Only slightly over a third of the chapters reported! Special thanks to those who did and for the good work done. Reports show that chapters are taking care of transportation and energy problems with car pools. Transportation was provided for 137 members on a regular basis and 102 on occasions.

Individuals and chapters visited historical spots. One bus was chartered for a trip to Tamassee. Other places visited were Kate Duncan Smith, Meadow Garden, Old Savannah, St. Simon's Island, Bulloch Hall, Coca-Cola Archives, and John Sitten's grave in White County, Georgia. Also Old Salem, New Salem, Charleston, Williamsburg, Boston, Concord, and Lexington. A member of Elijah Clark Chapter conducted a tour which included historical homes in the eastern United States. The Cherokee Chapter is commended for the magnificent transportation job done at state conference.

One Traffic Safety program was reported; other participated in community programs and recommended speakers and materials to schools and clubs. Booklets were distributed to members and schools. A Driver Training course was recommended.

The Bus Tour to Continental Congress is the "Big Deal" for the state chairman. The 1974 trip was most rewarding and plans are well underway for 1975. Due to inflation and the rising cost of food and transportation, the trip will be more expensive but well worth the cost. This will be a "once in a life-time experience" for those who have never attended and "still fun" for those who have been many times.

# AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH Mrs. Robert W. Harrison, Jr.

February 1975 was proclaimed American History Month by Governor George Busbee. Three hundred thirty letters were written to Senators and Congressmen in behalf of legislation designed to permanently designate February as American History Month and authorizing the President of the United States to issue permanently a proclamation to that effect.

One hundred per cent Chapter reports were received showing varied, informative and interesting programs.

The essay contest, "A Patriot of the American Revolutionary War", was sponsored in Two hundred thirty-three schools, Fifty-seven participating for the first time, with Four thousand nine hundred eighty-nine contestants.

One hundred ninety-one programs pertaining to American History were reported and Sixty-eight Chapters sponsored American History Month displays.

Three hundred twenty-one awards were presented to students for excellence in American History.

Seven hundred twenty-two spot announcements were used and Thirty-three members appeared on radio.

One hundred forty-nine spot announcements and Thirty members appeared on television on behalf of this committee.

My sincere thanks go to the chapter Regents and Chairmen for their interest in promoting American History Month.

# CONSTITUTION WEEK Mrs. James F. Ellis

This truly was a year in which our Constitution got a thorough inspection from all ranks and ages of our population. As we sought to bring its real meaning and worthiness to public attention, we had our Governor Carter, and 83 mayors sign proclamations to so designate celebration of the week of September 17-23 as Constitution Week.

More than 168 yards of newspaper were used to publicize the Constitution, and if we lumped all the radio time together, we could have had messages concerning our Constitution for 47 weeks! Displays in banks, libraries, and other public locations numbered over 350. . . and there were more than 730 programs given. The chapters distributed better than 27,541,299 pieces of literature concerning the Constitution, and ministers of all faiths spoke of our Constitution in prayer and in sermons.

Each Georgia chapter received a letter and information from this chairman, and 89 chapters responded. Thanks to all who cooperated in this worthwhile effort. This is a good report, and all of your clever ideas are deeply appreciated.

Mrs. Bahin was elected secretary. A motion to ratify the appointment of Mrs. Carl F. Wagner as State Chairman of Meadow Garden was passed. The State Regent announced her appointment of Mrs. L. M. Andrus of Wrens, to be Vice Chairman. Minutes of the meeting held March 6, 1974 were read and approved. Mrs. Watson read and explained the expenditures for repairs and told of her many visits to Meadow Garden to meet with advisors and workmen. She stated that the present caretakers are diligent workers, and that they had made the preliminary preparation for painting the house, clearing vines, etc. Mr. and Mrs. Binford sent forty - seven gallons of paint, as requested by the painter. Mrs. Watson asked that the Board approve the price of \$1300.00 for painting, scraping, caulking, glazing and cleaning the windows. This was approved. She explained the necessity for grading and grassing several areas at the base of the house to keep water from seeping in. A motion was passed to ask Mrs. Watson to proceed with her plan to have Mr. Stough do this work if possible. Motion by Mrs. Bahin, seconded by Mrs. Wallace, and passed to pay the premium on the Liability Insurance, set up on a three - year basis, in the amount of \$141.00 and due October 29, 1974. Mrs. Carl F. Wagner, State Chairman, read her report. She presented the bill for carpenter repairs sent by Mr. Grinstead in the amount of \$50.00. She suggested that since Mr. Grinstead has never presented a bill for his many helpful services, the Georgia State Society send him a card of appreciation with a gift of \$100.00 at Christmas 1974. A motion by Mrs. Waite, seconded by Mrs. Wagner was passed to send Mr. Grinstead the DAR Certificate of Appreciation (for his many years of untiring assistance), framed, with a check for \$100.00 at Christmas. Mrs. Bahin was asked to attend to this matter. Mrs. Waite gave a progressive report of having obtained a miror from Mr. Ed Jones, authorized to be paid for at the meeting of September 22, 1970. The report proved that the mirror delivered to Mrs. Waite was not of the period, design or quality of the one agreed upon. She read a proposed resolution to authorize the Georgia State Society to bring legal action against Mr. Edward Vason Jones to recover the money paid to Mr. Jones, plus interest to date, plus legal fees and other costs. Mrs. Binford moved, seconded by Mrs. Andrus, that the Meadow Garden Board accept the resolution and send it to the Resolutions Committee for presentation to the State Board of Management for action. Motion Passed, Mrs. Watson discussed the loan of books from Meadow Garden to the Augusta College Library. She called on Mrs. Edwin Johnson, Regent of the Augusta Chapter, to explain the wishes of the Augusta Chapter, owner of some of the books. Mrs. Wagner told of the Library's position on the books. Mrs. Johnson had prepared several letters concerning the books as well as other contents of the house. She read a letter from a granddaughter of a former member of the Augusta Chapter, Mrs. Harriet Gould Jeffries, concerning her grandmother's relationship with Meadow Garden and the Augusta Chapter and gifts of Mrs. Jeffries to Meadow Garden. Since the time allotted for the meeting had elapsed, the meeting was recessed until 10:00 p.m.

Meeting of the Meadow Garden Board reconvened at 10:00 p.m. in the State Regent's suite at the Quality Inn, Perry. Mrs. Watson asked for comments from each member on the matter of the books, etc. at Meadow Garden. There followed a discussion of the disposition of the books and contents. Upon motion of Mrs. Waite, seconded by Mrs. Binford, it was decided to postpone the matter of placing the books in the Augusta College Library until an inventory can be made showing ownership of books by the Augusta Chapter or the Georgia State Society, after which time the question can be resolved. Mrs. Waite wished to go on record as asking that the Inventory Committee furnish the State with a copy of its complete inventory of contents at the earliest possible time. The meeting was adjourned at approximately 11:35 p.m.
