week Luncheon.

Mrs. Chastain presented a program to the Roswell King Chapter where she installed new members; visited the General James Jackson Chapter to celebrate their 100th Year Celebration; gave "Aims and Goals for the Georgia State Society" programs to the John Franklin Wren and the Colonel Daniel Appling Chapters and visited the Historic Holmesville Site in Appling County; brought greetings to the Brunswick Chapter; installed new members and gave "Heirloom" program for the Roswell King Chapter; attended, with Joyce Patton, Phyllis Fox Lawson and Elaine Thames, the Atlanta History Center lecture on "Dave the Slave", the renowned potter from Edgefield, South Carolina, where she shared photographs of the three and possibly four jugs made by Dave which are owned by the Georgia State Society and housed at Meadow Garden. The State Regent attended Tamassee DAR School Founders Day events, including the Board of Trustees Meeting, DAR Council Meeting, dedication Tour, and chaired the Advisory Committee meeting. Then on to Kate Duncan Smith DAR School for Dedication Day Activities, attending JAC program, three Campus Dedications, the Board of Trustees meeting, was secretary for the joint meeting of the Advisory and State School Committees, and presented Georgia's contributions during the 84th Dedication Program. During this time the State Regent's letters # 1 and # 2 were produced; plans were started and hotels visited for the Georgia State Conferences 2009 and 2010; and agendas written for the three Workshops, all Board meetings and this State Board of Management meeting. During her "off the road time" Mrs. Chastain opens mail, checks and tries to answer emails and reviews chapter yearbooks.

The State Regent shared the following update from the National Board of Management held on Saturday, October 4, 2008: from July 14 to October 2, 2008,

3,179 applications and supplementals have been verified, 2,224 new members accepted, last National Number 866285, 843 deaths, 953 resignations, and 191 reinstatements. The NSDAR buildings will be closed on Monday, January 19, 2009 in observance of Martin Luther King's birthday. The Conservation Committee is celebrating its centennial year. Portions of the DAR Genealogical Research System will be launched on the DAR public web site. Eligibility has been expanded for bronze JROTC medals to include members of the junior class. Members may qualify to purchase the Friends of Genealogy pin with a donation of \$100 to this new fund. E-Membership now makes it possible for chapter officers to track applications and supplementals all the way from "received" to "verified". Current Handbooks and Directories are now available. Getting to Know the DAR booklet has been updated and is ready for purchase from the DAR Store. Approval has been given for authorized companies to design a cremation urn with the DAR insignia. Standing Rules for the 118th Continental Congress were adopted. Registration fees shall be \$30 for delegates and alternates if paid at the time the credentials are filed. otherwise, the fees shall increase to \$35. The complete minutes of the National Board of Management meeting may be found on the Members' Web site at "Frequently Visited" section. The Eagle Podium owned by the National Society will be used during the 2009 installation ceremonies for the President of the United States.

Mrs. Chastain declared the best time for this Regent has been the fellowship with the members. She has eaten the best of foods, shared the warmest of experiences, and laughed so much she wished it would not end. The State Regent expressed her love and gratitude to each Georgia Daughter for all the wonderful invitations, kind words and support.

The State Regent resumed the chair and called for the reports of the officers. State First Vice Regent, Sally Baldwin reported the request form for the 2009 Georgia Luncheon has been submitted to the National Society, and menu plans made with the JW Marriott hotel. Mrs. Baldwin, the State Second Vice Regent, the State Chaplain, and the State Parliamentarian are working on the luncheon theme, to be announced in the State Regent's letter. Tickets will be available at State Conference.

The State Second Vice Regent and DAR Schools Chairman, Virginia Lingelbach reported Georgia sales of the Lady Bug Pin have resulted in proceeds totaling \$1,600 for the DAR Schools. In keeping with our State Regent's theme, a "Special Times" boutique rack was established at the new Tamassee Thrift Store. Georgia Daughters have donated over 300 gowns, dresses, shoes, purses and jewelry to establish an inventory for this section of the store. The State Schools Committee has implemented "under \$5.00" projects. The first of these was the collection of supplies for the Clinic at Kate Duncan Smith DAR School which resulted in approximately 500 items being donated with an estimated dollar value of \$1,500. Our second "under \$5.00" project is to supply the children's cottages at Tamassee DAR School with cookie, brownie and hot chocolate mix. Voices sold on the quilt thus far have netted over \$600 for the State Regent's School Projects. The thrift trailer is collecting thrift today for delivery to Crossnore and Tamassee this weekend.

The State Regent introduced Audrey Struble Litts, Chairman of the Credentials Committee, who gave the first report of the committee: 86 voting members registered at the State Board of Management representing 85 chapters. In attendance were: 11 State Officers, 1 National Officer, 8 Honorary State Regents (1 of whom is reported elsewhere), and 68 Chapter Regents (1 of whom is reported elsewhere). Also present were: 1 State Parliamentarian (1 of whom is reported elsewhere), 3 National Chairmen (3 of whom are reported elsewhere), 7 National

Vice Chairmen (6 of whom are reported elsewhere), 51 State Chairmen (19 of whom are reported elsewhere), 21 State Vice Chairmen (15 of whom are reported elsewhere), 58 Chapter Members, and 0 Guests. Without duplication, 183 Georgia Daughters representing 85 Chapters were in attendance. By direction of the committee, Mrs. Litts **moved the adoption of the first Credentials report**. The report was **adopted**. The State Regent declared a quorum was present.

Reports of State Officers continued. The **State Chaplain**, Joyce Patton stated 75 deaths have been reported by Georgia chapters. Notes of condolence have been sent when addresses were provided. The memory of each deceased Daughter will be honored at the 2009 Memorial Service. Mrs. Patton urged chapters to report deaths immediately using the Chaplain General's forms. Currently 230 Georgia Daughters are over 90 years of age. Birthday cards have been sent to 60 of these special members this year.

The State Recording Secretary, Melodye Brown reported the 2007-2008 Proceedings were being distributed at this State Board of Management meeting. Ms. Brown expressed gratitude to the previous Recording Secretary, O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle, for her work on the Proceedings. Officers, Chairmen, and Regents were reminded of reporting requirements and deadlines for the next Proceedings. The Recording Secretary requested the First Vice Regent take the chair. Ms. Brown read the following recommendation: "The Executive Committee recommends to the State Board of Management that \$500.00 be donated to the NSDAR Library in honor of the Georgia State Regent, Barbara Blakely Chastain, for purchase of books for the Georgia Shelf. The check will be sent after January 1, 2009, for use in that year." The recommendation was adopted.

The State Regent resumed the chair. She expressed appreciation to O.B. McCorkle and Linda Overstreet Harvey, Proceedings Committee Chairman for the 2007-2008 Proceedings. Mrs. Chastain continued with the State Officers' reports.

The **State Corresponding Secretary**, Martha Knight reported contact information was updated frequently as changes were received. Labels were printed for distribution of the 2007-2008 Proceedings, and also for the Georgia State Society Master Questionnaire. In September the Regent's letter # 2 was emailed which greatly reduced costs. The Georgia State Society Master Questionnaire is ready for distribution at this State Board of Management. Electronic copies are available upon request.

The **State Organizing Secretary**, Phyllis Tanner reported she has contacted chapters requesting assistance. Mrs. Tanner is working with them and planning workshops to help with membership. The State Organizing Secretary offered her assistance to any chapter that needs help and encouraged chapters to contact her.

The **State Treasurer**, Bea Fischer gave the following summary of accounts for the Georgia State Society as of October 16, 2008: certificates of deposit \$91,320.04; checking account balance \$25,302.74; money market balance \$51,066.66; and deposits of \$1,500.00; making total assets of \$169,189.44. The financial report was filed. The Meadow Garden accounts as of October 16, 2008, were summarized as follows: certificates of deposit \$350,000.00; checking account balance \$69,288.55; money market balance \$29,703.28; fixed assets \$171,258.69; making total assets of \$620,350.52. Chapter dues and Conference fees are due December 1. Treasurer's forms are now available on the Georgia Members website. State Club individual accounts are being closed with all funds now going through the State Treasurer. New procedures will begin as of today.

The State Regent introduced Dollye Ward, reporting for the Finance Committee. Mrs. Ward, on behalf of the Finance Committee, recommended the Georgia State Society apply for a Georgia State Society credit card to be used

only for making contracts to secure locations for State Society events. Mrs. Ward explained the difficulty in obtaining free locations for meetings and the upfront expenses of booking hotels for events. The recommendation was adopted.

In the absence of the **State Registrar**, the State Regent reported the following: the current Georgia membership count is 7090 with 396 new members being added since the first of the year. There are 444 Junior members in the State Society, 64 of whom are new members.

The **State Historian**, Susan Lemesis reminded chapters submissions for Outstanding Teacher of American History Award are due by December 1. Mrs. Lemesis stressed the importance of reporting the placement of cemetery markers for Daughters. The appropriate forms may be found on the Historian General's website. Mrs. Lemesis presented four programs to DAR and SAR chapters and expressed willingness to assist chapters in any way.

The **State Librarian**, Lynn Wright urged chapters to donate books to the NSDAR Library. Mrs. Wright reported the Georgia State Society has 21 book credits from seven chapters as of October 31, 2008. Bookplates may be purchased from the State Librarian.

The **State Curator**, Charlotte Christian reported the property of the State Society was present and in good order.

The **State Parliamentarian**, Rena Setters thanked the chapters for submitting copies of their bylaws. Mrs. Setters reported the State Society currently has no parliamentary issues.

The State Regent called for extended reports from the following State Chairmen: Chapter Achievement, Dianne Brown Cannestra reviewed changes to requirements on the current form and challenged all chapters to participate; Membership, Phyllis Malone Porter explained resources available on the e-Membership website and detailed the membership contests; DAR Museum, Therry Nash Deal encouraged contributions for the DAR Museum and introduced Vice Chairman of the Georgia State Room, Anne Murphey, who requested volunteers to greet visitors to "Tondee's Tayern" during Continental Congress: State Honor Roll. Paula Hannah Osborne announced the Honor Roll form is available on the Georgia members website and reviewed requirements and deadlines; Volunteer Information Specialists. Vice Chairman Amy Pittman Lawson reported Chairman Wendy Tyson Fox and her Vice Chairmen have been busy and have already met all goals for the year. Chapter websites are now maintained or monitored by four District Vice Chairmen. The Georgia Public Web site and Meadow Garden Web site have been completely redesigned. The Georgia Members' Web Site has been updated. The entire Chapter Information Packet, including all necessary forms, is now online.

Mrs. Chastain called for reports from State Chairmen of NATIONAL COMMITTEES and NATIONAL SPECIAL COMMITTEES: American Heritage, Betty Samaras requested all national contest entries be reported at the state level; Women's Issues, Betty Garlington Christy encouraged members to enter the committee's essay contest in one of the categories of family, health or career; Junior Membership, Susan Austin Fitzgerald offered voices on the National Junior Membership Dolls from Oklahoma; American Indians, Carolyn Balog reported the "American Indian Heritage Month" Proclamation for Georgia was available on the Georgia Members Web Site; Constitution Week, Betty Harrah announced the next Constitution Week luncheon will be held on September 19, 2009 at the Ansley Golf Club in Atlanta; Genealogical Records, Vicki Lancaster Cobb asked all records be submitted by December 31; Lineage Research, Louise Greene Henry requested the names of chapter chairmen of this committee in order to distribute updates from the National Society; Community Service Awards, Patricia Pattillo Mercer reported nine

recommendations submitted and approved, while encouraging each chapter to submit the two allowed recommendations; DAR Service for Veterans, Becky Rostron reminded chapters of the December 1 deadline for the three awards offered by this committee. Mrs. Rostron suggested ways to support Veterans and encouraged members to check the DAR Web Site to locate programs still collecting stamps - Veterans History Project kits are available from the Vice Chairman, Frances Yarborough Sideman; National Defense, Joan Smith Hutcheson asked to be notified of planned ROTC award presentations and failure to receive National Defender publications while encouraging members to enter the National Defense editorials contest; Seimes Technology Center, Linda Cunningham Bhame promoted donations to support technical services; American History, Rebecca Malone West encouraged chapters to recognize contest winners with certificates and medals available from the DAR Store; DAR Project Patriot, Gwendolyn Meredith Martin reviewed items on a new wish list for Landstuhl Medical Center; Volunteer Genealogists, Diane McCranie Redkevitch offered her committee to present workshops to chapters and asked for detailed information on nominees for Volunteer Genealogist of the Year; DAR Scholarship, Tommie Elaine Shattuck announced regents should receive a letter outlining new deadlines, requirements, and other critical information regarding scholarships; Protocol, Carolyn Hanf reminded members DAR is non-political, and gave instructions on appropriate wearing of insignia.

Wilhoit McCorkle announced the Proceedings came in under budget this year and expressed special thanks to Martha Knight, Rena Setters, Laura Reid, Lanette Reid, and Linda Harvey for their assistance; Proceedings, Linda Overstreet Harvey thanked the District Directors for assistance in distributing the Proceedings at this meeting and offered kudos to Mrs. McCorkle for her efforts; State Directory and State Information Help Desk, Jean Manker announced some copies of the Directory remain and asked members to send announcements and invitations for the Information Help Desk: Coordinator of Districts, Brenda Davison Jessel announced the 2009 workshop schedule. Hostess chapters will be Fort Frederica, Saint Andrew's Parish and Brunswick in Saint Simons Island on Aug 19, Thronateeska in Albany on Aug, 20, Fielding Lewis in Marietta on Aug. 21, and Philadelphia Winn in Duluth on Aug. 22.

Lanette Reid, member of the **Resolutions** Committee, asked the First Vice Regent to take the chair while she read the **DAR School Per Capita resolution**, the **Annual State Society Contribution to the President General's Project resolution**, and the **Courtesy resolution**. The resolutions were **adopted**. (The resolutions are printed in their entirety at the conclusion of the State Conference minutes.)

Any announcements to be included in the Call to Conference letter should be submitted by December 1 to the Corresponding Secretary and the State Regent. Door prizes were awarded, and the winning voice was drawn for the guilt benefiting the State Regents Projects at the DAR Schools. Mrs. Chastain wished everyone a blessed Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year.

The meeting concluded with the singing of "God Bless America." Chaplain, Joyce Patton gave the Benediction. The State Board of Management meeting was adjourned at 1:55 p.m.

THEREFORE: I, SONNY PERDUE, Governor of the State of Georgia, do hereby proclaim September 17–23, 2008, as CONSTITUTION WEEK in Georgia and encourage our citizens to learn about the history and meaning of our Constitution.

118th Continental Congress Georgia Luncheon July 10, 2009

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

June 30, 2009

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This summary of significant accounting policies of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR (the Organization) is presented to assist in understanding the Organization's financial statements. The financial statements and notes are representations of the Organization's management, who is responsible for their integrity and objectivity.

1. Nature of Organization

The organization is a volunteer women's service organization created to promote patriotism, preserve American history, and secure America's future through better education for children.

2. Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Organization have been prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting, a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles. Accordingly, revenue is recorded when received rather than when earned and expenses are recorded when paid rather than when incurred.

3. Basis of Presentation

Financial statement presentation follows the recommendation of the Financial Accounting Standards Board in its Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations. Under SFAS No. 117, the Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted, temporarily restricted, and permanently restricted. A description of the three net asset categories follows:

Unrestricted

Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed restrictions. Unrestricted net assets may be designated for specific purposes by action of the Board of Directors.

Temporarily Restricted

Net assets whose use is subject to donor-imposed restrictions that can be fulfilled by actions of the Organization pursuant to those restrictions or that expire by the passage of time.

Permanently Restricted

Net assets subject to donor-imposed restrictions that they be maintained permanently by the Organization.

4. Use of Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts and disclosures. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

June 30, 2009

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, continued

5. Cash and Cash Equivalents

For the purposes of the statement of financial position and the statement of cash flows, the Organization considers all cash on hand, highly liquid bank deposits, and short-term debt securities with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

6. Property and Equipment

Major preservation or restoration projects are capitalized and depreciated over an estimated useful life of fifteen years. Additions and betterments of \$750 or more are capitalized, while maintenance and repairs that do not improve or extend the useful lives of the respective assets are expensed currently. Depreciation is provided for in amounts sufficient to relate the cost of depreciable assets to operations over their estimated service lives, principally using the straight-line and 200% declining balance methods.

The estimated useful lives in determining depreciation are:

The Organization does not capitalize collections and historical treasurers. Meadow Garden and its contents are historical treasures and are insured for approximately \$439,000.

Depreciation expense for the year ended June 30, 2009 was \$9,264.

7. Donated Services

Many volunteers have made significant contributions of their time to develop and promote the programs of the Organization. The value of these donated services is not included in the accompanying financial statements, as such services do not create or enhance non-financial assets or require specialized skills. If donated services received either create or enhance non-financial assets or required specialized skill which would need to be purchased if not donated, the value of those donated services would be recorded in accordance with SFAS No. 116.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, continued

8. Other Contributions

In accordance with SFAS No. 116, contributions received are recorded as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted support depending on the existence and/or nature of donor restrictions. Contributions are recognized when received by the Organization. Conditions that are restricted by the donor are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets if the restrictions expire in the fiscal year in which the contributions are recognized. All other donor-restricted contributions are reported as increases in temporarily or permanently restricted net assets depending on the nature of the restrictions. When a restriction expires, restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets.

9. Membership Dues

Membership dues are recognized when received.

10. Advertising

Advertising costs are expensed as incurred. Advertising expense for the year ended June 30, 2009 was \$9,130.

11. Income Taxes

Georgia State Society, NSDAR, a nonprofit organization operating under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, is exempt from federal, state, and local income taxes, and accordingly, no provision for income taxes is included in the accompanying financial statements for the Organization.

NOTE B - FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS AND CONCENTRATIONS OF CREDIT RISK

The Organization's financial instruments that are exposed to concentrations of credit risk consist primarily of cash and cash equivalents.

The Organization maintains its cash deposits with highly rated financial institutions. At times, such deposits may be in excess of federally insured limits. The Organization did not have any deposits in excess of federally insured limits at June 30, 2009. The Organization has not experienced any losses in such accounts and believes it is not exposed to any significant risk of loss.

NOTE C - AFFILIATES

The Organization collects membership dues and donations from its local Georgia Chapters for the Organization and the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

National Committee Reports

AMERICAN HERITAGE - Betty Keener Samaras

One hundred and three chapters have worked to help educate others on cultural events and traditions, and to save quilters' stories by entering the various contests within the American Heritage Committee. Chapters reported 208 programs or projects related to cultural events and traditions. Many projects have been entered in the Crafts, Fiber Arts, Poetry, Art and Literature and Quilters SOS - Save Our Stories. Georgia daughters submitted interviews to the Alliance for American Quilts to be archived in the Library of Congress for Barbara Bone (Old Unicoi Trail), Martha Davis (Vidalia), Violette Denney (Abraham Baldwin), Diane Cannestra and Elizabeth Bauer (Martha Stewart Bulloch). Interviews are being conducted with members of the West Georgia Quilters Guild as a joint project with Abraham Baldwin Chapter and funded by the West Georgia Quilters Guild.

AMERICAN HISTORY COMMITTEE - Rebecca Malone West

Reports were received from 105 chapters. Chapters and individual members presented 364 American History programs, with 101 programs focusing on outstanding American women. The American History Essay Contest was sponsored in 242 schools, with 3,796 students in grades five through eight participating. Chapters awarded 1.970 Certificates of Participation, 253 Certificates of Award, and 102 bronze medals. The Christopher Columbus Essay Contest was sponsored in 59 schools, with 166 students participating. Chapters awarded 50 Certificates of Participation, Chapters also presented 121 certificates, 60 bronze medals and five silver medals for Outstanding Work in American History. Three chapters were recognized for Outstanding Chapter Projects: William Day wrote American History scripts and performed plays and sent DVDs of the performances to all schools in a tricounty area; Oglethorpe archived photos of Pine Mountain Valley and interviewed descendants of its original residents; and Xavier produced six hour-long radio programs on the history of the Cherokee Indians in their area. Vice Chairmen Trudie Pabst, Kelly Weaver, Martha Dykes, and Dawn Hamill are commended for their excellent work in support of this committee and the chapters in their respective districts. This committee is privileged to serve the State Regent and the Georgia State Society.

AMERICAN INDIANS - Carolyn Baker Balog

One hundred and five chapters reported activity in the American Indian Committee. Three hundred seventy-three American Indian programs and Indian Minutes were presented at chapter meetings. Twenty-three proclamations to celebrate American Indian Heritage Month in November were obtained by chapters. Monetary contributions are as follows: \$1,639.88 to the American Indian Scholarship Fund, \$638.00 to Friends of the American Indians, \$3,340.00 to Bacone College, \$3,580.00 to Chemawa Indian School, \$1,383.00 to Indian Youth of America Summer Camp Program. Two thousand one hundred and three qualifying soup labels were sent to Bacone College and three thousand two hundred and six to Chemawa Indian School. Many activities for this committee were accomplished this last year.

AMERICANISM - Phyllis Fox Lawson

Georgia Daughters continue to promote Americanism. Fifty-eight chapters were active in their community distributing patriotic materials to naturalization applicants, schools and events. A total of 19,141 United States Flags, United States Flag pins, copies of the Pledge of Allegiance to the United States Flag or copies of the American's Creed were distributed. Several chapters donated Flag code brochures with Chestatee River Chapter distributing 1,275 DAR Flag Code brochures. Nine Chapters attended naturalization ceremonies. Sixteen chapters participated in patriotic parades or other special activities. Governor David Emanuel Chapter had a program on United States Citizenship Requirements. Chapter members tutored immigrants on the United States Naturalization Test. The Cherokee Chapter presented the Medal of Honor to Edison Earl Scholes, Major General, USA (Ret.) in February 2009. The Oliver Morton Chapter presented the Medal of Honor to James Coleman Moughon, of Gray Georgia. Mr. Moughon is this year's State winner of the Medal of Honor but sadly he died just after receiving the award. His chapter and family were honored at Opening Night ceremonies at State Conference in March.

CHAPTER ACHIEVEMENT AWARD - Dianne Brown Cannestra

Ninety-one of 112 chapters submitted Chapter Achievement Award forms by the State deadline. Fifteen forms were received after the deadline. Twenty-two of the 106 forms received were submitted without corrections required. Six chapters sent no report. In order to achieve the national goal of 100% reporting, this chairman will prepare and submit forms for those chapters not reporting. Sixty-seven chapters achieved Level 1, 27 achieved Level 2 and nine achieved Level 3. The chapter scoring the most points from each district was Fielding Lewis, District 1; Philadelphia Winn, District 2; Bonaventure, District 3 and George Walton, District 4. The chapter scoring the most points in the state was Fielding Lewis. This Chairman deeply appreciates the State Treasurer's responsiveness and information provided necessary to verify the chapter reports.

CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION - Lynn Snowden Dorney

This was a wonderful year for the Georgia State Society Children of the American Revolution. Led by state president, Carter Elizabeth Moore, and spurred by state theme, "Patriots Protecting Patriots", G.S.C.A.R. raised over \$3,000 to split among DAR, SAR, and C.A.R, national museums. Georgia is proud of C.A.R, member, Kevin Baker, elected this year as first President from Georgia in the history of the National Society Children of the American Revolution. His national theme is "Ensuring American Patriotism." He raised funds to put DVD, "Give Me Liberty or Give Me Death" in schools across United States. These accomplishments could not have happened without support of Georgia Daughters. Reports were received from 45 chapters who provide leadership and donations to C.A.R. They invited C.A.R. members to chapter meetings and often C.A.R. gave the program. Three chapters plan starting new societies or reorganizing one formerly sponsored. Thirteen chapters support an existing C.A.R. society. Fifteen provide senior leadership on local and/or state level. This chairman expresses gratitude to all who serve in leadership capacity. COMMUNITY SERVICE - Pat Mercer

Georgia Daughters recognized 19 community members for their "voluntary achievements in cultural, educational, humanitarian, patriotic, historical and

citizenship endeavors, or in environmental conservation." The First Place winner on the State level was Nicholas Robert Harris who was honored by James Waldrop Chapter for his work in establishing the Fayette Field of Hope, Inc. enabling over 30,000 special needs children to play Little League baseball. Second Place was Terry Edward Manning who was recognized by William Day Chapter for his outstanding work in promoting a realization of American History and historic preservation. Third Place was Mark Richt submitted by Reverend John Andrew Chapter. Coach Richt was honored for working with Camp Sunshine and Habitat for Humanity. Chapters recognized for presenting Community Service Awards were: Augustin Clayton, Colonel William Chandler, Fort Frederica, Fort Peachtree, General Daniel Stewart, James Stewart, James Waldrop, John Benson, LaGrange, Nancy Hart, Reverend John Andrew, Sergeant Newton, Sunbury, Thomasville, and William Day.

CONSERVATION - Billie J. Goodwin

Eighty-four chapters reported conservation programs, projects, tree plantings and other activities. There were 114 projects, 42 programs, 193 meetings included "Conservation Minutes", 147 members participated in Earth and Arbor Day activities, 17 trees planted. Projects included water and soil conservation, composting, recycling, wildlife preservation. Cemeteries beautified, historic trees recognized. Bee hives maintained, birds fed, Bluebird houses distributed. Energy efficient appliances, light bulbs and water saving fixtures installed. Parks, lakes, rivers cleaned. Participated in reusable grocery bag awareness program, donated a book on the life cycle of a drop of water to a school. Participation in "Plant-A-Row for the Hungry" producing 33,000 pounds of food. Three National Conservation Awards were presented. Sukey Hart to Charles "Chuck" and Rose Lane Leveal. Augustin Clayton to Michael DeLisle. James Waldrop to Doctors Ferrol and Helen Sams. First Place Best Chapter Report to Fayette-Starr's Mill for completing a Beautification Project, creating and preserving a wildlife sanctuary and performing community service: this report also submitted for entry in the National Contest, Second Place to John Benson for building a cofferdam. Third Place to General James Jackson for planting a climbing rose from the 1800s.

CONSTITUTION WEEK - Betty Brown Harrah

In September 2008 Governor Sonny Perdue welcomed State Regent, Barbara Chastain, Second Vice Regent, Virginia Lingelbach, Southeast Division Vice Chairman, Mary F. Simonds, and this Chairman to witness his signing of the Georgia Constitution Week Proclamation. This Proclamation was presented to the State Society at the Constitution Week Luncheon on September 20, 2008 with a letter from our Governor. The keynote speaker for the luncheon was Georgia Senator Ronnie Chance. Chapter Chairmen from 93 chapters reported Constitution Week celebrations focusing on promotion and education. These activities included all 93 chapters reciting the Preamble or reading Sidelights, obtaining 200 Proclamations, bell ringing by 149 groups, participating in 296 Constitution Week events. Chapters received 207 print media published, had 239 displays consisting of 2,423 square feet and 4,052 radio/TV broadcast minutes. DAR GOOD CITIZENS - Iris Bridges McRee

The qualities of good citizenship: dependability, service, leadership and patriotism were evident throughout our state as youth participated for this prestigious award. Eighty-four chapters contacted 368 accredited high schools: 16 were first time participants. Awards were given to 235 seniors, and 193 seniors entered the essay contest. The four District winners were: Jennie Catherine Nash (Elijah Clarke), Molly Engle (Martha Stewart Bulloch), Laura Allyn Doolittle (Governor Jared Irwin) and Dean Brennan Tennille (Thomasville). The state winner was Jennie Catherine Nash sponsored by Elijah Clarke Chapter. Participating chapters presented the pin, certificate, and wallet card set while honoring winners at teas, receptions, School Board meeting Award ceremonies, chapter meetings, school Honor programs, luncheons and dinners. The monetary gifts totaled \$9,073.61. Ten or more schools were sponsored by Augusta (13), Augustin Clayton (14) and Earl of Camden (11). Augustin Clayton contacted the most schools (51), William Witcher awarded the most money (\$1,000). All participating chapters received certificates of appreciation. District Vice-Chairmen, Charlotte Seefeldt, Bonnie Lashley, Jean Bridges and Rachel Colbert served with distinction, Thank you, Madam State Regent, for the honor of serving you and the State Society as State DAR Good Citizen Chairman in a program that recognizes outstanding youth.

DAR MAGAZINE - Kathryn London Stirk

The American Spirit is an award winning magazine that promotes the DAR mission. The DAR Newsletter is packaged with the magazine for the membership. The Newsletter has reports that keep the members informed of the wider efforts of the DAR. In Georgia, 95 regents subscribe to the American Spirit. Statewide, Georgia has an almost 30% subscription rate. Eight chapters will receive a certificate for having more than 50% subscription rate: Chehaw, Edmund Burke, James Waldrop, Colonel William Candler, Hightower Trail, Etowah, Sandy Springs and John Benning. Chapter Achievement reports were submitted by 103 chapters. These reports help National and State track ways to help the chapters with DAR projects. Ninety-two chapters share the President General's message each month. The President General's message is available online at http://members.dar.org/pgmessage/. Because of the continued support of the chapters in the co-op ads, Georgia had six pages in the November/December 2008 issue.

DAR MUSEUM - Therry Nash Deal

Reports received from 102 chapters indicated 20 programs included the Museum as major focus; six of these were presented by DAR Museum Correspondent Docents. State Treasurer books indicate a total of \$3,127 in gifts. Chapters reaching "Adoptan-Object" goal were: Atlanta, Augustin Clayton, Elijah Clarke, Joseph Habersham, Mary Hammond Washington, Martha Stewart Bulloch, and Nancy Hart. Chapters meeting the "Friend" goal were: Hawkinsville, Joseph Habersham, and Lachlan McIntosh. Joseph Habersham receives the Outstanding Award for meeting both goals. Martha Stewart Bulloch earns largest donor certificate. Elijah Clarke recognized for creative efforts to fund chapter museum support. In addition to exciting programs by docents, Martha Wright, Vice Chairman for Docents, reports one new docent recruit. She indicates the docents will work at Congress in Tondee's Tavern and earn hours. Anne Whipple Murphey, Vice Chairman for Georgia Room, indicates the room was rededicated at the 117th Congress. After serving the National Society as storage during renovation, our funds made it lovely again for the reopening ceremony.

DAR SCHOLARSHIP - Tommie Elaine Shattuck

The Georgia State Society Scholarship award applicant for the Dr. Aura-Lee A. and James Hobbs Pittinger American History National Scholarship is Jake Morakis, son of Mr. and Mrs. Anthony Morakis of Roswell. Sponsoring chapter is Martha Stewart Bulloch, Mary Simonds Regent. For the first time, two applicants tied for second place with each receiving a \$50 State Chairman's Stipend. Runners up were Elizabeth Johnston of Convers and Christin Johnson of Roswell, Elizabeth is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Johnston, granddaughter of DAR member Beth Johnston and was sponsored by Colonel John McIntosh, Janet Skelton Regent. Christin is the daughter of Carol Johnson and granddaughter of DAR member Dee Hutchinson, sponsoring chapter Martha Stewart Bulloch, Mary Simonds Regent, Reports from 105 chapters show 26 chapters are involved in scholarship programs awarding a total of \$42,502.00 to 63 Georgia students. When considering that 59 chapters gave a total of \$2,169.00 to national scholarship funds. Georgia daughters sponsored educational money for a grand total of \$526,366.89. DAR SCHOOL COMMITTEE - Virginia Grace Lingelbach

One hundred six chapters reported. Fifty-seven chapters earned the coveted Hightower Award. Sixty-seven Ladybug pins sold for a total of \$1,675.00. Profits from voices on the Quilt Project netted over \$800.00 for schools. Georgia Daughters contributed clinic supplies to Kate Duncan Smith at an estimated value of \$1,500. Over 400 boxes of cookie, brownie and hot chocolate mix were donated to Tamassee for the after school snack program. One of the most significant achievements of this committee was establishment of the "Special Times Boutique" at the Pulliam Thrift Center at Tamassee, Georgia Daughters donated over 500 evening gowns, promdresses and special occasion attire as well as shoes, jewelry and handbags. An additional estimated seven tons of thrift were donated. Over 31,000 qualifying food labels were donated, along with hundreds of ink cartridges and cell phones. Several chapters hosted Christmas parties. One chapter donated 30 knitted cap and mitten sets for Crossnore students, a chapter donated 103 dictionaries to KDS, and an individual Georgia Daughter donated a 2002 GMC Envoy to Tamassee. Total monetary contributions to the DAR Schools exceeded \$62,000.00. Thank you Georgia Daughters! Madam State Regent, It is an honor to serve you and the Georgia State Society.

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERANS - Rebecca Miller Rostron

There were 80 chapters who served our special veterans. Daughters gave their time, resources, and gifts to support veterans in VA Medical Centers, nursing homes (local, state, and national), military hospitals, and outpatient clinics. Also, daughters contributed to community events, cemetery projects, Veterans Memorial Parks, Veterans Day ceremonies, and other venues. Georgia had 461 adult volunteers who drove 37,280 miles in support of veteran activities and gave 6,390 hours of service. There were 136 youth volunteers who contributed 575 hours. Total cash and noncash donations were \$68,250. A total of 573.1 ounces of stamps were collected and donated. Certificates of Award were presented for most outstanding veteran reports (three chapters), outstanding veteran activities (18 chapters), outstanding monetary contributions (three chapters), most adult volunteer hours (three chapters), 500 plus volunteer hours (three chapters), most youth volunteers (three chapters), most miles traveled for veteran activities (four chapters), and most ounces of stamps donated (three chapters). VETERANS HISTORY PROJECT - Frances Yarborough Sideman

Georgia Daughters continue to interview and record our veterans' valuable histories. There were nine chapters who participated and recorded 33 histories. This was an increase of eight histories. Congratulations Daughters! We urge all chapters to support this most valuable project. Thank you, Madam State Regent, for the opportunity to serve the Georgia State Society in this manner.

FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA - Ann Parker Parsons

Georgia Daughters in 104 chapters participated in paying tribute to the Flag of the United States of America through various projects and activities. Fifty-two chapters held or participated in Flag events. Thirty-three chapters reported involving 8595 youth in various Flag activities. The total number of flags presented by chapters was 6573. One hundred twenty nine certificates were presented to individuals and groups recognizing their efforts in properly displaying the Flag. Chapters attended Naturalization Ceremonies, held Flag retirement ceremonies, and one chapter presented 9 books about the United States Flag to their local library. One chapter gave 330 Flags to new class rooms in their schools. One chapter gave Flags to local fireman, policemen, and EMTs on Patriots Day, September 11th. Programs and Flag etiquette workshops were given by several chapters. Many of the chapters reporting took time to salute our veterans on Memorial Day and November 11th, Veterans Day.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS - Vicki Lancaster Cobb

Georgia Daughters from nine chapters submitted new genealogical records for four volumes with a total of 1,014 pages to the NSDAR Library. The same amount was presented to each of the Georgia State Archives, the Washington Memorial Library, and the Georgia Historical Society for a grand total of 4,056 pages. The chapter presenting the most pages was Fort Peachtree with three volumes totaling 802 pages with a grand total of 2,406 pages. Chapters by membership categories with the most pages were 0-50 James Stewart Chapter, 51-100 Colonel William Candler Chapter, and 101+ Fort Peachtree Chapter. Ten members were involved in abstracting deeds and wills for the years 1880 - 1900. Other activities reported include: monetary contributions to the Washington Memorial Library Genealogical and Archives Section, members volunteering at the library, and members transcribing records which will be published and donated to NSDAR Library. This chairman thanks the State Regent for the opportunity of working with this project which demonstrates excellence in community and chapter service.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS - Indexing - Caroline Simmons Pope

The President-Generals' Every-Name Index is a project which will benefit all Daughters and other researchers by providing an on-line index to the wonderful Genealogical Records Committee (GRC) records that have been created. Twenty-nine Georgia Daughters from twenty two chapters have been very busy this year indexing sixty volumes of Genealogical Records. They have made approximately 140,530 entries. The top awards this year go to Jane Frazer of the Joseph Habersham Chapter and Gretchen Gunning of Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter. Jane indexed six books with 23,791 entries while Gretchen Gunning has indexed five books with a total of 35,179 entries this year. The following indexed four books each: Artie Taylor of Fort Peachtree Chapter, Jean Cole Manker of Fort Peachtree Chapter, and Meg Stevens of Joseph Habersham Chapter. Others completed one to six books each. Thanks to all of the Daughters who participated.

HISTORIC PRESERVATION - Jan Brown Anderson

This is a new committee this year, the purpose of which is to promote historic preservation by recognizing outstanding efforts in this area, and providing assistance where practical. No submissions were received for the Historic Preservation Medal, nor for the Historic Preservation Projects Contest, so no awards have been made. We expect greater participation as awareness of this committee grows. Several projects have been identified for consideration next year and we look forward to recognizing efforts towards historic preservation in Georgia.

JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS - Donna Raye Johnson

Nine Georgia DAR Chapters sponsor 19 JAC groups involving 959 children. Reports were received from 105 Chapters. The national theme, "America - Land of Opportunity", produced many varied and beautiful entries for this vear's contest from children in grades K through 10. Forty-five entries were received from four sponsoring chapters: Thomasville, Colonel William Candler, Roswell King, and Sweetwater. Other sponsors of JAC groups included Abraham Baldwin, Hawkinsville, Henry Walton, General Daniel Newnan, and Martha Stewart Bulloch. Georgia sent 43 winning entries including banners, posters. poems, photo essays, short stories, and stamps to the divisional level for judging. Five winners placed first in the SE division. Thomasville Chapter received a certificate of award for outstanding sponsorship of JAC, with seven groups involving 738 children. Thanks are extended to the Georgia DAR chapters who worked with the schools to make JAC groups a viable option for teaching patriotism to all children. Madame State Regent, it has been quite a thrill to see how well the children of Georgia are expressing their creativity in showing how America is truly a land of opportunity. Thank you for this opportunity to serve the Georgia DAR.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP - Susan Austin Fitzgerald

Reports from 106 chapters indicate Juniors serving in various capacities throughout the state. Many chapters keep their Juniors interested and involved in creative ways. This chairman thanks her Vice Chairmen: Amelia Pelton, Junior Sales and Mary Ann Hawthorne, Junior Contest, Juniors are members 18 to 35 years old. Nine Outstanding Juniors were nominated by their chapters: Jennifer Mansell, Edmund Burke; Mary Ann Hawthorne, Joseph Habersham; Kate Cook, Oglethorpe; Kelly Marie Hutchins Weaver, Philadelphia Winn; Christie Lynn Haynes, Rev. John Andrew; Dawn Villanueva Levy, Roswell King; Ashley Lynne Fincher, Savannah; Lynne Gant, William Day; Michelle Hurst, William McIntosh. LINEAGE RESEARCH - Louise Greene Henry

Our state chapters have been quite active in lineage research during 2008 reporting 67 state members as lineage research lookup volunteers who responded to 37 requests for assistance. State chairman and vice chairmen responded to 11 requests from in-state chapters. Reporting chapters conducted 32 workshops for prospective members and the general public with Augustin Clayton, Fielding Lewis, Trahlyta, George Walton, Governor David Emanuel, Philadelphia Winn, and Xavier leading in number of presentations. Outstanding chapter activities including: newsletters and a Meet & Greet Workshop which included application instruction, showed "Today's DAR" DVD (Xavier); workshop at National Archives-Morrow, invited local C.A.R. and SAR members (Augustin Clayton); workshops to teach use of DAR Members' website (George Walton); co-sponsored workshop at Washington Memorial Library on internet research (Governor David Emanuel); sponsors monthly trips to the National Archives and workshop at Gwinnett Co Public Library for prospective members including "Would you like to add YOUR Patriot to this list?" and how to access library resources from home computers (Philadelphia Winn). Top volunteer hours: Mary Hammond Washington, LaGrange, and Saint Simons. My thanks to Vice Chairmen Linda Lawrence, Janet Skelton, and Rosemary Henderson, for their assistance.

MEMBERSHIP - Phyllis Malone Porter

The State Society had 488 new members in 2008, and 79 were Juniors! The Official Membership Count as of 1/1/09 was 7,085 members, which was a net gain of 96 for the year. There were 310 prospective members received from National in 2008, and 63 became members. The best overall report was from Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter, Roswell (Mary Farthing Simonds – Regent and Elizabeth Bauer – Registrar). The traveling silver bowl for the most new members was awarded to Fielding Lewis Chapter in Marietta (Carolyn Hanf - Regent and Betty Christy - Registrar). The Eagle Award for the chapter with the greatest percentage of increase in membership goes to William Day Chapter in Duluth (JoAn Chewning - Regent and Libby Anderson –Registrar). This year's Essay Contest winner was Hilda Ann Simmons Eldredge of the James Waldrop Chapter, Fayetteville. The winner of the Photo Contest is Madge Lawrence McCrane, Nathaniel Macon Chapter, Macon. The winning essay and photo were sent to the National competition.

NATIONAL DEFENSE - Joan S. Hutcheson

Reports from the chapters show that Georgia Daughters are aware of the vital importance of National Defense. Of the 100 chapters reporting, 94 devoted three minutes to the National Defense message at each meeting and 47 chapters had a full program on National Defense. Sixteen chapters gave 27 gold medals, 53 chapters gave 145 bronze medals and 54 chapters presented 280 Good Citizenship Medals. Seventy-five chapters made a contribution to the National ROTC Award Fund. In state recognition for the most gold and bronze medals combined, Augusta Chapter won first place with second place won by Baron Dekalb and Oglethorpe Chapters. Honorable mention was awarded to Augustin Clayton and George Walton Chapters. First place winner for Good Citizenship awards is Etowah Chapter, with second place going to Martha Stewart Bulloch and honorable mention to Old Unicoi Trail and Brunswick Chapters. Members from four chapters had editorials or a letter to the editor that were published and, therefore, eligible to enter the National Defense Contest in Washington. First place for the best published letter is awarded to Jan Parker, a member of the Philadelphia Winn Chapter. Brenda Jessel of General Daniel Newman Chapter won honorable mention for her letter.

PROGRAM - Jean Cole Manker

The following chapters have received Certificates of Award for outstanding emphasis on their programs during the past year: Governor David Emanuel Chapter increased meetings attendance by using local talent, placing emphasis on how DAR's Historical, Educational, and Patriotic objectives benefit a community, Hawkinsville Chapter's Executive Board served as its Program Committee, and secured speakers for 100% of their nine programs. Hightower Trail Chapter gave an in-service program on the utilization of Chapter, State, and National Web sites including how to access and navigate these sites. The meeting was well attended; and many members, some of whom had not previously logged on to the sites, were excited and enthusiastic about the new information, and stated that they planned to use the sites "right away!" Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter presented programs which encouraged the members' interest and participation in the DAR projects and goals. Programs featured Historic Roswell, "The History of Georgia" presented by Roswell Mayor, Jere Wood; and a book review given by Sara Hines Martin, author of "More Than Petticoats: Remarkable Georgia Women." Sweetwater Chapter made the best Use of Programs from the National Program Office.

PUBLIC RELATIONS AND MEDIA - Sharon Ray

Two-thirds of Georgia chapters report using various forms of media to communicate with the public about our objectives, and to publicize commemorative events. Chapters reported 768 articles/announcements printed in newspapers, many with photos. Radio/television spots totaled 200, with one station airing 5,220 minutes for Constitution Week. Thirty-five chapters have chapter brochures. Sixty chapters are currently issuing newsletters. More chapters are turning to the internet to reduce costs in publishing their newsletters, and find it a faster way to communicate with members. Two chapters gave awards to media, one chapter gave the book "Today's DAR", and another furnished breakfast for radio station employees. One chapter had a special project called "A Thank You" to WWII Veterans, Eighteen chapters used the DAR video. Chapter events included Constitution Week, Flag Day, July 4th, grave markings, Veteran's Day, wreath laying at monuments, Good Citizen and History Essay awards, ROTC and JROTC Awards, Memorial Day, and special celebration teas. Fort Peachtree Chapter receives award for best newsletter. Colonel William Candler receives award for best brochure. Augustin Clayton receives award for best publicity. Martha Stewart Bulloch receives award for most comprehensive report. It has been an honor to serve as this committee chairman.

SEIMES TECHNOLOGY CENTER - Linda Bhame

Seimes Technology Center provides a wealth of information for genealogists and library staff, members and the public about genealogical resources on microfilm, on line data bases and CD-ROMS. Money received is used to purchase additional microfilm for the Revolutionary War era and the online data bases used at the library. This year a total of \$1298.50 was donated by Georgia Daughters. Two programs were given by Linda Bhame at the summer workshops. Ten donations of \$100 or more were received and four Friends of Seimes pins purchased. A catalog may be purchased from the DAR store listing all the Seimes Center resources.

VOLUNTEER INFORMATION SPECIALISTS - Wendy Tyson Fox

As of January 1, 2008, the Georgia State Society recorded 6,561 members. Chapters reported 178 prospective members contacted chapters through the web site with 114 of those prospective members attending a meeting. Of those, 46 have gone on to

become members and 37 have applications pending. Computers are used by 2,731 members for chapter activities. E-Membership is utilized by Chapter Regents, Treasurers, and Registrars. Special recognition is given to Amy Lawson for her valuable contributions to this committee, which include: redesign of the state website, design and implementation of website for Meadow Garden, many chapter activities regarding VIS, such as VIS website approval, National appointment in recognition of distinguished service, and helpfulness beyond measure to chapters. Madame State Regent, thank you for the opportunity to serve the Society in this capacity.

CHAPTER REVITALIZATION – Phyllis Johnson Tanner

For the fourth year the "traveling" Pewter Pitcher has been awarded to the chapter with the highest increase in member attendance for January 1 – December 31, 2008. The winner this year is Sandy Springs Chapter; Second Place: Thronateeska Chapter; Third Place: Archibald Bulloch Chapter; and Honorable Mention: Barnard Trail Chapter. Chapters exhibiting an increase in their chapter's health: First Place: Andrew Houser Chapter; Second Place: Sunbury Chapter; Third Place: Abraham Baldwin Chapter; Honorable Mention: General Josiah Tattnall Chapter.

COMMEMORATIVE EVENTS - Camille Redfern Baxter

This Chairman received 107 reports, with 81 chapters reporting participation in Commemorative Events. Independence Day celebrations were the most popular events with parades and ringing of bells. Daughters placed flags, laid "Wreaths Across America", held ceremonies all over Georgia, and in Alabama, South Carolina, North Carolina. General Daniel Newnan went to New England and Indiana to place flags. Daughters participated in Founders Day, Arbor Day, military unit reunions, 9/11 Commemoratives, Flag retirement ceremonies, Christmas Parades, Georgia Day, National Day of Prayer, Constitution Week, Flag Day, Memorial Day, Veteran's Day, Patriots Day, Mothers Day, Christopher Columbus Day, Pioneer Days, Presidents Day, and Blue Star Memorial Marker dedications. Wreaths and flags were placed at commemorative celebrations of the Battles of Kings Mountain, Cowpens, Guilford Courthouse, and Vann's Creek, the Siege of Savannah, Fort Frederica Naval Action, and Fort Morris "Come and Take It" Celebration. Hightower Trail lends a Hodar's beautiful voice to many commemoratives. Colonel Daniel Appling celebrated Abraham Lincoln's 200th birthday with members donating 200 Lincoln pennies honoring new penny designs. Augustin Clayton co-sponsored opening day celebration of National Archives in Morrow, Georgia. Chapters celebrating birthdays include Burkhalter, 87 years; Edmund Burke, 83; Fort Peachtree, 44; and Augustin Clayton, 35 years.

DAR GENEALOGY PRESERVATION - Diana Allen Simmons

DAR Genealogy Preservation volunteers index DAR genealogical and membership information into computerized, searchable databases. The committee's current activity is the Descendants Project. During this project, volunteers enter the information found on the second page of applications into a database at National. Any member with internet access can participate. Forty-three Georgia Daughters from 28 chapters have faithfully entered 7,780 applications into the national

database. Certificates are presented to these chapters with the names of their volunteers listed on the certificate. Twenty-one Georgia volunteers who have completed at least 100 applications during the last year will be given a certificate at Congress. Members are encouraged to join this important ongoing project. This work will assist in preserving these valuable records and considerably improve the application verification and membership record search processes.

DAR PROJECT PATRIOT - Gwendolyn M. Martin

Forty-four chapters participated in 75 different activities of DAR Project Patriot. They sent \$6190.65 in donations to the Treasurer General. These chapters used \$18,832.26 for local Project Patriot activities. 1320 Christmas cards and 3316 items valued at \$12,984,75 were sent to Landstuhl Medical Center in Germany. Participated in Family Readiness Group by preparing "Welcome Home" baskets for returning troops. Wrote letters to five deployed soldiers: one letter per soldier, per month for six months. Provided a website (let'ssavthanks.com) so members could send holiday greetings to troops electronically. Collected and sent coupons to Vilseck, Germany for use in commissary. Organized a "goody" drive during week of Veterans Day. Collection was sent to platoon in Iraq, whose leader is daughter of a member. Sent 12 cases of Girl Scout cookies and get well cards. Worked a plan with BJ's Wholesale Club for membership drive. The chapter would receive \$5 of every membership fee. Eight BJ's stores prepared a bin for customers to deposit items donated for the troops. Most items collected were given to USO at Hartsfield-Jackson Airport. Money received used for mailing expenses of items sent to Landstuhl. Martha Stewart Bulloch won award for largest value of items sent to Landstuhl.

INSIGNIA - Mary Gene Everitt Elliott

One hundred and two chapters reported to this State Chairman. The reports were very informative. A letter of information was included in the Chapter Information Packets and many questions were answered during the year about the correct way and time to wear insignia. Chapters reported having forms from Caldwell available at meetings and information about insignia was presented at workshops. "Let's Talk Pins" is a new Question and Answer feature on the Insignia Committee Website. Fort Peachtree, Martha Stewart Bulloch and Philadelphia Winn have newsletters that feature articles on insignia. Oglethorpe Chapter Chairman, Sarah Simpson, demonstrated a padded insert she made which she basted into her jacket for better support of her pins. Special recognition goes to Archibald Bulloch Chapter with sales totaling \$8,562.00, Sue R. Meikle, Regent. Total sales for the State reported by the chapters were \$51,079.18. Wear your insignia with pride at DAR functions or when representing DAR. Madame State Regent, it is an honor to serve you and the Georgia State Society.

LITERACY PROMOTION - Sherri Lawson Roberts

Fifty-six chapters were actively involved in literacy promotion. There was participation in literacy programs by 241members. A total of 15,003 hours were accumulated by DAR members from tutoring, assisting or promoting literacy – 4,091 hours with adults and 10,912 hours with children. There were 3,999 books donated by Georgia chapters to promote literacy. Some of the activities reported by Georgia chapters were: William Marsh sponsored a team for a spelling bee for adults. The money raised purchased dictionaries for every third grade student in Chattooga County.

Augustin Clayton distributed 758 dictionaries to third grade students in Clayton County. Fort Peachtree donated 103 dictionaries to KDS third grade students. General Daniel Newnan helped with the collection of books to establish a library at the Newnan Rehab Center. Elijah Clarke donated 54 books with historic subject matter to 29 local schools. Oglethorpe Chapter member worked with an early childhood literacy program to register children as participants who would receive a book a month until age five. Tallassee Chapter member, Elizabeth Carson Keith, donated over 700 hours tutoring, assisting and promoting literacy in children and adults. The Georgia Daughters are working diligently to promote literacy across the state.

PRESIDENT GENERAL'S PROJECT - O.B. McCorkle

"The Spirit of Hospitality Opens Doors to Opportunity" is the national theme, which involves the restoration and maintenance of our three historic DAR buildings in Washington DC. Chapters are continuing to make their contributions of \$2.00 per member for each year of the 3-year administration. Those chapters reaching 100% participation this year are: Atlanta, Barnard Trail, Colonel Ebenezer Folsom, Commodore Richard Dale, Edmund Burke, Fielding Lewis, General James Jackson, Governor Jared Irwin, John Benson, Joseph Habersham, Martha Stewart Bulloch, Old Unicoi Trail, Sandy Springs, Thomasville, William Day, and William McIntosh. This chairman would also like to recognize one chapter in particular for Outstanding Work and Awareness for the President General's Project. That award goes to the Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter, Shirley Lowe, Chapter Chairman; Mary Simonds, Chapter Regent.

PROTOCOL - Carolyn Grant Hanf

This chairman was pleased to assist chapters that had questions regarding Protocol. Members were encouraged to purchase and read the "Parliamentary Procedure, Protocol and Popular Traditions in Georgia DAR" booklet that is available. It has been a pleasure to serve the State Society and the State Regent in this capacity.

VOLUNTEER GENEALOGISTS - Dee Redkevitch

This was a very busy year for this chairman. Thirty-five workshops were presented with Fielding Lewis doing five of these. These workshops have contributed to our membership growth by providing correctly documented application papers sent to the Registrar General's Office. Problem solving (my favorite thing to do) played a large part in this chairman's schedule. I have had many e-mails from Registrars with questions about papers, received many sets of papers to review, and have critiqued a large amount of Analyses as Daughters have realized they do work when direct evidence cannot be found. I have given chapter programs on "How to do a Supplemental" and hope to see more of them sent to Washington from Georgia. Madam State Regent, I have really enjoyed having this chairmanship during the first year of your administration

WOMEN'S ISSUES - Betty Garlington Christy

The proposed budget for 2009-2010 was discussed and will be presented to the conference on Sunday morning. Members of the committee are: Sally McGlaun Baldwin; Marion Guion Atkins; Ida "Bea" Fischer; Marjorie Young Garner; Pat Long; Phyllis Johnson Tanner; Marilyn K. Lett Wallace and Barbara Blakely Chastain.

MINUTES Finance Committee Meetings October 31, 2008

The Finance Committee met on October 31, 2008, in a private room at the Holiday Inn, Roswell. Dollye Wren Ward, Chairman Pro-tem, called the meeting to order at 3:25 p.m. Other members attending were: Sally McGlaun Baldwin, Secretary; Ida Best Fischer, State Treasurer; Phyllis Johnson Tanner, Past State Treasurer; Barbara Blakely Chastain, State Regent. A prayer was given by Mrs. Ward.

The Minutes of the March 27, 2008 meeting were not read as they were approved as printed in the 2007-2008 State Proceedings.

Mrs. Fischer, State Treasurer, distributed copies of the Summary of Fund Accounts which were reviewed and filed. Mrs. Fischer explained that the cost of the 2008-2009 Audit would increase. The auditing firm will prepare the 990 forms. She explained if a "review" was preformed rather than a full audit, the Society's costs would be less expensive. Mrs. Fischer will ask the firm for a price quote on a review and a full audit. The Treasurer stated the tax returns would need to be completed by a qualified person.

The following two recommendations were made by the Finance Committee: (1.) that the Georgia Society apply for a Georgia State Society credit card to be used only to secure contracts for Georgia Society events. (2.) that the 2008-2009 Georgia State Society budget be amended to change (\$.03) Lucy Cook Peel per capita to (\$.01) and McCall Genealogical Fund per capita (\$.03) to (\$0.1) and the Funds be transferred to the Meetings Fund.

The following motions were made and adopted by the Finance Committee: (1.) that all back copies of the Lucy Cook Peel books will be offered for sale for

\$1.00. Orders to be taken and shipped by the State Chairman or will be taken by the State Chairman to State Conference, and all State functions. (2.) that the State Regent participate in the NSDAR Museum Period Rooms Virtual Tour at the cost of \$300.00 and to be paid from the Georgia Room Fund. (3.) that \$250.00 be paid to the Marriott Augusta Hotel and Suites to secure the hotel contract for October 27-30, 2010, State Board of Management Meeting. (4.) that \$500.00 be paid to Marriott Augusta Hotel and Suites to secure the hotel contract for April 27- May 1, 2011, State Conference Meeting.

The State Treasurer stated that a new Certificate of Deposit was purchased at the Park Avenue Bank for \$50,000,00. The FDIC insurance limit was increased to \$250,000.00. The State Treasurer has taken over the accounting of the Society Clubs due to an IRS ruling.

March 26, 2009

The Finance Committee met on March 26, 2009, at the Atlanta Marriott Northwest Hotel, Atlanta. Dollye Wren Ward, Chairman, called the meeting to order at 3:10 p.m. Mrs. Ward welcomed the members in attendance: Sally McGlaun Baldwin, Secretary; Ida Best Fischer, State Treasurer; Phyllis Johnson Tanner, Past State Treasurer, Barbara Blakely Chastain, State Regent, Marion Guion Atkins, Regent, Fort Peachtree Chapter, Marjorie Fox Garner, Honorary State Regent and Marilyn Lett Wallace, Regent, Oglethorpe Chapter, An Invocation was given by Mrs. Garner,

The Minutes of the October 31, 2008 meeting were read and approved.

Mrs. Fischer, State Treasurer, distributed copies of the Summary of Fund Accounts which were reviewed and filed; total Certificates of Deposit, \$92,273.60; total Checking Accounts, \$71,733,45; total Money Market Accounts, \$50,826,05; total Assets, \$217,083.10. The Hightower Memorial Awards Certificate of Deposit was moved from Sterns Bank to UCB. The Georgia State Society has a credit card, with a \$50,000.00 limit. The auditors, Santi & Associates have agreed to conduct the audit for \$7,500.00. Due to the complex financial situation of Meadow Garden, Meadow Garden will pay \$3,750.00 of the audit.

Mrs. Garner suggested the Meadow Garden Board appoint a separate designated Treasurer or Financial Manager to handle all of the Meadow Garden finances. The Finance Committee agreed with her suggestion. The Committee felt the Meadow Garden Board could handle the appointment of this position without having to go before the Conference with a recommendation from the Bylaws Committee.

Mrs. Garner asked if it would be possible for the GSSDAR, through the NSDAR, to transfer ownership of Meadow Garden to the Georgia Historic Trust. The Finance Committee members felt this was an idea to pursue, even though this might be a long term process. It was suggested that the Capital Investment Funds, \$350,000.00, might remain with the property for its upkeep. It was also suggested Mrs. Chastain appoint an ad hoc committee to study this issue.

Mrs. Fischer stated that Robin McIntire has agreed to prepare the 990 tax return for free again this year.

The State Treasurer distributed the 2009 -2010 Proposed Budget. Mrs. Garner moved, "that the Finance Committee approve the 2009-2010 Budget as presented." The motion was seconded and adopted. The recommendation will be presented to the State Conference.

The *History of the Georgia State Society* will be printed when Brenda Bush has finished typing the information. This printing account balance is \$1,900.00, with \$24,493.00 in the Money Market Account.

Litho Press in Macon will print the 2008-2009 Proceeding books. Mrs. Chastain stated she would like for Litho Press to price having the binding stitched instead of glued to see if this option is possible.

Mrs. Chastain stated the Hospitality Fund Resolution would be presented to the Conference for ratification.

NSDAR is planning to use the state of Georgia as a "test" state with "on line" ability to make contributions to the National Society with the use of a credit card.

Mrs. Fischer stated the Augusta bank account was working well for deposits by Ms. Jackson.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 3:45 p.m.

COOPERATION OF DAR WITH SAR and S.R. - G. Ann Coker Wilson

With 73 chapters responding, 302 SAR and S.R. members attended DAR functions, 579 DAR members attended SAR events. Twenty-one DAR members received SAR medals and/or certificates; 54 chapters attended grave markings; five placed wreaths at Kings Mountain; eight at Cowpens and 17 at Kettle Creek with 32 members attending. MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

August 7, 2008

The Meadow Garden Board met on Thursday, August 7, 2008 at the George Walton Heritage Education Center. Barbara Chastain, State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 10:30 a.m. Other members present: Sally Baldwin, Secretary, Jo Agostas, Betty Harrah, Bea Fischer, Patricia Burnam, Betty Durshimer, Margaret Cagle, Patricia Bracy, Sara Carter, Jeanette Click, Laura Reid, Lanette Reid, with Ex-Officio members, Virginia Lingelbach and Frankie Nevins. Absent was Phyllis Lawson.

Barbara Chastain offered the Invocation and welcomed everyone to the meeting. A committee was appointed to approve the minutes of the May 28, 2008 meeting. Those serving on the committee are: Margaret Cagle, Frankie Nevins and Laura Reid.

The Chairman of the Board gave an overview of the Meadow Garden House and Heritage Center. Items that need care in the Heritage Center downstairs are: grout in the floor, folding doors for the kitchen, the bathroom door is hard to open, bathroom door hinges need to be reversed, shutters are to be installed. Items added upstairs in the Stribling Room are: filing cabinets, oak cabinet, carpet, clock, table and chairs.

The Board members adjourned to the Meadow Garden house for a tour with Susan Jackson, House Manager.

Barbara Chastain and Laura Reid gave written job descriptions to each of the board members. (A complete copy is filed in the Secretary's Minute Book.)

Lanette Reid stated Sharon McDonnell of Brooklyn, New York, is writing an article on Meadow Garden. She mailed information about Meadow Garden to Ms. McDonnell. Mrs. Reid presented each member with a written copy of Substantiated Facts on George Walton and Meadow Garden that she complied.

The Chairman of the Board reported her goal of installing display cases in the Augusta Room. The display cases will hold items to showcase Meadow Garden, i.e., the David the Potter Jugs.

Mrs. Chastain reported Phyllis Lawson contacted the Department of Motor Vehicles concerning vehicle tags featuring Meadow Garden. Pre-orders will be needed to secure the minimum order of 1,000 tags before production. A \$50,000.00 bond will be required to order the tags. This information will be given to the members at the summer workshops. Action will be taken at a later meeting.

The State Treasurer, Bea Fischer, stated a Petty Cash form has been created for the House Manager to use. Susan Jackson has been given deposit slips to deposit money from tours and Gift Shop sales. She will mail the deposit slips to the State Treasurer. The amount of petty cash has increased to \$150.00.

The State Treasurer distributed the Summary of Accounts, as of August 5, 2008. Total Assets are: Checking Account, \$77,059.95; Money Market Accounts, \$29,769.30; Certificates of Deposit, \$350,000.00; Total Current Assets, \$456,929.25; Total Fixed Assets, \$144,693.12; Total Assets, \$601,622.37. Mrs. Fischer presented the 2008 - 2009 Meadow Garden Proposed Operating Budget. Mrs. Reid moved, that "the proposed 2008 - 2009 operating budget for Meadow Garden be adopted as presented." The motion was seconded and adopted.

Laura Reid, Honorary State Regent, stated the balance of money from her administration in the State Regent's Project was transferred to the Augusta Room Interpretive Center.

Jo Agostas, Meadow Garden Chairman, reported Al Walton is presently working on the outside of the house. There is rotten wood on several sections of the

house. This will need to be replaced and the project cost will increase. Mrs. Chastain stated she and her husband, Frank, will review these issues with Mr. Walton. Mr. Chastain has extensive construction knowledge, due to his business interests. The house will need a special pressure wash once a year after this work is complete. Mr. Walton is presently chemically cleaning and pressure washing the house. The air conditioner in the manager's office has been fixed at a cost of \$269.00. The shutters for the Heritage Center, purchased from Lowe's, costing \$1,260.51, have been shipped.

The Augusta Chapter Regent, Patricia Bracy, and College Hill Chapter Regent, Betty Durshimer, are the incoming regents and representatives on the Meadow Garden Board. The chapters continue to participate in the Georgia Day Events. Mrs. Chastain thanked the regents for their work on the Board.

Margaret Cagle, Docents Chairman, reported for the first half of 2008: 19 docents, 10 chapters, 493 $\frac{1}{2}$ hours, 1 docent, non DAR member, with 32 $\frac{1}{2}$ hours. The first lunch served will be September 16th. Docent training will be scheduled on a per chapter request.

Patricia Burnam, Furnishings Chairman, reported the hinges on the cabinet have been corrected. The piano will be moved to the Best Room. Mrs. Burnam distributed the "Meadow Garden Collections Management Policy" to the board members. She asked that the appraisal be reviewed to remove the Augusta Room furniture and make sure all new purchases have been added. The David the Potter jugs have been valued at \$25,000.00 each. Frankie Nevins will find an appraiser in the Augusta area. Lanette Reid stated there are several pictures in the house not being displayed. She suggested a peg board system to hang the pictures upstairs in the Heritage Center. Mrs. Reid submitted a drawing to receive an estimate on the cost of this type system.

Jeanette Click, Landscaping Chairman, stated the driveway has been completed. The yard maintenance company has increased their cutting service. This service will include cleaning out the flower beds. It was suggested that names of plants and shrubbery be attached/staked to the plants. A future item to look to change would be the fencing on the sides of the property. The fence cannot be higher than six feet per Augusta code. The out building (old out-house) needs to be repaired and secured as it is being used for storage of yard tools. It was stated the area under the house porch needs to be cleaned out.

Sara Carter, Gift Shop Chairman, stated she would like the gift shop to carry items for school children to purchase, priced from \$1.00 to \$5.00. The idea of "green bags" and personalized sale bags for Meadow Garden was discussed. Shoe sachets and sachets will be ordered.

Betty Harrah, Patrons Chairman, reported the membership goal will be increased to 800 Patrons. Patron levels are: individuals, \$50.00 per year; chapters, \$100.00 per year. Patrons will receive a Patron's ribbon to attach to their name tag at State Conference. The Meadow Garden pin will be redesigned.

Phyllis Lawson, Public Relations Chairman, submitted a written report covering several items. The *North Georgia Living* magazine published a three page article on Meadow Garden in the July 2008 issue. Mrs. Lawson will meet with Lynn Wright to enhance the current book of <u>George Walton of Meadow Garden</u> for reprinting. She is still working with the Governor's Office on the signage for Meadow Garden on I-20. Meadow Garden is being featured in Augusta Metro Guide. Sally Baldwin moved that, "David Brown, Beth Hillman and Jenna Albright with Lamar Advertising be recognized as Patrons-in-kind for their work with Meadow Garden, for the 2008 - 2009 year." The motion was seconded and adopted. The Patrons Chairman will send Patrons cards to the new Patrons.

Frankie Nevins, Liaison to Civic Augusta, gave information concerning the 2007 Candlelight Tour: A total of 315 tickets were sold, with each participating location receiving \$858.00. A grant was received in 2007 toward the printing costs. For 2008 a grant is not available and each participant will have to pay \$500.00 to cover the printing cost. The Tour will be held the first weekend of December; December 5th, 4 p.m. to 8 p.m. and December 6th, 2 p.m. to 8 p.m. Margaret Cagle moved, that "Meadow Garden will be included in Historic Augusta Christmas Open House December 5th and 6th, 2008, which will include \$500.00 advertising fee, to come from the Public Relations/Advertising Fund." The motion was seconded and adopted. Information concerning the Candlelight Tour will be included in the Fall Board letter. State mailing information will be used to inform chapters of the event. The Georgia Day event, always held the Friday after July 4th, was held with Meadow Garden hosting a table of information. There were over 400 people participating at this event.

The Chairman of the Board stated those chairmen designated to receive keys to Meadow Garden will exchange/receive keys after the meeting.

The Benediction was given by the State Regent and the meeting was adjourned at 1:40 p.m.

The Georgia Society owns two signed jugs, possibly one unsigned jug. There are 150 known pieces of pottery. The starting prices at auction run about \$50,000.00. The Georgia jugs have been appraised at \$25,000.00 each. A grout color will need to be selected to be included with the itemized cost estimate to complete the floor project of the Heritage Center. Mrs. Agostas will get an estimate for the entire downstairs floor, including the storage area.

The damage to the house on the canal side was more extensive than previously thought with more wood being replaced. The wood used on the house was not the appropriate type of wood, the life of this type wood will have a shorter life. The total amount approved for this project was \$17,500.00. This work was done by Al Walden, of A W Contractors Painting. Mr. Walden is owed a balance of \$8,750.00 when this work is complete. Mrs. Reid moved, "that A W Contractors be paid the balance due of the original contract to paint and replace rotted wood on exterior of Meadow Garden at such time as the contracted work is completed and the gate key is returned, and to postpone any further work on the exterior until such time as advice can be given on proper procedure for further work." Motion seconded and adopted.

The Meadow Garden Chairman, Jo Agostas reported a bid for a ramp at the small gate. Mrs. Baldwin moved, "that we repair gateway entrance ramp \$190.00,

canal entrance \$275.00, work on brick for education building \$175.00; 270 brick for project \$200.00, work by Joe Banks, total cost \$840.00, and to be paid from General Maintenance and Repair Fund." Motion seconded and adopted. Mrs. Agostas stated that Omar will sweep sand in the driveway brick. The walkway needs to be repaired. Mrs. Agostas will get an estimate for this work.

Pat Bracy, Regent of the Augusta Chapter, reported the Augusta Chapter held their September chapter meeting at the Heritage Center but due to limited room the meeting had to be held outside. Mrs. Bracy said she was concerned with the limited space in the room for meetings. She stated a new flag was needed for Meadow Garden and has been installed. The maximum capacity for the Heritage Center is 35 people according to the Fire Marshall. The Rental Contract states this number. The Augusta Chapter has a member who wishes to donate a book to the Heritage Center. The name of the book will be submitted to the Board. Mrs. Bracy has volunteered at Meadow Garden since the last meeting.

Betty Durshimer, Regent of the College Hill Chapter, reported bringing four cases of Lucy Cook Peel books to the Heritage Center for short time storage. A recommendation made to the Executive Board, "that all back copies of the Lucy Cook Peel books will be offered for sale for \$1.00. Orders to be taken and shipped by the State Chairman or will be taken by the State Chairman to State Conference, and all State functions." The recommendation was adopted. Mrs. Durshimer reported assisting with a luncheon at Meadow Garden. Margaret Cagle is working with the Candlelight Tour in December.

The State Treasurer, Bea Fischer distributed the Summary of Accounts, as of October 16, 2008. Total Assets are: Checking Account, \$69,288.55; Money Market Accounts, \$29,703.28; Certificates of Deposit, \$350,000.00; Total Current Assets, \$449,091.83; Total Fixed Assets, \$171,258.69; Total Assets, \$620,350.52. She renewed the Capital Investment Fund #2 Certificate of Deposit. There was a workman's compensation claim made against Meadow Garden by Susan Jackson, House Manager. She was bitten by a cat and required medical attention. At this point there have been medical expenses over \$1,200.00. Animal control was called and removed the animals. Mrs. Jackson asked to be reimbursed \$40.00 for prescription medicine. It was decided that the workman's compensation claim would cover this expense. A bill was received from Yellowpages.com for \$1,578.00. This service was not approved by the Board and will not be paid. The Petty Cash form is working great and will be continued to be used. The bill from the auditor was received. The approved amount for Meadow Garden to pay is \$3,450.00. This money was transferred to the State Society funds and the total bill was paid. A check for \$500.00, for participation in advertisement for Historic Augusta, was returned due to a donation given to pay this expense.

Mrs. Chastain stated that Meadow Garden is mentioned on the cover of the NSDAR Magazine, <u>American Spirit</u>. The magazine was shared with the Board, showing Meadow Garden, featured with a full article and pictures.

The Landscaping Chairman, Jeanette Click reported checking on the grounds every other week. The light by the flag pole has been repaired and a sprinkler head installed. Seeds for packets have been made to sell. Mrs. Click stated being concerned about building materials lying on the grass for the past two months. The Master Gardeners may be willing to volunteer their service with the herb garden.

Mrs. Baldwin moved, "that magazine feature articles on Meadow Garden be framed and hung on the walls of the downstairs room of the Heritage Center." Motion seconded and adopted.

The Gift Shop Chairman, Sara Carter reported buying and setting up merchandise to sell. She sold items at a chapter meeting. Mrs. Carter ordered flag

pins and 2 year calendars. Mrs. Baldwin donated a box of new Christmas items to be sold at the Meadow Garden sales tables.

The Patrons Chairman, Betty Harrah reported \$475.00 in Patron funds received to date. Mrs. Harrah moved,"to order 300 Patron ribbons for State Conference at a cost to be less than \$300.00. Funds to come from Administration Funds." Motion seconded and adopted. The Patrons Book will stay with the State Chairman to be updated until after the dues are paid. She will bring the Patrons Book to State Conference and display for members to view.

The Furnishings Chairman, Patty Burnam reported spending three days at Meadow Garden working. She reported the "picture rack" suggested by Mrs. Reid was cost prohibitive. The color for the bust pedestals has been selected. Mrs. Burnam had two appraisers' bio for the Board to review, Roderick A. Hardy of Hardy/Halpern Inc and Beth A. Kinstler. She has asked the Augusta Chapter to assist with documenting items at Meadow Garden. Mrs. Burnam asked the Board to consider a recommendation at the next Board meeting with action on the Hat Rack that is not being used. There are seven quilts in need of immediate attention. The material is in need of repair and should be kept out of the light.

The Liaison to Civic Augusta, Frankie Nevins reported attending several meetings in conjunction with the Candlelight Tour in December 5th and 6th. The Savannah River Slammers, a dulcimer musical group will perform; homemade cookies will be served; and the gift shop will be open. Mrs. Nevins attended meetings with groups of museums, historic sites and art organizations. The Richmond County Superintendent requested a joint project that would produce a booklet of properties offering educational tours and opportunities to school groups. Meadow Garden was represented at an open house for local teachers at the Morris Museum of Art to promote educational sites. Meadow Garden will be listed in *The Metro Spirit*, a free weekly newspaper, for the Augusta area.

Mrs. Chastain reported that Phyllis Lawson, Public Relations Chairman, has been working on the signs and directions to Meadow Garden with the Department of Transportation. She is working to update the booklet on Meadow Garden.

The Benediction was given by the State Regent and the meeting was adjourned at 3:15 p.m.

MEADOW GARDEN BOARD January 7, 2009

The Meadow Garden Board met on Wednesday, January 7, 2009, at the George Walton Heritage Education Center. Barbara Chastain, State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 10:08 a.m. Other members present: Sally Baldwin, Secretary, Bea Fischer, Betty Durshimer, Patricia Bracy, Phyllis Lawson, Billy Hunter, Sara Carter, Jeanette Click, Ex-Officio member, Frankie Nevins. Absent were: Margaret Cagle, Patty Burnam, Betty Harrah, Lanette Reid, Laura Reid and Virginia Lingelbach.

Barbara Chastain offered the Invocation and welcomed everyone to the meeting. The minutes of the October 21, 2008 meeting were approved as sent.

The Chairman of the Board, Mrs. Chastain reported accepting the resignation of Jo Agostas, Meadow Garden Chairman, with Margaret Cagle appointed to serve the remainder of the term. Mrs. Chastain expressed her thanks to Mrs. Agostas for an excellent job well done and hoped her health would soon improve. Billy Hunter has been appointed to serve as Docents Chairman.

Mrs. Chastain gave the following information concerning a cost of living raise for Susan Jackson, House Manager: since being employed by the GSSDAR, Mrs.

Jackson has received one cost of living raise, five years ago; job is 30 hours a week; present salary is \$1,397.00 per month; this proposed raise would be \$103.00 per month; the proposed raise would bring the House Manager's salary to \$18,000.00 per year. Sally Baldwin moved "that Susan Jackson, House Manager, receive a cost of living raise, gross salary \$1,500.00 per month, starting January 2009. A House Manager's description and responsibilities will be established before the next Meadow Garden meeting." The motion was seconded and adopted.

There was positive discussion concerning a separate Treasurer's position to handle the business of Meadow Garden. All members of the Board in attendance were in favor of this change. Mrs. Fischer will inquire of members that have experience in this field and report to the Chairman of the Board. There may be a member in the Augusta area that would be qualified to serve in this position. Further steps will be taken by the Board toward this important change.

State Treasurer, Bea Fischer, reported sending the cost of the 2008-2009 State audit to the Finance Committee. The Meadow Garden portion of the audit was \$3,600.00. The cost of the next audit will be included in the Proposed Budget. Meadow Garden will pay its portion of the audit. The Proposed Budget will include Mrs. Jackson's cost of living raise.

The State Treasurer, Bea Fischer distributed the Summary of Accounts, as of November 30, 2008. Total Assets are: Checking Account, \$71,549.75; Money Market Accounts, \$29,847.49; Certificates of Deposit, \$350,000.00; Total Current Assets, \$451,497.24; Total Fixed Assets, \$171,258.69; Total Assets, \$622,755.93. The Capital Investment Fund #1 Certificate of Deposit was renewed.

Al Walton's contract has been paid in full for the repairs to the House. Mr. Walton was told by Mrs. Chastain that he must finish the contracted work before starting any new projects.

An invoice from the Interspace Airport Advertising Company for \$2,400.00 was received. Mrs. Durshimer moved, "that we renew the advertising contract with Interspace Airport Advertising at the Augusta Airport for the period 2/28/2009 - 2/27/2010 for the sum of \$2,400.00." The motion was seconded and adopted. This advertising space is an eight foot scrolling display located in the Augusta Airport. Mrs. Nevins will check with the Augusta Airport to see if there is a location near the sign to display Meadow Garden brochures.

An invoice for \$500.00, from Universal Plumbing, Inc., was received and paid. This bill included: work on a clogged sewer line and installation of a new toilet in the back porch bathroom of the House.

Betty Jean Durshimer, Regent of the College Hill Chapter, and Pat Bracy, Regent of the Augusta Chapter, reported the Christmas Tour has held with cookies and drinks served to attendees. The Savannah River Slammers played during the Tour. The attendance for the entire Tour was low this year. Both chapter regents spent many hours in preparation for the Tour. Mrs. Chastain commended the regents, Meadow Garden chairmen, chapter and committee members for their hard work, helping to make the Christmas Tour a success.

Phyllis Lawson, Public Relations Chairman, has been working on the signs and directions to Meadow Garden with the Department of Transportation; has coordinated with the Governor's Office for George Walton Day Proclamation and photo op for January 12, 2009; still working on the George Walton of Meadow Garden reprinting book; and contacted all Georgia Welcome Centers, sending brochures to six out of eleven Centers. Mrs. Lawson presented a photocopy of the proposed state vehicle license tag. Mrs. Lawson stated the GSSDAR will have to presell 1,000 tags at a cost of \$25.00 in order for the State of Georgia to produce the tags. The State Society has liability insurance of more than \$300,000.00 and will not have to purchase additional insurance to meet the Georgia State DMV requirement.

Mrs. Lawson moved, "that we develop a special interest (Meadow Garden) license plate. Cost to public, in addition to cost of the tag, will be \$25.00. 1,000 plates must be sold before plates will be made." The motion was seconded and adopted. Special order forms for the license plate will be available at the 2009 State Conference for people to sign up. Mrs. Lawson moved, "that we honor Elaine Thames with Patron-in-kind of Meadow Garden for her service with ACVB (Augusta Convention and Visitors Bureau) grant." The motion was seconded and adopted. Mrs. Lawson presented a "display board/case" for use of displaying information about Meadow Garden. Mrs. Durshimer moved, "that we purchase the Prezenta Show Style Briefcase Display (1) for the sum of \$265.00, plus handling and taxes." The motion was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Chastain received a box of old pictures, seals and papers concerning Meadow Garden. The box has been given to Mrs. Burnam for cataloging.

Mrs. Hunter, newly appointed Docents Chairman, reported three members that are interested in the docents program: Susanne Jones, Patsy Ray and Daphne Hopson.

The Chairman stated a need for an assistant to the Chairman of the Furnishing Committee. An assistant in the Augusta area would speed the process of labeling and work with the computer inventory program.

The Gift Shop Chairman, Sara Carter reported \$930.00 sold at the State Board of Management meeting. Sales during the Christmas Candlelight Tour were \$199.00. Mrs. Carter decorated inside and outside the House for the Tour and removed the greenery after the event. Sales items will be taken by Mrs. Carter to chapter meetings when invited to visit. She asked if there was a possibility of a Docents Class to be held on a Saturday and possibly that Meadow Garden be open on the first Saturday of the month.

The Landscaping Chairman, Jeanette Click stated decorating for the Christmas Tour, Mrs. Click, Mrs. Carter, Mrs. Durshimer and Mrs. Bracy worked diligently together in preparation for the Christmas Tour. Mrs. Click has the herb garden cleaned up with pine straw placed around the trees. Mrs. Click stated serving 52½ hours of service. At State Conference, the final breakfast on Sunday will be the Meadow Garden event. The State Conference theme will be "Seasons", with the breakfast being Christmas/"Winter". Members will be invited to wear their "Christmas slippers" to the meal with Christmas sales items set up. Mrs. Click stated Mr. Walton did not clean up his building materials in the yard before the Tour and the Committee had to handle this clean up.

The Liaison to Civic Augusta, Frankie Nevins reported 98 visitors for the Christmas Tour. This attendance was down for all the Houses on the Tour. The total expenses of all the Houses on the Tour were \$2,482.00, with Meadow Garden receiving \$205.00 from the sale of tickets. The Savannah River Slammers, a dulcimer musical group performed; homemade cookies and drink were served. On the evaluation forms, Meadow Garden received a high rating from the visitors of the Tour. For the 2009 Tour, the days and hours will be: the same weekend, Friday, 4:00-8:00 p.m.; Saturday, 4:00-8:00 p.m.; Sunday, 2:00-6:00 p.m.

Mrs. Fischer stated her chapter, Colonel William Candler, would like to donate a painting, "Belles of Freedom and Patriotism" by member, Rosemary Wood Dodd, 2nd place winner, in the NSDAR National American Heritage Contest, to Meadow Garden. A note card of the painting was shown to the Board. Mrs. Baldwin moved, "that Meadow Garden accept the painting "Belles of Freedom and Patriotism" by Rosemary Wood Dodd from the Colonel William Candler Chapter, and hang the painting on the wall of the downstairs room of the George Walton Heritage Education Center." The motion was seconded and adopted.

There being no further business, the Benediction was given by the State Regent and the meeting was adjourned at 12 noon.

March 26, 2009

The Meadow Garden Board met on Thursday, March 26, 2009, at the Atlanta Marriott Northwest Hotel, Atlanta. Barbara Chastain, State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 1:00 pm. Other members present: Sally Baldwin, Secretary, Patricia Bracy, Betty Durshimer, Margaret Cagle, Patty Burnam, Sara Carter, Betty Harrah, Phyllis Lawson, Bea Fischer, Lanette Reid, Laura Reid and Virginia Lingelbach, Ex-Officio member. Frankie Nevins, Liaison to Civic Augusta. Absent: Billie Hunter and Jeanette Click.

Barbara Chastain offered the Invocation and welcomed members to the meeting. The minutes of the January 7, 2009 meeting were approved as corrected.

The Chairman of the Board, Mrs. Chastain reported the grout project for the Heritage Center is "on hold" until other bids have been received. Al Walden is still painting the House. He will mail the bill to the State Regent, who will mail the bill to the State Treasurer. Mrs. Cagle will oversee his work. Mr. Walden is to stop all work that is not in the present contract and complete the contracted work. Mr. Walden was recommended as a painter, not for carpentry work. Mrs. Cagle and the two Chapter Regents were asked to get estimates from contractors in the Augusta area for additional work on the House.

Mrs. Chastain asked about moving the display table in the upstairs hall to the Augusta Room. This display table is actually more than one piece. The upstairs hallway is narrow and does not allow enough room for visitor movement and display cases. There was discussion about different items that could be displayed for viewing by the public. There may be a grant available concerning assistance from a museum display designer specializing in placement of furniture and historical items. The large cabinet located in the Sales Room cannot be moved easily due to the condition of the cabinet.

Mrs. Lawson stated she has received information about a grant for consultants. There is a need to tint the upstairs windows on the canal side, due to the light that is damaging the textiles and furniture. The quilts need to be in climate controlled display cases due to fragile condition of the material. The quilts would need to be laid flat in the storage unit.

It is possible the upstairs needs a dedicated AC/heat unit to keep the temperature constant. The duct work may need to be updated or additional vents may be needed. It was decided that the AC/heat unit should remain on at all times. The temperature would need to be set on an evening setting after closing. Ms. Jackson will be informed of this change.

State Treasurer, Bea Fischer, reported the petty cash form was working with Ms. Jackson. Meadow Garden will pay \$3,750.00 of the state audit.

The State Treasurer distributed the Summary of Accounts, as of February 28, 2009. Total Assets are: Checking Account, \$97,923.67; Money Market Accounts, \$29,986.63; Certificates of Deposit, \$350,000.00; Total Current Assets, \$478,010.30; Total Fixed Assets, \$171,258.69; Total Assets, \$649,268.99.

Mrs. Burnam, Furnishings Chairman, has framed several of the approved pictures and magazines. She will be reimbursed by the State Treasurer when bills have been submitted.

Margaret Cagle, Meadow Garden Chairman, reported the sewer line has been repaired. The line from the House to the street needs to be replaced. Mrs. Cagle will contact Universal Plumbing to replace the pipe. Mrs. Agostas had an

estimate from Universal Plumbing for this work but the work had not been started due to her health.

Pat Bracy, Regent of the Augusta Chapter, reported that local DAR members saw the Meadow Garden "signs/bill board" at the Augusta Airport and were very impressed.

Betty Jean Durshimer, Regent of the College Hill Chapter, reported several members had served as docents. The gift shop was open for sales while their chapter members served meals for two chapters touring the property.

Mrs. Burnam showed the framed magazine featured articles on Meadow Garden. The hall tree is being used in the Gift Shop to display sales items. It was suggested to start a book with pictures of all Past State Regents on display in the Heritage Center. The small oil painting is ready to be framed along with the original picture of Francis Scott Key.

The State Regent reported the landscape is in good condition with Omar working with the landscape Chairman. The herb garden is being set up.

Docents Chairman, Billie Hunter, was absent. Mrs. Cagle reported that Mrs. Hunter would like to have a group of members take a docent's class, setting a date and time that the class could be held. This information would be given to Wendy Fox, Chairman of the Georgia Web Site. It was suggested that more information about Meadow Garden be put on the Georgia web site. The Disaster Plan has been updated. All of the outside steps need to have a non-slip paint put on them. The purchase and installation of rubber strips was included in the contract with Mr. Walden. He will be informed of this required change.

Gift Shop Chairman, Sara Carter, reported she has Christmas items to set up at the Meadow Garden Breakfast on Sunday morning. She traveled to chapter meetings selling Meadow Garden merchandise. She bought Christmas sales items in January and February to sell at DAR events. Mrs. Carter sold \$70.00 at two chapter meetings. The Gift Shop sales, since January 1, 2009, have been \$539.00.

The Patrons Chairman, Mrs. Harrah, showed members the Patron's book. It has been updated and she will read the lists of Patrons at the Meadow Garden Breakfast.

The State Regent stated she would like to recognize Jo Agostas for her outstanding work and dedication to Meadow Garden. Mrs. Agostas will be given a plaque and made a Patron for life. After much discussion, it was decided to check with Perkins Rose Company to see about having a rose named for Mrs. Agostas. The bush will be planted at Meadow Garden with cuttings taken after it matures.

Phyllis Lawson, Public Relations Chairman, has been working on the Georgia license plate featuring Meadow Garden. She presented a photocopy of the proposed specialty state vehicle license tag, with an application form for the tag. The Society has to pre-sell 1,000 tags before the State of Georgia will produce the tags. The cost of the manufacturing fee is \$25.00. The checks will be held until the minimum number has been pre-sold. Mrs. Lawson presented the completed display case, and carrying case, with the story of Meadow Garden displayed. Mrs. Lawson moved, "that we propose Judy Helms and Phyllis Newsome for Patron-in-kind for their assistance with the display board, artwork and printing for Meadow Garden." The motion was seconded and adopted. She had the George Walton Day Proclamation framed and placed at Meadow Garden. The Meadow Garden color print painted by Barbara Blakely Chastain is copyrighted by the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution.

Mrs. Chastain stated she attended the Florida State Conference and brought Greetings. The Florida Society had marked Mrs. Walton's grave in Florida. After hearing this information, Mrs. Chastain explained to the members about Meadow Garden being George Walton's farm home.

The Liaison to Civic Augusta, Frankie Nevins reported working with information prepared by the Education Coalition to use in South Carolina schools. The Open House will be held in the fall and the Georgia State Trust for Historic Preservation Conference will be held May 16th. Mrs. Nevins and Mrs. Cagle will set up the Meadow Garden display at the Georgia Welcome Center July 17th. Chapter members in the area will be asked to assist with this advertising.

Mrs. Chastain stated the Colonel William Candler presented her with the painting, "Belles of Freedom and Patriotism" by member, Rosemary Wood Dodd, 2nd place winner in the NSDAR National American Heritage Contest, to hang in the Heritage Center. The painting was too large to fit in her car so she was unable to take the painting with her. The painting will be delivered to Meadow Garden. When the painting arrives a card of acknowledgment will be sent to the Chapter.

Mrs. Chastain has the framed Declaration of Independence from Meadow Garden at State Conference to show Mr. David Carmichael. He will be the Opening Night Speaker.

There being no further business, the Benediction was given by the State Regent and the meeting was adjourned at 2:50 pm.

Standing Rules for Meadow Garden

I MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

- 1. The governing body of a Historic Site, in this instance the Meadow Garden Board, serves the public interest as it relates to Meadow Garden, and must consider itself accountable to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, as well as to Meadow Garden; members should not attempt to act in their individual capacities, but all actions should be taken as a Board, Committee, or otherwise in conformance with the Standing Rules, the Act of Incorporation, or applicable Resolutions.
- The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the three (3) Trustees as named in the Deed from the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, conveying Meadow Garden to the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution; namely, the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the State Chairman of Meadow Garden who is appointed by the State Regent; the Chapter Regents of the Augusta Chapter and the College Hill Chapter, both chapters being located in Augusta, who shall serve as Vice Chairman to the State Chairman of Meadow Garden; the State Treasurer; two Honorary State Regents; and six of the chairmen of Meadow Garden Committees, as appointed by the State Regent.
- 3. No Georgia Daughter shall serve in the same Meadow Garden Chairmanship more than three (3) consecutive terms.
- In addition to the six appointments to the Board which are made by the State Regent, she shall appoint two (2) Honorary State Regents.
- The State Second Vice Regent shall serve as ex-officio member of the Meadow Garden Board, being given the privilege of the floor without a vote.
- The State Regent shall serve as Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board, and the State First Vice Regent shall serve as Secretary of the Meadow Garden Board.
- 7. The Meadow Garden Board shall met a minimum of three (3) times each year; namely, preceding State Board of Management meeting, preceding annual State Conference and following Continental Congress, and at such other times as deemed necessary by the Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board. At least one (1) meeting of the Board shall be held at Meadow Garden each year. The Board may vote by teleconference, fax or email, if necessary.
- 8. The Meadow Garden Board shall have jurisdiction over the operation, maintenance and work of Meadow Garden and shall be the authority for Meadow Garden as long as such authority is not in conflict with the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, the Act of Incorporation for the Georgia State Society, Resolutions adopted by the Georgia State Society and/or directions which from time to time may be approved by action of the Georgia State Society assembled at its annual State Conference.
- The Meadow Garden Board shall supervise the placing of all insurance to cover the grounds and the Historic House and its contents, including the fine arts, with accredited companies – coverage to include fire, theft and liability.
- 10. Five (5) voting members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.
- 11. Minutes shall be kept of each meeting and a copy shall be sent to each member and printed verbatim in the State Proceedings.

- All expenses for maintenance, operation and purchases of furnishings and plantings shall be authorized by the State Regent, as Chairman of the Board, and paid by the State Treasurer. Expenditures exceeding \$1,000.00 must have the majority approval of the Board.
- These rules will be binding on the actions of the Board in their operation of Meadow Garden. They may be changed by the following procedure: Members of the Board must have written notification of proposed changes one month prior to the next meeting of the Board; a two-thirds vote of the Board and approval of the State Conference are necessary to effect a change.
- 14. The State Regent shall appoint a Meadow Garden Advisory Board, which would act in an advisory capacity only and be composed of no more than fifteen (15) members representing various areas of expertise.

II OPERATIONS

- Everyone entering Meadow Garden will be requested to sign the Register, including date, time of arrival and time of departure.
- No more than fifteen (15) people with each Docent are to be on tour in the house at a given time. Excess of this number may wait in the reception room or in the garden. The House Manager has the authority to enforce the Meadow Garden rules at all times.
- There will be no smoking on Meadow Garden property.
- 4. No refreshments are to be served in or taken into the Historic House by visitors, including chapters or the public. Should a group, such as a visiting chapter, desire refreshments, the garden is available for use if litter is properly disposed of by the serving group.
- Tour visitors will be asked to pay a fee as set by the Board.
- 6. In August 2006 Dixie Lock and Safe, Inc., installed new locks and keys were made which cannot be duplicated. The State Regent, State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Manager by the direction of one of the two above, are authorized to have new keys made for Meadow Garden.

There shall be two (2) complete sets of keys to Meadow Garden, which are eight (8) keys per set. There shall be four (4) sets of keys comprised of three (3) keys per set, which are the back door key to the historic house, the key to the George Walton Heritage Education Center, and the gate key. There shall be one (1) set of keys for "house" use, which are three (3) keys, one for the kitchen, one for the exterior bath at the historic house, and one for the interior door between the dining room and the old gift shop area. These three (3) "house" keys shall be kept in the old gift shop area for accessibility to all for use on a daily basis. There shall be one (1) gate key assigned to the landscape service company.

Keys are lettered per door of entry: Key # A is to the deadbolt of the three (3) doors of the George Walton Heritage Education Center; Key # B is to the deadbolt lock on the back door of the historic house; Key # C is to the gate; Key # D is to the Stribling Room in the George Walton Heritage Education Center; Key # E is to the kitchen; Key # F is to the deadbolt for the exterior bath at the historic house; Key # G is to the interior door between the dining room and the old gift shop; Key # H is to the office upstairs in the historic house.

Keys are numbered and assigned according to the appointed position on the Meadow Garden Board or as designated. Keys are distributed to the assigned person when they sign a "Meadow Garden Key Distribution Form." When this assigned person leaves her current position, she returns the keys and signs the same form she had signed when she accepted the keys. Keys go with the appointed position not the person.

Distribution of the keys: Key # 1 to State Regent, Chairman of Meadow Garden Board (complete set of 8 keys); Key # 2 to Meadow Garden Manager (complete set of 8 keys); Key # 3 to Chairman of Meadow Garden (keys A, B, C); Key # 4 to Docents Chairman (keys A, B, C); Key # 5 to Landscaping Chairman (keys A, B, C); Key # 6 for General Docent use (keys A, B, C) – to be checked "out" and "in" when used; Key # 7 are "house" keys (keys E, F, G); Key # 8 to landscape service (key C).

III VOLUNTEERS AND DOCENTS

- Docents, shall be those well screened and trained volunteers who will serve under the direct supervision of a Meadow Garden Chairman and/or the House Manager.
- Duties of docents shall include acting as guides, hostesses, working in gift shop, working in yard, cleaning in house, public relations. No volunteer work at or for Meadow Garden shall be done except under the direct guidance of the Meadow Garden Board and the chairman of the specific committee for that particular function.
- Cleaning or yard work volunteers shall be under the direction of the House Manager.

IV FURNISHINGS

- Items bought or accepted for the older section of Meadow Garden must predate 1821.
- 2. (a) the front room on the main floor, known as the Augusta Room, will be designed as an interpretive center, highlighting people, events, and memorabilia related to George Walton and to the history of Meadow Garden; (b) the back room on the main floor, formerly known as the Board Room, will be used as a gift shop; (c) the front room on the upper floor of the newer section will be furnished as a bedroom/study of the period pre-dating 1850 or be used to display historically significant items relating to Meadow Garden, Augusta and Georgia; (d) the back room on the upper floor of the newer section will be used as an office for the Meadow Garden manager and for storage and supplies for the gift shop.
- Reproductions may be used only when the physical condition of the antiques is jeopardized by exposure in areas where large numbers of visitors have easy access; or when environmental conditions including excessive light, dust, humidity or airborne impurities pose a threat to the preservation of originals.
- Effective March 12, 1983 all items donated to Meadow Garden shall be accepted with the written condition that they become the property of Meadow Garden and may be used, replaced or sold at the discretion of the Meadow Garden Board only.

- 5. All items that post date 1821, with the exception of those in the six (6) rooms of the newer section and those described in Number 3 of this section, shall be replaced as soon as possible with similar items pre-dating 1821.
- Once an item is placed, it shall not be moved from one location to another without permission of the Meadow Garden Chairman of Furnishings who shall report such changes to the Meadow Garden Board in a timely manner.
- Any item donated or purchased must have written documentation of appraisal.
- 8. No items and/or furnishings shall be accepted "on loan".
- 9. A file will be kept of all assets with information as to price paid or market value, date of acquisition, donor or where bought, documentation and appraisal and a description of article. One file will be kept in the reception room accessible to the Docents; a duplicate file will be in the possession of the Chairman of the Board. The Meadow Garden Chairman of Furnishings shall maintain and keep current the "Past and Perfect" Program on all items and furnishings.
- All items purchased or donated will be added to the Fine Arts insurance policy. Said policy will be reviewed and updated a minimum of once a year. Major additions to furnishings will be added immediately.
- Future plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the Historic House.

V LANDSCAPING

- The landscape plan adopted by the Board shall be adhered to with no deviation unless recommended by an authority on landscape design and care.
- Donations of shrubbery, plants or trees shall be accepted only when item is part of the master plan.
- Work on the grounds will be under the sole direction of the Meadow Garden Board and the Landscaping Chairman. Supervision of actual work will be provided by the Meadow Garden Chairman or the Landscaping Chairman of Meadow Garden.

VI GIFT SHOP

- The Chairman of the committee will be responsible for all purchases, subject to the approval of the Board or the State Regent. The Vice Chairman shall assist the Gift Shop Chairman with sales at state functions.
- Gift Shop operations will be self-supporting. In the event funds are needed for purchases, they may be advanced from available Meadow Garden funds and must be considered a loan and shall be repaid without interest within one (1) year from date of borrowing.
- Profit from the Gift Shop shall be accounted for within the State Treasurer's books, with a percentage being transferred at the discretion of the Board at the end of the fiscal year and placed in the Maintenance Account. The audit of the Gift Shop operation shall be included in the annual audit of the Georgia State Society.

This information will be publicized in the Meadow Garden brochure and other appropriate places as determined by the Board.

- Chapter gifts, above the State Honor Roll requirements, automatically qualify the chapter to be recognized at an appropriate giving level determined by the categories listed in #2.
- 4. The State Treasurer will report these gifts to the Patrons Chairman.
- The Patrons Chairman will issue certificates to the qualifying individuals and chapters or groups.
- A permanent book will be kept on public display at Meadow Garden to record the names of those who give at the Patrons level or above.
- 7. The Patrons Chairman will enter the names of donors in the appropriate book a minimum of once a year.
- 8. The Meadow Garden Patrons book shall be divided into four parts: (1) Individuals who give a minimum of fifty dollars in one payment, and chapters, organizations, businesses or groups that give a minimum of one hundred dollars in one payment; (2) In-Kind Patrons approved by the Meadow Garden Board in recognition of outstanding and/or unusual gifts of time, talents or expertise toward the betterment of Meadow Garden; (3) Honoraria, which shall list individuals or groups honored by a Patron gift as designated in #1, such listing to show the name of honoree (Patron) and the donor; (4) Memorials of at least fifty dollars which shall list the name of the individual memorialized and the name of the donor

VIII PLAQUES & MARKERS

 Plaques/Markers may be placed at Meadow Garden only at the discretion of the Board, and request meets the following criteria: Substantial service and/or contributions that secured the property and the heritage for the GSDAR. Individuals so recognized shall have been deceased for at least 5

- years; Plaque/Marker will be paid for by person(s) requesting such recognition.
- Such plaques will be permanently displayed at Meadow Garden and a record
 of the honoree's service and/or contribution will be recorded and placed in
 the Meadow Garden file, with Board approval.
- 3. Plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the Historic House. Additional markers shall not be permanently placed on the grounds.

Bylaws GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II OBJECTS

The objects of this Society shall be:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties

of American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of the Georgia State Society.

Article IV OFFICERS

- **Section 1.** The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian and a State Curator.
- **Section 2.** (a) To be eligible for state office, a member shall hold and have held membership in a chapter or chapters within the Georgia State Society for at least 5 years prior to her election and have served a full term as chapter officer or state chairman.
- (b) No member shall be eligible to the same state office for two (2) successive terms. A member having served more than one half of a term in a state office shall be deemed to have served a full term.
- (c) No two state officers shall be members of the same chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.
- (d) To be eligible for the office of State Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State First Vice Regent or as State Second Vice Regent or served in each of these two offices of the Georgia Society.
- (e) To be eligible for the office of State First Vice Regent or for the office of State Second Vice Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State Recording Secretary or as State Treasurer of the Georgia State Society and shall have served a full term as a Chapter Regent of a chapter in the Georgia State Society.

Section 3. In recognition of valuable service to the Georgia State Society, a State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent for life by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Article V NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

- **Section 1.** (a) A candidate for state office shall request the endorsement of her chapter, taken by vote at a regular meeting of the chapter held between May and January preceding the State Conference at which state elections are held. The endorsement, signed by the Chapter Recording Secretary, shall include the office the candidate seeks and shall be received by the State Regent with the candidate's statement of intent to be a candidate prior to any announcement or campaigning by the candidate and/or her supporters.
- (b) A candidate for State Regent who wishes to present a slate of officers shall send to the State Regent in one packet the chapter endorsements and the statements of intent for each of her selected candidates. If received by the State Regent no later than December 1, these candidates shall be listed as a slate in the State Regent's Call to State Conference.
- (c) Candidates wishing to run independently of a slate, whose chapter endorsements and statements of intent are received by the State Regent no later than December 1 shall be listed as independent candidates in the State Regent's Call to State Conference.
- (d) A candidate whose chapter endorsement and statement of intent have been properly received by the State Regent may choose to announce her candidacy separate from the State Regent's Call to State Conference. Such a chapter endorsement and statement of intent shall be received by the State Regent at least ten (10) days prior to the opening of the State Conference at which the election is to take place.
- (e) A candidate who does not meet the requirements of these Bylaws shall be declared disqualified and ineligible for consideration for state office.
- (f) A chapter shall endorse no more than one chapter member for state office per election with the possible exception of candidates for State Regent and for State Corresponding Secretary.
- (g) In the event of the death, incapacitation or withdrawal of a candidate prior to the election, a replacement shall be made with notification in writing to the State Regent and accompanied by the chapter endorsement and statement of intent as directed by these Bylaws.
- **Section 2.** Nominations of candidates for all state offices shall be made at a designated meeting of the State Conference.
- **Section 3.** The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected biennially by ballot at the State Conference. A majority vote shall elect. Independent candidates shall be listed on the ballot in a separate column from those candidates presented as a slate.
- **Section 4.** The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two (2) years or until their successors are elected. Their terms of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State First Vice Regent are confirmed.
- **Section 5.** (a) Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become State Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become State First Vice Regent subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. Vacancies in other state offices shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next State Board of Management meeting or State Conference, whichever shall come first.
- (b) Any state officer who is absent from the state for a continuous period of six (6) months or longer shall automatically relinquish her position as a state officer.
- **Section 6.** Upon the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Organizing Secretary General.
- **Section 7.** (a) A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot.
 - (b) The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for

endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than eighteen (18) months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

(c) The endorsement shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent with the candidate's name and address to the Recording Secretary General to be received by the first day of the month preceding the designated Continental Congress.

Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall perform the duties prescribed in this article, and parliamentary authority adopted by the Society, and such others as the State Board of Management and the National Society may require.

Section 2. The State Regent shall:

- (a) be the chief executive officer and the official spokesman for the State Society;
- (b) have general supervision of the affairs of the State Society;
- (c) preside at all meetings of the State Conference, State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;
- (d) appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society:
 - (e) be ex-officio a member of all committees:
- (f) appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as advisor in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting:
- (g) sign all contracts and agreements made in the name of the Georgia State Society with the recorded approval of the Executive Committee and the State Board of Management or the State Conference as directed by these Bylaws;
- (h) be bonded and have the authority to draw upon funds of the State Society with the approval of the Finance Committee.
- (i) recommend to the Finance Committee a Certified Public Accountant who shall be approved by the Finance Committee.

Section 3. The State First Vice Regent shall:

- (a) perform the duties of the office of State Regent in the absence or inability of the State Regent;
 - (b) fill a vacancy in the office of State Regent;
 - (c) Perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent:
- (d) serve on those committees as designated by these Bylaws and as directed by the State Regent.

Section 4. The State Second Vice Regent shall:

- (a) perform the duties of the office of State First Vice Regent in the absence or inability of the State First Vice Regent;
 - (b) fill a vacancy in the office of State First Vice Regent;
 - (c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;
 - (d) serve on committees as directed by the State Regent.

Section 5. The State Chaplain shall:

- (a) open all meetings of the State Conference and the State Board of Management with scripture reading and prayer;
- (b) preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and conduct such other religious services as may be required;
 - (c) be custodian of state properties pertaining to the duties of this office;
 - (d) be responsible for IN MEMORIAM pages in the Proceedings.

Section 6. The State Recording Secretary shall:

- (a) record the proceedings of the meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;
- (b) compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and the Proceedings Committee.

(c) submit to the appropriate National officers, the endorsement for Vice President General and the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent by the first day of the month preceding the month of Continental Congress of the year in which said balloting was held;

Section 7. The State Corresponding Secretary shall:

- (a) conduct correspondence and send notices on behalf of the State Regent, the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as may be directed by them:
- (b) receive from the chapters the Master Questionnaires and distribute to the appropriate state chairmen.

Section 8. The State Organizing Secretary shall:

- (a) assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new chapters;
- (b) assist chapters in conjunction with appropriate state officers and chairmen in revitalization.

Section 9. The State Treasurer shall:

- (a) be bonded;
- (b) be the custodian of the funds of the State Society, placing them in institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance:
- (c) receive the state dues and State Conference registration fees from the chapters and receive all sums contributed by the chapters for state and national projects, disbursing monthly to the Treasurer General all funds designated for national projects;
 - (d) disburse other funds only when authorized by the State Regent in writing;
- (e) keep an account of all sums received or disbursed by using the basic double entry form of bookkeeping according to accepted accounting procedures and keep receipts for all transactions;
- (f) prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference, sending a copy to the State Chairman of the Finance Committee ten (10) days in advance of each meeting:
- (g) be a member of the Finance Committee and an ex-officio member of the Credentials Committee:
- (h) balance and prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year; said audit by a Certified Public Accountant, shall be performed and delivered within forty-five (45) days of receipt of books.
- (i) An internal review of the State Treasurer's records shall be performed when a change in this office occurs after the close of the fiscal year. Following the review, the records shall be turned over to the new State Treasurer. The committee to review the books shall be composed of the State First Vice Regent, the immediate Past State Treasurer, the immediate past Finance Chairman and a current Chapter Regent appointed by the State Regent.

Section 10. The State Registrar shall:

- (a) when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution prove eligibility and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars;
 - (b) keep a correct list of all members in the state;
 - (c) report on membership to the State Conference:
 - (d) assist with the verification of the credentials;
- (e) be in possession of the computer and software owned by the Georgia State Society and see that it is maintained.

Section 11. The State Historian shall:

- (a) be in charge, within the state, of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General as well as those authorized by the Georgia State Society;
- (b) keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves within the state;
 - (c) prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General;

(d) promote the study of American history, state and county history and historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the founding of our state and counties.

Section 12. The State Librarian shall:

(a) serve as liaison between the Librarian General and the Georgia Chapters and disseminate general information on the NSDAR Library;

(b) cooperate with the director of the Georgia Department of Archives and History,

making the needs of the Archives known to the chapters;

- (c) collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing them wherever accepted in such libraries and Archives as may be chosen by the State Board of Management;
- (d) solicit, with the approval of the Executive Committee, contributions from the chapters for purchase of such books as requested by the office of the Librarian General, and/or the various libraries in Georgia which the State Society approves;

(e) receive gifts of books and other printed material from the chapters to be donated to

the approved libraries and Archives;

(f) maintain a constant supply of bookplates to the NSDAR Library, the Georgia Department of Archives and History and for purchase by the chapters.

Section 13. The State Curator shall: be custodian of the State portable properties and shall have them properly stored and made ready for use at state meetings.

Section 14. All officers will keep a Procedure Book of Instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new officers to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. State Conference:

- a) The annual meeting of the Georgia State Society shall be known as the State Conference. It shall be for the purpose of:
 - (1) receiving reports of officers, committees and Chapter Regents;

(2) electing officers biennially;

(3) promoting programs in furtherance of the objects of the Society;

(4) any other business that may arise:

i. annual budget shall be adopted,

ii. all projects of the State Society requiring funding shall be voted upon at State Conference or ratified by members at State Conference if previously voted upon by the State Board of Management,

iii. no project extending beyond the term of the presiding officer may be accepted at any meeting other than by vote at State Conference.

(b) The State Conference will be held between February 1 and the time of the meeting of Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week;

(c) The State Regent shall fix the time and place of meetings:

(d) The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credentials form to the chapters not less than sixty (60) days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 2. The voting members of the State Conference shall be:

- (a) the officers and Honorary State Regents of the State Society;
- (b) the officers and honorary officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state;
- (c) the Chapter Regent, or in her absence, the Vice Regent or alternate of each chapter;
- (d) delegates or alternates of each chapter of the state as designated by the Bylaws of the National Society for representation at Continental Congress.

Section 3. Only a chapter member in good standing whose credentials have been completed in accordance with the instructions of the State Regent and the State Credentials Chairman for the State Conference and in accordance with the Standing Rules of the National Society shall be eligible to represent her chapter at state and national meetings.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a chapter not less than one year before

she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the chapter, except in the case of the Regent or Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at an annual State Conference, shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the state of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference the privilege of the floor and the right to speak shall be accorded to the State Chairmen and State Vice Chairmen. They may not vote unless they are duly registered as voters of the State Conference.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Society may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen (15) days' notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Forty-five (45) voting members, representing not less than twenty (20) chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The state officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents and the Regents, or in their absence, the Vice Regents of the chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the fall, following the October meeting of the National Board, It may meet whenever called by the State Regent. A minimum of twenty (20) days' notice shall be given as to the time and place of any such meeting.

Section 3. Thirty (30) members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference or as proscribed by these Bylaws.

Section 5. State chairmen, vice chairmen, committee members of the National and Standing Committees may attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privilege of the floor and the right to speak, but shall not vote. One (1) member from each chapter may attend the meetings, if invited by the chapter regent, and shall be granted the privilege of the floor, but shall not have the right to speak or vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not vote.

Article IX EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, shall attend the meetings, but may not vote.

Section 3. This Executive Committee shall:

- (a) perform such duties of the State Board of Management between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient;
- (b) meet at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three (3) members of the committee;
 - (c) vote by teleconference, e-mail or fax, if necessary;
- (d) receive and make recommendations for projects requiring expenditure of funds outside routine expenditures to be considered by the State Conference;
 - (e) make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.
- **Section 4.** Decisions of the Executive Committee shall be acted upon at the next meeting of the State Board of Management or at State Conference, whichever shall come first.

Article X FINANCES

- Section 1. (a) The fiscal year of the Georgia State Society shall be July 1 through the last day of June.
- b) The annual budget, prepared by the Finance Committee, shall cover the fiscal year and be prepared on the basis of dues payable for the calendar year beginning December first preceding.
 - (c) The Finance Committee shall propose the per capita amount and

distribute according to the annual membership count. The per capita amount and distribution shall be indicated on the budget presented annually. Funds to be included in the per capita designations shall be Tamassee DAR School, Kate Duncan Smith DAR School, Berry College, Lucy Cook Peel Fund, McCall Genealogical Fund and Meadow Garden Maintenance.

- **Section 2.** The annual dues of chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be \$10.00 for each member of the chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1.
- **Section 3.** (a) Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the state dues, a conference registration fee of \$10.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under these Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether chapter is represented or not.
- (b) State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay a conference fee of \$10.00 at the time of registration.
- (c) Other members of the Georgia State Society who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a conference fee of \$7.00 at the time of registration.
- (d) All host chapters may charge a registration fee to those not purchasing a meal ticket to off-set the cost of hosting state/district meetings.
- **Section 4.** (a) The State Treasurer and the State Regent and such others entrusted with funds of the Georgia State Society as may be designated by the State Board of Management shall be bonded. (See Article VI, Sections 2 and 9);
- (b) The State Treasurer with the approval of the State Regent and the State Chairman of the Finance Committee shall place the funds of the Georgia State Society in financial institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage;
- (c) The placement of restricted savings funds and investment funds of the Georgia State Society shall be placed to the credit of the Georgia State Society by the State Treasurer under the direction of the Finance Committee. Monies may be invested in U. S. Treasury obligations or other interest bearing obligations of federally insured financial institutions;
- (d) The accounts of the State Treasurer shall be annually prepared for audit by a Certified Public Accountant immediately following the end of the State Society fiscal year and no later than July 15 and delivered to the CPA by that date;
- (e) Should the State Treasurer be incapacitated, the State Regent, after consultation with the Chairman of the Finance Committee and with the approval of the Executive Committee, shall appoint an Acting State Treasurer to serve until such time as the State Treasurer is able to resume her duties or a new State Treasurer is appointed and ratified as stated in Article V, Section 5 (a).

Section 5. The expenses incurred by the State Regent in the performance of duty shall be paid each year from the State Dues Fund:

- (a) Five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) shall be taken each year to defray her necessary travel expenses;
- (b) Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent, as budgeted, shall be paid by the State Treasurer who shall keep all receipts of these expenses. No expenses exceeding the budgeted amount shall be paid by the State Treasurer.

Section 6. At the close of the books annually, \$5,000.00 shall be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies Fund" so that at the end of each administration a total of \$10,000.00 will be reserved. This money is to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration.

Article XI COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Honorary State Regents of the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution shall function as an advisory committee to the State Regent and to the Georgia State Society.

Section 2. The State Regent shall appoint the following standing committees:

- (a) Bylaws: An Honorary State Regent shall be appointed as chairman and the committee shall be composed of two (2) other Honorary State Regents and one (1) member from each district;
- (b) Finance: This committee shall be composed of seven (7) members to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two (2) Honorary State Regents, one (1) active chapter regent and one (1) active chapter member, who shall not be an Honorary State Regent, nor a state officer, nor a chapter regent. One of the two Honorary State Regents shall be appointed chairman. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund. This committee shall have charge of all investments of the Georgia State Society funds.

(c) Resolutions: This committee shall be composed of all Honorary State Regents, the State Parliamentarian and three (3) chapter members;

(d) Proceedings: This committee shall be composed of the State Recording Secretary, the immediate past State Recording Secretary, State First Vice Regent and four (4) additional Daughters, at least one of whom shall be an Honorary State Regent.

Section 3. The State Regent shall appoint such other committees, standing or special, as the State Conference shall authorize and actions of the State Board of Management and of the National Society shall require. The appointments shall be concurrent with the term of the State Regent making the appointments and shall terminate with the end of the administration.

Section 4. Additional appointments may be made to any of the committees and vacancies shall be filled by the State Regent with timely notification to the membership.

Section 5. The duties of committees shall be such as these Bylaws, the State Conference, the State Board of Management or the National Society shall prescribe.

Section 6. All chairmen will keep a Procedure Book of instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

Article XII CHAPTERS

Section 1. To expedite the work of the Society, the chapters of the Georgia State Society shall be placed in geographical districts:

(a) A chairman appointed by the State Regent shall coordinate the work of all chapters as needed: she shall be titled "Coordinator of Districts":

(b) Each district shall have a Director appointed by the State Regent to work as a committee under the direction and supervision of the Coordinator of Districts and the State Regent.

Section 2. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April 1 in the year of chapter elections. The Chapter Regent shall report annually the names of the elected officers promptly on the form provided by the State Regent for this purpose, with copies to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, and the State Recording Secretary.

Section 3. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent, the State Recording Secretary, and the District Director at the time designated by the State Regent.

Article XIII MEADOW GARDEN

Meadow Garden, property owned by the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, shall be operated as follows:

(a) The governing body shall be the Board of Trustees composed of the following members: the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Chairman who shall be appointed by the State Regent;

- (b) The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the following members: the State Regent who shall serve as Chairman; the State First Vice Regent who shall serve as Secretary: the Chairman of Meadow Garden; the Regents of the Augusta and College Hill Chapters; the State Treasurer; two (2) Honorary State Regents; and the chairmen of the six (6) subcommittees appointed by the State Regent - Docents, Furnishings, Landscaping. Gift Shop, Patrons and Public Relations.
- (c) The Meadow Garden Board shall operate with Standing Rules approved by the State Conference

Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. The current edition of Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised, shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law in matters not covered by these Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

Article XV **AMENDMENTS**

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent, the State Parliamentarian, and the State Bylaws Chairman. The State Regent shall send a copy to each chapter, at least sixty (60) days prior to State Conference. with her message carrying the Call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

Article XVI DISSOLUTION

Although the period of duration of the Georgia State Society is perpetual, if for any reason the State Society is to be dissolved or otherwise terminated, no part of the property of the Society or any of the proceeds shall be distributed to or inure to the benefit of any of the officers or members of the Society. Upon the dissolution of the Georgia State Society. assets shall be distributed by the Board of Management and/or the Executive Committee to and only to the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the local United States District Court, exclusively to such organization or organizations as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated within the meaning of section 501 (c)(3), with purposes and objectives consistent with those of the Georgia State Society.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year, a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24, 1899. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21) No Conference was held in 1911, the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912," and amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, page 211).

BYLAWS

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National or State Bylaws, and a current copy is to be filed with the State Parliamentarian.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS

Notice of change of address of members shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, State Regent, State Corresponding Secretary, and the State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHANGE OF NAME

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, and the State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHAPTER ELECTIONS

As chapter elections are to be held before April 1, names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, 1776 D Street, NW, Washington, DC 2006-5303, the State Regent or the State Regent-Elect, the State Recording Secretary and the State Corresponding Secretary by April 1. The full Christian name of chapter officers shall be given, along with her husband's given name or initials, address, zip code, telephone number, fax and e-mail. In accordance with the National Bylaws, a Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years.

CHAPTER REPRESENTATION AT STATE AND NATIONAL MEETINGS

At the State Board of Management a chapter is represented by the Chapter Regent, or in her absence by the First Vice Regent, and one non-voting member, if invited by the Chapter Regent.

The voting representation of each chapter at State Conference and Continental Congress shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current

year have been received in the Office of the Treasurer General by December 1. Membership 12-19: Regent only; 20-49: Regent + 1 delegate = 2 votes; 50-99: Regent + 2 delegates = 3 votes; 100-149: Regent + 3 delegates = 4 votes; 150-199: Regent + 4 delegates = 5 votes; 200-249: Regent + 5 delegates = 6 votes; 250-299: Regent + 6 delegates = 7 votes. Chapters with membership of 300 and over will have an additional delegate for each additional 50 members exceeding 299.

CONFERENCE REGISTRATION

On or before December 1, each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer the state dues and a Conference Registration fee of \$10.00 per each delegate to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws. This fee is to be paid whether represented or not and is derived by recommendation of the Finance Committee to the Executive Committee. This is a requirement stated in the Georgia State Bylaws , Article X, Section 3 (a).

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the Conference Registration Fee of \$10.00 at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters, shall pay a Conference Registration Fee of \$7.00 at the time of registration.

CONTRIBUTIONS

All contributions by chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

The deadline for chapter contributions to the Georgia co-op ads sent to the State Chairman, DAR Magazine is February 28. The checks are to be made payable to the State Chairman, DAR Magazine and sent to her.

DATE FOR ANNUAL AUDIT

The Georgia State Society Fiscal Year is July 1 to June 30. Bylaw Article X, Section 1 (a). The State Treasurer should prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year. Bylaw Article VI, Section 9 (h).

DEADLINES

State Officers and Chairmen welcome chapter reports when completed. Deadline dates are given to ensure conformity for inclusion in reports to National Officers. Per National Society Bylaws, the deadline date is determined by the Federal Postal Service or other carrier, showing cancellation date and not by the date reports are received.

DECEASED MEMBERS

Deaths shall be reported promptly to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Chaplain and the State Registrar by the corresponding Chapter officer. A complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and date of death shall be furnished to the State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for the Conference Memorial Service and for State Proceedings.

DUES

Before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer sends to the State Treasurer state dues of \$10.00 per member. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the December through February Board meeting of the National Society. Before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer sends to the office of the Organizing Secretary General National dues of \$30.00 per member except Life Members, with check made payable to the Treasurer General NSDAR.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS

To insure uniformity and convenience in binding, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 11 inches, with 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches from top of page, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 inches on left side, 1 inch on right side and at bottom. Two copies shall be sent to the State Chairman of Genealogical Records. The booklet, "Instructions for Copying Source Records and Their Preparation for Library Use," should be obtained from the Corresponding Secretary General.

GEORGIA HOSPITALITY FUND

"WHEREAS, the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds a social event in Washington during Continental Congress which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society:

THEREFORE, **BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, not to exceed \$600.00 per year, to be used for the above purposes; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this fund shall not be cumulative." *Proceedings* 1955, amended 2001 and 2009.

State Officers and State Chairmen shall send to the State Regent and the State Treasurer a copy of any letters mailed to chapters.

NOMINATIONS

RESOLVED, that it is the judgment of the Executive Board that announcements for State Regent should not be made...earlier than three months prior to the meeting of the Conference and they shall be furnished to the press for publication.

Margins should be ½ inches from the top of page, 1 ½ inches from left side, 1 inch from right side, and 1 inch from bottom of page. Chapter Regents should exclude NSDAR Chapter Achievement Award and State Honor Roll, as these will be added when confirmed. Your name should be consistent with the lists of Chapter Regents and State Chairmen as found in this Proceeding. Winners of awards and awards to be offered shall each be listed on separate sheets identified with the title of the committee and the award. Reports and awards to be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary by the following deadlines; Chapter Regents by February 1; State Officers and State Chairmen by March 1.

The remaining copies are to be sent to the State Recording Secretary to be sold for \$20.00 per book plus \$3.00 postage, check made payable to State Treasurer.

For security and retrieval purposes, a current electronic backup of the proceedings under construction shall be kept by the State Recording Secretary, State Proceedings Chairman, and one member of the Proceedings Committee. A backup shall be sent by the State Recording Secretary at a minimum of once per month.

RESERVE FOR CONTINGENCIES FUND

NEW ADMINISTRATION RESERVE: At the close of the books annually, \$5,000.00 shall be kept in the General Fund, so that at the end of each administration a total of \$10,000.00 will be reserved. This money is to be used to pay for the *Proceedings* of the previous administration and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration. Proceedings 2003-2004, Bylaws: Article X – Finance, Section 6.

RESOLVED: that such available funds over and above said \$10,000.00 be designated as one half to Meadow Garden Maintenance Money Market account, to be transferred to one of the certificates of deposit at such time as a certificate is renewed; and the remaining one half to be deposited to the Georgia State Society General Fund money market fund account *Proceedings* 2001-2002, Resolution page 86.

This transaction is to be handled by May 30 every two years, before the auditors close out the books of the administration.

HOTEL CONTINGENCY RESERVE: It was moved that the Hotel Contingency Fund for State Conference be increased from \$1,000 to \$2,000. These funds are to secure a hotel for State Conference and are to be replaced from State Conference income reimbursing the fund yearly for the amount used.

Georgia State Society NATIONAL SOCIETY CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

The Georgia State Society Children of the American Revolution had an amazing year "Ensuring American Patriotism" by being "Patriots Protecting Patriots" under the leadership of State President, Carter Elizabeth Moore. Miss Moore was installed as Georgia State President at the N.S. C.A.R. 2008 Convention hotel in Alexandria, Virginia. Also installed was Kevin Spence Baker, the first National President elected from Georgia. The State President's theme was, "Patriots Protecting Patriots" and the project successfully raised over \$3,000 to be split equally among the N.S.C.A.R. Museum; the Georgia Room, a replica of Peter Tondee's Tavern, in the NSDAR Headquarters building; and the NSSAR Museum. Funds for the project were raised through the sales of pins, neon yellow-green t-shirts, miniconstruction cones, and donations.
