WHEREAS, The President General, Mrs. Henry Stewart Jones, has selected as her project a gift of ceiling murals for a corridor in the United States Capitol, to be planned and executed by the famous artist, Allyn Cox, to commemorate the "Spirit of '76"; and,

WHEREAS, The National Board of Management unanimously endorsed this project at its January meeting; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED: That the Georgia State Society NSDAR endorse the project of the President General and commend her for this selection which is needed, is timely, and will give the DAR a lasting place in the history of our Nation's Capitol.

BALANCED NATIONAL BUDGET

Letters and report blanks were sent to each Chapter Regent and the Chapter Historians when known, in the fall of 1974. Sixty-eight chapters reported.

Contributions of money and two items were made to the Americana Collection. Historical programs reported numbered 227; radio programs, 1491, and TV programs, 18. One hundred seventeen historical tours were arranged. Graves marked included those of five Revolutionary Soldiers, one daughter and two wives of Revolutionary Soldiers, and 65 DAR members. Graves of Revolutionary soldiers which had been marked in earlier years but were not recorded at National Headquarters were relocated and the necessary proof submitted. Seven historical restorations were begun, one completed and one marked.

Each chapter observed American History Month, a number with proclamations by local officials. Many sponsored the Essay contest and presented silver and bronze medals as well as certificates, books and other prizes. Letters were written to U. S. Congressmen and Senators urging that February be designated permanently as American History Month.

Contributions of funds, books, and microfilm to libraries within the state as well as to National projects were numerous. Letters of inquiry for information from out-of-state parties have been answered promptly.

The Georgia State Society has placed our official DAR marker at the grave of Mrs. Julius Y. Talmadge, Honorary President-General, in Oconee Hill Cemetery, Athens, Georgia. It was dedicated on March 13 at the time of the State Conference.

The work as a State Officer has been made delightful by the cooperation of our capable State Regent.

Approximate book values and cash given to National, State, and local library funds by the Georgia Society and Chapters amounted to \$12,273.00. Forty-four Chapters gave \$176.00 to NSDAR Library and fifty-one gave \$336.50 to State Library Fund, which includes \$161.75 designated by twelve Chapters for the Revolution Pensions Film Project at Georgia Archives. Local library gifts amounted to \$11,268.80, according to reports from sixty-four Chapters.

Georgia Society sent Librarian General two Request Books and fifty-six Georgia bookplates, plus thirteen additional books, five pamphlets, one manuscript, and one chart.

Reports from 76 chapters were received. The Treasurer shared data from the remaining 23. Eighty-nine chapters contributed these cash sums on the listed purposes: To Bacone College, Scholarships—\$359.90, Miscellaneous—\$242.00, Endowment of Chair in Silversmithing—\$120.00. To St. Mary's School, Scholarships—\$367.00, Misc.—\$188.00, National Project (Bus)—\$143.00. To American Indians Fund—\$146.00. Total \$1565.90.

Clothing weighing 302 lbs. valued at \$834.50 shipped to Bacone. Shipment of 673 lbs., valued at \$666.25 sent to St. Mary's. Other types assistance included \$10.00 on roof repair to Bacone, \$25.00 to a Columbus TV station Indian Scholarship Fund, \$30.00 on a portrait of Mrs. Susie Yellowtail to be placed in a Columbus Museum, \$50.00 sent to Bacone to which Quaker Oats Co. added \$150.00.

Full length programs presented by 23 chapters telling of the Indian, past and present, in Georgia. Speakers named included Chief Tall Pine, Chief of Lower Muskogee Creeks, Mrs. Addie George, Indian Trading Post, Ocmulgee National Monument, Mr. Eugene C. Black, Atty., Albany, Mr. Tom Eubanks, Assistant State Archeologist, Mrs. Harold Brewer, Elijah Clark Chapter, Mrs. Dorothy Wright Normandy, Washington, Ga., Mrs. E. B. Claxton, Dublin and several instructors from nearby colleges. Other programs featured Bacone and St. Mary's in slides, stories and posters. Tours made to Etowah Mounds and New Echota.

AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP

As chairman of this committee it was a pleasure to receive reports from 62 chapters. It is to be hoped that every chapter will send in a report next year so that we can have 100% participation.

There has been a great deal of interest in the awards phase of this committee. One Americanism medal was given and several applications are awaiting approval. Four Medal of Honor awards were presented, with others pending.

58 chapters repeated The American's Creed at their meetings and 42 devoted one full program to Americanism. There were 10 talks on Americanism to other organizations and 15 Americanization programs on radio and TV.

There were 1503 DAR Manuals for Citizenship given for use in Americanization classes and 87 for other purposes. 52 chapters had representation at naturalization courts and chapter members served 715 hours on committees to reduce illiteracy and other problems. 12 chapters studied the Immigration Act and 5 programs were sent to the Program Reviewing Committee. 939 American's Creed cards, 1123 Flag Codes, 16 Flag pins, 358 Flag of the United States cards, 1,032 Welcome cards, 736 patriotic leaflets and pamphlets and 1,502 other gifts were distributed.

Fifty four reports were received from chapter conservation chairmen. Five chapters participated in the planting and developing of Green Belts and Patches around and within their urban areas, along with their own planting of trees and flowering shrubs. Other interesting work in the state included the writing and presenting of a conservation play, a dedication of a tree, participation in a scholarship program to send children to a Conservation Workshop, the donation of books to libraries, and the promoting of conservation education through scholarships. Mrs. Rigdon, Conservation Chairman of the Oglethorpe chapter was honored by the Soil Conservation Society of America. Her latest contribution was \$5000 for the Conservation Writer Award. Letters of information and instruction were sent to all chapters in September. Questionnaires for reporting were sent the first of January. Of the 100 chapters, 90 sent in reports, of these 70 made monetary contributions.

According to the State Treasurer's record, a total sum of \$1608.00 was contributed for all Museum funds including the Proposed Georgia Room which led with the sum of \$723.00.

DAR SCHOOL

95 chapters reported, showing a total of \$13,082.21 contributed to the schools. This total included the per capita gifts from the State Society. Contributed to the State Regent's Project at Tamassee which is the renovation of the May Erwin Talmadge Gym and Auditorium was the sum of \$2590.29; scholarship contributions totaled \$3003.50; other items

included Christmas gifts totaled \$932.00. The Donations to the State Regent's Project at Kate Duncan Smith, which is the renovation of a classroom in Old Main in memory of Mrs. Julius Y. Talmadge, totaled \$2652.29; scholarship gifts were \$1722.25; other gifts totaled \$455.00. The State Regent's Project at Berry will be the construction of several flagstone walkways. Gifts to Berry totaled \$672.88 for this project and \$756.50 for scholarships. Gifts to the other approved schools totaled \$1277.50 73 programs given on Tamasee; 76 on Kate Duncan Smith; 50 on Berry, Crossnore and Hillside; 49 on Hindman and Northland. 415 packages of clothing, totaling 10,083 pounds were sent to the schools at a cost of \$544.20. Many packages were carried by car, free freight and one chapter chartered a bus to take members and clothing to Tamasee. 22 chapters reported publicity about the schools with 10 minutes of TV; 129 minutes of radio and 38 newspaper articles. It was my pleasure to give 6 programs on the DAR Schools and I regret that I could not attend all the meetings to which I was asked.

56 chapters earned the Hightower Award.

Activities in Veterans, Military, Naval and State Hospitals, also Convalescent, Nursing and Private Hospitals, and Private Homes: 742 Hours of personal visits; 34 parties with 85 members participating, value \$549.00; 14 programs given, involving 139 members. 297 gifts to hospitals, value \$532.00; 410 gifts to patients, value \$985.00. Fifteen Braille flags and nine USA Flags given, value \$85.00; "Stamps for the Wounded", 152 ounces. 980 Magazines sent, also numerous paper-backs, inspirational literature and puzzles. Miscellaneous gifts include Christmas and Halloween candy, cookies fruit and cards.

Sewing projects provided 39 laprobes and afghans, 65 bibs, 9 wheelchair bags, 6 cushion covers, 33 booties, 5 ditty-bags, value \$274.00.

Public Relations: 20 talks by members; 25 newstories using 73" space, 3 pictures published, 40" space; 1 TV talk, 20 minutes, 1 radio talk, 15 minutes.

Special Activities: Weekly coffee for incoming patients; suppers carried to patients at home; husband of one chairman pushes wheelchair patients to chapel services; member provides music for chapel services; plants given for terrariums and window arrangements; clothing provided patients; help given aged patient in copying records; prizes given for game booth at hospital carnival; continued TLC for women veteran-patients.

Outstanding this year: one chapter provided uniforms for team of amputee veterans for recreation. Two chapters encouraged youth participation: their CAR societies presented a joint program of inspiring Bicentennial music at VA Hospital.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS COMMITTEE

Fifty-seven chapters sent reports and twenty-eight contributed records through this committee, but records from only twenty-four are included in this report. The other four were either not in the proper form or were received too late to be included.

A total of 1558 pages and 6 reels of microfilm were sent to NSDAR, 1645 pages and 1 reel microfilm placed in Georgia Archives, 1550 pages and 274 reels microfilm given Washington Memorial Library, 5103 pages and 1 reel microfilm given other libraries and 257 pages loose papers placed in family files at Archives and Washington Memorial, making a grand total of 10,113 pages and 281 reels microfilm. Other records, for which no page count was given, were placed at various places.

Eight volumes of records were bound and sent to NSDAR, eight to the Archives in Atlanta and eight to Washington Memorial Library in Macon.

LINEAGE RESEARCH

A letter containing information, instructions, suggestions, in connection with our State Chairman's Awards, was attached to a report blank and mailed on October 10, 1974 to all Georgia Chapter Regents.

Response to this effort was: 57 Chapters reported. 51 of these had an appointed Lineage Research Chairman. (In some Chapters this work was done by the Regent or Registrar.) 319 prospective DAR members were given assistance; also 174 CAR and 9 SAR were assisted. One Chapter was instrumental in forming a SAR Chapter. One Chapter reported a new DAR line was established. 15 programs bearing on Lineage Research were initiated. 17 workshops-seminars were held. Items given to the Moultrie Library were: 5 reels 1870 U. S. Census; Register of marriages solemnized by Moses Waddell in Ga., and S. C. ; and Georgia Governor's passports through Indian Territory. 6 new members were acquired through the assistance of your State Lineage Research Chairman, who answered letters not only from Ga., but Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana and Missouri. Numerous personal and telephone inquiries were answered.

While not all Chapters participated, the response was encouraging, and thanks go to all who participated.

MEMBERSHIP

The total membership of the Georgia State Society as of February 1, 1975 was 7296, a net increase of ten over the previous year. We had 385

NATIONAL DEFENSE

National Defense reports were received from 83 of the 99 chapters. 74 chapters had one full meeting on the subject, most with outside speakers of experience and authority. 82 of the chapters devoted the required time to discussion of material contained in the national mailings. The 1974 Resolutions were studied in 80 chapters, 76 had material at Chapter meetings, with 47 distributing it to schools, libraries and interested individuals. 45 chapters reported the presentation of 377 Good Citizenship medals, most of them awarded at Honors Day ceremonies. Baron DeKalb

Chapter awarded 91 medals. The ROTC Medal Project involved 24 chapters, with 28 Bronze and 9 Gold medals presented. John Houston Chapter has a long-established custom of presenting a sabre to a member of the ROTC unit. A total of \$609.25 was contributed by 54 chapters to Dollars for Defense. 15 increased their subscriptions to the National Defense mailings from last year. 389 members were reported as writing to Congressmen on topics of especial interest. I wish I could single out the individuals who have been the leaders in the outstanding work done by the Georgia Daughters in the promotion of the National Defense Committee's work this year. It was due in greatest part to the constant and tireless dedication of those individual members of Cherokee Chapter who headed the State Committee opposed to the Equal Rights Amendment, with the fine cooperation of individuals from chapters all over Georgia, that the ratification of the amendment was again defeated in Georgia. The news coverage of the Georgia Daughters is represented in the Press Book by seventy one chapters, one hundred and three newspapers and magazines with a total publicity of twenty one thousand three hundred sixty six and two eights column inches which includes five thousand two hundred eighty one and two eights inches pictures.

The State Chairman sent many letters, postcards and made phone calls wherever needed information was asked. She attended the District and Fall Management meetings.

Bicentennial and American Heritage special plans excitedly unfolded, honor awards, Regents visits, guest speakers, graves marked, and DAR schools progress are boldly told in print. General information about Georgia Daughters varied achievements interestingly presented.

Much headstart information was given by Mrs. Arthur J. Waterman and Mrs. Thos. W. Bouchier.

It is a rewarding experience to work with the chapter press releases under the leadership of the State Regent, Mrs. Luther L. Watson, collecting and marking a permanent record of the far reaching chapter work of the Georgia Daughters.

PROGRAM COMMITTEE

Reports have been received from 60 chapters and 69 yearbooks were received. 19 yearbooks were forwarded to the National Chairman for judging; of these 14 received National recognition.

All chapters used the National Theme for the year, "Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might". 43 chapters reported good advance publicity, 41 reported good follow-up publicity. 53 chapters reported Honor Roll requirements as a guide in selecting their programs. Those chapters who ordered the Program Outline from National found it helpful.

53 chapters reported full National Defense programs and 58 chapters reported National Defense talks of at least five minutes. The President General's message was read by all chapters.

All chapters had Bicentennial reports; 54 had Meadow Garden reports and 28 chapters reported full programs on the DAR Museum.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

Ninety-nine (99) Chapter Regents and Public Relations Chairmen received letters in September with needed information relative to the execution of their duties. Annual report forms were also included.

Daughters were briefed at both district and Fall Board of Management meetings on the many opportunities to further portray the image of DAR during this Bicentennial administration. Thirty-seven (37) distinct ways were reported.

One hundred eighteen (118) newspapers, 3 magazines and 10 bulletins carried DAR publicity. Sixty-nine chapters reported 26,976 inches of recognition including 2011 articles and 732 pictures.

Five Chapters submitted entries for National Feature Competition. Kettle Creek contributed the best in a series and Brier Creek Chapter for a single feature article. News clippings and pictures representing a portion of the state's accomplishments have been sent to National for display.

RADIO AND TELEVISION

Fourth of July, History Month, Constitution Week, American Indian Week and other DAR projects were included in these programs and announcements.
