

annual state conference immediately preceding the biennial election. A majority shall elect. (b) No member of the state nominating committee shall serve twice in succession. Members and alternates elected to the committee shall have been members of a Georgia chapter for at least five (5) years, shall be in good standing in their chapter, shall have been either a chapter regent or officer or a state committee chairman and must have attended at least two (2) state meetings during the last two years. (c) The chairman shall be elected by the members of the committee. Only elected members, or their elected alternate, may attend and serve at any meeting of the committee. The quorum shall be three (3). (d) Chapters may send recommendations with qualifications and endorsement to the state nominating committee until October first of the year preceding the biennial election. In October, the committee shall send uniform blanks to the regents of the chapters which have submitted recommendations with the request for confirmation of the chapter's endorsement, nominee's consent and nominee's qualifications. These blanks shall be returned to the chairman by November fifteenth and from these the nominating committee shall prepare a ticket consisting of one or more candidates for each office. By December first, the chairman shall send a copy of the ticket to the State Regent so that she may include the ticket in her call to State Conference. (e) The chairman of the state nominating committee shall report at the first business meeting of the State Conference. Open nominations may be made from the floor provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained and the nominee has the endorsement of her chapter in writing. (f) The state nominating committee shall provide ballots for the election carrying the names of all candidates for office. (g) Uniform blanks for recommendation for state office shall be distributed through the state packet and shall be available at all state meetings at the state literature table.

On the motion of Mrs. W. A. Shubert, it was moved and seconded that (before the State Society amends this section) the Bylaws Committee actively solicits input from the chapters (on the composition and election of a state nominating committee). Adopted.

On the motion of Mrs. Samuel M. Merritt, it was moved and seconded that the amendment to Article V, Section 4 be referred back to the Bylaws Committee for further study. Adopted.



STATE ORGANIZING SECRETARY - Mrs. W. Elton Corbitt

Your Organizing Secretary has the sad duty to report the official disbandment of the Governor George W. Towns Chapter of Talbotton. This occurred at the October Board meeting of the NSDAR. She, along with their District Director, Mrs. J. C. Serrato, Jr., worked with the members who were struggling to keep the chapter going. After disbandment chapter members voted against a merger with another chapter and decided to join another chapter or become a member at large. Two chapters that were falling below the accepted membership level were contacted and both had plans for increasing their membership and maintaining their eligibility. Your Organizing Secretary attended State Conference, Fall Board, Executive Board meetings and Finance Committee meetings. These 2 years have been interesting and informative. The greatest reward in working in any area of DAR is the personal contact with the members. She is grateful for the opportunity to serve the State Society in this office and under the leadership of our capable State Regent.

STATE REGISTRAR - Miss Kay Yarbrough

The State Registrar has kept the membership files current for the Georgia State Society according to the printouts received from the Office of the Registrar General. The National Society reported 7908 members of the Georgia State Society in February, 1991. During the year we have had 309 new members admitted by application of which 72 are Juniors, 33 by reinstatement and 83 by transfer in. Georgia lost 175 members by death, 142 by resignation, 76 by transfer out and 68 members were dropped by the National Society for nonpayment of dues. The membership at large stands at 182. The official membership count as of February 1992 is 7872. This officer attended State Conference, Continental Congress, District Workshops, Fall Board of Management, and all Executive Board Meetings. The primary project of the office of State Registrar has been to computerize the files of the Georgia membership. This was completed in December 1991. It has been a privilege to serve the Daughters of the Georgia State Society under the leadership of Mrs. Donald D. Hankinson, State Regent.

STATE HISTORIAN - Mrs. James F. Forsyth

A special word of thanks to chapter regents and historians for reporting work done in 102 chapters. Chapters reported \$416.00 contributed to the Americana Room. This was quite an increase from last year. Reports showed that 180 historical programs were given for adults and 35 for school children. Rebecca Sykes Chambers (Mrs. Alan) was selected as Georgia's "Outstanding Teacher of American History." Mrs. Chambers was sponsored by the Baron DeKalb Chapter. Graves marked were: 4 Revolutionary Soldiers, and 55 DAR members. Four Historical Markers were placed; 6 historic restorations were begun and 3 completed. The graves of Revolutionary Soldiers were rededicated by the Etowah Chapter, Nancy Hart Chapter and as a joint project by the Oglethorpe, George Walton, and Button Gwinnett Chapters. The grave of Honorary State Regent, Mrs. John F. Thigpen, was marked by the Joseph Habersham Chapter. This officer completed and returned to the office of Historian General, a NSDAR Centennial Records Management Project Report. Many hours have been spent typing the supplement of the *History of the Georgia State Society*. Thank you, Madam State Regent, for the opportunity to serve the State Society as historian.

STATE LIBRARIAN - Mrs. Sterling P. Jones

Georgia Daughters continue to be enthusiastic and generous in their contributions to library work on the local, State, and National levels. Your State Librarian attended 4 District Workshops, Fall Board of Management, State Conference, and all Executive Board Meetings, wrote thank you letters to chapters for book donations and answered all queries. Ninety-seven chapters reported with 10 having programs on the NSDAR Library and/or local libraries. Chapters have donated gifts of books, Bibles, subscriptions, genealogy material, and funds to State and local libraries. Chapters have given \$143 to the NSDAR Library Purchase Fund; \$32 to the Rebinding Fund; \$157 to Indian

Collection; 160 hours volunteered to Georgia Department of Archives and History and National Archives; over 6000 hours to local libraries; 281 books donated to genealogy, 34 to microfilm, 133 to periodicals and subscriptions that valued over \$6600; 5815 books given to VA hospital, 6 to women's collection; and 6 worked toward Bookworm Pin. Chapters continued their support through the Friends of the Library with \$463 being contributed. Twenty-six books were confirmed accepted by the NSDAR Library. This past year has been a very rewarding year for this officer under the capable leadership of our State Regent.

National Committee Reports

AMERICAN HERITAGE, Mrs. Donald S. McClain

Great response from 97 chapters reporting to this chairman. American Heritage programs statewide included: Family Heirlooms, Art of Rughooking, Christmas at Williamsburg Through Design and Music, Historical Flags of the United States and Georgia, Ball Gowns of First Ladies, Basketweaving in Colonial Era, Early American Silver, Dolls in America, and Changes in Fashion, 1957-1991, were a few of the 177 programs given. There were more than 94 Historic tours which interested our Georgia Daughters at Pebble Hill Plantation in Thomasville, Bulloch Hall in Roswell, Rev. Sam Jones Home, Roselawn, in Cartersville, and the Colonial Coast of Georgia. We had 237 volunteers working in historic sites and 131 members serving on historic preservation committees. Repairs made to museums and buildings, historic markers, quilt projects, and laminating old newspapers were accomplished by chapter members. One chapter offered a sign for Dell-Goodall House while restoration was continued in Pearson-Boyer Home. Another restoration was started in a 76 year old farmhouse in Cherokee County. A Chapter gave \$7000 toward reconstruction of a home at McIntosh Reserve. What great strides and many hours of labor have been faithfully given by wonderful Georgia Daughters to preserve our American Heritage!

AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH, Mrs. Buxton L. Daniel

One hundred-one of Georgia's 108 chapters reported the diligent work of the American History Month Committee. Seventy-eight chapters, 273 schools, and 4,802 contestants participated with the American History Essay Contest. Twenty-five schools participated for the first time. Georgia's winners are: 8th grade: Treah Rebecca Caldwell, Baron DeKalb Chapter; 7th grade: Candler Baxley, Peter Early Chapter; 6th grade: Elizabeth Hudson Garrett, Governor Jared Irwin Chapter; and 5th grade: Richard Moore, Peter Early Chapter. Ninety-three chapters had American History programs, 46 observed George Washington's birthday, 43 had displays, and 37 recognized outstanding history students. Forty-six chapters had spot announcements on radio, 15 on TV, and 42 in schools. There were 75 pictures and 1,860 inches in the newspapers. Governor Zell Miller and 48 Mayors issued Proclamations naming February as American History Month. There were 129 posters and 170 stickers purchased. Excellent students in American History received 175 medals, 1,264 certificates, 23 books, and 213 other gifts. The American History Vice-Chairman were very helpful and conscientious, and I am grateful to them. They are: NE - Mrs. William E. Shubert; NW - Mrs. John I. Bell, Jr.; SE - Mrs. Lynn Grice Walshak; and SW - Mrs. Perry L. Bridges. It has been an honor and a privilege serving the Georgia State Society.

AMERICAN INDIANS, Mrs. Lawrence Avery

Ninety-five DAR Chapters reported. Thirty-nine Chapters listed interesting programs on American Indians. There was active participation in all phases of this Committee. The largest single contribution in financial assistance was made by Abraham Baldwin

Chapter which raised \$7000 for the reconstruction of Creek Indian Chief William McIntosh's log house at McIntosh Reserve in Carroll County. Brunswick Chapter sent 11 packages of clothing valued at \$2,000 to Bacone's Thrift Shop. John Laurens Chapter provided 368 Campbell Soup labels. All chapters are to be commended for their continued support of this very important committee. Bonaventure Chapter, Betty Tomat, Chairman, was awarded First Place Certificate (\$10.00) for the best report. LaGrange Chapter, Mrs. B. P. Moores, Chairman, was awarded Second Place Certificate (\$5.00). Colonel John McIntosh Chapter, Ethel Joiner, Chairman, was awarded Certificate (\$10.00) for the best overall report. Madam State Regent, it has been a pleasure serving on this committee during your Administration.

AMERICANISM AND DAR MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP, Miss Mary King

The American's Creed was repeated at meetings by 95 chapters; the Preamble to the Constitution by 48, appearing in 47 yearbooks. Fifty-nine had Americanism programs with 8 presenting 1 on radio/TV or elsewhere. Six had a program on the Immigration Act and 84 on the Constitution. Sixty-seven chapters placed patriotic literature in schools and libraries. Twenty-two sponsored Americanism essays and poster contests. Over 6,000 DAR Manuals were given to citizenship applicants and 260 purchased for others. Twenty-six chapters reported over 30 members working with Americanism classes or to reduce illiteracy, spending 3180 hours. (A praiseworthy increase.) Fourteen chapters regularly attended Naturalization ceremonies, giving 365 flags, 710 Flag Codes, 200 Welcome Cards, 460 American Creed Cards and 120 other items. Two sponsored receptions. John Laurens Chapter gave an Americanism Award to Margot Prada with presentation in the Federal Courthouse by the U.S. District Judge and hosted a luncheon and tea in her honor. Outstanding publicity. Vidalia Chapter presented an Americanism Award to Elizabeth Nasser Holmes at a dinner meeting. Also outstanding publicity. Joseph Habersham Chapter presented an Americanism Award to George Yacoubian, with publicity, and also a Medal of Honor to Deen Day Smith.

CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION, Mrs. R. E. Scott

Twenty Chapters sponsor C.A.R. Societies. Two new societies were organized this year. One Sons and Daughters of Liberty and Sukey Hart. Thirty-two DAR Chapters provide senior leadership with 12 Daughters being C.A.R. Senior State Officers. Twenty-three Daughters serve as Senior State Chairmen and 13 as Senior Society Presidents of C.A.R. Societies. Over 100 Daughters became State Patriots and Promoters. Five became National Promoters. One Daughter is a National Officer. Two Daughters serve on the National Board of Management. One Daughter contributed \$100.00 toward the National Endowment Fund. One contributed \$100.00 toward the C.A.R. National Project. Twelve contributed \$25.00 for State Honor Pins. More than 70 Daughters participated in C.A.R. state functions during the year. Many Chapters invited C.A.R. to luncheons, while other Chapters invited C.A.R. to other functions. In keeping with the State President's project, 10 societies contributed \$100.00 toward Meadow Garden. C.A.R. contributed 2 bricks (\$25.00 each) to the Tamassee brick walk in honor of the State President, William C. Hurst, Jr., and Senior State President, Mrs. R. E. Scott. Contributions to the local and State C.A.R. totaled almost \$2000.00. Some Chapters and Daughters have put forth much effort to help and keep C.A.R. alive and active, and much appreciation is extended for this cooperation. We would like for more Chapters to give more help and show more interest in C.A.R., the future of Daughters and Sons of the American Revolution. Special appreciation goes to our charming and gracious State Regent, Mrs. Donald D. Hankinson, for her sincere interest and participation in all the activities of this organization of fine young people.

CONSERVATION, Mrs. John K. Bretch

"Good Caretakers of God's World," Georgia Daughters are doing just that. Sixteen Chapters have 100% membership buying or contributing to recycling. Plantings: shrubs 786, trees 499,609, bulbs 959. Recycling: 9475 lbs. paper, 1280 lbs. cans, plastic 50 lbs.,

glass 1125 lbs. Chapter gave money to Nature Conservancy and Forest Service for Tropical Rain Forest, planting of seedlings in National Forest. Four Chapters planted trees commemorating The Bill of Rights. Chapters worked with SAR, C.A.R., Boy Scouts. Chapter members attended conservation workshop including this chairman. Governor Jared Irwin Chapter owns, maintains park in Sandersville. Trees have been planted on school grounds, Habitat for Humanity Home, public property, Tamassee, Berry College. Conservation exhibits: school libraries, city library, department store. Abraham Baldwin Chapter was honored by "Take Pride In America" national awards program for work on public lands. Drawing held by Chapter winner received membership to Conservation Society. Soil Conservation, fire, Arbor Day observed. Five Conservation Medals and Certificates were awarded by the following Chapters: Cherokee, General Daniel Newnan, Joseph Habersham, Roswell King, St. Andrew's Parish. Conservation display at State Conference with handouts and "The Recycler's Handbook." Thank you, Madam State Regent, for another great year.

CONSTITUTION WEEK, Mrs. Gordon B. Ragan

In 1990, the Constitution Week committee was named 1st place winner in the Nation and Peter Early Chapter - 3rd place. State winners were Benjamin Hawkins Chapter - 2nd place and John Laurens Chapter - 3rd place. Button Gwinnett, George Walton and Oglethorpe Chapters were 1st place Joint Chapter winners. Five Georgia Daughters, Mrs. James J. Leitch, Historian General; Mrs. Donald D. Hankinson, State Regent; Mrs. Billy W. Hunter, NE District Director; Mrs. Charles E. Beams, NW District Director and Mrs. Robert B. Vance, Sr., co-host of annual SAR-DAR Constitution Week Luncheon, joined the State Chairman in Atlanta where we witnessed the Honorable Zell Miller, Governor, proclaim September 17-23, 1991 as Constitution Week. Georgia Chapters again outdid themselves during the week with 82 reporting. Different Chapters stressed the excellent involvement from the youngest school children to the senior citizens with over 6,000 inches of publicity, radio and television, stores, restaurants, libraries, schools, banks, post offices, courthouses, churches, nursing and retirement homes decorated with creative posters and displays, gaily colored banners and flags flying - who could not be touched! The ringing of the bells and the celebration of the Bill of Rights' 200th Anniversary - truly, a year to remember! It has been my honor and privilege serving the Georgia State Society on this committee.

DAR GOOD CITIZENS, Mrs. Moody C. Summers, Jr.

One hundred Chapters reported with 89 participating in the selection of 250 Good Citizens from the 292 Schools contacted. The 4 District winners are: Northeast District, Katherine Virginia Elmore sponsored by Philadelphia Winn Chapter; Southeast District, Joshua Eric Kight sponsored by John Laurens Chapter; Northwest District, John Wesley Waller sponsored by John Houston Chapter and Southwest District, Margaret Fulton Holman sponsored by Peter Early Chapter. Each District winner will receive \$50.00 and the State winner, John Wesley Waller, will receive \$250.00 and the State Good Citizen Pin. Most Chapters honor their winners with special award ceremonies including teas, luncheons and meetings that include their parents when the pins and certificates are presented. There was a total of \$415.00 cash and a \$50.00 savings bond presented. One-fourth of a year's tuition was given by a local Community College and 1 Chapter offers the same. Ninety-nine Chapters reported to this Chairman. An estimated 24% of the total Georgia membership enjoy our magazine. There were 7 "feature articles" and 10 "With Chapters"

from Georgia. 1st place: 50% - General Josiah Tattnall Chapter; 2nd place: 33% - Knox-Conway Chapter. It has been my privilege to serve the Georgia State Society continuously for 22 years in various chairmanships. Thank you, Madam Regent.

DAR MAGAZINE ADVERTISING, Mrs. Theodore C. Whitson

The Georgia State Society celebrated its 100th birthday on April 15, 1991 and this was commemorated in the August-September Georgia issue of the DAR Magazine. The total revenue from Georgia was \$7,575.00. Sixty-eight chapters participated in the 1991 Co-op ads. These ads recognized the State Regent, Georgia's Outstanding Junior, 1991 Conference Pages, the Co-op Chapters, State Officers, Honorary State Regents and Honored Guests, District Directors and Coordinator of Districts, State Chairmen and Vice Chairmen, Georgia's 1991 Outstanding Veteran-Patient national winner and Georgia's 1991 Outstanding American History Teacher national winner, and the recognition of the Continental Congress Georgia Bus Chairman and co-workers. Reports were received by 101 chapters. Hightower Award presented to 53 chapters with Fielding Lewis and Sunbury honored for largest per capita contributions. The continuing support of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Hightower, Jr., for the Hightower Award is appreciated by the Georgia State Society. Berry College Scholarship recipients are: Barbara Buchanan, Janet M. Merritt Scholarship; Shannon Baker, Edna De Lamar Kendrick Scholarship. The Georgia Daughters were pleased Mr. J. Brendan McGowan, Hillside School, and Mr. Mike Mullins, Hindman Settlement School, were able to attend the Georgia Luncheon at Continental Congress and gave a brief statement.

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERAN-PATIENTS, Mrs. William P. Tillman

Georgia DAR members have done outstanding work this year for Veteran-Patients and I congratulate each Chapter Chairman. Ninety-nine chapters reported; 428 members made 648 visits to VA facilities; \$12,517 gifts, cash donated by chapters; \$1,800 by one member's employer for 500 Christmas stockings. Included were hours of volunteer service in VA Medical Centers, Military Hospitals, Nursing Homes, Private Hospitals, and other institutions. Gifts consisted of lap robes, afghans and other handmade items, books, games, cash for canteen books and clothes for men and women patients. All patriotic days were celebrated with programs and parties; flags were put on Veterans' graves; many news articles told of DAR participation in local events. Thank each of you for your participation and support of this committee.

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, Miss Patricia A. Glenn

Reports were received from 99 Chapters. 3,711 Flags reported presented; 3,486 Flag Codes; 590 Children's Flag Codes; 3,494 books and pamphlets and 2 Braille Flags given. 31 Flag Certificates were presented; 382 Flag spots on radio, 6 on TV, and 60 newspaper articles written. 46 programs were presented on the Flag including those by Mrs. Theodore C. Whitson on all the Flags of Georgia, and the continued delightful portrayal by Mrs. Gordon W. Kilgore, Sr., as Betsy Ross. 16 Chapters reported they kept a scrapbook on the Flag; 29 presented Flag Facts at every meeting; 74 used Flag Stamps on mailings; 53 checked classrooms for Flags; 87 urged members to fly the Flag and 93 opened their meetings with Pledge of Allegiance. Chapters included wonderful narrative reports of their special activities selling flags, giving them to classrooms, being part of patriotic parades, civic ceremonies, welcoming troops home from the Gulf conflict and demonstrating the proper retirement of worn or soiled flags as well as correct ways to fly or display the Flag. Many chapters had returning veterans of Operation Desert Storm as program speakers, learning firsthand about their participation in the war. Working with this Committee has been an honor and privilege.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS, Mrs. Everett E. Porter, Jr.

Twelve chapters submitted 1,123 pages of original source records and indexes to be sent to the NSDAR Library. The Georgia Archives, Washington Memorial Library, and the Georgia Historical Society Library received a total of 3,369 pages of new records (5 books each). Work is under way to complete the indexing of the unindexed volumes of previously submitted volumes of genealogical records housed at the Georgia Archives. A total of 6 volumes were indexed this year, bringing the total volumes which have been indexed to 157. Volunteers are working to index about 30 more volumes to complete this project. Two Bookworm Pins and 2 Bookworm Bars have been earned this year, bringing the total to 53 pins and 24 bars earned through this project. This Chairman is also working

to catalog the entire collection and to coordinate it with the Georgia Collection at the NSDAR Library. So far 300 volumes have been cataloged and the catalogs are in use at the Georgia Archives. Many researchers have been aided in the use of these valuable records by this catalog. Catalogs for the remaining 200 volumes will be completed in 1992, at which time the catalogs for the entire 500 volume collection will be sent to the NSDAR Library.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS FROM GEORGIA - 1992

This year 12 chapters have submitted new genealogical records. These records have been sent to the NSDAR Library, Georgia Department of Archives and History in Atlanta, Washington Memorial Library in Macon, and the Georgia Historical Society in Savannah. For the 6th consecutive year, Georgia has had 100% reporting, with reports to this Committee received from all of Georgia's 108 chapters. Seventy-eight percent of Georgia's 108 chapters should receive Honor Roll recognition. Pending confirmation from National, Georgia should receive 46 Gold, 23 Silver, and 15 Honorable Mention awards. State totals may change following Congress, as confirmation is not received until then. Georgia has been honored to have Mrs. Dennis J. F. Beall serving as National Vice Chairman of the Southeastern Division. This Chairman thanks the Chapter Regents, Honor Roll Chairmen, and Treasurers for their cooperation, and the State Regent, Mrs. Donald D. Hankinson, for the opportunity of serving the Georgia State Society as the Chairman of National Honor Roll.

JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZEN, Mrs. Ronald H. Salter

Thirty-seven chapters contributed \$137 to the JAC national prize fund. Many thanks to Oothcaloga and Thomasville Chapters for continuing to contribute to the JAC contest. Seven chapters have youth groups with at least 19 schools involved in JAC. 1420 pins were issued; 1420 membership cards were given; 42 handbooks for JAC clubs were distributed. Fort Peachtree Chapter gave 1479 flags. Two clubs had participants in the JAC contest; Thomasville Chapter had 720 and Oothcaloga Chapter had 65. Therefore, our state, region, and national winnings will be contained in 2 chapters. We have 4 less participating chapters than in 1991. All but 7 chapters sent in a "no report" to your state chairman. Our youth is our heritage; we must increase our support.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP, Mrs. Don Allmond

A total of 93 chapters reported with 31 chapters having a Junior serving as their committee chairman. Other Juniors have served as Chapter Regent, Officer, Chairman, State Chairman and Vice Chairman as well as Pages. Seventy-two new Juniors have been added to Georgia's roster this year. This committee is honored to have 2 Georgia "Juniors-at-Heart" serving on the National level: Mrs. Calvin C. Kammeyer as National Chairman,

and Miss Melody G. Brown as National Vice Chairman of the Southeastern Division. Throughout the state, Junior members have actively participated in all phases of DAR work, especially the Junior Membership Committee. They have supported the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund through the sales and purchases of DAR approved items such as jewelry, Innisbrook Wraps, stationery, and the Junior Bazaar. Their efforts have earned \$1,766.00. Georgia's outstanding Junior member for 1992 is Mrs. Ronald D. Kent of Sukey Hart Chapter. This Chairman would like to recognize and thank Mrs. James E. Hernandez, Jr., Vice Chairman of Contest, and Mrs. William Daniel McCranie, II, of Sales. Madam Regent, it has been an exciting 2 years. Thank you for allowing this Chairman the opportunity to serve our State Society.

LINEAGE RESEARCH, Mrs. Robert B. Vance, Sr.

Annual reports were received from 96 chapters, all beautifully prepared. Workshops were held by 19 chapters, with 260 potential members assisted, and 90 members acquired. Chapter Chairman received 223 requests with 7 requests sent to the State Chairman. Lineage Research Kits purchased were 11, and 24 Kits given by 1 chapter. Fifteen chapters had Lineage Research programs with subjects: "Supplementals, how to do research and fill out papers" - "Ways to verify proofs for acceptance of Applications and Supplementals," etc. This Chairman assisted, researched, and typed 42 SAR applications - all were approved. MEMBERSHIP, Mrs. Calvin C. Kammeyer

Congratulations to the 99 Chapters reporting on membership. This chairman found that 667 prospective members were contacted about applying for membership in the DAR in the 1991-1992 year. The following pieces of DAR literature were dispensed by Georgia Chapters: 326 DAR In Action; 760 Fact Sheets; 700 Know the DAR; 156 Membership Guides. The membership guide is a very important and helpful brochure. This chairman hopes it will be used more in the future. The following Chapters receive thanks for entering the National Prospective Member Contest: Cherokee, Etowah, Martha Stewart Bulloch, Philadelphia Winn, William Marsh and Joseph Habersham. Membership is the Future of DAR. Tell the story of this great organization and continue to get new members! It has been a pleasure to serve the Georgia State Society.

MOTION PICTURE, RADIO AND TELEVISION, Mrs. Gordon W. Kilgore, Sr.

To the 92 chapters reporting, thank you! Two chapters presented awards to media personnel for support in reporting DAR and other activities. 109 letters of praise and 98 letters of rebuke were written concerning programs on TV and Radio. The best TV shows for viewing by adults were: 60 Minutes, Murder She Wrote and the National Geographic Series. For children the winners were: Sesame Street, Cosby Show and Disney Series. For the best motion pictures for adults the vote was for: Home Alone, Beauty and the Beast, Driving Miss Daisy. For children: Home Alone, Beauty and the Beast, Robin Hood. Preference for radio programs were: News, Sports and Classical Music. Chapters reported 58 members as having appeared on TV or Radio programs either to promote DAR or Civic organizations. One chapter reported excellent success in getting news of DAR on TV. It is important that the public let the media know its feelings on their selection of good materials for viewing. Also, to let them know that indecent programs will not be tolerated. Letters addressed to advertisers may help in this way to get better programs.

NATIONAL DEFENSE, Mrs. Jerido Ward

Annual reports were received from 98 chapters. At least 5 minutes were devoted to a National Defense report by all chapters reporting; 90 had one entire program on a National Defense topic. The 1991 resolutions adopted at Continental Congress were discussed by 94 chapters; 93 chapters had extra National Defense materials available at chapter meetings; and 24 made materials available to schools and 25 to libraries. Good Citizenship Medals were presented to 231 students; 109 Bronze Medals were presented to cadets in high schools and junior colleges; and Gold Medals were presented to 20 students in colleges and universities. 36 chapters reported giving \$206.00 to the ROTC Award Program, and 18 chapters contributed \$568.00 to Dollars for Defense. Chapter Chairman in 92 chapters encouraged their members to vote in every election. National Defense topics of greatest interest were: Desert Storm, Break-up of the Soviet Union and Women's Issues. Awards for the National program will be made in Washington at Continental Congress. Films on Meadow Garden and Berry School as well as the tape on the 100th Anniversary Celebration were used and enjoyed for Chapter programs. PUBLIC RELATIONS, Mrs. Robert Wiltshire

All Georgia chapters made excellent progress in spreading our name and ideals throughout their communities with good media coverage. They were also creative in getting the word out by: distributing the DAR magazine to their local libraries; donating a copy of "The DAR Story" to a regional library; presenting a play to the public featuring the first President General and our 4 founders; buying advertising in local newspapers; regular announcements in church bulletins; conducting a DAR video screening at their Historical Society meeting; sponsoring information and sales booths at festivals; and many visual displays at Post Offices, libraries and schools. Special National Committee Reports

BICENTENNIAL OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, Mrs. J. L. Henderson

Eighty-eight chapters had programs on the Bill of Rights or Constitution, with 68 taking part in other activities promoting them. These activities included Mayor's proclamations, teas, luncheons, posters, exhibits, radio, TV shows, public forums, parades and newspaper articles. Georgia Daughters spoke before 34 adult groups and 79 young people's groups. Forty-eight chapters promoted "Let Freedom Ring" on December 15th with bells, carillons, sermons and church programs proclaiming Bill of Rights Day. One-hundred-thirteen Bicentennial trees were planted, 80 of these by the 3 Columbus Chapters at 15 schools. Over 1,485 "Bill of Responsibilities" were distributed. Peter Early Chapter sponsored a poster contest with the winning poster displayed in Washington, D. C., by Senator Wyche Fowler, and re-named a civic park in Blakely "Constitution Park." A Henry Walton Chapter member was instrumental in naming a park "U.S. Bicentennial of the Constitution Park" in Morgan County. Governor Treutlen Chapter sponsored a Bill of Rights forum with a judge, lady attorney, and black college professor conducting. This was taped and will be shown 4 times on Channel 31. George Walton Chapter distributed over 200 pocket-sized U.S. Constitutions to 1 school. Other outstanding reports by William Marsh, Cherokee, John Laurens and John Houstoun Chapters.

CENTENNIAL JUBILEE, NSDAR, Mrs. Erwin N. Kinne

"No report" was the response from 35 chapters. A total of 27 chapter subscriptions to the Centennial Call for the years 1987-1991 were sent in. Contributions to the Centennial Call were made by 41 chapter members. Centennial programs were held by 35 chapters. Centennial pins were purchased by 64 members. The video "A Century of Service to the Nation" is owned by 8 chapters. Centennial plates were purchased by 10 chapter members. Chapter records were checked for accuracy against National records of the Centennial Call Committee before preparation of the Centennial Call Book. It has been a privilege and pleasure to serve the State Society under the leadership of our capable and dynamic State Regent.

COLUMBUS QUINCENTENNIAL, Mrs. Alex S. Boyer, Jr.

Ninety-four chapters reported; 36 had programs. Celebrations are planned for October, 1992 but activities have laid ground work. State Regent spoke to several chapters and State Chairman is scheduled. One DAR is member of State Commission and 9 on local committees. Many will attend the celebration in Columbus, our Quincentennial City; other in Columbus, Ohio. Columbus Quincentennial pin available from Caldwell. Orders taken for pewter Jefferson cup engraved with crest of Columbus family. Postcards available and feature Nina, Pinta and Santa Maria and copy of first commemorative stamp printed by U. S. Postal Service.

ELLIS ISLAND RESTORATION, Mrs. William Dennis

This State Chairman had the honor of visiting Ellis Island on July 31, 1991. It was indeed spectacular to behold, but it was more than that. As I disembarked there came over me a great feeling of pride that so many came through this island to seek freedom, equality, justice and humanity, and that this great country spread out her arms of love and welcomed them, and they in turn flourished and made her great. Brenneman, Jr. The ex officio members were given the privilege of the floor without a vote. The proposed budget for 1992-1993 was discussed. On the motion of Mrs. Corbitt, it was moved and seconded that the number of members on which the state budget is based be set at 7700. Motion passed. On the motion of Mrs. Ward, it was moved and seconded that \$100.00 be taken from the Continental Congress Hospitality Fund and added to the Good Citizens Awards, enabling the state winner to receive \$100.00 and the four district winners \$50.00 each. Motion passed. The total budget to be \$30,800.00 will be presented at the Fall Board of Management, and voted on at the State Conference of 1992. Mrs. Hanf informed the members that the May Erwin Talmadge Auditorium was in need of new stage curtains, and as she has secured a very good price for fabric, she asked the committee to consider providing some of the funds for this project. On the motion of Mrs. Corbitt, it was moved and seconded that up to and no more than \$2,500.00 be drawn from the General Savings account to purchase fabric, construct and install stage curtains for the May Erwin Talmadge Auditorium at Tamassee DAR School. Motion passed. Mrs. Hankinson informed the committee on the status of the painted beaufet for the Georgia Room at the DAR Museum. The cost of the beaufet is \$25,000.00, \$16,000.00 has been paid as a down payment, and the balance needs to be paid by October 1, 1991. With the contributions that have been received to date, she said \$3,000.00 was needed to complete this transaction. On the motion of Mrs. McCranie, it was moved and seconded that \$3,000.00 be withdrawn from General Savings Account to be placed in the Georgia Room account for the purchase of the painted beaufet to be placed in the Georgia State Room in the DAR Museum in Washington. The money to be replaced as funds are credited to this account. Motion passed. Mrs. Kendrick informed the committee that there was a need for a printed guide of duties for the finance chairman and committee. After some discussion it was decided that she would work on a draft for a policy manual for the finance committee.

Hoff was welcomed as State Parliamentarian. Mrs. Hanf, DAR School Chairman, reported that the total cost of the stage curtains in the May Erwin Talmadge Auditorium, Tamassee DAR School, was \$2,301.44. Backdrops were included in the total cost. To date \$1,406.44 is needed to complete this project. Mrs. Hankinson informed the committee that the outstanding balance for the painted beaufet for the Georgia Room, NSDAR Museum, has been paid. She said that \$1,873.70 had been borrowed from the General Savings Account. The cost of shipping and handling was \$1,140.22. The ex officio members were given the privilege of the floor without a vote. The proposed budget, 1992-1993, was distributed and discussed. On the motion of Mrs. Corbitt, it was moved and seconded that the Continental Congress Hospitality Fund be adjusted from \$200.00 to \$300.00 with the additional \$100.00 to come from

the Capital Investment Fund thus making that fund \$1,633.00. Motion passed. A resolution, submitted by the DAR School Committee, was discussed. The resolution states that at the end of each administration, after all bills are paid and all designated funds established, 50% of any surplus monies will be deposited to the Georgia State Society Endowment Fund for the Talmadge Auditorium/Gymnasium, with the remaining 50% of surplus monies deposited to the General Savings Account of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR. On the motion of Mrs. Bahin, it was moved and seconded that the said resolution be submitted to the Resolutions Committee for consideration. Motion passed. There being no further business the meeting adjourned after prayer by Mrs. Kendrick.

Reports were received from 99 chapters and of this number 53 having an observance of Georgia Day with 34 having a program or partial program on Georgia. The programs were Georgia poets and writers, the history of the Georgia Flag, the founding and early history of Georgia, Georgia songs and outstanding Georgians. Among other activities were Georgia Flags presented to schools, several chapters had a quiz on Georgia history and 3 celebrated the occasion with a luncheon with another organization as their guests. One chapter taught a preschool class the pledge to the Georgia Flag and when they had learned the pledge presented them with miniature Georgia Flags. Notices were placed in newspapers, church bulletins, spot announcements on radio. Several members visited classrooms to talk on Georgia history. Wreaths were placed on Tomochichi and Oglethorpe's markers and the pamphlet "Georgia Firsts" was given to the members. It has been a pleasure to have served as Georgia Day chairman the past two years.

GEORGIA STATE ROOM, DAR MUSEUM, Mrs. Hugh Peterson, Sr.

The Georgia State Room, DAR Museum, depicting the "Long Room," Peter Tondee's Tavern, Savannah, 1770-1783, continues to be of interest to visitors to the museum. Many years have gone into the research, planning, and execution of putting this State Room into the proper way to depict an historic example of how the Patriots and Liberty

Boys planned and plotted to win liberty and freedom from the despot King George III. By using the inventory of Peter Tondee as a guideline, only relics mentioned therein, were gotten. One item, a "Painted Beaufet", was difficult to find; however, now it has been secured. In June 1991 word was received by this chairman that the long-sought "Painted Beaufet", as mentioned in Peter Tondee's inventory, could be secured. The persons who owned and loved this heirloom would now let the Georgia Society have it for the Georgia Room, DAR Museum. Under personal supervision, the Beaufet was shipped out of Savannah (its home for over 200 years) to the DAR Museum in Washington, D. C., where it was received with much interest and enthusiasm by the President General, Curator General, and all the staff. The price was \$25,000. Our Georgia Room fund, which the members had so faithfully built up, was not sufficient for payment; however, with a loan from the State Society, we were able to act. All loans have been repaid, thanks to generous, loyal members. The Beaufet is on loan to the museum for 20 years. The Beaufet will be dedicated in April during Continental Congress. Heartfelt appreciation to all who contributed to the success of this project. Especially do we thank the persons outside our DAR society who joined in as loyally with generous donations to support this patriotic venture. One-hundred-one chapters responded with contributions from members and friends of over \$6,985.75.

HISTORY OF THE GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY, Mrs. Leonard G. De Lamar

The past decade flew by as Georgia Daughters wove into the fabric of time their historic, educational and patriotic efforts. The numerous accomplishments of Georgia chapters and chairmen have been truly amazing and of great value to God, Home and Country. From yearly reports of chapters, chairmen, and officers and a great deal of additional research this chairman has compiled the history of this state society as pertains to work done February 1981 through January 1991, thus bringing up to date the *History of the Georgia State Society 1890-1981* that was published 10 years ago. As this year ends the goal is to have the manuscript ready for the printer in early summer and possibly the book available in time for Fall Board of Management. This chairman acknowledges with grateful appreciation the assistance of Mrs. James F. Forsyth and Mrs. Gordon W. Kilgore, Sr., who are spending countless hours typing this manuscript. Thank you, Madam State Regent, for entrusting the compilation of the History of the Georgia State Society to this Georgia Daughter.

MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

The Meadow Garden Board met Friday, August 16, 1991 at Meadow Garden with Mrs. Donald D. Hankinson, State Regent, presiding as Chairman of the Board. The minutes of the March 22, 1991 meeting were read. They had been approved by the proceedings committee, May 1991.

Gloria Clarke, caretaker, was introduced and she expressed her delight at being able to work at Meadow Garden. She informed the Board that she had not been notified of any tours for school children, but does expect some. She also informed the Board that the wall in the kitchen, just to the right of the door, needed attention as it is deteriorating.

Mrs. Hankinson gave the financial statement and told the Board that the Treasurer's books are in audit. Copies of the financial statement will be mailed to the Board at a later date.

She informed the Board that the picture that was in the Walton bedroom is deteriorating and as soon as a good restorer can be found it will be restored. Mrs. Watson, landscaping chairman, expressed appreciation to those workers who have been keeping the grounds in such good condition. She said that as she plans to be in Augusta soon she will instruct Mrs. Clarke as to the trimming of the grapevine.

Mrs. Elliott, furnishings chairman, said that she had not been in touch with the wallpaper man, and has not been able to locate anyone to restore the picture from the Walton bedroom. She said that if she could not find anyone, she would do it herself.

Mrs. Elliott informed the Board that she had found a double crucible lamp and ember tongs which she is donating to Meadow Garden. Cost of the items is \$75.00.

Mrs. De Lamar, patrons chairman, reported that contributions from several people have been forwarded to the state treasurer.
