# Georgia State Society DAR Meetings Executive Committee Meeting Minutes

July 18, 2020

The Executive Committee of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, met Saturday, July 18, 2020, in the Thomson Family YMCA Boardroom, in Thomson, Georgia. State Regent O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle called the meeting to order at 10:05 a.m., with State Recording Secretary Amy Pittman Lawson present. Also present were Betty Brown Harrah, First Vice Regent; Helen Robertson Powell, Second Vice Regent; Amy Bolin Nation, Chaplain; Catherine "Cathy" Winslett Hyer, Corresponding Secretary; Teresa Meadows Floyd, Organizing Secretary; Kay Griffin Ragan, Treasurer; Mary Kathleen "Kitty" Worrell Watters, Registrar; Kate Sievert Cook, Historian; Renee Gaspari Portell, Librarian; and Vanessa Michelle Watkins-Nutty, Curator. Parliamentarian Marjorie Singley-Hall was also present.

The State Chaplain offered the Invocation, and Mrs. McCorkle welcomed the members of the Executive Committee and distributed name tags.

The minutes of the March 16, 2020, March 30, 2020, and April 1, 2020 meetings were reviewed and approved as read.

The State Regent reported successful State Chair's Conference Calls, held via Zoom at various times on August 12 and 13, 2020. Chairs were encouraged to stay positive, given innovative ideas to reach members during the pandemic, and asked to direct members to the Chapter Information Packet (CIP) and state websites for information. Mrs. McCorkle announced the State Treasurer will post videos and tutorials to help chapters complete their financial reports. A Committee Corner will be highlighted in the State Regent's Weekly Blog; submissions should not exceed 100 words. The Fall Forum schedule will include committee meetings, a service project, sales and exhibits, genealogy programs and training, come-and-go workshops, State Regent's Project baskets, a Celebration of Service Dinner, a Constitution Celebration Dinner, and the annual GSSDAR Memorial Service postponed from the 2020 State Conference. Mrs. McCorkle expected a successful virtual State Regent's Tea to be hosted via Zoom in the afternoon.

Mrs. McCorkle reported the Finance Committee approved the amended GSS 2020-2021 budget, to be ratified at Fall Forum, and drafted the GSS 2021-2022 proposed budget. The committee approved moving unallocated funds remaining from the Brown Administration: half to be transferred to the GSSDAR State Dues Unallocated Money Market Account and half to the Meadow Garden Capital Improvement/Investment Account.

The State Regent reported new discoveries made at Meadow Garden include the possibility the historic house originally faced the Augusta Canal or Savannah River. While siding is removed from the canal side of the structure awaiting replacement, the Meadow Garden Board voted to take advantage of this opportunity and allow Landmark Preservation to remove walls in the Best Room to confirm orientation possibilities and create more interpretive opportunities. Mrs. McCorkle discussed potential fundraising opportunities using Donor by Design by seeking support from corporations and other major donors. Meadow Garden plans to reopen by appointment-only on July 27, 2020.

Updated Public Relations and Social Media Guidelines will be considered for approval at the next Board Meeting. Once approved, they will be posted on state social media sites. The State Regent stressed the importance of GSSDAR members avoiding political discussion.

Mrs. McCorkle presented a draft of the GSSDAR's Continuing Commitment to Equality for discussion. The final version encourages a diverse membership and will be posted online to the GSSDAR public and private sites as well as the Meadow Garden site.

First Vice Regent Betty Harrah reported plans for the Georgia Daughters Event at the 2021 NSDAR Continental Congress. She is available to assist the State Regent whenever needed. Second Vice Regent Helen Powell announced the following special projects at DAR Schools: Kate Duncan Smith (KDS) DAR School –redevelopment of the Georgia Park; Tamassee DAR School – ongoing improvements at May Erwin Talmadge Auditorium/Gymnasium; Berry College – continuing support of the Gate of Opportunity Scholarships; The Crossnore School– continuing support of the Healthy Child Initiative;

Hillside School – purchase of musical instruments for the music department; Hindman Settlement School – continued support of the Dyslexia Program. Mrs. Powell encouraged attendance at the KDS and Tamassee events in October. Georgia Daughters will postpone participating in the Hindman Day at the Races until 2021. Mrs. Powell has NSDAR School of Sunfish pins available for purchase.

Chaplain Amy Nation received all records from the previous officer. The annual GSSDAR Memorial Service, postponed due to the cancellation of State Conference, will be held on Sunday, October 25, 2020 at 10:00am. The service will memorialize Georgia Daughters who passed prior to the date used for the originally scheduled Memorial Service, March 1, 2020. Mrs. Nation reported 43 deaths since that date; those Daughters will be memorialized at the 2021 Georgia State Conference. Cards have been sent to 18 members celebrating their 90+birthdays.

Recording Secretary Amy Lawson asked all reports be sent electronically for filing. Mrs. Lawson proposed using online submission forms for all annual reports to eliminate formatting and word count issues.

Corresponding Secretary Cathy Hyer distributed over 300 invitations to serve during the McCorkle Administration. Mrs. Hyer updated the georgiastatedar.org email addresses and notified state leaders of their new credentials. She created the online registration form for the Tea for Two at Two and set up a Zoom account to accommodate large virtual meetings. Mrs. Hyer is responsible for maintaining the GSSDAR email contact list on Constant Contact; the list is used for communication, including distribution of the weekly blog. The 2020-2021 State Directory has been completed and posted on the private site. Limited printed copies will be available at Fall Forum.

Organizing Secretary Teresa Floyd reviewed the current Count Trend Analysis and all issues forwarded from the previous officer. GSSDAR has 14 chapters with less than 25 members. A net loss in members was reported by 57 chapters last year. Mrs. Floyd announced a chapter forming in Pine Mountain, Georgia, hoping to organize with over 50 members. Possible names have been sent to NSDAR for approval, officers and committee chairs selected, bylaws and standing rules written, and a meeting location secured. Mrs. Floyd thanked past Organizing Secretary Cathy Hyer for her support.

Treasurer Kay Ragan reported moving accounts from Wells Fargo to Synovus. Mrs. Ragan created online training to help chapters complete the GTR-01 and GTR-02 forms. Additional training will be created according to due dates and posted online. Mrs. Ragan distributed copies of GSS and Meadow Garden financials. The **Georgia State Society Account Summaries** were: Certificates of Deposit \$131,417.31; Checking Account \$90,479.00; Money Market Account \$154,793.41; Total Liabilities and Equity \$376,689.72. The **Meadow Garden Account Summaries** were: Certificates of Deposit \$308,118.98; Checking Account \$127,868.88; Money Market Accounts \$156,563.34; Petty Cash \$100.00; Total Fixed Assets \$260,932.38 and Total Liabilities and Equity \$853,583.58.

Registrar Kitty Watters announced GSSDAR has 8,098 members with 106 pending and 26 verified. Speakers have been secured for the Fall Forum Genealogy Workshop: Mr. Forest Crosley, Assistant Director of Genealogy, Supplementals, NSDAR, and Kathryn Wright, Archivist and Assistant Professor, Mercer University. Appreciation was extended to former State Registrar Melody Porter, Membership Chair Tricia Powers, and SAT Chair Lynn Spratling for a smooth transition. Mrs. Watters is enrolled in the new DAR Registrar Training Course and encourages all GSSDAR Registrars to take the course and the online Genealogy Education Program (GEP) courses. She is working to clear several "Have Written" and "Additional Information Required" (HWs/AIRs) letters. All Georgia Daughters are asked to bring prospective members into the Society.

Historian Kate Cook submitted the CIP and thanked the Volunteer Information Specialists (VIS) Committee for hyperlinking references to forms for members' ease of access. Mrs. Cook also developed a standard response email containing further instructions and pertinent forms for inquiries related to the placement of markers on members' graves.

Librarian Renee Portell is receiving monthly reports from the NSDAR Library Acquisitions office detailing books received from GSSDAR chapters. Mrs. Portell intends to continue and

encourage participation in the NSDAR and GSSDAR Virtual Book Clubs.

Curator Vanessa Watkins-Nutty reported the GSSDAR properties are in the possession of former State Curator, Renee Portell; the items will be exchanged at Fall Forum.

Parliamentarian Marjorie Singley-Hall worked with the National Parliamentarian for direction on handling the affairs of our Society during this time of national emergency, including assistance with critical events such as canceling State Conference and rescheduling Fall Forum. Mrs. Singley-Hall announced Robert's Rules of Order will publish a 12<sup>th</sup> Revision after September 1, 2020 containing updates regarding electronic meetings. NSDAR will be revising their bylaws as well as the National Model for Chapter Bylaws; Mrs. Singley-Hall will be helping the State Society and chapters to update their bylaws accordingly.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 12:26 p.m.

#### October 22, 2020

The Executive Committee of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, met Thursday, October 22, 2020, in Ballroom A and B of the Macon Coliseum, Macon, Georgia. State Regent O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle called the meeting to order at 9:10 a.m., with State Recording Secretary Amy Pittman Lawson present. Also present were Betty Brown Harrah, First Vice Regent; Helen Robertson Powell, Second Vice Regent; Amy Bolin Nation, Chaplain; Catherine "Cathy" Winslett Hyer, Corresponding Secretary; Teresa Meadows Floyd, Organizing Secretary; Kay Griffin Ragan, Treasurer; Mary Kathleen "Kitty" Worrell Watters, Registrar; Kate Sievert Cook, Historian; and Renee Gaspari Portell, Librarian. Vanessa Michelle Watkins-Nutty, Curator, was excused. Parliamentarian Marjorie Singley-Hall was also present.

The State Chaplain offered the Invocation, and Mrs. McCorkle welcomed the members of the Executive Committee.

The minutes of the June 18, 2020 meetings were reviewed and approved as read.

The State Regent announced the Honorary State Regents who were expected to attend Fall Forum: Edwina Hall Beall, Laura Marcella Reid, Virginia Grace Lingelbach, Joyce Ball Patton, and Melodye G. Brown. Mrs. McCorkle gave an update on the recent National Board of Management meeting. Detailed information on operational changes at Tamassee DAR School will be given to Georgia Daughters during the State Board of Management (SBOM) business meeting, to be held Saturday, October 24, 2020.

The State Regent discussed exciting progress at Meadow Garden. At the recommendation of the Meadow Garden Board, an interior wall between the Dining Room and Best Room was removed for exploration. The framing for two windows was clearly visible. The juxtaposition of a finished wall and unfinished wall is interesting; future interpretation ideas are being considered. The next major component of Meadow Garden's restoration and preservation plan will likely be the engineering of a new HVAC system.

First Vice Regent Betty Harrah deferred her report until the State Board of Management business meeting.

Five motions were introduced in support of State Regent OB McCorkle's selected projects: Mrs. Harrah moved that the Executive Committee recommend that the State Board of Management approve and adopt as a State Project, selected by State Regent OB Wilhoit McCorkle: For the Georgia State Society NSDAR to support the Gate of Opportunity Scholarship program at Georgia's own Berry College by sponsoring student scholarship recipients at the cost of \$7,000 per scholar, per year. Combining our donations with student work and a matching grant allows student recipients to graduate debt-free. The number of student recipients will be determined by the amount raised. Any excess funds will be applied to the Capital Improvement Fund of Meadow Garden. Seconded by Chaplain Amy Nation. Motion passed.

Mrs. Harrah moved that the Executive Committee recommend that the State Board of Management approve and adopt as a State Project, selected by State Regent OB

Wilhoit McCorkle: For the Georgia State Society NSDAR to fund implementation of the Plan for Historic Restoration and Preservation of Meadow Garden, which was prepared by Landmark Preservation LLC, and approved by the Meadow Garden Board. Projects will be initiated based on the current assessment of priorities and funds available. Any excess funds will be applied to the Capital Improvement Fund of Meadow Garden. Seconded by Corresponding Secretary Cathy Hyer. Motion passed.

Mrs. Nation moved that the Executive Committee recommend that the State Board of Management approve and adopt as a State Project, selected by State Regent OB Wilhoit McCorkle: For the Georgia State Society NSDAR to support the State Project entitled Operation Home Front by encouraging Georgia chapters to send care packages to active military families at remote bases and posts; these locations being assigned to chapters by the Project Patriot Vice Chair. And for the Georgia State Society to underwrite the costs of the service project Operation Home Front at state events not to exceed \$2,500 per fiscal year, funds to be taken from the GSS Checking State Regent's Project Fund. Any excess funds will be applied to the Capital Improvement Fund of Meadow Garden. Seconded by Librarian Renee Portell. Motion passed.

Mrs. Hyer moved that the Executive Committee recommend that the State Board of Management approve and adopt as a State Project, selected by State Regent OB Wilhoit McCorkle: For the Georgia State Society NSDAR to spotlight Constitution Week and Georgia Day by purchase and distribution of materials designed to increase awareness of these important days of observance among our citizens and representatives at the Georgia State Capitol, not to exceed \$2,000 per fiscal year, funds to be taken from the GSS Checking State Regent's Project Fund. Any excess funds will be applied to the Capital Improvement Fund of Meadow Garden. Seconded by Organizing Secretary Teresa Floyd. Motion passed.

Mrs. Harrah moved that the Executive Committee recommend that the State Board of Management approve and adopt as a State Project, selected by State Regent OB Wilhoit McCorkle: For the Georgia State Society NSDAR to support the State Project entitled JROTC Adoption Project by encouraging each Georgia chapter to serve a JROTC unit in the local area by providing medals, awards, and other gifts to show care and support to the cadets. This project has no monetary cost to the Georgia State Society. Seconded by Amy Nation. Motion passed.

Mrs. Harrah is planning a social outing for Georgia Daughters attending the 2021 Continental Congress. The Decatur House, Washington, DC, has been chosen as a prospective location.

Second Vice Regent Helen Powell asked Mrs. McCorkle to report on the issues surrounding Tamassee DAR School. Due to recent changes in federal and state regulations, group care for children in foster care has been restricted. As a result, the Tamassee Board of Trustees voted in February 2020 to transition away from residential care and close their Middle School Academy. These changes in the school's scope led to the determination that Tamassee no longer met the requirements of a nationally-supported DAR School. It was recommended by the National Executive Committee that the National Board of Management resign Tamassee as an official DAR School. The motion was adopted on October 10, 2020. The Georgia State Society is not in a position to act contrary to NSDAR's policy on DAR Schools and will no longer have a special project at Tamassee. The CIP, GTR forms, and the Hightower Award requirements have been updated to reflect the change. The Georgia State Society will no longer provide sponsorship or collect monies to support the May Irwin Talmadge Auditorium and Gymnasium. Per a 2014 resolution, remaining funds held in the Georgia State Project Fund at Tamassee will be divided between the GSSDAR General Fund and the Meadow Garden Admin and Maintenance Fund. GSSDAR's legal position regarding our Endowment Fund held at Tamassee is governed by a resolution passed in 1990 and is being investigated. A letter has been prepared and sent to Tamassee from GSSDAR. Per the 1990 resolution, the disposition of monies recovered from the Endowment Fund shall be decided by the membership at the next State Conference. Mrs. McCorkle and Historian Kate

Cook discussed the recordkeeping and accounting of GSSDAR monies currently held at Tamassee. A statement of principle and interest has been requested of the school by Mrs. McCorkle.

Mrs. Powell continued by deferring the majority of her report until the State Board of Management, but wished to highlight her attendance at Toccoa Chapter's 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration of Women's Right to Vote and Kate Duncan Smith DAR School's virtual Dedication Day.

Chaplain Amy Nation has sent cards to 143 members celebrating their 90+ birthdays. Mrs. Nation reported that 14 Georgia Daughters have or will be celebrating 100+ birthdays. Our oldest member is 105 and is a member of Chestatee River. Special appreciation was expressed to Past State Chaplain Mary King Givens, who worked tirelessly to ensure the Memorial Service postponed from the March 2020 State Conference will be a beautiful service. The Memorial Service scheduled for Sunday, October 25, 2020 will include Daughters reported deceased from March 1, 2019 – March 1, 2020. Since March 1, 2020, GSSDAR has recorded 86 member deaths. A listing of reported deaths since March 1, 2020 can be found on the GSSDAR Members Only website under the "In Memoriam" section. In addition to attending various chapter meetings via Zoom, Mrs. Nation has been pleased to make the acquaintance of many chapter chaplains and pray with Georgia Daughters.

Recording Secretary Amy Lawson will create an online submission form, GRC-01, to receive all annual reports for the Proceedings. This method will eliminate formatting and word count issues. Mrs. Hyer will send an access link, via email, to State Officers, the Coordinator of Districts, District Directors, State Chairmen, and State Club Presidents. The due date for annual reports will remain March 1 (May 1 for clubs).

Corresponding Secretary Cathy Hyer creates a well-received, weekly blog that's distributed via email on Monday mornings at 8:30 a.m. The VIS committee then posts the blog's content to the GSSDAR Members Only site. Mrs. Hyer has updated all state-maintained email addresses, sent over 300 invitations to serve in the McCorkle Administration, and published the 2020-2021 State Directory. Mrs. Hyer created the online registration forms for Fall Forum, the Fall Forum Program, and the first State Regent's Online Sales Table. All billing and contact information has been updated for Simple Give and Constant Contact. She has hosted and attended numerous Zoom meeting for chapters and GSSDAR. Mrs. Hyer created the first NSDAR-approved YouTube Channel for the Georgia State Society and manages the content. Mrs. McCorkle asked all State Officers to create a short blurb to be posted on the YouTube Channel. Mrs. Hyer coordinated with Mary Williams, VIS Co-Chair, to create official Georgia State Society Online Guidelines. A draft of the guidelines was presented and discussed.

Mrs. Hyer moved to approve the GSS Online Guidelines as corrected. Seconded by Renee Portell. Motion passed.

Mrs. Hyer expressed appreciation to Beverly Baker, Vice Chair State Events Committee Program Ads, for her beautiful ad designs in the Fall Forum Program. Mrs. Hyer thanked OB McCorkle, Melodye Brown, Betty Harrah, Helen Powell, Vicky Frolich, Carla Brown, and Ann Ameye for their assistance proofreading the program.

Organizing Secretary Teresa Floyd announced the newest chapter, Kings Gap, located in Pine Mountain, Mary Mullins, Organizing Regent. Kings Gap held it's organizing meeting on September 15, 2020 via Zoom with 56 members and guests attending. The National Board of Management approved the chapter at their October 5, 2020 meeting. Kings Gap currently has 59 members and is running smoothly. No issues have been reported to Mrs. Floyd from other chapters.

Treasurer Kay Ragan distributed copies of GSS and Meadow Garden financials. The **Georgia State Society Account Summaries** were: Certificates of Deposit \$135,762.49; Checking Account \$167,386.34; Money Market Account \$154,270.78; Total Liabilities and Equity \$457,419.61. The **Meadow Garden Account Summaries** were: Certificates of Deposit \$308,117.50; Checking Account \$103,944.17; Money Market Accounts \$146,091.99; Petty Cash \$100.00; Total Fixed Assets \$344,496.09 and Total Liabilities and Equity \$902,749.75.

Mrs. Ragan reported that four CDs had matured since the previous Board meeting. Two were moved from SunTrust Bank to First State Bank for twelve months. One was moved from Regions Bank to Georgia Community Bank for twelve months. And one at Touchmark National Bank was renewed for twelve months.

Registrar Kitty Watters emphasized a renewed focus on membership. Mrs. Watters reported that 230 applications have been verified since July. She has coordinated efforts of Volunteer Genealogy, Lineage Research, Membership, and the State Application Team (SAT) to facilitate the approval of applications to increase membership. Mrs. Watters penned a blog post and has helped many Registrars and Regents with situations ranging from data entry to electronic applications and Pre-Letters. Since last year's Fall Forum, Georgia Daughters have held 119 genealogy education programs, forty-eight of those were the new, free Registrar Training Course. Mrs. Watters sent emails to each member that completed one or more courses and invited them to attend a Genealogy Recognition on Friday night. Although many are unable to attend due to the pandemic, thirty members are expected to be recognized. Mrs. Watters is enrolled in the Registrar Training Course and has completed ten of twelve lessons. Seventeen "Have Written" letters have been cleared since July. GSSDAR has no Pending Members in Six Months Status. Nine volunteer Genealogists have been assigned to Georgia chapters. All twenty SAT members have received image access from NSDAR. The team is working on 80+ applications. Mrs. Watters has coordinated the speakers for Fall Forum's first ever live/virtual Genealogy Workshop; an informative event has been planned.

As of October 5, Georgia's membership is at 8,197, a net increase of 107 since July 1. There have been 254 applications submitted during the McCorkle Administration, with 230+verified and 94 pending.

Historian Kate Cook deferred the majority of her report until the State Board of Management business meeting. Mrs. Cook has received three Outstanding Teacher of American History applications.

Librarian Renee Portell deferred the majority of her report until the State Board of Management business meeting. Mrs. Portell recently joined a call with the Librarian General and received information about the NSDAR Book Club on Facebook.

Mrs. Portell moved that the Executive Committee recommend to the State Board of Management that \$500 be donated to the NSDAR Library in honor of Georgia State Regent, OB Wilhoit McCorkle, for the purchase of books for the Georgia collection, to be taken from the GSS Money Market Library Fund. The check will be sent after January 1, 2021, for use in that year. Seconded by Mrs. Powell. Motion passed.

Parliamentarian Marjorie Singley-Hall reported that Robert's Rules of Order, Revision 12, was published in September 2020. In accordance, NSDAR revised the National Bylaws as well as the National Model for State Bylaws and the National Model for Chapter Bylaws. Chapters are encouraged to review their bylaws with the August 2020 Model for Chapter Bylaws due to the many changes, primarily centered around electronic meetings but in other areas as well. Chapters are required to submit their bylaws electronically by November 1 in order to meet the bylaws requirement on State Honor Roll.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 11:16 a.m.

and Vanessa Michelle Watkins-Nutty, Curator. Parliamentarian Marjorie Singley-Hall was also present.

The State Chaplain offered the Invocation, and Mrs. McCorkle welcomed the members of the Executive Committee.

The minutes of the October 22, 2020 meetings were reviewed and approved as corrected. The State Regent announced new Fall Forum dates for 2021. Due to unforeseen circumstances, the Macon Marriott City Center, Macon, GA, will be closed to the public during the months of August and September. Fall Forum has been moved to October 13-17, 2021.

The COVID-19 pandemic has necessitated small changes to the operating procedures typical of the Georgia State Conference, including wearing masks and simulcasting sessions into multiple venue spaces to allow for social distancing. Mrs. McCorkle discussed possible questions that may be brought forth by the membership and how to address their concerns. The State Regent expressed appreciation to Bruce Hyer for donating his time and technical expertise throughout the Conference, saving GSSDAR thousands of dollars in A/V expenses.

The State Regent reminded all officers to read the President General's blog for updates from National.

All projects started during the Brown Administration at Meadow Garden have now been completed. Four new projects will begin soon: restoration of the exterior viewing porch on the canal-side, restoration of an original doorway leading into the house from the viewing porch; restoration of an original cased opening leading from the Best Room to the Dining Room; and mechanical and engineering updates needed to run the future HVAC system through the chimney flues. Mrs. McCorkle stressed the importance of continued communication with Georgia Daughters about Meadow Garden and its many ongoing projects.

First Vice Regent Betty Harrah deferred her report until the business meeting.

A motion was introduced in support of the NSDAR Next Act Campaign:

Mrs. Harrah moved that the Executive Committee recommend to the Finance Committee that the Georgia State Society sponsor, as part of the Next Act Campaign of the NSDAR President General, Denise Doring VanBuren, the restoration of a Lay Light panel at Constitution Hall in the amount of \$30,000, to be paid from the "State Dues Unallocated/General Savings Money Market Account", and this donation is in honor of all Georgia Daughters. Seconded by Recording Secretary Amy Lawson. Motion passed.

Second Vice Regent Helen Powell deferred the majority of her report until the business meeting, but she wished to recognize the 88 Georgia chapters eligible to receive the Hightower Award, a remarkable achievement during the COVID-19 restrictions. Appreciation was expressed to Kay Hightower for continuing to provide monetary support for the award. Mrs. Powell discussed discrepancies in the reporting on the CAA vs GSS-05 related to Hightower eligibility. It was decided that the question regarding programs will be taken off the GSS-05. That information will now be taken directly from the CAA.

A motion was introduced regarding the Georgia State Society Endowment Fund for the May Irwin Talmadge Auditorium and Gymnasium at Tamassee DAR School:

Mrs. Powell moved that the Executive Committee recommend to the Finance Committee that the Georgia State Society approve remaining funds in the Georgia State Society Endowment Fund for the Talmadge Auditorium/Gymnasium at Tamassee, be divided between the Meadow Garden Capital Investment/Improvement Checking Account and the Georgia State Society State Dues Unallocated/General Savings Account in the event the remaining funds are returned. Seconded by First Vice Regent Betty Harrah. Motion withdrawn.

After discussion, it was decided the motion needed to be rewritten. The Executive Board would prefer the motion reflect multiple options for the return of the remaining funds, such as dividing the amount between a scholarship for Berry College and the Meadow Garden Heritage Education Center, if possible.

The revised motion was introduced regarding the Georgia State Society Endowment Fund for the May Irwin Talmadge Auditorium and Gymnasium at Tamassee DAR School:

Mrs. Powell moved that the Executive Committee recommend to the Finance Committee that the Georgia State Society approve remaining funds in the Georgia State Society Endowment Fund for the Talmadge Auditorium/Gymnasium at Tamassee, be returned to the Georgia State Society and be divided between the Meadow Garden Capital Investment/Improvement Checking Account and the Georgia State Society State Dues Unallocated/General Savings Account. In the event the remaining funds are not returned, I move the Executive Committee recommends to the Finance Committee that the Georgia State Society approve redirection of the use of funds within the Georgia State Society Endowment Fund for the Talmadge Auditorium/Gymnasium at Tamassee to be divided between the benefit and use of the Meadow Garden Heritage Education Center in Augusta, Georgia, and a scholarship for Tamassee and/or other local students to attend Berry College in Rome, Georgia. Both uses to effective within the discretion of the Executive Committee. Seconded by First Vice Regent Betty Harrah. Motion passed.

Mrs. Powell announced that GSSDAR will be sponsoring two Gate of Opportunity Scholars at Berry College next year.

Chaplain Amy Nation deferred the majority of her report until the business meeting but thanked members for their help and support of the upcoming Memorial Service. Since January 1, 2021, GSSDAR has recorded 173 member deaths. 321 Georgia Daughters will be celebrating 90+ birthdays this year. 11 Daughters are over 100 years old; the oldest member is 104 and a member of the Earl of Camden Chapter. Mrs. Nation expressed appreciation and love to all chapter chaplains for their hard work and perseverance during the COVID-19 pandemic. Certificates of Appreciation will be given to outstanding chapter chaplains to honor their achievements.

State Regent McCorkle thanked Mrs. Nation for her continued communication with the Honorary State Regents.

Recording Secretary Amy Lawson reported that the new Georgia Leadership Report Form, GRS-01, was successful. The remainder of her report was deferred until the business meeting.

Corresponding Secretary Cathy Hyer deferred her report until the business meeting.

State Regent McCorkle asked Mrs. Hyer to give an update on the filming at Meadow Garden. Mrs. Hyer reported that all recent projects at the property have been documented. Mr. and Mrs. Hyer will be returning in mid-April to document the beginning of new projects. Greg Jacobs, of Landmark Preservation, LLC, will also be filmed at that time. Mrs. McCorkle expressed her appreciation to Mrs. Hyer for her ongoing work with the GSSDAR weekly blog.

Organizing Secretary Teresa Floyd deferred the majority of her report until the business meeting but reported that she had been working with chapters to encourage increased membership and leadership involvement. One new chapter is in the early stages of organization. If approved, the chapter will be established in the Loganville/Snellville area.

The Executive Board took a break from reporting to watch two promotional videos produced by Mr. and Mrs. Hyer. The first video highlighted the ongoing preservation work at Meadow Garden and encouraged Georgia Daughters to support the project. The second video showcased the house tour given to visitors at Meadow Garden.

Treasurer Kay Ragan distributed copies of GSS and Meadow Garden financials. The **Georgia State Society Account Summaries** were: Certificates of Deposit \$135,845.24; Checking Account \$253,574.40; Money Market Account \$150,435.80; Total Liabilities and Equity \$539,855.44. The **Meadow Garden Account Summaries** were: Certificates of Deposit \$308,119.72; Checking Account \$163,070.63; Money Market Accounts \$146,206.59; Petty Cash \$100.00; Total Fixed Assets \$344,496.09 and Total Liabilities and Equity \$961,993.03.

Mrs. Ragan reported that Meadow Garden will begin using direct deposit for payroll.

Registrar Kitty Watters stressed that membership remains her focus. As of the March 5, 2021 National Board of Management meeting, the Georgia State Society had increased by 164 to a total of 8,251 members during the McCorkle Administration. That's an outstanding number given the difficulties faced during the COVID-19 pandemic. As of the meeting, there

were 78 Pending and 16 Verified applications in March. Mrs. Watters acknowledged that we must constantly add members to maintain our membership numbers. Chapters are encouraged to bring in new members and reinstatements. There are many ways in which Chapter Registrars are supported, including: Georgia State Genealogy Teams, the America 250! Membership Task Force, the National Lineage Research Virtual Support Team, the free Registrar Training Course, and new Genie Clips. To aid in member retention, National is focusing on helping members with supplementals. Mrs. Watters announced that a Genealogy Workshop featuring Supplemental Training and a Paper Party would be given during the afternoon, following presentations by Dr. Debbie Duay, State First Vice Regent of Florida, and Forrest Crosley, NSDAR Assistant Director, Supplementals. During the McCorkle Administration, the State Application Team (SAT) has submitted 35 applications to chapters; 27 have been verified; 46 are actively being worked now. This administration inherited 26 "Have Writtens". Of those, 17 have been cleared, four were sent to America 250!, and five are being worked on by our Lineage Research Team. Mrs. Watters authored a blog pertaining to Registrars that was published as two articles in February 2021. The Registrar has completed the GEP6 Registrar Training Course and the GEP4 DNA & the DAR Course, Registrar General Pat McFall has initiated an online DAR Genealogy Lecture Series. Mrs. Watters has attended the first two: The Revolutionary War Era Genealogy Part 1 with Craig Roberts Scott and Starting Right and Staying Organized with Billie Stone Fogarty. The State Registrar worked with Chapter Regents and Registrars, as well as the State Chair of Volunteer Genealogy, to assign Volunteer Genealogists and works with Lineage Research to clear AIRs. Mrs. Watters is frequently asked to help facilitate priority applications for prospective members over 90+ and the terminally ill. DAR is extremely responsive to those requests. Mrs. Watters also worked with the Membership Committee, SAT, and Chapter Development and Revitalization Committee State Chairs on a variety of situations to help new members join and thereby strengthen our Georgia chapters.

Historian Kate Cook deferred the majority of her report until the business meeting. She announced that the winner of the State Outstanding Teacher of American History contest, Mr. Johnny Griffin, sponsored by the Philadelphia Winn Chapter, will not be in attendance during the DAR School/Youth Luncheon. Mrs. Cook will make the official presentation of his certificate and monetary award at the Philadelphia Winn Chapter meeting in May.

Librarian Renee Portell deferred the majority of her report until the business meeting. Mrs. Portell expressed appreciation to Kay Ragan for her help gathering information pertinent to the Librarian's Certificates of Award.

Curator Vanessa Watkins-Nutty deferred her report until the business meeting.

A motion was introduced regarding the purchase of a laminating machine for the Seating Committee:

Mrs. Watkins-Nutty moved that the GSSDAR purchase a laminating machine and extra laminating sheets for use by the Seating Committee and kept and maintained by the State Curator. Funds allocated from the Georgia State Society State Dues Unallocated Checking Account and not to exceed \$150.00. Seconded by Librarian Renee Portell. Motion passed.

Parliamentarian Marjorie Singley-Hall reminded members that Robert's Rules of Order, Revision 12, is now available. In accordance, NSDAR revised the National Bylaws as well as the National Model for State Bylaws and the National Model for Chapter Bylaws. Mrs. Singley-Hall will begin contacting Georgia Chapters to confirm their bylaws are in agreement with the new guidelines. Chapters are required to submit their bylaws electronically by November 1 in order to meet the bylaws requirement on State Honor Roll. 100 chapters submitted their bylaws in 2020.

State Regent McCorkle reminded the Executive Committee that the Proposed Budget was presented at State Board of Management and will come forward for approval during the State Conference Business Meeting. There was no discussion.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 11:04 a.m.

# State Board of Management Minutes October 24, 2020

The State Board of Management of the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, met on Saturday, October 24, 2020, at the Macon Centreplex, Macon, Georgia, with State Regent O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle presiding and State Recording Secretary Amy Pittman Lawson present at the meeting.

The meeting was called to order at 8:32 a.m. The Invocation was given by Amy Bolin Nation, State Chaplain. The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America was led by Pamela Ann Lyle, State Chair, Flag of the United States of America. The American's Creed was led by Susan Helton Gwaltney, State Chair, American Heritage. The Preamble to the Constitution was led by Rebecca Katherine Croft, State Chair, Chapter Achievement Award. The National Anthem was sung by Jeanie Evans Joesbury, State Co-Chair, Music. The Pledge to the Georgia Flag was led by Nancy Clark Coleman, State Co-Chair, DAR Service for Veterans.

The State Regent thanked Victoria "Vicky" Conn Frolich, State Events Chair, Judith "Judy" Richards Sherling, Coordinator of Districts, and the following District Directors for their coordination of the State Board of Management meeting: Phyllis Hill King, Northwest; Leslie Strickland Watkins, Northeast; Mary Shepherd Kuntz, Southwest; Sandra Dukes Avant, Southeast. State Parliamentarian Marjorie Singley-Hall was also presented.

Membership Task Force and recognized the following member with a Congressional Committee appointment: Lauren Nicole Baker, Congress Shops. Mrs. McCorkle also recognized the Veterans Affairs Voluntary Service Representatives and Deputies in attendance.

The following members in attendance holding DAR School appointments were acknowledged: KDS DAR School: Mrs. McCorkle, Member, Board of Trustees; Shannon Logue, Member, Endowment Committee; Mrs. Harrah, Secretary, Programs and Promotions Committee.

The State Regent recognized the members of the Timekeepers Committee and thanked them for their service: Carol Goff Russell, Chair, and Trudie Bilberry Pabst, Vice Chair.

The State Parliamentarian read Article VIII, Sections 1, 3, 4, and  $\tilde{5}$  of the Bylaws pertaining to the State Board of Management.

Mrs. Prince, Chair of the Credentials Committee, gave the first credentials report. As of 8:15 a.m., Mrs. Prince reported the following attendance: 1 National Officer, 12 State Officers, 5 Honorary State Regents, 65 Chapter Regents or voting Vice-Regents. Total Voting Strength: 78. Also present were: 1 Parliamentarian, and 195 Chapter Members. Without duplication, 274 daughters representing 96 chapters were in attendance. Mrs. Prince moved the adoption of the first credentials report. Adopted. A quorum was established. Mrs. Prince recognized her committee members, including Patricia "Pat" Haynes Bradford and Constance "Connie" Sasser Rifkind.

There being no objection, it was stated that the Proceedings Committee would review and approve the minutes of this State Board of Management meeting.

Mrs. Nation gave the Blessing for Breakfast, after which the meeting resumed.

First Vice Regent Harrah took the chair while the State Regent gave her report.

Since taking office following the historic virtual Continental Congress in June, State Regent McCorkle spent her weeks planning during the COVID-19 crisis, sheltering in place orders, and civil unrest around the country. Despite the challenging circumstances, the State Society launched a revamped Members Only Website and a vibrant public website on the first day of the administration to meet the news of the members, many of whom were quarantined due to the pandemic. VIS Co-Chairs Ruth Reed Pendergrass and Beverly Vaughan Baker were instrumental in the roll-out and worked overtime for several months in preparation.

Mrs. McCorkle learned how to Zoom and make YouTube videos of herself, two unexpected duties of her office. She initiated a weekly Georgia State Society blog, distributed every Monday morning at 8:30 a.m. to each Georgia Daughter, in an effort to connect with all members and provide pertinent information on a regular and timely basis.

To overcome restraints of gathering in person, the State Regent participated in the first-ever, virtual "Tea for Two", honoring the State Regent and State Outstanding Junior. Meeting via Zoom, Georgia Daughters were able to gain information, learn about projects, experience social breakout rooms, and have much-needed fun. Mrs. McCorkle expressed appreciation to the Burkhalter Chapter for hosting the event and State Corresponding Secretary Mrs. Hyer for providing the technical expertise necessary to make the tea interactive for over 250 Georgia Daughters that virtual attended.

The State Regent planned and executed a mini summer 3-day conference in Thomson, Georgia during July. Productive meetings were held by the Meadow Garden Board, Finance Committee, and Executive Board. After meeting with the Macon Marriott Hotel in July and learning of the economic struggles of the hotel industry amid the pandemic, Mrs. McCorkle announced the postponement of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Fall Forum from August 2020 to October 2020.

State Regent McCorkle was privileged to attend the Toccoa Chapter commemoration of the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment and honor their Organizing Regent Mary Jarrett White, the first woman to vote in Georgia. Mrs. McCorkle was invited to bring greetings and attend the virtual Georgia State Society, N.S.C.A.R. Workshops. The State Regent enjoyed speaking virtually with the newly organized King's Gap Chapter and presented programs at Cherokee, Sukey Hart, and Old Noonday Chapters. She brought greetings at the Joseph Habersham Chapter and the virtual Constitution Week Celebration hosted by the Augusta Chapter. Mrs. McCorkle enjoyed a joint visit in Newnan with five chapters: Andrew McBride, Augustin Clayton, Fayette Starr's Mill, General Daniel Newnan, and James Waldrop Chapters. The State Regent also attended the virtual National Board of Management and presented the State Gifts at the virtual Dedication Day at Kate Duncan Smith DAR School.

Mrs. McCorkle hosted several Zoom meetings with the state chairs in preparation for the new DAR year. She attended many planning meetings and conference calls for Fall Forum. The State Regent made numerous visits to Meadow Garden to meet with Greg Jacobs of Landmark Preservation to learn of discoveries being made during the implementation of the Plan of Restoration and Preservation at Meadow Garden.

The State Regent updated members on the news from the National Board of Management. Tamassee DAR School was resigned as a DAR-supported school. Changes in legislation eliminated the facility's ability to provide for displaced children in a group environment, and the Tamassee Board of Trustees closed its Academy in June. The live online genealogy assistance sessions have been authorized to continue year-round to help members with applications and supplementals. A five-year initiative was approved to increase awareness of Revolutionary War Patriots of minority descent as we approach the 250<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the nation. The effort, to be called the E Pluribus Unum Educational Project, was launched as a way that DAR can help to raise appreciation for the sacrifice and courage of all Patriots. It was also reported at the National Board of Management that DAR Constitution Hall is in its third, and final, phase of refurbishment of the auditorium in excess of \$10 million.

The State Regent thanked the members for the honor and privilege to represent the Georgia State Society and the Georgia Daughters. Mrs. McCorkle expressed her appreciation for all members' work to make the State Society successful and asked all Daughters to keep participating in their own communities and support state-sponsored efforts while being Anchored in Education, Patriotism, and Historic Preservation. Mrs. Harrah thanked Mrs. McCorkle for her outstanding leadership during unprecedented challenges. The Georgia Daughters responded with a standing ovation. The State Regent resumed the chair and called for executive committee reports.

State First Vice Regent Betty Harrah serves as Secretary of the Finance Committee, the Meadow Garden Board, prepares the Courtesy Resolutions for the Resolutions Committee, and serves as a member of Proceedings and Bylaws Committees. Mrs. Harrah has participated in the planning meetings of the Fall Forum, assisted the State Regent and State Treasurer updating the Treasurer forms, and helped the Coordinator of Districts to update the Chapter Officer's Calendar. Mrs. Harrah brought greetings for the State Regent at the SAR Siege of Augusta Ceremony by Zoom and the Dedication of a Daughter's grave Ceremony by the newly organized King's Gap Chapter.

State Regent McCorkle gave an update on Tamassee DAR School. Recent changes in federal and state legislation limit the use of group care for children in foster care. As a result, Tamassee DAR School Board of Trustees voted in February to transition out of residential care and close its middle school academy. The academy was discontinued in May and the last residential student left Tamassee's care in June. As a result of the changes in Tamassee's scope, mission, and purpose, the National Executive Committee determined that Tamassee did not meet the criteria of a nationally-supported DAR School and recommended to the National Board of Management to resign Tamassee as a DAR School at its October 10, 2020 meeting, Mrs. McCorkle stressed that Georgia Daughters should be proud that they helped to establish, a century ago, an institution of education in a remote area where access to public education did not exist. Regrettably, no Helen Pouch Memorial Fund or other NSDAR funding sources can go to non-approved schools. The GSSDAR is not in a position to act contrary to NSDAR's policy. As a result of this action, the Georgia State Society will no longer have a special project at Tamassee because it is no longer a DAR School. The CIP, GTR forms, and the Hightower requirements have been updated to reflect the change. Tamassee DAR School is its own legal entity; NSDAR has no legal standing or obligation to require a name change or any other change on campus. The buildings and cottages at Tamassee are fully owned and operated by the school, which has responsibility for them. Donors and sponsors have no legal rights or responsibilities regarding the properties. The GSSDAR's sponsorship of the May Erwin Talmadge Auditorium and Gymnasium has been a goodwill effort that is unofficial and not legally binding. Per the 2014 Resolution adopted at the 116<sup>th</sup> Georgia State Conference reactivating the Georgia State Project Fund at Tamassee, which monies are held by the GSSDAR for maintenance of the auditorium, remaining funds will now be divided between the Meadow Garden: Administration and Maintenance Fund and the GSSDAR: General Fund. Mrs. McCorkle announced that the GSSDAR's legal position regarding the Endowment Fund placed with Tamassee per the 1990 Resolution adopted at the State Board of Management is being investigated. A letter prepared by Cook Law Group was sent to Tamassee DAR School from GSSDAR. Per the Resolution, the disposition of any monies recovered from the fund shall be decided by the membership at the next State Conference. State Regent stressed that while members and chapters may continue to support Tamassee as they wish, the President

General urged all donors to thoroughly review the purpose and soundness of any nonprofit to which they choose to donate their funds.

State Second Vice Regent and DAR School Chair Helen Powell prepared a blog for the GSS website. She reached out to the Hightower family and received approval for changes to the school contribution award requirements necessitated by the regrettable resignation of Tamassee as a DAR School by NBOM. The State Regent will no longer have a Special Project at Tamassee this year and the CIP has been updated accordingly. Mrs. Powell encouraged all Daughters to register and celebrate KDS Dedication Day virtually. She communicated with DAR Schools and Approved Schools representatives regarding Fall Forum plans. She is pleased to share that Beth Cagle from KDS plus Josh Mullins and Jordan Collins from Hindman Settlement School were in attendance at the Fall Forum workshops to share updates about their students. Other school representatives were not able to attend due to pandemic travel restrictions but sent brief videos. Mrs. Powell announced plans to include all school videos on the GSSDAR YouTube channel following Fall Forum.

State Chaplain Amy Nation was honored to uplift Georgia Daughters in prayer through the joys and sorrows of the year. Our State Scripture is Colossians 2:3 "Whatever you do, do as if you are working for the Lord and not for men." Birthday greetings were sent to 143 Georgia Daughters over 90 years old. Mrs. Nation reported 14 Georgia Daughters have or will be celebrating birthdays over 100 years old. Currently, our oldest member is 105 and in the Chestatee River Chapter. Past State Chaplain Mary King Givens worked tremendously hard to ensure the Memorial Service postponed from March's State Conference is a beautiful service. Mrs. Nation extended special thanks and appreciation to her for her grace and dedication to the administrative transition during a National Pandemic. The Memorial Service scheduled for Sunday will include Daughters reported deceased from March 1, 2019 – March 1, 2020. Since March 1, 2020, Georgia has had 83 precious souls go to glory. A listing of reported member deaths since March 1, 2020 can be found on the GSSDAR Members Website in the "In memoriam" section. This Officer sent condolences to the next of kin as reported by chapter chaplains. Mrs. Nation had the privilege of attending and blessing the charter meeting for King's Gap Chapter. Stallings Island and Fielding Lewis also extended virtual Zoom invitations. She has had the extreme delight and pleasure of getting to know chapter chaplains and help Georgia Daughters as needed. Mrs. Nation offered her continued help and assistance to all.

State Recording Secretary Amy Lawson asked First Vice Regent Harrah to take the chair and presented the Recommendations from the Executive Committee.

That the Executive Committee recommend that the State Board of Management that \$500 be donated to the NSDAR Library in honor of Georgia State Regent, O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle, to the taken from the GSS Money Market Library Fund, for the purchase of books for the Georgia collection. The check will be sent after January 1, 2021, for use in that year. Adopted.

That the State Board of Management approve and adopt as a State Project, selected by State Regent O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle: For the Georgia State Society NSDAR to support the Gate of Opportunity Scholarship program at Georgia's own Berry College by sponsoring student scholarship recipients at a cost of \$7,000 per scholar, per year. Combining our donations with student work and a matching grant allows student recipients to graduate debt free. The number of student recipients will be determined by the amount raised. Any excess funds will be applied to the Capitol Improvement Fund of Meadow Garden. Adopted.

That the State Board of Management approve and adopt as a State Project, selected by State Regent O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle: For the Georgia State Society NSDAR to fund implementation of the Plan for Historic Restoration and Preservation of Meadow Garden, which was prepared by Landmark Preservation, LLC, and approved by the Meadow Garden Board. Projects will be initiated based on current assessment of priorities and funds available. Any excess funds will be applied to the Capitol Improvement Fund of Meadow Garden. Adopted.

That the State Board of Management approve and adopt as a State Project, selected

by State Regent O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle: For the Georgia State Society NSDAR to support the State Project entitled Operation Home Front by encouraging Georgia chapters to send care packages to active military families at remote bases and posts; these locations being assigned to chapters by the Project Patriot Vice Chair. And for the Georgia State Society to underwrite the costs of the service project Operation Home Front at state events not to exceed \$2,500 per fiscal year, funds to be taken from the GSS Checking State Regent's Projects Fund. Any excess funds will be applied to the Capitol Improvement Fund of Meadow Garden. Adopted.

That the State Board of Management approve and adopt as a State Project, selected by State Regent O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle: For the Georgia State Society NSDAR to spotlight Constitution Week and Georgia Day by purchase and distribution of materials designed to increase awareness of these important days of observance among citizens and representatives at the Georgia State Capitol, not to exceed \$2,500 per fiscal year, funds to be taken from the GSS Checking State Regent's Projects Fund. Any excess funds will be applied to the Capitol Improvement Fund of Meadow Garden. Adopted.

That the State Board of Management approve and adopt as a State Project, selected by State Regent O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle: For the Georgia State Society NSDAR to support the State Project entitled JROTC Adoption Project by encouraging each Georgia chapter to serve a JROTC unit in the local area by providing medals, awards, and other gifts to show care and support to the cadets. This project has no monetary cost to the Georgia State Society. Adopted.

First Vice Regent Harrah asked Mrs. Lawson to complete her report. Mrs. Lawson informed members that upcoming annual reports will be submitted using an online form sent via email to State Officers, Chapter Regents, and State Chairs. More information will be available closer to the deadline. Mrs. Lawson reminded committee chairs to include a list of awards conferred at State Conference with their reports. The State Regent resumed the Chair and continued with the state officer reports.

State Corresponding Secretary Cathy Hyer has worked closely with the State Regent to create a weekly informational blog sent to Georgia Daughters on Monday mornings. Mrs. Hyer updated the state email addresses, sent over 300 invitations to serve in the McCorkle administration, created and frequently updates the GSSDAR State Directory, created three registration forms for Fall Forum, and created the State Regent's Online Sales Table. Mrs. Hyer also updated the GSSDAR contact information for Simple Give and Constant Contact and worked with the State Treasurer to ensure accurate reporting of funds received through online giving. Mrs. Hyer created the first NSDAR-approved YouTube channel for GSSDAR and asked state chairs to submit short videos for publication. The Fall Forum Program was designed and merged with the ad pages created by Vice Chair State Events Committee, Program Ads, Beverly Baker. Appreciation was extended to Mrs. McCorkle, Honorary State Regent Melodye Brown, Mrs. Harrah, Mrs. Powell, State Events Committee Chair Vicky Frolich, VIS Advisor Carla Brown, and State Events Committee Advisor Ann Ameye, for their assistance proofreading the program.

State Organizing Secretary Teresa Floyd announced that Georgia's newest chapter, King's Gap, located in Pine Mountain, held an organizing meeting via Zoom on September 15, 2020, with 56 members and guests in attendance. The National Board of Management approved the chapter on October 5, 2020. The chapter has 59 members. Mary Mullins is the Organizing Regent. There are now 116 chapters in the Georgia State Society.

State Treasurer Kay Ragan distributed the financial reports. The **Georgia State Society Account Summaries** were: Certificates of Deposit \$135,762.49; checking account \$167,386.34; Money Market Account \$154,270.78; Total Bank Accounts \$457,419.61; Total Liabilities and Equity \$457,419.61. The **Meadow Garden Account Summaries** were: Certificates of Deposit \$308,117.50; checking account \$103,944.17; Petty Cash: \$100.00; Money Market Account \$146,091.99; Total Bank Accounts \$558,253.66; Total Fixed Assets \$344,496.09 and Total Liabilities and Equity \$902,749.75. Mrs. Ragan reported that the audit had been completed by Mauldin & Jenkins CPA and everything was found in order.

State Registrar Kitty Watters reported there were 8,153 Georgia Daughters as of January 1, 2021. 335 new member applications were approved; 291 members were resigned, deceased, or transferred. The GSSDAR membership count as of October 5,2020 was 8,197. As of October 24, 2020, Georgia has 94 pending members, 24 of whom have been verified. In response to the President General's "We Can Do It" initiative, chapter registrars were asked to work on submitting at least two new members per chapter by November 15, 2020. Mrs. Watters anticipates a large surge of applications in the coming weeks.

State Historian Kate Cook has received and is processing the chapter nominations for the Outstanding Teacher of American History, and thanks the chapters who nominated or honored such teachers in their local communities. Mrs. Cook also enjoyed presenting programs to three chapters, two of which were conducted via Zoom. She has received several reports of members' grave markers being placed and commends the chapters and families who have taken the time to honor loved ones in this meaningful manner.

State Librarian Renee Portell filed her report, which communicated her attendance at a virtual meeting with the Librarian General, Cynthia Sweeney, and other State Librarians, at which Mrs. Sweeney outlined various ways chapters can receive credit for the CMR questions pertaining to the NSDAR Library and promoted participation in the NSDAR Library Book Club on Facebook. Various questions from Georgia chapter librarians were researched and answered with the help of the DAR Library staff. To date, the NSDAR Library Acquisitions office reported zero books have been received from GSSDAR chapters, but new donation forms have been submitted and are awaiting approval.

Curator Vanessa Watkins-Nutty filed her report, which informed that state property, including the American Flag, the Flag of the State of Georgia, and the NSDAR banner were presently accounted for and in excellent condition. The curator's entire inventory list was discussed, and accounted for, with past State Curator Renee Portell, and all items appeared to be in excellent condition. Appreciation was expressed to Mrs. Portell for her willingness to maintain possession, and to arrange transport, of all state properties until the items could be transferred to Dr. Watkins-Nutty for continued safe keeping.

Special thanks were given to State Regent McCorkle by all State Officers for the opportunity to serve the Georgia Society in this capacity.

State Parliamentarian Marjorie Singley-Hall announced that Robert's Rules of Order, Revision 12, was published in September 2020. In accordance, the National Bylaws, as well as the National Model for State Bylaws and the National Model for Chapter Bylaws, were revised as well. Mrs. Singley-Hall encouraged chapters to review their bylaws with the August 2020 Model for Chapter Bylaws due to the many changes, primarily regarding electronic meetings. The Parliamentarian is collecting chapter bylaws in the state and encouraged chapters to submit them electronically by November 1, 2020 in order to meet the bylaw requirements for State Honor Roll.

The State Regent thanked the State Officers and State Parliamentatian and called for reports from the following State Chairmen:

Bylaws Chair, Melodye G. Brown, announced that the Bylaws Committee met Thursday, October 22, 2020, to consider amendments for recommendation to the 2021 State Conference. Ms. Brown recognized her committee: Betty Harrah, Marjorie Singley-Hall, Mary Mullins, Judy Dyer, and DiAnn Wheeler.

Finance Committee Secretary, Mrs. Harrah, reported in the absence of Finance Committee Chair Constance "Connie" Rifkind. Mrs. Harrah reminded members that the Finance Committee presented the 2020-2021 budget to the State Board of Management on August 7, 2019, to be voted on at the 122<sup>nd</sup> Georgia State Conference in March 2020. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, which resulted in the cancellation of the State Conference, the Finance Committee recommended that the Executive Committee approve the 2020-2021 budget so there would be no interruption of business. The Executive Committee subsequently met and approved the 2020-2021 budget. The Finance Committee recommended that this budget be ratified at the next meeting of the State Board of Management.

By the direction of the Finance Committee, Mrs. Harrah moved the ratification of the amended 2020-2021 budget, which was approved by the Executive Committee on

#### March 30, 2020. Ratified.

Mrs. Harrah continued; the Finance Committee met on July 16, 2020 and October 22, 2020 to prepare the 2021-2022 budget and discuss financial plans. As required by the State Bylaws, the proposed allocation of states dues and budget was presented in the Treasurer's handout. Subsequently, the proposed 2021-2022 budget will be published in the State Regent's Call to Conference and will be presented for a vote at the 123<sup>rd</sup> State Conference.

The Finance Committee recommended to the State Board of Management that the Resolution adopted in 2008 entitled "Annual State Society Contribution to the President General's Project" be rescinded, and be replaced by a motion to contribute to the President General's Project, an amount equal to the Benefactor Level set by NSDAR. Rationale: The President General's Project Benefactor Level amount has increased from \$1000.00 to \$1250.00, necessitating an update to the amount of the state contribution. The State Society no longer conducts business by Resolution; therefore, the Resolution needs to be rescinded, with this motion adopted to replace it. This change is to be recorded under Items of Information entitled "Annual State Society Contribution to the President General's Project." Mrs. Harrah informed the State Regent that the action would be completed in two motions.

By the direction of the Finance Committee, Mrs. Harrah moved to rescind the Resolution adopted in 2008 entitled "Annual State Society Contribution to the President General's Project." Adopted.

Mrs. Harrah requested that Second Vice Regent Powell take the chair.

By the direction of the Finance Committee, Mrs. Harrah moved to contribute to the President General's Project an amount equal to the Benefactor Level set by NSDAR, such funds to be debited from the GSSDAR State Dues Unallocated Money Market Account, and the gift to be made during the first year of a State Regent's term in honor of the State Regent of the Georgia State Society. Adopted.

Mrs. Harrah expressed appreciation to the Finance Committee: Connie Rifkind, Harriette Hankinson, Betty Harrah, Kay Ragan, Helen Powell, Lynn Tate, and Hanna Fowler.

State Regent McCorkle thanked the Finance Committee and announced that due to the format of Fall Forum, which allowed for members to hear reports from State Chairs elsewhere, most State Chair reports will be filed.

The State Regent called on State Events Chair Victoria "Vicky" Frolich to report. Mrs. Frolich thanked all attendees for their patience and graciousness. She reminded members that the hotel was shut down for the better part of eight months and expressed gratitude that they were able to open in time for the event. She hoped that attendees were learning new things, enjoying rekindling old friendships, and furthering the DAR mission. Mrs. Frolich thanked the State Events Committee for their help in planning the event.

Mrs. Beall presented the Courtesy Resolutions. Adopted. Mrs. Beall asked First Vice Regent Harrah to take the Chair and read a Courtesy Resolution expressing appreciation to the State Regent for her outstanding leadership. Adopted with a standing ovation.

State Regent McCorkle again thanked the Fall Forum Committee for their assistance in planning the State Board of Management.

The State Regent asked the Corresponding Secretary to send notes to the Honorary State Regents unable to attend.

Mrs. McCorkle recognized the State Officers and State Parliamentarian as a group. Georgia Daughters receiving National Appointments were recognized as a group. All members holding National Appointments as Chairs, Vice Chairs, or members of National and Congressional Committees, America 250! Membership Task Force, and VAVS Representatives and Deputies were also asked to stand and be greeted.

Julie Brooks Prince, Credentials Chair, gave the first Credentials report as of 8:00 a.m., Saturday, March 20, 2021: 179 voting members registered. Marjorie Singley-Hall, Parliamentarian, presented the Standing Rules of the 123<sup>rd</sup> State Conference and moved the adoption of the Standing Rules as printed in the Conference Program. Adopted.

Catherine "Cathy" Winslett Hyer, Corresponding Secretary, presented the Conference Program, and moved the adoption of the Program as amended to become the order of business for the 123<sup>rd</sup> State Conference subject to any necessary changes. Adopted.

There being no objection, the State Regent asked that the minutes of the 123<sup>rd</sup> State Conference be approved by the Proceedings Committee.

State Regent McCorkle introduced the Timekeepers: Carol Goff Russell, State Chair; and Christine Rife Napier and Trudie Bilberry Pabst, Vice Chairs.

Mrs. Harrah, First Vice Regent, took the chair while the State Regent made a report. Mrs. McCorkle's complete report will be found in the Reports of State Officers. Mrs. McCorkle wished to congratulate the Georgia Daughters for their relentless passion to push the objectives of our Society forward in the face of many obstacles created by the COVID-19 pandemic. She expressed appreciation to the chapters and their leadership for not giving up and continuing to serve and work in their communities. State Regent McCorkle stressed that we may be separated by the virus, but we are united in service. First Vice Regent Harrah expressed appreciation to Mrs. McCorkle for her hard work and dedication. State Regent McCorkle received a standing ovation.

The State Officers reported on their offices and any committees: Betty Brown Harrah, First Vice Regent; Helen Robertson Powell, Second Vice Regent; and Amy Bolin Nation, Chaplain. First Vice Regent Harrah took the Chair. Amy Pittman Lawson, Recording Secretary, brought recommendations from the Executive Committee, requiring no second:

By the direction of the Executive Committee, I move the State Conference ratify the motion adopted by the State Board of Management on October 24, 2020 to approve and adopt as a State Project, selected by State Regent O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle: For the Georgia State Society NSDAR to support the Gate of Opportunity Scholarship program at Georgia's own Berry College by sponsoring student scholarship recipients at a cost of \$7,000 per scholar, per year. Combining our donations with student work and a matching grant allows student recipients to graduate debt free. The number of student recipients will be determined by the amount raised. Any excess funds will be applied to the Capitol Improvement Fund of Meadow Garden. Adopted.

By the direction of the Executive Committee, I move the State Conference ratify the motion adopted by the State Board of Management on October 24, 2020 to approve and adopt as a State Project, selected by State Regent O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle: For the Georgia State Society NSDAR to fund implementation of the Plan for Historic Preservation and Restoration of Meadow Garden, which was prepared by Landmark Preservation, LLC, and approved by the Meadow Garden Board. Projects will be initiated based on current assessment of priorities and funds available. Any excess funds will be applied to the Capitol Improvement Fund of Meadow Garden. Adopted.

By the direction of the Executive Committee, I move the State Conference ratify the motion adopted by the State Board of Management on October 24, 2020 to approve and adopt as a State Project, selected by State Regent O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle: For the Georgia State Society NSDAR to support the State Project entitled Operation Home Front by encouraging Georgia chapters to send care packages to active military families at remote bases and posts; these locations being assigned to chapters by the Project Patriot Vice Chair. And for the Georgia State Society to underwrite the costs of the service project Operation Home Front at state events not to exceed \$2,500 per fiscal year, funds to be taken from the GSS Checking State Regent's Projects Fund. Any excess funds will be applied to the Capitol Improvement Fund of Meadow Garden. Adopted.

By the direction of the Executive Committee, I move the State Conference ratify the motion adopted by the State Board of Management on October 24, 2020 to approve and adopt as a State Project, selected by State Regent O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle: For the Georgia State Society NSDAR to spotlight Constitution Week and Georgia Day by purchase and distribution of materials designed to increase awareness of these important days of observance among citizens and representatives at the Georgia State Capitol, not to exceed \$2,500 per fiscal year, funds to be taken from the GSS Checking State Regent's Projects Fund. Any excess funds will be applied to the Capitol Improvement Fund of Meadow Garden. Adopted.

By the direction of the Executive Committee, I move the State Conference ratify the motion adopted by the State Board of Management on October 24, 2020 to approve and adopt as a State Project, selected by State Regent O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle: For the

Georgia State Society NSDAR to support the State Project entitled JROTC Adoption Project by encouraging each Georgia chapter to serve a JROTC unit in the local area by providing medals, awards, and other gifts to show care and support to the cadets. This project has no monetary cost to the Georgia State Society. Adopted.

Mrs. Lawson completed her report. The State Regent resumed the Chair and reporting continued: Catherine "Cathy" Winslett Hyer, Corresponding Secretary; Teresa Meadows Floyd, Organizing Secretary; and Kay Griffin Ragan, Treasurer.

Connie Sasser Rifkind, State Chair, Finance Committee, presented the proposed 2021-2022 budget, which was previously presented at State Board of Management on October 24, 2020, and distributed by the State Regent. Mrs. Rifkind, by direction of the Finance Committee, **moved the adoption of the 2020-2021 budget. Adopted.** 

Mrs. Rifkind continued with two additional motions: by the direction of the Finance Committee, with full support of the Executive Committee, I move the Georgia State Society sponsor, as part of the Next Act Campaign of the NSDAR President General, Denise Doring VanBuren, the restoration of a Lay Light panel at Constitution Hall in the amount of \$30,000 to be paid from the State Dues Unallocated/General Savings Money Market Account, and this donation is in honor of all Georgia Daughters. Adopted.

By the direction of the Finance Committee, with full support of the Executive Committee, I move the Georgia State Society approve remaining funds in the Georgia State Society Endowment Fund for the Talmadge Auditorium/Gymnasium at Tamassee, be returned to the Georgia State Society and be divided between the Meadow Garden Capital Investment/Improvement Checking Account and the Georgia State Society State Dues Unallocated/General Savings Account in the event the funds are returned. In the event the remaining funds are not returned, the Finance Committee further recommends that the Georgia State Society approve redirection of the use of funds within the Georgia State Society Endowment Fund for the Talmadge Auditorium/Gymnasium at Tamassee de divided between the benefit and use of the Meadow Garden Heritage Education Center in Augusta, Georgia, and a scholarship for students to attend Berry College in Rome, Georgia, within the discretion of the Georgia State Society Executive Committee. Adopted.

# AFTERNOON BUSINESS SESSION March 20, 2021

The 123<sup>rd</sup> State Conference of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, reconvened on Saturday, March 20, 2021, in the Evergreen Ballroom and Laurel Amphitheater, Atlanta Evergreen Marriott Conference Resort, Stone Mountain, Georgia.

State Regent O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle called the meeting to order at 2:31 p.m.

Mrs. McCorkle introduced President General Denise Doring VanBuren, who brought greetings. The State Regent reminded attendees that all voters should be seated in the Evergreen Ballroom and have their voter ribbons visible.

Julie Brooks Prince, Credentials Chair, gave the final Credentials report as of 2:00 p.m., Saturday, March 20, 2021: 214 voting members registered. In attendance were: 1 National Officer, 12 State Officers, 6 Honorary State Regents and National Past Officers, and 199 Chapter delegates. Also present were: 1 State Parliamentarian, 30 Chapter alternates, 90 Chapter Members, and 50 Guests. Without duplication, total registration was 387 Georgia Daughters representing 87 Chapters. Mrs. Prince moved the adoption of the final Credentials report. Adopted.

Mrs. Prince introduced her committee: Patricia Bradford, Vice Chair; Connie Rifkind, Vice Chair; Jane Bentley; Kim Bragg; Pat Gordon; Kayla Hudson; and Susan Lindsey.

State Regent McCorkle addressed the membership regarding the financially responsible

decision to host an in-person vs. in-person/virtual hybrid State Conference. State Chairmen resumed their reports, which continued from the Morning Business Session: Terrie Parks Fopiano, State Regent's Project; and Emily Penrod Woodyard, Operation Home Front. Helen Robertson Powell, DAR School Chair, announced that Georgia Daughters will be increasing their sponsorship to include two Gate of Opportunity Scholars at Berry College, for a total of \$14,000 in funding. Additional Berry College scholarship recipients were also announced. Reports continued: Ransom Bennett Schwerzler, Meadow Garden.

Melodye G. Brown, Chair, Bylaws, presented the State Bylaws Committee's recommendations, for which mandated procedures were followed, and moved the amendment of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Article I, NAME, by inserting "hereinafter referred to as GSSNSDAR.", to read: The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, hereinafter referred to as GSSNSDAR. No approval needed.

Ms. Brown moved the amendment of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Article II, OBJECTS, by inserting "to promote the objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, hereinafter referred to as the National Society." And Article II, OBJECTS, Section (1) by striking "American", to read: The objects of this Society shall be to promote the objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, hereinafter referred to as the National Society. (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries. No approval needed.

Ms. Brown moved the amendment of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Article III, MEMBERSHIP, by deleting the entire article and inserting: Article III, MEMBERS Section 1. Membership. The membership of the state society shall consist of the chapters in good standing of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution in the state of Georgia. Section 2. New Chapters. The corresponding secretary or other state officer shall enroll a chapter newly confirmed by the National Society as a member of the Georgia State Society upon receipt of the following information from the chapter: name of the chapter; the date of its organization: the names of its officers and of its members. To read: Section 1. Membership. The membership of the state society shall consist of the chapters in good standing of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution in the state of Georgia. Section 2. New Chapters. The corresponding secretary or other state officer shall enroll a chapter newly confirmed by the National Society as a member of the Georgia State Society upon receipt of the following information from the chapter: name of the chapter; the date of its organization; the names of its officers and of its members. No approval needed.

Ms. Brown moved the amendment of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Article IV, OFFICERS, Section 1, by inserting "Officers." and "elected", and striking "a State" before each officer, to read: The elected officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a regent, first vice regent, second vice regent, chaplain, recording secretary, corresponding secretary, organizing secretary, treasurer, registrar, historian, librarian, and curator. No approval needed.

Ms. Brown moved the amendment of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Article V, NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS, Section 4, by striking "Their terms" and inserting "The term"; inserting "no earlier than"; striking "election of the State Regent and the State First Vice Regent" and inserting "regent and vice regent", to read: The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two (2) years or until their successors are elected. The term of office shall begin no earlier

than at the close of the Continental Congress at which the regent and vice regent are confirmed. No approval needed.

Ms. Brown moved the amendment of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Article V, NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS, Section 5.(a), by striking "Should the office of State Regent become vacant, the State First Vice Regent shall become State Regent and the" and inserting "If the office of state regent becomes vacant, the state vice regent shall become state regent automatically provided she has been confirmed as state vice regent." The article would then read: If the office of state regent becomes vacant, the state vice regent shall become state regent automatically provided she has been confirmed as state vice regent. State Second Vice Regent shall become State First Vice Regent subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. Vacancies in other state offices shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive Committee shall be ratified at the next State Board of Management meeting or State Conference, whichever shall come first. No approval needed.

Ms. Brown moved the amendment of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Article VII, MEETINGS, by striking the current title and inserting a new title, "STATE CONFERENCE". The title would then read: Article VII – STATE CONFERENCE. Adopted.

Ms. Brown moved the amendment of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Article VII, MEETINGS, Section 2, by striking the current wording and replacing with wording mandated by NSDAR. (Additions are made in the proposed amendment following this one to retain the votes of Honorary State Regents.) Article VII, MEETINGS, Section 2, would then read: Voting Members. The voting members for state meetings shall be: a) the elected state officers as provided in these bylaws; b) the national officers and honorary national officers whose membership is within the state; c) the chapter regent or in her absence the first vice regent or her alternate; d) the elected delegates or alternates of each chapter of the state entitled to representation at the Continental Congress or special meeting of the National Society. No approval needed.

Ms. Brown moved the amendment of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Article VII, MEETINGS, Section 2, by adding Section 2.(e). "the Honorary State Regents of the State Society, and past national officers whose membership is within the state and whose service as a national officer was as a member of the Georgia Society." Article VII, MEETINGS, Section 2 would then read: Voting Members. The voting members for state meetings shall be: a) the elected state officers as provided in these bylaws; b) the national officers and honorary national officers whose membership is within the state; c) the chapter regent or in her absence the first vice regent or her alternate; d) the elected delegates or alternates of each chapter of the state entitled to representation at the Continental Congress or special meeting of the National Society; e) the Honorary State Regents of the State Society, and past national officers whose membership is within the state and whose service as a national officer was as a member of the Georgia Society. Adopted.

Ms. Brown moved the amendment of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Article VII, MEETINGS, Section 4, by striking "newly organized" and inserting "organized and confirmed no later than January 5," to read: A member shall have belonged to a chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the chapter, except in the case of the Regent or Vice Regent of a chapter organized and confirmed no later than January 5. Adopted.

Electronic mail (email) shall not be used to conduct meetings or to hold a vote. Section 12. Emergency Electronic Platform Meetings. In the event of a state or nationally declared catastrophic event where in person gathering is not possible, prohibited or discouraged, the Executive Committee by majority vote, may authorize a virtual platform meeting of the state society. The meeting will be subject to all rules adopted by the Executive Committee. These rules shall supersede any conflicting rules in the parliamentary authority but may not otherwise conflict with rules or decisions of the Society. A secure, anonymous vote conducted through the designated voting platform shall be deemed a ballot vote, fulfilling any requirement in the bylaws or rules that a vote be by ballot. Section 13. Notice. Unless members indicate otherwise to the regent and/or the corresponding secretary, in writing, all communication required in these bylaws, including meeting notices, may be sent using electronic measures, including email. Adopted.

Ms. Brown moved the amendment of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Article VIII, STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT, Section 1, by inserting "past national officers whose membership is within the state and whose service as a national officer was as a member of the Georgia Society," to read: The state officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, past national officers whose membership is within the state and whose service as a national officer was as a member of the Georgia Society, and the Regents, or in their absence, the Vice Regents of the chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management. Adopted.

Ms. Brown moved the amendment of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Article VIII, STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT, by inserting new Section 7 as follows: Section 7. Proxy Voting. There shall be no proxy voting. No approval needed.

Ms. Brown moved the amendment of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Article VIII, STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT, by inserting new Sections 8 and 9 as follows: Section 8. Electronic Participation. Electronic mail (email) shall not be used to conduct meetings. Section 5. Decisions of the Executive Committee shall be acted upon at the next meeting of the State Board of Management or at State Conference, whichever shall come first. Adopted.

Ms. Brown moved the amendment of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Article IX, EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, by inserting new Section 6 as follows: Section 6. Quorum. Seven members of the executive committee shall constitute a quorum. Adopted.

Section 7. Proxy voting. There shall be no proxy voting. No approval needed.

Ms. Brown moved the amendment of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Article IX, EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, by inserting new Sections 8 and 9 as follows: Section 8. Notice. Unless members indicate otherwise to the regent and/or the corresponding secretary, in writing, all communication required in these bylaws, including meeting notices, may be sent using electronic measures, including email. Section 9. Email Voting. In matters that require urgency and when a meeting is not critical to a decision, and with the written permission of a majority of members, a vote may be conducted by electronic mail (email) which must be ratified at the next meeting. The per capita amount and distribution shall be indicated on the budget presented annually. Funds to be included in the per capita designations shall be Friends of DAR Schools, Lucy Cook Peel Fund, McCall Genealogical Fund and Meadow Garden. Adopted.

Ms. Brown moved the amendment of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Article X, FINANCES, Section 2, by striking current wording and replacing with NSDAR mandated wording, to read: Annual Dues. The annual state dues for each chapter shall be \$15.00 per member which shall be sent by the chapter treasurer and shall be postmarked no later than December 1. A chapter whose dues have not been paid by December 1 shall be notified by the state treasurer that the chapter shall not be entitled to representation at the state conference. No approval needed.

Ms. Brown moved the amendment of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Article X, FINANCES, Section 3.(b), by inserting "Past National Officers whose membership is within the state and whose service as a national officer was as a member of the Georgia Society," and by striking "check" and replacing with "payment," to read: Honorary State Regents, Past National Officers whose membership is within the state and whose service as a national officer was as a member of the Georgia Society, and State Officers shall pay a conference fee of \$15.00 at the time of registration or shall include the conference registration fee in the payment for Conference meal reservations. Adopted.

Ms. Brown moved the amendment of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Article X, FINANCES, Section 3.(d), by striking "All host chapters may charge a registration fee to those not purchasing a meal ticket" and substituting, "The State Society may charge a registration fee," to read: The State Society may charge a registration fee to off-set the cost of hosting state/district meetings. Adopted.

Ms. Brown moved the amendment of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Article X, FINANCES, by inserting new Section 4, and renumbering current Sections 4, 5, and 6 as Sections 5, 6, and 7, to read: Section 4. New Chapters. (a) Newly organized chapters shall pay state dues within 60 days after the date of confirmation. (b) The state dues of new chapters organized between December 1 and June 30 will be allocated to the current year. The state dues of new chapters organized after July 1 will be allocated to the upcoming year. Section 5. (a) The State Treasurer and the State Regent and such others entrusted with funds of the Georgia State Society as may be designated by the State Board of Management shall be bonded. (See Article VI, Sections 2 and 9); (b) The State Treasurer with the approval of the State Regent and the State Chair of the Finance Committee shall place the funds of the Georgia State Society in financial institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage; (c) The placement of restricted savings funds and investment funds of the Georgia State Society shall be placed to the credit of the Georgia State Society by the State Treasurer under the direction of the Finance Committee. Monies may be invested in U. S. Treasury obligations or other interest bearing obligations of federally insured financial institutions; (d) The accounts of the State Treasurer shall be annually prepared for audit by a Certified Public Accountant immediately following the end of the State Society fiscal year and no later than July 15 and delivered to the CPA by that date; (e) Should the State Treasurer be incapacitated, the State Regent, after consultation with the Chair of the Finance Committee and with the approval of the Executive Committee, shall appoint an Acting State Treasurer to serve until such time as the State Treasurer is able to resume her duties or a new State Treasurer is appointed and ratified as stated in Article V, Section 5 (a). Section 6. The expenses incurred by the State Regent in the performance of duty shall be paid each year from the State Dues Fund: (a) Six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00) shall be taken each year to defray her necessary travel expenses; (b) Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent, as budgeted, shall be paid by the State Treasurer who shall keep all receipts of these expenses. No expenses exceeding the budgeted amount shall be paid by the State Treasurer. Section 7. At the close of the books annually, \$5,000.00 shall be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies Fund" so that at the end of each administration a total of \$10,000.00 will be reserved. This money is to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration. Adopted.

Ms. Brown moved the amendment of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Article XI, COMMITTEES, deleting Section 2.(c) and renumbering Section 2.(d) as Section 2.(c), to read: 2.(c) Proceedings: This committee shall be composed of the State Recording Secretary, the immediate past State Recording Secretary, the State First Vice Regent, and four (4) additional members, at least one of whom shall be an Honorary State Regent. The four (4) members, including the Honorary State Regent, shall represent different districts; and the members, excluding the Honorary State Regent, shall not be serving on any other State Standing Committee. The State Regent shall appoint the chair of the committee. Adopted.

Ms. Brown moved the amendment of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Article XI, COMMITTEES, by inserting new Section 7 as follows: Section 7. Quorum. A quorum of each committee shall be a majority of the committee members. Adopted.

Ms. Brown moved the amendment of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Article XI, COMMITTEES, by inserting new Section 8 as follows: Section 8. Proxy voting. There shall be no proxy voting. No approval needed.

Ms. Brown moved the amendment of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Article XI, COMMITTEES, by inserting new Sections 9, 10, and 11 as follows: Section 9. Meetings. Provision may be allowed for committee members who are unable to attend in person to participate by electronic means, so long as all committee members can simultaneously hear each other and participate, subject to any limitations established in special rules of order or standing rules adopted to govern such participation, and at reasonable expense to the state or committee. Electronic mail (email) shall not be used to conduct meetings. Section 10. Notice. Unless committee members indicate otherwise to the chair, in writing, all communication required in these bylaws, including meeting notices, may be sent using electronic measures, including email. Section 11. Email Voting. In matters that require urgency and when a meeting is not critical to a decision, and with the written permission of a majority of committee members, a vote may be conducted by electronic mail (email) which must be ratified at the next meeting. Adopted.

Ms. Brown moved the amendment of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Article VI, DUTIES OF OFFICERS, Section 3.(e), by striking "for the review and approval of the Resolutions Committee," to read: Section 3. The State First Vice Regent shall: (a) perform the duties of the office of State Regent in the absence or inability of the State Regent; (b) fill a vacancy in the office of State Regent; (c) Perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent; (d) serve on those committees as designated by these Bylaws and as directed by the State Regent; (e) Prepare the

courtesy resolutions for business meetings of the Georgia State Society. Adopted.

Ms. Brown moved the amendment of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Article XV, RULES OF ORDER, by striking the title "RULES OF ORDER" and replacing with "PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY", to read: ARTICLE XV – PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY. No approval needed.

Ms. Brown moved the amendment of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Article XV, RULES OF ORDER, by striking current Section 1 and replacing with new Section 1 as follows: ARTICLE XV – PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY. Section 1. The rules contained in the current edition of Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern this organization in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the bylaws, standing rules, or rulings of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, these bylaws, or any special rules of order the organization may adopt. Section 2. The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws. No approval needed.

Ms. Brown moved the amendment of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Article XVI, AMENDMENTS, by striking the title "AMENDMENTS" and replacing with "AMENDMENT OF BYLAWS", to read: ARTICLE XV – AMENDMENT OF BYLAWS. No approval needed.

Ms. Brown moved the amendment of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Article XVI, AMENDMENTS, by inserting a new Section 4 as follows: Section 4. Mandatory Amendments. Any amendment to the bylaws of the National Society shall become the law of the state without further notice. No approval needed.

Ms. Brown moved the amendment of the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, Article XVII, DISSOLUTION, by striking the terms "Georgia State Society", "State Society", and "Society", and replacing with "state organization", to read: ARTICLE XVI – Dissolution. Although the period of duration of the state organization is perpetual, if for any reason the state organization is to be dissolved or otherwise terminated, no part of the property of the state organization or any of the proceeds shall be distributed to or inure to the benefit of any of the officers or members of the state organization. Upon the dissolution of the state organization, assets shall be distributed by the Board of Management and/or the Executive Committee to and only to the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the local United States District Court, exclusively to such organization or organizations as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated within the meaning of section 501(c)(3), with purposes and objectives consistent with those of the state organization. No approval needed.

State Regent McCorkle expressed appreciation to Ms. Brown and the Bylaws Committee. Ms. Brown recognized the members of the Committee: Betty Brown Harrah; Marjorie Singley-Hall; Mary Ruth Mullins; Judith "Judy" Clements Dyer; and DiAnn Wheeler.

Edwina Hall Beall, Chair, Resolutions, brought forth the Courtesy Resolutions of the 123<sup>rd</sup> Georgia State Conference. Mrs. Beall requested First Vice Regent Harrah take the Chair to read the Resolution expressing appreciation to State Regent McCorkle. Mrs. McCorkle resumed the Chair.

Following announcements, the Benediction was given by Mrs. Nation. The meeting concluded at 4:02 p.m. and the Conference was in recess until 7:00 p.m.

# **Reports of State Officers**

# STATE REGENT - O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle

After being installed as your State Regent at the first virtual Continental Congress in June, the last nine months have been unprecedented amid the COVID-19 pandemic, sheltering in place orders, and civil unrest throughout the nation. Despite these challenging circumstances, the State Society launched a revamped, members-only website and a vibrant public website, and redesigned Instagram page upon the first day of the McCorkle administration and instituted a weekly Georgia State Society Blog to be distributed every Monday morning at 8:30 a.m. to every Georgia Daughter to connect and meet the needs of members, many of whom were quarantined due to the pandemic. This officer is grateful for the Georgia Daughters whose cooperative and positive spirit have supported the State Society in moving forward with the plans of this administration in spite of the challenges. The first few weeks of the administration consisted of productive meetings with the Executive Committee, Finance Committee and Meadow Garden Board, much planning for Fall Forum and State Conference, and learning how to Zoom and make YouTube videos of this officer. The State Regent's and State Outstanding Junior's virtual "Tea for Two" was held virtually to overcome the restraints of meeting in-person. This officer is deeply grateful to the Burkhalter Chapter for sponsoring the event, the State Corresponding Secretary Cathy Hyer for her technical expertise in hosting the event on Zoom, and to the state officers and chairmen who lead portions of the agenda.

This officer appreciates the support of the State Regent's Projects by providing at least one Gate of Opportunity Scholarship at Berry College this year, and to commit to provide two Gate of Opportunity Scholarships this fall. Another State Project, Operation Homefront, was supported by many Georgia chapters as they sent packages to specific, "adopted", remote bases and posts around the world. Operation Homefront was also the state-sponsored service project at the very well attended 3rd annual Fall Forum. At Meadow Garden, the implementation of the Plan of Restoration and Preservation is on-going. The much-needed removal of the non-historic plaster and repointing of the brick walls in the cellar, along with the restoration and reposition of the cellar doors has been completed. The removal of the non-historic siding on the canal side of the historic house has been replaced with periodappropriate siding, and the rake board and eave adjustment has been completed. The dendrochronology study yielded important results that the Second Period portion was added on sometime during 1836-1837. Finally, the removal of selective portions of the First Period interior wall for interpretive purposes is underway. An exciting find was made in the process: the historic house, in its early history, was oriented in a different direction. The front of the house today was, at one time, the side of the house. The orientation was changed prior to 1836 when the second portion was built on. Existing physical reinforces the assertion that the house was originally oriented with the front facing what is not the canal (south). In its earliest configuration, the house was a story-and-a-half with side gables. It is believed that after the Walton's vacated the house, a new owner changed the orientation to what is now the front for two reasons; the construction of the canal and a desire to enlarge the house. Subsequently, the second story was reconstructed, changing the entrance to the east elevation, changing the roof to be side gabled (based on new orientation), and removing a possible north porch or two-thirds cat-slide addition that is believed to be on the rear of the house in its original orientation (north elevation).

Meadow Garden was closed to the public for a few weeks during the summer months due to the pandemic; however, a successful event was held at Meadow Garden in December. Attendance remained strong even with the pandemic restrictions in place. A marketing plan, including print and video messaging was approved. The intense, targeted exposure on Facebook and National Historic Preservation Magazine will improve our public profile in Augusta and beyond. The new logo of the roof line and the tag line, "Uniquely Historic", were approved.

The main goal of this administration was to expand communication and continue to

streamline report forms which are in the control of the state society. Communication has increased to directly reach every member on a weekly basis with timely information. The Georgia State Society was the first state to have a nationally approved YouTube channel.

Following National Board of Management, this officer announced that Tamassee was resigned by NSDAR as a DAR School due to changes in legislation which eliminated the facility's ability to provide for displace children in a group environment. Because the State Society is not in position to act contrary to the National Society, the State Society will no longer support Tamassee.

This officer enjoyed visiting several chapters throughout the year whether in-person events and luncheons or virtual meetings on Zoom. She was honored to be special guest via Zoom at the newest chapter, King's Gap in Pine Mountain. Both Fall Forum in October and State Conference in March were held in-person with all safety protocols in place at their respective locations. Thanks to our volunteer team of photographers, Dwight Dover, Nina Alexander, and Kelly Jordan, all photographs at state events, are now available online for free to our members. The State Society was honored to have President General Denise Van Buren as the featured speaker on Saturday night Awards and Recognition Night. Georgia Daughters were thrilled to surprise Mrs. Van Buren with a \$30,000 donation to sponsor an entire lay light panel as part of the Next Act Campaign.

Because Congress was virtual for the second year in a row due to COVID-19, Georgia Daughters engaged in many of the various online events. There was no Georgia Event; however, the Georgia Room Open House consisted of a highly informative video presentation of Peter Tondee's Tavern, entitled "Patience".

To focus our members on our three mission areas, this state regent's theme is "Anchored on Patriotism, Education, and Historic Preservation". This officer wants to commend the state chairs and vice chairs for their relentless passion to push the objectives forward in the face of the obstacles created by the pandemic. She wishes to congratulate the chapters and their leadership for persevering and continuing to serve and work in creative ways in their respective communities. It is a great honor and privilege to represent the Georgia State Society and the Georgia Daughters. This officer appreciates each one of you and all you do to make our State Society successful. Georgia Daughters are enthusiastic and passionate, and we are moving forward in service to America.

This officer celebrates a decade of continuous growth as the Georgia State Society has 1,000 members more than it did ten years ago! 2020 began with 8,153 members in 116 chapters. Registrars are to be commended for submitting 433 applications throughout a pandemic year. In 2020, 438 new members were approved, 87% without Pre Letter/AIR. Education was key! A new free Registrar Training Course was offered in January to all current Registrars, and 49 Georgia Registrars completed the course. Daughters completed an additional 74 Genealogy Education Program classes for a total of 123. Fall Forum Genealogy Workshops and Registrar Forums highlighted our outstanding State Chairs of Volunteer Genealogy, Lineage Research, and SAT [State Application Team]. Registrars were trained on electronic applications and Genealogy Guidelines. Volunteer Genealogists assisted Registrars, and Lineage Research cleared challenging applications. SAT's 20 volunteers completed 44 applications for our chapters. In 2020, Georgia had 154 member deaths, 165 drops, 170 resignations, and 63 reinstatements. Fifty transferred in, and 106 left Georgia. In an historic year of closures and challenges, totals for 2020 are 8,168 members in 116 chapters, 89 Life Members, 525 Juniors. Well-done! It is an honor to serve.

#### STATE HISTORIAN – Kate Sievert Cook

This Officer commends chapters' efforts to promote the commemoration and education of American History during this unprecedented time. Three members' graves were marked, respectively, by Archibald Bulloch, Kings Gap and Savannah. #### STATE LIBRARIAN – Renee Gaspari Portell

Following the cancellation of the 2020 State Conference, this officer was honored to page at the virtual Continental Congress; attend - in person - an Independence Day celebration, the Virtual Tea honoring the State Regent and State Outstanding Junior and Fall Forum. In 2020, despite COVID-19 restrictions, 46 chapters reported a combined total of 4,552 hours spent volunteering in local libraries; 68 chapters reported a combined total of 4,681 books donated to local libraries. A total of 63 items, including 26 books, were donated by Georgia chapters to the DAR Library. Reportedly 33 programs on the DAR Library were presented during chapter meetings. A combined 12 chapters donated \$1,630 to the Friends of the Library fund, while five chapters donated \$442 to the Friends of Seimes fund. In addition to making monetary and in-kind donations to local and school libraries and state and national archives, Georgia daughters worked to promote literacy in their communities; encouraged people to apply for library cards; established and stocked various free lending libraries; started chapter book clubs and/or became more involved in the DAR Library Book Club; one chapter reported hosting a book swap to trade books with other members.

### STATE CURATOR - Vanessa Michelle Watkins-Nutty

This officer enjoyed attending Fall Forum in Macon in October, which included member workshops, the Constitution Week Celebration Dinner, the BOM meeting, and the opportunity to reconnect with Georgia Daughters, in person. During that same event, all property belonging to the Georgia State Society was officially transferred to this officer, from former State Curator Renee Portell, along with a reviewed and updated inventory list. All property is accounted for and is reported to be in excellent and functioning condition. Sincere gratitude is expressed to Mrs. Portell for her assistance in the extended storage and delivery of the state property and to Recording Secretary Amy P. Lawson and her family for their assistance in the careful storage and transport of the State Society's large lighted insignia.

### STATE PARLIAMENTARIAN – Marjorie Singley-Hall

Due to the pandemic this year, this officer worked with chapters to determine how to hold meetings in person or by electronic means, or a combination of both to comply with parliamentary procedures as well as state and local requirements for meetings. Robert's Rules of Order, Revision 12 was published in September 2020 and gave guidance to chapters and the state on how to properly hold electronic meetings. Prior to that, this officer worked with the National Parliamentarian for advice and direction in order to properly assist chapters in conducting business. A copy of each chapter's bylaws in the state was maintained in a database. One hundred chapters submitted their bylaws by November 1, 2020 to the State Parliamentarian in order to qualify for State Honor Roll.

### **National Service Committees: Reports of State Chairs**

#### **AMERICAN HERITAGE - Susan Helton Gwaltney**

Chapters gave 69 programs.1180 participated. Six Women in the Arts awarded. 51 entries in contests including fiber arts. Many historic dresses and sashes were made and worn depicting the100th Anniversary of 19th Amendment. Many blocks and labels we sewn for Quilts of Valor and presented. Two exhibits of winning entries from the National American Heritage Contest were displayed. Many programs on quilting were presented as well as a program on "Plarn" the art of crocheting and recycling plastic bags for mats for sitting and lying. Programs for students on making dolls in the colonial era. Thousands of masks were made for use in the pandemic.

### **AMERICAN HISTORY - Mary Lou Nelson Goehring**

Reports were received from 115 chapters, 304 American History programs presented; 119 outstanding American Women honored. Commemoration program honoring 19th Amendment in Toccoa for Mary Jarrett White, First Woman in Georgia to Vote. The American History Essay Contest was sponsored in 156 schools: 2,256 students participating. Chapters awarded 1,390 Certificates of Participation, 166 Certificates of Awards, and 79 Bronze medals. 68 Students were awarded Certificates for Outstanding Work in American History, 25 Bronze medals and 4 Silver medals awarded. 97 Women in American History were honored; 30 certificates awarded. 161 American History Displays arranged in schools and public places. 125 American History broadcast coverage or print coverages received. Thank vou to Vice Chair for Excellent Work supporting this committee: Margaret "Peggy" Dell Reese, Penny White Walker, Daphne Greene Wright, Dorothy Price Reynolds. The following Chapters won DAR certificates of Award: Largest number of students participating in American History Essay Contest: Oliver Morton, Women in American History Participation: Toccoa, Outstanding American History Publicity: James Stewart, Outstanding Chapter Program report: Fielding Lewis; Recognition for sponsoring an Essay Contest Winner: William McIntosh, High Tower Trail, George Walton, Hawkinsville; Outstanding Chapter winning the Traveling Silver Tray: Old Unicoi Trail, Pamela Virginia Matthews, Regent.

#### **AMERICAN INDIANS - Ruth Parker McIntire**

The American Indian Committee staffed a table at the Fall Forum in Macon to make the Daughters more aware of the American Indian activities and historic sites available to the chapter. The state committee also sold voice for a "Star" quilt to be given away at the Friday evening meeting. The quilt was hand made by a Native American woman from South Dakota. This activity raised \$400.00 dollars for American Indian causes.

#### **AMERICANISM – Denise Lundy Herring**

With 79 chapters reporting, 203 members referred to DAR Manual for Citizenship on DAR members' website; 16 members assisted with naturalization classes; ten chapters participated at 11 naturalization ceremonies before the suspension of ceremonies due to Covid-19. Distribution of patriotic materials included: 19,372 US flags, 1,125 US Flag Pins, 2,734 US Flag bookmarks, 4,115 copies of the US Pledge to the Flag, 4,587 copies of American Creed. Captain Edward Hagin Chapter presented a DAR Medal of Honor to Albert Lee Walker. Chapters coordinated veterans' projects, placed wreaths and flags at memorials; distributed flags, bookmarks and pins along with the American Creed and US Flag Code booklet to the community and school children while observing or celebrating Flag Day, Independence Day, Memorial Day and Veterans Day. JAC and C.A.R groups were included in the activities where possible. Chapters were creative finding ways to achieve goals by holding virtual events, drive thru events and recording small, socially distanced events that were disseminated to the public via social media.

#### **COMMEMORATIVE EVENTS – Virginia Gidden-Weinzierl**

Thank you to the 8,136 members in 116 chapters who participated in Commemorative Events work. COVID did not deter our Georgia Daughters. 934 daughters participated in Independence Day celebrations/parades, placed flags, wreaths at cemeteries and Revolutionary War battle sites. Chapters had programs on Commemorative Events, including 23 on the 50th Anniversary of the Vietnam War, 24 on the 400th Anniversary of the Mayflower, 20 on the 250th Anniversary of the Boston Massacre, 49 on the 100th Anniversary of Women's Suffrage, 14 on the 100th Anniversary of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, five on the 200th Anniversary of the Santa Fe Trail, 40 on the75th Anniversary of WWII. 49 chapters have registered as a Commemorative Partner with the United States of America Vietnam War Commemoration. Chapters participating in all CMR Commemorative Events: Andrew McBride, Etowah, and General Daniel Newman. Eight chapters submitted entries to the Outstanding Chapter Commemorative Events Report. Awards were presented as follows: 1st – Fielding Lewis; 2nd – John Benning; 3rd – Philadelphia Winn. Best report 100th Anniversary of Women's Suffrage report: John Benning. It is a privilege to share that our Georgia Daughters are Anchored in Patriotism, Education, and Historic Preservation.

### **COMMUNITY CLASSROOM – Ginger DeVaughan Deraney**

A total of 147 members volunteered assisting with schoolwork, reading to and tutoring students and much more. Students were excited to get to read a Service Dog. There were 9,003 students impacted and individual chapter members provided \$4,806.88 in financial support to classrooms and overall school functions. 1,590 books were donated to schools as well as many backpacks and school boxes filled with various needed school supplies were presented to classes as well as hand-sewn face masks. Conservation, and virtual water, weather and climate lessons were presented to 4th graders as well as Revolutionary War, Civil War, World War II and Colonial Activities were taught to 4th and 5th graders. 19th Amendment, American Indian, were exhibited in Media Centers. World War I and World War II Trunk Shows were presented to many classes. Food for Life Classes, 400th Lady of Mayflower, and hydroponic gardening was taught to students. 138 JROTC gave 1,088 volunteer hours to Wreaths Across America. Lessons about Women's Votes and Susan B. Anthony were taught, and 367 Constitution Booklets were distributed. 4-H students were given conservation lessons and Nancy Hart Cabin was open for school classes. A high school junior, House Page, was transported regularly to Capitol.

#### COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARDS – Billie Leverett Trussell

Chapters were encouraged to recognize exceptional volunteers within their communities who freely give their time, resources and talents in an unpaid capacity benefitting their community. Fifteen Community Service Awards were presented by ten Georgia chapters. The recipients of this award have given within their respective communities valuable service to either an individual or an organization. Types of service recognized included: aid to veterans, volunteer work with youth, patriotic flag displays on Federal holidays, historical preservation and education by creating a nonprofit association and a museum at Fort Daniel. literacy by providing free books to children, environmental conservation providing rehoming and low cost birth control for dogs and cats, citizenship by sponsoring patriotic essay contests, humanitarian in forming a volunteer community crisis response team, educational by establishing a friends of the library association, and humanitarian citizenship by providing free construction labor. There is no competition for this award. Chapters may present two awards a year. Chapters presenting one award were: Benjamin Hawkins, General Josiah Tattnall, Philadelphia Winn, Vidalia, William McIntosh. Chapters presenting two awards were: Abraham Baldwin, Andrew McBride, Lieutenant James Monroe, Old Unicoi Trail, Patriots of Liberty.

#### **CONSTITUTION WEEK – Jane Grier Durden**

Physical and social distancing certainly changed our routine but our patriotism never waned. Chapters reported a wide range of Constitution Week activities. Proclamations were obtained, bells rung, displays placed, programs were presented, activities were created for teachers to use in person or in virtual classrooms, kits distributed, spot announcements aired on radio, television, Facebook, Instagram, flags will displayed and distributed. Despite being unable to get into some schools, members were creative in ways to make kits, information, and activities available for teachers and students. Members dressed in period dress added a festive touch to their activities and community presentations. A proclamation signed by Governor Brian Kemp was presented at the Constitution Celebration Dinner, held at Macon Centraplex Coliseum on October 24, 2020. Dr. Eric Sands, Associate Professor at Berry College, spoke on the Electoral College: An Institution Worth Preserving. The GASSAR Color Guard presented the colors, and Greetings were brought by State Regent OB Wilhoit McCorkle; Immediate Past President GASSAR Scott Collins; and C.A.R. State President Micah Kilgore. ### CONSTITUTION WEEK

WHEREAS: On September 17, 2020 and the week following, we celebrate the 233rd

Anniversary of the 1787 Constitutional Convention. At this convention, the world's oldest written constitution was drafted by the United States, thus outlining the fundamental principles by which our nation is governed; and

WHEREAS: Our Constitution establishes six basic governing principles for society. These

include popular sovereignty, the rule of law, federalism, judicial review, individual rights, and separation of powers through a system of checks and

balances; and

WHEREAS: Popular sovereignty is the foundation of our government, a government that was created by and for the people. However, the rule of law requires that this

government be guided by a set of laws, not an individual or lone group; and

WHEREAS: Federalism provides for the sharing of power between our national govern-

ment and individual state governments; and

WHEREAS: The Constitution ensures the distribution of functions and responsibilities among three separate branches and a system of checks and balances to

calibrate those powers, ultimately ensuring the protection of individual rights

and liberties; and

WHEREAS: The State of Georgia was the fourth state in the union to ratify the Constitu-

tion. Georgia delegates Abraham Baldwin and William Few signed the

document on January 2, 1788; and

WHEREAS: Constitution Week provides an opportunity for all citizens to learn of Geor-

gia's role during our nation's founding; now

THEREFORE: I, BRIAN P. KEMP, Governor of the State of Georgia, do hereby proclaim

September 17-23, 2020 as CONSTITUTION WEEK and September 17, 2020

as CONSTITUTION DAY in Georgia.

In witness thereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the Executive Department to be affixed this 17th day of September in the year of our Lord, Two Thousand and Twenty.

#### DAR LIBRARY - Renee Gaspari Portell

Donations by Georgia Daughters and chapters to Friends of the Library totaled \$1,630 and \$442 to Friends of Seimes Technology Center. Programs on the DAR Library presented at chapter meetings totaled 33. Additional information regarding the total number of books and other items donated as well as hours of volunteer service may be found in the State Librarian report. Certificates of Award have been presented to the following chapters: Most Books Donated to the DAR Library – Philadelphia Winn (12); Most Volunteer Hours in Local Libraries – Reverend John Andrew (1,200); Most Books Donated to Local Libraries – Kennesaw Mountain (752); Highest Donation to the State Library Fund – Sandy Springs (\$161).

#### **DAR MAGAZINE – Trudy Foraker Alexander**

Georgia State Society's 7 pages in the November/December issue of the Daughters Newsletter featured our Vice President General Joyce Ball Patton, State Regent OB McCorkle, State Officers, Memorial for Honorary State Regent Rosemary Crow Hunter, 2020 Outstanding Junior Vanessa Watkins-Nutty, Meadow Garden and the list of Co-op Ad participants from 2019. As the winners of the 2019 grand prize of the Subscription Contest, Kennesaw Mountain selected the topic of "Wives of the Signers" which appeared in November-December issue of American Spirit. Fifteen chapters had articles printed in issues of Daughters Newsletters. One hundred and six Regents have subscriptions. The most popular areas of interest in the American Spirit are historical places, history, and genealogy. Forty-five of the 114 chapters had 31% subscription level or higher, and 3 of those were above 99%.

#### DAR MUSEUM OUTREACH - Martha Ann Story

DAR Museum Docents-12, DAR Museum Correspondent Docent in Training-2; Chapters promoted the DAR Museum to their chapters and to other organizations, Chapter Newsletter Chairs wrote articles about the DAR Museum, Chapters posted information about the Museum on Facebook, emailed to members, made displays for meetings, and presented Museum Moments; Museum Outreach Chapter Committee Chairs gave presentations about the Museum; 10 programs and 8 Museum Moments were presented at Chapter meetings, totaling 18 programs; 1 CD presented a Period Room presentation; Another CD presented information on the Museum; Members donated 2 books to the Museum; Chapter members attended the Virtual Continental Congress and watched the Tour of the Georgia State Period Room Open House, watched Katie Cannon's tours of the Museum; Members enjoyed virtual tours of the Period Rooms online; State Chair provided articles in the State Regents blog about the Museum and virtual DAR Period Room Tours, updated the CIP and State Directory; Vice-Chairs presented at Fall Forum; Two Period Room Programs were cancelled because of Covid-19. #### DAR PROJECT PATRIOT - Nancy Zoubek Vaughn

The total number of packages sent by Daughters was 810; total number of coupons (by quantity) sent domestically was 80,961; total weight of coupons (by weight) overseas was 185 pounds; total cards and words of encouragement were 9,815; and total monetary contributions were \$102,713. Following is a list of the various ways the 116 participating Georgia chapters supported deployed military and their families: Operation Home Front where items were sent to "adopted" bases in Japan and South Korea; knitted or crocheted caps and scarves; donations made to the USO at Atlanta Hartsfield International Airport; wearing red on Fridays to "Remember Everyone Deployed"; sending monetary donations to the National Project Patriot Fund; purchase of phone cards; gift cards; Operation Bean of Life donations; Operation Over There donations; Warrior and Support Center (San Antonio, TX) donations; hand-made face masks, adult and child sizes; NSDAR Challenge Coin donation; volunteering with American Legion Ladies Auxiliary to provide snacks and meals

for military personnel; participated in Marines "Toys for Tots" program; Landstuhl Regional Medical Center, Germany, donations; visiting local recruiting centers.

#### DAR SCHOLARSHIP - Dana McCoy Anderson, Ph. D.

Twenty-six chapters contributed a combined scholarship total of \$47,250 for 53 students. The Altamaha Chapter gifted the greatest amount (\$15,000), followed by Joseph Habersham (\$5K) and Oliver Morton Chapter (\$9K). Eleven chapters donated > \$1000, another twelve \$100 - \$999. Thirty-three chapters provided information to the public regarding the NSDAR scholarships. Three chapters, Elijah Clarke, John Houstoun, and Savannah have endowed scholarships at Georgia universities included below. Middle Georgia College Foundation awarded \$250 in Spring 2020 but will increase to \$500 next year. The Ingram Fund at Valdosta State issued 14 loans. State scholarships and loans totaled \$33,334.05 serving 25 students. A Gate of Opportunity Scholarship (\$9218.44) at Berry was the state regent's project, reported elsewhere. Assets held at educational institutions total \$ 599,190.82. Combined state and chapter funds supported 78 students with \$80,584.

Making a "Reel" difference, Georgia Daughters demonstrated they are "Hooked on DAR Schools" even amid the global pandemic. 88 chapters earned the prestigious Hightower Award. Appreciation is extended to the Hightower family for continued financial support encouraging focus on education. Georgia Daughters welcomed school reps from KDS & Hindman during Fall Forum and accessed school videos via YouTube. Zoom programs on schools, Virtual KDS Dedication Day ceremonies and Continental Congress School Luncheon were attended on-line. All 116 chapters submitted Chapter Master Report. 192 "School of Sunfish" pins were purchased and reported donations totaled \$9,203 to "Friends of DAR Schools" Fund. This chair received additional information from four chapters. Two chapters reported organizing special fundraising events to benefit the "Friends of DAR Schools." Thank you, Georgia Daughters.

#### DAR SERVICE FOR VETERANS - Nancy Clark Coleman

Georgia Daughters provided dedicated service to our veterans in a variety of ways despite pandemic restrictions. Sixty-seven chapters sponsored 3,684 wreaths for Wreaths Across America. They involved 237 youth who contributed 2,710 hours and 734 adults who contributed 17,744 hours. Georgia Daughters contributed \$36,492 in monetary donations and donated goods valued at \$154,545. Chapter members participated in drive-in baby showers for female veterans, cleaned veterans' graves, provided meals on various occasions, assisted homeless veterans and those with PTSD, presented Braille flags veterans groups, and drove veterans to the VA hospital. Chapters presented 28 Quilts of Valor to veterans. Members participated in commemorative events honoring veterans including 75th Anniversary of End of World War II, 50th Commemoration of the Vietnam

War, and Veterans Day and Memorial Day events across the state, Chapters heard 125 VAVS reports and conducted seven interviews for the Veterans History Project. Georgia members traveled 29,398 miles. The Outstanding Veterans Volunteer Award was presented to Donna C. Rowe, nominated by Cherokee; Outstanding Youth Volunteer Award to Andrew Bramlett, sponsored by Kennesaw Mountain; and DAR Service to Veterans Award to Pamela Lyle of James Stewart.

#### THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA – Pamela Ann Lyle

Georgia daughters have supported the national objectives to keep the flag flying, to protect it continuously under all conditions, and to educate citizens regarding its correct usage. 95 chapters submitted reports, with 508 flag events. Chapters involved 1,736 youth in flag activities and distributed 17,480 flags, awarded 124 flag certificates. 61 chapters gave 306 flag minutes at chapter meetings. 2,677 Flag Codes were distributed with 23 Braille flags presented. Certificates of appreciation were given to members that submitted flag pictures to the committee's social media group. This chair shared on the committee Facebook page 13 times since May 2020. Sequoyah and Martha Stewart Bulloch chapters were submitted to National as best reports. Kennesaw Mountain Chapter purchased 2 flags and was reported for the most flags flown over Constitution Hall. Martha Stewart Bullock chapter was reported as the best chapter using the flag as a part of another committee program or project. Several reports were forwarded to the SE Division vice chair for national consideration. Sequoyah Chapter was recognized for their outstanding flag project with their placement of bronze braille plaque in their county's veteran park. General Daniel Newnan individual member was recognized for outstanding individual program, "285 Days of Quarantine".

#### HISTORIC PRESERVATION - Nahali "Holly" Ruth Croft

The year 2020 brought us unique challenges, but Georgia Daughters remained busy in regards to their historic preservation work throughout the state. 106 chapter presentations on historic preservation were given, and several chapters chose historic preservation projects for their Day of Service in November. One chapter, Fielding Lewis, gave 25 presentations on historic preservation in 2020, and another, Sandy Springs, awarded three Historic Preservation medals. Pulaski Chapter sponsored a grant, which was awarded, for the restoration of Griffin City Hall. Colonel Ebenezer Folsom Chapter was tiny but mighty, with members volunteering at multiple historic sites. Georgia Daughters from the mountains to the coast participated in leaning and maintaining cemeteries, marking and reporting monuments, maintaining historic properties, helping to restore local sites, visiting historic sites to present programs, supporting local historical societies and libraries with their preservation work, enhancing historic sites with landscaping, and serving as docents to explain historic sites. Captain James Kell received first place for Outstanding Chapter Report, with second place to Fielding Lewis, and third place to Baron DeKalb. Historic preservation has remained a vital part of Georgia Daughters work in 2020, and we look forward to even more accomplishments in this area in 2021.

#### JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS - Heather Stair Dickey

Georgia DAR chapters were truly outstanding in their sponsorship and support of Junior American Citizens (JAC) groups this year. With a total of 97 JAC Groups 65 articles published and 2,919 students participating in the various JAC activities with the theme "The 400th Anniversary of the Mayflower—Rise and Shine for new Opportunities in a new world". Thomasville received 73 Ga State Awards 66 Reginal Awards and 53 National Awards. Trahlyta received 11 Ga state Awards and Nine Reginal and 6 National Awards. Rev John Andrews received Three Ga State Awards One Reginal Awards and One National Award for their service project. And James Pittman received One Ga state Awards and One Reginal Award. We also awarded a Thatcher award to Thomasville, Trahlyta and Rev John Andrews JAC Chairs for their outstanding work in this committee. This Chairman and Vice-Chairman were very impressed with our Georgia Daughters for their continued support of this

awesome committee I am thrilled to have had such successful year as the Georgia JAC Committee chair.

#### LITERACY PROMOTION – Marya Leone Leatherwood

This chair facilitated two workshops on Literacy Promotion at Fall Forum. The sessions were well attended and allowed me to present, and for Daughters to share, innovative approaches for promoting literacy. I have consulted with new Literacy Promotion Chairs who have inquired about ways to promote literacy in their communities. For the past three years, our county board of commissioners has, at the request of our chapter, designated November 1 as National Family Literacy Day. I have shared this proclamation, suitable for local and county level elected boards, with interested chapters across Georgia as well as with the National Chair for Literacy Promotion. Please contact me if you would like a copy of this proclamation. Despite the challenges presented by COVID-19, over 600 Georgia Daughters promoted literacy in 2020 by donating books (7479), contributing funds (\$7573), promoting literacy for adults (1221 hours) and children (4357 hours). And, creative ways are being developed (Zoom, YouTube) to continue encouraging literacy across Georgia communities. We hope 2021 allows more opportunities to connect with one another and develop an even stronger commitment to fulfill our mission of promoting education through our service to DAR.

#### NATIONAL DEFENSE - Sandra H. Darby

Thirty-nine of the 115 Georgia chapters presented at least one program dedicated to National Defense. One-hundred thirteen devoted at least three minutes to a National Defense report at all of their regular meetings. One-hundred eight chapters used National Defender articles for the chapter three-minute reports. Seventeen Gold ROTC medals were presented to a college or university graduate being commissioned in one of the U.S. Armed Services. One-hundred twenty three Bronze JROTC medals were presented to either a high school or junior college graduating senior. Twenty-five Silver Outstanding Cadet medals were presented to students participating in non-ROTC military affiliated programs. Distinguished Citizen medals were presented to 21 individuals 18 years or older who fulfilled the qualities of honor, service, courage, leadership and patriotism. Youth Citizenship medals were presented to 65 students in grades 5 through 11. \$4,169 was contributed to ROTC and Cadet Award Programs. Philadelphia Winn, James Stewart, Old Unicoi Trail, Archibald Bulloch, Augusta, Fielding Lewis, James Stewart, General David Newman, Fayette-Starr's Mill, Sweetwater and Kennesaw Mountain submitted reports in addition to the information reported on the Chapter Master Report.

#### **SERVICE TO AMERICA! – Frances Cunningham Gipson**

Our State of Georgia daughters have continued to dedicate their time in the promotion of Historic Preservation, Education and Patriotism. Fears of COVID-19 did not stop our daughters from their goal of providing meaningful community service. We have a Society based on service. Mrs. Eugenia Washington, a DAR founder, would be proud if she could see us today. Seventy-one chapters participated in the National Day of Service on or around October 11 and in some cases projects started continued. Seventy chapters sewed and donated face masks and other PPE. These masks and other PPE by our chapters totaled 26,910. Good job ladies. Ninety-three percent of chapters logged in their volunteer hours which totaled 188.642 for the State. These hours included sewing masks, gowns. ear savers, guilts, knitting, crocheting blanks, caps, blankets, stuffed buddy bags, fidget quilts, packing supplies to military bases around the world, providing supplies to homeless in their communities, providing clothes and personal supplies to women's shelters, cleaned headstones and cemeteries, photographed headstones and put in find-a-grave, provided supplies and help to schools, first responders, hospital and support personnel, taught English to immigrants, et al. Wherever there was a need, Georgia daughters were there to help.

#### WOMEN'S ISSUES - Bridget Hester Conner

This chair took on duties at the end of the year when someone resigned, close to the deadline for essay entries. I received several great essays and was also pleased to get some extensive chapter reports from several chapters on their activities throughout the year. At conference I encouraged chapters to send me reports of their activities and to remind members about the essay contest.

## **National Genealogy Committees: Reports of State Chairs**

#### DAR GENEALOGY PRESERVATION - Stephanie Lynn Dean Ray

This committee had no records. All persons interested in helping on this committee were asked to please assist in the Patriot Records Project.

#### GENEALOGICAL RECORDS – Linda Killebrew Lopez

In 2020, Georgia Daughters busily completed Bible record transcriptions and Cemetery Inventories. Several Daughters completed their first entries and other veteran Daughters continued their wonderful contributions, for a total of six chapters and 11 Daughters participating. Submissions to the DAR library were: Volume 531, Eastside Cemetery Inventory (122 pages), and Volume 697, Bible Records and Cemetery Inventory (199 pages), for a total of 321 pages. The Eastside Cemetery Inventory, submitted by Archibald Bulloch, was a major joint project by that chapter and the Bulloch County Historical Society. It contained over 26,000 names, which were indexed by Lynn Harburn. For the first time, submissions were accepted electronically. Bound copies will be distributed to the Georgia Archives, Washington Memorial Library and Georgia Historical Society. Three Daughters completed 13,814 GRC book indexing entries; special recognition goes to Jan Hogan, William McIntosh, and Bonnie Baker, Liberty Hill. Five chapters met the Ten Page Chapter Challenge that was issued by National Chair, Nan Ball. Publicity information about this project was distributed at Fall Forum and will continue to be distributed to chapters. We look forward to even more contributions in 2021.

#### LINEAGE RESEARCH – Patricia "Tricia" Cook Powers and Lynda Henderson Welch

Lineage Research reports were submitted by 52 chapters; 35 chapters report having a Lineage Research Chair; 3 chapters report having a lineage committee. Six chapters held workshops in 2020: Andrew Houser, Captain James Kell, Fielding Lewis, Martha Stewart Bulloch, Old Noonday, Philadelphia Winn. Later workshops were held virtually due to COVID. Chapters utilized the NSDAR Specialty Committees: Spanish, African American, American Indian, Georgia Daughters assisted others through LRLB and Facebook Lineage Research page. Six chapters reported members serving on NSDAR genealogical research committees. LR members assisted Registrars with difficult applications prior to submission. Twenty-six AIRs were a carryover into this administration; 34 AIRs were issued to Georgia chapters July to December 2020 for a total of 60 AIRs. Individual chapters cleared 31. LR was asked to assist with 14 of which 4 have been verified with an additional 8 responses sent to National. These numbers may be interpreted as confidence is building within the chapters to clear their own AIRs and/or to allow the Georgia State Lineage Research Committee to assist them. We continue to encourage Registrars and chapter volunteers to take the GEP classes and keep up to date with NSDAR application requirements to ensure the quality of future applications.

#### **PATRIOT RECORDS PROJECT – Teresa Bronte Daniels**

Volunteers for the Patriot Records Project provide easier access to hard-to-search American Revolutionary War records and related historical collections. In the Genealogical Research System (GRS), under the Rev War tab, you can find lists from over 60 Revolutionary War era record groups that have been indexed. Volunteers have indexed millions of names making the job of the researcher or volunteer genealogist much easier.

In 2020, 73 Georgia Daughters from 38 chapters participated in the Patriot Records Project. The Outstanding Volunteer of the Year is Lynne James of the Martha Stewart Bulloch Chapter. Lynne worked fulltime on this project indexing over 51,000 names by herself. For a complete list of awards, see Winners of State Awards. There has been a tremendous increase in participation in the Patriot Records Project. We wish to thank the Project Volunteers whose hard work has made the Patriot Records Project so successful. #### STATE APPLICATION TEAM (SAT) - Constance "Connie" Sasser Rifkind

The State Application Team consisted of 20 members willing to volunteer their time to complete new applications referred by National. Using their outstanding research skills, team members worked with 75 Prospective Members to complete their applications from January 2020 to December 2020. Of the 75 Prospective Members, 44 applications were completed and sent to 30 Chapter Registrars.

#### **VOLUNTEER GENEALOGISTS – Judith Pritchett Hall**

89 Daughters have passed the GEP 3 course increasing our Volunteer Genealogists. The most GEP courses taken by members in 2020 – with seven courses passed (tie): Fielding Lewis and Martha Stewart Bulloch. The Most Interesting CMR report was Kennesaw Mountain. Workshops were presented at Fall Forum on Family History Library Catalog Research and Citations. Requesting chapters with new registrars had Volunteer Genealogists assigned. Volunteer Genealogist with Most Diverse Research for a CDRC Chapter: Dana Anderson, Volunteer Genealogist with Most Verified Applications for a CDRC Chapter: Teresa Daniels. Vice Chairs: Dana Anderson, Brenda Bush, Teresa Daniels, Cynthia Davis, Christine Doerschner, Cindy Gaskins, Susan Lindsey, Cathy McLendon, Marie Manning, Pat Mercer, Sara Jane Overstreet, Lynn Parson, and Suzanne Sanborn.

## National Administrative Committees: Reports of State Chairs

#### **CHAPTER ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS – Rebecca Katherine Croft**

By using the Chapter Achievement Awards as a guide to tell how well Chapters are doing, one can see that Georgia is very strong state. Every chapter received an Awards Level for 2020 - Congratulations Daughters! Georgia has 116 Chapters with 98 Chapters that achieved Level 1 by earning 400 or more points, 16 chapters achieved Level 2 by earning 300-400 points, and 2 chapters achieved level 3 by earing 200 or more points. Georgia chapters were also at 100% for reporting Section 8 of the Chapter Master Report, which is a mandatory contribution from each chapter of \$100. ## CHAPTER DEVELOPMENT AND REVITALIZATION COMMISSION - Cynthia Willis Waskowsky

Volunteer Genealogists were assigned to ten chapters requesting assistance in researching lineage for prospective members. In October, the committee members presented workshops on both days of the Fall Forum emphasizing building strong chapters using the Chapter Checklist to evaluate their activities, developing Membership and Welcome Committees, and by encouraging the use of the First 30 Days and the Member Course to educate and encourage leadership in their chapter. In December, the committee members were featured in the last GSSDAR weekly blog in an effort to boost rejuvenation and sense of purpose within the chapters. Each member highlighted the resources they could provide our chapters.

Chapters were encouraged to contact the committee members with their requests.

#### INSIGNIA – Anita Pietrobono Bianconi

This Chair attended Fall Forum in October 2020 and spoke at four sessions, explaining the do's and don'ts of how to wear the insignia and the placement of pins on the official left-side ribbon. Also, discussed the changeover from Hamilton to DAR in-house sales. Discussed availability of pins to purchase at this time due to manufacturing delays from COVID protocols and staffing restrictions.

#### JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP - Kathleen "Kathy" Zeles Marsh

Georgia Juniors were lighting the way in 2020 and making a difference in our chapters and communities through assistance moving to digital meetings, fundraisers to meet community needs, creating masks and other PPE, paging virtually at Continental Congress, and serving on the frontlines as health care professionals. This Chair was grateful to have 137 Georgians participate in the National Firefly 5K raising money for the Helen Pouch Memorial fund. We're proud of Georgia Juniors for participating across all levels of leadership with one serving as a National Congress Committee Vice Chair, one on a national committee, one as a State Officer, six as State Chairs, 10 as State Vice Chairs, 33 Chapter Officers, and 69 Chapter Chairs. Four Georgia Chapters sponsored and received a \$500 scholarship via the Classroom Grant Award. This year the 52nd State Outstanding Junior was recognized along with one State Runner-Up and 28 Chapter Outstanding Juniors. This Chair continued to challenge Georgia Chapters to recognize a Chapter Outstanding Junior and to help their juniors find their place in DAR. This Chair is grateful for all the support from Georgia Daughters, especially the Junior Membership Vice Chairs and the officers and members of the Georgia Junior Club.

MEMBERSHIP – Mary King Gammage Givens
Total membership count on January 1, 2021 was 8168. Georgia welcomed 445 new DAR members by application, including 76 Juniors. In calendar year 2020, membership received 348 referrals forwarded from the National Society through the Prospective Member Database. This Chair received permission to proceed from 92 of the National referrals.

Despite limitations resulting from the COVID19 pandemic and ensuing restrictions, chapters have continued to recruit family members and friends, contacted prospective members referred by National, used email and postal mail to maintain contact, posted on websites and social media to keep chapter members informed and engaged, held ZOOM meetings, held Wreaths Across America events, sent newsletters. Chapter Membership Chairs contacted prospective members and arranged Zoom meets, used NextDoor App to connect with area residents, and stayed in contact with them. Service projects by chapter members were used to benefit the community and promote the value of DAR. Of the 116 established Georgia chapters, 52 chapters showed positive growth in calendar year 2020, with nine chapters growing by 10% or better. Forty-two chapters had zero dropped members. The Eagle Award for the greatest percentage increase in membership by application goes to Chestatee River Chapter with 25% increase.

#### PRESIDENT GENERAL'S PROJECT – Patricia M. Hein

The President General's Project gives all Daughters an opportunity to support the endeavors of the National Society. In 2020-2021, the Georgia State Society held a contest encouraging all Georgia chapters to gain one Sustaining Supporter through February 15, 2021. 21 chapters increased their count by at least one. With appreciation, a Certificate of Award will be given to these chapters. King's Gap Chapter had the largest increase with five. The Georgia State Society increased the Sustaining Supporter count by 18 for a total of 402, including two Member at Large. As of February 2021, 87 chapters have at least one Sustaining Supporter. Items to support the President General's Project were available at Fall Forum, including business cards with online information to purchase merchandise and become a Sustaining Supporter. Throughout the term, articles and photos of interest were posted on the Georgia State Society Facebook Group. All Georgia State Society chapters sent their required yearly amount for the President General's Project \$7.50 Member contribution. As of January 2021, 37 chapters have achieved 100% participation. 22 chapters will receive their 100% participation certificate at state conference.

#### PROTOCOL – Mindy Tidmore Kammeyer-Price

The Covid19 year brought new issues to our chapters. Many chapters contacted me to ask about protocol for Zoom meetings. The answer is that this is a new time for our chapters and doing your best is always the right way to proceed. I asked the leaders of the Zoom call to remind Daughters to 'mute' the call on their side for best results for all participants. The leader of the call should call on those as they raise their hand to talk. This chair helped with proper seating for the Fall Forum. Again, because of 'social distancing' this was also a challenge. I enjoyed helping our Daughters and am always happy to see their innovation and acceptance of the necessary changes!

#### **PUBLIC RELATIONS AND MEDIA – Mary Hamilton Williams**

Reports were received from all chapters. Chapters reporting newsletters, 77; members only website and/or social media, 83; brochures, 37; media awards, one; print coverage, 79; broadcast coverage, 24; electronic media coverage, 40; DAR videos used,18; publicity for a commemorative or community event, 66. This Committee Chair conducted two Public Relations training sessions during the Fall Forum. Chapters throughout the state utilized social media, print media, and online media to highlight Constitution Week, Proclamations from city and state leaders for patriotic days, grave markings, scholarship awards, ROTC awards, Good Citizen awards, and community events. Chapter business cards, chapter brochures/fact sheets, member name tags with the chapter name, and chapter banners were used by many chapters as conversation starters when members were at community events or for library displays. Social media continues to be a great way of communicating to a larger audience with public pages and to chapter members with closed groups. Chapters in communities with local weekly newspapers submitted monthly articles with photos.

#### **UNITS OVERSEAS - Donna L. Owens**

During the October 2020 District Workshops, this chairman provided handouts with information about the Units Overseas (UO) Committee, their importance to the NSDAR mission, and why each member should consider becoming an Associate of one or more UO chapters. These were distributed to members attending the teaching modules during each breakout session. Additionally, she published seasonal reminders, quizzes, and information segments on the UA Facebook page and for reports on the GSSDAR Monday News-You-Can-Use blog. Appreciation is extended to the State Regent, State Parliamentarian, and other members of the committee for their thoughtful and diligent work.

#### FINANCE COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES

#### July 16, 2020

The Finance Committee of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, met on Thursday, July 16, 2020, at the Hampton Inn in Thomson, Georgia. Committee Chair Constance "Connie" Sasser Rifkind called the meeting to order at 5:30 pm. Additional voting members attending were: Betty Brown Harrah, Kay Griffin Ragan, Helen Robertson Powell, Harriette Foster Hankinson, and Hanna Wren Fowler. Ex-Officio member State Regent O. B. Wilhoit McCorkle was present. Amy Bolin Nation was present as a guest.

Mrs. Rifkind welcomed those attending, declared a quorum present, and gave the Invocation. Mrs. Rifkind announced the previous Finance Committee approved the minutes of the last meeting of the Finance Committee during the Brown Administration, and they were submitted for publication in the 2019-2020 Proceedings.

Kay Ragan, State Treasurer, presented the Financial Reports as follows: **Georgia State Society Account Summaries** covering the period July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2020 were: Certificates of Deposit \$131,417.31; checking account \$90,479.00; Money Market Account \$154,793.41; Total Bank Accounts 376,689.72; Total Liabilities and Equity \$376,689.72. The **Meadow Garden account summaries** covering the period July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2020 were: Certificates of Deposit \$308,118.98; checking account \$127,868.88; Petty Cash \$100.00; Money Market Account \$156,563.34; Total Bank Accounts \$592,651.20; Total Fixed Assets \$260,932.38, and Total Liabilities and Equity \$853,583.58.

The Finance Committee discussed the Fixed Assets. New auditors have asked for the breakdown of Fixed Assets, but they cannot be found in the state records at this time. Kimberly Haynes, Senior Manager with Mauldin and Jenkins, will get those numbers from Smith & Howard. Mrs. Rifkind commented that the audit is already started and going well. Mrs. Powell explained that State Dues Unallocated checking funds are distributed at the end of each administration. Mrs. Powell moved that the ending balance of the GSS State Dues Unallocated checking on June 30, 2022, be distributed as follows: 50% Money Market State Dues Unallocated/General Savings, 50% Meadow Garden Money Market Capital Investment & Improvement. Seconded by Hanna Fowler. Adopted unanimously.

The committee discussed the "Items of Information" section in the *Proceedings* concerning the "Annual State Society Contribution to the President General's Project." The committee determined the Resolution needs to be rescinded because the President General's Project Benefactor amount has changed. Mrs. Hankinson moved that the "Annual State Society Contribution to the President General's Project" Resolution that was adopted 2008 be rescinded. Seconded by Mrs. McCorkle. Adopted unanimously.

Mrs. Harrah moved that the Finance Committee, in honor of the State Regent of the Georgia State Society, contribute to the President General's Project, the amount equal to the Benefactor Level, such funds to be debited from the GSS State Dues Unallocated Money Market Account and the gift to be made during the first year of the State Regent's term. This change is to be recorded in the *Proceedings* under

Items of Information "Annual State Society Contribution to the President General's Project." Seconded by Mrs. Hankinson. Adopted unanimously.

The proposed GSSDAR 2020-2021 Budget was discussed. The Christopher Columbus Essay Contest was discontinued by NSDAR. Mrs. Ragan moved to amend the proposed GSSDAR 2020-2021 Budget as follows: Delete line item for Christopher Columbus Essay in the amount of \$300. Reallocate \$150 to Chaplain line item and \$150 to the Simple Give line item, which should read \$39.00 monthly to bring the line item total \$500. Seconded by Mrs. Hankinson. Adopted unanimously. The amended GSSDAR 2020-2021 Budget will be ratified at the State Board of Management meeting at Fall Forum. State Regent McCorkle distributed and reviewed the proposed GSSDAR 2021-2022 Budget. Mrs. Ragan moved to accept the proposed GSSDAR 2021-2022 budget for the current dues allocation be accepted. Seconded by Mrs. Fowler. Adopted unanimously.

Mrs. Rifkind discussed Certificates of Deposits rates and stated she will shop rates for those that will be maturing soon.

Mrs. McCorkle announced the next meeting of the Finance Committee will be held Thursday, October 22, 2020, at 2:15 pm at Fall Forum. Mrs. Nation closed the meeting with prayer.

The meeting adjourned at 7:15 pm.

Additional voting members attending were: Betty Brown Harrah, Kay Griffin Ragan, Helen Robertson Powell, and Lynne Allen Tate. Ex-Officio member State Regent O. B. Wilhoit McCorkle was present. Amy Bolin Nation was present as a quest.

Mrs. Rifkind welcomed those attending. Mrs. Harrah called the roll. Mrs. Rifkind declared a quorum present and gave the Invocation. Mrs. Harrah presented the minutes of the July 16, 2020, meeting. Mrs. Powell moved that the minutes be approved as presented. Motion adopted unanimously.

Mrs. Ragan, State Treasurer, reported on the renewal of Certificates of Deposits. Two were moved from SunTrust Bank to First State Bank for twelve months at .65% and .75%. One was moved from Regions Bank to Georgia Community Bank for twelve months at .75%. Touchmark Bank was rolled over for twelve months at .60%. Mrs. Ragan commented the funds in the Wells Fargo Bank are for the various clubs and will need to be moved to Synovus Bank so that the account can be closed. Because there is \$65,000.96 in the Money Market account at Synovus, the total funds at Synovus would be at the FDIC Insured limit. It was decided that the funds in Wells Fargo would remain there for now. Mrs. Ragan presented the Financial Reports as follows: Georgia State Society Account Summaries covering July 1, 2020 through October 15, 2020 were: Certificates of Deposit \$135,762.49; Checking Account \$167,386.34; Money Market Account \$154,270.78; Total Bank Accounts \$457,419.61; Total Liabilities and Equity \$457,419.61. The Meadow Garden Account Summaries covering July 1, 2020 through October 22, 2020 were: Certificates of Deposit \$308,117.50; checking account \$103,944.17; Petty Cash \$100.00; Money Market Account \$146,091.99; Total Fixed Assets \$344,496.09, and Total Liabilities and Equity \$902,749.75. Mrs. Powell, Past Treasurer, reported the audit has been completed, and the books were found in order. Mauldin and Jenkins sent the audit report to the printer. Mrs. Powell will request hard copies from the auditors to distribute to the past State Regent, current State Regent, the Finance Chair, Treasurer General, and the state files.

Mrs. McCorkle explained the National Board of Management voted on October 10, 2020,

that Tamassee will no longer be a DAR school. After discussion, we will relinquish sponsorship of the May Irwin Talmadge Auditorium/Gymnasium and request the May Irwin Talmadge Auditorium/Gymnasium Endowment be returned. The Georgia State Society currently has \$23,181.90 in the Georgia State Project Fund for Tamassee. Mrs. Ragan moved to divide the Georgia State Project Fund GSS Checking funds in the amount of \$23,181.90 to the GSS General Fund and Meadow Garden Administrative and Maintenance fund as directed by the Resolution dated March 15, 2014. Motion Adopted unanimously.

Mrs. McCorkle reported the motion to rescind the Benefactor Resolution was approved by the Finance Committee in July 2020. At the State Board of Management, Mrs. Harrah will move the Benefactor Resolution be rescinded. The 2020-2021 Budget was reviewed. In Mrs. Rifkind's absence at the State Board of Management meeting on Saturday, Mrs. Harrah will bring the motion to approve the 2020-2021 Budget for ratification and present the 2021-2022 Budget.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:00 pm.

Ex-Officio member State Regent O. B. Wilhoit McCorkle was present. Amy Bolin Nation was present as a guest.

Mrs. Rifkind welcomed those attending. Mrs. Harrah called the roll. Mrs. Rifkind declared a quorum present. Mrs. Harrah presented the minutes of the October 22, 2020, meeting. Mrs. Ragan moved that the minutes be approved as presented. Mrs. Powell seconded. Motion adopted unanimously.

Mrs. Ragan presented the Financial Reports as follows: **Georgia State Society Account Summaries** covering July 1, 2020 through March 18, 2021 were: Certificates of Deposit \$135,845.24; Checking Account \$253,574.40; Money Market Account \$150,435.80; Total Liabilities and Equity \$539,855.44. The **Meadow Garden Account Summaries** covering July 1, 2020 through March 18, 2021 were: Certificates of Deposit \$308,119.72; Checking Account \$163,070.63; Petty Cash \$100.00; Money Market Account \$146,206.59; Total Fixed Assets \$344,496.09, and Total Liabilities and Equity \$961,993.03. Mrs. McCorkle asked Mrs. Ragan for the total funds in the Meadow Garden State Regent's Projects, Capital Improvements/Investments Checking, and Capital Improvements Money Market. The total for all was \$86,654.54. There is also \$37,422.23 in the Georgia State Society State Regent's Project. Some of those monies might be used for the restoration project at Meadow Garden.

Mrs. Rifkind reported she had communicated with Mauldin and Jenkins about the upcoming audit. All documents are now digitally entered. Mauldin and Jenkins granted the State Society a three-year price guarantee. However, because of unforeseen taxes on commercial ads, the State Society needed to file an amended tax return, therefore, charged an additional fee for the amended return. That should not apply in the upcoming year. Mrs. Rifkind provided Mrs. Ragan the Audit Engagement letter for review.

Mrs. McCorkle and the Executive Board recommended to the Finance Committee that the Georgia State Society should sponsor a gift to NSDAR. Mrs. Harrah moved that the Georgia State Society sponsor, as part of the Next Act Campaign of the NSDAR President General, Denise Doring VanBuren, the restoration of a Lay Light panel at Constitution Hall in the amount of \$30,000, to be paid from the "State Dues Unallocated/General Savings Money Market Account" and this donation is in honor of all Georgia Daughters. Seconded by Mrs. Ragan. Motion adopted unanimously.

Mrs. Powell moved that the Georgia State Society approve remaining funds in the

Georgia State Society Endowment Fund for the Talmadge Auditorium/Gymnasium at Tamassee, be returned to the Georgia State Society and be divided between the "Meadow Garden Capital Investment/Improvement Checking Account" and the "Georgia State Society State Dues Unallocated/General Savings Account" in the event the funds are returned. In the event the funds are not returned, I further move that the Georgia State Society approve the re-direction of the use of funds within the Georgia State Society Endowment Fund for the Talmadge Auditorium/Gymnasium at Tamassee be divided between the benefit and use of the Meadow Garden Heritage Education Center in Augusta, and a scholarship for students to attend Berry College in Rome, Georgia, within the discretion of the Georgia State Society Executive Committee. Mrs. Harrah seconded the motion. Motion was approved unanimously. Mrs. McCorkle explained this is reflected in the 1990 Resolution. The amount currently in the Endowment is \$109,761.00.

Mrs. Rifkind asked if anyone had any questions or comments about the 2021-2022 proposed budget that will be presented and ratified at the Business Meeting. There were no comments.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:59 am.

#### STATE SPEAKERS STAFF - Wanda Carol Patterson



## Meadow Garden

#### MEADOW GARDEN - Ransom Bennett Schwerzler

Meadow Garden started 2020 with more than 440 guests visiting in the first months. Our historic house had a 25% increase in visitors the last two years and was on track to have even greater attendance. Unfortunately, in March the pandemic caused the museum to temporarily close. The house reopened for tours by appointment on August 11 with precautions in place. In April, GSSDAR was honored with Georgia Trust's Excellence in Stewardship Award recognizing 120 years of stewardship of Meadow Garden. Even through this closure, Meadow Garden moved forward guided by the Preservation and Restoration Plan. Non-historic plaster was removed from the cellar exposing the original brick, early plaster, and vertical boards. Dendrochronology was conducted dating the extension of the house to 1835. Additional restoration on the west face of the exterior and in the Best Room gave clues to the earliest orientation of the house. In December, we hosted Christmas at Meadow Garden, with limited tours. Outreach has continued, often virtually, with programs for DAR chapters and organizations. Heartfelt thanks go to all those who have supported Meadow Garden through this challenging time as we preserve this historic home of George Walton, signer of the Declaration of Independence.

#### **MEADOW GARDEN DOCENTS - F. Anne Hinton**

Training is currently on hiatus due to the pandemic. Our house narrative was updated to include the latest information on the house and include content suggestions from Donor by Design Group, LLC.

### MEADOW GARDEN FURNISHINGS – Stephanie McIntosh Roohani

The Meadow Garden Board approved an upgrade of the Past Perfect Museum Software to the Web Edition to better facilitate access to collections data. The current records have been updated to allow for transfer to the Web Edition, which should take place in the Spring of 2021. Additional research was completed on items currently in the collections to better understand the provenance of items. Preparation to highlight certain items in the collections on both social media and future displays was conducted. This Chair fielded four questions from the public regarding items in the museum's collection.

#### MEADOW GARDEN LANDSCAPING - Catherine "Cathy" Winslett Hyer

The sprinkler system was damaged while work was being done on the house and Landmark LLC paid for the repairs. Mr. Blue, our lawn maintenance professional has had an accident and broken his neck. His crew continues to do an excellent job maintaining our landscaping. There are two sprinkler heads too close to the front porch that need to be moved. The overspray is contributing to the rot on the porch. Director Roohani said she will arrange the repairs.

The Meadow Garden Gift Shop is transitioning away from a traveling shop to focus on selling items at our physical gift shop, located in the Heritage Education Center. Mrs. Roohani diligently attended Fall Forum and State Conference to sell final sale items for the traveling shop. ## **Meadow Garden Board Minutes**

#### July 17, 2020

The Meadow Garden Board met Friday, July 17, 2020, at the Thomson Family YMCA in Thomson, Georgia. O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle, State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. Other voting members present were: Betty Brown Harrah, Kay Griffin Ragan, Ransom Bennett Schwerzler, Wadene Baird Welch, Stephani McIntosh Roohani, Melodye G. Brown, Laura Marcella Reid, F. Anne Hinton, Amy Pittman Lawson, Cathy Winslett Hyer, Amy Bolin Nation. Also present was Ex-Officio member Helen Robertson Powell and Docent Vice Chair Cathy Herb McAdams. Guests present were Greg Jacobs, Landmark Preservation, LLC; Jim Mellor, Donor By Design Group and HODAR; and Janie Mellor, member of Trahlyta Chapter, NSDAR.

The State Regent welcomed everyone to the meeting. Mrs. Nation gave the opening prayer. Mrs. Harrah called the roll. Mrs. McCorkle introduced the new members on the board. Mrs. Harrah presented the minutes from the June 3, 2020 meeting. Ms. Reid moved to accept the minutes as corrected. Motion adopted unanimously.

State Regent McCorkle gave a report of the tasks from the June 3, 2020 meeting. Mrs. McCorkle announced that Greg Jacobs with Landmark Preservation, LLC, would share the 2018-2020 addendum to the Plan for Historic Restoration and Preservation later in the meeting. She reminded the group that the purpose of the ten-year Plan for Historic

Restoration and Preservation is to have a complete and accurate history of the house. She also reported that Anne Floyd of the CSRA Regional Commission, Historic Preservation Division, Mr. Jacobs, Mr. Mellor have accepted positions on the Meadow Garden Advisory Board.

State Regent McCorkle explained that the financial balance at the end of each administration in GSS State Dues Unallocated is distributed equally between GSS State Dues Unallocated/General Savings Money Market and Meadow Garden Admin/Maintenance Money Market. Ms. Reid moved to transfer \$47,072.00 from the Meadow Garden Admin & Maintenance Money Market account to Meadow Garden Capital Improvements/Investments Money Market Account. This amount was originally from half of the State Dues Unallocated at the end of the Brown Administration 2018-2020. Seconded by Ms. Brown. Motion adopted unanimously.

Meadow Garden Chair Mrs. Schwerzler reported that the Christmas Open House is tentatively scheduled for December 11-12, 2020, 6:30-8:30 each night, dependent on the COVID-19 restrictions at that time. With the help of Amanda Bryan, Public Relations Chair, the Meadow Garden website is updated and online. Mrs. Schwerzler is writing a blog regarding George Walton to add to it. Mrs. McCorkle plans to insert a link to the Meadow Garden website in the GSS Blog four times a year. Mrs. Schwerzler reported on the progress of the George Walton book; many volunteers assisted with transcriptions. Pending guidance from Donor By Design Group, she may revise the book to better connect visitors and donors with the story of the life of George Walton. Mrs. Schwerzler reminded the Board that Meadow Garden was awarded the Georgia Trust Excellence in Stewardship Award. The award presentation during the 2020 Ramble has now been rescheduled for April 16-18, 2021. Mary Swafford Loveless, State Regent's Project Committee, will be working with Mrs. Schwerzler on future grant writing for Meadow Garden. Cindy Foster Grace, Historic Preservation Vice Chair, will assist Mrs. Schwerzler on the entry for the DAR Historic Preservation Contest. Mrs. Schwerzler presented the Historic Property Valuation Update Report prepared by Historic Appraisal Services, LLC, valuing the house at \$1,672,236.00. Mrs. Schwerzler reminded the Board that Meadow Garden received the 2020 Augusta CVB Grant, which resulted in a full-page, custom-content ad in the Augusta Experience Guide and a visitaugusta.com advertising package. The 2021 grant will be open for applications in September, with follow-up items due by December 31, 2020. Mrs. Schwerzler commended Cathy and Bruce Hyer for the beautiful pictures they provided of Meadow Garden.

Mrs. Roohani, Meadow Garden Director, reported that the HVAC System in the Heritage Education Center is not functioning and beyond repair. Three estimates were obtained: Sig Cox, \$11,506; Duggan, \$10,221; D'Antigna & Merritt Heating & Air Company (D&M), Mrs. Roohani moved that the Meadow Garden Board contract with D'Antigna & Merritt Heating & Air Company to replace the HVAC unit in the Heritage Education Center at the cost of \$10,178.00, to be paid from the Meadow Garden Administrative & Maintenance Money Market Account. Seconded by Ms. Brown. Motion adopted unanimously. Mrs. McCorkle remarked that replacement of the HVAC in the Historic House is in the Plan for Historic Restoration and Preservation, and all lines and ducts will be installed unobtrusively. Because of the replacement of the HVAC system, the intended re-open date of July 7 will be postponed. The Board decided that upon reopening, visits will be by appointment only. Mrs. Roohani stated that she and Amy Lawson will approach AP Wealth about hosting the George and Dorothy Walton Award Ceremony at Meadow Garden. Mrs. Roohani reported that she and Mrs. Schwerzler are organizing the Stribling room. Mrs. Roohani obtained all Gift Shop items from the past Gift Shop Chair; they will be inventoried and sold at the Meadow Garden table at Fall Forum and State Conference. Mrs. Roohani continues to inventory the items and furniture in the historic house. Mrs. Lawson moved that the Meadow Garden Board purchase the current Past Perfect museum software (Web Edition, Version 5.0) to include the New User Starter Package one-time setup fee and Annual Hosting, Licensing, Maintenance, and Support Fee. The total cost not to exceed \$900 (\$300 Start Up/\$600 Annual). Funds to be drawn from the Furnishings Checking Account. Seconded by Ms. Reid. Motion

**adopted unanimously.** Mrs. Roohani will obtain estimates on re-keying the doors; she and Ms. Brown will rewrite the Keys Section of the Standing Rules.

Mrs. Ragan, State Treasurer, presented the **Meadow Garden Account Summaries**: Certificate of Deposits \$308,118.98; Checking Account \$127,868.88; Money Market \$156,563.34; Petty Cash \$100; Fixed Assets \$260,932.38; Total Liabilities & Equity \$853,583.58. Mrs. McCorkle remarked that even though Meadow Garden is closed to the public due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Mrs. Roohani continues to work from home and is still receiving her full pay.

Mrs. McCorkle presented the proposed 2020-2021 Meadow Garden Budget, along with the 2019-2020 actuals for comparison. Mrs. Ragan moved to accept the 2020-2021 Meadow Garden Operating Budget as presented. Seconded by Mrs. Lawson. Motion adopted unanimously.

Ms. Brown moved that the Meadow Garden Board purchase a new computer not to exceed \$1,000.00 for the office at Meadow Garden, with funds to be drawn from Administrative and Maintenance Money Market. Seconded by Mrs. Hinton. Motion adopted unanimously.

Mrs. Hyer moved to join the American Association for State and Local History (AASLH) as an institution, with dues not to exceed \$100.00, with funds to be taken from Administrative and Maintenance Checking, Organizations & Affiliations. Seconded by Mrs. Welch. Motion adopted unanimously.

Ms. Hinton, Docent Chair, reported that the docents are developing a standard abbreviated script for each room to keep the groups moving at a consistent pace. Large group tours are divided into smaller groups of 10-12 and guided by a docent throughout the house. All tours and special events will be conducted in compliance with the health and safety regulations and policies. The docents continue to build relationships with DAR chapter leaders locally and in South Carolina.

Mrs. Hyer, Landscaping Chair, reported there are no landscaping projects underway at this time. Mrs. Hyer stated that she and her husband would like to update the Meadow Garden Tour video as discoveries have been made by Landmark Preservation. Plans are to develop a documentary and possibly share with Georgia Public Broadcasting Stations.

Mrs. Nation, Patrons Chair, reported online donations are being accepted through Simple Give. Since implementation, donations have increased; there are currently six recurring donors. She plans to promote the giving portal through social media, public relation opportunities, and corporate sponsors, with donor recognitions in newsletters, publications, the GSSDAR website, and blogs. A "New Donor Run" reward and a "Charter Recurring Donor" were discussed, including hosting special events for donors.

Mrs. Bryan, Public Relations, was not present, but Mrs. Schwerzler read her report. Mrs. Bryan suggested offering tours or special activities to complement other events in the area to provide a more focused marketing effort. Mrs. Bryan suggested virtual bingo events for DAR chapters.

Mrs. McCorkle read the "DAR's Continuing Commitment to Equality, which includes a statement about Meadow Garden entitled: **Georgia State Society, NSDAR, and Our Continuing Commitment to Equality.** It states, "The National and Georgia State Society Daughters of the American Revolution is a nonprofit, nonpolitical women's service organization dedicated to preserving the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American independence. As an organization committed to historic preservation, education, and patriotism, we know that examining history helps us to better understand our nation's long struggle to provide equality, justice, and humanity for all Americans. We recognize that the United States of America was built on the promise of equality for all, and we share an obligation to help our nation fulfill that founding promise. Our Society encourages and celebrates a diverse membership, and we embrace the opportunity to support our members of color. DAR reaffirms to the membership and the public alike that our organization condemns racism. Bias, prejudice, and intolerance have no place in the DAR or America. Through the restoration and preservation of Meadow Garden, home of Georgia Walton, Signer of the Declaration of Independence, the Georgia State Society DAR

is continuously learning about the historic structure, which is better informing the interpretation of what life was like during that time. Currently, the focus is on structural research and restoration. With the guidance of a 10-year Preservation Plan, efforts are being made to accurately portray the architecture, furnishings, and lifestyle of those who lived there and those who had a role in preserving it. Much research is being done, and we look forward to sharing our discoveries with the public".

The Meadow Garden Board recessed for lunch.

Mrs. McCorkle introduced Greg Jacobs with Landmark Preservation, LLC, who presented the latest updates on discoveries at Meadow Garden. He also presented the 2018-2020 addendum for review.

As a result of the findings from the siding removal on the canal side of the house, Mr. Jacobs proposed to remove selective finishes from the First Period portion of Meadow Garden with the purpose of exposing adequate framing members for a thorough assessment of the historic and chronological attributes of the framing. Mr. Jacobs was excused from the meeting.

Ms. Brown moved that the proposal received from Landmark Preservation, LLC, dated July 17, 2020, to remove selective finishes from the First Period portion of the Historic House to expose and assess the framing members for investigative and interpretive purposes at a cost of \$10,843.50, to be approved and paid from Capital Improvement checking. Seconded by Mrs. Hyer. Motion adopted unanimously. State Regent McCorkle will notify Mr. Jacobs.

Mrs. McCorkle introduced Jim Mellor of Donor By Design Group, who has had extensive experience with large donor fundraising and capital campaigns. He gave inspiring thoughts on the case for focusing more on the character, accomplishments, and life of George Walton, the Patriot, to potentially draw more interest in the form of large donations to accelerate the timeline of the Plan for Historic Restoration and Preservation at Meadow Garden.

Mrs. McCorkle announced the next Meadow Garden Board meeting will be held on October 22, 2020. The meeting adjourned at 3:00 p.m.

#### October 22, 2020

The Meadow Garden Board met Thursday, October 22, 2020, at the Marriott Macon City Center, Ballroom A/B, Macon, Georgia. O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle, State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 12:15 p.m. Other voting members present were: Betty Brown Harrah, Ransom Bennett Schwerzler, Stephani McIntosh Roohani, Kay Griffin Ragan, Melodye G. Brown, Laura Marcella Reid, F. Anne Hinton, Cathy Winslett Hyer, Amy Pittman Lawson, Amy Bolin Nation, and Kathy Zeles Marsh. Also present was Ex-Officio member Helen Robertson Powell. The guest present was Greg Jacobs, Landmark Preservation, LLC.

The State Regent welcomed everyone to the meeting. Mrs. Nation gave the opening prayer. Mrs. Harrah called the roll. Mrs. McCorkle introduced the new member on the Board, Kathy Zeles Marsh, Public Relations, following Amanda Bryan's resignation. Mrs. Harrah presented the minutes from the 17 July 2020 meeting. Mrs. Hyer moved to accept the minutes as corrected. Motion adopted unanimously.

State Regent McCorkle gave a report of the tasks from the July 17, 2020 meeting. Mrs. McCorkle contacted Greg Jacobs to inform him of the projects that were approved at the 17 July meeting, and work on those projects have begun. She has not been able to meet with James Garvey, Lee Ann Caldwell, and Erick Montgomery as of yet.

Mrs. Schwerzler, Meadow Garden Chair, reported the Meadow Garden website now has SSL certificates in place, and search engine optimization has been updated. Google analytics are set up and will track how visitors are accessing our site. Content has been updated per suggestions from Donor By Design Group, LLC. Pages reflecting specific restoration efforts will be added under the Historic Preservation tab. All social media

platforms, as well as Simple Give, are linked in the header navigation. Meadow Garden was the topic of the September 7 GSS Blog, and the November 9 GSS Blog will highlight the Christmas Candlelight Tour at Meadow Garden and patronage opportunities. Mrs. McCorkle stated the GSS Blog would highlight Meadow Garden at least once per quarter. Mrs. Schwerzler reported that the Meadow Garden Candlelight Tour will be December 11 and 12, 6:00-8:00 p.m., by appointment only, every 20 minutes, with groups limited to six guests to provide social distancing. Public relations and marketing plans are in progress. Mrs. Schwerzler plans to start decorating Meadow Garden for Christmas the Monday after Thanksgiving and remarked the Children of the American Revolution are welcome to join. To increase traffic, special offers will be planned for holidays throughout the year, and areas of interest will be highlighted to draw visitors to other local events, such as highlighting Colonial Gardening during the Sacred Heart Garden Festival. Plans for the 2021 Ramble are underway. Mrs. Schwerzler will give Meadow Garden programs by Zoom or in-person. It was decided not to apply for this round of the Callahan Grant but to investigate the NSDAR Historic Preservation Grant. Mrs. Schwerzler reported the Augusta Convention and Visitors Bureau Grant application and details for the 2021 grant are not yet available.

Mrs. Roohani, Meadow Garden Director, reported the installation of the HVAC units in the George Walton Heritage Education Center was completed by D'Antignac & Merritt (D & M) on July 24, 2020. After further discussion with D & M, it is suggested Meadow Garden enter into a service agreement to maximize savings and receive additional discounts on parts/labor for annual services. The service contract includes annual maintenance of two visits annually on all five HVAC units and a 10% discount on new units, repair parts, and repair labor. Mrs. Roohani moved that the Board approve a service maintenance plan with D'Antignac and Merritt at the cost of \$510.00 per year, which will cover all five (5) HVAC systems on the Meadow Garden property; maintenance will be in the spring and the fall, with funding to come from the Meadow Garden Administrative and Maintenance Checking account. Motion adopted unanimously. Mrs. Roohani reported that the visitor numbers are slow but steady since the re-opening of Meadow Garden on August 11, 2020. In August, September, and October, there were 31, 40, and 25 visitors, respectively. Mrs. Roohani was able to share the life of George Walton and the history of Meadow Garden with over one-hundred 4th grade students at Greenbrier Elementary School via four Zoom sessions. The potential for Meadow Garden to host the annual George & Dorothy Walton Award Ceremony presented by AP Wealth has been postponed due to the ongoing construction around Meadow Garden at Walton Rehabilitation Center. Mrs. Roohani stated that Walton Rehabilitation Center is extending the Center into their existing parking lot and demolishing the office building in front of Meadow Garden to allow for more parking. The completion of this work is expected in August 2021. Meadow Garden will be more visible from 13th Street. Mrs. Roohani worked with Ms. Hinton and Mrs. McAdams to complete a thorough inventory of the Gift Shop. Mrs. Roohani also coordinated with the Gift Shop Chair to transport items to Fall Forum. Mrs. Roohani identified a few viable options for the purchase of the laptop to be used at Meadow Garden and suggests waiting to purchase the laptop during the upcoming Veterans Day sales. A list of current keys with suggestions was drafted and sent to Ms. Brown.

Mrs. Roohani, Furnishing Chair, reported that she continues to sort through the inventory at Meadow Garden for updates and is compiling a list of recommendations to present to the board at a later date. Mrs. Roohani has been in contact with Past Perfect software personnel to inquire about the steps necessary to upgrade to the Web Edition of Past Perfect. Meadow Garden will not incur any fees to upgrade to the Web Edition. Mrs. Roohani and Ms. Hinton, under the guidance of Landmark Preservation, LLC, spent multiple days recovering items from behind the upstairs bedroom wall that were discovered during the exploratory removal of the interior wall in the front bedroom. Great care was taken to sort and sift through the findings, and this work is ongoing. To date, a large number of sewing items have been discovered. Mrs. Roohani is also coordinating with Mrs. Lawson to retrieve items that were discovered on the grounds during the Fischer Administration landscape project. These items have been cataloged by Ms. Lisa Pittman and other archaeologists at Savannah River

Site (SRS). Appreciation should be extended to these individuals who completed this work free of charge. Mrs. McCorkle suggested that Patron-in-Kind recommendations be brought before the Board next month after receiving the materials.

Mrs. Ragan, State Treasurer, reported that \$47,072.00 was transferred from the Meadow Garden Administration and Maintenance Money Market Account to the Meadow Garden Capital Improvements/Investments Money Market Account on July 19, 2020. Mrs. Ragan emailed the revised 2020-2021 Budget to the Meadow Garden Board. She subscribed to the American Association for State and Local History; State Regent Mrs. McCorkle approved the extra \$18.00 required for an annual membership. Mrs. Ragan presented the **Meadow Garden Account Summaries** covering July 1, 2020 through October 15, 2020: Certificate of Deposits \$308,117.50; Checking Account \$103,944.17; Money Market \$146,091.99; Petty Cash \$100; Fixed Assets \$344,496.09; Total Liabilities & Equity \$902,749.75. She reminded the board that the HVAC replacement in the Heritage Education Center was an unexpected large cost, and Landmark Preservation projects approved under the Brown administration were finished during that administration, but billed after July 1, 2020.

Ms. Hinton, Docent Chair, reported that the Docents' training is currently on hold due to the pandemic. She will continue training as soon as possible with all health and safety precautions per current local, state, and national public health policies. The Christmas event will be by reservation and according to our current Meadow Garden policies for small groups to maintain a safe, social distance environment for our staff and guests. Ms. Hinton will continue to build relationships with DAR chapter leaders locally and in South Carolina to recruit docents in the future. Ms. Hinton remarked there are plans to develop a costume closet for the docents at Meadow Garden, and Daughters outside the local area may gain volunteer hours.

The Patron Chair, Mrs. Nation, will be the contact for the pins and the pearls. To be eligible for a Meadow Garden pin, the member must make an initial monetary or in-kind donation of \$500. The pin is an additional \$50. After obtaining the pin, each donation of \$50, or 50 volunteer hours, the patron will earn a pearl, given by the Patron Chair.

Mrs. Lawson, Gift Shop Chair, thanked Mrs. Roohani and Ms. Hinton for their time and effort spent reorganizing and labeling gift shop inventory and updating the Square platform. She informed the Board of her research to determine the feasibility of online gift shop sales. Although selling items online is a good idea, and GSSDAR has the technological capability, Mrs. Lawson feels that it would be overwhelming for the volunteers at this time. Mrs. Lawson and Mrs. Roohani plan to implement online sales in 2021. Mrs. Lawson brought several boxes of jewelry and hats to Fall Forum to reduce the inventory of clearance and sale items.

Mrs. Nation, Patron Chair, has promoted new and recurring donors to become Meadow Garden Patrons. For the September State Regent's Meadow Garden Blog, opportunities and giving levels for Daughters, Chapters, and Corporate donors were included, resulting in increased donations and an increase in Patron levels. Since the last Board meeting, the CIP has been updated to include the name "Charter Recurring Supporters" for recurring donors. More donations and new Patrons are expected when chapters submit their annual reports. Donor recognition cards in honor or Memoriam have been sent as requested by donors as received. Once all chapters have had the opportunity to submit their annual reports, there are plans to publish the list of Patrons and levels. It was decided that to be a Charter Preservationist, the donor needs to contribute at least a \$5.00 monthly recurring donation over two years or a regular donation of at least \$120.00 for the calendar year. This is on a trial basis, so no formal action was taken.

Mrs. Hyer, Landscaping Chair, reported that the landscape maintenance company Environmental Life Planting has completed the lawn's fertilizing and overseeding. They will refresh the pine straw before the Christmas event.

Mrs. Hyer gave the schedule and details of recording the Home of George Walton documentary. Shooting Day 1: Meadow Garden Chair, Ransom Schwerzler, in costume, giving a tour of the home. Shooting Day 2: The Roohani and the Lawson families touring Meadow Garden beginning at the Heritage Education Center. Shooting Day 3: Greg Jacobs

of Landmark Preservation, LLC giving a tour of the discoveries and conclusions within and around the historic house and Fred Ecker speaking about the work completed and the methods of craftsmanship. Mrs. Hyer will conduct the interviews with Mr. Jacobs and Mr. Ecker. Shooting Day 4: Exterior shots in the spring of 2021 and will include Mrs. Roohani's information on the surrounding landscape and environment. Mr. Hyer will complete editing under the direction of Mrs. Hyer. Authorship will be shared by Mrs. Roohani, Mrs. Schwerzler, and Mrs. Hyer. Copywrite will be shared by the Georgia State Society and Hafodgau Films, and Hafodgau Films will hold the master files. Hafodgau Films is the company of Mrs. and Mrs. Bruce Hyer. Mrs. Hyer contacted Leslie Olejnik, who has produced a documentary that was broadcast on GPB, for contact information. Head of Programming William Overstreet was contacted on October 20, 2020.

Mrs. Marsh, Public Relations Chair, reported that she was thrilled to join the Board this year. She met with Mrs. Roohani and Mrs. Schwerzler to understand the public relations needs. Mrs. Marsh received Mrs. Burgess's contact list and copies of the prior press releases. Mrs. Marsh will prepare the press release and invitations for the Christmas event. She will also post dates on various community calendars.

Ms. Reid and Ms. Brown provided encouraging words for the group.

Mrs. McCorkle reported on the Donor by Design Group, LLC (DBD) results. A report from the DBD Group was presented, giving their scan of the top twelve Foundations that give large grants. Mrs. Schwerzler commented that the DBD Group did not include foundations that have already been approached, such as NSDAR, the Georgia Historic Trust, and others. Mrs. McCorkle will email the Board the detailed information provided by DBD Group, and she asked each Board member to review before the next meeting. Ms. Hinton has a connection with the Community Foundation for the Central Savannah River Area. Mrs. Roohani has a connection with the 1772 Foundation, Inc. in Rhode Island. Mrs. McCorkle presented a draft case for Meadow Garden with pictures compiled by the DBD Group. The Board will have a Zoom call to discuss the draft case, foundation recommendations, and other details.

Mrs. McCorkle introduced Greg Jacobs with Landmark Preservation, LLC, who presented the latest findings at Meadow Garden with the removal of the interior wall. There was discussion about leaving the wall open for historic interpretation, and it was decided to have it remain exposed for the near future. Mrs. McCorkle commented that Mr. Jacobs has given four projects for consideration: restoring the porch on the canal side, completing the mechanical and electrical engineering, removing the dining room wall to interpret the stairs, open the door on the canal side of the mantel.

Mrs. McCorkle announced we will have a conference call on November 17, 10:00 a.m. to discuss the DBD Group information and future restoration projects. The meeting was adjourned at 2:30 p.m.

The Meadow Garden Board met via Zoom, November 17, 2020. O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle, State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 10:00 am. Other voting members present were: Betty Brown Harrah, Ransom Bennett Schwerzler, Stephani McIntosh Roohani, Kay Griffin Ragan, Melodye G. Brown, F. Anne Hinton, Cathy Winslett Hyer, Amy Pittman Lawson, Amy Bolin Nation, and Kathy Zeles Marsh. Also present was Ex-Officio member Helen Robertson Powell.

The State Regent welcomed everyone to the meeting. Mrs. Nation gave the opening prayer. Mrs. Harrah called the roll. Mrs. Harrah presented the minutes from the October 22, 2020 meeting. Mrs. Hyer moved to accept the minutes as corrected. Motion adopted unanimously.

Mrs. McCorkle discussed the DBD Group Grant Support Opportunities Report. There were twelve recommended Foundations along with their respective grant contributions in the previous years. DBD Group selected organizations that had not previously donated to

Meadow Garden. The foundations included were: the Robert W. Woodruff Foundation, Inc., the Arthur M. Blank Family Foundation, Inc., the Georgia Power Foundation, the Zeist Foundation, Inc., the Knox Foundation, the Community Foundation for the Central Savannah River Area, the Watson-Brown Foundation, Inc., the 1772 Foundation, Inc., the Lockwood Partners Foundation, Inc., the Creel-Harison Foundation, Inc. the Storey Foundation, Inc., and the National Trust for Historic Preservation. Each foundation was reviewed and discussed. Mrs. Schwerzler will research.

Mrs. McCorkle asked the Board to look at the Capital Preservation Pamphlet prepared by DBD Group. After reviewing, edits will be sent to DBD Group.

Mrs. Roohani reported that Landmark Preservation was at the Historic House. They finished the siding on the front of the First Period portion of the house. They are now replacing the siding on the canal side of the house and cutting the edge off of the roof. Mrs. McCorkle made a request to Greg Jacobs that all active projects be finished by the end of the year. Mr. Jacobs will provide proposals for new projects to begin in 2021. A Meadow Garden Board meeting will be called in January to discuss. Mrs. Roohani was excused from the meeting.

Mrs. Schwerzler gave an update on the approaching Christmas Candlelight Tour. Daughters, with the help of the C.A.R., will be decorating on December 5th and the following week. Decorations will include preserved magnolia and bay leaves, fresh apples, dried oranges, and fresh cuttings of greenery for garland. Mrs. Schwerzler will compile a Newsletter to share with chapter chairs and in the GSS Blog. She will also provide the photographer, Dwight Dover, with a list of requested items to photograph.

Mrs. Marsh is working on a different banner for the Meadow Garden website.

Ms. Hinton stated she has five docents, including herself, who will work the Christmas event. The narrative needs to be updated to make the tours move faster.

Mr. and Mrs. Hyer will meet with Mrs. Schwerzler and Mrs. Lawson to create video footage of the house while decorated.

Mrs. McCorkle adjourned the meeting at 11:40 am. Approved January 11, 2021.

#### January 11, 2021

The Meadow Garden Board met via Zoom, January 11, 2021. O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle, State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 1:30 p.m. Other voting members present were: Betty Brown Harrah, Ransom Bennett Schwerzler, Stephani McIntosh Roohani, Kay Griffin Ragan, Melodye G. Brown, F. Anne Hinton, Cathy Winslett Hyer, Amy Pittman Lawson, Amy Bolin Nation, Wadene Baird Welch, and Kathy Zeles Marsh. Also present was Ex-Officio member Helen Robertson Powell.

The State Regent welcomed everyone to the meeting. Mrs. Nation gave the opening prayer. Mrs. Harrah called the roll. Mrs. Harrah presented the minutes from the November 17, 2020 meeting. Mrs. Hyer moved to accept the minutes as corrected. Motion approved unanimously.

Mrs. Schwerzler reported that she sent final edits of the DBD Capital Preservation Case to Donor By Design. The 2020 Convention and Visitors Bureau Grant procedures were reviewed and completed. The 2021 grant application, released on December 18, is due on January 15. Because of limited funds due to COVID-19, the grant will be limited to only four co-op marketing partner awards. Mrs. Schwerzler is working with Historic Preservation Vice Chair Lucinda "Cindy" Foster Grace on the DAR Historic Preservation Contest applications, which is due February 15, 2021. While the contest requests completed projects, a case will be made for the porch restoration, reflecting a complete project of stewardship. Mrs. Schwerzler reported the Spring Ramble has been, once again, postponed by the Georgia Trust. The future date is to be determined.

Mrs. Roohani reported on the 1772 grant and stated that step one is to determine which project to propose for the letter of inquiry. She will consult with Fred Eckert and Greg Jacobs of Landmark Preservation, LLC for recommendations. Mrs. Roohani reported the demolition

of the Walton Rehabilitation Building, located in front of Meadow Garden at the corner of Independence Drive and 13<sup>th</sup> Street, was completed in December 2020. A parking lot has replaced the structure. The preparation for the Walton Rehabilitation Hospital extension continues to move forward into the existing Walton Rehabilitation parking lot along Independence Drive. The new laptop for Meadow Garden, which was approved last summer, has been purchased. Mrs. Roohani has a consultation with the Past Perfect Museum Software personnel to begin the transition of our current Past Perfect software to the Web Edition version. The yearly fee of \$596 will be billed following the consultation.

Mrs. Hyer reported that filming of tours and of the historic house began while it was decorated for Christmas. More filming will take place during the next week, highlighting tours with Meadow Garden Chair Schwerzler and interviews with Mr. Jacobs and Mr. Eckert. Mrs. McCorkle thanked Bruce and Cathy Hyer for sharing their expertise to document Meadow Garden through filming. She also thanked everyone who donates time and energy at the historic house during the Candlelight Christmas Tour and throughout the year.

State Regent McCorkle reviewed the Landmark Preservation project spreadsheet created and updated by Ms. Brown. Approximately \$15,000 of outstanding approved projects remain pending. All projects should be completed by January 31, 2021. The list includes repointing of the fireboxes, installing the chimney caps, moving the cellar doors, and removing the non-historic brick under the porch. To date, the total remaining in the Capital Improvements Fund and the State Regent's Project, solely for Meadow Garden, less the \$15,000, totals \$132,000.

Mrs. McCorkle requested a new prioritized list of projects from Mr. Jacobs, and they were presented to the Board for consideration.

The first project for consideration was **to produce permit-ready mechanical and electrical designs and specifications for the HVAC throughout Meadow Garden.** The board agreed that Landmark Preservation's recommendation of Constantine Engineering Associates, LLC was acceptable. Mrs. McCorkle clarified that the project is for the design work only and not construction or installation. She also stated that time is of the essence because once the design work is complete, the chimney caps will be replaced and solved the condensation problem that currently exists in the house.

Ms. Brown moved to approve the proposal from Landmark Preservation dated August 14, 2020, to engage and coordinate with Constantine Engineering Associates, LLC (Constantine), licensed mechanical and electrical engineers in Georgia, to produce permit-ready mechanical and electrical designs and specifications for Meadow Garden. The scope of the work to include the production of 1) mechanical system designs to include new cooling, heating, ventilating, and dehumidification systems (HVAC) throughout the house, with attention to system performance coupled with minimal space intrusion, using chimney flues as chase ways for air ducting, where possible; and 2) electrical system designs to include power and lighting. Calculations will determine if a larger electrical service to the house is required, and if so, coordination with a local utility company will occur. Two site visits by Landmark and Constantine are included as required during the design process. The proposed work to be completed for a firm-fixed fee of \$22,500.00 to be paid from the Capital Investment/Improvement Money Market account. Seconded by Stephani Roohani. Motion approved unanimously.

The following two projects addressed the southwest porch and southwest entrance to the historic house. Currently, the porch is not stable and creating additional moisture in the historic house.

Mrs. Schwerzler moved to approve the proposal of Landmark Preservation dated January 9, 2021, for the Southwest Porch Restoration to include installing temporary protection to protect surfaces adjacent to the work area from damage; install temporary shoring to support the roof system; remove existing columns and retain for re-use; remove non-historic balustrade, decking, skirt boards, etc.; repair existing framing to ensure structural integrity; furring will be installed if required to achieve positive slope away from the house; install copper wall flashing at the union of the

house and porch framing; install new tongue-and-groove decking and bull-nosed edge boards matching the decking recently installed on the front porches during a previous recent restoration campaign; only stainless-steel fasteners will be used; reinstall columns to include newly fabricated plinths and abacus if required; fabricate and install new balustrade to match those recently installed on the front porches during a previous restoration campaign; only stainless steel fasteners will be used; re-install ceiling planks removed during a previous investigation campaign; prime wood members where required using an alkyd primer; apply two coats of acrylic finish to wood elements, matching front porch finishes in color and sheen as accurately as possible. Landmark will complete the scope of work described above for a firm-fixed fee of \$12,675.00 to be paid from the Capital Investment/Improvement Money Market account. Seconded by Laura Reid. Motion approved unanimously.

Mrs. Harrah moved to approve the proposal of Landmark Preservation dated January 9, 2021, for the Southwest Entrance Restoration to include providing and installing temporary protection where required to protect surfaces adjacent to the work area from damage; remove existing non-historic door; carefully remove existing interior plaster and wainscoting to expose original framed opening; remove non-historic infill framing; fabricate and install new, historically appropriate exterior door; door will be fabricated using Sapele (or equivalent); door will be mounted using forged H & L hinges, matching others within the first period portion of the house as accurately as possible; install in-kind door casings (interior and exterior) matching existing historic millwork as accurately as possible; prime wood members where required using an alkyd primer; apply two coats of acrylic finish to wood elements, matching front porch finishes in color and sheen as accurately as possible. Landmark will complete the scope of work described above for a firm-fixed fee of \$8,517.50 to be paid from the Capital Investment/Improvement Checking account. Seconded by Laura Reid. Motion approved unanimously.

The last project for consideration was the Interior Doorway Restoration, Parlor to Dining Room, which is just inside the Southwest Porch Entrance. Mrs. Roohani stated there was an interior door there originally; therefore, Mr. Jacobs recommends the door be re-installed. Mrs. Roohani moved to approve the proposal of Landmark dated January 9, 2021, for the Interior Doorway Restoration, Parlor to Dining Room, to include providing and installing temporary protection where required to protect surfaces adjacent to the work area from damage; carefully removing existing interior plaster and wainscoting to expose original framed opening; fabricate and install new, historically appropriate interior door; door will be fabricated using Sapele (or equivalent); door will be mounted using forged H & L hinges, matching others within the first period portion of the house as accurately as possible. A historically appropriate rim lock will be installed, matching others within the first period portion of the house as accurately as possible; install in-kind door casings matching existing historic millwork as accurately as possible: prime wood members where required using an alkyd primer: apply two coats of acrylic finish to wood elements, matching front porch finishes in color and sheen as accurately possible. Landmark will complete the scope of work described above for a firm-fixed fee of \$8,077.50 to be paid from the Capital Investment/Improvement Checking account. Seconded by Cathy Hyer. Motion approved unanimously.

Mrs. McCorkle will contact Mr. Jacobs to schedule the engineering firm and begin the new projects once the pending ones are complete. She also announced that Mr. Jacobs will make a presentation at State Conference on the progress at Meadow Garden since 2018. His presentation will be held on Friday, March 19. The Meadow Garden Board meeting will be Thursday, March 18, following the Executive Board meeting.

Mrs. McCorkle explained that we are very limited on our space for State Conference because of social distancing. She also explained a virtual or hybrid conference is not only expensive, but also would sacrifice the quality of State Conference. Registration will be in weekly waves to ensure that all delegates and voting members present have a voice at

State Conference. She will be announcing in a future blog that State Conference attendance will not be required for the 2021 State Honor Roll. The hotel is requiring face coverings at all times, and the State Regent asked the Board lead by example.

Mrs. Ragan reported the following balances for the Capital Investment/Improvements Accounts: Checking \$19,355.64; Money Market United Community Bank \$49,752.99; Money Market Synovus Bank \$65,888.66.

Mrs. McCorkle adjourned the meeting at 3:00 pm. Approved March 18, 2021.

#### March 18, 2021

The Meadow Garden Board of the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, met on Thursday, March 18, 2021, in the Waterside Restaurant of the Evergreen Marriott Conference Center, Stone Mountain, Georgia. O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle, State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 1:08 p.m. Other voting members present were: Betty Brown Harrah, Ransom Bennett Schwerzler, Stephani McIntosh Roohani, Kay Griffin Ragan, Melodye G. Brown, Laura Marcella Reid, F. Anne Hinton, Cathy Winslett Hyer, Amy Pittman Lawson, Amy Bolin Nation, Wadene Baird Welch, and Kathy Zeles Marsh. Also present was Ex-Officio member Helen Robertson Powell.

The State Regent welcomed everyone to the meeting. Mrs. Nation gave the opening prayer. Mrs. Harrah called the roll and presented the minutes from the January 11, 2021 meeting. Ms. Brown moved to accept the minutes as corrected. Seconded by Cathy Hyer. Motion approved unanimously.

Mrs. Ragan gave the Treasurer's Report. The **Meadow Garden Account Summaries** covering July 1, 2020 through March 18, 2021 were: Certificates of Deposit \$308,119.72; Checking Account \$163,070.63; Petty Cash \$100.00; Money Market Account \$146,206.59; Total Fixed Assets \$344,496.09, and Total Liabilities and Equity \$961,993.03.

Mrs. McCorkle explained that all projects from the Brown Administration were complete, and three Landmark Preservation projects were approved at the January called meeting. She provided one additional project for approval. Mrs. Harrah moved to approve the proposal from Landmark Preservation dated January 3, 2021, to repair and repoint the masonry in the cellar with lime-based mortar to ensure structural integrity, and to reconstruct damaged wall section adjacent to the fireplace, alleviating the non-historic, failing "pass through" window. The proposed work to be completed for a firm-fixed fee of \$4,930.00 to be paid from the Capital Improvement/Investment Money Market Account. Seconded by Mrs. Schwerzler. Motion adopted unanimously.

Mrs. McCorkle shared the Restoration Plan Addendum dated April 2020, which includes all work completed 2018 through 2020. Any edits will be sent to Landmark Preservation, LLC for correction.

Mrs. McCorkle remarked that Mrs. Schwerzler will report Opening Night of State Conference to recognize 47 individuals who are either recurring donors or those who donated \$120 or more since the beginning of the administration. The Board decided that from this point forward, a person has to be a recurring donor to be recognized as a Charter Preservationist. No donation limits. Details will be worked out on how to recognize the Charter Preservationists. For Mrs. Schwerzler's report during the business session, she will summarize the work accomplished at Meadow Garden, describe how visitations are managed during the pandemic, and share other information regarding the current status at the house.

Mrs. Schwerzler, Meadow Garden Chair, reported that the Georgia State Society won first place in the NSDAR Southeastern Division Historic Preservation Project Contest, still awaiting judging at the National level. This award is for the completed porch restoration. She thanked the State Historic Preservation Chair Nahali "Holly" Croft and Vice Chair Lucinda "Cindy" Foster Grace for their assistance. By recommendation of Donor By Design Group, LLC, a letter of inquiry has been drafted and sent to the 1772 Foundation. The project submitted is the restoration of the canal-side viewing porch. Mrs. Schwerlzer

reported that because only a limited number of co-op grants were awarded by the Convention and Visitors Bureau, Meadow Garden did not receive one in the first round of awards. There is a second round that will be announced later this year. Mrs. Schwerzler reached out to Historic Augusta and other house museums to discuss options for donor recognition. Some suggestions included newsletter listings, website listings, and possibly framed recognitions in the Heritage Education Center. Mrs. Schwerlzer reported that Meadow Garden would be included in the Georgia Trust Spring Ramble, now rescheduled for April 22-24, 2022.

Mrs. Roohani, Director and Furnishings Chair, reported that Landmark Preservation completed the work in the cellar and under the front porch. They will return to Meadow Garden after the postponed Masters' Golf Tournament week to begin work on the next project. Tours are starting to pick up a little as the pandemic restrictions are eased. Meadow Garden received three original photographs of the house from the Augusta Genealogical Society. These are amazing additions to the collection of early Meadow Garden photographs and show clear details of the home in the late 1800s that were not clear in other photographs. Mrs. Roohani provided a list of current keys and shared the proposed changes to the "Key section" in the current Standing Rules to be voted on at the summer meeting. Mrs. Roohani suggested starting a "Thankful Thursday" section on the Meadow Garden social media sites to recognize a patron who donates and ask them to provide a quote explaining the reason the donor supports the historic house. As Furnishings Chair, Mrs. Roohani stated that she would be uploading the current Meadow Garden Furnishing records into the new edition of the Past Perfect Museum Software this summer.

Mrs. Hyer, Landscaping Chair, reported that Landmark Preservation was responsible for accidentally damaging the sprinkler system, and they paid for the repairs. Mrs. Hyer showed two short videos of Meadow Garden to highlight the progress on the documentary being created by Mr. and Mrs. Hyer. The videos may be shown during the Business Session on Saturday of State Conference.

Mrs. Lawson, Gift Shop Chair, thanked Mrs. Roohani for her hard work and dedication at the Meadow Garden Gift Shop. Further appreciation was extended to Mrs. Roohani for bringing the remaining traveling gift shop items to State Conference.

Ms. Hinton, Docents Chair, reported the docents' training is still on hiatus due to the pandemic. The house narrative was updated to include the latest information on the house and include suggestions from Donor by Design Group, LLC. Ms. Hinton will continue to work with Mrs. Roohani to cover her days off as necessary. In 2020, eleven docents and five C.A.R. members volunteered more than 400 hours, even with the temporary closure March 17 to August 11, 2020, no Independence Day event, and no regular school tours. The Meadow Garden Christmas Candlelight Tour, by appointment only, was fully booked and was a great success.

Mrs. Nation, Patrons Chair, shared the proposed updated "Patrons section" of the current Standing Rules to be voted on at the summer meeting. The Patron's names will be listed in the Proceedings. Listing them in the "Patron Book" will be discontinued.

Mrs. Marsh, Public Relations Chair, reviewed the posts on Facebook and Instagram and stated many posts are being shared. Press releases were submitted for the Christmas Candlelight Tour. Mrs. Marsh is currently designing the Patron Newsletter. She requested information from the Georgia Gives Website, which manages 501c3 donations. Meadow Garden is currently not on their list. It was determined that the entity would actually be listed as Georgia State Society, not Meadow Garden, because both entities share the same EIN. Mrs. McCorkle will investigate the possibility of Meadow Garden becoming its own entity with its own EIN.

Ms. Brown and Ms. Reid commented on how well the board is working together and that Meadow Garden is coming to life.

Mrs. McCorkle adjourned the meeting at 3:00 pm. Approved May 10, 2021.

#### May 10, 2021

The Meadow Garden Board met via Zoom Monday, May 10, 2021. O.B. Brown, Laura Marcella Reid, F. Anne Hinton, Cathy Winslett Hyer, Amy Pittman Lawson, Amy Bolin Nation, Wadene Baird Welch, and Kathy Zeles Marsh. Also present was Ex-Officio member Helen Robertson Powell.

The State Regent welcomed everyone to the meeting. Mrs. Nation gave the opening prayer. Mrs. Harrah called the roll and presented the minutes from the March 18, 2021 meeting. Ms. Brown moved to accept the minutes as corrected. Seconded by Ms Hinton. Motion approved unanimously.

Mrs. Ragan gave the Treasurer's Report. The **Meadow Garden Account Summaries** covering July 1, 2020 through May 7, 2021 were: Certificates of Deposit \$308,119.72; Checking Account \$150,668.95; Petty Cash \$100.00; Money Market Account \$133,883.29; Total Fixed Assets \$344,496.09, and Total Liabilities and Equity \$937,268.05.

Mrs. Roohani, Director, reported that Mr. Jacobs and Mr. Eckert, of Landmark Preservation, LLC, were at the house after State Conference to determine their future project proposals. Mrs. Schwerlzer reported she was reviewing all the information on the foundations that Donor By Design, LLC recommended.

Mrs. McCorkle introduced Mr. Bruce Hyer of Bhyer.com, a premier marketing agency, to present a proposed Marketing Plan for Meadow Garden. Mr. & Mrs. Hyer were excused from the meeting for initial discussions by the Board. The proposed plan will be discussed further at the next called meeting.

Mrs. Hyer rejoined the meeting.

The State Regent noted that the "Dining Room" will henceforth be referred to as the "Bedchamber" to begin interpreting the use of this room in the house in a historically accurate manner. The room will be interpreted as the Bedchamber with furnishings and docent script adjustments at a later dated when deemed appropriate.

Mrs. McCorkle presented several proposals from Landmark Preservation. Ms. Brown moved that we approve Landmark Preservation's proposal dated May 3, 2021, for the First Period Staircase and Plank Wall Reconstruction, which includes reconstructing the missing plank wall separating the Best Room and the Bedchamber on the north side of the chimney and reconstructing the wooden staircase based on existing physical evidence and constructing plank doors to conceal a portion of the doors and install discreet lighting to appropriately display the staircase for interpretation. Landmark Preservation will complete the scope of work described for a firm-fixed fee of \$22,799.00 to be taken from the Capital Improvement/Investment Money Market Account, inclusive of all required materials, labor, and equipment, except as otherwise noted. Ms. Reid seconded. Motion approved unanimously.

Ms. Brown moved that we approve Landmark Preservation's proposal dated May 3, 2021, for Investigative and Interpretive Removals consisting of removing selective finishes from the First Period portion of Meadow Garden, specifically in the Best Room and the Bedchamber, to permit a more thorough assessment of the historic and chronological attributes of the building. Landmark will complete the scope of work for a firm-fixed fee of \$6,021.50 to be taken from Capital Improvement and Investment Money Market account. Mrs. Roohani seconded. Motion approved unanimously.

State Regent McCorkle will notify Greg Jacobs of Landmark Preservation, LLC of the approved projects and discuss the construction timetable to determine if the Independence Day Open House will be celebrated.

Mrs. Roohani requested the hours of operation for the house, be changed from Tuesday to Saturday to Monday through Friday and appointments only on Saturday. Events to be excluded. She explained that Saturdays have the lowest numbers of tours and Monday tours would likely be more poplar. Mrs. Roohani would be the default docent for Saturdays,

but other docents could volunteer to take the Saturday tours. The State Regent will propose an amended Employment Agreement for approval at the next meeting.

Mrs. Schwerzler moved to join the Metro Augusta Chamber of Commerce at \$155.00 for the first year, then \$130.00 for each year after. Seconded by Ms. Hinton. Motion approved unanimously.

The Christmas Candlelight Open House was discussed, and the board agreed to hold the 2021 tours from 4:00p.m.- 8:00p.m. on Friday and Saturday, December 3 and 4.

The next meeting of the Meadow Garden Board will be held via Zoom, Monday, May 17, 1:00 pm to decide on the following items: the Meadow Garden Marketing Plan, including the new logo and timeline; the Independence Day Open House, and the amendments to the Employment Agreement of the Meadow Garden Director.

Mrs. McCorkle adjourned the meeting at 3:26 pm. Approved May 24, 2021.

### May 24, 2021

The Meadow Garden Board met via Zoom Monday, May 24, 2021. O.B. Wilhoit McCorkle, State Regent and Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 10:40 a.m. Other voting members present were: Betty Brown Harrah, Ransom Bennett Schwerzler, Stephani McIntosh Roohani, Kay Griffin Ragan, Melodye G. Brown, F. Anne Hinton, Cathy Winslett Hyer, Amy Pittman Lawson, Amy Bolin Nation, and Kathy Zeles Marsh. Also present was Ex-Officio member Helen Robertson Powell.

The State Regent welcomed everyone to the meeting. Mrs. Nation gave the opening prayer. Mrs. Harrah called the roll and presented the minutes from the May 10, 2021 meeting. Ms. Ragan moved to accept the minutes as corrected. Seconded by Mrs. Hyer. Motion approved unanimously.

There was discussion on Patrons, the process to become a Patron, and printed certificates. Certificates for donations made in 2020 will be printed and distributed at Fall Forum. Mrs. McCorkle, Mrs. Nation, Mrs. Ragan, and Mrs. Harrah will meet to discuss further the process to become a Patron and alternatives to printed certificates for 2021, before the next Meadow Garden meeting in July.

Mrs. McCorkle confirmed the July 29-30 dates for the Meadow Garden and Finance Committee meetings.

Mrs. McCorkle gave an update on the Landmark Preservation proposals. Mr. Jacobs will start the latest approved projects, the remaining removals and the staircase, after the Independence Day event at Meadow Garden. He assured the State Regent that approved projects will be completed prior to our Fall Forum in October. Regarding the future of the restroom located in the historic house, Mrs. McCorkle suggested adding restrooms to the Heritage Education Building accessible from the outside. Mr. Jacobs will be at our meeting in July to discuss this suggestion further.

Mrs. Hyer was excused from the meeting so the group could discuss the three proposed marketing plans. The three plan proposals from Kruhu, M3, and bhyer.com were distributed by email to the Board members in the week prior to this meeting. The Kruhu Marketing Plan was presented first at over \$100,000. The M3 proposal for Plan A was \$24,145 and for Plan B was \$19,690; however, video production and media spend (approximately \$15,000) is not included. Mr. Bruce Hyer's proposal for Plan A was \$28,238 including the media spend, video production, and Meadow Garden would own the brand. Mrs. McCorkle remarked that all plans cover a six month period, beginning in June 2021. Ms. Brown moved adoption of the bhyer.com Marketing Plan A for Meadow Garden at a cost of \$28,238; to be funded by \$16,238 to be taken from the Meadow Garden State Regent's Project checking fund and \$12,000 transferred from GSSDAR State Regent's Project checking fund into Meadow Garden State Regent's Project checking fund. Motion seconded by Ms. Hinton. Motion approved unanimously.

Mrs. McCorkle brought forward for discussion the branding images sent by Mr. Hyer for the Meadow Garden logo. **Ms. Brown moved that Option 1 of the second set of logo** 

designs from bhyer.com be accepted, with modifications, as the Meadow Garden logo. Motion seconded by Mrs. Nation. Motion approved unanimously.

Mrs. Hyer rejoined the meeting.

Mrs. Roohani reported the Signers Monument Event will be held at 1:00 p.m. on July 4. She suggested that Meadow Garden have its event from noon to 4:00. Bill Colbert will set up his SAR trunk show at noon. Pat Colbert will contact the Garden City dulcimers and strummers. The Declaration may be read by several people. Mrs. Roohani also suggested an ice cream truck or snow cone machine. The Board agreed that tours by appointment would be eliminated, and masks no longer required. Mrs. Hyer will strive to have the video of the house ready for the event.

It was decided that the Christmas Candlelight Open House will be a two-day event the first weekend in December.

Mrs. Roohani was excused from the meeting, so the group could discuss the Director's Contract.

Mrs. McCorkle presented the proposed revised Director's Contract. There was discussion. Mrs. Schwerzler moved that the Meadow Garden hours be changed to Monday through Friday, with Saturday tours by appointment. Motion seconded by Ms. Hinton. Motion approved unanimously.

Mrs. Roohani rejoined the meeting.

Mrs. Roohani reported that a scout from Georgia Films came to Meadow Garden to discuss the possibility of using Meadow Garden as an Apple TV series film location in 2023 about the assassination of Abraham Lincoln. There was discussion regarding the necessity of contracts, scripts, and guidelines.

Mrs. McCorkle adjourned the meeting at 12:25 pm. Approved July 20, 2021

# **Standing Rules for Meadow Garden**

#### I MEADOW GARDEN BOARD

- The governing body of a Historic Site, in this instance the Meadow Garden Board, serves the public interest as it relates to Meadow Garden, and must consider itself accountable to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, as well as to Meadow Garden; members should not attempt to act in their individual capacities, but all actions should be taken as a Board, Committee, or otherwise in conformance with the Standing Rules, the Act of Incorporation, or applicable Resolutions.
- 2 The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the three (3) Trustees as named in the Deed from the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, conveying Meadow Garden to the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution; namely, the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the State Chair of Meadow Garden who is appointed by the State Regent; the Chapter Regents of the Augusta Chapter and the College Hill Chapter, both chapters being located in Augusta, who shall serve as Vice Chair to the State Chair of Meadow Garden; the State Treasurer; two Honorary State Regents; and six of the chairmen of Meadow Garden Committees, as appointed by the State Regent.
- No Georgia Daughter shall serve in the same Meadow Garden Chairmanship more than three (3) consecutive terms.
- 4. In addition to the six appointments to the Board which are made by the State Regent, she shall appoint two (2) Honorary State Regents.
- 5. The State Second Vice Regent shall serve as *ex-officio* member of the Meadow Garden Board, being given the privilege of the floor without a vote.
- 6. The State Regent shall serve as Chair of the Meadow Garden Board, and the State First Vice Regent shall serve as Secretary of the Meadow Garden Board.
- 7. The Meadow Garden Board shall meet a minimum of three (3) times each year; namely, preceding State Board of Management meeting, preceding annual State Conference and following Continental Congress, and at such other times as deemed necessary by the Chair of the Meadow Garden Board. At least one (1) meeting of the Board shall be held at Meadow Garden each year. The Board may vote by teleconference, fax or email, if necessary.
- 8. The Meadow Garden Board shall have jurisdiction over the operation, maintenance and work of Meadow Garden and shall be the authority for Meadow Garden as long as such authority is not in conflict with the Bylaws of the Georgia State Society, the Act of Incorporation for the Georgia State Society, Resolutions adopted by the Georgia State Society and/or directions which from time to time may be approved by action of the Georgia State Society assembled at its annual State Conference.
- 9. The Meadow Garden Board shall supervise the placing of all insurance to cover the grounds and the Historic House and its contents, including the fine arts, with accredited companies coverage to include fire, theft and liability.
- 10. Five (5) voting members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.
- Minutes shall be kept of each meeting and a copy shall be sent to each member and printed verbatim in the State Proceedings.
- 12. All expenses for maintenance, operation and purchases of furnishings and plantings shall be authorized by the State Regent, as Chair of the Board, and paid by the State Treasurer. Expenditures exceeding \$1,000.00 must have the majority approval of the Board.
- 13. These rules will be binding on the actions of the Board in their operation of Meadow Garden. They may be changed by the following procedure: Members of the Board must have written notification of proposed changes one month prior to the next meeting of the Board; a two-thirds vote of the Board and approval of the State Conference are necessary to effect a change.

14. The State Regent shall appoint a Meadow Garden Advisory Board, which would act in an advisory capacity only and be composed of no more than fifteen (15) members representing various areas of expertise.

#### **II OPERATIONS**

- Everyone entering Meadow Garden will be requested to sign the Register, including date, time of arrival and time of departure.
- 2. No more than fifteen (15) people with each Docent are to be on tour in the house at a given time. Excess of this number may wait in the reception room or in the garden. The House Manager has the authority to enforce the Meadow Garden rules at all times.
- 3. There will be no smoking on Meadow Garden property.
- 4. No refreshments are to be served in or taken into the Historic House by visitors, including chapters or the public. Should a group, such as a visiting chapter, desire refreshments, the garden is available for use if litter is properly disposed of by the serving group.
- 5. Tour visitors will be asked to pay a fee as set by the Board.
- 6. In August 2006 Dixie Lock and Safe, Inc., installed new locks and keys were made which cannot be duplicated. The State Regent, State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Manager by the direction of one of the two above, are authorized to have new keys made for Meadow Garden.

There shall be two (2) complete sets of keys to Meadow Garden, which are eight (8) keys per set. There shall be four (4) sets of keys comprised of three (3) keys per set, which are the back-door key to the historic house, the key to the George Walton Heritage Education Center, and the gate key. There shall be one (1) set of keys for "house" use, which are three (3) keys, one for the kitchen, one for the exterior bath at the historic house, and one for the interior door between the dining room and the old gift shop area. These three (3) "house" keys shall be kept in the old gift shop area for accessibility to all for use on a daily basis. There shall be one (1) gate key assigned to the landscape service company.

Keys are lettered per door of entry: Key # A is to the deadbolt of the three (3) doors of the George Walton Heritage Education Center; Key # B is to the deadbolt lock on the back door of the historic house; Key # C is to the gate; Key # D is to the Stribling Room in the George Walton Heritage Education Center; Key # E is to the kitchen; Key # F is to the deadbolt for the exterior bath at the historic house; Key # G is to the interior door between the dining room and the old gift shop; Key # H is to the office upstairs in the historic house.

Keys are numbered and assigned according to the appointed position on the Meadow Garden Board or as designated. Keys are distributed to the assigned person when they sign a "Meadow Garden Key Distribution Form." When this assigned person leaves her current position, she returns the keys and signs the same form she had signed when she accepted the keys. Keys go with the appointed position not the person.

<u>Distribution of the keys</u>: Key # 1 to State Regent Chair of Meadow Garden Board (complete set of 8 keys); Key # 2 to Meadow Garden Manager (complete set of 8 keys); Key # 3 to Chair of Meadow Garden (keys A, B, C); Key # 4 to Docents Chair (keys A, B, C); Key # 5 to Landscaping Chair (keys A, B, C); Key # 6 for General Docent use (keys A, B, C) – to be checked "out" and "in" when used; Key # 7 are "house" keys (keys E, F, G); Key # 8 to landscape service (key C). Key #9 to Furnishings Chair (Keys A, B, C, D).

#### **III VOLUNTEERS AND DOCENTS**

- 1. Docents shall be those well screened and trained volunteers who will serve under the direct supervision of a Meadow Garden Chair and/or the House Manager.
- Duties of docents shall include acting as guides, hostesses, working in gift shop, working in yard, cleaning in house, public relations. No volunteer work at or for Meadow

Garden shall be done except under the direct guidance of the Meadow Garden Board and the chair of the specific committee for that particular function.

3. Cleaning or yard work volunteers shall be under the direction of the House Manager.

#### IV FURNISHINGS

- 1. Items bought or accepted for the older section of Meadow Garden must pre-date 1821.
- 2. (a) the front room on the main floor, known as the Augusta Room, will be designed as an interpretive center, highlighting people, events, and memorabilia related to George Walton and to the history of Meadow Garden; (b) the back room on the main floor, formerly known as the Board Room, will be used as a gift shop; (c) the front room on the upper floor of the newer section will be furnished as a bedroom/study of theperiod pre-dating 1850 or be used to display historically significant items relating to Meadow Garden, Augusta and Georgia; (d) the back room on the upper floor of the newer section will be used as an office for the Meadow Garden manager and for storage and supplies for the gift shop.
- 3. Reproductions may be used only when the physical condition of the antiques is jeopardized by exposure in areas where large numbers of visitors have easy access; or when environmental conditions including excessive light, dust, humidity or airborne impurities pose a threat to the preservation of originals.
- 4. Effective March 12, 1983 all items donated to Meadow Garden shall be accepted with the written condition that they become the property of Meadow Garden and may be used, replaced or sold at the discretion of the Meadow Garden Board only.
- 5. All items that postdate 1821, with the exception of those in the six (6) rooms of the newer section and those described in Number 3 of this section, shall be replaced as soon as possible with similar items pre-dating 1821.
- Once an item is placed, it shall not be moved from one location to another without permission of the Meadow Garden Chair of Furnishings who shall report such changes to the Meadow Garden Board in a timely manner.
- 7. Any item donated or purchased must have written documentation of appraisal.
- 8. No items and/or furnishings shall be accepted "on loan."
- 9. A file will be kept of all assets with information as to price paid or market value, date of acquisition, donor or where bought, documentation and appraisal and a description of article. One file will be kept in the reception room accessible to the Docents; a duplicate file will be in the possession of the Chairman of the Board. The Meadow Garden Furnishings Chair shall maintain and keep current the "Past and Perfect" Program on all items and furnishings.
- 10. All items purchased or donated will be added to the Fine Arts insurance policy. Said policy will be reviewed and updated a minimum of once a year. Major additions to furnishings will be added immediately.
- 11. Future plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the Historic House.

#### V LANDSCAPING

- 1. The landscape plan adopted by the Board shall be adhered to with no deviation unless recommended by an authority on landscape design and care.
- Donations of shrubbery, plants or trees shall be accepted only when item is part of the master plan.
- 3. Work on the grounds will be under the sole direction of the Meadow Garden Board and the Landscaping Chair. Supervision of actual work will be provided by the Meadow Garden Chair or the Landscaping Chair of Meadow Garden.

#### VI GIFT SHOP

The Chair of the committee will be responsible for all purchases, subject to the approval
of the Board or the State Regent. The Vice Chair shall assist the Gift Shop Chair with
sales at state functions.

- Gift Shop operations will be self-supporting. In the event funds are needed for purchases, they may be advanced from available Meadow Garden funds and must be considered a loan and shall be repaid without interest within one (1) year from date of borrowing.
- 3. Profit from the Gift Shop shall be accounted for within the State Treasurer's books, with a percentage being transferred at the discretion of the Board at the end of the fiscal year and placed in the Maintenance Account. The audit of the Gift Shop operation shall be included in the annual audit of the Georgia State Society.

#### **VII PATRONS**

- 1. Donors to the following categories are eligible to be recognized:

  - D. Landscape

- 2. Giving categories and levels for annual contributions:
  - \$10 Friends
  - \$25 Supporters
  - \$35 Signers
  - \$50 Patrons
  - \$103\* The 1900 Society (\*giving level for 2003, giving would increase by \$1 each year)
  - \$250 Sons and Daughters of Liberty
  - \$500 Octavia's Legacy
  - \$1,000 George Walton Society
  - \$5,000 Meadow Garden Preservation Society

This information will be publicized in the Meadow Garden brochure and other appropriate places as determined by the Board.

- 3. Chapter gifts, above the State Honor Roll requirements, automatically qualify the chapter to be recognized at an appropriate giving level determined by the categories listed in #2.
- 4. The State Treasurer will report these gifts to the Patrons Chair.
- The Patrons Chair will issue certificates to the qualifying individuals and chapters or groups.
- A permanent book will be kept on public display at Meadow Garden to record the names of those who give at the Patrons level or above.
- 7. The Patrons Chair will enter the names of donors in the appropriate book a minimum of once a year.
- 8. The Meadow Garden Patrons book shall be divided into four parts: (1) Individuals who give a minimum of fifty dollars in one payment, and chapters, organizations, businesses or groups that give a minimum of one hundred dollars in one payment; (2) In-Kind Patrons approved by the Meadow Garden Board in recognition of outstanding and/or unusual gifts of time, talents or expertise toward the betterment of Meadow Garden; (3) Honoraria, which shall list individuals or groups honored by a Patron gift as designated in #1, such listing to show the name of honoree (Patron) and the donor; (4) Memorials of at least fifty dollars which shall list the name of the individual memorialized and the name of the donor.

#### **VIII PLAQUES AND MARKERS**

 Plaques/Markers may be placed at Meadow Garden only at the discretion of the Board, and request meets the following criteria: Substantial service and/or contributions that secured the property and the heritage for the GSDAR. Individuals so recognized shall

- have been deceased for at least 5 years; Plaque/Marker will be paid for by person(s) requesting such recognition.
- Such plaques will be permanently displayed at Meadow Garden and a record of the honoree's service and/or contribution will be recorded and placed in the Meadow Garden file, with Board approval.
- 3. Plaques shall not be attached to walls, doors or furnishings of the Historic House. Additional markers shall not be permanently placed on the grounds.

### **Bylaws**

# GEORGIA STATE SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

March 2021 Amendments indicated by underlining

### Article I NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Georgia State Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, <u>hereinafter referred to as GSSNSDAR</u>.

## Article II OBJECTS

The objects of this Society shall be to promote the objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, hereinafter referred to as the National Society.

- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the <u>revolution</u> and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics and of the records of the individual services of revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.
- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.
- (3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

## Article III MEMBERS

**Section 1.** Membership. The membership of the state society shall consist of the chapters in good standing of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution in the state of Georgia.

**Section 2.** New Chapters. The corresponding secretary or other state officer shall enroll a chapter newly confirmed by the National Society as a member of the Georgia State Society upon receipt of the following information from the chapter: name of the chapter; the date of its organization: the names of its officers and of its members.

## Article IV

- **Section 1.** Officers. The <u>elected</u> officers of the Georgia State Society shall be a <u>regent</u>, first vice regent, second vice regent, chaplain, recording secretary, corresponding secretary, organizing secretary, treasurer, registrar, historian, librarian, and curator.
- **Section 2.** (a) To be eligible for state office, a member shall hold and have held membership in a chapter or chapters within the Georgia State Society for at least 5 years prior to her election and have served a full term as chapter officer or state chair.
- (b) No member shall be eligible to the same state office for two (2) successive terms. A member having served more than one half of a term in a state office shall be deemed to have served a full term.
- (c) No two state officers shall be members of the same chapter with the possible exception of the State Regent and the State Corresponding Secretary.
- (d) To be eligible for the office of State Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State First Vice Regent or as State Second Vice Regent or served in each of these

two offices of the Georgia Society.

- (e) To be eligible for the office of State First Vice Regent or for the office of State Second Vice Regent, a member shall have served a full term either as State Recording Secretary or as State Treasurer of the Georgia State Society and shall have served a full term as a Chapter Regent of a chapter in the Georgia State Society.
- **Section 3.** In recognition of valuable service to the Georgia State Society, a State Regent, at the expiration of her term of office, may be elected Honorary State Regent for life by a majority vote of the State Conference.

## Article V NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

- **Section 1.** (a) A candidate for state office shall request the endorsement of her chapter, taken by a vote at a regular meeting of the chapter held between September and December preceding the State Conference at which state elections are held. The endorsement, signed by the Chapter Recording Secretary, shall include the office the candidate seeks and shall be received by the State Regent with the candidate's statement of intent to be a candidate prior to any announcement or campaigning by the candidate and/or her supporters. The candidate to be endorsed shall be a member of the chapter which endorses her for at least one year.
- (b) A candidate for State Regent who wishes to present a slate of officers shall send to the State Regent in one packet the chapter endorsements and the statements of intent for each of her selected candidates. If received by the State Regent no later than December 1, these candidates shall be listed as a slate in the State Regent's Call to State Conference.
- (c) Candidates wishing to run independently of a slate, whose chapter endorsements and statements of intent are received by the State Regent no later than December 1 shall be listed as independent candidates in the State Regent's Call to State Conference.
- (d) A candidate whose chapter endorsement and statement of intent have been properly received by the State Regent may choose to announce her candidacy separate from the State Regent's Call to State Conference. Such a chapter endorsement and statement of intent shall be received by the State Regent at least thirty (30) days prior to the opening of the State Conference at which the election is to take place.
- (e) A candidate who does not meet the requirements of these Bylaws shall be declared disqualified and ineligible for consideration for state office.
- (f) A chapter shall endorse no more than one chapter member for state office per election with the possible exception of candidates for State Regent and for State Corresponding Secretary.
- (g) In the event of the death, incapacitation or withdrawal of a candidate prior to the election, a replacement shall be made with notification in writing to the State Regent and accompanied by the chapter endorsement and statement of intent as directed by these Bylaws.
- **Section 2.** Nominations of candidates for all state offices shall be made at a designated meeting of the State Conference.
- **Section 3.** The officers of the Georgia State Society shall be elected biennially at the State Conference. A majority vote shall elect. If there is only one candidate for an office, election shall be by voice vote. For any contested positions, the vote shall be by ballot. Independent candidates shall be listed on the ballot in a separate column from those candidates presented as a slate.
- **Section 4.** The officers of the Georgia State Society shall hold office for two (2) years or until their successors are elected. <u>The term of office shall begin no earlier than</u> at the close of the Continental Congress at which the <u>regent and vice regent</u> are confirmed.
- **Section 5.** (a) If the office of state regent becomes vacant, the state vice regent shall become state regent automatically provided she has been confirmed as state vice regent. State Second Vice Regent shall become State First Vice Regent subject to confirmation by the National Board of Management or by the Continental Congress. Vacancies in other state offices shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee. Action of the Executive

Committee shall be ratified at the next State Board of Management meeting or State Conference, whichever shall come first.

(b) Any state officer who is absent from the state for a continuous period of six (6) months or longer shall automatically relinquish her position as a state officer.

**Section 6.** Upon the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent, a certified statement of their election, signed by the presiding officer and the State Recording Secretary shall be sent immediately to the Organizing Secretary General.

**Section 7**. (a) A candidate for the office of Vice President General shall be endorsed by a majority of the members of the State Conference present and voting by ballot.

- (b) The Continental Congress for this election shall be designated in the motion for endorsement and the endorsement shall not be made more than eighteen (18) months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated.
- (c) The endorsement shall be certified by the candidate and by the State Recording Secretary and sent with the candidate's name and address to the Recording Secretary General to be received by the first day of the month preceding the designated Continental Congress.

### Article VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

**Section 1.** The officers of the Georgia State Society shall perform the duties prescribed in this article, and parliamentary authority adopted by the Society, and such others as the State Board of Management and the National Society may require.

Section 2. The State Regent shall:

- (a) be the chief executive officer and the official spokesman for the State Society;
- (b) have general supervision of the affairs of the State Society;
- (c) preside at all meetings of the State Conference, State Board of Management and the Executive Committee:
- (d) appoint a State Chair for the work of each of the authorized National Committees, and such other committees as may be necessary to carry on the work of the State Society;
  - (e) be ex-officio a member of all committees;
- (f) appoint a Parliamentarian who shall act as advisor in matters pertaining to parliamentary procedure and who shall, at the request of the State Regent, attend any meeting;
- (g) sign all contracts and agreements made in the name of the Georgia State Society with the recorded approval of the Executive Committee and the State Board of Management or the State Conference as directed by these Bylaws;
- (h) be bonded and have the authority to draw upon funds of the State Society with the approval of the Finance Committee;
- (i) recommend to the Finance Committee a Certified Public Accountant who shall be approved by the Finance Committee.

Section 3. The State First Vice Regent shall:

- (a) perform the duties of the office of State Regent in the absence or inability of the State Regent;
  - (b) fill a vacancy in the office of State Regent;
  - (c) Perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;
- (d) serve on those committees as designated by these Bylaws and as directed by the State Regent;
  - (e) Prepare the courtesy resolutions for business meetings of the Georgia State Society.

**Section 4.** The State Second Vice Regent shall:

- (a) perform the duties of the office of State First Vice Regent in the absence or inability of the State First Vice Regent;
  - (b) fill a vacancy in the office of State First Vice Regent;
  - (c) perform such duties as may be requested by the State Regent;
  - (d) serve on committees as directed by the State Regent.

**Section 5.** The State Chaplain shall:

- (a) open all meetings of the State Conference and the State Board of Management with scripture reading and prayer;
- (b) preside at the Memorial Service during State Conference and conduct such other religious services as may be required;
  - (c) be custodian of state properties pertaining to the duties of this office;
  - (d) be responsible for IN MEMORIAM pages in the Proceedings.

### **Section 6**. The State Recording Secretary shall:

- (a) record the proceedings of the meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee:
- (b) compile and have printed the book of Proceedings of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and the Proceedings Committee;
- (c) submit to the appropriate National officers, the endorsement for Vice President General and the election of the State Regent and State First Vice Regent by the first day of the month preceding the month of Continental Congress of the year in which said balloting was held.

### **Section 7**. The State Corresponding Secretary shall:

- (a) At the direction of the State Regent, conduct email, postal correspondence and produce publications on behalf of the Georgia State Society;
- (b) With guidance of the State Regent and State Conference Chair, prepare the State Conference Program and arrange for printing. Present the Program at the State Conference:
- (c) Prepare the State Directory and maintain updates for inclusion in the Georgia State Society website;
- (d) Have for sale at all state meetings certificates of appreciation and certificates of award.

### **Section 8**. The State Organizing Secretary shall:

- (a) assist the State Regent in the preliminary work of organizing new chapters;
- (b) assist chapters in conjunction with appropriate state officers and chairmen in revitalization.

### Section 9. The State Treasurer shall:

- (a) be bonded:
- (b) be the custodian of the funds of the State Society, placing them in institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance. Place Certificates of Deposit after receiving written approval on rate and term from the State Regent and State Chairman of the Finance Committee;
- (c) receive the state dues and delegate fees from the chapters and receive all sums contributed by the chapters and others for state and national projects, disbursing monthly to the Treasurer General all funds designated for special projects. Receive State Conference registration fees and events funds from the State Conference and Events Treasurer. Disburse other funds only when authorized by the State Regent in writing;
- (d) upon receipt of verified expenses paid by the State Regent for travel and hotel, reimburse the State Regent for these expenses up to the amount approved in the budget for the State Regent's expenses;
- (e) keep an account of all sums received or disbursed by using accounting software and keep receipt/copies for all transactions;
- (f) prepare a report for the State Board of Management and for the State Conference ten (10) days in advance of each meeting for distribution at the meetings;
- (g) be a member of the Finance Committee, the Meadow Garden Board, and ex-officio member of the Credentials Committee;
- (h) prepare reports for the Proceedings Book, Executive Board Meetings, Meadow Garden Board Meetings, and, as needed to State Officers, State Chairmen, and Clubs;
- (i) monitor chapter filings with the Internal Revenue Service due the 15th day of the fifth month after the close of the chapters fiscal year.
- (j) prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year, said audit by a Certified Public Accountant, shall be performed and

delivered within forty-five (45) days of receipt of books;

- (k) arrange preparation of both federal and state tax returns by a Certified Public Accountant; filings are due the 15th day of the fifth month after the close of the fiscal year;
  - (I) provide copies of audit and tax returns to the Treasurer General;
  - (m) keep State Treasurer Instructions and Chapter Treasurers instructions current;
- (n) retain or destroy records according to their schedule provided by the Treasurer General.

### **Section 10.** The State Registrar shall:

- (a) when requested, assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution prove eligibility and shall give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars;
- (b) report on membership changes, by application, transfers, reinstatements and resignations at State Conference;
- (c) communicate with Chapter Registrars changes in procedures from the National Society;
- (d) review e-membership chapter reports and identify problems within chapters and offer assistance:
- (e) in conjunction with the Membership Committee, communicate with Chapter Registrars concerning the Prospective Member Database (PMD).

### Section 11. The State Historian shall:

- (a) be in charge, within the state, of historical research and historical projects of the National Society under the direction of the Historian General as well as those authorized by the Georgia State Society;
- (b) keep a record of the marking of historical spots and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves within the state:
  - (c) prepare reports as requested by the Reporter General;
- (d) promote the study of American history, state and county history and historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the founding of our state and counties:
  - (e) Facilitates the NSDAR Outstanding Teacher of American History contest.

### Section 12. The State Librarian shall:

- (a) serve as liaison between the Librarian General and the Georgia Chapters and disseminate general information on the NSDAR Library;
- (b) cooperate with the director of the Georgia Department of Archives and History, making the needs of the Archives known to the chapters:
- (c) collect such books as may be of historical and genealogical value to the Daughters of the American Revolution, placing them wherever accepted in such libraries and Archives as may be chosen by the State Board of Management;
- (d) solicit, with the approval of the Executive Committee, contributions from the chapters for purchase of such books as requested by the office of the Librarian General, and/or the various libraries in Georgia which the State Society approves;
- (e) receive gifts of books and other printed material from the chapters to be donated to the approved libraries and Archives:
- (f) maintain a constant supply of bookplates to the NSDAR Library, the Georgia Department of Archives and History and for purchase by the chapters.
- **Section 13.** The State Curator shall: be custodian of the State portable properties and shall have them properly stored and made ready for use at state meetings.
- **Section 14.** All officers will keep a Procedure Book of Instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new officers to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

### Article VII STATE CONFERENCE

### Section 1. State Conference:

a) The annual meeting of the Georgia State Society shall be known as the State Conference. It shall be for the purpose of:

- (1) receiving reports of officers, committees and Chapter Regents;
- (2) electing officers biennially;
- (3) promoting programs in furtherance of the objects of the Society;
- (4) any other business that may arise:
  - i. annual budget shall be adopted,
  - ii.all projects of the State Society requiring funding shall be voted upon at State Conference or ratified by members at State Conference if previously voted upon by the State Board of Management,
  - iii. no project extending beyond the term of the presiding officer may be accepted at any meeting other than by vote at State Conference.
- (b) The State Conference shall be held between February 1 and April 10 but shall not convene during Holy Week.
  - (c) The State Regent shall fix the time and place of meetings;
- (d) The State Regent shall send notice of the time and place of meeting and credentials form to the chapters not less than sixty (60) days before the time of the State Conference.

**Section 2.** Voting Members. The voting members for state meetings shall be:

- a) the elected state officers as provided in these bylaws;
- b) the national officers and honorary national officers whose membership is within the state;
- c) the chapter regent or in her absence the first vice regent or her alternate;
- d) the elected delegates or alternates of each chapter of the state entitled to representation at the Continental Congress or special meeting of the National Society:
- e) the Honorary State Regents of the State Society, and past national officers whose membership is within the state and whose service as a national officer was as a member of the Georgia Society.
- **Section 3**. Only a chapter member in good standing whose credentials have been completed in accordance with the instructions of the State Regent and the State Credentials Chair for the State Conference and in accordance with the Standing Rules of the National Society shall be eligible to represent her chapter at state and national meetings.
- **Section 4.** A member shall have belonged to a chapter not less than one year before she is eligible to serve as a delegate or alternate from the chapter, except in the case of the Regent or Vice Regent of a chapter <u>organized and confirmed no later than January 5</u>.
- **Section 5.** A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at an annual State Conference, shall be limited to vote only in one of the offices held by said member.
- **Section 6.** Each member of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is a member in good standing of any chapter in the state of Georgia shall have the privilege of attending the annual State Conference.
- Section 7. At the opening of the annual State Conference the privilege of the floor and the right to speak shall be accorded to the State Chairmen and State Vice Chairmen. They may not vote unless they are duly registered as voters of the State Conference.
- **Section 8.** Special meetings of the State Society may be called by the State Regent or the Executive Committee. Fifteen (15) days' notice of the time and place shall be given. The business to be transacted at any special meeting shall be limited to that mentioned in the call.
- **Section 9.** Forty-five (45) voting members, representing not less than twenty (20) chapters, shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Conference.
  - **Section 10.** Proxy voting. There shall be no proxy voting at any state meeting.
- **Section 11.** Electronic Participation. Provision may be allowed for members who are unable to attend in person to participate by electronic means. Participation, if available, will be subject to any limitations established in special rules of order or standing rules adopted to govern such participation, and at reasonable expense to the state. Electronic mail (email) shall not be used to conduct meetings or to hold a vote.
  - Section 12. Emergency Electronic Platform Meetings. In the event of a state or

nationally declared catastrophic event where in person gathering is not possible, prohibited or discouraged, the Executive Committee by majority vote, may authorize a virtual platform meeting of the state society. The meeting will be subject to all rules adopted by the Executive Committee. These rules shall supersede any conflicting rules in the parliamentary authority but may not otherwise conflict with rules or decisions of the Society. A secure, anonymous vote conducted through the designated voting platform shall be deemed a ballot vote, fulfilling any requirement in the bylaws or rules that a vote be by ballot.

**Section 13.** Notice. Unless members indicate otherwise to the regent and/or the corresponding secretary, in writing, all communication required in these bylaws, including meeting notices, may be sent using electronic measures, including email.

## Article VIII STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

**Section 1.** The state officers, the officers of the National Society whose membership is within the state, the Honorary State Regents, <u>past national officers whose membership is within the state and whose service as a national officer was as a member of the Georgia Society, and the Regents, or in their absence, the Vice Regents of the chapters of the state, shall constitute the State Board of Management.</u>

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall hold a regular meeting between annual meetings. It may meet whenever called by the State Regent. A minimum of thirty (30) days' notice shall be given as to the time and place of any such meeting.

**Section 3.** Thirty (30) members shall constitute a quorum of the State Board of Management.

**Section 4.** The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Georgia State Society between annual meetings, except that of changing or modifying any action taken by the State Conference or as proscribed by these Bylaws.

**Section 5.** All members in good standing of the Georgia State Society may attend the meeting of the State Board of Management. The State chairmen, Vice chairmen, committee members of Administrative, Standing, Special, State and Meadow Garden Committees shall be granted the privilege of the floor and the right to speak, but shall not vote.

**Section 6.** The Parliamentarian shall attend the meetings of the State Board of Management, but may not yote.

**Section 7.** Proxy voting. There shall be no proxy voting.

Section 8. Electronic Participation. Provision may be allowed for voting members who are unable to attend in person to participate by electronic means, so long as all voting members can simultaneously hear each other and participate, subject to any limitations established in special rules of order or standing rules adopted to govern such participation, and at reasonable expense to the state. Electronic mail (email) shall not be used to conduct meetings.

**Section 9.** Notice. Unless members indicate otherwise to the regent and/or the corresponding secretary, in writing, all communication required in these bylaws, including meeting notices, may be sent using electronic measures, including email.

### Article IX EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

- **Section 1.** The officers of the Georgia State Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.
- **Section 2.** The Parliamentarian, at the request of the State Regent, shall attend the meetings, but may not vote.

Section 3. This Executive Committee shall:

- (a) perform such duties of the State Board of Management between its meetings as may from time to time seem expedient;
- (b) meet at the call of the State Regent, or upon written request of three (3) members of the committee:
  - (c) vote by teleconference, email or fax, if necessary;

- (d) receive and make recommendations for projects requiring expenditure of funds outside routine expenditures to be considered by the State Conference. This includes the State Regent's Projects within the State of Georgia, at the National Society, and at the DARapproved schools.
  - (e) make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.
- Section 4. Provision may be allowed for members who are unable to attend in person to participate by electronic means, so long as all members can simultaneously hear each other and participate, subject to any limitations established in special rules of order or standing rules adopted to govern such participation, and at reasonable expense to the state. Electronic mail (email) shall not be used to conduct meetings.
- <u>Section 5.</u> Decisions of the Executive Committee shall be acted upon at the next meeting of the State Board of Management or at State Conference, whichever shall come first.
- Section 6. Quorum. Seven members of the executive committee shall constitute a quorum.
  - **Section 7.** Proxy voting. There shall be no proxy voting.
- **Section 8.** Notice. Unless members indicate otherwise to the regent and/or the corresponding secretary, in writing, all communication required in these bylaws, including meeting notices, may be sent using electronic measures, including email.
- **Section 9.** Email Voting. In matters that require urgency and when a meeting is not critical to a decision, and with the written permission of a majority of members, a vote may be conducted by electronic mail (email) which must be ratified at the next meeting.

## Article X FINANCES

- **Section 1.** (a) The fiscal year of the Georgia State Society shall be July 1 through the last day of June.
- (b) The annual budget, prepared by the Finance Committee, shall cover the fiscal year and be prepared on the basis of dues payable for the calendar year beginning December first preceding.
- (c) The Finance Committee shall propose the per capita amount and distribution according to the annual membership count. The per capita amount and distribution shall be indicated on the budget presented annually. Funds to be included in the per capita designations shall be Friends of DAR Schools, Lucy Cook Peel Fund, McCall Genealogical Fund and Meadow Garden.
- Section 2. Annual Dues. The annual state dues for each chapter shall be \$15.00 per member which shall be sent by the chapter treasurer and shall be postmarked no later than December 1. A chapter whose dues have not been paid by December 1 shall be notified by the state treasurer that the chapter shall not be entitled to representation at the state conference.
- **Section 3.** (a) Each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer, with the state dues, a conference registration fee of \$15.00 for each voter to which the chapter is entitled under these Bylaws. This fee to be paid whether chapter is represented or not.
- (b) Honorary State Regents, <u>Past National Officers whose membership is within the state and whose service as a national officer was as a member of the Georgia Society</u>, and State Officers shall pay a conference fee of \$15.00 at the time of registration or shall include the conference registration fee in the <u>payment</u> for Conference meal reservations.
- (c) Other members of the Georgia State Society who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters shall pay a conference fee of \$10.00 at the time of registration or shall include the conference registration fee in the <u>payment</u> for Conference meal reservations.
- (d) <u>The State Society may charge a registration fee</u> to off-set the cost of hosting state/district meetings.
- Section 4. New Chapters. (a) Newly organized chapters shall pay state dues within 60 days after the date of confirmation. (b) The state dues of new chapters organized between

<u>December 1 and June 30 will be allocated to the current year. The state dues of new chapters organized after July 1 will be allocated to the upcoming year.</u>

<u>Section 5.</u> (a) The State Treasurer and the State Regent and such others entrusted with funds of the Georgia State Society as may be designated by the State Board of Management shall be bonded. (See Article VI, Sections 2 and 9);

- (b) The State Treasurer with the approval of the State Regent and the State Chair of the Finance Committee shall place the funds of the Georgia State Society in financial institutions insured by the Federal Government, the amount in any one institution not to exceed the maximum amount of insurance coverage;
- (c) The placement of restricted savings funds and investment funds of the Georgia State Society shall be placed to the credit of the Georgia State Society by the State Treasurer under the direction of the Finance Committee. Monies may be invested in U. S. Treasury obligations or other interest bearing obligations of federally insured financial institutions;
- (d) The accounts of the State Treasurer shall be annually prepared for audit by a Certified Public Accountant immediately following the end of the State Society fiscal year and no later than July 15 and delivered to the CPA by that date;
- (e) Should the State Treasurer be incapacitated, the State Regent, after consultation with the Chair of the Finance Committee and with the approval of the Executive Committee, shall appoint an Acting State Treasurer to serve until such time as the State Treasurer is able to resume her duties or a new State Treasurer is appointed and ratified as stated in Article V, Section 5 (a).

<u>Section 6.</u> The expenses incurred by the State Regent in the performance of duty shall be paid each year from the State Dues Fund:

- (a) **Six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00)** shall be taken each year to defray her necessary travel expenses;
- (b) Necessary administrative expenses of the State Regent, as budgeted, shall be paid by the State Treasurer who shall keep all receipts of these expenses. No expenses exceeding the budgeted amount shall be paid by the State Treasurer.

<u>Section 7.</u> At the close of the books annually, \$5,000.00 shall be kept in the General Fund as a "Reserve for Contingencies Fund" so that at the end of each administration a total of \$10,000.00 will be reserved. This money is to be used to pay for the Proceedings of the previous administration and to pay initial operating costs of the new administration.

### Article XI COMMITTEES

**Section 1.** The Honorary State Regents of the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution shall function as an advisory committee to the State Regent and to the Georgia State Society.

**Section 2**. The State Regent shall appoint the following standing committees:

- (a) Bylaws: This committee shall be composed of one (1) Honorary State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and one (1) member from each of the districts; each of the members representing the districts shall not be serving on any other State Standing Committee. The State Parliamentarian shall serve as an advisory member of the committee. The State Regent shall appoint the chair of the committee.
- (b) Finance: This committee shall be composed of seven (7) members to include the State First Vice Regent, the State Treasurer, the immediate past State Treasurer, one (1) Honorary State Regent, one (1) active chapter regent, and two (2) active chapter members from different districts, neither of whom shall be an Honorary State Regent nor a State Officer nor a chapter regent nor from the same district as the appointed active chapter regent. From these seven (7) members the State Regent shall appoint the chair of the committee. This committee shall also serve as a Budget Committee to recommend to the State Board of Management the allocation of the State Dues Fund. This committee shall have charge of all investments of the Georgia State Society's funds.
- (c) <u>Proceedings:</u> This committee shall be composed of the State Recording Secretary, the immediate past State Recording Secretary, the State First Vice Regent, and four (4)

additional members, at least one of whom shall be an Honorary State Regent. The four (4) members, including the Honorary State Regent, shall represent different districts; and the members, excluding the Honorary State Regent, shall not be serving on any other State Standing Committee. The State Regent shall appoint the chair of the committee.

**Section 3.** The State Regent shall appoint such other committees, standing or special, as the State Conference shall authorize and actions of the State Board of Management and of the National Society shall require. The appointments shall be concurrent with the term of the State Regent making the appointments and shall terminate with the end of the administration.

**Section 4.** Additional appointments may be made to any of the committees and vacancies shall be filled by the State Regent with timely notification to the membership.

**Section 5.** The duties of committees shall be such as these Bylaws, the State Conference, the State Board of Management or the National Society shall prescribe.

**Section 6.** All chairmen will keep a Procedure Book of instructions, helpful suggestions and recommendations to be turned over to the new chairmen to facilitate their responsibilities, thus providing a continuity of DAR work.

**Section 7.** Quorum. A quorum of each committee shall be a majority of the committee members.

Section 8. Proxy voting. There shall be no proxy voting.

Section 9. Meetings. Provision may be allowed for committee members who are unable to attend in person to participate by electronic means, so long as all committee members can simultaneously hear each other and participate, subject to any limitations established in special rules of order or standing rules adopted to govern such participation, and at reasonable expense to the state or committee. Electronic mail (email) shall not be used to conduct meetings.

**Section 10.** Notice. Unless committee members indicate otherwise to the chair, in writing, all communication required in these bylaws, including meeting notices, may be sent using electronic measures, including email.

Section 11. Email Voting. In matters that require urgency and when a meeting is not critical to a decision, and with the written permission of a majority of committee members, a vote may be conducted by electronic mail (email) which must be ratified at the next meeting.

## Article XII CHAPTERS

**Section 1.** Chapter elections shall be held no later than April 1 in the year of chapter elections. The Chapter Regent shall report annually the names of the elected officers promptly on the form provided by the State Regent for this purpose, with copies to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Regent, and the State Recording Secretary.

**Section 2.** The Chapter Regent shall send a report of the year's work to the State Regent, the State Recording Secretary, and the District Director at the time designated by the State Regent

## Article XIII DISTRICTS

**Section 1.** The State Regent-elect shall divide the state into a minimum of four districts, using logic and geography to determine boundaries.

**Section 2.** Workshop(s) shall be held annually, the location(s) shall be strategically chosen to be convenient to the Georgia chapter members.

**Section 3.** The State Regent shall appoint a Coordinator of Districts who shall have served a full two-year term as a District Director, and who is not serving as a chapter regent during her term as Coordinator of Districts. She shall work with the State Regent and the District Directors in coordinating the workshop(s) and the State Regent's official chapter visits in each district; and shall offer guidance to the District Directors.

**Section 4.** The State Regent shall appoint a District Director to serve in each district. She shall have served a full two-year term as a chapter regent within the district she serves as

Director. She shall work with the hostess chapter(s) in planning the workshop within her district and shall work with the State Regent in planning her official visits to the chapters within her district and may accompany the State Regent on these official visits.

### Article XIV MEADOW GARDEN

Meadow Garden, property owned by the Georgia State Society, NSDAR, shall be operated as follows:

- (a) The governing body shall be the Board of Trustees composed of the following members: the State Regent, the State First Vice Regent and the Meadow Garden Chair who shall be appointed by the State Regent;
- (b) The Meadow Garden Board shall be composed of the following members: the State Regent who shall serve as Chair; the State First Vice Regent who shall serve as Secretary; the Chair of Meadow Garden; the Regents of the Augusta and College Hill Chapters; the State Treasurer; two (2) Honorary State Regents; and the chairmen of the six (6) subcommittees appointed by the State Regent Docents, Furnishings, Landscaping, Gift Shop, Patrons and Public Relations.
- (c) The Meadow Garden Board shall operate with Standing Rules approved by the State Conference.

## Article XV PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

Section 1. The rules contained in the current edition of Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern this organization in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the bylaws, standing rules, or rulings of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, these bylaws, or any special rules of order the organization may adopt.

**Section 2.** The State Conference may, by a two-thirds vote, adopt such additional rules of order as it may deem advisable for any meeting of the Conference, provided they are not in conflict with the State and National Bylaws.

## Article XVI AMENDMENT OF BYLAWS

**Section 1.** The Bylaws of the Georgia State Society may be amended at any annual State Conference, provided the proposed amendments shall have been submitted to the State Regent, the State Parliamentarian, and the State Bylaws Chair at least two weeks prior to the State Board of Management. The proposed amendments should include the date of the proposal with the rationale and the name of the proposer. The State Regent shall send a copy of the proposed amendment to each chapter, at least sixty (60) days prior to State Conference, with her message carrying the Call to Conference.

**Section 2.** The Bylaws Committee shall forward to the State Regent proposed amendments duly submitted, provided the subject matter is suitable for inclusion in the Bylaws and the proposal is in proper form, and if found not to be suitable subject matter, may reject the proposal, or if not in proper form, may revise, return it to the proposer for redrafting, or take such action as is deemed in order.

**Section 3.** Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in motion to adopt, an amendment to these Bylaws shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is so adopted.

**Section 4.** Mandatory Amendments. Any amendment to the bylaws of the National Society shall become the law of the state without further notice.

### Article XVII DISSOLUTION

Although the period of duration of the <u>state organization</u> is perpetual, if for any reason the <u>state organization</u> is to be dissolved or otherwise terminated, no part of the property of

the <u>state organization</u> or any of the proceeds shall be distributed to or inure to the benefit of any of the officers or members of the <u>state organization</u>. Upon the dissolution of the state organization, assets shall be distributed by the Board of Management and/or the Executive Committee to and only to the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the local United States District Court, exclusively to such organization or organizations as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated within the meaning of section 501(c)(3), with purposes and objectives consistent with those of the state organization.

### **State Conferences**

The first State Conference was called by Mrs. S. B. C. Morgan, State Regent, and was held at the Atlanta Exposition in 1895. The Annual Conference began in 1899. In that year, a Conference for the purpose of effecting a State organization was called by Mrs. Robert Emory Park, State Regent, and was held in Atlanta, May 23-24, 1899. Bylaws were adopted, and State officers elected. The succeeding Conferences were numbered from this Conference, until the Conference of 1909 adopted a motion, offered by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, "that the first State Conference in 1895 be recognized and the next Annual Conference, instead of being the twelfth, shall be the thirteenth." (Minutes, p. 21) No Conference was held in 1911, the time of meeting having been changed from the Fall to the first part of the year by the Conference in 1910, which adopted a recommendation by the Executive Board (made on the motion of Mrs. P. W. Godfrey) "that the State Conference be carried over from November 1910 to 1912, prior to Congress in 1912," and amended by Miss Ruby Felder Ray of Atlanta "that we have Conference in the Spring not to interfere with Lent." (Minutes, page 211).

### ANNUAL STATE SOCIETY CONTRIBUTION TO THE PRESIDENT GENERAL'S PROJECT

The Georgia State Society will contribute to the President General's Project, the amount equal to the Benefactor Level, such funds to be debited from the GSS State Dues Unallocated Money Market Account, and the gift to be made the first year of the State Regent's term.

#### **AWARDS**

All Chapters competing for awards must send reports to the respective chairs by the listed due dates. See the "Chapter Officers' Calendar" for a compilation of dates or the Individual Chair's Instructions in the CIP (Chapter Information Packet). Both documents are posted on-line on the Georgia Members Website. All reports for awards are based on membership confirmed by the National Society. The reporting year is January 1 - December 31.

#### **BYLAWS**

Chapter Bylaws MUST NOT conflict with the National or State Bylaws, and a current copy is to be filed with the State Parliamentarian. Proposed Amendments to the State Bylaws shall include the date of the Proposal with the Rationale and name of the Proposer and shall be sent to the State Regent, the State Parliamentarian, and the State Chair of the Bylaws Committee at least two (2) weeks prior to the GSSDAR State Board of Management meeting. *Proceedings* amended 2017-2018.

### CHANGE OF NAME AND/OR ADDRESS

Notice of change of name and/or address of members shall be promptly reported to the Organizing Secretary General on the Membership Change Form or by eMembership; also notify the State Regent, State Corresponding Secretary, and State Registrar by the Chapter Registrar.

### **CHAPTER ELECTIONS**

Chapter elections are to be held before April 1. Names of officers shall be promptly entered via eMembership-Chapter Officer Updates by the outgoing chapter regent. The full name of chapter officers shall be given, along with her address, zip code, telephone number, and email. In accordance with the National Bylaws, a Chapter Regent may not serve for more than six consecutive years.

## CHAPTER REPRESENTATION AT STATE AND NATIONAL MEETINGS

At the State Board of Management, a chapter is represented by the Chapter Regent or in her absence by the First Vice Regent. All members in good standing of the Georgia State Society may attend the State Board of Management but shall not vote.

The voting representation of each chapter at State Conference and Continental Congress shall be based upon the number of members whose dues for the current year have been received in the Office of the Treasurer General by December 1. Membership 12-19: Regent only; 20-49: Regent + 1 delegate = 2 votes; 50-99: Regent + 2 delegates= 3 votes; 100-149: Regent + 3 delegates = 4 votes; 150-199: Regent + 4 delegates = 5 votes; 200-249: Regent + 5 delegates = 6 votes; 250-299: Regent + 6 delegates = 7 votes. Chapters with membership of 300 and over will have an additional delegate for each additional 50 members exceeding 299.

### CONFERENCE REGISTRATION

On or before December 1, each chapter shall send to the State Treasurer the state dues and a Conference Registration fee of \$15.00 per each delegate to which the chapter is entitled under the Bylaws. This fee is to be paid whether represented or not and is derived by recommendation of the Finance Committee to the Executive Committee. This is a requirement stated in the Georgia State Bylaws, Article X, Section 3 (a).

State Officers and Honorary State Regents shall pay the Conference Registration Fee of \$15.00 at the time of registration. Other members of the Georgia State Society, who are not duly elected voters from their respective chapters, shall pay a Conference Registration Fee of \$10.00 at the time of registration.

The deadline for chapter contributions to the Georgia co-op ads, sent to the State Treasurer, is November 1. The checks are to be made payable to the Georgia State Society, NSDAR.

### DATE FOR ANNUAL AUDIT

The Georgia State Society Fiscal Year is July 1 to June 30. State Bylaws, Article X, Section 1 (a). The State Treasurer should prepare the books for an annual audit within fifteen (15) days of the close of the State Society's fiscal year. Bylaw Article VI, Section 9 (j).

#### **DEADLINES**

State Officers and Chairs welcome chapter reports when completed. Deadline dates are given to ensure conformity for inclusion in reports to National Officers. Per National Society Bylaws, the deadline date is determined by the United States Postal Service or other carrier, showing cancellation date and not by the date reports are received.

### **DECEASED MEMBERS**

Deaths shall be reported promptly to the Organizing Secretary General, the State Chaplain and the State Registrar by the corresponding Chapter officer. A complete list of deceased members' full name and date of death shall be furnished to the State Chaplain prior to the State Conference in order that they may be recorded correctly for the Conference Memorial Service and for State *Proceedings*.

#### DUFS

Before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer sends to the State Treasurer state dues of \$15.00 per member. State dues shall immediately be paid on all new members accepted at the monthly National Board of Management meeting, which is the 5th of every month. Before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer sends to the office of the Organizing Secretary General, a check payable to Treasurer General NSDAR, or pays by Electronic Direct Payment through eMembership, National Dues for each member except Life Members, with check made payable to the Treasurer General NSDAR.

### **GEORGIA HOSPITALITY FUND**

WHEREAS, the Georgia State Society, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, holds a social event in Washington during Continental Congress which necessitates expenditures for decorations and ten (10) guests of the State Regent and no more than one (1) representative of the one (1) DAR School and each of the four (4) DAR-approved schools for a maximum of fifteen (15) guests of the Georgia State Society; all other guests are paid by the Georgia Daughter who invites the guest. THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Georgia State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, establish a Georgia Hospitality Fund, the budgeted amount to be determined by the Finance Committee, to be used for the above purposes; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this fund shall not be cumulative.

**RESOLVED:** that the resolution entitled "State Events Contingency Fund" be amended by striking \$5,000.00 and inserting \$10,000.00. These funds are to secure anticipated deposits for State Events and are to be replaced from state fund income, reimbursing the fund yearly for the amount used. To establish the \$10,000.00, the additional \$5,000.00 shall come from the general checking account. *Proceedings* 2009-2010, amended 2012.

The Georgia State Society may charge a registration fee to off-set the cost of hosting any state meetings.
