# With reverence and appreciation, this Edition of the State Proceedings is Dedicated

Past Chapter Regent of Tomochichi Chapter, Mrs. Stribling devoted many years of selfless service to the Daughters of the American Revolution. Her willingness to help others and to share her talents at every level of work in our Society, she exemplified the finest ideals of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Of all her accomplishments as State Regent, she took special pride in the gift she encouraged Georgia Daughters to make to Berry Schools. Three stained glass windows behind the altar in Frost Memorial Chapel at Berry were a gift of the Georgia Daughters as a memorial to the Berry students who made the supreme sacrifice in World War II.

As Chaplain General, Mrs. Stribling led the efforts to see the deed to Meadow Garden in Augusta, home of George Walton, a Signer of the Declaration of Independence, transferred from the National Society to the Georgia State Society. She reminded the voters at the 1960 Continental Congress that Georgia Daughters had preserved and maintained the property for many years and should rightfully own that which they had kept at no expense to the National Society. During her term as Chaplain General she also served as advisor to the Kansas Daughters as they developed the Kansas Chapel in Memorial Continental Hall.

In 1950 Mrs. Stribling was named by the National Defense Committee of the National Society as Defense Woman of the Year. From 1974 to 1976 she served the National Officers Club as Second Vice President.

On August 26, two days after her 94th birthday, Lenamae French Stribling passed from this Life Militant to enter the Life Triumphant. An inspiration to all who knew her, she was truly —

## The Proposed Amendment: Article V, Section 1, Election of Officers

To add "by ballot" and to editorially rearrange. The Section would then read:

The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected biennially by ballot at the annual State Conference.

#### The Proposed Amendment: Article V, Section 3, Election of Officers

To editorially rearrange the first sentence of section three, add and shall have served a full term as a chapter regent or chapter officer of a Georgia chapter prior to her election, and to delete the entire last sentence which says essentially the same thing as the first sentence. The Section would then read:

To be eligible for state office, a member shall have held membership in a chapter within the Georgia State Society for at least five (5) years prior to her election and shall have served a full term as a chapter regent or chapter officer of a Georgia chapter prior to her election. No member shall be eligible to the same State office for two successive terms. A member having served more than one-half term in the State office shall be deemed to have served a term.

## The Proposed Amendment: Article V, Section 4, Election of Officers

To delete Section 4 and adopt a new Section 4. The Section would then read:

Nominations for State office shall be made by the state nominating committee and may be made from the floor. (a) The state nominating committee shall consist of five (5) members. The members and one alternate for each, shall be elected by ballot at the
