Brown, Recording Secretary; Martha Middlebrooks Knight, Corresponding Secretary; Phyllis Johnson Tanner, Organizing Secretary; Ida Best Fischer, Treasurer; Robin Redfearn Towns, Registrar; Susan Durden Lemesis, Historian; Marilyn Moulton Wright, Librarian; Charlotte Josephine Christian, Curator; Rena Morgan Setters, Parliamentarian.

The State Regent called the meeting to order and offered the invocation. Mrs. Chastain then welcomed the members of the Executive Committee. The minutes

of the March 26, 2009 meeting were approved as printed.

The State Regent has attended the State Conferences of the South Carolina, North Carolina, Iowa, and Oregon Societies, and will attend the Oklahoma State

Conference following District Workshops. She relayed favorable comments from our state guests regarding the Georgia State Conference. Mrs. Chastain announced the cookbook will be ready for State Board of Management on Oct. 23 -24, and preorders will be taken at the workshops. The initial order is for 1,000 copies. She pointed out two Georgia Daughters' award-winning letters to editors in the National Defender. The State Regent circulated copies of the 2009 Daughters newsletter magazine ads for Georgia. Mrs. Chastain asked that each officer and chairman tabulate the results of their respective Master Questionnaire chapter reports, and submit a numeric report on colored paper to the Regent. VIS Chairman Amy Lawson will be posting the Georgia Master Questionnaire online soon. The dates have been changed for Tamassee Founders Day (now Oct. 12-13), and Kate Duncan Smith's Dedication Day (now Oct. 15-16). The Regent will be unable to attend due to previous arrangements to visit District 2 that week.

Mrs. Chastain shared the following information from National: The parent company of J.E. Caldwell has filed for bankruptcy protection. At the current time, business continues as usual. The National Society is monitoring the situation and will

provide additional information as needed.

The State Regent's project at KDS is completed, except for the ongoing commitment to the Clinic. Other projects at KDS are currently under consideration. State Board of Management will be Oct. 23-24 in Macon, with Nathaniel Macon Chapter hosting. Mrs. Chastain circulated a list of national award winners from Georgia.

The First Vice Regent's husband was hospitalized and Mrs. Baldwin was not

present.

The Second Vice Regent reported Dean Bare from Tamassee will be the only representative from the DAR schools attending all District Workshops. Heather Green from Kate Duncan Smith will attend the District 1 and District 2 workshops. Hindman's Mike Mullins has a serious illness in his family, and Berry's Whit Whitaker is ill. Neither will be able to attend as planned. Donations for the "Special Times" boutique at Tamassee are being accepted at all District Workshops. School supplies will be collected for Hindman Settlement School. The Georgia Society has "adopted" the KDS Clinic. Health care supplies will be collected continuously. Mrs. Lingelbach had the Meadow Garden note cards reprinted and they will be available at the last two workshops. The Second Vice-Regent attended Meadow Garden Board meetings, the Kate Duncan Smith DAR School Awards Ceremony, and Continental Congress.

Because the State Regent's project at KDS is fully funded, additional projects should be identified. Mrs. Lingelbach suggested a \$5000 handwriting curriculum for grades K-3 as a project for KDS. Mrs. Chastain approved of this

project, if it is agreeable with the First Vice Regent.

The Chaplain reported 129 members age 90 and above have been identified and birthday greetings have been sent. Since State Conference, 44 deaths have been reported, and sympathy cards sent to family members when addresses were known. New forms were prepared for the Chapter Information Packet. The Chaplain attended grave markings, anniversary celebrations, and Continental Congress.

The Recording Secretary reported having had the honor to submit to the National Society Georgia's Certificate of Endorsement of the candidacy of State Regent Barbara Chastain for the office of Vice President General at the 2010 Continental Congress. Ms. Brown attended Etowah Chapter's 100th Anniversary in April, the Proceedings Committee meeting in Marietta on May 9, and Continental Congress. On the recommendation of the Proceedings Committee, the Recording Secretary moved that all copies of the State Proceedings prior to the administration of the immediate past State Regent, which are in the possession

of the State Recording Secretary, be sold for \$1.00 each by the DAR Literature Committee. Adopted. Ms. Brown reported the 2008-2009 State Proceedings has been submitted to the printer in Word and PDF formats. The first draft should be returned by the end of August, and the new Proceedings available at State Board of Management.

The Corresponding Secretary reported she received Chapter Officers Report Forms from 106 chapters. Chapter Regents' data was updated for the State Regent's June letter, which was sent by bulk mail. Letters of instruction for the Chapter Information Packet, and funds for printing were received by Mrs. Knight. One thousand Certificates of Award were ordered, and will be sold along with Certificates of Appreciation. The 2009-2010 Directory, compiled by Jean Manker, will be sold by the Corresponding Secretary at District 3 and District 4 workshops. Mrs. Knight attended Continental Congress and laid a wreath at George Washington's tomb at Mount Vernon.

The Organizing Secretary reported Fort Early Chapter in Cordele has been notified by the Organizing Secretary General the chapter has one year from June 3, 2009 to bring membership up to the required minimum of 12, or face automatic disbandment. Mrs. Tanner has received no communication from the chapter. Temporary exemption for holding chapter office with less than one year of membership has been granted to June Scarbrough, William Day Chapter Vice Regent, and Elizabeth Weaver, Matthew Talbot Chapter Regent.

The Treasurer gave the following summary of accounts for the Georgia State Society as of June 30, 2009: checking account balance \$64,348.68; money market balance \$48,569.13; certificates of deposit \$92,273.60, and deposits at hotels \$1,250.00; making total assets of \$206,441.41. The Meadow Garden accounts as of June 30, 2009, were summarized as follows: certificates of deposit: \$350,000.00; checking account balance \$93,357.48; petty cash \$100.00; money market balance \$30,118,22; fixed assets \$171,258.69; making total assets of \$644,834.39. The Treasurer stated the books were currently at the auditors. The financial report was filed. Mrs. Fischer reported new Treasurer's forms are on the Georgia members' web site. She explained new policies regarding Special donations to the NSDAR and the Bylaws change affecting dues allocation.

The State Regent asked the members of the executive board to suggest projects needing funding at the next board meeting. The possibility of one flat fee for all registrations at State Conference was discussed. Mrs. Chastain reported the Meadow Garden Board has made a recommendation for a bylaws change allowing Meadow Garden to have a separate financial manager. This will be brought for a vote at State Conference.

The Registrar reported Georgia's membership count as of January 1, 2009 was 7,085. The current membership count is 7,264, including 471 Junior members. This is a net gain of 179 members for the year, with 291 new members by application, including 57 new Juniors, 30 reinstatements, 66 deceased, 30 resignations, 32 drops, 21 transfers out of Georgia and 30 transfers into Georgia. The Georgia DAR database has been updated to reflect these membership changes. The Registrar brought greetings from the Georgia Daughters to the 119th SAR National Congress in Atlanta, and presented programs to the National SAR Ladies Auxiliary meeting, as well as four DAR chapters.

The Historian reported she continues to catalog available data on markings of Georgia historic sites, graves of Revolutionary soldiers, their wives, and daughters. A new policy limits each chapter to marking only five sites per year. Mrs. Lemesis is working with the Department of Natural Resources for permission to mark Fort Morris. The Historian attended KDS and Continental Congress.

The State Regent reported the Revolutionary marker at Peachtree Battle, placed by Atlanta Chapter many years ago, had been stolen. She suggested to

former Atlanta mayor Sam Massell that the site could be marked again.

The Librarian reported two copies of the DAR publication Forgotten Patriots - African American and American Indian Patriots of the Revolutionary War: A Guide to Service, Sources, and Studies were donated in honor of the State Regent. One went to Washington Memorial Library Genealogy Department in Macon and the other to Ladson Genealogical Library collection at the Vidalia-Toombs County Library. A total of 31 books from seven chapters have been donated to the NSDAR Library in 2009. Seventeen were donated by the Georgia State Society in honor of State Regent Barbara Blakely Chastain. Mrs. Wright attended Continental Congress.

The Curator reported the property of the State Society has been maintained in good condition and all items are organized and accounted for. An outline of duties and a check list of State Society property is being prepared for use by future State Curators. Ms. Christian attended Continental Congress and the Southeastern

Regional Conference, Children of the American Revolution.

The Parliamentarian expressed gratitude for the cards and concern during her illness.

The State Regent announced Phyllis Tanner is Georgia Campaign Chairman for the Wright Associates and Joyce Patton will be the Chairman of Mrs. Chastain's campaign for Vice President General. Mrs. Patton welcomed ideas, workers, and donations. Members should be encouraged to attend the 2010 Continental Congress and vote for our Georgia Daughters.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 5:30 p.m.

The Executive Committee of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, met October 23, 2009, in the La Quinta Inn Hotel in Macon, at 7:15 p.m. with Barbara

Blakely Chastain, State Regent, presiding.

Brown, Recording Secretary; Martha Middlebrooks Knight, Corresponding Secretary; Phyllis Johnson Tanner, Organizing Secretary; Ida Best Fischer, Treasurer; Robin Redfearn Towns, Registrar; Susan Durden Lemesis, Historian; Marilyn Moulton Wright, Librarian; Charlotte Josephine Christian, Curator; Rena Morgan Setters, Parliamentarian.

The State Regent called the meeting to order and offered the invocation. Mrs. Chastain then welcomed the members of the Executive Committee. The minutes

of the August 18, 2009 meeting were approved as printed.

The State Regent was a guest at the Oklahoma State Conference, and will be attending the Texas and Missouri State Conferences in the spring. The President General will be our honored guest for Opening Night at the Georgia State Conference. In addition, the state regents of Iowa, Mexico, Missouri, Oklahoma, Oregon, and Texas will be guests at State Conference. The cookbook has been well received. The Finance Committee passed the 2008-2009 Budget. Candidates for Vice President General now have space for their experience and credentials on the National members' website. Mrs. Chastain shared plans for a possible open house at the Georgia State Room, "Peter Tondee's Tavern", in the DAR Museum during Congress this year. National wants us to go totally electronic as soon as possible. Mrs. Chastain reported viewing the Wedgwood show at the DAR Museum, and

meeting Lord Wedgwood. She thanked Mrs. Lingelbach for attending Kate Duncan Smith in her place. The State Regent presented the 2008-2009 State Proceedings and expressed appreciation to Ms. Brown.

First Vice Regent Sally Baldwin reported plans are underway for the Georgia luncheon at Congress, which will have a fiesta theme. The cost is expected to be \$55,00. Officers will be asked to bring food for the evening receptions at State Conference again this year.

Second Vice Regent Virginia Lingelbach represented the State Regent at Kate Duncan Smith's Dedication Day, and visited Hillside School in Massachusetts on the Historic Pathways to Liberty tour. The thrift trailer will be available tomorrow for deliveries to Tamassee and Crossnore. Mrs. Lingelbach delivered hundreds of school supplies for Hindman Settlement School and additional clinic supplies to KDS.

Mrs. Chastain applauded the generosity of the Georgia Daughters towards the schools. Every goal set is reached and exceeded, and the schools are very

appreciative of the support from the Georgia Society.

Chaplain Joyce Patton reported birthday greetings have been sent to 133 members over 90 reported by their Chapters, There have been 66 deaths reported, since State Conference. Sympathy cards have been sent to family members when Chapters have reported that information. Work is underway for the Memorial Service. Mrs. Patton suggested ordering fewer programs this year; 225 rather than 350.

Recording Secretary Melodye Brown reported the 2008-2009 Proceedings were picked up from the printers yesterday. The books will be distributed at the State Board of Management tomorrow. Work continues on compiling next year's

Proceedings.

Corresponding Secretary Martha Knight sent updates to the Recording Secretary for the Proceedings and printed labels for Proceedings distribution. In September the Regent's Letter # 2 was emailed. Sending the letters electronically saved the State Society over \$600. The Georgia State Society Master Questionnaire was compiled and 121 copies printed. Only changes and additions to the National Master Questionnaire are included in the Georgia Master Questionnaire this year. The forms will be distributed at the State Board of Management meeting.

Organizing Secretary Phyllis Tanner has been in contact with General Josiah Tattnall Chapter regarding their Regent's death as well as declining membership and participation. The chapter will complete the dues process. Options for the future will

be considered after the first of the year.

Treasurer Bea Fischer gave the following summary of accounts for the Georgia State Society as of September 30, 2009: checking account balance \$42,728.26; money market balance \$48,728.68; certificates of deposit \$92,273,60, and deposits at hotels \$1,250.00; making total assets of \$185,220.54. The Meadow Garden accounts as of September 30, 2009, were summarized as follows: certificates of deposit: \$350,000.00; checking account balance \$72,639.47; petty cash \$100.00; money market balance \$26,353.28; fixed assets \$171,258.69; making total assets of \$620,351.44. Mrs. Fischer reported the audit was completed by Santi & Associates, and is printed in the Proceedings. The tax return is being prepared by Robin R. McIntire, CPA, and will be filed by November 15. The KDS Scholarship Fund was increased by \$4,100. The State Society funded the Zaner Bloser Handwriting Curriculum (\$5,000). Mrs. Fischer attended KDS Dedication Day.

Registrar Robin Towns reported Georgia's membership count as of January 1, 2009 was 7,085. The current membership count is 7,260, including 467 Junior members. This is a net gain of 175 members for the year, with 393 new members by application, including 72 new Juniors. The Georgia DAR database has been updated

to reflect these membership changes.

Historian Susan Lemesis reported fielding questions from members and those interested in their heritage, referring some to chapters in their areas. She attended the District 1 and 2 workshops. She continues to update DAR records and file historical papers that have been donated to our society, Research continues to support the historical marker at Fort Morris. In spite of challenges, Mrs. Lemesis expects to have the marker placed during this administration.

Librarian Lynn Wright attended all district Workshops. As of October 20, 2009 the Georgia State Society has 44 book credits from seven chapters. Sixteen were donated by the Georgia State Society in honor of the State Regent. The list of donated books is on pages 128 & 129 of the 2008 – 2009 Proceedings. On page 128, List of Civil War Veterans Tablet Fairview Park, Decatur, Macon County, Illinois, should be deleted. The NSDAR Library credited the book to Georgia in error.

The State Regent thanked Mrs. Wright for all the photographs in the new Meadow Garden history book.

Curator Charlotte Christian reported the property of the State Society has been maintained in good condition and all items are organized and accounted for. She attended all District Meetings, transporting and utilizing the State's property at each.

State Parliamentarian Rena Setters distributed copies of revised Standing Rules for State Conference. There was discussion of the collection of Conference Fees for non-member guests as an attempt to gauge attendance numbers year over year. Mrs. Lingelbach asked that official guests of the State Society, such as award winners and hereditary society leaders, be expressly excluded. Mrs. Setters will lead a tutorial on chapter bylaws at State Board of Management tomorrow.

The State Regent requested and received the board's approval for back publications of *The History of the Georgia State Society* and the *Membership Roll and Register of Ancestors* to be distributed for free at tomorrow's State Board of Management meeting, and for all remaining copies to subsequently be destroyed. There was a discussion of appropriate retention and storage of old publications and the need for established guidelines in this area, with no resolution.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:50 p.m.

Parliamentarian Rena Morgan Setters was not present due to her responsibilities as State Conference Chairman.

The State Regent called the meeting to order and offered the Invocation. Mrs. Chastain then welcomed the members of the Executive Committee. The minutes of the October 23, 2009 Executive Committee Meeting were previously provided to the State Officers and State Parliamentarian. There being no corrections, the minutes were approved as printed.

The State Regent reported on attending National Board of Management in February. *The National Defender* will no longer be mailed, but will be available online. The State Regent explained some changes in the Conference Program. Mrs. Chastain enjoyed attending the C.A.R. Government Studies and 71st State Conference. The State Regent has visited 20 chapters and attended Tamassee Board. Mrs. Chastain enjoyed being a guest at the Mexico State Conference and the Texas State Conference, where she unfortunately fell and broke her shoulder. If her recovery permits, she plans to attend the Illinois and Missouri State Conferences. Prior to Continental Congress, the State Regent plans to make five chapter visits, attend graduation at KDS and Tamassee. The State Regent expressed her desire that the Georgia State Society increase financial awards for State winners, and recommended moving \$1.00 of Per Capita from Meadow Garden to allow more funds to be available. She reminded everyone to submit all reports and awards for the *Proceedings* in a timely manner. Mrs. Chastain gave updates on the health situations of several Honorary State Regents.

The First Vice Regent reported she had tickets available for the 2010 Georgia Luncheon on July 9, at a cost of \$50.00. Mrs. Baldwin will give her full report

in session.

The Second Vice Regent reported the Georgia State Society donated \$92,000 to DAR Schools this year, more than 8 tons of thrift, and almost 30,000 soup labels. Six chapters contributed over 1000 soup labels each. A new State Regent's Project for KDS, a zero turn radius lawn mower costing approximately \$9,000, will carry over into the next administration. Mrs. Lingelbach enjoyed the opportunity to finally visit Hindman Settlement School this year.

The Chaplain reported 136 Georgia Daughters will be remembered at the Memorial Service today. Mrs. Patton has received many expressions of appreciation for the birthday cards and notes of condolence sent. She encouraged everyone to remember Honorary State Regent Evelyn Waite's 100th birthday on September 1.

The Recording Secretary stressed the need to submit reports and awards in order to complete the final *Proceedings* for this administration as soon as possible. The Proceedings Committee will meet tomorrow, and again on June 8, at which time committee members for the next administration will be included.

The Corresponding Secretary emailed the January letter to all chapters, with hard copies to the Honorary State Regents. Mrs. Knight reported a total of 107 completed Master Questionnaires were received, sorted and mailed to the appropriate Chairmen and Officers. Mrs. Knight sent out 300 certificates of award/appreciation in the last ten days. The Conference Program was typed, proofed and sent to the printers, and delivered to this State Conference. Chapter Officer Report Forms are just beginning to come in.

The Organizing Secretary reported the Adam Brinson Chapter and Governor David Emanuel Chapter wish to merge right away, but the name has not been decided. Fort Early Chapter may be automatically disbanded due to their membership level, having failed to file the appropriate papers. General Josiah Tattnall Chapter has

decided to disband, with their members moving to other chapters.

The Treasurer gave the following summary of accounts for the Georgia State Society as of February 28, 2010: checking account balance \$86,079.78; money market balance \$26,300.52; certificates of deposit \$118,424.63; and deposits at hotels of \$1,250.00; making total assets of \$232,054.93. The financial report was filed. The Meadow Garden accounts as of February 28, 2010, were summarized as follows: certificates of deposit: \$350,000.00; checking account balance \$117,644.52; money market balance \$30,313.79; petty cash \$100.00, fixed assets \$175,061.96; making total assets of \$673,120.27. Mrs. Fischer stressed the 990N form is required

by the IRS, and each chapter must file within four and a half months following the end of their fiscal year. Additionally, Chapter Treasurer's Annual Financial Reports are due by May 31. The Treasurer reviewed some problems with these reports and Chapter Achievement credits. She expressed gratitude for the assistance of Dianne Cannestra, Joyce Patton, Paula Osborne, Betty Harrah, and the Treasurer General Peggy Hurd. All bills to be paid by the State Society must be submitted by June 1. The Treasurer will recommend to the Finance Committee that the hotel contingency reserve be increased from \$2,000 to \$5,000.

The Registrar reported the official membership count for Georgia as of January 1, 2010 was 7178. For 2009, Georgia had 497 new members by application, 53 reinstatements, 113 deceased, 347 drops and resignations, 45 transfers out, 50 transfers in, and a total of 465 Juniors. In 2010, 69 new members have been approved, with a current membership count of 7213. Mrs. Towns stated the Georgia Daughters are doing an outstanding job of gaining new members.

The Historian reported she had received reports from 81 chapters. Mrs. Lemesis announced her award winners, which can be found in her full report. She discussed the misunderstandings regarding what constitutes marking a grave, and who qualifies as a Real Daughter. The Historian suggested the History medal be

emphasized in the next administration.

The Librarian reported Georgia Chapters sent \$527.00 to the State Library Fund, \$482.00 to Friends of the Library, and \$405.00 to Friends of Seimes Microfilm. As of February 28, 2010, the Georgia State Society has 48 book credits from 11 chapters. Mrs. Wright discussed the inability to verify reported donations. The State Regent expressed appreciation to Mrs. Wright for all the work she has done over and above her duties as Librarian.

The Curator reported all property of the State Society is present and in good working order. The lighted Insignia has been repaired after being damaged last year. Ms. Christian has created a checklist and file of helpful information for the next Curator.

On behalf of the Executive Board, Mrs. Baldwin presented gifts to the State Regent, in gratitude for her wonderful leadership, the achievements of her administration, and the fun shared over the past two years. Mrs. Chastain expressed her love and appreciation to the state officers, and presented each with a gift of her handwork.

There being no further business, the State Regent gave the Benediction. The meeting was adjourned at 11:00 a.m.

Southeastern Regional Meeting, Daniel Dorney, State President. The State Regent participated in three grave markings, one Memorial Service, and traveled to Macon with Alae Risse Leitch and Melodye Brown for the funeral of Amelia Anne Alderman,

daughter of Anne Murphey, Honorary State Regent. Mrs. Chastain drove with Rena Setters, State Conference Chairman, to the Wyndham Peachtree Conference Center in Peachtree City, to finalize plans for the 2010 Georgia State Conference. During this time the State Regent's letters numbers 4 and 5 were created, and agendas written for the four Workshops, all Board meetings and this State Board of Management.

There has been time for fun and fellowship as the State Regent traveled Georgia and this beautiful country, visiting the state conferences of South Carolina, North Carolina, Iowa, Oregon, and the Oklahoma Workshop. Mrs. Chastain has also been invited to attend the Texas and Missouri conferences in the spring. The State Regent expressed her wish she could accept all invitations but there is not enough time. Mrs. Chastain thanked chapters for their invitations and expressed her love for

every member of our wonderful society.

The State Regent resumed the chair and called for the reports of the officers. Mrs. Baldwin also attended the Resolutions Committee meeting. Preparations are underway for the 2010 Georgia Luncheon at the JW Marriott hotel. Mrs. Baldwin expressed appreciation to those contacting her regarding chairmanships for the next

administration and encouraged anyone interested in serving to contact her.

The State Second Vice Regent, and DAR Schools Chairman, Virginia Lingelbach reported assisting with decorations for the Georgia Luncheon at Continental Congress and hosting the Georgia box for several business sessions. All Meadow Garden Board meetings were attended and the Meadow Garden note cards were reprinted for the gift shop. Mrs. Lingelbach was honored to represent the State Regent at Kate Duncan Smith DAR School Dedication Day. Evening gowns continue to be collected for the "Special Times" boutique at the Tamassee Thrift Store. Hundreds of schools supplies were collected for Hindman Settlement School. The Clinic at Kate Duncan Smith DAR School has been formally adopted by the Georgia Society for the remainder of this administration. Thrift is being collected today for delivery to Crossnore and Tamassee this weekend. The Second Vice Regent thanked the Georgia Daughters for their generous donations to the schools.

The **State Chaplain**, Joyce Patton stated 44 deaths have been reported by Georgia chapters since State Conference. Notes of condolence have been sent when addresses were provided. The memory of each deceased Daughter will be honored at the 2010 Memorial Service. Mrs. Patton urged chapters to report deaths immediately using the Chaplain General's forms. Currently 129 Georgia Daughters

are over 90 years of age.

The **State Recording Secretary**, Melodye Brown reported the 2008-2009 *Proceedings* were being distributed at this State Board of Management meeting. Ms. Brown expressed gratitude to the State Regent and members of the Proceedings Committee for their assistance. Chapter regents and committee chairmen were reminded of reporting requirements and deadlines for the next *Proceedings*.

The State Regent expressed appreciation to the Recording Secretary and to Linda Harvey, Proceedings Committee Chairman, for the 2008-2009 *Proceedings*. Members of the Proceedings Committee were recognized as a group. Mrs. Chastain

continued with the State Officers' reports.

The **State Corresponding Secretary**, Martha Knight reported the Georgia State Society Master Questionnaire was ready for distribution at this State Board of Management. This year the envelopes only contained Georgia additions to the Master Questionnaire; committees and officers which were not included in the Master Questionnaire. This significantly reduced printing costs. Chapter regents were asked

to download the NSDAR Master Questionnaire from the DAR Members' Web Site. However, both forms must be submitted in hard copy.

The State Organizing Secretary, and Chapter Development and Revitalization Chairman, Phyllis Tanner reported she has contacted chapters requesting assistance. Mrs. Tanner is working with them on solutions. Chapters were reminded to complete and submit the 2009 membership attendance form found in the Chapter Information Packet for determination of the winner of the traveling award for increased attendance.

The **State Treasurer**, Bea Fischer gave the following summary of accounts for the Georgia State Society as of September 30, 2009; checking account balance \$42,728.26; money market balance \$48,728.68; certificates of deposit \$92,273.60, and deposits at hotels \$1,250.00; making total assets of \$185,220.54. The Meadow Garden accounts as of September 30, 2009, were summarized as follows: certificates of deposit: \$350,000.00; checking account balance \$72,639.47; petty cash \$100.00; money market balance \$26,353.28; fixed assets \$171,258.69; making total assets of \$620,351.44. Mrs. Fischer reported the audit was completed by Santi & Associates, and is printed in the *Proceedings*. The tax return is being prepared by Robin R. McIntire, CPA, and will be filed by November 15. The KDS Georgia Scholarship Fund was increased by \$4,100. The State Society also funded the Zaner Bloser Handwriting Curriculum (\$5,000) at KDS.

The **State Registrar**, Robin Towns reported Georgia's membership count as of January 1, 2009 was 7,085. The current membership count is 7,260 including 467 Junior members. This represents a net gain of 175 members for the year with 393

new members by application including 72 new Juniors.

The **State Historian**, Susan Lemesis reminded chapters Outstanding Teacher of American History Award submissions were due by December 1. Mrs. Lemesis continues to update DAR records and file historical papers donated to our

society.

The **State Librarian**, Lynn Wright urged chapters to donate books to the NSDAR Library. As of October 20, 2009 the Georgia State Society has 44 book credits from seven chapters. Sixteen were donated by the Georgia State Society in honor of the State Regent. The list of donated books is on pages 128 & 129 of the 2008 – 2009 *Proceedings*. On page 128, *List of Civil War Veterans Tablet Fairview Park, Decatur, Macon County, Illinois*, should be deleted. The NSDAR Library credited the book to Georgia in error. Bookplates may be purchased from the State Librarian.

The **State Curator**, Charlotte Christian reported the property of the State Society has been maintained in good condition and all items are organized and accounted for.

The State Regent circulated a recent Atlanta Journal Constitution newspaper article featuring Honorary State Regent Alae Risse Leitch entitled, "At 96 She Still Gets Close to her Beloved Yellow Jackets". Lanette. Reid was recognized and announced a University of Georgia student and member of Reverend John Andrew Chapter is writing a thesis on Honorary State Regent Janet Merritt (deceased), Past Vice President General, and first female elected to the Georgia General Assembly. Mrs. Reid asked anyone who could contribute information on Mrs. Merritt for the thesis to contact the student through Dana Anderson, Regent of Reverend John Andrew Chapter.

Following a brief break, Mrs. Chastain presented the State Parliamentarian,

Rena Setters who provided a tutorial on chapter bylaws

Mrs. Chastain called for reports from State Chairmen of NATIONAL COMMITTEES and NATIONAL SPECIAL COMMITTEES: American Heritage, Betty

Samaras stated Georgia has been very successful with this committee and urged members to consult the guidelines to inspire their creativity; American History, Rebecca Malone West reviewed guidelines for the Essay contest; American Indians, Carolyn Baker Balog reminded members to contact government officials and schools now to get proclamations and participation in observing November as "American Indian Heritage Month"; Americanism, Phyllis Fox Lawson encouraged anyone interested in attending a naturalization ceremony to contact her for locations and ways to help. As Meadow Garden Public Relations Chairman, Mrs. Lawson announced the commemorative license plates are still for sale and asked for volunteers to represent Meadow Garden at various Welcome Center events. Chapter Achievement, Dianne Brown Cannestra encouraged use of the online write-able form, reviewed reporting requirements and encouraged chapters to use e-Community membership: Service Awards. Pat Mercer reported recommendations received and encouraged every chapter to submit the two allowed recommendations; Constitution Week, Betty Harrah announced the guidelines for Constitution Week scrapbooks have changed. As Meadow Garden Cookbook Chairman, Mrs. Harrah reported the supply of books brought to this meeting was sold out, but additional books are available by mail. DAR Good Citizens. JoAn Johnson Chewning thanked 54 chapters for purchasing pins and certificates while encouraging each chapter to recognize students with this award; DAR Magazine, Kate London Stirk urged all chapters to join the 30 already participating in the Georgia CoOp ads for Honor Roll and Chapter Achievement credit; DAR Museum, Therry Nash Deal announced plans for an open house at the Georgia State Room in the DAR Museum during Continental Congress, Mrs. Deal recognized Vice Chairman of the Georgia State Room Anne Murphey and announced a room in the Georgia College and State University Library has been named in honor of Mrs. Hugh Peterson (deceased), long time chair of this committee. DAR Service for Veterans, Becky Rostron reminded chapters of the deadline for awards offered by this committee and suggested several opportunities for supporting Veterans including the upcoming Belk Charity Day Sale; Junior Membership Vice Chairman for Contest, Mary Ann Hawthorne reviewed quidelines for the contest and announced plans for a Junior luncheon at Meadow Garden in January; Lineage Research, Louise Greene Henry recommended the Lineage Research Lookup Volunteers as a wonderful resource in completing documentation for applications and asked for additional volunteers from Georgia; National Defense, Joan Smith Hutcheson expressed pride in three Georgia Daughters who won the National Defense editorial contest, and encouraged other members to write letters to editors. Mrs. Hutcheson asked to be notified of schools where chapters plan ROTC/JROTC awards and any schools known to have dropped the ROTC/JROTC program; Volunteer Information Specialists, Amy Pittman Lawson gave a review of the state web sites and pointed out the entire Chapter Information Packet is now online; DAR Genealogy Preservation, Diana Allen Simmons reported 35 Georgia members working on the Descendants Project entering names found on applications and encouraged more members to participate in this important effort. In the absence of the DAR Project Patriot Chairman, Martha Knight announced no home made food items may be sent to active troops; DAR Speakers Staff, Julia Ann Farrigan urged chapters to use the Speakers Staff booklet in planning programs. The State Regent asked all members of the State and National Speakers Staffs to stand and be recognized. President General's Project, O. B. Wilhoit McCorkle stated Jan. 1, 2008 is the date for the membership count to be used for President General's Project donations; Insignia, Mary Gene Everitt Elliott pointed out the DAR Members' Web Site has information on proper placement and wearing of insignia. Mrs. Elliott announced J.E. Caldwell has been sold and will not accept orders after February. **Volunteer Genealogists**, Diane McCranie Redkevitch offered her committee to present workshops to chapters and asked for detailed information on nominees for Volunteer Genealogist of the Year; **Women's Issues**, Betty Garlington Christy reminded members to enter the committee's essay contest by the Feb. 1 deadline and reviewed guidelines.

A PROCLAMATION CONSTITUTION WEEK

WHEREAS: September 17, 2009, marks the 222nd anniversary of the 1787 Constitutional Convention where the Constitution of the United States was finalized and signed, thus outlining the fundamental principles by which our nation is governed; and

WHEREAS: Our Constitution established six basic governing principles for our society, including popular sovereignty, rule of law, federalism, judicial review, individual rights and separation of powers with a system of checks and balances; and

WHEREAS: Popular sovereignty provided for our government to be created by and for the people, while the rule of law required that government be guided by a set of laws, rather than by any individual or group entity; federalism provides for the sharing of governing power between our national government and individual state governments; and

WHEREAS: The Constitution ensures the distribution of functions and responsibilities among three separate branches and a system of checks and balances to calibrate those powers, guaranteeing individual rights and liberties against government encroachment; and

WHEREAS. The state of Georgia became the fourth state in the Union to ratify the Constitution, signed by Georgia delegates Abraham Baldwin and William Few, on January 2, 1788; and Constitution Week affords the opportunity for all citizens to learn about Georgia's role in the history of our nation's founding documents; now

THEREFORE: I, SONNY PERDUE, Governor of the state of Georgia, do hereby proclaim September 17-23, 2009, as CONSTITUTION WEEK in Georgia and encourage our citizens to learn about the history and meaning of our Constitution.

In witness thereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the Executive Department to be affixed this 14th day of September in the year of our Lord two thousand nine.

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A PROCLAMATION AMERICAN INDIAN HERITAGE MONTH

WHEREAS: Before the first Europeans arrived in what now is the state of Georgia, thousands of Native Americans thrived off Georgia's fertile soil and many waterways in dozens of highly complex communities; and

WHEREAS. Native Americans are a diverse group with a rich and multifaceted system of governments, languages, religions, values and traditions, and during the month of November, our nation celebrates the culture and contributions of the first Americans; and

WHEREAS: In honor of American Indian Heritage Month, community celebrations as well as numerous cultural, artistic, educational and historical activities will take place all across Georgia; now

THEREFORE. I, SONNY PERDUE, Covernor of the state of Georgia, do hereby proclaim November 2009 as AMERICAN INDIAN HERITAGE MONTH in Georgia to honor the unique heritage of a distinctive people.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

June 30, 2010

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This summary of significant accounting policies of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR (the Organization) is presented to assist in understanding the Organization's financial statements. The financial statements and notes are representations of the Organization's management, who is responsible for their integrity and objectivity.

1. Nature of Organization

The Organization is a volunteer women's service organization created to promote patriotism, preserve American history, and secure America's future through better education for children.

2. Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Organization have been prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting, a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles. Accordingly, revenue is recorded when received rather than when earned, and expenses are recorded when paid rather than when incurred.

3. Basis of Presentation

Financial statement presentation follows the recommendation of the Financial Accounting Standards Board in its Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations. Under SFAS No. 117, the Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted, temporarily restricted, and permanently restricted. A description of the three net asset categories follows:

Unrestricted

Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed restrictions. Unrestricted net assets may be designated for specific purposes by action of the Board of Directors.

Temporarily Restricted

Net assets whose use is subject to donor-imposed restrictions that can be fulfilled by actions of the Organization pursuant to those restrictions or that expire by the passage of time.

Permanently Restricted

Net assets subject to donor-imposed restrictions that they be maintained permanently by the Organization.

4. Use of Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts and disclosures. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

June 30, 2010

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, continued

5. Cash and Cash Equivalents

For the purposes of the statement of financial position and the statement of cash flows, the Organization considers all cash on hand, highly liquid bank deposits, and short-term debt securities with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

6. Property and Equipment

Major preservation or restoration projects are capitalized and depreciated over an estimated useful life of fifteen years. Additions and betterments of \$750 or more are capitalized, while maintenance and repairs that do not improve or extend the useful lives of the respective assets are expensed currently. Depreciation is provided for in amounts sufficient to relate the cost of depreciable assets to operations over their estimated service lives, principally using the straight-line and 200% declining balance methods.

The Organization does not capitalize collections and historical treasurers. Meadow Garden and its contents are historical treasures and are insured for approximately \$439,000.

Depreciation expense for the year ended June 30, 2010 was \$9,868.

7. Donated Services

Many volunteers have made significant contributions of their time to develop and promote the programs of the Organization. The value of these donated services is not included in the accompanying financial statements, as such services do not create or enhance non-financial assets or require specialized skills. If donated services received either create or enhance non-financial assets or required specialized skill, which would need to be purchased if not donated, the value of those donated services would be recorded in accordance with SFAS No. 116.

8. Other Contributions

In accordance with SFAS No. 116, contributions received are recorded as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted support depending on the existence and/or nature of donor restrictions. Contributions are recognized when received by the Organization. Conditions that are restricted by the donor are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets if the restrictions expire in the fiscal year in which the contributions are recognized. All other donor-restricted contributions are reported as increases in temporarily or permanently restricted net assets depending on the nature of the restrictions. When a restriction expires, restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets.

9. Membership Dues

Membership dues are recognized when received.

10. Advertising

Advertising costs are expensed as incurred. Advertising expense for the year ended June 30, 2010 was \$3,192.

11. Income Taxes

Georgia State Society, NSDAR, a nonprofit organization operating under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, is exempt from federal, state, and local income taxes, and accordingly, no provision for income taxes is included in the accompanying financial statements for the Organization.

12. Subsequent Events

Subsequent events have been evaluated through August 12, 2010, which is the date the financial statements were issued.

NOTE B - FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS AND CONCENTRATIONS OF CREDIT RISK

The Organization's financial instruments that are exposed to concentrations of credit risk consist primarily of cash and cash equivalents.

The Organization maintains its cash deposits with highly rated financial institutions. At times, such deposits may be in excess of federally insured limits. The Organization did not have any deposits in excess of federally insured limits at June 30, 2010. The Organization has not experienced any losses in such accounts and believes it is not exposed to any significant risk of loss.

NOTE C - AFFILIATES

The Organization collects membership dues and donations from its local Georgia Chapters for the Organization and the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

National Committee Reports

AMERICAN HERITAGE - Betty Keener Samaras

The American Heritage Committee had 97 chapters working to preserve historic sites, to help educate others on cultural events and traditions, and to save quilters' stories by entering the various contests within the American Heritage Committee. There were 194 programs and projects given. Forty-one chapters entered contests for this committee. Winners are listed in the Awards section of the Proceedings..

AMERICAN HISTORY COMMITTEE - Rebecca Malone West

Reports were received from 100 chapters. Chapters and individual members presented 454 American History programs, with 97 programs focusing on outstanding American women. The American History Essay Contest was sponsored in 177 schools, with 4,740 students in grades five through eight participating. Chapters awarded 3,023 Certificates of Participation, 322 Certificates of Award, and 159 bronze medals. The Christopher Columbus Essay Contest was sponsored in 43 schools, with 272 students participating. Chapters awarded 77 Certificates of Participation. Chapters also presented 120 certificates, 62 bronze medals and six silver medals for Outstanding Work in American History. Three chapters were recognized for Outstanding Chapter Projects: The Reverend John Andrew Chapter raised \$15,000 to establish Patriot Park in Watkinsville, the Oglethorpe Chapter created a DVD about the original residents of Pine Mountain Valley, and the Fort Frederica Chapter members were re-enactors in local schools. Vice Chairmen Trudie Pabst, Kelly Weaver, Martha Dykes, and Dawn Hamill are commended for their excellent work in support of this committee and the chapters in their respective districts. This committee is privileged to serve the State Regent and the Georgia State Society.

AMERICAN INDIANS - Carolyn Baker Balog

It is a pleasure to report the activities of the chapters in 2009. This Chairman presented programs for 12 chapters. In October State Regent Barbara Chastain and this chairman met with Governor Perdue for the signing of the Proclamation for Georgia American Indian Heritage Month in November. Chapters presented 48 programs, Indian Minutes at 345 meetings and obtained 23 Proclamations for Native American Heritage Month. Daughters contributed \$1,064 to The American Indian Scholarship Fund, \$438 to Friends of the American Indians, \$1,969 to Bacone College, \$2,383 to Chemawa Indian School, and \$774 to the Indian Youth of American Summer Camp Program. There were 3,190 soup labels sent to Bacone, and 2,625 to Chemawa. Madam State Regent, it has been an honor to serve the Society under your administration. Thank you so much for the opportunity.

AMERICANISM - Phyllis Fox Lawson

With 99 chapters reporting, 61 chapters continued to promote Americanism in their communities distributing patriotic materials to naturalization applicants, schools and events. A total of 18,535 U.S. Flags, U.S. Flag pins, copies of the Pledge of Allegiance to the U.S. Flag or copies of the American's Creed were distributed. Medal of Honor winners were S. Truett Cathy, Georgia State nominee, and Joseph Stephen McDaniels, Nathaniel Macon Chapter nominee. Americanism Award winners were Maria Haydee Anderson, Colonel William Candler Chapter nominee; Yumi Kim, Nathaniel Macon Chapter nominee; and Jorge R. Houed, John Benning Chapter nominee. Twenty-four chapters attended naturalization ceremonies. This was a 38

percent increase from last year. Twenty-four chapters participated in patriotic parades or special activities. A Xavier Chapter member assisted a fellow teacher in becoming a naturalized citizen. The John Houston Chapter sponsored a drama re-enacting the signing of the United States Constitution and choreographed a musical program for our Armed Forces. These two activities involved 300 students and an audience of over 350. Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter participated in 232 school programs reaching over 12,270 youths.

CHAPTER ACHIEVEMENT AWARD - Dianne Brown Cannestra

Ninety-three of 112 chapters submitted Chapter Achievement Award forms by the State deadline. Twelve forms were received after the deadline. Even though this Chairman and the District Directors contacted the chapters repeatedly, seven chapters did not submit a report so the Georgia Society did not achieve the National Society goal of 100% reporting. Seventy seven chapters achieved Level 1, 22 achieved Level 2 and two achieved Level 3. The chapter scoring the most points from each district was Atlanta, District 1; Col. William Candler, District 2; Brier Creek, District 3; and Oglethorpe, District 4. The chapter scoring the most points in the state was Atlanta. This Chairman deeply appreciates the State Treasurer's responsiveness and information provided necessary to verify the chapter reports.

CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION - Lynn Snowden Dorney

This has been a great year for the Georgia State Society Children of the American Revolution. Led by state president, Daniel James Dorney, and spurred by state theme, "Supporting the Real American Heroes", the G.S.C.A.R. has worked hard to raise \$4,000 to be split among four Veterans Hospitals in Georgia. Reports were received from 38 chapters actively providing leadership and monetary donations to C.A.R. They reported inviting C.A.R. members to chapter meetings and many times the C.A.R. have given the chapter program. One chapter is reorganizing a society they formerly sponsored. Seventeen chapters actively support an existing C.A.R. society and six others provide senior leadership on the local and/or state level. This chairman expresses gratitude to all who serve in the leadership capacity. It is by providing and modeling leadership, that new leaders are developed. If you are interested in serving in this capacity, please contact this chairman. I would like to recognize Martha Stewart Bulloch and William Day Chapters for outstanding support of the Georgia C.A.R. and Augustin Clayton Chapter for providing the most C.A.R. Senior Leadership this year. Thank you for giving me the opportunity to serve as Children of the American Revolution State Chairman.

COMMUNITY SERVICE - Patricia Pattillo Mercer

Georgia Daughters honored 23 outstanding men and women with the DAR Community Service Award for their "voluntary achievements in cultural, educational, humanitarian, patriotic, historical and citizenship endeavors, or in environmental conservation." First place winner on the state level was Helen Dean Downing who was honored by Lachlan McIntosh Chapter for her humanitarian, patriotic, educational, cultural, and historic community service to the city of Savannah. Second place was Jim Freeman who was recognized by Philadelphia Winn Chapter for his outstanding work in assisting veterans through Task Force Patriot, an organization he founded, and his work for Salute to the Troops. Third place was Mark Secord who was honored by Fort Peachtree Chapter for donating his time and resources flying "Angel Flight" missions for the past 26 years. Honorable mention went to Gail Sparrow honored by James Waldrop Chapter and John Feight. Chapters recognized for presenting Community Service Awards were: Augustin Clayton, Colonel William

CONSERVATION - Billie J. Goodwin

Eighty-one chapters reported 133 projects, 43 programs, "Conservation Minutes" used in 213 meetings, participation in Earth and Arbor Day activities by 247 members, 41 trees planted. Projects included water and soil conservation, composting, recycling, wildlife preservation and green-space creation. Two National Conservation Awards were presented, Colonel William Candler to Kathy Sapp Lovett, Fort Frederica to Bill Jones, III. First Place Best Chapter Report awarded to Martha Stewart Bulloch for their work in landscaping and conservation projects at Oakland Cemetery, the rooting and replanting of two antique roses and restoration of a cherry orchard at Barrington Hall. Second Place to Chestatee River for work in Bluebird preservation, placing 14 Bluebird houses in five counties resulting in 74 Bluebirds fledged. Third Place to Xavier for participation and leadership in Rome's Arbor Day celebration. Fayette-Starr's Mill entry in the 2009 Beautification Project Contest tied for Third place nationally.

CONSTITUTION WEEK - Betty Brown Harrah

On September 22, 2009 Governor Sonny Perdue welcomed State Regent, Barbara Chastain, and this Chairman to witness his signing of the Georgia Constitution Week Proclamation. This Proclamation was presented to the State Regent at the Constitution Week Luncheon on September 19, 2009 with a letter of Greetings from our Governor. The keynote speaker was Tim Miller, History Teacher at Fayette County High School, Chapter Chairmen from 100 chapters reported Constitution Week celebrations focusing on promoting the Constitution and education. These activities included 96 chapters reciting the Preamble or reading Sidelights, obtaining 181 Proclamations, bell ringing by 200 groups, participated in 472 Constitution Week Events, Chapters received 162 print media published, had 697 displays consisting of 7677 square feet and 49,290 radio/TV broadcast minutes. DAR GOOD CITIZENS - Jo An Johnson Chewning

DAR Good Citizens exemplify these qualities: Dependability, service, leadership, patriotism. Eligible students attend accredited public high schools and are members of their senior class. Eighty Georgia chapters contacted 326 high schools; 14 were new participants. Awards were given to 231 students. Chapter winners received Good Citizens pins, certificates, and wallet cards. Special chapter programs were held and winners were recognized at school board meetings, school honors programs, and news articles. Gifts by chapters: \$10,642.29. Chapters sponsoring ten+ schools: Augusta (13), Augustin Clayton (12), and Earl of Camden (13). Augustin Clayton contacted 16 schools. Colonel John McIntosh made the largest award (\$1,500). District winners: 1- Hawley Anne Emanuele (Augustin Clayton); 2-Sonia Puthenpurackal Mathew (William Day); 3- Nicholas Olson Gober (Governor Jared Irwin); 4- Abbey Elizabeth Stokely (General Daniel Newnan). Each District

winner received a \$100 Georgia Society check. Our Georgia winner, Abbey Elizabeth Stokely, sponsored by General Daniel Newnan Chapter, received a State Winner certificate, pin, and Georgia Society check for \$250.00. DAR MAGAZINE - Kathryn London Stirk

The Newsletter has reports that keep members informed of the wider efforts of DAR. In Georgia, 89 regents subscribe to American Spirit. Sixteen chapters will receive a certificate for supporting the DAR Magazine through subscriptions, gifts to libraries and schools, and ideas for promoting subscriptions. Awards- John Houston, Fort Peachtree, Fort Frederica, Nancy Hart, John Benning, Sukey Hart, General Daniel Newnan, Augustin Clayton, Colonel William Candler, Archibald Bulloch, Martha Stewart Bulloch, Xavier, Philadelphia Winn, Mary Hammond Washington, Robert Loughridge, Sandy Springs. One hundred chapters submitted reports for Chapter Achievement. These reports help National and State track ways to help the chapters with DAR projects. Eighty percent of the chapters share the Presidents General's message with their chapter each month. The President General's message is available http://members.dar.org/pgmessage/ Because of the continued support of the chapters in the Co-op ads, Georgia had seven pages in the Nov/Dec 2009 issue.

DAR MUSEUM - Therry Nash Deal

Reports received from 100 chapters. Activities or donations were reported by 44 chapters. Sixteen programs about the museum, six presented by correspondent docents. Reports listed donations of \$2,049. Five chapters met the Chairman's Challenge Goal of pin level giving to both Adopt-an-Object and Friends during the two year Chastain administration: Colonel William Candler, Joseph Habersham, Lachlan McIntosh, Hawkinsville, and Nancy Hart. Highest per capita giving (\$5.92) was Lachlan McIntosh. Largest amount given was by Joseph Habersham. Best overall narrative of activities: Fort Peachtree. Three chapters reported visits to the DAR Museum followed by sharing this visit with chapter on return. Two chapters ordered the Museum Trunk Show; two others piggy-backed locally for the Trunk Show used at State Conference. Eight of our 21 correspondent docents filed reports with the Vice-Chairman for docents, Martha Wright. Anne Murphey, Vice Chairman for Georgia Room, indicates a new gift will be given during Congress for the room from funds available.

DAR SCHOLARSHIP - Tommie Elaine Shattuck

The Georgia State Society Scholarship award applicant for the Lillian and Arthur Dunn Scholarship is Holly Brackin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert E. Brackin of Marietta. The sponsoring chapter is Fielding Lewis, Betty Christy, Regent. Holly's mother, Gail is a member of the Fielding Lewis Chapter, and Holly is a page at this State Conference. Second place with a \$50 State Chairman's Stipend goes to Julia Durham, sponsored by Atlanta Chapter, Patricia Hein, Regent. Reports from 98 chapters show 26 chapters are involved in scholarship programs awarding a total of \$57,150.98 to 76 Georgia students. In addition, 66 chapters gave a total of \$5,953.80 to national scholarship funds. Georgia Daughters sponsored educational money for Georgia children with a grand total of \$539,764.08. Total fund balance in the six

colleges and universities with 16 scholarship/loan funds is \$476,695.30. A total awarded amount of \$59,085.10 went to a total of 45 recipients in 2010.

DAR SCHOOL COMMITTEE - Virginia Grace Lingelbach

One hundred chapters reported. Seventy-one chapters earned the coveted Hightower Award. A new "Under \$5.00" project was implemented this year with Hindman Settlement School being the recipient of hundreds of school supplies. The Georgia Daughters continued their generosity with the donation of medical items to the Kate Duncan Smith DAR School Clinic and donations to the Tamassee after school snack program. The "Special Times Boutique" at the Tamassee DAR School Thrift Store continues to be successful and very popular. An estimated eight tons of thrift were donated to the thrift stores at Tamassee and Crossnore, Over 31,000 qualifying food labels and over 500 ink cartridges were contributed. Chapters participated in the "My Coke Rewards" program and the "Publix Partners for Education" program. There were 107 chapters who served our special veterans. Daughters gave their time, resources, and gifts to support veterans in VA Medical Centers, nursing homes (local, state, and national), military hospitals, and outpatient clinics. Also, Daughters contributed to community events, cemetery projects, Veterans Memorial Parks, Veterans Day ceremonies, and other venues. Georgia had 465 adult volunteers who drove 57,082 miles in support of veteran activities and gave 8,586 hours of service. There were 139 youth volunteers who contributed 955 hours. Total cash and noncash donations were \$54,520. A total of 726.5 ounces of stamps were collected and donated. Certificates of Award were presented for most outstanding veteran reports (three chapters), outstanding veteran activities (14 chapters), outstanding monetary contributions (three chapters), most adult volunteer hours (three chapters), 600 plus volunteer hours (three chapters), most miles traveled for veteran activities (three chapters), most ounces of stamps donated (three chapters), and a Chairman's Special Project Award. VETERANS HISTORY PROJECT – Frances Yarborough Sideman

Georgia Daughters continue to interview and record our veterans' valuable histories. There were nine chapters who participated and recorded 34 histories. Congratulations Daughters!! This is a most valuable project and we urge all chapters to support this project. Thank you, Madam State Regent, for the opportunity to serve the Georgia State Society in this manner.

FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA - Ann Parker Parsons

Georgia Daughters in 76 chapters participated in paying tribute to the Flag of the United States of America through various projects and activities. Fifty three chapters held or participated in 194 Flag events. Thirty eight chapters reported involving over 12,000 youth in various Flag activities through schools, churches, scouting and JROTC programs. The total number of Flags presented by 45 chapters was 7134. Two hundred and five certificates were presented to individuals and groups

recognizing their efforts in properly displaying the Flag. Chapters attended Nationalization ceremonies, held Flag Retirement ceremonies and sent cards to our veterans in nursing homes. One DAR member wrote a Flag program and provided flags for the C.A.R. to use in a Flag Day presentation. Two chapters lined the streets of their community to honor a fallen soldier who had given his life in Iraq to preserve our freedom. Another chapter's Flag events were performances of the "Stars and Stripes" puppet show. Programs and Flag etiquette workshops were given by several chapters. Many of the chapters reporting took time to salute our veterans throughout the year. Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure serving the Georgia Daughters as State Chairman of the Flag Committee.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS - Vicki Lancaster Cobb

Genealogical records were submitted by Georgia Daughters from six chapters for the 2010 volumes. One volume of miscellaneous records with a total of 167 pages and one volume of tax digest records consisting of 570 pages were presented to the NSDAR Library. The same amounts were presented to each of the Georgia State Archives, the Washington Memorial Library, and the Georgia Historical Society for a grand total of 2948 pages. Chapters by membership categories with the most pages were 51-100 members - Oliver Morton Chapter, 101- 150 members - Colonel William Candler Chapter and 150+ members - Elijah Clarke Chapter. The Elijah Clarke Chapter presented the most pages. Eleven members were involved in abstracting deeds and wills for the years 1880 - 1900. Other activities reported were: transcribing chapter minute books from 1900-1945, monetary and book contributions to the Washington Memorial Library Genealogical and Archives Section, volunteering at the library, writing county history and cemetery books, copying a deteriorating GRC Volume and an 1840-1870 Will Book, Ledger and magistrate records are being transcribed for publication and donation to the NSDAR Library. This chairman thanks the State Regent for the opportunity of working with this great project.

HISTORIC PRESERVATION - Jan Brown Anderson

It has been a pleasure to serve our state in the capacity of Historical Preservation Chairman. It has been a struggle for me to learn exactly what my job was for this newly formed Committee. Many of you have been so willing to help me and I do appreciate your help. Georgia members have done many good things for restoration and the maintenance of historical places and documents. Our state has so much historical value and I hope next year will bring many more projects to preserve our places and documents.

JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS - Donna Raye Johnson

Four of the 101 Georgia DAR Chapters sponsor 44 JAC groups involving 1,314 children in grades K-8. The national theme, "America Land of the Free and Home of the Brave," produced many varied and beautiful entries for this year's contest. Sixty-five entries were received from: Thomasville, Colonel William Candler, Fort Frederica, and Henry Walton who also reported eight pictures and/or articles were published about JAC activities. Chehaw and John Houston Chapters reported donations to JAC totaling \$8.00 while Sweetwater and Xavier reported past involvement with JAC. Georgia sent 64 winning entries including seven banners, 11 posters, 12 poems, four photo essays, 13 short stories, and 17 stamps to the Divisional level for judging. Thomasville Chapter received a certificate of award for outstanding sponsorship of JAC, with 38 groups involving 718 children. Thanks are extended to those Georgia chapters who worked with the schools to make JAC a viable option for teaching patriotism to all children. Chapters reported 52 members as Lineage Research Lookup Volunteers (LRLV), made 62 requests to the LRLV Board, and 28 requests to State Chairman, Chapters conducted a total of 27 workshops for prospective members, SAR prospects, and general public with 1st place John Houstoun offering six workshops and a three-way tie for 2nd between Knox-Conway, Fielding Lewis, and Reverend John Andrew providing three each. Chapters with most LRLV Board members were 1st William McIntosh and 2nd Lamar-LaFayette. A special award for Outstanding Lineage Research Volunteer to Rachel Colbert of James Waldrop for her large number of research look-ups, and referrals to DAR and SAR. Outstanding chapter activities: member Brenda Jessel took a DAR from Illinois to visit her Patriot's Georgia grave; Old Unicoi Trail added books to their LR repertoire; Hightower Trail is organizing list of DAR-genealogy books/publications belonging to members that can be shared; members in Lieutenant James Monroe assisted SAR and C.A.R. applicants; Fielding Lewis assigns a committee member to each prospective who works with her until application is ready for review by registrar; and Sergeant Newton had a program on collecting oral histories. Sincere thanks to Vice Chairmen Janet Skelton, Rosemary Henderson, and Linda Lawrence.

MEMBERSHIP - Phyllis Malone Porter

Georgia had another membership increase in 2009 – 497 new members including 95 Juniors! Official Membership Count as of January 1, 2010 was 7,176, which was a net gain of 91. Chapter registrars took advantage of the many resources provided on the e-Membership website. Registrars were delighted to have the ability to run reports, check the status of prospective member and pending members, and see the lineage page of many applications online. Chapters received a total of 182 prospective members from National in 2009, and 50 became members. The best overall report was from Fort Peachtree Chapter. Lynette Rosinger is the Regent and Virginia Stuckey is Registrar, The Essay Contest winner is Trudy Alexander of Atlanta Chapter, and her essay was sent to the National competition. The traveling silver bowl for the most new members is awarded to Atlanta Chapter for 33 new members. Patricia Hein is the Regent, and Trudy Alexander is Registrar. Atlanta Chapter also had the most new Junior Members with eight. The Eagle Award for the chapter with the greatest percentage increase in membership goes to Atlanta Chapter, which had a 37.5% increase in membership.

NATIONAL DEFENSE - Joan S. Hutcheson

Excellent National Defense reports received from 100 chapters with special recognition to Oglethorpe chapter for the best overall report. Thirty-nine chapters had a full program on National Defense with 82 chapters giving three-minute National Defense reports at chapter meetings. Ten chapters gave 14 gold medals to ROTC students in colleges and universities. Sixty-seven chapters gave 175 bronze medals to JROTC students in Georgia high schools. Two hundred fifty Good Citizenship medals were awarded by 57 chapters. Donations to the NSDAR ROTC Award Program totaled \$254 given by 67 chapters. Three Georgia Daughters were honored by having their winning letters to the editor and an editorial printed in the NSDAR National Defender. Letters printed were written by Jan Parker of Philadelphia Winn Chapter and Brenda Davison Jessel of General Daniel Newnan Chapter. The editorial printed was Margaret G.R. Cronia's of the Colonel William Chandler Chapter. The Georgia State Society is proud of the achievements of these Daughters. Entries to the National Defense Best Editorial or Letter to the Editor Contest were sent in.

This chairman gave one program during the year on "Our First National Defense" as witnessed by Martha Washington.

PROGRAM - Jean Cole Manker

Eighty nine chapters sent their yearbooks to be judged in the Yearbook Contest. A winner, or two winners in case of a tie, were chosen from each of the four districts. Winners are listed under 2010 Awards.

PUBLIC RELATIONS AND MEDIA - Sharon Streetman Ray

Reports were received from 103 chapters. Constitution Week celebrated with parades, bell ringing, luncheons, school programs, proclamations, hosting receptions for Naturalization Ceremonies, PSA's on television, posters, articles, period dress. Awards for American History Essays, ROTC, JROTC, Community Service, Good Citizen Essays given. Scholarships awarded. American History Certificates of Accomplishment awarded to teachers. Information booths held at local events. Members held/attended grave marker dedications and battle commemorations. Wreaths laid at ceremonies. Certificate of appreciation given to Georgia's First Lady, Mary Perdue, recognizing her contributions to historical preservation, Articles placed in newspapers, "spots" recorded for radio and TV, newspaper websites utilized for reporting DAR activities, multiple pages in magazines. Georgia Day proclamations obtained, placed in schools, sent electronically. Celebrations held at meetings, schools, luncheons. Patriot's Day celebrated in period dress, media coverage. Participation in Armed Forces Day, Memorial Day, July 4th, Veteran's Day parades and celebrations. Flag retirement ceremonies held, publicized. Food, thrift, soup labels, box tops, canceled stamps donated. Christmas gifts, goody bags, given to veterans. Trees planted, cemeteries cleaned, preservation projects begun. Chapters publishing newsletters, 68; brochures, 36; reporting print coverage, 80; reporting broadcasting, 28; publicizing events, 51; presenting media awards, 3; using "Today's DAR" video, 22.

SEIMES TECHNOLOGY CENTER - Linda Cunningham Bhame

Georgia Daughters donated a total of \$799 to the Seimes Technology Center in the NSDAR Library. Eighty nine chapters reported. Donations ranged from \$2 to \$200. Thanks to all who contributed to this committee and continue to make the work of the Technology Center a vital part of our organization's resources.

VOLUNTEER INFORMATION SPECIALISTS - Amy Pittman Lawson

As of January 1, 2009, the Georgia State Society recorded 7,085 members. Chapters reported 182 prospective members contacted chapters directly through their individual web sites. This total does not include the hundreds of prospective members that go through the e-Membership tracking system. Computers are used by over 3000 Georgia Daughters for chapter activities, including the production of yearbooks and newsletters. A particularly nice example of a public relations flyer was sent to this State Chairman from the Robert Loughridge Chapter. E-Membership is now routinely used by chapter regents, vice-regents, treasurers, and registrars, as well as state officers and state chairmen in approved access groups. Georgia Daughters logged hundreds of hours on the NSDAR Descendants Project and the GRC Nationwide Indexing Project. The VIS Volunteer of the Year award goes to Carol Groover, Pulaski Chapter. She personally transcribed 527 applications of past members for the Genealogical Preservation Project. Thank you to the VIS Vice-Chairmen and the many chapter webmasters who spend incalculable hours updating and reviewing the

100+ Georgia State Society chapter and state web sites. It has been an honor to serve our State Regent and the Georgia State Society.

CHAPTER DEVELOPMENT – Phyllis Johnson Tanner See report of the State Organizing Secretary

CHAPTER REVITALIZATION - Phyllis Johnson Tanner

For the fifth year the "traveling" Pewter Pitcher has been awarded to the chapter with the highest average percentage increase in member attendance for January 1 – December 31, 2009. The winner this year is Atlanta Chapter; Second Place: Commodore Richard Dale Chapter; Third Place: Oglethorpe Chapter; and Honorable Mention: Hightower Trail Chapter.

COMMEMORATIVE EVENTS - Camille Redfern Baxter

Chairman received 100 reports, with 87 chapters participating in Commemorative Events. Independence Day parades and celebrations included 896 Daughters participating. Eighteen chapters had programs on Abraham Lincoln, seven had programs on DAR Real Daughter Project. Daughters placed Flags and laid wreaths in cemeteries and Revolutionary War battle sites. Daughters commemorated Veterans Day, Constitution Week, Patriots Day, Mothers Day, Presidents Day, Arbor Day, DAR Founders Day, the birthdays of George Washington, Abraham Lincoln, James Monroe, and Marques de Lafayette, Flag Day, D-Day, Georgia Day, National Day of Prayer, Election Day, September 11th, Armed Forces Day, Labor Day, Christmas Day, Thanksgiving Day, Columbus Day, Americans Creed Day, Treaty of Paris, Siege of Savannah, Battles of Lexington, Vann's Creek, Kettle Creek, Kings Mountain, Guilford Courthouse, and Yorktown, Frederica Naval Action, Bill of Rights Day, Pearl Harbor Day, American Indian Month, Many chapters participated in Flag retirement ceremonies. William Day Chapter participated in over 100 commemorative events! Oglethorpe Chapter members collected soil from battlefields in which infantry soldiers fought from Revolution to the present, presenting samples to new museum in Soil Ceremony, Chapters celebrating birthdays included Thronateeska, 100 years; Cherokee, 62 years; Tallassee, 48 years; Hightower Trail, 25 years; William Day, 10 vears.

DAR GENEALOGY PRESERVATION - Diana Allen Simmons

DAR Genealogy Preservation volunteers index DAR genealogical and membership information into computerized, searchable databases. The committee's current activity is the Descendants Project. During this project, volunteers enter the information found on the second page of applications into a database at National. Any member with internet access can participate. Forty-one Georgia Daughters from 28 chapters have faithfully entered 9,540 applications into the national database. Certificates are presented to these chapters with the names of their volunteers listed on the certificate. The chapter with the most volunteer Daughters is Philadelphia Winn with five. The chapter with the most volunteer entries is Martha Stewart Bulloch with 940 applications entered. Twenty-three Georgia volunteers who have completed at least 100 applications during the last year will be given a certificate at Congress. Members are encouraged to join this important ongoing project. This work will assist in preserving these valuable records and considerably improve the application verification and membership record search processes.

DAR PROJECT PATRIOT - Gwendolyn Meredith Martin

The Georgia Daughters performed outstandingly this year. Entire companies were adopted. Wounded Warriors were recognized with banquets. Boxes were shipped that contained: phone cards, socks, batteries, hot sauce, baby wipes, foot powder, lip balm, paperback books, CD's, snacks, packages of instant oatmeal, shampoo, soap, lotion, toiletry items specifically for women, playing cards, candy, Febreeze and lots of homemade brownies. Blue Star Flags were presented to Moms and Grandmoms. Chapters served at the USO at the Atlanta Airport, Soldiers received phone cards, bottles of water, candy bars, sandwiches and dozens of assorted snacks. Daughters did kitchen duty by cleaning, making coffee and more sandwiches. Chapters sent hand-knitted helmet liners and hand-warmers. \$8,468 worth of grocery coupons were sent to be used in the commissaries. One chapter sent money to provide bus transportation home for National Guardsmen who found themselves with leave time in Mississippi before deploying to Afghanistan. Our chapters sponsored 76 activities supporting the goals of DAR Project Patriot. \$4,468.55 was sent to the Treasurer General for Project Patriot and used \$3,913.90 for local Project Patriot activities. We sent 1,928 items valued at \$8,280.14 to Landstuhl Regional Medical Center.

FRIENDS OF THE LIBRARY - Marilyn Moulton Wright See Librarian's Report

INSIGNIA - Mary Gene Everitt Elliott

This chairman received reports from 104 chapters. The importance of a chapter Insignia Chairman was reflected in the total dollar value of Insignia bought by the chapter members and in the interest shown in wearing pins correctly. The largest total of sales was reported by Colonel William Candler of \$4,506.51. Augustin Clayton, Chestatee River, Elijah Clarke, Fielding Lewis, Martha Stewart Bulloch, Nathaniel Macon and Thronateeska all reported purchases over one thousand dollars. Chapters have literature tables with order forms and articles on Insignia. Etowah Chapter's chairman lives in Missouri and she supports the chapter via the internet and has created an Insignia booklet for new members. Total for purchases reported to me for the year was \$27,702.74. J.E. Caldwell & Co. is now Hamilton Jewelers. Their address and phone number remain the same. LITERACY PROMOTION - Sherri Lawson Roberts

Fifty-seven Georgia chapters were actively involved in literacy promotion. There was participation in literacy programs by 194 members. A total of 12,793 hours were accumulated by DAR members from tutoring, assisting or promoting literacy – 2,473 hours with adults and 10,320 hours with children. There were 5,220 books donated by Georgia chapters to promote literacy. Some of the activities reported by Georgia chapters were: Xavier Chapter hosted a tea and donated books to their local Boys and Girls Club. William Marsh Chapter hosted a Community Spelling Bee whose proceeds were used to purchase dictionaries for third grade students. A Mary Hammond Washington Chapter member donated three hours a week promoting literacy at the jail. John Benson Chapter sponsored a project to collect and distribute books to sites in the community where underprivileged children may not have books available. A member of the Colonel William Candler Chapter designed and distributed handouts for parents of non-readers about the Jumpstart Reading program. Georgia Daughters are working diligently to promote literacy across the state.

Total Certificates of Deposits, \$92,273.60; total Checking/Savings Accounts, \$183,970.54; total Money Market Accounts, \$48,728.68; total Assets, \$185,220.54. The auditors, Santi & Associates have completed the audit. The tax return is being processed by Robin McIntire, CPA, and will be filed by or on November 15, 2009. Additional funds of \$4,100.00, were given to Kate Duncan Smith DAR School toward the scholarship, which completed the endowment of a \$10,000.00 Georgia Scholarship.

The State Treasurer distributed the 2010-2011 Proposed Budget. Mrs. Hanf moved "that the Finance Committee approve the 2010-2011 Budget as presented." The motion was seconded and adopted. The recommendation will be

presented to the State Conference. The State Society membership is currently 7,090 members.

The Meadow Garden account in Augusta is still working well with Susan Jackson making deposits and mailing transaction forms to Bea. There are separate deposit forms for the gift shop and cook book sales. In September, \$3,185.00 in cookbooks had been sold. There were 1,000 cookbooks ordered.

The State credit card will be renewed and is being used for deposits and

paying for meetings.

Mrs. Fischer stated there is a new policy for donations for the Schools, concerning splitting donations between two schools. This will be clarified for the members.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 1:30 p.m.

The Finance Committee met on March 25, 2010, at the Wyndham Peachtree Hotel, Peachtree City. An invocation was given by Mrs. Hanf.

The Minutes of the October 23, 2009 meeting were approved as corrected.

Mrs. Fischer, State Treasurer, distributed copies of the Summary of Fund Accounts which were reviewed and filed; total Certificates of Deposits, \$118,424.63; total Checking/Savings Accounts, \$86,079.78; total Money Market Accounts, \$26,675.02; total Assets, \$230,804.93. Mrs. Fischer stated the Hightower Certificate of Deposit would be due for renewal on February 23, 2011. She took \$10,000.00 for both the Lucy Cook Peel and McCall Genealogical Funds and bought a CD to receive a higher interest rate. The funds are maintained separately to keep their identity. This CD would mature May 17, 2010. The Wachovia Bank has changed ownership to the Wells Fargo Banking Company. This bank has offered good service and she advised using this banking facility for the next administration. The auditors are Santi & Associates. The tax returns have been processed by Robin McIntire, CPA, for the past several years. There is no charge to the Society for this service. The proposed Budget was approved by the Finance Committee at the October 23, 2009 meeting. The budget will be presented at 2010 State Conference.

Mrs. Chastain recommended the next administration cut the amount of the

per capita to Meadow Garden from \$5.00 per member to \$4.00 per member.

Mrs. Garner stated would it be possible for the Georgia Trust be given Meadow Garden. She would like to see a group take Meadow Garden and show the property to its full potential.

Mrs. Hanf asked that the Proposed Budget be in the State Regent's Call to

State Conference letter as it had been in the past.

Mrs. Fischer made a motion "that the State Events Contingency Fund for State Events be \$5,000.00. These funds are to secure anticipated deposits for State Events and are to be replaced from state fund income reimbursing the fund yearly for the amount used." Motion Seconded and adopted.


for their many hours of service, and to the State Regent for her excellent leadership and her invitation to serve the Georgia Daughters in this manner.

October 23, 2009

The Meadow Garden Board met on Friday, October 23, 2009, at the LaQuinta Inn, in Macon. Barbara Chastain, State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 10:30 am, with Sally Baldwin, Secretary present. Other members present were: Patricia Bracy, Betty Durshimer, Margaret Cagle, Bea Fischer, Billie Hunter, Patty Burnam, Sara Carter, Betty Harrah, Phyllis Lawson, Lanette Reid, Laura Reid, Virginia Lingelbach, Ex-Officio member and Frankie Nevins, Liaison to Civic Augusta. Absent was Jeanette Click.

Barbara Chastain offered the invocation and welcomed members to the meeting. The minutes of the August 6, 2009 meeting were approved.

Mrs. Chastain read a letter from Al Walden of A W Contract Printing. She will contact an attorney.

Mrs. Chastain gave information about a puppet show that will be held at Meadow Garden. Mrs. Cagle moved, "that the Hightower Trail Chapter's DVD entitled "Stars and Stripes Puppet Show" be sold on the day of the puppet show at Meadow Garden with a percentage of the profits being donated to Meadow Garden." Motion seconded and adopted

Mrs. Reid moved, "that the resolution honoring Josephine Agostas be withdrawn due to the untimely death of Mrs. Agostas in September 2009." Motion seconded and adopted

The proposed changes will be printed in the State Regent's Call to Conference.

Mrs. Fischer, State Treasurer presented the following financial information: Total Certificates of Deposit, \$350,000.00; Total Checking Accounts Balance, \$72,639.47; Total Money Market Accounts, \$26,353.28; Total Current Assets, \$449,092.75; Total Assets, \$620,351.44; Total Liabilities and Equality, \$620,351.44. Mrs. Fischer presented the proposed 2010-2011 Budget. The budget was approved as presented.

The Chairman of Meadow Garden, Mrs. Cagle, reported another handle was installed on the door to the Heritage Center. She has a bid from the security company concerning the issue with the Heritage Center. A new commode is needed for the bathroom on the porch.

Augusta Chapter Regent, Mrs. Bracy reported two chapter members met with a filming crew to act as docents while making an advertisement for Meadow Garden. Gave a personal tour of Meadow Garden to friends from Williamsburg and they were impressed. One of the chapter members filled in for the house manager while she was on vacation. She suggested that a form be made to have at Meadow Garden for people to fill out to make donations to Meadow Garden.

College Hill Chapter Regent, Mrs. Durshimer reported several chapter members served as tourists during the filming at Meadow Garden. The chapter served

several meals to people visiting Meadow Garden. There are five meals scheduled for October. Open House is scheduled for December 5-7. Mrs. Durshimer checked on the outside porch commode. It does not have a water cut off value. This situation needs to be taken care of before a pipe freezes and there is wood damage.

Docents Chairman, Mrs. Hunter reported there are several ladies serving as

docents. Hopefully there will be a docent's class in the near future.

Furnishings Chairman, Mrs. Burnam, reported the pianoforte has been moved to the Best Room hall wall. The cost of moving was \$90.00. The pictures have been hung, identified with tags. Mrs. Burnam's husband has water-sealed the two outside benches. She has repainted the pedestals holding the busts, to a tinted white. Mrs. Burnam is still cataloging and finding history of the items at Meadow Garden. She is working on a photo album consisting of past State Regents. The next project is to hang the five-part framed Declaration of Independence in the former Augusta Room. The mirror will be moved over the pianoforte. Mrs. Burnam moved, "that the mirror which hung over the pianoforte in the Augusta Room be moved to the Best Room to be placed over the pianoforte there. Considering the condition of the mirror, which according to Susan is delicate, a determination will be made as to whether the mirror needs professional repair when moved." Seconded and adopted.

Gift Shop Chairman, Mrs. Carter reported showing the Meadow Garden DVD to the Burkeland Garden Club and the Edmund Burke Chapter. She sold \$14.00 of flower seeds. Mrs. Carter purchased merchandise for the gift shop. Approximately \$1,000.00 of merchandise was sold at the District workshops. Susan Jackson has sold

approximately \$2,391.20, through October 21, 2009, from the gift shop.

Patrons Chairman, Mrs. Harrah reported she had a table set up at the workshops for members to pick up and purchase cookbooks. There have been 397 cookbook sold. There were 1,134 cookbooks received even though we were billed for only 1,000.

Public Relations Chairman, Mrs. Lawson reported the George Walton booklet is ready to go to print and passed around a color copy for the Board to see. Mrs. Reid moved, "that the price for the revision of George Walton of Meadow Garden be sold for \$10.00 per copy." Motion was seconded and adopted. Mrs. Lawson made connection with all the Georgia Welcome Centers regarding their supply of brochures. She had 40,000 Meadow Garden brochures printed from the Grant with less than \$100.00 taken from the budget. She has applied for ACBC Grant, for the following items: Cooperative Advertising in three emailings; postage; Georgia Spring Newspaper insert, Southern Living, AAA Go Carolina Magazine; Retractor Banner Display; ACVB Trade Show, Georgia Society of Association Executives, for a total of \$9,500.00. She has contacted chapters located near each Welcome Center for representation at "Georgia on My Mind." Mrs. Lawson contacted Lamar to continue the billboard on Hwy. 120 and it has been placed at mile marker 157 since September 25th. She contacted Amy Lawson, Web Master, to work up a design on web-site for information to rent the grounds and Education Center.

Mrs. Lawson moved, "that the William Candler Chapter be given a Patronin-kind for their donation of the Rosemary Dobb painting." Motion seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Lawson moved, "that Rosemary Dobb be given a Patron-in-kind for her painting that now hangs at Meadow Garden." Seconded and adopted.

March 25, 2010

The Meadow Garden Board met on Thursday, March 25, 2010, at the Wyndham Peachtree Hotel, in Peachtree City, Barbara Chastain, State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 1:15 pm, with Sally Baldwin, Secretary present. Other members present were: Patricia Bracy, Betty Durshimer, Margaret Cagle, Bea Fischer, Patty Burnam, Sara Carter, Betty Harrah, Phyllis Lawson, Lanette Reid, Laura Reid, Virginia Lingelbach, Ex-Officio member and Frankie Nevins, Liaison to Civic Augusta.

Barbara Chastain offered the invocation and welcomed members to the

meeting. The minutes of the October 23, 2009 meeting were approved.

Mrs. Harrah reported for the Patron Committee with a total of 60 Patrons: Forty-five Individual Patrons; one Patron on the 1900 level; one Patron at the Olivia's Legacy level; eight donations made by non DAR members; and six members at the \$50.00 level. There were 20 Chapters donating at least \$100.00; five chapters at the 1900 Society level; two chapters at the Sons and Daughters of Liberty level; two chapters at the Olivia's Legacy level. Mrs. Harrah stated 1,124 cookbooks were received from the publisher. There has been a profit of \$7,896.39.

Mrs. Chastain stated Mr. Walden sent a letter to her requesting \$4,184.51 for payment for work. An attorney called her three weeks ago and wanted to know if the Board had reached a decision to pay Mr. Walden this additional payment. Ms. Reid stated she felt the Board had fulfilled all aspects of the contract and that he did not have a legitimate claim. Mrs. Reid stated the Board should have an attorney write Mr. Walden's lawyer stating our position which is that the contract has been fulfilled by the Board.

Mrs. Reid moved that "the State Regent engage an attorney in Augusta to respond to Mr. Al Walden's complaint of fulfillment of contract – attorney to be contacted before or by June 15, 2010." Motion seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Chastain recommended the Bylaw changes were removed from consideration based on incomplete information and wording and it was felt they did not answer how it would affect a quorum. The State Regent felt the concept needed more study and time related to the Financial Manager. The proposed Bylaw and Standing Rules were tabled. Several members of the Board expressed a need for more involvement on several of the committees as jobs have become more intense.

Augusta Chapter Regent, Mrs. Bracy reported that a member of the Augusta Chapter, Alethia Nowell had written a bio-sketch on the Augusta Chapter charter members. Nancy Parks, member, put the booklet together. She stated the chapter would like to have a copy of the booklet preserved in the Stribling Room. Mrs. Bracy thanked Mrs. Cagle for her support of the C.A.R. Society in Augusta. There are now ten members. They will work in the "garden" area on the property. Mrs. Cagle serves as the Senior President.

A motion was made by Ms. Reid that "the gift of the NSDAR Chapter History and Charter Members book given to Meadow Garden by the Augusta Chapter be placed in the Stribling Room." Motion seconded and adopted.

College Hill Chapter Regent, Mrs. Durshimer reported the chapter had members that served as docents during the December Open House. Several members provided meals to visitors at Meadow Garden and served as docents. The profits from the funds collected are donated to Meadow Garden. She has enjoyed visiting with students as they tour Meadow Garden.

Mrs. Reid moved that "the Meadow Garden Board approve the acceptance of the charter for Colonel Henry Lee C.A.R. Society for placement in the Stribling Room, Colonel Henry Lee Society now disbanded, being one of the first C.A.R. Societies organized in Georgia." Motion seconded and adopted.

The State Treasurer, Mrs. Fischer reported the following financial information: Total Certificates of Deposit, \$350,000.00; Total Checking Accounts Balance, \$117,644.52; Total Money Market Accounts, \$30,313.70; Total Current Assets, \$498,058.31; Total Assets, \$673,120.27; Total Liabilities and Equality, \$673,120.27. Mrs. Fischer moved that "to designate the funds in the Capital Investment Money Market Account be invested in a Certificate of Deposit – which shall be designated to build a gate/wall/fence." Motion seconded and adopted.

Furnishings Chairman, Mrs. Burnam, reported the Declaration of Independence had been hung over the busts. The piano was moved. The needlepoint fire screen had been repaired. The heavy mirror had been hung over the piano. The small chair had been inspected and does not need repair. The cost of the work was \$125.00. Mrs. Burnam moved that "Bruce Smith of 'The Furniture Doctor' (a business operating in Augusta) be made a Patron-in-kind of Meadow Garden for moving and repairing antiques for us at a fee which reflected his love of Meadow Garden." Motion seconded and adopted.

Gift Shop Chairman, Mrs. Carter reported giving two programs on Meadow Garden. She set up the Christmas decorations and took them down. Mrs. Carter bought and priced spring items. She sent DVDs to a chapter. She stated that she has enjoyed chairing the Gift Shop over the last two years.

Ms. Reid moved that "the Meadow Garden Gift Shop allow the State Regent to purchase gifts that promote Meadow Garden at cost, which would

include some shipping charge, plus 10%." Motion seconded and adopted.

Public Relations Chairman, Mrs. Lawson reported the George Walton booklets were available at this state conference for purchase. The price would be \$8.00 per booklet. She reported applying for a grant for \$4,100.00 for tourism. Mrs. Lawson displayed the retractable display banner of Meadow Garden. She had applied for a grant for \$19,000.00 to repair the canal side of the house. This would be a matching funds grant. Meadow Garden is featured on the map pad that are at local lodging locations to be given to people staying in the area. Meadow Garden was featured in the Augusta Magazine. Mrs. Lawson would be working on the signage for Meadow Garden.

Liaison to Civic Augusta, Mrs. Nevins reported coverage of Meadow Garden in a national tour book "Southeastern Group Tour". She used this company for her travel company and contacted the magazine to feature Meadow Garden. Mrs. Nevins and Mrs. Bracey attended the Educators gathering and had a booth on Meadow Garden. The Candlelight Tour maybe cancelled for the 2010 year due to low participation.

A motion was made by Mrs. Reid, "to accept four leather bound scrap books reflecting the term of Mrs. Thomas E. Stribling as State Regent, these books being given by her son Charles who with his brother made a substantial gift to Meadow Garden, these books to be placed in the Stribling Room." Motion seconded and adopted.

The State Regent stated she would like to hold a meeting for the Board and

would notify the members of the date.

There being no other business the meeting was adjourned at 3:10 p.m.

Standing Rules for Meadow Garden

MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

- The governing body of a Historic Site, in this instance the Meadow Garden Board, serves the public interest as it relates to Meadow Garden, and must consider itself accountable to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, as well as to Meadow Garden; members should not attempt to act in their individual capacities, but all actions should be taken as a Board, Committee, or otherwise in conformance with the Standing Rules, the Act of Incorporation, or applicable Resolutions.
- The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the three (3) Trustees as named in the Deed from the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, conveying Meadow Garden to the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution; namely, the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the State Chairman of Meadow Garden who is appointed by the State Regent; the Chapter Regents of the Augusta Chapter and the College Hill Chapter, both chapters being located in Augusta, who shall serve as Vice Chairman to the State Chairman of Meadow Garden; the State Treasurer; two Honorary State Regents; and six of the chairmen of Meadow Garden Committees, as appointed by the State Regent.
- No Georgia Daughter shall serve in the same Meadow Garden Chairmanship more than three (3) consecutive terms.
- In addition to the six appointments to the Board which are made by the State Regent, she shall appoint two (2) Honorary State Regents.
- The State Second Vice Regent shall serve as ex-officio member of the Meadow Garden Board, being given the privilege of the floor without a vote.
- The State Regent shall serve as Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board, and the State First Vice Regent shall serve as Secretary of the Meadow Garden Board.
 - 7. The Meadow Garden Board shall met a minimum of three (3) times each year; namely, preceding State Board of Management meeting, preceding annual State Conference and following Continental Congress, and at such other times as deemed necessary by the Chairman of the Meadow Garden Board. At least one (1) meeting of the Board shall be held at Meadow Garden each year. The Board may vote by teleconference, fax or email, if necessary.
 - 8. The Meadow Garden Board shall have jurisdiction over the operation, maintenance and work of Meadow Garden and shall be the authority for Meadow Garden as long as such authority is not in conflict with the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, the Act of Incorporation for the Georgia State Society, Resolutions adopted by the Georgia State Society and/or directions which from time to time may be approved by action of the Georgia State Society assembled at its annual State Conference.
- The Meadow Garden Board shall supervise the placing of all insurance to cover the grounds and the Historic House and its contents, including the fine arts, with accredited companies – coverage to include fire, theft and liability.
- Five (5) voting members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.
- Minutes shall be kept of each meeting and a copy shall be sent to each member and printed verbatim in the State Proceedings.

12. All expenses for maintenance, operation and purchases of furnishings and plantings shall be authorized by the State Regent, as Chairman of the Board, and paid by the State Treasurer. Expenditures exceeding \$1,000.00 must have the majority approval of the Board.

These rules will be binding on the actions of the Board in their operation of 13. Meadow Garden. They may be changed by the following procedure: Members of the Board must have written notification of proposed changes one month prior to the next meeting of the Board; a two-thirds vote of the Board and approval of the State Conference are necessary to effect a change.

14. The State Regent shall appoint a Meadow Garden Advisory Board, which would act in an advisory capacity only and be composed of no more than

fifteen (15) members representing various areas of expertise.

- 11 **OPERATIONS**

1. Everyone entering Meadow Garden will be requested to sign the Register, including date, time of arrival and time of departure.

2. No more than fifteen (15) people with each Docent are to be on tour in the house at a given time. Excess of this number may wait in the reception room or in the garden. The House Manager has the authority to enforce the Meadow Garden rules at all times.

3. There will be no smoking on Meadow Garden property.

No refreshments are to be served in or taken into the Historic House by 4. visitors, including chapters or the public. Should a group, such as a visiting chapter, desire refreshments, the garden is available for use if litter is properly disposed of by the serving group.

Tour visitors will be asked to pay a fee as set by the Board. 5.

6. In August 2006 Dixie Lock and Safe, Inc., installed new locks and keys were made which cannot be duplicated. The State Regent, State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Manager by the direction of one of the two above, are authorized to have new keys made for Meadow Garden.

There shall be two (2) complete sets of keys to Meadow Garden, which are eight (8) keys per set. There shall be four (4) sets of keys comprised of three (3) keys per set, which are the back door key to the historic house, the key to the George Walton Heritage Education Center, and the gate key. There shall be one (1) set of keys for "house" use, which are three (3) keys, one for the kitchen, one for the exterior bath at the historic house, and one for the interior door between the dining room and the old gift shop area. These three (3) "house" keys shall be kept in the old gift shop area for accessibility to all for use on a daily basis. There shall be one (1) gate key assigned to the landscape service company.

Keys are lettered per door of entry: Key # A is to the deadbolt of the three (3) doors of the George Walton Heritage Education Center; Key # B is to the deadbolt lock on the back door of the historic house; Key # C is to the gate; Key # D is to the Stribling Room in the George Walton Heritage Education Center; Key # E is to the kitchen; Key # F is to the deadbolt for the exterior bath at the historic house; Key # G is to the interior door between the dining room and the old gift shop; Key # H is to the office upstairs in the historic

house.

Keys are numbered and assigned according to the appointed position on the Meadow Garden Board or as designated. Keys are distributed to the assigned person when they sign a "Meadow Garden Key Distribution Form." When this assigned person leaves her current position, she returns the keys and signs the same form she had signed when she accepted the keys. Keys go with the appointed position not the person.

Distribution of the keys: Key # 1 to State Regent, Chairman of Meadow Garden Board (complete set of 8 keys); Key # 2 to Meadow Garden Manager (complete set of 8 keys); Key # 3 to Chairman of Meadow Garden (keys A, B, C); Key # 4 to Docents Chairman (keys A, B, C); Key # 5 to Landscaping Chairman (keys A, B, C); Key # 6 for General Docent use (keys A, B, C) – to be checked "out" and "in" when used; Key # 7 are "house" keys (keys E, F, G); Key # 8 to landscape service (key C).

III VOLUNTEERS AND DOCENTS

 Docents, shall be those well screened and trained volunteers who will serve under the direct supervision of a Meadow Garden Chairman and/or the House Manager.

Duties of docents shall include acting as guides, hostesses, working in gift shop, working in yard, cleaning in house, public relations. No volunteer work at or for Meadow Garden shall be done except under the direct guidance of the Meadow Garden Board and the chairman of the specific committee for that particular function.

 Cleaning or yard work volunteers shall be under the direction of the House Manager.

IV FURNISHINGS

- Items bought or accepted for the older section of Meadow Garden must predate 1821.
- (a) the front room on the main floor, known as the Augusta Room, will be designed as an interpretive center, highlighting people, events, and memorabilia related to George Walton and to the history of Meadow Garden; (b) the back room on the main floor, formerly known as the Board Room, will be used as a gift shop; (c) the front room on the upper floor of the newer section will be furnished as a bedroom/study of the period pre-dating 1850 or be used to display historically significant items relating to Meadow Garden, Augusta and Georgia; (d) the back room on the upper floor of the newer section will be used as an office for the Meadow Garden manager and for storage and supplies for the gift shop.
- Reproductions may be used only when the physical condition of the antiques is jeopardized by exposure in areas where large numbers of visitors have easy access; or when environmental conditions including excessive light, dust, humidity or airborne impurities pose a threat to the preservation of originals.
- 4. Effective March 12, 1983 all items donated to Meadow Garden shall be accepted with the written condition that they become the property of Meadow Garden and may be used, replaced or sold at the discretion of the Meadow Garden Board only.

All items that post date 1821, with the exception of those in the six (6) rooms
of the newer section and those described in Number 3 of this section, shall
be replaced as soon as possible with similar items pre-dating 1821.

 Once an item is placed, it shall not be moved from one location to another without permission of the Meadow Garden Chairman of Furnishings who shall report such changes to the Meadow Garden Board in a timely manner.

 Any item donated or purchased must have written documentation of appraisal.

No items and/or furnishings shall be accepted "on loan".

- 9. A file will be kept of all assets with information as to price paid or market value, date of acquisition, donor or where bought, documentation and appraisal and a description of article. One file will be kept in the reception room accessible to the Docents; a duplicate file will be in the possession of the Chairman of the Board. The Meadow Garden Chairman of Furnishings shall maintain and keep current the "Past and Perfect" Program on all items and furnishings.
- All items purchased or donated will be added to the Fine Arts insurance policy. Said policy will be reviewed and updated a minimum of once a year. Major additions to furnishings will be added immediately.

 Future plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the Historic House.

V LANDSCAPING

- The landscape plan adopted by the Board shall be adhered to with no deviation unless recommended by an authority on landscape design and care.
- Donations of shrubbery, plants or trees shall be accepted only when item is part of the master plan.
- Work on the grounds will be under the sole direction of the Meadow Garden Board and the Landscaping Chairman. Supervision of actual work will be provided by the Meadow Garden Chairman or the Landscaping Chairman of Meadow Garden.

VI GIFT SHOP

- The Chairman of the committee will be responsible for all purchases, subject to the approval of the Board or the State Regent. The Vice Chairman shall assist the Gift Shop Chairman with sales at state functions.
- Gift Shop operations will be self-supporting. In the event funds are needed for purchases, they may be advanced from available Meadow Garden funds and must be considered a loan and shall be repaid without interest within one (1) year from date of borrowing.
- Profit from the Gift Shop shall be accounted for within the State Treasurer's books, with a percentage being transferred at the discretion of the Board at the end of the fiscal year and placed in the Maintenance Account. The audit of the Gift Shop operation shall be included in the annual audit of the Georgia State Society.

This information will be publicized in the Meadow Garden brochure and other appropriate places as determined by the Board.

- Chapter gifts, above the State Honor Roll requirements, automatically qualify the chapter to be recognized at an appropriate giving level determined by the categories listed in #2.
- The State Treasurer will report these gifts to the Patrons Chairman.
- The Patrons Chairman will issue certificates to the qualifying individuals and chapters or groups.
- A permanent book will be kept on public display at Meadow Garden to record the names of those who give at the Patrons level or above.
- The Patrons Chairman will enter the names of donors in the appropriate book a minimum of once a year.
- 8. The Meadow Garden Patrons book shall be divided into four parts: (1) Individuals who give a minimum of fifty dollars in one payment, and chapters, organizations, businesses or groups that give a minimum of one hundred dollars in one payment; (2) In-Kind Patrons approved by the Meadow Garden Board in recognition of outstanding and/or unusual gifts of time, talents or expertise toward the betterment of Meadow Garden; (3) Honoraria, which shall list individuals or groups honored by a Patron gift as designated in #1, such listing to show the name of honoree (Patron) and the donor; (4) Memorials of at least fifty dollars which shall list the name of the individual memorialized and the name of the donor

VIII PLAQUES & MARKERS

Plaques/Markers may be placed at Meadow Garden only at the discretion of the Board, and request meets the following criteria: Substantial service and/or contributions that secured the property and the heritage for the GSDAR. Individuals so recognized shall have been deceased for at least 5 years; Plaque/Marker will be paid for by person(s) requesting such recognition.

Such plaques will be permanently displayed at Meadow Garden and a record
of the honoree's service and/or contribution will be recorded and placed in
the Meadow Garden file, with Board approval.

 Plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the Historic House. Additional markers shall not be permanently placed on the grounds.

Bylaws GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Article II OBJECTS

The objects of this Society shall be:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties

of American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

Article III MEMBERSHIP

All chapters of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution located within the State of Georgia shall be members of the Georgia State Society.

Article IV OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a State Regent, a State First Vice Regent, a State Second Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian and a State Curator.

Section 2. (a) To be eligible for state office, a member shall hold and have held membership in a chapter or chapters within the Georgia State Society for at least 5 years prior to her election and have served a full term as chapter officer or state chairman.

(b) No member shall be eligible to the same state office for two (2) successive terms. A member having served more than one half of a term in a state office shall be deemed to have served a full term.

(c) No two state officers shall be members of the same chapter with the possible

exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.

(d) To be eligible for the office of State Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State First Vice Regent or as State Second Vice Regent or served in each of these

two offices of the Georgia Society.

(e) To be eligible for the office of State First Vice Regent or for the office of State Second Vice Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State Recording Secretary or as State Treasurer of the Georgia State Society and shall have served a full term as a Chapter Regent of a chapter in the Georgia State Society.

Section 3. In recognition of valuable service to the Georgia State Society, a State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent for life by a majority vote of the State Conference.

Article V
NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. (a) A candidate for state office shall request the endorsement of her chapter, taken by vote at a regular meeting of the chapter held between May and January preceding the State Conference at which state elections are held. The endorsement, signed by the Chapter Recording Secretary, shall include the office the candidate seeks and shall be received by the State Regent with the candidate's statement of intent to be a candidate prior to any announcement or campaigning by the candidate and/or her supporters.

(b) A candidate for State Regent who wishes to present a slate of officers shall send to the State Regent in one packet the chapter endorsements and the statements of intent for each of her selected candidates. If received by the State Regent no later than December 1, these candidates shall be listed as a slate in the State Regent's Call to State Conference.

(c) Candidates wishing to run independently of a slate, whose chapter endorsements and statements of intent are received by the State Regent no later than December 1 shall be listed as independent candidates in the State Regent's Call to State Conference.

(d) A candidate whose chapter endorsement and statement of intent have been properly received by the State Regent may choose to announce her candidacy separate from the State Regent's Call to State Conference. Such a chapter endorsement and statement of intent shall be received by the State Regent at least ten (10) days prior to the opening of the State Conference at which the election is to take place.

(e) A candidate who does not meet the requirements of these Bylaws shall be declared

disqualified and ineligible for consideration for state office.

- (f) A chapter shall endorse no more than one chapter member for state office per election with the possible exception of candidates for State Regent and for State Corresponding Secretary.
- (g) In the event of the death, incapacitation or withdrawal of a candidate prior to the election, a replacement shall be made with notification in writing to the State Regent and accompanied by the chapter endorsement and statement of intent as directed by these Bylaws.

Section 2. Nominations of candidates for all state offices shall be made at a designated meeting of the State Conference.

Section 3. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected biennially by ballot at the State Conference. A majority vote shall elect. Independent candidates shall be listed on the ballot in a separate column from those candidates presented as a slate.

Section 4. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two (2) years or until their successors are elected. Their terms of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and the State First Vice

Regent are confirmed.

Section 5. (a) Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become State Regent and the State Second Vice Regent shall become State First Vice Regent subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. Vacancies in other state offices shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next State Board of Management meeting or State Conference, whichever shall come first.

(b) Any state officer who is absent from the state for a continuous period of six (6)

months or longer shall automatically relinquish her position as a state officer.

Section 6. Upon the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Organizing Secretary General.

Section 7. (a) A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by

a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot.

(b) The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for

endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than eighteen (18) months

in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.

(c) The endorsement shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent with the candidate's name and address to the Recording Secretary General to be received by the first day of the month preceding the designated Continental Congress.

Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall perform the duties prescribed in this article, and parliamentary authority adopted by the Society, and such others as the State Board of Management and the National Society may require.

Section 2. The State Regent shall:

(a) be the chief executive officer and the official spokesman for the State Society;

(b) have general supervision of the affairs of the State Society;

- (c) preside at all meetings of the State Conference, State Board of Management and the Executive Committee:
- (d) appoint a State Chairman for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society;

(e) be ex-officio a member of all committees;

(f) appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as advisor in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting;

(g) sign all contracts and agreements made in the name of the Georgia State Society with the recorded approval of the Executive Committee and the State Board of Management or the State Conference as directed by these Bylaws;

(h) be bonded and have the authority to draw upon funds of the State Society with the

approval of the Finance Committee.

 (i) recommend to the Finance Committee a Certified Public Accountant who shall be approved by the Finance Committee.

Section 3. The State First Vice Regent shall:

 (a) perform the duties of the office of State Regent in the absence or inability of the State Regent;

(b) fill a vacancy in the office of State Regent;

(c) Perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;

(d) serve on those committees as designated by these Bylaws and as directed by the State Regent.

Section 4. The State Second Vice Regent shall:

(a) perform the duties of the office of State First Vice Regent in the absence or inability of the State First Vice Regent;

(b) fill a vacancy in the office of State First Vice Regent:

(c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;

(d) serve on committees as directed by the State Regent.

Section 5. The State Chaplain shall:

- (a) open all meetings of the State Conference and the State Board of Management with scripture reading and prayer;
- (b) preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and conduct such other religious services as may be required;

(c) be custodian of state properties pertaining to the duties of this office:

(d) be responsible for IN MEMORIAM pages in the Proceedings.

Section 6. The State Recording Secretary shall:

 (a) record the proceedings of the meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee;

(b) compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and the Proceedings Committee.

(c) submit to the appropriate National officers, the endorsement for Vice President General and the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent by the first day of the month preceding the month of Continental Congress of the year in which said balloting was held:

Section 7. The State Corresponding Secretary shall:

- (a) conduct correspondence and send notices on behalf of the State Regent, the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee as may be directed by them;
- (b) receive from the chapters the Master Questionnaires and distribute to the appropriate state chairmen.

Section 8. The State Organizing Secretary shall:

- (a) assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new chapters;
- (b) assist chapters in conjunction with appropriate state officers and chairmen in revitalization.

Section 9. The State Treasurer shall:

- (a) be bonded;
- (b) be the custodian of the funds of the State Society, placing them in institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance;
- (c) receive the state dues and State Conference registration fees from the chapters and receive all sums contributed by the chapters for state and national projects, disbursing monthly to the Treasurer General all funds designated for national projects;

(d) disburse other funds only when authorized by the State Regent in writing;

- (e) keep an account of all sums received or disbursed by using the basic double entry form of bookkeeping according to accepted accounting procedures and keep receipts for all transactions;
- (f) prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference, sending a copy to the State Chairman of the Finance Committee ten (10) days in advance of each meeting;
- (g) be a member of the Finance Committee and an ex-officio member of the Credentials Committee:
- (h) balance and prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year; said audit by a Certified Public Accountant, shall be performed and delivered within forty-five (45) days of receipt of books.
- (i) An internal review of the State Treasurer's records shall be performed when a change in this office occurs after the close of the fiscal year. Following the review, the records shall be turned over to the new State Treasurer. The committee to review the books shall be composed of the State First Vice Regent, the immediate Past State Treasurer, the immediate past Finance Chairman and a current Chapter Regent appointed by the State Regent.

Section 10. The State Registrar shall:

- (a) when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution prove eligibility and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars;
 - (b) keep a correct list of all members in the state;
 - (c) report on membership to the State Conference;
 - (d) assist with the verification of the credentials;
- (e) be in possession of the computer and software owned by the Georgia State Society and see that it is maintained.

Section 11. The State Historian shall:

- (a) be in charge, within the state, of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General as well as those authorized by the Georgia State Society;
- (b) keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves within the state;
 - (c) prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General:

(d) promote the study of American history, state and county history and historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the founding of our state and counties.

Section 12. The State Librarian shall:

(a) serve as liaison between the Librarian General and the Georgia Chapters and disseminate general information on the NSDAR Library;

(b) cooperate with the director of the Georgia Department of Archives and History,

making the needs of the Archives known to the chapters;

(c) collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing them wherever accepted in such libraries and Archives as may be chosen by the State Board of Management;

(d) solicit, with the approval of the Executive Committee, contributions from the chapters for purchase of such books as requested by the office of the Librarian General, and/or the

various libraries in Georgia which the State Society approves;

(e) receive gifts of books and other printed material from the chapters to be donated to

the approved libraries and Archives;

(f) maintain a constant supply of bookplates to the NSDAR Library, the Georgia Department of Archives and History and for purchase by the chapters.

Section 13. The State Curator shall: be custodian of the State portable properties and

shall have them properly stored and made ready for use at state meetings.

Section 14. All officers will keep a Procedure Book of Instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new officers to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

Article VII MEETINGS

Section 1. State Conference:

- a) The annual meeting of the Georgia State Society shall be known as the State Conference. It shall be for the purpose of:
 - (1) receiving reports of officers, committees and Chapter Regents;

(2) electing officers biennially:

(3) promoting programs in furtherance of the objects of the Society;

(4) any other business that may arise:i. annual budget shall be adopted,

ii. all projects of the State Society requiring funding shall be voted upon at State Conference or ratified by members at State Conference if previously voted upon by the State Board of Management,

iii. no project extending beyond the term of the presiding officer may be

accepted at any meeting other than by vote at State Conference.

(b) The State Conference will be held between February 1 and the time of the meeting of Continental Congress, but shall not convene during Holy Week;

(c) The State Regent shall fix the time and place of meetings;

(d) The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credentials form to the chapters not less than sixty (60) days before the time of the State Conference.

Section 2. The voting members of the State Conference shall be:

(a) the officers and Honorary State Regents of the State Society;(b) the officers and honorary officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state;

(c) the Chapter Regent, or in her absence, the Vice Regent or alternate of each chapter;

(d) delegates or alternates of each chapter of the state as designated by the Bylaws of

the National Society for representation at Continental Congress.

Section 3. Only a chapter member in good standing whose credentials have been completed in accordance with the instructions of the State Regent and the State Credentials Chairman for the State Conference and in accordance with the Standing Rules of the National Society shall be eligible to represent her chapter at state and national meetings.

Section 4. A member shall have belonged to a chapter not less than one year before

she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the chapter, except in the case of the Regent or Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter.

Section 5. A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at an annual State Conference, shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.

Section 6. Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the state of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.

Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference the privilege of the floor and the right to speak shall be accorded to the State Chairmen and State Vice Chairmen. They

may not vote unless they are duly registered as voters of the State Conference.

Section 8. Special meetings of the State Society may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen (15) days' notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.

Section 9. Forty-five (45) voting members, representing not less than twenty (20) chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.

Article VIII STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The state officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents and the Regents, or in their absence, the Vice Regents of the chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting in the fall, following the October meeting of the National Board, It may meet whenever called by the State Regent. A minimum of twenty (20) days' notice shall be given as to the time and place of any such meeting.

Section 3. Thirty (30) members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of

Management.

Section 4. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference or as proscribed by these Bylaws.

Section 5. State chairmen, vice chairmen, committee members of the National and Standing Committees may attend the meetings of the State Board of Management and shall be granted the privilege of the floor and the right to speak, but shall not vote. One (1) member from each chapter may attend the meetings, if invited by the chapter regent, and shall be granted the privilege of the floor, but shall not have the right to speak or vote.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of

Management, but may not vote.

Article IX EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, shall attend the meetings, but may not vote.

Section 3. This Executive Committee shall:

- (a) perform such duties of the State Board of Management between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient;
- (b) meet at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three (3) members of the committee;
 - (c) vote by teleconference, e-mail or fax, if necessary;
- (d) receive and make recommendations for projects requiring expenditure of funds outside routine expenditures to be considered by the State Conference;
 - (e) make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.
- Section 4. Decisions of the Executive Committee shall be acted upon at the next meeting of the State Board of Management or at State Conference, whichever shall come first.

Article X FINANCES

Section 1. (a) The fiscal year of the Georgia State Society shall be July 1 through the

last day of June.

b) The annual budget, prepared by the Finance Committee, shall cover the fiscal year and be prepared on the basis of dues payable for the calendar year beginning December first preceding.

(c) The Finance Committee shall propose the per capita amount and

distribute according to the annual membership count. The per capita amount and distribution shall be indicated on the budget presented annually. Funds to be included in the per capita designations shall be Tamassee DAR School, Kate Duncan Smith DAR School, Berry College, Lucy Cook Peel Fund, McCall Genealogical Fund and Meadow Garden Maintenance.

Section 2. The annual dues of chapters to the Georgia State Society shall be \$10.00 for each member of the chapter, to be paid to the State Treasurer on or before December 1.

Section 3. (a) Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the state dues, a conference registration fee of \$10.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under these Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether chapter is represented or not.

(b) State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay a conference fee of \$10.00 at

the time of registration.

(c) Other members of the Georgia State Society who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a conference fee of \$7.00 at the time of registration.

(d) All host chapters may charge a registration fee to those not purchasing a meal ticket

to off-set the cost of hosting state/district meetings.

Section 4. (a) The State Treasurer and the State Regent and such others entrusted with funds of the Georgia State Society as may be designated by the State Board of Management shall be bonded. (See Article VI, Sections 2 and 9);

(b) The State Treasurer with the approval of the State Regent and the State Chairman of the Finance Committee shall place the funds of the Georgia State Society in financial institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to

exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage;

(c) The placement of restricted savings funds and investment funds of the Georgia State Society shall be placed to the credit of the Georgia State Society by the State Treasurer under the direction of the Finance Committee. Monies may be invested in U. S. Treasury obligations or other interest bearing obligations of federally insured financial institutions;

(d) The accounts of the State Treasurer shall be annually prepared for audit by a Certified Public Accountant immediately following the end of the State Society fiscal year

and no later than July 15 and delivered to the CPA by that date;

(e) Should the State Treasurer be incapacitated, the State Regent, after consultation with the Chairman of the Finance Committee and with the approval of the Executive Committee, shall appoint an Acting State Treasurer to serve until such time as the State Treasurer is able to resume her duties or a new State Treasurer is appointed and ratified as stated in Article V, Section 5 (a).

Section 5. The expenses incurred by the State Regent in the performance of duty shall

be paid each year from the State Dues Fund:

(a) Five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) shall be taken each year to defray her necessary travel expenses;

(b) Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent, as budgeted, shall be paid by the State Treasurer who shall keep all receipts of these expenses. No expenses exceeding the budgeted amount shall be paid by the State Treasurer.

Section 6. At the close of the books annually, \$5,000.00 shall be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies Fund" so that at the end of each administration a total of \$10,000.00 will be reserved. This money is to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration.

Article XI COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Honorary State Regents of the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution shall function as an advisory committee to the State Regent and to the Georgia State Society.

Section 2. The State Regent shall appoint the following standing committees:

- (a) Bylaws: An Honorary State Regent shall be appointed as chairman and the committee shall be composed of two (2) other Honorary State Regents and one (1) member from each district;
- (b) Finance: This committee shall be composed of seven (7) members to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, two (2) Honorary State Regents, one (1) active chapter regent and one (1) active chapter member, who shall not be an Honorary State Regent, nor a state officer, nor a chapter regent. One of the two Honorary State Regents shall be appointed chairman. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund. This committee shall have charge of all investments of the Georgia State Society funds.

(c) Resolutions: This committee shall be composed of all Honorary State Regents, the

State Parliamentarian and three (3) chapter members;

(d) Proceedings: This committee shall be composed of the State Recording Secretary, the immediate past State Recording Secretary, State First Vice Regent and four (4)

additional Daughters, at least one of whom shall be an Honorary State Regent.

Section 3. The State Regent shall appoint such other committees, standing or special, as the State Conference shall authorize and actions of the State Board of Management and of the National Society shall require. The appointments shall be concurrent with the term of the State Regent making the appointments and shall terminate with the end of the administration.

Section 4. Additional appointments may be made to any of the committees and vacancies shall be filled by the State Regent with timely notification to the membership.

Section 5. The duties of committees shall be such as these Bylaws, the State Conference, the State Board of Management or the National Society shall prescribe.

Section 6. All chairmen will keep a Procedure Book of instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

Article XII CHAPTERS

Section 1. To expedite the work of the Society, the chapters of the Georgia State Society shall be placed in geographical districts:

(a) A chairman appointed by the State Regent shall coordinate the work of all chapters

as needed; she shall be titled "Coordinator of Districts";

(b) Each district shall have a Director appointed by the State Regent to work as a committee under the direction and supervision of the Coordinator of Districts and the State Regent.

Section 2. Chapter elections shall be held no later than April 1 in the year of chapter elections. The Chapter Regent shall report annually the names of the elected officers promptly on the form provided by the State Regent for this purpose, with copies to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, and the State Recording Secretary.

Section 3. The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent, the State Recording Secretary, and the District Director at the time designated by

the State Regent.

Article XIII MEADOW GARDEN

Meadow Garden, property owned by the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, shall be operated as follows:

(a) The governing body shall be the Board of Trustees composed of the following members: the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Chairman who shall be appointed by the State Regent;

(b) The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the following members: the State Regent who shall serve as Chairman; the State First Vice Regent who shall serve as Secretary; the Chairman of Meadow Garden; the Regents of the Augusta and College Hill Chapters; the State Treasurer; two (2) Honorary State Regents; and the chairmen of the six (6) subcommittees appointed by the State Regent - Docents, Furnishings, Landscaping, Gift Shop, Patrons and Public Relations.

(c) The Meadow Garden Board shall operate with Standing Rules approved by the State

Conference.

Article XIV RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. The current edition of Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised, shall be the governing authority in Parliamentary Law in matters not covered by these Bylaws.

Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

Article XV **AMENDMENTS**

Section 1. The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent, the State Parliamentarian, and the State Bylaws Chairman. The State Regent shall send a copy to each chapter, at least sixty (60) days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the Call to Conference.

Section 2. Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which

it is so adopted.

Article XVI DISSOLUTION

Although the period of duration of the Georgia State Society is perpetual, if for any reason the State Society is to be dissolved or otherwise terminated, no part of the property of the Society or any of the proceeds shall be distributed to or inure to the benefit of any of the officers or members of the Society. Upon the dissolution of the Georgia State Society, assets shall be distributed by the Board of Management and/or the Executive Committee to and only to the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the local United States District Court, exclusively to such organization or organizations as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated within the meaning of section 501 (c)(3), with purposes and objectives consistent with those of the Georgia State Society.

State Conferences

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year, a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24, 1899. Bylaws were adopted and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21) No Conference was held in 1911, the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912," and amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, page 211).

AWARDS

All Chapters competing for awards must send reports to the respective chairmen by February 15. All reports for awards are based on membership confirmed by the National Society. SEE FIGURE BESIDE CHAPTER NAME IN CHAPTER REGENTS' DIRECTORY. The reporting year is March 1 – February 28.

BYLAWS

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National or State Bylaws, and a current copy is to be filed with the State Parliamentarian.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS

Notice of change of address of members shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, State Regent, State Corresponding Secretary, and the State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHANGE OF NAME

Notice of change of name of members shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, and the State Registrar by the Chapter Treasurer.

CHAPTER ELECTIONS

As chapter elections are to be held before April 1, names of officers shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General, 1776 D Street, NW, Washington, DC 2006-5303, the State Regent or the State Regent-Elect, the State Recording Secretary and the State Corresponding Secretary by April 1. The full Christian name of chapter officers shall be given, along with her husband's given name or initials, address, zip code, telephone number, fax and e-mail. In accordance with the National Bylaws, a Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years.

CHAPTER REPRESENTATION AT STATE AND NATIONAL MEETINGS

At the State Board of Management a chapter is represented by the Chapter Regent, or in her absence by the First Vice Regent, and one non-voting member, if invited by the Chapter Regent.

The voting representation of each chapter at State Conference and Continental Congress shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current

year have been received in the Office of the Treasurer General by December 1. Membership 12-19: Regent only; 20-49: Regent + 1 delegate = 2 votes; 50-99: Regent + 2 delegates = 3 votes; 100-149: Regent + 3 delegates = 4 votes; 150-199: Regent + 4 delegates = 5 votes; 200-249: Regent + 5 delegates = 6 votes; 250-299: Regent + 6 delegates = 7 votes. Chapters with membership of 300 and over will have an additional delegate for each additional 50 members exceeding 299.

CONFERENCE REGISTRATION

On or before December 1, each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer the state dues and a Conference Registration fee of \$10.00 per each delegate to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws. This fee is to be paid whether represented or not and is derived by recommendation of the Finance Committee to the Executive Committee. This is a requirement stated in the Georgia State Bylaws, Article X, Section 3 (a).

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the Conference Registration Fee of \$10.00 at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters, shall pay a Conference Registration Fee of \$7.00 at the time of registration.

CONTRIBUTIONS

All contributions by chapters for State and National work shall be made through the State Treasurer.

The deadline for chapter contributions to the Georgia co-op ads sent to the State Chairman, DAR Magazine is February 28. The checks are to be made payable to the State Chairman, DAR Magazine and sent to her.

DATE FOR ANNUAL AUDIT

The Georgia State Society Fiscal Year is July 1 to June 30. State Bylaws, Article X, Section 1 (a). The State Treasurer should prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year. Bylaw Article VI, Section 9 (h).

DEADLINES

State Officers and Chairmen welcome chapter reports when completed. Deadline dates are given to ensure conformity for inclusion in reports to National Officers. Per National Society Bylaws, the deadline date is determined by the Federal Postal Service or other carrier, showing cancellation date and not by the date reports are received.

DECEASED MEMBERS

Deaths shall be reported promptly to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Chaplain and the State Registrar by the corresponding Chapter officer. A complete list of deceased members giving Christian name, husband's name and date of death shall be furnished to the State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for the Conference Memorial Service and for State Proceedings.

DUES

Before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer sends to the State Treasurer state dues of \$10.00 per member. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the December through February Board meeting of the National Society. Before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer sends to the office of the Organizing Secretary General National dues of \$30.00 per member except Life Members, with check made payable to the Treasurer General NSDAR.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS

To insure uniformity and convenience in binding, all records shall be typewritten on one side of paper, 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 11 inches, with 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches from top of page, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 inches on left side, 1 inch on right side and at bottom. Two copies shall be sent to the State Chairman of Genealogical Records. The booklet, "Instructions for Copying Source Records and Their Preparation for Library Use," should be obtained from the Corresponding Secretary General.

GEORGIA HOSPITALITY FUND

"WHEREAS, the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds a social event in Washington during Continental Congress which necessitates expenditures for decorations and guests invited by the Georgia Society:

Margins should be 1/2 inches from the top of page, 1 1/2 inches from left side, 1 inch from right side, and 1 inch from bottom of page. Chapter Regents should exclude NSDAR Chapter Achievement Award and State Honor Roll, as these will be added when confirmed. Your name should be consistent with the lists of Chapter Regents and State Chairmen as found in this Proceeding. Winners of awards and awards to be offered shall each be listed on separate sheets identified with the title of the committee and the award. Reports and awards to be sent to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary by the following deadlines: Chapter Regents by February 1; State Officers and State Chairmen by March 1.

MINUTES OF ANNUAL MEETING 25 MARCH 2010
